AFTERNOON SESSION.

Association met. After prayer the discussion on Education, Minsterial E lucation and Institute work was resumed, and participated in by G. E. Mize, C. W. O'Hara and Dr. E. B. Teague, and the reports adopted.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

It has been said that the stability of any government depends upon the intelligence of its citizenship; and by an intelligent citizenship, it means one that has something more than mere mental culture. It means one that has physical and moral culture as well, and one that appreciates the exalted priviliges of republican form of government.

Man's environments largely influence his life. If they are whole-

some, they inspire him with hope and open up to him the splendid possibilities of his existence. It is frequently the case that a person has no desire for a certain thing, until he sees his neighbor possessing that thing; and then the very fact that his neighbor does possess it, stimulates him to seek after the same thing. And what is true of ordinary things is also true of education. Establish a good school in a community, with an intelligent man at its head, and you furnish inspiration to every man and woman, every boy and girl. But the school simply furnishes the foundation. No one person can make it a success, it requires the united support of every one.

Bishop Vincent says: "That is indeed an ideal community where the best men and women, church pastors and Sunday school leaders are a unit in the appreciation and service of the public school. In the public school a majority of our children will get all the training they will ever have, and how important then, that we make our public school the very best school possible! To do this, we must employ not only edu-

cated, but Christian men and women to instruct the young.

Brethren of this association, those of you who are parents, make yourself felt by giving the teachers your hearty sympathy and co-operations, and the public schools of our land will furnish men and women who will serve their country faithfully, bless humanity, and honor God. If your son, after having completed the common school course wants to finish his education, send him to Howard College, if it be your daughter, send her to the Judson. At these institutions they will have every advantage necessary to fit them for a life for usefulness. We heartily commend these idstitutions to you and urge you to give them your full support.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

It is a divine requirement that the Gospel shall be committed to faithful men, "who shall be able to teach others also," When Paul recognized or saw the gift of Timothy to preach the Gospel, he said to

him, "Stir up the gift of God which is in thee,"

As the soil of the earth is stired up or cultivated and thereby made to bring forth fruit, some 30, some 60 and some an hundred fold, so it is with the man, who is called of God to preach the Gospel by his education, the shade of nature or the darkness of ignorance is removed, and through the furrows of his mind the seeds of divine truth fall into his heart which is warmed by the "Sun of Righteousness" and the man is "able to teach orthers also."

God created the steel, but man can sharpen it. "Iron sharpeneth iron; so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend," Prov. 27:17. In the devices of mischief, the tongue is made keen as a sharp razor,

working deceitfully, Ps. 52:2. Who then would dare to argue illiteracy

for the preacher of the glorious Gospel of the Son of God.

The Baptists of Alabama are educating their young preachers in Howard College. We are collecting from our churches funds for Ministerial Education. I submit to the Shelby Association the following plan for Ministerial Education and this to become the system of every Association in the State:

"Instead of raising funds for Ministerial Education, you raise funds for associational missions and use such funds to employ a young preacher from Howard College to do mission work during the summer in this Association. And I recommend to you brother H. R. Arnold, of Six Mile, and D. R. Jackson as the young men to be employed next summer for half the time each. The time of service is to be three months. The amount to be paid for their services is one hundred dollars."

Let us look at some of the advantages of this system over the old plan. By this plan the Association will receive the benefit of the missionary work done by the beneficiary in the Association. The young preacher will be kept in the ministry and will be allowed to work his way through school. His duty will be to organize Sunday-schools and work up the destitution in general. There will be placed in his hands copies of our periodicals that he will leave in the homes of the people who do not read them.

Feed men's minds on wholesome food and you make them stronger,

better and happier.

To the end then that we may gladden our homes and furnish them food for thought, allow your committee to suggest that the Alabama Baptist have a place. Through it we are kept in touch with our denominational work of the State—we get inspiration from seeing what others are doing, and we find out what we ought to do.

The Baptist Standard and the Western Recorder are excellent papers also, some of the ablest men of the Baptist denomination contribute articles to them every week, which renders them very valuable aid in almost all kinds of church work.

The home with these or similar papers in it, is well supplied with wholesome reading matter.

The reports on State, Home and Foreign Missions were discussed by I. Windsor. Rev. W. B. Crumpton addressed the Association on the subject of missions, after which the reports were adopted.

REPORT ON STATE MISSION.

The State Mission Board has done good work the past year. Has gone into the destitute places of the State, preaching the word of God, building houses of worship, strengthening weak churches here and there, by supplementing their pastors salary. Brother Crumpton is active and progressive, and inspires those under him to greater activity, and they have done and will do great things for Alabama, if the churches that are organized and are able to give to State Missions will do their duty. The demands made upon State Mission work each year is greater as the foreigners, and immigrants comes amongst us. A large proportion of these people know not the way of the Lord, and if left to themselves, will be a menace to the people of God. We must meet this demand, and enable the State Mission Board by our contributions regularly coming from each church, to have the truth preached in its purity and power. May the day soon come when God's people shall realize that helping others to believe on Christ is mission work.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Home Missions beg leave to report that during the year 671 missionaries have been employed, against 653 last year. Baptisms this year, 5,596 against 6,552 last year.

They have organized 693 Sunday schools, with 24,675 teachers and pupils this year, against 512 schools, with 14,768 teachers and pupils

last year.

During the past year the Board has aided in supporting sixty six missionaries in Indian Territory; forty-eight in Oklahoma Territory, one hundred and seventy one in Texas. The Board has spent in this work during the past year as follows: In Indian Territory, in cash \$4,748.20; in boxes \$6,392.52. In Oklahoma Territory, in cash \$2,843.66; in boxes \$7 768 88. In Texas in cash, \$6,780.30; in boxes, \$8,668.00.

