



FIRST DAY-Morning Session

The Fourteenth Annual Convention of the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy met Wednesday morning, October 12th, 1910, at 10:30 o'clock in Rocky Mount, the city by the Tar.

Rocky Mount is proud of its patriotic heritage, for she has in her midst two of the living Bethel Heroes.

There has never been a more pleasing program, so intermingled with Southern intellectuality and songs.

The exercises were opened by our beloved Chaplain, Miss Hettie James, of Wilmington; followed by the Old North State, sung by the choir.

Addresses of welcome were delivered by three of Rocky Mount's most prominent citizens; the Mayor, Hon. T. T. Thorne, Mr. Jos. B. Ramsey and Mr. J. O. W. Gravelly and one by Mrs. M. O. Winstead, the able and enthusiastic President of the Bethel Heroes chapter.

HON. T. T. THORNE'S ADDRESS

In 1865, at the close of the war when the ragged Confederate Soldier buttoned his old gray jacket around him and turned his back upon the new made graves of his comrades in Virginia and his face toward his home in Dixie, he was confronted with a dual duty and responsibility. The one was to restore and rebuild to its pristine glory and beauty the fairest land that the sun in his course shines upon, the other to keep alive the heroic spirit of his people, the spirit that would make them brave and gallant in war, and sane, patriotic and wise in the hour of peace.

The soldier and his son because of the superior strength with which nature had endowed them, assumed for their part to build up the farms and restore the cities of the land, and so the days and years passed by. The time of reckoning has come. The confederate soldier has given an example to all the world not only of heroism in war but industrial and commercial achievements in time of peace.

To the women of the South the returned Confederate soldier committed the larger and more responsible duty of preserving the history of his own achievement for the inspiration of those to come after him, to form and mould characters redolent with Christian graces—strong and vigorous in all civic efforts and brave and gallant in war.

And so over her work 45 years has likewise come and gone. The hour has struck and the finished product comes from the workman's hand. Bolder in its outlines than the everlasting Alps in the eyes of the world appears her handiwork and creation—the character of the Southern people. When Knighthood died the reverent world placed in its grave the glittering coat of mail and waving plumes but it kept for the people of the south its prieeless heritage of Chivalry:

Self reliant, with high and holy ideals of society and government the world is looking now to the children of those who linked their destiny to the stars and bars and followed the fortunes of Jackson and Lee to save in its hour of peril this wonderful country of ours and give to it its rightful place among the nations of the earth.

To you, the Ladies of the South belongs the glory of it all. Like Cornelia, the mother of the Gracchi you can place your hands upon the heads of our civic heroes and heroines and say "these are my jewels."

The organization known as the United Daughters of the Confederacy is the voice and expression of this spirit of noble womanhood that has dared and won so much for our Southland.

The voice and form are both with us to-day. With reverant heads we stand uncovered in your presence; why say words of welcome to our Queen who wears a sparkling diadem and glorifies a throne?

A long time ago when the silver moon was shining and shedding its soft and gentle radiance over the dew bespangled grass and flowers we offered you our hands and hearts. I come again commissioned by all the good people of this loyal Southern town to revive in your minds this sweet remembrance and to offer you our hearts and hands and homes, and to say that so long as you choose to abide with us, the keys of this city are yours and in all else we are yours to command.

MR. JAS. B. RAMSEY'S ADDRESS

MADAM PRESIDENT; UNITED DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY; LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

From Rocky Mount Lodge No. 84, Knights of Pythias, and Rocky Mount Lodge No. 1038, Benevolent & Protective Order of Elks, I bring you greetings, and in behalf of local brotherhood generally I extend to you a most cordial welcome.

We congratulate you upon this splendid Convention: we rejoice that you hold it in Rocky Mount; and we trust that your deliberations ended will find each of you in love with our city.

MINUTES OF FOURTEENTH ANNUAL CONVENTION

When I was asked a few days ago to say something in behalf of my fellow Elks and Pythians, I did not stop to consider my inability, but just rushed in where I might well have feared to tread anxious to proclaim my allegiance to your organization, which has done so much to perpetuate Southern traditions and ideals and to preserve Southern history—anxious too to express my admiration for the noblest and most beautiful type of all the Creator's handiwork, Southern woman.

You played no small part in that great struggle between the States. Without you the war could not have lasted six months. With your aid and your sacrifice it was prolonged for four long years.

At all times you were the inspiration and the hope, the light that never failed. You were the "pillar of fire" and ever "like the shadow of a great rock in a weary land."

You were the song of the Old South: you are the theme of the New South; and to-day in this high hour of peace and commercialism, when men are prone to forget, we find you banded together, United Daughters of the Confederacy, all still loyal to Southern rights, democracy, and, thank God, to white supremacy.

As Elks we applaud you; as Pythians we cheer you, and as Citizens we welcome you.

A few years ago, and only a short while before he died, it was my privilege to hear General Gordon deliver his famous lecture on "The Last Days of the Confederacy." I have never heard a more glowing description of the waning fortunes of the Confederacy, nor higher tribute paid to the Southern Army, the grandest that ever assembled to marshal music, or drew sword in defence of a Nation's honor.

I only wish that every man, woman and child in the South might have heard him. It made me love my Southland better and proud that I am a citizen of North Carolina.

And sometimes now when I think of that magnificent oration and the glamour of war time is about me, I feel for the moment that I would be willing to be an old man with gray hair, and tottering step and slow, if only I might have been a soldier under Lee and a follower of Stonewall Jackson. If only I might have known a Confederate soldier's devotion to duty, and seen that vast army bow its head in prayer and ask the God of the Confederacy if it be His will to bless its fortunes; if only I might have been able to have faced the cannon's mouth uuflinching, and looking straight into the "valley of the shadow of death" have said with them: "And to die, if to die I must, with heart unswerved and face to the sod, give thanks to God, that I fought like a man with men." I say, if I could have known and done these things, I sometimes feel I would willingly be an old man with gray hair, and tottering step and slow.

My friends, to have been there must have been glorious, nothing else will describe it.

But I must not detain you; you are waiting to hear Mr. Dixon. In conclusion, I am reminded of a little story which is not original with me, and which I have told to my home people before, but they will pardon its repetition I hope, for it expresses so well what I wish to say: A few years ago, down by the docks of the great City of Boston, a cripple lad was accustomed to linger, and in return for the pennies tossed him by the captains and sailors of the great ships as they passed on their way to sea, he wished them a "bon voyage," saying "good luck to you, Mr. Captain, good luck to your crew." And so, Madam President and United Daughters of the Confederacy, in return for the pleasure you have given us by coming to Rocky Mount, in the name of the Orders I represent, I say to to you: Good luck to you, Madam Captain, good luck to your Crew.

MR. GRAVELLY'S ADDRESS.

MADAM PRESIDENT; LADIES OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY:

From sixty-one to sixty-five, the days and hours that were being indelibly written in the memory of the World's critizenship by the courage, valor, blood-shed and even death of the boys of the then Oasis of the Universe, there seemed to hover over sweet old Dixie, the deepest sorrow and darkest gloom. But it was not so, for from behind the clouds, the love and patriotism of God's greatest handiwork sent forth rays of hope, cheerfulness and love, converting darkness into light, weakness into strength, despair into determination, and defeat into victory.

Although the precious "Old rag," whose memory envelopes the hearts of every true southerner, was dipped at Appomattox into the cup of submission to unequal power, yet, our great, noble and universally loved Chieftain was not defeated, nor the cause for

which the nations truest and bravest men for four years fought, lost-

As a result of the awful conflict, slavery was abolished, as in my opinion it would and should have been in any event, but the cause which prompted our people to appeal to the highest tribunal known to man, reigns victoriously today in the hearts of every true American.

I beg you to accept these feeble words, not as flattery, but as uppolished praise most worthily deserved, for no cause, however, great or small since the return of Christ to His Father's bosom, has succeeded that was not blessed with the stamp of woman's approval. Whatever achievments, whatever success, whatever victory crowned the Southern arms is directly tracable and must be attributed to the incentives furnished the Boys in Gray by wives, sisters and mothers. Even the sad hours of vonder days have largely transformed into sweet memories, by woman's love and devotion as exemplified by their glorious and most successful efforts to forever perpetuate the memories of the brave deeds and heroic acts of the Boys who fell in defence of the Southern and most righteous cause, and with hearts full of sympathy and hands ever ready, make the remainder of life's short journey of the humble yet bravest of the brave, who escaped death on that memorable journey from Bethel to Appomattox, both comfortable and happy. If we who have been permitted to live to see with our own eyes and hear with our own ears the great work you are doing, can sing your praise, in the Name of High Heaven, what would those whose lives were given on the field of battle say and do, should they be allowed to return to earth. Forgotton? No never. Neglected? Not until the memories of the days of "Stonewall" and "Mars Bob" have been blotted from every Southern mind by the paint brush of death. Your work ladies, is a most glorious work. It doubtless has, does now, and will until the end receive the most hearty support of every loval Southern son.

To me it appears nothing short of mockery for the Rocky Mount Tobacco Board of Trade, which I have the honor to represent on this occasion, to bid these patriotic souls welcome to our city. To say that we are glad to have you in our midst, is but a faint expression of the real pleasure your presence among us affords. Our hearts and our homes are open to you and when this, your annual convention shall have finished its work and you return to your respective places of abode, may the blessings of Him who always strengthens and supports the advocates of a rightuous cause, be heaped upon you in untold quantities and may you be assured that when your task on earth is done, there awaits your coming to the world beyond, a sweet and never ending reunion with those whose memories you are here to-day to honor,

Two have since joined Wyatt across the river, beneath the trees. Today are we thrice honored for not only have we as hostess the chapter named for these great men, but we have them also in our midst. Rocky Mount above all her other attractions claims the greatest privilege of being the home of two of these grand heroes.

Therefore Daughters of the North Carolina Division we have more than usual to be grateful for in the kind invitations given us for this year's convention. May our meeting be an inspiration to us to aim at greater and yet nobler things, may peace and good will be our watchword in every action, and may the convention at Rocky Mount be the best, the most fruitful we have ever known.

We were unusually fortunate in having an address by another of North Carolina's sons who has won fame throughout the country, Thomas Dixon, having recently written another play, "The Sins of the Father."

Probably the most touching part of the program was the presentation to the North Carolina Division U. D. C. by the Hon. F. S. Spruill a gavel made by a Rocky Mount veteran, Mr. Christian, from a piece of dogwood grown on the spot where Henry L. Wyatt was killed. The dogwood was procured by Mrs. John H. Thorpe, wife of one of the living Bethel Heroes.

HON, F. S. SPRUILI'S ADDRESS

MADAM PRESIDENT, LADIES, AND GENTLEMEN:

On Monday morning, June 10th, 1861, a shot was fired which was heard around the world. Almost within the sacred precincts of a quiet country church, where everything suggested peace, and the echo of the toiling Sabbath bells had barely died away, the first battle was fought in a conflict that proved the most sanguinary in the world's history. The blood and treasure lost and spent in that gigantic conflict would feed and clothe the poor of the world for a century. It is not meet for this occasion that I should attempt any vindication of the cause for which we fought. History, within half a century of the events which made it, has justly appraised our

course, and our mighty struggle has ceased to be termed a "rebellion" and is now justly called the "War for Southern Independence."

Neither is it necessary for me to add one word to the just tribute the world has paid to Southern valor and heroism. Since time was, there has been no such exhibition of dauntless courage and deathless loyalty as was displayed by Southern men and women in those four years of blood and carnage. It is not invidious that from all this display of glorious manhood I should point to one heroic figure whose deeds of high emprise on that Monday morning half a century ago were a sort of first-fruits, a shining portent of that, at the doing of which, the world was to stand amazed. Α great war was ushered in, and on its first day, while myriad bullets, speeding from hostile guns, were whining their messages of death Col. Hill, in command of the immortal Bethef regiment, passing down the lines pointed to an empty house in the enemy's possession, which formed a valuable strategic point for their sharp-shooters, and asked Capt. Bridgers if he could not have it burned. It. should be borne in miud that his men were not drilled and hardened soldiers, used to death and grown callous to scenes of bloodshed. They were beardless boys whose largest experience in matters of life and death, up to that time, had been a fox chase, or perhaps a deer hunt. And yet, when Capt. Bridgers asked for volunteers to go through that hail of death and burn that house, as if they had been invited guests speeding to a bridal dance, six men, North Carolinians all, leaped forward to perform the fatal mission. Geo. T. Williams, Thomas Fallon, John H. Thorp, Robert H. Ricks, Henry L. Wyatt and Robert H. Bradley; truly it is a roll of immortals, of men who were not born to die. I will not tarry to pay just tribute to this illustrious sextette, their heroic deed has spoken them into deserved fame. As the enemy's guns thundered a volley, Henry Wyatt fell, as becomes a man and a soldier, with his face to the foe. From a wound in his forehead the slowly oozing blood told the story of his death. Hear the account given by Maj. Randolph, an eye witness to its happening, fifty years ago: "On getting there (to the battle field) I learned from the infantry that a small house in front was occupied by sharp-shooters, and I saw the body of a Carolinian lying thirty yards in front of the battery. 'He had been killed in a most gallant attempt to burn the house." What alegacy of honor to leave to his loved ones! What noble epitaph can be written above a soldier's grave!

That Carolinian was Henry Wyatt, in whose memory the patriotic women of the State are now engaged in building a worthy monument. His was the first life offered upon the altar of the South, in token of her supreme faith in the justice of her cause.

The years have passed. On the battle field of Big Bethel in spring time now the mating birds sing and the flowers blossom. Near the spot where the life blood of Henry Wyatt enriched the soil, there sprang up a lusty young dogwood, whose star likeflowers. by their silent symbolism, have annually reiterated the trnth of a nation's peace. Not long since, a Contederate soldier, Jno. L. Christian, compatriot of Wyatt and Thorp and Bradley, walking over the blood-baptized field of Big Bethel, and living again in memory its glorious history, cut, as a memento of his visit, the dogwood into whose sap had been drawn young Wyatt's life-blood. The fancy seized him to make it into a gavel to fit the hand of the presiding officer of that organization that is now engaged in preserving for posterity the history of those times and of the men who made them. For the Daughters of the Contederacy, who gave to the cause, in time of war a deathless devotion, and in time of peace a constant memory; who are even now piously and persistently gathering together the matter from which will be written a true history of that mighty epoch, he designed and carved this symbol of authority. In the name of John L. Christian, Confederate Veteran, worthily wearing his cross of honor and marching to meet the enemy, now as he did half a century ago, smiling and unairaid, the Bethel Heroes Chapter presents this gavel, with its history as I have told it, to the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. On it the patient hand of this old Confederate has lovingly etched the features of those two princes of the earth, Lee and Jackson. To him, as to us, they were the world's best types of men and soldlers. Muy climeetings rapped to order with this gavel be conducted with the same high sense of patriotism that inspired them whose features adorn it.

The gavel was accepted by Mrs. Williams in most appropriate words.

Mr. Ricks and Mr. Thorpe were escorted to the rostrum and General William Ruffin Cox who com-

manded the last charge at Appomatox, after repeated calls responded most happily for a few moments.

After the presentation of the state flag by Mrs. W. C. Feimster of the Ransom-Sherrill Chapter, Newton, and its acceptance by the State President, the Fourteenth Annual Convention was declared ready for business by Mrs. F. M. Williams.

MRS. FEIMSTER'S ADDRESS

As it is customary for a State Flag to be presented at roll call at every General Convention, and as this year North Carolina's President will be one of our own loved members, the Ransom-Sherrill Chapter, through me, wishes to present the flag that will be sent to Little Rock by the North Carolina Division.

We do this as a token of the love we bear our fellow-member; as well as a mark of the high esteem in which she is held by her chapter, for her untiring zeal in state and chapter work, and for loyalty and devotion to the Confederate cause.

Mrs. Williams, may you bear this to the Little Rock Convention with the same love and pride that you have ever given to the work of the Ransom-Sherrill chapter.

Mrs. Winstead made the motion that the following resolution be sent Prof. Hill:

It appearing that from his history of the late war, Prof. D. H. Hill has omitted the name of R. H. Ricks from the list of the six men at Big Bethel who attempted to storm the empty house, now be it resolved that a letter be written to the author calling attention to his omission and asking him to correct the same."

The roll call showed present Honorary Presidents, Mrs. W. M. Parsley and Mrs. E. E. Moffitt; Honorary Vice-President, Mrs. T. J. Jarvis. The officers absent were Miss Carry Leazar of Mooresville, 3rd Vice-President, and Mrs. Thos. Lee Craig, of Gastonia, Recorder of Crosses; Miss Rebecca Cameron, Hillsboro, Historian and Mrs. W. O. Shannon of Henderson, Asst. Historian. After the roll call by the recording secretary and report from the Chairman of the Credential Committee, the motion was made to adjourn for luncheon, given at the Cambridge Hotel by the city aldermen to the N. C. Division United Daughters of the Confederacy.

FIRST DAY-Afternoon Session

The afternoon session was called to order by the President at 2:45 o'clock. Immediately after the opening Mrs. Williams was presented with a cane made by Mr. Christian, with the message, "The hand that rocks the cradle rules the world."

Mrs. Winstead then read invitations: One extending courtesies from the manager of the Gem Theatre to the members of the Convention, and the other to a reception to be given by the Pythians, at night from 8:30 to 11 o'clock.

Telegrams of greetings were read from the President General, Mrs. McSherry; North Carolina's Asst. Historian, Mrs. W. O. Shannon; the 3rd Vice President, Miss Carrie Leazar; also from Mrs. Frank Anthony Walke, Norfolk, Va. Motion was made and carried that these telegrams be responded to. This was done.

Annual report of the President was read and accepted with thanks:

REPORT OF PRESIDENT.

DEAR DAUGHTERS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA DIVISION:

One year ago you placed me in the highest office within your gift, and it has been my carnest endeavor to give you the best service in my power. Nothing has come before my work in the Division. I have given to every work and every question my most earnest thought and attention. Every letter or postal has been answered the day it was received. Promptness and conscientious attention to duty has been my watchword and it remains with you to say whether you think I have faithfully fulfilled the high trust you gave into my keeping last fall at Wilmington.

Soon after that Convention closed I sent out a letter of warmest greetings to every chapter and urged them to pay special attention to each and every branch of our State and General work.

It was not long after the Convention that the State treasurer notified me that there was a deficit of \$4.02 in the amount due the painter for the Randoiph-Shotwell portrait. There being \$6.00 in the treasurer's hands credited to the Wirz Monument fund and that being completed your president ordered the treasurer to place \$4.02 to the credit of the Shotwell portrait fund and thus liquidate our indebtedness to Mrs. Marshall Williams, the remaining \$1.98 being added to the State fund.

Early in December cards were sent out to the Chapters notifying them of the continued illness of our Recorder of Crosses and stating that all papers for Crosses of Honor should be sent to your president until the Recorder should be able to resume her work.

Your president's attention was next called, by a newspaper clipping, to the fact that the Confederate Veteran at Nashville had published a statement that North Carolina had but two monuments to her Confederate dead, one at Pittsboro and one at Bentonville. Immediately your president made out a list of all the monuments of which she knew, and refuting this assertion in the strongest terms sent a copy of her letter to the Veteran, Keystone, News and Observer, and Charlotte Observer requesting publication. She also asked her Corresponding Secretary to send a card to every Chapter, requesting that they notify her at once which had monuments, which contemplated erecting and also to send the name of any towns they knew had a Confederate Monument but where there was no U. D. C. Chapter. Our list of these monuments, erected to North

Carolina Soldiers is very incomplete and your president would urge that Chapters take some interest in aiding and securing a thoroughly correct list.

Having been told by your last president of the earnest request by the Committee in Richmond for a North Carolina flag to float above our state column in the Jefferson Davis monument on certain occasions your president early in the year obtained through the courtesy of Mrs. Allison Hodges, your vice regent of the N. C. room, the desired dimensions. The best wool bunting flag was ordered and sent to Richmond where on May 10th it waved above the N. C. column.

In December a heavy bereavement caused Mrs. Brodnax, our most efficient chairman of the educational committee, to resign her work and Mrs. William H. Overman was appointed to fill her place.

Your president has been called upon to make several decisions in very important matters, and it now remains with the convention to decide whether those rulings were correct or not, but to them all she gave much thought before deciding.

1st. An appeal came from Florence, Alabama for \$50 towards the purchase of Christmas seals to be sold for the benefit of the Arlington monument. Our state treasury could not stand the strain, but North Carolina must not be delinquent in her duty, so your president ordered the treasurer to pay this amount out of the Arlington fund, as that seemed best, since all the proceeds of the sale of these stamps would go to the Arlington Monument.

2nd. Late in the spring came another request for a decision and that was whether a mother chapter had a right to take from a Children's chapter, money which they had made, and desired or intended to otherwise use. In this matter your president, decided that the children under their leader, had a right to control their own funds.

A request came in August from our President General for the name of a good worker to be placed as Director from North Carolina on the Dan Emmitt Monument fund and the name of Mrs. John H. Anderson, president of the J. E. B. Stuart chapter, Fayetteville was sent her.

The work along all lines has been progressing finely as will be shown by the different reports. The money for the Henry Wyatt Monument is about completed and the 50th anniversary of the day on which the Bethel Heroes performed their deed of valor, and our First at Bethel fell, will see the veil fall from the handsome brouze statue to his memory.

The Endowment Fund to the North Carolina Room should call for prompt attention. We must not lag behind other states in this matter.

In April and again in May your president met with the committee on the Boy Soldier Monument at Chapel Hill, at that place; plans and designs were submitted and work begun in earnest, and a stirring appeal is now made to the ladies present to return to their homes determined to lose no time in raising the required money for the cause.

Our educational work has been progressing finely. Many appeals have been sent out to local institutions, with the result that fourteen scholarships were reported to the General Educational Committee in July. Of these the Division supports three at the State Normal, Greensboro, covering all expenses, the University gives two free tuition scholarships, one to the state, one to the general organization. There is one at A. and M. College at Raleigh. The others are local scolarships awarded by chapters or individuals, and given only to descendants of Confederate soldiers. Of these Charlotte is the oldest, then there is one at Mt, Pleasant College for tuition, room rent and fees; the others are all for tuition, namely, at Fassifern in Lincolnton, given in honor of Judge Wm. J. Shipp, one at Davenport College, Lenoir, one at Oxford Female Seminary one at Claremont College, Hickory; one at Catawba College, Newton. and one at Concordia College. Conover. Your president is justly proud that in her home county three of these scolarships have been given.

During the past year, as well as can be learned, there have been erected the following monuments; at Reidsville, Lenoir, Monroe. Rutherfordton, Morganton, and Henderson will unveil this month. Winton and Durham have laid cornerstones. A tablet commemorative of the Confederate Navy Yard in Charlotte has been placed. This tablet is on the spot where stood the Navy Yard when moved from Norfolk. The Dixie-Lee Children's Chapter of Tarboro will on October 18th unveil their fountain to Henry Wyatt.

The Division has been augmented by three new chapters, King's Mountain at King's Mountain, Raeford at Raeford, and Ransom-Lee at Sanford, making 88. Three others have their papers about ready. Children's chapters have been organized at the fol-

lowing places, the Rockingham Volunteers, Reidsville; Lee-Jackson, Durham; Richardson Mallet, Chapel Hill; Bonnie Blue Flag, Lenoir, and one at Mt. Olive, and one at Graham. The Children of the Confederacy now number 33.

Three U. D. C. chapters have been reported dead and stricken from the roll after repeated attempts to revive them: Matt Ransom, Middleton; Holly Springs, Holly Springs; and Clayton, Clayton.

356 U. D. C, certificates have been signed and sent out to chapters.

In May your president was appealed to by Mrs. Brooks, to take up the Soldier's Home work again as they needed help. This was done, and here the suggestion is made that we never drop the work again till the Home ceases to exist.

Your president would urge the Daughters to subscribe for the Keystone. One copy at least should be taken by every chapter in the state, and its N. C. column read at the monthly meetings. Thus are you kept in touch with the work of your Division, and you can also gain valuable information regarding what is being done in other states. Chapter secretaries are urged to keep Mrs. Gordon Finger of Charlotte informed, from time to time, of work done by their chapters, so as to give her material for her monthly reports.

In August your president was requested by General Irvine Walker, Secretary of the Monument to Confederate Women Association to make an appeal to the Daughters of North Carolina. This she did and Gen. Walker had the appeal printed and gave your president a number of copies, which will shortly be sent out to the different chapters. This appeal will be read to the convention later in its session.

Your president would suggest that hereafter stationery be furnished to the Chairman of each committee, as it would give more dignity and prestige to the office. Also that each chairman be allowed to have her postage paid out of the amount collected for the work she represents. Those committees doing state work without collecting money should however have their postage paid out of the state fund.

The suggestion is also made that the number of minutes printed be increased to 600, as your president found this year, after sending the allotted amount to each of the chapters, that there were not enough left over to meet the demand from outside parties and use in organizing new chapters. All pledges made at the Houston Convention in the name of the North Carolina Division have been redeemed.

The Grim Reaper has paid many visits to the homes of our members, and four of our prominent workers have felt his presence. In December Mrs. Brodnax was called npon to give up her only child. Later our Chairman of the Home for Wives and Widows, Mrs. Hunter Smith, saw her beloved brother fall asleep. In May the husband of our Assistant Historian, Mrs. W. O. Shannon passed away. The last was Capt. R. H. Brooks, so long the faithful superintendent of the Soldiers Home, and husband of her whom we all loved to call our own Mrs. Brooks. To all of these your president wrote words of love and sympathy from the Division.

And now the resume of the year's work is completed, but before closing I would say a word regarding the many courtesies showered upon me during the year, as your representative.

On May 3rd on an invitation from their president, I attended the Convention of the North Carolina Federation of Woman's Clubs and bore them greetings from the North Carolina Daughters. Here your president was most royally treated, and was invited to make one of the receiving party at the reception given by the Daughters of the American Revolution. After the Convention she visited Littleton, by special invitation, and was elegantly entertained by the Roanoke Minute Men chapter, and the Annie Lee children of the Confederacy. On May 10th an invitation was accepted to attend the unveiling in Raleigh of the Gateway in the Confederate This is not the Memorial Arch, but the small pink cemetery. granite gateway turned over to the Johnson Pettigrew chapter by the Division several years ago. While in Raleigh your president had the pleasure of meeting and talking with a large number of this flourishing chapter, being delightfully entertained by their president, Mrs. Josephus Daniels.

Lenoir gave a cordial invitation to attend the unveiling exercises of their Confederate Monument in June, and your president witnessed the falling of the veil from this beautiful memorial to Southern bravery, besides being delightfully entertained at a reception by the Z. B. Vance chapter.

June 29th was a memorable occasion to the people of Rockingham county, for at that time at Reidsville, the veil fell from their exquisite Confederate Monument of granite and Italian marble. Your president was not only present, but was honored by being selected as one of the four ladies to draw the veil. The afternoon before an elegant reception was given her by Mrs. Hall, president of the Rockingham chapter.

Eefore closing this report I desire to utter a few words of hearty thanks to the members of the Executive Committee as well as to the chairmen of Committees for so ably upholding my hands and aiding in carrying forward our work during the year.

RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

MADAM PRESIDENT AND DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY:

It has been one of my most pleasant duties during the past year to sit at my desk daily and communicate with one or more of the Chapters of the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. In every instance each letter that has been received has brought with it kind words, encouragement and consideration for me; which has always been appreciated beyond words.

I have tried to respond promptly to all requests, and if there have been failures to do so, it was through no indifference or lack of interest on my part. The work continues to grow and that among the Children's Chapters is most gratifying. The State books record 88 chapters, and thirty one Children's Chapters; there being four new chapters: King's Mountain Chapter, King's Mountain; Raeford Chapter, Raeford; Ransom-Lee Chapter, Sanford. Also four new Children's Chapters: Lee-Jackson Chapter, Durham, Rockingham Volunteers Chapter, Reidsville; Richardson Mallett Chapter, Chapel Hill and Mt. Olive Auxiliary, Mt. Olive, have been organized this year.

1150 application blanks for the chapters and 493 for the auxiliaries have been sent out, 275 letters and 115 postals have been written.

It is to be hoped that the chapters have discussed the suggestion made at last Convention in regard to reducing the size and cost of the minutes. This is a very easy matter, if reports will be made short enough to cover the ground, without unnecessary details.

I thank you Daughters of the North Carolina Division for the honor you have conferred upon me and earnestly hope my work has been satisfactory.

REGISTRAR'S REPORT.

MADAM PRESIDENT AND UNITED DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY:

I have the honor to herewith submit my annual report as your Registrar. All data, herewith appended, have been compiled with great care, and I have done my best to secure accuracy. However, it is incumbent on me to say, as an official duty, that the books of the Registrar have not, do not, and cannot, in the present state of affairs, accurately reflect a true condition of your organization, as to number of members, names of members et cetera,

I heartily commend to this body that some measures be taken, whereby a general overhauling of the records of the Chapter Registrars and the State Registrar may be had. This will be absolutely necessary, to the end, that your Registrar's books may be what they

should be; to-wit: an accurate reflex of the condition of your organization,

I am sure that those who have preceded me in the office of Registrar, have given liberally of their time, industry and fidelity to this work, as your present Registrar has done; and yet for a lack of careful and accurate information that must be furnished to the State Registrar, by the individual chapters, it has not been possible to have the State records so accurate and reliable as they should be.

