The Rev. Henry Van Dyke, D.D., of the Presbytery of New Brunswick, was elected Moderator.

A Commissioner who arrived at the Assembly during the vote for Moderator, requested, prior to the announcement of the result, to be permitted to vote. The Moderator ruled that his vote could not be received.

On the nomination of the Stated and Permanent Clerks, the following were chosen as Temporary Clerks: Rev. Robert Hunter, D.D., of the Presbytery of Philadelphia; Rev. Maurice D. Edwards, D.D., of the Presbytery of St. Paul; Rev. Arthur C. Ludlow, D.D., of the Presbytery of Cleveland, and Mr. William C. Lilley, of the Presbytery of Pittsburgh.

A gavel made of woods from the Garden of Gethsemane and other historic localities of the city of Jerusalem was presented by the Rev. M. D. A. Steen, D.D., of California, for the permanent use of the General Assembly.

The General Rules for Judicatories and additional Rules for Business, as contained in the *Manual* of the Assembly, were adopted, also the Docket.

The Committee of Arrangements, through its Chairman, Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., presented a Report, which was accepted and adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee of Arrangements respectfully beg leave to report to the General Assembly the following recommendations:

1. The Committee recommend that the sessions be from 9 A.M. to 12.30 P.M. (on Saturdays to 12 M.), the first half-hour being devoted to devotional exercises, and from 2.30 to 5 P.M. (except on Saturdays), and that popular evening meetings be held at 8 P.M.

2. The Committee recommend, in connection with the administration of the Lord's Supper this evening, the following appointments: To preside, the retiring Moderator; to administer the Bread, Rev. William Beatty Jemings, D.D., of the Presbytery of Detroit; to administer the Cup, Rev. J. M. Alexander, D.D., of the Presbytery of Allahabad; Elders to aid in dis-

tributing the Bread: Mr. James F. Magee, of the Presbytery of Philadelphia; Mr. Thomas C. Day, of the Presbytery of Indianapolis; Mr. James Ratcliffe, of the Presbytery of Topeka; Hon. D. R. Noyes, of the Presbytery of St. Paul; Mr. Warren Switzler, of the Presbytery of Omaha; Hon. E. M. McPherson, of the Presbytery of Boston; Mr. Edwin R. Perkins, of the Presbytery of Cleveland; Mr. Robert Pitcairn, of the Presbytery of Pittsburgh; Elders to aid in administering the Cup: Hon. W. M. Lanning, of the Presbytery of New Brunswick; Mr. C. Bayless, of the Presbytery of Dubuque; Mr. Charles T. Thompson, of the Presbytery of Minneapolis; Mr. T. W. Synnott, of the Presbytery of West Jersey; Mr. Silas B. Brownell, of the Presbytery of New York; Mr. Foster Copeland, of the Presbytery of Columbus; Mr. John H. Converse, of the Presbytery of Chester; Mr. William B. Minnis, of the Presbytery of Union.

3. The Committee would report an invitation to the General Assembly to a reception at The Presbyterian Building, at 4 P.M., on Friday, May 16, to meet the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions and Church Erection. The Committee recommend that this invitation be accepted, and that the Assembly adjourn at 4 P.M., Friday.

4. The Committee would also report an invitation from The American Tract Society, No. 150 Nassau street, to visit the building and view the city from its roof, and to take luncheon, on Saturday, May 17, at 12.45 P.M.; also from the New York University, at Morris Heights, to visit the grounds and buildings of the University at a later hour. The Committee report that arrangements have been made for these visits, when receptions will be given to the Assembly, including ladies and visitors, special cars for transportation being provided. The Committee recommend that the General Assembly accept these invitations, and attend these receptions on Saturday, May 17.

5. The Committee would further report that in pursuance of an invitation from Princeton University, and from Princeton Theological Seminary, arrangements have been made for a visit to Princeton on Saturday, May 24, and special trains for transportation have been provided through the kindness of Mr. A. J. Cassatt, President of the Pennsylvania Railroad. Due notice of trains will be given. The Committee recommend that the Assembly accept this invitation.

6. The Committee also report an invitation from the American Bible Society to visit the Bible House, Fourth avenue and Ninth street, on Monday, May 19, at 1 o'clock, for luncheon. The Committee recommend that this invitation be accepted.

7. The Committee would also report that the Presbyterian Union of the City of New York have invited the General Assembly to attend a reception to Commissioners, their ladies and other invited guests, to meet the Presbyterians of the City

of New York, at the Waldorf-Astoria, Fifth avenue and Thirty-fourth street, on Thursday, May 22, at 8 P.M., and recommend the Assembly to accept the invitation.

8. The Committee would also report that an invitation has been given to the General Assembly, on behalf of the Albany Day Line, for a steamboat excursion on the Hudson river, on Monday, May 26. The Committee recommend the Assembly to accept this invitation, which will afford the Commissioners the opportunity of viewing the scenery of the Hudson to the Highlands, and to empower the Committee to make such arrangements as may be necessary.

9. The Committee also reports that arrangements have been made for the following popular meetings, to be held in the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, except when otherwise indicated:

Friday, May 16, 8 P.M., in the interest of Sabbath-school Work.

Saturday, May 17, 8 P.M., in the interest of the Board of Aid for Colleges and Woman's Board of Home Missions.

The Stated Clerk announced the time and places of meeting of the Electing Sections for the Standing Committees, and the names of the members of the same to whom the necessary papers were to be delivered.

The Assembly adjourned, and was closed with prayer.

THURSDAY, May 15, 8.30 o'clock P.M.

The Lord's Supper was celebrated in accordance with the arrangements previously adopted.

FRIDAY, May 16, 9 o'clock A.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read, and approved.

Addresses of welcome were delivered by Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., pastor of the Fifth Avenue Church, and Rev. Wilton Merle Smith, D.D., Moderator of the Presbytery of New York; and a gavel of walrus ivory from Alaska was presented to the Moderator by Rev. S. Hall Young, D.D. The Moderator responded to the addresses of welcome and presentation.

The Permanent Committee on Commissions reported the following additional Commissioners, who were duly enrolled: *Ministers*—John P. Campbell, D.D., of the Presbytery of Baltimore; Will S. Wilson, of the Presbytery of Kendall; William N. Crozier, of the Presbytery of Nanking; William J. McCaughan, D.D., of the Presbytery of Chicago; William C. Brass, of the Presbytery of Cayuga; Michael Albert, of the Presbytery of Minnewaukon; *Elders*—G. S. Kiner, of the Presbytery of Blairsville; Edward W. Ellsworth, of the Presbytery of Flint; William Carlyle, of the Presbytery of Gunnison; Thomas Templeton, of the Presbytery of Chicago; William W. Alder, of the Presbytery of Crawfordsville; D. W. Hills, of the Presbytery of Cimarron; A. M. Hutchinson, of the Presbytery of Council Bluffs; Benjamin Dutton, of the Presbytery of Emporia, and J. S. Varrick, of the Presbytery of Lackawanna.

Also the following Advisory Members: Rev. T. H. Candor, Colombia Mission; Rev. J. B. Kolb, Brazil Mission; Rev. H. G. Underwood, D.D., Korea Mission; Mr. B. C. Haworth, East Japan Mission.

The Committee on Commissions also reported the following recommendation, which was adopted:

Whereas, Standing Rule No. 15, with reference to the seating of Delegates as Advisory Members of the General Assembly from Missions organized under our Board of Foreign Missions, does not in its present form adequately meet the case of representatives from Missions where no union Presbytery has been organized, we recommend its amendment as follows, namely: that after the phrase "through the organization of union Presbyteries" there be inserted the phrase "or where Missions exist without Presbyterian organization."

The following changes were made in the time of hearing Reports of Standing Committees, said changes being made nec-

essary by the time given to the celebration of the Centennial of Home Missions :

Standing Committee on Education, Monday, at 11.30 A.M., instead of Monday, at 3 P.M.; Aid for Colleges and Academies, Wednesday, at 4 P.M., instead of Tuesday, at 2.30 P.M.; Church Election, Friday, at 10 A.M., instead of the second Thursday, at 2.30 P.M.; Publication and Sabbath-school Work, at 2.30 P.M., Wednesday, instead of 3 P.M.; Benevolence, Friday, at 11.30 A.M.

The Stated Clerk made the usual call for Papers from the Presbyteries and Synods, and also presented to the Assembly the Reports of the Special Committees in printed form, in accordance with Standing Order No. 23.

The Special Committee on Revision, through its Chairman, Rev. Henry C. Minton, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and its consideration was made the first Order of the Day for Thursday morning, with right of way until final disposition.

The Supplementary Report of the same Committee on Proof-Texts, was also presented and accepted, and its consideration ordered in connection with the main Report.

The Special Committee on Ministerial Relief, through its Chairman, Hon. William P. Potter, presented its Report, which was accepted and adopted, and is as follows :

The Special Committee on Ministerial Relief appointed by the General Assembly of 1901 respectfully reports as follows :

The resolution constituting the Committee reads : " That the whole matter of ministerial relief, as related to an improved method of sustentation, be referred to a Special Committee consisting of three elders and two ministers, in connection with the Board of Ministerial Relief, to take under advisement and report to the next General Assembly " (*Minutes*, 1901, p. 34).

" The Moderator of the Assembly appointed the following persons members of the Committee : *Elders*—Hon. William P. Potter, F. K. Hipple, Esq., LL.D., and Robert H. Smith, Esq.; *Ministers*—Henry E. Mott, D.D., and J. I. Blackburn, D.D." (*Minutes*, 1901, p. 77).

The Assembly also directed that the action taken by the meeting of the ruling elders present at the General Assembly of 1901 should be communicated to this Committee, and that the elders who drew the resolutions, together with any other elders whom the Moderator might desire to name, " be appointed a Special Committee, under the terms of their offer, to cooperate with the present Committee of the Assembly in this work " (*Minutes*, 1901, p. 148). The elders named were Ephraim Banning,

Chicago, Ill.; G. E. Conn, Seattle, Wash.; C. G. Thompson, Lafayette, Ind.; John H. Converse, Philadelphia, Pa.; Wallace T. Goodhue, Los Angeles, Cal.; Elmer E. Johnson, Rockwell City, Ia.; F. A. Hall, Springfield, Mo.; William E. Stiger, New York, N. Y., and John Willis Baer, Boston, Mass.

The action taken at the meeting of the elders referred to above is stated in the *Minutes*, as follows: "Your Standing Committee on Ministerial Relief has received the minutes of the meeting of ruling elders of this Assembly, held in the interest of those who have served the Church in the ministry of the Gospel, but have been retired on account of age and disability. This Committee is gratified at the action of the ruling elders, taken thus spontaneously. It begins to put into effect the suggestions of this Committee's Report, seconded by the address of the Secretary of the Board." Resolutions were adopted at this meeting of ruling elders calling for some measures for bringing this cause more effectively before the churches, suggesting an enlargement of the scope of the Board and a change of name to correspond to the enlarged idea, inquiring whether a different basis of the grants made under the Board is not both desirable and practicable, and expressing a wish to cooperate to these ends. (*Minutes*, 1901, p. 148.)

The Committee has held three meetings, September 26, 1901, December 19, 1901, and March 20, 1902. The Stated Clerk of the Assembly, at the request of the Committee, performed the duties of Secretary. Two conferences were held with the Presbyterian Board of Relief. The members of the Committee of Cooperation were also communicated with, and their views were submitted either in conference or by correspondence.

The subjects considered by the Committee were:

1. Annuity schemes.
2. Plans of sustentation.
3. The name of the Board of Relief.
4. The increased endowment of the Board of Relief.

In connection with the first subject, schemes of annuity were requested from and submitted by the Secretary of the Presbyterian Ministers' Fund, and by the President of a large Mutual Life Insurance Company of Philadelphia.

One of the proposed schemes and the least costly is submitted as an example. Beginning with payments of annual premiums at age of forty, and providing in the scheme for contingencies liable to arise, it would ordinarily require \$230 per annum to provide the following annuities:

\$500 per annum, at age of seventy, in event of annuitant having wife and children.

\$500 per annum, in event of permanent disability prior to age of seventy, with wife and children.

\$400 per annum, under either of the above physical conditions, with wife, but without children.

\$400 per annum, under either of the above physical conditions, with children, but without wife.

\$400 per annum, for widow with children.

\$300 per annum, for minister alone.

\$300 per annum, for widow alone.

\$300 per annum, for orphaned children, if three or more; if less than three, \$100 for each child.

In this scheme of annuities, the widow would cease to be eligible on second marriage; the annuities would only be paid to the children until the age of sixteen.

The above minimum cost scheme for 7500 ministers, the full number of the Roll of the General Assembly, would require a total payment of \$1,725,000 per annum.

The conclusion of the Committee is that, in view of the great expense involved, any annuity scheme through a life insurance company, for all our ministers, is under present conditions impracticable.

It is proper, at this point, to note the fact that the greater portion of the funds of the Board of Relief, as now distributed, is used for the relief of other persons than ministers who have retired through the infirmities of age. The beneficiaries of the Board, during the ecclesiastical year ending March 31, 1901, were as follows:

Of the above beneficiaries there are 375 ministers, and 531 who are not ministers; and if we add the guests in the Westminster House, 383 ministers, and 548 who are not ministers. Nearly four-fifths of the disbursements, it will be noticed, were to ministers not on the Honorably Retired Roll, and to the widows and children of deceased ministers. It is a subject worthy of the consideration of the Assembly and the Board, as to whether there should not be an increased emphasis upon the need of proper provision for those ministers who are usually classed as "Honorably Retired," viz., those who, having reached the age of seventy years, have also spent at least thirty years of continuous service in our Church. The rules of the Board now provide \$300 per annum for the support of such ministers when necessary. It is beyond question that this amount is not an adequate support; and we submit that it would

be well to make certain modifications of the rules of the Board as to the age and length of service of annuitants. But whatever may seem wise to the Assembly in this respect, the Committee does not see its way clear to make any definite recommendation in connection therewith. It can only give expression to the conclusion that general annuity schemes are impracticable.

II. The subject of sustentation was also carefully considered, and plans submitted by members of the Committee were discussed.

That a scheme of general sustentation is desirable appears to be the judgment of many persons well acquainted with denominational conditions. The way for such a plan has been in part prepared by Synodical action in the Synods of New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Baltimore, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky. In some of these Synods, notably New Jersey, sustentation has been successfully carried forward. But the Committee does not feel that any Board of the Church has any present relation to a Plan of Sustentation, either in its charter, in the intention of the Church, or by its history. It therefore believes that the best way of procedure in this matter will be by the appointment of a Special Committee by the Assembly to consider the whole subject of sustentation, apart from any existing Church agency.

III. The name of the Board received from the Committee due thought. Especially were the statements given earnest attention that the present name seems to savor unduly of charity, and that the self-respect of the persons who are aided by the Board would be conserved by a change therein. The Committee has come to the conclusion that no change should be made in the name, as it exactly describes the beneficent work conducted by the Church through the Board, and is in full harmony with the view of ministerial support taken by the Church. Provision for ministerial support in our Church, as shown by the language of the pastoral call in the Form of Government, Chapter 15, Sec. 6, is made in order that a pastor "may be free from worldly cares and avocations." The obligation thus recognized is based not upon work performed for money's sake, but upon service rendered for Christ's sake. This Christian view of service is the fundamental idea of both the Boards of Education and of Relief: the first caring for the needs of candidates for the ministry in their preparation for labor, and the second providing the means of support for those who have been worn out in the work. In addition, it is to be remembered that the Board has come to its present position of beneficent influence and power as the *Board of Relief*, and any change of name might work injury to the cause of which it has charge, both in connection with the annual collections for its work and with special gifts intended for the enlargement of its benevolence.

IV. The Committee has also given earnest attention to the

question of the enlarged endowment of the Board of Relief. It believes that the best method of furthering the interests which the Board represents will be through the increase of its Endowment Fund by the sum of at least one million dollars. The collections from the churches for the Board varied during the past twelve years from seventy-four thousand to ninety-four thousand dollars per annum. If the objects of the Board's beneficence had been left to depend upon these collections, their number would have been much restricted. But in 1888 the General Assembly came to the conclusion that an increased endowment was the best method of providing for an enlargement of the work. In that year and the year following, under the leadership of the Centenary Fund Committee, an effort was made to add one million dollars to the Permanent Fund of the Board. The churches generously contributed \$610,000 to that end, and from legacies and other sources this Fund has now been increased until it has reached a total of \$1,531,533. The interest during the last ecclesiastical year secured upon this Fund was \$61,381.20, and was a most helpful supplement to the regular church collections. The Committee believes that the Permanent Fund should be increased to two millions and a half, and that while the churches are to be urged to add to their annual collections for this most worthy cause, yet such an increase as is suggested offers the most available and commendable way of securing the funds needed for disabled ministers and missionaries and their widows and orphans.

In the resolution constituting the Committee, it was directed to consider the subjects referred to it "in connection with the Board of Ministerial Relief."

At the Conferences held with the Board, all the subjects before the Committee were carefully considered, and at the joint session held on December 19, 1901, the following action was adopted by both the Committee and the Board, viz.: "That the name of the Board of Relief remain as it is, that the basis of the work of the Board as at present conducted be approved, and that immediate steps be taken to increase largely the endowment and income of the Board. It was also agreed that the Assembly be recommended to take up and consider the advisability of organizing a plan of general sustentation for ministers, separate from any existing Board."

The following resolutions are submitted for adoption by the General Assembly, viz.:

Resolved, 1. That the Board of Relief is commended to the churches for an additional endowment to the amount of one million dollars, and that all pastors, ministers in charge of churches, and church Sessions are urged to further the interests of the Board by special appeals for the Permanent Fund, as well as by annual collections for current needs.

Resolved, 2. That the Board of Relief be authorized to take

the necessary steps, and if deemed advisable to appoint Special Representatives, to secure the proposed increase of the Permanent Fund.

Resolved, 3. That a Special Committee of ten, five ministers and five elders, be appointed by the Moderator, who shall take into consideration the whole subject of Ministerial Sustentation. This Committee is authorized to consider, among other things, the advisability of the adoption of a general plan of sustentation; may correspond with the Board of Home Missions, with the Committees of Sustentation and Home Missions of the several Synods, and with such other bodies or persons as it may deem proper; and shall report all its proceedings and conclusions to the next Assembly.

The Report of the Special Committee on Sabbath Observance was made the second Order for Friday morning.

The Report of the Special Committee on the Presbyterian Building was made the third Order for Friday morning.

The Special Committee on the *Assembly Herald*, through its Chairman, Rev. A. W. Halsey, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, amended and adopted. It is as follows:

This Report, in accordance with the resolution adopted at the last Assembly, covers the calendar year 1901, and not the fiscal year. The present Committee of the *Assembly Herald* was appointed in May, 1899. At that time the affairs of the *Herald* were in an unsettled condition, and it was found necessary to reorganize the entire management.

In the year 1899 there was a deficiency of more than \$11,000. In the year 1900 the deficiency was \$3646.91. The deficiency for the year 1901 is only \$2257.10. The actual deficiency is in reality not over \$2000, since the charge made by the Committee for the publication of receipts is some \$500 less than the actual cost.

In 1899 the number of *bona fide* subscriptions was a trifle over 16,000. In 1900 the subscription list was nearly 40,000. In the year 1901 this was reduced to 38,397. This loss of subscriptions is confined almost entirely to large churches. In many of these churches a single person, the pastor or elder or some one appointed by them, secured a long subscription list for a year. The failure to follow this up the second year caused the deficiency. It requires some one person in each congregation to

keep the subject of the *Assembly Herald* before the Church if our subscription list is to be maintained. The following is the list of subscriptions by States. The State having the largest number of subscriptions is Pennsylvania, with a total of 6651:

We would recommend that the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly be instructed to write to the Stated Clerks of all the Presbyteries, requesting them to bring to the attention of the Chairmen of the Presbyterian Standing Committees on Benevolence, the question of increasing the circulation of the *Assembly Herald*.

There has been complaint that the *Assembly Herald*, because of its club subscription of twenty-five cents, is seriously interfering with the circulation of these two periodicals.

The Assembly would urge upon all pastors and members of churches the paying, so far as possible, of the full subscription price, fifty cents, for the *Assembly Herald*, and thus avoid even the appearance of competing with these other periodicals which represent the same great work.

It was made the Order of the Day for to-morrow, to hear one of the Secretaries of the American Bible Society for fifteen minutes, at 9.45 A.M.

A letter of greeting and invitation from the authorities of the Union Theological Seminary, New York City, was read, and the Moderator and Stated Clerk were authorized to convey the thanks of the Assembly for the same.

The Special Committee on Church Statistics, through its Chairman, Rev. William H. Roberts, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, amended and adopted. It is as follows:

The Committee on Statistics would respectfully report to the General Assembly as follows :

The Committee was appointed by the Assembly of 1901 upon Overtures from ten Presbyteries, asking that steps be taken to collect certain statistics, additional to those appearing in the *Minutes*, regarding the membership, work and property of our Church. The Committee was also empowered to consider and act upon suggestions contained in an Overture from the Presbytery of Buffalo, proposing changes in the Annual Blank for the Narratives of the Presbyteries upon the State of Religion within their bounds (*Minutes*, 1901, p. 90).

The Committee consists of William Henry Roberts, D.D., Mervin J. Eckels, D.D., and John F. Patterson, D.D. The members have held three meetings, and have carefully considered the several matters referred to them.

The Committee reports first upon the Blank for the Narrative of the State of Religion, and respectfully recommends that the questions of the said Narrative hereafter read as follows :

ANNUAL NARRATIVE OF THE STATE OF RELIGION.

The Church of Presbytery of

Inquiries for the Guidance of Church Sessions in the Preparation of the Narrative.

[NOTE.—It is not intended that the Narrative shall be restricted to bare and formal answers. It should be, however, very concise, consisting of statements of facts rather than reflections. Arrange the paragraphs of the Narrative, if it be written out as a separate report, to correspond with the subjoined topics, and report numbers or amounts in the Statistical Table at the end.]

I. CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES.

The second subject referred to the Committee, that of the collection of Church statistics, is one which involves the attitude of the United States Government with reference to a religious census. Correspondence with the Director of the Census gave the Committee the following information :

The present Census Act divides the inquiries to be made into two groups. The first of these includes those subjects on which information can be obtained through the agency of the census enumerators, while the second includes subjects which can be dealt with without the aid of the enumerators, by correspondence or by the use of special agents. The seventh section of the Act restricts the first group to "inquiries relating to the population, to mortality, to the products of agriculture, and of manufacturing and mechanical establishments." The reports on these subjects are to be "published not later than July 1, 1902."

The eighth section provides that "after the completion and return of the enumeration and of the work upon the schedules relating to the products of agriculture, and to manufacturing and mechanical establishments provided for in Sec. 7 of this Act,"—that is, after July 1, 1902—"the Director of the Census is hereby authorized to collect statistics relating to several subjects specified, of which one reads: 'to religious bodies.'" Under the language of this section nothing can be done, except in a preparatory way, with reference to the collection of religious statistics. It will be noted that at the expiration of that time (July 1, 1902) the Director is "authorized," not required, to collect these special statistics; so that the question whether they shall be collected or not is entirely within his official discretion.

"This is a subject which will bear serious consideration and discussion on the part of those more particularly interested in this inquiry, and any suggestions relating to it, addressed to the Director of the Census, will be welcomed."

In view of the fact that the date fixed by the laws of the United States for the determination of the question as to whether the religious census shall be taken by the U. S. Government or not had not been reached, the Committee came to the conclusion not to proceed with the collection of statistics, nor to confer with other persons with reference thereto, until the whole matter has again been submitted to the General Assembly. The statistics gathered by the United States Government in 1890 set forth in a unified and admirable manner the strength and resources of the religious forces of the nation at that time. Another census of the same kind would be of great value, and no denominational agency could by itself achieve the results to be secured by Government action. The Committee therefore, after having carefully considered the entire subject, recommend the adoption of the following resolutions :

Resolved, 1. That this General Assembly hereby respectfully requests the Director of the United States Census to collect the

statistics of churches and religious societies after July 1, 1902, in a manner similar to that employed for the religious census of 1890.

Resolved, 2. That the Committee on Statistics be and hereby is continued to report to the Assembly of 1903.

Resolved, 3. That the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly be directed and authorized to coöperate with the Director of the U. S. Census, so far as feasible, in the matter of the gathering of the statistics of this Church, and under the direction of the Committee.

Resolved, 4. That if the Director of the U. S. Census decides not to authorize a religious census for the nation, that the Committee be empowered to arrange for the collection of such statistics as may be desirable, in connection with the Reports of the Presbyteries to the Assembly of 1903, and through the Stated Clerk of the Assembly.

The Special Committee on Omaha Theological Seminary presented its Report, which was accepted, approved, and is as follows :

The Committee on Omaha Theological Seminary would respectfully report as follows :

Our Report to the last Assembly showed a property worth \$60,000. We report this year an advance of \$30,000, making a total of \$90,000. This increase is owing to gifts made during the year, mostly to the Building Fund, but some of it to the Permanent Endowment Fund.

It has become necessary to build on the new land bought a year ago in the northern part of the city, and ground has already been broken for the first of a group of buildings, which is to cost about \$40,000. This building will have recitation rooms on the first floor, library, chapel and living rooms for students on the two other floors.

The old property downtown has not yet been sold, because the market is not yet right for sale, and increase in value is confidently expected. This property will probably bring about \$25,000, which, with the money now in hand for the new building, will enable the trustees to carry up the new building without debt. There is no disposition to push on in the direction of building any further than the progress of the institution de-

mands. What is projected now is what the present condition of the Seminary demands. Other buildings will go up in future years as the Seminary grows and the present quarters become cramped, but always within the means at the disposal of the trustees.

The Seminary is slowly getting on its feet, and yet with the added material equipment, the greater is the necessity for endowment. Your Committee want now \$100,000, not because that sum is perfectly adequate—it is not—but because the income of about \$4000, added to the resources at hand, and on which the Seminary is struggling hard to do the great work committed to it, would ease the situation considerably. At present the Seminary depends almost wholly on the gifts of generous friends—gifts gathered by the constant travel and hard work of the indefatigable President. It must occur to all who think about the matter at all that this method of gathering the supporting income of an institution is the most expensive that could be devised, in that it turns a valuable teacher away from the duties incident to that calling to become a collector of money, a work that a less well-qualified man, from an educational point of view, could do as well. We ought to move out from under the shadow of this unbusinesslike procedure to one that would better commend itself to business men and secure their unqualified approval. Such a departure means endowment. The first hundred thousand dollars given now will supply an added vigor in every department of instruction and in administration. The second hundred thousand, which will come later, will mean an expansion in keeping with the growth of the institution. No one knows except the man at the helm what it means in wear and tear to run the Seminary without debt through the entire year, and year after year, by the jog-trot method of going from city to city, and man to man, in search of money. That President is a hero who succeeds. He is a financier of an ability that has a large market value. President M. B. Lowrie has succeeded. Will not this Assembly so take up this important matter as to enable this youngest theological school of the Church to stand squarely on both feet? No question of consolidation of seminaries can ever be raised with reference to Omaha. The position of the institution and the home missionary empire all around it, the record of usefulness, and the increasing strength of the churches throughout all that vast territory tributary to it, attest the wisdom of the foundation of the school, and of the maintenance of it from year to year. To visit the city of Omaha, and to follow out the lines of travel and spread of population in the regions bordering on the Missouri river, and stretching away to the Rocky Mountains, will convince anybody of the fact. All life is music if we touch the notes with skillful technique and on time, and that great Western prairie will laugh and sing with the music of Immanuel's land, if now we handle the

notes as we should. There is no Seminary so poor and small as not to hold many a divine possibility. In this Seminary the possibilities have run far into the field of reality. Let us not worry, for worry and the undertaker get on well together, but let us work! Let us pray! And let us never give up till the needed endowment falls like a refreshing shower from heaven.

We recommend the appointment of another Committee by this Assembly.

The Special Committee on Evangelistic Work, through its Chairman, John H. Converse, LL.D., presented a Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by Rev. John Balcom Shaw, D.D., Rev. Wilton Merle Smith, D.D., Rev. Robert Hunter, D.D., and Rev. William H. Tower, was amended and adopted. The Report is as follows :

The Special Committee on Evangelistic Work respectfully reports to the General Assembly of 1902 :

The duties and membership of the Committee are given in the two following extracts from the *Minutes* of the General Assembly of 1901, viz.:

(1) " The following resolution was presented and adopted :

" *Whereas*, It is the obligation of the Church as a missionary organization to carry the message of salvation to every creature ; and

" *Whereas*, To this end, as part of the Forward Movement of the Twentieth Century, evangelistic services, so called, may be made, with the divine blessing, a powerful and efficient factor, especially in our cities ; therefore,

" *Resolved*, That the Moderator be requested and authorized to appoint a Special Committee of twelve, to consist of six ministers and six elders, whose duty it shall be to stimulate the churches in evangelistic work, to consider the methods of such

work and of its conduct in relation to the churches, and to report with recommendations to the next General Assembly" (*Minutes*, p. 119, May 27, 1901).

(2) "The Special Committee on Evangelistic Work was announced by the Moderator, and is as follows: *Elder* John H. Converse, Chairman; *Ministers*—George T. Purves, D.D., J. Wilbur Chapman, D.D., W. J. Chichester, D.D., S. S. Palmer, D.D., John Balcom Shaw, D.D., George P. Wilson, D.D.; *Elders*—John Willis Baer, James I. Buchanan, S. P. Harbison, E. A. K. Hackett, Charles S. Holt" (*Minutes*, p. 170, May 28, 1901).

The Committee has held four meetings, viz.: at Winona Lake, August 22, 1901; Philadelphia, Pa., October 9 and December 10, 1901, and New York City, March 19, 1902.

The Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, at the request of the Committee, acted at first as Secretary, but owing to the great increase of the correspondence of the Committee, and the pressure of his regular work, was, at his own request, at the meeting on October 9, made the Recording Secretary, and the duties of Corresponding Secretary were devolved upon the Rev. J. Wilbur Chapman, D.D. This arrangement was made possible by the courtesy of the Fourth Presbyterian Church of New York City, which, in response to the application of this Committee to release Dr. Chapman until May next for the service of the Committee, kindly consented to require from Dr. Chapman during the period named only the usual Sunday services, so that he might give the rest of his time to the duties of Corresponding Secretary of the Committee.

In arranging the work of the Committee, subcommittees were appointed on Conferences, on Evangelists, on Finance, and on Literature, respectively; and the Chairmen of these Subcommittees, with the Chairman of the General Committee, acted as an Executive Committee.

The Committee was called upon in September last to mourn the death of one of its most earnest members, the Rev. George T. Purves, D.D., LL.D., pastor of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, New York City. The death of Dr. Purves was a great loss both to the Committee and to the denomination. The Moderator appointed in his stead the Rev. John F. Carson, D.D., of Brooklyn, N. Y. The Committee, at its meeting October 9, directed the preparation of a minute on the death of Dr. Purves, which is as follows:

"The General Assembly's Committee on Evangelistic Work has learned with profound sorrow of the sudden death of one of its members, the Rev. Dr. George T. Purves, the beloved and distinguished pastor of the Fifth Avenue Church, of New York City, and desires to record its high appreciation of the invaluable assistance he gave to the prosecution of the work committed to its hands, and also its sense of bereavement and loss in his translation to the Church above. His counsel was always mature

and wise, his spirit inspiring and wholesome, and contact with his winsome and consecrated personality a privilege we are thankful to have enjoyed. His gracious memory will always be a summons to consecrated, faithful service, and we shall be the better able to fulfill our trust to our beloved Church for having known and labored with him."

The expenses of the Committee were provided for in two ways; those connected with the traveling expenses of members in attendance upon the regular meetings of the General Committee being defrayed by the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, while those connected with the general work in stimulating the churches to evangelistic effort were provided for by special contributions.

The Committee desires to acknowledge the cordial and valued coöperation of the Board of Home Missions in carrying on its work. At many points where the work of this Committee has touched the work of the Board, the officers and missionaries of the Board have shown the greatest interest and tendered every possible assistance.

The work of the Committee may be considered under three heads:

1. Methods.
2. Results.
3. The work in the future.

1. *Methods of Work.*—Communication has been had with the entire Church through the pastors, and, to some extent, through the eldership, by letters and circulars which have been sent out from time to time covering suggestions and proposing specific effort. The Committee has not attempted to prescribe methods, but has appealed to the churches to undertake such work as might be suited to their conditions. The request was made that Committees on Evangelistic Work be appointed in all the Presbyteries, and under the supervision of such Committees evangelistic services, presbyterial visitation, house-to-house work, open-air and tent preaching, and personal work have been emphasized. The observance of Decision Days in the Sabbath-schools was recommended, and special meetings suggested wherever practicable.

The chief reliance of the Committee, however, has been in the employment of representatives, and ten such representatives have been in the field, as follows:

Rev. W. S. Miller, of Pittsburg, labored in Montana. Rev. George B. Stewart, D.D., President of Auburn Theological Seminary, has spoken in the interest of evangelistic work for the Committee in nineteen States, viz.: Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Colorado, Utah, California, Oregon, Washington, Minnesota, Maryland and the District of Columbia. Rev. J. M. Campbell, D.D., of Pawnee City, Neb.,

visited twenty-three cities and towns, held forty-eight conferences, delivered seventy-five addresses and labored in Nebraska, Wyoming, Idaho, Montana, Washington and Utah. Rev. Ford C. Ottman, of Newark, N. J., conducted conferences in sixteen States and Territories, as follows: New Jersey, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska, Colorado, Oklahoma, Indian Territory, Texas, Kansas, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee and Delaware. Evangelistic services were also held by him in Denver and Boulder, Colo. Rev. I. B. Hopwood, D.D., of Newark, N. J., labored in the State of Texas. Rev. John S. MacIntosh, D.D., of Philadelphia, held conferences and conducted preaching services in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Iowa, Indiana, South Dakota, Illinois, Nebraska, Missouri and New Jersey. Rev. W. H. W. Boyle, D.D., of Colorado Springs, labored one month in the interests of the Committee in the State of Colorado. Rev. Arthur J. Smith, of New York, has conducted conferences in New York, Pennsylvania, Indiana and Ohio. Rev. William B. Irwin, D.D., of Steubenville, O., has represented the Committee in conferences held in the Steubenville Presbytery. Rev. James B. Ely, of Philadelphia, has spent several weeks, recently, in visiting the cities of Cleveland, Toledo, Chicago, St. Louis and Indianapolis, aiding in the promotion of tent work and other summer evangelistic services. In addition to the above, Mr. John Willis Baer, a member of the Committee, has acted as a representative during a tour of several months on the Pacific coast and in the States adjacent.

Impressed with the conviction that one of the most fruitful and effective methods would be the holding of conferences, the Committee has participated, by several of its members, in conferences held at the following points: Utica, N. Y., Elizabeth, N. J., Philadelphia, Pa., Pittsburg, Pa., Boston, Mass., Providence, R. I., St. Augustine, Fla., Geneva, N. Y., Elmira, N. Y., Albany, N. Y., Chicago, Ill., Cleveland, O., Bellaire, O., Harrisburg, Pa., Huntingdon, Pa., Red Bank, N. J., and Riverdale, N. Y.

It has not been the purpose of the Committee to put evangelists in the field. It has, however, on application recommended evangelists who were known to be available and competent. The nominations of the Committee have been utilized in some cases. The Committee has, however, had three evangelists at work for whose compensation it has been responsible: Rev. T. C. Smith, D.D., laboring in the State of Iowa; Rev. Daniel S. Toy, spending all his time from November till June in the Oklahoma and Indian Territories, and Mr. Ferdinand Schiverea, conducting services in the interests of workingmen, the meetings having been held in churches, shops and on the streets, in the States of Delaware, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota and New York.

In response to suggestions 1200 ministers have been enrolled

in a circle of prayer, the object being to pray for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on our Church.

More than 100,000 communications have been sent out to the pastors and elders of the churches. A volume describing evangelistic methods which have been used in different parts of the Church with success, entitled "Evangelistic Services," has been prepared, five thousand copies of which were printed, and most of them were sent out on application. A supply for free distribution may be found in the room set apart for Presbyterian literature in connection with this General Assembly.

2. *Results.*—One thousand five hundred and eighty churches have reported concerning their additions on confession of faith, and of this number 1285 churches have reported the holding meetings of an evangelistic character. The number received on confession by these churches has been largely in excess of the figures for the corresponding period of last year. For details reference is made to the Presbyterian Reports and Narratives.

The Committee rejoice in being able to report a very general awakening and forward movement in the churches. Ministers have been imbued with the evangelistic spirit, and have prosecuted their work with new zeal and devotion. In remote and thinly settled districts, the visits of members of the Committee or its representatives have been a source of joy and encouragement. The opportunity for conference has been cordially welcomed. The special services which have been held have resulted in increased accessions by confession of faith, and the more general adoption of Decision Day in the Sabbath-school has been abundantly blessed. The accessions from this source have been most encouraging.

3. *The Future of the Work.*—The necessity of an earnest, aggressive, evangelistic movement inside the Presbyterian Church is everywhere recognized. There has been no period in recent years when so much thought was given to the great demand for a true, faithful and intelligent setting forth of the Word of Life, both by ministers and laymen, to non-churchgoers as well as to those who are regularly reached by the local congregation.

The experience of the Committee during the past year has opened the way for the continuance of this or a similar work with a prospect of still more encouraging results. If the General Assembly shall take measures for such continuance, it is believed that a series of conferences should be carefully planned, first, in all centres touching theological seminaries, and, secondly, in such other parts of the Church as would make it possible to reach the greatest number of ministers and laymen.

It is suggested that at some season of the year all our churches be requested to engage in a forward movement in the interest of the unsaved. Such a uniform effort throughout our churches at a definite time, it is believed, could not fail to be blessed with large results. To this end, all the Presbyteries should be requested to

appoint Evangelistic Committees, or to reappoint existing Committees. It is suggested, also, that the Chairmen of the Presbyterial Committees arrange the appointment of Synodical Committees, and that the Chairman of each Synodical Committee be the corresponding member of the General Assembly's Committee on Evangelistic Work.

It is believed that the work already done may lead to the development of a class of pastor-evangelists, much needed in our Church. Evangelists drawn from our own ministry and possessing recognized evangelistic gifts might be effectively utilized, each for a well-defined field, such as a single Presbytery or two or more Presbyteries united for the purpose. The care of pastorless churches, the holding of evangelistic services and the aid given to pastors in conducting such services, would afford ample opportunity for the work of such evangelists. Over 682 applications for evangelists have been received by the Committee. It has been impossible to meet the demand, and the Committee has not felt that it was expedient to attempt it. There is, however, no doubt of the need of evangelists in certain cases. If the General Assembly shall appoint an Evangelistic Committee for the ensuing year, such Committee may be of service in passing upon the qualifications of evangelists and being prepared to recommend them in answer to applications. In many of the smaller churches evangelistic work will strengthen them, and bring them to the point of self-support, where they are now dependent on our Board of Home Missions. The evangelist, or evangelist-pastor, entering a Presbytery for three or four months, and visiting the various fields under the direction of the Presbyterial Committee on Evangelistic Work, can lift many of our churches to a higher spiritual plane, and arouse and train our people for soul-winning and more consecrated service.

The following recommendations are submitted for the consideration of the General Assembly :

Resolved, 1. That a Committee of sixteen, eight ministers and eight elders, be appointed by the Moderator, to stimulate the churches in evangelistic work and to give general advisory direction to such work. This Committee shall cooperate with the Presbyteries and Synods; shall have power to name an advisory member for each Synod and to constitute an Executive Committee of not less than five for the transaction of business in the intervals between regular meetings; and shall report to the next General Assembly. The expenses, except for the attendance of members upon the regular meetings, shall be met by voluntary contributions.

Resolved, 2. That the General Assembly recommend the appointment, or continuance, of Committees on Evangelistic Work in each Presbytery and Synod.

Resolved, 3. That the coming year be signalized by aggressive work for the winning of souls, and that the General Assembly

recommend to each church, by special services or otherwise, to take definite and systematic measures to that end, and that Presbyteries be instructed to initiate and direct the work so far as necessary.

Resolved, 4. That the General Assembly recommend that the work in the Sabbath-schools and Young People's Societies be conducted with a distinct evangelistic purpose: that Decision Days be fixed, and that under the supervision of the Session of each church such methods be adopted as will promote the all-important object of bringing the children and young people to accept and confess Christ, and that pastors and Sessions especially consider the feasibility of making some portion of the Sabbath morning service have special reference to the instruction and salvation of the young.

Resolved, 5. That the General Assembly recommend to the theological seminaries that arrangements be made for instruction in evangelistic methods, and that emphasis be laid on personal work, the conduct of inquiry meetings, and the preparation of distinctly evangelistic sermons.

Resolved, 6. That the General Assembly emphasizes the primary responsibility for evangelistic effort as resting upon pastors and Sessions. At the same time, the Assembly again, as heretofore, recognizes the use and value of accredited evangelists, and therefore authorizes the Committee to pass upon the qualifications of evangelists, and to recommend them to the churches and Presbyteries so far as their services may be needed.

The Assembly adjourned, and was closed with prayer.

A popular meeting was held in the interests of the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work, and addresses were delivered by Rev. James A. Worden, D.D., Secretary of the Board, Rev. Wilton Merle Smith, D.D., Rev. W. H. W. Boyle, D.D., and Rev. Messrs. E. F. Knickerbocker, S. R. Ferguson, and Joseph Brown.

SATURDAY, May 17, 9 o'clock A.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with devotional exercises, the Vice-Moderator being in the Chair.

The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

The Permanent Committee on Commissions reported the following additional Commissioners, who were duly enrolled: *Ministers*—Thomas R. White, of the Presbytery of Freeport; John Weston, D.D., of the Presbytery of Peoria, and *Elder* W. S. Branch, of the Presbytery of South Dakota.

The Standing Committees, as compiled from the Reports of the Electing Sections, were announced, and said Committees, where necessary, were instructed to meet at 7.45 o'clock this evening and elect their Chairmen.

The Moderator announced the appointment of the following *Special Committee on Evangelistic Work*: *Elder* John H. Converse, LL.D., Chairman; *Ministers*—W. J. Chichester, D.D., S. S. Palmer, D.D., John Balcom Shaw, D.D., J. P. Calhoun, D.D., J. Wilbur Chapman, D.D., Cleland B. McAfee, D.D., George Alexander, D.D., and John F. Carson, D.D.; *Elders*—L. H. Severance, George W. Bailey, John Willis Baer, E. A. K. Hackett, Walter M. Smith, W. E. Dodge and S. P. Harbison.

A paper with reference to the pay and allowances of the Chaplains of the U. S. Navy was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

The Assembly was addressed by the Rev. E. P. Ingersoll, D.D., in behalf of the American Bible Society, and the following Committee was appointed to present a resolution concerning the work of the Society: Hon. Daniel R. Noyes, Robert Hunter, D.D., and Mr. W. C. Lilley.

The Standing Committee on Ministerial Relief, through the Chairman, Rev. Thomas Parry, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman, by Rev. Benjamin L. Agnew, D.D., Secretary of the Board, Rev. D. R. Foster, D.D., and Rev. J. Beveridge Lee, D.D., was adopted, with the exception of the part relating to the Westminster Home, which was referred back to the Committee. The Report, so far as adopted, is as follows:

The Standing Committee on Ministerial Relief respectfully submit the following Report:

The Report of the Board of Ministerial Relief and the manuscript volume of its Minutes, for the year ending April, 1902,

were presented to your Committee, examined and their approval is recommended. These Minutes appear to your Committee as worthy of highest commendation, for the much and faithful labor which they manifest on the part of the members of the Board. The frequency of their meetings, the regard they have for all the details of their work, and the diligence with which they seek to make as much as possible of the means at their command, reveal the fact that they are doing this gracious service not merely as a matter of duty, but from love to God and the sweet sympathy they have for the aged servants of our Lord and their families. The untiring ministry of the Directors of this Board, which touches so tenderly the hearts of the whole Church, is indeed an inspiration to pastors and elders to come forward with greater zeal in endeavoring to secure more means, whereby they may more fully prosecute the enterprise and give better comforts to the needy who depend upon them.

The work is great; it is great in extent, it is great in its spirit, and it is great in mellowing the spiritual life of the Church. Nothing enriches the heart of a Christian more than the ministry of filial love to the aged who are worn out in the service of their Master.

The work is increasing. Not only is there a greater number coming under the care of the Board, but there is an increased demand upon the little store of each individual. Five years ago, a dollar went as far as a dollar and forty cents to-day. The work also is continually becoming more delicate, for as civilization advances the human sensibilities are being refined. The wives of ministers as well as the ministers themselves are from the colleges. They suffer intensely when they must appear in the threadbare garments of poverty or are housed under the shadow of charity. In this ministry, therefore, there should reign the sovereignty of gentleness.

We rejoice greatly that from each of its four sources of revenue the receipts of the Board have, during the past year, been much larger than the year previous. This has enabled the Board not only to pay all its appropriations in full, but to close the year with an encouraging balance in the Emergency Fund of \$8036.03. We are encouraged and hope for a brighter day to dawn upon the gloom of the past.

Yet while we rejoice that we have met our promises, yet the Board was not enabled to render to the needy the adequate aid to which they were entitled. Widows received but the small sum of \$150 per annum, ministers honorably retired \$300, and families received an average of \$180. Often this sum is not adequate to remove the strain of privation.

There are strong reasons urging the Church to greater efforts to come to the help of these aged servants of God.

First. The General Assembly has seen the need of increasing the support of those depending upon the aid of the Board of

Ministerial Relief in coming years. This very fact will call upon the churches to strive to secure greater liberality.

Second. In twenty years the applicants for aid have doubled, but the contributions have not increased in the same ratio.

Third. We find that in late years many ministers break down in the prime of life. The demands on the ministers are increasing, and the nervous system often gives way under the pressure. Also, if in the middle of life a minister leaves a church, he finds it exceedingly difficult to secure another field of labor. These things cause an increase of men, faithful men, often quite able men, to look toward receiving aid from this Board.

Fourth. One-eighth of the entire ministry depend in old age upon this Board.

Fifth. The increase in the cost of living makes a marked decrease in the purchasing power of the little which the Church grants these worthy men and women.

Sixth. The rate of interest on the Endowment Fund has decreased in the last few years, so that here even there is a call for an increased liberality on the part of the churches.

The above are some of the reasons why in the future this Board must receive a heartier consideration at the hands of the Christian people of our Church. We need to be aroused. The facts brought before this Board are enough to melt into pity the flintiest of hearts, did not delicacy forbid their being made public.

Why is it that the churches contribute so sparingly to this Board? It is not because of deficiency of wealth; it is not because there is not tenderness enough in the hearts of the people to kindle in them the desired sympathy; it is not because there is a lack of liberality of spirit, when the mind is enlightened; the truth is that the ministers and elders do not bestir themselves to become acquainted with the facts; or if they do know them, they do not present them with that zeal that awakens the conscience to see its duty, kindles the sympathies of the people, moves their wills, and secures the necessary gifts. When the ministry and eldership are aroused in respect to their accountability to God and man, as to what should be done for the aged minister or his widow, there will be no apprehension of hungry leanness at sixty-five, or of looking starvation in the face at seventy.

Your Committee believes it a sound Scriptural principle, that "when the Church accepts the services of a young minister, and requires him to keep himself free from worldly cares and avocations, and to give himself wholly to the preaching of the Word and to pastoral work, and when it has received such service from its covenanted servant, and he becomes disabled by disease, accident or old age, it is but common honesty, justice and honor to give him a comfortable support during the time of his disability. The consecrated young preacher does not give himself

and his services to any one particular congregation, but to the whole Church of which he is a minister, and he stands ready to go and labor wherever God by His providence may call him, until he is disabled from active service. When that time comes, the Church, the whole Church, to which he has given the cost of his education, his whole time, and all his working forces, is bound by the law of God to furnish him a decent living. To do so is but common fairness and even-handed justice, and not to do so is dishonoring to the Church of God. "Even so hath the Lord ordained, that they which preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel." "Take heed to thyself that thou forsake not the Levite as long as thou livest upon the earth."

Your Committee submits the following recommendations :

1. Whereas the terms of the following Directors expire at this meeting of the Assembly, viz., Rev. Thomas R. Beeber, D.D., Rev. John A. Liggett, D.D., Francis Olcott Allen, Esq., Rudolph M. Schiek, Esq., it is recommended that they be reelected.

2. The Assembly recognize the earnest efforts of the Secretary of the Board of Ministerial Relief in behalf of aged ministers and their families, greatly appreciate his labors, and thank God that we have so efficient a man in that office.

3. We rejoice that in our Presbyterian Church we have such large-hearted, self-denying ministers and laymen as the twelve men on this Board, who are exceptionally consecrated for this work, which needs so much tenderness, sympathy, judgment and fidelity in its administration. We present to them our grateful thanks and praise God for the gift of such men to carry on this all-important work.

The Standing Committee on Freedmen, through the Chairman, Rev. Samuel A. Martin, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman, by Rev. E. P. Cowan, D.D., Secretary of the Board, Rev. John N. McGonigle, Rev. Levi J. Melton, Rev. W. R. Holman and Rev. Eli M. Clark, was adopted. The Report is as follows :

The Standing Committee on Freedmen respectfully reports as follows :

We have carefully examined the record and Report of the Board of Missions for Freedmen, and are gratified to note the care and zeal and wisdom with which all its activities have been conducted, and the large and good results that have been secured from the slender means at their disposal.

The field is vast, the need is great and pressing, but the contributions of the churches have been painfully inadequate to the demands. The contributions from the field toward self-support have been generous, amounting in all to over \$88,000 for the year. This is an increase of about \$6000 over the gifts of the year before, and more than \$16,000 in excess of any previous year.

The zeal and energy of the Woman's Board has been most helpful and encouraging. But we are distressed to learn that the contributions from our churches, during this year of marvelous prosperity, have not increased, but have actually fallen short of the meagre gifts of the year before. Surely our people do not consider the pitiful need of these people, nor the splendid opportunity God's Providence has given us to work with Christ in saving souls.

Nearly nine millions of our fellow-citizens, co-heirs with us with this good age and land, dependent members of our State, and from every household crying to us, their stronger, older brothers, for the mere crumbs of the bread of life. Yet, they are starving at our very doors. This is the plain truth, and it is a shameful truth.

In the presence of a work so vast and pressing, our Board is furnished with means so utterly inadequate that they are made embarrassed oftentimes to know what they shall undertake for us. The greatest care and sanest judgment are required to use this little fund so prudently that it shall not be dissipated in fruitless efforts to accomplish the impossible.

It is with great satisfaction that we learn how much has been done, and well done by means so slender and uncertain.

One hundred and twenty-one workers have been supported on the field. Regular service has been maintained, in 353 churches and missions. Twenty-one thousand members of our Church and their families have been cared for by these pastors. Twenty-one thousand children have been taught in Sunday-school. Seventeen hundred souls have been added to the Church, and over ten thousand pupils have received instruction in the schools and colleges supported by our Board. And these schools have been much improved in many ways. This is a splendid record, and eloquent in praise at the devotion and fidelity and practical good sense of the officers and members of this Board.

We therefore recommend the following resolutions :

Resolved, 1. We congratulate the Church upon the efficiency and economy of management of this work. We commend the officers and members of this Board for their fidelity and prudent zeal, and we approve their Records.

Resolved, 2. We recommend the reelection of Rev. S. J. Fisher, D.D., Mr. Robert S. Davis, J. C. McCombs, Esq., Rev. J. P. E. Kumler, D.D., and Willis Boothe, Esq., members of the Board, whose terms of office expire the current year.

Resolved, 3. We put on record our high appreciation of the loyal and generous support given to this work by the Freedmen's Department of the Woman's Board and the liberality of our Young People's Societies.

Resolved, 4. We earnestly urge on all our pastors and people more serious consideration of the perishing condition of the people on whose behalf this Board is laboring, and we beseech them by the love of Christ to provide more generous support for this great work, and that not less than \$250,000 be given to this cause this year.

The Standing Committee on Education, through the Chairman, Rev. Russell A. McKinley, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman, by Rev. Edward B. Hodge, D.D., Secretary of the Board, Rev. John N. Hatfield and Mr. Jeremiah Baker, was adopted. The Report is as follows :

The Eighty-third Annual Report of the Board of Education has been placed in the hands of your Committee, and also a Supplemental Report relative to the Cairo Overture, referred to this Board by the General Assembly of 1901.

Your Committee has examined very carefully and thoroughly the Minutes of the Board's meetings and the Accounts of the Treasurer, and desires to express great satisfaction with the manner in which all the business affairs of the Board have been conducted.

We note with pleasure that the Board has closed the year

without any debt. It received through contributions from churches, Sabbath-schools and Young People's Societies \$230 more than last year, but much less from legacies. Its receipts from all sources have been \$66,525.73. It has paid to candidates \$55,530.27, or \$9197 more than last year. It has aided forty-one less candidates, but given them each more. The amount paid to seminary and college students has been \$100, and to preparatory students \$90. This is the maximum recommended by the last Assembly, and the highest sum that has been paid since 1894 and one-fifth larger than last year.

Of course it never has been the aim of the Board to furnish sufficient funds with which to get an education, but only enough to afford stimulation to those of meagre resources.

