BOSTON:

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ECLIPSES FOR 1802.

THERE will be four Eclipses this year; two of the **SUN**, and two of the **MOON**, as follows, viz.

I. The first will be of the **SUN**, March 4th, ch. 11m. in the morning; invisible to all north of the Equator; but visible and total in the *Great Southern Ocean*, in long. 175° East of *Porto*, and lat. 58° South. Moon's lat. 4' South.

II. The second will be a visible Eclipse of the **MOON**, March 19th, and by calculation as follows:

Digits eclipsed, 5° 17' on the Moon's North Limb.

III. The third will be an Eclipse of the **SUN**, August 28th, 2h. 16m. in the morning; invisible to the inhabitants of the *United States*.

IV. The fourth and last will be an Eclipse of the **MOON**, September 11th, part of which only will be visible.

* * * There will be, this year, a Transit of **MERCURY** over the Sun's Disk, for Mercury will pass over the face of the Sun on the 9th day of November, in the morning. The ingress, or beginning, will happen before sunrise; but the egress, or end, may be seen; as the planet will be more than five hours passing over the Sun's Disk. Mercury's lat. 13½' South, at the beginning, and 2½' North, at the end.

N. B. Those who are desirous of viewing this curious phenomenon, and have not the advantage of instruments, may possibly discover it (if the air be clear) through a piece of smoked glass.

DIRECTIONS FOR MARINERS.

MR. WILLIAM LORD, of Stonington-Point, has erected an iron spear, about 13 feet long, with a white vane on the top, upon the Rock of Latimer, in Fisher's-Island-Sound. The deepest channel is to the northward of the rock. This gentleman has it in contemplation, if suitable encouragement should be given by gentlemen from the eastward and westward (who are owners of navigation, and are constantly passing the Sound) to erect a spear upon what is called The Tail of Watch-Hill-Reef—Another upon Katumaent-Rock, upon the same Reef—One upon Ellis'-Reef, which lies off Ram-Island, and is almost in the middle of the Sound. These rocks are seldom, any of them, out of water, and much in the way of Coasters up and down the Sound, who are unacquainted.

CONVENTION

Of the CONGREGATIONAL MINISTERS in the
Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

THEIR Meeting is held in *Boston*, in the afternoon of the last Wednesday in *May* (or day of *Thanksgiving*) annually; and on the following day at noon, after transacting the usual business of Convention, a sermon is delivered in public before them, and a collection made for the charitable purpose of relieving the indigent widows of deceased Clergymen.

The Convention is a voluntary Association, embracing all the Congregational Clergy of the Commonwealth, and vested with no particular authority or control over the Churches. They have opened a friendly correspondence with the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, in the Middle and Southern States, and with the representative bodies of the Congregational Ministers in Connecticut, New-Hampshire and Vermont, for the purposes of communicating and receiving from them whatever may tend to promote the common interest of Christianity.

A Standing Committee of Convention have been appointed for the purpose of certifying the good character and qualifications of Ministers and Candidates who may travel into other States; and an agreement has been entered into between the Convention and the other representative bodies of Ministers in other States, mutually to communicate the names of their Committees for this purpose. Every certificate must be signed by one gentleman at least of that Committee, from whose bounds the person recommended travels.

The Convention “earnestly recommend to all young gentlemen, who design to devote themselves to the work of the ministry, to spend that portion of time in the study of divinity, which improved and judicious advisers shall think necessary to qualify them for public teachers.”

The Congregational Ministers throughout the Commonwealth, with some exceptions, are associated, and have regular and stated meetings for fellowship and mutual improvement. The Convention have passed a vote, requesting the Moderator or Scribe of the several Associations throughout the Commonwealth, to forward to the Scribe of the Convention, a correct list of the members of their respective Associations, with the name of the Scribe of each, and of the Candidates licensed by them; and have directed that the Scribe of the Convention procure the insertion of the several lists in the Massachusetts Register.

The Convention, solicitous to collect and preserve accurate documents for a *History of their Churches*, have passed a vote, that each of the Congregational Ministers in Massachusetts be requested to compile a history of his own Church, and of those in his vicinity which may happen to be vacant, and to make returns to the Scribe of the Convention. It is hoped, this important request will not pass unnoticed, but be productive of great good.

By a late Law of this Commonwealth, the Pilotage of the Harbour of Boston, is formed into two divisions, *Outward* and *Inward*. The outward division consists of four branches; and the inward division consists of three branches: And no person so commissioned as a Pilot, or his Deputy, shall undertake to bring in or carry out of said harbour any vessel drawing *nine feet* of water, (coasters and fishing-vessels excepted) except in his own particular branch, under the penalty of *fifty dollars*.

