## PREFACE

#### Abstract

The Permanent Judicial Commission, through its Chairman, Rev. William C. Covert, D.D., announced that the Commission was organized and ready for business. Also that the terms of the following members of the Commission expire with this Assembly, namely, Rev. William C. Covert, D.D., Rev. Edward A. Krapp, D.D., Rev. Joseph L. Weaver, D.D., John L. McNab, Esq., John H. DeWitt, Esq., and the Hon. James P. Goodrich.

## The Executive Commission

The Executive Commission, through its Chairman, Rev. Henry C. Swearingen, D.D., presented its printed report, which was received as the tentative report of the Executive Commission. The report as finally adopted appears later in these Minutes.

At the request of the Executive Commission, the Assembly adopted the following standing rule:

That at each session of the General Assembly, the Executive Commission in the person of the Chairman or at his request in the person of one of its members, shall have the floor if desired, immediately following the report of the Standing Committee on Bills and Overtures.

Continuing the report of the Executive Commission, the Rev. George B. Stewart, D.D., LL.D., presented the report of the Committee on Liquidating the Interchurch Debt of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., together with an additional report of the Committee on the Retirement of and

Interest on the Certificates of Indebtedness, and the following resolution was adopted by the Assembly:

That the Executive Commission be empowered to transfer, whenever necessary, from other funds in the Treasury of the (icheral Assembly to the account "Retirement of and Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness," amounts needed for the payment of interest when due on the Certificates of Indebtedness, said amounts to be returned to the accounts from which they were transferred when the funds in the account "Retirement of and Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness" permit.

The Assembly adopted the budget of the Boards and Agencies for 1922-1923 as presented by the Executive Commission, together with its accompanying resolutions, which will be found in the complete report of the Executive Commission.

Mr. Thomas D. Bradley presented the Report of the Committee of the Executive Commission to Apportion the Expenses of the New Era Committee to the Boards and Agencies. The Assembly adopted the following method of prorating the expenses of the New Era Movement among the participating Boards and Agencies:
(a). Each participating Board and Agency, shall, as soon as possible after the close of each fiscal year, report to the General Secretary of the New Era Movement, the entire sum received by or reported to said Board or Agency, on account of all the lines of work included in the askings of said Board or Agency, and placed by the Executive Commission in the annual budget of the fiscal year.
(b). The "entire sums" referred to iv (a) are to be totaled and the ratios between these "entire sums" and said total shall determine the amounts to be paid by said participating Boards and Agencies on account of the expenses of the New Era Movement.

## General Assembly Minutes

The Assembly directed on recommendation of the Stated Clerk that the orders of the General Assembly of 1921 with reference to Volume II of the Minutes of The General Assembly be modified so that said Volume II shall contain First, an alphabetical list of the ministers of each Presbytery, arranged alphabetically by Synods and Presbyteries followed by the local address of each minister; together with his occupation.

Second, The list of churches alphabetically aranged by post office addresses in Synods and Presbyteries, followed by the names of their pastors and theirstatistical reports as received from the Stated Clerks of Presbyteries.

Third, Said list of churches thus arranged followed by the names of their pastors and their statistical reports ats received from the treasurers of the Boards and Agencies.

Fourth, And additional lists and summaries as clearness and completness may require.

## Interchurch and New Era Debts

The Special Committee on the Interchurch and New Era Debts, through its Chairman, the Rev. John A. Marquis, D.D., presented its report, which was approved, and is as follows:

In accordance with the action of the last General Assembly instructing the Boards and Agencies to raise $\$ 500,000$ this year outside of the regular budget for the Interchurch and New Era Debt, the Secretaries of the Boards and Agencies met in the early part of June, 1921, and decided on the following plan:
I. That they would seek to complete the effort made in 1920 and 1921 to secure from each member of the Presbyterian Church the sum of One Dollar toward the Interchurch and New Era Debt. In accordance with this action a statement was prepared by the Treasurer of the Central Receiving Agency of the New Era Movement, and given to each synod at its regular meeting, showing:

1. The quota of each synod, each presbytery within the synod and each church within the presbytery, at the rate of One Dollar per member.
2. The amount contributed up to date by each synod, each presbytery and each church during the campaign of 1920 and 1921.
3. The balance due from each synod, each presbytery and each church, in order to complete the campaign of Onc. Dollar per member.
II. Representatives of the Boards and Agencies were appointed to present to each synod at its regular meeting the action of the General Assembly relative to the Interchurch debt for this year. The following suggestions were offered as to the method of procedure:
4. That the synods should commit the raising of their quota toward the debt fund either to the New Era Committee or to a special committee appointed for that purpose.
5. That churches which had given their full quota to the Interchurch and New Era Debt should not be approached as churches again, but that individuals within such churehes might be asked to contribute to the fund.
6. That churches which had not completed their quota should be asked to do so quickly as possible.
7. That churches which had given nothing toward the debt should be urged strongly to meet their obligation.
III. The synods, without an exception, responded to the appeal of the representatives of the Boards in behalf of the debt fund and promised to what they could to meet their quota. Some of the synods committed this work to the Synodical New Era Committee; others to a special committee. As very little money came in up to January 1922 an S. O. S. letter was sent to each chairman of the synodical committee charged with the responsibility of raising the Interchurch and New Era debt, urging them to have their full quota in by the 31st of March. The responses to this emergency letter indicate that while the committees have taken up the work of completing the fund very earnestly, they have met with great discouragement and with very little financial response toward the debt. This failure is due in part to the depression in the financial condition of our country. Here are some of the replies made to the S. O. S. letter:
"I am doing the best I can, but with very poor success."
"I am very much afraid that the response will be very slight. We are up to the neck in a promotional campaign both for our very urgent Home Mission needs and college needs, as well as our nation-wide interest in the New Era budget. Our State is as near the wall as it has ever been in its history. Corn at 20 cents a bushel is crushing the spirit out of many men. Corn is king in our State."
"This" is a bad time, as you know, to raise funds, and the best that we could do is to send a letter to each of the churches asking them to make an effort to reach all or part of their quota before March 31st."
"I have talked the matter over with our synodical superintendent who announces to me very hopefully that the matter is dead in our synod. In spite of that I am going to send out a letter to the churches and urge them to meet the situation. I certainly hope it may bring in enough to pay the postage at any rate."
"After full discussion it was the conviction of the committee that it would be unwise to institute a separate campaign for the debt just now."
"We will do all in our power to bring to a successful termination the raising of our quota of the debt by March 31st. The outlook is not bright; nevertheless we will keep at the job."
"The committee has been doing some work, but we have found little enthusiasm for the Interchurch and New Era Debt."
"To start out in an independent drive for the debt will confuse, if not disturb, the church collection as to benevolences all around, is my fear."
"It does not seem probable that many churches will undertake anything over and above the budget they have already accepted. However, we will do the best we can."
These quotations are typical of the attitude of the synods toward the raising of the Interchurch and New Era debt by a special appeal at this time.
IV. The present status of the New Era and Interchurch Debts is set forth in the following statement by the Treasurer of the Central Recciving Agency of the New Era Movement:

## The Presbyterian Magazine

The Committee of Management of the Presbyterian Magazine, through its Chairman, Rev. David C. Wylie, D.D., LI.I)., presented its report, and pending its adoption, the Assembly was addressed by the Editor of the Magazine, the Rev. James H. Snowden, D.I., L.L.D., and the following resolution, submitted by the Rev. Wallace Radeliffe, D.D., was adopted:

The General Assembly has heard with gratification the report of The Presbyterian Magazine and it heartily congratulates the Committee of Management, appointed by the Secretaries of the Boards and Agencies, the Editor, and the Publisher, on the splendid Magazine they are giving to the Church. We urge upon pastors and sessions that efforts be made to place the Magazine in every family of each congregation and we commend the plan of putting the Magazine in the congregational budget for each family as an effective means of informing and educating our people in our work, and of promoting denominational efficieney and loyalty and zeal in carrying it on.

The report of the Committee of Management was adopted, and is as follows:

The following report on The Presbyterian Magazine for the six months ending with March 31, 1922, during which time it has been under the present management and editorship, is herewith jointly submitted by the Committee of Management, the Editor Dr. James H. Snowden and the Publisher Horace P. Camden.

The General Assembly of 1921 committed The New Era Magazine, then under the control of the Executive Commission and edited by the Director of Publicity, in accordance with its editor's request and also at the request of a conference of the Board representatives "to the Boards to be conducted and financed by them" (Minutes, p. 169).

In carrying out this direction the Secretaries of the Boards and Agencies met in New York on Thursday, June 2, 1921, and elected the Rev. Dr. James H. Snowden editor. The name was changed to The Presbyterian Magazine and a Committee of Management was elected consisting of seven members to which the management of the publication was committed. This committee consists of Drs. David G. Wylie, John McDowell, William H. Foulkes and Rev. William P. Schell of New York, Drs. Henry B. Master and Harold McA. Robinson of Philadelphia and Dr. John M. Ga ton of littsburgh. The Committee met and organized by electing Dr. Wylie as chairman and Rev. W. P. Schell as secretary. The editor submitted a plan for the Magazine, which was
adopted. Owing to his summer engagements the editor could not assume the duties of the office until Angust when he began with the October number, since which time successive monthly issues have appeared. The reception of the Magazine as expressed in the hundreds of strongly commendatory communications that have been received indicates that it has the right ideal in view and is meeting the needs of the Church.

The Magazine contains six standardized departments as follows: Editorials, four pages; Devotional, one page ; General Articles, four pages; the Boards and Agencies, sixteen pages; the Sunday School, two pages; the Church at Work, a number of columns; besides there are many miscellaneous articles and items. Each Board and Agency has one page each month, but the Board designated by the General Assembly for the special consideration and offerings of the churches in each month has four pages.

The Presbyterian Magazine aims to be the advance agent of the Boards and Agencies, the assistant of every pastor and the helper of all our people in our work. It sceks to be a promoter of unity and harmony and a messenger of truth and righteousness, optimism and good cheer and above all, of faith in and service to our Lord Jesus Christ. Presbyterians in a peculiar degree base their activities on intelligence and this Magazine is a means to this end.

It will be able to accomplish this purpose largely in the degree in which it reaches all our pastors and people. If it were placed in the half million families in our Church it would be a powerful agency for informing and educating, unifying and inspiring our eighteen hundred thousand members in our work. We appeal to our pastors and people to take up this problem and make efforts to realize our ideal of a Presbyterian Magazine in every Presbyterian home. Any plan that will work towards this end is good, but we think a short and effective plan would be for each congregation to put the Magazine in its annual budget, paying for as many copies as there are families at the club rate of 75 cents a copy and having it mailed to their individual addresses. This should be done, not as a gift, but as an effective means of promoting all the work of the Church, an investment that is good business and will more than pay for itself in increased returns.

As the Committee of Management has had control of the Magazine for only six months the financial report is deferred until the completion of the year but the Committee regards the present condition and future prospects of the Magazine as very encouraging.

## Permanent Committee on Evangelism

The Report of the Permanent Committee on Evangelism was presented by its General Secretary, Rev. George G. Mahy, D.D., and pending its adoption, the following resolution, submitted by the Rev. Cleland B. McAfee, D.D., was ordered to be sent to the Chairman of the Permanent Committee on Evangelism, Mr. Charles L. Huston, of Coatesville, Pa , signed by the Moderator and Stated Clerk of the General Assembly.;
"The General Assembly has just received with rejoicing the annual report of the Permanent Committee on Evangelism, with its record of great work and rich results. It conveys to you by rising vote its gratitude for the faithful service you have rendered through so many years in its leadership, and it prays God's comforting blessing upon you in your present physical limitation, from which it trusts you may soon be restored to full strength."

The following addressed the Assembly in connection with the report of the Permanent Committee on Evangelism: Rev. William F. Kline, D.D., Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., LL.D., Rev. William R. Graham, D.D., Rev. George A. Hill, Rev. Olin M. Jones, Elder Fred R. Goodman, Rev. R. V. Gilbert, Rev. C. E. Thompson.

The recommendations of the Report were adopted, and are as follows:

In presenting for the consideration and action of the Assembly the resolutions which are here offered, your Committee calls attention to the fact that they are very similar to the resolutions offered last year, and particularly that the items under Resolution 2 are practically unchanged, for the reason that the policy of the Committee, which the last Assembly confirmed, has not been changed by any developments which have occurred during the past year.

1. That your Committee recommends the appointment, by the Moderator of the General Assembly, of the following ministers and elders to serve for a term of three years: Alfred H. Barr, D.D., George Brewer, D.D., J. Ross Stevenson, D.D.; elders, Foster Copeland, H. M. Voorhees and A. H. Whitford.
2. That the Assembly instructs the Permanent Committee on Evangelism:
(1) To exercise the powers conferred upon it and to perform the duties entrusted to it, by this and previous assemblies; to carry forward the comprehensive plans for the development of the evangelistic spirit, and direction of the evangelistic work of the Church, which it has initiated under previous instructions, and extend its work as rapidly as possible to every part of the Church.
(2) To continue among the synods and preabyteries the work of organizing their Evangelistic Committees and to render such assistance as will enable them to carry on an evangelistic work which will reach every church within their bounds.
(3) With this end in view to arrange, as in former years, for Evangelistic Institutes and Conferences in various sections of the country, with Synodical Committees, Presbyterial Evangelistic groups, and with the committees of individual presbyteries.
(4) To assist presbyteries which have voted to enter upon definite Evangelistic Campaigns in accordance with the suggestions of the Assembly's Committee, by furnishing them with help in the matter of organization for personal service and by securing and assigning evangelists and evangelistic preachers to the full extent of their requirements.
(5) To enlarge the scope of its correspondence with individual churches and to provide an increased distribution of literature among them to be sent on request and particularly to keep in touch, through the sessions, with those churches which are pastorless or are only irregularly supplied.
(6) To arrange, as in former years, for a Pre-Assembly Conference on Evangelism for Tuesday afternoon and evening and a part of Wednesday preceding the General Assembly.
(7) To carry on the work of College Evangelism in connection with the candidate enlistment program of the General Board of Education, through a Joint Committee on College Work which shall be composed of an equal number of members of the Board of Education and the Permanent Committee on Evangelism. The Permanent Committee on Evangelism to be primarily responsible for the evangelistic emphasis, and to devote the entire time of one of its secretaries to this work.
3. That the Committee be authorized to coöperate with the Evangelistic Commission of the Federal Council of Churches and with the Evangelistic Committees of other denominations; that the General Secretary of Assembly's Committee be authorized to carry on such work as may be necessary as Secretary of the Evangelistic Commission of the Presbyterian Alliance (Western Section); and that the Assembly authorize the Committee to take any further action towards coöperative work in evangelism which may appear to the Committee to be wise and productive of the best results.
4. That in accordance with the instructions of the last Assembly the Committee is instructed to give a thorough test to plans and methods of bringing back to the Church its lapsed members, in coöperation with the Stated Clerk and the Committee on Christian Life and Work.
5. That the Assmbly calls upon all the churches to coöperate with the Committee on Evangelism as its distinetive Agency appointed to stimulate the evangelistic spirit and direct the evangelistic work of the Church, and that it ugges upon all pastors and sessions to give their utmost time and strength to the fundamental work of evangelism; that in every church its truest members may be set apart, trained and assigned to the work of personal evangelism, and that special scasons be set aside for prayer and for an intensive presentation of the evangelistic message, and particularly that pastors are requested to coöperate with presbyterial committees in such evangelistic programs as the several presbyteries may adopt.
6. That the Assembly again calls upon synods and presbyteries to establish or strengthen their committees on evangelism and where these committces have failed by reason of inefficient leadership, or have been abandoned by presbyteries for any cause, that they be re-created as standing committees on evangelism in order that the Permanent Committee on Evangelism may through them contribute the largest possible coöperative service in men and money for the carrying forward of the evangelistic work of the churches.
7. That the Moderator and the Stated Clerk of the Cieneral Assembly be ex-officio members of the Committee, and that the Committee be authorized to appoint special representatives to coöperate with it in its work throughout the Church.

The Rev. Roy Ewing Vale, D.D., of the Presbytery of Chicago, conducted the devotional service.

The Assembly took recess until 2.30 P.M., and was closed with prayer.

FRIDAY, May 19, 1922, 2.30 P.M.
The Assembly met and was opened with prayer by the ViceModerator, Rev. W. O. Thompson, D.D., LL.D.

## Near East Relief

Mr. Charles V. Vickery, General Secretary of the Near East Relief, addressed the Assembly in behalf of its work, and the following resolution was adopted by the Assembly:

Reaffirming the action of previous Assemblies, and in view of the urgent need known to exist, this Assembly endorses the appeal of the Near East Relief in behalf of the 200,000 orphans now under its care, 110,000 of whom are in orphanages under the protection of the American flag. This work of the Near East Relief must go on. It would be a crime against humanity to remit our efforts in behalf of these helpless wards of Christian America. We therefore recommend an adequate presentation of this cause in all our churches and Sabbath schools without prejudice to other causes. For our churches and Sabbath schools, we recommend the third Sunday of January
ats a day for its presentation, with opportunity for free will offerings and pledges towards orphan adoption. We further recommend that the Treasurer of the Central Receiving Agency of the New Era Movement be authorized to receive and transmit funds for the Near East Relief, and that the Moderator appoint a Committee, serving without expense, to carry this plan of coöperation into effect.

