BETHEL BAPTIST CHURCH, Fort Deposit, Lowndes Co., Ala., October 7, 1864.

The Delegates from the Churches composing the Alabama Association convened with the Bethel Church, according to appointment.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder B. H. Crumpton from Nehemiah 6: 3—"Why should the work cease?"

After a short recess the Delegates re-assembled, and the business of the Association was opened with singing, and prayer by Bro. Thornton. The Clerk being absent, G. W. Thomas was appointed Clerk pro tem. The Letters from the Churches being called for, were read by Brethren Lundy, Waller and Lloyd, and the names of the Delegates enrolled, as follows:

Returning of correspondence postponed till to-morrow morning. Committee on Religious Exercises reported: Bro. Thornton to preach at the Stand to-morrow morning at half past 10; Bro. Walne to close.

A Committee consisting of Brethren Lundy, Bailey, Armstrong, Bishop and Jordan, was appointed to inquire into the condition of the destitute families of soldiers.

The Committee on Colportage reported through Bro. Waller; which report was adopted. [See Appendix A.]

The Treasurer's report from Colportage Committee was referred to the Auditing Committee.

Adjourned till 9 o'clock to-morrow morning. Prayer by Bro. Haw-thorne.

#### SATURDAY MORNING, 9 o'clock.

The meeting of the Association was opened with singing, and prayer by Bro. Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

At 10 o'clock suspended business to engage in prayer for our country. At half-past 10, by a previous resolution the Association gave way for the meeting of the Sunday School Society. At half-past 12 o'clock P. M. the Association resumed business.

Adjourned one hour for dinner.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Association was called to order.

The Committee on Missions being about, Bro. Waller presented a preamble and resolutions, which were read and adopted. [See Appendix B.]

Bro, Sumner, being invited, presented the claims of the Domestic and Indian Mission Board.

A collection was taken for Foreign Missions, amounting to \$161 55. Voted to appropriate \$200 to the Foreign Mission Board.

Suspended business at 2 o'clock for the meeting of the Bible Society.

At 3 o'clock the Association resumed business.

The Committee on Religious Services reported, that Bro. J. L. Lloyd preach to-night at 7 o'clock; Bro. Hawthorne to preach the Missionary Sermon at the Stand to-morrow morning at 10½ o'clock; Bro. Sumner to preach at the Stand at 2 o'clock to-morrow afternoon; Bro. W. E. Lloyd to preach at night; Bro. Walne to preach to the blacks at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning.

The same Committee also reported as follows for the next annual meeting of the Association: Bro. T. M. Bailey to preach the Introductory Sermon; Bro. J. A. Fonville, alternate. Bro. P. H. Lundy to preach the Missionary Sermon; Bro. C. F. Sturgis, alternate.

Voted to hold the next meeting with the Second Baptist Church in the city of Montgomery.

Committee on Documents reported through Bro. Walne. Received and adopted. [See Appendix C.]

By recommendation of this Committee, a day was set apart for fasting and prayer by the Churches of this Association, and the State Convention was requested to unite in its observance. Friday before the third Sunday in November was the day appointed.

Committee on State of Religion in the Churches reported through Bro. Crumpton, 'Received and adopted. [See Appendix D.]

Voted to spend a part of the half hour for prayer for the country in prayer and thanksgiving to God for the gracious outpouring of His Spirit, during the past year, upon the Churches of this Association.

Appointed Brethren Lee, Lundy and Barlow, a Committee to re-

port resolutions on the death of Bro. C. H. Cleveland; also on the death of Mrs. Tichenor, wife of Bro. Tichenor of Montgomery. W. W. Waller and G. W. Thomas were added to the Committee. [See Appendix E.].

The Treasurer's report was read by Bro. Thomasson, in the ab-

sence of Bro. Haralson. Referred to the Auditing Committee.

The Domestic Board of Missions in the Association, consisting of Brethren I. T. Tichenor, W. W. Waller, H. W. Watson, J. E. Bell and J. T. Jones, was continued another year.

Voted that when this Association adjourn, it adjourn till to-morrow evening at the close of the services at the Stand.

Bro. Crumpton presented the following resolutions, which were laid on the table till to-morrow evening:

Resolved, That one of the crying sins of this country has been the

neglect of the religious culture of our colored population.

Resolved, That the time has come when the voice of Southern Bap-

tists should be heard loud and unequivocal in favor of reform. Resolved, That one of the most fruitful and inviting fields for ministerial labor is among the slaves of the Sonth; one which we can

not neglect without incurring the displeasure of Heaven.

Resolved, That it is perfectly compatible with the safety of the country to allow our servants to assemble at our public places of worship, and that it should be permitted.

Resolved, That we recommend to the Churches composing this body, that they hold separate service for the benefit of the colored population of their respective communities.

Association adjourned. Prayer by Bro. Crumpton.