Your Registrar feels that, in justice to herself, she may say a word here in explanation of having returned individual membership blanks to the several chapters, whence they came. On the recommendation of the Registrar-General, the last General Convention, held at Houston, Texas, October 1909, amended the constitution to this effect; and your Registrar in returning said blanks, acted under instructions of that general officer.

Conforming to the new rule, your Registrar must send to the Registrar General, only names of members, names of ancestors, companies, regiments and titles, or rank.

The requirement of all State Divisions is now made by the general organization, that revised type-written copies of all State Registrars' books be sent by State Registrars to the Registrar-General. Your Registrar was physically unable to do this stupendous work herself, nor would it be fair to expect any Registrar to do it. However, she secured estimates from several public typists and the lowest bid she had was ten (\$10.00) dollars per thousand members. Having no authority to expend any sum of money for such work, your Registrar contented herself by making inquiry of the few State Divisions that have complied with the rule, and takes the liberty of commending to this body that the State Registrar be furnished, by each individual Chapter Registrar, with a typewritten list, carefully revised. of the required data. This data to be properly compiled by the State Registrar and forwarded to the Registrar General. This method of procedure allows a division of the labor and secures a substantial saving to your treasury.

Your Registrar came to this work without experience, and has prosecuted it without experienced assistance, and naturally she has made mistakes; yet, "it is human to err, but divine to forgive," and rendering this account of her stewardship in this sentiment, she will be amply compensated if it meets with your approval. Our Registrar General, than whom we have no nobler uor abler member, concluded her last report with the words of Philip Brooks' "Burden Bearcr," which are equally appropriate here:

> "The little sharp vexations, And the briars that catch and fret; Why not take them all to the Helper, Who has never failed us yet Tell Him about the heart-aches, Tell Him the longings too; Tell Him the baffled purpose When we scarce know what to do; Then leaving all our weakness With the One divinely strong, Forget we bore the burden, And carry away the song."

Our work is a noble one, voluntarily assumed by a band of noble women, and should ever be performed under the influence of noble purposes,

During the continued illness of your Recorder of Crosses, Mrs. Thomas Lee Craig, your president has kept up the Cross of Honor work for her, so that chapters might not be disappointed in getting Crosses for those desiring them at appointed times. Your special attention should be called to certain rules, which if carefully attended to, would save much trouble to both Recorder and chapters and secure Crosses where otherwise they are not attainable.

First, all papers are required to be in Mrs. Raines' hands three weeks before appointed time. Little attention is paid to this by chapters, applications often being rushed in a few days ahead of

time, giving no time for corrections. All applications must be signed by two veterans giving company and regiment, as well as the Adjutant of the camp, and these companies and regiments must be written after endorsers name on record sheets. Post office money orders must be made payable to the Custodian of Crosses, now Mrs-Raines, she will not receive checks, and lastly sufficient postage first class should always be sent your state recorder, with which to forward all papers.

You hardly realize, ladies, that your Recorder of Crosses is required to compare every application blank with your record sheet in order to approve before forwarding, and then she has to record in her books. It is an immense amount of work, but chapter presidents or custodians can greatly aid by seeing all requirements are complied with before sending papers out of their hands.

During the year there have been 787 Crosses of Honor awarded. Of these 749 were to veterans and 38 to descendants and widows as follows:

REPORT OF HISTORIAN

MADAM PRESIDENT:

A report of the year's work is in order, but like Channing's "Needy Knife Grinder;" "Lord love you Sir, I've no story to tell," for out of our eighty four chapters only two chapter Historians have reported any work. These honorable exceptions were Mrs. E. D. Foxhall of the Dorsey Pender Chapter, Tarboro; who reports filing two historical papers; and Mrs. J. P. Leach, of the Roanoke Minute Men, of Littleton; who reports eight. These make on file, so far as I know, one hundred and twenty seven papers.

But only a hundred and twenty seven papers, when we sent 125,000 men to the front is so infinitesimally small a portion that we should be, every one of us, most heartily ashamed of it. Why cannot we do better? Other states sent fewer men, most all of them file more historical papers, and so, in the years to come, can claim more soldiers by the records they can show. Yet, we might if we would, surpass them all by this simple matter of justice to our own men.

"The field is white to the harvest" now, but in a little, little while there will be nothing left even for the gleaners.

They are going so fast, these matchless men who wore the Grey! Barely a skirmish line is left now, and we let them go with their splendid memories unrecorded, their heroic stories all untold!

Oh! Daughters of the Confederacy! This should not be! I pray you, I beseech you, each one, to make an effort this year to gather up what fragments may yet be had; what stories can yet be told by living lips. Today I was told of the death of a gallant soldier cousin of mine, who died in Goldsboro, and here with us, as I write these words, a gallant officer of the 56th North Carolina, is dangerously ill. Death will not wait upon our tardy leisure, nor break the seal he sets upon brave lips.

There is no time to lose if we care to own those wonderful stores for those who will care, but will be too late to hear, and to record them.

Three monuments have been reported to me this year. One at Reidsville, one at Weldon, and one at Lenoir. I was sorry not to be able to accept the invitations to be present on each occasion.

A very handsome, and well gotten up history of the immortal

twenty sixth Regiment has been published by Assistant Surgeon George C. Underwood, and I am greatly indebted to Mrs. J. M. Brown, of Albemarle, for a copy of it.

And speaking of this work brings me naturally to a circular letter issued by our Historian General, Mrs. J. Enders Robinson, of Richmond, Virginia, urging upon all the Divisions of the U. D. C. the establishment by each one in their most centrally located city, of a U. D. C. Exchange Library, the object of which will be to locate, collect and preserve by gift, purchase or bequest, all Mss., newspapers, books, letters, poems, music, maps, charts, drawings, text books, money, stamps, State rosters of troops, and any and all miscellaneous matter connected with, or concerning in any way the C. S. A. dating from 1850 or even father back.

The officers of these libraries shall be a Librarian and Assistant Librarian, never the Division Historian, or Assistant Historian, who shall reside permanently in the library city, and shall always be members of the U. D. C.

This plan commends itself to me very strongly, for as Mrs. Robinson says, "many valuable papers are rapidly passing to other sections through gift or purchase," and many are being hopelessly lost by fire and flood and carelessness. This grand work is crying aloud for the aid of the U. D. C. There is not a day to lose, and I therefore beg our Division President to appoint a Librarian, and a Library Committee at once, for no time is ever so good as the present, for today only belongs to us, tomorrow may never be ours.

Mrs. Hall of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee read changes to be made in the Constitution and By-Laws. This called forth much discussion and all changes were adopted but two.

AMENDMENTS

ARTICLE 11

Section 1. First clause, by inserting the word "educational" after memorial.

Passed.

ARTICLE III

Sec. 1. After word nieces by adding "grand-nieces and their descendants," also, after women and lineal descendants, add "and nieces and their descendants who can give proof of personal service and loyal aid to the Southern cause during the war. Northern women having no male relative who served the Confederate States of America in the war between the States, 1861-1865, and having themselves performed no special service to same, but having married a Confederate soldier since 1865, and through this means becoming a member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy shall have the words, "by adoption" placed upon their certificates of membership, and upon the Registrars books, and in all rosters shall be designated as members "by adoption." Said member being entitled to all the honors and privileges of this Association except that of transmitting this honor to members of her family, only her children of a Confederate father; the honor dies with her if she has no children.

The section to read thus:

Sec. 1. Those women entitled to membership are the widows, wives, mothers, sisters, nieces, grand-nieces and their descendants and lineal descendants of such men as served honorably in the Confederate Army, Navy or Civil Service, of those men, unfit for active duty, who loyally gave aid to the cause; also, those women and their lineal descendants and nieces, and their descendants, who can give proof of personal service and loyal aid to the Southern cause during the war. Northern women having no male relative who served the Confederate States of America in the war between the States, 1861-1865, and having themselves performed no special service to same, but having married a Confederate soldier since 1865, and through this means becoming a member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy shall have the words, "by adoption" placed upon their certificates of membership, and upon the Registrars books, and in all rosters shall be designated as members "by adoption." Said members being entitled to all the honors and privileges of this Association except that of transmitting this honor to members of her family, only her children of a Confederate father. the honor dies with her if she has no children.

Also add: "Each chapter shall judge of the qualifications of its own members."

Lost.

Sec. 2. After standing add, "having paid all dues." Also add: "No, member after withdrawing or resigning from a chapter can obtain a demit from that chapter, unless on resignation she states her desire to join onother chapter.

Section to read:

Sec. 2. A member in good standing of any chapter, desiring to change her membership shall be entitled to receive from her chapter a demit, certifying that she is a member in good standing, having paid her dues, which, if presented within six months, shall make good her membership in any chapter to which she may be acceptable. No member, aftar withdrawing or resigning from a chapter, can obtain a demit from that chapter, unless on resignation she states her desire to join another chapter.

Lost.

Sec. 3. A daughter can belong to two or more chapters if she desires, by paying dues in all, but she can only vote in one chapter.

Passed.

ARTICLE IV.

Sec. 2. Strike out "Corresponding Secretary." Passed.

ARTICLE V.

Sec. 2. Change wording of this section as follows: "Each chapter shall be entitled at all meetings of the State Division to one representative for the first seven members, and an additional vote for each additional twenty-five members."

Passed.

ARTICLE VI.

Sec. 1. After word charter insert "\$3.00 for General fee and \$2.00 for State fee."

Passed.

ARTICLE VIII.

Sec. 3. After State Convention add: "But their work and disposition of money made by them to be decided by the Leader and children.

Passed.

BY-LAWS.

No. 3. Strike out "a minute book, in which" and revise to read: "Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate report of all meetings of the State Division, shall notify all chapters of contemplated changes in the Constitution thirty days before the Convention, and shall keep a roll of the chapters of the Division, the dates of their organization, and the addresses of their officers.

Motion was then made to adjourn.

SECOND DAY-Morning Session

After the reciting of the Lords' Prayer by the Convention assembled, and a most touching prayer by the Chaplain, Miss James, the business session began at 10:30 o'clock.

The President appointed the following Committee on resolutions of thanks:

Mrs. D. A. Garrison, Gastonia, chairman; Mrs. J. B. Richardson, High Point; Mrs. W. M. Ransom, Littleton; Mrs. B. L. Tyree, Durham; Mrs. Newton Smith, Fayetteville.

Telegrams were read, one from that ever good friend of the Daughters and true soldier, Gen. Julian S. Carr of Durham, and one from the Virginia convention, in session in Suffolk. The motion was made and carried that responses be sent to both. This was done.

The song "United" composed by our gifted and highest type of womanhood, Mrs. Mary Speed Mercer, of Edgecombe county, was sung by the choir, after which, Mrs. Winstead explained the reason the Daughters should be loyal to this song.

Then Mrs. Mercer most interestingly gave a sketch of the purpose of her work. Each chapter was earnestly requested to insist that the sale of the song be encouraged in order that the Endowment Fund, for the perpetuation of Annie Lee's grave, might soon be established.

As is the beautiful custom, time was given for Memorial exercises, and chapters so unfortunate were called upon to pay tribute to their deceased members. The President requested a moment of perfect silence.

A moment of peculiar interest to your Recording Secretary was when the "mother" of the North Carolina Division, Mrs. W. M. Parsley, of Wilmington, a noble woman that knew the hardships of '61-65, and bore them with equal patience and fortitude, was escorted to the platform, and Mrs. Williams, in most touching and appropriate words presented the beautiful pin to her, that was the privilege and pleasure of her Daughters to give her.

MRS. WILLIAMS'S PRESENTATION OF PIN

DAUGHTERS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA DIVISION:

Will you, for a few moments, go with me back in memory to those days that tried men's souls, that made heroes of these men and yet greater heroines of the women.

'Twas a day in 1862; the scourge of disease and pestilence lay over the city, where dwelt a proud young couple, to whom all was joy and sunshine, for they had that day plighted their troth to each other; she a maiden yet in her teens, he a brave and noble young man. But the clouds of war gathered fast and faster. His State needed his services, so with breaking heart though smiting lips, this fair young bride bade her husband go forth to battle for the right.

A few brief visits home, to brighten the lives of the lonely wife and her tiny babes. The dark day of Appomattox was approaching and the little remnant of that long gray line would soon return to their firesides and their families. But the Master yet needed a few more of the South's grand heroes, and one day in the fight around Petersburg this young hero, now bearing the title of Colonel, laid down his life upon his country's altar.

Dark days of sorrow and fight with poverty ensued for that young widow and her babes, but with it all she yet found time and heart to aid those weary, heart-sore men who had fought beneath the Stars and Bars. To aid[•] them in sickness and distress, and to cover with earth's fairest blossoms the silent resting places of the men who wore the Gray was to her ever one of life's greatest pleasures.

About 1893 there came the news of the organizing of the first chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy. The cause, for which this chapter was to do and dare, appealed to the eager heart of this noble woman, and she persuaded the Memorial Association of her

native town to become the third chapter of this great organization. By 1896 several other chapters had been formed in the State, and this same leader called them together in the city of Wilmington, and there formed the North Carolina Division of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

From that day to this, our friend and organizer has ever stood ready to aid in every good work for the Confederate cause. Time and again she has been the head of the banner chapter in the state. To us, one and all she is a tender loving mother. Her ear is ever ready to listen to her Daughters call for assistance. To many of us she is well known, to others more or less a stranger, but to us all a well beloved mother. There is but one person in this grand old state of ours, to whom we give that name, and that is Mrs. William M. Parsley, the organizer of the North Carolina Division. Such is but a brief, imperfect sketch of one, who stands for all that is true, noble and grand among that band of heroines, the Women of the Confederacy.

And now, dear Mrs. Parsley, your Daughters have bid me bring to you in their name, this slight token of their love and esteem. May its scintilating jewels speak to your heart of the glory of a cause, we know was right. May its encircling wreath remind you of the laurels that will forevermore rest upon the memories of every hero who bore the gray and of every woman who stayed at home and waited for the tidings from the front. May the pin itself bring to you ever, thoughts of the tenderest love and devotion of your Daughters of the North Carolina Division.

Mrs. Winstead was so enthused she requested the Convention to assist her in giving expression to her feelings by singing "Blest be the Tie that Binds."

A letter was read from the Hon. L. V. Bassett, regretting his inability in not being able to carry out his part of the program. His place was taken by General Irwin Walker, Commander Army of Northern Virginia, U. C. V., asking the Division to lend its support and influence for the erection of a Monument to the Women of the Confederacy—our Mothers and Grand-Mothers. Motion was made by Mrs. Henry A. London:

That the President appoint a committee to memorialize the next Legislature for an appropriation to crect this Monument to the Women of the Confederacy.

After much discussion it was carried, then followed by another:

To reconsider Friday morning immediately after the opeuing of Convention.

Motion was seconded and carried.

Report by the Chairman of the Memorial Arch Committee was read and accepted.

REPORT MEMORIAL ARCH

DAUGHTERS AND FRIENDS OF THE CONFEDERACY:

As many of you know the movement to erect a Memorial Gateway at the entrance of the Confederate Cemetery in Raleigh was inaugurated at the Convention held in Asheville seven years ago. It was voted at a subsequent Convention that each chapter donate twenty dollars. Since that time about 45 chapters have responded, and so far about 40 chapters for some reason have not contributed to this object.

A resume of the progress of the work may be important. We now have about \$1000 in hands of the treasurer. We need \$2000 for the work. This will about cover the stone work and will not include bronze tablets with names of all the chapters inscribed thereon. Since this cemetery holds the mortal remains of over 1000 soldiers of the Southern Confederacy, representing every Southern State; therefore the Memorial will not be a local one, but to memorialize the Southern soldiers. I recommend the following as a suitable inscription:

"A Memorial to the soldiers of 13 States, erected by the U. D C. of North Carolina."

We hope to enroll the name of every chapter in North Carolina. Every daughter and member should have the privilege of adding to this fund. It is a glorious opportunity for the daughters of the state to unite in erecting this Memorial Gateway, which will stand as a tribute to Southern Valor and an enduring evidence of woman's devotion to her valiant dead, of those who gave their lives to a lost cause, and whose deeds will never die, but will live in the hearts of a devoted and grateful people.

Motion was made by Mrs. Winstead:

That after the Wyatt Monument fund is raised, we make the Memorial Arch a special work for the coming year.

This brought forth unusual discussion, but was carried. Motion was made to adjourn after the announcement was made that the Convention would be entertained in the evening by the Benovelent Protective Order of Elks of Rocky Mount.

Luncheon was given by the Tobacco Board of Trade.

SECOND DAY-Afternoon Session

At 2:40 o'clock business was resumed, opening with prayer by the Chaplain.

Following the rules of the Constitution the election of officers was taken up.

Tellers, Mrs. Chas. Lee Smith, Mrs. Marshall Williams, and Miss Lena Reinhardt, were appointed.

The following officers were elected unanimously:

Mrs. F. M. Williams, Newton, President; Mrs. M. O. Winstead, Rocky Mount, 1st Vice-President; Mrs. Josephus Daniels, Raleigh, 2nd Vice President; Miss Carrie Leazar, Mooresville, 3 Vice-President; Thad W. Thrash, Tarboro, Recording Secretary; Mrs. W. C. Feimster, Newton, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Robt. Kornegay, Goldsboro, Treasurer; Mrs. Robert Davis, Louisburg, Registrar; Mrs. W. M. Creasy, Wilmington, Recorder of Crosses; Miss Rebecca Cameron, Hillsboro, Historian; Mrs. W. O. Shannon, Henderson, Assistant Historian; Miss Hettie James, Wilmington, Chaplain.

Motion was made that letters be written to Mrs. Shannon and Mrs. Wills expressing regrets at their absence and sympathy for them in their recent bereavements. This was done.

Report of Educational Committee was read by the Chairman, Mrs. Overman, and accepted.

EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE REPORT

PRESIDENT AND DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY:

To-day, I stand before this Convention in the place of another: lovely Mrs. Brodnax, who has taken such active interest in this noble work, has halted on account of deep affliction, and our President, Mrs. Williams, asked my services in her place for the year. The work is new to me and I have not accomplished as much as I hoped, still our efforts have not gone backward, but interest has been kindled in new directions. It is truly said a mother's influence never dies but reaches onward and upward through Seed sown is felt through coming generations. Next to eternity. motherhood is the power of education reaching onward and upward. Therefore the educational interests of the Daughters of the Confederacy must be our noblest and best work. To honor our dead heroes with monuments, must be done, for monuments tell a nation's history, a nation's glory. To shelter our infirm veterans is fulfilling a divine command, honoring old age, the greatest of these is charity, is love. But with education for the young is a power for future generations, future greatness. Who can estimate what the power of education is? The development of mind and heart, that lights genius, that opens to the world some powerful discovery, some invention to help mankind, some great missionary to go forth to the world carrying the light of Salvation to darkeded minds. 'Tis here then we find the blessed comfort that we are on the right duty, lighting the right spark. This educational interest begun must be continued, become perpetual, the noble work yearly increasing, pressing onward. I find in talking of the work of the U. D. C., more interest is awakened when we speak of what we are trying to do for the education of the children of veterans than any other. I feel that in this direction we have the prospect of raising more money, than for any other object. Camps, individuals, memorial scholarships have a prospect of being perfected, let us then hope, let us hope for great success.

Our Treasurer in her report gave the amount of funds on hand, and what chapters are interested in this great movement. The opening of the fall term at Greensboro in September received three young girls sent there by the educational fund of the Daughters of the Confederacy, one from Newton, one from Mooresville, the third from Reidsville. We would like to place at least four scholarships instead of three.

Each suggestion was voted on separately and accepted:

1st. All Chairmen of Committees have the privilege of calling on the State funds for postage connected with their work.

2nd. All chapters to be taxed one cent per capita to pay for the complete list of registration up to date.

3rd. To continue the appropriations and committees for the Soldiers' Home and to have a purchasing committee for same.

Report from the Arlingtan Monument was next read by Miss Hicks in the absence of the Chairman, Mrs. Faison, and accepted.

ARLINGTON MONUMENT REPORT

MADAM PRESIDENT AND DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY:

The report of the North Carolina Division for the Arlington Confederate Monument Association is not as good this year as it

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has been for the past two years, I am sorry to say. So many of our towns and counties are erecting Confederate Monuments it is hard for the chapters to contribute to everything.

North Carolina has always stood second in this work, and I hope next year we will endeavor to be first.

Why cannot every chapter in the Staie raise \$100.00; or the smaller ones, \$50.00, during the coming year, and pay what North Carolina is expected to give at one time, so I will not have to call upon the chapters every year? Even my penny collections from the schools in the State have not been so good, but since I began this it has added quite a nice amount to our collection. I began this penny collection in the State for Arlington Monument alone and it is my scheme.

Ladics, I wish to tell you about a Confederate Seal or Stamp to be used on all Christmas packages, letters, postals or anything sent by mail or hand, gotten out by Mrs. Edgar James of the Florence, Alabama, Chapter, U. D. C., and sanctioned by that State and our President General, Mrs. McSherry. It is now ready for use and all chapters are expected and earnestly urged to take hold of this work for Arlington Monument. I will take order for them at once; \$5.00 for one hundred envelopes, with one hundred seals in each envelope; 50 cents for each envelope, and they can be retailed two for one penny. So you see you can make a neat sum, and it is all credited to your chapter for Arlington alonc. Send all money to me and I will send to State Treasurer, as this money belongs to our General Convention. Every cent made on these seals or stamps belongs to Arlington Monument exclusively.

Each State Director sent \$50.00 and received one thousand seals, which will net \$500.00 or more.

CHAPEL HILL MONUMENT REPORT

In April, the committee appointed for this work, met in Chapel Hill. Mrs. F. M. Williams, State President, a member ex-officio of this committee, was present.

President Venable presided over the meeting, and showed many beautiful designs that had been sent for our inspection by different firms of marble works and sculptors.

Most of these were too expensive for us to even consider.

Plans for raising money for the erection of this monument were discussed. One of these designs from Mr. John Wilson, sculptor, was beautiful, but cost more than we could afford. This design was presented at last Convention, and was much admired. We decided to write to Mr. Wilson for further estimates for a less expensive monument, and to decide on it at our next meeting in June. Before adjourning, we selected the site for the monument. It is to be north of the Caldwell monument, and about fifteen feet on the north side of the main walk that runs across the campus from east to west. This is a fine position for it.

The committee met again in June, during commencement week. This time it was augmented by the auxiliary or advisory committee of Veterans which had been selected at the former meeting in April. This "advisory committee" consisted of General Carr, Colonel Kenan, Maj. H. A. London, Maj. E. J. Hale and Dr. Venable.

After examining the beautiful designs, (some of them slightly changed), and discussing the minutest details of each, the joint committee decided on the one sent by Mr. John Wilson, a Canadian Sculptor, now living in Boston. He had changed it somewhat at the suggestion of the committee, and considerably reduced its price for us. Its cost will be \$7500. It is thought that the alumni will give a great part of it, if the Daughters will give \$1500.

We can easily do this, but we must hurry; for the Veterans of the State earnestly desire that it shall be unveiled in June 1911, when the "Boys of '61 and '65" hold their Reunion at the University during commencement week. It will be the fiftieth anniversary of 1861.

I quote from President Venable's interesting speech at last Convention:

Dr. Venable said that he was an adopted son of North Carolina, but one who loves the State as a native son. He had been thrilled

with the historic story of the University and knew of no story in history that would compare with it. The placing of the monument on the campus is not a local matter, for North Carolina and the University are inseparable. The pages of the civil history of the State are filled with the deeds of University men. He regretted that the records had been imperfectly kept, and stated that even though the records are not complete the story is an inspiring one-There were all told, more than 1,000 University men in the struggle between the States, enlisting from various States of the South and out of this number one-third were killed. At least 40 per cent of the students entered the military service which is a record not equaled by any other institution. From some of the big Northern institutions there were 23 per cent; from University of Virginia, the the speaker's alma mater, 25 per cent. Of those who volunteered from Virginia 225 were killed while of the North Carolinians between 340 and 350 never returned home. They laid down their lives in the most important battles of the war.

Dr. Venable said that he would like to see the monument at the University because it would tell eloquently of the story of the sacrifice made by the students prior to the civil war. Their record should ever be before the eyes of the present-day students. Tablets have been erected in memory of those who lost their lives, and those who enlisted are worthy of a monument.

Let us all come forward, and give the money now, or as soon as possible, so that we can know what to depend on. Mr. Wilson told me on his visit to North Carolina in July, that he had always required a guaranty of 1-3 of the money in advance, but, that feeling sure that the Daughters would pay him before the unveiling of the monument, he would not require it of us.

I beg of you to attend to this immediately. For unless a sufficient amount is paid in early in the year, the committee will not feel justified in having Mr. Wilson go ahead with the work—the money not being in sight. And thus the monument could not be unveiled in June 1911.

NORTH CAROLINA ROOM IN RICHMOND MUSEUM REPORT-

MADAM PRESIDENT AND DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY:

I beg to submit the following report of the N. C. Room since our last State Convention in Wilmington. It is becoming more and more difficult to secure relics because of the effort of the owners to keep them in their own State, and naturally as the years go by the relics become scarcer. The following articles have been given:

A history of North Carolina given by the author Dr. J. B. Alexander, of Charlotte. Five pieces of calico that sold for \$9.00 and \$12.00 per yard that ran the blocade in Wilmington, and also some skeins of thread spun from cotton, and used for sewing, given by Mrs. Wm. Parsley of Wilmington, the first President of the United Daughters of the Confederacy in North Carolina. A sample of coffee taken from a sack which came through the blocade at Charleston, S. C., in 1863, given by Mrs. D. P. Hutchinson, Charlotte, N. C. Loans: Mrs. John Wilkes, of Charlotte, N. C., loaned a map that was the only one General Beauregard had to guide him in his campaign. This map was afterward returned to Capt. Wilkes with General Beauregard's thanks written on the margin.

An invitation from the Museum to the State regents to attend the annual meeting on June 3rd, could not be generally accepted I, however, had the pleasure of attending it and it was a privilege to be there and see for myself the work the ladies of the association have done for the honor of our State. I was entertained in the beautiful and hospitable home of our Vice Regent, Mrs. J. Allison Hodges, where I was the recipient of many social courtesies.

HENRY L. WYATT MONUMENT REPORT

MADAM PRESIDENT AND DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY:

Another year's work has drawn to a close and again we come to report to you the progress made in the particular phase of work that you have given unto our care and keeping, that of honoring our first Confederate hero, Henry L. Wyatt.

We, the U. D. C. and the Legislative committee that you and State have chosen to perfect this work, have worked with all our might, and given to it the best of our thoughts and service. With this our object in view, that the results of this work should be something that would be an honor to our State and Confederacy. Something that our army of grey jackets, yet with us, and, even were it possible, the noble comrades that have crossed over the river, could look down and see we honor our Confederates with the very best we have to give.

Three times during the past twelve months our committees have met together to discuss and plan for the completion of this work. It has been a pleasure and a rare privilege to have the gifted men of the Legislative committee to work with us, and we feel indebted to them for the interest shown in this undertaking and for their valuable assistance.

The entire amount of our fund now is \$2,231.62, the following chapters having contributed this year: Leonidas Polk, Chapel Hill; Graham, Graham; Cape Fear, Wilmington; Anson, Wadesboro; Junius Daniels, Weldon; Geo. Singletary, Greenville; Thomas Ruffin, Goldsboro; Cleveland Guards, Shelby; Henry Wyatt, Selma.

Besides the chapters that have contributed, there are quite a number of men and women, who have proven their patriotism by giving most liberally to this cause, and we most heartily appreciate this personal interest.

Knowing so well of what our State is capable, we decided not

to wait until our entire amount was safely lodged in our treasury, but to give the commission for the monument, feeling sure that ere it is completed we will have every dollar.

At our first committee meeting Mr. John Hinsdale, Jr., was appointed our Secretary and he has most faithfully filled this office, and we fully appreciate the amount of work he has done for us.

By the suggestion of Mrs. Allison Hodges of Richmond, and the untiring efforts of Mr. Hinsdale, we have secured a Sculptor of National reputation to make this monument. We have given the commission to Sir Moses Ezekiel, a Virginian by birth, a V. M. Iboy that left that college to go out and fight for our Confederacy. His works of art adorn many foreign palaces. We have in our Southland some of his work but not in our State.

As the music of the Masters is but the echo of the music of their souls, so is the picture or the statue of an artist but the embodiment of all the music and the poetry of his soul.

When the monument is completed we feel that it will not be only cold metal and stone, but will be a work of tender sentiment and love. Something fit to stand for bravery and true worth, a beacon to the youths of our land, beckoning them on to patriotism.

We can truly say this work of ours has been a work of pleasure. love and sentiment, now for the realization of our fond hopes we have turned our hearts, work over to a Confederate, who gave his service for our Southland. Who could more fittingly shape and mould our love of brave youth and true worth into something beautiful and lasting. Something we can be proud to show to the whole world and they can feel that love inspired it.

We trust now that ere this Convention closes we can raise the amount needed to complete our fund, for here in dear old Rocky Mount we have heard so much of Henry Wyatt.

