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

To The Virginia Historical Society

With apologies for inadequacy and inornateness, this modest volume of fragmentary history of a few of Old Virginia's brave sons and noble daughters, is respectfully dedicated by the Author.

Preface

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The first American Genealogy was printed in 1787, very few were issued in the next fifty years. It was not until the Centennial Celebration anniversary of our national independence (1876) that the revival in American history began, and the marvelous multiplication of the so-called "patriotic societies" and "orders" which has since followed, has given an impetus and value to the study of genealogy. Prior to that time only a small per cent of people could trace their ancestry three generations and many who could were /possessed of false ideas as to the numbers and standing of the original name. So frequently was this the case that those desiring to record the early history of any line, met with considerable difficulty in extracting authentic data from the colonists; the former avowing that the latter was seeking to secure their share in the supposed glistening fortune across the ocean.

These traditionary ghosts are now seldom met with. The genealogist is better understood, though there remain checks on his progress, largely due to lack of interest, and an occasional spinster who flatly refuses to produce the family bible, in which the records are contained, because it would disclose her age, or a crusty "self-made" man curtly advises that he received no aid from his parents and therefore feels no interest in them.

In compiling charts, items are often received that do not agree as to facts or dates, in such cases the writer has endeavored to harmonize the data and give it according to best judgment. But it will be seen that errors are unavoidable. Should the gentle reader be able to offer corrections or adenda, he will confer a great favor on the writer by advising him at once; and at a convenient day when sufficient information has been received, he will prepare a supplementary edition for the benefit of those interested. Although this small volume contains practically all the available facts relative to the McCue family in America and a generation beyond the water, which have been assembled from verified traditions (that would have been lost in the passing of the older generations), letters and references, it contains numerous deficiencies, and simple epithets that do not in any wise do justice to various members of the family.

The work appended with brief Charts of the STEELE, ARBUCKLE and CUNNINGHAM families, all of whom were originally Virginians and many of Augusta county. They were included in lieu of a common interest with one or more branches of the McCue family. Throughout the volume undue prominence has not been given some branches over others because partiality but by reason of the more abundant material. Over a thousand letters were written in the preparation of the chart, some of which were not even acknowledged, others were late, all of which had caused an unavoidable delay in publishing.

Introduction

Several bearing the name of "McCue," came to America, circa 1737, from Ireland. It is known that they were of Scotch descent; other than this, little is known of the early history of the family. Encyclopedias advise us that the name is of Gaelic descent as the prefix mac meaning son implies, it is not uncommon among Scotch names. There is room for speculation as to the original family name, it may have been MacHugh, MacCaw or McEwen, but more probably the former-which was doubtless derived from "The son of Hugh." Like many surnames, it has varied and a survey of modern families includes: M'Cue, McCue, McCueue, McHugh, McCune, McHue, McUe and others that are deduced from this family. They are scattered over Europe, North and South America and are as numberless as the sands of the sea shore.

The religion of the Scotch family was strictly of the Covenanter creed, many branches have retained the belief of their fathers while not a few have accepted other doctrines. But as a whole, the members recorded have all displayed a preference for some system of worship, while a good proportion are taking leading parts in Sabbath school and church work.

The Annals of the Persecution in Scotland, informs us that the Scotch (who afterward emigrated to Ulster, Ireland) were sorely persecuted because of their stubborn faith, attempts were made by the Church of State, both the Popery and the Doctrine. The seeds of Presybyterianism, which were imported because of a dissatisfaction with the existing state of affairs), took root, budded and blossomed and grew, in spite of the oppression of its believers. "The records of those sufferings should never be regarded with in difference by those to whom this faith has been transmitted; nor should the memories of those men be forgotten who stood in the forefront of the battle, that by their blood they might secure to remote generations the rights of Christian freedom and conscience, as a noble inheritance. To have such an ancestry is no common honor; to be partakers with them of like precious faith, is a distinction more than regal." Annals of the Persecution in Scotland.

Early in the reign of James I, a number of prominent ianded proprietors in Ulster (the northermost province of Ireland comprising the nine counties of : Antrim, Armagh, Cavan, Donigal, Down, Fermanangh, Londonderry, Monaghan and Tryone), engaged in a conspiracy to dethrone the King. The plot was discovered, the Lords fled from the country and their lands were confiscated and taken possession of by the crown. Thus about five hundred thousand acres were at the disposal of the King, who parceled it out to English and Scotch favorites, as rewards for services rendered or expected. In the autumn of 1609, Commissioners from Dublin, accompanied by military force, surveyed this land and assigned allotments to the new comers. It was at this time that the Scotch highlanders, desiring a change of government and freedom for worship, became attracted by the inviting prospect across the narrow channel, and in great numbers emigrated thence.

Froude, in speaking of thems, says: "They went over to earn a living by labor, in a land which had produced hitherto little but banditti. They built towns and villages; they established trades and manufactures; they enclosed fields, raised farm houses and homesteads where till then there had been but robbers, castles, wattled huts, or holes in the earth like rabbit burrows. While, without artificial distinctions, they were saved from degenerating into the native type by their religion, then growing in its first enthusiasm into a living power, which pervaded their entire being."

Their principles of worship attracted attention here also, and in due season the Irish authorities entered upon a vigorous attack of oppression which was withstood for years. but grew so intense that the natives of Ulster, embarked for America.

In the land files at Richmond, Va., a record is entered to the effect that "John McCue" landed at Havre de Grace, circa 1737, having emigrated from Ulster, Ireland. He settled in Lancaster county, Pa., but removed to Nelson county, Va., a short while thereafter. It is inferred that he became owned of a tract of land; tradition, almost verified, bears this out. Another tradition informs us that he went with the gold seekers to South America a few years later, but this, we cannot assert with any degree of certainty. It is a general belief that John McCue was a soldier of the Revolution, though his name is not found on the register. The writer owns a sword, once carried by the original emigrant, which is euriously wrought with various arms and crests. Until 1857, the ivory handle was silver mounted and the guard was filigree work. This metal extended all along the blade and scabbard was ornamented from mouth to tip. But rough handling occasioned a break of the hilt and the weapon was hastened to the silversmith's at once where the silver was moulded into a dozen tea spoons and a number of table spoons. An old Scotch wine chest, an heirloom of the family, now in the possession of Mr. Sam'l C. McCue of Mo., was evidently carried from the "Highlands" to Ulster, as its appearance indicates great age. It consists of six quart bottles of fine thin glass, figures; six pint bottles of the same pattern and as many drinking vessels, comprising, two dainty little tumblers, two larger and two handsome goblets; all in a walnut chest with tarnished copper bindings.

The only applicant for pension (Revolutionary) of the McCue name, was one Angelica, the widow of James McCue of New York State.

John McCue married Eleanor Mathews and was the father of :---

"John McCue, junr. was born May ye 8th in the year of our Lord one Thousand and seven hundred and Fifty three.

"Mary McCue, was born may ye first. 5756.

"Martha McCue was born Sept ye 2d. 5758.

"Elener McCue Junr. was Born March ye 20th. 5765.

"Charles McCue was born Feby ye 7th. 5762.

"Moses McCue Junr was born Decr. 23rd. 5768.

"David McCue was born Apr'l ye 15, anno Domini, 5775.

"John McCue junr. his and his brothers and sisters Names where you may read our Names at large when we are dead and gone and When my last glafs is run."

The above was evidently written by Rev. John McCue. It was found in an old family bible in the possession of Mr. Sam'l S. McCue.


Another family of the name of "McCue," which came to America some years since, is represented by Mr. Hugh McCue of Illinois and Hon. Thos. J. McCue of Denver, Colo., (the latter is Senator and chairman of the State Democratic Committee), came from the Parish of Anniskeene, County Monaghan, Ireland. But as this is near the home of the McCues, and the names are similar, there is reason to believe the families were one at an earlier date. Other McCues are in Illinois, Kentucky, Washington and various other States.

Various representatives of the passing generations of the family state that the Scotch McCues had a coat of arms, but every effort to discover the reading has been unsuccessful. Maj. J. Marshall McCue spent many years in collecting and arranging a history of the family and at his death left a voluminous manuscript, which would have interested the strongest anti-genealogist of the line; but Mr. Jas. B. Anderson advises that the mice had totally destroyed it at the home of a Texas friend where it had been shipped. The writer is at quite a disadvantage, therefore, in not having a basis on which to start.

The McCUES of the Old Dominion

-FIRST GENERATION-

(0) John McCue, b eirea 1750-65, Scotland; m Mary Moffett (?) according to tradition. Being of the covenanter stock he joined the tide of immigration that flowed into Northern Ireland.

-SECOND GENERATION-

(1) John McCue, b 1780-90, Ulster, Ireland; m. Sarah Mc-Dowell (it is alleged). As far back as the name can be authentically traced, the family was of the Covenanter Stock. The name was originally "MacCue," and was probably a variant of "McHugh," or perhaps, "Mc-Ewen," at an earlier date. John McCue, thought firm in his views, possessed a gentle disposition and enjoyed the confidence and esteem of a host of friends.

-THIRD GENERATION-

Children of John McCue, (1)

(2) i John McCue, Gent., b about 1715-20, d after 1775; m (1750?) Eleanor Mathews, after landing on American shores. John McCue came from Prince of Wales, Northern Ireland in 1731 and landed on the banks of the Susquehanna River, near where Havre de Grace, now stands, and settled in Lancastor county, Pa. Because of jealousies rising in the minds of the original settlers, restrictions were made so oppressive on the Scotch-Irish that many chose to seek homes in fair Virginia. So it was in 1739, that John McCue, with others, collected his few possessions and moved up the Great Valley of Virginia, crossed the Blue Ridge Mountains and settled in Goochland county, afterwards called Albemarle, then Amherst and now Nelson. Very little is known of his

life, except that he was a Planter. Tradition informs us that he participated in the Revolution; to bear this out, the writer has a very old sword, which originally, was the property of John McCue. It is alleged that he paid ten pounds sterling for it. During the Second war with Great Britan, his son, Major Moses McCue, used it, and at that time "U S. of A," was emblazoned on the blade. There can also be seen, a Coat of Arms, on the opposite side of the blade, but it is not known whether this was the "McCue."

- (3) ii Moses McCue, Sr. His descendants are scattered through Ohio, and a number of them are to be found in Louisville, Ky.
- (4) iii Sarah McCue, b Ulster, Ireland; m James McElroy. From "The McElroy's of Kentucky," we extract the following:

"About the year A. D. 1729, James McElroy, with his young wife, Sarah McCue, (or McHugh,) * * * left County Down, Ireland, for America on the ship 'George and Ann; sailing from Belfast. A number of other immigrants accompanied them, including the McCunes, McDowells, McCampbells, McKees and the Rev. John Irvine and wife. They landed at Philadelphia, and stopped for a time in Bucks county (Pa.). Thence they went west to Cumberland county, toward which the current of Scotch-Irish immigration was about that time flowing very strongly; there on the extreme frontier amid privations and perils they lived some twentyfive years-they then moved southward into the Great Valley of Virginia, with thousands of home hunters, about the year 1760. Such was the lot of the families of James McElroy and Rev. John Irvine. They found home and residence in Campbell county, Southern Virginia. During the stormy years of the Revolution these families resided in Campbell county, and the parents are supposed to have reached the end of life's journey."

From another source we are advised that the above

party left County Down. Ireland, on the 8th of May 1729, for America: and that they were eovenanters of Scotch descent.

After minute research and much reflection, the writer concurs with Mrs. B. M. Griffith (1358) and Mrs. D. A. Andrews. both authorities on the subject, (to whom he is largely indebted for the McElroy facts) in their conviction that James McElroy married Sarah McCue (or MacCue) sister of John McCue. Gent., (2).

The McElroy Centennial was observed near Lebanon, Ky., 16, Oct. 1889, on the spot where their first cabin stood.

- (5) iv David McCue, b, Ulster, Ireland: settled in Penn. (Mr. B. C. McCue. of Miss., probably is a descendant.)
- (51-2) v Mary McCue.

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-FOURTH GENERATION-

Children of John McCue, Gent., and Eleanor Mathews.

