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MINUTES.

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STAUNTON, VA., May 19th, 1881.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States met, in accordance with the appointment made by the Assembly of 1880, in the First Presbyterian Church, Staunton, Virginia, at 11 o'clock, A. M., and was opened with a sermon by the Moderator of the last Assembly, Rev. T. A. Hoyt, D. D., on Gal. 1:6, 7: "I marvel that ye are so soon removed from Him that called you into the grace of Christ, unto another gospel, which is not another, but there be some that trouble you, and would pervert the gospel of Christ."

After the close of public worship, the Assembly was constituted with prayer by the Moderator.

The Rev. Robert P. Farris, D. D., a commissioner from the Presbytery of St. Louis, was then unanimously elected as Moderator, and the Rev. G. A. Trenholm, a commissioner from the Presbytery of Bethel, was unanimously elected as Temporary Clerk.

It was resolved that the Assembly will take a recess to-day to meet at 3 o'clock, P. M., for the purpose of hearing annual reports and attending to such other matters as may be brought before it; and that, until otherwise ordered, the other daily sessions shall be from 9 o'clock, A. M., until 2 o'clock P. M.

THURSDAY, 3 o'clock, P. M.

The Assembly met and, in the absence of the Moderator, who was engaged in the appointment of the Standing Committees, the chair was occupied by the last Moderator.

The annual report of the Executive Committee of Foreign Missions was read by Rev. J. L. Wilson, D. D., one of the Secretaries, and was referred to the Standing Committee to be appointed on that subject. It was made the order of the day for to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock to hear the annual report of the Executive Committee of Home Missions.

The annual report of the Executive Committee of Education was read by the Secretary, Rev. E. M. Richardson.

and the annual report of the Executive Committee of Publication was read by the Secretary, Rev. J. K. Hazen, D. D. These reports were referred to the several standing committees on those subjects to be appointed, and a special communication from the Executive Committee of Publication was referred to the committee on that subject.

A report was received from the Rev. Dr. Pryor, concerning his attendance as a delegate from the last Assembly, upon the meeting of the General Synod of the Reformed Church, which report was approved, and is as follows :

To the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, in session at Staunton, Va.:

REVEREND FATHERS AND BRETHEREN:—I respectfully report to your reverend body, that, as your delegate, I attended the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America, held in the city of Brooklyn, New York, June, 1880. I was in attendance upon the body from the second day of June (the day on which it met), to Monday the 7th, inclusive. I was received and treated throughout with marked Christian affection and cordiality. The body reminded me forcibly of our own General Assembly in all of its characteristics and proceedings. I believe it to be thoroughly sound in doctrine, and eminently evangelical.

Its church work is carried on by methods similar to our own. It is hearty in the cause of Domestic and Foreign Missions, and indeed of all proper church work. I was charged by their presiding officer, Rev. Dr. DeBaun, with the duty of tendering to you an assurance of their warmest fraternal affection and esteem. They appointed a delegate to your body, who, I hope, will be in attendance. This fraternal correspondence I hold to be productive of great good to both bodies. I trust it will be continued by delegates.

A letter was received, through the Stated Clerk, from the Rev. Wm. P. Jacobs, declining the office of Official Reporter, to which he had been elected by the last Assembly.

The order of the day was then taken up, and the report of the Executive Committee of Home Missions was read by the Rev. Dr. Richard McIlwaine, one of the secretaries, which report was referred to the Standing Committee on that subject. His accounts, as Treasurer, were referred to the Auditing Committee.

It was ordered that fifteen minutes immediately before the time of adjournment shall be devoted to exercises of worship, under the direction of the Moderator.

A report was received from the Assembly's Permanent

Committee on the Sabbath, which was referred to a committee of seven, to be appointed by the Moderator.

Various overtures and other papers were presented by the Stated Clerk, and having been read, they were referred to the proper Standing Committees.

The Rev. J. L. Wilson, D. D., at the request of the late Presbyterian Council in Philadelphia, having called the attention of the Assembly to the action taken by said Council in reference to co-operation among Presbyterian churches in the work of Foreign Missions, the paper adopted by the Council, as also a communication from its Secretary to this Assembly, were referred to the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

It was made the order of the day for to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock to take up the subject of Retrenchment and Reform, which was referred by the last Assembly to this Assembly.

A paper from the Synod of Alabama, in relation to the transfer of the Theological Seminary at Columbia to the care of the three Synods which formerly controlled it, was referred to the Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries.

The annual report from the Trustees of the General Assembly was received and read, and referred to the Auditing Committee.

The annual report from the Trustees of Union Theological Seminary was presented, read, and referred to the Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries.

The following message was ordered to be sent by telegram to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (in session at Buffalo, N. Y.) by the Committee on Foreign Correspondence:

"The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, met in Staunton, Va., present to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, met at Buffalo, N. Y., their Christian salutations. May the presence of the Master of Assemblies be with you.

The Rev. F. P. Mullally, D. D., gave notice of his intention to enter a protest against this action.

The following report from the Judicial Committee was received and approved:

The Judicial Committee report that a paper entitled "The Complaint of Rev. W. H. Vernor," has been referred to them; which, however, is not a complaint against any decision of any court, but a claim for compensation due him from the Evangelistic fund. Your committee therefore recommend its reference to the Assembly's Committee on Home Missions.

Also from the same committee a report was received, which was adopted, and is as follows:

The Judicial Committee respectfully report to the Assembly that they have given most careful and patient consideration to the appeal or complaint of J. E. White against the Synod of South Carolina, and find nothing in the paper by which the decision appealed from can be known, whilst the paper on its face appears to re-open the case on which the last Assembly took action. On conference, however, with J. E. White, and also Rev. J. B. Mack, D. D., of the Synod of South Carolina, it was discovered that an application for a new trial had been made to the Presbytery of Bethel, in which the case at first arose, that a new trial was refused, and an appeal taken to the Synod, which sustained the Presbytery. From this decision of the Synod the said J. E. White professed before your committee to be now prosecuting this appeal. Your committee recommend the following action, viz:

WHEREAS, The paper of J. E. White does not state what decision of the Synod of South Carolina is appealed from or complained of; that it bears on its face the appearance of re-opening a case already adjudicated in General Assembly; and that it is in fact the old case, without one substantial addition to its *res gestae*; therefore

Resolved, That the appeal or complaint of J. E. White against the Synod of South Carolina be dismissed.

A report was made by the Committee on Devotional Exercises, and was approved.

A communication was received from Miss M. J. Baldwin, Principal of the Augusta Female Seminary, located at Staunton, inviting Commissioners to the several exercises connected with the present "commencement" in this

institution, which communication was received with the thanks of the Assembly for the courtesy thus extended.

After engaging in exercises of worship, the Assembly adjourned until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY MORNING, May 21, 9 o'clock.

The Assembly met and was opened with prayer by the Rev. H. H. Hawes. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Additional Commissioners, viz: W. L. Kennedy, minister, and Wm. McCurdy, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Western Texas; J. M. Buford, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of East Alabama; and J. P. Chase, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Harmony, were announced and their names enrolled.

A report on the Office of the Deacon was read by the Rev. J. L. Girardeau, D. D., chairman of the committee appointed by a previous Assembly, and was placed on the docket.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures made a report, and upon their recommendation, overtures Nos. 1 and 14 were referred to the Committee on Foreign Correspondence; No. 2 was referred to the Committee on the Sabbath; No. 5 to the Committee on Publication; and No. 15 to the Committee on Retrenchment and Reform.

A communication was read from a member of the Committee on Correspondence, appointed by the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, which was referred to the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

The order of the day was taken up, viz: the consideration of the subject of retrenchment and reform, and a motion was made to adopt certain resolutions presented in the majority report of the committee on that subject last year. The discussion on this motion was continued until near the hour of adjournment.

It was made the order of the day for Monday night at 8½ o'clock, to hear the report of the Standing Committee on Foreign Missions, and such addresses on that subject as may be suited to edify the congregation assembled.

The following telegram was presented by the Moderator :

To the Rev. Dr. Robert P. Farris, Moderator :

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Session at Buffalo, New York, gratefully acknowledges the greeting of the General Assembly, met at Staunton, Va., and invokes upon its officers and members Grace, Mercy, and Peace, from God the Father and our Lord Jesus Christ.

After devotional exercises, the Assembly adjourned until Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

MONDAY MORNING, May 23, 9 o'clock.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. Dr. Pryor. The minutes of Saturday were read and approved.

The Rev. O. P. Fitzsimmons, from the Presbytery of Augusta, and A. H. Hansel, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Savannah, were announced as additional Commissioners, and their names enrolled.

An invitation was received from Mr. H. L. Hoover to attend the closing exercises of the high school over which he presides, and the courtesy of the invitation was acknowledged.

A telegram was received from the General Conference of the United Brethren in Christ, at Lisbon, Iowa, and was referred to the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

The Judicial Committee made the following report, which was adopted, and the committee discharged :

Your Committee report that the appeal of W. S. Turner, from the Synod of Georgia, is in order, and recommend that the Assembly issue the case in the following manner :

1. That the papers be read.
2. That the appellant be heard on the subject of appeal, one hour, if he desire so much time.
3. That the representative of Synod be heard the same length of time.
4. That the appellant be allowed one half hour for response.
5. That the roll be called for the expression of opinion by members of the court; after which the vote shall be taken in the usual way.

Your Committee finally report that they have acted upon all the papers put into their hands, and as the time allowed for the introduction of further judicial matter into this Assembly has expired, they most respectfully ask to be discharged.

The unfinished business, viz: "retrenchment and reform," was then resumed, and its consideration continued until near the hour of recess, which, after devotional exercises, was taken by the Assembly until to-night at 8½ o'clock.

MONDAY NIGHT, 8½ o'clock.

The Assembly met, and the order for the evening was taken up, viz: the report of the Standing Committee on Foreign Missions, which was read by the chairman, Rev. Dr. Pryor. The Assembly was then addressed on that subject by Drs. J. L. Wilson, T. A. Hoyt, B. M. Palmer, and Theodorick Pryor; after which a collection was taken up in behalf of Foreign Missions.

Adjourned until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock; closed with prayer by Rev. M. D. Hoge, D. D.

TUESDAY MORNING, May 24, 9 o'clock.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. F. B. Converse. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The report of the Directors of the Theological Seminary at Columbia was read, and referred to the Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries.

Rev. Dr. Armstrong, from the Committee on Theological Seminaries, made a report on the overture from the Presbytery of Bethel, touching the study of the English Bible in our theological seminaries, which report was made the second order of the day for Wednesday

It was made the order of the day for one o'clock to-day, to hear the Rev. Philip Schaff, D. D., of New York, on the subject of the recent revision of the New Testament.

The unfinished business, viz: "retrenchment and reform," was then taken up, and the discussion was continued until the hour for the order of the day, when Rev. Dr. Schaff

addressed the Assembly on the subject above mentioned, for which address the thanks of the body were tendered to him.

It was made the order of the day for to-morrow evening at 8½ o'clock, to receive the report of the Standing Committee on Home Missions.

An invitation for members of the Assembly to visit, at their convenience, the Institute for the Deaf, Dumb and Blind, was received, and the thanks of the body were returned for this courtesy.

After a time spent in devotional exercises, a recess was taken until 8½ o'clock to-night.

TUESDAY NIGHT, 8½ o'clock.

The Assembly met, and the Committee on Bills and Overtures made reports on overtures 8, 9, 24, and 27, which were adopted, and are as follows :

No. 8. From the Presbytery of Orange, asking that an amendment of chapter 5, section 3, Form of Government, be sent down to the Presbyteries, providing that in cases where there are but two Ruling Elders in a session, one of them, in connection with the minister, be authorized, under certain conditions, to act as a quorum of the body.

The Committee recommend that the request be not granted.

No. 9. From Montgomery Presbytery, inquiring whether the deliverance of the Assembly of 1877, on dancing, has been affected by the action of the Assemblies of 1879-'89, and requesting that said deliverance be reaffirmed.

The Committee recommend the following answer, viz :

That the deliverance of 1877 has not been revoked by any subsequent action of the Assembly.

No. 24. From the Presbytery of South Alabama, asking for the abolition of the column in the statistical reports entitled "Pastor's salaries actually paid."

The Committee recommend that the request be not granted.

No. 27. From the Presbytery of West Hanover, asking for the appointment of a judicious committee to consider and report to the next Assembly upon the lawfulness of marrying a deceased wife's sister.

The Committee recommend that the request be not granted.

Overtures 3 and 4, 6 and 7, and 16, were placed on the docket.

It was made the order of the day for to-morrow at one

o'clock, P. M., to hear the Rev. Dr. Schenck, of Philadelphia, and the Rev. M. D. Hoge, D. D., in the interest of the Presbyterian Historical Society.

A memorial from the Presbytery of West Texas was referred to the Standing Committee on Home Missions

It was made the order of the day to-morrow at 12 o'clock, M., to fix the place for the meeting of the next Assembly.

The Committee on Foreign Correspondence reported a reply to the telegram from the Conference of the United Brethren, which was adopted, and is as follows :

To the General Conference of the United Brethren in Christ, in session at Lisbon, Iowa :

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States reciprocate your cordial greetings, and wish you Grace, Mercy, and Peace.

The Committee on Foreign Correspondence reported a reply to the letter from the Cumberland Presbyterian Assembly, which was adopted, and is as follows :

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church :

REVEREND BRETHREN:—Your kind and courteous letter tendering us your friendly greetings, is gratefully received and highly appreciated. It gives us cordial pleasure to hear that with your Church the last ecclesiastical year has been one of great prosperity, and we sincerely and earnestly hope, and pray, that the blessings vouchsafed to you may continue and increase. Surely we can have but one common interest, and that is to see the kingdom of the Saviour enlarge and spread.

God has been good to us, also, during the past ecclesiastical year. The spirit of missionary zeal is somewhat revived amongst us. Our Theological Seminary at Columbia is to be re-opened, we hope, this fall. There is life and vigor in the discussions that go on in our Church Courts, and we trust that our pulpits are earnest and faithful in proclaiming the truths of the gospel. But we greatly need the influences of the Spirit, convincing and converting those who are without, and edifying those who are within the Church.

We commend ourselves to your prayers. May the gracious Master comfort, strengthen and sanctify both you and us, and all the churches, and send out His light and truth to all the ends of the earth.

It was made the order of the day at 10 o'clock on Thursday to hear the report of the Committee on the Revised Directory.

The report of the Standing Committee on Foreign Missions was taken up and adopted, viz:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

This Committee have carefully considered the Minutes of the Executive Committee and their annual report; also, a suggestion emanating from the Council of the Presbyterian Alliance that met last fall in the city of Philadelphia, and an Overture from the Chesapeake Presbytery, placed in our hands by this Assembly. The Minutes show great punctuality of the members in attending the meetings of the Committees, and great diligence and wisdom on the part of members and officers in performing the arduous and responsible duties laid upon them by the Assembly. These facts demand that the gratitude of the Church shall be expressed to these brethren by this Assembly. The happy mingling of prudence and zeal, of economy and aggressiveness heretofore exhibited by the Executive Committee, gives it a fair title to the confidence and support of the Church.

We find that the receipts for the year were \$59,215.39, an increase of \$10,737.41 over those of the preceding year. The number of churches contributing is 68 more than last year; of ladies' associations 53 more; and of Sabbath schools 57 more. The indebtedness of the Committee has been somewhat diminished. The health of our Missionaries has been generally good, their labors abundant, and their zeal most commendable. One of them, however, was called in the early part of the year from the labors of the earthly to the rest of the heavenly Church.

The gates of countries occupied have been thrown wide open, and at the same time quite a number of young men have declared their readiness to go out as Missionaries. These facts call for special gratitude to the Great Head of the Church, and encourage his people to go forward.

We gratefully acknowledge liberal contributions made to this cause, and valuable services rendered by persons residing beyond the limits of our Church.

The present state of our Foreign Missionary work is very satisfactory, and the prospect for extending our labors were never more inviting.

This Committee recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. That while this Assembly would bow with submission to the will of God in removing, by death, from the field of labor, Rev. B. F. Thompson, of our Fernambuco Mission, and G. Ober, Esq., a valuable member of the Executive Committee of Foreign Missions, we cannot but recognize these dispensations as most painful bereavements.

2. That this Assembly hereby expresses its adherence to the present constitution of the Executive Committee of Foreign Missions, and its hearty approval of their methods of conducting the work committed to their charge, and declines to make any change whatever in them; and that *The Missionary* be retained in its present form, as the organ of Foreign Missions.

3. That in view of facts recently discovered respecting the resources, the highways, the people and the prospects of the great continent of Africa, this Assembly authorizes the Executive Committee to establish a mission in Africa whenever in their discretion the way is made clear, *provided* that this measure shall not interfere with the support of other missions already established, nor prevent the extinction in a reasonable time of the debt already incurred by the Committee.