We have been entertained in the homes of his comrades, we have had the honor of looking into the faces of two of the men who were with Wyatt when he fell, Capt. John Thorpe and Mr. Bob Ricks. These men are real live heroes, heroes of Bethel and many years of war and privation.

Let it be said that it was here we completed the amount needed to erect a monument to the Edgecombe county boy who was the first to give his life for our Confederacy.

The contract assures us the Wyatt monument will be completed in the year 1911.

Also the omission just discovered of a historical paper sent by the Historian of the Monroe chapter, Miss Margie Williamson who says Union county sent 11 companies, all officered by her own sons, to the front 1: the first two years of the war. A splendid record truly.

My only apology for omitting to mention these papers, in my report is that they came at a time of great distress and anxiety and one was mislaid, the others overlooked.

. To this end we respectfully suggest the passing of the following resolution unauimously:

Resolved. that we, the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, in Convention assembled, do unanimously, and earnestly beseech the honorable, the Legislature of the State of North Carolina, at its next session, to pass a bill for the immediate erection of a safe, commodious and handsome fireproof building, to be used for the storage and preservation of all Historical material, documents, records, papers, letters, mss., books, newspapers, maps, prints and everything relative to the domain of History in all its bearings and branches.

And we also beg that different funds do and shall be provided

in said bill to build such a house as will set forth the pride and dignity of its purpose and represent in its way the splendor of North Carolina History.

Your committee would also urge that the President or Corresponding Secretary, of each chapter in the Division, either see personally, or writ to the Senator and Representaive of her district and county and beg them to vote for the passage of this bill.

After which the "Grand Master Masou" and Durham Lodge of Masons had most impressive services, and laid the corner stone in the base of our Confederate Monument, which we hope to soon erect over our fallen heroes' graves in Maplewood Cemetery. Forty nine Crosses of Honor were presented by the Chapter and presented by Elizabeth Davis Tyree and Matilda Bryant of the Children's Chapter. Many war songs . were rendered by the school children and while the band played Dixie the two little girls placed our emblem, the 'Laurel Wreath," and a bunch of white carnations tied with the U. D. C. colors on the base of the monument.

MADAM PRESIDENT, DAUGHTERS AND CHILDREN OF THE CONFEDERACY:

I congratulate myself that it is my delightful task to bear to you to-day, the hearty greetings of the Washington Grays Chapter, Children of the Confederacy and assure you that as the years go by we faint not nor grow weary in commemorating the brave deeds of a noble ancestry. We remember them most tenderly today, as they sleep. Our Chapter was organized by the late lamented and much beloved leader, Mrs. W. H. Call, in the year 1887, being the first organized in North Carolina, and the second in the entire south, Virginia leading with the first, North Carolina second. When organized it had only sixty-five members, but that number soon increased to one hundred. Mrs. Call was inspired to organize the Chapter not to perpetuate the memory of our noble ancestry by the recital of cruel wrongs, that occurred during the great civil strife, but free from the feelings of ill will and bitterness, untrammeled by prejudice and unfettered by bias, she saw the necessity of teaching to us the truth of history in its simplicity, in love and in peace. As some of you are aware, we have placed in the North Carolina room of the "White House" of the Confederacy, at Richmond, an oil portrait of General Bryan Grimes, costing about one hundred dollars. We have also placed a portrait of Mayor Thomas Sparrow in the room of the Historical Society of N. C. in Raleigh, costing about one hundred dollars. Major Sparrow, after whom our Chapter was named, commanded the first company raised in Beaufort county. In 1905 we erected a beautiful monument to the memory of seventeen soldiers killed in 1862, in defence of Washington. This cost about one hundred and fifty dollars. We have disinterred a large number of soldiers and placed their remains in the Confederate plot in our city cemetery, and marked each grave with a marble slab. Another delightful labor which we have performed is contributing to the necessities of soldiers' families, giving them timely and substantial aid.

Of course we aid the Daughters on Memorial Day, for we feel

that they could not get along well without us, and we take great pleasure in rendering all the assistance we can. Our labors for the past year have not been so abundant as in former years, but we hope to turn over a new leaf and improve the coming year, under the leadership of Mrs. G. C. Bragaw.

Too, they were a feature of the day with their red and white badges, wreaths and flowers, when they marched in a body to the cemetery, there covering the graves of the Confederates with flowers, and singing songs to their memory.

Remember that all application blanks must be filled out and signed in ink by two Veteran endorsers, giving company and regiment of each. 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

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

United Daughters of the Confederacy

(AS AMENDED AT THE ROCKY MOUNT CONVENTION, 1910)

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

The name of this organization shall be the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be benevolent, memorial, educational, historical and social. To accomplish these purposes, it will seek:

1. To give assistance, when needed, to survivors of the war and those dependent upon them.

2. To honor the memory of those who fell in the service of the Confederate States, and to remember gratefully those survivors who have faithfully served and suffered, and remain loyal to the Confederate Cause.

3. To collect and preserve relics, objects and incidents of historic value, to record deeds of heroism of Southern men and women, and to unite with the Confederate veterans in the determination that the portion of American history relating to the late war shall be properly taught in the public schools of the State, and to use its influence towards this object in all private schools.

4. To bring into its organization the women throughout the State who are elegible to membership and loyal to the memories and principles of the Confederate cause.

ARTICLE III.

MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. All Chapters, which are properly chartered in the State, thereby become members of this Division. Seven or more women can organize a Chapter anywhere in North Carolina by applying for a charter through the State headquarters, only white women being eligible to membership. Those women entitled to membership are the widows, wives, mothers, sisters, nieces and lineal descendants of such men as served honorably in the Confederate army, navy, or civil service, or of those men, unfit for active duty, who loyally gave aid to the cause; also women and their lineal descendants, wherever living, who can give proof of personal service and loyal aid to the Southern cause during the war. All application blanks must be signed by one or more veterans who know the elegibility of the applicant.

Sec. 2. A member in good standing of any chapter, desiring to change her membership shall be entitled to receive from her chapter a demit, certifying that she is a member in good standing—which, if presented within six months, shall make good her membership in any chapter to which she may be acceptable.

Sec. 3. A daughter can belong to two or more chapters if she desires, by paying dues in all, but she can only vote in one chapter.

ARTICLE IV.

OFFICERS.

Sec. 1. The officers of the Division shall be a President, three Vice Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar. Historian, Assistant Historian and Chaplain, to be elected annually on the second day of convention, said convention to convene on the second Wednesday of each succeeding October, unless for good reasons the president finds it necessary to change the date. In the election of officers, nominations shall be made from the floor, election by ballot, a majority shall elect. No person can nominate another for office unless she knows the nominee will serve if elected and is present at the Convention, except when she already holds office and is detained by sickness or other cause to be decided by the executive committee. The term of office of the incumbents to expire on the day after the convention on which day said incumbents shall turn over to the newly elected officials all letters, papers, etc., pertaining to the business of said office.

Sec. 2. All Chapters must hold their annual election of officers at their November meetings, and the Recording Secretaries of the past year are required to at once notify the State Recording Secretary of the result of said elections.

ARTICLE V.

MEETINGS.

Sec. 1. The Division shall meet annually, the second Wednesday in October at such place as the preceding convention shall designate. An annual meeting should be held by all the Chapters in the State on June 3rd, the birthday of Jefferson Davis, the only President of the Confederacy, and January 19th, in honor of the birthdays of Generals Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson, the name to be known as Lee-Jackson Day.

Sec. 2. Each Chapter shall be entitled at all meetings of the Seate Division to one representative for the first seven members, and an additional vote for each additional twenty-five members But representatives shall be based upon the per capita tax paid.

Sec 3. Each State officer and Chapter president shall be entitled to one vote in the Convention.

ARTICLE VI.

FEES, DUES, ETC.

Sec. 1. A fee of \$5.00 shall be charged each Chapter for its charter, \$3.00 for General and \$2.00 for State fee, and 100 blanks; 50 cents shall be charged for each additional 100 blanks.

Sec. 2. Upon organization and before each succeeding March 1, each Chapter shall pay into the treasury of the State Division 10 cents for State and 10 cents for general tax for every member who may at such a date be in good standing on its rolls. All new members received into the Chapter between January 1st and October 1st, must pay their capita tax by the latter date or they will not be entitled to be counted in the Convention.

Sec. 3. The seal of the State Division shall be the same as that of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, with the addition of the name of the State on the onter rim.

Sec. 4. The badge to be worn by members of this Division shall be the same as set forth in the Constitution of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE VII.

CROSSES OF HONOR.

Sec. 1. Each Chapter should see that all veterans in its vicinity be given an opportunity to obtain a Cross of Honor. Crosses can only be bestowed on four days: January 19th, Lee-Jackson Day; May 10th, Memorial Day; June 3rd, President Davis's birthday; and August 23rd, North Carolina's special day. The bestowal must take place according to the U. D. C. Cross of Honor rules, but after having complied with them, veterans can be given their crosses whenever they call for them or at annual reunions. In reporting to State Recorder, bestowal of crosses, only give one of four legal days.

ARTICLE VIII.

CHILDREN'S AUXILIARIES.

Sec. 1. All Chapters should endeavor to have under them a Children's Auxiliary, presided over by one of their members as Leader.

Sec. 2. Each child must fill rpplication blank with same certificate as for a Daughter, said blank being received when party wishes to join regular U. D. C. Same rules of eligibility are required in both cases.

Sec. 3. Children are required to pay no taxes. A record of their application must be kept by the Leader, but not sent to State Registrar. Leaders must also report monthly to mother Chapters and send yearly reports to State Convention. But their work and disposition of money made by them to be decided by the Leader and children.

Sec. 4. Each Leader of a Children's Chapter shall be entitled to one vote in our State Convention, regardless of the size of the Chapter.

ARTICLE IX.

SPECIAL POWERS,

Sec. 1. This Division shall have the power to make and adopt such rules, regulations and by-laws as it may deem proper and expedient, provided such be not repugnant to the laws of North Carolina, or to the Constitution of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. Sec. 2. This Division shall have power to establish Chapters in any county in the State, subject to rules and regulations of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE X.

CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be changed or amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegate representation in regular session assembled, and after notification of at least thirty days before the meeting at which amendment is to be made.

BY-LAWS.

No. 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, announce the business before the Division; state and put all questions; preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order. She shall have the general supervision of the Division; appoint all committees; and approve all orders drawn on the treasury for payment of money. She shall call special meetings of the Division at 'the request of the Chapters.

No. 2. The Vice-President shall assist the President in her work, and in Convention in the absence of the President, the senior Vice-President shall act as President and discharge the duties of that office.

No. 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate report of the meeting of the State Division, shall notify all chapters of contemplated changes in the Constitution thirty days before the Convention, and shall keep a roll of the Chapters of the Division, the dates of their organization, and the addresses of their officers.

No. 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence, file all letters of importance, and keep an accurate note of all letters written by her for the Division. She shall notify all committees of their appointment and shall furnish the names of all to their respective chairman.

No. 5. The Treasurer shall collect all State dues, and disburse the same, under orders of the President, for the current expenses of the Division. She shall give receipts to treasurers of Chapters for the annual assessment received from them, and shall send her report with her books to the Auditing Committee, so as to be in their hands first day of Annual Convention.

No. 6. An Auditing Committee, composed of three members, shall audit the books of the Treasurer the first day of Annual Convention and make report at same.

No. 7. The Registrar shall keep a register of the names of all members of the Chapters, and the date of their admission to membership. The Recording Secretaries of the various Chapters shall send to her from time to time the applications for membership which they have received. The Registrar shall record these and return to Chapters if so desired. The Registrar shall have custody of all applications for Chapters.

No. 8. The Committee on Credentials, before allowing Chapter votes, shall confer with Treasurer and Registrar in order to make the number of votes consistent with the reports of those officers according to the per capita tax paid in each Chapter; and it shall be the duty of each Chapter President to send to the State Registrars just before the meeting of the Convention, a revised list of members of her Chapter indicating losses by death or removal.

No. 9. The Historian shall collect all records and incidents connected with the Confederacy and our glorious Southern valor and especially the part taken by North Carolina and by the women of the State, as well in self sacrifice and in untiring effort after the war, in the re-construction of the South, as ir perfect endurance of hardship and patriotic devotion during the struggle, and shall safely keep and preserve the same. She shall have custody of all historical papers and shall claim the co-operation of all the historians of the various Chapters of the State.

No. 10. That all printing, of whatever kind to be done for State officers or chairmen of committees must be sent to the Recording Secretary, and by her forwarded, with price of same, to the President, who will decide if work is necessary, and approve before printing is done.

No. 11. That fifty votes shall constitute a quorum of the convention of the North Carolina Division.

Adopted April 26th, 1897. Amended October, 1910.

RULES FOR BESTOWAL OF CROSSES OF HONOR

RULE 1.

Section 1. Each State and Territorial Division shall elect, or appoint a Recorder of Crosses of Honor, to whom Chapters shall apply for blank certificates of eligibility to be filled out by the veterans, and blank forms for alphabetical lists, to be filled out with data from the certificates, by the President of the Chapter ordering Crosses. When so filled out these shall be sent to the Recorder of said division, for approval or correction, and forwarded by her to the Custodian of Crosses, who will forward the Crosses to the Chapter, provided the rules have been complied with, and the decision of the Custodian shalf be final.

The Recorders shall apply to the Custodian of Cross of Honor U. D. C., for the blank forms of certificates, and blank forms of alphabetical lists, supplying these, on demand, to the Chapters, accompanied by an order to the Custodian, signed by the President General and Recording Secretary General, U. D. C.

Section 2. The oldest living lineal descendant of Veteran: who has not received a Cross, may secure it in any county. Both Veterans and descendants can receive Crosses on some historical day.

If there is no lineal descendant of Veteran, or, in case, that the oldest lineal descendant does not desire the Cross, the widow of a Veteran may receive the Cross, by presenting with her application written avowal of such descendant, that he or she waives the right to the Cross, provided said widow be a Confederate woman, who has endured the hardships and privations of the period from "Sixty one to Sixty five."

No descendant, or widow can receive a second Cross, such privilege being granted to Veterans alone, nor can such descendant or widow wear the Cross.

The Custodian General will supply to the Recorder of Cross of Honor of such States and Territorial division, special blank forms of certificates for descendants and widows, which must be filled with data of eligibility, such blank forms in use should conform with the headings used in the Record Book of the Custodian Geneaal. Section 3. After waiting one month, Chapters shall send to the DIvision Recorder rnd Custodian, names of Veterans for whom Crosses have been received and not claimed, and these Crosses, if not engraved, may be used at the next bestowal, provided, other certificates in due form have been sent to the Custodian.

RULE 2.

Section 1. No Crosses will be furnished by the Custodian unless the order is accompanied by certificates of eligibility, properly filled out, by the veterans, and certified to by two, or more members of a camp of United Confederate Veterans, and alphabetical list from Chapter president.

Section 2. Presidents of Chapters shall fill out blank alphabetical lists from the certificates with all data contained therein to forward with certificates to their State Recorder of Cross of Honor with money order, for the number of Crosses desired.

The Custodian of the Cross of Houor shall keep a book, or books, in which shall be kept, alphabetically arranged, the names and data of all veterans, descendants of veterans, and widows to whom Crosses have been issued.

Section 3. The certificates shall be returned by the Custodian to the President of Chapters who have ordered Crosses, and the same be placed on file by the said Chapter, that data may be furnished when needed for historical, or other purposes.

Section 4. Each Chapter shall keep a book, alphabetically arranged, in which is recorded the name and service of every veteran, and ancestor of descendant. and widow, of a veteran who receives a Cross. Each State or Territorial Recorder shall keep a similar record book of all Crosses issued,

RULE 3.

Section 1. Crosses may be granted by the muster roll of the nearest camp, U. C. V., and to Confederate veterans who are not members of a camp, who can give the required proof of eligibility, attested by two veterans who are members of a camp.

Section 2. The oldest living lineal descendant may secure the Cross, by giving the same proof of eligibility as that required of his veteran ancestor—and Confederate widows of veterans, applying for Cross, must fill blank form of certificate, giving service of veteran, whose widow she is—such widows must have endured the hardships of the war period from 1861 to 1865. Section 3. Upon the certificate of a reputable physician that a veteran is dying, if desired, he may receive the Cross immediately.

RULE 4.

Section 1. The Crosses may be bestowed on Memorial or Decoration Day, selected by each State or Territorial Division, U. D. C.; the birthdays of President Jefferson Davis and General Robt. E. Lee—June 3rd and January 19th; and one commemorative day, between July 1st and January 19th, to be selected by each State or Territorial Division, in convention assembled. North Carolina has selected August 23. The presentation shall be accompanied with such ceremonies as will give proper dignity to the occasion.

RULE 5.

Section 1. A veteran, in good standing, having lost his Cross, may have it replaced once only, by applying to the President of the Chapter from which he received the Cross, and he must furnish copy of the certificate upon which the Cross was first bestowed. If a second Cross is lost, a certificate may be given, in testimony that such veteran has been awarded a Cross. No descendart, or widow of a veteran. can have a second Cross.

Section 2. Chapter Presidents are urged to advise veterans to have their names engraved on the bar of Cross, for the purpose of identification, if lost.

Section 3. A veteran having been awarded a Cross, and dying before it is received, the President of the Chapter bestowing it may give it to the oldest lineal descendant, or widow, under provisions of Rule 1, Section 2. A veteran, having received a Cross, may bequeath it to any lineal descendant that he may select.

Section 4. On, and after November 1st, 1912, no more Crosses shall be issued.

RULE 6.

The Cross cannot be worn, in any case, or on any occasion, except by the Veteran upon whom it was bestowed—no descendant or widow can wear it.

RULE 7.

Section 1. Where counties have no local organization of U. D. C., a veteran may receive the Cross through the President of the nearest local Chapter, as the President of Chapter in the county

from which he entered the Confederate service, if so desired.

Section 2. When Chapters are not able to bear the expense of purchasing Crosses for other counties than their own, these may be furnished at the expense of the general association, upon the authority of the President General, U. D. C.

RULE 8.

All orders for Crosses shall be filed in the Custodian's office three weeks before the day intended for bestowal.

RULE 9.

Any Chapter departing from these rules will not be entitled to Crosses for presentation.

Preceding the presentation of the Crosses, Rules V., VI., VII., VII., and IX., shall be read upon every occasion of the bestowal.

The President of each Chapter shall see that the camps of Confederate Veterans and Sons of Confederate Veterans in her county shall receive a copy of these rules for continual reference.



FIRST DAY-Morning Session

The Fifteenth Annual Convention of the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy met Wednesday morning, October 25th, 1911 at 10:40 o'clock, in Winston-Salem. The Convention was called to order by Mrs. H. L. Riggins, the most capable President of the Jas. B. Gordon Chapter, and opened with prayer by the U. D. C. Chaplain, our much beloved Miss Hettie James, who always brings words of encouragement and peace to us.

Mr. Eugene E. Gray in eloquent and well chosen words turned over the keys of the Twin City, the largest leaf tobacco center in the world, to the North Carolina Division and made us "as welcome as could be."

Beautiful music by the Winston Orchestra as well

as songs and poems added much to the attractiveness of the program.

Greetings of welcome were brought from the Norfleet Camp United Confederate Veterans, from the local chapter Daughters of the American Revolution and the James B. Gordon Chapter, United Daughters of the Confederacy. They were responded to most feelingly by our honored State President.

The morning exercises being over, at 11:30 o'clock the State President, Mrs. Fannie Ransom Williams, declared the Convention opened for business.

Mrs. Williams then gave us the greatest honor the North Carolina Division has ever had, an introduction to Mrs. Cornelia Branch Stone, ex-president of the General Division, United Daughters of the Confederacy, the most highly honored woman of our Southern land.

Report of the President was then read.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

After another year of arduons, but pleasant, work for the good of the division, I bring to you an account of my stewardship as your president and come also to tell you of the work done in the Division and to make some suggestions, which after most careful thought and study seem to me necessary for the good of our work.

The year just finished has been the busiest within my knowledge as a Daughter. To the work I have given all mv energy and attention. Many questions and opinions have been asked and to all the best answers given as far as lay in my conception of the law, after giving to each special consideration. These decisions may not have coincided with the opinions of all, but they were the best constructions that your president could give, after much thought on each separate question.

Never before have the duties of the office been so heavy, nor the expenses so great. Letters have been more than double other years. The new law, made at the Little Rock convention, requiring all communications and printed matter to pass through the hands of the State President instead of being sent direct to chapters, while a most excellent one in many respects, causes very much greater expense to the Division.

The interest in all work, whether General, State or chapters has been greater than heretofore. There have been four new chapters added to our roll since last we met, viz: Harnett at Lillington, Transylvania at Brevard, McDowell at Marion, and Wilkes Valley Gnards at North Wilkesboro, also two new Children's Chapters, the Thomasville Blues at Thomasville and the Rocky Mount Standard Bearers at Rocky Mount. I would feel that justice were not done the new chapters at Breyard, Marion and North Wilkesboro did I fail to give them special mention for having done, what has never occurred before in the history of the Division, and that is that in ordering their charters they also sent in check to cover taxes and U. D. C. certificates.

Just here would I call the special attention of chapter presidents to the fact that it is required that every daughter be given one of these U. D. C. certificates by the chapter. Most new members are receiving them, but it is very much to be donbted if all old ones are supplied. This is a matter that should be inquired into by every chapter.

It is with regret that I must report the disbanding and cancelling of the charters of four chapters in the Division. Of these, three have been so for several years, but the hope has been cherished that they might be revived. These four chapters are; the Wm. A. Closs, Henderson; Theodore Hassell, Williamston; Knott's Island, Woodleigh; and Mt. Zion, Cornelius. Thus our revised roll shows 88 U. D. C. chapters and 37 children's chapters in the Division.

The work of the different officers and committees call for special praise, for they have all given time, thought and energy to their different works.

Shortly after the close of the last convention your president entered into correspondence with the Registrar General, relative to the manner in which she wished the state records sent her, with the result that a special lot of blanks giving the described dates, was gotten out for the use of the state registrar. Mrs. Davis at once began the work of making a complete and correct copy of every name registered upon the Division books, and early in the spring this record was sent to the Registrar General. A fine work most thoroughly done.

The Cross of Honor Record book which was ordered several years ago being full, your president ordered a duplicate from the same firm, for which, however, they insisted on charging \$11.00 against \$9.00 the time before. While on a visit to Atlanta Mrs.

Creasy made a copy of several hundred veterans names who had obtained Crosses prior to the establishing of the office of Recorder of Crosses. It is to be regretted that North Carolina has not a complete record of all these names. Chapters are especially urged to bear in mind the fact that there is only one more year in which these Crosses can be awarded to veterans or their descendents, so every exertion should be made to see that no one desiring a Cross fails to secure it at once.

Chapters are earnestly requested to send in their state and general taxes and their \$1.00 to the Sinking Fund by March 1st of each year. Bills for stationery and minutes are in the treasurer's hands by that time and she should have the funds to meet them. Besides, it adds to postage bills when the treasurer and president have to write many letters to get your taxes. Many chapters pay no attention to the law of \$1.00 each to be paid to the Sinking fund. This year only about half of the chapters having sent it in. Please notice this particularly.

Your president would call attention of chapters to the fact that the Keystone is the organ of the North Carolina Division, and one copy at least should be taken by every chapter and the North Carolina report read at each meeting. Mrs. Gordon Finger has proven herself most efficient as our state manager and has endeavored each month to give a brief summary of the work. The very small cost of the Keystone, and the great good to be derived from reading it should make it a most popular paper among Daughters.

Working in conjunction with Mrs. Marshall Williams chairman of the Endowment Fund Committee, Mrs. Latta Johnson, regent of the North Carolina Room in Richmond endeavored to secure an appropriation from the Legislature of \$1000 for that endowment. In this however they were not successful, but did succeed in having the amount raised from \$100 yearly to \$200.

Mrs. London has worked heroically for the Boy Soldier Monument at Chapel Hill, and the Alumni of the University last June pledged themselves to aid us in raising the fund necessary for this work

Miss Etheredge has completed the fund for the Wyatt Monument. When the small amount was needed to secure the \$2500 from the State, she personally borrowed the amount, which your president ordered refunded her, when the interest on the money in the hands of the state treasurer fell due.

Mrs. Moffett has by no means let the Memorial Arch drop and will tell you her ideas and plans to complete this work.

The Home for Wives and Widows was most ably placed before the legislature by Mrs. Hunter Smith and her committee but there was not money in the treasury that could be appropriated for this cause.

Our Educational work is still in a most flourishing condition. The same three young ladies were this year returned to the State Normal at Greensboro, after consultation with Dr. Foust, and twelve other schollarships of free tuition are awarded by various schools, and colleges in the state. The cost of living being so high, the expenses at the Normal have been raised \$25 for each young lady, so it is incumbent on these chapters, who have not yet contributed to this fund to do so at once. Your treasurer must meet these bills at stated times during the year, so that the amounts given for this purpose should be sent in early-

In obedience to your commands at Rocky Mount your president in the spring wrote to the American Flag Company relative to the state flag to be placed in the North Carolina Room in Richmond and on receiving samples of silk, submitted them to several Daughters, in whose knowledge of such matters she had perfect confidence. The flag was later placed in the hands of Mrs. Latta Johnston for the Richmond room.

The Soldiers Home has been well looked after by Mrs. M. S. Willard, Mrs. D. A. Garrison of this Committee and Mrs. Josephus Daniels of Purchasing Committee.

As far as can be ascertained five monuments have been unveiled this year. One at Henderson by the Vance County chapter, one at Elizabeth City by the D. H. Hill chapter, one at Ashboro by the Randolph chapter, a very handsome drinking fountain at Lincolnton by the Wallace Reinhardt chapter, Children of the Confederacy, and one to Hon. George Davis, Attorney General of the Confederate States at Wilmington. It was the privilege and pleasure of your president to be present on both the latter occasions, also to speak to the Cape Fear chapter at their celebration of "Shiloh Day". As soon as your president learned of the date set for the unveiling of the George Davis monument she wrote to each of her executive committee, asking their opinion regarding placing a wreath on the Monument for the Division as well as a suggestion as to cost of same. As a result of these letters a very beautiful wreath was placed at the base of the monument, and later taken to Mr. Davis' grave. Scotland chapter, Laurinburg has also completed their monument.

During the summer an appeal was made to your president for North Carolina to contribute to a testimonial for Mrs. Raines, our Custodian of Crosses, and the matter was placed in the hands of Mrs. Creasy with very fine results It is but right Mrs. Rains' great work should be recognized for it has been most stupenduous, Out of dreadful choos has she brought the most beautiful order, and has recorded in books the name and record of every man ever receiving a Cross of Honor. This has been a work of love done without any pay whatever.

At the old Hugunot Springs, Virginia is a graveyard, where sleeps many a North Carolina soldier. The sacred place has been deeded to the Richmond chapter, who have put it in order, and are trying to place an iron fence around it. The appeal comes to ns, to aid in thus protecting the graves of our dead heroes. Dauhgters of North Carolina be true to your own and let not this appeal go unheeded. Send your contributions to your State Treasurer.

Time and again have come protests against that miserable design for the monument to the Women of the Confederacy by Miss Kinney. North Carolina Daughters need never fear that this piece of statuary, an outrage to our noble mothers, as well as to our heroic fathers, will ever rise upon our soil. Better, far better, will be the handsome dormitory upon the State Normal grounds at Greensboro, for which our last Legislature appropriated \$25,000 and dedicated to the Women of the Confederacy. Noblest monument of all is this.

The Arlington monument has been most ably placed before you by Mrs. Faison, but a special appeal comes at this time to push the sale of the Arlington seals, as a testimonial of love to the memory of Mrs. Edgar James, who designed them, and who has lately been called to join the mighty hosts across the river, whom she desired to honor.

Shiloh Day was observed by all the chapters over the state, with the most gratifying results, which are due to the untiring efforts of Mrs. A. L. Smith. This is but the beginning of good work, which it is hoped will continue for Shiloh.

My friends it is necessary that this division awaken to the State's

financial affairs. Our treasurer will show you there is a deficit this this year, and some steps must be taken to meet the ever increasing state expenses. Year by year they grow larger. Our minutes are by far the heaviest. The price per page remains the same as given seven years ago, the cheapest that can be obtained, but the pages increase each year. Something must be done in order to make them less bulky. The subject has been one to which your president has given both thought and study during the past years, and hence would make a few suggestions:

1st. That all chapter reports be limited to the space allowed for remarks on the blanks, and if they exceed this the Recording Secretary be authorized to shorten them.

2nd. That all committee reports be limited to three typewritten pages.

3rd. That all addresses of any kind be omitted.

4th. That one or more pages be set aside for Memorial ones, giving simply names of deceased and chapters of deceased members, and date of death.

5th. That all committee stationery and expenses be paid out of said committee fund where there is one, otherwise from State fund.

6th. That the state tax be increased to 15 cents per member, as this is necessary to meet necessary expenses.

7th. That your state treasurer be instructed to pay out of the Sinking Fund, so far as it will go, all outstanding debts, also to continue to use next year's SinkingFund till these debts are liquidated.

8th. Your president would also suggest that hereafter one evening during each convention be set aside as Historical Evening, at which time suitable papers be read by ladies selected for the oceasion. This evening to be under the auspices of the Assistant Historian, who after consulting with the State Historian, will select the subjects for the papers and those to write them.

