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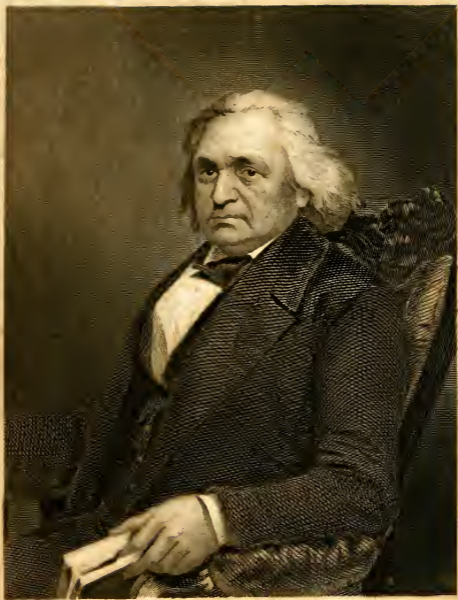


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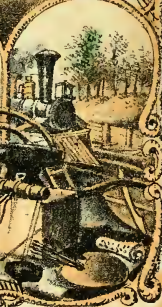

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AN ACT TO AMEND THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

PASSED APRIL 14, 1857, THREE-FIFTHS BEING PRESENT.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

SEC. 1. The Corporation now existing, and known by the name of "The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the city of New York," shall continue to be a body politic and corporate, in fact and in name, by the same name, and shall have perpetual succession, with all the grants, powers, and privileges heretofore had by "the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the city of New York."

§ 2. The legislative power of the said Corporation shall be vested in a Board of Aldermen and a Board of Councilmen, who together shall form the Common Council of the city of New York.

§ 3. The Board of Aldermen shall consist of one Alderman to be elected from each district in the city and county of New York, as hereinafter provided for. The members of the Board of Aldermen first elected under this act shall be classified as follows : The Aldermen from districts having an odd numerical designation shall hold such office for the term of one year, and those from districts having an even numerical designation shall hold such office for the term of two years. At all subsequent elections for Aldermen, they shall be elected for the term of two years.

§ 4. There shall be six Councilmen elected from each senatorial district in the city of New York, as the same now are, or may hereafter be, constituted, by general ticket, in each of said districts; and the persons so

elected from each of said senatorial districts shall together form the Board of Councilmen for the said city. The Councilmen shall be chosen for one year.

§ 5. No person shall be eligible to the office of Alderman or Councilman, who shall not, at the time of his election, be a resident of the district from which he is chosen.

§ 6. Each Board of the Common Council shall have power to direct a special election to be held, to supply the place of any member whose seat shall become vacant by death, removal from the city, resignation, or otherwise, and in either case the person elected to supply the vacancy shall hold his seat only for the residue of the term of office of his immediate predecessor.

§ 7. The Boards shall meet in separate chambers, and a majority of either shall be a quorum to do business. Each Board shall appoint a President from its own body, and shall choose its clerk and other officers, determine the rules of its own proceedings, and be the judge of the election returns and qualifications of its own members. Each Board shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and its doors shall be kept open, except when the public welfare shall require secrecy; and all resolutions and reports of Committees, which shall recommend any specific improvement, involving the appropriation of public moneys, or the taxing or assessing the citizens of the city, shall be published immediately after the adjournment of the Board, under the authority of the Board, in all the newspapers employed by the Corporation, and shall not be passed or adopted until after such notice has been published at least two days; and whenever a vote is taken in relation thereto, the ayes and noes shall be called, and published in the same manner.

§ 8. Each Board shall have the authority to compel the attendance of absent members, to punish its members for disorderly behaviour, and to expel a member with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to the Board; and the member so expelled shall, by such expulsion, forfeit all his rights and powers as an Alderman or Councilman, and no Alderman or Councilman shall be questioned in any other place for any speech or vote in either Board.

§ 9. The stated and occasional meetings of each Board of the Common Council shall be regulated by its own ordinances; and both Boards may meet on the same or on different days, as they may severally judge expedient.

§ 10. Any person holding office under this charter, who shall, during his term of office, accept, hold, or retain, any other civil office of honor, trust, or emolument, under the Government of the United States, or under this charter, or who shall, during his said term of office, receive any fees or emoluments, directed to be paid by any ordinance of the Common Council, except as is hereinafter provided, shall be deemed thereby to have vacated his office.

§ 11. Every legislative act of the Common Council shall be by ordinance, act, or resolution, which shall have passed the two Boards of Common Council, before it shall take effect, shall be presented, duly certified, to the Mayor of the city for his approval. If he approve, he shall sign it; if not, he shall return it within ten days thereafter, with his objections, to the Board in which it originated, or, if such Board be not then in session, at its next stated meeting. The Board to which it shall be returned shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and cause the same to be published in one or more of the daily newspapers of the city. But no ordinance, act, or resolution shall be valid, unless the same shall have received the assent of both Boards within the same year.

§ 12. The Board, to which such ordinance, act, or resolution shall have been so returned, shall, after the expiration of not less than ten days thereafter, proceed to reconsider the same. If, after such reconsideration, at least two-thirds of all the members elected to the Board shall agree to pass the same, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other Board, by which it shall be likewise reconsidered, and, if approved, by at least two-thirds of all the members elected to such Board, it shall take effect as an act or law of the Corporation. In all such cases, the votes of both Boards shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the passage of the ordinance reconsidered shall be entered on the journal of each Board, respectively.

§ 13. If the Mayor shall not return the ordinance so presented to him within the time above limited for that purpose, it shall take effect in the same manner as if he had approved of it.

§ 14. Any ordinance of the Common Council may originate in either Board, and, when it shall have passed one Board, may be rejected or amended by the other. But no ordinance shall be passed by either Board, except by the vote of a majority of all the members elected to such Board.

§ 15. Neither the Mayor nor Recorder of the city of New York shall be a member of the Common Council thereof.

§ 16. The executive power of the Corporation shall be vested in the Mayor and the Executive Departments.

§ 17. Whenever there shall be a vacancy in the office of Mayor, or whenever the Mayor shall be absent from the city, or be prevented by sickness, or any other cause, from attending to the duties of his office, or shall be removed, as hereinafter provided for, the President of the Board of Aldermen shall act as Mayor, and shall possess all the rights and powers of the Mayor, during the continuance of such vacancy, absence, or disability, and until the next charter election, in the case of a vacancy or removal from office.

§ 18. It shall be the duty of the Mayor—

1. To communicate to the Common Council, at least once a year, and oftener if he shall deem it expedient, a general statement of the

situation and condition of the city, in relation to its government, finances, and improvements.

2. To recommend for the adoption of the Common Council all such measures connected with the police, security, health, cleanliness, and ornament of the city, and the improvement of its government and finances, as he shall deem expedient.

3. To be vigilant and active in causing the ordinances of the city to be duly executed and enforced.

4. To exercise a constant supervision over the conduct and acts of all subordinate officers, and to receive and examine into all such complaints as may be preferred against any of them for violation or neglect of duty, and generally to perform all such duties as may be prescribed for him by the charter and city ordinances, and the laws of this State or the United States.

5. To appoint such clerks as may be authorized by the Common Council, and as may be required in his office, to aid him in the discharge of his official duties.

§ 19. The Mayor, Comptroller, and Counsel to the Corporation, shall each be elected by the electors of the city; the Mayor for the term of two years, the Counsel to the Corporation for the term of three years, and the Comptroller for the term of four years. The Comptroller shall be voted for on a separate ballot. The other heads of departments shall be appointed by the Mayor, with the advice and consent of the Board of Aldermen. The Board of Aldermen shall have power to confirm or reject all nominations of officers made by the Mayor; and whenever any person nominated by the Mayor shall be rejected by the Board of Aldermen, the Mayor shall immediately nominate another person.

§ 20. The Mayor, Comptroller, and Counsel to the Corporation, may each be removed by the Governor, for cause, in the manner provided by law in the case of sheriffs. The vacancy occasioned by the removal of the Comptroller, or Counsel to the Corporation, shall be filled by the Mayor, with the advice and consent of the Board of Aldermen, until it shall be supplied at the next annual election of charter officers.

§ 21. The other heads of the Executive Departments, except the officers of the Croton Aqueduct Board, shall hold their office for two years, and until the appointment of their successors. The Mayor shall have power to suspend, for cause, during any recess of the Common Council, and by and with the consent of the Board of Aldermen, to remove any of the heads of departments, except the Comptroller and the Counsel to the Corporation, which suspension, and the cause thereof, shall be communicated to the Common Council, if in session; and if not, then at the first meeting thereof. The Board of Aldermen shall have power, without the consent of the Mayor, by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected, to remove any of the heads of departments, for cause, other than the Comptroller and

Counsel to the Corporation. The heads of departments shall have power to appoint and remove the chiefs of bureaux and clerks in their respective departments; except that the Chamberlain shall be appointed by the Mayor, with the consent of the Board of Aldermen, and may be removed in the same manner with heads of departments. The chiefs of bureaux and clerks of departments and bureaux shall hold office during the same term enjoyed by the heads of departments, unless sooner removed. The Chief Engineer of the Fire Department shall be elected in the same manner as is now, or may hereafter be, prescribed by law. The number of clerks to the departments shall be as fixed by the Common Council, who shall also fix the terms of all offices created by them under authority of law.

§ 22. There shall be an executive department, which shall be denominated the "Department of Finance," which shall have control of all the fiscal concerns of the Corporation, and shall prescribe the forms of keeping and rendering all city accounts; and all accounts, rendered to or kept in the other departments of the City Government, shall be subject to the inspection and revision of the officers of this department. It shall settle and adjust all claims in favor of or against the Corporation, and all accounts in which the Corporation is concerned, either as debtor or creditor. The chief officer of this department shall be called the "Comptroller of the city of New York." There shall be a bureau in this department for the collection of the revenue accruing from rents and interest of bonds and mortgages, and for the collection of all revenues arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city; and for the performance of such other duties as may be directed by the Common Council; the chief officer of which shall be called the "Collector of the City Revenue." There shall also be a bureau in this department for the collection of taxes; the chief officer thereof shall be called the "Receiver of Taxes," who shall have all the powers and perform all the duties now prescribed by law for the Receiver of Taxes, and the office of Receiver of Taxes, as heretofore constituted, and the provisions of law relating to him, are hereby modified so as to conform to the provisions of this act. There shall also be a bureau in this department for the collection of arrears of taxes, arrears of assessments, and arrears of water rents, the chief officer of which shall be called the "Clerk of Arrears." There shall also be a bureau in this department for the reception of all moneys paid into the treasury of the city, and for the payment of moneys on the warrant drawn by the Comptroller and countersigned by the Mayor and Clerk of the Common Council; and the chief officer thereof shall be called the "Chamberlain of the city of New York." The Chamberlain shall keep books, showing the amounts paid on account of the several appropriations; and no warrants shall be paid on account of any appropriations after the amount authorized to be raised by tax for that specific purpose shall have been expended. There shall

be another bureau in the Department of Finance, to be called the "Auditing Bureau," and the chief officer thereof shall be the "Auditor of Accounts." It shall revise, audit, and settle all accounts in which the city is concerned as debtor or creditor; it shall keep an account of each claim for or against the Corporation, and of the sums allowed upon each, and certify the same, with the reasons for the allowance, to the Comptroller. The Comptroller shall report to the Common Council, once in ninety days, the name of every person in whose favor an account has been audited, with the decision of the Auditor upon the same, together with the final action of the Comptroller thereon. All moneys drawn from the city treasury shall be upon vouchers for the expenditure thereof, examined and allowed by the Auditor, and approved by the Comptroller, and filed in his office.

§ 23. There shall be an executive department, which shall be denominated the "Street Department," which shall have cognizance of opening, altering, regulating, grading, flagging, curbing, guttering, and lighting streets, roads, places, and avenues; of building, repairing, and lighting wharves and piers, the construction and repairing of public roads, the care of public buildings and places, and the filling up of sunken lots, under the ordinances of the Common Council. The chief officer thereof shall be called "Street Commissioner." There shall be a bureau in this department, the chief officer of which shall be called the "Superintendent of Wharves." There shall also be a bureau in this department, to be denominated the "Bureau of Repairs and Supplies," which shall have cognizance of all repairs and supplies to public buildings, lands and places, and of all other necessary repairs and supplies, not provided for in other departments; the chief officer thereof shall be a practical builder, and he shall be called the "Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies." There shall also be a bureau in this department, to be denominated the "Bureau of Lamps and Gas," the chief officer of which shall be called "Superintendent of Lamps and Gas." The Chief Engineer of the Fire Department shall have a bureau under the Street Department, and shall have charge of repairing fire engines and fire apparatus. There shall be a bureau in this department, the chief officer of which shall be called the "Superintendent of Roads." There shall be a bureau in this department for the collection of assessments, and the chief officer thereof shall be called the "Collector of Assessments." There shall be a bureau in this department for grading, flagging, curbing, and guttering streets, the chief officer of which shall be called the "Superintendent of Street Improvements."

§ 24. There shall continue to be an executive department, under the denomination of the "Croton Aqueduct Board," which shall have charge of the Croton Aqueduct, and all structures and property connected with the supply and distribution of Croton water in the city of New York, and the underground drainage of the same; and the public sewers of said

city, and permits for street vaults, and of paving, repaving, and repairing streets, and digging and constructing wells; and the collection of the revenues arising from the sale of the Croton water, with such other powers and duties as are, or may be, prescribed by law. The chief officers thereof shall be called the "President, Engineer, and Assistant Commissioner," who, together, shall form the Croton Aqueduct Board, and hold their offices for five years. There shall be a bureau in this department for the collection of the revenues derived from the sale of the water, and the chief officer thereof shall be called the "Water Registrar." There shall also be a bureau in this department for the laying of water pipes, and the construction and repairs of sewers, wells, and hydrants; paving, repaving, and repairing streets, the chief officer of which shall be called the "Water Purveyor."

§ 25. There shall continue to be an executive department known as the "Almshouse Department," which shall have cognizance of all matters relating to the Almshouse and prisons of said city; the chief officers thereof shall be called the "Governors of the Almshouse;" they shall take and hold their offices as provided by the act, entitled, "An act to provide for the Government of the Almshouse and Penitentiary in the city and county of New York;" and be charged with the duties, powers, and responsibilities prescribed by that act. All ordinary appropriations intended for the support of the government of the Almshouse Department, proposed by the Governors of the Almshouse, shall, before the same are finally made, be submitted by the Governors to a Board consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Board of Councilmen, Mayor, and Comptroller. If said Board approve of the appropriations, it shall immediately report the same to the Supervisors of the county of New York; if it shall disapprove of the same, it shall return them, with objections, to the Governors of the Almshouse, for their reconsideration; and in case the said Governors shall, upon a reconsideration, adhere, by a vote of two-thirds of all the Governors then in office, to the original appropriations, they shall return them to the said Board, whose duty it shall be to report to the Supervisors. The Board of Education shall also submit, in like manner, all appropriations required by it, and said appropriations shall be subject to all the provisions of this section, so far as the same may be applicable.

§ 26. There shall be an executive department known as the "Law Department," which shall have the charge of and conduct all the law business of the Corporation, and of the departments thereof, and all other law business in which the city shall be interested, when so ordered by the Corporation, and shall have the charge of and conduct the legal proceedings necessary in opening, widening, or altering streets, and draw the leases, deeds, and other papers connected with the Finance Department; and the chief officer thereof shall be called the "Counsel to the Corporation." There shall be a bureau in this department, the chief

officer of which shall be denominated the "Corporation Attorney." There shall be also a bureau in this department, the chief officer of which shall be called the "Public Administrator."

§ 27. There shall be an executive department known as the "City Inspector's Department," the chief officer of which shall be the "City Inspector," and shall have cognizance of all matters affecting the public health, pursuant to the ordinances of the Common Council, and the lawful requirements of the Commissioners of Health and of the Board of Health. There shall be a bureau in the City Inspector's Department to be called the "Bureau of Sanitary Inspection and Street Cleaning," under the control of an officer named the "Superintendent of Sanitary Inspection," and who shall render such services as by ordinance may attach to said bureau in cleaning the streets, and in the abatement and removal of nuisances detrimental to the public health in said city. There shall also be a bureau in this department to be known as the "Bureau of Records and Statistics," and which shall be under the direction of the Registrar of Records, and in which bureau shall be kept all records which may by law or ordinance be required to be kept in said department. The Coroners in and for the city and county of New York shall make return to the City Inspector of all inquisitions taken by them in the said city and county (excepting those charging homicide or felonious assault, which shall be filed with the Clerk of the Court of General Sessions). There shall also be a bureau in this department for the inspection, regulation, and management of the public markets, the chief officer of which shall be denominated "Superintendent of Markets." And it shall be the duty of the Croton Aqueduct Department, at all times, to permit the City Inspector to order the hydrants to be used for cleaning the streets, provided that such use shall not endanger the general supply of the Croton water, and shall be used under such regulations as the Croton Aqueduct Board may prescribe. The City Inspector shall, after the passage of this act, appoint such number of Inspectors and Sealers of Weights and Measures as now or hereafter may exist, and who shall succeed to all the powers, and perform the duties, and receive compensation as now by law prescribed, and shall hold office upon the same terms as chiefs of bureaux.

§ 28. It shall be lawful for the Common Council of said city to establish such other bureaux as they may deem the public interest may require, and to assign to them, and to the departments and bureaux herein created, such duties as they may direct, not inconsistent with this act, and the duties thereof shall be performed in accordance with the charter and laws and ordinances of the city; but no expense shall be incurred by any of the departments, or officers thereof, whether the object of expenditure shall have been ordered by the Common Council or not, unless an appropriation shall have been previously made covering such expense. And no member of the Common Council, head of department, chief of

bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, shall be directly or indirectly interested in any contract, work, or business, or the sale of any article, the expense, price, or consideration of which is paid from the city treasury, or by any assessment levied by any act or ordinance of the Common Council; nor in the purchase of any real estate, or other property, belonging to the Corporation, or which shall be sold for taxes or assessments, or by virtue of legal process at the suit of the said Corporation.

§ 29. The Mayor, or either Board of the Common Council, may at any time require the opinion, in writing, of the head of any department upon any subject relating to his department, or any information possessed by him in relation thereto. And every head of department shall report in writing to the Common Council, quarterly, the state of his department, with such suggestion in relation to the improvement thereof, and to the public business connected therewith, as he may deem advisable.

§ 30. It shall be the duty of the Common Council to provide for the accountability of all officers and other persons to whom the receipt or expenditure of the funds of the city shall be intrusted, by requiring from them sufficient security for the performance of their duties or trust, which security shall be annually renewed; but the security first taken shall remain in force until new security shall be given.

§ 31. Annual and occasional appropriations shall be made by proper ordinances of the Common Council for every branch and object of city expenditure; and no money shall be drawn from the city treasury except the same shall have been previously appropriated to the purpose for which it is drawn.

§ 32. Until the Common Council shall otherwise direct, the existing ordinances shall apply to the departments herein mentioned, so far as the same are applicable thereto and not inconsistent with this act.

§ 33. The Common Council shall not have authority to borrow any sums of money whatever on the credit of the Corporation, except in anticipation of the revenue of the year in which such loan shall be made, unless authorized by a special act of the Legislature.

§ 34. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller to publish, two months before the annual election of charter officers in each year, for the general information of the citizens of New York, a full and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Corporation during the year ending on the *the** first day of the month in which such publication is made; and in every such statement, the different sources of city revenue, and the amount received from each; the several appropriations made by the Common Council; the objects for which the same were made, and the amount of moneys expended under each; the moneys borrowed on the credit of the Corporation; the authority under which each loan was made, and

the terms on which the same was obtained, shall be clearly and particularly specified.

§ 35. No tax or penalty shall hereafter be imposed upon or collected of any person, nor license required for selling, or exposing for sale, upon his, her, or their own premises in said city, any wholesome article of food ; nor for selling such articles in such parts of the streets of said city as may be designated by the Common Council for that purpose.

§ 36. The Clerk of the Board of Aldermen shall, by virtue of his office, be Clerk of the Common Council, and shall perform all the duties heretofore performed by the Clerk of the Common Council, except such as shall be assigned to the Clerk of the Board of Councilmen ; and it shall be his duty to keep open for inspection, at all reasonable times, the records and minutes of the proceedings of the Common Council, except such as shall be specially ordered otherwise. The Clerk of each Board shall appoint, and may remove at pleasure, deputy clerks in his department, to the number authorized by ordinance. The Clerk of the Common Council shall keep the seal of the city ; and his signature shall be necessary to all leases, grants, and other documents, as under existing laws.

§ 37. It shall be the duty of the Clerks of the respective Boards to publish all ordinances and amendments of ordinances which shall be passed, and also the proceedings, in the newspapers which may be employed by the Corporation, except such parts as may require secrecy ; and whenever a vote shall be taken in either Board, upon the passage of an ordinance which shall contemplate any specific improvement, or involve the sale, disposition, or appropriation of public property, or the expenditure of public moneys or income therefrom, or lay any tax or assessment, such ordinance shall, before the same shall be sent to the other Board, and immediately after the adjournment of the Board at which the same shall have been passed, be published with the ayes and noes, and with the names of the persons voting for and against the same, in the newspapers employed by the Corporation, as part of the proceedings ; and no ordinance which shall have passed one Board shall be acted upon by the other Board on the same day, unless by unanimous consent, except in case of invasion, insurrection, riot, or pestilence.

§ 38. All contracts to be made or let by authority of the Common Council for work to be done or supplies to be furnished, and all sales of personal property in the custody of the several departments or bureaux, shall be made by the appropriate heads of departments, under such regulations as shall be established by ordinances of the Common Council. Whenever any work is necessary to be done to complete or perfect a particular job, or any supply is needful for any particular purpose, which work and job is to be undertaken, or supply furnished, for the Corporation, and the several parts of the said work or supply shall together involve the expenditure of more than two hundred and fifty dollars, the same shall be by contract, under such regulations concerning it as shall be

established by ordinance of the Common Council, unless, by a vote of three-fourths of the members elected to each Board, it shall be ordered otherwise; and all contracts shall be entered into by the appropriate heads of departments, and shall be founded on sealed bids or proposals made in compliance with public notice advertised in such of the newspapers of the city as may be employed by the Corporation for the purpose; said notice to be published for at least ten days in each of the daily newspapers so employed; and all such contracts, when given, shall be given to the lowest bidder, the terms of whose contract shall be settled by the Corporation Counsel, as an act of preliminary specification to the bid or proposal, and who shall give security for the faithful performance of his contract in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance; and the adequacy and sufficiency of this security shall, in addition to the justification and acknowledgment, be approved by the Comptroller. All bids or proposals shall be publicly opened by the officers advertising for the same, and in the presence of the Comptroller. If the lowest bidder shall neglect or refuse to accept the contract within forty-eight hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, it shall be re-advertised and relet as above provided. All property sold under the authority of the Common Council shall be sold at auction, after previous public notice, under the superintendence of the appropriate head of department. Every contract, when made and entered into as before provided for, shall be executed in duplicate, and shall be filed in the Department of Finance; a receipt for each payment made on account of, or in the satisfaction of, the same shall be indorsed on the said contract by the party receiving the warrant; which warrant shall be only given to the person interested in such contract, or his authorized representative. The proceeds of all sales, made under and by virtue of this section, shall be by the officer receiving the same immediately deposited with the City Chamberlain, and the account of sales, verified by the officer making the sale, shall be immediately filed in the office of the Comptroller. No expenditure for work or supplies, involving an amount for which no contract is required, shall be made, except the necessity therefor be certified to by the head of the appropriate department, and the expenditure be as authorized by the Common Council.

§ 39. Every person, elected or appointed to any office under the City Government, shall, on or before the first day of January next succeeding each election, or within five days after notice of such appointment, take and subscribe an oath or affirmation, faithfully to perform the duties of his office; which oath or affirmation shall be filed in the Mayor's office.

§ 40. Any officer of the city government, or person employed in its service, who shall willfully violate or evade any of the provisions of this charter, commit any fraud upon the city, or convert any of the public

property to his own use, or knowingly permit any other person so to convert it, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, in addition to the penalties imposed by law, shall forfeit his office, and be excluded forever after from receiving or holding any office under the city charter; and any person, who shall willfully swear falsely in an oath or affirmation required by this act, shall be guilty of perjury.

§ 41. All ferries, docks, piers, and slips shall be leased; and all leases and sales of public property and franchises (other than grants of land under water, to which the owners of the upland shall have a pre-emptive right), shall be made by public auction, and to the highest bidder, who will give adequate security. No lease hereafter given (except as the same may be required by covenants of the Corporation already existing), shall be for a longer period than ten years; and all ferry leases shall be revocable by the Common Council for mismanagement or neglect to provide adequate accommodations. All persons acquiring any ferry lease or other franchise or grant under the provisions of this act, shall be required to purchase, at a fair appraised valuation, the boats, buildings, and other property of the former lessees or grantees, actually necessary for the purposes of such ferry grant or franchise. Previous notice of all sales referred to in this section shall be given, under the direction of the Comptroller, in the newspapers employed by the Corporation, and for thirty days in each of the daily newspapers so employed.

§ 42. No money shall be expended by the Corporation for any celebration, procession, or entertainment of any kind, or on any occasion, unless by the votes of three-fourths of all the members elected to each Board of the Common Council.

§ 43. The Common Council are hereby authorized and directed to make all necessary arrangements for the conduct and regulation of all elections authorized under the provisions of this act, and in conformity, as far as may be, to the general election laws, except herein otherwise provided.

§ 44. No officer under this charter, except the Collector of City Revenue, Collector of Assessments, Clerk of Arrears, Counsel to the Corporation, or Inspector of Vessels, shall have or receive from the Corporation or City Treasurer any perquisites or any compensation or commission for his services, except a salary, except that the City Inspector may receive to his own use such portion of the fees, allowed for recording births and marriages, as are or may be prescribed by law. The salaries of all officers provided for by this act, or that may be created by the Common Council in pursuance of this act, shall be prescribed by ordinance to be passed by the Common Council, and approved as hereinafter provided, for the approval of all ordinances, for raising and appropriating the money or disposing of the property of the city; and any fees that now are, or hereafter may be provided for any officer under this charter, except as aforesaid, shall, on the receipt thereof, be paid by such officer into the city treasury. No member of the Common Council shall receive any compensation for his services as such member.

§ 45. All officers or other persons, to whom the receipts or expenditures of the city, or fees or funds payable into the city treasury, shall be intrusted, shall give sufficient security for the faithful performance of their duty in such form and amount as the Common Council may prescribe, which shall be annually renewed.

§ 46. No additional allowance, beyond the legal claim, under any contract with the Corporation, or for any services on its account, or in its employment, shall ever be allowed.

§ 47. No bid shall be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

§ 48. No Alderman shall hereafter sit or act as Judge of the Court of Oyer and Terminer, or in the Courts of General or Special Sessions in the city and county of New York; but this section shall not prevent his exercising the power of magistrate in the arrest, commitment, or bailing of offenders, excepting that he cannot let to bail or discharge a person arrested or committed by another magistrate. Courts of Oyer and Terminer, in and for the city and county of New York, may be held by a Justice of the Supreme Court and the Court of General Sessions in and for the said city and county, by the Recorder or City Judge of the said city and county; of Special Sessions therein, by any two Police Justices of said city; and, when either of the said Courts shall be held as aforesaid, all the powers and jurisdiction appertaining by law to each of said Courts shall be possessed and exercised by the officer or officers holding the same.

§ 49. The Grand Jury of the county may present any officer other than Mayor, Counsel to the Corporation, or Comptroller, created by or holding office under this charter, but only upon testimony from witnesses who are personally cognizant of the facts they testify to, and after the person so charged shall have had a reasonable opportunity to appear before said Grand Jury in person, in explanation thereof. This presentment may charge such officer with willful and fraudulent omission of duty, or commission of any official act prohibited by law. It shall be filed with the Clerk of the Court to which the presentment is made. A copy shall be served upon the officer presented as aforesaid, who shall be required to plead thereto as an indictment. If he admit the charges of the presentment so filed and served, the Court shall declare his office vacant. If he deny them, the said presentment shall be tried in the same manner as an indictment. If the jury convict him of any charge contained in the presentment, the Court shall then declare his office vacant. The Court shall order its declaration, if the person so presented shall be found guilty, to be entered on its Minutes, and a copy thereof filed with the Clerk of the Common Council, and thereupon the said office shall become vacant, and the person so convicted shall forever be disqualified from holding any office, not elective, under the city charter.

§ 50. The city of New York shall be divided into seventeen Aldermanic districts, as follows :

The first district shall consist of all that part of the city south of a line drawn from the Hudson river through the middle of Chambers street to the middle of Duane street, down the middle of Duane street to Rose street, down the middle of Rose street to Frankfort street, down the middle of Frankfort street to Pearl street, down the middle of Pearl street to Dover street, and down the middle of Dover street to the East river.

The second district shall be bounded southerly by first district, then up the middle of Broadway, from Chambers to Franklin street, down the centre of Franklin to Baxter street, up the centre of Baxter to Bayard street, through the centre of Bayard to Bowery, down the centre of Bowery to Catharine street, and down the centre of Catharine street to East river, and east by the river.

The third district shall be bounded southerly by the first district, then up the middle of Broadway from Chambers street to Spring street, through the middle of Spring street to Hudson river, and bounded west by the river.

The fourth district shall be bounded southerly by second district, then up the middle of Broadway from Franklin to Grand street, through the centre of Grand street to Clinton street, down the centre of Clinton street to East river, and east by the river.

The fifth district shall be bounded southerly by the third district, then by a line drawn up the middle of Broadway from Spring street to Fourth street; thence through the centre of Fourth street to Christopher street, and through the centre of Christopher street to Hudson river, and bounded west by the river.

The sixth district shall be bounded southerly by the fourth district, then by a line drawn up the middle of Broadway from Grand street to Houston street, then down the middle of Houston street to Clinton* street, and down the middle of Clinton street to Grand street.

The seventh district shall be bounded southerly by the fifth district, then by a line drawn up the middle of Broadway from Fourth to Fourteenth street, and through the centre of Fourteenth street to Hudson river, and west by the river.

The eighth district shall be bounded south and east by the East river, on the west and north by a line drawn from the river up the middle of Clinton street to Houston street, and down the middle of Houston street to said river.

The ninth district shall be bounded southerly by the seventh district, and then by a line drawn through the middle of Sixth avenue from Fourteenth street to Twenty-sixth street, and then through the centre of Twenty-sixth street to Hudson river, and west by the river.

The tenth district shall be bounded on the south by the sixth district ;

thence by a line drawn through the middle of Broadway, from Houston street to Fourteenth street, down the middle of Fourteenth street to avenue A, and down the middle of avenue A to Houston street.

The eleventh district shall be bounded southerly by the ninth district; thence by a line drawn through the middle of Sixth avenue, from Twenty-sixth street to Fortieth street, and through the centre of Fortieth street to Hudson river, and west by said river.

The twelfth district shall be bounded southerly by the middle of Houston street; thence by a line drawn up the middle of avenue A, from Houston street to Fourteenth street, and down the middle of Fourteenth street to the East river, and east by said river.

The thirteenth district shall be formed of the territory now known as the Twenty-second Ward.

The fourteenth district shall be bounded by a line commencing at the intersection of Fourteenth street with the East river; thence through the centre of Fourteenth street to the Sixth avenue; thence through the centre of Sixth avenue to Twenty-sixth street; thence through the centre of Twenty-sixth street to the East river, and easterly by said river.

The fifteenth district shall be bounded southerly by the Fourteenth district; thence through the centre of Sixth avenue, from Twenty-sixth street to Fortieth street; thence through the centre of Fortieth street to the East river, and easterly by said river.

The sixteenth district shall comprehend the territory now known as the Nineteenth Ward.

The seventeenth district shall comprehend the territory now known as the Twelfth Ward, being that portion of the city of New York north of the centre of Eighty-sixth street.

§ 51. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Councilmen, provided for in this act, shall be elected at the first election for charter officers, to be held after the passage hereof, which election shall take place on the first Tuesday of December, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven; all persons who shall have been elected under former laws, regulating or affecting the election of charter officers, and shall be in office at the time of the passage of this act, shall continue in office until the officers elected under this act shall take office, and no longer, except that the offices of Commissioner of Repairs and Supplies, and of Commissioner of Streets and Lamps, are hereby abolished, and except that the persons now filling the several offices of Comptroller, Counsel to the Corporation, Street Commissioner, and City Inspector, and the officers of the Croton Aqueduct Department, shall continue in office until the expiration of their several terms, and shall not be removed from office during such continuance, except for the cause and in the manner provided for in sections 20 and 49 of this act, and all other charter officers, and all school officers, and each Governor of the Almshouse, whose terms of office may expire with the present municipal year, shall be also elected on the day before provided for by this section.

§ 52. Every person, who shall promise, offer, or give, or cause, or aid or abet, in causing to be promised, offered, or given, or furnish, or agree to furnish, in whole or in part, to be promised, offered, or given to any member of the Common Council, or any officer of the Corporation, after his election as such member, or before, or after he shall have qualified and taken his seat, any moneys, goods, right in action, or other property, or anything of value, or any pecuniary advantage, present and prospective, with intent to influence his vote, opinion, judgment, or action, on any question, matter, cause, or proceeding, which may be then pending, or may, by law, be brought before him, in his official capacity, shall, upon conviction, be imprisoned in a penitentiary for a term not exceeding two years, or shall be fined not exceeding five thousand dollars, or both, in the discretion of the Court. Every officer in this section enumerated, who shall accept any such gift, or promise, or undertaking, to make the same, under any agreement or undertaking, that his vote, opinion, judgment or action, shall be influenced thereby, or shall be given in any particular manner, or upon any particular side of any question, matter, cause, or proceeding then pending, or which may by law be brought before him, in his official capacity, shall, upon conviction, be disqualified from holding any public office, trust, or appointment, under the charter of the city of New York, and shall forfeit his office, and shall be punished by imprisonment, in the penitentiary, not exceeding two years, or by a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars, or both, in the discretion of the Court. Every person offending against either of the provisions of this section shall be a competent witness against any other person offending in the same transaction, and may be compelled to appear and give evidence before any grand jury, or in any court, in the same manner as other persons; but the testimony so given shall not be used in any prosecution or proceeding, civil or criminal, against the person so testifying.

§ 53. The annual election for charter officers, school officers, and Governors of the Almshouse, after the year eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the first Tuesday in December, and the officers elected at the first election, as hereinbefore provided, and in each year thereafter, shall take office on the first Monday of January next succeeding. All the provisions of law now in force in regard to the notification, duration, conduct of election, and canvassing of votes at general elections, shall apply to the first election provided for herein, and to each annual election of charter officers, except that the returns of all elections provided for by this act shall be filed by the district canvassers in the several districts, with the Clerk of the Common Council, within twenty-four hours after the polls are closed, and the said returns shall be canvassed by the Board of Aldermen, sitting as a Board of City Canvassers. The Clerk of the Common Council shall be Clerk to the said Board of City Canvassers; and the said Board shall meet on the Thursday succeeding such election,

and shall, within ten days thereafter, wholly complete such canvass, and file, within the same time, duplicate statements of the result in the respective offices of the Clerk of the Common Council and County Clerk. The Clerk of the Common Council, within five days succeeding the filing of the said statement, shall give to each person declared elected a certificate thereof.

§ 54. The act to amend the charter of the city of New York, passed April seventh, eighteen hundred and thirty, and the act to amend the charter of the city of New York, passed April second, eighteen hundred and forty-nine, and the act to amend an act entitled an act to amend the charter of the city of New York, passed April second, eighteen hundred and forty-nine, passed July eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-one; and the act further to amend the charter of the city of New York, passed April twelfth, eighteen hundred and fifty-three; and the act supplementary to an act entitled an act further to amend the charter of the city of New York, passed April twelfth, eighteen hundred and fifty-three, passed June fourteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-three, are hereby repealed; and all laws inconsistent with this act are also hereby repealed; but the charters of the city of New York, known as the Dongan and Montgomerie charters, so far as the same, or either of them, are now in force, shall continue and remain in full force, and shall not be construed as repealed, modified, or in any manner affected thereby. This section shall not prejudice or affect any right accrued, or proceeding commenced, before this act takes effect.

§ 55. This act shall take effect on the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

AN ACT

RELATING TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE CITY NEW YORK.

PASSED APRIL 15, 1837, THREE-FIFTHS BEING PRESENT.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

SEC. 1. The Mayor and Recorder of the city of New York shall cease to be members of the Board of Supervisors of the county of New York. There shall be voted for, at each and every charter election hereafter to be held in the city of New York, twelve Supervisors, who shall, together, compose the Board of Supervisors of the county of New York, and hold office for one year, from the first of January in each and every year hereafter. They shall be voted for upon a separate and general ticket, but only six names for Supervisors shall be upon one ticket. The six persons receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected by the Board of City Canvassers, who shall canvass the votes in the same manner as they are required to canvass votes for charter officers; and all the provisions of law, relating to election of charter officers, are hereby applied to the election of Supervisors. On or before the twenty-fourth day of December, in each and every year succeeding the charter election, the Mayor of the city shall appoint, as Supervisors, the six persons receiving severally the highest number of votes next to the votes received by the six Supervisors having the return of the Board of City Canvassers.

§ 2. The vote of a majority of all the members elected to the Board of Supervisors shall be necessary to pass any act, ordinance, or resolution appropriating money; and every act, ordinance, or resolution, which shall have passed the Board of Supervisors, except such as levy any tax or taxes, before it shall take effect, shall be presented, duly certified, to the Mayor of the city of New York, for his approval. If he approve, he shall sign it; if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the Board, within ten days thereafter, or, if said Board be not in session, at its next meeting after that period. The Board shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and cause the same to be published in one or more of the daily newspapers of the city of New York.

§ 3. The Board shall, after the expiration of not less than ten days thereafter proceed to reconsider the same; and such act, resolution, or ordinance, if approved by a majority of all the members elected to the Board shall thereupon take effect. In all such cases, the votes of the Board shall be determined by the ayes and noes, and the names of the persons voting for and against its passage shall be entered on the journal of the Board.

§ 4. If the Mayor shall not return any act, resolution, or ordinance so

presented to him, within the time above limited for that purpose, it shall take effect in the same manner as if he had signed it.

§ 5. No money shall be drawn from the treasury, except the same shall have been previously appropriated to the purpose for which it is drawn; and no expense shall be incurred, whether it shall have been ordered by the Board or not, unless an appropriation of money, then in the treasury, sufficient to cover such expense, shall have been previously made.

§ 6. The Finance Department of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the city of New York, and its officers, shall have the like power, and perform the like duties, in regard to the fiscal concerns of said Board, as they possess in regard to the local concerns of the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty. All moneys drawn from the treasury, by authority of the Board of Supervisors, shall be upon vouchers for the expenditure thereof, examined and allowed by the Auditor, and approved by the Comptroller; and no such moneys shall be drawn therefrom except on a warrant drawn by the Comptroller, and countersigned by the Mayor and Clerk of the Board, and no other warrant shall be necessary for such purpose.

§ 7. No allowance or payment, beyond legal claims, shall ever be allowed by the Board.

§ 8. The members of the Board of Supervisors, when attending as members of the Board of County Canvassers, shall not receive compensation for a greater period than ten days, for canvassing the votes of any election; nor shall any person receive any compensation for services as a Supervisor of the said county of New York.

§ 9. The Counsel to the Corporation of the city of New York shall be the legal adviser of the said Board of Supervisors, and shall receive such compensation for his services as shall be fixed by said Board, not exceeding the sum of two thousand dollars per annum.

§ 10. This act shall take effect immediately.

A N A C T

TO AMEND AN ACT, ENTITLED, "AN ACT RELATING TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF NEW YORK," PASSED APRIL FIFTEENTH, EIGHTEEN HUNDRED AND FIFTY-SEVEN.

PASSED APRIL 17, 1858, THREE-FIFTHS BEING PRESENT.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

SEC. 1. The first section of the act, entitled, "An act relating to the Board of Supervisors of the county of New York," passed April fifteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, is hereby amended to read as follows :

The Mayor and Recorder of the city of New York shall cease to be members of the Board of Supervisors of the county of New York; the members now composing the said Board of Supervisors shall continue to be members thereof, as hereinafter mentioned; on or before the first Monday of May, eighteen hundred and fifty-eight, the present members of said Board shall meet at their usual place of meeting in said county, and the six members thereof, elected by the votes of the electors, shall, then and there, in the presence of the Mayor of said city, classify themselves, respectively, by lot, into six classes, and the six members of said Board appointed in December, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, by the Mayor of said city, shall also classify themselves, respectively, at the same time and place, and in the same presence and manner, into six classes; the term of office of the two members of the first class shall expire on the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and fifty-eight; the term of office of the two members of the second class shall expire on the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and fifty-nine; the term of office of the two members of the third class shall expire on the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and sixty; the term of office of the two members of the fourth class shall expire on the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and sixty-one; the term of office of the two members of the fifth class shall expire on the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and sixty-two; and the term of office of the two members of the sixth class shall expire on the thirty-first day of December, eighteen hundred and sixty-three. At the general election to be held in the city of New York in this year, and at every succeeding general election, two Supervisors shall be voted for upon a separate general ticket, but only one name for Supervisor shall be on any one ticket, and any ticket having thereon more than one name for Supervisor, shall not be counted. The person having the highest number of votes shall be declared elected by the Board of County Canvassers, who shall canvass the votes, and all the provisions of law relating to the election of county officers in said county are hereby applied to the election of Supervisors.

On or before the fourth Wednesday of December, in each and every year, the Mayor of said city shall appoint, as a Supervisor, the person who received the highest number of votes for Supervisor, next to the votes received by the Supervisor having the return of the Board of County Canvassers, as having been elected at the election last held.

§ 2. The second section of the said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows :

The vote of seven of the members of the said Board of Supervisors in the affirmative, or in favor thereof, shall be necessary to pass any ordinance or resolution appropriating money, or to fill any vacancy in said Board, or to do any act or thing, except to adjourn from day to day, and every act, ordinance, or resolution, which shall have passed the said Board of Supervisors, except such as levy any special tax or taxes, or fill a vacancy in said Board, before it shall take effect, shall be presented, duly certified, to the Mayor of the city of New York, for his approval; if he approve, he shall sign it; if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the Board, within ten days thereafter, or, if said Board be not in session, at its next meeting after that period; the Board shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and cause the same to be published in one or more of the daily papers of the city of New York.

§ 3. In case of any vacancy in said Board by death, resignation, or otherwise, the same shall be supplied by the remaining members thereof, and the person thus appointed shall hold his office as a member of said Board for the unexpired term of the member thereof in whose place he shall have been appointed.

§ 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

RULES AND ORDERS

OF THE

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

PASSED JANUARY 4, 1864.

I. UPON the appearance of a quorum, the President, or, in his absence, the President *pro tem.*, shall take the chair, as President, and the members be called to order.

II. In case the President shall not attend, the Clerk, on the appearance of a quorum, shall call the Board to order, when a President *pro tem.* shall be appointed by the Board, for that meeting, or until the appearance of the President.

III. After the reading and approving of the Minutes, the order of business, which shall not in any case be departed from, except by the consent of a majority of the members present voting therefor, shall be as follows :

1. Presentation of Petitions.
2. Motions or Resolutions.
3. Reports of Committees.
4. Communications and Reports from the Department or Corporation officers.
5. Unfinished Business.
6. Special Orders of the Day.
7. Messages, Papers from the Mayor, or the Board of Councilmen, may be considered at any time.

IV. Whenever the President may wish to leave the Chair, he shall have power to substitute a member in his place, provided that substitution shall not continue beyond the day on which it is made.

V. The President, in all cases, has the right of voting ; and when the Board shall be equally divided, including his vote, the question shall be lost.

VI. Whenever it shall be moved or carried, that the Board go into Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair, and shall appoint a Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, who shall report the proceedings of the Committee. The Rules of the Board shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole, except the rules respecting a call for the ayes and noes, and limiting the time for speaking.

VII. On motion, in Committee, to rise and report, the question shall be decided without debate.

VIII. No amendment shall be allowed in the Board on any question which has been decided in Committee of the Whole, unless by the consent of two-thirds of the members present.

IX. If the question in debate contains several points, any member may have the same divided.

X. A motion to refer or lay on the table, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendments to the main question.

XI. When a question has been once put and decided, it shall be in order for any member who voted in the majority, to move for the reconsideration thereof; but no motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be made after the ordinance, resolution, or act, shall have gone out of the possession of the Board; and no motion of reconsideration shall be taken more than once.

XII. No act, resolution, or ordinance shall be sent from this Board to the other Board, for concurrence, on the same day on which it passes this Board, unless upon the consent of a majority of the members present, first had and obtained; nor shall any ordinance sent to this Board from the other Board, for concurrence, be acted upon the same day it passed the other Board, unless by consent of a majority of the members present, except in cases of invasion, insurrection, or pestilence.

XIII. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to publish all ordinances and amendments of ordinances, which shall be passed, and also the proceedings, in the newspapers employed by the Corporation, except such parts as may require secrecy; and whenever a vote shall be taken upon the passage of a resolution or ordinance which shall contemplate any specific improvement, or involve the sale, disposition, or appropriation, of public property, or lay any tax, or assessment, he shall, before the same is sent to the other Board, and immediately after the adjournment, cause the same to be published, with the ayes and noes, with the names of the persons voting for and against the same, in at least two newspapers, as a part of the proceedings, and shall thereafter certify, and send to the other Board, every act, ordinance, and resolution which has originated in and passed this Board, and which requires a concurrent vote of the Board of Councilmen; and to deliver to the Mayor, certified in like manner, all such ordinances and resolutions which shall have been received from the Board of Councilmen, and concurred in by this Board, and which are required to be submitted to him for approval, and shall certify to the other Board the proceedings of this Board in reference to all acts or business originating with the other Board.

XIV. The President shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board.

XV. Every member, previous to his speaking, shall rise from his seat, and address himself to the President.

XVI. When two or more members shall rise at once, the President shall name the member who is first to speak.

XVII. No person shall speak more than twice to the same question, without leave of the Board; nor more than once, until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

XVIII. While a member is speaking, no member shall entertain any private discourse, or pass between him and the Chair.

XIX. No question on a motion shall be debated or put, unless the same be seconded. When a motion is seconded, it shall be stated by the President before debate; and every such motion shall be reduced to writing, if any member desire it.

XX. After a motion is stated by the President, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Board; but it may be withdrawn at any time by the mover before decision or amendment.

XXI. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, unless:

1. To amend it.
2. To commit it.
3. To lay on the table.
4. To postpone it.
5. For the previous question.
6. To adjourn.

XXII. A motion to lay on the table shall be decided without amendment or debate, and a motion to commit, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendments and debate on the main question.

XXIII. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate.

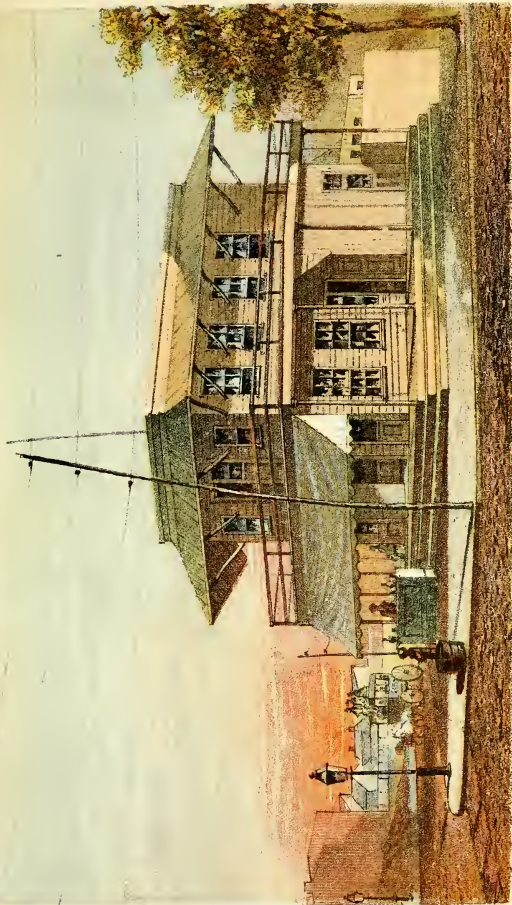
XXIV. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendments and debate, and shall be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?"

XXV. Every member, who shall be present when a question is put, shall vote for or against the same, unless the Board shall excuse him, unless he be immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote; but no member shall be permitted to vote upon a question, when a division is called, unless present when his name is called in its regular order.

XXVI. A member called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain; and the Board, if appealed to, shall decide on the case, but without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to.

XXVII. All questions shall be put in the order they are moved, except, in filling up blanks, the longest time and the largest sum shall be first put.

XXVIII. The ayes and noes shall be taken at the request of a member, and the name of the member calling for the division shall be entered on the Minutes.

XXIX. Upon a division of the Board, the names of those who vote for, and those who vote against, the question, shall be entered upon the Minutes.

XXX. All appointments of officers shall be by ballot, unless dispensed with by the consent of the Board, and a majority of the whole number present shall be necessary to constitute a choice.

XXXI. No member shall absent himself without permission from the President.

XXXII. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

XXXIII. Committees, appointed to report on any subject referred to them by the Board, shall report the facts in relation to the subject referred, with their opinion thereon, in writing, and shall attach thereto all resolutions, petitions, remonstrances, and other papers relative to the matter referred; and no report shall be received, except the same be signed by a majority of the Committee; but nothing contained in this rule shall prevent a minority of any Committee from submitting a report. And no report shall be printed, unless by the express direction of the Board, specifying the number of copies to be printed.

XXXIV. Whenever the doors are directed to be closed, all persons, excepting the members and the clerk, shall retire.

XXXV. Every petition, remonstrance, or other written application, intended to be presented to the Common Council, may be delivered to the President, or any member of the Board, and the member to whom it shall be given shall examine the same, and indorse thereon the name of the applicant, and the substance of such application, and sign his name thereto; which indorsement only shall be read by the President, unless a member shall require the reading of the paper, in which case the whole shall be read.

XXXVI. STANDING COMMITTEES, consisting of three members each, shall be appointed on the following subjects:

1. Almshouse Department.
2. Arts and Sciences.
3. Assessments.
4. Cleaning Streets.
5. Ferries.
6. Finance.
7. Fire Department.
8. Joint Committee on Accounts.
9. Joint Committee on Croton Aqueduct.
10. Lamps and Gas.
11. Lands and Places.
12. Law Department.
13. Markets.

14. National Affairs.
15. Ordinances.
16. Printing and Stationery.
17. Police.
18. Public Health.
19. Public Buildings on Blackwell's Island, Randall's Island, and Bellevue Establishment.
20. Repairs and Supplies.
21. Roads.
22. Salaries and Offices.
23. Sewers.
24. Streets.
25. Taxes.
26. Wharves, Piers, and Slips.
27. Railroads.

XXXVII. The President shall be, *ex officio*, a member of all Committees ; but a majority of such Committee, exclusive of the President, shall be sufficient to agree upon a report.

XXXVIII. The members of the Board shall not leave their places, on adjournment, until the President leaves the Chair.

XXXIX. No person shall be permitted on the floor of the chamber of this Board, inside the railing, other than members or ex-members of the Common Council, his Honor the Mayor, the heads of the several departments of the City Government, and the reporters of the press, unless by written permission, obtained from a member of the Board, to be countersigned by the President ; nor shall any such permission extend beyond the day for which it is given. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms rigidly to enforce the Rule.

XL. None of the foregoing Rules and Orders shall be amended or repealed, except by the vote of at least a quorum.

RULES OF ORDER
OF THE
BOARD OF COUNCILMEN.
1864.

I. Upon the appearance of thirteen members, the Board shall be called to order by the President, or, if he be absent, by the Clerk, and a President *pro tem.* appointed by the Board, for that meeting, or until the President appear.

II. After reading and approving the Minutes, the order of business, which shall not be departed from, except by the consent of thirteen members, shall be as follows :

1. Presentation of Petitions.
2. Motions and resolutions for which the Senatorial Districts shall be called in numerical order.
3. Reports of Committees.
4. Motions to take up and consider—
 1. Resolutions.
 2. Reports of previous meetings.
5. Communications and Reports from the Departments.
6. Special Orders of the day.
7. General Orders.
8. Messages from the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen may be received at any time.
9. Unfinished business may be resumed at any time, under the same order upon which it was taken.

III. Every petition, remonstrance, and other paper presented to the Board, shall be presented by a member in his place ; and, before presenting the same, the person presenting shall indorse thereon the substance thereof, and sign his name thereto.

IV. No motion or resolution shall be debated or put unless it be seconded, or until it be stated by the President ; and every such motion shall be reduced to writing, if any member desire it.

V. When the Board shall be equally divided, including the vote of the President, the question shall be lost.

VI. A motion or resolution may be withdrawn at any time, before action had on it, by consent of the Board.

VII. All questions relating to the priority of business shall be decided by the President, without debate.

VIII. The President shall preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board.

IX. Whenever the President shall wish to leave the Chair, he may substitute a member in his place; but such substitution shall not continue beyond the day on which it is made.

X. The President, or, in his absence, the Clerk, shall call special meetings of the Board, whenever the interests of the city may require it, at the written request of thirteen members, notice in writing to be sent to each member.

XI. In forming a Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair, and appoint a chairman to preside. The rules of the Board shall be observed in such Committee, excepting the rule respecting the ayes and naves, the times of speaking, and the previous question, and a motion to pass over shall be decided without debate.

XII. On motion, in Committee, to rise and report, the question shall be decided without debate.

XIII. After the report of the Committee, such amendments only shall be in order as were offered and acted on in Committee.

XIV. When the question in debate contains several distinct propositions, any member may have the same divided.

XV. All questions shall be put in the order they are moved, except those of privilege. When blanks are under consideration as to time and amounts, the longest time and largest amount shall be put first.

XVI. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be entertained, unless,

1. To adjourn.
2. To lay on the table.
3. For the previous question.
4. To postpone for a certain day.
5. To refer.
6. To postpone indefinitely.
7. To amend.

Which motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand.

A call of the Board may be ordered at any time.

XVII. When a resolution shall be offered, or a motion made to refer any subject, and different Committees shall be proposed, the question shall be taken in the following order:

1. A Standing Committee.
2. A Select Committee.
3. A Committee of the Whole.

XVIII. A motion to refer, or lay on the table, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment or debate of the main question.

A motion to postpone, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment to the main question.

A motion to adjourn shall always be in order; and that and a mo-

tion for a call of the Board shall be decided without debate ; but no motion whatever, except to permit a member to explain his vote, shall be entertained by the Chair after the ayes and nays shall have been ordered, until the result of the vote shall have been announced by the Chair.

XIX. No act, resolution, or ordinance, sent from the Board of Aldermen, shall be called up for final passage on the same day it is presented to this Board, unless by consent of thirteen members ; nor shall it be acted upon on the same day it shall have passed the other Board, unless by unanimous consent, except in case of invasion, insurrection, pestilence, or in such cases as do not conflict with the charter.

XX. It shall be the duty of the Clerk, to publish all ordinances and amendments of ordinances which shall be passed, and also the proceedings, in the newspapers employed by the Corporation, except such parts as may require secrecy ; and whenever a vote shall be taken upon the passage of a resolution or ordinance which shall contemplate any specific improvements, or involve the sale, disposition, or appropriation of public property, or the expenditure of public money, or the income therefrom, or lay any tax or assessment, he shall, before the same is sent to the other Board, and immediately after the adjournment, cause the same to be published, with the ayes and nays, with the names of the persons voting for and against the same, in at least two newspapers, as a part of the proceedings, and shall thereafter certify and send to the other Board every act, resolution, and ordinance which has originated and passed this Board, and which requires a concurrent vote of the Board of Aldermen, and shall deliver to the Mayor, certified in like manner, all such acts, ordinances, and resolutions which shall have been received from the Board of Aldermen, and concurred in by this Board, and which are required to be submitted to him for his approval ; and shall certify to the other Board the proceedings of this Board, in reference to all acts or business originating in the other Board.

XXI. It shall also be the duty of the Clerk to make and keep a list of all messages, acts, resolutions, ordinances, and reports, not finally or specially disposed of, in order of priority, which list shall be the " General Orders."

XXII. Every member, who shall be present when a question is put, shall vote thereon, unless the Board shall excuse him, or unless he be immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote. But no member, on taking of the ayes and nays, shall be permitted to vote, unless present when his name is called, in regular order, except by consent of a majority of the members present.

XXIII. Any member who shall have voted with the majority may move for a reconsideration, provided he do so at the time of the next meeting, and while the act, resolution, or ordinance is in possession of the Board ;

such motion, having been once put and lost, shall not be renewed, except by the consent of thirteen members.

XXIV. Every member, previous to speaking, shall rise in his place, and address the President.

XXV. When two or more members rise at the same time, the President shall name the member who is first to speak.

XXVI. No person shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the Board, nor more than once until every member, choosing to speak, shall have spoken.

XXVII. A member called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain; and the Board, if appealed to, shall at once decide on the case without debate. If there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to.

XXVIII. The previous question shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; and, until decided, shall preclude all amendment or debate, and must be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?"

XXIX. When the previous question shall have been ordered, and there shall be amendments pending, the question shall first be taken upon such amendments, in their order, and then upon the main question, without further debate or amendment.

XXX. On taking a vote by ayes and nays, in the cases required by law, as well as when required by three members, the names of those who vote for and those who vote against the question shall be so entered on the Minutes; and when so taken, on the call of a member, the name of such member, and the fact, shall also be entered on the Minutes.

XXXI. The following officers shall be elected by ballot, viz.: President, Clerk, Sergeant-at-Arms, and Door-keeper.

XXXII. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

XXXIII. The **STANDING COMMITTEES** shall be as follows:

3. Assessments.
4. Belgian Pavement.
5. Cleaning Streets.
6. Croton Aqueduct Department.

Each of which shall consist of three members, except the Committees on Railroads, Repairs and Supplies, and National Affairs, which shall consist of five members each.

XXXIV. The President shall be, *ex officio*, a member of all Committees; but a majority of the other members shall be sufficient to agree upon a report.

XXXV. Committees shall inquire into the matters referred to them, and report, in writing, the facts in relation thereto, with their opinions thereon; and attach to such report all resolutions, petitions, remonstrances, and other papers relating to the matters referred; but no report shall be made without consent first had, unless signed by a majority of the Committee; nor shall any matter reported on be taken up, for final action, the same day on which it is reported, unless by consent of thirteen members. No report shall be printed, unless by the express direction of the Board, specifying the number of copies to be printed.

XXXVI. No member shall absent himself without permission of the President; nor, on adjournment, leave his place until the President leaves the Chair.

