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PREFACE

The publication of the 1987 Manual for the General Court marks the 50th volume published in this series. With this volume, we celebrate the centennial of this book, initiated one hundred years ago by the 1887 legislature to provide information about New Hampshire state government and its public affairs.

Prior to 1887, this information was available annually in a publication called the New Hampshire Register. This publication included election statistics and legislative and executive branch information.

Beginning with its first edition, the Manual for the General Court, commonly known as the Red Book, has been published each biennium. Hosea Ballou Carter of Hampstead, a political jack-of-all-sorts, compiled the early statistics. The legislature often hired Carter to do various tasks, and it is recorded that in 1880 he served as chairman of the committee on credentials in the Republican State Convention, and the following day, he served in the same position in the Democratic State Convention.

Carter was a self-styled hustler, who in retrospect must have been a delight to know. He had no formal schooling, labelled himself "Hozee," and at 58, when given to wearing a skull cap in public, wrote of himself:

Hozee has hustled as a cyclopedia canvasser, a patent medicine manufacturer, a sewing machine agent, a safe salesman, a desk drummer, a typewriter expert, an editor, a statistician, a detective, a railroad commissioner, a publisher, a politician, a candidate, an office-holder, and even now (1892) he is hustling as chief clerk of the newly created New Hampshire Bureau of Labor.*

During the last one hundred years each Red Book has provided election statistics for primary and general elections during that biennium, and also general information about state government. Some editions also included historic information about New Hampshire and its state government.

This fiftieth edition includes a general index of all previous volumes, which lists various features of previous books, historic information, and the volumes and pages where this information can be located.

The Declaration of Independence is generally regarded as one of the most famous documents in the history of the world. On June 10, 1776, the Continental Congress appointed a committee, consisting of Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman and Robert R. Livingston to draft a Declaration of Independence.

Jefferson wrote out a rough draft of the Declaration, which was carefully revised by the committee and presented to Congress for adoption. After some further slight revisions by that body, it was adopted on July 4, 1776, at Philadelphia.

The parchment with the original signatures was deposited with the Department of State when the government was organized in 1789.

The original Declaration of Independence was transferred from the Department of State by direction of the late President Warren G. Harding to the Library of Congress. The Declaration was moved from the Library of Congress in 1952 at the direction of Congress and transferred to the National Archives Building where it rests today.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

Made by the Original Thirteen States in Congress at Philadelphia
Unanimously adopted July 4, 1776

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume, among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed, by their Creator, with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, that whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established, should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these States. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people should relinquish the right of representation in the legislature, a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected, whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the State remaining, in the meantime exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the laws for naturalization of foreigners, refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither; and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the military independent of and superior to the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation:

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing taxes on us without our consent:

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury:

For transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offenses:

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument the same absolute rule into these colonies:

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments:

For suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here, by declaring us out of his protection, and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy, scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms: our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do in the name, and by authority of the good people of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies, are, and of right ought to be, *free and independent States*; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connexion between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that as *free and independent States*, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which *independent States*, may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honour.

THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION

A Bicentennial Review

My country—yours and mine—is two hundred years old!

That, in itself, is not outstanding. Many nations have existed in one form or another for much longer periods. Egypt, China, Rome, Greece, England and others have far outstripped this time.

The circumstances that makes my country outstanding is that the United States of America is operating under a written form of government, under a Constitution, that is now two centuries old. No other country now existing can make this claim.

Two hundred years ago fifty-five representatives of the independent states met in Philadelphia to resolve the governmental problems then existing under the "Articles of Confederation." The names of many of the delegates are popularly known because of their activities during the Revolution or prominence gained later. Among these were Washington, Franklin, Hamilton, Madison and Robert Morris. John Langdon and Nicholas Gilman represented New Hampshire.

During the summer months of 1787, the Convention drafted the Constitution under which we still operate. They said:

"We the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, ensure Domestic Tranquility, provide for the Common Defense, promote the General Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our posterity do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

The records indicate their strong differences, their difficulties in reaching compromises, their reservations held beyond the days of completion. The fundamental belief that the Constitution should not exist without a Bill of Rights caused several Convention members to refuse to sign the completed document. This was corrected in 1791.

The work of the Constitutional Convention has been called, "The Miracle of Philadelphia." William Gladstone, British Prime Minister in the late 1800's, wrote, "I have always regarded that Constitution as the most remarkable work known to me in modern times to have been produced by the human intellect at a single stroke (so to speak) in its application to political affairs."

It has been said that it would be difficult to find a group of men more qualified by knowledge of the history of governments and the experience of living under the yoke of an unpopular government in which they had little participation. Further, many had taken part in the development of their State Constitutions. Paramount in their concerns were the dangers of centralized power and the arrogance of unquestioned laws emanating from an unreachable source.

Their solution, as we know, was to recognize:

- (1) That government should originate in the people governed;
- (2) That, though generally, people believed in a supreme being, a religion

should not be a part of natural politics; and

- (3) That a three-pronged government with carefully designed checks and balances would enable the nationally elected representatives and officers to perform their duties and still protect the rights of the citizens.

It has worked.

Some have claimed the Constitution is not specific enough to carry out the "original intentions of its drafters." Others say it is arrogance for us, today, to claim knowledge of their intentions. Some say our decisions and changes by Supreme Court rulings go far afield of the original thoughts indicated by the historic record of the convention debates. Others claim all changes have been properly made and show that the true strength of the document lies in its flexibility that allows it to meet the requirements of a changing world.

The words of Benjamin Franklin come to mind. The anecdote is told that as Franklin was leaving the last Convention meeting, a lady approached him and inquired, "Mr. Franklin, what form of government did you design?" Franklin is reported to reply, "A Republic, Madam, if you can keep it."

No attempt to moralize is offered here. However, it seems evident that his successful form of government, based on the supremacy of the people, can only be "kept" if the people act in performing and protecting their function in the governmental design.

In the spring of 1787, New Hampshire was asked to send delegates to a Convention in Philadelphia to meet on May 14, "to take into consideration the situation of the United States, to devise such further provisions as shall appear to them necessary to render the Constitution of the Federal Government adequate to the exigencies of the Union."

This invitation obviously referred to the existing Constitution then called "The Articles of Confederation." Hence, it would appear that the upcoming Convention was limited to potential improvements in that document. As we now know, the Convention discarded the Articles of Confederation and developed the Constitution we use today.

New Hampshire appointed John Langdon and Nicholas Gilman. Both were serving in Congress which was meeting in New York. Although appointed, no funds to cover expenses were available. Two reports covering the financial problem exist. One suggests that New Hampshire politicians were not too sure the Convention should meet, and even if it did, that it could resolve the national problems. The other, and generally considered accurate, is that the Legislature was unable to raise the money to support the delegates. In either case, the delegates from New Hampshire did not arrive in Philadelphia until July 23, when much of the work had been completed. Even then, it had been necessary for John Langdon to pay both his and Gilman's expenses. He was later reimbursed.

Though they represented a small state, they supported the majority group which advocated an effective federal government.

An article from a New Hampshire newspaper reads:

"Portsmouth (New Hampshire) May 19. We are authorized to inform our readers that the probability of the honorable delegates from this state not attending the convention in Philadelphia, causes great uneasiness in the

minds of the true Whigs of New Hampshire, and will occasion a considerable inspection into the state of our finance.

Near one quarter part of the towns in this state have resolved not to send any representatives to the ensuing General Court. A correspondent supposes this circumstance will greatly accelerate public benefits."

The following biographies are copied from "Signers of the Constitution" printed by the U.S. Department of the Interior.

NICHOLAS GILMAN

Member of a distinguished New Hampshire family and second son in a family of eight, Nicholas Gilman was born at Exeter in 1755. He received his education in local schools and worked at his father's general store. When the War of Independence began, he enlisted in the New Hampshire element of the Continental Army, soon won a captaincy, and served throughout the war.

Gilman returned home, again helped his father in the store, and immersed himself in politics. In the period 1786-88 he sat in the Continental Congress, though his attendance record was poor. In 1787 he represented New Hampshire at the Constitutional Convention. He did not arrive in Philadelphia until July 21, by which time much major business had already transpired. Never much of a debater, he made no speeches and played only a minor part in the deliberations. He did, however, serve on the committee on postponed matters. He was also active in obtaining New Hampshire's acceptance of the Constitution and in shepherding it through the Continental Congress.

Gilman later became a prominent Federalist politician. He served in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1789 until 1797; and in 1793 and 1797 was a Presidential elector. He also sat in the New Hampshire legislature in the years 1795, 1802, and 1804, and in 1805-8 and 1811-14 held the office of State treasurer.

Meantime, Gilman's political philosophy had begun to drift toward the Democratic-Republicans. In 1802, when he was defeated for the U.S. Senate, President Jefferson appointed him as a bankruptcy commissioner, and 2 years later as a Democratic-Republican he won election to the U.S. Senate. He was still sitting there when he passed away at Philadelphia, while on his way home from the Nation's Capital, in 1814 at the age of 58. He is interred at the Winter Street Cemetery at Exeter.

JOHN LANGDON

Langdon was born in 1741 at or near Portsmouth, N.H. His father, whose family had emigrated to America before 1660, was a prosperous farmer who sired a large family. The youth's education was intermittent. He attended a local grammar school, worked as an apprentice clerk, and spent some time at sea. Eventually, he went into the mercantile business for himself and prospered.

Langdon, a vigorous supporter of the Revolution, sat on the New Hampshire committee of correspondence and a nonimportation committee. He also attended various patriot assemblies. In 1774 he participated in the seizure and confiscation of British munitions from the Portsmouth fort.

The next year, Langdon served as speaker of the New Hampshire assembly and also sat in the Continental Congress (1775-76). During the latter year, he accepted a colonelcy in the militia of his State and became its agent for British prizes on behalf of the Continental Congress, a post he held throughout the war. In addition, he built privateers

for operations against the British—a lucrative occupation.

Langdon also actively took part in the land war. In 1777 he organized and paid for Gen. John Stark's expedition from New Hampshire against British Gen. John Burgoyne and was present in command of a militia unit at Saratoga, N.Y., when the latter surrendered. Langdon later led a detachment of troopers during the Rhode Island campaign, but found his major outlet in politics. He was speaker of the New Hampshire legislature from 1777 to 1781. In 1777, meantime, he had married Elizabeth Sherburne, who was to give birth to one daughter.

In 1783 Langdon was elected to the Continental Congress; the next year, to the State senate; and the following year, as president, or chief executive of New Hampshire. In 1784 he built a home at Portsmouth. In 1786-87 he was back again as speaker of the legislature, and during the latter year for the third time in the Continental Congress.

Langdon was forced to pay his own expenses and those of Nicholas Gilman to the Constitutional Convention because New Hampshire was unable or unwilling to pay them. The pair did not arrive at Philadelphia until late July, by which time much business had already been consummated. Thereafter, Langdon made a significant mark. He spoke more than 20 times during the debates and was a member of the committee that struck a compromise on the issue of slavery. For the most part, his sympathies lay on the side of strengthening the national Government. In 1788, once again as State president (1788-89), he took part in the ratifying convention.

From 1789 to 1801 Langdon sat in the U.S. Senate, including service as the first President pro tem for several sessions. During these years, his political affiliations changed. As a supporter of a strong central Government, he had been a member of the Federalist Party, but by the time of Jay's Treaty (1794) he was opposing its policies. By 1801 he was firmly backing the Democratic-Republicans.

That year, Langdon declined Jefferson's offer of the secretaryship of the Navy. Between then and 1812, he kept active in New Hampshire politics. He sat again in the legislature (1801-5), twice holding the position of speaker. After several unsuccessful attempts, in 1805 he was elected as Governor and continued in that post until 1811 except for a year's hiatus in 1809. Meantime, in 1805, Dartmouth College had awarded him an honorary doctor of laws degree.

In 1812 Langdon refused the Democratic-Republican Vice-Presidential nomination on the grounds of age and health. He enjoyed retirement for another 7 years before he died at the age of 78. His grave is at Old North Cemetery in Portsmouth.

NEW HAMPSHIRE'S CELEBRATION

New Hampshire will join the country in recognizing the official Bicentennial birthday on September 17, 1987.

The State has taken historic pride in becoming the 9th and Deciding State to approve the Constitution. On June 21, 1988, the Bicentennial of this event will receive special attention.

Leading to these special dates, the New Hampshire Bicentennial Commission on the U.S. Constitution has embarked on a number of programs.

A research program of eight New Hampshire communities to study the people, their way of living, their interests and attitudes and perhaps, basically, the answers to the question:

“Why did some of us believe the New Constitution was the correct answer to the Country’s ills, while others, with equal sincerity, rejected it?”

The researched material is expected to be printed for public discernment. It has become the background material for a public display piece—already displayed across the State and to be used during the celebration period. It is entitled, “Building a Nation, Building a State.”

A Reader’s Theater presentation has been written by David Magdison of the University of New Hampshire. The script is based on the debates held during New Hampshire’s two Commission meetings. Presentations by U.N.H. student actors have been made and will continue during the celebration period. Channel 11, the State public television station, recorded the first presentation and the VCR tape is available.

A commemorative medal recognizing New Hampshire’s 9th and Deciding petition has been struck and is being sold.

The original document announcing the State’s approval is available in reproduction.

A logo has been adopted.

The Commission is working on other projects in conjunction with the National Bicentennial Commission:

A display of the Magna Carta during the 1987 Summer.

Commemorative U.S. postage stamps.

Endorsement of several programs instituted by other organizations.

An adult education program.

Much of the above has been developed in cooperation with the New Hampshire Council for the Humanities. The Commission is grateful for their participation.

Funds have been made available by legislative appropriations and gifts from individuals and business and industrial organizations.

IDEOLOGY AND HARDBALL: RATIFICATION OF THE FEDERAL CONSTITUTION IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

At 1:00 PM, June 21, 1788 a convention of town delegates meeting at Concord, New Hampshire ratified the proposed federal constitution by a vote of fifty-seven to forty-seven. The vote capped a lengthy and often acrimonious constitutional conflict which had divided state inhabitants for more than nine months. The opponents of ratification — initially a majority of the convention delegates — deeply distrusted the idea of voluntarily granting to any distant and unknown political authority powers recently won at such personal and collective sacrifice. Supporters of the new plan of union felt just as deeply that a strengthened national government was necessary to fulfill the promise of successful revolution and that New Hampshire citizens would gain far more from union than they would lose. These ideological lines were drawn early in the conflict; relatively few individuals subsequently changed their minds.

Hard nosed politics decided the issue. The Federalists, those supporting ratification, simply outmaneuvered the anti-Federalists. They used influence in the state government to delay consideration of the plan until neighboring Massachusetts acted and to maximize their representation when ratification proceedings did begin. When the convention first met in February the Federalists arrived early, elected a committee to determine convention procedures, skillfully used those procedures to prevent a final vote — which they feared would be negative — and obtained adjournment until June. In the interim they worked long and hard for the June session. The final vote provided convincing evidence of their political skills.

Constitutionalism in Revolutionary New Hampshire

The ratification struggle took place in a state with a recent history of extended constitutional debate. Disputes over the proper structure of government had erupted in the mid-1770's and continued throughout the war years. The disputes reflected both ideological disagreements and competition for power among inhabitants of New Hampshire's three major subregions, the Piscataqua, Merrimack and Connecticut River watersheds. Piscataqua residents, from Portsmouth and Exeter especially, had dominated the pre-revolutionary government and accumulated a great deal of wealth largely through external trade. Not surprisingly, their constitutional arguments indicated a desire to preserve as much of the status quo as possible. Citizens in the rapidly growing central part of the state drained by the Merrimack had been poorly represented in the colonial government and used the revolution to assert themselves at the expense of the seacoast. Their fundamental constitutional stance emphasized local rather than state authority and control of state government by town delegates elected to a broadly representative legislature. Leaders in the Connecticut River valley communities tended to articulate beliefs which would free them from subordination to the more populated eastern parts of the state.

The first serious trouble occurred before passage of the Declaration of Independence. The only province in New England without a formal charter of incorporation, New Hampshire was left without legal government when the last royal governor, John Wentworth, fled in the summer of 1775. Town delegates from throughout New Hampshire created an extra-legal provincial congress which gradually took over responsibilities

previously exercised by Wentworth and the General Court. The congress, which contained far broader town representation than its colonial predecessor, adopted a written constitution in January 1776. The constitution legitimized the congress by making it New Hampshire's official House of Representatives by authorizing the new house to create an upper legislative body called the Council.