(6) i Rev. John McCue, D. D., b 8, May 1753, Nelson Co., Va.; d 20, Sept. 1818, Augusta. Co.,. Va; m Elizabeth Allen, b 9, Nov. 1761; d 11, Oct. 1831; dau of Jas. Allen and Margaret Anderson. In early life John McCue manifested a wonderful proclivity for the acquisition of knowledge. When but a boy he worked in the fields by day and literally devoured such books at night as he could lay his hands upon. At times he taught an Old Field School. It is believed that he walked as far as seven miles across the mountains into the Valley and Rev. Jas. recited at Spring Hill, Latin and Greek to Waddell (commonly known as the blind preacher), then ministering to the Congregations of Staunton and Tinkling Spring. While thus engaged his father sent him to Monticello to interview with Mr. Jefferson concerning a matter of business. The latter was so favorably struck with the dignity and manly bearing and the attainments of the youth, as to advise McCue to abandon the idea of preparing for the ministry, and betake himself to the profession of law, as holding out eminent distinction and large pecuniary reward. And that he, Jefferson, would become his instructor, and offered him a home at Monticello while prosecuting his studies. This was a most tempting offer, one that would turn the head of the average young man, but McCue refused, stating that he chose to follow the dictates of his conscience.

McCue graduated at Liberty Hall in 1785, receiving the Degree, "A. B.," In his class were eighteen, among them were: Moses Hodge, Sam'l Blackburn and William Wilson. "Nearly all of whom have made their mark in the world of Letters, Pulpit, Statesmanship, Law, Medicine and Phylosophy."

After studying Theology under Dr. Waddell, he entered the Ministry. Foote says, "At a meeting of the Hanover Presbytery in May 1782, at Timber Ridge, on the 22nd, * * * Mr. John M'Cue was licensed, and on parts of his examination Messrs. Houston and Rankin were associated." Mr. McCue founded the Church at Lewisburg (originally Virginia but now W. Va.), Dr. McIlhaney was his immediate successor there. He was the first man who ever, as an ordained minister preached the gospel in the Valley of the Mississippi.

Foote says in another place, "39th. John McCue was received a candidate in the spring of 1781, * * * *. He was ordained the first Wednesday of August, 1783, having accepted a call from Camp Union near Lewisburg, and Good Hope, in Green Brier. In 1791 he was relieved from his charge to take the pastorial care of Tinkling Spring and Staunton."

McCue traveled on horseback to the meetings of the Synod of Philadelphia. He was present at the first meeting of Lexington Presbytery, which was held at Timber Ridge, Rockbridge County, Virginia, Sept. 26, 1786; and was Moderator in 1790, '96, '98, 1807, '12, and '17. That he manifested some taste for teaching is shown in an alumnae note in Washington Lee catalogue, which states he was once principal of a classical school. At his death, which occurred on Sunday morning (20, Sept. 1818) the Lodge drew up the following Resolutions:

"Resolved, Unanimously, that the Church of Christ, society at large and the fraternity of Free and Accepted Masons in particular, have suffered incalculabe loss in the death of our much esteemed and highly respected brother, Rev. Jno. McCue, and that in commemoration of departed worth, the members of this Lodge will wear crepe on their left arm for thirty days, and that a copy of these resolutions be published for two weeks in the 'Republican Farmer,' of Staunton.''

Foote, in speaking of the Cemetery of Tinkling Springs, says: "Now let us visit the grave-yard to the west of the church, surrounded by a stone wall in the shape of a horseshoe, divided at the toe. Let us enter by the gate on the south side nearest the church, and before we go towards the south-west end, we will pause a moment to read the white marble slab to the memory of the third pastor, John M'Cue. Craig, the first pastor, lies near Augusta church; Waddell, in Louisia, under an apple tree, in a place chosen by himself, near where the Counties of Orange. Albermarle, and Louisa meet: M'Cue was suddenly removed Sept. 2t0h, 1818, in the 66th year of his age. His congregation assembled for worship on the Sabbath morning. His family preceded him a little on their way to the house of God. After a time a messenger informed the gathered people that his lifeless corpse had been found near his own gate. Whether he had fallen from paralysis, or the restiveness of his horse, can never be known. There was no appearance of a struggle after his fall.


On the marble slab is this inscription :

"Here lie interred the *relics* of the Rev. JOHN McCUE. who expired Sabbath morning, Sept. 20, A. D., 1818, in his 66th year. Having served his generation in dignified and faithful discharge of all relative duties, he was suddenly removed from labor to rest. His relations, numerous friends, and the church at large, deplore the loss of his talent, erudition, eloquence and evangelical ministrations, especially the church of T. Spring, amongst whom he had arduously labored in the ministry for 27 years. This monument was erected by his sons in token of filial esteem and regard."


Rev. McCue spent much time upon his sermons, always writing them in Latin. A volume containing them is today in the hands of his great grandson, J. McD. McCue, of Staunton, Va. And the old Tortoise Shell watch, his constant companion, was taken from his pocket after his death and is now the property of his great granddaughter, Mrs. B. R. (McCue) Norvell, of Beaumont, Texas. It is believed that this time piece came originally from Scotland. Other relics have been handed down to his numerous descendants.

- (7) ii Mary McCue, b 1, May 1756; d 11, Aug. 1847; m Mr. Hendren, a brother of Rev. John Hendren, D. D., of the Presbyterian church, and uncle of Judge John N. Hendren of Staunton, who was Treasurer of the C. S. A. After the death of Mr. Hendren, Mrs. Hendren made her home with her brother, Major Moses, of "Greenwood." She was buried in Nelson county, in the family burying ground by her parents.
- (8) iii Martha McCue, b 2, Sept. 1758; m Charles Hyde of

Augusta county, Virginia. Mrs. Hyde was a splendid specimen of womanhood—fair, gentle, cultured and refined.

- (9) iv Sarah McCue, b ; m Samuel Wilson. Mrs.
 Wilson possessed a mind of her own, a characteristic of the McCues.
- (10) v Charles McCue, b 7. Feb. 1762; m Anna Maxwell, of Nelson county, Va. He was an Old Field School teacher, and an active worker in the Presbyterian church. Lived and died in Albemarle county. Mr. McClue held the repect of all who knew him.
- (11) vi Eleanor McCue, Jr., b 20, March 1765. Nothing further is known of her.
- (12) vii Major Moses McCue, Jr., b 23, Dec. 1768; Nelson county; d 28, Apr. 1847, in Augusta county, Va. m 17, Apr. 1800, Sarah Smith, dau. of Major Thos. Smith of the Revolution, (who m Elizabeth Cunningham). Sarah Smith, b 5, Nov. 1773, Augusta county; d 6, Apr. 1856, Stanton Co. Moses McCue. as a boy displayed a decided inclination for study, his fondness for books grew as the years went by. We are told that he had a college education, but the name of his Alma Mater is not known, unless it was Liberty Hall (now Washington and Lee University) or William and Mary College. He removed to Augusta county in young manhood and located at "Greenwood," near Fishersville, became a member and afterwards a Ruling Elder in the Tinkling Spring Church, where so many of the McCues have worshiped. As a man he was much respected and commanded considerable influence. In 1813. he was a member of the Central Committee of Augusta, the other Alexander Nelson, Dr. Boys and members being: Samuel Clarke. This committee nominated Gen. Blackburn for Congress. On the 20th of June, 1812, the people of Augusta met in Staunton to form a Military Association and to devise plans for a Military School in

which the recruits might be instructed. Alexander Nelson was chosen President and C. Johnson Secretary. A committee was selected to draw up resolutions and preamble, which consisted of: John H. Peyton, Wm. Taylor, E. Stribling, C. Johnson, Wm. Young, M. Mc-Cue and Jas. Crawford. The Military School was promptly organized and placed under the superintendance of Capt. G. Turner, and it is needless to add that it served its purpose during the War of 1812.

In March 1812, McCue was chosen Captain of the Staunton Artillery and John C. Sowers was First Lieutenant. In May of the same year, Sowers was advanced to Captain and McCue, was promoted to Major. Me-Cue had been connected with military tactics for several years, for we find in Waddell's Annals, "The fourth of July was celebrated with much enthusiasm during the earlier years of the century. In 1810 William Clarke delivered the annual oration. From the Republican Farmer we extract the following account of the celebration in 1811: 'The day was announced by one discharge from the artillery of Capt. McCue's company at daybreak, and seventeen at sunrise. About 12 o'clock the Artillery company and Capt. Poage's troop of cavalry paraded the streets of Staunton. and marched to Dr. Peter Heiskell's spring, about a mile from town, where, after a short address suitable to the occasion, delivered by Briscoe G. Baldwin, a soldier of the artillery company, they dined on an excellent barbecue.' Then followed the toasts. In the evening the militia returned to town, and performed 'several interesting evolutions.' 'Seventeen discharges from the cannon,' continues the Farmer, 'closed the celebration of the day.' " In May, 1812, Waddell, says: "Major McCue's stable burned," (for he was a lover of fine horses and always kept a number of extra good ones on hand,) "and the Editor at that time, said, 'It is hoped that the avenging spirit of unerring justice, will

yet drag from his covert the fiend-like incendiary, and immolate him upon the altar of Violated Rights.''

Major McCue was sheriff of Augusta county some years, and performed the duties of the office with credit to himself and with honor to the county. He was noted for the politeness, prudence, fortitude and justness. He had a very steady nerve—and it is alleged that he could carry a goblet level full of water all about the streets of the city without losing a single drop.

(13) viii David McCue, Esq., b 15, Apr. 1775, Nelson county, Va.; d Summersville, W. Va.; m Margaret Craig. Mr. McCue had lived near Rock Fish Gap until marrying, but removed with his fair bride, a daughter of Augusta county, to Greenbrier county (now W. Va.), and from there to Nicholas county, W. Va., settling on a large farm ten miles east of Summersville about 1795. Here he lived until his death. He served in the War of 1812 and received an honorable discharge at Norfolk.

Children of Sarah MacCue (4) and James McElroy.

- (131-6) i John McElroy, b about 1730-40, Pa.

(20) i James Andrew McCue, b 7, May 1783 Augusta county, Va., d 4, Sept. 1853; m Margaret Trimble of Ky., (b 9, Nov. 1879,) dau of Capt., James Trimble and Jane Allen. Jas. A. McCue was Justice of Peace in Augusta county at an early date which meant much in that day for the county was of large dimensions and the Justice had more authority. He was a highly respected man.

Waddell says: "In 1809, General Blackburn was put

to trial before the County Court upon a charge which would now be considered very Preposterous. On the 28th of August, the Grand Jury, on the information of George Bittle, presented the General for exacting illegal fees, to wit: \$3 for an opinion when no suit was brought, and \$6 for fee in an inferior Court.' James Allen was foreman of the jury, among the members were Jacob Bungardner, James Tate, James A. McCue, James Bell and Peter Heiskell. The trial came off October 23, 1809, and 'the merits of this presentment being fully argued and considered,' the case was dismissed at the cost of Bittle.''

(21) ii Mary (Polly) McCue, b 18, May 1785, Augusta county, Va., d 14, Nov. 1853, Hillsboro, Ohio; m Andrew Barry, b May 1780, in County Donegal, Ireland, d 13, Nov. 1842, Hillsboro, Ohio. He married first Margaret Mathews (who d 19, Dec. 1803, aged 25 years; her son, Geo. Mathews Barry, b 14, Sept. 1803; d 1820); married second Polly McCue.

Andrew Barry came to this country from Ireland in 1796. France and England being at war, his ship was captured by the French and he was ransomed by his first cousin, John McKine, of Baltimore, who was an influential merchant and knew French people. Barry lingered a while with his cousin, clerking for him until he learned the business. But about 1800 he left for Staunton, Va., where he made his home until he was past middle age, having then moved to Hillsboro, Ohio.

It is found that in 1816, Jos. Bell, Sr., Jos. Bell, Jr., John Harman, Peter Hanger, James Marshall, Andrew Barry, Rev. John McCue and others owned carriages or chairs (gigs), a luxury very rare in that age.

In May, 1804, the Staunton Presbyterian Church was organized, with the following ruling Elders: Jos. Bell, Jos. Cowan, Andrew Barry and Sam C. Clark.

(22) ii William McCue, M.D., b 14, July 1787, Augusta county, Va., d 7, Nov. 1818 of fever; m Ann Isabella Barry, dau of Thos. Barry (brother of Andrew Barry, above) and Ann Isabella Smith of New Kent county. Md. Ann Barry, b 22, Jan. 1797, Staunton, Va., d 28, Nov. 1876. After Dr. McCue's death Mrs. McCue married John Allen (son of Jas. Allen and Elizabeth Tate). Wm. McCue was educated at Washington Academy, and from Historical Papers, of Washington and Lee University, (No. 4. 1893) the following is taken: "William McCue was born in Augusta county, Virginia, on the 14th day of January, 1787. He was the son of the Rev. John McCue, upon whom the degree of A. B. was conferred by Liberty Hall Academy in 1785, and who was long pastor of the Tinkling Spring Church. Mr. McCue entered Washington Academy, as the institution was then known, and finished his course in 1807. He then took a course of medicine in one of the Colleges of Philadelphia. Upon receiving his degree he settled in Lexington and occupied the lot where the Presbyterian church now stands. He at once took a high stand in his profession and enjoyed a large lucrative practice.