## Executive Commission

The Executive Commission presented sections X and XII of their tentative report, which were adopted, and will be found in the complete report inserted later in this Journal.

## Civil Law Enforcement

The following resolution, submitted by the Rev. W. Beatty Jemnings, D.D., of the Presbytery of Philadelphia North, was unanimously adopted by the Assembly:

Whereas the widespread and growing, and in many instances, boasted violation of law, and in particular of the Eighteenth Amendment of the Federal Constitution, the fundamental law of our country, tends to discredit our form of government, and breeds disrespect for all authority; and

Whereas the continuance of our nation hinges upon respect for and obedience to law; therefore,

Be it resolved: We, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, true to our Church's traditions, and viewing with profound alarm the certain effects of this lawlessness upon the character of our people, call upon our members, and upon all Christians, for continued and increased activity in behalf of the maintenance and enforcement of all laws. The Assembly later directed that their action to telegraphed to the President and to the Attorney General of the United States and appreciative acknowledgements were received from both recipients.

## Returns from Overtures

The Stated Clerk presented to the Assembly the replies of the Presbyteries to the two overtures sent down by the Assembly of 1921 , which were referred to the following committee of canvass appointed by the Moderator, in accord with the constitutional provisions.

## Necrological Report

The Stated Clerk made the Necrological Report for the year 1921-1922, after which the Assembly sang the hymn
"Nearer my (iod to Thee," prayer being offered by the Rev. George H. Ingram, of the Presbytery of New Brunswick.

## Special Committee on Christian Life and Work

The Special Committec on Christian Life and Work, through one of its members, the Rev. George E. Hawes, D.D., of the Presbytery of Carlisle, submitted its report, and pending its adoption, the Assembly was addressed by the Revs. John Grant Newman, D.D., George W. Shelton, D.D., T. Maxwell Morrison, Arthur C. Ludlow, D.D., George H. Ingram, Joseph W. Cochran, D.D., and Elders Philip A. Ryder and H. B. Faris. The resolutions of the report were adopted seriatim and the report as a whole approved, as follows:

The Special Committee on Christian Life and Work respectfully submits to the Ceneral Assembly its sixteenth annual report. The order of presentation of subjects is as follows:

## 1. Purposes.

In order to make clear the purposes of the Committee, the action of the Cieneral Assembly, constituting the Committee and indicating its sphere of work is again quoted in full, namely:
"That a Special Committee on Christian Life and Work is hereby appointed, to consist of eleven members, of whom two shall be the Moderator for the time being and the Stated Clerk, the other nine members to be appointed by the Moderator. Of the nine members to be appointed, one-third shall be changed each year. The duties of the Committee shall be to consider and report upon the Narrative of Christian Life and Work from the Presbyteries, annually prepared for the Assembly, and also to report from their own knowledge, upon any related matters, connected with the general spiritual condition of the Chureh. The Stated Clerk of the Assembly shall be the Secretary." (Minutes 1906, p. 222).

## II. Meetings

The Committce held during the year two meetings: at Atlantic City, N. J., on November 10, 1921, and at Philadelphia, Pa., on December 20, 1921, besides a meeting of a sub-committee of our members on April 4, 1922, to propare the report for presentation to the Assembly. The Moderator, Rev. Henry C. Swearingen, D. D., appointed the Vice-Moderator Nathan G. Moore, Esq., to act as Chairman of the Committee. All the members were in attendance at one or other of the meetings, good excuses for absence being rendered in each case.

## III. Members

The membership of the Committee is composed of three classes, each serving three years. The class whose term of service expires this year is composed of Rev. Hugh B. MacCauley, D.D., Rev. Paul M. Strayer, D.D., and Elder Harry P. Ford.

## IV. Statistical Summaries of Ministers and Churches

The statistical summaries have been prepared by authority of the Committee, under the direction of Elder Harry I'. Ford, from the statistical reports of ministers and churches as they appear arranged by Synods in the Minutes of the last Assembly. They are valuable and are not duplicated in the Minutes. The replies from the Stated Clerks last year as to the value of the tables decided the Committee to publish them. They are omitted from our report but will be found in Volume II of the Minutes of the General Assembly in their proper place.

The Summaries show the statistics of the churches arranged in tabular form by columns according to Synods and cover the following main heads, namely:

V. Annual Survey and Report. (Formerly "Narrative.")

We have given a great deal of time this year, as the Committee has done for several years, to the question of how to make a suitable survey of the Church, and a narrative of the state of religion. Under this head we come to the relations of the

Synods and Presbyteries to the churches. These judicatories, of course, occupy an important place in the administration of church affairs. (See Form of Govt., Chap. XI, Sec. 4 for Synod, and Chap. X, Sec. 7 for Presbytery.) This will be increasingly so in the immediate future, which is going to test to the utmost the Presbyterian principles of equality, review and control. The same is true as to the parallel principles of democracy in the State.

In order to assist in making this Synodical and Presbyterial control most effective to the largest spiritual results, the Assembly has for five years made the Stated Clerks advisory members of the Special Committee on Christian Life and Work, and has requested the judicatories to appoint a Standing Committee on Narrative, and to place this department on the docket at a morning session, and to direct the Stated Clerks to co-operate with our Committee to the ends desired

It is gratifying to report that most of the judicatories have done this, and that the Stated Clerks have rendered valuable aid, not only in the ordinary routine of their office, but in the prompt replies made by them to the two questionnaires sent out by this Committee last year, and this year, asking for their advice on matters under our consideration.

But it is also true that every year it appears more clear that there is need to arouse the Church, and especially the judicatories, to the duty of making such review of the state of religion within their bounds, and of exercising such control of the resources and powers of the Church as will bring out the weaknesses of every situation and the proposal of adequate means of relief.

It must be evident that the preparation of the Report on Christian Life and Work and its suitable hearing before the judicatory will follow a thorough review of the field and facts. 'This becomes very evident in the judicatory when the Standing Committee on Christian Life and Work lays out the whole subject in a competent way.

The Assembly's Special Committee on Christian Life and Work, with the approval of the Executive Commission, issued this year to the Presbyteries a new form of narrative which for the sake of clearness was named the "Annual Survey and Report." This annual survey and report replaced the blank hitherto known as the "Narrative of Christian Life and Work." The new form substituted for a statistical questionnaire, a request for a brief statement of what seemed to each pastor and session, to be of most importance in the life of the local church, and, to secure some uniformity in the replies, a suggestive outline was enclosed.

The object of this Annual Survey and Report is two-fold:
(1) To secure for the General Assembly reliable and recent information concerning the spiritual life of the ('hureh. Pastors and sessions were therefore asked to report as of the calendar year and not as formerly, of the church fiscal your. Some criticism was made of this change, but where the purpose of the change in the report period was clearly understood, ready approval was given. It should be realized by all that if the fiscal year is made the basis of this survey of spiritual conditions, the General Assembly, because of lack of time, cannot receive a report of conditions in the Church for the fiscal year next preceding the meeting of the General Assembly.
(2) The second object of this survey and report blank was to encourage the pastor to sit down with his session, and if he were so inclined, with his deacons and trustees also, and talk over under the stimulus of the outline accompanying the report blank, local conditions. Thus their judgment might be obtained in the formulation of the church's report to Presbytery, and through the Presbytery, to the General Assembly. Also their minds would be stimulated to think seriously with reference to the progress of the work of their church in its relation to its own interests, in its relation to the community in which it is located, and with reference also to the interests of the Kingdom of Christ in the nation and in the world.

We have received reports following the Annual Survey and Report outline from only one quarter of the Presbyteries. The Presbyteries submitting satisfactory reports, however, are so well scattered over the United States, and those compiling these reports have done their work with such intelligence that we are able to obtain from them a fairly accurate reflection of the spiritual condition of our Church. The Annual Survey and Report blank which was sent out, asked for expressions of opinion and conviction along seven lines, and in formulating our summary, we follow the outlines of the blank.
I. Church Membership and Services.-Membership in our churches throughout the country, except where the individual church has been faced with perplexing problems, is evidently on the increase. Steady growth is noted everywhere except in rural districts and in the congested centers of population. It is gratifying to find that our churches with rare exceptions, are relying upon conservative methods for increasing church membership and attendance. Very generally there is a good report of the attendance at the main Sunday service, whether this be morning or evening. In
localities where the morning service is the best attended on the Lord's Day, there is widespread difficulty in securing a good attendance of the congregation at the evening service. As to the mid-week service, there are few places relatively where this is a decided factor in the church life if conducted along what are commonly known as the old lines. When the Session of a church has been willing to recognize the situation and to face the conditions squarely, and where the old form of praying meeting has been somewhat modified, new life and vigor and interest have resulted. The attention of our sessions is called with earnestness to the need of conducting the mid-week service wisely. In each locality, those familiar with conditions must make the decision as to what shall be done, but this decision should in no case be hampered by too much adherence to what has been done in the past.

The using of the week preceding Easter as a week of prayer rather than the first week of the calendar year, is on the increase. A wise adaption of the so called "Church Year" to the life of our denomination, is being found a valuable asset in gaining and holding the attention of the people.
II. Religious Education and Young People's Work:
(a) Religious Education: While there is a decided advance in many of our churches in the adoption of a definite educational program, the great majority of our sessions are not taking the problem of Christian Education as it relates to the local church, into as serious consideration as the situation demands. While it may not be wise always to add to the local machinery by the formal appointment of a Committee on Religious Education in the session, the session as a committec of the whole, should deal definitely with the local problems in this sphere. The reports which have been received show an encouraging increase in Bible study, and to some extent, in the re-establishment of the family altar. Many of our churches are wide awake to the need of recognizing in some way the part of children in the conduct of the worship of the Lord's house. Communicant classes are conducted in most of our churches. The Graded Lessons issued by our Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, especially the Departmental Lessons, are growing in favor, and the folly of clinging to the old type of Uniform lessons is being almost universally recognized.
(b) Young People's Work: There is a serious question as to whether the Young People's Societies are maintaining their efficiency in many of our churches. In churches where these organizations are not serving as fully as they might, attention is called to the possibility of linking them as an expressional
organizations to the religions program of the chureh. Spercial emphasis in this connection is laid upon the definite provision which our Board of Publication and Sabbath Echool Work has made toward achieving this end.
(c) There is an ominous silence throughout these reports received from the Presbyteries, with reference to definite efforts for the enlisting of young men for the Gospel ministry, and indeed little if anything is said with reference to the enlisting of any of our young people for definite Christian service. We sincerely hope that lack of response to the inquiry in the blank which was sent out does not indicate general indifference in this hour when the need of highly qualified recruits for Christian service in all departments is so great.
III. Pastoral Visitation and Evangelism.-That faithful pastoral visitation is still maintained is clear from the report made to the Committee. The great majority of our pastors fully appreciate the opportunities offered them by coming in contact with their people in their homes. Those who are not in sympathy with pastoral visitation, are evidently for the most part, men who have no vision, or who lack inclination to put themselves to the trouble of meeting their people in informal and helpful ways. Most pastors find their elders willing to give all needed help along this line when particular and definite service is called for. Personal work for souls and nonprofessional evangelistic methods are everywhere emphasized as the most effective today. A more careful supervision of the communicant rolls of our churches is evidenced. There can be no question that there has been a great advance in this regard in recent years, and that with occasional exceptions, the rolls of our churches are kept in accordance with the rules of the Book of Discipline. There is also on the part of many pastors an earnest effort to interest absentee members in churches near their present places of residence. The Permanent Committee on Evangelism is co-operating cordially with your Committee in definite endeavor to remedy conditions at this point of the Church's life. Furthermore, many churches are making systematic and successful efforts to link new members to and to interest them in the organizations of the Church.
IV. The Community.--There do not appear to be in our churches many groups of people formally studying the social problems of the day under distinctly church auspices. On the other hand, there is obviously a growing interest on the part of a great majority of our congregations in the needs of the local community, and an earnest desire to serve the community at large in every possible way. This interest and
desire for service is shown in many ways. Especially is it manifested in the fact that leading workers in such organizations as the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and other community organizations, are leaders as well in the Presbyterian churches of the community. Union services are the rule rather than the exception, and there is evidently an increasing desire on the part of the churches of our denomination to relate themselves as helpfully as possible for the betterment of every local condition requiring attention.
V. Missions and Benevolence.-No new methods of missionary instruction have been brought to the surface as a result of the investigations of this Committee. The mission study classes under the auspices of the Woman's Missionary organizations of the churches seem to be still the outstanding medium of missionary information in the average church. Very few mission study classes among the men are reported. The School of Missions which has recently received so much attention from our denominational leaders, is increasing in favor and is doubtless performing a very great service in the dissemination of up-to-date missionary information. Sermons by the pastor, visits by Board secretaries and missionaries the literature furnished by the New Era movement and the Boards, and stereopticon lectures, are also widely in use. It is a regrettable fact that the earnest efforts put forth by all those interested in securing from the churches more frequent remittances to the Boards of benevolent funds in their hands, are not meeting with as gratifying results as could be wished.
VI. Finances.-The Every Member Canvass is being welcomed with ever increasing favor through the Church. Few churches having thoroughgoing financial methods, have any serious difficulty either with local support, or in meeting to a reasonable degree their obligations to the Boards and Agencies of the Church. Most gratifying also is it to find that the support of our churches by the rental of pews has become an anachronism. Presbytery after Presbytery reports that every church within its bounds has abandoned this method of raising money for the Lord's work. It is regrettable to find that here and there the salaries of our faithful pastors are not paid promptly. It also should be said with emphasis that the endeavor which has been seriously made in some quarters to secure for our ministers adequate salaries, should be extended through the church. The work which has been so well done in some Presbyteries needs to be prosecuted with carnestness and zeal in every Presbytery, and the attention of the commissioners to this General Assembly who are Ruling

Elders, is called especially to this important matter. The church buildings of our denomination are apparently for the large part in good repair. There is a gratifying increase of serious attention in the matter of architecture. This should be everywhere encouraged. We have not been as careful in the past as we should have been in urging that our congregations contemplating the erection or the remodeling of buildings for church purposes, should take such advice as will make these buildings not only in equipment, but also in appearance, worthy of the great Head of the Church. There is also an increasing interest in and attention to the matter of the insurance of church properties. Unfortunately, however, serious consideration of the matter of insurance is not as widespread as it ought to be. A questionnaire recently sent out from the Office of the General Assembly at the request of the Board of the Church Erection Fund, has revealed bad conditions in many localities. We would call the attention of the Ruling Elders in this Assembly to the importance of having all church property insured with the replacement value clearly in mind.
VII. General.-The reports which have been received leave certain general impressions.

1. Optimism: The reports received are with scarcely an exception, optimistic in tone. There is no lack of a recognition of conditions as they are. There is no tendency to ignore difficulties and problems. But there is a confidence that by cheerful faithful persistence, all difficulties can be removed and all problems can be solved.
2. Unity: One cannot but be impressed as he reads the Presbyterial reports with the sense of unity which pervades the Church. With rare exceptions the Presbyteries are performing the tasks to which they have addressed themselves with most commendable breadth of vision. Spiritual nearsightedness is steadily on the decrease among us to-day. A spiritual foresightedness which relates the local problem to the Presbyterial and the Presbyterial to the national and the international, is constantly on the increase.
3. Humility: There is also a gratifying atmosphere of humility about all the reports. The churches everywhere are ready to accept the blame for whatever of inertia and indifference is found among them and are"equally ready to give God the glory for the achievements made and the victories won. There is no evidence of any undue confidence in the flesh or of any wilful disregard of the place and power of the Holy Spirit.
4. Spirituality: Your Committee is convinced that the gencral spiritual life of the Chureh is in excellent condition today. There is nothing in the reports which have reached us to indicate that the present day emphasis upon methods and programmes has to any appreciable degree lessened the church's sense of dependence upon "the one thing needful." Never before in the history of our Church were the obviously artificial, and the merely clever, in such disrepute among us. Never before in the history of our Church was there such a universal demand for the substantial in doctrine and in practice.

## VI. Suspended Members and New Converts

We report that a Religious Census, recently compiled by Dr. H. K. Carroll for The Christian Herald, indicates that 1921 was a year of big gains for churches. The total increase in church membership last year, as shown by statistics collected by Dr. Carroll, was 761,727 , bringing the total membership for the United States up to $43,523,206$.

The membership of the Presbyterian group has increased the past year 62,649 , of which nearly 50,000 is credited to the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., and 20,541 to the Presbyterian Church, U. S. The United Presbyterian Church had an increase in membership of 3,393 . Some Presbyterian groups show losses.

Of the denominational groups the Methodist gained nearly 300,000 members, nearly a third of which increase is credited to the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church. The Methodist Episcopal Church had an increase of 118,037 and the Methodist Episcopal Church groups or denominations included Disciples 24,000; Protestant Episcopal 5,768; Lutheran 18,093; Roman Catholic 49,372. As neither the Northern or Southern Conventions of the Baptist Church have compiled figures for gains in 1921 no figures from those bodies were available.

The total number of ministers is placed at 195,414 which represents an increase of 1,791 over the number announced in 1920. Denominations or groups of denominations which report large increases in number of ministers are Roman Catholic 316; Dunkard Brethren 214; Lutheran 350; Methodist 529; Pentecostal Churches 220; and Salvation Army 910. It is estimated that there are 230,572 churches which represents an increase over the number reported in 1920 of eightyeight.

