The holy scriptures which are able to make thee wise unto salvation, through faith which is in Christ Jesus. How can we search the scriptures unless we have them? They cannot make us wise unto salvation unless we study them. How important then that every family have a copy of God's word. Brethren,

are we not derelict of duty, for after fifty-one years of work within our territory we still have families without a Bible. Let us arouse ourselves to action, for sinners are dying every day.

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

If they are fostered, our ministry will be improved, and we will soon have men in the field equipped for the battle with error and sin. #### REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The moral training of the people depend in a large measure upon the Sabbath School. Most of our earnest, efficient, and christian workers are drawn from those who have been educated by faithful and conscientious Sabbath School teachers. The work of training our youth, then, is one full of interest to the christian, and fraught with mighty responsibility to the church. As has been truly said "The Sabbath School is the church at work." Here is an opportunity for the improvement of those talents which must otherwise lie dormant for want of a field in which to be exercised. The pliant minds of children no less than of adults, are here started with those truths and doctrines which will not only render them proof against the attacks of infidelity, but prepare them to meet and oppose those forms of error which are given in the light of religious truth but are no less fatal, because presented in a false garb.

It is with pleasure that we notice the steady growth of Sabbath Schools in our Association. Through the kindness of the worthy Secretary of the Sabbath School Convention, we report the number of Sabbath-school scholars 736 and 83 Teachers. May the Lord increase the zeal and efficiency of His servants, and may the good work continue until the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth.

The reports of the Evangelist and the Executive Board were read and adopted:

#### REPORT OF EVANGELIST.

I come before you with my final and last report. I resumed work March 2, 1886, and herewith submit report of my work.

Preached 58 sermons, delivered 12 addresses, visited 18 churches; baptized 3, received by letter 4, baptized in connection with my labors 3, received by letter 3, religious visits made to families 422, number of miles traveled 959. Books, Bibles,

Testaments and Hymn books sold 280, valued at \$256.00; Testaments and Bibles donated 3, price \$1.15.

I have received for missions from the churches \$49.15. I attended the State Convention at Birmingham, also the Sunday School Convention of the colored people. They appreciated the services rendered them, and were very liberal towards the colportage work.

They need help and ought to have it. I raised \$7.25, to assist in building Spring Hill Colored Baptist church. In my work I found quite a number of our churches without regular preaching. There is great need for a concert of action among our churches. I am happy to say I have been kindly received by the people. I have had good and attentive congregations. Notwithstanding the great financial embarrassment I have succeeded very well with the colportage work.

There is a great need in all our churches for our denominational works. We as a denomination are sleeping to a great measure in regard to pressing home to the hearts of our people those grand old doctrines of faith once delivered to the saints.

With this my report I commit back the work which you have entrusted to my care for the past two years.

I return thanks to the Executive Board for their encouragement and support; also the State Mission Board. As regards the future working, I submit it to the discretion of this body to say.

## REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We employed Elder J. G. Thornton as Evangelist and Colporteur, beginning March 1st and continuing seven months, during which time he has visited quite a number of our churches, visiting, preaching, and selling Bibles, Testaments and other good books to the people. He has been well and favorably received wherever he has gone and has done much good; but much remains to be done—in fact he has been unable to hardly enter the field, so great is the destitution among our churches. Owing to the large territory covered by our churches and the amount of work to be done it is out of the question for one man to perform the labor required of an Evangelist. It is deplorable to note the increased destitution within our bounds. The cause appeals loudly to our people for help, and unless something is speedily done there is a strong probability that several of our churches will have to close doors. The supreme question for your consideration is, how to meet the demand. May the Head of the church direct you in this matter.

On motion, *Resolved*: That realizing the importance of having a good plan in all our churches for the collection of missions we recommend to the churches of this Association the adoption of the “Envelope System” as proposed by the State Mission Board.



## The report on Missions was resumed and adopted :

### REPORT ON MISSIONS.

No christian can doubt the imperative obligation of the great commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." To comply with this great command of our Saviour, the means must be provided. We have the ability and opportunity to do and are held responsible, if we don't avail ourselves of the opportunity. This great work is rapidly progressing, and our denomination are becoming more and more intensified with this christian duty.

Your committee recommend that this subject be held prominently before our people by the pastors and churches, and that the duty of increasing our contributions be pressed home to every Baptist. The work that has been done and is being done by our State Mission Board should inspire us with greater zeal. During the last conventional year there were sixty-five employed for part or all the time by this Board. This Board has now forty employees, going into the waste places of our beloved State.