"He was elected a Trustee of Washington College on the 8th of November, 1815, and at once became an active and efficient memeber of the Board. He married Miss Ann Isabel Barry, like himself of Scotch-Irish descent, who survived him more than half a century. She married John Allen, who removed to Michigan, and founded the city of Ann Arbor, calling it in honor of his wife.

Dr. William McCue died in Lexington on the 18th day of November, 1818.-W. McL."

There seems to be a slight error in the above, as it is found that Ann Isabella McCue married second, Capt. James Allen (of the War of 1812), from this union was born a daughter, Sarah, who married Dr. Addison Waddell. And a descendant of Dr. McCue states that hegraduated in Medicine in *Baltimore*, *Md*.

 (23) iv Cyrus McCue, b 22, Sept. 1789, Augusta county, Va., d Sept. 1813. He was a soldier in the War of 1812, receiving the rank of "Lieutenant." He was seized with camp fever, was taken to a hospital in Charlottesville, but his father brought him home where he died eleven days after.

Cyrus McCue was an alumnus of Washington College, having ended his course in 1809.

(24) v Squire John McCue, b 17, Feb. 1793, Augusta county, Va., d 18, May 1862; m (1st) Hannah Winters Moffett, d 1845, (dau of Jas. McDowell Moffett, and granddaughter of Col. Geo. Moffett of Revolutionary fame and Miss McDowell.)

Peyton, in his History of Augusta County, says: "The

writer cannot permit this occasion to pass without paying a slight tribute of respect to the memory of one of the best and purest men he ever knew. It was his good fortune to have known from boyhood the late John McCue, of 'Long Meadows,' to have spent some time now and again under his hospitable roof, to serve with him on the County Court, and to enjoy his friendship during the early years of his life. He soon learned to esteem and admire him for his sterling worth and many good qualities, and the more he knew him in after years, the higher was his estimate of his talents and his character.

"From the sacred calling of his father, the reader will not be surprised to learn that more care was taken to secure his moral and religious principles than to instruct him in professional or general literature, for both of which, however, he exhibited a decided and early liking. While yet a boy he expressed a wish to engage in agrieultural pursuits, a desire heightened by his ardent love for natural scenery and a taste for the seclusion of the country.

"After he acquired the extensive and valuable estate on the 'Long Meadows.' he removed there, and there the principal part of his useful and honorable life was spent, and there he died. His social, intellectual and moral qualities need not be described. To sum up in a few words: He was a man of vigorous intellect, generous soul and varied information. Though a Whig by conviction, and decided in his politics, he never was a partisan, and while serving in the General Assembly, of which he was often a popular and enfluential member, was a laborous and conscientious worker rather than a frequent and ambitious speaker. No man had a higher sense of honor, and he enjoyed the confidence and respect of both parties, wielded much influence, and served to the entire satisfaction of his constituents.

"In private life, Mr. McCue exhibited an active benevolence and the same Christian piety which marked his public career. His heart overflowed with benevolence and kindly feelings, and this precious quality rendered him even more dignified in the social circle than his strong bright intellect. His conversation was eagerly sought by the good and the wise, who derived both pleasure and profit from his varied stores of original thought and acquired information. To a large extent he lived for others. In all his acts he showed a forgetfulness of self, and in the last scene of his life exhibited the firmness of the philosopher united to the piety of the Christian. Mr. McCue not only paid homage to the Great Source of all good and precious gifts, whether intellectual or material, but made religion his favorite theme—not a religion of mental abstraction—but one of practical efficiency on every feeling of his heart and every action of his life. In his neighborhood and among the eongregation of Tinkling Spring, his memory is not only cherished as that of a good and wise man, but venerated as that of a public and private benefactor. It was ever his aim to promote glory to God in the highest by advancing 'Peace on earth and good will toward men.' ''

Squire McCue, one of the Delegates from Augusta, presented a memorial to the Legislature in December, 1832, signed by two hundred and fifteen ladies, praying for emancipation. In presenting this he delivered a vigorous speech in opposition to slavery. The contrary sentiment prevailed in the State, however, but at the next election (April Court-day), in 1832, he was returned to the Legislature from Augusta. Like all the other McCues, he was an ardent supporter of Henry Clay, and used his influence to bring him forward as a candidate for President. In the Annals of Augusta County, Va., we find he was a member of the Committee of Internal Improvements, Oct. 1846.

After the death of his wife, Mr. McCue contracted a second marriage with Eleanor Douglass, b 19, Jan. 1821, d 13, Jan. 1910, dau of John Douglass and Eleanor Hall, the latter being the dau of Archibald Stuart and Janet Brown.


(25) vi Col. Franklin McCue, b 28, Sept. 1795, Augusta county, Va., d 21, October 1874; m (1st) 16, Sept. 1819, Jane Crawford; d 1, April 1829, dau of Geo. Crawford and Nancy Winters (Geo. Crawford b 1, Oct. 1754), Mrs. Crawford's parents were: William Winters and Ann Boone, the latter an aunt of Daniel Boone. Elizabeth Winters, a sister of Mrs. Crawford married Abraham Lincoln, the grandfather of President Lincoln.

Col. McCue m (2nd) 2, Sept. 1830, Nancy Crawford, b 5, April 1801; d 3, March 1893. She was a cousin of Jane Crawford above.


In looking up war records it is found that Franklin McCue and his brother served in Col. James McDowell's company from Agusta county during the Second War with Great Britain, from 30th Aug. 1814, to 30th Nov. of the same year. The home of Col. McCue was originally an "Old Fort," it was so used during the French and Indian wars and later in the Revolution, the portholes may be seen today, just as they were then.

Col. McCue was an active and conscientious member of the Presbyterian church, where he was long Presiding Elder and a leader in the Sabbath School; in which latter branch of church life he took deep interest Nothing afforded him more pleasure than to talk to the children and to lead in the singing. He was noted over the country for his intellect, piety and integrity. It was dur-

ing one of his campaigns for the Legislature when he had just finished his speech on a special measure before the people and was retiring from the platform, when an Irishman on the front row, an old acquaintance, said, "Now for the Doxology."

- (26) vii Washington McCue, b 10, July 1797, Augusta county, Va., d 1, April 1798.
- (27) viii Eliza (Betsy) McCue, b 15, Sept. 1798, Augusta county, Va., d 21, April 1819; m John Porterfield, son of General Robert Porterfield (of the Revolution) and his wife, Rebeccah Farrar.

After the war Gen. Robt. Porterfield removed to Augusta county and settled in South River on a farm which he called "Soldiers' Retreat." He was originally from Jefferson county and his wife was a native of Ameila county, Va.

- (28) ix Margaret (Peggy) McCue, b 12, April 1802, Augusta county, Va., d 11, Oct. 1880, Daviess county, Mo.; m George Miller (son of James Miller) of Augusta county, Va., (who died some years earlier). The move to Missouri was after 1775, for in a letter to "Col. Moses H. McCue," dated "Nov. 21. '75," Maj. J. Marshall McCue writes: "Aunt Peggy and aunt Sally, both in good health. * * Thos. Barry and wife spent a night with us this summer, both deaf but tolerably well." Another letter from Major McCue, dated "Feb. 25, 1877," states that Geo. Moffett Miller had gone to see his mother in Daviess county, Mo.
- (29) x Nancy McCue, b 22, Nov. 1804, Augusta county, Va., d 17, Feb. 1856; m Jacob Mathews, grandson of John Mathews, Sr., and Ann Archer, Nancy M. Mathews was a very gentle woman and enjoyed the friendship of children as well as adult acquaintances.
- (30) xi Sallie McCue, b 22, Nov. 1805, Augusta county, Va., d 30, Nov. 1885, at Hillsboro, Ohio; m 17, April 1821, Gen. Joseph Jefferson McDowell (b 13, Nov. 1800, "Quaker Meadows," N. C.; d 18, Jan. 1877, Hillsboro,

Ohio), he was the son of Gen. Joseph McDowell, hero of Cowpens and King's Mountain. Gen. Jos. J. McDowell and Sally McCue were married at the "Old Stone Fort," the McCue home, and information is given the writer that they were "The handsomest couple ever married in the Valley of Virginia."

Gen. McDowell manifested an inelination for State affairs in early life and his rapid advancement from one office to another seems increditable. He was a man of brains and will power and enjoyed the respect and esteem of his friends and acquaintances. During Polk's Administration, Gen. McDowell was elected to Congress where he served with honor and distinction. His brilliant career was brought to a close in 1878, when he was seized with apoplexy while on the floor of the Senate. He was a noted lawyer and an orator of the first order.

His life was a most useful one and Ohio never lost a truer and better citizen. Some years before his death his many friends sought to elect him Governor, but he never permitted his name to be thus used.

Sally McCue McDowell was a wonderful woman, eultured, intellectual and brilliant. She had the merriest ringing laugh; and as to her beauty, it is related by her granddaughters that her pastor requested that she move her seat from in front of the pulpit because the "lovely picture" distracted his attention from his sermon. She retained her beauty and at the age of eighty had the complexion of a girl.

Jas. McCue was baptised in his home Presbyterian church early in life, was elected an elder in the "Mountain Plains & Lebanon Presbyterian Church," in 1840, (these two having united in 1824). Martha J. Lobban was a member as early as 1824. They were both highly respected citizens. James W. McCue was a remarkable man, mentally and intellectually; measured 6 ft. 2 1-2 in.

"James Wakefield McCue, son of Col. Chas. McCue and Anna Maxwell. A man of strong countenance and strong character, a model son, brother, husband, father and friend. An up to date farmer and orchardist. A devoted member of Lebanon Presbyterian Church, elected Elder thereof in 1840." Mrs. Wm. S. Rodes.

"Mrs. Martha McCue died of heart failure December 8, 1874, in the 63d year of her age, at the home of her son, John Watt McCue, Afton, Nelson county, Va. The deceased had been for forty years member Lebanon Presbyterian Church, Albemarle county, Va. Thus for more than the average life of a generation her personal influence had been for Christ and his cause. Her Christian character was decided. She was remarkable for sincerity, truthfulness and candor, seeking rather to profit rather than please those with whom she was asso-Singularly unselfish, she was constant in her ciated. labors for the good of others. In all the relations she as daughter, sister, wife, mother, grandmother and friend, she was diligent and faithful. Her hope of salvation was based entirely on the all sufficient merit and perfect righteousness of Jesus Christ. *

- (44) iv Bazaleel (Bazel) McCue, b Nelson county, Va., m Elizabeth Machet. Bazaleel McCue was admitted into the Presbyterian church in 1833. Was an excellent young man. It is related that while threshing grain in the old-fashioned way he became overheated, and died soon after of heart failure.
- (45) v William Boyd McCue, b Nelson county, Va., d Stone Coal Creek, m Frances Winebarger, dau of Charles Winebarger, who emigrated from Germany to Albemarle county, Va., at an early day. W. B. McCue taught an Old Field School for a number of years, but

in later life was a farmer. He was a substantial gentleman.

(46) vi Cyrus McCue, b Nelson county, Va., 1810, m Frances Glen. The following clipping is taken from the papers of the late Col. Moses H. McCue, the date and publication are not known:

"Died, October 6th, 1882, in the county of Nelson, Va., Cyrus McCue, in the 73d year of his age. Mr. McCue was a member of the Lebanon Presbyterian church and had for years lived a consistent Christian life. No man in the community had a clearer record as a honest, industrious man, and ready to do a neighborly kindness. Mr. McCue for years had, owing to an infirmity of deafness, been cut off from the privilege of hearing God's word preached, but he read much in the word of God and the old standard works of religion, and his soul profited thereby. Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. W."

Cyrus McCue was baptised in the Presbyterian church in 1834.

He graduated at Washington College in 1814, was a member of the Virginia Legislature for thirteen years, and later was a member of Congress. He served as Adjutant in the War of 1812. His death occurred 20, Dec. 1849. Gen. Dorman's father was educated in Ireland for a Catholic Priest, but did not follow this training.

