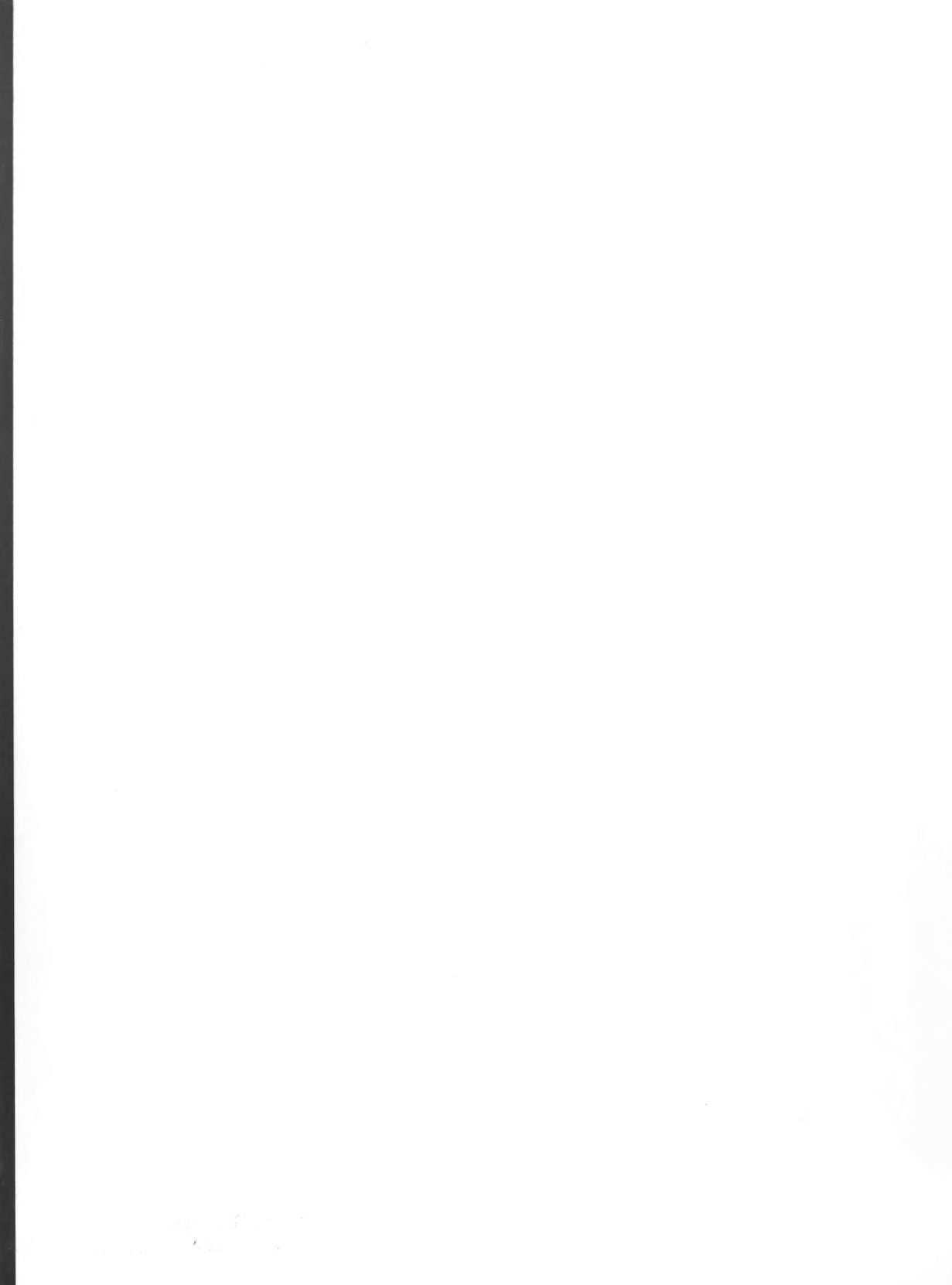

1989 was a record breaking year. The entering class was the largest in the history of the college. Of an entering class of 254, approximately 91% of those were freshmen.

