PHINEAS PRATT'S GRAVESTONES.

In the old Phipps Street Cemetery, in the Charlestown district of Boston, stand two stones erected to the memory of Phineas Pratt, who married Mary² Priest (*Degory*¹). The headstone, which is shown in the illustration, is twenty and one-fourth inches in height, twenty and five-eighths inches wide, and two and three-fourths inches in thickness. The footstone is thirteen and three-fourths inches in height, eleven and three-fourths inches wide, and four inches in thickness. The distance between the two stones is five feet, four and one-half inches.

The inscription on the headstone reads as follows :

HERE LIES Y^e BODY OF PHINEHAS
PRATT AG^D ABOUT 90 Y^{RS} DEC^D APRIL
Y^e 19 I 6 80
& WAS ON OF Y^e FIRST ENGLISH
INHABITANTS OF Y^e MASSACHUSETTS COLONY

Above the inscription is a Death's head flanked by wings. Apparently resting on the top of the head is an hour glass separating the words "FUGIT HORA". Above the tip of the wing at the left, as one faces the stone, are a spade and pickaxe, crossed, and above the tip of the right-hand wing are a coffin and crossed bones.

The inscription on the footstone is as follows :

JOHN HASKELL'S INVENTORY.

Transcribed from the Original Document,

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN.

JOHN HASKELL married Patience² Soule (*George*¹) in January, 1666, and died at Middleborough, Mass., on 15 May, 1706, in the sixty-seventh year of his age. His wife Patience had died at the same place two months earlier, on 11 March, 1705/6.*

The only reference on the Plymouth County Probate Records to his estate is contained in Volume III, page 22, where the inventory is recorded. The copy of the inventory here presented was made from the original document, the only paper relating to the estate remaining in the files.

ROBERT SPROUT'S WILL AND INVENTORY.

Transcribed from the Original Documents,

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN.

ROBERT SPROUT of Scituate married Elizabeth² Samson
 (*Henry*¹)* of Duxbury, before 1662, and died at Middleborough
 between 23 November and 11 December, 1712, his wife sur-
 viving him. His will and inventory are recorded in the Plym-
 outh County Probate Records, Volume III, pages 222 to 224,

but the copies here presented are made from the original documents, still on file. The inventory was taken by Ebenezer Richmond (husband of the daughter Anna Richmond named in the will) and Simeon Holloway and the autographs of both are appended, but in making the record in Volume III the name "Simeon" was incorrectly copied as "Simon," by the registrar.

[ROBERT SPROUT'S WILL.]

In the Name of God Amen I Robert Sprout late of Scituate but at this time being confined by bodily infirmities to abide at my house in Middlebury in the Massachusetts Bay in New England, being of sound memory & disposing mind Do hereby make this my last will & testament, revoking & annulling any former will or wills heretofore by me made, Resigning my soul to God in Christ, my body to y^e Earth by decent buryall, as to my worldly estate I dispose of it as followeth, Inprimis To my daughter Mercy oldham* I give one of my south purchass lots in Middlebury conteyning as I remember about forty five acres To her & her heys & assigns forever, To my daughter Anna Richmond I give my other south purchass lott in Middlebury, conteyning as the former, To her & her heys and assigns forever. To my daughter Hannah Cane † I give thirty acres of land in Middlebury which lyes near y^e place where James Bell lived, to her & her heys & assigns for ever. To my daughters Elisabeth Sprout & Mary Sprout I give the dwelling house in Middlebury where I now live, and the lands perteyning to this dwelling or lott esteemd about sixscore acres more or less with the meadows belonging to this lott namely that at bayting brook the other meadow lyes on the south side of y^e Eld's pond (so called) lyes yet in Comon between M^r Holloway & Ebenezar Richmond & my self, To them s^d Elisabeth Sprout & Mary Sprout Equally to be divided between y^m & to theyr heys & assigns for ever. I gi[ve] a featherbed to my daughter Elisabeth Sprout. For my wifes mayntenance during her life I order that fifteen pounds be annually payd to that person or persons who keep her & provide for her to be payd by those of my children that possess my farm at Scituate; which farm at Scituate I give to my two sons James Sprout & Ebenezar Sprout, to them theyr heys & assigns for ever to be Equally divided between y^m, only four rod from James Sprouts back door to run to y^e brook upon East south east poynt half a poynt southerly & then to come in again to the

My two sons James Sprout & Ebenezar Sprout are to pay yearly for my support from the day of the date of this my will the sum of forty pounds to that child which I live with & provides for me & looks after me which they are to pay & perform as the Condition of my giving them my farme at Scittuate. all my undivided Lands in Middlebury & twenty five acres on y^e neck & purchass right I give to my son James Sprout & to his heys & assigns forever. My moveables I give to my wife to be hers & at her dispose. I make my two sons James Sprout & Ebenezar Sprout Executors to this my last will & testament they to pay all just debts In witness hereof I have hereto set my hand & seal this twenty third day of November Anno Domini one thousd seven hundred & Eleven

GOVERNOR BRADFORD'S LETTER BOOK.

(*Continued from Vol. V, p. 201.*)

A letter of Mr. Sherley's to myself upon this conclusion, as followeth:

To his very loving and much respected friend, Mr. William Bradford, Governour of Plymouth, in New-England, these. Most Worthy and Beloved

SIR,

I have received your letter of the 14th of June last, by your and my loving friend, Mr. Allerton, wherein it pleaseth you to express more thankfulness than I have deserved; I confess my desire is much larger than my power, to do you and those good friends with you, the good I would. We cannot but all take notice how the Lord hath been pleased to cross our proceedings and caused many disasters to befall us therein; and sure I conceive the only cause to be, we, or *many of us here, aimed at other ends than God's glory*: But now I hope that cause is taken away, the bargain being fully concluded and, as far as our powers will reach, confirmed under our hands and seals to Mr. Allerton and the rest of his and your co-partners: But for my own part, I confess, as I was loath to hinder this bargain, being the first propounder thereof at our meeting, so, on the contrary side, I was as unwilling to set my hand to the sale, being the receiver of the most part of the adventures and a second causer of much of the engagements, and one more threatened, being most envied and aimed at (if they could find any step to ground their malice on) than any other of the adventurers whosoever: I profess I know no just cause they ever had, or have so to do, neither shall it ever be proved that I have wronged them or any of the adventurers, wittingly or willingly, one penny in the disbursement of the best part of five thousand pounds, in those two years' troubles: No, the sole cause why they malice me (as I and others have conceived) was that I would not side with

them against you and the going over of the Leyden ; but as I then cared not, so now I little fear what they can do ; yet charge and trouble I know they may cause me to be at ; and for these reasons, I would gladly have persuaded the other four to have sealed to this bargain and so have left me out ; but Mr. Allerton knoweth they would not ; so rather than it should now fail, Mr. Allerton having taken so much pains (as I am even ashamed to relate) I have sealed with the rest, with this proviso and promise of Mr. Allerton's, that if any troubles arise here, you are to be at half the charge : Wherefore now I doubt not but you will give your generality good content and self peace amongst yourselves, and peace with the natives, then, no doubt but the God * of peace will bless your going out and returning in, and cause all that you set your hand to to prosper : The which I shall ever pray the Lord to grant, if it be his most blessed will, and that for Jesus Christ his sake.

I acknowledge myself much obliged to you, and others with you, for your good counsel and loving respect to my kinsman ; I pray you continue the same still and set it as on my score to requite when occasion is offered. My wife and I most kindly remember our loves unto you and Mrs. Bradford, desiring you to remember us in your prayers, for assuredly unless the Lord be merciful unto us and the whole land in general, our estate and condition is far worse than yours ; wherefore if the Lord send persecution here (which is much to be feared) and so should put into our minds to fly for refuge, I know no place safer than to come to you, for all Europe is at variance one with another, but chiefly with us) not doubting but to find such friendly entertainment as shall be honest and conscionable, notwithstanding what hath lately passed ; for I profess in the word of an honest man, had it not been to procure your peace and quiet from some turbulent spirits here, I would not have sealed to this deed, though you have given me all my adventure and debt ready down : And this I leave to your serious consideration, not questioning, but you will approve yourselves faithful and honest before God and men : And thus desiring the Lord to bless, preserve and prosper you and all with you, I for this time cease, but ever resting,

DR. THOMAS DELANO'S WILL AND INVENTORY.

Transcribed from the Original Records,

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN.

DR. THOMAS DELANO died at Duxbury, Mass., between 5 October, 1722, the day on which his will was made, and 22 April, 1723, when the witnesses acknowledged their signatures. He is said to have married Mary² Alden (*John*¹) and the settlement of John Alden's estate * shows that Delano married one of Alden's daughters; but her baptismal name is not mentioned, and I have not yet found anything in the original records to prove that Thomas Delano's wife was named Mary.

The statement in Winsor's History of Duxbury that Thomas Delano married, second, Hannah Bartlett in 1699 is an error due to confounding father and son of the same name.

The will and inventory are recorded in the Plymouth County Probate Records, Volume IV, pages 358 and 359. None of the original documents remain in the files.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE THIRD GENERAL CONGRESS.

THE Third General Congress of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants convened at the Church of the Pilgrimage, Plymouth, Mass., on Saturday, September 5, 1903, at 10.30 o'clock A.M., Deputy Governor General William L. Marsh of the District of Columbia in the chair. Prayer was offered by the Elder General, Rev. Edward Huntting Rudd, of Massachusetts. The minutes of the previous Congress, September 15, 1900, held at Plymouth, Mass., were read and approved, also

minutes of second session of same Congress held at Buffalo, N. Y., September 6, 1901, were read and approved.

On motion of Mr. Dexter of Mass. the officers of the General Society were made officers of this Congress.

The Secretary offered to read the minutes of the Board of Assistants for information of the Congress, but not for action. On motion the reading of the minutes of the Board was dispensed with.

The Chair named as Committee on Credentials: Mr. W. H. Doane, of Ohio, Mr. George C. Nightingale, of R. I., and Mr. J. Granville Leach, of Pa.

Committee on Resolutions: Judge W. W. Goodrich, of N. Y., Dr. M. Standish, of Mass., Mr. Thomas S. Hopkins, of D. C., Mrs. Alice B. Wiles, of Ill., and Mrs. Herbert L. Crandall, of Conn.

On motion a Committee on Nominations was ordered.

On motion of Prof. Munro, of R. I., a recess was taken subject to the call of the chair.

The Congress re-convened at 11.40 A.M.

The Historian General offered his report, which was read, and on motion accepted and placed on file.

The report of the Treasurer General was read, in his absence, by the Secretary General in full. It was announced the report had been audited by Mr. Leach, a member of the Auditing Committee. On motion the report was accepted and placed on file.

The Chair announced that the second Congress appointed a Committee on Constitutional Revision. The Committee consisted of Winslow Warren, William Waldo Hyde, Walter S. Carter, L. E. Holden and Walter M. Howland. Messrs. Hyde, of Conn., and Holden, of Mass., stated they have no report. The Chair proceeded to fill the Committee by the addition of the following members, to wit: Judge Seth Shepard of D. C., George Ernest Bowman, of Mass., Richard H. Greene, of N. Y., E. Spencer Miller, of Pa., with Messrs. Holden of Mass., and Hyde, of Conn.

Judge Goodrich moved that a member from the Illinois Society be added to the Committee. The Secretary General stated it was his fault that the amendments proposed by Illinois were not among those printed, and proposed that the copy in the possession of Mrs. Wiles be added to the matters referred to this committee. The motion of Judge Goodrich was carried. The Chair then added Mrs. Alice B. Wiles to the Committee on Amendments.

W. H. Doane made the report of the Committee on Credentials; Mr. Leach, Secretary of the Committee, read the list as follows:

Moved and seconded that the rules of the last Congress govern the present Congress. Rev. John L. Ewell offered an amendment that the voting be by individual delegates. The Chair decided the motion out of order until the list of delegates is read.

Miss Ives having been reported on two lists, asked to have her name left on that of Connecticut only.

Mr. Miller moved to correct the report, omitting the name of Miss Doane from the second of the two states from which it appears. Judge Goodrich rose to a point of order that the motion of Mr. Miller was out of order, that this Congress has no power of the delegates sent or the Societies sending them. The Chair decided that a person selected from two separate societies is entitled to vote for each society.

Judge Goodrich moved that the roll of delegates as reported be the roll of the Convention so far as they have answered to their names. Mr. Bowman offered an amendment that included in that roll be the Officers of the General Society. Judge

Goodrich accepted the amendment and also accepted the suggestion of Mr. Miller that any who arrive later with credentials shall be accepted, seconded. The motion as amended was carried.

The motion to adopt the rules of the last Congress for the government of this was renewed, and the amendment that the rule in regard to voting be not by states but by individuals also was renewed. The question was raised that the voting by states or individuals was a question of order to be determined by the presiding officer. The Chair decides that the votes must be by states and the delegation can cast the full vote of the state. Mr. Bowman rose to a point of order that there was a motion before the house which had been seconded and amended and no presiding officer can rule that it cannot be acted on.

The motion of Judge Goodrich to receive the report of the Committee on Credentials was adopted.

Mr. Dexter moved that a committee of five be named by the Chair which shall be the Committee on Nominations, seconded and carried. The Chair appointed as such committee: Hon. Charles Francis Adams, of Mass., Prof. Wilfred H. Munro, of R. I., Hon. William E. Fuller, of D. C., Walter C. Faxon, of Conn., and Warren C. Crane, of N. Y. Mr. Adams stated that he was unable to remain and asked to be excused. Mr. Dexter, of Mass., was substituted as a member of the committee.

The motion to adopt the rules of the last Congress was again renewed. Mrs. Wiles inquired if in voting by states one state counts as much as another. The Chair answered—No. It was moved and seconded that a recess be taken of one hour, bringing the hour of meeting half-past two. An amendment was made that it be until three. A second amendment was offered that it be for five minutes. The second amendment was put and lost. The first amendment was put and lost. The Chair decided the motion for recess not carried. The Chair then put the question for the adoption of the rules of the last Congress, which was carried.

On motion an adjournment was taken until 2 : 30.

The Congress resumed its session at 3 : 15 P.M.

The Chair announced that he had been asked what his ruling was on the voting of delegations, and said: "The voting in the Congress shall be by State Societies in the order of their organization, the delegates present being entitled to cast the full vote to which their society is entitled, each delegate being allowed his individual vote and the fractional part of the state."

Surgeon General called and no report.

Captain General called and no report.

Judge Shepard, Chairman of Committee on Amendments to the Constitution, reported they were unable at this time to make a satisfactory report. Moved that the report be accepted and the Chair appoint another committee, that can get together to act, so that the next General Congress can act upon the amendments. Judge Shepard suggested that the subject be referred to the General Board of Assistants. Judge Goodrich moved that this Congress take a recess at five o'clock this afternoon until ten o'clock on Monday morning. Seconded by Mr. Hopkins. Mr. Miller announced he must leave this afternoon. The motion of Judge Goodrich to take recess at five P.M. until Monday was then put and carried.

The Committee on Resolutions, through Judge Goodrich, its Chairman, reported:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Society be extended to the Church of the Pilgrimage for the use of its church edifice during the session of this Congress; also

Resolved, That the thanks of the Society of Mayflower Descendants be extended to the Secretary of the Navy, The Hon. William H. Moody, in appreciation of his courtesy in sending the U.S.S. Mayflower to attend upon the Congress of this Society.

The report was received and the resolutions were adopted.

The Secretary, under the head of communications, stated that every one who was at the Congress three years ago undoubtedly remembers the charming manner in which the presiding officer won the hearts of every member of the Society who was present at that time. This communication comes from the Society in the State of Illinois.

Josiah Lewis Lombard, of Chicago, Deputy Governor General of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants, and a member of the Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of Illinois, departed this life at Pasadena, California, April 7, 1902.

In the passing away of Josiah Lewis Lombard this Society has lost one of the earliest, wisest and most faithful of its members. He was with us from the beginning. At every meeting his voice was heard, and at every election he was chosen to fill one of our highest offices. He gave us the best of his time and thought. He was an habitual attendant at the meetings, where his presence was helpful and inspiring. It could not be otherwise. Both from inheritance and from choice he was a true, loyal son of the Pilgrims.

He was born at Truro, and for eight generations from the landing of the Mayflower the members of his ancestral line lived, labored and died within sight and hailing distance of the very spot where that landing was made.