In June it was your president's privilege to go to Marion and aid in the final organization of the McDowell chapter, and on October 20th in the name of that chapter to welcome the Veterans to their Veteran's Day and explain to them the objects of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Your most particular attention is called to the question of demits. These blanks are gotten out by the general organization and are required where a Daughter moves from one chapter to

another, they must be signed by the president and secretary of the chapter on order from that chapter, end no paper or letter purporting to be a dismissal blank and signed by any other officer is legal. These blanks must be presented to the chapter named in the blank and registered in both chapter and state book, otherwise the lady cannot be counted as a member. Sufficient attention is not given to this matter and hence much confusion and misunderstanding results.

During the past year your president has written 2000 letters and 1000 post cards, signed and sent out 349 U D. C. certificates, and 79 children's certificates besides a number of blanks and other papers.

The saddest part of every report is that which tells of those who were once among us, but whose faces we shall see no more. This year has seen pass away the originator and designer of the Southern Cross of Honor, Mrs. S. E Gabbett of Atlanta. In our own Division death has taken in the prime of life and work our extreasurer Miss Alice Nelson of Greensboro, and also our earnest, devoted co-worker Mrs. Helen DeBerniere Wills, both true, loyal Daughters of the Confederacy, whose places are hard to fill. They were my friends true and tried, on whose advice I could always depend, and I miss them

And now my friends I feel that my report has been long but I wished to render unto you a just account of my stewardship. For seven years I have given to you and our work the best that was in me, of my time, my energy and my talents, it now remains with you to say how you think I have succeeded in my stewardship. Before laving down the office of high honor which you have bestowed upon me, I want to thank you one and all for all that you have been to me in my work, for the kind loving letters and messages that have come from you each year, and to tell you that no one will ever know how much they have been appreciated. May I ask that in the future you may prove to my successor in office the same true, helpful Daughters you have been to me. To you of my Executive Board and members of all my committees I would extend sincerest thanks for your aid and kindly forbearance with my many shortcomings, and may we in the future, as in the past, each in her own sphere, work together for the love of everything that belongs to the Confederacy.

And now my friends I am done. Confederate work will ever be

my joy and pride, and thus as your president I bid you farewell. Sincerely yours, FANNIE RANSOM WILLIAMS.

Reports from the Recording and Corresponding Secretaries, Registrar and Recorder of Crosses were read and accepted.

RECORDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Madam President and Daughters of the North Carolina Division, United Daughters of the Confederacy.

It is a priviledge and an honor for me to bring to you my second report as your Recording Secretary. Before giving this report allow me to thank collectively and individually you that have given me such cordial support, aiding me by words of encouragement and kindness to make my work one of pleasure. Each letter seemed to be from a loyal friend speaking ever thoughtfulness and consideration for me. Many of my most pleasant hours were caused by lovely invitations to your homes to unite with you in your local work for the Cause we represent.

It has always been my desire to answer all letters promptly by return mail if possible.

Our work holds its own; with an encouraging increase among the Children's Chapters. The State Books record 88 Chapters with 35 Children's Chapters, there being three new chapters:

Transylvania Chapter, McDowell Chapter Wilkes Valley Guards, Four Children's Chapters: Stonewall Jackson. Virginia Jacksie Daniel, Mrs William M Parsley, Fassifern Chapter,

There have been sent out 1221 Application Blanks and 424 for the Auxiliaries. 342 letters and 185 postals have been written. 79 childaen's certificates have been sold. I would suggest that more of these certificates be procured by these chapters. Very few demit blanks have been issued.

My dear co-workers now that my official duties and honors for the past two years are about to be laid down I wish to again thank you for the love you have shown me and the sympathy you have given my failures and shortcomings.

REGISTRAR'S REPORT.

Madam President and Daughters of the North Carolina Division: United Daughters of the Confederacy.

I herewith submit my report of work done, the past year.

Early last spring I completed the copy of our State Record, and sent it in to our Registrar-General, Mrs Gantt.

I have registered 365 applications and 17 demits; have written 141 letters and 42 post cards

This large number of letters and cards was rendered necessary by the fact that chapter officials do not seem to understand that it is now an essential that the Veterans endorsing the application papers must give both Regiment and Company to which they belonged. Also, that no demit can be accepted, unless made out on regular demit blanks

If you will turn to the report of my predecessor, in this office, you will note her statement "that the books of the Registrar have not, do not, and cannot, in the present state of affairs, accurately reflect a true condition in your organization as to number of members, names of members, etc."

This opinion I most heartily endorse, and I humbly suggest to this honorable body that they do not separate until some action be taken whereby a more accurate registration can be secured.

RECORDER OF CROSSES OF HONOR REPORT

Madam President and co-workers of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Your Recorder of Crosses in submitting her report for the year 1911 would impress upon you two facts which would tend to lessen both labor and expense connected with this work: First. In ordering crosses or materials for cross applications, write directly to the Recorder of Crosses aed not to the State President. In the latter case the President has to write to the Recorder of Crosses and Chapter President; and the Recorder in turn writes to both State and Chapter Presidents, making four letters where one would answer. Second. In making money orders for crosses do not include Recorder's postage in that order. Make post office order on Mrs. L. H, Raines, Savannah, Ga, for the crosses, and with the order inclose sufficient stamps for the Recorder to forward all papers by first class mail. By remembering these suggestions the State expenses will be decreased

In looking over the North Carolina Recorders' books I find there are ten chapters that have never awarded crosses. I have written several of these chapters calling their attention to this matter, and in one or two instances offered to go and assist the chapter in starting this work. The awarding of crosses is one of our most important duties and we should all see to it that no veteran, who deserves and desires a cross, is without one when December 1912 arrives After that date no more crosses may be awarded.

Although we have been awarding crosses since 1900, our State records go back no father than 1907. When I went to Savannah in February 1911 to consult Mrs. Raines, I copied the records for 1503 and a part of 1904. As a matter of State pride I think we should have all these back records copied and filed with the State Records; however that is for you to decide

During the year there have been 506 Crosses of Honor awarded. Of these 461 were to veterans, 14 to widows, 31 to descendants and 21 were duplicates as follows:

The historian's report was partly read by the Record ing Secretary. When the motion was made to adjourn to accept the so much appreciated invitation to a beauti-

fully appointed luncheon given at the Board of Trade rooms by the Women's Clubs of the Twin City.

FIRST DAY-Afternoon Session.

Business was resumed at 2:30 o'clock and the Historian's Report taken up. Motion was made by Mrs. I. W. Faison, seconded and carried that the following Resolution be incorporated in the minutes.

"Whereas it was authoritatively reported to this Convention that Elson's History is in use in the schools and colleges in North Carolina: Be it resolved—that the North Carolina Division United Daughters of the Confederacy heartily endorses the action of its Historian in investigating the use of this History and commend the colleges that have eliminated it from their curiculum. Resolved—This be recorded in our U. D. C. minutes."

Motion was made by Miss McGill of Fayetteville, seconded and carried "that the historical papers of Miss Cameron's Report be sent to the News & Observer's Historical Review for publication and that the balance of her report be accepted."

Motion was afterwards made that the whole of the Historian's Report be published in the minutes, seconded and carried.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT.

Madam President:

I herewith present my report as Historian of the North Carolina Division, U. D. C. for the year 1910-11.

During November 1910 I received five historical papers for preservation.

Two were sent by the J. E. B. Stewart Chapter of Fayetteville, one from the Person County Chapter and two from the Stonewall

Jackson Chapter of Charlotte. These were sent to the Office of the Secretary of State and put on file.

Since then the Division has reported no historical work to me. During the late session of the Legislature, as the North Carolina member of the General Committee U. D. C. on the Department of History and Archives, and as Chairman of your State "Committee to petition the Legislature to erect a Department of History and Archives; and to erect a suitable building to store such records,

I and my committee in connection with the State Historical Commission, and the other patriotic organizations in the State, and by individual work secured the passage by the Legislature of a bill for the immediate erection of a State Administration Building which is to be fireproof, wherein we are to have ample space, supplied with all modern improvements for filing and preserving our U. D. C. historical records and papers.

This crowns with success the work of several years, and is most gratifying to your committee, who further report that the Department of History and Archives has already been created under the name of "The State Historical Commission," and is doing most valuable work.

The next matter of importance taken up officially, was the report published in the June issue of the Confederate Veteran on the authority of the President of the Maryland Division, U. D. C., Mrs. F. G. Odenheimer, that Elson's History of the United States was in use in the University of North Carolina and in Davidson and Trinity colleges, which statement was made to her by the McMillan Publishing Company.

I at once wrote to the Presidents of the University, Davidson and Trinity, asking if the history was in use in their class rooms. President Venable referred me to the Professor of History at the University, Dr. J. G. deR. Hamilton, who said he had drawn the attention of the McMillan Publishing Company to the errors and inaccuracies of this History long before the Roanoke College incident gave it such publicity, and declared his intention of dropping it from his class books. And stated that when these sectional questions came up in the class room the students were taught the truth from the Southern standpoint.

President Smith of Davidson College wrote me that his Professor of History had used Elison's book for the express purpose of

having these especial charges against the South brought up in order to refute them, but had lately decided to drop it in future,

President Few, of Trenity Gollege says Elson's History is not in at Trinity and has not been for many years. These statements made anthoritatively by Dr. Hamilton, Dr. Smith, and Dr. Few, satisfactorilly dispose of this most important subject. So far as I have been informed no steps have yet been taken for the establishment of the U D. C. Lending Libraries, for which our Historian General, Mrs J. Enders Robinson appealed so urgently.

I trust, now that we are to have the State Administration Building where it can be housed, that one will soon be established in our Capital City. I think this covers the range of my official work.

I have written something over a hundred letters and many postals and have made official report of my work as Div. Historian to the Historian General.

And now in the line of that history which it is our duty to preserve, I wish to report as brielly as may be another most glorious "FIRST" for NORTH CAROLINA.

It was only in June that I learned what all North Carolinians should rejoice to know that "The Stars and Bars," the first flag of the Confederacy and chosen badge of OUR OWN ORDER of the U. D. C. was designed by a North Carolinian and first floated over North Carolina Soil.

Is not this worth knowing? and do not we all think that a special Monument should be erected to the Flag and to its designer on the sacred spot which was forever hallowed by its sacred folds?

Here is the history of the Flag as told by Major Orren Randolph Smith, a native of Warren County, North Carolina who designed the Stars and Bars and first gave it to the winds of Heaven in Louisburg, North Carolina:--

When the Senators and Representatives of the seven Confederate States that had seceded Feb. 1st, 1861, met at Montgomery, Ala., the first business after organizing was to decide whether the new nation should have a new flag and a new Constitution or fight under the "Stars and Strips" and under the Constitution of the United States. The debate was short, both sides had strong arguments to offer.

A new Constitution, composed by Native White Citizens was adopted, and a Committee advertised in the leading papers for de-

sigus of flags, to be sent to them at Montgomery. One of these wen^t from Louisburg, N. C. where there was living a man, an original secessionist, who so hoped that the Confederacy would adopt a new flag and a new Constitution that he was ready with a design when the advertisement of "Flag Wanted" appeared. When this man, Orren Randolph Smith, was introduced by Gen. Julian S. Carr, Commander-in-Chief of the U, C. V. of North Carolina, at their Reunion in Norfolk, September 1910, he told the story of the flag in the following words:—

"Three times have I been a soldier at my Country's call, twice fighting under the 'Stars and Strips' and one under the 'Stars and Bars.' While with Taylor, south of the Rio Grande, a unit in that proud army that never let an enemy touch our flag; in Utah with Albert Sidney Johnson, 1857-58, I learned what the flag meant to the men who were willing to give their lives for 'Old Glory,' every day and every hour in the day. A soldier's flag must be his iuspiration, it stands for home, kindred and country; it must be something more than a piece of bunting or the blending of bright colors.

"When at Sumpter, the shot was fired that was heard around the world," I realized that a new country had been made and that the new nation must have a new flag of the deepest, truest significance, to lead the "Men in Gray" against the greatest odds and through the greatest difficulties that any soldiers have ever come since the world was made. The idea of my flag I took from the Trunity, "Three in One."

"The three bars were forchurch, State and press, Red represented State, legislative, judiciary and exeutive; white for Church; Father, Son and Holy Ghost; red for press, freedom of speech, freodom of conscience and liberty of press—all bound together by a field of blue (heaven over all) bearing a star for each State in the Confederation. The seven white stars, all the same size, were placed in a circle, showing that each State had equal rights and privileges irrespective of size or population The circle, having neither head nor foot, stood for eternity, and signified "You defend me and I'll protect you." I had the flag all complete in my mind before the Confederate Congress advertised for models, and when the advertisement appeared I went to my friend, Miss Rebecca Murphy(she is now Mrs. W. B. Winborne of Wilson, N. C.) and asked if she

would make me a little flag, I'd tell her how. I tore the 'Bars' and cut the 'Stars' and she sewed the stitches and when finished the little flag was sent to Montgomery with the suggestion that a star be added for each State that joined The Confederacy. The flag committee, as you all know, accepted the flag and named it 'THE STARS AND BARS.'' They also adopted the suggestion and it was not long before the flag bore eleven stars for the eleven Confederate States that voted for Jefferson Davis to be President.

"After the small flag was sent to Montgomery I bought dress goods from Barrows' Store and asked Miss Rebecca to make me a large flag 9x12 feet, for whether the flag committee accepted my model or not I was determined that one of my flags should be floating in the breeze.

"Splicing two tall saplings together. I made a pole one hundred feet high and planted it on the court house square at Louisburg, N. C. (where I was then living) and the flag was sent aloft on Monday March 18th, 1861, two months before North Carolina seceded.

"Over the flag was floating a blue streamer, like an Admiral has on his ship when 'homeward bound' and on this pennant I had stars for each State that had seceded and one for North Carolina, for though my State was still in the Union I knew she was 'homeward bound.'

"This was the first Confederate Flag ever raised in the Old North State, and this is how the 'Stars and Bars, came into existence, Dixie's Flag that floated over the bravest and hardest to wear out soldiers ever encountered in any War."

Major Orren Randolph Smith was born, Dec. 18th. 1827, in Warren County, in 1846 he volunteered for five years, or during the war with Mexico. He went as a private, he was discharged at Smithfield, N. C June 1848, with rank of 'Captain.'

He was in Kansas when President Buchanan sent Colonel Albert Sidney Johnston, in command of U.S. forces, to Utah to coerce the Mormons into obedience to Federal authority, which he accomplished. Smith with rank and pay of Lieut. left Fort Leavenworth, with the U.S. troops June 10. 1857 for Salt Lake City where he remained until fall of 1858, when he returned to North Carolina and made Louisburg his home.

He enlisted June 1, 1861, in the 2nd Batallion, N. C. troops, Lieut, Wharton J. Green commanding, at Warrenton, N. C, After

his right arm was crushed, and he was unable for field duty he was made quarter master with rank and pay of Major. This position he held until end of War.

There is another bit of history that I would like brought to your notice just now and that is the death and burial place of Miss Anne Carter Lee, the second daughter of Gen. R. E. Lee, as next October will mark the half Century of her rest in North Carolina.

"Far from the toil and tumult of the twentieth Century, nine miles from a railway, and a half mile from the 'high road' is to be found a family graveyard, consisting of less than an acre, situated upon a knoll, surrounded by a forest of cedars, it is always in shadow, for the cedars have been left to shelter the graves. These, with two immense chestnut trees and the running box and flowers, are the only watchers "of those" asleep.

In the southeast corner there stands a granite column, twelve feet high on a square bise four feet each way and one foot high. The die is three feet square with moulding on top, the shaft is eighteen inches at base and twelve at the top, capped by an urn. The whole composes as symmetrical a monument as one could find.

Three sides of the die are engraved. On the south (facing you as you approach the grave) is:

"Anne C. Lee, Daughter of Gen, R. E. Lee aud Mary Custis Lee "

On the east:

"Born at Arlington June 18th, 1839, Died at White Sulphur Springs, Warren County. N. C. Oct. 20th, 1862.

On the west:

"Perfect and true are all his ways

Whom heaven adores and angels praise"

These are the closing lines of one of her lavorite hymns, and the one she asked to be sung just before she died

When Gen. Lee was consulted about the inscription to be placed upon the monument, he sent the above and asked that nothing be added, and that nothing but plain English letters be used.

General Lee's family found that it was necessary for them to evacuate their home at Lexington, Va., early in the beginning of hostilities; and after trying several temporary homes, drifted down to the then famous Warren County White Sulphur Springs, hoping that here in this quiet place, with the help of the valued waters, Miss Annie Lee might be nursed to health and strength. Before the war "Old Warren" was one of the leading counties of the State and "Jones' Springs" (as it was more familiarly known) was the rallying place of the wealth and beauty of Norrh Carolina and her sister States. The proprietor, Mr. William Duke Jones, was an old time Southern gentleman, and treated his patrons as if they were veritably his "guests" Here in this haven, far from the battles, Mrs. Lee and her daughter made their home. But in October, 1862, the fragile sufferer sank to sleep, aurrounded by loving friends, and was laid to rest in this private cemetery of Mr. Jones', which was a short distance from the hotel.

Impossible as it was for Gen. Lee to leave his place at the head of the army, it was equally impossible for her friends to carry her body to her home at Lexington, so in this "resting place" the ideal of the old Saxon words "God's Acre" was buried the beloved daughter of the ehieftain of the Confederate States Army.

Before the war began Mr. Joseph Speed Jones, son of Mr. William D Jones, employed a competent stonecutter, Mr. Zerald Crowder, to place granite steps and supporting columns to his house, which was being remodeled, and also to carve a monument for his wife lately dead; and in 1862, when Miss Lee died, he had intended that Mr. Crowder should also carve a stone for her grave, but every man having been called into service, Mr. Crowder was "at the front." Mr. Jones, wishing to leave undone nothing to show honor to the General's daughter, wrote to Gen. Bragg, a Warren county man, asking if he could not have Mr Crowder detailed for the work of cutting the monument, as his health was not good and he was unfit for active service in the army, Gen. Bragg wrote on April 2nd, 1864, "The feeling and just tribute you are quietly paying to the worth and eminent services of my old friend Gen. Lee. is just what I should have expected of "Old Warren." What ever I can do to forward the project will be most cheerfully performed."

Gen. Bragg was with Gen. Lee in the war with Mexico. On the 15th of April, 1864, he wrote again: 'Private Crowder will hand you this. He is directed to see you and execute the work of which you spoke to me, or rather of which you wrote to me. It was necessary to use some little circumspection to keep Gen. Lee from

knowing the object, or he never would have yielded his assent. Be so good as to require him to finish the work as soon as possible and return and report to me if he is able."

The Warren women took up the work of love, and elected Mrs. Joseph S. Jones chairman, organized a society for the purpose of collecting funds with which the grave of Annie Lee might be marked by as handsome a stone as they in their own great need could give. No others were asked to subscribe than the women of Warren county.

This was the FIRST monument ever erected to a woman by women, and this handful of Confederate Daughters formed the corner stone of the many chapters of the U. D. C.

Mrs Jones and Mrs. W. J. Green were the largest contributors and they made possible this handsome monument, though many a "widow's mite" was gladly given.

It was not until the summer of 1866, that the monument was ready for public dedication. The ladies sent invitations to Gen. Lee and his family by special messengers: and asked that if they could not be present at the time specified, they appoint a time when they could be present. General Lee could not be present by the terms of his parole, and traveling at that time was too dangerous an undertaking for Mrs. Lee and her daughters; but Gens. G. W. Custis Lee, and W. H. F. Lee came, and were the guests of their old West Point comrade Col W. J. Green at his home, "Esmeralda," several miles from "Jones' Springs." Here too, as guest for the occasion, was Orren Randolph Smith, the right hand man of the "Daughter's," putting the monument in position, arranging the speakers stand and seats for the guests, and on the great day, August 8th, 1866, was master of ceremonies.

The year before Gen. Lee died, he, with his daughter, Agnes, drove in a buggy to Mr. Jones' house as quietly, and as simply as one neighbor visiting another.

When the General reached his daughter's grave he was deeply affected, and much gratified that the women of their little town had done so much for him and his: He said then, he never wished his daughter moved from this hallowed spot, and he spoke of the North Carolinians as true and tried friends.

In 1900, Mr. Smith, knowing so lew people knew of the quiet grave in N. C., took his daughter to this "God's Acre" that she might

make a sketch of it. An oil picture done from the sketch made on this trip, was exhibited at the Raleigh Fair, and then sent to the North Carolina Room of the Richmond Museum, at Richmond, Va., the "White House" of the Confederacy. Another picture of the monument, as you approach the cemetery, is at his home in Henderson.

James Barron Hope, the "Poet of the Confederacy" was invited by the Warren county women to make the address when the monument was unveiled, and he delivered an elegaic ode, written for the occasion.

While a guest at Col Green's, Mr. Hope made a sketch of the grave and sent it to Mrs. Lee, and her letter is appropriate here:

Lexington, Va., Nov. 10, 1866,

"I cannot sufficiently express my gratitude to you, my dear sir, for sending that beautiful sketch of my dearest child's tomb.

"I have often longed to revisit it, and it is an inexpressible comfort to me daily to view this image of a spot so dear. I have loved to think of her lying so quiet, in that lovely place where the foot of our invaders never trod; to know, too, that she was spared the misery of seeing the downfall of the cause she so much loved. She only met the doom Heaven often awards its favorites, and I am content.

"I do not know the names or ages of your children, but send them two photographs of the General which they may perhaps value in the time to come. You can place their names on the back of each card.

Yours most respectfully,

M. C. Lee."

This letter and one of the photographs are in the possession of Mrs. R. A Marr, of Lexington, Va., a daughter of Gapt. James Barron Hope.

So here in this beautiful spot, where she was laid to rest in 1862, we leave until that last great morn, the dust of her who was the daughter of that Christ like man, OUR CHIEFTAIN, ROBERT E. LEE"

SECOND DAY-Morning Session

Convention opened at 10:20 o'clock Thursday morning with prayer by the Chaplain, Miss Hettie James.

Minutes were read by the Recording Secretary and

approved, also letters and telegrams were read.

Motion that replies be sent to telegrams and letters received from The National Regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution, from Mrs. McSherry, President-General of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, from Arkansas Division, the Richmond Division, and Mrs. Eller of Virginia, made and carried. These telegrams were sent at once.

Mrs. London made a motion "that a letter be sent to 'our mother' the first President and organizer of the North Carolina Division, Mrs. Wm. M. Parsley of Wilmington," seconded and carried. This was done.

Miss Louise Bahnson rendered in sweetest tones, "Gems of Scotland," by Julie-Rives King, inspiring us for the day's work just begun.

As is our sacred custom, time was here given to Memorial exercises, that chapters so unfortunate, be enabled to pay tribute to those members "that have crossed the River."

The President called for a moment of perfect silence.

It was decided that one page be given to "A Tribute of Love" to Miss Alice Nelson, she being an ex-State officer.

Next in order was the fulfilling of a promise made one year ago by our "Court Painter," Mrs. Marshall Williams, and in graceful words she presented the "Coat of Arms" of North Carolina as a gift from herself to the North Carolina Division, to be placed in its room in Richmond, Va. This was unveiled by two tots, little Misses Dorothea Gorrell and Margaret Francis Green, and accepted by Mrs. Latta Johnson, Regent of the North Carolina Room.

MRS. MARSHALL WILLIAMS ADDRESS

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

It is with much pleasure, I present to this Division a painting of the Great Seal of North Carolina. You have so often honored my brush with orders to paint the portraits of our noble heroes, that I am glad of an opportunity to thus express my appreciation. The Seal comes down to us from the second Charter granted by King Charles II, to the Lords Proprietors of Carolina 1665.

In the Colonial period there were four different seals; since North Carolina became a State, there have been five distinct Seals.

Of the first Seal we have no official description, but it can be seen in the Public Record Office in London. As the form of government changed, so did the Seal, and when the government of the State of North Carolina was organized, the Constitution adopted at malifax 1776, that "there shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the Governor, and used by him, and called the "Great Seal of North Carolina In 1776 the Seal may be described as follows: On one side the figure of Minerva of Liberty, holding in the right hand the pole and cap, and in the lett hand a large scroll, with the word "Constitution," on the other side, is the figure, a woman, probably "Plenty"-in one hand a distaff, the other an ear of corn, trees in the back-ground, and a cow. This Seal has been changed, and to-day we have the present design: Minerva, Goddess of Wisdom presenting the distaff of Liberty to Dame Ceres, the Goddess of Plenty.

AMENDMENTS

ARTICLE III

Section 2. Add "Said demit must be sent to State Registrar immediately on admission of member into a Chapter." Reason: fhis is done in order to make State and Chapter registration books tally.

Sec. 4 A U. D. C. engraved certificate must be awarded by all Chapters to every member upon their rolls, and to each new member as soon as admitted, and all charter members must order same with their charter. Reason: This is a law of the general organization, which they require observed.

ARTICLE IV

Sec. 2. Should a vacancy occur in a State office for any cause whatever, the State president shall have the authority to fill the same. Reason: There is no authority given, by which such a vacancy can be filled, and this is very necessary.

Sec. 3. Make present Section 2.

ARTICLE V

Sec. 2. Add "No proxies ahall be allowed Chapters." Reason: Proxies are unparliamentary, and are almost always unsatisfactory.

Sec. 3. Add after word Convention "when present, but no proxies allowed." Reason: This is now a rule and should be incorporated in the Constitution.

ARTICLE VI

Sec. 2. Change tax of 10 cents to 15 cents for State. Reason: The Division business is now so large that expenses cannot be met at present rate.

ARTICLE VIII

Sec. 2. After word "Daughter" substitute for rest of the sentence the following: "When wishing to join a U. D. C. Chapter, the child's application blank must be copied verbatum with signatures of endorsers on a U D. C. application blank and then presented to Chapter Credential Committee for their signatures, before being registered in Chapter and State." Reason: Because it is not understood how this transfer is intended to be made, and the constitution should clearly state

Sec. 4. Add after word "Chapte" "but no proxy allowed." Reason: This is now the rule, but not stated in Constitution.

ARTICLE IX

U D. C. NORMAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Sec. 1. These scholarships at the Greensboro Normal are open only to descendants of Confederate Veterans, who are otherwise unable to attend college.

Sec. 2. All applicants must fill out a U. D. C. application blank showing eligibility, with signatures of Veteran endorsers, and nearest Chapter president, also formed with above statements from reliable parties as to financial disability to otherwise attend college, and good moral character.

• Sec 3. All applicants for said scholarships must stand a competitive examination. Papers to be sent out by State president to some reliable party in applicant's home town.

Sec 4. Those securing these scholarships shall be entitled to hold same for four years, if reports are satisfactory to State president and president of the college. Reasons: Nothing is said in Constitution regarding these scholarships, and some laws should be laid down.

BY-LAWS

No. 7. After words "return to Chapters," omit "if so desired" and substitute "president."

Mrs. Stone was escorted to the rostrum and gave the Division a heart to heart talk and splendid advice relative to U. D. C. work. Rarely are we given such a treat and each Daughter felt better able to continue her work. After Mrs. Stone's address Mrs. Williams in behalf of the North Carolina Division, in well chosen words, presented her with a beautiful floral token.

Mrs. Riggins, ever thoughtful of the welfare and enjoyment of all, extended an invitation to the luncheon given by the Norfleet Camp United Confederate Veterans.

Motion was made to adjourn.

SECOND DAY-Afternoon Session

The Convention was opened for business promptly at 2:30 o'clock.

Following the ruling of the Convention the election of officers was taken up.

Mrs. Marshall Williams was nominated by the Goldsboro Chapter and seconded by the New Berne Chapter. Mrs. Fannie Ransom Williams was re-elected President of the N. C. Division, for the third time.

REPORT OF ARLINGTON MONUMENT ASSOCIATION

The North Carolina Division U. D. C. bought fifty dollars (\$50) worth of Confederate seals, for Arlington Confederate Monument, in Washington, D. C, and I bought \$5.00 worth from the Asheville Chapter, as they bought \$25.00 worth. Have sent to Mr. Streater, Treasurer, for this year, \$284.25.

I still have my penny collections in the school for this monument.

The seals came to us so late last year or we would have sold many more.

Only 4 chapters sold the whole amount expected from them, \$13 75 for one box up: Children's Chapter, Charlotte; Winston-Salem Chapter, Laurinburg Chapter, and Wilson Chapter.

We have sustained a great loss in the U. D. C. work in the death of Mrs. Edgar James, a native of North Carolina, and late of Florence, Ala, the originator of these seals. Her heart was in this work, and she was so anxious to see Arlington Monument completed next year and then Shiloh Monument.

Hoke, Johnston Pettigrew, Robert and Matt Ransom, as well known and revered as any your committee would suggest. That in the important notices of State work, attention is especially called to all the main facts of how to organize, children are included. That no charter is required, no State tees and no chapter fees, unless locally desired. The name is selected by the mother chapter if they desire. and a member as Leader or committee detailed for the organization, the name sent to the State recording secretary

The conference was fortunate in having the vast experience and splendid information of our beloved ex-president, Mrs. Cornelia Branch Stone, in solving the problems presented by the members. A suggestion of hers, that we have a State banner or flag for annual

awarding to chapter excelling along certain lines, your committee should decide upon, was enthusiastically adopted by the leaders, should it meet the approval of this body.