The Governor and Council determine and fix the fees of pilotage of the several Pilots for the harbour of Boston, from time to time, having respect to the different risk and hazard of the inward and outward divisions, and according as the circumstances of peace or war, and the seasons of the year may severally require, and the same to be specified on their respective warrants. A schedule of their fees to be hang up in the Custom-House for the Port of Boston and Charlestown, for public inspection and information.

The object of this Society is the promotion of Agricultural and Literary pursuits. Their Annual Meetings are held at the Academy in South Parish, Bridgwater, the 1st Thursday in October of each year. Their Quarterly Meetings are the 1st Thursdays of January, April and July.

Summary of the Method of Treatment, to be used
with Persons apparently dead from Drowning, &c.

CONVEY the person to the nearest convenient house, with his head raised: Strip and dry him as quick as possible; clean the mouth and nostrils from froth and mud—if a child, let him be placed between two persons, naked, in a hot bed—if an adult, lay him on a hot blanket or bed, and, in cold weather, near a fire—in warm weather, the air should be freely admitted into the room. The body is next to be gently rubb'd with warm woollen cloths, sprinkled with spirits, if at hand, otherwise dry. A heated warming-pan may be now lightly moved over the back, properly covered with a blanket; and the body, if of a child, is to be gently shock every few minutes: Whilst these means are using, one or two assistants are to be employed in blowing up tobacco-smoke into the fundament, with the instrument provided for the purpose, or a tobacco pipe, if that cannot be had—the bowl filled with tobacco and properly lighted, being covered with a handkerchief, or piece of linen, so as to defend the mouth of the assistant in blowing: Bathe the breast with hot rum, and persist in the use of these means for several hours. If no signs of life should then appear, let the body be kept warm several hours longer, with hot bricks, or vessels of hot water, applied to the palms of the hands, and soles of the feet, for a longer or shorter time, as the circumstances of the case may be.

The too customary method of rolling on a barrel, suspending by the feet, and every other violent mode of agitation, particularly in removing the body from the water, should be most carefully avoided.

The above mentioned method of treatment is to be made use of with vigour for several hours, although no favorable circumstances should arise; for it is a vulgar and dangerous opinion, to suppose persons are irrecoverable, because life does not soon make its appearance; and upon this opinion, an immense number of the seemingly dead have been committed to the grave, who might have been restored to life by resolution and perseverance in the above plan of treatment.

On all *ad valorem* articles imported from any foreign port within the Cape of Good Hope, 10 per cent. to be added to the actual cost, including all charges, (outside packages, commissions and insurance only excepted) before the duties are calculated, and 20 per cent. if from any port beyond said Cape.

All dutied Articles, imported into the United States, not having been landed more than one year, are allowed a drawback of the duties, subject to a deduction of $3\frac{3}{4}$ per cent. except spirits, which is *half a cent* per gallon, and $2\frac{3}{4}$ per cent. on the amount of the duties.

No beer, ale, or porter, to be imported in casks of less capacity than *Forty Gallons beer measure*, or if in bottles, in packages less than *Six Dozens*, under penalty of forfeiture, with the ship or vessel.

The Bottles in which Liquors are imported, to pay the same duty as empty bottles.

No goods, wares, or merchandize, of foreign growth or manufacture, subject to the payment of duties, to be brought into the United States from any foreign port or place in any

other manner than by sea; nor in any ship or vessel of less than *thirty tons burthen*,—except in certain districts on the Northern, Northwestern and Western boundaries of the United States.

No merchandize to be imported in any vessel belonging in whole or in part to a citizen or inhabitant of the United States, unless the master of such vessel shall have on board a Manifest in writing, signed by such master or other person having the command, containing the name of the port or place where such merchandize were received, and the port where consigned or destined to, within the United States, particularly noting the merchandize destined for each port respectively; and every package on board such vessel to be particularly described;—to whom consigned, or if to order, with the names of all passengers, distinguishing whether cabin or steerage passengers, or both, with their baggage, and an account of all remaining sea stores (if any.)

“No ship or vessel from foreign ports, or coming by sea from any port of the United States, shall be permitted to report, make entry, or break bulk, till the master shall deliver to the post-master all letters under his care or within his power, other than such as are directed to *the owner or owners, of such ship or vessel*, and on oath or affirmation, to be taken of such delivery, the master to receive *two cents*, for every letter so delivered.”

On other ships or vessels, *fifty cents* per ton.

Vessels of the United States, employed in the coasting trade, or fisheries, duly licensed, per annum *six cents* per ton.

Vessels of the United States, (other than licensed) taking in merchandize in a district in one State, to be delivered in a district in another State, other than an adjoining State on the sea-coast, or on a navigable river, *six cents* per ton.

Other ships or vessels, taking in merchandize to be delivered in another district, *fifty cents* per ton.

Allowance for Leakage and Breakage.

Two per cent. allowed on the gauge on all merchandize, paying duty by the gallon, contained in casks.

