

The Synod had a recess until 7 o'clock this evening.

After recess the Synodical prayer meeting was attended, and the several parts of the service were performed according to the previous arrangements.

The churches of Moscow and Caledonia having obtained the consent of the Presbytery of Newton, to which they belong, requested to have their relation transferred to the Presbytery of Cusquehanna.

Resolved, That the re west be granted.

Pesolved, further, that in granting the request, the Tynod do not intend to express any opinion in reference to the expediency or constitutionality of the proceedings of the Presbytery of Newton in receiving said churches.

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The following protest and complaint were received and ordered to be entered on the minutes, viz:-

We the subscribers, availing ourselves of a constitutional privilege, beg leave to protest against the decision of the Synod of New Jersey, by which that body refused to pass upon the minutes of the Presbyteries of Susquehanna, Newark, New Brunswick, Newton and Montrose, any opinion expressing approbation or disapprobation of the same, but postponed them until the next stated meeting.

Among the reasons of protest and complaint we state the following, viz:-

- 1. By Book of Disc. Chap. VII, sec. 1, "it is the duty of every judicatory above a church session, at least once a year to review the proceedings of the judicatory next below". Now we believe that " to review" implies and means expressly to pass judicially an act of approval or disapproval: and therefore, in sub sec. it it speaks of "recording their animadversion or censure". And in sub sec. iv it speaks of "reversing a judicial decision". It is clear, therefore, that in refusing to act, the most important duty of review and control has been neglected.
- 2. The minutes of the Presbytery of Susquehanna contain many and very important decisions in reference to matters of deep interest to churches within their bounds, and to the church at large, and to which the churches of that Presbytery are looking with anxiety to the Presbytery.

We therefore think the Synod were very specially called to the duty of review.

- 3. The Presbytery wished to have their minutes passed under review, as was their duty; and therefore the Presbytery was deprived of a right, by said vote of the Synod.
- 4. If Synods may postpone the performance of "the duty of review and control" for one year, we can see no reason why they may no postpone it for two or three years, or indefinitely, and thus one chief object of Synodical existence is lost, "to review the records of Presbyteries and approve or censure them". (Form of Govt. Chap. XI) Should the General Assembly tolerate such neglect, and refusal to review, our beautiful and efficient system of spiritual supervision is destroyed, and the main dependence of our churches as to means for the guardianship of her purity and order is taken away.

For those reasons, and such as may hereafter be presented to the Assembly, we complain against said decision, and request the General Assembly to settle the princei

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For these reasons, and such as may hereafter be presented to the issembly, we complain against said decision, and request the feneral issembly to settle the principle of constitutional duty by deciding on this complaint.

Resolved, that Messrs. Chester and Mirtland, ministers, and Mr. Prudden, elder, be a committee to make arrangements for the Missionary meeting and for the celebration of the Lord's "Supper at the next stated meeting of the Synld.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Tynod be tendered to the inhabitants of the borough of Taston for their kindness and hospitality to its members during their sessions.

Resolved, That the several Presbyteries under the care of this Synod be directed to take measures to send up to the next issembly agreeably to the order of the last, the brief abstracts of doctrine, by the adoption of which their churches are accustomed to admit members to their communion.

Ordered, That the janitor's bill, amounting to five dollars, be paid by the Treasurer from the funds in his hands.

resolved. That a copy of the proceedin s of this lynod in regard to irregularities in church order, be forwarded to the next General Assembly, agreeably to the directions of the last assembly.

The resolution of Dr. Junkin were taken up, and a motion was made to postpone the further consideration of them till the next meeting of the Synod; whereupon, the previous uestion being called, it was decided in the negative, and the resolutions were indefinitely postponed.

The Stated Clork reports to the Synod of New Jersey that according to direction very soon after the last meeting, he presented to Fr. Albert Baldwin, the young man whose name occurs on our records as having s ved the minutes, the thanks of the Tynod, and also offered the sum of sixty dollars to remunerate him for his loss. Hr. Baldwin hesitated whether he should accept the above named sum until June last, at which time it was pald over to him and a receipt taken. The Stated Clerk also reports that, agreeably to the direction of Synod, he has procured a transcript of the lost minutes. from the copy in the possesion of the Synod of New York: that for this transcript he is accountable in the sum of fifty dollars, which sume is believed to be no more than a reasonable remuneration to the transcriber, estimated according to the ordinary allowance of clerks in counting houses.

All which is respectfully submitted.