#### SABBATH.

In accordance with the report of Committee on Religious Exercises, Bro. Hawthorne preached at half-past 10 o'clock, to a large and attentive congregation at the Stand, from Hebrews xi: 16-"But now they desire a better country, that is a heavenly.".

At the close of the services a collection was taken up for Army Missions, amounting to \$1721 80 in cash, and \$4500 in pledges.

At 2 o'clock Bro. Wilkes presented the claims of the Orphan Asylum. A collection was taken amounting to \$148 90. Several thousand dollars were also pledged for the same object.

Bro. Walne preached to the blacks, and Bro. W. E. Lloyd preached at night.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON, 4 o'clock.

Association met. Singing, and prayer by Bro. Chambliss;

Clerk read the proceedings of yesterday.

Report of Committee on the death of Bro. Cleveland and Mrs. Tichenor was made by Bro. Lundy. Adopted. [See Appendix E.]. Report of Committee on Destitute Soldiers' Families was made by

Bro. Lundy. Adopted. [See Appendix F.]

Bro. Armstrong made a report for the Finance Committee, which was referred to Auditing Committee. Auditing Committee reported the accounts correct.

The resolutions presented on yesterday by Bro. Crumpton, in regard to the religious culture of slaves, were adopted.

Voted to pay the Clerk \$100 for his services. The balance of the Minute Fund to be used in printing Minutes.

Suspended business five minutes to take up a collection for the Sunday School Board, located at Greenville, South Carolina. \$119 25 collected.

The following resolutions were presented by Bro. Wilkes, and adopted:

Resolved, That the orphans of our deceased soldiers have not only a claim upon our sympathy, but upon our personal efforts to aid in raising and educating them; and that we recognize the claim, and will give of our means to provide for them.

Resolved. That the Orphan Asylum is an enterprise of the first importance, and demands the aid of the Baptists of the State of Ala-

bama.

Resolved, That the Pastors of the Churches of this Association be requested to place the subject of the Asylum before their Churches and congregations, and earnestly solicit their aid.

The following resolutions were presented by Bro. Waller, and adopted:

Resolved, That the manner in which our enemies have conducted this wicked and unjust war, and the avowed object for which it is waged, convince us more than ever of the necessity of separation from them, and strengthen our firm resolve never to submit, on any terms, to political union with them.

Resolved, That we renew to each other, to our fellow-citizens, and to the government of our choice, the solemn pledges of our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor, never to yield this struggle until the blessing of God shall crown our efforts with liberty and inde-

pendence.

Bro. Crumpton presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to the citizens of Fort Deposit and community for their kind hospitality during the session of this body.

After a fervent prayer by the Moderator, and the singing of the hymn-

"Blest be the tie that binds Our hearts in christian love,"

the Association adjourned to meet with the Second Baptist Church in the city of Montgomery, on Friday before the second Sabbath in October, 1865.

#### APPENDIX.

#### A

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COLPORTAGE.

The Committee on Colportage report: That the work assigned them has been performed to the best of their ability. Finding it impossible to get Bibles, Testaments or Tracts, for distribution in the hospitals, except such as were placed in the hands of the Committee at the last session of this body, and knowing the great demand for religious reading, the Committee, after mature deliberation, appropriated the six hundred dollars received from the Treasurer of this body, to the distribution of the "South-Western Baptist," and ordered the papers to be sent in response to calls made by the soldiers from this State. They then proceeded to take up a collection in each of the Baptist Churches in the city of Montgomery. From the First Church they received \$500—from the Second Church \$130.

They then ordered one hundred copies of the "South-Western Baptist" to be sent to Montgomery. The papers have been received, and have been distributed by the various missionaries of the Baptist denomination, who have labored in the hospitals in Montgomery.

In addition to the work done in Montgomery, the Committee placed in the hospital at Greenville one hundred and six volumes of books, and distributed about three hundred copies of minutes.

Resolved, That we deeply regret the failure of the Committee to report to this session of the Association.

Rescived, That the cause of Foreign and Domestic Missions demands our earnest prayers and liberal contributions, and that in this dark hour of war we should not falter nor relax our energies in the work, but should feel that our

obligations are increased, and that while the Lord is encouraging us we should be more faithful in laboring in His vineyard.

Resolved, That while we are cut off from our Foreign Missionaries, we will still make our usual contributions to that cause, and thereby show to the world that we are determined to sustain the work.

Resolved, That it is with profound gratitude to God that we have heard of the success of the Gospel in the Confederate Army, and our hearts have been made to rejoice and praise Him for His goodness in the conversion of so many of our brave men.

Resolved, That we will take encouragement from this evidence of answer to prayer and labor, and that we will in future make more vigorous efforts to sustain and increase the work of Army Missions.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DOCUMENTS.

Your Committee on Documents begleave to report, that the Benton Church reports the death of their venerable Deacon, Bro. W. Gresham, who, since the last session of your body, has been called from his field of labor upon earth to his reward in Heaven.