The Report of the Board calls special attention to the steady decline in the number of candidates, and to the fact that the expected reaction does not yet seem to be in sight. The number has been going down steadily from 1037 in 1896 to 572 in 1902. The same general proportion holds good relative to those not aided by the Board. Candidates for the Gospel ministry are decreasing year by year, while those in all other professions are multiplying. The Board seems to think that, during recent years the cause of this decline have been sufficiently considered and that it remains only to endeavor to remove them. And hence, the Board presses upon the attention of the Assembly and of the Church the importance of revival of ministerial influence and of private, family and public prayer for more laborers, as the best means of arresting the decline, and of obtaining an increase of candidates.

The Cairo Overture, referred to the Board by the last General Assembly asks, mainly, for a pronouncement upon what constitutes a sufficient college course, and the Board has answered by publishing in its Supplemental Report an ideal scheme of college studies. The Board has not deemed it best to go further than to suggest this scheme of a four-years' course of study, as a guide to those seeking advice thereon.

The Church has no more loyal, careful and efficient arm than the Board of Education. It is the creature and servant of the Church. It has not foisted itself upon the Church, but has been called into being by the Church. It exists because it has a great and noble mission to perform. It does not manufacture needy students, but recognizes the fact that God calls into the ministry many who are poor in money, but rich in faith and ability. It does not forget that Jesus selected to be educated for the apostleship, poor and illiterate fishermen, nor that the Reformation of the sixteenth century was heralded largely by members of mendicant orders, nor that a rail splitter and a tow-path boy mounted to the White House. It does not believe that Government scholarships at Annapolis ever hampered and pauperized and made fat and saucy such naval heroes as Samp-

son, Schley and Dewey, nor that those of West Point marred the character of Hancock, Sherman, Sheridan and Grant. Nor much less does it believe that the small scholarships of this Board for ministerial education ever damaged the character of anybody. How much of a splurge can any student make on \$60, \$70 or \$100 a year? Instead of degrading anybody, the elevation of their men by education and sending them forth to preach the Gospel has contributed to the general elevation of the masses of the people. As it is considered a high honor to be appointed to a cadetship at West Point or Annapolis, so should it be regarded as a great honor to be found worthy of being assisted into the Gospel ministry. This Board has been evolved out of the necessities of the Church and in its present organization expresses the wisdom of the Church acquired during many years of experience, and from some of the brainiest, most earnest and most consecrated men of our own Communion.

There is really no other Board of our Church more important than this. It is the fountain-head whence flow many of our streams of influence and power. It furnishes at least forty per cent. of our ministry. Since its organization it has assisted more than 10,000 men into the ministry of the Gospel. Presbyterians ever have sought for high attainments in education. As an educated people they ever have demanded an educated ministry. Believing in doctrine as the best instrument for bringing sinners to Christ, and for developing Christians in beauty and strength of character, we ever have aspired to a ministry sufficiently trained to expound and apply doctrine. In this age of widely disseminated education, of absolutely unparalleled and superabundant mental food, of scientific and materialistic skepticism, and of so-called Higher Criticism, the need is more imperative than ever before for the most highly trained ministry possible. God brings into this world but very few Moodys. All cloths cannot be cut to fit the pattern of Goliath of Gath. Because Samson slew 10,000 Philistines with the jawbone of an ass does not prove that there is no need of well-trained and disciplined soldiers. It is not so much learned men as men of power who are needed, and education gives chiefly power. Ministers may not make much use of astronomy or chemistry or differential calculus, or of Latin, Greek and Hebrew; but by these the mind is developed to be harnessed to the life-work afterward. Many things that are learned in college are soon forgotten and ought to be forgotten, but the power obtained in acquiring them may be concentrated upon preaching the riches of God's grace. It requires much mental power to get and hold attention in this age of indifference and doubt, and of absorption in pleasure and business. The most extended and thorough education must be insisted upon, that there may be sufficient mental power to make scientific Materialism and Higher Criticism glorify the Gospel and compel assent to its verities. No commonplace sort of

preaching ever again can get an appreciative hearing. We must put our standard up higher and higher, and help our young men with the means to attain it. It is along these lines that our Board of Education is working, and it deserves and has the confidence of the Church. It needs more men and more funds. The Board is wide awake. It is up to date. Its ear is ever open to the voice of the Church. It is ever ready to execute the will of the Church.

Your Committee would present the following resolutions for adoption :

1. That the fidelity and efficiency of the Board during the past year be highly commended.

2. That the Minutes of the Board's meetings, which your Committee has read carefully and found to be neatly and correctly kept, and the Treasurer's accounts, which have been scrutinized thoroughly, and which evidence wisdom in expenditures and investments, be approved.

3. That the Rev. John Calhoun be elected to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of the Rev. Lewis S. Mudge because of impaired health.

4. That Rev. George D. Baker, D.D., Rev. James M. Crowell, D.D., Rev. William P. Finney, Mr. George W. Barr, Charles P. Turner, M.D., and Mr. T. M. Rogers, whose terms of service expire at this time, be reelected to serve for three years.

5. That the annual election of officers, held June 10, 1901, when the following officers were chosen, to wit: President, Rev. George D. Baker, D.D.; Vice-President, Rev. James M. Crowell, D.D.; Corresponding Secretary, Rev. Edward B. Hodge, D.D.; Treasurer, Mr. Jacob Wilson, be approved.

6. That the Supplemental Report of the Board, evincing much care and wisdom and containing an ideal scheme of college studies, be considered a sufficient answer to the Overture of the Presbytery of Cairo, and as something worthy of commendation to the consideration of college faculties, and of candidates for the ministry.

7. That we deplore the gradually decreasing number of candidates for the ministry, and urge parents and pastors to bring the calling of the ministry to the attention of young men, and to spy out such as are adapted to the ministry.

8. That the last Thursday of January be observed as a day of prayer for Colleges and Academies, and that special prayer be then made for an increase of suitable candidates.

9. That it be recommended to the Board that the aid to college and seminary students be fixed at the rate of \$100, and to preparatory students at \$90, if the state of the funds will warrant it.

10. That the Assembly renews its admonitions to pastors,

Sessions and Presbyteries to exercise the greatest possible care in the recommendation of candidates.

Overtures Nos. 35 and 36, from the Presbyteries of Binghamton and Fargo, on the blank form for the Narrative of the State of Religion in congregations. It is recommended that inasmuch as the Assembly has a Committee on Church Statistics, which has been continued for another year, these Overtures be referred to that Committee, and that no further action be taken. Adopted.

Upon the proposed modification of Standing Order No. 5, dealing with the appointment of Standing Committees and referred to this Committee by the Assembly, it is recommended that in view of the brief time during which the new plan of appointing Standing Committees has been in operation, and of the desirability of giving the plan a fair trial in its original form, that no action be taken. Adopted.

With reference to the matter, referred to the Committee, connected with the pay and allowances of the Chaplains of the U S. Navy, the following action is recommended, viz.:

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., assembled in New York, N. Y., hereby petitions the Congress of the United States to enact such legislation as may be necessary to abolish what we believe to be an unjust discrimination made against the Chaplains of the Navy in the matter of pay and allowances, a discrimination which, in the opinion of

this Assembly, tends to decrease the influence of these Chaplains and to diminish the efficiency of their labors. Adopted.

The Standing Committee on Home Missions, through the Chairman, Rev. Richard S. Holmes, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman, by Rev. John Dixon, D.D., Secretary of the Board, Rev. Eben B. Cobb, D.D., Rev. Sheldon Jackson, D.D., Rev. Henry A. Little, D.D., Rev. M. Egbert Koonce, Ph.D., and Rev. S. Hall Young, D.D., was adopted. The Report is as follows :

The Standing Committee on Home Missions would respectfully report as follows :

The Committee was organized on Saturday, May 17, by the choice of the Rev. Richard S. Holmes, of Pittsburgh, Pa., as Chairman, and has carefully noted all papers, communications and Reports which have come before it, including the Minutes of the Board of Home Missions for the past year, and the published Reports of the Board of Home Missions and of the Woman's Board of Home Missions.

Your Committee has been deeply impressed with the fidelity and care which is manifest in the preparation and presentation of the smallest details of the work, with the watchful scrutiny which is given to the granting of appropriations for work on the mission fields, and with the economy exhibited in the administration of this great trust.

Your Committee cannot refrain from mentioning with commendation the courtesy which characterizes all the acts of the Executive Officers and of the Treasurer, as they have touch with the churches and with individuals, whether face to face or by letter, and expresses its belief that the only thing necessary for a large advance in Home Mission offerings is a closer acquaintance with these officers of the Board.

Your Committee is in entire accord in feeling that in presenting this Report to the General Assembly it should aim to centre your attention in the recommendations it has to offer, rather than in any attempt it might make to traverse the whole field of Home Missions in written form. The celebration of the Centennial of Home Missions on the 19th of May, with its three historic addresses, which will remain as the permanent possession of the Church, makes any further review of the fact of a finished century or of this just finished year unnecessary. We thank God for what has been accomplished and we ask Him to manifest Himself for His own glory in an abundant crowning with His blessings of the work and the workers present and to come in the century which we begin to-day.

We recommend :

1. That the Minutes of the Board of Home Missions be approved; and that the thanks of the General Assembly be

hereby returned to the officers for not only the fidelity of the record, but also for the beauty of form in which it has been presented.

2. That the General Assembly endorses the policy of the Board, which promotes efforts toward self-support by Home Mission churches.

3. That the General Assembly endorses the policy of the Board, which contemplates the extension of the work already begun in Cuba and Porto Rico.

4. That so liberal an advance in giving shall be made by the churches that the Board will be enabled to expend and justified in expending at least twenty-five thousand dollars more than last year "in new work."

5. That the second Sunday of October, 1902, be observed as a day for special centennial contributions in all our churches.

6. That churches, as far as they are able, undertake to provide for the support of at least one home missionary, that there may be between the individual church and the work the closer union caused by personal interest.

7. That the Sabbath-schools of the Church be requested to take collections for the benefit of the work of the Woman's Board of Home Missions, and if possible on the Sabbath nearest to Thanksgiving Day, November, 1902.

8. That the members of the Board of Home Missions whose terms of service expire with this Assembly be reappointed for the usual term, viz.: *Ministers*—Thomas A. Nelson, D.D., George L. Spining, D.D., Wilton Merle Smith, D.D.; *Laymen*—John E. Parsons, H. Edwards Rowland, A. Noel Blakeman and James A. Beaver.

We offer also the following general resolutions :

1. That the Assembly congratulates the Board of Home Missions that for four successive meetings of the General Assembly, it has been able to show in the Report of its Treasurer a cash balance in its treasury and no debt.

2. That the Assembly hereby makes public recognition of its appreciation of the life and services of Mrs. Frederick H. Pierson, the late beloved Secretary of the Woman's Board of Home Missions, and extends to that Board its sympathy in its hour of grief.

3. That the General Assembly once more commends the work of the Woman's Board of Home Missions, and urges all the women of all our churches to give their love and care to this great agency for the evangelization of the whole land.

The Standing Committee on Foreign Missions, through the Chairman, Rev. Courtenay A. Fenn, presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman, by Rev.

The Committee on Foreign Missions respectfully submits the following Report :

It is with a profound sense of joy and thanksgiving that we report to the Assembly the best year in all the history of the Board of Foreign Missions. The cause of our rejoicing is not merely the fact that for the fifth successive year the Board has come up to the Assembly without the distressing necessity for reporting a debt, but in a still higher degree the fact that from the mission fields, here, there, almost everywhere, has been wafted to our ears the jubilant song of the Harvest Home. We report to you not merely a financial prosperity which has enabled the Board to meet all its obligations, but also such an ingathering of souls, redeemed by the blood of Christ and regenerated by the effectual working of the Holy Spirit, as should cause the whole Church, from north to south, from east to west, to join with the angelic hosts in their song of triumph and of praise. No less a number than 5241 adult persons, after long instruction and careful examination, have been baptized into the Presbyterian churches on our mission fields, a larger number than in any previous year since the establishment of the Board. This is an increase of twelve and a half per cent. upon the membership of last year. Deducting all losses by death or dismissal, there has been a net gain of 2884, or more than seven per cent., while the average gain in the home Church for the past six years is but one and six-tenths per cent. Missions which have struggled for many years with small results have doubled or trebled the number of their converts within the year; others, which have long felt the influence of deadly reaction from the prosperity of the previous years, have seen the tide once more turn, and with a stronger, surer flow than ever before; others, which have encountered various and baffling hindrances, have seen them removed, and the natives turning to the missionary for the light of life so long unheeded: while still others, where the fury of man's wrath has been poured out in volcanic outbursts, which have threatened to overwhelm the work and destroy the workers, have seen God's hand stretched out to restrain the excesses of that fury, and to use what man called "destruction and ruin" to transform a nation, and hasten the coming of His own blessed kingdom of righteousness and truth. Never before has there been so much of inspiration in the Report of the Board, the reading of which in full—and not merely as an occasional work of reference—your Committee would earnestly recommend to every Commissioner to the Assembly, be he minister or elder. The statistics of growth, other than already given, are as follows: 745 missionaries, a gain of thirty; 26,108 scholars in schools, a gain of 198; 289,363 patients treated in hospitals and dispensaries, and 75,011,-

660 pages issued from Mission presses. The inevitable delay in reëstablishing schools and hospitals in North China accounts for lack of greater gains in those departments. One thousand eight hundred and eighty-two native helpers of all grades are employed in the care of 610 churches, and in widely extended evangelistic itineration. It is possible for us to give but a brief *résumé* of the work of the various fields.

CHINA.—All eyes have continued to be turned toward China, and the horror which filled all hearts during the awful summer of 1900 is only now beginning to give way to a vision of the glory which is to be revealed. A year ago it was only by faith that we could refuse to believe the pessimistic prediction that not in forty years would the Empire again reach the point of progress attained before the outbreak. The Empress Dowager, alas, is back in Peking in control of the Government. But what is she doing? Issuing the very same edicts of reform and progress for which she had deposed the Emperor! The establishment of a system of universities in provincial capitals and of academies in district cities, the abolition of the artificial literary essay, which served only for the manifestation of abysmal ignorance of everything but an effete past, as a basis for official appointment, the introduction of Western learning into the educational curriculum, the unparalleled demand for Western books, the formation of Students' Associations, the increased literary use of the Mandarin language, the imperial discountenancing of foot-binding, edicts of religious toleration and of protection for missionaries, heretofore undreamed-of freedom of social intercourse between Chinese officials and their wives and all classes of foreigners, an increased respect shown to the missionary in city and country, growing cordiality in the welcome afforded him, emphatic official expressions of approval of his leniency in the settlement of the recent troubles, larger numbers attending his preaching, Buddhist and Taoist priests converted and converting their temples into Christian Churches, growing groups of earnest catechumens, many baptisms even in the scenes of ruin—all these things and many more not only rejoice our hearts in the present, but strengthen our faith in God's plan for a mighty work in the days which are to come. No indemnity has yet been paid by the Chinese for the property of the Board and its missionaries in Peking and Paotingfu; but the increased regular contributions and special gifts for reëstablishment have enabled the Board to undertake the work of rebuilding, and to advance a moderate sum to the missionaries who lost their all. The native Christians have been reimbursed by the local magistrates, here and in other parts of the Empire, and the losses of the missionaries in other places have also been settled locally, the claims being willingly reduced for the sake of the beneficial effect of such relinquishment upon the Chinese.

A larger proportion of the China missionaries are now on

their fields and at work than of those of any other country where our work has been long established. In the Southern and Central Missions the work was not long seriously disturbed by the outbreak. It was vigorously resumed before the Board's year opened, and has been prosecuted with much encouragement. Huanan has been reoccupied by the reinforced pioneers of our Mission, and the new station at Hsiang Tan formally established. The little band which has for more than three years been preparing at Nanking has now pressed on to open a new station and take its part in the conquest of the province of An Hui. The beautiful life of our lonely missionary at Paotingfu has so watered the seed of martyr blood that officials and people unite in contributions for the new buildings; and the Provincial Treasurer, successor of the author of the massacres, is engaged in the translation of the Bible, which he has learned to admire. The noble witness borne by thousands of native Christians, faithful in every trial, and even unto death, not merely led some to cut out the hearts of their victims for examination, but to consider whether the truth in those hearts was not the source of their sublime courage. Divine wisdom has been given to the missionaries in dealing with the cases of temporary recantation, and their loving firmness has resulted in a great awakening of the Church. The missionaries in Peking have led to Christ many of the American soldiers, and quickened not a few of the careless. And now from every part of that great Empire comes home the word: "The fields are whiter than ever to the harvest. Send forth the reapers to gather it in."

JAPAN.—Once more has God given to His Church an open door in Japan. For some years, while it has appeared to be open, it was but an outer door. Following the early promises of our Mission work, which encouraged the hope of a speedy evangelization of the islands, and led to the earnest but almost vain appeal to the Church to seize the fleeting opportunity, came the reaction toward a rationalistic theology, invertebrate and nerveless, which threatened to kill the native Church by stopping its aggressive efforts, and to destroy all outside interest by its failure to offer anything better than the old ethical philosophies. The past year a general discontent with existing conditions, an awakening of the Japanese to a realization of the insufficiency of their own systems, together with other causes, led to the inauguration of the Twentieth Century Special Union Evangelistic Movement, in which Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Methodists and Baptists have coöperated. Conducted in a large measure by the natives themselves, with the aid and counsel of the missionaries, this evangelistic campaign, begun in the spring of 1901, and resumed in the fall of the same year, has resulted in 10,000 inquirers of all ranks and conditions, exclusive of the 1400 students who expressed a purpose to begin a Christian life in the meetings conducted by Mr. John R. Mott, and many

others who have recently taken a similar stand in meetings led by Rev. R. A. Torrey, D.D. The end is not yet.

The attempt of the subtle Conservative party to exclude Christianity from the education of Japan has failed. The new educational code, backed by imperial rescript, had but a temporary triumph, and once more our schools are free to teach Christian truth. The latest news from Japan is almost the best of all. The native leaders in theological thought have come out clearly and strongly in a declaration of their loyalty to the Word of God as the only infallible rule of faith and practice, and to Jesus Christ as the Divine Son of God.

KOREA.—This land continues to be the most fruitful field of our missionary labors, so far as visible results are concerned. One thousand two hundred and sixty-three communicants were added to the Church during the year, almost one fourth of the total number in all our fields. Considerable advance has been made in the new educational work. The Korean king's failure to keep an agreement has postponed the erection of the new hospital, the gift of Mr. L. H. Severance, who has now added funds for the needed land. The Board is making considerable additions to the forces of the Mission, whose inadequacy may be judged from the fact that Pyeng Yang Station has 2944 church members, 3837 catechumens, 1580 of the latter new this year, has fifty-four counties to shepherd and evangelize, and but eight ordained missionaries to do it. Of ninety-two native helpers, all but six are supported by the people, who have, almost unaided, erected forty-six new churches this year, making 152 in all. The natives have contributed nearly \$4400 gold. The work is waiting to be done, but the workers are pitifully few.

INDIA.—In India the Christian population continues to far outstrip in growth the general population, having, within a decade, increased between eighteen and thirty-five per cent. in the different presidencies, as compared with a general increase of seven to fifteen per cent. There is no little consternation among the Hindus on this account. Our Missions have extended greatly the village work among the low-caste people, while also emphasizing, as of old, the Christian education of the higher castes. The Home Missions of the native Church are prospering. The funds provided by the generosity of sympathetic friends in America, and the perilous, self-sacrificing efforts of the missionaries during the times of famine and of plague, have given as wards to the Church about 1500 orphans, to be trained for Christian service, and have also contributed to the general work a tenderness and a power which have brought into the churches of the Western India Mission within the year more than twice the number of people baptized in the previous thirty years.

THE PHILIPPINES.—No Mission of the Church has received a more emphatic expression of Divine approval than that established

on the first anniversary of the great victory in Manila Bay. Though other Churches have entered the field, there is room for all, and one Evangelical Church has been established, the various Missions having divided the archipelago among themselves, in the interests of harmonious coöperation. This gives to our Church all of Southern Luzon, and one-half of the Visayan group. Our three stations of Manila, Iloilo and Dumaguete are insufficiently manned, but the results are beyond what could be expected with such forces. Already we have enrolled 352 communicants, 299 of them during the year, while hundreds more are requesting instruction and baptism. Our medical work here, as in all our fields, presents a magnificent evangelistic opportunity. The Philippines are in our hands for weal or woe; the character of American influence upon them will depend largely on the American Church. With our civilization goes much of evil. The Church should see to it that there goes *more* of good. An intelligent people, having found their light but darkness, are looking to us for the true light of life.

SIAM.—In Siam the old official friendliness continues. The King has paid a visit to our new station of Pitsanuloke, near the southern border of the Laos country, and expressed his approval of our work. Nakawn, on the Malay peninsula, gives good promise. New buildings are being erected for the Boys' School in Bangkok. All the schools and the hospitals of this Mission are largely self-supporting. The work of our Mission Press, the best in Bangkok, is much in demand. The impression made by this Mission cannot be estimated by the number of its converts.

NORTH LAOS.—To the churches of North Laos have been added 161 members. A vast amount of evangelistic itineration has been carried on by ministers, doctors and the women of the Mission. Much of the work is self-supporting. The missionaries have been cordially received in many Buddhist temples. Nan station reports an increase of sixty-five per cent. in the number of communicants.

PERSIA.—In Persia Russian influence has increased, but the political situation has not been greatly changed, and the people seem decidedly more favorably disposed toward Christianity. The Report says that "Rationalism, Babism, infidelity and a general confused ruin of religious things have increased the spirit of religious inquiry in the minds of thousands who were orthodox Mohammedans." The missionaries have had many interesting interviews with Mohammedan mullahs. Not a few Moslem boys are enrolled in the schools. Some improvement is noted in the Armenian Church.

SYRIA.—The reports from Syria for the year bring more of cheer and encouragement than those of other years. Larger accessions to the churches; a stronger spirit of inquiry; a greater eagerness for education even at considerable cost; a widespread spiritual uplift as the result of the Brummana Conference, presided

over by the Rev. F. B. Meyer; a clearer perception of the lines to be followed in an aggressive advance; the considerable growth and strong life of the Christian Endeavor Society; an increased disposition among the natives to assume the responsibility for evangelizing their own land—all these things give hope that one day all obstacles, Turkish, Greek and Roman, will give way before the march of a pure Christianity.

AFRICA.—Africa has suffered, as of old, the loss of faithful and efficient missionaries; but from those who labor on sounds forth the cry of heroic devotion: "Africa must be evangelized. She is dear to the heart of the Master, who is more eager for her redemption than even we are. Plead with the Churches in America as well as with the Lord of the Harvest, to send forth more laborers into this harvest." It is hard soil, but there are signs of showers of blessing. From several of the stations come reports of inquiry classes of several hundred members, who are ceasing to do evil and learning to do well, and of churches enlarged and re-enlarged only to be filled again to overflowing. The precious lives have not been given in vain.

SOUTH AND CENTRAL AMERICA.—In Brazil there is an increase of unpaid evangelistic effort on the part of the natives. Much itinerating has been done. Three hundred and fifty-three have been added to the churches. The year has been the most encouraging in the history of the two missions. The relations between the Synod of Brazil and the Mission have greatly improved and consequently those between Mackenzie College and the Theological School. The College has been greatly prospered financially. Candidates for the ministry are more numerous. Bible sales are increasing. In Chile the Instituto Ingles has become the best Boys' School on the coast. In Colombia the long-continued revolutionary conditions have prevented itineration, but the work of the schools has been vigorously prosecuted, the only hindrance being the opposition of the Governor at Barranquilla closing—it is hoped but temporarily—our successful boys' school. In Guatemala renewed hostility from the Romanists has been encountered, and little progress can be reported. In view of all conditions, your Committee feels that the next Secretarial visit should surely be made to the fields of South and Central America and West Africa.

MEXICO.—The most interesting event in the history of the Mexico Mission was the organization last July, in Mexico City, of the Independent Synod of Mexico, a union of our own work with that of the Southern Church. Dr. A. W. Halsey represented the Assembly and the Board. One missionary has spent 202 days in itinerating. The schools have continued to do good work, and the churches have steadily grown. Some of the members give from one-tenth to one-half of their income to Church support.

The work for the Chinese and Japanese in this country has

been somewhat enlarged, a China missionary, hindered from returning, having taken charge of the work in Southern California. A timely suggestion of the Board to the Senate helped to prevent the enacting of a more rigid Exclusion law.

The Missions in Japan, Korea, China, the Philippines, Siam, Laos, India and Syria, visited by Secretary A. J. Brown and Mrs. Brown, have written enthusiastically of the great pleasure received from the visits, and of the inestimable advantage to the work from their sympathetic interest and helpful counsel. The reports of these visits are of great interest, and will be of large permanent value.

The union of churches in Mexico just referred to, is but one of many movements of the kind by which the year has been marked. The Presbyterian Alliance in India has submitted to the Presbyteries a basis for the Union of all Presbyterian bodies in that country as "The Church of Christ in India (Presbyterian)." In China the first steps have been taken in the same direction. A Committee of Coöperation in Japan now binds together not only Presbyterians, but all Churches save the Greek, Roman and Episcopal. In Shantung, China, there is talk of union between American Presbyterians and English Baptists, while in Peking, Methodists, Congregationalists and Presbyterians propose a Union University, the Collegiate department to be with the Methodist and American Board Missions, the Medical with the London Mission, and the Theological with the Presbyterians. All these things are in line with the deliverances of the Assembly, and with the prayer of our Lord for His disciples.

Your Committee has carefully read the Minutes of the Board of Foreign Missions, and wishes to record its hearty approval of the judicial fairness, the careful sense of stewardship, the appreciative sympathy, and the large faith which are manifest in the decisions of the Board, covering, as they do, an almost infinite variety of matters, from the most trivial to the most vital. The record is kept in beautiful form, convenient for reference, and your Committee can take no exceptions to it of any kind. We are more than ever convinced that the officers and members of the Board are administering their great trust with a solemn sense of its importance, and of the need of devoted consecration to God, as partakers with the missionaries in the self-sacrificing but blessed work. The Secretaries have been indefatigable, not merely in the performance of the duties of the office, but in presenting the needs of the work, and its call for men and means, throughout the churches. In this work, especially in large regions not easily reached by the office staff, the Field Secretary, Dr. Thomas Marshall, has labored energetically and efficiently, his visit to the Synods of the Pacific coast having been particularly successful: while a vast number of addresses have been delivered by foreign missionaries nominally at home

on furlough, but unable to refuse the opportunities for presenting the great cause.

To the force upon the foreign field have been added forty-eight new missionaries, while ten have been called to their reward, some of them but recently appointed, others after long years of faithful service.

The Treasurer's Report has been so carefully prepared and minutely analyzed as to present the work most graphically and forcibly. The system of accounting is accurate and economical. We have been both cheered and depressed by the financial Report for the past year. Thankful indeed should we be that once more there is no debt resting on the Board and the Church. The receipts from the churches were \$357,438.80; from Women's Boards, \$336,551.47; from legacies, \$158,045.90; from Sabbath-schools and Young People's Societies, \$76,793.67, and from miscellaneous sources, \$114,749.16, which, with the income from investments, and receipts from the Mission field, amounting to \$42,762.74, make a grand total of \$1,086,341.74, as compared with \$969,180.07 last year, or a gain of \$117,161.67, enabling the Board to meet the increased obligations of the year, assure the speedy rebuilding of Peking and Paotingfu Stations, add a little to its Reserve Fund, as advised by the General Assembly, and report a balance of \$1,291.56. But, brethren of the Assembly, follow your Committee for a moment in an analysis of this glorious result, and the glory which we may be inclined to take to ourselves will fade away, and give place to confusion of face. Whence comes this gain? Is it from a Church quickened and inspired with missionary zeal? Is it from the Young People, awakened to a new sense of the power which God has given to them? Is it from individuals, who, unable themselves to go, have been led to send substitutes to these far-off lands, or who have preferred to give their large gifts outside of church offerings? We may as well face the shameful fact that, in this year of America's greatest financial prosperity, in which almost every Presbyterian has shared, in this year of the greatest spiritual prosperity the Church abroad has ever seen, in this year of aggressive advance, had it not been that the Lord has called home to Himself a larger number than usual of liberal-hearted Presbyterians, the Board of Foreign Missions must have reported to this Assembly a debt, and not a small one either. The gifts of the churches were less than last year by \$271.53, those of the Sabbath-schools and Y. P. Societies less by \$19,895.22, and those of individuals less by \$3841.34. The only gains are from the Women's Boards, \$56,471.91, at least half of which is excess in legacies, and from legacies direct, \$76,934.54. Those who are responsible for saving us from debt are the dead, not the living! For the Church to continue to pray for more money to carry on this work, and not increase her own contributions, is to commit the horrible impiety of praying

God to take home more of His servants, that the stinginess of the Assembly on earth may be atoned for by the generosity of the Assembly above, who have no further use for the money! We think with a shudder of the son who waits eagerly for his father's death that he may enjoy the estate; but it is not more dreadful than the position of the Church which looks to the decease of its members for the support of its work, while wasting its substance in luxurious, if not in riotous, living. Cause for thanksgiving to God and to the love which prompts these liberal and greatly to be desired bequests we have, but for self-congratulation none; and we hope that every Commissioner will return to his home determined that his church shall make this work no longer a work of the dead, but of the living, lest we deserve from the Lord that condemnation of the Church of Sardis which had a name that it lived, and was dead! All honor to our noble women, who have faithfully performed their labor of love; but where are the men?

Is the Presbyterian Church playing at Foreign Missions? Does she expect large prosperity in business enterprises through a similar policy? Men are eagerly pouring their millions together into great trusts for the gaining of other millions. They are building handsome churches to delight the eye and compete with others. They are endowing great universities and libraries, single individuals for these purposes giving ten times the total annual gifts of our Church for foreign missions, while the Church of a million members, by hook or crook, manages to squeeze out a million dollars for the salvation of a billion souls! We make a plaything out of that which God gave us for our business, while we make a business of the things which He intended should be our playthings!

And how does the pittance come? Gladly, joyfully? Alas, No! The giving is not week by week as God has prospered us; but at the end of the year, when the Board, growing desperate with the fear of a debt staring it in the face, is compelled to write tens of thousands of letters to pastors and elders, Synodical and Presbyterial Chairmen, and send forth its executive officers at their busiest time to organize conferences, and cry "Debt, Debt!" until the churches make up the deficit. The Church does not like this plan. Then why not change it for a better one? The Board has disseminated more literature, brief, graphic, spiey, hopeful, stimulating, than ever before, and has held more conferences with Presbyteries, churches and individuals. Let it not be true that the only result is the avoidance of a debt! Our Treasurer says that if the members of our churches should each give, in Church offerings, but two cents per week, or one dollar annually, instead of the present thirty-five cents, the Board's income would be increased \$650,000. If the members of our Sabbath-schools should give one cent per week, instead of one-tenth of one cent each, the income would

be increased by \$470,000. If one per cent. of our members should make a special gift, equal to the average given by miscellaneous givers this year, we should add \$1,250,000. Who will say that there is anything impossible or exceeding difficult in this? Yet it would add more than \$2,000,000 annually to the Board's income.

We are pleased to learn of a decided advance movement contemplated by the Board, and rendered possible by the generosity of two elders, Dr. J. H. Converse and Mr. E. A. K. Hackett, who take equal shares in an effort to stimulate in individuals and churches a larger interest in the work of missions. It is desired to engage Mr. David McConaughy to devote himself for at least three years to this work of education and inspiration, as it is believed to be possible speedily to double the Church's gifts for this work, and largely increase her forces, thus trebling or quadrupling the effectiveness of the work on the foreign field. This movement is connected with a fuller development of the whole work of the Home Department, that still more of the best literature may be sent out, more conferences may be held, the Synodical and Presbyterial Committees and their Chairmen may understand more clearly and perform more faithfully the important duties assigned to them, and the whole Church, with a more perfect mutual understanding, may work together with harmony and enthusiasm to see that the Gospel is speedily preached to every creature. It is hoped, moreover, that a Young People's Department may be formed, which shall lead the young people in Sabbath-schools and Societies to perceive and seize the opportunity and responsibility which are peculiarly theirs. It should not remain true that two-thirds of our schools still give nothing to this work of the Church. One of the most emphatic lessons of the inspiring Missionary Conference, May 14, planned and engineered largely by Dr. Marshall, was the demonstration of the possibility, and strong desirability, of teaching every child to study and love missions. It is from among these young people that the new missionaries are to come, and it is to increased efforts for them that we owe the glad fact that, though the number of theological students in the country has greatly decreased, we are sending forth in the new year more missionaries than last year or the year before.

With a profound sense of the goodness of God in so signally blessing the work of a Church which is only beginning to adequately appreciate its duty and its responsibility, your Committee would offer the following recommendations:

Resolved, 1. That the Minutes of the Board of Foreign Missions from May 1, 1901, to April 30, 1902, be approved.

Resolved, 2. That the election by the Board of the Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., as a member of the Board to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of the Rev. J. Wilbur Chapman, D.D., be confirmed.

Resolved, 3. That the following persons be elected to membership in the Board to constitute the Class of 1902-1905, viz., Revs. George Alexander, D.D., John F. Patterson, D.D., J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., and Messrs. Henry Ide, Warner Van Norden, D. W. McWilliams, and John T. Underwood.

Resolved, 4. That, with gratitude to those who have made it possible, we heartily approve of the plan of the Board to increase the effectiveness of its Home Department by more perfect organization, and by the employment of Mr. David McConaughy for the purpose of reaching with a personal appeal those who might themselves become missionaries, and those who might largely further the work of missions by the consecration of the means which have been given them. To the same end we would favor the establishment of a Young People's Department, would urge the Board to make even larger use of the best literature, in the form of leaflets, bulletins and regular reports, of the needs and successes of the field; and would urge the Church to buy and read the *Assembly Herald*, the women's and children's magazines and other missionary literature.

Resolved, 5. That we express again our profound sense of gratitude to the Women's Boards for the splendid results of their labors and the stimulus of their example.

Resolved, 6. That we recommend the holding of another Missionary Conference on the day preceding the next Assembly.

Resolved, 7. That we press upon the churches the putting forth of a more determined, organized effort to interest the *men* of the Church in this work, as we feel that the failure to give, from increased means, is due to the indifference or ignorance, rather than to a will to refuse the Lord's call.

Resolved, 8. That we again declare our conviction that systematic weekly or monthly gifts are the best form for the Church's beneficence; but urge that, whatever the plan, a part at least of the year's contributions be forwarded to the Board's Treasurer early in the year.

Resolved, 9. That we again expressly designate the Sunday before Christmas as a most appropriate time for special offerings in our Sabbath-schools, and Easter Sunday as a most fitting occasion for special gifts in churches and Sabbath-schools for this work, and urge these celebrations upon all our churches. We, moreover, earnestly hope that the day will soon come when each church will fully support its own school, and devote all the offerings of that school to the work of missions at home and abroad.

Resolved, 10. That we emphasize once more the large place in the work of educating and arousing the Church given to Presbyterial and Synodical Committees, and urge their Chairmen to magnify their ministry in this respect, by thorough canvasses and conferences, that every pastor may bring the subject before his people, and that every church and every member may be led to have some part in the work of taking Christ to the heathen world.

Resolved, 11. That we view with no little apprehension the readiness of Presbyterians to contribute to outside enterprises, often without sufficient inquiry as to the responsibility of their financial agents, while making insufficient provision for the work of our own Boards. Without restricting the liberty of any, we would urge that the guarantees offered by the known character of our own Boards, and the loyalty due to the Church which we love, should lead the members of our Church to provide first for our needy yet successful work.

Resolved, 12. That we recommend to the attention of the churches our own Foreign Missions Library, and the projected Interdenominational Bureau of Missions, soon to be equipped for the furnishing of missionary information of every kind.

Resolved, 13. That we express our hearty sympathy with the many movements in mission lands looking toward union or coöperation in evangelistic and educational work.

Resolved, 14. That we again recommend the raising of the Paotingfu Martyr Memorial Fund, as the most fitting monument to our beloved missionaries, who gave their lives that the Chinese might know the truth of the new life. The interest of this Fund, supporting the successors of those who fell, would water, care for and gather in the harvest sown in their blood.

Resolved, 15. That, as an expression of our faith in the Church's willingness to make the previous recommendations something more than mere paper and ink, we call upon the Church to contribute to the regular work of this Board, during the present year, not less than \$1,250,000, and a sufficient number of consecrated young men and women to make possible the great advance movement to which the Church is called.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures presented the following Report, which was adopted:

The Committee on Bills and Overtures report upon the "Annual Report of the Executive Commission of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches throughout the world holding the Presbyterian System," *Paper No. 55*, as follows:

1. We recommend that this General Assembly express its gratification at the far-reaching and valuable work of the Alliance in uniting the Presbyterian family of Churches throughout the world in a closer bond of sympathy, loyalty and service.

2. That so much of this Report as refers to the provision to be made for the apportionment of the expenses of the Alliance due from our body, be referred to this Assembly's Committee on Finance.

3. That so much of this Report as refers to the work of Home Missions in this country be referred to the Committee on Home Missions.

4. That in reply to the request printed in this Report, that a Committee be appointed by this Assembly, to be known as a Committee of Correspondence on work on the European Continent, such a Committee be appointed, to consist of three ministers and four elders.

5. That in anticipation of the meeting of the Eighth General Council of the Alliance in Liverpool, England, in the summer of 1904, the following persons be appointed, in pursuance of precedents in this matter, as delegates from this Church to that Council, and that they constitute a Committee to nominate the full list of representatives in that Council, to be reported to the General Assembly of 1903, viz.: The Moderator of this Assembly; the Stated Clerk, Rev. William Henry Roberts, D.D.; the Permanent Clerk, Rev. William B. Noble, D.D.; Rev. Henry Collin Minton, D.D., the retiring Moderator of this Assembly, with the Rev. David R. Kerr, D.D., the Rev. James D. Moffat, D.D., Gen. Ralph E. Prime, Hon. William M. Lanning and F. K. Hipple, LL.D.

6. That the Assembly cordially approve the suggestion conveyed in the Report of the Alliance, that the second Sabbath of September be observed as a Day of Prayer for Private and Public Schools, and for preaching on the general subject of Education.

The Assembly took recess, and was closed with prayer.

WEDNESDAY, May 21, 2.30 o'clock P.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer.

The Judicial Committee, through the Chairman, Rev. James D. Moffat, D.D., presented a Report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The Judicial Committee hereby reports to the Assembly upon the following papers referred to the Committee, together with our recommendations respecting their disposition:

Judicial Case No. 1, consisting of

1. An Appeal of the Session of the Presbyterian Church of the Covenant of Williamsport, Pa., from the action of the Synod of Pennsylvania, rendered at its meeting held October 19, 1901.

2. A Complaint of the pastor and elders of the Church of the Covenant of Williamsport, Pa., against the action of the Synod of Pennsylvania.

3. A Memorial of the pastor, elders and deacons of the Church of the Covenant of Williamsport, Pa., addressed to the General Assembly.

Having found the Appeal and Complaint in order, we recom-

mend the appointment of a Judicial Commission, to whom the case may be referred for trial and judgment, according to the forms prescribed in the Book of Discipline.

Inasmuch as the memorial does not appear in the records as a part of this case, we recommend that it be dismissed.

Judicial Case No. 2, consisting of

1. An Appeal of Rev. Edward T. Fleming from the judgment of the Synod of Illinois, rendered at its meeting held October 16 and 17, 1901, and

2. The Complaint of the Rev. Edward T. Fleming of the action of the Presbytery of Chicago, taken October 28 1901.

These papers being found in order, it is recommended that they be referred to a Judicial Commission for trial and judgment.

Judicial Case No. 3, being the Complaint of Rev. Dr. William N. Richie against the Synod of New Jersey.

It appears from the papers filed in this case that there is not sufficient reason for trial, and it is therefore recommended that the appeal be dismissed.

Judicial Case No. 4, being the Complaint of J. M. Ross and others against the action of the Synod of Missouri in taking exception to the Minutes of the Presbytery of Kansas City.

We find the Complaint in order, and recommend that it be referred to the Assembly's Committee on the Minutes of the Synod of Missouri.

The Standing Committee on Publication and Sabbath-school Work, through the Chairman, Rev. J. Frederick Dripps, D.D., presented its Report, together with a Supplementary Report, both of which were accepted, and after addresses by Rev. E. R. Craven, D.D., Secretary of the Board, and Rev. Eli M. Clark, were adopted. The Report is as follows:

The Standing Committee on Publication and Sabbath-school Work respectfully reports as follows:

The usual point of contact between this Board and the average church member is at the collection plate. To most of our people the work of this Board is known chiefly as one for which they are asked every year to contribute an offering.

It is therefore highly desirable that two facts concerning it should be kept clearly in mind. The first is, that every dollar which is contributed to it, at a church collection, may in a very true sense be represented as going directly into the missionary work for which it is meant, without any deduction for expenses of administration. The warrant for such a statement will be clear to any one who will look for himself at the Treasurer's Report. There it will be seen that, after deducting the special expenses of "Children's Day" and of "Rallying Day," which are abundantly repaid by the gifts secured on those days, all ex-

penses for salaries, for printing and postage and freight, are more than met by the large sum paid over to the Missionary work by the Business Department of the Board itself. That sum amounted last year to no less than \$24,174.51. Not a cent of the church collection, therefore, was needed for administration expenses of any kind. Some of our larger Boards are earnestly hoping for the time when they can make just such a statement to the churches, by having all their office expenses met from other sources, so as to leave all church collections free to go to the purpose for which they were given, without any deduction on the way. The churches ought to know that this end is already practically gained by this particular Board.

The other fact which needs to be kept in mind is, that the one and only object for which this Board asks contributions from the churches is its Sabbath-school Missionary work, *i e.*, the work of planting new Sabbath-schools in destitute regions. There are ninety-seven such missionaries now in the field, one of them in Cuba, and the rest in thirty-one different States and Territories, with 2134 schools under their care; on the Pacific Coast, in the Rocky Mountains, in the Northwest, Southwest and Central West, and in the South, not only among the Negroes, but among the mountaineers who are largely of Scotch-Irish stock. This is distinctly pioneer work, for these men are able to gather Sabbath-schools in places where the way is not yet open for the organizing of any church. They and their work are accepted without question, in fields where nothing churchly would be admitted. All the reverence which so justly attaches itself to the name "Missionary" belongs to these men; and none the less so because their mission is on behalf of the children. It is indeed on account of that very fact that they are given welcome where other Christian workers might be repelled; because even the hardest and roughest of men cannot bring themselves to refuse the offer of spiritual help for their children. Surely, then, we on our side should see to it that this offer is made; we, as followers of Christ, should see to it that these children are given the chance to come unto Him. What are ninety-seven missionaries among such myriads of children, spread over such vast reaches of mountain and prairie and sea-coast!

This work is done in harmony with that of other churches and of the great Union Societies; we do not need to feel that the whole responsibility is upon us alone. And yet, when all the workers of every name are counted up, what are these among so many! The tender appeal of childhood and the heroic associations of the missionary are combined here, in the work for which, and for which alone, this Board asks contributions from the churches. Surely we may beg of each pastor, that when he rises to present this cause before his people, he will set before them distinctly this one great object for which their gifts are asked, instead of drying up the fountains of benevolence by the

perfunctory statement that "a collection will now be made for the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work."

The Church has a mission for every lost child; and your gifts are to help men go on that mission. The true symbol of this work is the figure of the Good Shepherd, going after the lambs which are lost.

The spirit and aims of the Board are well expressed in the following sentences from this year's Report:

"In some parts of our field our missionaries are confronted by a heterogeneous population of mixed nationalities, often divided among multitudinous sects, but more frequently entirely destitute of religious privileges, and profoundly ignorant as to our own Church. In such regions the work has to be done, if at all, on broadly evangelical principles. Wherever practicable, the schools are placed under the fostering care of a Presbyterian church, and as a further step toward securing greater permanency our missionaries are required to furnish the department annually with a list of schools under their care, of churches in their particular fields developed during the year from schools planted at any time by our missionaries, and of buildings erected during the year in connection with such schools. In their efforts to gather children into Sabbath-schools the missionaries visit from house to house, distribute Christian literature, conduct religious services, start Home Departments and Young People's Societies, hold Bible Institutes, attend Sabbath-school conventions, establish preaching stations, and encourage the development of their schools into churches. They travel hundreds of miles every month, in all weathers, suffering many hardships, crossing mountain and prairie, among miners, lumbermen, ranchmen, toilers of every kind, with the open Bible in their hands and words of brotherly cheer on their lips, planting the deathless seed of Christian civilization. It is hardly conceivable that any instrumentality could be devised which can so effectively meet the spiritual needs of our outlying population as this great agency of Sabbath-school missions."

In all the other departments of its work, the Board asks for intelligent sympathy and coöperation, but not for contributions of money. One such department, which is also in charge of the Superintendent of Sabbath-school Work, relates to the training and improvement of schools already existing; and in this there has been marked advance during the past year.

The Editorial department has likewise had a most successful season. In the form of books and tracts, and especially of periodicals, weekly, monthly, quarterly, there has been an issue of more than forty-five million publications this year. Quality has not been sacrificed to quantity; the popularity of these publications is due to their attractiveness of form and manner, and above all, to their spirituality and solid worth. The intelligence of such a constituency as that which is found in the Presby-

terian Church, at once develops and is developed by this immense volume of religious literature. It is useless to call on our people to purchase any publication merely on the ground that it is issued by the Presbyterian Board, for they will buy only what they believe to be the best, and because it is the best. But if more of them can be induced to try whether the best may not be found here, in the issues of their own press, we should find the Board adding untold millions more to the issues sent forth year by year.

There is encouragement in the fact that there have already been printed 225,000 copies of the Hymnal, a book which has been recognized by experts of other Churches than our own as reaching "the high-water mark" of excellence in Hymnology. It leads the way among all the Churches in this matter. The only thing to be feared was, that it might be so far in advance of the usual hymn-book as to fail in receiving due recognition from church members at large, but this fear has happily been disappointed.

So far as the Business department is concerned, the General Assembly can well afford to congratulate the Church that so vast a work is performed, not only with such transparent honesty and fidelity, but with such efficiency and good judgment. It is a significant fact that the sales for the year in books and tracts were \$210,445.10, and for periodicals the further sum of \$278,096.88, making in all \$488,541.98. Bearing in mind the amount handled by the Missionary department, viz., \$175,749, we may have some conception of the scale upon which this Board carries on its operations. It can hardly be considered as one of the minor matters in our Church life.

The following recommendations are presented for adoption :

1. The Minute books of the Board have been carefully examined, and we recommend their approval as a clear and full statement of the Board's operations.

2. The term of office of the following named members of the Board ends with the present year, and it is recommended that they be reelected: *Ministers*—Thomas A. Hoyt, D.D., J. Stuart Dickson, William L. Ledwith, D.D., Frank Lukens; *Elders*—Samuel C. Perkins, LL.D., Hon. Robert N. Willson, Henry T. Shillingford, George Stevenson.

3. Two Overtures have been received by the Assembly from the Presbyteries of Allegheny and Pittsburgh, which have been referred to this Committee, urging the issue of religious literature in the Austro-Hungarian languages. It is recommended that the Board take this matter into favorable consideration, and as speedily as possible take such action as its wisdom may approve.

4. Two Overtures have been referred to this Committee, from the Presbyteries of Dayton and of Steubenville, asking the Board to issue, in connection with its Home Department, literature for the help of parents in the training of their children. It

is recommended that this matter also be referred to the Board, for its most careful consideration, and for such action as it may find to be wise and practicable.

5. Another Overture has been received from the Presbytery of Fort Dodge, asking the Board to issue a denominational reading course for the young people of our Church. It is recommended that as the Board reports itself to be already engaged in the preparation of such a course, its action be approved, and the matter be again called to its careful attention.

6. The Board in its Annual Report calls attention to the importance of clearing off all the remaining encumbrance upon the Witherspoon Building, and makes a special recommendation in the matter. This Committee recommends to the General Assembly :

That inasmuch as the entire net profits of this building are pledged to the benefit of the Missionary Department, the Assembly expresses its entire agreement with the Board as to the importance of paying off the mortgages which still encumber it; and commends this to the liberal givers in our Church, as a most worthy object for their gifts.

That in view of the urgent need for enlarging the missionary work, the Board will do wisely to continue for the present year its policy of applying to that purpose, from the business profits, in the same proportion as for the last year.

It is further recommended :

1. That all our Sabbath-schools be urged to observe Children's Day and the Rallying Day, and to send contributions to the Sabbath-school missionary work of the Board.

2. That all our pastors and Sessions be urged to bring this work before their churches, so as to secure a yearly contribution for it.

3. That churches and Sabbath-schools have their attention again called to the especial excellence of the Hymnals, the Sabbath-school periodicals and the other publications of the Board.

4. That the number of our Sabbath-school missionaries be increased as much as possible, and that they be commended to the prayerful interest of all our people.

Ellis, and a statement on behalf of the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work have been referred to this Committee, and having given careful consideration to the matter presented in these papers, the Committee recommends to the Assembly that no action be taken.

The venerable Rev. Theodore Cuyler, D.D., being present, was introduced and addressed the Assembly.

The Rev. Morgan A. Dix, D.D., Rector of Trinity Episcopal Church, was also introduced, and addressed the Assembly.

The Standing Committee on the Board of Aid for Colleges, through the Chairman, Rev. Wilton Merle Smith, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman, Rev. E. C. Ray, D.D., Secretary of the Board, and Rev. Herrick Johnson, D.D., President of the Board, was adopted. It is as follows :

The Standing Committee upon the Board of Aid for Colleges and Academies would respectfully report as follows :

This Committee has examined the records and Annual Report of this Board for the year ending April 1, 1902, and heartily commends them, and suggests that the Annual Report, with its startling array of facts, be read by every Commissioner in this Assembly.

The Report may be summarized as follows: \$212,000 has been raised and distributed. Of this amount \$44,000 have come from churches and organizations, \$162,000 from individuals, and \$6000 from legacies. The money which has come from individuals, and much from the churches has been designated for some particular institution by the givers, hence only \$32,000 of undesignated moneys has come into the hands of the Board. The distribution has been made as follows: \$24,000 has been given to twenty-two different colleges and academies toward their maintenance and support; \$37,000 of designated moneys has been given for the support of institutions named by the givers, and \$138,000 has been used for endowment or debts, or erection of buildings in institutions for which these special gifts were made. Most, if not all, of these special gifts would not have been made but for the existence of this Board. This, in brief, is the work of this Board.

There are many interesting facts connected with it which have greatly impressed your Committee :

1. The remarkable economy of management. The offices of both Treasurer and Secretary are combined, and the salary and expense account are but 3.5 per cent. upon the moneys raised, a record equaled by no other Board.

2. The work of the Secretary. The Secretary of this Board has been very successful in raising funds for many institutions which owe heavy debts of gratitude to the Board. He is indefatigable in his efforts to promote the interests of the Board, and to his untiring faithfulness and that of his predecessor, Dr. Ganse, is largely due the two and one-half millions of dollars which have gone during the last nineteen years into thirty-six

new schools and colleges founded, and seventy-eight institutions aided by this Board.

3. The sanctified common sense in the management of this Board. It is impossible to particularize in this brief Report other than to say, the gifts from this Board to institutions have been so wisely given that they have greatly multiplied themselves by stimulating other givers; oftentimes \$5000 has been given to an institution on condition that a fourfold amount should be raised by local friends. In this way the gifts of the Board have been seedlings of much larger gifts.

Then the Board has been, in the judgment of the Committee, exceedingly wise in preventing the injudicious planting of new institutions, in advising in regard to the sites of new colleges, in discouraging the founding of institutions without endowment, and in all instances forbidding the creation of debt. Also the rigid rules guaranteeing the scholarship of aided institutions are a model of wise and careful oversight.

Then again, each aided institution is bound to the Presbyterian Church by mortgages covering the gifts, and by inflexible rules necessitating Presbyterian control.

4. The fourth fact commending itself to your Committee is the spiritual result in the conversion of students in these institutions. Most fortunately for this work, its Secretary has been a lifelong enthusiastic believer in the teaching of the English Bible in all colleges and academies; there is probably more and better teaching of God's Word in these institutions under our Board than in any other institution in our land. The result is that out of 3000 students last year, there were 147 conversions and 133 candidates for the ministry. It is very rare indeed that a student ever graduates from one of these institutions who is not an out-and-out Christian.

5. The final fact which impresses your Committee is the utterly inadequate support given to this Board. The Assembly is very earnestly urged to examine the comparative statistics given in the Annual Report of the sums given by prominent denominations for education, particularly in the West. We have prided ourselves on being the one Church which gloried in education. These statistics show that our glory has departed. The briefest abstract can only be given here. Take institutions in the West, the endowment of Baptist institutions aggregates \$7,000,000; of Methodist institutions \$6,500,000; of Congregational institutions \$3,000,000, while Presbyterian endowments are only \$1,500,000. Again, the income of Baptist institutions in the West is over \$1,000,000; of Methodist institutions nearly \$1,000,000, while the combined income of Presbyterian institutions reaches only \$230,000.