XXXVII. Whenever the doors are directed to be closed, all persons, excepting the members and the Clerk, shall retire.

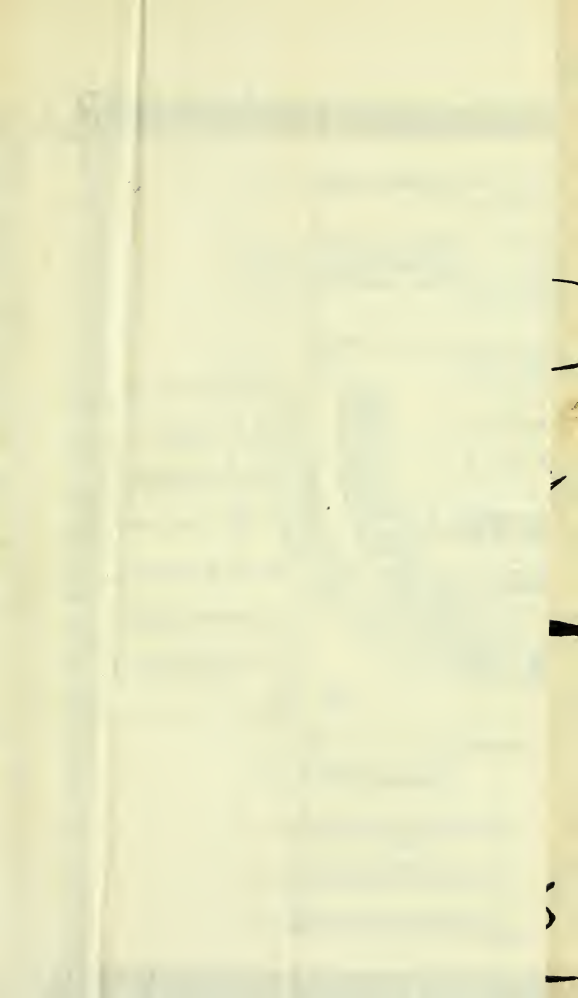
XXXVIII. No person shall be permitted on the floor of the Council, unless in the discharge of official duty, or by special invitation of a member, except the Mayor, Aldermen, members of the Boards of Supervisors and Education, and such persons as have been members of the Common Council, Heads of Departments, or officers of the State Government, and reporters of the press. The privilege of admission, under any invitation, shall not extend beyond the day on which it is given; and it is the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms and the Door-keeper rigidly to enforce this rule.

XXXIX. The regular sessions of the Board shall be held on Mondays and Thursdays of each week, commencing at five o'clock, P. M. ; but the Board may, by a majority of five members present, adjourn for a shorter or longer time.

XL. No standing rule or order of this Board shall be changed or rescinded, without one day's previous notice being given of the motion therefor. But any rule or order may be suspended, for a special purpose, by a vote of thirteen members.

COUNTY GOVERNMENT.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

THE act of the Legislature, passed April 15, 1857, altered the mode in which the Board of Supervisors of the county of New York were constituted, and prescribed the annual selection, at the Charter election, of twelve gentlemen to compose the Board. By a supplementary act, passed April 17, 1858, the terms of the Supervisors were continued, and a classification of the members ordered, which divided the Board into six classes, with terms varying from one to six years, each class to consist one member elected and one appointed at the election first held; and thereafter two Supervisors to be annually chosen at the county election, to serve for six years each.

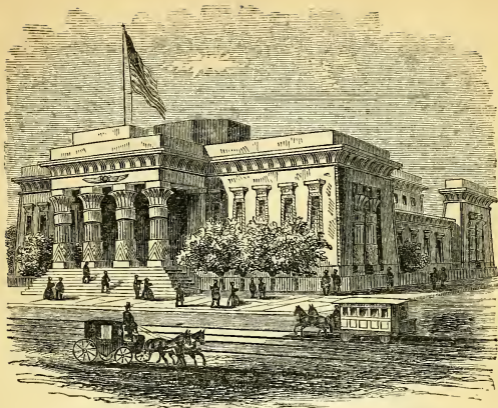

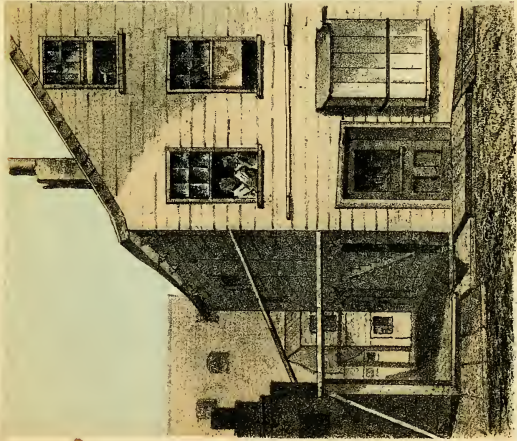

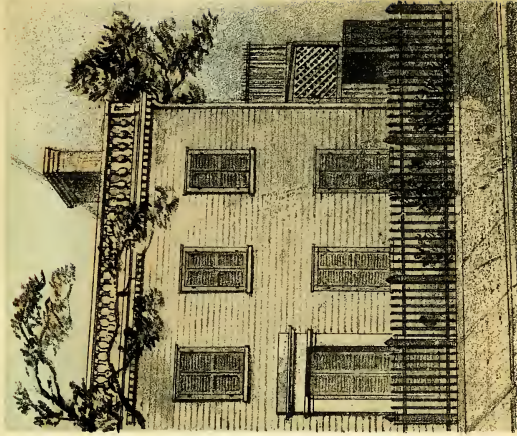

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

AN ACT

TO AMEND AN ACT, ENTITLED, "AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A METROPOLITAN POLICE DISTRICT, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE GOVERNMENT THEREOF," PASSED APRIL FIFTEENTH, EIGHTEEN HUNDRED AND FIFTY-SEVEN.

PASSED APRIL 10, 1860 ; THREE-FIFTHS BEING PRESENT.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

SEC. 1. The act, entitled, " An act to establish a Metropolitan Police District, and to provide for the government thereof," passed April fifteenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, is hereby amended, so as to read as follows :

§ 2. The counties of New York, Kings, Westchester, and Richmond, and the towns of Newtown, Flushing, and Jamaica, in the county of Queens, are hereby constituted and territorially united, for the purposes of police government and police discipline therein, into one district, which shall be known as, and called, the Metropolitan Police District of the State of New York.

§ 3. The powers and duties connected with and incident to the police

government and discipline of the said district shall be, as is hereinafter more especially provided for, vested in and exercised by a Board of Metropolitan Police, Commissioners of Metropolitan Police, and by a Metropolitan Police force, composed of a Superintendent of Metropolitan Police force, Inspectors of Metropolitan Police force, Captains of Metropolitan Police, Sergeants of Metropolitan Police, and Patrolmen of Metropolitan Police.

§ 4. On or before the tenth day of April, A. D. eighteen hundred and sixty, and thereafter, from time to time, as may become requisite, the Governor shall nominate, and, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, shall appoint, from among the electors of the Metropolitan Police District, three Commissioners of Metropolitan Police, who shall constitute the Board of Metropolitan Police, and two of them shall form a quorum for the transaction of business. The Governor shall have power to fill up any vacancy or vacancies that may happen in such Board during the recess of the Senate, by appointing a Commissioner or Commissioners, who shall hold office until appointment shall be made for the remainder of the unexpired term, in the manner hereinbefore provided. Any one of the Commissioners may be at all times removed by the Governor under the provisions of statutes relating to the removal from office of sheriffs, which provisions are hereby extended so as to relate to each one of the said Commissioners.

§ 5. The said three Commissioners, after having been duly appointed under this section, shall assemble together in the office of the Secretary of State, and there proceed to draw lots for three terms of office expiring respectively on the first days of April, in the years eighteen hundred and sixty-two, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, and eighteen hundred and sixty-six. At the expiration of each of the said respective terms, the full term succeeding shall be one of six years.

§ 6. Any one of the said Commissioners who shall, during his term of office, accept or hold any other place of public trust, or civil emolument, or who shall, during his term of office, be publicly nominated for any office elective by the people, and shall not, within ten days succeeding the same, publicly decline the said nomination, shall be in either case deemed hereby to have resigned his commission to the Governor, and to have vacated his office, and the Governor shall proceed as in case of vacancy.

§ 7. Upon the said three terms of office having been determined, as aforesaid, by lot, and a certificate of the result, attested by each Commissioner, having been filed in the office of the Secretary of State, there shall be issued to each Commissioner, from said office, the proper commission of appointment to office, for the term so drawn by lot, and each Commissioner shall, on receipt thereof, take and subscribe before the Secretary of State, for deposit in his office, the oath required by the Constitution for judicial officers.

§ 8. The said three Commissioners, appointed under this section, shall then take the places of the five Commissioners of Police of the said the Metropolitan Police District, now fulfilling office therein under the act hereby amended, and the terms of office of each of the said five Commissioners shall thereupon be at an end. The Board of Metropolitan Police, composed of the said three Commissioners, and of no other officers or persons, shall succeed and take the place of the Board of Police then existing.

§ 9. The said "The Metropolitan Police District" shall be divided by the Board of Metropolitan Police into precincts, not exceeding forty in the whole number thereof, and to each precinct shall be assigned a Captain of Metropolitan Police, and as many sergeants and patrolmen of the Metropolitan Police Force as the said Board may deem sufficient. Any number of said precincts may be joined into a sub-district by the said Board, and assigned to the charge of an inspector of police force. Any number of precincts may be likewise joined into surgical sub-districts, and assignments made thereto of Surgeons of Police by the said Board. In precincts within the county towns of Kings, or the towns of Newtown, Flushing, and Jamaica, in the county of Queens, or in the counties of Richmond or Westchester, respectively, the said Board may appoint therein any patrolman as acting sergeant in command of such precinct, with powers of captain, under the rules and regulations of the Board, but without increase of pay.

§ 10. The Board of Metropolitan Police, whenever vacancies occur, or the same becomes requisite, shall appoint the Superintendent of Metropolitan Police force, and the Inspectors of Metropolitan Police force, not exceeding four, and the Captains of Metropolitan Police, not exceeding forty, and the Sergeants of Metropolitan Police, not exceeding one hundred and sixty, and the patrolmen of Metropolitan Police, to the number authorized or restricted by this act. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall promulgate all regulations and orders through the Superintendent of Police, who shall be the executive head of the whole police force of the Metropolitan District, and who shall have the direction and control of said force, subject to the rules and regulations of the Board of Police.

§ 11. The quota of patrolmen for the county of New York, and whose services are to be paid for by the contribution of said county to the Metropolitan Police Fund, shall not exceed one thousand four hundred, unless the Board of Supervisors of said county shall, by resolution, determine an additional number to be necessary. The quota of patrolmen for the city of Brooklyn, and whose services are to be paid for by the contribution of said city to the general Police Fund, shall not exceed two hundred, unless the Common Council thereof shall, by resolution, authorize the Board of Metropolitan Police to appoint an additional specified number. Such resolutions may be passed, from time to time, by either the said Board of Supervisors or the said Common Council.

§ 12. The qualified voters of each of the towns in the respective counties of Kings, Westchester, and Richmond, and of each of the towns, respectively, of Newtown, Flushing, and Jamaica, in the county of Queens, and the qualified voters of any incorporated village within the said the Metropolitan Police District, shall have power, at any annual or special town meeting, or village election, to vote and determine if a regular patrolman, or any and what number of regular patrolmen, shall be appointed by the Board of Metropolitan Police, to be stationed in such town or incorporated village, and to direct the sum necessary to be raised by tax, in such town, or incorporated village, for contribution to the Metropolitan Police Fund, to pay such patrolman or patrolmen. Upon proper representation of any such action of any of the above towns or villages, the Board of Supervisors of the county in which such town is situated, or the trustees of such incorporated village, shall cause the sum so voted to be collected with the other expenses of said town or village. A special town meeting, or village election, for the purpose or purposes aforesaid, may at any time be held, if required, in the manner provided by law for special town meetings, or now authorized in respective incorporated villages within the said district. But, unless so voted, as aforesaid, the counties of Richmond, Westchester, and Queens, and such towns in the county of Kings as are not within the bounds of the city of Brooklyn, shall not become liable to the imposition of any tax for the general or partial expenses of the Board of Metropolitan Police, provided for or incurred by this act, and only, in any case, according to the provisions of voting aforesaid, and then such proportion of the general or partial expenses is to be imposed upon the town or towns so voting, in proportion to the number of patrolmen employed by such town or towns.

§ 13. Each member of the Metropolitan Police force of the Metropolitan Police District shall hold office, respectively, during his good behavior, and shall be liable to removal from membership of the said police force, only after written charges shall have been preferred against him, according to the rules and regulations of the said Board, and the same shall have been publicly heard and examined, after notice to him thereof, by the said Board, in manner to be prescribed by said rules and regulations. But no person shall ever be appointed to membership in the police force of the Metropolitan Police District, or shall continue to hold membership therein, who is not a citizen of the United States, or who has ever been convicted of crime, or who cannot understandingly read and write in the English language, or who shall not have resided within the district during the five years next preceding his appointment, except that this last limitation of residence shall not apply to members employed for detective service, not exceeding fifty in number.

§ 14. Vacancies in the police force shall be filled up as follows: Inspectors must be appointed from among those now holding office as Deputy

Superintendent, or who are captains. Captains must be appointed from among sergeants, and sergeants must be appointed from among patrolmen.

§ 15. The Board of Police of the Metropolitan Police District, whenever expedient, shall, on the application of any president of an incorporated village, within the said district or corporation, or person or persons showing the necessity thereof, detail regular patrolmen of the police force, or appoint and swear any additional number of special patrolmen of the police force to do special duty at any place within the Metropolitan Police District, upon the corporation, person or persons by whom the application shall be made, contributing to the Metropolitan Police Fund, by payment to the treasurer, not exceeding the sum of two dollars and fifty cents per diem of service on such detail of special duty; but the patrolmen so additionally and specially appointed shall be subject to the orders of the Superintendent of Metropolitan Police force, and shall obey the rules and regulations of the said Board, and conform to its general discipline, and to such special regulations as may be made, and shall wear such dress or emblems as the Board may direct, and shall, during the term of their holding appointment, possess all the powers, privileges, and discharge all duties of the Metropolitan Police force applicable to patrolmen. The persons so appointed may be removed at any time by the Board of Police, without assigning cause thereof, upon notice to the person or persons who applied for the appointment as aforesaid.

§ 16. The Board of Police may also, upon any emergency or apprehension of riot, pestilence, or invasion, appoint as many special patrolmen, without pay, from among the citizens, as it may deem desirable; and during any day of public election, it may appoint, to perform duty in the city of New York, not exceeding five hundred special patrolmen, who may be paid out of the police fund, contributed by said city, two dollars each for their services as such special patrolmen; provided, however, that each special patrolman so appointed shall make oath, before any Commissioner of Police, the Superintendent of Police force, or the Chief Clerk of the Board of Metropolitan Police, at the time of appointment, that he will not interfere in any manner with the election taking place on the day for which he is appointed, otherwise than by depositing his own vote; and providing that such pay may be withheld, and he may be duly prosecuted as for a misdemeanor, if the terms of such oath be violated, and during the term of service of any such special patrolman, authorized as aforesaid, he shall possess all the powers and privileges, and perform all the duties of the patrolmen of the standing force of the district. Every such special patrolman shall wear an emblem, to be prescribed and furnished by the Board of Metropolitan Police.

§ 17. No member of the Metropolitan Police force, under penalty of forfeiting the salary or pay which may be due to him, shall withdraw or resign, except by permission of the Board of Metropolitan Police, unless

he shall have given to the Superintendent one month's notice, in writing, of such intention. There shall be no limitation or restriction of place or residence, to any member of the Metropolitan Police force, other than residence within the Metropolitan Police District.

§ 18. The Commissioners of Metropolitan Police shall, annually, or as often as a vacancy shall occur, select one of their number to act as the President of the Board of Metropolitan Police. He shall preside at the meetings of the Board, and whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police force, in the absence or disability of the said Superintendent, the President shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of that office, subject to the rules and regulations of the Board of Metropolitan Police, and with proportionate increase of pay during such continuance of duty.

§ 19. The Commissioners of Metropolitan Police shall select one of their number to be the Treasurer of Metropolitan Police. He shall be the fiscal officer of the Metropolitan Police District. He shall, on check and voucher, duly disburse all moneys belonging to the Metropolitan Police Fund, and shall deposit the same, when paid to him by the Treasurer of the State of New York, in a bank designated by such officer. He shall execute a bond, with sureties, not less than two, conditioned, in a penalty of fifty thousand dollars, to the people of the State of New York, for the faithful discharge of his duties as such Treasurer. The sureties shall justify, before a Justice of the Supreme Court; but, before the said Treasurer shall enter upon his duties, the said bond shall be approved by, and filed with, the Comptroller of the State. Should any collections be made, upon civil action on such bond, they shall be immediately paid to the credit of the Metropolitan Police Fund of the Metropolitan Police District. No expenses, other than salaries and pay herein provided, shall ever be incurred by the Board of Police, except for rents, stationery, printing, and advertising, fuel and lights, unless the same shall be expressly authorized and provision therefor made as a separate annuity, or city charge, by the Board of Supervisors for the county, or the joint Board of the Supervisors and Aldermen of the city of Brooklyn, within the expenditure, becomes necessary.

§ 20. The Board of Metropolitan Police may appoint a Chief Clerk, a Property Clerk, and Deputy Clerks, not to exceed six; Surgeons of Police, not to exceed five; and Doormen, not to exceed two, to each station-house. The persons thus severally appointed shall severally hold office at the pleasure of the said Board.

§ 21. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall provide such office and business accommodations as it shall deem requisite for the transaction of its own business and that of its subordinate officers; there shall be a central office in the city of New York, to be known as the Central Department of Metropolitan Police; but the Inspector of Police force in Brooklyn shall have office accommodation in that city.

§ 22. It shall be a misdemeanor for any person not being a regular member of a police, established in any city of this State, or a member of the Metropolitan Police force, or a constable of this State, or a police constable, or assistant police constable, or a sheriff, or one of the usual general deputies of any sheriff, of the State, to serve any criminal process within the said the Metropolitan Police District.

§ 23. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall, at all times, whenever consistent with the rules and regulations of the said Board, and with the requirements of this act, furnish all police information desired by the Mayors or Common Councils of said cities, respectively, or by the Boards of Supervisors of the counties of Westchester and Richmond, and the county towns of Kings and Queens, within the said the Metropolitan Police District.

§ 24. The Board of Metropolitan Police is hereby invested with, and shall hereafter exercise, all the powers now conferred by law upon Mayors of cities in respect to requiring the services of the military, in aid of the civil authorities, to quell riots, suppress insurrections, protect the property and preserve public tranquillity; and such investure of power shall exclude that of the Mayors of New York and Brooklyn, within these cities, respectively, and such powers shall apply to the whole Metropolitan Police District.

§ 25. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall have power to issue subpoenas, tested in the name of its president, to compel the attendance of witnesses upon any proceedings authorized by its rules and regulations. Each Commissioner of Police, the Superintendent of Police, and the Chief Clerk of the Board of Police, are hereby authorized and empowered to administer affirmation and oaths to any person summoned and appearing in any matter or proceeding, authorized as aforesaid, or to make any depositions necessary to be made under the rules and regulations of the Board of Police, or for the purposes of this amended act. Any willful and corrupt false swearing, by any witness or person, to any material fact in any necessary proceeding under the said rules and regulations, or under this act, shall be deemed perjury, and punished in the manner prescribed by law for such offense. The provisions and procedure of section three of an act, entitled, "An act to enable the Common Council of the city of New York to take testimony in matters referred to for investigation or inquiry," passed February eighth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, are hereby applied to the case of any witness subpoenaed under this section.

§ 26. The Board of Metropolitan Police may, from time to time, establish stations and station-houses, or sub-stations and sub-station-houses, at least one to each precinct, for the accommodation thereat of members of the police force, and as temporary places of detention for persons arrested and property taken within the precinct.

§ 27. The Commissioners of Metropolitan Police, in furtherance of the

police government of the said the Metropolitan Police District, and for the promoting and perfecting the police discipline of subordinates, and of the members of the Metropolitan Police force, are empowered to enact, modify, and repeal, from time to time, "rules and regulations of general discipline," wherein, in addition to such other provisions as may be deemed expedient by said Commissioners, there shall be particularly defined, enumerated, and distributed the powers and duties of the superintendent of police force, and of the inspectors and captains of police force, and of the clerks of said Board, of the sergeants, of the doormen, and of the members of the Metropolitan Police force; and wherein shall be specified the modes of appointment to, and removal from office of the said superintendent and inspectors, and the members of the Metropolitan Police force, and the manner of discipline of the said police force, provided that such by-laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations shall not conflict with any of the provisions of this amended act, or with the Constitution of the United States or of this State.

§ 28. The members of the police force of the said "The Metropolitan Police District" shall furthermore possess, in every part of this State, all the common law and statutory powers of constables, except for the service of civil process; and any warrant for search or arrest, issued by any magistrate of this State, may be executed in any part thereof, by any member of the police force of the said "The Metropolitan Police District," and all the provisions of sections seven, eight, and nine, of chapter two, title two, part four of the Revised Statutes, in relation to the giving and taking of bail, shall apply to this act.

§ 29. It is hereby made the duty of the Metropolitan Police force, at all times of the day and night, within the said Metropolitan Police District, the members thereof are accordingly hereby thereunto empowered, to especially preserve the public peace, prevent crime, detect and arrest offenders, suppress riots and insurrections, protect the rights of persons and of property, guard the public health, preserve order at every primary and public election, remove nuisances existing in public streets, roads, places, and highways, repress and restrain disorderly houses and houses of ill-fame, to arrest all street-beggars and mendicants, to provide a proper police attendance at every fire, in order that thereby the firemen, fire-engines, and property exposed, may be suitably assisted or protected, assist, advise, and protect emigrants, strangers, and travelers in public streets, or at steamboat and ship landings, or railway stations, enforce every law relating to the suppression and punishment of crime, or to the observance of Sunday, or regarding pawubrokers, or mock auctions, or emigrations, or elections, or gambling, or intemperance, or lotteries, or lottery policies, or vagrants or disorderly persons, or the public health, or any ordinance or resolution of Common Councils, or town or village authorities within the said district, applicable to police, health, or criminal procedure.

§ 30. The several members of the police force shall have power and authority to immediately arrest, without warrant, and to take into custody any person who shall commit, or threaten, or attempt to commit, in the presence of such member, or within his view, any breach of the peace or offense directly prohibited by act of the Legislature, or by any ordinance of the city, town, or village within which the offense is committed, threatened, or attempted; but such member of the police force shall immediately and without delay, upon such arrest, convey in person such offender before the nearest magistrate, that he may be dealt with according to law.

§ 31. The office of Deputy Superintendent of Police, created by the act of which this act is amendatory, is hereby abolished, but the Board of Metropolitan Police shall appoint the persons now acting as Deputy Superintendents to be the Inspectors of Metropolitan Police force, provided by this act; and the said persons are hereby continued in membership of the Metropolitan Police force under such last-named designation, and the said Board may appoint, from the captains of the Metropolitan Police, two additional Inspectors of Metropolitan Police, whose duties shall be prescribed by the Board of Metropolitan Police, by its rules and regulations, but one of the said Inspectors shall always perform duty in the city of Brooklyn.

§ 32. The constables elected by the electors within the counties of Westchester and Richmond, and in the county towns of Kings and Queens; and the police constables and assistant police constables in villages within the said the Metropolitan Police District, shall possess all the powers conferred by this amended act upon the Metropolitan Police force. The Board of Supervisors, in each of the said last-mentioned counties, may call upon the Board of Metropolitan Police to appoint for duty within the police precincts of which the said county shall be a part, as many additional captains, lieutenants, sergeants, and patrolmen as the said Board of Supervisors shall enumerate and describe, upon appropriating to the Metropolitan Police Fund the necessary expenses, salaries, or pay to be incurred thereby. It shall become the duty of the Board of Metropolitan Police thereupon to appoint such additional members of the Metropolitan Police force, but not until so called upon.

§ 33. The Supervisors of the counties of Richmond, Westchester, Kings, and Queens are hereby authorized and empowered, from time to time, to levy and raise by tax, upon the estates, real and personal, taxable within each county, such sum or sums of money as may be required to carry into effect, in respect to either of said counties, the fiscal provisions of this act, affecting said counties, or any of them.

§ 34. No person holding office under this act shall be liable to military or jury duty, nor to arrest on civil process, or to service of subpoenas from civil courts, whilst actually on duty.

§ 35. The Health Officer of the port of New York shall have power at

all times to call upon any of the police force of the district, to a number not exceeding ten, to aid him, in any necessary emergency, in enforcing the powers and duties conferred upon his office by law, and it shall thereupon become the duty of any such member of the police force, so called upon, to obey him. But such service shall not continue longer than twenty-four hours, unless by direction of the Board of Metropolitan Police.

§ 36. In every case of arrest by any member of the Metropolitan Police force, the same shall be made known within six hours thereafter to the superior upon duty, in the precinct wherein the arrest was made, by the person making the same; and it shall be the duty of the said superior, within twelve hours after such notice, to make written return thereof, according to the rules and regulations of the Board of Metropolitan Police, with the name of the party arrested, the alleged offense, the time and place of arrest, and place of detention.

§ 37. The Board of Metropolitan Police are authorized, from time to time, to contract for and to provide suitable accommodation, within the said "The Metropolitan Police District," for the detention of witnesses who are unable to furnish security for their appearance in criminal proceedings; and such accommodations shall be in premises other than those employed for the confinement of persons charged with crime, fraud, or disorderly conduct. And it shall be the duty of all magistrates, in committing witnesses, to have regard to the rules and regulations of the Board of Metropolitan Police, in respect to their detention.

§ 38. The Board of Metropolitan Police may also suspend from pay or duty, or both, any member of the said force, but not longer than thirty days from pay at any one suspension.

§ 39. The Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police force shall make to the Board of Metropolitan Police quarterly reports, in writing, of the state of the "Metropolitan Police District," with such statistics and suggestions as he may deem advisable to submit for the improvement of the police government and discipline of the said district. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall, on or before the first Monday in December in each year, make a report, in writing, to the Governor of the State, upon the condition of the Metropolitan Police within the said Metropolitan Police District.

§ 40. The Superintendent of Metropolitan Police, and each captain of police within his precinct, shall possess powers of general police supervision and inspection, over all licensed pawnbrokers, licensed venders, licensed junk-shop keepers, junk boatmen, licensed cartmen, dealers in second-hand merchandise, intelligence-office keepers, and auctioneers of watches and jewelry, within the said Metropolitan Police District, and in the exercise of, and in furtherance of said supervision, may, from time to time, empower members of the police force to fulfill such special duties in the aforesaid premises as may be, from time to time, ordained by the Board

of Metropolitan Police. The said Superintendent, and each captain, within his precinct, may, by authority in writing, empower any member of the Metropolitan Police force, whenever such member shall be in search of property feloniously obtained, or in search of suspected offenders, to examine the books of any pawnbroker or his business premises, or the business premises of any licensed vender, or licensed junk-shop keeper, or dealer in second-hand merchandise, or intelligence-office keeper, or auctioneer of watches and jewelry, or boat of any junk boatman. Any such member of the Metropolitan Police force, when thereto authorized, in writing, by the said Superintendent, and having in his possession a pawnbroker's receipt or ticket, shall be allowed to examine the property purporting to be pawned, or pledged, or deposited upon said receipt or ticket, in whosoever possession said property may be; but no such property shall be taken from the possessor thereof without due process or authority of law. Any willful interference with the said Superintendent or captain of police, or with any member of the Metropolitan Police force, by any of the persons hereinbefore named in this section, whilst in official and due discharge of duty, shall be punishable by misdemeanor.

§ 41. If any member of the Metropolitan Police force, or if any two or more householders, shall report, in writing, under his or their signature, to the Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police force, that there are good grounds (and stating the same) for believing any houses, room or premises within the said the Metropolitan Police District to be kept or used as a common gaming-house, common gaming-room, or common gaming-premises, for therein playing for wagers of moneys at any game of chance, or to be kept or used for lewd and obscene public amusement, or the deposit or sale of lottery tickets or of lottery policies, it shall be lawful for the General Superintendent of Metropolitan Police to authorize any member or members of the police force to enter the same, who shall forthwith arrest all persons there found offending against law, and seize all implements of gaming, or lottery tickets or lottery policies, and convey any person so arrested before the nearest magistrate, and bring the articles so seized to the office of the Board of Metropolitan Police. It shall be the duty of the said Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police force to cause such arrested persons to be vigorously prosecuted, and such articles seized to be destroyed.

§ 42. It shall not be lawful for any person to publicly keep or dispose of any intoxicating liquors upon the first day of the week, called Sunday, or upon any day of public election, within the said "The Metropolitan Police District," under a penalty of fifty dollars for each offense, to be sued for and recovered in the name of the people of the State of New York, by the District Attorney of the county wherein the offense was committed, for the benefit of the said Police Life Insurance Fund, and it shall be the duty of the District Attorney to pay over, quarterly, all moneys or judgments collected by him, except the costs and disburse-

ments under the provisions of this act, or the act of which this is amendatory, to the Treasurer of said Police Board. And it shall be the duty of the Superintendent of Police to strictly enforce the provisions of this section, by his proper orders in respect thereto to the members of the Metropolitan Police force, and it is hereby made the duty of the said members, in respect to the enforcing the provisions of this section, to proceed in the manner provided by law for the arrest of offenders.

§ 43. It shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by imprisonment in the county jail, or in the city and county of New York in the penitentiary, for not less than one year or exceeding two years, or by a fine of not less than two hundred and fifty dollars, for any person without justifiable or excusable cause to use, or to incite any other person to use, personal violence upon any elector on any election day in the Metropolitan Police District, or upon any member of the police force thereof when in the discharge of his duty, or for any such member to willfully neglect making any arrest for an offense against the law of this State or ordinance in force in the said district, or for any person not a member of the police force to falsely represent himself as being such member, with a fraudulent design upon persons or property.

§ 44. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall cause to be kept general complaint books, in which shall be entered any complaint of a police nature preferred upon a personal knowledge of the circumstances thereof, with the name and residence of the complainant. The said Board shall also cause to be kept books of registration of lost, missing, or stolen property, for the general convenience of the public, and for the informaton of the Metropolitan Police force. The said Board shall cause to be kept books of record of "The Metropolitan Police District," wherein shall be entered the name of every member of the Metropolitan Police force, with the time and place of his nativity; the time when, and the place where, he became a citizen, if he was born out of the United States; his age, upon becoming such member, and his former occupation; number of his family and residence thereof, and the date of appointment, or of his resignation, or withdrawal, or of dismissal from office, with the cause of the latter. And against all such entries, sufficient space shall be left wherein to make record of any especial arrests, made from time to time, by such member of the police force, or of any special service deemed meritorious by the said Board. The said Board shall also cause to be kept, in proper books, the accounts of the treasurer, and all receipts for money expended, or for warrants, or for checks for moneys issued by the treasurer, shall be written in books kept for the purpose; and the said receipts shall be signed by the person or persons receiving said money, warrants, or checks from the treasurer. Such books shall be at all business hours, and when not in actual use, open to public inspection. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall also cause to be kept and bound all police returns and reports from any member of the Metro-

politan Police force, and all minutes of the proceedings of said Board, which returns, reports, and minutes shall only be open for public inspection in the discretion of said Board.

§ 45. Every member of the Metropolitan Police force shall have issued to him by the Board of Metropolitan Police a proper warrant of appointment, signed by the President of the said Board, and countersigned by the chief clerk, which warrant shall contain the date of his appointment and his rank.

§ 46. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall make suitable provisions respecting security, to be entered into by the Superintendent of Police force, and by the Inspectors of Police force, and by the Property Clerk, for the faithful performance of their respective duties. Each member of the Metropolitan Police shall take an oath of office, and subscribe the same in a book kept for that purpose, which oath of office may be taken before any Commissioner of Metropolitan Police, who is hereby empowered to administer the same, and write acknowledgment thereof.

§ 47. It shall be the duty of the Commissioners of Metropolitan Police to detail, on the day of any election within the cities of New York or Brooklyn, respectively, at least two patrolmen to each election poll.

§ 48. Said Commissioners shall, in and for each of the said cities, appoint all poll clerks provided for by law, and shall, in and for the said cities, provide ballot-boxes for use at general, special, and charter elections, and for the custody of the said boxes, except during the taking, receiving, and counting of votes.

§ 49. It shall be the duty of the Board of Police to prevent any booth or box, for the distribution of tickets at an election, to be erected or maintained within one hundred and fifty feet of any polling place within the cities aforesaid.

§ 50. All criminal process issuing out of any court, or from any justice or judge in the city of Brooklyn, shall be served by a member of the police force, and not otherwise. And the said Board of Police Commissioners shall detail so many patrolmen as shall be necessary to attend all courts transacting criminal business in said city of Brooklyn, and no constables or marshals shall hereafter attend said courts, or be paid either by the authorities of said city or by the Supervisors of the county of Kings for any service in said courts.

§ 51. It shall be the duty of the Board of Metropolitan Police District to set apart a Metropolitan Sanitary Police Company, and to assign to command of each of said companies either a captain or sergeant of Metropolitan Police, and to assign to each company such special duties, by the rules and regulations, as may be publicly advantageous.

§ 52. The Metropolitan Sanitary Company are hereby empowered, under such distribution of power and duty as may be made by the rules and regulations, to visit and make inspection of all ferry-boats, manufactories, slaughter-houses, tenement houses, and edifices suspected of or charged

with being unsafe, and to take all necessary legal measures for promoting the security of life or health, upon or in said boats, manufactories, houses, and edifices, and to make report of inspection and action in the premises to the Board of Metropolitan Police. Whenever said Board shall be satisfied, by such report, that any ferry-boat, manufactory, slaughter-house, tenement house or edifice is maintained in a manner prejudicial to the lives or health of the public, it shall, after due entry upon its minutes of the circumstance, cause complaint to be made, founded upon such report and circumstance, before any Magistrate of the Metropolitan District, who shall, in a summary way, upon such complaint made under oath, issue his proper warrant, reciting therein the name of the member or members of the Metropolitan Sanitary Police Company, for the arrest of the person in charge of such ferry-boat, manufactory, slaughter-house, tenement house, and edifice, to the end that he may be brought before such magistrate, and the complaint of insecurity of the life or health of the public, so made, be duly investigated, according to the law of examination into misdemeanors. If said magistrate shall be satisfied, on a summary hearing thereof, that such charge of insecurity of the lives or health of the public is founded on reasonable and probable cause, he may, by his order, in writing, command any such ferry-boat to cease running, or any business in such manufactory or slaughter-house to cease, until the cause of complaint aforesaid shall be removed to the satisfaction of the Board of Metropolitan Police.

§ 53. The Board of Metropolitan Police may, by its order in writing, cause any tenement house to be cleansed at any time after three days' notice for such cleansing shall have been served upon the owner, landlord, or agent thereof, and within such time the same has been neglected. The expense of taking down any edifice, or of cleansing any tenement-house, as aforesaid, shall be paid by the Comptroller of the city within which the said edifice or house is situated; a copy of the order of the Board, in writing, together with the bill of expense, countersigned by the Comptroller aforesaid, with a description of the premises and real estate thereof, being filed with the clerk of the county, shall become and continue to be a lien for the amount of such repair, with interest, upon said premises, to the same effect as a judgment of a court of record, until such time as the Comptroller on reimbursement of said expenses and interest, shall, in writing, authorize the said county clerk to discharge the same.

§ 54. The said proceedings of the Board of Metropolitan Police, or of the magistrate acquiring jurisdiction, as aforesaid, may be removed into the Supreme Court by *certiorari* for examination. The acts of the said Board, when in accordance with the provisions aforesaid, shall be deemed judicial acts.

§ 55. In addition to such duties which shall be assigned to surgeons of Metropolitan Police by the rules and regulations, it is hereby made their duty especially to visit each day the station-houses of police within the

Metropolitan Police District and exercise supervision over the sanitary condition of station and lodging-houses, and of the members of the force connected with the precinct in which the same is situated, and at all times to perform such services of inspection of nuisances and tenement houses, and such medical and surgical attendance and services to vagrants, disorderly persons, intoxicated persons, and sick persons within said station-houses, and to witnesses in the house of witness-detention, as may be requested of them, in writing, by the Superintendent of Police, or by the inspectors or captains of Metropolitan Police.

§ 56. The Board of Metropolitan Police shall have power to create, operate, and maintain, under the general laws of the State relating to telegraph lines, all such lines of telegraph in such places within the said district as for purposes of police the Board shall deem necessary. But the ownership of the fixtures and apparatus for such telegraphic purposes, in the cities of New York and Brooklyn, shall be in the respective municipal corporations of said cities, but subject to the exclusive use and control of the Board of Metropolitan Police.

§ 57. The necessary expenses incurred in the execution of criminal process within the said "The Metropolitan Police District" shall be a county charge only against the county from which the said process issued.

§ 58. It is hereby declared to be the duty of the Common Council of the cities of New York and Brooklyn, respectively, in accordance with the practice and ordinances now existing therein, to provide, at the expense of said cities, respectively, all necessary accommodations within such precincts of the said "The Metropolitan Police District," as shall be contained within the boundaries of the said cities, respectively, for the station-houses required by the Board of Metropolitan Police, for the accommodation of the police force of such precincts, and for the lodging of vagrants and disorderly persons, and for the temporary detention of persons arrested for offenses. In case the said Common Councils, or either of them, neglect or refuse, within thirty days after having been thereto, in writing, requested by the said Board of Metropolitan Police, to provide accommodations as aforesaid, or station-houses, which in the opinion of the said Board are not suitable, or to put the said station-house in due repair, then the said Board may make their own provisions and contracts of leasing or hiring, or repairing in the premises, and the same, when made, shall become a proper charge and debt for the expenses and disbursements thereof against the said city whose Common Council has so neglected or refused to make provision in manner and form aforesaid.

§ 59. The accommodations required for the police purposes of this act, in portions of the Metropolitan Police District, other than the cities of New York and Brooklyn, shall be those ordinarily used by the criminal authorities of each town or village therein. In places within the said dis-

trict, other than the cities of New York and Brooklyn, any member of the Metropolitan Police force taking any person lawfully under arrest, at night, may, in default of public accommodation of custody, provide for such person a place of detention, but for no longer period than twelve hours.

§ 60. The Commissioners of Metropolitan Police, and the Comptrollers of the cities of New York and Brooklyn, convened as a board of estimate and apportionment, shall, annually, on or before the first day of September, make up a financial estimate of the sums required annually for expenses in the execution of criminal process, or for the fitting up, warming, lighting, and furnishing police station-houses, and the house for the detention of witnesses, and for alterations, and additions to, and repairs of the same, and for office accommodation and printing, and stationery, and telegraph apparatus and fixtures, and for badges, emblems, and equipments of the police force, and also of the sums necessary for counsel fees, law expenses, and disbursements incurred by the Board of Metropolitan Police, or by the Commissioners of Metropolitan Police, or rendered necessary in criminal or civil actions and proceedings against the superintendent or inspectors, or property clerk, or members of the Metropolitan Police force, for acts done in the discharge of duty, and to defray the salaries and pay required by this act, and such other general expenses as may, from time to time, in the judgment of such apportionment board, become necessary, with the enumeration thereof. Such estimate shall be accompanied with a written apportionment, by said board, of the proportion of expenses applicable to each city, county, town, or village, in the Metropolitan Police District, interested therein, in the ratio of the number of patrolmen authorized by this act, and employed by such city, county, town, or village, respectively. The said estimate shall then be submitted to an auditing committee, composed of the Presidents, respectively, of the Board of Supervisors of the counties of New York, Kings, Westchester, and Richmond, and of the Board of Aldermen of the city of Brooklyn, and of the Supervisors of the respective towns of Newtown, Flushing, and Jamaica, in the county of Queens, who may meet by a majority thereof to consider the same, on or before the first Monday of October, in each and every year. If the said auditing board, on or before the second Monday of said October, shall object, in writing, to such estimate and apportionment, or any portion thereof, and so notify or cause to be notified the said board of estimate and apportionment, it shall be the duty of the latter to immediately and carefully revise the same, and consider the said objections. If such board shall adhere to their original action of the estimate or apportionment, or if they shall modify the same, then the final determination shall be binding upon the respective counties, or cities, or towns, or villages interested therein, except that in the counties of Richmond, Westchester, and Queens, no proportion of the general expenses of the Board of Police, in each year, shall be chargeable to any of said counties, or to any town or village therein, ex-

cept such county, town, or village shall have voted to employ and pay patrolmen.

§ 61. The Board of Supervisors of the county of New York, and the joint Board of Supervisors and Aldermen of the city of Brooklyn, are hereby, respectively, empowered and directed annually to order and cause to be raised and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, within the said county of New York and city of Brooklyn, respectively, the sums of money as aforesaid annually estimated and apportioned as the share of said county or city, of the said total expenses of the Metropolitan Police District.

§ 62. The several sums of money provided for by the preceding sections shall be paid into the treasury of the State, and shall be paid therein and therefrom under the fiscal regulations of law relating to the school fund of the State of New York.

§ 63. The Commissioner of Metropolitan Police, who shall be selected as Treasurer of the Board of Metropolitan Police, shall receive an annual salary of three thousand dollars, and each other Commissioner shall receive a compensation of eight dollars for each day of actual service, the same to be annually certified to the Comptroller of the State by the said Treasurer of the Board. The Superintendent of the Metropolitan Police shall receive an annual salary of five thousand dollars. Each Inspector of Police shall receive an annual salary of two thousand dollars. Each Surgeon of Police shall receive an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars. The Chief Clerk to the Board of Metropolitan Police shall receive a like salary of two thousand dollars. The Property Clerk shall receive a like salary of twelve hundred dollars; and each Deputy Clerk a like salary of one thousand dollars. Each Captain of Metropolitan Police shall receive an annual salary of twelve hundred dollars. Each Sergeant of Metropolitan Police shall receive an annual salary of nine hundred dollars. The pay of each patrolman shall be at the yearly rate of eight hundred dollars, and that of each doorman at the rate of seven hundred dollars per year. The salaries and pay aforesaid shall be paid monthly to each person entitled thereto, in modes to be prescribed by the rules and regulations, subject to such deductions each month from the salary or pay of members of the Metropolitan Police force as the Treasurer shall make (and which deductions he is hereby authorized to retain), to satisfy fines imposed on any member of the Metropolitan Police force by way of discipline or punishment, and as prescribed by the rules and regulations of the Board. The salary of the Treasurer, and the compensation of each other Commissioner, shall be paid by the Comptroller of the State out of the Metropolitan Police Fund.

§ 64. No member of the Board of Metropolitan Police, under any pretense whatsoever, shall, for his own benefit, share in any present, fee, gift, or emolument for police services, additional to his regular salary or compensation.

§ 65. The Board of Police, for meritorious and extraordinary services rendered by any member of the police force, in the due discharge of his duty, may permit any member of the police force to retain for his own benefit any reward or present tendered him therefor; and it shall be cause of removal from the Metropolitan Police force for any member thereof to receive any such reward or present without notice thereof to the Board of Metropolitan Police. Upon receiving said notice, the said Board may either order the said member to retain the same, or shall dispose of it for the benefit of the Police Life Insurance Fund.

§ 66. All fines imposed by the Board of Police upon members of the Metropolitan Police force, by way of discipline, and collectible from pay or salary, and all rewards, fees, proceeds, or gifts and emoluments that may be paid and given for account of extraordinary services of any member of the Metropolitan Police force (except when allowed to be retained by said member); and all moneys remaining for the space of one year in the hands of the Property Clerk, or arising from the sale of unclaimed goods; and all proceeds of suits for penalties, under this amended act, shall be deposited and paid into the bank wherein the Treasurer of the Board of Metropolitan Police shall keep an account. The payments so made shall constitute and be deposited and kept as a fund, to be called the "Police Life Insurance Fund," and the persons who shall, from time to time, fill the office of the said Treasurer of the Board of Metropolitan Police, and that of Comptroller of the city of New York and city of Brooklyn, are hereby declared the trustees of the said fund, and may, from time to time, invest the same, in whole or in part, as they shall deem most advantageous for the objects of such fund, and are empowered to make all necessary contracts and take all necessary remedies in the premises.

§ 67. If any member of the Metropolitan Police force, whilst in the actual performance of duty, shall become permanently disabled, so as to render his dismissal from membership necessary, or if any such member shall become superannuated after ten years of membership, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, as an annuity, to be paid such member, shall become chargeable upon the Metropolitan Police Life Insurance Fund. If any member of the Metropolitan Police force, whilst in the actual discharge of his duty, shall be killed, or shall die from the immediate effect of any injury received by him whilst in such discharge of duty, and shall leave a widow, or, if no widow, any child or children under the age of sixteen years, a like sum, by way of annuity, shall become chargeable upon the said fund, to be paid to such widow, so long only as she remains unmarried, or to such child or children so long only as said child, or the youngest of said children, continues under the age of sixteen years. In every case the Board of Metropolitan Police shall determine the circumstances thereof, and order payment of the annuity to be made by draft, signed by each trustee of the said fund. But nothing herein con-

tained shall render any payment of said annuity obligatory upon the said Board, or the said trustees, or chargeable as a matter of legal right. The Board of Metropolitan Police, in its discretion, may at any time order such annuity to cease.

§ 68.—1. All property, or money alleged or supposed to have been feloniously obtained, or which shall be lost or abandoned, and which shall be thereafter taken into the custody of any member of the Metropolitan Police force, or criminal court in the city of New York, or which shall come into custody of any police justice, shall be, by such member or justice, or by order of said court, given into the custody of, and kept by, the property clerk of the Metropolitan Police district, and all such property and money shall be particularly registered by said property clerk in a book kept for that purpose, which shall contain also a record of the names of the persons from whom such property or money was taken, the names of all claimants thereto, the time of the seizure, and any final disposition of such property or money.

2. Whenever property or money shall be taken from persons arrested, and shall be alleged to have been feloniously obtained, or to be the proceeds of crime, and whenever so brought with such claimant and the person arrested, before some magistrate for adjudication, and the magistrate shall be then and there satisfied from evidence that the person arrested is innocent of the offence alleged, and that the property rightfully belongs to him, the said magistrate may thereupon, in writing, order such property or money to be returned, and the property clerk, if he have it, to deliver such property or money to the accused person himself, and not to any attorney, agent, or clerk of such accused person.

3. If any claim to the ownership of such property or money shall be made on oath before the magistrate, by or in behalf of any other persons than the persons arrested, the said accused person shall be held for trial or examination, such property or money shall remain in the custody of the property clerk until the discharge or conviction of the persons accused.

4. All property or money taken on suspicion of having been feloniously obtained, or being the proceeds of crime, and for which there is no other claimant than the person from whom such property was taken, and all lost property coming into the possession of any member of the said Metropolitan Police force, and all property and money taken from pawnbrokers, as the proceeds of crime, or by any such member, from persons supposed to be insane, intoxicated, or otherwise incapable of taking care of themselves, shall be transmitted as soon as practicable, to the property clerk of the Metropolitan Police District, to be duly registered and advertised for the benefit of all persons and parties interested, and for the information of the public

as to the amount and disposition of the property so taken into custody by the police.

5. All property and money that shall remain in the custody of the property clerk for the period of six months, without any lawful claimant thereto, after having been three times advertised in public newspapers, shall be sold at public auction, and the proceeds of such sale shall be paid into the Police Life Insurance Fund.

6. If any property or money placed in the custody of the property clerk, shall be desired as evidence in any police or other criminal court, such property shall be delivered to any officer who shall present an order to that effect from such court; such property, however, shall not be retained in said court, but shall be returned to said property clerk, to be disposed of according to the previous provisions of this act.

§ 69. The persons in the respective offices of General Superintendent, Deputy Superintendent, Captains, Sergeants, and Patrolmen of the Metropolitan Police District, at the time of the passage of this amended act, and who have taken and subscribed an oath of office, as members of the police force of such district, are hereby continued in office during good behavior, subject to such promotion as may have been provided by previous sections hereof, and to removal from office only according to the provisions of this amended act.

§ 70. The Board of Police shall, at all times, cause the ordinances of the cities of New York and Brooklyn, not in conflict with the provisions of this act, to be properly enforced, and it shall be the duty of said Board, at all times, whenever consistent with the rules and regulations of the Board, and with the requirements of this act, to furnish all information desired.

§ 71. This act shall take effect immediately.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE SURGEONS OF THE METROPOLITAN POLICE.

1. The number of Surgeons of the Metropolitan Police shall, from time to time, be determined by the Board of Commissioners of Police, as the exigencies of the service may require, and the powers and duties of the said Surgeons shall be the same, except as hereinafter provided.

2. There shall be appointed, by the Commissioners of Police, one of the said surgeons as President, who shall be the organ of communication between the Commissioners and Board of Surgeons; but it shall be in order for either of the said surgeons to communicate to the Board of Commissioners, at any time, such suggestions or information, in respect to the sanitary condition of the police force, or of the station-houses in the dis-

trict to which he is assigned, and to the abatement of nuisances affecting the public health, or the presence of infectious or contagious disease in any part of the Metropolitan Police District.

3. The Metropolitan Police District is divided into Surgical Districts.

The first district comprises the 1st, 2d, and 3d Police Precincts, and 8th and 9th Wards (Sub-stations), Brooklyn.

The second district comprises the 4th, 5th, and 6th Police Precincts, and 17th Ward (Sub-station), Brooklyn.

The 3d district, 1st and 2d Police Precincts of New York.

4. To each of the foregoing districts the Commissioners of Police shall assign one surgeon for duty; and each surgeon shall, in the district to which he is assigned, have the exclusive surgical and medical charge, except that he may invite the aid of such other surgeons of the force, from time to time, as he may deem expedient.

5. It shall be the duty of each surgeon—

1. To report to the Commissioners of Police, as often as he may deem proper, but at least once every three months, on the health of the police force, and the sanitary condition of the station-houses in the district assigned to him.

2. To render professional services to all members of the police force stationed in his district, who may be ill, whether such illness be in consequence of injuries received on duty, or from ordinary sickness or indisposition, and to report thereon, in writing, to the chief clerk of police, on the last day of each month, the cause of such illness, and specifying the number of days when any officer in his district was unable, from wounds received while on service, or from illness contracted by exposure, to perform duty.

3. To visit daily, and, from time to time, carefully inspect and report to the Commissioners of Police, the sanitary state of the station-houses, the condition and ventilation of the cells, and on all matters connected with the station-houses or other buildings in charge of the Board of Police, within his district, which may affect injuriously the health of the inmates.

4. To attend all prisoners confined in the station-houses in his

district, on the requisition of a captain of police, or officer in command.

5. To attend all casualties requiring professional aid, occurring by day or by night in his district, on the requisition of a captain of police or officer in command, and to visit all persons reported to him to have been assaulted or otherwise injured, whose cases have or may become the subject of investigation by the police magistrates, and to report to the General or Deputy Superintendent of Police, whether the injuries sustained are of such a nature as to render it necessary for a magistrate to be called to take the injured person's deposition; and when the life of the injured person may appear to be in danger, it shall be the duty of the surgeon to give immediate notice thereof to the General or Deputy Superintendent.

6. To visit, from time to time, all injured persons in his district whose cases are undergoing investigation, in order that he may be able to give full and complete medical evidence, when necessary, on the trial of the accused parties.

7. To inspect, whenever called upon by a captain of police, the carcasses of any animals, within his district, suspected to be diseased, or any butcher meat, fish, poultry, or other articles of provisions suspected to be unsound, or unwholesome, or in a state unfit for human food, and to give evidence thereon, in court, when required.

8. To inspect, on the requisition of a captain of police, any adulterated provisions within his district, and to give evidence thereon when required.

9. To report forthwith, in writing, to the General Superintendent, all nuisances affecting the public health, and the presence of any infectious or contagious disease within his district.

6. It shall be the duty of the captains of police to report, in writing, to the surgeons of their respective precincts, the names of all officers under their command who may have been wounded or taken ill, stating their residence, and whether wounded or sick; and no officer so wounded or sick, shall be placed on duty without the consent, in writing, of the surgeon of police who attended him being first had and obtained.

7. It shall be the duty of those surgeons of police who receive fifteen hundred dollars per annum for their services, in consideration of their larger compensation, to examine the physical condition of all candidates for police appointments, whose applications shall have been favorably considered by the Board of Police, and report thereon, in writing, whether such candidates possess the qualifications prescribed in respect to health, strength, stature, and age. Such reports shall be signed by at least two of the surgeons referred to in this section, and be filed in the office of the chief clerk. It shall be the duty of all the surgeons of the police to make the examination herein mentioned, whenever required by resolution of the Board of Commissioners.

8. It shall be the duty of one or more of the surgeons of police to repair to any part of the Metropolitan Police District, whenever so directed by the Board of Commissioners, to examine and report upon the presence of contagious or infectious disease; upon the existence of nuisances dangerous to the public health, or upon any matter or thing within the said police district, that may be supposed prejudicial to the public health.

9. The surgeons shall file with the chief clerk, once in every month, reports of the names of policemen who have received professional attention from them, and stating the number of days they have been ill and unable to do duty, the nature of the illness, and whether contracted in the service of the Department.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE GOVERNMENT
OF THE
TWENTY-FOURTH PRECINCT.
(HARBOR POLICE.)

1. The harbor police, until the further action of the Board of Police, shall consist of twenty-five men, distributed in five boats.

2. There shall be assigned to each boat five men, of whom one shall be in command, and be called coxswain, but all shall receive the pay of patrolmen.

3. There shall be two sergeants, who shall relieve each other, and while on duty, shall be in command of all the boats, subject directly to the orders of the Deputy Superintendent of New York under the General Superintendent, to whom reports shall be made every morning at nine o'clock, of the duty performed by the several boats for the preceding twenty-four hours.

4. Three of the boats shall be on service on the East river and bay, of which two shall be on duty from sunset to sunrise, and one from sunrise to sunset.

Two boats shall be on service on the North river, of which one shall be on duty from sunset to sunrise, and one from sunrise to sunset.

5. The beats of the harbor police shall be from the northerly end of Blackwell's Island, on the East river, to Governor's Island, and the entrance to the Atlantic Dock, on the Brooklyn shore, and from Fourteenth street to the Battery, on the North river; but the boats may, by order of the sergeant in command, or of the General Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent of New York, proceed to any part of the harbor on police duty.

6. Each boat on night duty shall be provided with a signal lantern, to

throw flashes of red light on shore ; and it shall be the duty of the patrolmen on West or South streets, who may see the light, to repair to the place where the boat shall land, to render such assistance as may be required.

7. The boats on night duty shall, in addition to the signal-lanterns, carry rockets, provided for the purpose, which they shall discharge when requiring assistance from the other boats on service ; and it shall be the duty of the other boats to repair immediately to that part of the river or bay whence the rocket was discharged.

8. When a boat shall bring prisoners ashore, it shall be the duty of one or more of the crew to transfer them to the patrolmen on land, who shall convey the prisoners to the nearest station-house.

In addition to the ordinary baton of a patrolman, each member of the harbor police shall be armed, while on duty, with a revolving pistol and a cutlass.

9. Each boat, while on duty, shall be continually moving, unless engaged in watching some suspected place or vessel.

10. The boats shall be painted black on the outside and white on the interior, and the word " Police " shall be painted in large black letters on the inside of the stern, and in white letters on either bow on the outside of the boats, and numbered from one to five ; but there shall not be any name or any other distinctive mark on the said boats.

11. The uniform of the harbor police shall be—

A sailor's jacket of blue cloth, police vest buttons.

trowsers “ “ “ “

blue shirt.

“ pea jacket, police coat buttons,
tarpaulin hat.

And from June till September, instead of cloth, white duck trowsers ; and instead of tarpaulin, a sailor's straw hat.

The dress of the Sergeants shall be the same as that of men, except that they shall wear the cap and other insignia of officers of their rank. The men shall wear the patrolmen's shield.

12. Neither of the boats, under any pretence whatever, whether the crew be on or off duty, shall be employed except on the business of the Police ; and if it shall be proven that the crew, or either of them, or any other person or persons, shall use a Police boat for pleasure or fishing, the coxswain in command shall be instantly dismissed from the service.

13. It shall be the duty of the members of the Harbor Police to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with the localities of all junk-shops, and the character of their occupants, and the character, business, and appearance of all boats and vessels plying in the harbor of New York.

The station of the boats and the headquarters of the men shall be hereafter determined by the Board.

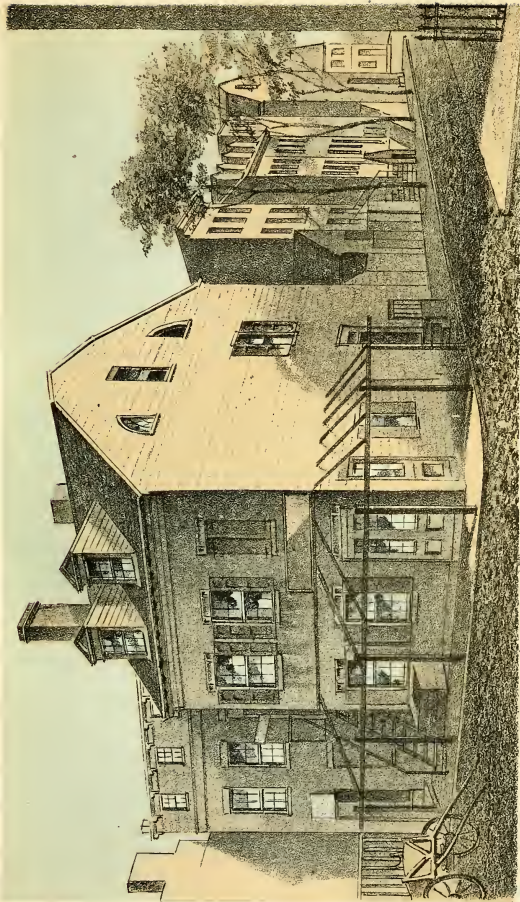

From January 1, 1830, to December 31, 1860 (thirty-one years), forty-three persons have been sentenced to be executed, on convictions had in the criminal courts of the county. 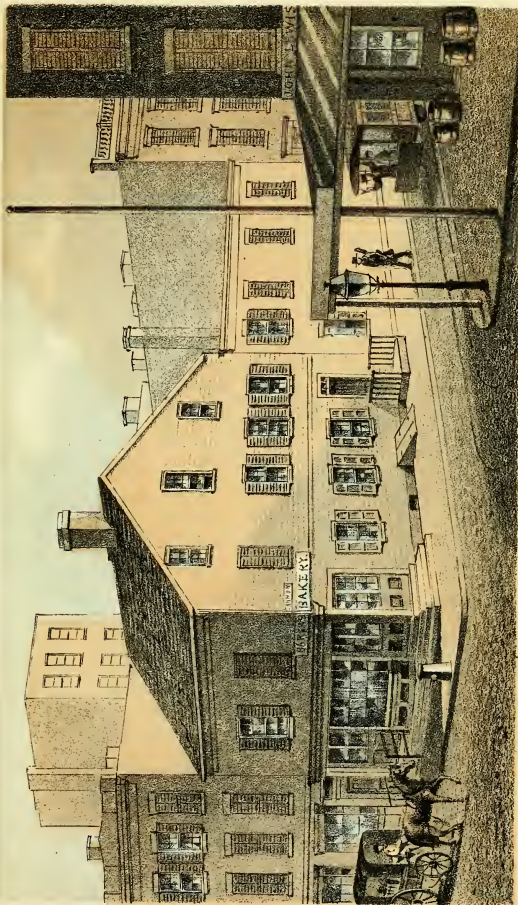

RULE 1. The General, Special, and Trial Terms of the Court will be held on the first Monday in January, February, March, April, May, June,

October, November, and December, in each year, and will continue until the last Saturday of such months, respectively.

