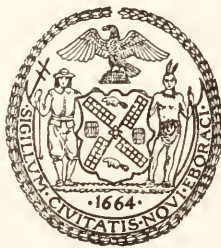

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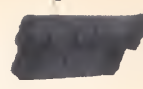

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and approved.

His Honor the Mayor laid before the Board a Letter from his Excellency Andrew Jackson President of the United States, which he had received during the [2] recess of the Board in answer to the Letter from the Mayor enclosing the Resolution of the Common Council relative to the Death of M^{rs} Jackson which was read and directed to be filed.

The Letter was as follows

Washington April 4. 1829

Sir

Your letter of the 14th January last transmitting the Resolutions of condolence adopted by the Common Council of New York on the 12th of the same Month, was received shortly after my arrival at this place, but thr'o some inadvertance for which, I trust, an excuse will be found in the great variety of business then before me, was not acknowledged.

His Honor the Mayor laid before the Board a Letter from the Honorable Martin Van Buren Secretary of State of the United States expressing his thanks [3] to the Common Council for their Resolution tendering the Freedom of the City to him was read and directed to be filed.

The Letter was as follows

Washington April 4, 1829

Sir

Your letter with the Resolution passed by the Common Council tendering to me the freedom of the City is recieved.

In communicating to that Honorable body my acceptance of this distinguished mark of their respect for my public services, and my grateful sense of the Honor they have conferred upon me, do me the favor to assure them of my hearty concurrence in the patriotic sentiments they have expressed, and which they have in so flattering a manner been pleased to attribute to me as the rule of my conduct.

In indulging a just pride in the present greatness, and a strong solicitude for the continued prosperity of a City, whose good fortune it is to have its affairs entrusted to persons so deserving of public confidence, as are your associates and yourself, I participate in feelings which are I trust as they certainly ought to be common to every Citizen of our highly favoured State.

This document, found among the loose papers in the custody of the City Clerk, is here reproduced for the first time. At this time Van Buren was Secretary of State in President Jackson's cabinet. In 1828 Van Buren was elected governor of New York for the term beginning January 1, 1829, but on March 5, President Jackson appointed him a member of his cabinet and he resigned as governor. His Honor the Mayor laid before the Board a Letter from Charles Stebbins Esq^r President of the Court for the correction of Errors which he had recieved during the recess of the Board stating that the Court had Resolved to hold an extra Term on the Second Monday of September next in New York and requesting to be informed if the Court could be accommodated as heretofore with the Common Council Chamber in which to hold their Sessions which being read The Recorder presented the following Resolutions which were unanimously adopted.

Resolved that it affords to the Common Council of the City of New York the highest satisfaction to meet the wishes of the Honorable the President and Members of the Court for the correction of Errors and that the Common Council Chamber be appropriated to hold the Session of the said Court at its extra term in September next.

Resolved that his Honor the Mayor [6] communicate the preceding Resolution to the Honorable the President of the Senate.

His Honor the Mayor laid before the Board the following Acts of the Legislature which he had received during the recess of the Board which were read and directed to be filed Viz^t

“An Act to enable the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to raise Money by Tax” passed April 17. 1829.

“An Act relative to the duties of the Clerk of the Police Office in the City of New York” passed 11th April 1829—& also “An Act in

relation to the Criminal Courts in the City of New York" passed 14th April 1829

His Honor the Mayor laid before the Board a Circular from a Committee of the Citizens of Augusta Georgia stating that a large Fire took place at said place on the 3^d of April which destroyed about Two hundred Buildings and asking some aid in relief of the Sufferers, which was read and on Motion it was referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Alderman Lee M^r Cooper & M^r Engs.

A Communication was received from Doc^r Samuel Akerly Secretary of the New York Institution for the instruction of the Deaf & Dumb stating that on [7] the Receipt of the Resolution of the Board requiring them to remove from the Rooms occupied by them in the Old Alms House, they immediately complied therewith and expressing their thanks to the Common Council for the use of said Rooms since 1818 was read and directed to be filed.

A Petition of James Killin praying for a reduction of his Taxes, on the ground that he belongs to a Military Company attached to the 11th Regiment was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Memorial of Vincent Rodriguez in relation to a Nuisance existing in Duane Street adjoining his property was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A Memorial of John R Murray praying for payment of the amount due upon a contract with Frederick Youmans for filling up a part of West street in front of Clinton Market was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of John Coffin. Butcher for the Stand N^o 6 Fulton Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of William Kellinger for [8] Stall N^o 7 Essex Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of William Haight for a Butchers License was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Lanning Ferris & John Post Jun^r praying that a Report may be made on the petition of the Butchers of the Fulton Market relative to the Long Island Butchers was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Cornelius DuBois & others to have a Well & Pump between Coenties Slip & Broad street in Water street was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 1st Ward & Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Augustus Wynkoop to be relieved from a Fine for

not filling up certain Lots in Second street was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A Petition of a number of persons praying to have the Middle Pier of Coenties Slip extended was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips

A Petition of William Erwin for an [9] Exchange of Butchers Stalls in the Greenwich Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Abraham G Thompson & others to have Beekman Street lighted with Gas, was read and referred to the Special Committee on Gas.

A Petition of Isaac Jones Jun^r for permission to erect an Iron Railing at his House on the corner of Dover & Water streets was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 4th Ward and the Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Leonard Kip for a Reduction of an Assessment on property for opening La Fayette Place was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Petition of Gideon Tucker & others to have the Sewer cleansed in Chapel street was read and referred to the Canal Committee.

A Petition of a number of Merchants praying that the Wharves may be planked over the solid part thereof and Kept clean was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips.

[10] A Remonstrance of Peter Lorillard against closing Catharine Lane was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Remonstrance of Cornelius T Williams against opening 16th Street from Bloomingdale Road to the 3^d Avenue, was read. Laid on the Table & afterward called up and referred to the Street Committee.

A Remonstrance of Cornelius T Williams & others against regulating 15th Street between the Bowery and the 3^d Avenue was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of Shubel Hall & others praying to have the Pier at the foot of Gouverneur Slip extended was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips.

A Remonstrance of C W Van Rants & others against opening Sixth street from Broadway to the Bowery was read, Whereupon M^r Cowan presented the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Street Commissioner be directed to cause all proceedings for the opening of Sixth Street to be stayed until the further order of the Common Council—Which together with the Remonstrance

was read and [11] laid on the Table, and afterward called up and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of Elijah Wood & others praying that a cross walk may be laid in Grand street at the Intersection of Madison street was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 13th Ward and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of William H Lorton & others owners of property in Spring street West of Greenwich street praying to have the Side walks extended to width allowed by Law was read and referred to the Street Committee; Whereupon Alderman B M Brown presented the following Resolution which was read and referred to the Street Committee.

Resolved that it be referred to the Street Committee to have Spring street Repaved between Greenwich and Washington streets.

A Petition of Nicholas Lozier for remuneration for injury sustained by his Horse being damaged by one of the Corporation Dirt Carts was read and referred to the Committee on Cleaning Streets.

A Petition of S D Chase for the [12] Office of Inspector of Lumber was read and referred to the Committee on Applications for Office.

A Petition of Charles Oakley stating he made application to the Superintendant of Repairs to have a Well & Pump in Barrow Street repaired at the expence of the Corporation, that he could not get the same done and in consequence thereof he had the same repaired at his own expence, said Pump was ceded to the Corporation when the Street was ceded and praying leave to remove said Pump on his own premises was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 9th Ward and the Street Commissioner.

A Petition of J Lounsberry & a number of other Cartmen praying for accommodation for Watering their Horses at the Pumps was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of William Ryer for Stall N^o 9. Centre Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of William L Reeves & William B Merrick for transfer of Stall N^o 5 Greenwich Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

[13] A Petition of Francis Marschalk to be appointed an Inspector of Fire wood for the 4th District was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips

A Petition of John Akley for permission to transfer Stall N^o 15 in Essex Market to Gilbert Graham was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of James Travers to be relieved from the payment of Tax on his personal property was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Petition of Jacob Vincent for the Office of Wood Inspector for the Bellevue District was read and referred to the Committee on Applications for Office.

A Memorial of Isaac Varian & others to have the opening of the 6th Avenue suspended until the 1st of June was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Memorial of W Wilson stating that in consequence of the digging out of the Roads adjoining his property the fences around the same have [14] been undermined and praying relief was read and referred to the Road Committee.

A Petition of R Elwell to have an error in his Tax corrected was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Petition of Isaac Green Pearson & others owners of Real Estate in this City praying that the Law relative to Vaults openings & Gratings on the Side walks may be so modified as to allow them to be placed either next to the Curb or area Coping was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of John Varick for transfer of Stand N^o 7 Grand Street Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Eli Corre to be relieved from the payment of personal Tax was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

The Police Committee to whom was referred back the Report on the Petition to exempt the Inhabitants of the 12th Ward from the operation of the Dog Law presented a Report

The former Report was read as follows.

[15] The Police Committee to whom was referred the Petition of the Inhabitants of the Twelfth Ward to be exempted from the operation of the Law relating to Dogs—Report .

That there appears to be the same reason for restraining the number of Dogs in this Ward as there is in the other Wards of the City.

They therefore recommend the following Resolution.

Resolved that it is inexpedient to grant the prayer of the Petition

The Report made this meeting was read as follows.

The Police Committee on the reference back to them of their Report on the Petition of the Inhabitants of the 12th Ward for exemption from the operation of the "Law concerning dogs" respectfully

Report.

That this Law, as they understand was enacted to prevent such an increase of dogs within the County as would add to the existing dangers from Canine Madness and with a view to prohibit in effect the poor, from Keeping these useless animals [16] about their premises while they have not a sufficiency of food for their Children.

Your Committee do not doubt that these important objects have been realized to any extent equal to the most sanguine expectations of the propounders of this Law, and that its salutary effects should induce its continued enforcement—Aware however of the peculiar situation of the Inhabitants of the 12th Ward; Your Committee would willingly release them from any burthen, which hinders that care over their lives and property intended to inhabitants within the Lamp and Watch district, provided such relinquishment was consistent with the general welfare of their fellow citizens, but, they are at a loss to discover by what regulations a rabid animal can be confined to the 12th Ward or how he will instinctively Know that when he comes to the line of that Ward he is prevented by an Ordinance from passing it—It is submitted too, whether, if the proposed exemption should be granted, a great proportion of the dogs belonging to residents of other Wards would not be sent to the 12th Ward during the warm season, and thus becoming thickly congregated increase the dangers of Canine madness to our whole population.

The services of a faithful dog appear to be very highly appreciated by the Petitioners, and [17] according to their representatives amply compensate for the Tax demanded upon them. In connection with this, it should be remembered that the Inhabitants of the 12th Ward do not contribute to the Lamp & Watch Tax.

The Register in consideration of the local necessities of the outer Wards, does not in pursuance of legal authority destroy those dogs which are there running at Large in violation of Law, but mercifully leaves them to protect their owners and annoy the passers by, thus anticipating in a degree the wishes of Petitioners.

Taxation of dogs was not intended as a measure of Finance, and your Committee are aware that no income is derived to the Treasury from this Source, there is however no expenditure requisite in enforcing the "Law concerning dogs" which is not met from the receipts

Although such is the indisposition of Citizens to pay this Tax, that the percentage allowed by Law for collection does not amount to a sum equal to the support of the individual who undertakes the disagreeable duty of Register, and hence it has been necessary to yield to that Officer the whole amount Collected in order to retain his services.

Your Committee trust that they have now complied with the rule regulating Reports, [18] and ask permission to express their wish that the Board may continue to enforce it believing that it would save from the annoyance of many long and unnecessary debates.

The following Resolution is submitted for the consideration of the Board.

Resolved that the prayer of the Inhabitants of the 12th Ward [to] be exempt from Taxation on dogs ought not to be granted

A motion was made to refer the Report back to the same Committee which was Negatived

Alderman Lee then presented the following Resolution—Resolved that the 12th Ward be exempt from the provisions and penalties of a Law concerning dogs passed 30th April 1827

After some discussion the question was taken on the Report and Resolution proposed by the Committee and the same was carried in the Affirmative.

Upon motion of Alderman Peters the Report of the Committee on Wharves Piers and Slips on Petitions relative to extension of Piers on the North [19] River was called up and considered and read in the following words.

The Committee on Wharves Piers and Slips beg leave to Report upon numerous Petitions and Resolutions.

That the proper season of the year for contracting for the extending and building of Piers having arrived, they have minutely examined the line of Water front from the Battery to the State Prison grounds, and have agreed upon the following facts and opinions Viz^t

At Washington Market the Bulkhead to extend West street is nearly completed—This improvement reduces the sise of the Basins

very much, so that the middle Pier ought to be extended 240 feet, to afford accommodation for market Boats and other Vessels estimated expense, in addition to the Bulk head about \$7,000. There is no Pier in the Fifth Ward from Jay to Canal street except the one at the North Battery which is owned by the Corporation. The water front is public from the same to Vestry street 500 feet. The Battery forms an L to the North of said Pier. By running out a Pier at the foot of Vestry street with an L to the South, on a line with the exterior of the Fort, you will form a spacious and safe harbour for the shipping which are now exposed upon a long line of Bulk head estimated expense about 8.500 Dollars.

[20] The only Piers above Charlton street are the two recently built which form the Basin appropriated for and occupied by Hay Boats. The line of Bulkhead from Charlton street North is already extended to Eighteenth street exceeding one mile; and as the Vessels plying thence to supply all that section of the City require at least two Slips for protection besides the Hay Slip, your Committee are of opinion that one Pier with a T ought to be ordered at the foot of Charles Street so as to form a Basin north of the Hay Slip previous to the sale of the Lots which front upon the Slip to be formed thereby—estimated expense about \$12.000

All the foregoing improvements appear to your Committee to be absolutely required for public accommodation and they believe they will produce as much income as the Public Piers now in use.

The following Resolutions are offered for the consideration of the Board.

Resolved that the Pier between Vesey and Fulton streets in the Third Ward be and the same is hereby ordered to be extended out 240 feet

Resolved that a Pier be ordered to be extended out at the foot of Vestry street in the Fifth Ward to extend out 250 feet with an L at the end of the same.

Resolved that a Pier be ordered to be extended out from the foot of Charles Street 250 feet with a T at the [21] end of the same so as to form a Basin adjoining the Hay Slip, and in front of the State Prison Grounds in the Ninth Ward

M^r Roosevelt presented a Resolution directing the Comptroller to report the average profits resulting from the Public Wharves & Slips—After some discussion M^r Roosevelt moved to postpone the further consideration of the subject, the question being taken thereon it passed in the Negative. The question was then taken separately on the Resolutions proposed by the Committee and they were carried in the Affirmative.

Alderman B M Brown presented the following Resolution which was referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips.

Resolved that a Pier be extended out at the foot of King street in the Eighth Ward to extend out 250 feet with an L at the end of the same.

The Police & Jail & Bridewell Committees to whom was referred the Petition for taking the Triangular block called the Five Points & building thereon a Bridewell & Watch House presented [22] the following Report

The Police and Jail and Bridewell Committees to whom was referred the Petition of a number of our Citizens suggesting the propriety of taking the triangular Block of Land called the Five Points, and erecting thereon a Bridewell and Watch House

Report

That your Committees agree in opinion with the Petitioners that the Five Points is a place of great disorder and crime, and that it would be particularly desirable to rid the City of the Nuisance complained of, and were it a suitable place for a Bridewell, they would be willing to see the Corporation make some sacrifices for the improvement of the part of the City referred to.

But when the Board reflect that all the Avenues to this place are narrow and its situation low they will conclude that the Five Points would not be a proper location for a Prison particularly for the Bridewell which is a prison for persons accused, and not generally for those convicted of crimes.

The prison fever not unfrequently exists in our present Bridewell under all it[s] advantages of Location, and we should have reason to expect great Mortality in a crowded prison located at the Points

Your Committee Know of no public use which this Block if taken could be put to, and it [23] would probably be valued very high to the Corporation as it produces a great rent on account of its being a good location for small retailers of Liquor, who have extensively located themselves in this vicinity. What may be considered as the Nuisance has in reality increased the Value of the property.

Your Committee have considered whether the Block ought to be taken as a public or open square or Grounds. If it is thrown open it must either be paid for by the Corporation, or by Assessment on the property in the neighbourhood adjacent.

Your Committee Know of no instance (and the precedent would be a bad one) of the Corporation taking ground to convert the same into a Square.

The different parts of the City would have like claims, and an enormous new item of expenditure would be immediately added to the annual Corporation expence.

In relation to the other mode of taking it by Assessment on the Property adjacent there could be no objection on the part of the Corporation. But it must be remarked that the Board have before them no petition, from the owners of property petitioning for it to be so taken, and this mode of taking should originate with them.

They offer the following Resolution

Resolved that it is inexpedient to [24] erect a Bridewell at the Five Points.

The Alderman & Assistant of the 13th Ward and Street Commissioner to whom was referred the Petition for a Well & Pump in Willett Street near Grand Street Respectfully Report.

That in their opinion a Well and Pump is much required at that place, and accordingly submit the following resolution.

[25] Resolved that a Well be dug and built and a Pump erected therein in Willet Street near Grand Street.

The Ferry Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Elisha Tibbitts Gould Hoyt and a number of others for a new South Ferry presented a Report which was read laid on the Table and directed to be printed for the use of the Members.

The Committee on Assessments to whom was referred the Petition of John F Rudolph for a reduction of Tax presented the following Report against the same.

The Reading of the Minutes of the last Meeting were dispensed

The Mayor stated that this Meeting had been called in consequence of the Law relative to the removal of the Female convicts from the State Prison making it necessary for the Common Council to designate the Prison to which they were to be removed, which designation [60] was to be approved of by the Commissioners appointed to build the State Prison—And as the Sale of the grounds of the State Prison made the immediate removal of the Convicts necessary, and as the Commissioners were now in Albany it became necessary for the Common Council to designate the Prison, and also to despatch a person to Albany to procure the approbation of the Commissioners. He had therefore summoned the Board and he submitted the following Resolutions which he deemed necessary to be passed on the subject.

The Resolutions were accordingly read in the words following, and were Adopted.

Resolved that the Penitentiary at Bellevue be and the same is hereby designated as a place of safe confinement within the City and County of New York to which it would be proper to remove the female convicts now confined in the Prison formerly known as the State Prison at Greenwich and which it will be proper to confine such female convicts as may hereafter be received for the purpose of confinement by the said Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty according to the Act of the Legislature of this State entitled "An Act relative to the imprisonment within the City and County of New York of female convicts adjudged to be confined in the State Prison" passed April 23. 1829

Resolved that as soon as the place [61] above designated shall have been approved under their hands by the Commissioners for building a New State Prison at Mount Pleasant the same shall be the place to which such female convicts shall be removed and in which they shall hereafter be confined pursuant to the Act above mentioned, and such removal is hereby directed to be made as soon after such approval shall have been obtained as conveniently may be, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Alms House

Resolved that the Counsel of the Board be instructed to proceed forthwith to Albany to obtain the approbation of the Commissioners for building a new State Prison at Mount Pleasant for the removal of the female Convicts agreeably to the foregoing Resolutions

Resolved further that if in consequence of the absence or sickness of the Commissioners or from any other cause the Counsel shall not be able to procure the signatures of the Commissioners as aforesaid that then and in that case he be instructed to endeavour to procure the

passage of a Law of the State Authorising the Common Council to select and appropriate any prison now erected or to be hereafter erected within the said City and County for the confinement of the Female Convicts.

The Mayor laid before the Board the following Copies of the Laws of the State passed at the present [62] Meeting of the Legislature and the following were directed to be filed and to be published in the Newspapers employed by the Board.

1. An Act relative to Imprisonment within the City and County of New York of Female Convicts adjudged to be confined in the State Prison passed 23^d April 1829.

2. An Act for the further support & extension of Common Schools in the City of New York passed April 25. 1829.

3. An Act to authorise the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York to erect a Public Market and to lay out and open a Public Street in the 11th Ward of said City passed April 25. 1829

4. An Act for the prevention of Masquerades passed April 25. 1829.

5. An Act making certain alterations in the Map or plan of the City of New York passed April 25. 1829

6. An Act to create a fund in Aid of the Society for the Reformation of Juvenile delinquents in the City of New York and for other purposes passed 29 April 1829

The Last Law was directed in addition to publishing it, that it be printed for the use of the Members, and that it be referred to the Committee on Laws to report on at the next Meeting of the Board Mr Bryson moved that the Counsel be instructed while at Albany to [63] endeavour to procure the repeal of the said Law After considerable discussion a Motion was made for adjournment, which was carried in the Affirmative So no question was taken on the motion of Mr Bryson and the Board adjourned to Monday next at 5 O'clock

The Jail and Bridewell and Police Committees, to whom the complaints of the Grand Jury against the present Bridewell and the necessary promiscuous confinement of the prisoners have been referred Report

That it appears by our Ordinances that the last Board constituted the Greenwich Prison a City Bridewell and contemplated the removal there [104] of the Bridewell Prisoners, and went so far as to direct the mode of their transportation to the Greenwich prison. The present Board have ordered this Prison and the grounds to be sold, so that it

appears to be incumbent on the Board to provide some other place, and to erect a Bridewell on some new location; for your Committee presume that the Board, by ordering the Greenwich Prison sold, did not intend to express an opinion that the Bridewell ought to be kept in its present location. The Police Committee, by direction of the Board, have at various times considered the propriety of establishing an additional Police Office, more central, or removing the whole department up town; and after much reflection your two Committees are induced to recommend to the Board that a Bridewell with small rooms for the separate confinement of prisoners and suitable rooms for the whole, or a branch of the Police, be built in or adjacent to the 14th Ward.

It has become inconvenient and expensive to the Corporation to have all accused persons brought to the present Police and Bridewell and the inconvenience and expense will be increasing as the City extends; and the more separate confinement of persons committed is loudly called for—No situation is so proper or convenient for a Police as in or adjacent to the Bridewell, and if the Special [105] Sessions could there also dispose of the cases of persons charged with minor offences, it would leave comparatively few prisoners to be conveyed to the Court of General Sessions wherever it might be held.

The subject of the proposed alteration of the Organization of the Common Council was upon Motion of Alderman Peters called up for consideration—The Resolutions adopted at a Meeting of Citizens held on 30th April was read in the words following.