The path of the early Pilgrims on their first excursion into the country was all familiar ground to him. Along that path his youthful feet had often trod. He often knelt at the spring where the early Pilgrims first quenched their thirst, and after three centuries was accustomed to drink of its sparkling waters. When he reached maturity and lived far from the scenes of his youth, his love for those scenes never faltered. He still maintained his summer home at Truro. In September, 1898, he entertained at that Pilgrim home the entire Mayflower membership. Afterwards he purchased the site of the Pilgrim spring, and had it properly marked and then presented it to this Society to be held and cared for by them in perpetual trust.

Mr. Lombard was indeed a loyal, faithful officer and member of this Society.

We cherish his memory. We mourn his loss and now place upon our record this tribute to one who was very dear to us all.

It was moved that this communication be spread in full on the minutes of this Congress. The motion was seconded and it was carried unanimously.

The Secretary then read a communication and circular from the Cape Cod Pilgrim Memorial Association. Mr. Hopkins moved that the object be approved and the communication laid on the table. Seconded and carried.

Mr. Leach moved to take the consideration of the question as to the number of Deputy Governors General from the Committee on Amendments. Mr. Hopkins objected and the motion was withdrawn.

At the request of the Chair Mr. Hopkins made an address inviting the members to come to Washington.

Mr. M. W. Greene suggested that a photographer was in attendance and anxious to take the Congress. The members of the Congress arose and the flashlight was taken.

The Secretary made the announcement that the U.S.S. Mayflower by order of the Secretary of the Navy was now in the bay, where the old Mayflower lay, and read the correspondence with Gen. Leonard Wood, Judge Goodrich and Secretary Moody. An invitation was extended to all the members and their friends to visit the vessel, on any of the three days; launches would take those who desired from the Hotel Pilgrim beach, free of charge.

On motion duly seconded Mr. Doane was appointed to wait upon the Committee on Nominations, and notify them that this body was waiting for their report.

Mr. Dexter for the Committee on Nominations reported: *For Governor General*, Hon. Charles Francis Adams, LL.D., of Massachusetts; *For Deputy Governors General*, Richard Henry Greene, of New York, Charles Edward Gross, of Connecticut, Francis Olcott Allen, of Pennsylvania, James Nevins Hyde, of Illinois, William Lowrey Marsh, of District of Columbia, William Howard Doane, of Ohio, Rev. Charles Augustus Brewster, of New Jersey, John W. P. Lombard, of Wisconsin, George Corlis Nightingale, of Rhode Island, Joseph Sumner Rogers, of Michigan, Hon. William Drew Washburn, of Minnesota; *For Secretary General*, Ashbel Parmalee Fitch, Jr., of New York; *For Treasurer General*, James Mauran Rhodes, of Pennsylvania; *For Historian General*, George Ernest Bowman, of Massachusetts; *For Elder General*, Rev. John Louis Ewell, of District of Columbia; *For Captain General*, Myles Standish, M.D., of Massachusetts; *For Surgeon General*, Abiel Ward Nelson, M.D., of Connecticut; *For Assistants General*, Howland Davis, of New York, Hon. Samuel R. Thayer, of Minnesota, Prof. Wilfred H. Munro, of Rhode Island, Theodore S. Lazell, of Massachusetts, Hon. William Waldo Hyde, of Connecticut, Walter Morton Howland, of Illinois, George Champlin Mason, of Pennsylvania.

All of the above were recommended by the committee, the nomination for Historian General was by a vote of four to one, the vote in committee for the others was unanimous.

Judge Goodrich moved that the Secretary General be instructed to cast one ballot for the persons named. The Secretary: As his name is on the ticket, the Secretary General must decline. Judge Goodrich was directed to cast the ballot for the names reported. Judge Goodrich cast the ballot and announced the result.

Dr. Standish moved that the Committee on Amendments be instructed to report a Deputy Governor General for each State Society as now elected, seconded and carried.

Dr. Standish: I now move that the date on which the Congress be held shall be the sixth of September, with the provision if the date falls on Sunday the Congress be held on the following day. Seconded and carried.

Mr. Doane moved that the amendments be referred to the Committee to report to a special Congress to be held one year from now. Seconded. At the suggestion of Mr. Hopkins the Chair asked the delegates to stand who intend to remain until Monday. The Secretary counted twenty-eight. Mrs. McCartney moved and it was seconded to lay the motion of Mr. Doane

on the table. The point of order was made that having resolved to take a recess until 10:30 A.M., Monday, it was necessary to vote to reconsider. The Chair decided that laying this motion on the table leaves the matter as it was before for this committee to report on Monday. The Chair called for a rising vote on the question to lay upon the table. The motion was carried by a vote of thirty in favor and four opposed.

A motion to adjourn was made.

Mr. M. W. Greene stated that the delegates from Michigan had asked him to present this communication, which reads: The nominee of the Michigan State Society of Mayflower Descendants for Deputy Governor General is Mr. Paul Doty, of Detroit. (Signed) Fanny Child Howarth (Mrs. J. B.), Helen E. Keep.

Mr. Dexter asked to be allowed to amend his report by substituting the name of Paul A. L. Doty for Mr. Rogers, as Deputy Governor General. Mr. Bowman inquired who this Mr. Rogers is? The Secretary replied that Joseph S. Rogers was dead, and no one had been named as Deputy Governor General for Maine, Hon. John Fremont Hill, the Governor, was suggested. Mr. Dexter: I also beg to offer the name of John Fremont Hill, of Maine. Mr. Bowman moved that the Chairman of the Committee be instructed to cast one ballot for these two gentlemen. Carried. Mr. Dexter cast the ballot and announced that they were elected.

Announcement was made of the banquet at 6 P.M. to be given by the New York Society to the General Officers.

On motion the Congress adjourned to Monday at 10:30 A.M.

SECOND SESSION.

Church of the Pilgrimage, Plymouth, Mass., Monday,
September 7, 1903.

The Congress assembled at 10:30 A.M. and in the absence of the last presiding officer was called to order by Mr. R. H. Greene, of New York.

Judge Goodrich moved that Mr. Greene take the chair as senior Deputy Governor General, and that Dr. Standish be elected Secretary *pro tem*. The motion was seconded and carried.

Judge Goodrich gave notice that the First Church would be open until half-past eleven o'clock for the inspection of the

window presented by the New York Society of Mayflower Descendants. All welcome.

Judge Shepard presented the report of the Committee on Constitutional Amendments. Mr. Crane moved that the report of the committee be received, the motion was seconded.

Judge Goodrich moved to amend by inserting the resolution adopted in regard to voting at the meetings of the Congress, seconded by Mr. Doane. Judge Goodrich explained that the insertion proposed occurred in Article X, after the words "Each State Society shall have" — "on all questions before the Congress." The amendment of Judge Goodrich was claimed by Mrs. Wiles and Judge Shepard to be outside of the work of the committee. The Chair ruled that the committee appointed by the former Congress had never been discharged, but had been increased and consequently it opened the door to the matter. The motion was taken on Judge Goodrich's amendment which was carried unanimously. Mr. Crane's motion as thus amended was then put and carried unanimously.

Moved by Dr. Standish, seconded by Mr. Bowman: Resolved, That the thanks of the Society of Mayflower Descendants are hereby extended to Mr. Richard Henry Greene, the retiring Secretary General, for his enthusiastic labors and great interest in the welfare of the Society.

Mrs. J. S. Peck asked that it might be a rising vote. The Secretary put the question and announced: It seems to be a unanimous vote, and it is carried unanimously. The Chairman responded.

Mr. Holden offered the following resolution which was seconded: Resolved, That the entire Constitution and By-Laws of this Society, as amended, and the records of this Congress be printed in the January, 1904, number of the Mayflower Descendant, and a copy thereof be sent to each member of the General Society; that the sum of \$200 be paid by the Treasurer General to the Massachusetts Society for that purpose. The resolution was adopted.

Mrs. Wiles moved and Judge Goodrich seconded the motion, that the Secretary General be directed to print 3500 copies, in book form, of the Constitution and By-Laws for distribution to the members of the General Society. This being an amendment was put and carried. The resolution of Mr. Holden as amended was then put and carried.

The Secretary General was authorized to pay all the bills of the Congress, and include the sexton of the church.

Judge Goodrich moved, and it was seconded: Resolved, That the thanks of the Society be extended to Mr. William L. Marsh, the presiding officer of the Congress, for the able and impartial manner in which he has discharged the duties of his position. The Chairman asked for a rising vote, and the resolution was unanimously adopted.

Mr. Bowman moved a vote of thanks to all the retiring officers. The Secretary asked for a rising vote, and having put the question announced it was carried unanimously.

Mr. M. W. Greene offered the following which was seconded: Resolved, That the thanks of this Congress be and are hereby extended to Rev. Ozora S. Davis, of Newtonville, Mass., for his discourse on Pastor John Robinson, before the Congress; and to Rev. Robert Collyer for his able address on Sabbath evening; and also to the Rev. D. Melancthon James, Pastor of the Church of the Pilgrimage, for his courtesy and attention during our sessions. Carried.

Mr. Faxon moved that the Secretary General be requested to communicate with the Rev. Mr. Davis, and that he request a copy of the discourse for the archives of the Society. Seconded and carried.

On motion of Judge Goodrich which was seconded the session of the Third General Congress adjourned 12 M., September 7th., 1903.

Article II. Article III. All persons over eighteen years of age who are descended from a passenger on the Mayflower, on the voyage which terminated at Plymouth, New England, in December, 1620, shall be eligible to membership.

The Chairman asked for a rising vote and the resolution was unanimously adopted.

Mr. Bowman moved a vote of thanks to all the retiring officers. The Secretary asked for a rising vote and having put the question announced it was carried unanimously.

Mr. W. Grosvenor offered the following which was seconded: Resolved, That the thanks of this Congress be and hereby extended to Rev. Gerrit S. Davis of Newburyport, Mass., for his discourse on Pastor John Robinson, before the Congress; and to Rev. Robert Collyer for his able address on Sabbath evening; and also to the Rev. D. McIntosh James Pastor of the Church at the Pilgrimage, for his courtesy and attention during our sessions. Carried.

Mr. Haven moved that the Secretary General be requested to communicate with the Rev. Mr. Davis, and that he request a copy of the discourse for the archives of the Society. Seconded and carried.

On motion of Judge Goodrich which was seconded the session of the Third General Congress adjourned at 10 o'clock, September 27th, 1850.

CONSTITUTION.

- Article I. The name of this Society shall be the General Society of Mayflower Descendants.
- Article II. The object of this Society is to promote the interests that are common to all the State Societies of Mayflower Descendants, which can best be served by a federal body, and more especially to secure united effort to discover and publish original matter in regard to the Pilgrims, together with existing data known only to antiquarians, and to authenticate, preserve and mark historic spots made memorable by Pilgrim associations, thus honoring our epoch-making ancestors.
- Article III. All persons over eighteen years of age who are descended from a passenger on the Mayflower, on the voyage which terminated at Plymouth, New England, in December, 1620, shall be eligible to membership.

Every application for membership in this Society shall be made on a preliminary application blank provided by the Society. Such application shall bear the autograph signatures of the candidate and of two members of this Society, who shall vouch for the applicant.

After the preliminary application has been approved the pedigree papers shall be issued. If the pedigree papers are not filled out in duplicate and filed with the Society within six months after the approval of the preliminary application, such approval shall become void.

No person shall be a member of the General Society who is not a member in good standing of a State Society.

Article IV. The General Society of Mayflower Descendants shall consist of the State Societies now existing and such other State Societies as may from time to time be duly organized under the authority of the General Society.

Whenever the word "State" occurs in the Constitution or By-Laws of this Society, it shall be held to include within its meaning the District of Columbia, the Territories and the Dependencies of the United States, or any foreign country.

Article V. The officers of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants shall be a Governor General, a Deputy Governor General for each State Society, a Secretary General, a Treasurer General, a Historian General, an Elder General, a Captain General, a Surgeon General, seven Assistants General.

These officers shall constitute the General Board of Assistants.

With the exception of the Deputy Governors General, the General Officers shall be elected by a plurality vote of the delegates present at a regular meeting of the General Congress.

Each Deputy Governor General shall be elected by a plurality vote of the delegates representing the State Society from which such Deputy Governor General is to be chosen who are present at a regular meeting of the General Congress.

Vacancies occasioned by death or resignation may be filled by the General Board of Assistants for the unexpired term.

The General Officers shall serve until the next regular meeting of the General Congress, or until their successors shall have been elected and qualified.

Article VI. Section 1. The Government of the Society shall be vested in a General Congress.

Section 2. When the General Congress is not in session, the Board of Assistants shall have all the powers and authority of the General Congress, and shall report all action taken by

them, to the next Congress. Except that the Board of Assistants shall have no power to amend this Constitution, or such By-Laws as the General Congress may adopt.

Section 3. The General Congress shall consist of the Officers of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants and Delegates from the State Societies, each State Society being entitled to one Delegate for every twenty members or majority fraction thereof.

Each organized State Society shall be entitled to at least three Delegates.

Section 4. The General Congress and the Board of Assistants shall have authority in all strictly national questions, and in all such matters as may be referred to them by the State Societies.

Section 5. The regular meetings of the General Congress shall be held at Plymouth, Massachusetts, in 1906, and every third year thereafter, on the sixth day of September, or on the following day when the sixth falls on Sunday.

Special sessions of the General Congress may be ordered by vote of the General Board of Assistants, and shall be called upon the vote of four State Societies.

The call for a special session of the General Congress shall be issued at least five months in advance, and no business except that specifically stated in the call shall be considered.

Section 6. At all meetings of the General Congress the order of business shall be :

First. The calling of the General Congress to order by the Governor General.

Secondly. Prayer by the Elder General.

Thirdly. Reading of the Minutes of the last General Congress.

Fourthly. Report from the Secretary General.

Fifthly. Report from the Treasurer General.

Sixthly. Report from the Historian General.

Seventhly. Report from the General Board of Assistants.

Eighthly. Reports from Committees.

Ninthly. Reports from State Societies.

Tenthly. Unfinished Business.

Eleventhly. New Business.

Twelfthly. Election of Officers.

Thirteenthly. Benediction by the Elder General.

The Minutes of each General Congress shall be read and approved before its final adjournment, and a printed copy of said Minutes shall be sent by the Secretary General to each

General Officer and to the Secretary of each State Society within one month.

Article VII. Section 1. The General Board of Assistants may at any time authorize the formation of a Society of Mayflower Descendants in any State, whenever twenty members residing in such State, who are in good standing in their respective State Societies, shall sign a request for a charter for such Society and file it with the Secretary General.

The standing of each person whose name appears on the petition shall be certified by the Secretary of his State Society.

If the applicants to whom a charter may be granted do not meet and organize a State Society within three months after the granting of the charter, such grant shall become void.

Section 2. After the formation of a Society of Mayflower Descendants in any State, all persons residing in such State desiring to join the Society of Mayflower Descendants shall do so through the local State Society. After having joined such State Society, however, a member may join any other State Society.

Section 3. All State Societies shall have authority to form their own Constitutions and By-Laws, which, however, shall not be in any respect inconsistent with the Constitution of the General Society.

Section 4. Each State Society shall pay to the General Society, on the first day of January in each year, a per capita assessment of twenty-five cents, and no other assessment shall be levied except at a regular session of the General Congress and by a two-thirds vote of all the State Societies composing the General Society, such vote being taken by States.

Any special assessment shall be on a per capita basis.

No fees, except the regular entrance fee and annual dues, shall be charged by the General Society, or by any State Society, for the filing of any pedigree papers, original or supplemental.

Section 5. Each State Society shall annually transmit to the Secretary General a statement giving the number of its members and any matters of interest in its history; also making any suggestions which it may deem profitable for the Society to consider.

Section 6. Each State Society shall file with the Historian General a duplicate of the application of each person admitted as a member of the Society.

Section 7. Should any pedigree paper at any time appear to the Historian General to be deficient, he shall notify the

Historian of the State Society from which it was received, and, if the pedigree has not been verified in the meantime, shall report the case at the next meeting of the General Board of Assistants for their decision.

Article VIII. Section 1. The Seal of the Society shall contain a representation of a sailing vessel of the Seventeenth Century, and around it the name of the Society, and the words "1620 Plymouth 1897."

Section 2. All State Societies shall adopt this Seal, with the words "Plymouth 1620" and the name of their own State and the year of their organization.

Article IX. Section 1. There shall be a certificate, insignia, rosette and flag, selected and approved by the General Society.