4. That this Assembly empower the Executive Committee of Foreign Missions to conduct such correspondence with Missionaries and Missionary Committees and Boards as may be necessary to ascertain if it be desirable for us, and if so, the best practicable method of carrying out the scheme of co-operation between the Missionaries of the "Reformed Churches" in the foreign field suggested by the Pan-Presbyterian Council, and report to the next Assembly.

5. That in view of the action herein taken in regard to the co-operation between the Missionaries of "Reformed Churches" in the foreign field, the Assembly in answer to the overture from Chesapeake Presbytery declines to grant the request.

6. That the Assembly urges Presbyteries and earnestly exhorts them by the wants of the world and the hopes that are now awakened by the facts recited above, to use their utmost power and to make their most vigorous efforts, to secure general and large contributions from their churches for the great work to which the Church is called. When God has opened wide the highways of the nations and disposed the hearts of many young men to enter and so fulfilled the long desire of his Church, let not the people of God, purchased by the Redeemer's blood from sin and hell, withhold the means of supporting the work and extending the blessings of the gospel.

7. That the Assembly recommends to the churches under its care the observance of the Monthly Concert of Prayer for Foreign Missions, and that collections for that object be taken up in connection therewith.

8. That the Assembly hereby appoints the following persons members of the Executive Committee, viz:

Rev. J. Leighton Wilson, D. D., Secretary; Rev. Richard McIlwaine, D. D., Co-ordinate Secretary and Treasurer; Rev. J. A. Leffevre, D. D.; Rev. J. J. Bullock, D. D.; Rev. John Leyburn, D. D.; Rev. W. U. Murkland, D. D.; Hon. Isaac D. Jones; J. Harmanus Fisher, Esq.; G. F. Anderson, Esq.; John L. Weeks, Esq.; C. F. McCay, Esq.

The unfinished business was resumed, and the discussion of the subject of "retrenchment and reform" (under an order limiting speeches thereon to fifteen minutes each), was continued until the hour for adjournment. Adjourned with prayer, until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, May 25, 9 o'clock.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. Armstrong.

The Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries made a report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

On the Report of the Executive Committee of the Tuscaloosa Institute, the Committee would report that they have carefully examined the same, and recommend: That the Assembly approve of the management of said Committee, particularly their effort to secure the services of an additional instructor, and the erection of a suitable building for the use of the Institute.

The Committee recommend that the Committee to whom the management of the Tuscaloosa Institute is committed, be re-appointed for the coming year.

On the "Report of the Directors of Union Theological Seminary," the Committee would report: That after a careful consideration of said Report, they find nothing calling for special action on the part of this Assembly.

On the "Report of the Board of Directors of Columbia Theological Seminary," the Committee would recommend to the Assembly the following action, viz:

1. That the Assembly approve of the action of said Board of Directors, as set forth in their Report.

2. That they heartily endorse the selection of Rev. B. M. Palmer, D. D., to the Professorship of Pastoral Theology in the Seminary.

3d. That the Assembly adopt the following preamble and resolutions, viz:

"Whereas the last General Assembly informed the Synods of South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama, of its readiness to restore the Seminary at Columbia, S. C., to their ownership and control whenever they shall indicate their desire to receive it." And

Whereas each of the above mentioned Synods has indicated such desire by an almost unanimous vote; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That this Assembly does hereby "return the ownership and control" of the said Seminary at Columbia to the said Synods of South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama; the Seminary hereafter to sustain to the General Assembly the same relation as that now sustained by Union Theological Seminary, Va.

Resolved, 2. That the present Directors and Professors of the Seminary at Columbia, South Carolina, continue in office until the three Synods above mentioned shall have assumed actual control of said Seminary.

The Committee recommend the adoption of the following Minute :

Whereas, it pleased the Great Head of the Church to remove, in October, 1880, from the scene of his earthly labors, that he might be with Him where He is, and behold His glory, Rev. W. S. Plumer, D. D., LL.D., Professor of Pastoral and Casuistic Theology in Columbia Seminary, by appointment of this body:

Resolved, That this Assembly does now record its testimony to the personal worth, eminent piety, unremitting industry and zeal, and official fidelity of this distinguished servant of Christ. Our deceased brother was a rare gift of the ascended Redeemer to his militant Church, and we render to Him thanks for that grace which qualified our brother for his varied and abundant labors—for his long and useful life, and for the testimony of his lips, life and death to the truth, preciousness and power of that gospel which was his comfort, joy and trust, living and dying.

During the discussion of the Report on the Theological Seminary at Columbia, the two orders of the day were suspended, and, upon invitation, the Rev. Dr. J. L. Girardeau, Rev. Dr. Wm. E. Boggs, and Rev. Dr. J. B. Mack addressed the Assembly on the interests involved.

The order of the day, which had been suspended, was taken up, and the Assembly was addressed by Drs. Schenck and Hoge, after which the following paper was passed :

The Assembly recognizes, with great pleasure, the successful prosecution of the important work of the Presbyterian Historical Society, and the erection of a fire-proof building for the preservation of its invaluable historic material. The Assembly hereby

Resolves, 1. That a Committee be appointed to co-operate with the Society in every appropriate method.

2. That the Synods and Presbyteries be recommended to appoint similar committees to procure material for the Society, and in all practicable ways to further its interests for the benefit of our entire Church.

Rev. M. D. Hoge, D. D., Rev. W. T. Richardson, D. D., and W. Wirt Henry, Esq., were appointed a committee to correspond with the Historical Society in regard to such matters as may be suitable.

A recess was then taken until 4½ o'clock, P. M.

WEDNESDAY, 4½ o'clock, P. M.

The Assembly met. The following paper was presented and adopted :

Resolved, That whilst the Assembly does not discourage that laudable aspiration which seeks the best culture, not only within our own pale, but in other parts of Protestant Christendom, no candidate for the ministry should resort to such exterior sources of learning until he shall have been grounded in that of his own denomination ; and therefore the Presbyteries are hereby exhorted to exert all their legitimate power to cause their students to go through the curriculum of our own Seminaries before studying in learned Institutions without our bounds.

The order of the day, which had been postponed, was taken up, viz: The consideration of the appeal of Mr. Turner from a decision of the Synod of Georgia ; whereupon the Assembly was reminded by the Moderator of their solemn obligations as a court of the Lord Jesus Christ. The papers belonging to the case having been read, the Rev. J. N. Bradshaw was heard in behalf of the appellant, and was followed by the Rev. Dr. W. E. Boggs in defence of the action of the Synod. The further consideration of the case was then suspended.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures made a report, recommending that Overture No. 23 be referred to the Standing Committee on Home Missions ; and Overtures Nos. 19 and 21 be referred to the Standing Committee on Publication. This report was adopted

The consideration of the unfinished business (retrenchment and reform) was made the order of the day for tomorrow morning at 9½ o'clock.

A recess was taken until 8½ o'clock P. M.

WEDNESDAY, 8½ o'clock, P. M.

The Assembly met. The order of the day was taken up, and the following paper, presented by the Standing Committee on Home Missions, was adopted :

The Committee on the Report of the Executive Committee of Home Missions, to whom was referred the complaint of Rev. W. H. Vernor against said Committee for withholding arrears of salary alleged to be due for work performed as an Evangelist within the bounds of Brazos Presbytery during the years 1878-9, would respectfully state that there

is no evidence in the papers accompanying the complaint that the Executive Committee at Baltimore had given any authority for the pledge made on their behalf. The Executive Committee, therefore, in the administration of a public trust, were fully justified in refusing to recognize this claim against them. But inasmuch as the Presbytery of Brazos, and its Evangelist, acted under the conviction that the guarantee of salary was duly authorized, and because the work for which remuneration is claimed was faithfully performed, it is recommended that, in this particular case, the Executive Committee at Baltimore be instructed to pay to Mr. Vernor the sum of \$350; but that this decision shall not hereafter be drawn into precedent, and that no pledges can bind the Committee except such as emanate distinctly from themselves in the form of an actual appropriation.

The complete report from this Committee was then read by the Chairman, Rev. Dr. B. M. Palmer, and addresses on the subject were made by Rev. Dr. McIlwaine, Rev. W. N. Dickey, Rev. Dr. S. W. Davies, and Mr. M. D. Hoge.

Adjourned until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock; closed with prayer by the Rev. R. L. Dabney, D. D.

THURSDAY MORNING, May 26, 9 o'clock.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by Rev. J. B. Morton. The Minutes of Tuesday and Wednesday were read and approved.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures made a report on Overtures 22, 10, and 17, which were placed on the docket.

The Rev. Dr. Mullally, on behalf of himself and others, presented the protest of which notice had been previously given. It was ordered that said protest be admitted to record, and that a Committee be appointed to prepare a suitable answer. The protest is as follows:

The undersigned beg leave, respectfully, to protest against the action of the General Assembly taken on Friday, the 20th instant, in sending, by telegram, fraternal salutations to the General Assembly at Buffalo:

1. Not from any bitterness of feeling. Your protestants love the Northern Church, and sincerely pray for her spiritual health and prosperity. Nor do your protestants desire that this venerable body should refuse all recognition of that Church as Christian and Presbyterian. They would not in any way oppose a response on the side of this Assembly to prayerful greetings sent to us by the Northern Assembly.

2. But the undersigned present this protest: (1) Because they are persuaded that under the aggrievances received from that Church, and never removed, it is unbecoming in this Assembly to do more than it has done in former years, namely, to return Christian salutations when they have been given. (2) Because this action of our Assembly, the undersigned are persuaded, taken as it must be in connection with the settlements uttered in the discussion preceding it, will be understood as meaning that our Church has receded from the position taken in the Baltimore Conference, and since deliberately confirmed by three successive General Assemblies of the Southern Church. (3) Because your protestants regard the independence of the Southern Presbyterian Church as a great boon mercifully bestowed upon her at an opportune time, when that laxity of discipline and doctrine, now so prevalent, began to invade the Presbyterian Churches of the North and of Scotland; and they deprecate every tendency towards a surrender of this great gift of independence which has hitherto proved the means of securing our beloved Church against many evils that have befallen other Churches in these evil days, and of enabling her to maintain her pristine purity of practice and doctrine in a degree that becomes the admiration of wise, spiritual men in all the reformed Churches of the world.

Upon the report of the Committee, the records of the Synod of Missouri were approved, with the exception that on page 23 it appears that the Synod, in reply to an overture asking "Are not our various forms of so-called benedictions prayers?" gave the answer, "they are prayers." We recommend that exception be taken to this answer, because of its inconsistency with the Form of Government, chap. 2, sec. 4, par. 5; and with chap. 4, sec. 2, par. 4.

The subject of "retrenchment and reform" was, as the order of the day, again taken up, when the following amendment to the majority report which had been offered by the Rev. S. T. Martin, was rejected:

"To strike out the clause of the first resolution, and insert this: That the Assembly remand the education of candidates for the ministry to the several Presbyteries, directing them to send twenty per cent. of their gross receipts for this cause to the Treasurer, to be distributed to supply the wants of the weaker Presbyteries, i. e., those who may have an excess of candidates and a deficiency of funds."

The question then recurring upon the recommendations offered by the Rev. A. C. Hopkins, in behalf of the

majority of the Committee, these were adopted, the vote being upon a count of the house—120 to 8. The recommendations are as follows :

“*Resolved*, 1. That the five Executive Committees be continued as at present, and that the Publication and Education Executive Committees shall hereafter publish monthly acknowledgments of all receipts into their treasuries, in the *Earnest Worker*.

2. That the General Assembly shall exert its influence upon the lower courts to bring about their rigid inspection of all accounts, and systematic and exact management of money matters by all diaconal officers of our congregations.”

The Rev. Mr. Martin gave notice of his intention to enter a protest against this action of the Assembly.

The order of the day was then taken up ; whereupon the Rev. J. B. Adger, D. D., chairman of the Committee on the Revision of the Directory for Worship, presented a report containing a statement in regard to the work of the Committee, and it was made the order of the day for this afternoon at 4½ o'clock to hear the reading of the Directory as now revised by the Committee.

The judicial case was resumed, when the appellant was again heard through his representative. It was determined that the members of the Assembly, in giving their opinions, should be limited to five minutes each.

The roll was then called and completed, when a recess was taken until 4½ o'clock, P. M.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, 4½ o'clock.

The Assembly met. The Rev. Dr. J. B. Adger, Rev. A. C. Hopkins, and W. R. Lyman, were appointed a committee to answer the protest of Rev. Dr. Mullally and others.

The report containing the Revision of the Directory for Worship, was read by the Rev. Dr. Adger, chairman of the committee, and, after discussion, the further consideration was suspended to resume the judicial case. The vote of the Assembly was then taken by calling the roll, and the result was, to sustain the appeal, 90 ; not to sustain, 22 ; non-liquet, 6.

The appeal of Mr. Turner, therefore, was declared to be sustained, and it was resolved that a committee be appointed to bring in a minute explaining the sense of the

Assembly in the decision thus given, which committee was appointed to consist of the Rev. D. W. Shanks, the Rev. A. C. Hopkins, and ruling elder J. M. Buford.

The Rev. Dr. B. M. Palmer, chairman of a committee appointed by a previous Assembly in relation to the office of Evangelist, presented a report, which was placed on the docket.

The report of the Standing Committee on Publication was read by the Chairman, Rev. Dr. Mullally, and was placed on the docket.

A recess was taken until 8½ o'clock this evening.

THURSDAY NIGHT, 8½ o'clock.

The Assembly met. It was made the order of the day to receive reports on Synodical Records, immediately after the reading of the minutes to-morrow morning.

The unfinished business was taken up, and the following paper was adopted :

The Committee appointed to Revise the Directory of Worship hope that they are able now to present the Revision in a much improved form. Their effort last year was, of course, only tentative. We were well aware that all we could produce of ourselves could only serve as a basis on which it must be for the Presbyteries to build—a skeleton into which they must breathe life, and which they must cover with flesh and clothe with beauty. A number of the Presbyteries have devoted themselves with zeal and ability to this business, and the work under their skillful manipulations will be found, we trust, much more acceptable to the Church.

The changes made at the suggestion of the Presbyteries are numerous. The chief ones are an alteration in the order of the last four chapters and the omission of all forms except the one prepared for a funeral occasion, where no minister is present. All these forms having been omitted, your Committee do not think it necessary to retain the note about Forms, which many Presbyteries desired to have inserted in the body of the Directory. As we have left out the Forms we have left out the Note.

We have to report that a copy of the Revision, as it now stands, is ready for the Assembly for it to dispose of as it may judge best. The Committee very respectfully suggest that if this body can afford the time necessary, and consider it to be advisable, the Revision, in its present form, be now read aloud, that the Assembly may judge of its

improvements. But if, on the other hand, this be not the pleasure of the body, your Committee would then suggest that the Revision be recommitted, to be printed, and one copy sent to every minister, one to every session, and two copies to every clerk of Presbytery, and that the Presbyteries be directed to take up the work again for a fresh examination, and report the results to the next Assembly.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures made a report on Overture No. 20, pending the consideration of which the Assembly adjourned until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock; closed with prayer by the Rev. J. S. Watkins.

FRIDAY MORNING, May 27, 9 o'clock.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. P. Fletcher. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Upon report of the various committees, the following Synodical Records were approved as far as written, viz.: those of the Synods of North Carolina, Nashville, Alabama, Memphis, Virginia, and Georgia.

In regard to the records of the Synod of Kentucky, which have not been sent up for revision, the attention of that Synod is called to the Form of Government, chapter 5, section 5, par. 5.

A telegram from the Young Men's Christian Association of the United States and the British Provinces, was read and referred to the Standing Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

A letter was read from the Rev. Wm. P. Handy, delegate appointed from the General Synod of the Reformed Church, which also was referred to the same Committee

The Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries presented a report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee on Theological Seminaries was charged with the consideration of the following overture from Bethel Presbytery:

The Presbytery of Bethel respectfully overtures the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church to convene in Staunton, Va., May 19th, 1881 :

1st. That in view of the increasing dangers that environ the cause of Truth, the Assembly urge upon the Presbyteries the necessity of a closer examination of all applicants for licensure, as to their familiar and thorough acquaintance with the Bible itself.

2d. That the Assembly recommend and urge upon the attention of the Boards of Directors of our Theological Seminaries the pressing demand for a more copious, thorough and direct study of the Book they are to preach, on the part of our theological students, not merely in private, but under the direction and lead of the Professor.