Copy of the Preamble and Resolutions unanimously adopted by the General Meeting of the Citizens of the City of New York, held at Masonic Hall on Thursday the 30th April last (pursuant to public notice duly given in all the daily papers) to take into consideration the propriety of adopting appropriate measures to effect an alteration in the present Charter of the City

“Whereas the present Charter of the City Government was framed at a period when the population did not [134] exceed Eight thousand; when its Commerce trade and wealth were comparatively insignificant, and its Municipal Concerns of small magnitude and great simplicity; And whereas since that time the City has increased in numbers nearly thirty fold and its business and wealth more than One hundred fold, so as not only to equal in these particulars, but to surpass the whole State, as it existed at the time of the adoption of the Constitution of 1777. And whereas as a necessary consequence of these rapid and almost unparalleled changes there has been at least a proportionate increase in the extent importance and Complexity of our public business.

Therefore Resolved as the sense of the Citizens here assembled, that the present organisation of our local government is not adapted to the altered exigencies of the City, but is essentially deficient in those checks & balances and securities against abuses, the necessity and efficacy of which have been declared by our wisest statesmen, and demonstrated not only in the general government, but of every State in the union.

Resolved that the calling of a City Convention is, in the opinion of the Meeting, the proper mode of revising the Charter and discussing the merits of the amendments which may be proposed, and that the measure is imperiously required, to relieve the Citizens from the evils which they have so long submitted to under the [135] present form of our City Government

Resolved that we cordially approve of the Ordinance now before the Hon Common Council making provision for calling a City Convention, and that the Chairman & Secretary prepare in behalf of this Meeting, a Copy of their proceedings, and present the same to his

A Law for the calling of a City Convention

Passed

1829

§1. Be it ordained by the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened, that it shall and may be lawful and it is hereby recommended to the Inhabitants of this City, on the twentieth day of May next, to elect by Ballot, Three delegates for each Ward, to meet in convention, for the purpose of considering the Charter of the City and the several Laws of the State in relation thereto, and suggesting such alterations therein as they may deem proper.

§2. And be it further ordained, that the same and no other qualifications shall be required of the Voters at the said Election, than are now required in the case of Charter Officers, and that there shall be appointed by the Common Council three Inspectors for each Ward, who or a majority of whom shall [137] designate for their respective Wards, the places of holding the said election; and shall provide a box

to receive the ballots, and shall appoint two Clerks each of whom shall keep a poll list of the Electors and the said Election shall be conducted by the Inspectors thereof with the like powers, and in all respects not herein otherwise provided for, in the like manner, as near as may be as in the case of Charter Officers.

§3. And be it further Ordained that fifteen days at least before the holding of the said Election, it shall be the duty of the Inspectors to certify to the Clerk of the Common Council, the several places designated by them respectively as aforesaid for the holding thereof and it shall be the duty of the Clerk thereupon to give notice thereof, for at least ten days successively, in all the public papers employed by the Corporation.

§4. And be it further ordained that the polls of the said election shall be opened at nine O'clock in the forenoon of the Twentieth day of May aforesaid and shall continue open until sunset of the same day, and for the like period on the ensuing day and no longer. And it shall be the duty of the Inspector within Twenty four hours thereafter to canvass and determine for their respective wards, according to the highest number of Votes, the persons chosen as delegates to the said Convention, and the names of the persons voted for as delegates and the number of Votes given for each and [138] the names of the persons chosen shall be immediately certified by the Inspectors respectively who shall also cause the said Certificate to be filed with the Clerk of the Common Council retaining a duplicate thereof in their own possession, and the said Clerk within Ten days after the said Election shall cause a Certificate thereof to be given to each person so found to be elected as a delegate, and shall also report the result of the said election to the Common Council.

§5. And be it further ordained that the delegates so to be chosen shall meet in Convention on the tenth day of June next at 12 O'clock at noon at the City Hall in the room now occupied by the Court of Sessions and it shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Common Council to attend the said Convention on the opening thereof and to Act as the Secretary thereof unless the convention shall other wise direct.

§6. And be it further ordained that it shall and may be lawful for the said Convention after having agreed upon their proposed amendments to make immediate application to the Legislature for the passage of an Act to sanction and give effect to the same, in such manner as to the said Convention may seem most expedient.

§.7. And be it further ordained, that there shall be allowed to each of the Inspectors of the said Election for his services the sum of Three dollars, to each of the [139] Clerks of the Polls, the sum of Two dollars and to the Clerk of the Common Council so much as may be necessary to pay for the Stationary and other contingent expences of the Convention, and that no other compensation shall be paid, or charge allowed, as against the City Treasury under or in relation to this Ordinance.

Mr Bryson offered an amendment which consisted in striking out the enacting words in the beginning of the Law and inserting "Resolved that it be and is hereby recommended" Al^d Stevens presented the following Amendment.

Resolved that this Common Council view with satisfaction the disposition lately shown by the Electors of the City of New York, to remodel the present form of the Municipal Government, And that this Board will with great pleasure receive and consider such alterations and amendments of the Charter of the City as the Association of Electors composed of the Ward Committees to be appointed on this subject may deem advisable to present—And that in case the alterations and Amendments which may be proposed meet the United approbation of said Association of Electors and of this Board, that then this Board will unite with the said Association of Electors in a direct application to the Legislature for the Enactment of a Law embracing the alterations & amendments which may be so agreed upon.

[140] Alderman B. M Brown presented as a Substitute an Ordinance which recommended to the Inhabitants to decide by Ballot the calling of a Convention and that Polls be opened for that purpose in each Ward and if there was a Majority in favor of a Convention then the proceedings to be as prescribed in the Law proposed by the Committee

Alderman Peters also presented the following Resolution.

Resolved that it is hereby recommended to the Inhabitants of this City to assemble in public meetings in their respective Wards on or before the _____ day of _____ next and to appoint _____ delegates from each Ward to meet in convention on the _____ day of _____ next for the purpose of considering the Charter of the City and the several Laws of the State in relation thereto, and suggesting such alterations therein as they may deem proper and to take such measures as may be necessary to have such alteration legally carried into effect.

A considerable discussion then took place when Alderman Palmer moved that the whole subject be referred to a Special Committee Alderman Peters calling a Division the question was taken on Alderman Palmers motion when the Members voted as follows

The Street Committee to whom was referred the annexed Resolution to enquire and Report on the expediency of appointing a Clerk in the Street Commissioners Office, Have enquired of the Street Commissioner and Assistant Street Commissioner concerning this matter who informed your Committee that the business had increased so much, that it will be absolutely necessary to have a competent person appointed to that Office.

Therefore Resolved that a proper person be appointed as Clerk in the Street Commissioners Office at a Salary not exceeding Five hundred dollars per Annum.

Resolved that Jacob Lozier who has been some time in the Office and is highly recommended by the Street Commissioner & Assistant be and he is hereby appointed Clerk in the Street Commissioners Office

Whereupon the Report was approved and the Resolution adopted and Jacob Lozier was accordingly appointed—And it was Resolved that the Salary be fixed at \$500 dollars per Annum.

[143] On Motion the Report of the Ferry Committee on the subject of the Williamsburgh Ferry which was laid on the Table on the 6th April last was called up and read in the words following

The Committee on Ferries to whom was referred the several Petitions in relation to the Williamsburgh Ferry respectfully

Report.

That the Williamsburgh Ferry Company, by the terms of their present Lease, have the exclusive privilege of the said Ferry for Thirteen years from the first of May next; at the annual rent, for the first six years thereof, Of one hundred and fifty dollars, and for the remaining Seven years, of Two hundred and fifty Dollars; and that the said Company now own two Steam Boats, which are used for the purposes of the said Ferry. That the want of a Third Boat has been much complained of by the public, for whose accommodation the said Ferry is conducted, and the Company admit such want, but represent that they cannot afford the expense of another Boat, unless the term for which they are to enjoy the privilege of the said Ferry should be extended.

The Committee having obtained all the information in their power on this subject, and having given the same full consideration, feel satisfied that public convenience requires that [144] two Boats should be kept constantly running at the said Ferry, which cannot, in their opinion be effected unless three Boats should be owned by the Company, which would enable them at all times to supply the place of any Boat rendered unfit for use by accident, or the want of repairs.

The Committee have reason also to believe that the income yielded by the said Ferry under present circumstances would not be a sufficient inducement to the Lessees to incur the cost of another Boat, without the prospect of indemnity which an extension of their privileges might hold out to them; and as public convenience is the primary object to be considered in matters of this nature, the Committee are of opinion that it would be expedient, with a view to that object, to extend the said Lease for an additional Term of Seven years at the annual Rent of Five hundred Dollars. It being a condition that the present Lessees shall procure a Third Steam Boat for the said Ferry without delay and that they shall at all times until the termination of the Lease so extended own three good and sufficient Boats, and keep two constantly running at the said Ferry.

The Committee are of opinion however that the extension of the Lease now recommended [145] by them should be confined to the landing at the foot of Grand Street only, and that the Corporation should on their part stipulate, that during such extended term, no privilege for any other Ferry between Grand street and the present Walnut street Ferry shall be granted to any other persons

The Committee therefore offer the following Resolution.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Board prepare a Lease to the said Williamsburgh Ferry Company, for the said extended term of Seven years in conformity with the foregoing Report

The Question was then taken on agreeing to the Report and the Resolution together with the amendment proposed by the Recorder, and a Division having been called by Alderman Stevens the Members voted as follows.

So it was carried in the Affirmative Alderman Peters gave notice of reconsideration at the next Meeting of the Board.

On Motion the Report of the Ferry Committee on the subject of the Hell Gate Ferry which was laid on the Table on the 6th of April last was called up and read in the words following

[147] The Ferry Committee to whom the Petition of Henry F Blackwell relating to Hurl gate Ferry was referred Report

That the Ferry in question though not extensively used, is yet a very great convenience to the inhabitants of the Twelfth Ward wishing to cross to Long Island, and for the Long Islanders wishing to cross to the upper part of this Island, or to West Chester, and there are considerable quantities of Hay and Marketing brought across this Ferry.

The Wharf on the Long Island side has been carried away by the ice, and a floating bridge is required on this side for the accommodation of the new Horse Ferry boat which the Lessees have built—A House is also required to be built on this side in the place of the one to be torn down by the opening of 86th Street. The Lessees ask the Corporation to erect the necessary wharves on Long Island and this

side—Your Committee are unwilling to lay out much money on these premises and yet they admit that something ought to be done.

By the opening of 86th Street not only the House but most of the Corporation Land has been taken as part of the Street leaving a front on 86th Street of about 75 feet by about 12 or 15 feet deep.

As this one day or other will be an important Ferry, Your Committee recommend the [148] purchase of as much ground in the rear of these premises as will make the Corporation Lots 100 feet deep. And that the Lessees be authorised to erect a House on the same to be valued and paid for by the Corporation at the Expiration of the Lease provided however that this House shall in no case be valued over \$2000, And the Lessees to be charged with the worth of the present materials of the Old House, to be removed—That the Street Commissioner cause the Hill at 86th Street to be dug down and the road made to the Third Avenue for the accommodation of this Ferry.

The rent for the last Seven years of their Lease is not fixed and your Committee recommend that the Lessees have it at \$100 per year, and that they be permitted to lay out their rent (which will amount to \$700,) in erecting wharves and bridges. And that the Ferry Committee be authorized to lay out an additional sum, on Account of the Corporation for permanent Wharf improvements not exceeding \$1500, they the lessees paying 6 per Cent per Annum for the same—The above to be on the express condition that the improvements in the Wharves floats and bridges shall enure to the Corporation at the expiration of the Lease whatever they may cost the Lessees beyond these amounts

[149] Your Committee offer the following Resolution

Resolved that the above Report be adopted and that the Ferry Committee carry it into effect

The Law Committee to whom was referred with power the annexed Resolution on the subject of the Office of Public Administrator in [165] this City Report

That the Law of the State as it existed at the time of the adoption of the Resolution in relation to the Office in question, was universally admitted to be very defective—It allowed the receipt of funds by the Public Administrator to an indefinite amount without any adequate security, and without any provision for a prompt accountability, while at the same time it made the City treasury responsible for their due appropriation. On examining the revised Statutes it appeared that these defects, had to a considerable extent been, remedied, by the Revisors, Inasmuch, however, as the Treasury of the City was still held liable for the Acts of this Officer, the Committee deemed it reasonable that the Common Council of the City should be vested with a more ample control over him than was provided for even by the revised Statutes, they accordingly prepared a Law and procured the passage thereof by the Legislature, adapted, as they believe, to carry into effect the views they have mentioned—A certified Copy of the Act is annexed to their Report—As the subject is intimately connected with the Finances of the City the Committee recommend the adoption of the following Resolution.

For repaving Murray Street from Broadway to the west side of Church street and John Targee Abraham Quick and Reuben Munson appointed Assessors.

For paving side walks of Ludlow and Essex streets to North street and Abraham Bloodgood James Barclay & Pine Hopkins appointed Assessors.

The Report of the Road Committee in relation to working the 8th Avenue which was laid on the Table on the 6th April last was now called up and read as follows.

The Road Committee respectfully Report. That the Eighth Avenue was opened about the year 1811 from Greenwich Village to M^cCoombs Bridge, the cost of the land taken, the Assessments fencing &c have been considerable to the proprietors along the line, and a large sum was disbursed from the Public Treasury in working the Road from Greenwich upwards and from M^cCoombs bridge downwards, soon after the Road was opened, but from some cause not definitely understood [227] by this Committee, the work was suspended for a number of years leaving a middle section of nearly three miles utterly impassible and thereby rendering the finished Sections but partially useful—About three years ago the Freeholders and other Inhabitants on the line of the Road Memorialized the Common Council representing the condition of the Road as a greivance, embarrassing to the occupancy disposition and management of their Estates, and praying that the same be finished or closed up, and the Common Council very wisely in the opinion of this Committee recommenced the work by the labour of the Penitentiary Convicts making some annual appropriations for the payment of overseers, and the necessary incidental expences. In this way at a trifling expence to the public Treasury, in all three years, about two miles of passably good Road has been made through the most uneven and most rocky portion of the Island. There still remains unworked about three fourths of a mile, from Apthorps lane to the foot of Clindennings Hill. Your Committee believing the Common Council would not fail to finish this small remaining Section this Season, have consulted with the Keeper of the Penitentiary in relation to the employment of the convicts, and finding the removal to Blackwells Island will bring into [228] more profitable requisition the labour of all the Convicts, and considering moreover the Section of Road in question too distant for the daily labour of the Convicts; Your Committee beg leave to recommend the adoption of the following Resolution

The Expence for working the Road is estimated not to exceed \$800, including the repairs of the Dock, and in the opinion of your Committee the request of the Petitioners ought to be granted, and accordingly recommend the adoption of the following Resolution.

On Motion the Report of the Committee on Public Offices relative to the Inspection of Quick Lime which was laid on the Table for consideration [276] on the 1st of June was called up and read in the words following

The Committee on Public Offices to whom was referred the several Petitions and Memorials on the subject of the Law regulating the inspection of Quick or unslacked lime

Respectfully Report.

That the views and wishes of the several parties interested in this subject are so different, that in the opinion of the Committee, no law could be framed which would be satisfactory to all. On the one hand, the existing Ordinance is represented to be useless and oppressive so far as it respects unslacked Lime imported from Rhode Island, because such Lime undergoes a sufficient inspection in that State, others again object to this Law, because it deprives them of the privilege of relying upon their own judgments as to the quality of the Article, and taxes them with the expence of an inspection, to which they attach no value.

On the other hand strong remonstrances have been offered against any change in the Law, whereby the necessity of Inspection should be dispensed with in any case. The Committee after exam[in]ing the

Law of Rhode Island relative to the Inspection of this Article (an exemplified Copy of which they procured for that purpose,) and bestowing upon the subject much reflection have considered, that those who seek to abolish all [277] Inspection of this Article, are persons, who from having dealt, largely in it as purchasers and consumers, feel themselves as competent to judge of its quality as any Inspector can be; And that the remonstrances against dispensing with an Inspection in every instance proceed from the natural Alarm which the Inspectors feel at the danger of having their business diminished

They consider also that there are other persons interested in this subject besides the Inspectors and that class of purchasers who may be skilled in the Article—Many persons have occasion to buy unslacked lime, in small quantities, of a few casks at a time, who are ignorant of its quality and have nothing to depend upon for their protection against imposition except the judgment of the Inspector. Under all these circumstances, the Committee have arrived at the conclusion that it should be left optional with the purchaser in all cases, whether there shall be an Inspection or not, While exam[in]ing this subject, the Committee have discussed the propriety of establishing an Assize for the Casks in which unslacked Lime should be sold in this City, but owing to the difference in the sizes of the Casks in which this Article is brought from different places, they have deemed it imp[r]acticable (without great and unnecessary inconvenience) to establish any fixed standard. They think it would be a useful regulation however to have the quantity [278] which a Cask is capable of containing marked on it whenever it may be Inspected—The Committee have prepared the annexed Ordinance containing the foregoing provisions and others which have been suggested to them by their investigation of this matter, and they are of opinion that by adopting the same the views of all parties interested may be in some degree reconciled and this subject placed upon a better footing than it has hitherto been—They therefore respectfully recommend the passage of the annexed Ordinance.

[305] The Finance Committee on the Petition of John and Thomas Morrell respecting Lots at Williamsburgh which *which* had been referred back to them presented a Report—The former Report was as follows

The Finance Committee to whom was referred the Petition of John Morrell and Thomas Morrell, praying an extension of the Lease held by them from the Corporation for two Lots of ground at Williamsburgh respectfully Report

That the Petitioners have represented in their Petition that there was a mistake in the location of the Lots intended to be Leased, owing to which, part of their buildings were erected on the property of other persons, and that they will be compelled to purchase such property or remove their buildings therefrom; the Committee have investigated the documents, on file, in relation to this Lease, and find. First, that on the 3^d August 1805, Thomas Morrell, the father of the petitioners, conveyed in fee to the Corporation two Lots of Ground lying at what was called Morrells point in Bushwick, being now called Williamsburgh, one Lot being on the Northerly and the other on the Southerly side of a main street or road then to be made (and which has since been made and is called Grand street) each Lot extending One hundred feet along the line of the said Street and running back Twenty five feet.

[306] Secondly. That on the first of December 1818, the Corporation leased to the said Thomas Morrell two Lots at Williamsburgh, one lying on each side of Green street and each containing Twenty five feet front on the Street and running back One hundred feet deep for 16 years and 5 Months at the rate of Seventy dollars per Annum, which lease will expire on the first day of May 1835. And Thirdly, that on the 8th January 1821, the said Lease was transferred (with the consent of the Corporation) by the said Thomas Morrell to his Sons, the Petitioners who now hold the same, being the Lease mentioned and referred to in their petition. The Committee would observe that the

only difference between the location of the Lots mentioned in the deed and those mentioned in the Lease, appears to be that the first are 100 feet front on the Street and twenty five feet deep, and the Latter Twenty five [feet] front on the Street and 100 feet deep; and it is alledged that the mistake occurred in making this difference in the position of the Lots. The Committee have no reason to doubt the fact that such mistake exists and that the inconvenience and difficulty stated by the Petitioners has resulted from it; and they consider it reasonable that the said mistake should be rectified and the Lease extended for a certain period as an indemnity to the Petitioners for any injury or loss they may [307] sustain. The Committee think however that Twenty one years is too long a Period, and that the rent should be increased during such time as the extension may be given for, and they have come to the conclusion to recommend that the said Lease be extended for the term of fourteen years at the rent of \$100 per Annum, for the first seven years, and of \$125 per Annum for the last seven years thereof. They beg leave therefore to offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Counsel to the Board prepare a Lease to the said Petitioners for such extended term in conformity to this Report, and that the same be authenticated in the usual manner during the recess of the Board.

That the Petitioners having represented in [308] their petition, that there was a mistake in the location of the Lots intended to be Leased, owing to which, part of their buildings, were erected on the property of other persons, and that they will be Compelled to purchase such property or remove their buildings therefrom, the Committee have investigated the Documents on file in relation to this Lease and find—First, that on the 3^d August 1805 Thomas Morrell the father of the Petitioners conveyed in fee to the Corporation Two Lots of ground lying at what was called Morrells point in Bushwick being now called Williamsburgh, One Lot being on the Northerly and the other on the Southerly side of a Main Street or road then to be made

(and which has since been made and is called Grand street) each Lot extending One hundred feet along the line of the said Street and running back Twenty five feet.

Secondly that on the 1st of December 1818 the Corporation leased to the said Thomas Morrell Two lots at Williamsburgh one lying on each side of Grand Street and each containing Twenty five feet front on the Street and running back One hundred feet deep for 16 years and 5 Months at the rate of Seventy Dollars per Annum which Lease will expire on the 1st day of May 1835. and Thirdly that on the 8th January 1821 The said Lease was transferred (with the consent of the Corporation) by the said Thomas Morrell to his sons the Petitioners who now hold [309] the same being the Lease mentioned and referred to in their Petition. The Committee would observe that the only difference between the location of the Lots mentioned in the Deed and those mentioned in the Lease appears to be that the first are 100 feet front on the Street and Twenty five feet deep and the latter 25 feet front on the Street and 100 feet deep; And it is alledged that the mistake occurred in Making this difference in the position of the Lots. The Committee have no reason to doubt the fact that such mistake exists, and that the inconvenience & difficulty stated by the Petitioners has resulted from it; And they consider it reasonable, that the said Mistake should be rectified, and the Lease extended to a certain period as an indemnity to the Petitioner for any injury or loss they may sustain—The Committee think however that Twenty one years is too long a period, and that the rent should be increased during such time as the extension may be given for. And they have come to the conclusion to recommend that the said Lease be extended for the term of Fourteen years at the rent of \$100 per Annum for the first seven years and of \$125 per Annum for the last seven years thereof. They beg leave therefore to offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Counsel to the Board prepare a Lease to the said Petitioners for such [310] extended term in conformity to this Report, and that the same be authenticated in the usual manner during the recess of the Board.

The Law and Finance Committees to whom was referred the Report of the Comptroller in relation to the Office of Public Administrator presented the following Report.

The Law and Finance Committees [314] to whom was referred the Report of the Comptroller in relation to the Office of Public Administrator.

Report.

In consequence of a special Law, passed at the instance of the Law Committee, the Revised Statutes, which were not to have gone into operation until the first day of January next, were made to take effect, so far as respects the Office of Public Administrator in this City, on the first day of May last.

These Statutes contain various provisions for the better Government of that Office, to which it is not deemed necessary except in a very few particulars, to make any addition, until experience shall have demonstrated its utility.