This showing most forcibly exhibited on the back page of the Annual Report calls for sorrow and tears. Much of the endowments of Baptist and Methodist institutions has come from the

East, but Eastern Presbyterians have as yet done almost nothing for our Presbyterian institutions of the West.

Your Committee earnestly recommends :

1. That pastors be urged to observe Education Day, the Sunday nearest to the Day of Prayer for Colleges, for sermons on Christian Education, for enlightening the people upon the work of this Board, and for taking an offering for this Board. Last year only 3300 churches out of 7700 took an offering for this Board; 4400 churches, nearly 60 per cent., gave nothing whatever for this work.

2. That \$150,000 be asked from the churches for this important work.

3. That the work of endowment of these institutions be commended and be vigorously pushed.

4. That the plans of the Board for classification of institutions and its general methods of work be heartily approved.

5. That the resignation of Rev. D. S. Johnson, D.D., be accepted, and that Rev. Charles S. Hoyt, D.D., be elected to fill the vacancy.

That the Hon. James M. Rice be elected to fill the place of Alexander McDonald, whose reelection is impracticable because of his removal to the East. That Francis L. Ferguson, D.D., W. S. Plumer Bryan, D.D., John H. Boyd, D.D., and William R. Notman, D.D., with Elders Henry W. Johnson, John C. Grant, LL.D., and John F. Seeley, be reelected to the Board.

6. That the popular meeting in the interest of this Board be changed hereafter from the first Saturday evening to the first Sabbath evening of the Assembly's sessions.

The Standing Committee on Bills and Overtures presented a Report, which was adopted, and is as follows :

Overtures Nos. 41 and 42, from the Presbyteries of Binghamton and Rock River, as to the distribution of the *Minutes* and Reports. Answer.—Inasmuch as there is good reason to believe that every possible means is already employed to get the Reports of the Boards and the *Minutes* of the General Assembly into the hands of the pastors at an early date, it is recommended that no action be taken.

Overture No. 49, from the Presbytery of Cairo, on the St. Louis Fair and the Observance of the Lord's Day. In answer to this Overture, it is recommended that the following be adopted: The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., in line with its frequent utterances on this general subject, enters its solemn protest against the doing of work on the Lord's Day upon the grounds and buildings of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, in St. Louis, Mo.

Paper No. 70, from the National Reform Association, requesting that a special day of prayer be set apart for public and private schools. The Committee recommend that inasmuch as this request has been acted upon in connection with the Report of the Pan-Presbyterian Alliance, no further action is necessary.

McCandless, M.D., Rev. T. H. Candor, of Colombia, Rev. H. G. Underwood, D.D., of Korea, Rev. Arthur J. Brown, D.D., a Secretary of the Board, and others.

THURSDAY, May 22, 9 o'clock A.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

The Standing Committee on Education presented a Supple- mentary Report, which was adopted, and is as follows :

There has been referred to your Committee *Overture No. 46*, from the Presbytery of Grand Rapids, asking that this General Assembly transmit to the Presbyteries for their adoption an Overture as to certain changes in the administration of the Board of Education. Your Committee submits the following :

Whereas, The General Assembly of 1899 appointed a large and representative Committee to make a study of the whole matter of Ministerial Education; and

Whereas, This Committee made a report to the General Assembly of 1900, in which they presented a full discussion of the whole subject, and made recommendations as to changes which they deemed advisable; and

Whereas, Their recommendations were approved by the General Assembly, and certain of them transmitted to and adopted by the Presbyteries; it is therefore

Resolved, That this General Assembly regard it as unwise to take any further action in this matter at this time.

An invitation to visit the New York Juvenile Asylum was accepted with thanks. Also an invitation to visit the New York Public Library, and inspect an exhibition of the most celebrated editions of the Bible.

The following deputation was appointed to represent the Assembly at Princeton University: The officers of the Assembly, with Herrick Johnson, D.D., Henry C. Minton, D.D., J. D. Moffat, D.D., D. R. Kerr, D.D., and J. G. K. McClure, D.D.

The Committee on Psalmody presented a Report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Report of the Committee appointed by the General Assembly of 1895 to coöperate with Committees appointed by the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church and the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church respectively, and such other Committees as might be appointed by the Churches of the United States and Canada as are connected with the Alliance of the Reformed Churches, "for the purpose of securing a metrical version of the Book of Psalms which will be correct and elegant, and conform to the present canons of literary taste in the English tongues."

The Committee as originally appointed by the Assembly consisted of the Rev. Howard Duffield, D.D., of New York City, the Rev. E. R. Craven, D.D., of Philadelphia, and Ruling Elder George Junkin, Esq., of Philadelphia.

The Joint Committee held its first meeting in the rooms of the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work in Philadelphia, at which were present representatives from almost all the Reformed Churches of the United States and Canada connected with the Alliance of the Reformed Churches. The Rev. E. R. Craven, D.D., was elected Chairman of the Joint Committee, and has continued to hold that position until the present time.

The members of the Committee representing the Presbyterian Church who consented to act were the Rev. E. R. Craven, D.D., and Elder George Junkin. The Rev. Howard Duffield, D.D., declined to act because of pressing duties that would prevent regular attendance on the meetings, and his father, the Rev. John T. Duffield, D.D., of Princeton, N. J., consented to act in his place and rendered valuable service, until his lamented death last year. After his decease, the Rev. S. T. Lowrie, D.D., of Philadelphia, was appointed by the Assembly of 1901 to supply his place, and has continued in active and efficient service until the present time.

Ruling Elder George Junkin closed a distinguished and valuable service to the Church and State by being called to higher service a few weeks ago.

The meetings of the Joint Committee, which have been held twice a year, each lasting about ten days, have been largely attended and faithful work has been done at their sessions. These meetings have been held in several cities of the United States and Canada. The last meeting was held in the city of Allegheny, Pa., April 15-24, 1902. As the senior member of the Committee, Rev. E. R. Craven, D.D., Secretary of the Assembly's Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work, was then engaged in carrying the Report of the Board of which he is Secretary through the press, it was impossible for him to be present, and it gives him pleasure to present to the Assembly the Report presented to him by Dr. Lowrie. It also gives him pleasure to state that the proceedings of the last meeting, as reported by Dr. Lowrie, are a type of the proceedings of all the meetings since the appointment of the Joint Committee. It is with regret that the Chairman of the Assembly's Committee reports the resignation of Dr. Lowrie, for reasons connected with the condition of his health.

As the sole survivor of the Committee appointed by the Assembly of 1895, the undersigned presents the following recommendations:

1. That the resignation of Dr. Lowrie be accepted with thanks for services rendered.

2. That the special Committee of three, to coöperate with the special Committees of the Reformed Churches of the United States and Canada, be continued.

3. That the Assembly receives with great regret the announcement of the death of the distinguished and valuable Ruling Elder, George Junkin, Esq.

4. That the Stated Clerk of the Assembly and the Chairman of this Assembly's Committee of Coöperation be empowered to fill the places occasioned by the resignation of Dr. Lowrie and the death of Elder Junkin.

5. That the Stated Clerk be authorized to pay the traveling

and entertainment expenses of the members of the Committee for this Church.

The Stated Clerk presented a Report on the Binding and Distributing of the Reports of the Boards, which was accepted and approved. It is as follows:

The Stated Clerk respectfully reports to the General Assembly on the binding and distributing of the Annual Reports of the Boards as follows:

1. The Reports for the year 1901 were distributed in accordance with the directions of the General Assembly, and a statement of the expenses involved is herewith submitted, said statement having been duly audited by a public auditor and accountant, in accordance with the directions of the Assembly.

2. It is recommended that the Annual Reports of the Boards for the year 1902 be printed and distributed as heretofore, under the direction of the Stated Clerk, the expenses to be borne by the several Boards in proportion to the space occupied by each Report in the bound volume.

3. It is recommended that the Boards be requested and urged to transmit their Reports to the Stated Clerk on or before June 21, 1902. Unless this be done, the Reports cannot be distributed prior to August 1.

The Order of the Day, the Report of the Special Committee on the Revision of the Confession of Faith, was taken up. The privileges of the floor were extended to members of the Committee who are not Commissioners. Speeches, except that of the Chairman of the Committee, were limited to ten minutes. The following resolutions were adopted, with two dissenting votes:

Resolved, 1. That so much of the Report as relates to the eleven Overtures be adopted, with a view to the sending of the Overtures to the Presbyteries in due form.

Resolved, 2. That the Brief Statement be adopted and printed with the approval of the Assembly, for use in the Church, to instruct the people and to give a better understanding of our doctrinal beliefs.

The Report was then adopted as a whole, and is as follows:

The Special Committee on the Revision of the Confession of Faith respectfully presents the following Report:

This Committee was appointed in pursuance of the action of the General Assembly of 1901 (see *Minutes*, p. 106), which action was embodied in the following recommendations:

“A. In view of these facts we recommend that a Committee, as provided for by the Form of Government, Chapter XXIII, Section 3, be appointed by this Assembly.

“*B.* We recommend that this Committee be instructed to prepare and to submit to the next General Assembly, for such disposition as may be judged to be wise, a brief statement of the Reformed Faith, expressed as far as possible in untechnical terms. The said statement is to be prepared with a view to its being employed to give information and a better understanding of our doctrinal beliefs, and not with a view to its becoming a substitute for, or an alternative of, our Confession of Faith.

“*C.* We further recommend that this Committee be instructed to prepare amendments of Chapter III; Chapter X, Section 3; Chapter XVI, Section 7; Chapter XXII, Section 3; and Chapter XXV, Section 6, of our Confession of Faith, either by modification of the text or by Declaratory Statement, but so far as possible by Declaratory Statement, so as more clearly to express the mind of the Church, with additional statements concerning the love of God for all men, Missions and the Holy Spirit. It being understood that the revision shall in no way impair the integrity of the system of doctrine set forth in our Confession and taught in the Holy Scripture.”

The Assembly also directed that this Committee should be composed of twenty-one persons, and itself named the following persons as members of it, viz.: *Ministers*—Charles A. Dickey, D.D., Herrick Johnson, D.D., Samuel J. Niccolls, D.D., Daniel W. Fisher, D.D., William McKibbin, D.D., George B. Stewart, D.D., Samuel P. Sprecher, D.D., Henry Van Dyke, D.D.; *Ruling Elders*—Justice John M. Harlan, Daniel R. Noyes, E. W. C. Humphrey, William R. Crabbe, John E. Parsons and Elisha A. Fraser; together with Henry Collin Minton, D.D., the Moderator of the Assembly, whom it designated as Chairman of the Committee. The Moderator was empowered to appoint the remaining six members of the Committee, and accordingly the following persons were named, viz.: John DeWitt, D.D., J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., D. W. Moffat, D.D., S. B. McCormick, D.D.; *Ruling Elders*—John W. Foster and Charles T. Thompson.

The Committee has held five meetings, as follows: In Pittsburg, June 18, 1901, where it was in session one day; in Saratoga, August 28, 1901, where it remained in session for three days; in Washington, D. C., December 4, 1901, ten days; in Philadelphia, Pa., February 5, 1902, eight days; and in Washington, D. C., April 9, 1902, eight days.

The Committee has taken the utmost care that all its work, in substance and in form, should be within the scope of the instructions of the Assembly appointing it. In analyzing these instructions it at once found that the work assigned it was twofold; in the first place, it was to prepare “a brief statement of the Reformed Faith,” to be submitted to this Assembly, “for such disposition as may be judged to be wise.” The other part of its work was the preparation and submission to this Assembly of certain revisions of the Confession of Faith, in certain speci-

fied parts of it, and concerning certain specified subjects, by the method of textual modification or of Declaratory Statement, or of additional statements, undoubtedly with a view to their subsequent adoption or rejection by the Presbyteries and by the General Assembly, by Constitutional process and in due form, as provided for in the Form of Government, Chapter XXIII, Section 4.

In addressing itself to this second part of its work, the Committee has not been unmindful that its instructions gave distinct preference to the method of declaratory statement; however, the Committee was constrained to believe that it had some discretion in this matter, first because the very language of its instructions left the question an open one for the Committee; and secondly, because of the qualifying clause "so as more clearly to express the mind of the Church." Accordingly, it will be seen that this part of our Report includes all the methods named. We recommend "Additional statements concerning the love of God for all men, Missions and the Holy Spirit," in the form of new chapters to be added to the Confession; we recommend a Declaratory Statement in reference to Chapter III and Chapter X, Section 3; and we recommend textual modifications in Chapter XVI, Section 7; Chapter XXII, Section 3, and Chapter XXV, Section 6.

It is improper to argue now in support of the decision at which the Committee arrived in this particular matter. It is enough to say that after prolonged and serious consideration, in comparison of the different methods proposed, the Committee was persuaded that the method agreed upon would most satisfactorily accomplish the end designed, and at the same time would most nearly meet the mind of the whole Church.

I. The Committee, therefore, recommends that the General Assembly transmit to the Presbyteries for their action, under the Form of Government, present Chapter XXIII, Section 4, the following Overtures, viz.:

Overture No. 1.—Shall the following Preamble to a Declaratory Statement be adopted, viz.?

DECLARATORY STATEMENT.

While the ordination vow of ministers, ruling elders and deacons, as set forth in the Form of Government, requires the reception and adoption of the Confession of Faith only as containing the System of Doctrine taught in the Holy Scriptures, nevertheless, seeing that the desire has been formally expressed for a disavowal by the Church of certain inferences drawn from statements in the Confession of Faith, and also for a declaration of certain aspects of revealed truth which appear at the present time to call for more explicit statement, therefore the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America does authoritatively declare as follows:

Overture No. 2.—Shall the following Declaratory Statement be adopted as to Chapter III of the Confession of Faith :

First, With reference to Chapter III of the Confession of Faith : that concerning those who are saved in Christ, the doctrine of God's eternal decree is held in harmony with the doctrine of His love to all mankind, His gift of His Son to be the propitiation for the sins of the whole world, and His readiness to bestow His saving grace on all who seek it. That concerning those who perish, the doctrine of God's eternal decree is held in harmony with the doctrine that God desires not the death of any sinner, but has provided in Christ a salvation sufficient for all, adapted to all and freely offered in the Gospel to all ; that men are fully responsible for their treatment of God's gracious offer ; that His decree hinders no man from accepting that offer ; and that no man is condemned except on the ground of his sin.

Overture No. 3.—Shall the following Declaratory Statement be adopted as to Chapter X, Section 3, of the Confession of Faith :

Second, With reference to Chapter X, Section 3, of the Confession of Faith, that it is not to be regarded as teaching that any who die in infancy are lost. We believe that all dying in infancy are included in the election of grace, and are regenerated and saved by Christ through the Spirit, who works when and where and how He pleases.

Overture No. 4.—Shall footnotes be appended to Chapter III and Chapter X, Section 3, of the Confession of Faith, reading " See Declaratory Statement."

Overture No. 5.—Shall Section 7, Chapter XVI, of the Confession of Faith be changed so as to read—

VII. Works done by unregenerate men, although for the matter of them they may be things which God commands, and in themselves praiseworthy and useful, and although the neglect of such things is sinful and displeasing unto God ; yet because they proceed not from a heart purified by faith, nor are done in a right manner, according to His Word, nor to a right end, the glory of God ; they come short of what God requires and do not make any man meet to receive the grace of God.

Overture No. 6.—Shall the last clause in Section 3, Chapter XXII, of the Confession of Faith, which reads as follows, be stricken out :

" Yet it is a sin to refuse an oath touching anything that is good and just, being imposed by lawful authority."

Overture No. 7.—Shall the following Section be substituted for Section 6, Chapter XXV, of the Confession of Faith, viz.:

VI. The Lord Jesus Christ is the only head of the Church, and the claim of any man to be the vicar of Christ and the head of the Church, is unscriptural, without warrant in fact, and is a usurpation dishonoring to the Lord Jesus Christ.

Overture No. 8.—Shall the following Preamble be adopted, viz.?

Whereas, It is desirable to express more fully the doctrine of the Church concerning the Holy Spirit, Missions, and the Love of God for all men, the following chapters are added to the Confession of Faith.

Overture No. 9.—Shall a chapter be added to the Confession of Faith, to be numbered Chapter XXXIV, and entitled “Of the Holy Spirit,” as follows :

CHAPTER XXXIV. OF THE HOLY SPIRIT.

I. The Holy Spirit, the third person in the Trinity, proceeding from the Father and the Son, of the same substance and equal in power and glory, is, together with the Father and the Son, to be believed in, loved, obeyed, and worshiped throughout all ages.

II. He is the Lord and Giver of life, everywhere present in nature, and is the source of all good thoughts, pure desires, and holy counsels in men. By Him the Prophets were moved to speak the Word of God, and all writers of the Holy Scriptures inspired to record infallibly the mind and will of God. The dispensation of the Gospel is especially committed to Him. He prepares the way for it, accompanies it with His persuasive power, and urges its message upon the reason and conscience of men, so that they who reject its merciful offer are not only without excuse, but are also guilty of resisting the Holy Spirit.

III. The Holy Spirit, whom the Father is ever willing to give to all who ask Him, is the only efficient agent in the application of redemption. He convicts men of sin, moves them to repentance, regenerates them by His grace, and persuades and enables them to embrace Jesus Christ by faith. He unites all believers to Christ, dwells in them as their Comforter and Sanctifier, gives to them the Spirit of Adoption and Prayer, and performs all those gracious offices by which they are sanctified and sealed unto the day of redemption.

IV. By the indwelling of the Holy Spirit all believers being vitally united to Christ, who is the Head, are thus united one to another in the Church, which is His body. He calls and anoints ministers for their holy office, qualifies all other officers in the Church for their special work, and imparts various gifts and graces to its members. He gives efficacy to the Word, and to the ordinances of the Gospel. By Him the Church will be preserved, increased until it shall cover the earth, purified, and at last made perfectly holy in the presence of God.

Overture No. 10.—Shall a chapter be added to the Confession of Faith, to be numbered Chapter XXXV, and entitled “Of the Love of God and Missions,” as follows :

CHAPTER XXXV. OF THE LOVE OF GOD AND MISSIONS.

I. God, in infinite and perfect love, having provided in the covenant of grace, through the mediation and sacrifice of the Lord Jesus Christ, a way of life and salvation, sufficient for and adapted to the whole lost race of man, doth freely offer this salvation to all men in the Gospel.

II. In the Gospel God declares His love for the world and His desire that all men should be saved, reveals fully and clearly the only way of salvation; promises eternal life to all who truly repent and believe in Christ; invites and commands all to embrace the offered mercy; and by His Spirit accompanying the Word pleads with men to accept His gracious invitation.

III. It is the duty and privilege of every one who hears the Gospel immediately to accept its merciful provisions; and they who continue in impenitence and unbelief incur aggravated guilt and perish by their own fault.

IV. Since there is no other way of salvation than that revealed in the Gospel, and since in the divinely established and ordinary method of grace faith cometh by hearing the Word of God, Christ hath commissioned His Church to go into all the world and to make disciples of all nations. All believers are, therefore, under obligation to sustain the ordinances of religion where they are already established, and to contribute by their prayers, gifts and personal efforts to the extension of the kingdom of Christ throughout the whole earth.

Overture No. 11.—Shall any change in the numbers appearing in the Declaratory Statement, in the numbering of the new chapters, and in the wording of the Preamble proposed in *Overture No. 8*, made necessary by the adoption of any or some of the above Overtures, be committed to the Chairman of the Revision Committee, under the direction of the General Assembly :

II. Concerning the Brief Statement of the Reformed Faith which the Committee was directed to prepare and to submit to this Assembly, we beg to say that this has been by far the most difficult task assigned to us, and that it has occupied the greater part of the thirty days in which the Committee has been actually in session. The Assembly's instructions were explicit, and yet they left room for difference of view. Apart from the direction that it should be “brief” and “expressed as far as possible in untechnical terms,” the Committee was given to understand the kind of statement required, only by the Assembly's instructions that it was “to be prepared with a view to its being employed to give information and a better understanding of our doctrinal beliefs, and not with a view to its becoming a substitute for, or

an alternative of, our Confession of Faith." These instructions are both positive and negative.

The Committee's understanding of the work thus enjoined upon it found expression in the following resolution which appears in its records, namely:

"*Resolved*, That it is the sense of this Committee that the Brief Statement of the Reformed Faith which the Assembly has ordered us to prepare, should be made with the view to inform and enlighten the people in regard to the significance and religious meaning of the Reformed Faith and not with the view of becoming a test of orthodoxy for ministers, elders and deacons."

The conception of the design of the statement to be prepared, as thus presented, has influenced our action, and, as far as it could be so, controlled our conclusions. In this work few precedents were within reach. We were not to prepare a new Confession of Faith, or merely a condensed compendium of our doctrine, or a new standard of orthodoxy; much less a standard of new orthodoxy. The enjoined brevity made necessary the delicate task of selection. We could not include in such a statement everything we hold to be true, nor, on the other hand, could we confine ourselves to doctrines distinctively our own. Indeed, many of our most fundamental and vital doctrines we hold in common with the whole evangelical Church; and, moreover, what is peculiar to our own faith is susceptible neither of being stated nor of being known except in the light of what we thus hold in common with other communions. Nor could we forget that the intellect is not the only organ of religious perception and knowledge. We must avoid reduplicating in principle, even though it be in reduced compass, what we unquestionably already have. The three confessional formulæ which we have received from the past, and which we hold in veneration, address themselves, primarily and predominantly, to the logical faculty, and in a way that is preëminently successful; certainly, then, it was not simply another symbol framed on the same organizing principles and destined to be inferior to them, both in precision of statement and in systematic excellence, which the Assembly had in mind, or which the present condition of the Church calls for.

Accordingly we have endeavored to introduce in some degree into our work a different principle of expression and so to bring out more plainly the evangelical aspects of our faith. We have aimed to connect truth with life, and to give to our doctrinal elements a personal reference. We have tried to make the Statement not intellectual only, but also devotional in its conception and form. We would not have it first of all theological, although we have constantly endeavored to preserve intact the substance of the truth as we hold it. There has been neither desire nor disposition to disobey the Assembly's injunction, that we should "in no way impair the integrity of the system of

doctrine set forth in our Confession and taught in the Holy Scripture.”

The Committee presents this Statement to the Assembly and to the Church, acknowledging that it has found it easier to exercise the critical than the constructive faculty in dealing with confessional literature. It is probably true that the result of our work pleases no member of the Committee exactly; and it would be presumption to hope that any one else should be entirely and in every particular satisfied. Every member of the Committee surrendered to the others, not principles, but preferences. Otherwise, the Assembly would receive twenty-one different statements of our doctrine instead of one. If we had had more time we could, doubtless, have produced a more satisfactory result, but we were resolved, if possible, to obey our instructions, both in the letter and in the spirit. We do not affirm that there are no imperfections in this statement; we are confident only in the consciousness that our purpose has been one of loyalty to our divine Lord and to our beloved Church, and our prayer is that, whatever may be the outcome of our labors, the truth of God to which our Church is called to testify shall ever be held in grateful allegiance and in loving reverence. The Committee has the honor to submit, “for such disposition as may be judged to be wise,” the following as a

BRIEF STATEMENT OF THE REFORMED FAITH.

ARTICLE I. OF GOD.

We believe in the ever-living God, who is a Spirit and the Father of our spirits; infinite, eternal, and unchangeable in His being and perfections; the Lord Almighty, most just in all His ways, most glorious in holiness, unsearchable in wisdom and plenteous in mercy, full of love and compassion, and abundant in goodness and truth. We worship Him, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, three persons in one Godhead, one in substance and equal in power and glory.

ARTICLE II. OF REVELATION.

We believe that God is revealed in nature, in history, and in the heart of man; that He has made gracious and clearer revelations of Himself to Men of God who spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit; and that Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, is the brightness of the Father's glory and the express image of His person. We gratefully receive the Holy Scriptures, given by inspiration, to be the faithful record of God's gracious revelations and the sure witness to Christ, as the Word of God, the only infallible rule of faith and life.

ARTICLE III. OF THE ETERNAL PURPOSE.

We believe that the eternal, wise, holy, and loving purpose of God embraces all events, so that while the freedom of man is

not taken away nor is God the author of sin, yet in His providence He makes all things work together in the fulfillment of His sovereign design and the manifestation of His glory; wherefore, humbly acknowledging the mystery of this truth, we trust in His protecting care and set our hearts to do His will.

ARTICLE IV. OF THE CREATION.

We believe that God is the creator, upholder, and governor of all things; that He is above all His works and in them all; and that He made man in His own image, meet for fellowship with Him, free and able to choose between good and evil, and forever responsible to his Maker and Lord.

ARTICLE V. OF THE SIN OF MAN.

We believe that our first parents, being tempted, chose evil, and so fell away from God and came under the power of sin, the penalty of which is eternal death; and we confess that, by reason of this disobedience, we and all men are born with a sinful nature, that we have broken God's law, and that no man can be saved but by His grace.

ARTICLE VI. OF THE GRACE OF GOD.

We believe that God, out of His great love for the world, has given His only begotten Son to be the Saviour of sinners, and in the Gospel freely offers His all-sufficient salvation to all men. And we praise Him for the unspeakable grace wherein He has provided a way of eternal life for all mankind.

ARTICLE VII. OF ELECTION.

We believe that God, from the beginning, in His own good pleasure, gave to His Son a people, an innumerable multitude, chosen in Christ unto holiness, service, and salvation; we believe that all who come to years of discretion can receive this salvation only through faith and repentance; and we believe that all who die in infancy, and all others given by the Father to the Son who are beyond the reach of the outward means of grace, are regenerated and saved by Christ through the Spirit, who works when and where and how He pleases.

ARTICLE VIII. OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST.

We believe in and confess the Lord Jesus Christ, the only Mediator between God and man, who being the Eternal Son of God, for us men and for our salvation became truly man, being conceived by the Holy Ghost and born of the Virgin Mary, without sin; unto us He has revealed the Father, by His Word and

Spirit making known the perfect will of God; for us He fulfilled all righteousness and satisfied eternal justice, offering Himself a perfect sacrifice upon the cross to take away the sin of the world; for us He rose from the dead and ascended into heaven, where He ever intercedes for us; in our hearts, joined to Him by faith, He abides forever as the indwelling Christ; over us, and over all for us, He rules: wherefore, unto Him we render love, obedience, and adoration as our Prophet, Priest, and King forever.

ARTICLE IX. OF FAITH AND REPENTANCE.

We believe that God pardons our sins and accepts us as righteous solely on the ground of the perfect obedience and sacrifice of Christ received by faith alone; and that this saving faith is always accompanied by repentance, wherein we confess and forsake our sins with full purpose of, and endeavor after, a new obedience to God.

ARTICLE X. OF THE HOLY SPIRIT.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and Giver of Life, who moves everywhere upon the hearts of men, to restrain them from evil and to incite them unto good, and whom the Father is ever willing to give unto all who ask Him. We believe that He has spoken by holy men of God in making known His truth to men for their salvation; that, through our exalted Saviour, He was sent forth in power to convict the world of sin, to enlighten men's minds in the knowledge of Christ, and to persuade and enable them to obey the call of the Gospel; and that He abides with the Church, dwelling in every believer as the spirit of truth, of holiness, and of comfort.

ARTICLE XI. OF THE NEW BIRTH AND THE NEW LIFE.

We believe that the Holy Spirit only is the author and source of the new birth; we rejoice in the new life, wherein He is given unto us as the seal of sonship in Christ, and keeps loving fellowship with us, helps us in our infirmities, purges us from our faults, and ever continues His transforming work in us until we are perfected in the likeness of Christ, in the glory of the life to come.

ARTICLE XII. OF THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE TO COME.

We believe that in the life to come the spirits of the just, at death made free from sin, enjoy immediate communion with God and the vision of His glory; and we confidently look for the general resurrection in the last day, when the bodies of those who sleep in Christ shall be fashioned in the likeness of the

glorious body of their Lord, with whom they shall live and reign forever.

ARTICLE XIII. OF THE LAW OF GOD.

We believe that the law of God, revealed in the Ten Commandments, and more clearly disclosed in the words of Christ, is forever established in truth and equity, so that no human work shall abide except it be built on this foundation. We believe that God requires of every man to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with his God; and that only through this harmony with the will of God shall be fulfilled that brotherhood of man wherein the kingdom of God is to be made manifest.

ARTICLE XIV. OF THE CHURCH AND THE SACRAMENTS.

We believe in the Holy Catholic Church of which Christ is the only Head. We believe that the Church Invisible consists of all the redeemed, and that the Church Visible embraces all who profess the true religion together with their children. We receive to our communion all who confess and obey Christ as their divine Lord and Saviour, and we hold fellowship with all believers in Him.

We receive the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, alone divinely established and committed to the Church, together with the Word, as means of grace; made effectual only by the Holy Spirit, and always to be used by Christians with prayer and praise to God.

ARTICLE XV. OF THE LAST JUDGMENT.

We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ will come again in glorious majesty to judge the world and to make a final separation between the righteous and the wicked. The wicked shall receive the eternal award of their sins, and the Lord will manifest the glory of His mercy in the salvation of His people and their entrance upon the full enjoyment of eternal life.

ARTICLE XVI. OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND THE FINAL TRIUMPH.

We believe that it is our duty, as servants and friends of Christ, to do good unto all men, to maintain the public and private worship of God, to hallow the Lord's Day, to preserve the sanctity of the family, to uphold the just authority of the State, and so to live in all honesty, purity, and charity, that our lives shall testify of Christ. We joyfully receive the word of Christ, bidding His people go into all the world and make disciples of all nations, and declare unto them that God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself, and that He will have all men to be

saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. We confidently trust that by His power and grace, all His enemies and ours shall be finally overcome, and the kingdoms of this world shall be made the kingdom of our God and of His Christ. In this faith we abide; in this service we labor; and in this hope we pray,

Even so, come, Lord Jesus.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

*In signing the Report of the Assembly's Committee on Revision, I except as follows: (1) I am opposed to the verbal amendment of the seventh section of Chapter XVI of the Confession. (2) I think it unwise to erect into a Church doctrine our belief that all who die in infancy are saved. (3) I do not think that the second sentence of Article X of "the brief and untechnical statement" (the article entitled "Of the Holy Spirit") accurately states the "Reformed faith."

† After signing this Report on April 19, 1902, Dr. Stevenson forwarded to the Moderator of the General Assembly his formal resignation as a member of this Committee. In doing so, he stated as his reason his anticipated transfer of membership from the Synod of Missouri to the Synod of New York, which latter Synod already had its full representation on the Committee under the provision of the Form of Government, Chapter XXIII, Section 3. He desired that no question of constitutionality should be raised on account of this change.

Upon completion of the consideration of the subject of Revision the Assembly spent a season in thanksgiving and prayer. Rev. Herrick Johnson, D.D., and Rev. Charles A. Dickey, D.D., led in prayer, the Moderator read the 133d and 134th Psalms, the congregation sang the 100th Psalm, and Rev. R. R. Booth, D.D., closed the exercises with prayer for the Church Universal, and the benediction.

The following Orders of the Day for to-morrow afternoon were transferred to this afternoon, viz.: Reports of the Special Committees on the Presbyterian Building, Vacancy and Supply, and Temperance.

The Assembly took recess until 2.30 o'clock P.M.

THURSDAY, May 22, 2.30 o'clock P.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer.

Upon application of the Stated Clerk, the Board of Publication was authorized to print the brief statement adopted this morning, and to entitle it "A Brief Statement of the Reformed Faith, for the better understanding of our Doctrinal Beliefs."

The Standing Committee on Temperance, through the Chairman, Rev. D. Stuart Dodge, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman, by Rev. T. B. Anderson, D.D., of the Permanent Committee, and Rev. Joseph Howell, was amended and adopted. The Report is as follows:

Your Standing Committee on Temperance respectfully submit the following Report:

That we have examined the Minutes of the Permanent Committee on Temperance, and recommend their approval. That these Minutes together with the Twenty-first Annual Report of the Committee, also placed in our hands, evince a most earnest and commendable diligence and zeal on their part.

We note with gratitude to God some recent successes for temperance, in the bringing about of which your Permanent Committee has had no small part:

1. The passing and enforcement of the Anti-Canteen Law.
2. The passage of the Lodge-Gillett Bill, for which the venerable missionary, Dr. Paton, has so long pleaded.
3. The present interest of the National Legislature in measures which favor the reform, notably: (a) The bill to prohibit the sale of liquor in the Old Soldiers' Homes; (b) The bill to prohibit the sale of liquor in the United States Government Buildings; (c) The bill to prohibit the sale of liquors at United States Immigrant Stations.
4. The fact that more and more the weight of your Permanent Committee is being felt, as the representative of our Church, wherever measures affecting the liquor traffic are before legislative bodies of the States or Nation.
5. The passage of the Scientific Temperance Instruction Law in Georgia, the last of the States to adopt this measure, thus

completing the list of States teaching temperance in the public schools.

6. A revival in some sections of the practice of pledge signing in the Sabbath-schools.

We heartily commend the action of railroad, street car and other corporations in demanding total abstinence as a qualification for employees, in whose duties the safety of human life is involved.

We view with pleasure the action of many of the fraternal orders of our land in excluding from membership all persons connected, directly or indirectly, with the liquor traffic. Notwithstanding the fact of these encouragements, there is a dark side to the outlook.

Never in the history of temperance work has the liquor power been so thoroughly organized, and so strongly entrenched. Instead of neglecting, the liquor power now advances and seeks to crush the temperance movement. This is illustrated by the recent conference of distillers and wholesale liquor dealers at Louisville, Ky., to reorganize the National Protective Association, which spent vast sums in buying up newspapers and defeating prohibition in the State Amendment campaigns of 1886, 1887 and 1889.

One of its own members thus states the aim of the organization: "At present a Prohibition movement is sweeping over the Southwest, and liquor interests are being hurt. In Michigan, Maine and Kansas, Prohibition is also strong. We want to show these people with speakers and literature that in passing Prohibition measures, they only reduce their revenue and do not benefit their States. In order to convince them that this is a fact, we will employ statisticians to complete figures in support of our statements. The work will require much money and persistent efforts; that the liquor men are united in the movement and will accomplish our object just as the old association did."

Again, the attention of your Committee has been called to the serious fact that a movement has been inaugurated to eliminate the Quarterly Temperance Lesson from our Sabbath-school course of study. We feel deeply that this Assembly should express itself emphatically against any such movement. While these lessons may not be all that could be desired, they are immeasurably better than any system which might leave it to the individual teacher or school to teach or not to teach temperance.

We beg to call the attention of the Church to the following deliverances of the General Assemblies of 1871 and 1877:

1871.—"The manufacture, sale and use of alcoholic stimulants as a beverage, in the belief of the General Assembly, is contrary to the spirit of God's Word, and wholly inconsistent with the claims of Christian duty. Those who knowingly rent their

premises for the traffic, or endorse licenses which legalize it, are reprehensible as accomplices in the guilt of the same."

1877.—"The Sessions of the churches are called upon to guard carefully the purity of the Church by refusing to admit to membership or to retain those within her pale who are engaged in the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, or who derive their livelihood from this sinful traffic."

Again, the attention of your Committee has been called to the inability of the Permanent Committee, owing to its lack of funds, to supply the growing demands for our denominational literature on the subject.

The lack of unity throughout the churches of our Communion with regard to this reform is, to say the least, not encouraging. There can be no doubt that, if it was a question of saloon or no saloon, our Church would have a quick answer. The great need is that the Church should make this plain, and by every means in our power we shall seek the overthrow of this destructive monster which stalks through our land. What are the churches doing? One notable fact is that the churches do not adequately support their Permanent Committee. This has rightly been called "our neglected agency." Your Committee does not believe that the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. is without strong sentiment on the temperance question, and yet the facts are that, having appointed a Permanent Committee to represent it in this matter, the Church has largely left its agency a financial cripple in the face of a financial Goliath.

We call attention to some figures: Last year our great Church gave \$1611 for the carrying on of its own temperance work. This was an increase of \$160 over the previous year, and was given by twenty-four of our thirty-two Synods. But of these twenty-four Synods, ten were represented by just one Presbytery in each, and often by only one church in that Presbytery. Three were represented by two Presbyteries in each, four by three Presbyteries in each, one by four Presbyteries, and eight by five or more Presbyteries in each. Turning to our 232 Presbyteries, only ninety-eight of them have one or more churches financially interested in Presbyterian temperance, while 135 Presbyteries take no interest in our work for this reform. Look carefully at our roll—look even at the churches. Last year 7779 were reported, and only about 317 were interested enough to make an offering to this cause. Have we forgotten our obligation?

Examine what each of these twenty-four Synods contributed. Take an average. Deducting \$85, which came from miscellaneous sources, we find that of the \$1611 given, the Synods of Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Ohio and New York gave between them \$1378. Leaving out these four Synods which gave so much, and the eight which gave nothing, we find that twenty of the great Synods of our Church gave on an average for temper-

ance work as it is carried on by our own Church only \$12.93 each! Is there any reform that would commend itself to anybody, when a great Synod of the Presbyterian Church puts only \$12.93 into it?

Look even more carefully at the figures. Our membership last year was 1,025,388, and these gave for the carrying on of temperance work by their denomination just one cent from every six members. Your Committee believes that if we, as Commissioners, make the attempt when we go back, we can secure for this year at least one cent from each member of the Church, and with this sum our Church, through her Permanent Committee, will take her rightful place in carrying on this relentless warfare.

Your Committee presents the following recommendations for adoption:

1. The General Assembly hereby reaffirms its previous deliverances on temperance, laying special emphasis upon personal total abstinence on the part of the members of the Church, and entire separation from any connection with the liquor traffic.

2. The General Assembly, through its Stated Clerk, conveys to the Triennial International Sunday-school Convention, to be held at Denver, Col., its emphatic protest against the elimination of the Quarterly Temperance Lessons from the Sabbath-school lesson series.

3. We urge upon pastors, Sessions and superintendents the use in the Sabbath-schools of the pledge cards prepared by the Permanent Committee.

4. We urge upon Y. P. S. C. E. Societies the importance of the appointment of Temperance Committees.

5. That we plead with our Presbyteries to appoint Presbyterial Committees, whose Chairmen shall systematically bring the matter of temperance to the attention of the churches.

6. We call upon all our churches to make an annual contribution for the work of the Permanent Committee on Temperance.

7. We request the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work to furnish the Permanent Committee on Temperance with 10,000 copies of Tract No. 6, entitled "A Summary of the Deliverances of the General Assembly on Temperance from A.D. 1812 to A.D. 1902," for free distribution among the churches. Also to furnish 10,000 copies of the "Temperance Catechism" as prepared by the Committee. These to be printed in a uniform size to be suggested by the Permanent Committee on Temperance.

8. We suggest that the Publishing Committee of the *Assembly Herald* continue to allot two pages monthly for the use of the Permanent Committee on Temperance.

9. We suggest that the Stated Clerk be instructed to permanently retain the column for temperance in the blank form entitled "Annual Report of Church to Presbytery," that the column be

headed "Temperance Committee," and that the explanation be made in its proper place on the form that only such sums as have been sent to our Permanent Committee shall be entered therein; all contributions to undenominational temperance work being included, as heretofore, among the miscellaneous items.

10. We suggest that the Permanent Committee on Temperance, as one of the agencies of our Church, be given a column in the *Minutes* of the General Assembly.

11. We suggest that the General Assembly, through its Permanent Committee on Temperance, memorialize the United States Congress to enact the following laws: (a) A law to prohibit the sale of liquors in Old Soldiers' Homes; (b) A law to prohibit the sale of liquors in the United States public Government buildings; (c) A law to prohibit the sale of liquors in immigrant stations.

12. The expiration of the term of service of the following members occurs at this time, viz.: Rev. William L. McEwan, D.D., Rev. A. E. Linn, Messrs. C. L. Rose and William R. Ziegler. Rev. A. E. Linn desiring to be excused from further service, the Standing Committee ask that Rev. J. P. Calhoun, D.D., be chosen in his place, and the other members be duly reelected.

A motion to amend Standing Rule No. 7 was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

The Special Committee on the Presbyterian Building, through the Chairman, Rev. Richard S. Holmes, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman and Rev. Wilson Phraner, D.D., was adopted. The Report is as follows:

The Special Committee appointed by the last General Assembly to endeavor to secure the funds necessary to complete the payment of the indebtedness incurred by the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions in the erection of the building No. 156 Fifth avenue, New York City, under the general authority of the General Assembly, would respectfully report as follows:

The Committee as originally constituted consisted of *Ministers*—R. S. Holmes, D.D., Charles Wood, D.D., H. H. Stebbins, D.D., W. J. McKittrick, D.D., W. R. Notman, D.D.; *Ruling Elders*—L. H. Severance, Robert Pitcairn, Russell A. Alger, C. H. McCormick.

Early in the summer of 1901, Mr. McCormick resigned, and his place was filled by Elder William D. Lilley, by appointment of the Moderator.

The Committee has never met. It was called together by the

Chairman, in June following the Assembly, but the call was revoked because of the inability of several members to attend.

Since then the absence of various members in Europe, the sickness of Gen. Alger, and the business engagements of others, have made it impossible to obtain a meeting.

The Chairman has held consultations at various times with the Joint Committee on the Building of the Home and Foreign Boards, with individual members of the Assembly's Committee, and has given the whole of his time that could be taken from a busy pastorate to the prosecution of this work.

The limitations placed upon the Committee by the terms of its appointment have been strictly observed. No expense has been caused the General Assembly by the Committee's work. We have published a pamphlet called "156 Fifth Avenue: a Statement of Facts and an Appeal," which is appended to this Report. The expense of this publication was met by one of the members of the Committee. The Committee also issued a circular letter, setting forth succinctly and briefly the reasons for the undertaking and the advantages that would accrue to the Boards by the success of the work. This circular has been in two editions, the first of which was generously contributed by Mr. William H. Scott, of Philadelphia, and the second, in a somewhat abbreviated form, was contributed by another member of the Committee. The first of these is appended to this Report.

As this is the first official presentation to the General Assembly of the project of paying the debt upon our Church property in New York, your Committee gives recognition here to the legal status of the Joint Committee of the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions, and the fact of its existence before the creation of the Assembly's Committee, and presents also the financial statement* of the acting Treasurer of the Joint Committee, Mr. Harvey C. Olin, the Treasurer of the Home Board, who is acting during the absence from the country of Mr. George H. Southard, the Treasurer of the Joint Committee. This statement shows the exact condition of this property of the Church at the time of writing this Report. Your Committee emphasizes the fact that while the title is in the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions, it is vested in those Boards only as creatures and agencies of the General Assembly, and that the real ownership is vested in the whole Church. The whole Church will share in the benefits that are to accrue from placing the property upon a firm and perpetually self-supporting basis, which will be immediately felt in an enlargement of evangelistic power, and the whole Church should take part in removing the encumbrance upon the property at the earliest possible day, that this enlargement may be secured.

The Committee feels a just pride in presenting the results of its labors in the securing of funds. Without including anything

secured in New York City, and without claiming any credit for subscriptions secured by the Joint Committee outside of New York City, before your Committee began its work, we are able to report at the time of this writing (one month before the Assembly meets) the sum of \$100,000, of which there has been paid over to the Treasurer and applied on the debt \$33,624.12. This has been secured at a total cost to the funds of \$1878.27. Your Committee employed for four months in 1901, in the Synod of Ohio, a canvasser at an expense of \$1161.15, but the disaster to Wooster University operated to prevent the realization of any large sum from this effort. In all less than \$5000 was realized from the experiment. The cost to the fund of raising the other \$95,000 has been \$717.12.

It may interest the General Assembly to note the distribution of these subscriptions. In all eighteen Synods have made contributions, as follows :

All these sums have been reported to the Twentieth Century Committee as part of the Thank-offering Fund.

The Committee feels like congratulating the General Assembly upon the splendid results of the work of the year, through the efforts of the Committee as supplementary to the work previously begun and simultaneously carried on by the Joint Committee of the Home and Foreign Boards. Of the total indebtedness due upon note and mortgage in November, 1900, of \$1,290,000, there remains now a total indebtedness of \$382,500, and of this \$116,000 has been subscribed, part of which will doubtless be paid before the meeting of the General Assembly. It needs but a determined continuation of the work begun a year ago by the Assembly, to insure complete success at no very remote day. But the burden of the work should no longer rest upon one or two individuals. In view of all this your Committee recommends as follows :

1. That the report of the present Committee of the General Assembly be accepted and the Committee discharged.

2. That a new and enlarged Committee be appointed, which shall include in its membership the members of the Joint Committee of the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions, the Treasurer of each of these Boards, and nine others who shall represent our great business centres.

3. In order to protect the current income of the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions, the Assembly directs that no appeal shall be made to churches for collections for the Building Fund, and urges on the churches that if they take voluntary collections for this end, it be with the distinct understanding that contributions for current work shall in no case be diminished.

4. That the General Assembly returns its thanks to the generous givers who have already so contributed as to encourage the Assembly to a further effort with full hope of success.

The consideration of the Report of the Special Committee on Vacancy and Supply was postponed until to-morrow at eleven o'clock, to be followed by the Reports on Sabbath Observance, Benevolence and the Twentieth Century Fund.

The Report of the Standing Committee on Church Polity was made an Order for to-morrow morning.

The Assembly adjourned, and was closed with prayer.

THURSDAY, May 22, 8 o'clock P.M.

A Reception was given the General Assembly at the Waldorf-Astoria, by the Presbyterian Union of the City of New York. The formal reception was held from eight to nine o'clock. Then came the exercises of the evening, consisting of an Invocation by the Rev. Wm. Henry Roberts, D.D., LL.D.; the Greeting to the Assembly by Mr. Noah C. Rogers, the President of the Union; the Greeting in behalf of the City of New York, by the Mayor of the City, Hon. Seth Low, LL.D.; the response in be-

half of the Assembly by the Moderator, Rev. Henry Van Dyke, D.D., LL.D., and Musical Selections rendered by a male chorus under direction of Mr. C. B. Hawley. The exercises were followed by a collation.

FRIDAY, May 23, 9 o'clock A.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

The Special Committee on Sabbath Observance, through the Chairman, Mr. James Yereance, presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman, Rev. J. W. Hathaway, D.D., and Rev. William S. Hubbell, D.D., was adopted. The Report is as follows :

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance would most respectfully present to the General Assembly the following Report :

We believe that these days of the opening years of the twentieth century mark an epoch in the history of our country, if not of the world, with reference to the great moral as well as economic questions. This fact is a loud call to the Church of Christ, which is the custodian of the oracles of God, for special watchfulness and care to guard the foundations of faith and righteousness.

There are many problems that confront the Church of Christ, both at home and abroad, the solution of which demands our renewed faithfulness and our best wisdom, guided by a steadfast loyalty and a ready obedience to the divine law as expressed in the Word of God. But there are none more difficult of solution, more perplexing of application, or more vitally important to the life and efficiency of the Church than the Sabbath question. The true nature, purpose, value and obligation of the Christian Sabbath is but little understood or felt by the masses of our American people. There should be a quicker pulse in the Church for its appreciation and defense. There should be a clearer conception of its origin and authority. There should be an awakening to the necessity for a larger measure of sound education of our children and people, as an antidote to the flood of false teaching and example that finds expression in these days.

It has become popular with many people, and with the secular press, to characterize efforts for preserving the Christian Sabbath on religious or even moral grounds as Puritanical and as evidences of bigotry, and to denominate laws enacted to safeguard the liberty of the day for the laborer, and in the interest of morality and religion, as "blue laws" and relics of inquisitorial intolerance. False teaching concerning the origin and authority of the Christian Sabbath does much to undermine the founda-

tions of this most vital part of the moral law, and to disturb the faith of many of the most conscientious of our people, and cause untold thousands to treat all efforts to preserve the Christian Sabbath with careless indifference. Immediately subsequent to the municipal election in New York City, November 10, 1901, the question of legally opening the saloon a portion of the Lord's Day in the city of New York was presented and discussed in the daily press. From November until March 11 the discussion of this question waxed more and more intense, both pro and con, in the religious and secular, daily and weekly journals of the whole country, and great interest was manifested not only in the Empire State but throughout the land.

There was a federated union between Sabbath Associations, temperance societies and Sabbath-loving people of this country in opposition to this proposition. A vast amount of work was done to reach and quicken the conscience of the people, which was met by a most gratifying response throughout the State and the country. Several bills for opening the saloons on Sunday were introduced in the New York Legislature and referred to the Excise Committee, but so strong was the opposition that none of these bills were reported back to the Legislature by the Committee to which they were referred. On March 11 the last bill was withdrawn, and thus ended for the present year the battle over the question of the legally open Sunday saloon in New York City by a great victory for the Sabbath, for temperance and for righteousness. This shows that the American people are not yet ready to submit the Decalogue or any one of the Ten Commandments to a vote of a city to determine whether it shall be obeyed or not. This is a typical example of what the Sabbath Associations are doing to leaven the public mind and quicken the public conscience in defense of righteousness and to check what otherwise might become irresistible flood-tides of evil.

On account of the many forces that are allied to destroy the sacred character of the Christian Sabbath and thus to destroy the primal purpose of this day, and also to rob this marvelously beneficent gift of its divine authority and binding obligation upon the conscience of mankind, we earnestly recommend this Assembly to adopt the following resolutions, that the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America may not fail to express with the authority of its highest court its strong convictions on this most important and vital question :

Resolved, 1. That the General Assembly hereby reaffirms its settled conviction that the law of the Sabbath is a divine law of perpetual binding obligation upon all men.

Resolved, 2. That the Decalogue is a formulation of a preëxisting and eternal moral law, of which the Fourth Commandment is a vital part.

Resolved, 3. That the *authority of the Christian Sabbath* is

based upon the universal Sabbath law as generically expressed in the Decalogue, and confirmed by the Lord Jesus Christ when He said, "The Sabbath was made for man," and that "The Son of man is Lord also of the Sabbath."

Resolved, 4. That the General Assembly enjoins all ministers, officers and members of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, also all members of their Young People's Societies and Sabbath-schools, to special care and faithfulness for the preservation, both by precept and example, of the sacred character of the Christian Sabbath.

Resolved, 5. That the day should be observed in such a manner as to be restful for the body and for the soul—a day for communion with God, for divine worship, and for Christian service.

Resolved, 6. That we strongly reprobate all games and sports, such as golf, ball games, Sunday photography, and social functions, etc., on the Lord's Day.

Resolved, 7. That we remind all church members of the necessity of special watchfulness over their conduct during the summer days of vacation and recreation, either at home or abroad, with regard to their Christian example on the Lord's Day.

Resolved, 8. That we most respectfully but earnestly request all officers of public transportation companies to seriously consider the subject of Sunday excursions, to the end that they may be discontinued, in the interest of labor, morals and religion.

Resolved, 9. That we deprecate the use of the Lord's Day for traveling, either for business or pleasure, by private individuals or public officials, notably such as occurred during the recent entertainment of a foreign guest.

Resolved, 10. That we deprecate political conferences on the Lord's Day, a practice which has become a great and growing evil in this Republic, and which has led in some recent campaigns to public political meetings on this day.

Resolved, 11. That we earnestly urge the captains of industry and all corporate officials and employers of labor to safeguard their employes in their right to the day of rest; the highest material and commercial prosperity, no less than the demands of human nature, necessitates the Sabbath rest of the employes.

Resolved, 12. The General Assembly repeats its condemnation of the seven-day journalism of our country and age, and strongly recommends against the purchase or reading of, or advertising in the Sunday newspaper.

Resolved, 13. That we most heartily commend and warmly endorse the work of the American Sabbath Union and the Woman's National Sabbath Alliance, in their faithful efforts to preserve in its purity the Christian Sabbath.

Resolved, 14. That we earnestly recommend that each pastor of our communion preach a sermon in the month of April next on the subject of the Sabbath, and that at that time an offering be made for the work of the American Sabbath Union (which

is the association organized by the coöperation of the General Assembly in 1888, and which represents the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America in this department of Christian work); or in lieu of an offering, we recommend that this association be placed upon the list of benevolences of the churches; contributions to be sent to Col. A. S. Bacon, Treasurer, 37 Liberty street, New York City.

Resolved, 15. That the Assembly's Committee on Sabbath Observance be continued, and these resolutions be read by the pastors from their pulpits in connection with the sermon preached on this subject; of which resolutions copies may be secured from the Secretary of the American Sabbath Union, 203 Broadway, New York, for distribution in the pews.

Overture No. 2, on Judicial Commissions: In the affirmative, 128 Presbyteries; in the negative, 79 Presbyteries; affirmative with exceptions, 1; taking no action or not reporting, 24 Presbyteries.

Overture No. 3, on Judicial Commissions: In the affirmative, 122 Presbyteries; in the negative, 82 Presbyteries; affirmative with exceptions, 4; taking no action or not reporting, 24 Presbyteries.

Overture No. 4, on Judicial Commissions: In the affirmative, 142 Presbyteries; in the negative, 66 Presbyteries; taking no action or not reporting, 24 Presbyteries.

Overture No. 5, on Judicial Commissions: In the affirmative, 150 Presbyteries; in the negative, 57 Presbyteries; taking no action or not reporting, 25 Presbyteries.

Overture No. 6, on the Power of Sessions over Sabbath-schools and Societies: In the affirmative, 173 Presbyteries; in the negative, 34 Presbyteries; taking no action or not reporting, 25 Presbyteries.

