The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved

Sundry memorials were received remonstrating against the assessment for opening Walker Street, which together with the assessment for opening said street, which was presented by the Street Commissioner, were referred to the Committee on Streets.

A petition was received from George Clinton and John M'Kesson, stating, that [134] they are proprietors of certain lots in the Fifth ward, bounded Southerly by Murray Street, Northerly by Warren Street and Westerly by the West line of a water grant heretofore made to the Corporation of Trinity Church and praying for a grant of the water lot between their line and West Street, which was referred to the Comptroller

A petition was also received from Coert Went, praying an abatement of the rent of the Lot N^o 112 fronting Chatham Street, which he held under lease from this corporation, which was also referred to the Comptroller

A memorial was received from Fire Company N^o 30, requesting, that a larger engine might be given to them, which was referred to the Committee on the Fire department.

Petitions were received from John Hogg and John Patterson, praying remission of a penalty, which they had incurred by selling liquor without licence and referred to the Attorney of the Board

Petitions were received from Benjamin Rowe to be appointed an officer and from John Thomas to be appointed an Inspector [135] of

wood, which were severally referred to the Committee on applications

An application was received from Robert Watts for the purchase of a small lot of ground, adjoining to a lot, which he owned fronting on State Street, which was referred to the Committee on Streets

A memorial of Peter P. Van Zandt, which on the 2^d of October last, had been referred to a committee; but which had not been reported on, was now referred to Alderman Fish Roosevelt & Carpenter

An application was received from Sir James Jay for the purchase of a Lot owned by the Corporation in Magazine Street, which was referred to the Comptroller

A request was received from the Commissioners for laying out Canal Street, that they might be permitted the use of the maps, profiles &c. in the Street Commissioner's office. Whereupon ordered, that the Street Commissioner be authorized to furnish the said Commissioners with such of the maps &c. in his custody, as they may, from time to time require, he taking from them receipts for [136] the safe return of the same.

The Superintendent of Streets recommended, that the 15th Section of the Law "For the appointment of a Superintendent of Streets" Passed 11th January 1808 might be re-enacted, in place of the 17th Section of the Law "to provide for the sweeping and cleaning of the streets &c passed 20th March 1809. Whereupon resolved, that it

"Be ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That the owners or occupants of each house or lot of ground in the said city, and the person having the charge of every church, cemetery, jail or other public building and the land thereunto belonging adjoining to any street, that has been or shall be paved, shall, within the first four hours, between sunrise and sunset, after every fall of snow, or hail or rain, which shall freeze on the side walks or in the gutters, cause the side walks and gutters to the breadth of one foot, opposite such house, building, or land to be cleaned off the same, unless the same shall be so congealed, that it cannot be removed [137] without injury to the pavement every such owner or occupant shall, within the time aforesaid, cause the side walks to be strewed with ashes, sand or other proper materials to enable persons to walk with safety thereon. And every person offending or being guilty of any neglect in the premises, shall forfeit & pay for the first neglect the sum of two dollars, and for every hour thereafter, during which such neglect shall continue, the further sum of twelve and an half cents for every twenty five feet

in length of any side walk or gutter, which shall not be cleaned or not strewed as aforesaid, as the case may be, and so in proportion for a greater or less length of side walk or gutter ”

Resolved that the 20th section of the law aforesaid “ to provide for the sweeping & cleaning of the streets ” &c be and the same is hereby repealed

John H. Sickles was appointed an Assessor for opening Cross Street in place of Luke Kipp, who was, by mistake, appointed at the last meeting of the [138] Board, being already one of the Assessors

A former report of the Lamp Committee on the account of Jacob Cholwell late Contractor of Lamps, and his objections to the said report were now referred to the Lamp Committee

The City Inspector reported the draft of an ordinance for filling in certain sunken Lots at Corlaer’s Hook, which was passed

An account of Robert Sutton for work at Corlaer’s Hook Market was presented and referred to the Comptroller

The Superintendent of the Alms House presented a communication, stating, that from the numbers, which were already in, and were daily applying for admission into the Alms House, he was of opinion, that it would be necessary to accommodate some of the Paupers at Bellevue, which would be attended with great inconvenience and considerable additional expence. He, therefore, suggested the propriety of endeavouring to procure the room [139] adjacent to the Alms House lately granted by the Board to the Trustees of the African School. Ordered, that the same be referred to Alderman Carpenter Bingham & M^r Jones

A letter was received from M^r George Newbold declining the acceptance of the office of Commissioner of the Alms House, Whereupon the Board proceeded to ballot for a Commissioner in his place, when Roger Strong was elected

The Comptroller presented an account of Beekman M. Van Beuren Superintendent of Roads, which was referred to the Road Committee.

The Foreman of Fire Engine Company N^o 7 reported, that the new Fire Engine some time since directed to be built for that company was now compleated. Whereupon, ordered, that the same be delivered.

A resignation of Charles Golden as Fire Warden of the Sixth ward was received, [140] which was accepted & Luke Kip was appointed a fire warden in his place

The following persons were appointed Firemen, the Chief Engineer certifying corresponding vacancies

The Alderman and Assistant of the Seventh ward, to whom was referred the petition of John Gardner reported as follows " The Alderman and Assistant of the Seventh ward, to whom was referred the complaint of John Gardner against DeKlyne and Cunningham for not complying with an ordinance for filling up a certain piece of ground at Corlaer's Hook by them leased of Thomas Gardner, some years since, beg leave to report

[141] From what information we can get it appears, that they have been deprived of the use they have made of it as a Sawyard as Mr John Gardner has docked out in front of them and deprived them of the use of the water, necessary for the use of the saw-pitt—Mr Cunningham has since failed in business and his creditors are in possession. We conceive it to be a hard case, as it relates to DeKlyne & Cunningham and recommend, that an ordinance be passed to compel the owners of the ground to fill up the same

The above report was confirmed & the Street Commissioner directed to report an ordinance agreeably thereto

The Attorney of the Board, to whom was referred the petition of George Duff, praying remission of a fine for selling liquor without licence reported in favour of the petitioner, which was confirmed

[142] The Committee of wharves, piers & slips, to whom was referred the Statement of the Street Commissioner on the subject of the Contracts of Daniel Woolsey & Walter Allen for sinking & making the piers between Fly Market & Burling Slips reported as follows

“ The Committee of wharves, piers & slips, to whom the Statement of the Street Commissioner of the date of the 16th December 1809, on the subjects of the Contracts of Daniel Woolsey and Walter Allen for making the piers between the Fly Market Slip & Burling Slip was referred respectfully report, That it appears by the said statement, that the said piers are now completed according to contract, and in a workmanlike manner, and that there are balances now due from the Corporation to the Contractors upon the said contracts to the amount of three thousand five hundred and seventy dollars and thirty four cents being the third & fourth [143] installments of what was payable thereon by the Corporation and that to enable the corporation to make the said payments, when they shall become due, the proprietors of lots fronting on South Street, who are interested in the piers, at the time the contract in question was made, came under an engagement to advance the said sum to the Corporation on their bonds by way of loan to be repaid at future periods of time and to bear an interest of seven per Cent per annum.

It is understood, however, that the Corporation are at liberty to pay the said balances themselves, if they choose, without calling on the proprietors for the stipulated advance: But it is believed, that in the present state of the finances of the Corporation, this cannot be done without the aid of a loan. And the Committee beg leave further to report, that they have the offer of a loan to the Corporation of the sum necessary for the purpose at an interest of six per Cent per annum [144] on the security of the bond of the Corporation, the interest to be paid half yearly in equal installments and the principal to be repaid at the expiration of, or at any of the times of the payment of half yearly interest within the term of five years, at the election & pleasure of the board

These terms it will be seen are more favourable to the Corporation than those agreed on by the proprietors of the lots on both streets. The committee are, therefore of opinion, that the offer made to them ought to be accepted and the Comptroller authorized to negotiate the loan accordingly upon the terms proposed as stated in this report, and that the said balances due to the aforesaid contractors on the contracts aforesaid be paid out of the money to be raised by such loan. The Committee further report, that in case of the concurrence of the Board in this report, an arrangement will be made, with the lender of the money, by which the amount of the loan will be placed in the

Treasury so as to meet the proper warrants, that may be [145] drawn in favour of the contractors for the balances aforesaid

Whereupon ordered, that the above report be confirmed and that the Comptroller be directed to issue the bond of the Corporation for the money so to be borrowed & warrants were also directed to issue to Woolsey & Allen for \$3570 $3\frac{1}{100}$ for payment of the balances due them viz to Allen \$1570. $3\frac{1}{100}$ to Woolsey \$2000

The Committee on the communication of the Street Commissioner respecting the proportion of the expence for paving Albany Basin, which is to be borne by the Board presented a report, which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

The Committee on the petition of Thomas Scott for payment of balance due him for paving Albany Basin reported, that the prayer of the petitioner ought to be granted, which was agreed to and a warrant was directed to issue in his favour for the balance due him being \$553 $1\frac{1}{100}$

146] The Committee on applications, to whom had been referred the several applications for offices, reported, that they find it impossible to ascertain the merits of the several applicants, so as to designate the most proper to fill the respective offices; they, therefore, beg leave to refer to the Board, the appointment of such persons as they shall deem most proper, Which report was agreed to

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition for a new slip at the foot of Walnut Street reported. Ordered that the same lie for further consideration

The Alderman and Assistant of the 4th ward, to whom was referred the assessment for opening Bancker Street, reported, that, in their opinion, the assessment ought not to be confirmed, which was agreed to. Whereupon Leonard Fisher, Simeon Skellin Jedediah Waterman, John Abeel & Henry Laverty were appointed assessors to make the assessment, under the ordinance formerly passed for that purpose.

The Committee of Charity, to whom was referred the petition of Ann Vandenburg praying the suspension of the payment of an assessment on a Lot corner of North Moore & Varick Street reported, that "they believe from the representation they have received, [147]

that the facts within (in the petition) stated are correct, and presuming no great inconvenience can result from suspending for a few months, the collection of the assessment alluded to recommend to the Board that the same be suspended till the first of June next

Ordered that the said report be confirmed

The Market Committee to whom was referred the petition of Frederick Glawshorn to receive a Butcher's Licence & to be assigned, to stall N^o 4 Spring Street market, reported in favour of the petitioner, which was confirmed

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of the Trustees of the Orphan Assylum, presented a report, which was ordered to lay for consideration until the next meeting of the Board.

The Street Commissioner represented that the Commissioners for laying out Canal Street had called upon him for a statement [148] of the demands of the Corporation against Canal Street. He stated, that anticipating that request, he had prepared a statement of the advances and assumptions of the Corporation for Canal Street amounting to \$58,405 $\frac{2}{100}$ which he presented—Ordered, that said communication be referred to the Canal Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented assessments for laying the curb & filling the walks from the North side of Water Street from Montgomery Street to the East River, and for laying the curb & filling in the walk on the North side of Cherry Street from Rutger Street to Gouverneur Street—which were confirmed and Andrew P. Martin was appointed collector

The Street Commissioner presented a statement of the expences incurred in obtaining the Triangular piece of ground, at the intersection of George, Lombardy and Cheapside Streets amounting to 544 $\frac{7}{100}$; of which 250 $\frac{9}{100}$ had been advanced by the Corporation and was to be refunded on the assessment. He also presented an ordinance for assessing said expences, which was passed & William Hunter, William Ball, Adolph Carter, William Johnson [149] and William Weeks were appointed Assessors.

At the request of the Superintendant of repairs, the Comptroller was directed to examine his accounts up to the 31st Dec^r last

On motion, Resolved, that the Committee on Laws and ordinances

be directed to enquire whether the increasing of the Bread Inspectors' districts would not be adviseable; and if so, to report at the next meeting of the Board an ordinance accordingly

On Motion, resolved, that all ordinances, resolutions, advertisements & other notices, which shall, from time to time, be ordered by this Board to be published in the Public News Papers employed by the Corporation, shall be published in the News Paper called the Commercial Advertiser edited by Zachariah Lewis, and that he receive the same annual compensation for the same as is given to the other printers of News papers, who are employed by the Corporation

The following was presented. Resolved, that Peter Paulding be removed from office as Foreman of the City watch [150] of the Second street, which was agreed to.

The Board provided to ballot for a person to fill the vacancy; but no person having a Majority, the board then proceeded to appoint viva voce, when Robert Tolfrey was duly appointed

The following was presented, Resolved, that Isaac Anderson be dismissed from the office of Captain of the City Watch for the 3^d district. On the question to agree to the same, a division having been called, it was carried in the affirmative in manner following

Whereupon the Board proceeded to ballot for a person to fill the vacancy, [151] when Jacob Hays was duly chosen. It was then ordered, that Jacob Hays take charge of the watchmen now under the command of George Goodheart & that George Goodheart take command of the watchmen lately under the charge of Captain Anderson

The following was presented, Resolved, that Abraham DeBaum be dismissed from the office of Assistant to the Captain of the watch in the 3^d district, which was agreed to, and Isaac Bogart was chosen by ballot to fill the vacancy

The following was presented—Resolved, that John S. Hunn Street Commissioner be removed from office. On the question to agree to the same, a division having been called, it was carried in the affirmative; The members voting in the same manner as on the question for

the removal of Isaac Anderson. The Board then proceeded to ballot for a person to fill the vacancy, when Samuel Stillwell [152] was chosen Street Commissioner

On Motion, it was resolved, that Edward Moran be dismissed from his office as Assistant to the Street Commissioner

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved

Petitions were received from John S. Smith & Stephen Roe to be appointed Inspectors of wood, which were referred to the Committee on applications

A letter was received from Silas Lord, requesting, that the Corporation wou'd not pay any monies to Thomas Duggan, on account of Canal Street, as the whole of said Duggan's property was mortgaged to him. And a request of said Tho^s [155] Duggan, that the Corporation would advance to him on account of ground taken from him on Canal Street \$2500 was also received. Ordered, that the same communications be referred to the Canal Committee

A petition from William Hunter and John Gardner praying that the ordinance lately passed, directing M^r Cannon to fill in his ground near Grand Street might be enforced was received & referred to the Committee on Wharves, piers & slips

A letter was received from Robert Watts, that he, for the present, wished, that his application for a lot of ground in State Street might be suspended

A letter was received from John S. Hunn late Street Commissioner, stating, that he had, for the last week been employed in arranging the various documents belonging to the Street Commissioners department, in that he was desirous of transferring them to his successor and had offered them to him with a request, that he would give him a receipt for such as should [156] be delivered; but that this proposition was declined; that he considered, that a regard to his own reputation, as well as the conveniency of the Common Council and the fitness of the thing required that formality on the transfer of his papers to his Successor &, therefore, requested the Board to make such order on the premises as they should think proper. Ordered that the same be referred to Alderman Mesier M^r Jones & M^r Lawrance

A representation from the present Street Commissioner on the same subject was received and referred to the above committee

A representation was received from the Trustees of the City Dispensary stating, that the funds of the said institution were, from the great calls, which had been lately made upon them by the sick poor of the city in a low state & praying that the Board would increase their subscription to that institution. Thereupon ordered, that the same be referred to the Committee of Charity

A petition was received from certain [157] of the inhabitants of Spring Street, praying that the said street might be paved to Broadway, which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

A Letter was received from William Mooney, requesting that the Board would authorize a committee to settle his account as late Superintendent of the Alms House. Ordered, that the same be referred to the following committee, with authority to adjust his accounts viz Alderman Torrey Carpenter & Bingham

The City Inspector presented drafts of ordinances for correction of sundry nuisances from N^o 5191 to N^o 5194 inclusive, which were ordered to pass

A Report was received from the Police Office, stating, that Adolph Brower one of the Assistants of the Watch at the village of Greenwich returned that he had suspended John Stingus one of his Watchmen for being in liquor and asleep on his post. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Watch Committee. It was also stated, that there was a general complaint of the lamps not burning well throughout the City, for [158] several nights past. Ordered that the same be referred to the Lamp Committee

The Committee on Laws & ordinances presented "A Law for appointing special Fire Wardens," which was read and ordered to lie for further consideration

The same committee presented the following draft of an ordinance, which was read & passed into a Law

"A Law for establ[ish]ing the assize and regulating the Inspection of Bread". Passed 8th Jan^y 1810

Sect: 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Alderman [159] and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that

every Baker or other person, who shall use or carry on the trade or business of a baker, either in person or by employing any other person to use or carry on the said trade or business, under his or her directions, or for his or her profit or benefit, within the city of New York, shall cause all loaf bread whatsoever, which he or she shall bake or cause or procure to be baked, to be marked with the initial letters of his, her or their Christian & surnames, plainly to be seen on each loaf thereof; and all loaf bread, which shall not be so marked shall be forfeited and shall and may be seized to and for the use of the poor of the city of New York; and the person or persons so offending shall also forfeit and pay ten cents for every loaf thereof so neglected to be marked as aforesaid

2^d And be it further ordained, that all bakers or other persons, using or carrying on the Trade or business of a baker as aforesaid, shall make or cause to be made all their loaf bread of good & wholesome flour or meal and according to the assize to be established in conformity to this ordinance or any other ordinance, hereafter to be passed [160] directing the assize of Loaf Bread and all loaf bread baked in the city of New York, which shall be found not to have been made of good & wholesome flour or meal, or not to be of good quality, or wanting in weight according to the assize established at the time shall be forfeited, and shall and may be seized and disposed of to and for the use of the poor of the city of New York; and the Baker or person, who shall cause or procure the same to be baked, shall moreover forfeit and pay ten cents for every loaf thereof

3^d Provided always and be it further ordained, that no bread shall be forfeited in consequence of the directions and provisions aforesaid for the want of weight only unless the same shall be ascertained within eight hours after the same is baked. And that whenever any loaf bread shall be inspected or weighed to ascertain the weight thereof more than eight hours after the same shall have been baked, the Inspector or Inspectors of bread shall respectively make such allowance, as in his or their judgment shall [161] be just, having regard to the time the same shall have been baked more than eight hours; and if the same shall be found deficient in weight after making such allowance, the same shall be forfeited in the same manner as though it had been inspected or weighed within eight hours after the same was baked and then found under the due weight according to the Assize: And whenever an allowance respecting the weight of Bread shall be claimed on account of its having been baked more than eight

hours as aforesaid, the burthen of the proof respecting the time when it was baked, shall be on the baker or proprietor thereof.

4th And be it further ordained, that the Inspector or Inspectors of bread shall when inspecting or weighing bread make such allowance as in his, or their judgment shall be just for any deficiency of weight only in what are commonly called split loaves

5th And be it further ordained, That the Common Council of the City of New York shall once in every six months or oftner, if they [162] shall deem it necessary, appoint three fit persons to be Inspectors of bread and assign one of such Inspectors to each of the districts herein after established, whose duty it shall be to inspect & examine all loaf bread baked as aforesaid, on the same day, on which the same shall be baked and ascertain & determine, whether the same is marked as is hereby required; and whether the same is made of good and wholesome flour or meal, & whether the same is of a good quality & to ascertain the weight thereof; and to determine whether the weight be sufficient according to this ordinance and the established assize: And for these purposes every such Inspector shall have power & authority, at all suitable times to enter any bake-house, shop, store-house or other building or enclosure, where any loaf-bread is or shall be baked, stored, deposited or kept, within the district so to be assigned to him: And also to stop and detain in any street, whether the same shall be within his Inspection district or not, any baker or other person or persons, with their waggons or other carriages carrying any loaf bread, [163] baked within this city as aforesaid: And there or in any other suitable place, to inspect, examine, weigh and determine respecting such loaf bread according to the true intent and meaning of this ordinance; And if the same or any part thereof shall be forfeited & liable to seizure for not being conformable to the directions herein contained, the said Inspector, so stopping or detaining such bread, shall immediately or within six hours thereafter convey, or cause to be conveyed all such bread as shall be so forfeited for any of the causes aforesaid to the Alms House of the city of New York, there to be left for the use of the poor of the said city: And if any Loaf bread shall be forfeited as aforesaid and shall after the same has been inspected or examined and the forfeiture thereof been determined by the Inspector as aforesaid, and within six hours thereafter be conveyed away or concealed so the Inspector shall not be able to find the same immediately, to convey it to the Alms house as aforesaid, the person or persons, in whose bake-house, shop, store-house or enclosure the same shall have [164] been left by the Inspector, after

ascertaining the forfeiture thereof shall forfeit and pay for any loaf thereof so conveyed away or concealed, twelve and an half cents. And it shall be the duty of such Inspector to inspect and examine the loaf bread baked within the Inspection district so to be assigned to him, on the same day, on which the same shall be baked, so far as shall be practicable for him to do so.

6th And be it further ordained, that this city shall be divided into three inspection districts: that the first of the said districts shall include all such parts of the city as are Southward & Eastward of a line commencing at Roosevelt Street on the East river; thence proceeding along the middle of said Street to Chatham Street; thence along the middle of said street to a place opposite the middle of Murray Street; thence to & along the middle of said street to Hudson River: And that the second district shall include all such parts of the city as are Eastward of and within a line, commencing at Roosevelt Street afore- [165] said, at the East river aforesaid & running thence along the middle of said street to Chatham Street; thence along the middle of said street to the Bowery Lane; thence along the middle of the Bowery Lane to Grand Street; thence along the middle of Grand Street to Broadway; thence along the middle of Broadway to the Highway called Kings-bridge road; thence along the middle of the said Highway to a place opposite to the Middle of Bellevue Lane, and thence along Bellevue Lane to the end thereof and thence continuing in the same direction therewith to the East river: And that the third district shall include all the remainder of the city not included in the first or second districts

7th And be it further ordained, that each of the said Inspectors shall receive as a compensation for his services the annual salary or sum of four hundred dollars payable in equal quarterly payments.

8th And be it further ordained, that the said Inspectors, to be appointed as aforesaid, shall before entering on the duties of their office respectively take an oath or affirmation before the Mayor or Recorder [166] well and faithfully to execute the powers and trusts reposed in them without favour or partiality

9th And be it further ordained, That it shall be the duty of the Chamberlain to publish every Saturday in two of the Daily News Papers, printed in this city an assize of bread for the ensuing week, according to the form herein after mentioned: And further, that in fixing the assize, the said Chamberlain shall estimate a barrel of flour to produce 4032 ounces of bread; and in order to ascertain the weight

of a shilling loaf of the respective qualities of flour, the number of ounces shall be divided by a number equal to the number of shillings a barrel of flour of such quality may be worth, at the time of fixing the assize and the number 28 added thereto (being 28 allowed the baker) and the quotient will be the number of ounces, a shilling loaf shall weigh in the following manner

[167] Divide 4032 by 100, the quotient will be $40\frac{32}{100}$ being the ounces the shilling loaf must weigh: and that whenever the fractional parts are less than half an ounce, they shall be taken off the loaf; and when half an ounce or more, an ounce shall be added to it. And further, that it shall be the duty of the Chamberlain to deliver an account of the assize he may so establish to the Inspector of Bread or any baker whenever called upon so to do

10th And be it further ordained, That all mixed bread whether baked with superfine flour and Indian Meal or Superfine flour and rye meal, the assize thereof shall be made by the Chamberlain & Inspectors or a Major part of them, as they shall, in their judgment, think just & proper ”

The Board then proceeded to appoint by ballot the Inspectors for the [168] several districts, when William M. Somers was chosen for the First; Francis Lynch for the Second & John A. Crolius for the Third District

His Honour the Mayor informed the Board, that having seen a publication in the News papers by Rob^t Dyde Innkeeper, stating, that there would be a masked ball at Mount Vernon hotel, on the night of the 16th instant, he had directed the first Marshal of the City to write to Robert Dyde & to inform him, that the intended ball was viewed by the Magistracy, as calculated to promote disorder and licentiousness; that the said letter was delivered, and that M^r Dyde’s reply was, that it was his intention to hold the ball as advertised. Whereupon

resolved, that the subject be referred to the Committee on Laws and ordinances.

At the request of the Building Committee, a warrant was ordered in favour of John H. Sickles their Treasurer for \$2000

The Attorney of the Board, on the petition of John Patterson, praying [169] remission of penalty for selling liquor without licence reported, that in his opinion, the prayer ought not to be granted, which report was agreed to.

The attorney, on a similar petition of John Hogg, reported, that the prayer of the petitioner ought to be granted on payment of costs, which was agreed to

The Comptroller presented a report of the accounts of the Corporation for the year 1809, with observations thereon. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Committee of Finance, with authority to print such parts of the same for the use of the members of the Board, as they shall judge proper.

The Treasurer also laid before the Board the accounts of the Corporation from his entering into office until the 31st Dec^r 1809, which was ordered to be filed with the Comptroller

The Street Commissioner presented an assessment for regulating Bridge Street, which was confirmed and Jacob S. Mott was appointed Collector

The Committee, to whom was re- [170] ferred the account of Richard L. Degroot respecting the Flag Staff at the Battery presented a report, which was ordered to be referred to M^r Lawrance Alderman Carpenter & M^r Hawes

The Market Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Leonard Wicker, praying, to be assigned to the stand N^o 28 Fly Market reported, that as the stall was vacant, they recommended, that it should be granted to him, which was agreed to

The following report was then read

“The Committee of wharves, Slips and Piers respectfully represent to the Common Council, that sometime in the month of August last past, an arrangement having been made between the Corporation and certain proprietors of Lots fronting on South Street for causing a pier to be sunk and made in the East River on the Westerly side of Peck Slip for their joint benefit, Jacob Halsey and Aaron J Westervelt contracted to sink & make the same & by a written agreement bearing date the 14th day of August now last past, and made & entered into between [171] the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty by James Drake, Samuel M. Hopkins and Jacob Mott, then the Committee of

wharves, slips and piers of the one part and them the said Jacob Halsey and Aaron J. Westervelt of the other part, they the said Jacob Halsey and Aaron J. Westervelt contracted to make and complete the same according to the plan and agreement mentioned therein for a sum or consideration therein specified payable by instalments, the two last of which, each amounting to 3225 dollars were to be paid, one of them in money and the other in a note at sixty days, when the said pier should be completed to the satisfaction of such person as the said Committee might appoint to inspect the same: And by which said written agreement the said contractors stipulated and engaged, that the timber and other materials and workmanship should be such as would be approved by the said Jacob Mott or such other person as the said Committee might appoint to inspect the same; And that they would in [172] all respects comply with his directions in the premises, provided such directions were in conformity with the plan and agreement therein mentioned. And which said pier so contracted to be sunk and made by the before named contractors as aforesaid being now finished, application is made by the Contractors for payment of the two last instalments of the sum agreed to be paid for the same; but the Proprietors of Lots on South Street, who are interested in the pier being dissatisfied therewith and differences occurring as to the adjustment thereof, they have agreed to submit the same to the arbitrament of Amos Corning, John Anderson & Andrew Ten Eyck, in case the Common Council shall consent thereto

The Committee of Wharves, Slips and piers have been applied to for their consent on the part of the Corporation to the proposed submission; and they are of opinion, that the same is adviseable; but being unwilling to act in the premises without the approbation of the Common Council, they submit the foregoing representation of the matter & request [173] the direction of the Board on the subject

The aforesaid report was confirmed and the arbitrators therein mentioned appointed

The Committee, to whom was referred the assessment for opening Walker St into Beach Street and the remonstrance against the same, reported, that, in their opinion, the assessment is in many respects unequal and unjust and ought not to be confirmed

A petition from Peter Hoffmeyer praying to be compensated for a house and lot taken for the purpose of opening said Walker Street was also received. Whereupon ordered, that the same be referred to the following Committee with directions to enquire how far the Board is responsible for damages or expences, which have been incurred, viz Mr Lawrance, Mr Jones, Mr Hawes & Street Commissioner.

[174] The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of the Trustees of the African Free School presented a report. Ordered, that the same lie for further consideration

The Committee, to whom was referred the subject of the pavement ^{Albany} at Swartout's Basin and "to enquire & report what had heretofore been the practice of the Corporation in assessing property adjacent to public squares or Streets, on the one side of which the property was owned by the Corporation, and whether any & what proportion of the expence for paving the same has been borne by the Corporation: And particularly whether the Corporation have heretofore borne any part of the expenses of paving the squares at the heads of slips owned by them—Beg leave to report,

That considerable pains have been taken by them to ascertain as well from Gentlemen of Information, who have heretofore had a principal agency in conducting the affairs of the Corporation as from the public records, and that they have not found a single instance, in which the expence has been assessed solely on the [175] individuals

On the contrary, they find, that the owners of property fronting the Streets opposite to the Bridewell, Alms House & Jail and those on each side of the Park have borne the expence of paving only one half the width of the Streets and that the other half was paid by the Corporation

The Streets round the publick square, at the head of Chatham Street, have been paved in the same manner; individuals have paid for paving the one half of the width of the street, opposite to their houses and the Corporation the other half next to the square

They find, that as lately as in the month of October 1808, the Corporation paid upwards of two hundred dollars for paving the centre of the Street, leading from the Exchange Market down to the Slip, and that individuals have only paid for the sides opposite to their lots. That still more recently, in a grant made by the Corporation to John R. Livingston [176] of property on the East River near Corlaer's Hook and opposite to a place, in which it is contemplated to open a slip, at some future period, he is bound to pave and keep in repair only

one half of the width of the street or square opposite to the bulkhead. And that to cite no more precedents, the pavement of the centre of the Street at Burling Slip has, this summer been taken up, the Common Sewer and the Street again paved, at the public expence

That as the inhabitants living on this square enjoy the benefits and advantage of a spacious and airy situation, and as those resident on the North side, have some time since paved, at their own [178] expence such part, as has been deemed equal to their proportion, Your Committee are, therefore, of opinion that the Proprietors on the South side of said square should contribute to the paving thereof in proportion to what they would by law have been assessed, had they resided on a street of fifty feet wide

On motion, Resolved, that the two Inspectors of wood, whose districts are at Peck Slip to wit Jacob Tabele & Joshua Hunt shall attend alternately one week to the Inspection of wood on the East side of the said slip and one week to the inspection of wood on the West side of the said slip; and that they be respectively entitled to charge & receive the fees allowed by law for their inspection of [180] wood, so that the said Jacob Tabele shall receive the fees for Inspection one week on the East side of said slip, and the week following on the west side of said slip. And in like manner, that the said Joshua Hunt shall receive the fees for inspection, one week on the West side of said slip and the week following on the East side of Peck Slip; and so on alternately so long as they shall continue Inspectors of wood at the said slip: And further that the said Jacob Tabele shall commence his weekly inspection on the West side of said Slip on Monday the fifteenth day of January instant; and the said Joshua Hunt shall on the same day commence his weekly inspection on the East side of said slip and that they shall interchange thereafter weekly in manner aforesaid
January 8th 1810

On Motion, Resolved that the office of Physician to the Alms House and that of Physician & Surgeon to the Gaol and Bridewell be united, and that two respectable persons be appointed jointly as physician and Surgeon to the Alms House, Gaol and Bridewell, and that they receive from the Board for their united service the same compensation as is now allowed to the per- [181] sons employed in those departments.

The Board then proceeded to ballot for two persons as physicians & surgeons to the Alms House, Gaol & Bridewell, when D^r Gilbert Smith and D^r Walter W. Buchanan were chosen

A petition was received from David Barker praying remission of a penalty incurred against him for breach of the ordinance regulating the lying of vessels in Slips &c. which was ordered to be referred to the Attorney of the Board

Petitions were received from Robert Alexander and Andires Van

Orden to be appointed Wood Inspectors; of William Peters to be appointed Collector of the Corporation and of Samuel P. Adriance to be appointed a Measurer, which were severally referred to the Committee on Applications.

A petition of Peter Wilt to be permitted [183] to exchange stall N^o 17 in Fly Market for N^o 32 in the same market was read and referred to the Market Committee

A petition was received from the Inhabitants of Spring Street, praying, that said street might be regulated from West Street to Greenwich Street & paved from Greenwich Street to Broadway, which was referred to the Committee on Streets.

A petition was received from the Inhabitants of Coenties Slip, praying, that a walk might be paved across said street in a line with Water Street and that an ordinance ought to be passed regulating the stand of Cartmen, so that they might be confined to a Stand between Pearl & Water Streets. The former part of the petition was referred to the Committee on streets; and the latter part to the Committee on Laws & ordinances, who were directed to report an ordinance corresponding therewith

A memorial was received from Charles Le Roux, praying payment of a Lot of ground taken for opening Bancker Street. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Committee on Streets.

A petition was received from John [184] Michen, stating, that he had agreeably to the directions of the Board paved Grand Street to Second Street, Bowery to Elizabeth Street and Rivington to Stanton Streets, for which there was due to him \$102 $\frac{1}{100}$; that the same had been due four years & praying payment of the same. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Street Commissioner

A letter was received from James Abeel requesting that the suits, which had been instituted against him for rent, might be suspended, was referred to the Road Committee

A petition was received from Rene R. Duchem & Slipton Liancourt, stating, that they had become sureties on a bond for one Jean Vangerois for the maintenance of a Bastard child; that said Vangerois had absconded; that Susan Germain the mother is able to maintain the child & thereupon they pray relief. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Commissioners of the Alms House

A petition was received from John R. Livingston, stating, that, since the year 1797, he had paid a personal tax in the County of Dutchess, where he resided in the Summer Season and also in this

[185] city and praying that the tax so paid in this city may be re-imbursed to him

M^r Jones from the Committee on Laws and ordinances, to whom was committed the propriety of repressing Masqued Balls presented the following ordinance, which was read & passed

“ A Law

for the further regulation of Taverns & Boarding houses, in the City of New York Passed the fifteenth day of January 1810.

Whereas it hath been represented to the Common Council, that masquerades or masqued balls are intended to be introduced in one of the Public taverns in this city; and the same, as well as the use of masques and other disguises in public places, on any occasion whatever, being of immoral and pernicious tendency, subversive of all just and honourable discrimination of character, and calculated to encourage the profligate, seduce the youth of both sexes and promote licentiousness & disorder, the welfare and good order of the city require, that the same should be prohibited

Section 1st Be it, therefore, ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That no Innkeeper or person licensed by the [187] Mayor of the said city to keep a tavern, shall, at any time, or [on] any pretence or occa-

sion whatever, permit or suffer any masquerade, masqued ball or other assemblage or meeting of persons masqued or otherwise disguised to take place, or to be had, held or given in his, her or their house, or within any building, inclosure or place whatsoever in his, her or their occupation or possession, or under his, her or their charge, power or controul under the penalty of two hundred & fifty dollars for each offence—And be it further ordained, That no Innkeeper or person or persons licensed by the Mayor of this city to keep a tavern shall permit or suffer any person, who shall be masqued, or otherwise disguised at any time, or on any pretence whatever, whilst such person or persons shall be masqued or otherwise disguised [to] come to or remain in the house of such said innkeeper or person licensed by the Mayor of this City to keep a tavern, or any building, inclosure or place, in his, her or their possession, where or wherein, he, she or they shall use the business of a tavern keeper, or sell wine or other [188] strong liquor or cause or permit the same to be sold by retail or small measure under the penalty of One hundred dollars for each offence

Section 2^d And be it further ordained, that if any person shall appear masqued or otherwise disguised, so as to conceal his or her name, in any boarding house or tavern within the city of New York, he or she so offending shall forfeit One hundred dollars for each offence. And in order to discover offenders against this ordinance be it further ordained, that it shall and may be lawful for the watchmen, constables, marshals & other peace officers, when & as often as they shall be required by the Mayor, recorder or any two aldermen, to enter into any boarding house, or tavern in which the said Mayor, Recorder or Aldermen may have reason to believe persons to be assembled with masques or other means to conceal their names; & if any there be found masqued or otherwise disguised as aforesaid, then it shall & may be lawful for any of the said officers to bring him, her or them before one of the magistrates of the said city, in order [189] to discover his or her name

Section 3^d And be it further ordained, That it shall be the duty of all constables and marshals in this city and they are hereby enjoined to give such information to the Attorney of the Corporation as may enable him to prosecute offenders against this ordinance to conviction

Section 4th And be it further ordained, That the Attorney of the Board shall be authorized, after the recovery & receipt of any penalty, under and by viture of this ordinance, to pay over to the person, who shall give the said attorney such information of any offence against

this ordinance as shall enable the said attorney to prosecute the offender to judgment, one half part of the said penalty so recovered & received after deducting all costs & charges of prosecution ”

A deputation from the Medical Society consisting of Drs Post, Miller & Douglass waited upon the Board with a memorial from that Society to the Legislature of the State soliciting [190] them to purchase the Botanic garden of Dr David Hosack, that the same may be annexed to the medical institutions of the state; in which application, the Society requested the concurrence of this Board. Whereupon the following resolution was presented

Resolved, that the Common Council fully coinciding with the medical society of this city in their opinion of the important benefits, resulting to the medical profession in particular and to the cause of science in general from the Botanical establishment of Dr Hosack & being persuaded, that the patronage of the legislature will redound to the public advantage & to the honour of the state, do most cordially and most respectfully unite with the medical Society in their application on that subject

A Letter from Captain George Goodheart recommending Daniel Williams to be appointed a Watchman in the place of Isaac Bogert promoted, was referred [192] to the Watch Committee

A report was received from the Police Office stating, that Captain White had returned, that he had suspended Oliver Purdy one of his Watchmen for being intoxicated, when on duty. Ordered to be referred to the Watch Committee

Mr Hardie laid before the Board an account of Cæsar Elston for

cleaning a certain privy of the Alms House, which was referred to the Superintendent of the Alms House with authority to settle said account

[211] Remarks

From the preceding statements, it appears, that the total number of deaths in this city for the last six years amounted to 13136, making an average for each of the said six years of 2189 persons.

If the increase of our city has been in the same proportion, since the last census, which was taken in 1806, as, during the five years immediately preceding that date, our population must, at present, consist of at least 93,000

It is to be observed, however, that the number was not nearly so great at the beginning of the year 1804, at which time the present calculations commence. Hence there is a necessity of fixing upon some average, for the said six years; and if we should say 85,000, it is highly probable, that we shall come very near to the truth

Proceeding, therefore upon this hypothesis, the medium of deaths during the period aforesaid, calculating upon the [212] average 2189 will be as one to 38 $\frac{1}{2}$ annually. If again we take the year 1808, the most healthy of the six, and in which there were 2014 deaths, the proportion of those, who died, was to the survivors, as one to 42 $\frac{1}{2}$. On the other hand, in the year 1805, which was the most fatal of the whole, a malignant fever having prevailed, during the autumn to a considerable degree, the number of interments was 2352. The ratio of the dead to the living was, therefore, as 1 to 36 $\frac{1}{7}$

If then instead of calculating our annual mortality from the returns of the year 1808, which was the most healthy, or even from the average of the last six years, we should fix upon 1805, which was the most fatal, it can still be proved, that the city of New York is not only more healthy than any of the great & even moderately sized cities of Europe; but that it may also vie in this respect with several of the States & kingdoms of that continent taking the towns & country together

The above assertion is founded upon no less authority than that of the Reverend Dr Price and Mr Malthus, from whose writings, the following quo- [213] tations are extracted

“It may be stated in general” says the Doctor in his work on Annuities” that whereas in great towns, the proportion of inhabitants dying annually is from 1 in 19 to 1 in 22 or 23, and in moderate towns from 1 in 24 to 1 in 28; in country parishes, or villages on the contrary, this proportion seldom exceeds 1 in 40 or 50. The proofs of this are numerous and incontestible” See 5th London Edition. Vol: II page 354.

“The Number of inhabitants at Stockholm in 1763 was 72,927. The average of deaths, for the six preceding years had been 3082. One, therefore, in nineteen died there annually.” Vol: II page 355; and in a note to the same page, it is added, “that, though a nineteenth part of the inhabitants of Stockholm die every year, yet in the whole kingdom, taking all the towns & country together, not more than a 35th die every year”

“At Rome, an account is taken every year of the number of inhabitants and, in the year 1771, it was 159,675. The average of deaths for ten years had been [214] 7637. One, therefore in 21½ died annually” See Vol: II page 355

According to the same author, at least 1 in 20¾ die annually in London. See Note Vol: I page 266 & Vol: II page 356.

According to the calculations of Mr Susmilch, an eminent & ingenious German writer, it appears, that in the dukedom of Wurtemberg, taking the towns & country together, on an average for five years, one in 32 died annually. In the kingdom of Naples, the medium of deaths for the five years preceding 1777 was 115,412: and, [215] therefore, one in 37½ died annually. The same author concludes, that "taking a whole country in gross, including all cities and villages, mankind enjoy amongst them about 32 or 33 years each of existence See Price on annuities Vol: I page 268 note

It has been already observed, that, in the year 1784, the bills of mortality were not kept with the same accuracy, as they have been since that period. For this reason, in the formation of the following Tables, a reference is only had to the last five years, during which time the total number of deaths amounted to 11011

The probability of a person living to the age of ninety years is nearly as 1 to 500; & by the first table, it appears, that out of 11011, not more than 3 reached the age of 100; and these, previous to their attaining the age of 102 were, likewise, consigned to the silent tomb.

From what has been observed, therefore, it appears, that one half of those, who are born in this city may be expected to arrive at the age of 20 years, and this is a proportion [218] infinitely more favourable to human life, particularly in the early part of it than is observed in any of those great towns of Europe, with which we are best acquainted.

In proof of this remark, the following quotation is adduced from Malthus on population (page 307) "In London" says he, according to former calculations, one half of the born died under three years of age; in Vienna & Stockholm under two; in Norwich under five, and in Northampton under 10.

It may be further observed on the whole, not only as it respects the mortality of this city; but, likewise, of most, if not all other places, that there are no years of life, in which so many die, as during the first four or five years. After this life becomes less and less precarious, till about 15, from which time, it begins to decline, & continues to do so, till it becomes quite extinct in old age. To this article, the following remark may likewise, be added, viz, that according to our bills, if the first five years of childhood be excepted, the greatest mortality takes place between the years of 20 & 40

These remarks shall be concluded with a few observations on these diseases, which are most prevalent & fatal.

[219] Burned or scalded. These are principally children, whose deaths are occasioned by their cloaths accidentally catching fire. Were their cloathing made of woolen instead of muslin, accidents of this kind would not so frequently occur

Consumption. This, according to the bills, is by far the most fatal disease, no less than 2621 having died of it, during the last five years, making nearly one fourth part of the whole. But the amount of deaths, under this head, must be received with considerable allowance, as there is just reason to conclude, that many are reported to have died of consumption, from the difficulty of ascertaining the precise malady. With every allowance, however, it is still a most alarming disease, incidental in some degree to our latitude; but, no doubt, greatly aggravated by the adoption of fashions in dress adapted to more genial climes, and a want of attention in changing our cloathing, according to the changes of the weather

Convulsions. This is, likewise, a very mortal [220] disease and together with Infantile flux, hives, teething, worms & whooping-cough, constitute by far the greater part of the maladies, by which children & young persons are cut off. The amount of these, during the last

five years, was no less than 3156, making about one third of our whole mortality. Were children debarred from eating unripe fruit, perhaps, the number of deaths occasioned by infantile flux & worms would be greatly diminished

Drowned. The number of persons, who have perished in this manner, during the last year, is nearly double of those of the year 1804; and considering our insular situation, it must no doubt go on to increase progressively along with the increase of our navigation & population.

Small pox. The number of those, who fell victims to this loathsome disease, in the year 1804, amounted to 169. Since that time, owing to the progress of vaccination it has been greatly diminished, not more than 29 having died in the year 1807; although, in the two last years, it has again increased to 62 & 66. Several weeks have now elapsed, since a single death has occurred of this disease; and if parents & guardians were duly im- [221] pressed with the facts, that the kine pock is an easy & infallible preventive against it; that this substitute may be communicated to the youngest child, and at any season of the year with the most perfect safety, & to those, who are in indigent circumstances, the means of getting their children inoculated is provided gratis, there is the strongest reason to believe, that this formerly so afflicting scourge would be speedily eradicated

Bills of mortality, in this city are as yet only in their infancy. Some important deductions may, however, be drawn from them even in their present state; and if the Common Council should continue to enforce accurate returns of deaths, they will, no doubt, in the course of some years, acquire a much greater degree of perfection & may become incalculably useful not only to medical professors; but also for various other useful purposes.

which he is ready to pay to M^r Mooney; and the sum of \$628.5 to be paid by a warrant, will make the whole of M^r Mooney's balance.

Whereupon ordered, that Richard Furman pay to said William Mooney the said sum of \$480.45, remaining in his hands, and that a warrant issue for \$628.5 [244] being the remaining balance due.

Alderman Mesier, from the Committee of Charity, to whom was referred the request of the Trustees of the City Dispensary that this Board would enlarge their subscription to said institution, reported that in their opinion, the corporation should in future, subscribe one hundred & twenty five dollars instead of twenty five dollars its present subscription. Alderman Carpenter from the Ferry Committee presented the following report.

" The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of the Lessee of the Ferry between Fly Market and Brooklyn, praying a remission of a part of his rent in consequence of losses he had sustained by the interruption of the regular intercourse with Brooklyn, by means of the Yellow fever, at that place, during the last autumn, beg leave to report

That in order to ascertain the extent of the loss, which the lessee might have sustained by the said interruption of the intercourse during the Yellow fever, they applied to him & requested him to furnish them with a statement of the receipts of the Ferry, during the same months in the year 1808 & of the year 1809. This he has declined doing, nor has he furnished to your committee any other grounds, on which they can make a calculation except his own assertions. Under these circumstances your committee conceive that they might with pro-

priety have reported against the prayer of the petition; but from a desire to do justice to the petitioner, they have endeavoured to discover from other sources what claims he has to the relief, for which he has prayed.

[246] Your Committee beg leave to premise, that whatever losses the petitioner may have sustained, have been occasioned by the dispensation of Providence, in which he was far from being the only sufferer & for which the Corporation are in no shape responsible; and that had he continued, during the time of the Yellow fever, to land his passengers, at the Old Ferry Stairs at Brooklyn, the number of passengers and of course the receipts of ferriage would have been much less than they were at the place designated by the Mayor's proclamation. Your Committee further report, that they are informed from sources, in which they place entire confidence, that, during a part of the time in which the passengers were landed, at the Dock near Pierpoints distillery, the sum demanded & received from foot passengers was six pence & in some cases a shilling a piece, for a passage in the barges belonging to the Lessee of the Ferry, and that this was only discontinued from a fear, that it would defeat the intended application to the Corporation for a remission of the rent.

Your Committee further report, that they find, that the Lessee of said ferry has granted his licence to a number of persons to carry foot passengers across the said ferry to Brooklyn, in small row boats and for [247] each licence he receives the sum of twenty five dollars per annum. There are ten boats now employed on the said ferry, under such licence. The owners of these boats charge the passengers in them six pence each, out of which they pay the Ferry Master two pence, being the sum allowed by Law. In this manner, the Lessee of the ferry gets his lawful emoluments of carrying passengers, without either employing his own boats or hands and at the expence of tripple passage money paid by persons crossing the ferrey. And so clamorous are the owners of these small boats, that persons, wishing to cross in the regular barges of the ferry, have frequently to wait a long time before one of them will put off from the reason as your committee suppose, that the ferry master does not wish to offend these his licensed boatmen. In this manner, persons, who do not wish to be delayed are driven to take passage in the sixpenny boats & this has so long been the practice, that it is now the usual manner of crossing the ferry. The consequence is, that many of the regular ferry boats are withdrawn or not employed on the ferry and Your Committee do not believe, that

the ferry master has much more than half the number of boats [248] owned and manned at his expence regularly on the Ferry at once, which are required by his contract: from all which considerations your committee are of opinion that the prayer of the petition ought not to be granted ”

Alderman Mesier, from the Market Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Alexander Dobbins praying to be permitted to sell coffee in the Hudson Market reported in favour of the petition, which was agreed to and the Deputy Clerk of the Market was directed to assign him a stand in said market

The Attorney of the Board, to whom was referred the petition of David Barker praying remission of a fine incurred for breach of the law regulating the lying of vessels in slips &c. reported as his opinion, that the petitioner was not entitled to relief, [249] as he had refused to comply, after the order for the removal of his vessel had been communicated to him—Which report was agreed to.