Adoption triggered a brief but dramatic protest movement. Western spokesmen criticized the new arrangement because it perpetuated eastern political domination. A few seacoast writers also complained about the specific form of government, but more argued simply that adoption of any constitution was premature. Portsmouth's delegates at the congress returned home and helped call a town meeting which voted unanimously to petition for reconsideration. Portsmouth also voted to send letters urging other towns to "remonstrate likewise." By the end of January eleven different Piscataqua communities and twelve individual provincial congress delegates had submitted formal protests. The congress as a whole compromised by asking the Continental Congress if taking up government had been a mistake. That body, however, never replied, and the formal Declaration of Independence ended conflict over adoption of the state's first constitution.

The next testing of constitutional attitudes had to do with national, not state government. In late 1777 New Hampshire was asked to ratify the Articles of Confederation. Partly because of the earlier controversy, the legislature decided to submit the document to individual towns before acting. The towns, although most reported general approval, made clear their commitment to state sovereignty. The citizens of Hawke (now Danville) complained that binding all states by a vote of only nine was "too prerogative"; Wilton argued that giving Congress the right to declare war bestowed "a power greater than the King of Great Britain in Council ever had"; numerous towns worried about New Hampshire's interests being compromised by insensitive central officials. Not a single town suggested that the Articles provided the Continental Congress with insufficient power. Complaints about the Articles granting too much power were concentrated in areas where anti-Federalism subsequently became strong.

Meanwhile two major and closely interrelated constitutional problems had begun to buffet the state. Both were triggered by dissatisfaction with the document so hastily adopted by the provincial congress early in 1776. A group of town leaders from the Connecticut River valley renewed complaints that the new form of state government left their communities underrepresented and demanded that a convention be called to rewrite the constitution. Portsmouth area critics of state government joined in the demand for a state constitutional convention. The legislature, after testing public sentiment, voted to hold such a gathering in the summer of 1778. By that time the western rebels had decided their towns would be better off joining the self-created state of Vermont across the river. Thus New Hampshire wrestled simultaneously with its own secession crisis and with a constitutional reform movement where existing authority supposedly was accepted. It took nearly five years to put down the western rebellion. Obtaining approval for a new plan of government took even longer.

The western rebellion was more than a constitutional conflict. It involved a complex mix of legal, demographic, geographic, and political factors all related to New Hampshire's colonial history. Constitutional questions, however, dominated the reasoning of the malcontents. They argued that the revolution had severed all governmental bonds of allegiance except those of the individual to his town. Towns therefore had the right to join whatever state their voters chose. The New Hampshire constitution, which classed small towns together for purposes of representation, had violated the fundamental right of each town to elect a member to the General Court, a right which towns in Connecticut

enjoyed. Furthermore, the constitution created a government with serious structural weaknesses which virtually guaranteed that seaboard inhabitants would dominate affairs. The Vermont constitution, on the other hand recognized the fundamental equality of all towns, accorded them representation, and in general seemed based on sound constitutional principals. In 1778 sixteen valley towns east of the river formally voted to join Vermont.

Constitutional issues were subordinated in the latter stages of rebellion. Vermont first accepted, then rejected the seceding towns. When community leaders on both sides of the river launched a campaign to have all towns east of the Green Mountains become part of New Hampshire, the Vermont legislature reannexed the original sixteen plus twenty-two more. This "second union" lasted until leaders in both governments withdrew support from the idea of any change in state boundaries. Meanwhile several spokesmen for the Continental Congress, including George Washington, expressed disapproval of the entire secession movement. The rebellion was over by 1783.

Acceptance of existing state authority by western leaders stemmed in part from constitutional reform within New Hampshire. The convention which met in 1778 had not accomplished much: its proposals were overwhelmingly rejected by the voters when submitted to town meetings for approval. But the existing constitution had been enacted only for the duration of hostilities. As it became apparent the war would soon end the legislature called a second convention and ordered it to remain in session, amending its proposals until ratification by the citizenry.

That proved easier said than done. The convention first met in the summer of 1781. Dominated by Portsmouth area delegates—including John Langdon and John Pickering, who would play key roles in ratification of the Federal Constitution—it first recommended a constitution which eliminated town representation entirely and provided such high property qualifications for state officeholding that few supporting votes could be obtained. A second proposal, much more moderate in content, was similarly rejected. Finally, in the fall of 1783, the convention submitted a document which a majority of those voting accepted. The constitution provided for a popularly elected President, a Senate made up of county delegates, and a House of Representatives which gave each town with 150 voters the right to choose a member. Small communities would be "classed," or combined, for purposes of representation. The rapidly growing western town, then could see their influence increasing as the years passed. The following June a state government chosen under the new system met for the first time.

Thus, by the middle of the 1780's, the politically active portion of New Hampshire's population had extensive experience in constitutional matters. Citizens shared certain assumptions. They believed in representative government. They believed that such government should have separate executive, legislative and judicial branches, and that the powers of each should be defined by a written constitution. Constitutions, in turn, should be drafted by individuals representing subunits of government—towns for state constitutions and states for any national constitution—and all proposed constitutions subject to close examination by voters in those subunits. They accepted the basic logic of a three tiered system of local, state, and national authority. The whole arrangement they labeled "federated republicanism."

Within that pattern of shared assumptions, however, there was much disagreement. Individuals differed on how authority should be distributed among the three levels of power; until now controversies had concentrated on local and state relationships, but that would soon change. Two regions of the state—the eastern seacoast area and the western Connecticut River valley—had a long history of dissatisfaction with

constitutional arrangements shaped largely by community leaders from central New Hampshire. Compromise had proved possible, but sectional differences remained. Finally, there existed both attraction to and deep distrust of the whole idea of constitutional reform. The past made clear that proposals for constitutional changes should be carefully scrutinized to prevent loss of popular liberties.

Round One: Preparation for a Decision

New Hampshire, like other states, experienced serious economic and political troubles in the immediate post-war era. A short-lived commercial revival collapsed soon after mid-decade. The newly formed state government found itself torn by factional disputes, in part because it proved unable to combat the recession effectively. Accusation of corruption, favoritism, and insensitivity were leveled at public officials. In 1786 groups of irate citizens began meeting to pressure state government; one such group surrounded the legislative hall in Exeter and had to be dispersed by the local militia. Disillusionment became so great that the following spring nearly forty percent of towns in the state refused to send legislative representatives.

Given the context, it is not surprising that many citizens looked to the Continental Congress for help, and when efforts to beef up its powers failed, began discussing other forms of interstate cooperation. The legislature in 1786 appointed delegates to a convention on the subject to be held in Annapolis, Maryland. None of the appointees attended, but when that convention called for a general meeting of state delegates in Philadelphia, the legislature authorized any two of the state's four Continental Congress members to attend the meeting. John Langdon and Nicholas Gilman, both prestigious seacoast merchant-politicians, eventually made the trip south. Although they contributed little to the constitutional discussions, they supported the final proposals, then joined Congress to make certain its members did nothing to hinder ratification. Langdon and Gilman also promised to campaign for approval in New Hampshire.

The Federal Constitution was first published in Portsmouth on October 4, 1787. Even before then, debate on its merits had begun; the debate continued until ratification. New Hampshire's five newspapers printed article after article emphasizing the potential benefits of adoption. Ministers throughout the state devoted sermons to the subject; in general they too supported the Federalist position. Both Federalists and anti-Federalists circulated pamphlets defending their stance and engaged in lengthy discussions in parlors, taverns, ship cabins and any other place an interested audience could be gathered.

Proponents articulated a variety of arguments. Ratification would be of immense economic benefit to merchants, land holders, mechanics, farmers and taxpayers. It would help solve the state political crisis by reducing interstate rivalries and circumscribing both the authority and responsibilities of state legislatures. It would give the United States a better international reputation. Ratification, in short, promised to solve the problems of New Hampshire and its fellow states. "Many people look upon the adoption of the new constitution," wrote one newspaper correspondent, "as the millennium of virtue and wealth."

Critics saw no such millennium on the horizon. Deeply committed to decentralization, they worried about too powerful a central authority. Merchants might benefit from increased commerce, some argued, but New Hampshire's many farmers would not. If state officials responsible to their electors couldn't be trusted, what could be expected of national rulers? The proposed federal court system would put decisions in the hands of distant authorities insensitive to local circumstances. Lack of religious qualifications

for national office holding — only Protestants were eligible in New Hampshire — seemed fraught with dangerous implications. The proposed constitution, many concluded, provided much too radical a constitutional change. The state should vote against ratification.

There were no professional poll takers in the 1780's so it would be fruitless to attempt any quantitative assessment of public opinion. Several things, however, quickly did become clear. Federalist attitudes dominated only in areas with a long history of constitutional disaffection — the seacoast and Grafton County, the center of the western rebellion. Secondly, most critics of the constitution were not cowed by the fact that a very high percentage of the state's economic, political and intellectual elite favored ratification. And finally, no one could be certain which side would win.

The proposed constitution itself dictated where the initial round of formal fighting would take place. Article VII stated simply that "Ratification of the Conventions of nine States shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution. . ." It was up to the state legislature to decide when, where, and with what membership the New Hampshire convention met. Actions taken by the legislature, leaders on both sides knew, would help determine the eventual outcome.

Individuals of known Federalist commitment controlled state planning for the upcoming convention. The next scheduled legislative session was set for late January. John Sullivan — seacoast resident, President of New Hampshire, a former revolutionary war general, and an outspoken unionist — decided that pro-constitution individuals would have a better chance of controlling a special legislative session than the regular one, hastily convened such a meeting, and urged his fellow Federalists to attend. The tactic worked. Of the ten senators who gathered, eight were from towns eventually voting for ratification. When the House had a quorum, attending members were evenly divided in sentiment even though the total membership contained a decided anti-Federalist majority. The speaker, Thomas Bartlett, strongly favored ratification.

Decisions made in December reflected the superiority of Federalist forces. Both houses agreed to form a joint committee to make recommendations for the convention. Bartlett selected an equal number of pro and anti members; the Senate, however, selected all Federalists. Not surprisingly, the committee recommendations had a pro-ratification flavor. The convention should be held at Exeter, in the heartland of Federalism. It would not convene until mid-February; by that time, it was hoped that six states, including neighboring Massachusetts, would have ratified. The state would pay expenses and each town or class of towns could send as many delegates as it had in the House. An apparently innocuous qualification stated that towns presently unrepresented could elect delegates if they chose. Finally, the state's exclusion bill, which prohibited most appointed state officials from simultaneously representing their towns in the legislature, would not apply to the convention. This made possible the participation of influential Federalists like Superior Court Chief Justice Samuel Livermore of Grafton County and State Treasurer John Taylor Gilman.

The anti-Federalists in the House, led by Nathaniel Peabody of Atkinson, knew they had been bested and made one effort to change the joint committee recommendations. They tried to have the number of convention members doubled, hoping thus to dilute the influence of powerful Federalists like Sullivan and Langdon. Since that would also have doubled the cost of the convention to the state the motion failed badly.

The vote provided the last flurry of round one. Judge's decision: a clear Federalist victory.

Round Two: Decision Postponed

The election of convention delegates by the various towns and classes of towns came next. Copies of the constitution were printed and distributed, selectmen began to post warrants for special town meetings, public curiosity about results intensified, and local leaders of both persuasions discussed strategy. Anti-Federalists, coached by men of like sentiment in Massachusetts and warned by returning legislators that the Federalists already seemed effectively organized, belatedly developed their own communication network. The network operated with the most effectiveness in the Merrimack River valley.

Anti-Federalist tactics dictated the internal dynamics of many town meetings. The plan was simple: elect anti-Federalist delegates and bind them by written instructions so they could not at Exeter be talked out of voting “nay.” It was inevitable that in some community’s delegates chosen would object to binding instructions — after all, they could and did argue that the purpose of the convention was to discuss the constitution and make a reasonable judgement about its merits based on that discussion. In such cases instructions were especially important, for unwillingness to accept them indicated potential softness of commitment. The matter of instructions seemed more and more important as New Hampshire’s anti-Federalists watched an initial majority in the Bay State convention gradually slip away. Only a handful of delegates there had formally been instructed.

These anti-Federalist tactics produced some elaborate and exciting local political contests. In Walpole, for example, Major General Benjamin Bellows was elected but refused to accept binding negative instructions. A few days before the Exeter convention, and shortly after news arrived of ratification in Massachusetts, a quickly convened town meeting replaced Bellows with an anti-Federalist. Keene also held a second meeting but a Federalist majority voted both to keep the same delegate and to pass over the article warrant on instructions. Town after town either voted against the constitution itself or appointed a committee which advised against adoption.

Surviving records, however, are neither plentiful nor clear enough to calculate with precision the overall results. Contemporary estimates of instructed delegates reached as high as forty. A more likely figure is about twenty-five, all but two or three of whom were advised negatively. Whatever the exact total, the anti-Federalists had a large base from which to operate. The total number of elected delegates would not be much over one hundred. With instructed delegates and a similar number of uninstructed but opposed delegates, the constitution might be defeated.

Federalists, meanwhile, prepared just as aggressively. They continued to flood newspapers with articles, including many critical of binding instructions. They also made every effort to maximize the number of proconstitution delegates. The inhabitants of Newcastle, which hadn’t elected a legislative representative for some time, chose a convention delegate when merchants in neighboring Portsmouth explained the need for more votes. Previously Canterbury and Northfield had shared a legislator; soon after the former chose an anti-Federalist, the latter voted to send its own proconstitution delegate. Up in Grafton County Samuel Livermore lined up support and convinced elected delegates they should make the long trek to Exeter. Bellows, Aaron Hall of Keene, Benjamin West of Charlestown, and other town leaders in Cheshire County fought successfully to limit the number of binding instructions.

The most important form of Federalist preparation involved the convention itself, not the local elections. The regular legislative session, which convened in Portsmouth January 23rd, provided the first good opportunity to gather accurate information about

developments at the local level. What Sullivan, Langdon and their allies learned must have been distressing. Inhabitants in the interior apparently didn't share seacoast enthusiasm for ratification. The problem of binding instructions was more serious than anticipated. Anti-Federalists had found an effective leader in the influential legislator Nathaniel Peabody, who seemed confident of victory at Exeter. Given the uncertainty, the Federalist leaders decided they should have a contingency plan for Exeter. They should be prepared to engineer an adjournment if ratification couldn't be guaranteed.

The contingency plan, hatched in early February, involved tactics similar to those used in the December legislative session. It is not clear who coordinated things, but Sullivan, Langdon, Gilman, Livermore and West — all convention delegates and former Continental Congress members — undoubtedly knew beforehand what would happen. Federalists were told to arrive as early on February 13 as possible. As soon as anything close to a quorum appeared the convention would be called to order and a rules committee formed. This committee, chosen by the Federalists in attendance, would check the credentials of convention members. It also would prepare procedural groundrules which maximized the possibility of adjournment should that become necessary. By the time everyone arrived the procedures would be in place.

This bold plan worked to perfection. The convention journal for February 13 tells the story. The first paragraph reads "about fifty members being assembled, they proceeded to the choice of a chairman, and the Honorable Josiah Bartlett Esq. was chosen." Of the "about fifty" recorded in attendance thirty-three voted in June for ratification. Five of these thirty-three had quietly left the nearby legislative session which Sullivan didn't adjourn until late that afternoon. Among the legislators remaining in Portsmouth were about two dozen delegates, a majority of them anti-Federalist. The choice of Bartlett as temporary chairman may also have been preplanned. Bartlett was a highly respected judge, a close friend of Peabody, and uncommitted publicly on the issue of ratification. His election to the chair would give what followed the appearance of legitimacy among all convention delegates.

The second paragraph of the journal reports the choice of Livermore, Gilman, and West as "a Committee to receive the returns of members elected; they were also appointed a Committee to prepare and lay before the Convention such rules as they shall judge necessary for regulating the proceedings in said Convention." The committee, in short, was to determine, not to recommend, the rules. Then the meeting broke up.

Attendance, swollen by legislative adjournment, had doubled by the next day. John Calfe, Federalist and long time clerk for the House of Representatives was chosen Secretary and President Sullivan won election by secret ballot to the convention presidency. No doubt he received all the votes of those informed beforehand of the Federalist strategy. Early in the afternoon the committee reported. Three key procedural rules helped prepare for possible adjournment. No individual's vote would be recorded except on the question of adoption, which would enable those bound by negative instructions to vote for adjournment without their fellow townsmen ever finding out. Second, a motion to adjourn would take precedence over any other motion: this routine legislative provision could be used to prevent a final vote on adoption. And finally, no vote could be reconsidered without as many members present as made the initial vote. If the Federalists got in deep trouble they could sneak in a delaying vote, then walk out. Calfe reports simply that the report was "considered, received, and accepted." Anti-Federalists later regretted the acceptance.