Leaders are asked to take our official organ the "Keystone," which tries in each issue to meet some need of the children's work, (price 50 cents.)

SUGGESTIONS

1. That all chapter reports be limited to the space allowed for remarks on the blanks, and if they exceed this, the Recording Secretary be authorized to shorten them.

2. That all committee reports be limited to three typewritte : pages.

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3. That all addresses of any kind be omitted.

4. That one or more pages be set aside as Memorial ones, giving simply names of deceased, chapter, and date of death.

5. That all committee statiouery and expenses be paid out of said committee funds, when there is one otherwise from the State fund.

6. That the State tax be increased to 15 cents per member, as this is necessary to meet necessary expenses. (This was adversely reported by the committee, but had already been passed by the convention in the Constitutional amendments.)

7. That your State treasurer be instructed to pay out of the sinking fund, so far as it will go, all outstanding debts, also to continue to use next year's sinking fund till these debts are liquidated.

8. That hereafter one evening during each convention be set aside as Historical Evening, at which time suitable papers be read by ladies selected for the occasion. This evening to be under the auspices of the Assistant Historian, who after consulting with the State Historian, will select the subjects for the papers and those to write them.

Mrs. Marshall Williams' motion to add to the year report blanks "Have you read your Minutes" was carried.

The Committee of Resolutions of Thanks was appointed: Mrs. E. F. Reid, Mrs. J. J. Yates, Miss Annie Gash and Miss Maud Windley.

Report of the Shiloh Monument read by the Chairman, Mrs. A. L. Smith. Accepted.

SHILOH MONUMENT REPORT

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

As Chairman of the Shiloh Monument Committee, I am glad to make a much better report this year than ever before toward the Monument to be erected on the battle field where 10,699 brave heroes gave up their lives. Last year we congratulated North Carolina on contributing \$9000, a considerable gain over the two previous years. This year we will add to this fund \$218.96. A list of the contributions to Shiloh Monument will be found in the treasurer's report under Shiloh.

To each chapter an appeal was made, making it necessary to write a number of letters and post cards.

Many of these contributions came after the observation of Shiloh day, April 6th, which was inspired by the Special Edition of The Newton Enterprise, gotten out by Mrs. Williams our State President and State Director of the Shiloh Monument Committee-A copy of the paper was sent to every chapter in the General Division.

For the above we are specially indebted to Mrs. Williams and due her a vote of thanks for the admirable manner in which this matter was handled in this issue of The Newton Enterprise.

REPORT OF WYATI MONUMENT COMMITTEE.

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

It is with a peculiar sense of joy that I bring to you this report of the Henry Wyatt Monument Committee For what gives us greater pleasure than to be bearer of glad tidings? The Henry Wyatt Monument just a few years ago a house of dreams is so soon to be a reality, upon which may the sunshine of your approval ever fall. It was at our last convention which was held in the home town of the Bethel Heroes that the amount necessary for the completion of our fund was pledged.

Chapters from the following towns were the ones to make the last contributions: Raleigh, Lincolnton, Fayetteville, Wadesboro, Newton, Washington, Tarboro, Wilmington, Gastonia, Goldsboro, Kenansyille, Winston and Selma.

Last October I reported to you that we had given the commission for our Monument to Moses Ezekiel, but when the contract came it asked for three years in which to do the work, so we thought best not to accept 11 But we feel very proud that we have given the commission to one of America's most famous Sculptors, Gutzon Borglum of New York. It may be interesting to know where we can see some of his work. In the Capital at Washington is the bust of Lincoln, in the Metropolitan Art Gallery and the Cathedral to St. John the Divine New York we will also find pieces of his work, and in many other places The first model of the Wyatt Monument has been accepted and according to contract first payment of \$1500 has been paid. The life size model will soon be ready and Mr. Bob Ricks of Rocky Mount has been appointed to see the model in the studio and accept it for our committee if correct.

On last Wednesday our committee met in Raleigh for the purpose of making the plans for the unveiling of our monument which we hope to take place at an early date. We can't say now just what day, but it will be sufficiently published. Various sub-committees were appointed by Chairman Dawes of the Legislative Committee to make all final arrangements.

This monument will face the Government Building that is soon

to be erected in Raleigh, a most fitting site for this, our Monument. For truly it is ours, made possible by the Daughters of the Confederacy, the patriotic citizens and the State Legislature of the "Old North State"

We want everybody in North Carolina to be in Raleigh the day this monument is unveiled. I assure you, who have not visited our Capital City, that we who know the people there can safely say you will be welcome to Raleigh, and everyone be made to feel it is really our city. We certainly hope every chapter in our State will be represented and the children should see what we are doing to honor the memory of our heroes and to beautify our Southland, something the world can look upon and be glorified with noble thoughts of the brave and the true.

In a way I feel that before this report closes we should thank every Chapter in North Carolina, every individual who has contributed to this work, and especially should we be grateful to the Legislative Committee for their deep interest. But do we deserve any thanks? I'm inclined to feel it would be irony, for we have each done only in part what we owe to our native land. This is our heritage, shall we not make it a house beautiful?

If our brave heroes give their life's blood shall we not consider it a joy to help perpetuate their precious memory. So when you at last look on the Wyatt Monument know it represents joyful service and loyal rendering of our best in heart and head in your behalf.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WIVES AND WIDOWS ANNEX.

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

At the convention at Rocky Mount a committee was appointed to go before the Legislature and ask that the State build a home for the wives and widows of Confederate Veterans, to be added as an Annex to the Soldiers' Home in 1 aleigh, and the State Division, U. D. C, pledged to furnish this home.

Your committee appeared in Raleigh at the time appointed were met by one of Cumberland's most worthy representatives, Mr. A. D McGill, who asked the privilege of presenting this cause, as he had introduced the bill in 1891 for the establishment of the Soldiers' Home He made a most able and interesting presentation of the cause The committee, with the Johnston Pettigrew Chapter met with joint Committee on Pensions. The Bill was presented, asking for an appropriation of \$5000 for erection and \$5000 for maintenance of a home for Wives and Widows. The Bill was re-

ported favorably. The time was appointed for a hearing on the Bill before the Committee of Appropriations from the House, but owing to a long session of the House until such a late hour, the meeting was postponed. Some members of your Committee had been in Raleigh for a week and were obliged to return home, but we left with the assurance that the Bill would be reported favorably After we had left there was some objection to the Home in connection with the present Soldier's Home. For moral reasons, some thought it best not to build the Home for the wives and widows there, Your Committee feel they cannot see the wisdom of this act, as it was to be an entirely separate building in charge of a matron.

This work is a labor of love to alleviate suffering humanity. Your Committee deem it best, in order to have concerted action by all our women in this most important work, that this Convention disbuss the whole question of location and take such action and make such recommendations as to them seems wise. Your Committee will then have the united support of the entire organization, whose unselfish devotion to a noble cause is one of the choicest possessions of the Old North State.

We want to say in this connection that we found no opposition whatever to the establishment of such a home, and we feel satisfied that this much needed provision for the wives and widows will be established by the General Assembly of 1913, and it is for the Convention to decide as to the location.

The Committee wants to thank Mr Joseppus Daniels for his assistance and commendation of the Home for wives and widows through the columns of the News and Observer, also, the Johnston-Pettigrew Chapter for courtesies shown them while in Raleigh.

REPORT ON MEMORIAL ARCH

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

In looking back on the Minutes of the Society I find that it has been eight years since the inception of the idea of erecting a Memorial Gateway to the Soldier's Home in Raleigh. As a resident of that city and a frequent visitor to the Soldier's Home I was prepared to see what was needed to make this place more comfortable and attractive. As to the comfort of the Veterans, this had been provided for by the State and many generous citizens, with the volunteer help of the Daughters.

The lawn and flower beds and garden were beautifully kept up by the Superintendent and wife, Mr. and Mrs. Brooks, with the help of the strongest Veterans who felt a pride in their Home. It was thought that a handsome gateway would add much to the beauty of

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the place. It was at the Convention of 1904, held in Fayetteville, that I ventured to offer a motion which was seconded by Mrs. A. L. Smith of Charlotte, and passed the State Organization, to erect at the aforesaid entrance, a stone gateway, each stone having the name of a Chapter engraved upon it. The matter was left open until the next year, 1905, when the Committee asked to rescind the Resolution to place the memorial at the entrance of the Soldiers' Home, this being unadvisable, since this home will revert to the State eventually. The committee, in lieu of this, then proposed the erection of a Memorial Arch entrance to the Coulederate Cemetery in Raleigh, as an enduring monument to the memory of over one thousand soldiers whose mortal remains lie in that sacred spot, representatives from every Southern state.

In order to raise funds for this object, a resolution was passed for each Chapter to raise twenty dollars, estimating the cost of the work would be about one thousand dollars. At this time there were fifty-seven Chapters recorded in the Secretary's book. You will see that I made allowance for a failure perhaps, of some small chapters that could not meet the allotment. The first contribution received was in October 1905. Dodson Ramseur Chapter, Coucord, (\$20) twenty dollars.

It will be seen from this statement that for some cause the contributions have diminished each year, I suppose on account of the many other objects **upon** which you are called io direct your attention.

At the Convention at Rocky Mount, October 1910, Mrs. Little the efficient treasurer, reported that she thought the total amount on hand would be about one thousand dollars including the interest of the fund which she had loaued to a reliable party. It will be seen from the contribution that only \$40 was contributed from 1909 to 1910.

About fifty four Chapters have contributed, leaving now thirtyfour yet to be heard from. Many of these Chapters have been formed since 1904, but which will no doubt respond to the call for \$20 each

It was my misfortune not to be present at the Convention in Goldsboro in 1908, in which there arose a murmur of disapproval regarding the inscription on the Memorial Arch. It is the object of this Committee to act in the best capacity for this object, regarding material, construction and inscriptions. Your Committee has had advice from wise, and competent architects who all the time advise not inscribing name of Chapters in the stones. It would require 84 stones of equal size—it would be very costly and to a degree perishable to cut names on stone, apart from the detraction as an object of beauty. The best architects advise bronze tablets to be placed on each side, on which should be inscribed the Chapters making the contributions. This would add to the cost, which would be at least \$200, but which should go on the Arch as a main feature,

Your Chairman must beg your indulgence for this long paper, but I suppose there may be delegates here who are not well informed regarding the work, but who would be interested did they know of it The falling off in contributions argues a failure on the part of some Chapters to come up to the requirement, but this has had no effect on the Cemmittee who are generous enough to allow freedom of thought and action. Were the Committee to failter under the opinions of those who have raised objections to the project, it would indeed have fallen by the wayside. But for their duty and loyalty to the 50 chapters which have so generously and so heartily contributed to it, we will continue our work. This Arch will not only be erected in honor of our departed heroes, but it will stand as a memorial of the devotion of North Caroliua's Daughters to the Confederate Soldiers representing every Southern State, who served in the war of 1861-1865.

The meeting was called to order by the President at 8:40 o'clock.

There being much business on hand the reading of the minutes was postponed. Chapter reports were then called for and observing the ruling made last year, the last chapter organized reported first.

Mrs. Marshall Williams made the motion "That the President appoint one large chapter and one small one to read a full report of the year's work but not for publication. Lost.

The reading of the reports was suspended and a most pleasant diversion was given in the way of beautiful music rendered by Mr. William Wright on the violin accompanied by Miss Lillian Johnson on the piano.

Chapter Reports continued, also Reports from Children's Chapters were read.

Motion was made and carried that reports be accepted.

NEW BUSINESS.

Motion was made by Mrs. Ed Overman of the Robt. F. Hoke Chapter, Salisbury and seconded by Mrs. W. M. Creasy of Wilmington that in the interest of truth and patriotism the North Carolina Division United Daughters of the Confederacy endorse the work of Hon. A. H. Boyden in attempting to have erected a suitable monument to the memory of North Carolina's brave sons who fell on the battle field of Gettysburg in defense of the Confederacy and that this division take immediate action toward this achievement. Carried.

Mrs. London called the attention of the Convention to the fact that some suggestion had been made to use in the Children's Chapters "The After School Club of America" Literature. Mrs. Stone spoke on this subject giving sound advice to the women of North Carolina. Mrs. London made this motion: Resolved, That the North Carolina Division United Daughters of the Confederacy enter its protest against the After School Club of America and that we have nothing to do with it whatever. Mrs. W. O. Shannon moved that a letter be written Supt. Joyner protesting against his name appearing as endorser of the After School Club for Southern Children. Carried, Mrs. Shannon to write the letter. Mrs. Gordon Finger objected, feeling the Clubs should not be antagonized. Mrs. London's motion was carried.

Mrs. Moffit presented a Resolution: Therefore, be it resolved that the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy endorse the present day movement for a Judicial settlement of International Disputes by other means than War.

2nd. That the Resolution be forwarded Secretary of the American Society for Judicial Settlement of International Disputes, Baltimore, Maryland. Carried.

Mrs. W. O. Shannon again presented the matter of the erection of a Monument to General Joseph E. Johnson. Motion was made that this matter be defer-

red until after the Convention in Richmond. Seconded and carried.

No other business, invitations for the entertainment of the Convention next year were asked for. Mrs. Ed Overman extended an invitation from Robt. F. Hoke Chapter, Salisbury and Mrs. Doane Herring, from John W. Dunham Chapter, Wilson.

According to vote the sixteenth Annual Convention of the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy will convene in Salisbury the second Wednesday in October 1912.

The Recording Secretary made the motion "That this Convention extend a vote of thanks to "Our Manager," Mr. H. L. Riggins, who so untiringly assisted in making our visit "A Joy Forever." No second was needed and the motion was carried with applause.

The Chairman on the "Resolution of Thanks" read the following.

Dr. Neal Anderson of the First Presbyterian Church of Winston, in earnest and divine words pronounced the Benediction, bringing to a close the Fifteenth Annual Convention of the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ASSISTANT HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Madam President, Daughters of the Confederacy, ladies and gentlemen.

It is with love and pride that I greet this great body of ladies, who have done so much to collect and perpetuate the heroic acts of the Confederate soldiers of North Carolina, and the great truths of our Southern history.

Our State stands "First in war, first in peace," and first in the hearts of her citizens—of her proud and loyal Daughters.

"Carolina! the pride of my bosom Carolina! the Land of the Sea, Carolina! the home of my fathers Carolina! my song is of thee!"

My work, as Assistant Historian, has been collecting the unwritten history of our State, those great and glowing deeds of her patriotic sons, which will crystalize into everlasting laurels to wreathe the brow of Carolina, the Queen of the States.

But ladies, I saw the length of our beloved Historian's report, and I condense mine, commending hers to you, which I heartily endorse, adding a few words and recommendations.

Besides collecting history, etc., I aided in getting the appropriation for our Hall of Records, soon to be built in Raleigh, our capital, by collecting and sending list after list of signatures of the citizens of my section of State, asking it of the Legislature of North Carolina. But I must condense. Now for suggestions, or recommeedations.

Bennett House, where General Joseph E. Johnson, surrendered days after the Army of Northern Virginia, under General Robert E. Lee, had surrendered, is an historic spot aud should be marked, and there are many others in our State. I feel that Gen. Julian S. Carr and Mr. Boyden would aid us in this great work. And in this connection I'd like to say that our first great chieftain—Gen. Joseph E. Johnston—first Commander-in-Chief of the Confederate forces (who lost his place on account of bravery and wounds) has received almost no recognition. Ladies, let us do our duty here,

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let us, let North Carolina, be the first to subscribe to a monument for him, in honoring him we'd honor ourselves. It is my intention to take this subject up at the General Convention of the U. D. C. in Richmond. He represented us as a whole, not as a Virginia General.

As a Sonthern lady, a Colonial Dame, a Daughter of the American Revolution, and a Daughter of the Confederacy, and as your Assistant Historian. I cannot endorse The Long Roll, Mary Johnston's Southern novel.

The book is well written, but I regard it as a caricature of our great General Stonewall Jackson. Even the frontis piece, the pictures in it are severe caricatures.

We should protest, unless we leave it quietly alone. Expect it will be taken up by the General Convention at Richmond.

We are too fond of helping Virginia, of placing our laurels on her brow, but trust me ladies, Virginia has the peculiar talent of helping herself—of taking care of herself. Lee and Jackson are already in the Val Halla, let them rest! I'm afraid the school children will think there were only two Generals in the war between the States. They are no doubt the largest and brightest stars in the Galaxy of theConfederacy, let us hunt North Carolina history—North Carolina heroes. The Bible says no man can do more than give his life for a cause, and many of our brave North Carolinians did that,

We are a monument building people, let us continue to build them in the hearts of the children. Educating the children is our greatest work now, and let them perpetuate the great truths of our great cause and country.

> We should teach them that their gallant sires of old Left a heritage more precious than rubies or gold, That honor and patriotism are the rarest gems That adorn America's diadems!

It has only ten members and their ages run from 4 years to 14 years of age. They meet regular once a month for six months, since then no regular meeting has been held, for the older ones have been away and are now at school, and the little ones have been sick most of the time. But their dues are all paid up, for the one for which it is named believes in promptness in all things, so they follow her example in all doings. They have sent one quilt to the Soldiers' Home, Raleigh, and another is nearly ready to go, and also \$200 in money. On May 10th, 1911, they held Memorial exercises and decorated each fallen heros grave with flags and roses. They have helped the sick Veterans of their town all the year. Last Christmas their leader made them a cake, a piece for every Veteran in their borders and these were carried by the little folks with cheerful words and happy greetings for the Christmas season. One old veteran was

sick for a long time, and it was no unusual thing for their leadsr to hear of their carrying butter, milk, nice crackers, and many other good things to this faithful old man that still feels the weight of the hardships felt during 61 and 65. When they gathered for a meeting, first one little tot and then another would tell of what they had done, and then they would ask of their leader if she thought Mrs. Thrash would feel proud of them. She always told them yes, Mrs. Thrash thinks you are the smartest little band of workers she has, and when a letter came to them from Mrs. Thrash's own pen, they were so proud; so with these thoughts always in their mind, they worked harder than ever to do something nice for others. One little girl reported she had been and read "Mother Goose" to the oldest Veteran in town, he aged 80, she aged 5 years, and I was told by him he enjoyed it more than anything that had happened to him since the war. At fhe next meeting she wanted to know if I had told Mrs. Thrash. So Mrs Thrash was told of their interest, and she sent to each one a certificate, and they think just lots of it. I feel like I must tell you how they conduct their meetings. Thev open with prayer, followed by roll call, and reading of the last minutes, aud theu "best of all," as one little tot says, we give all the money we can. While the older ones are talking of what is most needed, and best to be done, the little ones are eating popcorn, and getting ready to serve tea, etc., to the older ones when the meeting is over (This of course, is prepared beforehand by their leader, for their use.) They use their doll cups, etc., and we are children together. They use the "Children's Catechism," and enjoy its use. One or the other will give us a recitation, hence we spend a happy hour together They have helped on the monument fund, and have now a nice little sum in bank. They have kept busy all the time. RULES OF ORDER

In the transaction of business, this Association shall be governed by the usual rules of procedure and debate that govern deliberative assembles.

The following shall be the order of business:

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

United Daughters of the Confederacy

(AS AMENDED AT THE WINSTON CONVENTION, 1911.)

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be benevolent, memorial, educational, historical and social. To accomplish these purposes, it will seek:

1. To give assistance, when needed, to survivors of the war and those dependent upon them.

2. To honor the memory of those who fell in the service of the Confederate States, and to remember gratefully those survivors who have faithfully served and suffered, and remained loyal to the Confederate Cause.

3. To collect and preserve relics, objects and incidents of historic value, to record deeds of heroism of Southern men and women, and to unite with the Confederate veterans in the determination that the portion of American history relating to the late war shall be properly taught in the public schools of the State, and to use its influence towards this object in all private schools.

4. To bring into its organization the women throughout the State who are elegible to membership and loyal to the memories and principles of the Confederate cause.

ARTICLE 111

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. All Chapters, which are properly chartered in the State, thereby become members of this Division. Seven or more women can organize a Chapter anywhere in North Carolina by applying for a charter through the State headquarters, only white women being eligible to membership. Those women entitled to membership are the widows, wives, mothers, sisters, nieces and lineal descendants of such men as served honorably in the Confederate army, navy, or civil service, or of those men, unfit for active duty, who loyally gave aid to the cause; also women and their lineal descendants, wherever living, who can give proof of personal service and loyal aid to the Southern cause during the war. All application blanks must be signed by one or more veterans who know the elegibility of the applicant.

Sec. 2. A member in good standing of any chapter, desiring to change her membership shall be entitled to receive from her chapter a demit, certifying that she is a member in good standingwhich, if presented within six months, shall make good her membership in any chapter to which she may be acceptable. Said demit must be sent to State Registrar immediately on admission of member into a Chapter,

Sec. 3. A Daughter can belong to two or more chapters if she desires, by paying dues in all, but she can only vote in one chapter.

Sec. 4. A. U. D. C. engraved certificate must be awarded by all chapters to every member npon their rolls, and to each new member as soon as admitted, and all charter members must order same with their charter.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

Sec. 1. The officers of the Division shall be a President, three Vice Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, Assistant Historian and Chaplain, to be elected annually on the second day of convention, said convention to convene on the second Wednesday of each succeeding October, unless for good reasons the president finds it necessary to change the date. In the election of officers, nominations shall be

made from the floor, election by ballot, a majority shall elect. No person can nominate another for office unless she knows the nominee will serve if elected and is present at the Convention, except when she already holds office and is detained by sickness or other cause, to be decided by the executive committee. The term of office of the incumbents to expire on the day after the convention on which day said incumbents shall turn over to the newly elected officials all letters, papers, etc., pertaining to the business of said office.

Sec. 2. Should a vacancy occur in a State office for any cause whatever, the State president shall have the authority to fill the same.

Sec. 3. All Chapters must hold their annual election of officers at their November meetings, and the Recording Secretaries of the past year are required to at once notify the State Recording Secretary of the result of said elections.

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

Sec. 1. The Division shall meet annually, the second Wednesday in October at such place as the preceding convention shall designate. An annual meeting should be held by all the Chapters in the State on June 3rd, the birthday of Jefferson Davis, the only President of the Confederacy, and January 19th, in honor of the birthdays of Generals Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson, the name to be known as Lee-Jackson Day.

Sec. 2. Each Chapter, shall be entitled at all meetings of the State Division to one representative for the first seven members, and an additional vote for each additional twenty-five members But representatives shall be based upon the per capita tax paid. No proxies shall be allowed Chapters.

Sec. 3. Each State officer and Chapter president shall be entitled to one vote in the Convention, when present, but no proxies allowed.

ARTICLE VI

FEES, DUES, ETC,

Sec. 1 A fee of \$5.00 shall be charged each Chapter for its charter, \$3.00 for General and \$2.00 for State fee, and 100 blanks; 50 cents shall be charged for each additional 100 blanks.

Sec. 2. Upon organization and before each succeeding March 1 each Chapter shall pay into the treasury of the State Division 15 cents for State and 10 cents for general tax for every member who may at such a date be in good standing on its rolls. All new members received into the Chapters between January 1st and October 1st, must pay their capita tax by the latter date or they will not be entitled to be counted in the Convention.

Sec. 3. The seal of the State Division shall be the same as that of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, with the addition of the name of the State on the outer rim.

Sec. 4. The badge to be worn by members of this Division shall be the same as set forth in the Constitution of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE VII

CROSSES OF HONOR

Sec. 1. Each Chapter should see that all veterans in its vicinity be given an opportunity to obtain a Cross of Honor. Crosses can only be bestowed on four days; January 19th, Lee-Jackson Day; May 10th, Memorial Day; June 3rd, President Davis's birthday; and Angust 23rd, North Carolina's special day. The bestowal must take place according to the U. D. C, Cross of Honor rules, but after having complied with them, veterans can be given their crosses whenever they call for them or at annual reunions. In reporting to State Recorder, bestowal of crosses, only give one of four legal days.

ARTICLE VIII

CHILDREN'S AUXILIARIES

Sec. 1. All Chapters should endeavor to have under them a Children's Auxiliary. presided over by one of their members as Leader.

Sec. 2. Each child must fill application blank with same certificate as for a Daughter. When wishing to join a U. D. C. Chapter, the child's application blank must be copied verbatum with signatures of endorsers on a U. D. C. application blank and then presented to Chapter Credential Committee for their signatures, before being registered in Chapter and State. Same rules of eligibility are required in both cases.

Sec. 3. Children are requiaed to pay no taxes. A record of their application must be kept by the Leader, but not sent to State Registrar. Leaders must also report monthly to mother Chapters and send yearly reports to State Convention. But their work and disposition of money made by them to be decided by the Leader and children.

Sec. 4. Each Leader of a Children's Chapter shall be entitled to one vote in our State Convention, regardless of the size of the Chapter, but no proxy allowed.

ARTICLE IX

SPECIAL POWERS

Sec. 1. This Division shall have the power to make and adopt such rules, regulations and by-laws as it may deem proper and expedient, provided such be not repugnant to the laws of North Carolina, or to the Constitution of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Sec. 2. This Division shall have power to establish Chapters in any county in the State, subject to rules and regulations of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE IX

U. D. C. NORMAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Sec. 1. The scholarships of the Greensboro Normal and Industrial School are open only to descendants of Confederate Veterans, who are otherwise unable to attend college.

Sec. 2. All applicants must fill out a U. D. C. application blankshowing elegibility, with signatures of Veteran endorsers, and nearest Chapter president, also forwarded with above, statements from reliable parties as to financial disability to otherwise attend college, and good moral character.

Sec. 3. All applicants for said scholarships must stand a competitive examination. Papers to be sent out by State president to some reliable party in applicant's home town.

Sec. 4. Those securing these scholarships shall be entitled to hold same for four years, if reports are satisfactory to State president and president of the college.

ARTICLE X

CONSTITUTION

This Constitution may be changed or amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegate representation in regular session assembled, and after notification of at least thirty days before the meeting at which amendment is to be made.

BY-LAWS

No. 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, announce the business before the Division; state and put all questions; preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order. She shall have the general supervision of the Division; appoint all committes, and approve all orders drawn on the treasury for payment of money. She shall call special meetings of the Division at the request of the Chapters.

No. 2. The Vice-President shall assist the President in her work, and in Convention in the absence of the President, the senior Vice-President shall act as President and discharge the duties of that office.

No. 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate report of the meeting of the State Division, shall notify all Chapters of contemplated changes in the Constitution thirty days before the Convention, and shall keep a roll of the Chapters of the Division, the dates of their organization, and the addresses of their officers.

No. 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence, file all letters of importance, and keep an accurate note of all letters written by her for the Division. She shall notify all committees of their appointment and shall furnish the names of all to their respective chairman.

No. 5. The Treasurer shall collect all State dues, and disburse the same, under orders of the President, for the current expenses of the Division. She shall give receipts to treasurers of Chapters for the annual assessment received from them, and shall send her report with her books to the Auditing Committee, so as to be in their hands first day of Annual Convention.

No. 6. An Auditing Committee, composed of three members,

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shall audit the books of the Treasurer the first day of Annual Convention and make report of same.

No. 7. The Registrar shall keep a register of the names of all members of the Chapters, and the date of their admission to membership. The Recording Secretaries of the various Chapters shall send to her from time to time the applications for membership which they have received. The Registrar shall record these and return to Chapter presidents.

No. 8. The Committee on Credeetials, before allowing Chapter votes, shall confer with Treasurer and Registrar in order to make the number of votes consistent with the reports of those officers according to the per capita tax paid in each Chapter; and it shall be the duty of each Chapter President to send to the State Registrar just before the meeting of the Convention, a revised list of members of her Chapter indicating losses by death or removal.

No. 9. The Historian shall collect all records and incidents connected with the Confederacy and our glorious Southern valor and especially the part taken by North Carolina and by the women of the State, as well in self sacrifice and in untiring effort after the war, in the re-construction of the South, as in perfect endurance of hardship and patriotic devotion during the struggle, and shall safely keep and preserve the same. She shall have custody of all historical papers and shall claim the co-operation of all the historians of the various Chapters of the State.

No. 10. That all printing, of whatever kind to be done for State officers or chairmen of committees must be sent to the Recording Secretary, and by her forwarded, with price of same, to the President, who will decide if work is necessary, and approve before printing is done.

No. 11. That fifty votes shall constitute a quorum of the convention of the North Carolina Division.

Adopted April 26th, 1897. Amended October, 1911.

RULES FOR BESTOWAL OF CROSSES OF HONOR

RULE 1

Section 1. Each State and Territorial Division shall elect, or appoint a Recorder of Crosses of Honor, to whom Chapters shall apply for blank certificates of eligibility to be filled out by the vet. erans, and blank forms for alphabetical lists, to be filled out with data from the certificates, by the President of the Chapter ordering Crosses. When so filled out these shall be sent to the Recorder of said division, for approval or correction, and forwarded by her to the Custodian of Crosses, who will forward the Crosses to the Chapter, provided the rules have been complied with, and the decision of the Custodian shall be final.

The Recorders shall apply to the Custodian of Cross of Honor • U. D. C., for the blank forms of certificates, and blank forms of alphabetical lists, supplying these, on demand, to the Chapters, accompanied by an order to the Custodian, signed by the President General and Recording Secretary General, U. D. C.