On motion of Mr Hawes, Resolved that the “ Law appointing Commissioners of the Alms House and Bridewell and vesting them with sufficient powers for the better governing & regulating these institutions ” passed 18th Dec^r last be amended as follows. In the Title, after the word “ Bridewell ” strike out the remainder. In the first section, after the words “ Common Council ”, strike out the remainder of the said section; also strike out the whole of the second section, which was agreed to. The ordinance as amended now reads thus.

On motion, resolved, that the expences of the deeds to the purchasers of Lots, at Hamilton Square be paid by this corporation and that the deeds be delivered to the said purchasers free of any charge therefor.

M^r Bogardus called up the consideration of the resolution, which he offered at the last meeting of the Board, respecting the fixing a yearly sum to be paid to the [251] Mayor in lieu of all fees and also for the appointment of an Assistant Judge to the Mayor's Court. Whereupon M^r Jones moved the following as an amendment thereto. Resolved that the Committee on Laws & ordinances be directed to enquire into the necessity and expediency of an application to the legislature respecting the compensation to the Mayor of this city for his official services, and that the same committee enquire into the expediency of an application for the appointment of an Assistant judge of the Mayor's Court of this city, and that the said committee report thereon at the next meeting of the Board, & have leave to report the draft of a suitable petition in the premises to the legislature & an act or acts on such principles as may appear to them most fit and proper. The question being taken on the said amendment, it was carried in the affirmative

M^r Lawrance gave notice that he should, at the next meeting of the Board, call upon the committee upon the Inclenburgh lots for a report upon the subjects committed to them.

The Comptroller reported, that the cash in the Treasury amounted to \$4420 ⁹⁵/₁₀₀

The minutes of the last meeting were read & approved.

A petition signed Mathew Clarkson Chairman and William Few Secretary was received stating, that the meeting consisted of committees of sundry charitable societies, who were assembled to take into consideration the causes, which tend to incur vice and misery in this city; that the attention of the Committees had been called to the situation of the Bridewell prison, where were confined promiscuously persons suspected of crimes and those, who have been convicted, a circumstance highly unfriendly to the morals of those, who were not already depraved; that the legislature in 1802 had authorized [254] the building of a prison to contain solitary cells, which they recommended to be done; that the great increase of tavern licences was also a great evil and they recommended that some mode other than the one now pursued be devised for granting such licences.

Ordered, that the same be referred to the Committee appointed 11th December on the Alms House viz Alderman Bingham Mesier & M^r Jones

A petition was received from certain persons keeping victualling houses near the Hudson market, remonstrating against permission being given to persons to sell coffee in said market. Ordered that the

Deputy Clerk of that market be directed to remove all such persons as have coffee stands, who have not received permits from this board for that purpose.

A petition was received from certain inhabitants in Liberty Street near the Dutch Church, complaining that the lamps in said street were not duly lighted. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Lamp Committee

A petition of Jacob Mabie praying to be appointed a measurer was read. Whereupon resolved, that the said Jacob Mabie be and he is hereby appointed a measurer for this city

Petitions were received from Barney Caffrey praying payment for paving Fourth Street, from Delancey to Stanton Street and from John [255] Simonds praying payment for regulating Sixth Street from Delancey Street to Stanton Street, which were ordered to be referred to the Street Commissioner

A petition was received from Dennis M'Guire praying to be relieved from a fine incurred by a breach of the law respecting the Stand of cartmen at the Coffee House Slip. Ordered to be referred to the Attorney of the Board.

A petition was received from the Stockholders in the Aqueduct Coal Company in the State of Rhode Island, stating, that they had discovered an inexhaustible mine of Coal & wished the Corporation to consider of the propriety of contracting with them for a supply of the same—Ordered, that the same be referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

The account of Samuel S Smith for $4\frac{1}{2}$ days board of four Indian Chiefs of the Six nations and of their interpreter amounting to \$40 was received & referred to the Comptroller

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of John K. Murray & others reported, that they were unanimously of opinion, that, for the present, a further extension of the fire line for building ought not to take place, which report was agreed to

[256] An application from Cornelius Van Winkle to rent the upper part of the Watch House of the 1st district was referred to the Watch Committee

The Comptroller on the petition of Cort Went, praying a reduction of rent on his lease, reported, that the Board might from motives of benevolence, be inclined in the present instance, to make some abatement, on account of the poverty of the applicant; yet it would in the Comptroller's opinion open a door to applications from other tenants, which would be highly injurious to the revenue. He, therefore, would

not recommend the granting of the prayer; but left it under the circumstances of the case for the direction of the Board.

Whereupon resolved, that the Comptroller be authorized to grant to the petitioner an indulgence for payment of the rent due, until the first day of May next

The Attorney of the Board presented a report in the case of P. Darly, which had been referred to him, which report was referred back to said attorney and he was authorized to remit to said Darly the penalties incurred upon his giving up to said attorney the name of his employer.

The Finance Committee, to whom was referred the communication of the Comptroller [257] on the subject of the sum necessary to be raised by tax for payment of the expences of the city and county, for the current year, reported "That, in their opinion, application ought to be made to the legislature for leave to raise by tax, the sum of "One hundred & twenty thousand dollars to defray the expence of the "current year "

To the Honourable the representatives of the State of New York.
 The Memorial of the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York respectfully sheweth,

That they have estimated the sums necessary to be raised by tax for the expences of said City and county for the current year, founded on the actual expences thereof for the last year, which estimate detailing the particular objects of expence and the sums requisite to defray the same, they have the honour to transmit with this memorial.

From this it appears, that for the purpose of defraying the various charges of this city and county for the present year the sum of sixty five thousand dollars will be required, and the further sum of fifty five thousand dollars for the maintenance of the poor and for defraying the other contingent charges of said city and county.

Your memorialists, therefore, respectfully solicit, that an act may be passed [259] authorizing the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to raise the aforesaid sums upon the estates real and personal of the Freeholders and inhabitants of said city

1st Be it enacted by the people of the State of New York represented in Senate and Assembly.

That the Mayor, Recorder and Aldermen of the City of New York as supervisors of the city and county of New York or a majority of them, of whom the Mayor or Recorder shall be one, shall be and hereby are empowered, as soon as conveniently may be, after the first day of May next to order and cause to be raised by a tax on the estates both real and personal of the freeholders and inhabitants of and situate within the said city and to be collected a sum not exceeding sixty five thousand [260] dollars to be applied to the support and maintenance of the poor of the said city & county, the support and repair of the Bridewell of the said city, the support & maintenance of criminal persons, repairing & taking care of other public buildings in the said city belonging to or under the custody and care of the Mayor, Aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, the making, regulating, repairing & improving the public streets and roads in the said city and county, the defraying other contingent expences arising within & properly chargeable to the said city and county and for defraying the expences, which the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York may sustain or be put to in exercising the powers

vested in them by an act passed the second day of April, One thousand eight hundred and three entitled "An act to invest the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York with adequate powers in relation to certain objects of importance to the police & health of the said city and for supplying the deficiencies of former taxes upon any & every of the wards of the said city, owing [261] to the insolvency or inability of the collectors of the said wards any or either of them or others and fees of collection not heretofore provided for, such deficiencies, however, to be assessed on the estates real and personal of the freeholders and inhabitants of and situate within the said wards respectively, where they shall happen as aforesaid; and also a further sum not exceeding fifty five thousand dollars by a tax real and personal of the inhabitants of and situate within the said city to the Southward of a line, beginning at the North River, at a place called DeKlyne's ferry, a little to the Northward of the State Prison; thence Eastwardly in front of the New Banking House to the road commonly called the Sandy Hill road; thence along the said Sandy Hill road to the Northward of Potters Field and the house of William Nelson to the Bowery Road; thence across the Bowery Road to a street commonly called Stuyvesant Street and through the middle thereof to the East river to be applied to the payment of so many watchmen as the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common [262] Council convened, shall appoint & employ, for watching and guarding the said city, to the purchasing of oil, providing lamps, and putting up the same, and repairing, cleansing and lighting those which now are or hereafter may be erected within that part of the city last described, to the digging, cleansing, making & repairing public wells and pumps in the said city & to defray the other contingent expences arising in and properly chargeable to that part of the city to the Southward of the line aforesaid, as the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty in Common council convened, may, from time to time direct, and for supplying the deficiencies of former taxes, upon the same part of the said city last described owing to insolvencies and fees for collection not heretofore provided for, such deficiencies, however, to be assessed on the estates, real and personal of the freeholders and inhabitants of and situate within those parts of the said city to the Southward of the line aforesaid

2^d And be it further enacted, that the said several sums of money shall be assessed, in the manner directed by the act, entitled [263] "An Act for the assessment & collection of taxes", and each person's tax

in one ward shall be collected in one payment, and the money so collected paid into the hands of the Treasurer or chamberlain of the said city, at such times after the first day of May next, as the said Mayor, Recorder and Aldermen as supervisors of the city and county of New York, or a majority of them, of whom the Mayor or Recorder shall be one, shall appoint & direct

3^d And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the collectors of the First, Second & Third wards of the said city to retain in their hands, three cents in each dollar by them collected; the collector of the Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, seventh & tenth wards of the said city to retain in their hands four cents in each dollar by them collected; and the collectors of the eight and ninth wards of the said city, to retain in their hands five cents in each dollar by them collected and no more, as a full compensation for their trouble in collecting and paying to the said treasurer [264] or chamberlain the monies, which shall be raised by virtue of this act

Whereupon ordered that the Clerk of this board cause the petition & act to be fairly engrossed & forwarded under the Corporation seal to his Honour the Mayor, now at Albany, with a request to present the same to the Legislature at the present session.

The finance committee, to whom was referred the communication of the President of the Manhattan Company reported, that from information, which they have received, the monies required may be obtained at 6 per cent per annum, payable half yearly from different companies in this city, provided it be expressly understood, that the interest be punctually paid at the time it shall become due; and, under all circumstances, the committee are of opinion, that loans be procured in order to discharge the debt due the said Manhattan Company

The Committee have thought proper to suggest for the consideration of the Board the propriety of disposing of the Stock held by this board, in order to redeem the debt due by this Corporation. The question having been taken on the first part of the report it was approved of and the Committee were authorized to negotiate a loan, on account of this Board, on the principles of said report. The latter part of the report was ordered to lie for further consideration.

[265] The Committee of Laws and ordinances, to whom the resolution respecting the compensation of the Mayor and the application to the legislature for an assistant Judge of the Court of Common Pleas called the Mayor's Court was referred "respectfully reported, that from the best information they have been able to obtain they are satis-

fied, that the revenues and emoluments of the Mayoralty have become so great as to make the compensation of the Mayor already extravagant; and when they consider, that these revenues & emoluments are principally derived from the fees & profits of the Mayor as the Clerk of the Market and from the grants of licences and other sources, which must increase with the population of the city and that the said office of Clerk of the Market is held by the Mayor under the charter and that other parts of his revenue are received under the charter or under Laws of the State. They are satisfied also of the propriety of an application to the Legislature on the subject for an act to enable the Common Council to provide a suitable remedy in the premises and they beg leave to report the draft of a petition to the Legislature and a bill for the purpose which accordingly accompany this report. As to the other branch of the resolution referred to [266] the Committee, they are not satisfied of the necessity of an Associate Judge of the Court of Common Pleas called the Mayor's Court; but incline to the opinion, that if the powers & duties of the Recorder as Commissioner ex officio were transferred from him to a special commissioner appointed for the purpose, his remaining duties would not require the aid of an Assistant Judge, and, on this principle, they submit the draft of a bill for the appointment of such a Commissioner

The act prepared by the Committee [269] was then read in the words following

An Act for granting to and vesting in the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York the office of Clerk of the market within the said city and for other purposes.

Whereas a petition hath been presented to the Legislature by the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, praying,

that the office of Clerk of the Market within the said city and all and singular the fees and profits, revenues and emoluments granted or allowed to the Mayor of the City of New York, by the charter of the said city or by any law or usage, may be granted to and vested in the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the said city of New York; they the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the said city of New York making a proper allowance out of the same or out of the City Treasury to the Mayor of the said city with power under certain restrictions to regulate the amount thereof, which application is reasonable & ought [270] to be granted. Therefore

Be it enacted by the people of the State of New York represented in Senate & Assembly That the office of Clerk of the Market within the city of New York and all & singular the fees and profits, revenues & emoluments granted by the Charter of the City of New York to the Mayor of the said city, or which the said Mayor by the said charter or by any law or usage is entitled unto or allowed to receive and take to his own use, except the fees and perquisites, to which he is by law entitled as a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas called the Mayor's Court be and the same are hereby granted to and vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York and their successors for ever; And that it shall not be lawful to or for any Mayor of the said city of New York, at any time after the passing of this act, to receive or take to his own use any of the said fees, profits revenues or emoluments granted to & vested in the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the said city of New York, by this act as herein aforesaid; but that the said fees, profits, revenues and emoluments and every part thereof shall and may hereafter be received by the said Mayor, Aldermen & Common- [271] alty of the said city of New York or such officers and persons, as they may, from time to time, see fit to appoint for the purpose to be used and applied to the public use of the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the said city of New York and their successors for ever.

2^d And be it further enacted, that the Mayor of the City of New York shall and may be allowed and have to his own use for his compensation as Mayor of the said city of New York such part or proportion of the said fees, profits, revenues & emoluments or any of them not exceeding in amount the sum of seven thousand nor less than the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars, as the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the said city of New York or their successors in Common Council convened shall, from time to time, think proper

to allow him. Provided that it shall be lawful to and for the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the said city of New York in Common Council convened, at any time or times to allow and pay out of the City Treasury to the Mayor of the said [272] city, for the time being, as and for his compensation an yearly sum not exceeding seven thousand dollars nor less than five thousand five hundred dollars, to be paid in quarterly payments in equal proportions on such days as the said Common Council shall appoint for the purpose and which said yearly sum or allowance shall be in lieu of all fees, perquisites, revenues & other emoluments whatsoever, except only the fees and perquisites of the said Mayor as a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas called the Mayor's Court; And Provided also that the compensation or allowance to the Mayor of the said city for the time being, when settled and agreed upon by the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York as aforesaid shall not be diminished, during the Mayoralty of such Mayor

Whereupon, Resolved, that the Clerk of this Board be directed to engross fairly a copy of said petition and the act recommended to be passed under the Corporate Seal and to forward the same to his Honour the Mayor, now attending in the Senate of this State, with a request, that he would cause the same to be presented to [273] *be presented to* the Honourable the Legislature at their present session

The Comptroller has the honour to report, on the statement made by the Street Commissioner, the 15th instant respecting a balance due by the Corporation to Alexander Anderson, assignee of an order given by the former Street Commissioner in favour of Abraham Stagg & C^o directed to John Bussing Collector of the Assessment for paving Mulberry Street from Bayard to Hester Streets, dated 28th February 1807 for \$182. On account of this order, the sum of \$20 has been paid by Bussing the first collector & \$70 by Richard Clarkson the second Collector of the assessment.

It appears, that Bussing absconded and Clarkson cannot be found. The surety of the latter is Lancaster Palmer, and there is still due from Clarkson, as appears from the report [280] of the Street Commissioner \$143.38. Alderman Fish from the committee to whom was referred the memorial of Peter P. Van Zandt respecting property at Burling Slip reported,

“ That a water grant was made by the Corporation to M^r Van Zandt in front of his property at Burling Slip extending into the water 200 feet from Front Street; that upon laying out and regulating South Street, there were forty three feet of intermediate space between said street and the termination of M^r Van Zandt’s grant, which he claims under an act of the legislature entitled “ An Act [290] “ for regulating the buildings, streets, wharves & slips in the city of New York ” passed the 3^d day of April 1801, the 4th section of which authorises and directs the proprietors of such of the said lots as may not adjoin the said street or wharf to fill in the intermediate spaces & thereupon to become owners of the same in fee simple. Upon this section, M^r Van Zandt contends, that the title thus acquired vests in him not only a fee simple estate in the ground itself, but that it also gives him a right to the water along the Front thereof on the Slip in exclusion of the Corporation together with the whole width of South Street on the Slip. The Committee entertain no doubt as to M^r Van Zandt’s legal title to the 43 feet of ground filled in and made by him, under the law above stated; but they cannot imagine that the legislature could have intended by the above recited act to diminish any of the Corporation rights, or to vest in an individual the power of obstructing the entrance into a public slip or to appropriate the wharfage thereof to his own individual benefit. They, therefore, are of opinion, that M^r Van Zandt’s claim to the water in the slip, in front of his 43 feet of ground & at the end of South Street including the wharfage is not well founded ”

The ordinance, which the Street Commissioner presented, at the last meeting of the Board for regulating Pitt Street from Rivington to Grand Streets was now called up and passed, and John Brown, Thomas White, Benjamin Thurston, John Pell and John Drake were appointed assessors.

The Street Commissioner on the petition of Barney Caffrey reported, that according to the contract and receipts, there appeared to be due to him for regulating Fourth Street to Delancey Street \$70;

that William Dustan was the Collector & William Falconer his security; that there is no account of returns of Delinquents from Dustan. Whereupon ordered, that the Comptroller report a warrant for payment of the said sum & that the Street Commissioner take measures for recovering the same from William Dustan or his Surety.

The Street Commissioner on the petition of John Simonds reported, that \$55 was due to Simonds for regulating Sixth Street to Delancey Street, & that William Peters is the Collector—Whereupon ordered, that the Comptroller report a warrant for payment & that the Street Commissioner take measures for recovering the same from the said Peters or [292] his surety.

The Street Commissioner presented an assessment for opening Albany avenue. Whereupon ordered, that the Street Commissioner cause the same to be published in the papers employed by this Board.

The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition of Edward W. Laight reported “ That he has not been able from the accounts in his office, to ascertain the sum due to the petitioner. The assessment for opening Cherry Street being not among the papers relative to that subject, and not being able to find any recent account of receipts or payments cannot tell what remains uncollected. But as the petitioner has set forth, that he has frequently called for payment, the Street Commissioner is sorry to say, that he has ascertained, that the late Street Commissioner has retained in his hands since the summer of 1806 seventy four dollars and three cents, and that he has also received one hundred and eight dollars for his services as stated in the imperfect account exhibited in the Leger. That Thomas Timpson was the Collector.

“ As the Street Commissioner has reason to believe, that considerable sums of money have been, in like manner retained by the late Street Commissioner, he begs leave to suggest the propriety [293] of ordering the late Street Commissioner without delay to account to your Honourable Body for all the monies received by him and not accounted for while Street Commissioner; & also that a committee be appointed to examine into the claim of Mr Laight. And, as, in the opinion of the Street Commissioner, from the manner, in which the business of this office has for some time past, been conducted, there is a constant clashing between this and the Comptroller’s office. He, therefore, begs, that a Committee may be appointed with instructions to draw the line of distinction between the two offices ”

The Street Commissioner on the petition of John Mehan reported, that there is due on the contract of Walton & Mehan for paving [294] Grand Street from Bowery to Second Street $\$34.8\frac{2}{100}$ owing to the failure of John Bussing the Collector, and on Grand Street from Bowery to Elizabeth Street $\$23.2\frac{7}{100}$, Oliver Jaques Collector. On Third Street between Rivington & Stanton Streets $\$29.\frac{2}{100}$. In all $\$87\frac{11}{100}$. Whereupon ordered, that the Comptroller report a warrant for payment of the same & that the Street Commissioner take measures for recovering the same from the Collectors or their Sureties

The Street Commissioner reported, that he had taken a general view of the Collect & found, that the mud has risen near to the surface of the water. He was, therefore inclined to believe it would not be expedient to make a contract for filling the same. At the same time he believes, it ought to be filled as soon as practicable, and, therefore, recommends, that a quantity of earth not exceeding ten thousand loads be contracted for by the load. Whereupon resolved, that the Street Commissioner contract for the delivery of 10,000 loads of earth on as favourable terms as possible

Mr Lawrence, from the Watch Committee on the recommendation of Captain Goodheart, for the appointment of Cornelius DePew and of Captain Hays for the appoint- [295] ment of John Garbert reported, that they recommended said appointments, to be made, which was agreed to.

A petition from Peter Hoffmier on the subject of the ground taken from him to open Walker Street was received and referred to the Committee on his former petition

Ordered, that the City Inspectors report ordinances for filling up the sunken lots about the Collect.

An application was made on behalf of Jacob Cholwell for payment of a bond to Miller and Baker assigned to him. Ordered, that the said application lie on the table.

The Alderman and Assistant of the Fifth ward were requested to nominate assessors for opening Walker Street.

On motion to advance \$3000 to Abijah Brainard on account for curb stone furnished by him for Broadway, the same was agreed to and the Comptroller was directed to report a warrant at the next meeting of the Board.

Adjourned to meet at the City Hall on Wednesday next at 4 o'clock, 'till which time M^r Bogardus's motion for reconsideration was adjourned.

“ Your Committee by no means admit the legal liability of the Corporation to reimburse the lessee for any such losses, nor that under the circumstances detailed in their former report, the lessee has any very strong claims on the liberality of the Board. They, however, for the purpose of putting the claim of the Lessee at rest, and of closing the door to litigation, recommend, that the Corporation allow to the lessee the sum of three hundred dollars, provided he will accept of the same in full of his claim, to be deducted from the rent now in arrear on the lease of the said ferry ”

" And whereas the said Cross walks are frequently obstructed by horses, carts and other carriages; for remedy whereof

1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened that no cartman, coachman or other person shall obstruct the walks laid across the public streets or at the head of the public slips in any part of the

“city of New York, by placing or stopping his horse, cart or any other carriage upon or across any of the said Cross walks, or by placing or putting any other obstruction across or on the same, under the penalty of five dollars for each offence with costs [310] of suit.

“2^d And be it further ordained, that if any offence shall be committed against this law by any child, apprentice, servant or slave, the penalty in such case, shall be recovered from and paid by the parent, master or mistress of the person offending together with costs of suit”

Ordered that the said law be passed.

The Comptroller presented drafts of the following deeds for lots sold at the Collect, which had been examined by the Committee on Laws and ordinances viz 4 deeds to James Morris, 1 to Archibald Bruce, 3 to John D. A petition was received from Benjamin Waldron for permission to run out Fike nets at Bellevue Dock, for which he would give a compensation was referred to the Alderman and assistant of the ninth ward

A memorial was received from John D. Keese, stating, that, in pursuance of ordinances of the Board, he had filled in certain lots on the Westerly side of Pitt Street, between North & Stanton Streets; but that certain lots owned by Ephraim Hart and the Widow's Society, though by the same ordenance ordered to be filled in had not been so filled up as was ordered, which was of great injury to him & requesting, that the Board would enforce the ordinance against the said proprietors. [340] On motion, the following amendments to the Law entitled “A law to regulate the sale of Fire wood, for the appointment of Inspectors thereof, and for the division of the city into inspection districts.” passed January 4th 1808 were enacted. In Section 8th In place of “fourteen” say “sixteen” districts. Then add to the said section “that the Fifteenth district shall be composed of and comprehend the whole of the Ninth Ward, adjoining the North or Hudson River and the Sixteenth district shall be comprised of and comprehend the whole of the Ninth Ward adjoining the East and Harlaem River

Section 14th And be it further ordained, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prohibit the purchase or sale of fire wood in the Ninth Ward, by the cord or measurment, Provided always, and it is hereby ordained, that it shall be the duty of the Inspectors of the Fifteenth and Sixteenth districts to see that a sufficient allowance be made for any deficiencies of length, so as to make each and every cord by either of them inspected, to be equal to four cart loads, as is provided for in the third section of this law

The Street Commissioner presented an ordinance for regulating Green Street from Prince to Bleeker Street [which] was now called up and passed and Christopher Beakley, Peter Hatterick, Ebenezer Clark, George Cleland & [341] William Chives were appointed assessors. The Street Commissioner also presented a new ordinance for opening Walker Street, which was passed, and Jacob Sherred, Jonathan Little, Cornelius Du Bois, Anthony Steenback and James Tylee agreed upon on the 14th ultimo were appointed Assessors. The Street Commissioners represented, that Ezekiel Bishop appointed an Assessor for Banker Street was interested. Whereupon Samuel Webb was appointed an Assessor in his place

On motion resolved, that a Committee be appointed to ascertain and report to this Board, by whom the money was paid for the purchase of the ground, at the corner of Cherry, Water and Roosevelt Streets and that the Committee be the Alderman and Assistant of the Fourth Ward and the Comptroller

Resolved, that the following gentlemen constitute a committee to give directions respecting the care of the Park viz M^r Lawrence, Aldermen Bingham & Torrey

Resolved, that the Superintendant of repairs, under the direction of the Committee of repairs, cause the wharves at Brooklyn belonging to this Board to be repaired

The Comptroller reported, that the Bond [342] directed at the last meeting of the Board to be issued to Jacob Cholwell as Assignee of a bond given to Miller and Baker had by M^r Cholwell's direction been issued to Charles Dickinson Esq^r which was approved of

On motion, Thomas Kehoe was appointed Wood Inspector of the Fifteenth district and Edward Vermillyea Inspector of the Sixteenth district

On motion, resolved, that an agent be appointed to proceed to Albany to take charge of and forward the several bills proposed by this Board to the Legislature and now pending before that Body and that the said agent depart before the next meeting of this Board, if the same shall be deemed advisable by a committee consisting of his Honour the Mayor, M^r Jones & M^r Bogardus. And on motion, Resolved, that M^r Hawes be the agent of this Board for the above purpose

The Committee on the Flag Staff and battery presented the following report,

“That they consider the proper keeping of so elegant and public a walk among the first objects of attention and are persuaded that

every care and expence bestowed in this respect will, with the highest approbation, be [343] noticed by the Citizens. Your Committee, therefore, recommend that the Flag Staff be rented to some discreet and proper person for such sum and under such conditions as to protect the walks, grass and trees of the battery from injury and to remove therefrom every nuisance as may seem meet to a committee to be appointed for that purpose”

After the word "sale" where it first occurs in the first section of the said law, insert as follows "nor bring or cause to be brought, or be aiding or assisting in or consenting to the bringing into the said city for sale; nor unlade or take; or cause to be unladen or taken or be aiding or assisting in or consenting to the unloading or taking from on board any vessel, boat or craft, or from any waggon, cart or other carriage within the limits of the said [352] City" and after the word "City," at the third occurrence of that word in the said section of the said law, insert these words, to wit "nor carry, drive or convey, or cause to be driven, carried or conveyed, or be aiding or assisting in or consenting to the carrying, driving or conveying out of the said city or from any one part of the said city to any other part thereof (unless in case of necessity) any goods, wares or merchandize, horses, beeves, calves, sheep, hogs or other cattle, or any other thing whatsoever, that shall have been brought into or may be within the said city for the purpose of sale or with an intent to be sold therein"

which amendment was agreed to

John Titus, Isaac Burr and Wynant Van Zandt Junior arbitrators in the case of Peter Schermerhorn Esquire reported the following award viz that "Peter Schermerhorn pay unto the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, the sum of two thousand seven hundred & fifty dollars, when they shall convey unto him the piece of ground within (in the bond of submission) described"

Whereupon the Comptroller was directed to prepare a deed agreeably to the [353] award

On motion, the petitions of Thomas Marsh and Amos Rand to have permission to have Coffee Stands in the Hudson market, which had been referred on the 19th February last to the Market Committee were called up, and permissions were granted to them.

The market Committee presented the following report,

“ That your Committee with a view to remove the doubts, which existed as to the policy and propriety of issuing permits to sell coffee in the Hudson and Fly Markets, recently visited said markets and enquired as well from those engaged in, as from those living around the markets, what would probably be the consequence of such a practice

In the first place, we discovered, that the Green women, Fish men, poultry men and small meat butchers daily so throng these markets, as to resemble a crowd, and if even all the permit men already licensed should assemble at the same time, the mob would be such as to render business altogether impracticable. It also appeared from the view of several, who were pointed out as Hucksters or forestallers, that the public are, by these men, most grossly [354] imposed on, and that they with their poultry and meats so illegally procured occupy no inconsiderable portion of these markets. Your Committee further find, that the houses in the neighbourhood of these markets are occupied principally by victuallers, who calculating on the custom to be derived from Market people, have been induced to give very extravagant rents. They have also been at great expence to accommodate themselves comfortably & are well provided with every description of viands and can satisfactorily administer to the wants not only of the fatigued country man; but even to the dainty appetite of the most squeamish. Every thing appears inviting and nice, and the salutary beverage so much applauded for its vivifying efficacy here flows abundantly. The early stirring and often chilled market man can here quaff his ambrosial coffee, at as cheap a rate and with infinitely more comfort. Four cents a pint for coffee and two cents for a muffin is the usual price taken at the stands in the markets; so also in these houses, they sell this as well as every other nourishment at the same reasonable ratio.

Your Committee are, therefore, of opinion, that the applications to sell coffee in these markets now referred to them, ought not only not to be granted; but also that the practice of further encumbering these places [355] should be entirely discontinued; and further recommend, that the Deputy Clerks of the market be directed to demand of every person offering poultry or meat for sale, whom he suspects not en-

titled, to produce his licence or permit for so doing, and in case of refusal or neglect to produce the same, that then he be authorised to turn the persons so neglecting or refusing, from and out of the said markets."

The Canal committee, to whom the communication of a committee from the inhabitants interested in the assessment to be made by the Commissioners appointed by an act of the legislature of this state relative to the extention of the said assessment beyond the limits of interest, reported, that agreeably to the request contained in the said communication, they had a conference with the Committee from the inhabitants aforesaid and are clearly of opinion, that such aid as is in the power of the Corporation of New York ought to be given to the said inhabitants to mitigate the expence, which will necessarily be imposed upon them under the existing law of the legislature; and two [356] modes for that purpose were proposed by the Committee of the inhabitants—one to petition the legislature for a general tax upon the inhabitants of New York; the other for a lottery to defray part of the expences & thereby lessen the burthen upon those inhabitants

"Your Committee have maturely considered the propositions aforesaid and desirous to recommend the one most likely to succeed, do recommend, that this Board join the said inhabitants in a petition to the Legislature for a lottery, the proceeds of which to be applied towards defraying part of the expense of Canal Street, and thereby mitigate the assessment aforesaid

The City Inspector reported drafts of ordinances from N^o 5285 to N^o 5305 for correction of nuisances, which were ordered to pass.

A petition of James Perrot to be permitted to occupy a part of Ann Street by placing on it materials for building [was received], which was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the third ward, with authority to grant permission.

[357] The Committee on the Fire Department, to whom was re-

ferred the petition of Fire Engine Company N^o 30, reported, that they had purchased an engine from M^r Hardenbrook for the said company and as more men were required to work it, they recommended, that 14 men be added to said company, which was agreed to

The Street Commissioner presented a map of ground belonging to George Janeway Esquire, designating the line between the Corporation Land and said Janeway's, surveyed by Samuel Stillwell & Stephen Ludlum in August last; the former on the part of M^r Janeway and the latter on the part of the Corporation—The map protracted by M^r Ludlum & examined by said M^r Stillwell, which the Street Commissioner delivered as a public document.

Ordered, that the same be accepted as such and filed in the office of the Street Commissioner, which was agreed to.

The report of the committee on the communication of the Comptroller on the subject of the contract for Street manure was called up and being read was as follows.

“That finding by a comparative statement between the project of Superintendant and contractor, the nett profits arising from [358] the Street manure, are in favour of the former system; and also believing, that a Superintendant must feel a greater interest in keeping the city clean, than a contractor ever possibly can, do, therefore, recommend the following resolution.

Resolved, that the law for the sweeping and cleaning of the Streets, passed the 20th March 1809 be and the same is hereby repealed, and that the law “for the appointment of a Superintendant of streets” passed 11th January 1808, be and the same is hereby re-enacted.”

The ordinances presented by the Street Commissioner on the 26th day of February last for digging out and regulating Elm Street from Grand to Broome Streets and for regulating and paving Spring Street from Broadway to Greenwich Street were called up and passed—and Christopher Beakley, John P. Ritter, George Cleland, Ebenezer Clark and Benjamin Sands were appointed assessors. The ordinance for paving the South side of Albany Basin was also called up & passed, and Daniel Smith, Garret Storm, James W. Lent, Benjamin Stephens & John Nitchie junior were appointed assessors.

The Street Commissioner, to whom the petition of Thomas A. Emmett was referred, presented to the Board on the 19th February a map and remarks made by William Bridges City Surveyor relative to the subject, as contained in the following letter

New York February 1st 1810

M^r Stilwell

Agreeable to your request, I have [360] made the survey of M^r Emmetts and the adjacent lots on the West side of the Middle Road near D^r Hosacks Botannic garden and find that the Stone fence at the North end of the said garden is thirteen feet three inches on the Middle Road and the said fences continue from thence to M^r Emmett's North side, where it is right as to the line of the said road & having surveyed from Steuben Street up to Harsen's Road I find a surplus of about six feet and that Doctor Hosack's North fence is two feet six inches North of the true line, according to the original map and that being near the proportion of the surplus according to its situation, I have taken the center of that wall for a base line to measure from and have staked out the several and respective lots as marked in the map made thereof

which having been referred to the Road Committee, they this day reported "That in their opinion, the survey ought to be approved of so far as it respects the place of beginning, which is the center of the wall on the North side of D^r Hosack's Botannic garden," which report was agreed to.

The Street Commissioner and Comptroller, to whom was referred the petition of Archibald Smith for payment of a balance for regulating and paving North Moore Street reported, that the facts stated in the petition are true; and as the collection of the money from Ann Vandenburg had been suspended by the Board until the first of June next being fifty eight $3\frac{1}{100}$ dollars, the precise sum due to the said petitioner, they could see no propriety in procrastinating the payment to Archibald Smith and recommend a warrant accordingly:

Whereupon the Comptroller was directed to report a warrant for payment of the same

The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition of Uzel W. Freeman to be appointed a City surveyor reported in his favour; whereupon the said Uzel Freeman was appointed a City surveyor.

The Street Commissioner presented a communication from Peter A. Jay Esquire [362] stating, that if a deed of cession to the corporation were prepared for ceding the streets through the land of Messieurs Jay and Munroe, (excepting Canal Street) it would be immediately executed. The same was ordered to be referred to the Comptroller

The Street Commissioner presented an assessment for opening Collect Street, which was ordered to be published in the papers employed by the Board

On motion, resolved, "Whereas information has been given to this Board, that some person or persons are making preparations to sink a block at or near the foot of Walnut Street in the Seventh ward of this city and in water reserved for a slip: therefore Resolved, that the Street Commissioner take immediate measures to prevent the same from being carried into effect.

[363] On motion, Resolved that the Committee on Laws and ordinances be directed to revise and cause to be printed the Laws and ordinances of this corporation and such of the laws of the State as relate to the City of New York

Resolved that the Committee of repairs direct the Superintendent of repairs to cause a shed to be erected over the floating Engine

On motion resolved, that the Comptroller call upon the late Street Commissioner John S. Hunn and the late Attorney of the Board Samuel Cowdrey Esquire for an immediate settlement of their accounts with this Corporation

Resolved, that William Baker have permission to construct vaults in front of his lots in Bayard and in Pell Streets under the direction of the Aldermen & Assistants of the wards, in which those streets lie and of the Street Commissioner

The following was presented Resolved, that John H. Sickles be removed from the office of Treasurer to the Building Committee—On motion the consideration of the same was postponed to the [364] next meeting of the Board.

The Commissioners for laying out Canal Street have relinquished the right of soil to all the ground wanted for that street, except that of Messieurs Jay and Munroe and Dominick Lynch

The Commissioners were informed on their coming into office, that those gentlemen had agreed to cede what ground was wanted of them respectively for the use of Canal Street, on conditions, that they should be exempted from assessment for the expence of opening said street, & the Commissioners took an early opportunity of waiting on those gentlemen and received from them a confirmation of the same, and that they were ready, at any time, to execute the deeds of cession conformably thereto. The Commissioners, therefore, presented a draft of a deed of cession for the ground wanted of Messieurs Jay & Munroe to M^r Munroe and received for answer, that he approved of the deed and would execute the same; but that he had [370] made the bargain with the Corporation, and that he esteemed himself bound to them and they to him; of course the whole must be finished with them and declined for the above stated reasons doing any thing with the Commissioners

M^r Lynch expects to comply with and execute the same terms as M^r Jay and Munroe

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved

His Honour the Mayor informed the Board, that a vacancy having occurred in the representation of the house of Representatives of the Congress of the United States from the Congressional district of which this city forms a part, by the resignation of William Denning Esquire, his Excellency the Governor had, agreeably to law, issued his proclamation announcing such vacancy and directing an election to fill such vacancy to be held on the last Tuesday in April next, being the day of the General Election; that the following difficulty occurred, which [381] was not provided against in the law. The Sherriff, who received notice of the proclamation on the 20th instant is bound within eight days after the receipt of such copy to give notice of the same to one of the Inspectors of the Election. The election is, by law, to be holden by the same persons, who are appointed Inspectors of the General Election; but the Common Council are limited to the appointment of such Inspectors to some day between the 1st & 10th day of April. Of course, no Inspectors can be appointed, upon whom the Sherriff can serve notice of the election. His Honour, therefore recommended, that application should be made to the Legislature, who were still in session, to remedy the present evil and to provide against it in future. Which was agreed to & the Committee on Laws & ordinances were requested to prepare a bill on the subject, which the Clerk was directed to engross & the Mayor to forward immediately.

His Honour the Mayor also laid before the Board a letter, which he had received from Governor Tompkins, stating, that application having been made to him through the Navy Department of the United States for the cessions of the title and jurisdiction of a flat in the Wallabout Bay opposite the Navy Yard, he had thought it his duty to call a meeting of the Commissioners (of whom the Mayor, for the [382] time being was one) at Albany on the 2^d day of April next, to take the same into consideration: And as by such cession, the rights of the Corporation might be affected, the Mayor said he thought it his duty to communicate the information to the Board. Whereupon ordered, that the same be referred to his Honour the Mayor & his Honour the Recorder with authority to take such steps, as they might judge necessary.

A request was received from James Nesbitt to be permitted to assign the lease of N^o 73 Chatham Street to Henry Hart, which was referred to the Comptroller

“The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition for opening Washington Street from Jay to Hubert Street has the honour to report,

That he has caused a map, to be made, which is herewith presented to the Board, shewing the obstructions in the street, by which it appears, that there are no buildings in the street, excepting those, on the westerly side, which were built on the line of the street, when it was intended to be fifty feet wide. The Street has since been laid out sixty feet wide, which causes them now to stand ten feet in the street. But two of them being on a lease, which has but a short time unexpired, by the conditions of which the buildings are to be removed.

He is of opinion, therefore, that the only remedy the parties complaining have, should the building become offensive, after it is erected will be to present the same for the consideration of a Grand Jury and, by that means, will be brought before a proper tribunal, and if found to be a nuisance will be abated

The Committee to whom was referred the accounts of the expences &c of Jurors & officers on the trial of Charles Wakeley reported, that they have had the same under their consideration, and although they are satisfied, that no such account or demand is by law recoverable against the Corporation, yet they find, that [399] instances have occurred, in which charges have been allowed and paid by the Common Council, And it appears, that in this particular case, the judges who presided at trial and the Council or some of them gave the jury and officers assurances, that an allowance would be made to them by the Corporation of the city for their great expences and long attendance. These considerations induce your committee to recommend, a reasonable allowance for the expences and services of the Jurors & Officers on this occasion, though the Committee cannot advise the full payment of the Bills, nor do they recommend the payment of any part of them as a matter of right and they are thus particular in stating the grounds of their report in order, that the allowance made in the present case may not be drawn into precedent on any future occasion. They recommend, that three dollars per day be allowed & paid for each juror and one dollar & fifty cents for each constable or marshal for each day of his attendance on the said trial for payment of his expences & services and in lieu of all other compensation. And that R. Kent's bill of twenty dollars, being for preparations made by the Special order of the Court for the accommodation of the Jury be moreover paid [400] but nothing further be allowed or paid on the accounts referred to the Committee

That, for the purpose of collecting the other fees, revenues & emoluments, which are, by the said act, vested in the Corporation, a suitable person be appointed, to be denominated [406] the receiving clerk, whose duty it shall be to attend at the Mayor's office daily, during the time the same shall be open for business, to assist the Mayor as Clerk under his direction, in discharge of the several duties attached to his office as Mayor, and to receive in behalf of the Corporation, all such fees, revenues & emoluments, as heretofore were received by the Mayor for the same; and that the said receiving clerk shall account once in every week to the Comptroller on oath for the monies, which he shall, in that capacity have received, and thereupon pay over the same to the Treasurer

That the said receiving clerk shall receive as a compensation for his services above mentioned the sum dollars per annum to be paid to him quarterly, or such a per centage on the monies received, as the Corporation shall think proper

The Committee also further recommend, that there be allowed to the Mayor of the city, in lieu of all fees, perquisites & other emoluments whatsoever, which, in and by the said act are vested in the Corporation, a certain per centage to be hereafter fixed & ascertained by the corporation of the said fees, perquisites, profits, revenues and emoluments not *exceed* [407] exceeding in amount the sum of dollars per annum, as and for his compensation, to be paid in quarterly payments

The Committee also further recommend, that a suitable committee be appointed to draft and report an ordinance to the Corporation, conformable to this report, or in such other manner as they shall think proper "

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of a number of citizens praying for a division of the city into two districts, and the appointment of two superintendants of streets for the city reported

"That they are of opinion, that the prayer of the said petition is reasonable and for the reasons mentioned by the petitioners ought to be granted. The Committee beg leave to submit to the consideration

of the Common Council the following division & they recommend that the city be divided into two districts by a line [408] to begin at the East river at the Fly market slip and to run up the said slip to and through Maiden Lane to the Broadway and up Broadway to the Old Highway, leading to Kingsbridge and thence along the same to Bellevue Lane and thence along the said lane to the East River; all that part of the said city lying between the said lane and the East river to be called the Eastern District and to include therein the Fly Market Slip and Maiden Lane. And the residue of the said city, including Broadway, to be called the Western District."

Whereupon the Committee of Laws and ordinances were directed to report an ordinance agreeably thereto; and Mr Hitchcock lately appointed Superintendant of Streets was directed to proceed in his duties till the further orders of the Board

The Committee, to whom was committed the Sunday Law for revision presented the same, which was agreed to and enacted in the words following

A Law

for the due observance of the Lord's Day called Sunday.

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that no person or persons within the city of New York, shall do any manner of servile work or labour on the Lord's Day called Sunday (works of piety, charity or necessity excepted) under the penalty of five dollars; nor buy nor sell; nor shew forth or expose to sale, by opening his, her or their shop, [410] store or grocery, or in any street, cellar, place or

places; nor bring or cause to be brought; nor be aiding or assisting in or consenting to the bringing into the said city for sale; nor unlade or take or cause to be unladen or taken, or be aiding or assisting in or consenting to the unloading or taking from on board of any vessel, boat or craft, or from any waggon, cart or other carriage, within the limits of the said city, any goods, wares or merchandizes, or any other thing or things whatsoever on the said day within the said city; nor carry, drive or convey or cause to be carried, driven or conveyed, or be aiding or assisting in or consenting to the carrying, driving or conveying out of the said city, or from any one part thereof to any other part thereof (unless in cases of necessity) any goods, wares, merchandize, horses, beeves, calves, sheep, hogs or other cattle, or any other thing whatsoever, that shall have been brought into or may be within the said city for the purpose of sale or with an intent to be sold therein under the penalty of Five Dollars for each and every offence. Provided always, that it shall be lawful to sell fish on the said day, until nine o'clock in the morning and milk until nine in the morning and after five in the afternoon

Section 2^d And be it further ordained, That [411] no licensed butcher or other person or persons shall sell, shew forth or expose for sale or cause or procure to be sold, shewn forth or exposed for sale, any small meat on the said day, in any of the public markets or other public places within the said city. And every person offending in the premises shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars for every piece of small meat, which shall be by him or her sold, shewn forth or exposed for sale, or caused or procured so to be done, contrary to the true intent & meaning of this ordinance

Section 3^d And be it further ordained, that there shall be no shooting, sporting, playing or horse racing on the said day, in any of the streets or places, within the said city; neither shall any person on the said day be permitted to fish or to ride or wade any horse in the waters of the East or Hudson Rivers, within the bounds or jurisdiction of this city, under the penalty of Five Dollars for each offence

Section 4th And whereas the practice of swimming, bathing or sporting near the shores of the East or Hudson Rivers, at improper times & places prevails to a considerable extent and has become extremely offensive to passengers & Spectators, Be it, therefore, further ordained, That no person shall, upon any day in the week, between the hours of six o'clock in the morning and eight o'clock in [412] the evening, swim, bathe, sport or play in the waters of the East or Hudson Rivers, at any place exposed to the view of spectators to the

South of the State prison dock on the Hudson river or of Delancey Street on the East River under the penalty of five Dollars for each offence

Section 5th And be it further ordained, that no public innkeeper, victualler, keeper of an ordinary, grocer or other retailer of liquors shall permit any person or persons to come to & remain in his, her or their house, on the said day & there to be tipping; nor shall they, at any time, suffer any excessive drinking or persons to be drunk, in their houses, under the penalty of Ten Dollars for each offence.

Section 6th And it is hereby enjoined on the High Constable and other constables & marshals and they are hereby authorised & required to enter into all and any of the houses of the said public innkeepers, victuallers or keepers of an ordinary, grocers & other retailers of liquor; and if any person or persons shall be found tipping or drunk therein, or shall be guilty of any of the offences mentioned in this ordinance, to detain him, her or them, until they shall discover his or her name and place of abode & then to direct and order them forthwith to depart the said house; and if any such person or persons shall not discover his or her name & place of abode, or will not, when directed, depart the said house it shall be the duty of such constable or mar- [413] shal, forthwith to bring the said person or persons before the Mayor, Recorder or one of the Aldermen or other magistrates of the said city, and if, upon the oath or affirmation of the said constable or marshal, such person or persons shall be found guilty of either refusing to discover his or her name, or his or her place of abode, or refusing to depart the said house, when required, such person or persons shall forfeit and pay forthwith the sum of four dollars

Section 7th And be it further ordained, that if any person, who shall contravene this ordinance shall be a minor, an apprentice, a bound servant or a slave, his or her parent or guardian, master, mistress or owner, as the case may be, shall be deemed liable to pay the penalty so incurred & shall & may be prosecuted for the same as aforesaid

Section 8th And be it further ordained, that the attorney of this Board shall be authorised, after the recovery and receipt of any penalty to pay over to the said person, who shall give the attorney such information of any offence against this ordinance, as shall enable the said attorney to prosecute the offender to judgment, one half part of the said penalty so recovered & received.