The total amount of cash received during the year for the regular work of the Board has been \$75,366.68 In addition to this the Board has received a special annuity gift of \$4,000, which makes the actual amount of cash received \$79,366.68. All of the States, except one,

show an increase in cash contributions over last year.

Much good has been done in this work; but God requires more every year in this great field. People are coming to our land from most all countries of the world, and we must meet them with God's word and Christianize them or they will foreignize our children. Let's hold what we have and gain all we can.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

There is no department of our work that appeals to us more strongly, or has been more largely blessed of God, than our foreign mission work. Christ himself was our first great missionary, sent from the Father to save, or at least make a way for the salvation of the world. Before leaving the world He gave that greatest of all commissions; "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature, and Lo I am with you all the way." "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." They went forth and preached everywhere. From the day of Christ to the present time, the spirit of missions has thrilled the hearts and minds of the civilized world. Modern protestant missions may be said to have begun with the work of William Cary, a Baptist shoemaker, who caught the spirit while working at his bench, and reading the New Testament

In 1794, Cary went to India as a foreign missionary, and founded a Baptist mission in Sarampore. From that time until the present day, the foreign work has been widening, until to day there are few places that have not been reached by the gospel. The recent troubles in China have caused much discussion and anxiety about the work

there, but we must remember that "God works in mysterious ways," and we have faith in Him, that He is going to more thoroughly and effectually open up this great country for the Gospel, than it has ever been before. The Sun of Righteousness is blazing upon China to-day as it never has, and this great empire, of more than four hundred million of people, will soon see her false religion die. China for Christ; Africa for Christ; the world for Christ. "Ask of me and I will give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." The missionary spirit is so strongly entrenched behind the sacrad Scripture, that it cannot be successfully attacked till a thousand declarations of the Bible are obliterated. The man who does not believe in foreign missions certainly does not understand the spirit and mission of Christ, for He says "the world is the field." The harvest truly is great, and the reaping has been great, but still the fields are white.

Our workers have pressed forward in faith and hope, harmony and zeal, and their labors have been largely blessed. Last year we reported 845 baptisms, the largest number in the history of our work. This year we report 1,341. Thus it is shown while we resolved to increase the work 25 per cent., the Lord honored our purpose of heart, and gave us an increase of over 50 per cent. on the foreign field. To get an idea of the wonderful blessings of recent years, let us remember that for over fifty years previous to 1896, we had in foreign lands a living membership of 3,801; in the last three years there have been added by baptism 2,887. We now have in foreign countries, including China, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Japan 113 churches; 94 missionaries; 29 ordained native helpers; 104 unordained native helpers, and a membership of 6,537.

The Board reported no debt at the last convention, having raised \$140,102.30 for the work. Our fathers worked in faith, and laid a good foundation, and we are building thereon. May our energy and zeal know no bounds till the kingdoms of this world shall become the king-

doms of our God and His Christ.

The committee on Orphan's Home failing to report, the Clerk was requested to prepare a report, which is as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHAN'S HOME.

Our Orphan's Home was opened March 8th, 1893; two days latter first children were received into it. 136 children have found shelter in the Home. They came from 30 counties as follows: Autauga 2; Barbour 8; Bibb 2; Bullock 1; Butler 3; Chambers 4; Conecuh 2; Covington 8; Dallas 4; Elmore 4; Escambia 11; Hale 3; Henry 4; Jack-

son 1; Jefferson 15; Lamar 1; Lee 10; Limestone 1; Marengo 4; Mobile 2; Monroe 4; Montgomery 8; Morgan 3; Pike 2; Russell 4; Tallapoosa 2; Talladega 10; Tuscaloosa 9; Walker 6. Of these, two boys and four girls have died, two boys have been apprenticed, two boys and one girl have been irregularly discharged; thirteen boys and eighteen girls have been returned to their people, and fifteen boys and fourteen girls have been adopted, leaving in the Home at present 29 boys and 36 girls. The property is worth about \$10,000.00.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Dear Brethren, there are in Alabama, 78 associations, 1,766 churches, 128,156 members, 775 Sunday-schools with 40,783 scholars, Thus you see that more than half of our churches have no Sabbathschool. At least 80 per cent, of our church members take no interest in the Sabbath-school. Not one in every five of our church members attend Sunday-school. These facts are appauling, but they are true. Why this want of interest? We mention one or two factors that work evil to our schools. 1. A lack of wise directorship. In most churches where a school is run, the pastor and the leading members leave it to run itself. Whereas, it should be under the special direction of the church and under the personal supervision of the pastor. 2. Woeful ignorance of the needs and requirements of the Sunday-school on the part of pastors and church members generally, 3. In efficient teachers. There is a mighty dearth of real teachers. The great problem which confronts us to-day, is how to awaken a deeper interest in our Sundayschool work. We venture a few suggestions. 1. Let our pastors depend less on appealing to the emotions of their hearers and give more attention to teaching and having God's word taught to the people. Let us follow the example of Massachusetts, Nebraska, North Carolina and New Hampshire, and organize a State Sunday-school convention. Let a convention be organized in every Association, and then a general State convention. 3. Let us send out a general Sunday-school Missionary, whose duty it shall be to look after the Sunday-school interest in every section of the State.

Your committee would recommend to all the churches the periodicals published by our Sunday school Board at Nashville. These periodicals are to be commended for the emphasis put upon the missionary enterprises of our Southern Convention, as well as fastening the Spirit

of World wide evangelization.

We believe that temperance is growing each year, and that the most powerful instrumentality that could be brought to bear, to suppress and overcome it would be for church members to abstain from the use of intoxicants and thereby set an example for young men and boys. Thus only can they exhibit the fact that they are a peculiar people in this respect as well as in others.