Debate on the constitution began soon thereafter and continued until the following Thursday. Each section of each article in the proposed constitution was read, then

discussed. The form of the debate quickly became routinized and predictable. Critics of the proposed union explained why they found the section unacceptable and Federalist spokesmen defended its logic. Joshua Atherton, a lawyer from the inland town of Amherst, spoke most frequently and effectively for the opponents, most of whom were content, as an observer wrote, "to remain silent . . . until the vote comes." Several Federalists shared responsibility for answering objections. Sullivan — who accepted the presidency only on condition he be allowed to participate in discussions — Langdon, Livermore, John Pickering, and two seacoast ministers, Benjamin Thurston and Samuel Langdon played the most important roles as defenders of the proposed plan of union.

Only four parts of the constitution stimulated lengthy debate. Anti-Federalists objected strongly to two year terms for congressmen and six for senators — in New Hampshire elections for both occurred annually. Section eight of Article I, on congressional powers, compromised state authority far too much according to several spokesmen. Atherton spoke at length against a federal judiciary. The debate on the last paragraph of Article VI, which stated that "no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States," lasted nearly a full day. Its critics wanted office holding limited to Protestants.

While the discussions dragged on, leaders of both sides tried to count noses. Everyone agreed the anti-Federalists had an initial advantage. Sullivan later estimated the difference at seventy to thirty but the best evidence suggests a much narrower margin, perhaps fifty to forty, with the rest — including some restricted by negative instructions — uncertain as to how they would vote. During dinner parties, convention recesses and whenever else the opportunity arose, the Federalists tried to add to their ranks. They also tested the willingness of delegates to vote for adjournment. By the twenty-first, when debate ended on the last article, no one could predict the outcome with confidence. "It is very doubtful how the numbers are," wrote Pickering's close friend Jeremiah Libbey. "Each party think they have a majority, and yet appear afraid of each other."

A proposal by eleven of the instructed delegates determined the next move. The group approached Langdon and said they would consider supporting adjournment, but couldn't vote for the constitution. Almost immediately Langdon made the motion for which he and others had so carefully prepared. By general agreement the vote was postponed until the following day. That evening a bargain was struck. If the adjournment motion passed the convention would reconvene in June at Concord, a more convenient site, although in the anti-Federalist heartland. Whether Sullivan, Langdon and other Federalist leaders promised anything in the way of state appointments or other rewards cannot be determined. In any case the motion passed. According to Pickering, who seems to have been in charge of tabulating delegate sentiment, the margin was only fifty-six to fifty-one. Convention minutes note simply that after "some general observations were made" the "question was put and it was voted to adjourn to some future day."

Judge's decision on round two: a draw. Crowd reaction mixed. Federalists breathe a huge and collective sigh of relief. They know a vote on the constitution itself would have lost.

Round Three: Ratification

The vote on adjournment gave both sides hard information on which to plan strategy for the next four months. Anti-Federalists had about fifty solid votes, the Federalists about forty-five. Since the maximum number of delegates who might attend in June was around one hundred and ten, every vote counted. Momentum lay with the Federalists — they already had exhibited more skill in converting the undecided than their

opponents — but the outcome was still in doubt. In late March one perceptive seacoast resident reported that there was a “probability” New Hampshire would ratify “although considerable danger” it would not.

The anti-Federalists tried as best they could to prevent further erosion in their ranks. Led by Nathaniel Peabody, who had refused to serve as a delegate but remained active outside the convention, they convinced one town which had not yet chosen a delegate to elect an opponent of the constitution for the June session. Attempts were made in at least three towns to impose negative instruction on delegates who had voted for adjournment. Anti-Federalists in Boscawen convened a town meeting which voted to replace the elected delegate, who refused to promise a “nay” vote, with one who would. All in all, however, the anti-Federalists were relatively quiet in the interim between sessions. They knew that had a vote been taken at Exeter the constitution would have been defeated. The majority, they hoped, would hold at Concord.

Federalist leaders could not afford to be complacent. To no one’s surprise, they continued to flood the press with pro-ratification articles. The constitutional arguments differed little from those used before, but press coverage overall involved two fresh ingredients. One was widespread circulation in Cheshire and Grafton counties of the Hartford (Connecticut) *Courant*. The paper contained numerous articles explaining why Connecticut had ratified so readily and emphasizing the benefits of union to all Connecticut River valley inhabitants. Since many of the potential swing votes were from southwestern New Hampshire, circulation of the *Courant* had a large potential payoff.

Personal attacks on leading anti-Federalists were the second new ingredient. Ather-ton provided a particularly inviting subject. At the beginning of the revolution he had been a loyalist. Now the Federalists accused him of “wishing to prevent the adoption of a system only because it will put it out of the power of Britain to subjugate us.” Citizens were told that Peabody, still a major force in the legislature, opposed ratification primarily because it might undermine his influence over appointments to political office. Several writers linked anti-Federalism to participants in the paper money riot of 1786 and to the well publicized personal financial problems of Peabody and others.

Federalists supplemented their publicity campaign with hard-nosed politicking at the local level. Benjamin Bellows somehow managed to regain the convention seat from Walpole: either a third town election was held or as town clerk he doctored the records to validate the results of the initial election. Whatever the reasons Bellows’ credentials were accepted at the Concord session. Both Charlestown and Derryfield (now Manchester) repulsed efforts to force unwanted instructions on pro-constitution delegates. The Derryfield member, who had not gone to Exeter, showed up in Concord. Hopkinton held a special town meeting and released its delegates from binding negative instructions. Federalists in Boscawen drew up a petition which asserted that the recent town vote to change delegates had been illegal. Livermore produced two new supporters from Grafton county, one who had been elected but not gone to Exeter, the other representing Lincoln and Franconia which together had fewer than a hundred residents. The representative, Isaac Patterson, lived in Piermont, part of a class of towns which had chosen the county’s one anti-Federalist. All in all interim town meetings provided the Federalists with six badly needed new votes and prevented at least one potential defection.

Meanwhile the pro-constitution leaders worked on individual convention members trapped between the anti-Federalist sentiment in the towns they represented and their personal willingness to support ratification. Not attending the Concord session was one possible solution to their dilemma. Four of the five elected delegates who failed to show in Concord had been at Exeter and probably were among those voting for adjournment.

One of them had been given negative instructions and two others had been counted in the opposition camp by Federalist tabulators. The fifth non-attendee, Nathaniel Ladd from strongly anti-ratification Epping, missed both sessions.

All this made Sullivan, Langdon, Livermore and their associates optimistic as decision time approached. External factors added to the optimism. Since Massachusetts two additional states had ratified, thus bringing the total to eight, just one short of the required nine. The New Hampshire and Virginia conventions both would meet in mid-June. If New Hampshire moved rapidly it could, as one writer put it, provide the "Keystone of the Federal Arch." It was an opportunity not to be missed. The Federalists gained further encouragement from the legislative session held in Concord early in the month. Langdon, who replaced Sullivan as state President, gave ratification a ringing endorsement in his inaugural and the legislative response suggested that resistance to the constitution had weakened. Even more important the session gave Federalist organizers an opportunity to gather additional information about how delegates were apt to vote. Victory by a thin margin looked probable, but much depended on who showed up, and when.

The first day, Wednesday, June 18, went well for the Federalists. Ninety of one hundred thirteen elected delegates attended and of the missing twenty-three, sixteen were from anti-Federalist towns. Sensing a golden opportunity, the pro-constitution delegates pushed through votes settling the Walpole and Boscawen disputed elections in their favor. Meanwhile the credentials of all members chosen during the interim — including those of the Piermont resident supposedly representing Lincoln and Franconia — were examined by the rules committee and accepted. Then the meeting adjourned.

Encouraged by these successes, Federalist leaders decided to push rapidly for ratification. Their plan was to forego the extensive debate and behind the scenes politicking which had been so necessary at Exeter. They would — like their counterparts in several other states — support a series of constitutional amendments to correct "deficiencies" pointed out by anti-Federalists. The critical vote would come when someone, probably Atherton, moved for conditional acceptance, i.e. that New Hampshire ratify only on condition all the proposed amendments become part of the constitution. Federalists would seek postponement of that motion, substitute a motion for unconditional acceptance, and then vote to ratify.

Everything seemed in place by Friday. All but one of the known Federalists had arrived and four probable anti-Federalists were still absent. Early in the day an amendment committee, chaired by Langdon, was appointed. It reported after the noon meal, at which point Atherton made his expected motion. The ensuing debate proved perfunctory, so Livermore, seconded by several delegates, tested sentiment by proposing postponement. He also announced that if postponement passed he would move unconditional acceptance. Postponement was voted and by common agreement the meeting dispersed until the following morning.

Saturday's events confirmed what by now everyone suspected. Atherton tried unsuccessfully to obtain an adjournment. As vote on the main motion neared at least one delegate torn between negative instructions and personal commitment left the building. He and three others — all in similar circumstances — were recorded as in attendance but not voting. The final tabulation was fifty-seven yeas and forty-seven nays. The ten vote majority surprised even the most optimistic among Federalist leaders. Secretary Calfe recorded the precise time as 1:00 P.M., in case Virginia ratified the same day and made claim to having been the ninth.

Round three required no judge's decision.

Epilogue

In the last century historians have exerted a good deal of energy analyzing votes in the various ratification conventions. Several generalizations can be made about New Hampshire. To begin with, the mutually reinforcing factors of geography and past constitutional experience correlate neatly with divisions on the proposed plan of union. Federalism was concentrated in the seacoast area and upper Connecticut River valley where inhabitants had a long history of attempted constitutional reform. Similarly, anti-Federalism centered in regions whose inhabitants had resisted such reform. Secondly, Federalism was strongest among the upper classes. Of those listed in convention records as Judges, Esquires (Justices of the Peace), Generals, Doctors or Reverends, thirty-three voted "yea" and only fourteen "nay"; Misterys, Captains, and Lieutenants, on the other hand voted sixteen for and twenty-seven against ratification. Third, there was a clear Federalist bias among state citizens with "continental" experience: six former representatives in the Continental Congress served as convention delegates and all worked hard for ratification. Finally, the eventual vote masked the closeness of the struggle. Only the calculated and imaginative political maneuvering of men like Sullivan, Langdon and Livermore, made possible New Hampshire's claim to the label "Keystone of the Federal Arch."

Whatever historians make of the ratification conflict, adoption gained quick acceptance in New Hampshire. Portsmouth celebrated with a parade, fireworks, and free liquor. Ratification by Virginia, four days after New Hampshire, and by New York in July increased jubilation among citizens already optimistic about the newly established national government. Anti-Federalists swallowed their disappointment and advised acquiescence. Even Atherton gave up after New York. "The language" among New Hampshire opponents, he lamented to a friend there, has become "it is adopted, let us try it." Few, in subsequent years, regretted the attempt.

The United States Constitution is the oldest federal constitution in existence. It was so well framed that it has served on the basis for this government for a century and a half. Only once has it been seriously endangered, this being during the Civil War. Many of its principles have been adopted by other countries.

The Constitution was the outgrowth of a convention of delegates from the different states that met in Philadelphia in May, 1787, Rhode Island not being represented. George Washington presided over the convention, which lasted from May to September.

The Constitution was then submitted to the then existing states for ratification, with a provision that it should become effective when ratified by nine states. New Hampshire was the ninth state to ratify, June 21, 1788, and the Constitution went into effect in 1789.

The states ratified the Constitution in the following order: Delaware, Dec. 7, Pennsylvania, Dec. 12, and New Jersey, December 18, 1787; Georgia, Jan. 2, Connecticut, Jan. 9, Massachusetts, Feb. 6, Maryland, Apr. 28, South Carolina, May 23, New Hampshire, June 21, Virginia, June 26, and New York, July 26, 1788; North Carolina, Nov. 21, 1789, and Rhode Island, May 29, 1790.

CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

[Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a term of Years and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other persons.]* The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one

Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, [chosen by the Legislature thereof,]* for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; [and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.]#

No person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate, shall chuse their other Officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried, the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust, or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be [on the first Monday in December,]** unless they shall by Law appoint a different Day.

Section 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do

Business; but a small Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent Members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behavior, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil Office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States shall be a Member of either House during his continuance in Office.

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall before it becomes a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; If he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sunday excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section 8. The Congress shall have Power To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States:

- To borrow money on the credit of the United States;
 - To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes;
 - To establish a uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States;
 - To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;
 - To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;
 - To establish Post Offices and post Roads;
 - To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;
 - To constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court;
 - To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offenses against the Law of Nations;
 - To declare war, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;
 - To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;
 - To provide and maintain a Navy;
 - To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;
 - To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions;
 - To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States, respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;
 - To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—And
 - To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any department or Office thereof.
- Section 9.** The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.
- The privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.
- No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.
- No capitation, or other direct, Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census of Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.
- No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.
- No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another: nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be

obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States: And no Person holding any office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince, or foreign State.

Section 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bill of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts or grant any Title of Nobility.

No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection Laws: and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Control of the Congress.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected, as follows

Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress: but no Senator or Representative or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

[The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the Seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States

shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice President.]*

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.

[In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said Office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.]***

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—“I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States.”

Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offenses against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law: but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

The President shall have Power to fill all Vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time

of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section 4. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high crimes and Misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services a Compensation which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in office.

Section 2. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;— to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;— to all Cases of Admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;— to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;— to Controversies between two or more States;— between a State and Citizens of another State;— between Citizens of different States— between Citizens of the same States claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

The Trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Section 3. Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or, in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Persons shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

The Congress shall have power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attained.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State; And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Section 2. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on Demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

[No Person held to Serve or Labour in one State under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.]*

Section 3. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Section 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

ARTICLE V

The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislature of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths therefor, as the one or the other Mode or Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

ARTICLE VI

All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State

shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators or Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any office or public Trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII

The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same.

Done in Convention by the Unanimous Consent of the States present the Seventeenth Day of September in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Eighty seven and of the Independence of the United States of America the Twelfth. In Witness whereof We have hereunto subscribed our Names,

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

ARTICLES IN ADDITION TO, AND AMENDMENT OF, THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, PROPOSED BY CONGRESS, AND RATIFIED BY THE SEVERAL STATES, PURSUANT TO THE FIFTH ARTICLE OF THE ORIGINAL CONSTITUTION.

AMENDMENT I*

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

AMENDMENT II

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

AMENDMENT III

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

AMENDMENT IV

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

AMENDMENT V

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb, nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

AMENDMENT VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed; which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

AMENDMENT VII

In Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried in a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

AMENDMENT VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

AMENDMENT IX

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

AMENDMENT X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

AMENDMENT XI*

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.

AMENDMENT XII**

The Electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists

of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The Person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each State having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. [And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President—]* The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.

AMENDMENT XIII**

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Section 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XIV***

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Section 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice President of the United States, Representatives in

Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such States, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Section 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Section 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

AMENDMENT XV*

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State, on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XVI**

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

AMENDMENT XVII.***

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, that the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointment until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.

AMENDMENT XVIII*

[**Section 1.** After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.]

AMENDMENT XIX**

The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriation legislation.

AMENDMENT XX***

Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

Section 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provided for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice-President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one

who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Section 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice-President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.

AMENDMENT XXI*

Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

AMENDMENT XXII**

Section 1. No person shall be elected to the office of the President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of the President more than once. But this Article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President, during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President or acting as President during the remainder of such term.

Section 2. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress.

AMENDMENT XXIII***

Section 1. The District constituting the seat of Government of the United States shall

appoint in such manner as the Congress may direct:

A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which the District would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the States, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in the District and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of amendment.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XXIV*

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote in any primary or other election for President or Vice President, for electors for President or Vice President, or for Senator or Representative in Congress, shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any State by reason of failure to pay any poll tax or other tax.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

AMENDMENT XXV**

Section 1. In case of the removal of the President from office or of his death or resignation, the Vice President shall become President.

Section 2. Whenever there is a vacancy in the office of the Vice President, the President shall nominate a Vice President who shall take office upon confirmation by a majority vote of both Houses of Congress.

Section 3. Whenever the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that he is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, and until he transmits to them a written declaration to the contrary, such powers and duties shall be discharged by the Vice President as Acting President.

Section 4. Whenever the Vice President and a majority of either of the principal officers of the executive departments or of such other body as Congress may by law provide, transmit to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written declaration that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the Vice President shall immediately assume the powers and duties of the office as Acting President.