Section 9th And be it further ordained, that it shall be the duty

of all magistrates, constables & marshals in this city and they are hereby [414] enjoined to detect and apprehend all offenders against this ordinance; and to give such information to the Attorney of the Corporation, as may enable him to prosecute to conviction

The Committee appointed to carry into effect the objects of the report of the Committee on the subject of the Flag Staff, reported

“ That they have agreed with Gilbert Dean to let the same to him for one year from the first day of April next, at the rent of five hundred dollars, and on the terms & conditions mentioned in the agreement herewith submitted, And which agreement the Committee have prepared for the said Gilbert Dean, to execute, in case the same shall be approved ”

The agreement being read was in the words following

“ I Gilbert Dean do hereby acknowledge, that the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York have lett to me, & that I have taken of them the building at the Flag Staff on the Battery in the first ward of the city of New York for one year from the second day of April in the year One thousand eight hundred & ten on the terms and under the covenants hereinafter mentioned and at the rent of five hundred dollars for the year, which rent I promise to [415] pay them, their successors or assigns in four equal quarterly instalments on the first day of July, October, January and April, the first of the said payments to be made on the first day of July next. And I hereby covenant & promise to and with the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York their successors & assigns, that I will, during the said term of one year, as the agent of the said Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty take the charge of and well & faithfully attend to the grounds and premises South and West of State Street and of that part of Whitehall Street, which leads from the Broadway to Hudson's river, belonging to the said Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty called the Battery; will keep the same and the public walks free and clear from all nuisances and filth; will use my utmost endeavours to prevent all trespasses thereon, and in all things, as far as in me lies, preserve the same, and all the grass, walks and fences thereon from all injury or damage whatsoever: and that I will not, at any time, during the said term, sell or expose to sale any wine, brandy, rum, strong waters, ale or any other sort of exciseable or strong liquors (except

beer) in or at the said buildings at the Flag staff or at or upon any part of the said grounds & premises called the Battery and moreover that I will use my utmost endeavours to *pre* [416] prevent all riots and disorderly conduct on any part of the said premises and will at all times conform to and obey and aid and assist in the carrying into effect all ordinances, orders and resolutions of the said Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the said city in Common Council convened as to or concerning the said grounds and premises or the regulating, keeping or management of the same, and at the expiration of the said term of one year will deliver and yield up the possession of all and singular the said demised premises to the said Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty their successors or assigns, and further that in case of the non payment of the said yearly rent or any part thereof, by the space of ten days after any or either of the said days, whereon the same ought to be paid as aforesaid, whether the same shall be demanded or not, or in case of the breach or non performance on my part of any or either of the covenants, promises or agreements herein contained on my part to be performed, then and in any or either such case, it shall and may be lawful to and for the said Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty their successors or assigns to enter into the said demised premises or any part thereof in the name of the whole & myself & other occupiers thereof thereout to expel and put out and the same to have again and repossess, as in their first & former estate.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A petition was received from a number of Inhabitants, praying, that Coentie's Slip may be filled up, so as to form Front Street across said slip; but should that measure not meet the approbation of the Board, they then requested, that the Street on the East side of the Slip might be widened

A remonstrance against filling up said slip, signed by a number of inhabitants was also received; and the said petition and remonstrance were referred to the Aldermen & Assistant of the First Ward & the Committee of Wharves, Piers & Slips.

Petitions were received from Martin Lemons, John Parcels & Mathew Gibson for permission to sell meat by the Quarter in the Lower [419] Fly Market, and from Henry Starling for stand N^o 3 in, said market, lately occupied by Christian Truce, which were referred to the Market Committee

A memorial was received from a number of fishermen, who have hitherto attended at the Hudson Market, stating, that in consequence of a number of permits having been granted to Butchers to sell small meat in said market, the market has been so occupied, that there is no room for their fish stands, and that they have been obliged to remove to the Fly Market. Whereupon, ordered, that the same be referred to the Market Committee & to the Alderman & Assistant of the Third Ward

A petition of John Hammond to be appointed Deputy Keeper of Convicts was read & referred to the Road Committee

A petition of John Shepard & recommendation for Joseph Brotherton as Sweeper of the Fly Market and the petition of John K. Furman for the printing of the Board, were received & referred to the Committee on Applications

A petition from the Inhabitants of Mulberry Street, praying, that the same may be regulated & paved; and a petition from the inhabitants of Broome & Mulberry Streets, complaining of an obstruction to the water at the [420] junction of said streets were received and referred to the Street Commissioner

A petition of John K. Furman praying for payment as clerk at the last charter election in the Fourth Ward was received and referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the Fourth ward.

A petition of J. Weedon for the grant of twenty feet of Collect Street from the corner of Anthony Street to the intersection of Pump Street for the purpose of establishing thereon a Rope Manufactory was read & referred to the Committee on Streets & the Street Commissioner

A petition of Elizabeth Duryea, for payment of the balance of a bond due to her for ground taken to open Amity Street was received & referred to the Comptroller & Street Commissioner

A petition from Abraham R. Lawrance for the exclusive right of ferriage for the term of twenty five years from Great Barn Island to Long Island was read & referred to the Ferry Committee

A request was received from Samuel L. Page Junior, that the Corporation would in conjunction with Jacob Delamontagnie, to whom his house was also mortgaged, receive for the [421] present year, the rent of said premises. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Comptroller & Attorney of the Board with directions to take the necessary measures for complying with said request

A petition from Isaac Stagg to build a vault in Reed Street, in front of William Ross's building was granted under direction of the Alderman & Assistant of the Fifth ward & Street Commissioner

A similar permission was granted to James & Abraham Simonds, who are building in Pearl Street.

A memorial from certain captains of vessels, who ply between Peck's Kill &c and this city, praying, that the Sunday Law may be so amended, as that they may be permitted to land cattle on that day before ten o'clock in the forenoon and after five in the afternoon was read and ordered to lie on the table

A Complaint of Robert Fulton that the dirt, which had been swept up by the inhabitants in Chamber Street had not been removed by the Scavengers, was ordered to lie on the table.

A Letter was received from Thomas Barrow in behalf of the Corporation of Trinity Church, requesting, that as they had ceded to [422]

the Board, the ground laid out for the new range of Greenwich Street, that the ground, where the old road run, may be granted to them. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Committee on Laws & ordinances

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition for opening Hudson Street from Hetty to Clarkson Street, presented a report, which was referred to the Street Commissioner, and he was directed to report an ordinance for opening said street

The Attorney & Comptroller of the Board, to whom was referred the petition of Henry Titus, stating, that he held three lots at the corner of Pearl & Chatham Streets, under and by virtue of a lease from the corporation, that the same extends 78 feet on Pearl Street, and also that the person holding under a similar lease the adjoining property in Pearl Street has encroached upon his ground and wishes this Board to interfere in his behalf and reduce his rent, until the lease

of the said person shall terminate, which will be in about six years," reported, "that it is true, that they both hold, under and by virtue of a lease from the Corporation. It also appears, that Henry Titus had a renewal of his lease from the Corporation in the year 1805; but did not then represent to the [424] Board, that an encroachment had taken place, or that the quantity of ground granted him was in any respect deficient. It also appears, that he permitted the other party to build, but not until last summer, when he wished to build himself, did he complain of a deficiency of ground, and yet before a report was made on his then statement, he commenced and has since completed his building. It also appears, that by a survey submitted by Henry Titus, that in front on Pearl Street as also on the rear, the house of William Fash stands exactly on the line; but that there is an encroachment commencing a few feet from the front and which at about the centre is two feet 6 inches; but diminishes towards the rear. It also appears from Mr Titus himself, that he would put up with the encroachment, if the rent was but reduced. We are of opinion, that the fault is in Mr Titus, in not apprising the Board, at the time his lease was renewed, that there was a deficit of ground; but at all events he should not have permitted them to build without applying for relief, nor ought he to have built himself until he had obtained redress; and as the ground can be of no possible benefit to him at this moment, he is not entitled to relief on any [425] of the grounds asked for, and that he have leave to withdraw his petition "

The Street Commissioner presented a report recommending an amendment of the Law respecting the repairing of streets, which was referred to the Committee on Laws & Ordinances.

The Street Commissioner presented an ordinance for paving Delancey Street, which was passed. Assessors to be appointed at the next meeting of the Board.

The ordinance for paving Spring *Spring* Street, passed, at the last meeting of the Board was called up & Solomon Wheeler, Abraham Hart, Stephen Kingsland, Ezekiel Bishop & Robert Coles were appointed Assessors in said ordinance

The Street Commissioner and Comptroller reported, that the ground in the vicinity of the Collect was filled *suffi-* [426] sufficiently to admit being disposed of, in such manner as the Common Council may judge advisable. Whereupon ordered, that the Street Commissioner direct a quantity not exceeding ten thousand lots of earth to be carted upon the same and the ground to be forthwith levelled.

The Street Commissioner presented the assessment for paving at Albany Basin, which was confirmed & Edward Moran was appointed Collector

The Street Commissioner presented the assessment for opening Collect Street, as corrected by the Assessors, which was directed to be published in the papers employed by the Board.

The Committee, to whom was referred the objections against the assessment for opening Albany Avenue through the Inclenburgh reported, that, in their opinion, the assessment ought to be set aside. They further reported, that the street called the Albany avenue was established as a public street and the ground taken for forming & opening the same and the damages and recompence due to the owners thereof ascertained by a jury, before the act, entitled " An Act relative to improvements, touching the laying out streets and roads in the City of New York and [427] for other purposes, passed the 3^d April 1807 " was passed, and they are, therefore, of opinion, that the same ought to be opened with as little delay as may be. Which report was confirmed, and the assessment with the objections to it was ordered to be returned to the Assessors for revisal & correction.

On motion, the Comptroller presented a lease to Peter Lorillard, which, having been examined by the Recorder was directed to be executed

The Comptroller presented a deed for ground at Beekman Slip to Peter Schermerhorn, which was referred to the Recorder

Section 4th And be it further ordained, that the Clerk of the Common Council for the time being, shall collect the fees, perquisites, revenues, & emoluments other than the Market fees & those arising from tavern licences vested in the Corporation, in and by an act of the legislature of the State of New York, entitled " An act for granting to and vesting in the Mayor, Aldermen & Common- [432] alty of the City of New York the office of Clerk of the Market within the said city and for other purposes " passed March 16th 1810, whose duty it shall be to attend at the Mayor's Office daily, during the time the same shall be open for the transaction of business and act as clerk, under the direction of the Mayor, in discharge of the several duties attached to his office as Mayor, and shall receive on behalf of the Corporation, all such fees, perquisites, revenues and emoluments as heretofore were received by the Mayor for the same, and shall render a faithful account to the Comptroller once in every week of all the monies, which he shall, in that capacity, have received and shall thereupon forthwith pay over the same to the Treasurer or Chamberlain of the city, and who shall receive as a compensation for his services under this ordinance the sum of five hundred dollars per annum to be paid to him quarterly & in equal payments

Section 7th And be it further ordained, that there shall be allowed and paid to the Mayor of the City of New York, as and for his annual compensation as Mayor a certain proportion of the fees, perquisites revenues and emoluments, which by the herein before mentioned act of the Legislature are vested in the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York, to be hereafter ascertained and fixed by the Corporation not exceeding in amount the sum of Seven thousand dollars per annum, nor less in amount than the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars per annum to be paid to him quarterly

On motion, the Board proceeded to choose by ballot the persons to fill the offices of Deputy Clerks of the markets under the preceding ordinance, when the following persons were duly chosen.

Ordered, that William Wilmerding be employed by the Comptroller as auctioneer to dispose of the lots of the Corporation directed, at a late meeting, to be sold; and that he receive as auction fees on said sales, two dollars per lot.

On motion, resolved, that permission be given to Augustus Wright in Beekman Street and to the inhabitants in Chamber Street from the Broadway to Church Street to extend the side walks in the street, agreeably to the regulation as at present established

Ordered, that the Clerk of the Board procure a map of the city and

a copy of the Laws and ordinances and of the charter for their Honours the Mayor and Recorder.

Also ordered, that the Clerk of the Common Council, under the direction of the Mayor procure a suitable desk for the Mayor's Office and Common Council Chamber, and the silver oar (or badge) appertaining to the Mayor as Water Bailiff of this city

A petition from a number of inhabitants praying, that a block of houses in Pearl Street, at the [3] junction of Stone & Pearl Streets might be removed and a remonstrance against such measure, signed by Peter Goelett and the other proprietors of said houses were severally read and referred to a committee consisting of the Alderman & Assistant of the 3^d ward and Alderman Bingham

A petition from sundry farmers inhabitants of King's County, praying the Board to make further regulations respecting the sale of manure was read and referred to the Committee on Laws and ordinances to report an ordinance for that purpose, agreeably to the prayer of the petition

A request was received from Joshua Geer to be permitted to construct a vault at N^o 193 William Street and from John Patrick for the same at N^o 7 Pearl Street, which were granted under the direction of the Alderman and Assistant of the respective wards & the Street Commissioner

A petition from Court Went to be appointed a Street Inspector & a recommendation of William Seymour as a Sweeper of the Fly market was received and referred to the Committee on applications.

A petition of John Vanderbelt and of Daniel Baker to receive licence to sell liquors by retail were received & it was ordered, that licences issue to them free from expence to retail liquors until the first day of May next.

A petition of George Duryea for a huckster stand at the Fly Market was received & referred to the Market Committee

A petition was received from George Dominick to be appointed a measurer of lumber, which was granted

A petition of Adrian B. Holmes to be appointed an Assistant to the Street Commissioner was received. Whereupon it was moved, that the Board proceed to appoint by ballot an Assistant to the Street Com-[4]missioner, which was agreed to & upon counting the ballots, it appeared, that Adrian B. Holmes was duly appointed to said office

A petition of Nicholas W. Stuyvesant for remission of Water Lot rent was received & referred to the Comptroller

A petition of John Dowe and Tate & M'Niven for payment of Curb Stone furnished by them for the intersection of Hester & Rynder Street was referred to the Street Commissioner.

A petition from George Codwise Junior was received, stating, that having filled up the water lot granted to him at Burling Slip and being about to build thereon, he found he could not draw a straight line from the South West corner of South Street & Burling Slip to Front Street, so as to *to* obtain his compliment of ground. He, therefore, requested it to be referred to a committee to examine & make such grant to him, as might remedy his inconvenience. Ordered to be referred to the Committee on wharves, slips & piers & the Alderman & Assistant of the 2^d ward & the Street Commissioner

A petition was received from Samuel Barker praying payment for filling in certain lots in Spring Street [and] was referred to the Street Commissioner.

A petition from George Codwise Junior, George Buckmaster, Abraham Legget, & John Youle for grants of Water Lots opposite their ground at Corlaer's Hook was received and referred to the Comptroller

A petition of Charles Mooney for payment for regulating Second Street was received & referred to the Street Commissioner

A request was received from Isaac Auld, Lamp Contractor for an advance of \$500 on account [which] was granted & a warrant ordered to issue immediately

[5] The City Inspector presented the following communication viz "that a lot of ground in Chapel Street between Chamber & Reed Streets has been reported to him by M^r Hardie as in a dangerous situation. A house, which formerly stood upon it has been removed and the cellar is uncovered to the depth of six or seven feet. The Lot, it is said was presented some time since by the Corporation of Trinity Church to the Episcopal Church in Westchester County, by whom it is still owned. As it requires immediate attention, the City Inspector would recommend the following resolution

Resolved, that a fence be erected forthwith in front of Lot N^o 49 in Chappel Street & that the walk be so repaired, as to prevent its being dangerous to passengers ”

The Comptroller presented a communication on the subject of the Corporation Lots near the arsenal and at Old Potter's Field, the first part of which was referred to the Committee on Charity and the latter was laid for further consideration

A petition was received from Adam and Noah Brown, stating, that they had built by contract for the Corporation a dock fronting the public slip opposite Gouverneur's, for which they were to receive \$2495 & were to have the use of the slip, until the money should be paid to them; That they had received but \$430 and that they had been prevented from the use of the slip by the Lessee of the Public Slips. They therefore, prayed relief in the premises. Ordered to be referred to the Comptroller & Street Commissioner

Samuel Cowdrey the late Attorney of the Board communicated, that the cause of Clarkson vs Delamontagnie came on at the late sittings in this city, when the plaintiff was nonsuited on the ground, that the question [6] of the assessment had been decided by a competent tribunal. Ordered, that the communication be filed.

A Letter from Patrick M'Kay, on the subject of his lots at Inclenburgh was received, when the former committee on the Albany Avenue was discharged and this together with the whole subject of those lots at the Inclenburgh was referred to a special committee consisting of Alderman Mesier. Dickenson 7th and Mr Bogardus.

A request from sundry inhabitants to fix a bell on Catharine Market to alarm the inhabitants in cases of fire was referred to the Committee on the Fire Department, with directions to consider also the propriety of fixing bells on Corlaer's Hook & Duane Markets.

The City Inspector reported drafts of ordinances from N^o 5341 to N^o 5385 inclusive for correction of nuisances, which were ordered to be passed

The Market Committee on the petition of Cornelius King for stand N^o 46 Fly Market reported, that, as in the Exchange of the Stalls, no money had been paid and as they had received evidence of the good character of the applicant, they recommend the prayer to be granted, which was agreed to

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of the Trustees

of the Brick Church reported “ that, in the opinion of your Committee, “ Charitable institutions calculated to instruct and instil good principles “ and early habits of industry in poor children merit, in an especial “ manner the patronage of this Board: and without adverting to the “ benefit to be derived from the school, under the care & direction of “ this church, they would recommend, that a grant be made to the “ Trustees of the Brick Presbyterian Church of so much of the tri- “ angular piece of ground situate on the rear of the burying ground of “ said church, as may be required for the purpose of building a school “ house thereon, on *con-* [7] condition, however, that whenever it shall “ be differently appropriated, it shall then revert and become again the “ property of this Board.

building for the Kine Pock institution on the ground adjacent to the Free School, or whether some more suitable place may not be selected

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition & remonstrance on the subject of filling up Coentie's Slip reported, "That having viewed the situation of said slip, they are of opinion the filling the same up would not only be injurious to the neighbourhood; but a considerable public inconvenience. They also find the accommodation on the opposite sides of said slip is by no means equal, that while the residents on the West side enjoy a comfortable and spacious dock to transact their business on, those on the East side are at the hazard of their limbs and lives, confined to a way scarcely sufficient for a single cart. Your Committee, therefore, believe, that the safety of the inhabitants and the accommodation of the trade, which here is very considerable, require, that the Dock on the East side should be widened; and being also informed, that this measure will satisfy the petitioners and be readily acquiesced in by the remonstrators, recommend, that the Dock on the East side of Coentie's Slip be widened to a line to be drawn at such a distance from Blackwell & M'farlane's store and terminating at an angle somewhere between Front and South Streets, so as to make the dock on the East side opposite Panton & Bradford's Store equally wide with the dock on the West side opposite Thomas Storm's store: and as several of the neighbours expect about June next, to commence building, we would suggest the propriety of directing this improvement to be made immediately"

The Attorney of the Board presented the following report, that "a petition was presented by M^r Zophar R. Jarvis, on the 18th September 1809, stating that a house owned by David Dunham stood in Broadway near the upper part of it, and wishing the interference of the Board. An order was then made, that the same should be referred to the then Counsel & Attorney of the Board, directing them to take measures to abate the nuisance. On the 6th November following the Counsel & Attorney reported, that they had examined the premises; but owing to the want of a survey pointing out the extent of the encroachment, they could not proceed and recommended, that the Street

Commissioner forthwith furnish them with the same. No survey was ever made by the then Street Commissioner John S. Hunn; but one has lately been made by the present Street Commissioner. I wish the order of the Board, in relation to the subject, as Mr Jarvis is anxious to have the same removed."

Whereupon the Attorney was ordered to carry into effect the former resolution of this Board, ordering the nuisance to be abated.

The Committee on the Fire Department, to whom was referred the account of Abel W. Hardenbrook for two new engines reported, "That they have caused an alteration to be made in said account, which specifies the size of the Engines and quantity of Leader belonging to each. They find, the engines have been furnished, agreeable to the directions of the last and present Board. They, therefore, recommend that a warrant issue for the payment of the same."

The ordinance passed at the last meeting of the Board for paving Delancey Street was now called up and Ezekiel Bishop, Solomon Wheeler, Abraham Hart, Stephen Kingsland & Robert Coles were appointed assessors.

The ordinance for the assessment of the expences of Roosevelt Street drain was now called up & Nehemiah Allen, Garrit B. Abeel, James Smith, George Newbold, & William Cock were appointed assessors.

The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition of the inhabitants of Broome and Mulberry Streets, respecting obstructions, which prevent the water from flowing off the said street presented an ordinance for remedying the evil, which ordinance was passed. The Assessors named viz Christopher Beakley, John P. Ritter, George Cleland, Ebenezer Clark and Benjamin Sands were to lie over till the next meeting of the Board.

The Street Commissioner on the offer of Higgins & Parks to contract for filling in the dock at Peck Slip, reported in favour of making the contract, which was agreed to and the Street Commissioner was directed to make the contract.

The Street Commissioner presented an ordinance for regulating & paving Mulberry Street from Broome to Prince Streets, which was passed. The assessors named viz Christopher Beakley, John P Ritter, George Cleland, Ebenezer Clark, and Benjamin Sands to lie over till the next meeting of the Board.

The Committee on Laws & ordinances presented a draft of an ordinance, entitled "a law for the appointment of Superintendants of streets and for other purposes, which having been read was in the words following

[11] A Law

for the appointment of Superintendants of Streets and for other purposes. Passed April 9th 1810.

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That from and after the passing of this ordinance, two discreet and industrious persons of honest fame shall be appointed by the Common Council to be called and known by the name of Superintendants shall be assigned to each of the districts hereinafter established.

2^d And be it further ordained, that the city be divided into two districts for the purposes intended by this ordinance, by a line to begin at the East river at the Fly Market Slip and to run up the said slip, to and through Maiden Lane to the Broadway and up Broadway to the Old Highway leading to King's Bridge and thence along the same to Bellevue Lane and thence along the said lane to the East River, all that part of the said city lying between the said line and the East River to be called the Eastern District, and to include therein the Fly Market Slip and Maiden Lane and the residue of the said city including Broadway, to be called the Western District

3^d And be it further ordained, that it shall be the duty of each of the said superintendants under the direction of the Street Committee for and on account of this Board to hire and employ so many assistants, scavengers and other persons as may be necessary to sweep the heads of slips and other public grounds and to take charge of the mud machines and superintend the cleaning of the said slips and to clean, carry away and sell all such filth, dirt and rubbish as may be found in the streets within their respective districts and to provide suitable places of deposit for the reception of the said filth, dirt and rubbish [12] rubbish until it can be sold and removed; and it shall be the duty of each of the said Superintendants respectively to keep or cause to be kept regular accounts of his expenditures and sales and, at least once

in every year or oftener, if he shall be thereunto required settle the same and lay before the Common Council such statement thereof as will enable them to ascertain the sums of money, which shall have been expended on all the principal objects in his department and likewise the amount of sales. And further it shall be the duty of each of the said superintendants to examine into and direct the prosecution of all penalties incurred for breaches of this ordinance within his district, and generally to perform such other duties in relation to his office as may, from time to time, be assigned to him by the Common Council

4th And be it further ordained, that each of the said superintendants of streets, before he shall enter upon the duties of his office, shall take an oath before the Mayor or Recorder of the city well & faithfully to perform the duties thereof

5th And be it further ordained, that each of the said superintendants shall give security in the penal sum of five thousand dollars, conditioned, that the Corporation shall not sustain any loss by his improper or unfaithful application of their monies and to account for the same, when thereunto required

6th And be it further ordained, that the said Superintendants of streets shall each receive, as a compensation for his services, such sum as shall hereafter be allowed by the Common Council

7th And be it further ordained, that the owner or occupant of each and every house or other building or lot or lots of ground in the city and adjoining to any street, which is or shall be paved, shall, twice in every week upon the days herein after prescribed (until otherwise [13] ordered by the Common Council of this city) before the hour of ten in the morning, cause all the dirt and filth in their respective houses, cellars, alleys, yards, and lots to be brought out into the street opposite to their respective buildings and lots of ground and shall cause all the dirt and filth in the said streets as far as the middle of the same and the gutter or kennel thereof opposite as aforesaid to such buildings and lots to be swept, scraped and collected together in heaps in the middle of the same, in order that such dirt and filth may, from time to time, be removed by the persons, who are or may be employed for that purpose by the superintendant of streets for the district, within which the said buildings and lots respectively may be situate, under the penalty of two dollars for each neglect; and it is hereby further ordained, that each and every occupant of any house or other building shall be severally liable to pay the penalty herein before mentioned

8th And be it further ordained, that the person having charge of

any church, or other place of public worship, College, school, hospital, jail, Alms House, prison or cemetery adjoining to any of the paved streets shall, in like manner, cause so much of the said streets, gutters and kennels as may be opposite thereto and to the lots of land appertaining to the same to be swept, scraped and cleansed and the dirt and the filth thereof collected and laid in heaps twice in every week on the days herein after mentioned under the penalty of three dollars for each neglect.

9th And be it further ordained, that the duties aforesaid shall be performed by the owners and occupants and persons having the charge as aforesaid of houses and other buildings and lots of ground adjoining to the Broadway in the said city or situate to the Westward thereof and to the Southward of Murray Street and that part of the said city, which lies between the West side of George Street, Ferry Street and Peck Slip [14] on the West & the East side of James's Street and the New Slip on the East, Chatham Street on the North and the East River on the South, which shall be called the First Division on every Monday & Thursday; and that the owners or occupants having the charge as aforesaid of houses and other buildings and lots of ground in the said city situate to the Southward of Broadway and to the Westward of the Easterly side of George Street, Ferry Street and Peck Slip aforesaid, which shall be called the Second Division shall perform the duties required of them as aforesaid, on every Tuesday and Friday; and that the owners or occupants or other persons having the charge of houses and other buildings and lots of ground in all other parts of the said city, which shall compose the Third Division shall perform the said duties on every Wednesday & Saturday in every week

10th And be it further ordained, that before they begin to the sweeping of the said streets, they shall cause the same to be sufficiently sprinkled with water, under the penalty of two dollars for every neglect.

11th And be it further ordained, that carts shall be employed for the purpose of collecting and removing all offals, garbage, and other filthy substances from the cellars, yards and kitchens in the said city and that the persons employed by the Superintendants respectively to drive the said carts shall give notice at proper intervals of their approach by the ringing of a bell and shall receive all such offals and garbage, as may be delivered at the carts; And further that the said superintendants respectively, in removing the sweepings of the streets,

manure and other filth or rubbish do either cause the same cart to take away and remove the whole thereof at one time or otherwise employ and direct two or more carts to pass through [15] the same street at the same time, one or more whereof shall take up the manure, and another or others shall remove all other substances; or that the whole of one street or part of a street shall be fully cleaned at the same time. And it is hereby further ordained, that the inhabitants of the said city shall, from time to time, deliver to such scavengers or other persons employed as aforesaid all such offals and garbage, as may be in their respective buildings, kitchens, cellars or yards under the penalty of one dollar for each neglect or refusal so to do.

12th And be it further ordained, that no person shall cast or lay in any street, lane or alley in the said city any oysters, clams or other shell fish, shells of any kind, ashes, cinders, manure, offals, garbage, vegetables, rubbish, soil, straw, hay, litter, broken glass or earthen ware, shavings, paper or dirt, except on the days and before the hour above prescribed for the sweeping and cleaning of the streets in the several parts of the said city above designated or for the purpose of immediate removal and that no person shall obstruct any of the Common Sewers, drains or kennels of the said city under the penalty of two dollars for every offence.

14th* And be it further ordained, that every cart employed by the said Superintendants respectively for the purpose aforesaid, shall have a tight box, the sides and forepart of which shall be two feet and the tail board not less than sixteen inches high and shall have the words Dirt Cart and its number painted distinctly in black letters on the outside of the side board; and no scavenger or cartman employed by the said superintendants respectively shall drive or use any cart for the purposes aforesaid or any of them unless the same shall be constructed & marked as aforesaid, under the penalty of two dol^s for every offence

[16] 13th* And be it further ordained, that it shall be the duty of the Scavengers or persons employed by the said Superintendants respectively to remove and cart away all the dirt and filth, offals and garbage collected in heaps as aforesaid, or which may be delivered, to such place or places as the said Superintendants respectively shall or may, from time to time appoint, under the penalty of four dollars for every such neglect.

15th And be it further ordained, that no person or persons, except such as are employed by the said Superintendants or one of them shall

take up, carry away or remove any of the dirt or filth from the said street, under the penalty of five dollars for every offence; and if any licensed cartman shall be found guilty thereof, he shall forfeit his licence in addition to the said penalty.

16th And be it further ordained, that the owners or occupants of each house or lot of ground in the said city and the person having the charge of every church, cemetery, jail or other public building and the land thereunto belonging adjoining to any street, that has been or shall be paved, shall within the first four hours between Sunrise and sunset after every fall of snow, or hail or rain, which shall freeze on the side walks and gutters, cause the side walks and gutters to the breadth of one foot opposite such house, building or land to be cleaned off the same, unless the same shall be so congealed, that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, every such owner or occupant shall, within the time aforesaid, cause the side walks to be strewed with ashes, sand or other proper materials to enable persons to walk with safety thereon: And every person offending or being guilty of any neglect in the premises shall forfeit and pay for the first neglect [17] the sum of two dollars and for every hour thereafter, during which such neglect shall continue the further sum of twelve and an half cents for every twenty five feet in length of any side walk or gutter, which shall not be cleaned or not strewed as aforesaid, as the case may be and so in proportion for a greater or less length of side walk or gutter.

17th And be it further ordained, that if any cartman or other person shall take up shavings from any workshop or other building for the purpose of removal & spill or scatter any part thereof in any street of this city, he or they shall pay as a penalty for every load or parcel so carelessly removed the sum of one dollar for each offence

18th And be it further ordained, that it shall not be lawful for any cartman or other person whatsoever, except under the direction of the Superintendants of Streets or one of them and for public uses to deposit or heap manure at any place Southward of a line beginning at the outlet of the swamp of Anthony Lisenard into Hudson's river and running from thence to and along Broome Street to the East River, under the penalty of twenty five dollars for each offence, and the further penalty of one dollar for every twenty four hours, in which the same shall remain so deposited or heaped.

19th And be it further ordained, that it shall not be lawful for any cartman or other person whatsoever except under the direction of the said Superintendants or one of them to deposit or heap manure at any

place to the Southward of a line beginning on the Hudson River, in a line with Hammond Street; thence extending through Hammond Street to Greenwich Lane; thence through Greenwich Lane and Art Street to Bowery Lane; thence through Bowery Lane to North Street; thence through North Street to the East river under the penalty of twenty five dollars for each offence and the [18] further penalty of one dollar for every twenty four hours, in which the same shall remain so deposited or heaped, except for the purposes of cultivating the ground, on which it shall be laid. And further that no manure, filth or sweepings of the Streets, which now is or may hereafter be collected in heaps to the Northward of the line last before mentioned shall at any period, between the first day of May and the first day of December in any year be carted down to any wharf to the Southward of the line above mentioned, unless by the direction of the said Superintendants or one of them, under the penalty of twenty five dollars for each offence.

20th And be it further ordained, that no ship or vessel of any size or description whatsoever shall come into or lay in any public slip in this city without leave of the Superintendant of Streets for the district, wherein the same shall be situate, during the time, that the Mud machine & scow belonging to the public, shall or may be employed in cleansing such slip and removing the filth and mud therefrom. And if any ship or other vessel aforesaid shall or do without leave as aforesaid come into such public slip, in which the said Mud machine and scow shall be so employed the master, owner or persons having charge of such ship or other vessel shall forfeit and pay as a fine twenty five dollars: And further, that if the Master, owner or other person having charge of such ship or other vessel, which shall be in such public slip, in which the said mud machine and scow shall be so employed as aforesaid shall and do neglect or refuse to remove such ship or other vessel, from such public slip, when thereunto required by the said superintendant of the district, wherein the same may be situated, he shall forfeit and pay as a fine twenty five dollars for every twenty four hours and, in that proportion, for a shorter or longer time, such ship or other vessel shall be and remain in such slip

[19] 21st And be it further ordained, that in case the said Superintendants or either of them shall, in the discharge of their or his duties, under this ordinance, take up and remove any sand, clay, brick, stone or other matters, which ought to be removed by the person or persons placing the same in any street, the said person or persons shall forfeit and pay double the usual sum for removing the same

22^d And be it further ordained, that the said superintendants respectively be and they are hereby authorised and required to employ as many persons as may be necessary to sweep and clean the streets and gutters in front of such houses and lots as are uninhabited in the said city, or whose owners or occupants may have temporally retired from said city, and that it shall and may be lawful to and for the said superintendants respectively to collect the proportionate expence thereof from the owner or occupant of every such house and lot, and in default of payment of the same, by any such owner or occupant to prosecute for the same in any court having cognizance thereof

23^d And be it further ordained, that if any offence shall be committed against this law, by any child, apprentice, servant or slave, the penalty in such case shall be recovered from and paid by the parents, master or mistress of the person offending."

On motion to agree to enact the same, it was carried in the affirmative

On motion, the Board proceeded to ballot for another person to fill the office of Superintendent of streets, when it appeared, that Waters Furman was unanimously chosen to that office

On motion, resolved, that the several Fire Engine Companies be authorised to procure a torch for the use of the said companies

The minutes of the last meeting were read & approved.

Letters were received from Samuel M. Hopkins, of the Second ward and George Gardner of the Sixth ward, requesting to be permitted to resign their appointments as Inspectors of the ensuing election. On the question to agree to said request, it passed in the negative

A request was received from John B. Murray for payment of a bond from the Corporation to Miller & Baker for \$2000, which was assigned to him, which bond was for ground taken to open Canal Street & from which was, agreeably to the condition, to be deducted such sum as the land of Miller and Baker in said street, should be assessed for opening the same. On motion, resolved, that it is not expedient, at present, to comply with the request of the petitioner.

A petition of John Brown, praying remission of *of* a penalty for selling liquor without licence was received and referred to the Attorney of the Board.

A petition was also received from Daniel Corwin stating, that he had lately married Mary Emmons widow, who had taken out licence to sell liquor by [22] retail, and under that licence, he had supposed himself authorised to sell; but that the attorney of the Board had informed him, that he had incurred the penalty inflicted by the law for selling liquor without licence and that he had paid said penalty. The Committee, to whom was referred the report of the Attorney of the Board on the petition of B. C. Stevenson and on the petition of William G. Hopper reported, that the Corporation ought not to give the Collector any directions on the subject of said assessment, which report was agreed to

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of George Codwise junior reported,

“That they have taken into consideration the several matters referred to in the said petition & have examined the situation of the premises therein mentioned, and are of opinion, that it will be proper to permit the petitioner to run his line paralel to Burling Slip through to Front Street, in the same direction, that the foundation to his store, at the corner of Burling Slip and South Street, is now laid; upon condition, that he pay to the Corporation for the additional ground, which he shall gain by the same, at and after the rate, for every square foot, which was required of Peter Schermerhorn for the angle of ground, which he lately bought of the Corporation on Beekman Slip. And

that on payment for the said ground, he receive a grant thereof from the Corporation. If the principle of this report should be adopted, it will still leave on the East side of Burling Slip, a street for public use of twenty five feet wide, between the said slip and M^r Codwise's line, as herein recommended, according to the condition of the grant made to him.

Your Committee also further beg leave to represent, that while attending to the matters above referred to them, they discovered, that after leaving the space of Eighty four feet, required for Beekman Slip, and of twenty five feet, required for the Street on the North side of Burling Slip, there is between [27] the permanent line of M^r Schermerhorn's store, at the corner of Beekman Slip and South Street & the permanent line of M^r Codwise's Store, at the corner of South Street and Burling slip, a surplus of eight inches of ground on South Street, extending thence back to a point at Front Street, over & above the whole quantity of ground granted to Messieurs Schermerhorn and Codwise respectively; for which eight inches the Corporation are entitled to demand a reasonable compensation. The ordinance passed at the last meeting of the Board for regulating and paving Mulberry St^t from Grand to Prince Streets and for regulating Mulberry Street from Grand to Broome Streets were called up & passed and Christopher Beakley, John P. Ritter George Cleland, Ebenezer Clark and Benjamin Sands were appointed assessors.

The Committee on the petition against digging out Grand Street presented a report, the consideration of which was postponed.

The Street Commissioner on the petition of Samuel Barker for payment of a balance for filling in sunken lots at Spring Street reported, that the contract on M^r Barker's part was complied with and that there was due to him \$261 $7\frac{5}{100}$; but as the collector had made no return, he could not ascertain what sum remained to be collected.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the petition of Nicholas W. Stuyvesant. reported, that the facts with respect to the said petition are these

“ On the 10th July last, a petition was received from Mr Stuyvesant for a grant in front of his property on the East River in the Tenth ward, which was referred to the Subscriber. For the want of a map to ascertain the dimensions of the lot applied for, a report was not made till the 18th September, when a grant was recommended to be issued ”

“ This report was referred to a committee, consisting of Aldermen Bingham, Minthorne, and Dickinson, who on the 9th October following, recommended, that a grant should be made to Mr Stuyvesant, re-

No intimation was given, that the petitioner wanted to commence improving his property in the course of the last season; and it is presumed, that no inconvenience has arisen on that account, from the want of a grant.

The practice has uniformly been, to make the first payment of quit rent fall due on the 1st day of May, subsequent to the date of the grant. The following [35] instances are cited among others, which appear on the backs of record.

A grant to John J. Astor dated 16th April 1806, the payment due the 1st of May following

One to William Walton of the same date and terms

Another to Gerard Walton 14th April 1806, on the like conditions

These are all later than the one to M^r Stuyvesant, which bears date the seventh March last. Several are to be found dated late in the month of February, and all conditioned for the first payment, falling due, the following May. From the above statement, the Board will see, that the Subscriber has pursued the practice of his predecessors in this respect

Whereupon it was moved, that the rent be remitted to M^r Stuyvesant until the 9th day of October, that being the day, on which the Board ordered a grant to M^r Stuyvesant. The question having been taken thereon, it was carried in the affirmative

The Comptroller reported, that he had examined the accounts of the Superintendent of the Alms House for the quarter ending the 31st March and that there appeared to be a balance due the Superintendent of \$2011.⁹³/₁₀₀.

The Street Commissioner reported, that Garret B. Abeel and George Newbold declined serving as Assessors for Roosevelt Street drain, whereupon Strong Sturges and James Smith were appointed in their places.

The Street Commissioner reported, that M^r Dominick Lynch had not complied with the *ordinan-* [36] ordinances directing him to fill in

his lots at the Collect. Whereupon the Attorney of the Board was directed to prosecute M^r Lynch for breach of the said ordinances.

The Street Commissioner also presented an ordinance for regulating Bayard Street from Orange to Collect Street, which was passed and Ezekiel Bishop, Solomon Wheeler, Abraham Hart, Stephen Kingsland, and Robert Coles were appointed assessors

The Street Commissioner presented the assessment for regulating Green Street, which was confirmed and Edward Moran was appointed Collector.

A return was received from the Police office that Captain Hays had reported, that he had suspended Garrit Ackerman for sleeping on his post; that Captain Farrington has suspended Jacob Wheeler & Captain Goodheart had suspended James Fowler for the like offences. Captain Farrington also reported, that William Murphy had left his watch and he recommended Elijah Haines in his place. Ordered that the report be referred to the Watch Committee.

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition for opening Morton Street, reported, that having viewed the ground & finding, that it would be a public convenience to have said street opened and particularly to the inhabitants of the village of Greenwich, they recommended that Morton Street be opened, which report was agreed to and the Street Commissioner directed to take measures for that purpose

The Committee on Laws agreeably to direction reported a law regulating the sale of manure, &c. the consideration of which was postponed till the next meeting.

The Committee on the petition of proprietors at Crane wharf reported. "that they understand the practice of the board to have been & which they conceive remains, that no pier is to be permitted to be built, unless two thirds of the proprietors of lots affected thereby petition [37] for the piers and that number not petitioning in this case, the Committee recommend, that the prayer of the petition be not granted.

A Law for further regulating the public slips

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that no person or

persons whatsoever shall bring into any of the public docks, wharves, piers or slips of this city or continue therein, the wreck of any ship, boat or vessel of any description whatsoever, whereby the said public docks or slips shall be incommoded, or the entrance or departure of any ship or vessel or small craft in any wise incommoded, under the penalty of twenty five dollars. And be it further ordained, that for every day the wreck of any ship or vessel after being brought into any public dock, wharf, pier or slip shall continue or remain in the said public docks, the owner or the person having charge of the same shall forfeit the sum of ten dollars

which ordinance was passed

On motion resolved, that his Honour the Mayor be authorized to issue tavern licences to be in force until the 1st day of May next to such persons as he shall think proper free from expence

Permission was given to John Le Maire to construct a vault in front of his lots N^o 36 & 38 Barclay Street under the direction of the Alderman and Assistant of the ward and the Street Commissioner

A petition was received from Robert Bird, praying, that the limits of the law restraining the practice of swimming at certain hours may be extended to the ground owned by Governor Clinton on the Hudson River, which was agreed to.

A petition of Thomas Hobbs, praying permission to sell meat at a stand in Hester Street was received and referred to the Market Committee with directions to enquire, whether there are not persons now selling at stands in the Street, without any licence from the board.

A remonstrance of the Inhabitants of the Tenth Ward against the deposit of manure in certain parts of the ward was received and referred to the City Inspector.

A request was received from Elbert Anderson Junior, that the lease of Lot N^o 21 in Augustus Street might be assigned to him by Archibald Taylor and that said lease might be renewed to him for twenty one years. Ordered to be referred to the Comptroller.

A petition of sundry proprietors at Albany Basin, requesting the Corporation to unite with them in extending piers on each side of the basin was received and referred to the Committee on wharves, slips and piers.

A remonstrance against the projection of the Store N^o 194 Front Street was received from sundry inhabitants and was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Second ward and the Street Commissioner.

A petition of Peter Thorp for an office was received and referred to the Committee on applications with a request to report thereon at the next meeting of the Board

The Committee, on the several petitions of Edward Laight and others of Christian Bergh and of George Codwise Junior and others for water grants at Corlaer's Hook presented reports, which were referred for further consideration to the Alderman and Assistant of the Seventh Ward, the Comptroller and Street Commissioner

The Committee on the Fire Department, to whom was referred the petition of Fire Engine Company N^o 32 praying an addition of two men and of Fire Engine Company N^o 6. praying for an addition of four men and an additional length of leader reported, that, in their opinion the prayers of the several petitions ought to be granted, which was agreed to.

[43] The Committee on the petition of John K. Furman reported, "that the Act relative to the election of Charter officers authorizes the Inspectors to appoint one clerk only and directs, that he shall be allowed for his services two dollars per day; that it appears Adolph L.

DeGrove was regularly appointed Clerk of the election & has accordingly received payment for his services as such; therefore, in the opinion of your committee M^r Furman's claim on the board cannot be allowed"

The Comptroller laid before the Board an account current, which he had received from John S. Hunn the late Street Commissioner. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Committee on assessments

The Comptroller presented a communication to the Board on the subject of the expences of Clerks, Marshalls &c at the elections, which was ordered to be referred to the Finance Committee to report regulations on the subject.

The Comptroller, on the petition of Gilbert Coutant for permission to transfer the lease of N^o 118 Chatham Street to Joseph Rose, reported in favour of the petition, on condition, that M^r Rose take out his lease within two weeks from the 1st day of May next, which was agreed to

On motion, resolved, that the Watch Committee be directed to enquire into the propriety of reducing the number of watchmen in the several Watch Districts & also into the propriety of increasing the compensation to the Night Watch, and that they report at the next meeting of the Board

On motion, resolved, that the Chief Engineer be directed to report to the Board the number of Engines belonging to the Corporation, the size of the Chambers, the quantity of leader, the number of men, the names of the foremen of each engine and the places where they *respect-* [44] respectively stand together with the ages of them, and also the number and condition of such of the Fire Engines as are now unfit for use and where the same are deposited together with the implements belonging to them and generally all the implements appertaining and belonging to them respectively and such other information, as he shall think useful to the Board.

On motion, resolved, that it shall not be lawful for any person or persons wilfully to break down or in any other way to injure any tree or trees in any of the public streets, under the penalty of five dollars for each offence; and that the Committee on Laws and ordinances be directed to bring in an ordinance for the purpose

The law to regulate the sale of manure &c, which was laid over last

meeting was now called up and having been read by paragraphs was passed in the words following

A Law

to regulate the sale and cartage of manure, sand and clay and the inspection of manure exported from the City of New York, passed April 30th 1810

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, that all manure shall be sold by the cart or waggon load and that each load shall contain sixteen bushels, heaped measure

2^d And be it further ordained, that all manure, sand or clay shall be carted in close boxes with a tail board, at least sixteen inches high and well secured, and no person shall cart or sell any manure, sand or clay in any other manner than is by this law prescribed, under the penalty of five dollars for each load or part of a load, which he shall so cart.

3^d And be it further ordained, that, for the better carrying into execution the above regulations, so far as regards manure to be exported out of this city, there shall from time to time be such and so many persons [45] appointed in the said city of New York, as the Common Council shall think proper to inspect the loading of manure sold or intended for sale and to be exported as aforesaid, whose duty it shall be to see that each cart or waggon load of manure intended to be exported out of the said city, on board of any boat sloop, pettiauger or other vessel be carted in close boxes constructed in manner as aforesaid and contain the aforesaid quantity of sixteen bushels heaped measure, that the said inspectors respectively shall be duly sworn to execute the duties of their office with fidelity and impartiality; that their respective judgment in the premises shall be conclusive and that the said inspectors shall have for their trouble for each load of manure by them inspected three cents and in the same proportion for a greater quantity, the one third part thereof to be paid by the seller and the other two third parts thereof by the buyer of the said manure; and it shall also be the duty of each of the said Inspectors to keep a book, in which he shall make an entry of each load of manure by him inspected as aforesaid designating therein the quantity inspected for individuals & the quantity inspected for the superintendants of streets and shall once in every month make and render a full and true account and return of the number of loads of manure so inspected by him to the office of the City Inspector

4th And be it further ordained, that the Boatman or other purchaser of the manure shall be accountable to the Inspectors for the whole fees of inspection and shall and may deduct and retain the one third part of the said fees of inspection from the price or purchase money to be paid for the said manure, and it shall also be the duty of each of the said Inspectors, who shall inspect any load or loads of manure intended to be loaded or put on board of any boat, sloop, pettiauger or other vessel to give to the cartman or other [46] person, who shall cart the same, or to the Boatman or purchaser, who shall receive the same, a certificate or other voucher to shew, that the same has been duly inspected, which certificate or voucher, when given to the carman or other person, who shall cart the same, shall be delivered to the Boatman; and it shall also be the duty of such Inspector to give to the Boatman or person having the command or charge of such boat, sloop, pettiauger or other vessel and for which such certificates or other vouchers shall be produced, and delivered to such inspectors as aforesaid.

5th And be it further ordained, that if any Carman or other person shall cart and deliver to any boatman or purchaser any manure, which shall have been sold or may be intended for sale and to be exported as aforesaid before the same shall be duly inspected as aforesaid, he shall for every load so carted, forfeit the sum of fifty cents, and that if any Boatman or other person shall receive on board of any boat, pettiauger sloop or other vessel, any such manure before the same shall be inspected as aforesaid, he shall, for every load of uninspected manure so received on board, forfeit the sum of fifty cents and if any boatman or other person having the command or charge of any boat, pettiauger, sloop or other vessel shall depart with such boat, pettiauger, sloop or other vessel, from the said city or from any slip or other place therein, with any such manure on board for the purpose of proceeding or with intent to proceed to any place, when the said manure or any part thereof may be or is intended to be discharged and unloaded without such certificate as aforesaid of the said Inspector or inspectors of the number of loads delivered to and put on board of such said boat, pettiauger, sloop or other vessel, such boatman or person having the command or charge of such boat, pettiauger, sloop or other vessel, shall forfeit the sum of twenty five dollars.