RULE 2. There will be two Trial Terms for the trial of causes by a Jury, which will be denominated Parts I. and II.

RULE 3. There will be a Special Term, for the trial of issues of law and of issues of fact, without a Jury. The Calendar will be called through at 11 o'clock on the first day of the term, for the purpose of setting down causes for trial.

RULE 4. *Ex parte* orders must be applied for and non-enumerated motions heard at Special Term only. For such purpose the Special Term will be opened at 10 o'clock, A. M., and continue in session until 3 o'clock. P. M., of each day, except New Year's Day, Good Friday, the Fourth of July, the days of the Annual and Charter Elections, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas.

Ex parte orders must be applied for between the hours of 10 and 11 o'clock, A. M., of each day, or at any other time when the Justices, while holding the Special Term, may be disengaged.

The first Monday, and each of the Saturdays in the Special Term, shall be set apart for the hearing of non-enumerated motions. All motions must be noticed for, and orders to show cause returnable on, one of those days, unless otherwise directed by the Justice holding the Special Term.

RULE 5. The General, Trial, and Special Terms, for the trial of causes, will open at 11 o'clock, A. M., respectively.

RULE 6. Appeals from orders shall be heard in the General Term, on each Saturday in Term, and on the days appointed in vacation, at 11 o'clock, A. M. The appeal papers must be printed in like manner as upon appeals from judgments.

In appeals from orders, and in calendar causes, the parties shall deliver eight copies of the printed papers and points to the Clerk at the commencement of the argument.

RULE 7. The day calendar in the Trial Terms will be called through each morning, at the opening of the Court. The plaintiff, on failure of the defendant to appear, may take an inquest; and the defendant, on failure of the plaintiff to appear, may have a dismissal of the complaint.

RULE 8. Causes on the *Trial Calendar* may be *reserved generally* at any time before the cause is on the *Day Calendar*, by filing with the Clerk the written consent of the attorneys.

Motions to put such causes on the *Day Calendar* may be made to the Justice holding the Special Term on two days' notice.

SPECIAL TRIAL CALENDAR.

RULE 9. In actions on contract where there is reason to believe that the defense is interposed for the purpose of delay, and that the trial will not occupy more than one hour, the plaintiff may apply by motion at

Special Term, on a notice of four days, to have the issue placed upon a Special Calendar for trial (serving with such notice any affidavits or papers he may wish to use on the motion, which have not already been served); and the same be so ordered in the discretion of the Justice before whom the motion shall be made.

If such motion be granted, the cause will be entered on a Special Calendar to be made by the Clerk, on receiving a note of the issue specifying the number of the cause on the General Trial Calendar, and the date of the order directing it to be placed on such Special Calendar. Such Note of Issue to be filed with the Clerk four days before the day on which the cause shall be so entered.

The Special Calendar will be called on the second and last Friday of each Trial Term in part No. 1 for Trials, by the Justice there presiding, and the causes may be tried in either Part, as may be directed by such Justice.

If the trial of the cause shall occupy more than one hour, the trial may be suspended at the discretion of the Court, and the cause be placed at the foot of the General Trial Calendar.

ORDERED:

1. The General Calendars for the trial of Jury cases, and cases to be tried *by the Court without a Jury*, for the year 1863, having been called through, will be renumbered for 1864, and those cases only in which the law relative to Stenographers shall have been complied with, on or before the 24th instant, will be continued on the Calendars. Notes of issue in new cases not on the present General Calendar, must be filed on or before the 24th instant.
2. Causes may be *generally reserved* by a written consent of the attorneys, filed at any time *before* the case is on the day calendar. Cases so reserved may afterwards be placed upon the day calendar, on the application of either party to the Judge *at Chambers*, provided two days' previous notice of such application be given to the adverse party.
3. All causes marked "*Off for the Term*," shall have priority at the succeeding term, and will be placed at the head of the calendar therefor.
4. Fifteen cases will be placed on each day calendar, and no calendar will be made for Saturdays.

5. At the General Terms, in appeal cases arising in *this Court*, the parties may, by consent, reserve the argument until the second week in term, when all so reserved will be called in their order on the calendar. In any action or contract, where there is reason to believe that the defence is interposed for delay, and that the trial will not occupy more than one hour, the plaintiff may, upon a notice of four days, apply *at Chambers* to have the cause placed upon the Special Calendar for short cases, and which will be made up for the last Friday in each Trial Term.

The notice must be accompanied by the affidavits (if any), upon which the motion will be founded.

If the motion be granted, the order to that effect shall forthwith be delivered to the Clerk, with a written notice specifying the number of the cause on the General Calendar.

Should the trial occupy more than one hour, it may be suspended, in the discretion of the Judge holding the Court, and the cause will thereupon be placed at the foot of the General Calendar, unless otherwise specially ordered.

FIRE COMPANIES.

There are fifty-one engine companies, fifty-five hose companies, and eighteen hook and ladder companies, nearly all of which are supplied with the necessary apparatus for service.

FIRE DISTRICTS.

The city is divided into eight Fire Districts, as follows :

The First Fire District shall comprise all that part of the city lying north of Twenty-second street, and east of the Sixth avenue.

The Second Fire District shall comprise all that part of the city lying north of Twenty-second street and west of the Sixth avenue.

The Third Fire District shall comprise all that part of the city bounded and containing as follows : Beginning at the foot of North Moore street, on the North River, and extending easterly in a straight line to the corner of Church and Leonard streets ; thence northerly, in a straight line, to the corner of Eighth avenue and Twenty-second street ; thence westerly, along Twenty-second street, to the North River ; thence southerly, along the North River, to the place of beginning.

The Fourth Fire District shall comprise all that part of the city bounded and containing as follows : Beginning at the corner of Leonard and Church streets ; running thence northerly, in a straight line, to the corner of Eighth avenue and Twenty-second street ; thence easterly, along Twenty-second street to Lexington avenue ; thence southerly, in a straight line, to the corner of Elm and Leonard streets ; and thence westerly, in a straight line, to the corner of Church and Leonard streets.

The Fifth Fire District shall comprise all that part of the city bounded and containing as follows : Commencing at the corner of Elm and Leonard streets ; and running thence northerly, in a straight line, to the corner of Lexington avenue and Twenty-second street ; thence easterly, along Twenty-second street, to the East river ; thence southerly, and along the East river, to Fourteenth street ; thence southwesterly, in a straight line, to the corner of Leonard and Baxter streets ; thence westerly, in a straight line, to the place of beginning.

The Sixth Fire District shall comprise all that part of the city bounded and containing as follows : Beginning at the corner of Leonard and Baxter streets, and running thence easterly, in a straight line, to the foot of Market street, on the East river ; thence along the East river to Fourteenth street ; thence southwesterly, in a straight line, to the place of beginning.

The Seventh Fire District shall comprise all that part of the city bounded and containing as follows : Beginning at the foot of Market street, on the East river, and running thence westerly, in a straight line, to the corner of Leonard and Elm streets ; thence southerly, along a straight line, intersecting Wall street, at the junction of Nassau, Wall, and Broad streets, and continued through the Battery to the North river.

The Eighth Fire District shall comprise all that part of the city bounded and containing as follows : Beginning at the foot of North Moore street, on the North river, and running thence easterly, in a straight line, to the corner of Leonard and Elm streets ; thence southerly, along a straight line, intersecting with Wall street, at the junction of Nassau, Wall, and Broad streets, and continued through the Battery to the North river.

In case of fire in the First District, the signal shall be one stroke from the alarm bells.

SIXTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, 1863.

To the Representatives of the Fire Department of the city of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The approaching termination of another year reminds your Trustees that it is their duty to furnish you with a statement of the transactions which you have intrusted them to perform; and although many events of great importance have transpired during the past twelve months, in which all have been more or less interested—events in which we have had cause for joy and sorrow—nevertheless, your Trustees, through the receipts from the various sources of revenue, have been enabled to dispense to all applicants sufficient to aid them in the hour of adversity. The Pension List for the past few years has steadily increased. There are now on the Pension List the names of three hundred and seventy-three widows of our deceased brethren, who annually receive the amount of twenty-five dollars; in addition to this amount, the Trustee of each district is empowered to, and does, furnish to those who are in need such additional sums as the circumstances of the respective applicants

require, and in some cases they look principally to the Fund for their support. The same applies to active and exempt firemen, who, by reason of accidents or sickness, cannot follow their respective occupations. In all cases prompt attention is given to each application.

As the changes in the Board of Representatives are frequent and numerous, your Trustees present to your notice a synopsis of the financial affairs of the Department. The city is divided into seven districts; a Trustee is assigned to each, whose duty it is to examine and attend to all applications for relief, which is furnished in money, fuel, shoes, &c.

No Trustee is allowed, except in urgent cases, to act in any district but his own, unless with the knowledge and consent of the Trustee of the district. Each Trustee acts on his own judgment in regard to ordinary applications under his control, and is held responsible to the Board for his acts. He is required to attend to any applicant who may be in the Hospital having a residence in his district, and see that proper attention is given to his comfort.

The President of the Board has charge of the recipients residing out of the city, and with him constitutes the Donation Committee, who choose their Chairman, and to whom they report quarterly, in writing, the names of the various applicants for assistance, with all circumstances in connection with the same, with the amount in money paid to each applicant. These accounts are examined by their Chairman, who enters them in a book provided for that purpose, and the bills placed on file. Prior to their annual meeting, these bills are examined by a Committee of the Board, and the same audited if found correct. Before placing the name on the Widows' Pension List, or granting any assistance, the Trustees are required to examine the Firemen's Register, to ascertain that the party or parties applying for relief are entitled to the same, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter.

All the revenue derived from various sources are required to be paid to the Treasurer, who is under bonds, to the amount of ten thousand dollars for the faithful performance of his trust, in accordance with the Charter and the laws of the Board of Representatives.

All moneys exceeding one hundred dollars received by him, are required and are deposited in the Butchers' and Drovers' Bank to the credit of the Fire Department, and can only be drawn by a resolution of a majority of the Board of Trustees, signed by the President and Secretary, directing the Treasurer to draw his check to the order of a Trustee, specifying the amount and object of the appropriation. Said check to be indorsed over to the party who is to receive it. The moneys on deposit draw interest. When any bond and mortgage is canceled, the amount must be re-invested, and no portion of the permanent fund can be expended unless by the direction of the Board of Representatives. From the foregoing it will be perceived that those who were the founders of this truly noble charity, over sixty

years since, placed all the safeguards around it to prevent any misapplication of the funds, and the principle adopted by the originators have faithfully been fulfilled.

The following are the principal sources of revenue for the past year :

From the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department for certificates, six thousand three hundred and twenty dollars (\$6,320), again placing the firemen the largest supporters of the fund.

From the agents of the foreign Fire Insurance Companies doing business in this city, six thousand two hundred and ninety-eight dollars and sixty cents (\$6,298.60).

From the gentlemen composing the Fireman's Ball Committee, the handsome sum of five thousand two hundred and seventy-five dollars and thirteen cents (\$5,275.13), being the net proceeds of the Thirty-fourth Annual Ball in aid of the funds. During the period of thirty-four years the Department has received the total amount of \$82,843.31 from this source. May they prosper in their future labors.

From the Honorable Common Council, the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

From Mr. Peter Cooper, a donation of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

From Messrs. Hecker & Bros., a donation of five hundred dollars (\$500).

From Mr. F. R. Lee, one hundred dollars (\$100), being a portion of a legacy bequeathed by a benevolent lady (deceased) to the charitable institutions of this city.

From Mr. Robert Carnley, fifty dollars.

From the proprietors of the Herald and Sun newspapers, the full amount of their bills against the Department, which donations are most respectfully acknowledged in behalf of the Department.

By referring to the annexed report of the Treasurer, you will find that at the last annual meeting there was a balance in the Butchers' and Drovers' Bank to the credit of the Department, amounting to three hundred and nineteen dollars and thirty-three cents (\$319.33). Since that period there has been paid to the Treasurer the sum of sixty-two thousand six hundred and seventy-seven dollars and ninety-nine cents (\$62,677.99), making in the aggregate the amount of sixty-two thousand nine hundred and ninety-seven dollars and thirty-two cents (\$62,997.32). In the above amount there was received from bonds and mortgages canceled, \$14,000; also, \$15,000 from temporary loans, making the actual receipts \$33,177.99.

The disbursements for the same period have, in the aggregate, amounted to \$62,338.85 including the amounts as follows: re-invested in bonds and mortgages, \$9,000; re-invested in Government Bonds, \$5,000 being a portion of the permanent fund; invested in Government Bonds, twenty-seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,750), making the Permanent Fund one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).

In addition to the above, there have been \$3,000 of the available fund temporarily loaned on Government securities, making the actual disbursements for the fiscal year the sum of \$31,088.85. Leaving a balance in the Butchers' and Drovers' Bank, to the credit of the Department, of the sum of \$658.47.

The permanent fund is invested as follows: Ninety-two thousand dollars in bonds and mortgages (\$92,000); seven thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars in Government bonds, and two hundred and fifty dollars in Manhattan Bank stock, making the total amount of the permanent fund the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000). By comparing the above with the last report it will be perceived that the sum of twenty-seven hundred and fifty dollars has been added to the permanent fund.

The School Committee have expended fourteen hundred and fifty-five dollars and seventy-eight cents for shoes (\$1,455.78).

The Fuel Committee have expended \$5,233.49.

The Donation Committee have expended, in relieving the numerous applicants, the sum of fourteen thousand and sixty dollars and ninety-three cents (\$14,060.93). This amount is exclusive of pensions, fuel, and shoes, principally given to widows and orphans who are unable to obtain a living without aid from this source, also the families of active and exempt firemen who have become indigent from sickness or injuries sustained in the discharge of their duties, proper respect being paid in furnishing assistance to those of our brethren deceased, in procuring respectable interment.

The Court of Appeals have lately rendered a decision adverse to the Department, in regard to a seizure of powder made some seven years ago. The powder in question was, at that time, supposed to have been legally condemned, and the proceeds paid into the fund. This decision will subject the Department to costs and value, an amount far exceeding the amount received from the sale. Your attention is especially called to the importance of taking prompt action in having said law amended, so as to protect the city from danger, and at the same time affording sufficient privileges to those engaged in the sale and transportation of powder, without detriment to their business. Your Trustees recommend that application be made to the Common Council to reimburse the Department for the amount which they will be subjected to pay in carrying out the provisions of a law passed for the benefit of our citizens in general.

During the past year the firemen of this city have been called to perform more than ordinary duty, and earnestly did they work at the risk of their lives, to save the property of their fellow-citizens—reserving the right, as citizens, to form their own opinion on all subjects. But in the discharge of their duty as firemen, they know no other law, principle, or duty, but to protect the lives and property of the inhabitants of New York city. And it is well that the public should know that they are determined and prepared to fulfill their duty, regardless of all circumstances.

As firemen, they belong to all classes without respect to rich or poor, high or low, in position of life. Their motto is to "Protect and Save," not to destroy, and it is a subject of congratulation to know that the community appreciate their deserving efforts to discharge their duty at any and all times, and more particularly during the exciting time of the past season.

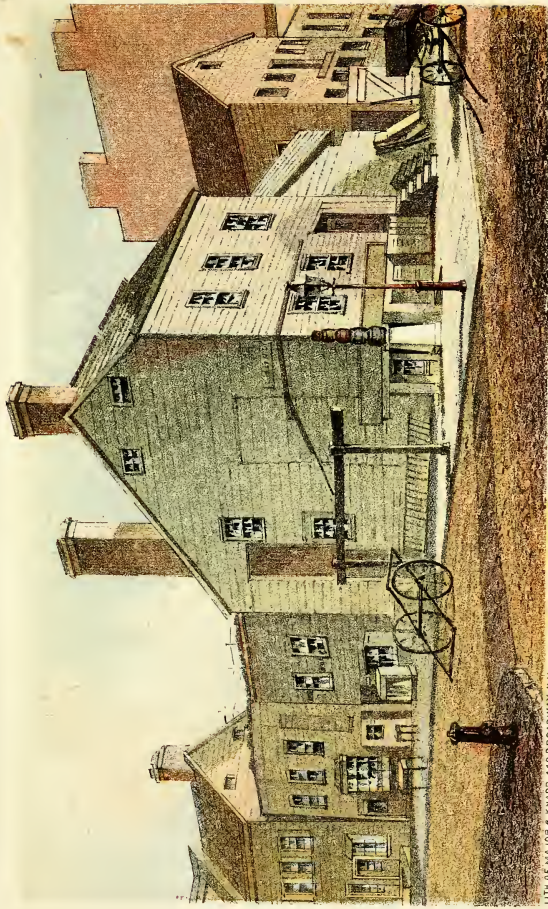

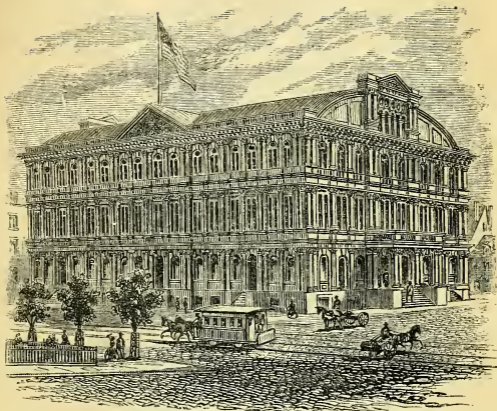

SEVENTH REGIMENT ARMORY.

THE Seventh Regiment Armory is situated on the east side of the Bowery or Third avenue, and occupies the block between Sixth and Seventh streets. It is constructed of iron, and is three stories high.

The first floor is used as a market, and known as "Tompkins Market." The second floor is divided into company armories and meeting rooms, which are fitted up and furnished at the expense of the several companies of the regiment. The third floor is used for a drill-room by the whole regiment. The basement or floor beneath the market has been prepared for target practice and squad drills.

By resolution of Common Council, approved April 6, 1855, the use of the armory was given the Seventh Regiment, New York National Guard, during the pleasure of the Common Council—but was not occupied until three years after said date.

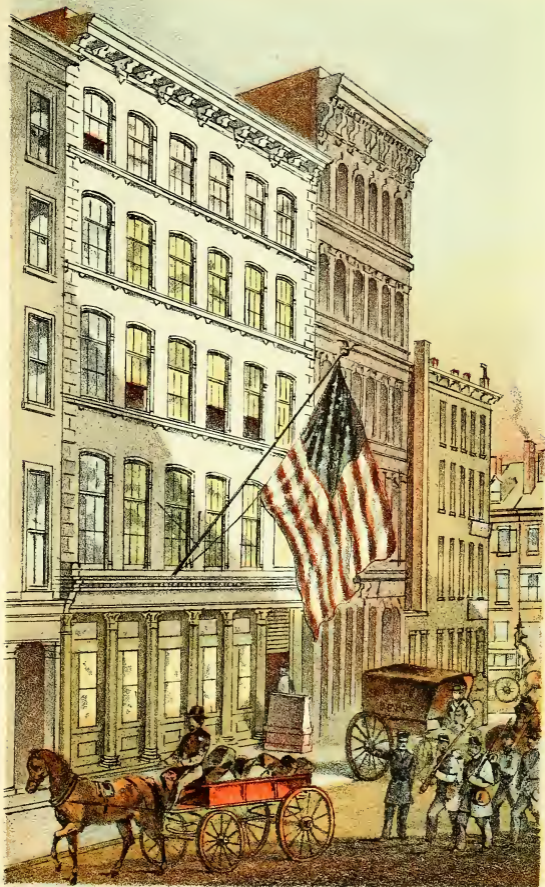

NEW YORK STATE SOLDIERS' DEPOT.

The New York State Soldiers' Depot, located at Nos. 50 and 52 Howard street, and No. 16 Mercer street, and established by the State Government as a temporary home or rest for furloughed and discharged soldiers, is now one of the most interesting and useful institutions in the city. It is based upon a fund of two hundred thousand dollars, appropriated by the State Legislature for the relief of soldiers of our own State, but its sphere of usefulness has been enlarged by the action of the National Government, from which it has received a liberal consideration in hospital stores, rations, and ambulance conveyance, on condition that its benefits should be extended to all soldiers in the service of the United States.

The building comprises washing and bathing rooms, barber's shop, kitchen, and store rooms; receiving room, and dining hall; reading and lounging hall, office, ladies' reception room, and board room; dormitory and matrons' apartments; hospital, dispensary, and surgeons' apartments; upper dormitory, store rooms, laundry, and domestic offices. The building is fitted up appropriately for the purposes to which it is devoted, and is kept in perfect cleanliness and order.

Under the system adopted at the depot, soldiers are protected on the trains and at the railroad depots by military couriers and station agents, and while at the institution are supplied with food, lodging, hospital attendance, and clothing, free of charge, until furnished with transportation to their destinations. Those who arrive in the city sick or penniless find the comforts of a home, and do not leave the depot until properly provided for. No one is turned away in want. Those who have money in their possession are induced to deposit it at the depot until they leave the city, and are thus saved from imposition and robbery. Under every conceivable circumstance the soldier finds protection and relief, and learns that his State appreciates his services and his sacrifices, and will not neglect the defenders of the Government. New York may justly be proud of such an Institution, for it has not its equal in any other State in the Union.

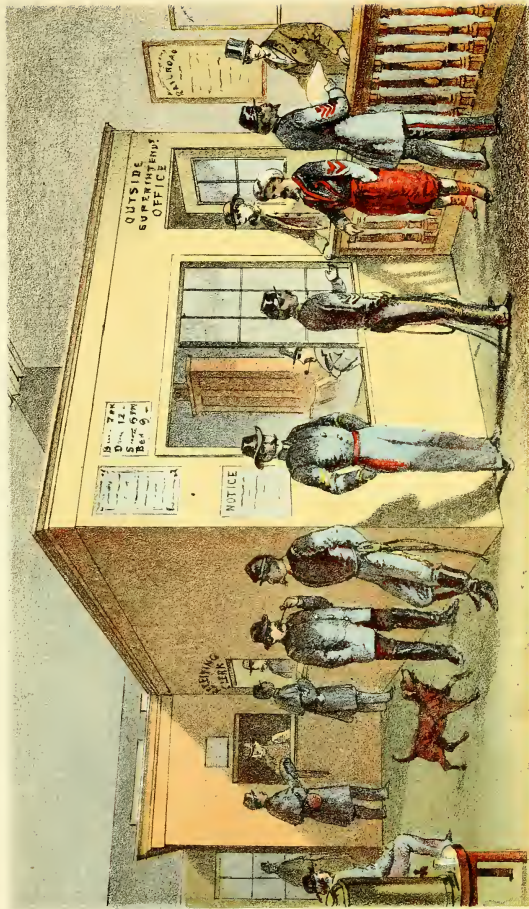

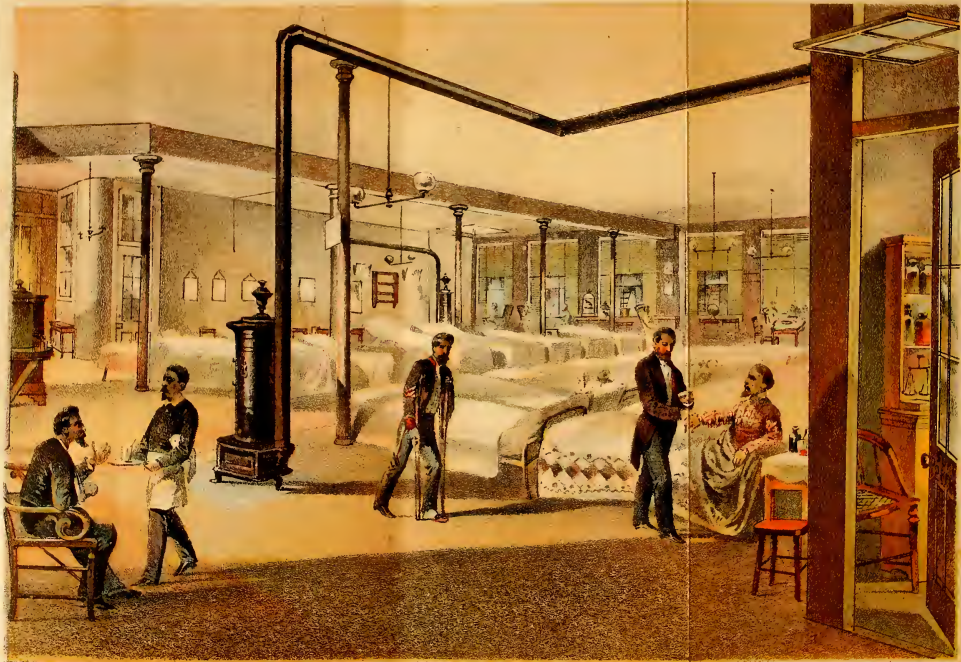
SOLDIER'S DEPOT - RECEIVING ROOM, (1ST FLOOR.)

Under the superintendence of Colonel Neville the discipline, order, and cleanliness of the building have attracted observation, and received the commendation of all visitors.

The rations for the soldiers are furnished by Mr. W. H. Walker, late United States contractor for subsistence, who fills his contract faithfully and to the satisfaction of all.

From the opening of the Institution, up to the 31st of December, 1863, a period of about six months, there had been received and relieved at the Institution 16,500 soldiers, and in the Hospital Department 4,018 cases had been treated. The deaths during the same period numbered 20. Those who die in the Institution are buried at Cypress Hill Cemetery, and when desired their remains are forwarded to their friends.

In addition to the relief and protection afforded at the Institution on Howard street, provision is made out of the legislative appropriation for the aid of our soldiers outside the State, in the service of the United States. This branch of the charity is confided to the hands of the Hon. John F. Seymour, as General Agent of the State, by whom the onerous and responsible duty has been discharged with zeal, fidelity, and efficiency.

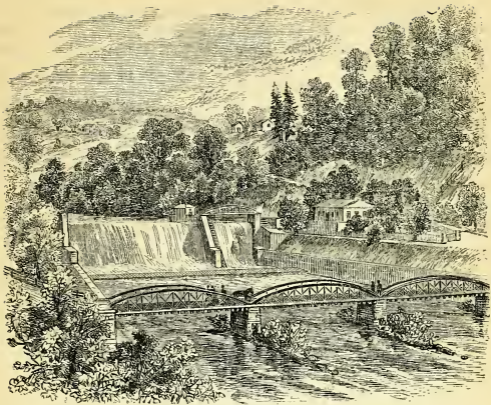

the people assembled to witness the introduction of water into the New Grand Reservoir, or Lake Manhatta, on the 19th day of August, 1862.

The Hon. Myndert Van Schaick may be justly regarded as the father of the great enterprise of introducing Croton water into the city of New York. He was, at the time of the inception of the project, a Senator from this city in the Legislature of the State; he framed the act to authorize the city authorities to undertake the work, and to incur the necessary expense to perfect it, and was mainly instrumental in effecting the passage of the act. His intimate connection with the successful prosecution and completion of the work is well known to our citizens. He has almost exclusively devoted his rare executive talent and administrative ability to the completion of the stupendous undertaking of supplying the city with the pure waters of the Croton—an event that, to his clear perception of the requirements of our population, was so indispensably necessary to the health, comfort, and convenience of every inhabitant of our city.

The Hon. Myndert Van Schaick, on the occasion above referred to, delivered the following address:

FELLOW-CITIZENS—The spectacle which we have been invited this day to witness, is truly full of grandeur. This reservoir lake, large enough to float a navy, or dock our stateliest steamers and merchantmen, the greatest work of its character in this country or age, is this day completed. All the former problems in relation to it are now solved triumphantly. The Engineers have opened their majestic gates, and the Croton river rushes, fathoms deep, to fill it up, obediently to their will. The whole project, from first to last, has been one based on principles, accurate calculation, and pure philanthropy, amalgamating all parties, all divisions of men, and all varieties of political opinion, during extraordinary changes of time and circumstance. Would to God that this people, the people of this city and of this country, could be as harmonious in everything else as we have been in this!

It is a work not only successfully accomplished, but it is worthy of its designers, its friends, early and late; of legislators who favored it, and of the great city which has executed it, amid pressures and panics, commercial and political changes in peace, and finished it amidst the calamities of a bloody and unjustifiable rebellion. I am truly happy that my life has been spared to this day. I may, perhaps, be pardoned if I express more than a usual amount of satisfaction as I cast my eyes beyond and around me on this admirable structure, this, our great municipal monument, not for the glory of a day, but endurance through all time. I was with this project in its infancy, I have watched its progress with unceasing anxiety. I see it now in its maturity with irrepressible satisfaction. Millions yet unborn, as they succeed each other in the

waves of future generations, will honor the foresight of those who gave it life, and admire the intelligence and the power with which so grand a design was so perseveringly carried through. I stand with but a few of the original and surviving friends of this work, and I regret we could not all stand, side by side, as we once did, and enjoy the fruits of our mutual toil, more than rewarded by such a sight as this.

To supply the city of New York with pure and wholesome water, words now familiar to every citizen, was the early thought of some leading minds in former days. The subject was much discussed in pamphlets and news journals, and some eminent engineers at that time gave the subject their attention. The wells were insufficient, so much so that water was retailed by the bucket at our doors, and not the best in flavor, nor in any great quantity. The Manhattan Company was the next source looked to for even a moderate supply, and it was also proposed to use the Hudson, to change its salt water into fresh, and bring it, by force, into reservoirs, with cumbrous machinery. After years of discussion, it was suggested that the Bronx river might be diverted from its channel, and, with the water of Rye and other ponds, be brought to the island. This idea seemed to be the most plausible, and for a time it carried the most weight, and was acted upon by the Common Council of 1831.

In this state of public opinion, the cholera of 1832 arrived among us, and as it then so happened that one of my daily official duties was, with my associates in the Board of Health, to contrive such measures as would mitigate this pestilence, nothing struck us with such force, so irresistibly, indeed, as the conviction that New York must at once, if possible, be supplied with pure and wholesome water. There was but one sentiment on the subject. It grew as it was considered, and assumed proportions too vast to be overlooked. That so large a city as it then was, so large as it was inevitably to become, should be without this universal gift of Heaven, seemed no longer admissible. We had water everywhere, but little fit to drink. The habitations of the rich as well as of the poor were on the same footing precisely in this want of a common friend. Large cities without water and sewerage become the homes of pestilence, and are paralyzed in their efforts for expansion and life. They are desolated by fire and become frightful ruins.

In considering the objects which had relation to the construction of this reservoir, it was necessary not only to regard the wants of the present, but of the future, the capacity, the head, the locality, and the safety and convenient position of the structures themselves. There were possible accidents to be guarded against of various kinds. In short, the precautions to be taken were many, and the highest skill was requisite to anticipate the methods of providing against every error.

It is not in the single light of individual comfort we may view this sub-

ject. The precious water we drink so safely and so freely does more. It is an agent of our prosperity. It pours its torrents upon the fires which threaten our warehouses and our residences. Driven by steam, which it also supplies, it breaks in cataracts upon the highest roofs. It supplies a large number of our workshops with motive-power. Free from sediment or corrosive substances, it is universally sought to fill the boilers of our steam-engines. It sets them at work also, and drives the machinery of many hundred factories with a power of thousands of horses, equal to the force of many thousand men. Our ships and steamers carry it to sea, and it remains potable during the longest voyages. Our streets are cooled from its numerous hydrants. Our garments are kept pure and cleanly by its ablutions. Fountains throw up their beautiful spray by its force. Our pleasure lakes in this park are kept full and fresh by its supplies, a glassy mirror for winter amusements, and a lovely water in summer for aquatic recreation. In all respects, in every way, our city, soon to become the greatest, not only on this continent, but in those beyond the Atlantic, is thoroughly, completely, and forever supplied with an element of health, wealth, and security, which no other city on the globe can surpass.

Well may we assemble together to-day to celebrate an event so auspicious. Nor should we forget to honor those men whose science, practical knowledge, and mechanical labor have contributed to this wonderful work. No one has had a better opportunity than myself, through the means of my long connection with the Croton Board, of knowing how much is due to the eminent ability of Alfred W. Craven, the Chief Engineer; to George S. Green, the engineer in charge of the work; and to the fidelity and perseverance of those eminent contractors, Messrs. Fairchild, Walker, Coleman, and Brown. Nor should we forget the valuable aid we have received from the press of New York, which has never deserted the good cause; but, disagreeing as they might on other subjects, have never been other than unanimous on this. May they always continue to act with equal patriotism and as excellent sense.

And to the people of this city we owe our thanks for the steadiness with which, in times past, they have sustained this policy, with the readiness with which they have met taxation to secure its triumph, and the punctuality with which they pay into the treasury their annual dues for their supplies.

If the city of Paris this day has, out of a revenue of one hundred and sixty-one millions of francs, a clear surplus of ninety-two millions, equal to eighteen millions four hundred thousand dollars, with a population that exceeds our own only by a third, though recently enlarged in its barriers, what may we not expect from the good management of our own? And when the Croton debt is paid, may we not anticipate a large

surplus income from this aqueduct, and a reduction in our taxes to an economical standard?

And what will be the verdict of posterity, to whom these perennial waters are to flow down as bright and healthful as ever? Will they not think well of those men, of their sagacity, their enterprise, and their perseverance, who created for them such a heritage, and have left them such a priceless possession.

We are now passing through great trials, witnessing great events; we are sorely put to a test of the stability of our beloved institutions, under which we have so long prospered, under whose benign influence so many great and useful works have been completed. We cannot doubt that the final result will be as certain for us, as any other which has power, truth, patriotism, and justice on its side. We have gone on in the North with the steadiness of undisturbed peace, and here is an example of the grandeur of one city of a single State, so advanced in the useful arts, so studious of the welfare of its people, as to continue to the end without pause or panic, in the construction of the greatest and most useful work of the Union. It will be a lesson for future ages of the nobleness of our objects, and the wise application of our strength. And though so large an assemblage will never have occasion to meet here for such a purpose again, the millions of our posterity, grateful for the boon we give to-day, will never cease to express their admiration for what has now been done. We have shown to the wondering nations of the Old World, in this beautiful park and this magnificent hydraulic work, what can be accomplished by earnest and thoughtful republican men, under republican institutions, for private comfort and the common welfare. We have shown how the principle of association carries us through the execution of great public works, the property of all, dear to us all, and defended by us all; how we stand by each other in all these enterprises, counsel together over their incipency, and rejoice together over their happy conclusion; and finally, how we have heretofore, in the discharge of our duties as citizens, proved ourselves worthy of the privileges we enjoy, worthy of such a monument as that which we now behold with admiration; and we trust that it will be preserved and remain a blessing to the generations of free, civilized, and Christian men who may inhabit this city forever.

I will conclude these remarks by making the following brief statement of the practical results.

The water property which belongs to the city may be enumerated as follows:

The Croton Dam, at which the water is collected and discharged into the Aqueduct.

A portion of this structure has been much improved under the direction of the Chief Engineer.

The Aqueduct conducts the water to the city, a distance of forty miles. It must be superintended and watched by the most reliable men.

The High Bridge, over the Harlem river, is about 1,400 feet across. The construction of that work upon a high elevation was procured by the exertion of the late Charles Henry Hall with the Legislature, instead of a low bridge or syphon.

The Receiving Reservoir, below Eighty-sixth street, covering thirty acres of land.

The Distributing Reservoir, below Forty-second street.

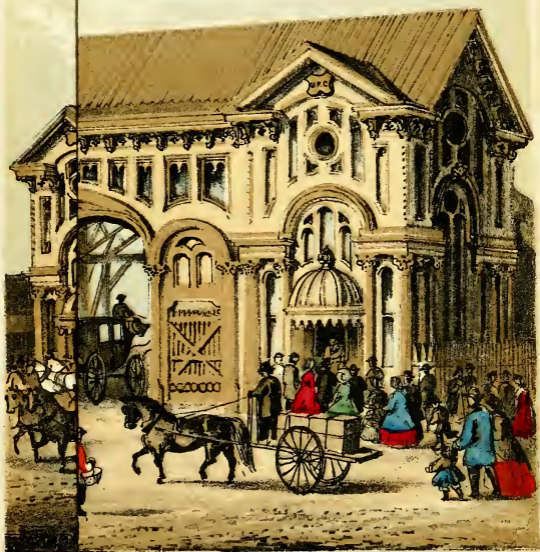

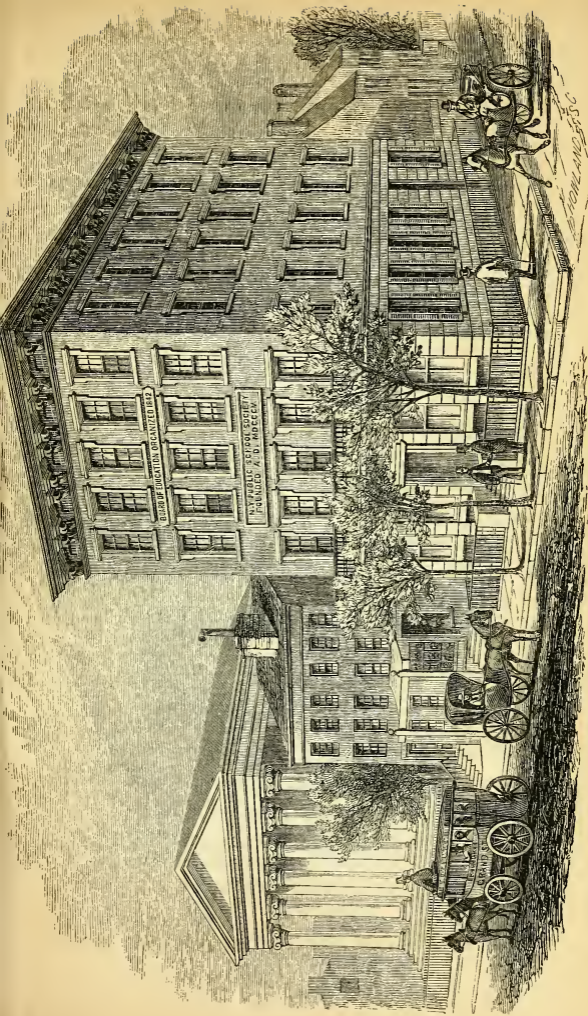

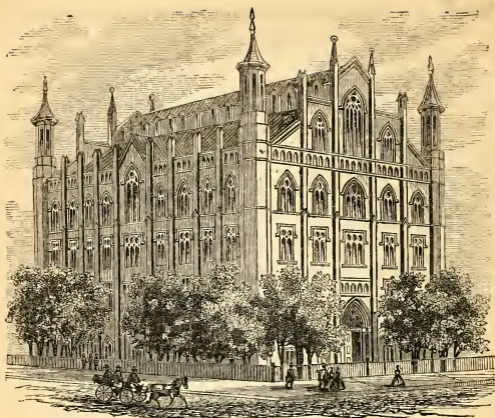

THE FREE ACADEMY.

The Free Academy of the city of New York is the first institution established in this State by the popular sovereignty, and maintained at the public expense, for the purpose of extending to the pupils of the Common Schools the advantages of free education in those higher departments of learning, which cannot be obtained but at a considerable expense in the colleges previously established in this State. It was intended to be the complement of the system of free public schools—making them complete and available for all classes of the people, and by

their courses of studies and means of instruction, fitted to meet the wants of all, from the elementary instruction of early childhood to the more various and profound studies in literature and science which constitute the higher departments of collegiate learning.

The Board of Education of the city of New York took the first action in reference to the establishment of this institution, by the adoption of a resolution, introduced by Commissioner Townsend Harris, July 27, 1846, raising a Committee to report upon the subject. On January 20, 1847, a report was presented by said Committee, recommending the establishment of "*a Free College or Academy*," and presenting its design, nature, and objects, in this language: "Your Committee will not at present enter into the details of the proposed institution, but will briefly remark, that their design is to offer the idea of a college, which, while it shall be in no way inferior to any of our colleges in the character, amount, or value of the information given to the pupils, the course of studies to be pursued will have more especial reference to the active duties of operative life, rather than those more particularly regarded as necessary for the pulpit, bar, or the medical profession."

The report was published, and considered at a meeting of the Board, held on the 10th of February, 1847, when a Committee was appointed to draft a memorial, in the name of the Board, to be presented to the Legislature, praying, among other things:

First—"That the Legislature will be pleased to pass a law directing the Regents of the University to pay over to the Board of Education such amount of the literature fund as may be apportioned by them to the third, fourth, fifth, and sixth Senate Districts of this State; such moneys to be applied to the support of a free college or academy, in the city of New York, for the instruction of students who have been pupils in the Common Schools of the said city."

Second—"That the Legislature will further authorize the Board of Education in said city to call on the Supervisors, from time to time, to raise by tax such sums as may be required for the erecting, furnishing, and fitting up of said college or academy, and supporting the same, such sums to be notified to, and raised by the said Supervisors, in the same manner and under the same heading of taxation that the moneys for the support of Common Schools in said city are now raised."

The memorial was drafted, and presented to the Legislature, offering, among others, the following views and purposes:

"One of the important objects designed to be secured by establishing a Free Academy is, to bring the advantages of the best education that any school in our country can give within the reach of all the children of the city, whose genius, capacity, and desire of attainments are such as to render it reasonably certain that they may be made, and by such means would become, eminently useful to society; the permanency of our free

institutions, the future state of society, the extent to which the laws of the country will be regarded, and social quiet and order preserved, depend essentially upon the virtue and intelligence of the people."

"Another object of the proposed free institution is, to create an additional interest in, and more completely popularize, the Common Schools. It is believed that they will be regarded with additional favor, and attended with increased satisfaction, when the pupils and their parents feel that the children who have received their primary education at these schools can be admitted to all the benefits and advantages furnished by the best endowed college in the State, without any expense whatever. It is believed that such an institution as the proposed Free Academy is designed to be, in addition to the great benefits it will confer by annually graduating a large number of highly-educated young men, destined to pursue some of all the various pursuits of life, would stimulate tens of thousands, who might never enter into this academy, to additional industry and greater advances while in the Common Schools. The certainty, to a young man of good abilities and desirous of making large acquisitions in knowledge, of having the opportunity of gaining as extensive an education as can be acquired in any institution in the State, if his parents can only furnish him the means to subsist at home, is in the highest degree cheering, while the certainty that the limited earnings of his parents will preclude him, in the existing state of things, from having any such advantages, tends to repress such generous aspirations, paralyze effort, and prevent the full development of his ability to become extensively useful to the class in which his lot may be cast, or to society at large."

Such were the objects presented to the Legislature, to induce the passage of the law authorizing the establishment of the Free Academy. The people were promised an institution which, in the character, amount, and value of the education imparted, should be inferior to none of our colleges, and at the same time should be so organized that the course of studies to be pursued would tend to educate the pupils practically, and particularly qualify them to apply their learning to advance and perfect the operations of the various trades and occupations in which they may engage; and, also, to furnish peculiar facilities for instruction of the highest order in various branches of knowledge, omitted altogether, or not practically taught, in our colleges. These views were approved by the Board, and concurred in by the succeeding Boards, who always have considered the Academy as a part of the Common School system of the city, by which, in easy and continuous development, students may pass on, as far as they are able, to the higher levels of literary and scientific education; an institution uniting in a properly progressive system the usual duties of the American Academy and the American College, retaining always its characteristic peculiarity of an agency of the Government in offering to all the people, equally, the means of educating their sons, up to the point from which they respectively are to start in the pursuits

of manhood and citizenship, and meeting the wants not only of those whose wealth is largely taxed to support education, but of those, more numerous, whose aggregate taxes are still larger, and also those whose more slender resources are subject to no direct pecuniary tax, but who, in numberless indirect exactions, contribute their full share in supporting the burdens of organized society.

The act authorizing the Board to establish a Free Academy was passed May 7, 1847, providing, as a condition to its becoming a law, that the question, whether such academy should be established according to its provisions, should be submitted to the people at the election to be held on the first Monday of June, 1847, and that a majority of the votes given must be in favor of the proposition. The question was so submitted, and 19,404 votes were given in favor of it, to 3,409 against—leaving a majority of 15,995.

ORGANIZATION OF THE FREE ACADEMY.

By the statute, it is made the duty of the Board of Education :

“To continue to furnish, through the Free Academy, the benefits of education, gratuitously, to persons who have been pupils in the Common Schools of the said city and county, for a period of time to be regulated by the Board of Education, not less than one year.

“To supervise, manage, and govern said Free Academy, and make all needful rules and regulations therefor; fix the number and compensation of teachers and others to be employed therein; prescribe the preliminary examination, and the terms and conditions on which pupils shall be received and instructed therein and discharged therefrom; direct the course of studies therein, and provide in all things for the good government and management of the said Free Academy; and purchase the books, apparatus, stationery, and other things necessary and expedient to enable the said Free Academy to be properly and successfully conducted, and to keep the said building or buildings properly repaired and furnished. And the Board, upon the recommendation of the Faculty of the Free Academy, may grant the usual degrees and diplomas in the arts to such persons as shall have completed a full course of study in the said Free Academy.

“To appoint annually a standing committee of not less than five persons of their number, who shall, subject to the control, supervision, and approbation of the said Board, constitute an Executive Committee, for the care, government, and management of the said Free Academy, under the rules and regulations prescribed, as aforesaid, whose duty it shall be to make detailed reports to the said Board of Education, and, among other things, to recommend the rules and regulations which they deem necessary and proper for the said Academy.”

The organization of the institution, based on the above enactments, is shown in the following digest of the by-laws of the Board of Education and regulations of the Faculty.

REQUISITES FOR ADMISSION.

The examination of candidates for admission takes place immediately after the general examination in July, and continues at the same hours every day, until concluded. No student can be admitted to the Academy unless he resides in the city, be fourteen years of age, shall have attended the Common Schools in the city twelve months, and shall pass a good examination in

Spelling,	Algebra, as far as quadratic equations,
Reading,	Geography, [inclusive,
Writing,	History of the United States,
English Grammar,	Constitution of the United States,
Arithmetic,	Elementary Book-keeping.

No candidate can be examined for admission unless he shall present to the Principal of the Academy a certificate, in the form prepared by the Executive Committee, signed by the Principal of the school or schools of which he has been a member, and specifying the age of the candidate, the Common Schools of the city which he has attended, the length of time in each, and when. If the number qualified for admission be more than can be admitted, the preference is given to those who have attended the Common Schools the greater period.

At either of the regular examinations, members may be admitted to one or all of the classes, to pursue the studies of any one or more departments, provided they shall have attended the Common Schools the requisite period, shall be of the proper age, shall pass the proper examination in the requisites for admission, and also an examination satisfactory to the Faculty, in the previous studies of the class or departments to which they are to be admitted.

No person is allowed to be present at the examination, except the instructors in the Academy and members of the Board of Education, and other school officers; neither are the names of the candidates, nor the schools from which they come, made known to the instructors conducting the examination, but each candidate is designated during examination by a number given to him on a card, by the Principal. Only the names of such as have passed a good examination are afterwards ascertained, in order to be inscribed on the rolls of the Academy.

Students are not allowed to reside or board in the Academy; they reside or board with their parents or guardians. By removing from the city, they forfeit their right to remain in the Institution.

Graduates may become resident graduates, and continue their studies at option.

DISCIPLINE.

The discipline of the Academy is mild, persuasive, and just, but steady, strict, and unyielding. The law on this point is clear and explicit.

“Every student,” it says, “shall conduct himself according to the

rules of good manners, good morals, and manly propriety; shall give punctual and constant attendance to all his duties; shall use the property of the Institution with care and economy, and restore the same when required."

The punishments inflicted in the Academy are demerit marks, private admonition, admonition by the Principal in presence of the Section and of the instructor in the recitation-room, suspension by direction of the Principal, public admonition by the Principal in presence of all the students at roll call, final admonition by the Principal in a meeting of the Faculty, and dismissal for misconduct, to be directed by a vote of the Faculty.

Every violation of the rules is recorded in the *Book of Discipline*, together with the degree of punishment inflicted, and the amount of demerits received. No student is demerited without receiving notice of the fact, and the cause.

Every student admitted into the Academy receives a certificate thereof, stating that on leaving the Institution with a good character, after one year, he shall receive another certificate or diploma, stating the period he has been in the Academy, and the studies there pursued by him; and, provided he shall have satisfactorily accounted for all the books and other property committed to him, and shall have maintained a good character, he shall, on so leaving the Academy, receive such diploma; but no student shall receive a certificate of dismissal if he be dismissed for misconduct; and, in each certificate, it shall be stated that he is furnished with a statement of his standing in the Academy, as it shall appear on the records during his whole connection with the Academy.

New York Consolidated Stage Company.

This Company was formed under an act of the Legislature, passed April 4, 1854, entitled, "An act to regulate Stage Routes in the City of New York, and to provide for the formation of companies to operate the same."—*Laws of New York, Seventy-seventh Session, Chapter 142, page 325.*)

It is composed of the following lines, viz. :

ROUTE—From Forty-second street to Broadway, to Whitehall street, to South Ferry—30 two-horse stages.

ROUTE—From Thirty-second street and Fourth avenue; down Fourth avenue, Broadway, and Whitehall street, to South Ferry—40 two-horse stages.

ROUTE—From avenue B and Fourteenth street; through avenue B to Tenth street; through Tenth street to avenue A, to Eighth street, to Broadway, to Whitehall street, to South Ferry; with permission to extend their line through Tenth street to the Greenpoint ferry, East River—27 two-horse stages.

ROUTE—From Forty-second street, down Seventh and Greenwich avenues, to Amity street, to Broadway; to and through Broadway to Fulton street, to Fulton Ferry—13 two-horse stages.

ROUTE—From Wall street ferry, up Wall street, to Broadway; up Broadway to Forty-second street; through Forty-second street to the Crystal Palace—20 two-horse stages.

ROUTE—Commencing at Second avenue and Thirty-fourth street, down Second avenue to Fourteenth street, to Broadway; down Broadway to Barclay street ferry—1 two-horse stage.

ROUTE—From Hudson River Railroad depot, through Thirty-first street, or one of the neighboring streets; to and through Ninth avenue to Fourteenth street, to Broadway; down Broadway to Whitehall street and South ferry—30 two-horse stages.

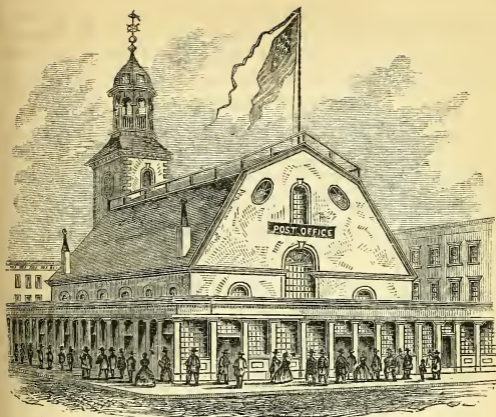

FORMATION OF WARDS.

In 1683, the city of New York was divided into six wards, under the designation of "South," "Dock," "East," "North," "West," and "Out" Wards; for map showing the boundaries of these wards, see page 212 of Manual of Common Council for 1848.

The Montgomerie Charter, dated January 15, 1730, designates, in addition to the above, the boundaries of the "Montgomerie" Ward.

By an act of the colonial government, passed February 28, 1791, the wards are designated numerically from 1 to 7, and the bounds of each described.

By an act of the Legislature, passed March 8, 1803, the wards are increased to nine, numerically designated, and boundaries described.

The Tenth Ward was erected from the Seventh, by act of March 18, 1808.

The Eleventh and Twelfth Wards were formed and the boundaries of all described, by an act passed April 25, 1825. (Chap. 195, Laws of 1825.)

HISTORICAL.

Biographical Sketches of the Principal Public Men in the City of New York, during the English Colonial Era.

BY D. T. V.

[The compiler desires to acknowledge the great facilities afforded, in addition to the ordinary sources of compilation, by the documents relating to the Colonial History of the State, and the notes thereto.]

JAMES ALEXANDER.

ALEXANDER, JAMES, a native of Scotland, was an officer of engineers in the service of the Pretender, and, from political motives, removed to New York in 1715. He soon after received an appointment in the office of the Secretary of the Province, and was appointed Surveyor-General of New York and New Jersey. In 1720, he was called to the Council under Gov. Burnet's administration. While in the Secretary's office he studied law, in which profession, "though," according to Smith's History, "by no means distinguished as a public speaker, he attained great eminence from his profound legal knowledge, sagacity, and penetration, was regularly consulted on the most important questions, and his replies were received as the answers of an oracle." In 1726 he married the widow of David Provoost, a wealthy Dutch merchant, and ex-Mayor of New York. Mr. Alexander died in 1756, leaving a considerable estate. His children were William, afterwards Lord Stirling; Mary, married to Peter Van Brugh Livingston; Elizabeth, to John Stevens; Catharine, to Walter Rutherford; and Susannah, to John Reed.

WILLIAM ALEXANDER.

ALEXANDER, WILLIAM (Earl of Stirling), son of James Alexander, was born at New York, in 1726, was educated in the best school in the Province, and was especially proficient in mathematical studies.

He was first clerk, and afterwards partner of his mother, in whose name the business of her former husband continued to be conducted. The firm contracted for supplying the King's troops with clothing and provisions, which led Mr. Alexander to joining the commissariat of the army. He attracted the notice of Gen. Shirely, to whom he became aid and private secretary. In 1756, he accompanied the General to England, and while there advanced his claims to the vacant earldom of Stirling. He based his pretensions upon his descent from an uncle of the first Earl, who had died in the course of the preceding century. By a proceeding in the Scotch law, in the nature of an inquisition held on the death of an ancestor, to ascertain, by the verdict of a jury, the person entitled to succession, he was found in 1759 nearest male heir to the last deceased Earl. He thereupon assumed the title, and petitioned the House of Lords to recognize his right to the peerage. In consequence of the death of his mother, in 1760, he returned to America in 1761, leaving his claim before the House of Lords, in the hands of counsel. It was not, however, allowed, and he was restricted from assuming the title. He, however, disregarded the restriction, and was always recognized in America by his title. In 1768, he removed to Baskenridge, New Jersey, and became a member of the Provincial Council. He took part with his countrymen in the Revolutionary struggle. In 1775, he was commissioned Colonel. In 1776, became Brigadier-General, and served in various actions during the war. In 1781, he was in command of the Northern Department, with headquarters at Albany, where he died in 1783, from an attack of the gout. Lord Stirling's wife was Sarah, daughter of Philip Livingston. He left two daughters, but no son.

SIR EDMUND ANDROS.

ANDROS, SIR EDMUND was born in London in 1637. His family was a distinguished one in the island of Guernsey. Having remained faithful to the royal cause during Cromwell's protectorate, he was rewarded after therestoration with the favor of the King. In 1672, he was in command of the forces in Barbadoes. In 1674 he was appointed Governor of New York, where he arrived with his wife in the same year. In 1678, he was knighted. In 1681 he returned to England, and was appointed Gentleman of the King's Privy Chamber. In 1686 he was made Governor of the New England Colonies, and his jurisdiction was extended in 1688 over New York and New Jersey. His wife, a daughter of Sir Thomas Craven, to whom he was married in 1671, died in Boston in 1688. The following year, Sir Edmund Andros was deposed by a

rising of the people of New England, and after some months' imprisonment he was sent to England, in 1690. In 1692, he was appointed Governor of Virginia, where he remained until 1698. In 1704 he was appointed Governor of Guernsey. He died without issue, at Westminster, in 1713, aged 76 years.

EDWARD ANTILL.

ANTILL, EDWARD, an Englishman by birth, became a resident of this city about the time of the arrival of Gov. Dongan, with whom he appears to have had some commercial relations. He engaged in trade in this city, and is found as a resident here in 1703, when his domestic establishment consisted of one male, one female, four children, two negroes, and seven negro children. He was a practicing lawyer in this city at that period.

CHARLES WARD APTHORPE.

APTHORPE, CHARLES WARD, a gentleman of English birth, was resident at Bloomingdale for some years previous to the Revolutionary War. He was appointed a member of the Governor's Council in 1763, and held this office until the Peace of 1783. He was a loyalist, and for that reason, a considerable property which he held in Massachusetts was confiscated. His name, however, does not appear in the New York Statute of Confiscation of 1779.

WILLIAM ATWOOD.

ATWOOD, WILLIAM, was appointed Chief Justice of the Province, with jurisdiction also extending to New England and New Jersey, in the year 1700, and arrived here in 1701. He was then a resident of England. He was immediately appointed one of the Governor's Council. He presided over the trial of Col. Bayard, and other anti-Leslerian factionists, and took an open part against the parties indicted. The advent of Gov. Cornbury, who sided with the anti-Leslerian party, led to the suspension of Judge Atwood, and he soon after departed for England.

GOLDSBOROW BANYAR.

BANYAR, GOLDSBOROW, was born in London, in the year 1724, and came to this country about the year 1737; was appointed Auditor-General in 1746, and served as Deputy Clerk of the Council for some years. In 1752 he was appointed Register of the Court of Chancery,

and in the following year Judge of Probate. He remained in public office until the termination of the British rule, and subsequently continued his residence at Albany, in this State. He also filled some considerable offices under the State Government, and died at Albany in the year 1815, at the age of 91 years, leaving a large estate to his family. He had married, in 1767, Elizabeth Mortier, daughter of the then British Paymaster-General. This lady died in 1809.

JOHN BARBARIE.

BARBARIE, JOHN, a French Huguenot, was a merchant in this city, and a prominent officer in the French Church. In politics he was an anti-Leislerite. He was a member of the Provincial Council during several years, and died in this city about the year 1727.

REV. HENRY BARCLAY, D.D.

