ALEXANDRIA, ALA., JULY 19, 1861.

The East Alabama Baptist Convention met with the Mt. Zion Baptist Church, at 11 oclock, A. M.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Eld. Gordon Mynatt, from the Text

"Preach the word"

APPENDIX.

Report on Books, Tracts and Colportage.

The committee on Book and Tract Distribution and Colportage, Report, that they assumed that good, useful, moral and Religious Books and Tracts only are intended to be put into circulation. To the most careless observer it would seem that argument or statements of facts were at this time unnecessary to satisfy even such, of the necessity, of their importance to the general diffusion amongst the learned and the unlearned—the intelligent and the ignorant—the moral and the immoral—the religious and all shades of infidelity—all classes and conditions of society.

The patent aphorism that "knowledge is power" in no department of human society, in no condition nor range of human thought or human action, has so forcible an application, as to

moral and religious subjects.

The acquisition of knowledge is derived from observation and experience—from the communications of others—and from the writings of other intellects. The life of the masses limits the range of their observation and experience to a narrow area—the confined space limited to intercourse necessary, circumscribes the reception of oral instruction; and it is, to many, limited to but a very few of the first principles. Both these have their advantages; it is known that much of the most valuable knowledge we possess is derived from our personal observations and experience—the ear and the eye of an attentive observer as he passes through life, like the bee, gathers food for its pleasure and nourishment from apparently barrer

and unproductive sources. But in our generation the pen and the press are the moral power that move and mould and govern the world. The amazing facilities for multiplying the printed page, puts into the hands of the enemies of God and his church on earth, this element of moral power, as well as of his friends-they use it with an energy and perseverance that chalanges the emula-tion of the friends of Zion and her King. Two motives, each in itself sufficient, should stimulate the church of Christ to vigorous efforts to disseminate a good, sactified literature, broadcast over the land. 1. To raise a breakwater againt the mighty tide of corrupt and vicious reading matter sweeping over our beloved land, and decoying many unwary souls away from truth's strong hold, drowning their souls in perdition. 2. To spread the knowledge of salvation; to do positive good to saint and sinner. Thousands may be induced to read a well written Book or Tract, adapted to their condition and calculared to awaken serious thoughts and prove to them a messenger of sell ation, who could not be induced to attend upon the minastry of the word or the services of the Lords house. Many of God's dear children, in his providence, have their lots cast beyond the reach of church privileges and personal intercourse and fellowship of the saints; but such may be reached by some of these messengers that may whisper peace to his troubled spirit, impart strength to his weakness, and so clear his spiritual horizon as to enable his faith to get a soul satisfying view of the pilgrims home, the saints everlasting rest. How shall these wants be supplied? What means shall be employed hopefully, to meet this demand upon our christian benevolence?

A prudent and wisely conducted system of Colportage scems to your committee precisely adapted to meet the case in all its phases. We may be met by an objector—the facilities for traveling and commercial intercourse are so great that one who wants books can without much inconvenience get them -To this your committee would reply, that there are large classes who are poor and feel unable to spare the means to pay for shem even if brought to their doors. (Colportage provides for taking them to the people and donating them.) Another class having means seldom if ever go to a town or village where any considerable variety of religious books are kept in the market; and few even who do visit such places, give much thought, or if they do, will not take the time and be at the pains to go to the Book Store, or may conclude that they have so many demands upon their purse, they for the present adjourn the subject to some indefinite period.

The business of the Colporteur should be to canvass his district by families—sell to all that are able and willing to buy, some good, religious reading matter, directing attention to such works as he shall judge adapted to the condition of the family—and giving to those in want or needing—holding serious religious conversation and prayer with them—thus filling, in an important sense the office and doing the work of a Home

Missionary.

We have not mentioned the Bible seperately, but lest any should infer thence that we do not regard it as essential; we could not endorse any system or get up any catalogue of books for general distribution without beginning with the Bible—the

Bible first —the Bible always.

