



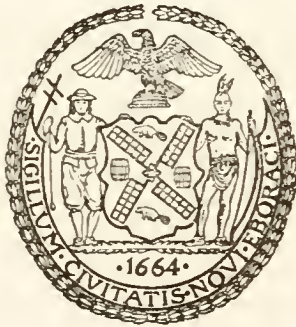

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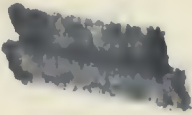

Henry Riker and Martin P Powles were appointed firemen to Company No 27 instead of Gerardus Riker and Cornelius Blackledge resigned Peter Devow was appointed a fireman to Company No 24, Stephen Egbert and John Tyson were appointed firemen to Company No: 8; instead of George Kayler deceased and James H Ward resigned; John Hall Currier was appointed a fireman of Company No. 7: instead of John Smith resigned; Luke Torboss was appointed a Fireman of Company No 20, instead of Peter H Wendover; William Seaman was [219] appointed a Fireman of Company No 11 instead of John Young resigned; and Gurdon Manwaring Seabury Tredwell, and John L Embree were appointed firemen of Company No 18, instead of Alsop Hunt, Sands Ferris, and Edmund Fanning resigned.

A Return, from Captain Lawrences Watch Company, was referred to the Watch Committee.

A Petition of Benjamin Bailey for the Office of Weighmaster, and of William Ellsworth for that of Inspector of wood, were referred to the Committee on Petitions for Offices.

A Petition of Matthew Vogle and others for leave to deposit manure on the vacant lots in the neighborhood of Corlaers hook was granted during the pleasure of Common Council and on condition that the same be removed whenever it becomes offensive.

A Petition of David Bayard and others that measures may be taken to prevent drunkenness in East George's Street, was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the seventh ward.

Resolved, that the Mayor be requested twice in every month during the warm season to Order the Constables and Marshalls to go through the City and apprehend and bring before the Magistrates of

this City all vagrants they may find, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law

[220] Alderman Fairlie, } were appointed a Committee together with the
 Brasher, } Brigadier general of Artillery to carry into effect
 and Mr Warner, } the resolution of this board made the 20 June
 1803 relative to exchanging set of colours.

Ordered, that the Attorney of the board take measures to enforce the order directing Beach and Bussing to fill in their ground at the foot of Cortland Street.

Resolved, that a Watchman be placed at the foot of Cortland Street near Powles hook ferry, and that the Watch Committee take measures to carry the same into effect.

Mr Mott } were appointed a Committee to report such regulations
 Crolius } as may be necessary in relation to riding timber

Messieurs Murray and Cunningham presented a bill to the Board of monies paid by them for Wood to replace the Wood lent by them to the Corporation last winter; Ordered, that the same be referred to the Committee of Supplies.

Jonas Humbert was appointed Clerk of the Alms house.

Resolved, that the City Inspector cause an extract from the Law of the State relative to driving carriages to be published in such a manner as in his opinion will have the best effect.

The City Inspector reported ordinances for the correction and removal of nuisances, numbered from 1732 to 1734, inclusive, Ordered that the same pass the board.

[221] Resolved, that James Hardie, be directed to furnish an abstract or table of contents of the Ordinances of the Common Council* in a State for publication by the next meeting of the Common Council.

The following report was received from the Ferry Committee,

The Ferry Committee to whom it was referred to report a state of facts relative to the Ferry house &c at the upper ferry at Brooklyn. Report, 1, That a lot of ground was conveyed by Joshua Sands to the Corporation near the upper Ferry for the use and accomodation of the same.

2, That in the Beginning of December last the said Lot was leased by the Comptroller to Henry Stanton Jun^r for seven years with the reservation of the lower front room in the house erected on the said Lot for the accomodation of the ferry, which the Committee

have examined, are of opinion, that it is not sufficient for the accomodation of the said ferry.

3, Joshua Sands is willing to convey to the Corporation in exchange for the said Lot one nigher the ferry stairs and containing more ground for the use and accomodation of the said Ferry, as will appear by a note from M^r Sands annexed The Committee recommend the said exchange

The Market Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Jacamiah Akerly and others praying the Corporation to Build a Fish Market at Catherine Slip are of opinion that the request of the petitioners ought to be granted, and that by driving about half a dozen piles in the Slip on the Easterly side thereof and by raising the Market about 18 inches from the present plates on the Slip and to be 30 feet on Water Street and 18 feet on the Slip, and would be no inconvenience to the Ferry, and by Standing so high from the Water, Market Boats could safely lay under the market and by having a stairs under one end of the market would be a great convenience to the Fishermen and Market Boats, and we are of opinion that the expence would not exceed 500 Dollars:

The following report was received from the Street Commissioner together with Assessments for regulating fourth Street between Pump and Grand Street, Hester Street, Norfolk Street between Division and Grand Streets and Essex Street

The Street Commissioner has the honor to present Four Assess-

ment lists for the confirmation of the Common Council, And for the appointment of persons to Collect the money therein mentioned.

Delays have frequently happened in Collecting money upon the assessments much to the injury of the persons who contract to do the Work. The Common Council may be convinced of this evil, if they revert to the numerous petitions last winter on this subject. The Street Commissioner to prevent in some measure this evil in future; begs leave to recommend that the Collectors to be appointed be limited as to the time they make their returns of delinquents, and these limitations ought to be no longer than One month after the period within which each contractor engages to complete the work [224] If the Collectors to be appointed for these assessments were limited to Three months from this day for Hester, and two months for the other three, it would come within the periods above mentioned

The Treasurers monthly account was received and filed

A return from Captain Dumboltons Watch company was received and referred to the Watch Committee

A petition of John S Moore for the appointment of Weighmaster was received and referred to the Committee on petitions for offices

A petition of David Burgher Senior stating that he is unable to pay an assessment of \$3 ³/₁₀₀ made upon a Lot of ground in John Street for the widening of Cliff Street Ordered that a Warrant issue upon the Treasurer for the payment of that sum

A petition of David Crone for liberty to sell household furniture in Chatham Street was referred to Alderman *[228] Janeway Dela Montagnie and Board.

Returns of Delinquents in the assessments for regulating Leonard and Chappel Streets, Brannon and Spring Streets and Vesey Street Slip were received Ordered that Warrants issue

Jonas Humbert presented his resignation as Clerk of the Alms house the same was accepted

Resolved that the sixth section of the Law for establishing the assize and regulating the Inspection of Bread be and the same is hereby repealed and in lieu thereof the following be substituted to wit.

Be it further ordained that this City shall be divided into two inspection Districts, that the first of the said districts shall include all such parts of the City as are Southward and westward of a line commencing at Roosevelt Street on the East river thence proceeding along the middle of said Street to Chatham Street. thence along the middle

of said Street to Magazine Street. thence along the middle of said Street to Broadway. thence along the middle of said Street to Anthony Street, thence along the middle of said Street to Hudson Street thence along the middle of said Street to Jay Street. thence along the middle of Jay Street to the Hudson River And that the second district shall include all the remainder of the City beyond the aforesaid boundary

Upon receiving the petition of Gabriel Van Norden and others against the practice of blowing horns [229] at the ferries at the foot of Vesey Street. the following ordinance passed the board

A Law to prevent the practice therein mentioned

Be it ordained, etc, that it shall not hereafter be lawful for the ferryman or any other persons concerned or employed in any of the ferries at the foot of Vesey Street to blow or make a noise, with horns shells or other instruments under the penalty of five dollars to be recovered with costs of suit

A petition of Daniel Lawrence and others to equalize the business of Measurers of grain was referred to M^r Board. Bloodgood and Van Antwerp.

Dennis Doyle, grocer. Abraham Bell, merchant. Walter Titus Merchant. Thomas Harding grocer, and Stephen Latham grocer were appointed Firemen of the floating Engine Company

The attorney of the board reported that a complaint has been exhibited against John F. La forgue for erecting a building Contrary to the law Ordered that a suit be commenced against him unless the building is taken down in ten days.

Upon receiving the report of the Attorney of the board the following amendment was made to the fourth section of the Law to regulate the fees of Weighmasters and measurers.

“And if any person not holding an appointment under this Corporation shall exercise the office of Measurer to measure any article for himself or for any other person for any purpose whatsoever except for the immediate and sole use of such person so measuring and not for the purpose of sale thereafter such person shall forfeit and pay Ten Dollars for each offence, and in case of measuring Lumber such unauthorized person so measuring shall forfeit and pay the sum of Fifty Dollars for each Offence

[230] A petition of John R Livingston and others to regulate Division Street was referred to the Street Commissioner

The Committee appointed for the purpose of enquiring what measures ought to be adopted for the more effectual execution of the law respecting obstructions in the Streets of this City. reported that upon

account of the great extent of the City and the increasing duties of the Street Commissioner it is necessary that two suitable persons should be appointed Assistant Street Commissioners. Resolved that the Clerk be directed to draw an Ordinance agreeably thereto.

Ordered that the fourth section of the Ordinance concerning Dogs be repealed and that the Attorney of the Board be authorized to pay such part of the fines arising under such ordinance to persons affording information which may enable him to prosecute Offenders to conviction as he may think proper not to exceed one half thereof.

Upon receiving the report of the attorney of the board Ordered that Beach and Bussing be directed to make the ferry stairs at the foot of Vezey Street agreeably to the conditions of their grant in three weeks from this day.

John Quackenbos resigned his office as an Inspector of bread and Jonas Humbert was appointed in his stead

The following report was received to wit

John Hunn Esquire } Report about a Survey made 1 May 1805
Street Commissioner } to find out the proper North east corner of
Greenwich Street and Harison Street.

In order to ascertain this corner with [231] proper precision I went to Thomas Barrow, and examined the Trinity Church maps and the cession made by the Corporation to the Corporation of this City, and find Rhinelanders corner the South side of Harison Street. Harrison Street ceded to the Corporation of this City 65 feet wide. The block from Harison Street to Provoost Street 175 feet and then Provost Street 65 feet wide

I surveyed accordingly with a line and a 10 feet standard, beginning at the corner of R. Strongs house, measured 65 feet and find the corner or the fence of M^r Boards lot to be one foot in the Street or too far South. Measuring M^r Boards two lots 50 feet I find the foundation of M^r Dobbs house 5½ inches too far south and on M^r Boards lot. Measuring 125 feet more to the corner of Provoost Street I find the corner 6 inches in the Street. Measuring from the mark across the Street I find Provoost Street 65 feet wide and the whole corresponding with the map of the Trinity Church Corporation

The following report was received from the Street Commissioner. to wit.

The Street Commissioner to whom it was referred to direct a survey to be made across the East River at Corlaers hook with a view of ascertaining the distance, situation, course of the tides and eddies and other circumstances in order to determine the place most proper for a permanent ferry has the honour to report

That he has examined the ground on both sides of the River and that Mr Loss and Mr Stilwell two of the City Surveyors have made a Survey the map or plan of which is herewith presented with a report of Mr Loss on the subject

That the distance from the foot of Grand Street to Morrells Landing is 3000 feet, while the distance from Bullock Street to Woodhulls is 3560 feet

That the course of the tides is also most favorable to the landing at Morrells. passages can be generally made with expedition and safety between those points, while on the other hand it very frequently happens from the nature of the wind and tides. that passages to and from Woodhulls will be much more tedious, and attended with considerable difficulty

The ground of Mr Woodhull on the Long Island *[234] shore is situated in a cove which from the best information the Street Commissioner can collect is generally obstructed by ice during the greatest part of the winter season. The land of Morrell on the contrary in addition to its being more directly opposite and more favorably situated with regard to the tides and eddies is placed upon a point which is generally free and open and from which passages can be made during all seasons of the year

It is only at favorable periods that Horse boats can pass between

Woodhulls and Willetts landings, and near to Woodhulls on the opposite shore there is said to be a reef of rocks which occasions rough water whenever the wind is high. This reef is entirely out of the course to Morrells landing but cannot be avoided in a passage to Woodhulls.

From these circumstances the Street Commissioner believes that the foot of Grand Street would be the most convenient and eligible place for a public ferry. It is not only the widest street in that part of the City but it also receives the greatest number of intersecting Streets and affords the readiest communication with other parts of the town. A public bason is reserved at the foot of Grand Street in the East River, and in all probability whenever a Market is erected, it will be built at that place, and it appears probable to him from the reservation of a bason that it must have been the original intention of the Corporation to establish the ferry there.

The Street Commissioner reported an Ordinance for extending Front Street from Dover Street to James Slip Ordered that the same pass.

Upon receiving the Report of the Street Commissioner Ordered that Spring Street be made Sixty one feet wide from Brannon Street to Broadway and that six feet be taken from the Lots on the South side and five feet be taken from the Lots on the North side of the said Street for that purpose.

The Street Commissioner reported that it would be proper to pay to Mrs Laight in advance the value of property taken to continue Cherry Street Ordered that the same be rejected

[236] Ordered that the Committee of public repairs report the plan of a new ferry house at Brooklyn by the next meeting of the board

Ordered that the sum of \$23 $\frac{23}{100}$ being the proportion of Elizabeth Baker in the Estate of her father Gardner Baker be paid to her upon her giving such security as the Comptroller shall approve

The Treasurers report concerning the estate of Colin Peacock was referred to the Attorney of the Board.

The following report was received from the Comptroller to wit.

The Comptroller begs leave to state that he has agreeably to the order of the Board settled accounts with Mr John Thurman and paid him a balance of \$650 $\frac{39}{100}$ and taken his receipt for the same

It is supposed to be necessary that the Board pass a resolution directing the Treasurer and Comptroller to charge the said Balance to account of the City of New York

The following resolution is therefore offered,

A report of the Committee in relation to a Bason and Market at the foot of Duane Street was received Ordered that the consideration thereof be postponed and that the Committee report their opinion when it will be proper to erect the same

Resolved that the Lamp Committee cause Lamps that will afford conspicuous light to be placed in the following places to wit On the point of the Battery, near the Fly market ferry Stears, At Catharine Slip. At Powles hook ferry Stairs at the end of the dock and at the Hoboken ferry Stairs.

Resolved that the lamp committee be directed to make an experiment on a small scale in order to determine the economy and convenience of reflecting Lamps and to report in convenient time the result thereof and also their opinion as to the expedience of introducing the same in general use.

That the claims of Mr Smith for an abatement of dock hire are founded upon his being deprived of the piers at Fly market, Coffee house, and Old [256] Slips, also Remsen and Rikers wharf at Burling Slip and at Charlotte Slip by Isaac Clason

Mr Smith makes the amount of damages \$3501 this claim was presented to the Corporation 28 June 1804 two reports of the former Comptroller have been presented in relation to them and no decision had.

Mr Smith hired the public slips and wharves 1 May 1802 for two years for \$33,000 and he has since hired them for two years for \$30,000, the Corporation having leased the public wharves and Slips for \$3000 less the present term (it is believed) in consequence of Mr Smiths being now deprived of the benefit arising from those piers by a decision of the Supreme Court.

It appears that in the first report of the former Comptroller which it may be proper now to read an attempt is made to make a calculation of the probable damages sustained by Mr Smith. It is therein stated that the sum of \$2361 would be the most that Mr Smith in all probability could have lost by being deprived of these piers slips and wharves

Every information has been diligently sought on this subject in order to render equal justice. It is therefore believed that if the sum

of \$2000 be allowed to M^r Smith for the privations he has sustained, it will be a full compensation

A considerable sum of money is withheld by M^r Smith in consequence of the board not coming to a decision on his claims. It is therefore recommended that the sum of \$2000 be allowed him, provided he pay without delay the balance now due to the Corporation into the City Treasury. All which is respectfully submitted.

The following report was received from the Committee to whom was referred the applications respecting a new ferry at Corlaers hook.

The Committee to whom was referred the report of the Street Commissioner and also the several papers in relation to the application for a New ferry at Corlaers Hook.

Respectfully Report.

That your Committee have examined the subject referred to them with considerable attention a Majority of them have viewed the situation of the land on both sides of the River, and all the subscribers have also heard the several parties for, and against the application.

Upon a subject of so much importance as well [263] to the public interest. as to the individuals concerned.

Your Committee did not form an opinion without a proper degree of caution and deliberation. in presenting their report they have considered it their duty to assign the reasons and the principles by which their decision has been ground.

In the first place ferries are establishments of the greatest public importance. And in creating them the convenience, safety and accommodation of the Community are the principal objects to be attained the Charter of this City having invested the Common Council with the right of forming those establishments at their discretion. Your Committee considers that right in the nature of a trust which they are bound to exercise in such a manner as shall best promote the convenience and benefit of the public.

Your Committee believe it perfectly immaterial and totally foreign to the principles which should govern the decision of this board, to enquire whose property is benefitted. or is not benefitted by those institutions. such enquiry might lead to favoritism and partiality, but never could advance the general interest. As representatives of this City. it appeared to your Committee that the public is entitled to ex-

pect that the board will invariably adopt such measures as are calculated to benefit its constituents in general.

Two questions therefore presented themselves to the Committee. First whether the place proposed by the petitioners is in reality the best? and Secondly whether if that should be the Case any circumstances [264] did exist which should induce the Board to reject the better place?

Upon the first of these heads your Committee entertained no doubt, for Independent of the examinations which had formerly taken place the spot had been recently viewed by the Street Commissioner and by two of the City Surveyors. the result of their investigation was such as to convince them that the natural advantages of the situation proposed by the petitioners afford it a manifest superiority and of course entitled it to the preference of the board.

Upon examining the report of the Street Commissioner your Committee found it to be correct and they are decidedly of opinion that from the foot of Grand Street to Morrills point is not only the best place for a public ferry. but that it would be unwarrantably hazard- ing the interests of the public to permit the present opportunity of securing it to pass by.

In Stating to the board, the most important particulars in which the situation of the present petitioners is entitled to a preference, we shall only enumerate the following.

I The Landings between Willetts and Woodhulls are not nearly opposite to each other. while those between Cannons and Morrells are sufficiently so. the difference in distance is also very great. being more than one sixth part of a passage across the River.

II The ferry at Woodhulls is situated in a Cove which during the winter season is generally obstructed with ice. It appeared to your Committee by very satisfactory evidence that during Seven Weeks of the last season the [265] landing at Woodhulls was entirely useless and the boats were frequently drawn by horses to Morrills point [which] is generally accessible and notwithstanding the severity of the last season boats could ply between thence and Cannons every day. It was indeed contended before the Committee on the part of Mr Willett that as the last season was uncommonly rigorous no conclusion should be drawn from thence they cannot however but view it as affording a very strong reason in favour of Morrills landing for as that was accessible during a Winter so unusually severe it may reasonably be inferred that it will generally remain so—and again it is well known that even ordinary winters produce a considerable quantity of ice and

though the Channel of the River may remain unobstructed yet the Creeks and Coves are usually filled.

III. The favorable position of Cannon and Morrills Landings. in relation to the situation, course and direction of the tides and eddies affords another ground of superiority, equal to those which have already been mentioned. the course of the flood proceeds from the point of Corlaers hook to Morrills and from thence in an opposite direction it strikes the Brandemula shore. with the flood tide when the wind is up the river to effect a passage from Woodhulls to Willetts would always be difficult and with a horse boat most frequently impracticable for the tide points along the opposite shore are so strong and rapid as to render it very nearly impossible to pass them with a large boat, and unless they are passed so as to admit of putting [266] across near Morrells the boat will not reach nearer than Brandemula many other cases of difficulty might be mentioned. but the Committee content themselves with observing that in general passages can be made with much more certainty. safety. comfort. and expedition between Cannons and Morrells *that* [than] at the present place

IV. The foot of Grand Street on this side appears to your Committee the best, and most eligible spot for the establishment of a ferry. because it is by far the widest Street in that part of the City, because it communicates with the greatest number of intersecting Streets because a public bason of seventy feet is there reserved. and because the Market to supply that portion of the City will in all probability be established there, and it appears obvious to your Committee that the Market and the ferry should be United and communicate at the same landing

V. It appears to your Committee that in general the present ferry is alone adapted to the Summer Season and to mild and clement weather. It is only at favorable periods and with suitable tides that large boats. capable of transporting horses and Carriages can be made to ply. but that between Cannons and Morrills a passage can be generally effected at all periods.

In addition to the foregoing reasons the Committee might mention several others also entitled to considerable weight. near woodhulls Wharf on the opposite side there is situated a reef of considerable extent which is said to occasion rough Water and to be considerably dangerous whenever the Wind is high [267] this reef which cannot be avoided in a passage from Woodhulls to Willetts. is entirely out of the Course from Cannons to Morrills. Upon the whole the result of the investigation exercised by your Committee has been to convince

them that the present ferry is established at an improper and inconvenient place that it is not calculated for permanent duration and that the place proposed by the Petitioners is far the most suitable for a valuable and durable establishment.

With regard to the second point whether any circumstances existed which unfortunately committed the board to select the worst place and to refuse the best for a permanent establishment? Your Committee have also endeavoured to consider that question with all the attention it deserves. they submit to the board the opinion they have matured together with the facts and the reasonings which have led to its formation.

It appears from an examination of the Minutes that some time in 1802 a petition having been presented to the board for the establishment of a ferry from the Ground of Mr Willett. to that then owned by Samuel Titus. that on the 29 November following the Committee reported that such an establishment would be usefull. shortly afterwards the board proceeded to consider such report and agreed to establish a ferry at that place to commence at a future period.

on the 14 February 1804 and before any Grant was made or ordered to be made to Mr Willett Thomas Morrell presented a petition for a ferry. [268] this petition was ordered to lie upon the table. and no Notice was afterwards taken of it on the 27. February upon receiving the Report of the then Comptroller, a lease was directed to be made to Mr Willett for six Years without rent upon condition of his making the necessary Wharves and ferry Stairs and restoring them to the Corporation in good order.

Mr Woodhull having become possessed of the land of Samuel Titus, a similar lease was afterwards directed to be made to him which was afterwards extended for a twelve month longer as a further Compensation for his improvements.

No agreement was made with either of those parties that such ferry should remain a perpetual one. indeed none could have been made.

Alderman Minthorne one of your present Committee was also a member of the Committee who reported upon the subject of the present ferry he perfectly recollects that such former Committee were solicitous to procure an establishment at or near the place proposed by the petitioners and that they endeavoured to obtain the consent of the proprietors for that purpose—a ferry being deemed necessary the former Committee reported in favour of the establishment as

the best that could then be procured—but certainly did not imagine that the public became thereby precluded from the better place.

Your Committee being fully of opinion that the public interest will be promoted by granting the prayer of the petitioners it therefore only remains to be considered [269] whether any valid impediment exists in the engagement with Woodhull and Willett. Your Committee are equally decided in their opinion that no such impediment can be found.

For in the first place the petitioners are contented with receiving a lease to commence from the expiration of those of Woodhull and Willett—in the next place they do not pray an exclusive right, but are willing to receive a concurrent one.

What is the interest of M^r Woodhull and M^r Willett in the ferry and how would such a grant affect them? It is plain to Your Committee, that their only right is as Lessees. the whole ultimate and proprietary right of the establishment is in the Corporation—From the expiration of the Leases all the interest of the Lessees ceases and it is in the power of the Corporation to direct whatever regulation may be thought proper: In this view of the subject it must be evident that the interests of Woodhull and Willett cannot be effected. by an act which is limited to take place after those interests expire

It was also urged to your Committee that Woodhull and Willett had been at considerable expence in building Wharves and other accommodations for the ferry on this head the Committee would observe that although it is always a subject of regret when individuals lose by an enterprize. Yet that circumstance cannot operate as a substantial ground of argument. For M^r Woodhull and M^r Willett must have known that the board could not be considered as pledged to them for a longer period [270] than their leases express. and it would have been perfectly absurd in them to have imagined that the board would remain forever bound to continue an *infeior* [inferior] ferry when a far superior one can be procured.

Your Committee further observe that any expences in which they have engaged are also the result of a fair negociation and for which they have received the very consideration they contracted for. A Lease for six years without rent was granted to them as the stipulated price of those improvements. and if in the event they should not realize the benefits they anticipated still it furnishes no sufficient inducement in this board to sacrifice the interests of the public in their behalf.

Another argument against the adoption of this measure has also been suggested which on a slight view appears to possess some speciousness and is therefore worthy of reply—It has been said that it

would be legislating for a future board on this head your Committee would observe that the measure recommended by them is not to be considered as an act of Legislation for a future board but that it is making such provisions for the permanent welfare of the public as is not only justifiable but strictly necessary, and they take the present opportunity of refuting an idea which if sanctioned would nearly destroy the usefulness of this Corporation. for if it was considered that the common Council were only to direct such regulations as are to Commence or be Completed during the period for [which] its present members are elected it is plain that few [271] undertakings of an extensive or durable nature could ever be accomplished. The powers of the Common Council would be subject to continual diminution and would vary with the seasons of the Year—In December and January its authority would be greater than in September and October because in the former period members would have near a twelve month to serve. but in the latter they would be confined within the compass of a few weeks. the regulation of a Street the construction of a Common Sewer or the erection of a market would be considered as improper because the measure could not be completed until the intervention of another board. In opposition to an idea so extremely pernicious Your Committee would observe that though the Common Council in respect to the periods of its election is annual yet in its public relations it is always the same body and is bound to consult the permanent interests of the Community—a future board is properly bound by the Acts of its predecessors when those acts are judged expedient for the public benefit. nothing is more common and more necessary than the adoption of measures of a permanent nature and such is the practice of every day. In all affairs which concern the property or the more important and durable Interests of the public it is necessary to look beyond the present hour, thus leases are granted for twenty one Years or for a longer period, how often have leases been renewed for several Year[s] before their expiration? Thus property is purchased or sold in fee, Thus an exclusive establishment is considered [272] as vested in M^r Willett for six years and inasmuch as it was necessary to provide a ferry the present board is properly bound by the Act of its predecessors though a far superior establishment could now be procured Thus likewise the ferry leased to M^r Willett was established by one Common Council and by them directed to be put into operation during the administration of another. When the building of a New City Hall was directed it was never mentioned as a valid objection to that measure that it could scarcely be commenced

by the members who directed it and that it was legislating for many future boards. It was never deemed an impediment that it was anticipating the revenues of several Years over which the then members could have no controul and engaging their Successors into unvoidable expenditures of an extent so great as to prevent other improvements which they perhaps might deem more necessary. It cannot be requisite to cite a greater variety of instances in support of a principle thus obvious—should such an objection be suffered to prevail. it would prevent every solid and substantial improvement. destroy the usefulness of the Corporation, and confine its powers within a very narrow sphere. Your Committee are convinced that it is the duty of the board to provide for the best and permanent interests of the City whether those interests are future or immediate and that if they should be convinced that the contemplated establishment is necessary they would not be justifiable in hazarding it by the Caprice of individuals the accidents of time or the vicissitude of events. It is plain to [273] Your Committee that nature has constituted that spot the best for a ferry—It will ever remain so—It is therefore necessary and proper to secure it—It was also mentioned to Your Committee as improper to determine the place of a New ferry before the expiration of the present Leases inasmuch as it may tend to diminish the value of the property of M^r Woodhull and M^r Willett and prevent them from selling their lots at as high a price as they might otherwise obtain

And your Committee are aware that this consideration furnishes the principal motive of their objection

The opinion of the Committee on this head has already been mentioned. The effect of a ferry upon the value of private property has been regarded by them as totally foreign to their enquiries. They have considered themselves as acting in behalf of the public, and as bound to promote the public interests satisfied that the spot proposed by the petitioners is by far the best and that [it] is the duty of the board to secure for public purposes while an opportunity exists. Your Committee have considered that a former Committee was desirous of obtaining it but could not procure the consent of the then proprietor that consent has now been obtained but it may hereafter be with drawn—the property may fall into the hands of infant proprietors who are unable to cede. ground to the public and indeed a variety of impediments might occur which would prevent the public from obtaining an establishment so essential to their accommodations under these circumstances, and acting with a view to [274] promote the general

benefit. your Committee are decidedly of opinion that it is proper and necessary to secure the best establishment for the public while it is attainable.

Indeed the very reasoning which has been most strenuously urged in opposition to the immediate adoption of the measure. upon being duly investigated by your Committee appears to dictate a prompt decision.

Ferries are not established with a view to any effect upon private property but if they are calculated to increase its price. and if a conviction should exist that it will hereafter be necessary to change the place of their establishment. Justice and duty to the public most evidently dictate that instead of concealing such intention, notice should be given to the inhabitants. Why should Mr Woodhull and Mr Willett be permitted to dispose of property under an idea and with representations which this board are convinced to be fallacious?

The suspension of a measure which is deemed to be essential, lest it should diminish the value, or embarrass the sale of lots would in the opinion of the Committee render the board instrumental in the deceptions which might ensue. If therefore the board shall be of opinion that in the establishment of Ferries, it is bound to select the best place and that the place proposed by the petitioners is in reality the best it appears to Your Committee that the earliest publicity should be given to its intentions.

In a Case which is governed by principles so evident, your Committee deem it unnecessary to refer to precedent. Yet they may venture to appeal to the [275] ordinary practice of this board. there are several Wehauk ferries and several to Elizabeth town.

When it was found that one ferry to Brooklyn was not sufficient to accommodate the inhabitants, another was established from Catharine Slip to the vicinity of the same Brooklyn Wharf. Again Budds ferry was established between the Hoboken and Paulus hook ferries during the existence of their leases and though the establishment was in some measure the effect of a compromise the board in adopting the report expressly recognized the principle that it took no concern in the calculations of individuals but was governed by a "single eye" to the public interest. And it is further to be observed that in the very instance before the Committee the ferry at Corlaers hook was directed to be established more than a twelve month before it was to be put in operation.