Section 2. These shall be the same for all the State Societies, the certificates being issued by the officers of the General Society and countersigned by the officers of the State Society.

Article X. Any proposed amendment to this Constitution must be submitted in writing by vote of a State Society to the Secretary General of the General Society at least six months before the session of the General Congress at which such amendment is to be considered; and the Secretary General shall mail a printed copy of all proposed amendments to the Secretary of each State Society at least five months before such session.

A two-thirds vote at a regular session of the General Congress shall be required for the adoption of any amendment, such vote to be taken by States. Each State Society shall have on all questions before the Congress one vote for each Delegate to which it is entitled; and the delegates present shall cast the entire vote of such State Society. Each Delegate shall be entitled to cast his proportional part of the entire vote of the Society which he represents. Provided, however, that in addition to the votes of the State Societies each officer of the General Society shall be entitled to cast one vote.

BY-LAWS.*

Article I. Section 1. Meetings of the General Board of Assistants may be called by the Governor General, and shall be called upon the written request of three of its members. Meetings shall be held at least once in each year, and notice of each

* As amended.

meeting shall be given one month in advance and shall state the object of the meeting. The Secretary General shall also send the notice of each meeting to the Secretary of each State Society.

Section 2. A majority of the members elected as delegates shall constitute a quorum of the General Congress for the transaction of business. At all meetings of the Board of Assistants five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article II. Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Governor General to preside at all meetings of the General Congress and the Board of Assistants, and perform such other duties as pertain to the chief officer of an organization.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Deputy Governor General designated by the Board of Assistants, to exercise all the functions of the office of Governor General during his absence or disability.

Section 3. The Captain General shall carry out all orders of the Governor General or the General Congress, and act as Marshal at parades and on occasions of ceremony.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Elder General to officiate, when called upon, at any meeting of the General Congress or Society. He shall have been ordained as an elder, bishop, minister or deacon of a Christian church.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Secretary General to record the proceedings of the General Congress and General Board of Assistants; to notify members of the General Board of Assistants of all meetings to be held; to transmit whatever notices and communications may be required by order of the General Congress, General Board of Assistants, or Governor General, and to perform all duties usually appertaining to such office.

He shall be the keeper of the Seal of the General Society.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer General to collect and take charge of all funds belonging to the General Society; to keep suitable books of account; to make all necessary disbursements upon approval of the Finance Committee, and to report the condition of the treasury at all meetings of the General Board of Assistants.

He shall have charge of all the insignia and rosettes of the Society, and dispose of them to the members at the prices fixed by the General Board of Assistants.

Section 7. The Historian General shall examine and report upon the pedigree papers, both original and supplemental, of all persons admitted as members of the Society; shall keep a com-

plete list of the members and of all lines of descent filed by them; shall have charge of the issuing of certificates of membership and pedigree papers; and shall keep a record of all celebrations of the General Society and file all historical documents and papers, and do any other work assigned him by the General Board of Assistants.

Section 8. The Surgeon General shall have been duly admitted to the practice of medicine. He shall be under the orders of the Governor General and Board of Assistants.

Article III. The General Board of Assistants shall have general charge and direction of the affairs of the Society. They may fill vacancies among the officers for unexpired terms. They may appoint any or all of the following standing Committees: Publication, Finance, Entertainment, Exercises, and Room and Property.

The General Board of Assistants may fill vacancies occurring in committees. All committees appointed shall make reports through their Chairman to each meeting of the General Board of Assistants.

Article IV. Amendments, alterations and additions to these By-Laws shall be made in the same manner as amendments and changes of the Constitution.

Any section of these By-Laws may be suspended for a special purpose at any time, by a unanimous vote of the members present at a meeting of the General Congress.

BENJAMIN³ BARTLETT'S WILL AND INVENTORY.**Transcribed from the Original Records,*

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN.

Benjamin³ Bartlett, the son of Robert Bartlett and Mary² Warren (*Richard*¹), was three times married. His first wife was Susanna, daughter of John and Sarah (Carey) Jenney; his second was Sarah³ Brewster (*Love*², *William*¹); and his third, who survived him, was Cecilia ——. The maiden name of the third wife has not been discovered.

Benjamin Bartlett made his will 21 August, 1691, and his inventory was taken just one week later, 28 August, 1691, therefore he must have died between these dates. The will and inventory are recorded in the Plymouth County Probate Records, Volume I, pages 113 to 115, and page 135. None of the original documents are now in the files.

[p. 113] I Benjamin Bartlet of Duxborough in the County of Plimouth Being weak of Body but of Sound mind and memory Praysed be God Do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in maner and forme following first I Commit my Soul into the hands of Almighty God And my Body to Decent Burial when it shall please God to take me home In Sure and Sertain hope of a joyfull Resurrection unto Eternall Glory through the precious merrits of our Lord Jesus Christ. And for the Disposall of my outward Estate which God hath Graciously Given me my mind and Will is that it shall be Bestowed in such maner as in this my Last Will and Testament is set Downe : first whereas when I Married this my Present Wife Sissilla I Promised her to Give her forty pound in Case she should Survive me, and she had a Writing thereof before our Marriage which she Did accept of and agree to as her joyn-ture in full Sattisfaction of her Dower of and into all my Estate : Now my Will is that the said forty pounds shall be Duly paid her in convenient time after my Decease And

And also She Shall have the Chamber over my Bigges Roome to Dwell in for her own personal use During her Widdowhoode and priviledge of putting her Cattel into the Pasture where my Son shall put his into the same whilst she shall Dwell here. And for the Disposall of my Estate amongst my Children my mind and Will is that my Eldest Son Shall have a Double Portion of all my Estate both Real and Personall with what he hath already had of my Estate. And all my other Children Single & Equall shares thereof. And what my son Samuel hath already had to be Reckoned as part of his portion or share thereof.

Item I Give and Bequeath All the ffarme I now live upon with all the appurtenances thereunto belonging unto my Eldest Son Benjamin and the heires of his Body Lawfully Begotten for ever. Item : I have already Given unto my son Samuel and Do hereby Confirm unto him and his heires All the ffarme he now liveth on Which was Sometime the Lands of his ffather in law Pabody. And also I Give to him and his heires one third part of the meadow I bought of John Soul at Salthouse Beach. Item . I Give and bequeath unto my son Ebenezer and his heires for ever all my Lands Lying at Little Compton alias Succonett

Item I Give and Bequeath unto my son Ichabod and his heires forever All my Lands in the Township of Middleborough. And I leave all my Lands at Rochester to Descend to my son Benjamin and his heires. Item I Give and Bequeath unto my Daughter Rebecka Bradford All my Lands at North hill where my son Benjamin now Liveth and two thirds of the meadow I bought of John Soul at Salthouse Beach to her for life and at her decease I Give the same Lands and meadows to her two Daughters Alice and Sarah which she had by William Bradford and to their Severall heires forever. JONATHAN BREWSTER'S FIRST WIFE AND CHILD.

BY MORTON DEXTER.

It appears to be true that Jonathan Brewster had a wife in Leyden, who died there, and that they had a child who also died there. In the Leyden archives (*Reg. van Overledenen Personen*. iii: 50) is an entry of the burial of a child, presumably his, on Nov. 27, 1610. There is another, on May 10, 1619, of that of a woman apparently his wife. His name is not entered in full in either case, but there is no reasonable doubt that he is referred to.

The first entry runs thus: "*Kint van Jonatan kerkgracht*," i.e., "A child of Jonathan (living on) Church street," and "*kerkgracht*" always means "*Pieterskerkgracht*" unless otherwise stated. The second is this: "*De huysvrou van Jan Willemsen op [op te] pieterskerkhoff*," i.e., "The wife of John, son of William, (living) on the Peter's Church Street." There is no significance in the fact that his first name is written "Jonatan" in one instance and "Jan" in the other. When he wrote "Jan" the Dutch clerk may have meant to write "Jon.," abbreviating "Jonatan," and in any case John and Jonathan are so nearly alike that the Dutch easily would confuse them.

In brief, the reasons why these entries are believed to refer to Jonathan Brewster are these:

1. It was quite usual for the Dutch to omit the last name in their records, and also to mention a man as his father's son, leaving out the last name of each.

2. Jonathan Brewster occasionally is associated unmistakably with his father, William. On June 25, 1609, they joined in a common affidavit (*Getuignis Boek*. K. 26 verso.) about some cloth (*Willam Bruster, Engelsman . . . , Marytgen Bruster desselfs huysvrouwe . . . en Jonathan Bruster, zyn zoon*), i.e., "William Brewster, Englishman, Mary Brewster, wife of the same, and Jonathan Brewster, their son."

3. The Pilgrim headquarters in Leyden was the Pieterskerkhof, or little colony of houses on the Robinson estate, on the Pieterskerkgracht, and in each of the two burial entries the Jonathan referred to is stated to have lived there.

4. At the betrothal of John Reynolds, who seems to have been in William Brewster's employ, on July 28, 1617 (*Echt*

Boek. B. 66), Mary Brewster was a witness. So was "Jonathan Williamson," evidently Jonathan (William's son) Brewster, her son.

5. When he was admitted to citizenship on June 30, 1617 (*Poorter Boek. F. 106*), his name is entered in full, "Jonathan Williamson bruster."

6. No other Jonathan appears in the Leyden records among either Dutch or English entries.

It may be added that "Jonathan Brewster" witnessed Edward Winslow's betrothal on Apr. 27, 1618 (*Echt Boek. B. 75*), with Isaac and Mary Allerton, when William's son naturally might have been present.

It therefore seems sufficiently certain that the burial entries refer to Jonathan Brewster, the son of William.

If it be objected that he was not old enough to be married and have a child before Nov. 27, 1610, it may be replied that, although it is true that he was very young — in the affidavit of June 25, 1609, he is said to have been then "*omtrent xvi jaeren*," i. e., "about xvi years" old, and in the Brewster Book (*Mayflower Descendant, I: 7*) he gives his own birthday as Aug. 12, 1593 — early marriages were not uncommon. Among the Pilgrims themselves Dorothy May was only sixteen when she married William Bradford. As no record of the marriage has been found in Amsterdam or Leyden, it is probable that it occurred in England before the flight to Holland.

The bride — whose name nowhere appears, and this is true of their child also — may have been some young girl who had become attached to Jonathan in England when they were hardly more than boy and girl, as sometimes happens; and, when the departure to Holland was being planned, their marriage, even at so early an age, may have seemed wise as affording her the protection which otherwise she might have lacked, as well as to avoid separating them, perhaps never to meet again.

Whatever the reasons were, there appears no room for reasonable doubt, because the various records at Leyden establish the facts that Jonathan Brewster was William's son and that he had a wife and child and lost them.

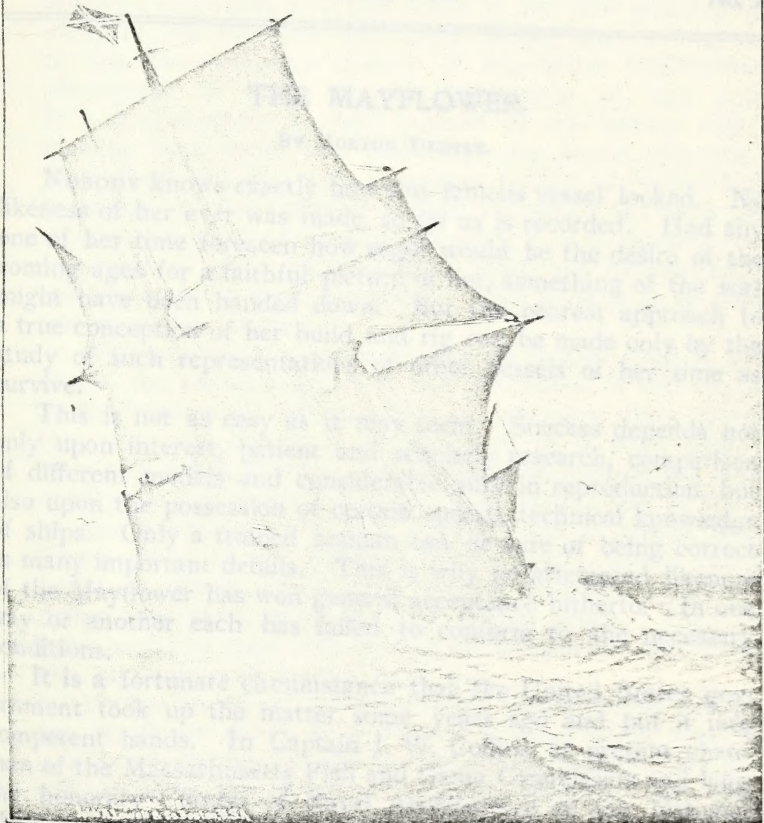

THE MAYFLOWER.

BY MORTON DEXTER.

NOBODY knows exactly how this famous vessel looked. No likeness of her ever was made, so far as is recorded. Had any one of her time foreseen how eager would be the desire of the coming ages for a faithful picture of her, something of the sort might have been handed down. But the nearest approach to a true conception of her build and rig can be made only by the study of such representations of other vessels of her time as survive.

This is not as easy as it may seem. Success depends not only upon interest, patient and scholarly research, comparison of different models and considerable skill in reproduction, but also upon the possession of certain special, technical knowledge of ships. Only a trained seaman can be sure of being correct in many important details. This is why no attempted likeness of the Mayflower has won general acceptance hitherto. In one way or another each has failed to conform to the necessary conditions.

It is a fortunate circumstance that the United States government took up the matter some years ago and put it into competent hands. In Captain J. W. Collins, at present chairman of the Massachusetts Fish and Game Commission and long the honorary Curator of Naval Architecture at the National Museum in Washington, it found a man at once zealous and expert. After careful investigation he selected a design of a vessel of the early seventeenth century from the standard work, *Souvenirs de Marine*, by Admiral François Edmond Paris, of the French navy. With equal conscientiousness he then superintended the construction of a model, built from this design,

and the result is a ship which doubtless is as nearly what the *Mayflower* was in every particular as it is possible to make one. The high stern, known then as the "castle"; the triangular, lateen-shaped mainsail, without any boom; and the square sail under the bowsprit are peculiarities of the marine architecture of the period which should be noted.

Then of course it was in order to put this ship into the water, that is, to reproduce her as she must have appeared under way. This was the task of an artist, and Mr. Marshall Johnson undertook it. The result is the fine painting which many of our members will recall having seen in the rooms of the Massachusetts Society of *Mayflower* Descendants, a photograph of which is the frontispiece of this number. It is a presumably truthful portrait of the famous ship just making land, laden not only with the brave colonists and their goods but also with an unseen freight of possibilities for humanity, of the splendid fruition of which the most daring imagination never dreamed. Moreover, it is an unusually excellent work of art, a painting full of spirit and life, instinct with the tonic of the fresh sea breeze. The artist is to be congratulated on his success.

This painting is now the property of Messrs. John A. Lowell & Co., the eminent engravers and publishers, of this city, and, as the readers of this magazine already have been informed, they are reproducing it in the form of a steel engraving, 22 x 18½ inches in size. Their reputation assures the superior quality of any engraving from their hands, and in the case of this particular work they evidently feel a special interest. There are to be two hundred artist's proofs, signed and numbered, at fifteen dollars each, as well as India proofs at five dollars and plain prints at three dollars apiece. Their enterprise ought to meet with prompt encouragement and doubtless the engraving will have a large sale.

Unless an actual, unquestionably demonstrable picture of the *Mayflower* should be discovered at some future time, which now is wholly beyond the bounds of probability, this picture will stand in history as her accepted likeness. All who are interested in the Pilgrims must be glad that so important a lack in their memorable story has been supplied so successfully at last.

JOSEPH² ALDEN, son of John and Priscilla (Mullins) Alden, died at Bridgewater, Mass., on 8 February, 1696/7, as shown by a statement in the record of his inventory, his wife Mary, the daughter of Moses Simmons, surviving him. His will and inventory are recorded in the Plymouth County Probate Records, Volume I, pages 256 and 257. The original documents are missing from the files.

[p. 256] These are to publish and Declare to all whome it may concern that I Joseph Alden sen^r of y^e Town of Bridgwater in y^e County of plimouth in New England being of sound judgment and memory Do ordain and make my last will and Testament in maner following my Immortall soul I do Humbly Resign into y^e mercyfull hands of Almighty God my creator hoping through y^e merrits and mediation of Jesus Christ to obtain pardon and Salvation my Body I Commit to y^e Earth from whence it was to be Decently Interred at y^e Discretion of my executors and the Rest of my christian friends. And as Touching Such worldly Estate as God hath Blessed me withall I Dispose of it in maner and forme as followeth.