Section 2. The oldest living lineal descendant of Veteran, who has not received a Cross, may secure it in any county. Both Veterans and descendants can receive Crosses on some historical day.

If there is no lineal descendant of Veteran, or, in case that the oldest lineal descendant does not desire the Cross, the widow of a Veteran may receive the Cross. by presenting with her application written avowal of such descendant, that he or she waives the right to the Cross, provided said widow be a Confederate woman, who has endured the hardships and privations of the period from "Sixty one to Sixty five."

No descendant, or widow can receive a second Cross, such privilege being granted to Veterans alone, nor can such descendant or widow wear the Cross.

The Custodian General will supply to the recorder of Cross of Honor of such State and Territorial division, special blank forms of certificates for descendants and widows, which must be filled with data of eligibility, such blank forms in use should conform with the headings used in the Record Book of the Custodian General.

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Section 3. After waiting one month, Chapters shall send to the Division Recorder and Custodian, names of Veterans for whom Crosses have been received and not claimed, and these Crosses. if not engraved, may be used at the next bestowal, provided, other certificates in due form have been sent to the Custodian.

RULE 2

Section 1. No Crosses will be furnished by the Custodian unless the order is accompanied by certificates of eligibility, properly filled out, by the veterans, and certified to by two, or more members of a camp of United Confederate Veterans, and alphabetical list from Chapter president.

Section 2. Presidents of Chapters shall fill out blank alphabetical lists from the certificates with all data contained therin to forward with certificates to their State Recorder of Cross of Honor with money order, for the number of Crosses desired.

The Custodian of Cross of Honor shall keep a book, or [•] books, in which shall be kept, alphabetically arranged, the names and data of all veterans, descendants of veterans, and widows to whom Crosses have been issued.

Section 3. The certificates shall be returned by the Custodian to the President of Chapters who have ordered Crosses, and the same to be placed on file by the said Chapter, that data may be furnished when needed for historical, or other purposes.

Section 4. Each Chapter shall keep a book, alphabetically arranged, in which is recorded the name and service of every veteran and ancestor of descendant, and widow, of a veteran who receives a Cross. Each State or Territorial Recorder shall keep a similar record book of all Crosses issued.

RULE 3.

Section 1. Crosses may be granted by the muster roll of the nearest camp, U. C. V., and to Confederate veterans who are not members of a camp, who can give the required proof of eligibility, attested by two veterans who are members of a camp.

Section 2. The oldest living lineal descendant may secure the Cross, by giving the same proof of eligibility as that required of his veteran ancestor—and Confederate widows of yeterans, applying for Cross, must fill blank form of certificate. giving service of veteran, whose widow she is-such widows must have endured the hardships of the war period from 1861 to 1865.

Section 3. Upon the certificate of a reputable physician that a veteran is dying, if desired, he may receive the Cross immediately.

RULE 4.

Section 1. The Crosses may be bestowed on Memorial or Decoration Day, selected by each State or Territorial Division, U. D. C.; the birthdays of President Jefferson Davis and General Robert E. Lee-June 3rd and January 19th; and one commemorative day, between July 1st and January 19th, to be selected by each State or Territorial Division, in convention assembled. North Carolina has selected August 23. The presentation shall be accompanied with such ceremonies as will give proper dignity to the occasion.

RULE 5.

Section 1. A veteran, in good standing, having lost his Cross, may have it replaced once only, by applying to the President of the Chapter from which he received the Cross, and he must furnish copy of the certificate upon which the Cross was first bestowed. a second Cross is lost, a certificate may be given, in testimony that such veteran has been awarded a Cross.

Section 2. Chapter Presidents are urged to advise veteraus to have their names engraved on the bar of Cross, for the purpose of identification, if lost.

Section 3. A veteran having been awarded a Cross, and dying before it is received, the President of the Chapter bestowing it may give it to the oldest lineal descendant, or widow, under provisions of Rule 1, Section 2. A veteran having received a Cross, may bequeath it to any lineal descendant that he may select.

Section 4. On, and after November 1st, 1912, no more Crosses shall be issued.

RULE 6.

The Cross cannot be worn, in any case, or on any occasion, except by the Veteran upon whon it was bestowed-no descendant or widow can wear it.

RULE 7.

Section 1. Where counties have no local organization of U. D. C., a veteran may receive the Cross through the President of the nearest local Chapter, as the President of Chapter in the county

from which he entered the Confederate service if so desired.

Section 2. When chapters are not able to bear the expense of purchasing Crosses for other counties than their own, these may be furnished at the expense of the general association, upon the authority of the President General U. D. C.

RULE 8.

All orders for Crosses shall be filed in the Custodian's office three weeks before the day intended for bestowal.

RULE 9.

Any Chapter departing from these rules will not be entitled to Crosses for presentation,

. Preceding the presentation of the Crosses, Rules V., VI., VII., VII., and IX., snall be read upon every occasion of the bestowal.

The President of each Chapter shall see that the camps of Confederate Veterans and Sons of Confederate Veterans in her county shall receive a copy of these rules for continual reference,



PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

Dear Daughter Friends:

It fills my heart with joy and gladness to again greet you in this our Sixteenth Annual Convention, and may our sessions be fraught with such good will and harmony that all our work may redound to the greatest good of our beloved organization.

When last year you did me the greatest of all honors in your power and for a third time placed me at the head of this Division, I accepted with the determination to, if possible, give yet greater energy and zeal to the work of the Confederacy. How I have suc-

ceeded in carrying out my determination remains for you to judge.

This year has been by all odds the most strenuous one of any, during the years it has been my pleasure to serve you as Recording Secretary or President, but at all times the business of the Division has taken precedence of any other call. There seems to have been a steady increase of interest ever since the close of the last Convention, and Chapters seem to be continually awakening to the great fact of what it really means to be a Daughter of the Confederacy.

While we can report no new U. D. C. Chapters formed this year my pen has been by no means idle in trying to awaken interest in new places and the need of a suitable leader in many instances seemed the only drawback to the organizing of several new Chapters. But in the old Chapters there has been much greater endeavor than heretofore to increase of membership and to draw the very many eligible women into the fold.

The work among the children has been fine and the Chairman of that Committee has done much to increase interest along this line. The idea of dividing the larger and smaller children or the boys and girls in a town into two Chapters has taken hold in some places with great results. The new Chapters formed this year among children are the Thomasville Grays at Thomasville, the James A. Weston and Dixie-Grays at Hickory, the Orren Smith at Henderson and Jefferson Davis at Weldon.

How few of us stop to study this work among the children and realize how great it has been in our Division. How many of you are aware that it is almost as old as the Division itself. As early as 1897 we find that Mrs. Margaret Call organized the first Children Chapter in her home town, the Washington Grays, and at the Convention of 1898 we find them presenting a portrait of General Bryan Grimes. In December, '98, Mrs. Margaret Branch Sexton organized in Charlotte the second one, the Julia Jackson, and from that time on the Children's Chapters continued to grow until now they number forty-one.

Your attention is especially called to the date of the organization of this Second Chapter for last winter your President's attention was called to a claim made in the Veteran that this Chapter was formed in 1908 and by other than Mrs. Sexton.

During the past year I have written some 3,000 letters and cards, answering all the day they reached me, this rule only having been broken when I was absent from home. I have signed and sent out 500 U. D. C. certificates, besides letters and papers from the general organization, demit and badge blanks.

Just here I would call your special attention to the great necessity of every registered Daughter having a U. D. C. certificate. No longer does it remain optional as to whether or not a Daughter shall herself purchase a certificate. It is not the member's duty to see to this. The General Constitution requires that every Chapter present to every member on joining or to every old member without one a U. D. C. certificate. All the past year have I endeavored to im-

press this fact upon Chapter Presidents. Some have responded by ordering for the entire Chapter, but there are still many among the older members particularly, who are without them. In furnishing to old members however bear in mind the fact that they must be signed by the officers in office when presented and cannot be ante dated.

Our Educational work in the State is now on a fine basis, and of all the work done by the Divisions first and foremost should stand this of educating the sons and daughters of Confederate Soldiers and sending them forth to teach the truth to coming generations. Many local scholarships under the U. D. C. are scattered from one end of the State to another, but it is to those at the Greensboro Normal to which I would call your undivided attention. The three girls are there and the Division stands pledged to meet their expenses of \$150 each. Your honor as Daughters has been pledged. Many Chapters meet this fund regularly, but many others pay no attention to it. My friends wake up to this work. Send in your contribution to the Educational fund so that the money may be on hand to meet the quarterly payments and not embarrass your President. Treasurer and Chairman of Committee.

During the past twelve months the Division has seen the completion of one of its greatest works. On June 10th, the veil fell from the monument to Henry L. Wyatt, erected through your efforts and at your instigation, and it was the honor shown your President that the Wyatt Committee selected her to present this monument to the great State for which Wyatt bled and died. Too much praise cannot be given to your able chairman Miss Margaret Etheredge and her assistant Mrs. Josephus Daniels for their untiring zeal and energy in pushing forward this work, and at the same time we owe a debt of gratitude to the sculptor, Mr. Borgeum, for his magnificent conception of the subject. A large laurel wreath was placed at the base of the statue as a tribute from this Division.

One more Division monument have we yet uncompleted, but we trust that before another Convention rolls around, the one to the Boy Soldiers of the University may stand upon that beautiful campus to speak to the hundreds, daily passing to and fro, of the bravery and heroism of the University men of the '60's.

Among the Chapter monuments unveiled this year' we find the one at Hertford completed by the Perquimans Chapter. The Frank Bennett Children's Chapter of Wadesboro have concentrated their energies on a Confederate Memorial Hall, which they opened in April with appropriate ceremonies. The J. D. Moore Children's Chapter in Gastonia has raised the fund of \$300 to purchase the statue which will crown the top of the monument the Gastonia U. D. C. Chapter hope to unveil this month.

And my friends let us not forget that the two great U. D. C. monuments, Arlington and Shiloh, are calling to us to complete them. Let us put our shoulders to the wheel and push them to unveiling, and then let us bend our undivided energies to the erection of the greatest of them all, North Carolina's monument at

Gettysburg. A monument that will tell the truth of all the men of this glorious old State stood for, which will tell how Petigrew led that famous charge, how North Carolina's sons went farthest and staid longest upon that bloody field and how none ever did or can surpass them.

The newspaper reports lately credit Gen. Julian S. Carr as saying he had a grudge against the Daughters of the Confederacy for not taking up the Stonewall Jackson Memorial. Surely if this is true that fine old veteran is ignorant of one of the U. D. C.'s most strongest rules. The U. D. C. can take up no general work such as that without the consent and endorsement of the President General, nor can a Division do so without endorsement of Division Presidents and neither of these were asked for, hence the North Carolina Division stands exonerated.

Your attention is very particularly called to the rules and regulations attached to applications for membership. In the first place no great nieces can hereafter be admitted, but this law in no way effects those already Daughters. In fact in every instance it is urged that application be made through material aid by lineal descent man or woman, rather than collateral descent through soldiers. This collateral soldier relation can be given in remarks.

The fact that each application be endorsed by one or two veterans, requires that these men give Company and regiment or camp so as to know they are veterans. These two matters if strictly attended to will save your Registrar much trouble and much expense to the Division.

The question of awarding Crosses of Honor has been greatly misunderstood causing very much confusion. After many applications for August 23rd had been returned by the Custodian General as "too late" your President requested the Division Recorder to take up the matter with Mrs. Raines in order to see if we could not excuse them, but alas, only to meet with positive refusal. Our only hope rests in getting the Washington Convention to extend the time every where till January 19, 1913.

This year North Carolina has received more recognition from our President General than has ever been our good fortune before, and is therefore represented upon more committees. On the two great committees of Arlington and Shiloh, Mrs. I. W. Faison is Director of the former and your State President of the latter. Mrs. Faison is also Vice-Chairman of the Historical Souvenirs Committee. Besides these the following ladies represent North Carolina on the various committees: Mrs. Martin Willard, President General's badge; Mrs. Leo D. Heartt, Program; Mrs. H. L. Riggins, Relief work; Mrs. Eugene Little, War Between the States; Mrs. E. F. Hall, Transportation, while your President has the high honor of being made chairman of the most important of this year's committees, that of the Revision of the U. D. C. Constitution and By-Laws.

Your special attention is called to the strict observance of the request to send all money to the Division Treasurer by money orders alone. We cannot afford to pay exchange on checks, and while some towns may be exempt from this rule of the bank, the Division cannot make exceptions to its rules. Much confusion and letter writing could be saved your Treasurer by adhering strictly to this request.

And just here I would state that many letters could be saved all State officers and a good deal of expense to the Division if Chapter officers would only consult the Minutes and inform themselves exactly to whom to write for various blanks. The law requiring all general work and communications to pass through the hands of the Division President, while a most excellent one, causes a heavy expense to said Divisions, as everything must be forwarded to chapters as soon as received and not held back till a convenient time.

Your President has been called upon, during the past year, to represent you in two very noted ways. First by being placed by Col. Ashley Horne upon his committee to select the design and manage the erection of his monument to the Confederate Women of North Carolina, and in the second place by being chosen by Major Orren Smith, the designer of the Stars and Bars, to present a flag of the original design to the general organization in Washington. Our President General writes that this presentation will take place at the opening exercises Tuesday night, immediately after the response to the addresses of welcome. For several years your President has made a thorough study of our U. D. C. work, its needs and interests and therefore desires to present to you at this Convention a few suggestions, which she would like for you to take up separately and thoroughly discuss.

1st. That we adopt the system that has worked so well in several other States, of dividing the State into several districts, which shall be under the immediate supervision of a District chairman. To this chairman be assigned the duty of forming new Chapters and in every way encouraging the work of those under her. Each district to hold a meeting of one or two days in some town during the spring, when the work be talked over and information given.

2nd. That every Chapter be required to have a Registrar.

3rd. That your President be instructed to immediately have printed the account of the organization of the Division and Minutes of first and second Conventions. Also that she have a set of all North Carolina Minutes bound for preservation. In suggesting your President to do this work, it is done because she has secured a full set of all printed Minutes, and has also compiled the notes of the two first Conventions.

4. In view of the fact that our Constitution is silent as to whether or not Presidents and Leaders are entitled to representation other than as delegates, and in order to settle this question for the future the suggestion is made that this matter be decided now. As it is the question of such representation must be left entirely with Chapters. Our Conventions are now so large that it is difficult, nay impossible, for small towns to entertain them. Your President would in view of such a fact suggest that hereafter the rule be

made requiring each Chapter President to be its first delegate by virtue of her office, with duly elected alternate, said alternate under no circumstances being entitled to cast a President's personal vote. That as Leaders represent the Children's Chapters and as we do not recognize Children in our Conventions, that said Leaders be entitled to personal representation, but no alternates.

5th. That special Resolutions of Appreciation be sent to Col. Ashley Horne for the great work he has done in erecting the monument to the North Carolina Women of the Confederacy and a committee be appointed to draw up said resolutions.

6th. That a new office, that of Director of Children's Chapters, be created.

During the past year it has been my pleasure to visit a number of Chapters and every where many honors have been extended to me as your President. Early in December I attended a most delightful entertainment in Raleigh and listened to our Historian General, Miss Rutherford's, delightful talk on old times, the next day attending a meeting of the Johnston-Pettigrew Chapter. Later in the winter I made a delightful visit to Tarboro where I addressed the William Dorsey Pender Chapter, and was the guest of the D. A. R. Chapter on Washington's birthday. In April I attended the meeting of the Revision Committee in Charleston and at a delightful tea given us by Miss Poppenheim met many of North Carolina's sons and daughters. Returning from there I stopped over in Wadesboro and took part in the delightful exercises of the Frank Bennett Children's Chapter at the opening of their Confederate Museum.

On May 20th you were represented at the unveiling of the tablet commemorative of the Mecklenburg Declaration erected by the Colonial Dames, and your greetings extended to that body. Midsummer brought a most delightful meeting with the Harnett Chapter at Lillington, when a number from neighboring Chapters were present to greet us. It was with regret that circumstances compelled me to decline invitations to attend the Veterans Re-union in Mobile, the unveiling of the monument to General John Morgan and the laying of the corner-stone of the Gastonia monument.

And now my dear friends, we must pause in our recital of what has been full of joy and gladness and turn for a moment to a darker side of our work. The angel of death has visited many of our Chapters, but we have been spared the loss of any of our honorary or ex-State officers. Yet while this is true, the Daughters have seen one of North Carolina's most shining lights flicker and grow dimmer till it ceased to shine to mortal eyes, but only became more luminous upon another shore. There has passed from among us that noble, retiring, brave, true Confederate Soldier General Robert F. Hoke, and we would pause to pay tribute to so true a Confederate, so noble a Christian, so loyal a North Carolinian.

And now to you Dear Daughters of our beloved Old North State, I have rendered the account of my stewardship. Whether it has been as you would have had it I cannot tell, but truthfully and faithfully I have given to your service the best that was in me, never letting anything interfere with your business.

To you one and all, to those present as to those absent, I would extend my heartfelt thanks for your generous dealings with all my short comings, for your kind thoughtfulness at all times, for your very many words and letters of encouragement and good cheer. The pathway has not always been strewn with roses, but your love has covered up the thorns. For my successor I bespeak the same kindness and good will you have shown towards me.

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

Once more I come before you to report work done: 264 applications registered, 28 transfers, nine of which were from outside Divisions, the remaining 18 being from one State Chapter to another.

I have written 221 letters and 64 post-cards and I am sure that two-thirds, nay, three-fourths of these were made necessary by the failure of Chapter officials to see that Company and Regiment of endorsing Veterans were put on application papers, and by the hitherto lax methods of registration.

I suggested in my report to the last Convention, that some action be taken in regard to these matters. I now urge it! for out of the fullness of two years experience and hard work, I realize that such action is absolutely necessary.

Until this is done, in regard to the endorsing Veterans, the work (and the postage bills) of the State Registrar will be doubled.

Until stricter rules are enforced in regard to registration, a correct State Register is impossible.

To these ends I would make the following suggestions:

A page in the Minutes, to be devoted to Hints Concerning Registration.

Concerning Veteran endorsers. Can statement of Camp to which one belongs be accepted in place of Company and Regiment? Can seal of County Clerks be accepted instead of Veteran endorser?

An emphatic statement that only printed demits can be accepted. That great-nieces are no longer eligible.

That papers must be in by September 15th or State Registrar cannot have time to attend to them. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF RECORDER OF CROSSES OF HONOR.

Madam President, Daughters of the Confederacy:

It is with feelings of pride and sadness that 1 bring my report of work done the past year. Pride that we have awarded so many crosses, but infinite sadness, when I reflect that there are still veterans, who not only desire crosses, but are begging for them, and still other veterans who have not heard of our "Cross."

This year, with the consent of our Custodian General, I asked several of the Eastern Counties to take up the work in the adjoining Counties where there are no Chapters. (All of the Western counties have Chapters.) Several of the Chapters responded enthusiastically; none more so than Pamlico Chapter of Washington; New Bern Chapter, of New Bern, and Cape Fear Chapter, of Wilmington.

August 23rd I accompanied the Wilmington representatives when they went to Onslow County to present crosses. The people of Onslow had not only invited Judge Clark to make an address and prepared a picnic dinner but turned out "enmasse" to show their appreciation. The veterans from all sections of the County had gathered; all who were to receive crosses were present, and about fifteen others; who, each, begged and plead for a cross. "Just please get me one. I never heard of them before. Lady can't you get me one?" And so on until we were all in tears. Now ladies, I do not want a single one of these old men to be disappointed. We must, if possible, get them crosses.

Owing to a misunderstanding, a great many Chapters were under the impression they could get crosses until November 1st, when as a fact, North Carolina's time expired August 23rd. As a consequence I have twenty-four Chapters on my list, who have either sent or written me for applications, varying from one to fourteen. Now, that these various Chapters and Veterans may not be disappointed, I ask you to draw up a motion to be sent to the General Convention at Washington, D. C., asking that "In view of the misunderstanding as to dates, the North Carolina Division be allowed to secure crosses for all applications now in hands of Chapters."

Last year when Mrs. Raines report was made, we determined that North Carolina must present one thousand crosses this year;

and, by hearty co-operation we have passed the mark. During the year, we have awarded 1169 crosses. Of these 956 were to veterans, 54 to widows, 159 to descendants and 48 were duplicates, as follows:

REPORT OF MISS REBECCA CAMERON, HISTORIAN.

Madam President: In submitting my report I regret that it should show such a small harvest of results from so much work and thought as has been expended by our Historian General who, in January last, sent at no little expense and trouble, a large package of circular letters (already folded and in envelopes) in which she urged the importance of immediate and zealous historical work, and outlining an admirable plan for its prosecution.

To this, I added a circular letter that I had written, a copy of which I herewith append:

Historian's Letter, North Carolina Division.

My Dear Madam: In sending out to you the Historian General's circular letter, it seems best to add to it a personal appeal from your own Division Historian. For ten years you have honored me with that important office. Many others could have discharged its duties with more abundant results, I have no doubt. None could have

given to it more heartfelt devotion and interest. And now, I am making a personal appeal to each one of you, my fellow workers in the field of history; begging you to take up your work with renewed interest and devotion; and work as you have never worked before, to make this year the most memorable in our annals. We are pledged by our Constitution to preserve the History of the War Between the States. And this means that each Chapter in each Division shall preserve its own local history of men, and measures and events.

Not wide areas of general history, that other writers have already recorded, and thus rescued from oblivion, but the noteworthy incidents that happened in your own individual localities, viz: towns, neighborhoods, and counties.

You are to go personally to the men and women who were the actors, or the sufferers and get from them their story of it.

Write it as nearly as possible in their own words; be absolutely exact as to names, dates, localities and commands if it happens to have been a fight or a public event.

And don't soften harsh or brutal facts; don't bring a post bellum sentiment to "Smooth War's horrid front."

"Paint Oliver Cromwell, warts and all."

Likewise remember that the women of the sixties have also stories to tell, that are worth as much in their way as those of the men. We want them all. Carefully study Miss Rutherford's plan; and follow it literally.

It has been very carefully studied out, and she is experienced in the work. (Also she is of North Carolina ancestry, as a county and town testify; and she is very proud of it, as she well may be. Most of us are.) When we make our Division report next November in Washington City let it be the best one of all. Let it stand first as North Carolina has ever been.

The eyes of strangers, and foreigners, will be upon us there. Let us shine forth gloriously.

We sent more men to the front than any other State; we left more dead upon the bloody trail from Bethel to Appomattox. We went "farthest" every where, therefore we have more history to record than any other State. Let us, Oh, let us spring forward now, and save the shining fragments that we still can grasp.

They are going away so fast, those matchless men. Soon the seal of death will be irrevocably placed upon brave lips that now can speak.

"The thin grey line" grows thinner all the while. Death will not stop for us, to wait our tardy leisure. Death will not unlock closed mouths for us. We must forever lose what we do not now ask for. And I pray you, I urge and beseech you, to go forth now to the gleaning that is left, the little that is spared from the tide of half a century of lost years. Soon, Oh, so soon, the bugles will blow "Taps" over the last of the grey clad men; and we can never then hear the stories that they only could tell. Will you, oh, can you let them be lost?

Your office is a sacred trust, you have accepted it, and thus have pledged yourself to do the work that belongs to it, and I am sure as the daughters, wives and sisters of those men who never failed Lee, you will as faithfully do your duty as did they.

Hoping to hear from you, if only a line, and that you will gather a rich harvest of historical papers, each honorably striving to excel all the rest. I am Very faithfully yours,

Hillsboro, N. C., January 22nd, 1912.

We mailed a copy to each one of the eighty-eight Chapters in the Division, asking for an immediate acknowledgment, and a report of Chapter's historical work by the middle of September. No replies were received by me, and only one Chapter reported its work.

"The Roanoke Minute Men" Chapter of Littleton, through their admirable Historian, Mrs. J. P. Leach, sent me on September 12th, a list of nine papers that had been read before their Chapter. On Sept. 4th. Miss Jessica Randolph Smith, a member of the Vance County Chapter U. D. C., who has the true historical instinct, as befits the daughter of that maker of history, Major Orren Randolph Smith, sent me valuable memoranda of the organization and services of the Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry, which I returned to her to embody in one of her own excellent papers; and a record of General W. H. Cheek, read before the Henry L. Wyatt Camp, U. C. V., written by Mrs. M. J. O'Neil. Also an admirable paper on "Arlington," as it was, in the days of the "Lees" and as it is to-day in its Military aspect, not the home of the living but of "The Sacred Dead," with descriptions of the head stones over every grave and speaking of how beautiful is the "Confederate Section" where lie our own Grey Clad Soldiers in the center of which, will be laid the corner stone of The Confederate Monument, which we hope will be the grandest work of Sir Moses Ezekiel. In this paper was also given a brief synopsis of the great work done by Dr. S. E. Lewis in whose brain the idea originated of having our "Confederate Section" at Arlington and by whom the "Charles Broadway Rouse" Camp of Washington was formed, to assist in this work which before long included the caring for all graves of Confederate Soldiers who died in Northern prisons or in Hospitals.

This paper was the work of Mrs. A. J. Cheek and read before the Henderson Camp by her on "Arlington Day."

Mrs. J. S. Henderson, of your hostess Chapter, sent a most valuable and delightfully written memorial sketch of that gallant Colonel, Charles F. Fisher, the first officer of the North Carolina line killed in battle and Colonel of the Sixth North Carolina Volunteers which was really the first regiment raised in the State, written by the Hon. John S. Henderson, of Salisbury, and read before the Mecklenburg Chapter of the U. D. C., in which address he shows clearly that the successful issue of the first great Victory of the War, the first battle of Manassas, was due to Colonel Fisher

and the gallant Sixth, who at the supreme moment of crisis; by their heroic capture of Rickett's and Griffin's batteries changed disaster into victory. A victory, however, that cost us dear for Colonel Fisher gave his life for it.

This is, as far as I know, all the Historical material that has been harvested in response to the appeals sent out.

Understanding early in September, that some question had already been raised as to which of the Confederate Flags Major Orren Randolph Smith designed and set afloat in Louisburg, March 18th, 1861, I wrote to Mrs. Robert Davis, of the Jos. J. Davis Chapter, U. D. C., at Louisburg, and asked her to take steps to secure the affidavits of some of the people who had been present on the occasion of the first unfurling of "The Stars and Bars" so that the question would be forever settled authoritatively. She replied at once saying that they were already at work trying to secure them, but so far, October 2nd, the result of their efforts have not reached me. This I consider a very important matter not only in justice to Major Smith but as a question of the truth of history, and of State pride.

We should have learned the value of an authoritative record from the vexed question of the date of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, May 20th, 1775, and I am sorry the affidavits have not come in time for this report.

I have written one hundred and fifty letters and twenty-five postal cards, and given desired information to the Historians of several of our sister States.

It is not worth while for me to urge upon our Historians the importance of prompt work. I have said all that I could for the past ten years and apparently without avail.

But. none the less, I wish with all my heart I knew the "open sesame to their hearts. Respectfully submitted,

In view of the fact that the awarding of Crosses of Honor will now expire by time limit: that the North Carolina Division now appoint a Committee to select a suitable testimonial to be presented to the mothers, sisters, nieces or nephews of those Boys in Grey who fought for their country, but died unmarried.

Seconded and carried.

2nd Recommendation: Omit names of all officers of Chapter Roster, except President and Recording Secretary.

Lost.

3rd Recommendation: That the paper, "Carolina and the Southern Cross", of Mrs. Archbell, of Kinston, be adopted by the Chapters as their local organ.

Referred to New Business.

The Arbitration Committee reported no business.

The report of Constitution and By-Laws read by Mrs. J. O. Litchford. All recommendations were adopted.

AMENDMENTS.

Article IV.

Section 1. Add, "A retiring Division president however shall represent the Division as its president at the General Convention of the same year."

Article V.

Section 1. After word Confederacy omit "and", also add to sentence "And Memorial Day, May 10th."

Article VII.

Omit if Crosses of Honor are abolished by General Convention in Washington.

Article X.

Section 5. All applications for U. D. C. Scholarships must be in the hands of Division President or Chairman Educational Committee not later than May first of each year.

Educational Committee report read by Mrs. L. J. Ingram in absence of the Chairman, Mrs. Eugene Little, and accepted.

Mrs. Little was detained on account of recent illness and motion was made to send her a telegram of love and remembrance.

Motion was made to adjourn. Accepted.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

The Convention was called to order at 10:40 o'clock a. m.

After the opening prayer by the Chaplain the Minutes were read and accepted.

As is the sacred custom, time was given to Memorial Exercises, that Chapters should pay tribute to those "Gone Before." A moment of perfect silence was called for.

REPORT OF HENRY WYATT MONUMENT COMMITTEE.

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

For four years we came to you telling you of the monument that was to be. To-day, this report could be made in the one brief sentence—The Henry Wyatt Monument is completed, unveiled, paid for, and Twenty-eight Dollars (\$28.00) left over.

June the 10th was a very proud and happy day for North Carolina. Time now, and space in the Minutes, forbid me telling you just how proud especially our committee felt. You who were there will agree with us that it was a perfect day.

It was my pleasure to be in Raleigh several days before the unveiling, and fully appreciate the skilful planning of the people there to make the completion of our work a grand success. They did all they could, and more too—not a request was refused nor a wish ungratified—and the expenses of the unveiling even seemed a joy to them.