Another Questionnaire sent out by our Committee this year to the Stated Clerks of Presbyteries, to which more than one hundred rep.ies were received, shows that in the opinion
of these men reflecting the opinion of their Prestyterises the question of devising some plan to save our suspended members should be answered in some way. decordingly we have carefully eonsidered the subject a second time and bedieno that the permanent committee on Exangelism is the properer ageney to carry out the plan. We submit a recolution 10 that effect.

## VII. The Need of Ministers

This subject has also given us renewed thought and wo submit the following considerations as a kind of programme to be carried out by the Ministers, Sessions and Church Boards concerned, as to which a notification should be sent by the Stated Clerk of the Assembly to the parties concerned. The items are as follows:
(1) That all Christian ministers cultivate a holy enthusiasm for their calling and renew their love for their work, carefully refraining from speaking of the ministry in a tone of discouragement.
(2) That at least once a year, pastors present, with high confidence to the parents and youth of their congregation, the opportunity of service and of moral leadership offered by the Christian ministry.
(3) That in large communities supper conferences of older boys, selected from all the churches, be held oceasiona'ly, and the call of the ministry be presented by ministers and laymen.
(4) That the General Board of Education, in co-operation with similar agencies of other denominations be requested to put into effect a comprehensive and continuous plan by which picked men shall be invited to all colleges and universities to lay this matter before the student bodies perhaps preaching a sermon and always spending several days or a week in personal conference on this subject.
(5) That careful attention be given by churches and sessions to their method of selecting pastors and their attitude toward the ministers involved. It is highly desirable that vacant churches make diligent effor't to secure pastor's, treating with Christian courtesy all ministers under consideration and giving generous and united support to pastors when chosen.

We submit a resolution as to this programme.

## VIII. Minsterial Compensation

Another subject that received renewed consideration by us was that of Ministerial Compensation (See last year's report Minutes of G. A. 1921 page 237.) The situation confronting
our pastors is just as serious as it was last year. Salary should be increased. Manses should be provided. Hundreds of appeals for help in the matter of building manses have been turned down by the Board of Church Erection because the available funds were exhausted. We urge a resolution for adoption.

## IX. Promoting Efficiency in Synod and Presbytery

One of our resolutions passed last year by the Assembly (See Minutes G. A. 1921, page 237, Res. 9) advising the Synods and Presbyteries to make special inquiry with a view to promoting efficiency in Presbytery and securing larger spiritual results has attracted considerable attention. In fact for some time the judicatories have been looking into the question of methods and conditions now prevailing and the need of further executive helpers. There is no question but what improvements should be made. When a Presbytery has 20 committees, half of which never meet, or render only a half-hearted service, it is evident that the standard of work in presbytery is going to be lowered, efficiency hindered and lack of interest certainly follow. The Elders will stay away from Presbytery. In the Synods the situation is even worse. A study of the dockets of some of the largest Synods shows a long list of disconnected items to which 10 or 15 minutes are assigned and in order to finish on time, the docket must be run like a time table. What is needed in our opinion is that the various agencies should be grouped in large departments such as (1) Home Missions and Church Extension; (2) Foreign Missions and Relations; (3) Christian Life and Evangelism; (4) Education and Examinations; (5) Ministerial Relations; and that places be assigned for these departments in such a way as to provide for an adequate, comprehensive and interesting presentation of the subject.

Besides that the time is near when our stronger presbyteries need to provide for a competent Executive Secretary whose duty it shall be to serve each department with information and investigation and aid the Presbytery and its officers to carry the resolutions of Presbytery into effect. We again urge a resolution to this effect upon the General Assembly.

## X. The Method of Our Report in the Assembly

This matter comes up for improvement. Last year we considered it, but did not present any resolution to the Assembly. The method at present provides that our report be printed in the Blue Book, and that the report be presented to the Assembly on the first Friday afternoon, at which time a half-hour is assigned for its presentation. In its present
place, it has no relation to any supporting topic, such as Evangelism. Also no discussion is had at that time. 'The report is automatically referred for consideration to the Standing Committee on Christian Life and Work, which makes a brief report on the following Thursday, after a hurried consideration of matters over which we have spent a year.

We think that our report should be acted upon immediately when presented to the Assembly, and that the Standing Committee on Christian Life and Work should be discontinued, because it can perform no adequate function, and that the report of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply which has also been referred to this Standing Committee, should hereafter be referred to some other Committee. We present a resolution to this effect.

## XI. Resolutions

1. That the Stated Clerks of Synods and Presbyteries be and hereby are appointed as advisory members of the General Assembly's Special Committee on Christian Life and Work, and that the said judicatories be requested to direct their Stated Clerks to co-operate with our Committee on Christian Life and Work, in the preparation of the Annual Survey and Report, by their reports and suggestions, and also to assist the Committee in the preparation of the Statistical Summaries of Ministers and Churches, when asked to do so.
2. That we request all the Synods and Presbyteries to give at least one hour at their annual meeting for the hearing and discussion of the Annual Survey and Report on Christian Life and Work, and we suggest that the report on Christian Life and Work in each of the judicatories, Assembly, Synod and Presbytery, be docketed, if the way be clear, in connection with the report upon Evangelistic work.
3. That the form of this year's "Annual Survey and Report," formerly known as the "Narrative," be and hereby is approved tentatively by the General Assembly, and that this Committee be directed to issue it on trial for another year.
4. That the action of the Committee in making the calendar year the period for report, be and hereby is approved, because only by the adoption of such a report period can the General Assembly and Presbytery be furnished with recent and reliable information as to the spiritual life of the Church.
5. That the Permanent Committee on Evangelism? be hereby authorized and directed to co-operate in the matter of recovering absentees to the Church, by receiving from
the churches and Presbyteries the ammal lists of absentees, prepared by the Special Committee on Christian Life and Work, for the purpose of helping absentee members to locate as speedily as possible in one of the churches near their new home; and that the Assembly's Committee on Evangelism be requested to consider the whole matter of conservation of membership and present the matter to the Presbyteries that they visit, thus co-ordinating the work of conservation and evangelism.
6. That a copy of the recommendations of this report on the Need of Ministers be sent to the Stated Clerks of Presbyteries, to be read in Presbytery in order to bring up the whole subject for discussion.
7. That Synods and Presbyteries be urged to appoint committees on Ministerial Compensation (composed of laymen), whose duty it shall be to take up with congregations the question of increasing the salaries of their ministers in all cases where such salaries are manifestly insufficient to meet ministerial necessities.
8. That the General Assembly again advises all our Synods and Presbyteries to make special inquiry, by the appointment of a competent committee, concerning methods and conditions now prevailing, with a view to promoting efficiency and securing larger spiritual results, and that a part of this inquiry include the question of what further administrative missionary and evangelistic helpers are needed by the Synods and Presbyteries to secure these ends.
9. That our report be acted upon directly upon its presentation to the Assembly, and that the Assembly discharge its Standing Committee on Christian Life and Work, that committee in the Assembly having little to do and its work being duplicated by the work of the Special Committce on Christian Life and Work.

## Standing Committee on Judicial Business

The Standing Committee on Judicial Business, through its (hairman, Rev. S. T. Wilson, D.D., presented a report, which was adopted, as follows:

The Committee on Judicial Business of the General Assembly of 1922, hereby certifies that it has duly examined all the papers, documents and records filed with it by the Stated Clerk of the Assembly in the following cases:

1. Appeal and Complaint of the New Castle Presbytery vs. the Synod of Baltimore;
2. Appeal of J. Edie Stewart from the action of the Synod of Colorado:
3. Appeal of the First Italian Church of Detroit from the action of the Presbytery of Detroit;

And finds that all steps have been taken which are required by the laws of the Church, in order properly to present to the Permanent Judicial Commission the questions arising therein, and herewith transmits to said Gencral Assembly all such papers, documents, and records, with the recommendation that they be transmitted to the Permanent Judicial Commission.

## Presbyterian Historical Society

The work of the Presbyterian Historical Society was presented by Elder John C. McKinney of the Presbytery of Philadelphia North, a member of its Executive Council, in the absence of the Secretary of the Society, Rev. Joseph Turner.

## New Era Movement

The Special Committee on the New Era Movement, through its Vice-Chairman, Mr. George Nicholson, presented its report and pending the adoption of the resolutions, the Assembly was addressed by Rev. William Hiram Foulkes, D.D., General Secretary of the New Era Movement. The report and its recommendations were adopted by the Assembly, the resolutions being as follows:

1. That the General Assembly reaffirm the endorsement of the principles and policies of the New Era Movement given by the four preceding General Assemblies and that it approve the policies of the General Assembly's Committee as set forth in its report and that it authorize the Gencral Assembly's Committee and its Boards and Agencies to coöperate in carrying out the proposed policies and programs, during the ensuing year.
2. That the five year goals set by the General Assembly of 1919 be reaffirmed and that the General Assembly of 1922 call upon the churches to realize to the largest possible extent a full year's share of the five year goals as outlined in the report of the Committee.
3. That the General Assembly's Committee on the New Era Movement be instructed to plan to continue its work without interruption for the period authorized by the General Assembly of 1919.
4. That the Budget System as presented by the Committee in the body of the Committee's report, be approved by the General Assembly and that all the Boards and Agencies and the various judicatories of the General Assembly, synods, presbyteries and congregations be urged to join in carrying out the activities of the Budget System thus presented.
5. That while standing as hitherto for all the broad implications of stewardship as proclaimed by our Lord,
including industry and justice in acquiring, discrimination in spending, foresight and thrift in saving, as well as liberality and self-denial in giving, the obligation to set apart first of all a definite proportion of income for the service of God, be made specific and emphatic with the view to bringing the entire membership of our Church, at an early day, to the practice of proportionate giving.

That the months of October and November be allotted as stewardship period in the calendar schedule of the Church, with thoroughgoing instruction in the principles and practices of stewardship in all church departments followed by enrollment in the Fellowship of Stewardship on or before December 3.

That all the General Assembly Boards and Agencies be authorized to put their combined force behind the stewardship program and that pastors and sessions be urged to give diligent attention throughout the entire year to the education of their members in the principles of stewardship and to their enlistment in its practice as proportionate givers, special stress being laid upon the education of the youth of the church in the ideals of Christian stewardship, alike of life and possessions.
6. That the General Assembly approve the continued issuance of the suggestive Schedule of Activities as an inspiring, coördinated program for the entire Presbyterian Church and that it call upon pastors and sessions, so far as they are able, to make use of the Schedule of activities by adapting it to the necessities of their congregations.
7. That the General Assembly record its hearty approval of the coöperation evidenced among the Boards and Agencies throughout the work of the entire year, and especially urges the chairmen of presbyterial standing committees and all field representatives of the Boards, Agencies and other causes working within the bounds of the presbytery, to meet at least annually in conference (preferably in connection with the regular meeting of presbytery) to consider the spiritual, educational and financial objectives approved by General Assembly and sent to the churches, with a view to laying before presbytery forits approval, definite presbyterial goals and carefully planned coördination of programs and forces for achieving these goals.
8. That the General Assembly approve the ideals and methods of the Every Member Canvass as the Scriptural and most successful form for securing the finaneial support of the Church and its enterprises and that it urge upon all churches the adoption of the Every Member Canvass, together with the employment of the Permanent Every Member Group Organization as an indispensable aid to the efficient carrying on of the work of the entire Church.
9. That the General Assembly express its appreciation 10 the retiring Moderator for his invaluable services in connection with the extensive itincrary in behalf of the work of the Boards and Agencies undertaken at the request of the New Era Committee.
10. That the maximum budget of expenditure of the General Assembly's Committee on the New Era Movement for the year, June 1, 1922, to May 31, 1923, be the same as last year, viz., $\$ 322,592$. This sum to include all of the coöperative expenditures which the General Assembly has laid or may lay, during the present session, upon the New Era Committee or the Boards and Agencies, including the conduct of the Presbyterian Magazine.
11. That the General Assembly's Boards and Agencies and the Self-Supporting Synods be authorized to finance the Movement on the foregoing basis, advancing funds as needed, in accordance with the ratio of the budget 1922-233, final adjustment to be made at the end of the year, upon the basis of receipts from living givers, during the year.

## Every Member Plan Committee

The Report of the Every Member Plan Committee was presented by Mr. David McConaughy, who addressed the Assembly in behalf of the work of the Committee, the report and recommendations being approved, as follows:

The Committee for the Every Member Plan submits its Eleventh Annual Report.

Two decades have elapsed since the first steps were taken to inaugurate what is now commonly known as the Every Member Plan. Avoluntary committee of laymen, co-operating with the Board of Foreign Missions, then entered upon a Forward Movement the main object of which was to put the Mission of the Church as well as its maintenance upon a more stable and adequate financial basis. The emphasis, which at first was laid more especially upon Foreign Missions, was later extended to cover also the Home side of the common task and, finally, came to include every aspect of the Church's life and work. This marked an advanced stage of a movement which really began in 1717 , when the "Fund for Pious Purposes" was set up, and the first general collection for Presbyterian Benevolences was taken, amounting that year to $£ 80-12-7$, or about $\$ 400$ all told. It is a far cry from that "day of small things" to the $\$ 14,500,000$ budget for 1922-23.

But the principles of the Every Member Plan remain the same as when proclaimed to the infant Christian Church of the first century, namely:
(1) That "everyone" is responsible for giving to support the Church.
(2) That giving is to be done as an act of worship to Cod every Lord's Day.
(3) That provision for giving is to be made by setting apart a definite proportion out of the first fruits of everything one receives, "as God has prospered him."

Unfortunately dependable data is not available to show just how far our Church has attained toward realizing the e ideals of the Every Member Plan. But the vast advance made in recent years affords good ground for the hope that the attainment of the goal is possible at no far distant day.

Special attention has been given to developing the Annual Social Visitation, revising the printed matter for this purpose.

In order to fully realize the possibilities of the Every Member Plan, it is essential that the Group Organization be perfected in the churches generally, with a view to enlisting every member in the entire program.

The Every Member Plan Committee, having transferred the services of its representatives to the New Era Committee for promoting the Stewardship and Every Member Canvass features of its work, still retains its responsibility for: (1) arranging for the Unified Exhibit of the General Assembly's Boards and Agencies; (2) the Pre-Assembly Conferences; (3) the Official Conference of the Boards and Agencies with the Executive Commission of the General Assembly, and (4) the management of the Hubbard Press.

The Exhibit is this year given a special character, by reason of its connection with the plan of Presbyterian Exposition, installed in Des Moines, Iowa, at the time of the meeting of the General Assembly. By the introduction of animation and pageantry, fresh interest is given to the varied activities carried on by the Boards.

The multiplication of Conferences held by the Boards and Agencies on the eve of the General Assembly would involve much crossing of lines, were there not a clearing house such as this Committee affords. As at present arranged, the Evangelistic Committee has right of way from Tuesday afternoon until Wednesday at noon; all other Boards and Agencies meet simultaneously Wednesday afternoon until 4 ; from that hour and through the evening (of Wednesday) the New Era Movement Conference claims the combined attention of all, a lantern presentation of the entire work of the Church and a pageant occupying the evening session which is open to the public.

The eager interest of the late William H. Hubbard, D.D., in developing the spirit of Benevolence in the Presbyterian

Church could have no fitter memorial than the contimed service rendered by the Press at Auburn, New York. During the past year, despite industrial depression, the Press has reduced its prices for offering envelopes.

Carriel, D.D., The report and its recommendations were adopted, and are as follows:

1. That the Assembly rejoices in the awakened interest and active participation of men in the work of their churches, and in the rapidly enlarging field of usefulness of its Committee on Men's Work.
2. That the Assembly, though grateful for the increase in the Contributions from the churches, reminds Sessions that the present budget is very inadequate for present needs, and urges a more ample support, while it approves the Committeres Policy of limiting expenditures to receipts.
3. That the Assembly commends the work done relative to Ex-Service Men and enlisted men in the Army Camps, and advises the extension of this work as rapidly as possible.
4. That the Assembly urges the extension of educational work among men through the use of literature of the Boards, courses of study in Stewardship, and through Men's Work Institutes and Conferences and other available methods, and that the churches through the officers of their Men's organizations maintain correspondence with the Assembly's Committee availing themselves of the help it offers and providing it with informatiom relative to the progress of their work.
5. That the Assembly calls the particular attention of Sossions and officers of men's organizations to the urgent need for making annual reports on their Men's Work.
6. That the Assembly recommends that wherever possib!e the Men's organizations of a Presbytery or city be federated for the extension of Presbyterian work, and that our men's organizations federate with men's organizations of other churches and civic organizations for community betterment.
7. That the Assembly strongly recommends that in every church at the beginning of each year a carefully constructed program of activities for that year be submitted to the men for their consideration and adoption according to the suggestions: contained in the splendid new "Nanual on Men's Work"; and further, that the Assembly calls upon all Presbyterian men to bring to their churches the abilities, business methods, and consecration which are so remarkably effective in other institutions.
8. That the Assembly approves and adopts the "Manual on Men's Work" recently prepared by the Assembly's Committee on Men's Work.
9. That the following members of the Assembly's Permanent Committee on Men's Work of the Class of 1922 be reelected to the class of 1925 .

## Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance

The Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance, through its Vice-Chairman, Rev. Walter L. Whallon, D.D., presented its report, and pending the adoption of the recommendations of the Committee, the Assembly was addressed by the Rev. Harry L. Bowlby, D.D., General Secretary of the Committee. The resolutions were adopted by the Assembly, and are as follows:

1. That the General Assembly earnestly reiterates its request of pastors and official boards of our churches to place on the church calendar and bulletin board frequently during the year scriptural texts and items bearing on the Sabbath and its problems, that pastors preach on the subject at least at one Sunday morning and evening service and that organizations of the Churches, Sunday Schools, Young People's Societies, Men's and Women's Clubs and Classes and Missionary societies, give a place to this vital subject on their regular, and conference and convention programs.
2. That as the question of Sabbath Observance is so vital to the life and activities of the home, and organized Sabbath descreation has become so serious a menace to the Lord's Day, the Church and many of our Christian institutions this Committee again makes its appeal for increased moral support and more liberal financial aid.
3. That this Assembly instruct the Stated Clerk to provide a column for the Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance in the statistical report of the church in the Minutes of the General Assembly and that this action become effective for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1922.
4. That the General Assembly recommends that the Sabbath Observance Committees of the Presbyteries and

Synods coöperate with the Permanent Committee, as many are now doing, with the Lord's Day Alliance of the United States, its auxiliary and affiliated societies, and similar societies where they exist; and that similar committees be organized in Presbyteries and Synods where they do not now exist.
5. That the General Assembly again commends the Committee for its hearty and effective coöperation with the Lord's Day Alliance of the United States and its affiliated societies, warmly commends them for the excellent results that have been obtained and the increasing success which is attending their efforts in the prosecution not only of educational programs but also on their progressive work on constructive plans for the defence and preservation of the American Sunday and a progressive and persistent attack upon the organized forces which are seeking to destroy the sanctity of the Lord's Day and to repeal the state Sunday Laws.
6. That we again heartily commend the movement for the early enactment of a Sunday Rest Law for the District of Columbia, where Washington, our National Capitol, is located, urge our people and all true Americans to aid in pressing to early enactment into law the Sunday Rest Bill; and we assure our Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance, the Lord's Day Alliance of the United States and the Pastor's Federation of Washington of every possible support toward the accomplishment of this desired end; and that we ask our churches to take suitable action respecting the Sunday Rest Bill as information reaches them through our accredited agencies.
7. That the Assembly heartily endorses the plan of the Saturday half holiday, commends all employers who grant it to employees and recognizes it as tending to a more proper observance of the Christian Sabbath; and that it earnestly requests all public officials to exercise great care and determined action for the defence of the law protecting Sunday from rapacious commercialism to secure their enforcement and to help to strengthen these laws where they are weak.
8. That in view of the circumstances which prevent the Chairman of the Committee, Rev. H. H. McQuilkin, D.D., from being with us at this Assembly, we assure him and his family of our thought and prayers, and express the earnest hope that Mrs. McQuilkin will be speedily restored to health; and that we assure Mr. James Yereance, Chairman-emeritus, of the Assembly's remembrance and continued appreciation of the long years of faithful service rendered to the Church as a member and Chairman of the Assembly's Committce on Sabbath Observance, and that his presence at this Assembly is greatly missed.
9. That we recommend the election of those members of the Committee comprising the class of 1922 to constitute the class of 1925, as follows:

## The Assembly Digest

The Special Committee on the Assembly Digest presented its report through the Rev. Harold MeA. Robinson, D.D., General Secretary of the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, and a member of the Committee. The report and its recommendation were adopted as follows:

The Special Committee on the Assembly Digest takes pleasure in presenting a report to the One Hundred and Thirty-Fourth General Assembly, which is as follows:

According to the action of the One Hundred and ThirtyThird General Assembly, in session at Winona Lake, Indiana, the Special Committee on Digest consists of the Rev. John V. Stephens, D.D., Chairman, the Rev. Edward L. Warren, D.D., the Rev. Harold McA. Robinson, D.D., Secretary of the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, and the Rev. Lewis S. Mudge, D.D., the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, ex-officio. (Minutes, 1921, page 145.)

The Rev. Lewis S. Mudge, D.D., the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, did not take up his official duties until last October. Naturally, for some time he was pressed by various duties from different directions. This delayed a meeting of the Committee; but at the earliest date possible the Committee convened, every member being present, in the Office of the General Assembly, Room 514, Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, on December 20, 1921.

Following the directions of the General Assembly, which provided "that the selection of an editor for the Digest be left to the Committee, in conference with the Editorial Committee of the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, with power," the Rev. Lewis S. Mudge, D.D., the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, with the consent and approval of the Editorial Committee of the Board of Publication and Sablath school Work, was unanimously elected editor of the New Digest, and the Rev. William P. Finney, D.D., was unaminously elected associate-cditor. The Committee believes that the election of these brethren to the positions
indicated will meet with the hearty approval of the (iencral Assembly, and that their clection to these positions is a guarantee that the New Digest will measure up to the expectation of the Church.

In presenting its report to the One Hundred and 'ThirtyThird General Assembly (Minutes, 1921, pages 51-53) the Committee was under the impression that the materials for the New Digest were practically in hand; but a careful examination, made later, showed that this impression was not well founded. On the other hand the editors have found it necessary to take up the whole work de novo.

But notwithstanding this disappointment, the Committee is glad to be able to report that satisfactory progress has been made. The whole body of material has been assembled, and the classification begun. But the fact should not be overlooked that the classification of such a large amount of material is a very slow and tedious process.

The Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work is giving and will continue to give every assistance possible in hastening the publication of the work. The Board will expedite the publication of the copy as soon as the editors can prepare the same for the printers.

Following the actions of the General Assembly, taken in 1898 (Minutes, page 22) and 1908 (Minutes, page 229) it is the plan of the Committee to issue the New Digest in two volumes. The General Assembly expressed the opinion that one volume should contain "only matters which have direct relation to the interpretation of the Constitution of the Church and the current work of its Agencies." This volume will be pressed to completion as speedily as possible, consistent with thoroughly reliable work, but owing to the great amount of work yet to be done no date can be named for its publication.

In view of the fact that the Rev. William P. Finney, D.D., has been elected associate-editor, the Committee is of the opinion that he should be added to the Committee, and so recommends.

## Special Committee on Chaplains

The Report of the Special Committee on Chaplains in the United States Army and Navy was presented by its Chairman, Rev. Wallace Radcliffe, D.D., and pending the adoption of the report, the Assembly was addressed by Chaplains Captain James M. Webb, Fort M'Lowell, Cal., and First Lieutenant William B. Bradley, Camp Knox, Ky. Resolution 3 was referred to the Executive Commission for consideration and report back to this Assembly The report and other recommendations were adopted, as follows:

The General Assembly's Committee upon U. S. Army and Navy (haplains reports:

The present number of chaplains in the Army as of date Narch, 1922 is 179, of which number 38 are Roman Catholics and 141 Protestants. Of the Protestant contingents, 16 are Presbyterians, that is, 13 Presbyterian U.S. A.,2 Presbyterian U. S. and 1 Cumberland Presbyterian. In the Navy are 86 chaplains, of whom 19 are Roman Catholics and 67 Protestants of which latter number 14 are Presbyterian U.S. A.

Because of recent and imminent reductions in both branches of the service no additional appointments have been made during the year and it is amounced that until the surplus- 36 in all-is absorbed no new appointments will be made. As a matter of fact with their scattering into smaller units, the number in commission is not large enough for efficient service.

In the Chaplain Reserve Corps, 608 who have been honorably discharged received commissions, of these 165 are Roman Catholics and 443 are Protestants. Of the latter number 70 are Presbyterian, and two additional applications have been approved and are pending.

The supplemental equipment fund of $\$ 25.00$ per month to each acting chaplain was approved by the last Assembly. For this fund we received by direction of that Assembly, $\$ 2,800.00$ from the Soldiers and Sailors Fund under control of the Board of Education. The National Service Commission also generously appropriated to us the balance remaining in its treasury-the sum of $\$ 2,174.41$. The total $\$ 4,974.41$ did not permit us to obey the instructions of the Assembly. By a few changes in the chaplaincies we were released from some obligations. We appealed to some churches and individuals and through their generosity were enabled to supply our chaplains with the monthly allowance from April 1, 1921 to January 31, 1922. For the remaining two months of our church year, we could do nothing. The following is the financial statement.

If this work is earnestly appreciated by the Church she should not impose upon this committee the necessity for special solicitations but appropriate to it from the Budget funds at least eight thousand dollars annually. We have received urgent inquiries concerning the possibility of hymn book supplies from our Board of Publication. It appears that in most instances our chaplains are compelled to use either the very churchly book of one denomination very generally and freely supplied or one of the many recognized flimsy and superficial compositions. They state that our own book whenever it has been obtained, has become immediately popular and helpful. It would be a fine piece of home mission work if in some way the Board of Publication could be enabled to make such grants under proper conditions.

We recommend the following:

1. That the Church renews its recognition of the Christian consecration and loyal devotion of our brethren in the chaplaincies of the U. S. Army and Navy and assure them of our continued prayer and sympathetic co-operation.
2. The presbyteries are urged to keep in vital touch with their members in the chaplaincy not only by the required annual correspondence but by special meetings and public appointments for visiting chaplains and by the adoption by individual churches in the same personal relation as is familiar in our home and foreign mission work.
3. The Assembly heartily endorses the present Supplemental Equipment Fund and recommends an appropriation to this Fund from the Budget of 1922, the sum of at least $\$ 8,000.00$.
4. The Assembly sympathizes with the petition of the chaplains for grants of our hymn books in camp and on shipboard and instructs the Executive Commission by Conference with this committee and the Board of Publication to seek to devise some way by which these grants may be made.
5. That this Committee be continued.

## American Bible Society

The work of the American Bible Society was presented by Elder Frank H. Mann, who addressed the Assembly in its behalf, and the following resolutions submitted by Rev. Daniel Russell, D.D., were adopted:

1. That the General Assembly congratulates the American Bible Society upon the accomplishments of the year in the translation, publication and distribution of the Holy scriptures; that it rejoices in the substantial increase in the number of volumes circulated throughout the world, particularly in China; and that it expresses its profound gratitude to

Almighty Cod for the remarkable desire shown hy the peopll of non-Christian lands.in the Christian seriptures.
2. That the Cencral Assembly expressen its appreciation of the action of the American Bible Society in adopting a by-law creating an advisory council composed of official representatives of all coöperating denominations; that the privilege thus extended be accepted and that the Moderator each year be authorized to represent the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A. with power to appoint a substitute if he camost attend; and that the Assembly express its belief that this action of the American Bible Society reciprocates to our mutual advantage the policy of the Presbyterian Church in accepting the American Bible Society as its official agency for Bible work with a place in the budget.
3. That the General Assembly record its gratification of the marked increase in the gifts of our churches to the American Bible Society since the Assembly in 1920 placed the Society in the budget; and that reaffirming the policy adopted at that time, this Assembly commends the American Bible Society and its fundamental cause to the most generous consideration of the budget-making body of the Church.

The following resolution, submitted by Elder H. P. Faris, of the Presbytery of Sedalia, was adopted by the Assembly:

That we recommend to all our churches, that every effort be put forth to place the Bible in all our educational institutions, especially in all our public schools, from the lowest to the highest grades, including the high schools.

## American Tract Society

The work of the American Tract Society was presented by the Rev. Edwin Noah Hardy, Ph.D., who addressed the Assembly in its behalf, and the following resolutions were adopted by the Assembly:

1. That the Assembly reaffirms its former deliverances and commendations of the unique, indispensable and world wide service of the American Tract Society, and earnestly commends it as worthy of generous support, and urges every Session of our Church to include the Society in its annual financial budget.
2. That the Assembly, in recognition of the value of Christian Literature and the wisdom of greatly increasing its circulation, approves and commends the observance of the last Sunday in January of each year as Christian Literature Sunday.

## World Alliance for International Friendship

The Report of the Presbyterian Commission in coöperation with the World Alliance for International Friendship through the Churches was presented by it, Chairman, Rev. Arthur J. Brown, D.D., who addressed the Assembly. The report and its recommendations were adopted as follows:

The year has been the most significant in the history of the World Alliance. There is a growing recognition of the fact that this organization has a unique place of importance and an opportunity for large service. The Alliance now has Councils in twenty-five different nations as follows:-United States, France, Holland, Italy, Sweden, Belgium, Esthonia, Lettland, Austria, Roumania, Bulgaria, Portugal, Great Britain, Germany, Hungary, Norway, Switzerland, Denmark, Finland, Greece, Czecho-Slovakia, Serb-Croat-Slovene State, Spain, Japan and China.

As in former years, the work has been done in the central office of the American Council of the Alliance at 70 Fifth Avenue, New York, without expense to the General Assembly. The Chairman of the Assembly's Commission is a member of the Executive Committee of the Alliance, and the President and Treasurer are both Presbyterians. The work of the Alliance for the year may be outlined as follows:

During the year two conferences were held in Europe-both at Geneva, Switzerland, one in April and the other in September. The second of these conferences met September 13th and remained in session until the 16th. The meeting was by far the best that has been held by this organization. The Councils of twenty-three nations were represented by thirty-eight official delegates. Plans for the future were discussed and important measures decided. Perhaps the greatest achievement was the formulation of a basis of agreement between the French and German Christians, which has materially helped in creating the right psychological attitude between the French and German groups, and without this there could be no real coöperation. At this meeting arrangements were made for the holding of the Annual World Conference at Copenhagen, Denmark, August 6 to 13, 1922.

A large part of the work of the American Council during the year has been done in connection with the crusade for the limitation of armaments. In conjunction with the annual meeting of the World Alliance, May 17-19, a Congress on Reduction of Armaments was held in Chicago. Over four hundred official delegates were present, coming from twenty states and as many denominations.

During May, formal statements were issued in coöperation with the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America,

The National Catholic Welfare C'ouncil, the ('entral ('onference of American Rabbis and The United Synagogue of America. Each statement urged the calling of a Conference of the leading nations on Reduction of Armaments. These actions of the great religious bodies were conveyed by The World Alliance, in coöperation with The Church Peace Union, to 120,000 ministers, asking them to present the question on Sunday, June 5th, to their congregations. 'Thousands of sermons were preached on that day and resolutions passed by congregations went in large numbers to Washington as well as myriads of personal letters. In the same envelope with the letters to the clergymen the following petition was enclosed:
"We, the undersigned clergymen, urge the President and the Congress of the United States to call a Conference of the leading nations on Reduction of Armaments at the earliest possible date."
Only two hundred and eight clergymen refused to affix their signatures. Twenty thousand, five hundred and three signed the petition. The long list of signatures was exceedingly impressive. The names when bound made a volume of four hundred and ten pages. A paragraph from the covering letter to the President read: "This petition is submitted as an expression of an overwhelming sentiment among the leaders of all forms of religious organizations concerning the importance of some positive step being taken which will relieve the whole world from the intolerable burden of taxation for military purposes and give enlarged assurance of permanent peace."

The delegation to Washington was made up of representatives from The World Alliance; The Church Peace Union; The Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America; the National Catholic Welfare Council; The Central Conference of American Rabbis and The United Hebrew Synagogue. The President received the delegation with courtesy and sympathy and he appeared to be deeply impressed with the representative value of the petition and the underlying conviction which it registered. July 10, eighteen days after the President received this petition, he issued his epoch-making invitation to Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan. We do not venture to assume that the petition was the decisive factor in the calling of the Conference but it certainly strengthened the President's conviction that he was acting in accordance with the best Christian sentiment of the country.

After the Conference was called, The World Alliance made active efforts to consolidate public opinion with a view to bringing it to bear upon the American delegates and calling
for concrete results from the Conference. Almost every day calls came in for speakers for mass mectings and in nearly every case The Alliance was able to send a capable speaker. Theofficers prepared programs, served on National Committees dcaling with the problem, and devoted two issues of the periodical, "World Friendship," to matters relating to the Limitation of Armaments.

It may of interest to refer to some allied forms of work which, while not under the immediate supervision of the Committee, are related to its activities and largely participated in by its officers and members.

The Alliance has worked in close coöperation with the Committee on Interchange of Speakers and Preachers between Great Britain, France and America. Early in the year it became known that a large delegation of eminent Presbytcrians were to attend the meeting of the Pan-Presbyterian Alliance in Pittsburgh, September 16-25. The Commission immediately put its good offices at the disposal of any of the delegates who proposed being in America throughout June, July, August and September, and made arrangements for thirteen of them to speak in leading churches, colleges, and universities in various parts of the country. All bore testimony to the fact that steadfast coöperation of the English speaking peoples is absolutely necessary for the cause of world peace and were unanimous in their opinion that the work of The Interchange Commission is an important factor in cementing the ties of international goodwill.

