





Fall Trustee Meeting

The annual fall meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the conference room of Long Hall on Thursday, October 21. W. Gibbs McKenney, Jr., chairman of the board, presided over the two-hour session that was attended by twenty-three trustees, the president of the college, and several members of the administrative staff. Two student reporters were also present.

In his first report to the trustees—"The State of the College: Perspectives of a New President"—Dr. Blumer indicated that there is much to keep him busy. The first part of his report dealt with the academic program, personnel, facilities and students. His assessment, in general, was that "Lycoming College is a very good school," that it "is fortunate to have an outstanding faculty and staff," and that it "enjoys the benefits of superior physical facilities." About the student body, Dr. Blumer observed that, "Already I have come to appreciate Lycoming students. Whether my new assignment has made me more sensitive to their needs and perspectives, or whether Lycoming students are simply more appealing than those with whom I have worked before, I cannot say. But I feel obliged to report that our student body is a genuine asset to this institution."

Next, the president spoke of needs. He recognized the "acute need to reestablish a sense of community which is based upon a foundation of trust and reciprocal interdependence among its various constituencies."

"Lycoming College also faces an immediate need to redesign its administrative structure and to revise some of its administrative procedures. A more extensive development program should be organized to increase gift income and thereby decrease our dependency upon tuition."

Speaking of stabilizing the academic program and curriculum, Dr. Blumer pointed out, "The mission of this church-related liberal arts college provides the basic norm for determining the content of the curriculum and we must allow that mission to guide our curriculum design."

Under the category of physical needs, the president stated, "A new gymnasium is badly needed. Instructional equipment is lacking in some departments. Library acquisitions are not keeping pace with the rate of publications in some disciplines."

Next, Dr. Blumer set the following objectives for 1976-77.

1. Reorganize the administration
2. Organize a coordinated development program, including a capital campaign to underwrite a new physical education building, as well as a more active deferred giving program and more effective utilization of all constituencies in the development effort.
3. Establish a single house organ for on-campus communications.
4. Centralize all budgets and business accounts, standardize purchasing procedures, and introduce a modified form of zero base budgeting.

Records Shattered By Football Team

Records are usually broken when a sports team compiles an outstanding won-lost mark, and this pleasing combination of events occurred this year when 14 school records, both team and individual, were broken or equaled as the Warrior football team rolled over eight opponents while losing only to Albright for the finest season in the history of the grid sport at Lycoming.

In addition, the Warriors were in excellent position to retain the title of national defensive champions won last year in N. C. A. A., Division III. With the Lycoming regular season completed, and only a few teams having games remaining, no one appeared to be in a position to edge the Warriors from the first-place spot they had held for the final three weeks of their schedule. They also had a solid grasp on the national rushing defense title, where last year they had finished in the runner-up spot. The Warriors also captured the Number One defensive team ranking in the Middle Atlantic Conference.

The Warriors' regular season 8-1 record was not only the best percentage mark ever compiled by a Lycoming team, it also produced the most wins in one season, surpassing the 7-1 mark established by the 1958 team. Also, when senior fullback Clark-Gaughan crasped through the Western Maryland line from 3 yards out with 30 seconds remaining in the 28-13 win in the final game, the 6 points broke a previous mark of 185 scored in one season by the 1958 squad. The new record of 192 points was established when senior Dave Bleistein added the extra point from placement.

The seven consecutive victories following the 20-14 Albright loss in the second game of the year also exceeded the previous mark of six straight wins ending the 1957 season and beginning the 1958. The two Lycoming quarterbacks, senior John Johnson and sophomore Frank Morogbiello, also set a season team record by combining for 14 touchdown passes to surpass the 8 scoring aeriels in 1967.

Individual records, both for single game and the season, were broken or tied by 5 players in 9 categories with sophomore tailback Kevin McVey leading the way with 4. McVey carried the ball 219 times for a net of 833 yards, both new season records, and scored 7 touchdowns, equaling a season mark. The previous rushing records of 165 times carried for 617 yards had been established by Seth Keller in 1963. John Grier in 1958 and Ronald Betts in 1967 each scored 7 touchdowns. McVey also set a single game mark of 39 carries in one game against Albright and matched the total in the game at Western Maryland. The previous high of 31 was set by John Grier in 1955 and equaled by Keller in 1963.

McVey also may have established a fifth record when he went over the 1000-yard mark in combined rushing, pass receiving, and kickoff return statistics. The 145-pound sophomore caught 11 passes for 68 yards and returned 8 kickoffs for 165 yards for a com-

5. Evaluate the current student financial aid program to determine what the scope of the program should be at Lycoming and how these expenditures can be used more effectively.

The president indicated that progress toward some of the objectives was under way and that they are realistic and within our reach.

