




This plate of arms of Sir Thomas Marsh, A. D. 1660, is from a very rare and ancient work on Heraldry (London 1679) and is "probably the ancient arms of all the Marshes with some slight variations for difference in families." It is supplied to us by the courtesy of Mr. George W. Montague, Amherst, Mass.

ITS BLAZON:

"Gules, a horse's head couped, between three crosses bottonée fitchée, argent."

Gules, means a red shield.

Couped, cut off smoothly.

Bottonée, a cross that is crossed at three ends or points.

Fitchée, a cross that has the lower end pointed like a dagger.


Argent, that the crosses are white in color (or silver)

to wit

"A red shield with a horse's head cut off smooth between three crossed crosses that are white and pointed at the foot."

THE MARSH NAME IN ENGLAND.

"REMEMBER THE DAYS OF OLD, CONSIDER THE YEARS OF MANY GENERATIONS."

We have good reason to think that for a thousand years, men of Marsh name have been known in all parts of England. The name is found in Ireland, in a limited degree, mainly connected with the English church, but not in Scotland. As the name (common in America for over 260 years) has been distinctly English for these certainly eight, and probably ten centuries, we need not go farther back. We will here give names of definite persons for more than 20 generations, from the year 1174, 721 years ago.

"Our days are like the shadows On sunny hills that lie."

IN NORFOLK COUNTY.

Page 247. Sir Stephen Marsh¹, Lord of Newton, Walsoken, Tid, St. Giles, etc. (These places were in the northwest corner of Norfolk Co., Eng., not far from "The Wash." D. W. M.)

His son, Jeffrey de Mariscow Marsh².

Jeffrey's dau. and heiress Desiderata Marsh³, m. about 1240 Sir Roger de Colville of Newton by Leverington.

(If Desiderata Marsh³ m. in 1240; she was b. about 1222, her father² about 1198 and Sir Stephen Marsh¹ about 1174. D. w. M.)

IN SUFFOLK COUNTY, NORTHWEST CORNER.

Page 20 in supplement. Col. Marsh¹ of Mildenhall, Suffolk Co. His dau. Martha Marsh², m. 1706, (second wife) Jeremiah Bigsby,

Esq., Suffolk Co., and their son Thomas Bigsby³ was A. M. and M. D. of Cambridge. (This Col. Marsh must have been b. as early as 1660, and his dau. 1684 to 1688. D. W. M.)

IN YORK COUNTY.

Page 117 in supplement. Thomas Marsh¹ of Dey or Darton House, Darton, York Co.

His dau. Elizabeth Marsh² d. 1580; m. Roger Elmehirst of Elmehirst and Houndhill, York Co.

(If she d. 1580 after m. she was born before 1562 and her father Thomas b. before 1538. D. W. M.)

Page 405. Richard Marsh¹, D. D., Dean of York, Vicar of Halifax, York Co. m. Elizabeth Batt. Their dau. Frances Marsh² m. Rev. Lewis West, Archdeacon of Carlisle and Vicar of Aldenham, Cumberland Co.

Page 408. Anne Marsh m. Samuel Ferrand, bap. in Bingley Feb. 24, 1664, Rector Todwick and Vicar Rotherham (all three in York Co. D. W. M.) (If he was b. 1664, she prob. b. 1670, or 1668. D. W. M.)

OF ENGLAND IN THE NORTHWEST.

Page 1191. Sir Edward Marsh¹ had dau. Mariana Marsh², m. Sir Harloven Saunders who came into England in or about 1270. He (Saunders) was descended from Robert, Lord of Innespruck, second brother of Rodolph, Count of Hapsburg and subsequently emperor. The family settled in Ireland. Their son Sir Robert Saunders, m. Dorothy, dau. Sir Edward Vickers of Lancashire.

(If Mariana Marsh m. about 1270 or 1280, she was b. about 1252 or 1262 and her father, Sir Edward, about 1228 or 1238. D. W. M.)

OF WILTSHIRE, ENGLAND, AND OF IRELAND.

(Narcissus Marsh, according to the Methodist Encyclopedia, was b. 1638 at Hannington, Wiltshire, England, was Archbishop 1690, and of Dublin, 1694, and of Armagh 1703, built a public library in Dublin, filled it with choice works and settled provision for two librarians. He d. 1713. We have again of the Landed Gentry:

Page 333. Francis Marsh¹, Archbishop of Dublin, his son? His grandson, Rev. Jeremy Marsh³, D. D., m. Mary dau. Jeremy Taylor, Esq. Their dau. Elizabeth Marsh⁴, m. Rev. Simon Digby, Bishop of Down and Connor who d. 1824.

(The following Marshes are prob. of the same family. D. W. M.)

Page 332. Dean — Marsh¹, his only child Mary Marsh², m. 1717 John Digby, Esq. of Landenstown, M. P. tor Kildare, 1731 and high sheriff 1732.

Page 135 in supplement. Digby Marsh, Esq., m. Eliza, dau. Christophilus Garstein, Esq., m. Elizabeth Thompson, 1790, of Bragganstown, Louth Co., Ireland.

OF WILTSHIRE.

(Probably same family as the Archbishop who was b. 1638. D. W. M.)

Page 1596. Samuel Marsh¹ of Clapham, M. P. for Chippenham. His dau. Annabella Marsh², m. (second wife) Thomas Adams, Vicar of Uske, b. Sept. 15, 1758. (Prob. his father-in-law Samuel Marsh, b. as early as 1740. D. W. M.)

Page 1206. Gen. Marsh' had sister' who m. Robert Sealy, Esq. of Bandon, Ireland, whose father went there in beginning of the reign of Charles II. Sons "Armiger" John and George, (about 1649. D. W. M.)

MARSH FAMILY OF KENT COUNTY, ENGLAND.

Page 831. This ancient family, styled De Marisco in ancient Latin deeds was at East Langdon near Dover, Kent, in 1326, in reign of Edward III.

In addition we have the names of over fifty members of this Marsh family in Kent, among whom was Richard Marsh, Clarke of Dover Castle and the Cinque Ports, who d. in 1626.

From other records we have Prof. Herbert Marsh of Cambridge, b. London, 1757, Bishop in 1816; Gabriel Marsh of the Admiraltie (1633) to discharge Mary and John and other vessels in the Thames; Walter Marsh who d. 1540 and his widow Eleanor m. Sir William Locke; also among "the noble army of martyrs," George Marsh, who studied at Cambridge and was curate of Deane, and martyred April 24, 1555 and Nicholas Marsh in 1532.

If we consider these persons as to time and place we have:

Sir Thomas Marsh of Middlesex Co., 1660. Near London in the heart of England.

Col. Marsh, 1660. Suffolk Co. on the east coast.

Narcissus Marsh, b. 1638, Archbishop of Dublin. Wiltshire Co., near the west coast.

The martyrs of Lancashire 1555 and Norfolk 1532.

Thomas¹ Marsh b. before 1538 and Elizabeth² b. before 1562, d. 1580, after marriage. Of York Co., northeast coast.

Ancient Marsh family of Kent, styled in Latin deeds "de Marisco." "Seated near Dover in the reign of Edward, 1326." South of England on the English Channel.

Sir Edward¹ Marsh, b. about 1228–38. Marianna² Marsh, b. about 1252–62, for she m. Sir Harloven Saunders soon after 1270. Northwest coast of England near Lancashire.

Sir Stephen¹ Marsh, b. about 1174. Jeffrey² de Mariscow Marsh, b. about 1198. Desiderata³ Marsh, b. about 1222, m. 1240. East coast of England, Norfolk Co.

There are others claiming our notice and among them we give first honor to the printers. Their work is more valuable than that on brass or marble. And we delight to find that a printer of our name did splendid work in London more than 300 years ago. A spoken word melts on the air; a printed word lingers down the ages.

"Among the books which formerly belonged to the kings and queens of England, and which are now in the library of the British museum, says the *American Bookmaker*, there are two which have bindings of a particularly beautiful and distinctive character. The volumes themselves are exceedingly interesting, both being presentation copies to Queen Elizabeth. The larger, a small folio, 11\frac{3}{4} inches by eight inches, is a copy of the "Flores Historianum." collected by Matthew of Westminster, and was printed in London by Thomas Marsh on June 2, 1570. It was published under the superintendence and at the expense of Matthew Parker, archbishop of Canterbury, and was presented by him to the Queen.

The smaller one, a quarto, eight inches and one-eighth by five inches and three-fourths, contains the Gospels in Anglo-Saxon and English, and was printed in London in the year 1571 by John Day. This most interesting volume, which was also published under the supervision of the archbishop, contains a dedication "to the Queenes Majestie," by John Fox, the Martyrologist; and we learn from a MS. note in the title page, that "This was the Dedication Book presented

to the Queenes owne hands by Mr. Fox."

The bindings of these volumes are not only very charming, but they are also quite different from any others in the royal collection. They are identical, with the exception that in the smaller, a portion of the design is omitted to suit the size of the covers. The material used is a brown calf, with corners and side pieces of inlaid white leather, beautifully decorated with military trophies and musical instruments stamped in relief upon a gold ground. In the center of each cover is an ornament of very elegant design executed in the same style as the corners and side pieces, and inclosing the arms of the queen impressed in gold, her initials being placed outside; the sides are also powdered with gold dots. The larger book has brass clasps handsomely engraved, and both volumes have the edges of the leaves gilt and gauffred."

The following letter as to the Marsh family in England is of interest:

REY. D. W. MARSH,

AMHERST, MASS., U. S.:

Dear Sir:

Having been for a series of years engaged as opportunity offered, in occasional antiquarian researches into the history, connections and origin of my family, I was somewhat interested in a circular issued by the "Marsh family of America" recently sent me by a Canadian relative.

Though a native of this town, I have lived in the early years of my childhood, in Massachusetts, my father having left Accrington and gone to the United States when I was only four months old. He, I believe, attended the ministry of the late Rev. Asa Brunson of Fall River, of whom an obituary notice, (I suppose on account of his patriarchal age) was copied into the English newspapers. My father died in 1833 at Fall River and my mother came back here with myself and sister. My father's great uncle Thomas, Marsh (son of Nicholas Marsh of Dykenook) went to America (I suppose with his wife whose maiden name was Heywood) toward the end of last or beginning of present century. So far as I know he never returned to this country.

I have not been quite successful in ascertaining to my satisfaction the origin of the name Marsh. The Lancashire Marshes to whom my family belong, are said to be of yeoman origin, and are very easily traceable for at least 400 years in this neighborhood or rather in that of Bolton Le Moors. My ancestor Nicholas Marsh came from Rivington (near Bolton) last century and became the ancestor of every person of the name of Marsh living in this town and neighborhood until within the last few years, when a very few others from Yorkshire, etc., have migrated hither.

In view of the fact that nearly every Lancashire town has its name duplicated in that of persons and families, in view also of the fact that in the vicinity of the rivers Mersey and Ribble, there are swampy lands liable to submersion in flood times, and taking into account the fact that Marsh is a geographical name, the inference seems natural that when surnames came into general use, this, like many

others had a geographical origin. This however is entirely my own idea and I have not as a matter of fact found that the name has been ascribed to such a source.

The theory held by the landed gentry of the name of Marsh isthis. Francis or Francisco de Marisco, a Norman, who came hither with William the Conqueror, founded the family whose patronymic has been Anglicised into Marsh. An intimate friend of mine, a Scottish landed proprietor, and Deputy Lieutenant of Lanarkshire, a noted authority in matters relating to Heraldry, alleges that the armorial bearings of the name of Marsh indicate ducal rank. So far as I have been able to ascertain, the name of Marsh, which is certainly and most essentially English, has never been associated with the English peerage except by marriage. The curious and interesting fact (supposing my friend's conclusion to be correct) referred to above, must therefore have what may be called a prehistoric or Norman reference. I have not been able to trace any relationship connection between the Marshes of the south and those of the north, except one single suggestion. In my family the distinctive and historic landmarks are the names Nicholas and Giles, these are so distinctive asto be obviously family names, and not merely importations from the female line.

In Fox's Book of Martyrs is given an account of the putting to-death of Robert Denham, Nicholas Marsh and another at Harwich Dover Court in the County of Norfolk. My ancestor Nicholas came from the neighborhood of Horwich or Rivington about 16 or 20 miles from here. The account of Nicholas of Norfolk given also in "The Lollard," a book published by the Religious Tract Society pages 207 and 208 is to me most tremendously suggestive, albeit I am without *certain* evidence of the connection of this Nicholas of the southeast coast with my family.

There is not the same want of evidence of the connection of my family with another member of "the noble army of martyrs" George Marsh to wit. He was Curate of Deane near Bolton and was burned at the stake for his faithfulness to Christ and his doctrine, in the reign of Mary of bloody memory. His life is also given in extent in Fox's book of Martyrs, and it has also been written again somewhat more fully by the Rev. Alfred Hewlett recently deceased. My copy of this work I gave to my relative the Rev. David Marsh of Quebec who died in February last.

William Marsh, Churchwarden of Deane, invited me over there some years since and he took me through Deane church and up to the pulpit from which the martyr it is said preached and which has been transposed from the now demolished ancient church into its modern successor. Only somewhere about 30 or 35 years separated the martyrdom of Nicholas of Harwich in Norfolk from that of George of Deane near Horwich in Lancashire.

My aunt stated to me that we are the descendants of George, but I think had it been so, the tradition would have been more vivid than it is. That he left a family is evident however and that we are of the same stock is well nigh certain. There have been a good many Irish Marshes, but these are certainly of the English stock. Among them there have been several prelates of the Episcopal church. There was a Bishop Jeremy Taylor Marsh whose close relationship to Bishop Jeremy Taylor is thus plainly indicated.

The late Rev. William Marsh of Beckenham of blessed memory was of this stock. He was the son of Sir Charles Marsh an Indian soldier. He, the Rev. William Marsh, was an Evangelical Episcopalian, one of the most saintly men of his, or any other generation, and a man most marvelously used of God in conversions. He was married to the Lady Elizabeth Cadogan a daughter of the Earl of Cadogan. His daughter (by his first wife), is an authoress, whose name and works are doubtless more or less known in America. Among other works she wrote the life of Capt. Hedley Vicars who was slain in the Crimean war. Some years ago when residing for a short time at the marine village of Lytham, I met a clergyman who acosted me by stating "I have a sister of the same name as you." This he told me was Lady Marsh, widow of the late Sir Henry Marsh, Baronet of Dublin. This baronetcy I am sorry to say, is extinct, there being no heir. This is undoubtedly another of the Anglo-Irish Marshes. I lived in Glasgow for 20 years and there was not during that time one other person of the name, so far as known in that immense city. There are no Scotch Marshes. Hoping to have the circulars by newspaper post,

When your historian was at Mosul on the Tigris, Lieut. Pengelly of the Indian navy was there during the Crimean war, making purchases of horses and mules for service in the English army before Sebastapool. He gave me the Life of Hedley Vicars, by Miss Marsh: and whoever has read that work and also her "English Hearts and English Hands," sees a solution of the labor question in her Christian treatment of English "Navvies" while they were building the Crystal Palace and when afterward, many of them went to the trenches in the Crimea. I have long had in my library the life of Rev. William Marsh and I take great pleasure in presenting to my American kinsmen from that work, his likeness, as a type of an all around English Marsh who united in his lineage, environment and soul-growth, much that is heroic from knightly descent, graceful in learned culture, refined in courtly associations, but above all Christian in due regard for all men, especially in most humble and constant service of the lowly. Happy for us could we all read his story, and put its splendid meaning into our lives.

I have not been able to make any extended and exhaustive study of the English Marshmen. As the years pass on, some other will do that work. So far as I have been able to carefully examine and to judge, there is as yet no proof, by exact dates and names, of the definite connection of any head of one of our Marsh tribes in America with his exact Marsh parent in the English family from which he came. Of course there has been in each case absolute connection with some English Marsh parent and family which at some future day may be exactly traced.

On the side of our mothers we have several definite connections carefully traced. In this genealogy it may be noted that all the descendants of Gov. Joseph Marsh of Vermont and Judge Perez Marsh of Berkshire, Mass., can, through their mother's line, trace their descent from several kings of England. And when we remember that in thirty generations back (a thousand years) we each have probably had a hundred thousand ancestors, it would not be strange if every one of Marsh name in America were descended from an English king. And what of that! What if a ten thousandth or a millionth part of you be tinged with royal blood! We must ask, was the king noble, and is a drop of his blood worth having? If we knew its whole history might we not prefer to let that drop out?

Better be born of a noble yeoman than of an ignoble knight or king! As the case stands, so far as we know, we can highly honor our name for its martyrs, its printers, its prelates and princely men.

"Down from the past has come, Mighty as the sun, Our father's name. As on a mountain's height; It shines a beacon light, To guide to paths of right And noble fame."

In ship "Plaine Joan" from London to Virginia May 15, 1635, John Marsh, age 26.

"He brought Attestacon of his Conformitie to ye orders and discipline of the Church of England."

From London to St. Christophers May 21, 1635 in ship "Mathew" William Marsh, age 26.

From London to Virginia July 27, 1635, in ship "Primrose" Fran-

cis Marsh, age 28 and Joseph Marsh age 33, both took oath of allegiance and supremicie, etc.

Monmouth Rebellion, Dec., 1685. From Dorchester jail to Barbadoes sold for ten years, political prisoner Edward Marsh in ship "Bettie" of London from ye port of Waymouth in Co. Dorset.

So we find that if many Marshes have been knighted, some have been martyred and at least one, for political offence, sold. And some became exiles in a new world.

In a church at Haverhill, Mass., where Marshmen of the Salem line settled, a bell "in memory of the Marsh family" has this inscription:

"Peace to the past, Joy to the present, Welcome to the future."

That bell seems to ring out all unkind memories of the motherland, and to ring in pleasant recognition of American prosperity, and to peal out again, buoyant anticipation of still more favored Marshmen yet to be, wherever they may come in all the world.

In the homeland or new land we can all join:

"Peace to the past, Joy to the present, Welcome to the future."

THE MARSH FAMILY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA.

ITS ORIGIN.

Early in 1884 David C. Marsh of Montague, Mass., received a letter from Mrs. Pamelia Wellman (p. 123 and 464) of Parma, N. Y., dated Feb. 11, 1884, asking for records of the Marsh family, particularly of descendants of John Marsh of Hartford, Ct., of 1636; and stating that she was a descendant of Joseph Marsh who came to Lebanon, Ct., in 1700. This letter was shown to many members of the Marsh family in the vicinity and to J. Johnson of Greenfield, Mass., whose wife Climena was a daughter of Calvin Marsh of Montague, born Oct. 21, 1828. The matter of the ancestry of the family was frequently discussed whenever two or three of them were together until by mutual consent, David C. Marsh and wife, Sanford Marsh and wife and J. Johnson met at the home of Hannah R. and Elvira F. Marsh, sisters of Mrs. Johnson, on the afternoon of June 2, 1884 and effected a temporary organization by choice of David C. Marsh, chairman, J. Johnson, secretary and Sanford Marsh, treasurer. an adjourned meeting, June 16, it was decided to hold a Marsh family gathering at Lake Pleasant, Montague, Mass., July 23, 1884.

"THESE SOUGHT THEIR REGISTER AMONG THOSE THAT WERE RECKONED BY GENEALOGY."

The first regular meeting of the Marsh family association was held at Lake Pleasant in the town of Montague, Mass., in July, 1884, with a very good attendance. An organization was completed. D. W. Marsh of Amherst, Mass., was chosen president with several vice-presidents and J. Johnson, Esq., of Greenfield, secretary, which office he has held most acceptably to this day. E. B. Marsh, registrar of Amherst college was chosen treasurer.

The second meeting in 1885 was also held at Lake Pleasant. The attendance was estimated by the different reporters as 150 and 200. The following officers were elected: D. W. Marsh, president; Rev. Francis J. Marsh of Walpole, Luther R. Marsh of New York, John E. Marsh of Hartford, Horatio N. Marsh of Joliet, Ill., Prof. Charles D. Marsh of Ripon, Wis., William A. Marsh of Jamestown, N. Y., Riverius Marsh of New Brunswick, N. J., vice-presidents; J. Johnson, secretary; E. B. Marsh, treasurer.

For the genealogical committee the above officers were chosen with D. C. Marsh of Montague, Lucius Boltwood of New Haven, Zebina Marsh of Northfield, Mrs. Pamelia Wellman of Parma, N. Y., E. J. Marsh of Leominster, Mass., Dr. Edwin Stuart of New York, Geo. M. Carrington of Winsted, Ct., John W. Thompson of Five Islands, Nova Scotia, Charles Marsh of Springfield and Lucius B. Marsh of Boston.

Valuable addresses were given by Rev. Francis Marsh of Walpole and by Luther R. Marsh of New York. Parts of the following ode: were sung as they have been at nearly every Marsh meeting since:

Tune, America.

1633—1887.

From England's sea-girt land By God's high guiding hand, Our fathers sailed. They laughed at ocean's roar, They found a broader shore, And here forever more They freedom hailed.

John Marsh was one of them, Those ancient, stalwart men, Their God, their King: His Bible was his chart, With wisest master-art, He put it in his heart, More light to bring.

And George of Hingham came, And many a queenly dame, And lovely bride: And Marshes, as the leaves, Or golden harvest sheaves, Or drops that drip from eaves, They multiplied. In truth we live and die As others far and nigh, For Marsh is man; The Marshes come and go, As come the rain and snow, The Marshes ebb and flow, A little span.


We boast no nobler name, No bluer blood we claim, Lest pride should fall: Yet love we this our tree, And come from land and sea One gathering here to be, And honor all.

The president gave the following address:

The Marsh family in the United States is composed of several large branches. Two hundred and fifty years ago there were at least six men of the Marsh name who had left the shores of old England for this new world.

According to Lunt's "New England Traits," the first of the six to come was John Marshe, who took oath March 24, 1633, and sailed a few days later in the ship Mary and John, Robert Sayres, master. This is the John Marsh who went to Salem. I have one account which says that a John Marsh took the freeman's oath at Quincy in 1634, and in 1635–6 went to Hartford, Ct. Savage says that John Marsh went to Hartford in 1636, but yet this first John was the one who went to Salem, 1633,—John Marsh our pioneer.

George Marsh of Hingham came very nearly as early; for he drew his home lot at Hingham, Mass., Sept. 18, 1635. Also in that year, 1635, four others came; for on May 15th, another John Marsh, age 26, having taken the oath of fidelity to the English King and crown, set sail on the Plain John, Richard Buckham, master, for Virginia, as all New England was then called. And in the same year, 1635, a week later than this second John Marsh, on May 21st, upon the Matthew of London, Goodlad, master, William Marsh, age 26, sailed for St. Christopher, and was possibly the William Marsh who came to Plainfield, Ct., in Cromwell's day, of whom an account says that he was at Boston in 1636. And on July 27, 1635, John or Jonathan Marsh, age 33, and Francis Marsh, age 28, came over on the Primrose, Captain Douglas, master. Thus in 1635 six of our name had sailed on five different vessels that year and one two years before. Samuel Marsh was at New Haven in 1647, Thomas Marsh came in 1648, Alexander Marsh of Braintree in 1654, and a John and Sarah Marsh had a son born in Boston in 1669. Others of our name followed.

And now after 252 years from the coming of the first John, 1633, we in 1885, are noting the great Marsh banyan tree that has spread over our land. We know the names of more than 5000 descendants of those early Marsh settlers. Men of our name are found in every part of our land, and the great family tree is grown so large that we cannot yet trace all the new trunks that drop, banyan-like, from the wide-spreading boughs and take root for a new life in new states and territories. One writes from New Orleans to know if he is a "twig of a branch" of this great tree.

The common name, Marsh, would indicate that most of the Marshes who came to this country from England between 1633 and the present time, must have had in England, a common origin, perhaps one or

two centuries back from 1633. That origin may at some future time be traced out.

To-day we have to do with the new Marsh life in a new world; we mean to get acquainted with those enterprising men, most of them led by the strongest devotion to noblest principles, who braved the sea and the unknown to help plant a new nation.

We can see them beginning to land when Plymouth was thirteen years old, not content to rest on the new shore of the old mother ocean, whose waves, away back, washed Old England, but, forsaking their ships, and plunging with the foremost into the mysterious woods, wild with pathless tangles.

Soon they are found on the Connecticut river, among the first settlers of Hartford. Twenty-three years later they toil up the river, cutting paths through the woods, guided by blazed trees; men and youth on foot with their guns, mothers with their younger children on the pack saddle and pillion. Some with household goods struggle in boats against the current of the noble river, so much larger than the Thames, often poling and dragging against the current. Above the Holyoke gorge they come out upon the broad Indian meadows. They help found Hadley and Hatfield, and branching from Hadley, they and their descendants are pioneers eastward at Ware and Hardwick, northward at Sunderland, Montague and Northfield, westward at Whately, Conway and Hawley, at Worthington, and Pittsfield, and Dalton.

Branching out from Hartford, John Marsh², grandson of the original Hartford John, explores Litchfield, his brother Joseph is of the first settlers of Lebanon, Ct., and his brother Jonathan, with Nathaniel Stanley, founds New Hartford.

From Salem, some of that John Marsh's descendants go to Haverhill and "many to Maine." From all these early settlements mentioned in Massachusetts and Connecticut, Marsh men pass on as pioneers to many towns in Vermont and New York. And still later with the moving tide they push on, westward ho! to Detroit, Chicago, St. Louis, Wisconsin, Kansas, Colorado. They have long since been found in California and Oregon. At New Albany, Ind., Samuel Marsh built "The Volcano," the first steamer on the Ohio below the Louisville Falls, as we have written to us by one of his descendants in Florida.

By letters received during the past year we can trace the line of movement of many descendants of Alexander of Braintree, some going from Massachusetts to Nova Scotia, and from Nova Scotia through Ontario to the great west. Others of that line to East Haddam, Ct., and back to New Hampshire and circling to the neighborhood of Boston; others from East Haddam to Vermont and the great west. One of that family, Sylvester, after inventing wheat dryers that made his fortune in Chicago, came back East to build a railroad up Mt. Washington, upon a principle so admirable that it has been copied for climbing the Alps. Hon. Thomas Allen of St. Louis, whose father's first wife was a Marsh and the second a daughter of a Marsh, became president of the Iron Mt, railroad and a The firm of Jordan & Marsh of Boston is well known. millionaire. L. Milton Marsh of New York City is at the head of a very wide and benevolent Sabbath-school work. Rev. Theodore H. Marsh is Superintendent of Home Missions at Grand Rapids for the Synod of Michigan.

It is not too much to say that, wherever settled, Marshes have been among the leading men—captains, selectmen, doctors, ministers, merchants, representatives, judges. At Litchfield, Ct., Col. Ebenezer Marsh was judge for twenty-five years, and his daughter Mary was grandmother of Gov. Horatio Seymour. At Hartford, Vt., Col. Joseph Marsh was long a judge and for five years Dep. Governor of Vermont. At Pittsfield, Dr. Perez Marsh was long judge of Berkshire. The first meeting called for town purposes to organize Dalton was held at Judge Perez Marsh's house. His descendants passed from Berkshire largely to Hudson City and down the Hudson river to New York and Brooklyn.

Children of Samuel Marsh of New Haven founded Elizabeth, N. J. One letter from Detroit, another from Peoria, Ill., and a third from Plainfield in this state, give long lines from John of Medfield, Mass. (He was descended from John of Boston.)