Another important piece of work has been done in connection with The American Committee on the Rights of Religious Minorities. On this committee there are eight members of the Executive Committee of the World Alliance. Dr. Arthur J. Brown is Chairman. Through the Peace Treaty, Transylvania and other parts of the old Hungarian Kingdom were ceded to Roumania. This Treaty was ratified by Hungary, November 15, 1920. Before and after its ratification, it was reported to the Committee that Roumania was persecuting the religious minorities in Transylvania, the largest body being the Presbyterian. The free exercise of religion was hindered by military authorities. Services were broke up, public collections prohibited for charity work; ministers, teachers, professors and elders ill-treated, and church schools were hindered from carrying on their work. The Committee made a careful survey of the situation and February 23rd, addressed a strong appeal to the Roumanian Government. After naming the sorces of information at hand and tracing the grievances of the churches in Transylvania, the appeal urged that the following specific steps be taken by the Roumanian Government:

1. A strict fulfilment of all the clanses in the Treaties relating to the Rights of Religious Minorities.
2. Relief from oppression caused by the quartering of Ronmanian families and officials in the homes of the Hungarithis without their consent and to their serious disadvantage.
3. The restoration of church property confiscated by the State, and compensation for ecclesiastical property of all kinds. used by the State.
4. The privilege of the churches to maintain their own schools, universities and colleges for the training of their teachers, their clergy and their missionaries, of course it being understood that such schools shall be subject to the requirements of the Roumanian Government and open for inspection and supervision by such properly accredited authorities as the Government may require and appoint.
5. Liberty of communication by post, telegraph and telephone, and personal intercourse on the part of ministers and authorities of the Transylvania churches with churches, schools and universities in other lands, subject only to such requirements and restrictions as apply to other Roumanian citizens in whatever part of the Kingdom they may live.
6. Removal of all discriminatory restrictions upon the freedom of the churches to maintain their work and religious agencies and to transact their business on the same basis as that of the other churches of the Kingdom.
7. The free use by these churches of their own language in public worship.
8. Complete amnesty for all ministers, church officials and members of the churches who have been arrested because of their unwillingness to accept Roumanian citizenship, but who are now willing to pledge their loyalty.
9. A proper representation, in the government at Bucharest, of such officials of the Hungarian churches as may be elected, and which will place these churches on an equality with the other churches and religious agencies of the Roumanian Kingdom.

For some months the Committee has been receiving appeals, documents and personal letters alleging serious denial of religious liberty in Poland. Some of these communications came from Sweden, Switzerland and Germany. The Committee has given large attention to this matter, has collected a large amount of information and interviewed various representative men and returning travelers, including former Premier Ignace Paderewski who was in this country. A visit was also made to the Polish Ambassador in Washington and the case carefully laid before him.

When information arrived that a new Polish Constitution was adopted March 17, 1921, the Committee addressed a letter to Prince Cosimir Lubomerski, Polish Ambassador to the United States, expressing deep interest in Religious Minorities and appreciation of the position taken by the Republic of Poland in fixing the principles of religious liberty in its constitutional law, and assuring him that the American Committee would watch with sympathetic interest the application of these principles to the Religious Minorities in Poland. A letter from Dr. Dibelius of Berlin, dated August 18, expressed the opinion that the representations made by Americans, Swedes and other friends have had considerable influence on the Polish authorities in their treatment of their newly acquired Protestant fellow-citizens and that the Polish authorities evidently are making efforts to treat Evangelical congregations and pastors better than heretofore.

September 28, in the apartment of the Chairman, the Committee met in conference with Lord Bryce, and had the benefit of his wide knowledge of European conditions and his sympathy for all oppressed peoples. Lord Bryce expressed the opinion that the continuation of the work of the American Committee was of large importance to the religious minorities in Europe.

The Committee plans in the near future to submit a draft to the President and Secretary of State expressing the hope that such action may be taken as shall lead to the confirmation by the American Government of the several treaties for protection of religious minorities. A European Committee on Religious Minorities is now in process of formation to work in close touch with the American Committee.

The world now offers a great field for just the kind of service that the Alliance and its coöperating committees are able to render. The conditions throughout Europe have been bad, but improvement is now beginning to be noticed. There are still disappointment, perplexity and suspicion on every hand, but we can go forward conscious that we have a program that has been tested and encouraged by the fact that something is being accomplished, that by patience and perseverance in applying the principle of the Prince of Peace to the solution of problems, we can make a greater contribution towarda settled and peaceful world than ever before.
The adopted resolutions are as follows:

1. That the General Assembly continue its Commission in coöperation with the Alliance without expense to the Assembly.
2. That the Rev. Alfred H. Barr, D.D., of the Presbytery of Baltimore, be appointed a member of the Commission to
fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Rev. John H. Boyd, D.D.
3. That the Assembly record its hearty recognition of the wise and Christian act of President Harding in calling the Conference on Limitation of Armaments at Washington, November 11, 1921, and of the able and statesmanlike way in which the Honorable Charles E. Hughes, Secretary of State, and his associates represented the best Christian opinion of the American churches and people in the notable proposals which they made. The Assembly believes that great as were the specific results of the Conference in the treaties that were agreed upon, and that have since been ratified by the Senate of the United States, the psychological effect upon the world's thought has been ever greater. Humanity, still worn, distracted and suffering by the Great War, now faces the future with new hope. The Assembly makes record not only of its grateful recognition of the leadership of the President and Secretary of State but of its gratitude to Almighty God for the effort to give practical application in international affairs to the teachings of the Prince of Peace: and the Assembly exhorts all its ministers and churches to do everything in their power to aid in strengthening a Christian public sentiment which shall support our Government in taking those further steps which are necessary to the development of Christian international relations to the end that nations as well as individuals shall recognize their obligation to observe the law of God and that our beloved country may speedily associate itself with other countries in the more effective promotion of international justice and goodwill.
4. That the Assembly record its gratification at the establishment at The Hague of the long desired Permanent Court of International Justice, so long advocated by the American people and other friends of the effort to settle international disputes by peaceful methods; that among the members of the International Committee which framed the plan was an eminent American citizen, the Hon. Elihu Root, and that among the eleven judges chosen to constitute the Court is another eminent American citizen, the Hon. John Bassett Moore; that already 45 nations have become members and supporters of the Court, eighteen of them having declared their acceptance of the jurisdiction of the Court as "Obligatory' in any or all of the four legal categories enumerated"; that the Assembly express the earnest hope that the American nation, whose citizens have been so prominent and influential in securing the creation of the Court, may speedily become a member of it; and that the Moderator and Stated Clerk be hereby authorized and instructed to express this hope to the President and Secretary of State.

## Per Diem Allowance

The Standing Committee on Finance presented a report, which was adopted, as follows:

The Standing Committec on Finance respectfully recommond that the rate for entertaimment be fixed at $\$ 3.00$ per diem for this Assembly.

At the request of the Stated Clerk, Elder Harvey R. Schmoyer, of the Presbytery of Seattle, having presented his credentials, was duly curolled as a Commissioner to this Assembly.

The Moderator appointed a Committee on Resolutions of Thanks as follows: Rev. Samuel Callen, D.D., Chairman; Rev. R. Ames Montgomery, D.D.; and Rev. W. W. Phraner.

The work of the Presbyterian Hospital of Denver was presented by the Rev. Leon C. Hills, D.D., of the Presbytery of Denver.

At the request of Rev. Stuart N. Hutchison, D.D., of the Presbytery of Pittsburgh, the following resolution was adopted:

That the love and sympathy of the Assembly be conveyed by the Moderator to the Robert Christie, D.D., professor emeritus of the Western Theological Seminary, Pittsburgh, in his severe illness.

A response full of gratitude was received in due time from Dr. Christie and reported to the Assembly.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. Reuben A. Torrey, D.D., of the Presbytery of Los Angeles, to conduct the devotional service at noon on Monday.

The devotional service was conducted by the Rev. William H. Black, D.D., of the Presbytery of Kansas City, and the Assembly was favored with two selections by the glee club of Park College, Missouri.

The Assembly adjourned until 9.00 A.M. Monday, and was closed with prayer.

At 6.30 P.M. the Men's Fellowship Dinner took place under the direction of the Permanent Committee on Men's Work.

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No official meetings of the Assembly were held on sumday, but in addition to the regular church services at which sermons were preached by the Moderator and other Commissioncrs in various churches as arranged by the local Committee, other meetings were held among which was a Commissioners' Bible Class.

Popular meetings were held at 2.30 P.M. under the direction of the Board of Home Missions; at 4.00 P.M. under the direction of the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare, and at 7.45 P.M. under the clirection of the General Board of Education.

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\text { MONDAY, May 22, 1922, } 9.00 \text { A.M. }
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The Assembly met and was opened with prayer by the Rev. Frank W. Hill, of the Presbytery of Rochester.

The minutes of Saturday's sessions were read and approved.

At the request of the Stated Clerk, the Rev. H. T. Bay, of the Presbytery of Zanesville, having presented his credentials in proper form, was duly enrolled as a commissioner to this Assembly.

## Bills and Overtures

The Committee on Bills and Overtures, through its Chairman, Rev. Cleland B. McAfee, D.D., presented a further report, which was adopted as follows:

Overture No. 67, that no action be taken.
Overture No. 72, that no action be taken.
Overture No. 73, that no action be taken.
Overture No. 74, that no action be taken.
Overture No. 75. that no action be taken.
Paper No.214, to be referred to the Standing Committee on Education.

Paper No. 215, to be referred to the Standing Committee on Temperance and Moral Welfare.

Paper No. 216, that the statistical report of the churches shall include only those members received by the session between April 1st of one year and March 31st of the next year.

Overtures Nos. 82 to 84, 113, and Paper 217, that the Assembly make the following declarations:

In response to several overtures and papers regarding "The Shorter Bible" The General Assembly made the following declaration.

The Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. welcomes every sincere effort to bring the Word of God to the minds and hearts of men, and it gladly recognizes that many such efforts are now being made. In view of several movements to this end, however, it bears earnest testimony to the necessity of the Word of God as an entirety, believing that its parts are best understood only in their relation to the whole, and that nothing is The Bible, nor is wisely or properly called by that name, except the whole Bible. Pastors and teachers are urged to make it plain that excerpts from the Bible, while legitimate and often desirable, are merely parts of one revelation, needing all the other parts for their full meaning. This Church maintains no Index of forbidden books, but wishes its people to have free access to all knowledge of and about the Bible. Its concern is solely to maintain the full knowledge of the whole Word of God.

Overtures Nos. 59 to 61 and 108, that no action be taken.

## Church Co-operation and Union

The Special Committee on Church Coöperation and Union, through its Chairman, Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D., LL.D., presented its report.
I. Membership of the Committee.- Since the last Assembly the Hon. J. A. Mcllvaine of Washington, Pa., has resigned from the Committee because of inability to attend its meetings. Concerning another member of the Committee who died last December, we ask your approval of the following Minute:

Your Committee has lost from its membership by death the Rev. Charles Little, D.D., LL.D., who was summoned to his heavenly home on December 28, 1921. For almost half a century he was pastor of one church, the church at Wabash, Ind., where in labors most abundant he exerted a strong and pervasive influence which established him as a prophet beloved in the town and the whole State. He was Stated Clerk of his Presbytery for thirty-five years. In 1910 he was clevated to the Moderatorship of the Assembly and during his term of office, and membership in the Executive Commission, he won a large place in the esteem and confidence of the whole Church as a wise, gracious and forward-looking leader of the sacramental hosts. He was appointed a member of this Committee in 1911, and taking a deep interest in all its problems and service, he faithfully and effectively discharged the full measure of his obligations, as he endeavored to promote the closer co-operation of the churches and bring about the unity for which our Redeemer
prayed. Pursuant to the action of the last Assombly, that one member from the southwest be added to the committee, the Moderator appointed Eder II. C. (ilem of 'Temple, Tex as an additional member of the committee.
II. Meetings of tha Commither.-A harge part of the Committee's work hats been carried on by an Executive Committee of five members and by the sub-committee on negotiations with Reformed Churches and by representatives of the Committee on the Ad Interim Committee of the Council on Organic Union of Evangelical Churches. Consequently only one meeting of the whole Committee has been held and this was at Atlantic City, N. J., March 15-16, 1922, following the Biemnial Meeting of the Council of Reformed Churches.
III. The Presbyterian Church and the Churches of the Reformed Family.-Following the instructions given of the Assembly to enter into correspondence with any Churches of the Reformed Family with a view to closer coöperation, confederation and consolidation, your Committee has continued negotiations with Committees representing the Presbyterian Church in the U. S., the United Presbyterian Church, the Reformed Church in America and the Reformed Church in the U. S. At the last Assembly there was presented a proposed Constitution for a United Assembly of Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, concerning which the following action was taken:
"1. That the Assembly refer back to its Committee on Church Co-operation and Union the proposed constitution for a united Assembly of Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, with instructions to the effect that while willing to approve any measures which will promote closer relation with Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, it is united and earnest in the desire for an actual union of the Churches of the Reformed faith and order.
" 2 . That the Assembly instruct the Moderator and Stated Clerk to send a message to the Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States, now in session at St. Louis, expressing the desire of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America for the real union of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, and the hope that the Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States may take such action as will not only promote closer relations but secure the reunion of our two kindred bodies.
" 3 . That a similar message be sent to the Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church, the Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States of America, and the Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States."

In line with this action your Committee in conference with representatives of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S., the United Presbyterian Church and the Reformed Church in the U. S., at a meeting held at Richmond, Va., November 29-30, 1921, took the position that since the Plan for a United Assembly as proposed by the Presbyterian Church, as well as the Plan for Regional or Provincial Assemblies, also presented for discussion, did not contemplate real organic union, these plans would not receive the approval of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. After prolonged consideration of the whole question of a possible union of Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, it was decided by the representatives of the four Churches present at the meeting, that nothing further can be gained at present than the co-operation already made possible through the Council of the Reformed Churches and its Amended Articles of Agreement.

No further action is necessary regarding Overtures Nos. 1542, 1160-1175 against the Plan of a United Assembly and favoring organic union, referred by the last Assembly to this Committee.
IV. The Presbyterian Church and the Council on Organic Union of the Evangelical Churches.-As the Plan for the Council of Organic Union of the Evangelical Churches sent down to the Presbyteries by the One Hundred and Thirty-second General Assembly was not adopted, the last Assembly instructed your Committee to communicate the action of the Presbyteries to the Ad Interim Committee of the Council and to take up with it the advisability of further negotiations looking to the actual union of evangelical churches on a clear and unmistakable evangelical basis.

This action was communicated to the Council's Ad Interim Committee which at a meeting held in Philadelphia, December 2, 1921, took the following action:
"The unabated desire for closer relations between the Evangelical denominations of our country has been impressed upon us in so many ways and from so many quarters that the Committee created by the Conference of the Evangelical Churches on their Organic Union, held in Philadelphia, February 2, 1920, feels that it would be a breach of trust to God and man to drop the task committed to it.
"The proposed plan for the creation of the United Churches of Christ in America, while received with favor by many, has not been satisfactory to others. But the desire for continuance of conference on this subject has been wide and earnest.
"The Committec ereated by the Philadelphia Conference in 1920, is therefore respectfully and earnestly requesting your body, in common with other Evangelical Churches:
"To appoint, if you have not already done so, repre-sentatives-not less than three nor more than ten in number-to a conference to be held as soon as advisable, to consider the closer relations of these Evangelical Churches and their ultimate union and so give visible manifestation to the spiritual unity in which we already rejoice."
In response to the request of the Ad Interim Committee your Committee proposes the following action for the Assembly's adoption:

1. The Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. through its General Assembly at Columbus, Ohio, in 1918, made the Call for the Organic Union of the Evangelical Churches in this country in the following language:
"(1) That we, the Commissioners of the One Hundred and Thirtieth General Assembly now in session at Columbus, Ohio, do declare and place on record our profound conviction that the time has come for Organic Church Union of the Evangelical Churches of America.
"(2) That this Assembly hereby overtures the National Bodies of the Evangelical Communions of America to meet with our representatives for the purpose of formulating a Plan of Organic Union."
2. The Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. reiterates the above call for organic union and pledges its heartiest co-operation in any effort toward the visible unity of the Body of Christ and the realization of the objectives named in the communication of the Ad Interim Committee.
3. The Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., therefore hereby authorizes its Committee on Church Co-operation and Union to participate in the Assembly of the Conference of 1920 which appointed the Ad Interim Committee, on the evangelical basis set forth in the call of 1918.

Regarding Overture No. 261 as to whether office-bearers of other ecclesiastical bodies may exercise their powers in the Presbyterian Church and referred to this Committee with instructions to enter into correspondence with other bodies on this subject, your Committee would report progress.
V. Comity.-The last General Assembly sent a communication to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. in answer to a complaint that no response had been made to messages sent to previous Assemblies in reference to supposed violations of comity agreements. (See Assembly Minutes p. 188.) Upon receipt of this communication the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church
U. S., appointed a special committee to confer with a corresponding committee of our Church regirding comity matters. Notice of this action was not received until our Assembly had adjourned. When the committee of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S., desired a conference, the Moderator of our Assembly, after consulting the Executive Commission, referred the matter to your Committee on Church Co-operation and Union under whose jurisdiction previous Assemblies had placed all matters pertaining to comity agreements. (See Assembly Minutes 1918, p. 284; 1919 p. 116.)