Although in ordinary ircumstances it might be deemed unnecessary, if not unsuitable, for Synods to express judgments on the proceedings of the highest judic tory of the church, yet, as the doings of the last assembly have been made the subject of much animadversion and even of great severity of censure, it may be due to truth and justice to express the opinion of this Synod in regard to some of the most prominent acts of that body. This becomes the more advisable because the expressed opinions of the inferior judicatories may furnish an important indication of the course most proper to be pursued in future, therefore,

- 1. Resolved, that the plan of Union adopted by the Assembly of 1601 was formed without any legitimate authority; that it was unconstitutional; that its operation for a number of years past, has been injurious to the Interests of the Presbyterian Church; and that the last Assembly, in abrogating that Plan, fulfilled an obvious and important duty to the churches under its care.
- 2. Resolved, that although verespect and love the Congregational churches of New England and elsewhere, who accord with us in the fundamental articles of the Christian faith, as sister churches, and desire to maintain Christian intercourse with them, yet in the judgment of this Syno., the incorporating of churches formed on Congregational principles with the Presbyterian Church, at whatever time,

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or by whatever means, ought to be regarded as an unnatural union, which could not fail of interfering with the orderly and confortable operation of our system, and which ought by no means to be continued.

- 3. Resolved, that upon the principle of the preceding resolution, the Synod of the Testern Reserve never had any constitutional connection with the Presbyterian Church; and therefore, that the General Assembly in declarin, said Synod no longer connected with our body, formed a decision equally just and conformable to the spirit of our Form of Government.
- Resolved, That in the judgment of this Synod, the act of the General Assembly, declaring the Synods of Utica, Geneva and Genesee to be no longer connected with cut body, was equally just and proper with the act of the Assembly in the case of the Synod of the Wostern Reserve; for, whether the said Sinods derived their origin from the Plan of 1801, as many of their churches undoubtedly did: or, as has been alleged, chiefly from the act of the Assembly of 1808, by which two large bodies of congregational ministers and churches were received, retaining their congregational character, as constituent parts of the then Synod of Albany, they cannot be considered as occupying, on account of their alleged origin, any more favorable ground than the Synod of Western Reserve. On the contrary, the act of 1808, being a still more palpable and extraordinary violation of our ecclesiastical constitution, than even the Plan of 1801. the former furnishes a basis even less tenable than the latter for the support of a Presbyterian body. To which may be added the notorious fact that a large number of the churches and ministers composing the said Synods were not only Congregational when first irregularly introduced into the Presbyterian church, but still retain that form of Government.
- 5. Resolved, That in the judgment of this Synod, the decisions of the Feneral Assembly, in declaring that the four discound Synods never had been constitutionally united with the Presbyterian church, and cannot now be considered as connected with our body, ought by no means to be rescinded; nor any part of those Synods to be restored to membership with the General Assembly in any other way than that pointed out by the General Assembly in page 445 of the printed Minutes, viz: by any Presbytery, if such there be, strictly Presbyterian in doctrine and order, and by any

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individual churches or ministers, of like character, separating themselves from their Congregational neighbors and making application, with proper evidence of their character and wishes, as the case may be, either to the next General Assembly, or to some convenient Presbytery or Synod, authorized to take order thereon.

Resolved, That the Synod has heard with much interest, Mr. Johnson's account of the state, prospects, and importance of the mission at Rio Janeiro, for the benefit of seamen.

Resolved, that the Synod deeply regrets that the American Seaman's riend Society has been constrained to suspend its missionary efforts in that country.

resolved. That the Synod would cordially recommend the American Seamen's Friend Society to the patronage of our churches; and would earnestly express the hope that the liberality of the Christian public will speedily enable that society to recommence the important mission in which Mr. Johnson has been for two years engaged.

The committee appointed to examine the "inutes of the General Assembly, and to report whether they contain anything requiring the action of the Synod, beg leave to report:

That in the opinion of the committee, there is nothing which demands peculiarly the attention of this body, with the exception of the resolution on pages 496 and 497 of the printed "inutes of the "ssembly, enjoining upon the Synod of New Jersey to take special order in regard to the subject of irregularities in church order, charged by common fame upon some of their Presbyteries.

The committee find but two Presbyteries within the bounds of this Synod to which the above injunction can have any particular application, viz., the Presbyteries of Susquehanna and Montrose. As the former of these Presbyteries has already acted on this subject, the committee suppose that nothing further is re uisite in respect to that Presbytery. The Presbytery of Montrose has reported five Congregational churches within its bounds and now forming a part of said Presbytery. With respect to this Presbytery the committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions, viz:

- 1. Te regard the Presbytery of Montrose as having, up to the present time, acted only in accordan e with the arrangements entered into with this Mynod in 1821; which arrangements have been in authorized operation up to this time.
- 2. To enjoin upon the Presbytery of Montrose to take order, as soon as it can conveniently be done, to bring all the churches within its bounds to an entire conformity with our standards, and to inform such churches that they can retain their present connection with the Presbytery on no other terms.

