When a rating is given in black face figures the publisher has furnished an affidavit of the average circulation during the calendar year immediately preceding date of issue.

Where a rating is given in black face figures with a star [★] the publisher has furnished a detailed statement showing the actual issue for each date during the calendar year immediately preceding date of issue, supported by an affidavit.

Where a rating is followed by a dagger; thus [†], the paper so rated is a member of the Audit Bureau of Circulations.

Where an affidavit of circulation has not been furnished, the rating is given as accurately as possible in thousands and fractions of thousands.

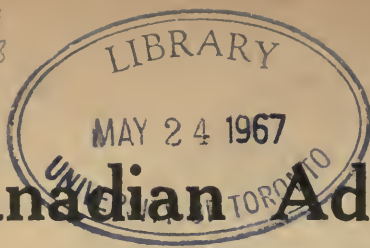

Canadian Advertising 1889---1919

IN presenting the Twelfth Edition of the Canadian Newspaper Directory, it is hardly necessary to emphasize the painstaking care exercised in its production. PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Ontario has an area of 407,262 square miles or 260,647,680 acres, with a population at the last census, in 1911, of 2,523,274 of which 1,194,785 was rural and 1,328,489 urban. The province extends from the United States on the South, to Hudson Bay on the North, a distance of 750 miles; the eastern boundary is only 48 miles from Montreal, the western is only 81 miles from Winnipeg. The intervening distance by rail is 1,285 miles. This gives an area three times as large as the United Kingdom, of which about one-tenth has been taken up, and less than 6% is under cultivation.

Ontario's facilities for railway and water communication combined are not surpassed by those of any division of the American continent. The River St. Lawrence and the great lakes, Ontario, Erie, Huron and Superior, touch it on almost its entire southern and south-western boundaries, it has over 600 miles of sea shore on James and Hudson Bays, while from the "Height of Land," which forms the backbone of the province, many fine rivers flow down to those lakes on the south, or to James Bay or Hudson Bay on the north. Every county in the province has a railway running through it, and the total mileage is 10,708, or nearly one-third of the mileage in Canada.

Ontario leads the Dominion in agriculture. The value of farm lands, according to the last census estimate, was 723,902,419; of buildings \$317,876,963; of implements, \$84,969,426; of live stock, \$214,720,424—a total of \$1,341,469,232.

"Ontario's annual returns from her fields aggregate in a good year over two hundred million dollars. To this should be added over another hundred million dollars from her live stock products."—Deputy Minister of Agriculture.

In fisheries, Ontario ranks fourth among the Provinces, with an annual catch valued at a little less than \$3,000,000.

The estimated area of commercial timber in Ontario is 70,000,000 acres, and of pulpwood 40,000,000 acres. The forest reserves of the Province total 11,690,240 acres, with nearly 3,000,000 acres additional in great parks. The lumber cut is worth over \$25,000,000 per year.

Ontario's mineral resources include the world's greatest nickel deposits, the remarkable Cobalt silver mines, the goldfields of Porcupine and valuable deposits of iron and cobalt. The production in 1915 was valued at \$41,184,954, of which \$8,501,391 represented gold; \$11,742,463 silver; \$17,019,500 nickel and \$3,921,600 copper.

The Province of Ontario spends each year many millions of dollars on education, maintaining in 1915 6,063 public schools, 537 Roman Catholic separate schools, 228 kindergarten schools, 30 public night schools, 160 high schools and collegiate institutes, and 132 continuation schools with 13,504 teachers and 573,178 pupils in all.

In higher education the Province has several universities and colleges, normal college and schools, art, industrial, technical, domestic science and agricultural schools.

Ontario is represented in the Dominion Parliament by 24 senators and 83 members of the House of Commons. Its local government is carried on by a single chamber having 111 members. Capital, Toronto.

The Bay, sheltered by Toronto Island, affords an excellent harbor, from which passenger and freight boats run throughout the season of navigation to all lake and St. Lawrence River ports, Canadian and American. Toronto is a great railroad centre, with connections by C. P. R., G. T. R., C. N. R., T. & N. O. R., T. H. & B. Ry. and their various branches and connections with all the important centres on the continent. Over 200 freight and 135 passenger trains enter and leave the city daily. The Toronto Suburban Railway runs to Port Credit and connects with the Hamilton Electric Railway. Toronto & York Radial Railway runs from North Toronto to Lake Simcoe, and the Toronto and Scarboro' suburban line runs to West Hill, via the Kingston Road. The manufactures embrace nearly everything required by the public, a few of the more important being organs, pianos, boilers, building materials, agricultural implements, cast iron work of every description, furniture, machinery, bridge works, ships, steel and cast iron piping, paints, oils and varnishes, hardware and dry goods. It is estimated that the city's factories employ over 100,000 hands. Toronto is the second largest city in Canada, it is the Mecca of trade and commerce and a popular resort for tourists, the centre of Lake Passenger traffic and is an important banking centre. Nine of Canada's chartered banks have their head offices and over 120 branches in the city, while 10 other banks have 60 branches located here.

The area within the city limits, as recently estimated by the City Engineer, is 32.59 square miles, not including the portion of the city land covered by water. There are 530 miles of streets and 140 miles of lanes. The electric street car lines comprise over 133 miles of tracks, and 700 cars are in daily use. There are 314 miles of sewers and 399 miles of water mains. The waterworks system cost \$10,000,000 and the annual revenue now exceeds \$1,000,000.

Toronto is the educational centre of the Province and contains 203 educational institutions, including the University of Toronto with its several federated or affiliated universities and colleges of different denominations. The following are some of the most important: Toronto and McMaster Universities; Victoria, Knox, Wycliffe, St. Andrews, St. Michaels and Upper Canada Colleges; Royal College of Dental Surgeons, College of Pharmacy, Havergal, Moulton and St. Margaret's Ladies Colleges, Conservatory of Music and College of Music, Margaret Eaton School of Expression, Technical High School, seventy-four public schools and seven high schools. There are seven public libraries in the city, containing 185,988 volumes, including those of the Department of Education and the Law Society of Ontario, and that of the Ontario Government, containing 75,000 volumes. Toronto is the musical centre of the Dominion and boasts some very fine musical organizations. It is the home of many famous choirs such as Mendelssohn's, Schubert's, and the National Chorus. The Toronto Symphony Orchestra can scarcely be surpassed on the American continent. Toronto has many massive and handsome buildings, including the Parliament Buildings, Government House, City Hall, University of Toronto, Post Office, Customs House, Royal Ontario Museum, Asylum for the Insane, Mercer Reformatory, General Hospital, Osgoode Hall, Normal School, I. O. F. and Masonic Temples, Confederation Life, Canada Life Assurance Co., Kent, Lumsden, Union Bank, Canadian Bank of Commerce, Standard, Dominion and Royal Bank Building.

