STATE MISSIONS.

Dear Brethren:—We are glad to report that our work in the State is in very much better condition than it was one year ago. Owing to yellow fever and smallpox two years ago and the short crops and low prices of cotton last year our State Board had fallen very much behind with our missionaries. We entered this year with an indebtedness hanging over us of about twenty-seven hundred dollars. This has been liquidated and we are now practically out of debt. There was another discouraging feature about our work in the commencement of this year. We were without a corresponding secretary and several members of the board had just sent in their resignation. The vacancies on the board, caused by said resignations, have all been filled by efficient and devout men, whose hearts are in the work, and just at the time when we most needed him, through the providences of God, we were enabled to secure the services

of Bro W B Crumpton as corresponding secretary, who had before served in that capacity so long and faithfully. Thus the work has been blessed with a most successful year, and Baptists all over the State have come to rejoice, and encouragement to put forth their efforts for the accomplishment of greater things for the Lord next year through the work of State Missions.

We have at present 487 missionaries who are doing faithful and efficient service. This has been the most successful year in the history of the Board. The Lord has wonderfully blessed our work, whereof we are glad.

But with the present demands upon-us we should pray the Lord to send forth more laborers into the harvest. Then we should open our hearts and purses to sustain those who have

ORPHANCE,

Our Orphanage has been in operation little more than six years. During this time we have received into it 49 boys, and 69 girls, and out of it have gone 28 boys and 27 girls, leaving in the Institution 21 boys and 42 girls—63 in all.

The Home is situated on Main Street, next door to the Agricultural School, where no tuition is charged, and where

all of our children, that are old enough, attend.

The boys are taught to work on the farm, and the girls to do various kinds of house work. The crop the boys were making this year, was greatly damaged by a hailstorm early in June.

Mrs C W Ansley, who had been Matron since the Home began retired from the work with the beginning of this year and Mrs Jennie M Hardy, of Greensboro. was elected to fill

that position.

It is gratifying to note the continued improvement in the domestic life of the children. The Matron has arranged one of the rooms for a chapel, and every Sunday afternoon a happy band make melody their hearts to the Lord.

During this year the children have been put in uniforms, which adds much to their appearance, and is no more expensive than their former dress. It promotes family life.

It takes about ten dollars a day to support the family, besides what they get in goods. They have no income except the offerings of their friends. "It is more blessed to

give than receive."

We are very sorry to note there has been a falling away in our annual contributions to the home and would recommend that our pastors be more vigilant in pressing the claims of the Home, making friends for the Orphans and soliciting more liberal contributions to the Orphanage. EDUCATION.

The committee on Education beg leave to make the following report: There are so many advantages that an educated person has over one who is uneducated. It is true that the educated persons are the leaders in every important enterprise, both as touching State and church as moral and religious affairs.

While it is of such importance to have the intellectual training, yet the moral and spirtual towers above it in significance. It is the best training where all there are taught side by side, for all education would be vain and only a delusion and a snare to allure mankind deeper into sin

making them more efficient workmen for the cause of Satan without the purifying and sustaining influence of Christianity. How can our people obtain the Christian education? No one can teach the principles of the Great Teacher who is

not himself or herself a disciple of Christ?.

We should be willing to devote all the time and money we can spare to the education of our children literature, thus fitting them for usefulness in this life and giving them the means of being a blessing to others. The Committee understands that the Baptists have an institution of learning located in their midst for the Baptists of Southeast Alabama at Newton, and we heartily recommend it to the patronage of all Baptists who desire to educate their children at a nominal expense, and for the higher education we commend the Howard and Judson as institutions where the higher education may be acquired. TEMPERANCE

The subject assigned to your committee is a broad one, and is no less important than broad. Temperance has been defined as meaning "the moderate use of things lawful and the total abstenance from things unlawful." It is to the last element in the definition that the reports and discussions on the subject, in our Associations and Conventions are confined—the argument being applied to the use and sale of intoxicating drinks. Hence, our work on Temperance has been confined to the one purpose of appropriate the liquor traffic from our midst, together with the purpose of elevating the moral standards of our people in reference to the drink habit. Your committee take pleasure in reporting the cause of Temperance has made such progress, within the past few years, that, whereas, then the open saloon was not only in all of our towns and villages, now there are only

two of these engines of hell in the bounds of this Association and these are confined to one locality—Headland.

But let not our people relax their efforts in this work nor conclude that because the victory is so nearly won their one gies may flag. Rather let them take courage and push forward until no bar rooms are to be found and until no church will retain in its membership any person who uses strong drink as a beverage.