Upon the subject of ferries generally an idea has been suggested which deserves the serious and deliberate attention of this board. It

has been asserted with great probability that the only effectual method of accommodating the public is by the creation of rival establishments. The competition produced by jealous and hostile interests, it has been reasonably supposed will afford the public a choice, and prevent those impositions which are frequently practised when the power of accommodation is vested in a single man, should this idea hereafter receive the sanction of the Common Council, it will be optional with the board at the expiration of the present Leases to maintain both establishments. But if, they should then consider [276] the present ferry to be so inferior in point of situation as to be incapable of being supported Your Committee upon a due consideration of the subject. and to prevent any complaint of hardship. are of opinion that it would be proper to restore to M^r Woodhull and M^r Willett the property they have ceded. together with all improvements thereon.

The present petitioners have offered to cede to the public a lot of ground at the foot of Grand Street together with sufficient ground on the opposite shore to erect thereon sufficient accommodations for the ferry and to surrender the same to the board for public purposes upon receiving a lease similar to that made to Woodhull and Willett and commencing at its expiration—Your Committee consider such proposition to be fair and reasonable and that it would conduce to the public interest to accede to it. but they recommend that an immediate cession of the ground be directed in order to prevent any accidents which might intervene to deprive the public of the establishment.

In presenting this report. Your Committee offer to the board the result of their reflections upon a full and impartial examination of the subject referred to them while they have patiently attended to the Claims of individuals whose private interests are supposed to be concerned and while they have been anxious to dispense strict and equal justice to each of those individuals they have been particularly studious to promote the public interest and to perform the duties with which they are more immediately intrusted They might indeed have [277] observed that M^r Cannon one of the petitioners is the oldest settler at Corlaers hook. that he has kept a ferry at that place near fifty Years. and had been led to form a reasonable expectations that whenever a regular ferry was established the first lease would have been granted to him, but the pretensions of M^r Cannon on the one side and those of M^r Willet on the other, in the opinion of your Committee are alike immaterial and should equally Yield to those measures which the substantial and general interest of the public requires.

Another objection was also stated in the Counter petition as considerable stress appears to have been the principal ground of objection with many of the petitioners. Your Committee have thought it worthy of a particular reply. This objection is that the proprietors of the Turnpike would sustain material injury and that the neighbouring Inhabitants would be put to considerable expences in altering their fences in consequence of the diversion of the Road. This objection appears to your Committee to be altogether ill founded for in the first place it is obvious that an improvement of the ferry will increase the travelling on the road and so far from injuring will considerably benefit the proprietors of the Turnpike. Secondly M^r Morrell has stipulated that he will cede a public road equal in breadth to the Turnpike to communicate with it and to form a continuation to his landing of consequence the Turnpike itself would become improved without [278] any inconvenience being sustained by the Inhabitants. and Your Committee also observe that the Turnpike would be rendered more conformable to the act by which it was established for by a recurrence to the act of 1803 constituting such Turnpike Company, it is found that they were directed to lay out and open the road in such a manner as to terminate at a place opposite or nearly opposite to Cannon Tavern by name this is not the case with respect to Woodhulls landing but is strictly so as it regards the landing of Morrell.

M^r Woodhulls in his verbal communication to the Committee also mentioned that he owned a landing superior to the present at a place termed the Drumpoint. and that it was his intention to erect a Wharf there this point which divides his land from that of M^r Morrells is at a very inconsiderable distance from the present ferry and is formed by the reef which has been already mentioned. it must always be liable to very great objection on account of the roughness of the water and no labour which can be bestowed upon it can render it equal in point of situation. safety and convenience to the land of M^r Morrell.

Your Committee have been thus particular in order that the reasons and motives which have governed their determination might be fairly presented to the board upon a full and impartial examination of the subject they are decidedly of opinion that the place proposed by the petitioners is by far the best [279] and most eligible for a permanent public ferry, and that as no sufficient obstracles exist to prevent its being established after the present leases terminates the public Interest requires that such establishment should take place.

Your Committee therefore recommend the following Resolutions.
Resolved that a ferry be established from the foot of Grand Street

to the point of land belonging to Thomas Morrell at the opposite shore to commence from the expiration of the present leases granted to Mr Woodhull and Mr Willett and that a lease similar to that made to Woodhull and Willett be granted to Cannon and Morrell to commence from the termination of the leases of the present ferry upon their immediately ceding a lot of ground at the foot of Grand Street and suitable ground on the opposite Shore both to be selected by the Comptroller, undertaking to make suitable accommodations for the ferry and agreeing to surrender the possession of the same and all improvements thereto [to] the board at the expiration of their lease.

Resolved that if at the expiration of the present leases. the board should deem it inexpedient for the public interest to continue a ferry from Willetts Wharf to Long Island. that the property ceded to them by Woodhull and Willett be restored to the said Woodhull and Willett.

But if the reasoning contained in the proceeding Report should not be deemed conclusive by the Board there is a method of securing every contemplated advantage to the public upon such terms as to remove every difficulty and silence every possible objection provided the present Petitioners should agree to the same that is to direct the new Ferry, immediately to take place. and the public to have the immediate benefit of the Landings. and in order that Mess^{rs} Woodhull and Willett should have no pretence of complaining. that in addition to their present Lease a Lease of such new Landing shall also be granted to them during the present term without Rent. and to compensate the petitioners for their Grant to the board that a lease be granted to them commencing from the expiration of that of Woodhull and Willett By that means the public would have the immediate use of the ferry. Woodhull and Willett would receive an additional grant and no objection could be urged that it is and act of which the operation is to be in future though your Committee are inclined to prefer the resolution first offered in order to afford the petitioners time to make suitable improvements and accommodations Yet if this board should not think proper to concur with them in sentiment in that Case on account of

the superior advantages of the situation and the necessity of securing it to the public. they would [281] offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that if the present petitioners for a New ferry from the foot of Grand Street to Morrells landing shall consent to such arrangement and make immediate cessions of a lot of land at the foot of the said Street and of suitable land on the opposite Shore that a New ferry be immediately established from the foot of Grand Street to Morrells point on the opposite Shore and that a lease of the said landing be also granted to M^r Woodhull and M^r Willett without rent during the continuance of their present term and to compensate Cannon and Morrell for their Cession of ground that a similar lease be made to them commencing from the expiration of that of Woodhull and Willett upon their undertaking to furnish suitable accommodations to have the same ready at the Commencement of the lease granted to them and surrendering the same to the board at the expiration of their term But if the said Woodhull and Willett should refuse to accept of such grant that then a lease shall be made to Cannon and Morrell for Six Years to commence immediately upon their making such improvements and agreeing to surrender the same to the board at the expiration of their term

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That it shall be lawful for the auctioneers to sell House hold furniture and articles

of Lumber at the place assigned as a Horse market, near the New Watch house—and that it shall be lawful for the Sheriff and his Deputies, Constables, Marshalls or other officers, to sell Goods &c in Execution at or in front of the house of Joseph Burgois in Vesey Street and at the Corner of East George and Lombard Streets in addition to the places now assigned by Law.

The account exhibited for those privations is inadmissible in the opinion of your Committee, at least to its full amount.

In order however to bring this business to a close your Committee recommend that Mess^{rs} Ash and Pearsee pay without delay the

sum of fifteen hundred Dollars into the Treasury; and discharge all the Costs of suit accrued on the case.

from the Corporation. which Pier forms one intire side of said Slip that the Dock master, Charles Smith has and still continues to collect the Wharfage of the Slip side of the said Pier where since it has been erected. The second, states that, for erecting the Bulk-head across the said Slip, he has been assessed between five and six hundred Dollars, and prays redress in the premises.

With respect to the first. It has been an established [308] rule and practice of the Corporation not to relinquish the Wharfage of the public Slips on either side; and no inducement has been discovered why in this instance they should yield this right, especially when it is considered that, by erecting and extending this Pier M^r Clason formed a Compleat Bason and safe harbour on the East side, which is wholly his property; and without having erected this Pier no Bason could have been formed, and his own Waters would have remained exposed to the Westerly Storms. Again the Corporation have rented to Charles Smith all the public Docks and Slips, and have so far put it out of their own power to grant M^r Clason the Wharfage on the Slip side. With respect to the over assessment for erecting the Bulk head, some considerable enquiry, and inspection, has been made. It appears that M^r Clason has a very large property on the East side of said Charlotte Slip, and extending from the river to Harman Street, all in the adjacent Neighbourhood of the place, and no fact has been discovered that the assessors should have rated M^r Clason more than an equitable portion according to the benefit received by him. as correct a view of the premises as could be made from bare inspection is hereunto subjoined

The public will be benefitted by the acquisition of valuable Lots on both sides of the River—they will acquire the immediate use of the best landings and the progress of improvement in that part of the Town will be greatly facilitated and promoted by the constant and easy intercourse that will be afforded with Long Island with a view of submitting the question to the board in a specific shape the Committee beg leave to submit the following resolution in which they have been studious to attend to the public interest. and to prevent any misunderstanding which might hereafter place the rights of the board in question

Resolved that a ferry be, and the same is hereby established from the foot of Grand Street to Morrells point on Long Island, upon condition that Abraham Cannon immediately cede to this board in fee simple a suitable lot fronting on Grand Street and Thomas Morrell immediately cede in fee simple to the board two suitable Lots at the aforesaid point and that leases of the said ferry be granted [314] Marinus Willett and Richard M Woodhull during the continuance of their lease of the ferry from Willetts Wharf to Williamsburg. and to Abraham Cannon and Thomas Morrell for Six Years from and after the expiration of the aforesaid lease granted to Willett and Woodhull provided the said Abraham Cannon and Thomas Morrell shall erect good and convenient ferry Stairs and other proper accommodations for the said ferry and have the same in readiness by the commencement of their lease. and surrender the same to the board for the use of the public at the expiration thereof, and resolved further that the lease of the ferry from Willetts Wharf to Williamsburg granted to the said Willett and Woodhull be extended and enlarged for the space of six Years from the expiration of their present lease thereof, the said Lessees respectively always to remain subject and be bound to conform to such rules and regulations as the Common Council shall from time to time think proper to order and direct with respect to the number of men and boats to be employed. the qualifications and description of Men and boats. and in respect to every other particular/y

which shall be deemed necessary for the better governing and conducting the said ferries. And likewise that a clause be inserted in the said leases that the board retain the right of instituting other ferries [315] and of licencing boats *of* [if] the public convenience should require it.

Reports, that having viewed the said Slip at Low Water, [they] are of opinion that it ought to be filled in about 25 feet, and the ferry stairs on the East side moved nearer the end; as the neighbours in the vicinity complain. that it is almost impossible for them to live there particularly when the Slip is bare and as we have been witnesses of the facts, We therefore recommend that the Street Commissioner be directed to advertise for estimates and report to this board with all convenient speed, [316] having also examined the pier on the West side, we find about 4 feet Water and upon further examination for upwards of 200 feet in the river, we found the depth of Water about 12 feet, the Committee are therefore of opinion that the said pier ought to be extended to the permanent Line with an L of 20 feet north Easterly as the water is very shole. and the expence would be but very trifling. when compared to the great accommodation it would aford to the vast number of boats resorting this Slip, and as the owners of the wharfs on the East side are only waiting for the pier now in contemplation to be run out. Your Committee are also of opinion that *that* the west side of the Slip ought to be exclusively for Hay boats, we are creditably informed that between 20 and 30 ferry Boats resort this Slip, would therefore recommend that the East side together with the L on the West side be for the sole use of the respective ferry boats, and

the yearly revenue that will be received from the ferrys will no doubt be sufficient for to defray the expences.

It may be proper to remark that, from the unusual severity of the last winter, which called into exercise every charitable emotion, and a corresponding disposition to relieve the distresses of the poor, the Corporation took a lively interest in affording them relief; which occasioned the expenditure of [a] large sum of money. From this circumstance, the provision made for the last year has not been able to meet the demands on the Treasury.

It is believed that, four or six weeks will elapse before any resources can be expected from the newly assessed Tax. The sums remaining due from sundry individuals for Water Lot rents and other dues will give some relief from time to time. nevertheless it is believed adviseable that the Corporation take a loan from the Manhattan Company of twenty thousand Dollars, which may enable them to answer the demands against the board until relief can be had from the tax.

That the report of a Committee upon the petition of Abraham Stagg on the 13. of February last, recommending that the prayer of the petitioner to be paid for having said intersections be granted, was agreed to by the Board, and an [343] Ordinance was passed in conformity thereto, to assess the amount thereof upon the inhabitants benefited thereby.

It appears to the Street Commissioner that this Committee did not advert to the situation of ground for which M^r Stagg was to be paid; for they have allowed him for the intersection at the same rate he did the rest of the Street including brick and curbstone; when it is plain it ought to have been much less; as neither brick or Curbstone are included in the space for which he claimed compensation.

By a law of the State, passed in April 1801, the Corporation are to be charged with one third of the expence of improving the Public

Slips This has been omitted by the assessors in the case before us ; but with no good reason as this intersection fronts the head of the Slip, and the open space between the Slip and Cherry Street, containing about seventy feet, along the Slip by thirty five feet in breadth, as stated in the petition.

It is only certain that if this work had been done separately from M^r Staggs Contract it would not have cost above one hundred dollars, but by the statement, it is estimated at Dolls 184.90—besides expences of assessing and Collecting.

The Street Commissioner is therefore of the Opinion, that as the Corporation are bound to pay one third, and the assessment is far beyond a reasonable sum for the work that has been done. The Common Council ought to pay one half of the above, to wit, Dolls, 92.45, toward [344] the said assessment.

The Road Committee, agreeably to the tenor of a resolution of the 12th of August last, directing them to procure a profile of the Middle road, with a view to a permanent regulation thereof, and to

report how much ought to be completed this season; have the honor to make the following partial,

Report,

That in consequence of the absence of the Surveyors, and the sudden appearance of Malignant Fever, they have not yet been able to obtain a complete survey of the Middle road, but they herewith submit a profile of about 1600 feet [371] between the Bridge near the powder house and William Ogden's gate; which they are of opinion deserve the first attention; and is as much as it is probable can be completed before the ensuing winter.

The regulating red line on the profile cuts down more of the Hill than might be supposed necessary on a slight view of the premises, and this opinion might be supported by a remark, that a faint black line on the profile, which is considerably steeper, is the ascent usually given to hills on a Turnpike. In opposition to this it must be taken into consideration, that although the ascents of the turnpike hills (which are 8 or 9 inches on 10 feet) are sufficiently small to answer the purpose of slow carting in the country, they would be found extremely inconvenient near the City when the passage of carriages are so frequent, and that it is beyond a question that the hill will soon be sunk to that level, if it is not now done. It is further to be observed that the proposed regulation (being above $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches on 10 feet) is a very considerable ascent [372] for a continued line of that length, and that it can be dug down cheaper by one operation, *that* [than] by detached periods.

The Committee believe that a considerable sum may at this time be saved in the expence of this road if as many of the men at Bellevue Gate that are able were employed at such wages as the Street Commissioner in his discretion may suppose they merit, after deducting therefrom a reasonable charge for their diet; The Street Commissioner represents that there are 15 or 20 at that place who are willing to engage in this way, and may be the means of rendering them a real service, while it will be an easy and cheap method of affecting this object.

The Committee intended in a short time to explore the road generally and report what further repairs are in their opinion necessary at this period: But they believe no time ought to be lost in commenced [ing] that above mentioned. They therefore propose the subjoined [373] resolutions relative to that subject.

Report,

Of the Committee of the Board of Health on the Subject of enumerating the inhabitants of this City.

The Committee to whom it was referred. to consider the expediency of taking an enumeration of the inhabitants who remained in the City during the late epidemic, report,

That they believe such an enumeration to be important & desirable, for the [394] following reasons. Because it will supply the only means of calculating the extent, virulence & ravages of the disease and of estimating the danger which must have arisen from a longer continuance of the inhabitants in the more exposed parts of the City.

Because the result will materially aid the selection of the safest situations in the City, in the event of a similar epidemic hereafter, will beget confidence in the healthfulness of such situations, and thereby will serve to diminish the evils and inconveniences of a general flight and a total suspension of Business.

Because there is much reason to believe it will result from such an enumeration that the mortality in the City was far less, in proportion to the number of People, than has been generally supposed, and certainly less than took place in many Districts of the Surrounding Country.

Because, as a medical document, this enumeration will Supply one, of a number of important data on which alone physicians will be enabled accurately to compare the Character of the late [395] epidemic with former ones of a similar kind as well as with such as may occur hereafter, and thereby to Deduce inferences of a practical & perhaps of a very interesting nature.

And finally, Because in the future developements of this pestilence, applications and uses of an important kind may grow out of such a Document, of which the present state of knowledge does not warrant the expectation.

To obviate any reasonable Objection as to the expence that may attend this enumeration, Your Committee would suggest that the persons to be appointed by the 12th Section of the Jury Act, for making and returning a list of proper persons to serve as jurors, and which, by the directions of the said act is necessary to be made about this period, should, in the execution of that duty make the enumeration required,

which can add very little to the expence of making, and returning the list of Jurors,

The following report was received from the Street Commissioner, to wit. The Street Commissioner to whom was referred the Communication of M^r Jones relative to Streets near the two Mile stone has the honour to report

That he does not find that the Common Council have ever laid out, adopted or proposed any Streets [426] in the block encompassed by Broadway, Art Street the Bowery and Bleecker Street which includes the ground delineated on the plan presented by Mr Jones.

Since the reference of Mr Jone's communication he has consented to alter his plan to meet a regulation of Minthorne Street proposed by Alderman Minthorne, and the subject as it is agreed to by these Gentlemen stands thus.

1. That Minthorne Street be made 75 feet from the Bowery to be taken from the South side and to be opened free of expence, to the Corporation by Alderman Minthorne to Orchard Street

2. That the Street proposed by Mr Jones to be called Jones Street be 75 feet South of his Northerly corner on the Bowery and be opened 75 feet wide to Broadway. By this regulation Minthorne Street and Jones Street will come out opposite each other in the Bowery

3 That a Street proposed by Mr Jones to be called Bond Street be opened 70 feet wide from the Bowery to Broadway parallel to Jones Street and two hundred feet South of it

The Street Commissioner believes it will be a good regulation and recommends the acceptance of these cessions

The distance from the Bowery to Broadway at Bleecker Street is more than One thousand feet but at Art Street not more than 400 It will be too large and inconvenient to have blocks of the extent of the first Street, and as it is necessary to stop several streets at Bleecker Street It is recommended to continue the Center Street [427] called Mulberry (or Catherine Street) to Art Street and parallel to Broadway. it will then divide the block described in equal parts. This plan has been submitted to Mr David Jones who thinks well of it but cannot determine to give cession without first consulting his father. Upon examining the City Map it will be seen that Bleecker Street comes out in the Bowery too far Southerly. It could be altered to suit public convenience without any reasonable objection. It is therefore proposed that it be run from the Bowery more northerly until it comes out in Broadway at a point opposite to the Mouth of David Street continued to that Street by this alteration there will be almost a straight communication from the East River to the State Prison and it will be more parallel to the Streets to the North and South of it

Agreeably to an order of the Board in September the Street Commissioner has caused a Survey of the Block between Bleecker and

Prince Streets, which is herewith presented, and he recommends that a Street be opened from Broadway to the Bowery through the said Block to the points and in the direction of the red lines drawn upon the said survey And that the said Street be at least fifty feet wide and if it is not materially more expensive that the same be of the width of Sixty feet.

 [495] The Committee of Finance with great solicitude have seriously reflected on the present arrangement respecting the disposition of the public property

This subject embraces three leading and important considerations. The first is—The improvement of the City and suburbs in such parts of it, where the public property is situate. The second is. To secure to the public a reasonable compensation from the Tenants, and the third is, to reconcile the inhabitants on the public Estate. as far as may be consistant with justice, and the public expectation from this Board as trustees of the general interest.

It was supposed that the arrangements, and disposition of the public property the last Year, embraced the above stated important objects. The Common Council however have supposed that, an improvement on the plan of the last Year would be made, by disposing of the public property at auction.

It is therefore only necessary to state, what we have done already, in the prosecution of the plan, for the disposal of the public Estate. We have instituted a valuation, and appointed the time when this property shall be disposed of at public auction, and what remains to be determined is, the terms on which the Leases shall be granted

With respect to the property in Town—The Committee after the most mature reflection recommend that, the conditions and terms of the Leases be as follows—Viz

The Lessees or their Successors or assigns, shall, [496] before the expiration of twenty one years, erect good & substantial Brick buildings, covered with Slate or tile, of at least two Stories high, besides the Garret, from the Ground sills thereof to the plates. That if buildings as aforesaid shall be erected, the Mayor Aldermen & Commonalty. shall again Lease to the person or persons who may hold the original Lease (at the end of the term) the said premises for a subsequent term of twenty one Years, on such terms and conditions as shall at that day be agreed upon between the parties or as shall be determined by two sworn appraisors, one of whom to be chosen by each of the parties, and in case of non-agreement they to choose a third—Unless the Corporation at that day shall choose to dispose of the public property at Auction. in such case—a fair valuation shall be made of the Buildings and improvements by sworn appraisors are to be chosen by the Corporation and the other by the Lessee in manner aforesaid. And if it shall so happen that buildings as above mentioned shall not have been erected, at or before the expiration of the term of twenty one years—that, in such case the owner or owners shall remove the same within ten days. It is also recommended that when any of the present buildings shall be taken down, or otherwise removed that. no buildings shall be erected other than mentioned above.

That in all cases when Leases expire which shall be given in pursuance of the above plan, it is expressly understood that—it shall be optional with [497] the Corporation, either to take the buildings and improvements at a fair valuation as aforesaid or to grant a further term in the manner and form above stated. That the usual clauses and provisors be also stipulated in the said leases, that the Tenant or tenants shall pay all assessments impositions &c which may be levied and raised on the said property during the term.

Your Committee believe that the above recommended plan, fully embraces the three above stated important objects and considerations. That while it gives encouragement and security to persons who shall purchase leases on the public property—at the same time holds the contrroll of the public Estate under the direction of the Corporation at the expiration of any term.

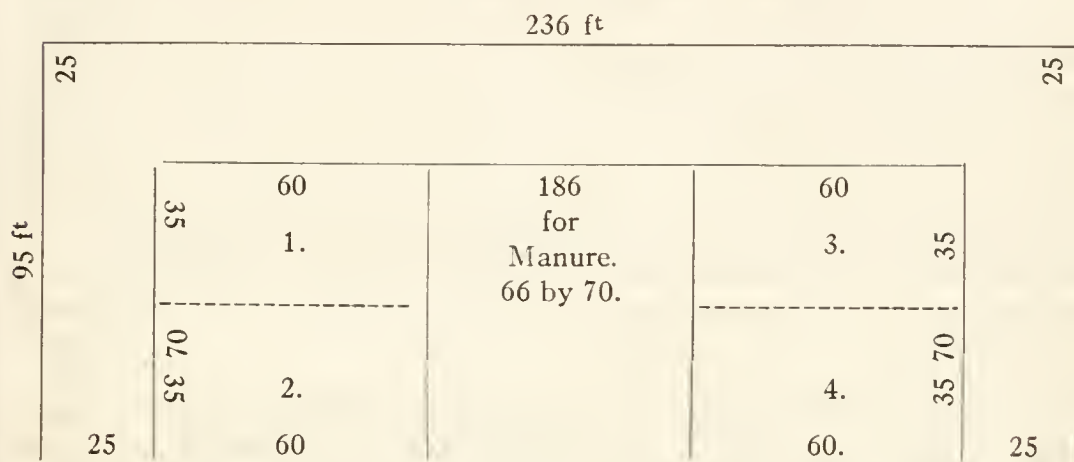

Therefore Resolved that in testimony of the lively indignation which this board feels respecting the atrocious murder of a Citizen of the United States and this daring aggression upon our national rights that the said John Pierce be interred with the assent of his relations at the public expence on Monday next at 12 OClock, that Aldermen Fairlie, Mott & M^r Miller be a Committee to make the necessary arrangements on this occasion that this Board will attend the funeral in a body that all the Captains of American Vessels in the harbor be requested to hoist their colors half mast on that day that the bells be tolled during the solemnity and that our fellow Citizens generally be invited to unite with us on this melancholy occasion

The Mayor having informed the Common Council that he had immediately communicated to the President of the United States, a statement of the improper conduct of the British Ships of War off our port.

Resolved that the Board approve of the Mayor's prompt attention to the interest's of our City and that he be requested to obtain such further information as may be practicable respecting illegal Captures, impressments and detentions off our port by the said Ship and to transmit the same to the national executive in full confidence that proper measures will be adopted for the vindication of our national honour and interest.

Ist For finishing the regulation of the Middle Road, from the South side of the Bridge near the powder house to John Murray's gate, agreeably to the profile. The hill is to be dug out forty feet wide, and the hollow filled in fifty feet wide on the line of the profile, and the rocks removed to the Bridge. If the earth from the hill should be found insufficient, more may be taken from the side Banks.

II. For erecting a substantial Stone Bridge across the road above mentioned in place of the present Bridge. with Walls on each side about ten feet high in the Centre, and one hundred and fifty feet long; besides a parapet wall three feet high and two feet thick above the surface of the Road. The arch must be seven feet high, [37] five feet wide, and fifty feet long, and be laid with good Masons Work in lime and sand. The side Walls are to be put up dry, faced on each side, battered, and sufficiently thick to resist the pressure of the earth which will be filled in between them.

III. For erecting a substantial arched Bridge of Stone on the Middle Road, over the stream South of Mr Post's in lieu of the present Bridge. The arch is to be eight feet high, five feet broad, and sixty feet in length across the road, and laid in lime and sand. The side Walls are to be put up dry, battered as aforesaid, and to be about twelve feet high, besides three feet parapet, two feet thick, and two hundred feet in length, on each side. In addition to the stone work of this Bridge, the Contractor must engage to fill in between the walls of the Bridge and at each end thereof, agreeably to the line of the profile and dig out and regulate so much of the Road as will be necessary to obtain the Earth for that purpose.

The materials on the Ground and in the adjacent parts of the Road will be at the disposal of the Contractors; from whom security will be required. that the work will be done at least equal to the walls laid by Anthony Smith, at Kessing Bridge.

That in his Opinion the claims of which the petitioners are apprehensive are unfounded and consequently [74] that there is nothing to indemnify them against Perhaps it may be said by these

Gentleman, if the Corporation hazard nothing by granting us the Prayer of our petition, it is of Course at most a nugatory Act, and cannot involve them, while it will essentially relieve us from what we are informed by Counsel may possibly happen—With as much propriety might it be demanded of a Grantor to Warrant the Grantee against the tortious and illegal acts of Strangers while in the Case now under consideration this Consequence might result, in addition to the trouble of drawing & executing the required instrument of indemnity, the claims of M^r Lorrillard might receive a stronger Colour of propriety and foundation from the Circumstance that the petitioners would eventually be relieved against them. or the petitioners might be rendered less assiduous in repelling them It cannot be determined what might be the Extent of this Consideration either on the minds of a Court and Jury or on the applicants But certain it is, in respect to the former, that individuals are Viewed and dealt with in a more favorable manner than the public. and in respect to the latter considered as individuals, it may with much appearance of probability be said that security might lead to inactivity on their part, it will follow then that the Corporation ought not, unless for very strong & conclusive reasons [75] to interfere in a Case like the present—In order to determine this the more satisfactorily, the following Concise statement of facts is presented.

M^r Lorrillard is intitled to the reversion in fee of the 4 Lots in Canal Street spoken of by the petitioners, he having granted Leases of them respectively for the Term of 20 Years from the 1st of May last, to the Petitioners—Sometime since a Jury was summoned pursuant to the act for laying out Streets, to value such parts of these Lots, as were required for the opening of Canal Street The Jury were sworn and gave in their Verdicts which it must be Supposed were Satisfactory to M^r Lorrillard as he did not move for a new Inquest—The Directions then of the Act, in respect to M^r Lorrillard have been complied with. what these Directions are will be seen from the following Extract. “ Which Jury shall inquire of and assess such damages and recompence as they shall under all the circumstances Judge fit to be awarded to the Owner or Owners of such ground for their respective losses according to their several interests and Estates therein ” Some time after similar proceedings were had respecting the Petitioners, the Lessees of the same lots. They say they are satisfied with the Verdicts But complain of their liability to M^r Lorrillard for the whole Rent of the Lots, and his threat to inforce such liability—It remain[s] therefore to be seen whether such liability exists. M^r

[76] Lorrillard has received a Valuation according to his Interest and Estate in the Premises.