There are many charitable institutions and organizations, including the Hospital for Sick Children, Boys' and Girls' Home, Homes for the Aged, General Hospital, Home for Incurables, House of Providence, Childrens' Shelter and the Notre Dame. The new General Hospital occupies an entire block comprising in all about ten acres, and is considered the most complete of its kind on the continent. Toronto is often called a city of homes, and is noted not only for its many fine residences but also for the uniformly comfortable and attractive appearance of the residential sections. The city is well supplied with places of amusement, having 33 public parks, three beaches, free Zoological Gardens, an island devoted to summer amusements, a number of athletic fields, yachting, rowing and canoe clubs, 8 large theatres, and Massey Hall, seating 5,000. It has a splendid police force with mounted contingent and an ambulance corps, and is lighted with gas and electricity. The hydro electric current for the street railway and for a large part of the city lighting is brought from Niagara Falls. The lighting system is owned by the city and Toronto is one of the best illuminated cities on the continent. It has one of the best annual exhibitions in the world, held in grounds containing 264 acres and 73 permanent buildings. Main group of 12 buildings are steel, brick and concrete. Grounds, situated on shore of Lake Ontario extend along water-front for upwards of one mile, and when not in use for Exhibition purposes, form a magnificent public park and playground. The grandstand is of steel, reinforced concrete and brick, 725 feet in length, and has chair seating capacity of 16,800. The "Exhibition City" has paved streets and its own electric lighting plant of 30,000 lamps. It has a permanent population during the time of the Exhibition of 15,000 people. There are 256 churches and some 50 missions in the city, over 56,000 telephones and 200 hotels. PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Quebec is the largest of the Provinces of Canada, with an area of 703,653 square miles, or over four hundred and sixty-two million acres—more than five times as large as the United Kingdom. Of this vast area only about one-twentieth is under cultivation. The population of the Province at the last census (1911) was 2,002,712, of whom 80 per cent were French-speaking. In fact, three-quarters of the French-speaking people in Canada live in Quebec Province. The increase in population during the decade ending 1911 was 21 per cent.

The settlement of Quebec Province was begun by the French in 1534, and for centuries it did not extend far back from the St. Lawrence and its tributary streams, which were the highways. Since then the fertile "Eastern Townships" have been settled, as well as large tracts to the north of the St. Lawrence and Ottawa. Over half the population is engaged in farming, the average size of the farms being considerably smaller than in Ontario and the Western Provinces. The latest estimates place the grain yield as follows: spring wheat, 1,411,000 bushels; oats, 42,182,000; barley, 2,255,000; rye, 145,000; peas, 404,000; beans, 103,000; buckwheat, 2,568,000; other grains, 3,512,000 bushels. The live stock owned in 1916 was estimated as follows: horses, 228,670; milch cows, 639,805; other cattle, 535,693; sheep, 497,711; swine, 531,303. The Province has 604 butter factories, 935 cheese factories and 519 factories making both. The value of the butter and cheese products in 1915 was \$18,500,501.

Quebec's forest wealth is very great. Its 111,600,000 acres of forest preserves are valued at \$445,000,000, and they are interspersed with streams and rivers which aid in lumbering operations and provide power for pulp, paper and sawmills. It is estimated that there are six hundred million cords of pulpwood in the Province.

The mineral production of Quebec during 1917 was valued at some ten million dollars. Eighty per cent of the world's supply of asbestos comes from this Province.

Quebec's fisheries rank fifth among the Provinces and are worth about \$2,000,000 a year.

Quebec is second only to Ontario in manufactures, with 6,548 industrial establishments in 1911, while Montreal is the leading manufacturing city of the Dominion. The factories of the Province employ about 175,000 workers, and pay annual wages of over \$75,000,000.

The railways of Quebec Province have a total mileage of 4,354, while the headquarters of two of the great transcontinental systems, the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Grand Trunk Railway, are in Montreal. The bulk of the ocean trade between Canada and Europe is handled in Montreal and Quebec, where excellent harbors have been developed.

A dual system of education exists in the Province, there being both Roman Catholic and Protestant School Boards. The latest figures show 6,894 elementary and model schools and academies, 14 normal schools, 21 colleges, 3 universities and over 100 schools dealing with various special subjects with a total number of scholars amounting to 486,335, and a total government expenditure of \$8,955,296.10.

By special provision of the British North America Act, Quebec has a fixed representation of 65 in the Dominion House of Commons, the ratio of population to number of members in this Province being used as a basis to determine the representation from the other Provinces. To the Senate Quebec sends 24 members. The Provincial Legislature consists of a Legislative Council of 24 members and a Legislative Assembly of 82 members. The capital is Quebec City.

T., Ex., Banks. Montreal is at the head of St. Lawrence ocean navigation, and at the beginning of inland navigation, and has railway connection via C. P. R., G. T. R., I. C. R., N. Y. C. Ry. and other lines with every important point in North America. It is distant from Quebec 172 miles; from Ottawa 120 miles; Toronto 333; Hamilton 373; Halifax 758; Fredericton 457; Winnipeg 1423; Victoria 2990; Regina 1779; Boston 334; New York 400; Chicago 845; and 2750 miles from Liverpool. Montreal is the greatest manufacturing centre in the Dominion; it is a bee-hive of industry, producing practically all the wants of twentieth century civilization from monster railroad locomotives to the lowliest kitchen utensil. Its products include architectural iron and bronze, asbestos products, automobiles, awnings, babbit metals, jute and cotton bags, beds and bedding, belting, biscuits and confectionery, boilers, boots and shoes, brassware, bricks, brooms and brushes, building paper, buttons, carriages and sleighs, cigars, cigarettes and tobacco, clothing, cottons, drugs, chemical and proprietary articles, electric apparatus, fixtures and supplies, elevators, engines, extracts, fans and blowers, flour, furniture, furs, glass, gloves, gramophones, hats and caps, jewellery, leather and leather goods, lumber, machinery, optical goods, paints and varnishes, paper goods, photographic supplies, pianos and organs, pipe and boiler coverings, plumbers' and steamfitters' supplies, refrigerating machinery, railroad rolling stock, razors, roofing, rope and twine, rubber goods, safes and vaults, sewing machines, ships, shoe machinery, soaps, stoves and furnaces, structural steel, starch, sugar, syrup and molasses, terra cotta, thread, tiles and tiling, tin and enamelware, tools, typesetting machines, typewriters, umbrellas, vacuum cleaners, watches and clocks, wines and liquors and wire goods. It is the headquarters of the two great railway corporations, the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific, whose works here employ several thousand hands in each case.

