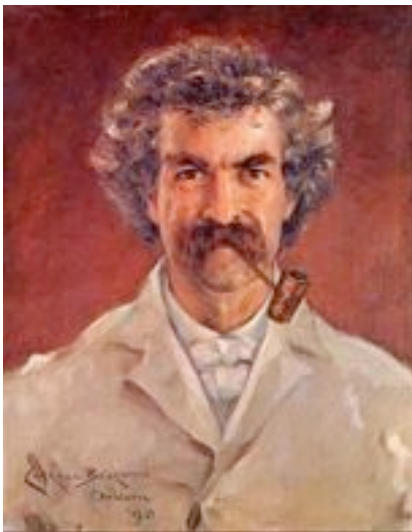


THE MAN THAT CORRUPTED HADLEYBURG