The Law above referred to (passed at the last Session of the Legislature) also gives to the Common Council the power to make from time to time such rules and regulations, for the direction of the Public Administrator as they may think proper, Your Committees, under this power would respectfully recommend, for the present, the adoption of the following Resolution.

Resolved that the following Rules and regulations be and the same are hereby enacted for the Government of the Public Administrator in this City.

I. All monies Collected or received by the Public Administrator shall within two days after the [315] receipt thereof, be deposited in the Mechanics Bank of this City to the Joint credit of himself and the Comptroller of the City, in the manner directed by the revised Statutes, and with the sole exception therein mentioned.

II. It shall be the duty of the Public Administrator whenever required by the Comptroller, to exhibit to him the Bank book, con-

taining the entries of such deposits, and all other vouchers and documents in relation to his the said Administrators Office.

III. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller, before signing any check for any monies so deposited as aforesaid to examine the said Bank Book, and also the vouchers on which the payment is to be made and to satisfy himself fully of the Correctness thereof and in case of any doubt or difficulty to report the same to the Common Council.

IV. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller to Keep a Register in which he shall immediately enter, from time to time as the same shall occur, all cases in which administration shall be granted to the said Public Administrator; and it shall be his duty also to see that the deposits, mentioned in the first of these rules are punctually and faithfully made.

The Law Committee to whom was referred the Act of the Legislature passed on the 29th day of April last in relation to the House of Refuge presented the following Report.

The Law Committee, to whom was referred the Act of the Legislature, passed on the Twenty ninth of April last in relation to the House of Refuge. Report.

That the Act in question contains substantially the following provisions: it directs that there shall be paid to that institution in the first place, Eight thousand dollars per annum, out of the surplus funds of the Marine Hospital, and in the second place One dollar and fifty cents on each Tavren Licence, Two hundred and fifty Dollars on each Circus Licence, and Five hundred dollars on each Theatre Licence, which sums the Mayor and Commissioners of Excise respectively are required to demand and recieve for that purpose.

As to the funds of the Marine Hospital, they are derived partly from a duty on Seamen, and partly from a duty on passengers. It appears from Statements exhibited to the Committee that the [317] amount derived from the latter of these two sources considerably exceeds the sums appropriated to the House of Refuge, and that there is therefore no ground of Complaint on the part of the Seamen—Inas-

much also, as a large portion, of the inmates of that establishment are of foreign Origin, it has been suggested that there is not only no injustice but a peculiar fitness in that part of the Law. But whatever may be its merits or demerits, they were, in the opinion of your Committee, the proper subjects for the consideration of the Legislature, and do not call for any measures on the part of the Common Council.

With respect to the extra duty of \$1.50 imposed by the Act on tavren licences although repugnant to long established usage, the Committee cannot say that it is unconstitutional. By the Charter the privilege of granting such licences, and the revenue to be derived therefrom is guaranteed to the Corporation; but that revenue is limited to Thirty Shillings in each case.

By an Act of the Legislature, passed in the year 1824, the sum to be demanded is fixed at \$10, which provision having been adopted at the instance, and of course with the assent of the Corporation became in effect, part of the Charter.

The question then presented is whether any, and if any, what, alterations may be made in such a Charter without the assent of the Corporation. It is a question [318] not without serious difficulties, and its discussion would involve an examination of Constitutional Law altogether beyond the limits of an Ordinary Report Your Committee therefore will confine themselves to a mere statement of the result of their deliberations, which is, that it is not expedient to resist the payment *the payment* of the monies which have been received under the Act referred to them. They accordingly recommend the adoption of the following Resolution.

Resolved that the monies received or to be received by the Mayor and Commissioners of Excise respectively, under the Act passed by the Legislature on the 29th of April last be paid over to the Treasurer of the Society for the reformation of Juvenile delinquents in the City of New York pursuant to the directions in the said Act contained.

The charges were that Robert Hinchman member of Fire Engine Company N^o 19 did when that Engine was at work in a line for the purpose of conveying Water to the above named fire take one of the nuts from off the chain which is attached to the Piston Rod, and secretly conveyed it away, and that in consequence the Engine could not be worked, and which was also the means [97] of stopping the whole line till another Engine could be obtained to supply the place, and consequently that much more damage was done by the fire.

From the evidence Your Committee are not willing to say that the charge of taking the nut off the chain is true but that he conveyed it away they have no doubt

It appears that the nut was discovered to be off and search was made for it in the Box of the Engine by the accused and other persons

M^r Machen says under oath that he saw Hinchman have the nut in his hand when he took it out of the Box of the Engine and also saw him put it in his pocket, and immediately walked around the corner of the Street and all agree that the nut has not been found—M^r Machan is a young Man but your Committee give full credit to what he says, as

his Story is Corroborated by other testimony which however is not so clear.

Your Committee have not been able to discover what reason there could have been to induce him to commit so base an Act, except that the Engine was near being overflowed by the one behind, and he was willing to make use of this plan for an excuse to prevent the Engine being again worked, notwithstanding he must have known that it would cause much more destruction of [98] the property of his fellow Citizens.

Your Committee are clearly of the opinion that the Public safety and the good of the Department require that such conduct should be met by prompt and merited punishment Accordingly submit the following Resolution

The Special Committee to whom was referred the Second and Third Sections of the Ordinance proposed by the Law Committee providing for the more equal distribution of the Common School Money in the City of New York Report

[185] That your Committee have examined into the organization and existing condition of the Four Schools therein enumerated and find that they are regularly Incorporated, and under the direction and control of highly respectable Trustees who have employed Teachers to instruct in the elementary branches of a Common School education—Gratuitous instruction is given to the Children of the Poor in all the said Schools, and although pay is demanded where the Parent is of sufficient ability, yet none are excluded because of their poverty—In Yorkville and its vicinity it is supposed there are between 120 and 150 Children requiring Instruction over four and under Sixteen years of age and that more than One third of these belong to Parents unable to pay for their education.

In the vicinity of the other Schools are also found large numbers of Children in like destitute condition.

The income arising from the Balance of what remains after building School Houses of the sums set apart by the Legislature for these Schools out of the proceeds of the Harlaem Common Lands is totally inadequate to their Support, and the Schools must have become extinct, but for the munificent patronage of a few of the Trustees.

On investigation it appears that the Inhabitants of the Twelfth Ward in which these Schools are located, have paid the annual quota [186] of the School Tax, since the first distribution of the School Fund, amounting in the aggregate to several thousand Dollars, and the only participation they have had of its benefits, has been the establishment of a Small School at Bloomingdale for the last Two years, excepting that which was paid for a short time to the Trustees of the Hamilton School under an express clause in its charter, but which has been discontinued for Several years.

Your Committee are satisfied that these Schools are not under the control of any particular Religious Sect or denomination, but that instruction is afforded to the children of the Poor, be they of what religious profession they may.

Whilst therefore this portion of our City pays its quota of the School Tax, and has Schools established under the control of

responsible Trustees for the gratuitous instruction of the children of the Poor. We cannot but deem it contrary to every principle of Justice to withhold from them a fair proportion of the fund as thereby we not only make them pay for the education of the Poor in the other sections of the City, but deprive them of that Interest in the Common School fund which of right belongs to them as Citizens of the State

Your Committee therefore recommend that the Second sections of the Ordinance as [187] proposed by the Law Committee and herewith Reported be passed

The great share the United States of North America, and in consequence the greatest trading town of these States has in the Baltic trade, will I am convinced, render very interesting the New Communication between the North Sea and Baltic through Sweeden, which we hope to see completed [198] in a few years, whereof the Port of Gotenberg is the western termination, and of course a natural entrepot not indifferent to one of the most considerable Staples of the world to whom Sweeden has, and more and more will have, so many relations.

The Finance Committee to whom was referred the Memorial of the Trustees of the New York Dispensary praying for pecuniary Aid
Respectfully Report.

That having made particular enquiry into the present circumstances of this Institution, and [218] fully considering the grounds set forth by the Memorial in support of the application, they do not hesitate to recommend that the Common Council should make an appropriation of money for its use

The Committee deem it unnecessary to enter into a detail of the benevolent purposes, and extended utility of this Institution, with a view of enlisting the favorable consideration of the Board in its behalf, Every member must feel that the Charity which it dispenses is in its nature peculiarly laudable; It holds out no inducements for idleness, but its direct tendency is to promote industry, by preserving health.

The Committee think that a very little reflection must convince every unbiased mind that upon principles of public policy, it is the interest of the Corporation, as a public body, to strengthen the hands of the Humane Individuals who guide the operations of this establishment, and to afford them, to a reasonable extent the means of enlarging the sphere of its usefulness.

In every civilized Community the relief and support of paupers is a public duty and whatever may tend to diminish the burthen thus imposed upon the public should receive support and encouragement from those to whom the administration of public interests are entrusted. [219] In a large and populous City like New York, sickness among that class of Inhabitants who depend upon daily labour for their support, may be considered as one of the primary causes of pauperism and when the sustenance of a helpless family of Children, may be cut off by the protracted sickness and perhaps death of a parent, and they either driven to Mendicity or crime, or thrown upon the public Charity of the City, it must be admitted that an Institution which like the Dispensary must often prevent those consequences by the prompt and efficient relief which it affords, acts as a powerful check to the progress of those evils which give rise to a large proportion of our City expences.—It is proper to state that the present application is not for a contribution towards the ordinary current expences of the New York

Dispensary but to enable the Trustees to proceed with the building which is now erecting upon the scite lately granted to them for that purpose, and which when Completed, will afford them accomodation and facilities, which they have long required, and without which, their usefulness must be comparitively limited.

It is stated that Four thousand dollars is required for this purpose, and that difficulty has been met with in endeavouring to obtain money by private subscription on the ground that this Institution from its nature and objects had strong claims upon the Common [220] Council. The Committee are of opinion that there is much truth in this view of the subject and under a strong impression that this measure will meet with public approbation, they respectfully recommend that the sum of Two thousand five hundred Dollars should be appropriated for use of the said New York Dispensary. The Committee beg leave therefore to offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Comptroller be directed to Report a Warrant in favor of the President John Watts of the New York Dispensary for the sum of Two thousand five hundred Dollars.

In obedience to a resolution of the Convention of Delegates from the different Wards of this City, chosen and assembled under an Ordinance of the Corporation, we have the Honor to transmit to you, an authenticated Copy of certain amendments to the Charter of this City, as the same were finally adopted by the Convention, and to request you to lay the same before the Common Council.

In compliance with the instructions of the Convention, we have also the Honor to request in their name, that an Ordinance may be passed by the Common Council, for submitting to the Electors of this

City, at the next general Election, the determination of the question, whether the amendments so adopted by the convention, ought to become a Law of the State; and also, if such amendments be approved, whether the term of service of the Alderman, should be one year or two years.

In further compliance with the instructions of the Convention, we have also to request, that the ordinance of the Common Council, should the same be passed in conformity to the wishes of the Convention, may contain a provision, that the Electors severally [239] express their approbation or disapprobation of the amendments proposed, by a Ballot containing written or printed, the word "Ay" or "No"; and also a provision, that the electors express their opinion in relation to the term of service of the Aldermen, by adding in their respective ballots to the word "Ay" or "No," the words "one year" or "two years"

In obedience also to a resolution of the standing Committee of the convention, consisting of one member from each Ward of the City, we have also the honor to request you to call a Special meeting of the Common Council, in order that the amendments now transmitted, and also the Resolutions of the convention referred to in this communication may be submitted for their consideration.

We have also the Honor to enclose copies of the Resolutions of the Convention and of the standing Committee to which we have referred.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the Communication from the Convention in relation to certain Amendments proposed by that Body to be made in the Charter of the City.

That your Committee have given the subject their attentive consideration, and beg leave to offer for the approval of the Common Council the Ordinance herewith submitted. They do not mean at this time to express any opinion as to the propriety or imp[ro]priety of the amendments proposed by the Convention.

The Law proposed and passed was in the following words

A Law

To provide for submitting to the Electors of this [256] City certain amendments proposed to be made in the City Charter.

The Mayor Alderman and Commonalty of the City of New York in Common Council convened do Ordain as follows.

Whereas the Common Council did heretofore recommend to the good People of this City, to choose Delegates to compose a Convention for the purpose of taking into consideration the Charter of the City, and suggesting such alterations therein as to them might seem expedient; And whereas the Convention chosen and convened pursuant to

the said recommendation have agreed upon certain amendments and returned the same to the Common Council—Therefore Be it Ordained that at the next general Election in addition to the Ballot boxes now required by Law the Clerk of the Common Council shall provide and furnish to the Inspectors of each Ward, a Box to be called the “ Convention Box.”

§2. Any person entitled to Vote for Charter Officers, may, at the said election, also vote for or against the amendments so proposed as aforesaid by the said Convention.

§3. If any elector approve of the said proposed Amendments he shall signify his approbation thereof by a Ballot containing written or printed thereon the word “ Aye ”

§4. If he disapprove of the said proposed amendments [257] such disapproval shall, in like manner, be signified by the word “ No.”

§. 5. The sense of the electors, in respect to the term of service of the Aldermen, shall be expressed by adding to the word “ Aye,” or “ No ” as the case may be the words “ one year ” or “ Two years.”

§. 6. Separate poll lists shall be kept of the names of the Voters under this Law, and the ballots, so to be tendered as aforesaid, shall be deposited separately in the said “ Convention Box.”

§.7. The canvass being completed, certificates stating the result thereof, subscribed by the Inspectors of the respective Wards, shall be by them returned to the Common Council, to the end that the same may be compared and such further proceedings had thereon as shall appear to be necessary and proper.

§8. In all other respects the election, so to be held under this Law, shall be conducted as near as may be, in like manner as in the case of Charter Officers.

§9. Nothing in this Law contained shall be deemed or taken as an expression, on the part of the Common Council of their approbation or disapprobation of the proposed amendments or of any part thereof.

The Amendments proposed by the Convention was in *in* the words following

[258] Amendments

to the Charter of the City of New York as adopted in Convention
September 1829.

Sect. I. The Legislative power of the City of New York, shall be vested in a Board of Aldermen, and a Board of Assistants, who together shall form the Common Council of the City.

Sect II. Each ward of the City shall be entitled to elect one person to be denominated the Alderman of the Ward, and the persons so chosen, together, shall form the Board of Aldermen; And each ward shall also be entitled to elect one person to be denominated Assistant Alderman, and the persons so chosen, together shall form the Board of Assistants.

Sect III. The Aldermen and Assistant Aldermen shall be chosen for one Year, and no person shall be eligible to either Office, who shall not at the time of his Election, be a resident of the Ward for which he is chosen.

Sect IV. The Annual election for Charter Officers shall commence on the second Tuesday in April, and the Officers elected shall be sworn into Office on the second Tuesday in May thereafter, And all such elections shall be notified held and conducted by Inspectors appointed in the same manner, with the like powers, and during the same number of days, as the election for members of Assembly of the State are notified held and conducted.

[259] Sect V. The first Election for Charter Officers after the passage of this Law, shall take place on the second Tuesday in April 1831; and all those persons who shall have been elected under the former Laws regulating the Election of Charter Officers, and shall be in Office at the time of the passage of this Law, shall continue in Office, or hold over until the Officers elected under this Law shall be entitled to be sworn into Office.

Sect VI. The Board of Aldermen shall have power to direct a special election to be held, to supply the place of any Alderman whose seat shall become vacant by death removal from the City, resignation or otherwise. If a special election be not directed, the vacancy shall be supplied at the next general election—And the Board of Assistants shall also have power to direct a special election, to supply any vacancy that may occur in the Board of Assistants. The person elected to supply such vacancy, shall hold his seat only for the residue of the term of Office of his immediate predecessor.

Sect VII. The Boards shall meet in separate Chambers, and a majority of each shall be quorum to do business—Each Board shall appoint a President from its own body and shall also choose its Clerk and other Officers determine the rules of its own proceedings, and be the Judge of the qualifications of its own members. Each Board shall keep a Journal of its proceedings, and the doors of each shall be kept

open except [*360] when the public welfare shall require secrecy: and all Resolutions and reports of Committees, which shall recommend any specific improvement involving the appropriation of public moneys or taxing or assessing the Citizens of said City shall be published immediately after the adjournment of the Board under the authority of the Common Council in all the News papers employed by the Corporation; and whenever a Vote is taken in relation thereto, the Ayes and Noes shall be called and published in the same manner.

Sect VIII. Each Board shall have authority to compel the attendance of absent Members, to punish its Members for disorderly behaviour, and to expel a member, with the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to the Board, and the members so expelled, shall by such expulsion forfeit all his rights and powers, as an Alderman, or Assistant Alderman.

Sect IX. The stated and occasional meetings of the Common Council shall be regulated by their own Ordinances, and both Boards may meet on the same or on different days, as they may judge expedient.

Sect X. Any Law Ordinance or Resolution of the Common Council may originate in either Board, and when it shall have passed one Board, may be rejected or amended by the other.

Sect XI. No member of either Board shall, during the period for which he was elected, be appointed, or be competent [361] to hold any Office, of which the emoluments are paid from the City Treasury, or by fees directed to be paid by any Ordinance or Act of the Common Council, or be directly or indirectly interested in any contract the expences or consideration whereof are to be paid under any Ordinance of the Common Council, but this Section shall not be construed to deprive any Alderman or Assistant of any emoluments or fees which he is entitled to by virtue of his Office

Sect XII. Every act, ordinance or Resolution which shall have passed the two Boards of the Common Council before it shall take effect, shall be presented duly certified, to the Mayor of the City for his approbation. If he approve he shall sign it, if not he shall return it, with his objections, to the Board in which it originated, within Ten days thereafter, or if the Common Council be not then in Session, at their next stated meeting The Board to which it shall be returned, shall enter the objections at large on their Journal, and cause the same to be published in one or more of the Public Newspapers of the City.

Sect XIII. The Board to which such Act ordinance, or resolution shall have been so returned, shall, after the expiration of not less than ten days thereafter proceed to reconsider the same. If after such reconsideration a majority of the members elected to the Board shall agree to pass the same, it shall be sent, together with the objections [362] to the other Board, by which it shall be likewise reconsidered; and if approved by a Majority of all the Members elected to such Board, it shall take effect, as an act or Law of the Corporation. In all such cases the Votes of both Boards shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the names of the persons voting for, and against the passage of the measure reconsidered, shall be entered on the Journal of each Board respectively.

Sect XIV. If the Mayor shall not return any Act ordinance or resolution, so presented to him, within the time above limited for that purpose, it shall take effect in the same manner as if he had signed it.

Sect XV. Neither the Mayor nor Recorder of the City of New York shall hereafter be Members of the Common Council thereof.

Sect XVI. Whenever there shall be a vacancy in the Office of Mayor and whenever the Mayor shall be absent from the City or be prevented by sickness or any other cause from attending to the duties of his Office the President of the Board of Aldermen shall act as Mayor and shall possess all the rights and powers of the Mayor during the continuance of such vacancy absence or disability

Sect. XVII It shall be the duty of the Mayor.

First. To communicate to the Common Council at least once a Year and oftener if he [363] shall deem it expedient a general statement of the situation and condition of the City in relation to its government finances and improvements.

Second. To recommend to the adoption of the Common Council all such measures. connected with the police, security, health, cleanliness and ornament of the City. and the improvement of its government. and finances as he shall deem expedient.

Third. To be vigilant. and active in causing the laws and ordinances for the government of the City to be duly executed and enforced.

Fourth. To exercise a constant supervision and control over the conduct and acts of all subordinate Officers and to receive and examine into all such complaints as may be preferred against any of them for violation or neglect of duty. and generally to perform all such duties as may be prescribed to him by the charter and City Ordinances and the laws of this State and the United States.

Sect. XVIII Annual and occasional appropriations shall be made by proper ordinances of the Common Council for every branch and object of City. [364] Expenditure nor shall any money be drawn from the City Treasury except the same shall have been previously appropriated to the purpose for which it is drawn.

Sect. XIX The Common Council shall not have authority to borrow any sums of money whatever on the credit of the corporation except in anticipation of the revenue of the Year in which such loan shall be made; unless authorised by a special act of the Legislature.

Sect. XX. It shall be the duty, of the Common Council to publish two Months before the annual election of Charter Officers in each Year for the general information of the Citizens of New York a full and detailed statement of the Receipts and Expenditures of the Corporation during the Year ending on the first day of the Month in which such publication is made and in every such statement. the different sources of City Revenue and the amount received from each, the several appropriations made by the Common Council. the objects for which the same were made, and the amount. of moneys expended under each the moneys borrowed on the Credit of the Corporation the authority under which each loan was made and the terms on which the same was obtained shall be clearly and particularly specified

Sect. XXI. [365] The executive business of the Corporation of New York Shall hereafter be performed by distinct departments, which it shall be the duty of the Common Council to organize and appoint for that purpose.

Sect XXII It shall be the duty of the Common Council. to provide for the accountability of all Officers and other persons to whom the receipts or expenditures of the funds of the City shall be entrusted, by requiring from them sufficient security for the performance of their duties or trust which security shall be annually renewed but the security first taken shall remain in force untill new security shall be given.

Sect. XXIII The Clerk of the Board of Alderman shall by virtue of his Office be Clerk of the Common Council and shall perform all the duties heretofore performed by the Clerk of the Common Council except such as shall be assigned to the Clerk of the Board of Assistant Aldermen; and it shall be his duty to keep open for inspection at all reasonable times the records and minutes of the proceedings of the Common Council except such as shall be specially ordered otherwise.

Sect. XXIV. Such parts of the Charter of the City of New York and of the several acts of the Legislature amending the same as are not inconsistent with the [366] provisions of this Law shall not be construed as repealed Modified or in any manner affected thereby, but shall continue and remain in full force.

In Convention Sept^r 28. 1829. Resolved. That the Members of this Convention who are present and also those absent who approve the amendments to the City Charter sign the same as engrossed.

Done in Convention at the City Hall in the City of New York the twenty eighth day of September in the Year one thousand eight hundred and twenty nine and of the Independance of the United States of America the fifty third.

The Committee appointed to Report to the Convention a Suitable plan for obtaining Sense of the People of this City in Relation to the Amendments of the Charter proposed by the Convention and also to report on certain Resolutions on that Subject heretofore submitted to the Convention

Respectfully Report,

That having fully considered the matters so refered to them they [are] of opinion that the following Resolution ought to be adopted, by the Convention as embracing the most expedient and effectual means for obtain[ing] the sense of the Electors.

