PRESIDENT'S CORNER

The September opening of the college brought us approximately 1390 fulltime-equivalent students, measured in terms of business office receipts. In addition, we have students registered for courses in the joint program of the Williamsport Hospital Nursing Program and Lycoming College. LEAP is an apparent success for the fall; approximately 30 persons took advantage of the opportunity to register for one course on a no-charge, audit basis. The residence halls have reached their capacity of 1100+ students, so that our problems there will not be lack of a "full house."

Fortunately, we have budgeted carefully for 1974-75, and this enrollment will put us almost exactly on target. If social and economic conditions permit us to retain the usual percentage of our students throughout the academic year, we shall have only inflation to worry us seriously. We are making every effort to maintain the level of giving to the college on the part of our constituents, but the cost of living is adversely affecting these friends also. If the recently enacted Pennsylvania Institutional Assistance Grants prove to be operable and acceptable to this institution, we shall probably have over \$100,000 from that source to help us meet rapidly rising costs in almost all areas, particularly in college financial assistance to students.

This will not be an easy academic year. We have been forced to cut expenditures in many "things." By June of 1975 we shall have also reduced faculty and staff positions significantly, and each such reduction causes deep personal and institutional pain. Since our fulltime-equivalent enrollment is approximately one hundred lower than a year ago, the yield from increases in tuition does not match the loss from a smaller number of persons paying the increased tuition. We simply must adapt our academic programs and personnel to the smaller enrollments which we expected for this academic year and the years immediately following.

And yet we are among the fortunate 30% in the academic world. Lycoming has been in that select list of institutions which has not experienced an operating deficit during the past few years--nor do we project such a deficit. Our faculty and staff have consulted with us throughout this difficult planning, and their support has made success possible. Although decisions have been difficult and painful, they have been made in fairness and have left our academic program strong and forward-looking.

HOMECOMING 1974

The football game on Saturday afternoon at College Field and the Homecoming Concert-Dance in the Ballroom of the Lycoming Hotel will be two of the main features of Homecoming-1974. The Warriors will meet Towson State at 1:30 p.m. Traditional Homecoming festivities will begin on Friday and carry through Sunday.

The highly acclaimed and very popular Bucknell Jazz and Rock Ensemble will be featured at the Saturday night Concert-Dance. A large attendance is anticipated at this event. Early reservation of tickets is recommended.

Alumni are urged to call other alumni and plan to meet at Lycoming for Homecoming-1974.

Dr. Smith also lent considerable help in the Department of Theoretical Physics in the preparation of a paper on the Irreversibility of Transport Equations. But his most pleasant activities took place at the Astronomical Observatory, where with good luck they were able to obtain on January 11, 1974, a photograph of the elusive comet Kohoutek. Smith also had the occasion to obtain several photographs of the transit of Mercury on November 10, 1973.

During his stay in Spain he collected a large amount of teaching materials, books, slides, etc., which will be quite useful in his teaching.

Last, but not least, Dr. Smith mentioned that he gave several talks on the subject of UFO's, which might still be controversial in the USA, but is a quite respectable scientific topic in Europe. Three of these talks were presented at universities (Valencia, Castellon, Alicante), and the rest, for academically related groups and organizations in the area of Valencia. All were well attended and received a very good press coverage.

PRESEASON FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

A prevailing mood of optimism has been much in evidence from the opening day of the Warriors' pre-season football drills as the Blue and Gold prepared to meet Lock Haven in the first of nine contests on the 1974 schedule.

Most observers have been impressed by the team in both intrasquad competition as well as in a controlled scrimmage against Bloomsburg State College. Some are already predicting a winning season for the first time since 1965.

A solid nucleus of 23 lettermen is back from last year, but the key to a successful season may be the performance of at least five freshmen on the offensive unit. Lack of a consistent running attack for the last several years has effectively blunted a better than average passing game, but this year may be different.

In addition to the return of all running backs from 1973, several freshmen have added speed to the ground game, including Gene Fairfax, an outstanding schoolboy halfback at Williamsport High School. Fairfax, who interrupted his education by enlisting in the Navy, has been playing service ball for the last four years.

The offensive line also appears to be improved with the addition of several fine looking freshmen who may bump veterans from starting spots. Both Barry Belgrade, out of Easton, Pa., and Joe Joyce, from Warminster, Pa., could start at tackles, and the two guard spots may be occupied by Mike Borkowski, of Levittown, Pa., and Dominic Johnson, of Willingboro, N.J. All four tip the scales between 210 and 225 and show excellent mobility.

Bill Grace and John Johnson, two sophomores who shared the quarterback starting roles

last year as freshmen, will be throwing to a group of veteran receivers led by Jim Rich, Pete Onorati, and John Vanaskie.

The defensive unit lost three excellent players by graduation, including Wayne Goodrow, middle guard; Steve Wisner, linebacker, and Angelo Fanelli, tackle, but still looked most impressive in containing the Bloomsburg attack in the scrimmage session.

In other Lycoming sports, the soccer team coached by Nels Phillips has a solid nucleus of veterans returning for the 10-game schedule that includes seven Middle Atlantic Conference games. The fall tennis team coached by Sally Vargo will compete in six events, and the field hockey squad under the direction of Louise Courtney will face eight opponents.

Busey Heads MAC

DAVE BUSEY, athletic director at Lycoming, was elected president of the 26-school Middle Atlantic Conference in June. He succeeds Bob Latour of Bucknell who is now president of the 12-school Eastern Collegiate Conference (formerly the University Division of the MAC).

Mr. Busey, in assuming the presidency of the MAC, will be heading what was formerly the college division of the conference.

For many years the MAC was divided into two divisions, college and university, for intercollegiate sports competition but functioned as an entity for most administrative purposes. For several years officials of the 12 schools comprising the university division had been considering the advisability of breaking away from the two division structure and forming their own conference.

After reviewing the pros and cons of the move, they completed the final plans late in 1973 and in the spring of 1974 announced intentions of dissolving their relationship with the Middle Atlantic Conference to organize their own league, which they named the Eastern Collegiate Conference.

With the dissolution of the two-tier conference, representatives from the college division then met to reorganize the administrative structure necessary to continue their own intercollegiate sports program.

The decision by the university division to form their own conference terminated a structure that had evolved slowly over the years since the Middle Atlantic Conference was formed in 1912. The MAC was first organized as a conference with all member schools competing in a common schedule.

However, during the intervening years, with additional sports being added and enrollment and sports emphasis at various schools developing at an uneven pace, some of the schools began dominating the intercollegiate events. It was this situation that resulted in the formation of two divisions several decades ago.