The Attorney of the Board cannot state what were the calculations of the Jury on the subject. But on principle, Mr Lorrillards Claim is unquestionably extinguished—He demands rent, now Rent is defined to be a certain profit issuing yearly out of Lands and Tenements. It Constitutes therefore a part of his Interest & Estate, and according to his Interest and Estate, the Valuation must be presumed to have proceeded—He has therefore received a satisfaction, in legal Contemplation, for the Rent which he now makes the subject of demand

But upon a broader View of the subject and without reference to technical definitions Mr Lorrillard must be supposed to be compensated by the verdict of the Jury, to the full Value of his Estate in the premises—so that what he was worth in Land is now made up to him in Money

The Jury must have considered their Verdict in this point of view, or they could not have supposed that they were allowing him such damages & recompence as were fit to be under all the Circumstances *to be* awarded to him—But supposing for a moment that Complete Justice had not been done to Mr Lorrillard still the Lessees have nothing to apprehend from his demand of rent because their being deprived of the Land by force of the Act referred to, must be considered [77] as tantamount and equivalent to an Eviction at Common Law, in which Case the rent ceases of Course and the plea of Eviction is a good bar to the action for rent

The injustice of the demand apprehended by the Petitioners is strikingly evident in asmuch as the Lessor has been paid for the Ground its full Value (this must be supposed) which becomes the principal in his hands. And can be put out & Interest secured upon it, in addition to which he proposes to demand Rent or Interest at the hands of his ejected Lessees, thus making double interest out of the same sum—A proceeding in which he cannot reasonably expect to be sanctioned by any Court or any principle of Justice—From these Considerations the Undersigned has the Honor to recommend that the petitioners have leave to withdraw their petition—It may be proper to state that Mr Harrison Counsel of the Board concurs in this recommendation

The Committee appointed to Superintend the Erecting of Piers between the Exchange & White Hall Slips have the Honor to—Report that the questions offered to M^r Harison by the Street Commissioner together with his answers have been shewn to M^r Coles who has Consented to Contribute his proportion towards the piers upon the following principles

1^t That the Ell projecting Easterly from the west pier be paid for and the wharfage thereof be considered the Exclusive right of the proprietors in the same [258] manner as is agreed with respect to the Center pier

2 That the Corporation relinquish their right to half the Wharfage at the Ends of the Piers in consideration of M^r Coles & M^r Goelet relinquishing their claim to damages for receding from the Slip. the half of the End of said Piers to be the Exclusive right of the said Coles & Goelet

3 That the Corporation receive the Wharfage on the Slip sides and the proprietors all the residue according to their several interests which several interests shall in this case be determined by the width of their respective fronts and in all cases the width of the Street leading to the river or such parts thereof as hath been made by the owners of the Corner lots shall be added to said Corner Lots

The Committee are aware that M^r Harisons Opinion respecting the interests of the several proprietors is different from the above propositions which are founded upon the Statement C M^r Harison having decided in favor of the Statement A But it ought to be understood that the law upon which he founded his opinion supposes or may be deemed to suppose the term of the water rights and the Expence of making the water into land to be in proportion to the width of their several fronts Whereas it is clear that the corner lots on Slips or Streets have been Obligated to expend a Considerable additional sum The proposition of M^r Coles is therefore to put the Corner lots upon

an Equal footing as to their payments [259] & interest in the revenue with the other proprietors

The proposition of Mr Coles to give up his claim to damages for the Bulk head and Waters and take as an Equivalent the half of the End of the Pier claimed by the Corporation appears to the Committee to be such as the Corporation ought to comply with; for they will receive a front on the Slip of Twenty feet in lieu of fifteen feet and the End of the pier & thereby be released from a difficult and doubtful settlement of damages which might be attended with the Expences of a suit at Law

The committee having taken up this subject in various points of View and believing that further delay will increase the difficulties of settlement recommend that the Corporation Accede to the propositions now made as a permanent adjustment of this affair. There does not appear any disposition in the other proprietors hostile to this mode of settlement and the Committee know of no objection to it except that Mr Goelet has not been Consulted in this particular But as he has uniformly refused to contribute the Corporation may be considered his Successor and they will consequently have to advance towards the piers already built for his rights &c therein \$603 $\frac{35}{100}$ which the Committee recommend to be paid to the Contractors And that Mr Goelet have Six months to refund the money to be advanced by the Corporation on paying interest for the same and that the Street Commissioner give him notice accordingly.

The Committee further report. there has been Collected of the new Tax \$37.471 $\frac{87}{100}$

The amount of debts which the Corporation owe the Committee have not been able to ascertain with that Exactness they could wish. The Comptroller's Books do not furnish the necessary information but they have learned from other sources that the Corporation owe to the Manhattan Bank for money loaned (the principal and interest) amounting to \$102.715 $\frac{80}{100}$ that they owe upon Bonds given to Individuals after deducting what money has been already paid on them \$44.228 there is also Owing on Contracts for building Bridges Docks Piers &c^a the proportion which the Corporation is bound to pay is \$12.713 these several sums making altogether \$159.656 $\frac{80}{100}$ Dollars. It is expected that some part of this sum will be refunded by assessments that [262] are intended to be laid on New Streets that have been opened. It is not likely that more than \$40.000 can be raised from these assessments which will still leave \$119.656 $\frac{80}{100}$ to be provided for either by additional taxes or by the Sale of Public property for it is believed that the part of the Tax that still remains uncollected and the remainder of the Corporation revenue will scarcely

To the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New York in Senate and Assembly convened

The Memorial of the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened most respectfully Sheweth

That the laying out Streets and Roads in the City of New York form a branch of their duties highly interesting and important. The necessity of projecting them in such a manner as to unite regularity and order with the public convenience and benefit and in particular to promote the health of the City must be obvious in the prosecution of this subject however various and complicated difficulties and embarrasments exists. The first which naturally presents itself is a radical defect in the power of your memorialists any regulation however promotive of utility adopted by one Board unless carried fully into execution may be disregarded or annulled by its successors: There are others equally palpable and of very considerable magnitude. The diversity of Sentiments and opinions which has heretofore existed and probably will always exist among the members of the Common Council, the incessant remonstrances of proprietors against plans however well devised or beneficial wherein their individual Interests do not concur and the Impossibility of completing those plans thus opposed but by a tedious and expensive course of Law are obstacles of a serious and very perplexing nature

[306] As these evils are continually Accumulating by reason of our increasing population and the rise of frequent Subdivisions of prop-

erty. Your Memorialists find it necessary to appeal to the Wisdom of the Legislature for relief in the premises

Your memorialists do therefore pray that such measures may be adopted by your Honorable Body as will obviate the Difficulties which at present lie in the way of public improvements in the City of New York or at least in such parts thereof as shall appear most susceptible of advantage from the interposition of your Honorable Body

That Various representations have been made to your Petitioners in Common Council respecting the exposed and dangerous Situation of the Powder Magazine belonging to the City near the fresh Water Pond in the Ninth Ward thereof and in which the Powder belonging to the State is kept That the said Magazine is in the Opinion of your Petitioners becoming dangerous to the Inhabitants of that Vicinity, but that the Common Council having assented to the keeping of the public Stores therein do not think themselves authorized to remove the same without the Concurrence of the Legislature That a Regard to the Public Safety has led to the practice of keeping Powder Magazines as much [323] as possible in retired and unfrequented places

where they woul'd be less exposed to Accidents, and woul'd endanger as few persons as possible if Accidents should happen

That tho' the Situation of said Magazine was not improper in those respects when it was first established, yet at present it is surrounded on all sides by Inhabitants at short distances and that, in Seasons of general Sickness great numbers of the Poor are quartered near it by the City Corporation. That among the Works which with the Improvement of that part of the City are necessarily carried on, is the blowing of Rocks from which the Magazine has already been endangered, and that all these Causes of Alarm will probably increase with the increase of Inhabitants and improvement, and that the Situation of said Magazine renders the public property less secure both in ordinary times & particularly in times of public Danger, than the Interest of the State seems to require. Your Petitioners therefore respectfully pray that the Legislature will be pleased to cause a Building to be provided for the keeping of the Powder belonging to the State in the Vicinity of Spyt den Duyvel or in some other place less dangerous to the public and more secure for the Military Stores than the present Situation of the said Magazine, and that the said Powder may be removed to such other place, or that some other proper remedy may be provided for the safety and quiet of the Citizens of this City respecting the Premises. And Your Petitioners will ever pray &c^a

That the Offices opened within the City and County of New York for the Insurance of Lottery Tickets have greatly increased, and produce very serious evils in the said City

Many persons are thereby induced to venture small Sums in consideration of the large Amount to be returned in proportion without considering that the chances allowing for the disparity is nearly twenty five per Cent in favor of the Insurer. Success or ill fortune lead to the same consequences, the former increases the desire of gain, and lessens the apprehension of loss, the former incites to a continuation of the adventure, by the Anxiety to retrieve what has been lost a spirit of gambling is thus introduced in the Community [330] and operates most on that part of it who have the least ability to support loss

The pernicious influence of these offices is extended even to Children, whose Morals are thereby corrupted in the very bud, as well by the example of those more advanced in years, as by the facility with which they find the means of participating in the practice

At these Offices are to be found not only labouring poor, but even Mendicants, children and Servants who do not scruple to make a Crime the Instrument to enable them to become Adventurers

Whatever Motives of policy may justify the resort to Lotteries for supplies, Your Memorialists believe that in their most unexceptionable form they produce Evils and your Honorable body will see how far those Evils must be increased by the means of the insurance System

Your Memorialists further observe to your Honorable body that the Grand Inquest for this City and County alarmed at the increase of that Evil have presented these Offices at the last Court of Oyer and Terminer held in this City a Copy of which Presentment was communicated by their request to Your Memorialists and is annexed to this Memorial

Your Petitioners therefore pray that your Honorable Body will take such speedy and effectual Measures for the correcting of the Evils complained of as in your Wisdom you shall deem meet

The Grand Jury in and for the Body of the City and County of New York Present

The Offices opened within the said City and County for the insurance of Lottery Tickets, as a serious Evil, and one which demands the interference of the Legislature, and they request that the Court will be pleased to cause a copy of this presentment to be communi-

The Petition of George Rogers & others Fishermen complaining that their Carr's are ordered from the Wharf of Fly Market Slip was referr'd to the Street Commissioner

The Petition of Hester De Witt complaining of her being assess'd for a Lot of Ground to which she has only a right of Dower was referr'd to the attorney of the Board*

A Representation from John Murray Jr [363] stating the poverty of William Elsworth who has been taxed & which tax he thinks ought to be remitted to him was referr'd to the Alderman and Assistant of the sixth Ward

The Petition of Peter Conover stating that in September 1805 while doing duty as a Watchman he caught the Yellow fever that his Physicians Bill for attending him during his sickness amounts to fifty two dollars was referr'd to the Watch Committee

The Petition of D. Kemper & others complaining that in Violation of the Law some of the Weigh Masters perform their duty by deputy was referr'd to Alderman Van Zandt & Mes^{rs} Mulligan & Bogardus

The Petition of George & Robert N Waite praying for leave to dig away part of a Hill near to the powder House and to remove the Earth from the same to their own Grounds was granted the same to be done under the direction of the Road Committee

It having been represented to this Board by Oliver Waldron that he shew to Samuel B. Waldron a written order from the Chairman of the Road Committee to deliver to him the Tools belonging to his Department which he refused to comply with Therefore Resolved that the said Samuel B. Waldron one of the late Road Masters deliver to Oliver Waldron the present Road Master all the public Tools and other property belonging to that Department and in default thereof that the Attorney of this Board commence a Suit for the recovery thereof against the said Samuel B. Waldron

The Attorney of the Board to whom was referr'd the Petition of John Kehoe reported That the Petitioner in subjecting himself to a fine acted more from incorrect advice than a desire to contravene the Law and that so much of the fine as accrues to this Board ought to be remitted, and the same was confirmed

The Petition of Patrick Barry praying to be exempted from the payment of a fine incurr'd [364] in Consequence of his having sold Liquor without a Licence from the Commissioners of Excise was referrd to the Attorney of the Board

The Comptroller informed this Board of the Progress made in the several Bills which this Board had pray'd the Legislature to pass into Laws

The Comptroller represented to the Board that there are a number of Accounts presented to him for Materials furnish'd and Work performed for the Corporation by the Order of Cornelius Warner late Superintendant of Repairs, and requested of this Board directions with regard to the Evidence he is to require from the persons presenting those Accounts. Thereupon Resolved that Cornelius Warner late Superintendant of Repairs do furnish the Comptroller with his Account Current and the Accounts of all the persons employed by him and of the Articles furnish'd on Account of and for this Board

The Comptroller having informed the Board that the last Quarters Dividends on Manhattan Shares belonging to the Corporation have not yet been recieved no power having been given therefore & Also that a Warrant ought to issue for the payment of the Interest due to the Manhattan Company on the Corporation Bonds held by them Ordered that the Clerk do prepare the necessary Instrument to enable the Comptroller to recieve the Amount of the said Dividends and that the Comptroller ascertain the Amount of Interest money due to the Manhattan Company

[365] The Petitions of George Grier and James McLean praying to be exempted from the payment of fines incurr'd for selling Liquor without Licences from the Commissioners of Excise were referr'd to the Attorney of the Board

The Petition of Roger Crandel & others Fishermen complaining that Wharfage is demanded for their Boat at Fly Market Wharf was referr'd to the Attorney of the Board

The Petition of Henry Brooks stating that a Well has been sunk in Magazine Street which has cost more than can be raised by Subscription was referr'd to the Alderman and Assistant of the Sixth Ward

The following Resolution was agreed to Resolved that Samuel Hutchins and John T. Crane have time until Monday next to remove their Manure deposited on the public Grounds

*The Attorney of the Board to whom was referr'd the Petition of Daniel N. Traine reported that the Suits commenced against him and his Surety ought to be discharged and the Bond cancelled on his paying the Costs already accrued And the same was agreed to

The Comptroller made the following Report The Comptroller reports That one of the former Attornies of the Board wishing to present an accurate Account of his payment to and his reciepts from the Board & not being able to accomplish it for the present Meeting of the Common Council, delays the Report of the Comptroller upon that Subject which had been committed to him

The Comptroller having requested the Appointment of a Committee to settle his Account for a small Sum deposited in his hands for the payment [366] of labourers employed at the Collect M^r Morris and Alderman Ritter were appointed accordingly

The Trustees of the New York Free School having requested the Use of about twenty feet of the Bridewell yard adjoining their School House for privies Ordered that the Superintendant of the Alms

†The Alderman and Assistant of the Sixth Ward to whom was refer'd the Petition of John Charles reported that they are of Opinion that the Sum of Seventy five pounds as formerly reported by the Comptroller as the Rent of the said Lot is a reasonable Rent for the same they therefore recommend that a Lease issue to the Petitioner on the Usual terms reserving the said Rent And the same was agreed to

The Memorial of Abraham Russell and others Trustees of the Methodist Episcopal Church complaining of the Interruption of their Service on Sundays by disorderly persons and requesting that Watchmen may be stationed at their Churches was referr'd to Alderman Van Zandt Alderman Selah Strong and M^r Robert Bogardus

The Petition of Henry Titus* stating that he is the lessee of three Corporation Lotts at the Corner of Pearl and Chatham Streets at a Rent of Eight hundred dollars per Annum which he states to be more than they are Worth was referr'd to Alderman Ritter Alderman Mott & Mes^{rs} Morris and Torbet

The Petition of Ann Walker Widow & Administratrix of James Walker deceased stating that her husband in his life time agreed with this Board to purchase some of the Inkleberg Lotts [370] for which no Conveyance has been executed nor was any payment made by him. That his Debts have absorbed more than the whole of his Personal Estate and that a compliance with the above Agreement will be attended with great Inconveniency to her in as much as it will lessen her means of supporting her family, and as in her Capacity of Executrix and Guardian she cannot take a Conveyance of said Lotts. She therefore prays to be relieved from a compliance with her Agreement. The said Petition was referr'd to the Comptroller and the Street Commissioner

The Petition of Lawrence Hyer stating that he is the Lessee of two Lotts of Ground belonging to this Board fronting on Chatham Street, that they were supposed at the time of his leasing them to contain thirty feet in breadth in consequence of which he was charged a Rent of four hundred and fifty Dollars. that they are only twenty five feet in front and one of them only Eighty feet in depth instead of one hundred in consequence of which he prays for an Abatement of the Rent. the same was referr'd to Alderman Mott & Mes^{rs} Bogardus and Torbet

The Petition of George Riker and others Heirs of Dorothy Riker praying that the Sum of three thousand and Seventy five dollars awarded to them by a Jury for a piece of Ground and a Shop taken by this Board, with Interest thereon from the 14 day of January 1806 may be paid to them was referr'd to the Comptroller and Street Commissioner

The Petition of John M. Mason and others praying that the Pavement in Pine Street may be repaired was referr'd to the Street Commissioner

[371] The Counsel of the Board who had been requested to inform this Board Whether in his Opinion the Grounds commonly call'd Stuyvesant Street are a public Street or not Submitted the following Statement and Opinion to the Board

Case of Stuyvesant Street

On the 30th Nov^r 1787 Evert Bancker Jun^r one of the Surveyors for the City of New York, surveyed and laid out at the request of Peter Stuyvesant on his Farm in the then Out Ward of the City of New York, a piece of Ground intended for a Street then and since known and call'd by the name of Stuyvesant Street

On the 30th day of March 1789, the said Peter Stuyvesant conveyed by Indenture of Lease, Lots of Ground bounded by the said Street, to John Coutant and Gilbert Coutant

On the day of 179 the Ground on which S^t Marks Church in the Bowery is erected, also bounded by the said Street was conveyed in fee to the Corporation of Trinity S^t Marks in the Bowery was built in the Year 1795 before which time and since the said Piece of Ground has remained laid open, and has ever since been used by the Public for their enjoyment and Accomodation as an High Way

The Legislature by an Act passed the 7th of March 1793 vested all the Right Title Interest Claim and demand Whatsoever, of the People of this State of in and to all lands at any time heretofore left for Streets or high Ways in the City of New York, by any person or persons whomsoever, in the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York and their Successors, for the Use of Streets and High Ways

[372] The Legislature by an Act pass'd the 30th March 1799 declare "that no New Street shall thereafter be laid out in the City of New York except with the Approbation of the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty in Common Council convened, and if any such Street should be laid out without such Permission it shoul'd be lawful for the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty by Bye Laws or Ordinances to direct the same to be stopp'd up, and all Buildings adjoining thereto to be removed by the Proprietors or Occupants within such times and under such Penalties, as they shoul'd think proper, and that all Streets not then already named and approved of by the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty shoul'd be considered as New Streets within the Meaning of that Act which had expired on the 30th March 1802

By an Act pass'd the Second of April 1803 the Legislature have made Similar Provisions to those contained in the Act of the 30th of March 1799 with this Variation that by the last Act all Streets not then already named and opened shoul'd be considered as new Streets within the Meaning thereof

On the 11th of December 1797 contracted with Casimer Th. Goerck & Joseph Mangin City Surveyors to make a New Map of the City from the Battery to the Sandy Hill road at the two Mile Stone

and Easterly including the Street on which the New Episcopal Church stands on Stuyvesants Grounds to the East River, and Westerly to the North River so as to include the Sandy Hill Road and the State Prison. By the Contract the Map was to contain certain specific Descriptions, and a Field Book to accompany the same and they were [373] to deliver another Map upon a smaller Scale which was intended for Sale to indemnify the Common Council &c^a

From the Minutes of the Common Council it appears that

“ On the 10th of April 1799 the Mayor laid before the Board the new Map of the City made by Mr Mangin which was committed to a Committee to examine and correct, as to the names of Streets, and also to Report a Mode for obtaining Subscribers to the Work

“ On the 15 of July 1799 Ordered that the Committee on the Subject with Mr Mangin, obtain the engraving of the New Map of this City by Mr Mavricks or other competent person on the best terms they can

On the 30th March 1801. it appearing that great inconvenience is sustained in consequence of having several Streets designated by the same Names, Ordered that the Street Commissioner be directed to attend to the completion of the new Map of the City, and that he be authorized to employ Mr Richard Furman to assist him in the execution of that duty

On the 14th February 1804 Alderman Barker, Alderman Brasher & Alderman Oothout were appointed a Committee in conjunction with the Comptroller and Street Commissioner, to examine the New Map of this City now nearly ready to be published, and to take such measures as will be most proper to indemnify this Board and the persons who have executed the same for the expence that has been incurr'd

A number of these Maps were Sold by the Corporation with the Title of “ A Plan and Regulation of the City of New York made from Actual Survey by Casmer Th. Goerck and Josep Fr Mangin City Surveyor by order of the Common Council and protracted by Joseph Fr Mangin Anno Domini 1800

[374] Some Alterations were afterwards made on the Map and instead of the above Title a label was substituted in these Words “ Plan of the City of New York drawn from actual Survey by Carmer Th Goerck and Joseph F. Mangin City Surveyors. This Plan shews the Wards of the City as lately altered by the Legislature, and designates with Accuracy most of the Streets and Wharves and Slips &c^a lying to the South Ward of a line beginning at the North River at Watts Street, thence extending thro' said Street to Hudson Street,

thence to Leonard Street thence to Broad Way, from thence in a line to Bayard Street, thro' this Street to Bowery Road, thence to Bullock Street, and thro' this Street to the East River. Except Brannon and Spring Streets, none of the Streets to the North Ward of the line above mentioned have been ceded to the Corporation, or have been approved and opened under their authority; they are therefore to be considered, subject to such future Arrangements as the Corporation may deem best calculated to promote health, introduce Regularity, and conduce to the conveniency of the City. New York Nov^r 1803

By an Act of the Legislature pass'd the 8th March 1803 entitled "an Act to increase the number of Wards in the City of New York and to equalize the same, the Boundaries of the Seventh Ward are described in these words" The Seventh Ward shall begin at the South Easterly corner of the fourth Ward; thence along the Northerly boundary of said Ward to the boundary of the sixth Ward thence along the Boundary of the Sixth Ward to the Bowery Road, thence along the Middle of the Bowery Road to a place opposite to the Middle of Stuyvesant Street, then along the [375] Middle of Stuyvesant Street in front of S^t Marks Church to the East River, and on a direct course to low Water Mark on Nassau Island &c^a

By three Acts of the Legislature severally entitled an Act to enable the Corporation of the City of New York to raise Monies by Tax pass'd April 6: 1804, March 28: 1805 and February 17. 1806. The lamp and Watch District of the City is described to be "to the South Ward of a line beginning at the North River at a place call'd De Klines ferry a little to the North Ward of the State Prison; thence Eastwardly in front of the new Banking houses, to a Road commonly call'd the Sandy Hill Road, thence along the said Sandy Hill Road to the North Ward of Potters field, and the house of William Neilson to the Bowery road, thence across the Bowery Road to a Street commonly call'd Stuyvesant Street, and thro' the Middle thereof to the East River

The said Piece of Ground or Street has never been actually ceded by Deed, from the said Peter Stuyvesant or any other person or persons to the Corporation

The Proprietors of Ground bounded by the said Street have petitioned the Corporation to cause the said Street to be regulated by ordinances in the Usual Way

The Corporation are now desirous to know if by the Acts of the said Peter Stuyvesant, the Legislature and themselves, the said Street has been regularly opened, named, approved, and sanctioned, as a

public Street or high Way, and if it is not a public Street, and it can be shut up, have they the Power so to order

Answer

Tho there are several Circumstances in this Case which might lead to the Idea that the Ground call'd [376] Stuyvesant Street was considered as a *a* public Street, yet I am of Opinion that they are not binding on the Corporation

The Charter gives the Corporation full Power and Authority to establish and appoint the laying out of all Streets, and the altering mending and repairing them

This Grant woul'd be Nugatory if every Individual had a Right to lay out Streets over his Grounds according to his own Fancy

The Several Acts of the Legislature mentioned in the Case do not in my Opinion destroy the Original Power. They only restrain the Corporation from removing the Buildings, unless they are valued and paid for in the Manner prescribed by Law

I think therefore that the Corporation may if they deem it proper, order this Street to be shut up, provided no Act was passed at the late Session of the Legislature which may deprive them of that Right

The Expediency of such a Measure they alone are competent to decide

The Petition of Abraham Stagg requesting the Payment of \$1937 $\frac{4}{100}$ which he states to be due to him for the paving and regulating of Streets was referrd to the Street Commissioner

A letter was read from Mr Harison [377] informing the Board that a Declaration had been served on him in a Suit commenced in the Circuit Court of the United States against this Board for having authorized the use of certain Mud Machines to cleanse the public Slips by the Patentee of the said Machine and requesting Directions with regard to the defence which he is to make. thereupon ordered that the Attorney of the Board do prepare for the Counsel a Statement of such facts as may be necessary for the said defence

The Petition of John Sigeson stating that Ann Witchin died indebted to him in the Sum of two hundred and fifty Dollars, that forty dollars were paid to him by the Surrogate on Account and the residue was paid into the City Treasury, Daniel Phoenix having administred, and praying that after the said Debt may have been ascertained to be

due to him that the same may be paid. the said Petition was referr'd to the Attorney of the Board

Ordered that John H Sickles and Edmund Seaman have leave to build Vaults in Broadway opposite to their houses under the Direction of the Street Commissioner

William Mathews having pray'd that this Board will appoint some person on their part to Value the extra Work done by him at the Bridge near the Powder house Ordered that John B. Macomb be authorized on the part of this Board to appraise the said Work

The application of Thomas Dick to [378] to lease a house and Lott now in his Possession for another Year was referr'd to the Street Commissioner

A Letter was read from Leonard Bleecker offering to pay for the Purchase of one of the Inklenberg Lotts out of a Corporation Bond held by him for two thousand four hundred Dollars and requesting that the Balance after deducting the amount of the said purchase money may be paid to him, was ordered to lie on the Table

A Report was made from the Police Office relative to the Suspension of two Watchmen and the same was referr'd to the Watch Committee

The Petition of William Philips praying to be appointed a Measurer of Salt was postponed until the next Meeting of this Board

The Petition of Augustus Lawrence and others stating that they are the Lessees of Lotts under Peter Lorillard, that the opening of Canal Street has cut off a part of the said Lotts, that M^r Lorillard will exact Rent for the whole, and the Petitioners pray that this Board will pay him for as much thereof as have been taken for public purposes. the same was referr'd to the Canal Committee

The Attorney of the Board having reported on the Petitions of Patrick Barry James M^cClean George Gier and Anthony Smith who were severally complained of for selling Liquor without a Licence from the Commissioner of Excise. Ordered that the Penalty accruing to this Board be remitted on their paying the Costs

The Memorial of John S Hunn [379] stating the inconveniencies to which Masters of run away Slaves are subjected in consequence of their not being permitted to send them to Bride Well, was referr'd to Alderman Mott M^r Bogardus and D^r Torbet

Ordered that a Court of Special Sessions of the Peace in and for the City and County of New York be held on the first Tuesday in May next

Ordered that the draft of the Law to determine the Width of Walks & for other purposes be referr'd to the Alderman and Assistant of the second Ward

The Street Commissioner having requested leave of the Corporation to change the security of Mess^{rs} Thomas and John Gardner for that of M^r Gabriel Furman for digging out a part of Cherry Street & that he may prolong the time limited for the performance of the same, the said request was granted

Ordered that the Mayor employ as many Marshalls as he may think proper & necessary on Sundays to cause the Sabbath Laws to be enforced and that this Board will pay them a reasonable Compensation therefor

Ordered That The Mayor Issue his Warrants to pay

The Report of Samuel Cowdrey Esq, late Attorney of the Board, on the application of John Murphy to receive the monies, in the hands of the City Treasurer, belonging to the estate of Robert Pendergast dec^d was read and, with the accompanying documents, referred to the Counsellor of the Board.

The Report of the Watch Committee on the petition of Peter Conover praying relief, that Twenty five Dollars ought to be allowed him to discharge physicians Bill for medicine and attendance during his sickness with malignant fever in 1805. was confirmed.

The Report of the Watch Committee in favour of reinstating William Dennis and William Parker Watchmen in Cap^t Beekmans Company was confirmed.

A Resolution, that the Comptroller be permitted to employ a discreet and proper person as a Collector of the public monies and that the said Comptroller be responsible for his honest and faithful conduct, was presented and ordered to lie for consideration.

[407] Resolved that the Comptroller notify, in writing, James Roosevelt and others to take out water grants in front of their respective lots within fourteen days and that he report their answers, that this Board may be enabled to pursue such measures as may be most conducive to its interests.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The nomination of Daniel Frazer as Fire engine man of Company N^o 24. was referred to the Chief Engineer for his certificate.

The petition of David Ackerman and Peter Fenton, for a water grant in front of their property in Watts Street in the [411] Fifth ward, was read and referred to the Comptroller.*

The Petition of Gilliam Cornell, Collector of the Second Ward, requesting further time of one month to complete the collection of taxes for said Ward, which had been delayed on account of his indisposition, was read and referred to the Comptroller, with authority to extend the time if agreeably to law.

The Petition of Henry C. Hawley, praying to be appointed Steward of the Alms House, was read and ordered to lie on table.

The Petition of John Hink, praying to be appointed an Inspector of Firewood, was read and ordered to lie on the table.

A recommendation of the Chief Engineer to provide Fire plugs in each Block of this city, on the principle of one lately constructed at the corner of William & Liberty Streets was read and referred to the Committee of the Fire Department.

The petition of William Hunter & others Proprietors of Lots on Corlaers Street, praying that the same may be carried through from Grand Street to Cherry Street was read and referred to the Street Commissioner.

granted: and a warrant ordered to be issued in his favour on the Treasurer for the amount.

A Letter from Jacob Cholwell, contractor for lighting the Public Lamps respecting the regulation of private Lamps was read, whereupon

Resolved that the owner of each private Lamp, lighted by or under the direction of this Board, pay for the providing Oil and lighting the same from and after the tenth day of May instant the yearly sum of Twelve dollars in half yearly payments and that they pay the same to the Superintendent of Lamps who shall account to this Board therefor. And also resolved that the said Superintendent collect from the several and respective owners the sums now due from them [413] respectively and report the same to this Board, together with the names of those persons who may neglect or refuse to pay. And also resolved that the said Superintendent without delay, report to this Board the number of private Lamps under the order of this Board, the names of the respective owners and where situate and of all others that may from time to time be set up, to the end that the Clerk of this Board may keep a regular list or account of the same. And also resolved that the said Superintendent report to this Board the names of the persons who collected the last sums for lighting private lamps to the end that the Comptroller may ascertain whether the money for said private lamps have been accounted for.

The following opinion of Richard Harrison Esq^r Counsellor of the Board on the remonstrance of Theodosius Fowler and others proprietors of Harlem Bridge was read and referred to the Comptroller.

I have maturely considered the case of Harlem Bridge, and am of opinion that it is not, as such, a proper subject of taxation. This, as well as Turnpike roads and other similar undertakings, has been [414] sanctioned by the Legislature. The acts establishing them I consider as a compact by law, giving a certain toll or allowance to the individuals concerned, as a compensation for the benefit derived to the publick. It would therefore, I think, be a breach of publick faith to diminish the profits of the Bridge arising from such tolls, by the imposition of taxes, operating as a deduction from their amount. I would not however be understood to say that property which would otherwise be subject to taxation is to be exempted, because it belongs to the proprietor of the road or bridge, for which a toll may be given, where there is no special exemption by law. But then the former state of the property should be considered, and the tax neither should

be imposed nor augmented on account of the receipts from the Bridge or road. The Board will therefore understand it as my opinion that the Bridge and Tolls are not, as such, proper subjects of taxation; but that if the land on which the Bridge and Toll house are erected were actually subject to taxation, they would still remain so, at their real value, independent of the [415] tolls, which ought not to be taken into consideration by the Assessors. If the land would not otherwise have been liable to taxation as belonging to the publick; then I think that it is not so when appropriated to the purpose of a Bridge under the sanction of a legislative contract."