Overture No. 7, on Organizations of the Church; In the affir-

native, 143 Presbyteries; in the negative, 63 Presbyteries; affirmative with exception, 1; taking no action or not reporting, 25 Presbyteries.

Overture No. 8, on Offerings of Societies: In the affirmative, 144 Presbyteries; in the negative, 66 Presbyteries; taking no action or not reporting, 22 Presbyteries.

It is the rule of the Assembly that a Committee of Canvass, composed of three ministers and two elders, be appointed by the Moderator to examine these returns and report to the Assembly.

The Standing Committee on Church Erection, through the Chairman, Rev. Arthur C. McMillan, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after addresses by the Chairman and Rev. E. N. White, D.D., Secretary of the Board, was adopted. The Report is as follows:

The Standing Committee on Church Erection respectfully presents the following Report to the one hundred and fourteenth General Assembly:

The organization of the Presbyterian Church is well adapted to carry forward the Gospel of Christ in America. First, the Sabbath-school missionary, entering a new community, visiting from house to house, organizing a Sabbath-school and developing a church; next, the home missionary, establishing the Gospel and expanding the work; finally, the Board of Church Erection, with generous hand and kind encouragement, making possible a home for the church and for the minister; these together form a system as perfect as can be devised, at present, for accomplishing the work committed to our branch of the Church.

The part performed by the Board of Church Erection, in this system, is of the utmost importance, if the labor of the first two is to be permanent. A schoolhouse or a hall may serve for evangelistic purposes or temporary meeting places, but to make a church permanent, there must be a church home. As Oliver Wendell Holmes said: "Fight for your homes!" is a real battle cry; but "Fight for your boarding-houses!" would be absurd. A church building is not only a reality, but it also tends to make church life real.

The time to render aid to a needy church is in the time of its need. The Board does not, and ought not, to wait until a new

organization shows assured virility. The original aim of this Board, five decades ago, was to aid young missionary churches to secure a house of worship. That is still its principal aim. That is the aim which appeals to strong organizations and makes them glad givers to this worthy cause.

Since 1847, 6794 churches have been aided and \$4,104,207 distributed by this agency. Probably few church buildings west of the Mississippi river have not received aid at some time. The substantial advancement of Presbyterianism in the West, endeavoring to keep pace with advancing population and mould it to the contour of Christianity, has been made possible by the ready assistance of the Board of Church Erection.

It is estimated that thirty-five per cent. of all churches, sooner or later, cease to exist. This may be due to the shifting of population, or to the changing character of the population, or to consolidation with other churches. But who shall say that it is an unwise use of money to aid in the erection of a building which is used but three or five or ten years? The discontinuance of a church by no means proves the unwisdom of granting aid. A church which serves a few people only a limited time in an isolated community may be doing a splendid work for Christ. Certainly, in view of the peculiar conditions of a frontier State, we cannot refuse Gospel privileges to a new community until time has shown that it is to have a permanent, enduring life.

The wise care exercised by the Board in making grants and loans is to be commended. No money is paid to a church without a mortgage and an insurance policy. The funds of the Board are thereby guarded, as far as possible, against loss, and some \$10,000 was saved last year by this foresight.

The permanent funds amount to \$608,500: reversionary interests in church and manse properties amount to \$2,247,331 more, which, although bearing no interest, require as constant care, and there are insurance policies to an equal amount, yet it is noticeable that the legal expenses required to administer property interests to this large amount cost the Church only \$38.27, the members of the Board freely giving professional services which otherwise would have a cash value of thousands of dollars. In this regard, the gratitude of the Church is due the brethren who compose this Board, especially the elders, and is doubtless heartily given.

The contributions of churches and Sabbath-schools amounted to \$55,406.70, a sum all too small, which will be readily appreciated when it is remembered that during the year appropriations were made from the General Fund to the amount of \$102,019. Obviously, were it not for legacies, individual gifts and other additional resources, the Board would be entirely unable to meet the demands upon it. As a matter of fact, the appropriations, the largest in the history of the Board, exhausted all these

resources, and the Board commences this year with an empty treasury.

The Synods of New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Ohio and Texas, contributed \$12,379.45 more than they received in appropriations. All honor to them! But cannot the Church reasonably expect that others of the strong Synods will follow this good example?

To this end the hearty coöperation of Presbyterian and Synodical Committees is asked. Membership in these Committees ought to be permanent, as far as possible; for their assistance in administering these funds wisely and judiciously requires not only consecration but experience. The admirable Report of the past year reflects credit upon these Committees, but there is still room for improvement. Their attention is especially called to the care needed in passing upon the papers submitted to them and the value, both to the Board and to the churches, of sympathetic counsel to churches asking for grants and loans.

While no church ought to hesitate to ask for a grant when needed, which is given without interest and without expectation of its being returned, more churches, in the older sections of our country, might be able to fulfill the conditions of the recommendations of former Assemblies and agree to return the money received, in yearly payments. The money so returned becomes immediately available for other needy congregations.

The attention of churches having no manse is called to the possibility of providing one by the aid of the "Manse Fund."

By this means, a manse can be built by a small congregation and the rent paid by the minister will return, within a few years, all money borrowed and the house will be free of debt. The operation of this Manse Fund during the fifteen years of its existence has been most beneficent, the entire fund having been loaned and returned several times over.

One-quarter of the income of the fund derived from the estate of the late Phineas M. Barber is administered by this Board, "for church buildings for Presbyterian colored congregations in the field outside the Freedmen's Board." Thus far this has been used only to aid church buildings. But since aiding manse building also would be within the terms of the bequest, and since the funds in hand warrant it, it seems wise to give this added power to the Board, to be used at its discretion.

Your Committee has visited the rooms of the Board and has become familiar with the manner in which this trust is administered. We most cordially approve the methods used, and express our high appreciation of the attractive appearance of the books and the businesslike method of keeping the Minutes and records.

Your Committee therefore recommends:

1. That this Assembly expresses its gratitude to the members

of the Board who so generously give their time and talents to this work.

2. That the fidelity of the Secretary and Treasurer be commended.

3. That the excellent Minutes of the Board be approved to date.

4. That the words "and manses" be inserted after the words "for church buildings" in the rules of the Barber Fund.

5. That this Assembly emphasize the recommendations already made by the Assemblies of 1893 and 1897, that churches, and especially those in our Eastern Synods, asking appropriations from the General Fund should consider such appropriations as loans, to be returned without interest, in annual contributions, to the treasury of the Board of a certain definite percentage of the amount received, the mortgage securing the appropriation to be canceled when the full amount has been thus returned.

6. That in view of the largely increased demands upon the Board, the Assembly urges upon all the churches the importance of this great work; and the necessity of making far more liberal contributions for its support.

7. Your Committee recommend that the Rev. Ford C. Ottman, the Rev. John Reid, D.D., the Rev. Robert F. Sample, D.D., and the Rev. Charles J. Young, D.D., with Elders William N. Crane, Ezra P. Hoyt, M.D., and George E. Sterry, be nominated for reelection as members of the Board, and that Elder Henry T. Bronson be nominated to fill the vacancy in the class of 1903 caused by the resignation of Elder Frederick W. Baldwin.

A Resolution with reference to the printing by the Government of Jefferson's *Bible* was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

The following were added to the Judicial Commission on *Judicial Case No. 2: Ministers*—R. P. G. Bennett, J. Frederick Dripps, D.D.; *Elders*—J. T. M. Finney, J. C. McKinney and R. M. Carothers.

The Special Committee on Vacancy and Supply, through Hon. Robert N. Willson, a member of the Committee, presented its Report, which was accepted.

A Minority Report was presented by Rev. Robert F. Sample, D.D., signed by himself and Rev. Herrick Johnson, D.D., members of the Committee, which was also accepted, and which recommended the establishment of a Central Agency for Ministerial Supply with a paid Secretary. The Report of the Committee was adopted, and is as follows;

The Special Committee on Vacancy and Supply respectfully reports to the General Assembly of 1902 :

The Committee was continued by the General Assembly of 1901, and increased by the addition of two members, the Rev. Herrick Johnson, D.D., and the Rev. James E. Moffatt, D.D. The Committee as thus enlarged is composed of *Ministers*—Robert F. Sample, D.D., William Henry Roberts, D.D., William P. White, D.D., Herrick Johnson, D.D., James E. Moffatt, D.D.; *Ruling Elders*—Robert N. Willson and George E. Sterry.

The Committee has held two meetings, and has given careful consideration to the several features of its work.

The attention of the Assembly is first drawn to the statistics of the subject. The returns secured show that the actual state of the ministry as to employment on May 1, 1901, as nearly as can be ascertained, was as follows :

The condition of the churches at the same date in the matter of ministerial supply is shown by the following exhibit :

These figures show that at the date given there were in the Church 1241 ministers who were designated as "evangelists" and "without charge," and also that there were 429 who were honorably retired and 259 who were engaged as "professors and teachers." The vacant churches numbered 1034. The number of ministers without regular employment, therefore, was 207 in excess of the vacant churches, and there were 678 ministers in addition who, though retired from service or engaged in educational work, might be able to serve in the pulpit with some regularity. The facts in regard to these classes of ministers, however, so far as ascertainable, would indicate that only about 400 of the 1241 ministers without regular employment were so situated as to be able to render continuous service in the pastorate; and that of the 678 ministers designated as honorably retired or as teachers, not more than 150 were in a position to serve the churches as temporary supplies. This reduces the number of

ministers who were available during the ecclesiastical year for regular or temporary service to about 550.

The condition of the 1034 vacant churches is believed to be as follows: 250 able to support a minister without outside aid; 202 could contribute only small sums for ministerial support, and 582 could be grouped so as to sustain about 150 ministers. Again, of the total of 7779 churches, 3484 were self-supporting, and 4295 did not themselves contribute sufficient sums for the whole of the expenses of their support.

These statistics enable the Committee to summarize the situation in the Church during the past calendar year approximately as follows: 5859 ministers were engaged in ecclesiastical or educational service, 429 were honorably retired, 3 were suspended, 691 were incapacitated for continuous work, and 550 who were able and willing to work were without regular charge. Of the churches, about 4200 were each in charge of a minister, about 2545 were grouped by twos and threes for ministerial service, and of the remaining 1034 about 850 were fields where 400 ministers might have been employed. The remaining 182 churches were so situated as to be unable to aid in securing a regular ministry.

It would appear, therefore, that the present ministerial force is just about sufficient for the present demand and resources of the churches. The ministers desirous of employment during the year were in number about 550, and the actual fields available for service were about 400. But it is to be emphasized that 3500 of the churches furnished fields for only 1500 men. If every one of our churches had its own minister, 2000 additional ministers would be needed. Add to this fact the additional one that over fifty per cent. of the churches are not in a position to support a minister without being grouped with other churches, or aided either by the Board of Home Missions or the Committees of Synodical Sustentation, and at once it becomes apparent that one of the chief difficulties in the matter of vacancy and supply is the lack of adequate funds for ministerial support.

Given increased financial resources, distributed through either of the agencies just named, and the situation of the ministry and the churches would be at once changed for the better. A more adequate support would be given to the devoted men who are serving Christ in many congregations, the weaker churches would be cared for in an appropriate and helpful manner, new fields would be opened for the spiritual harvest, and the whole work of our Church would receive a widespread and beneficent uplift along the lines of true Christian progress.

The Committee has also given careful consideration to the resolutions referred to it by the last Assembly, which read:

“*Resolved*, 3. That there shall be a Permanent Advisory Committee of seven, four ministers and three ruling elders, to be annually appointed by the Assembly, whose business it shall be

to consider a plan for the better adjustment of vacancy and supply in the entire Church, to issue such statements as may be deemed serviceable, and to make an annual Report to the Assembly.

“*Resolved*, 4. That there shall be a Corresponding Secretary, located at _____, with a salary of \$ _____, who shall be the medium of communication for the above Permanent Advisory Committee, with Presbyteries, Synods and other interested parties. The Secretary shall be appointed by the Committee, shall be subject to its authority, and his salary shall be provided for in such manner as the General Assembly shall direct.”

The Committee has also received from the Stated Clerk of the Assembly information to the effect that a number of the Synods and Presbyteries have adopted the Plan of Vacancy and Supply recommended by the last Assembly, and found on page 142 of the *Minutes*. The Presbyteries adopting the Plan have entrusted its administration to Committees, specially appointed or already existing. The Plan is sustained and enforced by the Form of Government, Chapter XXI, Sections 2, 3 and 4, providing in a definite manner for the supply of the pulpits of vacant churches and the employment of unemployed ministers. The Stated Clerk has also informed the Committee of the issue of a supplementary number of the *Minutes* for January, 1902, containing ecclesiastical changes, lists of vacant churches, and the names of the Chairmen of Committees having charge of the supply of vacant churches. The Plan recommended by the Assembly has therefore been put in operation throughout the larger part of the Church.

In view of these considerations the Committee is of the opinion that the time has not yet come for action upon the proposition for a Central Bureau and a paid Secretary. The Presbyteries having received Constitutional power to deal with the matter of vacancy and supply, and having begun the task of supervision, should be encouraged to continue the work. Further, the practical efficiency of the new Plan has not been tested by time. It is only about eight months since the Presbyteries began to take action in connection with it, and the Synods have had a less period than that for organization. In addition, it is to be noted that the Standing Committee on Vacancy and Supply constituted by the last Assembly, and to be appointed by this Assembly, has not as yet had opportunity to act. Both power and primary responsibility in this matter belong to the Presbyteries. There is no original authority connected therewith vested by the Constitution in the Synods or the General Assembly. It is the part of wisdom, therefore, to await the results of the operation of the new Plan in its entirety, prior to further action upon so important a matter.

The above considerations have direct relation to the minority Report presented by two members and appended to the Report

of the Committee. The Committee, however, emphasize in addition thereto the following statements as to the establishment of a central agency. While recognizing, equally with others, the vital relation of the General Assembly to the entire work of our Church, and while assured that the Assembly, in the present, as in all the past, will render needed assistance to all the general interests of our denomination, yet we submit that there are limitations not only upon the Assembly's constitutional power in the matter now in hand, but also upon the propriety of its acting upon matters which are constitutionally within its discretion. It has never been the policy of this Church to create central agencies unless the demand therefor be practically universal, and it is not believed that there is any such demand in the present case. Further, private agencies have existed within our denomination, from time to time, along the lines laid down by those who favor a central agency, and in every instance have resulted in failure. Neither ministers nor churches have availed themselves to any extent of the opportunities offered by them. Again, it is to be remembered that in all the Synods west of the Mississippi, the relation of the Home Mission Board to a majority of the churches is such as to do away with the need of assistance from a central agency. The adjustments involved in the employment of home missionaries, have been successfully carried on for many years by the Home Board and the judicatories concerned, whether Presbyteries or Synods. Correspondence had with clergymen and elders in different parts of the Church, also indicates that there would be nothing more possible in the way of action on the part of a central agency than the furnishing of information. Congregations can be authoritatively assisted only by the Presbyteries having jurisdiction. It is not to be forgotten that the risk of distrust in the Church, as to the disinterestedness and non-partisanship of the officers of a central agency, is a weighty consideration. In the opinion of several members of this Committee, the establishment of a central agency is unwise, uncalled for, involves the liability of an interference with the primary powers of the Presbyteries in the matter, and has against it both past experience and present conditions.

The Committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Presbyteries and Synods be directed to report to the next Assembly any action taken by them on the Plan of Vacancy and Supply, and any facts connected therewith which in their judgment may be of value.

The Committee was reappointed, to take charge of and report

upon any papers which may come into its hands before the next Assembly.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures reported on the resolution with reference to the printing by the Government of Jefferson's *Bible*, recommending that no action be taken. The Report was adopted.

The Assembly took recess, and was closed with prayer.

FRIDAY, May 23, 2.30 o'clock P.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer.

The Standing Committee on Benevolence, through the Chairman, Rev. George Dugan, presented its Report, which was accepted and adopted, and is as follows :

When one sits in such a company as this Assembly and hears the story of our beloved Church's triumphs from the lips of her worthy workmen, one feels like exclaiming, "O how lovely is Zion! beautiful for situation, the joy of the whole earth." Let us thank God for what our ears have heard and our eyes seen of the matchless triumphs of the Word of Life as it has been carried from Jerusalem to Judea, and to Samaria, and to the uttermost parts of the earth, by the great organized Boards of our militant Presbyterianism.

After hearing the splendid achievements of Home Missions during the first century of our Board's existence, have not our hearts burned within us? But while we glory in the past, as we have abundant reason to, let us not forget the tremendous call of this present day for larger gifts to meet our larger responsibilities. Patriotic Presbyterians ought to give to the Home Board for this year's work \$1,000,000.

When we turn to our two Boards that have to do with Presbyterian educational interests, the interests so well emphasized by our retiring Moderator, we find little room for boasting. Our Board of Education received last year the paltry sum of \$66,524, and the reason is not far to find, for out of our 7825 churches 4090 of them did not give a cent to this Board. Even a worse condition of affairs maintains with reference to our Board of Aid for Colleges and Academies. True, this Board received last year \$222,836.32, but out of our 7825 churches 4420 had no share whatever in that sum. We ought to give to these two Boards this year at least a quarter of a million of dollars dedicated to the cause of Christian Education.

Our Board of Publication and Sabbath school Work needs \$200,000, and it is eminently deserving of every dollar of the amount.

The Board of Church Erection, to which only fifty per cent. of our churches contributed last year, ought to have \$200,000 also.

The Board of Ministerial Relief, to which 3305 of our 7825 churches gave nothing last year, ought to have this year \$225,000, and every church in the land ought to have a share in the sum.

To the Board of Freedmen we gave last year \$185,804—3028 of the 7825 churches taking no part in the offering. When we consider the present and pressing needs of the work devolving upon this Board, \$250,000 is not too much for them to ask, and it is not too much for us to give. All this simply means that the work at home during the year ought to have from this admittedly wealthiest denomination the sum of two and a quarter million of dollars.

Now, not a word has been said about our great foreign work that last year received \$1,086,341.74, and needs for this year \$1,097,636. When you think of the grand and glorious work being done by this Board in the uttermost parts of the earth—Evangelistic, Educational, Medical and Publishing—it ought to receive from us a million and a quarter dollars.

It would bless the Church at home and make it a blessing, if it would press that much closer to its heart the needs of the Church abroad.

In viewing the work of our Boards three things impress us:

1. The magnitude of the work we are doing.
2. The wise enthusiasm of our leaders in directing the Church's energies.
3. The ever-present and pressing necessity for the sinews of war if the war is to go forward to wider conquest.

This last fact has been the dominant note in all of the Reports and it finds its justification in the common experience of every Board, to wit: That for the work in hand enough money is to be had only after the most persistent and insistent begging, while new and needy fields must remain untilled, simply because so many of the rank and file of our great Church will not come to the help of the Lord against the mighty. Why should "an offering every year, for every Board, from every church and every member in the Church," be thought a thing impossible, when we are told that "one cent a day from each member would supply the money asked for next year's work, and leave no debts?" It would seem not only not impossible, but not even difficult of realization.

That the Committee on Systematic Benevolence has done yeoman service in calling the Church to this high ideal of practical Christian Benevolence, it is our pleasure to record. We are fully persuaded, however, that this work still needs to be pressed with unabated zeal and with all the care and wisdom that such a varied and important service demands. We trust the time may not be far distant when every pulpit in our

beloved Church will place the grace of giving, along with prayer and Bible study, as one of the primary and essential accompaniments of salvation. Nature and grace both declare this law, "that life grows not only by what it receives, but quite as much by what it gives."

We have not the time to make any historical reference to the facts, but we venture the assertion that the periods of the Church's healthiest growth have been those periods when she abounded in the grace of giving. It is a spiritual law that has stood the test of the past and challenges the testing of the present, to wit: "Bring ye every tithe into the storehouse and prove me therewith, and see if I will not open the windows of heaven and pour out upon you such a blessing that ye shall not be able to receive it." May it not be fair to suggest that some of the Church's missing power may be found in the missing tithe? Is not that the significance of the call of the great Head of the Church Himself: "Give and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together and running over shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure ye mete withal, it shall be measured to you again." Yes, nature and grace both join in the call to the Church and to every member in the Church—

"Give! give! be always giving;
Who gives not is not living."

Overtures have come down from a number of Presbyteries (*Overtures Nos. 1-20* inclusive, also *Overture No. 69*), asking the General Assembly to designate Thanksgiving week as a time for special gifts to the Lord's work; and to recommend that all Presbyterians give all they can earn or save above actual expenses, for five days during that week, to the great work of our Church at home and abroad.

We heartily commend the principle of the above as embodying and expressing the true spirit of Christian benevolence, believing that the faithful practice of this principle on the part of every member in the Church would tend very largely toward the final solution of some of the vexing difficulties that have always attached themselves to the problem of the financial support of the Church's agencies for proclaiming "the glorious Gospel of the blessed Christ."

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following recommendations:

1. That pastors and Sessions be urged to frequently and fully instruct the churches under their care and guidance regarding the work and needs of our various Boards, their high privilege as Christians in giving to their support, with emphasis upon the doctrine of loyalty to things purely Presbyterian.

2. We repeat the recommendation of your Standing Committee of last year, to wit: "That in each of our theological

seminaries full instruction be given to our students for the ministry on the subject of Systematic Benevolence, and upon the history, objects and operations of the several Boards of the Church. Thus our young ministers will enter upon their work with a knowledge of these important agencies and trained in a branch of ministerial duty in which we cannot afford that any of our ministers should be lacking.

3. We recommend the approval and endorsement of the plan of Presbyterian Committees, and urge it upon the nineteen Presbyteries that report no such Committees the advisability of forming such at once, and that each Chairman of all the Presbyterian Committees keep in constant touch with the Chairman of the Assembly's Committee.

4. We recommend that the order of several previous Assemblies, to wit: "That the several Treasurers of the Boards give to the Assembly's Committee on Systematic Beneficence, on or about the first of March next, a list of the churches which shall not as yet have sent offerings to them, and that the said Committee make earnest effort in coöperation with the Boards to secure offerings from such churches before the close of the fiscal year," be again given, and that the Committee on Systematic Beneficence be instructed to repeat its successful experiment of last year.

5. We recommend the adoption of the recommendation of the Special Committee on Beneficence, viz.: "We have reason to suppose that an increasing number of churches have adopted the custom of providing for their congregational expenses, in whole or in part, by the envelope system. In order to make the system effective of largest good, we recommend that Assembly counsel such churches, when they arrange their packages at the beginning of the year, to include envelopes of another color for the offerings for the Boards, at least one for each month. These offerings might (1) be taken in the lump, to be distributed afterward by the Session according to the percentages recommended by General Assembly (in which case envelopes may be provided, if desired, free of charge, from our Secretary, Rev. W. H. Hubbard, D.D., of Auburn, N. Y., or from Mr. Adam Campbell, 156 Fifth avenue, New York City); or (2) if the Session so prefer, an envelope may be provided for each Board separately on the months determined by the Session (in which case the envelopes may be procured directly from the several Boards).

6. We recommend the approval of the valuable services rendered by your Committee on Systematic Beneficence, and for the contagion of enthusiasm that by wise and varied means it has helped to spread throughout our Church touching the great question of our benevolences.

7. We recommend the following changes in the Committee: In place of Dr. Richards, whose resignation has been accepted, Dr. Wylie; in place of Dr. Wylie as Secretary of the Com-

mittee, Dr. Hubbard; in place of the lamented Dr. Purves, Dr. Howard A. Johnston.

8. We recommend the approval of the Report of the Treasurer, whose work has been carefully and accurately performed.

9. We recommend that the sum of \$500 be appropriated for the work of the Committee for the present year.

The Standing Committee on Church Polity, through the Chairman, Rev. A. Christy Brown, D.D., presented its Report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee on Church Polity beg leave to make the following report upon the papers which have been placed in their hands:

Overture No. 54, from the Presbytery of Central Washington, asking whether the Presbytery of Central Washington is legally constituted, and whether the ministers who compose it should have had letters from the Presbyteries to which they belonged before the erection of the new Presbytery?

Your Committee recommend, that it be the judgment of this Assembly that the Enabling Act of the Assembly of 1901 (see *Minutes*, p. 89), in which the boundaries of the Presbytery of Central Washington were clearly defined, a Convener appointed, and a Home Mission Committee named to have charge of the business until the Presbytery had been convened, was the legal erection of the Presbytery, and that the ministers within the boundary described are members of the Presbytery by virtue of the aforesaid action of the General Assembly (see *Digest*, 1898, p. 302).

Overture No. 64, from the Presbytery of Albany, asking the appointment of a Special Committee to consider a modified plan for Judicial Commissions; *Overture No. 65*, from the Presbytery of Louisville, and *Overture No. 67*, from the Presbytery of St. Paul, proposing amendments to the Overture on Judicial Commissions

As *Overture No. 1*, on Judicial Commissions, sent down to the Presbyteries by the last Assembly, has been answered in the negative, we recommend that no action be taken.

Overture No. 59, from the Synod of New York, asking "whether the form or ceremony of declaring a pulpit vacant is a part of a judicial act, or is to be observed in every case of the dissolution of a pastoral relation."

The Committee recommends the following answer:

1. That declaring a pulpit vacant is not necessarily a part of a judicial process.

2. The custom of appointing a member of the Presbytery to declare the pulpit vacant upon the dissolution of a pastoral relation is to be commended, in that it magnifies the sacredness and

importance of the pastoral relation, but there is no reason why Presbyteries may not exercise their own judgment in each case, as provided in Form of Government, Chap. X, Section 8, "to order whatever pertains to the spiritual welfare of the churches under their care."

Overture No. 63, from the Presbytery of South Florida, asking "what are Church societies as referred to in the various Overtures from the General Assembly of 1901?" In the judgment of your Committee, this question is fully answered in the *Minutes* of the General Assembly of 1901, pp. 121 and 146. We therefore recommend that no action be taken.

Overture No. 66, from the Presbytery of New Brunswick, asking for the amendment of chap. vi of the Directory of Worship as a substitute for *Overture No. 8*, sent down to the Presbyteries by the General Assembly of 1901: Answer: As a majority of the Presbyteries have voted affirmatively upon *Overture No. 8*, sent down by the last Assembly, we recommend that no action be taken.

Overture No. 52, from the Presbytery of Cimarron, asking the Assembly to decide whether the responsibility for the care of the Negroes within its bounds belongs to the Board of Freedmen or to the Board of Home Missions. As the work of the Freedmen's Board has to do especially with those who are technically called Freedmen in the Southern States, and the territory of the Presbytery of Cimarron is in the newly developed West, we therefore recommend that the Presbytery of Cimarron be instructed to place the needs of the work for the Negroes within its bounds, on the schedule in its application for aid to the Board of Home Missions.

Overture No. 58, being a petition from certain missionaries asking for the organization of a Presbytery on the island of Porto Rico.

Your Committee has examined into this matter with care, and recommends that such a Presbytery be organized. To that end we propose for your action the following Enabling Act:

Be it Enacted by the General Assembly, 1. That the following petitioners and ministers: Rev. James Green Woods, of the Presbytery of Dubuque, of the Synod of Iowa; Rev. Milton E. Caldwell, of the Presbytery of Cincinnati, of the Synod of Ohio; Rev. Judson Underwood, of the Presbytery of Schuyler, of the Synod of Illinois; Rev. James A. McAllister, of the Presbytery of Carlisle, of the Synod of Pennsylvania; Rev. John Knox Hall, of the Presbytery of Cedar Rapids, of the Synod of Iowa; Rev. Donald McLaren, D.D., of the Presbytery of Brooklyn, of the Synod of New York; Rev. Howard T. Jason, of the Presbytery of Chester, of the Synod of Pennsylvania, be and hereby are erected into a Presbytery to be known as the Presbytery of Porto Rico, whose bounds shall be coterminous with the boundaries of the island of Porto Rico, and which shall have the care

of such churches as have already been organized or which may be organized in the said island.

2. That the Rev. Milton E. Caldwell, one of the above-named petitioners, be and hereby is appointed to convene said Presbytery at a time and place most convenient for the members.

3. That this Presbytery be appended to the Synod of Iowa, and that the Stated Clerk of the newly organized Presbytery be instructed to give notice to the Stated Clerks of the Synod of Iowa and of the General Assembly as soon as the organization is completed. Adopted.

Papers Nos. 30 and 31, with regard to Divorce and Remarriage. One of these is a communication from the Committee of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, making request for the appointment of a similar Committee to confer upon the subject of divorce and remarriage. There have also been placed in our hands *Overtures Nos. 32-34*, from the Presbyteries of Baltimore, Washington and Mattoon, on the same subject. We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions :

Resolved, 1. That in response to the fraternal request of the Committee of the Protestant Episcopal Church, this General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America appoints a Committee of nine persons, five ministers and four elders, to confer with the Committee of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and with similar Committees that may be created by other Churches, with a view of securing some concerted opinion and action by the Churches of America relative to divorce and remarriage, and so to affect public opinion that uniform legislation may be enacted by the State that will conserve the family institution, and preserve the sanctity of the marriage bond.

Resolved, 2. Relative to that part of the Overtures from the Presbyteries of Washington and Baltimore, which ask that constitutional steps be taken to amend chap. xxiv, section 6, of the Confession of Faith, so that the clause "and such wilful desertion as can in no way be remedied by the Church or civil magistrates" be stricken out: the Committee recommends that since the General Assembly has authorized the appointment of a Committee to confer with the Committees of other Churches in America on this subject, looking to some concerted action, it would not be advisable to take up the question of altering our own Constitution until this Committee has reported.

Resolved, 3. That this General Assembly, viewing with sad apprehension the many perils to family life in our time, the growing ease and frequency of divorces upon grounds trivial and unscriptural, urges upon all our people the promotion of a wider reverence for the marriage bond; and requires of all our ministers that they instruct their people in public and private of the sacredness of this divine institution, and that they exercise

due diligence before the celebration of a marriage to ascertain that there exist no impediments thereto, as defined in our Confession of Faith.

Overture No. 40, from the Presbytery of South Florida, asking the General Assembly to transfer that portion of Brevard county, Fla., which lies west of Indian river, from the territory of the Presbytery of South Florida to the territory of the Presbytery of East Florida. As there seems to be no objection, we recommend that the request be granted, and that the portion of Brevard county, Fla., which lies west of Indian river, be hereby transferred from the Presbytery of South Florida to that of East Florida. Adopted.

The Standing Committee on Bills and Overtures presented a Report, which was adopted, and is as follows :

Overtures Nos. 21-29, with reference to the Special Committee on Evangelistic Work, from the Presbyteries of Austin, Boulder, Dayton, Denver, Detroit, Jersey City, Minneapolis, Newark and Portsmouth. The General Assembly, having already taken action in connection with the Report of the Special Committee on Evangelistic Work covering all points in these Overtures except two, viz., (1) making the Committee permanent, and (2) authorizing it to employ evangelists, it is recommended (1) that no action be taken at this time on making the Committee permanent; and (2), that the Committee be authorized to employ evangelists, to meet applications from churches, Presbyteries and Synods, and consistently with the provisions of the resolutions already adopted by this Assembly.

With reference to the proposed addition to Standing Rule No. 7, referred by the Assembly to the Committee, it is recommended that the following clause be added thereto: "and that the remainder of the time allotted to the Committees be assigned to the Commissioners and to the agents from the fields of service."

The Special Committee on the Twentieth Century Fund, through the Chairman, Rev. Marcus A. Brownson, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted and adopted, with the thanks of the Assembly for the fidelity and efficiency of the Committee in this work. The Reports are as follows :

The Committee appointed by the General Assembly of 1900, and continued by the General Assembly of 1901, to direct and stimulate the raising of a Fund for the strengthening of the Church and its Boards and institutions at the beginning of a new century, would report to this present General Assembly, as follows :

The original resolutions authorizing this movement were :

“ That a special Fund, to be known as the Twentieth Century Fund, be raised for the endowment of Presbyterian academic, collegiate and theological institutions, for the enlargement of missionary enterprises, for the erection of church buildings and the payment of debts upon churches and educational institutions and for the other work of the Boards, at the option of the donors ; contributions to specific objects to be strictly regarded, and contributions to the general work to be distributed according to the proportions which have been designated by our General Assembly as applying to miscellaneous offerings, and care shall be taken that this special effort shall in no way conflict with or diminish the regular contributions to the treasuries of the several Boards.

“ That in connection with the Fund a Central Committee be appointed, to consist of seven ministers and six elders, whose headquarters shall be in Philadelphia ; which Committee shall have a general supervision of the work, shall publish appropriate literature for the furtherance of the object, making the widest possible distribution of the same, all expenses to be met out of the general contributions ; and that the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly be appointed Treasurer of the Fund, to serve without expense, except for such clerical assistance as may be required.”

The Moderator was authorized to enlarge this Committee, and subsequently did so in order that the entire Church might be represented.

The resolutions continuing this movement through the fiscal year were :

“ 1. That the General Assembly earnestly requests congregations and individual givers throughout the Church to prayerfully consider the enlarged needs and larger opportunities of the Boards, of the Theological Seminaries, of the academic, collegiate and charitable institutions of the Church, and to speedily provide for these greater needs as the Lord may enable them to do.

“ 2. That the General Assembly most earnestly calls upon the Synods and the Presbyteries to continue to prosecute this work during the ensuing year by organized effort and hearty coöperation with the General Committee on the Twentieth Century Memorial Fund.

“ 3. That in view of the longer time necessary to gather in the full results of this Twentieth Century Movement, the Assembly's Committee be continued for another year, to report to the General Assembly in 1902.

“ 4. That moved by the sense of gratitude to the great Head of the Church for His abundant and long-continued goodness to our Presbyterian denomination, and recognizing our contemporary responsibility for the relief of the suffering, the education of

the rising generation and the salvation of souls throughout the world, the General Assembly hereby expresses the deliberate judgment that it is the sacred duty and blessed privilege of the Church, at the beginning of the new century, to strengthen all the agencies and institutions employed in our work, by furnishing a sum sufficient for their enlarged endowment and adequate support; and, in addition, bringing the tithes into the storehouse of the Lord of Hosts, to seek by earnest prayer the fulfillment of the promise of abundant spiritual blessing attached to the faithful discharge of such a duty."

In obedience to the above instructions, the Committee has continued to prosecute this work on the lines of action laid down at the beginning, seeking to stimulate enlarged giving to the regular support of the Church and all its Boards and institutions, and to encourage special gifts for the increased endowments of these agencies.

In common with the whole Church, the Committee was called to mourn the death of the Rev. George T. Purves, D.D., LL.D., which occurred September 24, 1901. The first public meeting in the interest of this movement was held in the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, New York City, of which he was pastor, January 3, 1901. During the continuance of the work, until the time of his lamented death, Dr. Purves gave to the movement the wisdom of his valued counsel and the power of his ability and influence. The Committee expresses its grateful recognition of his faithful and efficient service.

In the early autumn of 1901, the Committee made the following announcement:

"The Committee, through the kind coöperation of the Directors of San Francisco Theological Seminary, has secured the services of the Moderator of the General Assembly, the Rev. Henry Collin Minton, D.D., as the representative of the Fund before the churches. It is an honorable distinction accorded to this movement that two Moderators of the Assembly in succession should seek through it to advance the welfare of all the interests of our beloved Church. The Committee acknowledges its indebtedness to both the Rev. Dr. Dickey and the Rev. Dr. Minton."

It is proper here to state that the Rev. Dr. Dickey, when Moderator and representative of the Committee, addressed large gatherings of Presbyterians in the following, among other, cities: Albany, N. Y., Atlantic City, N. J., Auburn, N. Y., Baltimore, Md., Bay City, Mich., Boston, Mass., Buffalo, N. Y., Chicago, Ill., Cincinnati, O., Cleveland, O., Dayton, O., Denver, Colo., Des Moines, Ia., Detroit, Mich., Harrisburg, Pa., Indianapolis, Ind., Kansas City, Mo., Los Angeles, Cal., Minneapolis, Minn., New York, N. Y., Oakland, Cal., Omaha, Neb., Philadelphia, Pa., Pittsburg, Pa., Portland, Ore., Saginaw, Mich., St. Louis, Mo., St. Paul, Minn., Salt Lake City, Utah, San Francisco, Cal., San José, Cal., Washington, D. C.

Dr. Minton also has made an extended tour of the country, having visited the principal cities East and West, many of the college towns and other centres of influence, and having faithfully, earnestly, and with marked effect presented the claims of our benevolent, educational and missionary work in all these places.

Two conferences between the Executive Section of the Committee and the Secretaries and other representatives of the Boards, were held in New York city during the month of November last, the outcome of which was the adoption of an elaborate plan for reaching givers in the Church from twenty or more different centres. It was not found feasible to carry out this plan in its entirety, but in several large cities representative gatherings of Presbyterian laymen, at tables supplied through the generosity of noble Presbyterians in sympathy with this movement, have listened to the stirring appeals of the Moderator, of college Presidents, Secretaries of the Boards and others, in behalf of the financial strengthening of our beloved Church, and these appeals have borne and will yet bear fruit. Such meetings were held in Albany, N. Y., Baltimore, Md., Boston, Mass., Buffalo, N. Y., Cedar Rapids, Ia., New York, N. Y., Peoria, Ill., Philadelphia, Pa., Pittsburg, Pa., Rochester, N. Y., St. Louis, Mo., San Francisco, Cal., Washington, D. C.

Through the year many special meetings of all the churches in particular cities have been held; the following-named places being included: Atlantic City, N. J., Auburn, N. Y., Bellevue, Neb., Berkeley, Cal., Bradford, Pa., Canandaigua, N. Y., Carlisle, Pa., Chicago, Ill., Cleveland, O., Chambersburg, Pa., Cumberland, Md., Dayton, O., Duluth, Minn., Easton, Pa., Enid, Okla., Erie, Pa., Evanston, Ill., Flagstaff, Ariz., Franklin, Pa., Harrisburg, Pa., Indianapolis, Ind., Jefferson City, Mo., La Crosse, Wis., Lancaster, Pa., Los Angeles, Cal., Minneapolis, Minn., Niles, Mich., Norristown, Pa., Omaha, Neb., Princeton, N. A special appeal to every pastor in the Church has recently been issued, as pastors have an access to the hearts of their people which none others can possibly possess.

The effort to pay off church debts, so auspiciously begun during the first year of this movement, has been prosecuted with success during the second year, and up to this time between six and seven hundred congregations have become free from these encumbrances; while as many as three hundred congregations have arranged to discharge their indebtedness in the near future. The Committee desire to emphasize the significance of this fact in connection with the much-desired advance in the financial interests of our Boards and institutions. At the present time there is in progress a concerted movement in the

city of New York to liquidate the combined debts of the churches of the Presbytery of New York. A similar movement has been proposed in the city of Philadelphia, for the few churches which are still in debt.

The history of our effort is this, that pastors, congregations, institutions and Boards, which have earnestly coöperated and have pressed their claims upon givers in the Church, have received substantial assistance, and those which have remained in a receptive attitude only have had but little increase of financial strength.

The Committee has not been directly engaged in soliciting funds, but in distributing information respecting, and stimulating gifts to, the several causes which are presented as the objects of beneficence. Each Board, institution, etc., has been expected to have its own agent in the field, and to do its own work.

It is a cause for hearty and general rejoicing that all of the Boards report an unusually prosperous financial year, and are not only without debt, but report good cash balances with which to begin the work of a new year.

Negatively, this movement for increased support of our denominational agencies at the beginning of a new century has demonstrated the great need of an enlarged spirit of unity and coöperation for work within our distinctive denominational lines. To move the Presbyterian Church by a general Committee and local Committees is a difficult task. Unity of action and concentration of effort are not readily accomplished in extensive movements of this kind under our system. Responsibility is so largely divided that it is not deeply felt. There is no permanent financial centre furnishing a point of unity for the general financial interests of the Church, and for the presentation of the proportionate needs of our various agencies. The Boards do constitute such centres to a limited extent, but in a general movement like the present they cannot provide the necessary facilities for such widespread activity. There is also the need of a better understanding, on the part of pastors, representative laymen and congregations, of the claims of our denominational agencies upon the hearts and hands of our people. Presbyterians are not supporting our Presbyterian institutions as these deserve support at their hands. Correspondence between the Committee and the Presbyterian college Presidents elicited the fact that, with all our boasted preëminence in educational matters, our college endowments are less by ten millions of dollars than the college endowments of the Methodist, Baptist or Congregational Churches. Correspondence between the Committee and representatives of the ten Theological Seminaries of our Church has drawn out into prominent showing, the inadequacy of the support provided for these absolutely essential sources of ministerial supply. And all the Boards are still handicapped, through lack of funds, for the large advance which is so obviously the duty of the hour.

Positively, this movement has been, to a considerable degree, a unifying force in the Church. The literature issued to the number of 200,000 statements and appeals, and placed in the hands of every pastor, and of representative people throughout the Church, so far as this was possible, have presented our denominational interests in their entirety, and the scope of much-needed Presbyterian gifts has been vastly enlarged before many eyes.

The larger and better support of our denominational agencies has been begun, at least. But this work is educational and therefore slow. Similar efforts have shown that considerable time is required to accomplish such an undertaking.

It is proper here to remind the Assembly that the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., during the past fourteen years has conducted certain movements, through the authority of the General Assembly, which have resulted advantageously to the Church, enabling it to more than hold its own against the spiritual and financial declensions which have affected quite seriously some other denominations.

For instance, in 1888 the Centenary Fund was instituted for the benefit of the Board of Ministerial Relief. Some six hundred thousand dollars were raised by the Assembly's Committee in charge for the Permanent Fund of that Board. This fund to-day amounts to \$1,531,000.

Again, in 1895, certain of the Boards being in debt, a movement was started known as the Quarter-Century Anniversary Reunion Fund. The Committee in charge of this fund secured \$384,000 from the churches, but the work begun by it was not finally completed until 1899, by the General Assembly at Minneapolis, Minn., when the debt of the Freedmen's Board was paid. Since that year no Board has reported a debt to the Assembly.

The Committee on the Twentieth Century Fund, in laying down its work, can only rejoice that another advance movement has been inaugurated by it, and can hope that the momentum given thereto will keep it moving onward, and gathering power as it moves, until the earnestly desired result shall have been accomplished in full.

The Committee has endeavored to faithfully discharge the task assigned to it, and again records its gratitude to all who have given coöperation. Particular mention is made of the gratifying fact that the entire expense of this important movement has been provided by gifts of certain members of the Committee and other individuals.

The Special Committee appointed by the last Assembly to raise the remaining indebtedness upon the Presbyterian Building in New York will make its own report, through its Chairman, Rev. Dr. R. S. Holmes. With this specific work this Committee was in hearty sympathy and cordially cooperated.

The Treasurer's Report to the last Assembly specified an

aggregate of \$3,377,031.10 to be credited to this Fund. Criticism concerning certain items was heard subsequently, and in certain quarters a disposition was shown to withdraw interest and effort on account of alleged unwarranted sums which were included. The Treasurer's Report, however, was made up chiefly from the Reports of the Presbyterial Committees, with which Committees the responsibility for returns lay. Perhaps some items in addition were reported, which represented sums of money that might have been given altogether apart from this movement, but in the time of a general stirring of the heart of the Church exact discrimination is difficult, a generous interpretation is readily made, and the specific requests of donors must control. The Committee had no desire to make a showing beyond actual facts and figures, but simply reported to the Assembly what had been reported to the Treasurer. The Report, with the exception of a few items, was correct, and there was therefore full reason for the profound joy which filled the hearts of Commissioners and of assembled Presbyterians in the Philadelphia Academy of Music, on the evening of the great day of review and outlook at the beginning of a new century, a year ago. The statement of the Treasurer for this second year of this effort will again gratify the Church.

Grateful to God for His marked favor upon its work, the Committee now surrenders this task completed, so far as was within the power of its members, and asks to be discharged, presenting two resolutions for adoption, namely:

1. That the Treasurer of this Fund be continued for a year, that he be empowered to receive any funds which may yet be contributed through him; that Reports of further contributions be made to him; that a summary of the Report up to the present time be printed in the *Minutes* for this year, and that the final Report be presented to the next Assembly.

2. That the General Assembly hereby again earnestly entreats the Church, which has been thoroughly instructed upon this matter, to complete the amounts so urgently requested by the Boards, the seminaries and the colleges of our Church as necessary to their adequate support and desired advance.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The Standing Committee on Home Missions presented a Supplementary Report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The Standing Committee on Home Missions would respectfully report, as supplemental to its Report previously made, as follows:

Your Committee has received papers referred to it by the General Assembly: (a) *Overture No. 43*, from the Presbytery of Albany, as to the "Consolidation of Weak Churches;" (b) *Overture No. 44*, from the Presbytery of Lackawanna, as to "Correspondence with the Reformed Calvinistic Church in Hungary;" (c) a Report from the Synod of Indiana as to the working of its plan for Home Mission work, with statistics covering the contri-

butions of all the churches in the Synod for the year past, and a tabulated statement exhibiting in detail all the contributions of the individual Presbyteries for the years since the adoption of the plan.

Your Committee would recommend :

In the matter of *Overture No. 43*, that no action be taken.

In the matter of *Overture No. 44*, that a Committee, consisting of Rev. William Henry Roberts, D.D., LL.D., as Chairman ; Rev. Arthur S. Hoyt, D.D., of Auburn Seminary ; Rev. Geerhardus Vos, D.D., of Princeton Seminary ; Rev. David R. Breed, D.D., of Western Seminary ; Rev. D. Schley Schaff, D.D., of Lane Seminary ; Rev. A. C. Zenos, D.D., of McCormick Seminary ; Rev. E. B. Hodge, D.D., Secretary of the Board of Education, and Rev. S. C. Logan, D.D., or others whom the Moderator may appoint, be directed to consider the condition of the immigrants from Hungary holding the Reformed Faith. This Committee shall have power to correspond with the Reformed Church of Hungary, in order to secure the coöperation of that Church in providing a wise and worthy evangelical care of these immigrants. The Committee shall also suggest plans whereby our Board of Education and our Theological Seminaries may prepare young men of foreign blood, for work among the people whom they represent, where missions may be established among them in our country.

This Committee shall report its work and recommendations to the next General Assembly.

In the matter of the Report referred to your Committee from the Synod of Indiana, we recommend that the papers be referred to the Board of Home Missions.

Your Committee has also considered the question of the record in enduring form of the proceedings in connection with the celebration of the Centennial of Home Missions, and we recommend that the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work be directed to print and issue in permanent form the proceedings of May 19 and 20, 1902, as they may be furnished by the Secretary of the Board of Home Missions.

In the matter of the Report of the Executive Commission of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches throughout the World holding the Presbyterian System—a part of which Report, numbered "*Paper No. 55*," from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, was referred to your Committee—we recommend : (1) That the attention of the Board of Home Missions be and hereby is specially called to the necessity for the adaptation of our Home Mission work to the changing conditions of our population ; (2) That the second Sabbath of September be set apart as a day for prayer for private and public schools ; and (3) That the Committee on Correspondence which has already been recommended in connection with the Overture from the Presbytery of Lackawanna, shall take into its consideration also the matter

submitted on page 3 of the Report of the Commission "in relation to work on the European Continent," and be directed to correspond also with the Rev. James I. Good, D.D., of Reading, Pa.

The Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries, through the Chairman, Rev. James F. Riggs, D.D., presented its Report, which was accepted, and after an address by the Chairman, was unanimously adopted. The Report is as follows :

The Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries respectfully presents the following Report :

Statements, statistical tables and formal Reports have been referred to us from twelve Theological Seminaries, and by us duly examined. We find in them many items of interest, and abundant reasons to thank God and to renew our zeal and courage. Especially do we rejoice in the fact that so full an opportunity is afforded to the young men of our beloved land and Church for theological study, inasmuch as these institutions are found in all parts of the country, pointing the way toward the high calling of a minister of Christ.

No one of these schools of the prophets is at a standstill. All are striving to make advances, and we extend our hearty sympathy to all. And while in several instances it would seem that the endowments administered and the property held constitute a very handsome total, yet we note the painful shrinkage in revenue due to the lower rate of interest payable in these days, and the pressing need of economy in methods which is the result, so that in the judgment of your Committee an appeal must be made on a grand scale to the renewed generosity of the Church. It is impossible to look with indifference on the distress of any school, or of any department of such a school, when it stands face to face with the prospect of being crippled for lack of financial resources.

The conditions reported in all these seats of sacred learning are hopeful in certain particulars, and the students are commended for "diligence, fidelity and general progress." Some gifts are reported, and there is evident a determination to carry forward the work. Yet we regard the diminished number of candidates for the ministry as a serious matter, and we commend a prayerful study of the facts alike to pastors and to parents, in the light of our Lord's injunction about the harvest and the laborers, in Matt. ix. 38. None of us liveth to himself and there is a vital connection between the home, the pulpit and the field; between parental care, ministerial efficiency and the triumph of the kingdom of Christ. We desire to see men enter this solemn covenant of service under a call which was heard by them and acknowledged by them from their earliest years, as in the familiar case of John the Baptist.

LINCOLN UNIVERSITY.—From Lincoln we learn that there were sixty-two students in the theological department during the year, that of these fourteen were graduated, and eight are already ordained. They are called to various fields of labor in the South, and two of them have accepted appointments in the Southern Presbyterian Church. Besides the students registered as members of the theological school, there are about seventy-five young men in the collegiate departments at Lincoln who are looking forward to the study of theology, so that the total is very encouraging—137 young men who expect to be preachers among the colored people.

Emphasis is laid in this Report on the fact that Lincoln continues to be loyal to the high standard required by our system, especially with reference to the deliverances of the General Assembly of 1876, when an Overture was presented looking toward the lowering of our standard in the effort to assist colored men. The Report adds: "The renunciation of higher education by the Negro minister would be spiritual suicide."

Gratitude is expressed for various gifts received during the year, notably one gift of \$5000 from Ralph Voorhees, and the necessities of the institution are set forth at length, showing that the sum of \$270,000 will be needed to put Lincoln really on its feet in an attitude for work to the best advantage. If this sum seem large, it is well to remember that the Negro is here, and the question is, What sort of a man and a citizen is he to be in the future? Dr. W. H. Weaver, of Baltimore, says: "It is too late to ask whether the Negro has any right to be here." And again, "Remember that the immigrants who came to this country from Africa constitute the only class of immigrants who came on a particular and a pressing invitation from the white man." The income of Lincoln is about ten thousand dollars, and there are seventeen thousand volumes in the library.

BIDDLE UNIVERSITY.—From this institution we have only a meagre statement of the number of students. There were twelve, and four of these were graduated. The explanation of this is that Biddle is a university, and it is impossible to dissociate the professors or the other parts of the system. The students who devote themselves to theology are after all sharers in the life of a secular school.

KENTUCKY SEMINARY.—The Presbyterian Theological Seminary of Kentucky makes its first Annual Report to this Assembly, making at the same time the same Report to the General Assembly of the Southern Church, now in session at Jackson, Miss. This institution is a consolidation of the two seminaries located at Louisville and Danville, and it is hoped that a higher degree of efficiency may be possible by this combination of the two. The indications are that the move is a successful one. But the details are not yet perfected as they will be shortly. The total valuation of the property is \$587,000. The income is

“estimated” at about \$23,000, and the expenses about the same amount.

The Assembly is requested to confirm and approve this consolidation (in accordance with the action taken last year), together with the transfers of directors and professors involved in the change.

SAN FRANCISCO SEMINARY.—This Seminary sends up its Thirty-first Annual Report. Eighteen students have been in attendance during the year, and eight were graduated. The seminary has been at a disadvantage in consequence of the loss of two professors and the temporary absence of another one. Dr. Kerr was called to New York City to enter upon work of a different sort in the American Tract Society. And Dr. Mackenzie resigned his chair to accept a call to the pastoral office in the metropolis. Further Dr. H. C. Minton, the Moderator of the Assembly of 1901, was detained in the East throughout the academic year in connection with work assigned him by the Assembly. The Faculty, however, made such arrangements as were practicable, and the departments were sustained with the help of local pastors who gave lectures on various subjects. The income for the year was about \$17,000, and the expenses somewhat larger. There is in this case an imperative call for generous gifts toward the permanent endowment of the seminary.

GERMAN SEMINARY OF NEWARK.—This seminary is under the care of the Presbytery of Newark. The Report this year is especially encouraging. The number of students remains about the same as usual, and general conditions are unchanged, except in one very important particular. This is the fact that the debt is entirely paid off. Four years ago there was a debt of more than \$9000. That has now been paid, and a small sum in addition turned in to the treasurer. This last item is added to the permanent funds of the school. This substantial achievement is largely due, under God, to the wise and patient efforts of one of the Bloomfield professors, the Rev. Henry J. Weber, Ph.D. The alumni of this seminary are widely scattered, and useful in so high a degree among their German brethren that our chief regret is that the number of students is so limited. But now, set free from the burden of debt, we doubt not the progress made will be steady and substantial.

LANE SEMINARY.—There have been during the year twenty-two students in attendance, and of these six were graduated. The officers of the seminary are hopeful for the future, and express themselves as much gratified with the “ability, fidelity and spirit” of the students. The income was about \$18,000, and the expenses about the same amount.