Thereafter, when the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that no inability exists, he shall resume the powers and duties of his office unless the Vice President and a majority of either the principal officers of the executive department or of such other body as Congress may by law provide, transmit within four days to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives their written

declaration that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office. Thereupon Congress shall decide the issue, assembling within forty-eight hours for that purpose if not in session. If the Congress, within twenty-one days after receipt of the latter written declaration, or, if Congress is not in session, within twenty-one days after Congress is required to assemble, determines by two-thirds vote of both Houses that the President is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the Vice President shall continue to discharge the same as Acting President; otherwise, the President shall resume the powers and duties of his office.

AMENDMENT XXVI*

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

CONSTITUTION OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

PART FIRST

BILL OF RIGHTS

Article 1. [Equality of Men; Origin and Object of Government.] All men are born equally free and independent; therefore, all government of right originates from the people, is founded in consent, and instituted for the general good.

June 2, 1784*

[Art.] 2. [Natural Rights.] All men have certain natural, essential, and inherent rights—among which are, the enjoying and defending life and liberty; acquiring, possessing, and protecting, property; and, in a word, of seeking and obtaining happiness. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by this state on account of race, creed, color, sex or national origin.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1974 adding sentence to prohibit discrimination.

[Art.] 2-a. [The Bearing of Arms.] All persons have the right to keep and bear arms in defense of themselves, their families, their property and the state.

December 1, 1982

[Art.] 3. [Society, its Organization and Purposes.] When men enter into a state of society, they surrender up some of their natural rights to that society, in order to ensure the protection of others; and, without such an equivalent, the surrender is void.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 4. [Rights of Conscience Unalienable.] Among the natural rights, some are, in their very nature unalienable, because no equivalent can be given or received for them. Of this kind are the Rights of Conscience.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 5. [Religious Freedom Recognized.] Every individual has a natural and unalienable right to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience, and reason; and no subject shall be hurt, molested, or restrained, in his person, liberty, or estate, for worshipping God in the manner and season most agreeable to the dictates of his own conscience; or for his religious profession, sentiments, or persuasion; provided he doth not disturb the public peace or disturb others in their religious worship.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 6. [Morality and Piety.] As morality and piety, rightly grounded on high principles, will give the best and greatest security to government, and will lay, in the hearts of men, the strongest obligations to due subjection; and as the knowledge of these is most likely to be propagated through a society, therefore, the several parishes, bodies, corporate, or religious societies shall at all times have the right of electing their own teachers, and of contracting with them for their support or maintenance, or both. But no person shall ever be compelled to pay towards the support of the schools of any sect or denomination. And every person, denomination or sect shall be equally under the

protection of the law; and no subordination of any one sect, denomination or persuasion to another shall ever be established.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1968 to remove obsolete sectarian references.

[Art.] 7. [State Sovereignty.] The people of this state have the sole and exclusive right of governing themselves as a free, sovereign, and independent state; and do, and forever hereafter shall, exercise and enjoy every power, jurisdiction, and right, pertaining thereto, which is not, or may not hereafter be, by them expressly delegated to the United States of America in congress assembled.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 8. [Accountability of Magistrates and Officers; Public's Right to Know.] All power residing originally in, and being derived from, the people, all the magistrates and officers of government are their substitutes and agents, and at all times accountable to them. Government, therefore, should be open, accessible, accountable and responsive. To that end, the public's right of access to governmental proceedings and records shall not be unreasonably restricted.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1976 by providing right of access to governmental proceedings and records.

[Art.] 9. [No Hereditary Office or Place.] No office or place, whatsoever, in government, shall be hereditary—the abilities and integrity requisite in all, not being transmissible to posterity or relations.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 10. [Right of Revolution.] Government being instituted for the common benefit, protection, and security, of the whole community, and not for the private interest or emolument of any one man, family, or class of men; therefore, whenever the ends of government are perverted, and public liberty manifestly endangered, and all other means of redress are ineffectual, the people may, and of right ought to reform the old, or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power, and oppression, is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 11. [Elections and Elective Franchises.] All elections are to be free, and every inhabitant of the state of 18 years of age and upwards shall have an equal right to vote in any election. Every person shall be considered an inhabitant for the purposes of voting in the town, ward, or unincorporated place where he has his domicile. No person shall have the right to vote under the constitution of this state who has been convicted of treason, bribery or any willful violation of the election laws of this state or of the United States; but the supreme court may, on notice to the attorney general, restore the privilege to vote to any person who may have forfeited it by conviction of such offenses. The general court shall provide by law for voting by qualified voters who at the time of the biennial or state elections, or of the primary elections therefor, or of city elections, or of town elections by official ballot, are absent from the city or town of which they are inhabitants, or who by reason of physical disability are unable to vote in person, in the choice of any officer or officers to be elected or upon any question submitted at such election. Voting registration and polling places shall be easily accessible to all persons including disabled and elderly persons who are otherwise qualified to vote in the choice of any officer or officers to be elected or upon any question submitted at such election. The right to vote shall not be denied to any person because of the non-payment of any tax. Every inhabitant of the state, having the proper qualifications, has equal right to be elected into office.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1903 to provide that in order to vote or be eligible for office a person must be able to read the English language and to write.

Amended 1912 to prohibit those convicted of treason, bribery or willfull violation of the election laws from voting or holding elective office.

Amended 1942 to provide for absentee voting in general elections.

Amended 1956 to provide for absentee voting in primary elections.

Amended 1968 to provide right to vote not denied because of nonpayment of taxes.

Also amended in 1968 to delete an obsolete phrase.

Amended 1976 to reduce voting age to 18.

Amended 1984 to provide accessiblity to all registration and polling places.

[Art.] 12. [Protection and Taxation Reciprocal.] Every member of the community has a right to be protected by it, in the enjoyment of his life, liberty, and property; he is therefore bound to contribute his share in the expense of such protection, and to yield his personal service when necessary. But no part of a man's property shall be taken from him, or applied to public uses, without his own consent, or that of the representative body of the people. Nor are the inhabitants of this state controllable by any other laws than those to which they, or their representative body, have given their consent.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1964 by striking out reference to buying one's way out of military service.

[Art.] 13. [Conscientious Objectors not Compelled to Bear Arms.] No person, who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms, shall be compelled thereto.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1964 by striking out reference to buying one's way out of military service.

[Art.] 14. [Legal Remedies to be Free, Complete, and Prompt.] Every subject of this state is entitled to a certain remedy, by having recourse to the laws, for all injuries he may receive in his person, property, or character; to obtain right and justice freely, without being obliged to purchase it; completely, and without any denial; promptly, and without delay; conformably to the laws.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 15. [Right of Accused.] No subject shall be held to answer for any crime, or offense, until the same is fully and plainly, substantially and formally, described to him; or be compelled to accuse or furnish evidence against himself. Every subject shall have a right to produce all proofs that may be favorable to himself; to meet the witnesses against him face to face, and to be fully heard in his defense, by himself, and counsel. No subject shall be arrested, imprisoned, despoiled, or deprived of his property, immunities, or privileges, put out of the protection of the law, exiled or deprived of his life, liberty, or estate, but by the judgment of his peers, or the law of the land; provided that, in any proceeding to commit a person acquitted of a criminal charge by reason of insanity, due process shall require that clear and convincing evidence that the person is potentially dangerous to himself or to others and that the person suffers from a mental disorder must be established. Every person held to answer in any crime or offense punishable by deprivation of liberty shall have the right to counsel at the expense of the state if need is shown; this right he is at liberty to waive, but only after the matter has been thoroughly explained by the court.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1966 to provide the right to counsel at state expense if the need is shown.

Amended 1984 reducing legal requirement proof beyond a reasonable doubt to clear

and convincing evidence in insanity hearings.

[Art.] 16. [Former Jeopardy; Jury Trial in Capital Cases.] No subject shall be liable to be tried, after an acquittal, for the same crime or offense. Nor shall the legislature make any law that shall subject any person to a capital punishment, (excepting for the government of the army and navy, and the militia in actual service) without trial by jury. June 2, 1784

[Art.] 17. [Venue of Criminal Prosecutions.] In criminal prosecutions, the trial of facts, in the vicinity where they happened, is so essential to the security of the life, liberty and estate of the citizen, that no crime or offense ought to be tried in any other county or judicial district than that in which it is committed; except in any case in any particular county or judicial district, upon motion by the defendant, and after a finding by the court that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had where the offense may be committed, the court shall direct the trial to a county or judicial district in which a fair and impartial trial can be obtained.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 to change “assembly” to: legislature.

Amended 1978 so that court at defendant’s request may change trial to another county or judicial district.

[Art.] 18. [Penalties to be Proportioned to Offenses; True Design of Punishment.] All penalties ought to be proportioned to the nature of the offense. No wise legislature will affix the same punishment to the crimes of theft, forgery, and the like, which they do to those of murder and treason. Where the same undistinguishing severity is exerted against all offenses, the people are led to forget the real distinction in the crimes themselves, and to commit the most flagrant with as little compunction as they do the lightest offenses. For the same reason a multitude of sanguinary laws is both impolitic and unjust. The true design of all punishments being to reform, not to exterminate mankind.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 deleting “those of” after do in 3d sentence and changing “dye” to: offenses.

[Art.] 19. [Searches and Seizures Regulated.] Every subject hath a right to be secure from all unreasonable searches and seizures of his person, his houses, his papers, and all his possessions. Therefore, all warrants to search suspected places, or arrest a person for examination or trial in prosecutions for criminal matters, are contrary to this right, if the cause or foundation of them be not previously supported by oath or affirmation; and if the order, in a warrant to a civil officer, to make search in suspected places, or to arrest one or more suspected persons or to seize their property, be not accompanied with a special designation of the persons or objects of search, arrest, or seizure; and no warrant ought to be issued; but in cases and with the formalities, prescribed by law.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 to change order of words.

[Art.] 20. [Jury Trial in Civil Causes.] In all controversies concerning property—and in all suits between two or more persons, except in cases in which it has been heretofore otherwise used and practiced, and except in cases in which the value in controversy does not exceed five hundred dollars, and title to real estate is not concerned the parties have a right to a trial by jury and this method of procedure shall be held sacred, unless, in cases* arising on the high seas and such as relates to mariners’ wages the legislature shall think it necessary hereafter to alter it.

June 2, 1784

Amended in 1877 to prohibit jury trials unless the amount in controversy exceeds \$100. Amended in 1960 to increase the amount to \$500 before a jury trial may be requested. *"Cases" appears in 1792 parchment copy of constitution. Original constitution had "causes."

[Art.] 21. [Jurors; Compensation.] In order to reap the fullest advantage of the inestimable privilege of the trial by jury, great care ought to be taken, that none but qualified persons should be appointed to serve; and such ought to be fully compensated for their travel, time and attendance.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 22. [Free Speech; Liberty of the Press.] Free speech and liberty of the press are essential to the security of freedom in a state: They ought, therefore, to be inviolably preserved.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1968 to include free speech.

[Art.] 23. [Retrospective Laws Prohibited.] Retrospective laws are highly injurious, oppressive, and unjust. No such laws, therefore, should be made, either for the decision of civil causes, or the punishment of offenses.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 24. [Militia.] A well regulated militia is the proper, natural, and sure defense, of a state.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 25. [Standing Armies.] Standing armies are dangerous to liberty, and ought not to be raised, or kept up, without the consent of the legislature.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 26. [Military Subject to Civil Power.] In all cases, and at all times, the military ought to be under strict subordination to, and governed by, the civil power.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 27. [Quartering of Soldiers.] No soldier in time of peace, shall be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner; and in time of war, such quarters ought not to be made but by the civil authorities in a manner ordained by the legislature.

June 2, 1784

Amended in 1980 substituting "authorities" for "magistrate."

[Art.] 28. [Taxes, by Whom Levied.] No subsidy, charge, tax, impost, or duty, shall be established, fixed, laid, or levied, under any pretext whatsoever, without the consent of the people, or their representatives in the legislature, or authority derived from that body.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 28-a. [Mandated Programs.] The state shall not mandate or assign any new, expanded or modified programs or responsibilities to any political subdivision in such a way as to necessitate additional local expenditures by the political subdivision unless such programs or responsibilities are fully funded by the state or unless such programs or responsibilities are approved for funding by a vote of the local legislative body of the political subdivision.

November 28, 1984

[Art.] 29. [Suspension of Laws by Legislature Only.] The power of suspending the laws, or the execution of them, ought never to be exercised but by the legislature, or by authority derived therefrom, to be exercised in such particular cases only as the legislature shall expressly provide for.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 30. [Freedom of Speech.] The freedom of deliberation, speech, and debate, in either house of the legislature, is so essential to the rights of the people, that it cannot be the foundation of any action, complaint, or prosecution, in any other court or place whatsoever.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 31. [Meetings of Legislature, for What Purposes.] The legislature shall assemble for the redress of public grievances and for making such laws as the public good may require.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 generally rewording sentence and omitting “for correcting, strengthening and confirming the laws.”

[Art.] 32. [Rights of Assembly, Instruction, and Petition.] The people have a right, in an orderly and peaceable manner, to assemble and consult upon the common good, give instructions to their representatives, and to request of the legislative body, by way of petition or remonstrance, redress of the wrongs done them, and of the grievances they suffer.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 33. [Excessive Bail, Fines, and Punishments Prohibited.] No magistrate, or court of law, shall demand excessive bail or sureties, impose excessive fines, or inflict cruel or unusual punishments.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 34. [Martial Law Limited.] No person can, in any case, be subjected to law martial, or to any pains or penalties by virtue of that law, except those employed in the army or navy, and except the militia in actual service, but by authority of the legislature.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 35. [The Judiciary; Tenure of Office, etc.] It is essential to the preservation of the rights of every individual, his life, liberty, property, and character, that there be an impartial interpretation of the laws, and administration of justice. It is the right of every citizen to be tried by judges as impartial as the lot of humanity will admit. It is therefore not only the best policy, but for the security of the rights of the people, that the judges of the supreme judicial court should hold their offices so long as they behave well; subject, however, to such limitations, on account of age, as may be provided by the constitution of the state; and that they should have honorable salaries, ascertained and established by standing laws.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 to provide for age limitation as provided by the constitution.

[Art.] 36. [Pensions.] Economy being a most essential virtue in all states, especially in a young one, no pension shall be granted, but in consideration of actual services; and such pensions ought to be granted with great caution, by the legislature, and never for more than one year at a time.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 36-a [Use of Retirement Funds.] The employer contributions certified as payable to the New Hampshire retirement system or any successor system to fund the system's liabilities, as shall be determined by sound actuarial valuation and practice, independent of the executive office, shall be appropriated each fiscal year to the same extent as is certified. All of the assets and proceeds, and income therefrom, of the New Hampshire retirement system and of any and all other retirement systems for public officers and employees operated by the state or by any of its political subdivisions, and

of any successor system, and all contributions and payments made to any such system to provide for retirement and related benefits shall be held, invested or disbursed as in trust for the exclusive purpose of providing for such benefits and shall not be encumbered for, or diverted to, any other purposes.

November 28, 1984

[Art.] 37. [Separation of Powers.] In the government of this state, the three essential powers thereof, to wit, the legislative, executive, and judicial, ought to be kept as separate from, and independent of, each other, as the nature of a free government will admit, or as is consistent with that chain of connection that binds the whole fabric of the constitution in one indissoluble bond of union and amity.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 38. [Social Virtues Inculcated.] A frequent recurrence to the fundamental principles of the constitution, and a constant adherence to justice, moderation, temperance, industry, frugality, and all the social virtues, are indispensably necessary to preserve the blessings of liberty and good government; the people ought, therefore, to have a particular regard to all those principles in the choice of their officers and representatives, and they have a right to require of their lawgivers and magistrates, an exact and constant observance of them, in the formation and execution of the laws necessary for the good administration of government.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 39. [Changes in Town and City Charters, Referendum Required.] No law changing the charter or form of government of a particular city or town shall be enacted by the legislature except to become effective upon the approval of the voters of such city or town upon a referendum to be provided for in said law.

The legislature may by general law authorize cities and towns to adopt or amend their charters or forms of government in any way which is not in conflict with general law, provided that such charters or amendments shall become effective only upon the approval of the voters of each such city or town on a referendum.