3d. That with a view to effect this result, as well as to put the opportunity of a thorough training for the ministry (subject to such restrictions and limitations as the Assembly shall deem necessary) within the reach of that numerous class of active, able and highly competent young men who have never enjoyed the advantages of a classical education ; and in view, furthermore, of the speedy reorganization of the Columbia Seminary, Bethel Presbytery would urgently pray the General Assembly to lend its sanction and approval to the plan of substituting, in that Institution, for the exegetical study of the Scriptures in the original Hebrew and Greek, that of the English Bible, old and new versions, confronted with and corrected upon the original, in all cases of real or supposed error, or other serious difference of opinion.

Bethel Presbytery would not be understood as desiring or sanctioning any proposal to supercede or neglect the study of the original languages of Scripture, on the part of such as are qualified for it ; but only to make the direct study of the Bible, as a whole (which can be effected only in that form which is most familiar, to wit : its English dress), the basis, practically, as well as theoretically, of our system of theological instruction, at least so far as regards the Seminary about to be reorganized.

We would not be understood as desiring the appointment of a special professorship with reference to the purpose proposed ; but rather that this feature be engrafted upon our system of theological education, and superadded to the ordinary studies of the seminary course, with the exception indicated.

Adopted in Presbytery at Lancasterville, S. C., April 5th, 1881, and ordered to be sent to the General Assembly.

D. HARRISON, Stated Clerk.

After a careful consideration of this overture, the Committee would recommend to the General Assembly the following action, viz :

1st. That the Assembly call the attention of the directors of our two Theological Seminaries to section 2 of said overture, expressing their

hearty approval of any practicable measure which will secure a more careful study of the English Bible by our seminary students, as a part of their theological training.

2d. That the matter presented in section 3 of said overture involves a change in our constitution (see Form of Government, chapter VI, section 6, article IV.), and such change must be made not by authority of the General Assembly, but by the action of the Presbyteries.

The narrative on the state of religion was read by the Chairman of the Committee, the Rev. J. A. Quarles, and was adopted.

The following report, from the Standing Committee on Publication, was made :

The Standing Committee on Publication beg leave to report on the four following overtures referred to its consideration :

1. From the Presbytery of St. Johns, to the effect that "inasmuch as the blanks for Presbyterial Reports on Sabbath Schools do not correspond with the blanks for Sessional Reports on the same subject, the General Assembly instruct the Secretary of Publication to so alter one of the two blanks as to make it correspond with the other, that more accurate and definite information on the subject may be given." To this overture the answer is recommended that there is no important discrepancy between the two forms referred to by the Presbytery. Adopted.

2. From the Presbytery of Ebenezer, "to cause to be prepared a full and accurate index to the Book of Church Order, and that said index be made to appear in all future editions of said book ; and also that chapter and section be printed at the tops of the pages throughout the book." To this overture the answer is recommended, that it is inexpedient to direct the desired changes to be made now, in view of the fact that the Directory for Worship is under revision. Adopted.

3. From the Presbytery of East Hanover, asking for a revision of the present Hymn Book. In answer to this overture it is recommended that the request be granted. Not adopted.

4. From the Executive Committee of Publication, as to a proposition from Messrs. Scribner & Co., publishers, in New York, to furnish the Rev. Dr. Charles S. Robinson's collections of Hymns and Tunes for use in various seasons of worship, to take the place of our own Hymn Book. It is recommended that the Executive Committee be not authorized to make the proposed contract. Adopted.

The Standing Committee on Home Missions made the following report, which was adopted :

The Standing Committee on Home Missions, to whom was referred the Memorial and Petition of the Presbytery of Western Texas, respectfully recommend the reference of this memorial to the Executive

Committee of Home Missions, at Baltimore, with the earnest hope that the Committee may be able to throw four or five evangelists into the broad and destitute territory indicated in said memorial, and in order to their maintenance, the churches are urged to make early and liberal contributions to this special object.

The same Committee reported the following paper, which was adopted :

The Standing Committee on Home Missions, to whom was referred the overture of the Synod of Virginia, respecting the organization of our colored churches into an independent body, recommend the following resolution for adoption :

Whereas, the colored people have always manifested a preference for an organization of their own, which has been recognized by us at all times as both natural and proper, the attention of Synods be specially called to this matter, with a view to forming such churches as may be within their bounds, into Presbyteries, if the way should seem clear ; and that adjacent Synods correspond with each other in the incipency of this movement, in order to secure the necessary co-operation.

It was made the first order for the afternoon to consider the report of the Standing Committee on Home Missions.

The Auditing Committee made the following reports, which were adopted :

Your Auditing Committee, to whom was referred certain resolutions and communications from the Trustees of this General Assembly, beg leave to report the following recommendations: That as the terms of James Hemphill, Esq., and Joseph H. Wilson, Esq., terminate at this Assembly, that they be re-elected Trustees for three years, and that as the resignation of Mr. Jesse H. Lindsay has been tendered and accepted, we recommend that the vacancy be filled by the election of R. I. McDowell, Esq.

Your Committee cannot realize a necessity for the attendance at the General Assembly of the President of the Board of Trustees, therefore offer no recommendation as to that matter.

We further report that we find on file by the Treasurer of the Board (Mr. Jesse H. Lindsay), the following receipts of the Rev. Dr. Richard McIlwaine, Treasurer of Foreign and Home Missions, viz: For securities turned over to the said Treasurer by direction of the last General Assembly ; securities for the Relief Fund amounting to thirty-one thousand five hundred dollars ; and also scrip for twenty-five shares of the capital stock of the South Western Railroad Co. of the State of Georgia ; also from the said Dr. McIlwaine, Treas., receipts for coupons amounting to the sum of six hundred and forty-five dollars ; and also for three hundred and thirty dollars, of same coupons, at a different time. Respectfully submitted,

The Auditing Committee having had referred to them the correspondence in reference to certain legacies to the committees of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, viz: By the last will of Mrs. Henrietta Jaccard, of one thousand dollars to the cause of Foreign Missions; by the same, a similar sum to our Invalid Fund; and also a bequest by the will of John W. Milligan, of Belmont county, Ohio, for a residuary legacy, for some of our executive committees, beg leave to recommend that the Board of Trustees of the General Assembly be appointed to receive these bequests, or any others, for the use of any of the Executive Committees of our Church.

Your Auditing Committee beg leave to report that they have, with all the care practicable within the limited time at their disposal, examined the books and vouchers of Rev. Richard McIlwaine, D. D., Treasurer of Foreign Missions (being aided by him, and having every facility afforded). We find his accounts well kept, and his vouchers carefully filed. His receipts, from all sources, correspond with the printed report of the Executive Committee. His disbursements are duly authorized by the said Committee, and are verified by the proper vouchers.

The balance due the Treasurer of Foreign Missions on 31st of March, 1881, is as follows: On account of Campenas debt, three thousand two hundred dollars (\$3,200.00); on account of general debt, six thousand fifteen dollars and seven cents (\$6,015.07); together making the sum of ninety-two hundred and fifteen dollars and seven cents.

Also, a report on the accounts of the Treasurer of Home Missions, which is as follows:

The Auditing Committee have examined the books and vouchers of Rev. Richard McIlwaine, D. D., Treasurer of Home Missions, and find them correct and well kept. The receipts correspond with the amounts in the printed report of that Executive Committee, and the disbursements made on account of appropriations by the said Committee, and are all verified by vouchers.

The balances of the various departments of the Executive Committee are as follows:

Sustentation.—Balance due the Treasurer on the 31st of March, 1881, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven dollars and forty-eight cents (\$1,967.48).

Evangelistic Fund.—Balance in the Treasury on 31st March, 1881, three thousand eight hundred and twelve dollars and sixty-two cents (\$3,812.62).

Colored Evangelistic Fund.—Is balanced by charging seven hundred and eighty-eight dollars and eight cents (\$788 08) to Sustentation on same day (March 31, 1881).

Invalid Fund.—Balance due Treasurer 31st March, 1881, five hundred and seven dollars and eight cents (\$507.08).

Relief Fund.—This account is balanced on the 31st March, 1881, and shows a balance in the hands of the Treasurer, on that day, of five hundred and twenty-six dollars and ninety cents (\$526.90).

Also, a report on the accounts of the Treasurer of Publication, which is as follows :

Your Committee have also examined the books and accounts of the Treasurer of Publication, with care, and find them carefully and accurately kept, and to be in accordance with the printed report presented to your body.

The total amount of assets, as therein set forth, is fifty-six thousand seven hundred and ten dollars and fifty cents (\$56,710.50); and the total liabilities are thirty-six thousand nine hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty-three cents (\$36,966.63); leaving an excess of assets over liabilities of nineteen thousand seven hundred and forty-three dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$19,743.87).

We desire to state, however, in order to induce greater liberality on the part of the Church at large, that the foregoing excess over liabilities is more nominal than real, a large amount (more than nineteen thousand dollars) being in stereotype plates, of value to the Church, but of small market value; and another item going to make up the assets, is some thirteen hundred dollars of old accounts of long standing, a portion of which may be eventually paid, rendering it impracticable for the Treasurer to retire them to profit and loss, but from which the Church may, or may not, realize any considerable part.

We find also, that the expense connected with the real estate (the Publishing House) to be in excess of rents, &c., two hundred and ninety-six dollars and sixty-three cents. This does not include, of course, any damage that may be to the house from age and use.

Your Committee take pleasure in saying that they find the accounts and books of the Treasurer, Dr. Hazen, kept in a most satisfactory manner, making the work of your Committee quite an easy task.

Also, a report on the accounts of the Treasurer for Tus-kaloosa Institute, which is as follows :

Your Committee have examined the books and vouchers of Dr. J. T. Searey, Treasurer of the Tuskaloosa Institute for the training of colored ministers, and find the balance on hand April 1st, 1880, to be as per Treasurer's books, two thousand one hundred and four dollars and seventeen cents (\$2,104.17), which, no doubt, is the true amount; and the receipts for the year to be two thousand seven hundred and

seventy-six dollars and seventeen cents (\$2,776.17), making an aggregate of four thousand eight hundred and eighty dollars and ninety-three cents (\$4,880.93).

His disbursements have been the following, viz: Salary to Rev. D. C. Rankin, one thousand and seventy-five dollars (\$1,075.00); paid to students five hundred and four dollars and seventy-five cents (\$504.75), and miscellaneous, two hundred and thirteen dollars and eighty-five cents (\$213.85); making an aggregate of one thousand seven hundred and ninety-three dollars and sixty cents (\$1,793.60), and leaving a balance in the hands of the Treasurer, on 1st April, 1881, of three thousand and eighty-seven dollars and thirty-three cents (\$3,087.33).

Your Committee ask leave to repeat the recommendation of the Auditing Committee of the last Assembly, that the receipts and disbursements of this Institute be printed for the use of the General Assembly and Church.

Your Auditing Committee report that they have likewise examined the accounts of the Treasurer of Education, G. W. Macrae, Esq., and find them correct and regularly kept and vouchers exhibited for all disbursements; that the balance in his hands on the 10th of May, 1880, was one hundred and ninety-one dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$191.88); that his receipts from all sources to the 1st day of May, 1881, was ten thousand three hundred and thirty-five dollars and ninety-three cents (\$10,335.93), which together make a total of ten thousand five hundred and twenty-seven dollars and eighty-one cents (\$10,527.81). His disbursements are as follows: Remittances to students, eight thousand seven hundred and forty dollars (\$8,740); refunded on account of a twice paid check, ten dollars and ninety-five cents (\$10.95); Secretary's salary, seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750.00); Treasurer's salary, one hundred dollars (\$100.00); traveling expenses, one hundred and sixty dollars (\$160.00); stationary, postage, discount, etc., fifty-one dollars and fifteen cents (\$51.15); printing reports, forty-seven dollars and seventy cents (\$47.70); making in all of disbursements nine thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine dollars and eighty cents (\$9,859.80), leaving a balance in the hands of the Treasurer, May 1st, 1881, of six hundred and sixty-eight dollars and one cent (\$668.01).

The Secretary's accounts correspond fully with those of the Treasurer, and require no separate notice by the committee.

Your committee recommend that hereafter these reports of the receipts and disbursements of the funds of this Executive Committee (Education) be printed for the use of the General Assembly.

Your Committee also report that they have examined the books and vouchers of the Rev. Joseph R. Wilson, D. D., Treasurer of the Assembly, and find them all accurate and with vouchers for payments.

Balance on hand last year, together with the receipts of the year, amounts to the sum of two thousand eight hundred and sixty-two dollars and fifty-two cents; expenditures one thousand five hundred and thirty-eight dollars and fifty-five cents, leaving a balance in his hands, April 30th, 1881, of one thousand three hundred and twenty-three dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$1,323.97.)

In concluding their work your Auditing Committee desire to say that the work assigned them is quite too large for the limited time in which they are expected to report. Your committee have endeavored to conscientiously discharge the duty assigned them by the Assembly and have devoted much time and labor thereto, but after all that has been done, or can be done, during the session, our reports are largely dependent on the integrity of and the confidence we place (not improperly we think) in the brethren who have charge of the Church's work.

The Committee on Systematic Benevolence made a report, which was adopted and is as follows:

REPORT ON SYSTEMATIC BENEVOLENCE.

The Committee on Systematic Benevolence respectfully report to the General Assembly as follows:

Fifty-seven Presbyteries have sent up reports but some of them are very imperfect, while ten Presbyteries have sent no reports. Some of our Presbyteries show an increase in benevolent contributions and others show a decrease, but upon the whole there is encouraging improvement. But the Church is yet far below what can reasonably be done for the glory of God and the salvation of souls.

The contributions to Foreign Missions amount to \$59,215. (Odd cents are omitted throughout this report.) This is an increase of nearly \$11,000, or about eight cents per member over last year.

Sustentation received \$18,526, or nearly the same as last year.

The Evangelistic cause received \$10,958, which is \$2,520 more than last year.

Contributed to the Invalid Fund \$10,248, the same as last year within a few dollars.

The cause of Publication received \$8,009, \$3.00 more than last year.

Contributions to aid our candidates for the ministry to complete their education amounted to \$10,335, or \$810.00 less than last year.

Tuskaloosa Institute received about \$2,000.

Contributions to the Colored Evangelistic Fund are painfully small, only \$597 from the whole Church. The Providence of God has brought us, as a Church, into peculiar relations to the African race among us that place us under responsibilities which we fear are not being met as duty demands.

The whole amount contributed to the various causes of benevolence, recommended by the General Assembly, sums up a little less than \$120,000, or not quite one dollar per member. We do not hesitate to say that more than twice this sum ought to be given during the coming year. While some individuals, churches and presbyteries, do well, a very large number do nothing. Six hundred and sixty churches give not one cent to Foreign Missions. More than one thousand churches give nothing to the cause of Publication, and the same is true of other benevolent causes of the Church. If our Presbyteries can secure collections from those hundreds of non-contributing churches, it will do them good and will greatly increase the general work of our Church.

When we look at the aggregate work of our whole Church, it seems considerable, but when we remember that ten cents per week given by each member would be more than five times as much as they now give it should stimulate us to do vastly more in the future. Your committee recommend:

1st. That the Presbyteries be urged, and are hereby urged, to do their utmost to increase the amounts contributed to each of the benevolent schemes of our beloved Church, and especially to secure collections from all of our hitherto non-contributing churches.

2nd. That at least \$10,000 should be raised this year for Evangelistic work among the freedmen within our bounds.

The Committee on Foreign Correspondence made a report, which, after some discussion, was recommitted.

After devotional exercise, a recess was taken until 4½ o'clock, P. M.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, 4½ o'clock.

The Assembly met. The report from the Special Committee on the Sabbath was read by the Rev. H. H. Hawes, and was adopted, and is as follows:

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE SABBATH.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Standing Committee, and other documents, on the Sabbath, would respectfully report:

1. That the Assembly approve the diligence and faithfulness of its Permanent Committee in prosecuting the work assigned it.
2. Your Committee would recommend the continuance of the Permanent Committee on the Sabbath, as at present constituted.
3. That the Committee be instructed to institute such correspondence with other evangelical churches as will secure their co-operation in bringing the "Sabbath question" to the attention of the civil authorities of all the States.

4. The Assembly would not recommend any overture, either as citizens or as ecclesiastics, to the Congress of the United States, until the co-operation of the great bulk of the evangelical churches of the whole country may be obtained.

5. The Assembly recommends their continuance where they do exist, and the appointment where they do not exist, of Presbyterial Committees, whose object shall be the instruction of their own people, the furnishing of the Assembly's committee with facts and statistics, and the proper agitation of this question in their respective bounds.

The following paper was adopted :

The Committee appointed to report a minute expressive of the decision of the Assembly in the judicial case from the Synod of Georgia, submit the following :

This case is an appeal by W. S. Turner, from a judicial decision of the Synod of Georgia, which, in effect, sustained the Session of Central Church, Atlanta, Georgia, in its refusal to grant the appellant a letter of dismission to the Southern Methodist Episcopal Church, upon the ground that the appellant had been judicially admonished by the Session, and was, therefore, when he applied for the letter of dismission, under judicial censure, and so not entitled to such a letter.