The whole Marsh family, wherever found, have valued education. I know one graduate of Williams College and of Harvard law school who had three boys in college at once. His grandfather, Dr. Perez Marsh, was a graduate of Harvard, 1748. Two cousins Marsh at Hadley, grandsons of John of Hartford, one, son of Daniel, and one, of Jonathan, graduated at Harvard in the same class, 1705. The

son of one of these Hadley-Harvard boys graduated at Harvard in 1728 and never married, but became for many years a noted teacher at Quincy, Mass. The celebrated Adams family of Quincy for early training probably owed much to him, John Quincy Adams being his pupil. The son of the other Hadley-Harvard boy graduated at Yale in 1735. A grandson of Alexander of Braintree graduated at Harvard in 1726.

Charles Marsh, LL. D., of Vermont, graduated at Dartmouth college, 1786, and was long head of the Vermont bar, James Marsh, declining a professorship at Princeton, became professor at Hampden-Sidney college, Va., and soon after president of Vermont university at Burlington. He left his life-work in fragments, published by Prof. Torrey, but is considered by many the keenest metaphysician America has produced. George P. Marsh has written the history of the English language, and for his philological works ranks among the foremost all over the world. Time hardly allows me to speak of Prof. Leonard Marsh, who declined a professorship at Dartmouth, but went to Burlington, of President Sidney Marsh of Facific University, Oregon, of Prof. O. C. Marsh of Yale, and of younger blood, lately passed into college work, in Prof. Charles Marsh of Ripon College, Wisconsin, and Edward B. Marsh, registrar and assistant librarian at Amherst and Prof. Arthur Marsh of Harvard College. Not far from here Dexter Marsh was first to call public attention to bird tracks. Amherst College owes very much to him. I have here a unique oration, delivered at Yale commencement in 1798, by Ebenezer Grant Marsh. It forms this little book, and is truly very learned, and was delivered when audiences were patient with sermons one or two hours long.

John Marsh, D. D., of Connecticut and Brooklyn, son of John Marsh, D. D., of Wethersfield, Ct., descended from George of Hingham, became very distinguished in the temperance cause.

William of Vermont, was active early and long in the anti slavery cause and proved that his principles were sincere by giving some \$25,000 to the work.

Most of the Marshes have been too busy in making history to spend much time in writing it. But a few have deserved our highest gratitude for studying and recording something of the deeds and origin of others. Rev. Frederick Marsh, when he died at Winchester, Ct., twelve years ago, aged 92, had done more genealogical work in our Marsh family than any other of his day. He was in correspondence with Charles Marsh, Esq., of Woodstock, Vt., and thus obtained from deeds and records most valuable facts as to the Lebanon Marshes and their connection with Hartford, Ct., and Hartford, Vt. He also had correspondence with Rev. Christopher Marsh of West Roxbury, Mass., as to the Alexander Marsh line. This venerable man, Rev. Frederick, of 92 years, living well on towards a century, was emphatically our pioneer in genealogy, and he left three manuscript volumes of valuable records. His grandson, George Marsh Carrington, graduate of Williams College, has given us most valuable aid with the utmost courtesy and good will.

Next comes E. J. Marsh, Esq., of Leominster, Mass. For twenty-five years, I think, he has given more or less attention to every part of the Marsh line, and as to the descendants of George Marsh of Hingham, no man living knows so much. He has a list of that line just about ready for publication. He has given aid of the utmost value in every part of our work.

I must mention next Mrs. Wellman of Parma, N. Y., a member of our genealogical committee, who has been very active for a number of years past, writing in all directions, getting valuable documents from the state capitals of Massachusetts and Connecticut, and leaving no stone unturned that she could lift alone or by getting help. She has had copied from the state archives of Connecticut a very interesting legal document signed in 1705 by six of John Marsh's children.

Some may ask, what has been done the past year? I hardly dare make our secretary blush by telling how much he has done, From a height to which none of the rest of us dare aspire, (6 foot 3, or more), he has been looking out all over our land and setting types in motion by newspaper courtesy in about every state in the Union, from the Boston Journal to the New Orleans Picayune. His work with the newspapers and by correspondence has borne much fruit.

Mrs. Sanford of Washington sends me from Claremont, N. H., most charming sketches of nearly all the descendants of Gov. Joseph Marsh of Vermont. These sketches would make a most interesting little volume if printed by themselves.

Frank B. Marsh of Springfield, Mass., a graduate of Amherst

college, has sent me a sketch, printed in the *Oil*, *Paint and Drug Reporter* of New York City, very highly laudatory of his father, the late Edward H. Marsh, one of the founders of the firm of Lazell, Marsh & Gardiner, the third house in size of the drug stores in New York City. He was a refined, Christian gentleman, and one of the most successful business men who ever left old Hadley. He was a son of Moses and grandson of Dr. Job, who was a son of a Moses and grandson of Capt. Job of Hadley, who in turn was son of Daniel and grandson of John of Hartford.

E. A. Marsh, banker of Groton, N. Y., has been indefatigable in tracing out all the descendants of Zimri Marsh, his grandfather, who was a son of Ebenezer Marsh, 3d, of Montague.

Joseph Marsh, bookseller of Northampton, has received and given much light.

Miss Northam of Phelps, N. Y., has sent much of value as to the children of "Asa the aged." Who will find a father for that old man? Some who were like "Japhet in search of a father," last year, have found out their line, and it made your committee glad to see their joy. (From Boston records at Deerfield Memorial Hall I have found that "Asa the aged was descended from John of Boston.")

Riverius Marsh of New Brunswick, N. Y., manufacturer and merchant, with a branch house at New York, has traced his ancestry by a very careful search of Connecticut town records back to William of Plainfield, Ct., who is said to have been in Boston in 1636. His brother James, of Kent, England, is said to have been beheaded by Cromwell, and his sisters took William from college and sent him for safety to this country. Riverius has provided us with a very valuable list of descendants of this college boy William.

I would gladly give the work of many others, but in a list of over three thousand names with which I have had personally to do, it is simply impossible at this time in this short paper to even mention all.

I must allude to highly valued letters from Joseph Marsh of Fire Island, Nova Scotia, and from Miss E. E. Dana and Mrs. Edith Longfellow Dana of Boston, and from Miss Brigham of Marlboro, who has sent this bit of silk which came from London to Hadley 125 or more years ago. We have had help, too, from workers in other family lines, especially from A. P. Pitkin, Esq., of Hartford, Ct., Martin Metcalf, Esq., of Battle Creek, Mich., Henry P. Andrews,

Esq., of Saratoga, N. Y., Hon. Lucius M. Boltwood of New Haven, and James M. Crafts, Esq., of Whately.

The officers of Amherst college library, Mr. Trumbull of Northampton city library and Mr. Hoadly, state librarian of Connecticut, have been very courteous in rendering aid.

Rev. Loring B. Marsh of Springfield has, years ago, done much work as to the Ware Marshes, and has valuable records and memoranda in his possession, which it is hoped will not be lost. The same is true of Dr. Stuart of New York as to the Montague Marshes. Our first president, D. C. Marsh of Montague, and also Sanford Marsh of that place, and the venerable Zebina Marsh of Northfield, have given valuable information, but we all wait for Dr. Stuart's more complete work on the Montague Marshes.

There are several young ladies of Marsh descent who have given very full records of their ancestry. Mrs. Mary Leeds Shepard of the city of Hudson, N. Y., has furnished all the descendants of her great grandmother, Lucretia Marsh Mellen.

Miss Florence E. Gill, of Greeley, Col., has given very completely the descendants of Irene Marsh of Hartford, Ct. Miss Bertha E. Adkins of Reynolds Bridge, Ct., has given all the descendants of Job Marsh, Jr., of New Hartford, Ct., for four generations. I was very glad to help her trace her ancestry back for five generations more.

O. L. Peck, Esq., of Toledo, Ohio, has given very complete record of the descendants of Sarah Marsh Peck, daughter of Dr. Perez Marsh.

E. Porter Belden of Sing Sing, N. Y., descended from Mary Marsh Porter of Wethersfield, Ct., who was daughter of Ebenezer Marsh of Hadley, writes a very interesting letter, and mentions that Col. Belden, one of Mary Marsh's descendants, was on Washington's staff. Mr. Marquand of Princeton college, has given information as to the Marsh descended Marquands.

Your committee have kept up active correspondence all the past year. Ten letters on Marsh genealogy have been taken from the the Amherst postoffice at once. They have come from New York City and Philadelphia, from Louisville and New Orleans, from Atlanta and Florida, from Detroit and Chicago.

Two very important mistakes have been corrected, one in the Had-

ley Book, the other in "Early Lebanon," a work which I found in Connecticut state library at Hartford, which has led the Boston Genealogical society astray.

We cannot begin to mention much of which we would be glad to speak. Do you wish to see a plot of the Hadley streets of earliest date and where Marshes have ever since been living at various places within a half mile of John Marsh's home lot in 1663? Ask Josiah D. Marsh of Hadley to show you.

In early times many boys were sent to college that they might become preachers. In colonial times ministers were not called Revs. but Mr. They did not perform marriage, but that honor belonged to the magistrate. The common people were not called Mr. even, but Goodman this or goodman that: the mother, Goodwife such an one. Perhaps for this reason military titles were the more sought.

John² Marsh's four grandsons at Hartford were Capt. John, Captain Jonathan, Captain Joseph and Lieut. Nathaniel. The title of ensign was put upon gravestones as well as that of captain or lieutenant. At East Hartford cemetery we have Captain Daniel and Ensign Daniel. We have Col. Joseph Marsh and Col. William and Col. Joel of Vermont about the time of the revolution. By order of Connecticut legislature troops from New Haven were sent to be under command of Capt, John Marsh in defending Litchfield from Indians. At Hadley we have Capt. Job, and his son, Dr. Perez, surgeon in Col. Williams' regiment, who had much work after the bloody battle near Lake George, where Col. Williams lost his life and the French general received his death wound. All our Hadley and Hatfield ancestors were for one generation familiar with the Indian war-whoop, and two of them, Jonathan and Daniel at Hadley, obtained wives whose husbands had been slain in battle by the Indians. I have found the names of some who died from prison horrors at New York by the English during the revolutionary war.

E. W. Marsh, a native of North Carolina, writes me from Atlanta, Ga., that his father was a captain in the revolutionary war, and died 104 years old, with fifteen children—eight sons, all of whom became merchants and were prosperous.

Speaking of age, Sarah Marsh Merrill of Hartford is said to have lived to be 106. We find a curious fact, that although some of our uncles lived to be old bachelors, most of our fathers preferred to

marry, and most of them married outside our family name, and so connected us with a thousand families as good or better than ourselves. Now, of two brothers born in the old John Marsh place at Hadley, his grandsons, one lived and died there at the homestead, full of years, aged 92 and over. The other died aged 46 and a little-over. One had three wives and the other died unmarried. Now, which had the wives? Alas! it was the youngster of 46, while the bachelor lived to be 92. Which shall we pity? Shall we say of the aged, "Poor man! to drag out 92 weary years with no wife or child?" Or shall we say of his brother, "Poor youth! hastened away by marrying too much?" I leave you to choose.

To return to the honor of military titles: my father was a lawyer, yet I remember as a boy over in Berkshire, hearing him called Captain Marsh far more frequently than "Squire." I have mentioned that the title of ensign was carved in stone, and even the least military title set a man and his family up. One good-wife when her goodman was made corporal, soon went to her neighbor's and said, "I am going to visit you just the same."

I have noticed this fondness for military rank, and this begrudging ordinary men the small honor of Sir and Mr., to call your attention to an important fact which appears to one who looks over the records of this and other families about the time of the revolutionary war. The college graduates of that day, the educated clergy, and especially prominent military men, were often loyal to what they deemed the only right way, to the King and law of England; and not unfrequently the common people, the farmers and mechanics and less known men, had to depose their leaders, and to put in their places men who would be true to this our country and the rights of man. Honor, then, to the common brotherhood, the bone and sinew, the life and energy of the best principles, moral and religious, as well as civil. It might seem discourteous to this audience to mention Marsh names, but I may say that one of my ancestors, not a Marsh, although he had long been the foremost military man in Western Massachusetts, was put into Northampton jail as not sufficiently loyal to liberty as understood by George Washington and the American people. A clergyman not of our name had his church door closed against him by a military guard. But claiming to be minister of the town, he kept up preaching at his house till his death in 1779.

In Vermont, two military men of our name at the coming of Burgoyne had occasion to go to Canada, and in Connecticut one dropped a little from his high place in public esteem.

It is very hard for us, surrounded by all the inventions and appliances of modern life, to put ourselves back into the time of men, women and children as they lived 100, 200 and 250 years ago; 25 years ago, no telephone; 50 years ago, no telegraph; 60 years ago, no railroad: 100 years, no steamboat; 110 years ago, no Fourth of July; 150 years ago, no carriages in all the Connecticut Valley; 200 years ago, very few roads, and few towns to go to; 250 years ago, no towns at all and no bridle paths. The pioneers often began with log houses. Their first meeting-houses as buildings were cheap and in a few years gave place to better. Their houses, as one of our housebuilders informs me, for long years were of two rooms below and two chambers above, with a leanto behind. They had no brooms nor lamps, and pine knots, called candle-wood, were prized. Wives rode to church and brides to their new homes on a pillion. There were spinning wheels and looms but no factories. Early villages had no sidewalks. At Northampton, manure was put out of barns on to the principal street. At Hadley, geese waddled and quacked under the church. Ministers were not "settled on horse-back," but for life. Within sixty years, children at school, if the stage passed during recess have arranged themselves in a row and bowed and courtesied. To those children the minister was a very great and awful man. In very early days people were summoned to church by the sound of a trumpet or beat of a drum. On a wedding night brides were sometimes stolen, carried off, and not let go till the abductors were invited to share the festivities. Such were a few of the differences between our times and those of our Marsh fathers and mothers. the whole, we may congratulate ourselves that they have provided for us better things than they had themselves, and we honor them for leaving so many comforts in England to endure much hardship for And what a change has been wrought in our land! We have now far more comforts than they ever left behind in Old England. It must do us good to examine their useful lives. Our early fathers all of them feared God, and some of them honored the King.

This work of studying a noble history, and finding out whence we came, and tracing carefully our lines of descent, must go on. We

must ransack public libraries and town records, and records in the old family Bibles and on gravestones, and hasten to gather what is in the memory of the aged. We must compare notes. Different members of a family line have partial records, which, put together, give often great increase of light. Places of birth, and dates of removal and places of ancestral residence, and full names, are of utmost importance. Often a middle name hints a family connection. Do not neglect this pleasant work, nor think your parentage of no importance. Let us each be faithful to those who who have gone before us, and honor our family name.

At the third Marsh meeting at Lake Pleasant in July, 1886, addresses were delivered by Josiah D. Marsh, Esq., of Hadley, (of which free use is made in this work pages six, seven and eight) and by Col. Lucius B. Marsh of Boston. Both addresses were published in the Marsh pamphlet of 1886 and the latter address was published in the Genealogy of John Marsh of Salem in 1888.

The fourth annual reunion of the Marsh family was held at Unity hall, Hartford, Ct., Aug. 3 and 4, 1887. The morning meeting was called to order by the president of the association, the Rev. D. W. Marsh, of Amherst, Mass. After an organ prelude the entire company sang:

From Massachusetts mountains, From western prairies grand, From northern hillside fountains From southern pine-clad sand From many a rolling river And many a fertile plain, With love to all forever, We Marshes meet again.

The address of welcome was by Mr. Riverius Marsh of New Brunswick, N. J., whose opening words were as follows:

"As we meet face to face in this beautiful city of Hartford, let our watchword be 'Welcome!' We admire the refinement and culture which clusters around this educational and commercial center. We behold stately trees, abundant foliage, the carpet of the greensward,

lovely homes, while above us the old blue vault of heaven arches from sunrise to sunset, just the same as when our forefathers first beheld the primeval forests which bordered the banks of this romantic river. We meet to cherish the memory of honored ancestors—because of that noble spirit of truth, born of experience, which will burn still brighter in future generations—as principle and truth become more deeply rooted. We say welcome!"

After the transaction of routine business came an address by Mr. John E. Marsh of Hartford. He began by telling of the early life of the pioneer in Braintree, Essex county, England, and spoke of his emigration to America in 1635, and of his arrival in Hartford the year following. He owned thirty-six acres of land here, the homestead being located at the spot now marked by the junction of Temple and Front streets, neither of which, of course, were then in existence. Following this came a detailed account of the controversy among the members of the old Center church, which led to his removing from Hartford in 1659 and going to Hadley, Mass. Forty families in this city and twenty in Wethersfield moved away at the same time for the same reason. The speaker then gave a rapid sketch of his life at Hadley, which was full of interest, coupled with some account of the marriage and place of settlement of each of his nine children. The death of his wife, in 1662, was followed by his second marriage, two years later. His own death occurred at Windsor, in 1688. His son John, after marriage, lived in the old homestead in this city, and his sons were among the earliest settlers of Litchfield, Lebanon and New Hartford,

A speech of an informal nature was also made by Colonel Lucius B. Marsh of Boston, who spoke of the pleasure he had taken in making these researches, and said that during the past two years he had succeeded in acquiring considerable information regarding the family. Colonel Marsh will be remembered as the officer who commanded the defences of New Orleans during the siege of Port Hudson.

At the close of the morning session the association proceeded in a body to view the site of the old homestead, after which they separated for dinner. At 2 o'clock they reassembled at the hall, the session being opened with the singing of the Marsh ode, composed by the Rev. D. W. Marsh and set to the tune of "America."

The first event on the programme arranged for the afternoon was an address by Mr. George Marsh Carrington of Winsted, who spoke in relation to Jonathan Marsh, who went from here to New Hartford in 1736.

CAPTAIN JONATHAN3 MARSH.

A pioneer settler of New Hartford. A paper read before the Marsh family reunion in Hartford, Aug. 3, 1887, by Judge George Marsh Carrington of Winsted.

Of the twelve children of John² Marsh, Jr., and Sarah Lyman his wife, of Hartford, five were boys. John, the eldest, was born in 1668 and Jonathan, the youngest, was born within the limits of this city 20 years after. Dispensing here with notice of the first eleven, I am to speak in a fragmentary way of Capt. Jonathan Marsh, the youngest of the twelve, and of his descendants. In the prime of his middle life the Captain found it necessary to seek a better location to win bread for himself and his family. No student of the early days of a community has failed to observe the truth of the saying of a political economist, "In a new country the spring of population uncoils itself with amazing velocity." The original "John of Hartford" was the father of nine children, John, Jr. by both wives, was the father of thirteen, while of his brothers and sisters, Samuel had 11, Jonathan and Lydia each had 8, Daniel and Hannah each had 7. Captain Jonathan himself had ten children. No wonder that in the early days, guiltless of commerce or manufactures, even this fertile valley, with the methods of cultivation and the limited markets of the time, could not support the swarms who poured from every family hive. Twenty miles northwest of where we are gathered today, was a tract of land, largely forest, which, to escape sequestration as colonial public land, had been hastily given by the General Assembly to the towns of Hartford and Windsor in trust. When the danger was passed and Sir Edmund Andros, the royal governor, was well away, the Commonwealth desired to repossess its lands, but found the towns not so ready to part with them. As the result of a compromise, to the share of Hartford fell four townships, and among them a tract of 35 to 40 square miles which, when erected into a township some years after, was called New Hartford. This new township fell to the share of 182 proprietors or land owners, of Hartford, in proportion to their property as rated on the list of 1720. In 1733 home lots were laid out and drawn by lot in what after inves-

tigation appeared the most eligible site in town, afterwards the out lying lands were drawn, first one parcel, then another. Of all the Hartford lands, only those in New Hartford were actually settled by the sons of the proprietors, probably because, while none of the others were valued at more than 10 shillings per acre, the New Hartford acre was considered worth 15 shillings. Every settler was obligated in two years next ensuing his agreement with the committee, "to build a tenantable house of 16 feet square on said land and break up two or three acres of sod land, and in one year or more after said two years are expired, personally inhabit by themselves or family on said land and to be obliged to continue inhabiting said land for the space of three years longer after the first three years are expired." Among the earliest settlers, and so far as the enthusiastic historian, Mrs. Sarah L. Jones, (without whose labors it would have been impossible to prepare this paper,) has ascertained, the second on the list was Jonathan Marsh. Like his brothers, a captain, he had lived to see 48 years before he left his old for his new home. had married for his first wife the daughter of that impetuous man, who, in the sudden darkness of a legislative session, laid hands on the charter of Connecticut and made the oak immortal, Captain Joseph Wadsworth. Compelled to surrender her to the grim destroyer, his three children found a second mother in Elizabeth Loomis of Windsor, and their number was increased to seven or eight before emigration to the new settlement. The earliest settlers appear to have spent two or three summers on the new lands clearing up the forest, for every inch of land had to be made, and to have returned to Hartford during the winters. The single handed battle with the forces of nature began with the first arrival. Without comfortable houses for themselves or their stock, without church or school house, no roads, bridges, fences, wagons, carts, and largely even without side saddles, without the means to buy or hire the efficient implements to do the work imperatively necessary, their experience was most trying and severe. We are without record of the particulars of those early days. Neither the type nor the quill has left its marks for our information. The first newspaper in Connecticut was not yet started. Fifty years afterwards there were not a hundred post offices in the United States. Other business than recording, claimed the pioneer's imperative attention. We can surmise that the sheltering of them-

selves and their animals, the providing of food, water and wood, the erection of looms, the clearing up and burning of the forest trees would exercise the colonists' first and best efforts from the first ray of light in the morning till they could see no longer. Little time did they have to build roads, bridges or other works for the common good when the struggle for existence was so severe that it taxed all their powers. And yet it is not very strange to find that the public worship of Almighty God held a high place in their estimation, and that early efforts were made to provide a suitable place for such worship. Here we come to matters of record. In 1738 an agent was appointed to ask the General Assembly to fix a spot for a church building, which the next year was located by a committee from adjoining towns. Preparations for building were commenced, "the length to be fifty foots and the bredth forty foots—" the length afterwards increased by "five foots." After innumerable drawbacks and ten years of time, provision of rum and other liquors for raisings, etc., it was completed. What would our western pioneers say to such an experience as that, and where would our church building societies be if all new settlements had the pluck of New Hartford? Truth it is, however, that not every new settlement is made of such stuff as the New Hartford settlement was, nor are their surroundings similar. As in all other New England towns the town and the church were one at first. The quaint and unique vote of the first town meeting is worthy of quotaion.

"Voted—That ye sd committee shall and are hereby empowered to make application to Mr. Baulden to come and settle in the town of New Hartford in the work of the ministry, and if the sd Mr. Baulden refuse to accept of their caul, then to Mr. Robords, and if ye sd Mr. Robords refuse, then to Mr. Marsh, sun to ye Rev. Mr. Marsh of Windsor, and if he refuse, then to Mr. Timo. Woodbridge."

The first two "refused to accept of their caul" and the lot fell upon another Jonathan Marsh, son of the first cousin of our pioneer. The difference between the two Jonathans is noted in the land records, the clergyman being called Jonathan Marsh, clerk. For fifty-four or five years he was the faithful pastor of the church. He raised a family of twelve children, none of whom permanently settled in New Hartford, but some were persons of more than usual prominence. While speaking of him I will refer to an invaluable memorandum of bap-

tisms, marriages and deaths in the hand writing of the Rev. Jonathan and covering the entire period of his ministry, rescued by Senator Foster of Connecticut, from a Washington second hand book store and now lodged in Eldridge Memorial hall in this city. And by a curious coincidence with this gathering there was placed in my hands three weeks ago a manuscript volume of sermons written by the first pastor of the New Hartford church. It measures $6\frac{1}{4} \times 3\frac{3}{4}$ inches, has 76 lines on first page, has eight pages and with a good magnifier one is able to read the dates of preaching and the texts of three sermons.

To return to our pioneer, Capt. Jonathan. The house he lived in did good service till 1800, when its successor was built. He lived on a hill whence he had a splendid view of a large range of hills and valleys, an educator doubtless, though perhaps an unconscious one, to his family of five sons and five daughters, the two youngest New Hartford born. As his sturdy boys grew to manhood they proved themselves like arrows in the hands of a mighty man. The tannerv of the place was on his farm, four vats still remain. Not till the oldest was nearly 30 years of age did he multiply himself by two. But that inevitable step in a family in due time found takers in nine out of ten of these young Marshes. The sons found homes of their own in town, the oldest and the unmarried one remaining at or near the homestead, the other three pushing some little distance from the original hive. Two of the daughters remained in town, three found homes outside its limits. The heavy hills and the passage through the town of the Farmington river and a large branch thereof, made the construction of roads and bridges hard, long delayed and expensive. The brutal barbed wire had not yet made fencing easy and to avoid losing stock it was necessary to make some such provision as this, from the records. "Marsh, Moses mark is as followeth; a slanting crop the upper side the off ear.—Marsh, Job, mark is a crop of the near ear and a half penny the under side each ear.—Marsh, John, mark is a tennend in the near ear." The crops, the tennends and the half pennies did not always avail to secure animals to their owners. "Nov. ye 28, 1749." There is in the custody of Jonathan Marsh a sorrel mare, white in the face, some white on the near hind foot." One foot some white! Well that Jonathan was an honest man or he would have kept that mare to her end.

An account book of one of the early Marshes is extant and supplies us with much valuable information. Entries as early as 1748, and thence onward, are made with a royal disregard of capitals and orthography. Other records that this man was a farmer and carpenter are here abundantly confirmed. One of the earliest records is, Thomas Wolton, "deter" to 35 pounds of beef, "old tenr." £2, 18. Then follow charges for weaving tow cloth, 13 vards drouged (drugget), making a "wheall" and numerous charges for weaving showing that the women of the family bore their share of the common burden. (I find elsewhere a note that an unmarried male relative, partially insane, helped this family in weaving.) The "reverant" Jonathan Marsh is charged for sundry weaving, and mending of wheels and "spinning" a "run of shrew thread" and credited by "rates." These accounts, kept literally by single entry, with utter confusion of the prepositions "to" and "by." which are now used for debit and credit, headed by the names of the debtors and running from year to year, are balanced not by the equally footed columns and the double lines under them, but by these or similar words:—" October 14, then recken with Jeames Steel to balance accounts, there is due to mee £8, 10s, 4d," signed by the two. There are no ruled lines in the books but at the right hand of the page penciled lines are ruled, leaving three spaces, for f₁, s. and d., with each denomination always represented by two figures or a cipher and one figure. This family, farmers and carpenters out of doors and weavers in doors, appears to have had a more or less regular set of customers. The items of farm produce are butter, sugar, hops, honey, vinegar, eider, etc. Sledding wood, plowing two days, "my cattel to fetch bark, a well poll and well croch" are samples of other charging in the farm department. In the carpenter's department are charges for "framing, working on your barn, making a voke for one ox, a betel, extring (axletree) a cart," and others. For indoor work the charges are mainly for weaving, occasionally one for "netin a pare of stockinis, makin a pare trouses," etc. The items of weaving are "plain cloth, fine cloth, part stripid, tow cloth, chect, checord, weaving eight yds and putting in short, hankerchief, lawn," a large variety of fabrics for, doubtless, a small number of looms. On page 54 is pinned a sample of cloth, of whose genuineness as a piece of what is there charged I would give something to know. But the miscella-

neous charges in this book fascinate. They lift a corner of the veil woven by the years, and by hints of the things which entered into their daily experience and a part of which they were, show us something of the lives of these sturdy men and women. Six shillings are charged "for my oxen to Hartford," carting a barrel of shad from Wethersfield cost three shillings. Jesse Goodwin pays 18s. for "the hoss to farmingtown." Smith & Cadwell, the first partnership noticed, pay £3, 15s. by carting a load of goods to the furnace and by bringing back a load of pigs to the forge, for "provisions that I found 4s., to keeping for the team 3s." Domestic help thus:—"for Susan's work at your house a week 3s.;" Sylvester Ryder is charged "to carrying a pig to Hartford and sold it, it waid 19 pound, one shilling and sixpence," a most reasonable price! The charge suggests another item at the expense of the Rev. Jonathan. hogs one day and a half, one shilling," doubtless charged for the principle of the thing, the amount being ridiculously small. This was in 1770. The next difficulty with hogs in the ministerial line of the Marsh family was many years after. A gentle, quiet man, who had curbed his passions with an unsparing hand, in the later years of a long life, one day read his paper sitting by the open window, occasionally, as was his custom, giving his family the benefit of what he found, when he became much disturbed by the importunate cries of a hungry pig in the pen some rods away. The care of the pig was one of the duties he had assumed. The reader showed uneasiness. remarked on the utter unreasonableness of the animal, whose appetite just then was apparently quite keen, and when the noise would not cease, he threw down his paper with the remark, nearest an objurgation his family remembered hearing: "I hate to be ruled by a pig."

