New Brunswick, New Jersey October 19, 1852 The Synod of New Jersey met in the 1st Presbyterian Church in the city of New Brunswick, New Jersey on the 3rd Tuesday in October 1852 t 3 o'clock p.m. and was opened with a Sermon by the Nev. S. Beach Jones, D.D. the Moderator from 2 Thess. II 13:14.





No. 1. The committee appointed at the last meeting of the Synod, and to when was referred the subject connected with the complainte against the Presbytery of Tewton, presented the following report, which was accepted and adopted.

The committee to whom were referred the complaint of Daniel Hulshizer and Robert 9. Vennedy against the Presbytery of Newton-the complaint of the session of the church of Stewartsville against the same Presbytery, and the complaint of the Tev.

Mesars. McWilliam and Townley against the same Presbytery, with directions to review the papers and records in the ese complained of and to decide in the same and report to the present meeting of Synod respectfully report.

That on the 6th day of July 1850, the committee met in the school house between Greenwich and Stewartsville and continued in session until the 5th of the same month. The masters and the members of the sersions of the two churches were present during all the meetings, and in each other's presence gave whatever information was sought in addition to the records and documents in the hands of the correlatee. It was not thought expedient or necessary to sek the Presbytery of Newton to be represented at this meeting of the committee as the nature of the complaint was such that if the subjects of difference between the original parties could be emicably adjusted, any reference to the action of the Presbytery might be avoided as this result was happily offected it precluded the necessity of entering upon such an accumination of the course of the Presbytary as would have made it proper that they should have been represented before the committee. After reading all the records and papers belonging to the complaints, the respective sessions wers fully heard and every opportunity afforded for consultation and conference among the parties and with the committee.

The committee upon a careful consideration of the case came to the conclusion that the following principles would determine the general questions in controversy.

- 1. The records of a session should, as a general rule contain only the proceedings of the session—such proceedings being the only proper subjects of review and control by the higher courts, and the business of the Congretation and church whon transacted in their respective meetings having no proper connection with the business of the session.
- 2. Yet there may be occusion in which it is proper for a session in their descretion to state upon their minutes what has been done by the congregation or church in their respective meetings. In such cases the record should consist of no more than a copy or synopsis of the proceedings quoted as they appear on the face of the original minutes without addition by comment explanation or otherwise, as if part of the record.

The committee were then disposed to recommend such an amendment of the historical record contained in the Greenwich session book respecting the formation of the Stewertsville church, as would make it accord more strictly with the above principles and accordingly suggested a plan for that purpose. To this proposition the objection was made by the Greenwich session that it would require such a mutilation of their book of records, as they were not at liberty to consent to. The committee then endeavored to irame such a minute as without referring to the details of the woints of controbersy would be assented to by both parties as a ground of conciliation. This resulted in the unanimous agreement of the committee to the following minute, which having been separately assented to by the sessions of the churches of Greenwich and Stewartsville was adopted, and according to the terms of the agreement entered upon the respective sessional records by the committee.

Stewartsville, July 8th 1852

The committee appointed by the Synod of New Jersey, at their sessions in Trinogton, Actober 1871, on the complaint of icbert S. Mennedy, Pariel Hulshiper and other against the Proceditory of Mewton in reference to the session book of the church of Greenwich, after examining all the papers, documents and minutes and fully hearing the sessions of the churches of Greenwich and Stewartsville, are unenimpusly of opinion that the whole conduct of the errons who engaged in, and carried out the organization of the church at "tewartsville, so far as we have been able to discover, was proper, unobjectionable and praise worthy and deserving of commendation rather than censure or disapprobation. And we hereb direct this minute to be entared on the session books of both the (reenwich and Stewartsville churches, as a final settlement of the whole matters referred to us. And that the complainants do rithdraw their complaints. to the Synod of New Jersey, which have been referred to us.

NC. 2 The committee appointed by the Tynod at its last meeting to enquire into the condition and prospects of the missions in the entire missionary fields within the bounds of this Symid with the view of representing the case fairly to the Board of Missions, and if necessary to make the facts in the case known through the press to the people of (od, beg leave to recert.