November 16, 1966

PART SECOND

FORM OF GOVERNMENT

Article 1. [Name of Body Politic.] The people inhabiting the territory formerly called the province of New Hampshire, do hereby solemnly and mutually agree with each other, to form themselves into a free, sovereign and independent body-politic, or state, by the name of THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

June 2, 1784

GENERAL COURT

[Art.] 2. [Legislature, How Constituted.] The supreme legislative power, within this state, shall be vested in the senate and house of representatives, each of which shall have a negative on the other.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 3. [General Court, When to Meet and Dissolve.] The senate and house shall assemble biennially on the first Wednesday of December for organizational purposes in even numbered years, and shall assemble annually on the first Wednesday following the first Tuesday in January, and at such other times as they may judge necessary; and shall dissolve and be dissolved at 12:01 A.M. on the first Wednesday of December in even numbered years and shall be styled THE GENERAL COURT OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1877 changing annual sessions to biennial sessions.

Amended 1889 calling for the legislature to meet in January instead of June.

1966 amendment permitting annual sessions was ruled invalid in *Gerber v. King*, 107 NH 495.

Amended 1974 to permit organizational meetings in December and the January meeting to be on the first Wednesday after the first Tuesday.

Amended 1984 changing biennial sessions to annual sessions.

[Art.] 4. [Power of General Court to Establish Courts.] The general court (except as otherwise provided by Article 72-a of Part 2) shall forever have full power and authority to erect and constitute judicatories and courts of record, or other courts, to be holden, in the name of the state, for the hearing, trying, and determining, all manner of crimes, offenses, pleas, processes, complaints, actions, causes, matters and things whatsoever arising or happening within this state, or between or concerning persons inhabiting or residing, or brought, within the same, whether the same be criminal or civil, or whether the crimes be capital, or not capital, and whether the said pleas be real, personal or mixed, and for the awarding and issuing execution thereon. To which courts and judicatories, are hereby given and granted, full power and authority, from time to time, to administer oaths or affirmations, for the better discovery of truth in any matter in controversy, or depending before them.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1966 to add exception relating to Art. 72-a, Part 2.

[Art.] 5. [Power to Make Laws, Elect Officers, Define Their Powers and Duties, Impose Fines and Assess Taxes; Prohibited from Authorizing Towns to Aid Certain

Corporations.] And farther, full power and authority are hereby given and granted to the said general court, from time to time, to make, ordain, and establish, all manner of wholesome and reasonable orders, laws, statutes, ordinances, directions, and instructions, either with penalties, or without, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution, as they may judge for the benefit and welfare of this state, and for the governing and ordering thereof, and of the subjects of the same, for the necessary support and defense of the government thereof, and to name and settle biennially, or provide by fixed laws for the naming and settling, all civil officers within this state, such officers excepted, the election and appointment of whom are hereafter in this form of government otherwise provided for; and to set forth the several duties, powers, and limits, of the several civil and military officers of this state, and the forms of such oaths or affirmations as shall be respectively administered unto them, for the execution of their several offices and places, so as the same be not repugnant or contrary to this constitution; and also to impose fines, mulcts, imprisonments, and other punishments, and to impose and levy proportional and reasonable assessments, rates, and taxes, upon all the inhabitants of, and residents within, the said state; and upon all estates within the same; to be issued and disposed of by warrant, under the hand of the governor of this state for the time being, with the advice and consent of the council, for the public service, in the necessary defense and support of the government of this state, and the protection and preservation of the subjects thereof, according to such acts as are, or shall be, in force within the same; provided that the general court shall not authorize any town to loan or give its money or credit directly or indirectly for the benefit of any corporation having for its object a dividend of profits or in any way aid the same by taking its stocks or bonds. For the purpose of encouraging conservation of the forest resources of the state, the general court may provide for special assessments, rates and taxes on growing wood and timber.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 changing "president" to "governor."

Amended 1877 changing "annually" to "biennially." Also amended to prohibit towns and cities from loaning money or credit to corporations.

Amended 1942 to permit a timber tax.

[Art.] 5-a. [Continuity of Government in Case of Enemy Attack.] Notwithstanding any general or special provision of this constitution, the general court, in order to insure continuity of state and local government operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices, and to adopt such other measures as may be necessary and proper for insuring the continuity of governmental operations including but not limited to the financing thereof. In the exercise of the powers hereby conferred the general court shall in all respects conform to the requirements of this constitution except to the extent that in the judgment of the general court so to do would be impracticable or would admit of undue delay.

November 30, 1942

[Art.] 5-b. [Power to Provide for Tax Valuations Based on Use.] The general court may provide for the assessment of any class of real estate at valuations based upon the current use thereof.

November 15, 1968

[Art.] 6. [Valuation and Taxation.] The public charges of government, or any part thereof, may be raised by taxation upon polls, estates, and other classes of property, including franchises and property when passing by will or inheritance; and there shall be a valuation of the estates within the state taken anew once in every five years, at least, and as much oftener as the general court shall order.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1903 to permit taxes on other classes of property including franchises and property passing by inheritances.

[Art.] 6-a. [Use of Certain Revenues Restricted to Highways.] All revenue in excess of the necessary cost of collection and administration accruing to the state from registration fees, operators' licenses, gasoline road tolls or any other special charges or taxes with respect to the operation of motor vehicles or the sale or consumption of motor vehicle fuels shall be appropriated and used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction and maintenance of public highways within this state, including the supervision of traffic thereon and payment of the interest and principal of obligations incurred for said purposes; and no part of such revenues shall, by transfer of funds or otherwise, be diverted to any other purpose whatsoever.

November 29, 1938

[Art.] 7. [Members of Legislature Not to Take Fees or Act as Counsel.] No member of the general court shall take fees, be of counsel, or act as advocate, in any cause before either branch of the legislature; and upon due proof thereof, such member shall forfeit his seat in the legislature.

September 5, 1792

[Art.] 8. [Open Sessions of Legislature.] The doors of the galleries, of each house of the legislature, shall be kept open to all persons who behave decently, except when the welfare of the state, in the opinion of either branch, shall require secrecy.

September 5, 1792

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

[Art.] 9. [Representatives Elected Every Second Year; Apportionment of Representatives.] There shall be in the legislature of this state a house of representatives, biennially elected and founded on principles of equality, and representation therein shall be as equal as circumstances will admit. The whole number of representatives to be chosen from the towns, wards, places, and representative districts thereof established hereunder, shall be not less than three hundred seventy-five or more than four hundred. As soon as possible after the convening of the next regular session of the legislature, and at the session in 1971, and every ten years thereafter, the legislature shall make an apportionment of representatives according to the last general census of the inhabitants of the state taken by authority of the United States or of this state. In making such apportionment, no town, ward or place shall be divided nor the boundaries thereof altered.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1877 three times providing for biennial elections; increasing representation from 150 rateable polls to 600; prohibiting towns and wards from being altered so as to increase representation.

Amended 1942 limiting size of House to between 375 and 400.

Amended 1964 providing for equal representation.

[Art.] 9-a. [Legislative Adjustments of Census with Reference to Non-Residents.] The

general court shall have the power to provide by statute for making suitable adjustments to the general census of the inhabitants of the state taken by the authority of the United States or of this state on account of non-residents temporarily residing in this state. November 30, 1960

[Art.] 10. [Representation of Small Towns.] (Repealed)

June 2, 1784. Small towns grouped together to provide one representative for 150 rateable polls. The election meeting was to rotate annually between the towns.

Amended 1877 increasing districts to 600 inhabitants; rotation of meeting changed to biennially.

Repealed in 1889. Provisions incorporated into Art. 11.

[Art.] 11. [Small Towns; Representation by Districts.] When any town, ward, or unincorporated place, according to the last federal decennial census, has less than the number of inhabitants necessary to entitle it to one representative, the legislature shall form those towns, wards, or unincorporated places into representative districts which contain a sufficient number of inhabitants to entitle each district so formed to one or more representatives for the entire district. In forming the districts, the boundaries of towns, wards and unincorporated places shall be preserved and the towns, wards and unincorporated places forming one district shall be reasonably proximate to one another. The legislature shall form the representative districts at its next session after approval of this article by the voters of the state, and thereafter at the regular session following every decennial federal census.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 changing General Assembly to General Court.

Amended 1877 changing 150 rateable polls to 600 inhabitants.

Amended 1889 providing that towns of less than 600 should be represented a proportional amount of time instead of being classed as formerly provided in Art. 10.

Amended 1942 deleting reference to 600 and providing that small towns should be represented at least once in every 10 years.

Amended 1964 to permit small towns to be districted for one or more representatives.

[Art.] 11-a. [Division of Town, Ward or Place; Representative Districts.] Notwithstanding Articles 9 and 11, a law providing for an apportionment to form representative districts under Articles 9 and 11 of Part Second may divide a town, ward or unincorporated place into two or more representative districts if such town, ward or place, by referendum requests such division.

November 22, 1978 (Rejected in 1976 as proposed by convention, but adopted in 1978 as proposed by the general court and including both representative and senate districts.)

[Art.] 12. [Biennial Election of Representatives in November.] The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen biennially, in the month of November, and shall be the second branch of the legislature.

June 2, 1784

Amended twice in 1877 substituting "biennially" for "annually" and "November" for "March."

[Art.] 13. [Qualifications of Electors.] (Repealed)

June 2, 1784. All persons qualified to vote in the election of senators shall be entitled to vote within the town, district, parish, or place where they dwell, in the choice of representatives.

Note: The phrase "town, district, parish, or place" was shortened to "district" in engrossed copy of 1792, apparently without authority.

Repealed in 1976.

[Art.] 14. [Representatives, How Elected, Qualifications of.] Every member of the house of representatives shall be chosen by ballot; and, for two years, at least, next preceding his election shall have been an inhabitant of this state; shall be, at the time of his election, an inhabitant of the town, ward, place, or district he may be chosen to represent and shall cease to represent such town, ward, place, or district immediately on his ceasing to be qualified as aforesaid.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1852 deleting provision for representatives to have an estate of 100 pounds.

Amended 1877 deleting requirement that representatives be Protestants.

Amended 1956 substituting "ward" for "parish."

Amended 1964 adding word "district."

[Art.] 15. [Compensation of the Legislature.] The presiding officers of both houses of the legislature, shall severally receive out of the state treasury as compensation in full for their services for the term elected the sum of \$250, and all other members thereof, seasonably attending and not departing without license, the sum of \$200 and each member shall receive mileage for actual daily attendance on legislative days, but not after the legislature shall have been in session for 45 legislative days or after the first day of July following the annual assembly of the legislature, whichever occurs first; provided, however, that, when a special session shall be called by the governor or by a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the then qualified members of each branch of the general court, such officers and members shall receive for attendance an additional compensation of \$3 per day for a period not exceeding 15 days and the usual mileage. Nothing herein shall prevent the payment of additional mileage to members attending committee meetings or on other legislative business on nonlegislative days.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 requiring state to pay wages instead of town.

Amended 1889 setting salary for members at \$200 and for officers at \$250 with \$3 per day for special sessions.

Amended 1960 limiting mileage to 90 legislative days.

Amended 1984 limiting mileage to 45 legislative days in each annual session.

[Art.] 16. [Vacancies in House, How Filled.] All intermediate vacancies, in the house of representatives may be filled up, from time to time, in the same manner as biennial elections are made.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1877 changing "annual" to "biennial" elections.

[Art.] 17. [House to Impeach Before the Senate.] The house of representatives shall be the grand inquest of the state; and all impeachments made by them, shall be heard and tried by the senate.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 18. [Money Bills to Originate in House.] All money bills shall originate in the house of representatives; but the senate may propose, or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 18-a [Budget Bills.] All sections of all budget bills before the general court shall contain only the operating and capital expenses for the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government. No section or footnote of any such budget bill shall contain any provision which establishes, amends or repeals statutory law, other than provisions establishing, amending or repealing operating and capital expenses for the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government.

November 28, 1984

[Art.] 19. [Adjournment.] The house of representatives shall have the power to adjourn themselves.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1948 substituting "five" for "two" days as length of adjournment.

Amended 1966 removing limitation on adjournment.

[Art.] 20. [Quorum, What Constitutes.] A majority of the members of the house of representatives shall be a quorum for doing business: But when less than two-thirds of the representatives elected shall be present, the assent of two-thirds of those members shall be necessary to render their acts and proceedings valid.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 21. [Privileges of Members of Legislature.] No member of the house of representatives, or senate shall be arrested, or held to bail, on mesne process, during his going to, returning from, or attendance upon, the court.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 22. [House to Elect Speaker and Officers, Settle Rules of Proceedings, and Punish Misconduct.] The house of representatives shall choose their own speaker, appoint their own officers, and settle the rules of proceedings in their own house; and shall be judge of the returns, elections, and qualifications, of its members, as pointed out in this constitution. They shall have authority to punish, by imprisonment, every person who shall be guilty of disrespect to the house, in its presence, by any disorderly and contemptuous behavior, or by threatening, or illtreating, any of its members; or by obstructing its deliberations; every person guilty of a breach of its privileges, in making arrests for debt, or by assaulting any member during his attendance at any session; in assaulting or disturbing any one of its officers in the execution of any order or procedure of the house; in assaulting any witness, or other person, ordered to attend, by and during his attendance of the house; or in rescuing any person arrested by order of the house, knowing them to be such.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 by adding that the House shall be judge of the returns, elections, and qualifications of its members.

[Art.] 23. [Senate and Executive Have Like Powers; Imprisonment Limited.] The senate, governor and council, shall have the same powers in like cases; provided, that no imprisonment by either, for any offense, exceeds ten days.

[Art.] 24 [Journals and Laws to be Published; Yeas and Nays; and Protests.] The journals of the proceedings, and all public acts of both houses, of the legislature, shall be printed and published immediately after every adjournment or prorogation; and upon motion made by any one member, duly seconded, the yeas and nays, upon any question, shall be entered, on the journal. And any member of the senate, or house of representatives, shall have a right, on motion made at the time for that purpose to have his protest, or dissent, with the reasons, against any vote, resolve, or bill passed, entered on the journal.

SENATE

[Art.] 25. [Senate, How Constituted.] The senate shall consist of twenty-four members. June 2, 1784. Provided for 12 senators.

Amended 1792. Generally rephrased specifying term as one year from the first Wednesday in June.

Amended 1877 increasing senators to 24 and providing for 2 year term.

Amended 1889 so that term started in January instead of June.

Amended 1974 deleting reference to term.

[Art.] 26. [Senatorial Districts, How Constituted.] And that the state may be equally represented in the senate, the legislature shall divide the state into single-member districts, as nearly equal as may be in population, each consisting of contiguous towns, city wards and unincorporated places, without dividing any town, city ward or unincorporated place. The legislature shall form the single-member districts at its next session after approval of this article by the voters of the state and thereafter at the regular session following each decennial federal census.

June 2, 1784. Number of senators elected from each district (county) proportioned to taxes paid by each district.

Amended 1792 dividing the state into 12 senatorial districts still based on proportion of taxes paid by the district.

Amended 1877 increasing senate to 24 members from single member districts.

[Art.] 26-a. [Division of Town, Ward or Place; Senatorial Districts.] Notwithstanding Article 26 or any other article, a law providing for an apportionment to form senatorial districts under Article 26 of Part Second may divide a town, ward or unincorporated place into two or more senatorial districts if such town, ward or place by referendum requests such division.

November 22, 1978

[Art.] 27. [Election of Senators.] The freeholders and other inhabitants of each district, qualified as in this constitution is provided shall biennially give in their votes for a senator, at some meeting holden in the month of November.

June 2, 1784. Annual election of senators at annual meeting in March.

Amended 1792 rewording phrases but not changing the meaning.

Amended 1877 twice substituting biennial election and sessions for annual elections and sessions and providing for elections in November instead of March.

[Art.] 28. [Senators, How and by Whom Chosen; Right of Suffrage.] (Repealed)

June 2, 1784. Senate, first branch of the legislature, elected by male inhabitants 21 years of age and older who pay their own poll tax.

Amended 1792 changing wording but not the meaning.

Amended 1877 twice, substituting "biennially" for "annually" and "November" for "March."

Amended 1958 removing obsolete reference to "male" inhabitants as being the only ones allowed to vote.

Repealed 1976. Provisions covered by Article 11.

