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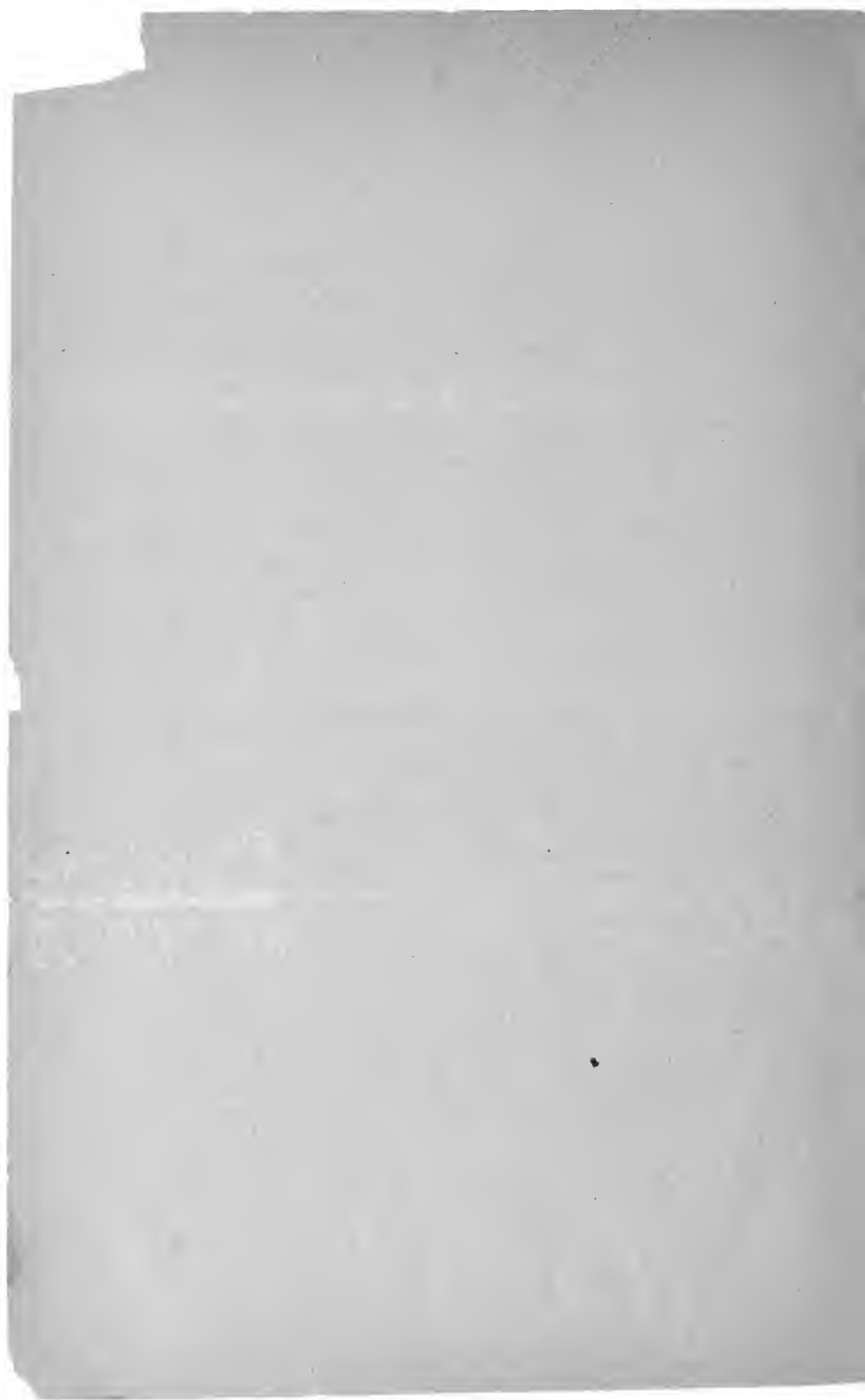