The report of the Chief Engineer on the Petition of Thomas White & others, that a new Fire Engine be stationed in the [416] Sixth Ward, nearly where N^o 19. formerly stood, was read and confirmed.

The petition of William L. Rose and others owners of Lots in Sugar loaf Street praying that the same may be regulated between Broadway & Chapel Streets, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner.

The report of the Street Commissioner on the subject of repairing damages in the Streets by the Manhattan Water Conduit pipes, ordered to lie for consideration at the last meeting, was read and ordered to lie for consideration.

The following report of the Street Commissioner was read,

The Street Commissioner has the honour to present a plan of Streets through the property of the Corporation of Trinity Church, between Brannon and Christopher Streets, which that Corporation intend to cede to the Corporation of New York. and having agreed to name the Streets as written upon the Map, they wish the Common

Council to confirm the same in order that they may insert the true name in their deeds of sale.

The alterations and arrangements [417] upon the map are as follow. That the Street formerly called Budd Street, be called Vandam¹ Street; that the street formerly called Hetty Street, be called Charlton² Street, that the Street formerly called Hazard Street, be called King³ Street, that the Street formerly called Village Street, be called Hammersley⁴ Street, that the Street formerly called Morton Street, be called Clarkson⁵ Street; and that the Three Streets immediately North of those above mentioned be called Leroy⁶ Street Morton⁷ Street and Barrow⁸ Street.

On a representation of facts by the Street Commissioner in favour of allowing damages to Martha Stuyvesant for injury done to her house by inundation in [418] consequence of the regulation of Mott Street between Hester and Grand Street was confirmed.

As this opinion is against the legality of the mode of assessment, the Board will probably consider the former assessment void, and it is submitted to their consideration whether it would not be advisable to appoint new Assessors, or at least to permit him to present the draft of an Ordinance for that purpose.

[419] The Street Commissioner takes this moment to observe, that Mess^{rs} Emmet & Van Slyck, council for M^r Duggan have applied to him for an answer to their communication and state that they will shut up the Street near Broadway (not ceded to the Board or agreed to be paid for) unless the Corporation come to some decision to effect a settlement of their claims; and they state further that they will have no objection to let the ground in question be included in the award of the new Jury that must be impannelled to value other grounds in that Street.

State of the Case

on the assessment for opening Canal Street

The Corporation for the purpose of extending the width of Canal Street, proceeded in the mode pointed out by the Act, and a Jury, on the 26. Feb. 1806. awarded sundry large sums to several proprietors for their land taken for the aforesaid purpose, and for which sums the Corporation in several instances paid the money, and in others gave their bonds.

[420] In Order to obtain a remuneration of the money so paid or secured to be paid, the Corporation passed an Ordinance dated the 26th May in the same year, to assess the amount of the award of the Jury and the expences of surveying &c^a "among the owners and occupants of all the houses and lots intended to be benefitted by the aforesaid regulations, in proportion as nearly as might be to the advantages which each should be deemed to acquire," agreeably to the powers vested in them by the act of the Legislature, and appointed Five persons to make such assessment.

The Assessors all qualified to make the Assessment directed by the Ordinance fairly and impartially, according to the best of their skill and judgment, and proceeded to the duty.

Their first determination was to levy the whole of the award within a district 500 feet round Canal Street, within which district neither of the Assessors were interested in any landed or copyhold estate, and directed a survey to be made accordingly.

Upon a representation of the inhabitants [421] within this district, that the burthen on them would be great, and that others more remote from the Street would be benefitted almost as much as those near 500 feet from it, the Assessors agreed to extend the assessment to all Streets from whence the water would ultimately empty into the Canal.

In order to facilitate the Collection of so much of the money to be raised as would be wanted in the month of August thereafter to pay an instalment upon the bonds, the assessors proceeded to assess so much as they thought expedient upon the persons within the 500 feet district, and presented it to the Common Council as part of the assessment directed by the Ordinance which being taken up by that board was ratified in the said month of August, when they also appointed a Collector who received three or four hundred Dollars upon the said Assessment, part of which he deposited in the City Treasury at the direction of the Corporation.

The object of the Assessors was solely to facilitate the collection of part of the money wanted, and it was their intention to levy all the money not included [422] in the first assessment upon the residue of the property from whence the water ran to the Canal, but from the information of the Surveyor, property owned by three of the Assessors would be included within this last district, and nothing further has been done by them in consideration that they may be deemed interested.

Is the first Assessment binding upon the inhabitants?

Can the Corporation rescind it and direct a new assessment?

If it is binding can the same Assessors continue to complete the second assessment?

If not, can the Corporation appoint others in their stead? And finally, how is that Board to act in this case, to proceed to effect and agreeably to law?

Opinion.

All the Acts of the Legislature, empowering the Corporation to direct assessments for certain purposes, require that such assessments should be made by disinterested Persons; and even if the Legislature had been silent upon the subject, it would still, in my judgment, be essential [423] to the validity of the proceeding.

In the case of Canal Street it is conceded that the assessors themselves have considered the Benefit of the improvement to extend to property, of which three of them are proprietors. They would therefore be interested not only in the Assessment last directed but in regu-

lating the proportions to be paid between Lots within the distance of five hundred feet round Canal Street, and those at a greater distance. Under these circumstances I think it would be unsafe to proceed upon the Assessment that has been made, and that new Assessors should be appointed, wholly disinterested in the property benefitted by the Canal.

The Report of the Street Commissioner containing an Ordinance for regulating Doyer Street was, in consequence of said Street not being ceded nor accepted by the Common Council, referred to the City Inspector to report an Ordinance for regulating the same to prevent its becoming a public nuisance.

The Report of the Street Commissioner on the petition of the Fishermen requesting the privilege of keeping their empty Fish cars on the Wharf at the west end of the Flymarket, that the continuance of such practice was a real nuisance as well as incumbrance, was read; Whereupon ordered that the Street Commissioner be directed to enquire on what terms a water lot at Brooklyne can be purchased for the accommodation of Fishermen's cars.

The Report of the Street Commissioner on the Petition of John R. Livingston, Peter Ogilvie and others for the regulation of Pitt, Ridge and other Streets in the vicinity of Corlaers hook, was read and Ordinances were passed directing the [425] same to be performed on or before the first day of June 1808.

*The Report of the Comptroller respecting certain repairs necessary to be made at the Albany Basin, and his opinion that the Assignees of a grant made in the name of Robert Leake are bound to make the same, together with the draft of an Ordinance in conformity therewith, was read and confirmed.

Resolved that Cornelius Wynkoop be and he is hereby appointed to collect the rents of this Board and that he receive for his services two Dollars per day while in the employ of this Board: And that he give

such security, as shall be approved of by the Mayor, for the faithful accounting for all monies which he may so collect.

The appointment of Thomas Auston Fireman to Company N^o 19 vice Andrew Pessinger, gone from this city, was approved The Chief Engineer certifying a vacancy in said Company.

The Street Commissioner's recommendation that John Anderson be paid One Hundred & Seventy three Dollars
 Warr^t $2\frac{3}{100}$ being the ballance due from Peter Goelet for the
 N^o 40 middle pier between the Exchange [426] and Whitehall
 Slips was read and approved, and a warrant on the Treasurer ordered to be issued accordingly.

A Report of the Comptroller on the applications for grants of land under water was read,

Whereupon Resolved that this Board will make no grant of Water lots North of the South line or bounds of that part of this city to be laid out by the Commissioners lately appointed by law, until after the survey of the said Commissioners shall be completed and filed. And further Resolved, that the Street Commissioner direct and obtain a complete survey of the shores of the rivers south of said South line or bounds, so as to show what water lots or grounds are granted, and what yet remains to be granted.

The Comptroller reported that Mr James Roosevelt to whom he had applied, in conformity with the orders of the Board, to take out his water grants, was ready to comply as soon as the terms were settled He further Reported that he found great difficulty in recurring to the Minutes of the Common Council for information, in the line of his duty, for want of a proper [427] index, Whereupon it was ordered that the Clerk provide an Index to the Minutes of the Common Council.

The Comptroller reported that he had received Returns of the Peace officers and Clerks who had served during the late election.

Ordered that a Warrant on the Treasurer be issued in his
 Warr^t favour to pay the accounts of the peace officers who had
 N^o 39 returned their names at the rate of One Dollar per day
 each, and the respective Clerks at the rate of Two Dollars
 per day each.

The Comptroller reported that according to the Treasurers return, there was \$16317.50 in the Treasury.

The City Inspector reported Ordinances for the purpose of correcting various nuisances from N^o 3329. to N^o 3338 inclusive.

Ordered that the same do pass.

Warr^t Resolved that a Warrant be issued in favour of Jacob
N^o 36 Cholwell for One Thousand Dollars on account of his
contract for lighting the public lamps.

Warr^t Ordered that a Warrant be issued on the Treasurer in
N^o 37. favour of John H. Sickles for Three Thousand Dollars, on
account of the Building Committee.

[428] The following Memorials of William Thomas, Nicholas Romaine and others relating to Scammel Street and the Soil under water in front thereof, were read and ordered to be entered at large on the minutes.

To His Honor the Mayor, Aldermen and Gentlemen of the Common Council

*The Petition of William Thomas humbly sheweth;

That on or about the year 1785, upwards of twenty Years ago, Your Honorable Board gave permission to Thomas Ivers and James Blanchard to dock out below high water mark (subject to the running of streets) with a promise of a corporation grant of the water when grants were issued at that distance from the city. This Dock or piece of ground with the upland in fee, was sold and conveyed by the said Ivers and Blanchard and about seven years ago, Your Petitioner became purchaser of the whole at about Eight thousand Dollars. This wharf has been suffering for years, and in an unproductive state, for want of a grant and permission to dock out farther as granted to the neighbours of your petitioner.

[429] Your Honorable Board will please to recollect, that for some years back Your Petitioners applications have been favorably received and variously referred, to former Street Commissioners, Comptrollers and Aldermen; but the grant has been always suspended on a contrariety of opinion, whether Scammel Street or Lane of 30 feet ought not to be continued through your Petitioners Wharf.

Your Petitioner humbly submits, that whatever intention Your Honorable Board had formerly of extending Scammel Lane, the present permanent regulation of Gouverneur Street of Fifty feet, leading to the very centre of your ground, reserved for a Corporation Wharf and Bason, and to which Scammel lane is so very contiguous, will shew the inutility of extending that Lane further than it is at present.

Your honorable Board must know that your Street Commissioner has contracted for, and has had sunk a bulk head and the space filled in to compleat your Corporation wharf of Two hundred & twenty two feet, along side of your Petitioners ground; and has under

your directions assessed the owners of adjoining Lots for the expence; and that your Petitioner [430] has paid M^r Stagg the Collector, One thousand and Forty one Dollars for his proportion. That from the state of your Petitioners wharf being lower than Water Street, and the Corporation Wharf, the ground of both is washing into his Wharf and also into the East river, for want of a bulkhead to prevent it, and also to secure the earth, that your Petitioner may cart to fill up his ground even with the Corporation Wharf. M^r Bergh, your Petitioners tenant, threatens to quit it, and the neighbours to indict it; and imperious necessity compels your Petitioner to pray that your Honorable Board will grant him prompt relief in the premises, to enable him to embrace the present season to procure Dock Logs and earth, from the adjoining Streets now digging out, and your Petitioner as in duty bound will ever pray

The Memorial of the Subscribers respectfully sheweth

That Your Memorialists and others proprietors of Land situate on and near Scammel Street have for many years considered it important to their property and the public good that Scammel Street should be extended to the East river, and their opinions on this subject have met the approbation of Committees formerly appointed by Your Honorable Board. Your Memorialists have now however much reason to believe that Your Hon. Board may consider it more for the interest of the public to derive a revenue from the said ground, which would be comprehended in Scammel Street were it extended from Water Street to the East river, than to permit it to be laid open for a street, and therefore they think themselves in duty bound to the public their neighbours and themselves to meet that point.

Your Memorialists are therefore ready to give to your Hon. The Street Commissioner reported that the drain in Water Street is impeded and requires to be opened.

[457] Ordered that he report an Ordinance for opening said drain at the expence of the parties benefitted.

A Report of the Street Commissioner on the subject of widening and straightening Grand Street from the Bowery to Broadway was read and the consideration postponed until the sentiments of the proprietors of Lots on said Street can be known.

Resolved that Books and paper cases be provided by the Clerk of this Board, at the public charge, for his accommodation and that of the Board, in which to keep and preserve more safely and conveniently the Books and papers belonging to the Corporation.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Resolved that the Resolution regarding the advertising Assessments for streets, passed at the last meeting of the Board, be rescinded and that the former resolution of this Board on the same subject, which was then rescinded, be revived.

The Clerk informed the Board that he had served notices on the several persons [462] appointed at the last meeting of the Board to take a census of the Electors of this city and County, and that he has provided Books for the purpose, agreeably to the order of the Common Council.

A letter from James Davidson appointed to take the census of the Fifth Ward, declining to serve on account of indisposition was read and his resignation accepted.

The Board proceeded to appoint, by ballot, a person in place of M^r Davidson, when the votes being equally divided between Henry Remmey and William Bridges the Mayor gave his casting vote in favour of Henry Remmey who was appointed accordingly.

A Letter from Henry Stanton requesting to be relieved from a suit brought against him by the late Comptroller, on account of Brooklyne ferry, was read and referred to the Comptroller.

A Memorial of Elizabeth Duryee demanding payment of a Bond given on account of ground taken for making Amity Street for the sum of \$3930 with interest [463] from March 21. 1806. was read and referred to the Street Commissioner to report a statement of facts.

A Letter from Courtland Van Beuren requesting payment of a Bond given to John Bachelor, for opening Varick Street, and assigned to him, for the sum of \$930 Warr^t N^o 80 with interest from March 15. 1806. was read and the Bond ordered to be discharged, deducting any Assessment that may be due by said Bachelor for opening said Street.

A request of the Managers of the First Blackriver Lottery for the use of any unoccupied apartment in the City Hall, for the purpose of drawing said Lottery, was read and granted.

A petition of Ephraim Hart, to be allowed to make use of a Fire Engine and Hose, under the direction of the Foreman for the purpose of draining the cellar of his House 87. Greenwich Street was read and the Board determined that it was inexpedient to grant the request.

A petition of William White, remonstrating against any alteration in the present profile of Church Street, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner.

[464] A Letter from Robert Lylburn requesting a settlement of his terms of payment for a Lot of Common lands, was read and referred to the Comptroller to report his opinion how the same ought to be settled.*

A Petition of William Butler praying to be appointed Inspector of Firewood, was read and ordered to lie on the table.

A Memorial of Thomas Farmer and others complaining of the dangerous state of Broadway near the road leading to Potters field was read and referred to the Street Commissioner with injunctions to cause the same to be immediately remedied.

A petition of the Devisees of Anthony Lispenard dec^d praying the grant of soil under water, fronting their property on Hudson river was read and referred to the Comptroller.†

The report of the Committee on the petition of Abraham Van Keuren and others respecting accomodating Lime vessels in the Basin at Duane Street, was read and ordered to lie for consideration.

A petition of Eliphalet Wheeler and John K. Floor to be allowed to sell meat in carts beyond the two mile stone, was read and [465] referred to the Market Committee.

A petition of William Wilson and others praying that Rivington Street, between Bowery and Norfolk Streets, may be regulated and paved, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner.

A Letter to the Mayor from Tunis Van Winkle, complaining of the situation of M^{rs} Skates Lot at the corner of Church and Barley Streets was read, Whereupon

Ordered that the Street Commissioner prepare an Ordinance for levelling the same.

The Clerk apologized in behalf of the Street Commissioner for his absence from the meeting of the Common Council, on account of indisposition, which also prevented him from making out a statement of Abraham Staggs claim, as directed: and presented the following reports.

[466] The Street Commissioner reported that he had discharged the labourers employed at the Collect, as they cannot work to advantage until Elm street be regulated.

The Account of Wages presented with the report Warr^t N^o 78 was ordered to be paid by a warrant on the Treasurer in favour of the Comptroller for the amount.

The Street Commissioner reported an Ordinance for regulating Sugar Loaf Street which was passed, and John Van Orden, Lawrence Van Buskirk, William Gifford, Tunis Ryker and William Chrystie were appointed Assessors.

The Street Commissioner reported an Ordinance for regulating Broadway from Great Jones to Art Street which was passed, and Aquila Giles, Lancaster Palmer, Joseph Watkins, Benjamin Sands and Abraham Skinner were appointed Assessors.

The report of the Market Committee on the Petition of John Pessinger and others Butchers in the Flymarket, that the deputy Clerk of the market be instructed to use his utmost vigilance to detect such offenders as shall sell contrary to the 10th section of the Law for regulating the public markets was read and confirmed.

[467] The Report of the Comptroller on the Petition of Henry Remmey* was read and ordered to lie on the table.

A petition of William Rhinelander Jun^r praying for the grant of soil under water in front of his land in Greenwich Street, was read and referred to the Comptroller.

The report of the Committee on the petition of Edward Ferris and others respecting a second assessment on Roosevelt Warr^t Street being illegal; and that a warrant be issued in favour of the Street Commissioner to be by him paid to the person or persons to whom the same may be due, was read and confirmed.

The Comptroller reported, that agreeably to the statement of the Treasurer there was a Ballance in his hands of \$20.387 $\frac{1}{4}$ ₁₀₀

The Clerk informed the Board that he had received from his predecessor Thomas Morris Esq^r all the Minutes of the Common Council from the year 1675 to the present day, comprehended in seventeen Volumes Folio.

In the apartment occupied by the Clerk of the Mayor's Court, there are several Boxes said to contain papers, deeds and documents [468] belonging to the Corporation. A case, the property of M^r Wortman, in the Comptrollers Office, contains a large proportion of Memorials, Petitions, Reports &c^a which have been presented and acted upon within the last few years. All these papers require arrangement, and demand more room to render them of convenient access than the present office, jointly occupied by the Street Commissioner and the Clerk, affords.

He therefore, respectfully proposed that a Committee be appointed to examine and see whether, without incurring any serious expence, some accommodation cannot be provided, within the City Hall, for repositing and arranging the public records in such manner as to render them more accessible.

Whereupon, Aldermen Ritter, S. Strong and M^r Mulligan were appointed a Committee to examine what accomodations were necessary for the Offices of this Board.

The City Inspector reported Ordinances from N^o 3342. to N^o 3380. inclusive for the purpose of raising sunken lots in Thomas Street and correcting other nuisances.

Resolved that the Portraits of the several Mayors of this city and other portraits belonging to the Corporation be removed and placed in the Common Council Room under the care and direction of the Clerk of this Board.

Resolved that the Mayor be requested to sit to Col. Trumbull for

his portrait, for the use of the Corporation. To this request His Honour politely assented.

Resolved that the Superintendant of Streets be directed without delay to clean and dig out the Exchange Slip, under the direction of the Aldermen and Assistant of the First Ward, together with the Street Commissioner.

The Committee therefore recommend that a pier of 40 feet wide and 240 feet in length be made at the east side of Burling Slip to be set back 30 feet from

*It is recommended that a Committee be appointed to confer and agree with Mess^{rs} Schermerhorn and Codwise for a compensation for this Loss, and if they cannot agree that the Committee be authorized to appoint referees on the part of this board, to meet such referees as shall be appointed by Mess^{rs} Schermerhorn and Codwise to determine what compensation shall be allowed them by this Board for the right of wharfage opposite their premises. A Report of the Committee appointed to confer with the Directors of the Highland Turnpike Company respecting a new bridge across Harlem river at the northern extremity of this island, was read and referred back to the same Committee for further negotiation.

*The Committee on the Petition of Peter Schermerhorn and George Codwise Jun^r further reported

That they have had an interview [21] with those gentlemen, but have not been able to agree with them for compensation for the right of wharfage in front of their ground at Burling slip: but the Committee have proposed to them that they should unite with the Corporation in building the Pier and that they should pay two thirds of the expence; for which consideration they should be entitled to receive the wharfage on the east side of the pier for two births of Ships, or for the use of the water not exceeding sixty feet from the pier. This proposition Mess^{rs} Schermerhorn and Codwise will comply with, upon condition of their having the exclusive right of wharfage at the end of the Pier. As this arrangement will relieve the Corporation from paying a considerable sum of money for the right of wharfage and also from two thirds of the expence of building the Piers, it is recommended that these proposals be agreed to on the part of the Corporation, and that Mess^{rs} Schermerhorn and Codwise be permitted without delay to contract with such persons as they shall think proper to build the said Pier and that this board will pay one third of the expence thereof. It is also recommended that a Pier be run out forming an L so as to complete the Corporation Basin at [22] the foot of Partition Street on the North river and also one other Pier with an L so as to complete the Basin already begun at the Hayscales near Duane Street; That the clerk be directed immediately to make out an Ordinance and have it published for six weeks as the Law directs, requiring all persons interested in the property adjacent to these Piers, to signify their assent to be at their proportion of the expence for building the said Piers, and in default thereof their right will be granted to such other persons as are willing to take it.

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, this twenty second day of June, One thousand eight hundred and seven: That a good and substantial Pier composed of four Blocks and four Bridges, each

forty feet wide at top and bottom, making a distance of two hundred and fifty feet, be [23] sunk from the South line of South Street into the East river on the east side of Burling Slip opposite the property of George Codwise Jun^r and in such manner that the westerly side of said pier be on a line *thirty feet easterly from the east line of the said Slip; and that the said pier be commenced on or before the third day of August next, and finished without delay.

And be it further Ordained, That one other good and substantial Pier, composed of Four blocks and four bridges be sunk opposite the property of the Heirs of John Rogers deceased on the East side of Beekman Slip, in such manner as that the west line of said Pier be on a line with the front of the buildings erected on the east side of said Slip; that the two inner blocks be thirty feet square at top and bottom, the two outermost blocks forty feet wide at bottom and thirty feet at top, and that the whole be two hundred and fifty feet in length from the south line of South Street: and that the said pier be commenced on or before the third day of August next and finished without delay.

And be it further ordained That one other good and substantial pier, composed of Four blocks and four Bridges of the same dimensions as the [24a.] two piers last above mentioned be sunk from the southerly line of South Street into the east river on the east side of the Flymarket Slip, in such manner as that the west side of the said pier be on a line twenty feet easterly of the east side of the present Ferry stairs at the said Flymarket slip; and that the said pier be commenced on or before the third day of August next and finished without delay.

And be it further Ordained, that all the piers above mentioned are to be completed in a good workmanlike manner with faced sides above half tide, in a manner [such as] those are done at the Battery and Peck slip and that they are to be securely connected with the several wharves any thing hereinbefore to the contrary notwithstanding.

And be it further Ordained that this Board will contribute their proportion towards the expence of the said piers agreeably to law, and that Selah Strong, John W. Mulligan and John S. Hunn, be a Committee to unite with the several proprietors, to consult upon the best methods of effecting the objects of this Ordinance and to sign any contracts or agreements they may agree upon, in behalf of this Board.

The following Report of the Comptroller was read.

The Comptroller to whom was referred the [24.b.] petition of Henry Stanton praying to be discharged from a demand which the Corporation have against him on account of rent for the Brooklyne Ferry

Reports that from the representation of Richard Furman Esq^r hereunto annexed it appears that M^r Stanton took the Ferry at Brooklyne in December 1800 under an expectation that in the Spring a lease would be given to him for a longer period, and that without that expectation, which it appears the Committee who had the charge of leasing the ferries sanctioned, he would not have undertaken the business.

That from documents produced by M^r Stanton it appears that he sustained a loss of Three hundred and twenty three dollars on the boats which he purchased from M^r Van Mater, the former lessee of the ferry and which he sold to the succeeding lessees Mess^{rs} Townsend and Van Nostrandt. When to this actual Loss is added the expences necessarily incurred for the repairs of the boats and for the wages and maintenance of the men employed at the Ferry; and when it is considered that the period for which M^r Stanton held the Ferry is a season of the year when it is generally believed that the expences equal [25] if not exceed the profits, it is highly probable that M^r Stanton was, as stated in his petition a very considerable loser by his engagement.

Under all these circumstances of this case the Board will therefore judge whether it would not be equitable to remit to M^r Stanton the rent charged against him.

with [28] the application of William Hunter and others for liberty to make Corlaer Street, have the honour to report

That they have examined the title of M^r Cannon for the lands under water on the North side of Grand Street and find that he has obtained a water grant from high to low water mark 200 feet into the river. That he is bound to make half the Street to low water mark where a slip is to commence. That the Slip is to be left 70 feet wide being the width of Grand Street and that he is to recede 25 feet from the line of Grand Street, or side of the Slip, from Mangin Street easterly, for the line of his buildings leaving the 25 feet for a public passage along the said Slip, and they further find, that M^r Cannon is bound to leave the same space for a passage along the line of Broome Street.

Your Committee further report, that as Corlaer Street is a very short distance above Mangin Street, they conceive it most adviseable that the proprietors of lots joining Grand Street, on the South side, should also leave a space of 25 feet in width south of Grand Street and from Corlaer Street to East street as designated on the Map accompanying [29] the report of the Street Commissioner, by a red line from F to G. and that they should be bound to make the Slip and wharf in the same manner as has been stipulated with M^r Cannon.

Your Committee further recommend that the several proprietors be directed to take their grants without delay between Grand Street and Cherry Street, and that they be directed by proper ordinances for that purpose to sink a bulkhead on the easterly line of Corlaer Street from Grand to Cherry Street and fill in the westerly part within six months; that they also sink a bulk head at least 200 feet east of Corlaer Street and fill in the same before the expiration of twelve months; and that on failure to comply with these stipulations they shall severally forfeit their preemptive right to the said grants.

Your Committee are aware that these stipulations may be considered by some as too partial and severe and that it is unusual to compel so large a space of ground to be made in so short a time: but they beg leave to answer that four or five persons are connected in making the said Corlaer Street, and if only one of them should fail to sink or contribute his proportion to sinking [30] a bulkhead along the Street in front of his lot, it would prevent his adjoining neighbours on each side from complying with their engagements in this respect, unless they went to the enormous expence of sinking a wharf along his ground to protect their earth.

Your Committee farther state that all the water as stated in the report of the Street Commissioner is very shoal and the ground bare at low water; that the bank adjoining the premises is very high and without rocks, and that in all probability the work can be done cheaper now than at any future period as earth is daily becoming more scarce and valuable.

Your Committee further remark that it would, in their opinion, be conducive to public improvements to grant to the several proprietors the additional lands under water to the east side of East street immediately upon their complying with the stipulation above mentioned and upon such terms as may be fixed for water grants in that vicinity.

All which is respectfully submitted.

And on the other hand, they shall contain a clause of re-entry, if the rent is behind above twelve months whether it has been demanded or not.

6. The square designated upon the map, shall be for the exclusive benefit of the purchasers and the avenues leading to it shall remain forever as public avenues and Streets, for the convenience and ornament of the city; but the square shall be enclosed by such fence and be otherwise improved as a majority of the purchasers shall, from time to time, think proper, at their expence, to which they shall proportionally contribute. But no buildings of any kind shall ever be erected thereon. A proper clause shall be inserted in the said deeds to give effect to this article. And

7. That the square designated on the map for a church and Academy, shall forever be reserved for and appropriated to that purpose.

*The Committee to whom it was referred to consider and report upon the Petition of Abraham Cannon respecting the situation of the ground in Broome Street opposite his property, having viewed the premises have the honour to Report

That the whole of Broome Street to the present wharf of the said Cannon and Marinus Willett has been regulated, except a sunken space through the center of the street of various widths and depths, more particularly described on the map and profile herewith [95] presented; which hollow or sunken space is conceded on all sides to be a great nuisance inasmuch as the water ebbs and flows into it through the wharf and is a receptacle for filth.

Ordinances passed this Board in 1805 as stated in the memorial as well as others of a recent date, directing this ground to be regulated, but owing to the difficulty of ascertaining the precise quantity of earth to be deposited by the opposite proprietors, nothing effectual has been done.

The remark of Your Memorialist that he has a claim on M^r Willett for damages, Your Committee are of opinion is irrelevant to the present subject and upon which they have no opinion to advance; the reference to them being, as they conceive, intended to point out the best method of correcting the present evil, and to render justice to the contending parties.

Your Committee deem it hardly necessary to remark that if either of the parties commence filling their side of the Street without the other, that the earth so filled in would soon glide over upon the opposite line and that therefore it would be continuing the present opposition to insist upon their doing it [96] individually.

‡The Street Commissioner reported an Ordinance to assess the monies awarded to sundry persons for opening and widening Cross Street, between Magazine Street and Little Water Street, and John Crolius Jun^r Oliver Drake, Peter Van Zandt, Matthew Bolmer and Alexander Clark, were appointed Assessors.

The Street Commissioner represented the propriety of digging out David Street, for the purpose of draining the water from Broadway, to the full extent of 50 feet in width, agreeably to the conditions required by Mr Anthony L. Bleecker, which was confirmed.

||The Street Commissioner represented a claim of Peter Dob, for the Ballance due him on account of the bulkhead at Beekman Slip: which was ordered to lie on the table.

The Street Commissioner recommended that \$250 be paid Mess^{rs} Stagg and Anson on account of their engagement to Warr^t 243. dig out 350 feet of Broadway above Jones Street [98] which was agreed to, and a warrant ordered to be issued in their favour on the Treasurer for that amount.