That soon after the rigins of the Synod a circular was addressed by the committee to the stated clerk of each Preabyters connected with this body, with the view of obtaining from ther all the information of which they might be professed with reference to the state of the missionery fields within their respective bounds—to which circular answers were received which serve to show that notwithstanding all that has been done in years past for the establishment of the wingdom of Christ, within the bounds of this Symod, there remains the et very much land to be possessed. The idea appears to have taken possession of the minds of many that there is but little if any necessity for missionary action of a domestic character on the eastern side of the Alleghany mountains—that all the means of the church should be applied to the support of gospel ordinances, and the extension of the church, South and Touthwest, and Test

inasmuch as so many new and feeble charches have been organized in these sections of the country, and so many large and important fields are now awaiting religious cultivation. Your committee most fully coincide with those who believe that every care should be token of that interesting field which stretches out to the Bocky Tountains, and thence to the shores of the Pacific and that the church with which we are connected should furnish a fer greater amount of means for the jurgose of granting gospel privalence to those the have gone but from the homes and the churches of their childhood, so that they and their may not be led away by error, and fill into the sname of the devil. Through the influence of the mid which has been extended many portions of the vest western wilderness have been made to bud and blossom as the rose, and many have been made jeyful in the house of their pilgrings.

But there are other sections of the country where there is at this moment as loud a call for missionary aid and as much necessity for missionary effort as in the fouth and "est--nay it may be said that at our own foors or within our own borders we may find fields which need cultivation of a noral character as much as any which lie along our western rivers, or even on the sides of, or beyong the Fooky Torntains.

The report from the stated Clerks of the several Prechyteri's of this Synod show us that there are calls for missionary labor in all the Presbyteries, and some of them inform us that there is no probability for years to come that all the charches within their bounds will become celf-supporting. This is especially the case with the Presbytaries of New Brunswick-- est Jersey-- Susquehanns and Luzerne. The other Presbyteries have missionary fields within their borders, but none as extensive as these to which reference has just been made. It is very true that a smaller amount of money has been expended than formerly as will appear from a tabular statement furnished by the Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Sissions, (to which we shall presently refer,) and the hope is indulyed that still smaller amounts

will be found to be necessary for the support of feeble churches In there districts. Imasmuch however as there are two large missionary fields, within the bounds of the Synod, touit, the Pines of New Jersey stratehing along the / Clantic hore. and within the bounds of the Prosbyteries of Ter Brunswick. Burlington and fest Jorsey, and the appl fields and agal region of Pennsylvanic, within the bounds of the Prosbyteries of Cusquehanna and Luzerne, but perficularly the letter, there is little ground to believe that the season is at hone then all the churches in these fields will be able to support the aspel without aid from abroad, and the idea of "yetting ria" of these churches, to use the language of the last report of the Board of Fiscions (page 32) because they are fieble, and comnot sustain themselves, is one which wear corrittee feel assured the Symod of Tew Jersey will never entertain -- no -- not for an hour.

Your committee have preatly repretted to find that there is a disposition in some quarters to compare the Symod of New Jersey as a large and influential "yound with other Symods and then to express surprise that the Symod of New Jersey should call for so much assistance to sustain certain charches, within their bounds, without takin: into the account at all, perhaps from entire ignorance on the subject that the two large missionary fields to which allusion has been made, are as destitute, and as unable to erect churches and mustain peopsi ordinances as any region of their size "est of the "ississippi River. Nor are there any missionary fields in any of the Synods on the Atlantic slope, so far as your committee before, which require so tach missionary aid as these—none being in so destitute a condition.

The people inhabiting the region which is describated "the Pines" are generally Colliers—and for the most part, poor. The population is deathered and the soil is unproductive—and it is withal, so far as religious matters are conserned, very needy, and there is no reason to suppose that it will be other—

wise for a long time to come. The larger portion of these dwelling in the "Goal Temion" are miners--dependent for their dally bread upon the demands elsewhere for conl -- nd although a great deal has been said about the mineral results of the state of Pennsylvania, and surprise has been expressed that such a region as the coal region does not suctain the scarel. it should be borne in mind that the larger eart of this region is owned by capitalists reciding within the bounds of the Sympler of New York and Filedelphia -- the many of them ove their yealth or a part of it, to the sweat of the brow of the coor winer who toils on in their employment, and that by his labor, they are enabled to swell the amount of treir donations, without a thing the being spent upon the fact that the foundation of their ability in this repard is laid in the coal bods. Some of those. It is true, who are interested in the lands of the cost regions, (and the fact should be stated to their credit.) have eene forward with a liber lity, which does ther great honor, and alded in the erection of churches and the run ort of the cornel. But such instances of liberality are rare.

