Committee on Devotional Exercises made the following report:

Rev. J. W. Willis to preach at Hoke's Bluff tomorrow night; Rev. W. L. Culbertson to preach at Turkeytown tomorrow night; Rev. B. F. Smith to preach to the colored people at Mt. Zion (colored) church Sunday at 11 o'clock; Rev. J. E. Smith to preach at Macedonia tomorrow night.

Motion and second that the committees on all three missions report tomorrow at 10 a.m. and all be discussed under the same head.

Motion and second that the Association meet at 9 a.m. and adjourn at 12 for dinner; meet at 1:30 and adjourn ad libitum.

Adjourned until 9 o'c.ock a. m. tomorrow, with prayer by Rev. G. E. Jones.

### SECOND DAY.

After reading 8th Psalm, and prayer by Rev. W. Y. Adams, the Association was called to order by Moderator.

Read and adopted the minutes of previous day.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The elementary education of our children must of necessity be almost entirely obtained in our public schools; and while these by law, must be non-sectarian, we can and should see that every public school teacher is a Christian in fact as well as in name. It is not safe to entrust the mental training of children to the care of teachers, however competent intellectually, whose lives are not in all respects morally correct. Let us see to it that our public school teachers are pious Christian men and women.

For higher education our State Convention maintains Howard College at East Lake and the Judson College at Marion. We unhesitatingly assert that these schools are unsurpassed in this State in their respective spheres, and it is our duty to send our boys and girls to these institutions when possible; not alone because they are our denominational schools, but also because of the superior advantages they afford.

We desire to call attention to the meagre support given by our churches to ministerial education. Only two of our churches report any contribution to this very important denominational enterprise. So far as the church letters inform us, the Etowah Association, representing more than two thousand church members, contributed last year the entire sum of \$2.00 to this cause, and during the entire year the board has been sorely pressed for funds. An educated ministry is no longer a luxury. It has become an imperious necessity. The ministry must keep pace with the educational progress of our young people or the church will loose its hold upon them. We are not doing our duty in this regard.

The religious organizations of young people are now attracting much attention, and while there may be some reason to condemn the increasing number of these organizations outside the church, we desire to commend the work being done by the Baptist Young Peoples' Union in our denomination. Its educational value is inestimable, in that our young people are therein trained in religious work, fitting them early in life for positions of responsibility in Christian labor.

### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Believing as we do that the mission work is one of the fundamental principles of the Gospel, and as the work began at Jerusalem, so it begins with us in our hearts and in our homes. The home mission work demands and should receive the hearty support of every lover of his country and his God. We desire to call special attention to the following facts concerning the work of the Home Mission Board, which we think sufficient plea for the support of the work:

First—About one eighth of the churches in the Southern Baptist Convention have been established through the work of the Board.

Second—The Board employed last year 411 missionaries; these Baptised 5,617 converts, or an average of 13 1-2 to each missionary.

Third—The receipts last year were \$75,927 by collection. We find that for every \$13.50 one soul is saved.

Fourth—The average missionary preaches to five congregations and averages two sermons per week. He attends 40 prayer meetings; Baptizes 13 believers and receives 15 by letter.

Fifth—He organizes four Sunday Schools every three years, into which he gathers 160 pupils. He makes 160 visits each year. He constitutes a church every two years, and every three years he builds a house of worship, worth, with lot, \$900. He gives away six Bibles and Testaments and 3000 tracts.

Sixth—He costs the denomination \$300 per annum, and the house of worship he builds every three years adds to the wealth of the denomination a sum equal to his entire support. So we emphasize the importance of supporting the Home Board.

### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

"The people which sat in darkness have seen a great light, and to them which sat in the region and shadow of death light is sprung up."—Matt., 4th chapter, 16th verse.

The progress of our Master's cause in the uttermost parts of the earth is an abiding inspiration to all the faithful and gives encouragement to others who would enlist in the great work of sending the Gospel into all the world. Only three generations ago every heathen nation was closed against the messengers of God who stood knocking for entrance, but now every heathen door is as wide open as the providence of God can spread it, and now the missionary finds welcome where formally he met persecution and death.

Bishop Thoborn recently said that since he had gone out to India the door of access had been thrown open to 700,000,000 of people, fully half the human race.