In the year 1535, Jacques Cartier came up the St. Lawrence to where the city now stands, and found a large, well-fortified Indian town called Hochelaga. In 1611, Champlain established a trading-post and called it Place Royale. In 1642, Paul de Chomedey, Sieur de Maisonneuve, landed on the island and laid the lasting foundation of the city. Canada remained a French colony till the Treaty of Paris in 1763, when Montreal became a British city. Its growth in population has been consistent. At the time of the cession to Great Britain the city had only a population of some 3,000; at the beginning of the last century this had increased to 12,000 and at the present time she boasts of over 600,000 inhabitants. Situated on the island of Montreal, the largest of a group of islands formed by the confluence of the Ottawa with the St. Lawrence river, one thousand miles from the open sea, its position is picturesque to a degree. Behind is the beautifully wooded Mount Royal, in front the majestic St. Lawrence.

Montreal is the head of ocean navigation, the key to the interior of the Dominion, the greatest export centre on the continent for grain and dairy produce, and the greatest seaport in America next to New York. It handles one-third of Canada's commerce, is visited each season by about 750 ocean-going steamers and 13,000 lake and river steamers, the whole fleet having a tonnage of approximately 7,000,000. The Montreal-Quebec channel now has a

minimum depth of 31 feet and easily accommodates vessels of 15,000 tons. The water area of the harbour is 12,000 acres, and granite wharves extend nearly 12 miles up and down the river. Splendid steel harbour sheds stand along the water front and three huge grain elevators provide a storage capacity of over seven million bushels. The harbour facilities include a 75 ton floating crane, and one of the largest floating dry docks in the world. This was installed in 1912 by Vickers, Sons and Maxim, and has a lifting capacity of 27,500 tons.

Montreal contains 32,000 acres or 50 square miles; its greatest length is 13 miles and width 8 miles. It has taxable property valued at \$628,086,376, exempt \$215,251,101—a total valuation of \$843,337,477. The city has approximately 125,000 dwellings. Quite a number of outlying municipalities have been annexed within the last few years and the city is rapidly extending its boundaries. Montreal has about two-thirds of the banking capital of Canada, no less than eight chartered banks having their head offices here. Twelve other banks have branches here, making over 110 branches in the city altogether. Montreal is noted for its charitable and religious institutions, some of which were founded nearly 250 years ago. The oldest church in the city is the Bonsecours (Roman Catholic); it was erected in 1658, was burnt in 1764, but rebuilt in 1771. The principal buildings are the City Hall, Court House, Post Office, Customs House, Board of Trade, Seminary of St. Sulpice, Convent of Notre Dame, General Hospital, Royal Victoria Hospital, Grey Nunnery, Montreal College, McGill University Buildings, Laval University, Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Colleges, Young Men's Christian Association Building, Sailors' Institute, St. Mary's College, Montreal Diocesan College, Royal Victoria College, Victoria Skating Rink, Deaf and Dumb Asylum. Many splendid banks and commercial buildings make the business section very solid and imposing; there are nine markets, including Bonsecours, a magnificent building with a lofty dome, fronting on the River. The city has over two hundred churches, many of them, such as Notre Dame and St. James Cathedrals and St. James Methodist Church, famous throughout the country. The parish church of Notre Dame holds 10,000 to 12,000 persons. It is 255 feet long and 145 feet broad with two towers 220 feet high. In one of the towers is one of the largest bells in America weighing 12 tons. St. James Cathedral is even larger than this. Christ Church Cathedral is considered the most perfect specimen of Gothic architecture in America. The parks and squares reserved in the various districts in the city number over 50, and have an area of 805 acres and an estimated value of \$8,000,000. Two splendid steel bridges span the St. Lawrence, one from the south-west part of the city to St. Lambert, on the opposite shore, and the other about seven miles above the city. The educational facilities of the city comprise the Universities of McGill and Laval with faculties of law, arts, science, medicine and veterinary science, and theological colleges connected with the Methodist, Congregational, Presbyterian, Church of England and Roman Catholic churches; a high school, two technical schools, over 70 public schools, a number of private schools and several classical and scientific academies, also a medical college affiliated with Victoria College, Toronto, and the medical faculty of the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville. Montreal has over 1300 streets, with 125 miles of electric car tracks. The city sends five members to the House of Commons and nine to the Local Legislature.

Quebec is the capital of the Province of Quebec. In the grandeur of its site and surroundings, in the strength of its fortifications, and in the extent and romance of its history, Quebec stands supreme among the cities of America. It has a remarkably picturesque situation between the St. Lawrence and St. Charles Rivers, at the north-eastern extremity of a narrow but elevated tableland, which for about eight miles forms the left bank of the River St. Lawrence. Cape Diamond, the extremity of the tableland, is 333 feet above the level of the river, to which it presents a nearly precipitous face; the descent to the St. Charles River is more gradual. The distance from one river to the other is little more than a mile. Opposite Cape Diamond the St. Lawrence is contracted to a breadth of 1,314 yards; but immediately below, at the confluence of the St. Charles, it spreads out into a broad and beautiful basin, more than 2,500 yards wide, forming a capacious and excellent harbour. The Quebec Bridge, which spans the St. Lawrence River above the city, is described as the eighth wonder of the world. As an engineering feat, the construction of this mammoth bridge far eclipses the structure over the Firth of Forth in Scotland, which is the second bridge in the world to-day. The Quebec Bridge connects the city directly with Winnipeg and the West by the shortest route from the Atlantic seaboard. The Spring tides rise and fall 18 to 22 feet. Quebec is divided into two parts called Upper and Lower Towns. The Upper Town occupies the highest part of the promontory; a small part of it is surrounded with walls, and otherwise fortified. The ancient citadel, which crowns the summit of Cape Diamond, covers, with its numerous works, an area of 40 acres, and from its position is the strongest natural fortress in America. The Lower Town, which is the seat of commerce, is built around the base of Cape Diamond, where, in many places, the rock has been cut away to make room for the houses. The banks of both rivers are lined with warehouses and wharves, the latter jutting about 200 feet into the stream, and along them the water is sufficiently deep to admit vessels of the largest size. The city has several times suffered from disastrous fires, but the result has been the erection of more attractive buildings and a consequent improvement in the general appearance of the city. In the Upper Town are several squares and public walks commanding views unrivalled for their varied and picturesque appearance. In one stands a substantial monument, erected to the joint memory of Generals Wolfe and Montcalm, the English and French commanders who fell in the taking of Quebec in 1759. It is 65 feet high. A