The statement which has been furnished to your committee by the corresponding accretary of the Board of Tissions shows that the region to which reference is now made is a very needy one. The am unt of money maid out for the support of feeble churches in the "knod of New Jersey for the years 1850-1 was \$5397--of which sum 5740 were expended in the Prophytery of Susquehanna. and 3156. in the Presbyter of Luzerne. leaving \$3075 to be divided among the other rix Prenbuteries. In the years 1651-2 (for 11 onths) the sum of (4300 was expended -in the Presbytery of Musquehanna 3430, being a deduction from the previous year of 2310, and in the Presbytery of Luzerne. \$1285, being less by 3299, then in the year proceeding -- giving hope that the churches are b coming better able to enstain the respel among themselves, but still showing beyond all evil. that they cannot support the gospel without assistance. Judging from the past, a long time past clapse are they will become self supporting. The same reduction is seen upon comparing the two tables furnished by the corresponding secretary. for instance.

"Tunkhannock, the next of justice in Tyoming county is now vecant. It needs an able non with an oilerance of \$100. The congregation has been formed for twenty peops—has suffered from frequent changes of ministers and out to by no means to be as lected."

"Newton long known as Falls, is a farming di triet, the land being only lately taken up. It has a pastor -- a house of worship and a manse -- is steadily growing and will need missionary aid to the amount of, at least "100 for some years."

"Lackavanna will still need aid, though or "intsten, with which it is somected, is growing, the nope is that the amount will be reduced next year."

"Hanover, is an ele congregation, but very feeble. It has a rich coal bed--and with swificient aid, say \$150, a minister might be placed here who would gather a good--almost a relf-sustaining convegation."

"Wyoming, has a pastor and a manac, and is about to ar at a house of worship and should be handromely sustained by the Board for the next two scare."

Of Berwick it is said that "the prospects are encouraging and a reduction of missionary aid is contemplated in the course of a year or two."

Of <u>Convinghos</u> it is said that it has a missionary and that in view of the destitution which prevails in its borders, it would be sinful to remove the missionary or reduce the appropriation at present."

. "Beaver Mondow will need marist nee continued to it, though the hope is indulged that the way will soon be open to reduce the appropriation."

White Waven is represented as needing \$ 200 for some time.

It is stated that every effort will be made to dispense altogether with missionary aid at Tanaqua.

Schurlfill Malley and Port C shor are represented as standing in meed of assistance.

of <u>Donaldson</u> it is said, "the lowest depression seems to have been reached, two unfinishes houses of worship stand yournfully and empty houses and described nines. The prospects of the place are brightening, we need a rood missionary, and the full amount of \$200 for his support."

Thus much for the Presbytery of Lagerne.

The stated clerk of the Presbytery of <u>uncuehanua</u> rays, "there are at present four charches under the care of the Presbytery receiving aid from the Board, vic:

In the Probleteries of New Brans ield, and Parsey and Durlington, your of mittee have said that there is a large amount of destitution. There are churches in these Presbyteries which cannot be sust ined without the aid of the Board, and although efforts may be made a conditionalities. This a view to the reduction of appropriations, as it is noted will be the case, still they must be assisted, or the ground of in they occur, must be abandones to others who may be more particular in regard to its cultivation.

With respect to the Preco, tory of jew premovick, the stated clerk of that porposses, that "Goshen, Tous River, Coder Trick, Squan Will ge and Thank liver, Canclester and the vicinity of Threwsbury are places where aid has been needed, and in root of them received in yours part." These churches must be assisted in order to their continuance. And the range remark may be made with regard to some of the carches in the relationry of Enrlington. The central portion of the territory within the bounds of this Presbytery says its stated clerk, "belongs to the Pines long and familiarly known as a very destitute Michigaany field --- 'he population lo soattered and migratury, consisting chiefly of poor people-Colliers etc. This is one of those fields, the wants of which must always strongl appeal to Christian faith, but can never be expected to yield very large or encouraging hervests. Can the church reduce to supply the destitutions of a territory which the thus circumscribes?"



And this is an enquiry which the church must answer. Will she answer it in the affirmative? For the honor or religion we hope not.

