## MINUTES.

STATESVILLE, N. C., Tuesday, Oct. 23, 1906.

The Synod of North Carolina met in its ninety-third annual session on Tuesday, Oct. 23, 1906, at 11 o'clock a. m., in the First Presbyterian church, Statesville, N. C., and was opened with a sermon by the Rev. E. R. Leyburn, at the request of the retiring Moderator, Mr. Geo. W. Watts, on the text— "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good work, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them." Eph. 2:10.

After the sermon the Synod was called to order by the Moderator and was constituted with prayer by the Rev. R. Z. Johnston.

On motion the Rev. Dr. T. H. Law, Agent of the American Bible Society, was given the privileges of the floor and was heard in the interest of the Bible Cause. The address of Dr. Law was referred to the Permanent Committee on the Bible Cause.

On motion the Rev. Dr. J. R. Howerton was heard in the interest of the "Montreat Association."

It was ordered that Synod hear the Rev. Dr. S. L. Morris, Assembly's Secretary of Home Missions, this evening at 7:30 o'elock.

It was ordered that when the Synod adjourns to-night, it do so to meet to-morrow evening at 7:30 o'clock, in order to observe the Special Order taken at the last meeting of Synod to visit, on Wednesday, Davidson College, and also the Synod's Orphan's Home at Barium Springs.

An invitation was received from Rev. Dr. J. A. Scott, President of the Statesville Female College, to attend a reception at the College on Thursday eveningat 9 o'clock. The invitation was accepted, with thanks.

The Synod then took recess until 7:30 o'clock p. m.

### FIRST DAY-EVENING SESSION.

STATESVILLE, N. C., Oct, 23, 1906.

The Synod met at 7:30 o'clock p. m., together with a large congregation, and observed the order to hold a Popular Meeting in the interest of the Assembly's Home Missions. The devotional exercises were conducted by the Synod's Chairman, the Rev. J. R. Howerton, D. D., who made a verbal report and introduced the Rev. S. L. Morris, D. D., the Assembly's Secretary of Home Missions, who was heard in the interest of this great cause.

At the close of Dr. Morris' address, the Rev. W. W. Moore, D. D., of the Synod of Va., and the President of Union Theological Seminary, was invited to sit as a Corresponding Member and introduced to Synod, and on motion Dr. Moore was heard in the interest of Union Theological Seminary.

On motion the address of Dr. Moore was referred to the Standing Committe on Union Theological Seminary.

On motion all the Standing Orders for this meeting of Synod were suspended, and the time for hearing all Special reports was referred to the Standing Committee on Special Order.

The Synod then adjourned with prayer to meet to-morrow evening at 7:30 o'clock.

## SECOND DAY—EVENING SESSION.

#### STATESVILLE, N. C., Oct. 24, 1906

NOTE: The Synod spent this day at Barium Springs and at Davidson College. Special cars were provided for the trip. Appropriate exercises were held at each place. At the Home the children entertained the Synod with songs and recitations and by their bright and happy faces. A lunch was served in the Rumple Hall by the Presbyterian ladies of Statesville, and during luncheon \$1500, was raised to complete "Little Joe's Church." At Davidson College the welcome was most cordial and splendid and inspiring addresses were made in the Chapel by President Smith, Dr. Cornelson, Dr. Moore and Mr. Merchant of the Senior class. These exercises were followed by athletic class drills and a foot-ball contest by the students.—Clerk.

On returning to Statesville, the Synod met at 8 o'clock p. m., and observed the order for holding a popular meeting in the interest of Foreign Missions. The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. R. F. Campbell, D. D., Chairman of the Permanent Committees on Foreign Missions, who read the report of the Committee which was received. Pending the adoption of the report, Synod was addressed by the Rev. J. O. Reaves, Assembly's Co-Ordinate Secretary of Foreign Missions, and also by Mr. Cameron Johnston, a returned Missionary. The address of Mr. Johnston was illustrated with Stereoptican views in Japan and Korea, after which the report was adopted.--See Appendix.

The Standing Committee on Special Orders, Rev. C. G. Vardell, D. D., Chairman made a report which was adopted.

The Synod then adjourned with prayer by the Rev. Cornelius Miller until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

STATESVILLE, N. C. Thursday, Oct. 25, 1906.

The Synod met at 9 o'clock a. m., and devotional exercises were conducted by the Moderator.

The Minutes of the preceding Sessions were read and approved.

A verbal report was made by the Rev. Dr. J B. Shearer, for the Regents of the South Atlantic University, and on motion of Dr. Shearer it was ordered that we discontinue our connection with this movement.

The Rev. Frank Siler of the M. E. Church South, was invited to sit as a visiting brother and introduced to Synod.

The Judicial Committee reported that no business had come into their hands and asked to be discharged. The report was received and the Committee discharged.

The Ad-interim Committee on the Presbyterian Standard made a report which was referred to the Committee on Special Orders.

The Special Committee on the distribution of the gift of Mr. W. W. Fuller, one year ago, made the following report which was adopted:

The Committee shortly after adjournment of last Synod, by correspondence agreed to the distribution as follows, and the amounts were promptly forwarded to the several beneficiaries:

The Permanent Committee on Church and Christian Education, Rev. J. B. Shearer, D. D., Chairman, submitted their report which was read and placed upon the Docket.

The Rev. P. H. Gwynn offered the following resolution, which, after some discussion, was placed upon the Docket.

"The Synod of North Carolina having heard from reliable sources that an effort will be made in the next General Assembly of North Carolina to establish a reformatory for youthful criminals; and believing that such an institution is greatly needed by this commonwealth, and that it is in keeping with the Spirit of our Divine Master, would heartily express its approval of the contemplated effort to inaugurate measures to establish such an institution."

A communication from the "W. C. T. U." was received, read and referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

The Committee on Special Orders made a partial report which was approved.

The Ad-interim Committee on the Evangelistic and Biblical Institute made the following report which was approved:

The Committee appointed to hold an Evangelistic and Biblical Institute, reports, that it did not think it advisable to hold the same, during the last year and recommends the continuance of the Committee under former resolution.

WM. BLACK.

The Ad-interim Committee on Proposed Changes in our Form of Government, so as to make the Synod a court in regular gradation etc., made a report which was received and placed upon the Docket for consideration at the next meeting of Synod; and it was ordered that the report be printed in the Minutes and the church papers. The report is as follows:

The Committee on proposed changes in the Form of Government, having in view the making of the Synod a Court in regular gradation recommends the following:

The Synod of North Carolina hereby overtures the General Assembly to send down to the Presbyteries for their adoption the following changes in our Form of Government, to-wit: 1—Amend paragraph 67 by striking out words, "And the Synod," in next to the last line.

2—Amend paragraph 77 by substituting the word "Synod" in place of the words, "General Assembly," and the omission of the words "Or to the Assembly."

3-Amend paragraph 78 by omission of the words "And the General Assembly."

4—Amend paragraph St, so that it shall read as follows: "The Synod shall consist of commissioners chosen by the Presbyteries, in the following proportion, to-wit- Every Presbytery shall be entitled to elect five ministers and five ruling elders, but if it consists of more than twentyfour ministerial members, it shall elect five additional ministers and five additional ruling elders."

5—Amend paragraph 84 by inserting before the words "And finally" the following clause "To appoint commissioners to the General Assembly."

6—Amend paragraph 85, so that it shall read as follows: "It shall be the duty of the Synod to keep full and fair records of its proceedings, to submit them annually to the inspection of the General Assembly, to report to it every year the number of its Presbyteries and the members thereof, the condition and progress of religion within its bounds during the year, and all the important changes which have taken place—such as licensures, ordinations, the receiving or dismissing of members, the removal of members by death, the union and the division of the churches, and the formation of new ones."

7—Amend paragraph 87 so that it shall read: "The General Assembly shall meet at least annually, and shall consist of commissioners from the Synods chosen in the following proportion: Every Synod shall elect one minister and one ruling elder from each Presbytery within its bounds, and if any Presbytery consist of more than twenty-four ministerial members, the Synod shall elect an additional minister and ruling elder from said Presbytery."

S—Amend paragraph 88 by the substitution of the word "Synod" for the word "Presbytery" wherever the latter appears.

9—Amend paragraph 142, sections II and IH by adding to each section the words: "Provided that the action of the Presbyteries shall be reported to the Synod, and the Synod shall report the same to the General Assembly, and all recommendations and orders from the General Assembly to the Presbyteries shall be directed to the Synod, and by the Synod directed to the Presbyteries."

10—The Synod further overtures the General Assembly to make our ecclesiastical year, hereafter, co-incide with the calendar year, and that it recommend to the Lower Courts that their stated meetings be held as follows: "The Presbyteries in January and June, and the Synods in March."

The Rev. D. I. Craig, Chairman of the Ad-interim Committee to write a brief history of "The Rise and Progress of Synodical Home Missions in North Carolina," submitted a paper which was read in part, and on motion the reading was suspended until this afternoon.

The Synod took recess for five minutes, after which the order for the Synodical Communion was observed. The Rev. A. H. Moment, D. D., and the Rev. D. Clay Lilly, D. D., conducted the devotional exercises and presided at the table in the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

At the close of the Communion Service the Memorials of deceased brethren who have died since the last meeting of Synod were presented and read by those previously appointed to that duty by the Moderator. The names of the deceased are: Rev. Jethro Rumple, D. D., Rev. James Kelly, Rev. Archibald Currie, Rev. A. N. Ferguson and Rev. S. H. Spencer, and the Memorials are as follows in the order above named.

# REV. JETHRO RUMPLE, D. D.

The Rev. J. Rumple, D. D., was born in Cabarrus County, N. C., graduated at Davidson College in 1850, and at Columbia Theological Seminary in 1856. He was licensed by Concord Presbytery the same year, and served as Stated Supply of Providence and Sharon Churches from 1856 to 1860. In 1860 he became pastor of the Salisbury Church and continued in this relation until his death in 1906. At Red Springs, N. C., in the home of his daughter Mrs. C. G. Vardell, during the winter of the present year, after a decline of several months he passed away from earth in the 78th year of his age.

