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

The Synod of New Jersey met pursuant to adjournment in the Second Presbyterian Church in this place at 3 o'chock, P. M. and was opened with tansermon from Deuteronomy, the eighth chapter, and the first part of the second verse, "and thou shall remember all the way which the Lord thy God led thee." by the Rev. Ravaud K. Rodgers, D. D., the Moderator.

The roll of the Synod having been called, the Rev. John Mac N. ir, D. D., was unanimously chosen Moder tor and the Rev. Messrs. Hale and Gosman were chosen Clerks

Resolved, That during the present sessions of the Synod it be the order to meet at 9 o'clock, A. N.-to have a recess at 1/2 past 12 o'clock, P. M.,- to meet at 1/2 past 2 o'clock, P. M.-to have a recess at 5 o'clock P. M. and to meet at 1/2 past 7 o'clock P. M.

The Rev. Alfred Nevin, D. D., of the Synod of Philadelphia, being present was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The Co mittee on religious exercises made the following report, which was accepted and adopted.

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The committee on religious exercises recommend to the Synod that public worship be held in the church which the sessions of the Synod are held, this Evening at 1/2 past 7 o'clock-that a sermon be preached by the Rev. Mr. Sheddan-and that the Synodical prayer meeting be held in the same place on Wednesday Evening, at the same rour.

The Rev. Drs. Rodgers and Blauvelt, and the Rev. Messrs. Street, Glen, Hubbard and Foster, Minister, and Messrs. Inglis, Baker, Herris, and Rodgers, Blaers, were appointed a committee of Bills and Overtures, to meet in this house upon the recess of the Synod, at 5 o'clock P. M. and afterwards on their own adjournments.

Synod then had a recess until 1/2 past 7 o'clock, P. 2.

At the close of the recess the Synod convened and attended upon the religious exercises, agreeably to the recommendation of the committee.

At the close of the religious exercises, the Synod proceeded to business.

Resolved, that the next Stated Meeting of the Synod be held in the First Presbyterian Church, in Rahway, N. J., on the third Tuesday of October, 1862, at 7 o'clock, P. M., and that the Moderator of the Synod-the Rev. Mr. Sheddan, the pretor of the Church, and Mr. Randolph De Camp be a committee to make arrangements for the religious exercises of the pext meeting of the Synod.

Resolved, That the Rev. Dr. Hodgers be requested to furnish a copy of the discourse delivered by him, at the opening of the Synod for publication, and that the Rev. Fr. Janeway be a committee to ascertain what amount can be erased to meet the expense of publication.

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The Rev. Mess's. Sheddan and Knighton, and the Rev. Drs. Hickok and MacDonald, Ministers and Messrs. Mennedy, Fithian, and fuller, Elders were appointed a judicial committee to meet at the call of the chair man.

Pessrs. Jonathon Pisk and James F. Stevens were appointed a committee to examine the Treasurer's account, and to make an assessment upon the Presbyteries of the Synod, for the purpose of meeting the contingent expenses of the Synod.

The Rev. Dr. Hornblower and the Rev. Tr. Entlish Ministers, and Wessrs. Brearley and Tunison were appointed a committee on leave of absence.

The Rev. Messrs. Symmes and Tully, "inisters and Mr. DeCamp, Elder were appointed a committee to negaraft the Marrative of the State of Religion within the bounds of the Synod for the next year.

The Rev. Messrs. Bond and Kehoo, Ministers, and Mr. W. L. Johnson, Elder were appointed a committee to examine the Minutes of the General Assembly, and report any articles requiring the attention of the Synod.

The Synod met pursuant to adjournment, and was opened with prayer.

At the close of the recess, the Synod came to order and proceeded to business.

The committe ap cinted to draft the Narrative of the State of Heligion within the bounds of the Synod made the following report which was accepted

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and adopted and ordered to be read at the prayer meeting this Evening.

The committee on the Narrative of the 'tate of religion appointed at the 1st meeting of Symod report that they have received communications from ten of the eleven Prechyteries that compose the body, and that they provided with a mixture of light and shade—of serrowing and rejoicing.