The Assembly is of opinion :

1. That judicial admonition is a censure whose legal force terminates when it is inflicted.

2. That Mr. W. S. Turner was not, therefore, under judicial censure when he applied for a letter of dismission.

3. That he was in "good and regular standing" in the sense that he was not under judicial process or censure.

4. That the said Turner not being under judicial process or censure, was entitled to a letter of dismission, if he desired it, to a church in connection with this Assembly.

5. That the usage of the Church is to grant a letter of dismission to members in good and regular standing, to churches not connected with this Assembly, but that such a letter cannot be demanded as a matter of legal right.

For these reasons, the Assembly sustains the appeal of W. S. Turner, and reverses the decision of the Synod of Georgia.

The report of the Standing Committee on Sabbath Schools was read by the Rev. E. Forman, and was adopted, and is as follows:

One hundred and ninety-eight schools are reported by the Presbyteries which have furnished no statistics.

We are glad to be able to say that a large majority of our Sabbath Schools are using our publications, and are under the control of the Sessions of the churches.

We find that many of our preachers preach to the children of the Sabbath Schools, and would urge all our ministers to do the same.

Notwithstanding the favorable contrast presented in the reports of the past year with those of the preceding year, your Committee would reiterate the recommendations of the Assembly of last year:

1st. That our Presbyteries appoint, each, a Superintendent of Sabbath Schools, or a permanent committee, whose special duty it shall be to promote the Sabbath School work.

2d. That they recommend all Presbyterian Sabbath Schools to be conducted under the control of the Session, and thus cultivate the idea that the Sabbath School is not something apart from the Church, but the Church, old and young, studying the Bible.

3d. That they instruct Sessions to use our own publications, especially the "Earnest Worker," "Children's Friend," and Shorter Catechism, and Child's Catechism in the Sabbath Schools of our Church, and thus shut out so-called helps whose doctrines are often false, and for which no one is responsible.

4th. That they also take measures to promote and encourage the attendance of the children upon the preaching of the Word, and train them to give by system to all the objects of benevolence in our Church.

5th. That they be more careful in requiring their Stated Clerks to send full and accurate statistics of the Sabbath Schools in their bounds, with concise answers to the questions propounded in the Sessional Reports.

Your Committee would also recommend the adoption of the following:

7th. That Presbyteries earnestly discourage Sessions from co-operating with Union Schools, wherever it is at all practicable to have schools of their own.

The report of the Standing Committee on Home Missions was adopted, and is as follows:

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Standing Committee on Home Missions beg leave to report that they have examined the Report of the Secretary, together with the Minutes of the Executive Committee and accompanying papers, including the account of expenses incident to the conduct of the office at Baltimore, and find abundant evidence of fidelity and zeal on the part of those to whom these important interests are entrusted.

Under the general denomination of Home Missions, several departments of Christian labor are embraced. A summary of what has been done under each of these, during the past year, is proper, as laying the foundation of the recommendations which this report will submit to the consideration of the Assembly.

1. *Sustentation.* The last General Assembly proposed the sum of \$40,000 as the amount that would be required to aid the feeble churches within our bounds in the support of their ministers. Of this amount, however, only \$18,526.08 were realized; less by \$724.35 than was contributed the year before. The payments made to the Presbyteries amount to \$18,492.75; exceeding the appropriations of the preceding year by \$862.34. The estimate of the Committee at Baltimore of what will be required for the coming year is \$50,000.

Undoubtedly one of the greatest drawbacks to the prosperity and growth of the Church is to be found in the inadequate support of her ministers, of whom it has been ascertained that only 55 per cent. are properly maintained. The Sustentation scheme was devised as, at least, a partial method of relief; and, beyond a doubt, it has enabled many a feeble church to tide over difficulties in the past, and will preserve others from extinction in the future by the timely aid, however scant, this Committee may be able to afford. The chief difficulty in accomplishing this important end lies in the unwillingness of some of the Presbyteries to co-operate; which prevents the Church from ascertaining what her whole strength would be in this particular direction.

2. *Evangelistic Work.* The receipts in this department have been \$10,958.89; larger by \$2,520.11 than ever before received. The sum of \$8,028.91 has been distributed amongst 30 Presbyteries in support of 36 evangelists. Eight other evangelists maintained by Presbyteries which do not act in connection with the Committee, swell the number of laborers in this arm of the service to 44. The report of the Secretary is encouraging, and shows that the attention of the Presbyteries is increasingly directed to the supply of their own destitutions through the agency of evangelists. In order to equalize, as far as possible, the supply of these destitutions throughout the Church, the sum of \$25,000 will be needed during the coming year; especially in view of the fact that 15 Presbyteries make an immediate call for 21 evangelists in addition to those already employed, who cannot be put into the field without the funds for their support.

The evangelistic work among the colored people is sustained through a special fund, which, though more than doubling that of the preceding year, has amounted only to \$597.75. This amount has been entirely expended in this work, with the addition of \$788.08 appropriated from the Sustentation Fund, making a total expenditure of \$1,385.83. It has been distributed through 10 Presbyteries in support of 11 ministers, of whom 9 are colored. In addition to the sums passing through the hands of the Executive Committee, the sum of \$1,320.75 has been raised and expended within the Presbyteries themselves, making a total of \$2,706.58. We have now amongst the colored people 25 churches, which is an increase of 7, with 16 ministers and 7 candidates of that race; all which indicates progress in this work so dear to all our hearts.

3. *Invalid Fund.* The needs of this fund are estimated at \$12,000; an amount approximated by the contribution last year of \$10,248.27, which has been distributed to the amount of \$8,014.55, through 49 Presbyteries, in support of 106 families of infirm or deceased ministers. The obligation of sustaining the helpless households of those who have fallen in the Master's service, is one of the most tender that can lie upon the conscience of the Church, and it may be urged with the full assurance of a constant and cheerful response.

4. *Relief Fund.* An earnest effort has been made by the Executive Committee to carry out the wish of the last Assembly to transfer this business to a corporation outside of the Church, in which all the interests of the beneficiaries shall be fully secured. The fulfillment of this desire of the Assembly has been barred by the refusal of some of the contributors to consent to any arrangement by which the Assembly shall be discharged from the obligations of its own contract.

In view of all these statements, it is recommended to the Assembly as follows:

1. To approve the diligence and zeal of the Executive Committee, and to rejoice with thanksgiving to God for the measure of success which has been attained in the several departments of the work committed to their care during the past year.

2. In accordance with the action of preceding Assemblies, the Presbyteries are anew urged to group their feeble churches, as far as practicable, into pastoral charges, and to seek to overtake the destitution within their bounds by a vigorous employment of the evangelistic arm.

3. That in all cases of the inadequate support of the ministry, Presbyteries be urged to stimulate their churches until the full ability is reached in the just discharge of this obligation, in order that the pastoral office may be advanced to its highest efficiency.

4. That in view of the wide destitutions in our land, which can only be overtaken by the co-operation of the Presbyteries, it is earnestly desired by this Assembly that such co-operation should, if possible, be attained, especially in an effort to raise, during the coming year, the sum of \$40,000 for the cause of Sustentation, the sum of \$25,000 for the Evangelistic Work, in view of the fact that both these funds are burdened with the work of evangelizing the colored race.

5. Inasmuch as some of the contributors to the Relief Fund refuse to consent to a transfer of their interests to a corporation outside of the Assembly's control, the Executive Committee are hereby instructed to retain the oversight of this business as heretofore, but to permit no new names to be added to the list of beneficiaries, with a view to the gradual extinction of the Church's responsibility; and further, that the Executive Committee re-open negotiations with the contributors of this fund, and urge upon their consideration the strong desire that is felt by this Assembly to have this business brought to an early close in any form satisfactory to the parties interested.

6. The following persons are nominated to constitute the Executive Committee for another year, viz:

Rev. J. Leighton Wilson, Secretary; Rev. Richard McIlwaine, co-ordinate Secretary and Treasurer; Rev. J. J. Bullock, Rev. John Leyburn, Rev. J. A. Lefevre, Rev. W. U. Murkland, G. F. Anderson, John L. Weeks, C. F. McCay, Isaac D. Jones, and J. Harmanus Fisher.

All which is respectfully submitted,

The Committee on Bills and Overtures made a report which was adopted and is as follows:

No. 13. From the Presbytery of St. Johns, in regard to the raising of a Commissioner's fund by means of assessment upon the churches. The Committee recommend the adoption of the answer returned by the Assembly of last year to a similar overture from the Presbytery of Dallas, to-wit: "Various plans for equalizing the expenses of delegates to the Assembly have already been tried and failed. The present plan, however faulty in theory, is the only one which has at all answered the purpose of securing due attendance at the meetings of the Assembly. It is therefore inexpedient in the judgment of this Assembly that any change be made in the present plan at this time."

The Committee on Bills and Overtures reported on overture No. 29 from the Synod of Texas touching the right of private judgment.

The Committee recommend the following answer: The Form of Government, (Chapter 5, Section 2, Par. 2,) declares that "church courts can make no laws binding the conscience, but may frame symbols of faith," etc. It follows that church courts are not infallible but on the contrary "all may err, and many have erred; therefore they are not to be made the rule of faith or practice, but to be used as a help in both." [Confession of Faith, Chapter XXXI, Section III.] Thus the right of private judgment is asserted; this right, however, is not opposed to lawful authority, but to the assumption of power to bind the conscience.

Adopted.

The following paper was adopted:

Inasmuch as the revised version of the New Testament, which has been prepared by two committees of Christian scholars from all the leading Evangelical denominations of Great Britain and the United States has been published and widely circulated, and inasmuch as the language of the Directory for Worship is that "the Scriptures shall be read from the most approved version in the vulgar tongue,"

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to examine the revised version of the New Testament, and to report thereon to the next General Assembly.

This committee was appointed to consist of the Rev. G. D. Armstrong, D. D., Rev. Joseph R. Wilson, D. D., Rev. J. W. Pratt, D. D., Rev. J. N. Waddell, D. D., and Rev. Charles C. Hersman.

The meeting of the next Assembly was appointed to be held in the First Presbyterian Church in the City of Atlanta, Georgia, on the third Thursday of May, 1882, at 11 o'clock, A. M.

It was made the first order for to-night to take up the report of the Standing Committee on Publication.

The Standing Committee on Education presented a report through its Chairman, Rev. Dr Harding, which was adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Standing Committee on Education respectfully present the following report:

Your committee offer the following recommendations to the Assembly for its adoption:

1st. That the Assembly approve the fidelity and diligence of the Executive Committee.

2nd. That there be no change in the plan for aiding students during the ensuing year.

3d. That the Assembly earnestly enjoin upon the Presbyteries to take into serious consideration the question of supplying candidates for the ministry.

4th. That the Assembly approve the recommendations of the Executive Committee, which are as follows:

That Presbyteries be not hasty in their reception of candidates. That they be very thorough in examination of them as to personal piety and their views in seeking the ministry, and request the Faculty of the institution which their candidates are attending to send to the Presbyterial Chairman of Education monthly statements of their department and standing in their studies.

5th. That the usual concert of prayer for young men in our institutions of learning be observed on the last Thursday in February.

6th. That the following persons be chosen to constitute the Executive Committee of Education for the ensuing year:

Rev. E. M. Richardson, Secretary; Rev. G. W. Macrae, Treasurer; Rev. E. Daniel, Rev. J. M. Rose, Rev. J. O. Stedman, Rev. E. E. Bigger, Rev. R. R. Evans, B. M. Estes, M. P. Jarnagin, James Elder, C. C. Graham.

A recess was taken until 8½ o'clock to-night.

FRIDAY NIGHT, 8½ o'clock.

The Assembly met and it was ordered that during the remaining sessions no member be allowed to speak more than once on the same subject, nor longer than five minutes.

The report of the Standing Committee on Publication was

taken up and twenty minutes were allowed the Chairman, Rev. Dr. Mullally, in which to explain said report. The report of the committee was adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATION.

The Standing Committee on Publication respectfully report to the General Assembly:

1. That the records of the Executive Committee are a full and satisfactory journal of its proceedings, and that its annual report is a clear and comprehensive statement of the present condition of our publication scheme; also, that the Secretary of Publication has been before us, and while he most carefully refrained from indicating the slightest preference in respect to any policy for the future conduct of publication, he gave us the fullest satisfaction in answering every question touching the present condition of the scheme. Your committee are convinced that he has the now somewhat complicated business at his fingers ends and is working not in the dark, but the light of noonday, and not in any spirit of venture but in that of intelligent caution. The examination of Dr. Hazen also assures your committee that the committee at Richmond has diligently and faithfully performed the work entrusted to it, and that it deserves the full confidence of the Church.

2. It gives us pleasure to report that all that can strictly be called the debt of the Church on account of publication, has already been reduced to about \$5,000, and may be expected with all the certitude that business prospects admit of, to be fully liquidated before another year has passed.

3. In the judgment of this committee there is no reason why the least uneasiness should be felt touching the mortgage on the publishing house. This judgment is based on the following considerations: 1. The insurance policy and what could be realized by sale of the lot would, in case of fire, amount to more than the sum for which the property is mortgaged. 2. The property, if now forced on the market, would, it is believed, bring the sum due on it and more. 3. Real estate is appreciating in the city of Richmond. 4. There is no reason to apprehend that the mortgagee will ever press his claim in any injurious way. 5. The publishing house for the last year has virtually been of no expense to the Church, and all indications are that it will be a clear gain next year. 6. If the General Assembly should hereafter elect to have its own depository of books in Richmond, so that the Secretary of Publication, under the direction of the Executive Committee, might be charged with filling the orders of the churches for books and papers, then, the publishing house would afford the necessary deposit room free of rent, or in addition to paying all expenses of interest and repairs, and thus save at least \$400 a year to our beloved Church. These considerations lead your committee to the conclusion that the present relation of the publishing house is that of gain and not of loss. Hence your committee recommend that the

discretion given to the Executive Committee by the General Assembly of last year in reference to the sale of the publishing house be also given to it by this Assembly.

4. In answer to the inquiry of the Executive Committee as to renewing certain Hymn Book stereotype plates, your committee recommend that since a revision of our Hymn Book is mooted, it is not expedient to incur the implied expense at present.

5. In reference to the *Earnest Worker* and *Lesson Quarterly* and the *Children's Friend* and the *Lesson Papers*, this committee recommend that they be approved by this Assembly as affording in excellent style all the help of the kind which is needed by our Sabbath Schools, and as well deserving the praise and support of the Church, and that this Assembly urge it upon the Presbyteries to see that they are used in all our schools and families.

6. We recommend that the Executive Committee be authorized to use for donation purposes 10 per cent. of the contributions of the churches, or 15 per cent., if it should seem desirable and the finances admit, and that the committee may at their discretion use part of this per centage in the printing and distribution of tracts.

7. The judgment of this committee is respectfully offered for the approval of the Assembly that it is desirable that our Secretary, under the direction of the Committee, should as soon as practicable be charged with the responsibility of filling the orders of the churches and of our people generally for books and papers.

8. We recommend that the following persons be appointed the Executive Committee of Publication to serve for the ensuing year, viz:

Rev. James K. Hazen, D. D., Secretary and Treasurer; M. D. Hoge, D. D., C. H. Read, D. D., T. L. Preston, D. D., W. T. Richardson, D. D., Rev. Wm. N. Scott, Rev. Wm. A. Campbell, Charles Gennet, Robert Ould, B. R. Wellford, E. H. Fitzhugh, Charles D. Hill, M. M. Gilliam.

The following paper was presented by the Rev. Dr. Hazen and adopted:

WHEREAS, The Executive Committee of Publication were directed by the last General Assembly to publish and distribute the majority and minority reports on Retrenchment and Reform, and did so with the understanding that the bill for the same would be paid out of the Contingent Fund of the General Assembly, it is hereby ordered that the Treasurer of the General Assembly be authorized to pay said bill out of the funds in his hands.

The following report was taken from the docket and adopted:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE OFFICE AND POWERS
OF THE EVANGELIST.

The Committee on the Office and Powers of the Evangelist, appointed in 1879 by the Assembly at Louisville, and which was enlarged and continued in 1880 by the Assembly at Charleston, find their instructions in the resolutions under which they were appointed, which are: "To report on the whole subject of the office and powers of the Evangelist, his relation to the General Assembly and the Presbytery at home, his relation to the church gathered among the heathen, and his relation to his fellow Evangelists in the same missionary field; and said committee shall report to the next General Assembly by a proposed additional chapter to our Form of Government, or otherwise." (Minutes of Assembly for 1879, page 28.)