1st Resolved. That a copy of the amendments adopted by this Convention duly authenticated by the signatures of the President and Secretaries be transmitted to the Common Council of this City with a request in the name of the Convention that an ordinance may be passed by the Common Council for submitting to the Electors of the City at the next general Election the determination of the question whether the amendments so proposed [369] ought to become a Law of this State and also if such amendments be approved whether the term of Service of the Alderman should be one year or two years.

2^d Resolved—That the ordinance so requested ought to contain a provision that the Electors express their approbation or disapprobation of the amendments proposed by a ballot containing written or printed the word “Aye,” or “No” and also that such Electors express their opinion in relation to the term of service of the Alderman by adding in their ballots, to the word “Aye” or “No” the words “one year” or “two years” and that every ballot Containing the word “aye” whether the words “one year” or “two years” be annexed thereto, shall be deemed a vote in favour of the Amendments proposed.

3^d Resolved—That a Committee of one from each ward be appointed who shall be authorised to call a meeting of the convention at any time hereafter if they shall deem it expedient.

4th Resolved—That it be the further duty of such Committee in case the amendments proposed be approved by a Majority of the Electors to transmit a duly authenticated Copy thereof Conformed to the decision of the Electors to the Legislature of this State at their next annual Session, [370] with a request in the name of the people of this City that the same may be passed into a Law. That it also be

the duty of said Committee to transmit the amendments so approved to the Common Council, and ask their aid in procuring such Law.

Report. under the authority given a Building 200 feet in Length by 50 feet wide and four stories in height, containing 240 seperate cells of 3½ feet by 7 and 7 feet high has been completed and is now occupied, The whole amount disbursed by M^r Burtis is \$29,120.15, and vouchers have been procured to your [391] Committee for the same of this sum \$5878.46 has been for the erection of out buildings purchase of Boats and pay of guards and Keepers &c leaving the sum of \$23,241.69 as the actual cost of the building.

The whole number of male prisoners at present in the Penitentiary is 303 and according to the experience of past years will probably increase by the setting in of the winter to 400 imposing the necessity of confining a part of the males in some other building and the expense of additional guards and Keepers to what would be required if the whole were under one roof and as it is understood to be the intention of the Board to remove all our prison establishments to Blackwells Island and introduce into them the advantages of separate

confinement. your Committee beg leave to submit to the Board a plan for the erection of a main building on the east end of the present prison to be divided into suitable apartments for the accommodation of the guard Keepers &c and a hospital and chapel and to extend [to] the east of that a wing corresponding in size and appearance with the present prison and to contain 300 separate cells The proposed building will enable the Commissioners of the Alms [392] House to separate the vagrant prisoners in one wing from the Court prisoners in the other and furnish the necessary accommodations for many vicious poor who are fit subjects for the prison but from want of room they are of necessity detained in the Alms House with those who though indigent are respectable.

Such a building with the experience now among the Keepers and prisoners it is supposed by taking two seasons for its erection may be completed principally with their labour, and at an expense of about 12.000 Dollars and will be sufficient to accommodate all the male prisoners of the City for many years

[15] The Law Committee to whom was referred the Petition of James M^cBride and others Owners and occupants of property in the Vicinity of Liberty Street praying that a certain encroachment on the North West corner of said Street and Broadway may be removed. presented the following Report

The Law Committee to whom were referred the Petition of James M^cBride and others proprietors and occupants of Lots of ground situated in Liberty Street and its vicinity praying that a certain encroachment on the said Street at the North West corner of Broadway may be abated and removed as a public nuisance.

Report

That they have examined the premises and have heard the allegations of the parties.

It appears that by an act of the Legislature passed the 4th May 1784 the Corporation were authorised to appoint Commissioners for the purpose of laying out the Streets in such parts of the City as had principally suffered by fire during the Revolutionary War The Commissioners were accordingly appointed and having agreed upon a plan, the same was submitted to and approved by the Corporation and ordered to be carried into execution. By this [16] plan Liberty Street then called Crown Street was widened five feet on each side from Broadway to the North River.

As damages might be sustained by the proposed alterations the act provided a mode of appraising the same and paying the amount out of the City Treasury.

No provision was made for the removal of any building there standing but it was enacted that any and every building which should thereafter be erected so as to intrude or encroach upon the Streets to be laid out in pursuance of this act, should be deemed a public nuisance and upon a view thereof by the mayor recorder or any two or more of the aldermen the owner or builder should be obliged to enter into recognizance in such sum as the Mayor recorder or aldermen should think fit to remove the same in convenient time and in case of refusal

to enter into such recognizance or neglect to perform the condition of the same within the time limited the Common Council may thereupon make an order for abating and demolishing the said nuisance. Provided that if the owner builder or lessee thereof should controvert the fact of such [17] intrusion or encroachment and should demand that the same be determined by a Jury of inquest it should be the duty of the Common Council before they proceed to make such order as aforesaid for abating and demolishing the said nuisance to issue there warrant to the sheriff of the City requiring him by the oaths of twelve good and Lawful men to inquire whether such building had intruded or encroached upon the Streets or either of them so to be laid out as aforesaid and the said sheriff should within the time limited in and by such warrant empanel a jury upon the premises and should duly return the inquisitions by him thereof made to the Common Council who in case the said jury should find the intrusion then and not otherwise should proceed to make the order for abatement as aforesaid.

To enable the Common Council to judge of the propriety of applying this remedy to the grievance complained of the following statement of facts is submitted.

The proprietors of all the lots fronting on Liberty Street have *received* [receded] according to the plan of the Commissioners except two. One the two excepted lots substantial brick buildings had been erected previous to the [18] passage of the act in question one of which still continues standing the other having been destroyed by fire about four years since. In rebuilding on the lot thus made vacant the proprietor so far as respects the main wall of his house has conformed to the line prescribed by the Commissioners but in constructing his area has occupied not only the usual space allowed by the ordinances of the Common Council but also the interdicted five feet, by erecting a stone wall around the same surmounted by a railing and united to the main wall. That this area greatly disfigured the Street and is a serious annoyance to the neighbourhood there can be no doubt and the only question is in what way can the evil be remedied, After much examination your Committee have come to the conclusion that the proper course to be pursued is the one pointed out by the act referred to—If any doubt should exist whether a stone wall around an area be a building within the meaning of the act it would seem hardly to admit of a controversy that such a wall connected with a house and erected the same time must be [19] considered as part of the same edifice and the whole together therefore as forming a building.

But how it may be asked is the proprietor to be compensated for

the five feet thus taken for the said Street The act required that the application for indemnity should be made within three years after its passage but as the original building was not destroyed till long after that period had elapsed and as the act did not require that it should be torn down it is difficult to percieve how the exact letter of the act could have been Complied with in that particular, Without prejudging this question, however the committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution. Resolved as the sense of this Common Council that the area lately erected along the side of the building on the North Westerly corner of Liberty Street and Broadway is a public nuisance within the meaning of the act referred to in the foregoing Report. Resolved therefore that his Honor the Mayor be requested to cause the said nuisance to be removed within convenient time in the manner prescribed in the said act

Resolved that so much of the proceedings of the Board of super-

visors as were referred to the Common Council be now referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature whose duty it shall be to report thereon previous to the next meeting of the Legislature. The Resolutions proposed by the Board of supervisors were as follows. Resolved that the Common Council be requested to apply to the Legislature to amend the Laws in relation to the Assessment and Collection of Taxes so far as the same relate to the County of New York embracing in such amendments the following principles and such other as the Common Council shall deem expedient

[22] 1st. that the assessors previous to entering on the duties be formed into a regular Board for the transaction of business, choosing a presiding Officer and secretary and keep a regular Book of minutes of their proceedings

2^d that at the first meeting and before they proceed to make any assessments they adopt such Rules or by-Laws as shall be calculated to insure uniformity in all the wards.

3^d That each assessor shall endeavour to ascertain the actual income and the capacity under Judicious Management to produce more or less income the probable increasing decreasing or stationary value of each parcel of property he may assess.

5th That when all the assessment Rolls are finished a Meeting of the Board shall examine and compare them ascertain whether the valuations in each roll bear a just relation to all, and report the result of such examination to the Board of Supervisors.

[130] The Communication from the Assessors presented at the last Meeting was as follows.

The undersigned Assessors appointed by an Ordinance of your Honb^l body to Assess Sixteen Cisterns in various parts of the City beg leave most respectfully to Represent.

That on entering on the duties of their appointment a considerable difficulty arose on allowing a fair Compensation to the Collectors as by an Ordinance of the Common Council they were not to receive more than Ten per Cent.

In the case of Public Cisterns where from One thousand to Fourteen hundred Lots are Assessed from Two dollars to Twenty five cents each per Lot, and extending as they do over a great portion of the upper part of the City, the Assessors did presume that the Ordinance above referred to was not intended to apply to any but ordinary Assessments.

The Assessors taking into *to* view the extraordinary nature of Assessments for Public Cisterns and the great difficulty that would occur in the Collection, deemed it but just to allow from 13 to 15 per Cent believing that the Common Council would not under all circumstances consider that an unreasonable allowance.

That with a view to lessen the expence [131] as much as possible the Assessors had the Sixteen Cisterns embraced in Nine Assessment Maps, and used the greatest possible economy in having them prepared

being aware that Assessments of this Kind are considered odious and vexatious—If they have erred it was with the best intentions, that of doing Justice.

His Honor the Mayor & Counsel of the Board to whom was referred the subject of the alledged nuisance at the North westerly corner of Broadway & Liberty street presented a Report which was referred to the Law Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented a Return of Delinquents on the Assessments for re-paving Spring street from Greenwich to Washington street and for a Well & Pump in 17th Street near the 7th Avenue. Whereupon a Warrant was directed to be issued to Jameson Cox the Collector thereof.

[154] The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for re-paving Greenwich street from Clarkson to Hammersly street which was confirmed and John Hanmer appointed Collector.

The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for a Well & Pump in 10th Street which was confirmed & Jameson Cox appointed Collector.

Upon recommendation of the Street Commissioner Jameson Cox was appointed Collector on the Assessment for a Well & Pump in 13th Street confirmed at the last Meeting of the Board.

The Finance Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Robert Chesebrough to be relieved from the payment of an Assessment for regulating 12th Street presented the following Report against the same

The Finance Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Robert Chesebrough praying that he may be discharged from they payment of a sum of money assessed upon a piece of ground in the 9th Ward formerly belonging to him for regulating 12th Street

Respectfully Report.

[155] That on examining into the facts of the case they find, that on the 1st January 1827 a Contract was entered into for regulating 12th Street which by the terms of the Contract was to have been completed the 1st October 1827, but was not in fact completed until about the beginning of the year 1829; that the Surveyors return and Assessment list was delivered to the Assessors about the month of March last, and was returned by them, and advertised on the 20th of May last, that no objections were made, And the Assessment was confirmed by the Common Council on the 1st of June last. In this Assessment Mr Chesebrough is charged with the sum of \$84.38 as one of the owners of property benefitted by the operation. They find also that on the 10th March 1828—The Resolution of the Board was passed directing the necessary steps to be taken for opening the 7th Avenue, and that the

Report of the Commissioners appointed for that purpose was confirmed by the Supreme Court on the first of June last. By this Report the sum of \$851, was awarded to Mr Chesebrough for property taken by the Commissioners being the same property against which the Assessment for regulating 12th Street was made as above stated.

Mr Chesebrough contends that inasmuch as the Report of the Commissioners for opening the 7th Avenue was confirmed by the Supreme Court [156] a few hours before the Assessment for regulating 12th Street was confirmed by the Corporation he ought not to be affected by the Latter. The Committee however do not think that this accidental circumstance furnishes any ground for exempting him from the payment of the sum Assessed against him. The operation of regulating 12th Street was actually completed while he was the owner of the property assessed, and there can be no doubt that the Commissioners on opening 7th Avenue in estimating the amount to be awarded to him, took into consideration, all the circumstances then affecting the value of that property.

The Committee therefore submit the following Resolution.

The Finance Committee presented the following Report relative to the annual allowance to the New York Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf & Dumb recommending the Repeal of the [157] Resolution of 13th July 1818

The Finance Committee respectfully Report to the Board, that on the 13th day of July 1818, the Common Council resolved, that the Directors of the New York Institution for the instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, be authorised to receive in their School Ten Deaf and Dumb persons at the expense of the Corporation, provided such persons are in needy circumstances and unable to pay the expense, of their instruction, and are inhabitants of this City, And that the expense of each scholar shall not exceed Forty Dollars a year. It was also Resolved that a donation of \$500 be made to said Institution, to aid them in carrying into effect this laudable undertaking.

The above named Institution has accordingly received the Annual sum of Four hundred Dollars till the 13th of April last.

On the 8th of September 1829, the Board of Supervisors agreed to raise by Tax (according to a Law of the State) the sum of \$1650. for the instruction and support of Eleven Mutes in the above mentioned Institution, which amount has been added to the Tax of the year 1829.

It appears to the Committee proper, to pay the Institution for the instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, the Semi Annual allowance of \$200, to the 13th day of October 1829 and that the Resolution. [158] aforementioned of the 13th of July 1818 should be rescinded.

They accordingly recommend to the Board the adoption of the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Resolution of the Common Council authorising the payment to the Directors of the New York Institution for the instruction of the Deaf & Dumb of a sum not exceeding Forty dollars a year for Ten Deaf and Dumb persons be repealed from and after the 13th of October 1829

Respectfully Report

That they have notified and heard the parties and their Witnesses and have given to the subject that consideration which its importance demanded—One of the charges brought against the Inspectors, is, that on each of the days of the Election they adjourned the Poll for one hour for the purpose of dining.

This proceeding it fully appears, was adopted by the Inspectors in perfect good faith, under a very natural, though as your Committee conceive erroneous construction of the Election Law.

By the Act respecting Charter Officers of this City April 16th 1822; it was provided that the Election for Charter Officers, should be conducted in the same manner as that for Members of Assembly, in respect to which by a previous Law it was enacted that the Polls should be opened at or before 10 O'Clock in the morning and should be kept open till the setting of the sun.

The question then arises does this error in judgment committed by the Inspectors vitiate the election.

[161] It does not appear that there was any press at the poll during the period of these adjournments or that a single vote was lost. If then this mere irregularity, proceeding from the purest motives, and attended in the particular instance with no injurious consequences, is to subvert the late election in the 10th Ward, there is hardly a Ward in the City, it is believed which would not be liable to a similar fate.

With respect to the various other charges contained in the Petition your Committee do not deem it proper that they should be spread upon the Records of the Common Council, inasmuch as they have been disclaimed or entirely disproved—It is due however, to the Inspectors, to add, that their conduct at the late election, was, in the opinion of your Committee, in all respects just and impartial.

Your Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following Resolutions.

Resolved as the sense of this Common Council that there is no sufficient ground for impeaching the conduct of the Inspectors of the late Election in the 10th Ward.

The Committee to regulate the cleaning of Streets presented the following Report.

The Committee to regulate the cleaning of Streets Respectfully Report

[220] That in pursuance of the duties incident to their appointment, they have had under their examination, the accounts of that Department up to the first day of February last, as rendered by M^r Rapelye the late Assistant Superintendent of Streets.

His accounts as then rendered not being satisfactory, as well as the circumstance of his leaving the Office to the care and conduct of his successor, M^r Dobbs induced the Committee to make a thorough investigation of the affairs of the Department.

It appears that from the commencement of the system, the "out door" business of the Office only was attended to by the Superintendent, while the multifarious details of the monied transactions were made exclusively the duty of the Assistant, who reported once in three months to the Committee "to regulate the cleaning of Streets."

Here an almost total irresponsibility on the part of the Agent is self evident, and in the opinion of your Committee constitutes a radical defect in the system.

Your Committee acknowledge and appreciate the services of Mess^{rs} Bloodgood and Rapelye who, under their direction have devoted much time and labour to the [221] adjustment of the accounts, but after waiting upwards of three months for the result of their joint efforts, and nothing satisfactory being attained, it was determined to employ an experienced and competent Accountant to aid them in accomplishing their object.

M^r Waters was selected for this purpose, and the books, vouchers &c &c, put into his hands accordingly. In performing the duties assigned him M^r Waters had many delays to encounter, and numerous difficulties to surmount, all which he has met with his accustomed perseverance, and the result is, your Committee believe, a correct statement of the accounts of the late Assistant Superintendent of Streets, from the commencement of the Office up to the first day of February 1829

A statement thereof by M^r Waters, with the securities received covering all deficiencies which have been ascertained, and providing for any contingencies which may occur is annexed, with which your Committee are satisfied.

While M^r Waters was progressing in his investigation of the accounts, your Committee directed their attention, to an improvement of the system, and with this view the following Resolution was presented to the Common Council on the 19th October last viz: "Resolved, that [222] the Committee to regulate the cleaning of streets be directed

to digest and report a plan for the improvement of that department." This resolution was adopted, and the subject thus brought under the immediate consideration of the Committee.

The safety of the public purse is in the opinion of your Committee, the great desideratum in all fiscal concerns, and any system of expenditure, which does not secure that all important object, should either be corrected or abandoned. Officers handling large sums of public money should promptly account for it, not to themselves, as has been the case in this department, but to the Official auditor of all the other public accounts of the City. The interest of the public as well as the character and reputation of the Officer demand this safe and obvious course.

To attain an object so desirable for the department committed to their supervision—Your Committee respectfully recommend that—From and after the first day of January next the moneys received by the Superintendent of streets, his Assistant or Agents for Manure sold, for any Public Property disposed of, or for any other public purposes whatsoever, [223] shall be paid by him, or by his Assistant, to the City Treasurer, at least once in every month; and that an Account of all such money so paid, with the Treasurers receipt for the same, shall be deposited in the Office of the Comptroller immediately thereafter, in order that a regular account may be kept on the books in the Office of the Comptroller, of all the receipts and payments appertaining to the cleaning of streets, and sweeping the public grounds; and that these two accounts shall, as heretofore be kept separate and distinct.

That all moneys to be disbursed by the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent of Streets shall be obtained by Warrant on the City Treasurer, being first ordered by the Common Council; and that all orders so presented for the sanction of the Board, shall state the specific object of the appropriation required, thus enabling the Comptroller so to charge the same in his annual account; that a full, clear, and correct statement of the receipts and disbursements of that Department, shall regularly be laid before the public.

There shall also be laid before the Comptroller for his inspection, monthly a detailed account of all the sales for the preceding month, including the certificates [224] their respective numbers, the number of Loads of Manure the price &c &c. together with the particulars of all certificates remaining unpaid, and not returned to the Office, and also the certificates on hand.

When a boat is loaded a receipt shall be taken from the Captain or

from some other person on board, hold the Captain the owner & vessel accountable until the certificate for the manure shall be returned to the Office.

Blank forms shall be prepared and printed under the direction of the Comptroller and Superintendent of Streets to give facility and system to the operations of the department. Your Committee have only to add, that a final settlement of the accounts before them was effected only a few days since, and therefore, to have reported sooner, could neither have been satisfactory to themselves nor acceptable to the Board.

The Committee submit the following Resolution.

Resolved that the foregoing be adopted, and that the Superintendent of Streets, together with the Comptroller be directed to make the necessary arrangements [225] for carrying it into effect on the first day of January next.

The Jail and Bridewell and Police Committees to whom the annexed Resolutions presented to the Board by M^r Roosevelt were referred, and to whom the subject of the location of a Bridewell had also been referred—Report

That the Board by a Resolution passed the last summer authorised your Committees to treat for the purchase of some suitable location for both a Jail and Bridewell, and to Report the same to the Board: under this direction, Your Committees have at last been able to negotiate with the various proprietors of the grounds fronting on Houston street and extending from Crosby to Mulberry streets for their Lots. The front on Houston street is 233 feet 3 inches, and the depth on Crosby street 104 feet 7 inches, and on Mulberry street 115 feet 11 inches—The ground is principally vacant, or slightly improved, and this part is offered at \$2,100 per Lot of 25 by 100 feet, and allowing for the improvements on the other parts of the block described, the whole can be procured at about \$23,500; Your Committees recommend the purchase of this property, and the erecting thereon both a Jail and Bridewell; the situation is the most central that can be procured, is high and commanding ground, and convenient to both the great thorough fares of the City, Broadway & Bowery

[232] The Resolution of M^r Roosevelt referred to your Committee, proposes that part of the Old Alms House be converted into a prison to be called a House of Detention, and to be used for persons charged with crimes awaiting their trial. Names do not alter things, The Bridewell is now almost exclusively used for the detention of persons awaiting their trial, and it is believed that the persons confined there under sentence, do not exceed, on an average during the year, two or three, so that the resolution virtually recommends the converting the Old Alms House into a City Prison and for the uses the Bridewell is now almost exclusively put to that is to say, this building to be made a Prison for the confinement of the 150 persons usually standing charged and committed for trial.

As the cell and classification establishments are the order of the

day, it will be perceived the room required would be very extensive. But your Committees object to the plan proposed by the Resolution because the Old Alms House building is required for other purposes, and to which it can be appropriated with but trifling Expence. The Commissioners of the Alms House are here accommodated and not unfrequently 400 or 500 poor persons are here waiting to be examined and relieved by them. They here store wood and many other necessary [233] articles for the poor. They here have a Hearse Establishment, and Vehicles to transport the sick poor to the Alms House. The plan proposed routs the Commissioners much in the opinion of your Committees to the expense and inconvenience of the Public.

Other parts of this building are required for Offices now in the City Hall, so as to leave further accommodation in the Hall for other purposes.