Brother Rumple was a strong man in every part of his nature. His physical manhood was unusually vigorous and well developed. His intellectual powers were active, well-balanced, and capable of sustained exertion. His moral nature manifested excellence in all the varied relations of life. His spiritual attributes uniting him with God and Divine realties, were plainly the graces wrought by the Holy Ghost. His gifts, his graces, and his rare capacity for work, caused him to be constantly employed after entering the Ministry for about half a century. As pastor and preacher, and presbyter, he was a zealous and faithful laborer. In the judicatories of the Church which he habitually attended, he was a wise counsellor and an active member. As a Trustee of Davidson College and of Union Theological Seminary for many years, he could always be depended on to perform efficiently any duty devolved upon him. As the first President of Barium Springs Orphans Home, he did more for founding and sustaining this institution than any member of our Synod. In his private and social relations, brother Rumple was a typical Christian gentleman, hospitable towards his brethren, considerate of the views and feelings of others, and genial in all his social intercourse. He had his personal and family sorrows, but they never led him to murmur at the orderings of Providence nor to become morose in disposition, nor to cease active work for the Master. Down to the last months of his life, he held official positions, and amid growing infirmities discharged his duties with conscientious fidelity. He died with the harness on, and dropped the oar of toil only to receive the crown of life. "The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance" and the name of Jethro Rumple shall be honored among us as long as virtue is cherished, and piety revered. H. G. HILL

## REV. JAMES KELLY.

Was born of Scotch parents near Carthage, Moore County, April 1st. 1832, and died in Clarkton, N. C., April, 19 1906. In early life he joined Union Church in his native county. He was prepared for College in the Carthage Academy. He entered our University and in June, 1860, graduated with high honors. He studied Hebrew while in College under Rev. J. B. Shearer then pastor of the Chapel Hill Church, now Dr. Shearer of Davidson College. He was the first President of the Y. M. C. A. on the Hill, the first organization by that name in the State. At the breaking out of the Civil War he enlisted in the army of Va., his health failing he was discharged and on his return home resumed his preparation for the Ministry. He was taken under the care of Presbytery as a Candidate for the Ministry in Fayetteville,

April 11, 1863, was licensed at Pike Church, New Hanover County now Pender County, Oct. 8, 1863, and was ordained at Mt. Horeb Church Nov. 18, 1865. On the 20th of Nov., 1868 in the eity of Wilmington when Synod erected the Presbytery of Wilmington he was one of its charter members. The most of his Ministerial life was spent in Bladen County. He served for many years in a joint pastorate, the churches of Mt. Horeb and Brown Marsh, now Clarkton church. He supplied other churches. White Plains was his last charge. His was a remarkable memory and what he learned he learned accurately. He taught school and was at one time Superintendent of Public Schools and was regarded as the best scholar in his county. Of varied information, genial and pleasant; to be in the circle of his friends was a real pleasure. Sometime after his licensure the writer asked him "Under whom did you study Theology?" With a smile he replied "Kelly and Company." And yet he had a very clear and comprehensive idea of our Doctrines and Polity. His weak voice was against him in the pulpit but this defect was largely compensated by the sympathy, tact and wisdom of the pastor for he certainly was a wise counsellor. About ten years before his death he was taken with rheumatism.-At times not able to feed himself. Afterwards he was stricken with paralysis and for nearly three years was helpless-A wonderful example of patience, never did a murmur or a complaint escape his life. Receiving his visitors with a smile he never made any allusion to his sufferings unless inquired about.

Brother Kelly was schooled in affliction, losing four brothers in the civil war and afterwards two little children. When nearing the end we gathered around his bedside and saw him quietly and gently pass from this into the unseen land. "Mark the perfect man and behold the upright for the end of that man is peace." On May 14, 1872, he was married to Miss Emma Cromartie. From this union came eight children, four sons and four daughters. Six are with the mother here and two are with the father and the Christ he loved so well to preach.

## **REV. ARCHIBALD CURRIE.**

Rev. Archibald Currie was born in Moore Counny, N. C., Oct. 15, 1817. His parents had moved to this country from Scotland. After receiving his preparatory training at the Donaldson Academy. he entered Union Theological Seminary at Hampden Sidney, Va., and graduated in 1843. He was licensed to preach by the Presbytery of Lafayette, Nov. 1, 1845, and ordained by Orange Presbytery, Aug. 30, 1846. He was installed pastor of Eno Church, and served as Stated Supply of Fairfield and Little River all in Orange County, N. C. This pastoral relation was dissolved Oct. 26, 1860, but he continued as Stated Supply at Eno until 1866. Meantime he had also supplied the Graham Church since 1856; and was installed as pastor there, June 3, 1866. This relation continued till April 25, 1878. In connection with this pastorate he also taught school, and many of the prominent citizens of Graham and Burlington were trained by him.

He taught again at Reidsville, N. C., 1880-'81, and supplied the Church of Speedwell. In 1882, he assumed charge of the Caldwell Institute in Orange County acting also as supply of the Fairfield Church. In 1885-86 he supplied the Wentworth, Leaksville and Madison group; and in 1887, Yanceyville and Bethesda.

From 1888 to 1893, Bro. Currie did such work as his strength permitted In Fayetteville Presbytery. He was dismissed to that body in 1889, but four years after was received back into his old Presbytery of Orange, and was made Chairman of Publication and Colportage. From that time he ceased from regular ministerial duties on account of failing voice and sight. He spent his closing years with his two daughters at Hampden Sidney, Va., where he peacefully passed away, June 17, 1906, in his S9th year.

Bro. Currie married Miss Mary Letitia Wharey of Hampden Sidney, Oct. 15, 1847. They had three sons and three daughters, of whom two daughters survive him, Mrs. Horace Lacy and Mrs. William H, Whiting.

The characteristics of this man of God were an immaculate neatness of person; a gentleness, simplicity and lovableness of disposition that endear his memory to his former Church members and pupils; sterling integrity of character and fervent piety. "He commanded his household after him, and they kept the way of the Lord;" and to the Gospel Ministry he gave one consecrated child, the Rev. James L. Currie a worthy son of a worthy father.

> "He was a poor parson - - - -, But rich he was of holy thought and work. He was also a learned man, a clerk, That Christes gospel truly wolde preach; His parish folk devoutely would he teach. Benign he was and wonder diligent, And in adversity full patient -This noble ensample unto his sheep he gave, And first he wrought, and after that he taught; A better priest I trow there nowhere is, He waited after no pomp nor reverence, Nor maked him no spiced conscience, But Christes love and his apostles twelve, He taught, but first he followed it himself." Dead July 26, 1906 in Laurinburg, N. C., Rev. A. N. Ferguson, in his 70th year.

He Was born in Moore County, N. C., of Scotch parents of earnest piety and early became a member of Union Church. He took his Literary course at Davidson, N. C., 1855 and '56 and at Chapel Hill 1859, and his Theological course at Columbia Seminary, S. C. He was licensed to preach by Fayetteville Presbytery at Pee Dee Church, October 2nd, 1862, and ordained at Antioch Church, April 1865. He was paster of Ben Salem Church from 1865 to 1870. And for several years he did faithful work as Stated Supply of Euphronia, Macedonia and Montpelier from time to time.

But his main life-work was as pastor of Laurel Hill, of which he took charge in 1871 in connection with Smyrna in 1873. To these churches he continued to minister until called Home.

About 1886 he took charge of a little flock composed of members from Smyrna and Ashpole which developed into a fairly strong Church—Midway in 1890 of this church he continued in charge, until on account of failing health to the great grief of this people, he resigned his position.

In 1895 on one wing of Laurel Hill Church he organized Aberdeen Church to which he ministered till the last.

Early in his Ministry in Laurel Hill his home, he married Miss Steward, by whom he had two daughters—Mrs. Wm. McLauren and Miss Elisa Ferguson. Subsequently he married a daughter of Major John McNeill, who was called up higher many years ago.

In the death of Bro. Ferguson the Synod of North Carolina and especially the Presbytery of Fayetteville, lost one of its most valuable members.

Humble and fair-minded, genial and obliging, free from censoriousness and envy and all undue desire for the advantage and honor of self, he had the confidence and kindlest regard of all his brethren. He was one, preeminently, that gained by being known intimately. The better he was known, the more he was loved.

As a preacher, he was always clear, earnest and Scriptural and he had a peculiar faculty of winning the good will of the hearer, whether saint or sinner, and arousing aspirations for a better life. His discourses were always carefully, (and doubtless too *very* prayerfully) prepared. And in delivery, while using his manuscript, he spoke so naturally, and with such fulness of his best thought and feelings, that one could hardly realize there was any manuscript there. As a pastor he had the confidence and love of his people during the many years of his ministry. He was always a comfort in the chamber of sickness and by the open grave, and he was always welcomed, both by the young and old, in the homes of his people. As a member of the church courts he could always be counted upon to do what was reasonable and right. Sanctified common sense pervaded his thoughts and acts. Never seeking to be prominent in these, or making his voice heard even, except where truth and right demanded it, yet his presence and approval secured many a wise and right decision in the Presbytery to which he belonged.

In connection with the objects of beneficence called for by our church courts, he was very faithful and successful in securing from his churches, year after year, liberal contributions.

Throughout his entire ministry, especially after he became pastor of Laurel Hill Church, he was often sought after to assist at protracted meetings, and especially to give several days of preaching in vacant churches. In such services he was always a blessing to the church and community, sometimes a very abundant one.

The secret, doubtless of his hallowed influence; wherever he went, was his profound humility, his consecration to his Masters work, and the spirit of prayerfulness that possessed him.

#### REV. S. H. SPENCER.

Samuel Henry Spencer was born March 11, 1843. He was born and raised in Chesterfield County, S. C., seven miles from Cheraw. He joined the Methodist Church before he was twenty, was soon made Steward in that church and was always an active and successful member.

He joined the Presbyterian Church in 1882 at Monroe, N. C., under Rev. R. A. Miller's pasorate.

He decided to study for the ministry. Mecklenburg Presbytery took him under its care. He took his Theological training at Union Seminary. On leaving the Seminary in 1884 and having been ordained, his first work was Swannanoa, N. C., where he staid two years. He was then six months, Stated Supply of Mecklenburg Church, Mecklenburg County, N. C. Then he was pastor of Humbolt, Shiloh and Brayl Churches, Tenn., for four years. He then preached three years at the churches of Bravl and Shiloh. Here his health failed for good.

He was wounded in the Confederate service. His hand caused him much pain for a time. He had consumption and other complication with a more weakening disease gradually wore his life away. He was married twice. His last wife being Miss Callie Hardin.

He leaves a son, a daughter and a wife, all consecrated members of the Presbyterian Church.

His last days were days of thanks to man and God for their kindness to him. His firm faith in the infalibility of God's Word and God was his subject of conversation at the close. He died June 19, 1906, and was buried at Morven, N. C.

THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

STATESVILLE, N. C., Thursday, Oct. 25, 1906.

The Synod met at 3 o'clock p. m., and resumed business.

The resolution offered by Rev. P. H. Gwynn concerning a Reformatory for youthful criminals was taken from the Docket and after some discussion was again placed upon the Docket.

The choice of place for the next meeting of Synod was taken up, and the Presbyterian Church at Hendersonville, N. C., was chosen as the place, and the time being fixed by Standing Rule for the fourth Tuesday in Oct., at 11 o'clock a. m., it was ordered that the hour be changed from 11 a. m. to 8 o'clock p. m.

The Rev. W. H. McMaster of the U. P. Church was invited to sit as a Corresponding Member and introduced to Synod.

The Report of the Permanent Committee on the Sabbath and Family Religion was submitted and read by the Chairman, Rev. W. D. Morton, D. D. The report was received and pending its adoption the Synod was addressed by the Rev. W. H. McMaster, a Secretary of the American Sabbath Union. The report with its recommendations was then adopted, and the address of the Rev. Mr. McMaster was referred to the Permanent Committee on the Sabbath to bring in a suitable response.