The work done by these faithful servants of God is as follows:—Days of service 2,620, miles traveled 56,000, addresses delivered 218, sermons preached 2,677, churches constituted 13, baptized 275, baptized in connection with thier labor 396, received by letter 252, received by restoration 52, Sunday Schools organized 190, books sold 2,243, value of the same \$1,429.12. Woman Mission Societies organized 18, Bibles and Testaments donated value of \$69.35, visits to families 4,649, visits to churches 634, preaching stations 103, subscriptions to Foreign Mission Journal 75, prayer-meetings held 429, meeting houses commenced 16, meeting houses finished 8, subscription to Alabama Baptist 86.

The State Mission Board has committed to it nearly all the interest of the denomination in Alabama: Namely, State Mission or Mission Work in Ala., Home Mission or Mission Work in the Southern States and the Island of Cuba, Foreign Missions or Mission Work in the regions beyond; Indigent Ministers, Bible and Colportage Work of the American Baptist Publication Society and the Evangelization of the colored people. Our Association is asked for the small sum of \$500 for all purposes. About twenty-five cents per member.

It certainly will be a reflection upon us if we do not heed the suggestion.

Report on Temperance, adopted :

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

This question is now agitating the minds of the American people to greater degree than at any time in the previous history of this country. The prohibition of the liquor traffic is now the great absorbing question, and has gained a position which commands the attention of the law makers of the land, as well as great cause for gratitude on the part of those who have so long and faithfully labored for its success.

Its present attitude before the politicians of the country is such that cannot be utterly ignored by them. It remains to be seen what will be done. It is rapidly becoming a political question in the Northern States, and it will not be many years before it will have to be met in the South. While we are doubtful as to the necessity or even propriety of a third or Prohibition party in the South, yet it becomes all true lovers and advocates of Temperance to exercise their franchise in selecting our legislators and executors of the law, with special reference to the promotion of this work.

We would therefore recommend that, for the present, the best policy to pursue is to keep the question constantly before our churches and the people, in our Sunday Schools and in our day schools, and vote for no man, for any office, who is addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors, or who is opposed to temperance, and such prohibition of the liquor traffic as the people and the demands of the times may require: for, by these means, if faithfully used, we feel constrained to believe that such legislation as may be necessary will be obtained at an earlier day, and in a much more satisfactory manner; than by abandoning the only political party from which relief will finally have to come. Situated as we are, with an element in our midst whose instincts and inclinations are naturally averse to a high and pure state of morals, we are unable, from the present stand point, to see how we are to be benefitted by a third party. Let us set our faces against church members who use intoxicating liquors other than medicine in urgent cases, and in anyway lend countenance or influence to this damnable business, or who will not, by precept and example, discourage and oppose their sale or use except in such cases as necessity actually requires.

Brethren, let us continue to work and pray for the day when the liquor traffic shall have been put under the ban of the law and the accursed evil shall no longer be felt in the land

## CIRCULAR LETTER;

WRITTEN BY ELDER H. B. CHAPPELLE.

“We believe that no minister has any right to administer the Ordinances of the Gospel unless he has been regularly baptized, called, and come under the imposition of the hands of a Presbytery.”—*Twelfth Article of Faith*.

We have here presented for our consideration: First—By whom should the Ordinances of the Gospel be administered? Second—How is he to become qualified for the performance of this important duty?

FIRST.—*By whom should the Ordinances of the Gospel be administered?* The Ordinances of the Gospel i. e. Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances exclusively within the church, for the first, baptism was recognized by our Divine Master, the same as was then being practiced by John the Baptist, for we find Him, just as He is about to commence His public ministry, demanding it at the hands of John, leaving us this solemn injunction: “Suffer it to be so now, for thus it becometh us to fulfill all

righteousness." And the Supper, Christ instituted as a memorial service, saying, "This do in remembrance of me." The passover had just been observed, the last that was ever rightfully held on earth: "For I say unto you," says Christ, "I will not any more eat thereof, until it be fulfilled in the kingdom of God." The Real has now come of which that was but the type or shadow—hence the change in the service. These ordinances are symbolic and can have a significance only to those who profess faith in Jesus Christ. To the church, and to the church alone has Christ committed these solemn rites. And the church does not delegate *any right* to the Minister or Elder in his ordination. He is but the qualified or official servant of the church, doing for her what she could not do in her collective capacity. It is the authority of the church that validates the ordinances, and not any mysterious efficacy in the administrator.

SECOND.—*How is he to become qualified for this duty?* First, He must have been regularly baptized; Second, He must have been called; and Third, He must have come under the imposition of the hands of a presbytery.