The City Inspectors Office, Comptrollers Office, Collectors Office, and Grand Jury Rooms might be removed to the old Alms House, and the basement story of that building would well accomodate the Watch now badly accommodated in this Hall—And if we bring to mind that the Police Magistrates and Marine Court Justices, have long been in the mists of a cellar accommodation, there will be but one opinion that they too should be accommodated above ground, where they will be exposed to and enjoy the sun and light of heaven—These uses are enumerated to show the Board that the Rooms in the building referred to are wanted and can be appropriated usefully without the destruction of the present interior construction of the edifice

The expence of converting this edifice into a Prison would your Committee think be nearly [234] as great as to erect a new Prison; and they cannot but think that laying out money for constructing a Prison in so central and exposed a situation and in the midst of what is justly considered the most beautiful part of our City, and in the vicinity of our most expensive public building would be ill advised in the extreme. If the Board are not prepared to build a new Prison away from the Public grounds, adjacent to the Hall your Committees would prefer that the present Bridewell building remain rather than to adopt the plan of spending money in patching up and vamping over the Old Alms House into a City Bridewell

If our City should continue for some years to come to increase in wealth and population, in the like proportion that it has increased in the years which have gone by, it is probable that before a lapse of a long period of time, that the ground on which the edifice in question

stands will be occupied with a Building corresponding in magnificence with the present City Hall; and if this should be the case, (and a Committee of this Board reported a plan for such an improvement during the last year) it will be seen that much public money would be uselessly [235] thrown away, in the construction of this Building into a Prison—In conclusion your Committees offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Jail and Bridewell and Police Committees be authorised to purchase the ground described in this Report fronting on Houstoun street at a price not to exceed \$23,500.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature in pursuance of a Resolution of the Board passed November 16, 1829 authorising them to Report to the Board from time to time, such alteration or Amendments in any of the Laws of this State relative to this City, as they might think expedient Respectfully

Report

That the existing Laws relative to the Collection of Taxes and Assessments in this City do not give to the Corporation any power to postpone sales of Lands and tenements for taxes or Assessments after such sales have been advertised, and as Circumstances may often render it expedient to grant further time to proprietors of Lands so

taxed or assessed without adding the charges consequent upon a sale to the existing encumbrance of such Tax or Assessment, the Committee are of opinion, that the Common Council should be invested with legal authority for that purpose.

They would also recommend that this subject should receive the immediate attention of the Board, inasmuch as a very extensive Sale of Real property for Assessments, is now [255] advertized for the 18th of January next and if sufficient reasons should exist for suspending such sale until a future period, application should be made to the next Legislature at the opening of the Session for the passage of such an Act as may render it legal for the Common Council to exercise their discretion on the subject.

In Connection with the above proposed amendment, the Committee would also suggest the propriety of reducing the expences incidental to such sales, in every possible shape. As the law now stands, it is necessary to employ an Auctioneer to conduct the sale, thus adding a charge upon every Lot or parcel of property, which might be avoided, if some proper Officer of the Corporation were empowered to sell. They beg leave therefore to recommend, that the necessary provision to effect this object may be inserted in any Law to be applied for on this subject.

The Committee would also point out an alteration to the present Law relative to the Collection of Taxes and Assessments, which although of Minor importance to those above mentioned, might properly be embraced in the proposed amendatory Act. The law now directs that by the advertizements, of sales, the owners should be required to pay their [256] respective Taxes or Assessments with interest charges to the Treasurer or Chamberlain of the City. The Committee believe that practically it never has been part of the duty of the City Treasurer to receive such payments or to keep the necessary documents or Books to enable him to do so correctly, nor do they consider that he is the proper Officer to perform that duty—The notices to be published prior to such sales, should in their opinion require such payments to be made to such person or persons (to be designated in the Advertisement) as the Common Council should appoint to Collect or receive the same.

The Committee submit herewith the draught of an Act prepared in Conformity with this their Report, and they offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Counsel to the Board prepare a Memorial to be presented to the next Legislature for the purpose of such Act and

that the same be authenticated in the usual manner during the recess of the Board

The proposed amendments having been thus passed upon by the people and approved by a Majority, your Committee do not feel themselves at liberty to enter into their merits. They therefore offer for the consideration of the Common Council the following Resolution.

Resolved that in compliance with the wishes of the people, expressed at the late Election, a Memorial be presented to the Legislature, submitting to that Body the amendments so proposed to the City Charter.

The Law Committee to whom was referred the subject of the Election of the Collector of the 12th Ward presented the following Report

By the return referred to the Committee [261] it appears that of the votes given for the Office of Collector of the 12th Ward 259 were for Abel Wheaton 17 for Abel Wheaten and 276 for Henry T Boyle

The first question presented is whether the two first sets of votes are to be considered as for one and the same person. It is obvious that the slight variance in the spelling does not alter the sound of the name in the pronunciation; and the votes must, therefore, according to established principles, be counted for the same individual, unless it be shewn that there was some other candidate, to whom they might apply. In the present instance there were but two candidates for the Office in question.

Abel Wheaton and Henry T Boyle, and there was no person of the name of Wheaten residing in the ward. There can be no doubt, therefore, that the 17 votes as well as the 259 were intended to be given for Abel Wheaton.

As the intention of the Electors, thus clearly expressed must and ought notwithstanding the slight misspelling, to be carried into effect, the result is a tie between the two Candidates. Does M^r Wheaton then, the present incumbent, hold over, or is there a vacancy, and if so, can the Common Council order a new Election? In the Charter of the City it is expressly provided that the Aldermen Assistants &c shall continue in their respective offices until [262] other fit persons are elected and sworn in their places. The office of Collector, in the enumeration of those who are so declared to hold over, is altogether omitted. In the Act respecting the Election of Charter Officers, passed by the Legislature of the 16th of April 1822 it was declared that the Charter officers to be chosen after their next election (“excepting the Collectors”) should be sworn into and commence the duties of their Offices on the last Monday of December in each year, and should continue in their offices from their being so sworn until other fit persons should be elected and sworn in their places.

The silent omission in the Charter and the express exception in the Statute taken in connection, prove conclusively, as your Committee conceive, that the Office of Collector is not one of those to which the principle of holding over applies.

Should any further arguments however, in support of this opinion be deemed necessary, it may be found in the 5th Section of the Statute already referred to “And be it further enacted that the Collectors of the Respective Wards of the said City shall be elected to serve in their respective Offices for one year from the second Monday of May

next after such election." The Office therefore of Collector of the 12th Ward will be vacant after [263] the second monday of May next, and the next question is in what manner shall the vacancy be supplied. The Committee have carefully examined the Charter and Laws on this subject, and can find no provision in them applicable to the case under consideration. Should any Charter Officer die or remove, out of the City, or refuse or be disqualified to serve, the Legislature have declared that the Common Council may order an Election to fill the vacancy thus produced; but should the people from division of opinion, as in the present instance, fail to make a choice, it is manifest that the case would not come under either of the heads so provided for.

It has been suggested that no express Legislative provision is necessary to authorize the Common Council to order a new Election, and that such power is necessarily implied in the ordinary grant of Corporate jurisdiction—As this position however, is by no means free from doubt and as the Legislature will soon be in Session, the Committee conceive it would be the more safe and expedient course to apply for a special Act on the subject. They therefore recommend the adoption of the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Counsel of the Board be instructed to prepare and submit to the Board *to* [a] draft of an Act to be passed by the [264] Legislature providing for the case of a tie in the election of Charter Officers,

The Board being equally divided the Mayor gave his vote in the Affirmative.

The Board being called to order, the Mayor rose and addressed the Board as follows.

Gentlemen of the Common Council.

I am at a loss to express to you in language sufficiently strong the feelings of my heart on your renewed expression of confidence in me, [292] and your approbation of the motives which has influenced my conduct as the Chief Magistrate of our City. I pray you to accept my profound acknowledgements.

In the discharge of my official duties, throughout the preceding year I have used my best endeavours to promote the interests of our City—to cultivate a spirit of harmony with all the Members of the Board and to extend to each that candour, and courtesy, which are essential to a valuable discharge of public duties, and which will always be exacted from men in Office, by a magnanimous free, and enlightened Community.

Allow me to assure you, that I will continue my unabated zeal to promote by every effort on my part, all those measures which your wisdom may suggest for the general good, and the extension of this great and growing Commercial emporium.

To two subjects of deep importance to our City I feel it my duty in a most especial and emphatic manner, to call the attention of the Common Council.

The First is the increasing necessity of procuring a full and abundant supply of pure and wholesome water. We have the opinion of two of the most eminent Civil Engineers that the Byram, Rye and Wompia Ponds will afford such supply [293] there are also the Bronx, Saw Mill and Croton rivers all within our reach, the expence it is believed cannot exceed Two millions of Dollars. It will probably be less. But suppose it will cost \$2,000,000 to give to the City an ample supply of water, so as to provide for all the wants of our fellow citizens, to furnish our shipping, our manufactories, to clean our streets, to extinguish fires, will not the City cheerfully encounter the expense?

The City can Borrow money at 5 per Cent, and it is very obvious that by the introduction of an abundant supply of pure water, the Citizens would be saved the expense of Cisterns and other heavy charges in procuring water, and a discreet and equal Water Tax, would meet all expenditures and greatly benefit the citizens.

I recommend an immediate application to the Legislature for the necessary Laws.

The second subject to which I think it my duty to call the attention of the Common Council is also in my judgment of immense magnitude to the interests of the City. I wish to put it upon record though the time has not yet arrived to carry the great work to which I am about to allude into effect. It however has engaged the attention of some of our wisest and most considerate Citizens and amongst others one pre-eminently valued by us all. His thoughts have been turned to it for years. He wrote me, when I was a member of the Legislature, a very able letter, and [294] expressed great anxiety lest our harbour, which has scarcely an equal in the world should be injured by extending the wharves into the river and filling it up with wood and dirt of which the piers are now principally made. This excellent man, this philanthropist who has always devoted himself to the great interests of his native City, and of his country, and shown conspicuously in the path of piety, and in all the charities of society is Col. Henry Rutgers.

His countrys good was his great object and he was a patriot in

whom the people steadily reposed their confidence and delighted to Honor.

This good man proposed that the piers should all be made of Stone; and so anxious was he for the future prosperity of our City, which he justly considered as intimately connected with the preservation of our Harbour; and viewing the East River as an arm of the sea, he was of opinion that the subject now presented to your reflection, merited the fostering aid both of the national and state Governments.

May we not Gentlemen indulge the hope that at no distant day the wishes of this much beloved Citizen, now, indeed nearly lost to us may be realized.

I cannot doubt that after the Canal debt is paid off, our State acting under the influence of that liberal and enlightened policy which has always distinguished her Public councils, will [295] make an appropriation of the auction duties or some other ample fund to effect a work so Honorable to the State and so useful to the City.

May our labours Gentlemen be directed with a sole view to promote and extend the best interests of our Constituents, and may you each receive their approbation.

The Committee on Arts & Sciences to whom was referred the Resolution relative to furnishing the Members with Burrs Map of the City presented a Report which was read and laid on the Table.

The Special Committee to whom had been referred the Resolution to enquire into the late Election of Mayor presented the following Report.

The Special Committee to whom it was referred to inquire into the facts in relation to the late Election of Mayor Respectfully Report

That they have examined under oath, the tellers, the Clerk, the assistant Clerk, and the Messenger being all the persons concerned in receiving or counting the Ballots, and from their depositions have extracted the following Result

It appears that at the Meeting of the Common Council when the Election took place Twenty nine Members including the Mayor were present, Alderman Mott and Alderman Meserole were appointed Tellers. They occupied as will be recollected by the Board, an elevated situation, open to the view of the Spectators as well as of each other, After they [353] had taken the seat assigned them M^r Williamson the Messenger was directed to Collect the Ballots.

M^r Williamson deposes that before presenting the Box to any of the Members, he took out the drawer and carefully examined it, as also the inside of the Box; both were entirely empty. He then replaced the drawer and presented the Box to each of the Twenty six Members successively. They all voted. He carefully observed each ballot as it was placed in the aperture of the box; and in every instance in which from

imperfect folding, a Ballot adhered to the sides, it was pressed in, at his request, not by him, but by the member who presented it. He, in no case, himself touched one of the Ballots. After receiving the votes of the Twenty six Members, who occupied the floor of the Hall, not being able to reach the place where the President and Tellers were seated, he handed the Box over to M^r Ahern the Assistant Clerk who presented it to those three members. He saw nothing and knows of nothing to induce him to believe there was any mistake or inaccuracy. He saw and is positive that each of the Twenty six Members, and no others while the Box was in his hands deposited his Ballot therein, and that when he handed the Box to M^r Ahern it contained those Ballots and no others.

M^r Ahern testifies that he received the Box as stated by M^r Williamson and presented it successively [354] to the President and Alderman Mott and Alderman Meserole and saw them deposit their Ballots therein. He then handed it to Alderman Mott, who sat between the President and Alderman Meserole, for the purpose of being canvassed. The Ballots being all received he took his Seat at the desk in front of the Tellers, and kept a Tally of the Votes as they were announced by Alderman Mott, as a check upon the Tally kept by the Clerk, that is the uniform practice; By his Tally there were 15 Votes for Walter Bowne 13 for Thomas R Smith and 1 for William S Coe. The tally kept by the Clerk exhibited the same result. They were kept independently of each other. He has no doubt of the accuracy of the count, and has no reason to suspect any error or mistake in any part of the Transaction.

General Morton, the Clerk, deposes that he kept the main Tally. He sat at a Desk immediately in front of the Tellers with his back towards them, Alderman Mott announced the contents of the Ballots. It was done slowly and deliberately. As each Ballot successively was proclaimed witness carefully noted the result, and then, from time to time, as a guide to the Tellers, called out "down"—The Tellers having finished, he added up the Votes for the respective candidates and found that 15 had been given for Walter Bowne 13 for Thomas R Smith and 1 for William S Coe. He so announced the result and [355] has no doubt of its accuracy.

Alderman Mott states that himself and Alderman Meserole were the Tellers. At the request of the Mayor they took their Seats on his left, he (Alderman Mott) being in the Centre. The Mayor removed all his papers to the extreme right end of the Table, so that the place where the Ballots were to be counted was perfectly free. After all the

Ballots had been collected the box was handed by the Assistant Clerk to witness. Witness drew out the drawer and turned its contents upon the table. He then first counted the Ballots unopened and found that they were 29 corresponding with the number of the Members present. Alderman Meserole saw this done and witness is under the impression that he also counted the Ballots or some part of them, as they were spread out on the Table, to see that the count of witness was correct. Witness then commenced opening the Ballots and he thinks as he held them in his hand he shewed them to the Mayor and then to Alderman Meserole. The Mayor after the sixth or seventh Ballot turned aside, and appeared to be engaged in writing. As each Ballot was opened witness announced its contents and did not proceed further until the Clerk had pronounced the word "down" Witness laid the Ballots, as they were called out, on three separate piles, and after the result of the whole had been announced, for greater satisfaction he re-counted the pile for Walter Bowne and found that it corresponded [356] with the previous count. There were 15 Votes for Walter Bowne 13 for Thomas R Smith and 1 for William S Coe. No ballot was so written that there could be any mistake as to the person for whom it was intended. The ballot for William S Coe was in M^r Bownes handwriting. He further states that the whole proceeding was conducted carefully and deliberately and that he knows of no circumstance to induce him to suspect any error or mistake

Alderman Meserole in his account of the canvass coincides in every essential particular with Alderman Mott. He states however that he has no recollection of having touched any of the Ballots, although he saw them all as they were successively opened and exhibited to him and declared by Alderman Mott.

The Committee not deeming it necessary to express any opinion of the facts above stated would conclude by simply recommending the adoption of the following Resolution.

Resolved that the foregoing Report be accepted and entered on the Minutes and that the Committee be discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

[358] The Memorial to the Legislature respecting the Amendments to the Charter of the City reported by the Counsel on the 11th of January instant agreeably to a Resolution of the Board and which was laid on the Table, was on Motion now called up and read in the following words

The undersigned in pursuance of a Resolution adopted by the Board on the 28th day of December last respectfully Reports the annexed draft of a Memorial to the Legislature on the subject of the Amendments to the Charter of this City.

To the Honorable the Legislature of the State of New York in Senate and Assembly convened.

The Memorial of the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York,

Respectfully Represents :

That certain amendments to the Charter of the City of New York were proposed and adopted in the month of September last, at a Convention of Delegates from the different Wards of the said City chosen and assembled for that purpose; and that at the last general Election held in the said City the question whether the said Amendments ought to become a Law of the State, having been submitted to the Electors of the said City it [359] appeared by the returns made by the Inspectors of the said election, in relation to the said amendments, that the same were approved of by a majority of the said Electors there being Ten thousand eight hundred and ninety nine votes in favor of, and five thousand five hundred and eighty eight votes against the said amendments.

Your Memorialists therefore in compliance with the wishes of the majority of the said Electors thus expressed, respectfully submit herewith to your Honorable Body the Amendments so proposed to the Charter of the City of New York.

The Amendments are in the following words

Amendments

To the Charter of the City of New York as adopted in Convention September 1829.

Sect. I. The Legislative power of the City of New York, shall be vested in a Board of Aldermen, and a Board of Assistants, who together shall form the Common Council of the City.

Sect II. Each ward of the City shall be entitled to elect one person to be denominated the Alderman of the Ward, and the person so chosen, together, shall form the Board of Aldermen; and each Ward shall also be entitled to elect one person to be denominated Assistant Alderman; and the persons so chosen, together, shall form the Board of Assistants.

[360] Sect III. The Aldermen and Assistant Aldermen shall be chosen for one year and no person shall be eligible to either Office who shall not at the time of his Election be a resident of the Ward for which he is chosen

Sect IV. The Annual Election for Charter Officers shall commence on the second Tuesday in April and the Officers elected shall be sworn into Office on the second Tuesday in May thereafter—And all such elections shall be notified held and conducted by Inspectors appointed in the same manner, with like powers and during the same number of days as the election for members of Assembly of the State are notified held and conducted

Sect. V The first election for charter Officers after the passage of this Law shall take place on the second Tuesday in April 1831, and all those persons who shall have been elected under the former Laws regulating the election of Charter Officers and shall be in Office at the time of the passage of this Law shall continue in Office or hold over until the officers elected under this Law shall be entitled to be sworn into office

Sect. VI. The Board of Aldermen shall have power to direct a special election to be held to supply the place of any Aldermen whose seat shall become [361] vacant by death removal from the City resignation or otherwise If a special election be not directed the vacancy shall be supplied at the next general election. And the Board of Assistants shall also have power to direct a special election to supply any vacancy that may occur in the Board of Assistants. The person elected to supply such vacancy shall hold his seat only for the residue of the term of Office of his immediate predecessor.

Sect. VII. The Boards shall meet in separate chambers and a majority of each shall be quorum to do business. Each Board shall appoint a President from its own body and shall also choose its Clerk and other Officers determine the rules of its own proceedings and be the judge of the qualifications of its own members. Each Board shall keep a Journal of its proceedings and the doors of each shall be kept open except when the public welfare shall require secrecy and all resolutions and Reports of Committees which shall recommend any specific improvement involving the appropriation of public moneys, or taxing or assessing the Citizens of said City shall be published immediately after the adjournment of the Board under the authority of the Common Council in all the newspapers employed by the Corporation and whenever a vote is taken in relation thereto the Ayes and Noes shall be called and published in the same manner.

[362] Sect. VIII. Each Board shall have authority to compel the attendance of absent members to punish its members for disorderly behaviour and to expel a member with the concurrence of two thirds of the members elected to the Board and the member so expelled shall by such expulsion forfeit all his rights and powers as an Alderman or Assistant Alderman.

Sect. IX. The stated and occasional meetings of the Common Council shall be regulated by their own Ordinances and both Boards may meet on the same or on different days as they may judge expedient.

Sect. X. Any Law Ordinance or Resolution of the Common Council may originate in either Board and when it shall have passed one Board may be rejected or amended by the other.

Sect. XI. No member of either Board shall during the period for which he was elected be appointed to or be competent to hold any office of which the emoluments are paid from the City Treasury or by Fees directed to be paid by any ordinance or Act of the Common Council or be directly or indirectly interested in any contract the expences or consideration whereof are to be paid under any Ordinance of the Common Council but this section shall not be construed to deprive any Alderman or Assistant of any emoluments or fees which he is [363] entitled to by virtue of his office.

Sect. XII. Every act ordinance or resolution which shall have passed the two Boards of the Common Council before it shall take effect, shall be presented duly certified to the Mayor of the City for his approbation. If he approve he shall sign it if not he shall return it with his objections to the board in which it originated within *in ten*

days thereafter, or if the Common Council be not then in session at their next stated meeting. The Board to which it shall be returned shall enter the objection at large on the Journal and cause the same to be published in one or more of the public Newspapers of the City

Sect. XIII, The Board to which such act ordinance or resolution shall have been so returned shall after the expiration of not less than ten days thereafter proceed to reconsider the same. If after such reconsideration a majority of the members elected to the Board shall agree to pass the same it shall be sent together with the objections to the other Board by which it shall be likewise reconsidered and if approved by a majority of all the members elected to such Board it shall take effect as an act or law of the Corporation. In all such cases the votes of both Boards shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the passage of the measure reconsidered shall be [364] entered upon the journal of each Board respectively.

Sect. XIV, If the Mayor shall not return an act ordinance or resolution so presented to him within the time above limited for that purpose it shall take effect in the same manner as if he had signed it.

Sect. XV, Neither the Mayor nor Recorder of the City of New York, shall hereafter be Members of the Common Council thereof.

Sect XVI. Whenever there shall be a vacancy in the office of Mayor and whenever the Mayor shall be absent from the City, or be prevented by sickness or any other cause from attending the duties of his office, the President of the Board of Aldermen shall act as Mayor and shall possess all the rights and powers of the Mayor during the continuance of such vacancy absence or disability

Sect. XVII, It shall be the duty of the Mayor

First—To communicate to the Common Council at least once a year and oftener if he shall deem it expedient a general statement of the situation and condition of the City in relation to its government finances and improvements

Second—To recommend to the adoption of the Common Council all such measures [365] connected with the Police, security health cleanliness and ornament of the City and the improvement of its government and finances as he shall deem expedient.

Third—To be vigilant and active in causing the laws and ordinances of the government of the City to be duly executed and enforced.

Fourth—To exercise a constant supervision and controul over the conduct and acts of all subordinate officers and to receive and examine

into all such complaints as may be preferred against any of them for violation or neglect of duty and generally to perform all such duties as may [be] prescribed to him by the charter and City ordinances and the laws of this State and the United States

Sect. XVIII, Annual and occasional appropriations shall be made by proper ordinances of the Common Council for every branch and object of City expenditure nor shall any money be drawn from the City treasury except the same shall have been previously appropriated to the purpose for which it is drawn.