- (52) ii Washington J. McCue, M. D., b 4, Dec. 1803, Augusta county, Va., d 1838, Bath county, Va., m 6, Oct. 1828, Sarah V. Hamilton of Kanawha county, Va. He graduated at Washington College in 1821, afterwards studied medicine and located in Bath county, where he worked up a large practice. He was ever fond of his books and possessed a fine library, several volumes of which are owned by the writer, among them is an old Latin-Greek Testament, which shows the marks of age in order to preserve it, it was rebound in calf before leaving his shelves.

Moses Hannibal McCue, b 30, July 1808, Augusta county, Va., d 31, Jan. 1885, Callaway county, Mo., m 6, Sept. 1838, Sarah Frances Steele (b 12, July 1817, Waynesboro, Va., d 21, Feb. 1884, Callaway county, Mo.) dau. of Capt. Samuel Steele, of the War of 1812 and his wife Frances Hunter.

Moses H. McCue was educated at Washington College, afterwards Washington and Lee University; leaving there in 1827, he returned to "Greenwood," where he engaged in farming for a few years. But soon became deputy for his father in the office of the High Sheriff, where he remained for twenty years, first as AMANDA ELIZABETH MCCUE, Sr. (51) (Wife of Gen. Chas. P. Dorman)

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assistant and later as High Sheriff. He was the first man to fill that office under the New Constitution in 1850, his predecessor having been Lyttelton Waddell.

The title of Colonel came to him because of an appointment to drill yearly the Militia Regiment of the county according to the old style which was observed in all the Southern States.

Besides a liberal education in that day, he was a great reader and possessed a wonderful memory, which next to health is the most acceptable temporal blessing. Col. McCue delighted in the respect and esteem of many friends and was a staunch friend in return. Literally speaking he would remove his coat on a wintry day for a friend if he thought he needed it more than himself.

He acquired an unusual amount of knowledge, which mixed with a liberal portion of "common sense," made his conversation sought on every hand and his views respected. Dr. W. W. McFarlane of Missouri said he was posted man on State and afthe best National fairs he ever listened to and that he was nnsubject which able to bring up a the Colonel a manner that displayed a could not discuss in mind deep and well stored. He was also a good speak. er; Rev. John C. Tate, D.D., of Tennessee, said of him: "He bore a strong likeness to Senator Stephen A. Douglass (of Ill.), and as a reader might have made a sensation on the stage." He preferred a quit life, and though he delighted in the company of educated men, he enjoyed most his own hearth-stone and the company of his family, in which were seven sons and three daughters. He was fond of saying that in this latter respect he was like the patriarch Job.

Prior to the building of the Virginia Central R. R., and when Col. McCue was farming, his wheat was hauled to Christian Creek (as was the custom of the community) to be ground. Then it was necessary to convey the flour to Scottsville in order to dispose of it. This was all done by wagon; in returning the wagons "back-hauled" merchandise for the Staunton merchants. In 1874 the railroad came to Staunton and in 1883, to Lexington.

From a Staunton paper of 1856, we read that Col. McCue was a Delegate to the State Convention. The next year (1857) he came with his family and a dozen slaves, to Missouri. Mr. Jacob Van Lear and his son, James, accompanied the party. Because of the feeling existing between the slave and non-slave States, it was necessary to travel south of the Mason and Dixon Line, which made the journey more tedious and trying. The party safely reached Callaway county with all their slaves, wagons and teams, that fall, stopping the first winter with Col. Isaac Tate (grandson of Capt. Jas. Tate of the Revolution). Col. McCue intended to locate in the south-western section of Missouri, but was so favorably impressed with the people, the land and the climate that he settled near *the Old Auxvasse church in Callaway, which church he united with in 1859, was soon elected ruling elder and continued in this office until his death which occurred in 1885.

*The Auxvasse church was organized in 1828 in Callaway county, it being the first Presbyterian organization west of St. Charles and alleged to have been the second west of the Mississippi River. Its name was taken from the small muddy stream which bounds the cemetery on the north. As early as 1823, this little band of hardy pioneers, comprised largely of Virginians and Kentuckians, held religious meetings in their cabins and under the massive oaks. The eleven charter members were: William Mateer, David Kenedy, Mary Kenedy, James Tate, Clarinda P. Tate, John Hamilton, Peggy C. Hamilton, Reuben Scott, Mart T. Scott, Ann T. Hart and Betsy Patton. The church grew rapidly, since that day almost a thousand names have been added to the roll. Six churches have sprung out of the original organization and one or two of different denominations, so that the name "Old Auxvasse," has been well applied to the mother. In Nov. 1911, the congregation, swelled by the daughter churches and many visitors, celebrated the Golden Jubilee of Rev. John F. Cowan D. D.'s connection with the Old Auxvasse as pastor, when an interesting program was rendered. Such an occasion is most unusual as it is believed no other church west of the 90th meridian in America has ever held a pastor for fifty years.

In a meeting of Synod held in Boonville, when the division between the North and South took place, a discussion arose after the Northern brethren had withdrawn, as to what steps should be taken to secure the control of our educational institutions. Dr. Faris was talking in his usual open manner when Col. McCue stepped to him and said, "Doctor, I do not think it wisest that we show our hand." The Doctor's face became a broad smile, laying his hand on the Colonel's shoulder he said, "Look here, old fellow, you have played seven up." The Colonel intimated that probably they both had, but the passage cemented their friendship.

Mr. Fielding McCue of W. Va., says of his father, that he was a man of great energy, having been considered the strongest man in the country in his prime, and that he took a keen delight in having the very best of stock on his farm, (which was located three miles south-east of Summersville, Nicholas county, W. Va.)

During the late war between the States, he was uncompromisingly in favor of the Union and offered his services, but because of his age, was denied the privilege of serving as a soldier. It is related that when Gen. Tyler came to Summersville in 1861, Mr. McCue was eating his noon meal, upon hearing the news, he collected his hat and cane and started for the Officers' headquarters, but before reaching camp was intercepted by pickets who advised him that they had strict orders not to let a man through the line without a pass. Mr. McCue was not baffled and using tact and persuasion he was escorted to Gen. Rosecrans where he received courteous treatment and lingered for several days, when he returned to his home. Ever after this there seemed to be a feeling against him by the Southerners and several attemps were made to capture him which finally resulted in his being shot on the night of the 2nd of Sept., (1862), for not surrendering. He bled to death in thirty minutes.

Mr. McCue volunteered in the War of 1812, but being rather young his father served in his stead.

Mr. Fielding McCue (191) says, Mr. John McCue had 13 children, 60 grandchildren and 160 great-grandchildren.

David McCue came to Daviess county, Mo., in 1844, at which time there were twelve children (and as many more born afterward). Hon. John F. Gordon, in his *Memoirs of Daviess County*, says, "The advent of this family added much to the numerical strength of the county."

David McCue, Jr. reached his western home fourteen years after John Splawn and his son, Mayberry, came from Ray county and built near where the Rock Island depot formerly stood. It was then a place where the hardy pioneer could rear his cabin and spend his days surrounded by peace and plenty. In this age the spinning wheel was in vogue, and the loom and the reel could be seen in every home. It can be easily understood how Mrs. McCue could find enough to occupy her time and attention, for when she was not making jeans and linseys for her sons and daughters, she was tieing up the children's fingers and patching rents and differences.

"Mr. McCue was a good provider, a loving husband, a kind father and in return his children loved and honored him above all men. It is indeed a great thing for a man to so live that he will deserve and receive the respect of his children."

Unlike his brother, Mr. McCue was a strong Confederate during the late war. He and eight of his sons entered the army; had every Southerner responded so freely and in the same proportion, it is probable that the result may have been different. Some years afterward (1886), he removed to the Chickasaw Nation with his last family, but his health failing, he was brought home and cared for by his children who reverenced him with the same tender affection and honor as when they crowded about his arm chair, in the days gone by, and begged for a "story." He died at the home of his son, Richard M. McCue, and the remains were laid to rest in the old "Jordin Graveyard."

Major McCue graduated at Washington College in 1836. At an early age he took part in civic affairs, from 1840 to his death his name is found among the prominent men of Augusta county. In 1845 (30 Jan.) Augusta Female Seminary was incorporated with the following Trustees, who were designated by the General Assembly of Virginia: Rev. Francis McFarland, D. D., Col. James Crawford, Rev. William Brown, Adam Link. Esq., John McCue, Esq., David Fultz, Dr. Addison, Rev. Solomon J. Love, Major J. Marshall McCue, Wm. Frazier, Esq., Alexander S. Hall, Esq., Wm. M. Tate, Esq., James H. Cochran, Esq., and Rev. Benj. M. Smith. As early as 1842, a number of ministers and other gentlemen met and adopted a Plan or Constitution for the Seminary. The name of this institution was changed to Mary Baldwin Seminary in 1895-6, by act of the Legislature and at the request of the Board of Trustees. The writer is in receipt of a History of Mary Baldwin Seminary, by Hon. Joseph A. Waddell, and in reading the

story of this school, how Miss Baldwin strove so long and unselfishly, during the ordeals of the late war, the trying season following, and through other difficulties, of making the small Seminary, one of the foremost institutions of learning for young ladies, he concludes that the Board of Trustees executed a wise move when they caused the name to be changed in her honor.

Going back to 1833 we find that J. Marshall McCue, a very young man and full of military ardor, was appointed adjutant of the Thirty-second regiment, before the One-Hundred and Sixtieth was formed, and came out in complete uniform of the modern style, including coeked hat and plume and red sash. The example was contagious, we find, for in a short time all the officers of high rank were similarly costumed. In 1850, J. M. McCue, J. Howard McCue and others were Justices of Peace in Augusta county. And later J. M. McCue was President of the court, being successor to Robert Guy, Esq.

On the 11th Nov. 1863, the various companies of the Augusta "Raid Guard," otherwise called "Home Guard," were organized as follows: John B. Baldwin, Colonel; Kenton Harper, Lieut.-Col.; J. M. McCue, Major; Dr. J. Alexander Waddell, Surgeon; C. R. Mason, Quartermaster; N. P. Catleyt, Commissary; and J. C. Marquis, Adjutant.

At the June court of Augusta, in 1866, a meeting of the people of the county was held to consider the Fourteenth Amendment, which among other things, disfranchised every person, who having previously, as a public officer, taken an oath to support the Constitution of the United States, had engaged in rebellion, unless relieved of such disability by a vote of two thirds of each House of Congress. Resolutions were made at the Staunton meeting, proteesting against the Amendments to the Constitution proposed by "the body of men now assembled at Washington, and which claims to be the Congress of the United States." At this meeting J. Marshall McCue presided.

The Augusta Agriculture Society was organized in Nov. 1811 and flourished for a brief season, having probably expired during the exciting scenes of the War of 1812-15. In 1867, Col. John B. Baldwin (who was Speaker of the General Assembly), Asher W. Harman, James Henderson and others, re-organized the Fair, and in June (1867) the County Court of Augusta met and chose (according to the instructions of the General Assembly) the following citizens to be Directors of the Augusta County Fair, viz: John B. Baldwin, A. W. Harman, James Henderson, P. O. Polmer, G. T. Antrim, J. M. McCue, James Walker, W. A. Burke, and Wm. M. Tate. In Jan. 1874 the name was changed to the "Baldwin-Augusta Fair," for the founder and first President.

J. M. McCue was a well informed man on any subject; he acquired much knowledge from vast travel, constant reading and keen observation. He was the family antiquarian and during his life, from young manhood to old age, had prepared a wonderful amount of data on State affairs and local. His History of Augusta county, almost ready for publication, with his very complete history of the McCue family, were sent to a friend in Texas after his death and stored away for a more convenient time. But when investigated it was found that the mice had literally ruined the precious documents and built of them playhouses and nests. This was a great loss, not only to Augusta, but to his family, for he had penned the results of a life-time research that was lost with the passing of the older generations.

During the prime of life Major McCue enjoyed independent means, but in the destruction of property at the time of the war between the States, he suffered heavily. He, with Col. Moses H. McCue and others of the family, had "gone security," more deeply than they realized before, this loss was more effective than that of their property, from it they never fully recovered. Major J. M. McCue spent his declining years with Samuel Steele, Esq., of Waynesboro, his wife having died some years since.

"Major J. Marshall McCue, a graduate of West Point; also a graduate of Washington College in Law. A brilliant lawyer, writer and legislator in Va., m Martha Jane, dau of Jas. Wakefield McCue (sec. cousin), a handsome woman of charming personality and a lovely Christian of whom he was proud and to whom he was devoted."