The Street Commissioner presented a return of delinquents on the Assessment for repaving Gold and Ferry Streets

*The Street Commissioner represented objections on the part of Mess^{rs} Miller and Baker respecting the order of the Board to give them a Bond for the amount of damages due them for opening Canal Street, subject to the condition of abating such assessment as may be made for the payment of said damages.

Ordered that several bonds be given to Mess^{rs} Miller and Baker for the amount of said damages and that the condition for securing the Assessment aforesaid be expressed in one particular Bond

The Street Commissioner represented that I. Boucker & C^o had applied to have the extra wall built by them last summer at Post's Bridge on the Manhattan avenue [99] valued;

Ordered that John M^cComb Jun^r be appointed on the part of this Board to estimate the expence.

The City Inspector reported drafts of Ordinances for the purpose of raising sunken Lots and correcting other nuisances from N^o 3695. to N^o 3705. inclusive.

Ordered that the same do pass.

The following Report was presented and Read.

The Committee that was appointed to call on his Excellency the Governor for information respecting the State of the Ordinance and Military Stores in this City and to offer him the aid of the Corporation in putting such in compleat repair as are at present unfit for service.

Report That there are Forty 32. Pounders Iron Cannon at the Ordinance Yard, Also Twenty eight 24. Pounders Iron pieces at the same place: these Cannon have carriages provided for them, but they are not mounted nor fixed to the carriages.

[100] There are also Thirteen 24 Pounders Iron pieces on Ellis' island, these are on carriages which however are of bad construction and so much decayed that they may be considered unfit for service. The above mentioned Cannon all belong to the State of New York. The Governor also informed the Committee that he has employed men to fit the carriages to the Guns for immediate service.

In addition to the above there are

in the new Arsenal near the Gaol. These pieces are on travelling carriages and in compleat order.

The United States have lately sent from Philadelphia Twelve 24 Pounders Iron Cannon fixed on travelling carriages which are now in the Arsenal at the Battery and in compleat order. Independent of these there are a number of 2. 3. & 4 Pounders Brass Field Ordnance in the Arsenal in good [101] order.

There are about Three thousand Stands of English muskets in good order, and about the same number of Hamburgh muskets unfit for service. A considerable quantity of Cartridges for the small Arms, are made up and filled in the Arsenal, but there are none of any kind made up for the cannon, there is a large quantity of Powder in the Magazine belonging to the State, also a sufficient quantity of wadding and Ball fitted to the different Calibres of the Cannon.

The Committee further report, that they have received from Colonel Jonathan Williams Engineer to the United States, a report for fortifying the Harbour of New York at the Narrows, with an estimate of the probable expence which is hereby submitted.

Fort Columbus. July 20th 1807.

Sir

I have received your favour of yesterday, inclosing a resolution of the Corporation [103] dated 27th inst. requesting me "to furnish with all possible dispatch a plan for fortifying the Narrows, with an estimate of the probable expence."

Although my official station will not permit me to enter into any engagements respecting plans of defence, without the authority of the Government of the United States, yet I shall with the utmost freedom communicate to you, and through you to the Corporation, every idea that can in my mind relate to a permanent and effectual defence against a maritime force; leaving the execution of the plans, and the means of raising the necessary supplies, to their good judgment and patriotic zeal. In stating the principles upon which as perfect a defence as the nature of the case requires should be founded, I must necessarily include those which influenced the orders I am now acting under, and, believing as I do that to form a correct judgment of the whole, the adopted plan should be known, as well as the reasons for its adoption, I shall go into some detail which, however irrelevant in appearance, is too much connected with your object, and too dependent upon it, to be omitted, consistent with a due regard to perspicuity.

[104] In the late conference between the *Vice-President of the United States, the †Secretary of War and myself, there has been but one sentiment respecting the mode of applying the means in our power, with the best effect: but nothing has been said against a defence at the Narrows, provided we had equivalent funds to depend upon; yet it has been uniformly a settled opinion, that a defence of

the Narrows only, would be putting all upon one stake, and probably wasting the zealous and laudable efforts of our citizens, without affording them more than a momentary and perhaps an ideal security.

The propriety of a defence at the Narrows in conjunction with an interior force, is in a striking manner indicated, by the introductory words of my orders. “ It being the intention of the general government so to fortify the harbour of New York, as will, with the aid of gunboats, afford a reasonable defence to the citizens and their property against Ships of War, unaccompanied with any formidable armament, such as can only be opposed by a superior army; the following system has been [105] deemed most expedient at present, with such additions hereafter, as may be thought adviseable, farther in advance.

The Narrows offer a passage of more than twelve hundred yards in width for any ship that could come over the bar at Sandy Hook; now, every Sailor knows that a dozen ships of the line could, upon an emergency, sail abreast through that passage, with fair wind and tide, and allowing one on each side to be destroyed, ten might surely pass unhurt, in as many minutes, and if there were nothing to encounter afterwards, they would indemnify their losses by the contributions they would exact from the city; hence an ineffectual defence at the Narrows, would only serve to increase these contributions.

Seeing therefore the magnitude of this object, and comparing it with the means provided; also considering the confidence placed in their judgment, the above named Officers naturally reverted to a very plain principle which comes home to all our domestic feelings: let us secure our house first, and then according to our ability, defend our courtyard.

In looking around, it was perceived that the prominent rocks on Governor's island, the [106] point of the Bastion of the old City Battery, and Ellis's island, forming nearly an equilateral triangle; and that the centre of this, offered an intersecting point, which, at the greatest distance from each, would only be about one thousand yards, while it would be difficult to go into either the North or East river, without passing within point blank shot, or between four or five hundred yards, of some one of them. It was also seen that former administrations before, and since the revolution, so highly valued these points, that fortifications have been erected upon or near every one, although time, the great destroyer of all things, has obliterated some of them. It was further considered that the modern improvements of marine batteries, which give double the number of guns on the same horizontal

base, and by multiplying the tiers may give six times the number of the heaviest metal with a bomb-proof security above, rendered the question of combat, a question of floating wooden walls, against impregnable stone walls on shore, with equal power as to celerity of action, number of guns within the same space, and weight of metal.

[107] It is not a very bold assertion to say that no ship that sails on the Ocean would engage on such terms.

In combining all these circumstances it was a matter of great consideration, and of the most consoling confidence to reflect, that we should be aided by gunboats, commanded by brave and experienced Officers. No man of professional knowledge has hitherto ventured an opinion against the efficacy of gun boats in harbour, in shoal water, and on a smooth surface; not one of these conditions have been attended to whenever they have failed, and with these conditions, they have been, and ever will be, formidable. Fifty gun boats scattered along the flats on each side of the channel, would all of them attack an advancing ship forward the fore chains, and if she passed the nearest pair, they might slip their cables and keep in their wake; all this time the advancing ship, instead of escaping, would be just coming into a still more prompt, powerful and intersecting fire, during which she could not attack more than the boat on each side, while all the others would rake her fore and aft.

But the certainty of passage is the great [108] objection, for it seems to be in the opinion of the world almost a settled axiom, that ships will pass batteries in spite of all their force. Why would they pass them? There must surely be a strong motive to encounter such danger? Doubtless to attack more vulnerable points. And this is precisely the reason they would pass the Narrows to attack the defenceless city of New York; as Admiral Duckworth passed the Dardanelles to attack Constantinople, and certainly if there had been no interior defence, the capital of the Sublime Port would have been reduced.

But merely passing the city cannot be an important object, for to put it under contribution, ships must lie there, either at anchor or with the main topsail to the mast; now that, when the proposed batteries shall be completed, cannot be done, and we do not find that it is generally thought advantageous to run the gauntlet for the purpose of running it back again.

Before I close this part of my subject, permit me to notice an objection to these batteries which seems to have made some impression on the minds of the citizens "It brings the battle home to our

doors, [109] within the cries of our wives and children." Will any reflecting mind, not under the excitement of passion, believe this to be the fact? Do invading enemies seek to attack powerful batteries, instead of making depredations where there are none? Will a shore lined with cannon be more inviting to a warlike plunderer, than a shore lined with rich freighted merchantmen, and defenceless, well filled stores? I leave the answer to the dictates of a plain but sound understanding, and as we live in the days of rapacity, rather than in the days of chivalry, I cannot doubt what that answer will be.

I beg pardon for this encroachment on your patience previously to answering your main object in the application to me; but the deference and respect I owe to the high characters with whom I have lately been in conference impose this explanation as an indispensable duty: especially as going at once into a plan, which they might be supposed to have omitted, would on my part be a very indecorous presumption.

I now come to the question implied in the resolution of your Board; "Are the Narrows defensible? If so, what are the means, "and what the probable expence?" To this I answer, they are in my opinion [110] defensible, but the means are extensive, and should unite submarine obstructions, forts on each side, and gun boats on the flats in advance.

With respect to the sinking an island in the centre, which has been much spoken of, it does not appear to me that local circumstances have been fully considered. In the middle of the Narrows there are between sixteen and seventeen fathoms of water, say one hundred feet at half tide; to make an island of stone in this depth, with an area of four acres at its surface, as I have heard mentioned, even if the sides were vertical, which could not be, would be more than seventeen millions of cubic feet of stone, this at fifteen cubic [feet] to the ton, would be about one million, One hundred and sixty thousand tons, and would require near twenty four thousand sloops of fifty tons each to convey it; and if the calculation were to be made at four and an half cents each cubic foot, the cost would be nearly Eight hundred thousand Dollars, with as much in addition as the natural slope of loose stones in a rapid current, would increase the mass.

[111] The best plan for permanent obstructions, in my estimation, is that which in the course of a conversation at the Mayor's was intimated by yourself, and as I take no merit in the invention, I may be allowed to state it in detail.

Suppose numerous blocks were to be sunk in the Narrows at certain distances from each other, which though sufficient for a ship to

pass between them, yet should she go but a little on either side of the middle, would insure her destruction; as the depth of water varies in the space before mentioned from ten to sixteen fathoms. Let us suppose a mean, thirteen fathoms or seventy eight feet; the mean would be less, as the depth is less within two hundred feet of the shore on each side, allowing the blocks to rise within ten feet of the surface, and taking a fair but sufficient mean. Let us suppose the averaged depth to be sixty five feet, and the superficial contents of each block, whatever may be its shape, to be fifty feet square, or twenty five hundred square feet, this multiplied by the depth, would give forty five thousand and five hundred cubic feet, which at the price of four and a half cents as above stated, would cost two hundred and twenty six thousand, One [112] hundred and ten dollars. If these blocks were placed at sixty feet distance from each other, and were armed with *cheveaux de frize*, as they might be, so as to reduce the spaces to the width of a ship, it is self evident that no ship could pass, for if she were but one foot on either side of the middle, one of the projecting points would check her progress, when she would immediately round to, and lay her broadside against all the others. To put this effect in a striking point of view, let us suppose a Ship going at the rate of ten Knots with wind and tide, and that by some accident her own anchor were to drop under foot, every sailor knows, that unless she parted her cable in an instant, she would round to, and carry all by the board.

Nautical men are generally very bold and hazardous when the danger is visible, because they rely upon their own skill and activity; but the boldest sailor is the most cautious of all beings, where the danger is invisible, and they always take care to give rocks a very good birth.

This calculation goes to filling up of the whole space, but it is evident that a channel should be left for our own vessels; this at the [113] worst would oblige an enemy to advance singly, and directly under the guns of the batteries to be erected on either side, while every block so sunk would compleatly cover a gun boat that might be anchored upon, or behind it, without danger, owing to their small draft of water. Besides these considerations, it is self evident that the blocks must aid every other mode of obstruction, and, after the experiment we have witnessed, there can be no doubt, but Mr Fulton's Torpedoes could be applied here with almost certain effect. If a pair of these destructive machines were placed in each space between the blocks, should all other means fail, their action would be, as far as human foresight can presume to be accurate, infallible.

If however such obstructions were to be unprotected by batteries on each side, an enemy might progress with a fair wind against the tide, giving to his ship just what way he chose; and by sending boats a head might in a slow and cautious manner feel for a safe passage and remove temporary obstructions; it is therefore of all things the most necessary to prevent the possibility of remaining at rest, any where in the passage.

The most essential as well as the most costly battery should be erected at the edge [114] of Hendrick's reef. Until I can have time to cause the plan and elevation of such a battery to be made, I submit to your consideration the plan and elevation of one designed for a point, not dissimilar as to position in the harbour of Charleston, which I must request you to return after it has been laid before the Corporation.

On the Staten Island side, only the lower battery need to be case-mated, as those ascending the hill in the rear, would be above the reach of either small arms or swivels from the tops of the enemies ships. These batteries could be so constructed as to be impregnable to the fire of shipping, and could form an intersecting fire of from fifty to eighty shot on each side.

It is not an easy matter to calculate the expence of batteries, where, nothing of the kind having been done before. I am deficient in the requisite data, upon which alone accurate estimations can be made, but as I have often heard it said that, could the defence at the Narrows, like the one described be procured, the inhabitants of New York would not think a million of dollars too great an expence. I feel a self assu [115] rance that, with certain dependence on such a fund, the object might be so far obtained, as in conjunction with protecting redoubts on the high grounds, and the interior fortifications and gun boats before described, the harbour of New York would become invulnerable to any maritime attack. In case of an invading army our only method would be, and the only one the spirit of our countrymen would require that of meeting the enemy in the field.

Deeply impressed with the importance of the present crisis, and knowing how anxious the public mind is at present, I have thought it best to give a prompt answer to your request, though from the nature of the case, it must be a very imperfect one; and were I very thirsty for professional fame, it might be considered imprudent, thus to lay myself open to criticism on a subject where there are so many opinions, with much confidence in the validity of each one.

I make no pretensions to infallibility upon any subject, and shall listen with complacency to any opinion, on this one, from any quarter ; but while I respect the sentiments of others, I hope I may rely on some indulgence for my own.

[116] Should it be in my power to give the Corporation any further information, I shall at all times most readily do it upon the slightest requisition on their part ; without any other view than the satisfaction of resulting from the reflection of having rendered an acceptable service to the citizens of New York.

Williams, in behalf of this Board, on the subject of fortifying at the Narrows, be and hereby are directed to request his opinion, whether the Narrows, under all circumstances, be the most eligible place for obstruction and the erection of batteries, in addition to those already determined on by the United States for the protection of the City and harbour of New York, and if, in his judgment, other positions are preferable, to request that he will report the [117] same to this Board with as little delay as possible.

Ordered that the same Committee be authorized to devise a plan for raising money to defray the expences, that may be incurred, for erecting fortifications and making such obstructions as may be judged necessary for the protection of this city and harbour.

The following Report from M^r James Hardie to the City Inspector, was read.

Sir

On Tuesday last I was informed by Doctor Douglas, Commissioner of the Health Office, that the cemetery of the African Zion Methodist Episcopal Church, emitted, frequently, a smell which was very offensive [125] to the neighbours. Since that time I have repeatedly endeavoured to see the Sexton; but did not fall in with him till yesterday, towards the close of Divine Worship, when I had a conversation with him and two of the trustees of the Congregation.

This Society has no burying ground, but inter all their dead in a vault under the church. Since the first commencement of this practice full five years have elapsed and I believe it will be nearly correct to state that, at an average. One hundred and fifty persons have been interred there annually since that period: hence there are now in that vault not less than seven hundred and fifty dead bodies.

Upon opening the door of this vault the smell is, at this season of the year peculiarly offensive; and I fear that unless an immediate stop be put to the practice of interment therein, it may be productive of terrible consequences to the neighbourhood.

The two trustees with whom I conversed informed me that since the first complaint was made, respecting the nuisance, it had been their anxious desire to put a stop to interments in the vault altogether; but that they found themselves in the minority. They observed, however, that if an order [126] should be sent by the Common Council or Board of Health, they were persuaded an unanimous resolution would be forthwith passed by their body, directing the discontinuance of interments in the aforesaid vault.

The Street Commissioner has the honor to communicate to the Board, that Miller & Baker who are large creditors on the award of the Jury for opening Canal Street, have some months ago suggested to the Board by petition that an error existed in the quantity of ground [136] required of them for said Street, and the same being referred to the Subscriber he finds it to be true. These gentlemen do not wish to enter into further disputes upon this subject and have agreed to release the whole of the ground as now taken upon condition that interest is allowed to them on their bond from the date of the award, which in the opinion of the subscriber is much less than would, by impartial judges be awarded to them for the error aforesaid. They further state that they are indebted to M^r Lispenard in part for the said ground, and wish the money for that purpose. Chains 32 Links; thence along the land of said Heirs of David Devore N. $47^{\circ} 45'$ W. 2 Chains 35 Links to the Common Lands; thence N. $63^{\circ} 30'$ W. 8 Chains [140] 85 Links; thence S. 34° W. 30 Links; and from thence 12 Chains in a direct line to the place of beginning, containing 42 Acres 1. Rood, be the same more or less, all which courses are to be run as the needle pointed in 1806.

The Committee further state that this survey is according to M^r Buchanans fences nearly and includes more ground than the original survey of Gourke; and that they have agreed with M^r Buchannan that he shall pay for the ground included in this survey which exceeds the original measurement at the rate of the original purchase with interest thereon, until the day of payment.

[141] *The following report was read and Ordered to lie for consideration.

The Comptroller to whom it was referred to examine into the situation of the claims of Mess^{rs} Rhinelanders to water grants at the foot of Reed, Jay and Beach Streets, and to report such plan as might be proper and just respecting said claims as preferred by the petition of the said Rhinelanders, has the honour to report:

That he has had, aided by the Street Commissioner several conversations with Mess^{rs} Rhinelanders upon this subject and has examined the minutes of the Corporation relating thereto, by all which he finds, with respect to Reed Street; 1st That the Corporation agreed on the 10th June 1794 to give a water grant to the Corporation of Trinity Church for all the ground from Washington Street, between Reed Street and Chamber Street to the river, to certain lines therein particularly described, on condition they would do certain things thereinmentioned, at an annual rent of one shilling per foot after

the expiration of 42 Years from the 10th day of June 1794. That by mesne conveyances the said premises and appurtenances have [142] become the property of M^r Rhinelander, the breadth of which premises on the present wharf of West Street is about 52 feet.

2. That Mess^{rs} Rhinelander also by purchase from the Corporation of Trinity Church and before that Board had agreed to widen or cede their streets in the vicinity, became possessed of all the grounds between Jay and Harrison Streets from Greenwich Street to the North or Hudson river. That Jay Street, on the south side of the premises last aforesaid, is only 40 feet in width, and it is contemplated to widen it by cutting off 25 feet on the north side of it, from the premises owned by M^r Rhinelander, and that a verdict of a Jury now exists in favour of Mess^{rs} Rhinelanders for the value of the ground between Greenwich and Washington Streets. But that a large portion of the street, between the east side of Washington Street and West Street remains to be obtained from M^r Rhinelander, as well as the whole breadth of Washington Street from Jay to Harrison Street aforesaid.

3^d That the Corporation of New York on or about the 29th day of May. 1797. [143] agreed to sell to Mess^{rs} Rhinelander all their right between high and low water mark fronting his property near Beach Street for One thousand Dollars in fee simple, being a breadth of about 125 feet: but which sum has not yet been paid; all which said premises are better understood by an inspection of the maps herewith presented and to which the Comptroller begs leave to refer.

It does not appear, from an investigation of this subject that there is any impropriety in issuing these grants to Mess^{rs} Rhinelander, provided they are equally disposed to render justice and a reasonable equivalent therefor. This idea being suggested to Mess^{rs} Rhinelander they have consented to a negotiation of the whole subject matter stated in the preceding part of this report: and have consented to accept of the grant near Reed Street and pay the aforesaid quit from the time thereinmentioned; that they will relinquish all claims they have to the ground required to widen Jay Street, west of the line of Washington Street, on condition their property on the west of Washington, between Jay and Harrison Streets is exempted from any charge for opening Jay Street above: That they will [144] cede Washington Street from Jay to Harison Street and that they will pay the principal sum of One thousand Dollars, with the interest due thereon, for the ground between high and low water mark, opposite their property in Beach Street.

The Comptroller is therefore of opinion that as Mess^{rs} Rhinelanders do agree to the stipulations aforesaid, Grants ought to be ordered to be made out in their favor for the grounds to the permanent line and present wharves inclusively, and upon such terms as may be just and right and according to the usual prices of grants in that quarter of the city.

All which is respectfully submitted.

The following Letter from Col. Jonathan Williams was presented To Selah Strong Esq^r

Chairman of a Committee of the Corporation of New York.

[146] Fort Columbus, Aug^t 17. 1807.

Sir

Since your favour of the fifth, inclosing the resolution of the Corporation dated the fourth instant, was received, I have been employed in examining the depths and distances of the shoals and channels in several parts of the harbour and bay of New York, in order to be as correct as possible in the representation I am about to make. The Corporation have done me the honour to ask my opinion,

“whether the Narrows, under all circumstances, be the most eligible place for the obstruction and erection of batteries, in addition to those determined on by the United States, for the protection of the city and harbour of New York.”

The best answer that I can make to this enquiry, will doubtless be to lay before the board, a collection of facts relating to the whole space, within and without the Narrows, which have resulted from credible information and unequivocal experiment.

There are people now living who remember when the channel between Governor's island [147] and Long island was fordable, and I have the best authority for saying that about fifty years ago, the gardener of the then Governor used to pass and repass in a canoe, without a paddle, by merely a push with his foot at setting out. By an English chart published in 1776, it appears that the shoalest water in this passage was at that time three fathoms; by a Chart made by Captain Chauncey and Mr Loss, the depth in the same place was in 1798, increased to five fathoms, and there are now seven fathoms of water at low tide.

The cause of this is universally, and I believe truly, ascribed to the cast given to the East river ebb tide, by the docking out on that side of the city.

If this be the effect of a partial obstruction occasioned by the new docks, it may be asked what would be the effect of one general obstruction across the channel between flats of deep and soft mud? As nature acts upon a large scale, and is not disposed to yield to the operations of art upon a comparatively small one, it is not unreasonable to suppose that a new channel would, in such a case, be soon opened on either side.

By the English chart abovementioned, [148] there appears to be a channel round Red Hook, of at least three fathoms deep, across the entrance of Gwoan's Cove, by Yellow Hook, and so on to the Narrows. Capt. Chauncey and Mr Loss' Chart describe the same channel, but it appeared to have been filled up to about two fathoms near Red Hook. I have now sounded the whole length of this channel, and find it has opened itself again, so that I carried from three and a half, to five fathoms, all the way through at low tide. It is therefore reduced to a certainty, that any ship, drawing as much water as can be brought over Sandy Hook, which is barred quite across by three and an half fathoms, may sail close on the Long island side to the eastward of Mud Flat, and come round Red Hook into the main, or into the Buttermilk channel, without coming near enough to be at-

tacked from any point in advance of the already described interior defence.

Buttermilk channel may doubtless be rendered impassible by chains well protected from the shores of Red Hook and Governor's island; and the South side of the latter would be a very commanding point for a battery, [149] which would rake the channel just described, to the whole length of cannon shot. The southern point of Gwoan's Cove, called Yellow Hook, lies about due east from Robins reef, and nearly at right angles with the channel, it was therefore essential to find the true distance and depth of water in this direction, since this appears to be the place most spoken of for obstructing an enemy's passage. By actual measurement with a line and two boats, warping from one to the other, and carrying on this warp as nearly as possible in one direction, making due allowance for the curve of the line by its sinking and by the tide, there appears to be at least three thousand nine hundred yards distance between the points, so far from the shore of each, that the least depth in any one place is seventeen feet, which compared with the ship channel in the Narrows, is nearly as five to two.

In the middle of the main channel the water is twelve fathoms deep to a width of about four hundred and fifty yards; it only decreases to nine fathoms on each side in a space of six hundred yards, and it is not less than five fathoms in fifteen hundred yards width; the channel east of Mud Flat, is in this place about five hundred yards [150] wide, with no less than twenty five feet, all the other depths vary between three and five fathoms.

That the Corporation may have at one view, this distance and the several depths in an east and west direction, I have subjoined a section of the passage quite across from Robins' reef to the point above mentioned. After this representation, the Corporation will not think it necessary for me to give any opinion as to the practicability, expediency, cost or effect of obstructions in this place: their own judgments will decide these questions. It must be remembered, however, that in obstructing the channel in this place, there is nothing to prevent the enemy from possessing the Kil's channel, and totally blockading Newark Bay and the sound, thus cutting off all communication with Jersey below Paules Hook, while the whole anchorage at the quarantine ground is left open, where a fleet of any number or size may ride unmolested and obtain coercively every supply it might want. It will also be matter worthy of consideration, how far this fine harbour may or may not be injured by obstructing the pres-

ent and opening [151] other channels. While upon this business, I thought it best to ascertain the width of Hendrick's reef at the Narrows, with more accuracy than could be done by trigonometrical observations, owing to the unsteady position of the buoy or boat, which I was obliged to make the apex of the triangle; and I found that in the direction from the first new house below Mr Denisses, towards the most southern private signal staff on Staten island, the reef measured, by the line, four hundred and twenty five yards, allowing twenty five yards for the curve of the line, this shoal may be calculated at four hundred yards from the shore; pursuing the same mode of measuring, the whole width of the Narrows, in this place, appears to be nineteen hundred and five yards, which agrees very well with my previous trigonometrical observations. The water, from the reef and from the shore on the Staten island side, deepens so suddenly that the width of the channel for any ship that can come over the bar at Sandy Hook, ought not to be calculated at less than fifteen hundred yards, and the depth in the line abovementioned is not more than fifteen fathoms; where greater depths are found they may be considered as holes. On trying the current by heaving the log when the boat was at anchor, it [152] appeared to run at the ebb and flood at the rate of two miles in an hour, but on raising the pitch pot, with which the boat was anchored, about two fathoms from the bottom, the current that passed by the boat was but at the rate of one mile in an hour.

As it is reasonable to suppose that the boat at the surface would have towed the pot a little, even if the water below had been still, we may conclude that the current below is not stronger than one mile an hour, and as all changes of full tides by increased freshes or the agitations occasioned by the wind, probably take place only at and near the surface to proportionally small depths, the velocity of one mile in an hour, or the constant velocity of one foot and an half in a second is all the impulse that blocks in the Narrows can be exposed to, at a certain depth, and this impulse would be alternate at each end, in precisely opposite directions, not more than six hours at a time; while the current of the water on each side would be a support rather than a pressure. Hence I conclude that if blocks were to be sunk in the Narrows two sides might be vertical, and if the ends were to be made like the [153] sterlings of a bridge, with a batter or talus of three inches in one foot, their strength would resist the currents and every sort of agitation of the sea from any ordinary cause whatever. In the same proportion as they are made long below in the course of

the current, they may be made short above in such a shape as to be narrow in that direction, and of the full width of the base across the tide; thus if the upper surface were a parallelogram of eighty across by thirty along the current, the surface below might be sixty along, by eighty across the current as above, making the mean surface three thousand six hundred square feet, and as the average depth may be taken at sixty five feet, supposing the upper surface to be ten feet under water, as mentioned in my former communication, which it will be remembered is below the ice in winter, the cubical contents of each block will be two hundred and thirty four thousand feet, and by extending the chevaux de frize fifteen feet each way, obstructions of one hundred and ten feet wide might be made to extend from side to side at such distances as to leave ample passage for the water between them.

Twenty eight of these obstructions, with [154] *with* intervals of eighty feet, would, at the ends of the chevaux de frize, leave intervals of but fifty feet, and form a line quite across the channel. But instead of filling up the whole space, it was intimated when this idea of obstruction was first stated, and although I approve, I do not take to myself the merit of its ingenuity, that they might run in different lines from either side, so that altho' each line of blocks might be half the width of the Narrows, the extremities might be an hundred yards distant from each other, in the line of the current, this would be always a safe uninterrupted passage for our shipping, when not closed by a chain, and when closed would float along the current at both flood and ebb, and thereby meet with no resistance laterally, and as the floats would ride, each in the rear of the other, the longitudinal resistance would be small. An enemy who might attempt to force the chain, would be obliged to check his way, and consequently his propelling force, by turning at right angles with the wind and tide, and should the tide resist one effort, he would be immediately thrown, by both wind and tide, with his broad side to the next line of blocks, and [155] remain at the mercy of the batteries. Now the whole of this defence, even at five cents the cubic foot, would be but three hundred and twenty seven thousand six hundred dollars, and the chain, which would answer for this purpose, is now lying in good order, at West point. The remarks I have made relative to the proposed obstructions before mentioned, may be said to apply here, and that I should be found in contradiction with myself, I will therefore beg leave to make a few comparative observations on this subject, which I trust every man of candor will admit to be tolerably well

founded. The channel near Robins' reef has on each side an immense expanse of water, and below it a body of soft mud. The channel in the Narrows, has on each side, hard rocks and high grounds, with a bottom that is worn down to its utmost depth, and there is probably nothing but rock remaining. The proposed obstructions in the Narrows, admit a current of as much water between them, as they impede the passage of: and as it is impossible to make any impression on either side, the only effect would be to raise the water in the Narrows as much as the opposing bulk amount to. For the sake of round numbers, I will suppose the whole cubical contents to be seven millions [156] of cubic feet. If this mass of water were to be spread over the whole breadth of the Narrows, through its length, it will be found by calculation that it would raise the surface continually with soft mud, and vast expanse on each side, is another question, the solution of which I make no pretensions to. I do not mean in this new statement, to abandon the position I took in my former communication, relative to Mr Fulton's torpedoes. This gentleman, in the several communications I have had with him, appears to be fully possessed of the subject of his invention, upon principles which are all of them reducible to mathematical and experimental demonstration; and seeing, as I have seen, the effect of his Torpedoes, I cannot hesitate in recommending these engines as a very powerful auxiliary. A question of humanity has been raised relative to the use of these machines, which in its effect has rather an inhumane tendency. Let us, if we can, blow up a few marauding invaders, and the immorality and inhumanity of attacking defenceless towns, for the sake of plunder, would be checked, while human miseries would be lessened by rendering such attacks less frequent. Wars [157] have in effect been less sanguinary since the invention of gunpowder; yet when it was first used, it must have had a treacherous appearance.