The miracle of Pentacost has spread to the regions of darkness, and 360 languages and dialects unite to swell the chorus of Goo's praise. More than 12,000 foreign missionaries with 60,164 native helpers and 1,251,145 living converts constitutes the working force for Christianity in foreign fields, the successors to the one man who a hundred years ago dared to go alone with all the world ageinst him, Wm. Carcy. missionary epoch: the 19th century will be characterized as the century of missions. To Baptists belong the honor of inaugurating this marvelons work; and to Baptists in a large measure are due the rich results that have followed. God has peculiarly blesse loar labors and gifts, so that with a smaller investment of men and women we have reaped a far greater harvest proportionally than our brethren of other denominations. In this fact I see God's gracious encouragement to Baptists to put more men and women into the work which he has so signally blessed. In 1877, only twenty years ago, we Southern Baptists had only 16 missionaries and 32 helpers, 48 workers in all, and we gave only \$32,276 for foreign mission work. In 1897 we have 190 missionaries and native assistants, 4,324 members, and our gifts aggregate \$125,682. When we remember that the number of ioreign converts is more than doubled every ten years, we ought to increase our gifts and working force proportionally. For the enhancement of our mission work we need in all our churches more praying for missions, more preaching about missions and more systematic giving to the cause of missions. To this end we urge every church in the Association to hold at least once a month a missionary prayer meeting at which time the best missionary information at the command of the leaders will be given to the congregation, and all hearts unite in prayer to God for his blessings upon the work, the gifts rendered and the church

which gives. We also urge the pastors in their monthly visits to devote some portion of their service to this subject, thus keeping the great matter constantly before their people, and if possible take a collection for missions every month. We commend the use of the Foreign Mission Journal and the inexpensive tracts published by the Foreign Mission Board, of Richmond, Va., to all who desire to keep well informed on the subject, but we respectfully suggest that it is the duty of every Baptist to keep just as well informed on the work of missions as his circumstances will permit.

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee on Tempetance, report, That it is evident that the Baptists of this Association are gaining more and more correct views in regard to temperance and are becoming more and more positive advocates of the only true temperance, viz: Total abstinence. This is evidenced by the fact that alcoholic stimulants have been totally banished from many homes, even as a medicine. It is now being appreciated that it is not beneficial as a medicine in the ways in which it has so often been used in the past, but that the tendency of its use in the family in such ways is harmful in the extreme. This is also most efficiently and impress-

ively evidenced by the fact that so many of our churches are now using unfermented wine at the Communion service; and in view of the fact that others desire to do so, your Committee desires to state that unfermented wine can be obtained at the drug stores in Gadsden, or of a number of persons in the county, who have put up and keep on hand unfermented wine.

It is a matter of congratulation that so many of our ministers and laymen have labored so earnestly and industriously in temperance work during the past year, and are even better prepared to continue this work in the future.

### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to submit. That on examination and comparison of the rolls of membership of eleven schools which reported at the last session of this body, and again yesterday, shows an increase of two officers and teachers and forty pupils.

From the best source of information at our command, we find that, while the schools have not grown very much numerically, there has been a manifestation of deeper interest in the work than ever before, especially among our young people. We believe that our older church members should set an example to the younger ones in this as in all good works, but we find the actual conditions to be a reversal of this and the young people leading in the Sunday School work. We emphasize this fact with the hope of arousing our older ones to a deeper sense of their duty and the importance of the Sunday School in the work of saving souls. We recommend and urge upon the churches composing this body the necessity of embodying in their associational letters a detailed and complete report of their Sunday Schools just as they do the Church letter itself.

We find that of the twenty-two churches reporting at this session, only twelve gave anything like a detailed statement of the work of their schools. The other ten barely mentioning the fact that their Sunday Schools were in existence. If this Association is alive to the importance of this work as it should be, it will keep a closer account of it in the future than in the past.

### CONSTITUTION.

The name of this Association shall be "The Etowah Baptist Association." The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall perform such duties and perform them in such a manner as is ordinarily required of such officers. They shall be elected at or near the opening of each annual session of the body. The membership of the Association shall be such churches as shall see fit and be permitted to represent themselves in its assion by delegates.

Each church shall be entitled to one delegate for every twenty-five members, or fractional part, thereof, but each church shall be antitled to at least two determines.

tional part thercof, but each church shall be entitled to at least two detegates.

The object of this Association shall be the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom not only within its own bounds, but throughout the world. It shall aid and encourage, by means of its influence, those grand institutions and agencies which, in the providence of God, have been established by the wise and good among our brethren for the spread of the Gospel throughout the world for the distribution of the Bible among those destitute of it, for the education of young men for the work of the ministry, as well as for the cause of education generally, for the promotion of the Sunday School cause, the cause of temperance, etc.

The Association shall employ such means and adopt such measures as shall seem best cal-

culated to cultivate Christian unity and Vellowship among the brethren within its bounds, to incite the brethren to love and good work, to stir up the pure minds of the brethren by way of remembrance, to secure individual advancement in the divine life, in every way as

individuals, to illustrate to the world the reality of the religion of Jesus Christ.

### BY-LAWS.

Preparatory to the organization of the Association an introductory sermon shall be preached by a member appointed at the previous meeting, and another shall be named at the same time to perform the duty in case of the failure of the first.