monument 40 feet high marks the spot where General Wolfe fell on the Plains of Abraham; while on St. Foy Road stands a monument presented by Prince Napoleon Bonaparte in 1855, commemorating a fierce struggle which took place here in 1760 between the British and French troops. Among the public buildings of Quebec may be mentioned the Parliament Buildings; Drill Hall; the Roman Catholic Basilica, with a seating capacity of 4,000 persons, and covering with the university attached an area of eight acres; the English Cathedral, surmounted by a lofty spire, both occupying elevated positions in the Upper Town, Chateau Frontenac, Bishop's Palace and Anglican See House. There are numerous churches in Quebec and one synagogue. The educational institutions comprise three Roman Catholic Colleges, viz: Laval University, with faculties of arts, law and medicine, the Grand Seminary and the Minor Seminary; the Ursuline Convent, an extensive establishment founded in 1641; several nunneries; Laval, Normal and Model schools; Girls' High school; the Quebec High school, and a number of private academies and public schools. There are in addition, a Canadian Institute, provided with a library and reading room; the Literary and Historical Society, the oldest Chartered Institution of its kind in Canada, having been founded in 1824, and possessing valuable "Records of the Realm" in eighty or ninety folios, and a large selection of historical manuscripts; the Entomological Society, St. Patrick's Literary Institute, Advocates' Library, Board of Trade, Merchants' Exchange and the Y. M. C. A. rooms. The principal benevolent institutions are the Hotel Dieu, Jeffery Hale's Hospital, General Hospital, Finlay Asylum, Church of England Women's Home, Ladies' Protestant Home, St. Bridget's Home, Female Orphan Asylum, and the Lunatic Asylum at Beauport. PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK

New Brunswick is the largest of the Maritime Provinces, with an area of 27,985 square miles. Of this 4,530,298 acres, or about one quarter, is occupied. The population at the last census was 351,889, of which over 70 per cent was rural.

As in most of the other provinces, the activities of the people are determined by the natural resources. Bounded on three sides by Chaleurs Bay, the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Northumberland Strait and the Bay of Fundy, fishing is naturally one of the greatest and most valuable industries, with the utilization of the great forest wealth its running mate.

There are over 22 billion feet of standing timber in the province and pulpwood exports annually amount to about 125,000 cords, valued at \$1,000,000. The estimated forest area is 9,000,000 acres. The Province has 240 active lumber mills and thousands of men find employment in various branches of the lumber industry. Upwards of 250,000,000 feet of lumber—exclusive of laths, etc.—are sent out from the mills of the St. John River annually, and great quantities are exported from the North Shore and Bay ports as well.

The provincial fisheries employ about 20,000 people: nearly 400 vessels and 8,000 fishing boats are in use, and the value of the fisheries amounts to over \$4,000,000 annually.

Farming is, of course, another very important branch of the people's activity. Each year sees new lands available for the farmer and the adoption of more advanced agricultural methods. Potatoes form one of the most important crops in the province, the annual yield averaging close to ten million bushels. Dairying holds a leading place, nearly a million pounds each of butter and cheese being marketed.

New Brunswick's annual mineral production amounts to about a million dollars. Deposits of coal, copper, gold, galena, albertite, salt and grindstones have been found in different sections. Some of the coal mines, especially those of Queens County, have been declared to be very valuable; and the resources of the whole province have been estimated at 151 million long tons. One of the richest iron deposits on the continent is located on the Nipisiguit river in Gloucester and a splendid iron and steel industry is being developed. Petroleum has been found in Westmoreland and Albert Counties and widespread reservoirs of natural gas under very high pressure tapped. Immense areas of oil shales exist in Albert, Westmoreland and Kings Counties. There are numerous water powers on these various rivers and their tributaries. The largest power is that at Grand Falls on the St. John where at the smallest summer flow over 100,000 horse power is available. New Brunswick at the last census had 1,158 manufacturing establishments, and is making rapid progress in that line. There are over 80 branches of Canadian Chartered Banks in operation.

The Province is represented in the Dominion Parliament by seven Senators and eleven Commons. The Provincial Legislature is made up of 48 members. There are three cities in the province — St. John, Fredericton and Moncton, Fredericton being the Capital.

PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA

The Province of Nova Scotia—called in its early days Acadia, and embracing under that term the territory of the present Province of New Brunswick as well—is bounded on the north and west by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Strait of Northumberland and Bay of Fundy, and on the east and south by the Atlantic Ocean. Only a narrow neck of land separates the waters of the Bay of Fundy from the Strait of Northumberland. Standing out in the Atlantic, and commanding, in a commercial sense, the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the province is remarkably situated for maritime pursuits, which employ a large proportion of her people. Each and every county in the whole province reaches the sea, and possesses one or more harbours; and the position of the province in this respect is unique in the geography of the world.

The area of Nova Scotia is 21,428 square miles, or 13,713,771 acres, and the population in 1911 was 492,338. It has 18 counties, three cities, 25 incorporated towns and about 850 villages.

The last census estimate places the grain crop at 4,480,700 bushels divided thus: wheat, 277,000 bushels; oats, 3,587,000; barley, 132,000 rye, 7,000; peas, 3,700; beans, 20,000; buckwheat, 309,000; mixed grains 145,000. The province is famous for its apples, the 1916 crop amounting to 830,000 barrels, valued at approximately two million dollars.

Nova Scotia is rich in minerals, particularly coal and iron ore, which are found side by side in enormous quantities. The estimated mineral production for 1916 was: coal, coke and by-products, \$24,695,000; iron and steel products, \$18,000,000; gypsum, limestone, etc., \$1,100,000; building materials and clay products, \$460,000.

The fisheries of the province employ a large number of men, and yielded, in 1916, \$8,150,000. Game and furs were worth half a million.

The estimated acreage of commercial timber is 5,000,000, and of pulpwood as much more, capable of producing 24,000,000 cords. The annual cut of lumber is worth about \$2,000,000.

The province has 1,500 manufacturing establishments, employing over 30,000, and turning out annually products worth fifty million dollars.