[Art.] 29. [Qualifications of Senators.] Provided nevertheless, that no person shall be capable of being elected a senator, who is not of the age of thirty years, and who shall not have been an inhabitant of this state for seven years immediately preceding his election, and at the time thereof he shall be an inhabitant of the district for which

he shall be chosen. Should such person, after election, cease to be an inhabitant of the district for which he was chosen, he shall be disqualified to hold said position and a vacancy shall be declared therein.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 32. [Biennial Meetings, How Warned, Governed, and Conducted; Return of Votes, etc.] The meetings for the choice of governor, council and senators, shall be warned by warrant from the selectmen, and governed by a moderator, who shall, in the presence of the selectmen (whose duty it shall be to attend) in open meeting, receive the votes of all the inhabitants of such towns and wards present, and qualified to vote for senators; and shall, in said meetings, in presence of the said selectmen, and of the town or city clerk, in said meetings, sort and count the said votes, and make a public declaration thereof, with the name of every person voted for, and the number of votes for each person; and the town or city clerk shall make a fair record of the same at large, in the town book, and shall make out a fair attested copy thereof, to be by him sealed up and directed to the secretary of state, within five days following the election, with a superscription expressing the purport thereof.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 generally rewording section.

[Art.] 33. [Secretary of State to Count Votes for Senators and Notify Persons Elected.] And that there may be a due meeting of senators and representatives on the first Wednesday of December, biennially, the secretary of state shall, as soon as may be, examine the returned copy of such records; and fourteen days before the first Wednesday of December, he shall issue his summons to such persons as appear to be chosen senators and representatives, by a plurality of votes, to attend and take their seats on that day.

[Art.] 34. [Vacancies in Senate, How Filled.] And in case there shall not appear to be a senator elected, by a plurality of votes, for any district, the deficiency shall be supplied in the following manner, viz. The members of the house of representatives, and such senators as shall be declared elected, shall take the names of the two persons having the highest number of votes in the district, and out of them shall elect, by joint ballot, the senator wanted for such district; and in this manner all such vacancies shall be filled up, in every district of the state and in case the person receiving a plurality of votes in any district is found by the Senate not to be qualified to be seated, a new election shall be held forthwith in said district. All vacancies in the senate arising by death, removal out of the state, or otherwise, except from failure to elect, shall be filled by a new election by the people of the district upon the requisition of the governor and council, as soon as may be after such vacancies shall happen.

[Art.] 36. [Adjournment.] The senate shall have power to adjourn themselves, and whenever they shall sit on the trial of any impeachment, they may adjourn to such time and place as they may think proper although the legislature be not assembled on such day, or at such place.

[Art.] 37. [Senate to Elect Their Own Officers; Quorum.] The senate shall appoint their president and other officers, and determine their own rules of proceedings: And not less than thirteen members of the senate shall make a quorum for doing business; and when less than sixteen senators shall be present, the assent of ten, at least, shall be necessary to render their acts and proceedings valid.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 adding "president."

Amended 1877 increasing quorum from 7 to 13 and changing assent of 5 when less than 8 present to assent of 10 when less than 16 present.

[Art.] 38. [Senate to Try Impeachments; Mode of Proceeding.] The senate shall be a court, with full power and authority to hear, try, and determine, all impeachments made by the house of representatives against any officer or officers of the state, for bribery, corruption, malpractice or maladministration, in office; with full power to issue summons, or compulsory process, for convening witnesses before them: But previous to the trial of any such impeachment, the members of the senate shall respectively be sworn truly and impartially to try and determine the charge in question, according to evidence. And every officer, impeached for bribery, corruption, malpractice or maladministration in office, shall be served with an attested copy of the impeachment, and order of the senate thereon with such citation as the senate may direct, setting forth the time and place of their sitting to try the impeachment; which service shall be made by the sheriff, or such other sworn officer as the senate may appoint, at least fourteen days previous to the time of trial; and such citation being duly served and returned, the senate may proceed in the hearing of the impeachment, giving the person impeached, if he shall appear, full liberty of producing witnesses and proofs, and of making his defense, by himself and counsel, and may also, upon his refusing or neglecting to appear hear the proofs in support of the impeachment, and render judgment thereon, his nonappearance notwithstanding; and such judgment shall have the same force and effect as if the person impeached had appeared and pleaded in the trial.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 adding mode of proceeding.

[Art.] 39. [Judgment on Impeachment Limited.] Their judgment, however, shall not extend further than removal from office, disqualification to hold or enjoy any place of honor, trust, or profit, under this state, but the party so convicted, shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment, according to the laws of the land.

[Art.] 40. [Chief Justice to Preside on Impeachment of Governor.] Whenever the governor shall be impeached, the chief justice of the supreme judicial court, shall, during the trial, preside in the senate, but have no vote therein.

EXECUTIVE POWER

GOVERNOR

[Art.] 41. [Governor, Supreme Executive Magistrate.] There shall be a supreme executive magistrate, who shall be styled the Governor of the State of New Hampshire, and whose title shall be His Excellency. The executive power of the state is vested in the governor. The governor shall be responsible for the faithful execution of the laws. He may, by appropriate court action or proceeding brought in the name of the state, enforce compliance with any constitutional or legislative mandate, or restrain violation of any constitutional or legislative power, duty, or right, by any officer, department or agency of the state. This authority shall not be construed to authorize any action or proceedings against the legislative or judicial branches.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 substituting "Governor" for "President."

Amended 1966 clarifying and reinforcing executive powers of the governor.

[Art.] 42. [Election of Governor, Return of Votes; Electors; If No Choice, Legislature to Elect One of Two Highest Candidates; Qualifications for Governor.] The governor shall be chosen biennially in the month of November; and the votes for governor shall be received, sorted, counted, certified and returned, in the same manner as the votes for senators; and the secretary shall lay the same before the senate and house of representatives, on the first Wednesday following the first Tuesday of January to be by them examined, and in case of an election by a plurality of votes through the state, the choice shall be by them declared and published. And the qualifications of electors of the governor shall be the same as those for senators; and if no person shall have a plurality of votes, the senate and house of representatives shall, by joint ballot elect one of the two persons, having the highest number of votes, who shall be declared governor. And no person shall be eligible to this office, unless at the time of his election, he shall have been an inhabitant of this state for 7 years next preceding, and unless he shall be of the age of 30 years.

[Art.] 43. [In Cases of Disagreement Governor to Adjourn or Prorogue Legislature; If Causes Exist, May Convene Them Elsewhere.] In cases of disagreement between the two houses, with regard to the time or place of adjournment or prorogation, the governor, with advice of council, shall have a right to adjourn or prorogue the general court, not exceeding ninety days at any one time, as he may determine the public good may require, and he shall dissolve the same on the first Wednesday of December biennially. And, in cases whereby dangers may arise to the health or lives of the members from their attendance at the general court at any place, the governor may direct the session to be holden at some other the most convenient place within the state.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 twice changing president to governor and inserting "place" of adjournment.

Amended 1889 changing June to January for time of dissolving house and senate.

Amended 1974 providing for the legislature to be dissolved on the first Wednesday of December.

[Art.] 44. [Veto to Bills.] Every bill which shall have passed both houses of the general court, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor, if he approves, he shall sign it, but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with such objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house,

it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of persons, voting for or against the bill, shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it unless the legislature, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

September 5, 1792

[Art.] 45. [Resolves to Be Treated Like Bills.] Every resolve shall be presented to the governor, and before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

September 5, 1792

[Art.] 46. [Nomination and Appointment of Officers.] All judicial officers, the attorney general, and all officers of the navy, and general and field officers of the militia, shall be nominated and appointed by the governor and council; and every such nomination shall be made at least three days prior to such appointment; and no appointment shall take place, unless a majority of the council agree thereto.

[Art.] 47. [Governor and Council Have Negative on Each Other.] The governor and council shall have a negative on each other, both in the nominations and appointments. Every nomination and appointment shall be signed by the governor and council, and every negative shall be also signed by the governor or council who made the same.

[Art.] 48. [Field Officers to Recommend, and Governor to Appoint, Company Officers.] (Repealed)

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 providing that field officers were to nominate and recommend to the governor the captains and subalterns instead of appointing them.

Amended 1903 added proviso that nominees had to be examined and qualified by an examining board.

Repealed 1976.

[Art.] 49. [President of Senate, etc., To Act as Governor When Office Vacant; Speaker of House to Act When Office of President of Senate Is also Vacant.] In the event of the death, resignation, removal from office, failure to qualify, physical or mental incapacity, absence from the state, or other incapacity of the governor, the president of the senate, for the time being, shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled or the incapacity is removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above-named causes, shall become incapable of performing the duties of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives, for the time being, or in the case of the like incapacity of the speaker, upon the secretary of state, or in case of his like incapacity, upon the state treasurer, each of whom, in that order, shall act as governor, as hereinabove provided, until the vacancy is filled or the incapacity removed. Whenever a vacancy for the duration or remainder of the governor's term of office occurs before the commencement of the last year of such term, a special election for governor shall take place to fill the vacancy, as provided by law. Whenever the speaker of the house

acts as governor, he shall act as such only until such time as the vacancy is filled or the incapacity removed in either the office of governor or of president of the senate, whichever occurs first. Whenever either the secretary of state or the treasurer acts as governor, he shall act as such only until such time as the vacancy is filled or the incapacity removed in the offices of governor, of president of the senate or of speaker of the house, whichever occurs first. While acting as governor under this article, the president of the senate, speaker of the house, secretary of state or state treasurer, as the case may be, shall be styled Acting Governor, shall not be required to take an additional oath of office, shall have and exercise all the powers, duties and authorities of, and receive compensation equal to that of the office of governor; and the capacity of each such officer to serve as president of the senate as well as senator, speaker of the house or representatives as well as representative, secretary of state, or state treasurer, as the case may be, or to receive the compensation of such office, shall be suspended only. While the governor or an acting governor is absent from the state on official business, he shall have the power and authority to transact such business.

[Art.] 49-a [Prolonged Failure to Qualify; Vacancy in Office of Governor Due to Physical or Mental Incapacity, etc.] Whenever the governor transmits to the secretary of state and president of the senate his written declaration that he is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office by reason of physical or mental incapacity and until he transmits to them a written declaration to the contrary, the president of the senate, for the time being, shall act as governor as provided in article 49, subject to the succession provisions therein set forth. Whenever it reasonably appears to the attorney general and a majority of the council that the governor is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office by reason of physical or mental incapacity, but the governor is unwilling or unable to transmit his written declaration to such effect as above provided, the attorney general shall file a petition for declaratory judgment in the supreme court requesting a judicial determination of the ability of the governor to discharge the powers and duties of his office. After notice and hearing, the justices of the supreme court shall render such judgment as they find warranted by a preponderance of the evidence; and, if the court holds that the governor is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, the president of the senate, for the time being, shall act as governor as provided in article 49, subject to the succession provisions therein set forth, until such time as the disability of the governor is removed or a newly elected governor is inaugurated. Such disability, once determined by the supreme court, may be removed upon petition for declaratory judgment to the supreme court by the governor if the court finds, after notice and hearing, by a preponderance of the evidence that the governor is able to discharge the powers and duties of his office. Whenever such disability of the governor,

as determined by his written declaration or by judgment of the supreme court, has continued for a period of 6 months, the general court may, by concurrent resolution adopted by both houses, declare the office of governor vacant. Whenever the governor-elect fails to qualify by reason of physical or mental incapacity or any cause other than death or resignation, for a period of 6 months following the inauguration date established by this constitution, the general court may, by concurrent resolution adopted by both houses, declare the office of governor vacant. The provisions of article 49 shall govern the filling of such vacancy, either by special election or continued service of an acting governor. If the general court is not in session when any such 6-month period expires, the acting governor, upon written request of at least 1/4 of the members of each house, shall convene the general court in special session for the sole purpose of considering and acting on the question whether to declare a vacancy in the office of governor under this article.

November 28, 1984

[Art.] 50. [Governor to Prorogue or Adjourn Legislature, and Call Extra Sessions.]

The governor, with advice of council, shall have full power and authority, in the recess of the general court, to prorogue the same from time to time, not exceeding ninety days, in any one recess of said court; and during the sessions of said court, to adjourn or prorogue it to any time the two houses may desire, and to call it together sooner than the time to which it may be adjourned, or prorogued, if the welfare of the state should require the same.

[Powers and Duties of Governor as Commander-in-Chief.] The governor of this state for the time being, shall be commander-in-chief of all the military forces of the state; and shall have full power, by himself or by any chief commander, or other officer or officers, from time to time, to train, instruct, exercise and govern the militia; to call forth the militia and to put in warlike posture the inhabitants of the state; to execute the laws of the state and of the United States; to suppress insurrection and to repel invasion; and, in fine, the governor is hereby entrusted with all other powers incident to the office of commander-in-chief to be exercised agreeably to the rules and regulations of the constitution and the laws of the land.

[Art.] 56. [Disbursements from Treasury.] No moneys shall be issued out of the treasury of this state, and disposed of, (except such sums as may be appropriated for the redemption of bills of credit, or treasurer's notes, or for the payment of interest arising thereon) but by warrant under the hand of the governor for the time being, by and with the advice and consent of the council, for the necessary support and defense of this state, and for the necessary protection and preservation of the inhabitants thereof, agreeably to the acts and resolves of the general court.

COUNCIL

[Art.] 60. [Councilors; Mode of Election, etc.] There shall be biennially elected, by ballot, five councilors, for advising the governor in the executive part of government. The freeholders and other inhabitants in each county, qualified to vote for senators, shall some time in the month of November, give in their votes for one councilor; which votes shall be received, sorted, counted, certified, and returned to the secretary's office, in the same manner as the votes for senators, to be by the secretary laid before the senate and house of representatives on the first Wednesday following the first Tuesday of January.

[Art.] 61. [Vacancies, How Filled, if No Choice.] And the person having a plurality of votes in any county, shall be considered as duly elected a councilor: But if no person shall have a plurality of votes in any county, the senate and house of representatives

shall take the names of the two persons who have the highest number of votes in each county, and not elected, and out of those two shall elect by joint ballot, the councilor wanted for such county, and the qualifications for councilors shall be the same as for senator.

September 5, 1792

Amended 1912 substituting plurality for majority.

[Art.] 62. [Subsequent Vacancies; Governor to Convene; Duties.] If any person thus chosen a councilor, shall be elected governor or member of either branch of the legislature, and shall accept the trust; or if any person elected a councilor, shall refuse to accept the office, or in case of the death, resignation, or removal of any councilor out of the state, the governor may issue a precept for the election of a new councilor in that county where such vacancy shall happen and the choice shall be in the same manner as before directed. And the governor shall have full power and authority to convene the council, from time to time, at his discretion; and, with them, or the majority of them, may and shall, from time to time hold a council, for ordering and directing the affairs of the state, according to the laws of the land.

September 5, 1792.

[Art.] 63. [Impeachment of Councilors.] The members of the council may be impeached by the house, and tried by the senate for bribery, corruption, malpractice, or maladministration.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 changing wording generally and changing mal-conduct to bribery, corruption, malpractice, or maladministration.

[Art.] 64. [Secretary to Record Proceedings of Council.] The resolutions and advice of the council shall be recorded by the secretary, in a register, and signed by all members present agreeing thereto; and this record may be called for at any time, by either house of the legislature; and any member of the council may enter his opinion contrary to the resolutions of the majority, with the reasons for such opinion.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 adding phrases: "by the secretary," "agreeing thereto," and "with the reasons for such opinion."

[Art.] 65. [Councilor Districts Provided for.] The legislature may, if the public good shall hereafter require it, divide the state into five districts, as nearly equal as may be, governing themselves by the number of population, each district to elect a councilor: And, in case of such division, the manner of the choice shall be conformable to the present mode of election in counties.

September 5, 1792

Amended 1912 substituting population for rateable polls.

[Art.] 66. [Elections by Legislature May Be Adjourned From Day to Day; Order Thereof.] And, whereas the elections, appointed to be made by this constitution on the first Wednesday of January biennially, by the two houses of the legislature, may not be completed on that day, the said elections may be adjourned from day to day, until the same be completed; and the order of the elections shall be as follows — the vacancies in the senate, if any, shall be first filled up: The governor shall then be elected, provided there shall be no choice of him by the people: And afterwards, the two houses shall proceed to fill up the vacancy, if any, in the council.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 twice changing president to governor and election of the council only if there is a vacancy.

Amended 1877 substituting biennially for annually.
 Amended 1889 substituting January for June.

SECRETARY, TREASURER, ETC.

[Art.] 67. [Election of Secretary and Treasurer.] The secretary and treasurer shall be chosen by joint ballot of the senators and representatives assembled in one room.
 June 2, 1784

Amended 1950 deleting commissary-general.

[Art.] 68. [State Records, Where Kept; Duty of Secretary.] The records of the state shall be kept in the office of the secretary, and he shall attend the governor and council, the senate and representatives, in person, or by deputy, as they may require.
 June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 twice transferring authority of the secretary to appoint his deputies to next article, and changing president to governor.