Ten per cent. on all beer, ale and porter in bottles, and five per cent. on other liquors in bottles, to be deducted from

the invoice quantity in lieu of breakage; or it shall be lawful to compute the duties on the actual quantity by tale, at the option of the importer *at the time of entry*.

Bounty on Salted Provisions and Fish of the United States.

An allowance of *thirty cents* per barrel is allowed on pickled fish of the United States, and *twenty-five cents* per barrel on all provisions salted within the United States, without any deduction, if the same shall amount to *ten dollars*. And in order to obtain such bounty, the exporter to make an entry therefor with the Collector—but no entry will be received where such pickled fish or salted provisions have *not been inspected and marked* agreeable to the laws of the respective states, where such laws are in force. Such bounty is payable in six months from the date of the bond to be given; and in no case, unless the certificates of landing at a foreign port, as in other cases, are produced. The bond to be in double the amount of such bounty—conditioned that the same shall be landed and left at some foreign port.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

The want of certificates of distilled spirits, wines or teas, subject such articles to seizure, and fifty dollars fine, if such certificates are not delivered to the purchaser; and if any cask, chest, vessel or case, containing such articles, shall be found in the possession of any person, without being marked, and not being accompanied with a certificate, the same is liable to seizure.

On the sale of any cask, &c. which has been marked, the marks to be defaced in presence of some officer of inspection or customs; and the certificate of the same to be delivered up, under penalty of one hundred dollars, with costs of suit.

Goods from foreign ports, not to be unladen but between sun-rise and sun-set, without special license, under a penalty

of four hundred dollars on the master, and every other person concerned, disability from holding any office under the government of the United States for seven years, and being advertised in the newspapers, with forfeiture of the goods; and if above four hundred dollars, value of vessel and apparel.

Goods removed before gauged, and weighed, and if wines, spirits or teas, before being marked, without permission, are forfeited.

Persons giving or offering a bribe, forfeit from two hundred to two thousand dollars.—Inspectors and officers of revenue cutters may go on board, examine and search vessels, have access to the cabin, and seal packages; and after sunset secure hatches, &c.—Persons in charge of vessels, for breaking fastenings, but in presence of an officer, forfeit 200 dollars.

Officers may seize within or without their districts—persons resisting or impeding them, forfeit four hundred dollars.

The master or commander of any vessel, that shall obstruct or hinder (or be the cause thereof) any officer of the revenue, in going on board his ship or vessel, for the purpose of carrying into effect any of the revenue laws of the United States, forfeits from fifty to five hundred dollars.

Every owner of a vessel, residing within the limits of the United States, to swear to the register within *ninety days* after its being granted, or it becomes void, and the vessel and cargo pays foreign tonnage and duty.

Returned-Cargo.

(If any articles of an outward cargo are brought back, they are to be detailed, specified by whom shipped outward, and to whom consigned inward.)

For the Information of Merchants in the District of Boston and Charlestown.

ALL bonds given on the exportation of Merchandize, entitled to a drawback, must be put in suit as they become due, unless by prior application to the Comptroller, longer time shall be given to procure the necessary evidence that the Merchandize exported was landed in a foreign port, captured or lost.

That no document, of landing Merchandize in a foreign port, entitled to a drawback, can be received, however regular, after the bond becomes due, unless satisfactory reasons are assigned for the delay.

That the exporter of all salted provisions and pickled fish, entitled to bounty, cannot claim it, unless the evidence of the delivery of the fish and provisions, in a foreign port, is tendered before his bond, given at the time of exportation, becomes due, excepting in those cases where satisfactory reasons are assigned for the delay, or a farther time granted by the Comptroller for obtaining evidence of the landing of the provisions or fish, in a foreign port.

That no debenture can be issued on the exportation of merchandize, unless the exporter shall, within ten days after the clearance of the vessel, complete those papers which the law makes necessary to his being entitled to a drawback.

Should any Merchant in this district be conscious that he has bonds in the Custom-House, now due, given on the exportation of merchandize, or of pickled fish, or salted provisions, he will consider how interesting it is to him to have them cancelled without farther delay.

Duties on Licenses, Carriages, &c.

ON LICENSES. For each License for retailing Wines and Spirits, 5 dollars.

Note. All are called Retailers who sell less than thirty gallons of wine, and twenty of spirits, otherwise than in the original casks in which they were imported, except innkeepers, apothecaries, &c.

AUCTIONS. Sales of land, &c. farming utensils and stock, or of ships and vessels, 25 cents per 100 dollars of the purchase money; and on the sale of other property (not exempted by law) 50 cents per 100 dollars.

Rates of Duties on Carriages.

