Morristown, New Jersey October 18, 1859

The Synod of New Jersey met according to adjournment in the First Presbyterian Church and was opened with a Sermon from Matthew 9:35 by the Rev. James T. English, the Moderator.

After public worship the Synod was constituted by prayer.

Resolved that it be the order that the Synod meet at 9 a.m.- to have a recess at 12:30 p.m.- to meet at 2:30 p.m.- to have a recess at 5 p.m. and to meet at 7:15 p.m.

Synod then had a recess until 7:15 p.m.

At the close of the recess the Synod met when the Annual Sermon on Foreign Missions was preached by the Rev. M. J. Hickok from Luke 24:46-47. Mr. Lourie made an address, etc.

Committee of Bills and overtures (file). Meet 8:30 tomorrow morning and afterwards, etc., their own adjournment.

Resolution about Choctaws. Unanamous.

Rev. B. J. Lowe, Synod of Ohio, Rev. H. F. Hickok, Albany, Rev. H. I. Coe, Illinois, Rev. C. F. Massy, Missionary from Southern India, and Rev. McElivy, Particular Synod of Reformed Dutch Church of New York.

Resolved, that if the way be opened for the reception of the Choctaw Mission by our Board of Foreign Missions, that this Synod pledge themselves as far as in them lies, that it shall not be wanting in means to sustain it.

Synod then adjourned to meet tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. Concluded with prayer.

Wednesday Morning 9 o'clock

Synod met pursuant to adjournment and was opened with prayer- present as before.

Order of the day for 10:30 o'clock to hear Rev. H. I. Coe, then Dr. Van Rensselaer, then Dr. Happenset.

Committees on file.

Resolved, that a committee of three be appointed to examine the rules passed last year as recorded on page 145 and to report. Murray, Baird and Marsh, Committee.

Burlington unánamously chosen next place of meeting.

The Moderator of this Synod the Rev. John Chester and the Rev. Dr. Van Rensselaer were appointed a committee to make arrangements for the religious exercises of the Synod.

Committee on Marriage laws reported through Rev. Mr. Chandler, that it in their opinion would be better not to appear as a religious body before the Legislation and motion was made to discharge the committee. Pending the discussion on this subject the order of the day was taken up- when the Rev. H. I. Coe, Church Extension Committee addressed the Synod. Dr. Van Rensselaer, Corresponding Secretary Board of Education. Dr. Happensett, Corresponding Secretary Board of Domestic Missions. Rev. George Sheldon in behalf of the American Bible Society.

Dr. Magie, Presbytery of Passaic, Rev. G. Sheldon, Elizabethtown, N. G. Parke, Luzerne, De Veure, New Brunswick, Baldwin and Martin, Elizabethtown, G. M. S. Blauvelt, Passaic, Mr. M. Little, elder, New Providence, Presbytery of Elizabethtown, H. W. Hunt, Newton, appeared, etc. Dr. Maclean, New Brunswick appeared, Mr. Brewster Presbytery of Passaic

Rev. James H. Dwight of the Synod of New York and New Jersey was invited to sit as a corresponding member. Mr. Dwight addressed the Synod in reference to the circulation of the Bible in the Turkish empire.

Resolution in regard to Boards, etc. (file).

Committee on religious exercises reported (file).

Resolution respecting the Historical Almanac (file).

Committee on next Synod's religious exercises reported that Dr. McGill be appointed preacher on Foreign Missions and Dr. Stewart alternate.

Statistical Reports read.

Rev. N. H. Broughton, Synod of West Tennessee, Rev. E. S. Vancleve, Methodist Church, corresponding members.

Committee on Treasurer's Account (on file), also report on the subject of assessment.

Recess until 2:30 p.m.

At the close of the recess Synod convened and proceeded to business.

Narrative read and accepted and ordered to be read at the Synodical Prayer Meeting this evening.

Mr. Taylor appeared in Synod.