At the meeting of your Committee at Richmond, Va., November 29, 1921, a friendly conference was held with the Committee of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S., regarding comity agreements, and answer was made to criticisms which were presented as to the course pursued by our Church following the action of the Assembly in 1916, when an agreement between the Executive Commission and a Committee of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. was approved. A second conference was held in New York City on Wednesday, April 12, 1922. The following action was taken: The Joint Committee recommends that the two Assemblies urge their respective Presbyteries and Synods to make every effort to settle all cases of Comity locally before appeal is made to the Assemblies. When cases are initiated the procedure shall be as follows:

The complaining body shall prepare in writing its case and keep a written record of the facts as directed in local conferences before appeals shall be made to a higher court, and these shall be transmitted to the appeal courts for their use.

One of the comity agreements which we have had under discussion is Comity Rule No. 2 of the Council of Reformed Churches and which reads as follows:
"Resolved, 2. That in any city of less than 100,000 where a Presbyterian or Reformed Church is at work among foreign people, no other Presbyterian or Reformed Church shall open a work for the same people in that city until other cities and towns where such work is needed, have been occupied."
In order to make this rule, dealing with work among foreign populations, conform to the Comity Rule for work among native populations, we recommend

1. That the General Assembly withdraw its approval of Rule No. 2, and
2. That the Assembly recommend to the Reformed Council of Churches the revision of Rule No. 2 basing it on the number of foreigners in a community instead of on the total population. In agreement with this we recommend
that Rule No. 2 read as follows: That in a community where a Presbyterian or Reformed Church is at work among foreign people, no other Presbyterian or Reformed Church shall enter until the number of said foreigners shall reach five thousand.

The General Assembly of 1919 took the following action regarding comity and correspondence:
"This General Assembly refers all the statements as to correspondence and comity with other churches, which have been adopted by other Assemblies, to the Committee on
Church Co-operation and Union to harmonize and digest the same, and that the Committee take the subject of Comity in its present conditions, under advisement during the year, and report fully upon the subject to the next General Assembly."
Owing to the serious illness of the Chairman of the Committee, Dr. Roberts, no report was made on this subject either to the Assembly of 1920 or 1921 . We therefore recommend that this Assembly re-affirm the action taken by the Assembly of 1919.

## VI. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Colored.

 -There are supposed to be fifteen or twenty thousand Cumberland Presbyterians, Colored, scattered over the Southern States of Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Texas, Arkansas, Missouri and Oklahoma. Among these Presbyterians there is employed one teacher, one evangelist and one Sunday School missionary. Inasmuch as the work is so meagre while the need is so great, we fear that in the proposed re-organization and consolidation of the Boards and Agencies of the Church this work, to which our Church thus far has given so little attention, may be entirely overlooked. We feel, therefore, that the Assembly should be reminded at this time as to the solemn engagement into which it entered at the time of the reunion of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1906."Whereas, The Committee on Fraternity and Union of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church have called attention to the responsibility which its church has felt in the matter of aiding the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, colored, its educational Society having been charged by its General Assembly from year to year with certain duties in relation to said Church, in order that this responsibility may be duly recognized by the reunited Church toward that particular denomination of colored people; therefore,
"Resolved, That the Board of Missions for Freedmen of the

Presbyterian Church in the United States of America and the Educational Society of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, both of which, after the completion of the reunion and union, will be agencies of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, are hereby authorized and directed to consider what may be done by the reunited Church for the further evangelization and education of the colored people in the South and Southwest; report to be made to the One Hundred and Nineteenth General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, meeting in 1909. (Assembly Minutes 1906, pp. 149-50.)
"Looking to the work of the coming year, the Board submits to the General Assembly the following recom-mendations:-
"That inasmuch as the corporate existence of the Educational Society of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church is likely to be continued through another year or longer, the General Assembly of the reunited Church shall authorize the Board of Missions for Freedmen to use the Board of Directors of said Educational Society, if so continued, and its Secretary as the agency through which such assistance may be tendered to the Educational and Missionary work of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, colored, as said Board of Missions for Freedmen, may deem proper.
"In soliciting contributions from former Cumberland Presbyterian Churches for the work of the Board of Missions for Freedmen, said Board may concede to all said Churches the privilege of directing all their contributions for the purpose to be applied for the aid of the Educational Missionary work of the Cumberland Church, Colored.
"The Board of Missions for Freedmen may make still further appropriations from its treasury as in its judgment the interests of said Colored Cumberland Presbyterians may require and the funds will allow.
"The manner of making such appropriations and the conditions imposed shall be left to the judgment of the Board of Missions for Freedmen, the same to conform as nearly as possible to the rules and regulations under which the ordinary work of the Board is conducted.
"Particular attention is called to the need of special training in behalf of candidates for the ministry in this denomination. The Board feels that some special arrangement should be made, jointly with the authorities of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Colored, whereby their young men preparing for the ministry may secure better
training for their life work. (Reports of the Boards, 19 1 , pp. 13 and 14.)
"That the recommendation of the Board in regard $t_{0}$ the contribution, the appropriation and distribution of funds for the educational and missionary work of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Colored, be adopted. This, recommendation is recorded in full in the report of the Board." (Assembly Minutes 1907, p. 72.)
By the reunion, the Cumberland Presbyterians lost the machinery of administration, it all being merged into the machinery of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A., hence the former Cumberland Presbyterian Church is not able to do what it formerly did for the colored people and keep in close touch with their movements and institutions. There is no member of the Board of Freedmen representing the former Cumberland Presbyterian Church in such a way as to be near the conscience and activities of the Board. We fear also that the Boards of the Church which deal with colored people have been so preoccupied with the orer-demand upon their time and resources that they have not felt the pressure of this particular obligation. In the light of solemn pledges that have been made, we recommend that the Assembly renew the agreement already made, endeavor to carry it out in good faith and refer the matter to the Board of Freedmen for its immediate and earnest consideration.
VII. The Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America.-Regarding the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America your Committee would make the following recommendations:

1. That the Report of the Federal Council of Churches for the current year has been received and we recommend its incorporation in the Appendix of the Minutes of the General Assembly.
2. That for the year $1922-23, \$ 2,500$ be paid to the Federal Council from the Treasury of the General Assembly as heretofore, and that the Council be commended to churches and individuals for the sum of $\$ 30,000$ as per its request.
3. That the sum of $\$ 30,000$ be placed in the Benerolent Budget of the Church for 1923-24 on a percentage basis.

Under the Standing Rules, this resolution i. e. Section VII-3 was referred to the Executive Commission.
4. That the expenses of the Presbyterian member's of the Executive Committee of the Federal Council in attending its sessions be paid by the General Assembly.
VIII. The World Conference on Faith and Order.Since the last meeting of the Assembly the Continuation Com-
mittee of the World Conference on Faith and Order has been planning definitely for the holding of such a Conference. In all probability this Conference will be held in 1925, and Washington, D. C., has been suggested as the place which would be most generally approved by the constituent bodies. A general outline has been made of the topics which are to be considered and Commissions will be appointed to make a special study of these topics and prepare reports for consideration and discussion when the Conference meets. Your Committee would recommend:

1. That the Assembly entrust all negotiations regarding this Conference and all matters connected with the preparation therefore, expenses included, to this Committee on Church Co-operation and Union as the authorized representative of the Assembly.
2. That the appropriation of one thousand dollars for the annual expenses of the Continuation Committee be renewed this year.
IX. Universal Conference of the Church of Christ on Life and Work.-The Last Assembly on the recommendation of this Committee appointed as a committee to arrange for this Universal Conference of the Church of Christ on Life and Work the following Presbyterian representatives: C. L. Thompson, A. J. Brown, W. P. Merrill, E. P. Hill and H. G. Mendenhall. As Dr. Mendenhall feels compelled to resign on account of his health, we recommend that George Reynolds be appointed to take his place. Plans for the proposed Conference are making satisfactory progress.

The purpose of the Conference, which will probably be held in 1924, is not primarily to promote the reunion of Christendom, though such co-operation between the Churches as it proposed would undoubtedly help to this end. It is not intended to deal with questions of Faith and Order. The purpose is rather to concentrate the thought of Christendom on the mind of Christ as revealed in the Gospels towards those great social questions, industrial and international, which are so acutely urgent in every country. Believing that only in Christ's way of life can the world find healing and rest, we desire to discover how best His message may be applied to the problems with which, since the war, every nation has been confronted. The need for making some such concerted endeavor to learn afresh the mind of Christ cannot be exaggerated. The nations are yearning for purer politics. Industrial unrest is producing chaos and confusion. The basic motives of citizenship need strong reinforcement. In international affairs men are sceking anxiously for permanent
peace and deeper fellowship. We believe that the message and teaching of Jesus Christ afford the only solution. 'To set ourselves to discover His will and under the guidance of His Spirit to find wise ways of applying His teaching, would seem to be the paramount task of the Church.

A committee has been formed in three sections, representing many Christian Communions in Continental Europe, in the British Empire and in the United States of America. On this Committee are leaders from the Church of England, the Church of Scotland, the Free Churches of Great Britain and most of the Communions in Europe and America. Eighteen denominations in the United States, including our own, have appointed representatives on the American Committee, and others are expected to act at their next meetings. The Chairman of the European Section is Archbishop Nathan Söderblom of the Lutheran Church of Sweden, the Chairman of the British Section is the Bishop of Manchester, and the Chairman of the American Section is the Rev. Dr. Arthur J. Brown, one of the representatives of our own General Assembly.

In thus presenting our report for the year we recommend that the Committee be continued and that the expenses of the Committee be paid as heretofore by the General Assembly.

Rev. Arthur J. Brown, D.D., addressed the Assembly with reference to the Universal Conference of the Church of Christ on Life and Work and reported progress.

In connection with Section III of the Committee's report, the following telegram from the Presbyterian Church, U.S., was read to the Assembly, referred to the Committee on Church Coöperation and Union, and the appended reply authorized:

Charleston, W. Va.
May 20, 1922.
The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, Des Moines, Iowa. Brethren:

The following resolution was adopted by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States and ordered sent to you:
"Resolved, That this Assembly approved and adopts the constitution of the Presbyterian Reformed Churches in America contained in the paper marked Exhibit B filed at this meeting with the report of the Committee to which this matter was referred by the last Assembly, the same to become operative and effective however, only when it shall have been approved and adopted by the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and at least one of the other churches in this country holding the Reformed Presbyterian faith.

Resolved, Further, that the Moderator notify the Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America now in session at Des Moines, Iowa, of this action and also communicate it to the other Presbyterian bodies of the country in such manner as he may deem most appropriate."

The Moderator of the Genoral Assombly of the Presbyterian Church in the Urited states.
Bhethiren:
The Ceneral Assembly of the Presbyterian Church U.S. A., acknowledges the commmination from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church U. S. regarding the adoption of the Constitution for a United Assembly of I'resbyterian and Reformed Churches to be operative and effective when approved by the Assembly of the Presbyterian Church U.S. A. and at least one other chureh in the country holding the Presbyterian and Reformed faith.

We reaffirm our willingness to take any steps in the direction of the actual union of Presbyterian and Reformed Churehes. In our judgment, however, this proposed Constitution secures no closer union than is already made possible by the Constitution of the General Council of the Reformed Churches already adopted by the majority of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches and now in operation.

We, therefore, believe that for the present we should endeavor to promote that coöperation already made possible through the Council of the Reformed Churches and its amended Articles of Agreement, until such time as the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. is willing to proceed further and adopt measures which will secure actual organic union.

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A request from the Commission on France and Belgium of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, asking that a Committee be appointed to coöperate in the celebration of the Huguenot and Walloon Tercentenary, was referred to the Special Committee on Church Coöperation and Union to designate the members of this coöperating Committee.

The Executive Commission of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches throughout the World holding the Presbyterian System, Western Section, presented its report through its Secretary, Rev. Henry B. Master, D.D. Pending the adoption of its recommendations, the Assembly was addressed by the Rev. Wallace Radcliffe, D.D. The report, together with the resolutions, were adopted by the Assembly, and appears in the Supplement of the Journal of the General Assembly.

The General Council of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches in America, presented its report through the Rev. James E. Clarke, D.D., a member of its Executive Committee. The Assembly adopted the following recommendations, namely:

1. That a full delegation be chosen on the old basis, which means the selection of twelve additional representatives.
2. That the term of service be changed to six years instead of three years, and that the terms of service of your representatives be so re-arranged that thirteen of them shall be in
a class expiring in 1924, thirteen in a clats expiring in 1920 , and fourteen in a class expiring in 1928.

These recommendations were referred to the Special Committee on Church Coöperation and Union. The report of the General Council was adopted, and appears in the Supplement of the Journal of the General Assembly.

## Ministerial Relief and Sustentation

The Standing Committee on Ministerial Relief and Sustentation presented its report through its Chairman, the Hon. Nelson H. Loomis, and pending the adoption of its recommendations, the Assembly was addressed by the Rev. Henry B. Master, D.D., Rev. Hugh A. Cooper, Rev. George F. Greene, D.D., Elder Charles H. Keesor, M.D., Elder Fred Goodman, and Elder F. Leonard Wailes. The report and its recommendations were then adopted as a whole, as follows:

Your Committee on Relief and Sustentation, after having carefully examined the minutes of the Board, the audited report of its Treasurer, and the reports and recommendations of the Board, respectfully submit the following recommendations for the consideration of the General Assembly:

1. That the Minutes of the Board and the audited report of the Treasurer be approved.
2. That the action of the Assembly of 1912 be renewed, requesting the Board to raise for Endowment the sum of $\$ 10,000,000$ and we heartily approve the plan of the Board to prosecute this work vigorously until the full amount is obtained.
3. That the General Assembly requests the various Churches so to interpret the Budget System and the Every Member Canvass as to make it possible for the representatives of the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation to present the cause and secure subscriptions for endowment in accord with the action of the General Assembly of 1912 and every subsequent General Assembly.
4. That the General Assembly directs the Board to place in its Budget for the year 1923-24, an amount sufficient to maintain the level of the payments to the annuitants in the Relief Department during the year, at or above the level of the payments during the year 1922-23.
5. That the General Assembly urges all Churches, Presbyteries and Synods to emphasize the importance of the Church's Pension System and its paramount claims upon the hearts and generosity of their members.
6. That in view of a persistent misunderstanding, the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A. through its General As-
sembly, hereby declares that the pensions which it provides are precisely (except in size) like the pensions of the United States Government and the great Industrial Corporations-a recognition of service faithfully performed.
7. That the following persons whose terms of office expire at this meeting of the Assembly, be re-elected,

Rev. Charles L. Candee, D.D., Wilmington, Del., Ormond Rambo, Esq., Philadelphia, Pa., and that Walter S. McInnes, Esq., Philadelphia, Pa., be elected to take the place of Mr. Allen Brown, resigned, and be re-elected for a term of three years; and that Mr. Laurence T. Bliss, Wilmington, Del., be elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. J. Willison Smith.
8. We recommend that the following agreement with the Executive Committee of Christian Education and Ministerial Relief of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. be ratified by this Assembly and the Board authorized to govern the payment of its pensions accordingly.

Whereas, ministers are frequently called from the service of one of the Reformed Churches into the service of another, and

Whereas, because of such transfer (in reckoning the years of service which are considered in determining the amount of pension or grant) no account is taken of those years during which the minister served any other Church than the one proposing to pay him a pension or grant, and

Whereas, this works not only hardship but great injustice to many brethren:

Therefore, this Agreement is made between the Presbyterian Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. and the Executive Committee of Christian Education and Ministerial Relief of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S., to the effect that hereafter, that is to say, immediately upon the ratification of this agreement or understanding by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.
(1) When application for a pension or grant is made, the applicant shall include in a request for a grant a record of service rendered to both churches and all papers, records and data, or copies thereof, shall be submitted by the board or committee to which application is made, to the board or committee of the other church; and
(2) Upon approval of such application by both boards the grant shall be adjusted between said board and committee in proportion to the service ${ }^{5}$ rendered in the particular
chureh; the basis of grants for the period covered by eithem board or committee being in aceordance with the seate of grants made to others by said board.
(3) It is understood and agreed that nothing in this agreement shall be construed to be retroactive so far as any minister or missionary is concerned who is now receiving a pension or grant of aid from either of the parties to this agrement, and that it is only to apply and to be considered as applying subsequent to the date of the ratification of the agreement.
(4) This agreement shall continue in operation subject to amendment between said board and committee, or to termination on a year's notice by one of the said parties to the other, with the proviso, however, that the interests of any nember who has, during the operation of the agreement, received a grant and which is still continuing to him and in which both parties participate, shall in no wise be affected by the termination of the agreement.

Also that the following agreement with the annuity fund for Congregational ministers of the Congregational Church and the Congregational Board of Relief be ratified by this Assembly and the Board authorized to govern the payment of its pensions accordingly.