I notice that sundry "berrels" of "cyder" were produced after some years by this Marsh man. After charging 18 "berrels" one year to a certain man, the next season brings a charge of 18s. and 6d. for "3 berrels of cyder, one was worked." Dr. Eldad Merrill has 15 items in his account, of which seven were for "cyder." I was startled to see the certificate of reckoning and balancing the next spring was signed by the executors of the estate of Eldad Merrill, late of New Hartford deceased. In another account-book of later date, but still in the last century, I find "Joseph Whitin Marsh" (a grandson of Rev. Jonathan Marsh) in bold letters at the head of

half a page of items. Evidently he is now a young man, indeed the records of baptism show him to be 23. He has "a horse to Barkhempsted meeting house, making a pare of trouses, a horse to Col. petebones three times, a horse two nights, a horse to quilting one night." What! does the young man go out sewing evenings? Ah! here we have it! "To a horse to pettibones a Corting, two shillings," and the next item repeats the charge. Ah! Joseph, Joseph! It is the old story! Nay, it is the young story! We of this later and perhaps not altogether degenerate day, who ourselves had a horse to "pettibones," or some other mans, can only say "All right, my boy, go ahead." I would love to linger longer with these books, whose rich yellow leaves hold other treasures, but I must only ask your attention to the list of one of the family for taxation in 1790.

Smokes refer to fire places, a house being taxed according to the number of these being called "smokes" for short. A "miner" is a son between 16 and 21, who by the statute was assessed £9. You observe that a farm of 287 acres was assessed at £25, 9s., 6d., the value ranging from 10s. per acre for low land to 6d. per acre for woodland. All the prices in the list were fixed by state law. Evidently these toilers had not developed the idea that personal protection was worth nothing, for they taxed the head of the owner more than two-thirds as heavily as they did his farm of nearly 300 acres. The one invaluable thing on these pages is the autographs. Lamenting the absence of that of Capt. Jonathan we have those of all his sons and most of his neighbors. In working at a genealogical record one sometimes comes to feel as if the names that occur in such

frequency were about as mythical as those of the founders of that other country, once new,-Rome. But here you find yourself possessed of an interest you can hardly describe. You find that the very men of that seemingly far away time, once sat where you sit, handled the book you have before you, and wrote with their several hands the names that are under your eyes. If any of you who try it can escape without something of a feeling that you should put off your shoes from off your feet, you will have an experience different from At first I was inclined to be amused over the queer spelling and quaint book-keeping, but I soon learned better. I found that the men had to work with all their strength from daylight to dark to subdue the demons of the wilderness, and provide for their rapidly increasing families in all the various particulars heretofore mentioned, necessary in a new country. The women, too, without a tithe of the modern facilities for doing work, had not only to provide the daily meals, but to milk the cows, make the soap, provide the lights, spin the varn and weave and make up the fabrics for the family's need, but also to produce goods for the market and so help support the household. Everyone, great and small, had their energies taxed to the utmost in the struggle for existence. What time or facilities had they for education? It was 20 years after Captain Jonathan became a settler, before the first New Hartford school house was completed, all his children, except perhaps one, were then beyond school age. Not that educational fires were extinguished. They had, perforce, to smoulder, but they appeared whenever there was an opportunity. Some of the signatures to these balancing accounts are beautiful. Jos. Whiting Marsh, son of the pastor, was the first graduate of Yale college from New Hartford in 1763. No, instead of making merry over their defects, in a line which was not theirs at all, I stand with uncovered head before the men and women who, with heart and hand and brain, toiled year in and year out to lay the foundations upon which we have built, without which we could not be here, and which are so fruitful in blessings to us and those like us.

New Hartford had in 1756, 250 white inhabitants, in 1761, 674, in 1775 their number had increased to 1,001, and so it came about that in due course of time a second emigration set in, and from about 1780 there was a current that set strongly toward New York state and farther west. New Hartford, Oneida county, N. Y., was first

settled and named by the sons of the Connecticut New Hartford, and among the four families who left in large numbers for the west, the historian places the name of Marsh.

I find in "Sketches of New Hartford" by Capt. H. R. Jones, an invaluable pamphlet to which I am greatly indebted, a statement that as late as 1776, forty years after Capt. Jonathan settled in New Hartford, the only two carts on Town Hill, the central part of the town, were owned by the son and grandson of our pioneer. Sleds were used for farming purposes. In that year 25 acres of land were offered by Daniel Marsh, a New Hartford farmer, son of the minister, for one of these carts and refused. By the way, this New Hartford family holds to the name Jonathan with great tenacity. Jonathan, Ir., was 21 years old when he went with his father from the town where we are, his son Jonathan made the carts just referred to before he was 20 years of age, his son Jonathan was town clerk for a time before his early death, his grandson Jonathan, deaf and dumb from his second year, is now 73 years old and is with us to-day, his son Jonathan died aged 15 at the Deaf and Dumb asylum in this city and lately I had the pleasure of taking by the hand his grand-nephew Jonathan, a young gentleman in his fifth year,—all bearing the surname Marsh. Longevity has characterized this family. Captain Jonathan was 95 years old when, after his many toils, he entered into rest. The average age of his ten children was 81-3 years. Think of it! How many parallels are there? His sister Sarah, who also settled in New Hartford, scored 106 years. Several of his descendants have passed 90. The family was represented in the wars of 1776, 1812 and 1861. One lady writes me that her grandfather was in the war of the revolution, her father in that of 1812 and her brother in the war of the rebellion.

THE MARSH FAMILY.

This family have now held four annual gatherings. The last was held in the city of Hartford, Ct., Aug. 3d and 4th, 1887. The previous meetings were held at Lake Pleasant. in the town of Montague, Mass. These meetings have been attended by persons from the Canadian Dominion and various parts of the United States, and have elicited a very wide and growing interest. A very great amount of information as to persons of Marsh descent has been obtained, and still more is sought.

Mr. E. J. Marsh has published a volume of 200 pages, giving descendants of George Marsh, of Hingham, 1635. It is expected that Col. L. B. Marsh, of Boston, will publish an account of the descendants of John Marsh of Salem, 1633, this summer.

A pamphlet was published by the Association in 1886, giving an outline of the descendants for four generations, of six lines, viz., from John, of Salem, 1633; John, of Hartford, 1636; Samuel, of New Haven, 1646; Alexander, of Braintree, 1654; John, of Boston, 1669; William, of Plainfield, 1675. A few copies of this only are left. Price \$1.00 each. (None are left now.) The design of the pamphlet was to give and draw out information, and the result has been excellent. We have now thousands of names of Marsh descent whose line we can exactly trace for a period of two and a half centuries, and through seven, eight or nine generations. We wish that all persons of Marsh descent into whose hands this leaflet may come, would give us all the dates they can of the marriage, birth, death, and also items as to residence and migrations, and employments of their ancestors or children, and send to Col. The fifth annual gathering of the Marsh Family association of America, held at Y. M. C. A. Hall, Bridgeport, Ct., Sept. 5th and 6th, 1888, was not as fully attended as could be desired; but about 80 were present, mostly from Connecticut and Massachusetts, but some from New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Indiana and Long Island. In age they ranged from a few children of eight or ten years to the venerable Mansir W. Marsh of Belmont, now 88 years old.

Most of those present were on the shady side of life and their delight was to converse with each other on the subject of their genealogy. The chair was occupied by Col. Lucius B. Marsh of Boston, a fine looking man, with a clear voice, eye-glasses and iron-gray Burnsides. The secretary, J. Johnson of Greenfield, Mass., had a table at the president's right hand.

The first reunion was held at Lake Pleasant, in Massachusetts, July 23, 1884, the second and third were held at the same place, and the fourth at Hartford. The meeting this morning was opened with the singing of an original ode composed by Fanny Marsh of Binghamton, N. Y.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Dwight W. Marsh of Amherst, Mass., and a ringing address of welcome was made by E. W. Marsh, Esq., of this city, in substance as follows: "We extend to you a cordial welcome to the thriving and youthful city of Bridgeport. We hope while you are with us you may find opportunity to see for yourselves our busy city. We have three good sized parks which give us the name Park City, also numerous manufacturing establishments, advantageous railroad and water facilities for traffic of all kinds. We have good public schools, a fine public library, and an institute near Seaside Park for the special aid and improvement of women who are employees of the extensive corset factory of the Warner Brothers, a number of handsome private residences, and last, but not least, the headquarters of the Greatest Show on Earth, including its original, active, indefatigable and enterprising proprietor, P. T. Barnum, himself.

The Marsh family in Bridgeport now numbers some twenty families all of whom have become inhabitants of Bridgeport within a period of 33 years. Without boasting we may say that this portion of the family are an average at least of the goodly residents of our city. We claim to be honest, temperate, industrious, to pay our debts and take a part in the support of churches and the various public institutions of our city and we try to keep the name above reproach in the community. We have heretofore very little time or inclination to look after our ancestors and were we not here ourselves we might not be able to say that we ever had any. We shall be pleased to listen while some venerable Moses or commanding Joshua shall unroll the scroll of the past and exhibit to our vision a genealogical tree with the various branches thereto belonging, showing how the tribes that compose the Marsh family have spread over the land.

We shall be happy to know more than we do now about our fore-fathers. We rejoice that there are those who take great interest in these researches. We hope to hear from some of the tribe who visit us to-day and learn that we have an honorable ancestry; that they had a part and share in the formation of this free government."

President L. B. Marsh responded in a few well chosen remarks and reports of the secretary Mr. Johnson and the treasurer Edward B. Marsh of Amherst, were read.

Rev. D. W. Marsh of Amherst, the historian of the association, read an interesting paper on a "Lost Family."

The afternoon session was opened with singing "Come Ye Marshmen," an original ode by D. W. Marsh. music by Prof. John B. Marsh, of Elmira College, N. Y., and was followed by remarks by L. Milton Marsh of New York, secretary of the American S. S. Union, a descendant of John of Hartford, Ct., of 1636; William L. Marsh of Memphis, Tenn., a son of William of Goshen, Ct.; a letter from Alexander Marsh of Worcester, read by Riverius Marsh of New Brunswick, N. J.; a telegram from H. N. Marsh of Joliet, Ill.; "Absence enforced, but with you in spirit, Marshmen of the prairie to the tribes gathered at Bridgeport, send greeting and farewell;" and familiar talk by John E. Marsh of Hartford, with the story by the secretary of the origin and progress of the association; the whole interspersed with singing, made up the exercises of the afternoon.

The evening was devoted to social talk and the election of officers

for the coming year as follows: President, Col. L. B. Marsh of Boston; vice-presidents, Riverius Marsh of New Brunswick, N. J.; Charles E. Marsh, New Milford, Ct.; John E. Marsh of Hartford, Ct.; Horatio N. Marsh of Joliet, Ill.; Ephraim Gilmore of Chicago, Ill.; James A. Marsh of Cleveland, O.; Edward W. Marsh of Bridgeport, Ct.; Mansir W. Marsh of Belmont; William L. Marsh of Memphis, Tenn.; John Edward Marsh of New York, N. Y., and Philip B. Stiness of Providence, R. I.; secretary, J. Johnson, Greenfield, Mass.; treasurer, Edward B. Marsh, Amherst, Mass.; historian, Rev. Dwight W. Marsh, Amherst, Mass. It was voted to hold the next meeting at Newark, N. J., about Sept. 1, 1889.

The meeting was opened the morning of Sept. 6th with singing of odes followed by pleasant remarks by those present, including Thomas Marsh of Easton, Ct., aged 78, and Mansir W. Marsh of Belmont, Mass., aged 88. After a photograph had been taken, the happy meeting ended with singing a closing song by S. D. Marsh, to the tune of "America."

Was very prominent in town affairs being chairman of the board of selectmen of West Cambridge for many years. Was a member of the school committee and held

various other positions of trust and responsibility, besides representing his town in the legislature for one year. Upon the incorporation of the town of Belmont he became what might almost literally be termed the Town Father and held numerous positions being chairman of the selectmen for ten years. He was intensely patriotic and used his influence to the best of his ability at the time of the war of the rebellion, and sent two sons to the war both of whom lost their lives in the service of their country. In religion he was a Universalist and was a regular attendant on the church of that denomination in West Cambridge for many years, and was also superintendent of the Sunday school. He was always faithful and true to his trusts and a man of unswerving honesty and integrity. He was buried in the family lot at Arlington, "Camp Charles V. Marsh, Sons of Veterans," (named in honor of one of his sons) attending the funeral in a body.

The following "answer" was read at the Bridgeport meeting in 1888 and it was also sung at our last meeting in Hadley, Mass. Sept. 4, 1894:



At the age of 16 he entered a store and post office at Litchfield, Ct., where he remained 15 years, succeeding to the business and held the position of postmaster some six years, besides serving as deputy U. S. collector. He then accepted a position as trav-

eling salesman for a large New York importing firm, then for a period of nine years was secretary of the Ives Patent Lamp Company of New York, during which time he visited Europe on business. He was the inventor of library hanging lamps, later he started the New Jersey Lamp and Bronze Works and took out some twenty-five patents. Over two million of his patent faucets have already been sold, he is now President of the Marsh Manufacturing Co. of New Brunswick, N. J. and Manager of the Consolidated Gas Manufacturing Co. of New Jersey. He is active in Christian work and has helped to establish many Sunday schools through the talent system, for which he has furnished the necessary capital.

The sixth annual meeting was held at Newark, N. J. We have not space for its report, nor to give farther notice of later meetings of the association held at Amherst, Lake Pleasant and Hadley except the last. The result has been gratifying. Riverius Marsh was chosen president in 1893. In response to circulars and newspaper notices sent all over the land much information has been gathered. Some 15,000 names have been collected of the different tribes. In 1886 a pamphlet (now out of print) was published by the association giving five generations of six different families. In 1887, Mr. E. J. Marsh of Leominster, who had begun his work years before this association came into existence, published the descendants of George Marsh of Hingham, 1635. In 1888 Col. Lucius B. Marsh of Boston published the names of over 2,200 descendants of John Marsh of Salem, 1633.

And enough information has come in, in regard to descendants of Samuel of New Haven, 1643, (almost entirely collected by John Edward Marsh of Rahway, N. J.) Alexander of Braintree, 1654, John of Boston, 1669 and William of Plainfield, 1675, to warrant the publication of two or three more books of Marsh genealogy whenever members of these families will take hold of this work in earnest. Indeed this rather extended notice of the association is published here, including effort to give a representative photograph for each of the tribes, to stimulate further honor of our Marsh ancestry.

The following extracts from the Springfield *Republican* will give a glimpse of the ninth annual reunion at Hadley, Mass.:

Hadley was just the place to hold such a meeting, for ever since 1660 the family has been represented there. The town hall is built on land formerly owned by one of the John Marsh family. Daniel Marsh owned and his son Job lived on this spot and sold the place in 1743. J. Dwight Marsh of Hadley, who has been one of the prime movers in working up the history of this family, presided at vesterday's meetings, which were held morning and afternoon, and dinner was served under the trees on his ample grounds. Of course Rev. Dr. D. W. Marsh, the untiring historian of the family, was present and added much to the interest of the occasion by bits of history which he interspersed during the day. Secretary Johnson of Greenfield was present too. As he is a well-known antiquarian and became a Marsh through marriage, he had something of interest to say when facts were to be submitted. In the name of the old town J. D. Marsh welcomed the family to Hadley in the following address of welcome:

Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Marsh family association, kindred and friends of whatever name: -We have met here at our ninth annual meeting to cultivate a better acquaintance with each other and learn more of our ancestors. We have met before in the city and in the grove, each place more or less associated with the name of Marsh, and it is fitting that we meet here in Hadley. as here John Marsh of Hartford spent the last 28 years of his life and some of his descendants have made Hadley their home ever since; and in their name we bid you a cordial welcome. As you look about our town we cannot point you to palatial buildings or large manufactories, as Hadley was settled largely by farmers, selecting this spot as one eminently fitted for that purpose. It may have changed somewhat, as in the list for 1771, 112 years after the settlement of the town are 147 rateable polls, 88 dwelling houses and 25 tan houses, slaughter houses, etc. These have all disappeared and to-day Hadley ranks near the first of the towns in the state, in agricultural productions.

Did the minority in the church in Hartford, (seeking a place where they could be free from the dominion of Samuel Stone, and perhaps directed to this spot by their relatives in Northampton, who perhaps had some choice as to who their neighbors might be,) ascend Mt. Holyoke and look down on this beautiful valley, they saw not the view you see to-day of stately church spires, farm houses, broad streets lined with stately elm, meadows covered with their crops of varied hues, but even then it must have presented a picture of surpassing loveliness with the beautiful Connecticut river winding its serpentine way through these meadows, now hidden behind some knoll for a time, to come forth again still rolling on until, like a silver thread, it is lost in the hazy distance.

They laid out the town as one street 20 rods wide, with the river at each end, their plow land at the west, also enclosed by the river, disposing of every house-lot on the street. Such was Hadley for more than 50 years, when the children's children, wanting more room, began to build on the east side of the street we are now in, which was laid out like the first, 20 rods wide, and this corner lot on which now stands the town hall, meeting house and the old dwelling south of it, was granted to Daniel Marsh, and here his son Job lived, selling the place in 1743 to Josiah Pierce, and the old house stood until 1841 when it was removed to make room for this town hall. It is not my purpose to give you a history of this town, but I speak of this simply to show that this spot with others is associated with the name of Marsh and I will close by wishing that you all may derive both pleasure and profit from this meeting, and again we bid you a cordial welcome to this historic old town, the deeds of whose first settlers, though shrouded in mist and unwritten traditions, we will not let die. Some of you slept on the spot made memorable by the presence of the regicides who with their protectors, defied kingly power, and yet it was accounted unto them as a virtue. A spot called for more often by strangers than any other in town.

Dr. Marsh is preparing a history of the family, which will contain the names of 5,313 people. He has found much interesting data. An edition of 500 copies will be printed, and 120 of this edition has already been taken.

These officers were chosen at the afternoon session: President, Riverius Marsh of New Brunswick, N. J.; vice-presidents, J. Dwight Marsh, Charles E. Marsh of New Milford, Ct., Horatio N. Marsh of

Joliet, Ill., Ephraim Gilmore of Chicago, Ill., James A. Marsh of Cleveland, O., Edward W. Marsh and Sanford Marsh of Montague. John E. Marsh of Hartford, Ct.; secretary and treasurer, J. Johnson of Greenfield; historian, Rev. Dr. D. W. Marsh Amherst; executive committee, Riverius Marsh of New Brunswick, N. J., Charles A. Marsh of New York. Those attended the meeting registered their names from an inkstand which has been in the family since 1743, and it now belongs to J. D. Marsh. On the outside is cast these words: "A gift to the Rev. Mr: Marsh by Samuel Catlin, 1743." This was Rev. Elisha Marsh. who lived in Westminster, Mass., at the time, and was subsequently a judge in the New Hampshire courts. The oldest person to use the inkstand yesterday was Mrs. Lois Marsh of North Amherst, who is 82 years old. The following, among others, signed their names to the book of records: John E. Marsh of Hartford, Sanford Marsh of Montague, J. Dwight Marsh of Hadley, Vernet E. Cleveland of Hartford, Lucretia P. Marsh of this city, Julia M. Harrison of New Haven, Lucy R. Marsh of this city, Lois Marsh of North Amherst, Mrs. Austin B. Marsh of Amherst, Mrs. Mary L. Morgan of this city.

The line of James Richardson^s Marsh of the Salem Branch is as follows:

John¹ Marshe took oath of allegiance in England, March 24, 1633-4, came to New England the same year, was allotted 30 acres of land in Salem, Mass., 20 in 1637 and 10 in 1638; m. in 1635 or 6, Susannah, dau. of Rev. The church building was put up in 1636 or 7 and John Marshe's eleven children were baptized there. The name is always Marshe in Salem records.

- 3. Jonathan³, b. at Danvers, Mass., April 14. 1672; wounded at the ferry, Haverhill, Mass., in the Indian fight 1708; m. (1) May 20, 1697, Mary Verry, b. 1668.

- 5. Samuel⁵, b. probably at Sutton, Mass., in 1738; m. about 1762, Rebekah Wilder, b. 1744.

The widow was robbed by her husband's partners and the robbers after that, "never had anything but misfortune and ruin." The widow was forced to resort to factory work and to pay quite a sum to settle the estate.
- 8. James Richardson's Marsh, b. at Cavendish, Vt., Feb. 1, 1839, had some bitter experience that at times comes to the fatherless. He lived with his mother's father in Sharon and West Woodstock, Vt., then in 1849-50 on a farm in North Bridgewater, Vt., then three years of hard life in a cigar manufactory at New Ipswich, N. H., "15 hours a day's work," with "board and a few clothes," then a year in the Empire hotel at Saratoga Springs. His mother, March 4, 1853 m. Samuel C. Patrick, tobacconist, of Lowell, Mass., and Oct. 16, 1854, J. R. Marsh "arrived home" and for 40 years since has lived with and been associated in business with Mr. Patrick. Sept. 24, 1879, J. R. Marsh was made a Mason in William North lodge of Lowell, Mass. and Feb. 14, 1881, made a Royal Arch Mason in Mt. Horeb Chapter; June 27, 1881, Ahasuerus Council; and June 28, 1881, Pilgrim Commandery of Knights Templar; and in Boston, April 28, 1882, Massachusetts Consistory of 32d Degree Scottish Rite Masons for the Northern Jurisdiction of the U.S. of America and Sept. 15, 1887 a Noble of Aleppo Temple of Boston, Mass. Residence No. 25, Prescott St., Lowell, Mass.

HISTORY OF THIS BOOK.

When the Marsh family association was first formed we designed to put all of Marsh name into one work. But at our first meeting it appeared that Mr. E. J. Marsh of Leominster, Mass., had the descendants of George Marsh of Hingham 1635, all ready for the press and to be published in 1887. Also names multiplied upon us so fast that in a year or two we found that it would be entirely impracticable to compress the account of the six remaining tribes into one or two volumes; and that the association could not publish a volume for each separate tribe. Publication of each book must be left to members of that particular tribe. Accordingly Col. L. B. Marsh, who in 1888 was our President, published in that year the history of his tribe, John Marsh of Salem 1633 and his descendants.

Mainly by generous aid of Col. Marsh the descendants of Alexander of Braintree, 1654, John of Boston, 1669 and William of Plainfield, 1675, were put in readiness for publication by the historian. No one yet appears from those tribes ready to take the risk of publication.

Up to 1893 the state of this John of Hartford work was very much the same. Col. Marsh had very generously aided us up to the point of publication, although it was not in his line. And also entirely unsolicited, John Edward Marsh of N. Y. City and Rahway, N. J. (whose work is very largely upon his own line, Samuel of New Haven, 1646) offered to give \$100 whenever the John of Hartford book should be published. The historian had tried to find some one of the Hartford line ready to go forward. He had written to a friend stating the case fully and offering to share half the expense, but met with no response. Finally in 1893, seeing no better way, he concluded to go forward himself and sent out the following circular, reproduced here with very slight additions and correction. The use

of the name of the Marsh association was fully warranted by repeated votes of that body. How could men and women scattered all over America know whether your historian was trustworthy? Some guarantee was due. No doubt *some* of the following circulars went promptly to the waste basket. But others brought a fair response.

THE MARSH FAMILY ASSOCIATION.

Col. L. B. Marsh of Boston, President.

To you, a descendant of John Marsh of Hartford 1636: a notice and a request.

By the long researches of John E. Marsh, Esq., of Hartford, Ct., p. 87, and J. Dwight Marsh, Esq., of Hadley, Mass., p. 373, (who in their family ancestry have represented John Marsh in the two places of his life residence, ever since 1636 and 1660) and by the very liberal aid of two gentlemen of Boston and New York of the Salem and the New Haven lines, the historian of the association has brought the genealogy of our Hartford branch to the point of publication, and now asks your help.

He is able to inform you that the names of several thousand descendants of our common ancestor John Marsh have been obtained, with very valuable information as to their residences, occupations and personal history. We can trace the main family currents as they have been flowing on for over 250 years. We note the inter-marriages with other most excellent families, bringing in and giving out valuable traits to enrich and enlarge family experience and outlook.

Among blood-descendants of John Marsh, one, Frances Appleton, p. 419, inspired Longfellow's Hyperion, and became his wife and the

mother of his children. Another, Susan Marsh Lyman, p. 159, became the wife of Senator Edmunds. One, Mary Marsh, marrying Dr. Ezekiel Porter, p. 353, at his death, in 1775, asserted her woman's right to do what she could, took up his practice, rode his circuits, and became a noted physician. Her energy flowed on to her grandson, Capt. Belden, p. 354, who was for a time on Washington's staff. The son of Eunice Marsh, p. 424, became Maj. Gen. Larned, Paymaster U. S. Army.

Several have had to do with the making and shaping of states. Colonels Joseph, p. 132 and Joel Marsh, p. 184, were of the State Commissioners to name Vermont. Hon. Jonathan Marsh, p. 196, in 1818, was a member of the convention to form the present Constitution of Connecticut. Joseph Marsh, p. 132, for years a colonel of the revolutionary war, and judge, became the first Lieut. Governor of Vermont; and when the state gave an entire township, declined it, saying that the state had more need of it than he.

Col. Joseph Marsh led a regiment to Ticonderoga. Molly Marsh, dau. of Col. Ebenezer, p. 29, was mother of U. S. Senator Seymour of Vermont, and her grandson, Horatio Seymour, p. 33, became Governor of the State of New York, and his sister the wife of Sen. Conkling, p. 34.

Henry R. Selden, p. 355, Lieut. Governor of New York state, and his not less distinguished brother, Samuel Lee Selden, p. 355, both judges of the New York Court of Appeals, were descended from Hannah Marsh, p. 354. So was the wife of Maj.-Gen. Eaton, and her son Prof. Eaton, p. 356, of Yale. Hon. Richard Skinner, LL. D., p. 71, son of Susannah Marsh became Chief Justice and also Governor of Vermont.