In my last communication, I probably did not express myself so clearly as I might have done, if it had been written more at leisure than circumstances permitted, for I find that my meaning has not been fully understood. In saying that ships would always pass batteries, I meant to speak of unobstructed passages, and in the direction of a tangent to the angle of the embrasure. This may be considered as settled, until batteries shall be erected of a greater power than any that have hitherto been seen; but the great force of batteries at the entrance of a narrow passage, should be applied at the moment a ship comes within cannon shot, and by a powerful, quick and intersecting fire, do her all possible injury, before she comes at right angles

with the battery; every sportsman knows the difference between a bird flying towards him, and one flying across his view. There is no inconsistency in my not opposing what the world seems to have deemed incontrovertible; where there are neither submarine obstructions nor a floating force to aid the batteries, and [158] saying at the same time, that these three, acting together, might be so placed as to render the Narrows invulnerable. If we were to have batteries without gunboats and obstructions an enemy might pass. If we were to have obstructions without force to protect them, the enemy would leisurely remove the dangerous parts and go between the others. Thus, you see, sir, that in my opinion, although a reliance upon any one mode might be illusory, the whole combined would certainly protect the Narrows, and insure security and tranquillity to this opulent city.

Those who object to permanent defence, because it will require time and expence, and will agree to no expence that does not imply immediate effect, may spend their lives in talking upon this subject, but they will never do any thing. Engineers do not deal in magic: there must be a sufficiency of time, money, with a very good stock of patience, or their works will never do any good to the public, nor credit to themselves. If this harbour and bay were in possession of any of the belligerent powers of Europe, their Engineers would pronounce it to be perfectly defensible, but they would require a good fund of the three requisites before mentioned, money, time and patience. What then [159] are we to do in case of a sudden unexpected attack? I answer that we must make use of the means we can, on short notice, command, send our gunboats in front with an ample collection of torpedoes to be placed in proper positions, put a gun or two on board each one of the North river Sloops, and go down upon the enemy like a swarm of bees. I would recommend however, that these auxiliary sloops should keep so far in the rear of the advanced guard, as not to impede their operations. Desperate cases must have desperate remedies: and this bold advance, with our wharves lined with cannon, might save the city. But this kind of defence should never be relied on, as a sure protection. By frequent repetition, it would be in effect more expensive than permanent batteries; and at every requisition the money so suddenly expended would be all lost; to say nothing of the loss occasioned by diverting our citizens from the daily pursuit of their business, and employment of their vessels. The enemy too, might perpetually harrass us by false alarms,

till tired of preparations, without using them, we should be caught, when we thought ourselves the most secure.

As the Corporation have not directed my [160] attention to any particular point, I was desirous of extending my examination down to Sandy Hook, but a violent storm drove me back, under the shelter of Coney island. I had here an opportunity of observing a fine land locked bay, called Gravesend bay, where the water was smooth, although there was a high sea without, and where the largest fleet that ever crossed the ocean could ride with perfect safety in four or five fathoms of water, while only a superior naval force could annoy it.

Between the Narrows and the Hook there does not appear one single point above water except Coney island, from which a ship could be touched, and this is so much exposed to be attacked with success, or to be starved out that it cannot be thought a proper place for a garrison. It is merely a sand bank without vegetation and without fresh water, and even if it were formidable, ships could keep at too great a distance to suffer from its shot, whatever might be their number or power. Although I could not visit Sandy Hook, I have a tolerable knowledge of that point, having passed it, and examined very accurate charts. From my experience in the rivers, inlets, [161] &c: on the coast of North and South Carolina, I am confident that no obstructions could be permanently placed on these moving sandbars at the margin of the ocean. Such ideas should in my opinion be abandoned as soon as conceived, and although I have seen a very elegant plan for fortifying this Hook at the expence of four millions of dollars, and a perpetual garrison of eight thousand men, I cannot hesitate to say, that if the plan were executed it would not in my opinion prevent an enemy's fleet from passing by, and occupying Gravesend Bay with very little injury.

I cannot close this account without acknowledging my obligations to my assistants, especially as their concurrence will show that I have hazarded no unsupported assertion, from any suggestions of the imagination. Cap^t Wilson navigated my boat in the precise direction required. M^r Thomas Brown placed the warp boat and kept it steady in the proper position. M^r Clark, an experienced seaman, heaved the lead with the utmost regularity, and Lieu^t Bomford, of the corps of engineers, made all the requisite notes and observations with the most minute exactness: and [162] with respect to the channel east of mud flat, Cap^t Wilson and M^r Clark have both declared that they could see no difficulty of carrying a ship of the line through upon a rising tide.

Thus, Sir, I have given all the explanations on this important subject that I am capable of, and if it should give any satisfaction to the good citizens of New York, I shall be abundantly gratified.

They ought to have some place assigned them for the conducting of those sales, and no Street on the west side of Broadway is better suited than the one in which they are at present permitted to sell. I would also have the law strictly enforced as the best remedy for the evil complained of, I would submit to [169] the Board the propriety of having that particular law published with a notice that hereafter every violation thereof would be promptly noticed.

The following letter from Colonel [173] Williams was presented and read.

To Selah Strong Esq^r

Fort Columbus August 21,
 1807.

Sir.

In compliance with the request of the Committee expressed in your letter of the 18th inst. I have sounded from the Southern part of Redhook in a direction West by South to the middle of the main channel bringing the eastern extremity of Bedlows island to bear North by east half east. I divided the soundings into equal distances of time and supposing the Boat to have equal way upon her the division of the length of the lines by the number of soundings gives about thirty yards for the distance between the heaves of the lead: by pursuing this calculation it will be found that the width of the interior channel, eastward of Mud flat, where the water on each side was three and a half fathoms and in the middle five, is about three hundred yards, this was about half tide. The width of the Flat will by the same rule be found to be about four hundred yards with [174] not less than three and a half fathoms and the rest of the line will be found to be a gradual slope from four to eleven fathoms in a distance of about twenty one hundred yards, the averaged depth of which will be six and a half fathoms, the whole length will be found about two hundred yards short of a mile and three quarters as required, but as I brought the bearings of Bedlows island exactly as marked by a pencil line on Cap^t Chaunceys and M^r Loss' Chart, and as the tide had caused me to deviate one half a point from the course, I conclude that this spot was the termination of the proposed line. I then sunk a Buoy and proceeded to Cawan Point, where I waited for

the next tide. On proceeding from this point in a South east direction as required I found about eighteen hundred or two thousand yards of soft mud, in some places six, but no where deeper than eight feet. We then came rather suddenly into five fathoms and continued deepning till we came into eleven fathoms and brought Bedlows island to bear nearly as before North North east; running across [175] we had about a dozen heaves of eleven fathoms, and then shoaled gradually till we came on the flat again, precisely as we ran off it before. Night coming on with contrary winds we could not proceed up in the line of the channel, but by frequent previous sounding, I am convinced it is no where less than eleven and in many places fifteen fathoms, between the part we crossed to the point of Governor's island. I beg leave to observe that there can be no doubt of the accuracy of Cap^t Chaunceys soundings, which I understand were all taken in a boat and in fine weather; the differences therefore are only to be ascribed to the changes a soft muddy bottom is liable to in the way of currents and in a long course of time. Desirous of giving the earliest information, I have not been able to accompany this letter with a section of the depths; but Lieut^t Bomford will wait upon you with one on Monday morning, in the mean time I send you inclosed a correct account of all the soundings arranged in the order they were made.

[176] *The following Report of the Committee, on the subject of fortifying the Harbour of New York, was read and ordered to be printed for the use of the Board.

The Committee that was appointed to carry into effect the resolution of the Corporation dated the 13th of July last, offering to cede to the United States such part of the public ground as the Secretary at War may require for the purpose of erecting fortifications for the defence of this city—and also the resolution, dated the 4th of August, offering the aid of this Board to the Executive of this state, to enable him more effectually to put in proper condition, for immediate service, the arms and ordinance belonging to the State, and to procure such military stores as the present exigencies may require—also to devise

such other means of defence as may be in the power of this Board to execute :

Report,

That the Secretary at War, with the other Commissioners of the United States, have determined, not only to enlarge and make durable the works on Governor's island, but [177] are now about erecting a very strong and powerful marine battery, on the Northwest point of that island, to extend on the reef, beyond low water mark, into the river. The works on Ellis' island are to be extended, and the number of guns and weight of metal greatly increased. It is also determined by the general government to erect a strong fort, with two or three tiers of guns, to extend beyond the present battery, in front of the Flag staff: also to build a block in the North river, at the foot of Duane Street, of 100. feet square, and to erect a battery thereon. When these works are completed, it is understood they will be able to bring 120 guns to bear upon any point in the bay, between Bedlow's island and the city. The Commissioners have also fixed upon the old Potters' field, as a proper place to erect laboratories and arsenals for depositing and repairing arms and military stores. The several sites, where these works are to be erected, and which are within the jurisdiction of this Board, your Committee have offered, on the part of the Corporation, to cede their right, as soon as the[y] can be made to designate the proper metes and bounds.

Although the works which are erecting under the direction of the government of the United States are proper, and may be considered very useful, as part of a general [178] system of defence, they are, however, deemed not sufficient in themselves to afford that protection against a maritime force, which will insure us safety in case of an attack. Your Committee have deliberately considered the several plans for the defence of the harbour that have been published, and others that have been handed to them; they have also caused several soundings to be made of the harbour, from the Narrows to Bedlows island, and find the shoalest water to be in a line between Red Hook and a reef of rocks on the west Flat, about half a mile below Bedlows island; and from the various information obtained, have thought it most adviseable to recommend the following plan.

To begin at a reef of rocks that is bare at low water, about half a mile to the South of Bedlows island, and run a course east by south to the southerly point of Red Hook on Long island. The distance across, on this line is about 3.000. yards, of which near 400 yards the water is 60 feet deep at low water, and the remainder varies from 40 to 16

feet in depth. A considerable part of the distance, say about 700 yards, does not exceed 16 feet at low water.

To secure this place against the passage of ships, whose draft or water exceeds 16 or 18 feet, [179] it is proposed that blocks be sunk, to consist of timber and stone, in the manner the piers of our wharves are made, the size of which to be in proportion to the depth of the water, and to secure their standing firm, to have the base always greater than the height. These blocks to be 50 feet wide in their position across the river, and to approach within 10 feet of the surface of the water at low tide, and to leave a space between each block of 50 feet. To commence sinking the blocks at Red Hook and to continue them until they come within 200 yards of the reef of rocks on the Flat beforementioned. If it should be feared that Ships might pass between the blocks, where the space left is 50 feet, that could be remedied by projecting 3 or 4 large timbers obliquely on the upper part of the blocks, with their points faced with iron, in the manner of a chevaux de frize: these might extend from each block 10 feet, which would then leave the space but 30 feet. These obstructions, being thus placed would compel all vessels, drawing more than 16 or 18 feet of water, to pass within the space of 200 yards, next the reef of rocks. At that place a fort of such strength might be erected, with two or three tiers of guns, as should be judged sufficient to defend this passage against any hostile fleet. The fort could be erected without difficulty at this place, there being several acres of ground bare at low water which is hard and firm. But as [180] an additional security against a fleet passing the fort, a number of chevaux de frize might be made and at hand. In case of an hostile fleet appearing, they could be placed in the passage in a short time. These might be removed when the danger disappeared.

A further security against forcing this passage by an enemy, would be placing in it a boom, constructed in an angular form \wedge with the point outwards, to be moored with a number of grapplings and anchors. If, however, it should still be believed possible, that these obstructions may be removed, and a fleet pass through the passage intended to be left open, it is proposed, that at the distance of 200 yards to the Southward from the line of obstructions and the reef beforementioned 4 or 5 Blocks be sunk, commencing from the flat that borders the west side of the channel to extend into the channel 200 yards, so as to be parallel to the last block of the range extending from Red Hook, and to connect the outward blocks or extremities of each line of blocks with a strong boom or chain, which can here be

used with great effect, as it will ride parallel with the tide and not across it. It will then be evident, that a ship coming to New York must [181] change her course, and stand directly for the fort, and it is almost certain, that her crossing the tide would so much impede her way, that the chain would entirely arrest her progress when she would be swept, by the current, directly on the blocks and left at the mercy of the fort.

If it should be thought necessary, and admitting that this chain might possibly be forced, a like range of blocks might be made 400 yards to the north of the last mentioned line, to extend into the channel 200 yards, and be connected in the same manner as the first, with a boom and chain; this would again oblige a vessel to alter her course and stand directly from the fort; her headway, by this time, would be so impeded, that this second chain would certainly stand.

It may be said, that a fleet of ships would take the fort, and then remove the obstructions. This is admitted to be possible; but if the fort be well defended and of suitable strength, with the aid of gun-boats, which can here be used with great effect, it is reasonable to believe the fleet would also be crippled and some of them destroyed. What then would be their situation? They cannot hold the fort, for it is entirely commanded by the works on Bedlow's island, [182] and it cannot be supposed they would attempt to come to town in their disabled state, to encounter other and more numerous and powerful fortifications.

The plan of defending the city of New York, by submarine obstructions, has been objected to on several grounds. First, it has been doubted by some, whether blocks can be sunk where water is sixty feet deep, and if they can be sunk, whether they will stand the force of the current and the storms.

Second, that by placing obstructions in the channel to such an extent, it will have an injurious effect upon the current and probably affect the ebb and flow of the tide. Third, that if they could be sunk and made to stand, & would have no bad effect upon the tide, the worms in a few years would destroy the timber, and the stones would fall out, when it would require the same expence to renew them again. And fourth, that Providence has given us one of the best harbours in the world, and these obstructions would exceedingly injure the passage of ships going out and coming in, and they would occasionally get on these blocks, by which they might be injured or lost.

As to the first objection it is answered, that upon enquiry from the most experienced dock builders, they assure us there is no diffi-

culty in sinking blocks where the water does [183] not exceed 60 feet in depth, and they have no doubt of their resisting the force of the current. We see almost daily, blocks of only 30 feet square, sunk in the East and North rivers opposite the city, where the water is thirty five or forty feet deep, and the current opposite to the town, is much stronger than it is in the bay, where the obstructions are contemplated to be made. Old mariners assert, that the agitation of water in a storm, is principally on the surface, and the bottom of the sea is not disturbed in any proportion to the surface; this being the case, there can no danger arise from storms, as the blocks will not be within ten feet of the surface of the water at low tide.

The second objection has more weight, as this is a new thing and we have not experience to guide us. If it should, have the injurious effect upon the tide to the extent that some suppose, the obstructions ought certainly to be abandoned; as we have no guide to direct us, every one must exercise his own judgment. Your Committee have, however, made various calculations, that the public mind may have some data to form an opinion.

It will be observed that the extent of the harbour from Red Hook, on Long island to Cowan's Point on the Jersey shore, is near four [184] miles; that the distance of the obstructions contemplated to be made, is about one and a half miles; that the blocks take up only half the space as far as they go, and that they do not come within ten feet of the surface at low water; the whole column of water, flowing between Long island and the Jersey shore, at low water, amounts to 350.000 square feet, and the proposed obstructions amount to 77.000 square feet; not one quarter of the whole column of the water will be obstructed, and if the number of square feet be taken at half tide, the obstructions will only be one sixth part of the whole space. It would appear from these calculations, that the obstructions could have no injurious effect upon the ebb and flow of the tide; the ground and wharves made on the east side of this city, have contracted the river more than one quarter of its original breadth, and our piers now are in the deepest part of the river. It has not been observed that the tide flows less at this time at Hell gate, than it did a century past. The current no doubt, is stronger opposite the town, than it was formerly; but it is believed that the same quantity of water passes in the river now, that did before the river was contracted.

[185] The third objection is against the durability of the blocks. Your Committee have taken pains to examine some of the oldest wharves in this city.

The Crane wharf, which has been built about sixteen years, has been searched under water at low tide; the timber appears to be perfectly sound and not the least decayed. We have examined another wharf, which was said to have been built previous to the revolution; the timber of which appeared to be sound. There is no doubt there are worms in the timber; they make small holes in the logs where they enter, but do not entirely destroy the wood. From the information of the dockbuilders, who have broken up old docks, that have been built 50 years, the timber, some distance below low water mark, has been little worm eaten, but such parts as the stones have covered, has not been touched by the worms, and was as sound as when put into the wharf.

To the fourth and last objection, that it will injure the navigation. It is answered, that there will be water sufficient for nine-tenths of our vessels to sail over the obstructions and such as require a larger draft of water, at all times when the wind is fair, can pass through the space of two hundred yards [186] intended to be left unobstructed; but it may sometimes happen when the wind is a-head, the Ship will lose a few tides before a suitable time offers to come up; and there is a possibility of some being lost by getting on the blocks; but considering the great object of having the city safely protected from invasion, these objections are of small moment.

The calculations of expence to make the obstructions in the channel, will not exceed 200.000 dollars, and to raise the flat sufficiently high to erect a fort upon, of 1000 feet in length, and 100 feet in breadth, will not be more than 100.000 Dollars; the cost of building the fort, and its necessary appendages, Your Committee have not military experience sufficient to determine.

If the Corporation should think proper to adopt this plan of defence, and to proceed immediately to carry it into effect, the next question is, in what manner the funds are to be raised. It is believed from the patriotic zeal of our citizens, and from the general anxiety expressed by all persons, that something should be done, without delay, to put this city in a posture of defence; there would be no difficulty in raising by [187] loan from the citizens, a sum sufficient to effect this purpose, upon Corporation Bonds, redeemable at pleasure, the interest to be paid half yearly. There can scarcely be a doubt, but the Government of the United States will assume and pay this debt; but in case they should not, and it should ultimately fall upon the city to pay it, the debt and interest would be extinguished in three years, by doubling the usual yearly taxes. Would it not be best even

to pay the debt ourselves, rather than remain in this exposed and defenceless situation? Our interest clearly dictates the propriety of the measure.

This is a work of great magnitude, and will take more than one year to complete it. The materials are not to be had in sufficient quantities at present, but we ought to make a beginning this year with what materials can be procured, and the works may probably be finished in the course of the next summer. If we should unfortunately be involved in a war, in consequence of the present dispute with England, it will most probably take place before any effectual system of defence can be completed, and we must submit to our unhappy situation. But if the storm should blow over, we ought not to desist [188] from our determinations, to put the city in a state of defence; we cannot always promise ourselves an exemption from the calamities of war: on the 20th of June last, the country felt as secure and as confident of the continuation of peace, as it has felt for many years past; but from the events that have recently taken place, it is seen upon what an uncertain tenure the peace of nations depends. The advice of our immortal Washington ought therefore to be confided in, "that to preserve peace we ought always to be prepared " for war."

The following Communication from the Street Commissioner was read;

The Street Commissioner has the honour to communicate that he has this morning attended with Colonel Williams at Duane Street Basin to ascertain the quantity and position of the water right he wishes the Corporation to convey to the United States for fortifications at that place.† The letter from him to the Chairman of the Committee of the Common Council, herewith presented, dated in August last, inserted at end of this report P. 221. mentions a [218] distance of 300 feet in a North and South direction parallel to the intended permanent line, which he has now agreed will be

sufficient for his purposes, provided he has an indefinite line from his eastern limits into the river.

In order to preserve the revenue of the wharves and basin as much as practicable the subscriber has pointed out the grounds to be occupied by the United States as portrayed on the sketch herewith presented and to which he begs leave to refer. To this area Colonel Williams has given his consent giving him free egress and regress over the pier to a draw bridge leading to the works. To be more particular, the Street Commissioner begs leave to describe the grounds by references to the map as follows:

1st A. B. C. D represents the ground required by Col. Williams.

2^d A to E is a space of 20 feet over which is to be a draw bridge, up at night, to let vessels pass into the basin N^o 2.

3^d A is to be 50 feet east of F and the line from A to B is to be 300 feet long and parallel to the permanent line, to the east of which the Corporation are to retain the right wharfage.

4th From A to G a line of 250 feet in the extent [219] of ground to be built upon. The other 50 feet from G to B is intended by Col. Williams as a water lot, and to be used by the Corporation in common with the citizens when not in use by the government.

5th The distance from H. to I. being the space the Street Commissioner believes the Corporation have an indisputable right to, is about 225 feet, being 95 less southerly than the line of the intended grant. This 95 feet trenches of course upon the waters fronting upon the block between Chamber and Warren Streets and will deprive those proprietors of so much of their future water right into the river. How far the Corporation possess the right to grant this space to the United States is not for the Street Commissioner to determine. Upon this subject however he will remark that no water grants have as yet been issued in that vicinity.

By this arrangement it will be perceived that due regard has been had to the preservation of the Corporate revenue, and that the works in front of the line from H to K will afford a fine shelter for small craft or sloops and deprive the Corporation of no part of their wharfage except the small space of 50 feet from E to F where it is indispensably necessary to have the draw bridge before mentioned.

The Street Commissioner hopes this arrange- [220] ment will meet the approbation of the Common Council and request to know whether he shall direct the survey and maps for the cession to the United States to be made in conformity therewith.

Fort Columbus. Aug^t 1807

Sir

The number and variety of my late duties and the difficulty of fixing determinate lines on a watery surface have delayed my application to you for certain cessions of submarine and other territory to the United States in conformity to the resolution of the Corporation of the 13th of July. It is impossible to determine the precise limits in the submarine cessions, and owing to the granted water lots on the North river the distance from the point of the Battery will necessarily be greater than at first intended. I would therefore propose that the grant be made in a line from the salient angle of the bastion of the battery in a direction S. 77. W. towards Ellis' island to the edge of the channel and on each side of that line, to any distance that may be occupied by the United States not exceeding two hundred feet at right angles from that line northwards, and two hundred feet southwards, granting however only so much as shall be absolutely occupied, with a water lot [222] of fifty feet on each side and to the channel in front with a right of egress and regress to and across the Battery to the main street. In like manner I would propose that the grant of the Corporation's property near Rhinelanders wharf should be restricted on the inside by the quantity of space the Corporation thinks proper to reserve as a place for vessels to be within; to leave it unlimited towards the channel; but the space to be limited by two parallel lines three hundred feet distant from each other and perpendicular to the front line of the wharves and a water lot of fifty feet on each side of the works that shall be actually made. The Corporation may further restrict, if they please, that the Bridge to be made to connect the Fort with the shore shall have a draw in it sufficient for vessels to pass and repass.

I inclose an extract of a letter from the Governor, by which it appears that the grant of Pottersfield must be made by this Corporation and I would propose to have the place designated by the existing fences in the open square behind the house and garden of that place at the angle of the intersecting roads now occupied. The Magazine, Arsenal, Labaratory, Workshops &c: &c: proposed to be built should [223] not be exposed to any buildings near them on either side on account of the danger of Fire. I should therefore think it proper for the line to extend to the road on each side and so wide as to admit a

large yard to be inclosed which may also serve for a deposit for various purposes. The metes and bounds of this may be ascertained by the City surveyor; and I will attend him at any moment that may be agreeable, on notice being given me the day before.

Extract of a letter from His Excellency Governor Tompkins to Colonel Williams.

New York. 25th July. 1807.

Sir

“The land around the Bastion of the old Battery belongs to the Corporation of New York, together with the land on the Battery which will be necessary to answer the purposes of fortification.”

“The land at Pottersfield originally belonged to the Corporation. They granted it to the State for the use of an Arsenal, but as it has not been applied to that use by the State, and as by an act of the Legislature a lease which the [224] Surveyor General had given of it was directed to be assigned to the Corporation and the rent which had been received in the mean time was ordered to be refunded to them, it is presumed the right of the State was relinquished and that the property reverted in the Corporation. At any rate I think their title will be deemed adequate, and that you will have nothing to apprehend from any interference with you by the Agents of the State.”

“The resolution of the Corporation of the 13th inst. embraces the whole property belonging to them. It will therefore be necessary for you only to furnish them with the precise limits and boundaries of the land required to answer your objects and a conveyance will be forthwith executed therefor.”

Ordered that the Comptroller prepare a deed in conformity, on condition that the premises be applied by the United States for the sole purpose of erecting a Fortification for the defence of this city to be commenced forthwith.*

Resolved that the Street Commissioner cause the survey of the shores of this city, lately ordered to be made, to be completed and a plan thereof presented to this Board at the next [225] meeting.

bursement of part of the expence for making a Pier on the East side of Coenties slip.

Resolved that the Watch Committee* confer with the Fire Department, on the subject of a late resolution of this Board prohibiting Watchmen from being Members of Fire Companies.

Board that he has been at the Old Potter's field with Colonel Williams to point out, more particularly, the ground intended to be ceded to the United States, and mentioned to him that a Street lying at right angles from Bloomingdale road to Albany Avenue cutting off an angle from the rear of the public grounds, was long since intended to be opened by conversations with General Bailey upon that subject, who owns the grounds adjoining thereto. Colonel Williams approved of the arrangement as the public grounds would then be surrounded by spacious streets and the property in the vicinity be more protected from the explosion of a magazine in case such an accident should happen. And he requested the Street Commissioner to obtain from General Bailey his determination, and if possible to settle the streets previous to the cession.*

[232] The Street Commissioner has further to communicate that he has been, likewise, on the ground with Gen. Bailey and finds him willing to make a fair exchange of ground which will be cut by the aforesaid street according to such principle as may be settled by referees reciprocally chosen and named Jacob Shute as a referee on his part, if the plan was agreed to by the Common Council.

The Street Commissioner believes it will be productive of public good to comply with this arrangement, and recommends that George Gosman, who resides in the vicinity, be appointed on the part of the Corporation to settle the proportionate value of the ground in question, the position of which may be better understood by inspection of the annexed map to which the Street Commissioner begs leave to refer.†

The Street Commissioner also submits to the Board whether it would not be better to straighten, or make straighter, the north side of the old post road along the public grounds by bringing out the line as marked on said map about 20 feet where the road is now 144 feet wide and where it has a considerable and unpleasant bend. This alteration can be [233] made without any personal inconvenience and will increase the triangle proposed by the subscriber to be reserved on the east side of the Albany Avenue and which the United States do not want.

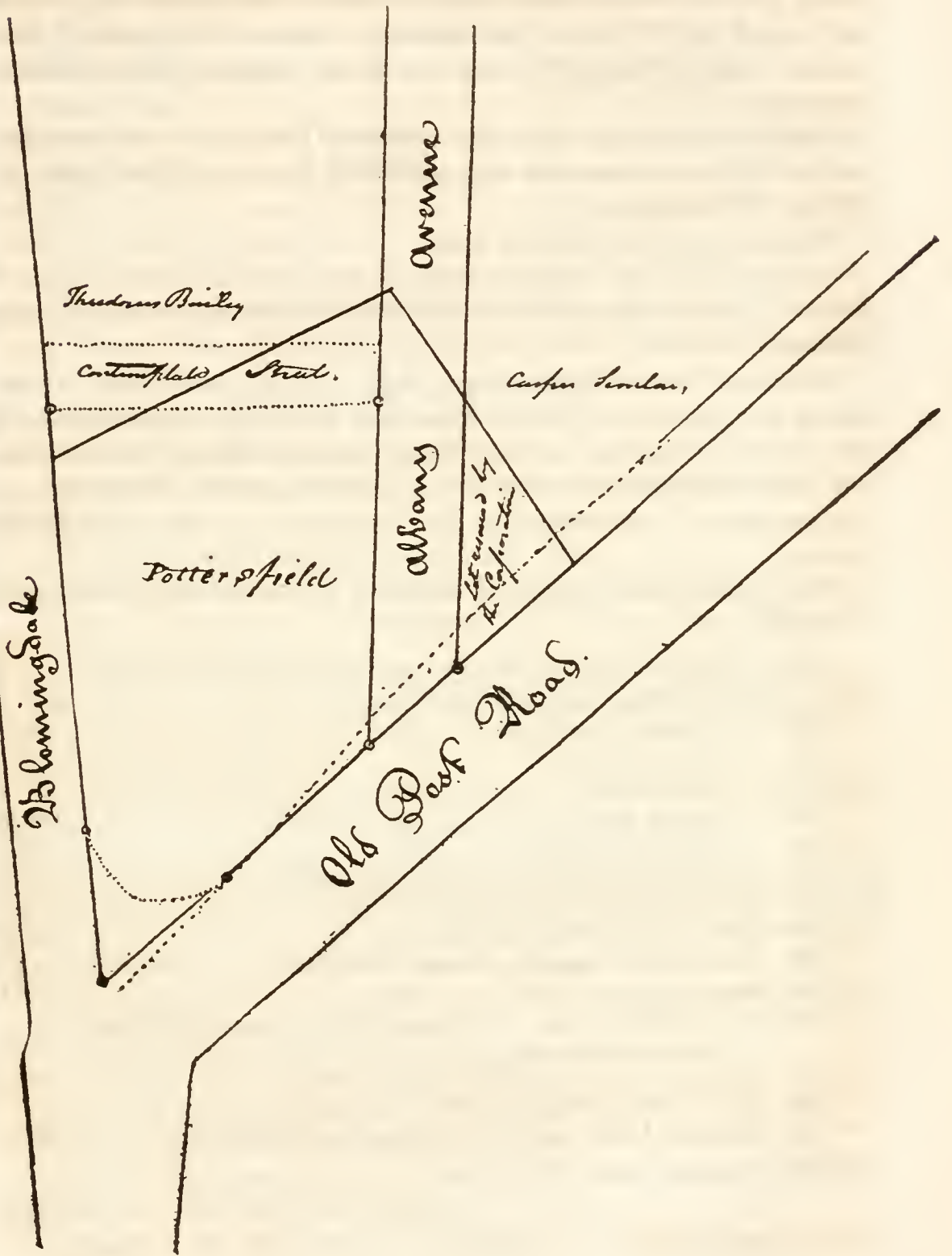

*The Street Commissioner to whom was referred the petition from sundry inhabitants in and adjacent to the lower part of Roosevelt Street, respecting the widening of said Street, has the honor to Report,

That about three years ago the Corporation conceiving it conducive to the interest of the community to widen that Street, caused an award to be presented in Court, by which it was determined that about the sum of Sixteen thousand Dollars should be paid for widening Roosevelt Street from Cherry Street to the river, of the same width it is above Batavia lane, the Board did not, however, pay the money and the transaction fell through.