[Art.] 69. [Deputy Secretary.] The secretary of the state shall, at all times, have a deputy, to be by him appointed; for whose conduct in office he shall be responsible: And, in case of the death, removal, or inability of the secretary, his deputy shall exercise all the duties of the office of secretary of this state, until another shall be appointed.
 June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 describing duties of the deputy secretary.

[Art.] 70. [Secretary to Give Bond.] The secretary, before he enters upon the business of his office, shall give bond, with sufficient sureties, in a reasonable sum, for the use of the state, for the punctual performance of his trust.
 September 5, 1792

COUNTY TREASURER, ETC.

[Art.] 71. [County Treasurers, Registers of Probate, County Attorneys, Sheriffs, and Registers of Deeds Elected.] The county treasurers, registers of probate, county attorneys, sheriffs and registers of deeds, shall be elected by the inhabitants of the several towns, in the several counties in the state, according to the method now practiced, and the laws of the state, Provided nevertheless the legislature shall have authority to alter the manner of certifying the votes, and the mode of electing those officers; but not so as to deprive the people of the right they now have of electing them.
 June 2, 1874

Amended 1792 twice adding proviso that the legislature could alter the manner of certifying the votes and mode of electing the officers; deleting oath and bond of county treasurer and transferring oath and bond of register of deeds to next article. Amended 1877 adding registers of probate, country solicitors, and sheriffs to those to be elected.
 Amended 1958 changing county solicitor to county attorney.

[Art.] 72. [Counties May Be Divided into Districts for Registering Deeds.] And the legislature, on the application of the major part of the inhabitants of any county, shall have authority to divide the same into two districts for registering deeds, if to them it shall appear necessary; each district to elect a register of deeds: And before they enter upon the business of their offices, shall be respectively sworn faithfully to discharge the duties thereof, and shall severally give bond, with sufficient sureties, in a reasonable sum, for the use of the county for the punctual performance of their respective trusts.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 providing for counties being divided into districts for registering deeds and electing registers.

JUDICIARY POWER

[Art.] 72-a. [Supreme and Superior Courts.] The judicial power of the state shall be vested in the supreme court, a trial court of general jurisdiction known as the superior court, and such lower courts as the legislature may establish under Article 4th of Part 2. November 16, 1966

[Art.] 73. [Tenure of Office To Be Expressed in Commissions; Judges to Hold Office During Good Behavior, etc.; Removal.] The tenure that all commissioned officers shall have by law in their offices shall be expressed in their respective commissions, and all judicial officers duly appointed, commissioned and sworn, shall hold their offices during good behavior except those for whom a different provision is made in this constitution. The governor with consent of the council may remove any commissioned officer for reasonable cause upon the address of both houses of the legislature, provided nevertheless that the cause for removal shall be stated fully and substantially in the address and shall not be a cause which is a sufficient ground for impeachment, and provided further that no officer shall be so removed unless he shall have had an opportunity to be heard in his defense by a joint committee of both houses of the legislature.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 changing president to governor.

Amended 1966 spelling out procedures for removal from office.

[Art.] 73-a. [Supreme Court, Administration.] The chief justice of the supreme court shall be the administrative head of all the courts. He shall, with the concurrence of a majority of the supreme court justices, make rules governing the administration of all courts in the state and the practice and procedure to be followed in all such courts. The rules so promulgated shall have the force and effect of law.

November 22, 1978

[Art.] 74. [Judges to Give Opinions, When.] Each branch of the legislature as well as the governor and council shall have authority to require the opinions of the justices of the supreme court upon important questions of law and upon solemn occasions.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 changing president to governor.

Amended 1958 substituting supreme court for superior court.

[Art.] 75. [Justices of Peace Commissioned for Five Years.] In order that the people may not suffer from the long continuance in place of any justice of the peace who shall fail in discharging the important duties of his office with ability and fidelity, all commissions of justice of the peace shall become void at the expiration of five years from their respective dates, and upon the expiration of any commission, the same may if necessary be renewed or another person appointed as shall most conduce to the well being of the state.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 76. [Divorce and Probate Appeals, Where Tried.] All causes of marriage, divorce and alimony; and all appeals from the respective judges of probate shall be heard and tried by the superior court until the legislature shall by law make other provision.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 77. [Jurisdiction of Justices in Civil Causes.] The general court are empowered to give to justices of the peace jurisdiction in civil causes, when the damages demanded shall not exceed one hundred dollars and title of real estate is not concerned; but with right of appeal, to either party, to some other court. And the general court are further empowered to give to police courts original jurisdiction to try and determine, subject to right of appeal and trial by jury, all criminal causes wherein the punishment is less than imprisonment in the state prison.

September 5, 1792

Amended 1877 substituting \$100 for 4 pounds

Amended 1912 giving jurisdiction to police courts.

[Art.] 78. [Judges and Sheriffs, When Disqualified by Age.] No person shall hold the office of judge of any court, or judge of probate, or sheriff of any county, after he has attained the age of seventy years.

September 5, 1792

[Art.] 79. [Judges and Justices Not to Act as Counsel.] No judge of any court, or justice of the peace, shall act as attorney, or be of counsel, to any party, or originate any civil suit, in matters which shall come or be brought before him as judge, or justice of the peace.

September 5, 1792

[Art.] 80. [Jurisdiction and Term of Probate Courts.] All matters relating to the probate of wills, and granting letters of administration, shall be exercised by the judges of probate, in such manner as the legislature have directed, or may hereafter direct: And the judges of probate shall hold their courts at such place or places, on such fixed days, as the conveniency of the people may require; and the legislature from time to time appoint.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 rewording section generally.

[Art.] 81. [Judges and Registers of Probate Not to Act as Counsel.] No judge, or register of probate, shall be of counsel, act as advocate, or receive any fees as advocate or counsel, in any probate business which is pending, or may be brought into any court of probate in the county of which he is judge or register.

September 5, 1792

CLERKS OF COURTS

[Art.] 82. [Clerks of Courts, by Whom Appointed.] The judges of the courts (those of probate excepted) shall appoint their respective clerks to hold their office during pleasure: And no such clerk shall act as an attorney or be of counsel in any cause in the court of which he is clerk, nor shall he draw any writ originating a civil action.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 rewording section generally.

ENCOURAGEMENT OF LITERATURE, TRADES, ETC.

[Art.] 83. [Encouragement of Literature, etc.; Control of Corporations, Monopolies, etc.] Knowledge and learning, generally diffused through a community, being essential to the preservation of a free government; and spreading the opportunities and advantages of education through the various parts of the country, being highly conducive

to promote this end; it shall be the duty of the legislators and magistrates, in all future periods of this government, to cherish the interest of literature and the sciences, and all seminaries and public schools, to encourage private and public institutions, rewards, and immunities for the promotion of agriculture, arts, sciences, commerce, trades, manufactures, and natural history of the country; to countenance and inculcate the principles of humanity and general benevolence, public and private charity, industry and economy, honesty and punctuality, sincerity, sobriety, and all social affections, and generous sentiments, among the people: Provided, nevertheless, that no money raised by taxation shall ever be granted or applied for the use of the schools of institutions of any religious sect or denomination. Free and fair competition in the trades and industries is an inherent and essential right of the people and should be protected against all monopolies and conspiracies which tend to hinder or destroy it. The size and functions of all corporations should be so limited and regulated as to prohibit fictitious capitalization and provision should be made for the supervision and government thereof. Therefore, all just power possessed by the state is hereby granted to the general court to enact laws to prevent the operations within the state of all persons and associations, and all trusts and corporations, foreign or domestic, and the officers thereof, who endeavor to raise the price of any article of commerce or to destroy free and fair competition in the trades and industries through combination, conspiracy, monopoly, or any other unfair means; to control and regulate the acts of all such persons, associations, corporations, trusts, and officials doing business within the state; to prevent fictitious capitalization; and to authorize civil and criminal proceedings in respect to all the wrongs herein declared against.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1877 prohibiting tax money from being applied to schools of religious denominations.

Amended 1903 permitting the general court to regulate trusts and monopolies restraining free trade.

**OATHS AND SUBSCRIPTIONS—EXCLUSION FROM OFFICES—
COMMISSIONS—WRITS—CONFIRMATION OF LAWS—HABEAS CORPUS
THE ENACTING STYLE—CONTINUANCE OF OFFICERS—PROVISION
FOR FUTURE REVISION OF THE CONSTITUTION—ETC.**

[Art.] 84. [Oath of Civil Officers.] Any person chosen governor, councilor, senator, or representative, military or civil officer, (town officers excepted) accepting the trust, shall, before he proceeds to execute the duties of his office, make and subscribe the following declaration, viz. -

I, A.B. do solemnly swear, that I will bear faith and true allegiance to the United States of America and the state of New Hampshire, and will support the constitution thereof. So help me God.

I, A.B. do solemnly and sincerely swear and affirm that I will faithfully and impartially discharge and perform all duties incumbent on me as . . . , according to the best of my abilities, agreeably to the rules and regulations of this constitution and laws of the state of New Hampshire. So help me God.

Any person having taken and subscribed the oath of allegiance, and the same being filed in the secretary's office, he shall not be obliged to take said oath again.

Provided always, when any person chosen or appointed as aforesaid shall be of the denomination called Quakers, or shall be scrupulous of swearing, and shall decline taking

the said oaths, such person shall take and subscribe them, omitting the word "swear," and likewise the words "So help me God," subjoining instead thereof, "This I do under the pains and penalties of perjury."

I, A.B., do solemnly and sincerely swear and affirm, that I will faithfully and impartially discharge and perform all the duties incumbent on me as . . . according to the best of my abilities, agreeably to the rules and regulations of this constitution, and the laws of the State of New Hampshire. So help me God.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 three times, changing president to governor; shortening oath of allegiance; and dispensing with need to take second oath.

Amended 1970 adding allegiance to the United States of America.

[Art.] 85. [Before Whom Taken.] The oaths or affirmations shall be taken and subscribed by the governor before a justice of a New Hampshire court, in the presence of both houses of the legislature, by the senators and representatives before the governor and council for the time being, and by all other officers before such persons and in such manner as the general court shall from time to time appoint.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 three times changing president to governor, senior senator to president of the senate, assembly to legislature, and generally rewording section.

Amended 1968 deleting reference to those first elected.

Amended 1984 providing that the governor's oath shall be taken before a justice of a New Hampshire court.

[Art.] 86. [Form of Commissions.] All commissions shall be in the name of the state of New Hampshire, signed by the governor, and attested by the secretary, or his deputy, and shall have the great seal of the state affixed thereto.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 changing president to governor.

[Art.] 87. [Form of Writs.] All writs issuing out of the clerk's office in any of the courts of law, shall be in the name of the state of New Hampshire; shall be under the seal of the court whence they issue, and bear test of the chief, first, or senior justice of the court; but when such justice shall be interested, then the writ shall bear test of some other justice of the court, to which the same shall be returnable; and be signed by the clerk of such court.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 88. [Form of Indictments, etc.] All indictments, presentments, and informations, shall conclude, "against the peace and dignity of the state."

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 89. [Suicides and Deodands.] The estates of such persons as may destroy their own lives, shall not for that offense be forfeited, but descend or ascend in the same manner, as if such persons had died in a natural way. Nor shall any article, which shall accidentally occasion the death of any person, be henceforth deemed a deodand, or in any wise forfeited on account of such misfortune.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 90. [Existing Laws Continued if Not Repugnant.] All the laws which have heretofore been adopted, used, and approved, in the province, colony, or state of New Hampshire, and usually practiced on in the courts of law, shall remain and be in full force, until altered and repealed by the legislature; such parts thereof only excepted, as are repugnant to the rights and liberties contained in this constitution: Provided that nothing herein contained, when compared with the twenty-third article in the bill of rights, shall

be construed to affect the laws already made respecting the persons, or estates of absentees.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 91. [Habeas Corpus.] The privilege and benefit of the habeas corpus, shall be enjoyed in this state, in the most free, easy, cheap, expeditious, and ample manner, and shall not be suspended by the legislature, except upon most urgent and pressing occasions, and for a time not exceeding three months.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 92. [Enacting Style of Statutes.] The enacting style in making and passing acts, statutes, and laws, shall be, Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 93. [Governor and Judges Prohibited From Holding Other Offices.] No governor, or judge of the supreme judicial court, shall hold any office or place under the authority of this state, except such as by this constitution they are admitted to hold, saving that the judges of the said court may hold the offices of justice of the peace throughout the state; nor shall they hold any place or office, or receive any pension or salary, from any other state, government, or power, whatever.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 changing president to governor. The engrossed copy of 1792, apparently without authority, changed superior court to supreme judicial court.

[Art.] 94. [Incompatibility of Offices; Only Two Offices of Profit to Be Holden at Same Time.] No person shall be capable of exercising, at the same time more than one of the following offices within this state, viz. judge of probate, sheriff, register of deeds; and never more than two offices of profit, which may be held by appointment of the governor, or governor and council, or senate and house of representatives, or superior or inferior courts; military offices, and offices of justice of the peace excepted.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 changing president to governor.

[Art.] 95. [Incompatibility of Certain Offices.] No person holding the office of judge of any court, (except special judges) secretary, treasurer of the state, attorney-general, register of deeds, sheriff, collectors of state and federal taxes, members of Congress or any person holding any office under the United States, including any person in active military service, shall at the same time hold the office of governor, or have a seat in the senate, or house of representatives, or council; but his being chosen and appointed to, and accepting the same, shall operate as a resignation of his seat in the chair, senate, or house of representatives, or council; and the place so vacated shall be filled up. No member of the council shall have a seat in the senate or house of representatives.

June 2, 1784

Amended 1792 generally rewording section.

Amended 1950 deleting commissary-general.

Amended 1958 changing obsolete words and phrases.

Amended 1980 prohibiting persons in active military service from holding state office.

[Art.] 96. [Bribery and Corruption Disqualify for Office.] No person shall ever be admitted to hold a seat in the legislature or any office of trust or importance under this government, who, in the due course of law, has been convicted of bribery or corruption, in obtaining an election or appointment.

June 2, 1784

[Art.] 97. [Value of Money, How Computed.] (Repealed)

June 2, 1784. Money valued at 6 shillings 8 pence per ounce of silver.

Repealed 1950.

[Art.] 98. [Constitution, When to Take Effect.] To the end that there may be no failure of justice, or danger to the state, by the alterations and amendments made in the constitution, the general court is hereby fully authorized and directed to fix the time when the alterations and amendments shall take effect, and make the necessary arrangements accordingly.

September 5, 1792

[Art.] 99. [Revision of Constitution Provided For.] (Repealed)

June 2, 1784. Question of calling a convention to be submitted to the people after seven years. Delegates to be elected in the same manner as representatives. Questions to be approved by two thirds of qualified voters present and voting thereon.

Amended 1792 detailing procedure for calling a convention.

Repealed 1980.

[Art.] 100. [Alternate Methods of Proposing Amendments.] Amendments to this constitution may be proposed by the general court or by a constitutional convention selected as herein provided.

(a) The senate and house of representatives, voting separately, may propose amendments by a three-fifths vote of the entire membership of each house at any session.

(b) The general court, by an affirmative vote of a majority of all members of both houses voting separately, may at any time submit the question "Shall there be a convention to amend or revise the constitution?" to the qualified voters of the state. If the question of holding a convention is not submitted to the people at some time during any period of ten years, it shall be submitted by the secretary of state at the general election in the tenth year following the last submission. If a majority of the qualified voters voting on the question of holding a convention approves it, delegates shall be chosen at the next regular general election, or at such earlier time as the legislature may provide, in the same manner and proportion as the representatives to the general court are chosen. The delegates so chosen shall convene at such time as the legislature may direct and may recess from time to time and make such rules for the conduct of their convention as they may determine.

(c) The constitutional convention may propose amendments by a three-fifths vote of the entire membership of the convention.

Each constitutional amendment proposed by the general court or by a constitutional convention shall be submitted to the voters by written ballot at the next biennial November election and shall become a part of the Constitution only after approval by two-thirds of the qualified voters present and voting on the subject in the towns, wards, and unincorporated places.

September 5, 1792. Question of calling a convention to be submitted every 7 years. Amended 1964 twice changing submission of question on calling a convention to every 10 years rather than 7 and providing that the general court could propose amendments.

Amended 1980 twice incorporating provisions of repealed Art. 99 and requiring all proposals be submitted at the next biennial November election.

[Art.] 101. [Enrollment of Constitution.] This form of government shall be enrolled on parchment, and deposited in the secretary's office, and be a part of the laws of the land and printed copies thereof shall be prefixed to the books containing the laws of this state, in all future editions thereof.