See the Report in the Appendix: The recommendations are as follows:

In view of these things your Committee makes the following recommendations:

I. That our pastors, elders and church workers earnestly press the elaims of the Sabbath on the hearts and consciences of the people. That they themselves be particular in observing the things they teach; that they especially refrain from the patronage of Sunday trains and mails, and that they nrge their people to the same self denial.

II. That they encourage marriage and the home life as a more religious and blessed estate than the single life in hotels and boarding houses. That they emphasize also the great gain of family religion in the formation of character and the preservation of our Christian civilization.

The Rev. J. E. Snedecor of the Synod of Ala., the Rev. J. O. Reavis of the Synod of Texas and the Rev. W. W. Morrison of the Synod of Tenn., were invited to sit as Corresponding Members; and the Rev. W. A. Leutz of the Lutheran Church and the Rev. J. F. Mitchener of the Baptist Church were invited to sit as Visiting brethren, and all were introduced to Synod.

On motion the Presbytery of Concord was authorized to meet at the call of the Moderator.

The Synod then took recess until 7:30 o'clock p. m.

### THIRD DAY-EVENING SESSION.

## STATESVILLE, N. C., Thursday, Oct. 25, 1906.

The Synod met at 7:30 o'clock p. m., together with a large Congregation. The order for holding a Popular Meeting in the interest of Synodical Home Missions was observed. The devotional exercises were conducted by the Superintendent and Chairman, the Rev. R. P. Smith, who also presented and read the Report of the Committee, which was received. Addresses were made by the Superintendent, the Rev. R. F. Campbell, D. D., the Rev. W. D. Morton, D. D., and others.

Pending the adoption of the report and its recommendations, the Synod adjourned, with prayer by the Rev. T. F. Haney, to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

FOURTH DAY-MORNING SESSION.

STATESVILLE, N. C., Friday, Oct. 26, 1906.

The Synod met at 9 o'clock a. m., and devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. C. G. Vardell, D. D.

The Minutes of yesterday's Sessions were read and approved.

Your Auditing Committee would report that we have examined the report of the Treasurer of the 20th Century Builders Fund and find the same correct.

There are no vouchers to support disbursements.

On motion the thanks of the Synod was tendered to Rev. Hines for his faithful labors in behalf of this cause and the Stated Clerk was instructed to inform him to whom to turn over the fund on hand.

On motion the Rev. Geo. H. Atkinson was elected to succeed Bro. Hines, removed from our bounds as Agent of the 20th Century Builder's Fund.

A Communication from Miss Annie Wilson Mebane in behalf of the prisoners in Jails, Convict Camps etc., and also a Communication from the State Board of Public Charities were read and referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

The Standing Committee on the Narratives to formulate an address to the Churches, made the following report, which was adopted and ordered to be published in the Presbyterian Standard and read from our Pulpits.

#### ADDRESS TO THE CHURCHES.

The Synod of North Carolina to all its Congregations: Greeting:

We are pleased with the reports that come from all our Presbyteries as to the encouraging attendance of our people in the services of the Sanctuary. Some town churches however complain of lack of interest in the evening services.

As to the observance of family worship there is a general wail of despair. Many Congregations however report a goodly number, and some even a majority of families, maintaining this most vital part of home religious life.

Our own members as a rule keep the Sabbath by a quiet resting from worldly employments and recreations; and for this much we grateful in in these days of the general open desceration of the day. But we fear that in many cases the secular newspaper and magazine and social intercourse take the place of the public and private exercises of God's worship.

Most of our Churches have Sunday Schools in which our youth are fairly well taught the Bible and Catechism. In some Godly homes too Lois and Eunice are bringing up Timothy in the nurture and admonition of the Lord; Timothy's father still remaining an unknown quantity.

A general increase is reported in our contributions to church causes; but this increase is not in proportion to our growing prosperity. While giving more, we are not really growing in the grace of Christian liberality. Our expensive style of living is robbing the Lord of his proportion of our increase in material wealth.

Most of our ministers are fully and promptly paid the salaries promised them. But we would here emphasize the fact these salaries are pitifully small as compared with the growing demands upon them. While their congregations have generally grown in numbers and have multiplied in wealth, and the cost of living has increased fully one third, their salaries have remained about the same. It is therefore becoming increasingly difficult for the churches to secure pastors, and the majority of our ministers are becoming seriously embarrassed financially.

From many congregations come reports of a gratifying work of grace both in the lives of Christians and in saving sinners. In many others there are no special evidences of revival, but a normal growth and a healthy spiritual condition.

Worldly conformity, as far as fashionable amusements of a questionable character and vicious and hurtful dissipations are concerned, does not generally prevail.

Many churches, especially in town, are doing good evangelistic work in surrounding communities, in the way of conducting Mission Sabbath Schools and Chapel services and supporting mission churches.

The great cry all over the church is for more preachers; and we earnestly plead with parents to consecrate their sons to the work of the gospel ministry, and to press its claims upon them.

E. C. MURRAY, J. B. SHEARER, W. M. SIKES,

The Standing Committee on Union Theological Seminary made the following report which was adopted:

Your committee has had under its consideration the report of the Directors and Trustees of the institution, also a synopsis of the minutes of the Board of Trustees at its annual meeting, May 8-9, 1906, together with a communication from John S. Munee, Treasurer.

The committee records gratefully the fact that the number of its students are increasing, its enrollment having been sixty-two, this being two more than was enrolled the previous year while the current year 1906-1907 the enrollment has already reached sixty-six. It rejoices moreover that fifty of the sixty-two students last year were full graduates of colleges, a fact due no doubt in large part to the requirements of a college degree as a prerequisite to receiving the degree B. D. It notes with pleasure also that the library of the institution has increased to 20,460 volumes and is now perhaps the most valuable theological library in the Southern States. It is pleasing to us to learn that the Board has made an appropriation to publish a full catalogue of all the alumni of the institution from its founding to date. It is cause for thankfulness that the work of the institution was conducted successfully during the year with every chair filled, despite the temporary sickness of two members of the faculty. It is especially a source of rejoicing that \$25,000 was added to the endowment during the year. This addition, it deserves to be mentioned gratefully, was made largely through the liberality of Mr. George W. Watts and the efficient labors of Rev. A. D.

P. Gilmour as Financial Agent. It is very clear to us that the great needs of the Seminary at the present time are a new Refectory and a Gymnasium building and an increase of its endowment and these needs should be commended to the prayers and liberality of the churches of our Synod. It is a source of gratification that through the generosity of Mr. Geo. W. Watts the Board has been enabled to engage the services of Mr. Gilmour for five years as Field Secretary and Assistant Professor. It is noted that the Board overtures the Synod to order an annual collection in all its churches for the benefit of the institution.

The Synod has had the pleasure of the presence of Rev. W. W. Moore, D. D., President of the institution at this meeting and hearty thanks are due to him for his able, instructive and eloquent addresses.

We recommend:

t. That we hereby express our gratitude and return our sincere thanks to Mr. Geo. W. Watts for his liberal benefaction to the institution.

2. That the Field Secretary of the Institution, Rev. A. D. P. Gilmour, be encouraged by all of our churches to visit them in the interest of this institution.

3. That an annual collection for Union Theological Seminary be made in all of our churches during the month of September.

4. That Rev. A. McFadyen, Rev. A. T. Graham, D. D., and Mr. G. W. Watts whose terms as directors of the seminary expire at this meeting be re-elected.

5. That E. P. Wharton, Hon. T. B. Womack, Hon. T. B. Bailey, J. M. McIver and C. W. Johnson be appointed an advisory committee to assist the Field Secretary, Rev. A. D. P. Gilmour, in conducting his canvass in behalf of the Seminary.

6. That the Constitution and Plan of Union Theological Seminary be adopted.

P. R. LAW, Chairman.

The report of the Executive Committee on the Twentieth Century Fund was submitted by the Chairman, Rev. E. R. Levburn, and adopted. It is as follows:

Your Committee on the Twentieth Century Fund would report as follows: This Committee was continued for another year by the Synod at Red Springs, "to act not as an aggressive canvassing agency, but as a medium for collecting and reporting these subscriptions already made," thus completing the five years of effort originally intended to be made by Synod. The Treasurer was directed to make a supreme effort, by correspondence, to collect the unpaid subscriptions, and finish up the whole matter." In accordance with these directions of Synod, the Treasurer of this Committee has done all in his power to collect these unpaid subscriptions. No paid agent has been employed by your Committee to collect these subscriptions, but the Treasurer of the Committee was authorized to pay to the Treasurer of each church, or to any other collector designated by the pastor of the church, the 6 per cent. commission for collecting which had been the rate paid the general collector the year before.

The Treasurer's report, herewith submitted, shows the result of the year's canvass conducted in this way.

Your Committee would recommend:

I. That in accordance with the plan adopted by the Synod of 1902. A special Committee be appointed, in which each Presbytery shall be equally represented, to distribute the balance of \$380.40 now in the Treasurer's hands.

II. That the Committee be discharged, but the present Treasurer, Rev. E. C. Murray, be authorized to receive funds and disburse them, one-third to go to Davidson College, one-third to Union Theological Seminary, and one-third to the Presbytery from which the contribution comes.

In closing up this whole matter and laying down its work at the end of the five years of effort originally contemplated, your Committee would remark that while we have not raised \$300,000 which we set cut to raise, we believe the effort has been eminently successful and has proved a rich blessing to the church, not only in that \$113,789 has been raised for Education, but because by this effort to raise this fund, great interest has been aroused in Christian Education, and a new impetus given to this important cause within our bounds. This in itself, if we had raised no money, is well worth all the effort that has been put forth. E. R. LEYBURN, Chairman.

The Moderator appointed, as the Special Committee called for in the first recommendation of the foregoing report, the Members of the Synodical Committee on Church and Christian Education.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures made the following partial report which was adopted:

I. In answer to Overture of Albemarle Presbytery (to take action looking to a larger endowment of Davidson College, that the pressure upon the Faculty owing to the increased number of students may be relieved.) Your Committee recommend answer as follows:

The Synod recognizes the need of a larger income for Davidson College, but sees no way to action in this matter except upon initiative and recommendation of the Board of Directors through whom the Presbyteries exercise joint control over this institution.

II. In answer to Overture of Asheville Presbytery (to arrange the blanks for reports on the Benevylent Causes so that they may be filled out from the Statistics prepared for the General Assembly at the spring meeting of Presbytery,) We recommend that this be answered in the affirmative, with the understanding that special causes of Synod be indicated in smeller letters under the appropriate head in the Assembly's blanks.

III. In answer to Overture from W. C. T. U. (in reference to the liquor traffic and the enactment of temperance laws.) The Synod of North Carolina does very heartily express its sympathy with all right efforts to rid our State of the liquor traffic.

While the Synod deems that church courts should exercise very carefully and sparingly the rights to petition Legislatures and other civil bodies for the suppression of vice by Legislation, yet the Synod would urge upon members of the Presbyterian Church in North Carolina; that they exercise their duties as citizens in the fear of God, and in their civil relations and capacities to put into practice the principles of our holy religion for the suppression of intemperance, vice and immorality of all kinds.