Gen. Isaac Marsh, p. 322, of Stockbridge, Mass. bought a Vermont town of the Stockbridge Indians and named it Marshfield. George Marsh, p. 53, laid out and named Marshfield, Ohio.

B. L. Marsh, and Charles Marsh, p. 352, brothers of the firm of Jordan, Marsh & Co. of Boston, are well known as prominent among our largest merchants and most successful business men.

Our original John Marsh was a pioneer of Hartford, Ct. and Hadley, Mass. Some of his grandsons were pioneers of Litchfield, New Hartford and Lebanon, Ct., and of Ware, Sunderland, Montague, Mass., and some of the later generations became pioneers in Berkshire and in Vermont, New York and other states.

Other descendants of our Hartford John Marsh are U. S. Senator Samuel S. Phelps, p. 31, of Vermont, and his son Edward J. Phelps, p. 31, late minister of the United States to England, Charles Marsh, p. 153, of Vermont, M. C., LL. D., and a trustee of Dartmouth College for forty years: and his more distinguished son, George P. Marsh, p. 155, M. C., Minister to Constantinople and to Italy.

Joseph and Leonard Marsh, p. 151, were Professors in the University of Vermont; C. Dwight Marsh, p. 374, is Professor at Ripon College, Wis.; Allan Marquand, p. 447, is Professor at Princeton; Herbert Osborn, p. 270, is Professor at Ames, Iowa, and James Marsh, p. 149, was Professor at Hampden-Sidney College, Va., and President of the University of Vermont. Worthington Smith, p. 306, descended from Ann Marsh, was also President of the University of Vermont.

Dr. Jonathan, p. 356, and Dr. Perez Marsh, p. 403, were surgeons in the French war of 1755. We have also Gen. Isaac Marsh of Connecticut. Ebenezer, p. 29, and Perez Marsh, after his French war experience, were long judges in Litchfield County, Ct. and Berkshire County, Mass. A descendant of the latter was Thomas Allen, p. 445, M. C. of Missouri. One of his sisters married Judge Benjamin R. Curtis of Boston, p. 444, and another, Henry G. Marquand, p. 447, of New York.

Lieut. Col. C. W. Marsh, p. 457, was for some time on Gen. Schofield's staff at St. Louis. Henry Marsh, Williams College 1815, of Dalton and Pittsfield, Mass. p 448, for a time of Racine, Wis., Sandusky, O., and St. Louis, was the fourth person to graduate at Harvard Law School, was a lawyer, manufacturer and merchant, and had he not died of cholera at the age of 55, would have left deeper marks of his untiring energy.

Several of John Marsh's descendants have resided in foreign lands. Some are buried by the Tigris, p. 457, and one in South Africa, p. 250. Some live in England, p. 419, and many have gone West and South. In the distant state "where rolls the Oregan," Joseph Walker Marsh, p. 151, is Professor and Sidney Harper Marsh, p. 150, has been President of the Pacific University.

How can we help feeling some interest in this our broad-spread common family!

I have given mention of a few, not of Marsh name, into whose veins blood of John Marsh has been inflowing. I can give names of

more than one hundred early colonial families some of whose life blood has been poured into our Marsh family. Pardon a few. From Hartford Colony, Webster, Wadsworth, Welles, Clarke, Hooker, Goodwin, Chester, Newberry, Buell, Pratt, Pitkin, Lewis, Trumbull, Bulkley, Spencer, Talcott, Merrill, Seymour, Loomis and many others; from Plymouth Rock, Bradford, Carpenter, and LeBaron; from the Bay State, Pynchon, Stoddard, Winthrop, Adams, Porter, Whitney, Dwight, Lawrence, Hawley, Williams, Holyoke, Edwards, Mattoon, Hoar, Gillett, Lyman, Montague, Smith, Barnard, Willard and many others.

In closing the introductory pages of this work I must not fail to express my indebtedness to the most expert genealogist whom I have personally known, Dr. D. Williams Patterson of Newark Valley, Tioga Co., N. Y.

In my three years' residence at Pittsfield, Mass., among numerous descendants of Dr. Perez Marsh and four years in St. Louis among others, and then two years in New York City where his descendants were still more numerous, by 1849 I had come to know many personally and to make out a list of some 400 descendants of my greatgrandfather. But it was not till more than twenty years later when I met Dr. Patterson that I knew anything about my Marsh ancestry beyond Dr. Perez.

While at Owego, N. Y., 1871—76, one day in Newark Valley the wise Dr. took me into his den, and my eyes opened upon stacks of manuscript and the four walls crowded with more genealogical works than I have ever seen together, before or since, except in the Genealogical rooms at Boston. Out of the many volumes the Dr. took down the Hadley Book and introduced me to my great grandfather's great grandfather and all the Hadley line down to Perez. It was a new world. That revelation gave me my first strong genealogical impulse.

In later study I have found that the Hadley Book knows nothing of the return of John Marsh's oldest son to Hartford and gives none of his descendants, although names of this oldest branch fill nearly half of this volume.

In the last decade Dr. Patterson has written to me from his home and during his travels in Connecticut and once turned aside to visit me here in Amherst, giving me highly valuable information, advice and help.

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John Marsh of Hartford and Hadley.

Born in England in 1618 he is believed to have come in 1635 when 17 years of age to Cambridge on Charles river by the bay, then laid out for the capital of Massachusetts, and called Newtown, and now included in the "greater Boston." According to Barber he was of the 100 men, women and children who in 1636 led by Hooker, Stone and Elder Goodwin took two weeks to make the journey with a herd of 160 cattle from Massachusetts Bay through a pathless wilderness to the beautiful shores of the Connecticut river. They emerged from the forest at the Indian town of Suckige, with much cleared land about it, now Hartford, the elegant capital of a noble and busy state. The cleared land was soon given to the "original proprietors." The name of John Marsh is found on the fine shaft erected at Hartford to the memory of these earliest settlers. This shaft stands in Hartford's oldest burial ground by the Central Church, "God's acre." His name is also on Hartford's earliest map of 1640, which gives with their names the home lots of the earliest settlers. was a minor his home lot was probably not given him until he was 21, in 1639; for we read "Lands were recorded to John Marsh Feb., 1639-40 part whereof did belong to John Stone and were by him given to Samuel Stone and by said Stone to John Marsh of Hartford and now belongeth to him and his heirs." Also, "Thomas Beale had an allotment of lands sequestered for him, but he did not come to Hartford and they were given to John Marsh before Feb., 1639-40." One or both of these lots, 12 and 24 acres, making 36, made John Marsh's homelot. This lot was number 16 on the north side of the stream that now runs through Bushnell Park, and on the street then nearest the Connecticut river, where Temple and Front streets now He not long after came to have 767ths acres additional; in

the distribution to "original proprietors" of common lands at the West end. Later he had also 72 acres allotted to him, at now East Hartford, just across the river.

We naturally think of his life in three parts:

- 1. Up to his 18th year, 1618–1636, his English life of 17 years and then one year of sea and land before reaching Hartford.
- 2. Twenty-four years of Hartford life, from his 18th to 42d year, 1636 to 1660.
- 3. Twenty-eight years of Hadley life, from his 42d to his 70th year, 1660 to 1688.

His parting from England, the voyage across the Atlantic, the passing into Massachusetts Bay and Charles river, the stay at Cambridge and the plunge through pathless forests, must have stamped upon his young mind, life-long impression.

Of his English boyhood and of his parentage we know nothing. He doubtless came from Essex Co., Eng. for almost all Hartford's earliest settlers and their celebrated pastor Hooker came from Braintree, Essex Co., and John Marsh had a brother Joseph Marsh, clothier, of Braintree, and that Joseph Marsh had a "kinsman Joseph Marsh." He also had three sisters in England and the daughter of one of his sisters came, later on, to live in London. John was no doubt familiar with the games and sports of English life and may possibly have seen London. He had heard of Shakespeare who died, (1616) two years before he, John Marsh, was born. During our ancestor's boyhood Hampden was stirring the English heart and Cromwell about to be. Charles I. had moved many excellent men to leave England. John may have run away to the new world, or have been apprenticed to some one of the more important Hartford families, possibly to Webster's into which family he married after a few years.

"John Webster was a leading citizen of Hartford; one of the 5 higher magistrates in 1639—holding office till 1655, when he became Deputy Governor, and after serving as Governor in 1656, resuming his office of High Magistrate and holding it till 1659," when he left Hartford. (Memorial Hist. Hartford Co.) Gov. Webster then led the great removal to Hadley, Massachusetts.

Our artist was not in Hartford when Hartford troops in 1637 under Col. Mason moved swiftly eastward and almost exterminated the Pequods with horrible fire and sword, but every Hartford boy and young man there and John Marsh among them, grew familiar with sights of friendly Indians under the forest trees and with wild stories of the tomahawk and scalping knife of hostile braves.

The ever-surviving story in genealogical study of "Three Brothers came over" does not willingly die in any family tradition, and it pops up, as to John Marsh, asking if he was not brother or son of some other Marsh who came over between 1633 and 1675. He might have been cousin but he could not have been brother or son of John of Salem, 1633, nor in any close relation to William of Plainfield, 1675, nor to John of Boston, 1669. He might have been a first or second cousin to Samuel of New Haven, 1643, or to George of Hingham, 1635, who was possibly uncle to Alexander of Braintree, 1654. But the terms of the will of his brother Joseph Marsh who died in Braintree, Eng. in 1676, seem to exclude by non-mention, the idea that Joseph had in America any brother but John of Hartford. So far as similar names would show he might have been related to the New Haven family. But so far as we positively know, John Marsh when he came had not a relative of Marsh name in America. We are not surprised that in less than five years, he took steps to have another assume his name and come to his side and these lines tell rather more of detail about it than we can absolutely affirm and they close with a question which we would be glad to have any one answer.

1635. John Marsh, 17—Anne, a rosy girl of 14.

From England's sea-girt land
Through God's high guiding hand
The Exmen sailed.
They laughed at Ocean's roar,
They sought a broader shore,
And here forevermore
They freedom hailed.

John Marsh sailed out with them,
Those dauntless Essex men.
Bold hearts and strong!
From home he dared to start,
From England chose to part,
A secret filled his heart,
And drew him on.

1640. John, 22—Anne, abt. 19.
By Hartford's river-flow,
You see them moving slow
At even tide,
A start! with half surprise!
A smile, of listening skies!
A droop, of tell-tale eyes,
A "yes," replied.

Did Hooker bid them stand,
Great "light of Western Land"
And tie the knot?
Or Webster knit them one,
Then call her John "my son"?
Some how, this deed was done,
And how forgot.

This was 252 years ago and our reporter not there. John's twenty-four years of Hartford life, from his 19th to his 43d year must have been full of growth in that new environment of rich experiences and fresh clashings of wits and wills. We know little of details. He was on a Hartford jury 1649 and chimney viewer 1657. He must have kept on contrasting two worlds of woods and waters; two Englands, old and new; two races, Anglo Saxon and Indian; and that in a focus of high thought, the capital of a colony. Hooker was as profound a mind as ever came from England to our shores; held in high esteem by the foremost in England and almost idolized here as "the light of the western churches." Since all were expected to attend religious services, John Marsh no doubt heard his Pastor Hooker's famous lecture, Thursday, May 1, 1638, whose principles lie at the foundation of our government. The text was Deut. 1: 13, "Take ye wise men" etc., the "Doctrine:"

- 1. That the choice of public magistrates belongs unto the people by God's own allowance.
- 2. The privilege of election, which belongs to the people, therefore must not be exercised according to their humors, but according to the blessed will and law of God.
- 3. They who have power to appoint officers and magistrates, it is in their power also to set the bounds and limitations of the power and place to which they call them.

Reason 1. Because the foundation of authority is laid firstly in the free consent of the people."

Hooker died July 7, 1647 "in epidemical sickness that prevailed throughout New England." John Marsh was therefore, 1636–1647, for eleven years under Hooker's pastorate and we think sometimes heard discussions and comments by such men as Winthrop, Elder Goodwin, Gov. Webster and Sec. Daniel Clarke. He saw by the great men "high magistrates" supposed witches tried; and heard one or two sentenced to death. The "Joseph Marsh" called to testify in one witch case in 1662 was possibly his third son and if so a lad of fifteen. But these dismal trials, like the early Pequod slaughter, were very exceptional. In general, life flowed on as placidly as the noble river by whose banks John Marsh's homestead lay. At that early home, all but one of his children were born. He had fair lands there at Hartford on each side of the Connecticut. His family grew and he prospered.

He signed as a "withdrawer" from the 1st church Hartford, July 11, 1656. The change from Hartford to Hadley, Mass., some 40 miles above on the same river, was brought about by two fundamental causes. One was, (when the Hartford hive became too crowded) the natural swarming tendency to "fresh fields and pastures new." The other, in the struggles of free thought, was the natural breaking away, even among warm friends, of the slightly more democratic from the slightly more aristocratic. The followers of Hooker, who was in advance of his age, tended to go with Gov. Webster and Elder Goodwin. John Marsh was of those who in their letter of March 12, 1656, refused longer to recognize Mr. Stone and called for an able and impartial mutual council. His name is attached to all the documents calling for greater freedom in removal from Hartford and in 1659-60 a large party moved up the river through the gorge between Holyoke and Tom, secured from Indians the broad river meadows and lands lying back and formed the new town of Hadley. At the time of this migration in 1660 John Marsh was 42, his wife Anne probably a little younger, their oldest son, John about 17, Samuel about 15, Joseph if living 13, (he probably died before marriage), Jonathan 11, Daniel 7, Hannah perhaps 9 or 5, and Grace perhaps 5 or 3.

The third period of John Marsh's life was almost entirely connected with Hadley, 28 years of fruitage and harvest time, 1660 to 1688, from his 42d to his 70th year. The names of John Webster

and John Marsh appear on the first town plot of Hadley as on that of Hartford and also on Hadley's first town meeting records Oct. 8, 1660. By vote Hartford in 1660 gave the Jews who lived in John Marsh's house liberty to stay seven months. He was no doubt in Hadley. And yet he had rather mysterious connection with Northampton. He was one of the original members of the church there at its organization June 18, 1661, and in a list in 1891 of over 4250 members of the Northampton church his name is second of all. The following comes from J. Dwight Marsh's search of Hadley town writings: "The first notice of John Marsh, which I find in the Hadley records, is at the first town meeting held at Warner's house, Oct. 8th, 1660, "Agreed that Jo Marsh hath his house lot with his father, Mr. Webster, of Mr. Webster's, and he to have eight acres allowed for it within the fence, and he to come up at spring next." They had cast lots for their land in Feb. of 1660, and Mr. Webster drew No. 19, and John Marsh No. 34. I think he came up in 1661, as in December John Marsh and Will Webster engage for Robt. Webster. He has his lands recorded the 19th of June, 1674, as John Marsh, Sen. In 1675, John Marsh was one of the Selectmen. This is the only time I find his name as a town officer, while the names of his sons, Jonathan and Daniel, recorded first as Jonathan and Daniel, and then as Lieut. Jonathan and Sergt. Daniel, and lastly as Mr., which title they have on their tombstones, are on every page of Hadley history from 1682 to 1715."

At the threshold of John Marsh's Hadley life he met with two bitter experiences, one the death of his father-in-law, Gov. John Webster, April 5, 1661; a great loss to his children and to Hadley. Noah Webster of spelling book and dictionary fame, was Gov. Webster's most distinguished descendant: but his two Hadley sons were not thrifty and much needed a father's care, so that John Marsh rather than they, came to represent their father. Indeed the widow of one of Webster's sons had the gift of a lot from the town, and suffered severely under charge of witchcraft.

The other trial, the following year, June 9, 1662, was the death of his wife Anne (Webster) Marsh, who had been his delight for twenty-two years, and yet now her sun went down at mid-day.

A flock of motherless children was about him, and after two years he married, in 1664, Hepzibah (Ford) Lyman, daughter of Thomas

Ford and widow of Richard Lyman who had been from the first one of the most prominent men in Northampton. She had five Lyman children of ages not far from those of his own. The skies brightened for the two families, and two years later in 1666 his son John Marsh, aged about 23, married his new wife's daughter, Sarah Lyman. Soon after, the young couple moved to Hartford and lived in the old Marsh homestead all their lives of many years.

And as happy years passed on, John Marsh enjoyed the marriage and settlement of all but the youngest one of his adult children and the birth of 39 of his 55 grandchildren. His children settled at Hartford, Windsor, Northampton, Hadley and Hatfield; all upon the beautiful river along whose banks he had lived and traveled for 52 years. Of these 52 years 22 had been spent with his first wife and 19 with his second. Of Richard Lyman, Savage prints "Hed. June 3, 1662 and his widow m. John Marsh of Hadley who thereupon removed to Northampton." He may have lived a year or two in Northampton; but of this there is yet no certainty. He was selectman of Hadley in 1675. That year was and is memorable in Hadley history and tradition. Also to John Marsh and many of his descendants that year and the following were memorable by the singular way in which wives were provided for two of his sons. The Indians did Aug. 5, 1675, Dorcas Dickinson lost her husband Azariah "slain in Swamp fight" and next year she married Jonathan Marsh. Hannah (Lewis) Crow, lost her husband, Samuel Crow, "slain in Falls fight May 18, 1676" and your historian finds and makes note that she married his ancestor, Daniel Marsh, in less than six months, Nov. 5, 1676. Be not quick to condemn the haste of those wise They knew the facts of battle where we have mingled fact Do as you please about all mere tradition but read and accept all facts. Indians surely were very troublesome at Hadley in 1675 and Goffe after the accession of Charles II. was hid there, and tradition says that one Sunday he helped fight the Indians. You can believe or doubt it. Josiah Dwight Marsh, Esq., of Hadley whose entire ancestry and his own family from 1660 to 1894 have lived at, or within half a mile of John Marsh's Hadley home lot, in an address to the Marsh Family Association states the case fairly.

"In my house I have a picture representing Hadley attacked by the Indians in 1675, and the majestic figure of Goffe standing in the

foreground rallying the panic stricken inhabitants. But, says the historian of to-day, "all tradition; no Indians nearer Hadley than Deerfield that day." I have looked at the records of the town of that time and find that it was a time of great trouble for fear of the enemy, as they call them. Votes were passed that the fortifications be strengthened; brush be cut down in all home lots, so as not to be a hiding place for the enemy; that no less than 40, or more than 50 men should go outside the fortifications to gather the crops in the . meadows, and they should dispose themselves in the best manner for protection; and that all males over 16 go armed to church. A garrison was kept there in the winter of 1675 and summer of 1676. Had the Indians been successful, as at Deerfield, and Goffe been tomahawked, there would have been no need of secresy, but I notice that Goffe was on the winning side, in his public acts, whether as one of the judges of Charles I. or in a sword contest in Boston or New Haven, or fighting the Indians in Hadley; and to have published the story at that time would have been death to protectors as well as the protected. Now Peter Tilton, one of the protectors, was a very modest man, and would naturally object to that way of being taken off. I notice that in recording the list of Selectmen for the town, while giving every other man his full title as Capt., Lieut., Sergt., Cornet, etc., he would write his own name last, and simply as P. T., although entitled to more titles than any other man in town.

The Rev. Samuel Hopkins, writing in 1793 to President Stiles of New Haven, speaks of the tradition in the family of the Marshes; John Marsh being one of the Selectmen in 1674 would know the facts in the case, and thus very likely the tradition would be handed down in the family. And President Stiles speaks of meeting in Wethersfield a Mrs. Porter, a sensible and judicious woman, a daughter of Ebenezer Marsh, born next door to Peter Tilton's, and of her story in relation to the judges. Thus the Marshes are brought in for their share in these traditions." The historian of this family thinks rather approvingly of the undoubted fact that Hannah Lewis married Daniel Marsh and so became his foremother, because her first husband was slain by the Indians.

Hepzibah (Ford) (Lyman) Marsh died April 11, 1683. Her will made in 1677, was presented (to probate court, Northampton, Mass.) in March, 1684. It gives to her Lyman children, Richard, Thomas,

John, Hannah and Sarah (Lyman) Marsh, £10 each, and to her daughter Lydia Marsh £20. This was the daughter of John Marsh and Hepzibah (Lyman) Marsh born Oct. 9, 1667, making her age about ten when her mother's will was drawn, and less than $15\frac{1}{2}$ at the time of her mother's death. Hepzibah Marsh's will proves that she lived in Hadley. It is found in the Probate court records at Northampton and commences:

"I Hepzibah Lyman alias Marsh, of Hadley in ye county of Hampshire, being weak and crazy in body, yet through the blessing and good hand of God on me in perfect memory and sound understanding yet knowing not the day of my departure out of this troublesome world" etc.

"As for my soule, that I commit to God that gave it to me and to Jesus Christ wch I hope hath redeemed it and to ye holy spirit wch I hope through Grace hath sanctified it. As for my body that I commit to ye grave to be buried in a Comely and decent manner, there to rest till ye gen Ressurrection wn though sown in corruption [it] shall I hope be raised in glory, and soule and body being united togeather shall immediately pass into glory."

After willing her property she gives motherly advice: "Giving to him and to ye rest of my children solemn and strict charges yt they walk in peace and unitie one with another but above all yt they walk in ye feare of the Lord attending diligently in ye way of all God's appointments for ye making sure and working out their own salvation with fear and trembling."

J. D. Marsh has copied for us John Marsh's will. He writes: "The next time I find John Marsh's name is in the Probate office at Northampton, March 3d, 1687-8.

JOHN MARSH'S WILL.

"A true copy of the last will and testament of John Marsh of Hadley, who dyed at Windsor, presented at the Court at Northampton, the 4th of December, 1688.

I, John Marsh, of Hadley, in the county of Hampshire, in New England, being very sensible of mine own frailty and mortality, yet through the mercy of God, of sound mind and memory at present, doe make this my last will and Testament as follows: I commit my selfe soule and body into the hands of the Almighty and Eternal God whose I am, and into the arms of my Dear-Redeemer the Lord Jesus Christ, in whom I desire steadfastly to belong,

and on whom do repose and rest alone for righteousness. life and salvation, leaving my body to be interred with a comely burial.

And for the outward estate the Lord hath blessed me withal, my will is, that after my just debts are paid. and funeral expenses discharged, that then

I give to my son, John Marsh, ffive pounds.

I give to my son, Jonathan Marsh, all my Gold.

I give to my son, Daniel Marsh, my two Cob Irons.

I give to my daughter, Hannah Loomis, alias Marsh, thirty pounds, unless I pay a part of it before my decease, n'th, if so then so much shall be discounted from the Legacy.

I give to my son, Samuel Marsh all my lands within the township of Hadley.

I give to my daughter, Lydia Marsh, my green Rug.

I give to my grandson Baker, of Northampton, ffive pounds, when he shall attayne to the age of one and twenty years.

I give and bequeath to my daughter, Lydia Marsh, twenty pounds.

And all said Legacies, my will is. that my Executors see faithfully discharged. And I do constitute and appoint my loving sons, John Marsh and Samuel Marsh, to be Executors to this my will annulling and making voide all former wills at any time by me willed or bequeathed.

Sealed and subscribed in the presence of

THOMAS HOVEY, THOMAS HEAD."

There can be no question that John Marsh in 1688 was "of Hadley" and not of Northampton or Hartford, and as to the place of his death, that it was Windsor, Conn. where his daughter Hannah (Marsh) Loomis then lived. Stiles in Hist. Windsor gives the date as "28, Sept. 1688, æ. 70." It is proper to add that our kinsman J. Dwight Marsh, Esq. of Hadley, who has taken great pains to get facts, thinks that his death at Windsor later than September was "probably in *November* 1688" and is inclined to this belief by the lateness of the following inventories, but that would make both the "28" and the "Sept." wrong.

We note by his will and these inventories that his property was mainly given away before his death.

Allsoe in that tract of land called plane two Akars two roodes twenty six rod and two thirds of a rod which is in consideration of the remainder of his house lott as it lyes bounded.

Allsoe more in the plane two Akars one roode and fifteene pole more or less bounded By the land Granted to robert boltwood west Abutting on a highway South and the adjoining ffurlong North.

Allsoe in the ffirst division of plowland in the Great meddow one parcell containing three Akars more or lefse bounded by the land Sometime Granted to Mr. John webster East and richard Churches land west Abutting on two highways North and South.

Allsoe in the meddow aforesaid one parcell more containing ffoure Akars more or lefse proportioned at one Hundred fortye and one rod to an Akar as it lyes bounded by the land of Timothye Nash East and Samuell Gardiner Sen' west abutting on a high waye north and the adjoining ffurlong South in bredth eleven rod and one flifth of a rod and a little better.

Allsoe in the ffort meddowe one parcell containing ffive Akars more or less proportioned at one Hundred and ninetye rod to an Akar as it lyes bounded by the land of Thomas dickinson South and Sam¹ moodies land and ye banke North abutting on the Great river west and the swampe East. Allsoe in the meddow called Hockanum one parcell containing ffoure Akars one roode and thirtye three pole more or lefse as it is proportioned at three roodes to an Akare bounded by the land Granted to Andrew bacon Nor'east and Jn° Crowe Sou'west abutting on the river Nor'west and the lotts running up the mountaine Southeast in bredth ffive rod and 4-10 of a rod: Allsoe over the river in Great pansett one parcell containing three Akars and one roode bounded by the land Granted to Mr. william westwood easterlye and Joseph baldwin westerlye. Abutting on the river Southerlye and a highwaye northerlye in bredth ffive rod and 1-2.

Allsoe in litle pansett meddow one parcell two Akars and three roodes more or lefse proportioned at one Hundred and ffourtye rod to an Akar bounded by the land Granted to Joseph Fellong easterlye and Adam Nicholls Westerlye Abutting on the river Southerlye and the bank Northerlye In bredth ffoure rod.

All and every of which parcells of land lyeing and being within the bounds of the townshipp of Hadley with all the apurtenances and priviledges to all and every of whom belong the aforesaid towne of Hadley have ffreelye given to the said John marsh his heires executors and Afsigns fforever to have and to hould the same without any lett or molestation ffrom the s^d Towne or any other Claiming by ffrom or under them—

The following document from records in the office of the Secretary of State of Conn. of date May 15, 1705, shows who were the then living children of John Marsh and also gives light as to his sisters and brother in England.

"John Marsh Heirs: Letters of attorney to Joseph Merrian and Mr. Allyn Buckham in England. To all people to whom these presents shall come: We, John Marsh, Samuel Marsh, Jonathan Marsh, Daniel Marsh, Hannah Marsh, Lydia Marsh and Grace Phelps, seven of the nephews and nieces of Joseph Marsh the older of late of Braintree in the county of Essex, clothier, deceased, residing in New England, Send greeting in our Lord God Everlasting.