In addition to its almost unparalleled facilities for coastwise trade, Nova Scotia has 1,360 miles of railway in operation. Banking facilities are provided by 110 branches of Canadian Chartered Banks.

Nova Scotia has 2,845 schools, with 110,847 pupils and 2,995 teachers. The province has four universities—Acadia University at Wolfville, Dalhousie College and University at Halifax, University of King's College at Windsor, University of St. Francis Xavier's College at Antigonish—three colleges, a provincial normal school, an academy for the deaf, dumb and blind—the first in any British colony—a school of mining, horticulture and agriculture, and numerous country academies, besides high schools. Nova Scotia sends to the House of Commons 18 members, and to the Upper House 10 senators; its local legislature has 38 members in the Assembly and 18 in the Legislative Council. Capital, Halifax.

PROVINCE of PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Though the smallest in area—having a land surface of only 2,184 square miles—Prince Edward Island is the most thickly settled and one of the most productive of the provinces of Canada. The population at the last census was 93,728, an average of 43 to the square mile.

There is scarcely a foot of land in Prince Edward Island not capable of cultivation, and the soil is uniformly rich. This natural advantage, coupled with a temperate climate and regular rainfalls, has made the province famous as an agricultural and stock raising country. The Island horses, cattle and sheep are eagerly sought after both by Canadian and United States buyers. But it is in dairying and in the meat business that Prince Edward Island has made remarkable strides. It is now sometimes referred to as "The Denmark of Canada." Among other agricultural products, the Island oats and potatoes are famous throughout America and the West Indies for their excellence, the foreign demand for these products being steadily on the increase.

The agricultural yield for 1916 was estimated at 6,567,000 bushels oats, worth \$5,940,200; 6,200,000 bushels potatoes, worth \$3,100,000; 3,800,000 bushels turnips and roots, worth \$760,000; a total value of \$7,800,000.

Live stock to the value of over \$1,500,000 is marketed annually.

The fishing interests of the Island are important, its position in the Gulf giving it great advantages. The value of the fish taken by Prince Edward Island fishermen averages very close to \$1,500,000 annually, and fully two-thirds is exported to foreign countries. The principal fish caught are mackerel, herring, cod, hake, lobsters and oysters. There are 95 lobster canning establishments on the Island and the annual take of lobsters is about 2½ million pound cans, and of oysters about 25,000 barrels, the Prince Edward Island oysters—especially those of Malpeque Bay—being esteemed the finest in flavour of any on the Atlantic coast.

The most remarkable industry of Prince Edward Island is fur farming, which includes the breeding of three varieties of foxes, raccoon, fisher, otter, beaver, muskrat, mink, marten, Persian lambs and Russian sable. Over 3,000 foxes were reared in the Province in 1916, and the industry promises to add very materially to its wealth. Old and young silver black foxes on the the Island on December 1st, 1916, numbered 7,000.

The railway system of the Island, some 279 miles in length, is of 3 feet 6 inches gauge and is entirely owned and operated by the Government of Canada. Three-quarters of the area of the Province is within five miles of the railway, and no part is over ten miles distant. Official statistics show that the Province has less crime and vice in proportion to population than any other Province of Canada and compares favorably in that regard with any country in the world. The sale of liquor for beverage purposes has been prohibited by law since 1901. Prince Edward Island has 479 public schools, with 590 teachers and 17,078 pupils. The percentage of rural school attendance is remarkably high. Prince Edward Island is represented in the Dominion Parliament by four senators and four members of the House of Commons. Its local government is carried on by a single house, the Legislative Assembly, having 30 members. Capital, Charlottetown.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA

Territorially the Province of Manitoba is one of the largest in confederation. Extending as far north as the 60th parallel and eastward to the Hudson Bay, it comprises a total area of 251,832 square miles, or 61,172,298 acres, of which about 85 per cent. is land. Manitoba enjoys the unique distinction of being the only one of the three prairie provinces, having a boundary on the sea, its boundary on Hudson Bay giving it several hundred miles of coast line and a number of important natural harbors. The southern part of the province is devoted almost exclusively to agriculture, being one of the biggest wheat-producing districts in the world. The northern part, while also rich in agricultural areas, is more remarkable for its wealth of minerals, timber, fish and fur, most of which is as yet undeveloped and is waiting only for the application of capital, industry and enterprise.

Important and very valuable discoveries of gold, copper sulphide and silver have been made in the past two or three years, especially in a district east of Lake Winnipeg and also north of The Pas. Much development work is being done.

The population of Manitoba is well over the half million mark.

At the last census (1911) only $8\frac{1}{3}\%$ of the land was occupied. First class arable land in the old province is estimated to amount to 30,000,000 acres, of which about 14,000,000 acres is occupied and close to 9,000,000 acres is actually under cultivation. In 1915 over 7,250,000 acres was actually under crop. Total agricultural production in that year was estimated by the Provincial Government statisticians at over \$262,000,000. Wheat amounted to 96,662,912 bushels with an average of 26.2 per acre; oats, 101,077,991 bushels with an average of 47.7 bushels; barley, 35,423,495 bushels with an average of 34 bushels. Dairy products are increasing rapidly in volume, amounting to \$3,417,381 in 1914, to \$3,845,183 in 1915 and to \$4,483,614 in 1916. The census of live stock in the province for 1916 showed 341,496 horses; 665,686 cattle; 261,774 pigs and 89,475 sheep, the value of which was estimated at \$103,821,763. Mixed farming is growing steadily. The annual wool crop is increasing and beekeeping is rapidly becoming a large and most profitable side line with farmers in all parts of the province.

Though the timber in the north of the province is almost inexhaustible—great forests of pine, spruce, poplar, birch, elm, tamarack, ash and fir—and the lakes are plentifully stocked with fish, lumbering and fishing have as yet received little attention compared with agriculture. There are about one hundred lumber mills, cutting approximately \$1,000,000 worth a year, and the annual catch of fish is worth about \$800,000.

Mineral products consist chiefly of building materials such as cement, gypsum, brick clay and stone, the average output of which has been as large as two and a half million dollars when the building trades demanded it. Recent discoveries of gold, copper, copper sulphide and silver are being developed and large shipments have yielded handsome profits. Manitoba has large areas of lignite coal estimated to contain 150,000,000 long tons and recent experiments promise to bring this vast deposit into use for the production of gas.

There are 4,672 miles of railway in Manitoba, Winnipeg with 24 separate lines of track entering from all parts of the province being the chief railway centre. Portage la Prairie and Brandon are also important railway centres.