IV. 'Your' Committee thinks that the letter or petition in reference to religious services in jails, conviet camps and alms-houses should be referred to our Synodical Home Missions Committee.

The unfinished business, namely, the Report and Recommendations of the Permanent Committee on Home Missions, was now taken up. The recommendations were considered Seriatim, and adopted, one by one. The Report as a whole was then adopted.—See the Report in Appendix: The following are the recommendations:

I. That the subject of evangelizing manufacturing villages or other districts in like need of organized church effort be referred to a Special Committee composed of the Chairman of this Committee and the Chairman of the Presbyterial Committees who shall devise and if possible put into effect a system for carrying on this work.

II. That the stronger cliurches undertake to support a Home Missionary each in some particular field.

III. That we have the Executive Committee of the Home Missions Committee incorporated.

IV. That all our regular workers be paid in full every month, and if the funds are not in hands for this purpose that the Executive Committee be authorized to borrow the money to meet the obligations.

V. That the 20th Century Building Fund be prosecuted with increased zeal and energy; and inasmuch as Rev. R. W. Hines, the Agent of this Fund, has left the bounds of our Synod, we recommend that Rev. Geo. H. Atkinson be elected to fill the place.

VI. That the Churches be asked to contribute the sum of \$12000 for carrying on the work during the incoming year and paying the deficit. That this sum be divided among the Presbyteries on the basis of last years apportionments.

The report of the Permanent Committee on Ministerial Education and Relief, was presented and read by the Chairman, Rev. A. T. Graham, D. D., and pending its adoption the Synod was addressed by the Rev. H. H. Sweets, the Assembly's Secretary of Ministerial Education and Relief. The report as a whole, was then adopted. See Appendix. The recommendations are as follows:

I. That the Churches of the Synod observe the Second Sabbath of November as a day of special prayer for Candidates, at which time it is urged that every pastor preach a sermon in which he shall set before his people the need of men to preach the gospel.

II. That the cause of Ministerial Relief be kept constantly before our people by the pastors and that the sessious co-operate cordially with any plan adopted by the Presbyteries in the interest of the Endowment Fund.

III. Synod cordially endorse the work of Mr. Sweets and that pastors use freely the excellent leaflets he prepares and offers for distribution.

ALFRED T. GRAHAM, Chairman,

The report of the Permanent Committee on Colored Evangelization was submitted and read by the Chairman, Rev. D. Clay Lilly, D. D., and received. Pending the adoption of the report the Synod was addressed by the Rev. J. G. Snedecor, Assembly's Secretary of Colored Evangelization, by Rev. J. R. Howerton, D. D., and by the Rev. J. S. Morrow. Following the address of Bro. Morrow, on motion a collection was taken for his benefit, amounting to \$30.00. The report was then adopted. See Appendix.

The report of the Permanent Committee on Publication, Sabbath Schools, and Young Peoples Societies, was submitted and read by the Chairman, Rev. Geo. H. Cornelson, D. D. The report was received and adopted.—See Appendix.

The Synod then took recess until 2:30 o'clock p. m.

FOURTH DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

STATESVILLE, N. C., Friday, Oct. 26, 1906.

The Synod met at 2:30 o'clock p. m. and resumed business.

The following resolution, offered by Rev. R. F. Campbell, D. D., was adopted:

That the Synod of North Carolina believing that the employment of young children in factories tends to dwarf the body, darken the mind, and deaden the soul, and that the system of child labor now in vogue comes therefore under the condemnation of the Lord Jesus Christ prononnced upon those who put stumbling-blocks in the way of these little ones, calls upon Christian employers, parents and citizens to exert all legitimate influence to remove this offence from the path of the children of our land.

The following resolutions in reference to the Historical Sketch of Home Missions in North Carolina was adopted:

Whereof the Synod is so pressed for time that it cannot possibly hear the balance of Rev. D. I. Craig's report on the History of Synodical Home Missions, we, the undersigned who have carefully read the whole of this most excellent paper, recommend the adoption of the following: I. That Synod adopt this report of her great Home Mission movement, and order its publication in the Appendix to the Minutes, and in the Presbyterian Standard.

II. That Bro, D. I. Craig be tendered the grateful thanks of the Synod for his laborious and painstaking work in preparing this splendid history of our Home Mission work, the publication of which we believe will not only afford our people an interesting history, but its reading will prove an inspiration to better and nobler work in the future.

The report of the Permanent Committee on Church and Christian Education was taken from the Docket and adopted. See Appendix. The following are the recommendations:

Your committee would recommend Synod to take the following action:

1. This Synod loyally approves and rejoices in the action of the Assembly, and promises all proper co-operation in carrying out the provisions of the Assembly's action in establishing the Executive Committee of Schools and Colleges.

2. This Synod considers it the duty of her Permanent Committee of Church and Christian and also the Committees of the Presbyteries, to co-operate in every proper way with the Assembly's Executive Committee in securing from all our churches both the collections, appointed by the Assembly, for schools and colleges.

3. The Synod's committee of Church and Christian Education shall consist, as heretofore, of a Chairman appointed by the Synod, and the Chairmen of the Permanent Committees of all the Presbyteries.

4. The time for Synod's collection for schools and colleges shall be the third Sabbath of March, or at such other time as may seem most available.

5. The Synod's collection for schools and colleges shall be applied and disbursed as heretofore, to wit: one-half to Davidson College, in which the entire Synod is interested; and the other half to schools, secondary and collegiate, male and female, under the care of Presbyteries, preference being given to schools under the care of the Presbyteries contributing the money to be disbursed, but not to the necessary exclusion of the needs of weak or mission Presbyteries. These appropriations are presumbly given to account of current expenses, rather than endowment.

6. The Synod would urge upon all the Presbyteries full co-operation

with all the details of the plan as outlined by the Assembly and detailed by the Synod. The best results will certainly be secured by hearty co-operation.

7. This plan in no respect interferes with the right of any and every school and college, through its own agencies, to select and collect moneys for support, betterments, or endowments.

S. It shall continue to be the duty of the Permanent Committees of Synod and of the Presbyteries, in future as in the past, to seek in every way to make all education the handmaid of religion, as set forth in the constitution and plan of organization found in the Assembly's Minutes of 1899 and expounded by subsequent Assemblies.

9. The Synod would especially commend the Assembly's first collection in December next, to all our churches, for out of it comes, first the maintenance of the "Home and School," and then the support of the committee including the Secretary, and then such schools as the Assembly may have under its care, if the funds be sufficient.

The Synod has referred to this committee the distribution of the sum of \$380.48, a remnant of the 20th Century Fund. We have made the following distribution, dividing it equally between the following schools: The Robbinsville School, Southern Presbyterian College, The Albemarle Normal and Industrial College, Statesville Female College, and Lees-McRae Institute.

The following paper in reference to the address of the Rev. W. H. McMaster, Secretary of the American Sabbath Union, was adopted.

Your Committee on the Sabbath to which was referred the matter of the address on the Sabbath by the Rev. W. H. McMaster, a Secretary of the American Sabbath Union, would record our high appreciation as a Synod of the object of his mission and of his address to our Synod.

I. We are grateful to God for any Scriptural movement designed to further the influence of the Holy Sabbath day and to check the baneful tendencies to the violation of its sacred character so prevalent among us.

II. As an organization designed to advance these objects and to stem the current of this evil, we commend to our people the American Sabbath Union as an object worthy of their support and the general dissemination of its literature as profitable to the purpose of our efforts in the interest of Sabbath Observance.

On motion the Synod heard an earnest and admirable address by President H. L. Smith in the interest of Davidson College.

The Standing Committee on the report of the Regents of the Synods Orphans's Home, Rev. J. R. Howerton, D. D., Chairman, made the following report which was adopted:

Your Standing Committee on Orphans Home present the following report:

1. We note with special gratification and thanksgiving the unusually encouraging report of the Board of Regents and especially the fact that contributions to the support fund have been considerably in excess of the amount asked for by Synod. We recommend the apportionment of \$12000 for this fund for the coming year asked for by the Board of Regents. We would especially commend the example of the Presbyteries of Albemarle, Concord, Fayetteville, Kings Mountain and Orange, which have exceeded the amount apportioned them, to the Presbyteries of Asheville, Mecklenburg and Wilmington which have fallen short.

We commend the work of the Field Agent, Rev. A. S. Caldwell and recommend that his services be continued if the way be clear.

3. We note the fact in the report of the Board of Regents that a number of applications for admission have been denied for want of room, and in this connection call attention to the need of a cottage for larger boys, and commend this to the liberality of our people. Whatever may been done in the past, we should strive to remove the reproach that any applicant should be denied for want of room.

4. We would record our grief at the loss of Rev. Jethro Rumple, D. D., and our gratitude to God for the noble work which he has done for this cause. We would recommend that the Board of Regents have a portrait of Dr. Rumple placed in some appropriate place in the Home to to perpetuate his memory and the example of his life in the hearts of the children.

5. We would record our thanks and appreciations to Mr. George Watts of Durham and Rev. C. G. Vardell and the contributing churches who have made it possible to complete the "Little Joe's Church" free from debt.

6. We recommend that Rev. G. H. Atkinson and Elder George Watts be re-elected to the Board of Regents and that Elder A. M. Scales be elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. Rumple,

The following additional report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, in answer to a Communication from the State Board of Public Charities, was submitted and adopted.

Committee on Bills and Overtures recommend the following answer to the communication of the Board of Public Charities of North Carolina through its Secretary, Miss Daisy Denson:

The Synod of North Carolina would record its hearty sympathy with the reformative treatment of prisoners and especially of boys who have become amenable to civil law. It is the spirit of the Gospel that the power of punishment which God has committed to the State should be administered not only with the view to the protection of society by the example of punishment and by the separation and confinement of criminals, but wherever possible with a view to the reformation of the eriminals. Many boys especially might be saved at the outset of a criminal career by the proper treatment instead of being hardened in erime by wrong treatment. To this end it is of the highest importance that criminals of tender age should be removed from the contact and influence of older and more hardened criminals, and we therefore commend the efforts of christian citizens to secure the establishment of a Reform School for boys, and to introduce religious services into all convict camps, jails and penitentiaries.

The report of the Committee of the whole, on the Records of the Presbyteries, Rev. T. H. Spencer, Chairman, made the following report which, after amendment was adopted.

Your Committee as a whole on Presbyterial records beg to report as follows:

I. We recommend that the Records of Mecklenburg, Orange, Wilmington, Kings Mountain (as far as written), Concord and Fayetteville be approved.

II. That Asheville be approved with the following exceptions: 1st. Failed to bring records to last meeting of Synod at Red Springs. 2nd. Minutes are type written on slips of paper in the record book.

III. That Albemarle be approved with the following exception:

Ist. Page 10, There is no record of the Constitutional question, being propounded in the Installation of Revs. J. E. Wool and J. G. Gyarth.

2nd. Page 12, The Commission to Ordain, Licentiate T. D. Viche calls itself Presbytery in listening to the sermon and the laying on of the hands in Ordination, then adjourns as a Commission.