Whereas the said Joseph Marsh the older, the Testator, in and by his last will and Testament, in writing bearing date on or about the two and twentieth day of May, Anno Domini one thousand six hundred seventy and six, did (amongst other things) give, bequeath, demise and appoint in those words or in words to the effect following (viz.) Item: I give and bequeath my free-hold lands and tenements lying in Braintree, called by the name of Clay

Hills, or by any other name or names whatsoever, now in the occupation of John Harris, unto my Sister Grace Tyres during the term of her natural life, and after [her] decease my will is that my said Freehold Lands be sold by my executors and trustees within one year after her decease and the money arising thereof be equally divided among my sister Shorey's two sons and my brother John Marsh's children, and my sister Martin's children, excepting sixty pounds to the Executors and Possessors in trust for funeral expenses and other charges, and as for my personal estate I give and bequeath to my Executors and Executrix only my wearing apparel to John Shorey and forty shillings to the poor in Braintree to be paid within three months after my decease at the discretion of mine Executor or Executrix hereinafter named. and I do hereby nominate [and] appoint my well beloved sister Grace Tyres Executrix and my kinsman Joseph Marsh Executor of this my last will and testament and I do request my loving friends Richard Thurlow of Cambridge, Folmonger, Nathaniel Tyres, my brother-in-law, and William Ward of Tawling. Possessors in trust and overseers, to see this my last will and testament performed as by the said will, relation being thereunto had, may appear.

And whereas the said Grace Tyres died about the fifteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand six hundred ninety and six, the said Richard Thurlow, Nathaniel Tyres and Wm. Ward being also dead, and whereas by a decretal order made in the court of Exchequer Chamber at Westminister on Thursday the seven and twentieth day of June in the twelfth year of the King, our late sovereighn Lord the King William the third, in a cause therein impending wherein John Shorey the older of Braintree in the County of Essex [husband] of Mary Shorey who was sister of Joseph Marsh the older of the same place, Clothier, John Shorey the vounger and Joseph Shorey, children of the said John Shorey the older, Robert Exton of London, carmonger, and Mary his wife, one of the daughters of Lydia Martin who was one of the other sisters of the said Joseph Marsh the older, Lydia Kemphouse, widow, Sarah Conner, widow, Elizabeth, widow, now the wife of Butcher, and Anna Porter, widow, daughters of the said Lydia Martin, John Marsh, Samuel Marsh, Jonathan Marsh, Daniel Marsh, Hannah Marsh and Lydia Marsh and Grace Phelps, all sons and daughters of John Marsh who was brother of said Joseph Marsh the older, Plaintiffs and the said Joseph Marsh Executor party to these presents Defendant: It was among other things ordered and decreed that the said Estate of the said Joseph Marsh, the Testator, should be forthwith sold to the best purchaser and the money arising by sale thereof and what should remain over from the defendants upon account therein mentioned, should be paid [and] divided among the plaintiffs and the defendants as legatees and devisees in the will of the said Joseph Marsh the Testator, pursuant to the direction thereof, and that the amount coming due to such of the Plaintiffs as were not present, should be paid to their order or assigns, and in default of such order or assigns then to remain in the purchaser's hands for the use of such absent persons, upon his giving security to answer and pay the same and that the Plaintiffs' Defendants might procure one or more bid[d]er or bid[d]ers, purchaser or purchasers for the said estate, and that the defendants should [each] convey all his [or her] right, title, interest, property, claim and demand whatsoever of and to the said Estate and premises, unto the person that should be the best bid[d]er, upon payment of such sums of money as should be agreed on for the sale of the premises; and whereas by an order of the same court, made and pronounced the fifth day of Dec. Anno Domini one thousand and seven hundred in the same (court) it is mentioned that the aforesaid Ionathan Boulder has bid more than any other person who offered to purchase the said premises, it was thereupon ordered, adjudged and decreed by the said court that the said Jonathan Boulder should be the purchaser of the same for the sum of one hundred and seventy one pounds, and that upon payment thereof the said defendants Marsh should convey the said premises unto the said Ionathan Boulder and his heirs and that the said defendants should deliver unto him the possession of the said premises and all deeds and writings conveying the same and that the said Jonathan Boulder should thereupon pay so much of the purchase money as would satisfy the said Defendant [This means the "Kinsman Joseph Marsh" the only living Executor or Possessor in trust] the aforesaid legacy of sixty pounds cash, deducting what was remaining in his hands for the rents and profits of said premises; and that he the said Jonathan Boulder should pay unto each of the nephews and nieces of the testator that were in England their several proportions of the said purchase money, and the residue thereof unto such of the said testators other nephews and nieces as were over broad sea, or their lawful Representatives empowered to see the same, when such person or persons or their Representatives should demand it and give proper discharges. for the sums to them respectively due; and that the said Jonathan Boulder and his heirs should hold and enjoy the said premises and be quiet in the possession of the sums by the authority of this court against the complainants and defendants and all persons claiming by, from or under him, them or any of them or by, from or under the will of Joseph Marsh deceased, or in or and by the several orders remaining on record in the said court that, relation thereunto being had, may appear:

And whereas we, whose hands and seals are hereunto set and subscribed, are credibly informed that Jonathan Boulder of the parish of St. Mary Magdalene Bromondsay in the county of Surray Distiller hath actually purchased the said Estate pursuant to the said decree for the sum of one hundred and sentyone pounds of lawful money of England and hath paid to said executor and such of the said legatees and relatives of said Testator as do reside in old England their seven shares and proportion thereof, being six pounds two shillings eleven pence and one farthing apiece, as by a certain indenture of release bearing date the twenty third day of June Anno Domini one thousand seven hundred and one made between said Joseph Marsh the Executor of the first part, the said Jonathan Boulder of the second part and Thomas Tyres of the said Parish of St. Mary Magdalene Bromondsay in said county of Surry, Merchant and Thomas Danning of London, gent., of the third part, relation being had thereto and to a schedule indented thereunto may more fully and at large appear.

Now know that we the said John Marsh, Samuel Marsh, Jonathan Marsh, Daniel Marsh, Hannah Marsh, Lydia Marsh and Grace Phelps, Have, and every one of us hath, nominated, constituted, appointed and in our place put, and by these presents do, and every one of us doth, nominate, constitute, appoint and in our stead and place respectively put, our trusty friends Joseph Merrian, formerly of Boston in New England, gent., now residing in London and Allyn Buckham of the Parish of St. Johns, Wapping, Distiller, our two lawful and irrevocable attorneys, jointly or severally for us and every one of us, in our and in every one of our name or names, and for our and every one of our respective use, to ask, demand, receive and take of the said Jonathan Boulder, his heirs or assigns our several respective shares of the said purchase money and upon receipt thereof [to make] one or more release or releases of and for the same in our and everyone of our respective name or names, or in the name of himself for us, and every of our respective name, place and account and [to] execute and deliver and upon payment thereof or any part thereof to take such due course and use such lawful ways and means for us and in our name or names, and for our use and benefit respectively, as our said attorneys or either of them shall in our behalf think fit or be advised, giving hereby unto our said attorneys and to either of them our full and whole strength and authority in and about the premises, ratifying and confirming, and each and every one of us do hereby confirm and allow all and whatsoever our attorney shall lawfully do, or cause to be done in and about the same.

In witness whereof we and every one of us have hereunto set and subscribed our respective hands and seals this fifteenth day of May Anno Domini one thousand and seven hundred and five, in the fourth year of the Reign of our *late* Sovereign Lady Ann, by the grace of God [Queen] of England, Scotland, France and Ireland and was defender of the Faith.

Rev. Christopher Marsh of W. Roxbury, Mass. reports as to John Marsh, "He was brother of Joseph Marsh of Braintree from which he certifies at Hartford 7 Nov., 1681, that he received money." This would imply that John was remembered directly by his brother. By the above document we learn that Joseph Marsh's will was made May 22, 1676; that under it Grace (Marsh) Tyres held the Clay Hills property until her death, March 15, 1696; that June 27, 1700 a decretal order was made in the Court at Westminster for the sale of

this property to the highest bidder; that Dec. 5, 1700 the same court decreed that Jonathan Boulder be the purchaser for £171, and that the seven heirs in England having received about \$30.75 apiece, release was given to him June 23, 1701, and that the seven heirs in America were now, May 15, 1705, seeking their share that would cost them more than their English cousins and if equal would only be £6, 2s. 11d. and one farthing apiece or some \$215 in all. The lawyers and courts up to 1705, seem to have been nine years about it and to have taken over 20 per cent. of what they divided.

A word here as to John Marsh's well. At a meeting of the Marsh Family Association in Hartford, Conn. in Aug., 1887, John E. Marsh, Esq. of that city pointed out at the intersection of Temple and Front streets the location of the old Marsh homestead and well of 1639. Of the old well Mr. Allyn Stanley Kellogg, one of John Marsh's descendants, writes pleasantly and truly. Having written that Hannah³ Marsh (John², John¹) married Dea. Joseph Olmstead and that in 1710 their daughter Hannah married Caleb Stanley his ancestor, he adds: "I have observed that in former times matrimonial alliances seemed often to result from *neighborly associations*. The above named Caleb Stanley was a son of Caleb Stanley, Jr., Secretary of the Colony, who lived on a part of the original homelot of his grandfather Timothy Stanley; the homelot adjoining that of John Marsh and south of it. As the second John Marsh succeeded to the occupancy of his father's homelot the young Caleb Stanley and Hannah Olmstead would easily become acquainted while the latter was visiting her grandfather. They would drink water from the same well, in the line between the two homelots, as appears by the agreement made for using it in common by John Marsh and Capt. Caleb Stanley."

It is asked did John² Marsh have a daughter Ruth? His brother Samuel had a daughter Ruth born 1685, also a daughter Elizabeth, b. 1683, who m. Oct. 27, 1714, Maynard Day of Hartford and this probably came from the m. of Ruth Marsh to Wm. Cadwell of Hartford, Oct. 31, 1711. We have at Hartford Second church the baptisms seemingly of all of John's² children except John³ the oldest whose birth was probably at Northampton or Hadley. This excludes Ruth.

Did John Skinner marry a daughter of John² Marsh? He is called by John³ repeatedly in accounts "Brother John Skinner," from 1709 to 1721. He m. Rachel Pratt, Feb. 22, 1693 and she outlived him. John³ Marsh's first wife was Mabel Pratt, and John³ Marsh and Elizabeth (Pitkin) Marsh, his 2d wife, were witnesses to John Skinner's will 1741. As the two men married sisters, from this probably came the strong friendship and brotherhood. Lydia³ born 1684 could *not* have m. Skinner as early as 1693 and it was hardly

probable that Elizabeth³ b. 1675, m. before 1691 or 1692 when only 16 or 17. Either Elizabeth or Lydia seem to have married Joseph Pratt their father's "son-in-law" according to his will; and both seem to have died before their father's death in 1727. He makes no allusion to them in his will which we here give. John Skinner and Hezekiah Goodwin were on the inventory of his estate in 1727.

As god hath given the earth to the children of men dividing it to every one severally as he will, and doth Indulge to them the liberty of disposing their worldly Estates in a testamentary way to such as are to succeed them in the enjoyment thereof, and their doing this seasonably and in a just and prudent manner, Being a likely means to prevent after trouble and contention about it, therefore I who am old, and now languishing under those decays of Nature which forebode a speedy dissolution of it, do with submission to the will of God, make the following disposition of that part of the Earth which through his goodness is yet continued, In my possession.

Impr: My will is that all my just debts and funeral expences be first paid without fraud or delay.

Item: I give to each of my daughters now living, besides what they have allready received, ten pounds, to be paid within a year after my decease, Either out of my lands att Inventory price, or in current pay of this colony, att the Election of my Executors, yet with this proviso that they bear their several proportions of the debts and charges before mentioned.

Item: I give to the children of my daughter lately deceased, ten pounds, over and above what she received In her life time, to be divided equally among them, and paid as the above said sums and upon the same condition.

Item: I Give to my son In law Joseph Pratt, five shillings.

Item: the rest of my Estate, that is to say all my lands not otherwise disposed of, whether divided or undivided I give to my sons to be equally divided between them. Excepting that I give forty shillings more to my Eldest son than to either of his brethren.

Lastly I do appoint and constitute my sons Executors of this my last will and testament.

And In confirmation of all that is above willed I have hereto set or caused

to beset my hand and seal this day of In the year of our lord one thousand seven Hundred twenty six.

SKETCH OF THE FOUNDER OF LITCHFIELD.

THE FATHER OF THE LITCHFIELD MARSH LINE.

JOHN³ MARSH

of Hartford, Litchfield and Hartford again was born in Hadley or Northampton, Mass. in 1668, the oldest son of John² and Sarah (Lyman) Marsh. All his children but one, the youngest, settled in Litchfield, Ct.

His boyhood and young manhood were spent at Hartford. Even in that focus of colonial authority and select thought he early attracted public attention. In 1704, at the age of 36 he became one of the selectmen as also in 1710 and 1714. He was then chosen by Hartford to explore its dimly known western lands; all Litchfield County except Waterbury on the south, being then unsettled. In 1715 he was the first Anglo-Saxon recorded to have trodden in that wilderness, and for 15 years his fortunes became connected with all the pioneer life of the County town, Litchfield, where later was the first ladies' seminary and for over 50 years the Gould Law School, then the most celebrated in America. The earliest record of the visit of any white man to that locality is as follows:

"The Town of Hartford,

Dr. to John Marsh

May 1715, For 5 days, man and horse with expenses in viewing the Land at the New Plantation $\pounds_2 \circ \circ$ "

He was commissioned by the Conn. Colony Lieut., May 17, 1717 and in May, 1722 Capt. and Justice of the Peace for Litchfield. The name John Marsh, for the first third of the History of Litchfield,

occurs upon nearly every page, as the first explorer, one of the first selectmen, the first town clerk, an office he held for nine years, and at the beginning or end of nearly every public document in town transactions or acts of the Legislature. He is first of the list of proprietors. He drew second choice of village lots and chose next to Bantam river where he was appointed to erect a grist mill.

In 1724 Indians were hostile, the Legislature directed that mounts be built within the forts; houses were fortified and a council of war was chosen in the record of whose acts John Marsh's name comesfirst. In 1726 thirty effective men were ordered by the Legislature to Litchfield, twenty from New Haven and ten from Wallingford, to be under the command of Capt. John Marsh for the defense of the town.

His name, as Lt. John Marsh of Hartford, and that of Dea. John Buell are the only ones recorded in the colonial patent for holding the Litchfield lands given to the settlers in the names of Kings Charles the II. and George.

That he did not relinquish hold upon Hartford appears in his being chosen selectman there in 1730, æ. 62, and again in 1735, æ. 67. The History of Litchfield thus sums up:

"The two most conspicuous and useful men among the original proprietors of the township were John Marsh and John Buell.

'John Marsh had long been a prominent citizen of Hartford beforehe interested himself in the Western Lands; and from the time when he came out to 'view the new plantation,' in May, 1715, till about the year 1738, his name was intimately associated with the history of Litchfield. I need not recapitulate the many ways and times in which he was called upon by his fellow citizens to serve them in public employments, as detailed on the preceeding pages. He served this town in the various offices within her gift during the entire period of his residence here.

While an inhabitant of Hartford, he was often a Representative in the Legislature, a Justice of the Peace, an Associate Judge of the County Court, and a member of the Council of War. He returned to Hartford in his old age and died there. His remains lie interred in the old Burying Ground back of the Center Church. His children remained in this town, and his descendants here and elsewhere are very numerous."

After his return to Hartford he was ordered in 1732 by the Gen. Court to build a church for the Second Society of Farmington. He was appointed by Hartford to lay out two Conn. towns. The Conn. Legislature met twice a year and I find record "Capt. John Marsh rep'd Hartford 40 sessions." His oldest adult son represented Litchfield 48 sessions. In 1744, the year of his death, John³ Marsh was on the war committee.

His will is in Hartford records and his great-great-grandson John⁷ E. Marsh, Esq., of Hartford is in possession of his very interesting account book, which was also used by Hezekiah⁴ Marsh the youngest son of John³ and Elizabeth (Pitkin) Marsh, the only one to return with his father and keep up the family line at Hartford; all the others settling at Litchfield.

In her will Elizabeth (Pitkin) Marsh leaves property "To my dau. Elizabeth" and "To my sons Eben., Wm., Isaac, Geo., John, Tim., Hez."

For the rest of the war his services were mainly at Litchfield as Commissary of supplies, purchasing, storing, guarding and convoying. In 1781 by order of Gen. Wolcott with his dragoons he guarded a train of supplies from Litchfield to Fishkill for the French army.

In a polite official acknowledgement the French Commissary certifies to the protection of the "dragons."

At the peace of 1783 with rank of Major he retired to private life but in 1789 he was elected town clerk and re-elected annually all his life, during 37 years. From 1795 he was chosen Representative and continued for 16 sessions. He married Molly⁵ Marsh, the youngest child of Col. being for the same nine years also rector of the Episcopal church at New Preston with a salary there of 28 pounds "two-thirds produce and one-third money." He m. at Litchfield, Oct. 27, 1791, his cousin, No. 202.

At the celebration of the "Centennial of Litchfield," Aug. 13 and 14, 1851, two portraits were exhibited of Rev. Truman Marsh, one painted 1789, the other 1842, one of his wife 1789 and one of her mother Mary⁵ (Marsh) Seymour, dau. of Col. Ebenezer⁴ Marsh. The rector d. March 28, 1851. His widow Mrs. Clarissa Marsh survived him more than 14 years, dying in her 94th year, Sept. 2, 1865.

Except the nine years at New Milford, nearly all their lives were spent in Litchfield village. We learn from a notice of the aged widow's death that St. Michael's church received substantial marks of her liberality and that the Episcopal parsonage was her gift, that she was the oldest inhabitant of the village and that if her husband was pastor she was a noble mother in the church where he had long been head and pioneer and had availed so much to give St. Michael's its present commanding position in the diocese. As this connection helped materially to shape the lives of George Marsh and his children it is in order to mention here some of Mr. Gilbert's benefactions, viz. \$100,000 to found and \$400,000, to maintain the Gilbert home for the friendless at Winsted; \$40,000, to Gilbert school for colored girls at Winsted, La.; \$500,000 for public school of high order in East Winsted, Ct.; \$48,000, for tunneling the mountain for a better water supply of Winchester, (now Winsted) Ct.; \$12,000 to Congregational and \$3,000 to Episcopal churches of Northfield, Ct.; \$19.000 (\$1,000 each) to 19 nephews and nieces and divided stock in value \$30,000, to James Woodruff and Ben. F. Marsh, nephews of Winsted, and his niece, Mrs. E. Whiting, of Canada.

George Marsh went to Ohio to sell clocks for the Gilberts. His family resided awhile at Athens, O. He traveled extensively over the state, entering government lands at \$1.25 an acre and bought many acres in different counties. In 1834-5 he went to Van Wert Co. and was one of the four proprietors of Van Wert the county seat. In 1847-8 he moved his family from Athens to Van Wert, and purchased the St. Charles Hotel, now the De Puy House. At the first sale of lots he had a large tract of land carefully bounded, "to have all the lands except the commons for \$150, but if Mr. Marsh will erect a sawmill within two years within one mile of Van Wert to pay only \$100." He had large land transactions with James Watson

Riley whose father Capt. James (see Riley's Narrative and also sketch under No. 4419) was Department Surveyor for North Western Ohio. George Marsh also bought lands 50 miles east of St. Louis in southern Illinois and had tenants and planted an orchard there. He accumulated much property although sometimes from taxes like other large holders land-poor.

His name fills pages of history of North Western Ohio and of Athens Co., on the Ohio river. His wife Caroline (Gilbert) Marsh, d. May 19, 1849. After her death he returned to Athens where he still had property and in course of time married a widow with several children. After his second marriage he laid out the town of Marshfield, O., a few miles west of Athens on the B. & O. S. W. R. R. Ohio Division. Marcus L. Griswold of Marshfield, O. writes, "George Marsh died here." Mrs. Wm. Wiltshire Riley (see No. 4420) who has supplied most of the above, writes, "Mr. Marsh was often at our home in Columbus, O. I saw them when he moved his family to Van Wert. I saw them in Athens in 1846." She adds, "He went back to Van Wert to his children and I think there died. Peaceful be his rest after his earthly toil, while others reap the harvest." Children:

But six of the thirty-six survived the horrors of a short prison life. We hardly wonder that the professed

infidel Ethan Allen, with clenched teeth, said to Capt. Beebe, "My creed is shaken. There ought to be a hell for that Lowrie." See History of Litchfield, pages 96–101. Major Marsh was a civil engineer by profession and was early engaged on the old Hartford & Providence R. R., now the New York & New England R. R., as division engineer in its construction before its opening in 1848. From this he went to the Ashuelot River road in New Hampshire, but in 1851 went to western New York as engineer in laying out the Rochester, Lockport & Niagara Falls R. R., and the Buffalo, Lockport & Niagara Falls R. R. In 1855 he returned to Hartford which was afterwards his home. The following year he was appointed city surveyor and was almost continuously thereafter in some public office, serving as councilman, alderman, city assessor, etc. For many years he was actively interested, as commissioner 1859-1864, and as chief engineer and superintendent, in the development of the water supply of Hartford. He built one of the largest of the city's reservoirs (1875) and had made the plans for and commenced work on the great storage reservoir in Farmington (capacity 6,000,000 gallons). "He did not live to see all his plans matured; but his ideas have been adopted and incorporated in the general plan of construction now in course of execution." From 1874 to his

death he was president of the board of water commissioners and under his management it became a great and paying corporation. Mr. Marsh had many large railroad contracts, among them the building of the Hartford & Ct. Valley, and the Boston & New York Air Line, with the great iron drawbridge across the Connecticut river at Middletown. In 1868 he was chosen Major of the Putnam Phalanx, a well known local military organization of two companies under a major commandant and the usual company officers. He was long connected with the Masonic fraternity, was past eminent commander of Washington Commandery-the oldest organization of Knights Templars in the United States and the only one that ever received authority from the Grand Encampment of England-was at the time of his death worshipful master of St. John's lodge No. 4, scribe in Pythagoras chap. No. 17, member of Wolcott council, No. 1, etc. Mr. Marsh was a man of wide experience and sound judgment, whose advice was often sought and richly valued, because of his great technical knowledge and illuminating common sense. 



VERMONT MARSHES.

Of the Lebanon Connecticut Line.

Not long before the revolution, seven grandsons of Capt. Joseph³, Marsh, (John², John¹) in the spirit of their grandfather, the Lebanon pioneer and proprietor of 1697, and of their grandfather's grandfather, pioneer and proprietor at Hartford 1636 and Hadley 1660, found their way to New Connecticut, now Vermont. Four were sons of Ensign Joseph⁴ and three of his brother Jonathan⁴. Of these cousins, John⁵, the oldest son of Jonathan⁴, preceded the rest, as proved by birth of his son John⁶ at Claremont, N. H. in 1759. His mother had d. in 1752. He is found a very little later across the river in Weathersfield, Vt. The two other sons of Jonathan4 and the four sons of Ensign Joseph⁴ with their widowed mother, in 1772 (Joseph's wife remaining a year at Lebanon) passed some 20 miles farther up the river and settled at the mouth of White river, calling their Green Mountain-Connecticut-Valley-town, Hartford, in memory of the colonial capital lower down. The French war, 1755-58, had brought all the Vermont region into larger notice and its termination had opened the way for a fresh northerly English migration. were fairer lands? The cousins acted wisely together and helped on new settlements. One-fourth of the first proprietors of Randolph, Vt., were these men of Marsh name. Yet the Revolution hindered that movement and they all sold out and remained lower down the White river, at Woodstock, Hartland, Hartford, Quechee and eventually Bethel.

We have this important testimony from Hon. James Barrett, Judge of the Supreme Court of Vermont.

"Great Honor has been brought to the State by those who have borne the Illustrious name of *Marsh*, all vitalized by the same family blood."

b. Lebanon, Ct., Jan. 12, 1726–7, son of Ensign Joseph⁴, (Capt. Joseph², John², John.¹) His mother was Mercy Bill or Mercy Durkee, "In 1772 he came to Hartford in New Connecticut, and took up a large tract of land bounded north by White river, and south by the south bank of the Otta Quechee. And opposite where the Quechee broke into little islands, he built a very large house, of which the frame, windows and doors were brought on rafts from Connecticut. Farly writers speak of the house as the "Baronial Mansion," and it is yet one of the finest places in Hartford or vicinity." The following extracts from a letter to D. W. Marsh have a fine flavor:

QUECHEE, VT., FEB. 13, 1893.

MR. MARSH-

Dear Sir: Your letter to our town clerk, Ex-Gov. Pingree of Hartford, Vt., is before me. He thought perhaps I might know something of the history of the Marsh family you mention. One volume of the town records of Hartford is lost, probably burned in some house where it had been borrowed, as was the habit in years past.

The reason Gov. Pingree referred to me for information is, that I live on the old Gov. Marsh place. He built the house which is a hundred years old this year. The rooms he lived in, have never been changed, even the cupboard where he had his rum, (a very temperate man too,) is just as it was a hundred years ago. This is a fine old place now, on the banks of the Quechee, surrounded by meadows, and the upland crowned with the forest "Primeval." Not an axe has been laid at the foot of a tree except those that have outlived their generation, or a pine that was not growing better, with time, and towering fifty feet above its fellows. Mr. Porter my husband, bought the Gov. Marsh place in 1846.

I have been looking over the Marsh "Deeds," and as I took up one after the other of these timeworn documents what Longfellow thought, and expressed, came to me. "We have no title deeds to house or lands; Owners and occupants of early date, From graves forgotten stretch their dusty hands, And hold in mortmain still, their old estates."

I loved many younger members of the Marsh family, but the grave has closed over them, and I am walking the same floors, and looking on the same landscape. The name of Elisha Marsh occurs often in the old deeds, and I think he, and Abel sleep in our little cemetery. When warm weather comes I will go there, and look over the old headstones. I will try and find out more about those brothers. There is one man in town that is older than myself. I will see him. You probably never received so long a letter from an old woman. (82)

Mrs. Porter has three quaint old chairs, that belonged to Gov. Joseph Marsh.

Judge Barrett says: "Having had much experience in business and public affairs he became at once active in the questions and controversies of the embryo state, and was soon called to stations of trust and responsibility."

In 1776 he was twice chosen a delegate for the County of Cumberland to the Provincial Congress of New York, but favored an independent state government, and under it was elected the first state governor.

The same year, 1776, he was commissioned Colonel of the northern or upper regiment of Cumberland county. What was then Cumberland county, forms now the counties of Windham, Windsor, Rutland and Bennington.

In 1777 he was a member of the convention that declared New Connecticut an independent state, changed its name to Vermont and pledged itself to resist by force of arms the fleets and armies of Great Britain. He was also member of the Convention that adop ed the State Constitution, 3d and 4th of July, 1777.

At the call of Gen. Schuyler, the same year, he, with his oldest son, as one of his quota of men, marched to and had part in the battles of Bennington, White Hall, Fort Ann, Fort Edward, and Sandy Hill. A price of $\pounds 40$ was offered for his head.

He represented Hartford in the first general assembly under the State Constitution.

The same year ('78) he was elected Lieut. Governor, and re-elected '87, '88 and '89. In the interim he represented Hartford in general assembly. He was 12 years chief judge of Windsor county. Was offered a township for his unpaid services, but refused to accept it. He was an active Christian, and liberal supporter of the religious and benevolent objects of his day and left a perpetual fund for the support of the church in Hartford. He was tall, large and finely proportioned and of great muscular power. Even at eighty he could lift weights his sons could not. He was a bold and superior horseman; wore small clothes and triangular hat to the last; kept a chaise but preferred to ride on horseback. Mrs. Sanford writes: He was never irritable, rarely was, but could be, stern; and had a close logical mind. At eighty he showed no decay of mind or body, and people came from long distances to consult him. But on the death of his wife, who left no Christian hope, he mourned himself to death. He would talk of nothing else for any long time, and would accept no diversion.