Notwithstanding the desirableness and importance of this work as it bears upon all the interests of society, socially, cirilly and religiously; and especially upon the destiny of the soul, as means in God's hand, your committee are not prepared to suggest any plans for the immediate action of the Convention in the premises; because with all the lights before them they fear it could not now be put into successful operation—should however a brighter financial prospect be revealed by the coming in of the Treasurer's report or be developed during the progress of the session, such action as the wisdoms of the body may take with a view of reaching the end proported would be gratifying to all who sympathize with the views here presented. Your Committee, however, would suggest

that under the peculiar circumstances by which we are surrounded, unless we shall have good reasons to hope for success, without endangering the stability and successful prosecution of the work already on hand, it would be best to suspend this until a more favorable period. Mean time our Missionaries may do a good work in the circulation of the Bible in their several fields of labor. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Report on Indian Missions.

We, your Committee on Indian Misssions, submit the follow-

ing report.

We have not supposed it necessary to present a discussion of the deeply interesting subject before us, but it becomes our duty to lay before you a series of facts bearing directly upon the relation which this body sustains to the enterprise of preaching the Gospel to the red men of the West. And we fear that some of these facts may startle you, and yet they are

facts which we must in some way meet.

In the fall of 1859, the Board of this Convention appointed Elder Isaac Read a Missionary to the Cherokee Indians and co-operating with the Domestic and Indian Mission Board at Marion, it was resolved to support him through, and send him out under the direct supervision of that Board; we becoming responsible to them for his salary each year, and they agreeing through their Secretary Bro. R. Holman, to furnish his outfit and traveling expenses, we hoping to be able to bear a liberal share of the said expenses.

At the same meeting your Board agreed to pay \$500 of the salary of Eld. A. E. Vandivere, who was sent to the Creek In-

plans.

Up to March 31st 1861, the Indian Mission Board at Marion paid to the salaries of these two Brethren the following sums which they had a right to expect from us.

From the above, and in view of all the circumstances, your Committee are of the cpinion that these brethren have been successful. They have prosecuted their work amid the greatest difficulties. They have been insulted, taunted, and threatened. Their greatest enemies have been Baptist Ministers, so called, in the form of Missionaries from the North. One, Mr. Jones, in this capacity, has given our Missionaries among the Cherokees great trouble, but the natives themselves, whose sympathies are with the South, rose up in their insulted majesty and drove him from their nation and he had to fice into Kansas for his life. C. Report on Sabbath Schools.

We the Committee appointed to present a Report upon the subject of Sabbath Schools, beg leave to Report, that we regret that the limited space of time allowed us to prepare a report has prevented us from presenting the claims of Sabbath Schools as fully as we wished. The Holy Scrip ures when properly studdied and searched are able to make wise unto salvation. We have seen Sabbath School pupils, whose knowledge of the Scriptures, was so far superior to others as should put to blush many old Professors. Give our children Bible knowledge, (which can be obtained more certainly in the Sabbath School then elsewhere,) and they will be guarded to a great extent from the influence of false teachers and false doctrines, and all the multitude of false "Isms" of the day. . In view of these and other important considerations which might be urged, your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution, to wit:

Resolved, by this Body that every Church in our bounds be requested to form, in their respective bounds, wherever the same has not already been done, a well organized Sabbath School and Bible Class, and that our Ministers be requested to urge the importance of the same upon their respective congregations.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGERS.

Your committee under the pressure of these times, feel the difficulty and responsibility of the management submitted to their care.

That there is a great work to be done none of us can doubt. But how to do that great work is, and has been our great concern. If the ministry in all this part of Ala., were ent loose from temporal pursuits, and had on the whole armor of God, who could tell what might be affected? In relation to money matters all feel concerned, about which your committee feel a delicate responsibility, still these things have been managed to the best of their ability. The missionary brethren employed before your last convention, were continued in their same fields of destitution with one exception, until about Oct., one was continued all the year. Portions of the same fields visited by these brethren are still destitute—the cry is send us preachers. Owing to the financial crisis and war troubles, we have no Agent this year. The brethren employed last year viz., Elders I. Scott, P. S. Montgomery, J. R. Steely and H. G. Smith, are not yet paid, we owe these brethren \$872 now, besides \$29,65 borrowed money.

The faith of your board in the liberality of the good brethren and sisters within our bounds influenced us to believe that we had only to send the Agent along and all would be right. But the money is not in hand. Hence we have no missioneries employed this year. Bro. N. D. Renfroe was elected Agent in Nov., he made an effort but finding hearts and money shut up he returned home and prudently resigned. We have settled with Bro. W. C. Mynatt former Agent. We refer you to Treasurers report, your Board are concious under the circumstances,

they have done the best they could.
