

MINUTES.

The delegates composing the Fifty-Sixth Annual Session of the Big Bear Creek Baptist Association, convened in the Baptist church, (Harmony.) Pleasant Site, Franklin Co., Ala., on Saturday, the 10th day of October, A. D. 1891, at 11 a. m.

Elder J. R. NeSmith preached the introductory sermon from I Corinthians, 15-14: "And if Christ be Not Risen, Then Is Our Preaching Vain, And Your Faith Is Also Vain."

After the services there was recess until 1:20 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment.

The former Moderator Elder J. S. Stocton called the Association to order.

On motion J. K. Bolton was appointed Clerk pro tem, the former Clerk being absent.

A hymn was sung.

Elder Joseph Shackleford led the Association in prayer.

Sabbath morning at 9 o'clock Sabbath-School, was opened by prayer by Brother J. S. Stocton. Pastor of Harmony Church, after singing, short lectures were delivered by the following brethern, J. S. REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Read and adopted as follows:

We your Committee on Education make the following report: "That, while education is not what it ought to be in the bounds of our Association, yet, we believe, our people are becoming more enthused on this subject, and are waking up to the fact that if the minds of our children are cultivated, and they are enabled to acquire useful knowledge that their condition in life will be better, and the whole people will be happier. We have found by experience, that certain conditions and sur-

roundings in life are desirable; and we believe that people are in better circumstances when surrounded by civilization; we dread the thought of a relapse into what history has characterized as the dark ages. Where the people are intelligent we look to find happy homes, a prosperous people, the observance of moral laws, the attitude and a disposition toward progress, a higher order of morality, and a higher conception of happiness. We have found that without education man suffers from the observance of the laws of his nature. If he does not know how to think correctly, he cannot act correctly, and, if he is unac-. quainted with the great laws of physiology and hygiene which are now being taught in our schools in connection with the usual branches, he must ever remain ignorant of the great laws of health, which are so necessary to the promotion of happiness and longevity of life, and he must even suffer the penalty of a violation of these laws. This being the case from a remporal stand point, and as it is obvious that man cannot teach these things without being educated, then how much more important that the teacher in Scriptural things be educated, that he may be thoroughly prepared for the great duties which lie out before him. We, therefore, recommend to your consideration the importance of an educated ministry. That the Man of God may be perfect thoroughly in all good works.

Brethern, we recommend that who can will patronize the High School, originated by your committee. The school is located at Pleasant Site, Franklin Co., Ala. In order that it be the institution that you would like it to be, it needs your influ-

ence, your co-operation and patronage.

We also endorse the preamble and resolutions as suggested by the Liberty Association, and adopted by the Mussel Shoals Association, as to the propriety of locating a school of high grade for the education of boys, somewhere in the jurisdiction of Liberty, Mussel Shoals, Big Bear Creek and Florence Associations. We recommend that this Association adopt these preambles and resolutions and that Brothers J. S. Stocton, J. T. Bolding and J. M. Douthit be appointed as a committee to act with the committees appointed by the other Associations in regard to the location of the school.

HIGH GRADE SCHOOL.

The following report was read and adopted:

We, your committee, appointed to start a High Grade School in the bounds of the Big Bear Creek Association, make the following report: At our last report we had located the school at

Pleasant Site, Franklin Co., Ala. We have employed Prof. Wade Smith, at a stated salary of \$40 per month, as the principal teacher in the school. School commenced the 1st Monday in December, 1890, and continued five months, with an enrollment of 54; average attendance 34. The tuition fee that we had established paid the expenses with a surplus of \$33.27. The next term of the school to begin on Monday, the 16th day of November 1891.

We, your committee on Temperance, make the following

report: The cause of temperance is fast growing. But intemperance is a national curse. Alcohol is the inventor of crime, destroyer of the body and soul. Intemperance cuts down youth in its vigor, manhood in strength, and age in its weakness. Alcohol burns up men, consumes women, destroys life, curses God and despises Heaven. Whisky poisons morals, whips out National honor, causes the world to languish at the sin it has wrought. It is the sum of all violence, the father of all crime, the mother of abomination, the devil's best friend and God's worst enemy, and, Brethern, we, as God's dear children, should use all effort to put down the curse of intemperance.

SECOND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

The report of the committee on Destitution was read, adopted and discussed by Brethern F. M. Jackson, W. C. Summers, J. R. NeSmith and J. S. Stocton.

We, your committee on Destitution, make the following report: There has been a great work done in destitution during the past year, but still there is much to be done, to occupy all the ground. There is a great work in the northeast part of the Association, east of Tuscumbia and Spring Creek to the river and county line. Our missionary, J. R. NeSmith, has supplied these points of great importance, to-wit: Mt. Moriah, Auburn Hill and Pleasant Spring.

During the past year there has been a great work done south and north of Cedar Creek, by W. C. Summers; and in the west by Brethern J. S. Stocton and F. M. Jackson of which we are proud. Still there is great destitution from the county line east, and down the south part of the Association to the state line, and in the west from the south to the Tennessee River, north then up the river to Tuscumbia. We see this large field of destitution all ready to harvest, and we pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth more laborers in the destitutions, to gather the

precious sheaves from all this land of ours, all of which we respectfully submit.

I was engaged 18 days, preached 18 sermons, traveled 150 miles, had the help of Brother W. M. Whitlock 6 days and for that time I ask the Association to pay Brother Whitlock. We received one church, baptized four, restored by letter one.

I was engaged 37 days, sermons preached 36, exhortations 25, prayer meetings 8, baptized 2, witnessed professions 30, held protracted meetings 6, organized churches 2, miles traveled 240, family visits 46. Elder J. W. Jones assisted me 9 days, Elder J. O. A. Pace, 4 days; Elder J. E. Miller, 4 days.