BARCLAY, REV. HENRY, D.D., was a native of Albany, and son of Rev. Thomas Barclay, first Episcopal minister of that city. He graduated at Yale College in 1734, and was appointed Catechist to the Mohawk Indians in 1736. He went to England, to be ordained, in the winter of 1737-'8, and was immediately made a missionary to the Indians. He continued among the Mohawks until 1746, when he was inducted Rector of Trinity Church, in the city of New York. He received the degree of D.D. from Oxford College in 1761. He died August 27, 1764.

NICHOLAS BAYARD.

BAYARD, NICHOLAS, a prominent public man, as well under the Dutch as the English administrations, was a native of Holland, and came to New Netherland with Governor Stuyvesant, of whom he was a relative. In 1666 he married Judith Verlett, in this city. His occupation was a brewer; filled various offices under the Dutch, was Secretary to Governor Colve, and member of his Council. Was Mayor of New York in 1685, and a member of the English Provincial Council for many years. Was a prominent opponent of Leisler, and retired from the city during the latter's administration; but having clandestinely returned was imprisoned and placed in irons. Was active in urging the execution of Leisler. Returned to power under Governors Sloughter and Fletcher; was suspended from the Council by Governor Bellomont; was tried for treason, convicted, and sentenced to death. His conviction was reversed on appeal to the courts

in England, and an act of Parliament passed in relation thereto. He was regarded as the "Dutch head of the English party," in the troublesome era towards the close of the 17th century. He died in the year 1711.

SAMUEL BAYARD.

BAYARD, SAMUEL, was a native of this city, and son of the foregoing. He married Margareta Van Cortland on 12th March, 1696; was a local politician of some influence. His occupation was that of a merchant.

STEPHEN BAYARD.

BAYARD, STEPHEN, a native of this city; married in 1729 Alida Vetch. He was prominent among the leading business men of his day, and was also influential in public life. Was a member of Gov. Colden's Council in 1746, but was suspended in the following year by Governor Clinton. He was opposed to the liberal party in the political strifes of his day.

GERARDUS BEEKMAN.

BEEKMAN, GERARDUS, was a son of William Beekman, a leading citizen in the times of the Dutch. He was a physician by profession, and became prominent in politics as an adherent of Leisler in 1689-'90. He was a member of the Council of Leisler, and after the fall of the latter, Mr. Beekman was tried for treason, convicted, and sentenced to death. Efforts were made to induce him to sue for pardon, which he declined. He was pardoned by the King's order, in March, 1694. He was subsequently a member of the Provincial Council under the governments of Cornbury, Hunter, and Burnet. He died in the year 1724.

BELLOMONT.

BELLOMONT (RICHARD COOLE), first Earl of, and second Baron of Coloony, in the County of Sligo, was born in the year 1636. He succeeded to his father's title of Baron of Colooney in July, 1683, and went over to the Continent after the accession of James II., and was one of the first to espouse the interest of the Prince of Orange. The King of Great Britain ordered his return, and in 1688 he became member of Parliament. In March, 1689, he was appointed treasurer

to Queen Mary, and he was soon after created Earl of Bellomont. He was appointed to supersede Governor Fletcher as Colonial Governor, and arrived at New York April 2, 1698. He immediately took a political position on the side of the Leislerian party, and during his short administration of affairs in this province, the most violent political agitation took place between the respective factions, which was only terminated by his death, which took place in this city on the 5th of March, 1701. The Earl was married in the year 1660 to Catherine, daughter of John Naufan, Esq., of the county of Worcester, England. He left two sons, Naufan and Richard, who successively inherited their father's title. The body of the Earl was interred under the chapel in the fort. After the leveling of the fort, in 1790, the remains were removed to St. Paul's churchyard. The widow of the Earl remained in this city for two or three years after his death, and then returned to England. She married there Samuel Pytts, Esq.

ISAAC BEDLOW

BEDLOW, ISAAC, an English merchant, resident from an early period in New Amsterdam, became factor for Lord Lovelace after the accession of the English. He died in New York in 1672, his widow, Elizabeth, surviving him.

ABRAHAM BRASHER.

BRASHER, ABRAHAM, a native of this city, of Dutch descent, was one of the leading adherents to the party of Leisler, in 1689-90. For his part in those troubles he was indicted, convicted, and condemned to suffer death, but was afterwards pardoned. He was a block and pump-maker, married Elizabeth Schouten, in 1690.

JOHN BRIDGES, LL. D.

BRIDGES, JOHN, LL. D., an English barrister, was appointed Chief Justice of this Province in August, 1702. He was a friend of Lord Cornbury, then recently appointed Governor, who procured his appointment. He brought with him to this country an extensive law library, and being in favor with the ruling powers in the province, a career of prosperity seemed to be opened to him. He became a favored patentee of several valuable grants, but illness fell upon him, and after tedious suffering his death ensued, within a year or two after his arrival. His estate, inventoried in 1708, footed up £75.

ANTHONY BROCKHOLST.

BROCKHOLST, ANTHONY, a lieutenant in the King's service, arrived in this country at about the time of the final surrender by the Dutch to the English, in 1674. He was named as the successor to Governor Andros, in the event of the death of the latter. He was appointed Receiver-General in 1681. He is found named as Captain in 1681. He was one of Governor Dongan's Council in 1683. He is found named as Major in 1684. In subsequent years he acted a leading part in the affairs of the Province.

CHIDLEY BROOKE.

BROOKE, CHIDLEY, was appointed one of Governor Sloughter's Council, and arrived in this country in the expedition conveying the forces of that Governor in January, 1691. He was made Receiver-General and Collector of the Customs, at a salary of £200 sterling, and also acted as one of the Justices of the Supreme Court. In 1695, was sent to England as agent of New York, but was taken on his passage by the French, with all his papers and instructions. He remained a prisoner until April, 1696, when he was released and proceeded to England. He proceeded to the execution of his mission, and afterwards returned to this city, where he assumed his duties as Receiver-General, and also acted as Naval Officer, and was a member of the Council. He was suspended from office by Governor Bellomont, and his affairs were found to be much involved. He is not found as a resident of the city after the time of Governor Bellomont (1702), and is supposed to have returned permanently to England.

SAMPSON SHELTON BROUGHTON.

BROUGHTON, SAMPSON SHELTON, an English barrister of the middle temple was appointed to act as Attorney-General of the Province of New York in the year 1700, and arrived here in company with Dr. Bridges, Chief-Justice, in July, 1701. He soon found himself at points of difference with Lt.-Gov. Naufan, by whom he was suspended from official duty. He was, however, restored by order of the Government, and reassumed his functions, which he was not destined long to enjoy, as he died while in office, in the year 1705. His library consisted of 36 law books. His estate was valued at about £220.

SAMPSON BROUGHTON.

BROUGHTON, SAMPSON, a son of the former, was appointed temporarily to act as Attorney-General after the death of his father, but was soon after superseded.

EDWARD BUCKMASTER.

BUCKMASTER, EDWARD, a local politician of some note, was active in opposition to Leisler, in 1689. He was imprisoned for political reasons. His occupation was that of tavern-keeper.

ELIAS BOUDINOT.

BOUDINOT, ELIAS was a French Huguenot, who established himself in this city as a merchant. He took out his citizenship in 1687. He took but little part in public matters, but enjoyed a favorable position in the mercantile and social circles.

WILLIAM BRADFORD.

BRADFORD, WILLIAM, the first established printer in New York, removed hither from Philadelphia, where his father was engaged in the same business. It is found by the public records that in 1693 an allowance of £40 per annum was allowed the public printer. The principal occupation of this officer at that time was in printing the public laws, with occasional jobs in the way of political pamphlets and almanacs. In 1703 the household of Mr. Bradford consisted of two males, one female, five children, and two negresses. He continued his residence and business here until an advanced age, having in the meantime, 1725, established a newspaper called the New York Gazette. His remains were interred in Trinity churchyard.

RICHARD BRADLEY.

BRADLEY, RICHARD, an Englishman by birth, was appointed Attorney-General of New York vice Rayner, March 11, 1723. He continued in office until his death, August 28, 1752.

WILLIAM BURNET.

BURNET, WILLIAM, a son of the celebrated Bishop Burnet, was appointed Governor of New York and New Jersey in April, 1720, and arrived in the city of New York on the 16th September, 1720. A few months subsequently, he married a daughter of a New York

merchant, Mr. Abraham Van Horne. The principal incidents of his administration were his active operations in the western parts of the province, connected with Indian affairs and border defenses. He was a gentleman of amiable temper, and was fond of scientific studies. Governor Burnet was superseded, in the year 1728, by Governor Montgomerie.

THOMAS BYERLY.

BYERLY, THOMAS, arrived in New York in the year 1703, and assumed the duties of Collector of the Port soon after. He also was one of the Governor's Council. He remained in this city until his death, which occurred in the year 1725.

JOHN CHAMBERS.

CHAMBERS, JOHN was a native of New York, and a member of the legal profession, which he pursued with success. He married Anna Van Cortland in the year 1737. He held several municipal offices, and was also a member of the Provincial Council for several years. He was appointed, in 1751, Second Judge of the Supreme Court, but resigned that position before his death. His brother, William, was Admiral in the Royal Navy. The social as well as political position of Judge Chambers was of the highest class, and in the recommendation by Governor Clinton for his appointment to the Council in 1751, he is described as "a gentleman of unexceptionable character, opulent fortune, and perfectly skilled in the Constitution of this province, having been a noted practitioner of the law for many years"

GEORGE CLARKE.

CLARKE, GEORGE, a native of England, and a lawyer by profession, arrived in this city in July, 1703, with a commission as Secretary of the Province. He was appointed a member of the Council in 1715, and became Lieutenant-Governor in October, 1736. He administered the government until 1743, when he was superseded by Mr. Clinton, and sailed for England in 1745, having accumulated a fortune estimated at £100,000. He retired to a handsome estate in Chelsea, England, and died there at an advanced age, about the year 1759. Mr. Clarke was married to Ann Hyde, a distant relative of Lord-Chancellor Clarendon. This lady died in New York, and is represented as a woman of fine accomplishments.

GEORGE CLARKE, JR.

CLARKE, GEORGE, JR., a son of the foregoing, was, on the recommendation of his father, appointed a member of the Council at an early age, in 1739. He visited England within a year or two subsequent, and remained there about twenty years. He procured, by purchase, the office of Provincial Secretary of New York, the same formerly held by his father. Among the offices held by him in the year 1772, are enumerated the following: Clerk to the Privy Council, Clerk of the Legislative Council, Clerk for the Court of Appeals in Error, Provincial Secretary, Clerk of the Supreme Court, with some others of lesser note. These offices were in the hands either of himself or his father for over seventy years, and the emoluments were considered as lucrative as those of the Governor.

THOMAS CLARKE.

CLARKE, THOMAS, a merchant in New York, was one of the opponents of Leisler, and was for some time imprisoned by the latter. He was engaged in trade with New England, and sailed a vessel thither. He held several municipal offices in New York, as Coroner and Assistant Alderman. In 1699 he became implicated with the pirate, Captain Kidd, and visited his vessel at the east end of Long Island. He received from Kidd a large amount of goods and treasure, which he carried into Connecticut. He was seized and sent to New York, where he was imprisoned.

MATTHEW CLARKSON.

CLARKSON MATTHEW, a connection of Mayor Lodowick of New York, was a highly educated young gentleman, and was complimented with the office of Secretary of the Province in 1691-'2, being the first who held that office. He held this office for many succeeding years.

GEORGE CLINTON.

CLINTON, GEORGE, Admiral, was second son of Francis, sixth Earl of Lincoln, by his second wife, Susan, daughter of Anthony Penniston, of Oxfordshire, England. Mr. Clinton's commission as Captain in the Navy was dated June 16, 1716. In 1732 he was Governor of Newfoundland, and Commodore of the squadron there; in 1737, Commodore of the Mediterranean fleet, and was commissioned as Governor of New York, July 4, 1741. He held that office until 1753, when he retired, it is said, with the sum of £80,000 sterling, accumu-

ted in that office. On his return to England he became Governor of Greenwich Hospital and a member of Parliament. He died July 10, 1761. His administration of affairs in this Province was not greatly noticeable for important political events.

JOHN COLSART.

COLSART, JOHN, a merchant of New York at an early period of the English possession, died about the close of the 17th century, leaving a considerable estate.

DR. CADWALLADER COLDEN.

COLDEN, CADWALLADER, DR. was appointed Surveyor of Lands in the Province in the year 1720. In the performance of his duties he extended his inquiries into the subject of the Indian trade, and became thoroughly conversant, not less with the geographical state of the country, than with the commercial and political affairs of the various colonies. He was early recommended for a seat in the Council, and subsequently appointed. He attained the position of Speaker of the Council and Lieutenant-Governor. He administered the affairs of the Province as acting Governor at several periods, and occupied that responsible position at the time of the exciting events which immediately preceded the Revolutionary War. He died at Flushing, Queens county, September 21, 1776. Dr. Colden was a gentleman of fine scientific and political attainments, and was second to none in influence during many years of our colonial history.

LORD CORNBURY.

CORNBURY, EDWARD HYDE, LORD, a son of the Earl of Clarendon, and related to Queen Anne, was appointed Governor of New York to succeed Governor Bellomont, and arrived in the city of New York, May 3, 1702. He immediately assumed a position in opposition to the Leislerian faction, and suspended the members of Lord Bellomont's Council. He was an enthusiast in respect to the predominance of the Church of England in the Provinces, and used his official position in measures against the Presbyterians which were characterized by the latter as persecutions. Previous to his retirement from office in this Province, he became Third Earl of Clarendon. His wife, Catherine, was daughter of Lord O'Brien, son of the Earl of Richmond, of Ireland. She was married to Lord Cornbury July 10, 1688. By this marriage she had seven children, of whom only one

son and two daughters survived their mother. She died in this city August 11, 1706, and was interred with great ceremony in Trinity Church. The Earl of Clarendon retired from the Government in 1709, and returned to England.

WILLIAM COSBY.

COSBY, WILLIAM was appointed Governor of New York in 1731, and arrived here in September, 1732. He found himself immediately involved with a contentious opposition, which was greatly increased by his injudicious administration. A spirit of insubordination to the sway of royal prerogatives was engendered at this era of our history, which was a stepping-stone to the independence established by the Revolutionary War. Governor Cosby died in this city on the 10th of March, 1736, after three or four months' sickness. His wife, who had accompanied her husband to New York, returned to England, after his death.

HENRY CRUGER.

CRUGER, HENRY was a son of John Cruger, a leading merchant in New York. He was engaged in mercantile pursuits, and from 1745 to 1759 he was member of Assembly from New York. In 1767 he was called to the Council, of which he continued a member until 1773, when he resigned. In 1775 he embarked for England, in hopes of recruiting his health, and remained in Europe until his death, which occurred in 1780, at Bristol, England.

HENDRICK CUYLER.

CUYLER, HENDRICK, one of the most active adherents of Leisler, in 1689; was a lieutenant in the New York train-bands, and when in command of his company delivered the Fort to the Leislerians. He was made Captain of the fort and one of Leisler's Council.

REV. PETER DAILLE.

DAILLE, REV. PETER, was one of the earliest ministers connected with the French Protestants in the city of New York. He removed to Boston soon after the troubles of 1690, and in 1696 had charge of a church at that place, of which he continued in charge until his death, which occurred in 1715, in the sixty-seventh year of his age.

JOHN DARVALL.

DARVALL, JOHN, was a prominent merchant soon after the close of the Dutch authority. He married Catharina Van Cortland, in 1675. He died in 1689, leaving all his property to his widow, who afterwards married Frederick Philipse. This lady was born in 1653, and lived until 1730. In her will she bequeathed the portrait of John Darvall to Mrs. Frances Willets.

JACOB DE KAY.

DE KAY, JACOB, a resident of New York, of Dutch parentage, was nevertheless a violent opponent of Lieutenant-Governor Leisler, by whom he was imprisoned. The sons of the prisoner, Jacob, Jr., and Tunis, were active in exciting a riotous assault on the Fort for the purpose of releasing their father. Jacob, Jr., also was imprisoned. These persons afterwards became leading merchants in New York.

JAMES DELANCEY.

DELANCEY, JAMES, a son of Stephen Delancey, a merchant of New York, and Anna Van Cortland, was born in this city, but received a collegiate education in England, where he afterwards studied law. On his return to New York he immediately assumed a prominent position in public affairs, was appointed Second Judge of the Supreme Court, and was elevated to the office of Chief Justice in the same year—1733. He afterwards was appointed to the Provincial Council, and was commissioned as Lieutenant-Governor in 1748; but by reason of his opposition to Governor Clinton, his commission was for a time withheld by the latter. He was regarded as the head of "the faction" in opposition at that era. He was, however, sworn in the year 1653, under the administration of Sir Damon Osborn, and subsequently, during vacancies in the gubernatorial chair, administered the government for several years. He died suddenly, at his seat on the Bowery road, in the year 1760, being found dead in his library chair. He was buried in the middle aisle of Trinity Church.

OLIVER DELANCEY.

DELANCEY, OLIVER, eldest son of Stephen Delancey and Ann Van Cortland, was born in the city of New York in 1717. In 1742 he married Miss Franks, of Philadelphia, and in 1756 and 1758 was in command of the New York Provincials in the military operations at Lake George. In 1759 he was a member of Assembly, and

in the following year was called to the Council, where he retained his seat until the dissolution of the Government. He was at one period Receiver-General of New York. At the breaking out of the Revolution he adhered to the Crown, raised the corps of provincials called the Delancey Battalion, and was appointed Brigadier-General. By the Act of 1779 his property was confiscated. After the peace he retired to England, and died at Beverly, October 27, 1785, aged sixty-eight years. His residence in this city was on the shore of the North River, at what was then called Greenwich. His son, Oliver, Jr., became a colonel in the British army.

STEPHEN DELANCEY.

DELANCEY, STEPHEN, born at Caen, in Normandy, became a resident in the city of New York at an early period of the English possession. He was engaged in mercantile pursuits in 1790, and successfully prosecuted a foreign trade, chiefly to Africa. He married, in 1700, Anne Van Cortland. His place of business was that formerly occupied by Stephen VanCortland, on the northeast corner of Broad and Pearl streets. His residence was on the west side of Broadway, near Trinity Church. He became distinguished for wealth and social position, and likewise held several political positions. One of his daughters married Captain Warren (afterwarwards Sir Peter), then in command of the naval station at this port. His sons became distinguished characters in the affairs of the Province. Mr. Delancey died about the year 1735.

PETER DELANOY.

DELANOY, PETER was a son of one of the early Dutch schoolmasters of New Amsterdam. He married, in 1680, Elizabeth De Potter, widow of a Dutch merchant, and daughter of Samuel Edsall of this city, and was engaged in similar business pursuits. In the time of Leisler's government, he was one of the leaders of that party, and was appointed Mayor of New York; was also one of the Committee of Safety, Collector of the Port, and a member of Leisler's council. He was arrested and tried for treason in connection with those events, but was acquitted. Mr. Delanoy died in 1696.

THOMAS DELAVALL.

DELAVALL, THOMAS, accompanied the English expedition in 1664, and was one of the Commissioners sent to summon the city. He es-

tablished himself in this city as a merchant, and was one of the principal agents of the Duke of York, for whom he acted as auditor. He acquired extensive possessions in various parts of the Province. In 1655, 1667, and 1670 he was Alderman, and in 1666, 1671, and 1678 was Mayor. He was also a member of the Colonial Council, under Governors Nichols and Lovelace. Captain Delavall died in June, 1682, leaving one son, John, a daughter, who was married to William Darvall, and a daughter Margaret, married to Thomas Codrington.

NICHOLAS DE MEYER.

DE MEYER, NICHOLAS, Mayor of New York in 1676, was an early resident of New Amsterdam, where he married Lydia Van Dyck in 1655. He served as Schepen in 1664, and as Alderman of New York, previously to his mayoralty. He was married a second time to Sarah, widow of John Wicksteen. He died in 1690, leaving five children.

ABRAHAM DE PEYSTER.

DE PEYSTER, ABRAHAM, a son of one of the leading Dutch merchants of New Amsterdam, was born July 8, 1657. He married in Amsterdam (Holland), Catharine De Peyster, April 5, 1684. He was alderman in 1685. In the time of Leisler, he attached himself to his party. He was Mayor of New York from 1691 to 1695, and was called to the Provincial Council in 1698, under Bellomont. He was soon after made one of the judges of the Supreme Court, and acted as Chief Justice for a short period. After the death of Lord Bellomont, and in the absence of the Lieutenant-Governor, he, as presiding member of the Council, administered the Government. He was suspended from the Council by Lord Cornbury. In 1706 he was appointed Treasurer of the Province, which position he held until 1721, when he was succeeded by his son. His mental faculties had then become much impaired. He died August 2, 1728, aged 71 years.

ABRAHAM DE PEYSTER, JR.

DE PEYSTER, ABRAHAM, JR., son of the foregoing, succeeded to the office of Treasurer in 1721, which office he held until his death in 1767. His estate was inventoried at £20,000, a very large sum at that period.

JOHANNES DE PEYSTER.

DE PEYSTER, JOHANNES, originally settled in New Amsterdam, where he married Cornelia Lubbertse, in 1650. He held the positions of Schepen and Burgomaster in New Amsterdam, and Alderman and Deputy-Mayor in New York.

JOHANNES DE PEYSTER, JR.

DE PEYSTER, JOHANNES, JR., son of the foregoing, was born in the year 1666. He was a leading merchant of New York, and held the office of Mayor in 1698. The name of his wife was Anna Bancker, whom he married in 1688.

COL. THOMAS DONGAN.

DONGAN, THOMAS, COL., was commissioned as Governor of New York, in September, 1682, and arrived in the following year. He was of an aristocratic Irish family, and a Catholic in religion. Previously to his being called into the English service, he had been engaged for a considerable time in the service of the King of France; and was first commissioned by the King of Great Britain to an official position in Tangier, which place he left for New York. In 1688, he was notified that the Province of New York had been annexed to the Government of New England, and that he should turn over the Government to Sir Edmund Andros on his arrival, and report himself to the king, assurances being extended to him that his government had been satisfactory. Gov. Andros arrived in New York in September, 1688, and received the Great Seal of New York, which was then broken up. Colonel Dongan remained in New York until the following year, and until after the taking of the Government by Leisler. In June, 1689, he set sail from the Neversink, for England, but being taken sea-sick, the ship put back, and landed in New Jersey, but soon after departed for New England. He was "hunted" by Leisler, and in 1690 arrived in Boston, whence he departed for England. He subsequently attained the title of Earl of Limerick.

THOMAS DELAVALL.

DELAVALLE, THOMAS, became first prominently known in New York at the time of its capture from the Dutch, in 1664; he was then one of the Commissioners for receiving the surrender of the city. He was Alderman at several periods, and Mayor in 1666, 1671, and 1678, and held prominent official positions in the province. He acquired considerable estate, and died in the year 1682.

ISAAC DE RIEMER.

DE RIEMER, ISAAC, a son of Pieter De Riemer, one of the citizens of New Amsterdam, was born in the year 1666, and married Aeltje Wessels in 1689. He followed the business of a general merchant, and became a prominent character in local politics, being an active Leislerite. He was a member of the Common Council for many years, and held the office of Mayor in 1700. His children, baptized in the Dutch Church, were, Isaac, in 1691; Petrus, in 1690; Anna Elizabeth, in 1693; and Susannah, in 1695.

REV. SAMUEL DRISSIUS.

DRISSIUS, REV. SAMUEL, a clergyman in the Dutch Reformed Church, was born in Holland. In 1659 he married, in New York, Lysbet Grevenaet, a widow. He died in the year 1672.

REV. WALTER DU BOIS.

DU BOIS, REV. WALTER was born at Street Kerf, in Holland, in 1671, and was a son of a clergyman at that place. He was educated at Leyden, where he passed his examination in 1697. He was called to the Dutch Reformed Church at New York, and was installed as minister in 1699. In 1700 he was married, in this city, to Helena Van Balen. He officiated in New York over fifty years, and preached for the last time on 29th September, 1751. He was taken ill on the same day, and died in the following week. He was succeeded in his ministry by the Rev. Lambertus De Ronde.

JOSEPH DUDLEY.

DUDLEY, JOSEPH, son of Thomas Dudley, Governor of Massachusetts, was born in 1647, and graduated at Harwood in 1665. He was agent of the Massachusetts Colony in England in 1682; one of Andros' Council in 1689, when he, with other obnoxious persons, was imprisoned by the people of Boston. In 1691 he was a member of Governor Sloughter's Council, and Chief Justice of the province of New York, in which latter capacity he tried and condemned Lieutenant-Governor Leisler, and his secretary, Milborn. He afterwards became a member of the British Parliament, Lieutenant-Governor of the Isle of Wight, and in 1702 was appointed Governor of Massachusetts, the affairs of which colony he administered until 1715. He died in 1720, aged seventy-two years.

JOHN MURRAY, 4TH EARL OF DUNMORE.

DUNMORE, JOHN MURRAY, 4TH EARL OF, succeeded to the title of his father in December, 1756, and in February, 1759, married Charlotte Stewart, daughter of the Earl of Galloway. He was commissioned as Governor of New York, and commenced his administration October 19, 1770, and continued until July 9, 1771, when he was transferred to North Carolina. He was afterwards commissioned as Governor of Virginia, where he arrived in 1772. He was active in the service of the British during the Revolutionary War. In 1786 he was appointed Governor of Bermuda. He died in England in 1809. His daughter, Augusta, married the Duke of Sussex, sixth son of King George III.

WILLIAM DYRE.

DYRE, WILLIAM, an Englishman, previously of Jamaica, settled in New England at an early period. He was one of the commanders of an expedition planned against the Dutch in New Netherlands in 1653, which, however, was not prosecuted to actual operation. Captain Dyre became a resident of New York after its surrender by the Dutch, and took a prominent part in public affairs. He was commissioned as Collector of the Port, July 2, 1674, and was Mayor of New York in 1680, and also member of the Provincial Council. In 1681 he was indicted for levying unlawful customs, and was sent to England for trial; but no prosecutor appearing he was discharged. He afterwards resided in Jamaica, where he died, in 1685.

SAMUEL EDSALL.

EDSALL, SAMUEL, an Englishman by birth, was a resident of New Amsterdam, under the Dutch, where he married Jannetje Wessels, in 1655. He followed the business of a hatter. In the troubles of 1689 he was one of the leading adherents to Leisler, one of his Council, and a member of the Committee of Safety. He was tried on a capital charge for political offenses committed at this period, but was acquitted. He subsequently became a resident of Queens county.

ANDREW ELLIOTT.

ELLIOTT, ANDREW, was the third son of Sir Gilbert Elliott, Bart., Lord Chief Justice Clerk of Scotland. Through the interest of his brother Gilbert, member for Selkirk, he was appointed Collector of the Port of New York in 1674, which office he held until the evacuation of

the city. In 1780 he was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of New York, and administered the government during the remainder of the war. He married a Philadelphia lady. His daughter, Elizabeth, was married in this city, in 1779, to Lord (afterwards Earl) Cathcart, then a major in the Royal army.

JAMES EMOTT.

EMOTT, JAMES, one of the earliest practicing lawyers in New York under the English *regime*, came first prominently into notice during the troubles of 1689, when he opposed the party of Leisler, and was forced to retire into New Jersey for safety from the prevailing party. On the return to power of the anti-Leislerians, he returned to the city, and practiced his profession, enjoying the position of attorney to George Fletcher, and other prominent offices.

PETER FAUCORIER.

FAUCORIER, PETER, a French Huguenot, was a merchant in New York, acted as Collector of the Port for some years, and was Receiver-General under Lord Cornbury.

BENJAMIN FLETCHER.

FLETCHER, BENJAMIN, a colonel in the English service, was commissioned as Governor of New York in 1692, where he arrived August 30, 1692. He immediately took sides with the anti-Leislerian faction, and acted with that party during his administration, interfering, with violence and threats, in the elections, and making every effort to defeat their opponents. In personal character he is reputed to have been vain and headstrong, and of a rapacious disposition. The grants made to his favorites are noted in colonial history as "the extravagant grants," and were mostly annulled by the English Government, and he was also concerned in various maritime adventures of a doubtful character. He was superseded by Governor Bellomont in 1698, and returned to England. During his residence in New York his wife died here, in the year 1696. Previous to his appointment to New York he had seen thirty years' service in the British army, and was engaged in the Irish wars.

PHILIP FRENCH.

FRENCH, PHILIP, a merchant of New York, was from Kelshall, Suffolk county, England. He married in this city, in 1694, Anna, daugh-

ter of Frederick Philipse, the wealthy Dutch merchant. In the affairs of 1689-'90 he took a prominent part in opposition to Leisler's party, and was for a time imprisoned in the Fort, but was released on his promising to acknowledge Leisler's authority, and giving bonds for good behavior. He was a member of Assembly in Colonel Fletcher's time, and was Speaker in 1698, but the violence of his political enemies caused him to absent himself until the arrival of Governor Cornbury. He was Mayor of New York in 1702. He died in New York in 1707, leaving three daughters, but no son.

REV. PATRICK GORDON.

GORDON, REV. PATRICK, for many years chaplain of the Fort in New York, died about the year 1704. His library was very extensive for the period, and was valued at about £200.

ABRAHAM GOUVERNEUR.

GOUVERNEUR, ABRAHAM was one of two brothers who established themselves as clerks to merchants in this city; the family was of French origin. The subject of this sketch was clerk of Leisler's Committee of Safety, and Town Clerk of New York in 1689. He was an active adherent of the Leislerian party, and was among those ordered to be imprisoned by Governor Sloughter in 1692. He afterwards escaped to Boston, where he set forth to those in authority the state of things in New York. His surrender was demanded, but was refused by Governor Phips. He was, however, under the arbitrary proceedings in New York, sentenced to death. In January, 1696, he, with Leisler's son, proceeded to England, and made representations to the Government of the state of affairs in New York. A governor of liberal sentiments towards the Leislerians was soon after appointed for New York. Mr. Gouverneur returned to New York, and married in 1698 the widow of Milborne, and daughter of Leisler. He was elected to the Assembly in 1699, and served until 1702, being Speaker in 1701. He was Recorder of New York in 1700-'01, and was regarded in his time as among the soundest and best of the leaders of the Leislerian party.

JAMES GRAHAM.

GRAHAM, JAMES, a gentleman of Scotch descent, and a relation of the Earl of Montrose, established himself in this city at an early period after the English accession. He was well versed in the law,

which pursuit he followed in connection with mercantile enterprises. He was Alderman in New York in 1680-2, and Recorder for several subsequent years. He succeeded Mr. Rudyard as Attorney-General in 1685, and was sworn in as one of the Council in 1687. He subsequently removed to Boston as Attorney-General under Andros, the odium of whose government he shared, and on whose downfall he was committed to the Castle. He returned to New York in 1691, and was elected to the Assembly, of which he was chosen Speaker. He was active in urging the condemnation and execution of Leisler. He was about nine years Speaker of the Assembly, and was again called to the Council in 1699, at the same time acting as Attorney-General. His public career closed in 1701, when he was superseded in his offices. His death occurred in the same year, at his residence at Morristania. He left all his property to his children, Augustine (Surveyor-General of New York), Isabella, wife of Lewis Morris, Esq., Mary, Sarah, Margaret, and John. He resided on the Morris property, his household consisting, besides his family, of one overseer, two white servants, and thirty-three slaves.

SIR CHARLES HARDY.

HARDY, SIR CHARLES was appointed Governor of New York, to succeed Sir Danvers Osborn, in 1755. He was grandson of Sir Thomas Hardy, the distinguished naval commander in the reign of Queen Anne, and eldest son of Vice-Admiral Sir Charles Hardy, who was one of the Lords of the Admiralty in 1743. The subject of this sketch was also a naval officer. He held the position of Governor of New York but little over two years, and in July, 1757, was appointed Rear-Admiral of the Blue, with the command of the Royal William, 84 guns, in the expedition against Louisburg. In June, 1758, he became Rear-Admiral of the White, returned to England, and January 4, 1759, married Miss Stanyan, and was appointed Vice-Admiral of the White, and as such commanded under Sir Edward Hawke in the Union, of 90 guns, in the memorable battle of Belleisle. In 1764 he became a member of Parliament. In 1770 was made Admiral of the Blue, next became Admiral of the White, and in 1779 was appointed to the command of the Grand Western Squadron. He died in England 18th May, 1780, aged about sixty-seven years.

FRANCIS HARRISON.

HARRISON, FRANCIS, a young man of liberal education, came to New York at about the time of the arrival of Governor Hunter in

1709, and received an appointment in one of the Government offices. He became a member of the Provincial Council, was a prominent officer in Trinity Church, and held a high social position in New York. His daughter married Colonel Roberts, then stationed in this city.

CALEB HEATHCOTE.

HEATHCOTE, CALEB (memoir elsewhere in this volume).

WHITEHEAD HICKS.

HICKS, WHITEHEAD, son of Thomas Hicks, was born at Flushing, L. I., in 1728. He became a student in the law-office of Hon. William Smith, in New York. He was admitted to the bar in 1750, and commenced practice in New York. He rose to be one of the leading men in the profession. In October, 1757, he married Charlotte, daughter of John Brevoort. In October, 1766, he became Mayor of New York, and held that office until 1776, when he resigned, on being appointed one of the Judges of the Supreme Court. He resided in the latter years of his life at Flushing. He died in 1780, before the termination of the Revolutionary War.

EDWARD HOLLAND.

HOLLAND, EDWARD received an appointment in connection with Indian affairs, and became Mayor of Albany, which position he occupied in 1734; he afterwards removed to New York. In 1748 he was appointed a member of the Provincial Council, and was Mayor of New York from 1747 to 1756. He died in this city. His wife, whom he married in New York, was Frances, daughter of William Nicoll, Esq.

DANIEL HONAN,

HONAN, DANIEL, a gentleman of Irish birth, who came to this country at about the period of the arrival of Governor Fletcher, was Accountant-General of the Province in 1693. He was also Secretary to Governor Fletcher, and apparently acted as a convenient instrument in the financial operations of that official. During the administration of Lord Bellomont he was out of favor, but upon the advent of Lord Cornbury he was reinstated as Governor's Secretary. To this appointment objection was taken by the Lords of Trade, on the ground of the accusations pending against him, and Mr. Honan was dismissed, and retired from public service.

DANIEL HORSEMANDEN.

HORSEMANDEN, DANIEL was born about the year 1693, at Gouldhurst, County of Kent, England. He was a lawyer by profession, and a barrister of the Inner Temple, London, and came to New York about the year 1730. In 1733 he was called to the Provincial Council. In 1736 he was appointed Recorder of New York, and in 1737 he was made third Judge of the Supreme Court. In 1747 he was suspended from his various offices by Governor Clinton, to whom he was politically opposed. He subsequently married the widow of the Rev. William Vesey, of Trinity Church. In 1750, having become reconciled to the Governor, he was restored to the Bench and to his seat in the Council. In 1762 he was appointed Second Judge of the Supreme Court, and in 1763 was made Chief Justice. He adhered to the royal cause at the breaking out of the Revolution, and died before its conclusion, in 1778. He was buried in Trinity churchyard.

GENERAL SIR WILLIAM HOWE.

HOWE, GENERAL SIR WILLIAM, afterwards fifth Viscount Howe, was the fifth son of Edmund Scrope, second Viscount, and was born in 1729. As Lieut.-Colonel served against Louisburg and Quebec; as Brigadier served against Belleisle in 1761. In 1762, as Adjutant-General, was employed against Havana; appointed Major-General, 1772. In 1775 arrived in Boston as Commander-in-Chief of the army in America, and commanded at Bunker Hill. Arrived at Staten Island in 1776, and participated in the battles near New York, his headquarters being in the city. Was made Lieutenant-General in 1777; was superseded as commander in America by Sir Henry Clinton. On his return to England received the sinecure appointment of Governor of Berwick. In 1808 became Governor of Plymouth. He died in 1814, without issue.

DUCEY HUNGERFORD.

HUNGERFORD, DUCEY, son to Sir George Hungerford, M. P., and a cousin of the Earl of Bellomont, was made Commissioner of the Customs and Joint Collector of New York, by Lord Bellomont in 1698. He was officially described as "a brisk young gentleman." He was recommended for a seat in the Provincial Council; Lord Bellomont, however, afterwards disapproved of the official conduct of Mr. Hungerford and removed him from office. He became involved in litigation and was confined in jail in New York, from whence he escaped and made good his way to England.

ROBERT HUNTER.

HUNTER, ROBERT, a Brigadier-General in the British service, who had served under the Duke of Marlborough, received the appointment of Governor of Virginia in 1707, and in 1709 was appointed to succeed Lord Lovelace in the Government of New York, where he arrived June 14, 1710. One of the principal incidents of his administration was the settlement, under his auspices, of a large number of Palatines in this and the neighboring provinces; his views were favorable to religious tolerance, and thus found favor with a large class of the people. During his administration, in 1712, a slave conspiracy occurred in New York, which was suppressed and several negroes were executed. In 1715 he was commissioned as Vice-Admiral of New York. He left New York in 1719 to attend to some matters of business in England, whence he did not return. He was afterwards appointed Governor of Jamaica. The wife of Governor Hunter was a daughter of Sir Thomas Orby, Bart., of Burton, Pedwardine, Lincolnshire, and relict of Lord John Hay, second son of the Marquis of Tweedale. This lady died in this city in the year 1716.

RICHARD INGOLDSBY.

INGOLDSBY, RICHARD, a Major in the British service, had served before his coming to America as a field-officer in Holland and Ireland. He arrived in New York, January 28, 1691, in command of a company in the forces sent with George Sloughter. The fleet conveying the expedition having separated on the ocean, four of the ships first arrived in which Ingoldsby was the senior officer. On his arrival he demanded possession of the fort from Leisler, who declined delivering it until the arrival of the Governor. Several weeks elapsed during which the parties were in hostile array against each other, and some blood was shed. On Gov. Sloughter's arrival the position of Ingoldsby was simply the commander of a company, until the death of the Governor, when he was made Commander-in-Chief by the Council. Efforts were made by leading anti-Leislerians to have him commissioned as Governor, but were unsuccessful. He was superseded by the appointment of Governor Fletcher, in 1692, and afterwards was employed in military affairs, chiefly in command on the frontiers. He returned to England about 1696, on furlough, and was examined on the state of affairs in New York, and was absent several years, meantime leaving his wife and children in New York, as was said, with scanty means of support. In 1702 he was commis-

sioned as Lieut.-Governor of New York and New Jersey, and returned to New York in 1706. His commission as Lieut.-Governor was revoked in 1706, and he was confined to his commission for New Jersey, where he was to reside. On the death of Lord Lovelace in New York, Lieut.-Governor Ingoldsby administered the government until the arrival of Brigadier Hunter. One of his daughters married William Pinhorn, who was Recorder of New York in 1691.

DAVID JAMISON.

JAMISON, DAVID, a Scotchman by birth, received a liberal education, and while a youth, in the latter part of King Charles II.'s reign, joined the religious society called the "Sweet Singers," a fraternity which denounced the use of arms, and were for burning all books except the bible. While at worship with that sect he was taken prisoner, and confined at Edinburg. On their promise to emigrate to America the prisoners were not proceeded against. On Mr. Jamison's arrival at New York several of the citizens took an interest in him, paid his passage, and set him to teach a Latin school. Mr. Jamison gave up school teaching on being appointed to a public office. He acted as Clerk of the Council in 1693, and subsequently farmed the office of Provincial Secretary from Mr. Clarkson. During the same period he applied himself to the study of the law, and became, as a lawyer, inferior to none in America. He likewise, as was not uncommon among professional men, was engaged in mercantile pursuits. Among the offices held by him were those of Chief Justice of New Jersey, Attorney-General of the Province of New York, and Recorder of New York. He acquired a considerable estate and was a leading member of society in New York. His religious views changed with his advancing years, and he became a leading officer in Trinity Church. He was married in this city in 1692, to Maria Hardenbrook; slander imputed to him that he had another wife living in Scotland, but this woman came to this country and did not claim to be his wife, otherwise than "before God," as she termed it, having had a child by him in his wild days. Mr. Jamison died in this city at an advanced age, leaving several descendants.

JAMES JAUNCEY.

JAUNCEY, JAMES was a member of the Provincial Council, and also served as Master of the Rolls. He died in 1777.

SIR JAMES JAY.

JAY, SIR JAMES, son of Peter Jay and Mary Van Cortland, was born in 1732, and bred a physician, which profession he practiced in New York. To aid in the efforts to establish a college in New York, Mr. Jay was sent to England to secure interest there on its behalf. He was there complimented with the honor of knighthood. He became involved, while there, in a lawsuit, arising out of collections for the college, and was detained in consequence. He returned previous to the Revolution, and survived many subsequent years. He died in 1815.

JOHN JAY, LL. D.

JAY, JOHN, LL. D., the eighth child of Peter Jay and Mary Van Cortland, was born in 1745, and graduated at King's College, N. Y., in 1764. Studied law, and was admitted to the bar in 1768. He was member of Congress in 1774, 1775, 1776. Was elected Chief Justice of New York in 1777, and President of Congress in 1779. Was appointed Minister to Spain in 1779, signed the Treaty of Peace at Paris, in 1783. Was appointed Secretary of State of the United States in 1784. Became Chief-Justice of the United States in 1789. In 1794, was appointed Minister to England. Was Governor of the State of New York, from 1795 to 1801. He died at Bedford, Westchester county, 17th of May, 1829, in the 84th year of his age.

SAMUEL D. JOHNSON.

JOHNSON, SAMUEL D., first President of King's College, came to New York from Stratford, Connecticut. He occupied the position until he returned to Connecticut in 1763. His wife, a daughter of Richard Floyd, of Long Island, died in 1658.

DOCTOR JOHN JOHNSTON.

JOHNSTON, DOCTOR JOHN, originally a druggist at the sign of the Unicorn in Edinburgh, immigrated to New Jersey in 1685. In 1686 he married Euphemia, daughter of George Scot, of New Jersey. He practised medicine with great success at Amboy, New Jersey, and attained considerable eminence for his scientific attainments. He subsequently removed to New York, where he held the office of Mayor, from 1714 to 1718. He was appointed one of the Provincial Council in 1720. About the same time, he removed his residence to New

Jersey, where he afterwards permanently resided. He was not, however, superseded as a member of the New York Council until 1723.

SAMUEL JONES.

JONES, SAMUEL, son of William Jones, and grandson of Chief-Justice David Jones, of the New York Supreme Court, was born in 1734. He was educated as a lawyer in the office of William Smith, of New York. His professional business became extensive and lucrative. He was frequently in public office, and, in 1778, was a member of the Constitutional Convention of the United States. In 1789 he was appointed Recorder of New York, and was in the later years of his life, recognized as the father of the New York bar, being distinguished as well for his professional ability as for his private character. He was twice married; first to a daughter of Cornelius Tusk, and second to a daughter of Elbert Herring. He died in 1819.

THOMAS JONES.

JONES, THOMAS, oldest son of David Jones and Ann Willet, of Fort Neck, Long Island, was admitted to the bar April 4, 1755, and on April 4, 1757, was appointed Clerk of Queens county. He married Anne, daughter of Lieutenant-Governor Delancey, and was appointed Recorder of the city of New York in 1769. In 1773 he was promoted to a seat on the bench of the Supreme Court. During the Revolutionary War Judge Jones sided with the British. After the Peace he returned to England, where he died. His property in New York was confiscated.

JOHN TABOR KEMPE.

KEMPE, JOHN TABOR, son of Wm. Kempe, Attorney-General of New York, was admitted to the New York bar in 1758, and in the same year succeeded his father as Attorney-General. He married Grace, a sister of Hon. Daniel Coxe, of New Jersey. A large grant of lands (100,000 acres), in this State, was made to Daniel, William, and Rebecca Coxe, and J. T. Kempe and Grace his wife, on condition that they release their interest in a province called *Carolana*, consisting of a territory on the coast of Georgia and the Carolinas, with several islands off that coast, granted in 1629 to Sir Robert Heath, and by him devised to the present grantees through their father. Mr. Kempe adhered to the Royal side in the Revolution, and was attainted, and his property confiscated. He returned to England.

WILLIAM KEMPE.

KEMPE, WILLIAM, an English barrister, was appointed Attorney-General of New York in 1751, and arrived in New York, November, 1752. He died in this city a few years subsequent, and was succeeded in office by his son John Tabor Kempe.

SAMUEL KEMBLE.

KEMBLE, SAMUEL was Naval Officer of New York in 1774.

CAPTAIN ARCHIBALD KENNEDY.

KENNEDY, CAPTAIN ARCHIBALD, became a Captain in the Royal Navy in 1757. He married as his second wife, Anne, daughter of Hon. John Watts of New York. He acquired considerable property in New York, where he was stationed for a long period. He succeeded his grandfather in 1792 as eleventh Earl of Capilis in the Scotch peerage, and died in 1794. His country residence near New York, was on the New Jersey shore of the Hudson River, within the present limits of Jersey City.

ARCHIBALD KENNEDY.

KENNEDY, ARCHIBALD, a gentleman of Scotch birth and aristocratic connections, arrived in New York in 1714. He is found soon after to have held the office of Receiver-General and Collector of the Port, which office he held for many successive years. He was recommended in 1725 by Governor Burnet for appointment to a seat in the Council, which appointment was made in 1727. He held these honorable and lucrative positions until his death, which occurred in this city about 1763. Mr. Kennedy married Catherine Schuyler, a member of one of the old New York families.

JOANNES KERFBYLE.

KERFBYLE, JOANNES (or John Corbyle as usually pronounced), a doctor of physic, of Dutch extraction, and a graduate of Leyden, became a resident of this city after the Dutch surrender in 1673. His wife, Catherine Hug, accompanied him, and they established their residence on the Heeren Gracht, or present Broad street. He was in good practice in this city in 1686, and occupied a prominent position in Dutch society, and in the Reformed Church. Becoming a widower he was married again in 1704, to Margaret Provoost. From his posi-

tion in the Dutch society, and from the sympathy of Governor Belomont with the Leislerian party, Dr. Kerfbyle was recommended and appointed a member of the Provincial Council in 1798. He died in this city.

CAPTAIN WILLIAM KIDD.

KIDD, WILLIAM, CAPTAIN, sailed the "Autegoa," merchantman, to New York, where he married the widow of William Cox, a merchant. Being commissioned to capture pirates, he sailed to Madagascar, where, being unsuccessful in his primary objects, he sought to retrieve his adventure by capturing merchantmen. He returned to the vicinity of New York with considerable booty, but was apprehended, sent to England, tried, condemned, and suffered death as a pirate. His biography has been published in detail in a former number of the Manual.

JOHN LATHAM.

LATHAM, JOHN, a shipwright, who learned his trade in one of the King's yards in England, came to New York before the year 1700, and engaged in his trade, in which he soon became among the most prominent among those of his trade. His shipyard was situated near the present foot of Roosevelt street, East River, where his residence is still standing in Cherry street (1864), probably the oldest architectural memorial of old New York.

JOHN LAWRENCE.

LAWRENCE, JOHN, an Englishman, was one of the earliest established merchants of his national birth, established in this city under the Dutch rule. His residence and place of business was then in what is now known as Hanover square, facing the East River. Among the Dutch he was highly respected, and held several positions. After the capture of New York by the English he was Alderman for several years, and was Mayor in 1673 and 1691. He was also a member of the Provincial Council, and one of the Judges of the Supreme Court, until his advanced years rendered him unfit for public duties. He died in 1699, being then over eighty years of age. His wife, Susanna, survived him. One of his sons (John) married Sarah, widow of Thomas Willett, first Mayor of New York. His daughter, Susanna, was married to Gabriel Minville, at one time Mayor of New York, and after his death to William Smith. Several other children survived him, one of whom married Governor Saltonstall, of Connecticut.

SAMUEL LEETE.

LEETE, SAMUEL left England in 1675 for New York, where he was appointed clerk of the Court of Mayor and Aldermen. He died in New York in 1679, leaving his widow, Christiana, surviving him. He was something of a literary character, his library consisting of thirty-eight volumes, which was quite an unusual number in that day. He died poor, the inventory of his estate amounting to something less than £25.

JACOB LEISLER.

LEISLER, JACOB, originally came to New Netherland as a soldier in the Dutch service. He established himself in trade in New Amsterdam, and was married in 1663 to Elsje Tymens, widow of Peter Cornelisen Vanderveer, a merchant of that city. His trade as a merchant became extensive, and he was rated among the leading citizens in point of wealth. He seems to have been averse to public affairs, and is not found in political position until the revolution of 1688. The news of the landing of William and Mary at Torbooy, in England, reached the American colonies, and the old religious fires and prejudices were inflamed in all quarters. In New York it was resolved to take the Fort and hold it until the pleasure of their Majesties should become known. This was accomplished, and the officers in authority mostly fled. A Committee of Safety was established by the citizens, who deputed Leisler, then captain of one of their militia companies, to execute the chief office of the government during the interim of the arrival of a new Governor. This covered a period of nearly two years, during which the most violent political agitation ensued throughout the province. Governor Sloughter arrived in 1691, and took part with the anti-Leislerites, who were clamorous for the most extreme revenge upon the leader and his principal adherents. A trivial pretext was the foundation of an indictment for treason, and the trial resulted in the conviction of the prisoners. Leisler was hanged, and afterwards beheaded. He left surviving his wife Elsje. The following are the recorded baptisms of his children : Susannah, in 1664 ; Catherina, in 1665 ; Jacob, in 1667 ; Mary, in 1669 ; Johannes, in 1671 ; Hester, in 1673 ; and Francina, in 1676.

ANTHONY LISPENARD.

LISPENARD, ANTHONY (ANTOINE), a French trader, became connected with commerce between New York and Canada, and was useful in negotiations between the respective authorities. He is found active in matters of that character as early as 1687.

THOMAS LEWIS.

LEWIS, THOMAS, an Englishman, was a merchant of New York, residing in Hanover square. He became Alderman in 1675-79. He was a staunch adherent of Leisler, and their families became connected by marriage. He occupied several public positions of importance in the province. Mr. Lewis died in 1684, leaving his wife, Geertje, surviving, and five children, Lodewick, Barent, Leonard, Catherine, and Thomas.

JOHN LAWRENCE.

LAWRENCE, JOHN, Alderman, and an eminent merchant of New York, was born at Newtown, L. I., and established himself in New York at an early age. In 1759 he married Catherine, daughter of Hon. Philip Livingston. He died in 1764, leaving no issue. The celebrated Whitfield preached his funeral sermon. His body was interred in the family vault of the Earl of Stirling, in Trinity churchyard.

FRANCIS LEWIS.

LEWIS, FRANCIS was a son of Rev. William Lewis, and was born in Wales in 1713; he was educated to mercantile pursuits in London. In 1735 he emigrated to America, and two or three years afterwards was established in business as a merchant, in New York. He married Miss Annesley. His mercantile transactions with the North of Europe were extensive; he took sides with the patriots of the Revolution. In 1765 he was a delegate to the Convention at New York. He soon after retired from business, and resided on Long Island. In 1775-6, '7, '8, he was a delegate in the Continental Congress, and signed the Declaration of Independence in 1776. He continued his residence on Long Island about twenty years, and returned to New York. He died in this city in 1802, aged about ninety years. Three children survived him, one of whom (Morgan) became distinguished in political affairs, and was Governor of the State in 1804.

JOHN LINDESAY.

LINDESAY, JOHN, a native of Scotland, received in 1730 the commission of naval officer of the port of New York. A few years subsequent he removed from the city on being appointed Sheriff of Albany. He was subsequently active in Indian affairs, and was Indian Com-

missary at Oswego, of which fort he was previously commandant. He died in 1751, at Oswego. He was the founder of the settlement at Cherry Valley, where he held a large tract of land.

MATTHEW LING.

LING, MATTHEW, an Englishman, established himself as a merchant in New York in the latter part of the seventeenth century. He became a member of the Provincial Council, and died while holding that office, about the year 1704.

PHILIP LIVINGSTON.

LIVINGSTON, PHILIP, son of Robert and Alida Schuyler, was born at Albany, in 1686. In the earlier years of his manhood he was engaged in military service on the frontiers; he subsequently studied law in New York, and was admitted to the bar in 1719. In 1720 he was appointed one of the commissioners for the management of Indian affairs, and in 1721 succeeded his father as Secretary of that Board and Clerk of the county of Albany. He was called to a seat in the Council in 1725. In 1737 he acted as President of the Commission on the New Hampshire and Massachusetts boundary. In 1746 he was one of the Commissioners assembled from the various Colonies on the affairs of the war. He continued in public life until his death, which occurred at New York in February, 1749. Mr. Livingston married Catherine, daughter of Philip Van Brugh, Mayor of Albany, and had two sons and three daughters.

PHILIP LIVINGSTON.

LIVINGSTON, PHILIP was the fourth son of Philip, second proprietor of the manor of Livingston, was born in Albany, in 1716, and graduated at Yale College in 1737. He became a merchant in New York, and was Alderman of the East Ward in that city from 1754 to 1762. He represented New York in Assembly from 1749 to 1769, and was Speaker in the latter year. He was a member of the first Congress which sat in Philadelphia at 1774-5, and was one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. He continued in Congress until his death, in 1778.

PHILIP LIVINGSTON, JR.

LIVINGSTON, PHILIP, JR., was son of Alderman Philip Livingston, of New York. He was educated in England, and bred to the profession

of the law at Lincoln's Inn, London, where at the same time were two or three others of the scions of New York families. On his return to America he was made private secretary to Governor Moore, and appointed Surrogate and Register of the Prerogative Court of the Province.

CHARLES LODOWICK.

LODOWICK, CHARLES, an Englishman, established himself as a merchant, in New York, shortly previous to the Revolution under Leisler. He was chosen captain in one of the train-bands, and was an active participant in the exciting events of that period. He was appointed Mayor of New York in 1694, being at the same time Lieutenant-Colonel in the militia. In 1701 he left New York, after a residence in that city of over seventeen years. While a resident of England he frequently acted as agent for parties in New York in official business with the Government. He is described as a man of high character and strict principles.

COLONEL FRANCIS LOVELACE.

LOVELACE, COLONEL FRANCIS, a son of Sir Richard Lovelace, afterwards Baron of Hurley, was appointed Governor of New York in 1668. His administration was conducted at an era when great tact and prudence were necessary to maintain the peace in the newly acquired Province, and was commended for its moderation and judiciousness. After the recapture, by the Dutch, in 1672, Gov. Lovelace returned to England. His grandson, Lord Lovelace, was Governor of New York in 1709, and died in New York.

JOHN LOVELACE.

LOVELACE, JOHN, 4th Lord, arrived with his family at New York, December 18, 1708, being commissioned as Governor of the Province. His administration was of short duration, as his death took place in this city on the 6th of May, 1709, having been constantly ill since his arrival. Previously to his own decease one of his sons died in this city, and a month after his death, his eldest son, who had succeeded to the title, also died in New York. Lady Lovelace, his widow, departed for England in the following July. The afflicting bereavements of this distinguished lady excited, as they deserved, universal commiseration.

ROBERT LURTING.

LURTING, ROBERT, an Englishman by birth, established himself, when a young man, as a merchant in New York, shortly previous to the close of the seventeenth century. He became a prominent man in public affairs, and served in the Common Council for several years; and in the latter years of his life was Mayor of New York, from 1726 to 1734. He was prominent in social and religious affairs in the city, and an officer of Trinity Church for many years.

GENERAL ALEXANDER McDOUGALL.

McDOUGAL, ALEXANDER, GENERAL, was, it is said, the son of a milkman in New York. He became an active member of the "Sons of Liberty," in the exciting times preceding the Revolutionary War, and was imprisoned in 1770 on the charge of being the author of incendiary publications. He was liberated after a year's confinement. In 1775 he was a member of the New York Provincial Convention, and was nominated for the Congress at Philadelphia, but was not elected. In the same year he was commissioned as Colonel of the First New York Regiment. He rose in 1776 to the rank of Brigadier-General, and was present at the battle of Germantown. In 1777 he was appointed Major-General, and in 1778 superseded Putnam in command at the Highlands. After the flight of Arnold he was put in charge of West Point, in 1780. In 1783 he was elected State Senator, and continued a member until his death, in 1786. He was also at that time President of the Bank of New York.

PETER MATTHEWS.

MATTHEWS, PETER, came to New York with Governor Fletcher, in 1692. He had previously been one of the household of the Governor, and by him was made a lieutenant in the garrison at the fort. He also (as was not uncommon among officers at that time) kept a public house in New York, which, in the time of Lord Bellomont, was a political headquarters. He subsequently rose to the rank of colonel, and was one of the Commissioners for Indian Affairs, in 1715. He removed his residence to Orange county, where he held a large grant of land. He died in 1719.

WILLIAM MERRITT.

MERRITT, WILLIAM came to New York at the time of the conquest by the English, in 1664, and was engaged in trade between that city

and New England. He was an Alderman for several years. In the time of Leisler he was an active opponent of that functionary, and with others of his faction was arrested, but soon after set at liberty. He was Mayor of New York in 1695, '6, '7. He was commonly known as Colonel Merritt, from his office in the local militia.

JACOB MILBORNE.

MILBORNE, JACOB, was a native of England, and resided in London before establishing himself in New York. His brother was a celebrated Anabaptist preacher in London. Mr. Milborne, before his arrival at New York, had been a resident of Barbadoes, and also of Connecticut. He established himself in New York during the administration of Gov. Andros, and married in that city a daughter of Jacob Leisler. During the exciting events, in which the latter took the responsible part, in 1689-90, Milborne was his most active adherent, and was by many considered as the leading spirit of those events. He suffered death with his father-in-law, after conviction for high treason, in 1691. The convicts were hanged in the suburbs of the town, and afterwards beheaded. His estate was decreed to be confiscated, but the attainder was reversed by the British Parliament. His widow subsequently married Abm. Gouverneur.

GABRIEL MINVIELLE.

MINVIELLE, GABRIEL was of French descent, but emigrated from Holland to New York, where he established himself as a merchant. He married Judith Van Beeck, at New York, in 1674. In 1675 he was one of the Aldermen of the city, and in 1684 was Mayor. He subsequently became a member of the Provincial Council, but was suspended by Lord Bellomont for political causes. Colonel Minvielle was one of the leaders of the opposition to Leisler and his party. He occupied a high social position in this city, and resided in one of the best mansions in town, at the lower end of Broadway. He died in New York in 1702, leaving no children, either by his first or second wife, the latter being Susanna, daughter of Alderman John Lawrence.

ROGER MOMPESON.