2. The service being performed, the Moderator, or if he be absent, the oldest minister

present shall op-n the Association with prayer.

3. He shall call for letters from the churches, when the delegates shall present them and

take their seats in order.

4. When the Association is regularly organized, as prescribed by the Constitution, the correspondence from other Associations shall be called for, the letters read and the messengers received by the right of fellowship from the moderator. The messengers shall be invited to received by the right of fellowship from the moderator. The messengers shall be invited to seats in the Association and accorded the privilege of speaking on any subject before the body, but not of voting on any. Other brethren may be invited to seats with the same privilege and prohibition.

5. Subjects not named in the last minutes may, at the discretion of the Association, be taken up at any time when there is no business before the body.

6. Any subjects not contained in minutes must be regularly brought before the body by motion which shall be seconded before it can be taken up. After this, it shall be considered as property at the disposal of the Association, unless it be withdrawn by the mover.

7. No one shall speak oftener than three times on the same subject, unless permitted by the Association. The speaker shall always rise to his feet and address the Moderater.

8. Silence and decorum shall be observed by every member of the association while the body is in session, and more especially in the time of debate. All personal reflections and remarks tending to wound the feelings of the brethren shall be strictly avoided.

9. No member of the association shall leave the house while the association is in session

without permission from the Moderator.

10. In order to expedite business, committees shall be appointed at the discretion of the association, who shall be named by the Moderator.

11. The meeting of the association shall, on each day of session, be open d and closed

with prayer.

12. The minutes of each day shall be read at its beginning and close, of business, after prayer, each succeeding, when names of the delegates shall be called. And the whole of the prayer, each succeeding, when have a larger close and signed by the Moderater and Clerk.

13. Any alteration of these By-Laws may be made at any meeting of the Association by two thirds of the members present.

### RULES OF ORDER.

The rules of order usually observed by deliberative bodies of this kind shall be observed by this association

If any point of order be raised by any member of the body, it shall be decided by the Moderator, but appeal may be taken from his decision to the body. "Wells' Parliamentary "Wells' Parliamentary Practice" shall be used as authority in regard to questions of order.

### ARTICLES OF FAITH.

There is one and but one God, who is a spirit, omnicent, omnipstent, omnipstent, eternal, unchangeable, infinite in goodness and wisdom, of inviolable truth, perfectly just, of immaculate holiness, the creator of all things, the preserver of all, and the supreme ruler over all. The Godhead is a trinity-Father, Son and Holy Ghost-three persons in one divine essence.

The Son became incarnate, thus uniting in himself the divine and human natures that he might become the mediator between God and man; man's final judge, and by his life, death

The Holy Spirit is the sanctioner and savior of his people.

The Holy Spirit is the sanctioner and comforter of God's people. He is, through the divine word, the author of the new spiritual life produced in man in his regeneration.

The Holy Scriptures were given by divine inspiration as a revelation of God's will to man concerning him, and constitute to him an infallible rule of faith and practice. Adam and Eve, the first man and woman, were created holy, and for a time served the Creator acceptably, living innocently and happy in His favor, but Adam, having been placed under a covenant of works, violated it and brought the penalty of the violation upon himseif and his descendants.

All men partaking of the consequences of the fall, are both totally depraved and guilty of actual transgression of God's laws.

No man can free himself from his native depraylty, or from condemnation. No man can

save himself. There is no way of salvation but by Jesus Christ.

The Christian Sabbath is the first day of the week, and should be kept holy and consecrated to the service and worship of \$\Pi\cite{o}\$ of in obedience to the command, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," and in commomoration of the resurrection on that day of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

The ordinances of the gospel are two—Baptism, and the Lord's supper. The great head of the church requires the perpetual observance of these ordinances by the church as such and

under their authority.

Baptism is the immersion of the believer in water by one duly qualified and authorized

to administer the rite. It is prerequisite to church membership.

A gospel church is a company of Baptise i believers, organized under the laws of its Great Head for the advancement of God's kingdom in the world. The officers of the church are its pastors and deacons Each church is an independent body, subject only to the commands of its Great Head. The work required of the church is missionary in its character "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every greature."

The Hely Spirit continues the work of sanctification upon those whom he has regenc-

rated to the end of life, and thus saves all who are regenerated from apostacy.

All who will be finally saved were chosen of God the father, before the foundation of the world, and gave to Jesus Christ in the covenant of grace; yet all who will be lost will have rejected a preferred satvation. The bodies of all who die will be raised from the dead and required to their spirits for the

judgment of the great day.

In the last day Jesus will come to judge the world, and having assembled all men before

him, will pass sentence upon them according to their works.

Heaven is a place to which the righteous will be received and made perfectly happy in the presence and enjoyment of God forever.

Hell is a place into which the wicked shall be cast to suffer eternal punishment for their sins.