At 3 p m, Elder Geo M Parker preached from II Timothy 4:7. At the conclusion of the sermon the Association adjourned to meet with Hebron Baptist church, Henry county, Ala., Thursday before the first Sabbath in October 1900. Thus ended one of the most harmonious sessions of the Judson Association.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This union shall be known and distinguished by the

style and title of the Judson -aptist Association.

ART. 2. This Association shall be composed of representatives from the churches in the union, in the following ratio: All churches composed of one hendred members and under shall be allowed two messengers; those having over one hundred members, three messengers; those having over one hundred and fifty and not two hundred members, four messengers; and so on in graduation, one messenger for every fifty members, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their churches before they take their seats.

ART. 3. The messengers when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body, by the election of a Moderator and Clerk. These officers shall be chosen by ballot at each annual meeting, and

continue in office until new ones are elected.

The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which she is composed. She shall regard them as independent bodies in all matters of internal government, and only act as an advisory council, assuming no authority except what is expressly delegated to here by the churches or evidently applied by the very nature of this compact; she nevertheless claims authority over her own members, the messengers of the churches and in justice and propriety must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming unorthordox in faith or disorderly in practice. She should therefore regard all the churches united under this Constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Her principle business shall be to promote the glory of God by extending his kingdom of grace on earth through the medium of preaching the gospel and other means in accordance with the gospel; to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ and especially with those united in this Association.

ART. 5. Newly constituted churches or churches dismissed from other Associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this Union by their sending their messengers to an annual meeeting with a petition, and by those messengers agreeing to the Abstract of

Principles herewith published.

ART. 6. The churches of this Union shall transmit to every annual session of this Association written communications, specifying the names of the messengers, number in fellowship, baptized, received by letter, excluded, restored and dead, since last session and all other

information which the churches may deem important, which shall

be read and minuted accordingly.

ART 7. This Association shall have a fund, supplied by the voluntary contributions of the churches, and all money thus contributed shall be transmitted from the churches and paid over, through the committee on finance to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and holds his office during the pleasure of the Association. He shall receive and manage the funds according to the orders of the Association, and present annually for insertion in the minutes a clear and full statement of all receipts and expenditures.

ART. S. This Association shall farmish the chareles with the

mimtes of every session,

ART 9. This Association shall not take cognizance of any query sent up by the churches unless they have endeavored to solve the same and failed, nor of any difficulty between churches, unless they have pushed the directions contained in the 18th chapter of Matthew and have not been able to settle it: then the Association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at her discretion.

Art. 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a regular file of printed minutes of every session of this body, and

deliver over the same to his successor in office.

ART. 11. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by proper rules of decorum, which she is authorized to form and amend

according to her own views.

ART. 12. This Constitution may be altered or amended at a regular meeting of this body and by a concurring voice of two-thirds of the members present; Provided such alteration be approved by a majority of the members.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1. We believe in the existence of one only time and living God, and that he has made himself known to his people under the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Chost, the same in essence and equal in divine perfection

ART. 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Ohl and New Testaments

are the word of God and the only tule of faith and practice.

ART, 3. We believe in the doctrine of election, that God chose his people in Christ before the foundation of the world: that they should be holy and without blame before him in love, having predestined them to the adoption of children by Jesus Chrsit, according to the good pleasure of his will.

Art. 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Art. 5. We believe in man's incompetency to recover Limself from the fallen state be is in by nature by his own will and ability.

ART. 6: We believe sinners are justified in the sight of God only by

the imputed righteousness of Christ.

ART. 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and

sauctified by the Holy Ghost.

ART. S. We believe that nothing can separate the true believers from the love of God, but that they will be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

ART. 9. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, that the true believers are the only subjects of these ordinances, and immersion only is Eaptism.

ART. 10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general

judgment.

ART. 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked to be everlasting

and the joys of the lighteous to be eternal.

ART. 12 We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances unless he is called of God and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery, and he is in fellowship in the church of which he is a member.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. Every query sent up to the Association by any church in the union shall be read and put to a vote by the Moderator whether it shall be debated or not, and if there be a majority for it, it shall be taken up and investigated; but if not, it shall be withdrawn, provided always that those be first considered which effect the umon of the churches.

2. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the Association, except it be withdrawn by the

member who made it.

3. Every person who speaks in debate shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and he shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject in debate.

4. No person shall speak more than three times on the same

subject without leave of the body.

5. No member shall abruptly break off or absent himself without leave of the body, and if he so does, he shall be marked as an absentee.

6. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled

by the Clerk, and called over as often as the body may require.

7. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall not vote except the body be equally divided.

8. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the

proceedings of the body.

9. The minutes of the Association shall be read and signed by the

Moderator and Clerk before the body rises.

10. Amendments may be made to this form of government by two thirds of the members in session.