The present petition is intended to revive the former proceedings, or to request the Corporation to operate anew. In consequence of which the Subscriber has called upon Mr and Mrs Beekman for their price for [282] so much of the ground and buildings thereon, as will be required to make the Street of the aforesaid width: and he has only been able to obtain from them the enclosed statement of their terms which however includes but about one half of the ground that will be required. This statement fixes the sum of Ten thousand One hundred Dollars for that portion necessary to make the Street about the width it is on the opposite side and according to that ratio, the whole ground required would exceed twenty thousand Dollars.

The Street Commissioner is well persuaded that the widening of that Street would be a great convenience, but he is of opinion the Board ought not to accept of the terms proposed and would in preference recommend the usual mode of valuation through the agency of a Jury.

That on the second of July 1804, the Comptroller reported in favour of building a bulkhead at said Slip. That on the 10th July an Ordinance passed for that purpose. That on the 20th August an Assessment therefor was confirmed. That on the 3^d September Israel Wood and others petitioned against the Assessment, and that the Petition was referred, and again referred on the 22^d Oct^r That on the 19th Nov^r the Collector made a return of Delinquents, and that on the 24th Dec^r 1804 the Committee to whom was referred the Petition of sundry inhabitants complaining of inequality in the assessment for making a Bulkhead and filling in Vesey Street Slip, reported in Substance,

The Street Commissioner agrees in opinion with the Subscriber, that all the expanse of water from Brannon Street Wharf, for three or Four Hundred feet south of it, opposite to the mouth of Canal Street and Westerly of Washington Street ought to be reserved for public purposes, and if the Corporation reserve the right of wharfage in front of West Street from the south side of Leroy Street to the North side of Morton Street and from thence extend piers of the usual length as [311] portrayed on the Map aforesaid, the public accommodations will be as ample as will be required in that vicinity, particularly if they reserve the wharfage in front of the intersecting streets.

The Comptroller is therefore of opinion that there would be no impropriety in issuing Water grants to Mr Astor from High water mark to West street, and recommends that they be directed to be prepared for him, and also for Mr Bruce, who has already extended a Wharf, subject however to the reservations aforesaid, and upon the further condition that he unite with the Corporation to make the abovementioned piers, in manner as has been agreed to by Mr Rhineland. The Street Commissioner has the honor to cover the Award of the Arbitrators appointed between the Corporation and the Tenants of Mr Spingler on Broadway; by which it is decided that the Corporation pay to Mr Clark|| [322] Two hundred & seventy six Dollars, to Mr Ross One hundred & Eighty five Dollars, and to Mr Wheaton Ninety Dollars, for their several interests in the ground required for the Street, deducting therefrom the amounts assessed to them respectively, which will leave a ballance to be paid to them of Four hundred & Fifty one Dollars ten cents: A warrant for which sum the Street Commissioner recommends may be directed in favor of the Comptroller or himself to pay them off.

It may here be proper to communicate to the Board a Short Statement of the case in Broadway respecting Mr Spingler.

When application was made to him to cede the Street to the Corporation, in common with his neighbours, he objected to it, on the ground that he was not equally benefitted, having a piece of land, which would be cut by the Street greatly to his disadvantage, by leaving a gore between the Bowery and Broadway. But he afterwards

signed the deed of cession, upon the express condition, which was agreed to, on the part of the Attorney and the Street Commissioner, Agents for the Corporation, that his Estate should not be charged for any part of the assessment for opening Broadway.

It was afterwards found that M^r Spingler had, previous to signing the deed, leased part of his grounds to the persons above named, [323] and the Assessors have thought proper to assess them respectively for their several portions of removing the houses and other buildings of M^r Burling and M^r Dunham, in which assessment M^r Spingler is charged Two hundred and Nine Dollars ten cents, which he conceives the Corporation ought to pay. It is further to be understood, that the condition on the part of the Corporation to release M^r Spingler was made, upon the presumption that he was to release the estate of incumbrance. And if it should be otherwise determined, and the Corporation are considered still bound to release M^r Spingler, they will be obliged to assume Six hundred & Sixty Dollars twenty cents of that Assessment instead of Three hundred and Nine Dollars which has been assessed, making an assumption of Three hundred and Fifty One Dollars twenty cents more than was intended by the Agents of the Corporation.

The Street Commissioner, knowing these circumstances, cannot take upon himself to make these settlements in the way proposed by M^r Spingler, and Solicits further instruction from the Board.

M^{rs} Arden who promised repeatedly to sign the deeds of cession and to whom the Street Commissioner has three or four times been with the deeds for that purpose without finding her home, now objects to making [324] the conveyance, unless the Corporation also releases her from the assessment amounting to Ninety dollars: although there appears to be no good reason for the assumption by the Corporation, particularly as M^{rs} Arden has sold all her interest East of and bound upon Broadway, previous to her engagements with the Corporation.

The Board will determine the course to be pursued in this respect; when there will be no further obstacle to opening that Street, except the opposition of M^r Farquhar, who assents that the agreement to cede the street through the estate he occupies, signed by a majority of the Trustees, is not binding upon them; because it was never entered upon their minutes.

The Street Commissioner being directed by a Resolution of the Board to examine the [325] propriety of appropriating a leased lot in the Commons N^o 113 (after the expiration of the lease) for a public opening or square, has the honor to Report.

That he has sketched the inclosed plan of the premises together with Hamilton Square adjoining thereto on the East, in order to shew its relative situation to that place.

That the Lot contemplated to be reserved for that purpose does not open directly opposite the said square, but runs 105 feet northerly of the North line of the intended houses, and being only 260 feet broad, brings the South line a little to the South of the Centre of the Square and consequently would not materially improve that neighbourhood by being opened as it is.

That M^r Brasher who owns the Lot immediately South of Lot N^o 113. has been consulted, and he agrees that if the Corporation consent to open Hamilton Square to Manhattan Avenue he will immediately convey to them so much of the Lot N^o 110, as may be required for that purpose, on Condition the Corporation convey to him the residue of Lot N^o 113, subject to the conditions of the lease.

The Street Commissioner is of opinion that such proposition will release the Board from all the difficulties suggested in consequence of the position of Lot N^o 113. and if adopted will contribute [326] much to the advantage of the neighbouring property and an additional public improvement. But the Board are to judge of the expediency of the measure. It might be objected that the Commissioners are delegated with authority to lay out Squares &c^a and that it would be infringing upon their privileges to act in this business; but it is well understood on the contrary, that the Commissioners do not pretend to possess the right of altering any Streets accepted or laid out by the Corporation, as provision has been made in the Law to prevent their interfering or altering those streets; so that they neither have the disposition or power to alter or prevent any arrangements the Corporation may make with respect to their Common Lands

The Comptroller presented the following Report,

*The Comptroller to whom was referred the Petition of the Heirs of Anthony Lisenard deceased, praying for a Water grant in front of their premises [337] bounded formerly by the Hudson river, has the honour to Report,

That the original front which Mr Lisenard had upon the river was about Four hundred and forty four feet, and extending easterly a considerable distance towards Broadway, and through which the Corporation have projected Canal Street, One hundred feet in width.

That Canal Street will unite with Washington Street nearly in the centre of the grounds solicited by the petitioners.

That upon consulting the Street Commissioner and agreeably to the report upon the petition of Mr Astor, it is thought expedient, if not absolutely necessary to reserve a considerable space of water at

the mouth of the intended Canal, not only for the free access through it, and to project such works as may be thought necessary there, but also to afford a spacious basin, for the accommodation of the public, which will be the more necessary, if it should be determined to make the Canal navigable.

That, however, it does not appear necessary to reserve the whole of the front of Mr Lisenard for such Basin, and the Comptroller is of opinion that there would be no impropriety in granting to the petitioners all the grounds to the East side of Washington Street, reserving the whole breadth of Canal Street, and such portion of Broome Street [338] as may run through the premises, agreeably to the Map of Canal and other Streets, laid out through Mr Lisenard's Meadows, and said by the Street Commissioner to have been presented by him and adopted by the Board.

The Comptroller further reports that it is believed the petitioners ought to have a further grant to West Street for a breadth of One hundred feet, on the Southern boundary of the premises, with condition to make a street of thirty feet along the Basin, which will leave a space of about three hundred feet for public purposes and which it is thought will be as much as may be necessary to reserve.

The Comptroller therefore recommends in substance that Mr Lisenards heirs receive water grants for all the ground fronting their premises from high water mark, to the East side of Washington Street, on the usual terms, reserving the whole breadth of Canal and Broome Streets as aforesaid, and with condition to make those Streets, as well as half of Washington Street, in front of the aforesaid Basin. That they have a further grant for One hundred feet, taken from their most Southern boundary, from the centre of Washington Street to the permanent line, reserving Washington and West Streets; and with condition to make a street thirty feet in width from the centre of Washington Street to the permanent [339] line on the North thereof and along the said Basin And lastly, that the said Heirs receive the wharfage in front of the aforesaid One hundred feet, and the Corporation to unite with the petitioners to make the bulkhead of the Basin along Washington Street, and thereafter keep it in repair, as they will receive the wharfage in the manner it is arranged at the Corporation Dock.

The following Report was presented.

The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Anthony Jones,† Report

That upon enquiry and examining the premises they have collected the following State of facts.

First. That M^r Jones began to build on his lot in Thompson Street in November last, the lots on each side being built upon he supposed that the line of the Street was parallel with the fronts of said houses and consequently commenced building his house upon the same line with the other houses. A few days after he had begun to lay the foundation of his house, he was informed that the line on which he was building was not correct. He immediately, on receiving this information applied [345] to M^r Loss to survey his Lot and to give him the right line of the Street. M^r Loss after surveying the said Lot, directed M^r Jones to proceed in building his house in the manner he had begun it, that he was right as to the line of the Street.

Secondly. That sometime after M^r Bridges by order of the Street Commissioner surveyed said Thompson Street and reported that the said house was four feet on the Street, he consequently ordered M^r Jones to stop building, which order has been complied with by M^r Jones to this time.

M^r Jones' house is brick with cut stone foundation in front: the first tier of beams was laid and the rear and two side walls raised sufficient to receive the second tier; a Stone area and a brick cistern with a stone well in the yard, all finished when he received orders to stop building.

Exclusive of the loss M^r Jones sustains by the loss of rent which cannot be calculated at less than one year, the walls have received so much injury by being exposed to the weather in an unfinished state as to be insufficient for the building, and must, consequently be taken down.

The Committee are of opinion that some compensation is due to

M^r Jones and that One hundred and fifty Dollars, will be reasonable in the case;* and as a number of buildings are erected on this Street, likewise on Sullivan Street, directly in the rear, which would all be affected by the alteration in the street of the said four feet, and [346] the proprietors of which would all be entitled to receive compensation for cutting off part of their houses: .

The Committee therefore recommend that the said Street remain in the same situation for the present as it was when M^r Loss surveyed it, conceiving no material injury can result therefrom, and that the said four feet of ground, on which the said buildings are erected, be leased, to the proprietors of said buildings respectively, for a term not exceeding twenty one years at an annual rent of One Dollar, on condition that at the expiration of said leases, the said proprietors, their heirs or assigns will remove their buildings from off the said four feet of ground, and will lay the said Street open, agreeably to a clause to be inserted in each of the said leases respectively.

The Committee appointed on the 8th of December 1806. to Superintend the building of the New City Hall,

Report, That they have carefully examined the vouchers and compared them with the charges of their Treasurer, and find that there has been expended since the 26th of November last to the 26th of Nov^r inst. for the purchase of materials and for erecting the building, the sum of \$37,768.81. which sum, together with \$1426.80. that was due the late building Committee amounts to \$39,195 ⁶¹/₁₀₀. that during the

above mentioned period, the Committee have received by warrants drawn on the Treasury by order of the Common Council, \$33.400. together with \$515.50 which has been received from the Sale of Boards [372] and Planks amounting in the whole to \$33.915.50. which leaves a Ballance due the Committee of \$5.280.11.

The Committee have been furnished by Mr Macomb with an account of the quantity of work finished and nearly ready to lay on the walls, also the amount of marble and other materials on hand amounting to \$37.675

The Committee beg leave to remark, that this Building has now been on hand about Four Years and a half, and has cost about \$207.000 including all the materials on hand: the marble is all delivered and paid for, agreeably to contract, except about Three hundred Dollars. The Building is now up to the Window Sills of the Second Story windows; and a considerable quantity of marble already cut and prepared to lay: the work will be mostly plain until it comes to the top of the second Story window, which will enable the workmen to make great progress in carrying it up; and the foundation of the building is now sufficiently settled, so that no danger can be apprehended in carrying it up to its height, and the beams and timber have been exposed to the weather for several years, and a number of Articles now on hand in a state of decay, which must be renewed if the Building is much longer delayed. The slow progress with which the Building has been conducted from the beginning has greatly enhanced the expence. There has been expended for the last two years past about \$35.000 per an. and upwards of \$7000 per an. of this sum has been paid to Overseers [373] and Officers that are employed to superintend it, that is 25 per cent upon the sum actually expended on the building. These Superintendants can, with equal facility, oversee three times the number of workmen, without any additional expence to the publick; it therefore appears prudent and economical to put this Building, at least the two wings, under cover, in the course of the ensuing season.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Memorial of the Inhabitants of the Fifth Ward, Petitioners against the election of John Bingham returned as Alderman and Thomas J. Campbell returned as Assistant for said Ward, as not being

qualified according to Charter, being neither Freeholders in said Ward, nor Freemen of this City, was read, together with the following opinion of the Council of the Board.

“I have inspected the Memorial presented to the Corporation relative to the late election [381] of an Alderman and Assistant in the Fifth Ward; and pursuant to their directions do report as my opinion:”

1st “That if Mess^{rs} Bingham & Campbell were not Freeholders of that Ward, nor Freemen of the City, they were not by Law eligible to those Offices.”

2^d “That the Corporation has the power at once to examine and determine upon the said Memorial; and are bound, if the allegations in it are true, to direct a new election.”

The following Memorial was also read.

To the Honorable the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened.

The Memorial of the subscribers respectfully sheweth.

That they are Inhabitants, Freemen and Electors of the Fifth Ward, entitled to vote at the late Charter election, and who did vote at such election for John Bingham as Alderman and Thomas J. Campbell for Assistant Alderman to represent the said Ward in the Common Council the ensuing year.

That they have been informed a remonstrance has been preferred to the said Common Council against the due election and legal qualifications of the said John Bingham and the said Thomas [382] J. Campbell, to fill the said Offices, as being neither Freemen of the said City, nor Freeholder of the said Ward.

Your Memorialists dissenting from the correctness of the objection, with due submission and respect, represent, their concern on being advised that Your Honorable Body are about to act upon the said remonstrance, as in their opinion, in other hands and under other circumstances it will afford an evil precedent, be injurious to the elective franchise, and a fair enjoyment of the plain provisions of our Charter.

That Your Memorialists conceive the investigation and decision of this question, properly and of right belongs to your Successors, who are chosen and to be sworn in on the first Monday in December instant, inasmuch as it is expressly granted by the said Charter to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty for the “time being” to determine

and decide all Elections of all and every their officers and ministers to be chosen or elected in or for the said Corporation.

That the said Alderman and Assistant are not members of the Corporation for the present year, nor officers nor ministers thereof for the "time being," but are chosen the successors of those now in office; and while your memorialists are not unmindful that the Corporation is a perpetual body, they respectfully consider [383] that a discrimination of the powers of the incumbant and succeeding Aldermen, are in this case emphatically recognized; and the right to examine and decide upon the election and qualification of the officers and ministers, chosen for the Corporation, is in terms given by the charter to that Corporation existing at that particular time, during which the officer or minister is elected to serve. Your Memorialists scarcely need remind your Honors, that a different construction of the Charter would enable any future succession, at any length of time, to examine and decide upon the due election, and legal qualification of former members of the Board, and thereby to invalidate, annul and destroy the important Acts of their predecessors.

That the 23^d Section of the Act of the Legislature of this State, passed 5th April 1804. strengthens the opinion of your Memorialists; That, the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty for the "time being," are only competent to examine into, and decide upon the qualifications of their own members and Officers, and not into those of their successors. It provides that "if any Alderman, chosen as aforesaid, shall refuse to serve, die or remove out of the city, before the expiration of the term for which he was chosen in such office, or shall not be legally qualified &c" Now an Officer cannot properly refuse to serve in an Office, so as to render him liable to fine for such refusal, until after the time is in "being," for which he is chosen to serve. [384] The Aldermen elect are not chosen to serve until next Monday, and if any one should die or remove from the city before that day, there would be no vacancy in the Corporation, and of course none to be supplied by a new Election.

But if in this respect Your Memorialists should have conceived the true construction of the said Charter and Act, then they would further respectfully suggest that the 12th. Section of the said Act, entitles every Freeholder, every Citizen of the State, or of the United States of twenty one Years of Age, having resided in the city for six months previous to a charter election, during that time rented a tenement of Twenty five Dollars yearly value paid taxes, and no way disqualified by law, to all the right and privileges of a Freeman of the said City.

That among these are the right and privilege of being an Artizan and trader in the said city, and of being eligible to the Office of Alderman and Assistant or other officer of the City and Corporation.

That Mess^{rs} Bingham and Campbell being inhabitants of the said City, Citizens of the State, and not disqualified by law, having rented a tenement of twenty five Dollars yearly value and paid taxes, are by the aforesaid section qualified Charter Electors and Freemen of the city, or so far at least as to entitle them to keep [385] shop, and pursue manual occupation therein, without incurring the Five pound penalty to which those who are not Freemen are liable, and also to be most eligible to the Office of an Alderman and Assistant Alderman.

Lastly, Your Memorialists further represent, that they are informed that the Counsel at law of the said Common Council has reported his opinion to the said Corporation, that if the said John Bingham and the said Thomas J. Campbell are neither Freemen of the said City nor Freeholders in the Ward, they are not by law eligible to those offices for which they are chosen. In the correctness of this opinion Your Memorialists fully acquiesce; but respectfully remind your honors, that by the said 12th. Section of the act aforesaid they being Electors qualified by law to vote at the said Charter election, are also by the same law Freemen of the said City, and as well for the tranquillity of the said Corporation and Ward, as because a great majority of the votes thereof were given for those gentlemen, and to avoid the establishment of an injurious precedent, the great trouble, expence and public inconvenience of a second election, Your memorialists respectfully pray that the said remonstrance may be dismissed, or that the said John Bingham and Thomas J. Campbell be declared legally qualified and duly elected to serve in their offices of Alderman and Assistant Alderman.

Resolved that the further consideration of the Memorials of the Inhabitants of the Fifth Ward respecting the Election of John Bingham and Thomas J. Campbell to the offices of Alderman and Assistant of said Ward, be postponed to the next meeting of the new Board, it being doubtful whether the Board have the right to determine the qualifications of their Successors.

The following was proposed by Mr Mulligan as an Amendment.

Whereas a Petition has been presented to this Board against the Election of John Bingham as Alderman and Thomas J. Campbell as Assistant of the Fifth Ward of this City, returned as elected at the last Election for Charter Officers, and a counter petition has this day been presented to this Board. And Whereas by the opinion of the Council of this Board, also this day produced, he appears to be of opinion, that the present sitting Members are the proper Judges of the subject matter of the said Petitions. And it is very important to the rights and immunities of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of this city as also to the rights and priviledges of the Freemen, Freeholders and other Electors thereof, that the same should be decided by the body to which it of right may belong, and that this Board, previous to any decision thereon should be as well informed as [387] possible on the subject. And whereas there has been offered to this Board the Resolution, as before cited.

Resolved that the consideration of the said resolution be postponed to a meeting of this Board to be held on Monday next at 10 o'clock A. M. and that a Committee be appointed to ascertain and enquire what proceedings have taken place in cases of contested Elections for Charter Officers, and that they make a report thereon to this Board at said meeting.

The Mayor presented a letter addressed to him from the Honorable Samuel L. Mitchil Senator in Congress, inclosing "A further Report of the Committee of the Senate relating to the Defence of the Sea ports and harbours of the United States," which was read and referred to the Committee of Defence, the Report directed to be published, and the Mayor requested to return the thanks of this Board to Doctor Mitchill for his communication on this important subject.

The Mayor also presented a letter addressed to him, dated Philad^a the 7th inst. signed a Pilgrim, and inclosing a Pamphlet under the same signature on "an improved mode of Defence against the Bucaneers of the Ocean" &c. was read and referred to the same Committee.

The Mayor presented the following opinion of M^r Harison relating to the Sailor's Snug harbour.

Upon the will of Robert R Randall and the Act of the Legislature incorporating the Trustees of the Marine Hospital, I am of opinion that these [405] Trustees have a right to convey land for Streets to the Corporation of the City. There are no words, either in the will or Act, prohibiting such conveyance. The laying out of Streets is essential to the improvement of the property, and must have been foreseen as a measure necessary and which ought to be adopted, even if it was not required by the public. M^r Randall, by his will, appears only to provide, that the Hospital shall be built upon his land, but in all other respects he leaves his property to the disposition of the Trustees, and in my judgment, there is nothing in that instrument from whence it can be inferred that he meant his whole real estate should be unalienable in any event.

The Street Commissioner having been informed by several of the Assessors named in an Ordinance for regulating Art Street, that they could not agree upon a principle, upon which to lay the assessment, and the contractors pressing for their money, he wrote to them, requesting the said assessment to be made out by this day, as, if they could not agree, that they would report upon the cases that others might be appointed to perform this necessary duty.

[407] The Assessors, agreeably to his request, have now sent in their report which is covered by this communication and upon which the Street Commissioner begs leave to remark in answer to the "Reasons" they have offered for not making out the said assessment.

They first state, that none of the proprietors petitioned for it; but it was well understood by the Board that when Broadway was directed to be regulated, it would be necessary also to regulate Art Street; and if any mistake has occurred in that respect, it was, that Art Street ought to have been first regulated: besides the presentation of a petition from the proprietors, has not under such circumstances been considered by the Common Council as a necessary measure.

The Assessors next state that Bleeker Street was dug out for the same purpose as Art Street to vent the water. This is true, but the cases are not parallel. M^r Bleeker has a very large tract of ground on

the west side of Broadway, through which many streets will necessarily intersect each other, none of which have ever been ceded to the Corporation, and the Board, in order to obtain a ready cession of those Streets without subjecting themselves to the expensive and tedious method pointed out by Law for opening Streets, made a special agreement with M^r Bleecker [408] to regulate so much of Bleecker Street, as far as has been done, on condition that he cedes all the Streets through his ground to the Corporation without further compensation. With respect to Art Street, the proprietors can make no such equivalent, as that Street has been opened and recorded as a public Street or road about forty years ago.

The third reason offered by the Assessors can have no weight, as it is founded in error, they state that the regulation is not deemed permanent, but it is well known to the surveyors and the Subscriber, that the line given to the Contractors is intended as a permanent regulation of that Street. The Street Commissioner begs leave further to remark, that all the gentlemen named in the Ordinance have qualified to make the assessment, and there is a plain existing law, by which they are to be governed. It therefore becomes an important question, how far they are bound by their appointment and their oaths to perform this duty.

If the Board should decide that they have the right to excuse these gentlemen, they will of course name five other persons in their stead. If they should decide otherwise, perhaps it would be well to direct the assessors to make out the assessment agreeably to their consciences, when [409] the Common Council can reject it, and according to usual practice direct a new ordinance to be presented.

The Street Commissioner has the honor to communicate to the Board, that Ordinances passed the Common Council several months since, directing the individual proprietors of sunken lots in Hester and Rynder Streets to fill up the same in such manner as to preserve the Streets from washing away when they had been filled. These ordinances were faithfully served upon all such persons as could be found to be owners and they have pretty generally complied with their condi-

tions: but several vacant Lots on the South side of Hester Street between Broadway and Rynder Street and two or three on Rynder Street between Grand and Hester Streets, remain sunken, and for which no owners can be found.

Rynder Street has lately been directed to be paved: the pavement and even the curbstone have by the late rains been removed and considerably [410] damaged in consequence of these cavities on the sides of the Streets.

The Street Commissioner is persuaded that the evil will be corrected if the lots are filled up, and, as in such cases, the expenditure is a lien upon the property, he proposes the following resolution.

Resolved that the Street Commissioner be and he is hereby directed to take order for filling in such sunken lots on Hester Street between Broadway and Rynder Street and on Rynder Street between Grand and Hester Street, as in his opinion may require to be filled up to preserve the said Streets and to such depth and height as he may think necessary, and that the expences of the same be a lien upon the property agreeably to law.

Stillwell on the subject of a Coalmine on his land in Wood-Stock in the County of Ulster in this State;

[422b] Report, that they have submitted the Specimen of Coal produced by M^r Stillwell to the inspection and examination of Doctor Bruce professor of mineralogy and Doctor Dewitt professor of Chemistry of the College of Physicians in this city. That those gentlemen are decidedly of opinion that the Specimen indicates the existence of a Coal mine, the extent and quality of which can only be ascertained by actual exploration.

From satisfactory enquiry into the character of M^r Stillwell, Your Committee are perfectly assured that the Specimen of Coal offered by him has been, bona fide, taken from a mine as set forth in his petition. The expence of exploring being too great and hazardous for him to attempt alone, he proposes to raise a fund of \$50.000. in Shares of Fifty Dollars each, pledging the land on which the mine is situate for the benefit of the Subscribers together with a right to one half of the coalmine.

How far the Corporation may judge it expedient to contribute towards exploring the mine, either by subscription for a number of shares, or by an advance of a reasonable sum on such security as M^r Stillwell can give, or by offering a premium for the first quantity [423b] of Coal amounting to Chaldrons produced from his mine, is submitted to the wisdom of the Board.

The Committee cannot conclude this reference without observing that it is certainly an object of the highest consequence and a duty imposed on this Board to encourage every plausible plan that may tend to produce a supply of an Article so essentially necessary for the comfort and existence of the citizens of this rapidly encreasing metropolis, as mineral Coal; especially when the resource can be found within the bosom of our own State, whereby our citizens will be relieved from the uncertain dependence on foreign supplies.

The Augmentation of our population exceeds, annually, the growth of Forests for Fuel, and unless additional resources be explored, this essential article of existence must bear extremely oppressive, as indeed it does at present, on the poorer classes of Society.

*The Street Commissioner presented the following Report

The Street Commissioner has the honor to state to the Board, that by virtue of the powers vested in the Corporation by an Act of the Legislature entitled "and Act for regula [442] ting the Buildings, Streets, Wharves and Slips in the City of New York," passed the 3^d April 1801. They have directed him to take order for filling in the sunken lots on Hester and Rynder Streets, which had not been filled and regulated agreeably to certain ordinances passed for that purpose.

It was at first considered that it would only be necessary to fill in the lots by contract and charge it as a lien upon the property, agreeably to the last section of the said act: But if this is done, it may be a long time before the Corporation will be remunerated, as they cannot, it is believed, sell the Lots under that clause.

But by the 12th Section of the said Act, another process is pointed out, authorizing the Common Council to advertise and sell the Lots to defray the expenses. It is, in this case necessary to cause estimates to be made by five Assessors in the usual way, and to advertise the same three weeks previous to the sale.

The Street Commissioner is of opinion that it would be most prudent to adopt the latter mode, particularly as the owners of several of those Lots are unknown. He there- [443] fore presents the draft of an Ordinance for the purpose of making the said estimate, which in his opinion ought to be passed.

Report

That the house complained of by the Petitioners had been for many years the joint property of John Leake late of this City and William Peartree Smith of Elizabeth town in New Jersey. That John Leake devised his interest in the premises to Robert B. Norton, and William Peartree Smith devised his interest in the premises to his daughter M^{rs} Boudinot, which interest M^r Elisha Boudinot still holds. That Robert B. Norton made a will by which he devised his interest in this estate among other things to his two children, infants, and appointed his brother John L. Norton, and his brother in law George Clinton, his Executors; without giving them any power to sell any part of the estate so devised to his children, until they should arrive of age.

[13] The Street Commissioner further reports, that twelve months ago or more, from an application made to him by M^r Storm one of the Petitioners, he communicated to M^r Norton, the acting Executor of Robert B. Norton, the anxiety of the neighbourhood to remove that house, and that M^r Norton made him the answer stated by the petitioners, that he had no power to treat respecting it, but could have no objection to its being removed by the mode pointed out by law.

This building is very old, built of Wood and very slight. The expence of the removal will not be of any serious consequence; and it is really a very considerable incumbrance to the Street and ought to be taken away. And as the Executors of M^r Norton, who are in the actual possession of the premises cannot treat, the only measure necessary and proper for the Corporation to adopt for its removal is to direct the Attorney to prepare the usual precepts, which the Street Commissioner recommends by proposing the following resolution.

That he wished to consult with the Board on the measures that might be proper to be adopted to prevent any unpleasant consequences.

Whereupon, the Mayor was requested to publish the following Notice in all the Daily papers and to circulate the same in Hand Bills, viz^t

Notice.

The Mayor decidedly disapproves the mode of application recommended in a Morning paper, to be pursued by the Sailors of this port for relief.

He informs the public that the Corporation will, on the present emergency, as they have done on former occasions, provide for the wants of every person, without distinction, who may be considered proper objects of relief.

The Mayor cannot conclude this Notice, without exhorting all classes of Citizens to refrain from assembling in the mode as proposed, and especially dissuades the Sailors from meeting in the Park.

by his Honour that the Corporation would take their case into consideration.

To the Honorable the Mayor of the City of New York.

Honorable Sir.