After careful consideration of the whole subject, it does not appear to your committee to be necessary to add a new chapter to the Form of Government for the reason that the doctrine of the Evangelist is set forth with sufficient clearness in Chapter IV, Section 2, Articles I and 7. Nothing is required but the application of the general principle to the concrete case of the Evangelist at home or abroad, which can be done in a declarative paper without importing into the organic law details of legislation upon which there may be more or less diversity of opinion in the Church. The committee therefore avail themselves of the discretion with which they are indulged, and submit their conclusions in a form to be adopted by the Assembly, if it sees fit, as simply interpretative of the law which already exists.

I. The Office and Powers of the Evangelist.

The only feature that distinguishes the Evangelist from the ordinary "Minister of the Word" is that he labors to plant the Gospel and the institutions of the Church in places where they do not exist. When his field lies within the territory of the Church as already organized, his powers are circumscribed within those of the court having jurisdiction over the same. As the Form of Government (Chapter V, Section 4, Article 6, and Chapter VI, Section 2, Article 1) assigns the power of forming new churches and of ordaining to office, to a court, these extraordinary functions of the Evangelist can be exercised only when expressly delegated by the court to him as their agent. When his field lies beyond the territory which the Church occupies, his powers are necessarily enlarged. There being no court to discharge these functions, the constitution recognizes as inhering in his office all the powers that are necessary to constitute the Church. He may organize churches and ordain to all the offices required to make them complete; and also, with a view to the extension of the Church, he has the power to ordain other Evangelists, both natives and for-

eigners, provided the latter be not under the jurisdiction of a Presbytery at home, in which case the concurrence of said Presbytery shall first be obtained. As soon, however, as a court is created, even the lowest, his extraordinary powers cease within its jurisdiction, and can be resumed only in the region that is beyond; the guiding principle being, that the powers of an Evangelist cannot supersede nor impair those which pertain to a court, either at home or abroad.

II. The Evangelist's Relation to the General Assembly and the Presbytery at Home.

The Evangelist is a member of the Presbytery to which he belongs in the same sense with every other "Minister of the Word," with the same rights and privileges, equally amenable to its discipline, and sustains, through the Presbytery, precisely the same relation to the Church at large. But as the Foreign Missionary is supported by the whole Church, and as the Form of Government (Chapter V, Section 6, Article 5) vests in the General Assembly the power "to institute and superintend the agencies necessary in the general work of Evangelization;" the immediate direction and control of his labors is remitted by the particular Presbyteries to the Assembly, as the Presbytery which is common to them all. This control is exercised, ad interim, by the Assembly through its Executive Committee of Foreign Missions, as a Commission created for that purpose, with such powers as the Assembly may from time to time see fit to delegate, and equally responsible with the Evangelist himself to the Assembly, in which body rests the authority to decide all questions that may arise in the exercise of their respective functions.

Upon the two remaining topics, viz: "The Evangelist's Relation to the Church Gathered Among the Heathen," and "His Relation to His Fellow Evangelists in the Same Field," your Committee find themselves, after two years of conference, unable to agree. It would be easy to bring in two reports running counter to each other, which would only involve the Church in the abstract discussion of points which must, at last, find their practical solution in the foreign field. Your committee can therefore agree only in recommending to the Assembly to drop for the present the consideration of these topics, and to wait for their practical solution in the future history of our missionary operations. All of which is respectfully submitted.

The Committee on Foreign Correspondence made a report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee on Foreign Correspondence would report:

1. An overture from Holston Presbytery asking that the appointments of delegates to the General Presbyterian Council be distributed amongst our various Synods—at least one from each Synod—and that it be referred to the Synods to make the nomination, each for itself.

Your Committee recommend the Assembly to reply that it has no control over the action which it may please the Assembly of 1883 to take respecting its appointments, but is willing to express the opinion that the appointments should be distributed, and that nominations from Synods should be invited.

2. A request from the Council for a small Standing Committee to be appointed by this Assembly, with whom the Clerks of the Council might correspond.

Your Committee recommend that this request of the Council be complied with by the Assembly.

3. An overture from the Synod of Texas asking this Assembly to request the Northern Assembly to appoint a Committee to confer with one to be appointed by this Assembly about the territory in Texas, so as to avoid conflict in labors.

Your Committee recommend that the Assembly would express its earnest desire that brethren in Texas, from the Northern and Southern Churches, should endeavor to avoid interfering with one another in their Church work, and cultivate peace, but would refer to our Presbyteries all practical propositions for the cultivation of their fields; and would have the Synod of Texas, in a way merely advisory, do all which it can to promote charity and edification.

4. A letter from the delegate appointed to represent, on this floor, the Reformed Church, stating the circumstances which have prevented his appearing, and urging us to send a delegate to the approaching meeting of their General Synod.

Your Committee recommend that the Rev. Miles Saunders be appointed principal delegate, and the Rev. John A. Scott, Senior, alternate delegate.

The Clerks of the Assembly were appointed the Committee to correspond with the Council.

The report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, on the overture from the Synod of South Carolina, was taken up, and was amended by a substitute, which was under consideration when the Assembly adjourned.

The Assembly then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock; closed with prayer by Ruling Elder T. C. Smith.

SATURDAY, May 28, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by Rev. W. P. Bingham. The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

A report from the Committee appointed by the last Assembly to revise the Presbyterian assessments, was made through the Chairman, Rev. Dr. J. R. Wilson, and adopted. It is as follows :

The unfinished business of last night, viz: the substitute for the report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, was taken up, and was amended by the adoption of another substitute, which is as follows :

To the overture from the Synod of South Carolina, the Assembly returns the answer: That all just and necessary consequences from the law of the Church, are a part of the same, in the logical sense of being implicitly contained therein. The authority of this law is, however, two-fold: it binds all those who profess to live under it as a covenant by which they are united in one communion, so that there is no escape from its control except by renouncing its jurisdiction; and it binds because it has been accepted as a true expression of what is revealed in Holy Scripture as infallible truth. The consequences deduced from it cannot, therefore, be equal in authority with the law itself, unless they be necessarily contained within it as shown by their agreement also with the Divine word.

The report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures on overtures Nos. 6 and 7 was adopted, and is as follows :

No. 6. A request from the Synod of Georgia, for a division of the said Synod, and for the erection of a new Synod to be called the "Synod of South Georgia and Florida." No. 7. A protest from the Presbytery of Savannah against any such division.

The Committee recommend the following answer : That the request of the Synod of Georgia be granted : that the Presbyteries of Savannah, Florida, and St. Johns be erected into a new Synod, to be called the *Synod of South Georgia and Florida*. That this new Synod hold its first meeting in the Church at Jacksonville, Fla., on Wednesday before the second Sabbath of November, 1881, at 7½ o'clock, P. M., and that the Rev. W. J. McCormick preach and constitute with prayer, and in case of his absence, that the Rev. W. B. Telford be appointed to take his place.

The following report from the Committee appointed to answer the protest of Rev. Dr. Mullally, and others, was adopted, and is as follows :

It is not now, and it has never been, with our Church, a question whether we should not, in some form, acknowledge a Christian brotherhood with the Northern Presbyterians. More Catholic and Christian sentiments towards all Evangelical Churches, more especially those of the Presbyterian order, are nowhere to be found than in our Minutes of 1861 and 1865. But the question simply is as to the form and extent of the acknowledgment. This statement is established by well-known facts :

1. At the close of the war, when brethren of the Northern Church were present in our Synods and Presbyteries, they were invited to sit as corresponding members.

2. As soon as a Christian salutation was sent by their Assembly to ours, it was immediately reciprocated. But,

3. In 1870, and subsequently, we declined a proposal for an interchange of delegates, which would recognize each other as corresponding bodies on the distinct ground that this has always been regarded as the most manifest and visible consummation, and the most complete evidence of such relations. Like the sending of ambassadors between nations, this interchange of delegates carries with it the fullest significance of fellowship, and we declined it unless our aggrievances should first be removed. This position was confirmed by several successive Assemblies.

From this statement it will be seen that there is manifestly no inconsistency in the course pursued by our Assemblies. It is not a question of fraternal relations in some form ; to this we have never objected. In certain forms, and to a certain extent, such recognition

has always been observed. Nor, when the form adopted has been that of merely a Christian salutation, is it a question whether we should or should not give that salutation first. That is a matter of no material moment. This Assembly solemnly denies that our Church has receded at all from the position taken in the Baltimore Conference, and deliberately confirmed by three successive Assemblies. The independence of the Southern Church is, indeed, as the protestants expressly affirms, "a great boon mercifully bestowed upon her at an opportune time, when that laxity of discipline and doctrine now so prevalent, began to invade the Presbyterian Churches of the North and of Scotland," and, with the protestants, this Assembly would deprecate "every tendency towards a surrender of this great gift of independence which has hitherto proved the means of securing our beloved Church against many evils that have befallen other churches in these evil times."

This Assembly stands, therefore, in the position assumed by our Church long ago, taking no step forward and no step backward.

JOHN B. ADGER, Chairman.

The Rev. Dr. Adger presented the following protest, which was ordered to be admitted to record without answer:

The undersigned respectfully asks leave to enter his protest against the Assembly's decision that no change whatever shall be made in its system of Executive Committees. If the conclusions of the minority report go to one extreme, the propositions of the majority report (which the Assembly has adopted) go, in the judgment of the undersigned, to the other. There is dissatisfaction in the Church, wide-spread and growing, with some features of our system. There are reasonable objections from our constitution and from expediency, also, to the Assembly's managing what properly belongs to our Presbyteries in the work of Home Missions and of Education. And there are objections wide-spread and good, against the continued concentration of Home and Foreign Missions in the hands of one and the same committee.

For these and other reasons, your protestant respectfully dissents from, and solemnly protests against, the Assembly's action in this matter.

The Rev. S. T. Martin read the protest of which he had given notice, and it was ordered that said protest be admitted to record, and a committee appointed to prepare an answer to it. This committee was appointed to consist

of Rev. G. D. Armstrong, D. D., Rev. A. C. Hopkins, and ruling elder W. C. Bullock. The protest is as follows :

The undersigned would respectfully dissent from, and protest against, the action of the Assembly in the matter of Retrenchment and Reform, on the following grounds :

I. Of principle, in that 1. "The daily ministration" of the finances of the Assembly's work is committed to bishops instead of to deacons, as demanded by the Scriptures and by our standards. 2. In that powers of jurisdiction, in the present arrangement of the Executive Committees, are granted to our Secretaries, to whom, as individual ministers, the powers of order alone belong. 3. In that the work of evangelizing our home fields is not directly and fully committed to the Presbyteries, to whom, according to our constitution, it properly belongs.

II. On the ground of expediency, in that, 1. The zeal and activity of the Church, we believe, would be more fully developed by remanding the home work to those directly interested in it. 2. In that the funds raised for evangelistic work would be thus more economically administered in the lessening of the expenses of the central agencies, and in committing their distribution to those who have directly contributed to them.

III. On parliamentary grounds, in that, 1. This important matter involves a consideration of some nine different propositions, and yet it was decided without any special attention to them in detail, that the Assembly might see whether our evangelistic operations might not, in some respects, be modified. 2. In that, though the matter was fully discussed by the majority, no opportunity was afforded the minority, *on the day of settlement*, to present its views, and the mover of the amendment was cut off from his privilege of replication on his own motion by the call for the question; and was thereby prevented from correcting a defect in the form of the motion, which defect prevented some from voting for it who desired its adoption in substance. At the close of the remarks on the general subject, the amendment was offered, when the question arose as to whether it had been seconded; this being ascertained, the floor was claimed as a matter of privilege to read a communication from Dr. Robinson. The mover of the amendment did not press his claim, both from considerations of courtesy and because, being indisposed at the time, he was willing to defer his remarks, never doubting that the Assembly would hear him, *on his own motion*, before the vote should be taken. 3. In that the vote was taken upon the question as a whole, many being thereby debarred from voting for particular propositions which they favored.

While your protestants believe that the action of the Assembly was taken under a misapprehension, they feel that the facts should be

known, as showing that the vote taken was no indication of the sentiment of this Assembly with regard to some of the propositions of Reform.

The report, as offered by Dr. Girardeau, on the subject of the Diaconate, was taken up, and was then, without discussion, referred to the next General Assembly.

The answer of the Committee on Bills and Overtures to overture No. 22, was taken up and adopted, and is as follows :

No. 22, from the Presbytery of Savannah: "Can one elder constitute a quorum of Session to act in connection with a minister, invited by himself, when he is the only elder of that particular church?" The Committee recommend that this overture be answered in the affirmative.

Against this action, the Rev. J. W. Montgomery gave notice of his intention to enter a protest.

The report of the Committee upon the Records of the Synod of Texas was taken up, and said records were approved. From this action ruling elder T. C. Smith entered his dissent.

The records of the Synod of South Carolina were approved.

The report of the Committee on the Records of the Synod of Mississippi were taken up, and the report was adopted. It is as follows :

We recommend the approval of the Records of the Synod of Mississippi, so far as written, with the following exceptions, viz: On page 324 of the Records, it appears that a former action of Synod, in directing a Presbytery to restore a deposed minister, had met the disapproval of the General Assembly, and Synod justifies its former

action in this case by saying that it regards the language of the Book of Discipline, Chapter xi., Sec. 7, as advisory, whereas it is mandatory, and requires that a Presbytery act with great caution, and restore a deposed minister only by degrees.

The Committee on Foreign Correspondence made the following report, which was adopted :

The Committee, after much consideration of the telegram recommended to it, have grave doubts of the expediency of this Assembly beginning to hold correspondence with other than ecclesiastical bodies; yet, since we have in this case gone so far, the Committee are of opinion that the Assembly ought to return a reply to the Young Men's Christian Association, and therefore this reply is recommended for the Assembly's adoption.

The salutation received is as follows :

The General Assembly met at Staunton, pray that the grace of our Lord Jesus may be with you.

The following overture was taken from the docket, and the answer adopted :

No. 17. From W. H. Humphreys and W. W. Trimble, asking sundry questions touching the official status of the Stated Supply; the rights of the people in the selection of a minister, and the measure of the deacon's discretion in the management of the Church's temporal affairs.

The Committee recommend the following as to the first two points: 1 The Stated Supply being unknown to our standards has, as such, no official status. As, however, the Stated Supply is not unknown in our practice, it may be well to say that he has all the rights, and should discharge all the duties of the minister of the gospel, such as preaching the word, administering the sacraments, etc.; but he is not a member of the Session by virtue of stated supplyship. He can only act as Moderator by invitation of the Session, except when his relation

as Stated Supply is sanctioned by the Presbytery, under Form of Government, Chapter 5, Sec. 3, Par. 3. 2. The whole case of the Stated Supply is anomalous; but the underlying principle of Form of Government, Chapter 6, Sec. 1, par. 2, would seem to require scrupulous regard to the wishes of the congregation in employing or dismissing a Stated Supply.

The Committee to answer the protest of Rev. S. T. Martin and others, made a report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

1. That the Assembly desire to say nothing respecting the first and second divisions of said protest, as their vote sets forth, with sufficient clearness, their views of the matters embraced therein.

2. That, in the third division, all they desire is to enter a correct statement of fact on the records on the following points, viz: 1st. That when the Moderator awarded the floor to Judge Bullock, he did so not as a matter of courtesy or of privilege, but as a matter of right; and that Dr. Robinson's letter was read by Judge Bullock as a part of his speech. 2d. That when, after a long debate, continued through several days, the Assembly sustained the call for the question, this action cut off the author of the majority report from a further hearing, as well as the author of the minority report; so treating both parties alike.

The Committee on Leave of Absence made a report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee on Leave of Absence respectfully report that leave of absence has been granted to the following Commissioners: After Wednesday, May 25, to J. J. Boozer, S. P. Greves, and Thomas H. Brewer, T. Pryor, J. D. Anderson, W. R. Lyman, M. B. Shaw, J. T. Davidson, P. P. Barbour, J. A. Patillo, J. J. Moorman, and J. Leighton Wilson. After Saturday, 28th, at 11 o'clock, A. M., to J. A. Lefevre.

The answer of the Committee on Bills and Overtures to overtures 3 and 4, was taken up and adopted, and is as follows:

Nos. 3 and 4: From the Presbyteries of Atlanta and Chesapeake, touching a change of Chapter 12, Sec. 3, Book of Discipline, so as to read thus: "This provision shall apply, *mutatis mutandis*, to the case of ruling elders and deacons."

The Committee recommend that the proposed change be submitted to the Presbyteries for their action.

he answer to overture No. 16 was adopted, and is as follows :

No. 16: From the Presbytery of Mecklenburg, asking, 1: Do the provisions of our book (Rules of Discipline, Chapter 6, Sec. 6, and Chapter 3, Sec. 2,) apply to the case of a member of the church who refuses to obey the citation of the Session to appear for conference concerning matters affecting the Christian character, when no formal charge has been preferred? 2. If they do not, by what means must the Session deal with resistance of its authority when it exercises the power conferred in Chapter 5, Sec. 3, Par. 5, Form of Government, and endeavors to perform the duty therein devolved on it of inquiring into the knowledge, principles and Christian conduct of the church members under its care by directing the members to appear before the Session?