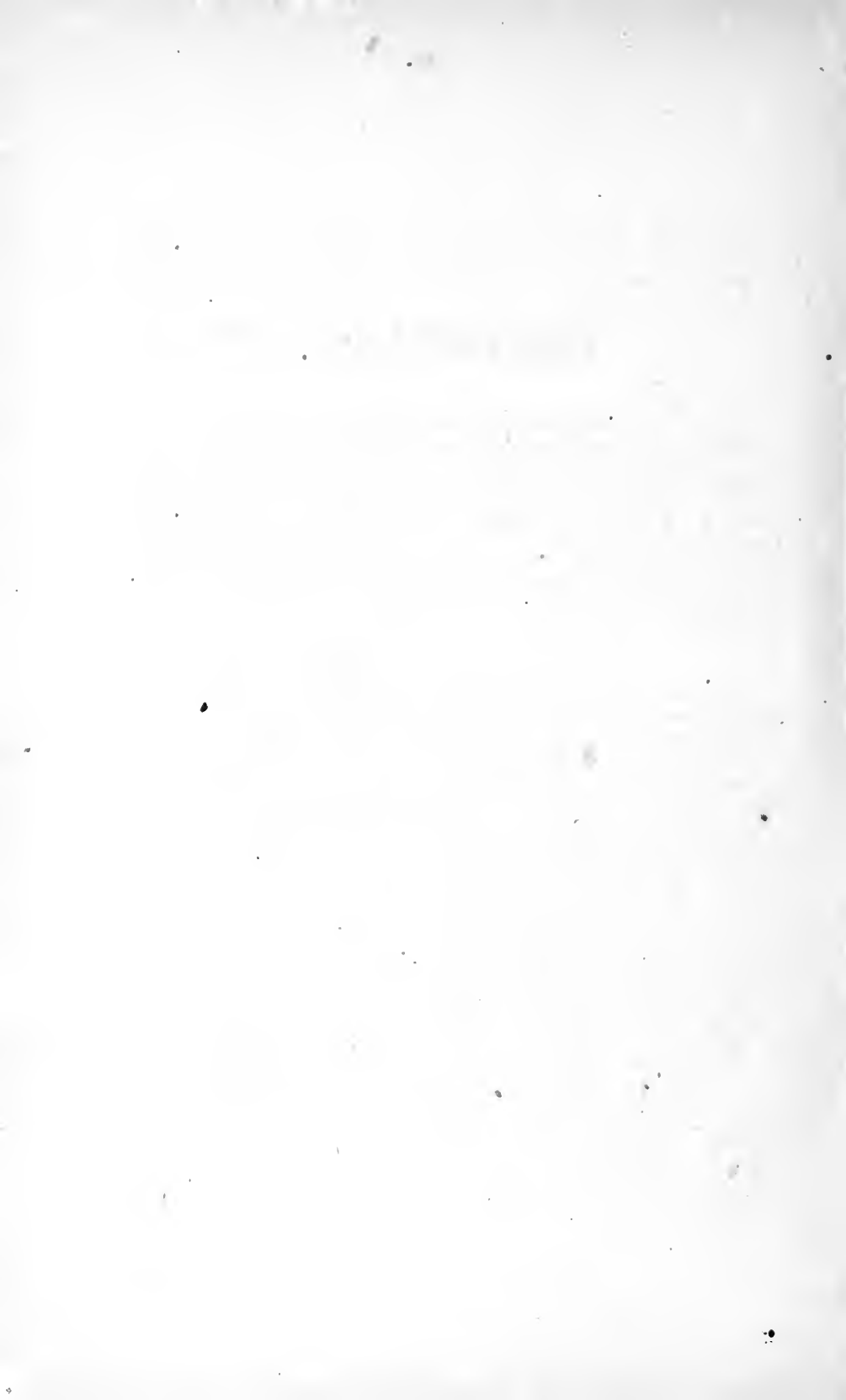

FIRST DAY—MORNING SESSION.

THE CHEROKEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION met with Mt. Vernon church, DeKalb county, Alabama, September 12th, 1893.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder J. R. Ramsey. Text, First Timothy, 3rd chapter and 15th verse. Prayer, J. H. Glazener.

At 1:30 p. m. the meeting was called to order by the Moderator. Read the 103rd Psalm and prayer by the Moderator.

Appointed Brethren J. A. Glen and S. H. Glazener to read letters from the churches.

On motion set aside the reading of the By Laws and Constitution. Called for petitionary letters and received two new

churches, Bivron and Corinth. Invited visiting ministers and brethren to seats. On motion agreed to not allow the name of Sam D. Monroe to go on the minutes as a delegate. Elected officers for the ensuing year—Elder J. B. Appleton, Moderator; C. C. Davis, Clerk.