OMAHA SEMINARY.—This Report is marked with strong expressions of gratitude for the divine goodness during the past year. There have been eighteen students and six of these were graduated. The income is about \$7700, and the expenses about

the same, but a large addition has been made to the permanent funds of the institution by the donation of \$25,000 by Mrs. William Thaw, of Pittsburg. Hence the Report states that the total valuation of the seminary property now amounts to \$90,000. A most significant forward step has been taken in the plan which was recently set in operation giving instruction in the Bohemian language to students of that race. There are many Bohemians in the Northwest, and they call aloud for aid and sympathy of this practical sort. They need preachers of their own lineage, able to minister to them in the speech of their fatherland, and to do this in a way which should be a real blessing to a multitude is the aim of the new department begun at Omaha. Of course this necessitates enlargement in the quarters provided for the young men. One new building, costing about \$40,000, is now in process of erection, and this will probably meet the needs of the case for some time to come. It is well to remind the brethren of the action of the last Assembly, according to which an endowment of \$100,000 is very much needed. This action we desire to reaffirm and commend to all the churches.

GERMAN SEMINARY, NORTHWEST.—Twenty-four students have been in attendance, and five of these were graduated. The income of this Seminary is about five thousand dollars, and the expense account is just a trifle larger. But we wish to express our conviction that a very earnest appeal ought to be made in behalf of our work among the German population. The features of that work may not be so dramatic or so tragic as in the case of the Negro race or the work in the foreign field, but the fact is that we have millions of Germans in this country, and they need the Gospel. Dubuque is making an effort to solve this problem. "Mr. Thomas Foster, who has been on the Board almost from the organization of the seminary, and who is prevented by the infirmities of age from attending the meetings, was made honorary director." The Assembly is asked to approve of this action. The Rev. N. M. Steffens, D.D., whose election to the Chair of Theology was approved by the Assembly last year, and who has complied with the condition annexed by joining the Presbytery of Dubuque, was installed April 20, 1902.

AUBURN SEMINARY.—The governing Boards of Auburn Seminary report the death of four gentlemen who have been long identified with the work of that institution. The Rev. Samuel M. Hopkins, D.D., professor emeritus; Rev. Ezra A. Huntington, D.D., professor emeritus; Rev. Levi Parsons, D.D., the President of the Board, and the Hon. Charles C. Dwight, LL.D., the Vice-President of the Board, have been called to enter into their rest. We sympathize with our brethren of that seminary in this bereavement and loss, and we recognize the long and faithful services so willingly rendered, and so emphatically approved. Fifty-eight students have been in attendance,

and the class recently graduated had nineteen members. The expenses were \$41,000, that is a little in excess of the ordinary income; but a donation of \$17,950 brought up the income to a point far above the average, and thus we rejoice to see the permanent funds of the seminary augmented to a gratifying extent. Prof. Hoyt is now enjoying a year's leave of absence, and his place is supplied by the Rev. Charles E. Robinson, D.D. The Rev. Harry Lathrop Reed, of Albany, Oreg., has been elected assistant professor in the department of New Testament Literature. The attention of the Assembly is called to this fact as one which comes under the rule, and requires the confirmation of the Assembly.

WESTERN SEMINARY.—The Report from this seminary shows that the Directors and the Faculty are giving most careful and detailed attention to the students, especially with regard to the requirements of those who do not bring college diplomas with them. A Special Committee has been appointed to take charge of the examination of such students. Mention is made also of a Convention held to advance the interests of evangelistic work, of special lectures, of the Newberry Scholarship, visits of missionaries, of a new professor, Dr. James A. Kelso, and of the twenty-five years' service of Dr. Jeffers. Sixty-four students were in attendance during the year, and of these nineteen were graduated in the usual way. The income of the seminary was \$33,000, and the expenses slightly larger. But there is one item in this Report to which we are most happy to draw the attention of the General Assembly. We quote the language of Dr. S. J. Fisher, the Secretary of the Board. "During the year the President of the Board, Mr. S. P. Harbison, has offered to present the seminary \$50,000, unrestricted as to its use, on certain conditions which are being met by the Trustees." Mr. Harbison accompanied his offer with the generous statement that the interest on the donation should be at the use of the Board from the time of the acceptance of the offer, without regard to the time required for the arrangement of the conditions. Comment on such gifts is superfluous, and we need only say that the Assembly unites with the seminary in hearty expressions of its appreciation to the donor.

MCCORMICK SEMINARY.—One hundred and twelve students have pursued their studies at McCormick this past year, and thirty-nine have been graduated in regular course. The income is nearly \$62,000, and the expenditures about the same.

Toward the close of the academical year the seminary was deprived of the services of one professor. The Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., Professor of Ecclesiastical History, offered his resignation to the Board March 4, in order to accept a call to the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church of New York City. This resignation was accepted, and Prof. Zenos was transferred from the Chair of Biblical Theology to that of Ecclesiastical

History. The Rev. Prof. James S. Riggs, D.D., of Auburn Theological Seminary, was elected to the Chair of New Testament Literature, to succeed Dr. Marquis, but Dr. Riggs has since declined this appointment.

One matter of very great importance is brought to the notice of the Assembly by a minute adopted unanimously May 1, 1902, at the regular annual meeting of the Directors. This minute sets forth the wish of the Directors in the following sentence, to be incorporated as an amendment in Article ii, Section 4, of the Constitution:

“The Board shall have power to elect a President of the seminary, who shall be a member of the Faculty, and subject to all the rules and regulations which apply to other members of the Faculty.”

PRINCETON SEMINARY.—The Report from Princeton gives us a very full and detailed statement in regard to the students, one hundred and thirty-seven in number, and in general of all the work done. Of these students forty-two received the diploma of the seminary. The income for the year was over \$70,000, and the expenditures over \$73,000, so that a deficit of \$3200 appears in their Report. The total property of the seminary, including the valuable real estate, foots up a handsome total of \$1,949,483. The Stone Lectures were delivered this year by the Rev. Henry C. Minton, D.D., of San Francisco, and his subject was “The Cosmos and the Logos.” The Students’ lecturer on Missions was the Rev. C. A. R. Janvier, of India. The Rev. William M. Paxton, D.D., resigned his professorship of Homiletics and was elected Professor Emeritus. The Rev. W. P. Armstrong has been appointed instructor in the department of New Testament Literature, and the Rev. C. W. Hodge appointed as assistant in the department of Dogmatic Theology. A full statement is given in this Report in regard to the joint action of Directors, Trustees and Faculty, asking for permission so to amend the Plan of the Seminary as to make possible the election of a President. This officer is to be subject to the rules of the Directors, and is to represent the institution before the Church. All details are given in the text of the Report, together with the modifications which would be necessary in the wording of the Constitution.

The following resolutions are presented for adoption:

Resolved, 1. That the election or reelection of all Directors, Trustees and Professors, as reported from the seminaries, wherever necessary, be and hereby is approved.

Resolved, 2. That the amendments of the Plan of the Princeton Theological Seminary, proposed by the Board of Directors of that institution in their Annual Report to this General Assembly, be and the same are hereby adopted.

Resolved, 3. That the amendments of the Constitution of the McCormick Theological Seminary of the Presbyterian Church,

proposed by the Board of Directors of that institution in their Annual Report to this General Assembly, be and the same are hereby approved.

Resolved, 4. That we rejoice in the tokens of an advancing liberality in the Church, and commend the pressing needs of all our seminaries to the attention and prayerful sympathy of men whom God has blessed with wealth.

Resolved, 5. That this Assembly earnestly approves the faithful work now being done among our German brethren in order to spread the Gospel among them. And we do heartily commend the effort now made to secure a substantial endowment for the two seminaries at Dubuque, Ia., and Bloomfield, N. J.

Resolved, 6. *Whereas*, The Trustees* of the General Assembly have reported that the title to certain real estate held for the use and benefit of the Western Theological Seminary at Allegheny City, in the State of Pennsylvania, is vested by various deeds partly in the General Assembly, partly in the Trustees of the General Assembly, partly in the seminary and partly in the Trustees of the seminary; and

Whereas, The Trustees of the seminary have requested the Trustees of the General Assembly to convey to the former body all the right, title and interest of the latter body in said real estate, and to ratify and confirm a certain perpetual lease affecting a portion of said real estate executed to Allegheny City by the Trustees of the seminary on December 3, 1849; and

Whereas, The General Assembly believe that such conveyance and ratification should be made on the terms and conditions hereinafter specified; therefore,

Resolved, That the "Trustees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America" are hereby instructed to cause to be executed and delivered to "The Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America" a deed of conveyance and ratification, in due form of law, for the purpose and to the effect aforesaid; *Provided, however*, That the said "The Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America" shall, contemporaneously with the execution and delivery of such deed, and in accordance with the proposition they have already voluntarily made, agree, certify and declare, in due form of law, and in consideration of said conveyance and ratification, that "the property of said seminary, real and personal, as well that which it now has or is entitled to as that which it may hereafter acquire by gift, devise, bequest, purchase or otherwise, is and shall forever continue to be held, used and employed in trust for the use and benefit of said seminary in carrying out the purpose of theological education according to the standards of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and

subject at all times to the authority, control and direction of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America as to the use and disposition thereof;" and *Provided further*, That said Trustees of said seminary shall also, in due form of law, agree to submit annually to the General Assembly a full and true Statement and Report of their finances and investments.

Resolved, 7. That in view of the restless spirit of the times in which we live, and the dangerous influence exerted by some revolutionary theories, we do affectionately exhort the governing Boards of all our seminaries to exercise the utmost caution in the election of professors. And in view of the assaults recently made on that which we regard as vital truth as to the nature and inspiration of the Scriptures, and particularly in view of assaults on the integrity and authority of the Old Testament, we do reaffirm the historic faith of the Church in the Oracles of God as the veracious record of His dealings with men from the beginning of human history. It is our unshaken belief, that these sacred books were written by holy men of old, who spake as they were moved by the Holy Spirit, and that this fact has the solemn witness of the apostles and of the Lord Jesus Christ Himself. All of which is respectfully submitted,

A popular meeting in the interests of Young People's Societies was held, and addresses were delivered by Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., Mr. John Willis Baer, Rev. Graham Lee and Rev. M. Egbert Koonce, Ph.D.

A popular meeting was also held in the interests of Temperance in the Central Presbyterian Church.

SATURDAY, May 24, 9 o'clock A.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

The Judicial Commission on *Judicial Case No. 2* reported its findings in said case, which were entered upon the Minutes of the Assembly. They are as follows:

FLEMING VS. THE SYNOD OF ILLINOIS AND THE PRESBYTERY
OF CHICAGO.

The findings of the Judicial Commission in *Judicial Case No. 2* are as follows:

1. In the case of the appeal of the Rev. Edward T. Fleming from the judgment of the Synod of Illinois, the appeal is not sustained, and the judgment of the inferior judicatory is affirmed.

2. In the case of the appeal of the Rev. Edward T. Fleming from the judgment of the Presbytery of Chicago, the appeal is not sustained, and the judgment of the inferior judicatory is affirmed.

3. In the case of the complaint of the Rev. Edward T. Fleming against the proceedings of the Presbytery of Chicago, the complaint is not entertained, since "a complaint is a written representation made to the next superior judicatory" (B. D., 83), which in this case is the Synod of Illinois.

4. A communication from the Commission of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches throughout the World holding the Presbyterian System, Western Section, appointing the Rev. W. H. Roberts, D.D., to represent the Alliance at the General Assembly.

5. A communication from the Stated Clerk of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Mexico, appointing Rev. George Johnson and Rev. Isaac Boyce, as fraternal delegates.

Your Committee would therefore recommend :

1. That these Delegates from other Churches be invited to address the Assembly.

2. That, upon the recommendation of Rev. Dr. Roberts, the Rev. George D. Matthews, D.D., General Secretary, who is present, be invited to address the Assembly in behalf of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches.

3. That the Moderator appoint Delegates to convey the fraternal greetings of this Assembly to the following bodies : To the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America ; to the General Convention of the Reformed Episcopal Church ; to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in America.

In connection with said Report addresses of fraternal greeting were delivered by Rev. J. M. Buckley, D.D., and U. S. Senator Beveridge, of Indiana, Delegates from the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church ; Rev. Isaac Boyce, Delegate from the Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Mexico, and Rev. G. D. Matthews, D.D., General Secretary of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches throughout the World holding the Presbyterian System. A letter was also read from Pres. Austin Scott, LL.D., the Delegate from the Reformed Church in America.

A paper from veterans of the Civil War present at the Assembly was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures. Also proposed amendments to Rules seven (7) and nine (9) of the Rules for Judicatories.

The Standing Committee on Aid for Colleges presented a Report upon a paper referred to it, which was adopted, and is as follows :

Whereas, The intrenchment of Mormonism in our Western States is becoming each year a more serious and menacing problem ; and

Whereas, This false system is gradually but surely fastening itself with tenacious hold upon this fair Republic ; therefore be it

Resolved, That we take pleasure in the fact that our great

Church has been foremost in seeking to supply the need of Christian education as a counteracting influence to the evils of false teaching and practice in Utah; we rejoice in the work accomplished by means of the mission schools and academies in that region of our country; and in order to conserve the beneficent results of this work and give completeness to our Christian school system in Utah, the General Assembly commends to the favorable consideration and generous benefactions of our people the Westminster College of Salt Lake City, a thoroughly Christian and missionary institution, founded by Dr. Sheldon Jackson, for the training and equipment of future workers in the Mormon field, and for the emancipation of the many victims of that cruel and blighting system of false doctrine.

The Standing Committee on Finance, through the Chairman, Mr. L. H. Severance, presented its Report, which was accepted and adopted, except the recommendation of election, which was deferred until Monday next. The Report is as follows:

The Committee on Finance respectfully submits the following Report:

It has examined the financial statement of the Trustees of the General Assembly for the past year and find that the funds in their hands on March 31, 1902, were as follows:

In addition to the above, the Trustees hold in trust nine premises in the City of Philadelphia and a real estate mortgage of \$5000 for the benefit of the Board of Ministerial Relief, and one other house and lot in trust for the benefit of the Mariners' Church. These do not appear on the books of the Trustees as representing money value. There has been received during the past year in payment of mortgages held by the Trustees \$81,875, and of this amount \$61,400 has been reinvested. The total income for the year was \$39,220.09, an increase of \$2095.56 over the previous year. The rate of interest received averaged four and a half per cent. The cost of administration has been \$1742.20, a decrease over the year previous of \$94.85. The

taxes and repairs on properties coming into the Trustees' hands under foreclosure amounted to \$1691.91. The Treasurer has in his hands \$415.96. The net income for the year has been divided among the beneficiaries as follows:

The expenses of the past year have exceeded the receipts by \$22,931.25.

The account of the Stated Clerk with the Boards of the Church for printing, binding and mailing their Reports to the last Assembly, for which he has been reimbursed by the Boards, shows a total expenditure of \$2496.77. There remains a balance of \$55.22 to the credit of the Boards in this Fund.

All of these statements with their vouchers, both of the

Trustees and the Stated Clerk, have, by the direction of the General Assembly of 1899, been examined by a public accountant and auditor, and certified by him as correct in every particular.

The Committee gratefully recognizes the able and efficient services so generously given by the Trustees in their care of the great trust committed to them.

They also bear testimony to the valuable service rendered by our ever-faithful Stated Clerk.

During the past month death has called to his eternal home George Junkin, Esq., long a member of the Board of Trustees. It is incumbent upon this Committee to make a nomination to fill the vacancy. We therefore present the name of Charles H. Matthews, Esq., and recommend to this General Assembly his election to the vacant position.

We also recommend that the Stated Clerk be authorized to pay the sum of \$765 as a contribution toward the expenses of the Pan-Presbyterian Alliance, of which the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America is a member.

The Permanent Committee on the Next Place of Meeting presented its Report, which was accepted. A motion to adopt was made, and was amended by a motion to substitute the "Second Church, Cleveland," for "Immanuel Church, Los Angeles." The Stated Clerk made a definite statement of the financial condition of the Assembly, showing that a meeting at Los Angeles would require an increase of the apportionment by one cent per communicant, in addition to the surplus in the Treasury.

Pending the discussion of the amendment the hour of adjournment arrived.

The Assembly adjourned until Monday, May 26, at 9 A.M., and was closed with prayer.

MONDAY, May 26, 9 o'clock A.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with devotional exercises.

The Minutes of Saturday's session were read and approved.

The continuation of the consideration of the Report of the Committee on Next Place of Meeting was made the Order for 10 o'clock, and the time to be given to its consideration was limited to twenty minutes.

The Standing Committee on Ministerial Relief presented a Report on certain Overtures referred to it, which was adopted, and is as follows :

The Committee on Ministerial Relief presents the following Supplementary Report on Overtures and other matters submitted to it, viz.:

1. An Overture from the Presbytery of Los Angeles, requesting "that ministers received from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States may be honorably retired with the same rights and privileges as to relief, as if the whole term of service had been in connection with the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America." Your Committee recommends this Overture to be answered in the negative.

2. An Overture from the Presbytery of Elizabeth concerning the Westminster House at Perth Amboy, N. J. Your Committee recommends that this Overture be answered in the negative.

3. The Committee further recommends that the request of the Board of Ministerial Relief to close the Westminster House at Perth Amboy at its earliest convenience, and to transfer such of the guests as would so desire to the Merriam House at Newton, N. J., be granted.

4. The Committee also recommend that the Board be permitted to make such verbal changes in the paragraph of its Report to the General Assembly which concerns the Presbytery of Elizabeth as may be deemed advisable.

5. While your Committee recommends the General Assembly to deny the request of the Presbytery of Elizabeth, it recognizes with gratitude the liberality, the faithful labor and the deep interest, which said Presbytery has always manifested in behalf of the Board of Ministerial Relief.

The Standing Committee on Bills and Overtures presented a Report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows :

Overture No. 48, on the Revised Bible, American edition, from the Presbytery of Columbia. It is recommended that the following answer be made, that inasmuch as previous Assemblies have taken liberal action with reference to revised versions of the Bible, no further action is necessary.

Overture No. 53, on Young People's Societies, from the Synod of New Jersey. It is recommended that a Special Committee of the Assembly be appointed, consisting of four ministers and three elders, to consider and, if the way be clear, to formulate some plan whereby, without interfering with the interdenominational fellowships now enjoyed by them, the young people of our

churches may have the results of their work regularly presented to the Assembly, and may receive the benefit of the guidance and inspiration of the Church as a whole as represented in the Assembly, the Committee to report to the Assembly of 1903.

The Order of the Day, the Next Place of Meeting, was taken up, and the Report of the Committee was adopted. The Report is as follows :

The Permanent Committee on Next Place of Meeting respectfully report as follows :

The Committee has received invitations from the Immanuel Church of Los Angeles, the Presbytery of Los Angeles and many organizations of that city, and also from the Second Presbyterian Church of Cleveland and the Presbytery of Cleveland, for the meeting of the next Assembly.

On behalf of the Assembly, hearty thanks are returned to the brethren who have presented both of these hospitable and cordial invitations.

The Committee find that their predecessors last year recommended Los Angeles as the place of meeting for 1903. At the same time we find that to hold the Assembly on the Pacific Coast will cost at least \$40,000 for mileage, more than the expenses of this year. We feel that while this action of last year's Committee must in a certain sense influence our action, we cannot make any recommendation to the Assembly without a full statement of the conditions involved.

The Assembly must in the end consider and decide the matter, with a view to promote the best interests of the whole Church.

We recommend that the Assembly of 1903 be held at Los Angeles, on condition

1. That proper railroad arrangements are made.
2. That the Los Angeles churches and Committee meet all expenses for entertainment and guarantee the Assembly against loss.
3. That an additional apportionment of one cent for the Mileage Fund be made.

These three conditions must stand or fall together.

The Committee has received several invitations for 1904, which we acknowledge with thanks, but to which we do not feel that we are empowered by the Assembly to reply.

The Committee would also recommend the following additional resolutions :

1. That the railroad arrangements be placed as customary in the hands of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, who shall have entire charge of the same in all matters.
2. That the pastor and Session of the Immanuel Church, Los

Angeles, Cal., with the Stated Clerk of the Assembly, be the Local Committee of Arrangements, with power to add to their number.

The Supplementary Report on Proof-texts of the Special Committee on Revision was taken up, adopted, and is as follows :

The Committee on the Revision of the Credal Statements of the Church considered the matter of proof-texts for the proposed new chapters of the Confession, and herewith submits to the General Assembly the result of its deliberations for such use as in the future may appear to be wise.

It is recommended that the proof-texts of the proposed new chapters of the Confession of Faith, selected by the Revision Committee of 1892, be retained, but with the following additions and omissions :

In Section i, on the chapter "Of the Work of the Holy Spirit," we recommend the omission of John xiv. 16-17, Matthew xii. 31-32, and the addition of the third verse of Ephesians iv to the fourth and thirtieth verses as given. In Section ii no change. In Section iii the omission of Acts xxiv. 25. In Section iv the omission of John xiv. 16-17, Ephesians iii. 16 and iv. 30, and under No. 2 the addition of Romans v. 5 and Ephesians iii. 16, and that the reference under No. 2 begin with Ephesians i. 13. In Section v the omission of Ephesians iii. 10, of 1 Timothy iii. 15, Ephesians iv. 3-4, Joel ii. 28, and the addition under No. 1 of Colossians i. 18 and Ephesians iv. 15-16.

As to the proposed new chapter "Of the Love of God and Missions," we recommend no change in the proof-texts of Section i; in Section ii that in place of John iii. 11, probably a misprint, John iii. 16 be substituted, and that the following omissions be made: Luke xix. 41, 42, Mark xi. 1-15 and Acts xvi. 14, and under No. 3 we would add to John iv. 14, verses 9-14, same chapter; to Hebrews ii. 4 we would add the third verse also; in Section iii we recommend the omission of Proverbs i. 24-26; in Section iv no change.

The thanks of the Assembly were tendered to the Special Committee on the Revision of the Confession of Faith, and the Committee was discharged.

The Assembly, by unanimous consent, authorized the Stated Clerk to cast, and he did cast, the ballot of the Assembly for the following persons, viz.:

For *Members of the Board of the Church Erection Fund: Ministers*—Ford C. Ottman, John Reid, D.D., Robert F. Sample, D.D., Charles J. Young, D.D.; *Elders*—William N. Crane, Ezra P. Hoyt, M.D., George E. Sterry; and Elder Henry J. Bronson to fill the vacancy in the Class of 1903 caused by the resignation of Mr. F. W. Baldwin.

For *Trustee of the General Assembly*—Charles H. Matthews, of Philadelphia, Pa.

The Judicial Commission on *Judicial Case No. 1* reported its findings in said case, which were entered upon the Minutes of the Assembly. They are as follows:

JUDICIAL CASE NO. 1.

The Judicial Commission to which was referred the appeal of certain parties claiming to be the Session of the Presbyterian Church of the Covenant of Williamsport, Pa., against the Synod of Pennsylvania, and the complaint of Rev. James Carter and others against the Synod of Pennsylvania, respectfully report as follows:

1. Said Commission having examined said appeal and complaint above referred to, and having found that both involved practically the same questions, resolved unanimously to consolidate the two and hear them together as one appeal.

2. Said appeal and complaint were found to present a large number of purely technical questions which, except as hereinafter set forth, were not considered by the Commission and are not now decided. The Commission, after considering the record and hearing the parties, unanimously decided that it was its duty, as far as possible, to disregard such technicalities and to decide speedily and definitely the merits of this unfortunate case, which has for so many years vexed the Church of the Covenant of Williamsport, Pa., the Presbytery of Northumberland, and the Synod of Pennsylvania, and which has been before three General Assemblies.

3. All the parties to said proceedings were heard, or appeared before the Commission and waived their right to be heard, and consented that the Commission might decide the case upon its merits, upon the papers and records submitted. The record was carefully considered and every effort was made to get a full understanding of the issues involved and to arrive at a definite and positive conclusion, which would settle finally the serious controversies which have threatened to disrupt the Church of the Covenant.

4. The Commission finds that the action of the Presbytery of Northumberland, taken at its meeting held June 10, 1901, upon the Report of a Committee appointed to consider the condition of the affairs of the Church of the Covenant of Williamsport,

was a faithful endeavor on its part to carry out the spirit of the decision of the General Assembly of 1900 in certain appeals which came before said Assembly involving the same parties and practically the same questions; but that in its action said Presbytery transgressed its constitutional limitations in assuming to dictate to the congregation of the said Church of the Covenant the manner in which a new Board of Elders should be elected, and who should be elected to the office of ruling elder in said church. All proceedings under said action of Presbytery have been stated, pending this appeal.

5. This Commission finds further, that the plan adopted by the Presbytery of Northumberland, except as herein modified, will settle the questions vexing the church finally and equitably. The General Assembly, therefore, without sustaining either said appeal or said complaint otherwise, does

First, Direct the Synod of Pennsylvania to instruct the Presbytery of Northumberland to modify its action taken at the meeting held June 10, 1901, relating to the calling of a congregational meeting for the election of new elders for the Church of the Covenant at Williamsport, Pa., by striking out of said action all that part thereof relating to the manner of the election and the parties to be elected, leaving to the congregation its constitutional right to elect such parties as to it may seem best.

Second, Vacate the stay of the proceedings under the said action of the Presbytery of Northumberland taken at said meeting on the 10th day of June, 1901, and direct the Synod of Pennsylvania to instruct the Presbytery of Northumberland to call a congregational meeting of said Church of the Covenant of Williamsport, Pa., to elect new elders for said church in accordance with the resolution of said Presbytery adopted June 10, 1901, as above modified, which new elders, when elected, shall be the Session of said Church of the Covenant and shall supersede all those now claiming to be elders in said church; and further, to instruct said Presbytery to carry into effect the action taken by said Presbytery on June 10, 1901, except as now modified.

Rev. George L. Shearer, D.D., Secretary of the American Tract Society, addressed the Assembly in the interests of the work of said Society. The following resolution was then adopted:

The Assembly, having heard the Report of the American Tract Society for the past year, as presented by the Rev. George L. Shearer, D.D., Secretary, congratulates the Society on the enlargement of its operations, and in view of the extent and excellence of its Christian literature in English and the many languages used by immigrants; its gratuitous distribution of

its publications through Home Missionaries and other Christian workers; its colportage among the foreigners, Mormons and other exceptional classes, and its invaluable aid to Foreign Missions by printing works in 153 languages, hereby renews its commendation of said Society, and recommends that our several churches make an annual offering for it, and also that each Presbytery appoint a Standing Committee on its work.

The following action was proposed with relation to the Presbyterian Historical Society, and after an address by DeBennville K. Ludwig, Ph.D., the Treasurer of the Society, was adopted:

Whereas, This year is the semi-centennial of the Presbyterian Historical Society, organized during the meeting of the General Assembly in Charleston, S. C., in 1852, and located now in the Witherspoon Building in Philadelphia; and

Whereas, The work of the Society in gathering and preserving the history of the Presbyterian Church in the United States has been increasing yearly in interest and efficiency; therefore

This General Assembly, following in the footsteps of previous Assemblies, most heartily endorses the work of the Society, and most earnestly commends it to the attention and coöperation of the members of our churches throughout the land, so that they may send to the Society the Minutes, histories, biographies, portraits and pictures bearing on their progress, and that they may aid in the financial support of the Society either by endowments or by membership fees.

The Standing Committee on Bills and Overtures presented a Report, which was amended, adopted, and is as follows:

With reference to the paper dealing with the veterans of the Civil War, it is recommended that inasmuch as the person presenting this paper requests leave to withdraw it, such permission be granted.

Upon certain changes in Rules for Judicatories Nos. 7 and 9, it is recommended that, owing to the lateness of the date of the presentation of this paper, it be referred to the next General Assembly.

The Stated Clerk presented to the Assembly the need of action on the matter of securing answers from all the Presbyteries, more especially those in foreign mission lands, to the Overtures on Revision. The subject was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures. The Committee presented the following Report, which was adopted:

Whereas, All Presbyteries are equally entitled to vote upon every Overture transmitted to the General Assembly; and

Whereas, A failure to vote upon such Overtures is equivalent to a negative vote ; therefore

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk be instructed to make special requisition upon the foreign mission Presbyteries, which not unfrequently decline to exercise their rights in this regard, to consider and vote promptly upon all the Overtures relating to the Revision of the Confession of Faith and report their action to him.

The Committee to Canvass the Vote of the Presbyteries on Overtures sent down by the Assembly of 1901 reported. The Report was adopted, and is as follows :

Your Committee to Canvass the Votes of the Presbyteries on the Overtures sent down by the last Assembly, respectfully report the following as the result of their examination of the papers submitted by the Stated Clerk :

1. *Overture on Judicial Commissions.*—The Overture reads—*Overture No. 1 (a)*. Shall Chapter xiii of the Book of Discipline be changed so as to read :

CHAPTER XIII. OF JUDICIAL COMMISSIONS.

118.—Judicial Commissions as herein established shall have jurisdiction only of judicial cases affecting church members or officers.

119.—Any Presbytery or Synod may at any time elect a Judicial Commission of not less than five ministers and ruling elders for a Presbytery, and not less than nine ministers and ruling elders for a Synod, and may transmit to such Commission any particular judicial case for hearing and determination.

120.—Every Judicial Commission of a Presbytery or Synod shall elect its own Moderator and Clerk; shall sit at such times and places as it may deem proper; shall keep full and correct minutes of its proceedings in a book to be provided for that purpose; shall have all the powers prescribed by, and conduct all its proceedings according to, the rules applicable to the trial of a judicial case before the judicatory appointing the Commission; and shall report its decision to the said appointing judicatory as soon as possible after it shall have been agreed upon. The decision, from the date of its Report to the appointing judicatory, shall be held to be the final judgment of that judicatory.

121.—A quorum of every such Judicial Commission shall be for a Presbytery three, of whom at least two shall be ministers, and for a Synod seven, of whom at least four shall be ministers.

122.—The minutes of every such Judicial Commission, together with all evidence taken in the case transmitted to it, if any there be, shall be duly authenticated by the clerk of the Commission, and be forthwith filed with the Stated Clerk of the

appointing judicatory; and such Stated Clerk shall preserve the same as a part of the records of the appointing judicatory, and shall send up the same annually to the next superior judicatory for review.

123.—The court of last resort for the hearing and determination of judicial cases, which the General Assembly shall determine not to try itself, shall be styled "The Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly," and shall be composed of eight ministers and seven ruling elders, who shall be elected by the General Assembly. At the first election fifteen persons shall be elected, five to serve for one year, five for two years, and five for three years, and thereafter five persons shall be elected annually to serve for three years. Any vacancy may be filled by the General Assembly at any meeting thereof by the election of a person to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

124.—The said Permanent Judicial Commission shall annually elect a Moderator from among its own members; shall, unless otherwise ordered by the General Assembly, fix the times and places for the hearing of cases; shall have power to require the attendance of parties and witnesses, and shall also have the powers prescribed by, and conduct all its proceedings according to, the rules applicable to the trial of a judicial case before the General Assembly. All appeals and references in judicial cases taken to the General Assembly may, if found to be in order by the General Assembly, be submitted to said Permanent Judicial Commission, which shall then hear and give final judgments therein.

125.—Ten members of the said Permanent Judicial Commission shall constitute a quorum, of whom, however, at least five shall be ministers.

126.—The Clerk of said Permanent Judicial Commission shall be the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, who shall file all papers relating to the business of the Commission, keep full and correct minutes of its proceedings and judgments in a book to be provided for the purpose, and report to each General Assembly all judgments rendered by the Commission during the last preceding year, together with all written opinions of the members of the Commission assenting to or dissenting from such judgments. He shall serve without salary and may from time to time appoint an assistant to attend the sessions of the Commission and discharge the duties of the Clerk, when the Stated Clerk is himself necessarily absent.

127.—The expenses of the said Permanent Judicial Commission, and of its officers, shall be defrayed, upon proper vouchers, by the Treasurer of the General Assembly from its Contingent Fund.

1. (b.) In addition, as a part of *Overture No. 1*, Shall the Form of Government, Chapter XII, Section iv, be changed so as to read:

iv. The General Assembly shall receive and issue all appeals, complaints and references that affect the doctrine or Constitution of the Church, which may be regularly brought before them from the inferior judicatories, except that appeals and references in judicial cases, if found in order, may be submitted to the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly, as provided for in the Book of Discipline. They shall review the records of every Synod, and approve or censure them; they shall give their advice and instruction in all cases submitted to them, in conformity with the Constitution of the Church; and they shall constitute the bond of union, peace, correspondence, and mutual confidence among all our churches.

The Presbyteries voting in the affirmative are Aberdeen, Alaska, Allahabad, Athens, Baltimore, Binghamton, Birmingham, Bloomington, Box Butte, Brooklyn, Cairo, Cedar Rapids, Chippewa, Columbus, Council Bluffs, Dakota Indian, Denver, Detroit, Dubuque, East Florida, East Oregon, Ebenezer, Emporia, Erie, Flint, Fort Wayne, French Broad, Gunnison, Hastings, Helena, Holston, Iowa City, Jersey City, Kearney, Kiamichi, Kingston, Knox, La Crosse, Lahore, Lake Superior, Logansport, Long Island, Lyons, Maumee, Minneapolis, Muncie, Nebraska City, New Brunswick, New Castle, Niobrara, North River, North Texas, Northumberland, Oakland, Olympia, Ozark, Peking, Philadelphia, Portland, Puget Sound, Red River, Rock River, Sacramento, Santa Fé, Schuyler, Sequoyah, Siam, Sioux City, Solomon, Southern Dakota, Southern Oregon, Spokane, Steubenville, Stockton, Syracuse, Trinity, Union, Utica, Walla Walla, Washington City, West Jersey, White Water, Winnebago, Yukon—84.

The Presbyteries voting in the affirmative, with exceptions, are Benicia, Boston, Freeport, Lackawanna, Nassau, Niagara, Otsego, Pittsburgh, San José, Santa Barbara, Steuben, Troy, Winona—13.

The Presbyteries taking no action or making no Report are twenty-three in number.

Not having received a majority vote of the Presbyteries, it is recommended that this Overture be declared not adopted.

2. *Overture on Judicial Commissions, No. 2.* The Overture reads:

Overture No. 2. Shall the following amendments or alterations of the Book of Discipline be approved and adopted, viz.:

2. (a.) Insert a new Section in the Book of Discipline as follows, to be numbered Section 5:

5.—Every case in which there is a charge of an offense against a church member or officer, shall be known, in its original and appellate stages, as a judicial case. Every other case shall be known as a non-judicial or administrative case.

2. (b.) Amend and alter Section 83 of the Book of Discipline, so as to read:

83.—A complaint is a written representation by one or more persons, subject and submitting to the jurisdiction of an inferior judicatory, to the next superior judicatory against a particular delinquency, action or decision of such inferior judicatory in a non-judicial or administrative case.

2. (c.) Amend and alter Section 85 of the Book of Discipline, so as to read:

85.—Whenever a complaint is entered in a non-judicial or administrative case against a decision of a judicatory by at least one-third of the members recorded as present when the decision was made, the execution of the decision shall be stayed until the final issue of the case by the next superior judicatory.

2. (d.) Amend and alter Section 87 of the Book of Discipline, by omitting the last clause of the first sentence and the whole of the second, so that it shall read:

87.—If the higher judicatory finds that the complaint is in order, and that sufficient reasons for proceeding to its determination have been assigned, the next step shall be to read the record of the action complained of, and so much of the record of the lower judicatory as may be pertinent; then the parties shall be heard, and after that, the judicatory shall proceed to consider and determine the case.

2. (e.) Amend and alter Section 88 of the Book of Discipline, so as to read:

88.—The effect of a complaint, in a non-judicial or administrative case, if sustained, may be the reversal, in whole or in part, of the action or decision complained of. When a complaint is sustained, the lower judicatory shall be directed how to dispose of the matter.

2. (*f.*) Amend and alter Section 89 of the Book of Discipline, by striking out the words "in cases non-judicial," so that the Section will read :

89.—The parties to a complaint shall be known respectively as Complainant and Respondent—the latter being the judicatory complained of, which should always be represented by one or more of its number appointed for that purpose, who may be assisted by counsel.

2. (*g.*) Amend and alter Section 91 of the Book of Discipline, so that it shall read :

91.—Either of the parties to a complaint may complain to the next superior judicatory, except as limited by Chapter XI, Section 4, of the Form of Government.

2. (*h.*) Strike out the whole of Section 93 of the Book of Discipline, which reads :

If a case should be carried to an appellate judicatory by both appeal and complaint, the same shall be consolidated for trial, if deemed proper by the appellate judicatory. If the appeal be abandoned, the case shall be heard only on the complaint.

2. (*i.*) Amend and alter Section 94 of the Book of Discipline, so that it shall read :

94.—An appeal is the removal of a judicial case, by a written representation, from an inferior to a superior judicatory, and may be taken by either of the original parties from the final judgment of the lower judicatory. These parties shall be called Appellant and Appellee. Final judgments in judicial cases shall be subject to reversal and modification only by appeal, and no judicatory from whose final judgment an appeal shall have been taken shall be heard in the appellate judicatory, further than by the reading of the dissents, protests and written opinions of its members assenting to or dissenting from its judgments.

2. (*j.*) Amend and alter Section 95 of the Book of Discipline by striking out the words "or complaint" in the third line of said Section, so that it shall read :

95.—The grounds of appeal may be such as these : Irregularity in the proceedings of the inferior judicatory ; refusal to entertain an appeal ; refusal of reasonable indulgence to a party on trial ; receiving improper, or declining to receive important, testimony ; hastening to a decision before the testimony is fully taken ; manifestation of prejudice in the conduct of the case ; and mistake or injustice in the decision.

2. (*k.*) Amend and alter the last clause of Section 74 by omitting the words "or complaint," so that it shall read :

Provided, That no judicial decision shall be reversed, unless regularly taken up on appeal.

No person shall accept any fee or other emolument for any service rendered as counsel.

CHAPTER XXIII. OF THE ORGANIZATIONS OF THE CHURCH : THEIR RIGHTS AND DUTIES.

SECTION 1. The members of a particular church or particular churches may associate together, and may associate with themselves other regular members of the congregation or congregations, under regular forms of association, for the conduct of a special work for missionary or other benevolent purposes, or for the purpose of instruction in religion and development in Christian nurture.

SECTION 2. Where special organizations of the character above

indicated exist in a particular church, they shall be under the immediate direction, control and oversight of the Session of said church; where they cover the territory included within a Presbytery or Synod, they shall be responsible to the judicatory having jurisdiction; and where they cover territory greater than a Synod, they shall be responsible to the General Assembly.

SECTION 3. The names or titles of special organizations may be chosen by themselves, and the organizations shall have power to adopt each its own Constitution and to elect its own officers, subject always to the powers of review and control vested by the Constitution in the several judicatories of the Church.

SECTION 4. Wherever the functions of the special organizations shall include the collecting and distributing of moneys for benevolent work, it shall be done always subject to the power of oversight and direction vested by the Constitution in the Session and in the higher judicatories.

Number of Commissioners on the Roll—ministers, 335; elders, 318; advisory members, 4; total, 657. Presbyteries represented, 222; not represented, 10. Presbyteries exempt from payment, Foreign Mission, Indian and Freedmen, and in addition advisory members representing missions, making a total of 37. The Freedmen and Indian Presbyteries, however, contribute to the Fund.

The Presbytery of Bellefontaine has not contributed to the Mileage Fund.

The following Presbyteries have not contributed to the Entertainment Fund: Bellefontaine, Clarion and Redstone.

Your Committee would recommend as follows:

1. That the Assembly again urge upon all Presbyteries to contribute in full to the Mileage, Entertainment and Contingent Funds.

2. That the apportionment for next year be six cents for each communicant, distributed as follows: To the Mileage Fund, three cents; to the Entertainment Fund, one and one-half cents; to the Contingent Fund, one and one-half cents.

3. That the Stated Clerk, as Treasurer of the General Assembly, be authorized at his discretion to pay Commissioners any further sums as may be considered justly due to them, by reason of their having underestimated railroad charges or other necessary expenses in returning home.

4. That for future meetings of the General Assembly the Stated Clerk be directed to obtain, if practicable, from the railroads a longer time limit for the return of Commissioners to their homes, say ten to twenty days after the probable day of adjournment.

5. That the General Assembly extend its thanks to such railroads and other transportation companies as have carried Commissioners at reduced rates.

In bringing its sessions to a close, the One Hundred and Fourteenth Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America desires to express, and to put upon record, its most grateful appreciation of the noble magnanimity with which it has been received and cared for by the Presbyterians of New York.

To provide the barest necessities of so large an assemblage, concerned with interests so numerous and so varied, for so many days together, would lay a heavy tax upon the most resourceful community. But the welcome accorded us has gone far beyond the necessities, reaching a generosity worthy of the Empire City of the nation, and of the Church within its bounds.

The Committee of Arrangements, under the Chairmanship of

Rev. Dr. J. Ross Stevenson, and all the Subcommittees have been most indefatigable and successful in their labors.

The people of the Fifth Avenue Church have not only placed at our disposal the whole of their superb edifice for all our sessions, but they fitted it for our use with an attention to detail which anticipated every want and left nothing to be desired. The people of the Central Church also have freely given the use of their building for several public meetings.

The great popular meetings in Carnegie Hall were impressive demonstrations of the missionary power and enthusiasm of the Church. At that held in the interests of Home Missions and in honor of the One Hundredth Anniversary of the organization of the Board, we were honored by the presence of Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, who delivered a characteristic and inspiring address. That held in the interests of Foreign Missions was presided over by Mr. John Wanamaker, of Philadelphia.

The reception given at the Waldorf-Astoria by the Presbyterian Union was planned and carried out with a hospitality that knew no bounds, and was one of the most delightful and memorable incidents of this memorable Assembly. The presence of Mayor Low, and his graceful speech of welcome, were greatly appreciated.

The excursion up the Hudson, given by the Albany Day Line, to take place this afternoon in one of their incomparable river steamers, is another generous incident which will give never-to-be-forgotten pleasure to all who may be able to accept the invitation.

The Boards of Home and Foreign Missions and of Church Erection, in their reception at the Presbyterian Building, and the American Tract Society, the American Bible Society, the New York University, and Princeton University and Seminary, by their invitations to the Assembly to visit their respective institutions, have added interest and profit to some of the intervals between our business sessions. The Pennsylvania Railroad, through its President, Mr. A. J. Cassatt, repeated its generous action of last year, in providing free transportation for the entire Assembly to and from Princeton. And the Van Norden Trust Co. has placed its ample facilities freely at our disposal for the transaction of our financial business.

The press, both secular and religious, has given full and in the main, accurate and sympathetic reports of our meetings, and the railway, telegraph and telephone companies have responded readily to every call for service.

The United States Postmaster of New York City deserves special mention for the ample and efficient service rendered by him to the Assembly, through the location in the Lecture Room of a sub-station, and the assignment thereto of a force of skilled clerks.

Dr. F. L. Marshall has led the singing in the devotional services, as he has so acceptably for eight years past. We are also indebted to the choir and organist of the Fifth Avenue Church for their admirable service, and to the children whose singing added so much to the interest of some of the popular meetings.

As a presiding officer, our Moderator has shown a faithfulness and fairness, a promptness, tact and courtesy which have greatly facilitated the transaction of business and done much to preserve the kindly and cheerful spirit which has in so marked a degree characterized our deliberations; and he has, besides, on public occasions spoken with a fitness, grace and force which have made us all glad and proud to have him as our representative. In all his duties he has been most pleasantly and efficiently aided by the Vice-Moderator.

The Clerks, Stated and Permanent, have discharged their exacting duties with their old-time practiced skill and fidelity.

To all these individuals and institutions named, and to the larger number unnamed, who personally and through Committees have done so much for our personal comfort and the efficiency of our service for the Church, the Assembly utters its sincerest thanks, and directs the Stated Clerk, as far as practicable, to express them to those for whom they are intended.

But while we thank our brethren who have served us, our deepest gratitude is to our Father, who has preserved us by His providence and guided us by His Spirit. We have not only reached conclusions on matters of extreme difficulty and delicacy, conclusions which we believe to be right and good and full of promise, but we have reached them with a unanimity which not the most sanguine among us had dared to hope for. The old fraternal confidence has returned. The old unity has been restored. As we separate it is with one purpose dominant in every heart, the purpose to press the Kingdom, with every power of body, soul and spirit, that God will give us, upon the hearts of men. "Pray for the peace of Jerusalem: they shall prosper that love Thee. Peace be within Thy walls, and prosperity within Thy palaces. For my brethren and companions' sake; I will now say, Peace be within thee. Because of the house of the Lord our God I will seek thy good."

Oh, that the salvation of Israel were come out of Zion! Oh! that the salvation of the nation were come out of the Church!

NARRATIVE.

OF THE STATE OF RELIGION WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA
FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 1902.

The Standing Committee on the Narrative would respectfully present to the General Assembly the following report:

Narratives from 230 of the 232 Presbyteries constituting the Assembly have come into our hands. Believing the Narrative to be, contrary to the common opinion, of great importance, both as summing up the past year's work and as suggestive of lines of future effort, these 230 papers have been read carefully and their main facts embodied here. The picture of the state of religion in our bounds to be given here must be of the impressionist, rather than the realistic type that leaves unexpressed no minutest detail.

In the matter of attendance upon Church worship the morning service occasions comparatively little anxiety, save as to the presence of the boys and girls. This is peculiarly the problem of the city churches. Many of these report the young people present in goodly numbers, and in some cases where the proportion is small an increase is noticed, a fact full of encouragement. Several plans are tried to induce them to attend—five-minute talks, occasional special sermons, competitions in giving abstracts of the sermon, attendance upon morning worship as a condition of membership in boys' clubs, etc. But none of these plans seem to accomplish permanently the result desired. And it is worth while to ask whether boys and girls cannot best be led to the Church, and to interest in its services, by a return to simplicity, the simplicity which is consistent with both depth of thought and freshness of presentation in the regular sermon?

The second service is generally more meagrely attended than the first. The average runs from fifty to seven per cent. of the morning congregation. Your Committee observes that in those churches where young men are organized to bring in their fellows, and where the evening sermon is of the expository or evangelistic type, carefully prepared, the largest companies of worshipers are to be found. It may be that the people, from long experience, have found out that the pulpit work in the second service is of an inferior grade, and so do not think it worth while to be present.

The prayer meeting is generally poorly representative of the church membership, yet in a few cases the increased presence of young people has raised the average.

The reports concerning Sabbath-schools are encouraging all along the line. Jubilant notes are sounded here and there. Fuller ranks; one large school reports a "record-breaking attendance;" steadier attendance,

more careful teaching due to the employment of methods that are used in the day-schools. These are the stories joyfully told. Two minor notes are sounded, the one in connection with the school, the other with the home. The Teachers' Meeting is almost universally omitted, and one report shamelessly declares that such a meeting "belongs to the past." The home-centered discouragement oftenest mentioned and most lamented is the want of coöperation of parents. Not only do they set young people the example of staying away from the school, but they take little interest in their children's preparation of the lesson, and indeed show a general indifference to the Bible-school which is paralyzing to the spiritual life of the young people. Yet in spite of these things the ring of advance both in the size and work of the school sounds in reports from many quarters. Your Committee believes that the retrograde movement in Sunday-school work, deplored for several years, has reached its end and that a revival has begun. Many of the churches are observing Decision Days, several each year, with most gratifying results.

The women of the Church everywhere are well organized and are doing most commendable work. In this they are in striking contrast to the men. Few indeed are the societies of men reported. In the large city churches the main ends of the men's societies seem to be, the working up of an interest in the second service and securing the presence of men at that service. In the towns and villages social and literary ends are sought chiefly. A few men's societies have their bond in the love of missions, and some support their own missionaries in home and foreign lands. Your Committee thinks that herein is a splendid opportunity for our Church, and, through the Assembly, would call on the men of the Church for organized work along distinctly spiritual and missionary lines.

Young People's Societies are found in most of our churches, and these are generally Christian Endeavor Societies. In discussing the condition of our young people's work a word often used for several years past was "decadence." The years just gone were a critical period in this great effort, and there were signs of wavering, it may be of retrogression. But in not a single report this year is there a word of discouragement. The young people are organized, loyal to the Church, doing good work, giving themselves more and more to mission study and labor. In some cases pastors are at the front in this forward movement. In other cases pastors and Sessions are apparently following the young people. Is not the time at hand for a more positive, a more constructive work by and for young people, in which elders and pastors shall occupy the place of enthusiastic leadership?

The note of gladness and hopefulness which is heard all through the Presbyteral reports of the year, rings loudest in the description of "Spiritual Conditions." True, many churches report no special religious interest. But many more than last year tell us of seasons of gracious outpouring and consequent revival of spiritual life. It is most significant that the churches and Presbyteries so reporting are those which have coöperated with the Assembly's Evangelistic Committee, either by using the evangelists sent out by this committee, or working in harmony with its suggestions. The call to larger evangelistic effort heard in the earliest sessions of the Assembly is reinforced by the success with which God has already crowned the beginnings of this work wherever undertaken. A large far Western Presbytery reports: "All the churches have held some evangelistic meetings, in response to the suggestion of the Assembly's committee. There has been during the year one conference for prayer for ministers and elders, and a systematic visitation of each church by a committee of ministers and elders from other churches, and a series of meetings held in each which were helpful and refreshing and in some instances resulted in new conversions. A permanent Committee on Evangelistic Work has been appointed and the visitations are to be repeated this winter." From a middle Western Presbytery we hear: "We are able to report a more healthful condition of the Christian life of the churches within our bounds. . . . A new incentive in aggressiveness has been given to many of our churches by emphasizing the evangelistic side of Christ's Gospel. This is due to the impetus given by the General Assem-

bly's Committee on Evangelistic Work and the success of the methods suggested by the same."

A Southern middle Presbytery tells us from its own experience: "The day of revivals is not past. The evangelist is not a back number. Our General Assembly in its appointment of a special Committee on Evangelization has stirred the Church from centre to circumference, and this Presbytery seems to have gotten some small measure of the blessing."

One small Presbytery reports "396 added on profession of faith during the year . . . certainly a remarkable record. These results we believe are . . . due largely to the stimulating influence of the General Assembly's Committee on Evangelistic Work . . . with the hearty coöperation of a similar committee of the Presbytery. This is the strongest argument for and the heartiest endorsement of the propriety and wisdom of the appointment of such a committee on the part of the Assembly which this Presbytery can offer, and we beg leave to suggest to the General Assembly the propriety of the further continuance of this splendid and efficient agency for the promotion of special evangelistic work among the churches." A strong central Presbytery tabulates the results of the evangelistic work thus: "Possesses an evangelistic committee; held an evangelistic retreat and conference; evangelistic services were held in thirty-eight out of fifty-five churches; average length fifteen nights; as a rule a pastoral helper; attendance in most instances exceeded membership; about nine-tenths of additions to the churches during the year came through these special efforts." Such testimonials might be multiplied abundantly. Is it surprising that one Presbytery begs this Assembly to "keep up the pressure?" Surely these tidings of success should give added enthusiasm to the spirit of evangelism which has so marked this Assembly; that the work in its initial stage has received thus the Divine approval is our sufficient inspiration for larger and more determined and gladder effort. God is in the midst of His Church attesting the power of the simple truth earnestly preached, and blessing the first personal efforts toward the winning of souls by individuals. The next year's work will be overwhelmingly successful. Let us follow the example of one Western church, of which the Presbytery says: "It looks as if the highways and hedges had been literally searched for candidates" for church membership.

Parents are generally reported as fairly faithful in the Christian training of their children, and in their presentation for baptism. But from many quarters comes the sad confession that Sessions are not true to their trust in their care of baptized young people, and make no loving and persistent effort to lead them to confess Christ for themselves. This reveals one source of greatest loss to our Church. Large numbers of our young people, baptized in infancy, are, through lack of guarding and teaching, allowed to be lost in the world. One Presbytery reports that its pastors and Sessions have made special effort along this line and "with good result."

This is an imperfect sketch of the religious condition of our Church. There is a feeling of encouragement and hopefulness everywhere. Under the sweet impulse of this spirit the Assembly faces the work of the present year. Joyfully acknowledging the presence and goodness of God, the Assembly begs all its churches to throw themselves into the work of God, to rely more confidently on the promises of God, and to yield promptly and unreservedly to the working orders of the Spirit of God, and it honors God in the belief that the next Assembly will rejoice in the largest ingathering in our history.

CORRESPONDENCE.

REPORT OF THE DEPUTATION TO PRINCETON.*

The deputation to Princeton respectfully presents the following Report :

First of all we desire to acknowledge the generosity of the Pennsylvania Railroad, through the President, Mr. A. J. Cassatt, in providing free transportation on special trains to and from Princeton for the officers and Commissioners of the Assembly and friends of Princeton University and Princeton Theological Seminary. About nine hundred persons availed themselves of the facilities so kindly furnished by Mr. Cassatt.