"Mai. Marshall McCue dead. The death of Maj. McCue occurred in Staunton, Va., aged 75 years. He had just returned from Washington City, D. C., in the interests of a memorial building to Columbus, designed to be erected in that city. Maj. McCue was one of the most prominent figures in the History of Virginia and his whole life has been devoted to the public service. The result of his study and researches have been of great benefit to our people. He will long be remembered in connection with valuable contributions which he made to the records of our county (Augusta) and the best means of tilling the soil to the best advantagea model farmer. There is hardly a man in the State who had more acquaintances and more friends and whose death will be more sincerely lamented. M. M. R."

His burial took place about Wednesday, New Years, 1900 (?)

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"Col. Moses H. McCue, Fulton. Mo.

Dear Colonel:-

* I have settled here to Practice Medicine. Your cousin Eliza is at Marshall's, children at school. Like thousands of others, a ruined man, but for my profession would be flat enough. You know I bought the farm upon which Brandy Station is located in Culpepper county. Both armies upon me all the time. It was Camp Ground, Hospital and Graveyard. Mead's Army, under Grant, stayed on me from Sept., 1864 to May, 1865 with seventy-five thousand men. House, barn, fencing and all the buildings used for fuel to cook with. Not a cart-load of wood left on the fivehundred and thirty acres. I had nearly improved it. Barn, houses, etc., could not be put back for ten thousand dollars in gold.

"There were ten calvary fights on my farm. I lost eighteen negroes, farming implements, all my household furniture, etc.

"Well I merely write to let you know I have not forgotten you and yours. Hope you are doing well, but would like to have you here. As I get older, Colonel, I naturally revert to our young days, twenty-five or thirty years ago. A very few are here now whose faces are familiar. I was three years Surgeon in the C. S. Army at General Hospital at Charlottesville, and five in Culpepper. Eight years has made a great change here. And the Valley does not feel the change in the status of her agricultural interests like the eastern part of Poor Old Virginia. The question had to be settled with armies, and State rights with Courts; and National liberties are dead issues. There is no intermediate ground, hence consolidation. The legitimate sequence of an abandonment of doctrines of State rights is staring us * * full in the face.

"Staunton is improving since the war. No news of interest. Mrs. Arnall has been very poorly, but I believe is better. John Sherer wishes to be remembered to you, and his boys also. Mrs. Watt Tapp has made me think of your mother often. She was a favorite with the old lady and used to humor her in everything. *******

"Marshall's folks all well. John, my boy, is said to be well grown and likely, looks like the McCues and Smiths. The girl, Margaret, is really handsome, Moses, and favors her father very much they say. Arnall's boys are promising, one of them R. R. Agent; made good soldiers. Write to M. C. Garber. Old Allen sends regards, you recollect him. Love to all. Yours truly, Signed) Clem R. Harris,"

"Judge John Howard McCue, who had been long in declining health, died at his home in this city in the afternoon of the 15th instant, aged sixty-seven years. He was of a family identified with the history of Augusta county from earliest times. He inherited the exemplified and strongest traits of character, his associations and all that adorns a man, and the beautiful tribute to his memory adopted by his brethren of the Bar Association, which we annex, renders supererogatory any eulogy by us. He was a graduate of Washington College (1842) and also of the University of Virginia and chose the profession of law. Immediately thereafter he commenced the prosecution of his profession in Nelson county, where he married Miss Signora C. E. Willis, a highly accomplished young lady. Her parents were of Nelson families and like the ancestry of her husband in Augusta were foremost among the citizens of Nelson in agriculture, commercial pursuits, and classical attainments, of whom is her uncle Professor William E. Peters, of the University of Virginia.

"Judge McCue was called to the bench in 1870, when the Legislature got the new government of the State to work. It is unnecessary to speak of the ability, the learning, and the integrity which characterized his service in that station.

"Some years ago he removed to Staunton from Nelson and entered upon the practice of his profession here, attaching to himself the confidence and esteem so forcibly mentioned in the tribute of respect referred to. He was for several years counsel of the Western Lunatic Asylum. Mrs. McCue and seven children survive him. The sympathies of the entire community will afford all the comfort that sincere friendship can contribute.

"The funeral services took place on the morning of the 17th instant from Trinity Episcopal church, Rev. W. O. Hullihen, Rector. The pall-bearers were: Judge J. N. Hendren, Judge J. W. Green Smith, Dr. Geo. S. Walker, Hon. A. H. Fultz, S. M. Yost, J. L. Peyton, Geo. M. Harrison, J. C. Shields."

Tribute of Respect.

"On the forenoon of the 16th instant, the Staunton Bar Association assembled in the Court House, when Judge Gratton of the City Court called to order, and announced the death of Judge McCue in brief address of touching and sympathetic utterances. Chas. E. Kemper, Esq., was requested to act as Secretary. Mr. George M. Harrison, in feeling terms, referred to the event, and then presented the following:

"Judge John Howard McCue departed this life at his home in this City, yesterday evening at half past two o'clock, and this Bar has met to pay the last sad tribute of respect and friendship for another honored member.

"Judge McCue possessed many noble traits of character, and his life was graced by many of the virtues that most adorn and dignify humanity. He was kind and courteous to all with whom he came in contact. He was generous to a fault, ever ready to respond to the appeal of sorrow of suffering from whatever quarter it might come. He was generous and tender in his feelings, and at the same time as brave as the bravest.

"He bore no malice, but ready forgave and forgot injuries. All his asperations and thoughts were exalted. He viewed things from no low plane and with a mean or unworthy act he had no patience. His integrity was incorruptible, and his honesty never questioned or doubted.

"As a lawyer he was well and favorable known. He was faithful to all the interests confided to him, and no clients ever had a braver, more determined, or chivalrous defender of their rights than John Howard McCue.

"It is sad to reflect that we shall hear no more his kind and cordial greeting, or feel the warm grasp of the hand so recently given in sincere friendship; but such is life—so soon passeth it away and we are gone.

"With unaffected sorrow and sympathy for the family of our deceased brother, we the members of the Staunton Bar, unite in the following resolutions:

1. "That in the death of Judge McCue, the members of this Bar have lost an associate and friend whose memory they will cherish with sentiments of sincere affection.

2. "That we will not attempt here fully to express our estimate of his character and virtues.

3. "That we will attend the funeral of our deceased brother, and wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty days.

4. "That copies of these resolutions be presented to the courts of this City and county with request that they be entered of record.

5. "That the Secretary transmit a copy of the same to the family of the deceased with expressions of our sympathy.

6. "That the city papers be requested to publish these proceedings."

"Major T. C. Elder followed the reading of the resolutions by Mr. Harrison with remarks, in which he paid a fitting tribute to the deceased and expressed his highest admiration of his character." From Waddell's Annals of Augusta County it is learned that "John H. McCue, Esq., was practicing law in Nelson county in 1861," was appointed Commissary of the Fifty-first regiment, Colonel Wharton. Was with Gen. Floyd's command at the fall of Fort Donelson. He was captured at Waynesboro in March, 1865, while acting as volunteer aide and detained a prisoner till July. From a Catalogue of the Officers and Alumni of Washington and Lee University, we find he was a Major C. S. A.

Peyton acknowledges his indebtedness to Hon. Jos. A. Waddell, Hon. A. H. H. Stuart, Judge J. H. McCue, Wm. M. Tate, Esq., Hon. Thos. Barry, Major H. M. Bell, Wm. E. Craig, J. W. Crawford, Marshall Hanger and others, in the preparation of the *History of Augusta County*.

"She possessed all the attributes of a beautiful character, based upon principle and piety, was self-denying, sympathetic, gracious and tactful, and richly endowed with intellectual attainments and social qualities, which made her a charming companion. In all of life's relations; the life individual, the life of fidelity to duty, and the life of communion with God, her forceful and well balanced nature measured up to every requirement. In her home where woman fulfills her highest and noblest mission, she lived in unswerving devotion to her family, and language is inadequate to express the anguish and desolation of their hearts. * * * —D. The writer enjoyed a short correspondence with Mrs. Hedges and not only did he learn much of interest concerning the McCues of the Old Domain, but was deeply impressed with her refinement, modesty, and virtue, for character is ofttimes read in a letter. "Mr. A. H. McCue was born in Augusta county, Va., in 1853, and received his education at Washington and Lee University, Lexington, Va. In later years Mr. Mc-Cue purchased the homestead of his father's estate where he now resides. He has been and is now engaged in agricultural pursuits, and a eattle and sheep grazer on a large scale. Although comparatively a young men, he has, by close attention to business, acquired a fine estate. He is the senior member of the firm of McCue and Kemper, general eastern agents for the Aeme Hay Harvester Co., of Pekin, Ill., who are large manufacturers of hay stackers and rakes. He is an active member of the Real Estate Exchange, and is of the firm of Hanger, Kemper & McCue, real estate brokers. Mr. McCue is a gentleman of fine business tact, sound judgment and foresight. He is an active promoter of the eity's development and a solid eitizen."

Besides being efficient in business, Mr. McCue is active in church work. For years he has filled with credit, the office of deacon in Tinkling Spring church. This grand old house of worship has done a noble work from its early beginning to the present day. Mr. Mc-Cue is a member of the Horticultural Society of Virginia; a member of the Board of the State Institution for the Deaf, Dumb and Blind; and an apostle of free silver and Jeffersonian Democracy. A late number of the *Staunton Daily Leader*, advises that he heads the delegates from Augusta to the State Convention which will instruct for Governor Wilson, a former Augustian, as choice for Presidential nomination.

Mr. Imboden graduated at Washington College ın 1843, studied law, was a member of the Virginia House of Delegates. He was Clerk of the County Court, and Brigadier General C. S. A. A lawyer of considerable prominence. At the Annual Fair of the Virginia State Horticulture Society, 1774, he exhibited a "Car-lifter," which solved the difficulty of the different gauges in railways and was operated by compressed air, the contrivance was invented by himself.

It is related of Gen. Imboden, that when a mere boy, his father operated a waterpower saw-mill and ottimes left young John in charge of the feed; but the lad having taste for books, turned the carriage to run slowly so that he might read with less frequent interruptions. The father noticing the lack of progress and locating the cause, gave his son a sound trouncing, declaring that he didn't want him "spoilt with book larnin."

Mrs. Imboden was a gentle loving wife and a fond mother, during her deelining years, she was visited with a protracted siege of illness.

"James Cyrus McCue, son of James Wakefield McCue and Martha Lobban, born May 23, 1833, died at his home, at Afton, Albemarle county, Virginia, March 14, 1891, of heart failure.

"To the stranger, how simple this announcement, but to the hearts of his beloved family, relatives and friends, what agony it conveys. When death strikes down the infant we say 'It is well,' Heaven has but rescued its own from sin, sorrow and suffering. When it calls home the aged we feel it is but natural—his work being ended he would go to his rest, but when the summons without warning comes to the strong man in the very prime of life, who has fought through the breakers of early manhood, surrounded by everything necessary to make life dear, who has every prospect of a long life's enjoyment of the fruits of his hard-fought battles— When such a man is stricken down we stop appalled, and feel that indeed life is but a vapor. These thoughts apply with peculiar force to the death of Mr. MeCue.

"Married October 11, 1857, to Sarah Jane Moon, daughter of Mr. Samuel Overton Moon, of Batesville, Virginia, life opened for him with the brightest prospects. Soon after his marriage he located on the estate where he lived to the day of his death. He at once went to work with an indomitable will to improve and beautify his home. When the first angry mutterings of the Civil War broke over the land it found him eminently successful in his work and on the high road to prosperity, surrounded by the comforts and luxuries of life and happy in the love of his idolized wife and prattling babes; but his country called him from peace to war. He joined Company F, Tenth Virginia Cavalry, and was taken prisoner at the last battle of the war in which General Lee was engaged at Five Forks, and taken to Point Lookout, where for many weary months he thought of and longed for home and loved ones.

"It was the writer's privilege to read a letter written to his wife during this imprisonment, which breathed throughout a touching affection for his wife and little ones, and at the same time a complete and perfect trust and confidence in his God and Saviour Jesus Christ and resignation to God's will. Confined in a loathsome prison far from all he held most dear, tortured by a dread uncertainty as to their fate or his own, he writes, he never before enjoyed so fully the consolations of religion. In this letter we find no word of enquiry as to his property; no impatient muttering. His whole thoughts seem concentrated on his devoted wife and helpless little ones and deep gratitude to his Maker that it was as well with him as it was.