JOHN² DOTY, son of Edward and Faith (Clark) Doty, died at Plymouth, and his death is entered on the town records [Vol. I, p. 203] as follows: "John doty senior deceased May 8th 1701." His will and inventory are recorded in the Plymouth County Probate Records, Volume I, pages 341-343. The only original document in the files is the inventory, which is badly stained and somewhat worn on the edges. The copy of the inventory here presented was made from the original document, the illegible places being supplied from the record.

CAPTAIN JOSEPH² HOWLAND'S WILL AND INVENTORY.

Transcribed from the Original Documents,

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN.

CAPT. JOSEPH HOWLAND, the son of John and Elizabeth (Tilley) Howland, died at Plymouth in January, 1703/4. This statement is made twice in the records of the First Church (Part III, pages 1 and 6), and his will was dated 23 December, 1703, and the inventory taken 31 January, 1703/4.

The will and inventory are recorded in the Plymouth County Probate Records, Volume II, pages 43-45, but the transcript here presented is taken from the original documents, still preserved in the files. The will is twelve and three-fourths inches wide and sixteen and one-half inches high. It is badly cracked in the creases where it has been folded. The inventory is seven and seven-eighths by twelve inches and it is badly cracked. In a few cases it was necessary to complete the copy by comparison with the record.

The will was evidently written out in 1691, and necessary changes made, and the codicil added, in December, 1703, as shown by the erasures and interlineations noted.

A DEED FROM SAMUEL AND HANNAH TUCKER AND THANKFUL MAYO TO ELEAZER RING.

In the April, 1903, issue of this magazine was inserted a query as to the name of the husband of Elizabeth (Ring) Mayo, the daughter of Andrew and Deborah (Hopkins) Ring, and the names of her daughters mentioned in Andrew Ring's will.* By the terms of this will John Mayo, the son of Elizabeth (Ring) Mayo deceased, was to receive certain land in the Sixteen Shilling Purchase at Middleborough, and if he should die under age or without lawful issue the land or its money value was then to be given to his sisters, whose names were not stated.

A partial answer to this query is furnished by the deed here printed. The original document is now in the possession of Pay Director James Andrew Ring, U.S.N., a great-great-grandson of Elizabeth (Ring) Mayo's brother, Eleazer Ring of Plympton, the grantee named in the deed. The deed is recorded in the Plymouth County Records of Deeds, Volume 13, folio 149, but the copy here presented was made from the original document by permission of its owner.

This deed proves that John Mayo died without issue before 4 January, 1717/18, and that the land mentioned thus became the property of his sisters. The will does not state how many of these sisters there were, but it is plain that at the date of the deed there were but two living, and the terms of the deed would seem to indicate that there were no others. These two sisters

were Hannah Tucker, the wife of Samuel Tucker of Chatham, and Thankful Mayo of Eastham.

The date of the marriage of Samuel Tucker and Hannah Mayo has not been found, but it must have been in or before the year 1707, since the Chatham records give the births of eight children, the first one in November, 1707, and the last in June, 1722.* The deed follows.

To all People to whome these Presents shall Com Greeting Know ye that we Samuel Tucker of Chatham & hannah his wife together with Thankfull Mayo of Eastham (Daughters of Elizebeth Mayo formerly of Eastham Deceased) all of the County of Barnstable In the Province of the Masachusets Bay In New england, for & In consideration of the sum of thirtie one pounds Currant money to us In hand paid by our uncle Eleazor Ring of Plimton In the County of Plymouth & Province above sd the Receipt where of we the sd Samuel Tucker & hannah his wife & Thankfull Mayo do acknoleg our selves fully satisfied & paid & thereof & of every part there of do aquit exonerate & discharge the sd Eleazor Ring his heirs exacutors & adminestrators & every of them for ever; especially by these presents for the above Consideration have ffreely, ffully & absolutely Granted Bargained sould Enfeoffed Confarmed & Delivered unto him the sd Eleazor Ring & to his heirs and assignes for ever all that our parcel or or parcels of Lands lying in the Town of Midleborrough in the County of Plymouth above sd in that Purches of Lands there Commonly Cald the sixteen shillings purches & is all the Lands in sd purches that did belong unto our Honoured Grand ffather Andrew Ring Decest & now of Right belongeth unto us as by the Last will & Testament of our sd Grand ffather, baring Date December the forteenth 1691 may appear with all the members Rights privileges & appurtenances every ways belonging & appertaining to all and singuler the Granted premises whasoever: To have & To hold 2ll & singuler the Granted premises from us the sd Samuel Tucker & Hannah Tucker his wife & Thankfull Mayo our heirs exacutors & adminestrators unto him the sd Eleazor Ring & to his heirs & assignes ffor Ever : ffree & clere of all Entanglements hereby declering that before & untill the time of signing these Presents we ware the Lawfull sole priators of all the above Granted premises it being our absolute Estate in ffee simple & we thereby had good Right ffull power & Lawfull Authority to Grant & Confarm as above said & that the sd

GOVERNOR BRADFORD'S LETTER BOOK.

(Continued from page 17.)

THIS year we had letters sent us from the Dutch plantation, of whom we had heard much by the natives, but never could hear from them nor meet with them before themselves thus writ to us, and after sought us out; their letters were writ in a very fair hand, the one in French, and the other in Dutch, but were one *verbatim*, so far as the tongue would bear.

[*Here follows a letter in Low Dutch, from Isaac de Razier at Manhatas, in fort, Amsterdam Mar. 9, 1627 N. S. to the Governour of New-Plymouth.*]

I will not trouble myself to translate this letter, seeing the effect of it will be understood by the answer which now follows in English, though writ to them in Dutch.

To the Honourable and Worshipful the Director and Council of New Netherland, our very loving and worthy friends and christian neighbours.

The Governour and Council of Plymouth in New England wish your Honours and Worships all happiness, and prosperity in this life, and eternal rest and glory with Christ Jesus our Lord in the world to come.

We have received your letters wherein appeareth your good will, and friendship toward us, but is expressed with over high titles, and more than belongs to us, or than is meet for us to receive: But for your good will and congratulation of our prosperity in this small beginning of our poor colony, we are much bound unto you, and with many thanks do acknowledge the same; taking it both for a great honour done unto us, and for a certain testimony of your love, and good neighbourhood. Now these are further to give your Honours, Worships and Wisdoms to understand, that it is to us no small joy, to hear, that it hath pleased God to move his Majesty's heart, not only to confirm that ancient amity, alliance, and friendship, and other contracts formerly made, and ratified by his predecessors of famous memory; but hath himself (as you say) and we likewise have been informed, strengthened the same with

a new union, the better to resist the pride of that common enemy the Spaniards, from whose cruelty the Lord keep us both, and our native countries. Now for as much as this is sufficient to unite us together in love, and good neighbourhood in all our dealings; yet are many of us further tied by the good and courteous entreaty which we have found in your country; having lived there many years, with freedom and good content, as many of our friends do to this day; for which we are bound to be thankful, and our children after us and shall never forget the same but shall heartily desire your good and prosperity, as our own forever. Likewise for your friendly proposition and offer to accommodate and help us with any commodities or merchandize which you have and we want, either for beaver, otters or other wares, is to us very acceptable, and we doubt not but in short time, we may have profitable commerce and trade together: But you may please to understand that we are but one particular colony or plantation in this land, there being divers others besides, unto whom it hath pleased those Honourable Lords of his Majesty's Council for New England, to grant the like commission, and ample privileges to them (as to us) for their better profit and subsistence; namely to expulse, or make prize of any, either strangers or other English which shall attempt, either to trade, or plant within their limits (without their special licence and commission) which extends to forty degrees: Yet for our parts, we shall not go about to molest or trouble you in any thing, but continue all good neighbourhood and correspondence as far as we may; only we desire that you would forbear to trade with the natives in this bay, and river of Naragansett and Sowames, which is (as it were) at our doors: The which if you do, we think also no other English will go about any way to trouble or hinder you; which otherwise are resolved to solicit his Majesty for redress, if otherwise they cannot help themselves.

May it please you further to understand, that for this year we are fully supplied with all necessaries, both for clothing and other things; but it may so fall out, that hereafter we shall deal with you, if your rates be reasonable: And therefore when your people come again, we desire to know how you will take beaver by the pound, and otters by the skin, and how you will per cent. for other commodities, and what you can furnish us with; as likewise what commodities from us, may be acceptable with you, as tobacco, fish, corn, or other things, and what prices you will give.

Thus hoping that you will pardon and excuse us for our rude and imperfect writing in your language, and take it in good part; because, for want of use, we cannot so well express that we understand; nor happily understand every thing so fully as we should: And so we humbly pray the Lord, for his mercy's sake, that he will take both us and our native countries, into his holy protection and defence. Amen.

Next follows their reply to this our answer, very friendly but maintaining their right and liberty to trade in those parts, which we had desired they would forbear; alleging that as we had authority and commission from our king; so they had the like from the States of Holland, which they would defend.

August 7, 1627.

Another of theirs upon our answer to their last, which I here omit.

An answer to the former letters.

We have received your *letters dated the 7th of August, and with them a rundlet of sugar, and two Holland cheeses, by John Jacobson of Wiring; for which we give you many thanks and must remain your debtors till another time, not having any thing to send you for the present that may be acceptable: Further, you shall understand that it is also our resolution and hearty desire to hold and continue all friendship and good neighbourhood with you as far as we may and lies in our power; we desire also that we might have opportunity (according as you write) by word of mouth, to confer together touching our mutual commerce and trading in such things as our countries afford; and would now have sent one, but that one of our boats is abroad, and we have much business at home; But if by the next you would please to depute one (according as you have propounded) to come hither and to confer hereabouts, we should be glad and he should be welcome. If not, we shall send as soon as conveniently we can (after harvest) if we can know when your bark comes this way. We cannot likewise omit (out of our love and good affection toward you and the trust you repose in us) to give you warning of the danger which may befall you, that you may prevent it; for

if you light either in the hands of those of Virginia or the fishing ships, which come to New England, peradventure they will make prize of you, if the can, if they find you trading within those limits; as they surprised a colony of the French, not many years since, which was seated within these bounds: For howsoever you allege in your former letter, that you have navigated and traded in these parts above this twenty-six years, and that your company have now authority from the States and the Prince of Orange to do so; yet you must understand that her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, of famous memory hath began to navigate and plant in these lands well nigh forty years ago, as appeareth by her patents and royal grants conferred upon divers of her subjects and since confirmed and enlarged by his late Majesty, and still continued by possession. Therefore it were best (in our opinion) that your masters should solicit the States that they might come to some order and agreement with the King's Majesty and State of England hereabout, before any inconvenience befall; for howsoever you may be assured for ourselves, yet we should be sorry to hear you should sustain harm from any of our nation; but more of these things when we shall speak one with another: In the mean time we commit you and your affairs to the protection of the highest.

After the wishing of all good unto you, this serves to let you understand, that we have received your (acceptable) letters dated the 14th of the last month, by John Jacobson of Wiring, who besides, by word of mouth, hath reported unto us your kind and friendly entertainment of him: For which cause (by the good-liking and approbation of the Directors and Council) I am resolved to come myself, in friendship, to visit you, that we may by word of mouth friendly communicate of things together; as also to report unto you the good will and favour that the Honourable Lords of the authorized West-Indian com-

pany bear towards you. And to show our willingness of your good accommodation, have brought with me some cloth of three sorts and colours, and a chest of white sugar, as also some *seawan*, &c. not doubting but, if any of them may be serviceable unto you, we shall agree well enough about the prices thereof. Also John Jacobson aforesaid hath told me, that he came to you overland in six hours, but I have not gone so far this three or four years; wherefore I fear my feet will fail me, so I am constrained to entreat you to afford me the easiest means that I may, with least weariness, come to congratulate with you: So leaving other things to the report of the bearer, shall herewith end; remembering my hearty salutations to yourself and friends, &c. from a-board the bark Nassau, the 4th of October; before Frenchman's point.

So, according to his request, we sent our boat for him, who came honourably attended with a noise of trumpeters; he was their upper *commis*, or chief merchant and second to the Governour; a man of a fair and genteel behaviour, but soon after fell into disgrace amongst them; by reason of their factions; and thus at length we came to meet and deal together. We at this time bought sundry of their commodities, especially their *sewan* or *wampampeack*, which was the beginning of a profitable trade with us and the Indians: We further understood, that their masters were willing to have friendship with us and to supply us with sundry commodities, and offered us assistance against the French if need were. The which, though we know it was with an eye to their own profit, yet we had reason both kindly to accept it and make use of it: So after this sundry of them came often to us, and many letters passed between us, the which I will pass by, as being about particular dealings, and would not be here very pertinent; only upon this passage we wrote one to their Lords and masters; as followeth.

Right Honourable and Worthy Lords, &c.

We understand by your agent, Mr. Isaac Razier, who is at this present with us (and hath demeaned himself to your honours and his own credit) of your honourable and respective good intentions towards us, which we humbly acknowledge with all thankfulness, and shall ever be ready in the perform-

ance of all offices of good and christian neighbourhood, towards your colony and plantation here, and in all satisfactory correspondence to your Honours, so far as in us lieth and may stand with our allegiance to the King's most excellent Majesty. our Sovereign Lord the King of Great-Britain; acknowledging ourselves tied in a strict obligation unto your country and State, for the good entertainment and free liberty which we had, and our brethren and countrymen yet there have and do enjoy, under our most honourable Lords the States; and so shall be ready to accommodate ourselves to your good satisfaction: For the propositions of your agent concerning the matter of trade and commerce, we will have due and respective consideration, wishing it had been sooner propounded at the beginning of the year, before we sent our factor into England and Holland about our trade and supplies; for, till his return, we can determine of nothing, not yet knowing certainly what issue there will be of the business between the merchants our partners, and ourselves; and therefore desire suspension of our determination and resolution herein till the next year, we being not yet altogether free in respect of our engagements unto them: In the meantime we will digest it in our best cogitations; only we desire your Honours, that ye would take into your wise and honourable considerations, that which we conceive may be a hindrance to this accordation, and may be a means of much future evil, if it be not prevented, namely, that you clear the title of your planting in these parts, which his Majesty hath, by patent, granted to divers his nobles and subjects of quality; least it be a bone of division in these stirring evil times, which God forbid: We persuade ourselves, that now may be easily and seasonably done, which will be harder and with more difficulty obtained hereafter, and perhaps not without blows; so there may be assured peace and good correspondence on all parts, and ourselves more free and able to contract with your Honours. Thus commending our best service to our most noble Lords, praying for the prosperous success of your worthy designs, we rest your Lordships'

A GENEALOGICAL LETTER FROM JOHN^A ALDEN.

THE letter here presented was written by John^A Alden (*John³, Joseph², John¹*) of Middleborough, Mass., in 1801, when he was over eighty-two years of age, and is printed from a copy made many years ago by Mr. Fred Church and loaned to the Editor by its present owner, Mr. W. C. Stoddard of Fairhaven, Mass. The whereabouts of the original letter is not known.

Joseph² Alden's will* mentions sons Isaac³, Joseph³ and John³, and no other of the sons of John¹ had children of these names, therefore the grandfather of John^A was Joseph², not John² as the writer of the letter supposed. This error is not surprising in view of the fact that Joseph² died more than one hundred years before the letter was written.

This letter is of especial interest because of its statement that Joseph² Alden had three daughters, two of whom married Snows of Bridgewater and the third a Burrill of Weymouth. This positively identifies Elizabeth the wife of Benjamin Snow and Mercy the wife of John Burrill as daughters of Joseph² Alden; and it leads us to suspect that Hopestill, the wife of Joseph Snow, was the third daughter, but the latter marriage has not yet been proved.

It will be noticed that John^A Alden twice gives his birth date as September tenth, new style, and that the Middleborough records † give the date as October eighth, probably old style. There can be little doubt that John knew the correct date of his birth, and a study of the records leads to the belief that the town clerk by mistake copied the month and day of Ebenezer's birth in place of John's. Both are entered as "october the : 8," John in 1718, Ebenezer in 1720. Many such errors have been found by comparison of the records with the original returns.

[JOHN^A ALDEN'S LETTER.]