MOMPESON, ROGER, seventh Chief-Justice of New York, is supposed to have descended from the Rev. William Mompesson, in England. He was a lawyer of ability, and previous to his coming to America

had been Recorder of Southampton, and a member of two Parliaments. Becoming involved, it is said, by engagements to pay some of his father's debts, Mr. M. found it convenient to accept the appointment of Judge of the Admiralty for New York and the adjoining colonies, which he received in April, 1703. He arrived in Philadelphia in the summer of that year. In July, 1704, he was appointed Chief-Justice of New York. In 1705 was sworn of the Council, of which he continued a member until his death. In 1704 he was appointed Chief-Justice of New Jersey also, and in 1706 the Chief Justiceship of Pennsylvania was added to his functions. He died about the year 1715. His widow, who was a daughter of Mayor Pinhorne, of New York, survived him.

ROBERT MONCKTON.

MONCKTON, ROBERT was second son of John, first Viscount Galway, and adopted the army as a profession. In 1754, being then Lieutenant-Colonel, he was appointed Governor of Annapolis. In 1755 he served against the reduced Fort Beausejour and Fort Gaspereau, and was in the same appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia. In 1757 he attained the rank of Colonel, and served against Louisburg. In 1759 he served as Brigadier, and was second in command under Wolfe in operations against Quebec, where he was shot through the lungs. In 1761 he became Major-General, and soon after was appointed Governor of New York. He continued in New York but a few months, and left in November of 1761 in command of an expedition against Martinico. After the reduction of Martinico he returned for a short time to New York, after which he proceeded to England. In 1766 he received the sinecure of Governor of Berwick, and in 1770 became Lieutenant-General. In 1778 he was appointed Governor of Portsmouth, and became a member of Parliament. His death occurred in 1782.

JOHN MONTGOMERIE.

MONTGOMERIE, JOHN, previous to his appointment as Governor of New York had held a high position in the household of his Majesty. He arrived in New York April 15, 1728. His administration was in the main successful, and in its connection with the local affairs of New York city was chiefly noted for the charter granted in 1730. Governor Montgomerie died at his residence in the fort, June 30, 1731.

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RICHARD MONTGOMERY.

MONTGOMERY, RICHARD was born in Ireland in 1736, his father being a member of Parliament. He received a collegiate education, and entered the army, and served with distinction at Louisbourg and against the French forts on Lake Champlain, and at Montreal. In 1762 he served as captain in the West Indies, after which he returned to New York. He proceeded to Ireland in 1767. In 1772 he retired from the service. In 1773 he returned to America, and in July of that year married Janet, daughter of Justice Livingston. He established his residence at Rhinebeck. In 1775 he was elected to the first Provincial Congress. In June of that year he was appointed Brigadier-General by the Continental Congress, and was engaged in the expedition against Canada. He fell mortally wounded before the walls of Quebec, and died 31st December, 1775, in the fortieth year of his age. His remains were interred with solemn ceremonies in St. Paul's Church, New York.

SIR HENRY MOORE.

MOORE, SIR HENRY was only son of Samuel Moore, Esq., of Jamaica, W. I., of which island he was Lieutenant-Governor from 1756 to 1759, and from 1760 to 1762. He received his baronetcy from his energy in suppressing a slave insurrection in that island, and soon after was appointed Governor of New York. His administration was successful and generally acceptable to the people, although the political affairs of the Province at that period were in a highly excited condition. He died in New York, September 11, 1769. He was the only native American who held the office of Governor-General during the Colonial period. Sir Henry Moore married the daughter of Chief Justice Long, of Jamaica, and left two children, a son and daughter.

JOHN MOORE.

MOORE, JOHN, a merchant of New York, was Assistant Alderman from 1730 to '34, and Alderman in 1737, and subsequently became a member of the Provincial Council, being then a leading merchant, and notable for his wealth and elevated character. Moore street, New York, received its name in compliment to this gentleman. He died about 1749.

LEWIS MORRIS.

MORRIS, LEWIS was a native of Monmouthshire, England, and was

captain of a troop of horse in the Parliament Army against Charles I. He retired to the island of Barbadoes, where he purchased a large estate. He was commissioned by Cromwell as Colonel, and served at the reduction of Jamaica. Having joined the Quakers, he suffered from fines, &c., and after the death of his brother Richard, in New York, he removed in 1673 to that colony, where he resided until his death, upon his manorial estate at Morrisania. He was a member of the Council from 1683 to 1686. He died in 1691.

LEWIS MORRIS.

MORRIS, LEWIS, a son of Richard M., was born at Morrisania in 1671. At twenty years of age he married Isabella, the accomplished daughter of James Graham, Esq. He removed his residence to New Jersey, where he had large landed interests, and became a leading public character in that Province. After some years' residence in New Jersey, he returned to Morrisania, and became a member of Assembly for Westchester, in 1710. In 1715 he was commissioned as Chief Justice of the Province of New York, although his education in the law had not been of a thoroughly practical character. He held the office until 1732, when he was displaced by Gov. Cosby for political causes. In the exciting public affairs of this period, Judge Morris was the leading man in the liberal party. He went to England on a political mission in 1735, and returned in the following year. He was subsequently Governor of New Jersey. He died in the year 1746.

LEWIS MORRIS, JR.

MORRIS, LEWIS, JR., son of the foregoing, was married to Catherine Staats, a daughter of one of the leading New York citizens. He was appointed at a youthful age as a member of the Provincial Council, but was suspended by Governor Montgomerie in 1729, for his opposition to certain measures of the Government. He was an active co-operator with his father, in the opposition to measures of the Colonial Governors, from 1730 to 1740, the events of that day foreboding, and sometimes immediately threatening rebellion. In 1737, Col. Morris was chosen Speaker of the Assembly, and subsequently held various prominent offices. Smith, the historian, in a letter in reference to the death of Chief Justice Morris, of New Jersey, says: "He came out to a rural dance on January 27, 1764. He took out the parson's wife, opened the ball, danced down six couples, and fell dead on the floor without a word, a groan, or a sigh."

RICHARD MORRIS.

MORRIS, RICHARD, a native of Monmouthshire, England, served as a Captain in the Parliamentary Army, and retired first to Barbadoes, where he married a wealthy lady named Pole. He afterwards removed to New York, and purchased a large landed estate in Westchester county. He pursued the business of a merchant in New York. Mr. Morris died in 1672.

ROGER MORRIS.

MORRIS, ROGER, was born in England in 1717, and bred to the army. He was Aid to Gen. Braddock, in his American campaign. In 1758, he married Mary, daughter of Frederick Philipse, of Youkers. He attained the rank of Major in 1758, and in 1759 accompanied Wolfe in the expedition against Quebec. In 1760 he was promoted to a Lieutenant-Colonelcy, and served against Montreal. He retired from the army in June, 1764. In the same year he was made a member of the Provincial Council of New York. He adhered to the Crown during the Revolution, and his estate was confiscated. At the Peace he retired to England, where he died in 1794, aged 77. His residence on New York island, near Manhattanville, is still in good preservation, and a fine specimen of architecture of that day.

STAATS LONG MORRIS.

MORRIS, STAATS LONG, son of Lewis Morris, Jr., and Catharine Staats, was born in 1728, and educated at Yale College. He entered the army, became Captain in 1756, and Major in 1758. He married about the latter period, in Scotland, the Dowager Dutchess of Gordon. By the influence of the Gordon family, a regiment of Highlanders was raised, of which Major Morris was made Lieutenant-Colonel. The young Duke received a Captain's commission; Lord William, his brother, that of Lieutenant, and Lord George, that of Ensign. The regiment was organized as the 89th Highlanders. It was ordered to the East Indies, where it arrived in 1761. In 1763, Colonel Morris was raised to the local rank of Brigadier-General. He returned to England in 1765, was made Major-General in 1777. He rose to the rank of General in the British army in 1796, received the sinecure appointment of Governor of Quebec in 1797, and died in 1800, in his seventy-second year. He was twice married, first to the Dutchess of Gordon, who died in 1770, second to Miss Urquhart, who survived her husband about a year.

JOSEPH MURRAY.

MURRAY, JOSEPH, commenced practice as a lawyer, in New York, about the year 1728, at the commencement of Governor Montgomerie's administration. He attained a leading rank in the profession, and as a politician, sided with the liberal party. He became a member of the Council about the year 1744, and occupied a high position in affairs until his death.

JOHN NANFAN.

NANFAN, JOHN entered the British army about the year 1688, and came to New York in 1698, at the same time with Governor, the Earl of Bellomont, of whom he was a relative. He was married to a lady of Barbadoes, who accompanied him to New York. He held the commission of Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, and for some time officiated as commander of the garrison at Albany, where he was mostly occupied with Indian and Canadian affairs. At the time of Lord Bellomont's decease, in 1700, Mr. Nanfan was absent at Barbadoes, engaged in matters concerning his wife's fortune. He returned to New York in May, 1701, and assumed the administration as Lieutenant-Governor, which he conducted until the arrival of Lord Cornbury, in May, 1702. The chief event of his administration was the prosecution of Bayard and Hutchins for treason, an event growing out of the high state of exasperation existing between the Anti-Leislerians and the Leislerians, the latter of whom were sustained by Lieutenant-Governor Nanfan. On the arrival of Lord Cornbury, who sided with the opposite party, Captain Nanfan was dismissed from his office, and arranged to depart for Barbadoes with his family. The latter went on ship-board, and sailed—but Capt. Nanfan was detained by an arrest for alleged deficiencies in his public accounts, and, also, for arbitrary arrests while in power. He was cast into prison, where he lay about a year and a half. His case being presented to the Government at London, his release was ordered on bail; measures were devised by his enemies to re-arrest him so soon as he obtained his liberty, which he evaded by immediately taking refuge on the man-of-war in the harbor, leaving all his effects behind him, and thus destitute he arrived in England.

FRANCIS NICHOLSON.

NICHOLSON, FRANCIS, an officer in the British army, was commissioned as Lieutenant-Governor of New York and New England, in

THE Tammany Society has established a Museum for the purpose of collecting and preserving every thing relating to the history of America, likewise, every American production of nature or art; for which purpose part of the funds of the Society are appropriated.

The success of this institution, however, must, in a great measure, depend on the voluntary contributions of a generous public; and the present collection has chiefly arisen from this source. Although, quite in its infancy, the Museum already contains many articles in the historical and natural lines, highly deserving the notice of the curious.

As almost every individual possesses some article, which in itself is of little value, but in a collective view, becomes of real importance—the patrons of this institution solicit the attention of their fellow-citizens to the Museum, and request their aid towards forming a collection which promises fair to become an object of utility. The articles and names of the generous donors, are carefully registered in a book kept for the purpose, the contents of which will be published at some future season. Every thing, and from whatever clime, will be acceptable; for although the funds of the Society are confined to American productions, the doors of the Museum are, nevertheless, open to voluntary contributions from every quarter.

The corporation of this city, ever disposed to encourage patriotic undertakings, and favourably impressed with the importance of the present, has generously granted a room in the City-Hall, on a range with the Library, for the use of the Museum, which is at present opened every Tuesday and Friday afternoons, for the gratification of public curiosity.

Any article sent there on those days, or to Mr. JOHN FURTAD, No. 57, King-street, will be thankfully accepted, and due care taken of them.

L A W S A N D R E G U L A T I O N S O F T H E A M E R I C A N M U S E U M , B E L O N G I N G T O T H E T A M M A N Y S O C I E T Y O R C O L U M B I A N O R D E R .

I. Of the election of Officers.

THE Trustees of the American Museum, as by law established, shall, on the first stated meeting after their election, annually choose from out of their number, a Chairman, a Treasurer, and a Secretary.

II. Of the Chairman.

The Chairman is to preside at all meetings; to preserve order, to regulate the debates, and to raise and put questions, agreeable to the sense and intention of the Trustees. In the absence of the Chairman, his place shall be supplied by one of the Trustees, chosen *pro hac vice*.

III. Of the Treasurer.

The Treasurer shall receive all monies that may become due to the Museum, and shall pay the same, by an order from the Chairman, which shall be his voucher. The Treasurer shall keep a regular account of all monies received and paid by him, as aforesaid; and once every year, or oftener if required by the Trustees, he shall render an account to them of the flock in his hands, and the disbursements made by their order, and shall deliver up to his successor, the books and all papers belonging to them, together with the balance of cash in his hands.

IV. Of the Secretary.

The Secretary shall take the minutes, and read all letters and papers that may be communicated to the Trustees. He shall enter into a book, to be provided for the purpose, an account of all donations made to the Museum, together with the names of the donors. He shall take charge of, and preserve, all books, pamphlets, and works presented to the Museum, or purchased by it.

All curiosities, whether of nature or art, presented or purchased, and shall class and arrange them in their proper order.

V. Of the meetings of the Trustees.

The ordinary meetings of the Trustees shall be on the second and fourth Fridays of every month, from October to May, both inclusive, at six o'clock in the evening; on the fourth Friday of each of the other four months, at seven o'clock. No meeting shall be continued after ten o'clock. Five Trustees shall constitute a quorum.

VI. Of the disposition of Money, and making new Laws. No part of the funds shall be disposed of but by a regular motion, seconded and agreed to by a majority of the Trustees present. And all orders for payment shall be signed by the Chairman. No new law shall be made, until the same shall have been proposed at one meeting, and agreed to by a majority of Trustees (forming a quorum) present at a subsequent meeting.

VII. Of a Keeper.

The Trustees shall elect a Keeper of the Museum, whose duty shall be to summon all meetings called by the Chairman, to attend the same, and perform such necessary offices as may be required. He shall receive all presents made to the Society, and deposit them in the Museum, giving an account thereof to the Secretary. He shall admit all members into the Museum, at such times as shall be appointed for that purpose, and shall take care that no visitor remove or injure any of the articles belonging to the Museum. For all which services, he shall be entitled to such compensation as the Trustees shall see fit to grant.

VIII. Of access to, and use of the Museum.

The intention of the Tammany Society or Columbian Order, in establishing an American Museum, being for the sole purpose of collecting and preserving whatever may relate to the history of our country, and serve to perpetuate the fame, as also all American curiosities of nature or art.—In order to answer this end, it is evident that every article presented to, or purchased by the Society, ought to be carefully deposited in the Museum, and never be allowed to be taken out of the same, lest it should be mislaid, and perhaps irretrievably lost. Nevertheless, in order to render this Museum serviceable, to the great interests of Society, every member of the Tammany Society shall have free access thereto, through the means of the Keeper, and shall be permitted to examine all the natural or artificial curiosities, and read all books, pamphlets and papers, and take extracts therefrom, as far as may fit his purposes, but shall not be allowed to take away any thing whatever out of the Museum, on any pretext whatever.

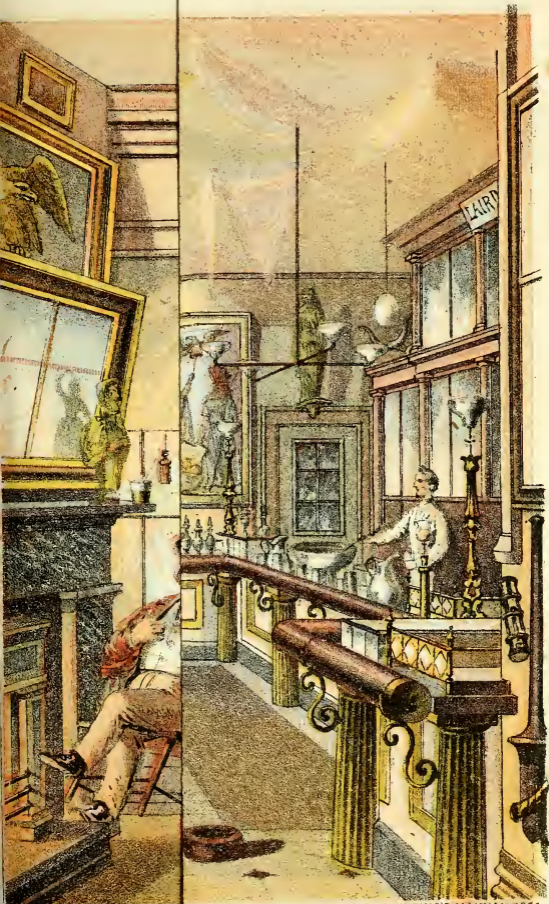

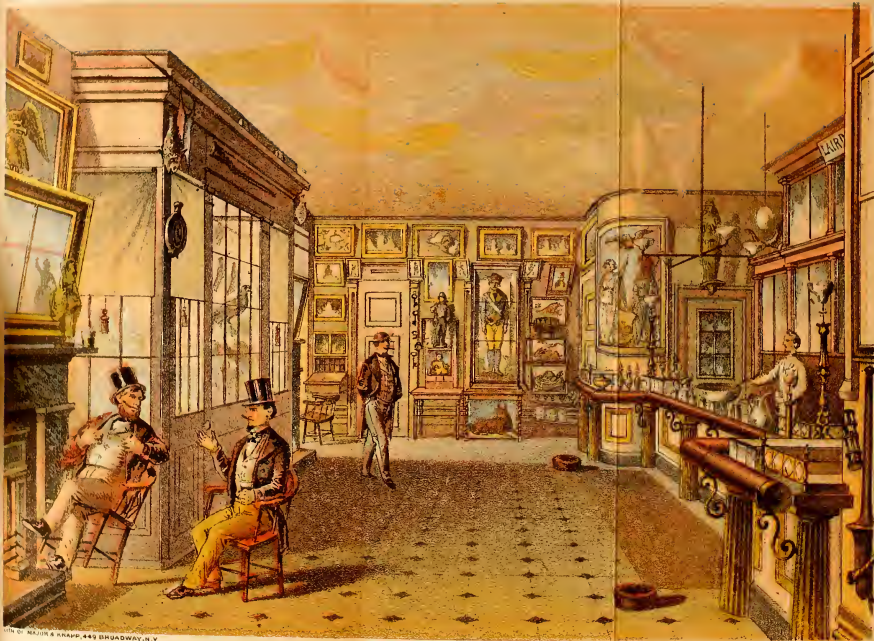

1688, under Governor Andros. Upon the rising of the people, in 1689, Nicholson, who held command in the fort, was obliged to relinquish it to the militia, and immediately departed, privately, and sailed for England, where he was active in inducing the government to take part against the malcontents in New York. In 1696 he is found in commission as Governor-in-chief of Maryland. In 1709 he commanded in chief in the expedition against Canada. In 1714 he was appointed by the government in England Commissioner of Accounts for New York, and also received from the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel a commission of spiritual inspection.

MATTHIAS NICOLL.

NICOLL, MATTHIAS, was a son of an Episcopal clergyman, of Islippe, Northamptonshire, England, and was educated as a lawyer. After the capture of the city, in 1664, he took a prominent part in public affairs, and became the first Secretary of the Province under the English, and was Presiding Judge at the Sessions in the various Ridings. In 1672 he was appointed Mayor of New York. In 1683 he was appointed one of the Justices of the Supreme Court, which office he held until his death, which took place Dec. 22, 1687, at Cowneck, L. I. (now Plandome), where he held a large landed estate.

WILLIAM NICOLL.

NICOLL, WILLIAM, son of the foregoing, was born in England, in 1657, and educated for the bar. In 1683 he was appointed Clerk of Queens county, and in 1687 was commissioned Attorney-General of the Province of New York. In the time of the troubles of 1689 he opposed Leisler, and was imprisoned until Governor Sloughter's arrival. He was a member of the Provincial Council in 1693. In 1695 he was sent as Agent, by the New York Assembly, to England, to represent the affairs of the Province; on his way he was captured by a French privateer, but was exchanged. On his return to New York he re-engaged in public affairs, and was Speaker of the Assembly in 1702, which office he held until 1718. He died in 1723. He was married in 1693, to Anne, daughter of Jeremiah and widow of Kiliaen Van Rensselaer, by whom he had three sons and three daughters. His wife died in 1715.

RICHARD NICOLLS.

NICOLLS, RICHARD, Colonel, commander of the English expedition

which captured New York in 1664, and one of the Commissioners for examining into the affairs of the New England Colonies, was the Chief Executive Officer of New York from the time of the capture until the arrival of Governor Lovelace, in 1668. His administration in New York was eminently prudent and successful. He subsequently became a member of the household of the Duke of York, afterwards King James II.

THOMAS NOELL.

NOELL, THOMAS, Mayor of New York in 1701, was a merchant in extensive business in this city, where he had then been a resident several years. The date of his grant of citizenship was in 1698. His administration of the mayoralty was at the exciting period of our political history, immediately subsequent to the death of Lord Bello-mont. Mayor Noell died at his farm on the New Jersey side of the river, opposite New York, in 1702. His family in England was of aristocratic connections.

SIR DANVERS OSBORNE.

OSBORNE, SIR DANVERS, Baronet, of Chicksands, county of Bedford, England, was commissioned as Governor of New York in 1753, and arrived in New York in the fall of that year. His wife was Lady Ann Montague, daughter of the Earl of Halifax, and sister of Lord Halifax, then President of the Board of Trade. He published his commission in New York on the 10th October, 1753, "amidst the greatest acclamations of the people, and the sincerest demonstrations of joy." But it would seem that with them the Governor could not sincerely sympathize. He had lately been bereaved of his wife, and no official advancement or change of scene could afford him solace. On the second day after (12th) he was found "about seven o'clock in the morning, in the lower part of Mr. Murray's garden (at whose house he lodged until the fort was fitted up for his reception), strangled in his handkerchief." It was observable that, although he expressed his sense of the people's joy upon his succession to the government in the most engaging manner, yet he never showed any cheerfulness, but appeared with a sedate and melancholy countenance, complaining of great indisposition of body, and disturbance of mind which could not be diverted. It was found he had committed suicide

THOMAS PALMER.

PALMER, THOMAS, a merchant of New York, was made naval officer by Lord Bellomont, in 1698, at about which period he became a resident of this city. His business was that of a merchant.

PAROCULUS PARMITER.

PARMITER, PAROCULUS, an English attorney, established his residence in New York toward the close of the 17th century, his date of citizenship being 1699. He was made naval officer of the port. His official conduct was not satisfactory, and it was subsequently ascertained that he had previously been tried in England for forgery, and condemned with one Lynch, his associate, to be hanged. Lynch suffered the penalty of the law, but Parmiter was pardoned, and emigrated to America. He was soon after removed from office.

WILLIAM PEARTREE.

PEARTREE, WILLIAM, a merchant engaged in trade between New York and the West Indies, established his residence in New York about the year 1700, and took out his citizenship in 1701. His residence was a fine one for the time, and was situated on the north side of Beaver street, between Broadway and New street. He held the office of Mayor from 1703 to 1706, and also was a member of the Provincial Council. He died in 1714, leaving no male descendants. His daughter married William Smith, one of the leading men in New York.

FREDERICK PHILIPSE.

PHILIPSE, FREDERICK, born in Holland, emigrated to New Netherland while a young man. In 1662 he married Margaretta Hardenbrook, widow of Pieter Rudolphus, who died a few years subsequently. In 1692 he married Catharina Van Cortland, daughter of O. S. Van Cortland, and widow of John Dervall. He acquired the largest fortune in the Colony. His residence and mercantile establishment were in the Brower Straat, although towards the close of his life he lived much of the time at his manor house, near Tarrytown. Mr. Philipse filled various public offices, under the English as well as the Dutch administrations. He died in 1702; his widow survived him several years. Of his children, Philip, born in 1663, died in the West Indies; Adolphus, born in 1665; Annetje, born in 1667, married Philip French in 1694; Rombout, born in 1670, died before attaining mature years. Eva married Jacobus Van Cortland, in 1691.

ADOLPHUS PHILIPSE.

PHILIPSE, ADOLPHUS, son of Frederick, was born in New York in 1665. He was educated as a merchant, which pursuit he followed in New York, in connection with the management of his large landed estate in Westchester County. He held several prominent public offices, was a member of the Provincial Council under Lord Cornbury, and held the position until 1721. He was subsequently, during several years, member of Assembly, and was Speaker from 1726 to 1737, and from 1739 to 1745. He died in 1750, in the eighty-fifth year of his age. Mr. Philipse was never married. He is said to have been a man of "superior talents, well educated, sedate, highly respected and popular," though somewhat penurious.

FREDERICK PHILIPSE.

PHILIPSE, FREDERICK, grandson of the original proprietor of Philipse Manor. He was brought up to the legal profession, and received the appointment of Third Judge of the Supreme Court. In 1733 he was appointed Second Judge, which office he held until his death, which occurred about the year 1751.

WILLIAM PINBORNE.

PINBORNE, WILLIAM, established himself as a merchant soon after the final surrender to the English in 1674. In 1686 he was Alderman of the East Ward. In October, 1685, he was Speaker of the Assembly. In the troubles of 1689-90 he took a prominent part in opposition to Leisler, he being then a member of the Provincial Council. On the arrival of Governor Sloughter, in 1691, he was appointed Recorder of New York, and in the same year he was made Fourth Justice of the Supreme Court. In 1693 he became Second Justice of the Supreme Court. He was suspended from office by Lord Bellomont in 1698. He soon after retired to his farm at Snake Hill, Bergen County, New Jersey, and was appointed Second Judge of the Supreme Court of that Province, and a member of the Council of that Province. As President of the Council, he succeeded Colonel Nicholson as Lieutenant-Governor of that Province, and administered the government until 1710. In 1713 he was dismissed from all his places of trust. He died in 1719. Judge Pinborne was married to Mary, daughter of Lieutenant-Governor Ingoldsby.

MATTHEW PLOWMAN.

PLOWMAN, MATTHEW was appointed Collector of the Port of New York, by commission dated in 1687, previous to which period he had not been a resident of New York. In the time of the troubles in 1689 he was dismissed by the Leislerian party, and absented himself from the scene of disturbance, and returned to England.

BENJAMIN PRATT.

PRATT, BENJAMIN, Chief Justice of New York, was born in 1709, in Boston. He was bred a mechanic, but, having lost a limb, turned his attention to other pursuits; graduated at Harvard in 1737, and became a distinguished practitioner at the bar. He held the station of Chief Justice of New York but a short period. He died in 1763.

DAVID PROVOOST, JR.

PROVOOST, DAVID, JR., was son of David Provcost and Tryntje Laurens, and was born in New York in 1670. He was brought up as a merchant, in which pursuit he was prosperous. He was married in 1691 to Helena Byvanck, who soon after died, when he married, in 1699, Maria De Peyster, then a widow. He had by his first wife two daughters, and a son David, the latter of whom was born in 1695. He was an Alderman in New York, and held the office of Mayor in 1699, and afterward occupied various civic and Provincial positions, among which was that of member of the Council. He died about the year 1721. His personal estate was inventoried at about £1,500. His widow married James Alexander, and was the mother of Lord Stirling, of Revolutionary memory.

JOHANNES PROVOOST.

PROVOOST, JOHANNES, a descendant of one of the early settlers of New Amsterdam, was educated as a merchant. In 1687 he married a daughter of Dominie Van Nieuwenhuysen. He was a member of the Common Council in 1688-'9. He became identified as a partisan of Leisler, and was appointed to superintend the affairs at Albany in 1689. Being then a member of Leisler's Council, after the accession to power of the opposite faction, he was retired from official position.

WILLIAM PROVOOST.

PROVOOST, WILLIAM, a merchant of New York, was recommended

as "an eminent merchant," and fit for an appointment in the Common Council in 1722, to which he was soon after elevated. He removed, about ten years subsequent, to New Jersey, "where his estate and fortune lay."

JOSEPH READE.

READE, JOSEPH, a merchant of New York, was a leading citizen of New York in social and church matters. He was elevated to the position of member of the Provincial Council in 1764. His daughter, Sarah married, in 1748, James, son of Abraham De Peyster.

PAULUS RICHARD.

RICHARD, PAULUS was a merchant in New Amsterdam before the conquest, in 1664. In the latter year he was married to Geletje Jans a widow. His residence and place of business in 1674 was on the north side of Pearl street, between the present Broad and Whitehall streets. He was then one of the considerable citizens in point of wealth. He held the office of Alderman and Commissioner of Customs. He had four daughters and three sons.

PAUL RICHARD.

RICHARD, PAUL, eldest son of Alderman Paulus Richard, was born in New York, in 1667. He engaged in mercantile pursuits, in which he took an eminent position. He was Mayor of New York from 1735 to 1739. In 1743 he was elected to the Assembly, of which he continued a member until his death, in 1756, aged eighty-nine years. Mr Richard left no children, and is believed not to have been married.

STEPHEN RICHARD.

RICHARD, STEPHEN, second son of Alderman Paulus Richard was born at New York in 1670. He married Maria Van Brugh in 1696. His business was that of a merchant. He was not prominent in political affairs, but enjoyed a high social position.

JAMES RIVINGTON.

RIVINGTON, JAMES was born in England in 1724, and became a bookseller in London. He removed to America in 1760, and settled in Philadelphia. In 1761 he established himself in New York in the book trade, in partnership with a Mr. Brown, his store being at the

lower end of Wall street. In 1773 he started "*Rivington's New York Gazetteer, or the Connecticut, New Jersey, Hudson River, and Quebec Weekly Advertiser.*" He also published several books at about the same period. His newspaper took part with the Crown, and in 1775 he was assailed by a mob, and compelled to take refuge on board the man-of-war. In November of the same year his printing office and press were destroyed by the mob. He went to England and procured new printing apparatus, with which, after the British took possession of the city, he recommenced the publication of his paper, the title of which he at first changed to "*Rivington's New York Loyal Gazette,*" and afterwards to "*The Royal Gazette.*" He subsequently moderated his political views, and on the termination of the war he was permitted to remain in the city and continue his paper, the title of which he changed to "*Rivington's New York Gazette, and Universal Advertiser.*" It met, however, with little support, and was discontinued in 1783. Mr. Rivington died in 1802, aged seventy-eight years.

FRANCOIS ROMBOUTS.

ROMBOUTS, FRANCOIS, of French extraction, emigrated from Holland to New Amsterdam in 1654, in the capacity of a merchant's clerk. He established himself here in mercantile business, and in 1665 married first Aetje Wessels, by whom he had one son born in 1666. His wife dying, he married again, in 1683, Helena Teller, daughter of one of the leading Dutch merchants, and then a widow, by whom he had two daughters and a son. Mr. Rombouts took a prominent part in local politics, and served as Alderman, and in 1679 as Mayor. He became member of Governor Sloughter's Council in 1691, and died in the same year, leaving one daughter. His residence was in Broadway, below Rector street, his garden extending to the North River shore.

WOLFGANG WILLIAM ROMER.

ROMER, WOLFGANG WILLIAM, a British Colonel of Engineers, was dispatched to America towards the close of the seventeenth century, to superintend the engineering affairs of the government. He was engaged in and about New York, and on the frontiers, in his professional pursuits, and also as a member of the New York Council until 1703, when he left the Province, and, it is believed, returned to England about 1705. Among the other labors of Colonel Romer was a survey of the harbor of New York, executed in 1700-'01. The shoals called "Romer Shoals" received their name from this survey.

THOMAS RUDYARD.

RUDYARD, THOMAS, an eminent London lawyer, was appointed in September, 1682, Deputy Governor of East Jersey, and filled the office of Attorney-General of New York in 1684, which he held until 1685. He died abroad in 1692, leaving two sons and two daughters, who remained in New York and New Jersey.

COMFORT SANDS.

SANDS, COMFORT was born at Sands' Point, L.I., in 1748, and served as clerk to merchants in New York until he went into business in 1769. He married, in the latter year, Sarah, daughter of Wilkie Dodge, of Cow Neck, L. I. He was active, preceding and during the war, as a patriot. In 1775 was a member of the Provincial Congress. In 1776 was chosen Auditor-General of Accounts, which office he resigned in 1781. In 1783, he re-established himself as a merchant in New York, was President of the Chamber of Commerce, and also served as member of Assembly several years. His first wife died in 1795. In 1797 he married Cornelia, daughter of Abraham Lott. He died at Hoboken, in 1834, aged eighty-six years.

LUCAS SANTEN.

SANTEN, LUCAS was appointed Collector of the Port of New York in 1683, and was also a member of Governor Dongan's Council. Differences arising between him and the Governor, he was suspended by the latter and sent prisoner to England. A hearing on the matter in difference was accorded him before the authorities in England, but he failed to obtain reinstatement in his office, and was succeeded by Matthew Plowman, 1687. His will was proved in New York in 1692.

BRANDT SCHUYLER.

SCHUYLER, BRANDT, a descendant of one of the early Dutch settlers at Albany, was married in New York, to Cornelia Van Cortlandt, in 1682. He established himself as a merchant in that city, and in the troubles of 1689-'90 took part against Leisler and his party, and was arrested in consequence of his political action, but discharged soon after. From 1691 to 1699 he was Alderman of the South Ward. He died about 1723.

JOHN MORIN SCOTT.

SCOTT JOHN MORIN, was educated as a lawyer in New York, and was Alderman of the Out Ward from 1757 to 1762. He was an active patriot on the American side during the Revolutionary War, was a member of the Provincial Congress in 1775-'6; of the Convention of 1776; of the State Senate from 1777 to 82; of Congress from 1779 to 1781; Secretary of State of New York from 1778 to 1789.

ISAAC SEARS.

SEARS, ISAAC was descended from New England stock, and established himself in New York some years previous to the Revolutionary War. He became one of the original members of the association called "The Sons of Liberty," and, in 1765, was for ten years subsequent the recognized leader of the most ultra of the revolutionary party in the city of New York. He was a prominent actor in the various affrays growing out of the exciting political events of that era. In 1775 he was appointed by General Lee, Deputy Adjutant-General, with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. During the occupation of this city by the British he was a resident of Boston. He returned to New York after the Peace, and was member of Assembly in 1783. In 1784-'85, the firm of Sears & Smith, of which he was a member, failed, and he made a voyage to the East Indies to retrieve his fortunes. He died at Batavia in 1786.

HENRICUS SELYNS.

SELYNS, HENRICUS, clergyman of the Dutch Reformed Church, was born in Holland, and ordained minister at Breuckelen, L. I., in 1660. He also officiated at the Governor's "Bowery" in 1664, when he returned to Holland. In 1682, after the death of Dominie Van Nieuwenhuysen, he accepted a call to the Dutch Church in New York, in which he continued until his death in 1701. He was married in New York, in 1662, to Magdalena Specht, by whom he had one child born during his residence in the province in 1663. His second wife was the widow of Hon. Cornelis Steenwyck, whom he married in 1686.

JOHN SHACKERLY.

SHACKERLY, JOHN, one of the first tobacco merchants established in New York after the surrender by the Dutch, came to New York from Delaware, where he had a large plantation. He died in New York in 1679.

HENRY SLOUGHTER.

SLOUGHTER, HENRY, a colonel in the British army, was commissioned as Governor of New York, where he arrived on the 19th March, 1691, having been delayed nearly four months on his passage. He found a terrible scene of tumult existing in the city, arising out of the refusal by Leisler and his adherents to surrender the fort and government to Sloughter's lieutenant, who had arrived before him, but without papers to show his authority for demanding possession. Colonel Sloughter at once caused the apprehension of Leisler and several of his party, who were tried and convicted of treason. Leisler and his son-in-law, Milborne, were hanged, and afterwards beheaded, on the 17th May, 1691. Governor Sloughter did not long survive his victims, as on the 23d July following he was seized with sudden illness and expired. Some suspicions existing as to the cause of his death, a *post mortem* examination was had of the body, but without establishing the surmise that he came to his death by violence. His wife, who had accompanied him to New York, remained several years after his death, endeavoring to secure to her family an amount which had been voted to her husband by the New York Assembly.

WILLIAM SMITH.

SMITH, WILLIAM, was born at Newton, Northamptonshire, England, in 1655. In 1675 he was appointed Governor of Tangiers, where he married, in the same year, Martha, daughter of Henry Tunstal, of Putney, in the county of Surrey. On the abandonment of Tangiers in 1683, Mr. Smith returned to England and embarked in commercial pursuits. He continued business in London until 1686, when he removed with his family to New York, where he established himself as a merchant. He made large purchases of land on Long Island, which, in 1693, were erected into the Manor of St. George, and which became his permanent residence. He was appointed member of the Council in 1691. In 1692 he was appointed Chief Justice of the Province, which office he held until 1700. On the death of Bellomont he became President of the Council. He was again appointed Chief Justice in 1702, and filled that office until 1703. He continued a member of the Council until his death, which occurred at St. George's Manor, in 1705, in the 51st year of his age. His estate was inventoried at £2,589.04, and among the stock on his plantation, on Long Island, were fifteen slaves. The city residence of Judge Smith was on Broadway, opposite the Bowling Green. His domestic establish-

ment in 1703 consisted of—*whites*, one male, one female; *negroes*, two male and four female, six children. His wife died in 1709. His daughter Patty married Caleb Heathcote, at one time Mayor of New York. Another daughter married John Johnston, also Mayor. Another daughter married Chief Justice Delancey. Another daughter married Rev. Mr. Morrison.

WILLIAM SMITH.

SMITH, WILLIAM, a distinguished lawyer of New York, was born in Buckinghamshire, England, in 1697, and arrived with his father's family in New York in 1715. He studied law, and was admitted to the bar, where he took a leading position. In 1751 he was appointed Attorney General. In 1755 he was called to the Council, and in 1763 was appointed one of the Judges of the Supreme Court. He died in 1769.

WILLIAM SMITH, JR.

SMITH, WILLIAM, Jr., son of Judge Wm. Smith, was born in New York in 1728. He graduated at Yale College in 1745. In 1748 was appointed Clerk to the Court of Chancery, and was called to the bar in 1750. In 1757 he published his History of New York. He was called to the Council in 1769. He adhered to the Royal cause in the time of the Revolution. After the war he proceeded to England, where he remained until 1686, when he was appointed Chief Justice of Canada. He died in 1793.

SAMUEL STAETS.

STAETS, SAMUEL, was (it is supposed) a son of Dr. Staets of Albany, one of the earliest settlers of Rensselaerwyck. The subject of this sketch was born in this Province while under the Dutch rule, and was sent to Holland to learn his profession, after which he returned here, and was in New York at the time of the final surrender to the English. He declined taking the oath of fealty to the new government, and retired to Holland, where he remained until about the year 1688, when, after the accession of the Prince of Orange to the English throne, Dr. Staets returned to his native land, and established himself in New York, at about the time of the *quasi* revolution, headed by Weisler. He allied himself to the party of the latter, and became one of his council, and a recognized leader of that party. During the

administration of Sloughter and Fletcher, he was in opposition, but upon the arrival of Lord Bellomont, he was appointed one of his council, which post he held until 1702, when he was suspended by Lord Cornbury. He died in the year 1715. The children of Dr. Staets, born in New York, were Catalina, born in 1689, Anna Elizabeth, born in 1690, and Johanna, born in 1694.

CORNELIS STEENWYCK.

STEENWYCK, CORNELIS. Of this citizen, an extended biography has been given in another part of this volume.

PETER STUYVESANT.

STUYVESANT, PETER, Director General of New Netherland, died in New York, after the accession of the English. His history, however, more appropriately belongs to the Dutch era.

NICHOLAS WILLIAM STUYVESANT.

STUYVESANT, NICHOLAS WILLIAM, a son of the Director General, was born in New Amsterdam, in 1648, and married, first, Maria, daughter of William Beekman, in 1672, by whom he had two children. His second wife, whom he married in 1681, was Elizabeth Slechtenhorst of Albany, by whom he had six children. Mr. Stuyvesant resided on the "Bowery," and represented the Out Ward as Alderman for several years. He followed mercantile pursuits in the city, in connection with the management of his extensive landed property. Mr. Stuyvesant died about 1698.

GERARDUS STUYVESANT.

STUYVESANT, GERARDUS, son of Nicholas Willam, was born in New York in 1691. He was married in 1722, to Judith Bayard. He was Aldermen of the Out Ward from 1722 to 1753, a period of 31 years. His business pursuits were the same as those of his father.

LANCASTER SYMES.

SYMES, LANCASTER, came from England to New York as a soldier, in Gov. Sloughter's forces, in 1691. He was subsequently advanced to the position of Lieutenant; and subsequently rose to the rank of Major. He engaged in mercantile pursuits in New York, at the same time

commanding one of the companies in garrison in the fort. His long residence in that capacity gave him some notoriety among the public men of the day. He died in New York, 1729.

WILLIAM TELLER.

TELLER, WILLIAM was of New Netherland Dutch ancestry. He was married in New York, to Maria Verleth (then a widow), in 1664, and conducted business as a merchant in that city for many succeeding years. He died about the year 1700, possessed of a considerable estate.

COENRAET TEN EYCK.

TEN EYCK, COENRAET, one of the early settlers of New Amsterdam, followed the business of a tanner and shoemaker. He resided in the city over thirty years, during which time he was the leading man in his trade. He died in 1680, leaving his tannery to his three sons, Dirck, Tobias and Coenraet.

WILLIAM TRYON.

TRYON, WILLIAM, who had previously been Governor of North Carolina, received the commission of Governor of New York, where he arrived in July, 1771. His administration was characterized by events growing out of the revolutionary symptoms then prevalent. In 1774 he repaired to England, ostensibly for the benefit of his health. In the following year he was directed to return, and arrived in July, 1775. He was notified that the government intended to enforce its policy respecting the colonies, and, against his judgment as to their propriety, he followed his instructions. In 1775, the Continental Congress passed a resolution recommending the seizure of the king's officials. In consequence of which he retired, in October of that year, on board of a British man-of-war then lying in the harbor, where he remained for several months, meanwhile nominally administering the government. In the following year he raised some loyalist forces on Long Island and adjacent counties, whom he was to command as Major-General. At his own request he was relieved of his position as Governor of New York, in 1777, and was succeeded by General Robertson. His successor, however, did not immediately arrive, and he remained in New York, exercising his official and military functions, until March, 1780, when Gov. Robertson arrived, to whom the seals were delivered up, and General Tryon then, as he had long pre-

viously been greatly afflicted with the gout, resolved upon returning to England.

JOHN TUDOR.

TUDOR, JOHN, an English lawyer, became a resident of New York in Gov. Andros' time. He likewise was engaged in mercantile pursuits, and became a prominent actor in the troubles of 1689 and '90. He was Recorder of New York from 1704 to 1707.

JEREMIAH TOTHILL.

TOTHILL, JEREMIAH, born in England, engaged in mercantile business in New York, where he was married, in 1686, to Janneken De Key. He was active in opposition to the Leislerites, and assaulted Lieut.-Gov. Leisler. In 1696 and in 1703 and '04, he was a member of the Common Council.

JOHANNES VAN BRUGH.

VAN BRUGH, JOHANNES, a prominent merchant and magistrate of New Amsterdam (to which period his history principally belongs), served in the Common Council during several years after the English accession. His business concerns were of an extensive character. He died in New York at an advanced age, about 1699. He married Catherine Roelofs, widow of Lucas Roodenburg, in 1658. This lady survived him. He left several children surviving him: Helena, wife of Tunis DeKay, Anna, wife of Andries Grevenraedt, Peter-Catherine, wife of Henry Van Rensselaer, Johannes, and Mary, wife of Stephen Richard.

OLOFF STEVENSEN VAN CORTLAND.

VAN CORTLAND, OLOFF STEVENSEN, one of the early settlers, and a leading man in the times of the Dutch, died in New York after the English came into possession (viz., in 1683); his history, however, appropriately belongs to the Dutch period.

STEPHANUS VAN CORTLAND.

VAN CORTLAND, STEPHANUS, eldest son of Oloff Van Cortland, was born in New York, in 1643. He was brought up to mercantile pursuits, and was married, in 1671, to Geertruyd Schuyler. In 1674, when the city was recaptured by the Dutch, he served as Schepen, and

after the final surrender to the English, he was Alderman, in 1675-'6, and in 1687 was called to the Provincial Council. He was Mayor of New York in 1677, 1686-'7-'8-'9. The latter year was that in which the Leislerites took possession of the Government. Mr. Van Cortland, who took an active part in opposition to that party, was obliged to flee the city, to avoid arrest. On the arrival of Governor Sloughter, Colonel Van Cortland returned to New York. He became an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and a Judge of the Common Pleas. In 1698 he was appointed by Lord Bellomont Commissioner of the Customs and Collector of the Revenue. He is represented as soon after becoming infirm. He died, after a week's illness, November 25, 1700, aged fifty-seven years. Colonel Van Cortland left eleven children surviving, viz. : Johannes, Margaret, Ann, Olivia, Mary, Philip, Stephanus, Gertrude, Elizabeth, Catherine, and Cornelia. His estate was large, and included Cortland Manor, on the Hudson River, at the entrance of the Highlands.

JACOBUS VAN CORTLAND.

VAN CORTLAND, JACOBUS, youngest son of Oloff Stevensen Van Cortland, was born in New Amsterdam, in 1658, and married Eva Philipse, daughter of the wealthy Frederick Philipse, in 1691. He followed mercantile pursuits. In 1686, 1694 to 1703, he was Alderman, and from 1710 to 1719 was Mayor of New York. He died in the year 1739, aged 81 years.

JOHANNES VAN CORTLAND.

VAN CORTLAND, JOHANNES, eldest son of Stephanus Van Cortland, was born in New York in 1672, and was married in 1695 to Anna Maria Van Schaick. He was a merchant of New York, in high standing, but took no active part in political affairs.

PHILIP VAN CORTLAND.

VAN CORTLAND, PHILIP, third son of Stephanus, was born in New York, in 1683, and married Catherine De Peyster in 1710. He followed mercantile pursuits, and took some part in politics, serving in the Common Council as Assistant Alderman, 1714-'15-'16, and as Alderman from 1717 to 1729.

RIP VAN DAM.

VAN DAM, RIP was born in New Netherland, about the year 1760. He established himself as a merchant and shipbuilder in New York, and in 1684 married Sara Vanderspeigle, daughter of a respectable baker of that city. He was Assistant Alderman in 1693-'4-'5, and belonged to the anti-Leislerian party of that day. He became a member of the Council in the year 1702, which office he held during several successive administrations. On the death of Governor Montgomerie, in 1731, he became, as President of the Council, acting Executive of the Province, which position he held until the arrival of Gov. Cosby, in 1733. The latter demanded half the perquisites received by Van Dam during his term, as having been specially allowed him by the King, which Van Dam refused to pay. Violent political agitation ensued, in which the prerogatives of the Royal Governors were the points at issue, and the occasion produced important results in the popular mind. A lawsuit was instituted, entitled *The King' vs. Van Dam*, to recover the perquisites, and in this was involved the question of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court to hold pleas in equity, on which the judges disagreed, the majority being in favor of the Crown. Governor Cosby, in 1736, being taken seriously ill, and apprehending his decease, suspended Mr. Van Dam, soon after which the Governor died. Mr. Van Dam took the ground that his suspension was unlawful, and claimed the government, in which he was successfully resisted by President Clarke, though he was supported by a strong popular sentiment. Mr. Van Dam died in 1749, aged near 90 years.

ABRAHAM VAN HORNE.

VAN HORNE, ABRAHAM was descended from a New Netherland family, and established himself as a merchant in New York, where he was married, in 1700, to Maria Provoost. His business concerns were of an extensive character, and he acquired a large estate. His daughter married his Excellency Governor Burnet, about the year 1721. Mr. Van Horne was appointed a member of Burnet's council in 1723, which position he held until his death in 1741.

CORNELIS VAN HORNE.

VAN HORNE, CORNELIS was born in New York about the year

1694, and was married in 1718 to Elizabeth French. He followed mercantile pursuits. He was appointed Mayor of New York by President Van Dam in 1736, but the validity of his appointment was denied, and he did not act officially.

GARRET VAN HORNE.

VAN HORNE, GARRET, a son of Cornelis Jansen Van Horne, was born in New York in 1671, and married Elsie Provoost, in 1693. He followed mercantile pursuits. He was a member of Assembly from New York for several years. He died about the year 1738.

GULEYN VERPLANCK

VERPLANCK, GULEYN commenced mercantile business in New Amsterdam, where he had previously been a clerk for Allard Anthony. He married Hendrickje Wessels, in 1668. He was Schepen in 1673, and Alderman in 1677-'78-'79-'83. He died in 1685, leaving four children surviving, Samuel, Jacobus, Abraham, and Anna.

REVEREND WILLIAM VESEY.

VESEY, REVEREND WILLIAM graduated at Harvard College, Massachusetts, and removed thence to Long Island, where he officiated as a dissenting minister. On the incorporation of Trinity Church, New York, in 1696, he was invited to conform to the Church of England. He proceeded to England, received holy orders, and was appointed Rector of Trinity Church, where he first officiated in 1697, and which he held until his death, in 1746. Mr. Vesey was married in this city in 1698, to Mrs. Mary Reade, a widow.

ROBERT WALTERS.

WALTERS, ROBERT established himself as a merchant in New York, where he was married in 1685, to Catherina, daughter of Jacob Leisler. In 1688, '9, he was Alderman of the South Ward. He was a partisan of his father-in-law in the exciting political events of his day, and became a member of Assembly in 1689. He was called to Lord Bellomont's Council in 1700, from which he was suspended, with the other Leislerites, by Lord Cornbury, in 1702. He was also one of the Justices of the Supreme Court, during Bellomont's administration.

He was soon after reinstated in his several offices, and held them until his death. He was Mayor of New York, in 1720-'21-'22-'23. Mr. Walters died about the year 1731.

WILLIAM WALTON.

WALTON, WILLIAM, a merchant of New York, married Cornelia Beckman in this city, in 1731. His trade with Southern Atlantic ports, particularly with St. Augustine, which he supplied many years with provisions by contract, being the only merchant whom the Spaniards allowed to trade at that port, where he had a factor. It is also said that he made large sums of money during the French war by foreign trade. Mr. Walton built the Walton Mansion, in Pearl street, then the finest private residence in the city. It is still standing, near Franklin square, one of the most interesting monuments existing of the early architecture of the city. Mr. Walton died about 1768—being then a member of the Provincial Council.

SIR PETER WARREN.

WARREN, SIR PETER was born about the year 1700, and entered the Navy. He was a Captain in 1727. In 1744, he was commander of the Fleet at the Leeward Islands. In 1745 he served at the siege of Louisburg. He became Admiral, and after various distinguished services was knighted in 1766. In the course of his naval service he was stationed at New York, where he married Susan, daughter of Stephen Delancey. He established his residence in the suburbs of the city, at Greenwich, where he owned a large estate. He died in 1758.

JOHN WATTS.

WATTS, JOHN, eldest son of Robert Watts of Rose Hill, near Edinburg, and Mary, eldest daughter of William Nicoll, of Islip, Long Island, was born in New York, in 1715. He was married to Mary, daughter of William Nicoll, by whom he had issue, Mary and John. In 1742 he married Ann, youngest daughter of Stephen Delancey. His residence was at Rose Hill farm, on the East River, between the present 21st and 30th streets. His town house was at No. 3 Broadway. He was for some years member of Assembly, and in 1757, was called to the Council, of which he continued a member un-

til 1775, when he retired to England. In 1779 his property in New York was confiscated, but the most valuable part was afterwards re-conveyed by the Commissioners of Forfeiture to his two sons, Robert and John. Mr. Watts, died in Wales, in 1789, in the 60th year of his age. Of his children, Robert married Mary, daughter of the Earl of Stirling; Ann married Captain Archibald Kennedy, afterwards Earl of Capilis; John, Recorder in 1774; Susannah married Colonel Philip Kearney; Mary married Sir John Johnson; Stephen married Mary Nugent, and Margaret married Colonel Robert Leake.

THOMAS WEAVER.

WEAVER, THOMAS, a lawyer, previously a resident in the Leeward Islands, accompanied Lord Bellomont to America in 1698, where he was appointed King's Counsel, and was soon after sent back as Agent in Great Britain for the Province of New York. He obtained the office of Collector of the Port of New York in 1699, but did not return until the following year, when he was also called to the Provincial Council. He became one of the most active political partizans on the side of the Leislerites, and was suspended from office by Lord Cornbury, who, on his arrival, sided with the opposite faction. He found it necessary to abscond, to evade an order which had been issued for his arrest, and he did not again return to New York.

THOMAS WENHAM.

WENHAM, THOMAS, a New York merchant of English descent, was one of the Commissioners of Customs, in 1689, at which period he was an active anti-Leislerite in politics. In 1698, he was Alderman of the South Ward. In the exciting times of 1702 he was indicted, with other anti-Leislerites, and to save himself from imprisonment, absconded. He returned after the advent of Lord Cornbury, and was elevated to a seat in the Provincial Council, which position he held until his death, which occurred in 1709.

JOHN WEST.

WEST, JOHN became a resident of New York about the time of Gov. Andros. In 1680, he was appointed Clerk to the Court of Assizes, and Clerk to the city of New York. In 1684, he married Anne, daughter of Thomas Rudyard, Lieutenant-Governor of New Jersey.

He accompanied Governor Andros to Boston, and when the latter was overthrown, West also was seized, and thrown into prison.

HENRY WHITE.

WHITE, HENRY was a Commissary in the British service, and a prominent merchant in New York, and was one of the consignees of the tea sent to that city. He was sworn of the Council in 1769, and continued a member until the Peace, in 1783, when he returned to England. His estate was confiscated in 1779. He was married in New York, in 1755, to Eve, daughter of Frederick Van Cortland. One of his sons rose to be a General in the British Army, and another to the rank of Vice-Admiral in the Navy. Mrs. White died in New York, in 1836, at the age of 90.

THOMAS WILLET.

WILLET, THOMAS, one of the earliest English merchants resident in New Amsterdam, was one of the Plymouth Pilgrims, where he arrived in 1629. His trade was principally with the New England colonies, to which he was a frequent visitor, and became useful in negotiations between the authorities of the two colonies. On the capture of the city by the English in 1665, he was judiciously appointed Mayor of New York, being the first who held that position. He afterwards removed his residence to Seekonk, Bristol county, Massachusetts, where he died in 1674. It is stated in some biographical notices of Mr. Willet, that he was married in 1636, to Mary, daughter of John Brown, of Plymouth, by whom he had seven children. In the Dutch Church records of New Amsterdam the marriage of Thomas Willet with Sara Cornell, in 1643, is stated, and it would seem highly probable that the individual was the subject of this sketch.

RICHARD WILLETT.

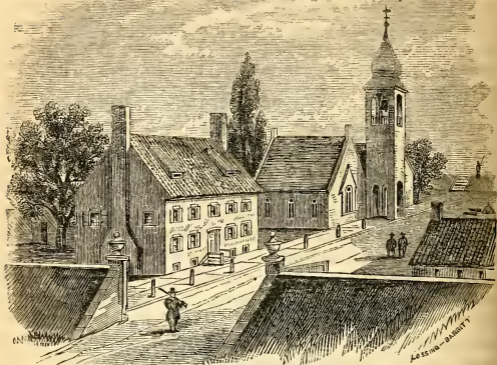
WILLETT, RICHARD, a merchant of New York, was nominated by the Assembly for Treasurer of the Province in 1705, being the first person named for that office. He was a prominent officer of Trinity Church, and was Alderman of the Dock Ward in 1706-'07-'08.

EBENEZER WILSON.

WILSON, EBENEZER, a merchant of New York, was an active participant in the public affairs of his time. After serving in the Common Council he was appointed Sheriff in 1698 and 1702. He was Mayor of New York in 1707-'08-'09, and member of Assembly in 1709, '10. His residence and place of business were in the lower part of Wall street.

JOHN PETER ZENGER.

ZENGER, JOHN PETER was born in Germany, in 1697, and arrived in New York in 1710, in which year he was bound apprentice to William Bradford, the printer, for the term of eight years. After the termination of the apprenticeship, he married, in 1722, Anna Catharina Malin. He soon after set up business on his own account, and in 1733 commenced the publication of "Zenger's New York Weekly Journal," a newspaper started in opposition to Bradford's New York Gazette, which favored the Court party. The imprisonment of Zenger, founded upon the political articles appearing in his paper, his trial, and the exciting events growing out of it, are matters of well known history. Zenger continued the publication of his paper until his death, which occurred in 1745.

History of the Fort in New York,

This edifice was, for nearly two centuries, the most important in the city of New York, it being not only the principal means of defense for the city, and the centre of military affairs, but from the circumstance that it contained within its walls the residence of the Provincial Governor, the principal officers of the State civil authority,

and for a long time the only place of worship in the city. It was distinguished not less for its social and political associations than from its characteristics as a military post.

The earliest accounts of the settlement of the Dutch upon the island concur, in stating that a work of defense was erected upon its site as early at least as 1614, at which time it was described as a palisaded work; its particular form and dimensions have not been furnished.

The permanent settlement of families commenced about 1626, at which time the subject of a more substantial work of defense seems to have been taken into consideration. De Razieres, in discussing the matter, says: "This point might, with little trouble, be made into a small island, by cutting through Blommaert's Valley" (alluding to the marsh in the present site of Broad and Beaver streets), "so as to afford a haven, winter and summer, for sloops and ships. It ought, from its nature, to be a ROYAL FORT, so that it could be approached by land only on one side, as it is a triangle, bounded by two rivers. Three angles are indicated by nature; the most northern is opposite to and commands within the range of cannon shot, the great Mauritius (North) river and the land. The southernmost, on the water-level, commands the channel between Nutten" (Governor's) "Island and the fort, together with the Hell Gate" (East River). "The third point, opposite to Blommaert's Valley, commands the low land. The middle, which ought to be left as a landmark, is the height of a hillock above the surrounding land, and should always serve as a battery, which might command the three points if the streets should be arranged accordingly."

The latter part of the suggestion of De Razieres seems to have been carried out, viz.: that of constructing the battery upon the hillock which he describes. The fort was staked out by an Engineer named Kryn Frederick, and was set around with palisades, but the situation of the fort was not approved by those of experience. When, in after years, Gov. Stuyvesant was induced, without a shot in its defense, to surrender the fort and Province, he excused himself to his superiors by saying, that "the fort is situated in an untenable place, where it was located on the first discovery of New Netherland, for the purpose of resisting an attack of the barbarians rather than an assault of European arms, having, within pistol shot on the north and northeast sides, higher ground than that on which it stands, so that, notwithstanding the walls and works are raised highest on that side,

people standing and walking on that high ground can see the soles of the feet of those on the esplanade and bastions of the fort."

As to the method of construction of the fort and the buildings erected within it at the early period when it was first erected, and indeed at any time within the first eight or ten years after it was designed, it seems certain that the walls were merely ramparts of earth, eight or ten feet high, while the buildings within it, occupied by the officers of the company and the garrison, were of hewn plank, or bark edifices, roofed with reeds. This was the condition of the fort during the administration of the first of the Dutch Governors—Minuit.

Gov. Van Twiller arrived in 1633, with authority to improve the condition of things at the fort; and, under his instructions, a guard-house and barracks for his newly arrived soldiers were constructed within the walls, and a windmill, used to grind the grain necessary for the garrison, was erected on the southwest bastion of the fort. The company's slaves, under the supervision of Jacob Stoffelsen, the overseer, were the laborers principally engaged in these improvements. At a subsequent period, when these slaves had grown old, they petitioned the authorities for their freedom and recounted their services at the time mentioned in support of their application. Their overseer gave them a certificate, "that during the administration of Van Twiller he, as overseer of the company's negroes, was continually employed with said negroes in the construction of Fort Amsterdam, which was finished in 1635; that the negroes assisted in chopping trees for the big house, making and splitting palisades and other work."