Manufacturing is rapidly assuming large proportions. the value of manufacturers in 1916 being closely estimated at \$52,000,000. Winnipeg and its immediate district has the great bulk of the manufacturing industries of the province, aided largely by cheap electrical power supplied by the power developments of the City of Winnipeg and the Winnipeg Electric Railway Company from the Winnipeg River. Industries in Winnipeg include large meat-packing establishments, cold storage plants, biscuit factories, oatmeal mills, bag, cloth, skirt, over-all, shirt, underwear, awning and tent factories, box factories, large carriage factories, automobile factories and a great number of other industries. There is raw material in abundance—grains of all kinds for the flour and cereal food manufacturer, wool for the spinner, flax seed for the oil manufacturer, straw and pulp for paper mills, minerals, gypsum, peat, salt, manganese, limestone and sand for glass making. In the chief cities of the province are also found the head offices or western branches of many of the largest commercial and wholesale companies of Canada; a great number of financial institutions, such as trust companies, loan companies, fire and life insurance companies, banks, etc., have their head offices in the province. There are over 200 branches of banks in the province.

The whole province is dotted with schools and churches. There are over 1,900 schools employing nearly 3,000 teachers, with an enrollment of 104,000 pupils. A well equipped University and a modern Agricultural College are supported by the province. Manitoba sends ten members to the Dominion House of Commons and four to the Senate, while the Provincial Legislature consists of 48 members. Capital, Winnipeg

The city contains 133 churches and missions, 42 public schools, with a registered attendance exceeding 23,000, and six parochial schools with 1,200 pupils, six colleges, a university, new agricultural college, academies, ladies' schools, the Provincial Government buildings, court house, gaols, chief offices of the Dominion Government in the west, city hall, million dollar Canadian Pacific Railway Hotel, \$1,500,000 G. T. P. Hotel, \$140,000 Carnegie Library, Industrial Exhibition buildings, markets, fire stations and police stations, water works, electric street and house lighting, gas, electric street railway, seven bridges, permanent and volunteer military force. The history of Winnipeg, with its wonderful growth and progress, reads like a chapter from some romance. Forty years ago it was but a post of the Hudson Bay Co., without churches, streets or railroads, and but a few years previously the Indian chased herds of buffalo across the prairie where the city now stands; in 1870 its population was 215; 1902, 48,411; 1912, 200,000. It is now the railroad and business centre of the Canadian Northwest. Twenty-seven pairs of railway tracks radiate from it, and the C. P. R. yard here, with its 150 miles of sidings, is the largest in the world controlled by a single corporation. 10,000 railway employees reside in the city. It is in the famous Red River Valley, and surrounded by good farming, timber, and mining districts with extensive lake fisheries. The streets of the city are generally wide, the principal avenues being 132 feet, and many are paved with asphalt, block and macadam. The sidewalks are concrete, tile and plank. The city is spreading rapidly over a wide territory, with its wide streets and its detached houses. Not less than 15,287 acres have been covered by its 253 miles of sewers, 481 miles of paved and graded streets, 145 miles of which are boulevarded, and 526 miles of sidewalks. Approximately 280 miles of water mains have been laid down since the city's incorporation about 35 years ago. Winnipeg's assessment returns tell the story of progress—in 1900 the figures were \$25,077,400; 1902, \$28,615,810; 1905, \$62,727,630; 1906, \$80,511,727; 1909, \$131,402,800; 1916, \$323,490,280, and in 1917, \$253,667,790. The grain business of the Canadian West centres in Winnipeg, and for the year 1916 the amount of wheat export exceeded 247,000,000 bushels. It is the biggest grain market in the world with one exception. This is evidence enough of the nature of the soil tributary to Winnipeg. In addition to agriculture a considerable fishing business is done in the large Northern lakes, and timber and mining enterprises abound on their shores. Winnipeg city owns and operates its own asphalt paving plant, its own quarry, public lighting, water works, including high pressure system for fire protection costing \$950,000, and fire alarm plants. Winnipeg is fast becoming an important manufacturing centre—the output of local factories in 1917 was estimated at \$90,000,000. Winnipeg has decided to encourage manufacturers by affording cheap power. A power plant has been erected on the Winnipeg River where a total of 60,000 h.p. can be developed.

PROVINCE OF SASKATCHEWAN

Saskatchewan occupies the central part of the great alluvial plain of the Canadian Northwest, the most fertile wheat field in the world. It extends from Manitoba 375 miles west to Alberta, and from the United States Boundary Line, 49° N. Latitude, 740 miles north to 60° N. Latitude. Its area is 250,650 square miles, or 161,088,000 acres, of which 27,000 square miles is water. The population at the last census, 1911, was 492,431—an increase of 400,000 between 1901 and 1911—and the estimated population in 1915 was 700,000, 80 per cent. engaged in agriculture.

Saskatchewan has the largest continuous area in the world suitable for growing the famous hard spring wheat. At least 50,000,000 acres of its land are capable of raising an average of 20 bushels to the acre, most of it No. 1 Northern. There are 86,000 square miles of land suitable for grain growing, 32,000 square miles more that only need irrigation to fit them for raising wheat, and over 100,000 square miles suited for ranching and mixed farming. As yet only about 15 per cent. has been brought under cultivation.

The chief business of the province is wheat growing. The average six-year wheat yield for the Province of Saskatchewan exceeds that of the United States by two bushels per acre, the production of the former being 18 bushels per acre, as against 16 for the United States, while the best bushel of wheat exhibited at the International Dry Farming Congress in 1914 was grown at Rosthern, Saskatchewan. Over ten million acres is now producing grain of all kinds at the rate of about 250 million bushels a year. Crops represent a return of nearly two hundred dollars per annum for every man, woman and child in the province.

The most recent estimate of the live stock in Saskatchewan, June, 1916, was:—646,633 horses; milch cows, 218,230; other cattle, 556,710.

Saskatchewan's coal resources are estimated at 59,812,000,000 long tons, contained within 4,000 square miles of coal areas. The annual production is about 250,000 tons.

Timber is found in some sections, generally along the banks of streams, lakes and rivers. The annual output of lumber mills and sash and door factories is valued at \$10,000,000.

Saskatchewan is one of the most prolific fur-bearing provinces—yielding annually furs valued at nearly \$1,000,000.