In giving the foregoing direction to the Presbytery of Montrose, the Synod have no desire to interfere with the friendly relations hitherto existing between the Presbytery and the Congregational churches under its care, farther than to separate them from their present connection, so that they shall not be considered a constituent part of said resbytery, nor be entitled to a vote or representation in it.

- 3. That the narrative of the state of religion be read by Mr. J. M. Ogden, the chairman of the committee appointed to prepare the said narrative.
  - 4. That a brief address be made by Hr. Yeomans.
  - 5. That Mr. Comfort offer a prayer.
- 6. That Mr. Henry read a Psalm or Hymn and pronounce the benediction.

Whereas, the Presbytery of Susquehanna now covers so large an extent of territory as to render it not only inconvenient, but impracticable for some of its members to attend its regular meetings, and for the Presbytery to superintend its churches: therefore,

- 1. Resolved, That the Rev. Isaac W. Platt, the Rev. David Harrowar, and the Rev. Edwin Bronson, with the church of Bath, of the Presbytery of Susquehanna; together with the Rev. John H. Reddington, and the churches of Caledonia and Moscow, of the Presbytery of Newton, be, and they hereby are, erected into a new Presbytery, to be called the Presbytery of Caledonia.
- 2. Resolved, That the said Presbytery hold its first meeting in the village of Bath, on the 3d Tuesday of November, next, at 6 o'clock p.m., and that it be opened with a sermon by the Rev. David Harrowar, or in case of his absence, by the oldest minister present.

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The Synod of New Jersey, having been permitted again to assemble to look at the state of the churches under their care, and to deliberate respecting their interests, may well suppose that the inquiry will again be made to them, by the friends of Zion, "Watchman, what of the night?"

In attemptin to answer this in uiry, in relation to the events of the past year, the Synod feel that it is no small cause of thankfulness that the churches under their care have enjoyed to so great a degree the stated ministrations of the Word and the ordinances of the Gospel.

Amid all our unworthiness, few if any, have been left to a famine of the Word. Perhaps in no former year have the churches been more generally supplied with pastors. They have had line upon line and precept upon precept. There is reason to believe also, that with few exceptions, the external attendance upon the means of grace has rather increased than diminished. Nor has God left us without special, nay signal, tokens of his gracious presence in some of our churches.

To those especially of New Brunswick and Boundbrock, in the Presbytery of New Brunswick, the past has emphatically been a "year of the right hand of the Most High". To the former of these churches there have been added as the fruits of the most signal and general outpouring of the Spirit of God upon it, more than 120 members, and to the latter more than 100.

There have been very few indeed of the churches connected with the Presbytery of Newark, where there have not been cheering and decided Indications of the special presence of the Holy Spirit. In some of these churches the work of the Lord has been more extensive and powerful. They have been permitted to rejoice in a large accession of hopeful converts. In other churches the work has been more silent and less extensive in its influence. As the result of these visits of mercy, the churches of Caldwell, Succasunna and Paterson have been enlarged by the addition of members to the number of from fifty to seventy each. In the church at Bloomfield. from which no particular report has been received, the number of hopeful converts is believed to have been still greater. On the churches of Hanover, Parsippany; on several of those within the city of Newark, and also on those of Newfoundland and North Hardiston, the (racious influence has decended, and numbers have been added to the Lord, while believers have been encouraged and quickened.

The Spirit of the Lord has also been poured out on the churches of Connecticut Farms, New Providence and Liberty Corner, in the Presbytery of Elizabethtown. And in the churches of Lower Mt. Bethel, Mansfield and Greenwich, in the Presbytery of Newton; and in those of Montrose and Honesdale, in the Presbytery of Montrose, revivals to some extent have been enjoyed. In other churches from which no revival has been reported, there has been a gradual accession of members, and in some more than usual sericusness now prevails. For these tokens of good, the Synod feel called apon to offer their devout thanksgiving to the Great head of the church, that in the midst of deserved wrath he has remembered mercy.

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In the churches generally throughout our bounds, the Synod are gratified to learn that Sabbath Schools not only exist, but are increasingly numerous and prosperous; and that attention has been paid by the pastors generally to the catechetical and Biblical instruction of the youth of their respective charges. Deeply impressed with a sense of the vital importance of this part of pastoral outy, the Synod would renewedly commend it to the particular attention of every pastor.

The monthly concerts for prayer have been generally observed, though in by far too many cases, former complaints of indifference and negligence in attending them on the part of many professing Christians are still repeated.

It is a most encouraging indication for good that from almost all our churches we hear of an increase of interest in the great cause of benevolence. The Synod are more and more convinced that the time has come when every friend of the Redeemer is called upon to feel more deeply for a world that lieth in wickedness, and to engage in greater earnest in the work of seeking its conversion to God; and they are pained to learn that in any of cur churches the spirit of covetousness and worldliness should still so steel the hearts and close the hands of those who profess to be the Lord's stewards, against the loud and reiterated appeals that are made to them for their aid and their prayers in behalf of the perishing.