Sect. XIX, The Common Council shall not have authority to borrow any sums of money whatever on the credit of the Corporation except in anticipation of the revenue of the year in which such [366] loan shall be made unless authorized by a special act of the legislature

Sect XX, It shall be the duty of the Common Council to publish two months before the annual election of Charter Officers in each year for the general information of the Citizens of New York a full and detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the corporation during the year ending on the first day of the month in which such publication is made and in every such statement the different sources of City revenue and the amount received from each the several appropriations made by the Common Council the object for which the same were made and the amount of moneys expended under each the moneys borrowed on the credit of the corporation the authority under which each loan was made and the terms on which the same was obtained shall be clearly and particularly specified

Sect. XXI, The executive business of the corporation of New York shall hereafter be performed by distinct departments which it shall be the duty of the Common Council to organize and appoint for that purpose

Sect. XXII, It shall be the duty of the Common Council to provide for the accountability of all [367] officers and other persons to whom the receipt or expenditures of the funds of the city shall be entrusted by requiring from them sufficient security for the performance of their duties or trust which security shall be annually renewed but the security first taken shall remain in force until new security shall be given

Sect. XXIII, The clerk of the board of Aldermen shall by virtue of his office be clerk of the Common Council and shall perform all the duties heretofore performed by the Clerk of the Common Council except such as shall be assigned to the clerk of the board of Assistant

Alderman and it shall be his duty to keep open for inspection at all reasonable times the records and minutes of the proceedings of the Common Council except such as shall be specially ordered otherwise.

Sect. XXIV, Such parts of the charter of the city of New York and the several acts of the legislature amending the same as are not inconsistent with the provisions of this law shall not be construed as repealed modified or in manner affected thereby but shall continue and remain in full force

Alderman Steavens proposed to add to the Memorial as follows "And your Memorialists respectfully solicit of your Honorable Body that a Law may be passed in conformity with the proposed amendments as recommended by the Convention

[368] A motion was made to lay the proposed addition on the table the question being taken & a division called by Alderman Strong, the Members voted as follows.

Your Committee therefore recommend the following Resolution.

The furnishing of Medicines & Medical attendance to the Poor gratis, is a Charity not liable to imposition, And therefore particularly merits the patronage of the Public, The great utility of the diffusion of Vaccination throughout our City is too generally admitted to require Comment.

The Police Committee to whom the Petition of a number of the Weighmasters, asking for the appointment of a Weighmaster General and an alteration of the System was referred Report

That they have heard the Petitioning and the Remonstrating Weighmasters, And your Committee are of opinion that there is no serious evil growing out of the present System.

The only possible objection of a Public Nature that is to be urged against the present System is that the Weighmasters being selected and employed solely [38] by the Seller of Merchandize are induced to favor their employers. But if there is any disposition on the part of the Weighmasters to act from such favoritism, their conduct must soon be exposed, for the usual purchasers of the Articles Weighed, by the Weighmasters, being Store Keepers have great facilities to re-weigh the Merchandize, after it is received, And detection must of course be inevitable.

And your Committee have received Certificates of the Store

Keepers, complaining that the weight given by the Weighers is "frequently short"

The Committee have annexed a Copy of this Certificate, that the Board may be enabled to Judge for themselves whether there is such fraud as to require an alteration in the System.

The disadvantage of the new System as alleged is that there is a want of confidence in some of the Weighers and therefore an unwillingness to employ them in rotation and also that the Weighmasters will loose the inducements to an Active personal attendance to their duty, the excuse for Articles sometimes falling short of their proper weight is, that it in part arises from losses in transporting the Articles. It may also be added that for any fraudulent performance of duty, the Board would remedy the evil by removing any of the Weighmasters.

The real difficulty in relation to the subject [39] is that the Corporation have appointed too many Weighmasters.

On the whole your Committee are of opinion that there are no evils of so general a Nature as to require an alteration of the System, and the appointment of a Weighmaster General, and they respectfully submit the following Resolution.

The Police Committee to whom was referred the subject of Hawking & Peddling presented the following Report.

The Police Committee to whom the Petition on the subject of Hawking & Peddling in the City of New York was referred Report.

That the subject was before this Committee the last Winter, And the Common Council then sent up to Albany the draft of a Law, which though it passed each House, yet owing to some amendment it never became a Law.

There has been some question with the Committee whether articles of food should be excluded from being hawked about the Streets, but upon reflection, they have considered it best to exclude such articles from the operation of the State Law—The reasons against Hawking & Peddling [41] in all Articles of Merchandize whether of Foreign or Domestic growth or Manufacture are *in* included

First, In the evil tendency thereof upon the Public Morals inasmuch as many persons, including Children & Minors, are engaged in vending different goods in a wandering vagrant manner.

Second, The facility of disposing of Stolen goods, and the opportunities furnished to commit Acts of Robbery, upon our Citizens especially as all responsibility is avoided by reason of the vender having no settled habitation or known name

Third, The importunate calls at the doors of Citizens and the impudent perseverance of some pedlers who will intrude upon our Citizens and will scarcely receive a refusal to purchase tho often repeated

Fourth, The gross impositions practised on our Citizens, who are, every day, deceived by the Pedlers, in the purchase of inferior goods & Merchandize with no possibility of obtaining redress or remedy.

Your Committee offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Counsel of the Board prepare a Law for the Legislature, bottomed on the principles contained in this Report, and further authorising the Corporation to pass such Laws as they may deem expedient for the prevention or regulation of the sale by Pedlers or Vagrant persons of Articles of food and [42] all other articles not included in the proposed State Law.

On Motion of Alderman Lee the Report of the Committee on Applications to the Legislature with the draft of the Law for the more effectual [67] prevention of Fires presented by *the* them on the 7th December last and laid on the Table was called up & agreeably to the Resolution of the Board at the last Meeting was taken into consideration. The Report being read was as follows.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature on the subject of the Fire Laws of the City.

Report

That your Committee have carefully examined the Report and project of a Law for the more effectual prevention of Fires in the City of New York, heretofore submitted by them to the Common Council and referred back to your Committee.

The extensive enlargement of the buildings and population of the City, and the alarming increase of Fires, together with the inadequate condition of the Fire Department admonished your Committee of the necessity as well as the difficulties of making suitable provision for the more effectual prevention of Fires.”

In framing the Law formerly submitted and again proposed (with some slight alterations) they have been aided by intelligent members of the Fire Department, as well as by several of our most extensive and respectable builders; and your Committee having bestowed their own deliberate judgment on the subject, are led to believe that the Law now proposed will, if adopted, be attended with very beneficial results.

[68] On the subject of printing the existing Fire Laws, with the Law now offered, your Committee deem it almost impracticable, so far as the meaning of the Resolution is concerned, and altogether unnecessary the Laws now in force are contained in several volumes, and of themselves would form a considerable work, and as the Law proposed contains many provisions entirely new, they cannot see the utility of the proposed publication, as leading to a correct understanding of the project of a Law submitted by the Committee

To the proposed Law they have added, as an independent section, the Resolution of M^r Roosevelt on the subject of Steam Engines as directed by the Board, but are of opinion that it is altogether unnecessary to make any provision therefor.

In conclusion your Committee deeming it important to the well being and safety of the City that the Fire Laws be amended in such manner as shall more effectually guard the dwellings, Store houses and work shops of our Citizens from the ravages of Fire, but also protect the lives of our Firemen in their voluntary labours for its extinguishment, by requiring the buildings to be erected, to be of more solid structure, and for which the existing Laws make no provision, offer the following Resolution

Resolved that the preceding Report and the project of a Law therewith submitted [69] be adopted and that application be made to the Legislature that the same be passed into a Law

The Report was approved and the Law passed under the title of "A Law relative to the Washington Parade in the City of New York."

The Law Committee presented the following Report on subject of the Office of Public Administrator.

The Law Committee Report that by a provision in the Revised Statutes the Public Administrator, before he enters upon the duties of his Office, is required to give sureties to be approved of by the Mayor or Recorder, for the due administration of all estates which may come to his hands. Prior to the year 1815 the Chamberlain was ex-officio public administrator; and, as he gave security in his former character, the Law provided that when administration, in any particular case, was granted to him, it should be without Sureties. In 1815 a distinct Office was created called the Office of Public Administrator; but the Legislature not adverting, as it is presumed to the circumstance that the Chamberlain, in his character as such, gave sureties, the benefit

of which was applicable to all his Acts, in creating the new Office inadvertently repeated the terms "without sureties." So that, unless resort be had to the Revised Statutes, the City, altho responsible [88] for all the estates of which the Public Administrator may take charge, has no security, other than the mere Bond of the Officer himself, for their due administration. Under this Law the present public Administrator was appointed during the pleasure of the Common Council. He entered upon the duties of his Office before the revised Statutes took effect, and in order therefore to obtain the benefit of the sureties prescribed by those Statutes, a new appointment must be made. Such, at least, is the opinion, of some of the members of the legal profession; and in case of doubt, particularly where the question relates to the liability of Sureties, the Committee deem it most prudent to adopt that course which all concede to be the safe one. They accordingly submit the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Common Council will at their next meeting proceed to the appointment of a Public Administrator pursuant to the Revised Statutes.

The Law Committee to whom it was referred to inquire into the expediency of establishing an additional standing Committee to be denominated the Committee on Common Schools

Report.

That by the present Law, fourteen Commissioners of School money are required to be appointed by the Common Council once in every three years, whose duty it is, first, to require certain returns from the Officers of the several schools; secondly, to apportion and pay the school moneys to the several institutions designated by the Common

Council; thirdly, to visit and examine the Schools twice at least in every year, and to investigate their affairs; and lastly, on or before the first day of December in each year to make a full and complete Report of their doings to the Common Council. From this enumeration of their duties, it will readily be seen [90] that there may be many questions connected with the important subjects of popular education, which could not with propriety be referred to the Commissioners. Nor is there that freedom and frequency of intercourse between them and the Common Council which exists in the case of Committees, and is so essential to the harmony and efficiency of public bodies. The amount annually appropriated to the support of Common Schools in this City exceeds Forty thousand dollars. And altho this expenditure is itself of great magnitude, the magnitude of the object to which it is applied is still greater.

There is no subject in which our City has a deeper interest than in the elementary education of the people, and none, therefore, it would seem in regard to which the action and supervision of the City Government should be more perfect.

The following resolution is accordingly submitted for the Consideration of the Common Council. Resolved that in addition to the present standing Committees there shall be appointed this year and annually hereafter a Committee to be denominated the Committee on Common Schools.

The Police Committee to whom was referred the complaints against Peter F Cisco Inspector of Weights & Measures presented the following Report

The Police Committee on the complaints against Peter F Cisco, Inspector of Weights Report

That they have heard the Parties complaining and the Officer complained against.

Mr Cisco is charged with want of accuracy and careful attention to his duties by which means it is alleged he has improperly Inspected and passed Weights which were not correct—He is also charged with receiving greater fees than the Law allows.

[94] In relation to the first charge of inspecting & passing Weights not correct, the instances of so doing are not so proven against Mr Cisco as to shew great negligence. There does not appear to be any thing to impugn the motives of the Inspector in relation to this charge.

The Law allows Mr Cisco to make his return to either of the City Sealers (there being two) according to his own option, A discretion which should not be vested in the Inspector, and which has given rise to some feeling between one of the Sealers and the Inspector. To remedy this the Committee recommend that the City be divided into two Districts, and the entire returns of each District to be made to its respective sealer. And if the Sealers & Inspectors cannot agree on these Districts, that the Police Committee designate the bounds of them.

In relation to the Inspectors overcharging it was satisfactorily proven that he received from Henry B Parks, Palmer Clark & Mr Terry Fishermen in the Fulton Market, for examining their Weights, Twenty cents each which is about five Cents more from each of them, than he was entitled to receive; And though the Amount collected beyond the legal rates, are small, yet the principle is wrong, and

should be censured whenever it comes under the consideration of the Board

Your Committee offer the following [95] Resolutions.

Resolved, that Peter F Cisco, the City Inspector of Weights refund to Henry B Parks, Palmer Clark & M^r Terry Fishermen in Fulton Market, Five cents each, being the amount paid by them respectively beyond what the Law requires.

[96] The Law enacted by the Legislature last year imposing heavy penalties on the Proprietors and Managers of Theatres and other Public places in which Masquerades or Masqued Balls should be held has failed to prevent those kinds of exhibitions. And your Committee perceiving no good reason for disguising the Persons of our Citizens and believing that all the honest useful purposes of life can be better performed in their well known persons. And that any healthful amusements or recreations may be as freely enjoyed in our usual Costume as disguised and unknown, and further, believing that it is possible that our good Citizens might say or do things in the irresponsible character of disguise, which in their known and responsible character, they would deem improper. Your Committee recommend that application be made to the Legislature to pass a Law to prevent this kind of amusement hereafter

And Your Committee beg leave to recommend that the Counsel pre-

pare the draft of a Law for the purpose similar to one which has been in Salutory operation in the State of Pennsylvania for many years.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature to whom was referred a Resolution of the Board adopted December 23. 1829, directing them to Report on the propriety of petitioning the Legislature to repeal the Law passed at their last Session imposing an additional Tax \$1.50 upon Licences to be granted to Grocers and Tavren Keepers in this City respectfully

Report.

That the Law referred to by the said Resolution, is one of the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act to create a fund in Aid of the Society for the reformation of Juvenile Delinquents in the City of New York and for other purposes," which was passed during the last session of the Legislature, but at so late a period thereof, that no opportunity was afforded, either to the parties to be affected thereby, or to the Common Council of this City, to present any Memorial on [98] the subject thereof. Your Committee would also remark that no application for the passage of such a Law was made by or with the knowledge of this Board, and that no intimation so far as they have ascertained was received by any of the Members thereof that any such Law was in contemplation until it was too late to interpose any objection thereto.

The Act passed April 10th 1824 on the subject of Excise and Tavren Licences in the City of New York by which the sum to be charged for every such Licence by the Mayor Aldermen and Assistants of the said City, was fixed at Ten dollars, was (like other Laws strictly local in their operation) passed on the Petition of this Board under its Corporate Seal; and your Committee deem it but reasonable and proper, that in all such cases, the Common Council of the City as the Municipal Governors thereof, should at least have an opportunity of expressing

an opinion and more particularly in respect to such Laws, which are to be carried into effect by the said Common Council or the Members thereof.

As the Law in question professes to have been passed for the benefit of the House of Refuge, Your Committee in acting upon the Resolution referred to them have considered it proper to apprise [99] the Officers of that Institution and to request their attendance, and they have accordingly received statements on behalf of that Institution in relation to this subject, which statements accompany this Report.

The Committee cheerfully admit the utility of the House of Refuge, and that it deserves the utmost encouragement and support: nor do they mean to question the Correctness of the principle, upon which that part of the Law under consideration to which the Resolution referred to them relates, would appear to have been passed namely, that the use of Strong or spirituous Liquors is perhaps the most fruitful source of crime and poverty; but they do not hesitate to express their opinion that upon a higher principle in Legislation, this Law is objectionable.

The House of Refuge is located in the City of New York, and the legal name of the Institution is the Society for the Reformation of Juvenile Delinquents, in the City of New York, from which it might perhaps be inferred that the benefits flowing from this Charity were confined to this City. But such was not the intention of that establishment nor is it true in fact—The words “in the City of New York” are intended merely to designate its Location, not to confine its advantages to juvenile delinquents from this City. In this respect it is a State Institution; and the Committee would simply state the fact that no less than Twenty nine [100] Children were during the last year sent from other Counties in the State and found refuge within its walls. The Legislature however by the 3^d 4th & 5th Sections of the Act in question would seem to have viewed it in a different light, for by those sections, they have imposed heavy pecuniary duties for its support, exclusively upon certain classes of the Inhabitants of this City—They have taxed dealers in Spiritous Liquors and Managers of Theatres and Circuses in the City of New York alone, alth’o the same avocations are pursued in other parts of the State producing the same effects whether for good or evil, upon the condition of Society—If it was supposed therefore by the framers of this Law, that the fund to be created by it, would enure exclusively to the benefit of the Inhabitants of this City, or be applied towards mitigating an evil originating alone within its boundaries, the supposed propriety of the Law rests upon a falacy; And whatever may have been their impression in that respect,

the operation of the Law is partial and therefore unjust. The evil intended to be remedied is Co-extensive with the State, The burthen of providing the Remedy intended by this Law, is thrown exclusively on this City, and that not in the shape of a general Tax, but as a duty upon [101] a certain class of its Inhabitants

For these reasons, and most especially the dangerous tendency of passing State Laws vitally affecting the City Revenue, without the approbation or knowledge of the City Government, the Committee are of opinion that Measures should be taken to procure a repeal or modification of the Law in question, And they beg leave therefore to offer the following Resolution for the adoption of the Board

Resolved that the Counsel to the Board prepare a Memorial to the Legislature in conformity with this Report so far as relates to Excise and Tavren Licences, and that the same be authenticated in the usual manner during the recess of the Board and forwarded for presentation during the present Session.

[103] The Street Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Comptroller relative to an Account from the Manhattan Company for filling Cisterns near the City Hall with Water presented the following Report.

The Street Committee to whom was referred a Report made to the Board by the Comptroller on the 25th of January last relative to an account rendered by the Manhattan Company for filling Cisterns near the City Hall with Water, on the 24th of December last; Also a Report made to the Board by the Street Commissioner on the 22^d of December 1828 on the subject of injury done to the Streets by the Manhattan Company

Respectfully Report.

That the question presented by the Documents referred to them, appears to be whether the Account from the Manhattan Company mentioned in the Comptrollers Report, should be resisted on the ground that the Corporation on their part have a Claim against said Company for damages, for injuries done to the public streets by laying and repairing their Water pipes. The present demand of the Manhattan Company is \$22.81 and if the charge be correct in point of amount, the Committee have no doubt of the legal right of the Company to make it against the Corporation as against any individual. Nor do they think that any claim which the Corporation [104] may have against the Manhattan Company for injuries to the Streets should be put forward as an objection against settling such charge.

By the Comptrollers Report it appears that in 1804 the sum of \$4700 was awarded to the Corporation and paid by the Manhattan Company as Damages for such injuries previous to that period; And the Street Commissioner has reported that in his opinion the probable amount of such damages for the last Twenty years would be not less than \$10,000. The immense disparity in the amounts of these claims is of itself a sufficient reason in the opinion of the Committee for not attempting to place that of the Corporation on the footing of an offset against that of the Manhattan Company even if no legal difficulty

(arising out of the different Characters of the demands) could exist to such a course. Whatever claim the Corporation may have against the Manhattan Company cannot be impaired or affected by the settlement of the account in question, And the Committee think that the two subjects should not be connected together.

They offer the following Resolution therefore,

Resolved that it is inexpedient to resist payment of the account rendered by the Manhattan Company for filling Cisterns near the City Hall on the 24th December last amounting to \$22.81 [105] on the ground that the public ought to be supplied by the said Company with water for the extinguishment of Fires, as a compensation in part for the injury done to the Streets of the City by laying and repairing Pipes by the said Company.

The Report of the Law Committee on the alledged encroachment at the North West corner of Liberty street and Broadway which was presented on the 21st December last and Laid on [123] the Table, was now called up and referred to the Street Committee.

The Petition from certain Inhabitants of the 5th Ward requesting a New Election for Alderman in said Ward alledgeing that David Rogers elected Alderman at the last Election was absent from the City on a Voyage to the West Indies and had not taken the Oath of Office which was Laid on the Table on the 8th February was called up and referred to the Law Committee.

Prevention of Fires was called up, was considered by Sections and finally approved—The Counsel was directed to prepare a suitable Memorial to the Legislature and his Honor the Mayor was requested to have the same authenticated during the recess of the Board and transmitted together with the draft of a Law to the Legislature now in Session at Albany.

[130] The Committee on Applications to the Legislature to whom had been referred the Copy of a Bill now before the Legislature in relation to the support of Foreign Poor presented the following Report.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature to whom was referred the Copy of a Bill now in the Legislature in relation to the support of Foreign Poor respectfully

Report

That the said Bill was reported by a Committee in Assembly on a Memorial from the Supervisors of Kings County its provisions are substantially the following.

That any Pauper in any County (other than New York) becoming a Public charge, and if the Superintendents of the Poor for such County shall suspect such Pauper to be a Foreigner and to have been landed in New York within the last two years, such Superintendent may require the Commissioners of the Alms House, to provide for the support of such Pauper, and the Common Council must provide such support, as well for the Pauper, as for his Children which may have been born within the two years—proviso, that the Common Council shall have been indemnified for the support of such Pauper by Bond or commutation [131] and the fact that such Pauper has been Reported to the Mayor or Recorder on landing shall be conclusive evidence that the Common Council has been so indemnified. Should this Bill pass into a Law, it will be found most burdensome to this City.

During the last three years, Fifty three thousand Alien Passengers have been landed in this City from Foreign Ports. The industrious and useful portion have for the most part migrated to the Country leaving in the City that portion most likely to become a public charge. The great Commercial reputation of this City, and the facilities of procuring a livelihood without labour, has also drawn to this City the less industrious, and less useful portion of Aliens, who have landed in our Sister States, and in Canada, for whose support we have neither Bonds or commutation Money.

The facilities above named have moreover invited to this City, an

undue proportion of freed Slaves, and lazy vagrant Whites, from the interior of this State, and the adjacent States, Add to this, the decline of our Trade and Commerce and the consequent loss of employment for the labouring poor.

It is the opinion of your Committee no County in the State is equally oppressed with poor Taxes, and more particularly for the support of Foreign Poor

[132] 124,900 Dolls was expended during 1829 for the Alms House Bridewell and Penitentiary Department more than one half of this enormous sum was expended on Foreigners, and more than one fourth of it was expended on Persons from the interior of this and the adjacent States. Formerly too this County received a large sum for the support of Foreign Poor from Auction fees, that sum is now reduced to \$10,000 annually—The annual sum of Commutation money has fallen off likewise, being only \$8,700 for 1829 and the Bonds taken are in many instances not collectable.

These circumstances however onerous to the City Treasury, are in a great measure incidental [to] the Commercial Capital or Emporium of other Nations, and are probably irremediable but the Bill in question, is in the opinion of Your Committee without parallel and its operation will be found oppressive and unjust. Your Committee are informed that peculiar facilities are offered to the poor by the British Government to emigrate to Canada, that many of these Emigrants avail themselves of those facilities of passage with the intention to pass directly, and do pass directly into the Northern and Western parts of this State.

That many of those Persons do and will become chargeable to the Counties in which [133] they locate. That they will be suspected of having landed in this City. That from the similarity and sameness of names of persons from the same Country, a large portion of the names of such Paupers coming through the Canadas, will correspond with the names of persons, landed in this City, and Reported to the Mayor, and Recorded on the Alien Passengers Book, which Report and Records are by the Bill in question, made the conclusive evidence, that the City is indemnified for the support of such Pauper.

Personal identification in our distant Counties would be impracticable and your Committee apprehend, great loss and injury to the City from the passage of the Bill.