In railway mileage Saskatchewan is second only to Ontario among the provinces of the Dominion, with 6,101 miles. The Canadian Pacific, Canadian National, Grand Trunk Pacific and Great Northern Railways have recently extended their lines, and the whole province is now well supplied with means of transportation. Towns and villages are springing up quickly along the railways. Banking facilities are provided by over four hundred branches of most of the chartered banks of Canada. The province has a Government owned and operated telephone system, with 4,000 pole mileage, connecting with 300 centres, 17,000 local and 8,000 rural subscribers. Saskatchewan has 3,787 schools; 4,871 teachers, 23 school inspectors and 5 inspectors of school districts; with an attendance of 111,059 scholars. The University of Saskatchewan has an enrollment of over 400. The climate, although rather severe in winter, is more moderate than that of Manitoba, and is delightful in summer, the long, sunny days being admirably suited for maturing the wheat rapidly. The province is governed by a Lieutenant-Governor, an Executive Council and a Legislative Assembly of 54 members. Capital Regina.

PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

Alberta extends from the 49th parallel on the south to the 60th on the north, a distance of 750 miles, and from the 110th meridian on the east to the 120th on the west, giving it a breadth of 400 miles. Its area is 254,559 square miles—over 160 million acres, of which 120 million acres are suitable for cultivation. Up to the present only about three and a half million acres are under cultivation. The influx of population has been steady and rapid, and there are now 400,000 people making their homes in Alberta.

The eastern part of the province is a rolling prairie, a large part of which is admirably adapted to raising the first quality of hard wheat. Farther west come the foothills of the Rockies, and a territory probably unexcelled for ranching, mixed farming and raising the famous "Alberta Red" wheat. Alberta's spring wheat yield, average per acre cultivated for 12 years, 1901-1912, 20.62 bushels; winter wheat, 22.51; oats, 36.42; and barley, 26.85. The average value of farm land in the province is \$20.46 per acre. The largest irrigation system in the world is under construction in the province and some remarkably fertile land is being opened up. The C. P. R. Alberta Irrigation—America's greatest irrigation project—covers: Western section, 1,039,620 acres, 370,000 already under irrigation; Eastern, 1,156,224 acres, 540,000 acres of which are now irrigated.

Alberta Railway and Irrigation Co. have 300 miles built and 100,000 acres under irrigation; Southern Alberta Land Co. have about 50 miles of main canal completed. There are over 500 miles of irrigation canals in the province.

Alberta's estimated grain yield for the year 1916 was 122,885,000 bushels and in this same year the Province broke the world's record for wheat yield per acre. The last available estimates of the live stock in Alberta were: 621,200 horses, 440,310 swine, 539,100 sheep, 394,233 cows, over 200,000 beef-cattle and 546,176 other cattle, all valued at \$110,000,000.

The mineral production of the province is valued at about \$15,000,000 annually. Large deposits of coal have been found in "The Pass" district, near Medicine Hat, Edmonton, Calgary and other points. In all, the province has 16,218 miles of coal land, with estimated contents of 1,072,627,400,000 tons. Natural gas and petroleum are found at various points from the United States boundary to the Peace River district. Zinc deposits are extensively worked in the neighborhood of Frank and clay mines near Medicine Hat.

The Peace River District at the north, almost 400 miles square, now being opened up for farming, ranks as one of the greatest fur producing districts in the world. More raw furs are marketed at Edmonton than in any other city. Tests have proved, too, that almost every part of this territory will grow wheat and rough grains.

The province is served by three great railway systems, the Canadian Pacific, Canadian National and Grand Trunk Pacific, with a total mileage at December 31, 1915 of 4,520. Banking facilities are provided by over 260 branches of Canadian chartered banks.

In education Alberta is not behind the other provinces having in 1915-1916 some 2,478 school districts; 12 school consolidations and 3,082 schools or classrooms in operation; with a total of 97,286 pupils.

The Government consists of a Lieutenant-Governor, Executive Council and Legislative Assembly of 56 members. Capital Edmonton.

BRITISH COLUMBIA

British Columbia has a land area of 395,000 sq. miles and a water area of 2,439 sq. miles. The population at the last census was 392,480. The province has a greater variety of climate than any other in Canada, for while the upper slopes of the Rockies are as cold as Labrador, the southern coast is so warm that oranges have been ripened in the open air. Taken as an average the climate is mild and equable and resembles that of many parts of England. Its many splendid valleys and level plateaus are exceedingly fertile. Its seven thousand miles of coast line, embracing hundreds of harbors; its unrivalled fisheries; its stupendous forests; its incalculable wealth in minerals and its peculiar geographical position on the Pacific Coast, all mark out the province as one of the imperial realms of the future.

Agriculture and fruit growing are rapidly becoming more important, producing twenty-five million dollars worth annually. The southern valleys are already famous for their apples, while peaches, pears, plums, cherries and smaller fruits are claiming much attention.

British Columbia has the greatest compact area of merchantable timber in America, estimated at 182,750,000 acres and 350 billion feet. The annual timber cut averages two billion feet, from about 800 logging camps and 425 mills.

In fisheries, the Province is immensely rich. The total catch in 1915-16 was valued at \$14,538,320, while the canned salmon pack amounted to 1,132,000 cases.

The wealth of British Columbia in minerals can scarcely be calculated, for tracts of country, thousands of square miles in extent, are as yet untraversed by the prospector, and many regions known to be rich in minerals cannot yet be reached by railways. Yet the production up to 1915 totalled over 516 million dollars, and the annual production averages between 30 and 40 million dollars. For 1915 the figures were: gold, \$5,937,934; silver, \$1,588,991; lead, \$1,939,200; copper, \$9,835,500; coal, \$5,638,852; coke, \$1,475,226; other minerals, including mercury, galena, cinnabar, platinum, antimony and salt, \$1,571,181. The coal of the province ranges from common lignite to anthracite and most of it is admirably suited for steam purposes. The steam shipping trade of the whole American coast of the Pacific is now looking to British Columbia for its coal supplies. In addition to the vast supplies of coal on Vancouver Island, the extensive beds of the Crow's Nest Pass have been proved to be excellent steam coal. The coal bearing areas so far explored are 65,000 sq. m. in extent, the quantity underlying portions of this area being estimated at four and a half to nine million tons per square mile, the total deposits having been computed at over 45 million tons. Gold is found in greater or less quantity all over the province, but the mines of the Kootenay and Cariboo districts are becoming prominent as quartz mining regions, while the Cassiar, Atlin Lake and other regions have developed rich placer mines.