On motion suspended the regular order of business to appoint Devotional Committee, as follows: C. C. Clayton, J. P. Reed, J. A. Garrett from the body with the pastor and deacons of this church. Called for correspondents and received Brethren H. A. Sims and Wm. Coplinz, from Cedar Bluff Association; and J. H. Glazener, from Etowah Association; J. A. Glen, Cahaba Valley Association, and in the interest of Howard College and Ministerial Education. Set 9 o'clock to-morrow morning to read reports on State, Home and Foreign Missions. Adjourned until 8:30 to-morrow morning. Prayer by Elder J. H. Horton. Preaching at the church at night by Eld. J. H. Glazener.

SECOND DAY—8:30 A. M.

Read 24th Psalm. Prayer by Elder E. Crawford. Appointed Committees on Nomination for this meeting: J. W. Lackey, B. C. Jones, D. D. Hughes, J. B. Wilbanks; on Finance, A. B. Tidmore, D. D. Hughes, R. L. Waldrop. Read reports on State, Home and Foreign Missions, and telling speeches were made by Brethren J. A. Glen, J. H. Glazener and J. R. Ramsey.

At 11 o'clock business was suspended to hear the Missionary Sermon preached by Elder A. J. Noblett. Text, Matthews 28th chapter and parts of the 19th and 20th verses.

1:30 p. m.—Read and adopted report on Education after speeches by J. A. Glen, J. G. Denton, A. J. Noblett and W. R. Johnson. Read and adopted report on Literature after speeches from E. M. Waller and J. G. Denton. Adjourned until 8:30 to-morrow morning. Prayer by J. L. Pace. Preaching at the church at night by Elder E. Crawford and at Love lace by Elder D. J. Dodd.

THIRD DAY—8:30 A. M.

Read the 126th Psalm. Prayer by Elder E. Crawford. Read report of Executive Committee which was discussed by J. R. Ramsey, A. J. Noblett, J. L. Pace and J. G. Denton. On motion it was agreed to elect a Missionary and Colporteur for the ensuing year and Elder S. C. Richard was elected. On a motion taken pledges for the support of the missionary—elected.

On motion the Moderator was appointed to get up the history of the Association up to the present time and a biography of the deceased ministers of the Association. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your Committee on State Missions offer their report. Less than one thousand years ago the State Mission Board was organized to do work in our own beloved state while it was then in its infancy. It has grown from year to year in its work. While it hasn't as many men under its employment as in former years it is because money has been withheld from the Board by the churches, yet in their report it had under its employ: Missionaries, 50; days of service, 5,443; miles traveled, 24,884; sermons preached, 2,224; addresses, 516; churches constituted, 12; Baptised, 198; baptized by others in connection with the work, 248; received by letter, 230; restored, 22; Sabbath schools organized, 50; Sabbath school addresses, 162; number of preaching stations without churches, 79; number of visits to these stations, 303; subscription to the Alabama Baptist, 79; subscriptions to the State Missionary

Quarterly, 61. For other statistical reports see the minutes of the State Convention held at Anniston, Ala., November, 1892. The Board is doing all it can with the meager amount of money placed in its possession to supply the destitute parts. If we would send all monies to the Board, to be distributed for such missions as it thinks best, it would be far better. We have to regret in our own Association that there has not been any work done by us as an Association; yet there has been a few of our preachers who left their homes, wives and children and went into the destitute parts preaching and organizing churches without money and without price. We are fearful when we go before the flaming bar of God we cannot say that we have carried out our Captain's marching orders. As has been said God permits the foreigner into our own state and they will be a blessing to us if we look after their salvation—neglected it will be a curse. We most earnestly recommend that the Association at its present sitting make some arrangements to have the destitute parts supplied in our own border. We have two churches that have no pastors this year—Fort Payne and Valley Head—besides other places out in the rural districts. This ought not so to be. We further recommend that each church be asked for its pro rata to defray the expenses and that pastors of churches take monthly collections to raise the money. The motto is: "More collections for missions to pay for work done in destitute districts." We do further recommend that our members subscribe to the Alabama Baptist and State Mission Quarterly, that by so doing they may be better informed on all mission movements.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Home Missions submit the following: Home Missions are the source or fountain-head of Missions. Our Home Mission has done a great work in the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention. They have 368 missionaries in the states and Indian Territory and Cuba, but this number is not sufficient for the territory they are in. There is much territory where we have no missionaries, and the demand for mission work is increasing fast. Much of the future prosperity and true happiness of the Southern states depends on the Home Mission work of to-day. Foreigners are coming here fast, and they bring their religion with them, but not many of them bring the religion that we profess—the religion of the Lord Jesus Christ; and if we don't lift them up to our religion they will drag us down to theirs. This Association paid \$168.80 to State, Home and Foreign Missions last year. This is between 8 and 9 per member. Now we can't believe that the cause of this is opposition to missions, but think it was the lack of information of the great need of mission work. Our Baptist people are doing much to inform our people on Home Mission work, but they are insufficient. Nothing but the heaven-ordained means of propagating the truth will avail. The living man fired with holy zeal must go to the brethren and talk with them face to face about their duty to a living Savior and a lost world. This we think the pastors can do. We recommend that this body advise the pastors of this Association to pass the all-important question of mission more and more on their churches.