Whereas, ministers are frequently called from the service of one of the churches of the Presbyterian Church in the U . S . A. into the service of one of the Congregational Churches of the U.S. and vice versa,

And Whereas, in case of such transfer (in reckoning the years of service which are considered in determining the amount of pension or grant) no account is taken of those years during which the minister served any other church than the one proposing to pay him a pension or grant,

And Whereas, this works not only hardship but great injustice to many brethren:

Therefore this Agreement is made between the Presbyterian Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation and the Congregational Board of Ministerial Relief, to the effect that hereafter, that is to say, immediately upon the ratification of this agreement or understanding by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. and the National Council of the Congregational Churches of the U.S.
(1) When application for a pension or grant is made, the applicant shall include in a request for a grant a record of service rendered to both churches and all papers, records and data, or copies thereof, shall be submitted by the board to which the application is made, to the board of the other church; and
(2) Upon approval of such application by both boards, the grant shall be adjusted between said boards in proportion to the service rendered as a Presbyterian, or as a Congregationalist; the basis of grants for the period covered by either board being in accordance with the scale of grants made to others by said board.
(3) It is understood and agreed that nothing in this agreement shall be construed to be retroactive so far as any Minister or Missionary is concerned who is now receiving a pension or grant of aid from either of the parties to this agreement, and that it is only to apply and to be considered as applying, subsequent to the date of the ratification of the agreement.
(4) This agreement shall continue in operation, subject to amendment by mutual agreement between said boards, or to termination, on a year's notice by one of said boards to the other, with the proviso, however, that the interests of any member who has, during the operation of the agreement, received a grant and which is still continuing to him and in which both boards participate, shall in no wise be affected by the termination of the agreement.
9. That Standing Rule No. 18 be amended by the addition of the words "the evening of Thursday, the first day, to the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation."
10. That every effort be made to enlist the active interest of the eldership in the work of the Board. When possible we suggest the wisdom of appointing an elder as Chairman of the Committee in Synod and Presbytery and that the General Assembly authorizes the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation to inaugurate a Layman's Movement throughout the Church to provide a sufficient endowment to insure suitable pensions for the aged and disabled ministers and missionaries of the Church.
11. That we specifically approve the following action of the Board as shown by the minutes of the Board meeting of April 20, 1922 :
"The Special Committee appointed to consider the Overtures concerning the sixty-five and seventy year classes is hereby discharged as per the following report:
'The Board wishes to place itself upon record to the effect that inasmuch as there has been such a decrease in the receipts of the Board this year as compared with last year, and inasmuch as nothing was placed in the Budget last year for the Sustentation Department, although we have set aside a large sum of money for the reserve, the Board, is less able financially to comply with the requests of these overtures.'"
12. That as to Overture 78 from the Presbytery of Chicago, asking that the Board give all members of the sustentation Fund the privilege of entering the 65 year class and on the $\$ 600$ per year basis at once by paying their proportionate share of the adjustment, no action be taken.
13. That as to Overture 79 from the Presbytery of Cairo, and Overture 80 from the Presbytery of Rushville, both of similar purport to 78 , no action be taken.
14. That as to Overture 81 from the Presbytery of Southern Oregon, asking for the establishment of a Home for the Aged and especially aged ministers, in view of the fact that the charter of the Board limits the use of its funds to aged ministers and commissioned missionaries and their families, that the Board is now looking after four homes for ministers and their families, which homes were given to the Board with sufficient endowment to support them; and in view of the fact that the Board would be glad to take charge of similar homes on the Pacific Coast and in the Southwest if they should be donated to it, together with sufficient endowments to support them, we recommend that no action be taken.
15. That as to Overture 140 from the Presbytery of Cleveland asking that the whole force and influence of the Church be put behind the movement to create the endowment fund of $\$ 10,000,000$, we recommend that it be referred to the Budget Committee of the Executive Commission.
16. That as to Overture 141 from the Presbytery of Cleveland, asking that those who have been longer members of the Sustentation Department be granted the same benefits as now offered to new members, no action be taken.
17. That we commend the Board and its workers for their splendid, faithful service and urge the Churches to open up their Churches to its representatives to present the cause and take subscriptions for the Endowment Fund.

## Executive Commission

The Executive Commission continued its report, section XI being presented by Rev. George B. Stewart, D.D., LL.D., and adopted by the Assembly. See complete report of the Executive Commission below in this Journal.

Section XIV was referred to the Committee on Polity.
Section XV was presented by the Rev. Louis B. Crane, D.D., and adopted by the Assembly. See complete report of the Executive Commission below in this Journal.

The Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation, through the Moderator of the General Assembly, announced the
receipt of a check for $\$ 2,500.00$ from the Prestrytery of Redstone, the donor wishing to remain anonymons, which was received by the Assembly with a rising vote of thanks.

The devotional period was conducted by the Rev. Reuben A. Torrey, D.D., of the Presbytery of Los Angeles.

The Assembly took recess until 2.30 P. M. and was closed with prayer.

## Executive Commission

The Executive Commission continued its report, sections XVI, XVII, XVIII and XIX being adopted. See complete report of the Executive Commission below in this Journal.

At the request of the Executive Commission, the following Standing Rule, presented by Elder Thomas E. D. Bradley, was adopted:

That the Executive Commission be and it hereby is authorized and empowered, whenever property rights of the Presbyterian Church are threatened or involved, to take any such action as may be necessary or proper to protect or preserve such rights; to intervene in any suit or proceeding already begun; or institute any other such proceedings at law or in equity, as may be necessary to carry out the authority hereby conferred; and to delegate to, authorize, and empower the Moderator and Stated Clerk of the General Assembly to sign, in the name of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, any and all documents which may be deemed necessary to exercise the power hereby conferred.

The report of the Executive Commission was adopted as a whole, and is as follows:

## I. Meetings

The Executive Commission met preceding and during the Session of the General Assembly in Winona Lake, May 19-26, 1921. The first meeting of the Commission with the newly elected Moderator as Chairman and with the newly elected members in attendance was held on Thursday, May 26, 1921, at Winona Lake. The Executive Commission was also in session at Atlantic City, New Jersey, Thursday, November 10th to Tuesday, November 15th inclusive. The Commission is now in session at Des Moines, having convened on Tuesday, May 16th, at 10.00 A.M. and awaits the pleasure of the General Assembly.

## II. Members

The membership of the Executive Commission at present is as follows:

There have been no vacancies created in the Executive Commission during the year either by death or by resignation, and therefore there have been no appointments to membership.

The General Assembly of 1921 (see Minutes, p. 185) adopted the following standing rules relating to membership in the Executive Commission:
"1. That appointments by the Moderator to fill vacancies in the Executive Commission shall be valid only until the next succeeding Assembly, which shall then fill the vacancies by election.
" 2 . That with the exception of the Moderator of the General Assembly, no one shall be eligible to serve on the Executive Commission, either by appointment or election, or both, for more than four years in succession, until one full term of three years shall have intervened."

In conformity with the second of these rules, none of the members of the class of 1922, are eligible for re-election and therefore two ministers and three ruling elders should be elected by this General Assembly to succeed them.

## III. The Stated Clerk

The Rev. J. M. Hubbert, D.D., having resigned as Acting Stated Clerk, as of June 1, 1921, the Rev. George B. Stewart, D.D., was appointed Acting Stated Clerk, from June 1, 1921, to serve until the Stated Clerk elect should be ready to take charge of the office of the General Assembly.

The Rev. Lewis S. Mudge, D.D., Stated Clerk elect assumed office October 17, 1921.

The Commission has made suitable record upon its Minutes of the valuable service of Dr. Stewart as Acting Stated Clerk.

## IV. New Standing Rule Requested

The Executive Commission respectfully requests the General Assembly to adopt the following standing rule, the sole object of this rule being to systematize and expedite business:

That at each session of the General Assembly the Executive Commission in the person of the Chairman or at his request in the person of one of the members, shall have the floor if desired immediately following the report of the Standing Committee on Bills and Overtures.

## V. Report of the Committee on Liquidating the Inter-church Debt of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.

Your Committce charged with the duty of paying the Bankers' Trust Company the balance due on account of our Church's underwriting of the Interchurch World Movement, would respectfully report:

The General Assembly sitting at Winona Lake, Indiana, on May 23rd, 1921, took the following action regarding the indebtedness due to the Interchurch underwriting, and to the New Era Movement:

Whereas, The General Assembly has certain outstanding financial obligations, to wit, the balance of an underwriting of the Interchurch World Movement, amounting to approximately $\$ 555,000$ with accrued interest, and a balance of an underwriting of the New Era Movement, amounting to approximately $\$ 365,000$ with accrued interest, making a total of approximately $\$ 920,000$ with accrued interest, which must be liquidated, and

Whereas, It is impossible to assess either or both of these obligations against the funds held or administered in trust for special missionary and benevolent objects by any or all of the Boards and Agencies of the General Assembly, therefore,

For the purpose of liquidating the Interchurch debt, Be It Resolved:

1. That the Moderator and the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. be authorized, empowered, and directed to make', execute and deliver in the name and under the seal of the General Assembly certificates of indebtedness not to exceed the sum of $\$ 600,000$ for a term of five years, bearing interest at the rate of $6 \%$ per annum, interest payable half yearly, in such denominations as the Boards and Agencies may elect; subject to redemption in whole or in part at any interest period as the Executive Commission may determine.
2. That such obligations be and are hereby declared to be authorized investments for the Boards and Agencies of the Church to the repayment of which the good faith of the Church is pledged.
3. That such certificates of indebtedness be issued under the direction of the Executive Commission, and that the Boards and Agencies which participate in the percentages be empowered and directed to invest in the said issuc in the proportion in which the receipts of each Board and Agency from living givers in the year 1920-1921 bears to the total receipts of the Boards and Agencies from living givers during that year, with the further provision that if any of these
certificates of indebtedness are purchased by either or both of the Women's Boards, the amount of such purchase shall be deducted from the total issue before the proportion of the Boards and Agencies is determined.
4. That the funds realized from such issue be paid to the Treasurer of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A. to pay out and retire the outstanding indebtedness incurred in the Interchurch underwriting amounting to approximately $\$ 555,000$ and interest thereon.
5. That the Executive Commission be directed to place in the budget for the year 1921-1922 the sum of $\$ 350,000$, in addition to the total budget of the Boards and Agencies, for retirement on account of these certificates of indebtedness and all interest thereon and that all money realized from this item of the budget for said year be used and appropriated to reduce and retire the above authorized certificates of indebtedness and all interest thereon as the Executive Commission may determine.
6. That the Executive Commission be directed to place in the budget for the years following 1921-1922 a sum equal to $2 \%$ per annum of the total budget of all participating parties for the purpose of retiring certificates of indebtedness to the amount of percentage available from such proportionate part of the budget after paying therefrom all half-yearly interest, and that a definite percentage be allocated for this purpose.

And, For the purpose of liquidating the New Era debt, Be It Resolved:

1. That the Executive Commission be directed to place in the budget for the year 1921-1922, in addition to the total budget of the Boards and Agencies and the amount specified in paragraph 5 above, the sum of $\$ 150,000$, and that all money realized from this item of the budget for said year be used and appropriated to liquidate said New Era indebtedness, including all interest thereon.
2. That the Executive Commission be directed to place in the budget for the years following 1921-1922 a sum equal to $1 \%$ per annum of the total budget of all participating parties for the purpose of completing the liquidation of said New Era indebtedness and interest and that a definite percentage be allocated for this purpose.

And, For the purpose of raising the amounts placed in the budget for 1921-1922 by the above resolutions, Be It Resolved:

1. That the representatives of the Boards and Agencies on the New Era Committee be constituted a Special Com-
mittee of the General Assembly, and that it be empowered to use all available agencies of the Church, including the New Era Committee, to accomplish this purpose.

Pursuant to this action, the Chairman of the Executioe Commission appointed the following Committee to accom-plish this purpose so far as it pertained to the Interchurch indebtedness: Doctors Palmer, Stewart and Mr. J. Willison Smith. Subsequently the Committee added the Moderator, Dr. Swearingen, to its number.

In the discharge of its duties, the Committee proceeded as follows:

1. The Committee asked on July 1st, 1921, of the Woman's Board of Home Missions, and the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions, their intention in the matter of subscribing for the Certificates of Indebtedness, so that their subscription might be deducted before the allocations were made to the Boards. Neither Board was in a position at that time to subscribe.
2. The "Boards and Agencies" of Article 3 of the Assembly's action were interpreted to include the following Boards and Agencies:

The Board of Home Missions.
The Board of Foreign Missions.
The General Board of Education.
The Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work.
The Board of Church Erection.
The Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation.
The Board of Missions for Freedmen.
The Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare.
The Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance.
The Permanent Committee on Evangelism.
The Permanent Committee on Men's Work.
3. Under date of July 7, 1921, the Committee received from Dr. W. R. Patterson, Comptroller of the New Era Movement, the following statement of "Receipts from living givers as reported by the several Boards and Agencies."

4. The Bankers' Trust Company of New York informed the Committee that the indebtedness of the Presbyterian

Church, U. S. A., on account of the Interchurch World Movement underwriting, was as follows, as of August 1, 1921.

5. On July 8, 1921, a tentative and approximate allocation was made and communicated to the various Boards and Agencies, and was accepted by all except the General Board of Education, and the Committees on Sabbath Observance, Evangelism and Men's Work. The American Bible Society was given an opportunity to make a voluntary subscription, and indicated that possibly later on when its Directors could act, it might do so. The Committees on Sabbath Observance, Evangelism and Men's Work were not in a position at the time to take action.

The General Board of Education raised objection, claiming that there was included in the $\$ 1,106,311.39$ receipts reported by the New Era Movement, as reported by the Board, $\$ 459,263.43$ which in point of fact did not pass through the Board's treasury, but was money reported to the Board by the Colleges under its care. It contended that the amount to be taken as the basis of its allotment should be $\$ 647,047.96$. After careful consideration, following correspondence, telephone conversations and personal interview, the Committee decided that it must adhere to the figures submitted by the Comptroller of the New Era Movement, and therefore made its allocation to the Board on the basis of the original figures.
6. The Committee, convinced that the Assembly intended that the whole amount of indebtedness to the Bankers TrustCompany should be paid, was under the necessity of a'llocat ing the whole amount of the Certificates of Indebtedness authorized by the General Assembly, namely, \$600,000.00, leaving to a future date the final adjustment of the several allocations, made necessary by conditions not under its control.
7. On July 21, 1921, the following statement of allocations was sent to the several Boards and Agencies therein mentioned, requesting payment of the several amounts by July 29, 1921:

8. Subsequently, but too late to admit of changing the percentages, a subscription of $\$ 30,000.00$ was received from the Woman's Board of Home Missions.
9. The General Board of Education, still maintaining the justness of its position, declined to subscribe the amount allotted to it, but agreed to subscribe $\$ 69,100.00$, figured on the basis of $\$ 647,047.96$ received by it from "Living givers," and a total basis of $\$ 5,615,392.28$ to all the Boards and Agencies from the same source. Without acknowledging the correctness of its position, and leaving the matter for future adjustment, the Cmomittee, "as a matter of expedience," accepted this subcrisption.
10. On August 1, 1921, the Land Title and Trust Company of Philadelphia, Pa., Treasurer of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., discharged the full amount of indebtedness of this Church to the Bankers'Trust Company of New York, covering the balance due of $\$ 583,365.77$, and received from the Bankers' Trust Company the cancelled warrants held by it as the evident obligation of this Church on account of the Interchurch World Movement underwriting. These warrants are now in the possession of the Land Title and Trust Company, Philadelphia, Pa., Treasurer of the General Assembly.
11. The Land Title and Trust Company, Philadelphia, Pa., Treasurer of the General Assembly, as of August 1, 1921, made the following statement of account in the above transaction:

12. The Committee, as of August 1, 1921, delivered Certificates of Indebtedness as authorized by the General Assembly, signed by the Moderator and Acting Stated Clerk, bearing $6 \%$ interest from August 1, 1921, to the Boards and

Agencies in the amount set opposite their respective names in paragraph 11 above.
13. On August 3, 1921, your Committee issued a Statement showing in detail all of its transactions to that date. This Statement was sent to all of the Boards and Agencies, to the several members of the Executive Commission, and to all of our Presbyterian papers, and through the Publicity Department, a synopsis was given to the secular press.
14. On September 22, 1921, the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions informed the Committee that it was not in a position to subscribe for any of the Certificates of Indebtedness.
15. As the new allocation of the Certificates contained in item 22 of this report, reduced the amount originally allocated to the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation, that Board increased its subscription for additional Certificates from $\$ 3,800.00$ to $\$ 4,000.00$.
16. As indicated above in items 5 and 9 , there was a difference of opinion between the Committee and the General Board of Education as to the amount of receipts from living givers to that Board, which difference was left at the time of collecting the subscriptions from the Boards, to be adjusted later. After conference it was decided to base the allocation of Certificates of Indebtedness to the General Board of Education on the receipts of the Board from living givers, which passed through the treasury of the Board, amounting to $\$ 647,047.96$, the Board agreeing to purchase $\$ 25,000.00$ additional Certificates of Indebtedness in order to a satisfactory adjustment.
17. The Committee incurred the following expenses in the discharge of its duty, namely: Mimeographing Statement, $\$ 6.25$; West End Trust Company, registering the Certificates, $\$ 100.00$; Printing Certificates, $\$ 150.00$; Postage (part) $\$ 1.06$, a total of $\$ 257.31$. This amount the Committee regarded as properly chargeable against the fund to be covered by the Certificates.
18. The Committee on Evangelism informed your Committee that as it had no permanent funds it could not make an investment in the Certificates of Indebtedness, but that it hoped certain of its members would subscribe for some or all of the Certificates allotted to it, namely: $\$ 4,600.00$. As your Committee judged that it was expected to close the whole matter before the meeting of the Executive Commission on November 10, 1921, it advised the Committee on Evangelism that it could not wait for receipt of money for the Certificates beyond November 1, 1921. Later on your Committee received from individual members of the Committee on

Evangelism through that Committee $\$ 3,000.00$, leaving a balance of $\$ 1,600.00$ of the allotment to that Committee $1 m-$ provided for. The Committee on Evangelism is to be commended for what it has done under the circumstances.
19. The Committee on Men's Work expressed its earnest desire to comply with the direction of the Assembly and to subscribe for the amount of the Certificates allotted to it, $\$ 3,100.00$, but as it had no permanent funds, it was unable to make the investment, greatly to its regret.
20. The Committee on Sabbath Observance out of its current funds, as we understand, at the first took $\$ 500.00$ of the Certificates allotted to it, and later on took the remaining $\$ 500.00$, thus accepting and buying the full amount of $\$ 1,000.00$ allotted to it.
21. Your Committee judged that the Executive Committee desired the whole matter closed before the meeting on November 10, 1921, and therefore made a new allocation of the Interchurch Indebtedness covering the amount of principal and interest owed to the Bankers' Trust Company, plus the expenses of the Committee, a total of $\$ 583,623.08$. In this new and final allocation the receipts from living givers to the Committee on Men's Work were omitted, and the receipts from living givers to the General Board of Education were those which passed through the treasury of that Board. This final allocation revealed that your Committee had on hand a surplus of $\$ 30,534.24$, received from the Boards, as of August 1, 1921. It was necessary, as stated above, that in order to meet the obligation to the Bankers' Trust Company on August 1, 1921, and to cover all unforeseen and foreseen contingencies, your Committee should make an allocation of Certificates that would leave a surplus rather than a deficit. A deficit was not to be contemplated. The aim was to have this surplus as small as would be safe. Nevertheless, in order to suffer no disappointment in our purpose to pay in full the balance of the Interchurch Debt on August 1, 1921, your Committee arranged with the Land Title and Trust Company for a loan sufficient to cover any failure to receive from the Boards the necessary amount. Happily, this was not needed, but, on the contrary, there was on that day after paying the whole bill for principal and interest, a substantial balance of over $\$ 2,000.00$ which later on was increased to the above mentioned surplus.
22. The following table is the Final Allocation of Certificates of Indebtedness as of August 1, 1921, made October 31, 1921, to the Boards and Agencies entering into the transaction.