With few exceptions the churches connected with this synod have enjoyed during the past year much external prosperity. Their temporal affairs appear to be in an unusually flourishing condition. Several new church edifices have been erected, others have been enlarged and improved, several parsonages have been built, and at the same time contributing to other religious purposes particularly to the Boards of our own church have been steadily increasing. Bible Classes and Sabbath Schools have been senerally well sustained, and attendance upon the ordinary means of prace has been large and regular.

It is a matter for remark and thankfulness that in these dayes of defection from "the faith nee delivered to the Caints-" defection on the one hand toward ritualism, and on the other towards radicalism, the attachment of our people to the doctrines, and order of our own time henored church is not distinishing. Presbyterianism as taught and practiced by our fathers, seems to be regarded with increasing confidence as one of the most important elements in our country conservation of a true religion, a pure morality and a sound public sentiment.

As evidences of this attachment to remains Presbyterianism we may refer particularly first to a growing interest through—out our synod on the subject of Church Txtension. The different Presbyteries seems to be awakening to a sense of their responsibility and duty in this matter. Toward new charches have been organized with in the limits of old and established congregations and in those parts of the Synod that are Missionary fields the work is prosecuted with such vigor and success as to create a call for additional laborers.



Inother striking mark of confidence in, and attachment to the good "old paths" is an increasing effort to have sound religions instruction associated with the recular education of our youth. Parochial Schools and Presbyterian Academies have been established in various parts of the Syned, and they are generally in a flourishing condition. Thatever may be the opinions of individuals as to the general practicability of the parochial school system, all must rejoice at the indication which their establishment affords of an earnost desire to impart to our gouth a sound religious education. Interest on this subject is not confined however to those portions of the Synod where schools strictly denominational have been organized.

In other quarters where circumstances are such as seem to render the establishment of such schools impracticable, our people are making carnest efforts to secure the end in view in the way which appears to them most available.

The spiritual condition of our churches presents such cause for cratitude and at the same time such for humiliation. God has been graciously misased to nour out his sairit abundantly on several of our churches in different parts of the Synod, and we record the fact with joy and thankfulness. "e may mention particularly the church at Flemins ton. in the Presbytery of Taritan-the church of Connectifut Farms in the Presbytery of elizabethtown -- the 1st church of New Brunswick in the Probatery of New Brunewick, and two of the churches in the Procedutery of assauchanne. In several other parts of the Synod the spirit of grace has seen especially present exciting an unusual interest in religious things awakening and converting sinners are reviving the people of fod to a more entire and hearty dedication of themselves to Cod's eryvice, of our churches menerally however, we commut thus speak... "ost of them have just reason to nourm over their coldness and their learness. Motivithstanding external presperity, they have experienced little of that joy which the righteous on Earth as well as the angels in heaven feel over the sinner that reguteth. Many of the professed followers of the Lamb are

ness of riches and the last of other thin, s, and manifest little seal for the spiritual welfate of themselves and others, and withal little sorrow and contrition on account of their lack of evidence of vital picty. The standard of practical religion in many of our churches is deflorably low and get they are therewith deploably content. 's intimably connected with this low state of picty, there are indications of a growing inattention to the subject of family religion. There is reason to fear that in many of our household family workship and the direct religious instruction of children and servents it to be a great extent neglected—"any parents seem to be depending on Sabbath Schools and parochial schools to do the work which God has peculiarly imposed upon themselves—"training up their children in the nurture and admendition of the Lord."

In regard to the subject of Temper nee with in our bounds it appears that while the ravages of intemperance have letterly been fearfully on the increase the friends of morality and religion are at the present time arousing themselves to a renewed and vigorous effort not only to arrest but to banish the scourge from the community. In this good work the members of our churches gener lly are found taking a prominent and active part.

The Presbytery further report, that on the 22nd of October 1851, this Synod transferred the church of Allentown with its paster, the Ecv. Henry Perkins to this Presbytery—that on the 30th of April 1852, they received Fr. George W. Butler a condidate from the Presbytery of Wolston, and on the 12th of October, dismissed him to put himself under the care of the Presbytery of Woston—that on the 10th of May. they dismissed the Pev. Jerse B. Davis to Join the Presby—tery of Mew Brunswick—that on the 12th of October they received the Tev. lichard B. estbrook from the Fourth Presby—tery of Philadelphia, and on the same day received under their care "r. James Ttebbins a licentiate from the Presby—tery of Troy.
