MINUTES.

The fifty-sixth annual session of the North River Baptist Association convened with the Day's Gap church, Walker county, Ala., on Saturday, September 27th, A. D. 1890.

At 11 o'clock A. M. the introductory sermon was preached by Eld. L. B. Harbin. Text: "Son, go work to-day in my vineyard."—Matthew 21:28.

After preaching a recess was given until 2 o'clock P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2 o'clock P. M. the delegates reassembled. Our former moderator being absent, Eld. L. M. Bradley was elected Moderator, pro tem, and after devotional services, was called to order.

The Constitution, Articles of Faith, and Rules of Decorum were read by S. Lacy.

On motion, the regular order of business was suspended to hear the Report on Temperance, and after discussion by S. Lacy and others, was adopted:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to report, That while the cause of Temperance has not, and perhaps will never accomplish all that we could wish, and while prohibition laws have not prohibited in many instances as they should yet when we contrast the present condition of our country with the past

we can but see that great good has been accomplished, and is still being accomplished by our prohibition and local option laws. We hear some say, and members of the church too, that they favor a repeal of our prohibition laws because they are violated. With the same propriety they might say they oppose the law against murder, because men continue to commit murder. The question for us is not whether the prohibition laws are violated, but whether or not our peaceful and prosperous country would be better with a grog shop in every town and village and at every cross roads where the whisky seller saw fit to hang out his alluring sign, to tempt the poor wreck who has fallen a victim to strong drink and who is fighting with herculean strength to repel the temptation. We need not dwell upon ravages, wastes, crimes, devastated homes, blighted lives, crowded prisons, etc., caused by intemperance. That is admitted by all good and thoughtful men. The question which confronts us is how best to promote the interest of Temperance. We think the best way to accomplish this is hold to all the prohibition we have and extend it where it is not, and do all in our power as parents, as teachers, as preachers, as churches and as citizens, by moral suasion and education to teach the rising generation to shun strong drink as they would a deadly foe. Let us fight the monster in every conceivable way, and prove our sincerity by a total abstinence ourselves.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We, your Committee on Sunday Schools, report as follows: We believe that the Sunday school interest is on the rising ground in our bounds. There may not be any more Sunday schools in number, but those that are at work are doing great and lasting good and are instrumental in bringing our young people to Christ. We have several largely attended and good working Sunday schools in our bounds, but not able to give exact number. Although our Sunday school convention has about gone down, but we hope it will be renewed. Let this good work spread all over our bounds. We recommend the Kind Words Series as a good Sunday school literature, and we recommend that it be bought through J. B. Collier, Secretary of the Book Depository, Opelika, Ala.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on State Missions respectfully report. We feel thankful to God that we have been so wonderfully blessed, the past year; we have had a missionary employed who has traveled and preached to the destitute in our bounds, and there is much yet to be done in this grand and glorious work that now lies out before us. We recommend that our Executive Committee select and employ a suitable man to travel and preach the Gospel to the destitute in our bounds, and that the Association raise money sufficient to pay said missionary for his services.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