"On his release from prison and return home, he found his loved ones living, but the grim fate of war had swept away the fruits of years of labor, his house robbed, growing crops destroyed, his cattle, horses, farming implements stolen and destroyed. Even the bread and meat stored to feed his family, taken-nothing between his loved ones and suffering but his own bare arms. Weakened by disease and long imprisonment, but the same indomitable will which characterized his life kept him from falling a victim to despair. Those were for him dark days, but time was too precious to be spent in useless repinings. He at once went to work to retrieve his fortunes, and though for a long time he was tossed from billow to billow, and time and again it seemed his bark must be wrecked, the watchword of his life, 'my wife and children,' sustained his flagging strength, and he rode through the storms to victory.

"In early life he embraced religion and connected himself with the Methodist church, which through life remained the church of his choice, but living at inconvenient distance from this church and his wife and several children having united with Lebanon Presbyterian church which was

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close by, he for many years most often attended that ehurch, manifesting the deepest interest in its welfare and contributing largely to its support. Some years ago, seeing the necessity of more safely investing a portion of his money he purchased the splendid Brookville property which adjoined his home. About a year ago he had this property divided among his daughter, Mrs. W. S. Rodes and six eldest sons. reserving his home for his two youngest sons. Mrs. Rodes, in the division, drew and occupied the Brooksville mansion and surrounding farm. Four of the sons had erected comfortable homes and with their families were settled around the homestead. The dream of his life seemed realized. His battles had been many, but victory had crowned his efforts. The future stretched out before him in a gentle, peaceful decline to the shores of eternity. The picture of perfect physical manhood, he seemed destined for yet many years of life.

"On March 11, just three days before his death, he was called to Stanton, Virginia, on business. After reaching his hotel he heard that a celebrated opera troupe would give an entertainment that night in the city, and being a lover of music he started to hear this opera. On reaching the street he heard a church bell ringing. Guided by some subtle influence he turned and went to church instead of the opera. The service was to him of a prophetic character, but how little he realized it. The text was Matthew XXV, 13: 'Watch, therefore, for ye know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of Man cometh.' And strange to say his three favorite hymns, viz: 'Come Thon Fount of Every Blessing,' 'There is a Fountain Filled With Blood,' and 'How Firm a Foundation.' were sung. On his return home-his last night on earth, his last hour with his loved ones-while seated with his family around the fireside he related to them these incidents, and seemed deeply impressed with the fact that a Divine hand had guided and richly rewarded him. Had he known this was his last hour in his family circle he could not have spent it more profitably for himself or left his family. relatives and friends a richer consolation. How precious the thought to that grief-stricken wife and children that he preferred his Master's service to worldly amusement, and that his last hour on earth was spent in religious converse! How pleasant to know that his last thoughts were of heaven, the last music he heard on earth was praise of his Redeemer. "A large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends from Charlottesville, Staunton, Richmond and surrounding eountry assempled at his residence to pay to his memory the last tribute of love and respect. Among the vast assemblage were a large number of family servants and their children. He was left to sleep beside his two infant sons who had preeeded him to that better land, and his spirit, doubtless now with theirs, is only waiting to welcome home one by one until the family eirele so rudely broken, may be united in that land where parting is unknown.—S"

"Died July 28th, 1879, at Afton, Va., Mrs. Martha J. McCue, wife of Major J. Marshall McCue.

"Though the subject of this passed away some weeks since, the writer eannot forbear offering this testimonial of her worth. As he was permitted to know her in a way that enabled him to see and admire her noble qualities, he is enabled to speak of her life in its testimony for Christ. Naturally of a most amiable and gentle disposition, grace made her indeed conspieuous for those virtues, so that her husband ean 'rise up and eall her blessed.' And all who eame in contact with her learned to love her. Not only did she minister with bountiful hospitality to her guests, but she was also a generous friend to the poor, many of whom can testify to her unostentations kindness. Her death witnessed for the truth of the words 'blessed are the dead who die in the Lord.' Calm, peaceful, and full of joyous hope and unwavering trust in Jesus which she expressed by repeating to her friends, who stood around her bed:

> 'Other refuge have I none, Hangs my helpless soul on thee; Leave, Ah! leave me not alone, Still support and comfort me.'

"We sorrow not for her as for those who have no hope, but standing around her death-bed we say, 'Let me die the death of the righteous,' and let my last end be like his.' —J. W. Rosebro.''

(144) iv John Watt McCue, b 11, Aug. 1839, Nelson vounty, Va.; d 11, July 1885; m Mary Adaline Shepherd, dau of Dr. Shepherd of Hillsboro. J. W. McCue was a highly educated instructor and teacher. He was a most active elder in Lebanon Presbyterian church in 1875. His wife d 20, Feb. 1871, and their only child was kept at Major J. M. McCue's for a few years, but later was adopted by her uncle, Benj. T. McCue, now of Richmond, Va.

"John Watt McCue departed this life July 11, 1885, in the 46th year of his age. At the home of his brother, B. Taylor McCue, Richmond, Va. A noted teacher, qualifying and stimulating more young men for immediate common sense business than many of the Colleges, many of them filling responsible and lucrative positions in the business and Christian world.

(6* * 茶 Mr. McCue was for many years a member and Elder in the Lebanon Presbyterian church in which church's gravevard he is buried. He was decided in his Christian character, marked by a high sense of integrity and devotion to duty. I have never known one who lived nearer to God or more in daily communication with Him. His life seemed to be a continued spiritual growth. For years his health was delicate and his last days were spent in almost rapturous anticipation of his change. In his letter to myself, an old friend and pastor, he spoke of his expected departure with the spirit of Him who said, 'I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded he is able to keep that which I have committeed unto Him against that day.' Mr. McCue some years since lost his wife, who died as she had lived, a Christian. His only child, a daughter-Mary Shep-* * * — B. M. Wailes.'' pard McCue—survives him.

Married Robert Hardin Smith. They had a charming home, 'Redland,' to which they cordially and sincerely welcomed and hospitably entertained their relatives and friends. They and their children were members of Hebron Baptist church. The parents and three children of their eight dead and buried in its church graveyard.—Mrs. Wm. S. Rodes.''

Hon. B. T. McCue moved to Richmond in 1870, and for three years he was engaged in Produce Commission business. In 1878 he acquired an interest in the firm of "Prescott Tobacco Mfg. Co.," but retired from business in 1881. He was a member of the Board of the Central Hospital, from 1882-85, being Chairman of the Board the last two years; during his connection with the Institution, the handsome new building was erected. Before moving to Richmond, he was school director of Henry county for twelve years and magistrate longer.

On the 31st of Dec., 1911, the Church of the Covenant, (Richmond, Va.) celebrated the Silver Jubilee of its faithful minister's connection with the organization. Since Rev. J. Calvin Stewart entered its pulpit in 1887, both the church and Sabbath school work has been greatly on the increase. Dr. Stewart is to be congratulated on his success, and Mr. Benj. T. McCue is most fortunate to hold membership in so noble a house of worship. He acknowledges his Christian life due to

A model type man of large proportions with the finest black eyes, lashes and eyebrows; a very handsome man of the Massie type. Member and Elder in the Lebanon Presbyterian church. * * *-Mrs. Wm. S. Rodes."

Dr. McCue is a prominent member of the Virginia Horticulture Society and their annual meetings are never completed without a special talk from the physician of Greenwood, Va.

The following is taken from a letter to Col. M. H. McCue:

"Home, Jany. 2, '75. (Sat. night)

Cousin Moses :---

* * Poor Mattie, it is hard for her to become reconciled to the loss of one of the most self sacrificing and faithful mothers any set of children ever had. It was a sad sight to see the seven children surrounding her bier, heart broken and disconsolate. Massie, the youngest child of Martha J. McCue (my wife's mother), graduated two seasons ago at the University in Medicine, and his mother had for some time, been preparing his clothes to go to Richmond to practice his profession, she feeling reconciled to that because he would be only a day removed from her, rather than see him go West or North. I do not think I have ever known a more exemplary young man in character, perfectly free from the many vices that so many of the young men of the present day are addicted to. He lived with me two or three years, and 1 am thus able to speak of him. He is the finest looking one of the name I have ever seen. There are now about twenty-three grand children and one great-granchild —Mariana Smith's daughter, Bettie, married Dr. Killian and has a daughter some months old. Sandy Stuart thinks Dr. Killian one of the cleverest young men he knows. * * Afft. your relative: J. M. McCue.''



Mr. Dorman was educated at Virginia Military Institute, of which he was one of the earliest graduates, attended Washington College, (now Washington and Lee University) in 1839-40, and studied law under his father, an able expounder of its principles.

"When he had equipped himself for the bar, he located at Lexington and began the practice of his profession. Excellently qualified for it, he soon rose to prominence and achieved great distinction as able pleader. The war with Mexico came on and the young lawyer, along with many of his fellows, imbued by their martial spirit which so eminetly characterizes Virginians, enlisted in a regiment of Volunteers and served throughout the contest. After the war he resumed the duties of his profession and launched into politics, a field in which so many Virginians were then prominent.

"As a Forensic orator, he had perhaps no superior in the State and few equals. He served his county several terms in the Legislature and was prominent in its proceedings. In 1861, Major Dorman and General Samuel McDowell Moore were chosen to represent Rockbridge in what

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proved to be the Virginia secession convention. He was a zealous advocate of the perpetuation of the Union until his State seceeded, whereupon he cast his lot with her and was enrolled among the soldiers of the confederacy. The war concluded, he continued the practice of law at Lexington until 1880, when he was made clerk of the Court of Appeals at Staunton. He continued in this position until his death.

"Those who knew him best, described him as a gentleman noted for his courtesy, his clear, discriminating mind, his wide range of information and of great literary culture. He was a student at the time of his death. * * * * * * *."

(167) ii Capt. William Boliver Dorman, b 3, Feb. 1826, Lexington, Va.; d 8, Jan. 1911, Red Oaks, Texas. m 16, June 1853, Margaret Catharine McCue (73), dau of Squire John McCue and Hannah W. Moffett. After marrying he removed to Mercer county, Va. Like his brother, he opposed secession, but after the die was cast, he enlisted with the Confederates, was soon made Captain in the Fiftieth Virginia Regiment. Some time after the struggle between the States, he removed with his family to Hill county, Texas, but latter settled in Ellis county, adjoining. He was educated in Washington College, and like his brother, gathered knowledge throughout his life, so that e're old age approached he was reckoned as a man of strong mind, and wilful intellect.

In 1849 Mr. Dorman made an overland trip to California, where he met with many trying frontier experiences.

John Letcher was the war Governor of Va. and a very distinguished man. Hon. David Curry was educated at Washington College.

Mrs. Curry's life was illustrated and adorned by the cultivation of piety, and the observance of all her duties, personal, domestic and social, to cheer and encourage those about her, through their progress in this world, and to stimulate them to active preparation, for the enjoyment of pleasures and blessings in the world to come. Let it be our pride to follow her example, and to imitate her virtues.





thorough literary course. In her girlhood she was charming and attractive. In her home as a married woman she was a faithful wife, a devoted mother and trained her children in the way of the Lord, an energetic manager and a despenser of genuine hospitality.

(171) ii Samuel Steele McCue, b 31, July 1841, "Greenwood," Augusta county, Va.; m 20, Feb. 1868, Clarinda Pinckney Tate, b 20, Nov. 1844, dau of Col. Isaae Tate and Jane Henderson, and gr-granddaughter of Capt. James Tate and Sarah Hall (the latter being a dau of Edward Hall and Eleanor Stuart.)

Mr. McCue was engaged in mereantile pursuits when he left Virginia in 1857; became a farmer upon reaching Missouri; in 1889, he acquired an interest in the Harrison McCue Hdw. Co., of Auxvasse, but retired to his farm in 1904. While not an office holder, he has ever taken a deep interest in politics, has been Central Committeeman in Callaway for years; Congressional Committeeman, and Delegate to the State Convention at various times. During the late war he enlisted under the "Stars and Bars," with his brother, Henry, both shared in the trying ordeals of war, were captured, had horses shot from under them, but survived the hostilities without a sear. For a score of years the kindred have been accustomed to gather at his home every few years in celebration of his birthday, last July (1911) there were present one hundred and ten.

other like meritorous works; another cousin married Hon. E. W. Stephens, President of the International Association of Baptists.. And another cousin, Rev. Boving, is President of Westminster College, an historic old Institution of Missouri.