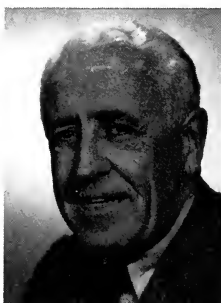

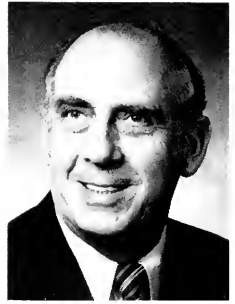

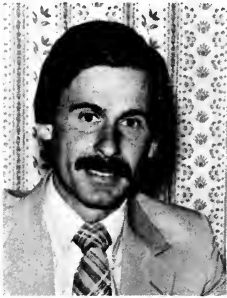

EXECUTIVE COUNCILORS

Article 60 of the second part of the constitution provides for an executive council of five members to advise and act with the governor. Before the constitution there was a council both under the temporary constitution of the Revolution and under the provincial government. Since 1913 councilors have been elected by plurality vote to represent population but previously to that they were elected by majority vote to represent property. In the colonial days councilors were appointed.

UNITED STATES SENATORS FROM NEW HAMPSHIRE

The following is a list of the senators from this state, and the years of service. One of the first senators, John Langdon, was chosen president pro tempore of the first national senate in 1789 and presided over that body until Vice-President John Adams qualified as president of the senate by virtue of his office as vice-president. Senator Langdon was again elected president in the second senate in 1792-3. Senator Samuel Livermore was elected president of the fourth senate in 1795-6 and of the sixth senate in 1799-1800. Senator Daniel Clark was elected president of the thirty-eighth senate in 1963-4. Senator Jacob H. Gallinger was elected president of the sixty-second senate in 1911-13. Senator George H. Moses was elected president pro tempore in 1925, re-elected 1927, 1929, 1931.

First election results showed Louis C. Wyman, Manchester, the winner — recount requested by John A. Durkin, Manchester, resulted in favor of Durkin — Appeal to the Ballot Law Commission resulted in favor of Wyman — appeal to the U.S. Senate by Durkin. U.S. Senate sent the appeal back to the State of New Hampshire, declaring a vacancy as of August 8, 1975 and under Chapter 1, Laws of 1975, a special election was held September 16, 1975, in which the final results were:

Wyman	113,007 votes

In this period, Norris Cotton, Lebanon, was appointed U.S. Senator from August 8, 1975 until Durkin was sworn into office by the U.S. Senate, September 18, 1975.

UNITED STATES HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Under the constitutional apportionment which provided for a house of representatives in congress, New Hampshire was allotted three seats. The national census of 1790 (first census) increased this to four, the second census of 1800 to five and the third census of 1810 to six seats. The census of 1830 reduced it to five, that of 1840 to four and that of 1850 to three. The census of 1870 reduced it to two, but the seat taken away was restored until the next census of 1880; since then the state has had two representatives.

**Special Session

DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Articles 67 and 68 of the second part of the constitution provide for a department of state with a secretary of state who is elected biennially by the legislature and a deputy secretary of state appointed by the secretary. In the colonial period there was a secretary appointed by the chief executive, but no deputy. During the revolutionary period and under the constitution of 1784 the secretary was chosen by the legislature and given authority to have several deputies, but in 1793 the constitution was changed to provide for a single deputy.

THE TREASURY

Article 67 of the second part of the constitution provides for a treasurer who is elected biennially by the legislature. In the colonial period the treasurer was appointed by the chief executive and frequently the same person was secretary of the province and treasurer. In 1891 the legislature created the office of deputy treasurer, and in 1983 the office of chief deputy treasurer was created.

THE SENATE

The senate began under the constitution and first met in 1784. There were at first twelve senators who represented the five counties that then existed, five senators from Rockingham county, two from Strafford, two from Hillsborough, two from Cheshire and one from Grafton. In 1793 senatorial districts were created to take the place of county representation and each district elected one senator. The elections during the early years took place in March and the legislature met in June annually.

The senatorial districting of 1793 was changed over in 1803 and several times subsequently. In 1878 the senate was doubled in size. In 1915 the senators were elected by plurality instead of majority vote. The following is a complete list of the senators from the beginning, showing the name and residence of each member of each senate, arranged in the order of districts from 1793, when the districts were created, and previous to that year, in the order of counties.

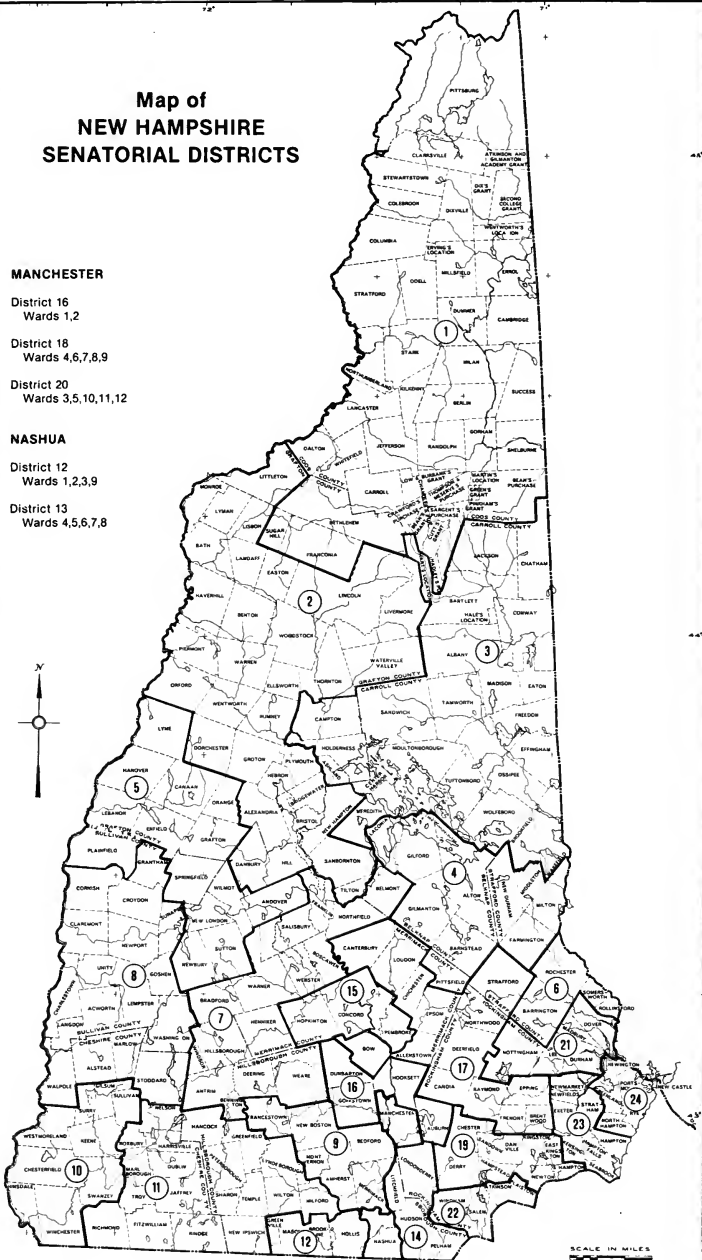
Map of NEW HAMPSHIRE SENATORIAL DISTRICTS

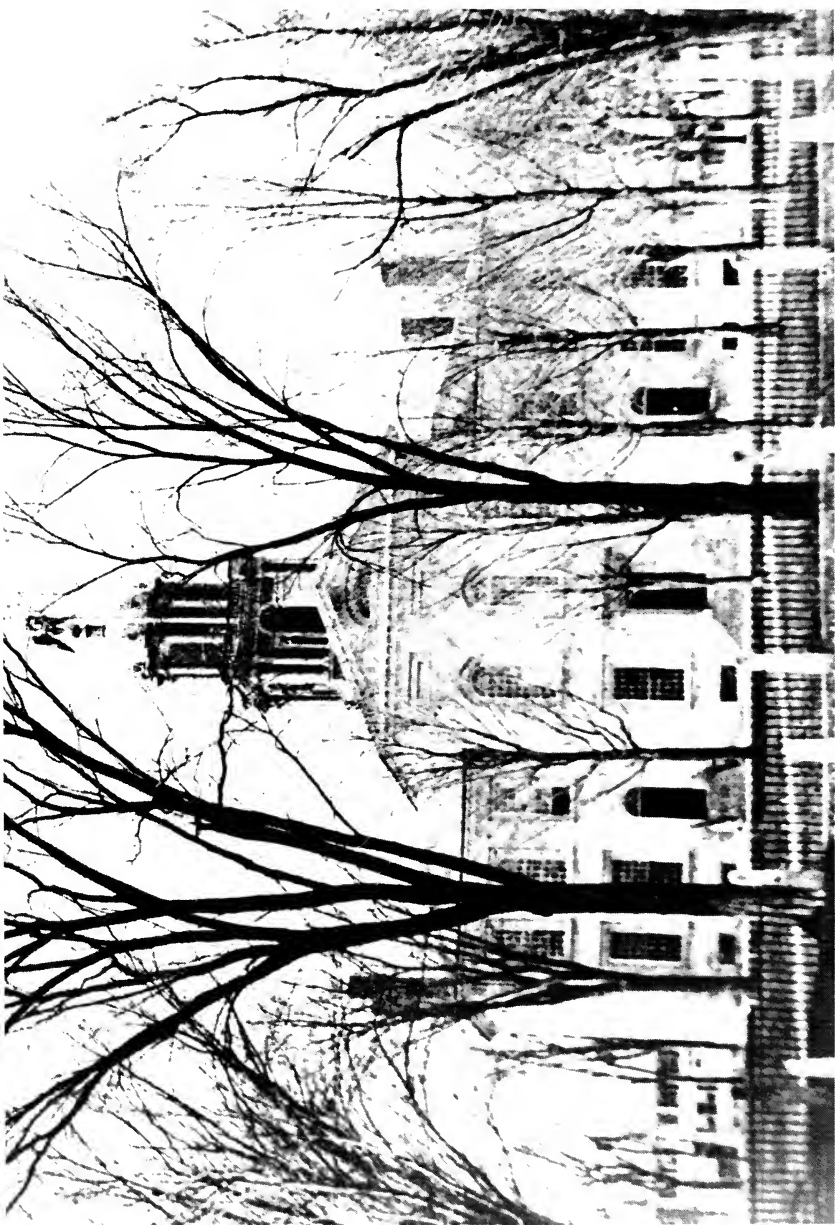

Each member shall also be qualified in the following manner: (a) well informed on fish and wildlife conservation and restoration; (b) dedicated to the conservation and protection of the state's fish and wildlife resources and of an environment conducive to the welfare of the same; (c) committed to a fish and game program providing reasonable balance between research, habitat management and law enforcement; (d) an active outdoorsman with a resident fishing or hunting license in at least five of the ten years preceding his appointment; (e) personal record free of convictions of violation of fish and game laws and regulations of this state or any other jurisdiction within five years preceding his appointment; (f) at least five years experience in one or a combination of the following fields; (1) Forestry; (2) Agriculture; (3) Management of wild lands; (4) Soils conservation; (5) Conservation of water resources; (6) Fish and game management or propagation; (7) Conservation engineering; (8) Conservation law; (9) Wildlife education; (10) Active membership in a conservation or sportsmen's organization in this state, (g) in the case of the coastal commission member, a general knowledge of all crustaceans and bivalves in coastal waters and salt water fishing in general. Upon nomination by the Governor, each nominee shall forthwith file with the secretary of state an affidavit, duly signed and sworn to, setting forth in detail how he complies with the qualifications cited above and affirming his belief in the aims of subparagraphs (b) and (c). Appointments shall not be confirmed by the Council until such affidavit has been examined by them and such appointee has been found qualified. Each member shall hold office for a **term of five years** and shall continue until his successor is appointed and qualified. Each year, at least two and not more than three, members shall be appointed. Vacancies in the commission shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as the original appointment. NEW HAMPSHIRE COURT SYSTEM

DISTRICT COURT

The comprehensive district court system, composed of forty-two judicial districts, was created by the General Court in 1963. Each judicial district consists of a justice and special justice nominated and confirmed by the Governor and Executive Council.

The district courts have exclusive original jurisdiction over juvenile cases and civil cases where the damages claimed are \$500 or less, and the title to real estate is not involved. The district courts have subject matter jurisdiction over small claims actions not involving the title to real estate in which the debt or damages, exclusive of interest and costs, does not exceed \$1,500; and landlord and tenant actions. The district courts have original and concurrent jurisdiction with the Superior Court over domestic violence cases and civil cases not involving the title to real estate in which the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$10,000 and a jury trial has not been requested.

Each district court has original jurisdiction subject to appeal for trial *de novo* in the Superior Court, of all crimes and offenses committed within the district in which the court is located and are punishable by a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or imprisonment not exceeding one year, or both.

MUNICIPAL COURT

The Municipal court system was established by the General Court in 1915 under RSA ch. 502, which provided that a municipal court composed of a justice and special justice must be established in every city and town with 2,000 inhabitants and in any town with less than 2,000 inhabitants by town vote.

The Legislature abolished the municipal court system in 1963 with the establishment of the district courts with the exception that by town vote the municipal court could be retained until a vacancy occurred in the office of the justice of the municipal court.

Of the eighty-four municipal courts that existed in 1960, only eight remain today.

The municipal courts civil subject matter jurisdiction is limited to small claims actions, not involving the title to real estate, in which the debt or damages, exclusive of interest and costs, does not exceed \$1,500; and landlord and tenant actions. The municipal courts criminal jurisdiction is limited to crimes and offenses committed within the town in which the court is located and punishable by imprisonment for not more than one year or a fine of \$1,000, or both.

SUPERIOR COURT

The New Hampshire trial court of general jurisdiction is the Superior Court. The Court has a chief justice and 24 associate justices who are nominated and confirmed by the Governor and Executive Council for a term of office which continues during good behavior until reaching the age of 70. It sits in each of the ten counties in New Hampshire and hears cases both at law and in equity. The Superior Court has jurisdiction over felony matters and hears violation and misdemeanor appeals *de novo* from the district and municipal courts.

The Superior Court has concurrent jurisdiction with the district court over domestic violence cases and civil cases where the damages claimed are more than \$500 and

do not exceed \$10,000. Although the district court has concurrent jurisdiction in matters between \$500 and \$10,000, all requests for jury trials must be heard in the Superior Court. Where the damages exceed \$10,000 or title to real estate is involved, the Superior Court has exclusive jurisdiction. Divorces, alimony, and support cases are also heard by the Superior Court.

PROBATE COURT

The Probate Court, a court of record, sits in each of the ten counties of New Hampshire. Each location of the court has one judge, nominated by the Governor and confirmed by the Executive Council, a register elected for a two-year term, and a deputy register appointed by the register. Part 2, Article 80, of the New Hampshire Constitution, grants the Probate Court authority in all matters relating to the probate of wills and granting of letters of administration. The Legislature has extended these powers to include conservatorships, guardianships, commitment of the mentally ill, termination of parental rights, adoptions, change of name, partition of real estate, custodianship of the property of minors, apportionment of federal estate taxes, license to sell real estate when a married couple is separated and there are justifiable grounds for divorce, waiver of certain marriage requirements, and general equity jurisdiction over an accounting. The Probate Court has concurrent jurisdiction with the Superior Court to interpret and construct and construct wills and testamentary trusts.

SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court is New Hampshire's court of last resort.

A 1966 amendment to Part 2 of the New Hampshire Constitution added Article 72-a designating the Supreme Court a constitutional court.

The Supreme Court consists of a chief justice and four associate justices, each of whom is nominated and confirmed by the Governor and Executive Council for a term of office which continues during good behavior until the age of seventy.

The Supreme Court has general superintendence of all courts of inferior jurisdiction to prevent and correct errors and abuses, including the authority to approve rules of court and prescribe and administer canons of ethics, exclusive authority to issue writs of error and original and concurrent authority with the Superior Court to issue writs of certiorari, mandamus, prohibition, habeas corpus, and all other writs and processes to other courts, corporations and individuals.

The Supreme Court is also empowered by the State Constitution to issue advisory opinions at the request of either House of the General Court or the Governor and Executive Council.

N.H. CONST. Pt. 2, Art. 73-A places the responsibility for the administration of all the courts in the State on the Supreme Court. The text of the article provides that the chief justice shall be administrative head of all courts and that with the concurrence of a majority of the Supreme Court justices, he shall make rules governing the administration of all courts in the State which shall have the force and effect of law.