Middleborough April 14th 1801

Sir,

Being from home when you was last here on the business of obtaining a genealogy of the Aldens, I was not able to com-

municate with you on that subject. Deacon Alden has handed me the letter from Rev. Timothy Alden, and agreeably to the wish therein expressed, I have here committed to paper for the use required, such information as is in my power. Similar information from other branches of the family may be obtained, which united will give the genealogy required. The number, or names of the children of John Alden who landed at Plymouth in 1620 I am not able to give, nor can I relate the chain from me t[o] the Duxborough original. Whether my Grandfather who lived in Bridgewater, was son of said John Alden I am not able to say — nor can I *positively determine*, but do *suppose* his name was *John*. My grandfather had three sons and three daughters, who were married, Joseph, (I suppose the oldest,) Isaac and John. The daughters' names I cannot relate; neither am I positive the second son's name was Isaac. Two of the daughters married into the family of Snow of Bridgewater — the other married a Burrill of Weymouth. — John Alden the third son was my father; he married *Hannah White*, daughter of Capt. Ebenezer White of Weymouth, in what year I am not able to say — she died October 5th 1732, O. S. in the 52^d year of her age — By her he had thirteen children, viz., David, Priscilla, Thankful, Hannah, Lydia, Mary, Abigail, Joseph, *John* (myself) Ebenezer, Lemuel, Nathan and Noah — he died September 29th 1730, O. S. in the 56th year of his age. — David married Judah Paddleford — the genealogy of this family you can give more correct than myself. — Priscilla married Abraham Borden and died soon after. — Thankful married Francis Eaton of Kingston — Hannah married Thomas Wood of Middleborough — Lydia married Samuel Eddy of Middleborough, who deceased, and she afterward married John Fuller, she is now living and is *ninety one* years old, and enjoys tolerable health. Mary married Noah Thomas of Middleborough, — Abigail married Nathan Thomas, brother of Noah. — Joseph married *Hannah Hall* daughter of Hall of Raynham, by whom he had Ebenezer, Amaziah, Mercy, Phoebe, Hannah, Joseph, Fear, Eunice, Lois, Abner and Eliab — Hannah his wife deceased and he married the widow Deborah Williamson, by whom he had no offspring. Abner Alden will give you the genealogy of this family correctly.

John (myself) born Sept. 10th 1718 N. S. married Lydia Lazell daughter of Simon Lazell of Middleborough May 14th 1739, N. S. She died April 17th 1749, N. S. in the 27th year of her age — By her I had five children, viz. John, born Feby. 7th 1740 N. S, Mary, born Nov^r 22^d 1741 N. S. Nathan,

born Aug^t 22^d 1743, N. S. Susanna, born Aug^t 29th 1745
N. S. Lydia, December 11th 1747 N. S.

July 12th 1750 married Rebecca Weston, daughter of Zachariah Weston of this town, who was born Nov^r 25th 1730. by her I had fourteen children, at single births, viz., Priscilla, born May 15th 1751 — Died Oct. 22^d 1751. Ruth, born Oct. 15th 1752. Died Aug^t 25th 1753. Elijah born June 13th 1754. Rebecca, born April 18th 1756. Hannah born April 15th 1758. Sarah born Feby 9th 1760. Lucy, born Aug^t 12th 1762. Jael, born June 27th 1764. A Son born March 26th 1766 and died not named. A Daughter, born April 16th 1767 and died not named. Ruth born March 13th 1768. Seth, born Feby 7th 1770. Betsey, born April 13th 1773. Elihu, born May 20th 1775.

Ebenezer, my brother married Ann Whitaker, she died and he married a second time — the person's name I am not able to give. He removed and settled in the western part of this State. Deacon David Alden can better give you his genealogy than myself. *Lemuel* and *Nathan* died young. — Noah became a settled minister of the Baptist order in Stafford Connecticut, afterwards removed to Bellingham in this State, and died there — he married Joanna Vhaun daughter of John Vhaun of this town the number of his posterity I am not able to give — Deacon Alden will probably do it. — This is the genealogy of my Father's family.

John Alden, my son, married Lois Southworth daughter of Gideon Southworth of Rochester, and settled in Dartmouth now called New Bedford — their offspring are Mary, Sarah, (died young) John, Lydia, Sally, Lois, Gideon, Seth and Nathan.

Mary, (my dau^r) married Calvin Delano of Dartmouth now called New Bedford, settled and died there, leaving three children, viz., Lydia, Alden, (since dead) and Deborah.

Nathan, married Priscilla Miller, daughter of John Miller of this town, their progeny are John, Priscilla (died young) Otis, Lydia (died young) Polly, Earl and Nathan — he settled first in this town is himself now in Kentucky.

Susanna, married Joseph Tripp of Dartmouth, now called New Bedford and settled there — by him she had two children — Joseph only survives. Mr. Tripp died and she married Samuel Procter, Merchant of same place — he died Feby. 16th 1801 leaving by her, Susanna, William and Charles. —

Lydia, married John Spooner of Dartmouth and settled there — he died Feby 1773 leaving John and Thomas with

her — She died June 19th 1775, and Thomas died May 31st 1799.

Elijah, married Mary Alden daughter of Solomon Alden of Bridgewater, their issue is Israel, Lucinda, Vienna, Serena, Jared, Elijah, Mary, (died young) Polly, Daniel and Olive, all unmarried.

Lucy, married Eleazer Carey of Bridgewater Nov^r 1791 and settled there ; but died April 29th 1795. —

Jael, married Isaiah Jones of Raynham, and are settled in New Bedford, they had four children, two only living Alden and Philander.

Ruth married Walter Howard of, and settled in Bridgewater ; they have two children Alden and Ruth.

Seth, remains unmarried.

Betsey married Daniel Thomas, and is settled in this town — their children are five, viz., Daniel, Hercules, Lewis, Eliza and Rebecca.

Elihu, married Lydia Mitchell, daughter of Capt. Mitchell of Reedsfield District of Maine, and is settled in Collegetown Dist. Maine, — his progeny are Lucy & Millbury Weston, both young.

Thus far my family.

Mary, eldest daughter of my son John, married Rev. Isaac Tompkins, now settled in Haverhill in this State, they have two children, Lois and Sally.

John, his oldest son married Ruth Pope dau^r of Samuel Pope of New Bedford and is now settled there — his progeny are Ebenezer, Betsey and Samuel.

Lydia, his second daughter married Gamaliel Church and is settled in New Bedford, her children are Isaac, James and Lydia.

His other children are unmarried.

John Alden, Son of Nathan married Susanna Dunham daug^r of M. Dunham of Plymouth — their children are five in number, names I know not.

Otis, son of Nathan married a Miss Barrow of this town, they have two children, both young, names not known to me.

Earl, son of Nathan was a few weeks since married to a daughter of Rev. Samuel Nelson of this town.

Nathan's other children are unmarried.

Thus I have given you as correct a genealogy as in my

power, remarkable anecdotes, I have none, nor are there any striking traits in the lives of the characters delineated worthy of note. In general terms they have been persons "*who feared God and eschewed evil.*" I am now Eighty two years old, and should I live to the 10th of September next I shall be Eighty three. My posterity can now be reckoned at *nineteen* children, 50 Grandchildren, and 29 Great Grandchildren, in the whole ninety eight — of whom I reckon now living *twelve* children — forty grandchildren and 24 great grandchildren.

STEPHEN² SAMSON (*Henry*¹) probably died at Duxbury shortly before 31 January 1714/15, when his widow Elizabeth was appointed administratrix.

The final settlement of the estate bears no date, but it is recorded among other matters considered at the probate court held June twenty-first and twenty-second, 1716, and it is probable that one of these dates should be assigned to this settlement.

The following transcripts are all made from the original documents, except in the case of the letter of administration, which is not in the files. All the documents except the bond of the administratrix are on record in the Plymouth County Probate Records, Volume III, pages 342-344 and 421.

 11 April, 1765, and duly acknowledged by all the grantors,
 but never recorded, in which the children of Allerton⁵ Cushman
 (*Allerton⁴, Elkanah³, Mary² Allerton, Isaac¹*) by his first wife,
 Alethea⁴ Soule (*Joseph³, John², George¹*), convey to Joseph
 Cushman of Duxbury land in the Major's Purchase which they
 had inherited from their grandfather Joseph³ Soule. The land
 conveyed by this deed is the same as that given by the will*
 of Joseph³ Soule to the children of his deceased daughter
 Alethea Cushman, therefore the grantors named must have
 been the only surviving children. The grantee, Joseph Cush-

man, was probably the son of Joseph³ Soule's deceased daughter Mary, the first wife of Joshua Cushman, mentioned in the will.

This deed proves that the only children of Allerton⁵ Cushman and Alethea⁴ Soule who were living 11 April, 1765, were Allerton⁶ Cushman, Jr., and Ephraim⁵ Cushman, both of Coventry, Conn., Asenath the wife of Joseph Downer of Lebanon, Conn., Lydia the wife of Ephraim Foot of Nine Partners, N. Y., and Mary the wife of Joshua Soule of Duxbury. In another deed* made 22 September, 1766, by Allerton Cushman, Jr., and Harmony his wife, Ephraim Cushman and Sarah his wife, and Joseph Downer and Asenath his wife, all are said to be of Coventry, Conn.

The compiler of the Cushman Genealogy (pp. 170, 171) does not give the marriages of Asenath and Mary, and makes an unfortunate error in stating that Lydia became the second wife of Perez Bradford, contradicting his own statement, on an earlier page (147), that Perez married Lydia the widow of Elisha Cushman.

The document was in three vertical strips when received by the Society, and the top of the right-hand strip and the bottom of the middle strip were missing, but enough remains so that we know that none of the names have been lost. The deed has now been preserved by the Emery Process.

 PILGRIM NOTES AND QUERIES.

NOTE.

GOVERNOR THOMAS PRENCE'S WIDOW. The identity of Mary, the widow of Governor Thomas Prence, has long been a disputed question, and it will be very gratifying to his numerous descendants to learn that Miss E. F. Elliot, of Somerville, Mass., has discovered conclusive documentary evidence that Mary, the widow of Thomas Howes of Yarmouth, afterwards married Governor Prence and survived him. Governor Prence, therefore, had at least three wives, Patience Brewster, the daughter of Elder William Brewster, Mary Collier, the daughter of William Collier, of Duxbury, and Mary —, the widow of Thomas Howes of Yarmouth. There are also other records which cannot be satisfactorily explained except on the supposition that there was still another marriage, prior to the marriage to Mary (—) Howes.

Miss Elliot is preparing the evidence of the marriage to the widow of Thomas Howes for publication in our July number.

ANSWER TO QUERY.

39. PRATT. The wife of Samuel⁴ Pratt (*Samuel*,³ *Mary*² *Priest*, *Decease*¹) was Hannah, daughter of John Miller, Sr., of Middleborough. John Miller, Sr., left no will and on 24 May, 1720, his son John was appointed administrator. On 27 June, 1720, John Miller of Middleborough, Thomas Dexter and Mary his wife, of Rochester, Samuel Pratt and Hannah his wife, of Middleborough, Ebenezer Reddin and Mercy his wife, of Middleborough, Joseph Rickard and Deborah his wife, of Plympton, and Elizabeth Delano of Middleborough, "being the children of John Miller Senior late of middleborough aforesaid Deceased:" made a settlement of the estate by which all the real and personal property was conveyed to the son John, who paid each of his sisters the sum of £43, 3s., 10d. This settlement was not recorded, the original paper being in the Plymouth County probate files.

BOOK NOTES.

A beautiful piece of book-making is "The Tale of the Spinning Wheel," by Mrs. Elizabeth Cynthia Barney Buel, the Regent of Mary Floyd Tallmadge Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. The book is illustrated by Emily Noyes Vanderpoel in a most unique manner—dainty little vignettes in tint—which combine with the text, as do both with the printing and binding, to make one of the choicest little books which we have seen. It is rare that an historical monograph receives such tasteful setting and one hardly knows where to begin in admiring this little gem of a book. Mrs. Buel read a paper on the subject of the Spinning Wheel before the Historical Society of Litchfield, Conn., where the book, which is a revision and enlargement of the paper, is published. Afterwards the author read her work before many historical societies, including the New England Society of New York, various Chapters of Daughters of the American Revolution and Colonial Dames Societies and other bodies, and it is a cause for congratulation that all of us who are interested in historical study now have access to her work, the result of careful research and painstaking study. The romance and reality of the badge of colonial womanhood and the symbol of the great society in which she is an honored Regent is set forth in this pretty book with all the charm and appreciation of the subject which can be imagined. It is a book that instructs while it pleases and leaves one a better American for the reading.

Miss Emily Noyes Vanderpoel has compiled and Mrs. Elizabeth C. Barney Buel has edited a book published by the University Press, Cambridge, Mass., called "Chronicles of a Pioneer School. From 1792 to 1833, being the History of Miss Sarah Pierce and her Litchfield (Conn.) School." This work in 465 pages and 64 half-tone plates, is a welcome addition to historical literature in one of the most fascinating departments of "Americana." It gives a history of a celebrated female academy, during a large part of its existence the only institution in New England for the higher education of young women and it exerted a great influence on the times. The history of such an institution is a distinct gain to the cause of historical as well as of educational research. It goes thoroughly into the life, the manners and customs of the epoch, contains extracts from compositions, diaries, rules, reminiscences and even genealogies, and there is a complete index, making the book valuable for reference. The press work, illustrations and arrangement are of the best; it is a book not only to own but to read and to read through, a thoroughly interesting and instructive book, fairly breathing the life of the past and rolling away that mystical haze which too often clouds our ideas of the fathers and mothers of New England. Here they live again and in this exhaustive record of the higher types of living a century ago we gain new inspiration for our battles with present day problems and find renewed cause to glory in the rare heritage which is the birthright of the children of New England.

WILLIAM PABODIE'S WILL AND INVENTORY.

Transcribed from the Original Records and Documents,

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN.

WILLIAM PABODIE married Elizabeth² Alden (*John*¹) on 26 December, 1644,* and, after living at Duxbury many years, removed to Little Compton, which was a part of Bristol County, Mass., until 1747, when it was annexed to Rhode Island. He died at Little Compton on 13 December, 1707, and his will and inventory are found in the Bristol County Probate Records, at Taunton, Mass., Volume II, pages 193-195 and 268. The original will has disappeared from the files, but the original inventory and the executor's account, also the bond of the executors, which is not recorded, are still in the docket.

The bond of the executors is dated 27 February, 1707,† and was made out on a printed form. "Elizabeth Pabodie widow Relict of m^r william Pabodie Late of Little Compton in the County of Bristoll Deceased & william Pabodie son to y^e said Deceased" were the principals, and "m^r Peter Taylor & Samuel wilbore of Little Compton" the sureties, the bond being for the sum of £800. Elizabeth Pabodie, the widow, signed by her mark, the others wrote their names. The witnesses were John Coe and William Fobes.

GOVERNOR BRADFORD'S LETTER BOOK.

(Continued from page 109.)

WE well knew likewise, that this dealing and friendship with the Dutch (though it was wholly sought of themselves) yet it would procure us envy from others in the land, and that at one time or other, our enemies would take occasion to raise slanders and frame accusations against us for it; therefore, to prevent their malice, as also to shew the sincerity of our dealing and our loyal and dutiful respect to his Majesty and the Honourable Council for New England; we sent their first letter (with our answer thereto and their reply to the same) unto the Council as may appear more particularly by our letters following.