The "big house," above referred to, was the Governor's residence. It was built of brick, and was, no doubt, a substantial edifice, as it is found to have served for the residence of successive chiefs of the colony during all the Dutch era, and for a few years subsequent.

In respect to the walls of the fort, they were in nowise improved by Van Twiller, except the northwest bastion, which was faced with stone. The other parts of the walls were banks of earth without ditches, nor were they surrounded by a fence to keep off the goats and other animals running at large in the town. Gov. Kieft arrived in 1638, and found the fort in a decayed state, "open on every side, so that nothing could obstruct going in or coming out, except at the stone point."

But it is probable that the fort answered a very serviceable purpose in respect to keeping the Indians in a state of awe. An Indian war broke out in 1641, and raged for many succeeding months, resulting

in the devastation of most of the farms and exposed settlements, even within stone's throw of the settlement of New Amsterdam. The frightened settlers fled to the fort, but no accommodations could be afforded them within its walls, and they established their cottages as close to its protecting ramparts as possible. Thus it was that two or three new streets were formed around the southern and eastern walls of the fort. After the danger had passed, these buildings were allowed to remain, and grants of the lots were made to the possessors. Thus was formed that portion of the present Pearl street west of Whitehall street, and also a portion of the latter street. In after times, as we shall relate, some of the encroachments thus made upon the proper domain of the fort were removed.

The insufficient condition of the fort as a place of defense became the subject of serious consideration after this war, and the authorities in Holland, listening to the importunities of the colonists, gave directions for its improvement, requiring, however, that the people should contribute, to some extent, towards the labor and expense involved. In 1647, the subject was discussed in the Council of the Director-General, and a resolution was arrived at that the fort should be repaired with stone, laid in mortar, "by which means alone," it was stated, "a lasting work could be made," inasmuch as the earth to be procured in the neighborhood was entirely unfit to make it stable with sods, unless it were annually renewed, nearly at the same expense; and as this project required a considerable disbursement for labor in carrying the stone, &c., it was found expedient to consult the inhabitants, to learn the extent to which assistance would be afforded by them.

In communicating their resolve to the people, the authorities referred to "this glorious work, which must increase the respect for the Government, as well as afford a safe retreat to the inhabitants in case of danger." The suggestion made was, that every male inhabitant, between the ages of sixteen and sixty years, devote, annually, twelve days labor, or, in lieu thereof, contribute for each day, two guilders (eighty cents).

But the project was found too expensive for the means at hand, and the completion of the work with stone was abandoned for the time, the work being repaired with earth, as before. Nor does it appear that it was, as yet, protected by an inclosure from the inroads of the vagrant cattle, as the Director is found, from time to time, expostulating with the city authorities against permitting swine,

goats, and other animals, to run at large in the town, from which great destruction to the works of the fortress ensued.

This matter came to be considered of so great importance that, in 1656, Gov. Stuyvesant again communicated with the Holland authorities respecting the improvement of the fort, and received from them a favorable response, stating that they had no objection to have the fort surrounded with a stone wall, and were willing, in the ensuing spring, to send "a few good masons and carpenters to assist in the work," enjoining the Governor, in the meanwhile, to have the necessary materials prepared and in readiness when the mechanics should arrive.

That this work was proceeded with at the time mentioned, is apparent from a petition presented by Resolvert Waldron, in 1657, in which he states that, as overseer of the negroes, he has been engaged with them by day and night in breaking rocks, &c., for underlaying the fortress with stone, and asking an increase of his salary. And in 1659, Governor Stuyvesant writes to his Deputy, in the West Indies, that he was engaged in inclosing the fort with a stone wall, and for the purpose of lessening the expense, he would require a half dozen of the old Company's negroes, who might be spared for a time. It is probable that the work then in progress was merely a base-wall, of sufficient height to keep the cattle from the sod-work.

As this brings the history of the fort to a period near the close of the Dutch administration, some further details respecting the edifice and its surroundings at that period will be found interesting. The interior of the fort was a plain, about one hundred and fifty feet square, and contained the Governor's residence, erected by Van Twiller, in 1635; the church, constructed of stone, erected in 1642, under Kieft's administration; the prison, the guard-house, barracks, &c. An entry in the Records of the Burgomaster, in 1656, relating to matters in and about the fort, is to the effect that Burgomaster Anthony proposed that, as the church in the fort is getting more and more out of repair, and as the Director-General is the sole churchwarden, whether it would not be advisable to supersede him with a more diligent officer. The same Burgomaster also stated that the Director-General had suggested to him the propriety of discontinuing the use of the old graveyard on Broadway, and dividing it into lots for sale, and to establish a new graveyard south of the fort, after removing the houses standing there. The matter was discussed by several of the Burgomasters, all of whom agreed in the necessity for discontinuing the old graveyard; but it was the prevailing opinion that it

was unadvisable to remove the houses south of the fort, and that it was better "to establish the graveyard west of the fort, in the neighborhood of the windmill, where there is a good hill, clear of timber." The windmill here alluded to, stood, as before mentioned, on the southwest bastion, and near the present corner of State and Stone streets.

Of the church within the fort Jan Gillisen was "Koeck," or Bell-ringer, and was allowed for that service, and for bringing the magistrates' cushions from the City Hall to their official pews, and returning the same, fifty florins, or twenty dollars per annum. Of the circumstances attending the erection of this church, and its cost, full accounts have already been given in histories of that period, but of its actual appearance there is no full illustration that we are aware of. Several pictures of the fort, at different periods, show the roof and steeple of this edifice, the earliest of which is that drawn by Heermanus, in 1656, which shows a building with two peaked roofs, having the steeple in front, between the two. This was undoubtedly its form of construction, as it is described in that manner in a document subsequent to the Dutch era.

The Governor's house appears to have been a plain, two-story building, and is mentioned by Father De Jaques as of "neat" appearance. Both the house and the church stood on the easterly side of the fort, and faced to the west. The position of these principal buildings, as seen from the entrance at the fort gate, is shown in the engraving.

The fort was surrendered to the English in August, 1664, and as its surrender involved the loss of the entire Dutch possessions in New Netherland, the conduct of Governor Stuyvesant, in not maintaining its defense, was severely criticised by his superiors in Holland. In his justification, he explained that the fort was encompassed only by a slight wall, two to three feet in thickness, backed by coarse gravel, not above eight, nine, and ten feet high, in some places; in others, higher, according to the rise and fall of the ground. It was for the most part crowded all around with buildings, and better adapted for a citadel than for defense against an open enemy. The houses were, in many places, higher than the walls and bastions, and rendered those wholly exposed. Most of the houses had cellars not eight rods distant from the wall of the fort; in some places, not two or three feet distant, and at one point, scarce a rod from the wall, so that whoever should be master of the city, could readily approach with scaling-lad-

ders from the adjacent houses, and mount the walls, which had neither a wet nor a dry ditch.

But the explanations and excuses made by Governor Stuyvesant were not at all satisfactory to his superiors, who replied that, although it was true that the fort was at first constructed to resist the incursions of the barbarians, yet it was also true that it was afterwards so strengthened by a rampart and an earthen wall, that, if kept in good condition, it need not fear any assault from European arms. They further asserted that, although the fort was encompassed with houses, yet it should have been defended, if it were necessary to pull all the houses down for that purpose. But it would seem that the protection of private property was more regarded than that of the public property, aye, even of the whole Province and Government. As to the further excuse that there was no cistern in the fort, the Company asserted that it sounded very strange to them, and that they were then, for the first time, apprised of the fact. But they knew, however, that there was a well of water close by the fort, which could, with very little trouble, be brought into it. The Committee of the Company, in conclusion, asserted their conviction as to the causes and reason of the loss of the place were these: The persons in office, as well as the Governor, being very deeply interested in lands, boundaries and buildings, were unwilling to offer any opposition first at the time of the English encroachments, in order thereby not to afford any pretext for firing and destroying their properties; and having always paid more attention to their particular affairs than to the Company's interests, New Amsterdam was found, on the arrival of the English frigates, as if an enemy was never to be expected; and finally, that the Director, first following the example of heedless, interested parties, gave himself no other concern than about the prosperity of his boundaries, and, when the pinch came, allowed himself to be rode over by clergymen, women, and cowards, in order to surrender to the English what he could defend with reputation, for the sake of thus saving their private properties.

THE FORT UNDER THE ENGLISH, FROM 1664 TO 1672.

At eight o'clock on the morning of September 8, 1664, Stuyvesant, at the head of the garrison, marched out of the fort with the honors of war, pursuant to the terms of surrender. His soldiers were led down the "Bevers' Paatje," or Beaver lane, to the shore of the North River, where they embarked for Holland.

An English corporal's guard immediately entered and took posses-

sion of the fort, the name of which was changed to FORT JAMES, in compliment to James, Duke of York, the King's brother, to whom the territory had been granted.

The condition of the fort was taken into consideration at an early period, and, for the purpose of improving its defensive character, it was proposed to raise the walls higher. But Colonel Cartwright, the engineer, was of opinion that such an improvement would afford but trifling advantage. The measure finally adopted was the construction of a battery under the walls of the fort, and along the river front, which, it was concluded, would be "of greater advantage and more considerable than the fort itself." The battery was built under the supervision of General Leverett. In the excavations of "the Fort Hill," it is said stones were removed exceeding a ton in weight.

The interior of the fort was improved under Governor Lovelace, and it seems that the Governor's house was rebuilt by him. (See Andros' Report, of date 1681.) The tiles were removed from the church, and shingles substituted.

In a description of the fort in 1671, it is described as built of earth. "Within it and on the outermost bastion towards the river stands a windmill and a very high staff, on which a flag is hoisted whenever any vessels are seen in Godyns' bay. The church rises with a double roof, between which a tower looms aloft. On one side is the prison, and on the other side of the church the Governor's house."

RECAPTURE OF THE FORT BY THE DUTCH.

The war which broke out between the English and Dutch, which was mostly carried on by the naval service of the two powers, occasioned apprehensions for the safety of the Province of New York, and Governor Lovelace made preparations for a demonstration of that character on the part of the Dutch. In May, 1672, he called on the inhabitants of different portions of the Province for assistance in men and money to bring the fort into a condition of defense, to which liberal responses were given by the English population, but the Dutch were more passive, and inclined to let events shape themselves without their co-operation.

Some months elapsed without any event happening indicating the approach of danger; but about the month of March, 1673, news came that a Dutch fleet was on the sea, bound first for Virginia, and thence for New York; activity again ensued in the fortifications of the latter place, and troops were brought from various parts of the province to assist in defense. But no enemy appearing, a fatal sense of security

induced the Governor to disband most of the levies, and the Governor himself departed, on a visit to the eastern colonies, leaving the fort in charge of Captain John Manning.

The Dutch fleet entered the lower bay on the 28th July, 1673, and on the 30th summoned the fort, and on the same day landed near eight hundred men on the North River shore above the outskirts of the city. Hearing of the landing of the enemy, Captain Manning sent a flag of truce and surrendered, and the Dutch forces took possession.

A quaint description of its capture is herewith given in the language of one of the garrison, whose account is dated August 8, 1673 :

“The relation of one of the corporalls of the garrison as followeth, viz. : on the last Monday was sevensnight the Dutch flecte appeared about Sandy Hooke. On tuesday they came to an anchor under Staten Island. On the wednesday the flecte came up into Hudson's River and Ankored before the ffort, not a Musquet Shot before the fort. Before they came to an anchor at the ffort, while they were at Staten Island, the flecte sent a trumpeter to the ffort and demanded it for the Prince of Orange, and what answer was returned the Corporall knows not. After the flecte was at an anchor by the ffort they did not shoot a gunn for the space of half an hour, then the flecte discharged their broad sides at the ffort, and the ffort shoot at them. While the Dutch were placing their great gunns they landed their men in Hudson's River above the Governor orchard. This Corporall saith that immediately the fflag of the ffort was taken down, & he canot certainly say who did it. The Souldiers of the enemy came downe the broad way and entred in at the ffort gate, it being open, whereuppon the besieged souldiers marched forth with their arms and colours flying, & laid them downe, when they came for them they were comanded into the ffort again & comitted to prison in the church & so sent afterward aboard the ships.’”

Captain Anthony Colve was made commander of the fort, the name of which was changed to “FORT WILLIAM HENDRICK.”

Captain Colve took immediate measures to improve the means of defense in the fort, and in October 1673, we find it stated in one of his public orders, that the fortifications had then, at great expense and labor to the citizens and inhabitants, been brought “to perfection.”

But there still remained surrounding the southern and eastern sides of the fort the dwelling-houses which forty years before had been clustered under its protecting shadows, and to which frequent exception had been taken by the authorities as before noticed. It was

now resolved that these should be removed, and as the particulars of that transaction are interesting in connection with the topographical history of the city, we shall give the proceedings as they took place in detail.

At a meeting of the Governor and Council, held in Fort William Hendrick, October 8, 1673 ;

The Burgomasters of the city being present, the Governor submitted to them the necessity of demolishing or removing some houses and gardens situated under the walls of the fortress, and requested the Burgomasters to propose the same to the owners, and report the result.

On the following day the Burgomasters reported, in writing, the answer of the owners, and it was resolved to invite them to be present to make their particular cases known. It was resolved to indemnify them by paying an extra duty on several articles of export and import.

The persons interested appeared on the 10th of October, and responded as follows :

PETER DE RIEMER is willing to remove his house, but requests that Mÿyens lot, or one at the water side, be given to him instead.

LODEWYCK POS requests the house next the City Hall ; otherwise it will be impossible for him to move.

JACOBUS VANDEWATER requests Pattison's house in Pearl street, or a lot as near his former residence as possible.

GEORGE COBBETT says he is unable to move unless assisted.

JAN DIRCKSEN MEYER says he knows not whether to leave, but finally requests a lot in Bridge street, behind the five houses.

ANDREW MEYER also requests a lot there.

GERRIT HENDRICKS, the butcher, says that he has been ruined by the English, and is unable to move ; requests help and assistance.

PETER JANSEN SLOT, by his father, requests a lot behind the City Hall.

SIMON BLANCK requests accommodation for the winter, or his house cannot be moved ; asks a lot behind the five houses.

A committee was appointed to value the lots of those ordered to move, with the expenses of moving ; also to value the houses and lots which will be given in change to said persons.

On the 16th of October, an ordinance was passed, reciting that the fort was much weakened by the houses, &c., lying close under its walls, and necessity demanded their removal, wherefore, the

persons before mentioned were required to remove them immediately, and making provisions for their indemnity by exchange of lots and levying a duty to defray their losses.

The Commissioners appointed to appraise the loss or gain of the several individuals by the removal and exchange, reported as follows:

JACOBUS VANDEWATER : the value of his lot and the cost of removing his house, estimated at a sum equivalent to \$568. He was allowed the house of William Pattison, in Pearl street.

GEORGE COBBETT : value of lot and cost of removing his house, estimated at \$312; allowed lot No. 4 in the Company's garden (our present Broadway, west side, below Rector, the garden then apparently for the first time turned into building lots). The lot was valued at \$176.

GERRIT HENDRICKS : value of his lot and cost of removing his house estimated at \$664. He was allowed a lot in South (now William) street.

The other persons mentioned, were in a similar manner accommodated with houses or lots in place of those taken.

The following paper shows the routine of duty at the fort under Captain Colve :

Memorandum and order for Ensign Jan Sol, Major of the garrison in Fort William Hendrick, October 1, 1673.

1. A corporal's guard from each company to be put on duty daily, their arms to be inspected by the sergeants.

2. The guard to be relieved at 1 o'clock (on Sunday at 12 o'clock), at which time the gates shall be closed. A lieutenant or ensign to be present, wearing his sash.

3. The reveille to be beaten at break of day. The gate to be opened at daylight, and closed in the evening before dark. At 9 o'clock the drum shall beat the tattoo, when all soldiers shall retire to their quarters.

4. The corporals to see that their men keep continuous guard, and not more than four at a time have leave to go and eat. No strong drink to be brought or used in the guard house. To teach the men the use of arms, and to see that no person (except the city magistrates) enters the fort without permission.

5. The grand rounds to go before midnight and receive the word, but both before and after the grand rounds, a cadet shall continually go around the walls.

6. The soldiers to clean their barracks and quarters weekly. The filth to be thrown out of the fort.

But the Dutch administration proved to be short lived, and on the conclusion of a treaty of peace between Great Britain and Holland, in 1674, the captured city and province were restored to the rule of the former power, and the fort again received the name of Fort James.

THE FORT UNDER GOVERNOR ANDROS.

Governor Andros made some improvements in the interior arrangements of the fort. He removed the old kitchen which was attached to the Governor's house, and constructed an armory, upon its site, which was between the house and the church. He also took off the tile roof of the Governor's house and substituted shingles; the reason given for this being the leaky state of the tiles occasioned by their being cracked by concussions from firing salutes in the fort. The platforms of the fort were planked, and stockades were set round the outside of the fort, with a view to protect it from animals.

Another improvement within the fort under Governor Andros' administration was the construction of a building to serve as officers' lodgings; an edifice which had interesting historical connections. Those familiar with the local history of the city in the early Dutch period know that five brick storehouses were erected for the uses of the Dutch West India Company, at a time coeval with the earliest permanent improvements. These were situated upon a street by themselves, running from the present Bridge street to Stone street, about a hundred feet east of the present Whitehall street and parallel to that street. The street of the stores was known by the Dutch as the "Winckel street," or Store street. The final demolition of these old buildings is related in a report of Governor Andros, dated 1681, in which he states: "The five houses or old hospital, in the towne, in which officers also used to be lodged for want of roome in the fort, being yearly chargeable and of little use, and upon a survey found too old and rotten to be repaired, I caused them and the ground to be appraised and then pulled downe, and brought ye materials into the fort for the rebuilding of a like olde house designed to bee built by all my predecessors, which is rebuilt accordingly and therein made very convenient lodgings for ye officers and secretary, and which was before very much wanted. The ground of the hospital and a little part of the streete, by consent of the towne, was appraised at £200, and sold in 4 lotts." "The streete was the towne's and sold by them for their own use."

THE FORT UNDER GOV. DONGAN.

Gov. Dongan's Report on the state of the Province, states as follows :

“ At New York there is a fortification of four Bastions built formerly against the Indians of dry stone & earth with sods as a Breast-work well and pleasantly situated for the defence of the Harbor on a point made by Hudsons River on the one side and by the Sound on the other. It has Thirty-nine Guns, two Mortar pieces, thirty Barils of Powder, five hundred Ball, some Bomb shells & Granados, small arms for three hundred men, one Flanker, the face of the North Bastion & three points of Bastions & a Courtiu has been done & are rebuilt by mee with Lime & Morter & all the rest of the Fort pinnd & Rough Cast with Lime since my coming here. And the most of the guns I found dismounted & some of them yet continue to bee soe, which I hope to have mounted soe soon as the mills can sawe. I am forced to renew all the Batterys with three inch Plank & have spoke for new Plankes for the purpose. And the Breast work upon the wall is so moultered away that its likewise needful to make a reparation thereof. The Officers Quarters had formerly a flat Roof which I finding to be Chargeable to maintain & that it could not be kept tight have caused a new roof to be upon it. As also finding water to run through the Arch of the Gate I have been forced to put a Roof over it. I am forced every day by reason of the roteness of the Timber & Boards to bee making reparations in the Soldeers quarters or my own. The ground that the Fort stands upon & that belongs to it contains in quantity about two acres or thereabouts. About which I have instead of Palisadoes put a fence of Pales which is more lasting.”

THE FORT IN 1688.

The following extracts, taken from a report of a survey of the fort made in 1688, show its condition at that time.

“ The fence about the fort—the posts rotten, several panels fallen down. Will require 150 posts, 300 clapboards, 100 rails.

“ There were formerly about the fort stockadoes about 9 feet high, and 10 feet from the walls, but none now. To make it up again will require 1800 short stockadoes, 2400 stockadoes, 12 feet fong.

“ Upon the flag mount² there were [qu. are] 6 brass guns.

“ The stone wall about the fort is in indifferent condition.

“ The flag staff is rotten.

* The flag mount was on the southwest bastion of the fort.

“ Upon the well curtain[⊖] are two seekers and a brass ; 2 brass mortar pieces.

“ The whole platform is rotten, and will want 1400 feet of plank to make it new.

“ The inner wall of said battery hangs over so, wants buttresses to sustain them.

“ The old well being fallen in, there should be a new one.

“ Upon the magazine mount[†] there are 6 demi culvarins.

“ Upon the armory curtain,[‡] no guns.

“ Upon the Iron Mount[§] are 4 seekers ; no platform.

“ The room over the gate^{||} wants shutters and repairing.

“ Upon the Merry Mount[¶] are 4 seekers and two brass culverins ; a stone platform wants repairing.

“ Upon the curtain of the back end of the guard^{⊕⊕} are 4 seekers and 4 carriages. Platform rotten.

“ Wants a smaller new house of office.

“ In the fort before the house, two brass guns, one iron gun.

“ Upon the spur before the gate,^{††} 3 seekers, one iron, 2 brass ; no carriages or platform.

“ The breastwork on the wall out of repair, except from the merry mount to the gate.

“ Out the fort, under the flag mount, near the water side,^{†††} 5 demi culverins ; wanting 1600 feet of plank to repair the platform.

“ The great house, officers' and soldiers' room, should all be repaired.

“ There wants a new gate between the spur and iron mount, for which is wanted 4 posts, 6 ribs and 15 laths.

“ In the guard and soldiers' rooms are found—first room, 4 cabins ; second room, 5 cabins ; third room, 6 cabins ; fourth room, 7 cabins ; fifth room, 7 cabins. The armorer's room, 6 cabins.

“ The great house wants some shutters and floors to be mended.

“ The great gate of the fort and the gate of the wood yard must be repaired.

“ The sally port^{§§} wants a new door.

* The well curtain is supposed to have been the southerly side of the fort.

† The “ magazine mount ” was the southeast bastion.

‡ The armory curtain was the side of the fort facing eastward, on the line of Whitehall Street.

§ The Iron Mount was probably the northeast bastion.”

|| This room over the gate, in front of the fort, was erected a few years previously, as before mentioned.

¶ The “ merry mount ” was the northwest bastion.

** This was the side of the fort facing west, and near the present line of State street.

†† A triangular defensive work, outside the fort, and protecting the gate towards the Bowling Green.

THE FORT UNDER LEISLER'S ADMINISTRATION.

THE political events which led to the taking of the fort by the city train-bands, in 1689, are among the most interesting topics of our early history, but can be but briefly alluded to in this essay. They were induced by the revolution in England, by which King James was superseded by the Prince of Orange and his consort Mary. The elements of this revolution were mostly of a religious character, and signalized the last stages of the long contest between the Catholic and Protestant interests, and closed the triumph of the latter. The people of the colonies strongly sympathized with the revolutionary party, and were not slow in measures for advancing its ascendancy within their own borders.

In New York the advices of the accession of William and Mary to the throne led to the determination to secure the fort for their majesties, which was effected without bloodshed on the 31st May, 1689, through the agency of the train-bands or militia companies of the city. Captain Leisler, of one of those companies, was soon after deputed to hold it in possession, and put it in a better state of defense.

Leisler proceeded with energetic measures in improving the condition of the fort. In a letter of June 19, 1689, to the Governor of Boston, written in "Fort William," he states: "I am daily working in the fort with sixteen carpenters and twenty men, which I shall continue till it is truly in good posture of defense. I am digging up the old well which was filled up by Colonel Dongan. I intend to stockade the fort round, and hope within three weeks, if it please God, to have it compleat." It appears the people joined heartily in the work, as in a letter to the same party, dated August 19, 1689, Leisler states that "the people would work continually with five hundred men till the fortifications were fully compleated, and upwards of thirty boats to fetch sods and palisadoes." He reported the fort at that date to be in posture of defense.

The battery before alluded to, as having been constructed along the river shore, was at this time in a ruinous condition, and was not repaired. In its stead a "half-moon" fortification was erected on the shore west of the fort, upon which were placed seven great guns, designed to defend the landings of both rivers.

There is no doubt that the efforts made during the first three months of Leisler's authority, added to the voluntary assistance rendered by the inhabitants under the pressing emergencies of the times,

contributed to a substantial and permanent improvement of the edifice.

In 1691 the administration of Leisler ceased, by his immurement in the prison within its walls, whence he departed only in his journey to his place of execution, near the Commons.

THE ERECTION OF A CHAPEL IN THE FORT.

The serious troubles of the years 1689 and 1690 occasioned violent commotions and changes in the fabric of New York society, even to the extent of a modification of their religious associations, and most of those leading citizens of the old Dutch families who had been in opposition to Leisler, are found to have then become affiliated with the Church of England.

It was determined in 1693 to demolish the old Dutch Church within the fort, which was in a dilapidated condition, and erect in its stead a chapel, and efforts were successfully made to induce the King to favor the design, which he did by a letter in 1694, recommending the measure to the Provincial authorities. This edifice was completed in 1696.

The cost of its erection was defrayed by public charge, except an amount which had been raised by contribution for the ransom of several of the inhabitants, who had been captured and were held as slaves in Algiers. These having been released by other means, the fund was appropriated towards the chapel.

IMPROVEMENTS OF THE WORKS CONNECTED WITH THE FORT.

The national troubles with the French towards the close of the century occasioned renewed efforts towards increasing the defensive works of the city. It was proposed in 1693, that two batteries be erected at the Narrows, but in view of the great expense involved and the time necessary for their construction the project was abandoned, and the alternative adopted of erecting a great battery of fifty guns on the outmost point of rocks under the fort, and so situated as to command both rivers.

In furtherance of this important work, the different towns of the province were required to furnish a proportionate number of stockadoes, and the inhabitants of the city were severally called on to contribute a share of the necessary labor.

One of the appendages to the fort at that time was Nutten or Governor's Island, on which was an old frame house, which in 1692 had fallen to decay; it was decided to remove it and build a new edifice of brick or stone.

The fort also was extensively repaired during the administration of Governor Fletcher ; a great portion of the barracks was taken down and rebuilt, some of the bastions were paved with flagstone. The fence around the outside was removed, and a large amount in general repairs was expended.

THE FORT WELL AND PUMP.

A matter of small apparent historical interest is sometimes found to have occasioned more considerable controversy, in its own times, than its importance would seem to warrant ; an instance of which is found in the history of the fort well and pump.

The water in the wells in the lower part of the city was of an inferior quality, and this was more especially the case with the well originally dug in the fort for the supply of the garrison. It was situated so near the river that it was highly impregnated with brine. The Dutch seem to have been satisfied with it, but, after the English came into possession, the old well was filled up, and a new one dug outside the fort near the entrance gate, and was found to furnish a better quality of water ; but the alteration was open to criticism in a military point of view, as the garrison were liable to be shut off from this necessary supply should an enemy appear in front. When Leisler took possession of the fort, he made this a prime measure of improvement, and redug the old well in the fort, which he found, as he said, to give good water enough. But with his downfall the "new well party," again securing predominance, at once reconstructed the well outside the fort gate, which was further improved in 1694 by the erection of a pump, and this controverted question was thus set at rest for the subsequent period until the final demolition of the edifice. A great part of the civic population obtained their supply from that source, which was one of the marked localities of New York in early times.

THE FORT FROM 1700 TO 1740.

The history of the fort during the above interval has no particular importance. Its name was changed as successive sovereigns attained the throne, and thus it was known as Fort Anne until the Georges became the reigning sovereigns, when it assumed the cognomen of Fort George, which it retained during the greater part of the last century.

In 1738 the then Governor wrote concerning it as follows : "In the town of New York is an old fort of very little defence ; cannon we

have, but the carriages are good for little ; we have ball, but no powder, nor will the Board of Ordnance send any, on pretence that a large quantity was sent in 1711 for the Canada expedition, which is twenty-seven years ago ; much of it has for many years been trodden under foot in the magazine. There is a battery which commands the mouth of the harbour, whereon may be mounted 50 cannon. This is new, having been built but three years, but it wants finishing."

The Governors lived in considerable state in the mansion in the fort. Around them circulated the smaller lights of fashion illuminating the Provincial court ; servants in livery with state carriages, and finely caparisoned horses, swept through the fort gate in imposing panoply ; negro musicians enlivened the evening with their strains from the battlements ; parties and scenes of festivity, suited to the gay and luxurious habits of the aristocracy of that age, were not uncommon, and in short, the representatives of majesty maintained their state with as much show and ceremony as their important condition demanded.

But these insignia of greatness were not the same with all the Governors, but rather depended upon the social position and habits which had been held and formed in the European capital and court by the various individuals who were appointed to the office. The mansion was generally furnished in its details by the different governors, and the style corresponded with their various dispositions or means.

It will be curious to illustrate this subject by a general view of affairs in and about the Governor's domestic establishment in 1730. *In the stable* were a fine saddle stallion, cloth housing with silver lace, two coach horses, one black breeding mare, one black cart horse, two coach horses, a stallion, a black breeding mare, a colt, two coach horses, two black colts of coach breed, a four-wheeled chaise and harness, a servant's saddle, a coach with five set of harness, a set of traveling two-horse harness, brass mounted, a postillion's coat and cap, a sorrel colt, saddles with holsters, caps, and harness, servants' saddles, bridles, bits, cruppers, and breastplates, a fine embroidered suit of horse furniture, a natural pacing mare, a cart with harness. *In the boat-house*—A state barge with accoutrements, a small four-oared boat. *Domestic servants*—Two white males, one white female, a negro musician (prime slave), two negro boys (slaves), three prime negro women (slaves), one ordinary negro woman (slave). *In the wine cellar* an ex-

tensive stock of the finest wines and liquors for the table. The *parlors* and *living rooms* were furnished in a handsome and expensive manner, and the *library* contained some 1,400 volumes of standard books.

THE FIRE IN THE FORT IN 1741.

On the 18th of March, 1741, the Governor's house in the fort was discovered on fire, and, notwithstanding the efforts of the fire department, then recently organized in the city, and having the benefit of one or two fire engines, that edifice, together with the chapel erected about fifty years previously, and all the other buildings in the fort, were entirely consumed. Most of the public records were saved from the Provincial Secretary's office, having been removed therefrom before the office took fire. The house, however, was past saving, even before an engine could be brought into action upon it. It was covered with cedar shingles, and the floors and wainscots were so old that they took fire in an instant, and burned with extinguishable fury.

The fire was afterwards ascribed to the negro slaves in the city, as a part of their programme in the famous negro plot of that year, and was the first event which, according to the cotemporary historians, marked the progress of that detestable scheme. One of the negroes who was burnt at the stake confessed that he was the agent in incenaricism; and his statement was to some extent corroborated by other negroes implicated; but though this was believed by most people at that day to have been the cause of the fire, yet others supposed it to have been an accident caused by the negligence of plumbers. The views of the Governor as to its origin, given a month subsequent to the occurrence, are stated thus; "The fatal fire that consumed all the buildings in the fort, which from the circumstances of the time and place of the plumbers, working I thought was accidental, now appears evidently to be done by design, in consequence of a horrid conspiracy to burn it and the whole town." The Governor's personal losses by this fire were estimated at between two and three thousand pounds. Immediate measures were taken for rebuilding the barracks in the fort, and for the construction of an additional battery, which works were completed before the close of the year; and not long after, the Governor's house was reconstructed, on the former site, and a new secretary's office was constructed outside the walls of the fort, on the present corner of the Bowling green and Whitehall street.

THE FIRE IN THE FORT IN 1773.

On the night of December 29, 1773, the government house accidentally caught fire. So rapid was the progress of the flames that in a few moments after the alarm was given a thick cloud of smoke and flame pervaded the whole building, and in less than two hours it was entirely consumed. From this dreadful conflagration nothing in the building, except a few articles of furniture, taken from one of the parlors, was saved. The manner in which the fire originated was not discovered. The deep snow which covered the roofs of the other buildings in the city, contributed towards their protection, and the fire department of the city showed great activity in preventing the progress of the flames.

Governor Tryon was a resident of the government house in the fort at the time of its destruction, and was a heavy loser by the event. He afterwards resided in a house on the corner of Wall and William streets, the same house having been subsequently, and until late years, occupied by the Bank of New York.

THE FORT DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR.

The history of the fort subsequent to the fire of 1773, until its final demolition, is confined exclusively to military affairs. The interest attached to it as the headquarters of the officers of state had ceased, and its uses were confined to the occupancy of its own garrison. Nor was its military history of special interest, as it was the scene of no important events connected with the war. Some improvements were designed, but the alterations really made to the edifice were of insufficient interest to be detailed.

FINAL DEMOLITION OF THE FORT.

After the close of the war, and about the year 1788, it was resolved to remove the entire edifice, and to erect a house for the residence of the President of the United States upon its site. Its appearance at the time immediately preceding its demolition is described as follows: First a green bank, which was sloping, and about fourteen feet high, on which were erected the walls, of about twenty feet additional height. In its front, towards the Bowling green, were two apple trees, and an old linden tree, which were about the same height as the walls. The commissioners appointed on the part of the city to conduct the work of removal, were Messrs. Pintard, Janeway, and Van Zandt.

A part of the stone of the fort was used in the erection of the government house. In the course of the work a vault, which had originally been constructed beneath the chapel, erected in 1694, was opened and in it were found the remains of Lord Bellomont and members of his family, which were distinguished by inscriptions and family escutcheons on silver plates. The coffins were of lead and in good preservation. These, together with the bones of other persons found scattered in the vault, were taken by Mr. Pintard and interred in St. Paul's churchyard, where they were left without monumental notice. The silver plates were, however, removed, and were taken by Mr. Van Zandt, who designed them for preservation, but after his death they were converted into spoons.

The house designed for the President was finally completed about the year 1791. But at this time the seat of government had been removed to Philadelphia, and the object of its erection was unaccomplished. It was, however, devoted to the occupancy of the Governor of New York, and was so used for some years, and was subsequently occupied as the Custom-house.

TITLE TO THE LANDS OF THE FORT AND BATTERY.

At the period when the resolution to remove the fort and battery was adopted, the question of title to the lands occupied by them was mooted and the opinion of the Attorney General was requested on the subject. His report is deemed of sufficient historical interest to be reproduced in this connexion, and was as follows :

“The Attorney-General reports that in consequence of the concurrent resolutions of both Houses at the last session, he hath enquired into the nature of the claim of the Corporation of the city of New York to *Fort George, and the lands adjoining thereto,* and that the following facts appear, viz. :

“1st. That Governor Dongan did, by Charter, under the Great Seal of the Colony, on the twenty-seventh day of April, in the year one thousand six hundred and eighty-six, ‘grant to the Corporation all the waste, vacant, unpatented, and unappropriated lands on Manhattan’s Island, extending and reaching to low-water mark in and through all Parts of the said island,’ with a saving in the said charter contained in these words, viz. : ‘Saving to his most sacred Majesty, his Heirs, Successors, and Assigns, and the Lieutenants, Governors, and Commanders-in-Chief, and other officers under him and them in Fort James, in and by the city of New York, and in all

' the Liberties and Boundaries, Extents, Priviledges thereof, for the
' Maintenance of the Fort and Garrison there, all the Rights, Use, Title,
' and Authority, which they have had, used, exercised.'

" 2d. That Governor Montgomerie did, by charter, under the Great Seal of the Colony, on the fifteenth day of January, in the year one thousand seven hundred and thirty, reciting the Charter by Governor Dongan, Grant and Confirm to the Corporation, ' All the waste, vacant, unpatented, and unappropriated lands on Manha ttar's Island, ' extending to low-water mark,' with an Exception as to Fort George, (the same place intended by Fort James in the Charter by Governor Dongan), in these words: ' Except our Fort George, in our city of ' New York, and the ground, full boundaries, and Extent thereof, ' or thereto belonging.'

" 3d. That, by an Act of the Legislature of the Colony, all Letters Patent, Grants, Charters, and Gifts to the Corporation, are confirmed.

" 4th. That, in the Journal of the General Assembly of the late Colony, of the twenty-first of November, in the year one thousand seven hundred and thirty-four, are the following orders of the House, and Message from the Corporation, viz.:

" ' ORDERED :

" ' That Captain Van Horne and Colonel Morris, Junior, wait on the Corporation now convened in Common Council, with a copy of a clause intended to be inserted in a bill, now under Commitment, for erecting of a Battery on Copsee Rocks, and desire them to signify to this House, whether they have any objection to the inserting of the said clause.'

" ' A Message from the Corporation of the City of New York, by Aldermen Jansen, and Stephen Bayard, in the words following, to-wit :

" ' At a Common Council held at the City Hall of the said city, on Thursday, the twenty-first day of November, and in the year one thousand seven hundred and thirty-four.

" ' PRESENT :

" ' Robert Lurting, Esquire, Mayor, &c.

" ' In answer to a Message of the General Assembly, and a copy of a Clause to be inserted in a Bill now under commitment, for erecting a Battery on Copsee Rocks, it is Ordered by this Court, that Alderman Jansen and Alderman Bayard, do wait upon the General Assembly, and acquaint them that the Corporation have no objection to inserting the Clause mentioned in the Bill now under commitment, for erecting a Battery on Copsee Rocks, saving to this

'Corporation the undoubted right they have to the Soil, from High Water Mark to low water, from White Hall to Elds Corner.'

“ ‘ Per order of Common Council.

“ ‘ WILLIAM SHARPAS,
Clerk.’

“ And the said Alderman Jansen and Alderman Bayard verbally informed the House from the said Court that they did not desire to make use of their said Right until such Time as that the said Fortification shall happen to be removed or demolished.

“ ‘ Ordered, that such saving shall be added to the clause above mentioned.

“ 5th. That the said bill was on the twenty-eighth day of November, in the year one thousand seven hundred and thirty-four, Passed into a Law, entitled ‘ An Act to appoint and impower Commissioners for erecting Fortifications in this Colony, at the several places therein mentioned;’ and contains the following clause, viz. : ‘ And to the end that when such a battery shall be built and erected, as aforesaid, it may not be rendered useless by buildings to blind or incumber the same. Be it enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, that after the Publication of this Act, no manner of House or other Edifices whatsoever (except for Plat Forms, Batteries, or other Fortifications), shall be built or erected, either in the River or in any Part or Parts which now overflow with the water, from and between the Westerly Part of the Battery, so as aforesaid, to be built on Copsee Rocks, to the Place commonly called and known by the name of Elds Corner,* or Slip, any Law, Grant, or any other Claim or Pretensions whatsoever to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding; Saving, Nevertheless, to the Corporation of the City of New York the Rights they have to the lands from high to low water Mark, between the two Places above mentioned, under Colour of which the Fortifications aforesaid are, however, in nowise to be incumbered or blinded.’

“ He further reports, that no Evidence hath been discovered of a Claim by, or Seisin or Possession in the Corporation, at any Time, of the Soil under the water, and below low water Mark, between White Hall and Elds Corner, or the ground above high water Mark between those Places, and now claimed by the State, as *Fort George and Lands adjoining thereto*; and where the Lines of high and low water Mark, in every Part between those Places, at the time of the Granting of the

Charters, were, can be legally determined by a Jury only, and it can not be doubted but at this Day it will be *very* difficult, *if not impossible*, to ascertain the Fact with Precision.

BURGOMASTER OF NEW AMSTERDAM, MAYOR OF NEW YORK, &c.

THE subject of this sketch resided at Harlem, in Holland, previous to his emigration to New Netherland, and from the circumstance that his relatives were also residents of that city, it is supposed that it was his native place. Of his early education we have only such knowledge as may be inferred from his pursuits, and the character of his family and social connections, which were highly respectable. His acquirements for the business of a merchant were of a thorough and practical kind, and he was particularly noted for his correct and neat method of keeping accounts.

The precise date of the arrival of Steenwyck in New Amsterdam is not recorded, but it was probably about the year 1652. He certainly was considerably engaged in trade here in the following year, principally in tobacco for the European market, and is also shown to have been concerned in ventures to Virginia and the West Indies, sailing his own vessels. At the time of the very serious troubles between the Dutch and English, in 1653, when the city wall was built, the tax levied to raise funds for that purpose rated Steenwyck among the most considerable citizens for wealth, and, besides his ordinary tax, he advanced a large amount of necessary goods to the city, the cost of which was not reimbursed for several years subsequent, a circumstance which indicates that his mercantile position was from the first prosperous and conspicuous. That he was engaged in maritime pursuits as late as 1656, is shown from statements made in a slander suit, which occupied the attention of the community for several months during the latter part of that year. It arose out of the circumstance that Jan Adamsen, a tapster, was making a display of his liberality in the Fort by distributing cakes, &c., and being questioned concerning his unusual bounty, "gravely spoke of a little sailor and a woman whom he had found in the bush, the latter of whom had come with him to the fresh water, when he had such a kiss from her that he could hardly contain himself. She gave him some sewant (money of that day) to be silent, and offered him a gold ring, which he was sorry he did not take." He further intimated

that the parties were the Sieur Steenwyck, and a certain distinguished lady of New Amsterdam. It may be added that this malicious story infected the whole gossiping community, but the retailers of the slander were pursued by the husband of the injured lady with the unrelenting vigor of the law, until from the effects of imprisonment and fines to several, and torture to the originator, the mouths of people were silenced.

Mr. Steenwyck was married in May, 1658, to Margaretta De Riemer, daughter of a widowed lady, whose maiden name was Grevenraedt, and who conducted a small mercantile establishment in New Amsterdam. The mother of Madame Steenwyck was married in 1659, to Domine Drissius, the Dutch clergyman of New Amsterdam.

It is not known whether or not Steenwyck built the house in which he resided subsequent to his marriage. Its position and general characteristics are, however, sufficiently ascertained. It was a double stone house, situated on the present southeast corner of Whitehall and Bridge streets. The position of the rooms are indicated in the will of Steenwyck (to be afterwards referred to).

It was the misfortune of Mr. Steenwyck's domestic life, that nearly all his children failed to live to attain years of maturity, while most of them died in infancy. The successive births of his children were as follows :

The public life of Mr. Steenwyck commenced at about the period of his marriage, and we find him enjoying positions in the civic magistracy as Schepen of New Amsterdam in the years 1658 and 1660, and as Burgomaster of the same city in the year 1662.

Meantime his business affairs prospered exceedingly, and the records show him as heavily engaged in foreign as well as domestic trade.

The political troubles towards the close of the Dutch administra-

tion brought Mr. Steenwyck forward in more conspicuous as well as more important public affairs.

We find it stated in the public records of December, 1663, that the Hon. C. Steenwyck being sent for to Court, and appearing, was informed that pursuant to unanimous resolution he is requested by the General Provincial Assembly to proceed to Fatherland, as delegate from this Province, to lay the deplorable and sorrowful condition of this Province before the Heeren Majóres, with petitions for redress, pursuant to writings given him herewith; and whereas, the ship "the Gilded Star" (De Vergulden Star) lies ready to sail, he was requested to get himself ready to go in her; to which he answered, that his circumstances at present did not permit him to leave, as he is expecting one or two ships, and intends to depart with them in March or April of next spring for Holland, offering them then to do all in his power for the good of the province.

The people of New England had long had their covetous eyes upon the possessions of the Dutch, though without shadow of justification, except perhaps as to the eastern portion of Long Island, where emigrants from the English towns on the main had been long settled. This question of jurisdiction over Long Island was the rock upon which the Dutch dynasty upon this continent split. The natural position of the island sufficiently pointed out the necessity of its being under uniform government, while circumstances had thrown two distinct races upon it, neither of which would willingly avow the supremacy of the other. Its importance to the Dutch was the more obvious, as its westerly shores bounded upon the mouth of the Hudson. But diplomacy seemed inefficacious to produce a permanent good understanding between the Dutch and English authorities, and finally avarice effected not only the settlement of the Long Island question, but that of the entire Government of New Netherlands.

Long Island having been granted to the Duke of York by his brother the King of Great Britain, and the latter having, upon inquiry, learned that it was estimated to be worth some £3,000 sterling, determined to make a bold push for its possession. He found a fit instrument in one Captain John Scott, who without difficulty excited the English portion of the inhabitants to join him in his enterprise, and with about one hundred and fifty followers set out from the East to visit the Dutch towns in the western portion.

On the 11th of January, 1664, Scott, with seventy or eighty horsemen and fifty or sixty foot, made his appearance opposite New Amsterdam at "Breucklen," the ferry landing. He marched with great

noise, and sounding trumpets, quite terrifying the few inhabitants on the river shore. He displayed the British flag, and boldly demanded submission. Stuyvesant sent over a boat conveying his secretary, who politely asked Captain Scott, "will he come across the river," to which Captain Scott replied, "No; let Stuyvesant come over with a hundred soldiers; I will wait for him here." "What for?" asked the secretary. "I will run him through the body," answered Captain Scott. "That would not be a friendly act," said the secretary, and so they parted, the secretary to report the result of the strange conference to the Director-General, while Captain John Scott went with his armed followers to Midwout (now Flatbush), where he arrived with great uproar, colors flying, drums beating, and trumpets sounding, so that the people "looked on with wonder, not knowing what it meant."

Stuyvesant, however, had sent several of his principal officers to watch the proceedings of Scott, and confer with him as to his intentions. After Scott had harangued the people, notifying them that they must abandon their allegiance to the Dutch, a meeting took place between him and the Dutch officers, in which it was proposed that he should confer with Governor Stuyvesant, to which he consented, and accompanied the officers to the ferry; but no meeting took place, as he declined going over the river. He, however, threatened to go over with his soldiers and proclaim the King at the Manhattans, and, furthermore, to "rip the guts and cut the feet from under any man who says this is not the King's land." Having thus vaped for some time, he joined his soldiers and proceeded to New Utrecht, where he ordered the gun in the block-house to be unlimbered, then to be mounted again and fired off in the King's name. This accomplished, the doughty captain proceeded to Amersfort, where similar proceedings were gone through with.

Meantime Governor Stuyvesant had organized another commission, among whom was Steenwyck, who visited Jamaica to confer with Scott. After considerable talk with respect to the national claims, it was finally agreed that Scott should not further molest the Dutch towns, but that a more formal meeting for conference should be held at a subsequent period. He insisted, however, upon the basis that Long Island should belong to the King of Great Britain. On taking leave, the captain informed the commissioners, in all seriousness, that they must expect to lose the island, as if it could not be obtained peaceably the Duke of York was preparing to take it by force, and the whole of New Netherlands would be likewise reduced.

This threat proved too true, as but a few months subsequently several British frigates appeared before New Amsterdam, and the Dutch were compelled to surrender. Steenwyck acted as one of the commissioners in the affair of the surrender.

However staunch Steenwyck may have been in his patriotism, he was too prudent to persevere in obstinate resistance to the peaceful establishment of the English when once they had possessed the government and were in sufficient force to maintain themselves. Soon after the English had taken the city the English Governor called the citizens together to ask if they were willing to contribute towards repairing and improving the city fortifications. It was, certainly, requiring of conquered people a great sacrifice, to persuade them thus to strengthen the hands of their conquerors, and to contribute towards the permanency of their subjection, and as might be expected, many demurred. But Steenwyck, whose influence among the citizens seems to have been paramount, replied, "that so long as the country remained in the hands of the English he should be found a willing and obedient subject." And the policy in which he was thus the leader, no doubt contributed greatly to the benefit of his fellow-citizens during the eight or nine years succeeding the English conquest, and preceding the retaking by the Dutch.

That his position was during that period in advance of any other of his fellow-citizens is evidenced by the fact of his being a member of the Colonial Council, and of occupying the position of temporary Governor of the Province during the absence of Governor Lovelace, in Virginia, in the year 1671.

But that his obedience to and acquiescence in the measures of the English Government was the result of policy and not of disloyalty to his native country, is evidenced by the circumstances which followed the re-conquest of the city by the Dutch forces under Benckes and Evertsen, in 1673.

Steenwyck was recognized by those officers as the leading man among the citizens. He was called into their councils from the moment of the capture. He was requested to call the citizens together, with the view to appoint a delegation to confer with the military officers. This was accordingly done, and Mr. Steenwyck headed the list of six citizens who composed the delegation.

The citizens being called on to nominate for Burgomasters and Schepens, under the new regime, sent in the name of Steenwyck at the head of their nominees. He had, however, been fixed upon by the officers for a more important position, and while Captain Colve was

designated by the officers as governor, citizen Steenwyck was appointed his sole councilor, a position substantially equivalent to the Executive chair, as from the inexperience of Captain Colve it must be supposed that the practical direction was left to his coadjutor.

The Commission of Councilor Steenwyck read as follows :

The Honorable Council of War, over a squadron of ships of war, now at anchor in the North River, in New Netherland, on the behalf of their High Mightinesses, the Lords States-General of the United Netherlands, and his Serene Highness, the Prince of Orange, &c. ;

To all those who shall see or hear these read, GREETING :

WHEREAS, we have deemed it necessary for the promotion of justice and police in this conquest of New Netherland, under the superintendence and direction of the Honorable Governor-General Anthony Colve, to appoint and commission an expert person as Member of Council in this Province: We, therefore, upon the good report which we have received of the abilities of Cornelis Steenwyck, former Burgomaster, of the City of New Orange, in the time of the West India Company's government of this country, have commissioned, qualified, and appointed, as we now commission, qualify, and appoint the aforesaid Cornelis Steenwyck, Councilor of the aforesaid Province of New Netherland, to assist in the direction of all cases relative to justice and police, and further, in all such military concerns, both by water and by land, in which the Governor shall deem proper to ask his advice and assistance ; to maintain good order, and promote the welfare and prosperity of this country, for the service of the Lords Majores ; to take all possible care for the security and defence of the forts in these parts ; to administer justice both in criminal and in civil cases, and further, to do and execute everything relative to his office ; that a good Councillor is in duty, bound to do, upon the oath which he shall have taken: Commanding therefore, by these presents, all persons whom this may concern, to acknowledge, respect, and obey the aforesaid Cornelis Steenwyck, as Councilor in New Netherland, as we have deemed it necessary for the service of the country, but all this under approbation or rejection of our Lords and Principals.

DATED, at Fort William Henry, on the day }
above (12th day of August, 1673). }

One of the most difficult questions which the new Government was called upon to deal with, was that which, during the former administration of the Dutch, had been the source of so much trouble, viz. : the

towns on the east part of Long Island, which had been settled by the English.

It was judged to be the necessary policy of the new Government to require their submission and recognition of allegiance, and missions to that effect were transmitted to them at the same time, as to the towns in other parts of the Province, and to effectuate this requisition, two military officers with a proper escort were sent to administer the oaths of allegiance to the inhabitants east of Oyster Bay. These officers reported (19th October, 1673), that they had repaired to all the said towns, and called town-meetings, at which the oath of allegiance was tendered, but all had refused, except the towns of Oyster Bay and Huntington, where the inhabitants requested to be excused from taking the oath, promising, in writing, to remain on good terms with the Dutch.

A council, composed of the Governor and his Councilor, and of the Burgomasters and Schepens, having been called on the subject of the English towns, it was resolved, after full discussion, that it was unadvisable to attack them at that conjuncture by force of arms, as thereby occasion would be afforded them and their neighboring colonies to take up arms again, but it was judged better to send a second delegation, accompanied by sufficient military display.

On this most important mission, "Primo Counsel" Steenwyck was delegated as the Chief Commissioner, his associates being two of the principal military officers in the Dutch squadron. Their instructions were to visit the towns of Easthampton, Southhold, and Southampton, to call the inhabitants together, and admonish them of their duty and submission, and to establish the magistrates in office.

These commissioners departed in the frigate *Zee hond* (Sea Hound), one of the Dutch squadron which participated in the capture of the city. A journal of the voyage, and of their proceedings was kept, which is of sufficient interest to justify its insertion here.

Journal kept on board the frigate Zee hond, Captain Cornelis Evartsen, sailing with the Commissioners, Councillor Cornelis Steenwyck, Captain Charles Epensteyn, and Lieutenant Charles Quirynsen, from New Orange to the east end of Long Island, 1673.

"We sailed on the 31st October, being Tuesday, about noon, with a southerly wind and were thrown ashore by the current near Corlears Hook, but throwing out the anchor we warped afloat and sailed to the farthest point of the Hell gate, where we met the flood, so that we were compelled to return and anchor near Barent's Island, where a short while after the sloop *Eendragt*, Luycas Andriessen schipper,

arriving, from Boston passed us. We despatched our boat to enquire, if there were any letters for us. Coming on board we received several letters for the Honorable Steenwyck, and were informed that Maestricht had been taken by the French.

“*1st November.* The wind blew very hard from the east so that we were compelled to remain at anchor. In the meanwhile rowed the Commissioners to Barent’s Island. On their return they touched a rock near the *Pot*, when the boat was nearly upset by the stream, so that they were indeed in imminent danger.

“*2d. November.* The wind as before, with rain and violent gusts; about breakfast broke our rope, but somewhat nearer its bight; exerted all our endeavors to recover our anchor, but could not find it. The Commissioners rowed in the meanwhile to New Harlem, and returned on board towards evening.

“*3d. November.* The wind N. N. West; we again weighed anchor and sailed against the tide through the Hell gate. Towards noon the wind veered again to the east, and as the tide was against us we could not proceed further than the *White Stone*, where we cast anchor, then went in the boat ashore to procure water. Towards evening we were favored with a northerly breeze, got under sail, and when we arrived near *Minnewit’s island* the wind again veered to the northeast, so that we were obliged to cast anchor there.

“*4th November.* We sailed at day break, the wind N. West. Towards noon, the wind blowing very fresh, we lowered our topsail; towards evening took in all sail, with two reefs in our mainsail, and were about south of New Haven, the wind very cold, the waves rising, and the night dark; about three o’clock in the morning saw *Falcon’s Island*, about a pistol shot to leeward; we intended to avoid it but could not succeed through the violence of the wind, so that we tacked quite close to the rocks with great good luck. Night approaching the storm sensibly increased, and about day break it was a complete hurricane.

“*5th November.* The wind as before, but somewhat more westerly, we ran on with a reef in our foresail; about eight o’clock our boat broke adrift, which compelled us to return; we recovered it with great difficulty after three hours, and when we had her on board saw that nearly all the stanshions were torn in pieces. A short while afterwards the wind increased in violence, so that once more we were compelled to run to leeward, and about four in the afternoon cast anchor near the riff of the *Little Gate*, our boat full of water and utterly unfit for use, so that we abandoned her to the deep.

“6th November. Lying at anchor. In the morning at day break at *Pluymgatt* the wind N. W. and W.; weighed anchor again and discovered a sail to leeward; we pursued with our courses set, and hoisted English colors; we supposed him to be a West Indiaman, hoisted our topsail. The tide turning against him he anchored near *Silvester Island*, in eight or ten foot water; we then lowered the English colors and hoisted those of the *Prince*, whereupon they instantly struck their colors. Commanding them to come on board, the skipper arriving with two men, reported that they came from *New London* and that *Capt. Winthrop* and *Mr. Willis* were in his ship, being commissioned by those of *Connecticut*. Sent the boat for them; when on board, they said, they would show us their commission to take a copy of it. They farther stated that those of *Connecticut* despatched a letter to the *Governor-General, A. Colve*, of which a copy should be shown to us, whereupon we showed them our commission together with the article penned by those of the east end of the island, and in consequence of it their nomination and subsequent election, &c. The answer thereto was exhibited, to wit: That the 9th article had not been consented to, and thereby their subsequent nomination and their actual submission to their High Mightinesses had been rendered null and void. We then, after having treated them to the best in our power, permitted them to go ashore in the ship of *Lieut. Quirynsen*. Towards evening we again hoisted sail and anchored before *Sylvester*. Towards evening at a signal *Sylvester* sent his son with a boat on board to carry the commissioners on shore who staid that night with him.

“7th November. In the morning the commissioners of *Connecticut* delivered us a copy of their commission as follows:

“‘*Whereas*, By divers reports and information we are given to understand that there are some forces expected speedily from *New York* at the eastern end of *Long Island* to force and constraayne the People there to take the oath of obedience to the State’s General and *Prince of Orange*; we have thought it expedient to desire and empower you, *Samuel Willis, Esq.*, and *Capt. John Winthrop*, or either of you, to take such necessary attendance as you judge meet, and forthwith to go over to the said island, or to *Shelter Island*, and treat with such forces as there you shall meet, and do your endeavor to divert them from using any hostility against the said People, and from imposing upon them, letting them know if they do proceed notwithstanding it will provoke us to a due consideration what wee are nextly obliged to doe.’

“ ‘Dated at Hartford, October 22, 1673, and signed pr order of the Governour and Magistrates pr me,

“ ‘JOHN ALLYN, Sec’y.’

“ And further delivered to us a copy of the letter which was sent by the Court of Connecticut to the Governor, Anthony Colve, and requested that we should abandon our voyage, and not proceed further in persuading the English of Easthampton, Southhold, or Southampton, to take the oath ; whereunto we answered that we were in duty bound to execute our commission, and so departed from Sylvester’s Island. In the meantime those of Connecticut hoisted the King’s Jack at their mainmast, which was permitted them, as they were Commissioners.

“ About 10 o’clock the Connecticut gentlemen rowed up towards Southall, in the boat belonging to Sylvester’s ship, with the King’s Jack in the stern, when the Commissioners immediately followed in a boat they had borrowed from Captain Sylvester, with the Prince’s flag also in the stern. Arrived at 2 o’clock in the afternoon about Southold, when they heard the drum beat and the trumpet sounded, and saw a salute with muskets whenever the Connecticut gentlemen passed by. Meanwhile, the water being low, and the tide on the turn, the boat being slowly dragged along by the sailors, the Commissioners were obliged to land. Approaching somewhat nearer they discovered a troop of cavalry riding backward and forward, four of whom advanced towards us, and when they reached the Commissioners, offered them their horses, on which these mounted, ascended the heights, where they met Captain Winthrop and Esquire Wyles, with a troop of 26 or 28 men on horseback, and so they rode on together towards the village, on reaching which they found a company of about 60 footmen in arms. After tarrying a few moments they marched into the village to the house of one Mr. Moore, where dismounting from their horses, they were invited to enter.