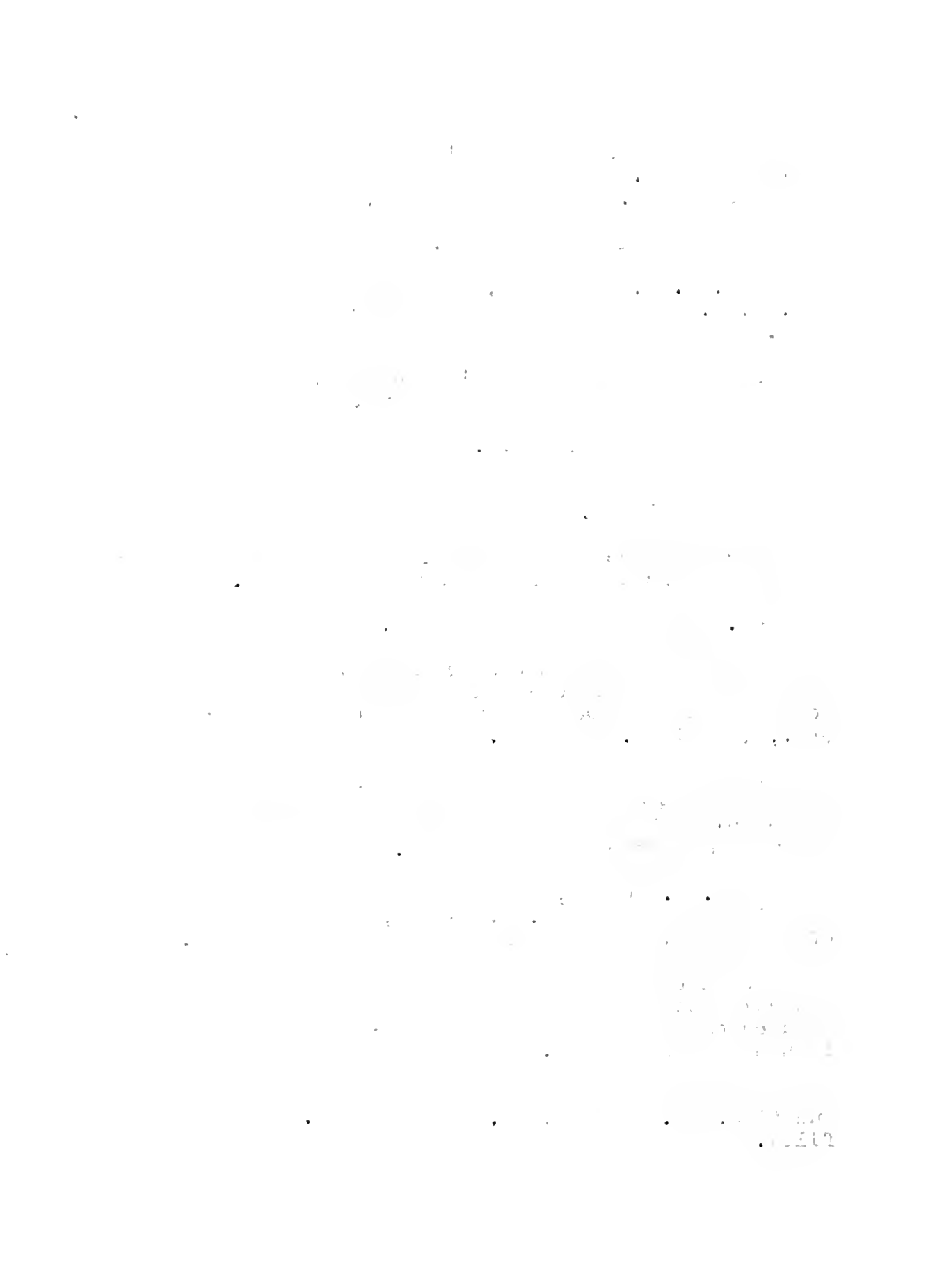
Committee to whom was referred the rules passed at the last meeting of the Synod recorded on page 145, reported that they had examined said rules and recommended, etc., (on file). Adopted.

The unfinished business to wit. The motion made to discharge the committee appointed to procure a change in the Marriage laws in the State of New Jersey was taken up and the committee was discharged.

Thos. H. Morris, Elder from Woodbridge of Presbytery of Elizabethtown and A. B. Karner, Elder from Hightstown of Presbytery of New Brunswick appeared in Synod.

Committee appointed to examine the Minutes of the General Assembly reported calling the attention to the Minutes on pages 524 and 532 and 4- as follows - and it was adopted (file).

Special Committee to draft a law in the Marriage Question, Mr. Ryerson, Mr. Marsh and Dr. Magie (paper on file).



Committee on Bills and overtures made No. 1 inadequate support of the Ministry, No. 2 Reconstruction of the Presbyteries of this Synod, No. 3 Disabled Ministers.

Synod then proceeded on motion made, to a consideration of overture No. 2 and after a lengthened discussion the overture was laid on the table.