It is believed that the Supervisors of Kings County, on whose Memorial this Bill was Reported to the Legislature, could not have been aware, that the proportional Burdens for the support of Foreign poor, are far less in that County than in this, nor could those Memo-

rialists have contemplated a Bill to follow their Memorial of a character so injurious to this Country—Your Committee close by offering the annexed Resolution which they hope will be adopted.

Resolved that the Counsel prepare a proper Remonstrance, against the passage of the Law in question, and that the same be authenticated in the recess of the Board and forwarded to the Legislature as soon as may be

The Counsel presented the following Report respecting the suit against Howard A Simmons.

The Counsel of the Board respectfully Reports that by order of the Finance Committee he brought a suit in the Superior Court against Howard A Simons and his Sureties to recover the rent of the Wharf District N^o 4 for the quarter ending May 1st 1829 amounting to \$1625, That on the commencement of such suit the defendant paid to the Collector of the City Revenue \$825 leaving the balance (amounting to \$800) to be determined by such suit—That the Defendants gave notice of an offset for a much larger amount than the said \$800, and claimed a balance in their favor—That the said suit was referred by order of the Court to three persons appointed by the Court. That on the trial the defendants claimed and called several witnesses to prove that over and above the said sum of \$800, there was a large [147] sum due to him for damages occasioned by building the bulkhead between the foot of Fulton and Vesey streets, by removing an L in the said Slip by the occupation of Stone boats in the employment of the persons building the Bulkhead, by the occupation of the Wharf or Pier at the foot of Cedar street with Pine wood for the use of Steam Boats, and by the loss of Wharfage of several Vessels which left the said District in consequence of the building such bulkhead and the occupation of such Wharf or pier. That the Referees by their Report found that the Defendants over and above the said \$800, were entitled to six Cents and costs. That their Costs have been taxed at \$104,⁷/₁₀₀ and that the Corporation are liable to pay the same

R Emmet.

Which was accepted, and Alderman Seaman presented the following Resolution which was adopted.

Resolved that the Comptroller Report a Warrant in favor of R Emmet for \$104.75 to pay the Defendants costs in the case of the Mayor Aldermen and Commonalty against Howard A Simons and others.

The Counsel to the Board respectfully Reports that at the last term of the Supreme Court an application was made on behalf of John R Livingston [148] for the allowance of a Certiorari on the proceedings of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of opening Ridge and Attorney streets, that such application was resisted on behalf of the Corporation, but that the said Court have allowed such Certiorari, the effect of which is to subject the said proceedings to a future review by the said Court.

Which was read and ordered to be filed.

The Attorney presented a Report in relation to a Law which had been passed concerning proceedings in Criminal Cases in the City of New York accompanied with the Law, which were read and the Law ordered to be published & referred to the Law Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented a Return of Delinquents on the Assessment for paving Cedar street from William to Pearl Street which was read. Whereupon a Warrant was directed to issue to John Hanmer the Collector thereof.

The Street Commissioner recommended the appointment of Abraham Baudoine as an [149] Assessor in the place of William Burtzell on the Ordinances for a Well & Pump in 10th Street between the 5th & 6th Avenues, and one in 10th Street near the 6th Avenue which was agreed to and he was accordingly appointed

The Finance Committee to whom was referred the Memorial of C D Colden for relief in relation to the Paulus Hook Ferry ask leave to be discharged from the further consideration of the subject which was agreed to and the Petition was referred to the Ferry Committee

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature to whom was referred the subject of increasing the number of Marshals in the City of New York presented a Report, which was read laid on the Table, and directed to be printed.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature on the Petitions for extending the Fire Limits so as to comprehend parts of the 7th 8th 9th and the whole of the 13th Wards presented the following Report.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature to whom was referred the several petitions for extending the Limits for erecting Fire proof buildings comprehending parts of the Seventh, Eighth Ninth, and the whole of the Thirteenth Wards

[150] Respectfully Report

That they have had the subject under their deliberate consideration, and are of the opinion that the request of the Petitioners ought to be granted inasmuch as it appears to be their general wish and no objections having been made thereto.

1st All that part of the Seventh Ward not included within the present Fire Limits viz^t from Gouverneur Street and the East River.

2^d All that part of the Eighth Ward which lies between the present limits One hundred feet Westerly of Broadway and Northerly of Spring street to One hundred feet on the Westerly side of Greene street between Spring and Houston streets

4th All that part of the Ninth Ward lying between the present limits on Broadway at Houston street to One hundred feet Westerly of Greene street, thence to Amity street thence through Amity street to the Sixth Avenue, thence along the Easterly side of the said Avenue to Eighth street, thence along Eighth street to a line drawn Two hundred feet westerly from Broadway, thence along the Westerly side of Broadway and Two hundred feet therefrom to the Fourteenth street, Thence along Fourteenth street to the Bowery, thence through the Bowery to the present Limits at Houston street and thence to Broadway including all the Lots to the depth of [151] One hundred feet on the Southerly side of Amity street, and on the Northerly side of Eighth street between the Sixth Avenue and Broadway.

5th All of the Thirteenth Ward including the Lots on the Westerly side of Norfolk street between Division street and Rivington street, and on the Northerly side of Rivington street to the East River

And your Committee recommend that the foregoing extension of the Fire limits may be adopted And the Counsel to this Board prepare a Memorial and a draft of a Law to be presented to the Legislature at their present Session, and that the same be authenticated during the recess of the Board

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature to whom was referred the Communication from the Commissioners of Health suggesting certain Amendments to the Health Law presented the [152] following Report in favor of the same

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature, to whom was referred a Communication from the Commissioners of Health suggesting certain Amendments to the Quarantine Laws beg leave to Report.

One of the Amendments so suggested relates to the Quarantine of Passengers arriving from Sea—By the Revised Statutes Vol 1 page 430 Section 28, none of the Officers Passengers or crew of any vessel subject to a Quarantine of thirty days are allowed to enter the City until fifteen days after sailing from her Foreign port, nor until fifteen

days after the last case of pestilential sickness which may have occurred on Board, nor until ten days after landing at Quarantine.

This repetition of restriction on restriction proves in practice unnecessarily oppressive on Officers Passengers and Crews arriving in our Harbour, as well as on Commerce generally, and is evidently an oversight in those who framed the Law.

It seems to be conceded by men of Science that the infection of most diseases imbibed by the Human System will always be exhibited, within twelve or fifteen days at farthest, in the form of positive Disease, but by the legal provisions above quoted, many persons from a long Voyage, in a healthy [153] Vessel, are detained at Quarantine ten days, who have not been exposed to any such Infection for fifteen twenty and even thirty days previous to their arrival.

Your Committee can hardly believe, such unnecessary delay, to have been the intention of the Legislature a healthy Passenger, in a healthy Vessel, from a Voyage of twenty or thirty days could hardly endanger the health of the City, and so far as our own Citizens on return Voyages are held in Quarantine; Your Committee as well as the Health Officer apprehend more danger, from the unrestrained and daily intercourse, with Staten Island, by the families and friends visiting the detained Person, than from his admission without baggage, into the City.

Another portion of such Passengers, are F[o]reigners who visit this Country for purposes of Commerce, Science or Amusement, and no less anxious to reach their destination, than our own returning Citizens. But by our Laws applicable alike to Strangers and Citizens, whatever the length of Voyage, however health[y] the Vessel and Passengers, they must be Quarantined ten days after arrival, in all cases where the Vessel is liable to thirty days, and under Penalties should they enter the City (see page 438 § 72) of Fine, not exceeding Two thousand dollars or imprisonment not exceeding Twelve Months, and incur the odium moreover of a Misdemeanor.

These extraordinary Laws being now generally understood abroad, and it being also well [154] known abroad, that for several years past the Quarantine Codes applicable to Boston Philadelphia and Baltimore, have been so ameliorated, that little restraint remains against the free entrance of Tropical productions or Vessels or Passengers, the result is that the severity of our Quarantine, and the leniency of theirs, has drawn from us, and bestowed on them, a very large proportion of our once profitable Foreign Commerce—The Communication from the Health Commissioners, suggests other Amendments, and Your Com-

mittee could point out numerous provisions of our Health Laws, which they deem useless, in guarding the Health of the City, and yet most oppressive to our suffering Commerce

But the failure of the Amendments proposed to the Legislature in the fall of 1827 and the more recent fate of those discussed in Common Council during 1829 have led the Committee to the opinion that the public mind is not at present prepared for any considerable alteration in the Quarantine Laws, and they think it more prudent to propose the single Amendment embraced in the annexed Resolution.

Resolved that the Counsel prepare a Memorial praying the Legislature to amend Section 28 of Article 3 of Title 2. of the Revised [155] Statutes, giving the Health Officer a discretionary power to permit any Healthy Person arriving from Sea, in a Healthy Vessel, and not having been exposed, to any contagious disease during the last fifteen days, to come to the City without Baggage, and that the same be authenticated during the recess of the Board and forwarded to the Legislature.

That they have examined the Plot of Ground belonging to the Corporation on the Collect, which is now occupied by the Superintendent of Repairs with Blacksmiths & Carpenters Shops, and by the Corporation Stables. Your Committee are of opinion that there is

not in the Corporation Block, as much ground to spare from its present uses, as would be required for erecting a Bridewell, And in relation to the State Arsenal ground, Your Committee caused a Letter to be sent to General Muir, the Commissary General, asking his opinion as to the wants of the State in [166] relation to the Arsenal Ground, by his answer to which it would appear, that if we get the grounds from the State, (which is by no means probable,) we should yet have to purchase of the State other Lands and erect thereon buildings which would be more expensive to the City than to purchase unoccupied grounds in some suitable location, And your Committee are further of opinion that the ground in question is not a suitable location, being too low, having thereby a tendency to create prison fevers, and to make a prison establishment unhealthy.

To bring this interminable subject before the Board so as to take the sense of the Common Council on the questions connected with it, your Committee offer the following Resolutions.

And lastly whether this Company chartered for the sole and express purpose of introducing into the City pure and wholesome Water, and having enjoyed a valuable consideration in Banking privileges claimed in perpetuity, have fairly or substantially complied with the Conditions of their Charter.

A Memorial of the General Executive Committee of Mechanics & from a General Meeting of Citizens of which John W Hardenbrook was Chairman, to have certain alterations and amendments made in the Market Law relating to Hucksters &c was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Letitia Hegeman to purchase a Gore of Land adjoining her property N^o 8 Ann street was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Request of the Managers of the [192] Inauguration Ball for Loan of Decorations owned by the Corporation was read and referred to the Committee on Repairs with powers.

A Petition of Thomas Burling to have the opening and Regulating of 15th Street from Broadway to Sixth Avenue postponed was read and referred to the Street Committee

A Petition of M^{rs} Ann T Bancker to be relieved from the payment of an erroneous personal Tax was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Petition of Isaac Adriance and others for permission to build a Wharf near Harlaem Bridge was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips.

A Memorial of a number of persons against opening the Ninth Avenue was read and referred to the Road Committee.

A Petition of William Peck a Lamplighter praying for some Assistance having broken his leg while in the discharge of his duties was read and referred to the Charity Committee.

A Petition of William Mandeville praying to be relieved from the payment of an Assessment on his property on Hudson street between Fitzroy Road and 13th Street the same having been used as a Cemetery for the last Fifty years, was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Petition of John Marston praying to be relieved from the payment of a personal Tax was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

[195] A Petition of Peter Embry in behalf of himself and others Devises of Daniel Aymar late of the City of New York deceased complaining that the Commissioners of Estimate &c in estimating the value of premises belonging to Petitioners taken to widen Ann street, estimated the same at as sum far below its real value and praying relief was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of the Daily Advertiser Courier & Enquirer, New York Gazette & Mercantile Advertiser for permission to raise a small Boat House at White Hall was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves Piers & Slips with power.

A previous motion having been made that when the Board adjourn, they adjourn until tomorrow evening at 6 OClock which was agreed to And the Board accordingly adjourned to tomorrow at 6 OClock P M

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and approved.

M^r Roosevelt agreeably to notice given moved that the Board now reconsider the vote given at the last Meeting on the Resolution proposed by Alderman Palmer as follows.

Resolved that it is expedient on the part [197] of this Board to delegate a person to repair forthwith to Albany for the purpose of expediting the passage of Law by the Legislature of this State giving to the Inhabitants of this City the New Charter for said City asked for by a large Majority of the Voters at the late November election.

The question being taken on reconsidering it was carried in the Affirmative.

After considerable discussion the Question was taken on adopting the Resolution, and a Division having been called by M^r Engs, the members voted as follows.

[198] So it was carried in the Affirmative. It was then moved to strike out the word one and insert two as the number to be sent to Albany, which was agreed to. The Mayor then appointed as Delegates Alderman Stevens & M^r Dibblee.

The Report of the Committee on Applications to the Legislature on reference to them of the Resolution of the Board of Supervisors relative to the Assessment and Collection of Taxes presented on the

28th December last and laid on the Table was called up and read in the following words.

The Committee on Applications to the Legislature to whom was referred the annexed Resolution of the Board of Supervisors requesting the Common Council to apply to the Legislature to amend the Laws in relation to the Assessment and Collection of Taxes, so far as relate to the City and County of New York.

Respectfully Report.

That deeming the subject of the said Resolution to be one of great importance, they have given it a careful examination, and have particularly considered the amendments suggested by the Resolution itself. It cannot be denied, that [199] a great inequality exists in the valuation of real estate, as made by the Assessors of the different wards, and it is very advisable that some legal provisions should be devised and adopted, which may at least have a tendency to diminish such inequality, and to produce more uniformity in future Assessments.

The Committee are of opinion, that this may in some measure be effected, by such an amendment as shall embrace the principles firstly and secondly suggested by the annexed Resolution.

The effect of such formal meetings of the several Assessors, sanctioned and required by Law, and having for their avowed object, the adoption of a Just and uniform rate of Assessment for all the wards, would be at all events, an interchange of opinion among the Assessors, and the Committee conceive that that alone would conduce to greater equality in the different Assessments. The Committee recommend therefore that those principles be embraced in the Amendments to be applied for.

The Committee are of opinion that it would not be advisable to adopt the *the* third suggestion contained in the Resolution of the Supervisors. The rule which the Law now prescribes for Assessors is, that they shall estimate the value of real property, at the sum at which they would appraise the same in payment of a just debt due from a solvent debtor.

[200] The Committee are well convinced that no safer principle can be laid down for the guidance of Assessors than is afforded by this rule, and that any attempt to explain, modify or add to it, would produce difficulty and doubt, where there would now appear to be room for neither.

The annexed Resolution recommends lastly that when all the Assessment Rolls are finished the Board of Assessors should meet and

examine and compare them, to ascertain whether the valuations in each roll bear a just relation to all, and that they should report the result of such examination to the Board of Supervisors.

The Committee are in favor of having the Board of Assessors meet at the time, and for the purposes thus suggested, but they are of opinion that such Meeting should take place before copies of the Assessment Rolls are made for the examination of the inhabitants, as required by the present Law ; and they would recommend in addition to the objects of such meeting as specified by the Resolution of the Supervisors, that the Board of Assessors should have the power to alter and correct the assessment of any particular piece of property in any ward, by increasing or diminishing the valuation—They conceive that this power will operate as a salutary check upon the Assessors [201] of particular wards, and be conducive of uniformity in the several valuations.

If the foregoing suggestions should be adopted, and the necessary amendments passed to carry them into effect, it is evident that the duties of Assessors will be somewhat varied from and increased beyond what they now are: the Committee therefore think that it would be proper that the subject of their compensation should be attended to in any proposed amendments to the existing Laws, and they are satisfied that it would be right to leave not only that subject but also the compensation of Collectors under the control of the Board of Supervisors. They recommend therefore that a provision be made in such amendments empowering the Supervisors to fix the compensation of the Assessors and Collectors in this City, at such time or times as they may think proper.

By the Act respecting the Collection of Taxes in the City of New York passed April 6. 1825 and which remains in force, the Supervisors are authorized and directed to examine the several Assessment Rolls, and to equalize and correct the valuations. The 31 Sect. Title 2, of Chapter 13 of the first part of the Revised Statutes, authorizes the Board of Supervisors of each County, to increase or diminish the aggregate valuations of real estates in any town or ward by adding or deducting such sum upon the hundred [202] as may in their opinion be necessary to produce a just relation between all the valuations of real estates in the county and expressly prohibits them from reducing in any instance the aggregate valuations of all the towns and wards, below the aggregate valuation thereof as made by the Assessors. The terms of the Revised Statutes being much more explicit in relation to the powers and duties of Supervisors in this respect, than those used

by the above mentioned Act of April 6. 1825, the Committee would recommend that the above mentioned 31st Section be made applicable to the Supervisors of the City and County of New York, by an express provision for that purpose. The Committee conclude therefore, by offering the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Counsel to this Board be directed to prepare Amendments to the Laws in relation to the Assessment and Collection of Taxes in the City and County of New York in conformity to this Report, and that such measures be taken as may be necessary to have the same passed during the next Session of the Legislature of this State

The Draft of the Law reported by the Committee was then read by Sections, amended and on the Question of adopting the Resolution and approving the Law the same was carried in the Affirmative. The Title of the proposed Law was "An Act to amend the Act passed April 6. 1825 entitled an Act respecting the Collection of Taxes in the City of New York."

He also testified that he was perfectly aware of the period when the Assessors were open, but [did] not think it necessary to apply. As M^r Wood appears to be perfectly acquainted with his

rights, and as the Committee believe that in this instance, he has suffered from his own neglect, they [do] not think him entitled to relief. They therefore offer the following Resolution. Resolved that the Petition of William Wood for relief from an erroneous Tax be rejected.

The Report of the Finance Committee on the subject of an application of the Northern Dispensary for a Gore of Land at the junction of Christopher, Sixth, Factory & Grove streets was called up and read in the words following

Trustees of the Northern Dispensary praying that the Common Council should grant them a location

Respectfully Report

That they are satisfied that the said Northern Dispensary is a Meretorious Institution, and that it deserves aid and encouragement.

That there is a small Gore of Land at the Junction of Christopher street, Sixth street Factory street and Grove street belonging to the Corporation and which cannot probably be required for public purposes that this location would as they are informed be suitable for the said Dispensary. The Committee therefore offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Gore above mentioned be granted to the Trustees of the [235] Northern Dispensary, to be held by them so long as it shall be used for the purpose of such Dispensary and that the Counsel to this Board prepare the necessary conveyance for that purpose and that the same be authenticated in the usual manner during the recess of the Board.

The Street Commissioner presented the following Assessments which were confirmed and Collectors appointed thereto Viz^t

For laying the Side walks in Henry street near Gouverneur street and Thomas Cottrell appointed Collector

For a Well & Pump in 19th Street near the 8th Avenue and Thomas Cottrell appointed Collector.

For regulating and paving Troy street [256] from Asylum street to Greenwich Lane and Jameson Cox appointed Collector.

The Street Commissioner presented a communication stating that he had received information that M^r John Hone was inclosing that part of Southampton Road adjoining his premises near the 6th Avenue without any permission, that road being a Public highway and suggesting the propriety of referring the subject to the Counsel which was read and referred to the Road Committee.

The Police Committee to whom was referred the charges preferred against Abraham M Valentine one of the Police Magistrates presented the following Report

The Police Committee to whom was referred certain Papers and Affidavits impeaching the conduct of Justice Valentine of the Police Department Report.

That the papers embrace the charges of neglect of duty—Not regularly accounting for the fees received by him—And in one instance taking money instead of a Recognisance—And lastly, that he has borrowed money from a convict in Bridewell, being money found upon the convict. In support and refutation of [257] these charges, Your Committee examined the Police Justices & Clerk, and also several other witnesses.

In relation to the first charge "Neglect of duty" it does not appear to your Committee that this charge is supported, although Justice

Valentine does not appear to have been as much in the Office as either of the other Magistrates.

In relation to the second charge "Not accounting for the fees" it does appear that in some five or six instances he has received fees out of the Office, which should have been paid to the Clerk of the Police as the proper receiving Officer. The amount of these fees as far as proved, do not exceed eight or Ten dollars, but they have been demanded by the Clerk from the Justice, and the payment was neglected under such demand, and the same still remain due to the Office.

In relation to the charge "of taking money instead of a Recognizance" It was proved that a Female Bridewell prisoner, by the name of Rosannah Parris, not being able to give a Recognizance for good behaviour, but having Eighty dollars in money, that Justice Valentine received the money, and discharged her from Bridewell, and held the money as security, for her good behaviour for the Six months, and when that period expired, the money was not, though demanded forth coming, although it was afterwards paid to her by Joseph M Thomas, one of the Police Marshals, who [258] advanced the amount at the request of the Justice, The Marshal on his part alleges that he is still minus this amount.

In support of the last charge "borrowing money from a prisoner," It appears that a man by the name of Stevens, was committed to Bridewell on the 8th March 1828 he was charged with forgery and other high crimes, he had in his possession money amounting to Eighteen hundred and Seventy dollars and some Jewellery. on the 14th of March Stevens was tried and convicted, And on the 22^d of March Justice Valentine procures an order from Stevens on the Police Office or Clerk for Two hundred Dollars which amount was paid to him on the 28th of same month, Stevens was additionally committed as a fugitive from Justice charged with obtaining money by Forgery, and Committed at the instance of the Governor of Massachusetts. On the 19th of April following, our Court of General Sessions ordered the balance of the money found in Stevens possession, to be given up to him, which was then reduced to Eleven hundred and twenty dollars. This balance on the 19th of April 1828 was paid to Stevens the Convict while in Bridewell, by the Clerk of the Police, Justice Valentine being present and being left in Stevens apartment in Bridewell by the Clerk of the [259] Police. M^{rs} Stevens the unfortunate wife of Stevens testified that her husband gave her Justice Valentines receipt for Five hundred dollars for money borrowed by the Justice of him while in Bridewell,

and this fact was not denied by M^r Valentine. Stevens was sentenced the 17th May following to the State Prison for Fourteen years, and M^{rs} Stevens testified that at or about that time, she paid or Loaned to Justice Valentine one sum of One hundred and Sixty dollars, and another of Twenty or Forty dollars, making from her One hundred and eighty or Two hundred dollars, and in all Six hundred and eighty or Seven hundred dollars received by Justice Valentine from Stevens and his wife. It also appeared and was proven that on the discharge of one George Jenkins from Bridewell in April 1829 M^r Valentine charged him with having borrowed Fifty dollars from the said Stevens while in Bridewell, and claimed the same for M^{rs} Stevens alledging that she was in want, Jenkins thereupon paid Twenty five dollars to M^r Valentine as part of the Fifty dollars claimed. M^{rs} Stevens testified that she had not received this money, nor been made acquainted with the transaction.