3rd. The Synod disapproves of the action of the Presbytery of Albemarle in appointing a commission to examine and ordain a licentiate as irregular in that our book of Church Order requires that the examination requis te to ordination be conducted by the Presbytery. 4th. Page 22, The lists of Missionary Supplies are not written in the body of the Minutes.

With these exceptions we find the Minutes accurately and neatly kept and recommend their approval.

The Synod of North Carolina has heard with interest the address of Rev. J. R. Howerton, D. D., in regard to the plans of the Mountain Retreat Association, and commends these plans as worthy of the confidence of our people and as likely to conduce, through the proposed Summer Schools and Conferences at Montreat, to the spiritual interests of the Church. The managing committee of the Montreat Association being composed of the persons appointed by the Synod to consider the advisability of the purchase of Montreat for this purpose.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND TRUSTEES OF UNION THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

To the Synod of North Carolina:

The Board of Directors and Trustees of Union Theological Sciniary in Virginia would report:

1. That the total enrollment of students for the session was 62, an increase of 2 over the enrollment of the previous year. As evidence of the fine effect of our policy of requiring a College Degree as prerequisite to our Degree of B. D., we are able to report that fifty of the students were full graduates of colleges.

2. That nearly all the students have applied themselves to their work with diligence and success, and that they have been blest with almost uniformly good health.

3. That the Professors have done their work with fidelity and efficiency. Drs. Moore and Johnson were temporarily disabled by illness, but the teaching in their departments was successfully prosecuted during the interim by the Rev. W. H. Stuart and the Rev. D. K. Walthall, Ph. D.

4. That the Seminary posseses, perhaps, the most valuable Theological Library in the South, consisting of 20,460 volumes, and that the Library is now in a condition of order, accessibility and general working value to which it has never before attained.

5. That the Board has made an appropriation providing for the publication of a General Catalogue of the Seminary to contain, as far as obtainable, sketches of the Alumni of the Institution from its founding to the present time.

6. That the great needs of the Seminary, in addition to the pressing demands for the increase of the General Endowment Fund, are a new Refectory and Gymnasium Building, and the Board desires to call the attention of the Synods of Virginia and North Carolina, and the friends of the Seminary generally, to these needs.

7. That the financial condition of the Seminary is steadily improving, nearly \$35,000 having been added to the endowment during the last year. This increase is due largely to the liberality of Mr. Geo. W. Watts of Durham, N. C., and to the efficient labors of Rev. A. D. P. Gilmour, who has served as financial agent for the last seven months.

S. Through the munificence of Mr. Watts, the Seminary has been able to engage the services of Mr. Gilmour as Field Secretary and Assistant Professor for five years, and the Board earnestly commends Mr. Gilmour and his canvass to the confidence and liberality of the friends of the Seminary.

9. The Board requests the Synod of North Carolina to order an annual collection in all its churches for the benefit of the Seminary.

10. That the degree of B. D. was conferred upon the following:

## REPORT ON SYNODICAL HOME MISSIONS.

## To the Synod of North Carolina:

Your Committee on Home Missions would respectfully submit its eighteenth annual report as follows:

During the year just closing your Superintendent has tried to keep the membership of our churches well informed as to the conditions of the work. Articles have been published in the church papers, statements sent to pastors and sessions, and the cause presented in person to many Congregations, Sabbath Schools, and Missionary Societies. The policy adopted is that of trying to get every church in the Synod to contribute its proportionate part for the support of the work. The list of contributing churches this year amounts to sixty more than last. Thirty-four Ladies Missionary Societies have contributed making sixteen more than last year. The total contributions from all sources amount to \$3,580,00 more than last report.

Our evangelists have rendered faithful service in their respective fields, and God's blessing has attended their efforts. The following summary will show in part what has been accomplished.

(1) 27 ministers have served regularly 71 small churches and 70 mission points.

(2) Under the preaching of these ministers 1389 persons have made a public profession of their faith in Christ and 708 of this number have been received into the membership of the Presbyterian Church.

(3) Five churches and thirty Sabbath schools have been organized in new territory.

(4) The money raised on these mission fields for all purposes amounts to \$9,850.00, much of this sum being used for erecting church buildings.

(5) Five churches have developed into self support, and others are making good progress along this line.

(6) Our Church Schools of Academic grade, located at Bauner Elk, Plumtree, Canton, and Robbinsville are increasing steadily in patronage These institutions are exerting a great influence for mental development, for domestic happiness, for public enterprise, and for spreading the Gospel among the destitute.

(7) In addition to our regular work, some very valuable help has been received from a number of consecrated Christian women, who have given their services as volunteer teachers in the more destitute sections of our Synod.

#### REV. WM. BLACK.

Our General Evangelist, since the last meeting of Synod, has preached 376 times in more than 27 different places. In these meetings there were 1133 professions and more than 464 additions to the Presbyterian Church. He raised \$1400 for Synodical Missions, and \$2050 for church erection, pastors salaries etc. 276 persons promised to hold family worship. You will observe that Bro. Black has raised funds more than enough to pay his salary. In response to many invitations from churches outside our Synod, and by permission of our Committee, he has held this year several meetings beyond our bounds. While thus absent the Synod was credited with the lost time. His services for the past year have proved a great blessing to thousands of people.

While the above abstract furnishes just cause for gratitude and encouragement, the church at large should know that our faithful workers have endured many hardships in producing these results, and at times some of them have stood face to face with painful financial embarrassments. While the expenses of living have increased greatly, the already small salaries have remained the same, and they have not been paid promptly. Under this pressure four of our evangelists recently gave up their fields of labor and have gone from us.

#### WORK TO BE DONE.

With all that has been accomplished still there are pressing needs. In the more remote districts the destitution appeals to us with a Macedonia cry that will not hush. At our solicitation numbers of godly women have gone into those sections and have organized Mission day schools and Sabbath schools in which many have learned to read the Scriptures and to know Jesus as a personal Saviour. Frequently during the year these teachers and the people whom they serve have asked that ministers be sent to preach at these mission points. It is painful to state that most of these requests have not been granted because there were no funds to meet the expenses. It must be remembered that these noble women are closing this work without any compensation.

We call attention to the fact that thousands of people are flocking into villages in the manufacturing districts in different parts of our state, and our church is doing but little to send the Gospel into these places.

The great destitution of this larger element of our population appeals eloquently to the Christian benevolence of our Synod, and our Presbyteries are urged to use more strenuous efforts to give to them the privileges of the gospel.

Vast sums of money are being invested for developing the various resources of our state, and hundreds of people are pouring in from all parts of our country to utilize this capital. Out of these conditions are growing new duties and responsibilities every day. Can we as Christians, can we as a church afford to be indifferent? Careful investigation shows that we could use to good advantage 28 more ministers in mission fields where there is a demand for them. At least six more men are absolutely necessary to meet the requirements of our growing work.

We are face to face with a crisis. If the churches will not furnish us the means with which to do this needy work at our door, among our own people, then common honesty demands that we step aside and ask others to do it; and not send out workers to suffer disappointment and humiliation.

The example of the First Church Wilmington, is heartily recommended to other churches; said church has agreed to give a definite sum, \$600 annually for the support of an Evangelist in the Brunswick field.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

I. That the subject of evangelizing manufacturing villages or other districts in like need of organized church effort be referred to a Special Committee composed of the Chairman of this Committee and the Chairman of the Presbyterial Committees who shall devise and if possible put into effect a system for carrying on this work.

II. That the stronger churches undertake to support a Home Missionary each in some particular field.

III. That we have the Executive Committee of the Home Missions Committee incorporated.

IV. That all our regular workers be paid in full every month, and if the funds are not in hands for this purpose that the Executive Committee be authorized to borrow the money to meet the obligations.

V. That the 20th Century Building Fund be prosecuted with increased zeal and energy; and inasmuch as Rev. R. W. Hines, the Agent of this Fund, has left the bounds of our Synod, we recommend that Rev. Geo. H. Atkinson be elected to fill the place. VI. That the Churches be asked to contribute the sum of \$12000 for carrying on the work during the incoming year and paying the defieit. That this sum be divided among the Presbyteries on the basis of last years apportionments.

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#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

To the Synod of North Carolina:

Your Committee on Foreign Missions would respectfully submit the following report.

The contributions from this Synod to the cause of Foreign Missions amount to a total of \$27.779, an increase of \$1.761 over last year.

Albemarle Presbytery gave this year \$1382, as against \$1479, last year, a decrease of \$67.

Asheville Presbytery gave this year \$932, last year \$954, a decrease of \$22.

Concord Presbytery gave this year \$5110. last year \$5202, a decrease of \$92.

Fayetteville Presbytery gave this year \$6170, last year \$4107, an increase of \$2063.

King's Mountain Presbytery gave this year \$862, last year \$832, an increase of \$30.

Mecklenburg Presbytery gave this year \$4,098, last year \$4771, a decrease of \$673.

Orange Presbytery gave this year \$5792, last year \$5849, a decrease of \$57.

From this summary it appears that while the total contributions from the Synod have increased \$1761, there has been a falling off of contributions in every Presbytery except King's Mountain, which has given \$30 more than last year, and Fayetteville, which has given \$2,063 more than last year.

From this it will be seen that while Fayetteville Presbytery leads in the total amount contributed, and in the increase of contributions this year over last year. Orange is the banner Presbytery in the average gift per member which is 18 cents beyond Fayetteville's contribution per capita, and 21 cents beyond the average for the whole Synod.

We would call the attention of the Synod to the fact that of our 418 churches 121 contributed nothing last year to send the Gospel to the heathen. Albemarle Presbytery had out of 38 churches 17 that gave nothing to Foreign Missions; Asheville 13 out of 25; Concord 22 out of 70; Fayetteville 15 out of 87; King's Mountain 8 out of 35; Mecklenburg 14 out of 47; Orange 16 out of 65; Wilmington 16 ont of 51.

Your Committee would also call the attention of the Synod to the appeal made by the Missions for a re-enforcement of thirty-five new missionaries as the minimum number required to meet the immediate need created by the success of the work. In view of this demand for more workers in the field, the General Assembly at Greenville, S. C., appealed to the church for a contribution of \$325,000 to sustain and enlarge the work during the present fiscal year. This means an increase of 22 per cent over the contributions of last year. If the Synod of North Carolina is to do her part in meeting this imperative demand for larger contributions she must send into the Foreign Mission treasury this year \$34,000 as against \$27,779 last year.

## REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION AND RELIEF.

## To the Synod of North Carolina:

Your Committee on Ministerial Education and Relief would respectfully report as follows:

#### I.-MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Within the bounds of the Assembly there are now 332 Candidates for the Ministry, 205 of these are under the care of the various Presbyteries, while the remaining thirty-seven, though fully decided in their purpose to preach, have not yet put themselves under the care of any Presbytery. 124 of these Candidates are in the Seminary, 156 in college and 32 in the Schools and Academies. 195 Candidates were aided by the Executive Committee. The Committee paid out \$18,800 for this cause, making an average of \$96 to each Beneficiary. Out of the men studying for the ministry 46 graduated from our Theological schools last year and have been added to our roll, but 40 ministers died besides others that retired. Over against this sad fact stands another which appalls us—there are 196 vacant fields that can support a pastor.