[47] 6th And be it further ordained, that if any Inspector shall, by sickness or otherwise be prevented from attending to the duties of his office in such case, the Mayor of the said city for the time being, or in his absence the recorder shall appoint. one other

fit person in his stead during the sickness or absence of such Inspector.

7th And be it further ordained, that the Attorney of this Board shall be authorised after the recovery and receipt of any penalty under and by virtue of this ordinance, to pay over to the person, who shall give the said attorney such information of any offence against this ordinance, as shall enable the said Attorney to prosecute the said offender to judgment one half part of such penalty so recovered and received

8th And be it further ordained, that the ordinance entitled, "A Law to regulate the sale and cartage of manure, sand and clay in the City of New York" passed January 11th 1808 be and the same is hereby repealed.

The Committee on applications having reported in favour of the appointment of Andres Van Norden Daniel Canniff and Daniel Cotton to the office of Inspectors of manure, they were accordingly appointed as such.

The Committee on Laws presented the following Law, which was passed

A Law

to amend a law entitled "A Law for the appointment of Superintendants of Streets and for other purposes" passed April 30th 1810

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that the ninth section of the law for the appointment of Superintendants of Streets and for other purposes" be so amended, that the division of the said city, as therein designated, be so modified, that the [48] said division be as follows, that is to say, that all that part of the said city adjoining to and on the westerly side of Broadway and the Southward of Murray Street, with all that part of the said city, which lies between Mott Street, Chatham Street, Tryon Row, Cross Street, Reed Street, Elm Street and Prince Street and all that part of the said city, which lies between the West side of Peck Slip, Henry Street and George Streets shall be called the First Division; And all that part of the said city, between the East River and a line running up from the Battery to Prince Street, and thence through Prince Street to Elm Street, including the same and thence down Elm Street, to and through Reed Street, Cross Street, Tryon Row, Chatham Street, Nassau Street and George Street, and thence along the Easterly side of George Street, Ferry Street and Peck Slip shall be called the Second Division and the residue of the said city shall be called the Third Division

On motion, resolved, that the City Inspector, with the approbation of the Alderman and Assistant of the ward designate the place allowable by law, in such ward, where manure may be deposited

The Report of the Ferry Committee on the petition of Abraham R. Lawrence, which was laid for consideration, was now referred back to the Ferry Committee at their request

The Committee on Laws and ordinances reported the following ordinance respecting trees.

A Law

Concerning Trees standing in the streets, passed May 7th 1810

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that no person or persons shall, at any time, hereafter cut down or wilfully break, remove or destroy or, in any way damage or injure any tree or trees standing, or which may at any time hereafter be standing in any public street in the City of New York, without the consent of the Alderman and Assistant of the ward, wherein the same may be, under the penalty of five dollars for each tree so cut down, broken, removed destroyed damaged or injured, to be recovered in any court having cognizance thereof, with costs of suit

Section 2^d And be it further ordained, that if any person, who shall contravene this ordinance, shall be a minor an apprentice, bound servant or slave, his or her parent or *guard-* [54] guardian, master or mistress or owner, as the case may be, shall be deemed liable to pay the penalty so incurred, and shall and may be prosecuted for the same as aforesaid.

Section 3^d And be it further ordained that the Attorney of the Common Council shall be and hereby is authorised after the recovery and receipt of any penalty under and by virtue of this ordinance to pay over to the person, who shall give the said Attorney such information of any offence against this ordinance, as shall enable the said Attorney to prosecute the offender to judgment, the one half of the said penalty so recovered and received "

Whereupon resolved that the said ordinance do pass

The Committee on the petition, respecting piers at Albany Basin presented a report, which was ordered to lie for further consideration

The Committee on the account of Luke Persiany for taking care of the mud machine was read, who reported as their opinion, that the account ought to be paid, which was agreed to, and the Comptroller directed to report a warrant for the same. The remainder of the report of said Committee, as to the further use and management of said machines was referred back to the said committee for further consideration

The Committee, to whom was referred the deed to be given to Miller and Baker for ground, which had been taken for Canal Street, reported a deed, which, in their opinion ought to be given, which was agreed to and ordered to be executed

Certain accounts of the Inspectors of the late election for expences incurred was received & referred to the finance committee

The Street Commissioner & Comptroller, to whom was referred the petition of Mrs Duryea, praying payment of a bond given to her for ground taken for Amity Street, presented a report, which was directed [55] to lie for further consideration

The City Inspector presented a report, stating that the privies in the Bridewell were in an extremely offensive situation, and that in his opinion, a sewer ought to be constructed to carry off the filth of that establishment and of the Alms House. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Sixth ward and the City Inspector

The City Inspector also presented ordinances for correction of sundry nuisances, from N^o 5417 to N^o 5421 which were passed

The Committee on applications reported on the petition of Peter Tharp, that they regretted there was not, at present, any office vacant, to which he could be appointed; but that they would take the first opportunity, which should offer for gratifying his wishes.

The ordinances passed at the last meeting of the Board for regulating South Street and for paving Elizabeth Street were called up and Daniel Smith, Garret Storm, James W. Lent, Benjamin Stephens and John Nitchie Junior were appointed Assessors for the former and John Merritt, Ebenezer Clark, Benjamin Sands, George Cleland and Asa Holden were appointed Assessors for the latter

A report from the Police Office on the city lamps as reported by the Captains of the City Watch was received and referred to the Lamp Committee.

The Committee, to whom the remonstrance against the projection of the store N^o 194. Front Street into the street was referred, reported, that they had viewed the incumbrance and were of opinion, that the prayer of the petition ought to be granted. Whereupon the Street Commissioner and Attorney were directed to take measures to cause the said incumbrance to be removed.

On motion resolved, that all monies, which now are in the hands of the Treasurer of the New City Hall, and which may hereafter be paid to him on account of said building shall be by him deposited to his credit in one of the banks of this city as Treasurer of the New City Hall and that all checks on account of said building shall be subscribed by him as Treasurer of the New City Hall.

To the Chairman of the Canal Committee

Sir,

The Commissioners for laying out Canal Street had the honour to address you a note on the 3^d of February 1810 stating in their opinion some mistake had occurred in your charges against said street, and wishing you to revise and correct the same, since which the Commissioners have not heard from you on the subject. They also addressed you a note on the 12th day of February covering a draft of a deed to be given by the Corporation to the several former owners of the land, not now wanted for the use of Canal Street, which deed the Commissioners have not yet received. The cession of Messieurs Jay and Monroe and Dominick Lynch for ground wanted for Canal Street has not been completed. The Commissioners would further observe, that it has been necessary in order to open Canal Street to take the several buildings, which [60] have been valued by a jury and which should be disposed of in some way before the expences of said street can be ascertained, and the commissioners doubting their authority to sell the same, would suggest the propriety of the Corporation consenting, that the Commissioners should charge the Corporation with one third of such valuation. The Commissioners feel the more confident that the Corporation will deem this just and proper, considering, that the

general law, under which the Corporation open streets, authorises the assessors to charge the corporation with one third of the valuation by a jury of all the buildings, which may be situate in any street to be opened, and it is presumable, that the Law under which the Commissioners act was intended to have been similar; but by some accident, the words do not convey distinctly that authority

The Commissioners addressed you a note on this subject on the 3^d March, since which they have heard nothing from you. You, Sir, will be pleased to lay this communication before the Common Council, that they may take such order on the whole as they may think proper. You will easily perceive the necessity of a speedy attention to these various subjects, as it is impossible for the Commissioners to close their business before every thing here stated is settled.

A petition from the Collectors of taxes, praying a further compensation for collection was received. Whereupon resolved, that this Board cannot interfere in the premises

Leave was given to Joseph Corré, to construct a vault in front of his building in State Street under the direction of the Alderman and Assistant of the first ward and the Street Commissioner

A representation was received from Richard Upson and C^o that upon digging the vault in Broadway, for which the Board had given permission, the earth, on account of the extreme looseness of the soil was constantly caving in, which made the passage of carriages dangerous. They, therefore, requested to prevent the passage of carriages for a few days. Which was agreed to on condition of the permission extending no longer than for the present week

A petition for regulating Lewis Street from Delancey Street 250 feet towards Rivington S^t was received & referred to the Street Commissioner

Petitions of Daniel Woolsey & Walter Allen praying that warrants might issue for collecting a balance due them for sinking piers at Burling Slip and Fly Market Slips were received and ordered to lie for consideration

A petition to regulate Willet Street from Stanton Street to North Street was received & referred [73] to the Street Commissioner

A petition of Joshua Barker, that his Son Joshua Barker Junior might be appointed a Sealer of weights and measures was granted

A petition from Sam^l Lawrance, Levi Coit, and John Murray on the subject of extending the piers at the Albany Basin, wherein they propose doing the same at their own expence, provided the Corporation permit them to receive the wharfage of the same until the Board shall repay to them the expences incurred was received. Whereupon resolved, that the same together with the former petition on this subject & the report of the Committee thereon made at the last meeting be referred to the Committee on wharves, slips and piers

The Attorney of the Board on the several petitions of P. Blandin, G. Champinon & William Slam Junior reported against granting the prayer of said petitioners, which was agreed to.

An objection to the assessment on Collect S^t was received from Leonard Fisher. The Committee, to whom the said subject had been

committed now presented a report. Whereupon it was resolved, that the said assessment, the objections thereto and the said report be referred to M^r Jones Alderman Mesier & M^r Bogardus.

The Street Commissioner represented, that he had been informed, that some hydraulical improvements had been lately made in and about the City of Philadelphia, and for the purpose of viewing the same and making such drafts as might be useful to this city, he requested leave of absence for a few days, which was granted.

The Market Committee, on the petition of Henry Sparling for stall N^o 3 Fly Market reported, that as the stall is vacant and the petitioner of good character [74] they recommend granting to him said stall, which was agreed to

The City Inspector reported ordinances for correction of sundry nuisances from N^o 5428 to N^o 5434 which were passed

The following person was appointed fireman, the Chief Engineer certifying the vacancy.

Asher Martin Shoemaker corner Green & Provost Streets v John S. Dusenbury resigned

A petition of Leonard Lisenard & Alexander L. Stewart for himself and Sarah B. Bache, stating, that the new line of Canal Street naturally varies their water grant & praying a new water grant to correspond, with said Canal Street was received and referred to the Aldermen & Assistants of the 5th & 8th wards the ferry committee and the Street Commissioner.

On motion resolved, that the Clerk of this Board, out of the monies he shall receive, be authorised from time to time to pay such accounts not exceeding \$20, as he shall judge proper, reporting such payments & presenting the vouchers therefor to the Board, weekly.

Your Committee, however, considering the smallness of the sum and feeling disposed to cooperate with the legislature in their laudable and generous views of devoting this institution to the benefit of the medical schools of this city and also to remunerate, as far as practicable, the patriotic contributions of time, talents and labour, which Doctor Hosack has so unceasingly bestowed on this object, recommend, that the quit rent reserved in the Botanic garden be remitted or released, so as to enable Doctor Hosack to comply with the act of the Legislature, which requires a conveyance of the same, should be made free from all incumbrances. All which is submitted

*The Committee on the petition of George Clinton and John M'Kesson & of John M'Kie reported, that the following facts stated in the Comptroller's report they find correct viz "that according to the grant made 18th Nov^r 1773 to the Rector &c of the Episcopal Church, under whom the petitioners hold, there was conveyed 200 feet from low water mark into the river, leaving Greenwich Street 66 feet in breadth along high water mark, also another street of forty† feet from the said street, at high water mark to be called Second Street (at which distance low water mark is deemed.

Likewise another street of 40 feet in breadth at the outward or westernmost part of the 200 feet beyond Low water mark, fronting to Hudson's river, to be called Third Street. It appears, that in consequence of West Street being located, considerably further West, than was formerly contemplated, there is a space not granted in front of the petitioner's Lots, and between the grant, under which they hold, and West Street. Had the pe[r]manent line been established at the end of the 200 feet granted, the proprietors would then have had only a street of forty feet in width, to make agreeably to the terms of the grant.

But in consequence of extending West Street [77] further out, in order to produce uniformity in the range of the permanent line, the applicants will be obliged to build in much deeper water, at a great expense and to make a street of 70 feet wide, besides making and extending Warren Street about 260 feet in length and upwards of 30 feet in width.

From the peculiar circumstances of this case, the subscriber would respectfully state, the facts to the Board, as it may be a question whether it would be just to charge the petitioners any further quit rent, in consequence of the extension of West Street beyond the original line, contemplated to be the permanent boundary "

The Committee, therefore, recommended, that the grant prayed for by the petitioners be issued to them respectively free of any additional quit rent beyond what is reserved by the former grant. Which report as far as related to M^r M'Kie was agreed to. The part relating to Messieurs Clinton & M'Kesson was referred back to the Committee to obtain their consent to remove obstructions from the street.

The committee, to whom was referred the report of the Comptroller on the Election expences reported,

That the act of the legislature for regulating elections provides for a compensation for the services of Clerks, Constables & Marshals, attending elections; but is silent as to the Inspectors. The duties of inspectors being equally arduous and of much greater responsibility [79] than any other officers employed, the Committee can see no reason, why the inspectors should be precluded. In order to regulate

the expences of election, they respectfully offer to the board for their consideration, the following resolutions

A Law

to regulate the driving of horses, carts & carriages in the City of New York. Passed 4th June 1810

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That no person shall ride or drive any horse on a canter or gallop in any of the streets in the City of New York, South of Grand & Vestry Streets and that if any person shall so ride or drive any horse, on a canter or gallop, the person so offending shall forfeit the sum of ten dollars for each and every offence

Section 2^d And be it further ordained, that no person shall drive one horse before another in the manner, commonly called Tandem, otherwise than on a walk in any of the streets in the city of New York, southerly of Grand and Vestry Streets, and that if any person

shall drive one horse before another contrary to this ordinance, the person so offending shall forfeit & pay the sum of ten dollars for each & every offence

Section 3^d And be it further ordained, That no person shall ride or drive any horse or horses, in any waggon, cart carriage or otherwise howsoever, in turning the corner of any street or streets in the City of New York, southerly of Grand & Vestry Streets as aforesaid, otherwise than by riding or driving on a walk in turning every such corner, and that if any person [105] shall ride or drive any horse or horses in turning the corner of any street contrary to this ordinance, the person so offending shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars for each and every offence

Section 4th And be it further ordained, that no person shall ride on horseback nor drive any horse or horses, in any cart, waggon, chair, gig, coach, coachee, sleigh or other carriage whatsoever, in any of the streets of the City of New York, southerly of Grand and Vestry Streets aforesaid, with greater speed than a slow trot or pace, not exceeding at any time the rate of five miles per hour, and that if any person shall ride on horseback or drive with greater speed than as aforesaid, the person offending shall forfeit and pay for each and every offence the sum of ten dollars

Section 5th And be it further ordained, that no person shall ride on horseback, nor drive any coach, coachee, cart, chair, gig or other carriage, in passing any church, or other place of public worship during divine service therein, in any part of the city of New York, southerly of Grand and Vestry Streets, on the Lord's Day called Sunday, otherwise than on a walk, and that if any person shall ride on horse back or drive in passing any church or other place of public worship during divine service therein, contrary to this ordinance, the person so offending shall forfeit and pay for each and every offence the sum of ten dollars. And, that it shall and may be lawful for each congregation in the said city, to cause chains to be put and kept up across the street or streets in front and along side of any place of public worship in the said city, during the time of divine service in the day time on the Lord's Day called Sunday, so as to prevent horses & carriages from passing such place of public worship, during the time of divine service therein as aforesaid

Section 6th And be it further ordained, that if any person offending against this ordinance be an infant, an apprentice, a bound servant or a slave; his, her or their parent or guardian, master or mistress

shall be deemed liable to pay the penalty so incurred, and shall & may [106] *may* be prosecuted for the same.

Section 7th And be it further ordained, that the owner or owners of any horse or horses, with which any person may offend against this ordinance, shall be deemed liable to pay the penalty so incurred unless such owner shall, upon the request of the Attorney of this Board, give all such information to him as may be requisite to a recovery against the person offending

Section 8th And be it further ordained, That from and after the twentieth day of June instant no per[son] shall drive any dray in any of the streets of the city of New York, southerly of Grand & Vestry Streets aforesaid, unless the same be numbered in such manner as the Mayor shall direct, and the number thereof registered in the office of the Mayor, together with the name of the owner of such dray, and that if any person shall drive any dray contrary to this ordinance, he shall forfeit and pay ten dollars for each offence

Section 9th And be it further ordained, that no person shall drive any horse or horses in any dray in any of the Streets of New York, southerly of Grand & Vestry Streets aforesaid, otherwise than on a walk, under the penalty of ten dollars for each and every offence

Section 10th And be it further ordained, That no person shall carry or cart any timber, plank or poles, exceeding the length of thirty five feet, upon a single cart in any of the Streets in the city of New York southerly of Grand and Vestry streets aforesaid; and that if any person shall cart any timber, plank or poles exceeding the length aforesaid, in or upon any cart, the person so offending shall forfeit the sum of ten dollars for each offence

Section 11th And be it further ordained. That it shall be the duty of all constables and marshals & the foreman of each class of cartmen in this city to give such information to the Attorney of the Corporation of offences against this ordinance, as come to his knowledge, as may [107] enable the said Attorney to prosecute them to conviction; and that if any constable, marshal or foreman of any class of cartmen, shall neglect or refuse to give such information as may be in his power, or shall in any wise be negligent in the execution of this ordinance, he shall for each offence, forfeit and pay the sum of twenty dollars

Section 12th And be it further ordained, that the attorney of this Board, be authorised after the receipt of any penalty under this ordinance, to pay over to the person giving such information as shall enable him to prosecute any person to conviction, one half part of such penalty.

The following ordinance was proposed and having been read was passed in the words following

“A Law to amend a law entitled a law for the appointment of a Street Commissioner, and to regulate the paving and keeping in repair and to prevent obstructions in the City of New York

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that it shall not be lawful for any cartman or other person to drive or back any horse or cart or any wheel carriage of burthen or pleasure on the foot path or walk of any street, nor shall any owner or occupant of any store or house permit any cart or other wheel carriage to be driven or otherwise to pass or go over or upon the foot path or walk of any street, opposite to the store, house, yard or premises of such owner or occupant for the purpose of loading or unloading such cart or other wheel carriage or for any other purpose whatever under the penalty of five dollars for every offence and further, if any cartman or other person aforesaid shall break or otherwise injure any such foot path or walk, he or she shall within twenty four hours thereafter cause the same to be well and sufficiently repaired and amended on pain of forfeiting five Dollars.

Section 2^d And be it further ordained, that the 14th section of the law, to which this is an amendment be and the [108] same is hereby repealed

The following ordinance was proposed and having been read was passed in the words following

A Law to amend the law entitled “A Law to regulate the sale of fire wood, for the appointment of Inspectors thereof, and for the division of the City into inspection districts

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that no Inspector of fire wood shall inspect any wood for any cartman, whose cart shall not have the number thereof fairly painted thereon in the manner required by law, and that if any inspector shall inspect any load of wood for any cartman contrary to this ordinance, he shall for each offence forfeit the sum of five dollars.

An ordinance was passed in the following words

A Law

to prevent the vending or exposing for sale tin plate ware in any of the public streets or slips in the city of New York

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that no person or

persons whatsoever shall from and after the first day of July next sell or expose for sale any tin plate ware of any kind or description whatever, in any of the public streets or slips in the city of New York, and that if any person shall sell or expose to sale any tin plate ware contrary to this ordinance, the person or persons so offending shall forfeit & pay the sum of ten dollars for each & every offence. Provided Nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall prevent any person from disposing of tin plate ware on board of any vessel, by the whole sale, nor to prevent any person or persons from selling or exposing to sale, tinplate ware in front of his, her or their shop or manufactory

[109] A resolution was presented respecting licensing minors as cartmen, which passed in the negative

The following ordinance was then presented

“ A Law

to authorise the licensing of minors as cartmen in certain cases.

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that the Mayor be and he is hereby authorised to issue licences for cartmen to such minors, as the board shall from time to time direct and to take in all such cases a bond from a good and sufficient person to the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York, as security for such minor's good behaviour as a cartman, with condition to pay such damages, as may be sustained by any person or persons employing such minor in his capacity as a cartman”

entitled a law to amend "A Law to regulate the sale of manure, sand and clay in the City of New York

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that so much of the said Law hereby amended as requires each load of manure to be inspected shall be applicable only to the public manure

Section 2^d And be it further ordained, that so much of the said law as requires each load of manure to contain sixteen bushels be repealed and that instead thereof each load of the public manure shall contain fourteen bushels.

The Lamp Committee presented the following viz "that having taken into consideration the proposals of the several candidates who have offered to light the city lamps for the ensuing year, they recommend, Alexander Andrews as a proper person to contract for the first Division or Western District, he being willing to undertake the same at nine dollars each lamp per annum. As it is probable the improved burners will be in operation in the course of two months, and as Mr Andrews had undertaken to import them, we think this will give him an opportunity to make a fair experiment. The Contractor is, however, to understand, (whoever he may be) that the penalty for every default is to be rigidly enforced. The Lamp Committee desirous to improve that department, propose to devote a considerable portion of time to attain so desirable an object.

For the Eastern division, or what may be called the Second District, the Committee beg leave to suggest to the Board the propriety of having that part of the society lighted at the expence of the Corporation, [111] under the direction of a person to be selected by ballot, as a Superintendant with a salary not to exceed three hundred pounds per annum. Should this project meet the approbation of the Common Council, a fair experiment may then be made, at the close of the year, which plan will best promote the public good.'

Resolved, that the ground in front of the United States arsenal be levelled and regulated under the direction of the Road Committee, and that they be authorised to dispose of the old building remaining thereon and to have so much of the said ground inclosed by an ornamental fence and planted with trees, as they may think proper

The Watch Committee, on the petition of James D. Bissett to be paid for a house, corner of Beach and [112] and Chapel Streets, which the late Watch Committee had purchased of him, reported, that the facts stated by M^r Bissett are true & therefore recommend; that a warrant issue to him for \$152 for payment of the same, which was agreed to

The assistant of the 4th ward, in the absence of Alderman Roosevelt, to whom with him, was referred the petition of the Inhabitants of Jacob & Frankfort Streets reported, that, in his opinion, a drain or common sewer was absolutely necessary to carry off the waters from the cellars in Jacob & Frankfort Streets and, therefore, recommended, that the street Commissioner take immediate measures to have one constructed, which was agreed to.

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Patrick M'Kay reported

That M^r M'Kay purchased at the Incleburgh sales lots N^o 2. 52. 58 for the sum of five thousand one hundred and ninety dollars and paid thereon the *the* sum of three thousand two hundred and forty three dollars and seventy five cents; that, at the time of sale he had reason to believe, that the streets designated upon the map would be opened in a convenient time; that the committee believe the property brought a great price; much more than it would have brought, had

not the purchasers been induced to believe the streets would have been opened by the Board. Your committee believe one year from the time of sale to be a reasonable time to have had the streets opened. Your Committee are, therefore, of opinion, that the said Patrick M'Kay has a just and reasonable claim against this Board and advise, that he be allowed interest upon the sum advanced by him after the expiration of one year from the time of payment

Resolved, that two sunken lots, situate on Orange Street and adjoining the premises of Solomon Wheeler be filled up at the public expence and that the charges thereof shall be a lien on the property

Which report was agreed to & referred to the City Inspector to be carried into execution.

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition for the removal of certain incumbrances from Dover Street presented a report, which was referred to the attorney of the Board to investigate the facts and to report a statement to the Board

The Committee, to whom it was referred to consider and report the proper mode of certifying and transmitting to the Clerk of the County the names of Jurors in conformity to the Act entitled " An Act for regulating Trials of issues and returning able and sufficient jurors " passed 31st March 1801, respectfully report, that by the 13th section of the 3^d act

It is made the duty of the Common Council, once at least in every year to cause the names of each person residing in the City of New York and qualified and of sufficient ability and understanding to serve on juries in the several Courts mentioned in the said act, and not contained in the boxes in the Clerk's Office with their places of abode and additions, to be certified in writing & transmitted to the [128] *to the* Clerk of the County. The frequent changes that take place in the residence and in the qualifications of persons in this city, the accession

of those, who, from time to time, become qualified to serve on juries, the exemption of others from serving occasioned by age or by privilege and the fluctuations of the latter exemption, must render a list of jurors formed by the personal knowledge and information of the members of the Common Council with no other aid than the Assessors Books, liable to great deficiencies and errors. It is, by an actual census alone taken with care and diligence & with an eye to the object of it, that a full & correct list of persons qualified to serve on juries can be made and the certificate required by the act aforesaid given by the Board.

It may not be necessary, that such census be annually taken; the books of the Assessors may be a sufficient guide for perhaps two or three years; but the errors and omissions inseparable from a list made up in that way must be occasionally corrected by an actual enumeration made for the purpose. The last Census of Jurors was taken in the year 1806. Since that period the list of names, which have been certified & returned to the Clerk as persons qualified & of sufficient ability, and understanding to serve as jurors have been found as the Committee understand from the information of the members of the Common Council and the books of the Assessors without any actual enumeration. And the consequences (as the Committee are informed) have been, that the panels drawn from the boxes to the courts have now become so deficient of qualified jurors as to be a matter of serious complaint. The Committee are, therefore, of opinion, that a full & faithful compliance with the above mentioned section of [129] the act above referred to requires, that an actual census should be adopted upon the present occasion, as the proper mode of ascertaining the names of the persons qualified as Jurors, & submit to the consideration of the Common Council the following resolutions on the subject

Resolved, that a census be taken of the persons residing in the city of New York and qualified and of sufficient ability and understanding to serve on juries in the several courts mentioned in the act entitled "An act for regulating trials of Juries and the returning able & sufficient jurors" passed the 31st March 1801; and that two fit and discreet persons be appointed in each ward of the said city to take the census in such ward accordingly

Resolved, that it shall be the duty of the persons appointed to take the said census to make a return in writing to the Common Council within sixty days after their appointment, which said return shall contain the names of all the persons residing in the ward and qualified to

serve on juries, with their additions & places of abode, ages and special exemptions from serving on Juries, with the cause of such exemptions in separate columns, with an additional column containing the names of all persons, who are over the age of sixty years.

which report was agreed to and it was referred to the same committee and the City Inspector to prepare proper forms for making said lists

The Committee, on wharves, slips & piers, to whom was referred the case of Charlotte Slip reported "that ordinances have been passed by the [*128] Common Council, directing a wharf to be sunk and made on each side of the said slip; that the wharf on the Northerly side of the same has been sunk and made by the proprietors of lots who were directed by the said ordinances to sink and make the same; but that the proprietors of lots and premises to the Southward of the said slip, who were required by the said ordinance to sink and make the wharf on the Southerly side of the same refuse to do so; and that the want of such said last mentioned wharf renders the slip so insecure as to be nearly useless & exposes the wharf already made on the Northerly side thereof to universal danger. The committee from the information before them are *laid* [led] to believe, that the said wharf may be sunk & made in the usual way at an expence of about 5500 dollars and with deep bridges & square timber and close fendered, at an expence of about \$6400 and that the money wanted for the purpose may be obtained on loan upon the bond of the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York at lawful interest. The Committee are satisfied, that the slip will be of public utility and as the recorder and the Attorney of the Board, by their report to the Common Council on the subject, which has been laid before the Committee, have given it as their opinion, that the case falls within the provision of the 5th section of the act entitled "An act for regulating the building of wharves & slips in the City of New York," passed 3^d April 1801, whereby power is given to the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the city of New York, on the neglect or refusal of proprietors to fill up and level the intermediate ground mentioned in the said act, to cause the same to be done for and in behalf of the [129] said proprietors and to charge them with the expence thereof and to collect the said expence with lawful interest and the costs and charges by distress and

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved

A petition from a number of the inhabitants in the vicinity of Dover Street complaining of the obstructions in said street was received.

The report of the attorney on the same subject was read as follows

The attorney of the Board, to whom was referred the report of the committee on the subject of the removal of certain incumbrances

from Dover Street between Water & Front Streets reports, that on the 6th day of March 1752, a grant was made by the Corporation to Ann Margaret Clarkson from Water Street to Front Street 200 feet in length; but no street by the name of Dover Street is mentioned in such grant; that the Clarkson family sold to a M^r Kip & Degrushe. The part now claimed by M^r Lawrance is the part formerly owned by M^r Degrushe, M^r Kip's proportion remained in the family until some few years since, when the same was sold bounded on a street (agreed as M^r James Kip now says between M^r Degrushe and his father) to be opened between them; but which never [137] was ceded to the Corporation, nor paid for by them

On the 18th day of January 1806, the Corporation made a grant to M^r Lawrance for property between Front Street and South Street and bound the same South Westerly by Dover Street and M^r Lawrance to make one half of a Street to be called Dover Street from Front Street aforesaid; but I have not been able to discover any agreement, or other writing, by which the proprietors were bound to open a street by the name of Dover Street from Water Street to Front Street. In a conversation with M^r James Kip, he says, it was always understood by his father and upon that idea he should have acted, had the property continued in him, that each of the proprietors of ground between Water and Front Streets were to yield an equal proportion for the making and continuing of Dover Street and upon that principle he sold binding his property in Dover Street. From these facts it does not appear, but that M^r Lawrence has a right to the property claimed by him, and if he refuses to open the same, will be entitled to a compensation therefor. I am of opinion, that but one of two things can be adopted; either to submit M^r Lawrence's title to an arbitration and let them say what he ought to have and which mode he assents to, or to pursue the method pointed out by the statute by having the same valued by a jury. The former method will be least expensive.

Whereupon resolved, that this Board will agree to refer the question of title to said street between them & M^r Lawrence to referees to be chosen. And on M^r Lawrence's consenting to the same, that his Honour the Mayor be authorised to appoint a referee on the part of this Board

A petition was received from Peter Hatteric praying the repayment of the sum of \$25, paid [138] by him to Oliver Jaques on the assessment for Canal Street & the sum of \$170 paid by him to John

S. Hunn on the assessment for Amity St Ordered, that the same be referred to the Street Commissioner

The petition of William Cunningham for the grant of a water lot at Brooklyn was referred to the Comptroller

Petitions from Ann Hart & Rachel Davie to sell vegetables in the public markets; of Elizabeth Stratton for a Coffee stand of Joseph Place to sell poultry &c on commission in the Fly Market and of sundry butchers in the Fly Market, praying, that the stand lately occupied by Francis Arden deceased may be left vacant, as they are already too much crowded in said market, were received and referred to the Market Committee

A petition for granting a licence to drive a cart to Mathew Fox Junior, he being a minor was received. On the question to grant the same, a division having been called, the members voted in the following manner

The members being equally divided, his Honor the Mayor gave his vote in the affirmative. So a licence was ordered to be given to the petitioner

A petition from John Bogart, praying remission of a penalty for breach of the ordinance [139] respecting forestalling was received. Whereupon ordered; that the Attorney suspend issuing execution until the further order of the Board.

A petition from sundry fishermen was received, stating, that they understood the Corporation had ordered them to remove their fish cars to Brooklyn and stating, that this would be a great inconvenience & would prevent them from supplying the market as promptly as was necessary. Alderman Mesier stated, that the Market Committee had that morning given directions to the Fishermen, where to station their cars on this side the river. Whereupon resolved, that the regulation of the Market Committee be approved: and further resolved, that the City Inspector and Street Commissioner order the fish cars to be removed from the Dock and Ferry Stairs at the Fly Market, and that the Fishermen be no longer permitted to place them there

A further petition from Ruben Drake for remission of the penalty incurred by him was received. Whereupon resolved, that the Attorney be authorised to discontinue the suit on security being given, that the defendant will remove from the city and on payment of costs

A petition from the inhabitants of the Ninth ward, stating that the hill near Harlaem heights was so steep as to render it unsafe for travellers was received & referred to the Road Committee

A petition of William Donovan for remission of a penalty incurred by a breach of the Carriage Law was received. Ordered, that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition

A petition of Isaac Keeler to be appointed Collector for the assessment on Delancey Street was received and ordered to be laid on the table

[140] A petition of Peter Tharpe to be appointed Collector of the Dog tax was received & ordered to lie on the table.

The several petitions of Samuel L Page Junior, Robert Degrushe, Anthony Ernest, A. Ledyard and Robert Thorn to be appointed to make the Jury list were received and laid on the table

A request of the Commissioners of Canal Street for an advance to them of \$2000 was received. Ordered, that a warrant be reported for that sum by the Comptroller

A petition was received from Jonas Humbert and Benjamin Aycrig, in behalf of the General Committee of arrangements for the aid of the Corporation on the 4th of July next.

Mr Jones proposed the following Resolved, that the Committee of arrangements of this Board be authorised and directed to cause such measures to be adopted and to furnish such means for the celebration of that day as has been customary and usual, on the part of the Common Council, which was agreed to

A letter was received from John Pintard stating, that he forwarded to the Board the indexes of their minutes agreeably to the report of their Committee of the 20th November last and requested, that a warrant might be issued to him for \$300. Ordered, that the Comptroller report a warrant for that sum

The case of James Hewitt, which, at the last meeting of the Board, was referred to the Commissioners of the Alms House, not having been acted upon by them, the Board now directed that his Honour the Mayor allow to said Hewitt \$21 for payment of an account for his board and such further sum to defray his expences home, as he [141] shall judge proper.

Petitions of John Smith & Samuel Bell Minors for licences to drive carts were received. Ordered to be referred to the Committee on applications. Mr Hawes then moved, that in future, no minor should be licensed to drive a cart. On the question to agree to the same, a division having been called, it passed in the Negative in the manner following

Whereupon resolved, that a special committee be appointed to receive all applications from minors for licences to drive carts and that they examine into and report upon the individual cases. The Committee appointed were Alderman Watkins, Carpenter & Mr Hogland

The report of the Committee on the petition of William Johnson made at the last meeting was now read in the words following " that the public slips & with the revenues of the same were leased or farmed to the said William Johnson for two years, commencing the 1st day of May 1806 and ending the 30th April 1808, at the sum of seventeen thousand dollars per annum: and that the sum or balance of two thousand five hundred & sixty dollars remains due upon the contract; that some time previous [142] to the 3^d day of July a suit was directed to be brought upon the bond of the Lessee or contractor and his sureties for the recovery of that balance and that the said William Johnson, on the said third day of July 1809 made an application to the Common Council for relief, asking remission of the debt, on the grounds herein after stated, which petition was referred to the committee on wharves, slips and piers for the time being, who never made a report thereon

The Committee further report, that the said William Johnson has laid before them his books and also produced to them an affidavit of his Clerk or Bookseller, which is annexed to this report, shewing that the whole receipts of wharfage &c. during the continuance of his contract or lease according to those extracts and affidavit amounted to the sum of \$31.874.66½ being \$2125.33½ less than the rents or sum

agreed to be paid for the same to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York by his aforesaid lease or contract. This statement is made the principal ground of the Contractor's application for relief: & if it be free from error, though it is no defence against the demand of the corporation for the balance remaining due upon the contract, it presents a case, which has some claim to the favour of the Common Council. The petitioner further states, that he was induced to give the above mentioned rent for the public slips and wharves by advertisements and credible information, that additional slips would be immediately made by the Corporation for the better accommodation of vessels & to the obvious increase of the wharfage, whereas in fact, no such additional slips were made during the continuance of his term; but that on the contrary the accommodation of vessels and the consequent [143] receipt of wharfage was diminished by filling up part of Beekman's Slip and the Fly Market Slip. The Committee are unable to make any report as to the information or assurances, which may have been given to the Lessee or contractor to be made to the public slips or wharves, during his term, no evidence having been produced to them on that point further than the allegation of the petitioner himself; And as to the alterations made in the two slips, the Committee have no reason to believe, that any material effect was produced thereby to the prejudice of the wharfage or revenues thereof

The Committee forbear to express any opinion to the Board, as to the prayer of the petitioner. They confine themselves to a statement of the facts & circumstances of the case and leave the Common Council to make such decision upon it as shall appear just and equitable

walks in the upper part of the street are in bad order being much broken and in some places, the cellar doors interfere with the walks. They farther reported, that the gutters might be improved as many of them project [144] too far from the curb stone. The Committee, therefore recommended, that the Street Commissioner be directed to have the walks well repaired, with such other improvements as he may think proper in the gutters & cellar doors to put the street in good order”

The Committee, of repairs, to whom was committed the representation of the Sherriff respecting [145] the City Prison, reported, as their opinion, that the roof of the prison may be prevented from leaking by covering the upper pitch with plank and corking the same, by which means the roof may last for some years and therefore wish the sanction of the Board, that the Superintendant of repairs may immediately commence the same and also make such other repairs and im-

provements in the prison as the committee of repairs shall judge to be absolutely necessary

The Street Commissioner presented the Assessment for paving Third Street from Hester to Grand Streets, which was confirmed and John T Baimbridge appointed collector.

The Street Commissioner presented a return of delinquents upon the assessment for Lombardy Park. Whereupon ordered, that a warrant issue to Arunah R. Martin the collector, to collect the sums due thereon.

The Street Commissioner presented the Assessment for opening Walker Street revised by the Assessors, which was confirmed & Noah Jarvis was appointed collector.

The report of the Ferry Committee of the 7th ultimo, which was directed to lie for further consideration was read and the blanks being filled up was agreed to in the words following.

“The Ferry Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Abraham R. Lawrence praying for permission to establish a ferry from Great Barn Island to Long Island beg leave to report,

That they have examined the place where said ferry is to be established, and are of opinion, that it is suitable for that purpose; as it will accommodate the inhabitants going from the upper part of this Island to Long Island, as well as those coming from the country

The Committee, therefore, after duly considering the case, believe, that the prayer of the petitioner ought to be granted and a lease given for ten years at one dollar per year, upon condition & with such

clauses as may be thought necessary to protect passengers from toll on Ward's Bridge, should any be required of them

[148] The preceding report was agreed to with this further condition, that the lessee enter into a covenant, that he will, at any time within ten years from the date of said lease when there unto required by the Corporation, sell to the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York one acre of ground contiguous to the landing place of the ferry, at such price as shall be estimated by persons indifferently chosen between the said Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty and the said Lessee

The Committee, to whom it was submitted to devise a proper form to be adopted in making a jury list presented their report, which was agreed to & which is as follows

Resolved, that the persons to be appointed in the several wards to take the census or enumeration of persons therein qualified to serve as Jurors, at the same time take a census also of all the inhabitants residing in the said city, distinguishing in distinct additional columns, the white Inhabitants male & female; the negroes and people of colour male & female; Slaves, males & female and aliens male & female.

The Board then proceeded to chose by ballot the persons to take the Jury lists in the several wards, when the following persons were appointed.

Ordered, that the City Inspector have prepared [149] the necessary books and forms for the persons above appointed to make a census.

The Committee to whom was referred the petition of sundry inhabitants of the Tenth ward, complaining of large deposits of manure, which was very offensive, reported,

That they have attentively viewed the premises and are of opinion, that the complaint of the petitioners is well founded. Different individuals, speculators in the article of manure, have, for some time past, been in the habit of depositing large quantities, in various parts of the ward, between Broome & Rivington Streets; and as their sole object appears to be their own private interest, there it not only remains but is suffered to accumulate till they can dispose of it at the highest price. These heaps are placed on vacant spots of ground, which, in general, belong to gentlemen residing in the city, to whom the offensive smell of the manure cannot of course be inconvenient; but to the inhabitants, who reside in the vicinity of these deposits, it has been and as the hot weather progresses, will continue to be a very serious evil, which your committee are of opinion, ought immediately to be removed.

For several years past, cartmen and others have been prohibited by law from depositing or heaping manure, at any place Southward of Broome Street &c. At the time, this law was passed, the limits therein mentioned, were no doubt perfectly proper; but since that time the city has been so far carried out into what was then the country, that it now appears necessary, that the line for depositing manure should be extended to the Northward of North Street. They therefore, respectfully submit to the consideration of the Board the draft of an ordinance, which, if passed, they believe would not only obviate the complaints of the petitioners in this case but likewise be conducive [150] to the public good

A Law

to amend a Law for the appointment of Superintendants of Streets and for other purposes.

1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that it shall not be lawful for any cartman or other person whatsoever, except under the directions of the Superintendants of Streets, or one of them and for public uses, to deposit or heap manure, at any place Southward of a Line beginning at the Hudson River & running from thence through Hazard to Hancock Street; from thence to and along Prince Street to the Bowery Road; and from thence to & along Stanton Street to the East River under the penalty of twenty five dollars for each offence

and the further penalty of one dollar for every twenty four hours, in which the same shall remain so deposited or heaped

2^d And be it further ordained, that the 18th section of the law, to which this is an amendment be and the same is hereby repealed

M^r Hawes proposed the following ordinance, which having been read by paragraphs was passed

A Law Concerning Dogs

1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York, that from & after the tenth day of July next, no dog shall be suffered to go at large in the City of New York; and if after that day any dog shall go at large in the City of New York, the owner or possessor thereof [151] shall forfeit and pay the sum of ten dollars for each offence. Provided, however, that if such dog going at large as aforesaid shall have on the neck thereof a collar, on which shall be plainly inscribed the name of the owner or possessor thereof and the street and number, or other sufficient description of such owner or possessor, such owner or possessor shall forfeit & pay the sum of five dollars for each offence

2^d And be it further ordained, that every dog, which, from and after the said tenth day of July next, shall go at large in the city of New York, without having on its neck such collar as aforesaid shall be liable to be seized & killed by any person or persons whomsoever; and that every dog, which shall go at large in the City of New York having on the neck such collar as aforesaid, may be taken up and confined by any person or persons whomsoever, and if the owner or proprietor of such dog shall not within twenty four hours after notice given to him or her of such dog having been taken up and confined as aforesaid, pay the amount of the fine or forfeiture incurred as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the person, who shall have taken up and confined such dog, to kill such dog or otherwise to keep and retain such dog to his or her own use

3^d And be it further ordained, that it shall be the duty of every person, who shall, in pursuance of this ordinance, take up and confine any dog as aforesaid, within twenty four hours thereafter, to give notice in writing to the City Inspector, and to the person, whose name shall be on the said collar, if he or she can be found, & if not, at the place mentioned on the said collar, of the said dogs being so taken up and confined to- [152] together with the inscription on said collar and that in default thereof he or she shall forfeit the value of the said dog

to the owner or proprietor thereof and also all right to any part of the penalty incurred by virtue of this ordinance

4th And be it further ordained, that any person, who shall have taken up any dog, in pursuance of this law, shall, after the expiration of one week, from and after his or her so having taken up & kept such dog, in his or her custody, be deemed and taken as the owner or possessor of such dog for all the purposes of the penalties or forfeitures imposed by this ordinance

5th And be it further ordained, that if the person or persons offending against this law shall be a minor, apprentice, bound servant or slave, the parent or guardian, master or mistress or owner of such minor, apprentice, bound servant or slave shall be and hereby is made answerable for such fine or forfeiture as aforesaid together with costs of suit.

6th And be it further ordained, that the attorney of this board shall be authorised, after the recovery and receipt of any penalty, under and by virtue of this ordinance, to pay over to the person, who shall give the said attorney such information of any offence against this ordinance as shall enable him to prosecute the offender to judgment, the one half part of the penalty so recovered. And that it shall be the duty of all constables & marshals in this city to use their endeavours to carry this law into effect

7th And be it further ordained, that the ordinance of the Corporation entitled "A Law concerning dogs" passed January 11th 1808 be and the same is hereby repealed

[153] 8th And it is further provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply to any dog, which shall be kept North of the Lamp district of this city, and which shall not in any case come within the said district.

The City Inspector presented an ordinance for regulating taverns & boarding houses, which was passed in the words following

A Law

Concerning Taverns & Boarding Houses

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That the City Inspector shall cause all taverns and boarding or lodging houses in this city to be examined and reported to his office, and that the number of each house so reported, the tenant or occupier thereof, the number of boarders or lodgers therein with their names & conditions, the street,

in which such house is situated, the number of apartments contained therein, and the apartments appropriated to the use of lodging rooms be specified in such report; and that the City Inspector for the purpose of performing the duties enjoined by this ordinance, be authorised to employ the persons appointed Assistants to the Board of Health

2^d And be it further ordained, that the City Inspector with the aid of the persons appointed or to be appointed as aforesaid by the Board of Health shall determine the number of boarders and lodgers allowed to be kept in each house reported as aforesaid & cause notice thereof to be given to the tenant or occupier of such house

3^d And be it further ordained, that every keeper of a tavern, boarding or lodging house who shall entertain or accommodate any boarder or lodger above the number so allowed, shall forfeit & pay for each supernumerary boarder or lodger the sum of [154] twenty five dollars, to be recovered by the said Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty for the use of the said city

4th And be it further ordained, That it shall be the duty of the City Inspector, with the aid of the persons so appointed or to be appointed by the Board of health to inspect or cause to be inspected all houses reported as aforesaid, as often as he shall judge necessary, and at least once a week from the first day of May, in every year; and the said Inspector shall prescribe such regulations to be approved by the Common Council, as may be most conducive to the preservation of the health of the said city, as he shall deem proper.

5th And be it further ordained, That the keeper of every tavern or boarding house, whether the same be so reported or not, shall give notice in writing to one of the Commissioners of the health office of all & every boarder, who may be sick in such house, within twelve hours after such boarder shall be taken sick or come into such house, between the 1st day of May and the 1st day of November in each year, under the penalty of one hundred dollars for every omission or neglect, to be recovered in manner aforesaid for the use of the said city

6th And be it further ordained, that the said Inspector shall make a weekly report to the Common Council of his proceedings in the execution of this ordinance; and if any person shall resist or prevent the inspector or any of his agents from inspecting as aforesaid, the offender shall forfeit for every offence the sum of twenty five dollars, to be recovered in the manner aforesaid, for the use of the said city

Mr Jones called up the resolution respecting the pay of the City Watch & after some [155] *some* debate thereon the further consideration was postponed

“ We the subscribers commissioners appointed, under the act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled “ An act respecting streets in the city of New York ” passed 20th March 1809 for the purpose of laying out a street in the city of New York by the name of Canal Street, do hereby certify and make known to the Honourable the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that we the said Commissioners have in conformity to the above recited act, laid out the said Canal Street—beginning at the East side of Collect St eighty six feet. North and East from where Pump Street is reputed to meet Collect Street and two hundred and seventeen feet, South & West from where Hester Street is reputed to meet Collect Street, and running from thence a straight course, One hundred feet in width, throughout in the direction of North forty two degrees West, until it meets the Hudson River beyond West Street, so that the North East line of said street strikes the centre of the Post, on the South West corner of Lorton’s Dock, being [157] four thousand two hundred and thirty five feet in length on the North East side and four thousand two hundred & eighty seven feet one inch and an half inch, On the South west side of said street and they have caused monumental stones to be placed at the corner of the principal intersecting streets with the elevations above high water marked on the same, and have likewise, caused maps to be made of the said street, on which are marked the distances from one intersecting street to another, with the angles at such intersections with Canal Street, with such explanatory notes, as are deemed necessary, accompanied with profiles of the same, on which are marked the elevations from High Water at the intersecting streets with Canal Street, with such field notes and elucidations as the nature of the case was deemed to require and the Commissioners have also made and completed according to their best judgment a just and equitable assessment of all the expence for laying out & opening the said Canal Street, as well what has been incurred under any former acts of the Corporation as under the present law—among and upon all the owners or occupants of all the houses, lots and lands intended to be benefitted thereby in proportion as nearly as may be to the advantage, which each may be deemed to acquire, according to the meaning and intent of the statute in that case made and provided, and the Commissioners have caused a copy of the same to be filed *of* [on] record in the office of the Clerk of the City and County of New York

together with a map and profiles of the said street agreeable to law, a description of which said map and profiles is herewith presented to the Common Council. The Commissioners have also in pursuance of the said act, caused notice to be given by advertisement in five of the Public Papers printed in the City of New York and by hand bills to all persons interested in the said assessment to state their complaints or objections in writing to the Commissioners within the period of one calendar month from the date thereof [158] and that as soon as possible after the expiration of the above period, the Commissioners will deliver to the Common Council a corrected copy of the said assessment with all the papers, vouchers and documents belonging to the same

A petition of Adam Walker for the remission of a fine incurred under the Sunday Law was ordered to lie on the table

A remonstrance of sundry inhabitants against repaving William Street was received, which together with a former petition on the subject and an ordinance reported this day by the Street Commissioner for repaving the same were referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 2^d ward and the Street Commissioner

A petition of Thomas Gilbert for remission of a fine for breach of carriage law was referred to the Attorney of [159] the Board

A petition from Leonard Bleecker, praying to be relieved from the assessment laid on him for opening Amity Street, as the same was in nowise advantageous to him, but rather injurious was received and ordered to lie on the table

A petition from sundry owners of Lots in Grand Street was received praying, that the Board would direct their former orders to be carried into effect for the permanent regulation of said street. Whereupon ordered, that the Street Commissioner cause the same to be carried into effect.