*A letter to the Council of New England.**Right Honourable,*

WE held it our bounden duty to inform and acquaint your Lordships and Honours, with all such occurrences and matters of note as do here befall, and may any way concern the estate of this country, in either the good or hurt thereof, which, next his Majesty, stands under your honourable governments and protection; or which may in any sort, be worthy your wise and prudent considerations. May it please your Honours and Lordships to understand, that of late we received letters from the Dutch plantation, who using to trade near unto us, had order to stay for an answer from us; and the effect of their letters, being friendly and congratulatory, we answered them in like sort; since which time, we received another from them, but have had as yet no opportunity to give answer thereto. Their first letters were two,* but both one in effect and verbatim, so far as the proprieties of the tongues will bear; the French, with the copies both of our answer and their reply, we have here enclosed sent unto your Honour's view, that according to your honourable directions therein, we may govern ourselves, in our dealings with them. We further understand that for strength of men and fortification, they far exceed us, and all in this land. We cannot likewise forbear to complain unto your Lordships, of the irregular living of many in this

land, who without either patent or licence, order or government, live, trade and truck, not with any intent to plant, but rather to forage the country and get what they can, whether by right or wrong, and then be gone: So as such as have been and are at great charge to settle plantations, will not be able to subsist, if some remedy be not provided, both with these and the inordinate course of fishermen, who begin to leave fishing, and fall wholly to trading, to the great detriment of both the small beginning here, and the State of England, by the unprofitable consuming of the victuals of the land upon these salvages: Whereas plantations might here better raise the same in the land, and so be enabled both to subsist and to return the profit thereof into England for other necessaries, which would be beneficial to the commonwealth. Our humble suits therefore to your good Lordships is, that you would take some such order, for redress herein, as shall seem best to your honourable wisdoms, for the relief of all the plantations in the land. So in all humbleness we commit ourselves to your honourable direction, and you to the protection of the Almighty, resting

Honourable Sir,

MY humble duty remembered; we have of late received letters from the Dutch plantation and have had speech with some of them; I hold it my duty to acquaint your Worship and the rest of the Honourable Council therewith, unto whom we have likewise writ and sent the copies of their letters, that, together with their and your honourable directions, we may know how to order ourselves herein: They have used trading there this six or seven and twenty years, but have begun to plant of later time, and now have reduced their trade to some order, and confined it only to their company, which heretofore was spoiled by their seamen and interlopers, as ours is this year most notoriously, of whom we have made some complaint in our letters to the Council, not doubting but we shall find worshipful furtherance therein. We are now upon concluding with our adventurers, and shall be put upon hard straits by great payments, which we are enforced to make, for sundry years, or else to leave all, which will be to us very difficult; and, to say the truth, if these disorders of fishermen and interlopers,

be not remedied, no plantations are able to stand, but will decay, whereas otherwise they may subsist and flourish: Thus in all humbleness I take leave, and rest,

Besides the spoiling of the trade this last year, our boat and men had like to have been cut off by the Indians, after the fishermen were gone, for the wrongs which they did them, in stealing their skins and other abuses offered them, both the last year and this; and besides they still continue to truck pieces, powder and shot with them, which will be the overthrow of all, if it be not looked unto.

BUT I will now return to prosecute other letters out of England, touching our business and success thereof.

A letter of Mr. Shirley's.

To his worthy and loving friend, Mr. William Bradford, Governour of Plymouth, in New-England; these.

Thrice worthy and beloved Sir,

I HAVE received your letter of the 26th of May, by Mr. Gibs and Mr. Goff, and with all the barrel of skins according to the contents; for which Mr. Beauchamp and I got a bill of store, and so took them up and sold them together at £78 12s. sterling, and since, Mr. Allerton hath received the money, as will appear by the account. It is true as you write, your engagements are great, not only the purchase, but you are yet necessitated to take up the stock you work upon, and that not at 6 or 8 per cent. as it is here let out, but at 30, 40, yea and some 50 per cent. which were not your gains great, and God's blessing on your honest endeavours more than ordinary, it could not be that you should long subsist, in the maintaining of and upholding of your worldly affairs: And this your honest, wise, and discreet agent, Mr. Allerton, hath seriously considered and so deeply laid to mind how to ease you of it, as I know it hath much troubled him: He told me you were contented to accept of me and some few others, to join with you in the purchase, as partners; for which I kindly thank you and all the rest and do willingly accept of it; and though absent, shall willingly and readily be at such charge as you and the rest shall think meet; and this year am contented to forbear my former £50 and two years increase for the adventure, both which now

makes £80, without any bargain or condition for the profit, you (I mean the generality) standing to the adventure outward and homeward: Now (not that I would seem to boast or seek for undeserved praise) I have persuaded Mr. Andrews and Mr. Beauchamp to do the like; so as you are eased of that high rate you were at the other two years, I say we leave it freely to yourselves, allow us what you please and as God shall bless: I purpose, God willing, to be at charge of sending over a man or two; and so doth Mr. Andrews and now Mr. Beauchamp; for what course I run he desireth to do the same; and though he have been or seemed somewhat harsh heretofore, yet, now you shall find he is new moulded.

I also see, in your letter, your desire I should be your agent or factor here; truly Mr. Bradford and our worthy Governour, far be it from me to flatter you (for I profess to hate it) I have ever esteemed and found you so faithful, honest and upright men, as I have even resolved with myself (God assisting me) to do you all the good that lieth in my power; and therefore if you please to make choice of so weak a man, both for abilities and body, to perform your business, I promise, the Lord enabling me, to do the best I can, according to those abilities he hath given me, and wherein I fail, excuse me and blame yourselves, that you made no better choice; now, because I am sickly and we are all mortal, I have advised Mr. Allerton to join Mr. Beauchamp with me in your deputation, which I conceive to be very necessary and good for you; your charge shall be no more for it is not your salary makes me undertake your business: Sir, for your love and good counsel to my kinsman, I acknowledge myself much engaged unto you, I pray you be still the same, for I know he hath much need of it.

[The rest being news, and of sundry passages about the Parliament; I omit as not pertinent to my purpose, it was concluded as followeth.]

Thus fearing I have been troublesome in relating of things, I cease, heartily desiring the long continuance of your good health to the pleasure of the Lord, and commending you and yours, and all God's faithful people wheresoever, unto the guidance and safe protection of the Almighty, ever resting

London, Nov. 17, Anno 1628.

BEING thus deeply engaged, and a few only of us being bound to make payment of all, yea in a double bond; for

besides our formal bonds, it was our credits and honesty, that made our friends rest and rely upon us, assuring themselves, that if we lived and it was possible, we would see them have their monies: Therefore we thought it our safest and best course to come to some agreement with the people, to have the whole trade consigned to us for some years; and so in the time to take upon us, to pay all the debts and set them free: Another reason which moved us to take this heavy burthen upon our shoulders was, our great desire to transport as many of our brethren of Leyden over unto us, as we could, but without this course we could never have done it, all here being (for peace and unity's sake) made joint purchasers with us, and every one thereby had as much interest as ourselves; and many were very opposite here against us in respect of the great charge: Again we well knew, that, except we followed our trading roundly, we should never be able to do the one or the other; therefore we sought means to have our patent enlarged, and to have some good trading places included therein; that if we could not keep them thereby wholly to ourselves, yet that none should exclude or thrust us wholly out of them, as we well knew that some would have done, if we now had not laid hold of the opportunity: Therefore Mr. Allerton was sent over to prosecute these things, and to acquaint those few of our friends in England, whom the year before were joined purchasers with us, what agreements we had made and concluded with our people, and for what ends, and so to offer them to be our partners in trade and the whole business; writing our letters unto them for that end.

The copy of the covenants made with the people here followeth; after the which were signed by them, we made division of the cattle and other things, every one having according to their proportion of shares, and so were set free from all engagements and debts, they resting wholly on our heads.

ARTICLES of agreement between the Colony of Plymouth in New England of the one party; and William Bradford, Captain Miles Standish, and Isaac Allerton, and such others as they shall take as partners and undertakers with them, on the other party, made the —

First, it is agreed and covenanted betwixt the said parties, that they the said William Bradford, Captin Miles Standish, and Isaac Allerton, and such others as they shall take unto them, have undertaken, and do by these presents covenant and agree to pay, discharge and acquit the said colony, of all the

debts, both due for the purchase, or any other way belonging to the same, at the day of the date of these presents.

Secondly, the abovesaid parties are to have and freely enjoy the pinnace, the boat at Manamett, and the shallop, called the Bass Boat, with all other implements to them belonging, that is in the store of the company; with all the whole stock of furs, fells, beads, corn, wampampeak, hatchets, knives, &c. that is now in the store, or any way due unto the same upon account.

Thirdly, that the abovesaid parties have the whole trade to themselves their heirs and assigns, with all the privileges thereof, as the said colony doth now, or may use the same; for six full years to begin the last of September next ensuing.

Fourthly, in further consideration of the discharge of the said debts every several purchaser, doth promise and covenant yearly to pay, or cause to be payed, to the abovesaid parties, during the full term of the said six years, three bushels of corn or six pounds of tobacco, at the undertaker's choice.

Fifthly, the said undertakers shall, during the aforesaid term, bestow £50 per annum in hose and shoes, to be brought over for the colony's use, to be sold them for corn, at 6s. per bushel.

Sixthly, that at the end of the said term of six years, the whole trade shall return to the use and benefit of the said colony, as before.

Lastly, if the aforesaid undertakers, after they have acquainted their friends in England with these covenants, do (upon the first return) resolve to perform them, and undertake to discharge the debts of the said colony according to the true meaning and intent of these presents, then they are (upon such notice given) to stand in force, otherwise all things to remain, as formerly they were, and a true account to be given to the said colony, of the disposing of all things according to the former order.

This agreement was by these subscribed; for some would not subscribe, and some were from home.

ISAAC² HOWLAND (*John*¹) died at Middleborough, Mass., on 9 March, 1723/4*, and his widow Elizabeth died at the same place 29 October, 1727, in the seventy-fifth year of her age.*

Isaac's will is recorded in the Plymouth County Probate Records, Volume IV, pages 408 and 409, and the inventory in Volume V, page 6. The inventory is the only original document left in the files and this has been used in making the copy here presented. It is somewhat worn and the copy has been perfected from the record.

HOWES WILLS AND INVENTORIES.

THE wills and inventories of Thomas¹ Howes, Captain Thomas² Howes and the latter's widow, Sarah (Bangs) Howes, all of Yarmouth, are important links in the chain of evidence which proves that Mary, the widow of Thomas¹ Howes, became the third or fourth wife of Governor Thomas Prence and survived him. The literal copies here presented were made from the second, third and fourth volumes of the Plymouth Colony Wills and Inventories.

[THE WILL AND INVENTORY OF THOMAS¹ HOWES.]

[II : II : 31*] The Last Will and Testament of m^r Thomas howes of yarmouth late Deceased; exhibited to the Court held att Plymouth the seaventh of March 1665 on the oath of; M^r Anthony Thacher and Mistris Elizabeth Thacher his wife

I Thomas howes weake in body but of sound memory Doe this 26 Day of September Ann^o : Dom : 1665 Doe make and ordaine this my last will and Testament in maner & form following first my Will is that my three sonnes Joseph Thomas and Jeremy have and hold the lands; both upland and meddow which I have formerly given to each of them and alreddy put each of them in possession of; To them and their heires and assignes for ever; together with all waies and easments unto them and each pticulare psell of them as now they have them; without any Interruption or molestation of any or each of them or any their assignes; further my will is and I Doe give unto Mary my wife my Dwelling house with all other my outhousings whatsoever with all the Lands now in my Posession During her life unlesse shee Change her Condition by marrying her selfe after my Decease unto another man; and then shee shall have onely the thirds of them; And my will is that shee alsoe have all my moveable goods both within and without after my Debts bee payed att her Dispose for her use and benefitt; provided shee Dispose and give the remaine of them; att her Decease or marriage unto my said Children but in such and such proportions as shee shall see meet; And my will is and I Doe give and bequeath unto mine eldest sonne Joseph after; mine and my said wives; Decease all that feild now comonly called the new feild; and all my meddowes therunto adjoining unto the little brooke that runs Downe towards the nine acres point; and one halfe pte of the necke called Simpkins necke; from the Cart path as now goeth through the

swamp into the said necke on a straight line to the Easter end of the Townes meddow (viz) the easter end and alsoe that meddow which was formerly Sturgises together with all waies and easments with the bounds both uplands and meddow; and every pte and psell of them as now they are; and I Doe give and bequeath by this my last Will and Testament unto Thomas my second son after mine and my wifes Decease my now Dwelling house with my outhouses and orchyard and all the land according as the old fence went Downe to the nine acres springe on the north west side of the said fence to my son Jeremyes feild with the other pte of said Necke Called Simpkins necke and four acres of meddow lying and being betwixt the Towne meddow and Ryders meddow; and all the meddow on the Northwest of the said Ryders meddow to the Reedy Creeke together with such waies & easments to the said lands and meddowes and every pte and psell of them as now they are; provided and my will is that in Consideration of this legacy my said son Thomas teach or cause to bee taught my grandchild Samuell the Trad of a Cooper; and alsoe att such time as the said Samuell is twelve yeares old hee the said Thomas pay unto him the said Samuell one mare of three yeares old; and alsoe keep and maintaine from time to time the said Dwelling house in good repaire During my said wifes life or widdowhood; And I Doe give and bequeath unto Jeremiah my youngest son all the upland from the old barrs beyand the barne on the southwest side the said old fence Downe to the nine acres Creeke or little brooke before mencioned and all the meddow that lyeth and is between his meddow now in his posesion and the aforsaid Reedy Creeke together with the waies and easments to the said lands and every pte and psell of them as now they are; and the rest of my lands whatsoever not heer nominated and bequeathed I give and leave to my wife to bee Desposed of and given unto my said Children as shee pleaseth att or before her Decease; And I make and ordaine my said wife sole exequitrix of this my last Will and Testament; and I Doe Intreat and appoint my beloved frinds M^r Anthony Thacher and Robert Denis as feofees in trust to see to the pformance of this my last Will and Testament In witnes wherof I have heerunto sett my hand the Day and yeare abovewritten

Be it alsoe Knowne that my will is that my Mother Prence Injoy without molestation During her Naturall life the house shee Now lives in with the orchyard belonging therunto; and to pay a bill my mother hath under my hand bearing Date the 15th of the 11th 1675

And finally I Doe ordaine and appoint and make Sarah my loveing wife sole executrix of this my last will and Testament; and Doe Desire my loveing frinds and bretheren Jonathan Sparrow Jonathan Banges Jeremiah howes and John Thacher to be healpful therin, To her as need may require; In witnes wherof I have heerunto sett my hand and seale this fifteenth of January 167 $\frac{5}{8}$

THE SETTLEMENT OF CAPTAIN JONATHAN² ALDEN'S ESTATE.

Transcribed from the Original Documents and Records,

CAPT. JONATHAN² ALDEN (*John*¹) died at Duxbury in February, 1696/7, and his estate was settled 7 January, 1703/4, on the widow Abigail and three sons and three daughters. The only original papers in the probate files are the bond of the administratrix (which is not recorded) and the inventory, which have been used in making the transcripts here presented. The letter of administration, the inventory and the settlement were recorded in the Plymouth County Probate Records, Volume I, page 255, and Volume II, page 28.

GORHAM LETTERS, WITH FACSIMILES.

THROUGH the courtesy of Mr. Frank William Sprague, of Brookline, Mass., and Mr. Henry S. Gorham, of Brooklyn, N. Y., we are able to reproduce facsimiles of letters written by three prominent members of the Gorham family. These facsimiles were printed by Mr. Sprague, in 1896, in the "New England Historical and Genealogical Register," and the cuts were later presented by him to Mr. Gorham.

The frontispiece of this number is a reproduction of a letter written by Capt. John¹ Gorham, four months before he was mortally wounded at the Narragansett Fight.*

The second letter was written by John² Gorham (*Capt. John¹*), who was a captain in the Canada Expedition of 1690, under Major Walley, and is usually referred to as Lt. Col. John Gorham, having acquired that title later, in the militia. He died in 1716.

The third letter was written by John⁴ Gorham (*Shubael³, John², Capt. John¹*), at the siege of Louisburg. Facsimiles of his "Wast Book" and "Dayly Journal" we have already printed.†

JAMES² SAMSON (*Henry*¹) died at Dartmouth, Mass., between 10 January, 1715/16, the day his will was made, and 7 July, 1718, the date on which the will was proved. The will was recorded in the Bristol County Probate Records, Volume III, page 447, and the receipts of the heirs in Volume IX, pages 440 and 441. The original will is still on file and the copy here presented was made from the original document, as was the executor's bond, which was not recorded. No inventory was found.