The welcome given to all the visitors was truly like "ye olden days."

There was an elegant dinner prepared for veterans and visiting military companies. Mrs. Josephus Daniels entertained the Daughters and other guests at a beautiful luncheon served at her home.

We thank dear old Raleigh, beautiful City of Oaks, for the many kindnesses extended to us; and to three faithful women are we especially grateful—these three women are, Mrs. Josephus Daniels, Mrs. Leo Heartt and Miss Denson.

When any of you go to Raleigh be sure to go and look into the face of the Henry Wyatt Statue. You can't but feel the spirit that sent the young hero into the face of death.

Mr. Borglum has said that "America erects too many monuments to men, not ideals." In this he most nearly archives it, with his genius

consecrated to the pure ideal of an eternal truth, he has thrown into his work his entire skill. As the clay responded beneath his hands it became something real fed with this ideal—the spirit of the Confederate soldier—the true patriotism that sent him to arms, the spirit of determination that carried him through four years of fighting and hardships, the unconquerable courage with which he laid down his arms to return to a country of ruins.

As this is my first work done for our cause, I wish to thank you individually and collectively who have given me such cordial support in carrying on your work. While the Henry Wyatt Committee stands dismissed, I shall ever feel a special interest in each of you, for united we stood for the best we could give our State.

Oh, the sweetness and sadness of thinking of the millions who may gaze upon the sculptered ideal of Henry Wyatt—as they view the grand proportions and stern, resolute expression of this youthful hero going forth to battle, may the same emotions that stir our hearts make them know that their fathers fought and died for what they knew to be right.

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy of North Carolina:

I beg to submit the following report as Chairman of the Memorial Arch or Gateway to the Confederate section of Oakwood Cemetery in Raleigh, N. C.

This object has been under the consideration of this Convention for nine or ten years and the fund has suddenly grown, but has not as yet reached a point to justify the beginning of the actual work of construction.

By reference to the minutes of the past Conventions you will find a history of the work and its progress up to 1908, when there seemed quite a falling off of interest in the project attributable to several causes that can be adjusted as time goes on. Be that as it may, we hope the Chapters will repose sufficient confidence in the Committee to set aside all differences of opinion that may have existed regarding the manner of inscribing the names of Chapters on the Arch. Let the funds be raised first, and then let the President appoint a wise and competent committee, who will endeavor "to regulate the article of expense as economically as they can with justice to the wishes of the Society."

According to the minutes of 1905 to 1908 forty-six Chapters have responded to the call for Twenty Dollars each.

The amount now in the hands of the Treasurer is \$1,048.77—a very small increase in two years, and this increase principally from interest on the funds. Thanks are due our treasurers for their wise investments.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHILDREN'S CHAPTER.

Madam President, Fellow Workers:

The thought that the U. D. C. is a unique organization among all the patriotic orders of the world perpetuating as it does the heroes and principles of a lost cause has been expressed on many occasions; but the more unique and greater responsibility that necessarily accompanies and grows out of this distinction I have never heard emphasized. It is that we shall teach truth untinctured with prejudice; that we shall revere the past without injecting its rancor into the present and the future; that we shall teach our children the facts about the opponents of our men in arms with no embitterments of hatred; in fact to carry out General Lee's injunction in "The Last Word of the Confederacy".

Remember, we are one country now. Bring up your children to

be above all, Americans. This work of training young Americans that Lee spent his days after the war in performing, your committee has done in a humble way.

Five new Chapters have been organized since last Convention and more than five others have had preliminary work of organization done with such hopes of success, we believe another year will see them perfected.

Our Conference of Leaders was held Thursday, October 10 of this Convention. For inspiration, direction and encouragement we are indebted to Mrs. Frances Fisher Tiernan for a beautiful message of greeting.

A delightful talk on "Attractive Methods of Teaching Confederate History," was made by Miss Mabel Tuck, of Durham.

Program and Entertainment Plans, by Mrs. T. T. Covington, of Laurinburg.

Mrs. Henry Archbell, of Kinston, presented reasons why we need a State Magazine for the Children, how we can have one and proof copies of "Carolina and the Southern Cross," which would eminently meet these needs were distributed. The concensus of opinion of the leaders being strong approval of the publication the editor Mrs. Archbell has designed.

The sub-committee of award were Mrs. F. M. Williams, Mrs. T. W. Thrash and your chairman. Their duty was to award the banner donated by Mrs. Thomas L. Craig, of Gastonia, for the Chapter doing the best work this year and was made under rules formulated by the main committe and followed:

The points made are:

I. To that chapter the largest proportion of whose members can perfectly recite the Confederate catechism.

II. To the chapter making the largest proportionate increase in its membership.

111. To the Chapter having the best financial record. This includes all actual work; aid to sick or aged veterans, monument funds, Soldiers Home, Museum, Education, Confederate flags or pictures, anything of value done or secured by Leader and members.

IV. To the Chapter whose members and Leader have caused the greatest number of new Children's chapters to be organized.

We are indebted to Mr. C. H. Wilmoth, of Charlotte, for donating our printed programs of the Children's Conference, the Conference this year being the best attended of the three held as a result of its time and place, etc., being well known, this Conference also had the honor of being the first to be attended by our State President. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME FOR THE CONFEDERATE WOMEN.

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

Your Committee on Home for the Confederate Women comes once more to make its annual report on this worthy undertaking. Since our last meeting at Winston-Salem practically nothing has been done. It seems to your Committee to be wisest and best that

we devote our energies to securing a site for the home, and getting a building erected and equipped as soon as possible. Without going into an argument on the question in this report, we beg to recommend:

First. That a representative committee of five from different sections of the State be appointed to ask for and receive offers of sites and donations for the home, and that this committee be instructed to report fully all bids and offers to the proper committee of the Legislature of North Carolina, that such site may be selected as will be, all things considered, the best for the home.

Second. That this committee be charged with the duty of presenting to the Legislature of 1913 the claims of the Confederate Women of the State, and ask for an appropriation by the Legislature of Ten Thonsand Dollars for the erection and equipment of buildings and an annual appropriation of Five Thousand Dollars for the maintenance of the same.

Third. That this Committee be authorized to renew the offer of the United Daughters of the Confederacy of North Carolina, made by the Convention at Rocky Mount in 1910 to furnish this building upon its completion.

Fourth. That the several Local Chapters comprising this Convention be asked to appoint a special committee and pass suitable resolutions and to co-operate with the central committee in getting this important matter properly before the people of the Sate and before the State Legislature at its Session in 1913.

While the progress that we are making in our effort to secure this home has not been rapid as we would like, yet we are persuaded that if our women will work unitedly and enthusiastically we can secure this much needed home within the next twelve months. Let us make this our chief aim for the year to come, and set our hearts on this one thing. We are sure that the good women of North Carolina will have sufficient influence with the true manhood of the State to secure, at their hands, a place where protection and peace will be provided for the faithful women, who must look to the benevolence of a grateful Commonwealth to care for them in their declining days. In other days they kept the fires burning at home, while their husbands and sons were at the front, and we feel that we can appeal with confidence to the Old North State in the days of their adversity.

Miss Dowty has been at the Normal two years working her way, and is highly endorsed by President Foust and teachers. Miss Wilson's application was longest on file. Miss Pinkston is granddaughter of a brave veteran and a girl of fine character and attainments. The young man who was to have our scholarship at Chapel Hill decided at the last minute to work instead so President Venable gave it to a worthy applicant. A. & M. scholarship is filled by Earnest Knox Herman, son of a Methodist minister and grandson and nephew of veterans. The scholarship at Oxford College is still open, also one for Music only at Davenport, though advertised. Miss McRae hopes to have one next year at Red Springs Seminary. Miss Shipp fills her own at Fassifern, as does Professor Graham at Warrenton High School and a number of others are filled locally. I feel we have "Just begun to fight" on the school question and hope to see this work carried on to much greater success. I call to the consideration of this Convention, Mrs. Archbell's Magazine, "Carolina and The Southern Cross," the first issue of which has lately reached me. I believe she will, if properly supported and encouraged, do a great and highly important work in placing in our children's reach a knowledge of the History we ourselves have made, and a "Reason for the faith that is in us."

Go with me a few moments back fifty one years to the town of Louisburg. Twas there that young Orren Randolph Smith bought from J. Barrow's store some red, white and blue material and with the assistance of Miss Rebecca Murphy (now Mrs. Winburn) made and sent aloft the flag that afterwards was accepted by the committee at Montgomery as the flag of the Confederate States of America. Major Smith, a brave veteran of several wars, is now living in Henderson and 85 years old. In his name it gives me unspeakable pleasure and the greatest honor to present to you his flag—your flag—the stars and bars that led the men in grey to such deeds of heroism and to the highest glory won by any soldiers of the known world—the boys of '61.'65.

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SUPPLEMENT TO TABULATED REPORTS.

CAPE FEAR CHAPTER, No. 3-WILMINGTON.

Have contributed to all State and General causes possible-to Arlington, Shiloh, Gettysburg Monument Funds, to proposed statue to General Stonewall Jackson and several lesser causes. At Christmas the children sold sealts for Arlington \$1.20, to which they added \$1.30 making a total of \$2.50 for Arlington.

The sale of cards amounted to 60 cents to which they added \$1.90 including the price of the cards for Shiloh and making a total of \$2.50 for the Shiloh monument.

As the President and Leader were both very ill in August and September the sums were not sent to the treasurers but to the Convention by the Leader.

The Leader bought 20 pamphlets written by J. Ogden Murry, giving a short biography of Jefferson Davis. She started a circulating library in the Chapter. Each child that took a book promised to read it and pass it on till every member of the Chapter had read the book; then they promised to circulate it outside till the books have familiarized the people in Kinston with the life of the Confederacy's only President. I consider this work important,

A paper on the "Meaning of Dixie" was prepared for the Chapter by the Leader and afterward, at their request, it was published in the News & Observer and was appreciated enough to be copied by several other papers. Numerous letters have been received by the Leader congratulating her on the interpretation of Dixie. Other

papers have been read in the Chapter during the year. Ten new members have been added to the roll.

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CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

-of the-

United Daughters of the Confederacy,

(AS AMENDED AT THE WINSTON CONVENTION, 1911.)

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

The name of this organization shall be the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE II.

Object.

The object of this Association shall be benevolent, memorial, educational, historical and social. To accomplish these purposes it will seek:

1. To give assistance, when needed, to survivors of the war and those dependent upon them.

2. To honor the memory of those who fell in the service of the Confederate States, and to remember gratefully those survivors who have faithfully served and suffered, and remained loyal to the Confederate Cause.

3. To collect and preserve relics, objects and incidents of historic value, to record deeds of heroism of Southern men and women, and to unite with the Confederate veterans in the determination that the portion of American history relating to the late war shall be properly taught in the public schools of the State, and to use its influence towards this object in all private schools.

4. To bring into its organization the women throughout the State who are eligible to membership and loyal to the memories and principles of the Confederate cause.

ARTICLE III.

Membership.

Section 1. All Chapters, which are properly chartered in the State, thereby become members of this Division. Seven or more women can organize a Chapter anywhere in North Carolina by applying for a charter through the State headquarters, only white

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women being eligible to membership. Those women entitled to membership are the widows, wives, mothers, sisters, nieces and lineal descendants of such men as served honorably in the Confederate Army, navy, or civil service, or of those men, unfit for active duty, who loyally gave aid to the cause; also women and their lineal descendants, wherever living, who can give proof of personal service and loyal aid to the Southern cause during the war. All application blanks must be signed by one or more veterans who know the elegibility of the applicant.

Sec. 2. A member in good standing of any Chapter, desiring to change her membership shall be entitled to receive from her Chapter a demit, certifying that she is a member in good standing which, if presented within six months, shall make good her membership in any Chapter to which she may be acceptable. Said demit must be sent to State Registrar immediately on admission of member into a Chapter.

Sec. 3. A Daughter can belong to two or more Chapters if she desires, by paying dues in all, but she can only vote in one Chapter.

Sec. 4. A U. D. C. engraved certificate must be awarded by all Chapters to every member upon their rolls, and to each new member as soon as admitted, and all charter members must order same with their charter.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers.

Section 1. The officers of the Division shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, Assistant Historian and Chaplain, to be elected annually on the second day of convention, said convention to convene on the second Wednesday of each succeeding October, unless for good reasons the president finds it necessary to change the date. In the election of officers, nominations shall be made from the floor, election by ballot, a majority shall elect. No person can nominate another for office unless she knows the nominee will serve if elected and is present at the Convention, except when she already holds office and is detained by sickness or other cause, to be decided by the executive committee. The term of office of the incumbents to expire on the day after the convention on which day said incumbents shall turn over to the newly elected officials all letters, papers, etc., pertaining to the business of said office, A retiring Division President however shall represent the Division as its President at the General Conventon of the same year.

Sec. 2. Should a vacancy occur in a State office for any cause whatever, the State president shall have the authority to fill the same.

Sec. 3. All Chapters must hold their annual election of officers at their November meetings, and the Recording Secretariès of the past year are required to at once notify the State Recording Secretary of the result of said elections.

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ARTICLE V.

Meetings.

Section 1. The Division shall meet annually, the second Wednesday in October at such place as the preceding convention shall designate. An annual meeting should be held by all the Chapters in the State on June 3rd, the birthday of Jefferson Davis, the only President of the Confederacy; January 19th, in honor of the birthdays of Generals Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson, the name to be known as Lee-Jackson Day, and Memorial Day, May 10th.

Sec. 2. Each Chapter, shall be entitled at all meetings of the State Division to one representative for the first seven members, and an additional vote for each additional twenty-five members. But representatives shall be based upon the per capita tax paid. No proxies shall be allowed Chapters.

Sec. 3. Each State officer and Chapter President shall be entitled to one vote in the Convention, when present, but no proxies allowed.

ARTICLE VI.

Fees, Dues, Etc.

Section 1. A fee of \$5.00 shall be charged each Chapter for its charter, \$3.00 for General and \$2.00 for State fee, and 100 blanks; 50 cents shall be charged for each additional 100 blanks.

Sec. 2. Upon organization and before each succeeding March 1 each Chapter shall pay into the treasury of the State Division 15 cents for State and 10 cents for general tax for every member who may at such a date be in good standing on its rolls. All new members received into the Chapters between January 1st and October 1st, must pay their per capita tax by the latter date or they will not be entitled to be counted in the Convention.

Sec. 3. The seal of the State Division shall be the same as that of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, with the addition of the name of the State on the outer rim.

Sec. 4. The badge to be worn by members of this Division shall be the same as set forth in the Constitution of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE VII.

Crosses of Honor.

Section 1. Each Chapter should see that all veterans in its vicinity be given an opportunity to obtain a Cross of Honor. Crosses can only be bestowed on four days: January 19th, Lee-Jackson Day; May 10th, Memorial Day; June 3rd, President Davis's birthday; and August 23rd, North Carolina's special day. The bestowal must take place according to the U. D. C. Cross of Honor rules, but after having complied with them, veterans can be given their crosses when-

ever they call for them or at annual reunions. In reporting to State Recorder, bestowal of crosses, only give one of four legal days.

ARTICLE VIII.

Children's Auxiliaries.

Section 1. All Chapters should endeavor to have under them a Children's Auxiliary, presided over by one of their members as Leader.

Sec. 2. Each child must fill application blank with same certificate as for a Daughter. When wishing to join a U. D. C. Chapter, the child's application blank must be copied verbatim with signatures of endorsers on a U. D. C. application blank and then presented to Chapter Credential Committee for their signatures, before being registered in Chapter and State. Same rules of eligibility are required in both cases, but Chapter initiation rules must apply to members of Children's Chapters, as well as other applicants. No transfers can be made without investigation where Chapter requires such.

Sec. 3. Children are required to pay no taxes. A record of their application must be kept by the Leader, but not sent to State Registrar. Leaders must also report monthly to mother Chapters and send yearly reports to State Convention. But their work and disposition of money made by them to be decided by the Leader and children.

Sec. 4. Each Leader of a Children's Chapter shall be entitled to one vote in our State Convention, regardless of the size of the Chapter, but no proxy allowed.

ABTICLE IX

Special Powers.

Section 1. This Division shall have the power to make and adopt such rules, regulations and by-laws as it may deem proper and expedient, provided each be not repugnant to the laws of North Carolina, or to the Constitution of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Sec. 2. This Division shall have power to establish Chapters in any county in the State, subject to rules and regulations of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE X.

U. D. C. Normal Scholarships.

Section 1. The scholarships of the Greensboro Normal and Industrial School are open only to descendants of Confederate Veterans, who are otherwise unable to attend college.

Sec. 2. All applicants must fill out a U. D. C. application blank showing eligibility, with signatures of Veteran endorsers, and nearest Chapter president, also forwarded with above, statements from

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reliable parties as to financial disability to otherwise attend college, and good moral character.

Sec. 3. All applicants for said scholarships must stand a competitive examination. Papers to be sent out by State president to some reliable party in applicants home town.

Sec. 4. Those securing these scholarships shall be entitled to hold same for four years, if reports are satisfactory to State President and president of the college.

Sec. 5. All applications for U. D. C. Scholarships must be in the hands of Division President or Chairman Educational Committee not later than May first of each year.

ARTICLE XI.

Constitution.

This Constitution may be changed or amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegate representation in regular session assembled, and after notification of at least thirty days before the meeting at which amendment is to be made.

BY-LAWS.

No. 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, announce the business before the Division; state and put all questions; preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order. She shall have the general supervision of the Division; appoint all committees, and approve all orders drawn on the treasury for payment of money. She shall call special meetings of the Division at the request of the Chapters.

No. 2. The Vice-President shall assist the President in her work, and in Convention in the absence of the President, the senior Vice-President shall act as President and discharge the duties of that office.

No. 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate report of the meeting of the State Division, shall notify all Chapters of contemplated changes in the Constitution thirty days before the Convention, and shall keep a roll of the Chapters of the Division, the dates of their organization, and the addresses of their officers.

No. 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence, file all letters of importance, and keep an accurate note of all letters written by her for the Division. She shall notify all committees of their appointment and shall furnish the names of all to their respective chairman.

No. 5. The Treasurer shall collect all State dues, and disburse the same, under orders of the President, for the current expenses of the Division. She shall give receipts to treasurers of Chapters for the annual assessment received from them, and shall send her report with her books to the Auditing Committee, so as to be in their hands first day of Annual Convention.

No. 6. An Auditing Committee, composed of three members, shall audit the books of the Treasurer the first day of Annual Convention and make report of same.

No. 7. The Registrar shall keep a register of the names of all members of the Chapters, and the date of their admission to membership. The Recording Secretaries of the various Chapters shall send to her from time to time the applications for membership which they have received. The Registrar shall record these and return to Chapter presidents.

No. 8. The Committee on Credentials, before allowing Chapter votes, shall confer with Treasurer and Registrar in order to make the number of votes consistent with the reports of those officers according to the per capita tax paid in each Chapter; and it shall be the duty of each Chapter President to send to the State Registrar just before the meeting of the Convention, a revised list of members of her Chapter indicating losses by death or removal.

No. 9. The Historian shall collect all records and incidents connected with the Confederacy and our glorious Southern valor and especially the part taken by North Carolina and by the women of the State, as well in self sacrifice and in untiring effort after the war, in the re-construction of the South, as in perfect endurance of hardship and patriotic devotion during the struggle, and shall safely keep and preserve the same. She shall have custody of all historical papers and shall claim the co-operation of all the historians of the various Chapters of the State.

No. 10. That all printing, of whatever kind to be done for State officers or chairmen of committees must be sent to the Recording Secretary, and by her forwarded, with price of same, to the President, who will decide if work is necessary, and approve before printing is done.

No. 11. That fifty votes shall constitute a quorum of the Convention of the North Carolina Division.

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RULES FOR BESTOWAL OF CROSSES OF HONOR

RULE 1.

Section 1. Each State and Territorial Division shall elect, or appoint a Recorder of Crosses of Honor, to whom Chapters shall apply for blank certificates of eligibility to be filled out by the veterans, and blank forms for alphabetical lists, to be filled out with data from the certificates, by the President of the Chapter ordering Crosses. When so filled out these shall be sent to the Recorder of said division, for approval or correction, and forwarded by her to the Custodian of Crosses, who will forward the Crosses to the Chapter, provided the rules have been complied with, and the decision of the Custodian shall be final.

The Recorders shall apply to the Custodian of Cross of Honor U. D. C., for the blank forms of certificates, and blank forms of alphabetical lists, supplying these, on demand, to the Chapters, accompanied by an order to the Custodian, signed by the President General and Recording Secretary General, U. D. C.

Section 2. The oldest living lineal descendants of Veteran, who has not received a Cross, may secure it in any county. Both Veterans and descendants can receive Crosses on some historical day.

If there is no lineal descendant of Veteran, or, in case that the oldest lineal descendant does not desire the Cross, the widow of a Veteran may receive the Cross by presenting with her application written avowal of such descendant, that he or she waives the right to the Cross, provided said widow be a Confederate woman, who has endured the hardships and privations of the period from "Sixty one to Sixty five."

No descendant, or widow can receive a second Cross, such privilege being granted to Veterans alone, nor can such descendant or widow wear the Cross.

The Custodian General will supply to the recorder of Cross of Honor of such State and Territorial division, special blank forms of certificates for descendants and widows, which must be filled with data of eligibility, such blank forms in use should conform with the headings used in the Record Book of the Custodian General.

Section 3. After waiting one month, Chapters shall send to the Division Recorder and Custodian, names of Veterans for whom Crosses have been received and not claimed, and these Crosses, if not engraved, may be used at the next bestowal, provided, other certificates in due form have been sent to the Custodian.

UNITED DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY.

RULE 2.

Section 1. No Crosses will be furnished by the Custodian unless the order is accompanied by certificates of eligibility, properly filled out, by the veterans, and certified to by two, or more members of a camp of United Confederate Veterans, and alphabetical list from Chapter president.

Section 2. Presidents of Chapters shall fill out blank alphabetical lists from the certificates with all data contained therein to forward with certificates to their State Recorder of Cross of Honor with money order, for the number of Crosses desired,

The Custodian of Cross of Honor shall keep a book, or books, in which shall be kept alphabetically arranged, the names and data of all veterans, descendants of veterans, and widows to whom Crosses have been issued.

Section 3. The certificates shall be returned by the Custodian to the President of Chapters who have ordered Crosses, and the same to be placed on file by the said Chapter, that data may be furnished when needed for historical, or other purposes.

Section 4. Each Chapter shall keep a book, alphabetically arranged, in which is recorded the name and service of every veteran and ancestor or descendant, and widow, of a veteran who receives a Each State or Territorial Recorder shall keep a similar Cross. record book of all Crosses issued.

RULE 3.

Section 1. Crosses may be granted by the muster roll of the nearest camp, U. C. V., and to Confederate veterans who are not members of a camp, who can give the required proof of eligibility. attested by two veterans who are members of a camp.

Section 2. The oldest living lineal descendant may secure the Cross, by giving the same proof of eligibility as that required of his veteran ancestor—and Confederate widows of veterans, applying for Cross, must fill blank form of certificate, giving service of veteran, whose widow she is—such widows must have endured the hardships of the war period from 1861 to 1865.

Section 3. Upon the certificate of a reputable physician that a veteran is dying, if desired, he may receive the Cross immediately.

RULE 4.

Section 1. The Crosses may be bestowed on Memorial or Decoration Day, selected by each State or Territorial Division, U. D. C.; the birthdays of President Jefferson Davis and General Robert E. Lee-June 3rd and January 19th; and one commemorative day, between July 1st and January 19th, to be selected by each State or Territorial Division, in convention assembled. North Carolina has selected August 23. The presentation shall be accompanied with such ceremonies as will give proper dignity to the occasion.

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RULE 5.

Section 1. A veteran, in good standing having lost his Cross, may have it replaced once only, by applying to the President of the Chapter from which he received the Cross, and he must furnish copy of the certificate upon which the Cross was first bestowed. If a second Cross is lost, a certificate may be given, in testimony that such veteran has been awarded a Cross.

Section 2. Chapter Presidents are urged to advise veterans to have their names engraved on the bar of Cross, for the purpose of identification if lost.

Section 3. A veteran having been awarded a Cross, and dying before it is received, the President of the Chapter bestowing it may give it to the oldest lineal descendant, or widow, under provisions of Rule 1, Section 2. A veteran having received a Cross, may bequeath it to any lineal descendant that he may select.

Section 4. On, and after November 1st, 1912, no more Crosses shall be issued.

RULE 6.

The Cross cannot be worn, in any case, or on any occasion, except by the Veteran upon whom it was bestowed—no descendant or widow can wear it.

RULE 7.

Section 1. Where counties have no local organization of U. D. C., a veteran may receive the Cross through the President of the nearest local Chapter, as the President of Chapter in the county from which he entered the Confederate service if so desired.

Section 2. When Chapters are not able to bear the expense of purchasing Crosses for other counties than their own, these may be furnished at the expense of the general association, upon the authority of the President General U. D. C.

RULE 8.

All orders for Crosses shall be filed in the Custodian's office three weeks before the day intended for bestowal.

RULE 9.

Any Chapter departing from these rules will not be entitled to Crosses for presentation.

Preceding the presentation of the Crosses, Rules V., VI., VII., VII., and IX., shall be read upon every occasion of the bestowal.

The President of each Chapter shall see that the camps of Confederate Veterans and Sons of Confederate Veterans in her county shall receive a copy of these rules for continual reference.

(Note: Cost of Crosses, 12 1-2 cents each, for an order of more than one. For an order of only one, the cost is 13 cents.)



The President's report was read. Seconded and accepted.

ADDRESS OF MRS. MARSHALL WILLIAMS,

President of North Carolina Division, U. D. C.

Daughters of North Carolina, I greet you in this our seventeenth annual convention in a new capacity, standing at the helm of ship trying to guide into untried waters. The captain is powerless without his crew, therefore I ask your consideration, your helpfulness and your indulgence for mistakes. The head of each department has felt her responsibility and aided in making this a splendid report. We announce a large increase in membership and four new chapters. Trenton Chapter organized May 5th, Mrs. Lizzie Newell, president: Onslow Guards Chapter of Jacksonville, organized May 17th, Mrs. Murrill, president; The Ashley Horne Chapter of Clayton, re-organized July 17th, Mrs. Herbert McCullers, president; China Grove Chapter, organized September 22nd, Mrs. W. G. Swink, president. Our able State Director of Children's Chapters, Mrs. Gordon Finger of Charlotte, reports six new chapters and will give their names and leaders in her report. The Orran Randolph Smith Children's Chapter, Henderson, Mrs. G. A. Rose leader, raised a fund of \$211.00 for the Veterans of the Henry L. Wyatt Camp to attend the reunion at Gettysburg. We are proud to record such substantial patriotism. Realizing the great trust you had placed in her hands and knowing there is wisdom in a multitude of council, your President invited the full membership of the Executive Board to be her guests in Faison, December 4th, to discuss the work and plan for the coming year.

Last November the Division received invitations for the convention of 1913 from Tarboro and Raleigh. The Executive Board appreciated highly both invitation. Tarboro's came first and we accepted that most gratefully.

We examined the bids for the minutes and placed the publication with Nash Bros of Goldsboro. Mrs. E. C. Chambers' suggestion to tabulate the reports helped to reduce the cost of minutes.

We discussed plans for grouping the Chapters for District meetings. Your President appointed sixteen directors to preside over these meetings and selected the date, April 26th, in honor of the birthday of Mrs. William Parsley of Wilmington, the founder of North Carolina U. D. C. work. During this convention the Directors will meet and discuss changes in the grouping of the chapters. Not knowing the railroad facilities we realize the grouping can be improved, I would suggest hereafter the Hostess Chapter select the date for the district meeting and that the ratio of attendance for the delegates be increased. These meetings have resulted in great good as both newspaper accounts and telegrams assured your President.

Your President has signed and sent out three hundred and seventy-six certificates, also sent demits and badge permits. Please remember each member is required to have a Certificate, 15 cents each.

Our educational work has progressed under the leadership of Mrs. Eugene Little. We now have fifteen scholarships, valued at fourteen hundred dollars. Now Daughters, we come to a serious problem, our educational fund; many reminders had to be sent the Chapters for the money due the Greensboro Normal College for the three girls we are educating there. This continual drain on the Chapters has forced your President to this solution, that we establish a Loan Educational Fund, designed to advance money to the sons and daughters of Veterans for securing vocational education.

Daughters, we have glorious news for you, the gift of a Woman's Confederate Home from our beloved State to be erected at Fayetteville, annuial maintenance \$5,000. We congratulate Mrs. Hunter G. Smith, the author of this movement. Her zeal and energy richly merited this reward. Too much praise cannot be given the Hon. T. T. Thorne of Rocky Mount for successfully introducing this bill.

The Division rejoices in the completion of the "Boy Soldiers" monument erected on the campus of the University, June 2nd. Your President assisted in the unveiling, this labor of love was begun five years ago by Mrs. James Keenan as chairman, and later continued by Mrs. Henry A. London. The monument is beautiful and points out daily two great lessons, patriotism and duty. The monument cost \$7,500 and the Daughters, were greatly aided by the Alumni of the University. Brevard: owns a handsome Chapter House, setting an example worthy of emulation.