The trustees approved a total budget of over \$5.25 million for the 1976-77 fiscal year, and it is a balanced budget.

Finally, the trustees authorized the president and the Executive Committee to proceed with necessary planning to construct a new physical education and recreation center. More specifically, authorization was given to employ a capital fund director, to study the impact of such a facility on the rest of the campus, and to commission an architect at the proper time. At the same time, it was emphasized that details concerning funding or a target date for construction have not been determined. When these details have been finalized, our readers will be among the first to know.

The following resolution was also approved by the trustees

"Be it resolved that the inauguration of Frederick E. Blumer, eleventh president of Lycoming College, be held at 2:30 p. m., April 16, 1977, in the Pine Street United Methodist Church. Activities associated with the inauguration will include a luncheon for delegates and the Lycoming faculty, an afternoon reception for the community and an evening dance for the student body. Arrangements for these events will be planned and coordinated by the administration."

Two new trustees, Walter W. Whit, '65, Camp Hill attorney, and the Hon. Kent D. Shelbamer, member of the Pennsylvania Assembly from Berwick, were welcomed to their first meeting

...total of 1,069. However, no previous records have been compiled combining the three areas, and the mark will remain "unofficial."

Other individual records broken include 9 touchdown passes by Morogiello, exceeding Mike Cohen's 7 in 1963, 29 punt returns by junior defensive back Dwight Stilwell, surpassing the 27 by Vinnie Joy in 1971, and 24 extra point conversions by Bleistein, breaking his own mark of 17 set last year. Bleistein missed only 3 extra point attempts in his varsity career, successfully hitting on 44 of 47. He also booted three field goals.

Two records were equaled during the season. Junior defensive back Ray Radomicki picked off three Western Maryland passes to tie a single game record set by Ed Biggio in 1971, and junior slot back Jim Jeffries caught 5 touchdown passes during the year to equal a season mark held by Tom Craier and set in 1966.

ECAC Cites Warriors

Lycoming's football team won seven consecutive games to end the 1976 season for a new school record and for each of those victories an individual player was cited for outstanding play by the Eastern College Athletic Conference.

When junior defensive back Ray Radomicki intercepted three passes against Western Maryland in the final game of the year to tie a school record set in 1971 by Ed Biggio, he became the fifth player on the 1976 squad to be named to the weekly honor roll by the E.C.A.C. Two players, middle guard Mike Prowant and tailback Kevin McVey, were cited twice. Others named included tight end Gene Daly and linebacker Randy Parsons.

Prowant led off the string of seven by being selected for his play in the 21-15 victory over Wilkes and repeated the following week in a 13-3 homecoming win over Susquehanna. The junior middle guard blocked a punt which was converted into a touchdown and made 11 tackles against Wilkes. He repeated his outstanding performance against the Crusaders with two pass interceptions, a rare feat for a middle guard, recovered a fumble and was in on 15 tackles. He was also named the most valuable player of the game by the homecoming committee.

McVey, a sophomore, ran for 163 yards and scored 2 touchdowns in a 21-0 win over Delaware Valley. The 145-pound tailback returned to another fine performance in a 42-0 romp over Fairleigh Dickinson when he ran for 99 yards and scored 2 touchdowns while playing only a little more than half the game.

Daly, a sophomore, caught two touchdown

passes, both on crucial fourth downs, in the close 14-13 victory over Junata. He also had two other receptions for a total of 115 yards. Parsons, a senior, was cited for his outstanding performance in the 17-10 win

over Upsala when he was instrumental in holding the Vikings ground game to a minus 5 yards. He participated in 16 tackles and blocked an Upsala punt to set up the first Lycoming score.

Winter Teams Open Schedule Nov. 29

Candidates for the Warriors basketball, wrestling and combined men and women's swimming teams have been practicing since October in preparation for the winter sports program which will officially open on November 29 when the cagers meet Navy at Annapolis.

A major revision in the swimming program was implemented this season on a one-year trial basis when the two-team structure in effect for the last four years was eliminated and both men and women will compete on the same team during the 1976-77 season.

Nine men and three women reported to Susan Hetrick, beginning her second year as coach of the swimmers, when the combined teams began practice for the 10-meet season. Last year the men's team compiled a record of 1-8 and the women were 1-6. Five letterwinners have returned to form a nucleus for the new group. Veterans back include two seniors, Doug Baker and Lynn Martin; two juniors, Sue Sharkey and John Quinn, and sophomore Frank Bartuski. The remainder of the squad includes one senior, Jeff Miller, one junior, Bill Scott, two sophomores, Barb Witty and Keith May, and three freshmen, Mark Fultz, Rick Miskin and Bill Torney.

