MINUTES.

On Friday, August 5th, 1892, the Florence Baptist Association assembled in its Fifth Annual Session, with the Union Grove Baptist Church, near Green Hill, Lauderdale County, Alabama.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. W. J. N. Wiley, with C. S. W. Paulk as Secretary and Treasurer.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

“Your committee on Associational Missions beg leave to report that we see great need of mission work in the bounds of our association, and would urge that the church give as liberally as the Lord has prospered them, in order that this great need may be supplied. The field is ripe to harvest and the laborers are few.”

SATURDAY MORNING.

After devotional exercises the reports on Missions were submitted as follows:

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

“We, your committee on Foreign Missions, find that there is much for us, as Baptists, to do, in spreading the Gospel truths of our Lord and Saviour. That the message of our Lord, ‘Go forth and preach the Gospel to all nations,’ should be more fully answered by our people. While God has blessed us in spreading His word, yet there are

millions of people who do not hear his word. This fact should cause every Baptist to give of his means as God has prospered him, that the word of God may be sent to the heathen lands.

Cary's Text: "Expect great things of God; attempt great things for God," should be our motto.

God has done great things. Sixty years ago there was not a christian in Polynesia, now the word of God is heard among them and they educate their children. The Fiji Islands sneered at Christian Missions, cannibalism reigned supreme: Of the 200,000 inhabitants 22,000 are church members, while half of the population attend divine service. A few years ago the doors of China were closed against Missionaries. To-day they are open, and the cry is, "More missionaries." Japan, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Burmah and other nations are calling for missionaries.

Let every Baptist make renewed efforts to help send the means by which 100 more missionaries may be sent out to these dying nations during our Centennial year.

Go to Him in earnest prayer for his help in the great work of the Southern Baptist Convention.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Association was called to order at 1:30. Moderator in the chair. Report of committees being in order, the following was submitted:

WOMAN'S WORK.

Your committee is convinced that the organization of the women within the bounds of the association, would be productive of gratifying results. There is located in Birmingham a central committee in charge of this work. The Secretary is Mrs. I. C. Brown, East Lake, Ala. In each association a vice-president has been, or should be, appointed and all reports are made through her, though monies are sent to our corresponding Secretary at Marion, Ala. (Rev. W. B. Crumpton.) The Baptist Mission rooms at Baltimore, Md., send to all Societies, literature, prayer cards and missionary barrels, and are anxious to aid the work in this way.

The children of many of our churches are organized into Sunbeam Societies and we believe, in this way, the young may best be educated in the grace of giving. All the societies of the women and children are auxiliary to the Southern Baptist convention, and all reports are made at the meeting of that body. Respectfully submitted,

We especially recommend our State paper, the Alabama Baptist. The Foreign Missionary Journal, published at Richmond, Va. The Home Field, Atlanta, Ga., and the Baptist Basket, Louisville, Ky. the church of God, and sincerely trust soon to see a Sunday School in every church within our association.

The audience was then divided into four classes and the lesson for the day taught them by Rev. W. S. Brown, Misses Mattie and Pink Ellis and L. P. Fleming. A permanent Sunday School was organized with Rev. T. S. Leavell, Green Hill post-office, as Superintendent.

Rev. W. S. Brown was elected by Executive Committee as a delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention, with C. S. W. Paulk, as alternate. Delegates to State Convention as follows: Rev. W. S. Brown, Rev. W. J. N. Wylie, L. P. Fleming. Alternates: Rev. T. S. Leavell, Erista Ashcraft and Rev. F. M. Hutchinson.

The thanks of the Association were tendered the people of the vicinity for the hospitable manner in which they entertained delegates and visitors.

The Association then adjourned to meet with Brush Creek church on Friday before the first Sunday in August, 1893.

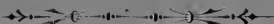