Overtures No. 1 and 3 were by order of the Synod placed upon the docket.

Synod then had a recess until 7:15 o'clock.

At the close of the recess the Synod met and attended on the Exercises of the Synodical Prayer Meeting agreeably to the report of the committee.

Mr. Joseph Withian, Elder from the Church of Woodbury of Presbytery of West Jersey appeared in Synod. Rev. Mr. Yeomans, Rev. John Hall and Rev. Dr. Hornblower appeared, etc.

Rev. David Wilson of the Irish Delegation was introduced to the Synod and invited to sit as a corresponding member.

Books approved, Raritan, Burlington, Passaic, Susquehanna, West Jersey, New Brunswick, Luzerne, and Newton.

Ordered that the Statistical Report be forwarded to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly.

Synod then adjourned to meet tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. Concluded with prayer.

Thursday Morning 9 o'clock

Synod met pursuant to adjournment and was opened with prayer.

Committee on leave of absence reported (on file).

Rev. Dr. Maclean made an interesting statement in regard to the present condition of the College of New Jersey (see page 135). Also respecting Theological Seminary, Rev. Dr. Wilson offered a resolution respecting a division of the Presbytery of New Brunswick (see file).



Amendment of Dr. Maclean- Strike out 1 and 2 Cra. and adding, and such other churches contiguous to them as may be willing to be connected with them- which was carried- and the resolution for the erection of a New Presbytery was passed. Resolution offered by Dr. Van Rensselaer to detach Dr. Stewart and the Church of Camden from the Presbytery of West Jersey and attach them to the Presbytery of Burlington. Carried.

Rev. David Lyons, Synod of Albany, Rev. E. D. G. Prime, D. D. Synod of New York being present were invited to sit as corresponding members.

The committee appointed about the Marriage law made report. Accepted. Committee continued and instructed and requested to obtain a supplement to the law in accordance with the provision contained in the report. Accepted.

Committee on leave of absence reported (file).

Synod had a recess until 2:30.

At the close of the recess Synod met and proceeded to business.

Dr. Studdiford's resolution- which after discussion was postponed until the next meeting of Synod.

Committee appointed to examine the records of the Presbytery of Elizabethtown reported and the book was approved with the exception of the action of the Presbytery recorded on page 294 with respect to which the Synod express no opinion.

Overture No. 1 was taken up and adopted- Stated Clerk to send copy to each Presbytery and publish in Presbyterian.

Resolution respecting Presbytery of Monmouth.

Vote of thanks- citizens and Rail Roads.

Janitor's bill paid \$5.00 and a bill of Stationery \$1.00.

Adjourned to meet, etc. in Burlington on the 3rd Tuesday of October 1860 at 3 p.m.

Concluded with prayer, singing and Benediction.

1859

No. 1 The following paper was offered for the consideration of the Synod, and they unanimously adopted.

Very interesting addresses having been made by the Secretaries and agents of the Board of Foreign Missions--Domestic Missions--Education--the Committee of Church Extension, and the American Bible Society,

Resolved. That these several Boards and Societies be renewedly recommended to the increased liberality of the churches under the care of this Synod.

Resolved. That this Synod commend to the attention of the members of the churches under our care, the Presbyterian Historical Almanac, published by Mr. Wilson of Philadelphia, illustrating, as it does the annual operations of the whole Presbyterian family.

No. 2 The committee of Bills and Overtures reported Overture No. 1 from the Presbytery of Elizabethtown on the inadequate support of the ministry--The committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution, viz: Resolved. That in view of the inadequate support of many of the ministers within our bounds, this Synod enjoin it upon the Presbyteries to take order directing their sessions to enquire whether the ministers of their churches receive a sufficient temporal maintenance, and to report to this Synod at its next stated meeting; what they have done, together with the result of their enquiries.

Overture No. 2 being an overture on the matter of the reconstruction of the Presbyteries of this Synod.

The committee recommend the adoption of the following paper, viz: Whereas under the present arrangement of our Presbyteries, many churches, whose local interests are the same are separated and many which have no common Presbyterian interests are thrown into the same body; and whereas several of our Presbyteries are too large and others too

small for efficient action therefore, Resolved. That a committee consisting of one minister and one ruling elder from each Presbytery be appointed to consider the subject of a reconstruction of our Presbyteries, and if such reconstruction appear feasible, to report a plan for the same at this meeting of the Synod.

Overture No. 3 being an overture in regard to the fund for disabled ministers, and the widows and orphans of deceased ministers. On this subject, the committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution.

