REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee, not having any access to the statistics of the Board is unable to report as to the general work. We find by examination of the letters that only two of our churches have contributed specifically to this work. Attalla reporting \$15.07 and Union No. 2, 85 cents, making a total of \$16.52. This amount will be slightly increased by the proportionate part of the few contributions to mission in general which may be alotted to state missions. Your committee beg to sny that we ought to, and can do better if our pastors will give their attention to this matter. We recommend that the pastors preach special sermons to their churches to be followed by a collection for this purpose some time during the coming Associational year.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We your committee on Foreign Missio s submit the following report: The statement of our Master in regard to the Samaritans may fitly be applied to the world in the present day. "Lift up your eyes and look upon the fields for they are already white to the harvest." In all our Mission fields there is an urgent demand for more workers. This comes as a Macedonian call to us "come over and help us." While the contributions of men and money for this purpose are on the increase yet we feel that they are by no means keeping pace with the demands. Esnecially we regret to see that the contributions from the churches of our Association are not what the should be and further that many of our churches do not contribute at all. From the statistical report in last years migutes we find that only eight out o twenty-four churches report anything for Foreign Missions. We notice also that the whole Association contributed only \$60.00. This amounts to only about 212 cents per member. Brethren, is this satisfactory? Is this the highest an bit on we have in carrying out the last great command of our Saviour." We can but believe this state of affairs is largely due to the fact that the pastors do not piace these matters before their people as they should. We therefore recommend that the pasters study missions, pray for missions, preach missions and give their congregations op portunities to contribute regularly to this purpose. We recommend also that the cople study this question in the light of the scripture and of present & s. That they pray for Divine guidance and then contribute according to the de mands of the situation and as they are moved by the Holy Spirit

The Association shall employ such means and adopt such measures as shall seem best calculated to cultivate Christ an unity and fellowship among the brethren within its bounds, to provoke the brethren to love and do good work, to stir up the pure uninds of the brethren by way of remembrance, to secure individual advarcement in the downs life, to every way as individuals, to illustrate to the world the raity of the religion of Jesus christ.
