REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

We, the committee on education, beg leave to make the following report:

Dear brethren, in this age of progress we should certainly keep the cause of education abreast of the times. Education is essential to the welfare of our government, and if so how much more is it essential to the welfare of the cause of christianity. Dear brethren, we see that other denominations take great pride in their institutions of learning and it seems to be their strongest fort. There can be no doubt but that education is power. It gives good men and women power for good, it also gives wicked people power to carry their evil designs into effect. Hence the necessity for religious institutions of learning when both moral and religious training are given in connection with literary training.

We therefore recommend that great care be exercised in selecting teachers for our common schools. We also recommend to our brethren, and especially those who are preparing for the ministry, Howard College, at East Lake, Birmingham, Ala., and the Walnut Grove College; and more especially do recommend to our pastors, as well as all our brethren from

the oldest to the youngest, the "Pastor's Institute" at East Lake, which commences the 10th day of June and continues one month. We know of no place where one can learn so much in so short a time.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions ask to report as follows:

That we are glad to ascertain, from the reading of the letters from our churches, that a number of our churches have responded very liberally to the call for mission funds. Others seemed to have neglected this duty, which is obligatory upon every church in our Association. We earnestly recommend that our churches take up quarterly collections for missions, as some of the strongest churches in our Association have adopted this system. Brethren, let us "come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty," and help to carry out the last great commission of our Divine Master. We also urge that we look more diligently to the support of the ministry at home, as we have preachers that are being driven home from their pulpits year by year, on account of our churches failing to obey the injunction of God's word; "The Lord hath ordained that they which preach the g spel shall live of the gospel." "Blessed are they that do his commandments."

[To raise the above amount will require only about 16 $\frac{2}{3}$ cents per member, or about 4 1-6 per quarter, or about 1 $\frac{1}{3}$ cents per month. G. M. M., Clerk.]

THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

The Temperance Committee reported as follows:

We, the committee on Temperance, seeing the great danger our church members, especially our young members, are exposed to by the use of intoxicants, and seeing that strong drink is yearly increasing the number of criminals in jails and penitentiaries, and multiplying suicides, and digging drunkards' graves, destroying the peace, prosperity and happiness of families, increasing the number of widows and orphans, destroying the peace of communities and churches, and is a mighty means of the wicked one for destroying the souls of men, and would recommend the following resolutions for adoption by this Association.

Resolved, First that we ask our brethren to abstain from all intoxicants and advise all others to do so.

Resolved, Second that we advise all, and especially our young people who have not as yet fallen into the habit of using narcotics to forever abstain from their use.

Adjourned for dinner.

Reassembled at 2 o'clock and opened with prayer by Bro. C. C. Collins.

On motion allowed ten dollars of minute fund to clerk for services.

The following resolution was offered by W. A. Phillips:

Resolved, that it is the sense of this body that, if a church can dissolve within herself without a presbytery present, she can organize without a presbytery by a band of believers coming together.

On motion the resolution was laid on the table.

On motion Elder J. M. Thompson was recommended as a suitable man for colporteur work in our Association.

Adopted the following resolution:

Resolved. That the thanks of this body are due and hereby tendered to Hopewell church and vicinity for their generous hospitality towards us while we have been among them.

Notice was given that at the next session of this Association a motion would be made to change the fourth article of the constitution.

Passed the following resolution:

Resolved. That we request each church of this Association to appoint one or more of its members to look after the interest of Sabbath schools.

On motion requested the executive committee to expend associational fund in mission work in our bounds.

Read and adopted minutes and adjourned, the parting hand being given and prayers being offered, Bro. R. W. Roe leading.