Looking at the facts as they exist in our Synod. There are 57 Candidates under the care of our several Presbyteries. Synod is asked to give careful attention to the facts contained in this tabulated statement:

b.-Synod gave \$2,243.43 to this object-but it needed for aiding her

Candidates \$3,995.00. That means that one of the very strongest of the Synods received from outside source \$1,751.57 more than she contributed.

#### IL-MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

Our Secretary informs us that there are 31 infirm ministers in the bounds of our Assembly who are over seventy years of age and in dire need. There are 125 widows of ministers and 69 fatherless children under 14 years of age needing aid from this Fund. The Executive Committee paid out to Beneficiaries \$19,851,50 last year.

Of this amount the twenty Prineficiaries in the Synod of North Carolina received \$1,695.00. It is good to know that we gave over \$600 to this object above our own Synodical demands. There were 246 contributing churches—while 166 gave nothing.

We submit the following table which is worthy of careful study by our Sessions:

#### III. - ENDOWMENT FUND.

Our relation to the Endowment Fund has not indicated that we have vet taken that cause to heart.

The vigorous campaign of our untiring Secretary shows that in the church at large, he is making evident progress in seeking to establish this Fund by the aid of the generous minded Mr. Imman. Something like sixty thousand dollars have been collected and invested for the benefit of this Endowment. Our own part has been very small—only six churches have contributed—with four hundred and six noncontributing. From all sources \$59.30 had gone into this fund out of the Synod up to the last report from the Executive Committee. It is cheering to know that all of our Presbyteries are beginning to move vigorously in this matter. Wilmington Presbytery for example, has undertaken to raise a special Fund of 15,000 and has requested five prominent ruling Elders to visit the churches in this behalf. Others have set on foot more or less definite schemes which are sure to result in a great forward movement in this effort.

#### WE RECOMMEND.

I. That the churches of the Synod observe the Second Sabbath of November as a day of special prayer for Candidates, at which time it is urged that every pastor preach a sermon in which he shall set before his people the need of men to preach the gospel.

II. That the cause of Ministerial Relief be kept constantly before our people by the pastors and that the sessions co-operate cordially with any plan adopted by the Presbyteries in the interest of the Endowment Fund.

III. Synod cordially endorse the work of Mr. Sweets and that pastors use freely the excellent leaflets he prepares and offers for distribution.

# REPORT OF SYNOD'S PERMANENT COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

## To the Synod of North Carolina:

It gives us pleasure to recall the fact that this Synod originated the movement to restore education to its proper place in relation to the Church, and to awaken a proper sense of responsibility for the Christian Education of the young, and they have kept in the fore front of interest and effort for this cause. It is a matter for the profoundest gratitude to God that our efforts and our prayers have been so signally blessed within our bounds. We have also great reason to rejoice that so much has been done in all our sister Synods, not only in enlarging and strengthening schools already in operation, but also in founding so many new schools and colleges, male and female,-schools of all grades, primary, secondary, and collegiate; and their initial success is marvelous. This awakening is not limited to our church, but all the churches are setting to each other the example of a great forward movement. Fifteen or twenty years ago the advocates of a purely secular education were advising Church Education to retire from the field as an anachronism and a failure. But instead of this, the church has renewed her efforts and recognized her obligations with the promise of the largest success. This is no sudden spurt of interest, born of the ephemeral impulses of denominational pride and competition, but the church recognizes her duty and responsibility to make education more distinctly Christian than ever before. This principle is the source of her new found power and success. She begins also to recognize her mission and her power to make secular schools more distinctly Christian.

It gives your Committee the greatest pleasure to report that all our Schools and Colleges are in a more prosperous condition every year, and especially the last year; and the opening of the schools this fall, and their outlook for the next year is cheering.

Davidson College is of interest to the entire Synod, because she is owned by all the Presbyterians in conjunction with the Presbyteries of three Synods on the South Atlantic border, and because we draw so largely from her halls for the ministers and office bearers of our church. The prosperity and usefulness of the College are greater than ever before.

We need only mention in this report our leading female schools— Peace Institute at Raleigh, Statesville Female College, Lees-Mcrae Institute at Banner Elk, The Southern Presbyterian College and Conservatory of Music at Red Springs, The College for Women in Charlotte and the James Sprunt Institute at Kenansville. Any attempt here to advertise their merits would be inadequate. We hope that any who may desire to talk briefly to Synod about these schools may have the opportunity of doing so.

We might mention besides a dozen or more schools of lower grade, some male, some female, some co-educational, some under Presbyterial control and some under sessional control. And besides these there is a considerable number of mission schools in our more destitute fields about which Synod will hear from other sources.

Your Committee herewith submits a financial statement of collections and disbursements for this cause. This statement includes such April collections as came into our hands; such collections as were made and used by the Presbyteries and only reported through your Committee: and moneys collected in Synod for the Davidson College Church and ordered by Synod to be reported through this Committee. This statement does not include moneys raised by special effort by the several Schools and Colleges for plant, and betterments and endowments—quite a large sum, about \$30,000.00.

The matter which concerns us most at this time is the action of the Assembly, at Greenville, S. C., establishing the Executive Committee for Schools and Colleges, as found on page 54 of the Assembly's Minutes, 1906. That action makes the Chairman of the Synods' Permanent Committees  $\mathbf{of}$ Church and Christian Education. corresponding members of that Executive Committee. That action also appoints two collections for this cause, one in December and one in March. The one in December supersedes the collection for the Home and School, and is called the "Assembly's collection for Schools and Colleges," and is to be used by the Executive Committee of Schools and Colleges as set forth in the said action. The other collection is called the "Synodical Collection for Schools and Colleges," and is to be used by the Synod to maintain Schools and Colleges in which they may be interested.

Your Committee would recommend Synod to take the following action:

1. This Synod loyally approves and rejoices in the action of the Assembly, and promises all proper co-operation in carrying out the provisions of the Assembly's action in establishing the Executive Committee of Schools and Colleges.

2. This Synod considers it the duty of her Permanent Committee of Church and Christian and also the Committees of the Presbyteries, to co-operate in every proper way with the Assembly's Executive Committee in securing from all our Churches both the collections, appointed by the Assembly, for Schools and Colleges.

3. The Synod's Committee of Church and Christian Education

shall consist, as heretofore, of a Chairman appointed by the Synod, and the Chairmen of the Permanent Committees of all the Presbyteries.

4. The time for Synod's collection for Schools and Colleges shall be the third Sabbath of March, or at such other time as may seem most available.

5. The Synod's collection for Schools and Colleges shall be applied and disbursed as heretofore, to wit: one-half to Davidson College, in which the entire Synod is interested; and the other half to schools, secondary and collegiate, male or female, under the care of Presbyteries, preference being given to schools under the care of the Presbyteries contributing the money to be disbursed, but not to the necessary exclusion of the needs of weak or mission Presbyteries. These appropriations are presumably given to account of current expenses, rather than endowment.

6. The Synod would urge upon all the Presbyteries full cooperation with all the details of the plan as outlined by the Assembly and detailed by the Synod. The best results will certainly be secured by hearty co-operation.

7. This plan in no respect interferes with the right of any and every School and College, through its own agencies, to solicit and collect moneys for support, betterments, or endowments.

8. It shall continue to be the duty of the Permanent Committees of Synod and of the Presbyteries, in future as in the past, to seek in every way to make all education the handmaid of religion, as set forth in the constitution and plan of organization found in the Assembly's Minutes of 1899 and expounded by subsequent Assemblies.

9. The Synod would especially commend the Assembly's first collection in December next, to all our Churches, for out of it comes, first the maintenance of the "Home and School," and then the support of the Committee including the Secretary, and then such schools as the Assembly may have under its care, if the funds be sufficient.

The Synod has referred to this Committee the distribution of the sum of \$380.48, a remnant of the 20th Century Fund. We have made the following distribution, dividing it equally between the following schools: The Robbinsville School, Southern Presbyterian College, The Albemarle Normal and Industrial College, Statesville Female College, and Lees-McRae Institute.

# REPORT OF PERMANENT COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATION, SABBATH-SCHOOLS AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

# To the Synod of North Carolina:

I. For the cause of Publication, the Assembly asks the sum of \$25,000 from the churches. Last year Synod's total contributions to this work was only \$1599, an increase of \$390 over last year, but the pressing and aggressive needs of the work demands an increase this year equal to the total contribution of the year gone, if we are to give our proportionate part of the \$25,000, at least \$3500, or 9 nine cents a member. Assembly's Committee asserts that "It must be made clear that the benevolent work cannot be continued on its present basis unless the church increases its offering for this cause." Let all bear in mind that every dollar of this offering goes back in to our missionary work with an increase from the profits of the Publishing business, an increase last year of 30 cents to every dollar from the general contribution, including bequests which were the largest in the history af the work. We urge our people to make their purchases of all kinds of literature with the Assembly's Book Department. Its terms are most reasonable, and all profits go to the support of our missionary work.

II.—The study of the statistics of the Sabbath-School Work from year to year drives one to the conclusion that the variations in the figures, whether these indicate a gain or a loss, are due to faithfulnest or unfaithfulness in making out these reports than to any actual gain or loss in the schools. Some years there are fuller reports from the schools than in other years, and the difference this factor alone makes renders any comparisons of the figures from one year to another trustworthy as an indication of real advance or decline in the work of the Synod; indeed, this is true for each Presbytery. For this year the figures indicate a loss of 3 scholars and 49 teachers, when there are so many other indications compelling the belief that had the whole field been fully reported, a decided gain would be shown. One Presbytery alone reports a loss of 527 scholars, which clearly is due to many of its churches not sending in any report.

In preference, therefore, to giving a comparative table of statistics we take this space to urge upon all concerned the necessity of all schools sending to the Spring Meeting of Presbytery full reports of their work, and that they do so every year.

Attention is called to the large and increasing support the Assembly Committee is giving the Sabbath-School Work in this Synod, and Presbyteries are urged through their respective Chairmen to the heartiest co-operation within their bounds, and Presbyteries, Pastors and Sessions are called to give to District Superintendent, Rev. M. B. Porter, address Charlotte, N. C., an opportunity to present the cause of progressive work in Sabbath-Schools and Young People's Societies to our congregations.

III.—From the Assembly's Report and the facts in the reports of Presbyteries, it is manifest that there is a marked increase of interest in church work among our young people and most emphatically among the men, toward organized effort to greater and more intelligent activity in Christian work, but here, too, reports are meagre. We call attention to the need expressed by the Assembly that all of our Young People's Societies be unified under the Westminster League, as can be done with its present elastic and comprehensive Constitution; particularly specifying the new organization for men. The Presbyterian Brotherhood. We quote the recommendation of the Assembly's Committee; That the Assembly adopt for its work among boys from 8 to 16 years, "The Covenanters," and for men from 16 to 35 "The Presbyterian Brotherhood," and for girls and women, "The Miriams." Let us endeavor to conform our societies to this general plan, that the work may be systematized and intelligently fostered by the Chairmen of this growing work as appointed by Presbytery, Synod and the Assembly.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE SABBATH AND FAMILY RELIGION.