The Committee recommend the following answer: Chapter 6, Sec. 6, Rules of Discipline, refers only to formal judicial prosecution, and requires that charges be preferred and the offender formally cited to appear before the Session for the purpose of answering the charges. Chapter 3, Sec. 2, Rules of Discipline, refers to offences which may call for judicial prosecution, or may not, according to the nature of the case; and of this the Session is to be the judge. The authority of the Session, as defined in Chapter 5, Sec. 3, Par. 5, Form of Government, allows the Session to enquire into the "knowledge, principles and Christian conduct of the members under its care," without formal judicial process. If its authority is resisted when so exercised, the Session may then proceed to cite the offender to appear, as provided in Chap. 6, Rules of Discipline. If, after two citations, its authority is still resisted, the Session may proceed to deal with the offender for contumacy, as provided in Chapter 7, Sec. 2, Rules of Discipline.

Also, on overture No. 10, which was adopted, and is as follows :

No. 10: From Montgomery Presbytery, asking for a change of Parliamentary Rules respecting the method of action by the Assembly upon the matter of overtures.

The Committee recommend that the request be not granted, because of the impracticability of considering overtures in the manner proposed.

The following protest was presented, in accordance with previous notice, and was ordered to be admitted to record without answer.

The undersigned respectfully enters the following protest against the decision of the Assembly in returning an affirmative answer to an overture of the Presbytery of Savannah, to the effect that one elder in

a church in which there is no other, may constitute a Session competent to the exercise of all its powers, by inviting a minister to preside. Your protestant respectfully dissents from this decision for the following reason, viz: The election of a Moderator is an act of jurisdiction, and can be performed only by a quorum; and one elder is not a quorum, according to Form of Government, Chapter 5, Sec. 3, Par. 1 and 3, as interpreted by paragraph 6.

It was, on motion,

Resolved, That the thanks of the Assembly are tendered to the good people of Staunton for their cordial and bountiful hospitality, and to the railroads and steamboat lines which reduced their rates for the benefit of delegates, and to the churches of the city which threw open their pulpits to the members of the Assembly.

The Minutes of to-day were read and approved.

It was then, on motion, resolved that this General Assembly be now dissolved, and that another General Assembly, chosen in like manner, shall meet in the First Presbyterian Church in the city of Atlanta, Georgia, on the third Thursday of May, 1882, at 11 o'clock, A. M.

Closed with prayer by the Rev. B. M. Palmer, D. D., and with singing, and with the benediction by the Moderator.

NARRATIVE OF THE STATE OF RELIGION.

Fifty-nine Presbyteries have reported upon the state of religion within their bounds, from which the following particulars have been gathered :

1st. There is a record of official fidelity sent up from all parts of the Church. Many of the reports emphasize the zeal, the self-denial, the faithfulness of the ministry. Some of them complain of the neglect of the pastoral duty of visiting on the part of ruling elders. A few declare that the office of deacon is not filled in some of the churches, while others lament that their deacons are not alive to the importance of their rank.

2d. As to the attendance upon the ordinances of God's house and an appreciation of them, the testimony is substantially unanimous that the condition is decidedly encouraging.

3d. Not many of our Presbyteries, and but few of our churches, have been visited by especial outpourings of the Holy Spirit, though the majority of the reports indicate that the Spirit has been present, adding to the Church such as should be saved.

4th. Intemperance is everywhere bewailed as the monster evil of the day. But few churches, however, find it amongst its members. Worldly amusements seem to be giving but little trouble. Covetousness is named in some of the reports as prevailing to an alarming extent.

5th. One of the most painful features of the situation is the general report of the neglect of family worship. The family is the integer of the Church ; indeed it is the Church in miniature. Defection here demands the earnest consideration of our pastors and sessions.

6th. It is painful to learn, in this connection, that catechetical instruction is so largely neglected in our Christian households ; but it is, on the other hand, encouraging to know that our Sabbath schools are almost universally attending faithfully to it.

7th. That the Sabbath is everywhere, according to our ideas, desecrated by the Government, by the common carriers and by worldly men, is a fact too well known. It is, however, pleasant to know that in the general community, and in the Church, the reports show a healthier sentiment and a correspondingly better practice.

8th. In worshiping God with their substance, the reports almost without exception, show an increased and growing fidelity on the part of God's people.

9th. Except in Texas and from a few weak Presbyteries elsewhere, the reports would indicate that our fields are well supplied with spiritual husbandmen.

10th. The colored population seem to have passed, for the present at least, beyond our reach. They prefer their own preachers and services. In some sections they are reached by Sunday schools, and in a

few cases we have colored churches. But it is manifest that we can influence them now only by helping to train their ministry. Surveying the whole field, we have reason to thank God, and take courage for another year of more faithful work.

ABSTRACT OF THE TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee feel called upon to render thanks to Almighty God for the many and great mercies He has bestowed on the missionary work during the past year. Among these favors may be mentioned the very considerable increase in the contributions of God's people for the support of this cause; the greater diffusion of missionary intelligence, and the growing conviction in many parts of the Church that she has a great work to do in evangelizing the benighted nations of the earth; the lively interest which our Christian women are feeling, and the earnest and self-denying efforts they are putting forth to promote this cause, as also the interest which is cherished in our Sabbath-schools in the same great work; the quiet and peaceable manner in which our missionary brethren have been permitted to prosecute their labors, and the large number of souls that have been rescued from the dominion of Satan and brought into the fold of Christ through those labors; and especially would they give thanks to God that, in consequence of the increased contributions of God's people, as many as twelve missionary laborers have been sent out to reinforce our different missions, and thus save them from the calamities with which they have been threatened for the last four years. It has been the aim of the Committee, in the prosecution of the work assigned them, not to plant any new missions, but to strengthen and consolidate those already established. Of course the enlargement of the missionary force will call for increased contributions, but the hope is confidently entertained that the Church will take no backward step, but will go forward with new life and increased alacrity. Her own honor, the glory of the Master, and the salvation of poor dying men are all involved in the earnest and faithful prosecution of this great work, and it is earnestly hoped that it will never be recorded of our beloved Church that she was wanting in the discharge of this most solemn duty.

The whole force now engaged in the missionary work under the direction of the Church, and supported by her contributions, consists of eighteen ordained missionaries, one missionary physician, twenty-six assistant missionaries from this country, thirteen ordained native ministers, and thirty-four native assistants, variously employed as teachers, colporteurs and Bible readers. The whole missionary force, therefore, consists of ninety-three persons, being an increase of ten laborers during the year.

As has already been stated, twelve missionary laborers have been sent out during the year. This had become a matter of absolute necessity for the preservation of some of our most important missions. Several of them had endured the strain on their resources to the last extremity, and it is a marvel of Providence that they were not permitted to be entirely overthrown. The Committee were glad that the means were placed in their hands to strengthen most of the weaker positions in the work, and that this could be done without increasing our indebtedness. It has not been their aim to establish any new

missions, or to extend the work beyond its existing limits; but to strengthen and consolidate what has been carried on for several years past. The urgent and multiplied calls for enlargement have been held in abeyance for better and brighter times.

The aggregate receipts for the year are \$59,215.39, which is an increase over those of last year of \$10,737.41. Of this amount \$42,365.03 are from churches and individuals; \$10,603.60 from ladies' missionary associations, and \$6,246.76 from Sabbath schools. There has been a material increase in each one of the above mentioned departments. On the part of churches and individuals, the increase has been as much as \$9,894.08; on the part of ladies' missionary associations of \$572.24, and from Sabbath schools of \$263.09. The whole number of churches that have contributed is 1268, which is 68 more than contributed last year. The whole number of ladies' missionary associations is 264, which is an increase of 53 new associations. These associations are to be found in 56 different Presbyteries. The number of contributing Sabbath schools is 289, which is 57 more than contributed last year. These contributing Sabbath schools are to be found in 63 different Presbyteries.

The indebtedness is \$6,015.07 on general account, and \$6,000 on the Campinas debt, aggregating \$12,015.07, showing an increase of the general debt of \$1,636.92, but a corresponding decrease of the Campinas debt.

The number of paying subscribers to the *Missionary* the last year was 3,045, being an increase of 425 over that of last year. The amount of cost to the treasury (for twelve months), over and above receipts, is \$389.32. There would have been no loss, but a gain to the missionary treasury of several hundred dollars, if more than 1,000 copies had not been gratuitously sent to ministers. It is confidently believed that if the price were fixed at \$1, instead of 50 cents, it would not only be self-sustaining, but would at once yield a handsome income; but it is felt to be the wiser policy to keep it at the lower figure in order to secure a wider circulation. The Committee beg leave to express their strong conviction that the highest interests of the cause of Foreign Missions are involved in continuing the *Missionary* just as it is. They have reason to know that it is being read by thousands of our best Christian people with a profounder interest than ever before; that hundreds and thousands of dollars are being brought into the treasury through its statements and appeals, and that the great body of our Christian people, largely through its influence, are becoming more thoroughly imbued with the missionary spirit, which is indeed the spirit of Christ. Under these impressions, and with the full assurance that it will be alike gratifying to the Assembly and the Church at large, the Committee have great pleasure in announcing to the Assembly that arrangements have been made by which the *Missionary* shall be published hereafter without cost to the missionary treasury, and at the same time be sent gratuitously to all ministers that have pastoral charges. In this respect it will probably be considerably in advance of all other missionary magazines of a similar character in the country.

The question, shall the Southern Presbyterian Church have a mission on the continent of Africa? is propounded to the General Assembly for its serious and prayerful consideration. The command of the Great Redeemer is to go and preach the Gospel to every creature. Our beloved Church has its representatives in Europe, in Asia, in South America, in Mexico, and among the Indian tribes of our own country, making known to these various races the unsearchable riches of Christ. But on the great outlying continent of Africa, with its 200,000,000 of immortal beings; with all its geographical secrets recently brought to light; with the great facilities, both present and

prospective, for traversing every portion of it; with extraordinary linguistic advantages for diffusing the knowledge of salvation through all its boundaries; in view of that marvelous Providence which has brought that great but benighted continent right along by the side of our own; in view of the further fact that almost every other branch of the Evangelical Church is putting forth its most earnest efforts to impart the blessing of the Gospel to that people, *yet, up to the present moment, the Southern Presbyterian Church has not one single representative to proclaim to that perishing people the salvation of Jesus Christ.*

For years we had not the means to engage in such an undertaking, and consequently little or nothing was said on the subject. But now we are in improved circumstances, and is it not proper that we should testify our gratitude to Almighty God by undertaking to ameliorate the condition of these miserable people? If there is nothing in the character of the people themselves to draw our hearts towards them (which no heathen people have), ought we not at least to be moved by considerations of sorrow and pity, and should we not hearken to the voice of the Great Captain when he bids us enter the door which He Himself has opened to us? In being surrounded with the representatives of this people whom we can easily train to be helpers in the work, we have greater advantages than almost any other Christian Church for carrying on the missionary work in Africa. It would not require a very heavy outlay of funds—certainly for a number of years—to establish and maintain a mission in Western Africa; perhaps not more than \$5,000 or \$6,000 per annum. At the same time, the most eligible point along the whole coast of Western Africa, at least in the judgment of the writer, is still open to us, and through which, in a very short time, we would be enabled to unfurl the Gospel banner in the very heart and centre of the great valley of the Congo. What shall be done? Let our response be such that we shall not be ashamed to have it recorded in the courts of Heaven.

ABSTRACT OF THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF
THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF HOME MISSIONS.

The work of Home Missions has been conducted by the Executive Committee during the past year with the most entire harmony of view between themselves and the Presbyterian agencies. The methods employed have been those repeatedly approved by the General Assembly, and which have heretofore been found useful. The only change in this respect which has been made, is that *The Missionary* has not been used, except to a very limited extent, as the channel of conveying information to the Church about this department. This has been felt to be a great loss, but as the original and exclusive design of this magazine was to advocate the cause of Foreign Missions, and it appeared desirable to present this single branch of effort in its pages with unbroken effect, there seemed to be no room to question the propriety of the course adopted. It is evident, however, that if the cause of Home Missions is not to be retired to a second-class position in the esteem of the Church and its efficiency to be seriously crippled, it must have some means of representing its needs and presenting its claims stately to our Christian people, and as it is impracticable to issue a periodical for this special purpose, it is proposed, with the consent of such of the editors of our religious papers as may not deem the design injurious to their publications, to occupy a certain space in these papers at least once a month in giving information and exciting interest in the branches of work included under this department.

The only embarrassment the Committee has suffered during the year has been occasioned by the very inadequate means placed at their disposal. This has been felt in all branches of the work, and under the head of Sustentation has been peculiarly distressing. But for this difficulty the Committee would have an unbroken story of encouragement to tell.

The number of co-operating Presbyteries is one less than at the last meeting of the General Assembly, the Presbyteries of Mecklenburg and South Carolina having withdrawn, and the Presbytery of Wilmington having restored its relations with the Committee. The Presbytery of Charleston, which has heretofore directed its churches to observe the Assembly's collections does not now feel able to do more than send a certain per cent. of what its churches give. The Presbytery of East Hanover has directed its Committee of Missions to confer with the Executive Committee in reference to re-establishing its relations with the Assembly's work, and it is hoped that this may be effected. The non-co-operating Presbyteries at present are Concord, Chesapeake, Nashville, Mecklenburg, Fayetteville, Charleston, South Carolina, and East Hanover. Concord, Chesapeake and Mecklenburg do not co-operate in any branch of the work. The others have co-operated in the Invalid work, and some of them with marked liberality. All these Presbyteries, except Chesapeake and Nashville, have agreed to send a certain per cent. of the collections of their churches to the Assembly's treasury. It ought to be stated with reference to Chesapeake, that it is by far the weakest, numerically and financially, of the Presbyteries named above. Besides these, the Presbyteries of New Orleans and Orange, which co-operate with the other branches of Home Missions, conduct evangelistic work separately.

The time has now perhaps come when a sufficiently broad induction can be made upon which to base an accurate judgment of the financial results of the method adopted by these Presbyteries in its bearing upon the Assembly's work in its frontier and destitute parts. It is believed that this phase of the question has been little considered, and its importance seems to require that the General Assembly and Presbyteries

shall clearly understand it. Nothing is needed except a few simple calculations based on data placed herewith before the Assembly in the Treasurer's Report, to show that however salutary this system may be in maintaining the work in the stronger Presbyteries, if extended, it must result in leaving the weak Presbyteries in helplessness and inefficiency.

The total receipts for all the funds in this department have been \$46,-302.09, which is larger than ever before, and a gain of \$1,389.58 over last year. But there was a falling off of \$651.85 in the Relief Fund, so that the gain in the funds which depend on contributions of the Church was \$2,041.43.

For sustentation, the receipts from all sources amount to \$18,526.08, which is \$724.35 less than last year. This falling off is more than accounted for by the difference in the receipts from the Presbyteries which formerly sent their collections to the central Treasury, but now retain them at home. There has been no falling off in the total received from co-operating Presbyteries and a slight increase from miscellaneous sources.

The payments to Presbyteries have been \$18,492.75, which is \$862.34 more than last year, and leaves a balance of indebtedness against the treasury of \$1,967.48. This statement does not, however, fully represent the case, for on March 31st the Executive Committee had assumed obligations to pay for second installments and to aid in church erection over \$8,000, which has to be provided for by October. Besides this, it has been necessary since April 1 to make some further appropriations, which have added to these obligations.

Sixty Presbyteries report that out of 644 ministers, wholly engaged in ministerial work, 356 are adequately supported by their charges. This is about 55 per cent—a falling off of 4 per cent. from the report of last year, which is to be accounted for, perhaps, not by an actual decrease in ministerial support, but by the greater accuracy with which the reports have been made. The supplemental aid from the Sustentation Fund was so materially decreased the present year that it is impossible to form any correct estimate of the proportion of the whole number of ministers who are adequately supported. It is probable, however, that less than three-fourths of those who give themselves altogether to the ministry can be said to belong to this class. The proportion of non-supported ministers is larger in the Synods of Georgia and Texas than in any other. There is great inequality in the different Presbyteries, six reporting that every wholly engaged minister is adequately supported, while one states that only one out of nine, and several one out of three are supported.

A large majority of the Presbyteries report that their aided charges are growing steadily and decidedly. In a few cases removals and other causes are alleged as reasons why this is not the case.

In the matter of grouping churches so as to form convenient and self-supporting pastoral charges decided progress has been made, and the Presbyteries seem generally to appreciate its importance. Two hundred and seventy-seven churches are reported vacant which must be aided before they can be supplied with the gospel.