The advanced age in which we live demands of us to look well and truly to the best culture of the young, for we feel that the two greatest points to which we should look in fitting our children are to do great and good work in this life both for God and their fellow creatures, and when all their work is done on earth that they may be ready for eternal felicity. Brethren, we should thank God that we are blessed with many good teachers, both male and female, that are seeking to carry our literary school to a higher point of perfection, and that many others are preparing to enter the field; and we are glad to believe our people generally are more interested in the cause of education than formerly. We are happy to know that these standard schools are fostered by our denomination and are inviting all who can to enter. Those who cannot enter the classical schools should patronize our home schools for we feel there should be a good school in every community. If frugality and economy, combined with judgment is sufficient to educate these lovely boys and girls with which God has blessed us it is safe to say they will receive the coveted boon. For Sabbath schools we recommend Kind Words published by the Sabbath School Board at Nashville, Tennessee. For good, sound wholesome soul-feeding read-

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSION.

Brethren, our marching order is: Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature; as the Gospel is the power of God unto salvation, Rom. 1.-16. It is said that without faith its impossible to please God; Heb. 11.-6. So then faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God, and how shall they hear without a preacher, and how shall they preach except they be sent; Rom. 1, 14 to 17. The possibilities that lie out before us are appalling. It is ours to designate the truth among the Pagans of the dark continents. When we consider that the Baptists can and do carry on the war with one-fifth of the means and men that are required by others, should we not take courage and push the work. The Southern Baptist Convention has representatives in Asia, China, Africa, Yarbua, Europe, Brazil, Mexico and Japan. China is spoken of as the Gibraltar of paganism; its population is more than 400,000,000 with a death rate of 12,500,000 a year; this death rate would sweep off the population of the United States in five years to Christless graves. There is destitution in Africa containing one hundred and thirty million souls almost wholly without a missionary. One hundred and fifty million souls in India and one hundred million souls in other parts that are yet to see a preacher or to hear the first word of gospel truth. Only one hundred years ago the first missionary society was organized in the private parlor of a widow in Kettering, England. It was

a seed sown in good ground which has yielded fruit more than ten thousand fold then there was only one, and it was small and poor. Now we have more than one hundred and fifty organizations for foreign missions, but better still the churches of all denominations numbering thirteen million souls have become our best missionary societies. The two missionaries who in June, 1793, sailed for India proved but the advance of an army that now numbers more than 600 missionaries while 35,000 natives are associated with them in the work. There are 145,000 Baptists in the foreign fields. As a result of effort there remains eight hundred and thirty six millions of heathens yet untaught by the power of God's truth. To the sistershood—Dear sisters: May the spirit of God permeate your whole being and prepare you to sympathize with your sect in heathen lands who are unwelcomed at birth, untaught in childhood, uncherished in widowhood, unprotected in old age, unlamented when dead. PREAMBLE.

We, the churches of Jesus Christ, who have been regularly baptized upon the profession of our faith, are convinced from a series of experiences of the necessity of a combination of churches, and maintaining a correspondence for the preserving of a Christian union among all churches of the same faith and order, and, as we are convinced that there are a number of Baptist churches who differ from us in faith and practice, and that it is impossible to have communion where there is no union, we think it our duty to set forth a concise declaration of the faith and order upon which we intend to associate, which is as follows, viz:

CONSTITUTION.

1. This Association shall be known as the Cherokee Baptist Association.

2. The objects of this Association are to promote union among the children of God, their growth in grace, the salvation of sinners and the Glory of God; for effecting all of which they are authorized to adopt the arrangements they judge proper: Provided such arrangements are in accordance with the intention of the union as expressed in the preamble, and directed by the word of God.

3. The Association shall be composed of brethren, chosen by the churches in union which they represent, who shall produce certificates of their appointment, together with a statement of the members in their respective churches—of those

baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead during the year, with the whole number in fellowship.