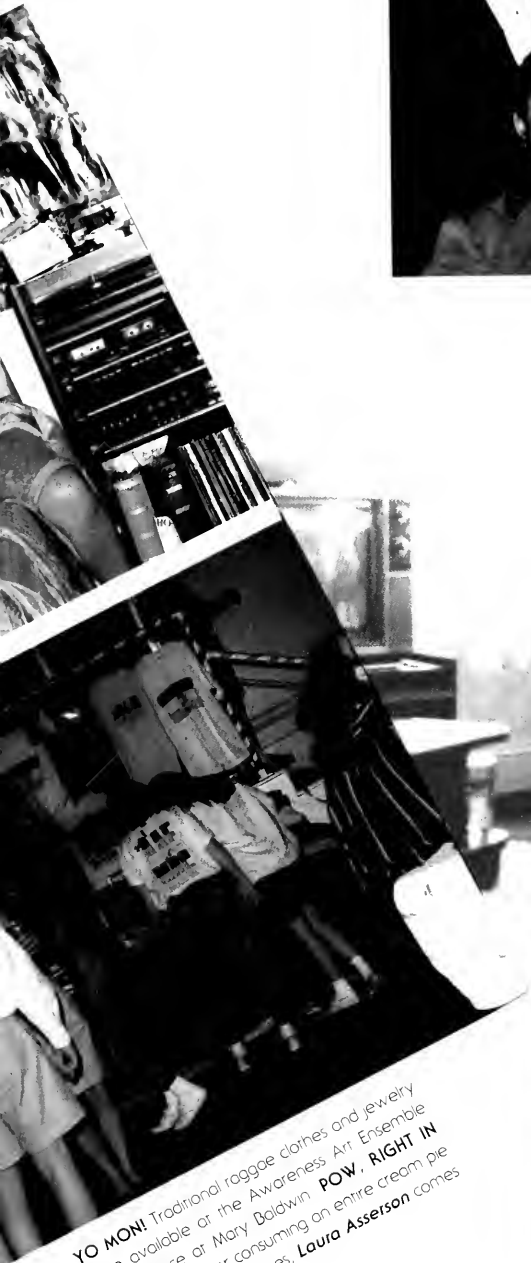
Housing situations changed. The newly renovated Memorial opened its doors to students. The plush interior of brass chandeliers and mauve walls was often compared