“ After having been a little while in the house, Mr. Steenwyck requested that the inhabitants of the village might be convoked to communicate to them the cause of their arrival, also the Commission of the Governor, to which those of Connecticut answered, that the inhabitants of the village of Southold, being subjects to his Majesty of England, had nothing to do with any order or commission of the Dutch, and then said to the inhabitants, ‘ Whosoever among you will not remain faithful to his Majesty of England, your Lord and King, let him now speak,’ to which not one of the inhabitants

made answer. Mr. Steenwyck replied thereupon, that they were subjects of their High Mightinesses, the States-General, and his Highness the Prince of Orange, as appeared by their color and constable staff, by their nomination of the magistrates presented to them by the Governor, and by the election subsequent thereon. He further requested that these elected persons might be called, of whom Thomas Moore appeared but Thomas Hudsingsen absented himself, and could not be found. When the election of Gov. Colve was communicated to said Moore he would not accept it, saying he had nothing to do with it. Then Isaac Fernout, who had been already sworn in a sheriff of the 5 easterly villages on Long Island, was asked, who declared he had already resigned his office as sheriff because it was not in his power to execute that office, having been already threatened by the inhabitants that they would plunder his house. Mr. Steenwyck again asked the people, most of whom were present, if they would remain faithful to their High Mightinesses and take the oath, but not one person answered, signifying plainly enough by their silence that they would not. Then orders were given to read to them the commission of the Governor, which being perceived by the committee from Hartford, they said as before, that the inhabitants of that place being subjects of his Majesty of England, had nothing to do with a commission of the Dutch. So that after many discussions pro and con, we took up our commission and papers, after having entered due protest, and took our departure out of the village. On leaving the place some inhabitants of Southampton were present, among the rest one John Couper, who told Mr. Steenwyck to take care and not appear with that thing at Southampton, which he more than once repeated; for the commissioners, agreeable to their commission, had intended to go thither the next morning; whereupon Mr. Steenwyck asked what he meant by that word 'thing?' to which said John Couper replied 'the Prince's Flag.' Then Mr. Steenwyck enquired of John Couper, if he said so of himself, or on the authority of the inhabitants of Southampton. He answered, 'Rest satisfied that I warn you, and take care that you come not with that flag within range of shot of our village.' When taking leave of the Connecticut gentlemen they asked us to what village we intended to go first to-morrow morning, and they assured us that they should be there as they intended to be present at every place the commissioners should visit. Entered the boat and rowed again towards Shelster Island and resolved not to visit the other two villages as we clearly perceived that we should be unable to effect anything, and rather do

more harm than good. Arrived about 10 in the evening at Sylvester's Island, where we passed the night.

"8th, *Wednesday*. The wind being S. E., we set sail again about 12 at noon, with the ebb towards New Orange, when the sun being yet about an hour high, passed Plum Gut with a spanking breeze. Saw two sails; spoke one belonging to *Aghter Kol*; they who passed New Orange a day after us.

"9th. In the morning, at day break, we had *Onkeway* on our beam. About north of us espied a mizzen sail ahead, near the *White Stone*, when it became very calm, so that we were compelled to row, and arrived by dark at *Deutel Bay*, whence the Commissioners traveled by land to New Orange, and arrived about eight in the evening at Fort William Henry, delivering a report of their transactions to Governor A. Colve. The ship *Zee hond* anchored in harbor about midnight.

Subsequent events showed that not only were the residents of the east end of Long Island averse to acknowledging themselves subjects of the Dutch, but their fellow-countrymen of Connecticut were disposed to maintain them in their position by force, and measures were adopted to that end. The citizens of New Amsterdam also formed themselves into military companies, and organized four companies, of one of which Cornelis Steenwyck was appointed captain.

But these military preparations were not destined to be brought to the point of actual practice, inasmuch as in the following spring (1674) the Governments of England and the Dutch States contracted a treaty of peace, by the terms of which the American Province was finally passed over to the former, and its inhabitants henceforth became subjects of the British King. Some months, however, elapsed between the date of the treaty and the arrival of *Sieur Edmund Andros*, the newly appointed Governor, which did not take place until the 1st of November, 1674. He entered on the Government on the 10th of the same month.

The Dutch citizens yielded without opposition to the new power, but a serious misunderstanding existed between them and Governor Andros respecting the rights of the citizens under the new treaty. It is not necessary to state at large the particular subjects upon which this dispute arose. It is sufficient to say that Governor Andros enforced obedience to his decree by imprisonment of the principal Dutch citizens, among whom was Steenwyck. The prisoners were, after a time, released on bail, but directed to be placed on trial for mutinous conduct. The subject became matter of diplomatic correspondence between the home Governments, but was finally settled in a manner

which reconciled the Dutch citizens to abandon a resolution which was at one time entertained of leaving America and returning to their native land.

Mr. Steenwyck lived ten years subsequent to the second surrender to the English, in the meantime enjoying the ease and dignity afforded by an ample fortune and the respect and confidence of the community in which he lived. Among other civic positions held by him during this period was that of Mayor of the city.

The will of Mayor Steenwyck appears to have been made in the year 1684, at which time he describes himself as sick. By the terms of the will, he desired that the settlement of his estate might be according to the customs of the Dutch, and according to the articles of the surrender of the city, "any law to the contrary notwithstanding." He made as his heirs Jannetie Steenwyck, residing at Harlem, in Holland; Jacob Mauritz, testator's half brother, by the mother's side, and Annatie Mauritz, widow of Dr. Wilhelmus Van Nieuwenhuysen, testator's half sister, by the mother's side, both residing at New York. They to divide among them half the testator's estate. The other half of his estate he left to his wife and her lawful heirs.

He reserved, however, from these devises his manor of Fordham, in Westchester county, an estate containing several thousand acres, which he gave to the nether Dutch Reformed congregation in New York, for the maintenance of their minister, with the provision that it should not be alienated, but always remain for the purpose above named.

It is not known with certainty how many children of Steenwyck survived their father, although it is certain that his son Isaac, who at the time of his father's death was about eighteen years old, was living some years afterwards.

The bequest of Steenwyck for the support of the minister of the Dutch Church was a natural one, from his near family connection with several of those who officiated in this city; and the bequest itself, although then realizing but a small income, became, in subsequent years, a source of great emolument to the church. It was, perhaps, intended more immediately for the benefit of Dominie Drissius, the husband of Steenwyck's mother-in-law, but the Dominie did not long survive his benefactor, the period of his decease being in the year 1689—his wife, Madam Drissius, having deceased in the previous year.

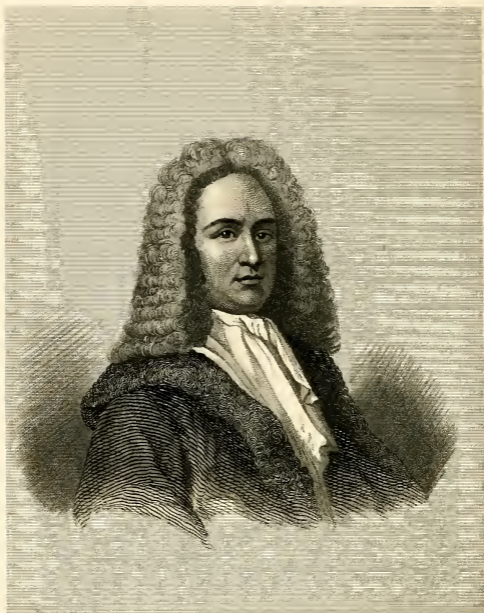

Caleb Heathcote.

MAYOR OF NEW YORK IN 1711-'12-'13.

This gentleman, who occupied a distinguished position in the leading social, political, and mercantile circles of his time, became a resident of the city of New York about the year 1690. His uncle, George Heathcote, had, during ten or fifteen years previously, resided in this city, his business being that of a general merchant, and his position one of wealth and distinction. It is probable that the inducement held out by Mr. George Heathcote persuaded his youthful relative to abandon the ties surrounding a home of ease and comfort in England, and establish himself in a part of the world then regarded as remote from the scenes of civilization and luxury.

Caleb Heathcote, it is stated, was the son of a man of fortune in England, the Mayor of Chester. The story is current that he was supplanted in the affections of a young lady by his elder brother, Gilbert, and that his exile from his native land was thus induced; but it is probable that such circumstance, if it had any foundation in truth, was not of so great consequence. At any rate, it appears, with certainty, that no estrangement occurred between himself and his brother Gilbert.

The latter became distinguished as a man of wealth and as a financier. He was the first Governor of the Bank of England, and received the honor of Knighthood.

Very soon after his arrival in New York, Mr. Heathcote, who was a gentleman of finished address, secured the friendship of the leading official characters, particularly of Governor Fletcher, who, in 1693, advanced him to a seat in the provincial council, and in his report to the Lords of Trade, asking confirmation of the appointment, describes Mr. Heathcote as "very serviceable and forward upon all occasions." The appointment was apparently sanctioned, but some correspondence took place on the subject. In 1697 the Lords of Trade wrote to Gov. Fletcher: "Upon your desire that Mr. Caleb Heathcote be confirmed one of the Council, his Majesty has been pleased to order it: but nobody having appeared on behalf of Mr. Heathcote to take out the warrant, it lies, as yet, without effect. The reason has been told us

that he is about removing from thence; and we desire you to take care for the future that whoever you recommend on like occasion may have somebody here to look out for the dispatch of what is desired for them." In reply, Gov. Fletcher says that Mr. Heathcote has no intention of leaving the province, and hath given directions for taking out the warrant, and adds: "He is a gentleman, has been very useful, and has advanced his private fortune for his Majesty's service, to answer an emergency, when money was not in the Treasury, and is, moreover, zealously affected towards his Majesty's government and interest."

It would seem that Mr. Heathcote became a resident of Westchester county soon after his arrival in the Province, as in the report of the Militia, in 1693, it is recorded, "The Militia of the county of Westchester, commanded by Colonel Caleb Heathcote, being six companies of foot, consisting of 283 men." His residence in Westchester became permanent after his purchase of a very extensive tract of land lying on the west side of Mamaroneck river, and extending eighteen miles north and south. This land originally formed a part of the estate of John Richbell, who owned between Mamaroneck river on the east, and Stonybrook on the west, extending twenty miles inland. The widow of Mr. Richbell died about the year 1700, leaving the arrangements for her funeral under the direction of Colonel Heathcote, who, it is probable, was a very intimate friend of the deceased. In 1696 he had arranged to purchase the property before referred to, which was consummated in 1700, and erected as the Manor of Scarsdale. Upon a portion of the property, called Heathcote Hill, the Manor house was erected, which is described by a traveler, in 1704, as "a very fine seat," and its owner, Colonel Heathcote, is mentioned as "a very fine gentleman." The Scarsdale Manor house existed until the Revolutionary War, when it was destroyed by fire. Its site was, however, afterwards improved by the erection of a mansion thereon by the Delancey family.

Colonel Heathcote married Patty, a daughter of Chief-Justice William Smith, of New York. This gentleman was proprietor of St. George's Manor, at the east end of Long Island, and was one of the leading public men of his day. Previously to his coming to New York, he had been Governor of Tangier, and hence his family were commonly known as the Tangier Smiths. The date of Colonel Heathcote's marriage we have not ascertained with certainty, but it was, doubtless, within a few years after his arrival here.

The business concerns of Colonel Heathcote were carried on in the city of New York, and were no doubt extensive. He probably succeeded to the business of his uncle, who retired to an estate in Bucks county, Pennsylvania, and upon his death left the bulk of his property to Colonel Heathcote. The nature of the business operations thus carried on is derived from various sources, and appears to have been shipping interests and the furnishing of naval stores. In some correspondence carried on between Colonel Heathcote and the Lords of Trade, he made strenuous efforts, in which he was sustained by the merchants of New York, to induce the Government to encourage the building and equipment of vessels of war in this section of country, under his supervision. In this correspondence, dated 1705, he states that he had been in this province fifteen or sixteen years; that it was not for want of business nor merely to gain a fortune that he tendered his services, it having been his principle to prefer public before private interests, nor had any man in these parts so much business on the wheels as he had. He did not blindly guess at the advantages he intimated, it being the chiefest branch of his business to build vessels, for which his people raised hemp and flax and made their rigging and sails, which gave him a perfect knowledge of the business, and was more than had been done by any other man in the Province that he had heard of. The plans and details of this scheme were particularly set forth in his correspondence, but did not meet with favor from the Home Government, whose policy at that time, as well as subsequently, was to discourage any measures which induced the establishment of manufactories in the colonies.

We may infer that Colonel Heathcote enjoyed popularity with all classes in the colony, from the circumstance that Colonel Morris, one of the most liberal of the leading colonial politicians, indorsed his aspirations for the distinguished position of Governor of New Jersey. Colonel Morris writes to the Secretary of State, in 1707, on this subject, as follows: "We are told Sir Gilbert Heathcote has made some interest for his brother, Colonel Caleb Heathcote; he will be a man to the general satisfaction of the people, and at this juncture, to obtain a resettlement of his Majesty's revenue, no man fitter. I know no man who understands the people or the Province better, or is more capable of doing his Majesty real service. He is an honest man, and the reverse of Lord Cornbury."

Colonel Heathcote was appointed Mayor of the city of New York in the year 1711, and held the position for three years. He likewise

held other conspicuous positions, and at the time of his death was Surveyor of the Customs for the Northern District, a Judge of the Court of Admiralty, and one of his Majesty's Council.

This distinguished gentleman died on the 27th of February, 1721. By his will he gave his wife Martha considerable annuities and some property in England. Having then recently received a large legacy from his brother William (who died in England), he apportioned it among his children. To his eldest son, Gilbert, he gave £2,500 sterling; to his son William he gave £2,500 sterling; to his four daughters, Anne, Mary, Martha, and Elizabeth, he gave £1,000 each. He gave his mansion at Mamaroneck, with one thousand acres of land, to his eldest son Gilbert. The remainder of his estate he divided among his several devisees.

Anne, the eldest daughter of Colonel Heathcote, married James Delancey, afterwards Lieutenant-Governor of this Province.

Martha, his second surviving daughter, married Lewis Johnson, son of Dr. John Johnson, who succeeded Colonel Heathcote as Mayor of New York, in 1714, and afterwards resided at Perth Amboy.





Operations of the British Army in the Environs of New York in 1776.

WE present in the present number of the Manual a topographical view, on a large scale, of the operations of the British fleet and army in the campaign of 1776, which involved the taking of the city of New York, and the subsequent movements between the two armies on New York island and in Westchester county.

This interesting memorial of the revolutionary period is copied from an original, formerly in the possession of the Right Hon. John Beresford, and has not been heretofore published. The compiler has in previous numbers of the Manual acknowledged his indebtedness to George H. Moore, Esq., librarian of the New York Historical society, through whose indefatigable researches, principally in European archives, several most interesting illustrations of old-time history have been brought to light, and through whose favor they have been given to the public through the medium of the Manual. He is to add this topographical map, as well as the view of the engagement between the Phoenix and Rose and the American fire-ships, which also appears in the present number, to the number before acknowledged from that source.

Sir—The Country being generally amused with the *Aurora Borealis* which made so beautiful and magnificent Appearance the 22 and 23 Nights of the last Month, I take the liberty to convey to you the following Speculation occasioned by that *Phenomenon*.

We have several times seen this illustrious Meteor in this Country, but never so surprizingly Rich and Splendid as now blush'd over the face of the Skies. It first appear'd only as is usual with the *Northern Twilight*, a bright Flame in the North Quarter of the Horizon. Some observe that this kind of Meteor never appears near the Equator, and has therefore obtained the above name. About half an hour past seven there shot up a *Ruddy Stream* which collected itself into a Body and seem'd to hang over us like a *Mass of Blood*, or rather like a *Curtain of Fire*. This lasted a few Minutes, when it grew fainter by Degrees, and at length vanished. However the Glitter in the North

still continued to light us, so that one might with some Attention, see to read in some large Print. Near the Hour of Nine it began to increase again and the Heavens here grew *Luminous* and *Rosey*. At Twenty-four Minutes after Nine, there was observed a *Light* gathering in the *North East*, which moving slowly to the *East* began to glow very *fierce* and *vivid*. It rose leisurely and at last crowded into a Centre near the *Zenith*, whence in a few Minutes it branched out over all the Northern Half of the *Hemisphere*, in the *florid* and *sparkling Colours* of a *Thousand Rainbows*. As we stood under it and gazed up, the Country far and wide seemed to be arched over (if I may be allowed the Expression) with a vast *Flaming Umbrello*. It continued for about a Quarter of an Hour shifting its *Form* and *Colours*, and then gently faded away till it quite disappeared. For the Remainder of the Night, a settled *Lustre* dawned round the Northern Edges of the *Hemisphere*, which kept Flashing at intervals till it was lost in the Spread of the *Morning Light*.

The natural Causes of this gay Meteor, I leave to be disputed among Philosophers. For my own Part, I am more inclined to turn it into a serious Speculation, that may improve my Religion, at the same time that it entertains my Fancy. I love to lift my Thoughts to the Creator, when I see the Pomp and Wonders of his Workmanship. I learn a little of the Majesty and Magnificence of his Throne when I behold the secret Beams of Light staining the Skies with such a beautiful Variety of Glories. It naturally leads my thoughts to the Contemplation of that important Night, when the *Heavens being on Fire shall be dissolved, and the Elements shall melt with fervent Heat; when our blessed SAVIOUR shall descend in flaming Fire, in the Clouds of Heaven, with Power and great Glory*.

I am far from encouraging an irrational Enthusiasm, or justifying the extravagant Whimsies of some, who upon every odd Appearance in the Sky fancy the World will end in an Hour or two. But I can by no means think it unbecoming a Christian Philosopher, to take Notice of those fearful Sight, and great Signs from Heaven, which we know are to be Fore-runners of the Conflagration that must quickly devour the Earth. And it happens very well for our present Purpose, that the Words of the sacred Text cannot on any Occasion be more applicable than to this particular Appearance. *I will shew Wonders in Heaven above, Blood and Fire and Vapours of Smoak, before that great and notable day*. Our Lord himself has taught us to observe these Things when they come to pass, as the Preludes to his second Descent. *So likewise when ye see all these Things, know that it is near at the Doors* — *New York Gazette, November 9, 1730*.

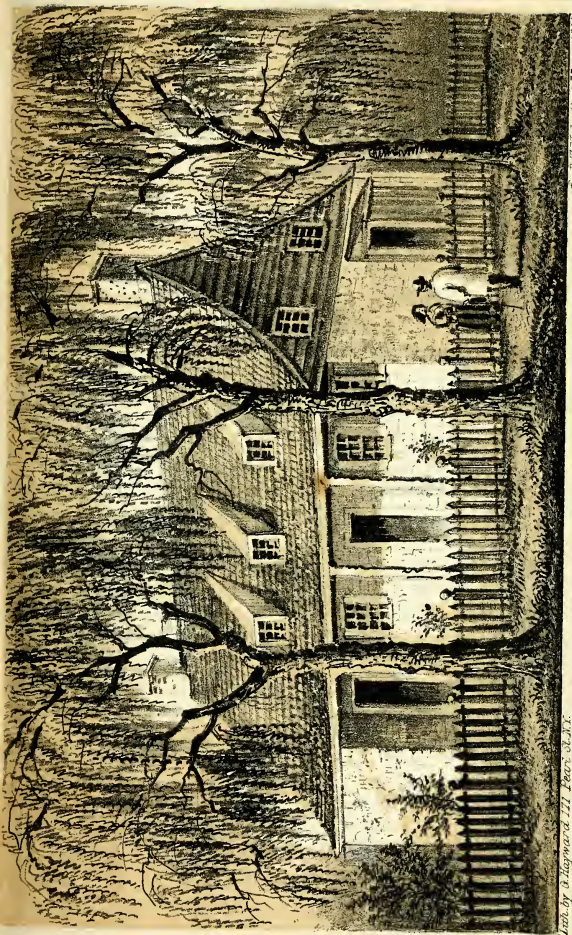

Of which all His Majesty's Subjects, and concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

And in Order thereto, it may not be amiss to propose some Methods necessary to be done as soon as possible, so that in Case of a Rupture, the Enemy should attack Us in these Parts, we might be in a Condition to receive and salute them after a brave and warlike Manner, not trusting too much on our Number of Men, and carelesly saying, *No Fear, No Fear*; but let Us be prepared, if possible, to disappoint them in their first Attempt, by endeavouring to engage them smartly at every convenient Place, as they enter the Channel, thereby to disable them more and more as they come nearer the Town; and as I am unacquainted with Depth and Breadth of our Channel, I shall only suppose, the first convenient place for erecting a sufficient Battery (and other Conveniencies necessary), to be at *Sandy Hook*, and a suitable Guard to be there placed as Occasion shall require; and on the first Alarm, all the Train-bands of the next adjacent Towns and Villages to repair thither well armed. The next convenient Places I suppose to be at *Caney-Island*, and at the *Narrows* on both sides of the Channel, the Train-bands also, on Notice to repair to their respective Fortifications. And also in and about the City such other Batteries as shall be most necessary, and all the Train-bands of *Queens County* and to the Eastward to repair to the City, and all that come by Water to leave their Boats and other Small-craft at *Kips's-Bay*, and the Train-bands of *Bergin County* to repair to *New York* also, and leave their Small-craft at *Grinage*. By which means and further Management we might be able not only to defeat and dissappoint the Enemy in their first Designs, but to also discourage them of making the like attempts for Time to come.

“And towards effecting these good Purposes, every Man in his Capacity ought to join his Endeavours, and lay aside all private Views, Partyships, and Divisions (which often tends to the Ruin of a State or Country), and declare for a stout and resolute Resistance, suitable to the Character we bear of good Subjects, and as may render us worthy of those many Blessings which we enjoy under the Protection of our most Gracious Sovereign in a free Country, where every Subject may reap the fruits of his own Labours, and the free Exercise of his Religion: Those Liberties enjoyed, so dear, so precious, are well worthy of our Concern, the same to preserve and maintain.

“ Perhaps our Enemies might flatter themselves, That it would be an easy Matter for them, with a *small Number of Shipping* to sail into our Harbour, and oblige us to a Compliance of ransoming the Place for a large Sum of Money (as indeed it would, if we should depend too much upon our present State and Condition), and some of our careless Inhabitants might also think the Cost of those new proposed Fortifications would be a good help towards ransoming the Place, in Case the Enemy should come to disturb us. But every Man that hath a Regard for the Honour of his King, the Welfare of his Country, and for the Preservation of his Life and his Liberty, ought to assist in using all Endeavours of putting us in a good Posture of Defence, and on every Occasion be ready for a noble Resistance that so by our timely and earnest Endeavours and God’s Blessing we might remain, *A free and happy People.*”—*New York Gazette, December 31, 1733.*

May it please Your Excellency:

We the Grand Inquest for our Sovereign Lord the KING, and the Body of the City and County of *New York,* being desirous on all Occasions to demonstrate our Zeal and Affections for His most Sacred Majesty’s Person and Government, Conceive it our Duty to embrace this Opportunity in the most respectful Manner to beg leave humbly to represent unto your Excellency, That from the various Accounts we have lately had by the publick Papers of the Armaments and Military Preparations which for some Time past has been making by several of the States and Powers in *Europe.* We are apprehensive that the Consequences thereof may terminate in a WAR; and tho’ at this Distance we cannot certainly depend on such Account, or how far *Great Britain* may be concerned, yet we may receive them as just Cautions to prepare and put ourselves in the best Posture of Defence we are capable of, as well to discourage, as to oppose any Naval Attempt that might be made against us.

THEREFORE to whom can we so properly apply on this Occasion as to Your Excellency (of whose long Experience and great Ability in Military Affairs, we are well assured) to request that such proper and seasonable Care may speedily be taken to fortify this City (the Me-

tropolis of this Province) as may most conduce to His Majesty's Honour, and the Safety of his People, and we beg leave to assure your Excellency that it will not only be highly acceptable to us, but also to the body of the City and County, which we have at this Time the Honour to represent. Unto which his Excellency our GOVERNOUR was pleased to return the following Answer *viz.* :

Gentlemen:—As I think it my Duty, I shall with Pleasure give my Concurrence to every Thing that appears to me consistent with the Honour of the KING, and the true Interest and Tranquility of this City and Province : Upon the least Surmise of a War, Expresses have always been and by several Ways sent to Governors abroad. I have received none, neither can I learn that any of the Governors either of the Islands or the Continent Plantations have received any : But least the various Accounts of a War should not prove a groundless Report, I shall in the mean time employ my immediate Thoughts to consider such effectual Measures, that no Time may be lost when it is proper, to put them in Practice for the Security, Ease and Protection of you all, so that you may depend that everything necessary shall be ready to lay before the Assembly on their very first meeting.

New York, January 22, 1734.—Sunday, the 20th Instant, being the Anniversary of the Birth Day of his Royal Highness, *Frederic, Prince of Wales*, the Honours of the Day were defer'd till Monday, following, when at 12 a'Clock at Noon, his Excellency was attended by the Corporation, and all the principal Gentlemen and Merchants of this City, at Fort George, where the Healths of His Majesty, His Royal Consort, His Royal Highness the *Prince of Wales*, the Royal Family, and the Ministry, were drank as usual, the Cannon around the Ramparts firing, and the two Independent Companies posted here being under Arms.

In the Evening there was a numerous and splendid Appearance of Gentlemen and Ladies at the Fort, where they were received by His Excellency and Lady, and the Honourable Family ; the Night concluded with a splendid Supper and a Ball, which lasted till Four o'Clock in the Morning.

In the Dusk of the Evening, on Sunday, the 20th Inst., a young

woman about 14 or 15 years of Age, coming from a Neighbour's House at the outward Part of City, was met by a Negro Man belonging to Mr. *Vallet*, who threw her down, stopt her Mouth, and made an Attempt to Ravish her; but by her struggling she got the Cloth out of her Mouth, cry'd out, and told him, *That she knew him and who was his Master*, upon which he desisted and ran away. On Monday said Negro was apprehended, Tuesday he had his Trial, by Virtue of an Act of Assembly of this Province, appointing three or more of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, in Conjunction with five of the principal Free holders of the County, to try and convict Negroes transgressing the Law. At his Trial, by some other evidence it appeared, That said Negro had endeavoured to make the like Attempt on another Woman some Time before; and this last Fact appearing very Plain, he was sentenced to be burnt alive, and on Thursday last he was burnt accordingly, in the presence of a numerous Company of Spectators, great part of which were of the Black Tribe.

By the Inspection of the Justice inflicted on this Negro, it is hoped it may be the Means to deter others from attempting such wicked Crimes for the future.—*New York Gazette, January 28, 1734.*

WHEREAS by the Contrivance of some evil Disposed and Disaffected Persons, divers Journals or Printed News-Papers (entitled *The New-York Weekly Journal, containing the freshest Advices, foreign and Domes-tick*) have been caused to be Printed and Published by *John Peter Zenger*, in many of which Journals or Printed News-Papers (but more particularly those Numbered 7, 47, 48, 49) are contained divers Scandalous, Virulent, False and Seditious Reflections, not only upon the whole Legislature, in general, and upon the most considerable Persons in the most distinguish'd Stations in the Province, but also upon his Majesty's lawful and rightful Government, and just Prerogative. Which said Reflections seem contrived by the Wicked Authors of them, not only to create Jealousies, Discontents and Animosities in the Minds of his Majesty's Liege People of this Province to the Subversion of the Peace and Tranquility thereof but to alienate their Affection from the best of Kings, and raise *Factions, Tumults and Sediti-on* among them. Wherefore I have thought fit, by and with the Advice of his Majesty's Council, to issue this Proclamation, hereby Promising a Reward of *Fifty Pounds* to such Person or Persons who

shall discover the Author or Authors of the said *Scandalous, Virulent and Seditious Reflections* contained in the said Journals or Printed News-Paper, to be paid to the said Person or Persons discovering the same as soon as such Author shall be convicted of having been the Author or Authors thereof.

The other proclamation was issued by his said Excellency, by advice of his Majesty's Council, and pursuant to an Address to his Excellency by the late Grand Jury, Promising the sum of 20*l.* to such Person as should discover the Author of two late scandalous Songs or Ballads, Printed & dispersed in this City, &c., highly defaming the Administration of his Majesty's Government in this Province, tending greatly to inflame the Minds of his Majesty's good Subjects, and to disturb the Public Peace.

On the 17th Instant *John Peter Zenger* was taken up and committed to Gaol by virtue of an Order of Council, for Printing and Publishing the above mentioned Journals, or News-Papers, &c., and on the 20th instant he was brought by a Writ of *Habeas Corpus* before the Honourable *James DeLancey, Esq* ; Chief Justice, at his Chamber where the Writ was Returnable, who ordered the Argument of that Matter to be at the City Hall on the 23d in the afternoon. At which Place, after a long Debate (the City Hall being crowded with People) the Chief Justice was pleased to order that the said *John Peter Zenger* shou'd be admitted to Bail, himself to be bound by Recognizance in the Sum of 400*l.* & two Sureties, in 200*l.* each, for his Appearance the next Term ; and Remanded him to Prison for want of such Recognizance ; which we don't hear is as yet enter'd into.—*New York Gazette, November 25, 1734.*

Oh cruelty unknown before
 To any barbarous savage shore,
 Much more when Men so much profess
 Humanity and Godliness

It is no new Thing for even a Man of Vertue to fall under Distress ; but to mock him when distress'd or under Misfortunes, is what has been accounted a Vice among the more civilized Heathens ; however it is my case at present, and my Adversaries are not content with my Imprisonment, but I am made their laughing Stock.

There is a great Noise made in that ridiculous Letter in Mr. *Bradford's* last *Gazette* about setting the Province in Flames, raising of Sedition and Tumults, &c. I know of none, either past or intended ; if my Adversaries know of any, they'l do well to discover them and prevent ill Consequences. I have printed some Complaints to the Public, those complain'd of had a Remedy to answer without coming to me ; and had they come to me, they would have found the same Fidelity some of them experienc'd before ; They may tax me with Weaknesses accident to human Nature ; but it is out of their Power (and I hope ever will be) truly to prove me guilty of any premeditated Wickedness.

That Author begins the Confession he would have me make with a very puny Witticism on my Address to my Readers ; by saying *It sounds like the Language of the Prize-fighter or Poppet Show Man.* I can assure him that many *Gentlemen and Ladies* read my *Journals* ; there is also some *others* and among them some S——s, witness that Author. I might tell him that the Whole of his Performance sounds too much like the Language of a bankrupt Vinter or —— &c.

Upon this his Excellency the Governour sent to the *Jerseys* to have this *Johnson* apprehended, and also called

a Council and by their Advice issued a Proclamation, Promising the Sum of *Fifty Pounds* for the discovery of the Author or Authors these Counterfeit *Ten Shilling Bills of Credit*, which are pretty difficult to be distinguished from the True Bills, the Signers Names being nearly Imitated, but upon a nice observation there is some difference, more particularly in the Vanes of the Wind-mill, the Flour Cask, and the Letter N in the Arms of the City of *New York*.

The said Joseph Johnsons Wife was Indicted last Wednesday at the Quarter Sessions held for this City and County, for uttering several of said Counterfeit Bills, and is now in Gaol in the *City Hall* of the City of *New York* for the same.

Yet since that it appears that it was only an enlivening before Death ; for on *Wednesday* the tenth of this Instant his Excellency Coll. *William Cosby*, Governor of the Province, departed this Life, after a severe Illness of almost sixteen ; and on *Saturday* following he was decently interred in his Majesty's Chappel in the Fort, his Corps being attended by the Gentlemen of the Council, the Clergy of the City, the Physitians that attended him in his Illness, and most of the principal Gentlemen and Merchants who from an affectionate concern for his Death, voluntarily assisted in paying their last Duty to his Remains. The Grief and Affliction of his family, the Concern and Regret of all that Knew him, is a testimony that he was, in relation of Life, a valuable man.—*New York Gazette*, March 15, 1736.

Mr. Zenger :—Mr. *Bradford's* Integrity has been so long established, and the falsity of his Assertions so often proved, that were his late elaborate Performance, to Wit, the first Paragraph of his last *Gazette*, calculated for the present Times, and for this Meridian only, it would be Difficult to find an excuse for observing upon it, but to prevent Impositions upon any at too great a Distance to know the Facts. And also upon those who coming hither hereafter as Strangers, may possibly be imposed upon by some of his Coadjutors, I shall take the Liberty of passing a few genuine Remarks upon what he hath said, and hope to acquit myself in such Manner as becomes a Lover of Truth, a Friend to my Country, and one who is in Charity with all Men. He begins with an Apology for having told us in his preceding Paper, that our late Governour was in a fair Way of recovery on the Tuesday, when it was well Known he dyed on the Wednesday following, and he insinuates that he was deceived by the Governours Physicians and Friends. Who he means by the Governour's Friends is only known to himself, and therefore cannot properly be reply'd to. But I dare take upon me to Affirm and Challenge him to prove the Contrary, that both on the Sunday Evening, and all the Monday before the publishing of that *Gazette*. Two of the Governor's Physicians did declare they had no hopes of his Excellency's Recovery, and that they feared he could not subsist many Days; It would be needless here to shew Mr. *Bradford's* inducement for this Misrepresentation, a small share of Penetration will fathom this Mistery in Politics as well as the great Pains he has taken to inform the World that the Gentlemen of the Council, most of the principal Merchants and Gentlemen (not to mention the Orders of Divinity, and Physick, who seem upon this Occasion under an unavoidable restraint) Voluntarily, of their own Accord, attended his Excellency's Funeral, and he would draw from this, that they by this shewing their Affection, Concern and Regret, did testify that his Excellency was in Relation of Life a valuable Man; but if the Facts be not true, I presume the Consequence will be little insisted on: I will therefore pray leave to ask Mr. *Bradford* a few Questions; were none of the Gentlemen of the Council invited to that Funeral; nay were not some of

them very much pressed to come there? Who were they that were invited and for what Reason? And who were those that did attend? Was the Funeral said to be publick or Private? Was not there a great deal of Pains taken by a certain set of Emmissaries, even by some who reckon themselves considerable, to perswade Gentlemen to go to the Funeral? Was there no other Persons invited besides part of the Gentlemen of the Council? Is it not notorious that by far the greatest Number of the Gentlemen and principal Merchants were not at the Funeral? Will his Excellency's good or ill Character follow from his being buried in the King's Chappel, or is a Person who had born his Majesty's Commission of a Governor? Is it not publickly known that there never was in this Province an Administration so loudly complained of as the last? Have not the Right Honourable the Lords of the Privy Council reported to his Majesty. That the late Governor had displaced the Chief Justice of this Province without cause; not to enumerate many other flagrant Instances. Can such an Action appertain to a Man who was in Relation of Life, Valuable? Mr. *Bradford* would do well to be more Cautious for the Future; It is more allowable indeed for the Relations and Dependants of the deceased to be partial in his Favour; but a publick News Writer, who sets himself at other Times to criticize severely enough upon Men's Conduct, that are not agreeable to his Taste, may surely be said to Trip, when by false Glosses and Appearances he is detected in endeavouring to impose upon Mankind in favour of particular Views and Interests; I shall only add, that I advise Mr. *Bradford* not to rake any more into the ashes of the Dead, for I can assure him I know a much abler Pen than my own who has collected a compleat set of Records and Materials, to enable him to write that Gentleman's Life and Character, and I believe, should he be tempted to send it abroad to the World, it would not be acceptable to his Friends, and the less so for the publick Testimonies, that would support it. On the other Hand Mr. *Zenger* it will be no Disadvantage to your Character to have it said of you, that upon this Occassion you have behaved yourself with more Modesty than your Adversaries. Permit me to remind you of a saving that is highly approved.

The PRINTER To his Readers : Gentlemen it is but too well Known to you all that for above 2 years past, there has been a Difference between the late Governour *Cosby* and some other Persons in this Province, which has been exposed in print with some warmth, but as to the merit of the Cause I meddle not with it, nor will I enter into Controversie about it, having declared myself to be of neither party, from the beginning, yet as I am and have been above forty years last past a Servant to the Government (and consequently to the severall Governours during that Time) so I have according to my duty, some times printed in my *Gazette* some observations which the late Governour's Friends, thought proper to make upon what the other Party printed against him, and for my so doing Mr. *Zenger*, or some of the Party, have been angry with me, as I may suppose, (for I know not of any thing else that I have done by which they could be offended with me, they having formerly been my very good Friends) they have from time to time, Reflected upon me and against my *Gazette*, insinuating that what I published was not true. That I published nothing but what the Governour does allow of, &c., whereas the contrary is most true, for neither his late Excellency Governour *Cosby* nor any other Person ever directed me, or ever saw what News I put into my Paper before it was published to the World; only what Answers on Observations were sent to me against what the other Party printed against the Governour &c. (as before mentioned) and sometimes (when I was not present) some Friend of mine would send me an account of what passed and how the Royal Healths were drank on Publick Days, and sometimes would say, *That most of the principal Merchants and Gentlemen at the Fort, &c.* This *Zenger's Journal* oftentimes would contradict, and say, *the greatest number were not at the Fort*, whereas perhaps neither party had made an exact calculation how many were at the Fort, or how many absent; however, this and such like trivial matters *Zenger's Journal* would magnifie to be a Lie, in order to discredit *Will. And I hereby acquaint my Friends and Readers, that if at any time I am made sensible that thro' wrong Information I have published anything not true, I shall readily make known the true matter of facts. But as to what I published concerning the *Governour's being in a fair way of Recovery after his Imposthume was lanced* is True, according to the then Opinion of his Physicians and Friends about him, as I then had it from some of them, in writing, and still have it by me. But if my account of the Governor's Indisposition had been wrong, was anybody hurt by it? I suppose my Friends nor enemies will not say it. So also what I related concerning his Excellency's Funeral I find, upon enquiry, to be true, altho' Mr. *Zenger's Journal* insinuates the contrary. They cite my words *The Gentlemen of the Council, &c., Voluntarily assisted in poying their last Duty to his Remains*; and then ask *W. Bradford, Were none of the Gentlemen of the Council invited to that Funeral?* To which *W. B.* answers. That he is informed that some of the Council were invited to be Pawl-bearers, and yet he will not allow that he gave a false account, when he says, *They Voluntarily Assisted, &c.*, because he is very well informed, that the several Degrees of Persons there mentioned, did come to said Funeral of their *own Voluntarily good Will*. To conclude, altho' I apprehend myself to be wronged by their or his false Charges, I am obliged to him for his good Advice, (and which I hope I shall follow) where he says, *I advise Mr. Bradford not rake any more in the Ashes of the Dead*. They would tell you, that the *Liberties of the People* are never more secure than when they are fenced and guarded by the *Royal Prerogative*, and never more exposed to the Lust and Rage of Lawless Might, than when the Fence is broken down; and they would Illustrate what they Advance, by recent Examples from our own History. They would show you, that the cry of *Liberty* and *Breach of Privileges*, and the Complaints of *Grievances*, were the Engines of a *Faction* and *Rebellious People*, by which they subverted our happy Constitution, Murdered and *Destroyed* a *Legal Monarchy* and introduced the *Greatest Tyranny* that ever any Age or Country groaned under; They would show you, those Liberties trodden under foot by those very Men who before pretended to be jealous of them; that the Will and Breath of the Tyrants were the only Laws by which the good, the honest and the Loyal were Governed and destroyed, and their Estates and Fortunes Sequestred; and that this Evil did not fall on the good only, but on them too, who having gone every length in Villainy, but the last, stopt there; for thats the way of the *Ring Leaders Faction* (*Brother*). They first hoodwink the People, and then lead them thro' thick, and thro' thin, and when they begin to shrink, smother them in their own Filth, or leave them to grope out their Safety as they can. They would shew you that *Liberty* and *Law* had no other way to raise their Heads, and to dispencc their Blessings again to the People, but under the Protection of the *Royal Prerogative*; in a word, They would show you such a lively Image of *Faction*, as would make every honest Eye sicken at the sight of it and fill us with Transports of Joy, that we live under the cover of that *Prerogative* which potects and guards us in the Enjoyment of our *Civil* and *Sacred Rights* and *Liberties*, and make us, with hearts full of *Loyalty* and *Gratitude* to his *Most Sacred Majesty*, for the Blessings we Enjoy under his most Auspicious Influence, incessantly offer up

our Vows to Heaven for his Health, and for a long and prosperous Reign over us, and a never ending Succession of Illustrious Princes of his Royal House, to sit upon his Throne forever. They would then shift the Scene to this Province, and shew you, that all the Noise and stir that has been made, has arose from *Disappointment, Resentment* and the *Private* views and *self-Interest* of a few Men; They would expose the *Folly* and *Sophistry* of those Arguements that have appeared in defence of Mr. *Van Dam's* Pretensions to the Administration of the Government. They would shew you, that Governor *Cosby* had power by the King's Commission and Instructions, to suspend him without giving his Reasons here; That by a Clause in the same Commission (which you have thought fit to conceal) His Majesty has in express words declared, *That the suspension shall remain in Force till his Royal Pleasure be known.* They wou'd shew you, that a Councillor's being first named in the Instructions, does not, in all events, invest him with the Administration of the Government, on a Governour's Death; That he may be disqualified for that high Trust, by other means than that of Suspension; for the hand of God may many ways interpose and disqualifie him. They would shew you, That the Administration of the Government is rightly and Lawfully lodg'd in Mr. *Clarke's* hands, and must remain so till the King's Pleasure be known. They would then speak out, and shew you, That it is the Duty of the Assembly to meet and sit when he calls them together; That the Defence, the Quiet and Prosperity of the Province require it of them; That to act rationally, they ought, when they meet, to Examine Seriously the Powers given to a Governor by the King's Commission and Instructions. Whereas at present your Letter Writers (like others of their Kind) are forc'd to mumble Thistles; they own, and yet would fain deny, *That it is dangerous for the Assembly not to meet.* They foresee the Consequences of their Sitting, that it would put an End to Faction and them to Silence, and restore perfect Peace and Concord to the Province; The greatest Blessing the country can receive, and the greatest evil that can befall your Correspondents. For our Parts, *brother*, these are things we must not touch upon, let us first wear out the Subject I proposed, and then lay our heads together and think of something else. But be sure when your Letter-Writer has done with your little Book of Jests and Proverbs, that you bring it with you when you meet me, for we may pick out some Pretty little things to Embellish

our Papers, and divert our Readers, no Matter whether they laugh at them or at us.

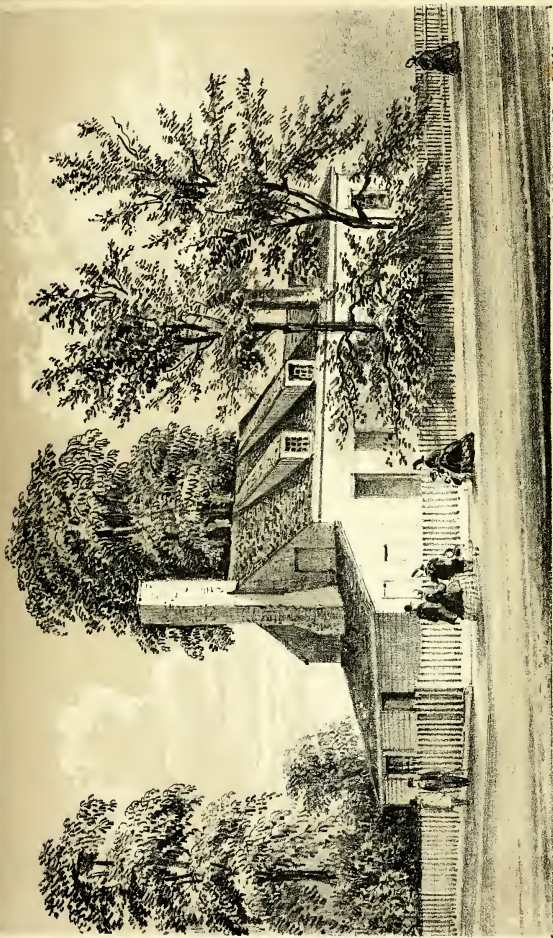
THE causes of the American Revolution, both the remote and proximate, when carefully considered, present an extraordinary combination of influences ; some originating at periods far distant from those of others ; some antagonistic and repugnant to, and, apparently, irreconcilable in many respects with others ; generally diverse and various in their nature, character, and tendencies. Yet all, as the events of the past have demonstrated, flowing ultimately into one channel ; uniting in one common sympathy for one common end ; one common, mighty purpose—the establishment of a Government for the protection and benefit of all the people of a nation, and of the great and noble principle of “civil and religious liberty.”

The settlements of the thirteen Colonies, which comprehended the original U. States, were composed chiefly of exiles, who had fled from tyranny and its consequences ; who had come with a bitter sense of previous persecution ; with an intense appreciation of the blessing of living in the wild solitudes of a land where they could exist, and breathe, and act, and move and have a being, without oppression.

Such were the religious reformers of all denominations, from various parts of Christendom : the Lutherans, the Calvinists, the Anabaptists, the Protestants, of every description ; the Huguenots from France ; the Puritans and Independents from England ; the Covenanters from Scotland ; and, at a later period, the followers of George Fox.

There came to what is now the City of New York, and there and in such of the surrounding country as was formerly known as the “Nieuw Netherlands,” settled “large numbers of the people from Holland, accompanied by French Huguenots, their allies and friends : they came with a fresh knowledge of the civil wars of the Low Countries of Europe, which terminated in the establishment of the Dutch Republic ; they came with an intelligent comprehension of the value of human liberty.”

In the sentiments and feelings of those original settlers of the Colonies was the germ of one of the causes, though a silent and remote one, of the American Republic.

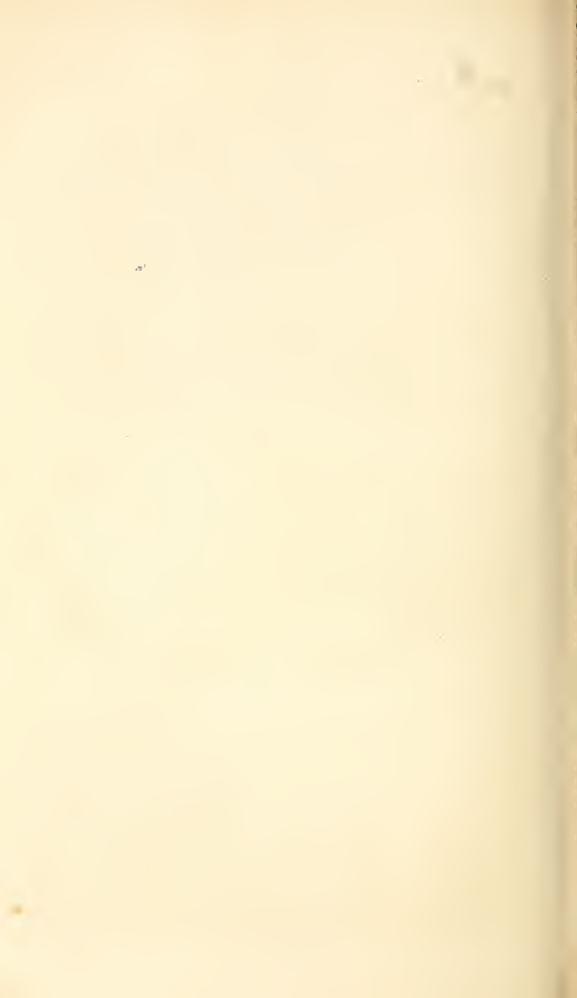

The examination of the annals of the several Colonies develops the fact, that this sense of liberty (especially in New York, under both the Dutch and English sovereignties) was with unvaried constancy and fearlessness maintained; and the fact that on every occasion, when requisite or proper, resistance to encroachments upon, and bold and explicit assertion of their rights, were openly made by the people. The manifestations are numerous; the detail would be too lengthy to be included in this sketch. The history of the city of New York, which for a long period, in many respects, is identical or interwoven and intimate with that of the Colony and nation, is a strong illustration of this truth.

After the conquest of the Nieuw Netherlands from the Dutch by the English, as the Catholic and Protestant power in England alternately predominated, so did the persecution of one sect by the other prevail; and so was exercised the hand of power in various degrees in the British Colonies until, by the Revolution of 1688, the Prince and Princess of Orange were placed upon the British throne, and the Protestants obtained the permanent sovereignty of the British nation.

Then followed the fierce oppression of the Catholics, as well in the British Colonies as elsewhere, where British jurisdiction existed. The statutes of the Colonies, passed in those days, show the intensity of the bitter and cruel feeling then entertained against them. (See Smith & Livingston's *Laws of the Colony of New York*, Vol. 1, page 37, and the *Life of Charles Carroll*, Vol. 7 of the *Lives of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence*, page 239.)

This persecution was steadily continued for a series of years, and gave birth to an influence, most potent, of opposition to the British Government. It was a material contribution to the cause of the Revolution of 1776.

It is a singular circumstance, in the history of those times, that in some cases those who had fled from religious and political oppression became intolerant in their turn, and would not allow an honest difference of opinion, from their own, to be entertained by others. They in some cases persecuted, even unto death, those whose tenets were variant from those held by them. The Quakers (of all sects the most inoffensive and noted for their benevolence) were special objects of their vindictiveness. (See Sewall's *History of the Friends*, in 2 vols.) The wrongs and injuries heaped on that people, was it not for reliable proofs of them, would be now deemed incredible. Herein was caused another powerful, though quiet influence, which contributed towards the success of the American Revolution.

The case of Jacob Leisler, his connections, kindred and friends, was another concurring influence which led to the great event. His interesting history is the history of a true and devoted patriot; of an honest man; of his loyalty to his sovereign and his country on the one side, of the ingratitude, injustice, and extreme cruelty of the British Government, on the other. Its wicked treatment of him, the sufferings, and undeserved, ignominious death of him and his son-in-law, Jacob Kilbourne, and the persecution of his friends and followers, made a deep, durable, abiding and unalterable influence, great in its power, which was cast into the scale of the Revolutionary Patriots.

It is worthy of remark that the spot where Governor Leisler suffered, and where his remains were first interred, is opposite to and in front of the present "Tammany Hall," erected more than a century after his death by those who held the same principles as those for which he contended and died—principles tending to elevate and give prosperity to the virtuous, the good, and the faithful of all classes of a nation.

And another singular fact: Nicholas Bayard, who was one of the most bitter of his opponents, was tried and sentenced to death, under a law said to have been suggested by himself when he was in power. His sentence presents a revolting evidence of the cruelty and barbarity which then was recognized and allowed by British criminal law. (See *State Trials*, by Howell, Vol. 14, page 515.)

From the causes above mentioned, and others, all classes and sects, in fine nearly all the British Colonists, had become inspired with a ceaseless anxiety for liberation from governmental oppression, and a grave predisposition to resist every additional innovation on their rights. Such was the state of the public mind when the Stamp Act was passed in 1765.

That law, in addition to previous laws which had been enacted under pretense of enforcing the revenue laws and the laws to prevent smuggling, and other laws laying burdens on the people, gave fuel to the flame of feeling which latently existed. The Stamp Act was peculiarly obnoxious; it was a direct tax without representation. The claim to the right to lay it was openly avowed by the British Government. And sensitive as the people were from previous provocations, they received the intelligence of its passage with open expressions of indignation.

Most of those who until then had been neutral joined the disaffected, and actively co-operated in acts of resistance to it.

Under the first spontaneous impulse, a league to discontinue importations was formed, and the association known as the Sons of Liberty was organized. The Lieutenant-Governor was burned in effigy, and some private property was destroyed.

By the tenor of the Act, it was to go into operation on the 1st of November, 1765. Between that day and the 18th of March, 1766, the struggles of the citizens, efficiently aided by the Sons of Liberty, to prevent the distribution and use of the stamps, and the officers of the crown to introduce and circulate and force them into use, were incessant, numerous, and vigorous; the detail is too lengthy to be here inserted. The people finally succeeded. So unpopular was the law that none would use the stamps.

On the day last mentioned the Act was repealed. But the news of the repeal was accompanied by the news of the passage of the Mutiny Act, a law also obnoxious and oppressive.

Thankful, however, for the repeal of the Stamp Act, the People, on the King's birth-day the 4th of June, held a jubilee in the Fields (the Park), and on the occasion erected a Liberty Pole, on that part of them where afterwards the Bridewell was built—now between the westerly side of the City Hall and Broadway.

The discontent of the officers of the Government, and military officers, with the success of the people, was manifested after the repeal in various ways. The Liberty Pole was regarded with especial dislike, as the symbol of their victory. On the 10th of August it was cut down by the soldiers.

For several years thereafter there was a succession of struggles, on the part of the citizens to maintain and preserve it, on the part of the soldiers and officers of the Crown to remove it. The attempts to destroy it were numerous, often produced severe conflicts, and were attended by personal violence. Five times it was broken down, and in some instances destroyed; but after each successful effort it was promptly re-erected by the people. At last, in May, 1769, it was erected on a piece of land which was close to the spot where it was first put up, and which belonged to a citizen and there afterwards, until the Revolution, remained unmolested.

On the repeal of the Stamp Act the non-importation league ceased, and the association of the Sons of Liberty was dissolved. But those who composed those associations, in reality continued attached to each other by a bond of sympathy too strong to be severed.

The passage of the Tea or Tariff Act, in 1768, revived with increased

force the previous feeling of disaffection and opposition, and united nearly all the people in a stern resolve to resist its enforcement; the non-importation league was again formed, and the Sons of Liberty reorganized.

Efforts were made and measures initiated to give form, method, and power to their sense of, and oppose, with effect, the wrongs which the law authorized and occasioned, and to combat every attempt to invade the rights of the people. The conduct of the officers and subordinates of the British Government was vigilantly watched.

Of the events which followed, until the close of the Revolutionary War, every intelligent American is doubtless aware.

The various laws of the British Parliament in relation to billeting the soldiers of the King upon the inhabitants, and the other acts, including the Stamp, and the Tea and Tariff Act, gave rise to an opposition exceedingly strong; by which were organized and united each and all of the elements of discontent and opposition; and of the influence then and before existing, and thus united, composed a power which all the British nation and Government, in their utmost strength, could not resist.

The Sons of Liberty may be said to have given form, force, energy, and definiteness to the great purpose of this power—to have been the inspirators of the conflict which led to the consummation of the mighty result. They were a band of patriotic heroes who devoted all their means, their energies, their time, and many of them their lives to the great cause: their sacrifices and sufferings were great; their perils extreme and incessant; they were foremost in every danger, in every battle, in every trial; they submitted freely, to every privation, every exposure, with patience, perseverance, and intense devotion; without reservation, fear, doubt or distrust, with implicit faith, dedicated themselves, and all they possessed, to their country. The actions of each and every of them were as a unit, were unceasing and eminently beneficial; their influence was a concentrated, an organized strength, felt every where, and exercised with unwavering fidelity, and with wisdom, skill, and intrepid valor.

The band was originated in the city of New York, but they subsequently extended to every other city—indeed had members in most parts of all the Colonies.

The Declaration of Independence, which, on July 4, 1776, enumerates with graphic truth, in detail, the numerous causes, the wrongs, abuses, and sufferings which led to that sublime Act, and intrinsi-

cally gives evidence of the various influences which contributed to its consummation. The names appended to it include those of every religious sect, those of the Catholic and those of the Protestant, of every denomination, including the name of Benjamin Franklin, one of the Friends, and Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, a leading Catholic.

Two leading members of the Sons of Liberty were John Lamb, of the city of New York, and William Bradford, of the city of Philadelphia. The former was born in this city on May 1, 1735, became a merchant, and at his majority married Catharine Jaudine, a lady of Huguenot descent.

His father, Anthony Lamb, was a native of England, an optician and maker of mathematical instruments, who emigrated to this country and here married; his mother was of Dutch parentage.

John Lamb was a man of good education, spoke Dutch and German fluently, and was well read. He was a close observer, a forcible, fearless, and ready writer, and an easy and powerful speaker. These powers he applied with effect, upon all occasions when the acts of the Crown conflicted with the rights of the people.

Hugh Gaines' Sheet, the paper printed by John Holt, and the Boston papers, The Gazette and Spy, then the chief mediums of public intelligence, were the recipients of many of his productions. Also, he maintained a correspondence with many persons in other parts of the Colonies—those whose sentiments and feelings were similar to his own. From the date of his early manhood until the close of the Revolution, all his powers and his thoughts appear to have been in incessant and energetic action; all his means and resources devoted freely to the good of his country.

In 1765, on the arrival of the news of the passage of the Stamp Act, in the proceedings at the meeting of the citizens held to oppose it, he was an eminent actor—was on the committee, to propose Articles of Confederacy to the other Colonies. He was prominently active in the formation of the non-importation league, and in its subsequent proceedings. He was a leader in the organization and re-formation of the heroic band, the Sons of Liberty, and in their actions. He was distinguished for his zealous and steady exertions in the establishment and in the struggles for the maintainance of the Liberty Pole; for his resistance to the Mutiny Act; the Bills of Credit acts; and, in 1773, to the Tea and Tariff law, and for the part he took in the denunciation of the tea commissioners; in the institution of the Mohawks to destroy, and their after destructions

of the tea importations, and in the various measures which were adopted to prevent such importations.

He was noted for his efficient action at the meeting of the 19th June, 1774, reproaching the Committee of 51 ; in the timely publication of hand-bills ; in accomplishing the resolves of Congress of that year ; at the meeting of April 20, 1775 ; in the closing of the Custom-house after the battles of Concord and Lexington ; in the organization of the Committee of Safety of 100, and in the measures which followed.

He was at the head of the party who took possession of and removed the ammunition in that year from Turtle Bay, and was especially active in the removal of the guns from the Battery.

In that year (1775) he was appointed a captain of artillery, and thereafter served, in various capacities, in the army until the close of the war, with distinguished talent and bravery ; was at the siege and capture of St. Johns, and those of Montreal ; was in the battle of Quebec, and performed his task with intrepid bravery and skill ; was there severely wounded ; was at the battle of Compo in Connecticut ; and was stationed at the water batteries, near Fort Clinton, when the latter was attacked by the British forces. He was commander of the artillery at West Point at the time of Arnold's treason.

His military career closed with the distinguished share he had in the battle and victory at Yorktown, on the day of which brilliant and important triumph he was commander of the artillery in the trenches.

At the close of the war he became a member, and was afterwards Vice-President, of the Cincinnati Society, in the State of New York. In 1789 he was appointed Collector of the Customs for the Port of New York ; and afterwards, by the frauds of an official underling, while there, was deprived of all his property. He died in the city of New York in 1795, and was buried in *Trinity Church Yard*.

William Bradford, who was a member also of the Sons of Liberty, located in Philadelphia, in that relationship, and, during the Revolutionary War, proved himself an ardent, devoted, talented, and beneficial aider of the great cause. His particular history is not sufficiently known to the writer of this article, to enable him to state a detail of it. In the life of General Lamb, page 25, will be found a letter of Wm. Bradford, as one of the Sons of Liberty, interesting in its substance and style, and manifesting the highest order of patriotism.

In the Revolutionary War he became a colonel in the service, and distinguished himself in the battle of Princeton.