On the arrival of the trains at Princeton, the Assembly was conducted to Alexander Hall, where an address of welcome for the Princeton Institutions was made by the Rev. Francis L. Patton, D.D., LL.D., President of the University. Response to the address was made by the Moderator of the General Assembly, who emphasized the fact that there was a vital connection, though not a legal one, between the University and the Presbyterian Church, and that Princeton was the "holy hill of Presbyterianism in America." From Alexander Hall the Assembly went to Nassau Hall for the purpose of taking part in the unveiling of a tablet commemorative of the vital connection between the University and the Presbyterian Church. The address on the occasion was made by the Rev. John DeWitt, D.D., LL.D., Professor of Church History in Princeton Theological Seminary. The expense of the tablet was provided for by friends of the University and the inscription thereon reads as follows :

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMISSION OF THE ALLIANCE OF THE REFORMED CHURCHES THROUGHOUT THE WORLD HOLDING THE PRESBYTERIAN SYSTEM.

PHILADELPHIA, PA., May 10, 1902.

To the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.:

DEAR BRETHREN :—The Executive Commission of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches throughout the World holding the Presbyterian System, Western or American Section, presents to your venerable Body its annual report, greeting you as brethren beloved in the Lord and fellow-laborers unto the Kingdom of God.

The Commission has held two meetings during the year, one on October 24, 1901, at Montreal, Canada, and the other at Pittsburg, Pa., on April 16 and 17, 1902. The members of the Western Section received most cordial welcome in both cities, and popular meetings were held in Pittsburg in the interest of the Alliance. There was also a reception on the evening of October 24, 1901, at the Presbyterian College, Montreal; and at Pittsburg, on the evening of April 17, a banquet was given in honor of the Commission by the United Presbyterian Social Union of that city. These meetings and social functions are of great value in the nurture and maintenance of that fraternal sympathy which more than any other influence cultivates the spiritual unity of our churches.

The Commission has appointed the Rev. William Caven, D.D., LL.D., President of the Alliance, with the Rev. W. H. Roberts, D.D., American Secretary, as delegates to bear to your venerable Body brotherly greetings.

It is respectfully requested that provision be made for the apportionment of the expenses of the Alliance due from your venerable Body for the present year, which amounts to the sum of \$765. Remittance may be made to the American Treasurer of the Alliance, F. K. Hipple, Esq., LL.D., President of the Real Estate Trust Company, Philadelphia, Pa.

We regret to report the death of the Chairman of the Western Section, George Junkin, LL.D., a distinguished ruling elder connected with your Church. Dr. Junkin was present at the First Council of the Alliance, at Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1877, and was a member of the Commission from its establishment. He was Chairman of the Business Committee of the Second Council, held at Philadelphia, Pa., in 1880, and contributed materially to the success of that great gathering. For a long period he served as Treasurer, and in September, 1899, in recognition of his high character and distinguished services, he was unanimously chosen Chairman. His death took place on April 10, 1902, and the Section has entered upon its records an appropriate Minute setting forth its appreciation of his life and work. The Rev. R. P. Kerr, D.D., Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Richmond, Virginia, one of the Vice-Chairmen of the Section, was chosen as his successor.

Attention is especially drawn to the fact that the Eighth General Council of this Alliance will meet in Liverpool, England, either in June or July, 1904. The basis of representation in the Council is as follows: for each one hundred congregations or less, two delegates up to one thousand congregations; above one thousand congregations, one delegate for each additional one hundred up to two thousand; above two thousand, one delegate for each additional two hundred and fifty congregations. It is respectfully requested that an early report be made both to the General Secretary, the

Rev. Dr. Geo. D. Mathews, and to the American Secretary, in the matter of the persons named as your delegates.

The Commission begs leave to draw attention to the work accomplished by it during the year, as set forth in part by the Minutes for the meeting of April, 1902, copies of which have been forwarded to you for distribution. In particular is it asked that you give consideration to the reports on "Moral Conditions in the New Territories," on "Religious Liberty" in said Territories, and on the need for "Mission Work among the European and American Residents in Foreign Seaports."

In relation to work on the European Continent in aid of the Reformed Churches located there, the Commission respectfully requests that a Committee be appointed by your Body, to be known as a Committee of Correspondence on Work on the European Continent, and that said Committee be directed to coöperate with the similar Committee of this Commission, of which the Rev. James I. Good, D.D., of Reading, Pa., is Chairman. There is present need of assistance to these European Churches. At this very time there is a decided movement away from the Roman Catholic Church in several European countries, and the hold of the Papacy appears to be loosened upon large populations. The expression of sympathy and the tendering of aid at this critical juncture would prove of very great value to the cause of true religion.

The Commission also requests that special attention be given to the following resolutions upon Home Missions:

"Whereas, The relation which the United States and Canada sustain to both Europe and Asia gives to them a position of great power, and the advancement of the Kingdom of God requires that their influence should be in the highest degree Christian; and whereas, God has brought to our door a great multitude who sadly need the quickening and saving influence of evangelical truth; and whereas, He has greatly blessed the Churches in their Home Mission work; therefore,

"Resolved, That it be recommended to the supreme judicatories of the several Churches in the Western Section of the Commission to hold a special service of thanksgiving and praise for His grace, and of prayer for His continued blessing on the Home Mission work, and to take steps to keep this work before the members of all the congregations in all its importance and pressing urgency.

"2. That special attention be called to the necessity for the adaptation of the Home Mission work to the changing conditions of our population, and for more systematic efforts to reach all classes and all communities with the Gospel of divine love."

It is further respectfully requested that the second Sabbath of September be set apart as a day of prayer for private and public schools and for preaching on education. It is at this period of the year that the schools begin their work, and the interests involved are the largest and most important of those connected with educational interests. The secularism which is abroad is one of the great dangers of the country, and has seriously affected popular education both in its spirit and in the personnel of the teaching force. We believe that the general observance of a day of prayer as requested would be highly conducive to the moral and religious interests of the millions of our children and youth.

In closing, we emphasize the influence of the Alliance in relation to Christian unity as illustrated by the movements towards union in the Mission Churches of the Presbyterian faith and order found in China and India. In India, where a Presbyterian Alliance exists, the proposals for a united Church have been duly submitted to the ecclesiastical authorities interested, and a name has been agreed upon, viz.: "The Church of Christ in India, Presbyterian." The new Church, if the movement for union succeeds, will begin its work with not less than fifty thousand church members. Details of the progress of union in China, and of the condition of the Church of Christ in Japan, will be found in the Minutes (above referred to) of the last meeting of the Western Section of the Alliance.

We draw with especial pleasure your attention to the fact that the General Secretary of the Alliance, Rev. George D. Mathews, D.D., is on a visit to the Churches on the American Continent in behalf of the general

interests of the Alliance. It is the expectation that he will be able to visit you at your present meeting. We invoke for him a cordial reception by you and the blessing of God upon his visit.

May the God of all grace bless you in your labors abundantly and bestow upon you success in all your undertakings for the welfare of man and the extension of the kingdom of Christ in the earth.

REPORT OF THE DELEGATE* TO THE SYNOD OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN MEXICO.

To the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America :

FATHERS AND BRETHREN:—In accordance with the instructions of the Assembly, it was my privilege to visit Mexico and to take part in the organization of the new Synod of Mexico. An informal preliminary meeting was held on Saturday evening, July 6, in the Church of Divino Salvador. An address of welcome was given by the Rev. Arcadio Morales, and a few words of reply by the Rev. J. H. McNeilly, representing the Presbyterian Church of the United States. On Sunday afternoon a formal meeting was held, at which the Rev. T. F. Wallace, D.D., the oldest missionary of the Board, presided and made the opening address. On the part of the Southern Church, Dr. McNeilly delivered an eloquent and instructive address on "The Things which Presbyterianism has Stood for during the Century." It was my privilege to speak on the "Presbyterian Church in its Relation to Comity." The regular sessions of the Synod began on Monday morning, July 8, the Rev. Leandro Garza Mora, of the Presbytery of Tamaulipas, being elected temporary Moderator, and the Rev. W. Wallace, of the Presbytery of the City of Mexico, temporary Clerk. After prayer, the roll of the Synod was duly completed, each of the four Presbyteries being represented by delegates. The number of missionaries in attendance at the Synod was thirty-seven. The order of business followed the order as suggested by the Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, the Rev. William H. Roberts, D.D., namely :

1. The reading of the petition of the Presbytery of Zacatecas to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and the plan of union accompanying said petition.
2. Reading of the action of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, authorizing the establishment of the Synod of Mexico and the Presbyterian Church of which it will be the supreme judicatory.
3. Reading of the letter from the Commission appointed by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America to be present at the establishment of the new Synod.
4. Adoption of the following resolutions :

WHEREAS, The work of Christ in the Republic of Mexico, as carried on by the Presbyteries of the City of Mexico, Gulf of Mexico, Tamaulipas and Zacatecas, under the blessing of God has been prospered to that degree that the churches therein represented are ready for organization as an independent branch of the Church of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ; and,

WHEREAS, It seems proper to the ministers and elders representing said Presbyteries duly assembled together, that the new Church should be established and organized as a Presbyterian Church; and,

WHEREAS, The General Assemblies of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America and of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, with which the above-named Presbyteries have been connected, have assented to and authorized the establishment of the new Church by the said Presbyteries, and have signified said assent and authorization in due and regular form; therefore, be it

Resolved, 1, That we ministers and elders representing the Presbyteries known as City of Mexico, Gulf of Mexico, Tamaulipas and Zacatecas, do hereby constitute ourselves with the churches of said Presbyteries into the Presbyterian Church in Mexico.

Resolved, 2, That the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America be and is hereby adopted as the Constitution of the said Presbyterian Church in Mexico.

Resolved, 3, That until the organization of the General Assembly, the supreme authority in matters of doctrine, government and discipline with all the powers granted by the Constitution of the Church to the General Assembly, shall be vested in and exercised by a judicatory to be known as the General Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Mexico.

Resolved, 4, That the General Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Mexico shall have its first meeting in the City of Mexico on July 8, 1901.

Resolved, 5, That the individual relations between the missionaries and the General Synod, and between the latter and the missionaries who shall cooperate with said Synod, shall be and are as follows:

1. That the missionaries shall be considered members of the Synod with the same rights and obligations as the Mexican Presbyteries.

2. That the Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Mexico expects that the Foreign Mission Boards of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America and that of the United States, will continue to give the pecuniary aid which their Christian love may prompt them to concede for the sustentation of the work which the Synod has to carry forward.

The action of the General Assembly of the Southern Church was also read and all the documents were placed on file, and the Synod adjourned with prayer.

On Tuesday, July 9, after the opening prayer and reading of the Minutes, the Synod discussed at some length the question of the name of the Synod, whether it should be called "The Synod in Mexico" or "The Synod of Mexico." All matters now being satisfactorily arranged, the Synod proceeded to elect a Moderator, and the Rev. Arcadio Morales was unanimously chosen as Moderator, and the Rev. Hubert W. Brown, missionary of our Board, Vice-Moderator. The Rev. Leandro Garza Mora was chosen Stated Clerk. The Synod was then constituted with prayer. This service was of peculiar interest. The Moderator first called on Dr. Wallace, the senior missionary, to offer prayer; then on the Rev. Alego Espenoza, the oldest native preacher. After this, the Rev. J. H. McNeilly, of the Southern Church; the Rev. A. T. Graybill, of the Southern Church; the Rev. Mr. Martinez, one of the oldest members of the Synod, the Rev. A. W. Halsey and the Rev. Alfonso Herrero led in prayer. The Moderator in this service called upon the representatives of all the Presbyteries constituting the Synod, as well as the representatives of the two Assemblies representing the Presbyterian Churches in the United States. He then constituted the Synod with prayer.

The business of the Synod was continued through the next day. Among the items of interest, it was voted that they request the General Presbyterian Alliance to permit them to be enrolled as a member of that body. The greetings of the new Synod were sent to President Diaz, the President of the Mexican Republic. The utmost unanimity and harmony prevailed during the entire meeting of the Synod. Nothing illustrates the spirit of the new Synod better than the election of officers. Mr. Morales had been the prime mover in bringing to pass this happy issue, and it was fitting that he should be chosen Moderator. Rev. Leandro G. Mora is the most representative man of the Southern Church in Mexico, and it was very seemly to elect him Stated Clerk. The native brethren wished the Rev. Hubert W. Brown to accept the office of Moderator, but he promptly declined. The devotional exercises connected with the meetings of Synod

were not only well attended but were very helpful, and the public meetings of the evenings brought out large numbers and evoked much interest. The Mexican *Heraldo*, the English daily newspaper, gave large space to its proceedings, publishing in full Dr. McNeilly's address. Nothing occurred to mar the harmony of the proceedings from the beginning to the end.

The members of the new Synod of Mexico, through the Moderator, requested me to convey to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America fraternal greetings, and to assure them that it was their purpose and desire to maintain the honor of God's Word, to proclaim the truth as it is in Jesus, and to remain steadfast to Presbyterian faith and doctrine in the carrying forward of the great work of the evangelization of Mexico. They also requested an interest in our prayers, owing to the arduous task which God has set to their hands.

Permit me to express to the General Assembly my high appreciation of the privilege of attending this first meeting of the Synod of Mexico. I believe that the hand of God is in this movement, and that it will result in more aggressive work for Christ in our sister Republic.

The General Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Mexico, in session the 9th day of July, 1901, in the City of Mexico, resolved to send the following greeting to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America:

CITY OF MEXICO, July 9, 1901.

To the Venerable General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America:

VENERABLE FATHERS AND BRETHREN:—With our hearts filled with gratitude for the valued aid which you have extended to us during the delicate period of our spiritual childhood, and on the solemn occasion in which, thanks to your Christian kindness, we have formed ourselves into an ecclesiastical body independent of our mother Church, we send you these poor but expressive lines.

As we break the sweet bonds which have bound us together for so many years, we experience an indescribable feeling of homesickness, produced not only by our separation from the mother Church, but by the weighty duties which our new condition imposes upon us. Nevertheless, confident that Divine guidance will be ours, and full of enthusiasm, we begin our work, believing also that our independence will prove no obstacle in the way of your still helping us with your wise counsels, as well as with your generous and liberal pecuniary coöperation in order to carry forward the vast work which with such happy success you have begun amongst us.

If, as we hope, we come to achieve in the future some striking triumph in the battle of Protestantism in Mexico, the glory will be yours, inasmuch as the good deeds of men have their origin in the education and in the wise advice which their mothers give them, and in the character which she impresses on them.

Receive then, venerable fathers and brethren, our most affectionate and respectful greeting, and be assured of our deep-felt and lasting gratitude for the kindly care which you have had for us.

BELOVED BRETHREN:—Your letter announcing the formal organization of the Presbyterian Church in Mexico, and also the report of the representative of this General Assembly, the Rev. A. Woodruff Halsey, D.D., were both received by this General Assembly, and read in open session in the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, New York City, N. Y., May 26, 1902. The communications were heartily welcomed by the Assembly, and the general feeling was one of deep satisfaction over the success of your organization, and of sincere gratification at the filial spirit manifested by you. The Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. felicitates herself upon the vigorous life and encouraging prospect of so promising a daughter. The mother assuredly will continue to extend not only sympathy, but such aid as may be required by circumstances to her devoted child. We note with especial pleasure the adoption of the Constitution of this Church as the Constitution of your Church, and your appropriate recognition of the missionaries of this Church as members of your Synod with the same rights and obligations as the Mexican ministers. We believe as fully as you do that God will achieve through you "in the future some striking triumph of Protestantism in Mexico," and we are certain that the Divine blessing will attend your labors in the present yet more abundantly than in the past. Your position as a church is a notable and inspiring one. The great Reformation of the sixteenth century, which wrought in Europe such remarkable results, and which more than any other cause gave origin to the United States of America, is yet a most potent force, and has to-day a world-wide sphere of operation. Of this movement full of hope for mankind you are a part. We hope that ere long the influences which have secured the full enfranchisement of the souls of men in our country will make themselves yet more strikingly manifest within your Republic, and produce results as widespread and beneficent as in other lands. We invoke upon you the blessing of the Triune God, that you may be enabled ever to shine as lights in the world, holding forth the word of life, that we may rejoice in the day of Christ that we have not run in vain, neither labored in vain. We commend you to the God of all grace, who is able to do for you exceeding abundantly above all that we can ask or think. We are co-laborers with Him. "Be patient therefore, brethren, unto the coming of the Lord. Behold the husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the earth, and hath long patience for it until he receives the early and latter rain. Be ye also patient; stablish your hearts; for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh."

The Students' Lecturer on Missions was the Rev. C. A. R. Janvier, a missionary of the Presbyterian Church to India, who spoke on "Modern Movements and Missionary Methods in Northwestern India."

¶ The Directors desire to report to the General Assembly the resignation of the Rev. William M. Paxton, D.D., LL.D., from the chair of Ecclesiastical, Homiletical and Pastoral Theology. The Board of Directors beg to call the attention of the Assembly to the action of the Board given below, and to a short historical statement explanatory thereof.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors held May 6, 1901, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted :

“ *Whereas*, The Board of Directors believe it may be possible so to modify or alter the Constitution of this Seminary as to promote efficiency in its management; therefore,

“ *Resolved* (the Board of Trustees and Faculty concurring), That the Board of Directors, the Board of Trustees and the Faculty each appoint three of its members to constitute a Joint Committee on Administration, who shall meet in the Old Oratory of the Seminary on ——— for the purpose of organizing and arranging for the preparation, by said Joint Committee, of such modifications of the Constitution of this Seminary as will, in their judgment, promote efficiency in its management.

“ *Resolved*, That when the Joint Committee shall be ready to report, it be authorized to call a joint meeting of the Directors, Trustees and Faculty to hear and consider the proposed modifications, and that the hope is hereby expressed that said Joint Committee may be able to call such joint meeting prior to the dates fixed for the next October meetings of the Board of Directors and of the Board of Trustees, to the end that the report and the action thereon at such joint meeting may be duly submitted to said Directors and Trustees and also to the Faculty in the month of October next for their consideration as separate bodies.” (Extracts from minutes of Board of Directors.)

During the interval between the meetings of the Board joint meetings of its committees took place, and after a full discussion the following modifications of the plan of the Seminary were agreed upon. They were submitted to the Trustees, Faculty and Board of Directors and approved by them.

The Board of Directors, however, being the governing body of the Seminary, and being instructed by the plan of the Seminary “to recommend such measures for the advantage of the Seminary as to them may appear proper,” request the General Assembly to grant them permission to amend the plan of the Seminary in the following particulars :

PROPOSED MODIFICATIONS.

ARTICLE II.

Of the President of the Seminary.

SECTION 1. There shall be a President of the Seminary, who shall be elected by the Board of Directors; he may also be removed by the said Board; but his election or removal shall be subject to the veto of the General Assembly, to which body the election or removal must be reported at its next meeting thereafter.

SECTION 2. Such President shall by virtue of such election be the President of the Faculty. He shall be inaugurated in such manner and form as the Board of Directors may prescribe, and at his inauguration shall make the subscription and declaration required of a Professor; he

shall be subject to the regulations made by the Board of Directors and to the prescriptions of the plan of the Seminary with regard to Professors. He shall be the representative of the Seminary before the Church; he shall be the administrative agent of the Seminary in matters of order and discipline; he shall give instruction to the students in such departments as the Board of Directors may direct or the General Assembly may order.

SECTION 3. Such President shall, by virtue of his election as aforesaid, become and be a member of the Board of Directors during his continuance in office.

SECTION 4. The salary of such President shall be fixed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III.

Of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 1. Apart from the President of the Seminary, the Board of Directors shall consist of twenty-one ministers and nine ruling elders; of whom one-third, or seven ministers and three ruling elders, shall be chosen by the said Board annually, to continue in office three years; and the Board shall also have power to fill all vacancies which may occur in its body; all these elections, however, shall be subject to the veto of the General Assembly, to whom they shall be reported at its next meeting thereafter.

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ARTICLE IV.

Of the Professors.

* * * * *

SECTION 9. In every meeting the President of the Seminary or the Senior Professor present shall preside.

II. AUBURN THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

REPORT OF THE GOVERNING BOARDS.

THE Governing Boards of the Theological Seminary of Auburn, in the State of New York, report as follows for the year ending May 8, 1902, to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America :

In the death of two of its Emeriti Professors, Rev. Samuel Miles Hopkins, D.D., and Rev. Ezra Abel Huntington, D.D., LL.D., and the President of the Board of Trustees, Rev. Levi Parsons, D.D., and the Vice-President of the Board of Trustees, the Hon. Charles C. Dwight, LL.D., the Seminary has met with a serious loss of true and valued friends, who through long periods have served the Institution in their respective positions with great fidelity. Friends of the Seminary have contributed during the past year \$17,950 toward permanent funds and \$4000 toward current expenses. Prof. Hoyt, at the end of the first term, entered upon a year's leave of absence, which he is spending in the study of social conditions and the English and Scottish pulpits. That portion of his work which he was unable to do before he left is being satisfactorily done by Rev. Charles E.

Robinson, D.D., recently pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church, Scranton, Pa., of the Class of 1861. The Rev. Halsey Bidwell Stevenson, of the Class of 1881, has been elected Librarian. Rev. Harry Lathrop Reed, of the Class of 1897, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Albany, Ore., has been elected Assistant Professor in the New Testament Department. The trustees of the estate of the late William E. Dodge, of New York city, have given \$15,000 to the Permanent Scholarship Fund of the Seminary. A plan for Pastoral Scholarships, designed for giving students the opportunity of being pastors' assistants in Auburn and neighboring cities, is being matured. An effort is being made to add \$300,000 to the permanent funds of the Seminary and is progressing with gratifying results.

Mr. Brown and Mr. Svacha who entered the Senior Class were received by letter from Lane Theological Seminary and Omaha Theological Seminary respectively.

The following former students, who had withdrawn for a shorter or a longer term for various reasons, re-entered the Seminary: Mr. G. R. Phillips joined the Senior Class, and Messrs. O. S. Fowler, A. F. McGarran and J. S. Pittenger the Middle Class.

One student, Mr. A. J. McCartney, was dismissed at his own request to the Middle Class of Princeton Theological Seminary.

The total attendance for the year has been 64. Of these three were post graduates, twenty Seniors, nineteen Middlers, nineteen Juniors and three special students.

During recent years the introduction of the elective system into the college course has thrown considerable doubt upon the exact meaning of a college diploma. In view of this the Faculty at the opening of the term decided to appoint a standing committee, consisting of Professors Christie and Kelso, to examine students who either had no college diploma or who had taken a degree for which no work in Greek or Philosophy was required.

The Faculty co-operated with the Committee of the General Assembly on Evangelistic Work in holding a convention. The meetings were held in the Seminary Chapel and the Second Presbyterian Church, Pittsburg, on December 2 and 3, 1901.

Professor Casper René Gregory, of Leipzig, delivered three lectures at the opening of the term; during January and February the Rev. Chalmers Martin, D.D., President of the Pennsylvania College for Women, gave a course of five lectures on "The Historical Development of the Missionary Idea."

The Board of Education offered the Newberry Scholarship, paying \$400 a year for three years, to the Middle Class, and after a competitive examination the honor was awarded to Mr. G. C. Fisher.

The health of the students has been unusually good. There has not been a single case of serious illness during the entire year. The spiritual tone of the student body has been exceptionally high. This has been manifested in their application and devotion to duty. Their missionary zeal has been evinced in the financial support which they have given to a graduate of the Institution in China, and in their attendance on lectures by returned missionaries and Secretaries of Boards.

In addition to the various forms of religious work in which they have been previously engaged, they have very willingly undertaken the morning prayers at the Presbyterian Hospital together with a monthly preaching service.

In view of all these facts we are warranted in saying, without any exaggeration, that the session of 1901--1902 under the blessing of God has been very successful.

Rev. James A. Kelso, Ph.D., in accordance with the recommendation adopted at the semi-annual meeting of the Board of Directors held in

November, 1901, was formally inaugurated as Professor of Hebrew and Old Testament Literature on the evening of May 7, in the North Presbyterian Church, Allegheny, Pa. Rev. O. A. Hills, D.D., Vice-President of the Board of Directors, in the absence of Dr. Kennedy, the President, presided. Rev. James H. Snowden, D.D., delivered the charge to the new Professor and Dr. Kelso delivered his inaugural address on the Old Testament idea of holiness.

The Board of Directors re-elected Rev. Matthew B. Riddle, D.D., LL.D., to the position of President of the Faculty for the ensuing year.

The Board also congratulated the Faculty upon the successful conclusion of their faithful labors during another Seminary year, and expressed great gratification on this account and formally assured the Faculty of the confidence, Christian sympathy, co-operation and prayers of the Board.

The following action was also taken with reference to the completion of twenty-five years of service by Dr. Jeffers in connection with the Seminary: "The Board of Directors records with gratitude the singular favor of the Lord of the harvest, who for the past twenty-five years has blessed this Seminary with the wise, learned and efficient services of the Rev. Professor William Hamilton Jeffers, D.D., LL.D., and desires on this twenty-fifth anniversary of his incumbency hereby to express to Dr. Jeffers the high esteem and sincere affection of the Board, praying that as the years go on his service here may continue to be more and more abundantly blessed by Him who loves his ministers and gives the increase."

The closing services of the Seminary were held this year on the evening of May 8, in the First Presbyterian Church, Allegheny, Pa., and after the delivery of the diplomas to the students by Dr. Riddle, the President of the Faculty, a memorial address was made by Rev. Henry T. McClelland, D.D., reviewing the seventy-five years of the Seminary's history which was completed at the close of this term.

A banquet was held in the Chapel of the Seminary in the earlier part of this same evening in commemoration of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Seminary.

No deaths have occurred in the membership of the Board during this present year. The outgoing Class of 1902 was re-elected and made the Class of 1906.

V. GENERAL STATEMENT.

We have to report the death of Rev. Claude B. H. Martin, D.D., Professor of Church History, on April 22, 1902, which greatly saddened the closing days of the session. Dr. Martin labored faithfully and heroically to the last, attending his classes with some degree of regularity till a week or ten days before his decease. His death is a very great loss to the Seminary and to the Church.

Steps have been taken looking to the filling of the Chair of Church History, vacated by Dr. Martin's death.

During the year a course of lectures on “Great Preachers of the Nineteenth Century” was delivered by Professor Emeritus Rev. John M. Worrall, D.D., also a course of lectures on “Pastoral Work” by the Rev. Meade C. Williams, D.D.

The Board of Directors has adopted a Form of Constitution and By-Laws for the government of the Seminary.

Plans have been drawn and steps taken looking to the early erection of handsome new permanent seminary buildings.

Altogether, the first year of the Presbyterian Theological Seminary of Kentucky has been characterized by a spirit of perfect harmony, under the Divine blessing, in the Board, in the Faculty, and in the Student body, and is auspicious of a growing career of large usefulness to Christ and His Church.

Of this number 95 are Presbyterians in connection with our Assembly ; 6 come from the German Evangelical, 4 from the Canadian Presbyterian Church, 2 from the Calvinistic Methodist, 2 from the Cumberland Presbyterian, 1 from the Reformed Presbyterian, 1 from the United Presbyterian, and 1 from the Methodist Church.

The special lecturer for the session was Prof. Caspar Réne Gregory, Ph.D., D.D., LL.D. His subject : "Textual Criticism of the New Testament." In addition to these lectures the students had the privilege of hearing others of great interest.

The Bernadine Orme Smith Fellowship which was awarded a year ago to Mr. William H. Foulkes, has been used by him in prosecuting his studies in Philosophical Apologetics in Edinburgh, Scotland. The Faculty reported his return to this country, and that he brought with him certificates of the work done by him under his chosen Professors.

The Revell Prize, consisting of fifty dollars' worth of the publications of the well-known firm of Revell & Co., to be given to that member of the Senior Class writing the best thesis on an assigned subject in the Old Testament Department, was awarded this year to Mr. Claude Riley Shaver.

The gift of two new Fellowships, one in the Old Testament Department, the other in the New, with an endowment of thirty thousand dollars for each, was announced to the Board at its special meeting in March. The

conditions under which these Fellowships should be awarded were also submitted to the Board at the same time. These generous gifts made, the one by Mrs. Nettie F. McCormick, the other by Mrs. Isabella F. Blackstone, through the personal effort of Prof. Robinson, are highly commended. Mrs. McCormick kindly put at the disposal of the Board at once one-half of the income of the Hebrew Fellowship, and all of the conditions having been fully complied with, the Faculty recommended the Board to appoint as the holder of this Fellowship for one year Mr. Alexander Albert Pieters, which was done.

The Faculty called the attention of the Board to the fact that in many of our first-class Seminaries, degrees, such as that of B.D., are granted to students for special work of a highly meritorious character, and expressed the opinion that it was eminently desirable that this Seminary should fall in line in this respect, if it be practicable to do so.

At the regular annual meeting of the Board of Directors, while in session May 1, 1902, it was by a vote of more than three-fourths of the Directors present, that is to say, unanimously, resolved that Section 4 of Article II of the Constitution be amended by adding to said Section the following clause:

“The Board shall have power to elect a President of the Seminary, who shall be a member of the Faculty, and subject to all the Rules and Regulations which apply to other members of the Faculty.”

When so amended said Section will read as follows:

SECTION 4. The Board of Directors shall have power to elect and duly induct and inaugurate into office the Professors of the Seminary; to receive their resignations; also to remove them from office; such elections and removals to be subject to the veto of the General Assembly. The Board shall also have power to suspend temporarily a Professor, preliminary to and pending an investigation of charges against his conduct or doctrine.

The Board shall have power to elect a President of the Seminary, who shall be a member of the Faculty, and subject to all the Rules and Regulations which apply to other members of the Faculty.

5. GENERAL STATEMENT.

All things considered, the past year's work in the Seminary has been carried forward with marked success, remembering the continued absence in the East of the Rev. Henry C. Minton, D.D., Professor of Systematic Theology (Moderator of the General Assembly), and the recent departure of Rev. Robert Mackenzie, D.D., Professor of Apologetics and Missions, to an important charge in New York city.

6. GENERAL REMARKS.

At its annual meeting the Board of Directors elected the following Directors, whose term shall expire in April, 1905: Rev. W. O. Ruston, D.D., Rev. Henry Schmitt, Jr., Rev. E. R. Burkhalter, D.D., Rev. E. J. Boell, William M. Camp, C. Bayless, John Kruse and A. J. Van Maur. Rev. B. E. S. Ely, Jr., D.D., was chosen in place of Rev. Ernst Schuette, D.D., resigned, in the Class of 1903. Mr. Thomas Foster, who has been on the Board almost from the organization of the Seminary, and who is prevented by infirmities of age from attending the meetings, was made Honorary Director. We ask the Assembly to approve of this action.

The Rev. N. M. Steffens, D.D., whose election to the Chair of Theology was approved by the last Assembly and who complied with the condition annexed to the approval by joining the Presbytery of Dubuque, was installed on April 30, 1902.

Five students, having completed the course of study, were granted diplomas of graduation, to wit: Jacob J. Agena, George Frank, Louis Goetz, Jueren Jansen and John Neve. The scholarship prize of \$100 was awarded to J. J. Agena.

The great need of the Seminary is increased endowment. On our meagre income we have been enabled to keep the doors open and to avoid indebtedness. We should enlarge our work. The demands upon the German ministry require the best equipment for pure young men. Enlargement can only come by endowment. Rev. Cornelius M. Steffens, of the Presbytery of Dubuque, has been appointed Financial Secretary and is meeting

with some encouragement in his work. The greatness of the cause is witnessed by the incoming multitudes of foreigners, who furnish constantly new fields of evangelism. The duty of the Church is recognized. We ask the Assembly to commend this effort in such a way as shall open the churches to our representative.

3. THE STUDENTS.

During the year there have been in attendance seventeen Academic and seven Theological students. Our graduating class was composed of six members, and we have already received an unusually large number of applications for admission to the Academic Department.

This feature is peculiarly gratifying in view of the lately and largely increased German immigration.

4. THE ALUMNI.

The Alumni now number 108 ; of whom 9 have died, 85 are pastors of churches ; the remainder are teaching or doing literary work.

5. THE FINANCES.

With devout thanksgiving to Almighty God and profound gratitude to our generous friends, we record the fact that the debt which has proved so burdensome of late years has been entirely liquidated.

On May 1, 1898, we were compelled to report a deficit of \$9,216.76 ; on May 1, 1900, we had reduced it to \$7,501.12 ; on May 1, 1901, to \$3,377.27, and on May 1, 1902, we announced not only that every pecuniary obligation has been fully met, but also that an addition of \$1,908.81 has been made to the endowment of the German and the Newark Professorships. This desirable and gratifying result is largely due to the energetic, patient, and persevering efforts of our Professor, Rev. Dr. Henry J. Weber.

This total covers an increase of \$7500 during the current year; \$5000 being a contribution from Ralph Vorhees, Esq., and invested in a residence for a Professor, and \$2500 being a scholarship founded by the family of the late Hon. Wm. E. Dodge, which we acknowledge *in memoriam*. The total invested gifts of the late Hon. Wm. E. and Mrs. Melissa Dodge amount to \$40,500; to which we add, with grateful memory, a like amount contributed by him in annual scholarships during the twenty-five years of his trusteeship in Lincoln University.

RELATION OF THE THEOLOGICAL TO THE COLLEGIATE DEPARTMENT.

All the resources and property of the University are subservient to the Theological Department. Candidates for the ministry, with other students, have the benefit of endowed instruction in the college classes, and of dormitory rooms and instruction halls made free from rent by the generosity of the patrons of Lincoln University. There are now seventy-five candidates for the ministry in the Collegiate Department. These together with the sixty-two in the Theological Department make a total of 137 candidates for the ministry under our care during the current year.

This proportion of 137 to 75 would be immediately increased, if the contributions of the churches to the Board of Missions for Freedmen could be enlarged in twentieth century proportions, so that the Board could venture without fear of debt to give appointments to worthy and eager missionaries.

Lincoln University could and perhaps ought to apply all its resources to the increase of a godly and highly educated Gospel ministry for the colored race.

THE HIGHER EDUCATION.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, met in Brooklyn in 1876, reiterated its adherence to the higher educational requirements made of candidates for the ministry in our Form of Government, and refused "to modify the regulations" of the XIV Chapter, "so as to make provision for any class of exceptional cases." Meanwhile, recognizing the deplorable and immediate necessity "of the great work to be done by our Church among the colored people," in view of the perilous "experience of several years" in lowering the requirements, the General Assembly enjoined the Presbyteries "to take great care lest incompetent or unworthy men be admitted into the ministry of our Church."

The General Assembly in 1876 virtually decided that the Constitution of the Church requires the higher education of its Negro ministers, and said that "the experience of several years" of tolerated exceptions made renewed care a governmental duty. This variation from the regulations imperiled health to save life.

This action of the General Assembly was its answer to an overture from Lincoln University. From that time, as before, this Institution has hastened and enlarged its educational work to save the spiritual life, and raised its standard of education higher to save the health of the churches, gathered out of the communities of colored people North and South. One result of our work is that there are a hundred and fifty-two colored men who have received this higher education on the roll of the Presbyteries of our Church.

There are other urgent necessities of the colored youth of our country. They need common school education to avert the harm which ignorance inflicts. They need industrial education, that their skill may economize and not waste the sweat of their toil, and may advantageously exchange it in

the mart of labor into the bread needful for the body; and they need the encouragement of fair wages for honest work.

But the Presbyterian Church has directed the attention of its members to their higher needs and their eternal responsibilities, and has commended Lincoln University to the benevolent as a successful agency for the higher education of their ministry.

We rest the justification of our higher education of the Negro on the act of God. Man has not conferred on him his powers. And God has not endowed him with any superfluous powers. He will not excuse the Christianized Negro from perfecting every feature of the Divine Image into which he has been recreated. The renunciation of higher education by the Negro minister would be spiritual suicide. Any Presbytery would be justified in erasing the name of such a man from its ministerial roll. The Presbyterian Church will not impose upon her colored ministers such a degradation.

We look to the friends of the industrial education of the Negro for the most generous support of his necessary higher education.

During the first twentieth century year now closing we have received several contributions to our higher work:

These, with other not less valued gifts, we gratefully acknowledge as the first fruits of an expected harvest. Many churches have been struggling with their debts. The whole church has been engaged in reorganizing a forward movement in the great departments of work committed to its historic Boards. The Negro awaits his turn. The Lord is giving him the emphasis of numbers. Interpreting His providence, we must count *that* a preliminary blessing. But we must not make his numbers a curse to him by preventing his enlightenment. We must not enchain the powers, nor crush the aspirations, nor disappoint the hopes which God has implanted in our Negro fellow-Christians. A pent-up power which cannot be annihilated must explode, involving in its wreckage all about it. From those to whom God sends the higher message we must not withhold the key of interpretation. Men may make a Trust of all earth products, so that no man save he that has the mark of the Trust may sell or buy in the markets of this world; but Christian men dare not make a syndicate to control the light which is freely given from above to enlighten *every man* that cometh into the world. It would be selfish to withhold from the Negro what we value for ourselves.

Dr. Bingham had been for eleven years acting Professor of Systematic Theology. The Board of Trustees will nominate to the next General Assembly an occupant for the vacant chair.

Lincoln University invites the inspection of the Church. Acquaintance-ship is necessary to co-operation. The Negro must be known in order to be appreciated. He is not fully known in his industries or in his vices. The grace of Christ makes a new man of him. The Church will recognize the mark of Christ wherever He enstamps it. Presbyterian education follows in the wake of grace.

Presbyterians ought to hear the cry of the needy as God hears it, and He hears it as the cry of an immortal soul hungry for the bread of life.

Lincoln University offers itself as a vicarious agency to the Church to perform an obligation which its members cannot personally fulfill.

Biddle University continues in its great work, under the head of the Church, of uplifting among the needy people for whose benefit the school was originally designed. The entering class numbered seven: Kersey Jones Cardy, Huron College; James Clark, Manitoba College; Amadeo Maes, Del Norte College; Thomas C. Osborn, Hastings College; Richard L. Purdy, Western College, Iowa; John Elton Youel, Coe College, and Emery E. Zimmerman, Bellevue College.

The Seminary has made large advance during the past year, and through the liberality of its friends, and chiefly Mrs. William Thaw, of Pittsburg, whose benefactions for the year amount to over \$25,000, is able to report to the General Assembly at this time a total amount of \$90,000 as the present value of its property.

The new Seminary building has been begun and is now in course of erection. It is expected to have it completed in September for the opening of the Fall term. It will furnish ample provision for the needs of the Seminary for a long time, giving rooms for students and Professors, Recitation rooms, Chapel, Library, etc.

The Board has decided this year to make special provision for the training of Bohemian students by offering them, in addition to the regular Seminary curriculum, instruction in the Bohemian language and in History of the Reformation in Bohemia, these being specially necessary to fit men for mission work among Slavic people. The Seminary has made substantial progress in its endowment and other permanent funds, yet after all it is but a beginning and much remains to be accomplished, but if the good hand of our God had not been upon us we never could have come this far. Thankful for the way in which He has led us and for the friends He has given us, we look forward with hope for the future. We must, it may be for a long time to come, continue to appeal to the Presbyterian Church for the funds needful to carry forward and make permanent a work, so closely connected with the supply of ministers needed in this large and increasingly important Home Mission field.

ABSTRACT OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH ANNUAL REPORT.

This Assembly will celebrate the centennial of the organized home mission work of our Church.

In 1802 the Permanent Committee of Home Missions was organized. A story of the work of the Church during this century would tell how our country has been occupied for Christ from the Alleghenies to the Pacific and from Alaska to Porto Rico; how about 5600 churches have been organized and in part supported by this Board, and how hundreds of schools

among exceptional populations have elevated, and in some cases transformed, the communities where they were planted. It was estimated by Henry Kendall that nine-tenths of all our Presbyterian churches owe their existence, directly or indirectly, to the fostering hand of home missions. The Board of Home Missions has issued altogether over 74,000 commissions. The first annual collection reported to the Assembly amounted to about \$400. In all about \$23,000,000 have been expended upon this work, and during the ecclesiastical year which has just closed the Church expended \$803,870 for this great service.

Since our last report the following missionaries have ceased from their labors and entered upon their reward. They are:

CUBA.

In our Report last year we called the attention of the Church to the opportunity for Christian work which this island afforded and made an appeal for means to enable us to establish our work there. The appeal was providentially and quickly answered.

In looking about for a man to begin and organize our work in Cuba we turned naturally to the Rev. J. Milton Greene, D.D., who began our work in San Juan, Porto Rico. After a brief campaign in the States in presenting the needs of the Caribbean Islands and their claim upon the Presbyterian Church, he sailed for Havana in October, having secured two other missionaries to accompany him, the Rev. A. Waldo Stevenson, of Beaver Falls, Pa., and the Rev. Herbert S. Harris, the assistant pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian Church in New York. They held their first service the latter part of October, with an attendance at Sabbath-school of about fifty and an evening attendance of sixty persons. The Rev. Pedro Rioseco, under the direction of the Presbyterian Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work, had established a Sabbath-school in Havana and had been holding services. His work formed the nucleus for that which Dr. Greene thus began. A hall was at once rented in the Calle de Industria, near the *Prado*, the principal street in the city. Dr. Greene also secured the services of the Rev. Antonio Mazzorana, a native Cuban who had been educated in Europe.

In November Dr. Greene made a short tour of inspection in the district outside of the city and found at Guines, about thirty-five miles from Havana, a most favorable opening. It is a city of 9000 inhabitants and about 12,000 in the municipal district. There is only one Romish church, which the people very generally ignore. Our missionaries received a most cordial welcome.

The Rev. Mr. Stevenson has been assigned to this new and most promising station. From that centre it is estimated 25,000 people can be reached, and they are all accessible.

The third principal station to be occupied by our Church is in the district of Sancti Spiritus, to which station the Rev. Herbert S. Harris has been assigned. It is in the province of Santa Clara. It has a population of 12,000 in the city proper, while the jurisdiction embraces some 8000 or 10,000 more.

PORTO RICO.

This island remains one of the most appealing and most fruitful of home mission fields. What we said a year ago about the weariness of the people of the emptiness of the forms of the Spanish Church, and their readiness to receive the Gospel and Christian education is now as manifestly true.

The practice of Dr. Grace Williams Atkins, our missionary physician at San Juan, has so developed that a hospital has become an absolute necessity. Much of the money for this building has been raised, and during the

coming year we expect to see it in operation. Dr. Atkins is known as an "evangelical doctor." Twice every day the people gather at her dispensary. Seldom less than fifteen or twenty come morning and evening, and sometimes as many as thirty. Before admitting any one of them into her office for examination and treatment she reads to them the Scriptures in Spanish and explains to them the way of life.

MAYAGUEZ.—The great need in Mayaguez is that of a church building. We are the only evangelical denomination in the city of 20,000 people. We cannot hope to meet our responsibilities to that population unless we have better quarters for religious services than at present. The church that is needed there will cost, with the lot, probably \$10,000.

AGUADILLA.—The Rev. Judson L. Underwood continues his manifold labors in Aguadilla and the region roundabout. At this point a lot has been purchased for the erection of a church building, which it is hoped will be ready for occupancy during the present year.

Our church there, though only two years old, has now a membership of 160. Services are held as often as possible at Montana, a country station ten miles from Aguadilla.

The Board also commissioned last October and sent to the island the Rev. Jas. A. McAllister, a recent graduate of Princeton Seminary. He is to have charge of the work at Isabela and Quebradillas, on the northwestern coast of the island. In the latter town, although a centre of fanaticism, 275 people were present at the first service.

SAN GERMAN.—Our work was still further extended during the past year by the commissioning in October of the Rev. James Greer Woods, of Dubuque, Iowa, who with his family went to San German, also in the western part of the island. It is a town of about 6000 people in the midst of a very populous district. The missionary reports large congregations and much interest.

ALASKA.

POINT BARROW.—The Rev. and Mrs. H. Richmond Marsh, M.D., are closing the fifth year of their service as missionaries of the Board at this station. They and their native elder, a commissioner from the Presbytery of the Yukon at the last General Assembly, returned to their homes and their work last summer. Rev. and Mrs. Samuel R. Spriggs, the teachers at that station, supplied the religious services during the absence of Dr. Marsh.

TELLER.—This new mining town is situated at Port Clarence, seventy-five miles north of Nome. Our work was begun there by the Rev. S. Hall Young, D.D., and has been continued during the year by Dr. E. J. Meacham, a Christian physician from Nome.

The Rev. M. Egbert Koonce, Ph.D., whose permanent station was Rampart, on the Yukon, spent several months of last summer at St. MICHAEL'S, a point of departure for steamers up the river. Dr. Koonce, after three years of very hard work, came out in March and April by dog-sled from Rampart to Valdez, a lonely journey of a thousand miles over the snow, and is at this Assembly a commissioner from the Presbytery of the Yukon.

EAGLE CITY.—Seven hundred miles up the river from Rampart is EAGLE CITY, the station which the Rev. and Mrs. James Wollaston Kirk have held for three years. What with winters when that "kangaroo" weather varied from a few degrees above zero to sixty and seventy below, and with the constant fluctuation of population, our missionaries have had a hard time and have met it with fortitude and faith.

KLUCKWAN.—The work in this station was organized by us some twenty years ago. Recently the Methodists held services there conducted by Rev. M. A. Sellen. By an arrangement entered into among the denominations a number of years ago all the region of Alaska occupied by the Chilkats and Chilkoots was assigned to our Church. The Methodist Board, in courteous recognition of the terms of that agreement, have transferred the Kluckwan field to us. This places about a thousand Indians at Ilaines and Kluckwan under our care.

JUNEAU.—The feature of the year in this historic little town is the beginning of self-support by the white church under the care of the Rev. J. H. Condit. With a good church building and an attractive parsonage, both paid for, the Church may expect the early attaining of entire self-support by that congregation.

In the Indian church, under the care of the Rev. L. F. Jones, this has been a good year.

HOONAH.—Our missionary, the Rev. William M. Carle, has had both a hard and an encouraging year. It has been a time of epidemic and other hindrances, and a time also when many of the professing Christians who had continued to participate in the native feasts renounced the old customs and declared their purpose to become true Christians.

During the year sixty-six persons have been received into the church. The tribe seems to be on the eve of turning to the purity and strictness of Christian life.

SITKA.—The spiritual awakening which Kluckwan, Haines and Hoonah experienced during the year has also been felt in the capital. There have been good results which can be made permanent by wise management.

The Rev. W. S. Bannerman has continued his varied services to the two churches and has been greatly helped in the spiritual work among the natives by Mrs. Paul and Mr. Beck, teachers in our Sitka school.

We have not been able to develop agricultural features on the land at Sitka as Mr. Kelly had hoped, but we are still looking forward to the time when this may be done. The other industrial work has gone on as usual. An interesting and important piece of work has just been done by Miss Fannie Willard, our native teacher in the Sitka school, in the preparation of a grammar of the Thlinkit language. It is the first time an effort has been made to reduce the language to grammatical and printed form. It is now being published in San Francisco and will, it is believed, be a valuable help to our work generally in Alaska.

KLAWACK.—At this station the Rev. and Mrs. David Waggoner began work last summer. They have had a year of special blessing. They found peculiar difficulties. There are three distinct villages widely separated, yet forming one town. The missionary has tried to reach all of these places. He has been handicapped for lack of equipment.

JACKSON.—Rev. and Mrs. D. R. Montgomery have closed two years of interesting work at this station. Spiritual blessing has there also attended the means of grace.

As the result of a week of service there Mr. Montgomery received sixteen adults into the church on confession of their faith. Others have been examined and were to be admitted at the next communion service.

WRANGEL.—The two churches here, white and native, continue under the care of the Rev. Harry P. Corser. Dr. Young held a week of special services there with the pastor, and as a result on Sabbath, January 19, twenty persons united with the church on confession of their faith, seventeen of them were baptized, many backsliders were restored and the pastor feels that the Indian work is in a far more hopeful state than ever before during his ministry.

SAXMAN.—The Rev. Edward Marsden has had the happiness of organizing the First Presbyterian Church of Saxman with thirty-one members. Dr. Young assisted him in a series of services of which this organization was the culmination. The people are making a self-sacrificing effort to erect a church building, and the missionary is having success in an effort to develop industrial occupations among his people.

SYNODS.

SYNOD OF CALIFORNIA.—The Pacific coast has recently come into new and greatly increased prominence. The possession of the Philippines and the condition and outlook in China make the work west of the Rocky Mountains of far-reaching influence. In common with all the farther

western States there is both a steady and rapid increase of population. To-day there are not less than 1,527,388 people in the two States, California and Nevada, which comprise this Synod.

The Synod has been led by a deep sense of its need and the inadequate provision made by our Church for the work to ask the Board for the appointment of two synodical missionaries. The Rev. William B. Noble, D.D., of Redlands, Cal., Permanent Clerk of the General Assembly, and the Rev. George W. Lyons, of Haywards, Cal., were nominated by the Synod and appointed by the Board.

SYNOD OF COLORADO.—On the territory now covered by the Synod of Colorado (which includes the State of Colorado and all but the western part of Wyoming) twenty-five years ago there were 28 churches, now there are 128; there were then 3 self-supporting churches, now there are 43; then there were 1280 communicants, now 11,896; at that time there were gathered in our Sabbath-schools 1935 children, now 13,665. All the churches of the Synod except two have been aided by the Board of Home Missions. The event of the year has been the large number of churches (8) that have come to self-support. There have been the same number of new organizations and more are in sight. For the needy field of Wyoming a pastor at large has been secured.

SYNOD OF IOWA.—Iowa is in a transition state as far as Presbyterianism is concerned. It has passed the pioneer period. The State has grown greatly in numbers and wealth and culture. Railroad building, new towns and general thrift are constantly changing conditions there, so that communities which had to be content with occasional services, or so-called "union" meetings, or the various "isms" of the day, are now seeking the regular ministrations of Presbyterian pastors. State pride and enthusiasm have not yet been developed to such a degree as to wholly provide for the work of missions within the bounds of the Synod. The work of other days makes progress towards self-support, and the time cannot be distant when Iowa, which has a larger number of missionaries (100) under the care of the Board than any other Synod, will become a distributor instead of a receiver of missionary aid.

SYNOD OF KENTUCKY.—The Southern branch of the Presbyterian Church is stronger in Kentucky than the Northern, but the consolidation of the two colleges at Danville and the two theological seminaries at Louisville will have a marked effect on the field. The prospects are good, and students are anxious to settle in Kentucky and are asking for fields of labor. We have three Presbyteries in the State, viz., *Ebenezer*, with five churches aided by the Board, under the care of three ministers; *Louisville*, with seven missionary churches and four ministers, and *Transylvania*, with twelve missionary churches and five ministers.

SYNOD OF MICHIGAN.—The Synod of Michigan, which has been considering the matter of self-support for several years, finally resolved last October to undertake its own mission work from April, 1902. The Synod and the Board have corresponded freely upon the subject, as the Board heartily commended the purpose and was ready to co-operate with the Synod in every way and facilitate the carrying out of the plan. The Synod's plan provides for the gathering of its own funds, to be administered by the Synodical Committee. The Treasurer of the Board, at the Synod's suggestion, is the treasurer of the Synod's fund, and that without expense to the Synod. The Board deposits the Michigan money in a separate account, to be paid out only upon the order of Synod. The churches of the Synod have agreed to continue their annual contribution to the Board of Home Missions.

SYNOD OF MONTANA.—The Rev. Chas. F. Richardson, of Great Falls, Mont., was recommended by the Synod of Montana as synodical missionary to fill the place made vacant by the resignation of Dr. Baird on account of ill health. He entered upon his duties August 1, 1901.

SYNOD OF NEW MEXICO.—Arizona is in the formative period. Larger development and more extended settlement have been accomplished in the

past year than in any of the preceding years. The territory is 300 by 375 miles in extent. The whole of the territory is covered in the Presbyterian enterprise. One event of the year has been the taking up of work among the Navajo Indians. Rev. Charles H. Bierkemper last September began laboring for this interesting tribe, the centre of work for the present being at Ganado, Ariz. There are about twenty thousand of these Indians, and our missionary is the first ordained minister settled among them. The Board has also in prospect a missionary for the Mojave Indians on their reservation on the Colorado River. The special feature of interest this year in the whole Mexican work, and of the Indian work also, is the starting of a training-school at Albuquerque under the leadership of the Rev. H. C. Thomson, D.D. He comes to the work well equipped for it by a knowledge of the Spanish language, experience as a home missionary and enthusiasm for the evangelization of the Mexican people. A good work was done years ago at Del Norte, Col., under the leadership of the sainted Rev. F. M. Gilchrist. Now the work is taken up afresh. It is not a theological seminary, but a training-school where selected men may be fitted to go out among their people and evangelize them—preparing the way for the ordained minister. There are nine men now receiving such training.

SYNOD OF NORTH DAKOTA.—We have organized seven churches in the Synod of North Dakota, have brought nine fields to self-support and have made a net gain of sixteen ordained ministers on the field. There has been good spiritual interest and ingathering over a large part of the State. The needs are greater than they were one year ago, as it is reported that 28,000 people settled in the State, coming from Iowa and Illinois alone, in the year 1901. The prospects for development in the year 1902 are better than in any year in the history of the State. Various estimates are made, from sixty to one hundred thousand, nearly all coming from the States and Canada; a large percentage in every community is of Calvinistic heredity.