1. *He must have been regularly baptized:* This accords not only with Scripture, but with the history of the church from the Apostles to the present day. The church confers the rite of baptism and she does it by the hand of her accredited servant—the minister. The church can neither limit or extend this ordinance. Faith in Christ is absolutely essential for Scriptural or regular baptism. There must be unity of mode as well as unity of qualification to constitute regular baptism. Any essential element wanting either in subject or administrator would vitiate the act. Baptism is an act of obedience, hence voluntary and to be regular cannot be dependent on the will of another.

2. *He must have been called?* Of whom? Surely not of the church, but of God, as was Aaron. The church can give or confer only *authority*, but never the necessary qualifications. Neither can the combined Theological Seminaries of the land make a *gospel* minister. The ministry is not a profession, to be laid down or taken up at pleasure, for if so then our Seminaries might turn them out according to the law of supply and demand. What then is a call to the ministry? It can be nothing more, nor nothing less than a conviction of duty, a duty so engrossing, so permeating the heart as to cause each to feel "Woe is unto me, if I preach not the gospel." But how are we to know that we have been called of God to preach the gospel? Not from any outward manifestation, for it is an inward work, and like faith and regeneration each must answer for himself, its effects may be seen in the life, but surely fitness or adaptability for the work can never enter into the solution of the question. It is not a privilege but a duty impressed by the Holy Spirit upon the heart, the mind, the soul of every one truly called of God. Nothing less than this could impel the acceptance of a work of such fearful responsibilities. Now, how can any one who has been impressed with the duty of preaching the gospel refuse to discharge its duties? None should engage hastily in this work; and not until fully assured that "a dispensation of the gospel" is committed unto him. This may be known by the peace, the joy imparted to the conscience by discharging its duties. Still how often the question recurs "Who is sufficient for these things." We are but feeble instruments, "I have planted," says Paul, "Apollos watered but God gave the increase."

The work is not of man, yet "it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe." "For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish, foolishness; but unto us which are saved, it is the power of God." 1 Cor. 1:18. Faithfulness on the part of the minister, in whatsoever sphere God has placed him, should be of far greater anxiety to him, than the results; for these belongs to God. Then "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Matt. 28, 19, 20.

3. *He must have come under the imposition of the hands of a presbytery.* This is but a formal and solemn setting apart by the church of those whom she approves and confirms in the gospel ministry. The church alone bestows the ecclesiastical authority, and she does it by the hands of a presbytery—her official servants. The presbytery or counsel can exercise or bestow no authority apart from the church.

"That Christ," says a well known author, "invested His churches with all the functions and powers necessary for their self-existence and self-perpetuation no intelligent Baptist will deny. No church then is dependent upon bodies outside of herself for her religious teachers and the administrators of her ordinances. Each church then has divine authority to select and ordain her own officers, and is in no sense dependent upon the will or pleasure of another church or body for her officers. Any Scripturally appointed church can find a presbytery within her own membership to officiate for her in formally setting apart and conferring her authority upon one she has elected to preach the gospel." "No instance can be found in the New Testament where one church applied to another or to other churches for a presbytery to ordain for her a minister." "It is true if an apostate was present he doubtless assisted, by advice, in the work, but still it was the church that ordained or made the member an official servant." "Paul did not tell Titus to call in several ministers from sister churches in Crete when he commanded him to have elders appointed or ordained in all the churches of that island." These churches evidently ordained ministers to the full work of the ministry when they were without pastors themselves, or why this order of Paul to have them ordain one or more elders for each church in the city."

"Let it then be borne in mind that each church is possessed of all the ecclesiastical powers on earth, and she can therefore derive no additional power or authority should all the existing churches on earth act with her; also that the ordaining of a member to the full work of the ministry is an ecclesiastical act, and that a council, presbytery, Association or Convention is no church or part of a church, and possesses not a scintilla of ecclesiastical power or authority, and therefore can neither make nor unmake a minister, or dictate anything in connection therewith, but advise only when a church asks for advice."

"It is, we repeat and emphasize, by the sole authority of a church that a legal or Scriptural minister can be made,—ordained to the full work of the ministry. If then there can be a Scriptural church without a pastor, then she can perform all the functions of a church, and that there can be a church without a pastor is evident, since where there is no church no pastor is needed, and the organization must exist before its officers."

MINUTES OF THE 18TH SESSION OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION  
OF THE UNION BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, HELD WITH BETHEL  
CHURCH, AUGUST 27TH, 1886.

FRIDAY—The appointees being absent, by request, the Convention sermon was preached at 11 a. m. by Elder M. M. Wood.

After a short recess the Convention was called to order by the Secretary, in the absence of the President and, on motion, Bro. C. Richey was elected temporary chairman. The proceedings were conducted in accordance with program arranged by the committee.