We your committee on Home Missions beg leave to report that we can not arrive at any correct amount of Home Mission funds that have been collected this associational year, from the fact that some of our churches have sent up their collections to the State Mission Board, and some have their collections on hand and ready to turn over to the committee and we do not know the amount in the hands of the treasurer. And yet we are deeply impressed with the fact that we are doing little to bring our people to the Lord. The native white people of our own land should have the first place in our affections and interest. To their evangelization should be directed the earnest effort of every lover of our country. While our prayers should go out in sincere desire for the salvation of millions of heathen who know not God, and while we labor to bring to light and truth the people of other lands, we must not lose sight of our own fields. Here we are face to face with thousands of our own native people who know not God, and thousands of foreigners from other nations who must be evangelized by us as Christian people or remain in sin and wickedness.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on Foreign Missions, respectfully submit the following report: Foreign Missions are the only means by which the world can be christianized. All other missions are subordinate and only lead up to the Foreign Mission spirit. The heathen are as lost as ever. The Bible plainly teaches that all mankind have their origin from Adam, and on account of his transgression all are lost. Christ himself has said, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life; no man cometh to the Father, but by me." "This is the only name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved." These scriptures, so plain, clear and decisive, seem to settle this question forever. It is not a matter of speculation or philosophy, but of revelation exclusively, and there cannot be two opinions as to what the Bible teaches on this point. The latest report give the following statistics, viz: Of the 1,500,000,000 people in the world, one-third are nominally christians. Of China's 300,000,000, there are 75,000 in Christian communities. Of India's 250,000,000, about 700,000; of Japan's 35,000,000 about 15,000; of Siam's 8,000,000, about 3,000; of Tartary's 20,000,000, about 100,000; of Persia's 7,500,000, about 5,000; of Africa's 200,000,000, about 600,000; American Mission field add 700,000, and the Isles of the Sea 400,000 more identified with Christian institutions, and so we have a grand total of 2,600,000, who in the whole mission field are either converted, or adherents of Christian churches. We have in the field 40,000 teachers and ordained ministers, dividing the number of heathen by the number of laborers, we find that there are 30,000 heathen to every laborer. These men see that the work is too great for them and they are calling for help. "Shall we, whose souls are lighted with wisdom from on high—shall we to men benighted, the lamp of life deny?" The Foreign Mission Board has done a grand work in sending the GOSPEL to those benighted lands, but it cannot work without money. The above startling facts should bring the subject of MISSIONS TO OUR OWN HOMES AND FIRESIDES, and enjoin upon us with solemn emphasis, that in proportion as we value the blessings of the Gospel, in the same proportion are we under the most obligations to send it to other countries. We most earnestly urge our ministers to teach the churches in their care their duty in regard to Foreign Missions, and EACH CHURCH of this Association to con-

tribute something for Foreign Missions at the next session of the North River Association.

At 1:30 o'clock, p. m. met pursuant to adjournment, and after singing and prayer by Eld, G. E. Brewer, was called to order.

RESOLUTION.

In order to continue and promote the good of missions that are being carried on in our Association, State, home and abroad, we ask that the following resolutions be passed and carried out, to-wit:

1. RESOLVED, That we undertake to raise for missionary purposes the coming year \$400.00, the amount suggested to us by the State Mission Board, to be divided, as follows: State Missions, \$200.00; Home Missions \$100.00; Foreign Missions, \$100.00.

2. RESOLVED, That this shall in no sense be regarded as a tax, but a request that the churches try to raise these amounts.

3. RESOLVED, That a committee of five be appointed to apportion the amount out to the churches and their report be printed in the minutes. Offered by G. D. O'Rear.

In accordance to the above resolution, the Moderator proceeded to appoint a committee to apportion to the churches the amount requested by the State Board for our Association to raise, to-wit: G. D. O'Rear, J. F. McDuff, R. A. Baker, J. P. Mooney and M. J. Lunkin; W. T. Rutledge and D. J. Files were added.

On motion, suspended regular order of business for the purpose of hearing report from Jno. H. Pool, Missionary for this Association. Said report was read and adopted.

REPORT OF JNO. H. POOL, MISSIONARY OF NORTH RIVER ASSOCIATION. RENDERED SEPTEMBER 29TH, 1890.

Brewers and others, was adopted.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

We, your Committee on Religious Literature, report as follows: We recommend the Kind Word Series as a Sunday school literature, and we recommend that our brethren of our Association, in buying any religious books, buy them from our book depository at Opelika, Ala., from J. B. Collier, We recommend as religious newspapers, the Alabama Baptist printed at Montgomery, Ala., Hare & Pope, proprietors, and the Home Field, printed at Atlanta, Ga., and the Foreign Mission Journal, printed at Richmond, Va., and the State Mission Quarterly, printed at Marion, Ala. These four papers will cost \$2.25 for one year. Brother, can't you pay this amount, for four good religious newspapers? You know that your only excuse is, I am not able to pay so much. We answer this excuse and say that a member of the Baptist Church that is not willing to pay this amount for four good religious newspapers for one year has not got much interest in religious literature, and we hereby urge upon all our people the great importance of placing religious literature in their families. We also recommend the American Baptist Publishing Society, and we state that they publish a good Sunday School Literature.