It must be remarked that the Justice twice went to Albany to solicit the pardon of Stevens from the Governor, and that in addition thereto he boarded M^{rs} Stevens at his House for Four months. These services and this Board are the only offsets made or returned for the several amounts received in money, And that in [260] addition a Ring of some Twenty or Thirty dollars value was presented by Stevens while in Bridewell to the Magistrate.

M^r Valentine endeavoured to procure the pardon of Stevens, and rendered him all the service in his power, and there were circumstances growing out of the testimony of Stevens on the trial of another prisoner, which might have led M^r Valentine to have used his influence with the Governor to procure a pardon for Stevens, independent of the inducements which might be supposed to have grown out of these monied transactions; though his Colleagues did not draw the same conclusion, and did not unite in the application for a pardon. How far the money found on Stevens ought to have been considered either by the Court or Magistrate as the property of Stevens, and how far a Magistrate and prisoner can be considered as parties capable of entering into contracts for the borrowing and loaning of money are questions not now necessary to be decided.

All your Committee feel called upon to do in relation to this business, is to present to the Board a statement of facts, without expressing any ultimate opinion thereon, as the Common Council are not further required to Act in this business, than to decide whether the Magistrate [261] ought or ought not to exculpate himself from these charges before the Court of Common Pleas, the tribunal authorized to

decide this case. And with a view that the Common Council may decide as to the propriety of this step, Your Committee present the following Resolution.

Resolved that the District Attorney be requested to present these charges against Justice Valentine to the Court of Common pleas, that some day may be assigned to hear the Justice in explanation of or defence of himself against the same.

That they have given the subject their consideration, and are of opinion the proposed amendment would be beneficial to the interests of the City, but should extend throughout the Year—The present rate of Wharfage for Vessels between 20 and 50 Tons is 50 Cents per day and for Vessels between 50 and 100 Tons 62½ Cents per day, but the owner of [or] Master may if he so elect pay 60 Cents per Ton which entitles his vessel to the use of the Slip for a year without further charge. Vessels that have paid under this last provision, and are unemployed during the dull season of the year and the winter Months frequently occupy for many weeks, our most central Public Slips, to the great inconvenience, and sometimes to the exclusion of those engaged in active trade—Old vessels are also found stationed in some of our Slips the whole year for the purpose of receiving Cargo from other Vessels and disposing of it by retail—Your Committee [270] think the proposed amendment would tend to remedy these evils, and at the same time increase the City Revenue they therefore offer the following Resolution.

As Mr Williams appeared to be perfectly aware of his rights, and neglected to call on the Assessors, this Committee do not consider him entitled to relief. They therefore offer the following Resolution

The Street Commissioner presented the following Ordinances which were passed and Assessors appointed thereto.

For paving the side Walks of Laight and Collister streets and David Lyon, William [288] Lockwood & Charles Dusenbury appointed Assessors.

For paving the side walks of Charles street from Hudson street to Greenwich Lane and Abraham Baudoine, Everardus Warner & Gabriel Van Cotts were appointed Assessors.

Upon motion of Alderman Stevens on the request of Alderman Lee Chairman of the Committee who is absent from the City, the Report of the Road Committee relative to the working of the 3^d Avenue was called up and considered the same being read was as follows.

The Road Committee
Respectfully Report

That the increasing Travel on the Third Avenue requires that Road to be put in the best possible order. The Repairs for three years have cost more than Three thousand Dollars, and the Road has yearly grown worse; this Road was originally made with large Stones

of unequal dimensions, and placed with little regard to regularity. It presents a surface in some parts unreasonably crowning, in other concave, in others flat, and in all parts most uncomfortable for travellers; and these irregularities are greatly increased by the heaving effect of frost.

[289] If repairs be done with hard materials, they slide from the road, or from place to place, and if done with clay or loam, the road is made worse.

Your Committee are unable in fact to devise any beneficial plan for repairing this Road

By an Ordinance lately passed the section between 13th and 24th Streets will be regulated as a Street, and the section between the Six mile stone and Harlaem Church having been completely gravelled is a perfect road.

The middle section between 24th Street and the six mile stone, about three and a half miles, is intolerably bad, and being distant from any bed of natural gravel, your Committee recommend it to be taken up and made anew on the M^cAdam plan; but little repairs would therefore be required.

They think the interest of Travellers; the duty of this Board as Commissioners of Roads to the City, and to the public and above all, the interest of the Treasury imperiously call for this measure.

By experiments made the past season, in M^cAdamising several short sections of the Bloomingdale Road, they are satisfied that the cost will not exceed 2.660 dollars per mile, and if presently done, now that a large portion of our work people are unemployed, and labour unusually low, it may cost less. Your Committee doubting [290] their powers to make new Roads under the authority vested in them to Repair Roads, earnestly ask for the passage of the annexed Resolution.

Resolved that it be the duty of the Road Committee to cause the Third Avenue or such parts of it as may be necessary, to be completely M^cAdamised between 24th Street and the Six mile Stone.

The Report of the Finance Committee on the subject of the Commutation of Alien Passengers was called up and after some discussion was Laid for further consideration.

[291] Upon motion of Mr Roosevelt the Report of the Law Committee on the Petition of sundry Inhabitants of the 5th Ward praying that the seat of the David Rogers elected Alderman of said Ward may be declared vacant and a New Election ordered was called up and read as follows.

The Law Committee to whom was referred the Petition of a number of the Citizens of the 5th Ward claiming that the seat of David Rogers Alderman for said Ward is vacant, and praying that a new Election be ordered Report

That the Committee have had under consideration the various provisions of the Charter, and of the State Laws affecting the Question, but that there is a difference of opinion in the Committee as to the construction and application of those provisions.

Considering that the decision to be made will be very important not only in this particular instance, but as a precedent, the Committee have agreed to submit for the consideration of the Board, the following Resolution.

Resolved that a statement of the facts in the matter of the Petition for vacating the seat of Alderman David Rogers and ordering a New Election, be prepared under the direction of the Law Committee, and that the same be presented to the Judges of the Superior Court with a respectful [292] request on the part of the Common Council for the opinion of the Judges thereon.

Mr Roosevelt then presented the following preamble and Resolutions.

Whereas, by the Charter of the City, it is provided and declared that in case any Alderman or Assistant shall happen to die or remove out of the City it shall be lawful for the Electors, at such time and place as the Mayor may designate, to choose some other person to serve in the room of the person so dying or removing.

And Whereas the said Charter further provides in case any person duly elected to serve as an Alderman or Assistant, and having notice of his Election, shall refuse, deny, delay or neglect, to take upon him to execute the Office, that then and in such case it shall be lawful for the Common Council to impose upon such person a fine not exceeding £15, and that upon every such refusal or neglect another person shall be elected and chosen in the same manner as in the case of death or removal from the City.

And Whereas by the Act of the Legislature relating particularly to the City of New York passed April 9th 1813 it is enacted, that if any Charter Officer duly chosen [293] shall refuse to serve, die, or remove out of the City, or shall not be legally qualified, then and in every such case such office shall be deemed to be vacant, and the Common Council shall order an Election to be held to fill up every such vacancy and that such Election shall be held regulated and conducted in the same manner as is prescribed in the said Act for the anniversary Election except that the same shall continue for two days only.

And whereas, by the Act of the Legislature respecting the Election of Charter Officers passed April 16th 1822 it is provided that such charter Officers (except the Collectors) shall be sworn into, and commence the duties of, their Office on the last Monday in December in each year.

And whereas by the Act in relation to Towns passed March 19th 1813 it was provided that if any Supervisor Assessor &c should not take and subscribe his Oath of Office within the time thereby prescribed, such neglect should be deemed a refusal to serve in such Office, and the City or town might thereupon proceed to a new choice according to Law.

And whereas by the Revised Statutes it is declared that every Office shall become vacant, by the incumbents ceasing to be an Inhabitant, or on his refusal or neglect to take the oath of Office within the time required by Law.

And whereas at the anniversary Election, held on the first Monday of November last David Rogers Esq^r then being an Inhabitant of the Fifth ward was duly elected [294] Alderman of the said Ward.

And whereas the said David Rogers altho' informed of his said Election, afterwards to wit on the 17th day of November, left this City for the West Indies, there to attend to his necessary private business, and hath not yet returned, nor taken the Oath prescribed by Law.

And whereas a formal notice of said Election was, in the usual course on the 20th of November left at the residence of the said David Rogers in the said Ward.

Therefore Resolved that the Office of Alderman of the Fifth Ward is, and the same is hereby declared to be vacant, and the Common Council do accordingly Order that an Election to fill the said vacancy, be held in and for the said Ward at the Hotel of Thomas Riley on the corner of Chapel and Provoost streets on the 19th and 20th days of April instant according to Law.

Resolved that Robert M Russell William Westervelt and John B Schmelzel all of the said Ward be and they are hereby appointed Inspectors of the said Election.

Alderman Stevens moved that the Resolutions be referred to the Counsel of the Board and that he be requested to give his opinion thereon in writing. This motion was Negated. After [295] some discussion the question was taken on adopting the Resolutions and a Division having been called by Alderman Strong the Members voted as follows

That they have duly considered the subject and recommend to the Common Council the adoption of the following Resolution

Alderman Strong gave notice that he would at the next Meeting of the Board, move to reconsider the Vote then given—The Mayor stated that a Motion for Reconsideration on an agreement to go into Balloting for Office was out *or* [of] order. Alderman Mott appealed from the decision of the Mayor. Alderman Stevens was about to speak on the subject, when the Mayor decided, that on an appeal from the Chair there could be no debate. Alderman Stevens appealed from that Decision. The Mayor declared the appeal out of order.

[298] The Question was then taken on the correctness of the Decision of the Mayor on Alderman Motts appeal, and a Division having been called the Members voted as follows.

Alderman Stevens appealed from the decision of the Mayor and was about to speak to the subject when the Mayor decided, that on an appeal from the Chair there could be no debate, from this decision Alderman Stevens also appealed And on the Question—Is it the judgment of the Board that the Decision of the Mayor is right on the second appeal A Division having been [313] called the Members voted as follows.

The Committee on the Fire Department on the subject of a further supply of Water for the extinguishment of Fires and the erection of a Steam Engine at the Public Well presented the following Report.

The Committee on the Fire Department who have in charge the Erection of a Reservoir and the laying down of Iron Pipes, fire plugs &c and the obtaining a further supply of Water for the extinguishing of Fires beg leave

Respectfully to Report.

That they have caused to be erected on the Public Ground on the corner of Bowery and 13th Street, a Stone tower 44 feet diameter and 27 feet high above the surface of the ground, on which there is now putting up, an Iron tank of 43 feet diameter & 20 feet high which will contain 305.422 Gallons of Water, that the line of 12 inch Iron pipes are completed from the reservoir through [331] 13th Street

and Broadway to Canal street, and the line is nearly completed through the 3^d Avenue and Bowery to Catharine street, that there is yet wanted a few 10 inch pipes to complete the connection through Grand street, the whole will be completed in about three weeks, when it will comprise 30 Fire plugs 6 Stop cocks & 18,060 feet of Iron pipes containing 108,360 Gallons of Water capable of being thrown nearly 60 feet above the surface of the highest elevation of the streets as now regulated, or about 70 feet above the level of the Park in case the Common Council should deem it expedient to extend this important work to other parts of the City.

Your Committee would further Report that they have caused a Well to be dug averaging 18 feet diameter & 70 feet deep, 50 feet of which is through Rock and they have succeeded in obtaining (in the opinion of your Committee) a sufficient supply of Water for the above purpose, the Well having had a depth of 62 feet of Water, rising from the bottom untill it rose two feet above the level of the Bowery & 13th Street, but which your Committee have found expedient to have drawn down for the purpose of having the Wall of the Well from the top of the Rock which was laid without Mortar cemented with Hydraulic cement, in the hope that the Water may yet rise to the surface of the Hill—The greatest [332] quantity at any time in the Well is estimated at 106,980 Gallons of Water. Your Committee would further Report that after mature deliberation on the subject of raising the Water in the tank they are of opinion, that it would be advisable to erect a Steam Engine with lifting and forcing pumps & all the necessary fixtures for the same capable of raising 300 Gallons of Water per minute a height of 117 feet viz^t from the bottom of the Well to the top of the Tank, and although objections may be urged that it is unnecessary to raise so large a quantity of Water per Minute, except only when there should be a fire, but when it is considered, that the additional power can be obtained at a very small addition in the expences, and the extra power thus obtained can be so profitably applied in boring for Water which can be used for domestic & other purposes that your Committee are persuaded that the Public Interest requires an Engine of the above power. They have accordingly advertised for and received estimates for the same differing in their amount say from Five thousand Dollars, to Eight thousand Dollars, but in the opinion of your Committee the whole can be completed on an improved plan for a sum a little rising Five thousand dollars, they therefore offer the following Resolution for the consideration of [333] the Common Council.

Resolved that the Committee on the Fire Department, be and is hereby empowered to contract for a Steam Engine agreeably to the above Report at a sum not exceeding Five thousand Five hundred Dollars

The Law Committee to whom was referred the subject of the expiring Ordinances

Respectfully Report

That they had originally contemplated submitting to the Board an entire new revision of the Laws of the City. Further reflection and subsequent occurrences have led them to a different conclusion. A large body of Statute law differing not only in its form, but in many of its principles from that which preceded it, has lately gone into operation. Much time must elapse before the public, or even the legal profession, become familiar with the change, and in the mean while embarrassments cannot fail to arise, which, in the opinion of the Committee, it would not be expedient to increase by the proposed remodelling [339] of the whole system of our City Ordinances. In addition to this consideration there is another reason for postponement arising out of the adoption of the new Charter. To give full effect to that instrument much local legislation will become necessary. That Legislation ought to harmonize with the other parts of the System, and to insure such a result the whole should proceed from one and the same source. To our successors therefore who it is to be presumed will be selected by the people with an express view to the supplying of all defects, the removal of all abuses, and the redress of all grievances, the Committee would leave the task of preparing and enacting the new revised code of City laws. As, however, a large portion of the present Ordinances expire on the 30th of this month it becomes necessary that measures should be adopted for their continuance till the new system is ready to take their place. The Committee accordingly recommend the adoption of the annexed Ordinance

Respectfully Report.

That they have had the subject under their deliberate consideration, and after hearing the [351] reasons for, and against the same from the persons interested in the property to be affected thereby, Have arrived at the conclusion that it would conduce to Public convenience, as well as to the convenience and interest of individuals, particularly to those

owning property situate on that Street to have it widened by taking ten feet from the Lots on the Northerly side thereof.

The Street at present is extremely narrow and inconvenient being but about 23 feet in width, and from its being a leading street from Pearl street to the Albany basin, your Committee believe (if widened) would shortly be rendered a Street of business or a desirable place of residence for persons doing business in the lower section of the City, thereby adding an increased value to the remainder of Lots after taking the proposed Ten feet to be added to the width of the Street. For the foregoing considerations your Committee are induced to offer for consideration the following Resolutions.

Resolved that it is desirable for Public convenience that Cedar street be widened by taking Ten feet from the Lots on the Northerly side thereof from Broadway to Greenwich street

Resolved that the Counsel to the Board make the necessary application to the Supreme Court for appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the said matter [352] and that the Petition be authenticated during the recess of the Board.

Respectfully Report

That the said Market has for a long time been in a state of decay, having but one or two Butchers Stalls in it occupied, and affording no convenience to the Inhabitants generally, and little if any to persons residing in the immediate neighbourhood. On all hands it is admitted to be a great nuisance in its present condition, and although some of the Petitioners first presented on this subject prayed to have it repaired and extended, a great Majority of the Petitioners apply for its total removal. The establishment of [353] Clinton Market within the last year, renders it still less necessary to retain a Market on this spot, and the Committee are decidedly of opinion that the total removal of the present Market house and building there will not only be a public improvement but conduce much to the comfort of the Inhabitants

resding in that quarter, They have reason to believe that such a measure would now give general satisfaction to all parties interested, and that a unity of sentiment prevails among them in favor of having the space of ground where the said Market stands thrown entirely open, which would not prevent the re-establishing of a Market in the same place, or the use of it in any other way for public convenience which might be deemed expedient at a future day. The Committee submit the following Resolutions therefore for the adoption of the Board.

Resolved, that the Market House and its appurtenances erected on the space of ground lying between Duane, Reed, Washington and West streets be removed and that the ground upon which the same stands be paved and regulated.

On Motion the Report of the Market Committee which was Laid on the Table on the 5th April relative to further regulations in respect to the Sale of small meats in the Country Markets accompanied with an Ordinance were called up and Read in the words following

The Market Committee to whom was referred the Petition of several Butchers in the Fulton Market praying for further Regulation in respect to the Sale of small meats in the Country Market

Respectfully Report.

That by the 31st Section of the Ordinance entitled "A Law to regulate the Public Markets" passed 30th April 1827 it was Ordained that no Stand for selling meat of any description should be allowed in any of the Markets, except the regular butchers Stalls. Provided that such prohibition should not be construed to prevent any Countryman from bringing to the Market [355] and selling small Meats of animals raised on his own farm, but not the meat belonging to other persons. That by an Ordinance entitled "A Law to amend a Law to regulate the Public Markets" passed 7 May 1827, it was ordained, that so much of the Law thereby amended as might be deemed to

prohibit the selling in the Public Markets of this City, by any Country man or Country woman of small meats of Animals, raised and slaughtered on the farm of such Country man or Country woman, or which such countryman or Country woman purchased or obtained in the Country from the Farmer raising the same, in order to be sold in the public Markets of this City, should be and the same was thereby repealed.

The intention of this Amendatory Ordinance was, as your Committee conceive that Countrymen or Farmers bringing produce to our Markets should not be restricted to selling small meats raised and slaughtered on their own farms only, but that they should be permitted to purchase such small meats from their neighbours or to bring the same to Market for them. It was considered that in many parts of the Country, it might be a reasonable accommodation to farmers who might find it inconvenient to come or send to Market themselves, to allow them in this way to dispose of their [356] small meats, and if the practical operation of this privilege had not been extended beyond its object and meaning; Your Committee believe that no complaint would have been made by the regular Licensed butchers of this City, relative to the sale of small meats in our Country Markets.

But it appears that under the supposed sanction of this Ordinance, a class of persons called Country butchers (and who pursue that occupation exclusively) are in the regular habit of exposing their small meats for Sale in the Market, to the obvious injury of the Licensed Butchers who deal in the same Article. Your Committee have carefully enquired as to the existence and extent of the practice, and they are well convinced that it is unjustly detrimental to the regular Butchers of the City and should be suppressed.

The Country Butchers if thus allowed to carry on their business in our Markets have the following advantages; They pay neither premium nor rent for a Stall, their only expence for the privilege of selling in Market is one Shilling per day for every day they may think proper to come, they do neither Military, Jury nor Firemens duty, nor contribute in any way to the revenue of the City, except by paying the above trifling sum for a Stand in Market. On the other [357] hand the regular Butcher after serving an apprenticeship has to obtain a Licence, purchase a Stall, pay an Annual Rent for the same, whether he uses it or not, keep a horse & Cart, besides contributing his proportion of City Taxes and performing such other duties as are incident to his citizenship & residence in this City. Nor is he

allowed even then to compete with the Country Butcher, by selling his small meats by the quarter in the Country Market, the Law peremptorily confines him to his own stand or stall.

The Committee have carefully considered how this alleged grievance to the City Butchers should be remedied and after much deliberation they have arrived at the conclusion, that the Law as it existed previous to the passage of the amendatory Ordinance above mentioned was sufficiently liberal, and that neither the convenience of our own Citizens nor any other consideration, requires that the privilege which Farmers and Countrymen have of selling Meats in our Markets should be extended by the express terms of an Ordinance, beyond their own produce, and when it is considered, that under colour of the amendatory Ordinance, an abuse of the intended privilege, has crept in, highly injurious to a meretorious class of our Citizens, and which cannot in the opinion of the Committee be effectually restrained, but by confining this privilege [358] within its original Limits, no better remedy can be applied, than the repeal of such Ordinance, by which Measure every Farmer will be allowed to sell in our Market such small meats as he may have raised and slaughtered himself, while Country butchers will no longer be sanctioned in buying Stock whenever and in whatever quantities they may think fit and by exposing it for sale in this City, rival our Licensed butchers upon very unequal and to the latter very disadvantageous terms.

In this view of the subject the Committee beg leave to submit the draft of an Ordinance hereunto annexed and they offer the following Resolution.

Resolved that the Ordinance entitled " A Law to amend a Law to regulate the public Markets " passed 7th May 1827 be repealed, and that an Ordinance of which a draft is hereunto annexed be passed for that purpose.

Alderman Wells called up the formal Resolutions of the Counsel for the extension of the 8th Avenue from 13th Street to Hudson street, Bleecker Street to Hudson street & Greenwich Lane to 8th Avenue, and were read in the words following

I. Resolved that it is desirable for public convenience that a Street be opened of the width of Eighty feet in continuation of the Eighth Avenue from Thirteenth street to the intersection of Hudson street with Bank street. Also to extend Bleecker street to Hudson street—And also to extend Greenwich Lane to the Eighth Avenue; the same being in that part of the City of New York, not laid out into Streets Avenues, squares and public places by the Commissioners of Streets and Roads in the City of New York and by virtue of the Act entitled “An Act relative to improvements touching the laying out of Streets and Roads in the City of New York and for other purposes” passed April 3. 1807. And that the same is hereby ordered and directed to be done, And [361] that the Counsel to this Board make the necessary application to the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the premises in order that the same may be carried into effect.

II. Resolved that the Petition to the Supreme Court in the above matter be authenticated in the usual manner during the recess of the Board.

Whereupon the Resolutions were adopted.

Alderman Woodruff presented the following Resolution which was read and referred to the Committee on Repairs with powers.

Resolved that it be referred to the Committee on Repairs to examine and Report at the next Meeting of the Board what repairs is necessary to be done to the exterior of this Hall for its better preservation from the weather.

Alderman Woodruff presented the following Resolution [which] was read and referred [363] to the Committee on Repairs.

Resolved that the Committee on Repairs be authorized to take down the Wooden Figure now standing on the top of the Cupola of this Hall and cause a new one to be made and erected thereon, If in their judgment the old one should not be worth Repairing, if worth repairing to be repaired, And a Scale placed in the hand of the figure instead of the present Steel yards.