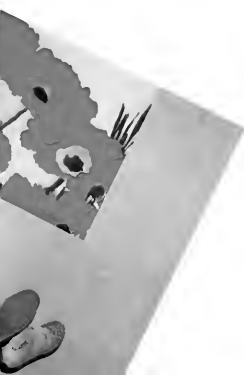

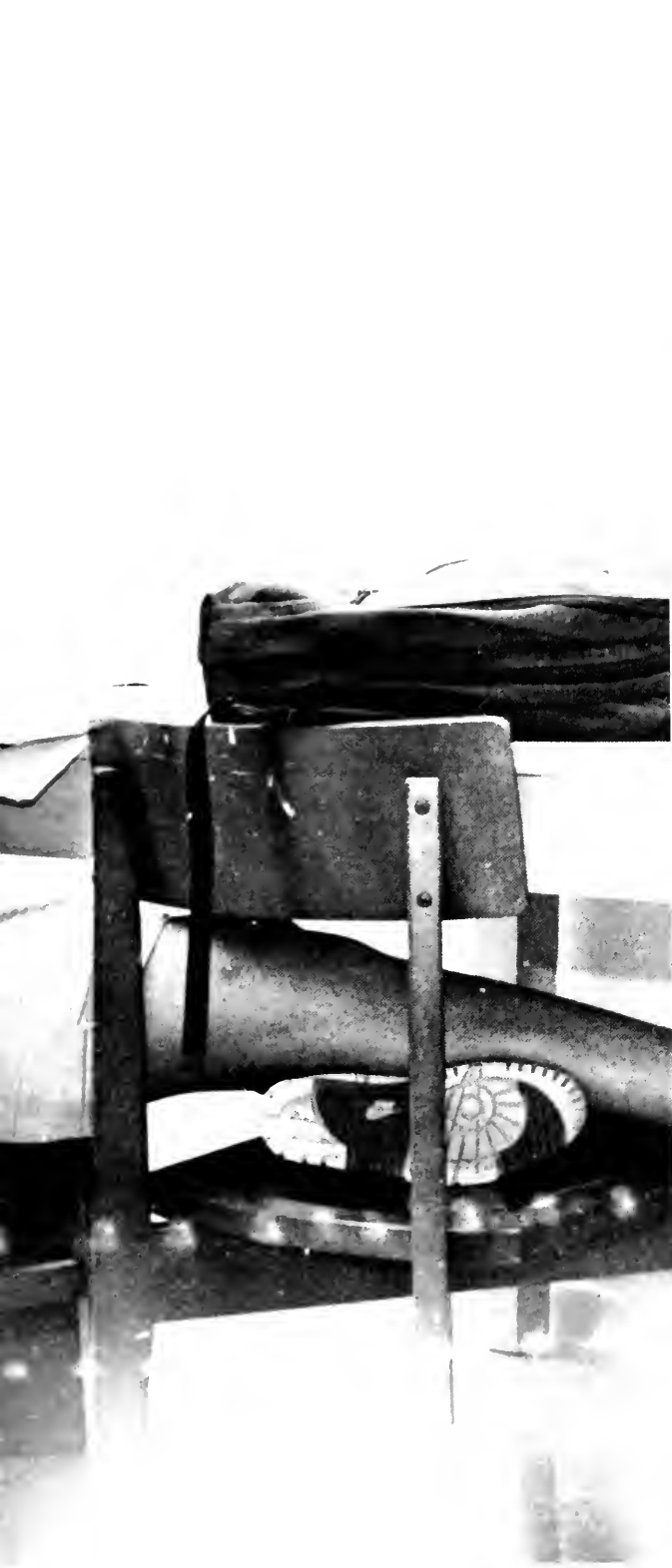

Drama Department Cannot Be UP STAGED



One of the most popular weekend activities on the campus of Mary Baldwin College is for students to go and see the plays sponsored by the Theatre Department at Mary Baldwin. This year has provided theatre goers with an exceptional variety to choose from. There was a play for everyone.

Each year the MBC Theatre department puts on four plays and a night of one-act plays during May term. The first of these plays was a play which was written in 411 B.C. by Aristophanes. This proved to be a challenge for the cast and crew. They had to transfer this play into more of a modern style so it would be both appealing and understandable to modern audiences.

This goal was accomplished wonderfully by both the producer Terry Southerington and the director Virginia Francisco. They decided to have all the characters in 20's style of clothing. The flapper image was very suitable to the characters of the play.

The lead role of Lysistrato was performed by Sharon Akel. She was very convincing in her portrayal of the fiery leader of the women in Greece. Lysistrato was a Grecian woman who devises a plan to stop the fighting between the Athenians and the Spartans. Her plan is to go on a "sex-strike" until the war is over. While her plan is first met with resistance from the women of Greece, played by Tracey McPherson, Jenni McCarroll, Michelle Jackson and many

others, she eventually succeeds in convincing the women. One of the "highlights" of the play was the scene when a Spartan soldier, played by Rick Plant, tries to convince his wife, Jenni McCarroll to "meet" him outside the city walls. This was just one of the many delightful scenes of Lysistrato which received thunderous laughter from the audience.

Mary Baldwin's next play was more subtle in its humor and style. Under Milk Wood was set in a small town and showed the various dreams that the townspeople had. The play was very unique in its style for Mary Baldwin plays. It was narrated by two actors while the cast played the parts of the townspeople. Michelle Roberts and Stephanie Leftwich played the parts of the narrators.

This cast was one of the larger casts for a Mary Baldwin production. The actors and crew worked very hard and were often heard working in Fletcher Collins Theatre well into the evening. When times were rough, the cast and crew used the unofficial motto of "Hugo, Oh Hugo" to keep them going.