MORNING SESSION.

At 8 o'clock a. m. met pursuant to adjournment. and after singing Rock of Ages and prayer by Z. J. Amerson, was called to order. Then on motion the regular order was suspended for the purpose of hearing the Report on Documents. Report was read and after being discussed by L. B Harbin, G. E. Brewer and others was adopted.

RÉPORT ON DOCUMENTS.

We, your Committee on Documents, report that we find from Macedonia church, a paper in memory of our beloved Brother, the late Dr. James L. Gilder deceased, which we recommend be inserted in the minutes of this Association.

We also find three queries from Mt. Joy church, which we think proper to consider.

1. In answer to the first question, it is the opinion of your committee, that no member should be excluded from a church for drunkenness, or any other offense, without a fair and impartial trial, but from the best information obtained, Bethabara church is justifiable for its action in the case referred to in said query.

2. We think the annexed letters are in sufficiently good form, and a church would do right to receive members on such letters.

3. We think it good discipline to exclude a person at his or her own request who is guilty of a public offense, without preferring a charge against him or her

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We, your Committee on Education, recognizing the fact that Education is one of the greatest agencies that Christians have for the elevation and improvement of the human family. Therefore, it behooves us a great Christian Family, to avail ourselves of the present opportunities, which are great to educate. We recommend that as far as possible, every church have good schools established in the vicinity in which they are located. The future of Alabama, absolutely demand an ONWARD and UPWARD movement in this direction. By raising the standard of education in this State and making it of increased interest to the people, we will be the better able to educate our own children and the orphans of our country and place it in easy reach of our entire family, to obtain an english education. We not only recommend Howard College as an institution of learning, but an institution that belongs to and should be upheld and fostered by the Baptists of Alabama. However, we congratulate the Baptists on the rapid progress they have made in their educational interest. We recommend to our brethren that they send their sons to Howard College for the purpose of fitting them for the battle of life. But we must say that there is one lamentable fact that some of our denomination don't patronize our denominational schools, as we think they should. We must be united on the Schools and Colleges controlled by the Baptist if they be a grand success, for in unity there is strength. We also recommend the Judson Female Institute for the education and accomplishment of our daughters.

TRIBUTE OF RESPECT.

We, the Baptist church of Christ at Macedonia, Eldridge Ala., ask space in your minutes for a tribute of respect to our beloved brother, Dr. James L. Gilder. He has some time since passed over the River, but the remembrance of his loving life still remain and ever will be fresh on our minds. He was born in Georgia, July 12th, 1829. His father, Sennot Gilder, and mother Francis Gilder, moved to Chambers county, Ala., during his early boyhood. At the age of sixteen he embraced faith in Christ and joined the Baptist church at Sardis. In the early part of his life he attended the Medical College at New Orleans, afterwards at Atlanta, Ga. He married Miss Mary A. Suttle, Sept. 20th, 1855. He moved to Walker County, Alabama, December 20th, 1865. Since then, we have always found him in the path of duty, as a citizen and as a brother. He was a devoted father, a pious christian, and was ever ready to do his Master's will. "pointing sinners to the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world." We cannot help but recall to memory his last hours; how calmly, how fearlessly he faced death, as a soldier of the Cross, placing his all with God.

He was the pastor of our church until the Lord called him from his labors. He died April 28, 1890, aged 60 years, nine months and 16 days. We miss him as a kind neighbor, we miss him in our Sabbath school, our prayer meetings and most of all as our pastor. We express our heartfelt sympathy for the bereaved family, and invoke the blessings of God to rest upon them in their desolation. May they emulate his holy life, and by the mercies of God meet him on the sunny banks of sweet deliverance. Amen.