A petition was received from Abel W. Hardenbrook and from Jabez Pell, praying to have their appointment as sealers of weights and measures renewed. Ordered, that the prayer of said petitioners be granted

A petition that the wife of Samuel Willet may be permitted to have a huckster stand in the market was referred to the Market Committee

Petitions from a number of inhabitants, complaining of the indecent practice of swimming at the Battery and at Courtland Street ferry were received and referred to the City Inspector, with directions to him to select and report a suitable place on the North & also one on the East River, where the inhabitants may bathe.

A petition of Abraham Bandorin, stating, that he was a purchaser at the Inclenburgh sales and praying that the Corporation would fulfill their agreement of opening the streets through the same, or that they would return the purchase money. Ordered to be referred to the former committee on the aame subject. viz Alderman Mesier, Dickinson 7th [&] M^r Bogardus

A further petition of Thomas Hood for remission of his fine for breach of the Sunday Law was received. Ordered, [160] that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition

The attorney of the Board presented an ordinance for amending the law for the appointment of a Street Commissioner, which was passed in the words following

A Law

to amend the first part of the 22^d section of the Law for the appointment of a Street Commissioner &c

And be it further ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York in Common Council convened, that no person or persons shall incumber any street, wharf or pier with any carriage, timber, boards, planks, staves, heading, pitch, tar, turpentine,

grind-stones, anchors, bricks or any other kind of lumber or other things without having first obtained leave or permission so to do from the Mayor, recorder or alderman of the ward or the Street Commissioner; And that leave and permission is hereby limited to and confined to persons only, that are or shall be building or repairing houses or other buildings under the penalty of five dollars for every day they shall so continue to incumber the same”

A petition was received from Howland and Grennell praying remission of a fine incurred under the law regulating the lying of vessels at the public slips together with a representation of the Attorney of the Board of the facts relative to the case. Whereupon resolved, that the part of said fine belonging to the Corporation be relinquished on payment of the costs incurred.

A representation was received from the trustees of the Brick Presbyterian Church, that they had erected a small house on their ground adjacent to the church & that the building occupied by the Kine Pock Institution & City Dispensary stood directly in front of and incommoded their building & praying that the same may be removed was referred [161] to the former committee viz M^r Lawrence Alderman Carpenter M^r Hoghland

The Attorney of the Board stated, that from the abuses practised by several of the officers on prosecutions upon the Sunday, carriage and other laws of the Corporation, he thought it would be proper to give a discretionary power to him to stay suits, when they were vexatiously brought. Ordered, that said representation lie for consideration

The Committee on the petition of Fire Engine Company N° 28 and 31 reported that N° 31 has a 4½ inch chamber 80 feet of leader without any suction, stands in Sugar Loaf Street near the new Sugar House in a thick settled and an increasing part of the city and where there are but few engines, the Committee are of opinion, that every part of the city ought to enjoy an equal proportion of the benefits arising from the public expenditures for security against loss by fire, according to its population; they, therefore, beg leave to recommend the purchase of a new engine of 6½ inch chamber for fire company N° 31. They further report, that N° 28 has a 3½ inch chamber, 80 feet of leader without suction is old & in very bad order, stands in Broadway opposite the 8th ward Liberty Pole, the committee according to their view of the population of that part of the city are of opinion, that the present fire Engine N° 31 ought to undergo a thorough repair and be fixed so as to work with suction & then be deposited in the place of N° 28, all of which is submitted

"A law to prevent disorderly assemblies of persons in the City of New York" was presented & passed in the following words

"Whereas by the constitution & laws of this state, the free exercise and enjoyment of religious profession & worship, without discrimination or preference, shall for ever be allowed within this state to all mankind, provided that the liberty of conscience thereby granted shall not be so construed as to excuse acts of licentiousness or justify practices inconsistent with peace and good order; And whereas the practice of assembling together persons of all descriptions and characters in the park and other public places in this city has been introduced and carried to an extent, which is inconsistent with the preservation of peace and good order: And tends to licentiousness and to degrade and bring into contempt and ridicule all religious worship: And whereas those places and the public streets of this city are wholly unfit for religious assemblies, and are, by law appropriated to other purposes

Be it therefore ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that no assembly or assemblies of persons shall [166] be permitted, under the pretence of public worship in the park, on the battery, or in any

of the public markets or streets of the said city, or in any other public place in the said city laid out and appropriated for the common use and benefit of the citizens of the said city, and that all and every person or persons, who shall be concerned or instrumental in collecting or promoting any such assembly in any of the said places, under such pretence shall forfeit and pay the sum of Fifty dollars for every offence, to be sued for and recovered by the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, the one moiety thereof for the use of the said city, and the other moiety to the informer, in any court having cognizance thereof with costs of suit

2^d And be it further ordained, that it shall be the duty of all magistrates, constables and marshals of the said city and they are hereby enjoined to prevent all such disorderly assemblies as aforesaid & to prosecute and apprehend all persons concerned & instrumental in promoting the same

3^d And be it further ordained, that every constable & marshal, who shall neglect to perform his duty in the premises, shall for every neglect forfeit and, pay the sum of twenty dollars to be recovered as aforesaid." Ordered, that 500 copies of said law be printed in hand bills and distributed.

A law concerning taverns & boarding houses was presented & referred to Alderman Mesier, Bingham & Carpenter

A remonstrance of L. and James Webb against a turpentine manufactory erecting by Mess^s Fellows and Donovan at Greenwich was

received & referred to the Committee on Laws & ordinances with authority to report an ordinance on the subject

A petition of Cottrell and Martin was received, stating, that they had furnished Isaac Auld late contractor for lighting the public lamps with oil in the expectation, that the funds arising from his contract would be applied to the discharge of their demand; that they had a note of said Auld for \$395⁴/₁₀₀ part of the balance due them and they prayed, that the same might be charged to the said M^r Auld's account with the corporation and they receive the same. A remonstrance of John Edwards and Dorothy Ripley against "The Law to prevent disorderly assemblies of persons in the City of New York was read. Ordered, that the petitioners have leave to withdraw their remonstrance.

A letter was received from Bourdett Stryker Lessee of Brooklyn ferry and from Rodman Bowne Lessee of Catharine Slip Ferry, in which they state in reply to the resolution of the Board of the 18th June last, that they elected to continue their respective leases, under the law of the state as amended, trusting, however, that the Corporation will make them some allowance for the extra expences, which they are put to by the alterations in the conducting of the ferry as directed by the late law. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Ferry Committee, with authority to make arrangement with the said lessees, as to the terms, on which the said leases shall be held & report the same to the Board

An account of Nehemiah Allen for superintending the sinking of piers in South Street from the Fly Market to Burling Slip amounting to [was referred to the committee on] wharves, slips and piers and the Comptroller

A representation was received from Jacob Barker, complaining of the conduct of the Attorney of the Board in a suit, which had been commenced against him was received and [173] referred to M^r Bogardus, Lawrence & Timpson

A petition of Ebenezer Backus praying remission of a fine under the Carriage Law was referred to the attorney of the Board for a statement of facts.

A petition of Sally Berrian, praying that the Board would order the stay of execution until the 1st day of August next, on a warrant against her for expences for regulating Lombardy Park was received and granted

A petition was received from Samuel Winship and David Cannon, stating, that on the 1st February last, they had leased from John

Gardner, the ferry from the foot of Grand Street; that supposing, that their lease commenced on the 1st day of May last, they had purchased boats &c and had commenced ferrying; but they find that the lease does not commence till May next; and that the Attorney of the Board has threatened them with a prosecution. The Street Commissioner presented ordinances for paving Pearl Street; for digging out Grand Street from Arundle to Goerck; for regulating Willett Street, and for working the upper part of Greenwich Street, which were severally passed. The Assessors named were laid over.

The Street Commissioner presented the *assentment* [assessment] for paving Provost Street, which was confirmed & William Peters appointed Collector

The Street Commissioner further reported on the petition of Peter Hatterick, that on the 29th January 1807 John S. Hunn then Street Commissioner was appointed by the Common Council Collector of the assessment for opening Amity Street; but that no bond was given for

the due performance of the trust. He further reported as his opinion, that a warrant ought to issue to M^r Hatteric for \$88.66 which was agreed to and the Comptroller directed to report a warrant for the same

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of sundry owners of property in that part of William Street, which lies between John Street and Fair Street for repaving the said street & the remonstrance of sundry other persons residing in said street against the same reported

That they have viewed said street & in their opinion the condition of the pavement is such that it ought to be repaved or undergo such a thorough repair as would cost nearly as much as to [175] repave it. That there are thirty one fronts in said street and that the proprietors of twenty of these have petitioned in favour of paving the street. That the Remonstrants, as the committee understand with the exception of two or three are tenants or lessees only; and that four of them are tenants to persons, who have petitioned to have the street paved. Your Committee would further add, that the principal objection by the remonstrants to paving the street is, that they are lessees, whose terms are to expire within two or three years, and that, by the conditions of their leases, the expence of paving the street will fall on them. Whether this reason is sufficient to induce the corporation to postpone the paving of the street is respectfully submitted

M^r Kirby now moved, that the resolution of the Board at their last meeting on the report of the Committee on the petitions from the Fire Engine Companies N^o 28 and 31 be reconsidered. On the question "Will the Board reconsider the same?" it passed in the negative

[176] Alderman Mesier then moved, that the Committee on the Fire department be directed to enquire whether any assurances had been given by the members of those Fire Companies to M^r Abel W. Hardenbrook, that those engines should be built by him; and if so, that the said committee direct M^r Hardenbrook to construct said engines. On the question to agree to the same, it passed in the negative. It was then moved & carried, that the committee on the Fire Department be directed to carry the above reports into execution.

M^r Hawes presented the following ordinance, which was passed

A Law

for attaching the fire wardens in the City of New York to the several fire engines in said city. Passed July 9th 1810

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That such persons as now are, or hereafter may be appointed fire wardens in the city of New York shall from time to time be assigned & attached by the Mayor of the said City to such of the several companies of firemen, having charge of a fire engine, as he shall think proper

Section 2^d And be it further ordained, that the only additional duties required of the said fire wardens, in consequence of so being assigned and attached, shall be to aid & assist in procuring supplies of water, during the times of fires, to the fire engines, to which they shall so respectively be assigned & attached

M^r Bogardus presented the following.

Resolved, that Susanah Drake be permitted to repair the side walk in front of her house in [177] the Bowery with good hard bricks, instead of stone, which was agreed to.

The Comptroller presented the following

“ Agreeably to a resolution of the Board, on the 2^d ins^t directing the Comptroller to enquire & report to the Board, at the next meeting, whether any & how much of the public grounds & especially of grounds under the water are occupied by persons having no leases or grants and for which no rent or quit rent has been paid and how long such ground has been so occupied, he has the honour to report

For the want of an accurate schedule of the estate belonging to the Corporation, much inconvenience has been experienced in defining with precision the scites of property, whether improved or otherwise. A short time after the subscriber came into office, the defect was perceived and in consequence thereof, a report was made to the Board on the 30th May 1808 recommending ‘ that suitable registers or Field

Books should be procured, wherein to insert maps and descriptions of all the land, plots of ground, wharves, docks, slips and ferries belonging to the Corporation, whether under lease or otherwise, designating their boundaries and such other circumstances, attending them, as may give a full view of all the corporate estate. Connected with this subject, it was recommended, that the Street Commissioner be empowered to procure a map and description of all the property bounded by water within the jurisdiction of this Board south of the line of the Commissioners, designating such parts as are now occupied by docks or wharves and for which no grants have been obtained ”

This proposition met with the concurrence of the Board; but owing to the constant pressure of public business, was never carried into execution

[178] The necessity of obtaining an accurate survey of the shore at Long Island from high to low water within the jurisdiction of the Corporation was obvious and two city surveyors were employed in the course of last year on that business

Considerable progress has been made and it is expected, that they will compleat the work in a few weeks. Several water grants have been issued within two years past, and the back rents paid, which had lain dormant a number of years, and it is thought that there are some more, which require investigation.

Information was received, that a piece of ground opposite to Gouverneur and Scammel Streets at Corlaer's Hook, at the head of a slip reserved by the corporation, was occupied with ship timber & unproductive to the Corporation. The subscriber viewed the premises and has since had an offer from C. Bergh & Forman Cheeseman of One hundred dollars each per annum from the 1st of May last, during the pleasure of the Board, with a condition to reserve Gouverneur Street free of incumbrances to the river

The difficulty of ascertaining the original high and low water mark on Hudson river from the Battery Northward induced the Board to direct the Street Commissioner last summer to procure a survey and map of the margin of said river from the Battery to the State prison. The want of authentic documents to establish the lines from which grants should commence, has been the cause of delaying the issuing of some grants, which have been applied for in that quarter

When any further information shall be obtained which may elucidate the objects contemplated by the resolution, it will be communicated as promptly as possible to the Board

Whereupon resolved, that the former report alluded [179] to and the objects of this report be carried into execution by the proper officers

The Market Committee on the petitions of Mrs Willet and Ann Banta for grant of huckster stands reported in favour of the petitioners, which was agreed to.

The Committee on the petition of the inhabitants of Spring, Budd and Hudson Streets reported, that it is inexpedient to alter the course of the waters in conformity to the prayer of the petitioners, as there is not elevation enough at Greenwich Street to carry the water with a proper descent into West Street

The Committee, on the petition of John Stanley reported, that in running Green Street, a part of ground leased by the petitioner had been taken and submitted whether the Board conceived him entitled to compensation. On motion, resolved, that in the opinion of the Board, the petitioner is not entitled to any allowance from this Board.

The City Inspector reported ordinances for correction of nuisances from N^o 5803 to N^o 5824 inclusive, which were passed

The Attorney of the Board, on the petition of Fountain & Ferris praying to be relieved from a penalty incurred by selling a quantity of provisions at auction contrary to law reported, "that a complaint had been made to him by one of the officers of the Board of health against those gentlemen. The fact being admitted, he is of opinion, that the excuse offered, that they were ignorant of the law cannot avail them, particularly as it is a law of long standing, and they persons following the profession for many years, and that they should be compelled to pay the fine," which was agreed to

The attorney of the Board on the petition of Thomas W. Gilbert praying to be relieved from a penalty incurred by galloping his horse through the [180] public streets reported, that the facts stated in the said petition are substantially true; that he was passing through the street, when there was a great collection of people running in different directions, owing to an alarm of fire, which caused the horse to be unruly and very fretful. It also appears, that the horse did several times break off a trot, upon a canter or gallop; but the witnesses are unable to say whether the same might not be owing to the fear apprehended in passing through the crowd. From all the circumstances collected, the attorney was of opinion, that so much of the said fine as the board were entitled to should be remitted on the usual terms"

Which report was agreed to.

The Committee, on the ordinance respecting Boarding Houses reported, "that they conceive many difficulties and inconveniences will attend the execution of the existing law in relation to this subject, and feeling at the same time a conviction, that some regulation in this respect ought to be enforced, they recommend the annexed draft of an ordinance, which in their opinion will both remedy the defects of the present law as also afford a proper regulation in the premises

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That the City Inspector shall cause all taverns and boarding or lodging houses in this city to be examined and reported to his office and that the number of each house so reported, the tenant or occupier thereof, the number of boarders and lodgers therein, with their names and conditions, the street, in which such house is situated, the number of apartments contained therein, and the apartments appropriated to the use of lodging rooms, be specified in such reports; and that the city Inspector, for the purpose of performing this ordinance be authorised to employ the persons appointed assistants to the Board of health and that copies of the said reports be, from time to time furnished and delivered by the City Inspector to the Board of Health

2^d And be it further ordained, that the City Inspector with the aid of the persons appointed, or to be appointed by the Board of Health, shall determine the number of Boarders and Lodgers allowed to be kept in each house reported as aforesaid & cause notice thereof to be given to the tenant or occupier of such house

3^d And be it further ordained, that every keeper of a tavern, boarding or lodging house, who shall entertain or accommodate any boarder or lodger, above the number so allowed, shall forfeit and pay

for each supernumerary boarder or lodger the sum of twenty five dollars, to be recovered by the said Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty for [182] the use of the said city

4th And be it further ordained, that it shall be the duty of the City Inspector with the aid of the persons so appointed, or to be appointed by the Board of Health, to inspect or cause to be inspected all houses reported as aforesaid, as often as he shall judge necessary, and at least one a week from the first day of May to the first day of November and at least once a month from the first day of November to the first day of May in every year and the said inspector shall prescribe such regulations to be approved by the Common Council, as may be most conducive to the preservation of the health [of] the said city; printed copies of which shall be furnished to such taverns and boarding or lodging houses as he shall deem proper

Woodhull of the ferry from Willett's wharf in the city of New York across the East River to Williamsburgh in the town of Bushwick for the term of six years from the 1st day of May next thereafter; that on the 3^d day of August 1805, a lease was executed in like manner to Abraham Cannon

of the ferry from the foot of Grand Street to Morrell's point at Long Island; and on the same day a lease was executed to Thomas Morrell, of the ferry from Morrell's point at Long Island to the foot of Grand Street, in the city of New York, to hold the same respectively from and immediately after the expiration of a lease thereof made to Marinus Willett for the term of six years thence next ensuing: that on the second day of February 1808, a second lease was executed in like manner to the said Marinus Willett & Richard M. Woodhull, reciting their former terms and granting the said ferry to them, as described in their first lease, from the 1st day of May 1811 for [200] for the term of six years next thereafter and fully to be complete and ended. From the several grants or leases above mentioned it appears that the first lease to Willett and Woodhull was understood to embrace the ground, on which the subsequent leases of a ferry to Cannon & Morrell were granted, and that the said lease to Cannon & Morrell do not commence until the first day of May next. The sub-arrangements or permits between the respective lessees, or their assigns, if any such there are, appear to your committee to be wholly immaterial to the corporation & can only be of importance to the parties in settling their rights at law. The Committee on the petition of the trustees of the Economical school reported, " that having attended to the mode of instruction in said school, and having witnessed the improvement of the pupils, they are of opinion, that the institution is admirably calculated to be of extensive utility; and from the circumstance of teaching a foreign as well as the language of this country must be beneficial not only to emigrants children; but also to those of our own citizens. The respectable character of the Trustees and the indefatigable philanthropy of Monsieur Neufville its principal conductor excites a confidence, that any grant made by this Board [201] will be properly applied and extensively promote the wishes and views of the friends of literature. The legislature at their last cession not only incorporated this school;

but have also evidenced their opinion of its good tendency by a liberal grant of money; and should this Board further aid it with a site for a school room, it will then progress rapidly. By instructing (as is promised) in the higher branches of education, such paupers as may in their course, through our free school, give proof of talents, we will not only extend this branch of the charitable fund; but create an important addition to the charitable institutions of our city

A petition from sundry inhabitants residing near Peck Slip, stating, that a number of robberies had lately been committed in their neighbourhood and complaining of the remissness of the City watch, was referred to the Watch Committee

Whereas by the constitution & laws of this state, the free exercise and enjoyment of religious profession & worship, without discrimination or preference shall forever be allowed within this state to all mankind, Provided, that the liberty of conscience thereby granted shall not be so construed as to excuse acts of licentiousness or justify practices inconsistent with peace and good order: And whereas the practice of [220] assembling together persons of all descriptions and character in the park and other public places in this city, has been introduced and carried to an extent, which, unless regulated & restricted is calculated to produce disorder and licentiousness & to bring into ridicule and contempt all religious worship

Be it, therefore, ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that no assembly or assemblies of persons shall be permitted under the presence of public worship, in the park or the battery, or in any of the public markets or streets in the said city, or any other public place in the said city, laid out & appropriated for the common use and benefit of the citizens of the said city, and that all and every person or persons, who shall be concerned or instrumental in collecting or pro-

moting any such assembly in any of the said places, under such pretences shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifty dollars for every offence, to be sued for and recovered by the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, the one moiety thereof for the use of the said city and the other moiety to the informers, in any court having cognizance thereof with costs of suit

2^d And be it further ordained, that it shall be the duty of all magistrates, constables and marshals of the said city, and they are hereby enjoined to prevent all such disorderly assemblies as aforesaid & to prosecute and apprehend all persons concerned & instrumental in promoting the same

3^d And be it further ordained, that every constable and marshal, who shall neglect to perform his duty in the premises, shall for every neglect, forfeit & pay the sum of twenty dollars, to be recovered as aforesaid. Provided nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall apply to any clergyman or minister of any regularly established congregation or Society of any denomination whatsoever, who may desire to preach in [221] any of the said places, that may be proper for the purpose and who shall previously obtain the permission of the Mayor, recorder or one of the Aldermen of the said city therefor: And further, provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the ministers of any of the churches usually called Baptists from assembling in proper places within the said city for the purpose of performing the rites of baptism according to the rites of those churches

4th And be it further ordained, that if any person or persons shall disturb or interrupt any clergyman or minister, who shall have obtained permission in manner aforesaid, in the performance of Divine worship, or shall commit any riot or disorder, in any such assembly, such person or persons shall forfeit and pay the sum of twenty five Dollars, for every offence to be sued for and recovered in manner aforesaid, to the uses aforesaid in any court having cognizance thereof with costs of suit; and if any person so offending as last aforesaid, shall be a minor, an apprentice, bound servant or slave, the penalty in such case, shall be recovered from the parents, guardian, master or mistress of such minor, apprentice, bound servant or slave

5th And be it further ordained, that so much of the law to which this is an amendment, as is repugnant hereto be and the same is hereby repealed

M^r Hawes presented the following resolutions “ Resolved, that

the Comptroller be directed to furnish a correct list of all the quit rents owned by the Corporation, designating the grounds, on which the same are respectively charged, and the persons by whom and the times, at which, they are payable: and also the amount due and outstanding on such quit rents."

Resolved, that the Collector of the Corporation rents be directed to make a report every three months to the Board, of all monies by him received on account of the Corporation & of all persons, who are delinquents, and that [222] the first report in the premises be made by him at the next meeting of the Board, bringing the accounts up to the first instant " Which Resolutions were agreed to.

Alderman Mesier presented a resolution respecting the fees of butchers, standing either in temporary markets or at particular stands, which was agreed to and referred to the Committee of Laws and ordinances to report an ordinance agreeably thereto

John Hyslop having declined serving as an assessor for John and William Street, Stephen B. Munn was appointed in his place

The ordinance for paving Crosby Street passed 24th July was called up and John P. Ritter, George Cleland, Asa Holden, Christian Tripller and Ebenezer Clark were appointed assessors.

On motion, ordered, that the Superintendant of repairs cause Greenwich Street at the drain near M^r Bruce's New Fish Store to be immediately repaired

On motion of M^r Hoghland, Resolved, that a committee be appointed to visit the Alms House and Bridewell on such days and at such times as they may think proper & from time to time, report to this Board; and that the chairman be enjoined to give notice to the said committee at least once a fortnight to attend for that purpose. His Honour the Mayor appointed the following gentlemen to compose the said committee viz Alderman Mesier, Torrey M^r Douglass, Hoghland & Hardenbrook.

A petition was received from Richard M. Woodhull complaining of an encroachment by Samuel Winship of the right of ferriage, granted to him at Corlaer's Hook to Williamsburgh on Long Island. Referred to the Ferry Committee

A petition of Alexander Buchanan for stall N^o 45 Fly Market and of Andrew Passenger for Stall N^o 5 Fly Market was received & referred to the Market Committee

A petition of John Byrd for the appointment of a weigher of hay & for establishing a hay scale at Manhattan Ville was received & on motion the same was granted.

A Communication from the Engineers of the Fire Department, recommending, that certain alarm bells should not be rung on days of public rejoicing was received and referred to the Committee on the fire department

A remonstrance of Charles M. Graham ag^t filling in certain lots in Division Street was received. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Street Commissioner

[225] A list of names to compose the Fire Company N^o 36 to be established at Spring Street near Varick Street was presented and ordered to be referred to the Chief Engineer

The City Inspector reported drafts of ordinances from N^o 5921 to N^o 5940 inclusive for the correction of sundry nuisances, which were passed

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Dominick Lynch, praying that the slip now constructing at the foot of Walnut Street may be so constructed as to allow fifty feet of ground upon the same, reported "that from a full investigation of the subject, they were of opinion, that the prayer of the petitioner ought to be granted" which report was agreed to.

The Street Commissioner on the petition of Rea and Oliver reported, that having examined the contract and assessment for regulating Broadway finds the facts stated in the petition to be true and therefore recommended, that the prayer of the petitioners be granted. Whereupon ordered, that a warrant issue in favour of said Rea & Oliver for \$15⁷/₁₀₀.

The Committee on the petition of Joshua Jones for a water grant having reported, "that in their opinion a grant should be issued to M^r Jones from the South East side of Front Street to the permanent line on South Street, the distance from Front to South Street being 142 feet, on the usual terms, and with the customary restrictions for making South Street," which report having been referred to the Street Commissioner on the 6th instant, he this day reported, "that having fully investigated the subject, he saw no reason, why it should not be confirmed." Whereupon resolved, that the report of the said committee be confirmed.

The Street Commissioner presented an assessment for the drain in Jacob Street, which was directed [226] to be published in the papers employed by the Board

The Street Commissioner presented an ordinance for filling in and regulating the intersection at Grand and Essex Streets, which was passed. The assessors named were laid over

A memorial of Henry Spingler & James F. Fonerden complaining, that the ordinance of the Board, directing a certain nuisance occasioned by a house of David Dunham, projecting in B^d Way to be removed was received. The attorney of the Board having been called upon to explain, why the nuisance had not been abated, stated, that M^r Dunham having some time since promised, that it should be immediately done, he had concluded, that the obstruction had been removed

Whereupon ordered, that the attorney take immediate measures for removing the same.

A remonstrance from sundry inhabitants against paving Broome Street was received & referred to the former committee on said subject, who immediately considered the same & reported an ordinance for paving Broome Street from Bowery to Suffolk Street, which was passed. The assessors named were laid over

The Committee on the Law respecting Dogs presented an ordinance, which was referred to the former committee viz Alderman Fish, Mesier & Bingham with the addition of Messieurs Bogardus, Hoghland and Hardenbrook

The Committee on Laws & ordinances reported "A Law to regulate the Market fees in Temporary Markets and for other purposes," which was passed in the words following

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that each and every licensed butcher [227] who shall sell meat of any kind, either in temporary markets, or at particular stands or in any place in the City of New York, other than the public markets permitted by this Board, shall pay the same market fees, as are payable by licensed butchers standing in the Public markets according to the Law, entitled "A Law to regulate the public markets in the City of New York" Passed December 28th 1808.

2^d And be it further ordained, that for the purpose of ascertaining and collecting such market fees, it shall be the duty of each and every of the said butchers, on the first Monday of every month, to account on oath & pay over to the comptroller of the city, the amount of market fees due on the meats sold by them respectively, during

the month next preceding, designating in such account, the kind and quantity of meats sold by them respectively as aforesaid, on each and every day during the said month, and the amount of fees due for the same. And that if any of the said butchers shall neglect to account & pay over the said market fees, in manner afores^d such butcher so neglecting, shall forfeit his licence

3^d And be it further ordained, that any such butchers, who shall sell any meat at any such temporary markets, stall or other place in the said city other than a public market, which shall not be included and accounted for in the account to be rendered to the Comptroller, for the month, during which the same shall have been sold, shall forfeit & pay the sum of five dollars, for each and every piece of meat so sold by him, and not included in his return and accounted for; the said penalties to be sued for and recovered, with costs of suit, in any court having cognizance thereof, and the one moiety thereof to be paid on the recovery to the person or persons, who shall sue for the same

[228] 4th And be it further ordained, that it should be the duty of the Comptroller, at all times to keep an accurate list of such of the licensed butchers as shall sell meat in manner aforesaid, and shall from time to time report to the corporation the amount of such monies, as he shall receive for market fees, in pursuance of this ordinance and pay the same into the treasury. And it shall also be the duty of the Comptroller to ascertain as far as may be. the persons, who shall be in default in accounting and paying the market fees in pursuance of this ordinance, and report the same from time to time to the corporation.

“ Commissioner’s Office August 20th 1810

To the honourable the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York

Gentlemen

We the subscribers Commissioners appointed by virtue of the act entitled “ An act respecting Streets in the City of New York ” passed March 24th 1809, for the purpose of laying out a street in the city of New York by the name of Canal Street” do most respectfully inform the Honourable the Corporation of the City of New York, that we have caused public notice to be given agreeably to the note we had the honour to present to your Honourable Body on the 26th [230] June last and in conformity to law for the period of one calendar month for all persons interested in the assessment made by us the

Commissioners for the expence of laying out the said Canal St. And that the Book containing such assessment & expence was filed in the Clerk's Office as the law directed, and requested them to bring in or state their objections and complaints in writing and have attended to receive the same; and that we have immediately after the expiration of that time, proceeded to examine the merits of all the complaints and objections, which we have received in consequence of the same—and to revise and correct the assessment so as appeared to be just; And we the Commissioners aforesaid do now certify, to the Honourable the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that we have finally revised, corrected and determined upon and adjusted the aforesaid assessment made out by us, for the expence of laying out the said Canal Street as appeared to us to be just and right and we do most respectfully present to your Honourable Body the assessment book containing a corrected copy of the same, in pursuance of and in conformity to the act aforesaid amounting to the sum of dollars 159.267²/₁₀₀, which sum is equal to the total amount of all the expences incurred under the above recited act, including all damages assessed or payments agreed to be made for lands together with the compensation and expence of the Commissioners and of the persons employed by them and of all *and of all* costs of legal proceedings under this act and all other expences incurred to carry the same into effect by the Common Council of the City of New York in pursuance of this or any former law, which has come to the knowledge of the commissioners, which will more fully appear by a reference to the accounts herewith [231] presented, accompanied with the books, maps, documents and vouchers belonging to the same

A communication of Leonard Bleeker on the subject of an assessment upon him for Amity Street was received. Ordered, that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition

A petition of sundry inhabitants, praying that the intersection of Roosevelt Street from Water Street to Front Street may be regulated & paved was received & referred to the Street Commissioner

A representation respecting a sunken lot, [232] at the corner of Budd & Varick Street was also received and referred to the Street Commissioner

A representation of John Jacob Astor complaining of an assessment upon him for Varick Street was received. On motion resolved, that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition

A petition of John Randall one of the surveyors employed by the Commissioners for laying out Streets and roads, praying reimbursement of damages & costs recovered against him by John Mills, in an action of trespass for entering on his grounds in the service of said commissioners was received and referred to Alderman Mesier M^r Jones & M^r Hawes.

A petition of the Fishermen attending the Fly Market, praying, that the Corporation would assign to them some places where they may place their fish cars was referred to M^r Hawes Alderman Dickinson 7th & M^r Hoghland And further resolved, that the market committee be discharged from the further consideration of the subject of the fishermen and that the chairman deliver to the clerk of the board, the several papers now on that subject in his possession

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Richard M. Woodhull reported "that the lease of the ferry from Corlaers Hook to Williamsburgh referred to in said petition was in the opinion of the committee the one granted to Marinus Willett & the petitioner M^r Woodhull, which will expire on the first day of May next. That no grant or lease of said ferry, has ever been made by the corporation to Samuel Winship, in the said petition mentioned, and that if he has any right to run boats on the said ferry, it must be by virtue of an arrangement made with the said lessees or their [233] assigns. The

committee, however, on enquiry find, that the said Samuel Winship does employ boats on the said ferry, in carrying passengers from the foot of Grand Street to Long Island, and alledges, that he has a right so to do, by permission of the agents or assignees of Willet & Woodhull the lessees of the ferry

Whether the allegation be well founded or not, the committee presume not to say, nor do they conceive it to be in anywise important to the Corporation to know, as they have no occasion to interfere between the parties.

The Committee, therefore; recommend, that if the petitioner will indemnify the Corporation against all damages & costs, he be permitted to proceed in the suits he has commenced, or to commence others for the recovery of any penalties incurred, or to be incurred by the said Samuel Winship or others for running boats on said ferry

During his contract, he became indebted to John Kelly for glazing and keeping in repair the public lamps of the city, and about the time his contract ceased with the Corporation, he gave M^r Kelly an order on the Comptroller, dated 15th June last for \$168.12½, which is here annexed, to be paid out of the money due him from the Corporation. It appears, that Kelly had sued Auld for the amount of his debt previous to this, from an apprehension, that he was in danger of losing it; but on Auld's agreeing to give this order, which Kelly was induced to believe would be paid, the latter stopped all

further proceedings, at the time when the bail were becoming answerable for the debt & costs. His only hope of getting his money now is, that the order will be paid by the corporation out of the balance due by them to Mr Auld; and as Mr Kelly is an honest industrious man with a family to support and will experience much distress in case of failure in having the order paid, and as a considerable balance will still be coming to Mr Auld, the committee are induced to believe, that justice requires, that the above mentioned order should be paid and charged to Isaac Auld's account & accordingly recommend, that the Comptroller be directed to report a warrant at the next meeting of the Board, for the amount of said order in favour of John Kelly

The petition of Jeremiah Tier praying for permission to sell meat in Hester Street was received & referred to the Market Committee

A petition of a number of cartmen, praying that the law respecting the sale of hay might be so amended as to permit each cartman to ride hay for his own use, was received. Whereupon ordered, that the said petition & the remonstrance be referred to the committee on Laws & ordinances

The petition of a number of inhabitants praying, that a watchman might be stationed at the corner of Orange & Chatham Streets was received & referred to the Watch Committee

An application from Bernard O'Blennis clerk of the police office, praying for the payment of an assistant in his department was received. Whereupon [258] resolved, that the same be referred to the finance committee

A communication was received from the Comptroller on the existing state of the pecuniary concerns of the corporation. Whereupon ordered, that the same be referred to the finance committee and the Comptroller

A report from the Comptroller on the memorial of Isaac Vanderbeck requesting the payment of interest on two bonds assigned to him by his daughter Ann Walker was received. Whereupon resolved that the same be referred to the finance committee

The Comptroller presented a report against the petition of John Johnston, praying for a lot of ground at the corner of Washington & Partition Street, which was read and confirmed

The Committee appointed to take into consideration the applications of minors for cartmen's licences recommended, that a licence be given to David Griffiths, a minor, which report was agreed to

The Market Committee having reported favourably on the petitions of Mathew Bird and George Paff, who had applied for stands in the temporary market, ordered, that the said report be confirmed

The Assistant Street Commissioner presented an assessment for paving Pearl Street from N^o 430 & 431 to Chatham Street, which was confirmed & Noah Jarvis appointed collector.

The Assistant Street Commissioner presented an assessment for regulating Greenwich Street from the present pavement to Christopher

Street, and from Christopher Street to the late residence of William Bayard, which was confirmed and Andrew Tinkey appointed collector

The Road Committee, to whom were referred the accounts of James J. Myers and Oliver Waldron overseers of [259] roads presented a report, recommending the payment of the same, which was agreed to.

A petition of Caleb Conklin, a butcher in the Fly Market, who had been deprived of his licence for not giving in a true account of the meat he had sold, expressing his sorrow for his misconduct & praying, that his licence may be restored to him was received. Ordered, that the same be referred to the Market Committee

On motion, resolved, that the attorney of the Board report on Monday next, what amount of fines he has received for breaches of any law of the Corporation & also by whom the said fines have been paid, since the first Monday of December last

The report of the Committee, to whom was referred the petition of the fishermen for a place near the Fly Market to dry their cars upon, reported, " that they have made enquiries into the subject and after full consideration are of opinion, that for the purpose of preserving the fish deposited in cars, in a wholesome condition, so as to be fit for the market, it is absolutely necessary, that the cars should be frequently taken out of the water and dried. That after a car has been one fortnight under water, it will contract a green mucus, or covering of several inches in thickness so as to stop all the openings at the bottom & sides of the cars, by which means the fish become sickly and in a short time die

[260] The Committee, therefore, recommend, that a temporary accommodation be granted to them on easterly side of the pier, on the West side of the Fly Market Slip, on condition of their not permitting any nuisances to be contracted there; and also that they shall not occupy more than nine feet in width on that side of the pier from

the North East corner of the said pier to the post erected by the outer bridge, being the second post from the South end of the pier. As this pier is 30 feet in width, the committee are of opinion, that this would not be any material obstruction to the discharging of vessels lying on the opposite side, and is less objectionable in that respect than any other place, that they have been able to discover in the neighbourhood of the Fly Market

But the Committee are of opinion, that provision ought to be made for the permanent accommodation of the fishermen, as well for the drying of their cars as for the keeping of their fish, while in the water. From the present situation of the slip, the boats frequenting the market are very much exposed to the Southerly winds and in the fall & winter months particularly. The pier on the East side of the slip extends 250 feet from South Street to the permanent line, while the pier on the West side extends only 195 feet. This will occasion the floating ice, in the winter season at flood tide to fill the slip & it will then be impossible for the hulk or car boat, used by the fishermen for fastening & supporting their cars to lie in its present situation without being beat to pieces. It must of consequence, unless the slip is better protected, be removed to its old situation near the foot of the drain

For remedy of these inconveniences and to furnish the necessary permanent accommodations to the fishermen, the committee recommend the sinking a block at the head of the western pier so as to form an ell of thirty or forty feet on the West side of the slip and to be [261] connected by a bridge of 25 or thirty feet with the main pier. That part of the proposed block, which projects across the head of the slip to be granted to the fishermen upon such terms as may be agreed upon, for the sole purpose of drying their cars. And the angle formed by the new block with the present pier and opposite the bridge, to be used by the fishermen for keeping their hulk and cars with fish in the water

The committee presume, that the expence of sinking the block & making the bridge will not exceed \$4000, and that if it is commenced without unreasonable delay, it may be completed this season

The Committee have conferred with a committee appointed by the fishermen, who were very desirous that some arrangement of the kind herein before mentioned should be carried into effect & are willing to pay such reasonable sum annually as the Corporation shall think an equivalent for the expences incurred in carrying the same into effect.

The diagram accompanying this report will present a general view of the Fly Market Slip & of the plan proposed by the Committee

Upon the petition of Jeremiah Tier to be permitted to sell meat in Hester Street, they reported, that from the vicinity of the temporary market, at the arsenal, they did not see the necessity of meat being sold in Hester Street &, therefore, [266] that the prayer of the petition ought not to be granted, which was agreed to.

The Committee of repairs, to whom was committed the examination of the dock and bridges wanting repairs reported, that repairs are necessary & recommend, that two of the bridges below the Market Vesey Street be laid with new plank; the old plank to be taken as spiles for the outer pier with a view of saving the Hoboken ferry stairs; that a few top pieces are wanted at the wharf at Spring Street; likewise a bridge at the Whitehall Slip, which is very much out of repair and dangerous to passengers. Whereupon the Superintendent of repairs was directed to cause the repairs in said report mentioned to be forthwith made; and also to cause the two bridges at the foot of Partition Street to be repaired; this not, however, in any way to effect the rights of this Board respecting that property.

The Building Committee, agreeably to the direction of the board, presented a report on the subject of the City Hall, accompanied w^h a detailed statement from M^r John M'Comb jun^r the architect, of the progress and present state of that building, of the sums annually expended thereon from [267] its foundation in 1803 and an estimate of the additional sum, that will be requisite for the current year, which being read was ordered to be filed

The Attorney of the Board, on the subject of the report respecting the fines, which had been received by him, called for by a resolution of the Board, at their last meeting stated, that it was wholly out of his power to comply with said resolution this day, that the justice, before whom the suits have been prosecuted is engaged in making an accurate

return from his minutes of the names of the parties, together with the amounts recovered, and that when the same is completed, which will be during this week, he will be enabled to comply with the terms of the said resolution. He begs leave farther to state, that heretofore it has been customary to report once in every year, and that had he been apprised of a wish on the part of the Board to change that method, he would have reported once a quarter or half yearly as would most comport with their wishes

The Attorney of the Board, on the petition of Wetmore & Jackson reported, that two of the said penalties are for selling provisions in barrels, and the other for selling animals near the Tontine Coffee House. It appears, that they knew of the law, prohibiting the sale of provisions during certain months in the year; but that they believed said law had expired, and as a reason of such belief, that they had refused to sell provisions during the month of August. This then instead of proving an apology operates against them; for with a little trouble they could have possessed themselves of the true state of the case, whether they were permitted to sell or not. I am of opinion, that they have shewn no reason for granting them relief for the two first penalties; but that they should pay the same. As to the last cause of complaint for selling animals, I have reason to believe, that the frequent sales, that daily take place of animals & particularly of sheep [268] at the Tontine Coffee house might have led them into an error, and am, therefore, of opinion, that from that penalty they should be relieved on the usual terms

The Street Commissioner presented an assessment for the intersections of Grand & Essex Street which was confirmed & Isaac Kealer was appointed Collector

The Street Commissioner also presented the assessments for paving Fourth Street and Broome St^s, which were confirmed & Lewis Angevine was appointed collector of the former and Isaac Keeler of the latter

The Street Commissioner presented returns of delinquents on the assessments for paving Varick and Provost Streets & for paving Walker Street. Whereupon ordered, that warrants issue to the respective collectors to collect the same.

The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition for opening Crosby Street reported, "That the inconvenience complained of by the petitioners is that they cannot travel out of town, or to that part that lies [276] beyond them in a direct line, and as most of the citizens of this city are unavoidably subject to the like inconvenience, the Street Commissioner can see no feasible remedy for the people of Crosby Street. Yet he has good reason to believe, that the proprietors of the obstructing enclosures will soon open the street to Bleeker Street, of their own accord. and, therefore, can see no necessity of the interference of your Honourable Board

The Committee on the petition for paving Broome Street from Suffolk to Mangin Street reported, that the season is too far advanced to commence the work; but recommend, that the ordinance be passed and the work commenced in the Spring, which was agreed to and the ordinance was accordingly passed.

“ The Comptroller has the honour to inform the Board, that agreeably to their resolution of the 17th ult^o he has effected a temporary loan at the Manhattan Bank for twenty thousand dollars payable within thirty days from the 27th ult^t at 6 per cent per annum by a bond, which has been executed and delivered; it being understood, that an arrangement would be made to pay the said sum within the time limited

A permanent loan of fifty thousand dollars at 7 per cent per annum had been proposed to the subscriber, payable by a bond of the Corporation at three years, reserving to them the liberty of paying the same at any time within the above period; or by instalments of not less than ten thousand dollars, at a time

It is thought, that these terms are as favourable as, under all circumstances, can be obtained at present, [281] and if no objection should be made by the Board, the subscriber will proceed to execute the power vested in him, by the first section of the resolution passed the 17th September last

A petition was received from John Jackson, stating, that he had sunk a bulkhead in front of his grant at Brooklyn; that the adjoining water lots belonged to the Board, and as the earth, with which he filled in his bulkhead would wash through the ground of the Corporation, unless the bulkhead was also sunken there, he prayed the Board would order it to be done; that he would perform the work for them & would rent the lots or purchase them, as the Board should judge most advantageous to them.

A petition was also received from Bourdett Stryker, stating, that he was desirous of purchasing or leasing from the Corporation the Water Lots at Brooklyn North of the Old Ferry called the Rock's. Whereupon, [282] ordered, that the two foregoing petitions be referred to Alderman Carpenter M^r Hoghland M^r Hawes Alderman Dickinson 7th & the Comptroller.

A petition of Peter G Hart, in behalf of himself and partner Thomas H. Smith, praying remission of a fine for keeping gunpowder in their store incurred by them through mistake of the law, the same having been procured at the request of a friend of theirs and not vended by them. A petition of 144 Cartmen, complaining that some Cartmen monopolised the wood brought [283] into the city & praying, that the Wood Inspectors may be directed to take charge of the wood & remedy the mischief, was received & referred to Alderman Dickinson 3^d, Bingham & M^r Kirby

A petition of Susan Daly, praying an extension of the time of payment of an assessment for \$26 for paving Mott Street was received. Whereupon ordered, that she have time until the first day of May next.

A petition of John Ireland, praying abatement of an assessment laid on him for opening Amity Street was received & referred to the Street Commissioner

A petition of John S. Delamater praying, that the Board would direct some repairs to be made to the house, which he rents from them, situate at the corner of Pearl & State Streets near the Battery was referred to the Committee on repairs

The Attorney of the Board represented, that within ten days, several vessels had arrived from Ireland with passengers & in order to avoid giving the bond for the passengers required by law, had entered their vessels & landed their passengers at Amboy, many of whom had come to this city and would probably become a charge on the same

Ordered, that the Attorney pursue such measures as the law directs for redressing the evil stated

A petition from the Inhabitants of Jefferson Street, praying, that they may be permitted to pave said street themselves was received. Whereupon ordered, that they be permitted to pave the same under the directions & orders of the Street Commissioner

The Chief Engineer agreeably to the directions of the Board reported his reasons for complying with the request of Fire Engine Company N^o 5 in having [284] two men added to their company, which were deemed satisfactory and two additional men were ordered to be attached to said company.

The Comptroller on the petition of James Scott reported, That the petitioner owns Lot N^o 137 of the Common Lands, subject to an annual rent of four bushels of wheat; also lot N^o 138 adjoining, on lease, 13 years unexpired from the 1st of May last, at an annual rent of ten dollars. He wishes permission to exchange these lots by taking the lease lot in fee, and the other on lease, on the same conditions, at which they now stand, or to purchase the lease lot

The Subscriber can perceive no advantage likely to result to the Corporation from this exchange; but some inconvenience might arise from interference with sales already made and the precedent [285] may be plead by others in similar circumstances, which eventually might operate unfavourably to the interests of the Corporation.

As to the purchase of the Lease Lot, the board will judge of the expediency of selling it at this time, and of the price, which they are disposed to take, should they agree to a sale

The facts above stated are respectfully submitted for the consideration of the Board.

The Comptroller & Street Commissioner were then directed to treat with M^r Scott respecting the exchange proposed by him and to report the same to the Board.