4. Each church shall have the liberty of sending two delegates for the first fifty, and one for every fifty or fraction over.

5. The Association shall have a Moderator and Clerk (last shall be Treasurer), who shall be chosen by ballot out of the members present, and who shall continue in office until a new election shall be made.

6. After the reading of the letters from the churches, enrolling the names of the delegates and minuting the state of each church, the Constitution, Declaration of Faith and By-Laws shall be read. The door shall then be opened for the admission of other churches into the union. If any such shall present themselves by letter or delegates they shall, on satisfactory evidence of their regular formation, faith and practice, be received into fellowship upon the principles of the Constitution, by the right hand of fellowship from the Moderator.

7. After reading the Constitution, Declaration of Faith and By-Laws, and the reception of other churches, if any apply, then the Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen.

8. The Moderator shall be considered a judge of order and call to its observance at any time. He shall have the privilege of leaving his seat, upon putting one in his place, and of engaging in debate.

9. The Clerk shall minute the proceedings of the Association, prepare them for the press, keep a file of the printed minutes, present them at each session for use of the Association, and deliver them to his successor. He shall also take charge of the money and property of the Association, and dispose of them as the body shall direct.

10. In the decision of any point the majority of votes shall determine the point.

11. The Association shall recognize the entire independence of the churches as to any other head than Christ. The Association shall not assume any power over them in relation to their internal concerns, but shall aid them in any consistent manner. The Association will receive and act upon any question that may be sent up by the churches, and attend to any case of difficulty among them which they cannot satisfactorily settle among themselves.

12. Each member of the Association will be expected to be in his place at the hour of meeting on the first and each day of the session, and remain until the dismissal of the body.

13. As the object of this union is to promote brotherly love, the edification of Christians, the conversion of sinners and the glory of God, it shall be its duty and privilege to hold affectionate correspondence with other Associations, and to embrace every opportunity of doing good unto all men, and especially to them that are of the household of faith, as in their judgment may seem proper.

14. This Association shall adjourn at any time and place they determine upon.

15. The churches of this Association shall send up yearly by their messengers a reasonable contribution for the printing of the minutes, which business shall be confided to some discreet person, who shall have it in charge to superintend the printing and distribution to the Associations with whom correspondence is maintained, and to the churches in fellowship.

16. As this Association is a voluntary connection, each church in it shall have the liberty of withdrawing, upon a request, setting forth its reasons for such a step—at the same time, itself, be bound to hear and weigh any reasons that may be urged against its withdrawal before its final separation.

17. The Association shall have the privilege of withdrawing its connection with any church in the union which shall become disorderly, after consistent efforts have been made in vain to reclaim her from errors.

18. No alteration shall be made in the Constitution, or in the Declaration of Faith and Practice, hereinafter set forth, except such alteration shall be passed a year previous upon the Minutes and the views of the churches obtained; when, if a majority of the churches and two-thirds of the Association shall approve of it, the alteration shall be made.

BY-LAWS.

1. Preparatory to the organization of the Association an introductory sermon shall be preached by a member appointed at the previous session, and another shall be named at the same time to perform the duty in case of the failure of the first.

2. This service being performed, the Moderator, or, if he be absent, the oldest minister present shall open the Association by prayer.

3. He shall call for letters from the churches, when the delegates shall present them and take their seats in order.

4. When the Association is regularly organized, as prescribed in the Constitution, the correspondence with other associations shall be called for, the letters read and messengers received by the right hand of fellowship from the Moderator. These messengers shall be invited to seats in the Association and accorded the privilege of speaking on any subject before the body, but not of voting on any. Other visiting brethren may be invited to seats with the same privilege and prohibition.

5. The minutes of the last Association shall be read, and shall form the order of business for the session. A change may, however, be made in this order on special motion.

6. Subjects not embraced in the last minutes may, at the discretion of the Association, be taken up at any time when there is no business directly before the body.

7. Any subject not contained in the minutes must be regularly brought forward by motion, which shall be seconded before it can be taken up. After this it shall be considered as properly at the disposal of the Association, unless it be withdrawn by the mover.

8. No one shall speak oftener than three times on the same subjects, except permitted by the Association. The speaker shall always rise to his feet and address the Moderator.

9. Silence and decorum shall be observed by every member of the Association while the body is in session, and more especially in the time of debate. All personal reflections and remarks tending to wound the feelings of brethren shall be strictly avoided.

10. No member of the Association shall leave the house while the Association is in session without leave from the Moderator.