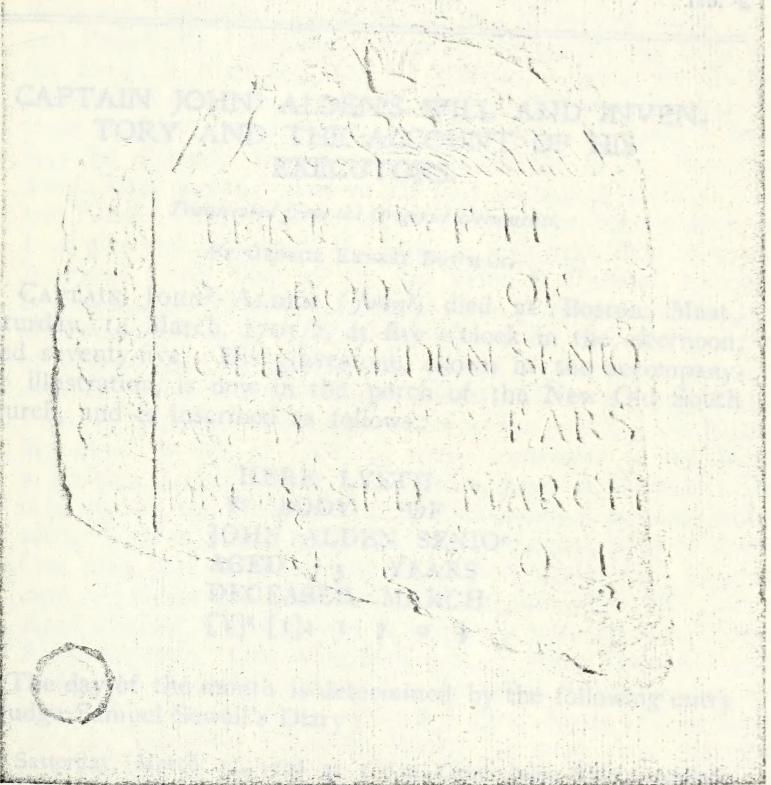

CAPTAIN JOHN² ALDEN (*John*¹) died at Boston, Mass., Saturday, 14 March, 1701/2, at five o'clock in the afternoon, aged seventy-five. His gravestone, shown in the accompanying illustration, is now in the porch of the New Old South Church, and is inscribed as follows:

GOVERNOR BRADFORD'S LETTER BOOK.

(Continued from page 147.)

THIS year sundry that pretended themselves to be planters, seeing the gain the fishermen made by trading of pieces, and powder, and shot to the Indians, and how they went on uncontrouled in the same, they began to practice the same: A principal head of whom was one Morton, who had gathered a profane crew unto him, and was himself an example of all wickedness unto them, who kept a house (or school rather of *Athesmy*) in the Massachusetts bay. He not only had offended in trading off sundry pieces to the Indians, but when he was by his neighbours gently admonished of the same, and shewed the evil consequences that would follow thereupon, he took it in great scorn, and said he would do it in the despite of all; and for that end sent for many new pieces out of England; besides, as he and his consorts got much hereby, so they spent it as lewdly in maintaining drunkenness, riot and other evils amongst them; yea and inveigling of men's servants away from them, so as the mischief began to grow intolerable, and if it had been suffered a while longer would have become incurable; his neighbours about him grew afraid of him, and suffered many abuses at his hands, and knew not how to help it; but both they, and other of the weaker plantations, made suit to us, to help and assist them to take some order with him and that desperate company; we told them that we had no authority to do any thing, but seeing it tended to the utter ruin of all the whole country, we would join with them against so public a mischief; so we sent first again to admonish him, from ourselves and the rest, and signified unto him, that besides the hurt and peril he brought upon us all, his actions was flatly against a proclama-

tion of the late King's Majesty, published to all his subjects, both in England and here, against the trucking of any pieces or other arms, to any of the Savages; his answer (after oaths and other contumelies) was, that proclamations were no law, nor enjoined no penalty; he was answered yes, the breakers incurred his Majesty's displeasure, which might prove a penalty too heavy for him to bear; he replied, that King was dead, and his displeasure died with him: Thus seeing no other remedy, at the earnest request of the other planters, and plantations in the land, we assisted and led in the apprehension of him (which was with danger enough, for he armed himself for resistance) and so, by the mutual consent of all the rest, he was sent prisoner into England,* to the council of New England, with letters and information against him; which letters follow:

To the Right Honourable, his Majesty's council for New England, these,

Right Honourable, and our very good Lords,

NECESSITY hath forced us, his Majesty's subjects of New England in general (after long patience) to take this course with this troublesome planter, Mr. Thomas Morton, whom we have sent unto your Honours, that you may be pleased to take that course with him, which to your honourable wisdom shall seem fit; who hath been often admonished not to trade or truck with the Indians, either pieces, powder, or shot, which yet he hath done, and duly makes provision to do, and could not be restrained, taking in high scorn (as he speaks) that any here should controul therein: Now the general weakness of us, his Majesty's subjects, the strength of the Indians, and at this time their great preparations to do some affront upon us, and the evil example which it gives unto others, and having no subordinate general government, under your Honours, in this land, to restrain such misdemeanours, causeth us to be troublesome to your Lordships, to send this party unto you for remedy and redress hereof: And not only in respect to this particular delinquent, but of the fishing ships, who make it too ordinary a practice, with whom we have neither authority nor ability to deal, and who are more encouraged when the planters themselves are so licentious herein; and therefore most humbly pray your Lordships, to take into your honourable considerations that some speedy course and remedy may be taken herein; otherwise we shall be forced to quit the country, to our great grief, and dishonour to our nation; for we shall be beaten with

our own arms if we abide: And that which further presseth us thus to send this party, is the fear we have of the growing of him and his consorts to that strength and height, by the access of loose persons, his house be a receptacle for such, as we should not be able to restrain his inordinariness when we would, they living without all fear of God or common honesty; some of them abusing the Indian women most filthily, as it is notorious: And for further satisfaction of your Lordships we have sent some particular testifications which we aver upon the faith of christians to be true: And likewise this bearer, Mr. John Oldham, who can give your Honours further information upon his oath, if need so require whom we have sent with the prisoner, and to attend your Lordships pleasures: And thus most humbly beseeching your Lordships and Honours to make a favourable construction of our honest intendments herein, of our loyalty and respective service to his Majesty, and our care for the common good of this country, thus we cease, and most humbly commend your Lordships and honours to the protection of the highest.

This letter was subscribed by some of the chief of every plantation; but I have not their names to the copy, and therefore omit them; yet they may in part be seen by that which was at the same time underwritten (in another paper) towards the charge, as followeth; though it cost us a great deal more, and yet to little effect, as the event sheweth.

Honourable Sir,*

AS you have ever been, not only a favourer, but also a most special beginner and furtherer of the good of this country, to your great cost and no less honour, we whose names are

underwritten, being some of every plantation, in the land, deputed for the rest, do humbly crave your worship's help and best assistance, in the speedy (if not too late) redress of our almost desperate state and condition in this place, expecting daily to be overrun and spoiled by the Savages, who are already abundantly furnished with pieces, powder and shot, swords, rapers and *Jaflings*; all which arms and munition is this year plentifully and publickly sold unto them, by our own countrymen; who, under the pretence of fishing, come a trading amongst them; yea, one of them (as your worships may further understand by our particular informations) hath for his part sold twenty or twenty-one pieces, and one hundred weight of powder, by which you may conceive of the rest; for we hear the savages have above sixty pieces amongst them, besides other arms; in a word there is now almost nothing vendible amongst them, but such munition, so they have spoiled the trade, in all other things; and as vice is always fruitful; so from the greedy covetousness of the fishermen, and their evil example, the like hath began to grow amongst some, who pretend themselves to be planters, though indeed they intend nothing less, but to take opportunity of the time, and provide themselves and begone, and leave others to quench the fire which they have kindled; of which number Mr. Thomas Morton is one, being of late a dweller in the Massachusetts bay, and the head of a turbulent and seditious crew, which he had gathered unto him, who, dwelling in the midst of us, hath set up the like practice in these parts, and hath sold sundry pieces to the natives, who can use them with great dexterity, excelling our English therein, and have been vaunting with them, at Sowams, Narragansett and many other places, so as they are spread both north and south, all the land over, to the great peril of all our lives: In the beginning of this mischief we sought friendly to dissuade him from it; but he scorned us therein and prosecuted it the more; so as we were constrained for the safety of ourselves, our wives and innocent children, to apprehend him by force (though with some peril) and now have sent him to the council of New England to receive according to his demerits, and be disposed of as their Honours shall think fit, for the preventing of further mischief, the safety of our lives, and the terror of all other delinquents in the same kind: Now our hope and humble request is, that your worship, and those honourable of his Majesty's council for New England, will commiserate our case, tender our lives and pity our infants; and consider the great charges and expenses, that we, and our

assistants and associates have been at, besides all the miseries and hardships, that we have broken through in these beginnings which have hitherto happily succeeded, for the planting of this country, which is hopeful, if it be cherished and protected against the cankered covetousness of these licentious men; if not, we must return and quit the country: Wherefore we beseech your Worship to afford us your favourable assistance and direction in bringing this man to his answer, before those whom it may concern; and to credit our true informations, sent by this bearer, lest by his audacious and coloured pretences, he deceive you, which know not things as we do; as likewise that such fishermen, may be called to account, for their great abuses offered this year and the last, as many as have been known to offend in this case; and that your worship for the time to come would be a means, in what you may that we may be strengthened with some authority, or good order amongst ourselves, for the redressing of the like abuses which may arise amongst us, till some general government be established in the land: Thus in hopeful assurance that your worship will make a favourable construction of these our honest intendments and humble requests, we commend you to the protection of the highest and rest

I now will come to the year 1629.

THIS year we had divers of our friends of Leyden come to us, as had long been desired, both of them and us, and by the good providence of God end the willing mindedness of our friends, was now in part effected, as will appear by this letter following.

To my worthy and well beloved friend, Mr. WILLIAM BRADFORD, &c.

MOST loving and most respected Sir, having but two days past parted from my dear and only daughter, by reason whereof nature forceth me to be full of grief and heaviness (though otherwise, I bless God, I have cause to rejoice) be entreated therefore, to accept these few lines: First I acknowledge myself much engaged unto you for your love and care over my kinsman; be entreated to enlarge my score, by the continuance thereof; and as you for your particular have occasion, make use of me, and I hope the Lord will direct my heart not to be unthankful, nor unmindful of your love. Here are now many of your friends from Leyden coming over, which though for the most part, they be but a weak company, yet herein is a

good part of that end obtained which was first aimed at, and which hath been so strongly opposed by some of our former adventurers; but God hath his working in these things, which man cannot frustrate: With them also we have sent some servants, or in the ship that went lately (I think called the Talbot) and this, that these come in, is the May-flower. Now Mr. Andrews, Mr. Beauchamp, and myself, are with your love and liking, joined partners with you; the like is Mr. Collier, Mr. Thomas and Mr. Hatherly, but they no doubt will write unto you; but Mr. Andrews, and Mr. Beauchamp rely wholly on me; they are such as Mr. Hatherly could take up, for whose care and pains you and we, are much beholden unto him; we have disbursed the charges of setting them out and transporting them over, and what allowance or agreement, you and your assistants, please to make with us, we will accept of; nay if you think mete we should make them up two a piece, because our persons are absent, we will consent to what you do, and, upon your letter and answer, make good what we are too short, or what you desire herein; Mr. Hatherly hath bound them, some upon one condition and some upon another, as they could agree. I doubt not but beaver will continue a good price still, as 15 or 16 shillings per pound; it is daily more and more worn here; besides we have now peace with France, so as now much will be carried thither; and there is some likelihood for a peace with Spain, I pray God it may be for our good, which is much to be feared: Thus not being fit, to write at this time, I shall cease with my love, and my wife's, most kindly remembered to you and yours, &c.

THESE persons were in all thirty-five, which came at this time unto us from Leyden, whose charge out of Holland into England and in England till the ship was ready, and then their transportation hither, came to a great deal of money; for besides victuals and other expenses they were all newly appareled, for there was bought for them

Of Kersey, and other cloth,	125 yards.

Of Shoes,	66 pair.

Besides hats and other necessaries needful for them; and after their coming here, it was 16 months before they could reap any harvest, all which time they were kept at our charge which was not small: As the Lord sent these unto us, both to their

and our comfort, so at the same time he sent many other godly persons into the land, as the beginning of a plentiful harvest, as will appear more fully hereafter: So as the delay of our friends was now recompensed with a large increase, to the honour of God and joy of all good men; these began to pitch at Naumkeak, since called by them Salem, to which place was come in the latter end of summer before, a worthy gentleman, Mr. John Endicott by name, and some others with him, to make some preparation for the rest; to whom (by some that came hither from thence) I had occasion to write unto him, though unknown by face, or any other way, but as I had heard of his worth, from whom I received this letter following.

IT is a thing not usual, that servants to one master and of the same household should be strangers; I assure you I desire it not, nay to speak more plainly, I cannot be so to you: God's people are all marked with one and the same mark, and sealed with one and the same seal, and have, for the main, one and the same heart, guided by one and the same spirit of truth; and where this is there can be no discord, nay, here must needs be sweet harmony; and the same request (with you) I make unto the Lord, that we may, as christian brethren, be united by an heavenly and unfeigned love, bending all our hearts and forces in furthering a work beyond our strength with reverence and fear, fastening our eyes always on him that only is able to direct and prosper all our ways. I acknowledge myself much bound to you, for your kind love and care, in sending Mr. Fuller amongst us, and rejoice much that I am by him satisfied, touching your judgments, of the outward form of God's worship; it is (as far as I can yet gather) no other than is warranted by the evidence of truth, and the same which I have professed and maintained, ever since the Lord in mercy revealed himself unto me, being far differing from the common report that hath been spread of you touching that particular; but God's children must not look for less here below, and it is the great mercy of God that he strengthens them, to go through with it. I shall not need at this time to be tedious unto you, for, God willing, I purpose to see your face shortly: In the mean time I humbly take my leave of you, committing you to the Lord's blessed protection, and rest,

NOW shortly after the writing of this letter came these people before mentioned, and quickly grew into church order, and set themselves roundly to walk in all the ways of God, as will appear by this letter following.

To the Worshipful, his worthy, and much respected friend, Mr. BRADFORD, Governour of Plymouth these,

MOST worthy and much respected friend, Mr. Bradford; I with my wife, remember our service unto you and yours, thanking you most humbly for your great kindness, when we were at Plymouth with you: Sir, I make bold to trouble you with a few lines, for to certify you, how it hath pleased God to deal with us, since you heard from us; how, notwithstanding all opposition, that hath been here and elsewhere, it hath pleased God to lay a foundation, the which I hope is agreeable to his word, in every thing: The 20th of July, it pleased God to move the heart of our Governour, to set it apart, for a solemn day of humiliation for the choice of a pastor and teacher; the former part of the day being spent in praise and teaching; the latter part was spent about the election, which was after this manner; the persons thought on (who had been ministers in England) were demanded concerning their callings; they acknowledged there was a two-fold calling, the one and inward calling, when the Lord moved the heart of a man to take that calling upon him, and fitted him with gifts for the same; the second (the outward calling) was from the people, when a company of believers are joined together in covenant, to walk together in all the ways of God, every member (being men) are to have a free voice in the choice of their officers, &c. Now we being persuaded that these two were so qualified, as the apostle speaks of to Timothy, where he saith a bishop must be blameless, sober, apt to teach, &c. I think I may say as the eunuch said unto Philip, what should let him from being baptised, seeing there was water, and he believed; so these two servants of God clearing all things by their answers (and being thus fitted) we saw no reason but that we might freely give our voices for their election after this trial: Their choice was after this manner, every fit member wrote, in a note, his name whom the Lord moved him to think was fit for a pastor, and so likewise, whom they would have for teacher; so the most voice was for Mr. Skelton to be pastor, and Mr. Higginson to be teacher; and they accepting the choice, Mr. Higginson, with three or four more of the gravest members of the church, laid their hands on Mr. Skelton, using prayers therewith. This being done, then there was imposition of hands on Mr. Higgin-

son: Then there was proceeding in election of elders and deacons, but they were only named, and laying on of hands deferred, to see if it pleased God to send us more able men over; but since Thursday, being (as I take it the 5th of August) is appointed for another solemn day of humiliation, for the full choice of elders and deacons and ordaining them; now, good Sir, I hope, that you and the rest of God's people (who are acquainted with the ways of God) with you, will say that here was a right foundation laid, and that these two blessed servants of the Lord came in at the door, and not at the window: And thus I have made bold to trouble you with these few lines, desiring you to remember us to Mr. Brewster, Mr. Smith, Mr. Fuller, and the rest of the church; so I rest, at your service in what I may till death,

3. the comission in Mat : 28 . 19 . cannot be given to pp in comon, but to some distinguishingly qualified persons, as is there evident . accordingly, for persons, on conceit of their own fitness, or with ye Concurrence of a few private Christians only, to Set up for preachers, must needs be inexcusable presumption.