The Comptroller on the petition of Dominick T. Blake presented a report which was agreed to and the following resolution was adopted

Resolved, that M^r Skaats be authorised to permit Dominick T. Blake Esq^r to make use of such room in the City Hall, in the day time, as shall not be otherwise occupied for the purpose of [286] any lectures or instructions, which M^r Blake may Deliver on legal subjects

The Street Commissioner on the petition for filling in Stanton Street & Pitt Street reported "that he had viewed the premises & found the streets impassible for carriages. A great quantity of ground from the Lots of Jannet Montgomery & Benjamin F. Haskins & from Pitt and Stanton Streets has gone into the lots of Phoenix & Ingraham on the North side of Stanton Street; and the Street Commissioner is of opinion that until the lots on the North side of Stanton Street are filled so high as to confine the water to the street, the street cannot be made to stand; but with a small expence for the present, the intersection of Stanton & Pitt Streets may be mended so as to make Stanton Street passable "

The City Inspector reported ordinances for correction of sundry nuisances from N^o 6043 to N^o 6053 inclusive, which were passed

The Street Commissioner on the petition of John Stanley having on the 24th Sept^r last reported, "that the Streets on the West side of Broadway, running through the ground of Anthony [287] L. Bleeker was ceded to the corporation 19th October 1808; that John Stanley farms the land of M^r Bleeker, by virtue of a verbal agreement for one year, commencing on the first day of April last

which report having on that day been referred back to the Street Commissioner for further investigation, he now added the following " that he had called on M^r Stanley to see if he had a lease or not; that on Friday last M^r Stanley had called at his office and handed to him as he (M^r Stanley) said, all the papers in his possession on this subject, by which it appears M^r Stanley had no written lease.

By the receipts for rent paid, it appears, that previous to ceding the streets to the corporation by M^r Bleeker, Stanley paid \$375 a year for rent, and after that only \$300. The Street Commissioner is, therefore persuaded, that M^r Stanley's report has no foundation in justice or equity

The Comptroller & Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the report of the Attorney of the Board, on the removal of obstructions in Front Street reported, that the proposals made by Lewis Moore are such as the Board ought not to accede to. The Street Commissioner also communicated a letter from David V. Smith, in which he stated, that he would consent to the cutting off of his store for the purpose of widening said street on receiving \$400 and provided the alteration was made in the month of July & August next.

Whereupon ordered, that the Street Commissioner take legal measures for causing the obstruction in Front Street to be removed.

The Street Commissioner presented a return of delinquents on the assessment for paving South [288] Street. Whereupon a warrant was ordered to issue to the Collector for the collection of the same

The Street Commissioner stated, that on account of the ill health of Benjamin C. Stevenson Collector for Spring Street & Elizabeth Street the assessment remained uncollected. He also stated, that Edward Moran had been repeatedly called upon: but without effect to make returns of the several assessments of which he was collector. Information was given, that M^r Stevenson was now so far recovered, as to attend to business; And the Street Commissioner was directed to call upon M^r Moran to state to the Board, at their next meeting, the cause of his neglect.

On motion resolved, that the Attorney of the Board be directed to enforce without delay the collection of all such penalties as have been incurred by not filling up sunken lots near the Intersection of Stanton & Pitt Streets & other places for the filling up of which ordinances have been, or shall hereafter be, passed. And that the Street Commis-

sioner, from time to time, report new ordinances as those already passed & to be passed shall expire, until said lots shall be filled.

The Street Commissioner presented an ordinance for paving Washington Street from Beaver Lane to Albany Basin, which was passed, and Daniel Smith, Garret Storm, John Nitchie Junior, Benjamin Stephens and James W. Lent were appointed assessors, the rule on this subject having, by unanimous consent, been dispensed with.

On motion, resolved, that the Street Commissioner cause so much of the pavement in Chatham Street and in the Bowery Road to be repaired as in his opinion shall be necessary.

[289] On like motion, ordered, that the Street Commissioner ascertain and report the level of Church Street between Vesey & Barclay Street.

On motion, ordered it to be referred to the Street Commissioner to judge of the propriety of widening the foot walk in Bayard Street in front of Mr Hardenbrook's property with authority to do it, if in his opinion proper.

Ordered, that the Road Committee be authorised to sell the buildings on a lot at the Inclenbergh, opposite Jay's tavern

Mr Bogardus moved, that the Board take up the consideration of the report of the Committee on the petition of Patrick M'Kay, which was agreed to. After some time spent thereon, it was agreed that a special meeting be called on Friday next to take into consideration the subject of the Inclenbergh lots & the opening of the Albany Avenue & the further consideration of the report was postponed until that day. The Committee on the Inclenbergh lots were requested to prepare by that day a statement of the facts in that case

The Board then agreed to meet on Friday next at 3 o'clock at the Alms House in order to make, at the same time, the quarterly visitation of the Alms House & Bridewell

The Board proceeded to make the quarterly visitation of the Alms House & Bridewell, after which the following business was transacted

The Comptroller presented the following report on the subject of the Loan

The Comptroller respectfully reports, that [he] has negotiated a loan, with the Phœnix Insurance company of New York for fifty thousand dollars at an interest of 7 per Cent per Annum, payable annually; reserving the liberty of paying the principal or any part thereof in sums of not less than ten thousand dollars at one time, at any period within three years from the 3^d instant, in conformity with a resolution of the Board passed the 17th ultimo.

It is recommended, that a warrant should issue in favour of the President & Directors of the Manhattan Company for twenty thousand and thirty dollars, Amount of Principal and interest from the 27th ultimo to the 6th instant, due on a temporary loan made with that company, agreeably to the resolution above mentioned

Which report was approved and a warrant was [292] directed to be issued for \$20.030 to the Manhattan Company in payment of the sum borrowed, as as mentioned in said report

A petition of Sarah Lewis for a stand, to sell vegetables in the Bear Market was received & referred to the Market Committee

The Committee, to whom was referred the petitions of John Jackson & Burdett Stryker for a grant or lease of the Corporation Lands on the East side of the Old Ferry at Brooklyn, and also certain propositions for erecting a bulkhead & filling the same to high water mark reported

That they have examined the premises and are of opinion, that the said bulkhead ought to be made and the grounds filled in as soon as can conveniently be done. But that before any contracts are made for filling in the same, or granting the same on a lease, it is expedient to lay out the whole of the Corporation Lands at Brooklyn in City Lots of 25 feet by 100 feet, or as near thereto as the circumstances of the ground will admit.

They therefore recommend, that the Street Commissioner be required to lay out the whole of said grounds in lots, under the direction of some committee of the Corporation & cause a map of the same to be made, as soon as possible & report the same to the Corporation together with the probable expence of making a bulk head & filling in the said grounds

Which report was agreed to & the same committee & the Street Commissioner were directed to carry the same into effect.

[293] The Committee appointed to report a state of facts, respecting the application before the Common Council on the subject of the Inklebergh lots reported, that they were furnished with copies & extracts of the proceedings of the Common Council on that subject commencing on the 3^d of March 1806 and brought down to 2^d July last, which they herewith lay before the Board. By these documents, it appears, that prior to the first mentioned date, the lots at Inklebergh had been laid down on a map made under the direction of the Common Council; that according to a report of the then Comptroller made on the 31st March 1806, fifty nine half acre lots (or nearly that quantity) were sold at Public auction on the twenty fifth day of that month

for the sum of 61,990 dollars or thereabouts subject to a yearly quit rent of twenty bushels of merchantable wheat and that 25 per cent of the purchase money had been paid in part and would be received in the course of that week, on the residue of the amount of sales

That on the eighth day of February 1808, a reference was made to the Aldermen & Assistants of the eighth and ninth wards to take into consideration the situation of the said lots as sold by the direction of the Common Council and to report on the propriety of passing ordinances for opening streets, from the main road to meet the street on these lots; that on the 8th August 1808, the then Comptroller in a report made by him to the Common Council, took occasion to mention, that a very small part of the purchasers of the lots in question had paid in full, that several had not made any payments and some of them, who had partially complied w^h the terms of the sale were anxious to effect a settlement, provided the Corporation would comply with a condition on their part, which was to open a street [294] called Albany Avenue—and that as more than two years had elapsed since the sale of the lots and as a settlement could not be effected without the interference of the Board, the matter was submitted for these considerations; upon which the subject was referred to a committee of the Common Council—that no report appears to have been made by that Committee—That on the 28th August 1809, a reference was made to the Road Committee on the subject of opening the roads through the lots in question—That a report was made by that committee on the subject, on the 11th September 1809, stating in substance amongst other things, that, at the time of the sale of the lots a map or diagram of the property was exhibited, on which were pourtrayed certain streets or avenues communicating with the said lots and without which no access could be had thereto, the said streets or avenues also passing through the grounds of several individuals, that in pursuance of an implied stipulation on the part of the Board to open said roads, the grounds wanted for the purpose of forming and opening one of the said streets to wit the Albany avenue had been taken & the recompence to be made therefor to the owners ascertained by the verdict of a jury, which had been approved by the Court; but had never been acted upon by the Common Council and that the purchasers availed themselves of the want of access to their lots to decline payment of the purchase monies on the ground of the non performance on the part of the Corporation in that respect of the conditions of the sale, and under all which circumstances, the committee recommended the passing an ordinance for

opening the said Albany Avenue, which ordinance was passed and assessors appointed for making an assessment [295] of the expences on these deemed to be benefitted thereby.

That on the 12th February 1810, the Street Commissioner presented an assessment of the expences for opening said avenue. That on the 26th February 1810, objections in writing were made to that assessment and submitted to the Common Council, which objections being referred to a committee of the Board, that Committee on the 4th April 1810, made a report thereon giving it as their opinion, that the assessment ought to be set aside; but that as the said Albany Avenue was established, as a public street, the same ought to be opened with as little delay as might be, which report was confirmed and the assessment with the objections to it was ordered to be returned to the assessors for revisal & correction. That the same has never been corrected

That on the 5th March 1810, a request was made to the Common Council in writing from certain proprietors of Lots on the Albany Avenue, praying that the same might be continued from Potters Field, to the first Cross Road, and on the 27th March a petition was presented by Patrick M'Kay a purchaser of some of the lots in question, stating, that it was a condition of the sale, that roads should be opened through the grounds according to a map or plan exhibited, which had not been done, whereby he was prevented from improving his property & praying that the Common Council would either fulfil their assessments or return him the purchase money,

That the last mentioned applications were, at first referred to the Committee on the subject of the Albany Avenue; but on the 9th April 1810, another application being made by the said Patrick M'Kay on the subject of his lots at Inclenbergh, the former committee on the Albany Avenue was discharged, and the whole subject referred to a special committee, and [296] which committee on the 4th June 1810 made the report, which is now under the consideration of the Board

Application has also been made on the subject to the former Committee of the Common Council under whose direction the lots in question were sold, and an answer has been received from the late Alderman Drake, one of the said committee stating, that he was present, at the sale & thinks that nothing was said by order of the Corporation as to opening the Albany Avenue. The letter from Alderman Bingham to him as well as his answer accompany this report. Other applications are also before the Board on the Subject, as well as by Abraham Burdowine, one of the purchasers of Lots at Inklebergh, praying that

the alleged agreement on the part of the Corporation to open the streets in question may be fulfilled, or that the purchase money paid for said lots may be returned, as also by some of the individuals, whose grounds were taken for the purpose of opening the Street called the Albany Avenue, praying, that the sums awarded them by the Jury may be paid and that the said street may be opened & representing the hardships and inconvenience they suffer from the present situation of that street and their grounds fronting upon it

The lots by the deeds or grants thereof are bounded on streets and the streets & avenues not actually opened, upon which the lots are made to front, or by which they are bounded, appear by the acts & proceedings of the Common Council to have been intended to be laid out and are delineated on the map made of the said lots accordingly and the sale of the said lots appears to have taken place and to have been made according to that map, before the passing of the act [297] of the Legislature of the State, which was passed on the 3^d April 1807 entitled "An Act relative to improvements touching the laying out streets and roads in the City of New York and for other purposes" and to which act and the provisions therein contained as respects the matters contained in this report, reference is hereby made—the same being before the Common Council

A statement of the Comptroller also accompanies this report, shewing, who were the purchasers of the lots in question, the prices thereof, what had been paid & what is yet due thereon respectively

The Market Committee, on the petition of Charles Gilman reported in favour of granting the Stall N^o 4 in Spring Street market, which was agreed to

The City Inspector presented drafts of ordinances for correction of sundry nuisances from N^o 6111 to N^o 6120 inclusive, which were passed

The Comptroller presented a report on the subject of the compensation to be allowed to the persons lately employed in taking the census, which was referred back to him with directions to report the number of inhabitants at the last census and the compensation then allowed to the persons employed in taking the census.

On motion of Alderman Mesier chairman of the committee of arrangements, ordered, that a warrant issue to R. Kent for \$375 in full *full* for the public dinner provided by him on the 26th instant

The Superintendent of repairs reported, that the well at the foot of Duane Street had been examined by him and after several trials he found good water could not be procured and that the inhabitants wished another well to be sunk at a distance from the former. The following communication was received from Gouverneur Morris Esq^r

Commissioners Office 29th Nov^r 1810

Sir,

I am directed to inform you, that the Commissioners for laying out the Manhattan Island have completed their work so far forth as depends on them; but much is yet to be done on the ground. It would be useless to detail the causes, which have delayed their operations. The unpropitious weather for the last and preceding season is not the least. So much, however, is accomplished, that with tolerable success in the operations now going on, it will be practicable, to make within the time fixed by the Statute a report complying substantially, if not literally with the law, shewing all the streets to be laid out and specially designating those, on which monuments have not been placed. These Streets may hereafter, without the superintendance of Commissioners be accurately [366] traced by a skilful, practical man, possessed of suitable instruments. It is, however, proper to remark, that in order to establish points, which have been ascertained by measurements already made, the course of operations commenced this year ought to be continued next year by the surveyor now employed, after which, the work may be conducted in such manner as the corporation may deem most expedient.

That they may the better be able to form a judgment, I am directed to state, that only one surveyor can be employed in what remains, and that the commissioners have been under the necessity of directing the construction of particular instruments in order, that he might attain to that degree of accuracy, requisite in a work of this sort, where the

difference of an inch may afterwards be a source of contention. There are, however, measured and to be measured with this extreme precision upwards of five hundred & fifty thousand feet, that is to say upwards of one hundred miles. A work so extensive, although enjoined by the statute was not, perhaps, contemplated, when it was proposed. To place and take the elevation above high water mark of about three thousand five hundred monuments will also require as little time. Yet all this must be done to comply literally with the provision of the Statute in relation to so much only of the island, as may, in the opinion of the Commissioners, become part of the city in the course of ages. If the whole were embraced, the labour would of course be increased with a proportionate increase of expence

They have directed estimates to be laid before them and find, that to complete the work will require (exclusive of the compensation allowed to them & the expence of making maps) a sum of seventeen thousand dollars, to which must be added six thousand [367] dollars more, if the monuments be made of marble; and it has been found by experience, that those of common free stone are daily defaced by men, who, in cultivating their fields, do not perceive them until the mischief is done. Sixteen hundred dollars are needful now to pay what is done and compleat the field operations of this season, for which sum I am directed, Sir, to ask a warrant on your treasurer

which communication was referred to Alderman Fish, Mesier, Hoghland & the Street Commissioner and a warrant was ordered to be reported by the Comptroller, in favour of the Commissioners for laying out streets for \$1600

It was now resolved, that the Common Council should take into consideration the subject of the Sixth ward election. The parties agreeably to the permission of the Board, appeared by their Counsel, the members elect by Barent Gardinier Esquire and the protestors by Thomas Addis Emmet and Elisha Morrill Esq^{ts}

The following papers were then read.

To the Honourable the Mayor & Common Council of the City of New York

The protest of the subscribers to the return made by a majority of the inspectors of the late election for charter officers in the Sixth

ward of said city and particularly against William Torrey and Isaac S. Douglass taking their seats as Alderman and Assistant of the ward, respectfully sheweth

That the subscribers, as candidates regularly [368] and fairly nominated and supported, as they believe, by a considerable majority of the electors of said ward, for the offices of Alderman and Assistant Alderman, conceive themselves, as well as the electors, who honoured them with their suffrages aggrieved by the return made by a majority of the inspectors of the said election, for the following reasons viz

That whereas eight hundred and ninety one tickets were polled at the said election, which exactly correspond with the number of names entered on the poll list; and they are able to substantiate, that their names for the offices aforesaid were entered upon four hundred and twenty nine tickets, which were denominated regular, that is containing similar names for all the offices voted for, and that there were Sixty tickets, which were denominated irregular or mixed, upon twenty five of which their names also appeared. giving them a majority in the whole number polled of twenty five

And, that whereas they are able to prove, that of the aforesaid four hundred and twenty nine tickets an account of three hundred and eighty nine only were taken and entered to their credit by the official clerk of the Inspectors, leaving a deficiency of forty tickets, as will fully appear by a comparison of the Poll list with the official return

And that whereas the above mistake was discovered and acknowledged by two of the inspectors, at the time, one of whom refused to sign the statement of the election, as it then appeared, except the error should be corrected by recounting the tickets, which the other inspectors, being wrongfully persuaded by some officious bystanders, that such a procedure would be illegal, refused to do

And that whereas by the aforesaid omission of forty tickets, which of right should have been placed to their credit, as well as by several other errors and [369] the incorrect proceedings of a majority of the Inspectors, in sundry instances from want, perhaps, of a sufficient knowledge of the law regulating Charter Elections, the return made of said election is, as they conceive at variance with truth, in opposition to an expressed will of the majority of the electors of said ward, and, if permitted to pass without a free investigation, will tend, as a precedent to nullify the important privilege of elective franchise, the essential, the preeminently distinguishing trait of the representative system of government.

Therefore the candidates aforesaid protest against the return made of said election and particularly against William Torrey and Isaac S Douglass taking their seats in the Council as Alderman and Assistant Alderman of the Sixth Ward; and in order to substantiate their allegation against the same, they respectfully pray to be heard by Council before your Honourable Board, not doubting, but that your decision in the premises will accord with justice and the inestimable privileges of free electors

The following communication from Alexander Clark one of the inspectors of the election for the Sixth ward was read.

Gentlemen,

Being nominated one of the Inspectors of the Sixth Ward by Your Honourable Body in consequence of some unexpected circumstances at said election arising, precluding, in my opinion my signing the return in Common with the other inspectors, I beg leave, in my justification, respectfully to state for such omission, my reasons.

First, there were on the Clerks book eight hundred and ninety one names finishing with Thomas [370] Dougherty and the ballots after three careful examinations amounted only to eight hundred and Eighty nine. The two deficient tickets I afterwards found under the table, close by one of the inspectors.

Secondly. After opening and examining said ballots and separating them into Federal, Republican and Scattering divisions, and canvassing the whole ones, it appeared to me, and by the notes taken down by some gentlemen present, that the Republican whole ticket amounted to four hundred and twenty nine, the Federal whole ticket to four hundred and two, leaving a majority of twenty seven, in favour of the whole Republican ticket. How the different candidates stood on the split tickets I know not, as M^r Kennedy sat between the clerk and me, M^r Janeway sitting opposite to him, who cried out the names to the Clerk; they were then handed to M^r Kennedy, who handed them to me to file. I counted them, at least, twice over and found them to be sixty in number—which made up the full number of Eight hundred & ninety one as stood on the Clerks Book

Thirdly. When the final close or examination came to be made, I found a deficiency on the clerk's book of forty whole ballots, I instantly demanded a reexamination, which was refused by the other in-

spectors. I, therefore, thought it my duty to refuse to sign the official return of said election, more especially as Mr Janeway one of the inspectors admitted, there was an error; and I believe would have re-examined the tickets, had he not been prevented by some persons then present. I hope this will be a sufficient excuse to your Honourable Board and I remain

The memorial and protest of the Subscribers residents and electors of the Sixth ward respectfully sheweth

That Your memorialists protest against the official return made of the late election for Charter officers in the Sixth Ward—Because without going much into detail, they are convinced, that they are able to prove, that forty tickets, which were polled at said election were not accounted for, that is were not carried to the credit of any of the candidates for the respective offices voted for at said election; and because if the said forty tickets had been truly & justly reckoned, the result of the election would have been different from the return made, that is that candidates would have been elected to all the offices different from those reported in the return as duly elected.

Your memorialists do not wish to charge the inspectors or their poll clerk with making wilful mistakes, or omissions; but their duty compels them to declare their surprise and disapprobation of the inspectors preferring a clerk, whose integrity and abilities to execute so responsible a trust was unknown to the citizens of the ward, and as your memorialists believe to the inspectors themselves; and the more so, as they believe they shall be able to prove, that the said clerk, in keeping the account of the poll, crossed three marks as tally for five votes, that he made one mark on another, by which one vote was lost, and that he omitted one entire tally of twenty tickets

Therefore, your memorialists pray to be heard by council by your Honourable Board to shew cause for setting aside the said Charter election of the Sixth ward and granting a new election: because if a poll clerk through design or inattention can render an election valid, [372] and at the same time, make an untrue return of the votes polled,

the elective franchise becomes a dead letter, and the boasted pre-eminence of representative government a mockery.

Mr Jones from the Committee on the subject of the sixth ward Election handed in the following Report

The Committee to whom the protest remonstrance and petition respecting the last Election for Charter officers in the sixth ward were refered with directions to report a statement of facts in relation thereto Respectfully Report. That they have attended to the duties of their appointment and have examined the Inspectors and Clerk of the Election and fifteen other witnesses on oath touching the matter refered to them in the presence of the signers of the protest and such members of the Common Council as chose to attend, and that upon such examination it appeared that after Closing the Poll the Poll list was first inspected and that the names entered by the Clerk thereon as Electors polled at the said Election amounted to the number of Eight hundred and ninety one that the ballots were then Counted several times, the same not Exactly agreeing with the Poll list; two of the Inspectors and the Clerk stated that the number of ballots were ultimately found to be Eight hundred and Eighty seven, and that that was the number canvassed, the other Inspector stated that the number on the last Counting appeared to be Eight hundred and Eighty nine but that before the [373] Canvass began he discovered two more which had dropped on the floor and which he picked up and added to the others making the number of ballots agree with the names on the Poll Book; It further appeared that the Inspectors then proceeded to Canvass the ballots that they opened them one by one and separated them into three parcels one comprising all the ballots whereon the names William Torrey for Alde[r]man Isaac S Douglass for assistant &c were written, one other of said parsels comprising all the ballots whereon the names of William AlBurtis for Alderman Samuel Webb for Assistant &c were written which were called full or regular Tickets and the third parcel all the residue which were called Irregular or split Tickets That Mr Janeway one of the Inspectors then proceeded to call off the names on the full or regular Tickets and the same after being inspected by the

other Inspectors were placed on wires, Those on which William Torreys name for alde[r]man appeared, on one wire and those on which the name of William AlBurtis for alderman appeared, on another wire commencing with the Ballots for the last mentioned Ticket and placing between Each twenty as they proceeded a strip of blanck paper; that in this operation the wires were filled, two several times that when both the wires were filled the first time the Ballots were taken off by twenty at a time and called off to the Clerk who took them down; that the Ballots on the first wire thus called off were those on which the name of William AlBurtis for alderman was written and those were called off to the Clerk by twenty at a time, but that the ballots on the other wire which were those on which the name of William Torrey for alderman was written were taken off in this manner the Inspector took off five parcels of twenty distinctly and slowly counting as he [374] took them off one twenty two twenty three twenty four twenty five twenty is one hundred which was taken down by the Clerk—that this last mode was pursued during the residue of the Canvass of the full Tickets; and that the result was found by the Clerks entry to be 402 for William Torrey for Alderman and 389. for William AlBurtis for Alderman and for the other Candidates the same numbers respectively: that they then proceeded to Canvass the residue of the Ballots called irregular or split Tickets in which operation the ballots were first put on one of the wires one by one and then taken off and inspected in the same manner as the full Ticket but were called off one by one to the Clerk who gave Credit for one vote to each of the Candidates on the full Tickets whose name was written thereon; that among these Ballots there were some which had no name thereon for Alderman some which had no name for assistant some which had a name for Alderman or for assistant which was not on either of the full or regular Tickets, one full Ticket for Candidates in the Tenth ward and some with fictitious names: That the number of votes given on the split Tickets for William Torrey for Alderman was Twenty five and the number for William AlBurtis was 23. and the rest of the Candidates nearly the same in numbers & proportions with some variations making the whole number of votes canvassed and estimated for William Torrey for Alderman four hundred and twenty seven and the whole number canvassed and estimated for William alBurtis for Alderman four hundred and twelve and the whole number for Isaac S Douglass for assistant 428. and the whole number for Samuel Webb for assistant 417. as certified in the return; That one or more of the Bye Standers declared that there was a mistake of forty Tickets in the Can-

vas and estimate, that M^r Clark one of the Inspectors insisted [375] upon a recanvas or new counting of the Ballots which M^r Janeway another of the Inspectors at first inclined to assent to, but that M^r Kennedy the other Inspector refused to do so, and M^r Janeway coming into his opinion the majority of the Inspectors agreed not to recanvass or recount. the Ballots and they with the Poll list were destroyed and the certificate on file in the Clerks office was thereupon made out signed and returned—as to the fact of the alledged mistake in the Canvass and estimate and the circumstances respecting the refusal of the two Inspectors to recanvass or recount the ballots, the precise time when the alledged mistake was first declared and the number of Ballots not comprised in the two parcells called full or regular ballots and as to some other matters much Testimony was produced which being extremely variant and in some instances perhaps not reconcilable your Committee have thought proper to state it at Large as taken down at the time and read over and assented to by the witnesses specifying the names of the witnesses and by whom produced

Alexander Clark one of the Inspectors deposed in substance that on completing the Canvass of the full Ballots the same were put into two separate handkerchiefs Those having thereon the name of William AlBurtis for Alderman in the handkerchief of Deponent and the others in the other handkerchief and left laying on the Table: That they then proceeded to Canvas the split Tickets first putting them on one of the files that the number of split Tickets was sixty, he counted them himself that he kept an account of the Canvass with Chalk but not an accurate one—that he believes the result of the Election was in fact different from that which is returned. that M^r Janeway also said he believed there was a mistake and put his hand on the deponents handkerchief wherein one parcel of the ballot was contained as if to proceed to recount [376] them but that some of the Bye Standers declaring it to be improper to recount them he declined doing so. that the mistake was not mentioned until after the canvas of all the Ballots was finished, but was declared before the Certificate was signed that during the Canvass of the full tickets he overlooked the Clerk to see that he entered the numbers correctly as called off by the Inspectors and that the Clerk did enter the same correctly as far as the witness could discover that he did not particularly attend to the Clerks entries on the Canvass of the split Tickets—That some ballots 8 or 9. had no name for alderman thereon but how many such there were he could not say and that the same was the Case as to assistant Alderman

William Janeway another of the Inspectors deposed that he did not count the split Tickets & could not say how many there were—there were several without any name thereon for Alderman some only for Constables and some having fictitious names thereon and some blanks that on finishing the Canvass of the full Tickets M^r Clark one of the Inspectors proposed burning them—that when it was first suggested there was a mistake he said he believed there was, which declaration he made in consequence of the assertions of others and not from any knowledge of his own—that he was at first inclined to recount the Ballots and put his hand on one of the handkerchiefs with that intent but that on reflection he *he* declined doing so. not being certain that they remained in the same state as when put into the handkerchief or whether some might not have been taken away as the handkerchief had been out of his sight, that during the Canvass he stood directly opposite the Clerk and looked over him to see that he set down the numbers correctly and believes he did That the Clerk made one mistake on the Canvass of the split tickets in entering [377] A vote which he the witness corrected that during the Canvass of full Tickets two dropped from the Table and were taken up by M^r Kennedy and put among the uncanvassed ballots that he did not declare next morning there was a mistake but said that if there was a mistake he did not know in what it consisted or how it happened, that when they were about to destroy the Tickets and Poll Book M^r Clark one of the inspectors took up the Poll Book and appeared to Witness, as about to take it away that witness demanded it of him—that M^r Clark said he had a right to look over it that witness assented thereto That M^r Clark then inspected it and said he was satisfied with his examination on which it was with the Ballots destroyed—Bernard Kennedy the other Inspector deposed that during the Canvass he by accident drew two Tickets off the Table with his elbow which he took up and they were canvassed with the rest—that he knew nothing of any Tickets being found on the floor by M^r Clark before the Canvass was begun that he sat alongside of the Clerk and carefully attended to his entries during the whole of the votes and he is confident that he made but one mistake which was in entring one vote which was corrected that the number of votes for each candidate was not added up until after the Canvass of the whole was finished that he does not know how many split Tickets there were that there were several without Alderman several without Assistant some for only one candidate several for persons as Alderman who were not Candidates and several with

fictitious names upon them that when the Canvass of the full Tickets was finished M^r Clark proposed burning them but they were put in handkerchiefs and shifted to different parts of the Table that when they were about to burn the votes M^r Clark took [378] up the Poll Book and put it under his arm as if to carry it away—that from his whole knowledge & belief he is confident that each candidate had due credit given him for each vote he received at the election and that he knows of no mistake in the Canvas and Estimate

Henry Faber the Clerk of the Election deposed that he does not know how many split Tickets there were he knows that Torrey had twenty five AlBurtis twenty three for which credit was given to them and that there were nine without any name for Alderman several for persons that were not Candidates and a number with none but fictitious names thereon he thinks about thirty and and is fully satisfied from twenty five to thirty he is confident he set down to each Candidate every Vote given for him as called off by the Inspectors that the Canvass was finished and the successful Candidate declared before it was suggested that there was a mistake—that M^r Clark after the Canvas was over snatched the Book ran to the end of the table and examined it that M^r Janeway pul[1]ed it from under his arm and it was burned with the Ballots that he did not say there was a mistake nor has he any reason to believe there was, thinks that John D Miller first suggested that there was a mistake, that he heard some person present declare it contrary to law to canvass anew that he thinks none of the ballots would have been taken out of the handkerchiefs was not accused of any mistake until after the canvass except by M^r Paulding as to one vote

John Ackerman produced by the Protestants said that he was one of the officers who attended at the Poll and was present at the Canvas but kept no account thereof that he saw the Ballots in which AlBurtis's name was written for Alderman [379] taken from the wire and when the last twenty were taken therefrom and called out by the Inspector the Clerk did not set them down at the time he usually did he said the Clerk might have set them down before called off, as that was the last twenty, at that time he was at the end of the table where he had been and continued during the canvassing and that Alexander Clark set between him and the Clerk that he took notice of the omission at the time but did not mention it till after it was supposed there had been a mistake, he also declared he usually uses Glasses but had none at that time though he could see perfectly well and at that time a number of

persons were round the table some of whom came inside by force, at the time he supposed the omission took place the Clerk set between two of the Inspectors—he saw two tickets in Kennedys hand which he understood were found on the floor—At the time the last twenty were taken from the file he saw the Clerk put the pen to the Book but did not see him make the requisite N^o 20. that he was then certain and still believed he omitted it

John D Miller Esq^r produced by the same said he was present at the latter part of the Canvass and saw the split Tickets counted and put on a wire and they amounted to sixty that as soon as they were put on the wire he added them up with the full or regular Tickets which in the whole made Eight hundred and fifty one, that he did not count the split tickets himself but took the number from one of the Inspectors he believed all the split tickets taken from the wire had some one persons name on it, he mentioned to the Inspectors that there were forty ballots short before the Inspectors declared the result. or at least before he heard them so declare that he believed all the split Tickets thrown out the Hat in which they had been put. were placed on the wire he also declared he was [380] alongside M^r Janeway but could not see whether the Clerk kept the account correct or not that M^r Earnest appeared very attentive to what he was doing that he did not hear any person say to the Inspectors there had been an omission in setting down 5. 10. 15. 20. or any other number of Votes, That when he informed M^r Janeway there was a mistake in forty votes M^r Janeway replied he believed there was and appeared willing to count them over but afterwards declined he thought none of the Tickets could have been out of the handkerchiefs without having been discovered by some person round the table

Isachar Cozzens Jun^r produced by the same said he was looking into the window soon after the Canvassing was over and enquired of the Clerk the result who informed him that M^r Torrey had fifteen Majority but there was a mistake which was not owing to him for when the votes were counted they tallied with his Book and at which conversation he said M^r Lane was present that there was then a great noise in the Room.

John Lane produced by the same said he was present at the Canvassing of the vote and after which he heard the Clerk say M^r Torrey was fifteen a head that his Books were correct but the rest made a mistake of forty that he then stood in the corner of the Room and M^r Cozzens was sitting in the window

Richard L Walker produced by the same said he was present at the canvassing of the said votes and kept an account thereof that he kept the same in consequence of an agreement by the Inspector That one person on each side might keep such an account & for that purpose be at the Table he was appointed by the supporters of M^r AlBurtis and M^r Earnest by those of M^r Torrey that the Ballots were counted three times and proved to be Eight hundred and eighty nine that the number of full Ballots as kept by the Clerk differed from his private account, that [381] there were sixty split Tickets as declared by the Clerk and that he counted them as M^r Clark put them on the file and afterwards as he turned them and the number was sixty that M^r Miller then declared there was a deficiency of tickets and that before the Majority was ascertained and told the Inspectors if they would count the tickets in that handkerchief they would find the mistake, that M^r Janeway said there seemed to be a mistake and laid his hand on the handkerchief and that M^r Clark also declared there was a mistake and that they must count the votes over he further stated that M^r Rose offered to bet him One thousand dollars and that, before the split Tickets had been counted that the republican Ticket on the full Ballot had a Majority of twenty seven which agreed with his private account within two or three that he thought the Tenth ward Ballot and *and* those having fictitious names on were included in the sixty he further stated that he then informed M^r Morrel that his private Canvass differed from the Inspectors that he kept his from the slips of paper that M^r Morrel informed him the witness that he Morrel kept his from the Call of the Inspector which one kept by Morrel differed from the witnesses and the Witness submitted to Morrells until the sixty should be examined as the mistake might be there that he the witness the next day after the Canvass made out a Calculation from his private Canvass which he might have shewn to some persons and that he did not recollect shewing his private Canvass to any person but Morrell nor did he mention his canvas as differing from the Inspectors as a reason why they should recanvass

Ebenezer Stevenson produced by the same said he was present part of the time during the Canvass and heard M^r Rose offer to bet. M^r Walker 1000. Dol. the Republican Ticket had a Majority on the full [382] Ballots of twenty seven that the Clerk marked two votes in the one and the same stroke opposite to Morrells name and after the Canvassing was finished he heard the Clerk say there was a mistake his counting did not hold out with the poll list that he also heard M^r

Janeway say there were sixty split Tickets as called off from the Clerks Book

Helmus C Van Houten produced by the same said he was present at part of the Canvassing and heard M^r Janeway say he believed there was a mistake or something like that that after the split Tickets were put on the wire he the witness counted them over and there were sixty exactly

George Cumming produced by the same said that he was at the latter part of the said Canvassing half the split tickets were canvassed when he came to the Poll he heard M^r Miller Walker and Clark say there had been a mistake and that M^r Janeway admitted then there had been a mistake and that they ought to Canvass over and put his hand on the handkerchief but declined recounting as the witness supposed in consequence of information of others standing there that the supposed error was mentioned before the witness heard the result

James H Ward produced by the same said that he saw M^r Hedden take the handkerchief from the table before the Inspectors began to Canvass the Split Tickets after which he heard M^r Janeway say there was a mistake and was about recounting the votes that on several persons declaring it would be improper he declined that he saw M^r Van Houten inside the Bar when canvassing the split Tickets which he did not hear counted altho attending to their being canvassed that Van Houten set alongside M^r Clark

William M Summers produced by the returned [383] Candidates said that he knows Van Houten and that he did not see him at the Inspectors Table as stated by him that he saw him out side the Bar but not all the time that after the canvassing was over he and Van Houten went inside at the same time that he believed M^r Van Houten to be an honest Man

Henry Marsh produced by the same, said he was present at part of the canvassing and heard M^r Rose offer to bet M^r Walker on either side upon the result and offered to give M^r Walker his choice he did not suppose M^r Rose in earnest, that M^r Rose by his private canvass gave M^r Burtis seven majority from the full Tickets M^r Miller contradicted M^r Rose and then Rose corrected his by Millers that M^r Miller said from his account M^r Torrey had thirteen over AlBurtis during the Canvassing he saw M^r Kennedy take two Tickets from the Floor which were also canvassed

Charles Morrell produced by the same said he came to the Poll after they had commenced canvassing and from thence kept a Tally

but not a correct one and got confused and quit, that Dr Walker did not tell the witness his private Tally differed from the Inspectors as he could recollect that Mr Walker declared there was a mistake as soon as the split Tickets were counted from the wire and to the number of about forty Tickets he did not recollect whether Mr Miller or Mr Walker first mentioned there was a mistake he could not say whether all the split Tickets were put on the wire nor how many there were that he heard Rose offer to bet Walker 1000 Doll. upon a Majority of 24 or 27 upon the Republican Ticket. before the split Tickets were all put on the file and soon after he offered to bet either way and when Rose so offered to bet all the full Tickets had not been counted but some laid on the Table in heaps that he saw Van Houten at some time during the Canvass inside the Bar he also stated that he the witness set at the end of the table and Mr Ackerman [384] stood behind him and that part of the time he saw the Clerk put down the votes and part of the time he could not the Box being between them

Anthony Earnest produced by the same said that he attended during the whole of the canvassing and counting of the votes and kept an account of the same for which purpose he attended that he particularly attended to the business through every stage of it that he set near the Clerk but did not keep his account by the Clerks but from the Call of the Inspectors and after the difficulty arose he compared Books with the Clerk and they exactly agreed, he was certain he gave each candidate credit for the votes given for him he would not say how many split Tickets there were he saw Mr Kennedy take two from the floor when Canvassing that he kept his account all by twenty he further stated there were a number of Ballots with fictitious names written on them how many he could not say that some contained only an Assistants name some were Crossed, that the room was much crowded and a number looking on and he did not believe any of the Tickets had been taken away that he did not hear of any mistake till after the successful Candidate had been declared

Thomas Angell produced by the same said [he] was present during the whole Canvass that he and Ackerman attended the Poll as officers and stood along side at each end of the Table from which he could not see whether the Clerk set down the number or not. that he and Ackerman stood there when the last twenty were taken from the file he did not hear Ackerman remark to any person there had been a mistake in setting down, two or three days after the election Mr Ackerman told him there was a mistake in the Clerks not setting down the two last

twenties but that he Ackerman could not say for whom those were for and that he said [385] then he was sure there had been a mistake he further stated that Ackerman was a man of good Character

Lewis Angevine produced by the same said he was present at the Canvassing of the votes and kept an account there of which agreed with the Clerks he kept his without any communication with the Clerk and from the Call of the Inspector and also said he was certain he witness made no mistake and that he put them down correctly as called off that he saw the Clerk put down each twenty on the first file for M^r Burtis that after the full Tickets were canvassed M^r Clark proposed destroying them before Canvassing the split he did not know how many split tickets there were that several persons declared the result previously to M^r Miller saying there had been a mistake that M^r Torrey had a Majority of thirteen from the whole ticket that when M^r Miller declared there had been a mistake as to forty votes M^r Janeway replied he did not know how it had happened for he was sure he had canvassed them fairly

Your Committee deem it proper to add that they have no reason from the evidence adduced nor do they understand that the parties allege that the Inspector or Clerk of the Election manifested any partiality or mal conduct during the Canvass and estimate but that it was generally agreed on all sides that if there was an error therein the same had arisen from some unintentional mistake which could not be accounted for

On motion it was agreed that the Common Council now take into consideration the report. of the Committee

The parties agreeably to the permission of the Board appeared by their Counsel the Members elect [386] by Barent Gardenier Esq^r and the Protestors by Thomas Addis Emmet and Morrell Esq^{rs} The protest &c was read M^r Emmet stated to the Common Council that his Clients had been desirous of obtaining the Testimony of W^m Luccus Rose Esq^r that for that purpose he had been summoned before the Committee of the Board but had not attended He therefore prayed that a Suppoena might be sent to him requiring his attendance forthwith before the Common Council,

It was then moved that a message be sent to M^r Rose requesting his attendance which was agreed to

A Note was accordingly despatched by the Clerk of the Com. Council to Mr Rose stating that his Testimony had been required by the Protestors to the return made in the late Charter Election for the 6th Ward and requesting his immediate attendance before the Com. Council, to which Mr Rose returned an answer that he would in the Course of half an hour Attend Mr Emmett then opened the Case in behalf of his Clients, William Luccus Rose attended & was sworn and examined as a witness on the behalf of the Protestors Mr Anthony Ernest was on behalf of the Members Elect requested to be sworn as a witness & was accordingly sworn & Examined

Mr Gardenier then addressed the Common Council on the part of the Members Elect to which Mr Emmet (with permission of the Board) replied,

Alderman Bingham then presented the following Resolution

This Board having received through the medium of their Committee the allegations of the different Inspectors the Clerk of the Poll and a number of the Electors of the sixth Ward and hearing the Counsel fully on the subject Do on a full investigation of the contested Election believe that some mistake has taken place for that Ward for Charter Officers, [387] Therefore resolved as the sence of this Board that a warrant issue from the proper officers calling a new election for the said sixth Ward as speedily as may be.

His honor the recorder then moved that the question be taken on the resolution without debate but that each member if he pleases assign his reason for his vote on the question to agree to the same it was carried in the affirmative

The Recorder then rose and in a speech of considerable length assigned the reasons which influenced his vote and gave his vote in the negative

Mr Hoghland then moved that the resolution Just passed "that the question should be taken without debate but that each member if he pleased might assigns his reasons" be reconsidered to the end that the question might be debated—on the question of agreeing to the same a Division having been called it passed in the negative in the manner following Alderman Torrey & Mr Douglass not Voting

Negative Mr Recorder Aldⁿ Mesier, Carpenter, Dickinson 3^d Dickinson 7th Watkins Fish, Mr Hawes Lawrence Hardenbrook—10

The members then proceeded to give their vote and assign their reasons, and a division having been called the Resolution presented by Alderman Bingham passed in the negative in the manner following Ald^m Torrey & M^r Douglass not Voting

[388] The Recorder then proposed the following preamble & resolution "The Board proceeded to the determination of the legality of "the return of the Inspectors of the late Election for Charter officers "for the sixth Ward—and after hearing Counsel for and against the "said Return Resolved that the said Return is legal and that the "persons therein returned are duly elected to the offices mentioned in "the said return respectively" on the question to agree to the same a division having been called it was carried in the affirmative in the manner following Ald^m Torrey & M^r Douglass not voting on the question

Affirmative—M^r Recorder Ald^m Mesier, Carpenter, Dickinson 3^d Dickinson 7th Watkins Fish M^r Jones Hawes Lawrence Bogardus Kirby Hardenbrook 13.

Negative—Ald^m Bingham Minthorn M^r Hoghland Timpson Palmer 5.

M^r Bogardus then moved that the Report of the Committee including the Testimony reported by them together with the Testimony given by M^r Rose & M^r Ernest be published under the direction of the said Committe.

A petition of Benjamin G Minturn and John T Champlin praying a Grant to them as Tenants in Common of a certain parcell of made ground situate near the new slip extending from Water Street to Front Street with a wharf in the east river in front thereof no Grant having yet been made by the Com. Council for the land so reclaimed

Also a Pe[tition] from Benjⁿ G Minturn W^m Minturn & John T Champlin praying a Grant to them in trust under the will of W^m Minturn deceased for certain Lotts made Land in the 4th (formerly 5th) ward upon the East River, were received & refered to the Comptroler & Street Commissioner

A Report was received from the Collector of the Corporation which was ordered to be filed

A Representation from James Hardie was received stating that under the direction of some of the Magistrates in enforcing the Sunday Law he had been prosecuted by a person whom he had interdicted in the sale of Oysters and that a Recovery had been had against him for \$12.¹/₁₀₀ Whereupon ordered that the Comptroller report a warrant for refunding the same to the said James Hardie

The Committee from their present view of the subject are of opinion that a contract for finishing the surveys placing monuments

and completing the work marked out by the Commissioners would be proper still however they think it would be advisable before any definitive step be taken by the Corporation to have a conference with the Commissioners themselves or some one of them to know more precisely their views and opinions on the subject they therefore recommend [394] that a Committee be appointed to confer with them and report to this Board what measures ought to be pursued in relation to the subject

3^d such accommodations as may be deemed fit and necessary for the steam Boats on this side of the River shall from time to time be made by the Corporation and in the interim between the commencement of the Term and the readiness of the steam Boats the Ferry must be kept on the present establishment or on one equally accomodating

4th The Rent is to be paid quarterly and in default thereof the usual remedies by distress Reentry &c are to be resorted to nor is the Toll or fare during the said Term to be raised higher than what is at present received

Mr Stevens has acceded to the above terms and as soon as the lease is prepared by Counsel will on his part willingly execute the same, All which is respectfully submitted by your Committe

An application was received from Gilbert Van Mater to lease the vacant corporation property in the town of Brooklyn above Water Street and for a new lease of the property he now holds, which was referred to the ferry committee and Street Commissioner

The petition of Jesse Hodges to be appointed as Inspector of wood was read & referred to the committee, to whom had been referred the

subject of equalizing the wood districts viz Alderman Hogland & Messieurs Lawrence and Douglass

A petition from certain persons, burnt out by the late fire in Charlotte Street, praying for some relief and assistance was read and referred to the Committee of Charity and the Commissioners of the Alms House

The Street Commissioner laid before the board a communication from Messieurs John R. Murray and William Ogden with Justis Dearman's account for building the pier on the North side of Albany Basin & repairing the old wharf; Whereupon ordered, that the same be referred to the Street Commissioner and Comptroller

out Grand Street from Elizabeth to Orange Streets, which was confirmed and Lewis Angevine was appointed Collector

The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition of James Barkley reported, that if James Bartlett, in whose name an award was made, on the 21st August 1809 was intended in favour of the petitioner, that the Board was indebted to him in the sum of \$800 with interest from the 21st November 1809. Whereupon ordered, that the same be referred back to the Street Commissioner, with instructions to ascertain the facts

On motion, Resolved, that the Street Commissioner furnish the Superintendant of Repairs with a map, or if in his opinion, it will answer [5] as well, with a list of all the slips and bulkheads, which the board are bound to keep in repair

The City Inspector, reported that he had received returns from the Chief Engineer of the names & places of abode of the members composing the fire department of this city. On motion ordered, that the same be published

The Committee, to whom was referred the report of a committee, on a communication of Gouverneur Morris Esq^r in behalf of the Commissioners for laying out streets, reported, that from a conference with M^r Morris, one of the Commissioners and M^r Randell their surveyor, they are confirmed in the opinion communicated in the former report, that the Commissioners have substantially completed the duties assigned them and will within the period prescribed by law, file the maps,

field notes &c therein required. The Committee, however, perceive, that although the Commissioners may comply with the law so far forth as relates to what is immediately incumbent on them, still much will remain to be done to give effect to their plans and operations and to satisfy the principal object of the law itself. The avenue and intersecting lines not having yet been measured and designated by monuments, so as to give a finish and precision to the work, to provide for this, the Commissioners advise, that Mr Randell, the surveyor employed by them be continued by the Corporation to complete the surveys and measurements already begun in conformity to their plans to place the necessary monuments &c. To furnish an idea of the probable expense of thus completing the business, the committee refer to an estimate and [6] information obtained from the Commissioners & Surveyor, from which it appears, that whole extent of measurement will be about 605,000 feet and the probable expense about 13,000 dollars that is about \$20 or \$21 per 1000 feet

The Commissioners also suggest, that as the statute, under which they and those acting under them have derived their authority will expire on the 3^d day of April next, that a renewal by the legislature of such parts and provisions as may be necessary to protect the Surveyors and agents, who may be employed by this Board, in like manner, as those heretofore employed by them will be necessary

To perform the work with the accuracy required certain instruments of peculiar construction will be necessary, which it is proposed, should be purchased by the Corporation for the use of the surveyor & made under his direction, provided the expense shall not exceed \$1000; and that he shall take the same at the original cost, and that the same be deducted from his account at the close of the transaction. To this must be added, the cost of the monuments and the transportation of them to the ground, where they are to be placed, which will probably amount to \$4000 making a total expense, now to be incurred of about \$17,000 or \$18,000.