Under Milk Wood marks a great achievement in the Theatre Department. It could not have been done without the hard work of the crew and also the work of Terry Southerington, the producer, and Virginia Francisco, the director.

Ms. Southerington was also the producer

of Mary Baldwin's production of *This Juan's for You*. This was written by Staunton's own Jim Capuro. As the title suggest this play is filled with many jokes and plays on words (no pun intended).

This is a play about a naive 21 year old girl who receives a special birthday gift. Par Deflorio plays the part of Juan (the gift) and Eileen Schroder is the 21 year old girl. This play also shows the acting talents of Myra Cooper and Ron Ramsey, and Frank Southerington. It was filled with a delightful plot and many humorous highlights. Many audiences were heard laughing all the way home over the newest playwright from Staunton: Jim Capuro.

The drama *As You Like It* was written by the more well-known dramatist William Shakespeare. Mary Baldwin's production stars Tracey McPherson as the lovely Phoebe and Nick Surtcliff as Duke Senior. The cast is also enhanced by the addition of the actors Myra Cooper, Frank Southerington, Eileen Schroder, Denise Lockert, and Francie Huffsretler.

This college's performance is produced by Virginia Francisco and directed by Terry Southerington. By performing the drama *As You Like It*, Mary Baldwin continues the tradition of producing a Shakespeare drama each year.

Another tradition in the Theater Department is having a night of one-act plays performed at Mary Baldwin. During the one-acts a theatre-goer is able to see a variety of plays all in one evening. The *Night of One Act* plays also allowed Mary Baldwin theatre majors the chance to produce their own plays. There were five performed this year. Both the actors and the directors enjoy having them during May term. This allows them to concentrate on their acting and plays more. They are usually too busy during the school year to focus



on theatre as much as they would like to. However, all their hard work was well paid off. Each play was able to enhance the directors' and actors' abilities to their best advantage. The *Night Of One-Act* plays was both exciting and entertaining all at the same time. The audience seemed to appreciate all the hard work that went into each performance.

Theatre 211: Stage Makeup. The very name of the course conjures up images of white painted faces and unusual disguises. Instructor Terry Southerington describes the class as "basically a 'hands on' lab course," where "we go from theory to practice." The small theatre class learned how to use makeup to completely transform their faces to several different people ... and animals.

"We do everything from 'fun stuff' to old age and historical characters," said Mrs. Southerington. Those aren't the only things they did, though.

"I enjoyed doing the fantasy and animals makeup the most because it was really different," said senior Corrinna Durham enthusiastically. Myra Cooper, too, liked "the fact that it wasn't just people" they did, but "animals and abstract — cartoon characters, too."

As a project, the class picked specific characters from plays and did analyses and presentations of those characters. The students found the class to be enjoyable, but it was also quite a challenge.

"It was difficult to look at your face and try to make it look different," said Corrinna Durham. "That was a real hurdle for everyone in the class, I think."

Myra Cooper found the "very small class" to be a real advantage. "The teacher just gave personal attention to each student," she said. "She would help individual students with ideas.

"It was a really fun class, overall," she said. "Everybody always looked forward to it."

Radio

On Tuesday and Thursday nights, while everyone else is studying, talking on the phone, and listening to music, a small group of students gathers in a classroom on the basement floor of the library. Here, they learn about the basic equipment and techniques of radio and audio production. The room is full of equipment for radio broadcasting.

"I think the students at first are usually scared of all the equipment," said Dr. William DeLeeuw, who teaches this class, entitled Radio/Audio Production. Whether they were scared or not, junior marketing/communications major Maggie Tate professes that, "It's really interesting learning about how to use the equipment." Freshman communications major Melody Twigg agrees, adding that, "I didn't know anything about radio before I came here." Now, she has tentative plans to work at a local radio station this summer.

For a special project of the class, students work in groups of two on an hour-long music program to broadcast in Spencer. They are required to select the music and write their own transitions. They also have to come up with ten minutes' worth of announcements and news.