BY an Act of Congress, passed May 28, 1796, it is enacted, that the following yearly rates and duties are to be paid upon all Carriages for the conveyance of persons, which shall be kept for his or her use, or to be let out for hire, or for the conveyance of passengers, viz. For every Coach, the sum of 15 dollars: For every Chariot and Post-Chaise, the sum of 12 dollars: For every Phaeton, for the conveyance of one or more persons, with or without a top; and for every Coach or other carriage, having pannel-work with blinds, glasses or curtains, in the upper division of the sides, front or back thereof, the sum of 9 dollars: For every four-wheel carriage, having framed posts and top,

and hanging on steel springs (whether drawn by one or more horses) the sum of 6 dollars: For every four-wheel carriage hanging upon wooden or iron springs or jacks (whether drawn by one or more horses) and upon every *Carriage, Chaise, Chair, Sulkey*, or other two-wheel top carriage; and upon every two-wheel carriage hanging or resting on steel or iron springs, the sum of 3 dollars; and upon every other two-wheel carriage, the sum of 2 dollars; and upon every four-wheel carriage having framed posts and tops, and resting upon wooden spurs, the sum of 2 dollars.

Carrriages usually and chiefly employed in husbandry, or for the transportation of carrying goods, wares, merchandize, produce or commodities, are exempted from the above duties.

Rules for reducing the Currencies of the different States into each other.

1st. To reduce the currencies of New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island, Connecticut, and Virginia, into those of New-York and North-Carolina, to the given sum add 1-9th part thereof.

Of Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, to the given sum add 1-4th.

Of South-Carolina and Georgia, from the given sum subtract 2-9^{ths} thereof.

On the contrary.

2^d. To reduce New-York and North-Carolina into New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island, Connecticut and Virginia, from the given sum deduct 1-9th thereof.

Into Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, from the sum given deduct 1-16th thereof.

Into South-Carolina and Georgia, to the sum given add 1-6th, and then take half of the whole.

3d. To reduce Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, into New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island, Connecticut and Virginia, from the sum given deduct 1-5th thereof.

Into New-York and North-Carolina, to the sum given add 1-15th thereof.

Into South-Carolina and Georgia, multiply by 3 and 1-9th, and divide the product by five; or multiply by 28, and divide by 45.

4th. To reduce South-Carolina and Georgia into New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island, Connecticut and Virginia, to the given sum add 2-7ths thereof.

Into Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, multiply the given sum by 45, and divide by 28.

Into New-York and North-Carolina, from the given sum subtract 1-7th, and double the remainder.

NOTE ON NANTUCKET SHOALS

IN several conversations with Coasters and others, who are well acquainted with the navigation round the Cape and Shoals, the following project has been proposed for their opinion.

Do you think it possible to raise an Island on one of the Shoals? (By what means?) By casting some thousands (or millions) of lighter loads of Stone, or by sinking HULKS or BOXES filled with stones, on that Shoal, which shall be found most eligible for the experiment, and raise such a foundation, as to build thereon an Island, sufficient to erect a CONDER or some kind of monument, which may be of use to all vessels, especially *Strangers*, in so critical a navigation. The answer was in favour of the proposition, and that called the *Great Round Shoal*, was mentioned as the most suitable. On this Shoal, there are about *four feet* of water in common tides.

If such an experiment should be made, why may we not at least expect, somewhat may be performed, equal to, if not more than that, so benevolently done by the patriotic William Lord of Stonington Point?

Who can tell but that with Nature and Art, joined to experience, and *perseverance*, we may yet see an Island, (perhaps a Light-House) rising amidst the roaring of the SEA, and *defying its storms*, stand a friendly and faithful WATCHMAN, to warn the Mariner of his *latitude* and his *danger*? Whether the CANAL through the *Cube* is opened or no, *this object* ought not to be relinquished for any reason, less than a natural and absolute impossibility, as it will be scarcely, if at all, the less necessary, if the Canal should be effected. When we consider what has been done in other places, particularly in sinking the *Cones* or *Piers*, at Cherbourg in France, we ought not to be easily discouraged.

Of the expense nothing is said, because I am totally incompetent to form the estimate, and if I were, it appears to me, *the amount ought not to be a consideration*. Our only concern therefore, should be concerning its practicability, and its execution. The commercial resources, and the vast and rapidly increasing ability of our country, is equal to the enterprize.

To decide fairly what degree of attention the project deserves, it should be examined and weighed by men, whose mature judgment will enable them, "*to distinguish between difficulties and impossibilities*," and whose genius, manner of

life, and experience, lead them to speculation and practice, in subjects of this nature. If it is admitted that the plan is within human ability to perform, then let those who can, *hesitate* between HUMANITY and an inordinate *self-love*—between DUTY and the calculations of *interest*—between *Dollars* and the LIVES of MEN. *Religion* robed in the heavenly attire of CHARITY *commands it*, and, pointing to both the *Canal*, and the *Island*, says, “*This ought ye to have done, and not leave the other undone.*” W.