To complete on the ground the plans, which the Commissioners shall present in paper, the committee think it would be advisable for this Board to avail themselves of the talents and experience of Mr Randell who is willing to contract to complete the same in the most accurate manner and with the least possible delay, at the estimate [7] above stated viz \$20 or \$21 for every 1000 feet. For this purpose, they recommend, that a committee be authorised to contract with Mr Randell for performing and perfecting the surveys and measure-

ments, placing the monuments and all other things necessary in relation to the subject

The Assistant City Inspector presented drafts of ordinances from N^o 6256 to N^o 6356 inclusive for the correction of sundry nuisances, which were passed

Peter Wright was appointed a member of Fire Engine Company N^o 16. in the room of William King resigned, the Chief Engineer having certified the corresponding vacyancy

A report of the comptroller, on the petition of John N. Greenzeback was received respecting the renewal of his lease for lot N^o 191 Common Lands was received in the words following

The petition of John N. Greenzeback having been referred to the Comptroller, the 29th October last, he respectfully reports, that the petitioner holds the lease of Lot N^o 191 Common Lands twelve years unexpired from the 1st May next, at an annual rent of fifteen dollars. He is desirous of erecting a good house on the premises but the term being short, he proposes, that the Corporation should grant him a new lease for a longer time on fair and equitable terms, or if more agreeable to sell the lot; or finally, that if neither of the above proposals should meet the approbation of the board, that they would give him assurance that he shall have the preference, in case the Common Council should be disposed to sell or lease at the expiration of the lease now held by him.

In the opinion of the Subscriber, it would be unadvisable to interfere, during the existence of the present lease, for the following reasons. At the time [19] when the Common Lands were sold, they were disposed of alternately on lease and in fee subject to an annual quit rent. The supposition no doubt was, that as improvements were made on the latter, the value of the lease lots would be enhanced at the expiration of the term, for which they were sold, and then reverting to the Corporation could be disposed of in one mode or the other to greater advantage

By interfering at this time, either by sale, an extension of the lease, or giving assurance of preemption, the precedent would form a ground of authority for other applicants, similarly situated and inroads would consequently be made, in a system wisely calculated to enhance the public revenue

It cannot be presumed, that the petitioner need apprehend any other than a fair and honourable proceeding, on the part of the Corporation at the expiration of the present lease; should he be disposed to make improvements on the lot in question

From a review of these considerations, the Subscriber is fully impressed with the importance of not innovating or [changing] the system already devised, from a conviction of the serious evils, which may eventually result to the revenue of the Corporation, and the permanent interests of the Community

The Street Commissioner, to whom had been referred back the petition of James Barkley reported, that he had ascertained, that James Barkley is the person intended in the award and assessment for opening Walker Street and that the sum of Eight hundred dollars was due to him, with interest from the 21st day of November 1809, which report was agreed to & the Comptroller directed to issue a warrant for the same, at next meeting of the Board.

On motion, resolved, that the Superintendant of repairs be directed to cause the Engine house belonging to the fire company N^o 7 to be ceiled over head, in such manner as he shall think proper.

The Committee on Laws and ordinances [21] to whom it was referred to report the laws, which are about to expire, and which it is proper in their opinion to re-enact, presented the following report.

“ The Committee on Laws and ordinances to whom was referred by the Common Council, the laws and ordinances, which are about to expire, and which it is proper in their opinion to re-ordain with or without amendments respectfully report, that the laws & ordinances

contained in the printed volume, will very shortly have been three years in operation since they have been first passed, without having been renewed and must consequently be re-ordained or they will cease to be in force. The Committee have examined and revised such of them as would expire before the next regular meeting of the Board, if not now renewed & respectfully present the same to the Board, with such amendments as have seemed to the Committee proper and advisable. In some instances, the original ordinances have undergone subsequent alterations and amendments and these the Committee have incorporated with the original ordinance, thereby reducing the whole into one law. It is proper to add, that in the two cases of the ordinances respecting the Board of Health and that on the subject of the Alms House & Bridewell, the Committee have recommended the passage of temporary ordinances for the sole purpose of continuing in force the laws on the subject until more mature consideration can be had in regard to the establishment of a permanent system. This was done, in the case of the Board of Health, at the recommendation and by the desire of that Board, and in case of the Alms House department, because [22] the Committee wished to have the aid of the talents and experience of the present Superintendent, who is unable, from indisposition, at this time to give it

A petition was received from Fire Engine Company N^o 10 stating, that the engine belonging to the said company is old and in a state of decay and praying to have a Suction Engine of a larger size. Whereupon ordered, that *that* the same be referred to the committee on the fire department

The appointment of the assessors named, viz Ezekiel Bishop, Solomon Wheeler, Robert Coles, Abraham Hart and Stephen Kingsland) were laid over till the next meeting of the Board.

The Committee also presented an engrossed deed from the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty to David Hosack, which was accepted & directed [34] to be executed accordingly.

7th A Law for the better regulation of the city watch and for the division of the city into districts for that purpose

8th A Law for establishing the assize & regulating the inspection of bread.

9th A Law to regulate the sale of Charcoal

10th [35] A Law to regulating the driving of horses, carts and carriages and sleds in the city of New York

11th A Law for the establishment of signal poles on Staten Island

12th A Law to regulate the admission of Freeman

13th A law to regulate the fees of weigh masters and measurers

A petition was received from Stephen Bourdett and Jacob Peterson, stating their desire to contract with the Corporation for the wharves, piers and slips belonging to the Common Council. Ordered that the same lie on the table.

The City Collector presented a report in the words following

The City Collector, in compliance with the resolution of the Board, thinks it his duty to present all the information in his power

The City Collector, in compliance with the resolution of the Board, thinks it his duty to present all the information in his power respecting the object of their enquiries, although at the same [39] time, he begs leave to state to the Honourable the Board, that, in making such communication, he is giving up a private property, the procuring of which has cost him much time and trouble

When the Collector was appointed to the office, which he now holds, all in that department was confusion. Accounts had been permitted to remain unpaid from one to fourteen years and the Water Lots were generally entered in the Leger to names different from those, to whom they were granted, and some of these grants were so early as the year 1734. To find such persons as Sir Peter Warren and many others in the Leger was impossible. The Collector, therefore, determined to make two maps viz one of the East and the other of the North River Water Lots. One of these is 42 feet in length and the other 19. By making these maps, finding the present owners, and dividing the grants amongst each, according to the extents, which they respectively occupy, he has been able to ascertain the exact sum, which each person had to pay; but in executing this business, the Collector found it to be a work of immense labour, as he had to procure his information from very old and almost destroyed papers and likewise from several of the oldest inhabitants of the City. About nine months of incessant industry and application were devoted to this work before it could be completed. He likewise found his own paper; as he intended that the said maps should be his own private property, that he might thereby be enabled the more effectually to execute the duties of his office. The Honourable the Corporation, however, having called for all the information he possesses respecting his department, that information will be now communicated to the utmost of his power

[40] The Collector further states, that in the first year after his appointment, he collected the sum of \$58,524 $\frac{9}{100}$: in the second year

\$70.428 $\frac{5}{100}$ and in the third year, ending the 18th ult. the sum of \$61.446 $\frac{1}{100}$. He further begs leave to add, that Mr Wynkoop his predecessor was to have received at the rate of five per cent for all monies, which he should collect; but finding it impossible to make wages upon these terms, he resigned in about 6 weeks after his appointment.

It will be obvious to the Board from the statement the Collector has made as above of the monies, which he has paid into the City Treasury, that his compensation has not amounted to one per Cent, and he is persuaded, that if he had not made the said maps, he could not be able to collect one third part of the money, which he now does

In complying, therefore, with the resolution of the Board of the 31st ult; he does it in full confidence, that their justice and liberality will be manifested in the compensation they may think him entitled to, for his extra services as above mentioned (signed)

The Street Committee, to whom it was referred to examine and adjust the bills of George Gosman and John M'Comb presented to the Common Council for payment, reported, that, under all the circumstances of the case, in their opinion, the total amount of the bills \$210.15 ought to be paid. Whereupon ordered, that the said report be agreed to and that the Comptroller, at next meeting, report a warrant for payment of the said sum.

The Alderman and Assistant of the Fifth ward [41] to whom was referred the account of John Anderson for erecting a pier at Duane Basin reported, that they had examined the work done by him, and that according to contract, he was entitled to receive the sum of eighteen hundred and forty three dollars, which would leave the sum of sixteen hundred and forty dollars, in the hands of the Corporation to complete the contract. Which report was agreed to and the Comptroller was directed to report a warrant in his favour for one thousand eight hundred & forty three dollars.

The following persons were appointed assessors, on the ordinance passed at the last meeting of the Board for opening Dover Street, viz Ezekiel Bishop, Solomon Wheeler Robert Coles, Abraham Hart & Stephen Kingsland.

The Committee on Laws & ordinances reported such of the remaining laws and ordinances, comprised in the printed volume and

soon about to expire, as appear to the Committee proper to be renewed. They stated, that they had incorporated the several ordinances, which have been passed subsequently to the publication of the printed volume, on the same subjects into the respective ordinances relating thereto and they agreed to recommend to the Common Council certain amendments to the law "to regulate the inspection, cartage & sale of lime" the "law concerning ferries and the "Law to regulate sales at auction in the City of New York" &c which they respectively submitted to the consideration of the Common Council

The following are the titles of the Laws, [42] which the Committee reported

1st A Law for the appointment of Superintendants of streets

2^d A Law to prevent nuisances and to provide for the security of the public health of the City of New York

3^d A Law for preventing and extinguishing fires, and to regulate the keeping and transportation of Gunpowder in the City of New York

4th A Law to prevent the firing of guns and setting off squibs in the City of New York.

5th A Law to regulate the inspection, sale and cartage of lime

6th A Law for the regulating of public porters in the City of New York

7th A Law to regulate the landing and sale of hay in the City of New York.

8th A Law to regulate the lying of vessels at the public wharves & in the slips and to establish the rates of wharfage

9th A law for regulating partition fences and partition walls for supporting ground in the City of New York.

10th A Law to prevent improper conduct on certain days

11th A Law to regulate sales at auction in the City of New York

12th A Law to regulate surveyors.

13th A Law Concerning ferries

14th A Law to regulate the sale of horses, to prevent their running loose in the street and to prevent racing in the streets and highways

15th A Law to regulate the measure of coals

16th A Law to regulate the sale & cartage of manure, sand and clay and the inspection of manure [43] in the City of New York

17th A Law to prevent the flying of kites in the public streets & highways

18th A Law to prevent the ringing or tolling of bells for funerals in the City of New York

19th A Law for the better recovery of fines, penalties and forfeitures incurred by breaches of the laws of the Corporation

All of which were passed.

The following are the amendments suggested, by the Committee, to some of the preceding ordinances and agreed to by the Board.

Amendment to the " Law to regulate the inspection, sale and cartage of Lime "

In the first section erase " and at least once in every year "

Amendment to the " Law to regulate the landing & sale of hay in the City of New York "

In the last section, after the word " piers " in the 6th line, insert these words " And of one birth in the South East corner of Duane Street basin and from thence to the outer end of the West side thereof "

Amendments to " the Law to regulate sales at auction in the City of New York.

Section 3rd Strike out in the 3^d & 4th lines the words " of such articles only, as are, by this ordinance allowed to be sold at those places " and insert " of articles of household furniture only " Also strike out the words " in Wall Street between Pearl Street & Front Street " in the 7th & 8th lines of same section

Section 5th Strike out the words " at any time in the forenoon " in the 4th line of this section and insert instead thereof the words " at any time between the hours of nine o'clock in the forenoon and one oclock in the afternoon "

10th Section. Strike out the whole section & substitute [44] the following viz " And be it further ordained, that it shall not be lawful for any of the auctioneers, or other person whomsoever to sell or expose to sale, at public vendue, auction or outcry, any dry goods, hardware or other articles, excepting household furniture, in any of the public streets of this city excepting as herein before permitted, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offence "

Amendment to the 5th Section of the ordinance

" To regulate Surveyors "

5th And be it further ordained, That for taking a survey for the purpose of regulating and paving streets ; making a map or profile of the same and furnishing a statement in writing of the number & breadth of the lots & the names of the owners & occupants of the

same, the said surveyor or surveyors shall have and receive at the rate of four dollars for each hundred feet, so to be paved or regulated, which sum shall be charged on the assessment of the street so to be regulated or paved

Amendment to the law Concerning Ferries

Sect: 1st Insert from the law of the state in the 1st part of this section

“ That the ferry masters or lessees of the ferries for the time being, of the ferries between the City of New York and the island Nassau shall at all times, in the months of May, June, July, August and September in every year, have their boats ready for transportation of passengers and goods from half an hour before sunrise in every morning to nine o'clock in the evening and in all the other months of the year from Sunrise to eight o'clock in the evening and that no passenger shall be detained more than 5 [45] minutes, under the penalty of fifty cents for every offence, at any time, within the hours or times aforesaid. Provided the wind, weather or ice do not render the crossing of the river difficult or very dangerous And that the Lessees or keepers for the time being of the several other ferries &c (take in the remainder of the section & strike out the 2^d 3^d and 4th Sections

The following was presented by M^r Hardenbrook

Resolved, that in future the repairing of all intersections of Streets be paid for by the Corporation. Whereupon ordered, that the same be referred to the Street Commissioner

The Street Commissioner presented a communication from John R Murray & William Ogden with Justis Dearman's account for building the pier on the North side of Albany basin and repairing the old wharf, in order that the Corporation might take such order thereon as might be thought expedient. Whereupon resolved, that the same be referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the 1st and 3^d wards

An application was made in behalf of M^{rs} Morris for a surplus of about five inches of ground, included in her water grant, which was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Fourth ward and the Comptroller

The application of Samuel M. Thompson and Thomas S. Clarkson for water grants on the North River was received and referred to the Comptroller and Street Commissioner

On motion resolved, that John Bogart be and he is hereby appointed Commissioner [46] of the Alms House and Bridewell

M^r Hardenbrook called for the report of the committee for laying

out streets, on the resolution presented by him and passed on the 24th ult: The chairman of the said committee being absent, no report was made

On motion of M^{rs} Jones, ordered, that a committee be appointed to examine and report a statement of facts on the subject of the necessary repairs of wharves and slips, wherein the corporation of the City are interested with others, with the opinion of what proportion of the expence of such repairs, the Corporation must bear, and whether in case the whole expence should be paid by the Corporation, any part thereof can be recovered from the other owners, and what steps, if any are necessary to be taken to obtain such recovery. The Committee appointed was Messieurs, Jones, Morss, King, the Comptroller and Street Commissioner

On motion, resolved, that the Superintendant of repairs be directed to obtain a list of all the public docks and slips belonging to the Corporation

The following persons were appointed firemen, the Chief Engineer certifying the corresponding vacancies

The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition of A. Arden asking compensation for damages said to have been sustained by a canal dug by direction of Doctor Browne thro' a lot of ground belonging to the petitioner on the West side of Elizabeth Street, between Hester and Grand Streets reported.

That previous to any regulation of Streets and lots in the neighbourhood of the lot in question, when the surface of the earth was in a state of nature, there was a pond of water between Bowery Road and Elizabeth Street at the foot of Bunker's Hill on the South side. And when a greater quantity of water ran into the pond than [71] could be contained therein, it found vent thro' this lot, passing off in a Westerly direction and obliquely across the lots and streets to the Collect Meadow, crossing Hester Street near the intersection of Orange Street. This was the natural state of the ground as long as the oldest inhabitants can remember

In 1803 Bowery road was regulated and dug down about 4 feet at the intersection of Grand Street, which made it lower than the outlet above mentioned and caused the water to pond in the road. The next year, Grand Street was dug out from Bowery to Elizabeth Street, and being not yet dug through the hill, the inhabitants were greatly annoyed by the standing water. To remove as far as possible, the cause of complaint, Doctor Browne ordered a ditch or canal to be dug from Grand Street along Elizabeth Street about 155 feet, which brought it to the lowest ground being at the said lot of Miss Arden

Doctor Browne being a man of science, & Professor of Hydraulics, very well knew, that the place the water had formerly made choice of must then have been the lowest, and all he had to do was to dig this as much as he had done the Bowery Road to make them of the same proportionable height to each other as they were before; and the lot being vacant he turned his ditch through it; and as the ground descended rapidly to the Westward, he had but a small distance to dig before the water of its own accord pursued its former track. How long this ditch continued open, the Street Commissioner does not remember, but it must have been until Grand Street was dug through the hill, [72] which he thinks was two or three years

All the above difficulties and many more originated in a miscalculation of the time it would take to dig through the hill

It is believed, that some have been much greater sufferers in this instance than the petitioner; but how far Your Honourable Board is accountable to individuals for damages sustained by premature regulations of Streets, the Street Commissioner is not prepared to say, neither does he think himself a competent judge

But the trespass complained of is on the property of an individual

If a Street Commissioner, in carrying into effect the ordinances of this Board, pursuing his own judgment in contradiction to all advice of those capable of judging, finding himself embarrassed, to extricate himself in some measure from the blame, should commit a trespass on private property or by agreement incur expenses, unauthorised by this Board, would he not as an individual, be bound to pay such damage and expense

In the opinion of the Street Commissioner he would and the Corporation would not be chargeable with such damage or expense. And as he believes the act complained of to be an act of Joseph Browne and not of the Corporation of the City of New York, he is of opinion, that the petitioner should have leave to withdraw her petition "

West stating [80] that he was builder of the houses of Messieurs Lynch & Prime in Marketfield Street; that on account of the Springy nature of the soil in that part, the cellars were filled with water; & praying permission to dig a drain through the street to the river, was referred to the Street Commissioner and Superintendant of repairs with authority to allow the same, if they judged it advisable.

An account of Jacob Halsey for bulkhead at the mouth of Canal Street was presented and referred to the Comptroller & Street Commissioner and the Superintendant of repairs.

The Committee, to whom it was referred to consider and report their opinion, whether any and what improvements can be made in the Law concerning the police of the city and trial of offences therein reported

“that they have duly deliberated upon the subject committed to them and are persuaded, that much improvement may be made in the laws relating to the police department, particularly as it regards the punishment of petty crimes and misdemeanours. By a late act of the legislature, the jurisdiction of the Court of sessions in this city, has been extended so as to embrace all cases, except such as effect life, by which the business of that court has been considerably increased. The Sessions sit six times a year and usually continue about a fortnight each time. A great proportion of the citizens are exempt by law from serving on Juries, and that duty is extremely hard upon those, who remain subject to it, and has long been a matter of serious complaint among them. The present system is also attended with great inconvenience to parties accused, many of whom are committed to [81] prison for want of surety, on suspicion of crimes, some are falsely accused, and are compelled to endure a long confinement before a trial can be had. The same delay, which is sometimes the occasion of punishing the innocent is well calculated to assist the guilty to

escape. The witnesses against them often reside at a distance, and are unwilling to be detained, or if they reside in this city, to avoid the trouble of attending court will frequently absent themselves, or in some way elude the *the* vigilance of the public prosecutor. Your Committee have found it difficult to devise a plan to remedy these evils, and at the same time to secure to the parties accused a fair and impartial trial according to the constitution and laws of the State. And before they proceed to draft a law to be recommended to the Legislature, they have concluded to submit to the Common Council the following sketch of a plan viz. That another Criminal Court be organized in the City to be denominated the Inferior Court of Sessions of the peace in and for the City and County of New York, with power either with or without a jury, at the option of the party accused to hear, try and determine according to law upon all indictments or informations to be brought before the said court for every petit larceny, assault and battery, unaccompanied with no other charge, and disorderly house keepers committed within the said city.

The Court to consist of three judges to be appointed by the Council of appointment, whose duty it shall be to *a* hold a court daily (Sundays and certain other days excepted. The judges to have a salary of \$ each per annum

That a Clerk for the same court be likewise [82] appointed, by the Council of appointment, whose duty it shall be *ex officio* to exhibit informations before the said court in a summary manner against all persons accused of any of the aforesaid offences & brought before the said court for trial. It shall also be the duty of the said clerk to conduct such pro[se]cutions, on the part of the people of this State, except in cases, where the court shall require the attendance of the District Attorney. The Clerk to receive the same fees as are now allowed by law to Clerks of Courts of General Sessions of the Peace.

That it shall be lawful for the Courts of Oyer and Terminer and General Sessions of the peace in the said city to transmit indictments for any of the offences aforesaid found by a Grand Jury before them, to this court for trial and to bind the Witnesses and parties to appear accordingly.

And the court shall have power to summon a jury once a fortnight by the ordinary process to be directed to any Constable or Marshal of the City; but shall not compel the attendance of such jury longer than three days at a time

That the party accused shall make his or [her] election, to be tried

with or without a jury before the Court proceed to enquire into the merits of the case

In case of the death, sickness or necessary absence of any one or more of the Judges, their places in the mean time, to be supplied by the same number of the Aldermen of the city

A memorial from a number of inhabitants to the Honourable the Legislature of this State, praying, that an act might be passed declaratory of the Law rendering the owners of dogs liable for damages done

by them & authorising [96] the different counties to lay a tax on them was laid before the Board with a request, that they would unite with them in their application to the Legislature. Therefore resolved, that the Common Council coinciding with the memorialists, in the opinion, that provisions by law, as mentioned in said memorial would be highly useful, do therefore respectfully unite with the memorialists in their application to the Honourable the Legislature upon that subject.

On motion of Alderman Mesier, Resolved, that a committee be appointed to take into the consideration the propriety of making an application to the Legislature respecting the Government House in this city. The Committee appointed were Alderman Mesier, Hoghland & M^r Hawes

The Committee on the amendments to the Police Department reported a memorial to be presented to the Legislature on that subject, of which the following is a copy

To the Honourable the Legislature of the State of New York.

The Memorial of the Common Council of the City of New York respectfully sheweth,

That great and serious evils are experienced in the said city under the present system of the administration of criminal law therein; that the jurisdiction of the Court of General Sessions of the peace in and for the said city has been extended to comprehend all cases except such as affect life, by which the business of that court has considerably increased; that the said court is held once in every [97] six weeks and usually continues to be held for two weeks; that the majority of cases, which occupy the attention of the said Court consists of petit larcenies, assaults & batteries and complaints against disorderly houses; that, in those cases, it frequently happens, that the parties accused are confined for a long time in the City prison for the want of bail and a great number of witnesses are compelled to attend the trial of them for many days, both on the part of the people and on the part of the defendants; that in a number of instances, false accusations are made and the parties accused, though innocent, are compelled for the want of bail to endure a long confinement before their trials can be had, and this delay, which sometimes punishes the innocent, is also well calculated to assist the guilty to escape; The witnesses against them often reside at a distance and are unwilling to be detained, or if they reside in the City to avoid the trouble of attending court will frequently absent themselves, or, in some way, evade the vigilance of the public prosecutor; that although the Court of General Sessions of the peace

in said city can execute the business now assigned to it, during the times it may be held by law, the inconveniences above mentioned and others, which attend the present system are become so obvious and are so much the subject of general complaint among the Citizens of New York, that your memorialists have considered it their duty to investigate the same and endeavour to devise a remedy for such extensive evils. After due deliberation, it appears to your memorialists to be necessary to institute a new court of inferior jurisdiction in the said city to be held daily for the trial of the offences above [98] mentioned, and they have accordingly digested the plan of such a court and beg leave to submit the same to the consideration of the Honourable the legislature in the form of a bill, which is hereunto annexed & which together with certain other provisions therein contained they pray may be passed into a law or that such other legislative remedy in the premises be afforded as to your Honourable Body shall seem meet; And Your memorialists will ever pray &c”

Whereupon the said memorial and the bill corresponding therewith were agreed to; and his Honour the Mayor was requested to forward the same under his signature and the seal of this corporation.

The Street Commissioner & Comptroller to whom had been referred the resolution of Mr Jones, on the subject of an assessment, on a Lot Corner of Hester & Crosby Streets belonging to W^m North reported,

That, on an investigation of the subject the Street Commissioner finds that on the 25th day of March last, he received from Benjamin Mumford the sum of 89 $\frac{58}{100}$ dollars, which he deposited in the Treasury, being the amount of several assessments and expenses due on Lot N^o 716 Bayards farm, there being no evidence in the office of any part of this being paid. The Attorney of the Board presented the following report & resolution, which were agreed to

“ The Attorney of the Board begs leave to state, that the practice of forestalling in our markets has, and is continually increasing and no provision, at present, exists, to compensate [103] the person or persons, that would inform against such as are in the habit of violating the law regulating our public markets and as no possible inconvenience can arise from allowing to such as chuse to inform and furnish testimony to convict those in the constant practice of infringing the law, he has submitted a resolution on that subject for the consideration of the Board ”

“ Resolved, that the Attorney of this Board shall be authorised after the recovery and receipt of any penalty under and by virtue of the “ Law to regulate the public markets in the city of New York ” to pay over to the person, who shall give the said attorney such information of any offence against the said ordinance as shall enable the said attorney to prosecute the offender to judgment, one half part of the said penalty so recovered and received as in his judgment he shall deem meet and proper.

The Attorney of the Board, on the application of William Coley, reported, that provision was already made by the ordinance of the Board establishing the Street Commissioner's office, sufficient to give the relief required. Which report was approved.

The City Inspector presented drafts of ordinances for correction of sundry nuisances from N^o 6851 to N^o 6951 inclusive; which were passed.

The Street Commissioner, superintendant of repairs and Comptroller, to whom was referred the accounts of Jacob Halsey for repairs done at the Dock, at the foot of Spring Street, & for building Ferry Stairs at Hornes Hook reported, That after an examination of the [104] accounts and making deductions to the amount of \$16.75, there

appears a balance due of \$1131.15, agreeably to the account presented, & recommend, that a warrant should issue for the same

It appears to be a question susceptible of legal investigation, whether the holders of bonds issued for the payment of ground taken to open Canal Street, are liable for the *assess* [105] assessment standing against the persons, to whom the bonds were given. A difference of opinion has been expressed on this subject, and as the Board have, in frequent instances declined interfering with those bonds for the present; the subscriber cannot see the propriety of the Board making a declaration as requested, at this time, least embarrassments might arise in the collection of the assessment ”

directing the levelling of snow in the streets of the City of New York. Passed February 18th 1811

Whereas, in consequence of the late heavy falls of snow, the streets, particularly where narrow, are, at present, in such situation, as to render it scarcely possible, in case of fire, to convey the engines to the place or places, where they may be necessary.

Be it, therefore, ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That it shall be the duty of each and every owner and occupant of houses and lots, to cause the snow in front of their respective houses and lots, in the streets, to be forthwith levelled in such manner as to render the conveyance of fire engines from one place to another, as practicable and easy as possible; and that if any owner or occupant shall neglect to cause the snow to be levelled, in manner as aforesaid, he or she shall, for each neglect, forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars, to be recovered in any court having cognizance thereof with costs of suit

And be it further ordained, That it shall be the duty of the Superintendants of Streets to cause this ordinance to be rigidly enforced.

The Board having been informed that Mr Tabele Inspector of wood had offered, if the Inspection district lately attended to by Joshua Hunt deceased were added to his, that he would allow to the widow & family of the deceased, one fourth of the fees received in the same. Whereupon resolved, that Mr Tabele have charge of the said inspection district for two weeks from this day and that in the mean time the Committee of Charity [110] be requested to enquire into the case & report the same to the Board

From her situation at the foot of the Oswego Market, she is calculated to be most essentially useful in extinguishing fires in the central & most

thickly inhabited part of the city. As of late years, the fire engines are principally supplied by leaders, forming a line by means of engines, communicating with the rivers, it becomes of great importance to furnish the different engines with leaders in proportion to their respective powers; and money expended for that purpose is in the opinion of your Committee usefully employed. N^o 24 has at present about 260 feet of leader and is capable of usefully employing one hundred feet more, which from the reputation of the present company, will doubtless be the case

Your Committee, therefore, recommend, that Fire Engine N^o 24 be allowed, one hundred feet of leader in addition to their present quantity, and that the Chief Engineer cause the same to be made ”

A letter was received from John Vanderbilt Esq^r one of the representatives from the City in the State Legislature, informing the Board, that a bill was now depending before the legislature for increasing the rates of wharfage in the city & changing the system by affixing the dues upon the cargoes of vessels instead of the vessels themselves & requesting the opinion of the Board as to the proposed bill.

The City Inspector reported drafts of ordinances for correction of sundry nuisances from N^o [125] 7052 to N^o 7200, which were passed

A communication from a committee consisting of John Bingham, James Townsend and Benjamin Romaine appointed at a meeting of some citizens at Martling's tavern on the 27th ultimo, presenting sundry resolutions then passed and a draft of a memorial to the legislature praying sundry alterations in the Charter of the city, making the office of Mayor elective &c & requesting the concurrence of the Common Council therein was read. Whereupon resolved, that the consideration thereof be postponed

The Committee, to whom was referred the application of Benjamin Smith, for a renewal of his lease, on the Store House, part of the Corporation property at Brooklyn reported,

That in their opinion, it is not advisable, at the present time to let the same for a longer time than one year. That M^r Smith has heretofore paid for the same five hundred and seventy five dollars and the taxes. M^r Smith now offers Six hundred dollars and necessary repairs, for the year, commencing the first of May next. This is as large a sum as has been offered for the same.

As M^r Smith has been heretofore punctual in the payment of his rent and in other respects is in the opinion of your committee, a worthy

man and a good tenant, they recommend that the premises he now occupies be lett to hire for the ensuing year upon the terms he offers

The Committee, to whom was referred the subject of the Government House presented the following draft of a report upon the subject

To the Honourable the Legislature of the State of New York in Senate & Assembly convened.

The memorial of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York respectfully sheweth,

That, from the conspicuous situation, in which the Government House stands & from its being so prominent an object in the view of every one and especially of foreigners, who frequent the most public walk in our city, the condition or state of repair in which it happens to be is and always must be a circumstance of great concern to your memorialists

As guardians of this city, its public buildings naturally demand the attention and as but few are acquainted with the history of this property, they therefore feel a solicitude, that its appearance should not longer disgrace its proprietors

The ruinous state, in which every part of this property now is and for a long time has been beggars subscription, The roof, walls, internally and externally, and ceilings of the house are rapidly going to decay, and even the arms of the state, which once so proudly decorated the front are defaced and fallen to pieces, that recollection only can now describe what was originally intended. The [127] fence, yard and out houses are of a piece with the principal building and appear consigned to ruin, but the area in front of its circular wall, the flight of Stone steps and ornamental iron railing are, if possible, in a still more desolate condition; part is already down; part is yet hanging and all must speedily tumble

Your memorialists feeling that the reputation and interest of

both the State and city is connected with this subject and presuming, that the legislature, when apprised of the ruinous condition, in which their property is, would be disposed immediately to adopt measures to have the same repaired or to place the same in such a situation as would in future be more profitable to the state and more creditable to the city, have, therefore, thought proper to make this representation; and they consequently do most respectfully solicit your Honourable Body to take such order in the premises speedily as will effectually remove all cause of complaint

And Your memorialists &c &c

Whereupon resolved, that the said memorial be approved, and that the same be engrossed and transmitted, under the seal of the Corporation to the Honourable the Legislature.

Various recommendations in favour of M^r Striker and of his conduct, while lessee of the ferry were read, also an offer of sundry persons to secure to the Board the payment of as much by M^r Striker, as any person should offer for the same—Recommendations in favour of granting the lease of said ferry to Hunt & Van Nostrandt subscribed by sundry inhabitants was also received and read. It was then moved, that the consideration of the proposals be postponed, which was agreed to. M^r Lawrence, who had voted in the affirmative, then moved, that the vote last taken be reconsidered. The question being taken thereon, it was carried in the affirmative

The Common Council then proceeded to determine by ballot, to whom the ferry should be leased, when it appeared, that there was a majority in favour of Hunt & Van Nostrandt. Whereupon resolved,

that the said ferry be leased to Theodosius Hunt and Lossee Van Nostrandt for the term of three years from the day of next, at the rent of \$3450 per annum, they finding sufficient security for the payment of the same and that the Comptroller prepare the leases with the usual covenants

On motion of Mr King, the ordinance for [129] appointing commissioners of the Alms House and Bridewell was so amended, that there should be not more than five nor less than three commissioners. Whereupon Nehemiah Allen was elected a Commissioner of the Alms House & Bridewell

On motion, resolved, that Mr Tabele be allowed to add the wood inspection district lately occupied by Joshua Hunt deceased to his own district until the further order of the Board on condition, that he allow to the widow of the said Hunt one third part of the fees of the two districts

The Committee appointed on the 25th ultimo on the subject of purchasing land from Martin Hoffman reported, " that they have agreed with Mr Hoffman for the purchase of his place at the sum limited, say Seventeen thousand five hundred dollars payable in three years, the interest payable annually, by the bonds of this Board, possession to be given on the first day of May next

Since the agreement, however, a small difficulty has arisen respecting the right of the former proprietor to land his wood &c, during his life and that of his wife and sister

There is also a mortgage to the United Insurance Company for \$8000 with interest payable half yearly and may be paid at the pleasure of this board, provided the interest is regularly paid

It, likewise, appears by the said minutes, that on the 16th of April 1804, a resolution passed to widen Roosevelt Street from Cherry to Water Streets, so as to make Roosevelt Street 44 feet on Cherry Street and 47 feet on Water Street; that the usual proceedings were taken accordingly and the damages and recompence to the proprietors were assessed at \$16125 and judgment thereupon entered in the Mayor’s Court: since which time various petitions have been presented to the Board on the subject & several resolutions have passed respecting it: but nothing decisive has taken place, that your committee have been able to discover

In obedience to the directions of the Common Council, your Committee have had a conference with the owners of the said ground, with a view to ascertain their price in case it should be deemed expedient to purchase a moiety thereof only, who expressed their willingness to accept the original assessment for the whole of the ground or to convey the one half for the sum of 9607.50 dollars. But the Committee are of opinion, that it will be more advantageous to take the whole of the ground so as to make the lower end of the street of the same width it is above Batavia Lane

Your committee are, likewise, of opinion, that the judgment so entered in the Mayor’s Court remains obligatory upon both parties and they recommend, that the same be acted upon without delay. And your Committee submit to the consideration of the Common Council, whether it would not be just, under the circumstances of this case, to appropriate the property on the West side of [136] Roosevelt Street (which was purchased for the purpose of opening that street) to the

Your Committee further beg leave to state that the village, in which the engine is kept and for whose benefit it will be employed, are not chargeable with any of the City taxes for engines. That it is at too great a distance ever to be employed in extinguishing fires in the city and that probably the company will not be obliged to turn out more than once or twice in the year for the purpose of extinguishing fires. If the Corporation should agree to the appointment of persons to man the engine, they would by law be exempted from doing military duty and of serving on juries. From the great number of persons exempt, the duty already falls heavily upon those liable to serve as jurors. Your Committee also apprehend, that the precedent is a dangerous one, and that if this application should be granted, it would be repeated by others in like circumstances. They are, therefore, of opinion, that the prayer of the petition ought not to be granted

The Committee, to whom was referred the †plan of John J. Boyreau respecting the establishing of a general chimney office reported.

That they have examined [145] the plan and considered the details as explained by him. At present they can only observe, that a due regard to the safety of the city as well as a respect to order and decency requires that this department should be taken out of the hands of the miserable corps, who, at present, manage it.

In consequence of no responsibility being attached to the poor little sweeps or to their cruel taskmasters, the business, at present, is executed carelessly, and that chimnies not being attended to, at regular intervals, frequently occasions accidents.

The Committee are, therefore, of opinion, that a plan calculated to regulate the department would not only meet the cordial approbation of the citizen; but contribute substantially to the safety and credit of the city

Doubts, however, have arisen whether the corporation are empowered to vest the management of this department exclusively in one individual, or in other respects, to render valid & efficient any general system, which might be advisable. Should this suggestion be deemed correct, the committee would then recommend an application to be made to the legislature for the requisite authority

The Committee, to whom was referred the petition of sundry watchmen against Captain Farrington reported, "that they have made that enquiry, which the serious imputations against the character of the said John Farrington and the high charges alleged against him as Captain of the watch, made necessary.

The only witness in support of the charges, that appeared, notwithstanding all the watch were present, was the complainant Elijah Haines himself alluded principally to a single case, which occurred upwards of a year ago, when it appeared, that Farrington invited him (Haines) when on duty to take a drink with him; that from his first applying to a Cooper's Shop and afterwards to a grocery for liquor, he (Haines) concluded, that Farrington was intoxicated. The tyrannical behaviour spoken of by his testimony alone alluded to what took place after he was discharged from the watch. It appeared, that in conversation with Farrington respecting some slander, which either he or his wife had been guilty of circulating; and in consequence of repeating the same, to Farrington's face, he was by him ordered out of the watch house. On appearing to comply with said order, rather reluctantly, Farrington threatened him and walked quick up to him; but did not strike him

Jonas C. Rhodes and Andrew V. Stout the [157] two other subscribers to the memorial utterly disclaim having any intention of charging said Farrington with the conduct and practices mentioned in said memorial and that when signing the same, they were led to believe, that they were only representing the causes of their several discharges.

They also fully concurred in the representation of the fifteen witnesses, who were examined, some of whom had been twenty two and several sixteen years watchmen in this city. These watchmen represented that Farrington had always conducted himself soberly, orderly and properly and that as captain he was only rigid to those, who neglected their duty. Many more were present, who, the committee understand, would have corroborated the testimony; but the committee were satisfied

They, therefore, are of opinion, that the charges contained in the memorial against John Farrington Captain of the City Watch are altogether without foundation

The Committee on the subject of the police reported the draft of a memorial to the legislature and a bill to be enacted into a law corresponding therewith, which were approved and directed to be engrossed, sealed and forwarded to his Honour the Mayor to be presented to the legislature at their present session

The following is a copy of the memorial

[158] To the Honourable the Legislature of the State of New York in Senate & Assembly convened

The memorial of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York respectfully sheweth

That a perfect police is in the opinion of your memorialists of extreme importance in every city and particularly in one daily and rapidly increasing like the city of New York. In perfecting such a police, the activity of the inferior officers & agents of the Police Magistrates is every way important and competent rewards are consequently necessary to stimulate such activity. At present, there are constables & marshals, in the service of the City Police, whose compensation arises merely from very trivial fees, which are allowed them by law, and which are the same in all cases, whether such cases are important or unimportant. It is very apparent to your memorialists, that in cases of difficulty and importance the established fees of office can hold out very partial inducement for increased exertion, and that, therefore, capital criminals may, through the want of competent remuneration to these inferior officers of justice, baffle pursuit & escape the penalties of the law

Your memorialists are, therefore, anxious, that some remedy may be applied to this gross defect, and they beg leave to suggest the following. Since the first establishment of the Police office in the city of New York, large quantities of property of various kinds & of considerable value seized under suspicion of being stolen have devolved to the office by remaining unclaimed by any owner: And from the proceeds of the sale of such property, the expenses of the office have been annually paid and a large surplus left in the hands [159] of the magistrates unappropriated. The proceeds of this unclaimed property with occasional assistance from the public revenue of the State will form a

sufficient fund more effectually to encourage the vigilance and activity of the several branches of a police confessedly of great benefit to the whole state of New York.

Your memorialists, therefore, pray, that provision may be made by law for the disposal of the property so remaining in the said office unclaimed at the expiration of every six months & that the proceeds thereof may be paid into the treasury & an established salary in addition to the existing fees may be allowed out of the public treasury to such constables and marshals as the police Magistrates may select on account of their vigilance & fidelity to attend at the said office and to execute their commands

A Law

to prevent gambling in the Streets and public grounds in the City of New York, Passed 8th April 1811

Whereas the assembling of persons in the park and other public places of this city, particularly on holidays, for the purpose of gambling, is a practice highly injurious to the morals of the young & rising generation; for remedy whereof

1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen & [178] Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened. That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons, either on a holiday or

on any day whatever, to put or place in or about the park, or in any of the public grounds, or streets, lanes or alleys of this city, any table or device of any kind whatever, by which gambling or any game of chance or hazard can or may be played under the penalty of twenty five dollars for each offence

2^d And be it further ordained, That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons, either on a holiday or on any other day whatever, to play at dice or at any other game of chance or hazard, for money or any thing whatever, in the park or in any of the public grounds or streets, lanes or alleys of this city, under the penalty of five dollars for each offence

3^d And be it further ordained, That if any person, who shall contravene this ordinance shall be a minor, an apprentice, a servant or a slave, his or her parent or guardian, master, mistress or owner, as the case may be, shall be deemed liable to pay the penalty so incurred, and shall and may be prosecuted for the same as aforesaid.

4th And be it further ordained, That the Attorney of this Board shall be authorized, after the recovery and receipt of any penalty, under and by virtue of this ordinance, to pay over to the person, who shall give the said Attorney such information of any offence against this ordinance as shall enable the said Attorney to prosecute the said offender to judgment, one half part of the said penalty so recovered and received.

Two hundred copies of the said ordinance were likewise ordered to be printed and posted up in proper [179] places

The following ordinance was presented by M^r King and passed

A Law

for the establishment of a Board of Health, Passed 8th April 1811

Whereas, by an act of the Legislature of this state entitled "An act relative to the public health of the City of New York" passed the ninth day of March 1805, the Mayor, Aldermen & Commonalty of the said city, are empowered to institute from time to time, a board of health for the said city, consisting of the Commissioners of the Health Office and such other persons as they may think proper and to invest the said board with such of the powers of the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty as they may judge proper, and to enforce compliance with the orders of the said board by the infliction of penalties not exceeding One thousand dollars for each offence: therefore

1 Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That a board of

health shall be and is hereby instituted to consist of the Commissioners of the Health office and of the Mayor or in his absence the Recorder with the Aldermen of the City, together with Joseph Bailey, John H Douglass and Joshua E. Birch, who shall assemble at such time and place, and as often as they may judge proper, to superintend and carry into effect all laws and ordinances of this State and of the Common Council, which, at present exist or may hereafter be passed, providing against infectious and pestilential diseases, or which relate to the public health of this city. And the said Board are hereby invested with all the powers [180] of the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City, which regard the public Health of said city, to be by them exercised in such manner as in their judgment and discretion, may best promote the important objects, for which the said Board is instituted and that any five of the said Board shall be a quorum to transact business

2^d And be it further ordained, That the said Board of Health shall make diligent enquiry with respect to all nuisances that may exist and which they may deem obnoxious to the health and lives of the inhabitants of this city, and shall have full power to order the removal of the same at their discretion, under the several penalties in such cases made & provided

3^d And be it further ordained, That the said Board of Health, during the existence of any epidemical disease, or upon its probable approach, shall have power, at the public expense, to open the hospital at Bellevue, for the accommodation of the sick, and to make such rules and regulations for their reception, and also to determine what persons shall be entitled to admission, as they may think proper; and moreover that the said board of health, during the existence of any epidemic, shall have power to furnish and employ physicians, nurses, medicines & other necessaries, not only for the use of the sick, who shall have been removed into the said hospital; but also for the use of the sick and indigent of the city

4th And be it further ordained, That the said Board of Health shall have power, in their discretion, to remove or order the removal of all persons and things within the said city, infected by or tainted with pestilential matter, to such place or places, as may, in their opinion most conduce to the preservation of the health of this [181] city; and in order to enforce a prompt & punctual compliance with the said order, all offenders in the premises shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars for each offence

5th And be it further ordained, That it shall be the duty of the City Inspector to observe such instructions as may be given to him by the Board of Health, in relation to nuisances, and to execute the several resolutions and orders of this Board.

On motion, it was resolved, that another measurer of grain be appointed. Whereupon Jacob Valantine was appointed to that office

Mr Hoghland then moved, that another measurer of grain be appointed. On the question of agreeing to the same, a division having been called, it was carried in the affirmative as follows

A petition of sundry inhabitants, praying, that the upper part of Maiden Lane may be widened and the Otswego Market removed was received, which was referred to the following committee, with authority, if they conceived the measure advantageous to the public, to give notice to the persons now employed in making improvements of the intention of the Board to widen the street, and also to request the Mayor to call a Special Meeting of the Board, if they deemed it necessary. The Committee appointed were Alderman Dickinson, Carpenter & M^r Jones

A petition of sundry inhabitants, praying that Front Street between Dover Street and New Slip may be laid with flagging was read & referred to the Street Commissioner.

A petition of Samuel Engles complaining of the sunken situation of King Street, as being a receptacle for Stagnant Water highly offensive & injurious was referred to the Street Commissioner

[184] A petition of Fire Engine Company N^o 10 for a larger engine was read & referred to the Committee on the Fire department

The ferry Committee pursuant to a *resolution of the Common Council of the 22^d instant reported, that they had taken into consideration the application of the Lessees of the Fly Market ferry for a ferry house to be erected at Brooklyn and are of opinion, it would be proper to grant it and they recommend that measures be taken to have a convenient ferryhouse erected at Brooklyn, on the corner of Water S^t opposite the house of Gilbert Van Mater, at the expense of the Corporation, and that the Lessees of the ferry, pay as rent for the same the interest of the money, which shall be expended for that purpose.

With respect to the †application of the Lessee of the New Ferry for an extension of his lease, the Committee find, that the Slip and ferry stairs on the Brooklyn side require some immediate repairs & considering the offer on his part as a reasonable one, they recommend, that his lease be extended for the term of two years, from the first day of May 1812 at the present rent, on condition, that he shall, at his own expense, cause a sufficient bulk head to be sunk and the slip filled in to the distance of fifty feet from the head and shall likewise have an entire new Stairs built, extending ten feet farther into the river than the present stairs; but in case the expense thereof shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars, the Committee are of [211] *of* opinion, that the excess ought to be borne by the Corporation

With respect to the application of William B. Kipp and Truman Hamilton to lease Fort Lee and Bull's ferries, the committee recommend that the same be granted on the terms offered.

Your Committee beg leave to state, that the New made Lands at Brooklyn are nearly completed and they respectfully suggest the propriety of leasing that part of it lying below Water Street, at public auction for the term of twenty one years. The residue being so connected with the property of M^r Van Mater and he being desirous of leasing, the Committee think him entitled to a preference

Your Committee farther beg leave to state, that in order to complete the ground at Brooklyn and continue Water Street, it will be necessary to fill in the Old Ferry Slip a considerable distance and to carry out the piers and they recommend, that measures be taken accordingly

A communication from Mr Hardie, stating, that in obedience to the direction of some members of the Board, he had on the 15th ultimo employed Mr John M'Comb paver, to take down a chimney at Peck Slip, which, in consequence of an explosion of [224] Gun powder in the house had been left in a dangerous situation & which had been

attended w^h considerable risque to M^r M'Comb & suggesting the propriety of paying M^r M'Comb five dollars for his trouble was read and the sum ordered to be paid to him

Petitions were received from John Carman & Silas Pearsall praying for the appointment of inspector of manure, which were referred to the former committee on that subject viz Alderman C. Pell, Carpenter [&] J. Pell

Petitions were received from David Hall & Jacob S. Myers for the office of keeper of convicts which were referred to the aforesaid committee

An account for services of the Marshals and constables for attending at the polls of the last election was referred to the Comptroller

A representation from the police office on the subject of compensation to an additional clerk in said office was read and together with the act of the Legislature entitled an act to improve the police of the city of New York and for other purposes were referred to the former committee on the subject of the police office viz M^r Jones M^r Hawes M^r King

A petition of Josiah Shippey Jun^r and William Shippey auctioneers to be permitted to sell household furniture at the door of their auction room in Wall Street and a remonstrance from a number of inhabitants against the sales of furniture in Vesey Street were read & referred to Alderman Mesier, Carpenter [&] Dickinson

[227] A petition was received from Michael Thalamis a native of Jerusalem formerly Consul from the king of Spain at Damietta in Egypt, stating, that from various misfortunes in Europe, he had been reduced to great distresses, that he was about going to New Spain; but

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved

On motion ordered, that the Clerk of this Board furnish to the inhabitants of Maiden Lane, who are immediately affected by the proposed measure of widening said street, the resolutions of the Common Council on that subject.