The Chapters of Gastonia and Winton have erected monuments. The Burgaw monument is ready for erection. The Mount Olive Chapter has given an order for a handsome Memorial Drinking Fountain. Now that the monument at Chapel Hill is nearly finished, let us put our energy on the erection of the monument at Gettysburg, which will tell the story of North Carolina's glory.

Last year we presented to Captain O. R. Smith a Confederate watch charm. A committee was appointed to collect funds for the payment of same. Mrs. Morris O'Neil of Henderson reported \$8.00. The balance was paid by the Division. This token of esteem reached this gallant, Confederate soldier shortly before his death.

Last year Mrs. Archbell, editor of the Carolina and Southern Cross, asked and received the endorsement of your Division. She has given a most excellent monthly magazine full of historical research, and this publication can be of great service to our cause. The Chapters can report their work through this medium much to the advantage of each other. Unless this publication receives your financial support Mrs. Archbell says it will have to be discontinued.

Our contributions to Arlington and Shiloh monuments speak well for our State Directors, Mrs. I. W. Faison of Charlotte and Mrs. F. M. Williams of Newton. These ladies have brought signal honors to their State. Mrs. I. W. Faison was elected 'hird Vice-President General of the U. D. C. in Washington. As n'any of you know Mrs. F. M. Williams has the great honor of being chairman of the Revision of the General Constitution. Again was North Carolina complimented by the appointment of Miss Jessica Smith on the Transportation Committee by the President General. The President General has complimented our Recording Secretary, Mrs. T. W. Thrash, on her Roster report, saying it was the best from all the States.

The Weldon Chapter has come into possession of an historical cemetery where a hundred and fifty Confederate soldiers lie in unmarked graves and would like aid from the Division in the care of this sacred spot.

Your President has received many invitations to visit Chapters, was also invited by Mrs. Cotton to the Federation of Women's Clubs in New Bern, where she extended greetings from the Division. Your President was invited by Miss Easdale Shaw to address the King's Circle which met in Wilmington. Your President made two visits to the Soldier's Home and tried to speak words of cheer. While in Raleigh was the guest of Mrs. William J. Andrews, who tendered a reception to your President to meet the Johnson-Pettigrew Chapter. Mrs. W. J. Andrews of Raleigh, N. C., and her sister, Mrs. W. P. Trimble, of Seattle, Washington State, have given three thousand dollars to the Solid South Room Confederate Museum, Richmond; \$1,000 to place a tablet to the memory of their mother, Mrs. Francis Ford, of Kentucky: \$2,000 goes to the Endowment Fund for this room. We are proud this gift is shared by an adopted daughter of North Carolina, whose broad philanthrophy is well known in the State. Your President has attended four meetings of the Directors of the Confederate Women's home, and was at the first meeting in Rocky Mount.

During the year your President has visited the following Chapters: Wilmington, Goldsboro, Kinston, Raleigh, Dunn, and Clinton, on each occasion was the recipient of many courtesies.

Now Daughters, your President feels that her report has been long and there are some subjects not touched on for want of time and space. However, she cannot close without expressing her appreciation of the valuable work done this year by our Historian, Miss Carrie Leazar.

Allow me to thank you collectively and individually for your able assistance, and for your patience.

Madame President and Daughters:-

For the third time I come to report my work of the year past: 343 applications registered; 16 demits, 4 of these coming to us from other Divisions.

I have written 227 letters and 29 postal cards. According to my books, we have now a membership numbering 4644 in this Division, but I am far from sure that this is accurate.

I have succeeded in bringing "order out of chaos" with some of the Chapters, and their rosters now agree perfectly with the State books.

But alas! these are not many. Some chapters have begun the good work, but not completed it, while many have made no effort at all to straighten out their records.

Out of our large number of Chapters only about 15 have sent in any lists this fall, and not more than six have sent in any list of their dead, transferred, married or withdrawn. Can you not understand that a Registrar cannot possibly keep accurate records unless the Chapter officials send in their statements at least once a year?

I trust that they may awake to the importance of this and pay more attention to it, there by making lighter the task of my successor.

I hope that she may find as much pleasure in the work as I have done.

Recorder of Crosses report read and accepted.

REPORT OF RECORDER OF CROSSES OF HONOR.

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy:

During the year I have awarded 451 crosses. Of this number, 12 were to widows and 63 to descendants. Eighteen crosses were refused, four because applicants service was civil and not military or naval; the other fourteen were made by nieces, nephews, or sisters, none of whom are eligible.

I have on hand about 50 applications that came in too late for bestowal August 23rd; these will be sent off for January 19th, 1914. If the Chapters officers would just remember that the Recorder has to get the applications to the Custodian three weeks before the day of presentation, a great deal of disappointment would be prevented by having Mrs. Raines refuse to fill late orders. Her work is so great she has to adhere to the rules. I have found Mrs. Raines considerate but strictly business, and we in turn must be likewise.

The expense of the office could have been halved if rules had been followed. Mrs. Raines refuses stamps for over one cross; this year I had twelve orders in which stamps were sent for a large number of crosses. I had to go to the postoffice and get money orders before I could forward the application. Twelve were to be sent payable to me, these had to be cashed and new orders made out to Mrs. Raines; six inclosed the stamp money for forwarding, with Mrs. Raines' order and I had to furnish the stamps. Many made no allowance for forwarding, and several sent application blanks but nothing else. All these things increased the expenses of the office three fold.

Interest in the work has continued. Forty-three Chapters have presented crosses; and 70 orders were sent off. While the number of crosses presented is only one-third of last year, we can all see what a calamity it willd have been if no crosses were given this year. When the New Orleans convention meets and the constitution is revised we should strive to see that the books are not closed so long as there is one veteran who desires a cross.

REPORT ON MEMORIAL GATE TO CONFEDERATE CEME-TERY.

Raleigh, N. C., October 7, 1913.

Madam President and Daughters of the Confederacy of North Carolina:

As all the older members of this organization are well aware of the steps taken to erect a suitable Memorial Arch or Memorial Gateway to the Confederate Cemetery in Raleigh, it would seem superfluous to repeat from year to year the oft told story, but there being many new additions to the membership it is due them and to the object we have in view to re-iterate a general outline of the progress made since 1904. (See minutes 1904, page 54.)

In the year 1904 a resolution was passed to erect a stone gateway at the Soldiers' Home in Raleigh, etc.

A committee was appointed to formulate plans towards erecting a Memorial Gate or Arch. It was found on investigation that it would not be feasible to erect a gateway at the Soldiers' Home as that property would eventually pass from the present ownership and our Memorial Gate would cease to have any significance. In view of this the Chairman made a suggestion at the meeting of 1905 to place such memorial at the entrance to the Confederate Cemetery in Raleigh in which lie the remains of our one thousand soldiers, representing every State of the Southern Confederacy.

It was moved that and passed that the Chapters raise twenty dollars each for the purpose. The committee was to submit plans for consideration at the next meeting. In 1905 and 1906 the treasurer reported \$200, as having been received. The Chapters were responding quite as favorably as one could expect, considering the many other objects needing their aid and attention.

In 1907, the treasurer reported \$816 as received up to November 1908. Since that time the fund has grown very slowly---many Chapters no doubt supposed that a sufficiency had been raised since the President in her report in 1908, failed to emphasize the Memorial Arch as a State work and one of prime importance, but your Chairman did consider it quite as important as Shiloh, Arlington and the Wirz Monuments. (Minutes 1908, page 15-16.)

At the annual meeting 1910 at Rocky Mount the Treasurer reported that the amount then in the Treasury was about \$900.00, and was bearing interest. At the next annual meeting at Winston-Salem in 1911, the Treasurer reported \$1,048.77.

The present Treasurer, Miss Etheredge, writes me that she has \$1,121.78 in the Savings Bank and that she has received \$18.00 from Murfreesboro. The above increase 18 due to a great extent to the care of our efficient Treasurer, who has invested the funds wisely.

Madam President you will recall the action taken by the Chairman of the Memorial Arch Committee at the annual meeting of 1912—in appointing several sub-committees to aid in the collection of the amount which the convention had stipulated that each convention might give. By reference to the minutes I found that about 45 Chapters had paid in the quoto of \$20.00 each—leaving about 43 Chapters to be heard from. The following ladies were requested to act for the Chairman on the subcommittee:

Mrs. M. O. Winstead, Rocky Mount; Mrs. Wm. Bryan, New Bern; Miss Margaret Etheredge, Selma; Mrs. O. M. Royster, Hickory; Mrs. T. J. Woolridge, Asheville; Mrs. B. N. Mann, Durham.

A list of the 43 Chapters yet to be heard from was made out and divided between the six ladies of the sub-committee, with the request that they aid the Chairman in securing the quoto due so far as possible, and we hope that we will hear a favorable report at this meeting.

Your Chairman is now cheered with a new hope, in the form of a larger bequest from the Oakwood Cemetery Association. At an informal meeting on September 30, your Chairman proposed that they duplicate every dollar raised by the N. C. U. D. C. The proposition could not be acted on until the regular meeting, but we have every reason to believe that it will meet with favorable response.

Approved and accepted.

Motion that small Chapters that are unable to raise funds can secure aid from the County.

Seconded and carried.

Motion made by Mrs. M. O. Winstead.

"That the N. C. Division of the U. D. C. have the President, Mrs. Marshall Williams, paint the portrait of Col. Ashley Horne to be placed in the Hall of History.

Motion seconded and carried.

Report of the Educational Committee read and accepted.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE.

Madam President and Ladies of this Convention:

Our Educational work has done fairly well since last report, though a number of Chapters failed to contribute to this most worthy cause and our Treasurer has had to borrow from other funds to make final payments to Dr. Foust. Our committee divided up the Chapters and wrote to all and I do trust that the coming year each and every Chapter will remember this important work and give early and liberally. We have now 15 scholarships, one having been most kindly given by King's Business College, Charlotte or Raleigh, the full stenographic or business course to a lady; 50 per cent. of same to a man. I have a young lady applicant, who, I hope will soon go to Charlotte. Our tuition scholarship at Oxford, and one for Music at Davenport are still unused, though I made diligent efforts to fill them. The Presidents of State University and A. & M. report out scholarship there as worthily filled, and our girls at the State Normal are a credit to any school. Our 15 scholarships are worth in money \$1,350.00, in other ways there is no reckoning the good they are doing.

SUGGESTIONS FOR COMMITTEE.

1. After careful consideration from every point of view, the committee decides to have the educational fund as it is for the present. We, however, recommend that the President appoint a committee to consider the subject of establishing a loan fund to report to the next convention.

CARRIED.

2. Last year the Division ordered printed an account of the organization of the Division and the minutes of the first and second conventions. Mrs. F. M. Williams has printed these minutes, price 25 cents per copy. The cost to the Division is \$25.00. We hope the Daughters will purchase these minutes and relieve the Division of the debt. I would suggest that a committee be appointed to sell these minutes and turn the funds over to the State Treasurer.

APPROVED.

3. That special resolutions of appreciation be sent to the Hon, T. T. Thorn of Rocky Mount, the Hon, A. D. McGill of Fayetteville, and the Hon. L. B. Davis of Beaufort for their untiring zeal in bringing about the erection of the Confederate Woman's Home. That a committee be appointed to draw up said resolutions.

APPROVED.

4. That special resolutions of thanks be sent to the Hon.

Ashley Horne of Clayton, Colonel James A. Bryan of New Bern, Captain White of Oxford, Hon. Haywood Parker of Asheville, and Hon. J. A. Turner of Louisburg, Mr. Watkins, Concord, Dr. Bahmson, Winston-Salem, for the time and thought they have spent on the selection of the site for the Confederate Woman's Home and for the beautiful design they selected. the Salisbury Convention early in April, I wrote to every Chapter asking that I be notified by July first how many copies of the minutes of the First and Second Conventions would be wanted. REPORT OF CONFEDERATE WOMAN'S HOME.

Madam President and Daughters:

It is with deepest regret that I am unable to meet with you and read my report, for I feel I have so much to say to you that I cannot write; but Providence has prevented me and I am in the hospital, but my heart and thoughts are with you.

I send you glad tidings of great joy that our four years' of labor has been crowned with success and in the near future, our fond hope will be realized in the erection at Fayetteville, of a Confederate Women's Home; a building that will stand for all ages as a comfort to the homeless. I wish I could thank each Daughter personally, who has responded so cheerfully and worked so faithfully for the erection of this Home and I feel this living monument to alleviate the sufferings, and provide comfort for those that remain of the followers of Lee and Jackson, will tower high in Glory to the credit of the women of North Carolina, and the General Assembly ϕ_{-} 1913 that made this Home possible.

"Inasmuch as ye did it unto the least of them, ye did it unto me."

I recommend that this body of women give a rising vote of thanks to the General Assembly of 1913 for the appropriation of \$10,000 for the erection of a Women's Confederate Home, and \$5,000 a year for the maintenance and that a telegram be sent the General Assembly, now in session in Raleign.

I urge that each Chapter send to our State Treasurer, as soon as possible, their pledge for the furnishing of this Home, so that there may be no delay in completing same and getting it ready for occupancy, as we already have a number of pathetic letters for admittance. I ask all Chapters, having those who wish admittance to the Confederate Home, to send in their names, so that they can be duly recorded. It is also greatly desired that all Chapters wishing to furnish a room, to be known as their Chapter Room, please send in their names at once.

I wish I could be present to eulogize the men of the former Board and present Board, that have worked so untiringly in our behalf, and which I shall refer to later.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

of the

UNITED DAUGHTERS OF THE CONFEDERACY,

(AS AMENDED AT THE TARBORO CONVENTION, 1913.)

CONSTITUTION.

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ARTICLE I.

The name of this organization shall be the North Carolina Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE II.

Object.

The object of this Association shall be benevolent, memorial, educational, historical and social. To accomplish these purposes it will seek:

1. To give assistance, when needed, to survivors of the war and those dependent upon them.

2. To honor the memory of those who fell in the service of the Confederate States, and to remember gratefully those survivors who have faithfully served and suffered, and remained loyal to the Confederate Cause.

3. To collect and preserve relics, objects and incidents of historic value, to record deeds of heroism of Southern men and women, and to unite with the Confederate veterans in the determination that the portion of American history relating to the late war shall be properly taught in the public schools of the State, and to use its influence towards this object in all private schools.

4. To bring into its organization the women throughout the State who are eligible to membership and loyal to the memories and principles of the Confederate cause.

ARTICLE III.

Membership.

Section 1. All Chapters, which are properly chartered in the State, thereby become members of this Division. Seven or more women can organize a Chapter anywhere in North Carolina by applying for a charter through the State headquarters, only white women being eligible to membership. Those women entitled to membership are the widows, wives, mothers, sisters, nieces, grandnieces, and lineal descendants of such men as served honorably in the Confederate Army, navy, or civil service, or of those men, unfit for active duty, who loyally gave aid to the cause; also women and their lineal descendants, wherever living, who can give proof of personal service and loyal aid to the Southern cause during the war. All application blanks must be signed by one or more veterans who know the eligibility of the applicant.

Sec. 2. A member in good standing of any Chapter, desiring to change her membership snall be entitled to receive from her Chapter a demit, certifying that she is a member in good standing—which, if presented within six months, shall make good her membership in any Chapter to which she may be acceptable. Said demit must be sent to State Registrar immediately on admissionof member into a Chapter.

Sec. 3. A Daughter can belong to two or more Chapters if she desires, by paying dues in all, but she can only vote in one Chapter.

Sec. 4. A. U. D. C. engraved certificate must be awarded by all Chapters to every member upon their rolls, and to each new member as soon as admitted, and all charter members must order same with their charter.

ARTICLE IV.

Officers.

The officers of the Division shall be Section 1. 9 President, three Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, and Chaplain, to be elected annually on the second day of convention. said convention to convene on the second Wednesday of each succeeding October, unless for good reasons the president finds it necessary to change the date. In the election of officers, nominations shall be made from the floor, election by ballot, a majority shall elect. No person can nominate another for office unless she knows the nominee will serve if elected and is present at the Convention, except when she already holds office and is detained by sickness or other cause, to be decided by the executive committee. The term of office of the incumbents to expire on the day after the convention on which day said incumbents shall turn over to the newly elected officials all letters, papers, etc., pertaining to the business of said office. A retiring Division President however shall represent the Division as its President at the General Conventon of the same year.

Sect. 2. A President shall not be eligible to hold office more than two years consecutively.

Sec. 3. All ex-Presidents shall have an inherent right to attend State conventions, and when present shall be entitled to an individual vote.

Sec. 4. Should a vacancy occur in a State office for any cause whatever, the State president shall have the authority to fill the same.

Sec. 5. All Chapters must hold their annual election of officers at their November meetings, and the Recording Secretaries of the past year are required to at once notify the State Recording Secretary of the result of said elections.

ARTICLE V.

Meetings.

Section 1. The Division shall meet annually, the second Wednesday in October at such place as the preceding convention shall designate. An annual meeting should be held by all the Chapters in the State on June 3rd, the birthday of Jefferson Davis, the only President of the Confederacy; January 19th in honor of the birthdays of Generals Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson, the name to be known as Lee-Jackson Day, and Memorial Day, May 10th.

Sec. 2. Each Chapter shall be entitled at all meetings of the State Division to one representative for the first seven members, and an additional vote for each additional twenty-five members. But representatives shall be based upon the per capita tax paid. No proxies shall be allowed Chapters.

Sec. 3. Each State officer and Chapter President shall be entitled to one vote in the Convention, when present, but no proxies allowed.

ARTICLE VI.

Fees, Dues, Etc.

Section 1. A fee of \$5.00 shall be charged each Chapter for its charter, \$3.00 for General and \$2.00 for State fee, and 100 blanks; 60 cents shall be charged for each additional 100 blanks.

Sec. 2. Upon organization and before each succeeding March 1 each Chapter shall pay into the Treasurer of the State Division 15 cents for State and 10 cents for general tax for every member who may at such a date be in good standing on its rolls. All new members received into the Chapters between January 1st and October 1st, must pay their per capita tax by the latter date or they will not be entitled to be counted in the Convention.

Sec. 3. The seal of the State Division shall be the same as

that of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, with the addition of the name of the State on the outer rim.

Sec. 4. The badge to be worn by members of this Division shall be the same as set forth in the Constitution of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE VII.

Crosses of Honor.

Section 1. Each Chapter should see that all veterans in its vicinity be given an opportunity to obtain a Cross of Honor. Crosses can only be bestowed on four days: January 19th, Lee-Jackson Day; May 10th, Memorial Day; June 3rd, President Davis's birthday; and August 23rd, North Carolina's special day. The bestowal must take place according to the U. D. C. Cross of Honor rules, but after having complied with them, veterans can be given their crosses whenever they call for them or at annual reunions. In reporting to State Recorder, bestowed of crosses, only give one of four legal days.

ARTICLE. VIII.

Children's Auxiliaries.

Section 1. All Chapters should endeavor to have under them a Children's Auxiliary, presided over by one of their members as Leader.

Sec. 2. Each child must fill application blank with same certificate as for a Daughter. When wishing to join a U. D. C. Chapter, the child's application blank must be copied verbatim with signatures of endorsers on a U. D. C. application blank and then presented to Chapter Credential Committee for their signatures, before being registered in Chapter and State. Same rules of eligibility are required in both cases, but Chapter initiation rules must apply to members of Children's Chapters, as well as other applicants. No transfers can be made without investigation where Chapter requires such.

Sec. 3. Children are required to pay no taxes. A record of their application must be kept by the Leader, but not sent to State Registrar. Leaders must also report monthly to mother Chapters and send yearly reports to State Convention. But their work and disposition of money made by them to be decided by the Leader and children.

Sec. 4. Each leader of a Children's Chapter shall be entitled to one vote in our State Convention regardless of the size of the Chapter, but no proxy allowed.

ARTICLE IX.

Special Powers.

Section 1. This Division shall have the power to make and adopt such rules, regulations and by-laws as it may deem proper and expedient, provided each be not repugnant to the laws of North Carolina, or to the Constitution of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Sec. 2. This Division shall have power to establish Chapters in any county in the State, subject to rules and regulations of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

ARTICLE X.

U. D. C. Normal Scholarships.

Section 1. The scholarships of the Greensboro Normal and Industrial School are open only to descendants of Confederate Veterans, who are otherwise unable to attend college.

Sec. 2. All applicants must fill out a U. D. C. application blank showing eligibility, with signatures of Veteran endorsers, and nearest Chapter president, also forwarded with above, statements from reliable parties as to financial disability to otherwise attend college, and good moral character.

Sec. 3. All applicants for said scholarships must stand a competitive examination. Papers to be sent out by State president to some reliable party in applicant's home town.

Sec. 4. Those securing these scholarships shall be entitled to hold same for four years, if reports are satisfactory to State President and president of the college.

Sec. 5. All applicants for U. D. C. Scholarships must be in the hands of Division President or Chairman Educational Committee not later than May first of each year.

ARTICLE XI.

Constitution.

'This Constitution may be changed or amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegate representation in regular session assembled, and after notification of at least thirty days before the meeting at which amendment is to be made.

BY-LAWS.

No. 1 The President shall preside at all meetings, announce the business before the Division; state and put all questions; preserve order and decorum, and decide all questions of order. She shall have the general supervision of the Division; appoint all committees, and approve all orders drawn on the treasury for payment of money. She shall call special meetings of the Division at the request of the Chapters.

No. 2. The Vice-President shall assist the President in her work, and in Convention in the absence of the President, the senior Vice-President shall act as President and discharge the duties of that office.

No. 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate report of the meeting of the State Division, shall notify all Chapters of contemplated changes in the Constitution thirty days before the Convention, and shall keep a roll of the Chapters of the Division, the dates of their organization, and the addresses of their officers.

No. 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence, file all letters of importance, and keep an accurate note of all letters written by her for the Division. She shall notify all committees of their appointment and shall furnish the names of all to their respective chairman.

No. 5. The Treasurer shall collect all State dues, and disburse the same, under orders of the President, for the current expenses of the Division. She shall give receipts to treasurers of Chapters for the annual assessment received from them, and shall send her report with her books to the Auditing Committee, so as to be in their hands first day of Annual Convention.

No. 6. The Books of the Treasurer shall be audited by a competent accountant a week before the opening of Convention.

No. 7. The Registrar shall keep a register of the names of all members of the Chapters, and the date of their admission to membership. The Recording Secretaries of the various Chapters shall send to her from time to time the applications for membership which they have received. The Registrar shall record these and return to Chapter presidents.

No. 8. The Committee on Credentials, before allowing Chapter votes, shall confer with Treasurer and Registrar in order to make the number of votes consistent with the reports of those officers according to the per capita tax paid in each Chapter; and it shall be the duty of each Chapter President to send to the State Registrar just before the meeting of the Convention, a revised list of mmebers of her Chapter indicating losses by death or removal.

No. 9. The Historian shall collect all records and incidents connected with the Confederacy and our glorious Southern valor and especially the part taken by North Carolina and by the women of the State, as well in self sacrifice and in untiring effort after the war, in the re-construction of the South, as in perfect endurance of hardship and patriotic devotion during the struggle, and shall safely keep and preserve the same. She shall have custody of all historical papers and shall claim the co-operation of all the historians of the various Chapters of the State.

No. 10. That all printing, of whatever kind to be done for State officers or chairmen of committees must be sent to the Recording Secretary, and by her forwarded, with price of same, to the President, who will decide if work is necessary, and approve before printing is done.

No. 11. That fifty votes shall constitute a quorum of the Convention of the North Carolina Division.

RULES FOR BESTOWAL OF CROSSES OF HONOR

RULE 1.

Section 1. Each State and Territorial Division shall elect, or appoint a Recorder of Crosses of Honor, to whom Chapters shall apply for blank certificates of eligizility to be filled out by the veterans, and blank forms for alphabetical lists, to be filled out with data from the certificates, by the President of the Chapter ordering Crosses. When so filled out these shall be sent to the Recorder of said division, for approval or correction, and forwarded by her to the Custodian of Crosses, who will forward the Crosses to the Chapter, provided the rules have been complied with, and the decision of the Custodian shall be final.

The Recorders shall apply to the Custodian of Cross of Honor, U. D. C., for the blank forms of certificates, and blank forms of alphabetical lists, supplying these, on demand, to the Chapters, accompanied by an order to the Custodian, signed by the President General and Recording Secretary General, U. D. C.

Section 2. The oldest living lineal descendants of Veteran, who has not received a Cross, may secure it in any county. Both Veterans and descendants can receive Crosses on some historical day.

If there is no lineal descendant of Veteran, or, in case that the oldest lineal descendant does not desire the Cross, the widow of a Veteran may receive the Cross by presenting with her application written avowal of such descendant, that he or she waives the right to the Cross, provided said widow be a Confederate woman, who has endured the hardships and privations of the period from "Sixty-one to Sixty-five."

No descendant, or widow can receive a second Cross, such privilege being granted to Veterans alone, nor can such descendant or widow wear the Cross.

The Custodian General will supply to the Recorder of Cross of Honor of such State and Territorial division, special blank forms of certificates for descendants and widows, which must be filled with data of eligibility, such blank forms in use should conform with the headings used in the Record Book of the Custodian General.

Section 3. After waiting one month, Chapters shall send to the Division Recorder and Custodian, names of Veterans for whom Crosses have been received and not claimed, and these Crosses, if not engraved, may be used at the next bestowal, pro-

vided, other certificates in due form have been sent to the Custodian.

RULE 2.

Section. 1. No Crosses will be furnished by the Custodian unless the order is accompanied by certificates of eligibility, properly filled out, by the veterans, and certified to by two, or more members of a camp of United Confederate Veterans, and alphabetical list from Chapter president.

Section 2. President of Chapters shall fill out blank alphabetical lists from the certificates with all data contained therein to forward with certificate to their State Recorder, of Cross of Honor with money order, for the number of Crosses desired.

The Custodian of Cross of Honor shall keep a book, or books in which shall be kept alphabetically arranged, the names and data of all veterans, descendants of veterans, and widows to whom Crosses have been issued.

Section 3. The certificate shall be returned by the Custodian to the President of Chapters who have ordered Crosses, and the same to be placed on file by the said Chapter, that data may be furnished when needed for historical, or other purposes.

Section 4. Each Chapter shall keep a book, alphabetically arranged, in which is recorded the name and service of every veteran and ancestor or descendant, and widow, of a veteran who receives a Cross. Each State or Territorial Recorder shall keep a similar record book of all Crosses issued.

RULE 3.

Section 1. Crosses may be granted by the muster roll of the nearest camp, U. C. V., and to Confederate veterans who are not members of a camp, who can give the required proof of eligibility, attested by two veterans who are members of a camp.

Section 2. The oldest living lineal descendant may secure the Cross, by giving the same proof of eligibility as that required of his veteran ancestor—and Confederate widows of veterans, applying for Cross, must fill blank form of certificate, giving service of veteran, whose widow she is—such widows must have endured the hardships of the war period from 1861 to 1865.

Section 3. Upon the certificate of a reputable physician that a veteran is dying, if desired, he may receive the Cross immediately.

RULE 4.

Section 1. The Crosses may be bestowed on Memorial or Decoration Day, selected by each State or Territorial Division, U.

D. C.; the birthdays of President Jefferson Davis and General Robert E. Lee. Lee—June 3rd and January 19th; and one commemorative day, between July 1st and January 19th, to be selected by each State or Territorial Division, in convention assembled. North Carolina has selected August 23. The presentation shall be accompanied with such ceremonies as will give proper dignity to the occasion.

RULE 5.

Section 1. A veteran, in good standing having lost his Cross, may have it replaced once only, by applying to the President of the Chapter from which he received the Cross, and he must furnish copy of the certificate upon which the Cross was first bestowed. If a second Cross is lost, a certificate may be given, in testimony that such veteran has been awarded a Cross.

Section 2. Chapter Presidents are urged to advise veterans to have their names engraved on the bar of Cross, for the purpose of identification if lost.

Section 3. A veteran having been awarded a Cross, and dying before it is received, the President of the Chapter bestowing it may give it to the oldest lineal descendant, or widow, under provisions of Rule 1, Section 2. A veteran having received a Cross, may bequeath it to any lineal descendant that he may select.

Section 4. On, and after November 1st, 1912, no more Crosses shall be issued.

RULE 6.

The Cross cannot be worn, in any case, or on any occasion, except by the Veteran upon whom it was bestowed—no descendant or widow can wear it.

RULE 7.

Section 1. Where counties have no local organization of U. D. C., a veteran may receive the Cross through the President of the nearest local Chapter, as the President of Chapter in the county from which he entered the Confederate service is so desired.

Section 2. When Chapters are not able to bear the expense of purchasing Crosses for other counties than their own, these may be furnished at the expense of the general association, upon the authority of the President General U. D. C.

RULE 8.

All orders for Crosses shall be filed in the Custodian's office three weeks before the day intended for bestowal.

RULE 9.

Any Chapter departing from these rules will not be entitled to Crosses for presentation.

Preceding the presentation of the Crosses, Rules V., VI., VII., VIII., and IX., shall be read upon every occasion of the bestowal.

The President of each Chapter shall see that the camps of Confederate Veterans and Sons of Confederate Veterans in her county shall receive a copy of these rules for continual reference.

(Note: Cost of Crosses, 12 1-2 cents each, for an order of more than one. For an order of only one, the cost is 13 cents.)