Mr. McCue lived in Callaway county until the 20th of Feb. 1883, when he removed with his family to a point twelve miles north of Mexico, Mo., where he lived for eight years. Then he purchased from Jos. Brown, the "Sin Clair," farm upon which he settled and remained May the 25th, 1893, he received inuntil his death. juries in a disastrous tornado from which he never fully recovered. The cyclone wrenched a beam loose in his barn, in which he had just re-entered, because of the approaching storm, and as the heavy timber swung around one end struck him on the head. He was restored to health, but never seemed quite so full of life as before. He came to Missouri when fourteen years of age, shortly after he became a member of the Old Auxvasse Church, a house of worship which ranks second in age among the Presbyterian churches west of the Mississippi river; when he removed to Audrain he placed his membership in the Bethel Church, where he was soon made a Ruling Elder, which office he held until his death. He possessed a cheerful disposition and an amiable character. His memory was much like that of Hortensius of Roman fame, for it is believed he never forgot anything of consequence that he ever heard or read, so it was he became a well informed man on any subject and his conversation was sought by the good and the wise.

It is related of him, that on one occasion when he with his family had listened to a "long winded," and rather dry preacher, that he quietly left the church, drove his team to the style and waited for his family. He must have remained in this position for some time, for when Mrs. McCue and the children came out at the

- (173) iv Charles Andrew McCue, b 12, Jan. 1846, "Greenwood," Augusta county, Va.; m 13, Apr. 1871, Josephine Kidwell, b 2, Nov. 1847, dan of W. R. Kidwell and Mary Ann Wheeler, natives of Fairfax county, Va. Mr. McCue was educated at Lexington, Va., directed his attention toward agriculture and stock raising upon reaching Missouri ; he removed to Auxvasse, in 1888, and in the spring of the next year, he purchased an interest in the firm "Harrison & McCue," but at length he bought land near town, and became interested in thoroughbred sheep and hogs. In the latter he has made quite a success. Has taken sweepstakes on his herd of Berkshires at State Fair, Sedalia; Kansas City Royal; at St. Louis Exposition, (1904), and else where. He has sold fine hogs in nearly every state in the Union.
- (174) v Frances Hamilton McCue, b 16, Jan. 1848, Augusta county, Va.; m 20, Oct. 1880, Theadore A. Garrett, (b 31, Aug. 1842; d 1893, Auxvasse, Mo.) son of Wm. N. Garrett and wife Frances E. Garrett. Mr. Garrett came with his mother to Mexico, Mo., in 1856, engaged in the mercantile business, removed with his wife to Auxvasse in 1889, and remained in the same business. He was an upright, humble christian gentleman.

Mrs. Garrett, as a girl was very popular because of her brilliancy, refinement and amiable disposition. As a lady she possesses all the charms of her girlhood in addition to many since gained. She resides in Roswell, N. M.

(175) vi John Marshall McCue, b 6, May 1850, "Greenwood," Augusta county, Va.; m 5, Nov. 1879, Sallie Keesee, a cousin of John Keesee (225). Mr. McCue came to Missouri when seven years of age, in early manhood he removed to Dallas, Texas, and became manager

of the International Harvester Co's. interests in a large section of that State, and has held that position since. He is an enthusiastic mason, having traveled all the way from an Entered Apprentice through the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite.

- (176) vii James William McCue, b 12, Aug. 1852, "Greenwood," Augusta county, Va.; m 25, May 1887, Sallie L. Hussey, b 2, Aug. 1861, dau of Dr. John T. Hussey of Union county, Ark. Mr. McCue came to Mo. when five years of age, where he was educated. He grew to manhood and on the 6th of February 1879, he removed to Texas where he married Miss' Hussey eight year afterwards, she having emigrated with her father to that State in 1863. From Nov. 1894, to Nov. 1898, Mr. McCue held the office of Sheriff in Ellis county, Texas. Residence Henrietta, Texas.
- (177) vii Eleanor Sarah (Ella) McCue, b 28, Oct. 1854, Staunton, Va.; m 6 May 1875, James William Garrard, b 9, July 1852, Paris, Ky., (son of Thos. and Charlotte Garrard, now of Los Vegas, N. M.) Mr. J. W. Garrard moved from Ky. with his parents in 1864, to Callaway county, Mo., where he was educated. In 1879 he and Mrs. Garrard removed to New Mexico, where he became interested in the sheep business. They now live in Roswell, N. M.

Mrs. Garrard was Matron at Synodical College in 1893-4. She now possesses a ring made of the gold her uncle Boliver Dorman mined when in California in 1849-50. Mrs. Garrard is a church worker and an enthusiastic D. A. R.

m 26, Aug. 1885, Ida Wheeler, b 9, May 1861, dau of Louis Wheeler of Md., and Elizabeth Mason, originally from Ky. Mrs. McCue was educated at Synodical College, was a teacher at Mo. D. & D. from 1881-97, and Matron there from 1901-07. Mr. McCue was educated at

Martinsburg Academy and Kirksville Normal, leaving the latter school in 1879, he taught in public schools, came to Fulton in 1882 and entered the D. & D. Institution as a teacher. In 1891 he became a member of the firm of "Richmond & McCue," Groceries, (Fulton), which was later, "McCue and Grant," In 1901 he returned to the Deaf and Dumb Institution as Assistant Supt., holding that position until 1907. For several years he was President of the Fulton Fire Briek Co., and is now a member of the Board.

In November 1863, George and Frank (Franklin) McCue, with a companion, Markman, left the Confeder-

ate army and undertook to make their way North in order that Frank, who was suffering from serious wounds. might be properly eared for, As the boys reached their old neighborhood a cold drizzling rain set in, turning into sleet. They went into camp in a place near "uncle Isaac Jordin's," known as the "Rochhouse," The trip was made thus far on horseback and Frank was thoroughly exhausted, so since the weather continued inclement, it was deemed wisest to seek the comforts of a quiet home where he could receive proper care for his wounds. Arrangementts were made and after transporting him to "uncle Isaae's" George and Markman continued their journey. The invalid remained some days recuperating, then Tom Bradshow came with a covered wagon and took him to Iowa, where he was eared for at the home of J. G. Crist (182) (his cousin by marriage), until death.

Jordin had not thought of the eonsequences of sheltering a "Rebel." Lieut.-Col. S. P. Cox at Gallatin, was promptly apprised of the matter, but being of a generous nature, gave a friendly warning, and Jordin bade farwell to his home never to return.

"The death and burial last week at Staunton, Va., of John McCue, a well-known engineer and member of one of the 'first families' of the Old Dominion, recalls to many old residents of Baltimore an interesting trial by court martial in this city in the Civil War times. As a boy of fifteen and a Confederate soldier, John McCue was tried for his life as a spy and was only saved through the hard work and influence of prominent Baltimoreans.

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"When the war broke out the spirit of the South of 61 beat high in the breast of young McCue, but he was a mere boy—12 years old—and his father, Capt. John McCue, Sr., who had himself joined the Confederate army, forbade the boy enlisting. To 'keep him out of trouble,' young McCue was sent to the Virginia Military Institute, where it was thought the gay uniform and drilling would be sufficient to satisfy his military appetite.

"The war dragged on. class after class of sturdy youngsters left the institute to join the Southern army, but still John McCue was too young. Then came the dark days of 1864. when the beautiful Valley of the Shenandoah was overrun with the blue troopers. In those days Virginia boys became men in a day and the Virginia Military Institute cadets were ordered to join the little army gathered to oppose the march of the invaders. They fought at New Market, and historian and poet have told how the boys of the Virginia Military Institute charged upon the muzzles of the Federal cannon, bayoneted the gunners and planted their little flag on the battery.

"But the fame won by the cadets on the field at New Market was denied John McCue. When the cadets marched to meet the foe they left at the Institute a dozen weeping boys, too small even to march with their comrades, and John McCue was one of them.

"That was the last straw. A few weeks later there rode into the camp of Mosby's Range—Mosby the guerilla—a mite of a boy on a pony almost as small. It was John McCue, who had run away from school. 'I want to enlist,' stammered the stranger. * *

* * * ''The rangers knew a man when they saw one, no matter what his age and size, and John MeCue was allowed to stay with the band to 'show his mettle.' He did not have long to wait. 'There were few intermissions in the great American Drama of the Sixties. When the Rebel yell rang out on the valley air and the Colts began to pop. John McCue rode in the front rank of the gray. In the melee he rode up to a Federal cavalryman. thrust his tiny pistol in the man's face and hollored 'Surrender!' and five minutes later, mounted on a big horse branded 'U. S.' and with carbine slung over his shoulder and big Colt in hand, John McCue joined in the chase.

"Soon afterward McCue and several comrades were scouting in Maryland when they ran full tilt into a party of Federals. In the fight McCue was knocked from his horse and, after a struggle, was helpless in the grasp of a big soldier in blue.

"Young McCue was brought to Baltimore and locked up in Fort McHenry to be tried for his life as a spy. At that time his father, Capt. McCue, was a prisoner of war in Fort Delaware, and the frantic father wrote to Mrs. Robert Hull of Baltimore to try to save his boy. Mrs. Hull went at once to Capt. Wigel, provost marshal of Baltimore, and explained the case to him, asking permission to employ a lawyer to defend McCue. Capt. Wigel gave her the permission, but advised her not to employ a 'secesh lawyer.' Frederick Brune at once offered his services to defend the boy, but as Mr. Brune was known to be a Southern sympathizer. Mrs. Hull decided to get someone else. Finally she got the services of Milton Whitney, famous as a criminal lawyer and father of Joseph Whitney of Baltimore.

"Mrs. Hull was permitted to summon witnesses for the boy, but the only one she could summon was his father, who was brought from Ft. Delaware under guard. Firmly believing that the boy would be executed. Mrs. Hull summoned his father so he could say goodbye to his son.

"On the stand in his defense young McCue exhibited superb courage, claiming that he was a Confederate soldier and not a spy. He told the court he would answer any question about himself, but none about his comrades.

"When the last day of the trial came Mrs. Hull had given up hope. Addressing the court, Mr. Whitney began to make an appeal for mercy, and said that young McCue had been 'conscripted.'

"Hardly had he uttered the obnoxious word when McCue jumped to his feet, stopped Mr. Whitney and shouted: 'I was not conscripted. I ran away from school to join the army. Take me out and shoot me now, but don't tell my people I said I was conscripted.'

"That ended the trial and Mr. Whitney turned away in despair, saying he had played his last card. As the boy was taken back to prison to await sentence he said to Mrs. Hull: 'Ask them not to shoot me in the face. My mother hasn't seen me for so long she would not know me.'

"By the stand of one member of the court marital— Col. Bowman—the boy's life was saved, but he was sentenced to life imprisonment at hard labor.

"Some time after the war young McCue's family and Col. Bowman interested General Grant in the case, and John McCue was pardoned. * * * *

"When McCue's body wrapped in a Confederate flag, was borne to the grave last week a simple bunch of palm leaves rested on the coffin. It was Mrs. Hull's tribute to a Virginia boy."

"Christianly impressed at home and at school, early

joined the Presbyterian church and with it worshipped until her husband's long desired conversion, in the Episcopal church and he urging she join him in Confirmation. She gratefully rejoiced in his conversion, felt constrained to prayerfully consider and consult the dear Presbyterian minister and people who affectionately by letter and personal expression justified her touched and touching motive and Christlike bade her God speed with her husband to another branch of Christian service.

"Consequently they were confirmed into Emmanuel Episcopal church Sabbath morning, March 14, 1909, by Right Reverend Robert Atkinson Gibson, D. D. Bishop of Virginia. Grand Daughter American Revolution and Daughter the Confederacy.

"January, 1883, married William Smith Rodes, son Charles Rodes and Elisabeth Massie Smith, Avon, Nelson county, Virginia. Who was early orphaned and during the Civil War boarding near the home of Mr. James C. McCue, who was a Southern soldier, serving in the Civil War. Mrs. McCue wills her babes a kind woman companion and several loyal slaves at home. February, 1865, Federal Gen. Sheridan and soldiers raiding and devastating this portion of Virginia, camped around and searched the McCue estate, appropriating to themselves wearing apparel, jewelry, portraits, paintings, libraries, silver plate, ehina, furniture. slaves, horses, eattle, harness, vehieles, implements. everything! Yankee soldiers threatening, disorderly. Mrs. McCue, a plucky, brave woman, naturally now nervous and frightened, ran to the home of her nearest neighbors, Union people, asking protection. Thev kindly sympathized and would and did come frequently to comfort. William Smith Rodes, their boarder, 10 years of age, returned with Mrs. McCue and proved a manful protector and comfort in the varied trials and experiences incident to war.