"It's a lot of work and it can be frustrating," said freshman public relations major Noel Bevan, "But it's really cool, being able to use what you've learned, and being able to come up with your own ideas for a radio program."



ADP STUDENTS ON CAMPUS



The Adult Degree Program at Mary Baldwin College is a non-residential, individualized program for students over age twenty-one who wish to get a liberal arts education. Students enrolled in ADP include both men and women, young and old. The program began in 1977 upon receiving support of the faculty and a three-year grant from the Fund for the Improvement of Post-secondary Education. There were eight students then. Today, over five hundred adults take advantage of this opportunity to earn their college degree.

"The program is thriving well," said Dr. James Harrington, who has served as ADP Director since 1983. Contributing to the success of ADP is the availability of resources and tutors for students all over the state as well as the country and even abroad. There are four regional offices in Richmond, Roanoke, Charlottesville, and Southside Virginia. These offices provide convenient program counseling for students who live too far away to take advantage of the resources and campus of MBC.

There are several ways that an ADP student may go about earning his or her college degree, which consists of the same requirements of a traditional student. If they live nearby, they can take courses from MBC faculty on campus. If not, they have the option of taking courses at other accredited institutions. They may also engage in independent study under the supervision of MBC faculty or approved off-campus tutors. Or, if they choose, they may enroll in accredited, approved correspondence courses. Students of the Adult Degree Program are generally very motivated and graduates have gone on to graduate and professional programs, not to mention promotions and expansion of career options.

"It's a real unusual thing for a college as small as Mary Baldwin to have such a thriving program," said Dr. Harrington. "It has a lot to do with institutional commitment and a

terrific faculty. The faculty themselves are, almost all of them, just good teachers. They figure out ways to overcome the obstacles of distance and age, if age is a problem."

One very valuable aspect of the Adult Degree Program, the ADP director feels, is that there is a "high degree of interaction between our students and professors." About 85% of MBC faculty are in some way directly involved with ADP students. Adult students are also becoming more involved with traditional students and life on campus.

One of Dr. Harrington's goals is "to integrate the program even more fully into the life of the college." It is a "difficult goal to achieve," he believes, because "students are so different. Their interests are different. For example, they don't need the college to provide them with a social life." The ADP students are included in things such as honorary societies on campus.

"It's real important to me to have ADP students eligible for that," Dr. Harrington believes.

He and his staff will continue to look for every opportunity to provide a good liberal arts education for more and more students. Dr. Harrington is very enthusiastic about the Adult Degree Program and how it has continued to grow in past years. He also thinks positively about the future of the program.

"We're good at serving students," he said. "We're just good at what we do!"

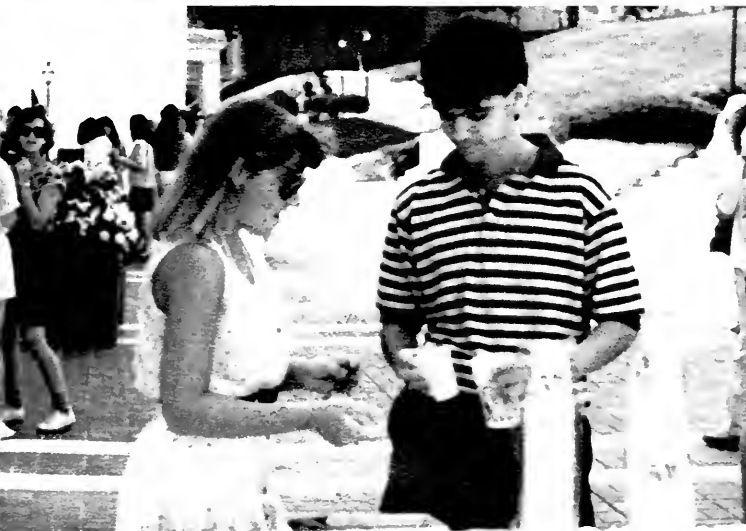

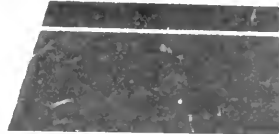