Our situation is not only distressing, but truly alarming. The Embargo lately levied upon our shipping, has not only destroyed all employment by Sea, but rendered it impossible to gain a subsistence by our labor on shore. Our humble petition, to you Sir, is to know how we are to act in this case, and to beg of you to provide some means for our subsistence during the winter, should not the embargo be immediately taken off. What has America to boast of but her Agriculture and Commerce? The destruction of one, will be the ruin of the other.

The greatest part of the wages due us from our last voyages is already expended, and more, we are already indebted for our boarding. By what means shall we discharge these debts? Should we plunder, theive or rob, the State prison will be our certain doom.

In a handbill, this morning, You tried to dissuade us from our purpose, mentioning that provision was made for objects of pity. We are not objects of pity yet, but shall soon be, if there [22] is not some method taken for our support. We are the most part hale, robust, hearty men, and would choose some kind of employment rather than the poor house for a livelyhood. We humbly beg therefore, you will provide some means for our subsistence, or the consequences may not only prove fatal to ourselves, but ruinous to the flourishing Commerce of America, as we shall be necessitated to go on board foreign vessels.

The Committee of ways and means

[24] Report

That in order to provide for the subsistence of the Seamen of this port, thrown out of employment in consequence of the existing embargo, they have conferred with Captain Chauncey of the U^d States Navy who has consented to receive the Sailors in the Navy Yard, on condition of signing the Articles of the U^d States Navy, to continue in service, during their own pleasure, and perform duty agreeably to his orders, the Corporation agreeing to pay the amount of their maintenance, at the rate of twenty cents per ration for twenty four hours, which includes victuals, drink, fuel, candles and accommodation for lodging. Soap for washing to be an extra charge.

The Committee recommend this arrangement to the Common Council, as thereby every Sailor in distress will be comfortably supported, and being removed from town, and subject to the orders and discipline of the Navy, no ill consequences can result to the peace of the city, from their tumultuous associations. This meritorious class of citizens, it is confidently presumed, will be perfectly satisfied with this plan for their immediate support. Whenever they can do better they

will be at perfect liberty to leave the navy yard and work for themselves.

[25] Should the Common Council approve the measure, the Committee will arrange the details with Capt. Chauncey for the admission of the Seamen and charge of the rations.

To provide for that class of citizens, who are capable of labouring and who are destitute of occupation, the Committee have directed the Street Commissioner to examine how many Carmen and hands to load carts can be advantageously employed to fill the collect, and the means of providing earth for the purpose: and to report Ordinances to compel proprietors of low grounds in the vicinity to co-operate with the Corporation.

The Committee likewise contemplate the expediency of reducing Inclenberg hill on the Boston road, provided the frost shall not oppose insuperable obstacles.

They will likewise direct the Street Commissioner to examine the situation of Streets and lots that may require to be regulated and raised in the vicinity of Corlaers Hook, and, if practicable and not too oppressive to the proprietors, to report ordinances for regulating and filling the same.

These various objects may employ a considerable number of industrious persons at moderate wages, which may enable them to support their families without becoming a public burthen.

[26] For the maintenance of that class of citizens for whom labour cannot be provided and who are incapable of labouring, the Committee propose to issue rations of Soup and meat, four times a week, in proportion to the numbers of their respective families, agreeably to the accompanying plan.

To conduct this measure, with the greatest possibly economy, the Committee are providing a Soup House in the Alms House, which will be completed by Thursday next; in the mean time partial supplies are provided, adequate, it is presumed, to the present demand.

The Committee suggest the propriety of keeping a distinct account, from the ordinary expences of the Almshouse, of the expences which may be incurred for this extraordinary exigency. For this purpose they have appointed Alderman Bingham their Treasurer, and recommend that a Warrant be issued in his favour for One thousand Dollars, to be accounted for by the Committee.

*The undersigned, to whom was referred the report of the Assessors named in an Ordinance for regulating Art Street, with the accompanying documents, has the honor to state

That in his opinion the Report is not in any point of view consistent with the appointment of the gentlemen who made it. They have it is presumed been sworn to discharge the duties of their situation, in pursuance of the Statute, by the authority of which they have been chosen. This Oath must have been "to make an estimate of the expence of conforming to the Ordinance for regulating Art Street, and a just and equitable assessment thereof among the owners or occupants of all the houses and lots intended to be benefitted thereby, in proportion as nearly as may be to the advantage which each may be deemed to have acquired, fairly and impartially according to the best of their skill and Judgment." Instead of which, they undertake, in their report, to judge of the propriety of the ordinance itself, and apparently forget the duty which they have undertaken to perform.

The right or the propriety, on the part of the assessors, of determining on any of the grounds [34] stated in their report, cannot be gathered from the expressions or the nature of the oath prescribed in the Act. The power to do this, it appears to the undersigned, is clearly and exclusively vested in the Common Council. Of course it must be presumed that as well the circumstances mentioned by the Assessors, as every other, relative to or connected with the measure itself, has been already considered and decided upon by the proper forum, and it remains for the Assessors to perform their duties, without reference to any considerations whatever which does not necessarily arise out of the nature of their appointment. Whether the proprietors have petitioned for the regulation, whether Bleeker Street was dug out for the same purpose, for which Art Street is intended, at the public expence, and whether this is to be a permanent measure or not, are points, certainly not comprehended in the Oath before recited, and with which therefore these Gentlemen have certainly, in strictness, nothing to do. It appears to the undersigned that the only question which this case presents, is, whether the Corporation will decide for themselves, or select others to decide for them, on subjects exclusively within their jurisdiction. The undersigned therefore submits to the consideration of the Common Council the following resolution.

[47] The Soup house has been compleated and the Boilers will, in all probability, be adequate to the supply of rations, without interfering with the Alms House establishment unless the demand should increase beyond the calculations of the Committee.

The Committee flatter themselves that the arrangements they have made will be equal to the exigency of the times: and the Common Council may rest assured that every possible economy will be rigidly observed in the distribution of the public charity.

Should the Seamen, to any considerable number, avail themselves of the offer to be maintained at the Navy Yard, it may not be improper to request his Honour the Mayor to inform the Secretary of the Navy of the measures which have been adopted for the relief of the Sailors, and to suggest, that as the United States will derive the whole benefit of their labour, that it can be no more than reasonable to expect that the expense of their support will be defrayed by government: especially, as the Corporation will incur a very serious expense by providing for the wants of their own citizens.

From the inclemency of the season it has hitherto been impossible to provide any profitable labour, for the numerous applicants to be employed. Should the weather mitigate, it is proposed [48] to remove the earth in the vicinity, that may belong to the Corporation, into the Collect; which, together with taking out the mud from the Collect; will occupy a certain proportion of labourers, but to no great extent.

That no reasonable cause for complaint may, however, exist, the Committee give notice to every applicant to apply, in case they should want, to the Alms House for rations for themselves and families. And M^r M^cPherson is constantly employed in visiting those families

who are reported to be in distress and administering such supplies as their respective cases may require.

*The Committee of the Corporation appointed to confer with a Committee of the Manhattan Company on the subject of purchasing the Waterworks of the said Company

Report that in pursuance of their appointment they have conferred with a Committee of the Company, and find a proper disposition [49] on their part to promote the views of the Corporation, but that no alienation of the said water works can take place without the sanction of the Legislature.

It has been generally understood and believed, that the right of supplying this city with pure and wholesome water, ought to be vested in the Corporation, as the constituted guardians of its prosperity. Previous to the institution of the Manhattan Company, this measure was recommended to the Corporation by a respectable and enlightened Committee, and although it unfortunately failed, yet it has commanded the attention of subsequent Boards, and there has been no diversity of opinion on the general expediency of being invested with the exclusive power; altho' there may have been at different periods variances in sentiment with regard to the mode and extent of executing it, and altho' obstacles from various sources have hitherto interfered to prevent the accomplishment of this desirable object, when your Committee consider the importance of this power, in supplying the citizens with good water for domestic purposes, in guarding against the ravages of fire and disease, in purifying the Streets, and in accommodating the public buildings, they can not but earnestly recommend to the Corporation, the most prompt and efficient measures for obtaining it.

The Street Commissioner has the honor to cover the Award of the Arbitrators appointed by the Corporation and Mess^{rs} Lawrence and King to divide in an equitable manner the property at the corner of Elm and Leonard Streets and to make such exchange as might be just and right; by which it appears that the Corporation are to pay Mess^{rs} Lawrence and King \$1340 for the difference between their former ground and that now assigned to them by the award.

The Street Commissioner conceives it to be his indispensable duty to guard the interests of the Corporation in all matters submitted to his discretion, and to present to them such remarks thereon as may suggest themselves as necessary for their information when deliberating upon the subjects. Impressed with this duty the Street Commissioner cannot refrain from communicating to the Board his disappro- [60] bation of the decision of the Arbitrators above mentioned: and he begs leave to offer the following statement of the circumstances in support of that opinion.

The Corporation, in order to increase the value of their property on Elm Street, originally laid out but Forty feet wide, agreed to cut off ten feet from their grounds on each side and make the Street Sixty feet in width. They also gave up Ten feet in width along the south side of their grounds at the corner of Elm street to make Leonard Street of the width of Fifty feet:

although Mess^{rs} Lawrence and King, at the same time, were paid exclusive of the assessment, One thousand Dollars for a slip of Ten feet required of them for the same purpose, and adjoining the ground of the Corporation, and above Three hundred and forty Dollars of that sum was paid by the Corporation, and the residue by M^r Clarke who owned the opposite ground.

The Corporation, further to improve their property there, regulated the whole of Elm Street at their expence: having previously regulated the whole of Leonard Street, Three hundred and fifty feet along the property of Mess^{rs} Lawrence and King, through massy hills, without any expence to them.

Notwithstanding these sacrifices on the part [61] of the Corporation, to enhance the value of their property, the Arbitrators have apportioned the lots they were to exchange, according to their several Areas, by a nominal value, without regard to their situation with respect to the Streets: and have actually valued front and corner lots belonging to the Corporation at no greater sum than other grounds belonging to Mess^{rs} Lawrence and King in the rear of those lots and to which there is no communication from the Streets.

The Street Commissioner is persuaded the Common Council, upon a slight inspection of the Map of the property, herewith presented, will see the impropriety of agreeing to the arrangement proposed by the Arbitrators; but he will do these Gentlemen the justice to state, that he has reason to believe they have been led to make this decision from misunderstanding the subject and the principles upon which they were to act. For it is evident that a front upon a Street is worth considerably more than the same area of ground in the rear of it. And such has been the invariable practice and opinion of other Arbitrations. The Street Commissioner will only recite one recent instance, where the Corporation, in exchanging ground with General Bailey at Pottersfield, have been obliged to give at the rate of two square feet on Albany Avenue, an intended Street of Sixty feet, for one foot on the Bowery road, and the [62] only reason assigned was, that the one was accessible and the other not.

That the only present place of resort for these boats, is the Whitehall basin, which on account of the crowd of Vessels there, has become a very inconvenient and, sometimes, almost a useless place for the unlading and landing passengers, horses, cattle &c^a from the said boats.

That the situation at the end of Marketfield Street as contemplated by the memorialist, is very bleak, the water shallow and the bottom rocky, so as to render it altogether useless, as an harbor, without very considerable expense, and it does not appear in its present situation to be of any material benefit to the Commerce or business of this city.

That it is for the consideration of the Memorialist, whether he will, under these disadvantages, [77] be disposed to incur the risque of making the same, at his own expense, a safe and secure harbour.

That if such should be the case, a greater facility will be given to the intercourse between this and a growing country, fast improving to a great extent, by turnpike roads leading to Elizabeth Town point, the present revenue of this Corporation will be advanced, and there will be a prospect of improvement to a greater degree in future, by the rents resulting from the establishment, and encouragement will be given to enterprize in new improvements.

The second plot (N^o 2) comprehends from the western boundary of the preceding plot a parallelogram sixty feet wide, running westerly to the boundary line of M^r Duggans property, being a part of Canal Street in its original breadth, as formerly laid out: The third Plott (N^o 3.) comprehends a square peice of ground included in the contemplated widening of Canal Street, and the breadth of a strip of ground that has been called Mercer or Clermont Street.

As to M^r Duggans claim for damages which he alleges to have sustained by the direction of Canal Street having been repeatedly changed, the Committee are of opinion, that he ought not to have [94] regulated his conduct by what appeared to be only the intentions of the Corporation, But should have previously ascertained what had been really adopted, and that if he has sustained damage, either by leasing or selling lots on Streets which he presumed were contemplated, the loss is chargeable to his negligence only, without the least colour of claim on the Corporation.

The Committee further report that for the purpose of opening Canal Street, the grounds of certain other proprietors, viz^t John Jay, Peter Jay Munro, the Corporation of Trinity Church, Walter Bowne, John M^cCamman, Lewis Lorton, the heirs of Anthony Lispenard deceased, and several others will be required, and they are of opinion, that regular measures ought, without delay, to be taken for that purpose. They therefore submit to the Board the following resolution.

Streets generally to the West of Broadway and above Canal Street, have been, sometime, in possession of the Street Commissioner, who has deferred to report upon them until some arrangement might be made with M^r Bleecker and other large Proprietors of the grounds in that vicinity.

M^r Bleecker having consented to cede the Streets through his ground and the inhabitants being extremely anxious to regulate their lots, induces the Street Commissioner to report, that no part of that large district has been regulated, except Spring Street, and that it would be improper, in his opinion, to make partial regulations, so near Canal Street, as some of the ground lies. That a general survey of the unregulated Streets north of Canal Street, as far as Art Street, is very desirable, as it will enable the several proprietors to regulate their lots, and appropriate any extra earth they may have to the best advantage. Besides these considerations, the Corporation of Trinity Church and the Heirs of M^r Lispenard are making rapid improvements upon their ground, and have applied to the Subscriber, for the heights of the intended Street, and to furnish them with data upon which they may found contracts for regulating their lots, but he has been unable to give them the necessary information.

It is always desirable to make surveys [105] and regulations previous to erecting buildings, and the enormous damages that have been done to property, in this city, by digging and filling up have arisen from the opposite practice of building first. The district spoken of is very large and contains but a few buildings, and perhaps, more than any part of the city deserves the attention of the Board in this respect. It can be surveyed to advantage now, as the Surveyors are very little employed by individuals and promise to attend punctually to any surveys required by the Corporation.

The Street Commissioner therefore recommends the propriety of employing the Surveyors to ascertain the height through these streets and proposes the following resolution to that effect.

*Resolved that the Street Commissioner take order forthwith, to ascertain by actual survey the heights of the surface of the several Streets between Canal and Art Streets and from Broadway to Varick Streets in order to fix a permanent regulation of the same; and that when the regulated lines are adopted, by the Common Council, at least one substantial mark stone or Monument shall be placed at each intersection and at the angular points where he may think necessary,

New York Feb^y 6th 1808

Sir

An Assessment has sometime since been made under the authority of the Corporation to defray the expense of filling up the Slip at the Foot of Vesey Street. A number of the persons assessed, supposing themselves not liable to contribute to this expence applied to me as counsel on that occasion. On examining the case, and considering the object of the work and the purposes accomplished by it on the part of the Corporation I did not think the [112] persons assessed were liable, and it appeared to me also a case of considerable hardship. I then proposed to the Attorney of the Corporation to join an issue with him in any manner that should be thought best, to try the right in the easiest and most expeditious mode, to which I was informed he then agreed. Expecting to hear from him on the subject, nothing farther was done and the business slept.

The persons affected by the Assessment have again called upon me and inform me that a warrant has lately issued to levy the amount of the Assessment and their property has been taken and they are notified that it will be sold on tuesday next, if the assessment be not paid. To prevent so harsh a proceeding where the parties really suppose themselves aggrieved and have shewn every disposition to try the right, I take the liberty to state the business to you and thro' you to submit to the Corporation a renewal of the proposition to try the question in the shortest and least expensive mode of joining an issue for that purpose by the determination of which all the parties will agree to abide. If some arrangement of this kind be not made, the difference must lead to as many useless and expensive law suits

as there are individuals concerned. I cannot think but that the Board will agree to this proposition and instruct their [113] Attorney accordingly, and in that case it will be necessary to suspend the proceedings of the Officer acting under the warrant that has issued.

I am sensible that every question of this sort which can in any way affect the Police of the city is of a delicate nature and that the example, whether successful or not, may be injurious. I have therefore really wished to avoid this controversy, but I do not know that it can now be avoided. If however any method can be adopted to accommodate the business, I shall cheerfully do what I can to accomplish it.

I will thank you for an answer on Monday to the proposition of trying the right in the manner above mentioned.

As this labour is not very profitable, and as means of employment will be afforded at Governor's island the Committee have concluded that it will be best to discharge these Labourers, and have given the Street Commissioner orders accordingly.

To the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New York, in Senate and Assembly convened:

The Memorial of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

Respectfully sheweth

That the Building in the city of New York belonging to the people of this State and at present occupied as an Arsenal, is, in their opinion, far from being suitable for that purpose, as it is not sufficiently extensive to contain the military stores and implements which belong to them.

That the Trustees of the Free School, for the education of such poor children as do not belong to or are not provided for by any religious Society, are in want of a Building, which should be large enough to accommodate the great and constantly increasing numbers of those for whom the benefit of their institution was intended, and that the present Arsenal would answer extremely well for that purpose.

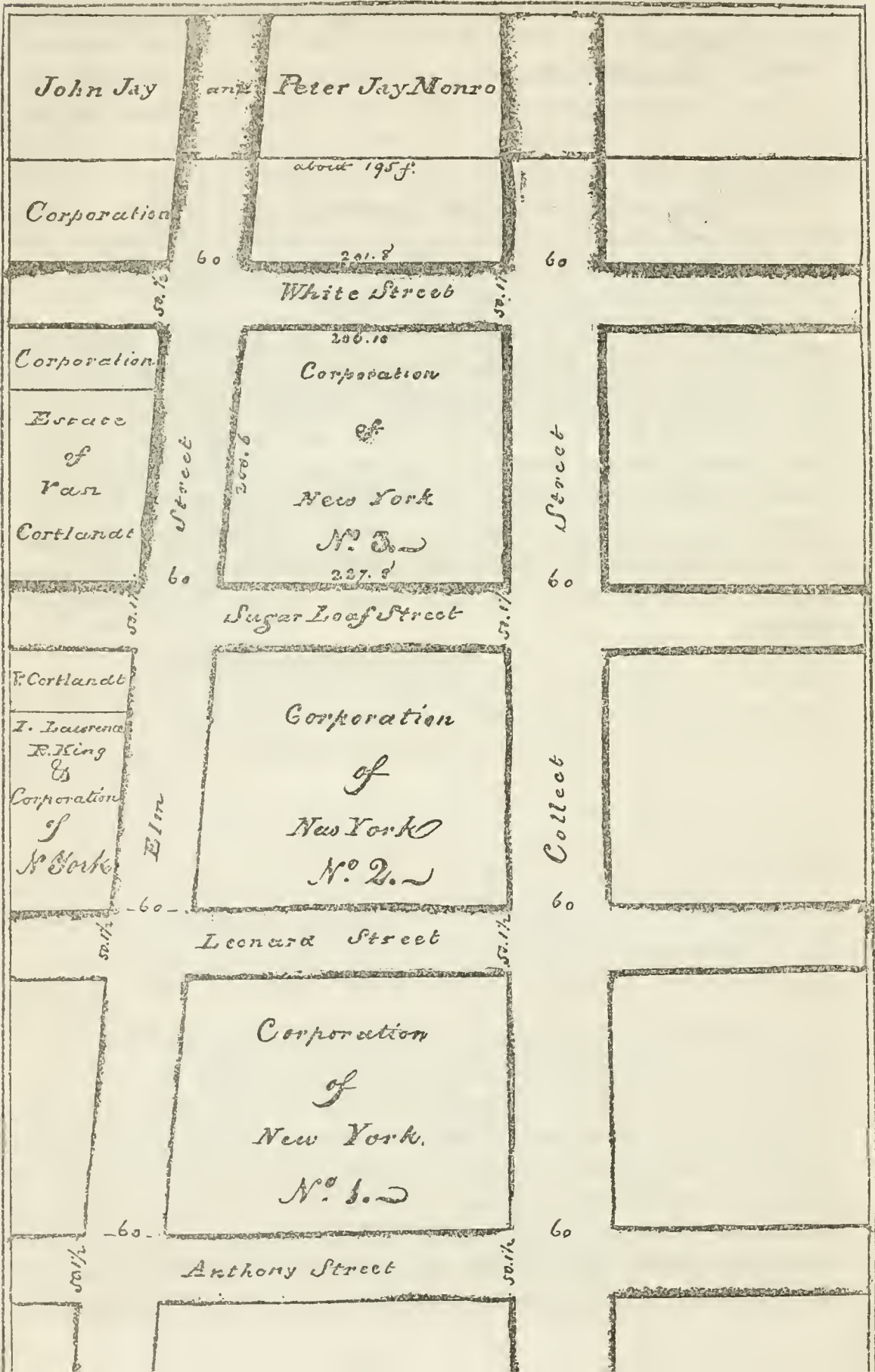
Your Memorialists further show, that they are possessed of several pieces or blocks of vacant ground between Elm and Collect Streets as designated [118] by the Numbers 1. 2 & 3. on the annexed Map, either of which would be amply sufficient for a spacious Arsenal, and they are of opinion that certain arrangements might be made with respect to the premises which would not only be highly beneficial to the State and to the Corporation of this city; but would also materially extend the usefulness of the Free school, an institution which eminently promotes the general good, in the means of

diffusing the blessings of useful Knowledge amongst those who stand most in need of it.

Your Memorialists therefore recommend to the Honorable the Legislature, the propriety of ceding to their Corporation the Building now employed by the State as an Arsenal, upon Condition that the said Building shall be occupied by the Trustees of the aforesaid School, so long as they shall use the same for the purposes of their institution, and shall also educate gratis the children belonging to the Alms House, but that in case of failure in either of these respects the said building shall revert to the Corporation.

Your Memorialists in consideration of the aforesaid cession on the part of the State, do pledge themselves to cede to the State the peice or parcel of ground designated on the said Map by N^o 3. and situate between Elm and Collect Streets and from Sugar Loaf to White Streets, being a block about [119] two hundred and ten feet square, or either of the others if they should be preferred, to be appropriated by the State for the purpose of building and continuing an Arsenal thereon; but which said ground shall revert to the Corporation, whenever the State shall cease to use it for military purposes.

[120] The Comptroller presented the following Report.

The Common Council having, at their last meeting, directed the Comptroller to report an estimate of the sum necessary to be raised by Tax for the expences of the city and county for the present year; he has the honor to present herewith an account of the expenditures of the last year, which, in his opinion, should form the basis of the application to the Legislature for the sum to be raised for the expences of the present year. From that statement it will appear that there was expended for county purposes

which was supplied by a Ballance in the Treasury arising from monies borrowed from the Manhattan Company in a former year, and a further Loan in that year.

Though it is generally calculated that the City revenue will aid the Tax, yet the amount of city disbursements for the last year exceeded [121] considerably its annual revenue, and if the Building of the new City Hall is to be continued, it ought not to be counted upon in a provision for county purposes for the present year. It ought further to be observed that there will probably be a considerable deficiency in the Collection of the Tax for 1807. arising from mistakes in the Assessors and a reduction from the proceeds of the Excise of \$4000. the sum granted by the Legislature to the Free School.

From the foregoing Observations the Board will perceive, that if the amount of the Tax is alone to be relied upon for the expences of the current year, a larger sum will be necessary than that required for the last year; but as the sum to be asked for will depend upon the determination of the Common Council as to the application of the Corporation revenue, the Comptroller presumes that it would be proper in him to submit to them the Amount which they should, under all circumstances deem it expedient and prudent to require.

The Memorial of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York,

Respectfully sheweth

That Your Memorialists for the purpose of ascertaining the sum necessary to be raised for the City and County of New York, for the current year, directed the Comptroller of the Corporation to lay before them an estimate of the [123] sums requisite for those purposes, founded upon the actual expenses of the last year. This estimate, detailing the particular objects of expense, and the Sums requisite for the same, we have the honour to transmit with this Memorial. From that estimate it appears, that for the purpose of defraying the various charges of the city and county for the present year, there will be wanting the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars.

Your Memorialists would therefore respectfully solicit, that an Act may be passed, authorising the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to raise by Tax upon the estates, real and personal, of the Freeholders and Inhabitants of the said City the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars for the maintenance of the Poor and

for defraying the other contingent charges of the said City and County.

The Street Commissioner to whom was referred the petition of Thomas Gardner and others praying that measures may be taken by the Common Council to cause Corlaers Hook Street to be made to the centre of Water Street, has the honor to

Report

That he has viewed the premises alluded to in the aforesaid Petition, and finds that the proprietors of ground between Grand and Cherry Street have not, as directed by the Board [125] completed the said Corlaer's Street, but that they have done some part of the filling and are now employing carts for that purpose. That they have sunk a very extensive line of Blocks nearly five hundred feet from high water mark which will require a long time to be filled and that considering their great expense in sinking these blocks the Board ought to indulge them in an extent of time for their filling, if they should apply for such extension.

That from the conversations the Street Commissioner has had with the agents of Mr Gardner, the principal object of their petition was to obtain the order of the Board to themselves, for filling in and making Corlaers Street to the centre of Water Street, which by the

stipulations in their grants they cannot do without such particular order.

The Street Commissioner is of opinion that no good reasons can at this time be presented against the wishes of the petitioners, as the claim of M^r Cunningham has been deemed to extend only to the waters edge.

The low price of labour is another reason offered for permitting the petitioners to take the earth from their hills to the low ground and that they will thereby employ many poor people.

The Street Commissioner therefore presents the draft of an Ordinance embracing, [126] as he believes, the wishes of the Petitioner, which in his opinion ought to be passed.

Livingston to state to the Board the situation of the cellars in Anthony and Thomas Streets which are filled with water, in much greater quantities than can be discharged through the small drain which has been placed in the Streets to relieve them, and that two or three feet of water is now [in] many of the cellars in the neighbourhood.

The Street Commissioner begs leave to turn the attention of the Board to his Reports N^{os} 452 and 465 in possession of the Clerk, and hopes some order will be taken to afford the necessary relief to the Complainants.

[127] The Street Commissioner presented the following Report

The Street Commissioner having been directed by the Common Council to report upon the present state of Stanton Street and the reasons why the contract for regulating it has not been completed, has the honour, in part, to Report

That the badness of the weather and the indisposition of M^r Still-

well, who was directed to make the necessary surveys, have been the primary reasons for presenting, at this late day, an imperfect report upon the subject.

That from the surveys that have been made it appears, that 27000 feet of earth are wanted at the lower end; that within the next 200 feet 30.000 feet are deficient; that within a space of 450 feet between Pitt Street and the Bowery 22.500 feet are wanted and that in addition to the above, 5000 feet will be required between Norfolk and Essex Streets, making a total deficiency of 84.500 Cubic feet, which, at 10 feet to the load, at 4 cents each will make \$338. But it is probable that the work could not be completed by others than the Contractors for less than \$450 or \$500.

The Street Commissioner further reports, that Mess^{rs} Hulsart and Stagg have stated to him, that when they took Stanton Street, they also took Arundle Street, both of them at rates lower than they could be done separately as they calculated to deposit [128] the extra earth of Arundle street into Stanton Street, where it was wanted. That M^r Stuyvesant forbid them taking any of the extra earth in Arundel Street, which they had so calculated to use, and that they were therefore obliged to stop their work in both streets until this difficulty was adjusted. They further state that the ground proposed to be given to them from vacant lots on Stanton Street, has not a bank sufficient for them to work in at this season, and that they would be liable to a suit of the proprietor when he should appear. And lastly, that if the Corporation will permit them to regulate Attorney Street, to North Street, where there is a surplusage of earth, they will regulate the Street conformably to a profile for the consideration of the earth and immediately proceed to finishing Stanton Street with the same.

The Street Commissioner being well acquainted with the circumstances of the case in Arundel Street, and having failed in his exertions to prevail upon M^r Stuyvesant to permit the earth to be removed, is impressed with an opinion, that Mess^{rs} Hulsart & Stagg have not been so reprehensible as they would otherwise have been, if no such obstacle had occurred: And that if it is consistent with the authority of the Common Council, he will recommend that they be permitted to regulate Attorney Street as aforesaid for the purposes they have mentioned, or to take as much earth therefrom as will be sufficient to finish [129] Stanton Street.

All which is respectfully submitted.

*Ordered that the same be referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 7th. Ward, with power to reject or confirm as they on examination, may judge proper.

†The Street Commissioner reported that he had not been able, within the time limited by the Board, to see all the proprietors of Lots in Canal Street; that some of those with whom he has conversed on the subject have required a few days to give their answers, but that he expects to report fully on the subject at the next meeting.

The Street Commissioner presented a return of Delinquents on the Assessment for regulating Broadway from Great Jones to Art Street,

Ordered that a warrant be issued in favour of Lewis Angevine to enforce payment.

The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for regulating First Street, from Grand to Delancey Street, which was confirmed and William Peters was appointed Collector.

The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for regulating First Street from Delancey to Stanton Street, which was confirmed, and William Dustan was appointed Collector.

[130] The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for regulating ‡Second Street from Broome to Stanton Street, which was confirmed and ||Lewis Angevine was appointed Collector.

Agreeably to the order of the Board the City Inspector reported Ordinances for raising sunken lots in Spring, Thompson and Varick Streets, and for correcting other Nuisances, from N^o 4003 to N^o 4027. inclusive.

Ordered that the same do pass.

A Report from the Fire Department that the §Petition of Fire Engine Company N^o 28, for two additional Members, ought to be granted

And that the ¶Petition of Fire Engine Company N^o 20, for Five additional members ought not to be granted; was confirmed.

**M^r James Townsend appointed a Referree at the last meeting, to value the proposed exchange of ground in Chatham Street, with the Executors of Michael Nestle dec^d declined the appointment.