While Judge, his son Charles, then at the bar, was insulted by an opponent, and sprang up and struck him on the mouth. His father gave Charles a most scathing rebuke. Charles sprang to his feet, asked the forgiveness of the court, of his opponent, of his client whose cause he had jeopardized, and then of his father, as a father whose honored name he had disgraced. Even strong men wiped their eyes, but the father sat calm and seemingly cold.

Deacon —, a cabinet maker, made Joseph Marsh a chest of drawers that soon fell to pieces. One winter day he came to the door and called my great-grandfather out. "Gov. Mash! Gov. Mash! Our women! Oh, our women—their frivolities will bring ruin on us! Even dumb animals suffer! Come out to my sleigh. I have got a pig with a crape cushion on its head!" with a long sigh.

My great-grandfather looked down from his six feet on him, "Never mind that, Deacon, but if one come with a *chest of drawers* on his head, I'll go and look at him."

He was very kind and gentle, but firm in all his family relations. My grandfather died when my mother was six months old. At all the family gatherings, her grandfather held her on his knee and called himself her own father and was a father to her at all times.

1926. Dorothy Mason. We can trace the descent of Mrs. Joseph Marsh, Dorothy Mason, from Rev. Samuel Whiting born 1597 and his wife Elizabeth St. John, b. 1605, through Elizabeth Whiting, b. 1645 and her husband Rev. Jeremiah Hobart, b. 1630 and through Dorothy Hobart and her husband Daniel Mason, b. 1674 and on down to her own bright self. We hardly know in which of these four names to feel the greater interest. Major John Mason the first of his line in America was born in 1600, m. Anne Peck in 1639, came to Massachusetts as early as 1632 and to Windsor, Ct., in 1636. Thence in 1637 he led ninety men to the Pequot stronghold, smote them with cruel fire and sword and forever that same year broke up their tribal relations. For this and other evidence of skill and force to lead, he was chosen deputy governor of Connecticut colony for eight years and also made major general and for six years sent commissioner to the New England congress. He d. Jan. 30, 1672, æ. 72.

Edmund Hobart, great-grandfather of Dorothy (Hobart) Mason, wife of Daniel, grandson of Major John Mason, was of the family of the Earl of Buckinghamshire, and his descendant, Bishop Hobart of New York, when in England, was acknowledged as a relative, by the present earl. He came from Hingham, England, to Charlestown, Mass. in 1633 and to Hingham in 1635. Of deeper interest to us than any tinge of noble blood or royal descent, is the manliness of Edmund Hobart's son. Rev. Peter Hobart, b. Hingham, England, 1604, of Magdalen college, Cambridge university 1625, became a preacher in England but "feeling oppressed by the impositions of the prelacy," emigrated to Hingham, Mass. in 1635 and became the first minister there. His son Rev. Jeremiah b. 1630, graduated at Harvard 1650, was minister at Topsfield, Hampstead, L. I. and Haddam, Ct., in all 43 years. His daughter Dorothy m. Daniel Mason.

Rev. Samuel Whiting was b. Nov. 20, 1597 in Boston, England, took degree of A. B., Cambridge university 1616, and A. M. 1620, came to Boston, Mass. 1636, was pastor at Lynn, Mass., 43 years. He had three sons, ministers, and his dau. Elizabeth b. 1645, m. Rev. Jeremiah Hobart. His wife Elizabeth St. John, b. 1605, d. March 3, 1677, was the only dau. of the Rt. Hon. Sir Oliver St. John, Knt., Devonshire, England. He was chief justice of England in the time of Oliver Cromwell, to whom he was nearly related by marriage.

Elizabeth St. John was of very noble lineage. In her was united the blood of ten of the sovereigns of Europe. Mrs. Sanford writes:

"Mrs. Joseph Marsh, Dorothy Mason, was aunt of Jeremiah Mason the noted lawyer of Boston, sister of Mrs. Theodore Sedgwick and sister of Mrs. Senator Durfee of Connecticut. One of her ancestors was Elizabeth St. John, dau. of Baron St. John who was cousin of Queen Elizabeth, and descendant of Henry VII. She came in two lines from William the Conqueror, and direct from Alfred the Great, and by several royal marriages was allied to all the early royal powers of Europe.

Brownsville was a 'station' of the underground railroad between Virginia and Canada and his sympathy and influence were fully enlisted in favor of the slaves escaping from bondage. To a friend he wrote, 'I feel a great satisfaction at my opposition to human slavery. I have from early manhood continued firm in my belief that freedom should be national and apply to all classes.' To me he once said, 'I determined when I started in life, never to lose my faith in God and man,' and to the day of his death, he maintained a trust that no rude shock could destroy." He d. His only son, who resides with him, married Miss Rogers of Philadelphia, who is the mother of an interesting family of four sons, the oldest of whom Louis Joseph⁴, is twelve years old." The family is American in its sympathies and English is the language of the home.

"On a knoll in the wooded park, between the chateau and the village, stands a small private chapel" which has become a veritable Mt. Vernon of liberty-loving Canadians, for in its vault lie the bones of the Patriot Louis Joseph Papineau, who in the assembly of 1834, uttered this remarkable prophecy: "My honorable friend boasts of his attachment to monarchy, and thinks that it can be perpetuated on this continent. I will venture to say to him that instead of Europe giving kings and kingdoms to America the day is not far distant when America will give presidents and republics to Europe." Since that prophecy Louis Napoleon has failed in his attempt to give a king to Mexico, and France herself has become a republic.

Judge Barrett says: "For breadth and profoundness of comprehension, for keenness and subtilty of discrimination, for rapidity and justness of analysis, for clearness, strength and force of logical argumentation, for effectiveness in advocacy, as well as for a thorough, appreciative and practical familiarity with all the artificial technicalities of the law he was long recognized by bench and bar as having no superior, and, for all these qualities in combination, as having no equal." He rarely spoke an hour. He talked quietly, to the court and jury only, not heeding anybody outside, and with scarce a gesticulation.

Yet he was most successful in winning cases apparently hopeless. He was a member of the United States congress 1815–1817. Chief Justice Williams said Mr. Marsh "wielded the most powerful weapon of severity he ever knew." "He scarified, flayed and slaughtered but with a polished weapon, and with the most quiet manner and voice, and rigorous chasteness of language." His wit was keen and ready. In politics he was a Federalist of the Washington school. In theology he was a Calvinist of the Edwards school. He was one of the founders and for many years president of the Vermont Bible society, vice-president of the American Bible Society, and of the American Education Society. Was forty years trustee of Dartmouth college, president of trustees of Kimball Union academy. He gave to his parish the site of the church and parsonage and contributed liberally to them; was constant in conference and prayer meeting.

Personally he was tall, well proportioned but spare, of fine sensitive and nervous organization, with great self-control over a temper that was quick and strong. He always wore black, but following the cut of his early days, wore white cravat, turned-down collar and ruffled shirt bosom to the last of his life. He was a model gentleman of

the old school and bore himself with great simplicity and courtliness and entertained the best society of New England and New York.

"Captain Wyllys Lyman, Fifth Infantry, was promoted on the 4th of July, 1892, to the rank of Major United States army, and placed upon the retired list for disability from wounds received in line of duty.

Major Lyman is the only son of the late Wyllys Lyman of Burlington, Vt. He went to the front as adjutant of the Tenth Vermont Volunteers, August, 1862. Except when absent wounded he was present in all the battles of his regiment, viz.: At Kelly's Ford, Va., Orange Grove, Wilderness, Spottsylvania, Tolopotomy, Cold Harbor, Monocacy, Winchester, Fisher's Hill, Cedar Creek, Petersburg, April 2, 1865, and Sailor's Creek, April 6, 1865.

At the battle of Cedar Creek on the 19th of October, 1864, when the Tenth Vermont, under command of Col. William W. Henry led in the charge, which resulted in the recapture of the guns of McKnight's Regular Battery, from the enemy, Adjutant Lyman while gallantly performing the duties of his position was severely wounded in the thigh. The regiment lost that day nearly one-third of the 297 officers and men who stood in line.

In the final assault upon Petersburg April 2, 1865, the Tenth Vermont Regiment took a brilliant part and Major Lyman received the following most complimentary notice in the reports of his commanding officer: "While I cannot speak in too high praise of the conduct of both officers and men, I desire to mention as deserving of special consideration, Major Wyllys Lyman, who was among the first to enter the rebel works with the color bearer, and performed most efficient service during the day, using every exertion to keep the men

together, and bring them forward to their duty." He was at this time promoted to be Lieutenant-Colonel of his regiment, and was mustered out of the United States service June 28, 1865. Lieut.-Col. Lyman was appointed Captain of the 40th U.S. Infantry, July 28, 1866; was transferred to the 25th Infantry April 20, 1869, and to the 5th Infantry Dec. 15, 1870. He was brevetted Major of the U. S. army March 2, 1867 for gallant and meritorious service in the battle of the Opequan, Va. In Major Powell's record of living officers of the United States army we find the following: Wyllys Lyman's services in the field with the army of the Potomac during the war of the rebellion from 1862 to 1865; engaged in the Indian campaign and battles under Gen. Miles in Texas and Montana from 1874-76; Deputy Governor Soldiers Home, District of Columbia, 1884-85; later on duty in the War Department, War Record office. Staff positions occupied: Adjutant Tenth Vermont Volunteers, Aug., 1862. Acting assistant Adjutant General of brigade 1862 to July, 1863. In addition to the battles mentioned above Col. Lyman participated in several engagements with the Indians in the campaign of Gen. Miles in 1874-76; brevetted Lieut.-Col. United States army for gallantry in the actions on the Washita river, Tex., Sept., 1874 against the Kiowa and Camanche Indians. Few Vermont soldiers have had a more brilliant record than this gallant officer, and he will receive the sincere congratulations of his many friends in Vermont upon his promotion." Child:

He remained in New Brunswick at St. John till 1832, engaged in commerce. In the fall of 1832, during the Black Hawk war, he emigrated to St. Louis, Mo. and in April, 1833, settled in Hancock county, Ill. At that time Warsaw had not been laid out, and the only families here were those of Mark Aldrich, John R. Wilcox and Isham Cochran. Mr. Marsh's family remained at F. Edwards until Christmas, 1833, when having completed the house now standing on his farm, four miles east of Warsaw, he removed them thither. On this farm he continued to reside until the spring of 1863, when, on account of his son Arthur having joined the army, he took up his abode with his son John W. Marsh, Esq. of Warsaw, where he remained up to the time of his death. His wife d. in 1838.

Two of Mr. Marsh's sons have been officers in the army. His son, B. F. Marsh, Jr., volunteered at the opening of the war, in the 16th Illinois infantry. Subsequently he joined the 2d Illinois cavalry as captain, and in Dec., 1864, held the position of lieutenant colonel, commanding that regiment. On several occasions he distinguished himself on the battle field. Arthur W. Marsh raised company C. 118th Illinois volunteers, and served with distinction until 1863, when he was killed in a skirmish with the rebels in Louisana.

Mr. Marsh was a man of polished manner, urbane and courteous. Physically, but few finer specimens of man could anywhere be found. He loved his country and hated a rebel and a rebel sympathizer. Never neutral upon any subject, whatever cause he espoused, he supported with all the zeal in his nature. Hence he had warm friends, and in his active days, bitter enemies. Tenacious of his own rights he never invaded the rights of others.

About 1854 he met with an accident on a railroad car, which rendered him a cripple, and which no doubt shortened his days. Being from this cause unfitted for business, he retired from contact with the world. Thus the asperities of former days were softened, and at the time of death he enjoyed the respect and esteem of the entire community. He was one of the most prominent men of Hancock

county and one of its earliest settlers. Judge Charles Phelps Marsh, his half brother, writes: "One of his last acts was to vote for Abraham Lincoln. He had been sick and feeble for some days and daily prayed that his life might be spared so that he might vote for Lincoln—and it was." He d. Nov. 23, 1864, æ. 71 years, 11 months and 19 days. Washburn in Feb., 1870. He acquired a handsome competence, yet was simple and unostentatious with an easy dignity that belongs to a natural and unassumed dignity of character.

Mr. Marsh was state's attorney for Windsor county for four years from 1861 to 1865, a member of the constitutional convention in

1870, a member of the house of representatives of Vermont in 1886 and in 1888, and chairman of the judiciary committee of the house during his second term, and was appointed one of the assistant judges of Windsor county court in May, 1887. This office of judge came to him entirely unsought.

Judge Marsh died of acute pneumonia during a term of the court Jan. 13, 1893. Messages of sympathy came to the home.

"I have lost one of my earliest and most valued benefactors, and the village and state have lost one of their most worthy citizens," writes Judge Adams of St. Louis.

"I mourn the loss of a most valued friend," writes Mr. Norman Williams from Chicago.

"He was one of the warmest friends the University has had," says President Buckham, "and his interest in the institution led him into a kindly friendship for its president, which to me was very delightful."

Gov. Fuller, in a most kindly note of condolence, alludes to Judge Marsh's "many excellent and rare qualities of mind and manner," and to the great loss to his family and to the community. "I knew him so well (and only recently received a letter from him) that the blow has been peculiar to me."

A message from Hon. Justin S. Morrill at Washington speaks of Mr. Marsh as "my old and excellent friend."

Mr. Marsh in his political opinions might be emphatically styled "thorough." He began life an ardent Whig. Endorsing the nomination of General Harrison for president in 1840, he entered heartily into the stirring scenes of that brilliant campaign. In 1844 he conducted with great ability a campaign paper, advocating the election of Henry Clay as president. Others might change in their political opinions, but there was no change in him, and while the slavery agitation, the free soil slide and the temperance movement drew many away from old party ties, he remained loyal to the Whig cause, till the party dissolved in 1853. After that he became a Republican and to the new party remained through life as strict and uncompromising in his attachments as he had been to the old. In this connection it is proper to allude to one peculiar characteristic of Mr. Marsh. In discussing political questions, especially those of a local nature, or in talk upon the social topics of the day he would often exhibit a grim humor that was perfectly irresistible. In these displays of caustic wit, which began early in life and continued late, it may be he was not always particular in what direction the shafts flew; yet from bitterness of spirit towards others he was entirely free, as they will allow who knew him well and knew him long.

He gave of his means to aid many a young man whom he found worthy and ambitious to secure an education. His acts of unselfish and not stinted, though always studiously reticent, liberality are acknowledged in private by men now in professional life whom Mr. Marsh has befriended. It is known to some of Judge Marsh's older friends that in his own young days, when the facilities of school and college were much less easy of access, Mr. Marsh himself felt compelled to relinquish his studies at the university, from lack of means, and was befriended and aided to go on by Consul Jarvis of Weathersfield, who afterwards refused to accept any interest upon his repaid investment in the early education of the graduate and attorney. This may give a reason why more than one young man has warmly recognized Mr. Marsh as a friend and benefactor.

For quite a number of years Mr. Marsh had been accustomed to provide for three annual prizes of \$25.00 each, to be awarded to the most successful student in each of the three departments of Latin, Greek and Mathematics, at the university.

By the provisions of his will, after making liberal provision for his widow and his surving son and family, Mr. Marsh makes the following public bequests:

To the University of Vermont, five scholarships, of one thousand dollars each (\$5,000) to be designated as the C. P. Marsh scholarships, for the benefit, first, of needy and worthy young men and women from Windsor county. Also one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to endow a scholarship in memory of Charles Munson Marsh, for the benefit, first, of students from Woodstock.

A scholarship endowed some twenty years ago by Mr. Marsh in memory of his son who was drowned in the lake while a student in the university, was known as the Edwin Wright Marsh scholarship.

To St. James' Episcopal church, Woodstock, \$500.

To the Congregational church, Woodstock, \$500.

To the Riverside cemetery association of Woodstock, in trust, \$1,000.

Mr. Marsh was instrumental in procuring the organization and incorporation of the new cemetery association, in securing and laying out the grounds so beautifully located by the picturesque winding banks of the Otta Quechee. To that resting place by the riverside he has now been borne. The mound and the memorial, the gateway and hedge and winding path will long commemorate the honored citizen who is buried there. 



This venerable and holy man became deeply interested in the history and genealogy of the families of his town and region. More than 40 years ago, at his request, the present historian of our family sent to the Rev. Frederick Marsh a list of 270 descendants of Judge Perez Marsh of Berkshire Co., Mass. In an address by Judge George Marsh Carrington before the Marsh family association upon the New Hartford branch, Aug. 3, 1887, in his own words "to lift a corner of the veil woven by the years" the Judge closes with this well deserved tribute:

"These notes would be seriously lacking if they contained no reference to one, great grandson to Capt. Jonathan, who, as he approached 70 years and laid aside active duties, spent much time and effort in preserving the statistics and history of his own family and other New Hartford matters, subjects of his early recollections. Few men of any name leave behind them three good sized manuscript volumes of family and local history. The idea was largely new forty years ago, but he grasped the importance of it. One is struck with the deep religious tone pervading these records. To him "the one thing needful" was no myth. He measured men by the importance in which they held it. No man had a better right. For 64 years he went in and out before his people, in sickness and health, in sunshine and in shadow, a sympathetic, true minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ. He did not chafe at the righteous requirements of God, he did not belittle his profession or himself by unbecoming conduct therein nor did he try to let down the high standard of the King of Kings. He did have an intense longing for the salvation of every one he knew, for he knew that without personal faith in Jesus Christ they were lost. He had a keen and lively interest in current events, all of which he referred to the hand of God working among men for the best and highest good of all. He was profoundly conscious that he was an imperfect man, but when his friend of 40 years, the senior Fellow of the corporation of Yale college, stood over his body the best words he could find were "Behold an Israelite indeed in whom there is no guile." Here he continued his business of cabinet making until 1847, when he purchased the *True Democrat*, which he continued to publish until 1852. In 1852 he took charge of the affairs of the C. R. I. & P. railroad in Joliet, and remained in charge for a number of years, with the exception of an interval of three years, from 1864 to 1867, during which time he was postmaster of Joliet. Mr. Marsh also served for several terms as a member of the city council. He is at present the senior member of the real estate firm of H. N. Marsh & Co.

Mr. Marsh has lived a life of great usefulness to his fellowmen. He has been actively engaged in all the great reform movements of his time. He was one of the earliest advocates and friends of the temperance movement, and continues to give it his hearty support. He was one of the most faithful adherents of the abolition cause, and has been, and is, a friend to every movement that has for its object the enlightment and moral advancement of men. He has a mind well-stored with the best thoughts of literature, history and ethics, and, though modest to the point of diffidence in the presence of an audience, he has rare faculties of entertainment when comfortably situated by his own fireside.

Mr. Marsh has been for many years an intelligent, conscientious, consistent and devoted supporter of the christian religion. He was one of the charter members of our church, and is the only male member who remains with us, of those who laid the foundations of our loved organization. He continues to be the senior ruling elder, and one of the most zealous workers in the church, regularly attending both of the Sunday services, and the mid-week prayer meeting; by his conduct, giving an example of fidelity to younger servants of the Master. At eighty, Mr. Marsh is a splendid example to the young men of our congregation, of a life rooted and grounded in the eternal principles of right, as they are set forth in the gospel of Christ. Temperance, integrity, uprightness of heart, make the man.

We heartily congratulate Mr. Marsh on attaining his four score years, and sincerely trust that he may be spared many more years, to give his aid and counsel to the conduct of our church." Children:

In 1741 he was of the council that disapproved of "faintings and convulsions" as necessary for conviction of sin. and of visions for the bodily eye. Mr. Marsh told the men present that they must cut away the white birches between there and Mr. Israel Loomis' house before they could have anything to eat or drink as he wanted to see his nearest neighbor's house. They fell to, cut the way clear and had the refreshments including a good supply of rum. He had a slave who did his house and farm work. This negro, named Moses, set out an orchard of some fifty apple trees which was always called "Moses' orchard." Father Marsh as was customary in those days, considered a little stimulant essential to health of farm laborers, especially in having. Yet he was a thoughtful man and knew that these stimulants sometimes bite like an adder. One day he gave Moses a bottle containing a moderate quantity of

cider brandy and to divert his attention from the quantity to the quality told him that it was very old. Moses took the bottle, held it up to the light and with a disappointed wink replied, "Yes, Massa, but berry small of his age." He told Mr. Tucker one day "It would be no sin to worship your drag for it is 'like nothing in the heavens above or the earth beneath.'" Rev. Jonathan Marsh was twice married. He had a little book in which he thus records his two marriages:

This little book now more than 150 years old, in which he kept some or all his church records, has a curious history. John E. Marsh, Esq., of Hartford, 1803, thus describes it: "Some one came across it in Washington, D. C. and sent it to Hon. Origen S. Seymour, connected with the Marsh family, see No. 145. He presented it to the corporation of Memorial Hall, Hartford, where I found it. It is bound in leather, is about six by four inches in size and less than an inch in thickness. The cover is off and the leaves all loose. The work is finely and closely written. How it got to Washington is a mystery." Of his first wife who had six children the following record is significant. "Her child, Elizabeth, was born May 10, baptized 15. She d. of a Sab. morning May 20, 1749, æ. about 30 years." He had twelve children, of whom seven were daughters and five sons, and all but one son grew up, and ten were married. His second wife Marianna Keith was a young widow with two daughters one of whom m. William Ellery, a prominent merchant of Hartford, and became grandmother of Thomas H. Seymour, governor of Connecticut and minister to Russia. The following records were written by Jonathan Marsh 125 years ago: "Mem. Susanna Ellery d, at my house June 22, 1868, æ. 28. She was eldest daughter of my wife." "Wm. Chas. Hulett m. Mary Ann Keith, Mrs. Marsh's second daughter Nov. 29, 1761." Widow Keith was sister of John Lawrence, treasurer of the colony, a lady of many accomplishments, whose friends opposed her burying her graces in the wilderness of New Hartford, actually over twenty miles from the capital. The following pen portrait is by Rev. Frederick Marsh, who lived to be 92. No. 2710. "Mr. Marsh was above the medium height and size of men, well proportioned, grave and venerable in appearance, of a social turn of mind, and accustomed to wear a large wig. He was settled on the halfway plan; was Arminian in his theological views. In his preaching, as I remember him, when about fourteen years old, was not animated, and as it seemed to me, never earnest and rousing. I remember to have been seriously affected on seeing and hearing him address the people on funeral occasions." A fac simile of his signature is found in the History of Hartford county, vol. 2, p. 540. His salary was £100 to be increased £10 a year till it became £150. He was given choice of pews. Indians were allowed in the church only on towns pleasure. There was "suitable preparation of liquer" for meeting house "raising." During 55 years of ministry he never attended the Hartford North Consociation. As did most of the Connecticut ministers in 1741 and 1744, he opposed Whitfield. He d. 1794, æ. 80. His widow Marianna was always called "Madame Marsh" by his parishoners. After his death she resided in Somers, Ct., with her daughter Mrs. Cooley and was buried there. Children:

"Resolved, that we cordially recommend all classes of our fellow citizens to attend with us the funeral of Mr. Marsh from his late residence on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, and that during the solemn services all the stores be closed."—Penn Yan Paper. 

dau. of Isaac Marsh Nov. 7, 1779." Gen. Isaac Marsh is called "Capt. Isaac Marsh of Stockbridge" in his father's little book from 1778 to 1784 and "Col. Isaac Marsh of Stockbridge, June 29, 1792," altho Gen. Isaac d. at Tyringham, near Stockbridge, Mass., Aug. 27, 1792, æ. 44, apparently away from home. His residence at Stockbridge led to his familiarity with the Stockbridge Indians and to his purchasing from them, for £140, the township in Vermont which had been granted to them in 1782. They deeded the township to Gen. Isaac Marsh July 29, 1789. The deed was signed by 18 Indians then residents of New Stockbridge, Montgomery Co., N. Y., now Stockbridge, Madison Co. The Vermont township was called Marshfield in honor of Gen. Isaac Marsh, whom the Vermont Gazeteer confuses with Capt. Daniel⁵ Marsh, No. 903, who m. widow Anna (Stanley) Pitkin, whose sons were of the first settlers of Marshfield. Capt. Daniel's dau. Hannah m. Caleb Pitkin, his wife's son, and the parents visited their children there several times even up to the very year of Mrs. Marsh's death. None of Gen. Isaac's children went that way. 






The plan of the burial plat of Daniel² Marsh as it exists in the old Hadley cemetery in 1894 is worthy of notice.



3987 = 9. DANIEL² MARSH

b. at Hartford, Ct., about 1653, son of John¹ Marsh of Hartford and Hadley, and Anne Webster, dau. of Gov. John Webster of Connecticut, came with his father and family when seven years of age to Hadley, Mass: He must have remembered all his life the breaking up at Hartford below and the journey up the beautiful river and the founding of the new town, Norwottock, in the broad valley where red men had wandered for ages in sight of Mt. Holyoke and Mt. Tom, and the higher Green mountain ranges east and west. must have always remembered the death of his mother's father, Gov. Webster, whose home was with them, coming as that blow did to the new colony within a year of the settlement; and his burial April 5, 1661, he could not forget, nor the death of his mother June 6, 1662. In 1675 and 1676 there was serious trouble with the Indians and his brother and he were led to marry young widows whose first husbands had been not long slain. He m. Nov. 5, 1676, No. 3987.

3987. Widow Hannah (Lewis) Crow, whose husband Samuel "was slain at Fallsfight, May 18, 1676," less than six months before. Hannah³ Lewis was dau, of William² and Mary (Hopkins) Lewis, who lived and died at Farmington, Ct. William² was son of William¹ and Felix Lewis who came to America in 1632. This earliest William Lewis was a resident of Braintree and Cambridge, Mass., then of Hartford's first settlers in 1636 and in 1660 a founder of Hadley. He represented Hadley in 1662 and Northampton in 1664. removed to Farmington, Ct. before Nov. 29, 1677. The Lewis home lot in Hadley was bought by Daniel Marsh and occupied later by two of Daniel's sons. But Daniel himself never resided there. Shortly after marriage we find him and his brother Jonathan at the lot which had belonged to John Crow. John Crow removed to Hartford and Jonathan and Daniel Marsh bought his lot. On or before the death of his father, Daniel removed to the home lot and remained there for life. In 1669 we first find his name signed to a public document. He became one of the principal landowners in the town, in 1701 standing second as to quantity and in 1720, fourth in valuation. In 1699 he was assigned a lot on Pine Plain 16 rods by 80, eight acres, which included the tract where now stand the town house and meeting house and his son Capt. Job Marsh lived for a while at that corner of Middle street. For 13 different years between his 29th and 62d year, 1682 and 1715, he was chosen one of the selectmen. He was sent representative to Boston in 1692 and often afterward. In 1689 he was on an important committee as to the grammar school. He sent his third son to Harvard college 1701–1705. He d. Feb. 24, 1725, æ. 72. After 168 years his gravestone may be seen with those of 22 of his children and their descendants, in his burial lot in Hadley graveyard.