SYNOD OF OREGON.—The main feature of the work in Oregon for the past year has been our advance into 'unoccupied' territory. We have gone into seven fields during the past year which were entirely destitute of all church privileges when we entered them. They are as follows: Southern Oregon Presbytery, Glendale, and Woodville. In both these places we have organized churches and supplied them with preachers. In Glendale a church building has been erected and dedicated. In Willamette Presbytery, Waldport and Shelburn. In both these places we have Sunday-schools organized and church buildings erected. In Waldport a church has been organized and minister secured in connection with Newport. In East Oregon Presbytery we have occupied Meachem, Umatilla, the Hahn school district near Pendleton, and the north end of Grant county at Hamilton, Monument, and in two school districts. At Meachem and in the Hahn district chapels have been erected. In all these places the way has been prepared for the home missionary by the faithful work of the Sunday-school missionaries.

SYNOD OF SOUTH DAKOTA.—The great rise in land values in the State has resulted in more shifting of population and great inrush of new settlers, making new and larger demands upon missionary efforts. If 100,000 people settled in South Dakota last year, it seems now certain that double that number will settle here this year. Increase of what has been done for evangelizing this State is the great need, with more emphasizing of the evangelistic work and an increased number of effective ministers who can adapt their methods to the needs. It is in Aberdeen Presbytery that the work is expanding the most.

SYNOD OF TEXAS.—Texas is a problem. It is an immense State with a large and rapidly growing population. We are careful to respect the rights and even the wishes of our brethren of the Southern Presbyterian Church, not entering any field where they are at work. But the need is far beyond their ability to overtake it, and with our help there yet remain many localities altogether untouched with the gospel. The agricultural interest, the oil fields, and the rapidly growing export trade call for more railroads and stimulate activity along every line.

SYNOD OF UTAH.—The Synod of Utah covers the State of Utah and portions of Idaho and Wyoming. The year has been one of activity and aggression on the part of the Mormon hierarchy. This has been due to two causes: first, the Presbyteries have more clearly defined their purpose and work; and, second, the Mormon Church has felt the pressure of awakened public sentiment in the East, and has therefore become more active in Utah. To merely hold the ground already won in Utah requires much work, patience and grit, as well as grace. To advance becomes increasingly difficult. At least eleven new men are needed to take up the work already begun and some new places where we ought to enter.

SYNOD OF WISCONSIN.—Wisconsin has a large foreign population: so much so, that in many sections of the State the English language is rarely heard in conversation and in many stores and places of business it is necessary to have clerks who can speak German, Danish, Polish, etc. A large proportion of these foreigners are Germans, and the great majority of them are either Catholics, Lutherans, or Turners. Our work among these people is especially difficult, as they have their own customs, religious habits, and observances. A few foreigners scattered here and there in an American community will lose their individuality and will become thoroughly American. Not so in Wisconsin. Whole sections of the State are almost as foreign as when the people were in the "Old Country," and it is a matter of pride with them that the old customs prevail and that the old language is in use. To enter such sections with the gospel, as the Presbyterians hold it, is almost impossible. The regions first settled (formerly Protestant) are changing, and many of our country churches have been so weakened by death and removal that home mission aid is imperative, while the extinction of some of our churches is threatened.

THE WOMAN'S BOARD.

This important department of the Board's work has been sorely bereaved by the death of its corresponding secretary, Mrs. Frederick H. Pierson, which occurred at her home in Elizabeth, N. J., on January 14, 1902, after a very brief illness. The loss of so valuable a worker has been keenly felt, but the work goes on, though the workers, one by one, fall by the way.

As the missionary teachers apply themselves to their task they are the more thoroughly convinced that the most economical and successful method of reaching these destitute, ignorant, falsely taught peoples who are now occupying the remoter and consequently little known parts of our land is through the children. Yet on no single field, even among the most ignorant, debased and falsely taught among our exceptional populations, has there been a lack of encouragement or a want of success. The permanency of the work is one of the most important reasons for its success. The policy of the Woman's Board has been to enter the field to stay. There are no roving missionaries sent out to hold brief series of meetings, exciting the emotions of the people, urging confession of Christ and organizing them into churches, and then moving on and leaving them to their fate. This too often is the case, and results in discouraging the people and causing them to fall back into their old habits, thus making their "last end worse than the first." But a far more satisfactory method is to search out localities where the greatest need exists, and where the other agencies of the Church at large are the least liable to succeed, and there plant the school or establish the mission. This method appeals to all classes, and when the time comes, as it always does sooner or later, for the gathering together of the converts into little churches, the work is put on a solid basis. This accounts for the fact that three Presbyteries and almost an entire Synod have grown out of this work.

LITERATURE DEPARTMENT.

This centennial year has witnessed an increase of 25 per cent. in the demands for literature in excess of last year, which was then the banner year in the history of the department. An average of 1082 requests for information per month have been received from churches, Sabbath-schools, women's and young people's societies and individuals; about 3831 of these were for literature and collection envelopes for general distribution in congregations. This is a gratifying increase over the report of a year ago, but still there are more than 3948 churches where the Board's leaflets have not been used.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT.

The Young People's Department is a strong factor in our work, although a comparatively recent adjunct to the Board (the first Secretary having been appointed in 1893). The development has been constant, so that from year to year we have been able to report progress in the interest and contributions from the young people. Although the gain in the average contribution is small, more contributing societies are reported, due mainly to the persistent, faithful efforts of synodical and presbyteral young people's secretaries through whom the work is presented, and whose aim it has been to secure an active interest in home missions on the part of every young people's organization.

RESULTS.

As the result of the review of the year's work the following points may properly be emphasized:

1. An unusually large number of churches have come to self-support. According to our promise of last year we publish them on a Roll of Honor, to which we call the attention of the Presbyteries.†

In addition to those which have come to self-support, many have advanced toward that goal. While in many cases the advance has not been great, it indicates the appreciation of the churches of the need of progress.

2. This has been a year of marked spiritual results. In some cases these have been the result of special evangelistic efforts; in other cases of the faithful and diligent use of the ordinary means of grace.

† Of these, thirty-two are missionaries of the Board and eleven are native evangelists and interpreters whose salaries are paid either in whole or in part by the Woman's Board.

In this connection it is our happiness to recognize the work of the General Assembly's Evangelistic Committee which, on many fields, has co-operated with our missionaries in special efforts for the salvation of souls.

3. As appears from the Treasurer's statement elsewhere, there has been decided advance in receipts. A large part of this came to the Woman's Board, and was expended largely in permanent improvements on mission property in various parts of the country. The receipts of the Board from living sources are also somewhat larger than last year. As our work, however, was advanced during the present year about \$30,000, we were able to meet our obligations with a surplus of less than \$5000. We have, therefore, practically nothing with which to begin the new year, and yet the demands from the field were so urgent that the duty to advance was imperative.

Many of the States in the West, Northwest and Southwest have been receiving notable accessions of population, and the churches call loudly for help to enable them to take advantage of the opportunities that are presented on every hand. Not to advance at this time would be to retreat. The Board, therefore, has ordered an advance over last year of \$25,000. This is scarcely more than half of what was asked. Some of the Presbyteries have necessarily been disappointed. Will not the Church this year provide such resources that all obligations shall be honored at the close of the year, and the way be opened for a still larger advance in the year that is to come? Much of the new work which was urged could not be touched. Will not the Church during the coming year come forward so strongly in her contributions that there may be still further advance in appropriations? Surely this Centennial year is a time when we must not only march on, but with a strong and steady step! How rapid shall be the advance we leave it now for the Church to sav.

The Board laments the loss by death of the Rev. George T. Purves, D.D., LL.D., from whose service in the cause of Home Missions much was justly expected. The Rev. Wilton Merle Smith, D.D., was chosen to fill the unexpired term.

The year has been unmarred by great catastrophes like the Boxer uprising in China and the famine in India, which made the preceding year remarkable for sorrow and for suffering. It has been a year of quiet growth and uninterrupted expansion of the work. There have been added to the churches 5241 new members, the largest number added in any year of the Board's history. At the close of the year the Board reports 749 missionaries, a gain of 34; 44,443 communicants, a net gain of 2884; 26,108 scholars in schools, a gain of 198, and 289,363 patients treated in hospitals and dispensaries, and 75,011,660 pages issued from its presses. The number of patients has been nine times that of the number treated in the best of the hospitals in New York City, and the expense has been but one-tenth as great.

The receipts, as indicated in the detailed report of the Treasurer, have exceeded those of any preceding year: from churches, \$357,438.80, a loss of \$271.53 as compared with last year; from Women's Boards, \$336,551.47, a gain of \$56,471.91; from legacies, \$158,045.90, a gain of \$76,934.54; from miscellaneous sources, \$114,749.16, a loss of \$3,841.34; from Sunday-schools and Young People's Societies, \$76,793.67, a loss apparent rather than real of \$19,895.22. Adding to these amounts the receipts from investments and receipts upon the mission field, etc., the total receipts for the year for the current work were \$1,086,341.74, as compared with \$969,180.07 from the same sources last year. This has made it possible for the Board to meet all the liabilities assumed for the year; to assure the possibility of rebuilding the Peking and Paotingfu stations, though it still counts upon special efforts to provide for this work, thus releasing the funds now locked up in it for work elsewhere; to set aside a further sum for its necessary reserve funds, as advised by the General Assembly, and to report a balance of \$1291.56. The Board has accepted the generous proposal of Mr. John H. Converse and Mr. E. A. K. Hackett, to support for three years an agent whose whole time shall be given to this work. In line with the same purpose, the Board is hoping to be able to avail itself of the honorary service of several laymen to develop and strengthen the work of the missionary propaganda, especially among the young people.

This interest received a great impulse during the year through the fourth quadrennial convention of the Student Volunteer Movement, held in Toronto, February 26th to March 2d, and attended by 2955 delegates, 2296 of them students, making it probably the largest student convention ever held. It was preceded by the Ninth Annual Conference of Mission Boards. At both of these the Board was represented, and is bold to believe that, through our missionaries, it contributed the representative share of influence which was to have been expected from our Church.

One of the foremost features of encouragement on the mission field during the year has been the development of the spirit of Christian union. Thus far it has found expression chiefly in the association of allied churches, but this is a first and necessary step toward larger things. In

accordance with authority given by the last Assembly, the churches and missionaries connected with the Board in Mexico were united with the churches and missionaries of the Southern Presbyterian Church in the independent Synod of Mexico, which was established with four Presbyteries, in Mexico City, on July 9, 1901. The Rev. A. W. Halsey, D.D., represented the Assembly and the Board at this meeting. In India the Presbyterian Alliance at its meeting in Allahabad, December 11-14, 1901, voted to submit to all Presbyteries in India a basis of union of all the Presbyterian bodies in the country. In China, representatives of the various Presbyterian bodies met in Shanghai, October 2-4, 1901, and took the first steps toward the establishment of one Presbyterian Church in China. In Japan there has long been in existence the Church of Christ, composed of the fruits of the work of all Presbyterian and Reformed Missions; and since the Tokyo Conference in 1900, a spirit of yet broader co-operation has grown, resulting in the organization of a Committee of Co-operation, representing practically all the Missions in Japan, except the Greek Church, the Roman Catholic Church, and the American Episcopal and English Church Missions.

Both in Japan and India and China these movements have been coincident with spiritual revival, and in Japan at least the coincidence is not accidental. The spirit of union displayed in the Tokyo Conference found issue in the Taikyo Dendo movement, described in the report of the Japan Mission herewith submitted to the Assembly. Various causes contributed to render the field ready, and the union of missionaries and natives supplied the required force, and thousands have begun the Christian life as a result of the work. In the Western India Mission, there have been added to the churches more than twice as many persons this past year as were connected with the Mission in 1901 as the result of our thirty years' work. This ingathering was one of the first results of the Famine Relief work. There are now as a result of the famines about 1500 children under the care of our own missionaries to be provided for and trained to Christian life and service.

The martyrs' lives are already fruitful in China. That "noble army of men and boys, the matron and the maid," which marched through the peril, toil and pain of death to their martyrs' crowns in the summer of 1900, has already drawn after it the faith of thousands. In Paotingfu, Mr. Lowrie baptized twenty believers during the year, and the missionaries at Wei Hsien have already welcomed amid the ruins of their destroyed churches many new members into that unseen Church which no man can destroy, and against which the gates of hell cannot prevail. The new work undertaken by the Board in China has been begun with singular promise. Hwai Yuen, in the province of Anhwei, and Siang-tan, in the province of Hunan, have been occupied without trouble, and the difficulty is not so much to find as to sift candidates for baptism. The Chinese have turned again to the West, as they were turning before the reaction of 1899, and schools and colleges are springing up everywhere.

In India the new census reveals a great and disproportionate growth of Christians. These results have caused a certain amount of surprise and consternation in the ranks of Hinduism. Many agencies have co-operated to produce this result—at one end of society the village work among the low, and at the other the work of the Christian colleges among the high castes. The Board has enlarged both forms of work. It desires to see a great extension of the village work. It has also authorized the establishment of a Christian college at Allahabad.

The work in the Philippines has exceeded all expectations and has revealed a solidity and real vitality most encouraging. All southern Luzon is opened before us as our own field, and at Iloilo and Dumaguete our missionaries were the first to occupy Panay and Negros.

In Siam the Mission has settled itself permanently in the two new Stations at Nakawn and Pitsanuloke, the former on the Malay Peninsula, the latter to the north near the gates to the Laos country. The direct results in Siam appear small, but it is a hard type of character to deal with, for the reason that it is a soft type of character in itself. Buddhism cannot create firm character. The Laos churches, almost completely self-supporting, have added 161 to their membership.

The Greek Church Mission in Urumia has lost ground during the year, and the political problem has taken on no fresh complications. The opportunities for work were never before so great. The schisms of Shia Mohammedanism increase in number and in disintegrating force. Among the Nestorians, perplexing as the situation is to the Evangelical Church membership, there has been an addition of 159 on profession of faith. No new difficulties have been thrust on the work of the Syria Mission, but its old ones—Turkish obstruction, Moslem fanaticism, Roman and Greek opposition, immigration, poverty, misgovernment—constitute hindrances enough. No one can estimate, however, the influence exerted by these Persia and Syria Missions on the west and the east of the Mohammedan world.

In Africa fever and death have claimed this year, as alas! in so many years, the lives of some who were ready to give themselves for Africa, and to hold it by their dust for the day of its redemption.

The work of the Board in South America has been prosecuted in Brazil, Chili, Colombia, and Venezuela. The schools at Sao Paulo, under a separate Board of Trustees, have had the most prosperous year of their history. In Chili, the Instituto Ingles has developed into the best institution for boys on the west coast of South America. In Colombia, the revolution has thrown everything into confusion and stopped all country work, as well as some work in the Stations.

In Guatemala the Board has not sought to do more than maintain the small existing force as a testimony to evangelical religion in a land greatly needing the forces of a pure religion.

As reported to the last Assembly, the Rev. Arthur J. Brown, D.D., has been making a visitation of the Missions in Asia, which beginning in the Spring of 1901, has just closed. He has visited Japan, Korea, China, the Philippines, Siam, Laos, India and Syria. The missionaries write in the warmest terms of the help his presence and counsel have given, and his reports to the Board, which have been printed for the use of the Board and the Missions, have been of great value.

The work of providing for the mortgage indebtedness of the Presbyterian Building has continued throughout the year. The remaining mortgage indebtedness chargeable to the Board of Foreign Missions is now only \$150,000. The Board expresses its sincere gratitude to the many friends who have given, and especially to the Rev. Richard S. Holmes, D.D., whose indefatigable efforts have been one of the main factors in achieving this result.

Once again the Board records its appreciation of the work done by the Women's Boards and Societies, which this year have given \$336,551.47, exceeding their largest preceding contribution of \$336,244.78 in 1891. The relations existing between them and the Assembly's Board could not be more harmonious and delightful.

Alike by the devotion of the dead and of the living, and by the unceasing calls of opportunity and need which pour in from every Mission field, the Board feels that the Church is called to a movement of advance and expansion. There should be new Stations in Hunan, Chihli, Anhwei and Chekiang in China, in Laos and Persia, and Mexico and the Philippines, and in every Mission there should be an increase of the native force, of foreign missionaries, and of the general work; while hospitals, schools and colleges need better equipment and more adequate support, so that their

work may be made more efficient in spiritual result. Cannot measures be devised which will result in doubling the Foreign Mission enterprise of the Church?

The Board has appropriated \$950,000 for the year 1902-1903, but a far larger sum is most importunately needed.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER.

The fifth year in succession has closed without a debt. In its history of seventy-one years the Board of Foreign Missions has but once before experienced a longer period of financial prosperity. This satisfactory result could not have been predicted at the close of February, when but two months of the fiscal year remained, as at that time the receipts from all sources, except legacies, had fallen alarmingly below those of the previous year.

CONTRIBUTIONS.

The surplus for the year, as shown by the balance sheet, added to the surplus of last year, gave a total surplus of \$21,291.56, from which has been carried to the credit of the Board's General Reserve Fund, \$20,000. The sources of income are as follows:

PRESBYTERIAN BUILDING.

The present gross income from rentals of the Presbyterian Building is \$118,130 per annum, exclusive of the quarters occupied by the two Boards. There are but six rooms now vacant, and it is expected that in a short time these will be rented.

During the past year many applications for space had to be declined owing to the fact that the building was so generally occupied, and the few remaining offices were not in the most desirable locations. The agents of the building, Messrs. Horace S. Ely & Co., have manifested a personal interest in the conduct of the building, which has largely contributed to the high class of tenants and the gratifying reputation of the building.

Schedule 8 shows the results from operating the building.

THE MORTGAGE DEBT.

On May 1st, the mortgage debt of the Board of Foreign Missions on the Presbyterian Building had been reduced to \$150,000. Grateful acknowledg-

ment is due to the Rev. F. F. Ellinwood, D.D., the senior Secretary of this Board, for the inception of the movement for removing the indebtedness from the Mission House. The services of Rev. R. S. Holmes, D.D., and the Rev. W. W. Atterbury, D.D., and of the members of the Joint Committee of the two Boards having in charge this matter, and of the General Assembly's Committee, have all contributed to the present gratifying results.

Upon the payment of all subscriptions to date the mortgage of this Board will have been reduced to a figure considerably below \$100,000, and it is fair to assume that during the current year the indebtedness will be entirely removed, and it is hoped that the fund will be sufficient to reimburse the Board's General Reserve Fund for the temporary loan made therefrom during the early period when the building was conducted at a loss in operation.

It may be interesting to note that in providing the funds for the erection of the Presbyterian Building, including the removal of its indebtedness, five hundred and ten persons have had a part. The contributions have ranged all the way from two cents, the value of a postage stamp, to something over a quarter of a million dollars. A full list of contributors, covering the one-half interest of the Board of Foreign Missions, will be found in Schedules 11 and 12 of the Financial Report, and is well worthy of perusal.

EXPENSES FOR THE YEAR.

An analysis of the expenses of the Board will be found in Schedule 5 of the Financial Statement. The percentages of disbursements in New York to the total sum received are as follows:

It is a satisfaction to note that this is 0.56 per cent. less than last year.

This has been the second successive year during which the Board has not been compelled to borrow funds for the maintenance of the work. The earning from interest on the daily balances of the Board has been \$3889.92.

ABSTRACT OF EIGHTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

The Board of Education met all the financial obligations of the year without incurring any debt. There was a slight increase in the amount of contributions from churches, Sabbath-schools and young people's societies as compared with the contributions of the previous year, the total amount received from these sources being \$44,099.45.

The total number of candidates enrolled under the care of the Board for the year was 572. Experience shows that there are to be expected recurring seasons of decline in the number of candidates, followed by periods of sometimes sharp and quick reaction. After six years of declining numbers it may reasonably be assumed that there will be very soon an increase which may be both sudden and large, and the Church needs to be prepared for the emergency. It is not improbable that the Board may need an increase of fully ten thousand dollars in income account for the coming year.

The income from legacies was smaller than for many years, and the Twentieth Century Movement brought a very small amount into the treasury of the Board.

The discussion with regard to the decline in the number of candidates has gone on in the Church, and opinions as to the causes vary greatly. The cause most frequently mentioned is the alleged superfluity of ministers. The General Assembly's Special Committee on Education, appointed in 1899, after a careful study of the whole matter, reported that the statement that there are already too many ministers is misleading; and the Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply, with information derived directly from the Stated Clerks of Presbyteries, reported that they found that there were 379 ministers unemployed, and yet able and willing to work. How many of these would prove acceptable ministers cannot be known. Undoubtedly better means are needed to make full and economical use of the force at the disposal of the Church; but we should be sadly recreant to duty if, at such a time as this, we should be occupied simply with the question how to supply our vacancies as they occur. We are bound to survey the vastness of the great harvest-field, the present accessibility of

almost every part, and to take to heart the commission which we have received from our Divine Lord to go in and reap.

The measures which the Board would earnestly press upon the attention of the Church are: A. *Prayerful effort to promote a general revival of religion.* When conversions abound there will be reason to expect a multiplication of candidates. The prompting of a converted heart is to cry out, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" In such a cry from a young man's mouth we may readily recognize an offer of his services for the holy ministry. B. *The enlistment of ministerial influence.* Young men are watchful to observe the life and ways of ministers. When they see ministers magnifying their office and taking pleasure in "infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake," it is likely that they will learn to consider it an honor of the highest kind to be called to the holy office. Ministers in college towns have a great opportunity to come into touch with young men and to use their influence to lead the students to consider the question of a call to the ministry. C. *Prayer in the closet, prayer in the family, and prayer in social meetings,* in addition to more formal prayers in the great congregation. God alone can give a valid call to the ministry, and, as He knows the exact need, He will not call too many, nor make any mistake in selection.

Careful attention has been given to visiting students in their places of study. Much interest was felt in seeing, at the Presbyterian Theological Seminary of Kentucky, with what harmony and success the Northern and Southern branches of the Church have united in prosecuting the work of ministerial education in that State.

Decided inconvenience has been experienced during the year from the failure to provide in the new Constitutional Rule No. III for emergencies, but it may be wise to give longer time for wider acquaintance with its provisions and for the testing of its efficiency.

The Newberry Scholarship has been awarded to George Curtis Fisher, of the Western Theological Seminary, to be enjoyed for three years.

There were enrolled during the year 317 theological students, 220 collegiate students, and 35 students preparing for college. Among the enrollment were 77 colored men, 29 Germans, 4 Spanish-speaking students and 1 Bohemian. Robert Ivan McKee, of Alma College, and H. M. Scott, of Lane Seminary, died during the year. Three candidates were dropped on account of having married, and thirteen applications were declined as not coming up to the requirements of the Board.

The General Assembly is asked to appoint the last Thursday in January, 1903, as a day of prayer for the conversion of youth and for an increase of the ministry, and to request ministers to preach upon the subject of the ministry.

Failure of health compelled Rev. Lewis S. Mudge to resign his membership in the Board.

A Supplemental Report gives the result of study given to the Overture which the Presbytery of Cairo sent up to the General Assembly of 1901, in which they asked a reassertion of the determination of the Church to maintain a high standard of education for the ministry, and also a more specific definition of the course of study which could be considered a suitable preparation for the theological seminary, besides whatever else might be regarded as needful for the preserving of uniformity of action among the Presbyteries on the subject. The Board report a scheme of college studies suitable for candidates for the ministry for the advice and assistance of such as desire the same; intending thus to suggest an ideal scheme and to stimulate to high attainments. They do not consider it to be the province of the General Assembly to prepare examination papers for the uniform use of Presbyteries, but only to promote uniformity as far as practicable, by keeping Presbyteries reminded of the covenant engagement which they have made with each other by the common acceptance of the provisions of the Form of Government as to the proper qualifications for the ministry of the gospel in the Presbyterian Church, by the observance of which alone mutual confidence can be retained, and the ordinations performed by the several Presbyteries be mutually respected and fully recognized.

ABSTRACT OF THE SIXTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

April 1, 1901, to March 31, 1902.

I. SABBATH-SCHOOL AND MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT.

1. MISSIONARY WORK OF THE DEPARTMENT.

This work has been carried on during the past year in 23 Synods and 98 Presbyteries, comprising 31 States and Territories; also in the city of Havana, Cuba.

The number of our missionaries in commission April 1, 1901, was 93. The new appointments during the year have been 22, the withdrawals 18, leaving a force upon the field April 1, 1902, of 97 missionaries, of whom 13 are Synodical missionaries, 83 Presbyteral missionaries, and 1 is in Cuba.

The number of Sabbath-schools organized during the past year was 773, reorganized 338, total 1111 schools, with an aggregate membership of 3916 teachers and 35,944 scholars.

In their efforts to gather children into Sabbath-schools the missionaries visit from house to house, distribute Christian literature, conduct religious services, start Home Departments and Young People's Societies, hold Bible institutes, attend Sabbath-school conventions, establish preaching stations, and encourage the development of their schools into churches. They travel hundreds of miles every month, in all weathers, suffering many hardships, crossing mountain and prairie, among miners, lumbermen, ranchmen, toilers of every kind, with the open Bible in their hands and words of brotherly cheer on their lips, planting the deathless seeds of Christian civilization. It is hardly conceivable that any instrumentality could be devised which can so effectively meet the spiritual needs of our outlying population as this great agency of Sabbath-school missions.

Details of work performed by the missionaries in connection with the organization and reorganization of Sabbath-schools will be found in the tabular statement on page 33 of the Report of the Board.

The number of mission Sabbath-schools under the care of our missionaries at the close of the year 1901 was 2134. Of these 1703 are reported as having no connection with any form of church organization, and 1762 as having no building of their own in which to assemble. The large proportion of the schools reporting no church organization or building shows the distinctively pioneer character of this work.

The number of churches growing out of Sabbath-schools organized by our missionaries, as reported to the Department during the year 1901, was 66, of which 54 are Presbyterian churches. The total number reported since the creation of this Department in 1887 is 1094, of which number 651 are Presbyterian and 443 churches of other denominations.

The number of separate buildings—churches, chapels and manses—erected during the year 1901 in connection with Sabbath-schools organized by our missionaries was 63, at an aggregate cost of \$109,475.

The net value of the grants of books, tracts, and periodicals made by the Missionary Committee or distributed by the Sabbath-school missionaries during the past year was \$5332.86, and the total net value of all the literature gratuitously distributed, including the Bibles awarded for the recitation of the Shorter Catechism and money granted in aid of publications in foreign languages, was \$6663.14.

The missionaries also distributed 76 barrels, boxes and packages of clothing generously contributed by women's societies, churches, Sabbath-schools, and individuals for the aid of needy children and adults. A low estimate places the value of these gifts at \$2807.82.

II. EDUCATIONAL WORK OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The Educational Work of the Department has been conducted, during the past year, along the following lines: Normal Department Work, Home Department Work, Catechetical Instruction, Children's Day and Rallying Day, Presbyterian Sabbath-school Statistics.

Normal Department Work.—The launching of this important movement for the promotion of advanced Biblical instruction and the training of Sabbath-school teachers has occupied much time and attention, involving, as it has done, the preparation, by the Superintendent of the Department for the lessons for the new *Westminster Normal Quarterly*, the first number of which was issued last October; also involving the preparation and distribution among pastors and Sabbath-school superintendents of circular and literary matter explanatory of the movement, the writing of articles for the press, many personal interviews, and a large correspondence.

Up to the present time many hundreds of Sabbath-schools have established Normal Departments, the class or classes ordinarily meeting at the same hour as the school and constituting a part of the school. The *Normal Quarterly* has reached a paid circulation of nearly 12,000 copies.

The Synods and Presbyteries have with great unanimity and cordiality supported the Normal Department movement, and it is evident that a great impulse has thus been given to the systematic study of Scripture and to the improvement of Sabbath-school teaching.

Home Department Work.—Scarcely, if at all, second in importance to teacher-training is the promotion of Bible study in the home. This is the special aim of Home Department Work. This movement is no longer an experiment, either in our own or in other denominations. Hundreds of our Sabbath-schools have formed Home Departments, to their great advantage and the advantage of the community. There is no good reason why all our Sabbath-schools should not do likewise.

The last completed Reports from our Presbyteries show a slight increase both in the number of Home Departments and in their membership.

The Department issued last autumn a circular letter to pastors inviting their co-operation in an effort to begin the present year with at least a thousand additional Home Departments in our Church. We are not as yet able to report the measure of the response made to this appeal.

Catechetical Instruction.—The Board has continued its offer, through this Department, of a Teachers' Bible as a prize to scholars under eighteen years of age for correctly reciting the Westminster Shorter Catechism. The number of prizes thus awarded last year was 1096, and the total number of Bibles thus distributed during the past fourteen years has been 23,869.

The number of Sabbath-schools in the year 1900-1901 reporting to their respective Presbyteries that they teach the Shorter Catechism was 3659.

Children's Day and Rallying Day.—During the past year the Department has followed its usual course of preparing programmes for the special services of each of these anniversaries, together with collection boxes and appropriate circulars. These supplies are sent out in the quantities ordered without charge. Last year 4314 Sabbath-schools applied for and received these supplies for Children's Day, and 1499 schools ordered and received them for the services on Rallying Day. The contributions of Sabbath-schools for the missionary work of this Board for the year ending March 31, 1902, amounted to \$60,360.84, the largest offering ever received from this

source and \$2100.79 more than the contributions of the preceding year—the highest point at that time ever reached.

Presbyterian Sabbath-school Statistics.—The General Assembly places upon this Board the responsibility of collecting the annual Sabbath-school statistics of our Church and of preparing a summary of the same for publication in the Annual Minutes of the Assembly.

It is found by experience that each year some Reports, both of Sabbath-schools and of Presbyteries, are lacking, and that many of the Presbyterial Reports received by the Department are, in some important points, defective or incomplete. The summary published in the Minutes, though occupying nine or ten pages of closely-printed tabular matter, gives only an imperfect idea of the mass of statistical information every year reaching the Department, showing the actual condition of every one of our more than 8000 Sabbath schools, arranged in Presbyteries and Synods, and supplying data for careful examination and correspondence.

III. GRANTS MADE BY THE DEPARTMENT.

Grants amounting in value to \$6663.14 were made, as follows :

Contributions to the amount of \$785 were made to aid in the erection of chapels, etc., when such appropriations were specially designated by the contributing individuals and churches.

IV. RECEIPTS AND EXPENSES OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The receipts of the year covered by this Report (including the balance of \$34,986.03 reported last year) amounted to \$175,749. The expenses were \$130,480.98, leaving a balance of \$45,268.02 (see Treasurer's Report, pages 280, 281). From this should be subtracted \$10,983.26, being the amount of salaries and expenses then due, leaving a net balance at the close of the year of \$34,284.76.

V. ENLARGEMENT OF THE WORK OF THE DEPARTMENT.

In view of the large balance with which the Department begins the new year and the prospects of increased contributions from churches and Sabbath-schools in the future, the Committee, with the approval of the Board, has determined to enlarge its work in the following directions :

1. To place not more than 40 summer missionaries in the field for three and one-half months, upon the receipt of satisfactory recommendations, and when the consent of the Presbyteries within whose bounds they are to labor, under the supervision of the respective permanent missionaries of those Presbyteries, has been obtained.
2. To authorize the Superintendent of the Department to seek diligently during the summer months for well-qualified men to be added to the force of permanent missionaries as soon as the summer missionaries leave their fields.

The Committee also has requested the Secretary and Superintendent to consider what additional publications, if any, ought to be issued for what is known as the foreign population of our country, who are not capable of using English publications, and to report as soon as possible. The Editorial and Business Superintendents have been added to the Committee.

PERIODICALS.

A few words of description will explain the character and purpose of each of our periodicals.

LESSON HELPS.

The Westminster Teacher is a monthly magazine for teachers and officers of Sabbath-schools, used also in many adult classes. It contains full and varied expositions of the International Bible Lessons. Price, single copy by mail, per annum, 60 cents; school subscriptions to one address, 50 cents per copy.

The Westminster Senior Quarterly is prepared for older scholars, and is used also in adult classes. Each number contains full lesson work for three months, with Order of Service, Map, Bible Dictionary, and other valuable matter. School subscriptions to one address, 12 cents a year; single copies, 20 cents.

The Westminster Intermediate Quarterly is designed for scholars of intermediate grade. It contains full lesson text, with notes, questions and practical teachings. In it are found also Map, Order of Service and Bible Dictionary, the same as in *The Senior Quarterly*. School subscriptions to one address, 12 cents a year; single copies, 20 cents.

The Home Department Quarterly is prepared for the use of those who, though unable to attend the sessions of the Sabbath-school, yet desire to study the lesson week by week. It contains also in each number a series of readings for the thirteen Sabbaths. *The Home Department Quarterly* is the same size and price as the *Senior*—12 cents a year for school subscriptions to one address; 20 cents for single copies separately mailed.

The Westminster Junior Quarterly is prepared for younger children in the Junior Department. School subscriptions to one address, 12 cents a year; single copies, 20 cents.

The Westminster Primary Quarterly is a new lesson help. It was begun

in January of last year. It is for the little folks of the youngest grade. It contains explanations of the lessons, with hymns and music, and is beautifully illustrated. School subscriptions to one address, 12 cents a year; single copy, mailed separately, 20 cents.

The Westminster Normal Quarterly is the latest addition to our list of Quarterlies. It is designed for use in classes preparing to be teachers. It contains not only Bible lessons, studies covering large sections of the Scriptures, but also pedagogical lessons to advance the teachers in practical methods. Price, single number, 40 cents per year; school subscriptions, 24 cents.

The Westminster Lesson Leaf is prepared with special reference to intermediate and younger scholars. It is issued monthly, but it is so prepared that, if desired, the leaves can be separated and distributed to scholars weekly. Each leaf contains one lesson complete. School subscriptions to one address, 5 cents a year.

The Westminster Junior Lessons is a neat leaf adapted to the little people. Illustrated. It is issued weekly in the same form and at the same price as *The Westminster Lesson Leaf*.

The Westminster Lesson Card contains a brightly colored lithographic picture, illustrating the lesson of the day, with Lesson Title, Golden Text, etc. It is adapted in grade to younger children and to primary classes. The price for school subscriptions to one address is 10 cents a year. Single sets, 20 cents a year.

ILLUSTRATED PAPERS.

Forward is designed especially for young people in Intermediate and Senior grades, and is adapted for reading in the home and by young people in general. The best writers for the young in all the country furnish contributions. While intended primarily for the older classes in Sabbath-schools, *Forward* is adapted also for young people in the home and everywhere. School subscriptions mailed in packages to one address, 50 cents a year; single subscriptions mailed separately, 75 cents a year.

The Sabbath-school Visitor is the oldest of the periodicals of the Board. It is adapted to a younger class of readers than *Forward*. It is an illustrated four-page paper, each number containing attractive and interesting matter. It is published weekly, but may be taken once or twice a month, if preferred. Single subscriptions, per year, weekly, 50 cents; fortnightly, 30 cents; monthly, 20 cents. School subscriptions to one address, per year, weekly, 30 cents; fortnightly, 16 cents; monthly, 8 cents.

The Morning Star is issued to meet the demand in many schools for a paper at small cost. It is of the same quality, grade, and style as *The Visitor*, but is only half the size. It is issued every week, but may be taken once or twice a month, as desired. Single subscriptions, per year, weekly, 25 cents; fortnightly, 15 cents; monthly, 10 cents. School subscriptions to one address, per year, weekly, 15 cents; fortnightly, 8 cents; monthly, 4 cents.

Sunbeam is a four-page weekly illustrated paper for very little people. No subscriptions are taken for less than one month. Single subscriptions, 30 cents a year. School subscriptions to one address, 20 cents a year for each scholar.

REPRINTS OF FORMER PUBLICATIONS.

Of these 52 editions of books and tracts have been published.

III. BUSINESS DEPARTMENT.

This Department conducts all the business operations of the Board. Of these the most important are, first, the manufacture of books, tracts and periodicals; and, secondly, the placing of the publications on the market.

PUBLICATIONS.

There have been published during the year 1,495,020 copies of books and tracts and 44,353,899 copies of periodicals, which together with 5750 copies

of the Annual Report* make an aggregate of 45,857,669 publications for the year.

PLACING ON THE MARKET.

This work continues to be performed by means of the main store in Philadelphia, the depositories in Chicago, New York, St. Louis and San Francisco, and seven other houses where the publications of the Board can be obtained.

These houses, with the exception of the one in London, furnish all our publications at the Board's prices.

Our periodicals are still further brought to the attention of churches and Sabbath-schools by advertising in Sabbath-school and other papers, and by circulars addressed to pastors and Sabbath-school superintendents. Our missionaries also bring all classes of our publications to the notice of those who dwell in missionary districts.

SALES.

The sales for the year in books and tracts were \$210,445.10. This amount, as it includes credit sales, does not agree with the Treasurer's account, which account exhibits only cash received. The Treasurer's account includes cash received for the sales of the current year, and also cash received for the credit sales of preceding years.

The amount received during the year for the sale of periodicals was \$278,096.88.

The aggregate of the preceding sales includes not only the ordinary sales of the main house and of the depositories and other houses, but all sales made to the Sabbath-school and Missionary Department.†

NET PROFITS.

The net profits of the year were \$36,261.76, being \$12,380.56 greater than those reported last year. Of this sum two-thirds, or \$24,174.51, have been placed to the credit of the Sabbath-school and Missionary Fund, in accordance with the direction of the General Assembly. The remaining third, or \$12,087.25, has been added to the capital.

CAPITAL.

This, at the beginning of the year, according to the balance sheet of the last report, was \$218,260.55. In consequence of the addition of one-third of the profits of the year, or \$12,087.25, the capital is now reported as \$230,347.80.

* This refers to the number of copies of the Report for the year ending March 31, 1901.

† The Business Department sells all its publications to the Sabbath-school and Missionary Department at "the highest rate of discount allowed on the same classes of publications to the most favored branch houses in this country." The missionaries are required to sell for cash only.

HYMNALS.

The total number of adoptions in our churches and schools of the Hymnal during the year was 112, of the Chapel Hymnal 258, and of the School Hymnal 127; the numbers sold respectively, 16,003, 21,638 and 13,183.

The Board has just gone to press with the 225,000 edition of the Hymnal and the 160,000 edition of the Chapel Hymnal. Of the School Hymnal 83,500 copies have been printed. It is very satisfactory to the Board to be able to state that the demand for these books is constant and large. The outlook is that our Church will be practically united in the use of the same Books of Praise in its various departments of activity.

ABSTRACT OF THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT.

If it were permitted to believe that the spiritual life and progress of a Church bear such definite relation to its prosperity in temporal things that their advance may be measured by its activity in the erection of church buildings, and if such activity may be fairly estimated by the applications for aid which reach this Board, then we might well conclude that the last year was a very fruitful one in our branch of the Church of Christ. Not for ten years has the work of the Board been so wide in its reach as during the twelve months of which it now reports.

APPLICATIONS.

The total number of applications during the year in all departments was 278, and the aggregate amount asked either as grants or loans was \$233,053.

Of the 278 applications above mentioned, 175 were to the General Fund, 145 being for grants, 17 for loans and 13 for both grants and loans; 19 were for loans from the Loan Fund; 61 for loans and 2 for grants and loans from the Manse Fund; 19 for loans for manses from the Reynolds Fund, and 2 for grants from the Barber Fund.

APPROPRIATIONS.

1. *The General Fund.* This may with propriety be considered the most important department of the Board, as its sphere is most directly in connection with the aggressive missionary work of the Church, for the support of which the Board was originally established. In its distribution it is restricted, as is indicated in the words of the Board's charter, "to the purpose of aiding feeble congregations in erecting houses of worship," and its appropriations either in the form of actual grants or loans without interest are invariably to churches which otherwise would be unable, in the judgment of the Board, to provide themselves with church homes. Moreover, it is this fund that appeals to the contributing churches, for it receives, unless otherwise specially designated, every dollar from the annual offerings of the congregations, and moreover every dollar thus contributed is again appropriated to the feeble churches without any deduction for other expenses.

From this fund appropriations have been made to 165 churches aggregating in amount \$102,019, a most remarkable advance upon last year of 33 per cent. in the number of churches aided, and of 60 per cent. in the aggregate amount appropriated.

The amount thus appropriated is the largest in this department in the history of the Board. Of the above appropriations, 145 were grants to the amount of \$83,385, and 20 were loans aggregating \$18,634, but as in 10 cases both loan and grant were made to the same church, the total is as given, viz., \$102,019 distributed among 165 churches. In addition special gifts of \$2,062 have passed through the treasury of the Board to 18 churches, 11 of which are not counted above. Thus the final result should be given as 176 churches reached and \$104,081 appropriated.

2. *The Loan Fund.*—This fund, the origin and working of which were fully explained in last year's Report, has now been in operation long enough to vindicate the wisdom of the Assembly in permitting the Board to invest a certain proportion of its capital in loans to churches. The plan under which this fund is distributed meets the needs of many churches which, while no longer to be considered as proper recipients of grants from the Church at large, are yet unable without undue strain to complete by immediate subscriptions suitable church buildings.

By borrowing from this fund and repaying in annual installments they distribute the expense over a number of years. The table in the full Report shows how large a number of churches have availed themselves of this fund during the ten years in which it has been in operation, and also indicates that, upon the whole, the returns have been made so promptly as not to endanger the integrity of the fund.

During the past year 19 loans, aggregating \$58,600, were voted, an amount larger than in any previous year.

3. *The Manse Fund.*—The increasing demand made upon this fund, to which attention has been called for the last three years, still continues. This is in itself a sufficient proof of the value of this department in enabling the churches to secure a permanent ministry. Probably no one cause so adds to the discomforts of our missionaries upon new fields and so conduces to their frequent removal from place to place as the difficulty and often the impossibility of securing a home in which their families can be comfortable. In new towns, the growing population is always pressing upon the home supply. There are no houses built as an investment and rented. The first duty of each newcomer is to secure a lot and provide a shelter for his family. The church as soon as it is organized needs a minister and the minister needs a home, which, unless provided by the church, is ordinarily not to be found.

While the necessity of such provision is not so pressing and immediate in older and stronger communities, yet the propriety and advantage of such assured and permanent homes are almost as great.

It is a satisfaction to look back upon the sixteen years in which the Manse Fund has been available and recall that it has been instrumental in providing more than 700 such homes for the families of pastors. For the most part, too, this has been done, not by actual gifts which have diminished the fund, but by loans without interest, which have enabled the church without undue strain to secure the property and to own it without any permanent lien upon it.

From this fund there have been this year 58 loans, aggregating \$28,050, and two grants, \$400; or a total of 59 churches aided and \$28,450 appropriated. To these figures are to be added, by reason of special contributions, two churches and \$130, making the final result 61 churches and \$28,580.

4. *The Reynolds Fund.*—During this the second year of the operation of this special department, established to meet the provisions connected with the large bequest from the late General William F. Reynolds, of Detroit, there has been a marked advance. Under the plan adopted loans are made of larger sums than are permissible in connection with the original Manse Fund, and for a longer term of years, but with a low rate of interest, usually four per cent. There have been 15 loans, aggregating \$15,200.

5. *The Barber Fund.*—From this fund, which is to be used specifically for "congregations of colored people," there has been one grant of \$1000.

SUMMARY.

Looking at this year's work as a whole we find, as has been already said, that its extent has been greater than in any previous year of its history.

The total number of churches to which appropriations have been made, either as grants or loans, is 259, and the amount thus appropriated is \$205,269. Adding special gifts, amounting to \$2192 to 22 churches, of which 13 were not otherwise aided, we have a final result of the year's work of 272 churches reached and \$207,461 appropriated.

These appropriations have been distributed through 41 States and Territories, including Porto Rico, and among 129 Presbyteries.

During the year there have been reported as completed, without debt, 218 churches and manses, the aggregate value of which is computed at \$612,766.

INCREASED RESPONSIBILITIES.

In view of the constantly enlarging work which has been recalled, it is obvious that the responsibilities of the Board in many respects have been constantly increasing.

Evidently the monetary responsibilities of the Board must every year increase. The wise provision of the Assembly by which all grants and loans are secured against alienation by mortgages, and this large mortgage interest in its turn protected by insurance, has resulted, after nearly half a

century of activity, in the holding of mortgages and insurance policies to the extent in both respects of two and a half millions of dollars. These important trusts involve a constant oversight of the field, so that in case of the abandonment of the work or a dissolution of the congregation the invested funds may not be lost. There is also demanded a careful account, to insure the collection of the premiums upon insurance, each year from the congregations thus protected.

It is to be remembered that by generous bequests and otherwise, trust funds have been committed to the Board now amounting to more than \$600,000. In view of the facts that a large part of these funds is distributed in loans among churches scattered all over the country; that upon a considerable portion annuity charges are paid during the lifetime of the donors, and that all must be kept in some way safely and profitably invested, it is evident that a very large proportion of the work of the Board and of its expenses is in connection with departments aside from the receipts of contributions and the distribution of appropriations.

THE FUTURE.

As has been shown by this Report of the year's work, the demands upon the Board have been greater than in any former year of its existence. This, while in itself most gratifying as an indication of the active progress of our Church, affords also ground for anxiety, which can only be allayed by an assurance that the Church is also willing and able to provide adequately to meet the demand. Providentially the year opened with a substantial balance in the treasury of the Board, which, with receipts slightly above the average, enables it to close the year without debt and without disappointment to the churches asking aid.

But having done this, it begins the new year under the serious disadvantage of a treasury practically empty and a roll of applications already giving promise of equaling the unusual demand of last year.

At its first meeting its unappropriated balance was barely sufficient to cover the amount which it seemed properly called upon to appropriate.

Evidently, unless one of two events occur, the Board will for the next twelve months occupy the very trying position of living from hand to mouth—each month anxiously measuring its receipts against the eloquent and often pathetic appeals of the young churches. One of these contingencies, which may lessen such anxiety, is a marked diminution in the demand, the other is a marked advance in the contributions from the churches.

The former is very unlikely, and were it to occur would be far from a cause of congratulation. It would signify that after a most encouraging

advance in the first year of the new century, the Presbyterian Church was lagging and halting in the second. May not the Board then confidently appeal to the churches to relieve it from anxiety by insuring the second alternative condition, viz., a marked increase in the number and amount of the contributions?

ABSTRACT OF THE FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

ROLL.

We have had upon our roll for the year ending March 31, 1902, 903 names—367 ministers, 473 widows, 36 orphan families, 1 medical missionary and 1 widow of a medical missionary, 7 women missionaries and 21 guests in the Home at Perth Amboy, N. J. The average amount paid to ministers on the Honorably Retired roll was \$285.26. Some ministers on the Honorably Retired roll did not ask for the full amount to which an Honorably Retired minister is entitled when in need. The amount paid to Honorably Retired ministers the past year was \$43,075. In 1889 the rule was adopted allowing ministers who are 70 years of age and who have been 30 years in active service in the ministry of our Church to be placed on the Honorably Retired roll of the Board, to be granted, without being annually renewed, an annuity of \$300 when they certify that they need that amount. Since then 283 ministers have availed themselves of this privilege. Twenty-nine names have been added to this roll during the past year; 11 ministers whose names were on this roll have died during the year. During the past year we have had 151 Honorably Retired ministers on the roll, and their average age has been 78.5 years, and their average active service has been 44 years. Forty-eight of these men were over 80 years of age, and 13 of them were over 90. Whilst the average amount paid annuitants on the Honorably Retired roll was \$285.26, the average amount paid annuitants not on the Honorably Retired roll was only \$180.

During the past year we have added 80 new names to the roll of annuitants—44 ministers, 31 widows, 1 woman missionary and 4 orphans. Fifty-

seven of those who were on the roll have died during the year—34 ministers, 21 widows and 2 woman missionaries. Two of those who died during the year were guests at the Westminster House at Perth Amboy, N. J.

We have received during the past year collections from 4235 churches; 3325 churches have failed to send any contributions to this hallowed cause during the year.

Besides the cash contributions to the Board from churches and individuals, the Ladies' Aid Societies of our Church have sent to families on our roll gifts of money and boxes of clothing and groceries amounting to the value of \$6279.64.

A LARGER ENDOWMENT NEEDED.

The Board of Relief cannot do the work which is expected of it by the Presbyteries unless it receives from some source or sources a much larger annual income than it has ever heretofore received.

We think the principle is a sound and scriptural one, that when the Church accepts the services of a young minister, and requires him to keep himself free from worldly cares and avocations and to give himself wholly to the preaching of the Word and to pastoral work, and when it has received such service from its covenanted servant, and he becomes disabled by disease, accident or old age, it is but common honesty, justice and honor to give him a comfortable support during the time of his disability.

The consecrated young preacher does not give himself and his services to any one particular congregation, but to the whole Church of which he is a minister, and he stands ready to go and labor wherever God by his providence may call him, until he is disabled from active service. When that time comes the Church, the whole Church, to which he has given the cost of his education, his whole time and all his working forces, is bound by the law of God to furnish him a decent living.

Until the Board secures a much larger Endowment Fund than it has at present, it is an imperative necessity that the yearly offerings for Ministerial Relief should be very much larger than they have ever been.

The number of families on the roll of the Board has just doubled in the past twenty years, and twice as much should be raised for Ministerial Relief as was raised twenty years ago. Twenty years ago there were 592,128 communicants in the Church, and last year we had 1,025,388, almost double the amount we had at that time. But notice! In 1882 the Church collections for the Board were \$67,981. The Church collections then averaged 10 3-5 cents per communicant. Had we received that amount from each communicant last year, we would have received \$108,691 from the Church collections, but instead of receiving that amount we received from churches only \$89,400. This state of things is not confined to the cause of Ministerial Relief, for it is true of all the Boards of the Church, that the offerings made to God for the use of the Boards have not increased in proportion to the increase in the number of communicants in the Church.

OUR HOMES.

Number of Guests at Perth Amboy.

1. Statistics show that the number of guests who have availed themselves of the privileges of the Perth Amboy House has been exceedingly disappointing from the opening of the House to the present time.

The average number of guests in the House from year to year has been but 21. The average number of women each year has been 13, and the average number of ministers per year has been only 8.

Cost of Entertaining Guests.

2. The great cost of entertaining our guests at the Perth Amboy House has been another very disappointing feature in the history of the House.

The House is very large, and it is difficult and expensive to keep it sufficiently heated for the comfort of our aged guests; and its large dimensions necessitate the employment of more help than would be required in a house only large enough to accommodate 21 guests.

As long as we keep this House we will be obliged to keep the old building in repair; we must employ a competent matron to manage the household affairs; we must have a physician, a nurse, and occasionally several nurses at the same time, a man of all work, a chief cook and an assistant, 2 chambermaids to care for the rooms and keep the house in order, 2 laundresses, etc., the expenses being nearly the same whether we have 21 or 50 guests in the house.

The average net cost of the *Home* per year has been \$9134.73, and as the average number of guests in the *Home* has been but 21 a year, it has made the average cost of each guest \$434.98 a year.

The whole history of Ministers' Homes shows that there is very little demand for them, and it only confirms the Board in its judgment that the one Home at Newton is sufficient for all the probable demands for a Home for an indefinite time to come; and in view of the past experience of the Board, it has felt constrained to take the following action:

Whereas, The cost of maintaining the Westminster House has for more than eighteen years exceeded the amount that would have been granted the guests of the Home, had they not been in the Home, about \$5000 a year, or about \$90,000 in all, which money should have been distributed among the other persons on the roll of the Board, who have been in great financial distress, and who have had equal claims upon the funds of the Board to those who have been guests in the Home; and

Whereas, The Merriam Home at Newton, N. J., can be maintained at less cost than the Westminster House at Perth Amboy, N. J., because it is a much smaller building than the Westminster House, and can be heated at less expense; and because there being but four acres of ground in the Merriam Home property, whilst there are eleven acres at Perth Amboy, it can be kept in good order at less cost than it costs to keep the grounds in good condition at Perth Amboy; and also because the buildings at Perth Amboy are very old, having been built in colonial days, and they cost a large sum every year in the way of repairs and betterments, whilst the buildings at Newton are comparatively new, and will cost but little to keep them in good condition; and

Whereas, The Westminster House has no endowment at all, whilst the Merriam Home has an endowment of \$30,000, the interest of which is to be used in maintaining the Home; and

Whereas, If it should prove possible to sell the Perth Amboy property at the end of fifty years' occupancy, about which there may be question under the peculiar deed by which it was conveyed to the Board, there is no hope whatever that the future rise in the value of the property will ever reimburse the Board for the extra cost of maintaining the Home over the amount that would probably be paid to the guests who have been in the Home, and likely to be there in the future; therefore,

Resolved, That after a most diligent and careful compliance with the directions of the last General Assembly, and after prolonged thought

upon and consideration of the whole subject, the members of the Board have seen no reason to change their conviction, embodied in their Report made to the General Assembly of 1901, in regard to the question of abandoning the Westminster House and of transferring the guests of the House to the Merriam Home at Newton, N. J., and they ask the General Assembly to authorize the Board to close the Westminster House at Perth Amboy, N. J., at its earliest convenience, as requested in our last Annual Report; or, if the General Assembly is not satisfied with the wisdom of this action, now for the second time recommended by the Board which has been in charge of the House, then that the Assembly be requested to appoint a special Committee to act with the Board in considering the whole matter of the Westminster House and the Merriam Home, and to make a joint report of their conclusions to the next General Assembly.

ABSTRACT OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The year just closed has been one of activity and success. The growth of the work has been normal and healthy.

We are pleased to report that we have received during this year more money than we have received in any other year for the last eight years. We have also spent more on the field than in any other year during the same period of time, not counting, of course, the years when with insurance money we have replaced structures destroyed by fire. We have had more workers and done more work. We have closed the year free from debt and have a small balance on hand with which to begin the new year.

