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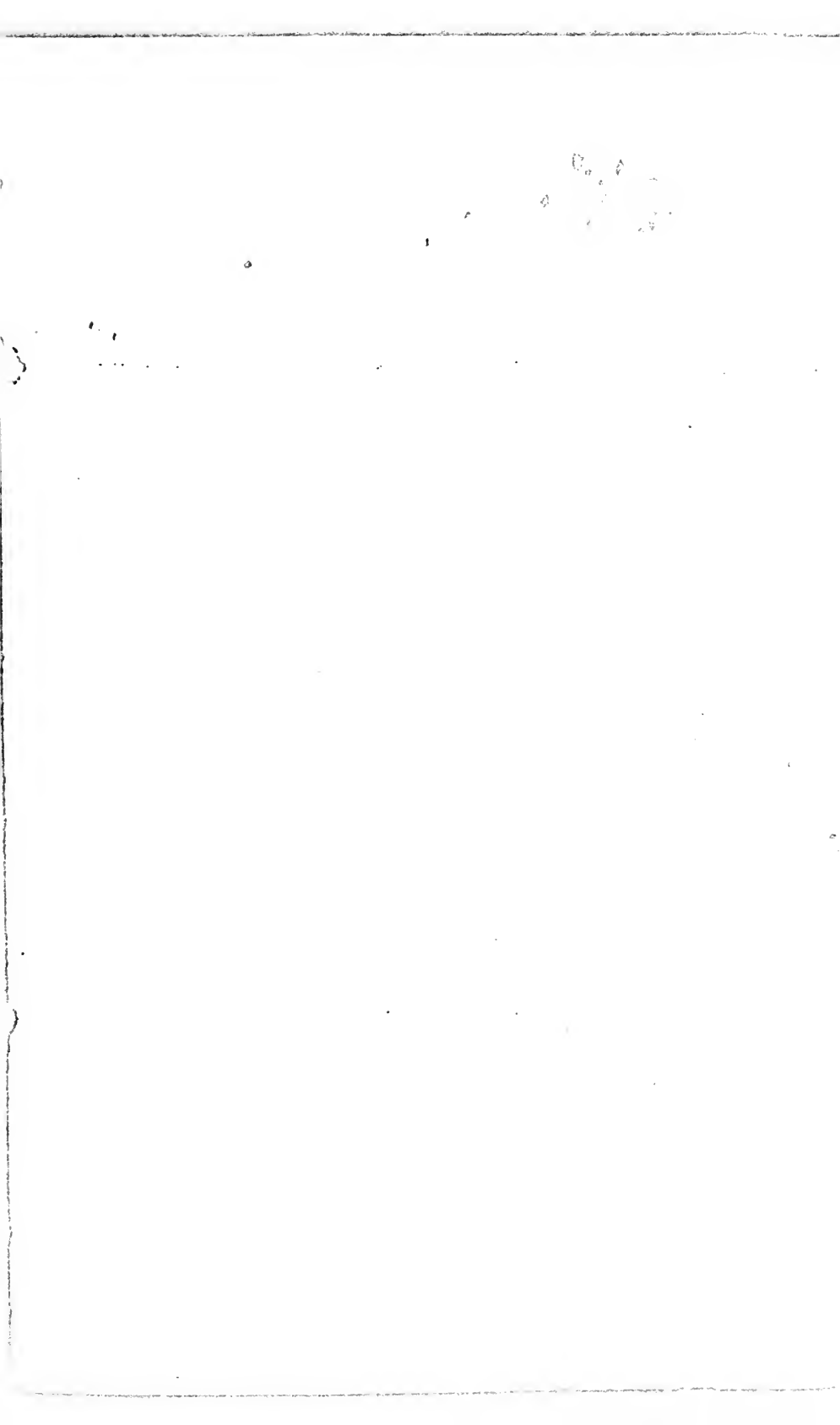

Minutes

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NEW PROSPECT, SUMTER CO., ALA., Sept. 9, 1898.

The Bigbee Baptist Association met this day in its Forty-Sixth Session, in the New Prospect Baptist Church, and at 11 a. m. was called to order by J. R. Larkin, the Moderator of the previous Association.

The appointee, J. G. Dickinson, not being present, the Introductory Sermon was preached by W. A. Parker, Sr. Text, Matt. 6:33; "But seek ye first the Kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

GENERAL AND MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We report that the cause of education is on the advance all over the State. The reports which come to us through the press and from the presidents of our private institutions are of the most encouraging nature, and it is with much pleasure that your Committee note the ever increasing facilities which are becoming more and more available for the higher education of our boys and girls, and the increase in the number of those who are using them.