3996 = 3989. SERGT. JOHN³ MARSH

b. at Hadley, Mass., March 9, 1679, son of Daniel² and Hannah (Lewis) Marsh, (John¹), was in an Indian fight in 1704. His mother had no doubt told him how her first husband was killed by red men and the husband of his Aunt Dorcas Marsh too in 1675 and 1676. Five Hampshire towns had been given up for a year or two. Then in his boyhood came the "second Indian war 1688 to 1698" and then "1702 to 1713" the "third Indian war." Feb. 29, 1704 was a day to be remembered by him. French and Indians fell upon Deerfield, set the town on fire, murdered and scalped, slew 38 in the palisaded village, and took 112 captive. John³ Marsh of Hadley and John³ Marsh his cousin of Hatfield were of the soldiers from Hadley and Hatfield who 57 in number hurried to burning Deerfield; they drove the Indians out, fought them in Deerfield meadow, followed them a mile and

more and had to retreat leaving nine of their number dead. In all, of the 112 captives, two escaped, 22 were slain or perished on the way to Canada, 28 remained in Canada and 60 returned. The famous antiquarian, George Sheldon of Deerfield, states that he is in doubt which John Marsh is the one numbered among the captives in the official list: but as it reads "John Marsh and Sarah Dickinson two Hatfield persons" see No. 2837, we must conclude that it was not Sergt. John Marsh of Hadley, although Hadley History, p. 273, mentions him as in the fight. "Hadley had five men slain." He had hardly time to go to Canada and back for he m. June 27, 1704, No. 3996.

That year he was juryman at Springfield, and Hadley voted to raise and give Mr. Hezekiah Porter of Farmington, Ct., bonesetter, £62 if he settle in Hadley and £52 if in Hatfield or Northampton. April 14, 1739, Ebenezer Marsh sold to Hezekiah Porter the north half of his homelot with house, barn and fencing and May 24, 1741 bought it back. In J. Pierce's diary we read, "May 6, 1744, Cornet Marsh admonished in church; he withdraws. March 5, 1746, I went this day at Cornet Marsh's desire with him to Rev. Mr. Williams, to desire him to move to have his confession red. March 16, church voted Mr. Marsh's confession red next Sabbath. Jan. 23, 1747, Indian soldier dies at Cornet Marsh's about 50 years of age." Mary (Parsons) Marsh, d. July 2, 1759, in her 69th year. Cornet Marsh m. (2) Feb., 1760, No. 4042.

4042. Miriam —, who d. July 30, 1765 in her 63d year. In his will dated April 14, 1764, he gives to his son Ebenezer five acres on the south side of his home lot with orcharding and buildings thereon and to son John five acres on the north side (which Dr. Ezekiel Porter sold to Benjamin Colt, Nov. 5, 1761, though not recorded until Oct. 30, 1765) also to Dr. Ezekiel Porter a lot of land "for doctoring my former wife." That land, eight acres, 80 by 16 rods, was given to Daniel Marsh, April 5, 1699, in a division by the town. At the same time a similar lot immediately south was allotted to Experience Porter whose dau. Hannah m. 1722, William Marsh and lived there next to Capt. Job his brother. Town records mention Capt. Job Marsh, first 1719, fence viewer, 1724, committee on cutting staddles (the town made persistent efforts to save young trees) 1725 fence viewer, 1727 till death in 1746, 19 years, town clerk, also both town clerk and treasurer, except one year, from 1738 till death, and in 1738 also selectman and assessor, 1744 committee on highway to Pelham, 1745 to prosecute trespassers.

Pierce's diary calls him Capt. and also his monument gives him that title. Hon. Samuel Porter, importer, representative, judge and county sheriff, d. July 29, 1722, leaving to his family an estate of over £10,000, £196 in goods were on way from London; 1642 acres of land in Brookfield were to be equally divided among his seven He left in his will £700 to his dau. Mehitable Marsh. He had lived on the Stanley lot which came into possession of Capt. Job Marsh; just when does not appear nor how soon he moved there from Pipe Plain street, where he was recorded in 1720. (History Hadley, p. 286.) In 1731 he is recorded at the Stanley lot. (See History Hadley, p. 291.) June 9, 1733 he bought of Joseph³ Smith a home lot of five acres with its buildings next north from his own Stanley lot for £190 in bills of credit. He evidently sold the lot where the town hall and First church now (1895) stand in 1742. The deed says "3d Nov., 1742, Job Marsh of Hadley sells to Josiah Pierce, Gentleman a certain Homelot containing eight acres more or less bounded north on a highway, south William Marsh deceased or his heir William Marsh a minor, west on the Pine Plain street and east on Isaac Selden, with a Dwelling House, Well, Barn, Hovelling, Orcharding, Fencing, etc." And J. Pierce's diary reads, "Feb. 28, 1743, This day I receive deed of homelot of Mr. Marsh at 330 pounds." "May 17, 1743. Mr. Marsh moves out of my house." These two extracts will interest descendants of Judge Perez⁴ Marsh of Berkshire Co., son of Capt. Job3. "Sept. 9, 1741. Received of Mr. Job Marsh £1, 4s, in or for buying several books." "Aug. 15, 1744. Go to Cambridge and offer Perez Marsh to college. (Accepted.)" Mr. Job Marsh must have had tenants in one or more of his houses. Mehitable (Porter) Marsh d. July 13, 1739, æ. 44. He m. (2) Sept. 19, 1742, No. 4050.

4050. Rebecca Pratt of Hartford, Ct. He d. Aug. 29, 1746. His will, dated Aug. 15, 1746, gives to his beloved wife Rebecca "one hundred pounds old tenor out of my personal estate and my negro man Robin to be at her own disposal forever, and the improvement of the third part of my real estate during the time of her remaining my widow." After special gifts to Moses, Perez and Joseph he adds, "To my sons Samuel and Daniel the remainder of my Real and Personal estate." In the division Samuel had the five acre home lot and buildings north side and Daniel the five acre lot and buildings south. Before 1770 Capt. Moses⁴, son of Job³ had the five acre home

lot next north (the original Andrew Bacon lot) and the families of these three brothers were side by side. Mrs. Rebecca Marsh soon removed to Hartford, Ct. and was buried there in the old church yard Sept. 29, 1768. Children:

(See History Hadley, p. 199.) This is the lot next south of the first church in Hadley. Experience Porter removed to Mansfield, Ct. Mr. William Marsh d. Nov. 3, 1727. He was owner of half the original John¹ Marsh lot, and in 1743 his minor son William⁴ owned the Pine Plain lot. The inventory of William³ Marsh's estate included "guns, horns, powder, pistols, holster, etc. Homestead £90. Total, £547, 10s., 6d." Widow Hannah Marsh removed to

Mansfield, Ct., and m. (2) in May, 1735, Major Joseph Storrs of Mansfield, and d. Aug. 28, 1741. Children:

b. at Hadley, Mass., March 27, 1713, son of Cornet Ebenezer³ and Mary (Parsons) Marsh, (Daniel², John¹); graduated at Harvard college 1738 and settled at Westminster, Mass., then "Narraganset No. 2," Oct. 20, 1742, on the day of incorporation of the town; salary £150 a year in addition to land. He m. (1) No. 4062.

4062. Widow Deborah (Lorin) Lathrop of Boston, a skillful painter, a lady of wealth who set her table with china and silver and brought her own servants from Boston. She d. Nov. 21, 1756, æ. 39. They had "'tis said' worthless continental money enough to paper a house. He m. (2) July 25, 1757, No. 4063.

4063. Susannah (Wilder) Willard, whose first husband, Col. Samuel Willard, b. at Lancaster, Nov. 12, 1718, had m. this Susanna of Lancaster in 1743 and resided at Petersham. He d. ill in camp, Oct. 25, 1755 in command of his regiment of 800 men.

Rev. Elisha was in Westminster about 28 years, leaving in 1770, though dismissed from his pastorate in 1758. He then removed to Walpole, Cheshire Co., N. H. and lived 14 years more and became Judge of Court of Common Pleas. He d. in 1784, in Lancaster at the house of his wife's brother from effects of a fall from his horse in Roxbury, Mass.

His well-known great-grandson, Luther R. Marsh, Esq. of New York. once a partner of Webster, long a commissioner of Central Park, who is retired at Middletown, N. Y., after a practice of 53 years, describes his ancestor as "sprightly and original," says well, "he found it impossible to contain himself within ministerial conventionalities. He was constantly violating the puritan tone of that day. His wit bubbled over the pulpit enclosure." Tradition said that he once stepped down from the pulpit and in the sanctuary engaged his farm help for the next day; that he was so positive that one member of the church with himself made a majority. The centennial orator of Westminster records that the houses and church were protected against Indians by stockades and muscular Christians took muskets to meeting and charge was brought against the minister for "stumping one of his church members on the Sabbath, to swop powder hornstrings with him." A county sheriff had occasion to serve process upon the town of Westminster and could legally do it by serving the writ on any townsman. He first met the parson, as he rode in; took off his hat, handed him the writ and said, "The Grace of God, Mr. Marsh," and Rev. Elisha gave instant retort, "Yes, by the hands of the devil."

He was put on trial for saying "That obedience is the condition of salvation;" also for saying, "that if all that was required of a man was to believe, then the condition of salvation was easy and pleasant to fools;" also "that he would as soon worship the devil, as worship such a being as required more of his creatures than they are able to perform, and that he did not worship such a being."

After 125 years from his settlement the historical discourse of Parson Rich sums up fairly, "The originality of his language and the keen force of his logic, so wittily and boldly expressed, showed that he possessed no ordinary mind, and, if not much devotion, yet a good deal of common sense and of eminently practical faith."

His name is evidently permanently written upon the town and his thought helped mark its history. We cannot help agreeing with his not less unique and witty great-grandson, Luther R. that his characteristics fitted him better for the law than the ministry. We do not wonder that this great-grandson visiting Westminster a few years since sought out the old meeting house that had moved about, became a store and then a barn, and knocked out from one of the massive

timbers an oak pin that had seasoned for 140 years and had listened for 15 years to sermons of the Rev. Elisha. Children:

He was descended from Edward Rawson who came to Newburyport, Mass., in 1636 and was in Boston in 1650 and secretary of the colony there 36 years. Mr. Marsh's great-grandfather Rev. Grindal Rawson m. in 1798 Dorothy, great-grand-daughter of Rev. Charles Chauncev, second president of Harvard college, whose lineage is traced back to the ancient crowns of England, France and Germany. Luther Marsh removed from Walpole to Onondaga Co., N. Y. On his way perhaps was awhile editor at Elizabethtown, N. Y. The New York state Gazetteer gives "The Reveille, the first paper in the county (Essex) was started at Elizabethtown, about 1810, by Luther Marsh." He seems to have been as eccentric as his grandfather for while high sheriff of Onondaga Co., in riding through what was ironically called "Christian Hollow," seeing a man suddenly drop his hoe and make for the woods, in his exuberant strength, activity and vitality he dismounted and after hot pursuit grasped the panting fugitive and explained, "Well, I have no process against you now, but I thought I would let you know that if I ever did have any, it wouldn't do you any good to run." We get a glimpse of Gov. DeWitt Clinton slapping on the knee the senator who asked him to reappoint Sheriff Marsh and saying "Squire Birdseye, I wish you to understand that the good people of Pompey Hill cannot have all the offices in the state of New York."

The son of Emma Rawson had "lost his own mother on the anniversary of his seventh birthday." That seventh anniversary came April 4, 1820. Luther Marsh m. (2) No. 4076.

4076. Margaret Leonard, dau. of Rev. Joshua who graduated at Brown university in 1788 and after preaching at Ellington, Ct., settled in Cazenovia, N. Y., and in May, 1799 formed the first Presbyterian church and has published that then from Cazenovia to the Pacific ocean and in New York state to the north and south of him there was not one Congregational church or Presbyterian pastor. From 1814

to 1822 he was principal of Pompey academy. Margaret Leonard was descended from James Leonard who came from Pontypool, Wales, in 1652, to Taunton, Mass., and set up the first iron works established in this country. Luther Marsh d. at Chicago, Ill., Nov. 14, 1859. Child:



Elisha⁴, Cornet Ebenezer³, Daniel², John¹); a remarkable man, by heredity charged, 100 years before he was born, with somewhat of the erratic, independent tendencies of the clergyman and judge, his great-grandfather; by environment in constant association from boyhood with not a few of America's foremost men, the intimate companion of Gov. Horatio Seymour and a partner of Webster; in student life at Capt. Partridge's celebrated military academy in Connecticut among splendid competitors gaining a medal for the second best English oration and commended therefor by no less a judge than Aaron Burr; a profound admirer of eloquence, going to Bunker Hill to hear Webster's address, eagerly seeking to know and hear every great man, thrilled and captivated by Theodore Dwight Weld, "the grandest platform orator of that or perhaps of any time;" by choice a lawyer and public speaker, delighted with literary refinement and culture, an intimate friend of Lester, author of the "Glory and Shame of England" and guest of Willis at Glen Mary, rising in New York City to rank among those at the very front, brimfull and bubbling over with wit and fun, meeting safely the keenest at the bar; chosen by the New York Historical society to attend Webster's funeral at Marshfield and giving the society an address on return, selected by Raymond to write for the New York Times a four column article on Webster's death, which was included by the Appletons in their Memorials of Webster, chosen by the N. Y. legislature in 1882-3 on the commission to locate grounds for public parks which shall meet the future needs of the city of New York: helping wisely in care of Central Park and suggesting provision for the public at Niagara, his

life has been too full and brilliant to be given here with any completeness. As to opinions in which he chooses to differ from the world at large this is not the place to state or discuss them and the great future has time enough to test and finally judge them.

He spent several years in various places before settling in New York City, first at Pompey, then at Middletown, Ct., then clerk at Onondaga Hill, next at Skaneateles 1830–36, then in New York City, then at Utica 1837–42 where he conducted in 1840 a campaign paper called *The Sledge Hammer*. While at Utica he joined Horatio Seymour, No. 150, in a campaign tour through the Boonville region advocating the democratic faith.

There at Utica came a turning point. Theo. D. Weld in 16 lectures without a note before him, rounded out his great argument for the abolition of slavery. That remarkable man Alvan Stewart gave up most of his time to anti-slavery and temperance movements and did more than any other man to unite whigs and abolitionists and form the republican party. Mr. Marsh was gradually weaned from being an ardent democrat to free soil sentiments, and when the extension of slavery into new territory assumed importance he joined the republican party. Stewart's words in 1841, "These states must necessarily be in eternal conflict until liberty conquers slavery, or slavery overturns the liberty of all," preceded Senator Seward's historic expression, the "irrepressible conflict," and Lincoln's aphorism, "these states can never remain half slave and half free." After about five years at Utica, Mr. Marsh returned to New York and made that the headquarters of all his brilliant business life.

I cannot give dates after long effort but from an encyclopedia I read what may help explain the modification of his political views. "As soon as Mr. Marsh was fairly established in his profession he consummated an engagement he had formed." He m. No. 4078.

4078. Jeannie E. Stewart, daughter of Alvan Stewart, a lady to whom Mrs. Fanny Osgood dedicated a poem and of whom Gen-Geo. P. Morris sang some years after:

Jeannie Marsh of Cherry Valley, In whose name the muses rally, Of all the nine, none so divine As Jeannie Marsh of Cherry Valley. A sylvan nymph of queenly grace, A goddess she in form and feature, The sweet expression of the place, A dimple in the smile of nature. Not long after, Mr. Marsh took a house in 15th St., New York, near Dr. Cheever's church, where his father-in-law lived with him until the death of Mr. Stewart in 1849. About 1883 Mr. Marsh was accustomed to spend his summers partly at Newport and at the beautiful village of Charlestown, N. H., and the rest on his farm at Brockton, Lake Erie, amid his orchards and vineyards. Of recent years he has retired from business and lives at 10 Barton St., Middletown, Orange Co., N. Y.

I will give of many, a single example of his wit. A case was suffering from the "law's delay" owing to the many engagements of the Judge. Finally Mr. Marsh inquired "Have you settled the case of Col. Sheep?" "Col. Sheep," said the Judge, "I do not remember any such case." "Perhaps your Honor will remember it better by the name it had when it came into your custody, that of Colonel Lamb." The case was settled within a week.

We are indebted to Col. L. B. Marsh of Boston, President of the Marsh Family Association, 1887 to 1893, for the following sketch of the Marsh brothers of the firm Jordan, Marsh & Co.

Benjamin L7. Marsh and his junior brother Charles7 Marsh, sons of Reuben⁶ and Mary Marsh of Chesterfield, N. H., came to Boston and each entered stores as salesmen previous to 1850. Benjamin was not a novice in business experience when, with Mr. Eben D. Jordan, the house of Jordan, Marsh & Co., was established in 1851. He had received a most excellent business education with one of the largest and most respectable dry goods importing and jobbing houses in our city. He was one of those young men who at once win confidence and esteem. The firm of Jordan, Marsh & Co., commenced business under very favorable circumstances, being supplied very considerably by one of the largest commission houses in England that had connections with manufacturers who sought an outlet for their surplus goods. With these and other advantages, including his large acquaintance with the trade, their ability was sufficient to win from the start a large share of business. In a short time their credit was firmly established and they had the confidence and good will of the public.

In 1865 Benjamin died. He was regarded as a most excellent business man. For fourteen years of active business he enjoyed the confidence and respect of the mercantile community. In social life he was kind-hearted, benevolent, a true friend and an esteemed citizen. He was ambitious, courageous and successful. He lived to see the business that he and his partners had created and developed, become one of the largest in our city.

His brother Charles was admitted a partner about 1852. He too had experience in business in the house of Pearl, Smith & Co., as a salesman. As such he had shown marked ability and was very popular. He well sustained his brother in his particular department of the business. At his brother's death he took his place and his executive ability and courage as well as business knowledge, were manifest in the increase and development of the immense business they were then doing.

It is very seldom that three partners are so suitably associated in business as were Mr. Eben D. Jordan, Benjamin L. Marsh and Charles Marsh. Each had his peculiar and distinctive traits of character. No wonder that the junior partners of such men are distinguished for great mercantile ability. Mr. Jordan, still in active business, is enjoying the fruits of the united labor, energy and success of their well developed mercantile capacity.

Without doubt hard work and an overtaxed brain caused the death of Benjamin L. Marsh at the age of 41; and the same causes may also have contributed to the death of his brother Charles at the age of 57.

THE WETHERSFIELD, LYME, NORWICH, CT., LINE.

An upright and charitable man, an exemplary Christian. Who departed this life greatly lamented by all who knew him, Oct. 3, 1775, in the 69th year of his age." "Mrs. Mary Marsh Porter, relict of Dr. Ezekiel Porter, who died Nov. 17, 1796, æ. 80." At her age of 77 President Stiles of Yale, a zealous early reporter, sought interview with her May 25, 1792 as to the Hadley regicide Judges, and called her "a sensible and judicious woman." (See his pleasing report of her; History of Hadley, pp. 219 and 220.) Skillful in medicine and a daring horse-woman, after Dr. Porter's death, Widow Mary continued his practice and had patients for some distance in neighboring towns. Her marriage to Dr. Porter may

have had connection with Dr. Hezekiah Porter's short residence in Hadley at her father's door and it no doubt led to the removal of her two brothers Jonathan and John to Wethersfield, and to Dr. Jonathan's choice of profession and also his son's choice and his daughter's marriage to Dr. Lee who studied with his uncle Dr. Ezekiel Porter. Dr. Samuel Lee's mother was sister of Dr. Ezekiel and dau. of Dr. Samuel Porter. Children:

Ct., with his sister's husband, Dr. Ezekiel Porter or her father-in-law, Dr. Samuel Porter of Farmington, Ct. This led him to settle for a time at Wethersfield, but eventually at Norwich, Ct. During the French war he was in the northern army, 1755-7, a skillful surgeon. In the Colonial Records of Connecticut he is called "army surgeon in the expedition to Crown Point." "March 13, 1746, he received deed of land in Norwich, Ct., describing him 'of Weathersfield in the county of Hartford, Colony of Connecticut.'" He m. Nov. 5, 1747, No. 4133.

4133. Sarah Hart of Farmington, Ct., great-grand-daughter of Stephen Hart of Farmington. He owned land at the foot of Mt. Holyoke in Hockanum, Hadley, probably a part of the land recorded in 1674 as given by Hadley town to his great-grandfather "John1 Marsh his heirs, executors and assigns forever." The record of that "parcell" Dec. 19, 1674 reads "alsoe in the meddow called Hockanum. One parcell containing flour akars one rood and thirty-three poles more or less," "abutting on the river norwest and the lotts running up the mountain southeast in bredth ffive rod and $\frac{4}{10}$ of a rod." His two sons held this land up to Nov. 30, 1791. Dr. Marsh's death was due to his profession, from the absorption of virus in treating a wound caused by an explosion at Hartford in celebrating the repeal of the stamp act in 1766. He d. June 3, 1766 in the 47th year of his age and was buried in the church yard at Wethersfield. family remained at Norwich but his brother and sister lived at Wethersfield, almost a part of Hartford. The malignity of the disease may account for burial near by. The explosion above mentioned took place in the upper room of a school building where many young men of Hartford were making cartridges and other fireworks. Children:

Dr. Jonathan Marsh's daughter. Dr. Lee was social, skillful and of extensive practice. Of great agility and muscular strength he once hopped 40 feet at three bounds, and once lifted a cart with nine men in it by getting under it. He entered into the revolutionary struggle with great zeal, was on committee to examine applicants for service as army surgeons and served himself until the war closed. He became intimate with Maj. Gen. Charles Lee, the English officer who served under Washington and named one of his sons after him. He d. at Windham, Dec. 7, 1805. The historian of the John Lee Family, Sarah Marsh⁷ Lee, writes of the grandmother Sarah⁵ (Marsh) Lee after whom she was named, "My grandmother must have been very much like her Aunt Mary (Mary [Marsh] Porter, 4095). She certainly inherited a skill in surgery, even setting bones. Her husband used to say that she could perform all these operations as well, if not better than he could and he was a very skillful surgeon." Children:

J. Pierce's diary reads, "Dec. 9, 1742, begin to instruct Eben Marsh in Arithmetic Monday and Thursday evenings." He was then 19 or 21. He was field driver 1743 and 1744. He m. Dec. 4, 1746, No. 4287.

viewer, 1771, 72 and 73, sealer of leather. In 1773, while living himself at the original John Marsh lot, Cornet Ebenezer bought of the town an addition to his son Timothy's home lot, which was the south half of the original William Lewis lot. William Lewis was Timothy Marsh's grandfather's grandfather. This addition was on the east, eight rods square and towards Pine Plain St. He was on committee 1773 to set bounds of street, 1774 to repair wharf of north end of the town, and on "correspondence" Jan. 4, 1775 to receive donations for Boston and Charlestown, chosen selectman, refused to serve, 1776 fence viewer, 1778 highway surveyor, 1779 on town money, on committee with militia officers, delegate to convention at Northampton, to examine war services, on transfer of credit. Voted June 28, 1779, transfer of Timothy Marsh's service to his father's account. He was moderator of four town meetings that year, Aug. 23, Sept. 13, Oct. 19 and 20. In 1780 by town vote, corn was estimated at \$20 a bushel. He was on committee for clothing and to procure soldiers, to give opinion against Mr. Strong and to seat meeting house, 1781 to collect minister's salary, to build pews and estimate their dignity and to seat the meeting house, on purchasing for the army and to meet delegates, 1782 sealer of leather, 1783 to see Mr. Hopkins, 1784 to seat meeting house and about soldiers, 1785 sealer of leather and on wearing of river bank, 1786 delegate to Hatfield convention, 1791 about town land. He d. May 29, 1795 æ. by family record 74, or by gravestone, (both in good preservation) 72. His gravestone stands near the north end of his grandfather Daniel's lot and also his wife's, who d. Jan. 31, 1794. Distribution of his estate gave to Timothy the homestead on which he lives, with buildings on same. To Sarah four acres and one hundred and forty-six rods on south side of homestead on which he lived, the original John Marsh lot. To Ebenezer north side of homestead one acre and ninety-four rods and liberty of ingress and egress to buildings partly on Sarah's land.

When seven he saw Sammy Sumner (age 6) drowned and long after would not allow his own children to play at the river. In 1806 his mother sold the place, and m. Josiah Cowles and removed to Leverett. He was early apprenticed to a shoemaker, but disliked the trade and was bound out to Silas Ball of Townsend, Vt., and when 21 took certificate that he had learned the carpenters and joiners trade. With a large muscular frame he would surpass the other apprentices in feats of strength and skill. He worked, his first free year in Westfield, Mass., and joined a military company, the only one thereabouts not ordered to Boston in 1814. He worked one season at Pompey, N. Y. and visited Niagara Falls and the battle field of Lundy's Lane.

In the "great revival" of 1816 he joined the church as did his after wife Harriet Warner. He is described at this time as full of humor and fond of a joke, but withal a very religious man. Having made his home in Hadley or Leverett in 1820, Dec. 26 he bought of Elihu Warner for \$240 two and one-half acres on Middle St. the east end of a lot sold by Capt. Moses Marsh in 1782, built a one and one-half story house and m. Oct. 25, 1821, No. 4318.

Harriet Warner, dau. of Elihu, Orange, Jacob, Jacob, Andrew of Cambridge, 1632, Hartford 1639 and of Hadley first settlers. Jonathan6 Marsh in 1821 was taxed on the old Marsh lot. Warner and Marsh families had lived on West St. side by side for 160 years, just where the main highway now passes out toward Northampton. At the death of his uncle Ebenezer⁵ his house had come into possession of Jonathan6 who tore it down, using some of the timber in his new home. His father-in-law also in 1822 sold the old Warner homestead and built a two-story house next south of his dau, on Middle St. so that the Marsh and Warner families were still side by side. At one time with other carpenters Jonathan⁵ Marsh did work on the south college at Amherst and in 1841 he helped move the old Hadley meeting house from West to Middle St. opposite his home and the next year he helped finish it off in its present shape. He also added a half story to his house. He d. May 3, 1843, leaving his widow and five children. She d. Sept. 24, 1864. Hampshire Gazette May 11, 1843 has: "Died, in Hadley, May 3, after a short but exceedingly painful sickness Mr. Jonathan Marsh, aged fifty, whose memory will be long and fondly cherished not only by his widow, children, aged mother and other family connections to whom he was inexpressibly dear, but by the people of the town of which he was a valuable citizen, and the church whereof for many years he was an exemplary member." 

It is in Van Wert Co., O. and there was then no white settlement west nearer than St. Louis. Young Willshire had six years experience with buckskin clothes and Indian boys. Allen G. Thurman was a schoolmate in 1820 while the family was delayed there, and such men as William Henry Harrison and Henry Clay were guests in his father's cabin, half way from Fort St. Mary to Fort Wayne and the only cabin within 30 miles of either place. William Willshire returned to Connecticut when 13 and was apprenticed to a jeweler in Hartford nearly seven years. He has resided in New York City and in Lima, Mansfield and Columbus, O. He has shaken hands with every president of the United States from Monroe to Benjamin Harrison and has eaten mush with a gold spoon in the executive mansion with General Jackson when he was president of the United States. In 1763 on committee to build pews, 1764 moderator, selectman, assessor, committee to seat meeting house, 1765 moderator, 1766 assessor, 1767 moderator, 1768 to seat meeting house and prepare letter to Boston, 1770 committee of inquiry, selectman, assessor, to lease land at lower end of the street, and Aug. 3, moderator, 1771 and 1772 moderator, 1773 to sell part of the back street, constable, refused to serve, selectman. Granted to east end of lot, 5 rods, four feet by 16 rods, 10 feet, May 14 moderator, Oct. 7 on correspondence, Nov. 4 moderator, and to sett street bounds, 1774 moderator, June 9 and on correspondence, 1775 on

correspondence. (That year a committee to bring cannon from Williamstown.) Selectman 1776, on provision committee on pest house, moderator, Jan. 30, May 3, May 30, July 8.