Letters were received from 11 Schools and delegates enrolled.

C. Richey was elected permanent President, and W. G. Robertson Secretary and Treasurer.

Query No. 1. How shall we increase the spirit of beneficence in our schools? Opened by Elder M. M. Wood, and participated in by other brethren, after which it was laid on the table.

SATURDAY, 9 A. M.—After devotional exercises discussed Query No. 2. Who is responsible for the action of a Sabbath School? The discussion was opened by brother S. S. Thornton, and after a pleasant and profitable interchange of views, was answered as follows: The Church is responsible for the action of the Sunday School.

Query No. 3. What relation does the pastor sustain to the Sunday School—was opened by brother C. Richey. This Query elicited a warm discussion and was referred to brothers R. H. Foster and W. G. Robertson for answer. The Essay—The Force of Habit—was read by Miss Jennie Thornton, much to the delight and entertainment of the convention. On motion, the convention requested the publication of the Essay in the *Alabama Baptist*. 2. P. M. Devotional exercises. The report on temperance submitted by brother Hodo was discussed with much earnestness. The policy outlined advises to steer clear of political alliances, and by agitation in our churches and schools, educate the people to take a high stand against the liquor traffic, and when called upon to vote to select only those who will reflect the sentiments of the people and give us wholesome legislation on this subject.

Query No. 4. Is the Influence of Sabbath Schools increasing with the people—was opened and ably discussed by Dr. R. D. Lucius.

Secretary made report on Sunday School work. The report shows a decrease in the number of schools during the past year. One encouraging feature is that nearly all the schools are on a more permanent basis and self sustaining. There has been but little demand for aid, and most of those asking it have refunded the amount used.

On motion, Bro. J. L. Ray was authorized to labor with every church in the 4th District and make an effort to organize a school in each, and that he draw on the Treasurer for expense of his services and literature. On motion, *Resolved*, that the Secretary be instructed to secure the services of some competent man to visit the 1st and 2nd Districts and organize, if possible, schools in the churches where there are none; and that he be instructed to pay the said brother from the surplus fund now on hand. Adopted.

Next Convention Sermon to be preached by Elder J. H. Curry; alternate, Elder J. P. Lee. Missionary Sermon by Elder H. B. Chappelle, alternate, Elder M. G. Lofton.

Queries and Essays adopted for next convention, viz: *Query 1.* How can we establish Sabbath Schools in those churches which have none? Opened by J. P. Barnett. *Query No. 2.* What are the moral and religious influences of a Sunday School? Opened by E. D. Willett, Jr. *Essay 1.* The Influence of Association, by Mrs. M. E. Gardner. *Essay 2.* The Importance of Early Religious Training, by D. C. Hodo.

The committee reported \$14 sent up by the schools. Amount collected on Sabbath was \$14.

The next session of the Convention will be held with Hebron church, commencing Friday before the 5th Sabbath in July, 1887. D. C. Hodo and S. Hildreth appointed committee on programme. W. G. Robertson was requested to conduct the Sunday School exercises on Sabbath. Elder J. S. Dill of the Tuskalooosa Association was requested to preach the Missionary Sermon to-morrow.

Ordered that the Constitution be published in the Minutes.

Returned thanks to the brethren and friends for hospitalities shown during the Convention.

The Convention adjourned.

## CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF DECORUM.

Article I. The name of this society shall be the SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION OF THE UNION BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Art. II. Its object shall be to organize Sabbath Schools within the bounds of said Association, and co-operate with the Alabama State Baptist Sunday School Convention.

Art. III. It shall be composed of such members as the various Baptist Sabbath Schools, or churches within the bounds of said Association may annually elect. Every Baptist Sunday School, having a permanent organization, shall be entitled to three delegates, and every Baptist Church where there is no Sabbath School, to two delegates.

Art. IV. The officers shall be a President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall discharge the duties usual to such offices, and hold their offices until their successors shall have been elected.

Art. V. This Convention shall meet annually at such time and place as shall from time to time be appointed.

Art. VI. This Constitution may be altered or amended by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any regular annual meeting. The parliamentary rules applicable to deliberative assemblies, shall govern this Convention whilst in session.

This Convention shall annually elect delegates to the Union Baptist Association, and to the State Sabbath School Convention.

Art. VII. All Baptist ministers, in good standing, residing within the bounds of said Association who may be present at any annual meeting, shall be ex-officio members of this Convention; and any such who may attend the annual meetings of the State Sabbath School Convention, shall be delegates thereto from this body.

Art. VIII. Officers of this Convention shall be elected annually by ballot of the members present, and a majority of all the votes cast shall elect.