Resolved. That it be recommended to the sessions of the churches under the care of this Synod, to bring before their congregations, the matter of disable ministers and the needy widows and orphans of deceased ministers, and to take up a collection for this object on some Sabbath previous to the 1st of January, 1860, and transmit the same to the office of the Treasurer of the General Assembly in the city of Philadelphia.

No. 3 A paper was presented to the Synod by the Rev. Mr. Wilson in which a proposition was made for a division of the Presbytery of New Brunswick and after considerable discussion It was,

Resolved. That a new Presbytery, to be known as the Presbytery of Monmouth, be and the same is hereby erected, and that the following ministers compose said Presbytery: Rev. Charles F. Worrel, Rev. Messrs. John M. Rogers, Phaddeus Wilson, Charles Webster, Frank Chandler, Donald McLaren, John L. Kehoo, Daniel L. Cahler, William W. Wells, with the following churches, Millstone, Middletown, Point, Shrewsbury, Village Church Freehold, Tennent church, Manalapan, Red Bank, Jamesburgh,

Tom's River, Cedar Creek, Manchester, Squam Village, and such other churches contiguous to them as may be willing to be connected with them--that said Presbytery hold its first meeting at the Tennent church on Wednesday the 11th day of January, 1860, at 11 o'clock A. M.--to be opened with a sermon by the Rev. Charles P. Worrel, (or in his absence, by the oldest minister present) who shall preside until a Moderator be chosen.

The Rev. Dr. Van Rensselaar offered the following resolution, which after some discussion was adopted,

Resolved. That the church of Camden, and the Rev. Daniel Stewart P. D. be and hereby are detached from the Presbytery of West Jersey, and connected with the Presbytery of Burlington, and that the territory of the Presbyter. of Burlington be extended so as to include the city of Camden and the township of Newton, Union, Centre and Delaware.

PRESBYTERIAL
STATISTICAL REPORTS

1. The Presbytery of Elizabethtown, report to the Synod of New Jersey that they consist of 24 Ministers, and have under their care 16 Churches, 1 Licentiate, and 4 Candidates.

The Presbytery further report that on the 21st of December 1858, they received the Rev. W. LeRoy Lockwood from the Presbytery of Ottawa and on the same day installed him pastor of the 2nd Church of Rahway--that on the same day they received Mr. James R. Campbell under their care as a candidate for the gospel ministry, and ordered that the name of the Rev. John Wirz be erased from the roll of the Presbytery--and that the name of the German Church of Elizabeth be dropped from the list of Churches--that on the 17th of April, they received the Rev. George M. L. Blauvelt from the Presbyterian and Congregational District Convention of Milwaukee, and dismissed Mr. Samuel McIlhenny a licentiate under their care to put himself under the care of the Presbytery of West Jersey--that on the same day, they received under their care, Mr. James Gibson, a candidate for the ministry from the Presbytery of Belfast, Ireland--and licensed Mr. James Gibson and Mr. Morris C. Sutphin to preach the gospel--that on the 1st of May, they dismissed Mr. Gibson to put himself under the care of the Presbytery of Belfast, Ireland--that on the 27th of September, they dismissed the Rev. George S. Mott to connect himself with the Presbytery of Newton, and on the 1st of October dismissed the Rev. George M. L. Blauvelt to join the Presbytery of Pasaic.

The Presbytery further report that all the churches under their care have taken collections for the various objects recommended by the General Assembly, except that the churches of Pluckamin, Perth Amboy, Elizabeth Port, Plainfield, and 2d Rahway have omitted the Board of Publication and the fund for disabled Ministers.

2. The Presbytery of Passaic, report to the Synod of New Jersey, that they consist of 19 Ministers, and have under their care 14 Churches, 3 Licentiates, and 3 Candidates.

The Presbytery further report that on the 20th of April, 1859, the pastoral relation between the Rev. Charles D. Rosenthal and the German Church of Paterson was dissolved--that on the same day, Mr. Rosenthal was dismissed to join the Presbytery of Luzerne--that on the same day the Rev. Josiah Markle was dismissed to join the classis of Kingston, of the Reformed Dutch Church--that on the same day Mr. Francis E. Butler was licensed to preach the gospel--that on the 31st of May Mr. Edward W. Weiss a licentiate was received under their care from the classis of Bergen and that on the same day he was ordained to the work of the gospel ministry, and installed him pastor of the German Church of Paterson--that on the 5th of September, Mr. J.