#### To the Synod of North Carolina:

Your committee respectfully submits the following report.

Throughout Christendom three powerful forces continue to exert strong influences in the formation of standards for Sabbath day observances. The first of these is protestantism, which insists on a strictly religious keeping of the day, on the absence of all secular labor and pastime, and on making the entire day one of rest for the body and worship for the soul. On all these things the Presbyterian brand of protestantism especially and persistently insists.

The second is Catholicism, which while making provision for the observance of religious rites, allows a large latitude for social recreation and worldly amusements.

The third influence is secularism. This merely tolerates the day, and its purpose has been to totally destroy it.

In the early ages of the life of the church, the day was kept by loving disciples in memory of the risen Lord, and was a day of spiritual joy and thanksgiving. And this is it's true character. When Roman Catholicism triumphed the day degenerated into one of superstitious ceremonial and in many cases, degrading pastimes. This was its characteristic during the dark middle ages. The Reformation cleared away most of these false notions and injurious practices, seeking to restore the true intent and design of the day. But in some instances the pendulum swinging too far brought about a restoration of that rabbinical sabbath which the Master denounced as burdensome, and against which he laid down the great principle that the Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath.

Of late years secularism has exerted a decidedly modifying influence on both catholic and protestaut opinion; until to-day the great danger which threatens us is the secularized Sabbath, which is, at its best, no Sabbath at all.

The destructive influence of secularism on Christian ideals of the Sabbath can readily be seen when we consider the vast multitudes of toilers whom modern industrialism deprives altogether, or in part, of the Sabbath; the decrease in all lands in attendance on the sanctuary; the patronizing of Sunday trains, mails and newspapers, to an extent till lately unknown; the prostitution of the holy hours of the day to public and private games, excursions, picnics, shows and the like.

While this tendency may well cause the upholder of the Lord's day uneasiness, there are indications that the tide is about to turn, and that we are going to preserve our Christian Sabbath. What are some of these indications?

One is the alarm that secularism itself has taken at the result of its effort to destroy the Sabbath. The discovery is made that man must rest, and that civilization depends largely for its preservation on the Sabbath. Hence irreligious men at the head of great industrial movements are making provision for the Sabbath of their employees: hence the government of France passes Sunday laws forcing its people to abstain from work on that day.

We also see a quickening of the Catholic conscience on this point. Archbishops issue pastoral letters pleading for a more scriptural observance of the day. At the recent Catholic Congress held at Brighton, England, discussion of this subject occupied an important place, and every speaker was for a more religious observance of the day. The Catholic priests of Spain forbid the bull fight on the Sabbath.

Our third ground for hope is in the aroused sentiment in protestant communities, manifesting itself in active effort to preserve the Sabbath.

The Canadian government at its last session passed a Sunday law, which among other steps in advance, positively prohibits the running of Sunday excursions, and the publishing of Sunday newspapers. Several railroads in America are minimizing their Sunday traffic, seeking to get rid of freight trains altogether on that day. Many Christians hitherto careless in this regard are more particular about what they do and leave undone on the Lord's day. These are encouragements that should stimulate us to further effort in advocacy of the claims of this day upon the church and the world.

In the matter of family religion the outlook is not so hopeful. Doubtless God is regarded in the great majority of nominally christian homes, but the setting apart of a stated time for united worship is much neglected; and definite instruction of children in the truths of our faith is almost unknown.

This sad condition arises partly from the strenuousness of modern living, which leaves so little time for the home life, partly from the emphasis given to Sunday School work. The parent now eases his conscience by relegating the instruction of his children to the well equipped up-to-date Sunday School. Thus the Forward Movement threatens to become a backward movement in this particular direction.

Unwise methods must be combatted with wise and proper methods. We discount the truths for which we control by our meagre support of the work which gives these truths their only practical exhibition. We have never given them hearty enough support to cause them to largely affect public opinion.

#### REPORT OF REGENTS OF ORPHAN'S HOME.

#### To the Synod of North Carolina:

The Regents of the Orphan's Home would present to the Synod their Seventeenth Annual Report. This Institution has been in existence since 1888, a period of I8 years. In 1890 the present location was chosen and in 1892 the Synods and "The Annie Louise" Cottages were erected and dedicated. Since that time the Orphan's Home has made steady progress, and has grown in size, and efficiency. It now has 200 acres of farming land, 50 acres of wood land, and 9 principal buildings, besides the needful out-buildings. The value of the whole property, which has been donated or paid for exceeds \$52,000. During the past year several new buildings for conducting the work of the Home have been erected and a number of improvements made. A farmer's house, a new barn, a dairy barn, a feed stuff building and a cold storage room have been provided. Cement floors have been placed in the cook room and the basement of Rumple Hall. Wainscotting has been furnished in Synods and the Annie Louise Cottage where needful to protect the plastering from damage. The tin roofs on all the buildings have been repainted, a shoe shop filled up and furnished, a hot water feed pump placed in the engine room, a planing machine in the carpenters shop, separator in the dairy, and an ensilage cutter bought. In addition to these improvements "Little Joe's Church" has been commenced, and considerable progress has been made towards completion.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

The Superintendent's Annual Report states, that the year has been upon the whole one of progress and improvements, though it has not been exempt from trials and afflictions. They have been called upon to mourn the death, from diphtheria, of one little girl, Annie Beulah McDonald, aged eleven years. No sickness, however has been traced to any local cause. Some inconveniences has been encounted at times from over crowding, and from frequent changes in the Matron of Synod's Cottage. The wages paid are so low that it is difficult sometimes to secure efficient Matrons. During the year provision has been made for 166 children, 70 boys and 96 girls, while the average number present at one time has been 150. Many applications have been denied for want of room, and the next pressing need of the Orphan's Home is a new Cottage for the larger boys.

There has been expended in money during the year, for support, including board, clothing, all salaries, school expenses and purchases for kitchen, dining room, and dormitories, \$12,155.31. To this should be added clothing donated by societies and individuals \$1,892.04.

Making a total of \$14,047.35. This is an average per capitum of \$93.64. But if you deduct the greater part of the \$2600, indebtedness carried over from last year, it would make the whole expenditures about \$2500, and the average per capitum \$83.32.

#### THE TREASURER'S REPORT.

Mr. P. M. Brown, of Charlotte has furnished his Annual Report,
fully stated, audited by the appointed committee, and approved by
the Regents. From this we learn that the Receipts for all funds in-

On hand Oct. 1st, 1906\$ 674.94 From this statement it appears that our receipts for the Support Fund have been larger than in any previous year, and but for a debt of \$2600, with which we started the year, and for the repairs and improvements made would have been fully adequate to the want of the Home.

Asheville was short in its apportionment \$359.81; Mecklenburg \$78.59; and Wilmington \$314.67. The other five Presbyteries so largely exceeded their apportionments, as to secure a most gratifying result. The same apportionment of \$12000 among the Presbyteries should be continued if we would keep free from debt, and make any provision for an increased number in the Orphan's Home.

#### WORK OF FIELD AGENT.

During the past year Rev. A. S. Caldwell has been acting as Field Agent for the Home throughout the Synod. Since he commenced the work about 18 months ago, he has visited some 200 churches, and has secured from individuals, Sabbath schools and churches, promises of support for more than 150 orphan children, and in cash and subscriptions \$6,954.00. Many of his subscriptions however are payable on birth-days, and will not be met for a year. The increased contributions of \$3,280.16 to the Support Fund reported by the Treasurer for this year compared with the previous one, is partly due to the efforts of the Field Agent. He has been elected to this position for the coming year, and specially charged with collecting past due subscriptions, securing promised support for other orphans, interesting Sabbath schools as well as churches and individuals in the support of the Home, extending the circulation of "The Fatherless Ones," and keeping the Institution before the public through the columns of its paper.

TREASURER'S REPORT OF RECEIPTS BY PRESBYTERIES.

This report covers the Synodical year from Oct. 1st, 1905, to Oct. 1st, 1906. It has been printed and a number of copies are present for distribution among the members of Synod.

Fayetteville—Apportioned \$2300; contributed \$2,531.91; contributing 68; non-contributing 19; No. churches 87.

Mecklenburg – Apportioned \$1200; contributed \$1,921.41; contributing 36; non-contributing 11; No. churches 47.

Orange—Apportioned \$2100; contributed \$3,458.39; contributing 42; non-contributing 22; No. churches, 64.

Wilmington—Apportioned \$1200; contributed 5885.33; contributing 36; non-contributing 18; No. churches 54.

# STANDING RULES OF SYNOD.

Revised and Adopted October, 1905.

1.—GENERAL RULES. (Pertaining to the Synod as a Body.)

1. The Stated meetings of this Synod shall be held annually, and unless otherwise ordered, in the month of October, beginning on the Fourth Tuesday of said month at 11 o'clock a. m.

2. The Parliamentary Rules of Order, adopted by the General Assembly, and published in the Book of Church Order, shall be the Rules of Order for the guidance of Synod.

3. The officers of the Synod shall be a Moderator, a Stated Clerk, a Treasurer, two Temporary Clerks, and a Board of Trustees consisting of five Members. The Moderator and the temporary Clerks shall be elected at each Stated Meeting and the Stated Clerk,, the Treasurer, and the Board of Trustees shall be elected every three years counting from 1886. 4. The Synod shall elect annually:

(a) A Superintendent of Synodical Home Missions.

(b) A General Evangelist.

(c) Three Members of the Board of Directors of Union Theological Seminary, two Ministers and one Ruling Elder, whose term of office shall be four years.

(d) Two Members of the Board of Regents of the Orphans' Home, term of office shall be for five years.

5. The Synod shall elect triennially, counting from 1886, the following Committees which shall be known as the "Permanent Committees" of the Synod.

> (a) On Synodical Home Missions, consisting of the Chairman of the several Presbyterial Committees on Home Missions, and one Ruling Elder from each Presbytery. The Superintendent of Synodical Home Missions shall be "ex-officio" Chairman, and the General Evangelist shall be "ex-officio" a member of this Committee and it shall be charged with the conduct of the work of "Synodical Home Missions" under the direction of the Synod and in harmonious co-operation with the Several Presbyteries.

(b) On Foreign Missions.

(c) On Assembly's Home Missions.

(d) On Ministerial Education and Relief.

- (e) On Church and Christian Education.
- (f) On Publication and Sabbath School work.
- (g) On the Sabbath and Family Religion.
- (h) On Colored Evangelization.
- (i) On the Bible Cause.
- (j) On Assembly's Home and School.

These Committees, except the first named, shall consist each of a Chairman appointed by the Synod, together with the Presbyterial Chairman of the Several Causes, respectfully. And it shall be the duty of these Committees to take into consideration everything bearing upon the Causes which they represent calculated to inspire interest, to increase knowledge, and to promote the growth and glory of Christ's Kingdom, and to report in writing through their Chairman at each meeting of Synod.