He was the grandson of the celebrated William Bradford, who died in the city of New York, May 23, 1752, aged 92 years, and was buried in *Trinity Church Yard*. The latter was born in Leicestershire, in England, and emigrated to Pennsylvania before Philadelphia was laid out. He was renowned as the first champion of the freedom of the press in this country, and for the fearless constancy and ability with which he maintained its rights; the first who issued proposals for the printing of an English edition of the Bible, in the Middle Colonies; the first who printed the English prayer book therein; was in part the founder of the first paper mill in this country; was for upwards of fifty years printer to the Colonial Government; the map of the city, printed in 1728, is his work. He was noted for his exemplary piety, integrity, and patriotism. From him were inherited, by his grandson, that holy love of country and dauntless courage in its cause for which he was justly distinguished. The wife of William Bradford the grandfather, Elizabeth Bradford, was interred in the same grave where repose the remains of her husband, in *Trinity Church Yard*.

Belvedere Club House.

THE accompanying view of this celebrated house, was taken by J. Anderson, in the year 1794, from the opposite shore of Long Island, a distance of more than a mile. The following description, written at that time, may be of interest.

“ Belvedere House is situated on the banks of the East River, about a quarter of a mile beyond the pavement of the eastern extremity of the city of New York. It was built in the year 1792, by thirty-three gentlemen, of whom the Belvedere Club is composed. The beauty of the situation induced them to extend their plan beyond their first intentions, which were merely a couple of rooms for the use of their Club; and they erected the present building, as well to answer the purposes of a public hotel and tavern, as for their own accommodation.

“ The ball-room, which includes the whole of the second story of the east front, is an oblong octagon, of forty-five feet in length, twenty-four wide, and seventeen high, with a music gallery. This room is occupied by the Club on their Saturday meetings, during the summer season; the right to which on that day, is the only exclusive privilege which the proprietors retain. The windows of this room open to the floor, and communicate with a balcony twelve feet wide, which surrounds the eastern division of the house, and affords a most delightful promenade. The style in which this room is finished and decorated has been very generally admired.

“ The room on the ground floor is of the same shape and dimensions of the ball-room, and is generally used as a dinner and supper-room for large companies and public entertainments.

“ The west division of the house is composed of two dining parlors, a bar-room, two card-rooms, and a number of bed-chambers. The west front opens into a small court-yard, flanked on each side with

stables, a coach-house, and other offices. The little grounds into which the east front opens are formed into a bowling-green, gravel walks, and some shrubbery, in as handsome a manner as the very limited space would admit of.

“The want of extensive grounds is, however, much compensated for by the commanding view which the situation gives of the city and adjacent country. The prospect is very varied and extensive; a great part of the city, the bay of New York, Long Island, the East River as far as Hell-Gate, the island of New York to the northward of the city, and a little of the North River, with its bold and magnificent bank on the Jersey side, altogether compose a scenery which the vicinity of few great cities affords.

“On the demise of a proprietor the vacant interest in the estate can only be purchased by a person eligible by a majority of votes as a member of the Club.

Description of the New York House of Refuge,

1827.

THE Houses of Refuge for Juvenile Delinquents are situated about two miles north of the City Hall, at the junction of the Harlem and Bloomingdale roads, on the grounds recently occupied by the United States Arsenal. A more convenient or eligible situation could not probably have been selected. The lot of ground, 320 feet by 300, is inclosed by a stone wall 17 feet in height, and more than two feet thick. Within this inclosure, the Society has erected two stone buildings, each 150 feet in length by 38 in breadth, and two stories high. One of the houses is appropriated for Boys, the other for Girls, and the two being separated by a high wooden fence there is no communication between them.

The first story of the Boys' Refuge is divided into five rooms, 30 by 34 feet, for dining-room, common hall, Superintendent's office, and tailor's and shoemaker's shops. Three flights of stairs lead into the second story, which contains an hospital, 30 by 34 feet, and two rows of dormitories, each $3\frac{1}{2}$ by 7, and 6 feet high, for the accommodation of 132 boys with separate rooms, each of which is well ventilated by openings in the rooms and stone wall. Two aisles, 10 feet by 110, are used as school-rooms, and are furnished with desks and benches suitable for the *monitorial* plan of instruction. The garret is one large room, 150 feet by 34, and may be occupied when required as a work-room. The whole building is well lighted and ventilated.

The Girls' Refuge is finished in a superior manner to that for the Boys. The first story is divided into four rooms, 30 feet by 34, for a kitchen, dining-room, and work-rooms. The other part of this story is occupied by a neat parlor and chamber for the Matron, a committee-room, and a laundry. In the south end of the second story is a handsome Chapel, with a gallery, sufficiently large to accommodate 140 boys, 70 girls, and 300 visitors. At the north end is the hospital, 25 feet by 34, and the intermediate space is occupied by two rows of dormitories, furnishing 68 rooms for as many girls, which are also ventilated similar to the boys' rooms. The garret is 150 by 34, and is intended for the storing of goods and drying of clothes, and may be used as a work-room.

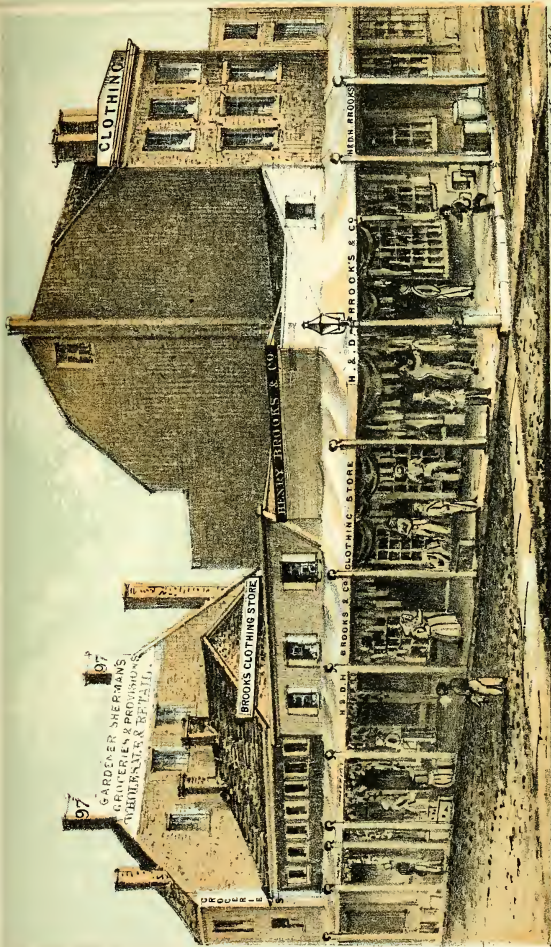
A two-story brick building, 40 feet by 30, situated on the southwest

corner, is occupied by the Superintendent and his family. Near to this is another brick building, 22 feet by 60, occupied by the Superintendent, and by the Assistant Keeper and his family. Adjoining this is a two-story brick work-house, 40 feet by 80, divided into four rooms, each 40 feet square, in which 40 boys are employed in the chair-making business.

On the southeast part of the yard is a one-story wooden building, 60 feet by 14, in which 30 boys are employed in the manufacture of brass nails and saddlery, and in filing, &c.; to this is attached another wooden building, 80 feet by 18, used as a bakery and store-house, under which are large vaults for provisions, stores, and fuel; a stable and carriage-house under one roof, and some small out-buildings, complete the establishment.

A part of the ground is laid out into kitchen and flower gardens, grass plats, and gravel walks. There are four wells on the premises, of excellent soft water. Adjoining the south wall, the Society occupies an angular piece of ground, containing about one acre, as a pasture.

The whole aspect of the establishment is cheerful and comfortable, and it has little or none of the appearance of a prison.

Brooks' Clothing Store, Catharine Street.

It is a peculiarity of a great commercial city like New York that Trade imparts an historical interest to many of its localities ; and that special branches of business luxuriate and send out strong and fresh shoots from particular spots. An interest of this kind attaches to the East side of the town, centering about Catharine Market, in which neighborhood the nautical element has, time out of mind, been peculiarly active ; in fact, the East might be called the Salt Side of New York. At the opening of the present century, all along that shore was busy with the shipyards of Eckford, Burgh and Ficketts ; vessels were constantly arriving and departing ; ship-stores were loading ; the sailors' rendezvous along Water and Cherry streets hummed like a hive, and Jack was plying about to collect in necessities for his chest, and "togs" for his own personal equipment. This last circumstance, and the fact that Catharine street was then the principal inlet and outlet for Brooklyn, and that Catharine Market was one of the best in town (and pre-eminent for fish), drew great crowds into that neighborhood.

About 1810, James Drake, David Logan, John Vansicklen, Samuel Thompson, and some others, commenced the clothing business in the vicinity of Catharine Market. David Brooks had a store, in 1816, on the corner of Market street. Henry S. Brooks, in 1817-'18—in the days when that fine specimen of an alderman, George Buckmeister, wore his cue in the Board—opened his store, as shown by the print, on the corner of Catharine street, which was, in 1845, replaced by the present building. David Brooks and Henry S. Brooks were sons of a physician, Dr. David Brooks, who was born in Stratford, Conn., and settled in New York to practice, on the northwest corner of Catharine and Cherry streets, and died in 1795, of yellow fever.

At one period, just previous to 1830, Cherry street, from James to Market, was the great centre of the clothing trade, and here some of the first wholesale houses were established. Conspicuous among them was Henry Robinson (with whom was at one time associated Joseph Hoxie), George Opdyke, our late Mayor, John J. Cisco, present Assistant Sub-treasurer of the United States in New York, Robert T.

Haws, late Comptroller of the city, were all at one time in the clothing business in Cherry street ; besides a number of others who were carried by the tide of improvements to other parts of the city and country. After the West began to develop itself, and the grand canal was opened, business gradually worked its way over to the west side of the town. With this movement, Brooks Brothers, the present firm, the sons and successors of Henry S. Brooks, and composed of Daniel H. Brooks, John Brooks, Elisha Brooks, and Edward S. Brooks, participated so far as to establish a new store (co-operating with the one which is still conducted by them on the spot established by their father) of large proportions on the corner of Broadway and Grand street. Than this there is no finer, and, we believe, no larger, if there is so large, establishment of the kind in the world. The Catharine street store was sacked by the mob, in 1863, for which no reason has, as far as we know, been assigned ; for the Messrs. Brooks are fair, upright gentlemen, of mild manners and such simplicity of deportment as to allay and conciliate rather than excite ill feeling in any with whom they come into intercourse. It calls back vividly old times to look upon the print which represents one of the great landmarks of Catharine street a generation ago. What a tide passed through that narrow street in those days, hurrying to the horseboats, hurrying to market, hurrying to the shops ! And rising upon the wave, emerging like the Mariners in Virgil, here and there, some head which has become famous in one or other of the thousand channels of enterprise which New York and its citizens cut deeper, open wider, and follow with more vigor than any other people in the world.

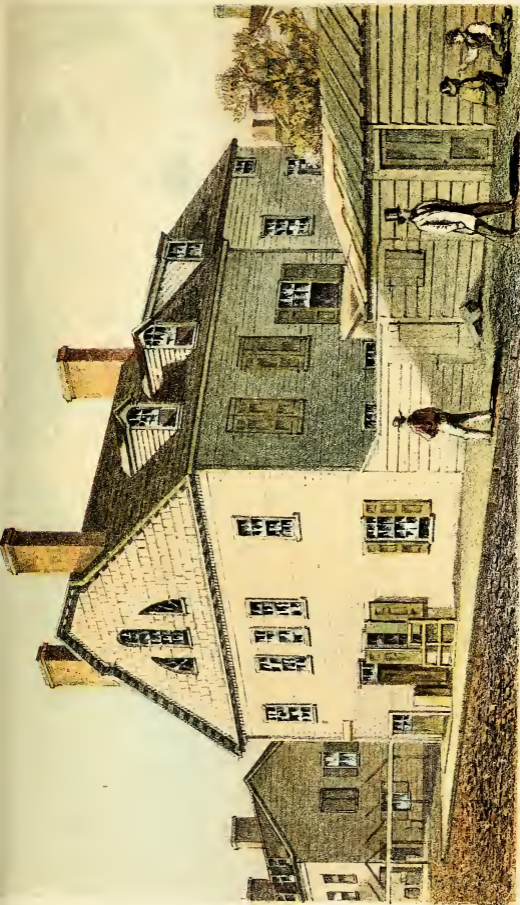

TO DAVID T. VALENTINE, ESQ., *Clerk of the Common Council of the City of New York* :

DEAR SIR : In accordance with your request, I have prepared the annexed statement of the recollections of myself and others, as to the location of the residence of THOMAS PAINE, author of "*Common Sense*," "*American Crisis*," "*Rights of Man*," "*Age of Reason*," &c., at the time and immediately preceding his death, the 8th June, 1809—and other reminiscences, &c., of that early day ; to which I have added certain other matters—deemed by you to be of interest to many of the readers of your Manual—which I obtained whilst laying out this city into streets, avenues, and public squares, under the Commissioners, and under contract with the City Government, and subsequent thereto.

The Honorable Gouverneur Morris, Simeon DeWitt, and John Rutherford, were appointed "*Commissioners of streets and Roads*" in the city of New York, by a statute of 3d April, 1807 ; and in the year 1808, they appointed me their "*Secretary and Surveyor*," and as their *Chief Engineer*. I also superintended and aided, in the surveys and maps used by them, in preparing the *Plan* of the streets, avenues, and public places, from North (now Houston) street to 228th street, near Kingsbridge ; three copies of which *Map* and *Plan* were made by me, and accompanied by their *Report* and *remarks*, were attested by them (as required by the Statute), before "a person authorized to take the acknowledgment of deeds and conveyances," to wit : they were signed and sealed by SIMEON DE WITT at Albany, on the 22d March, 1811, in presence of Archd. Campbell and "John Randel, Jr.," and attested and acknowledged by him before DE WITT CLINTON, Mayor of the city of New York, on the 4th May, 1811, and were signed and sealed by GOUVERNEUR MORRIS, at Morrisania, and by JOHN RUTHERFORD, at Belleville, in the presence of "John Randel, Jr.," and were attested and acknowledged by them on the 29th March, 1811, before BENJ. LEDYARD, Master in Chancery—all of which were also *filed* in conformity with the Statute ; to wit, "one in the office of the Secretary of State, to remain of Record ; one other was filed 30th March, 1811, in the office of the Clerk of the city and county of New York,

“to remain of Record; and the other of said maps to belong to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the city of New York.”

This latter map and report, were filed on the 1st April, 1811, as certified thereon by Jacob Morton, Clerk of the Common Council (they are now on file in the Office of the Street Commissioner), which was *two days prior* to the expiration of the Statute, which limited the time for this work to *four years* from the 3d April, 1807; and thereby permanently established the same, until altered by the Legislature.

It was declared by this Statute “to be unlawful to allow any compensation whatever for any building that might be built, placed, or erected, in part or in whole, on said streets, roads and public squares, *after* the said maps were made and recorded.”

The Commissioners were empowered “to lay out streets, roads, and public squares, of such width, and extent as to them should seem most conducive to the public good;” but were “prohibited from laying out any street of *less than 50 feet* in width.”

The Commissioners were “prohibited from purchasing any lands within the bounds to be laid out by them.”

The time within which the Commissioners were limited by the Statute to make their *Plan* of the streets, avenues, and public places on Manhattan or New York Island, and also to lay out the same upon the ground, being barely sufficient to enable them to comply with the letter, although not fully with the spirit, of the Statute, by only making the *Plan* therefor, besides reporting the width of all the streets and avenues, and the spaces between some of the avenues, and designating points on the ground through which the others should pass, *without locating* the whole of any one of the avenues permanently upon the ground; and also by establishing on the ground only one point in some part of 16 out of the 155 streets laid out on their *Plan*, which subsequently required and received 1,549 marble monumental stones and 98 iron bolts, at their several intersections with the avenues; and directing that the spaces between all the streets falling between each two of those points named and described by them therefor, should be of equal breadth, without specifying the breadth of any of those spaces, or locating any of those streets permanently upon the ground.

The Commissioners reported to the Corporation this insufficiency of time to complete their work, and recommended that, as their Secretary and Surveyor I had become acquainted with the ground, and the

Plan for laying out the same, I should be employed to complete the work according to it.

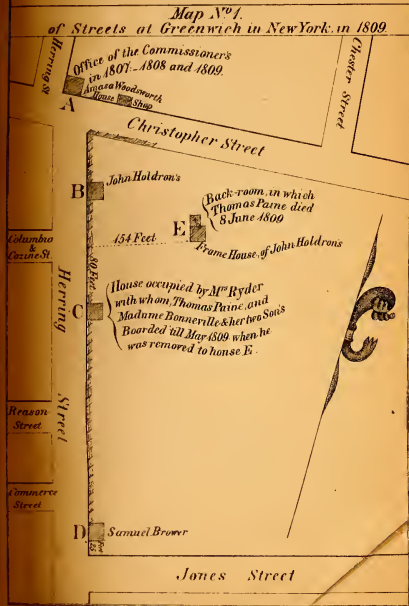

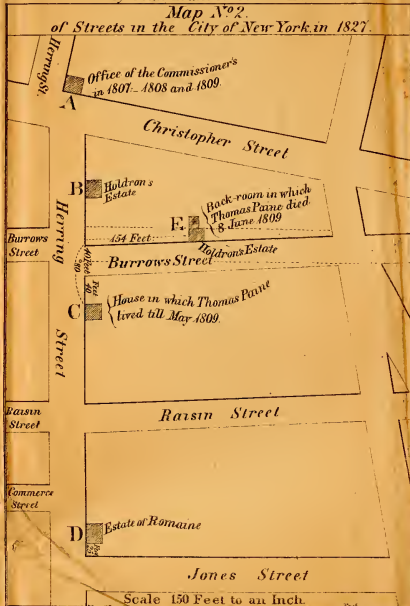

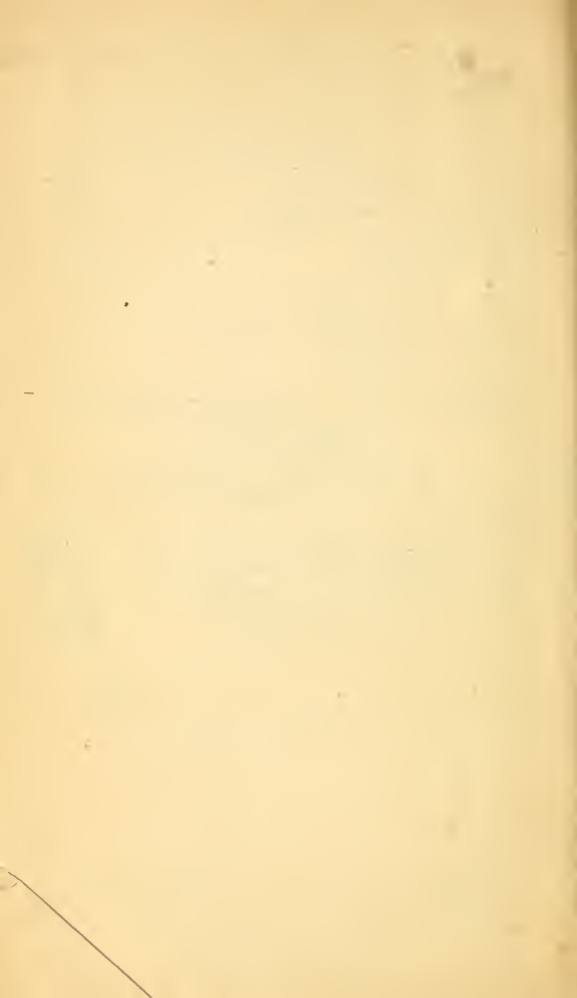

AT AND BEFORE HIS DEATH, 8TH JUNE, 1809.

In the years 1807 and 1808, and until some time after the death of THOMAS PAINE, 8th June, 1809, the office of "*the Commissioners of Streets and Roads in the city of New York,*" was in a room of a house occupied by AMASA WOODSWORTH and family, at the northeast corner of Herring (now Bleecker) and Christopher streets, and about 100 yards north of the residence of a Mrs. Ryder, on Herring street (now No. 293 Bleecker street), where THOMAS PAINE, and a French lady named Madame BONNEVILLE and her two sons, resided to within a few weeks of his death. And some time *after* his death our office was removed to a room in Smith's Tavern, near "*Kissing Bridge,*" on the "*Eastern Post Road,*" now on Third avenue at Seventy-seventh street.

At the time our office was at Christopher street, it was in the eastern part of the then *village of Greenwich*, about 500 yards east of the old State Prison (now removed), and about the same distance south of temporary hospitals (like the present Park Barracks) which had been erected during the prevalence of the yellow fever in the city, and had not then been removed.

Our office at Christopher street was, at that time, more than a mile north of the settled part of the city, which then terminated south of Lispenard's Salt Meadow (now Canal street). And during the time it remained there, I boarded in the city, and in going to the office I almost daily passed the house on Herring street (now No. 293 Bleecker street) where THOMAS PAINE resided, and *frequently*, in fair weather, saw him sitting at the south window of the first story room of that house—the sash was raised, a small table or stand was placed before him, with an open book placed upon it, which he appeared to be reading. He had his spectacles on, his left elbow rested upon the table or stand, and his chin rested between the thumb and fingers of his hand; his right hand lay upon his book, and a decanter, containing liquor of the color of rum or brandy, was standing next to his book and beyond it.

I never saw Thomas Paine at any other place or in any other position.

Mrs. MARIA THOMPSON, wife of William A. Thompson, Esq., now residing at No. 188 Dean street, in the city of Brooklyn, has furnished me with a statement in relation to THOMAS PAINE, of which the following is a copy :

“ THOMAS PAINE lived in Bleecker street, two or three doors from Grove street ; afterwards in a house of mine in Grove street, the site of which is now occupied by the house No. 59, with a French lady named Madaune Bonneville, and her two sons, where he died ; which house was then a frame building.

“ Grove street was then Cozine, or Columbia street. He was buried on a farm of his at New Rochelle. The family with whom he lived was called Ryder, in Herring street.”

G. Vale (whom I knew in 1847) states, in pages 152, 153, 154, 155, 156 and 157 of his life of THOMAS PAINE, published in 1841 :

“ That, when Thomas Paine’s sickness increased on him, and boarding house attention was scarcely sufficient, Madame Bonneville took a small house for him, May, 1809, in Columbia street, and here she attended on him till his death”—(page 152).

“ That among the most prominent and zealous visitors of Mr. Paine, in his last days, were the Rev. Mr. Milledollar, a Presbyterian clergyman, and the Rev. Mr. Cunningham. About a fortnight before Mr. Paine’s death, this latter gentleman told Paine that they visited him as friends and neighbors”—(page 153).

“ That Mr. Milledollar attempted to address him (Paine), but was interrupted by Mr. Paine ; and when they were gone, he said to Mrs. Hedden, his housekeeper, ‘ Don’t let’em come here again, they trouble me.’ In spite of Mr. Paine’s declaration these gentlemen again attempted to obtrude themselves upon him, but they were refused admittance, as directed, by Mrs. Hedden, who piously added : ‘ If God does not change his mind, she was sure no human power could’—(page 154). On the 8th June, 1809, about 9 o’clock in the morning, he died”—(page 155).

Mr. Vale states that he visited Amasa Woodsworth, at East Cambridge, Boston, and on his return he published in the “ *Beacon* ” of 6th June, 1839—

“ That as an act of kindness, Mr. Woodsworth visited Mr. Paine every day for six weeks before his death ; he frequently set up with him, and did so on the last two nights of his life”—(page 156).

“ The day after the death of Mr. Paine, he was taken from his house in Greenwich street (it should have been written ‘ Green-

“ wick *village*’) to New Rochelle, attended by a few friends, and
 “ was there buried on his farm, and a plain stone was erected to his
 “ memory, with the following inscription :

“ THOMAS PAINE,

“ AUTHOR OF ‘ COMMON SENSE,’

“ DIED JUNE 8, 1809, AGED SEVENTY-TWO YEARS AND FIVE MONTHS’”

—(page 157).

I did not know *the age* of Amasa Woodsworth ; but from my recollections of him, think he must have been at least 45 years of age, in the year 1809, when we occupied a part of his house in Christopher street for our office (as before mentioned) ; and if so, he must have been at least 75 years of age in 1839, when he was visited by Mr. Vale.

Mr. Woodsworth was a very worthy mechanic ; his shop, which had the appearance of a carpenter’s shop, was on Christopher street, a few yards east of our office, where I frequently conversed with him about THOMAS PAINE and his “ *Age of Reason*,” he advocating and I opposing it.

One day in June, 1809, after I came from the city to our office, I stepped into Mr. Woodsworth’s shop, when he informed me that THOMAS PAINE *had just died*, and that he had been with him the previous night ; and I think he said *he had just come* from there.

I inquired of Mr. Woodsworth, whether Thomas Paine continued in his belief of the doctrines advocated in his “ *Age of Reason* ;” he replied, that Thomas Paine did not recant, and that he (Paine) declined speaking upon that subject. I informed him of the rumor that Thomas Paine’s friends and disciples, who had charge of him during his last sickness, had refused admittance to some clergymen and others who desired to see and converse with him ; he replied, that some meddlesome persons, taking advantage of his supposed debility of mind, as well as of body, called to see him, and they were very properly refused admittance. I also mentioned the report that Thomas Paine’s friends had kept him partially under the influence of intoxicating liquor, to prevent him from recanting, or making any confession of his error, or regret, for having published his “ *Age of Reason*.” He said there was no truth in such report, and that Thomas Paine had declined saying anything upon that subject.

I have no recollection of Thomas Paine’s having been removed before his death from the house on Herring (now No. 293 Blecker) street, where I had so frequently seen him ; but recently, on being

informed that it was the general public opinion that he died in a house on *Grove street*, to which he had been removed from the house where he had lived on Herring street, a few weeks before his death—and *knowing, myself*, that neither *Grove street* nor *any other street*, between Christopher street and Jones street, *had been opened*, from Herring street *eastward*, to the reputed *place* of Thomas Paine's removal, as early as his death, in June, 1809, as I informed you—I thereupon, in accordance with your request, continued the search I had commenced, for some person who could at this late day, *and from their own personal knowledge of the facts in the case*, explain this *seeming discrepancy* as to the *place* where Thomas Paine *died*; and after many fruitless efforts made for that purpose, I at length succeeded, by finding Mrs. Maria Thompson, formerly *Miss Maria Holdron*, now the wife of William A. Thompson, Esq., and the *niece* of the Mrs. Palmer, widow of Elihu Palmer, to whom Thomas Paine, by his *Will*, dated 18th January, 1809, bequeathed \$100, who gave me the information herein mentioned; and also that the homestead of her father, John Holdron, fronted on the south side of Christopher street, and was the third house and lot west of the present Fourth street: and that his *garden* extended southerly to the "*vacant lot*" hereinafter mentioned; and also to the frame house *in which Thomas Paine died*, which was at the foot of their garden and on that lot, both of which belonged to her father, *John Holdron*, together with a frame dwelling-house on Herring street, now No. 305 Bleeker street—all of which were inherited by his only child, Mrs. Maria Thompson.

William A. Thompson, Esq., informed me that he had been the *law partner* of Col. Aaron Burr, in Pine street, for about two years, after Col. Burr returned from England. He also informed me that his father-in-law, John Holdron, had been for the forty-five years next *preceding* the use of *horse and steam power* (and whilst *sail and row-boats* were used on the *ferry*, from Cortlandt street in New York to Jersey City), the lessee of that ferry, which was then called "*Powles Hook Ferry*."

In the years 1808 and 1809, there were *only three dwelling-houses* on the *east* side of Herring street, and *south* of our office, at the northeast corner of Herring and Christopher streets, and they were connected by *fences* which extended *north* to Christopher street, and *south* to near Jones street.

These three dwelling-houses were two-story frame buildings, and *now* (1864) *remain standing*; but the *building* in which we had *our office*,

at the northeast corner of Christopher and Herring streets, *was removed* by the straightening and widening of Herring (now Bleecker) street in 1827. These three buildings are marked *B, C, D*, and the site of our office is marked *A*, on the annexed maps, No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3, copied from maps in the Street Commissioner's office.

The *first* and most *northerly* of those three houses, in 1809 called the "*Holdron house*," is marked *B*, and is *now* No. 305 Bleecker street, and belongs to Mrs. Maria Thompson, before mentioned. It is the 3d house, and 44 7-10 feet *north* of Grove street; but previous to the straightening and widening of Grove street, east of Bleecker street, in 1836, it was the 4th house, and 72 feet north of that street.

The *second* and *middle* building of those three on Herring street, in 1809, is marked *C*, and is *now* the fourth house and 57 1-10 feet *south* of Grove street; but previous to the straightening and widening of Grove street, east of Bleecker street, in 1836, it was the *third house* and 40 feet south of Grove street (this *fact* agrees with Mrs. Thompson's *recollection*, that it was the "*second or third house from Grove street*"). In the year 1809 this house was occupied by a Mr. Ryder, with whom Thomas Payne and a French lady, Madame Bonnevillle, and her two sons, resided till within a few weeks of his death, the 8th of June of that year; it is now No. 293 Bleecker street, and belongs to Isaac C. Delaplaine, Esq., of No. 278 Fifth avenue, who has had its lower rooms altered into a meat and vegetable market.

The *third* and most *southerly* of those three dwelling-houses on Herring street, in 1809, called the "*Brower House*," and marked *D*, is now No. 269 Bleecker street, and is the second house and 25 feet north of Jones street. It belongs to the Romaine family.

The *fences* which in 1809 connected those three dwelling-houses, and extended northerly to Christopher street, and southerly to about Jones street, *have been removed*, and now give place to *brick and frame buildings*, and the "*vacant lot*" back of those fences is now occupied in part by "*Grove street*;" a part of that "*vacant lot*" is now also occupied by "*Barrow street*," but in 1827 it was called "*Raisin street*," and in 1809, before it was opened east of Herring street, the part of it lying west of that street was, on a map in the Street Commissioner's office, named "*Reason street*," and also by buildings erected on both sides of both Grove and Barrow streets.

At the time of Thomas Paine's death, there was *not any street opened* out of Herring street easterly to the house in which he died, marked *E* on the annexed maps, No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3. But a short time

after his death (I have been informed) a street was opened from Herring street eastward, passing along the front of that house, and called *Columbia street*, also called *Cozine street*, and in 1827 called *Burrows street*, and now called *Grove street*.

In the year 1836 *Grove street* was widened and straightened—in doing which about $19\frac{1}{4}$ feet were taken off the front of the lot upon which the house in which Thomas Paine died then stood; that house, William A. Thompson informed me, was a frame building, about 20 feet square, and two stories in height, with *back building* about 20 by 14 feet square, built in range of its West side, in which *back building* Thomas Paine died.

Mrs. Maria Thompson had that frame house taken down or removed, and a block of *five brick buildings*, each three stories in height and 20 feet in width, erected on the North side of Grove street, the most Easterly house in which block is No. 59, and it covers the site of the *back building* in which Thomas Paine died, and is marked *E* on the annexed maps No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3; it is about 153 feet east of Bleeker, then Herring street; and the house now No. 293 Bleeker street, in which he lived till May, 1809, is now 107 feet south of the north side of *Grove street*, as altered, but was only 80 feet south of the north side of *Columbia*, afterwards *Burrows, street*, before the street alteration was made, which distances together ($154\frac{1}{4} + 80$) give 234 feet for the whole distance from the house No. 293 Bleeker street, where Thomas Paine lived, to the house No. 59 Grove street, which covers the site of the back building where he died, as measured along Herring and Columbia streets, on maps in the Street Commissioner's office, and shows that the whole distance that he was removed was only 78 yards.

City of New York, north of Canal street, in 1808 to 1821.

In the years 1808, 1809, and 1810, whilst acting as Secretary and Surveyor to the "Commissioners of Streets and Roads in the city of New York," and also as their Chief Engineer, superintending and aiding in the surveys and maps of the assistants employed by them, I went almost daily from the city to our office, *then* in the country, at the northeast corner of Christopher and Herring streets, previous to performing field work with them in the suburbs of the city, and on distant parts of the Island; at which times, and subsequently, I obtained the following information.

In going from the city to our office in 1808 and 1809, I generally crossed a *ditch* cut through Lisenard's salt meadow (*now a culvert under Canal street*) on a plank laid across it for a *crossing-place*, about midway between a *stone bridge* on Broadway, with a narrow embankment at each end, connecting it with the upland, and an excavation then being made at, and said to be for, the foundation of the present St. John's Church, on Varick street.

From this *crossing-place* I followed a well-beaten path, leading from the city to the *then* village of Greenwich, passing over open and partly fenced lots and fields, *not at that time under cultivation*, and remote from any dwelling-house, now remembered by me, *except Col. Aaron Burr's* former country seat, on elevated ground, called "*Richmond Hill*," which was from about 100 to 150 yards *west* of this path, and was then occupied as a place of refreshment for gentlemen taking a drive from the city. Its site is now in Charlton street, between Varick and Macdougall streets. I continued along this main path to a branch path diverging from it to the east, south of *Manetta water*, (*now Minet a street*), which branch path I followed to *Herring street*, passing on my way there, from about 200 to 250 yards *west*, the country residence of *Col. Richard Varick*, on elevated ground *east* of *Manetta water*, called "*Tusculum*," the site of which is now "*Varick Place*," on Sullivan street, between Bleecker and Houston streets. I entered the south end of *Herring street*, a short distance beyond *Manetta water*, and continued along the easterly side of that street to our office, at the northeast corner of it and *Christopher street*.

I passed only *three* dwelling-houses on the easterly side of this street, and they were two story frame buildings, connected by fences, extending northerly to Christopher street, and southerly to about Jones street. There was no street opened eastward out of this part of Herring street, nor did I observe any opening in that fence for any such street. The *middle building* of those three on Herring street, *all of which are yet standing*, is the one hereinbefore described by me as the house occupied by a Mr. Ryder, with whom Thomas Paine and Madame Bonneville and her two sons resided to within a few weeks of his death, and now No. 293 Bleeker street.

Col. Richard Varick, who was *Mayor* of the city of New York for the *twelve years* from 1789 to 1801, always became *bail* for my appearance at Court, when, in the absence of the Commissioners, I was arrested by the Sheriff, on numerous suits instituted against me as agent of the Commissioners, for trespass and damage committed by my workmen, in passing over grounds, cutting off branches of trees, &c., to make surveys under instructions from the Commissioners. The persons who instituted those suits were a few of the numerous opponents of the field of operations of the Commissioners, which included their property in the *then new Plan for the city*, many of whose descendants have been made rich thereby.

This Plan of the Commissioners, thus objected to *before its completion*, is now the *pride and boast of the city*; and the facilities afforded by it for *buying, selling, and improving* real estate, on streets, avenues, and public squares, already laid out and established on the ground by monumental stones and bolts, *at the cost of the city*; and of greater width and extent, safety from conflagration, beautiful uniformity and convenience, than could otherwise have been obtained; having *streets* from 60 to 100 feet in width, and from $1\frac{1}{2}$ to $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles in length, and *avenues* 100 feet in width, and from $6\frac{1}{2}$ to $11\frac{1}{2}$ miles in length, and extending *in straight lines* from river to river, and to the end of the Island at Kingsbridge; with 10 public squares, exclusive of three triangles, containing in the aggregate 470 acres (and 576 acres, including their surrounding streets), and admitting the free circulation of air through them; thereby *avoiding* the frequent error of laying out *short, narrow, and crooked streets*, with *alleys and courts*, endangering extensive conflagrations, confined air, unclean streets, &c., must have greatly enhanced the value of real estate on New York Island, thus laid out on the Commissioners' Plan.

In consequence of those suits, the Commissioners reported to the Corporation the impracticability of their completing the duties of

their appointment unless protected from such vexatious interruptions; whereupon the Corporation obtained from the Legislature an Act, passed 24th March, 1809, authorizing the Commissioners, and all persons under them, to enter upon grounds to be surveyed, and to "cut down trees, and do other damage;" and allowing a specified time thereafter within which to compensate the owners for such damage.

The ditch over which I passed at the "*crossing-place*," in going from the city to our office near *Greenwich village*, was cut through *Lispenard's salt meadow*, from *Hudson's River*, northeastward to and under the *Stone Bridge* on *Broadway*, and continued to the "*Collect*" or "*Fresh Water Pond*," East of *Broadway*; from which water, for the use of the city, was taken to "*the Tea Water Pump*," on *Duane street*, near the present missionary church at "*the Five Points*."

This pump furnished water to the city, in addition to a scanty supply of *tea and drinking water* obtained from "*Knapp's Spring*," near the west end of *Greenwich lane*, and from other springs, from which it was brought to the city by carts, in hogsheads, and sold by the pailful.

The Collect was at that time filled up by a *collection* of spare earth and rubbish, &c., carted from the city, which being of greater specific gravity than the *debris*, or mud at the bottom of "*the Pond*," or "*Collect*," caused it to rise, and mix with the rubbish and stand out; forming a very offensive and irregular mound of several acres; which appeared to me, as seen from *Broadway*, between which and it *there were no buildings*, to be from 12 to 15 feet in height above the level of the tide, and of the water remaining in the *Pond*. It is *now* occupied by *Centre street*, southerly to near "*The Tombs*," or "*Halls of Justice*."

On *Broadway*, north of *Lispenard's salt meadow* (now *Canal street*), to "*Sailors' Snug Harbor*," a handsome brick building, called by that name, erected on elevated ground near the bend in *Broadway* at the present 10th street, and formerly the residence of *Captain Randall*, who bequeathed it to the *Trustees* of "*Sailors' Snug Harbor*," together with his adjoining grounds, opposite to and also south of *Grace Church* to *Art street* and *Greenwich lane*; and from the *Bowery road*, westward, to *Manetta water*, there were only a few scattered buildings, except country residences which were built back from *Broadway*, with court-yards and lawns of trees and shrubs in front of them.

Between *Sailors' Snug Harbor* (now 10th street) and *Love lane* (now 21st street) were a narrow causeway and perhaps from 6 to 8

frame dwelling-houses. This part of the present Broadway was at that time the "*Bloomingdale Road*."

By the "*Commissioners' Plan*," Broadway was to have been *straightened* at this place, by continuing it from the bend at the present 10th street, northward between 3d and 4th avenues to 23d street, where it was lost in "*The Parade*" (a public square laid out by them for military parades, containing 238 7-10 acres, which was reduced by a statute of 15th April, 1814, to 89 1-10 acres, and by a later statute it was reduced to less than seven acres, and is now called "*Madison square*."

This part of the Commissioners' Plan for *straightening* Broadway was repealed by a subsequent statute, and the bend in it remained as before; otherwise, Broadway would have intersected 23d street near the present "*Free Academy*" on Lexington avenue.

The Bowery was at that time (1809) the principal road leading out of the city to *Harlem* and *Manhattanville*, and thence to Boston and Albany, and was settled, in part, to near North (now Houston) street. At this street the Commissioners' Plan for the streets and avenues commenced; north of it we encountered in our surveys extensive ancient and neglected hawthorn hedge-fences, then grown to saplings, extending along the east side of the Bowery, in front of the Stuyvesant estate, that were impassible without the aid of an axe; a short distance beyond which the Bowery road and the (then) Bloomingdale road formed a junction at the Commissioners' 16th street (now a point in *Union Square*, about 110 yards southwest of *The Everett House*), and formed an acute angle at that place, which, when further intersected by the streets crossing it, left so small an amount of ground for building purposes, that the Commissioners instructed me to lay out the ground, at the *union* of those streets and roads, for a *public square*, which, from that circumstance, they named *Union Place*.

From this angle at 16th street, the *Bloomingdale Road* (more recently called *Broadway*) continued northward, through Manhattanville, to near the gate of the country residence of Dr. Samuel Bradhurst (now near 147th street at 9th avenue), where it formed a junction with the *Kingsbridge Road*, passing in its route from 16th street along the westerly side of the *United States Magazine*, opposite 25th street and 5th avenue, across "*The Parade*," which the Commissioners set apart "for *military exercise*, and also to assemble, in case of *need, the force* destined to defend the city." It contained, by their Plan, 238 7-10 acres.

This road thence crossed 57th street, 120 yards east of *Blooming-*

dale Square, which, by the Commissioners' Plan, extended from 53d to 57th street, and from 8th to 9th avenue, and contained 18 1-10 acres; it thence passed through *Harsenville*, from 68th to 72d street, at 10th avenue, and crossed 79th street 167 yards west of 10th avenue, and 500 yards west of *Manhattan Square*, which, by the Commissioners' Plan, extended from 77th to 81st street, and from 8th to 9th avenue, and contained 19 1-10 acres; thence crossed 96th street; west of 10th avenue, and east of *Striker's Bay*, on Hudson River; thence crossed 117th street, 113 yards west of 11th avenue, and 200 yards west of the *New York Hospital* and *Bloomingdale Asylum* for the Insane, and thence passed through the *Barrier Gate*, built across this road at the *Manhattanville Pass* during the war of 1812, at 123d street, 33 yards west of 11th avenue; the road then passed through *Manhattanville*, from 126th street at 11th avenue to 132d street, 100 yards east of 11th avenue (the end of the *Manhattanville wharf* on Hudson's River, opposite this road, between 132d and 133d streets, and west of it, and west of 12th avenue, is distant from *Fort Lee Ferry wharf* 2,840 yards, and 1,472 yards from *Woolsey's wharf*, on the west shore of Hudson's River, as measured by "*Triangulation*" in 1821); thence passed 100 yards north of the country residence of the widow of *Col. Alexander Hamilton*, at 143d street, 80 yards east of 10th avenue; and thence to the junction of this road with the *Kingsbridge Road*, 10 yards east of 9th avenue, between 146th and 147th streets.

"*The Eastern Post Road*" diverged northeasterly from the *Bloomingdale Road*, at 23d street and 5th avenue, and run by a circuitous route through the *village of Harlem*, from 118th to 125th street, west of 3d avenue to "the *Harlem Bridge*," built over *Harlem River*, near 130th street and 3d avenue.

This road, in its route from the *Bloomingdale road* at 23d street and 5th avenue, passed south of "*the United States Magazine*" at 25th street, and "*The Old Pottersfield*," at 26th street (both of which were included in "*The Parade*," and their sites are now covered by *Madison square*). It crossed the 4th avenue at the *Middle road*, near 29th street, and passed through the *village of Kip's Bay*, from 32d to 38th street, west of 3d avenue; it thence passed the "*Cross Road*" to "*Burr's Corner*" (on the *Middle road*, opposite the present *Croton Reservoir*) at 41st street, and the road to *Turtle Bay* on the *East River*, between 47th and 48th streets; thence crossed the 2d avenue at 52d street, and recrossing it between 62d and 63d streets, entered the present 3d avenue at the southeast corner of *Hamilton Square*, which,

by the Commissioners' Plan, extended from 66th to 68th street, and from 3d to 5th avenue, and contained 20 6-10 acres. This road continued thence along the present 3d avenue, passing Harsen's Crossroad at 71st street, and east of Smith's Tavern, opposite "*Kissing Bridge*," at 77th street, where the Commissioners held their office in 1809 and 1810. It crossed the division line between New York and Harlem Commons between 81st and 82d streets, and continued along 3d avenue to near 83d street. At this place several branch roads diverged from it eastwardly to the following *places* on the East River near Hell Gate, to wit: *Commodore Chauncey's*, on the south side of 85th street; *Hell Gate Ferry*, at the foot of 86th street, opposite the north end of Blackwell's Island; *John Jacob Astor's*, on the south side of 88th street; *Oliver Gracie's*, on the north side of 88th street; — *Prime*, on the north side of 89th street, and *William Rhineland*, on the north side of 91st street. The three last named country seats were nearly opposite the following *rocks* at the entrance of Hell Gate, to wit: *Hancock's Rock*, 3 *Gridiron Rocks*, 4 *Middle Reef Rocks*, 2 *Flood Rocks*, and *Mill Rock*. *The Pot Rock*, in the middle of Hell Gate, was about 700 yards east of Mill Rock, and south of *The Pot* was *Way's Reef Rock*, and north of it was *The Frying Pan*, and *Holmes' Rocks*, and 3 *Hogsback Rocks*. During the war of 1812, a *block house* was built on *Mill Rock*, and opposite to it, at *Hallet's Point*, on Long Island shore, *Fort Stevens* was built; and on the high ground southeast of it a *tower* was erected, called Castle Bogardus. These fortifications were built to command *Hell Gate Pass*.

From the 3d avenue, near 83d street, this Eastern Post road diverged westerly, and crossed and recrossed the division line between New York and Harlem commons, and crossed 4th avenue near 85th street; thence passed over the southwestern corner of *Observatory Place*, and intersected the *Middle Road* at 90th street. This *Observatory Place*, or square for *Reservoir*, was laid out, on the Commissioners' Plan, from 89th to 94th street, and from 5th to 6th avenue, and contained 26 3-10 acres. From 90th street, this Eastern Post road continued along the Middle road to 92d street, and there diverged westerly, and passed between 5th and 6th avenues (where it was also called "the Kingsbridge road"), through the Barrier gate, built across it during the war of 1812, at *McGowan's Pass*, at 107th street, about 116 yards east of 6th avenue; thence crossing a small bridge over the head of Benson's tide mill pond, near 109th street and 5th avenue, passed through the village of Harlem, at 116th to 125th street, near and west of Third avenue, to Harlem Bridge.

During the war of 1812, the Barrier gate at McGowan's pass was connected with the Barrier gate at Manhattanville pass by the following military defenses, which were extended across the Island, from Harlem River to Hudson River, to wit:

Fortifications on Benson's point, near 3d avenue and 106th street; Fort Clinton, between 106th and 107th streets, and about 170 yards east of 6th avenue; Fort Fish, between 105th and 106th streets, and about ten yards east of 6th avenue; a stone tower, about 14 yards south of 109th street and 7 yards west of 7th avenue; a stone tower, between 113th and 114th streets, and between 9th and 10th avenues; a stone tower, on the south side of 121st street, and about 110 yards east of 10th avenue; a stone tower, on the south side of 123d street, and about 54 yards east of 10th avenue; Fort Haight, at Manhattanville pass, about 20 yards north of 124th street, and 120 yards east of 11th avenue.

"*The Middle Road*" diverged northward from "*the Eastern Post Road*," near 29th street and 4th avenue, and thence ascended "*Ink-lanbergh Hill*" (now Murray's Hill), and connected with Manhattan (now 5th) avenue, at the present Croton Reservoir on 42d street, and continued along that avenue to its intersection with "*the Eastern Post Road*" at 90th street; and thence continued on a straight line, along a (then) new road, called the "*The Middle*" or "*Harlem Bridge Road*," to Harlem Bridge, at 130th street and 3d avenue.

This road passed in its route from the Croton Reservoir at 42d street the following places, viz.: along the east side of Dr. Hosack's "Elgin (Botanic) Garden," from 47th to 51st street; about 210 yards east of the Powder House, between 64th and 65 streets; along the west end of *Hamilton Square*, as laid out on the Commissioners' Plan, from 5th to 3d avenue and from 66th to 68th street; crossed "the Harsen Cross Road" at 71st street; crossed the division line between New York and Harlem commons at 87th street; reached the southwest corner of Observatory place at 89th street, and crossed that square to 94th street; thence crossed "Harlem Marsh" square, which was laid out, on the Commissioners' Plan, from 106th to 109th street, and from 5th avenue eastward to Harlem River at "Benson's point," and contained 68 6-10 acres; and thence passed through Harlem village from 116th to 125th street.

"*The Kingsbridge Road*" commenced at the crossing of the Middle road by the Eastern Post road, at 90th to 92d street; and continued along the Eastern Post road through the Barrier gate, at McGowan's pass, to "Harlem lane," near 108th street, where it diverged east-

wardly to Harlem; it thence continued along that lane over Harlem flat to Myer's corner, about 67 yards west of 8th avenue at 131st street—passing in its route along “Harlem lane,” the residence of Valentine Nutter, in 6th avenue, between 109th and 110th streets; and thence passed 73 yards west of the southwest corner of “Harlem square,” which was laid out on the Commissioners' Plan from 117th to 121st street, and from 6th to 7th avenue, and contained 18 1-10 acres; crossed the road leading from Manhattanville to Harlem at 125th street, between 8th and 9th avenues, and east of the Manhattanville Academy at 126th street and 10th avenue. From Myer's corner the Kingsbridge road continued northward, between 8th and 9th avenues, to its intersection with the Bloomingdale road at 9th avenue, between 146th and 147th streets; passing in its route from Myer's corner west of the country residence of Cadwallader D. Colden—who was Mayor of the city in the years 1818, 1819, and 1820—standing in 7th avenue, between 139th and 140th streets; passing Bussing's Point road 133 yards west of 8th avenue, between 143d and 144th streets; thence ascended Bradhurst hill west of a Revolutionary redoubt at 145th street, and connected with the Bloomingdale road 10 yards east of 9th avenue, between 146th and 147th streets; this Kingsbridge road thence passed the 10-mile stone, the southern side of which is described in the Commissioners' report as “being touched at the surface of the ground by the southern side of 153d street;” thence passed 120 yards west of the residence of Madame Jumel, the widow of Stephen Jumel, and afterwards the widow of Col. Aaron Burr, standing 150 yards east of 10th avenue, between 160th and 161st streets. At 161st street the road passed east of and opposite to Mount Washington spring, at 11th avenue, and redoubts, &c., from 11th to 12th avenue; at 175th to 176th street the road passed 67 yards east of 12th avenue, and 900 yards east of a fort and redoubts on a point of rocks on Hudson's River, about 30 yards south of 176th street, and 200 yards west of 14th avenue. From this point to the wharf at Fort Lee ferry was 1,950 yards, and to the opposite shore of Hudson River, at the foot of the Pallisade, was 1,267 yards, as measured by triangulation in 1821. At 183d street the road was 43 yards east of 12th avenue, and 343 yards east of *Fort Washington*, on 13th avenue. At 192d street the road was 33 yards west of 12th avenue, and 533 yards west of *Fort George*. At 196th street the road was 133 yards east of 13th avenue, and 233 yards east of *Fort Tryon*. At 206th street the road crossed the west side of 12th avenue, and was 730 yards east of

Tubby Hook Point, on Hudson's River, from which point the oblique distance across that river to Norman's cottage, on the New Jersey shore, was 1,570 yards, as measured by triangulation in 1821. Between 208th and 209th streets this road was opposite the residence of *Jacobus Dyckman*, and 150 yards west of 11th avenue. From 213th to 217th street the road passed along the foot of the eastern slope of marble quarries. At 216th street the road was 33 yards west of 10th avenue, and 1,070 yards east of *Cock Hill Fort*, on high ground, between Spuyten Duyvel (Spiteing Devil) creek and Hudson's River. At 222d street the road crossed the *Canal* cut across New York Island from Harlem River to Spuyten Duyvel creek. At 226th street the road was 150 yards east of *Fort Prince Charles*, on 10th avenue, at the southerly side of that street. At 228th street and 10th avenue, where the most northerly monument on New York Island was placed by me, Kingsbridge road was about 34 yards east of that avenue; and McComb's mill, built over Harlem River, along the west side of Kingsbridge, was about 17 yards north of that most northerly monument.

"*The Harlem Road*" passed from the village of Harlem over the Harlem Flat, north of "Snake Hill," on 5th avenue, from 121st to 123d street (now Mount Morris square), and formed a junction with the Kingsbridge road at Myer's corner.

The Bussing's Point road diverged eastwardly from the Kingsbridge road, between 143d and 144th streets, and intersected the 8th avenue at 145th street, and continued along it to near 149th street, and thence diverged northeastward, on a straight line, to McComb's Bridge and Dam across Harlem River, at 155th street, 20 yards west of 7th avenue.

All the redoubts and forts from Bussing's Point road to Kingsbridge were built during the Revolutionary War, and consisted of embankments of earth, some of which remained standing, from 6 to 8 feet in height, and the outlines of the ruins of others remained pretty well defined upon the ground, when I surveyed them in the years 1819, 1820.

I obtained the names of those fortifications from *Jacobus Dyckman*, on the Kingsbridge road, and other old gentlemen in that neighborhood—some of whom informed me that they lived there when those fortifications were being built, during the Revolutionary War.

The streets and avenues herein mentioned, although reported on the Plan filed by the Commissioners in 1811, for streets as far north as 155th street, and for 10th avenue thence to Harlem River near

Kingsbridge, and all the streets and avenues north of 155th street were extended across the Island, and northward to Harlem River, on maps subsequently made by me and filed in the Street Commissioners' office. Yet many of the streets and avenues on New York Island were not defined upon the ground by monumental stones and iron bolts till as late as about the year 1818, and none of them were placed by me north of 155th street, except on 10th avenue to 228th street, near Kingsbridge; and the distances herein *stated in yards* were obtained from measurements made on those maps.

All the streets laid out by the Commissioners were numbered from Houston (formerly North) street, which is about one mile north of the City Hall; and as twenty of these streets, including the adjoining block, measure *one mile* (within about a yard), the proximate distance *in miles* from the City Hall to any of the places herein described by the number of a street, may be readily obtained by dividing such number by 20, and adding *one mile* to the result.

Take, for example, the village of Harlem (which is described as extending from 116th to 125th street) as at 120th street, which, being divided by 20, gives 6 miles as its distance from Houston street, to which add one mile, and it gives 7 miles for the distance between Harlem, at 120th street, and the City Hall.

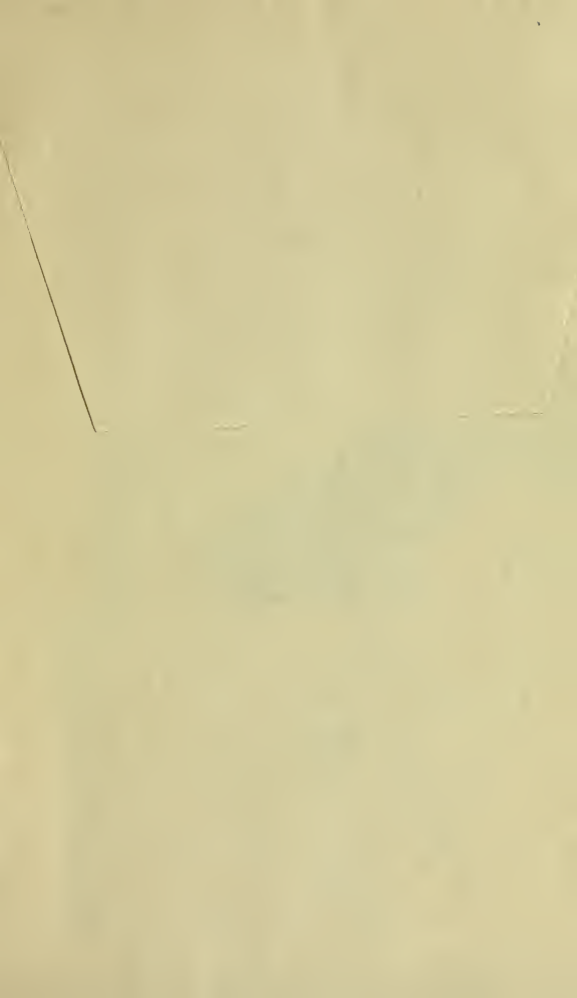

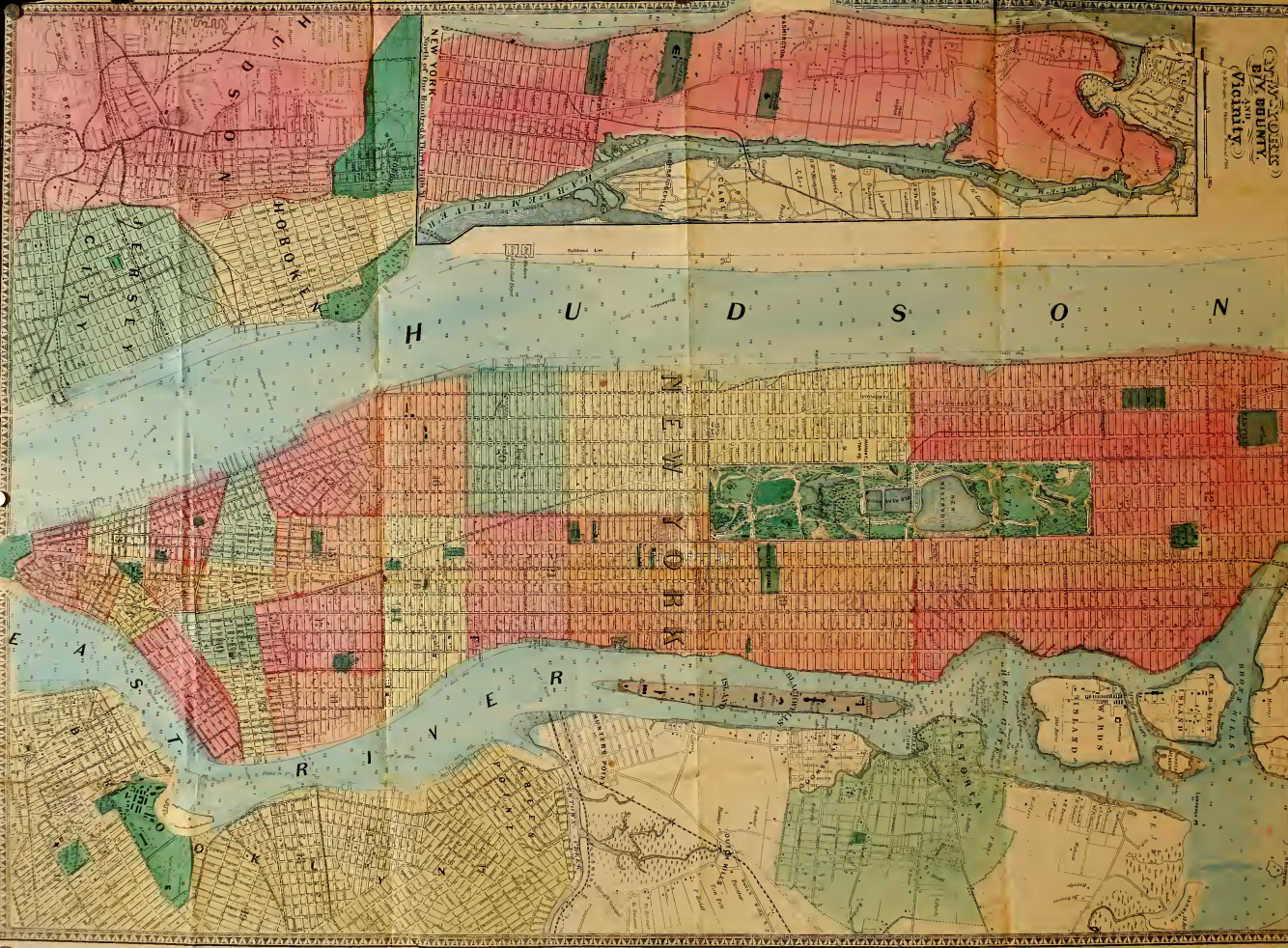








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