4. for one of ye members of my chh to take upon him, without my leave, yea against my declared mind, to preach to a pp of whom I have ye pastorall charge, as this man has done, is (1) expressly cross to [p. 48] that comand in Heb : 13 . 17. (2) its a violation of his covenant ingagment when received into our chh, which obliges him to submit to ye government &c : (3) it tends to absolute confusion in all our instituted chhs ; for, if he may take one part of my Flock to preach to ; another may as well take another, and another a third ; and w^t then becomes of ye Pastorall office into which, ye Ministers are in a publick & solemn manner brought ? Yea where is any flock for them to lead, if

others may act according to this mans disorderly and aspiring humour, and practice!

GOV. THOMAS PRENCE'S WIDOW MARY, FORMERLY
THE WIDOW OF THOMAS¹ HOWES, AND THE
INVENTORY OF HER ESTATE.

THE records of Yarmouth, Mass., contain this entry: "mi^{ary} prince late wife of governer Thomas prince died upon the Ninth day of desember 1695 and was Buried upon the leventh daye of y^e said : 1695 : " *

The family history of Governor Prence, as left to us in vital records alone, is briefly told: he married, (1), August 5, 1624, Patience² Brewster (*Elder William*¹); and, (2), April 1, 1635, Mary Collier (said to be the daughter of William Collier of Duxbury); his daughter Jane was born November 1, 1637 (recorded at a later period in Eastham by her husband Mark Snow, Town Clerk); the marriages of several of his daughters are recorded; he died March 29, 1673, aged about 73 years; his widow died as quoted.

While much has been added to this meagre outline from other sources, many points yet remain unsettled. The identity of the widow Mary has been one of these unsolved problems, regarding which two principal assertions have been made: (1), that she was the second wife, Mary Collier; (2), that she was a third wife, Mrs. Freeman, the mother of Samuel Freeman of Eastham.

In support of the first theory, the principal argument advanced was the fact that the widow was named Mary, whereas the mother of Samuel Freeman was named Apphia. The basis of the second theory was the fact that there are on record two transfers of land from Gov. Thomas Prence to Samuel Freeman of Eastham which show that Gov. Prence was either the father-in-law or the step-father of Samuel Freeman. [Plym. Col. Deeds, III : 201.]

The first, executed December 8, 1662, was a deed of gift "unto my sonne Samuuell ffreeman and Mercye his wife : the house and land the said Samuuell Now Dwelleth in." The estate adjoined the grantor's own at Eastham. The other deed was dated nine years later, January 12, 1671, and was a sale, for the consideration of £30, the property conveyed consisting, in part, of the owner's house-lot, house, and housing in East-

ham; and "Mistris Mary Prence" consented to the sale. In this deed, Samuel Freeman was first called "my beloved sonne in Law," and then was three times termed "my sonne." According to the more elastic usage of that century the relationship thus expressed may mean either son-in-law, as now understood, or step-son. There is abundant proof that Samuel Freeman was not the Governor's son-in-law; for the Plymouth Colony Records show that the Governor's daughter Mercy became the wife of John Freeman, February 13, 1649, and both she and her husband were living when the Prence heirs sold their father's estate in Plymouth, June 10, 1676, [Plym. Col. Deeds, IV : 124]. Also, Samuel Freeman's marriage to Mercy Southworth, May 12, 1658, is on record; and Constant Southworth in his will, dated February 28, 1678, mentioned his "daughter Marcy Freeman" [Plym. Col. Wills, IV : 124]. Since Constant Southworth's wife was Elizabeth Collier (also said to be a daughter of William of Duxbury), Governor Prence's second wife, Mary Collier, was the aunt of Samuel Freeman's wife, hardly a close enough tie between the two men to account for the younger's being called "sonne" or for so considerable a present to the young couple as a house and land, even if we assume that Mercy (Southworth) Freeman's aunt was then living.

Recent investigations, pursued at the expense of Mr. Robert Sloane Bickford of Boston, a descendant of Jeremiah and Sarah (Prence) Howes, prove incontestably that neither Mary Collier nor Mrs. Apphia Freeman was the last wife of Gov. Thomas Prence, but that, as indicated by the headline, she was Mrs. Mary (—) Howes, widow of Thomas¹ Howes of Yarmouth. In the light of this fact there seems no good reason for doubting that there had been a marriage between Governor Prence and Mrs. Apphia Freeman.

Analysis of the will and inventory of Gov. Thomas Prence, dated 13 March, 1672/3 [Mayflower Descendant, III : 203-216], suggests, not only that he had allied himself to his (then) wife Mary much later than 1635, but that she was a widow at the time of their union. The will stipulated that "Mary my beloved wife shall have such household goods of Any kind as were hers, before wee married, Returned to her againe, after my Decease and if any of them, be much Impared or be wanting, that shee shall make it good out of my estate in such goods as shee Desireth;" In his inventory is seen a list of the "Goods mistris Mary Prence had before Marriage," from the number and variety of which it is evident that she was a

widow at the time of her marriage to the Governor. There is noted particularly, "Item 1 Troopers saddle," an article which makes the presumption of a previous husband for its possessor very strong. It would be difficult to account for Mary Collier's owning this "Item" before marriage; for William Collier (said to be her father) was alive in 1635 and for many years thereafter.

The Governor made no provision for the future abiding place of his widow, although he provided liberally for her income and share in the personal estate. The seeming negligence in providing no home for his widow is explained by the fact that she still held a life interest in the home of her former husband.

The proof of the statement that the Widow of Gov. Thomas Prence was formerly the widow of Thomas¹ Howes is found in the will of Captain Thomas² Howes and the will and inventory of his father, Thomas¹ Howes. [See pages 157-163 of this volume.] Thomas¹ Howes died at Yarmouth between the 6th and 18th of October, 1665, when he acknowledged his will, and when the inventory was taken. He confirmed to his sons Joseph, Thomas and Jeremiah the lands already given each of them, and he bequeathed his dwelling house and all the lands then remaining in his possession to his wife Mary "During her life unlesse shee Change her Condition by marrying her selfe after my Decease unto another man; and then shee shall have onely the thirds of them;" He also gave her all his personal property, which she was to distribute as she might please "att her Decease or marriage unto my said Children." He farther provided that his second son, Thomas², should have the homestead, etc. "after mine and my wifes Decease"; but Thomas² was to keep the house in repair "During my said wifes life or widdowhood." "Mistris Mary howes widdow" attested the inventory February 26, 1665/6.

On the 9th of February, 1667/8, the real estate of Thomas¹ Howes was divided among his three sons. [Plym. Col. Deeds, III : 106, 107.] Following the bounds of each allotment, was the clause "Alwaies Reserving unto our mother the Relect of our Deceased father all her Right and Interest according to the will of our father" etc. The bounds of the land set off to Thomas² included the paternal homestead. While it is possible that by mutual agreement the estate was divided during the term of Mrs. Howes' widowhood, it is more likely that during the two years since she signed the inventory of Howes' possessions she had married "her selfe unto another man," and it is

certain that she did so before August 1, 1668, when "Mary Prence" witnessed a deed which was acknowledged before "Thomas Prence Govr." [Plym. Col. Deeds, III : 146.]

Captain Thomas² Howes made his will January 15, 1675/6; his inventory was taken 26 December, 1676, at Yarmouth. After providing for his wife Sarah and their four children, he said: "Be it alsoe Knowne that my will is that my Mother Prence Injoy without molestation During her Naturall life the house shee Now lives in" etc. There is no evidence of the existence in the Colony of any man besides the late revered Governor who bore the surname "Prence," except the Governor's son Thomas, who died in England (where a daughter Susannah survived him) previous to the date of his father's will. The son was mentioned in the Division of Cattle, June 1, 1627, and was then not more than two years of age. There is, therefore, no reason to doubt that the Governor's widow was here referred to.

By "Mother Prence" Capt. Thomas² Howes must have meant, either his "mother-in-law," his "step-mother" or his "own mother." He could not have meant his "mother-in-law," since his wife Sarah was the daughter of Edward¹ Bangs, as shown by the following notes: Sarah the widow of Capt. Thomas² Howes died in 1683, and in her will [See pages 163-165, ante.] named as executors her "loveing Bretheren Jeremiah Howes and Jonathan Baings." Lieut. Joshua² Bangs in his will, dated 20 February, 1706, mentioned his "deceased sister Howes children" [Bangs Genealogy, p. 19]. The will of Edward¹ Bangs, the father of Jonathan² and Joshua², was dated 19 October, 1677, and mentioned his "daughter Howes." [Bangs Genealogy, p. 15.]

Since "Mother Prence" was not Capt. Thomas² Howes' "mother-in-law," she must have been either his own mother or his step-mother, and in either case she must have been the wife, and the widow, of his father Thomas¹ Howes.

It is true that Governor Prence's will mentions a daughter Sarah Howes, but in the deed of the Prence heirs, dated June 10, 1676, previously mentioned, she is shown to have been the wife of Jeremiah² Howes, the brother of Capt. Thomas² Howes.

If any vestige of doubt remains that she was the widow of Governor Thomas Prence, it is dispelled upon a comparison of the list set forth in his inventory, of "Goods mistris Mary Prence had before Marriage," with the inventory of Thomas¹ Howes. The "Troopers saddle" of the former list is doubtless referred to in the following extract from the latter: "Item in

Armes and Amunition as 3 guns a Case of Pistolls & holsters 1 saddle and furniture one halbert a sword and belt powder & shott." A silver dram cup, 2 silver spoones, and a chafing dish are articles common to both lists; while in substance much of the property mentioned in the two is identical.

Unless his own testimony be rejected in a matter upon which no one could have been better informed, that of his own relationship to Samuel Freeman, Governor Prence was married no less than four times :

1. To Patience² Brewster (*Elder William*¹), August 5, 1624, who died before April 1, 1635.

2. April 1, 1635, to Mary Collier. The date of her death is very uncertain, but it must have been previous to December 8, 1662.

3. Before December 8, 1662, to Mrs. Apphia Freeman, who died before August 1, 1668.

4. To Mrs. Mary (—) Howes, before August 1, 1668, who died December 9, 1695.

(Her maiden name, as given by another writer, is not here quoted, for want of proof.)

This marriage probably took place before February 9, 1667/8, the date of the division of Thomas¹ Howes' real estate.

DAVID² ALDEN'S ESTATE.

Transcribed from the Original Documents and Records,

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN.

DAVID² ALDEN (*John*¹) died at Duxbury, probably not long before 1 April, 1719, the date of the bond given by the administrator, Benjamin Alden of Duxbury. There is no record of the appointment of an administrator, but the original bond is still in the Plymouth County Probate Files. The amount of the bond was £400, and the surety was Samuel Alden of Duxbury. The bond was made out on a printed form, and a part of it reads as follows: "The Condition of this Present Obligation is such, That if the above-bounden Benjamin Alden unto whome is Committed power of administration of the Estate of M^r David Alden Late of Duxborough Afores^d deceased." The administrator was required by the bond to bring in an inventory to the Probate Court, of which Isaac Winslow was the judge, on or before 20 June, 1719, and to render an account of his administration on or before 20 September, 1719. The autograph signatures of Benjamin and Samuel Alden are appended to the document, and the witnesses were Henry Gulliford (who signed by a mark) and Anne Thomas.

The inventory of the personal estate and the account of the debts of the deceased were never recorded, but the original documents are in the files and have been transcribed. The inventory of the real estate in Middleborough was recorded, but the original has disappeared.

THE ELIGIBLE MAYFLOWER ASCENDANTS AND THEIR MARRIED DAUGHTERS.

THE following list contains the names of the twenty-two heads of Mayflower families from whom descent has been proved,* also the names of all their daughters who are known to have married, with the names of the husbands.

Every line of Mayflower descent that has yet been established has been traced to one of the twenty-two Mayflower Passengers here named, either through a son or through one of the married daughters in this list, which has been prepared by the Editor, merely as a convenient reference table, in consequence of the frequent calls for the names of the Passengers from whom descent can be proved, and the still more frequent letters asking if such and such a person did not marry a daughter of a Mayflower Passenger.

A literal copy of Governor Bradford's list of the Passengers will be found in Volume I (1899) of "The Mayflower Descendant," and in Volume II (1900) is an alphabetical list of the Passengers, giving, as far as then possible, the date and the place of the birth, the marriage and the death of each. Some additional dates, discovered later, may be found in the succeeding volumes.

* The names of William Mullins and John Tilley are omitted from this list to avoid duplication, since the lines of all known descendants of these two men are traced through their respective daughters, Priscilla Mullins, who married John Alden, and Elizabeth Tilley, who married John Howland.

New Plymouth November the 29th 1652

Know all men by these p'sents that I Wosamequen and Wamsutta my sonne have sould unto M^r Willam Bradford captaine Standish Thomas Southworth John Winslow John Cooke and their associates the Purchasers or oudcomers all the Tract or Tracts of land lying three miles Eastward from a River called Cushenugg to a certaine harbour called Acoaksett to a flatt Rocke on the west ward side of the said harbour; And wheras the said harbour Devideth itselfe into severall branches; the westermost arme to bee the bound; and all the Tract or Tracts of land from the said westermost arme to the said River of Cushenugg three miles Eastward of the same; with all the profitts and benefitts within the said Tract with all the Rivers creeks meddows neckes and Islands that lye In or before the same; And from the sea upward to goe soe high that the English may not bee anoyed by the hunting of the Indians in any sort of their Cattle; And I Wosamequen and Wamsutta Doe promise to Remove all the Indians within a yeare from the Date heerof That Doe live in the said Tract And wee the said Wosamequen and Wamsutta have fully bar-

In the name of the father and of the Sonn & of the Holy Ghoest Amen I Edward ffofter though weake in body yet in pfect memory & understanding Do make this my last Will and Testament this present twenty fourth of November in the yeare of our Lord God one thousand six hundred fourty and three And first I bequeath my soul unto the Lord that gave it and my body to the Dust from whence it was in certaine hope of y^e resurrection thereof at the last judgment to ptake of glory Concerneing my worldly goods I thus Dispose of them I do give and bequeath to my loveing wyfe Lettice ffofter (whom I Do make my sole Executrix) All my cattell both one kynd & other and all my moveable goods either at hoame or abroad wth whomsoever they be, of what name or for what use soev^r they bee except my books which I Dispose of to my sonn Tymothy ffofter, Do give unto my said Executrix freely absolutely and forever : fftermore I do give unto my said Executrix the use of my house or houseing and all my lands whereof I am at p^rsent possessed which lyeth at three sev^rall places, one at the North River one at the Stony Brooke one at the second Cliff untill that my sonn Tymothy ffofter be one and twenty yeares of age unto whome I give one third part of my house and houseing and one third part of all my land to be Deliv^red unto him at the age of twenty and one yeares Another third part of my house and houseing and all my said lands I give to the Infant yet unborne whether it be male or female wherewith my Executrix goeth to be Delivered to this assigned owner at the age of one and twenty yeares, and my said Executrix freely to enjoy the use of the other third part of my house houseing or lands untill the day of her Death and then that third pt to return unto my sonn Tymothy ffofter as his owne pper goods unto whom I give it ffreely forever as also the first third part specyfyed, as also the third part given to the unborne Infant I do give it freely unto it forever But if the said Tymothy ffofter shall Dye before he comes to Age then his said portion shall belong to the unborne infant, who shall receive benefitt of it as if it were the said Tymothy himself, at the same tyme when he should receive it In like manner if the unborne Infant

shall not live to the tyme of receiveing the said lands they shall then returne to Tymothy ffoster or any of his Successors if they survive. But if they shall both be dead and the lands left wthout an heire I shall leave the ordering of it to the Discretion of those faythfull Overseers whom I Do Denominate and put in trust w^{ch} psons are m^r Tymothy Hatherley father Richard Sillis Edmond Eddenden & brother Isaack Robinson. And I do give power & authority unto these my ov^rseers that if they shall see cause & good so to Doe being by some speciall meanes prvoaked thereunto and that they shall all joyntly agree together in the thing, that they may sell some portion of the land in behalf of the mother and her children, and the remaynder of the rest of the lands to be ordered & Disposed given and left unto the said psons before specyfyed according to pporcon before named. And I Do give power unto these my overseers in case of Defection or if any be Dead, to choose one or more as occation shall serve to have the oversight of the said will. So givinge unto my Executrix all my Debts as are Due unto me from pson or psons whatsoever requireinge also that shee Do pay and make Due Discharge of all such Debts as I owe unto any pson or psons whatsoever In witness unto the p^rmisses of this will I Edward ffoster Do set my hand & seale.