"Espying Mrs. McCue's little daughter his interest waxed stronger and he continued his war charge long after General Lee surrendered, and Yankees left. In fact wished the war never would end. However 'all is well that ends well.' Mr. Rodes, after all, is the happy possessor of the heart and hand of his 'war charge,' and

if possible, more intensely continues the love and protection imbued when a youthful Rebel, W. S. Rodes' war fact. After a wedding tour of the West, Mr. and Mrs. Rodes located in Rouceverte, Greenbrier county, W. Va., where Mr. Rodes owned a dear home and with his only brother, Robert Clifton, owned flourishing General Merchandise, Gent's Clothing and Tailor Stores and Real Estate, Mrs. Rodes being the only and dearly beloved daughter and sister, Mr. Rodes a general favorite. Parents and brothers combined urge; Mr. Rodes was persuaded to sell his West Virginia interests and in 1890 returned to Virginia and occupy Brookville, a gift from Mrs. Rodes' parents. A happy family reunion. But how sad, in almost a year thereafter, Mr. McCue died and Mrs. McCue died six weeks later. A sudden and distressed shock to the devoted children, relatives and friends. Among the children orphaned were several union sons. Edward and Harry, the two youngest, chose Mr. Rodes as their guardian. A loving charge for Mr. and Mrs. Rodes, who endeavored and hope they faithfully discharged their duty and pleasure.

"Friend in press correspondence, 1904, wrote, 'Mrs. William Smith Rodes, nee Miss Martha Maria McCue, a lovely gentle-hearted, charitable, Christian woman, devoted to her dearly-beloved brothers and husband, a hightone, Christian man.'"

In this capacity he won the admiration and confidence of his church as a devout and earnest worker, and no where will he be missed more than in this office. Married Miss Margaret Hall, Richmond, Virginia. She and three ehildren survive to mourn their loss in his attractive home, well ordered and directed according to Divine Truth.

"Finally relieved by death of a long series of patiently endured afflictions, his remains were brought to Richmond, Virginia, and laid to rest in Holly Wood cemetery.

Knowing him has made me want to be a better man. T know Charles was ready; I know he was a Christian, and I know he is safe now with Jesus. He sleeps. Christ wanted him and will let Christ have him. Oh! let us be ready when Christ calls us. Charles has left a glorious legacy-the legacy of a trusting, unselfish, devoted, loving life. I do not grieve for him, safe in Jesus. But I do grieve and mingle my tears with his dear family-sister, brothers, relatives, friends, Lebanon church, and the whole community. A great sorrow! A severe blow! I pray, Our Heavenly Father put his arms around, comfort and protect. Give us grace to say-"." Thy will be done."





The Steele Family

-FIRST GENERATION-

A very eareful study of the ancestry of the subsequent generations impress the writer with a belief that the progenitor of this family was Sir Riehard Steele (1672-1, Sept. 1729,) or a brother (Samuel?). (the father died at Cameron, Wales; m (1st) 1705, Mrs. Stretch. d 1706; m (2nd) 9, Sept. 1707, Mary Scurlock, of Llangunnor, Wales. Sir Richard was Commissioner of Stamps, Member of Parliament and author of mark. The writer possesses a copy of the "Spectator" written by Addison and Steele (1710-1714). The Steeles were originally Scotch.

From "American Heraldica" p 179, we are advised that the Steele family bore the following arms (and by consulting other works it is found that the various branches are very similar):— "Arms: Arg. a bend, checque, sa. and ermine, between two lions' heads, erased, Gu. On chief az., three billets, or." "Crest: a lion's head, arased gu."

These are found on a tombstone of Capt. John Steele in the King's Chapel Burial Ground, Boston, Mass. His father, Thos. Steele, b 1664, Seotland; d 1735. Boston, Mass.


—SECOND GENERATION—

Which are the Hunters of Polmood in Tweeddale, now extinct; and the Hunters of "Hunterston," of whom the Laird is the present chief of Hunters. Crauford States that those of the "Hunterston" line were owners of their land as far back as Alexander II, King of Seotland.

A branch of this line removed to Martinsburg, W. Va., and another branch settled in Greenbrier county (which were the sons and daughters of Henry Hunter above). An effort has been made to trace the ancestry of Henry Hunter, but to no avail.

According to Mrs. Amos G. Draper, of the Genealogical Dept., of the American Magazine, a Henry Hunter (formerly of Mecklenburg Co., N. C., received a pension for Revolutionary services, he afterwards removed to Virginia, but it is hardly probably that he is the Henry Hunter above, or his son.

Will of David Steele, furnished by Mr. J. J. Steele:

"In the name of God Amen—This twenty-third day of November one thousand eight hundred and twelve— I David Steele of Jessamine county and State of Kentucky. Being at present weak in body but sound in mind and memory. Thanks to the Almighty God for it.

"Therefore calling to mind the morality of my body, knowing it is appointed for all men to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament. That is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it, and my body I recommend to the earth so that at the general resurrection I may receive the same again by the mighty power of God. And so touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life, I give, desire and dispose of in the following manner: FIRST, I desire all my just debt and contracts to be settled.

"I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Mary Steele, her room, desk, beds and other furniture belonging thereto, and likewise her thirds of all the cleared land and stock. I give to her the negro woman named Rose all during her natural life. The negro woman is at her disposal at her death.

"I give and bequeath to my loved son Thomas Steele, that tract of land he now lives on surveyed to him, his heirs and assigns forever.

"I likewise bequeath to my beloved daughter Nancy Lamb and her heirs one bed and furniture at her mother's death.

"I likewise bequeath to my beloved daughter Polly Scantland that tract of land whereon she now lives as surveyed to her and her heirs and assigns forever by paying up the contract to her father's estate, which was between William Scantland and her father.

"I likewise bequeth to my beloved sons David and Samuel Steele all my land and negroes and appurtenances thereto, both real and personal to be equally divided according to quality and quantity.

"And I do wholly disallow, revoke and disarm all and any other form or testaments, wills, bequeaths, by me in any wise before named, willed and bequeathed, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. As witness whereof I have thereunto set my hand seal this day and year, above written, signed, sealed, published, pronounced, and declared by the said David Steele as his last will and testament in the presence of us subscribers:

STEELE, DAVID

"Dec. 2, 1820, David Steele of Augusta Co. testified that he was the same David Steele who had been receiving a pension since 1795 on account of injuries received while belonging to a company of rifle-men, under Capt. James Tate's command, (Volunteer Riflemen,) which was attached to Col. Lee's regiment of horse before the Battle of Guilford Court-House; that he received several wounds March 15, 1781, at the Battle, and has never entirely recovered from their effects.

"The original papers in the case were burned at the time of the fire in the Pension Office; but the facts in the case were corroborated by Judge Archibald Stewart of Augusta Co. who testified that on the evening before the Battle at Guilford Court House he went to see Capt. James Tate where he was encamped, and understood in the course of conversation that Col. Lee who then commanded the Horse in the American Army had applied to Gen. Campbell to point out a proper officer to attach to his Corps—that Gen. Campbell recommended Capt. Tate of Augusta Co. that accordingly early the next morning Capt. Tate with his company of which David Steele was a member, marched in advance of our army with Col. Lee, to meet the British. They were met according to expectation and made a most gallant resistance. Capt. Tate was killed and a large portion of his company were killed and wounded. He recollected seeing Steele the morning after the battle; he had so many sabre wounds that he considered it impossible that he could recover; and when he parted from him, he had not the most distant expectation of ever seeing him again.

"Two surgeons, who examined David Steele, reported that he had received several wounds in his head, some of which manifestly appear to have passed through the skull to the brain, inflicting permanent and severe injury to the bones of the head, by which the left eye is severely injured; also several wounds on the shoulder and back, the scapular bone being cut through to the shoulder, thereby permanently disabling him; and that these wounds, according to all reports, were received by David Steele, while in the performance of his duty, in the service of the United States, at the Battle of Guilford Court House, March 15, 1781.

"His claim was allowed and the pension increased."

While the writer could not swear that this is the exact place that David Steele enters the Steele family, he has every reason to believe it however. D. Steele was undoubtedly a first consin to Mary Steele (his wife).

The horsemen unable to get at him with their swords, put spurs and rode out of his shot. He took advantage of their disappearance and was soon out of danger. David Steele, of Medway, was eut down in the retreat, and left for dead. The scar of a deep wound over one of his eyes, was frightful to strangers, through his long life."

* * * "—Charles S. Arnall was a gentleman, if one ever came into the world, and, if it be higher praise, let us say with equal truth, he was a man. The proudest, purest blood of the Old Dominion flowed in his veins.. He was the very flower of Virginia chivalry, and illustrated with engaging charm every attribute the name implies.

"He was thoroughly imbued with the spirit of the Old South. He loved her history and traditions, her manners and her customs. He loved the fine strain of the cavalier which maintained its purity in the south while the hordes of Europe corrupted the ancestral fountain of less happy sections. He loved the theory of government for which the south took up arms, and when the first war note sounded he was among the first to reach the field. Youth though he was—for he was still in his teens—he threw himself into the conflict with a veteran's dogged persistence, heightened by young blood's fiery zeal.

"To the very point of hardihood he was brave. Wherever the quick and the dead were in red burial blent—whenever the thunder of the guns rolled in deepest diapason—there was young Arnall, flushed with the ardor of the battle, splendid in his unwavering, an inspiration to all who beheld him in the very maelstrom of death.

"He was well preserved for a man of his years, so until the very last he maintained the soldierly bearing which attracted attention everywhere. He was essentially a soldier, and he looked the part. * * * *

"His most distinguished characteristic was the sunny radiance of his smile. * * * Across the silence we greet his chivalric soul."

Capt. Arnall was Georgia State agent for the Phoenix Life Insurance Company. Was adjutant to Gen. Baylor's staff in Gen. "Stonewall" Jackson's brigade.

The Arbuckle Family

-FIRST GENERATION-

The first available records, show a family living near Balcony Falls, Va., consisting of four brothers and a sister. They were among the first settlers of Greenbrier county, then a part of Augusta county.

The writer is under obligations to Dr. J. H. Arbuckle of much of the facts relative to this family.

The service of Capt. Matthew Arbuckle is mentioned in the index to Va. Rev. soldier, recently published; and note is made that he received a bounty warrant from the State of Va. for his Rev. services, as captain.

Jones, who being of a pioneer disposition, acted a guide to Lewis and Clark (1803-5) in the great exploration of the Jefferson Purchase of Louisiana, of St. Louis; m (2nd) 1776, Wm. Poague, who lived ten months, leaving Catharine a widow, a second time, with a posthumous child (Wm. Poague, Jr. gr-father of Geo. Poague who m Sarah McCue Wilson: see No. 126, McCue Chart).

Capt. Wm. Arbuckle participated in the Revolution and in numerous battles with the Indians prior to 1776. Lived at Ft. Lewis, in Pt. Pleasant and removed to a place 16 miles above Pt. Pleasant in the Valley of the Great Kanawha River (1797).

Michael Garber, Jr., and wife were buried in cemetery at Trinity Church, Staunton, Va. This inscripof Guilford, he and his company traveled from there on hoseback, but went into the battle on foot.

"Thomas' name is not anywhere on the roll of soldiers in the Revolution, and it is only now and then that the name of this soldier is found. If any of the descendants of Capt. Thomas Smith wish to join the Sons or Daughters of the American Revolution, it is only necessary to say to them to refer to page 281 of Annals of Angusta County, to find their title to membership.

"Stewartsville, Ind., 9th Sept. 1853.

M. C. Garber,

Dear Sir: I received your answer to my short epistle some time since, and am satisfied that you are of the family of whom I was seeking information. Owing to a of business, and absence from home, I have not had an opportunity of writing to you more satisfactorily till now. My father has resided in Posey county, for something like 32 or 33 years. But he removed some ten months since and is at present a resident of Richland county, 111. He has raised a family of seven children—all living.

"The old gentleman himself is getting somewhat frail but still enjoys as good health as most people of his age, which is, (1 believe) 67 years last May. Myself and two others of the family-a brother and sister-are married. Four of the family remain single-two boys and two girls. The two that are married besides myself are living, the brother in Mount Vernon, Posey county, and the sister within a mile and a half of the same place. The brother's name is Gilbert M., the name of the sister's husband is Proley (or Roley) McBradley. If you can spare the time, from your editorial duties, to visit any, we would like to have you visit us. It would take but a little while to pay us a visit. Three of us live in Posev county, and it is about forty miles to where father and the rest of the family live.

"It is some time since we heard from uncle Thos. P. Smith, probably a year ago; the last we heard from him he was living in Clay county, Mo. Write again at your earliest convenience and give me some particulars eoncerning your family. I wish to know how many of your father's family are living and where they are residing, etc.