That the town was in earnest J. Pierce's diary shows: "April 20, 1775. We receive the news of the battle of Lexington at 9 A. M.! At one, fifty men march from Hadley." J. Pierce town clerk in 1776 administers the salt petre oath to Capt. Moses Marsh, "you do solemnly swear that the whole process of the manufacture of the salt petre now presented by you was begun, carried on and finished within the limits of this colony, and that no foreign salt petre is mixed therewith. So help you God."

At a meeting of the inhabitants of Hadley at the meeting house May 30, 1776, at 3 P. M. warned and assembled to instruct their representative, they voted that "If the American congress should for the safety of the United Colonies declare them independent of the kingdom of Great Britain, we the inhabitants of said Hadley will engage with our lives and fortunes to support them in the measure. Capt. Moses Marsh, Moderator."

J. Pierce's diary reads on, "Nov. 3. Fifteen men innoculated at Capt. Marsh's to the great disturbance of the day as sabbath and sacrament. Nov. 7. Innoculating hospital burnt."

In 1778 he was moderator and constable; in 1779 delegate to county convention; 1780 to give opinion against Mr. Strong. March 12, 1782 he sold his place, the original Andrew Bacon lot, with the easterly addition for £425, to John Chester Williams, nine acres more or less, with house, barn and all buildings. took action and the N. Y. Oil, Paint and Drug Reporter of March 26, 1884, gave extended report, here much abridged.

"Mr. Edward H. Marsh, of the firm of Lazell, Marsh & Gardner, d. suddenly Sunday morning at his residence in Brooklyn. He was well Saturday and at business as usual and in the evening with wife and sister visited the art exhibition; retired well, woke at 2 A. M. and d. in 20 minutes. He was born at Hadley, Mass., in 1829; at 16 entered employ of C. A. Harrington & Co., of Worcester; next spent five years with L. T. Lazell druggist and then went into business for himself at Worcester. Removed to Bellows Falls; Mr. Lazell, going to New York and finding he could buy the jobbing business of Haskell, Merrick & Bull, telegraphed to Mr. Marsh, for whom he had a strong personal liking, and in whose business capacity he placed great confidence, to see if he would join him. In result March 1, 1855, the firm of Lazell, Marsh & Hunn was formed, continuing till 1860 when the style was changed to Lazell, Marsh & Gardiner. Marsh and Mr. Lazell were partners 29 years and associates in business 35 years. Mr. Lazell called their partnership something more than a business relation, a warm personal friendship intensified by time. He knew Mr. Marsh thoroughly. At times impetuous, partly due to physical suffering he was a man of ingrain truthfulness and justice and could always be depended upon to do unflinchingly what he believed to be right. He left a wife and four children, the youngest 14. The oldest was obliged to retire from connection with the house on account of ill health. The second, a graduate of the School of Mines is now pursuing his studies under Prof. Hoffman at Berlin. A third after graduating at Amherst last year entered the employ of his father's firm."

As soon as Mr. Marsh's death was generally known a meeting of the Drug, Paint and Chemical exchange organization was called and resolutions were passed of heartfelt sympathy with the family with these strong words as to his character. "Endowed by nature with deliberate judgment and a keen perception of and devotion to, the principles of justice; trained from youth to the calling to which his years of manhood have been untiringly devoted, he has been a living example of the best type of the merchant and the citizen."

In moving the adoption of the minute Mr. D. C. Robbins recollected very well the honorable beginning of this firm. It succeeded

the old firm of Haskell & Merrick and sustained its reputation; always honorable in its dealings, always the representative of the highest mark in the trade. The firm located in New York City and made a most important change in the system of credits instituting for the first time in our midst the rule that settlements should be made at the end of six months. I was so struck with the scheme that in my next statements I gave notice to the trade that I should pursue the same course.

Mr. Gellatly indorsed every word and added "I desire for the sake of the religion which he professed to add my testimony as to the sincerity with which he was a follower of the Lord Jesus Christ. Prominent as a business man, he was equally prominent influential and useful as a member of the church with which he was connected."

THE BERKSHIRE LINE. JUDGE PEREZ MARSH AND HIS DESCENDANTS OF DALTON AND PITTSFIELD, BERKSHIRE COUNTY, MASS.

4680 = 4055. DR. AND JUDGE PEREZ⁴ MARSH

b. at Hadley, Mass., Oct. 25, 1729, son of Capt. Job³ and Mehitable (Porter) Marsh; (Daniel², John¹.) J. Pierce's diary gives hints as to early education of Perez: "Sept. 9, 1841. Received of Mr. Job Marsh £1, 4s. in order for buying of several books." "Aug. 15, 1744. Go to Cambridge and offer Perez Marsh to college (accepted)." Josiah Pierce was a graduate of Harvard college 1735 and a notable man. (See No. 3746.) Perez graduated at Harvard college, 1748, was A. M. 1754 at both Harvard and Yale. He probably studied with Dr. Thomas Williams, at any rate he was his surgeon's mate in the French and Indian war of 1755, and made report of the entire loss, American and English, in the different regiments at the battle of Lake George, Sept. 8, 1755, when Col. Ephraim Williams, the founder of Williams college, was killed. The following paragraph is from the account of that battle in the History of the Williams Family.

"According to a return made by Dr. Perez Marsh, surgeon's mate in Col. Williams' regiment, the loss on the part of the English and Americans in both the engagements, was 216 killed and 96 wounded, making a total of 312 and a few missing. Col. Williams' regiment suffered the most, 46 were killed, 20 wounded and several missing." Dr. Perez is also spoken of as "attending to divers sick men at Fort Lyman."

He had been brought into contact with the Williams family by the fact that his uncle John^a Marsh No. 3996 had married Sarah Williams No. 3998, who was sister of Rev. William Williams of Hatfield and

aunt of his surgeon, Dr. Thomas Williams and of Col. Ephraim in whose regiment he was surgeon's mate. This also led on to his relation to Sarah Williams, who was dau. of Col. Israel, son of Rev. William Williams.

The tradition in the Marsh family, handed down from the fair Sarah⁵, is that the gallant Colonel Ephraim⁴ who was over 40, desired to marry Sarah⁵ who was 19 and dau. of his half cousin Col. Israel⁴. Isaac² Williams (son of Robert¹) had, by first wife, Martha Park, a son, Rev. William³ and by second wife Judith Cooper, had children Sarah³ (who m. John³ Marsh) and Ephraim³ of Stockbridge, Mass., father of Col. Ephraim⁴ and Dr. Thomas⁴. Col. Ephraim⁴ sought Sarah⁵. Sarah declined. He offered to make his will giving all his property to her before starting for Lake George. She still preferred the surgeon's mate aged 25, to the Colonel of 40 and at Albany the will was made which gave his property to Williams college.

We find, soon after the battle of Lake George, that Dr. Perez Marsh settled on the eastern edge of Pittsfield, the date is uncertain although said to be 1755. He is always spoken of as first of the settlers in what is now Dalton. It was called the Ashuelot Equivalent being given in exchange for lands in New Hampshire. This led the Hadley book to state p. 534, that Perez Marsh "was a physician in Pittsfield," and p. 603, "Sarah (Williams) m. — Marsh and resided in Ashuelot, N. H.," which was not the case. Dr. Perez Marsh m. about 1759, No. 4680.

William Pynchon founder of Springfield. Elizur was son of Edward Holyoke at Lynn, 1639 who m. 1612 our ancestor, Prudence Stockton, dau. Rev. John of Kinholt, England.
- Sarah⁷ Chester, 1707–1770, m. Col. Israel Williams, 1709–1789. Through Sarah (Williams) Marsh's father, Col. Israel, we all come from his mother, Christian Stoddard, who lived 1676-1764, and her ancestry. She was dau. of Rev. Solomon, 1643-1729, Harvard college 1662, minister at Northampton 56 years and the remarkable Esther Warham who lived 92 years, 1644-1736, dau, of Rev. John Warham, first minister of Windsor, Ct. and Jane, widow of Thomas Newbury. Rev. Solomon was son of Hon. Anthony Stoddard, 1618-1686, to Boston 1639, and Mary Downing (sister Sir George afterwards Lord Downing) dau. Hon. Emanuel and Lucy Winthrop, b. Jan. 9, 1600, (they both joined Salem church Nov. 4, 1638) sister Gov. John and dau. Adam3 Winthrop, b. London, Aug. 10, 1548, m. 1579, Anne Brown, who had a French Bible, d. 1629, dau. of Henry of Edwardston, clothier and Agnes Brown, d. Dec. 17, 1590, son of Adam2 Winthrop, 1498-1562, Lord of the Manor Groton and Patron of the living, (m. 1534 Agnes Sharpe, 1616-1665, dau. of Robert,) son of Adam¹ Winthrop and Joanna Burton. (Those who wish can trace in the Stoddard book their ancestry back from Hon. Anthony b. 1618 to William Stoddard, Knight who came, 1066, with his cousin William the Conqueror from Normandy to England.)

The Williams descent is from Robert¹, d. Sept. 1, 1693 and Elizabeth Stratton d. July 28, 1674. (They came over 1638.) Capt. Isaac², 1638–1708 and Martha Park, Rev. William³ Williams 1665 to 1741, a minister 56 years at Hatfield, Mass., called by his nephew, Jonathan Edwards, son of Esther Stoddard, "a great divine of very comprehensive knowledge;" "Christ was the great subject of his preaching;" and Dr. Chauncey in his sketch of eminent men in New England calls him "a greater man" than his father-in-law, Rev. Solomon Stoddard, who, Elliott says, "has always been considered one of the greatest divines in New England". Chauncey also thinks him greater than any of his sons who were all men of mark. His son

Col. Israel4 Williams, living 1709-1789, Harvard college 1729, active in French and Indian wars 1744 and 1755, commissary under Col. John Stoddard of Northampton (one of the three so called "river gods" who m. Prudence Chester sister of Col. Israel's wife) and upon Col. Stoddard's death, succeeded him and was charged with the plan of the entire system of works to protect all Western Massachusetts and Western New Hampshire. He had command of all the forces and garrisons from the Connecticut to the Housatonic and the Hudson. "Probably no man in the country during the war of 1755 rendered more efficient aid than Col. Williams." That was a school for the revolution. It makes us sad to say that his very lovalty to King and old England and the flag he had served under, made him a tory. "While confined in the jail at Northampton for his political sentiments, his dau. a girl of 17, (about 1770) carried him his daily food from Hatfield, submitting to the greatest indignities from suspicious opposers." To day of her death in Pittsfield, æ. 81, Dec. 11, 1834, she spoke of the revolutionary war as rebellion and of herself as a subject of the English crown. She was a woman of great wit and brilliancy, became wife of John Chandler Williams and in her dying room, taking the communion bread with the rector's words "Take and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for thee," irrepressibly replied, "That I will!" The people of Hatfield after the revolution grew more lenient, and being cured of their hostility to Col. Williams they were accustomed as for the minister when he entered or left church, so also to rise and continue standing while Col. Israel passed to his seat or the open air.

On the way to and from French and Indian battle fields, men of Hampshire found out the beauty and promise of the Housatonic valley and Berkshire Hills. There four of Col. Israel Williams' eight children settled, two at Pittsfield Center, and two, three miles east, in Ashuelot Equivalent, afterwards Dalton. At the center were Eunice, wife of Maj. Israel Stoddard, and Lucretia, who had cared for her father in Northampton jail, now the wife of John Chandler Williams, Esq., Harvard college 1778, whose three children m. one, Hon. Edward Newton; another, Moses Hayden, member of congress; a third, Harris Seymour of Canandaigua, N. Y.

Dea. William Williams and Dr. Perez and Sarah (Williams) Marsh settled as neighbors close by the eastern Pittsfield border, in full

sight of Pittsfield, on the slope whose ridge a little higher up commands a view of Greylock on the north and westward all the Housatonic valley, and the scalloped Taconic range toward wonderful sunsets, and through the gap where the Boston & Albany railway passes out of New England into New York, a glorious view of the mighty Catskill mountains.

At the age of 35 in 1764 Dr. Perez Marsh was appointed Judge of the Court of Common Pleas for Berkshire county and held the office for 16 years until 1781. Judge Perez and Sarah (Williams) Marsh joined the Pittsfield church in 1765, the next year after it was formed. Rev. Thomas Allen was their pastor and their daughter m. the famous parson's son. Five daughters married very prominent citizens of Pittsfield, and they could not have asked more pleasant surroundings or prospects.

The town of Dalton was "detached from Pittsfield" and incorporated in 1784 and the first meeting for its organization was held April 19th at the house of Judge Perez Marsh. Of the first warrants (four in all) one was posted in his dwelling house. Nathaniel Kellogg who had been with him one of the three first settlers about 1755, had m. No. 4008, Hannah Barnard Hastings, dau. of Abigail (Marsh) Hastings, who was cousin of Perez Marsh. Dea. William Williams did not move into Dalton till some years after 1755. He was a trustee of Williams college and for several years state senator, called in History of Dalton "a leader and guide, an ornament and glory to the town." Dr. Perez d. in his 55th year, May 20, 1784. Sarah (Williams) Marsh d. June 2, 1817, æ. about 81. Children:

Esquire Gold was a lawyer of considerable prominence in Pittsfield and by the five sisters, daughters of Perez Marsh, the Peck, Gold,

The poet graduated with Hawthorne at Bowdoin college in 1825. He is proof that the highest style of man can love truly more than once. He had m. in 1831, Mary S. Potter, who d. in Rotterdam, Holland, Nov. 29, 1835. He could never forget this first wife,

"Who to (his) youth was given, More than all things else to love him,"

nor cease to hear her

"Soft rebukes in blessings ended, Breathing from her lips of air." Hyperion shows the play of a true soul in passing from a past to a present. Crude, and not yet developed into the finish of his later song, it is young manhood looking backward and downward to a morning splendor receding and seeming lost in inconceivable depths and also it is an awakening to look onward and upward. It is absurd to say that "who has truly loved one, can never truly love another." Substitute Frances for "Mary" and Appleton for "Ashburton" and America for "England," and it is plain enough who led "Paul Flemming" sunsetward into new Eden.

When in 1843, Longfellow with his fair bride came to the two Gold homesteads in Pittsfield, the homes, side by side, of mother and son, your historian's father, Henry Marsh, Esq., Williams college 1815, the third graduate of Harvard law school, 1819, was living just across East St., opposite the Gold places. He was the only Marsh grandson of Judge Perez, whose seven married children were five daus. and Chester who had only three daus. and Henry Senior, who had two daus. and but one son, the only grandson of Marsh name. And yet of the many who assembled to greet the newly wedded pair, half or more were of Marsh descent. The scarlet tie of cousinship with each other and with the bride, was from Judge Perez and Sarah (Williams) Marsh, in the veins of Golds, Pecks, Marshes, Allens, Larneds, Westons, Kittredges, Watsons, Humphreys, Bushes, Hinsdales and others.

The writer, not out of his teens, nor long out of college was only too happy to be there. Here was a living poet! Some of us knew by heart half the "Voices of the Night." "Potnia, Potnia Nux," Holy, Holy Night, has been a talisman in this and other lands. That Longfellow had married a kinswoman, was honor enough; to be introduced, to touch the hand of each and have a pleasant word was added delight.

We have loved and honored Longfellow from that hour. Writing much he has no words to blot. At home in Harvard, having the ear of all the Englands, living in the fine old Cambridge mansion where Washington had his headquarters, his was an ideal home. There children came and sometimes

"Grave Alice, laughing Allegra, And Edith with golden hair"

would try to storm his castle wall, only to be put deeper down into the dungeon of his heart. There tragedy came. Oh the horror of it! when the drop of burning sealing wax fell upon the muslin dress and the cruel flame ended in agony the mother's life! Mrs. Longfellow was burned to death in 1861.

The poet grew on in love and honor and into wider fame. His "Morituri Salutamus" is a most noble approach to closing scenes. He d. March 24, 1882. Westminster Abbey honors his memory.

As in the prelude to "Voices of the Night" he sings of his delight to go into the thick wood and lie down

"Beneath some patriarchal tree,"

where all

"His hoary arms uplifted he"

and then look up and listen pleased to hear

"A slumberous sound, a sound that brings

The feelings of a dream, As of innumerable wings."

So, not dreaming, in blessed transition, he finds himself, whether awake he can hardly tell, beyond all realms of death, lying under the wonderful tree of life, that stretches up and out into all the eons and spaces, and around him are all the most glorious forms of life, and the day is a day of heaven, and above him are wings innumerable and in his ears a continuous sound of perfect joy and at his side the smiling one who promised, "Because I live ye shall live also," and he lives forevermore. His 40 sheep multiplied (as your historian well knows, from his father's purchases of fine Merinos) on a farm of 200 acres which Mr. Allen bought in 1819 and sold in 1833; returned to the village and was postmaster 1837 till his death in 1845. He was selectman 1817-18, in Massachusetts House 1816, 1817, 1821 and 1830, in Massachusetts Senate 1822 and 1823 and in 1825 chosen to give Pittsfield's address of welcome to LaFayette. He was a president of the Berkshire agricultural society and trustee of the Berkshire medical institute. He d. May 26, 1845. Children:

Job³, Daniel², John¹); graduated at Union college 1832, admitted to the bar in New York City when 22, went to Washington in winter of 1836–7, was made editor of the *Madisonian*, and I take these words from the eulogy of Senator Dawes in the U. S. senate chamber, June 23, 1882: "At the opening of congress (1837) Mr. Allen, then only 23, was elected by the house of representatives public printer and two years later was elected to the same office by the senate. Our history furnishes no parallel to this bestowal by the house of representatives and the senate of the U. S. successively of such power and responsibility upon one so young." He m. Mr. Allen removed to St. Louis and more than any other manfinally stirred slow-going Missouri and St. Louis to enter upon their grand railroad destiny. It was like Cyrus Field's ups and downs in laying the Atlantic cable. But Mr. Allen pulled through. He became first president of the Missouri Pacific railroad 1850-54, president of the St. Louis & Terre Haute railroad, 1857-8; president of the Iron

Mountain railroad. He was four years state senator in Missouri and finally member of congress. He spent summers in Pittsfield, erecting an elegant homestead at the old place by the public square. He bought for \$20,000, the farm where his father had lived for a time. He gave the "Berkshire Athenaeum," a stately free library and museum, to his native town. He was a life long democrat and an ardent Union man. The Pittsfield company for the war of the Union was named for him the Allen Guards. After his election in Nov., 1880 to the 47th congress by the second district of Missouri he traveled extensively in Europe to regain health, took his seat at Washington in Dec., 1881, but on April 8, 1882 at Washington, as Senator Dawes expresses it, having been true to the motto of his fathers, "Fortiter geret crucem," he gave up doing as he longed to do, something more for Missouri and died in the Christian faith. soldier of our early history, Major Simon² Willard, b. May, 1605 who m. Mary Dunster, sister of the first president of Harvard college. The line came down through Henry³ and Dorcas Cutler, Josiah⁴ and Hannah Wilder, Col. Josiah⁵ and Hannah⁵ Hubbard of George¹ Hubbard, John² of Hadley, Jonathan³, Major Jonathan⁴, Hannah⁵ and Colonel Josiah⁵ Willard, Eunice⁶ (Willard) and Rev. Micah Lawrence to Betsey⁷ (Lawrence) Marsh. On the father's side the descent being the same with that of Abbott Lawrence, minister to England in 1849, is definitely traced from Robert Lawrence of Lancashire who attended Richard I. to Palestine in 1191 and for distinguished service in the siege of Acre was knighted "Sir Robert of Ashton Hall." Those who wish can trace this descent for 16 generations in England to Henry16 Lawrence b. at Wisset, England 1609 and of Charlestown, Mass., 1635. See "Family of John Lawrence, 1636-1869." The American line is Henry's son John¹, Nathaniel², John³, John⁴, Rev. Micah⁵, Betsey⁶ (Lawrence) Marsh. Henry Marsh, Sen., although not a churchmember, as a magistrate had enough of the Puritan to sometimes stop highway travelers and not allow them to go forward on Sunday. He removed his residence and built a pleasant new residence, with ample hall and with cheerful fireplaces in both stories. I remember well the marble hearth, brass andirons and fender. He had five sisters married in Pittsfield with troops of children and being the head of the Dalton household he made his home cheerful with a marked hospitality. Frequent welcomes made glad times. They had only three children. He d. in his new home in Dalton Sept. 8, 1824, æ. 55, like his father æ. 54 and grandfather æ. 56, not having attained to the 70 years of John or the 72 of Daniel2. His widow lived generally with her son, but always where she could best serve her children. She d. at the home of her dau. Harriet, Mrs. Dr. Kittredge, in Hinsdale, Mass., Feb. 26, 1847, æ. 70. Her brother's sons are now 1893, professors in Harvard, Yale and She taught in New Haven and in Maryland and at Hopkins academy, Hadley, as assistant of Daniel Huntington, father of the Bishop, where her brother's wife, Sarah Williston, had preceded her: both of them teaching only before marriage, except their children. Having such a wife and both of his own grandfathers having graduated at Harvard College, it was not strange perhaps that Henry⁶ Marsh should have three sons at one time in his Alma Mater. Williams college. He was an active business man, having in his day the finest sheep barn in Berkshire county and over 2000 sheep, some from Mr. Jonathan Allen's, his cousin's imported flock. But when prospered he told his children that he meant to give them a good education and that very likely the education might be all. In 1839-43 he spent three years in Pittsfield. The Ashuelot Manufacturing Co., in which he had been most concerned failed and in the autumn of 1843 he went west and entered with two of his sons into mercantile and shipping business on the lakes at Racine, Wis. and in 1846 at Sandusky City, O., from which place in 1850 with his son Calvin Waldo he went to St. Louis and was extensively engaged in purchases of wheat and other produce when his oldest-son, Henry Lawrence, was taken with cholera at Lasalle, Ill. and the father going to care for him was himself taken down and d. June 4, 1852, æ. 55. son d. June 10, æ. 30. Henry Marsh, Esq., was a fascinating man, an eloquent speaker, a successful Sunday school superintendent, an active Christian. His Saviour knew best what discipline was necessary for him. An only son, and among the very numerous descendants of his grandfather, Judge Perez⁴, the only grandson of Marsh name, his father could not bear to have him go, as he wished, to New

York City and carry on his profession of law. How different might have been his life! But it is well!

Sarah Whitney was dau. of Major Abel, who was aid of Gen. Shepard at Springfield in the Shay's rebellion. Her mother's father, Col. Josiah Dwight, was judge of Hampshire County (then all western Massachusetts) 1750-1768, time of his death, and his father Capt. Henry Dwight, judge from 1727-1731; d. March 26, 1732. father d. March 2, 1807, when she was ten and her brother Josiah Dwight Whitney then twenty, afterwards merchant and banker of Northampton, promised and kept his promise to be a father to her. He was unspeakably kind to her and her children. Her mother m. (2) July 4, 1809 Calvin Waldo, Esq., b. at Mansfield, Ct., March 12, 1759, son of Shubael and Abigail (Allen) Waldo, graduated at Dartmouth college 1785, a lawyer of Dalton, Mass. Mrs. Waldo lived there till his death Aug. 25, 1815, and after that with her son J. D. and d. at his house in Northampton, Aug. 22, 1820. Sarah Whitney showed her character by standing up all alone in the very large old church at Northampton, as the old records quaintly say, "April 18, 1819, Sarah Whitney received to communion by vote of ye church." After marriage 1821, and death of her husband 1852, she lived with her children in St. Louis, Mo., Batavia, Ill., Pittsfield, Mass. and from her 75th to her 86th year, eleven years of most healthy and happy old age in the family of her son Dwight W. at Owego, N. Y. and at Amherst and Haydenville, Mass., close by the scenes of her early days. In 1882 her dau. Mrs. Eager of Racine, Wis., persuaded her to return from Amherst and spend her closing days at her home. She grew feebler, yet enjoying life and March 11, 1883 having lived a beautiful Christian life of 86 years and 8 months, she passed on to the land where she was ready and glad to go. In his wise and touching address at Hartford, Feb. 5, 1895, as to the long time desecration and much needed improvement of the oldest burial ground located in the heart of that city, Dr. George Leon Walker mentions that of the great company gathered into that ground between 1698 and 1752, "only scattered names are recoverable. But among them are men filling a large place in the affairs of the Hartford of the two generations in question." Then he gives the names of 16 men and one is "Capt. John Marsh." Then he gives the following town act:

On December 18, 1730, the town appointed "Nathan Stanley, Ozias Pitkin, Captain John Marsh³, Captain Thomas Steele and Captain John Whiting, a committee in behalf of the town to consider and determine" on a petition of the "First Church or Society in Hartford," for "liberty to set a meeting house either in part or in whole on the burying lott."

The National Exponent is a newspaper published weekly at Chicago, in the interest of the deaf.

The issue of Jan. 31, contains a full account of the 55th anniversary of the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Jonathan P. Marsh, in that city, with portraits of both Mr. and Mrs. Marsh. The celebration took place on Washington Boulevard at the house of a son-in-law, Edwin Bowes, with whom they reside.

Mr. and Mrs. Marsh (then Paulina Bowditch) were among the early pupils of the American Asylum for the Deaf and Dumb, at Hartford, established in 1817, and the first one in America. Its

first principal was Rev. Thomas H. Gallaudet, a graduate of Yale college in 1805, who went abroad to perfect himself as a teacher of the deaf mutes and spent some time in France under the instruction of the Abbe Sicard.

Mr. Marsh is a native of this town, born April 26, 1814, and is an elder brother of the esteemed Edward F. Marsh, who died Feb. 4, 1895 in New Hartford. Their father Rev. Frederick Marsh, was ordained pastor of the church in Winchester Feb. 1, 1809, and continued to reside there until his death in 1873.

Rev. Mr. Marsh was a college classmate of Dr. Gallaudet and was visited by him at Winchester soon after the opening of the asylum. Tradition tells that after Dr. Gallaudet had seen the bright eyed dumb boy for a few minutes, he turned to Mrs. Marsh, the boy's mother, and said, "your son tells me that you keep a horse, two cows and many sheep." "Why how is that possible?" asked Mrs. Marsh, and burst into tears, for up to that time there was no hope of educating mutes and they were considered hopelessly unfortunate.

Mr. Jonathan Marsh has filled a long life with usefulness and has been specially happy in his home. His only son died in boyhood. His two daughters both mutes, married mutes. One has four children who speak, now men and women; and the other three mute children.

Edward F. Marsh of New Hartford, whose critical illness was announced in Monday's *Herald*, died that day at the age of 78 years. He was a son of the Rev. Frederick Marsh, who for 50 years was pastor of the Winchester Center church, and father of Fred. W. Marsh of Winsted. Mr. Marsh was well known here by our older townspeople and has many relatives hereabout, among his nephews being Judge Carrington and Henry F. and Joseph Marsh. Marquis F. Dickinson, Jr., born Jan. 16, 1840, at Amherst, Mass. Cecilia Risk Williston, his wife, daughter of Henry Risk, for 17 years in the English army in which he is said to have held a commission. He participated in the battle of Waterloo. After quitting the service he married Cecilia Brett (or Fox) and at one time resided at Birmingham, England, where his two oldest children were born. Removing to Canada he became Imigration Agent and later, Inspector General of Weights and Measures. The daughter Cecilia was born in Canada, Nov., 1838, but whether at Montreal, Hamilton or Toronto is uncertain. 