British Columbia has over 650 manufacturing establishments, with 33,312 employees, producing annually goods to the value of \$65,000,000. Manufacturing is aided by the enormous available water-power, as well as the abundance of coal. Banking facilities are provided by 250 branches of Canadian Chartered Banks.

The province is represented in the Dominion Parliament by three senators and seven members of the House of Commons. The local government is carried on by a single chamber, the Legislative Assembly, having 42 members. Capital, Victoria:

The B.C.E.R. has more than 300 miles of street railway in operation in the city, and during 1918 they carried some 43,000,000 passengers. Regular steamers ply between Vancouver and the Orient, Australia, Alaska, California and north and south. The C. P. R. maintains a large fleet of ocean liners and coasting vessels. YUKON TERRITORY

Yukon Territory, Canada.—Population,¹ in summer 9,000, in winter 6,000, as it is estimated that 3,000 leave annually to spend the winter on the coast. The only industry of the territory is mining, chiefly gold, nearly all from the city of Dawson. Most of this gold was formerly taken out by old-fashioned methods of placer mining, but many capitalists have now invaded the field, and dredging and hydraulic mining as well as gold and silver quartz mining, are in vogue. The total output of gold for the year 1916 was \$4,376,393. Electric power and water supplies for operation are conveyed long distances where necessary. Copper is also mined near White Horse. The recent action of the Federal Government in abolishing until January, 1921, the royalty of 2½ per cent of the sales of the products of copper localities, will, it is confidently expected, greatly stimulate the copper mining industry in the Territory. A large percentage of the vegetables consumed in the territory are raised there, but all other food-stuffs must be brought in from outside centres. Heavy mining machinery forms an important part of the imports. Altogether Yukon annually purchases millions of dollars worth of goods from outside. Every convenience of life is now afforded in the Territory, including steamboat lines, railway connections from Seattle, Vancouver and Victoria to Dawson, and a superb winter stage relay system for travel in or out, so that connections can easily be made at any period of the year.

NEWFOUNDLAND

Newfoundland, the oldest colony in the British Empire, embraces the Island of Newfoundland and a portion of the Labrador coast of the mainland, and is the only part of British North America not as yet included in the Dominion of Canada. Though proposals for confederation have at various times been made, and although the question is a live one, many of the leading men of the island are opposed to a union with Canada. The area of the island is estimated at 40,200 sq. m., and the Labrador coast at 120,000 sq. m. The population is estimated at 227,500, including Labrador. From its settlement in 1614 to a very recent time, the fisheries have formed practically the only industry of the inhabitants, but the building of railways, and the exploration of the interior, is leading to the discovery and development of hitherto unknown resources that will give a steadiness and balance heretofore lacking in the commerce of the island. In minerals the island has copper, coal, iron, gypsum, sulphur, graphite, lead, asbestos and gold. Iron and copper are the most important. Copper was discovered at Tilt Cove in 1856, but the mines were not operated until 1864. Since then several large deposits have been uncovered, and to-day Newfoundland stands sixth among the copper producing countries of the world. In 1895 brown hematite iron was discovered at Bell Island, Conception Bay. It is estimated that in the two deposits on the island there are 40,000,000 tons. The output of these mines and the shipments of iron pyrites are materially adding to the exports of the colony. Talc deposits have also been uncovered at Topsail, some 14 miles from St. John's, and shipments are made regularly to the United States. Besides the above, slate quarries are in active operation, and shipments sent to Wales. The value of minerals exported yearly averages about \$1,500,000. Within the last few years vast timber limits have been operated, modern saw mills constructed and heavy shipments made to the United Kingdom and South America. The value of the lumber exports is increasing every year and the trade promises to become extensive. The pulp industry is also assuming large proportions under the management of British capitalists. More attention is being paid to agriculture. The number of acres under cultivation has increased within a few years from about 100,000 acres to close to 250,000 acres. The annual value of agricultural products is nearly \$1,000,000, and the value of land under cultivation, together with horses, sheep, etc., is nearly \$3,500,000. A movement is on foot to utilize the vast plains in the interior, raising sheep and cattle for export to the United Kingdom. Fish is the chief food product of Newfoundland, and the annual export exceeds \$10,000,000. The herring fisheries are commanding the attention of the Government. Expert herring packers were brought from Scotland, with the result that shipments of herring were sent to Petrograd, Russia, and sold at good prices. The whale fisheries are also extensive. The settlement of the French shore question has been the means of adding greatly to the development, not alone in connection with the fisheries, but other resources of the treaty shore. The lobster fisheries alone are valued at close to \$400,000 per annum. The imports of Newfoundland annually exceed \$10,500,000, and the exports \$12,250,000. There are over 2,500 vessels on the shipping register of the colony, with a tonnage of approximately 120,000 tons, and of the whole population no less than 54,000 persons are engaged in fishing. The government is carried on by a Legislative Council, consisting of 15 members, and a Legislative Assembly of 36 members. Capital, St. John's.

The 1918 figures indicate strikingly the rapid and substantial restoration of business in Winnipeg and Western Canada since the decline consequent on the declaration of war.

Open Letter to the Audit Bureau of Circulations



LONDON, CANADA

Gentlemen :

We have been members of the A. B. C. since it was first organized.

We entered because we felt we had a circulation that made the name of the A. B. C. mean something to the advertiser and advertising agency.

We believe in the cause for which the A. B. C. is organized, but the time has come when it should adopt better business methods regarding quality of circulation. At present, the words "A. B. C. Guaranteed Circulation" apply solely to *quantity*, and mean nothing as to *quality* of circulation—percentage of renewals, methods of increasing circulation, or net rate per subscriber received by publisher.

The annual subscription price of the Farmer's Advocate and Home Magazine, London, Canada, is \$1.50 in advance. Its circulation, as shown on A. B. C. audit report for year ending June 30th, 1918, was 30,878. The cash received from this circulation for the same period, after deducting all commissions, was \$38,351.55, making an average of \$1.24 net for each subscriber. Weak and inferior publications, employing strong-arm circulation methods, using premiums, guessing contests and other questionable tactics, allowing agents 100 per cent and in some cases even giving bonuses for getting names, get the A. B. C. endorsement of this inferior circulation. Some advertisers **KNOW** circulation for themselves; others depend upon A. B. C. reports, and, misled by these, place their advertising in these inferior publications.

To be of continued use to us, as the oldest farm paper in Canada, employing only honest circulation-getting methods, refusing fakes, liquor, tobacco, mining-shares, or any other objectionable advertising, A. B. C. approval must differentiate between *sound* circulation and temporary, inflated, circulation.