11. In order to expedite business committees shall be raised at the discretion of the Association, who shall be named by the Moderator.

12. The meetings of the Association shall, on each day of the session be opened and closed with prayer.

13. The minutes of each day shall be read at its close and the opening of business, after prayer each succeeding day, when the names of the delegates shall be called, and the whole minutes of the session shall be read at its close and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

14. Any alteration of these By-Laws may be made at any meeting of the Association by two-thirds of the members present.

DECLARATION OF FAITH AND PRACTICE.

ARTICLE I. We believe that there are three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, Word and Holy Ghost; and that these three are one, the only living and true God, the Creator and Preserver of all men of the universe.—I John 5:7; 1 Tim. 2:5; Proverbs 26:4.

ART. II. We believe the Word was made flesh in the person of the man named Christ Jesus, who is God over all and blessed for evermore.—John 1:14; 1 Tim. 2:5; Rom. 9:9.

ART. III. That all Scripture, as contained in the Holy Bible, is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for correction, for reproof, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works.—2 Tim. 3:16; 2 Peter 1:20-21.

ART. IV. That the law and the testimony as set forth in the Scriptures is the only rule of faith and practice to Christians in their spiritual concerns, and in their conduct as individuals and as members of the churches.—Isaiah 8:20.

ART. V. That Adam, the natural head and representative of all mankind, fell from his state of original purity, and that by his disobedience all his posterity are made sinners.—Gen. 3; Rom. 5:12-19.

ART. VI. That by the obedience of Christ alone sinners are restored to the favor of God, and through his unmerited mercy receive regeneration, pardon, justification, sanctification and glorification.—Rom. 5:19-21, 8:29; John 3:16.

ART. VII. That these blessings are communicated by the Holy Ghost sent down from Heaven, so that those who are saved by grace, through faith, and that not of themselves, not of works lest any man should boast; not by works of righteousness which they have done, but by the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Ghost.—1 Peter 1:12; Eph. 2:8-9; Titus 3:5.

ART. VIII. That God works all things after the counsel of his own will; foreknown unto him are all his works from the beginning; and that of course, all that the Father hath given to Christ shall come to him and he will raise them up at the last day, so that his sheep will hear his voice, and shall never perish: become dead to the world and sin, be made alive to God, and shall, when he who is their life shall appear, appear with him in glory.—Eph. 1:2; Acts 15:18; John 6:39, 10:28-29; Col. 3:3-4.

ART. IX. We believe that believers should obey the commandments of Christ, and maintain good works for necessary uses.—John 14:15; Titus 3:14.

ART. X. That sinners of the vilest character may obtain salvation through Christ, without money and price.—Isa. 1:18-55; John 3:16.

ART. XI. That there will be a resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment, according to the decision of which the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, and the righteous to life eternal.—Dan. 12:2; John 5:28-29; Rev. 20:12-13; Mat. 25:30 and to the end.

ART. XII. That God has instituted a church on earth, existing in distinct bodies, the only scriptural members of which are the faithful in Jesus Christ, called to be saints, who are immersed in water in the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, and who have given themselves to the Lord and to one another in the church relation by the will of God and their voluntary compact.—Mat. 18:18; Cor. 1:2; Eph. 1:2; Rom. 6:3-4; Colos. 2:12; 2 Cor. 8:5; Acts 1:14, 21:41-47.

ART. XIII. That each church of Jesus Christ is independent of all authority but that of her Head; and that she has under him the exclusive power of managing all her concerns, of judging of the qualifications of her own members for the offices they are to fill, and of choosing her own officers in conformity with the directions of the word of God.—Mat. 14:28; 2 Thes. 2:11; Cor. 14:29-31; Acts 14:23 (see original) Phil. 1:5.

ART. XIV. That the officers of the churches are pastors and deacons only.—Tim. 1:3.

ART. XV. That scriptural baptism is an ordinance in the gospel and consists in immersing the body of a disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ in water, upon a profession of faith in Christ—Mat. 18:19; Mark 16:16; John 4:1-2; Acts 2:41, 8:12, 37-8 10:47-8; Rom. 6:3-4; Colo. 2:12.

ART. XVI. That the Lord's Supper is a standing ordinance of the Church of Christ, consisting in a believing participation of bread and wine, to be observed in commemoration of the death of Christ, and to show forth his death until he come the second time.—Mat. 16:28; 27:26; Acts 2:42; 20:7; 1 Cor. 11:23-25.