As Paul proposed to Barnabas to revisit the cities in which churches had been sathered to know their conditions, so we arrive at this same knowledge from the annual reports of the State of religion in the churches of the different Presby teries, and from them we learn that the home field of the Lanod is as extensive, and the appliances of the cospel the same as in former years. Truth has been regularly dispensed to the attendants upon the Sunctuary, the Lecture Loom, the bible Class, and the Cabbath School, and has been blessed to many; still the labours expended in these have not been remaid with great, nor perhaps with corresponding fruits. The hopes that centered around the recent revival period in our history have not been redlized-lorldliness wide spread and marked, is still a characteristic of Christian and Church life, dw rfing dieta. counteracting heavenly incluence and engeelling the power of the preached word. Marnest personal activity in the Parvice of Christ is far beneath the pressing demands of the one, and the sad necessities of the other. The standard of religious life and feeling is not sufficiently elevated. The prayer meeting is not thronged and especially by the male members of the church. Family worship is neglected in ot a few Christian households and the children of the church are not regularly brought up in it, while some are deprieved of certain 11 hts and priveleges connected with proper Christian culture.

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bounds which have not been conteneed by the power of the respet and the force of Christian exemple—
may the whole resources of the church have been incapable, in laces of threating the one and flow of intemperance or put a stop to Tabbath descration and profamity within the sphere of her labours.

It is with pleasure we can speak from the tons of the Marrative of the hormony, union and perce of the church and of the fiderity of the ministry, and though it is not our privalege to mention great and general awakenings and large accessions with which we have been favored in times of special revival, yet reports have come up from churches laden with joy over sathered showes.

In the Presbytery of Lewton, special mention is made of the churches of Mackettstown, Danville, Lower Fount Bethel, and Blairstown, as being graciously revived by the presence of the Lord and the glory of his power, and the streng theming of those by the addition of some 200 members. In the Formouth Presbytery, the same divine influences have been at work, chearing the feeble and increasing the mend power of several churches.

New Brunswick reports encouraging takens for good in two or three compregations and Passale mentions one church refreshed by the special visitation of the Holy Ghost.

Mearly all the churches are supplied with pastors, and the mission field which covers no small portion of the territory of the Synod has been pocularly avorade. During the year Durlington Presbyter; has organized one new church-rejoices over considerable accessions to a missionary church and the removal of a heavy pecuniary burden from it and speaks of providential openings which she cannot meet with the resources at her command.

Vest Jersey has sent out to her mission field four new labourers and new aports the supply of all her churches with the regular ministrations of the word with but one exception, and lazarne reveals her accustomed aggressive vigor in the fact of several organized churches.

In a highly favored portion of the viaevard of the Lord-in a great measure exmot from monetary derangments and wholly from the scene of devartation and winton destruction witnessed in a portion of our land-with a history replete with divine guidances and radiant with wondrous love, we cannot as stewards of the manifold ; race of God, refer to our benificence as indicative of our gratitude and our appreclation of the work entrusted to as, when according to the last report of the General Assembly we numbered 195 churches this a membership of 23,823 who gave, including the many non-communicants, to all the Boards of our churches for home and abroad. an appregate of less than Twenty thousand dollarsor an average of 82 cents a member. The memory of the post and the present in such an exhibit should fill us with shame.

Whilst thus engaged in statistics we regard it a duty, from an allumion to it in a recent Larrative of Synod, to lock back and see how the Lord has led us, and our improvement of his prest produces and special refreshings as developed in our relative growth as a denomination with other religious sects, and with the increase of population and for obvious reasons we confine the survey to the "tate which gives name to the Synod."

In 1832 there were 31,040 members belong insite the different Evanglier bodies to a population of nearly 330,000 or one communicant to every 8 1/2 of the population; now we have almost 103,000 among 680,000 in habitants, or one to every 6 3/5.

In this aggregate, the Presbyterian body has increused from 14,369 to 29,571-the reformed with from 4.223 to 10.081-the Episconal from 900 to 5.955the Baptists 3,981 to 17,121 and the "ethodists from 15,537 to almost 40,000. Pur church has just kept pace with the increase of population, so that whilst we the relative difference between the church and the world, the same during the list thirty years. the other denominations have reduced the pre-crtion from 8 1/2 to 6 3/5. In this time we have little more than doubled while the others combined have quadrupled. This is another painful record-that with one noble seminary and college, our complete church machinery, our educated ministry, and our boasted aggressive movements, we have allowed every other denomination to cutstrip us in affective attacks upon the Mingdom of darkness, and instead of being in the van of the sacramental host of God's elect, in wanglistic efforts, we are bringing up the rear.