For Evangelistic work the receipts from all sources have been \$10,-958.89, which is the largest amount ever received by this fund, and is \$2,520.11 more than reported last year. The balance in the treasury on the 31st of March was \$3,812.62, which, with the probable receipts before July 1, will nearly if not quite suffice to meet the second installment of appropriations to evangelists then due. There has been paid during the year \$8,028.91 to thirty Presbyteries in the support of

thirty-six evangelists. Of these twenty-three are wholly engaged in strictly evangelistic labors and thirteen for only a part of their time. In the non-co-operating Presbyteries six evangelists have been employed for their whole time and two for one-fourth of their time, making forty-four in all engaged in this branch of service. This department of work, as conducted by the Presbyteries in connection with the Assembly's committee, was never in so hopeful and effective condition as at present, and the demand for its enlargement was never so urgent.

The receipts for the Colored Evangelistic Fund have been \$597.75, which is \$250.42 more than last year. The whole of the increase is from within the bounds of our own Church. Only twelve churches have sent collections. Franklin Street church, Baltimore, gave nearly two-thirds of all that was received from our own bounds. A steadfast friend of the cause, in Baltimore, who is not connected with our Church, has also given \$200 for this cause as he has continued to do for a number of years. There has been paid out from the Sustentation Fund \$788.08 on account of this branch of work, making the total appropriation paid from the fund \$1,385.83. If the funds can only be provided, it can hardly be doubted that brethren will be found to enter this self-denying and hard field with the determination that under God they will succeed in rescuing many from ignorance and superstition, and by the power of Divine truth give them strength and efficiency in the service of God. The Presbyteries report that they have under their care twenty-five churches, seven more than last year; sixteen ministers and licentiates, two more than last year; and seven candidates, three more than last year. This indicates decided progress. Thirty-seven Sabbath schools, under the care of our churches, are reported to exist, and there are perhaps others not known to the Presbyterial chairmen. Most of the Presbyteries have taken no action looking to the development of this branch of work and comparatively little interest seems to be manifested in it.

The receipts for the Invalid Fund have been \$10,248.27, which is within less than five dollars of what they were last year.

There has been paid \$8,014.55 to forty-nine Presbyteries in the support of twenty-nine aged and infirm ministers, and seventy-seven families of deceased ministers, which is one hundred and six families in all, sixteen less than last year. Six ministers who were aided from the fund have died during the year, but several of their families still need assistance. The debt reported last year of \$1,972.26 has been reduced to \$507.08, but in order to do this, it was necessary to reduce somewhat some of the appropriations. Had the fund reached \$12,000, the amount sanctioned by the last General Assembly, it would have been just about enough to make all the appropriations asked for and leave a little surplus in the treasury, and it is hoped this may be realized the present year. The decrease in the number of families needing aid can be accounted for by the death of several ministers, the improved condition of the country, and the ability of children who have entered upon life to take upon themselves the support of their mothers. It is not believed that it will be safe to estimate the needs of the fund at less than \$12,000, and it is hoped that this amount will fully suffice to meet all the demands which will be made upon it.

The receipts for the Relief Fund have been \$5,971.10, of which \$2,305 is interest from investments, which has been more than sufficient to meet the annuities falling due by \$155. Annuities have been paid during the year to the families of eight deceased ministers amounting to \$2,150. The whole amount paid from the beginning is \$12,590. The number of names on the relief lists whose premiums have been fully paid is seventy-one. No new names have been added during the past year, it not being deemed proper, under the action of the last Assembly, to increase the obligations of the fund. Three of its subscribers

have died since the last General Assembly. An investment in \$2,000 of bonds has been added to the fund, which now amounts to \$36,000. The last General Assembly instructed "the Executive Committee to confer with the beneficiaries of the Fund, and, if practicable, report to the next General Assembly a scheme of management by which it may be placed hereafter on an independent basis and the Assembly discharged from all responsibility."

Earnest attention has been given to this instruction, and it was hoped that a plan might be devised which would meet the views of all the subscribers. A number of gentlemen in Baltimore, most of whom are members of the Executive Committee, have consented to form a corporation to hold, manage and disburse the fund, as trustees for the subscribers, under the relief scheme, as adopted and modified by past General Assemblies, and this was the plan proposed and to which some object. Whether it is wise for the General Assembly, in view of the objections made and in opposition to the wishes of some of the subscribers, to proceed to carry out this plan is a matter for this venerable body to decide. The only other plan which suggests itself to the committee by which it may be possible to harmonize all views, satisfying at once the subscribers to the fund and giving measurable relief to the anxieties of those who fear that some disaster may entail loss and scandal on the Church, is for the Assembly to retain its oversight of the scheme as heretofore, and work it through its Committee, but permit no new names to be added to its lists.

ABSTRACT OF THE TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT OF
THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF PUBLICATION.

The amount received from churches, Sabbath schools, and individuals, and credited to collection account during the year, is \$8,009.71, being \$3.30 more than was reported last year. Besides this, \$7.00 has been received in payment of certain subscription notes; making the total amount contributed \$8,016.71.

It is worthy of note that the aggregate amount contributed to this cause during the year, covered by this report and the preceding year, is greater by nearly twelve and one-half per cent. than the aggregate of any two consecutive years since the war. The contributions of the churches proper are of course referred to, without including the amounts raised at different times by special agencies. This statement is important, as indicating an increased interest in this cause, and attention is called to it for the encouragement of all who are interested in this branch of the work of the Church.

From the old accounts due the Committee, only \$100.55 has been paid during the financial year. Of the remaining unpaid accounts, claims to the amount of \$1,036.15 have been ascertained to be worthless, and these have been charged to profit and loss, as it is desirable that our books should show as nearly as possible our actual financial condition. Of the accounts that remain upon the books, most have been recognized as just claims by the parties to whom they are charged, but efforts to collect them have not been very encouraging.

Profit and loss has also been charged with certain subscription notes, all for small amounts, which were taken by the traveling agent of the Committee over four years ago. On various grounds payment of these notes has been declined, and it is not thought desirable either to force the collection of them, or that our books should be cumbered longer with them, as it is reasonably certain that nothing will be realized from them.

The amount received from royalties during the year is \$1,999.00, a little more than was reported last year.

The Treasurer's annual report for 1880 showed the actual debt of the Committee of Publication, exclusive of the mortgage upon the publishing house, to be \$10,870.00. The interest which has accrued during the year being added to this, we have a total of \$11,929.56, of which \$5,925.11 has been paid. Of the remainder, \$54.45 was due by the Committee on old account; but of this \$37.82 has been credited to profit and loss, this amount having been found in the settlement of certain accounts to be in excess of the amounts actually due. The remaining \$16.63 to the debit of the Committee on old account consists of small balances which the Committee are not likely to be called upon to pay, so that the actual debt, exclusive of mortgage on the publishing house, which is protected by the property itself, is \$5,950. Cash in hand at the close of the year, and available notes, would reduce this to about \$5,000.

The rate of interest on the remaining debt will hereafter be but six per cent. The average of interest charges for the last four years has been very nearly \$2,000 per year (the amount last year being \$1,059.56). The coming year it will be less than \$400; and with this reduction of interest, another annual collection, even though it should be no larger than that now reported, will remove the last vestige of the debt that has so long burdened us and hampered our work.

Under the action of the last General Assembly, the Executive Committee have not relaxed effort to effect a favorable sale of the publishing house, but have had it constantly in the hands of efficient real estate agents for this purpose.

The publication of our list of Sabbath school papers—the *Earnest Worker*, *Lesson Quarterly*, *Children's Friend*, and *Lesson Papers*—

has been continued with encouraging and increasing success. While the subscription list has not grown as rapidly as in the two preceding years, yet there has been decided growth, as is shown by the amount of royalty reported from the papers, amounting to \$1,590.17, being \$119.73 more than last year. Besides this cash income derived from these papers, which helps so largely in meeting the expenses of the Committee, the Church derives a further benefit in the free distribution of these periodicals among the ministers of the Church to an amount in gross value of about \$1,150. This amount ought properly to be charged in some way to the donation account, and credited to royalty; and if this is taken into consideration, as it should be, it will be seen that the earnings of the papers amount to more than three-fourths of the total current expenses of the Committee.

Besides the evidence afforded by the growth of our subscription list, there have been many indications from all parts of the Church of the acceptability of our whole series of papers, but especially of the *Earnest Worker*.

As showing the amount of religious literature distributed during the year, it may be stated that the total number of volumes of all sizes, including tract volumes, distributed by the Presbyterian Publishing Company in the prosecution of the business of the Committee under its contract, is over 100,000, besides more than 150,000 pages of tracts.

The last General Assembly authorized the Executive Committee to appropriate for donation purposes ten per cent. of the contributions of the churches. Under this authority all applications for aid, coming before the Committee in proper form, have been responded to. The number of such applications during the early part of the year was very limited, the impression being generally prevalent among our churches that the Committee were not in a condition to extend any aid. Under these circumstances, it was thought wise that attention should be especially directed to the fact that the Assembly had taken the action above referred to, and that the Executive Committee were prepared to respond to appeals for aid within the limits assigned by the Assembly. A card was, therefore, issued to this effect. Since then frequent applications have been received, and have been responded to, though the total amount of donations for the year is only \$412.96. This, however, represents a gross valuation of about \$700, to which should be added the value of papers donated to ministers, \$1,150, making in all \$1,850. Over twenty Sabbath schools have received greatly needed assistance; a number of feeble congregations have been aided, and pastors and evangelists have been supplied with tracts for gratuitous distribution.

It is to be regretted that no more definite statement can be made of the colportage work; but the only way in which such a presentation of it as would be really valuable can be embodied in the annual report, is by securing from each Presbytery, through its chairman of publication or colportage, a complete statement, from which a report of the condition of the whole work might be made. In the absence of such data, we can only state that about twenty of the Presbyteries have, in some way, prosecuted the work during the year. Others have provided the means, and are about to enter upon it.

No special action has been taken by the Executive Committee during the past year in the department of Sabbath school work; but it is gratifying to be able to report to the General Assembly that there are abundant indications that our Churches and Presbyteries are recognizing more and more the necessity that this work should be under the supervision and control of our Church courts, and that the Sabbath school should not be regarded as in any way independent of the Church. It is apparent, also, that there is a growing appreciation of the importance of the Sabbath school teacher's office and work, and a growing demand for a higher standard of qualification. In some of our Presbyteries the duty of making provision for the training of

teachers is recognized, and it is to be earnestly hoped that very soon in all our Presbyteries some measures to this end will be taken.

ABSTRACT OF THE TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF EDUCATION.

The Executive Committee of Education would respectfully report to the General Assembly, now in session at Staunton, Va., that we have been permitted to pursue our work uninterruptedly during the year. Nothing has occurred out of the usual routine of our work, except the fact that early in the year, it came to our knowledge that some of our students proposed attending institutions of learning outside our own bounds. The committee called attention to the fact, and expressed it as their judgment that the Presbyteries ought to direct their students to attend our own institutions of learning.

The attendance of students upon institutions outside our own bounds; special efforts in behalf of educational institutions in our own bounds; Columbia Seminary and Central University; continued wet weather and the insufficiency of appropriations, have all doubtless affected our receipts.

Notwithstanding these hindrances we are gratified in being able to report to the Assembly that our gross receipts have been \$10,335.93. Of this amount \$9,151.13 has been contributed by the churches, and \$1,184.80 has come from miscellaneous sources.

The number of students reported to us, and for whom aid was asked is eighty.

They have come from thirty-seven Presbyteries and are distributed as follows: Chesapeake one; Central Mississippi three; Memphis three; East Alabama two; Orange two; South Alabama four; Ouachita six; Abingdon four; Lafayette one; Columbia one; Greenbrier two; Cherokee three; Western District one; Atlanta two; Augusta one; North Mississippi one; Arkansas two; West Hanover two; Lexington two; Holston ten; Savannah one; Missouri one; South Carolina four; Chickasaw one; Winchester one; Central Texas three; Harmony two; Paris one; North Alabama two; Louisville one; East Hanover three; Ebenezer one; Bethel two; Charleston one; West Lexington one; Fayetteville one, and West Texas one.

It will be seen that one-eighth of the whole number is from the Presbytery of Holston. There are doubtless other candidates that have not been reported to us for aid, but there is as little doubt that this exhibit shows what a lamentable dearth of candidates there is in all our Presbyteries. In view of such a state of things does it not become our churches and our Presbyteries to cry aloud to the Lord of the harvest and to continue to cry that He would send forth laborers into the harvest. The answer to that prayer will involve the duty of adequate assistance, if not support of the candidates on the part of the churches. The Committee respectfully suggest to the Assembly to recommend to

the Presbyteries not to be hasty in the reception of candidates, to be thorough in their examination on personal piety, and their views of seeking the ministry.

The number of non-co-operating Presbyteries is five, and the number of churches that have contributed this year is eight hundred and seventy-five.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES AND DIRECTORS OF UNION THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

The Trustees and Directors held their annual meeting on the 3d and 4th days of May, 1881, eighteen of the twenty-four members being present.

The whole number of students in the year 1880-81 was fifty. Of these one was a resident licentiate, twenty-one were in the Senior, twelve in the Middle and sixteen in the Junior Class. The following students, having completed the full course of study prescribed by the Constitution, were awarded the usual certificates to that effect, viz:

Messrs. James W. Holt, West Virginia; Marion S. Kennedy, Tennessee; Wm. R. Laird, Virginia; J. Leach Lancaster, Virginia; James L. McLin, South Carolina; Walter W. Moore, North Carolina; T. Smith Simral, Kentucky; Hugh C. Smith, Tennessee; James N. Vance, Tennessee; Wm. D. White, Virginia; and Thornton S. Wilson, Virginia—being four from Virginia, three from Tennessee, and one each from West Virginia, Kentucky, North Carolina and South Carolina.

The examinations of the students commenced on the 28th of April and closed on the 3d of May. These examinations, which were both written and oral, were very thorough and were conducted by the Professors and a committee, consisting of four Directors, appointed for the purpose. This committee, in their full report, "express their hearty approval of the character of these examinations, the fairness and thoroughness with which they were conducted, and the evidence they give of faithful instruction on the part of the Professors, and of conscientious diligence and generally of commendable proficiency on the part of the students."

The recorded judgment of the Trustees in favor of written examinations has been confirmed by the experience of several years.

Provision has been made for instruction in Elocution, and addresses will be delivered by the students at the anniversaries hereafter, at which time diplomas will be awarded in lieu of certificates.

About 200 volumes have been added to the Library—the whole number of volumes being about 11,200. The Library, since the report of 1880, has been removed to the commodious new Library Building.

Measures for improving the public grounds, walks and enclosures, have been adopted. The condition of the finances will be exhibited in the appendix to this report.

Acknowledging with profound gratitude the manifest favor of God to this Seminary, in the years that are passed, we look to him for continued direction and blessing.

The next term begins on the 7th day of September, 1881, and ends on the 3d day of May, 1882.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE
THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY AT COLUMBIA.

The Board of Directors of the "Theological Seminary of the Synod of South Carolina and Georgia" ask leave to submit this annual report:

During the past year the exercises of this Institution have been suspended, for the reasons made known to you in our last report, especially our insufficient income, vacant Professorships and unpaid debt.

We are glad to report that the finances of the Institution have materially increased since last May. The effort to increase our endowment has been signally blessed with the divine favor. At first we only endeavored to re-endow the "First Professorship," and that only to the extent of \$30,000, but the hearty response of the Synods of South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama, and liberal friends elsewhere, caused us to enter upon the work of fully and completely re-endowing the Institution by increasing the endowment of each Professorship to \$40,000. In carrying on this work the Rev. Dr. Girardeau became our Agent in October, 1880, and the Rev. Dr. Mack, an additional Agent, in January, 1881. The efforts of these brethren have been very successful, though to our deep regret the Rev. Dr. Girardeau was compelled by ill health to retire from the work in March, 1881.

Over \$30,000 has been contributed to increase the endowment; the firm of James Adger & Co. have paid their indebtedness in full; and over \$2,000 has been collected on the debt due the Perkins Professorship. Hence the endowment for the support of professors, which in November, 1879, was valued at \$65,000; and in May, 1880, at \$85,000; is now valued at \$135,000, and its income, which in November, 1879, was estimated at over \$4,200, and in May, 1880, at about \$5,100; is now estimated at over \$8,000. Besides this, there has been an increase of \$6,000 to the student's fund, and of \$1,300 to the library fund.

We are pained to state that our Emeritus Professor, the Rev. W. S. Plumer, D. D. LL. D., departed this life in October, 1880. The Board have expressed their sympathy with the bereaved family, and as a testimonial of their respect have directed the Treasurer to pay them his salary in full to January, 1881.