The swimmers will open the 10-meet schedule on December 1 with Franklin and Marshall in the Warrior pool, followed by three consecutive home meets with Dickinson, Elizabethtown, and Ursinus prior to the holiday-semester break. The team will swing back into action January 15 with a triangular meet with Kings and Rider at Kings. The second half of the schedule also includes Gettysburg, Jersey City State and Lock Haven on the road and Wilkes and Western Maryland at home. The Middle Atlantic Conference Championship Tournament is scheduled for February 25-26.

BURCH GREET'S SIX LETTERMEN

Coach Dutch Burch will build his 1976-77 squad around six lettermen back from the team which last year finished with an overall record of 11-14 and 5-5 in the Middle Atlantic Conference, a mark good enough to give them a playoff spot in the well-balanced MAC. They lost in the first round of the playoffs to Scranton, the team which went on to capture the national championship of Division III.

Of the 14 players on the roster, 2 are seniors, 4 are juniors, 2 are sophomores, and 6 are freshmen. Although the team has no player over 6-6, 7 are 6-3 or more, including the three leading scorers from the 1975-76 squad. Four of the returning players scored more than 100 points last year, including two 6-5 front-court veterans, Jeff Billman, a senior, and Bill Conroy, a junior and the team captain. Billman garnered 303 points and Conroy added 260. The two are also the top returning rebounders with Conroy's 276 the high effort while Billman gathered 187 rebounds.

Mark Molecky, a 6-3 sophomore guard, made the team last year as a freshman and captured a starting spot midway through the year while scoring 259 points. He is being counted on to continue his outstanding play of the second half when the season opens with Navy at Annapolis on November 29. Two other guards, two-year veteran Jim DiMarco, a 5-10 junior, and Mike Brown, a 6-2 sophomore, are also expected to see regular action. Brown, who has been bothered by a knee problem, scored 143 points last year and DiMarco added 57.

returning letterman, saw mostly reserve action last year. He scored 33 points. Dave Gonzales, a 6-3 junior, and Mike Moore, a 5-11 junior, have had little varsity experience.

Ray Graff, at 6-6 the biggest freshman on the squad, could see considerable action, particularly if Billman's knee, which has hampered his play in past years, should continue to give him problems. Other first-year players include Tom Dodds, a 6-4 guard, Chuck Gryczka, a 6-4 center; Mike Moran, a 5-10 guard, and Steve Russell, a 6-0 guard.

WRESTLERS FACE TOUGH SCHEDULE

Coach Budd Whitehill's wrestlers compiled a fine 12-3 record last winter against strong competition which included a number of Eastern wrestling powers. And this year's schedule appears to be even tougher. In addition to the teams which appeared on the 1975-76 schedule, the Warriors have added the University of Pittsburgh, Navy, North Carolina, and Princeton. Locoming will open the season in an invitational team meet at Bucknell on December 3-4 before swinging into the regular dual meet season December 8 at Kings. The Bucknell invitational, in addition to the Warriors and the host school, will include Bloomsburg, Duke, Mansfield, Maryland, Millersville and Buffalo.

Other teams on the schedule include Oswego, Rider, Baptist Bible, West Chester, Delaware Valley, Franklin and Marshall, Wilkes, Scranton, Bucknell, Lebanon Valley, Elizabethtown, Western Maryland and Juniata. All meets are dual except two. Navy, North Carolina and Princeton will be the opponents in a quadrangular at Princeton on January 8, and Elizabethtown, Lebanon Valley and Juniata will tangle with the Warriors on February 12 at Lebanon Valley. Two matches will be wrestled on the same date, January 15, when Whitehill will split his squad to meet the University of Pittsburgh and Baptist Bible, both on the road.

Whitehill and his assistant, Doug Keiper, have been working with what is probably the largest group of candidates in the school's history. More than 50 wrestlers, including 32 freshmen, reported when practice sessions opened and many were still around just prior to the opening meet at Bucknell. Upperclassmen include 4 seniors, 6 juniors and 10 sophomores.

The squad included 11 lettermen who are returning to give Whitehill a solid nucleus of veterans. All 11 compiled individual records of .500 or better last year for a combined mark of 77-42-2. At least one letterman will be back in each weight category except 167, and two will be fighting for the starting nod at 118 and 142. Russ Granato (4-1 last year) and Bill Beasley (7-4) are competing for the 118-pound class while Mike Bradley (9-5), who has moved up from 134, and Harry Shaw (6-2) will vie at 142.

Other returning lettermen, their weights and 1975-76 record include Ron Granato (126, 5-5-2), Bob Scifani (134, 5-1), Craig Savitsky (150, 11-3), Steve Borja (158, 8-5), Brad Young (177, 7-5), Ruddy Parsons (130, 7-7) and Steve Hovey (Hwt., 8-4).