The private institutions of the State which are managed by our brethren are, we believe, by far better managed than the larger ones which are under the control of our State government.

Howard College, we believe to be the superior of most, and the equal of any institution in the country, and we heartily commend it to our people.

The Judson Female Institute at Marion, Ala., is the only female Baptist College within our bounds, and while there are others in the State, we believe that the advantages offered by it are equally as good as those obtained elsewhere.

We note the ever increasing demand for an educated ministry. The rapidly increasing mixed population, and the coming of thousands of strangers to our shores, who will leave their impress upon us and our children unless we evangelize and christianize them. In the face of these things can we believe the interest manifested in christian education equal to the emergency?

Resolved, That, this Association adopt H. B. Woodward as its beneficiary at the next session of Howard College.

ORPHAN'S HOME.

We, the Committee appointed to report on our Orphan's Home, beg leave to submit the following: That we have an Orphan's Home in reasonably successful operation at Evergreen, Ala., presided over by our brother, J. W. Stewart; that we have expended for buildings and repairs about ten thousand dollars. Consequently we are prepared to receive and take care of as large a number of children as may be expected to become inmates thereof. We have in attendance now fifty-three orphans.

While these poor children are furnished an ample home so far as buildings are concerned, the report comes to us that the institution is behind in its current expenses. Brethren, let us open our hearts to the appeals of charity, and furnish the means to render these orphans comfortable and happy. Faith is lost in sight, Hope ends in fruition, but charity reaches beyond the skies. And that spirit which prompts the christian heart to contribute to the welfare of the widow and orphan is the noblest work of God's people; for he that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto the Lord.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The purpose of this report will be to bring before this body a clear, concise statement of the work of the State Board.

It is important in the first place to note the fact that all the interests of missions throughout the State are committed to this Board--Home and Foreign, as well as State Missions. By mutual agreement made some years ago between the Home and Foreign Boards, they withdrew their paid agents from Alabama, with the pledge upon the part of our State Board that it would undertake to look after their interests in Alabama. Thus every employee of the State Board is instructed to foster the interests of the Home Board at Atlanta, and the Foreign Mission Board at Richmond. This fact is brought out in this report so that the churches may understand that helping the State Board is also indirectly aiding the Home and Foreign Boards.

The special work of the State Board is divided into two departments:

I. **EVANGELISTIC.**—The Board has in its employment four general Evangelists, viz: Elds. W. A. Parker, Sr., A. J. Preston, J. S. Sandlin and Jos. Shackelford. These brethren, together with the Corresponding Secretary, Eld. W. C. Bledsøe, visit as many of the churches as possible, striving to increase interest in the mission cause, and to encourage pastors and churches to enter into earnest and efficient co-operation. They also, as far as possible, preach the Gospel in destitute places and aid in building up the weaker churches.

II. **MISSIONARY PASTORAL WORK.**—This work consists of aiding weak churches at important points, supplementing the salaries of pastors, and helping to firmly plant those churches that give promise of permanency. The record of this work constitutes the brightest page in the history of our mission work. There are to-day, many churches in cities, towns and country that are strong and self-supporting that were planted and nurtured to strength and self-support by your State Board.

While there has much been done in this work, there is much more to be done that goes undone for the lack of means.

Your Committee would call special attention to the present condition of the State Board.

The Corresponding Secretary informs us that the Board is not able to meet its obligations. Only two months remain before the end of our convention year; these two months will have to bring liberal contributions to our State Board if it is relieved of its pressing necessities.

Surely the Baptists of Alabama will at once make a strong rally to their own Board; and we urge our churches to do their part.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board is located at Atlanta, Ga., with Rev. I. T. Tichenor as corresponding secretary. There are more than 20,000,000 of people resident upon the field under the operation of this Board. Having no data at hand, it is impossible for us to give a summary of work done during the last conventional year. Owing to the war between Spain and Cuba, and finally between Spain and the United States, the progress of the work of the Board on the Island of Cuba has been greatly crippled, in fact suspended; but now that peace is to be restored, let us hope and pray that the work of the Board will soon be resumed, and that all the barriers of infidelity will soon succumb to the truth of the gospel.

The demands upon the Board for the prosecution of the work in our Southern States are each year being more urgent.