A spirit of enlarged benevolence is not less necessary to the growth of piety in the heart, than it is imperiously demanded of every friend of Sion, in view of the present aspects of divine providence towards the church and the world.

Thile the cause of temperance in/several of our churches has been making progress during the past year, and has been promoted with zeal and success, intemperance continues to be one of the crying evils of the day in most of our congregations, and in some is said to be increasing. Notwithstanding all the light which has been poured upon the wide spread miseries and suffering occasioned by the manufacture and sale of ardent spirits, distilleries are still in successful operation in many of our congregations, and those disposed to indulge in habits of intemperance find the means of gratification at hand. On this subject, therefore, the Synod again feel called upon to lift their marning voice, urging upon all the members of our cnurches and all the friends of humanity to

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unite their efforts with still more determined zeal in endeavoring to stay the progress of this deadly evil. And as evidence of the manner in which God regards this cause, it is stated that in a single congregation where the Lord has poured cut his spirit during the past year, the number of subscribers to the pledge of total abstinence was almost immediately doubled.

The Sabbath continues to be desecrated to a most lamentable extent, particularly upon our public highways, although the Synod are gratified to learn that on one of our most public routes there has been an improvement in this respect, by the determination on the part of one of our most important transportation companies no longer to furnish the means of travelling on the Sabbath. This is an example in favor of the Sabbath which we could ish might be universally followed, and we cannot doubt but that the hap lest results would ensue.

The Theological Seminary at Princeton continues to prosper, and has numbered among its candidates for the ministry during the past year as many as 142.

The College of New Jersey also continues in a highly flourishing condition, and has had during the past year in all 240 students, 40 or 50 of whom were members of the church. The Bible, Tract, "ducation, nd foreign Missionary Societies of the College have been well sustained; and though there has been no special attention to the subject of religion, yet there have been one or two cases of hopeful conversion.

Thile we have abundant cause for gratitude in view of the past, we cannot forget that there remaineth yet very much land to be possessed. Many of our churches are reported as being in a low and declining state as regarding vital piety. Irreligion abounds. Sculs almost within sight of our sanctuaries are throughing the road to eternal death. "e are called upon to be deeply humble before God in view of our past apathy and abuse of our spiritual privileges. And while we have such abundant evidence or God's readiness to help, and power to save, it becomes the watchmen on the walls of Jion, and the elders and members of our churches, one and all, to awake and put on strength in the work of the Lord, and as we look around upon the multitudes among us still under the reign of spiritual death, to unite with greater fervency than ever in the prayer, 'Come from the four winds, o breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live".

Griffin, from the Berkshire Association, Mass: That on the 14th day of November they dissolved the pastoral relation between the Rev. Sylvester Haton and the congregation of Paterson, and on the same day cismissed him with a view to his joining the Presbytery of North River: - That on the 31st day of Jan'y 1837, they organized the Tentral Presbyterian Church in the city of Newark: - That on the same day, they received the Rev. Charles Hoover from the Presbytery of Llizabethtown, and installed him Pastor of said church: - That on the 21st day of February they received the Rev. John F. Clark from the Presbytery of Newton, and on the same day installed him pastor of the congregation in Paterson: - That on the 18th day of April they dissolved the pastoral relation between the Rev. Henry Axtell and the 2d congregation in Orange, and likewise the pastoral relation between the Rev. Peter Kanouse and the 1st Free Church in Newark, and on the same day dissolved the church at Stoney Brook: - That on the 6th day of June they installed the Rev. Joseph C. Moore pastor of the Congregation in Succasunna: - That on the 4th day of October they dismissed the "ev. Albert "illiams with a view to his joining the Presbytery of South Alabama: - That on the same day they erased the name of the congregation of Thippany from their list of churches, that church having irregularly withdrawn to connect themselved with a Congregational Association: - That on the same day they received under their care Joseph S. Gallagher, a licentiate of the 3d Presbytery of New York, and on the 12th of October ordained and installed him paster of the 2d congregation in Orange.

David Harrower of the Presbytery of Chemung, the Rev. E. H. Snowden of the Presbytery of Chemung, the Rev. Edwin Bronson of the Presbytery of Chemango, and the Rev. Isaac W. Pratt of the Presbytery of Bath.

The Presbytery would further inform the Synod that at their last stated meeting they appointed a committee to visit the churches of At ens. Smithfield and Pike, and to inform them that their connection with us is unconstitutional and to advise them to take such form of organization as they prefer, and if it shall appear that they prefer to conform to the constitution of the Presbyterian Church, the said committee was directed to proceed to their regular organization, and as this committee has not yet reported, and it is unknown to the Presbytery what course the said churches will adopt, their names are not inserted in the reported list of churches, as connected with this presbytery.