During the year the Woman's Department renewed their efforts toward the work of raising \$10,000 to complete the unfinished wing of our Ingleside Seminary Building at Burkeville, Va., and succeeded in completing the entire amount. Nearly \$5000 more were secured for improvements at Brainerd Institute, and the money gathered for these two schools has been temporarily invested. Plans for these improvements are already in process of preparation.

During the year by the will of the late Mrs. Henry J. Biddle, of Philadelphia, widow of Colonel Biddle, after whom Biddle University is named, that institution received a bequest of \$5000 without conditions.

By a decision of the Board, this bequest is set apart for the purpose of securing to the University a very much needed industrial building in which the industries of the institution may be more conveniently and advantageously grouped together.

The amount received direct from churches, societies, Sabbath-schools, legacies and miscellaneous sources, including interest from invested funds, was \$17,087.10 more than last year. The largest increase was from legacies, being almost \$12,000 in excess of last year's amount.

The Woman's Department increased their gifts to the Board's work by \$5452.51, thus bringing up the total of our receipts for the year to \$22,539.61. A large part of this amount, however, was not available for current expenses, having been assigned to specific improvements to be carried out the coming year.

The number of churches that helped us this year in any one way was 4751, being a loss of 13 compared with last year.

The number of churches that helped us by congregational collections was 3997, being an increase of 23.

The executors of the estate of the late William E. Dodge, Sr., assigned to our Board \$2500 from the William E. Dodge Educational Fund, to be invested for the benefit of students in the gospel ministry in attendance at Biddle University, Charlotte, N. C.

ABSTRACT OF THE NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

For many years this Board has told the Church that we were far behind other denominations in college work, especially in the West. The Church has not taken our statements seriously; and indeed, to those not familiar with the facts, they seemed to be grossly exaggerated, as if to make capital for this Board. We can do no better service for the Church than to show the facts in such a way that they can be neither questioned nor ignored.

We therefore present the following statistics. They are believed to be fuller and more accurate than any heretofore published, and are from official sources only.

Each denominational title represents a single denomination only: "Baptist" not including all Baptist colleges; "Methodist" only those of the Methodist Episcopal Church; except that "Presbyterian" includes two institutions jointly controlled by Synods of our own and of another denomination, so that the showing is actually too favorable to our Church.

"Benefactions" represents gifts of two years, except those to Methodist institutions, which represent but one year; so that the showing is actually too favorable to our Church.

The line between "The East" and "The West" is so drawn that the West contains most of the institutions aided by this Board, and that each division has one-half of all the colleges and universities in the United States.

Most individual gifts and many church offerings are designated by the givers for certain institutions, so that the Board could appropriate only about \$24,000 for current expenses of institutions for which \$50,000 should have been given.

AVERAGE ENDOWMENT OF INSTITUTIONS IN "THE WEST."

Baptist, \$166,456; Congregational, \$136,769; Methodist, \$157,118; Presbyterian, \$67,082, being from 40 to 49 per cent. of each of the others. Some encouraging gifts have been made this year from "the East," but what are these among so many? Our Western colleges and academies—some of them standing well at the head of educational work in their several States, some with very fair properties, none of them having debts, most of them popular and facing splendid possibilities—cannot receive more students, cannot employ more instructors, cannot enlarge their work, cannot grow, cannot live, unless they have endowment.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT, 1902.

The work of your Committee for the year has been along the lines approved by the last General Assembly. Our aim has been to aid pastors

and Sessions in their effort to lead their several churches toward the ideal of "an offering every year, for every Board, from every church and every member in the church." For accomplishing this we have endeavored to avail ourselves of the admirable machinery furnished us in our Presbyterian form of government.

Of the 208 home Presbyteries, 189 are known to us to have Committees on Systematic Beneficence. By frequent correspondence through the year with their Chairmen we have endeavored to help these Committees in their work, and have received answers from many of them which have been exceedingly encouraging and instructive to us.

We learn that many Presbyteries already recognize this supervision of benevolence as an important part of that review and control which they are charged to exercise over their churches.

Correspondence has furnished us impressive testimony as to the faithful and successful work of some of the Presbyteral Committees. It may be a help to others if we quote from a few of their communications. The Chairman of a Committee in one Presbytery (where it is now the established custom for every church to contribute to every Board) writes that they call the roll in the spring, so that any possible blanks may be detected and corrected. Then for the fall meeting he prepares a report grading the churches according to the rate of giving per member, which rate is stated; also showing whether each church has gained or lost since the previous year. The Presbytery has insisted year after year that the report be printed. "I print the table out," he writes, "on large blank newspaper sheets, and hang it up on the wall of the church in which the Presbytery meets, and great is the interest and pleasure and mortification of the brethren as they gather before it to see where they stand. It appears to stimulate them to a very healthy rivalry among themselves, and I think it is not too much to say that many of our churches dare not let up in the least in this matter of beneficence for fear of a drop on the list."

Another Chairman, whose name is honored in all the churches, himself a former Governor of the State, writes from a Presbytery in the Synod of Pennsylvania: "Not only do we call the roll in our Presbytery and require an explanation, but the pastor of every church that has a blank in any column of the *Minutes* is written to subsequently by the Chairman of our Committee and an explanation asked in regard to the blank. We are in the habit also of sending out, some time in advance of the meeting of Presbytery in April, a blank upon which the several pastors can make reports to the Committee in regard to the contributions for the year."

It is not surprising that when the interests of this cause are committed to such men and are so faithfully maintained by them, the cause flourishes and the churches go on abounding in this grace also of systematic liberality.

We wish that the influence of General Assembly might be exerted in some way to secure the appointment of efficient Committees in the nineteen Presbyteries not yet provided with them.

The Assembly of 1901 (page 114 of the *Minutes*) repeated an order issued by several previous Assemblies, "That the several Treasurers of the Boards give to the Assembly's Committee on Systematic Beneficence, on or about the 1st of March next, a list of the churches which shall not as yet have sent offerings to them, and that the said Committee make earnest effort, in co-operation with the Boards, to secure offerings from such churches before the close of the fiscal year." This year, for the first time, a definite attempt has been made to comply with that direction. In the month of February we communicated with the Treasurers of the several Boards, reminding them of Assembly's action, and expressing our willingness, in case they were able to furnish us the information, to forward it to our various Presbyteral Committees for their guidance in writing to the churches.

Six of the Boards were able to send us the information in time for our circular letter, which was mailed on the 8th of March. Some of the Treasurers seemed cordially in favor of the undertaking, but three expressed doubt of its wisdom, objecting also to the trouble it gave them in the busiest season of the year. We await direction from General Assembly as to whether this experiment should be repeated in the future.

We have reason to suppose that an increasing number of churches have adopted the custom of providing for their congregational expenses, in whole or in part, by the envelope system. In order to make the system effective of largest good we recommend that Assembly counsel such churches, when they arrange their packages at the beginning of the year, to include envelopes of another color for the offerings for the Boards, at least one for each month. These offerings might either be (1) taken in the lump, to be distributed afterward by the Session according to the percentages recommended by General Assembly (in which case envelopes may be provided, if desired, free of charge, from our Secretary, Rev. W. H. Hubbard, D.D., of Auburn, N. Y., or from Mr. Adam Campbell, 156 Fifth avenue, New York City); or (2) if the Session so prefer, an envelope may be provided for each Board separately on the months determined by the Session (in which case the envelopes may be procured directly from the several Boards).

It has not been convenient this year to obtain from the Boards the statistics of the year's receipts, which have formerly constituted a valuable feature of our Annual Report. In place thereof we append a general summary of the work for a year ago, kindly furnished us by the Rev. W. J. Gregory (see full Report in volume of Reports.)

ABSTRACT OF THE TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

Several new tracts and leaflets have been published during the year, but the aggregate has fallen short of the output of last year. The number of applications for literature for distribution steadily increases; we are frequently receiving from correspondents commendation of the character of our printed matter, and have some most gratifying reports of good results; but all this we have felt to be tantalizing rather than satisfying.

Our work of tract dissemination during the year has been curtailed owing to the lack of the printed matter which in the year preceding we had been authorized to draw from the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work. To a larger extent than heretofore, however, the columns of the periodical press have been utilized for the work of the Committee. The *Assembly Herald* has been found a valuable medium through which to reach a great number of Presbyterian readers in all parts of the land. Each week a column has been occupied by the Committee in one largely circulated paper, and occasionally in others some phase of the subject has been presented. Some use has also been made of periodicals other than religious, and effort has been made to impress Sessional Committees and other friends of the cause with the importance of using the local secular press for the promotion of temperance sentiment.

An extensive correspondence has been maintained. Among its widely diverse subjects the matter to which, more than any other, the Committee's

correspondence has related was the passage by Congress of the Gillett-Lodge bill. For such legislation our Government has been besought for years by the venerable missionary, John G. Paton. His appeals were warmly seconded by the Presbyterian Church. The General Assembly took repeated action on the subject, which, by its direction, its Permanent Committee on Temperance presented to the attention of the executive and legislative departments of our Government. Correspondence regarding the matter was had by this Committee with President Cleveland and President McKinley, and with members of their respective Cabinets. In this campaign we labored side by side with the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the National Temperance Society, the American Anti-Saloon League and the Bureau of Reform, whose indefatigable Secretary was especially active. And yet we had the sorrowful report to make to the last Assembly that the bill had failed to pass. The effort, however, was not abandoned.

On November 15 a letter was addressed to the President expressing the deep solicitude of our Church regarding the fate of this pending measure. The attitude of President Roosevelt towards the question proved to be what we should have expected. In his message to Congress, December 2, 1901, occurs the following:

"In dealing with the aboriginal races few things are more important than to preserve them from the terrific physical and moral degradation resulting from the liquor traffic. We are doing all we can to save our own Indian tribes from this evil. Whenever by international agreement this same end can be attained as regards races where we do not possess exclusive control, every effort should be made to bring it about."

And now it is with profound gratitude to God that we put on record in this report that on February 1, 1902, the Gillett-Lodge bill, having previously passed the Senate, finally passed the House of Representatives by an almost unanimous vote, and by the President's concurrence this just and humane measure became a law.

In view of the tendency to despondency and consequent inactivity relative to all temperance work, it surely behooves us to utilize to the utmost every event of so cheering a character. In 1890, seventeen nations joined in the Treaty of Brussels, aiming at the suppression of the liquor traffic in Africa, a treaty which was renewed in 1899 with more stringent provisions. Does not the adoption of such treaties betoken an arousing of a sense of moral responsibility on the part of nations? Witness the following words which occur in the Treaty of Brussels:

"Being justly anxious concerning the moral and material consequences to which the abuse of spirituous liquors subjects the native population, etc."

In line with this action of the nations the following resolution was adopted January 4, 1901, by the Senate of the United States:

"In the opinion of this body the time has come when the principle, twice affirmed in international treaties for Central Africa, that native races should be protected against the destructive traffic in intoxicants, should be extended to all uncivilized peoples by the enactment of such laws and the making of such treaties as will effectually prohibit the sale by the signatory powers to aboriginal tribes and uncivilized races, of opium and intoxicating beverages."

In another public utterance, Secretary Hay has declared that "recent American diplomacy has been inspired by the Golden Rule."

A German newspaper declared that in the annual message of President Roosevelt the word "duty," or its equivalent, occurs more than one hundred times.

Let us "thank God and take courage," for this is the same America in whose National Assembly a leading statesman once exclaimed: "Mr. President, communities have nothing to do with morals. Interest—interest alone is the law of nations."

After nine years of importunate reiteration, the cry from far-off New Hebrides, "Avenge me of mine adversary," has at last secured response. Redress has been granted. Many thousands of American Christians have contributed to this result by helping to voice that piteous cry. Can they

now be less compassionate towards those who are of their own race and nation? Let our National Government be petitioned no more to receive blood-money into its treasury; no more to sell strong drink to its old soldiers; and in those portions of our own country under federal authority, as well as in our new island possessions, to prohibit utterly the traffic. Most reasonably may our Government be asked to adopt for its employees both civil and military the same rule to which railway employees are expected to yield obedience, viz.: total abstinence from intoxicating liquors. Let Congress also be asked to appoint a committee to investigate the liquor traffic.

State Governments should be petitioned for laws prohibitory of the traffic or for the abolishment of the iniquitous license system, whereby the State places the shield of its protection over this robber traffic, which the indignant people of any community might otherwise suppress as a nuisance. And meantime it should be demanded that counties and towns be not unwillingly saddled with this vile institution, the saloon, but be permitted to exercise the local veto. In license courts and municipal governments the remonstrance and petition should be made against every proposed extension of the business.

Objection is made that this must involve burdensome toil, a ceaseless struggle; but the objector seems to forget that we are yet in the church militant here. The period has not yet come when "the wicked cease from troubling and the weary are at rest." "There remaineth a rest," but now is the time for effort.

As in years past, your Committee has sought to reach every church Session with a brief circular letter, in which a response is solicited, in the form of answers to certain questions, relative to the progress and prospects of temperance work in their respective fields.

We wish to express our grateful appreciation of the aid of those chairmen of Presbyteral Temperance Committees who from year to year gather and transmit these sessional reports. These narratives have been carefully read and their contents noted, and will be utilized in the prosecution of our work. Upon examination of the documents before us we do not find them in such form as to be susceptible of tabulation, and we only attempt to convey in this Report some general conception of the facts reported.

Regarding the existence of a Sessional Committee on Temperance, the reports indicate some progress, though the number of churches which have such committees is still comparatively small. Some report that the Session is a Committee of the Whole on Temperance, others that the Church is a Temperance Society. In very many cases the Young People's Society has such a committee, and Temperance Secretaries are being appointed by the Women's Missionary Societies. In seven Presbyteral Societies such appointment has been made, and the work is progressing of securing such appointment in the local societies.

The following report regarding Temperance organization in the Church and federation of the churches is from the Temperance Committee of the Presbytery of Oakland, and is in perfect accord with the principles and methods urged by your Committee:

"A federation of the churches of Christ on Temperance lines, to meet, to withstand, and with God's blessing to overcome the federated liquor traffic, has long been the dream of Christian Temperance workers. There have been many lines of co-operation established between individual members of the Church, but a satisfactory basis of federation of the churches themselves, which should safeguard the rights of all concerned, and be a practical guarantee that the churches entering into such a federation should not be led any whither without their consent, such a plan we have waited for, and we believe that, in the providence of God, it is coming into view.

"Most if not all the denominations have already endorsed the idea of a local Temperance committee in each church, even though they may not generally have formed such committees."

Most cheering are the indications in all quarters of increased attention to the cause of Temperance in our Young People's Societies. And in the Sabbath-schools the quarterly temperance lesson of the international series

seems to receive attention in most cases. The importance of thorough training of our youth in regard to the perils, spiritual and physical, of alcoholic liquors, opium and other narcotics can scarcely be overestimated. We are glad, therefore, to perceive by these reports that in some Presbyteries action has been taken deprecating any cessation of temperance teaching in the Sabbath-school. The occasion of such action was the rumor that at the approaching Triennial International Sunday-school Convention at Denver, Col., there is to be an effort made to eliminate the quarterly temperance lesson from the course. By correspondence with a member of the Lesson Committee we learn that the attitude of the members of that committee is adverse, and unless explicitly instructed by the convention, they will include no quarterly temperance lesson in the schedule which they shall prepare.

If those who are of this mind advise the coming convention of their convictions and wishes, the attack on Sabbath-school temperance teaching will prove as futile as the recent assault on physiological temperance instruction in our public schools.

Among all the marvelous achievements—scientific, military or political—which signalized the advent of the twentieth century, there is no event more worthy of record in the history of human progress than the enactment throughout our whole country of temperance education laws. Since the passage a few months ago of such law by the Legislature of the State of Georgia, it can be reported that every State government, and the Government of the United States, now requires that in all the public schools the scientific reasons for total abstinence shall be taught.

Results already begin to appear.

A score of years ago railway companies, manufacturers, and other employers gave little attention to the habits of their men as long as they did not become helplessly drunk. But this is rapidly changing, and the manifest trend is now toward positive rejection by employers of every applicant who uses intoxicants.

We are glad to note some revival of the use of the temperance pledge, which we are convinced will prove of great value, especially as a safeguard to the young.

The widespread movement known as the Anti-Cigarette Crusade is meeting with great success among the school boys, and there is good ground to hope that an effective check will be dealt the tobacco habit, and especially this most pernicious form of it among our youth.

In some Presbyteries the observance of a Temperance Sabbath has been general, though in many instances not on the date recommended by the General Assembly. Since this institution is becoming world-wide, we suggest that the day which the General Assembly shall recommend to our churches be that which is most generally observed as Temperance Sabbath, both in America and Great Britain, viz.: the fourth Sabbath of November.

The Sunday-school libraries seem to contain an extremely small number of Temperance books. The tracts of the Permanent Committee are sent free on application, and for a small sum the admirable Temperance paper and tracts of the National Temperance Society and Publishing House of New York, or of the Women's Temperance Publishing Association of Chicago, may be obtained.

In this literature work and in pledge work excellent service has been rendered to the cause by the Presbyterian Woman's Temperance Association, whose headquarters are at Philadelphia.

Of the same organization of Presbyterian women is the Women's Synodical Committee of the Synod of Pennsylvania, located at Pittsburg, whose Secretary at threescore and ten abates none of her life-long zeal in this and every good cause.

The reports show that in some churches temperance meetings are held monthly, and in the aggregate a vast amount of agitation of the question has been had.

The usual story coming up of struggle in the way of remonstrances against licenses, and of local option campaigns, and often with the sorrowful record of "failure." But who can know that such defeats were failures, or that such faithful and brave struggles were "in vain?"

Many reports tell of good results through the agency of the Anti-Saloon League. In Ohio the passage of the new local option law is attributed to the persistent efforts of this organization.

We attempt no statement of the amount that has been contributed to the cause. Any estimate based on the imperfect reports before us would be utterly misleading.

We are led to the opinion that more than usual effort has been made in behalf of temperance measures in Congress, by letters, petitions and interviews.

The General Assembly has heretofore addressed our National Government deprecating the increased liquor importation in the Philippines, the introduction of the licensed saloon and the virtual licensing of other vices. It behooves us, as God's witnesses, to testify with ever increasing emphasis against this heaven-defying policy, whereby rulers who should be a terror to evil workers become their patrons and partners.

The expiration of the term of service of the following members occurs at this time, viz.: Rev. Wm. L. McEwan, D.D.; Rev. A. E. Linn, D.D.; Messrs. C. L. Rose and Wm. R. Ziegler. Rev. A. E. Linn desiring to be excused from further service, the Permanent Committee ask that Rev. J. P. Calhoun, D.D., be chosen in his place.

The above statement shows, in general, the financial condition of the General Assembly from year to year for nineteen Assemblies. The management which began with 1884 resulted in such economies that a surplus was accumulated, which enabled the Assembly to meet in Portland, Oregon, in 1892, without calling for additional funds from the Presbyteries, and also greatly reduced the apportionments from 1896 to date. The interest earned during the period amounted to \$27,126.87.

III. APPLICATION OF TRUSTEES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FOR INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING DEED OF CONVEYANCE TO WESTERN SEMINARY.*

To the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America :

At a special meeting of the Trustees of the General Assembly, held in Philadelphia on May 13th instant, Mr. W. M. Lanning, Rev. B. L. Agnew, D.D., and Samuel C. Perkins, LL.D., three of the members of that body, were appointed a special committee to ask the General Assembly for instructions concerning a proposed transfer to "The Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America" by the "Trustees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian

Church in the United States of America" of all the right, title and interest of the latter corporation in certain real estate in which the Western Theological Seminary, at Allegheny City, in the State of Pennsylvania, is beneficially interested. The facts, as presented to the Trustees of the General Assembly by a committee of the Trustees of the Seminary, seem to be as follows:

On November 11, 1825, certain owners of lots in Allegheny City released to the "General Assembly," whose Trustees had been incorporated under a Pennsylvania statute in 1799, all their right, title and claim to 18 acres and 37 perches of land, "for the sole use and benefit of the Western Theological Seminary."

On April 17, 1827, the Pennsylvania Legislature passed an act relinquishing the right of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in the same land to John Brown, John Hannon and Hugh Davis, "in trust for the free use and benefit of the Western Theological Seminary, proposed to be erected and established under the direction of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America."

On February 15, 1828, John Hannon, Elisha P. Swift and others released all their interest in the same land to "The Trustees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church."

On March 13, 1829, the Trustees of the General Assembly and the Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary (though the latter Trustees were not yet incorporated) jointly entered into an agreement with John Towne for the laying out of streets on the same land.

On August 29, 1829, Joseph Guyer executed a release similar to those above mentioned to "The Trustees of the General Assembly."

On September 15, 1834, M. Brown and wife released their interest in the same land to "The Western Theological Seminary," its Trustees not having yet been incorporated.

On March 29, 1844, the Trustees of the Seminary were incorporated under the name of "The Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America." The sixth section of the act of incorporation contains the following language: "That the said corporation shall not consist at any time of more than thirty persons, nine of whom shall at all times be laymen and citizens of the State of Pennsylvania, whereof the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America may at their annual meeting change one-third in such manner as to the said General Assembly shall seem proper; and the corporation aforesaid shall have power and authority to manage and dispose of all moneys, goods, chattels, lands, tenements and hereditaments, and all other estates whatsoever committed to their care and trust by the said General Assembly; but in case where special instructions for the management and disposal thereof shall be given by the said General Assembly in writing under the hand of their clerk, it shall be the duty of the said corporation to act according to such instructions."

On September 30, 1846, George R. Riddle and wife released their right in the above-mentioned land to the Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary.

On December 3, 1849, the Trustees of the Seminary made a perpetual lease of 17 acres of said land to Allegheny City, reserving an annual ground-rent of \$2100, and on the same day the authorities of Allegheny City and the Trustees of the Seminary entered into an agreement for laying out streets, exchanging lands, removing seminary buildings, etc., in which agreement was a recital that the estate vested in John Brown, John Hannon and Hugh Davis by the legislative act of April 17, 1827, above mentioned, had become vested in the Trustees of the Seminary by the act of incorporation passed March 29, 1844.

On January 30, 1854, Allegheny City conveyed a lot adjoining the above-mentioned land to A. T. McGill, and on or about the same date A. T. McGill conveyed it to the Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary, subject to an annual ground rent of \$60 payable to Allegheny City.

The recital of these facts shows that the title to the lands in question appear by the records to be vested partly in the General Assembly, partly in

the Trustees of the General Assembly, partly in the Seminary, and partly in the Trustees of the Seminary. Assuming that the civil courts would hold that the record title appearing to be vested in the General Assembly is really vested in the Trustees of the General Assembly, and that the record title appearing to be vested in the Seminary is really vested in the Trustees of the Seminary, still there would be an undivided interest vested in each of these incorporated Trustees. Such a condition the Trustees of the Seminary wish to change.

Their proposition is this: That the Trustees of the General Assembly convey to the Trustees of the Seminary all the right, title and interest of the former body, that they also ratify the lease made by the latter body to Allegheny City on December 3, 1849, and that, in consideration of such conveyance and ratification the Trustees of the Seminary do, in proper legal form, "for the purpose of forever setting at rest any and all questions as to the purposes and objects for which the Seminary property, whether real or personal, is held, agree, certify and declare that said property, real and personal, as well that which it now has or is entitled to as that which it may hereafter acquire by gift, devise, bequest, purchase or otherwise, is and shall forever continue to be held, used and employed, in trust for the use and benefit of said Seminary, in carrying out the purpose of theological education according to the Standards of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and subject at all times to the authority, control and direction of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America as to the use and disposition thereof."

The Trustees of the Seminary have represented to the Trustees of the General Assembly that "such an agreement being founded on a good and sufficient consideration, cannot be revoked without the consent of both parties." It is proper at this point that we should refer to the sixth section of the Pennsylvania statute, passed March 28, 1799, under which the Trustees of the General Assembly are incorporated. That section declares that "the corporation aforesaid shall have power and authority to manage and dispose of all moneys, goods, chattels, lands, tenements and hereditaments, and other estate whatsoever committed to their care and trust by the said Assembly; but in cases where special instructions for the management and disposal thereof shall be given by the said General Assembly in writing, under the hand of their clerk, it shall be the duty of the said corporation to act according to such instructions."

The Trustees of the General Assembly, through the undersigned as their committee, therefore hereby apply to the General Assembly for instructions concerning the matter.

At their meeting on May 13th instant, the Trustees of the General Assembly adopted the following resolution: "*Resolved*, That the Board of Trustees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America approves the general plan proposed by the Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary for safeguarding the property of that institution for the uses of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, subject to the control of the General Assembly, and hereby appoints a committee with directions to bring the matter before the next General Assembly for its instructions in the premises." As already stated, the undersigned were appointed that committee.

A form of agreement for carrying out the propositions above outlined has been submitted to us by the Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary. We herewith submit it to the General Assembly.

V. Miscellaneous.

I. THE MILEAGE AND CONTINGENT FUNDS.

SPECIAL attention is called to the *Mileage and Contingent System* adopted by the General Assembly of 1870, and amended by the General Assemblies of 1875, 1877, 1884 and 1896. As amended it is as follows:

"The Committee to whom it was referred to consider and report a uniform system of Mileage, whereby full provision may be made for the traveling expenses of the Commissioners to our General Assemblies, and to meet the contingent expenses of each Assembly, respectfully report:

"It is affirmed, *Form of Government*, Chap. xxii, Section 3, that, 'in order, as far as possible, to procure a respectable and full delegation to all our judicatories, it is proper that the expenses of ministers and elders, in their attendance on these judicatories, be defrayed by the bodies which they respectively represent.'

"The principle is thus established, that provision should be made for the payment of the traveling expenses of Commissioners to the General Assembly. This provision should be made by the Presbyteries. As far as possible, the feebler Presbyteries should be aided in this matter by the stronger. It appears just and reasonable, and so has been found by experience, that the estimated contingent expenses of each Assembly, and the traveling expenses of the Commissioners in coming to and returning from the Assembly, should be fully met by the apportionment of the whole amount among the several Presbyteries, according to the number of their communicants respectively.

"It is therefore recommended—

"1. That the Standing Committee on Mileage, annually appointed, be instructed to present an estimate of the probable amount that will be needed by the next General Assembly, in order to meet their contingent expenses and the traveling expenses of their Commissioners, with a statement of the *per capita* rate, based on the number of communicants, that will be needed to secure the amount.

"2. That the Presbyteries, at their Stated Meeting next following the adjournment of the General Assembly, apportion the amount required of their churches as they deem best.

"3. That the churches be instructed to pay over their respective apportionments at the Stated Meeting of their Presbyteries next preceding the meeting of the General Assembly—the whole amount due from the Presbytery to be forwarded to the Assembly by their Commissioners.

"4. That, as early as the fourth day of the sessions of the Assembly, the apportionment of each Presbytery be paid in full, and a bill of the necessary traveling expenses of its Commissioners be presented to the Standing Committee on Mileage.—N.B. It is understood that Commissioners, both in coming to and returning from the Assembly, will avail themselves of any commutation of fares that may be offered in season; and that in other cases they are to take, when practicable, the most economical route; no allowance to be made for extra accommodations on the way. Also, that no one will charge for return expenses unless he intends to go back to his field of labor; and that no one on a business tour, or excursion of pleasure, will make a convenience of the meeting of the Assembly and expect payment of his traveling expenses from the Mileage Fund. Also, that Commissioners, as soon after their arrival as practicable, are to report themselves to the Committee of Arrangements, and have their respective places of abode assigned them.

"5. That the Mileage Committee, after appropriating from the whole sum an amount sufficient to meet the estimated contingent expenses of the Assembly, be instructed to audit these bills and that the Stated Clerk pay them *pro rata* (if found in accordance with the preceding regulations), as far as the funds will permit.

"6. That, in order to avail themselves of the proceeds of this fund, the Presbyteries must contribute their full proportion to it according to the *per capita* rate.

"7. That every minister, and every vacant church contributing to this fund, connected with the Presbyteries thus complying with the provisions of this plan, be entitled to a copy of the Annual Minutes of the General Assembly.

"8. That the Commissioners from Presbyteries in foreign lands receive their necessary traveling expenses, *pro rata*, from their place of residence in this country."

In accordance with this system, every Presbytery is requested to pay in full, next year, to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, a sum equal to *three cents* for Mileage, and *one and one-half cents* for Contingent Expenses, or in all *four and one-half cents* for every communicant under the care of their churches, as determined by their Statistical Report, herewith printed. This will entitle their Commissioners to a full share in the apportionments for necessary traveling expenses. It is expected that these expenses will be fully met, if the Presbyteries comply with the recommendations of the Assembly.

They are expected, also, to provide for an

ENTERTAINMENT FUND.

In addition to the Mileage Fund, the Assembly of 1877 made provision for a "Supplemental Contingent Expense Fund," to "be used for the purpose of meeting the expense of entertaining such Commissioners as are not otherwise provided for." Each Presbytery is requested to contribute to this fund a sum equal at least to *one and one-half cents* per church member, and to forward it, with the Mileage Fund, to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly. It is to be disbursed by the Committee of Arrangements, whose bills for entertainment the Stated Clerk, as Treasurer, is authorized to pay, after they have been approved by an Auditing Committee composed of the clerks of the Assembly.

II. THE ANNUAL MINUTES.

The Minutes for 1902 will be supplied at *One Dollar* per copy, postage included. A copy will be sent, without charge, to the Stated Clerk of every Presbytery and of every Synod; also (in the case of every Presbytery that has paid its full apportionment to the Mileage and Contingent Funds of the Assembly), to every ordained minister, and to the Session of each contributing *vacant* church, *whose address is known*; also to every ordained missionary of the foreign Presbyteries. A supplementary number of the Minutes will be issued in January, 1903, showing ecclesiastical changes to date, and can be had on application to the Stated Clerk.

III. SYNODICAL REPORTS.

A *Statistical Report* is to be forwarded to the Assembly by the Stated Clerk of every Synod; in which are to be stated the number and names of the Presbyteries within their bounds; the changes which may have been made in the number or arrangement of their Presbyteries; the names of the Stated Clerks of the Presbyteries; the place and hour of the next annual meeting; and the names of the Moderator and Stated Clerk of the Synod. A blank will be sent to the Stated Clerk of every Synod, near the close of the calendar year, which should be filled up, and forwarded, without delay, to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly.

IV. PRESBYTERIAL REPORTS.

It is required of every Presbytery to prepare and forward to the General Assembly:

1. A *Statistical Report*, according to the form exhibited on page 349d of the present Appendix; a printed blank for which will be furnished in due season, by order of the Assembly, to the Stated Clerk of every Presbytery. This Report should, if possible, embrace all the changes in the Presbytery previous to the first day of April.

2. A *Narrative of the State of Religion* within the bounds of the Presbytery, for the year ending April 1st. A blank for the Narrative was adopted by the General Assembly of 1902, p. 23, and a copy will be forwarded to every Stated Clerk. By order of the Assembly of 1880, a blank for a Tabulated Statement of facts will annually be forwarded to the Stated Clerk of each Presbytery, to be filled properly, and duly reported to the Assembly. This Tabulated Statement should be sent to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly at least ten days before the meeting of that body. As the Narratives are not to be publicly read, less care may be given to their style, and more to the details of particulars, such as will aid the Committee of the Assembly in preparing their Annual General Narrative of the State of the Church. The blank for the Congregational Narratives, ordered by the Assembly of 1895, can be had from the Stated Clerk of the Assembly. See *Minutes*, 1902, p. 23.

V. STATED CLERKS OF PRESBYTERIES.*

In preparing the Statistical Report, let the following RULES be strictly observed:

(1) Carefully copy the blank form and order of columns, etc., on page 349d, *Minutes*, 1902, if a blank has not been received.

(2) Record ministers in the order of their MINISTERIAL AGE, with their CHRISTIAN names in full, without abbreviations, and their address on the same line, in the adjoining column.

(3) Place the name of every Church and Mission Chapel opposite the name of its Pastor, or Stated Supply; never opposite the name of any other minister; if the Church is Vacant, place it at the foot of the roll. If the Church uses in worship a language other than English, indicate the fact by words such as German, Welsh, etc.

(4) Place, after the name of every minister, an abbreviation, denoting his occupation; *e. g.*, P., for a Pastor; P. E., for a Pastor Elect; C. P., for a Colleague Pastor; A. P., for an Associate Pastor; S. S., for a Stated Supply; H. M., for a Home Missionary; D. M., for a District Missionary; C. M., for a City Missionary; T. M., for a Tract Missionary; S. M., for a Synodical Missionary; S. S. M., for a Sunday-school Missionary; P. M., for a Presbyterial Missionary; F. M., for a Foreign Missionary; Pres., for the President of a College; Chan., for a Chancellor; Prof., for a Professor of a Theological Seminary or College; Prin., for the Principal of an Academy, etc.; Sec., for a Secretary or Stated Clerk; D. Sec., for a District Secretary of a Benevolent Institution, Ag., for an Agent of do.; Ch., for a Chaplain; Tea., for a Teacher; Ed., for an Editor; Ev., for an Evangelist; H. R., for a Minister honorably retired; Col., for a Colporteur; Com., for a Commissioner; Supt., for a Superintendent; Libr., for a Librarian; and W. C., for other ministers without charge.

(5) Place after the name of every Church the abbreviation P., for one that has a Pastor; P. E., for one that has a Pastor Elect; S. S., for one that has a Stated Supply, and V., for one that is vacant.

* These rules were adopted as a whole by the General Assembly of 1891. See "*Minutes*," p. 181.

(6) If a Church fail to report, let the "whole number" of communicants be given as reported to the Synod, or to the last Assembly, with an asterisk (*) in the column of communicants, denoting the fact.

(7) In the *Additions* to the Church, distinguish between those on *examination* and those on *certificate*; in the *Baptisms*, between the *adults* and the *infants*; and be careful to observe the order of the columns in which these particulars are recorded.

(8) In the *Losses* to the Church, distinguish between (1) those *dismissed*, (2) those *deceased*, and (3) those suspended, erased or placed upon the absentee roll.

(9) In the report of "*Funds*" contributed, observe the order of the columns, and the directions of the Assembly of 1871 (*Minutes*, 1871, p. 589) as modified by the Assemblies of 1873, 1874, 1883 and 1887, as follows:

1. *Home Missions*. To include all moneys collected, whether for the Board, or for any Home Missionary operations, including Presbyterian Mission Schools, value of boxes, Ladies' Societies, etc.

2. *Foreign Missions*. To include all contributions for the spread of the Gospel in foreign lands.

3. *Education*. To include all that is given for the education of Candidates for the Ministry, whether to the Board or otherwise; and for Theological Seminaries.

4. *Sabbath-school Work*. To include all moneys contributed to the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work for their Missionary work, Sabbath-schools included, and for Synodical and Presbyterian Depositories.

5. *Church Erection*. To include all contributions for Church Erection, outside of the congregation, whether through the Board or otherwise.

6. *Relief Fund*. To include all moneys contributed for the support of disabled ministers, and Missionaries, and in aid of their families.

7. *Freedmen*. To include all moneys contributed to the evangelization and education of Freedmen, whether through the Board or otherwise.

8. *Synodical Aid*. To include all contributions to the Synods for Synodical Sustentation.

9. *Aid for Colleges*. All given for Presbyterian Colleges, Academies and Schools, whether established for the education of males or females.

10. *General Assembly*. To include all given for ecclesiastical expenses, whether in Presbytery, Synod, or General Assembly.

11. *Congregational*. To include all moneys contributed for the congregation, the salary of the minister, the support of the Church Sabbath-schools, the relief of the poor of the congregation, building and repairing churches, liquidation of debts and current expenses.

12. *Miscellaneous*. To include all other collections, for Bible and Tract Societies, etc., and for general benevolence.

13. *Temperance*. Contributions to the Committee on Temperance.

Be sure to omit the fractions of the dollar, except in the General Assembly column.

(10) The *names* of the Licentiates are to be recorded immediately after the list of Ministers, in the same column, with their *Address* in the next column; but of the candidates—including all who are studying for the ministry under the care of the *Churches* of the Presbytery—the number only is to be given.

(11)  **ADD UP**  and **verify** every column of figures, and *authenticate* the Report with your signature.

(12) Annex a statement of the number of licensures, ordinations, installations, dissolutions of pastoral relations, organizations, receptions and dissolutions of churches; also, any changes in the names of Churches; and the decease (with age, date and place) of Ministers since the last Annual Report.

(13) Avoid erasures and interlineations, **make names and numbers distinctly legible**, and punctuate properly.

(14) Affix no extraneous matter, such as memoranda, explanations, or orders for the delivery of the printed Minutes of the Assembly; let these be given on a separate sheet; also, every Overture to the Assembly.

Revise your Report, and find out its defects. Put in the commas and periods that are wanting; fill out the abbreviations; supply the *Christian* name of every minister (an *initial* letter is not a name), and see that every name and figure is perfectly legible.

IX. STANDING ORDERS AND RULES.

1. The General Assembly meets invariably on the third Thursday of May, annually, at 11 o'clock A.M.

2. The credentials of Commissioners and Delegates are to be presented at a previous hour of the same day, or of the preceding day, according to public notice, to the Stated and Permanent Clerks, acting as a Permanent Committee on Commissions.

3. The Lord's Supper is to be celebrated by the Assembly on the evening of Thursday, the first day of its sessions.

4. The dates assigned to popular meetings are as follows:

The evening of Friday, the second day, to the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work and the Sabbath-school interests of the Church.

The afternoon of the first Sunday, to the Woman's Executive Committee of Home Missions; the evening to the Board of Aid for Colleges and Academies.

The evening of Monday, the fourth day, to Missions among the Freedmen.

The evening of Tuesday, the fifth day, to the Home Mission Work.

The evening of Wednesday, the sixth day, to the Foreign Mission Work.

The evening of Friday, the eighth day, to the causes of Young People's Work and Temperance.

5. For the purpose only of electing Standing Committees, the General Assembly shall be divided into twenty-two Electing Sections of, as nearly as practicable, equal size, by combining the smaller Synods and dividing the larger by Presbyteries where necessary. The Standing Committees, except those on Mileage and Finance, shall be numbered consecutively; the Electing Sections shall be numbered in like manner.

The Standing Committees shall consist of eleven ministers and eleven elders, excepting those on Mileage and Finance, which shall each consist of eleven elders.

On odd-numbered years each odd-numbered section shall elect one minister for each odd-numbered Committee, and one elder for each even-numbered Committee, and one elder for the Mileage Committee.

On the same year, each even-numbered section shall elect one minister for each even-numbered Committee, and one elder for each odd-numbered Committee, and one elder for the Finance Committee.

On the even-numbered years this order shall be reversed.

The Standing Committees shall elect their own Chairmen. After the election of a Moderator, the Permanent Clerk shall report absentees from the first roll call. Vacancies in the Electing Sections may then be filled by the Assembly. The Stated Clerk shall designate one Commissioner in each Section to receive any necessary papers for the Section. The Sections shall meet, as far as practicable, at the close of the second session of the first day. Reports from the Sections shall be handed to the Stated Clerk by the opening of business on the morning of the second day. The quorum of an Electing Section shall be the same in number as the quorum of the Assembly, viz., fourteen.

6. The reports of the Standing Committees shall be considered at the times herein designated, viz.:

Ministerial Relief, Saturday, at 10 o'clock A.M.

Freedmen, Monday, at 10 o'clock A.M.

Education, Monday, at 3 o'clock P.M.

Home Missions, Tuesday, at 10 o'clock A.M.

Aid for Colleges and Academies, Tuesday, at 3 o'clock P.M.

Foreign Missions, Wednesday, at 10 o'clock A.M.

Publication and Sabbath-school Work, Wednesday, at 3 o'clock P.M.

Church Erection, second Thursday, at 3 o'clock P.M.

Benevolence, second Thursday, at 7.30 o'clock P.M.

Temperance, second Friday, at 3 o'clock P.M.

7. That the Standing Committees on Home Missions and Foreign Missions have each two and a half hours; and those on Education, Publication, Church Erection, Ministerial Relief, Freedmen, Temperance and Aid for Colleges have each one and a half hours. That the Secretaries and the Chairmen of the Standing and Special Committees be requested to make their statements within the limits of half an hour, and that the remainder of the time allotted to the Committees be assigned to the Commissioners and to the agents from the fields of service.

8. The Stated Clerk shall receive all Memorials, Overtures and other miscellaneous papers addressed to the General Assembly, shall make record of

the same, and then deliver them for distribution or reference to the Committee on Bills and Overtures. All complaints and appeals, however, shall be transmitted by the Stated Clerk directly to the Judicial Committee.

9. All Special Committees appointed by one General Assembly to report to the next Assembly shall be ready to present their reports on the second day of the session.

10. The Stated Clerk shall have printed and ready for distribution, so far as practicable, on the morning of the day fixed for their consideration, the resolutions appended to the reports of Special Committees appointed at previous Assemblies to report at that meeting.

11. The Stated Clerk and Permanent Clerk shall be a Committee to revise the phraseology of all papers sent down to the Presbyteries to be voted upon, provided that in no case shall this Committee so change the phraseology as to alter the meaning [1886, p. 113].

12. The Stated and Permanent Clerks shall be a Committee to supervise the publication of any and all editions of the Constitution hereafter issued by the Board of Publication, and also of the Rules for Judicatories [1886, p. 113].

13. Each Board and Permanent Committee is instructed to send up its minutes with its report, that these minutes may be reviewed by the Assembly on the report of the appropriate Standing Committee [1885, p. 690].

14. A sufficient number of the Reports of the Boards and Committees shall be forwarded by them to the place of meeting of each Assembly, prior to the day of meeting; and a complete file of the same, stitched together, shall be delivered to each Commissioner [1886, p. 77].

15. In all regions, where through the organization of Union Presbyteries or the existence of Missions without Presbyterian organization, there are no Presbyteries in connection with this Assembly, each Mission organized as such under our Board of Foreign Missions may send to the General Assembly an ordained missionary, or ruling elder, as a delegate; and the Standing Rules of the Assembly are hereby so amended that such delegate is entitled to sit as an advisory member in the Assembly, and to speak, under the rules, on all questions, and that his expenses from his domicile in this country to and during the Assembly, and return, shall be met as those of Commissioners, out of the funds of the Assembly [1887, p. 247].

16. No person shall serve as a member of a Board who is a salaried executive officer or employé of said Board, or a member of any other benevolent Board of the Church; and no more than one ruling elder from the same congregation shall serve on a Board at the same time [1887, pp. 51, 108; 1898, p. 132].

17. Any vacancy occurring in the membership of any of the Boards of the Church during the interval between the Assemblies may be filled until the next succeeding meeting of the Assembly by the Board in which such vacancy may occur [1887, p. 128].

18. The Moderator is authorized to fill by appointment any vacancies which may occur, by resignation or otherwise, in any of the Special Committees [1892, p. 209].

19. All resolutions for the appropriation of money, outside the Boards, should be brought before the Finance Committee before action by the Assembly [1892, p. 199].

20. The recommendation of any particular congregation to the benevolence of the denomination by the General Assembly is not to be understood as creating either a legal or a moral obligation upon the Assembly for the payment of the amount recommended to be contributed by the churches [1892, p. 36; 1893, p. 41].

21. All Overtures must be presented to the Assembly not later than the fifth day of its sessions.

22. The Stated and Permanent Clerks shall be a Committee to have the oversight of arrangements for the entertainment of the General Assembly [1896, p. 130].

23. All Reports of Special Committees shall be delivered to the Stated Clerk thirty days prior to the meeting of the General Assembly, and shall be printed by him and delivered to Commissioners in bound form on the second day of the sessions [1897, p. 144].

24. Upon the original appointment of any salaried executive officer of any of the Benevolent and Missionary Boards of the Church, such appointment shall be subject to the approval of the General Assembly [1898, p. 132].

25. The Moderator, with the Stated and Permanent Clerks, should an emergency requiring action at any time arise, are authorized to provide a new place of meeting for the General Assembly.

GENERAL RULES FOR JUDICATORIES.

The following "General Rules for Judicatories," not having been submitted to the Presbyteries, make no part of the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church. Yet the General Assembly of 1871, considering uniformity in proceedings in all the subordinate judicatories as greatly conducive to order and despatch in business, having revised and approved these rules, recommended them to all the lower judicatories of the Church for adoption. The rules were amended by the General Assemblies of 1885 and 1887.]

I. The Moderator shall take the chair precisely at the hour to which the judicatory stands adjourned; and shall immediately call the members to order; and, on the appearance of a quorum, shall open the session with prayer.

II. If a quorum be assembled at the time appointed, and the Moderator be absent, the last Moderator present, *being a commissioner*, or if there be none, the senior member present, shall be requested to take his place without delay, until a new election.

III. If a quorum be not assembled at the hour appointed, any two members shall be competent to adjourn from time to time, that an opportunity may be given for a quorum to assemble.

IV. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, at all times, to preserve order, and to endeavor to conduct all business before the judicatory to a speedy and proper result.

V. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, carefully to keep notes of the several articles of business which may be assigned for particular days, and to call them up at the time appointed.

VI. The Moderator may speak to points of order, in preference to other members, rising from his seat for that purpose; and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the judicatory by any two members.

VII. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, except in those cases in which the judicatory shall decide otherwise. In appointing the standing committees, the Moderator may appoint a Vice-Moderator, who may occupy the chair at his request, and otherwise assist him in the discharge of his duties.

VIII. When a vote is taken by ballot in any judicatory, the Moderator shall vote with the other members; but he shall not vote in any other case, unless the judicatory be equally divided; when, if he does not choose to vote, the question shall be lost.

IX. The person first named on any committee shall be considered as the chairman thereof, whose duty it shall be to convene the committee; and, in case of his absence or inability to act, the second named member shall take his place and perform his duties.

X. It shall be the duty of the clerk, as soon as possible after the commencement of the sessions of every judicatory, to form a complete roll of the members present, and put the same into the hands of the Moderator. And it shall also be the duty of the clerk, whenever any additional members take their seats, to add their names, in their proper places, to the said roll.

XI. It shall be the duty of the clerk immediately to file all papers, in the order in which they have been read, with proper indorsements, and to keep them in perfect order. The Stated Clerk shall receive all overtures, memorials and miscellaneous papers addressed to the judicatory; shall make record of the same and deliver them to the Committee on Bills and Overtures for appropriate disposition or reference. This committee shall have the floor on the reassembling of the judicatory after each adjournment, to report its recommendations as to reference of papers, and this right of the committee shall take precedence of the Orders of the Day. This committee shall report the papers retained by it as well as those recommended for reference to other committees, and no committee shall report on matters which have not been referred to it by the judicatory.

XII. The minutes of the last meeting of the judicatory shall be presented at the commencement of its session, and, if requisite, read and corrected.

XIII. Business left unfinished at the last sitting is ordinarily to be taken up first.

XIV. A motion made must be seconded, and afterwards repeated by the Moderator, or read aloud, before it is debated; and every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the Moderator or any member require it.

XV. Any member who shall have made a motion, shall have liberty to withdraw it, with the consent of his second, before any debate has taken place thereon; but not afterwards, without the leave of the judicatory.

XVI. If a motion under debate contain several parts, any two members may have it divided, and a question taken on each part.

XVII. When various motions are made with respect to the filling of blanks, with particular numbers or times, the question shall always be first taken on the highest number and the longest time.

XVIII. Motions to lay on the table, to take up business, to adjourn, and the call for the previous question, shall be put without debate. On questions of order, postponement, or commitment, no member shall speak more than once. On all other questions, each member may speak twice, but not oftener, without express leave of the judicatory.

XIX. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, unless to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged; and the motion for adjournment shall always be in order.

XX. An amendment, and also an amendment to an amendment, may be moved on any motion; but a motion to amend an amendment to an amendment shall not be in order. Action on amendments shall precede action on the original motion. A substitute shall be treated as an amendment.

XXI. A distinction shall be observed between a motion to lay on the table *for the present*, and a motion to lay on the table *unconditionally*, namely: A motion to lay on the table, *for the present*, shall be taken without debate; and, if carried in the affirmative, the effect shall be to place the subject on the docket, and it may be taken up and considered at any subsequent time. But a motion to lay on the table, *unconditionally*, shall be taken without debate; and, if carried in the affirmative, it shall not be in order to take up the subject during the same meeting of the judicatory, without a vote of reconsideration.

XXII. The previous question shall be put in this form, namely, Shall the main question be now put? It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present; and the effect shall be to put an end to all debate and bring the body to a direct vote: First, on a motion to commit the subject under consideration (if such motion shall have been made); secondly, if the motion for commitment does not prevail, on pending amendments; and lastly, on the main question.

XXIII. A question shall not be again called up or reconsidered at the same sessions of the judicatory at which it has been decided, unless by the consent of two-thirds of the members who were present at the decision; and unless the motion to reconsider be made and seconded by persons who voted with the majority.

XXIV. A subject which has been indefinitely postponed, either by the operation of the previous question, or by a motion for indefinite postponement, shall not be again called up during the same sessions of the judicatory, unless by the consent of three-fourths of the members who were present at the decision.

XXV. Members ought not, without weighty reasons, to decline voting, as this practice might leave the decision of very interesting questions to a small proportion of the judicatory. Silent members, unless excused from voting, must be considered as acquiescing with the majority.

XXVI. When the Moderator has commenced taking the vote, no further debate or remark shall be admitted, unless there has evidently been a mistake, in which case the mistake shall be rectified, and the Moderator shall recommence taking the vote. If the House shall pass the motion to "vote on a given subject at a time named," speeches shall thereafter be limited to ten minutes. Should the hour for adjournment or recess arrive during the voting, it shall be postponed to finish the vote, unless the majority shall vote to adjourn; in which case the voting shall, on the reassembling of the House, take precedence of all other business till it is finished. Under this rule the "yeas and nays" shall not be called, except on the final motion to adopt as a whole. This motion to fix a time for voting shall be put without debate.

XXVII. The yeas and nays on any question shall not be recorded, unless required by one-third of the members present. If division is called for on any vote, it shall be by a rising vote, without a count. If on such a rising

vote the Moderator is unable to decide, or a quorum rise to second a call for "tellers," then the vote shall be taken by rising, and the count made by tellers, who shall pass through the aisles and report to the Moderator the number voting on each side.

XXVIII. No member, in the course of debate, shall be allowed to indulge in personal reflections.

XXIX. If more than one member rise to speak at the same time, the member who is most distant from the Moderator's chair shall speak first. In the discussion of all matters where the sentiment of the House is divided, it is proper that the floor should be occupied alternately by those representing the different sides of the question.

XXX. When more than three members of the judicatory shall be standing at the same time, the Moderator shall require all to take their seats, the person only excepted who may be speaking.

XXXI. Every member, when speaking, shall address himself to the Moderator, and shall treat his fellow-members, and especially the Moderator, with decorum and respect.

XXXII. No speaker shall be interrupted, unless he be out of order; or for the purpose of correcting mistakes, or misrepresentations.

XXXIII. Without express permission, no member of a judicatory, while business is going on, shall engage in private conversation; nor shall members address one another, nor any person present, but through the Moderator.

XXXIV. It is indispensable, that members of ecclesiastical judicatories maintain great gravity and dignity while judicially convened; that they attend closely in their speeches to the subject under consideration, and avoid prolix and desultory harangues; and, when they deviate from the subject, it is the privilege of any member, and the duty of the Moderator, to call them to order.

XXXV. If any member act, in any respect, in a disorderly manner, it shall be the privilege of any member, and the duty of the Moderator, to call him to order.

XXXVI. If any member consider himself aggrieved by a decision of the Moderator, it shall be his privilege to appeal to the judicatory, and the question on the appeal shall be taken without debate.

XXXVII. No member shall retire from any judicatory without the leave of the Moderator, nor withdraw from it to return home without the consent of the judicatory.

XXXVIII. All judicatories have a right to sit in private, on business, which in their judgment ought not to be matter of public speculation.

XXXIX. Besides the right to sit judicially in private, whenever they think proper to do so, all judicatories have a right to hold what are commonly called "interlocutory meetings," in which members may freely converse together, without the formalities which are usually necessary in judicial proceedings.

XL. Whenever a judicatory is about to sit in a judicial capacity, it shall be the duty of the Moderator solemnly to announce, from the chair, that the body is about to pass to the consideration of the business assigned for trial, and to enjoin on the members to recollect and regard their high character as judges of a court of Jesus Christ, and the solemn duty in which they are about to act.

XLI. In all cases before a judicatory, where there is an accuser or prosecutor, it is expedient that there be a committee of the judicatory appointed (provided the number of members be sufficient to admit it without inconvenience), who shall be called the "Judicial Committee," and whose duty it shall be to digest and arrange all the papers, and to prescribe, under the direction of the judicatory, the whole order of proceedings. The members of this committee shall be entitled, notwithstanding their performance of this duty, to sit and vote in the cause, as members of the judicatory.

XLII. The permanent officers of a judicatory shall have the rights of corresponding members in matters touching their several offices.

XLIII. The Moderator of every judicatory above the Church Session, in finally closing its sessions, in addition to prayer, may cause to be sung, an appropriate psalm or hymn, and shall pronounce the apostolical benediction.