The crying need of the Board is for means with which to carry on its work. Brethren, what are we doing for Christ? What are we doing to give the gospel to the vast number of unsaved men and women in our own borders. Remember the awful warning spoken by the God of Israel through Amos—"Woe to them that are at ease in Zion."

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your committee beg leave to submit the following:

Never before in the history of Foreign Missions have Southern Baptists had greater cause for rejoicing, and a more powerful incentive to continue their efforts to proclaim in the ears of every benighted heathen the glorious message of "Jesus and His Son."

Our Foreign Mission work is under the management of the Foreign Mission Board, situated at Richmond, Va., and it is exceedingly gratifying to state, that, under the wise direction of the Godly men constituting this Board, and the increased missionary spirit which now seems to be pervading our Baptist hosts—the entire foreign mission debt of the Southern Baptists, which last year amounted to \$13,532.73, has been paid with a surplus of \$2,975.96 in the treasury.

Our missionaries in foreign lands number seventy-six, and native assistants, one hundred and seventeen. They are stationed in the following countries—China, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Mexico and

Japan. Their work has been graciously blessed. In China and Brazil the work is especially encouraging. Large numbers have been added to the churches, and new centers of interest opened to the messengers of the cross. In Japan, Africa and Italy the work has progressed steadily. In Mexico, while the advancement has not been as marked as we would like to have seen it, still it is encouraging from many standpoints.

In all, the scales of error and sin have fallen from the eyes of seven hundred and one of those which "sat in darkness" during the past year, and they have been enabled to see the "truth as it is in Jesus."

Yes, God has blessed us, and let us be grateful. But withal let us not fail to remember that if He would continue to bless us, we must continue to work. Let us remember that though this Board is out of debt now, it will not continue to be so, except we continue to do our duty towards it. And let us not only lend liberally our financial aid, but let us pray for His benedictions to rest upon His faithful and self-sacrificing servants in foreign lands, and the work committed to their care.

CONSTITUTION.

1. This body shall be known by the name of the Bigbee Baptist Association.
2. The officers of this Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at each annual meeting, from its own body, and shall hold their office until their successors are elected.
3. The Moderator shall preside over the Association, and shall discharge the duties usually imposed upon officers presiding over deliberative bodies.
4. The Clerk shall keep a fair record of the proceedings of this Association, and shall attend to the printing and distributing of the Minutes.
5. The Treasurer shall perform the duties usually assigned to such officer, and shall report annually to the Association.
6. The Association shall hold its meetings at such time and place as it shall from time to time appoint.
7. Every church shall be entitled to two delegates, and also one for every twenty-five members exceeding twenty-five.

8. This Association disclaims all right of exercising authority over the internal regulation of churches, believing that within their own sphere they are accountable to God only.

9. The Constitution may be altered or amended by the concurrence of three-fourths of the members comprising the Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one living and true God, that in the Godhead are Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the New Testament is the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe that the Church of God is composed of such persons as believe in Jesus Christ and have been baptized; that baptism consists in the immersion of the whole body in water; and that the Lord's Supper should be administered to church members only.

4. We believe in the doctrines of grace taught by the United Baptists, viz: In the depravity of man; in the converting grace of God; in the resurrection of the dead; in the general judgment; in the eternal life of the righteous; in the everlasting punishment of the wicked.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. At each meeting of the Association the Moderator shall take the chair, shall call the members to order, shall decide questions of order subject to an appeal, shall open and close the Association with prayer, shall appoint committees, when not otherwise ordered, and shall pronounce the decisions to the Association.

2. The names of members shall be called each day, and invitations to seats extended to ministering brethren.

3. The members shall observe respect to officers and to each other; shall arise when addressing the Moderator, shall confine themselves to the questions, shall avoid personalities, shall not speak without leave more than once, until every member shall have opportunity to speak, and shall sustain that bearing to each other which becomes gentlemen and Christians.

4. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Moderator, and then shall be in the possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn by the mover before amendment or decision.

5. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend or postpone; which motion shall have precedence in the order enumerated.

6. All questions except those relating to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority. Any member voting with the majority

may move for a re-consideration on the day of decision. Members may not leave the Association without permission.

7. When questions of order are not provided for in these rules, they shall be decided according to the rules and regulations governing legislative bodies generally.

8. The Association shall have power to receive into its body and fellowship such churches as apply for admission; and shall also be empowered to withdraw its fellowship from any church or body of men walking disorderly, and supposed to be unworthy the fellowship of the Association.