On a verbal report of the committee on the fire department, ordered that the Comptroller report a warrant at the next meeting of the Board in favour of Hardenbrook and Nichols for \$800 on account for repairs to the engines &c.

An invitation was received from the president of the College of physicians & surgeons to attend the Medical commencement of the Institution on Thursday next at 11 o'clock. Whereupon resolved, that the Common Council will attend the same.

Petitions were received from Joseph Dederer N Taylor and Peter Hoffmire to be permitted to build vaults in front of their respective lots in Courtland, Barclay & Walker Streets, which were granted [233] upon the usual terms and under the direction of the Alderman and Assistants of the respective wards and the Street Commissioner

A presentment was received from the Grand Jury of the late Sessions recommending the regulation of the stands & prices of Hackney coaches and presenting as a nuisance the running at large of dogs, the former of which subjects was referred to the committee

on Laws and ordinances and the latter to the committee heretofore appointed on that subject. At the request of M^r Hawes he was excused from serving on said committee and M^r Titus was placed upon it

A petition of Bartholomew M'Garagan for a huckster stand at the Fly Market was received and referred to the Market Committee

An account of John Brown for emptying the Bridewell sink was received & referred to the Superintendent of repairs and the City Inspector

A petition from Fire Engine Company N^o 24 stationed at the Otswego market requesting, that as the Engine House is to be removed, that it may be placed, at the corner of Trinity Church Yard was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Third ward.

A petition of Robert Hinchman for an office was read and referred to the committee on applications.

A petition was received from William Anderson stating that he was owner of some lots of ground at Greenwich near Hetty Street; that he had been ordered to fill up the same; but as he was intending immediately to build, he prayed the [234] ordinance might be repelled. Ordered, that the operation of the said ordinance be suspended for one week

A petition of Margaret Davis was received stating, that she was owner of the lot at the corner of Grand & Crosby Streets, which is advertised for sale for an assessment due upon it; that she had a certificate from the former Street Commissioner M^r Hunn (which she had lost) stating, that she was not to pay that assessment and praying relief. Ordered to lie on the table

A petition was received from Abraham Staggs for payment of money due to him for regulating &c Lisperard Street, which was referred to the Street Commissioner

A representation was received from Fire Engine Company N^o 5, stating, that their Engine House wanted repairs. Whereupon ordered, that the Superintendent of repairs cause the necessary repairs to be made.

A petition was received from sundry inhabitants, praying that the curb and gutter stone might be laid and the carriage way paved in Pump Street from Mott to Mulberry Street [and] was referred to the Street Commissioner

A communication from Benjamin Dickinson on the subject of the price of a house of John Dickinson for a watch house for the Greenwich watch was received and referred to the Watch committee

A petition of John Paul to be appointed overseer of convicts was received and referred to the Committee on the establishment at Bellevue

The Committee on the petition of John Anderson respecting the outer block of the pier at Duane Street [235] Basin reported, that they had paid particular attention to the subject and find from a survey and diagram made thereof, that it will be requisite to sink a block in front of the one overturned in such a manner as to be worked up with the said overturned block on the top, so as to make a solid surface of thirty feet by forty with a base of 55 feet by part 30 and partly 40 feet; and to connect this with the present pier will require a bridge of 62 feet, the whole expense by calculation will amount to \$3970, which sum Mr Anderson will agree to compleat it for, which your committee are of opinion ought to be done, as the basin in the present state is dangerous for vessels. The Committee, therefore beg leave to recommend that the Street Commissioner be directed to make a contract with Mr Anderson accordingly

They therefore recommended, that the prayer of the petition be granted them," which report was agreed to

The attorney of the Board, agreeably to the resolution of the Board passed at the last meeting reported upon the prosecutions, which had been commenced for breaches of ordinances on the [237] subject of nuisances, which was ordered to be filed

The Committee of Charity, on the *petition of M^r Thalamis reported verbally, that they had enquired into the situation of the petitioner and believed the case as stated in his petition was true. They, therefore, recommended, that provision be made for the support of the petitioner while in this country and that a passage to his own home be procured for him, which was agreed to and the same committee were requested to carry it into execution

The Committee on the †petition of Peter Schermerhorn reported, that the prayer of said petition ought to be granted by directing South Street to be continued from Beekman Slip to Peck Slip and they recommend, that measures be taken for the purpose accordingly

The City Inspector reported sundry ordinances for filling in certain sunken lots & correcting other nuisances from N^o 7725 to N^o 7730 inclusive, which were passed.

The Committee on the petition of sundry persons for opening the Street delineated on the map of the Commissioners as the 3^d Avenue presented a report, the consideration of which was postponed

The Street Commissioner presented several ordinances for regulating and paving Dover Street, from Water Street to South Street; for paving Delancey Street from Norfolk to Lewis Street and for elevating & repaving so much of Magazine Street (now Pearl Street) as may be necessary to gain an elevation of two feet at Collect Street, which ordinances were passed. The Assessors named were laid over

[239] A valuation of the Boats of the Hell Gate and Brooklyn ferries was presented. Whereupon ordered, that the Comptroller settle the balance due and report a warrant for payment of the same.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the account of Simeon DeWitt Esq^r reported, as follows "The Comptroller has the honour to report to the Board, on the account of Simeon DeWitt Esq^r one of the Commissioners of Streets and roads in the City of New York referred to him the 6th instant.

There are charges made in this account which the Subscriber conceives to be incorrect, according to the 12th section of "an act relative to improvements, touching the laying out of streets and roads in the city of New York and for other purposes" Passed 3^d April 1807. By this it is enacted that each of the said Commissioners shall be entitled to receive the sum of not more than four dollars, (besides all reasonable expenses for maps, field notes, monuments, chain bearers and assistants) for each day, they shall respectively be actually employed, in the duties assigned to them, the same to be paid by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York and assessed as aforesaid.

M^r DeWitt states the date of his arrival in this city, from time to time, and when he left it & charges the whole number of days, Sundays included. There are also charges for going to and coming from Albany.

The whole above mentioned, which do not appear to be embraced by the law, amount to near two hundred dollars

As the Subscriber cannot consistently *ad* [241] adjust this account, without the interference of the Board, he respectfully submits the same for their decision

He would again beg leave to suggest to the Board the propriety of appointing an Inspector of pavements, whose duty it shall be to inspect the materials & *workman* [242]workmanship, as the work progresses and to see that the conditions of the contracts on the part of those, who engage to do the work are fully complied with." Whereupon resolved, that an inspector of pavements be appointed; and ordered that the Street Commissioner report an ordinance respecting the same

The Street Commissioner presented a further list of monies due upon assessments on vacant lots. Whereupon ordered, that the same be advertised by the Street Commissioner agreeably to the Statute in such case made and provided

Ordered, that the Clerk of the Board make a return, at the next

The ordinance was then passed in the words following.

"A Law concerning Dogs"

Section 1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Alderman and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that no dog shall be suffered to go at large in the City of New York on or after the first day of June next.

Section 2^d And be it further ordained, That there shall annually be levied and collected for every dog, which shall be owned or kept in the said city the sum of "three dollars" and the owner or possessor of every such dog shall on or before the First Monday of July in every year make report in writing to such person as the Common Council shall appoint Register [265] for that purpose of the number of dogs by him or her owned or kept in the said city and shall, at the same time, pay to the said Register & Collector, the tax imposed by this ordinance under the penalty of fifty cents for every day he or she shall neglect to make report and pay such tax and the said Register and Collector shall keep an Alphabetical list of the names of all persons, who shall have paid such tax of the number of dogs reported and the sum paid for each.

Section 3^d And be it further ordained, That the said Register and Collector shall be entitled to twenty per Cent upon all monies by him collected and shall on the first Monday of August, November February and May in every year, account under oath with the Chamberlain for the residue of such tax, which shall have been by him received. And shall within one week after his appointment open an office for such registry, giving at least six days previous notice thereof; in at least three of the public Newspapers printed in this city and shall keep the said office open for that purpose every day, Sundays excepted, from the hours of nine o'clock in the morning until three o'clock in the afternoon until the said first Monday of July next and shall in each and every year hereafter, at least one month before the first Monday of July open his said office for the purpose aforesaid giving at least six days previous notice in manner aforesaid of the time & place which his said office will be so opened & shall keep the same open for the purpose aforesaid every day (Sundays excepted) during the hours aforesaid for one month previous to the first Monday of July in each year.

Section 4th And be it further ordained, That every dog found at large contrary to the provisions of [266] this ordinance on or after the first day of June next, shall be liable to be seized and killed by the said register and collector, or such other person or persons as he shall, for that purpose, from time to time appoint, which said register and collector or such other person or persons appointed shall cause the carcasses of all dogs by them seized & killed to be forthwith removed & buried and for every dog so killed, removed & buried, shall be entitled to receive the sum of fifty cents to be paid him out of the City Treasury. Provided always, that it shall be lawful for any person to kill a dog going at large on or after the first of June next out of the Lamp district of this city: and that it shall also be lawful for any person to kill any dog at large in any part of the city, which shall bite or attempt to bite any person or animal

Section 5th And be it further ordained, that any person, who shall hinder or molest the said register and Collector of dogs or other person or persons so to be appointed as aforesaid, in carrying into effect the provisions of this ordinance shall forfeit & pay the sum of thirty dollars for each offence

And be it further ordained, that all fines & penalties imposed by this ordinance shall and may be sued for, recovered & received by the

said register & collector to be applied and accounted for by him in the same manner with the monies received for taxes."

The Clerk was directed to cause the above ordinance to be published in the different papers of the city, for four days successively and also to publish the same in hand bills. The Board proceeded to the appointment of the Register and Collector, when [267] Abner Curtis was chosen

The City Inspector, to whom it was referred to consider and report the ordinance proposed to regulate the deposit of Manure re-

ported, "that the intended ordinance extends the line, within which manure may be deposited, considerably beyond the limits of the ordinance now in force, passed 25th June 1810

By the existing ordinance, the limits are thus described viz^t that no manure should be deposited except under the direction of the Superintendants of Streets or one of them and for public uses Southward of a line, beginning at the Hudson River & running from thence through Hazard Street to Hancock Street; from thence to and along Prince Street to the Bowery Road & from thence to and along Stanton Street to the East River

The contemplated ordinance proposes, that the line should commence from the Hudson's river in a line with Hammond Street; thence extending through Hammond Street to Greenwich Lane; thence through Greenwich Lane and Art Street to the Bowery Lane; thence through the Bowery Lane to North Street; thence through North Street to Attorney Street: thence through Attorney Street to Rivington Street; thence through Rivington Street to the East river.

[279] At the time the ordinance now in existence was drawn, the committee, to whom the subject was then submitted were of opinion, that the line was extended as far as was necessary; but owing to the very rapid increase of buildings in the outskirts of the city, the City Inspector is of opinion, that it now would be proper to extend it farther

The 3^d section of the new or contemplated ordinance makes it the duty of the Superintendants of Streets to remove and appropriate to public use all manure deposited at any place to the Southward of the line therein prescribed or that may remain deposited or heaped from and after the tenth day of June next, and if any Superintendent of Streets shall refuse or neglect to remove and carry away such manure so deposited or heaped as aforesaid, he shall forfeit and pay for each neglect the sum of twenty five dollars

The City Inspector, upon taking the whole of the subject into consideration is of opinion, that, however the Board may think proper to decide respecting the line, it would be proper to adopt the third section of the intended ordinance, as many people, who may be annoyed by manure being deposited too near their houses either do not know where to enter their complaints or are unwilling to complain. He, however, respectfully submits, that, in his opinion, if the ordinance should be passed, the 10th of June would be too short a period for the

removal of the manure, and that it would be better, perhaps, instead of the 10th to substitute the 20th

[280] A Law to prevent nuisances

1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, That it shall not be lawful for any cartman or other person whatsoever, except under the direction of the Superintendent of Streets and for public uses to deposit or heap manure at any place Southward of a line beginning on Hudson's river in a line with Hammond Street; thence extending through Hammond Street to Greenwich Lane; thence through Greenwich Lane & *and* Art Street to the Bowery Lane; thence through Bowery Lane to North Street; thence through North Street to Attorney Street; thence through Attorney Street to Rivington Street, thence through Rivington Street to the East River, under the penalty of twenty five dollars for each offence, and the further penalty of one dollar for every twenty four hours, in which the same shall so remain deposited or heaped, except for the purpose of cultivating the ground, on which the same shall be laid

2^d And be it further ordained, that all manure, except the public manure, now deposited or heaped at any place to the Southward of the line above before mentioned shall be removed to the Northward of the said line, by the owner or owners thereof, on or before the twentieth day of June instant, under the penalty of twenty five dollars for each default, and under the further penalty of one dollar for every twenty four hours, in which the same shall so remain unmoved

3^d And be it further ordained, That it shall be the duty of the Superintendants of Streets to remove, take, carry away, and appropriate for the public use, all manure deposited or heaped at any place [281] *place* by any person or persons whatsoever, at any place to the Southward of the Said line, or that may remain deposited or heaped from and after the twentieth day of June ins^t and that if the Superintendent of Streets shall refuse or neglect to remove and carry away such manure so found deposited or heaped as aforesaid, he shall forfeit and pay, for each neglect the sum of twenty five dollars "

The Committee, to whom the several petitions on the subject of manure was referred, presented a report, which was referred to the

City Inspector with directions to draft and report an ordinance on the subject

The Steam ferry boat committee presented a report, which was agreed to and the Street Commissioner was directed to carry the same into effect under their direction. The Committee were also authorised to appoint an arbitrator on the part of this Board.

The City Inspector presented ordinances for correcting sundry nuisances from N^o 7550 to N^o 7660 inclusive, which were passed

The Committee, to whom the petition of John Holdron was referred, reported, that from having been the negociators on the part of the B^d with the Steam Ferry Boat Committee, mentioned in the petition, they firmly believe that the circumstances as stated by the petitioner are strictly true and that he is justly entitled to some relief

They, therefore, recommend, that this board relinquish to the petitioner what is due from the 1st of February last to the first of May last, being the time, which, for public accommodation, he continued running the ferry after the expiration of this lease.

The enclosed account of G. DeBow for six fire buckets furnished the Bridewell by order of the keeper, having been delivered to the Subscriber, he declines auditing it for the following reasons

By the Sixth Section of the law for the regulation and government of the Alms House, the purveyor is to make all purchases for the use of the Alms House & Bridewell & by the 7th section, the clerk is to keep a clear & distinct account of all monies expended for the use of the Alms House and Bridewell, distinguishing the same &c. It appears by this, that all demands against the Alms House & Bridewell are to be paid from the monies advanced to the Superintendant of the Alms House and the accounts kept distinct on its books

The keepers of the Bridewell & Jail have been informed some time since of the irregularity of purchases or repairs in the present mode, and as it is manifestly proper, in order to preserve uniformity in the system of finance [283] that the Board should discountenance any innovation, it is respectfully recommended, that this account should be paid at the Alms House, in order that it may be chargeable to the Bridewell establishment

The Comptroller on the account of Jacob Halsey for repairs done at Jay Street pier, reported, that according to the note made by the Superintendent of repairs, the work was done by order of the committee of repairs and half of the expense is to be collected from Mr Rhineland

When expenses of this nature are incurred in conjunction with an individual, it would seem proper, that a perfect understanding should previously be had between the parties as to the extent of repairs, the person to be employed and the sum expended. This is the ordinary mode of procedure between individuals interested in wharves and no reason can be perceived why similar arrangements should not be had in the improvement of public property. The correctness of this account as well as others similarly circumstanced, as it respects the various charges of the number of days, the quantity of materials [338] and some of the prices charged must rest on the confidence reposed in the persons employed to execute the work. Although it is signed by the superintendent of repairs, yet his knowledge of the transaction extends only to the customary price of labour. The large amount of the bill now under consideration, with others of a similar nature, which are frequently presented induce the subscriber respectfully to ask the attention of the Board to some salutary regulation in the future repairs of wharves, piers & slips

Whenever public and individual property are so connected, that it is indispensable to act in concert, the person interested should first be consulted as above mentioned and the Corporation be considered liable only for their proportion of expense

It is also suggested whether the public interest would not be greatly promoted by employing a competent person to superintend the repairing of docks and piers, whose duty it should be to keep an account of the number of men actually at work, the whole or part of days employed, the sufficiency of materials used and every other particular connected with the business in the same manner as individuals do, who

are desirous of guarding against abuses, from whatever quarter they may arise

The arduous and encreasing duties of the Superintendant of repairs render it impracticable for him to pay that attention to this subject, which its importance demands. His avocations in the course of a day require his attendance in various parts of the city and it cannot be expected that he should have a perfect knowledge of many particulars charged in an account of this [339] kind

The Subscriber would not have troubled the Common Council with so detailed a representation; but he could not reconcile that justice, which is due to the General interest with a tacit acquiescence in what he has reason to consider a useless profusion of public money

The account is submitted to the Board, should they think proper to allow it, a warrant could pass for one half the amount, and an order be given attested by the Clerk on Mr Rhinelande for the other moiety

The Street Commissioner, to whom was [340] referred the petition of Andrew Kevan and others for an alteration in the assessment for regulating Laight Street reported, that he had carefully examined the assessment and compared it with the profile shewing the quantity of filling and can see no reasonable objection against the assessment; but is of opinion, that the assessors have attended to their duty and that the petitioners should have leave to withdraw their petition

The same committee on a petition presented on the 17th June last for establishing certain other persons as a company to be attached to N^o 37 reported, that in their opinion, the prayer of the petitioners ought not to be granted, which was agreed to

[341] Nehemiah Allen and John Van Nostrandt were offered to the Board by the Lessees of the Brooklyn ferry as their sureties for the performance of their contract and were accepted

Resolved, that the Ferry Committee be authorised to cause New Ferry Stairs to be built at the Fly Market

Resolved also, that the same committee be authorized to enforce the law respecting the lying of vessels at the Fly Market Slip.

Resolved, that the Ferry Committee be authorised to expend a sum not exceeding sixty dollars in painting the Ferry house at Horn's Hook & in making window shutters to the same

The Attorney of the Board, to whom it had been referred to draft arbitration bonds between this Board and Charles Smith and wife (late M^{rs} Wilkins) on the subject of the pier at Courtlandt Slip reported that he had drafted the same; but that the said Charles Smith & wife had utterly refused to execute the same on their part. The attorney further informed that the late M^r Wilkins had not complied with his parts of the covenant respecting the running out of piers at said slip

The Steam Ferry Boat Committee on the subject of the accommodation to be provided for the steam boats, at Courtlandt Slip reported, That by the terms of the contract between this Board and the Steam ferry boat committee it is obligatory on the Corporation to accommodate the piers and slips on this side of the river to the Steam boat establishment in time and season to meet the readiness of the Steam

boats, and that [342] *that* Mr Fulton is by said contract to be consulted.

That we have every reason to believe, that the Steam boats of said company are already in such forwardness as to render a strict compliance on the part of this board, as to their contract respecting the slip altogether impracticable; yet we presume every effort to accommodate said boats ought to be made & that no time in regulating said slip in conformity to said contract ought to be lost

The Committee, therefore, recommend, that Powles Hook ferry Slip at the foot of Courtlandt Street be filled up to the West side of West Street and that from that line on the North side of said slip, a pier be run to the permanent line of such construction and width & from such point, as the committee with the Street Commissioner may deem proper and that the Street Commissioner be directed to carry the same into effect

The Committee further report, that they have consulted with Messieurs Bussing & Beach the grantees of the ground connected with the contemplated pier and are pleased to find, that they are willing to join the Corporation in building said pier provided they can be indulged for only one year for the payment of the money, at which time they will obligate themselves to pay to the Corporation both principal and interest for any advance, which may be made on account of their proportion of the expense of said pier

To remove the articles, by which the square is incumbered, it would be requisite to prohibit the sale of horses and carriages by auction at that place; and if it be necessary to tolerate this species of traffic, a much better and more convenient place may be found between Elm and Collect Streets, the arsenal and Anthony Street. He therefore, suggested, the propriety of removing the Horse market to the Ground South of the Arsenal and to prevent nuisance, that Chatham Square be enclosed with a pale fence and as the wooden curb is decayed on the side of the square next to Chatham Street; that new curb & gutter (of stone) be laid and the walk filled with gravel [370] gravel. This will preclude the necessity of paving the square and be a great saving of expense.

Likewise the Assessors viewing the improvement and the adjacent property in its present state, make the assessment, without enquiring what arrangements have been made for previous improvements.

Viewing the subject in this light, the Street Commissioner has no right to call in question the judgment of the Assessors for opening Washington Street: and the objections of M^r Rhinelanders resting only on conversation, which took place *be* [371] between him and the late Street Commissioner which cannot be said amounted to a bargain for exemption, even if there had been sufficient authority in the Street Commissioner to have made such a bargain. The Street Commissioner is therefore of opinion, that the assessment should be confirmed and a collector be appointed

Whereupon resolved, that the said assessment be confirmed and on motion Morris was appointed Collector on the assessment

The same committee on the petition of John Downing reported, "that they had enquired into the circumstances of the petitioner & cannot find, that he has any property, except a little furniture, the principal of which was saved from the late fire in Chatham Street and that there is no way to get the rent due from the petitioner but distress and sale of said furniture, which they think would be distressing the distressed. They, therefore recommend, that his rent be remitted and that he be discharged from the same

A petition from Fire Engine Company N^o 12, stating, that the present Engine was in a decayed state and praying that the Board would grant them a new one was read & referred to the committee on the Fire Department

The Street Commissioner on the petition of John Ireland, Robert Thompson, & William G. Miller reported generally against granting the prayer of the petition; but added, that in a conference with some of the petitioners, he found it would be an accommodation to them, if time was granted for [388] payment of the assessment until the 20th day of November next. It was, therefore, resolved, that it be referred to the Committee on assessments with authority to grant that time of payment, if they judged it proper

A petition for fencing in Chatham Square was read and ordered to be filed

The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the remonstrance against fencing in Chatham Square reported, "that he has not sufficient discernment to see any truth in the objections proposed, against fencing in the square. It is said it will stop the free communication of nine or ten streets. This is not true, the fence will stop no street, and he cannot see, why a load of hay, wood or provisions would not be as safe along side of the fence as in the open space. But it is said it will injure trade. If this should prove true, as it respects the petty auctions and in that respect only, a great purpose would be gained, as they are the greatest nuisance about the place and, in many respects, worse than the old iron shops so much complained of in the City of London

In the petition for paving, a calculation is made leaving out more than half the ground to be paved: but why pave it, as there is neither mud nor water there, but a hard gravel much better for an open space in that situation, with so much declivity. To pave it, therefore, would abate no nuisance

A plan is herewith presented for fencing and improving it, which, in the opinion of the S^t Commissioner is the best thing, that can be done with [389] it; but if this should be thought inexpedient at present, a little more attention will be requisite to keep it clear of incumbrances and filth "

Whereupon ordered, that the said communication be referred to M^r King M^r Hawes & the Recorder

A petition of William Todd to be paid for digging out Grand Street was read & referred to the Street Commissioner

The Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition of Eli Knapp for relief from the assessment for paving Lispenard Street reported "that M^r Knapp says, that in [390] January, he paid the

Collector three dollars & made him a pair of boots, on account of his assessment

Afterwards the Collector Jonathan O. Delavan was called to account for the moneys collected and proved delinquent. He then was requested to return under oath the delinquents on the assessment, which he did and Mr Knapp was returned for the whole amount of the sum assessed on him. The delinquents were reported & a warrant granted to Noah Jarvis to collect the same.

Mr Knapp was made acquainted with this and warned not to pay Delavan. He then called at the Street Commissioners office, where the warning was repeated by Doctor Graves. Notwithstanding Mr Knapp paid to Delavan the remainder, as is supposed in order to save the three dollars and the price of the boots. From the information the Street Commissioner has been able to obtain on this subject, he is induced to believe, that Delavan received the three dollars and the boots at nine dollars, making together twelve dollars on account of the assessment, while authorised to collect it, & that this sum ought to be deducted from Mr Knapp's assessment and be compelled to pay the balance."

Whereas by an act of the Legislature of this State, entitled “An Act to improve the police of the City of New York and for other purposes” passed April 9th 1811, it is enacted, that it shall be the duty of two of the Aldermen of the said city to attend as judges of the Court of General Sessions of the peace in and for the City and county of New York, when notified and required for that purpose by the Mayor or recorder and that it shall and may be lawful for the Common Council to provide a suitable compensation for their attendance; therefore

1st Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that the Aldermen of the said city, who shall attend as judges of the said court, when notified and required for that purpose, by the Mayor or Recorder, shall severally and respectively be allowed as a compensation for their attendance each, the sum of four dollars per day for each and every day, that such alderman shall actually attend as a judge of the said court, to be paid out of the Treasury of this city; And the certificate of the Clerk of the said court shall be sufficient proof of such attendance; provided that the compensation shall not be allowed for the attendance of more than two Aldermen on any one day; Provided further, that the compensation [401] shall commence from the first Monday of May last.

2^d And be it further ordained, that the Assistant Clerk of the Special justices for preserving the peace in the said city shall be allowed as a compensation for his services the annual salary of 500 dollars to be paid in equal quarterly payments out of the treasury of this city, the said compensation to commence from the time of the appointment of the said Clerk

A petition of Morris Ackerman to be appointed Captain of the Greenwich watch & a petition for a watchman at the corner of Grand & Suffolk Street was read & referred to the watch committee

A petition from the livery stable keepers, praying the Corporation to establish the stands of carriages was read & referred to the Committee appointed on the subject of regulating hackney carriages

A petition from fire Engine Company [407] N^o 2 for additional leader and for additional men & a petition from hook & ladder company N^o 2, stating, that an enlargement to their Engine House or a new one would be necessary were read & referred to the committee on the Fire department, the latter with discretionary power to act as they should judge advisable.

sons employed by them and of their several duties. The Committee appointed were M^r Hawes M^r Welling M^r Lawrence

The Comptroller presented the following

“ The Comptroller respectfully informs the Board that the assessment books for the tax of the present year, have been returned to his office and will be made up with all expedition

By an act passed at the last session of the Legislature of this state, a deduction of one third is to be made from the assessments on all lots & buildings, which have been assessed on account of Canal Street, excepting those lots, which front thereon. The deficiency occasioned by the said deduction is to be borne and paid by the freeholders & inhabitants of the City of New York and is to be assessed on the said freeholders and inhabitants of the City of New York and collected in the manner directed by the act for the assessment and collection of taxes. The amount to be [410] added to the general tax in conformity with the above mentioned act will be about \$47,000. The Street Commissioner presented an ordinance for paving First Street from Grand to Broome Street, which was passed. The Street Commissioner stated, that one side of the Street was owned by one family who did not reside here; & who objected to the pavement, but that the work would be a public convenience. The Assessors named were laid over.

The Comptroller and Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition of Thomas Egenton, soliciting a lease of the vacant ground adjoining his lot on Pearl (late Magazine) Street, near the corner of Cross Street reported "that they expected to have made an arrangement with George Janeway for an exchange of part of this ground, which would be mutually advantageous; but as yet they have not been able to agree.

The lot in question would be peculiarly beneficial to the petitioner, and he has offered to take it on lease for 21 years at \$125 per annum. This sum the subscribers think to be a fair & equitable one and respectfully submit to the Board the propriety of acceding to the offer; provided an agreement [412] should not be made with M^r Janeway for an exchange on or before Wednesday the 28th instant

The Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A Memorial of John Johnston respecting an account for Ironmongery which the Superintendent of Repairs declined certifying was read and refered to the Committee of Repairs.

A Petition of Josiah Richards for Stall N^o 30 in Fly Market, Petitions from James Van Riper, from Elizabeth Deshay, and Rachel Nathaway, for Hucksters Stands in the Hudson Market, were read and referred to the Market Committee.

[2] A Petition of Joshua Parker praying indulgence for payment of Assessment on Leonard St till 8th of November was granted on condition of Petitioners giving his note for the same payable at that time.

A Petition of Thomas Knox Executor of Nicholas Gouverneur deceased, praying that an assessment laid upon said Estate for orchard St may be paid out of monies paid by said Estate for regulating Gouverneur St which has not yet been regulated. Ordered to be referred to the Street Commissioner.

A Petition from Woodstock Glass Manufactory praying the loan of a Fire Engine until they can procure one for themselves, was read and referred to the Committee on the Fire department with authority to loan or sell to the said Company any Fire Engine which is not used by any Fire Company.

Petitions from Mary Wheeler and Diana Waterman to receive Licences gratis to retail Spirituous Liquors they being Widows and in indigent circumstances, were read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

[3] A Remonstrance against widening Bridge S^t was read and referred to M^r Jones M^r Lawrence and the Street Commissioner with authority to suspend the proceedings ordered at the last meeting of the Board.

A Petition of Pat M^cKay on the subject of his lots at Inclenberg was read and laid on the table, to be taken up when the subject of the Inclenberg Lots was considered

A Petition of John Slidell and others proprietors of ground included in the Plot designated in the Map of the Commissioners for laying out Streets and Roads, by the Title of the Parade praying the Corporation would make arrangements for the purchase of the same, was read, and referred to the General Superintending Committee of Surveys viz Ald Mesier. Fish. Hoghland. Mess^{rs} Jones and. Hardenbrook.

A Petition of the Proprietors of the Lots upon which the damages and expences for opening Canal S^t have been assessed—praying the Corporation would suspend the Collection of said Assessment until the Petitioners can have an opportunity of making a further [4] application to the Legislature for relief was read and referred to Aldⁿ Carpenter. Buckmaster M^r Hawes.

The Attorney of the Board presented a Report of the valuation made by the Jury for opening Chamber S^t amounting to \$15816,⁸¹/₁₀₀ which was ordered to be referred to the Street Commissioner with directions to procure an ordinance for assessing the same upon the persons benefitted thereby

The Attorney of the Board made a representation on the subject of rent due by Henry Mehan sub-Lessee of Luke Kip and also of rent due by James Abeel—which was referred to the Finance Committee.

The Committee of Wharves on the Petitions of John R Murray and W^m Ogden for payment of one half of the expences of making part of West street at the north side of Albany Bason on the North River. Reported. That on examination of the Grant to the applicant for the land under water, which is made by that part of West Street which has been made by him as aforesaid, they find that he is bound by his Grant to make the same and keep it in repair at his own expense

[5] The Committee therefore recommend that the Bonds of the Corporation be given to the applicant for the proportion payable by the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty, of the City of New York of the expenses of making the pier on the Northerly side of the said Albany Bason but without including therein or allowing the applicant

any part of the expences of making that part of West Street referred to in the application

which was agreed to and the Comptroller was directed to prepare bonds accordingly

The Street Commissioner on the petition for paving Washington Street from Murray to Warren Street reported that the proprietors of the ground adjoining the street are absent from the City and therefore their signatures to the petition could not be obtained but he stated the Street was almost impassable and therefore he presented an ordinance which he thought ought to pass

Whereupon the ordinance was passed and the rule being dispensed with. Samuel Delamater Lemuel Skidmore William Stone Joseph Dederer and Frederick Eckert were appointed [6] assessors.

The Street Commissioner presented a Deed from the Corporation to Henry White for land on Elm Street and a Deed from Henry White and Ann his wife to the Corporation for land on Elm Street which were referred to M^r Hawes as counsel, for examination.

The Comptroller presented a Grant for land under Water in the Fourth Ward on the East River to James Roosevelt. A Lease to Thomas Egerton for a Lot on Pearl (late Magazine Street) for twenty one years which having been examined by M^r Hawes were ordered to be executed. Also a Release from George Meiner for all claims in consequence of his house being pulled down at the late fire in Pearl Street which having also been examined by M^r Hawes was ordered to be filed in the Comptrollers Office.

Upon the recommendation of the Street Commissioner James Masterton was appointed an assessor for the drain in Liberty Street in place of Jonathan Little who is absent from the City

[7] The Street Commissioner to whom was referred an account of Andrew Hamersley for money paid by him to Jasper Ward for transfer of a lot sold by mistake by the Corporation for an assessment due. reported. That the account was correct M^r Hamersley having before paid the assessment, he therefore recommended that the Comptroller report a warrant for \$43.⁹/₁₀₀ in payment of the same, which was agreed to

The Street Commissioner presented an assessment for paving the West side of Coentius Slip, which was confirmed and Morris De Camp was appointed collector.

The Ordinance passed 26 augst for paving First Street was called up and Ezekiel Bishop Robert Coles, Stephen Kingsland Abraham Hart and Solomon Wheeler were appointed Assessors

An account of the Proprietors of the Evening Post and of the Commercial Advertiser for advertisement in thier papers were presented by the Comptroller with a request, as they amounted to a very large sum that they might be referred to a Committee to examine and to establish the principle as to what advertisements are to be paid for by the [8] Corporation—ordered that the same be referred to the Finance Committee.

The Comptroller to whom was referred the petition of Lawrence Heyer Reported, That about two years since a considerable balance appearing against the petitioner for ground rent the account was put in the hands of the Attorney of the Board. M^r Heyer applied to the Common Council for a suspension of the time of payment; and it appears from the minutes that the sale of the Lots was postponed several times, and indulgence given the petitioner on condition of his making payment at a future day. In consequence of this the suit was suspended, and on the 1st of may last the sum of \$787.⁵⁰/₁₀₀ remained due, on which no payment has since been made. The two Lots of ground N^o 102. and 103 on the Southerly side of Chatham Street, are under lease to L Heyer for 21 years from the 1st of may 1806. for \$450. per Anⁿ and no Assignment has been made of either. Samuel Tooker purchased at the sheriffs sale, one of these lots, which L Heyer had previously leased to a person, without obtaining permission from the Board agreably to a condition of the lease. In a communication received from [9] Samuel Cowdry Esq^r the late attorney of the Board on the 29th January 1810. he informed the Common Council “that on the suit commenced by him in behalf of the Corporation against Lawrence Heyer for arrears of rent, he had received the sum of \$665 from Samuel Tooker and Alexander Fink, who purchased the leases of M^r Heyer, and who requested that the leases might be assigned to those persons. It was ordered that the Comptroller be directed to assign the said leases as requested upon the rents which are due being paid into the Treasury.” The sum above mentioned was paid by M^r Cowdry into the Treasury, but no assignment has taken place, in consequence of the balance not being paid. The Buildings were destroyed by the fire in may last, and M^r Tooker is not willing to make any further payments on the lot he purchased unless he can obtain a new lease for both Lots at a lower rate. From all the information

which the subscriber has obtained, it is believed that L Heyer is unable to make good the deficiency and should he be pressed by a suit he will probably take the benefit of the Insolvent Act. His situation is such that there appears no prospect of obtaining any thing from him. Should the Board think [10] proper to take the ground back it is respectfully proposed to lease the same at Public auction for the remainder of the term, subject to the usual conditions of building &c and from the number of valuable houses now erecting in Chatham Street it is thought that an advantageous sale might be made

The Street Commissioner presented the assessment for making a bulkhead & sewer & filling in of Peck Slip, which was confirmed & Noah Jarvis appointed collector.

The Committee, on the Fire department, on the petition of Fire Engine Company N^o 16 reported "that they have examined the Engine House for N^o 16 and that, in their opinion, it is too small to accommodate the company. But as the said house has once been enlarged, they are of opinion, that it will not be advisable to attempt enlarging the same again. They recommend, that a new Engine House be built for said company, on the spot, where the present house stands, of suitable dimension and that the Superintendent of repairs cause the same to be built on contract

Which report was agreed to and the Superintendent of repairs directed to carry the same into [78] effect.

The Comptroller presented several leases, which were referred to M^r Hawes as Counsel for examination

The Comptroller presented the following on the subject of the funds of the Corporation.

"The Comptroller is under the necessity of informing the Board, that the funds in the treasury are nearly exhausted and from the continued application for money from various quarters, there appears no prospect of meeting the demands from the collection of rents, the only source, from whence ordinary supplies can be raised Having had the honour to submit some remarks on the existing state of the pecuniary concerns of the Corporation on the 10th of September 1810; it may be necessary to premise, that the most prominent points there represented still continue to claim the serious attention of the Board. From the constant pressure for money to meet the contracts for building and repairing docks and piers, expenditures for the Alms House, New City Hall, and a variety of contingent charges, which are presented weekly; it appears impracticable to prevent embarrassments, unless recourse is had either to a diminution of expenses or further loans. The [79] Assessment books are preparing for the Collectors with as much speed as possible; but from this source, a large sum cannot be calculated upon for some time to come. The

revenue is collected with as much dispatch as circumstances will permit; but owing to the embarrassed circumstances of many tenants at this juncture (some of whom also suffered by the fire in May last) the receipts for the last four months have not been so great as was anticipated. Agreeably to the order of the Board on the 30th ult^o directing the Street Commissioner and Comptroller to have the Book of Canal Street assessment divided Alphabetically into four parts as nearly equal as may be and report the same with all convenient speed. The person, who was employed to copy the original assessment and make out the proportions payable by each individual, has been engaged to execute the work lately ordered and to have the same completed as promptly as possible

The subject of commuting certain portions of quit rents, being still at the disposal of a committee appointed for that purpose, it would be improper to make any comments [80] thereon at present. The resolution of the Board on the 9th September last, relative to the Inclenbergh lots has not been complied with by the purchasers, though it is understood, that a petition on this subject will shortly be presented to the Board

The Subscriber respectfully submits the foregoing observations for the information of the Common Council

The following resolution was proposed & agreed to, “Whereas it is apprehended that the frequent fires which have lately occurred in this city have been the result of design—Therefore

“Resolved that the Mayor be authorized to issue a Proclamation offering a reward of Three Hundred Dollars for the discovery and apprehension of the offenders or any of them to be paid on conviction.”

Resolved that the Recorder Aldⁿ Hoghland & M^r Hawes be a Committee to take into consideration the Memorial of Richard Varick heretofore presented Viz, on the _____ day of _____ respecting the Wharf at the foot of Partition Street.

The consideration of the request of P. H. Schenck to erect a lime house was taken up & the following resolution was agreed to

“Resolved that Peter H. Schenck be authorized to erect a lime-house on the site of the old Oswego market [104] “on condition that he erect his contemplated buildings on the line of the street as laid out by this Corporation at as early a period in the spring as the season will permit.”

A specimen of a new invented Leader for Fire Engines was presented by M^r Hardenbrook and the Committee on the Fire Department were requested to have a leader of similar construction made for the purpose of testing its utility.

The Petitioner wishes to be exempted from payment of rent for the last six months, stating that the fire which consumed his house happened in May last since which the lot has been of no use to him & that he considers it to have been out of his occupancy. This last objection the Subscriber is conscious to be incorrect, inasmuch as the petitioner was under no obligation to relinquish to the Corporation that portion of the lot which remained out of the intended Street; and by assuming the Assessment of about Five Hundred Dollars which is attached to the remainder of the lot & paying

The petitioner might have built on the residue of the lot & was in actual possession of all that the Corporation leased to him. The opinion of the Street Commissioner who has been consulted on this subject coincides with that of the Subscriber—that the Board was under no obligation to take back the remainder of the lot, left out of the street and to assume the assessment aforesaid, but in consideration of the peculiar situation of the petitioner with [126] respect to his domestic concerns, & actuated by benevolent motives they agreed to accept his lease in order to facilitate the settlement of his business with the Corporation.

Should the Board however feel disposed to continue their liberality by exonerating the petitioner from half a years ground rent amounting to D^{rs} 93:75 it will be necessary to direct a further warrant to be reported for that Sum But from the remarks above made the Subscriber cannot perceive the propriety of recommending the payment on the score of justice or equity Respectfully submitted

Whereupon Ordered that the Clerk of the Common Council give notice to the said persons so elected to attend at the Common Council Chamber in the New City Hall on Monday next at twelve O'clock to take the oaths of Office prescribed by Law.

His Honor the Mayor laid before the Board a draft of a Letter addressed by him to the Governor of the State of New Jersey on the subject of Aliens landing in that State to evade the Municipal regulations of this State, which having been read was approved & directed to be forwarded and is in the Words following

New York Nov^r 22^d 1811

Sir,

I am requested by the Common Council of this City to address your Excellency on a subject which they consider of importance.

By a Law of this State passed on the 8th April 1801 [145] entitled "an act for the settlement and relief of the Poor" the following provisions were adopted Viz

Sect. 30th And be it further enacted that every Master of any Ship or other vessel arriving from a foreign Country or from any other of the United States, who shall enter his vessel at the Custom House in the City of New York shall within twenty four hours after such entry make a report in writing on Oath to the Mayor or in case of sickness or absence to the Recorder of the said City of the name age & occupation of every person who shall have been bro't as a passenger on vessel on her last voyage upon pain of forfeiting for every neglect or omission to make such report the sum of Seventy five dollars for every alien and the sum of Fifty Dollars for every other person neglected to be so reported as aforesaid.

Sect. 31. And be it further enacted That 'it shall and may be lawful for the said Mayor or in case of his absence or sickness for the said Recorder to require every such Master of such ship or vessel to be bound with two sufficient sureties to the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty of the said City in such sum as the said Mayor or Recorder may think proper not exceeding three hundred dollars for each Passenger to indemnify and save harmless the said Mayor

Aldermen & Commonalty and the overseers of the Poor of the said City and their Successors from all and every expense and charge which may or shall be incurred for the maintenance and support of any such person so imported in case such person shall at any [146] time within two years thereafter become chargeable to the said City; and if any person so brought as aforesaid and not being a Citizen of the United States, shall be permitted or suffered to land within the City from any such ship or vessel before such bond shall have been given and without a permission in writing from the said Mayor or Recorder the Master or Commander of such ship or vessel shall be subject to the penalty of Five hundred dollars for every person so suffered or permitted to land as aforesaid.

Sect. 32^d And be it further enacted that if any person who may have been a Passenger in any such ship or vessel and not being a Citizen of the United States shall be suffered to land from such ship or vessel at any place within the distance of fifty miles from the said City with intent to proceed to said City otherwise than in the said ship or vessel the Master or Commander thereof shall be liable to the ^{like} same penalty of five hundred dollars of every such person so suffered or permitted to land ”

Your Excellency will perceive that the object of this statute is to prevent the influx of Paupers from foreign Countries and to discourage the introduction of persons whose habits of indolence, whose state of health whose vicious propensities, or whose extreme poverty may render them a burthen instead of a benefit to the *com* [147] Community and that if within a probation of two years it shall be found that any emigrant becomes a pauper then the Master and owner of the vessel importing him are called upon to indemnify the Public from any expence to the amount of Three Hundred dollars. The Policy and justice of these provisions are too obvious to require comment or explanation and this City has derived great benefit from enforcing them.

But within a few years some of our Merchants more attentive to their private interest than to their duties as good Citizens have endeavored to evade this salutary statute by landing Passengers at Perth Amboy, and sending them to this City in Boats; wherever information could be obtained of these practices, prosecutions have been instituted and a compliance with the law has been enforced, but in most cases it has been impossible to discover the offenders; and the consequence has been that Paupers so introduced have been sent from this

City to Amboy being the place from which they last came, which has resulted either in imposing an injurious burthen upon that City or of producing a Controversy repugnant to the feelings of humanity and injurious to the interests of good neighborhood

It would not be consistent with the high respect which the Common Council entertain for your Excellency and the Legislature of New Jersey to presume to suggest an adequate remedy for these practices—permit us however [148] to observe that it is a subject of common concern and of mutual interest and that in addressing this letter to your Excellency we have equally in view the welfare of Perth Amboy and this City.

A further Petition of Richard P Lawrence on the subject of compensation for his lots in Chatham Street, was read & referred to the Comptroller & Street Commissioner

The Street Commissioner presented a Report from the Assessors appointed on the Ordinance for opening Chamber Street assigning [152] their reasons for said Assessment which being read it was Resolved that the said Assessment be not confirmed

It was further Resolved that other Assessors be appointed under the Ordinance and the Rule being in this case dispensed with George Ireland, John E. West, Matthew Bolman John Nitchie & Abraham Russell were appointed.

The Street Commissioner presented a return of Delinquents on the Assessment for Georck Street whereupon a Warrant was ordered to issue to the Collector for collecting the same

The Street Commss^r presented the Assessment for regulating Grand St. from Goerck Street to the East River which was confirmed & Noah Jarvis appointed Collector.

The Committee on the Petition of Peter P. Van Zandt presented a report the consideration of which was postponed.

The Bellevue Committee presented the following report

“The Bellevue Committee avail themselves of this occasion of respectfully reporting to the Common Council, a brief Statement of their proceedings in relation to the new Alms House; its present situation, the expenditure of the monies appropriated thereto, the Stock of materials on hand & what may in their opinion be done to advantage during the Winter.

[153] It is with no small degree of satisfaction that the Committee have witnessed the rapid progress of the building, thus far composed of the best materials, & executed in the best manner, the foundation of the whole building is laid except a part of the East wing which being a bottom of rock and elevated above the level of the ground floor has occasioned some delay in reducing it to that level, and is now in considerable forwardness—the basement story of the residue of the building being about three fifths of the whole is raised ready for the beams & completely covered & secured against the effects of the weather. A considerable stock of materials is on hand as from the Report of the Superintendent herewith presented & to which the Committee beg leave to refer, will appear

The sum of \$45'791 ⁹/₁₀₀ appropriated by the Board to the New Alms House is credited in the Treasurers account which also accompanies this, & to which for more particular information the Committee beg leave to refer. From this document it appears that \$5'791 have been paid to Jacob Halsey on acc^t of the bulkhead & dock which sum being deducted from that appropriated by the Board reduces it to \$39'820 ⁹/₁₀₀ which last sum together with the balance due the Treasurer of D^{rs} 350. ⁸/₁₀₀ composes the agregate amount of expenditure on the New Alms House to the present day including materials on hand to the amount of about 10'000 Dollars.

The Masons and laborers being all discharged for the winter there will be no further appropriation necessary on account of them until spring; but the Stone Cutters, Carpenters & Blacksmiths & [154] & those having the charge of superintendance of them, will be to be provided for. The Committee therefore recommend that the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars be now appropriated to the New Alms-House

and paid to the Treasurer of that building in such amounts as may from time to time be required by the Committee who may be charged with that subject.

The Committee cannot close this Report without expressing their confident hope that a considerable part of the New Alms-House will be under roof early in the month of July next, & that the whole building will be completely so, in the month of November.

Carlisle Pollock obtained a Grant dated the 4th February 1799 for the Water lot between Rector Street & Carlisle Street bounded easterly by Washington Street and extending to West Street the permanent line; paying from the 25 March 1797 for the first fifteen years at the [183] rate of 9^d per foot for the second fifteen years at $1/6$ and forever after at $2/3$.

After maturely examining the business the Committee are of opinion that a Grant shou'd issue to Mess^s Coit and Lawrence for 116 feet in breadth comprising the Block between the Albany Basin on the North & Carlisle street on the South from Washington Street to the permanent Line; with the usual covenants and conditions as to Streets and Piers; on the same terms as granted to M^r Pollock the first payment at 9^d Per foot to be considered as payable from the 10th June 1793 the date of the order of the Board with interest on the several payments as they respectively become due.