We are greatly gratified to report that the Rev. J. L. Girardeau, D. D. LL. D., has complied with the request of the last Assembly, and withdrawn his letter of resignation as Professor of Didactic and Polemic Theology, and is ready to enter upon the duties of his chair next fall.

In consequence of the increase of income and the prospect of being entirely relieved of our indebtedness by October 1st, 1881, we have resolved to resume the exercises of the Seminary on October 3d, 1881; *provided* a suitable additional Professor can be secured. In attempting to do this we have unanimously elected the Rev. B. M. Palmer, D. D. LL. D., as Professor of Pastoral Theology. We hope that this election will receive the hearty approval of your honorable body, for nothing (in our judgment) will do as much towards restoring the full confidence of our people in our Seminary, and in cheering them on in their effort to make this Institution second to none in the world, as the securing of Dr. Palmer for one of our Professorships.

We have made the salary of the Perkins Professor to be whatsoever income the Perkins Fund may yield; and have fixed the salaries of the other Professors at \$2,000 per annum, until the income may warrant increase.

The name of the "First," or "South Carolina" Professorship has been changed to that of "Howe Memorial," in honor of the Rev. George

Howe, D. D. LL.D., who has for fifty years been a Professor in this Seminary.

The term of office of the following Directors, viz: Rev. A. W. Clisby, Rev. W. J. McKay, A. B. Davidson, Esq., and Hon. T. B. Fraser expires at the meeting of this Assembly.

The officers of the Board are James Hemphill, Chairman; J. B. Mack, Clerk; and H. Muller, Treasurer.

FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE INSTITUTE FOR THE TRAINING OF COLORED MINISTERS.

With the exception of the months of July and August, the regular vacation, the exercises of the Institute have been sustained without intermission. Professor Rankin has devoted his time and strength to the laborious work of instruction with a degree of fidelity, diligence and success which secured the full approval of the Committee, and gave great satisfaction to the students. The increase in the number of students added largely to his labors, and this, in connection with the extreme severity of the winter, for a time impaired his health. Still, with some assistance, the work of instruction went forward, and we are happy to report that his health is better now than at any other time since he first assumed this position. We endeavored to procure the services of an assistant teacher to serve during the latter half of the session, but were unable to procure a suitable person. We feel more than ever the need of an additional professor. The work is too great for any one man. In accordance with the action of the last Assembly, we are taking steps to elect another professor, to enter upon his duties at the opening of the next session.

We submit for your consideration the annual report of Professor Rankin for the year just closed, which will inform you fully of the number, names and denominational relations of all the students of the year, the course of study, the various exercises, the progress made, and the deportment of the students. The sub-committee have confirmed these statements, as far as their personal inspection of the Institute and its various members has enabled them to know the facts. This committee have used great caution in receiving students, and have watched carefully over their conduct. So far, no reproach has arisen, and all applicants have been made aware of the strictness of our standard of admission and the necessity for punctuality, diligence and good deportment in order to their remaining in the Institute.

The increase in the number of students is not due to any drumming, special persuasion or offer of inducements. Besides what seems to us a growing conviction in our Church of the need and value of such training as is given here, and the growing desire on the part of the colored people of all denominations for an educated ministry; the hearty and emphatic commendation of our school by all who have enjoyed its benefits, seems to be the main cause of this increase. We now have other applications for admission, and the prospect of a larger attendance in the fall.

The Committee have felt no hesitation in receiving students from

other denominations, inasmuch as this is common with all our Theological Seminaries, and has been approved by the Assembly. Nor do we regard this as at all aside from our mission, as a Church, to the colored people. We can reach, with our Scriptural teachings, an immensely larger number, through preachers of other Evangelical Churches than with our own, and hence we regard this as a most hopeful and important part of our work.

During the year two of our Presbyterian students have gone into the active work of the ministry—one in the Presbytery of Eastern Texas, the other in the Presbytery of Savannah. We do not claim that they are fully equipped for the work; but the former was withdrawn by his Presbytery because they felt unable to continue him here, and they have examined and licensed him; the other is to spend one year in active work and study combined, and then return to the Institute for another year.

We have continued the plan of last year in meeting the expenses of students of our own Church. We pay their board, fuel, lights, &c., costing in all \$8.00 per month, or \$80 per year, they providing their own clothing, &c., and supporting themselves during vacation. We still endeavor to procure this amount from the Presbyteries sending them, but are obliged, in some instances, to supplement a deficiency.

We have not yet provided a building for the Institute; but are taking steps to do so, following the instructions of the Assembly to incur no debt.

We have not deemed it advisable to send an agent into the field to solicit funds. We have received some aid, however, from persons outside of our Church, both in the form of money and of books.

Report of Instructor in the Tuscaloosa Institute, to the Assembly's

Executive Committee, for the year ending April 20th, 1881.

During the present session, twenty-three pupils have been connected with the school. Their names are as follows: George W. Brown, Alfred Cooper, Washington Covington, Anderson D. Geren, Henry H. Harris, Thos. Maclin, Henry Shepperson, Alex. Turner, John Crawford, A. D. Jemison, Dock. M. Sewell, Wm. A. Shirley, Andrew J. Vandyke, Armstrong Burrell, Wm. H. Darden, F. M. Hamilton, Henry Hamner, Edw. Hunter, Jeff. N. Kemp, Peter C. Lewis, Walter H. Nelson, Wm. Spencer, Jere Spriggs.

Of this number the first eight are Presbyterians, the succeeding five Baptists, and the remaining ten Methodists, belonging to three different branches of that Church.

Virginia, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, Arkansas and Texas have been represented during the year, and our eight students have come to us from the bounds of as many different Presbyteries, viz: Roanoke, Savannah, Tuskalooza, Tombeckbee, Central Mississippi, Mississippi, Memphis and Eastern Texas.

The general deportment of the students has been very good, and throughout the year they have, as a body and as individuals, maintained such a character as has secured them the confidence of all who know them. So far as can be ascertained, those who were formerly connected with the Institute bear a like character, and seem to be useful men.

With scarcely an exception, the students have been diligent in study, and their progress has, on the whole, been quite satisfactory. The following is a schedule of the studies pursued during the year:

I. STUDIES PURSUED BY ALL THE SCHOOL IN COMMON.

The Bible; Shorter Catechism; Spelling (Swinton's series); Pilgrim's Progress (with Scott's notes), as an introduction to Pastoral Theology; and Rules of Interpretation, with practice in Textual Analysis.

II. STUDIES PURSUED BY ALL THE SCHOOL, BUT IN SEPARATE CLASSES.

Writing; Arithmetic (Davies'); English Grammar (Smith's); Geography (Cornell's). Plumer's "Truths for the People" has also been used for a time by some junior students as an introduction to Theology, the regular Text Book being Dagg's Manual—one introduced last session, and well suited to our purposes.

III. STUDIES PURSUED BY ADVANCED CLASS.

Moral Science (Alexander); Systematic Theology (Dagg's Manual); Biblical Geography and Antiquities (Barrows); Evidence of Revealed Religion; and Introduction to the Old and New Testaments (Barrows). A portion of this class has also studied the Larger Catechism, Book of Church Order, New Testament, Greek Grammar (Cary's), and Wharey's Church History. In addition to these studies, one pupil a Methodist pastor, had separate recitations in the Greek Testament and Hebrew Grammar, and written exercises in the latter. He read Greek with much ease and correctness, made excellent progress in Hebrew, and was just beginning to read the Hebrew Bible when, in January, he was transferred to another field of labor.

Monday is regularly spent in practical exercises relating to pulpit work. These exercises consist in pulpit readings of the Scriptures and hymns, preaching, popular exposition of the Scriptures, declamation and the reading of original essays on religious topics. All these exercises are conducted directly under the teacher's supervision and subject to his criticism.

Saturday is devoted to textual analysis and to interpretation of the Scriptures, which exercises are likewise conducted directly under the supervision of the teacher. The only additional feature in this department to be specially alluded to is the Bible class, the first exercise of the morning. An hour is invariably given to this recitation, in which the students are trained to a ready and familiar use of the Bible by being required to find and read in class all the parallel passages, besides using all other available helps in acquiring a knowledge of the lesson in hand. In this way it is hoped that whatever may be their other deficiencies, they will acquire some degree of readiness in the use of the English Bible.

One morning in each week is set apart for the study of the International Bible Lesson, in order to prepare students for teaching in the Sabbath schools, the greater part of them being engaged in this work.

The admirable works of Professor Barrows on Biblical Antiquities and the Canon were introduced last October, and give great satisfaction. Thanks are due the American Tract Society for putting us these works, which are somewhat expensive, at half price; and likewise to the American Sunday School Union for furnishing us with important Bible helps at the same generous rates. A good map of Palestine, such as Osborne's, is much needed; likewise a large Bible for practice in pulpit reading.

The hours of instruction have necessarily varied with the season of the year, though during much of the time the greater part of each day has been devoted to class-room work. The school is opened at 9 A. M., and during the winter months there was but one session a day, extending till 3, and often till 4 P. M. Recently, however, the work has been less arduous, and the one continuous session has been shortened to about five hours, with sometimes an additional hour in the afternoon devoted to private recitations.

In conclusion, it may truthfully be said that the year has been one full of encouragement to the friends of the Institute. The increase in the number of students, their earnestness and success in study, the uniformly good character they bear, and the hopeful tone of their piety and consecration to their chosen work, all combine in affording cause for gratitude, and inspire hope for the future.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

The Trustees of the General Assembly beg leave to report that at the meeting of the last General Assembly in Charleston, S. C., the Auditing Committee, to which our annual report was referred, made a report, in which they recommended "the securities belonging to the Relief Fund be placed in the custody of the Executive Committee of Home Missions, with instructions to deposit them in some safe-deposit company for safe keeping." This report was adopted by the Assembly. In compliance with this instruction our Treasurer has turned over to the Treasurer of Home Missions all the securities of said Relief Fund, and has taken his receipt therefor. We understand that we are relieved from all further responsibility for said securities.

The Treasurer's report, which accompanies this, contains a statement of funds received and paid out since the meeting of the last Assembly. We also send our minutes as heretofore.

The Trustees passed a resolution that Dr. E. H. Harding, the Commissioner from Mecklenburg Presbytery, be requested to endeavor to obtain such action of the Assembly as will provide for the payment of the necessary expenses of the members of the Board of Trustees of the Church in attending to their duties, and in defraying the necessary expenses of the President of the Board in attending the sessions of the General Assembly.

Jesse H. Lindsay, Esq., who has with the greatest fidelity filled the office of Secretary and Treasurer of the Board from its organization, offered his resignation at this meeting, which was accepted. Mr. Lindsay also declines re-election as a member of the Board.

The terms of the following Trustees will expire at your meeting, viz: Jesse H. Lindsay, Joseph H. Wilson and James Hemphill.

The following persons have been elected officers for the ensuing year, viz: James Hemphill, President; Joseph H. Wilson, Vice-President; John E. Brown, Secretary and Treasurer.

THIRD REPORT OF THE PERMANENT COMMITTEE ON THE SABBATH.

The Permanent Committee on the Sabbath would report to the General Assembly that in response to a circular addressed to the several Presbyterial committees soliciting information on certain points, they have received answers from thirty-two of these committees, located as follows: One in West Virginia, two in North Carolina, three in South Carolina, five in Kentucky, two in Tennessee, two in Louisiana, one in Arkansas, four in Mississippi, two in Missouri, six in Georgia, two in Florida, one in Texas, and one in Alabama. Thus, though not hearing from half of the Presbyteries, yet as those heard from are scattered nearly over our entire field, we may receive their reports as fair representatives of the whole.

From the reports thus received, we gather the following facts:

That the matter of Sabbath observance has been held, more or less prominently, before the minds of the people as a question of commanding interest and importance, and as a result of this continued agitation, a deeper and more wide-spread interest is being awakened.

The subject occupies a prominent position upon the docket of some of the Presbyteries, and is regularly considered, thus giving rise to interesting and instructive conferences. Our ministers have generally in accordance with the instructions of the Assembly been required to preach to their people upon the subject, and in a few instances certain ones have been appointed to preach special sermons before their respective Presbyteries on some particular branch of the same.

Some of the Presbyteries report a decided improvement in the matter of Sabbath observance, while quite a number assert just as decided a deterioration.

In answer to the question whether the day was considered of Divine authority, the response was uniformly in the affirmative, so far, at least, as theory is concerned, the practice however being more variable—many of our people, in the face of the professed admission, devoting the day to secular uses. In some of the Presbyteries there seems to be a diversity of sentiment as to what is really included in "works of necessity and mercy"—the minds of the people not being entirely clear on this point.

All of the reports show that, to a greater or less extent, the public conveyances are still patronized on the Sabbath by professing Christians; and, so far as the general travel is concerned, there being even an excess on that day, many availing themselves of the special Sunday rates offered on some of the great thoroughfares. Mention is also made of frequent Sabbath excursions under the plea of attending conventions, associations and other church meetings, which are reported as demoralizing.

In the matter of legislation, it appears that most of the States have good Sabbath laws, the only difficulty being in their enforcement. This the friends of the Sabbath in different directions are endeavoring to have done. In some instances success has crowned their efforts; in others resistance has been offered, and every barrier thrown in their way. In one or two instances railroads and steamboats are, by special statute, exempt from Sunday laws. In several of the legislatures bills have been introduced favoring reform, but were uniformly voted down. An effort was made in the last legislature of South Carolina to repeal the recent law regulating the running of freight trains on the Lord's day, which, we are thankful to say, was unsuccessful.

After a careful analysis of the reports, we are constrained to believe that, upon the whole, though our apparent progress may seem to be little, it is, nevertheless, real.

The principal difficulties that confront Sabbath reform are two-fold. The first is the open and flagrant violations of the Divine law by railroad and other corporations. To say nothing about the express business and the transportation and delivery of mail matter, the freight business is simply immense. It may not be generally known to what an alarming extent this species of traffic is carried on, and the consequent demoralization that is connected therewith. From different directions and different States comes the same report. "No difference in the running of freight trains on the Sabbath from other days." And with this statement invariably comes this other linked with it, "Desecration on the increase." The one the legitimate outgrowth of the other. Nothing can be more demoralizing to any community than this open and legalized disregard of Divine authority. With this running of trains, this loading and unloading of freight—and the amount of secular work incident thereto—there must, of necessity, be not only confusion, but a letting go of the Divine law in other directions. This is truly a crying evil which the Christian people of this country should seek in every lawful way to abate.

The other difficulty, and which we conceive to be the chief one, exists, strange to say, in the very bosom of the Church itself. It consists in the astonishing and wide-spread apathy of professing

Christians, as appears from their unwillingness to utter one word of remonstrance or protest against the many violations of which they are witnesses, and even their readiness to join the unthinking multitude in those acts of desecration, as their worldly interests might demand. One of the reports estimates the number of professing Christians, who would not hesitate to travel on the Lord's day if business required it, as actually in the majority. With such a state of things in the Church, what can we hope for from without? If the people of God were only consistent in their testimony, and united in their resistance, we would have nothing to fear. But when those who are set for a light and defence of the truth, do not scruple thus deliberately to set aside a plain command, we must be allowed to express our fears as to the final issue.

Your Committee would respectfully suggest the propriety of calling the special attention of Church Sessions to this matter, and also enjoining the Presbyteries to see that those who are rulers in the house of the Lord, shall institute inquest into the conduct of church members in this particular, and if necessary to proceed in case of gross and willful violations, to administer the censures of the Church. For we are fully convinced and unanimously concur in the opinion expressed by one of the Presbyteries, that reformation in this matter must first begin in the Church of God.

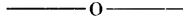

3. To make them as accurate and as full as possible. If, in any instance, churches do not report to Presbyteries, it is desirable that their number of communicants should be inserted from their last report.

4. To report *no fractions* in the money columns.

5. To *add up* each column of figures with care.

6. To append to the statistics of Presbyteries a brief account of the changes which have occurred during the year, such as the *number* of licensures, ordinations, installations, dismissions of pastors, organizations of new churches, and the names of ministers deceased.

7. To transmit their Statistical reports to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly, either at the meeting of the Assembly, or at Wilmington, N. C., *not later than the 20th day of May.*

Blank forms for *Sessional or Presbyterial Reports* are not furnished by the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, but by the Executive Committee of Publication, at cost price, by order of the Assemblies of 1867 and 1878.

TO THE STATED CLERKS OF SYNODS.

It is the duty of these officers to send up to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly an Annual Report, stating the number of Presbyteries, Ministers, Churches, Licentiates and Candidates within their bounds; and particularly all changes which have been made in the arrangement of Presbyteries. It is also their duty to transmit to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly a notice of the time and place of the ensuing meetings of their respective Synods.