(k) A Historical Committee, consisting of three members including the Stated Clerk, who shall be "ex-officio" Chairman. It shall be the duty of this Committee to be a medium of communication and information with other like Committees or Societies, and to have a watchful care for the preservation of all records, documents and papers belonging to the Synod and, to collect and preserve all possible material of historical value pertaining to the Synod, and to report from time to time on all matters of historic value and interest.

6. The Stated Clerk, the Pastor of the Church in which the Synod shall meet, and the Ruling Elder appointed to represent said Church, shall constitute a Committee on Enrollment. This Committee shall meet in the Church at a time appointed before the opening of Synod and prepare the roll of Synod, and to this Committee each member shall be required to report for enrollment. The roll thus prepared shall be called at the organization of Synod. Additional enrollment shall be made by blank slips distributed through the Synod and collected by tellers appointed by the Moderator.

7. The first half hour of each Morning Session shall be spent in devotional exercises conducted by the Moderator or by some one appointed by him, and the last hour of each morning session shall be given to the hearing of a sermon, or of a public address on some cause of the Church.

8. The Synod shall recede from business during the afternoon of the second day, in order that the various Committees may meet and prepare their work.

## H.-SPECIAL RULES.

(Pertaining to the Duties of Officers and Committees.)

9. The Moderator. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, at an early hour in the proceedings of the regular meeting to appoint the following Standing Committees, which shall usually consist of not less than three members each.

- (a) On Devotional Exercises.
- (b) On Special Orders.
- (c) On Bills and Overtures.
- (d) A Judicial Committee.
- (e) On an Address to the Churches.
- (f) On the Minutes of the General Assembly.

(g) On the Report of the Directors of Union Theological Seminary.

- (h) On the Report of the Regents of the Orphans' Home.
- (i) On the Statistical Reports of the Presbyteries.
- (j) On the Presbyterial Reports on Systematic Beneficence.

(k) On the Report of the Treasurer and his Books—Auditing Committee.

- (1) On the Records of Synod.
- (iii) On the Records of the Presbyteries-Eight Committees.

(n) On Leave of Absence. To these Committees shall be referred without a vote, unless there is objection, all reports, documents, communications, and other matters pertaining to the several subjects upon which they are appointed, and it shall be their duty to formulate reports upon the matters referred to them and to present the same to the Synod for action.

It shall also be the duty of the Moderator, in the interim of the meetings of Synod when a vacancy occurs, in any of the offices of the Synod, by death, resignation, or removal from our bounds, to fill such vacancies by appointment, until the next meeting of Synod. And also, upon the occasion of the death of a minister, it shall be his duty to appoint a Committee of one, to prepare a Memorial Sketch of the deceased, to be read in the Synod ensuing, and to be spread upon the Records.

10. The Stated Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Stated Clerk when he is elected and enters upon the duties of his office, at the opening of the Synod immediately succeeding that at which he is elected, to report to the Synod in writing and in full whatever he has received from his predecessor, in the way of Records, Books. Papers, Documents, Furniture, etc., and the condition of the same when received.

The Stated Clerk shall conduct the correspondence of the Synod and he shall be the permanent (Ex-officio) Chairman of the Standing Com-

mittees on Special Orders and Statistics. He shall publish a notice of the time and place of the Meeting of Synod at least one month before the appointed day. He shall secure such reduced rates of Railroad travel as may be possible, and he shall sign all necessary certificates for the same, or for other official purposes of the Synod or its members. He shall prepare a detailed Docket of business for the next meeting, and cause the same to be published in the Appendix of the Minutes of the last meeting. He shall have at each meeting of the Synod, accessable to the Moderator a sufficient number of Dockets, a copy of the last printed Minutes of the General Assembly, and a copy of Alexander's Digest. He shall duly engross the Minutes of the Synod after their approval. and transcribe the same into a Book to be known as the "Synod's Official Records," and he shall transmit said Records annually to the General Assembly for review. He shall caused to be published annually, in pamphlet form, at least one thousand copies of the Minutes of each meeting, as soon as practicable after adjournment, and distribute the same among the members and Church Sessions. He shall cause to be published in the Appendix of the Printed Minutes, the reports of the Presbyteries on Statistics and Systematic Beneficence, the reports of the Permanent Committees without their recommendations, the annual report of the Directors of Union Theological Seminary, a roll of the Ministers of Synod by Presbyteries, and a list of the officers, appointees and Permanent Committees, together with the Standing Rules. He shall also cause to be published every five years according to Rule adopted in 1874, but counting from 1896, the names of the Ruling Elders and Deacons, with their respective post offices, belonging to the Churches composing the Synod, and the Stated Clerks of the Presbyteries shall be required to furnish the Stated Clerk of the Synod with the necessary information for the execution of this rule. He shall forward a copy of the Printed Minutes, annually, to the Librarians of Union Theological Seminary, Davidson College and the Presbyterian Historical Society in Philadelphia, and he shall file at least three copies in the Archives of the Synod. He shall also from time to time have the Printed Minutes bound in suitable volumes and deposited in the Archives of the Synod. The Stated Clerk shall be charged with the further duty of reporting to the Moderator any vacancies to be filled by him, and of any deaths in the Ministry that may occur, and of reporting to the Synod the expiration of the terms of appointment of its officers and Committees according to the Standing Rules.

11. The Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep a strict and accurate account of all the funds received and disbursed, showing what Presbyteries have paid or have not paid their assessments, and for what purpose the funds have been disbursed. He shall submit to the Synod annually, his book, together with a Report of the Receipts and expenditures, presenting vouchers for the same.

12. The Trustees. It shall be the duty of the Board of Trustees, as the Synods' medium, or agency, in all matters requiring the use or aid of the Civil Law, (to receive, take charge of, and manage to the best advantage, and account to Synod for, according to law, all property and estate belonging, or which may accrue and enure to this Synod; and they shall hold in trust, subject to the order of Synod, the said property, and all legacies and bequests which may be willed to the Synod in behalf of charitable and other objects under its control, and they shall make a full report, in the premises, whenever occasion or circumstance shall so require.

The Permanent Committees. It shall be the duty of any or all of 13. the Chairmen of the Permanent Committees, including the President of the Board of Regents of the Orphan's Home, if deemed advisable to arrange for, and to hold popular meetings in the interest of the respective cause they represent. These popular meetings, it held shall be in connection with, and at the time of the presentation of, the Report of the Committee, and they shall in no wise interfere with the Standing Orders of the Synod. And it shall be the rule, as far as practicable, to hear in this connection and at this time the Secretaries of the General Assembly, and other representative brethren, in the interest of the corresponding cause which they may represent. And it shall be the duty of the Chairmen of the Several Committees, in arranging for the aforesaid meetings, to correspond with the representative brethren, who are expected to be present prior to the meeting of Synod, as to the time when they are expected to be heard agreeably to the Standing Rules.

14. Special Orders. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee on Special Orders to confer with the Chairman of the Permanent Committees, and with the Moderator who shall be (Ex-officio) a member of this Committee, and to arrange as early in the meeting of Synod as possible a schedule of business, such schedule to be formed in such a way as to conform to all the Standing Orders of the Synod, and afterwards to fix the Special Orders that may arise, and report to Synod as often as the business before it may require. And all applications for Special Orders shall be referred by the Moderator to this Committee before action thereupon by the Synod.

15. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committees on the Records of Synod to examine the Official Records, and report with special reference to the condition of the same, and as to the neatness and faithfulness in the execution of the work, and whether or not the Records have been sent up and approved by the General Assembly.

16. It shall be the duty of the several Standing Committees on the Records of the Presbyteries to confer with the Stated Clerks of the Presbyteries whose Records they are appointed to examine before submitting their reports to the Synod in order that the Clerks may have opportunity to make explanations in regard to their Records before the matter is brought before the Synod. And after the Records are examined, the Chairmen of the Several Committees shall meet in Committee of the whole, and compare, classify and adjust to a common Standard or Judgment their criticisms and exceptions. They shall then elect one of their number who shall act as Chairman of the Committee of the whole, and who shall submit the Judgment or Criticisms of all the Committees on all the Records in his one Report to Synod.

17. It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee on Leave of Absence to receive and pass upon, before presenting their reports to Synod for approval, all excuses for absence from the last and present meeting of Synod, for tardiness, for absence without leave from the last meeting, and for leave of Absence from the present meeting All excuses shall be rendered to this Committee and this rule shall apply to all the members of Synod, except Foreign Missionaries, and infirm ministers who are not required to attend the meetings of their Presbyteries. It shall be the duty of this Committee to refuse Leave of Absence to any member, except for urgent reasons.

18. It shall be the duty of the ad interim Committee on Memorials, to write simply and briefly a sketch, and not an extended history of the deceased. It is designed for obvious reasons, that the sketch shall embrace only the chief dates and main facts in reference to the life, work and death of the deceased.

# III.-MISCELLANEOUS RULES.

19. It shall be the duty of each member, unless released by a vote of the Synod, when providentially prevented from attending the Synod, to address a letter to the Moderator stating reasons for his detention.

20. It shall be the duty of the Stated Clerks of the several Presbyteries to furnish the Stated Clerks of the Synod, when applied to with all necessary information required, and with a corrected roll of Ministers and their Post-Offices annually, and also a roll of the Elders, Deacons and Churches, with their Post-Offices once every five years. The Stated Clerks are enjoined to be careful, accurate and punctual in filling out all blanks sent to them, and in returning them to the Stated Clerk before the meeting of Synod.

21. It shall be the duty of all the members of Synod, and especially the Chairmen of Committees, in preparing written reports to be presented to the bedy, to write the same in a plain and legible handwriting, and with ink if possible. And it is desirable that the Chairmen of the Permanent Committees furnish the Stated Clerks with an extra copy, if possible, of their annual reports, respectively.

22. The roll shall be called at each meeting before final adjournment

and those who are absent without permission shall be noted by the Clerk as "absent without leave" and they shall be required to report to the Committee on Leave of Absence at the next meeting and answer for the irregularity.

23. It shall be a Standing Rule, until otherwise ordered that the Treasurer of Synod pay the expenses of the representative of Union Theological Seminary in attending the annual meetings of Synod-1906.

24. It shall be a Standing Rule that the Devotional Exercises at the opening of each day's sessions of Synod be put into the hands of the Standing Committee on Devotional Exercises—1906.

#### IV.-STANDING ORDERS.

The following Standing Orders shall be observed by the Synod:

(1) The Synodical Communion shall be held at eleven o'clock, a. m. of the second day without a sermon.

(2) The Memorials of the deceased Ministers shall be read immediately after the Synodical Communion Service.

(3) The Popular Meeting in the interest of Foreign Missions shall be held on the evening of the second day.

(5) The Popular Meeting in the interest of the Synod Orphans' Home shall be held at eleven o'clock on the morning of the third day.

(5) The Popular Meeting in the interest of Home Missions shall be held on the evening of the third day.