The Mecrolegy of the Synod for the pist year is light according to Presbyterial reports. Luzerne mentions the removal of a member from sative toil to the joys of heavenly rest-the Nov. hr. borrance, who by his many noble qualities and christian character endeared himself to all who knew him, and who has left his impress upon his church and Presbytery.

But we all feel that there is another vacancy the absence of the geniul soile-the varm greating the impulsive and generous actrity and the prompt movements of one so steadily in his place, and so long accustomed to meet with us, tell us that Nichol's Murray is no more! Then New Pruns lek has lost a valued member in the death of the Dr. Isaac d. Brown,

and as no narrative has been received from Corisco we learn from other sources the fall of Tr. Open at his post in Africa.

From this survey of mercies received and returns made, this mingling of encouragements and discouragements, we have much reason for gratitude for the past and hope for the future-much for which to thank God and take cour ge.

At the close of the recess, Synod convened and attended upon the exercises of the Synodical prayer meeting acreeably to the recommendation of the committee.

At the close of the reli icus exercises the Symod resumed the consideration of the judicial case, and the calling the rell to live the members an opjortunity to express their opinions was completed.

The vote was then taken, and the complaint of Fr. William 3. Guild was sustained as follows:

Whereupon the Moderator gave the casting vote to sustain the complaint, and it was sustained accordingly.

The following limits was proposed and adopted as expressive of the views of the Lynod in the case, viz.

The complaint is sustained—the Tynod judging that the action of the General Issembly in the case did not suspend, nor in any way affect the decision of the Synod; except that it recommends a new trial for reasons contingent upon a condition of which the Tynod is left to be the judges.—Until Therefore the sentence of the Tynod alread; made in the case of Tider wild is reversed or set aside by some competent court, it continues in full force and the action of the session complained of, is not land void.

The Rev. Levis C. Baker, of the Prosbytery of Burlington, appeared in Symod, and assigned satisfactory reasons for late attendance.

The committee on le ve of absence reported that they had given leave of absence to the Lev. Dr. Mall, and the Lev. Meners. Chapin and Maller, Ministers and to Mr. Misvens, Ider. They also reported that Lev. Thomas D. Moover, of the Presbytery of New Bruns lek had assigned catish coop reasons for late attendance. These reports were adopted.

The Symod then adjourned to meet tomorrow morning at 9 c'eloek.

Symod met jurguent to adjournment and was opened with prayer.

The "inutes of the last session of Synod were read.

The following resolutions were offered and adopted.

Resolved, that in view of existing difficulties in the session of the 3d Church of Newerk, apparent in the case originating there, which has just been decided by this body, that the Tev. Prs. Macdonald and Tickok Ministers and Professor Rephen Alexander, Tider, be a committee to visit said Church, and ascertain in any mode that the committee may deem proper whether any of the Elders are unacceptable to a majority of the church, and if it should be found that such is the case that the feet be certified to the prator, to be entered on the session records, and that such be no longer rewarded as acting elders in the church.

Resolved, That the said committee be authorized to take any additional steps, which the interests of the church in question and the cause of Christ, may require for the restoration of barrony and perce.

Resolved, That all proceedings in the case of Fr. William B. Guild returned to us from the General Assembly be dismissed by correct consent.

The committee of Bills and Overtures reported Overture No. 3 being the papers of the Nev. George Blair, a foreign minister referred to the Cynod by the Presbytery of Sus uchanna-They recommend that, as the papers are all found in order, the respective of Sus uchanna-They recommend that, as the papers are all found in order, the respective of the church in regard to the reception of foreign ministers.

The report was adopted.

The following resolutions were proposed for the consideration to the Symod and adopted.

Resolved, That the interests of our roreign and Domestic missionary fields be recommended one to the ministers and churches connected with this Dyned. They are white for the barvest. And while the openings for missionary labor and multiplying and the men are ready to occupy them, the people of God should not be wanting in sustaining by their contribations their efforts, and their prayers, these important arms of our charches enterprises.

Tesolved, hat the embarrassment incident to the unhalpy condition of our country eacht not to interfere with out effets for the spread of the lossel at home and abroad, but should nother lead us to increase them, and that our church members are called upon to exercise great solf denial, and to be instant in season and out of reason, but the great work of Christian benevolence may not flat.

The committee of bills and "vertures reported Overture To. I being that part of the Ministers of the General Assembly relating to a division of the Synod, thich had been referred to them-with regard to this matter, they recommend that whereas, the last General Ascembly was overtured by the Prosbyteries of Luzerne and Eusquehanna, connected with the Synod of New Jersey, and the Presbyting of Forthumberland, connected with the Synod of Philadelnia. to organize these several presbyteries into a new Synod to be ealled the Synod of ----, and whereas the Sy od of Philadelphia, at its sessions in October 1860, empressed its approval of the purposed organization and the late assembly of 1862, for its action, the Synod of New Jersey, if the overtures b renewed next spring, will join in the reduest, contained in these several overtures, and will commend to the attention of the Genreal Assembly, the Proposed New Sincd as not only called for, but as eminently

desirable and coloulated to promote the interests of our sion in North Easten Pennsylvania.

The report was accepted and laid on the table.

The commistee on leave of absence reported that they had given leave of absence to the lev. Messrs. Blauvelt, worrel, and McGee-end that Messrs. Johnson and White of the Presbytery of Luserne had assigned satisfactory reasons for absence from the lest meeting of Synod. The report was adopted.

The following resolution was effered for the consideratio of Lymod and un nimeasly adopted.

Resolved, That this Lyncd in the spirit of that Christian patriotism which the Toriptures enjoin, and which has always characterized this church, do hereby acknowlede and declare our obligations to promote and perpetuate, so far as in us his, the integrity of these United States, and to attenuate, a hold and encourage the Federal Fovernment in the operaise of all its functions under our noble constitution; and to this constitution in all its provisions, requirements, and principles we profess our unabated localty.

The subject of changing the boundary line between the Presbyteries of Newton and Maritan was brought forward, when it was Masolved, That the churches of Bloomsbury-Museometeons falley-lox will and Morman Valley, with their posters be and they he oby are transferred from the Presbytery of Memton to that of Maritan. Ordered, That the Mated Clerk give notice to these churches and their pastors of this transfer.

The following resolution was offered and adopted. Thereas the Interests of our beloved zion as represented in the Foreign and Lomestic boards are inseparable from

the Boards of Education, and whereas there is already embarrassment in the operations of the scard of Education. Therefore, leadined, that the Board of Education be carrectly recordeded to the churkes of this Symod for their prompt and liberal centributions.

Resolved, That hereafter when Unicters of other denominations or other Oppods are invited to sit as corresponding members, they be presented to the house and recognized by the Mederator addressing them and informing them of the invitation of the Syned.

The Nev. Mr. Jameway stated to the Lynod that a sufficient sum had been obtained to cover the expense of printing the sermon delivered by the Rev. Dr. Rod ers at the opening of the Synod.

The committee on leave of absence reported that the Rev. Tr. Filson of the Prembytery of Conmouth had assigned satisfactory reasons for absence from the list stated meeting of the Symod.

The report was adopted.

Resolved, That the thanks of the Synod we returned to the citizens of octtsville for the kind and abundant hospitalities which they have extended to the members of the Synod, during the sessions of the body in this place.

Resolved. That the thanks of the Tyrod or given to Penry Fick, Tso., for his kind exertions in procuring from the Lailroad companies return tickets for the members of the Syrod and to the manager

of those companies the lave favored the members with return tickets free of charge.

Ordered, That the calling the rell be dispensed with.

The Treasurer was directed to pay the janitor's bill amounting to Four dollars—the bill for stationary amounting to Tre dollar and fifty—four centr-and bills for printing tickets for the use of numbers returning from the Bymod, assumting to Three dollars and twelve cents.

The Synod then adjourned to meet in the first Presbyterian Church in the fit, of Rahway on the 3d Tuesday of October 1862, at 7 piclock P. F.

Concluded with singing prayer and the binediction.