The first column shows the Receipts from Living Givers;
The second column shows the percentage of each Board's receipts;
The third column shows the final allocation of Certificates; The fourth column shows the amounts paid as of August 1, 1921;
The fifth column shows the surplus paid above the final allocation;
With the surplus, we deal later on in this report.
Your Committee before making this final allocation of Certificates, subtracted the amount of certificates taken as voluntary investments from the whole indebtedness to the Bankers' Trust Company, as follows:

and added to the remainder the expenses of the Committee, $\$ 257.31$.

The new amount thus obtained was $\$ 524,623.08$, which was apportioned to the Boards and Agencies according to the plan formulated by the General Assembly.

23. The Committee has received at different times from William H. Patterson, Comptroller of the New Era Movement, about $\$ 6,000.00$, contributions from the churches toward the Interchurch debt, as reported by him. This amount was paid to the Treasurer of the General Assembly, The Land Title and Trust Company, which on the suggestion of the Committee, opened a new account with the General Assembly, styled, "Retirement of and Interest onCertificates of Indebtedness," and credited the above amount to this account.
24. On November 7, 1921, your Committee had on deposit with the Land Title and Trust Company, Treasurer of the General Assembly in an account it had opened and styled "Liquidation of Interchurch Debt," $\$ 30,534.24$. This balance was created by the surplus received from the various Boards
and Agencies, over and above what was used in paying the indebtedness to the Bankers' Trust Company, and in meeting the expenses of the Committee. (The difference between this amount and the amount shown as surplus in the table above, is caused by the underpayment of the Committee on Evangelism, and the amount of the expenses of the Committee.) This balance, at the direction of your Committee was transferred by the Treasurer to the new account styled, "Retirement of and Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness." The Committee received from the Committee on Evangelism, interest from August 1, 1921, on account of deferred payment, $\$ 45.00$; and has still to receive from the Board of Education $\$ 375.00$ and the Committee on Sabbath Observance $\$ 7.50$. These amounts will, of course, be repaid to them when they receive the interest on their Certificates of Indebtedness, which draw interest from August 1, 1921. These payments of interest are to be deposited in the account "Retirement of and Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness," and will appear in such report as may be made in the future for that account.
25. Your Committee wishes to express its gratitude to all of the Boards and Agencies for the fine spirit of co-operation with it in its delicate and difficult task, and their willingness to comply with the wishes of the General Assembly. We are under special obligation to Ormond Rambo, Esq., who generously drafted the form for the Certificates of Indebtedness, and supervised the printing of them, a task requiring fine legal ability, and painstaking labor.
26. We would call the attention of the Executive Commission, and through it that of the Church, to the fact that the General Assembly of 1921 in authorizing the issuance of these Certificates of Indebtedness, declared that to the repayment of them and of their interest at the rate of $6 \%$, "the good faith of the Church is pledged." Happily, the obligation to the Bankers' Trust Company is fully discharged. But the debt has not been paid. It is only transferred from without the family to within it. It is now owed to the Boards and Agencies, which in a spirit of loyalty to the Church have invested their permanent funds in these Certificates of the Church. While it is a good investment for them and the security is gilt edged, it is only thus because the Church will surely repay to them principal and interest to the last cent. It will be the business of the Church during the next five years according to the plan quoted at the beginning of this report, to collect the money necessary to meet these sacred obligations. The Executive Commission should exercise all diligence to see that this is done.
27. Your Committee recommends:
28. That the Executive Commission appoint at once a "Committee on the Retirement of and Interest on the Certificates of Indebtedness."
29. That said Committee be instructed and empowered to supervise the work of obtaining the funds necessary from time to time to pay promptly and fully the principal and interest on these certificates.
30. That said Committee be directed to have deposited with the Treasurer of the General Assembly in the account " Retirement of and Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness" already opened, all monies collected and received for this purpose.
31. That said Committee be authorized to issue the necessary vouchers to the Treasurer of the General Assembly for payment from this account of principal and interest of the Certificates as the same may become due. 5 . That said Committee be directed to pay on Nov. 15, 1921, or as soon thereafter as possible, to the following Boards and Agencies, the following principal sums on the Certificates held by them, together with the accrued interest at $6 \%$ on the amounts thus paid to date of said payment, the same being in effect a partial refund with interest of the surplus paid by them as indicated in the table of final allocations of Certificates contained in item 21 of this report.

The report was received, its recommendations were adopted, and the Committee discharged with the thanks of the Commission for work done in a way rarely equalled in the affairs of the Church.

Dr. H. C. Swearingen, Mr. J. Willison Smith and Dr. George B. Stewart were elected by the Commission, the Committee referred to in Article 27, section 1, of the above report.

Your Committee on the Retirement of and Interest on the Certificates of Indebtedness would respectfully recommend the following addition to the Report of the Executive Commission, as found in the "Blue Book."

These Certificates bear date of August 1, 1921, with interest at six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually on January 1 st and July 1st.

The interest due on this total for 5 months to January 1st last was promptly paid, largely from funds received through the Central Receiving Agency.

The General Assembly last year referred to a Special Committee composed of "the representatives of the Boards and Agencies on the New Era Committee" the matter of raising $\$ 350,000$ for the liquidation of these Certificates and $\$ 150.000$ for the liquidation of the New Era Debt, and the payment of interest during the year 1921-1922. The result of that action appears in the Report of the Special Committee on the Interchurch and New Era Debts.

From that Report, it appears that the New Era Debt was not reduced during the year and that the amount transmitted to the Treasurer of the General Assembly toward the Interchurch Debt (now in the form of Certificates of Indebtedness) was $\$ 34,062.61$.

The Assembly must make adequate provision for the payment of the interest on these debts, and for the gradual reduction and ultimate liquidation of them. The plan of a particular sum added to the budget adopted a year ago has failed to produce needed revenues, and the Church in this respect is scarcely better off than then. Manifestly, some more effective method must be adopted. The Exeçutive Commission
has fully discharged the duty laid upon it by the Assembly of 1921, and in doing so, has at the mandate of the Assembly, pledged the faith of the Church through these Certificates of Indebtedness. This pledge must be kept. We believe that this pledge can be fully met through the plan proposed in resolution (4) p. 26 of our Report. We see no other way of meeting these obligations, and we most earnestly hope the Assembly will adopt the recommendation therein contained.

The Treasurer's books show that from the Central Receiving Agency and other sources there was received in the account, "Retirement of and Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness," $\$ 54,106.81$ and paid out $\$ 46,129$, leaving a Balance in this account, on March 31, 1922, of $\$ 7,977.81$.

On July 1, 1922, there will be due about $\$ 17,490$ interest on these Certificates. This interest must be paid, and there must be no defaulting in interest on any subsequent interest date. To guard against such contingency, we recommend the adoption by the Assembly of the following:
"That the Executive Commission be empowered to transfer, whenever necessary, from other funds in the Treasury of the General Assembly to the Account, "Retirement of and Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness," amounts needed for the payment of interest when due on the Certificates of Indebtedness, said amount to be returned to the accounts from which they were transferred when the funds in the account, "Retirement of and Interest on Certificates of Indebtedness," permit.

## VI. Tentative Budget of the Boards and Agencies for 1922-1923

1. Procedure. In preparing the Tentative Budget of The Boards and Agencies for 1922-23, the Executive Commission proceeded as follows:
(a). A Detailed Questionnaire was formulated in August and sent to all the Boards and Agencies. The object of this questionnaire was to obtain full information concerning the financial operation of the Boards and Agencies during the last four years, as to receipts and disbursements and investments also, as to their present status financially in all important points. The answers to this questionnaire were scheduled in the office of the General Assembly, and a copy furnished to each member of the Executive Commission and to each of the Boards and Agencies.
(b). Hearings were given to each of the Boards and Agencies at which, through its representatives, each Board and Agency was able to present its claims to the entire membership of the Executive Commission sitting as committee of the whole.
(c). A Preliminary Budget was then drafted by a Budget Committee of the Commission, and was carefully considered and amended by the Commission.
(d). This Preliminary Budget was then presented in the presence of the entire Commission, with full explanation, to a meeting of the representatives of all the Boards and Agencies, and ample opportunity given for questions. The representatives of the Boards and Agencies were then informed that the Commission would adjourn to meet next morning, when the Boards and Agencies would be heard by the Commission in the order in which their names appeared in the announcement of the budget percentages and amounts.
(e). After a separate hearing had been given to each of the Boards and Agencies desiring it, and by the full Commission, the General Assembly's Committee on Apportionment upon invitation of the Commission appeared in a body before the Commission, and were invited to give full expression to their individual opinions as to the total of the tentative budget and any other matters relating to the general principles involved in the making of the 1922-23 budget.
(f). Due consideration having been given to all the views, opinions, criticisms, and suggestions made by all the above mentioned parties and bearing in mind the specific instructions given by the General Assembly of 1921 (See Minutes pp. 104, 115, and 184), the Commission adopted the following for presentation to this General Assembly and announced it to the Boards and Agencies and to the General Assembly's Committee on Apportionment.
2. Tentative Budget. The Executive Commission recommends:
(1). That the Publicity Department be included in the tentative budget for the General Assembly for 1922-23, to the amount of $\$ 20,000$.
(2). That the list of Agencies participating in the budget be confined to those participating in the budget of 1921-22, together with those under direct control of the Assembly.
(3). That the Devastated Churches in Europe, the American Church in Paris and the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America be commended to the sympathetic and generous support of our churches.
(4). That out of all funds received from any source by any Board or Agency of the Church and creditable upon the budget (except funds received by the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions, the Woman's Board of Home Missions, and the Woman's Department of the Board of Missions for Freedmen) two per cent. thereof shall be paid quarterly to the Treasurer of the General Assembly, the Land Title and Trust

Company, and used for the payment and redemption of the Certificates of Indebtedness and interest thereon; and one per cent. thereof shall be paid to said Treasurer for the reduction and payment of the New Era debt and interest thereon, unless the giver or donor of said funds shall specifically direct that the sum shall not be used in payment or redemption of said Certificates or the reduction and payment of said New Era debt.
(5). We recommend the following budget for 1922-23:

## VII. A Day of Prayer

A Day of Prayer in connection with the announcement to the Church of the Tentative Budget and of the reasons for its adoption by the Commission, was approved by the Commission. The Moderator and the Stated Clerk were empowered to issue the call for such a day accompanying said call with such explanation as would commend it to the Church. Sunday, December 18, 1921, was duly set apart as such a Day of Prayer.

## VIII. The Every Member Plan Committee

The Committee on the Every Member Plan recommended to the Commission.

1. The placing of the Stewardship enrollment period in the Fall.
2. The naming of Sunday, March 12th, as the date of the Every Member Canvass for 1922.

The Commission approved these recommendations and transmits them to the Assembly for its information.

## IX. New Era Movement Expenses

The Committee appointed "to decide all questions relating to the final adjustment among the Boards and Agencies of the expenses of the New Era Movement for the year 1920-21,' met in the Office of the General Assembly, Philadelphia, Pa., Tuesday, January 24th, at 10.00 A.M.

All the members of the Committee were present, namely, Mr. J. Willison Smith, Rev. Louis B. Crane, D.D., and Rev. George B. Stewart, D.D., Chairman.

The Chairman presented a copy of the statement of "Receipts from living givers against budget items from April 1st, 1920 to March 31st, 1921," prepared by the Comptroller of the New Era Committee, Dr. W. R. Patterson. This statement had previously been sent by the Comptroller to each of the Boards and Agencies and their replies were presented to the Committee.

The Chairman reported that he had notified the Boards and Agencies and the New Era Committee, of this meeting, and had given them an opportunity to be heard. None of them had indicated any wish to be present.

The action of the Executive Commission taken at Atlantic City, Tuesday afternoon, November 15th, was read and is as follows:
"In the matter referred to the Commission by the Boards for a ruling relating to the apportionment of the expenses of the New Era Movement for the year 1920-21, in which it was submitted by certain of the Boards that there should be allotted to the General Board of Education a proportion based upon the amount received by its treasurer plus the amounts received by the colleges from givers to defray their current expenses and reported to the Board, it is the judgment of the Commission that it is concluded by the action of the General Assembly of that year fixing the manner in which such expenses should be paid. That action is as follows:
" 'The expenses incurred in the support and conduct of the New Era Movement shall be allotted to and met by the several Boards and Agencies of the Church on a pro rata basis, each Board and Agency having assigned to it that proportion of the whole amount, equal to the percentage of that Board and Agency's receipts to the sum total of the receipts of all the Boards and Agencies.' (See Minutes, 1920, p. 142, par. 6).
"The Commission believes the Assembly by this language intended the actual receipts passing through the treasuries of the Boards."

The Committee agreed that there was no occasion for interpreting this action of the Exccutive Commission, since the language is unmistakable, and that its sole duty consisted in determining the receipts from living givers of the various Boards together with the total amount of the same.

It appeared from the letters received from the several Boards by the Comptroller of the New Era Committee, that the statement sent them by him was acceptable. Therefore the Committee decided that the said statement be approved as the basis for computing the portion of the expenses of the New Era Committee to be paid by the respective Boards. The Statement is as follows:

The Chairman was directed to inform the Comptroller of the New Era Committee of this action and to authorize him to use this statement as the basis for determining the ratio of the expenses of the New Era Committee for each of the Boards and Agencies.

He was also directed to inform the several Boards and Agencies of the action of the Committee.

As to the general principle involved, the Executive Commission hereby recommends that the following method of
prorating the expenses of the New Era Movement among the participating Boards and Agencies be adopted by the General Assembly, and made applicable to 1921-1922 and future years.
(a). Each participating Board and Agency shall, as soon as possible after the close of each fiscal year, report to the General Secretary of the New Era Movement the entire sum received by or reported to said Board or Agency, on account of all the lines of work included in the askings of said Board or Agency, and placed by the Executive Commission in the annual budget of the fiscal year.
(b). The "entire sums" referred to in (a) are to be totaled and the ratios between these "entire sums" and said total shall determine the amounts to be paid by said participating Boards and Agencies on account of the expenses of the New Era Movement.

## X. The Finance Committee

The Finance Committee of the Executive Commission made the following report to the Commission:

[^0]The report was accepted and the recommendations adopted. The report is herewith presented to the Assembly for its information.

## XI. Department of Publicity

The Commission has supervised and directed the work of this Department through a Committee, which has maintained close connection with the Department, determining its policies, fixing its budget, passing upon its expenditures, keeping advised of the details of its work.

The original intention of the Assembly in constituting this Department has been kept in mind throughout the year, and we have been more successful in adhering to it than in any previous year, since this is the first year that the Department has functioned independently of the Magazine. It is to be borne in mind that the Assembly in constituting the Department had in mind the publicity needs of our whole Church. This is far more than publicity service for the Boards and benevolent agencies of the Assembly, although it includes it. The Church as a whole and its several parts, its multiplied activities and thousands of congregations, must have some channel through which they can effectively, quickly, reliably, and economically reach the public. This public in some cases is a local public, and in some cases, the whole country, sometimes is merely the church public and sometimes is the larger secular community.

The Boards have certain interests in this sphere which they severally can each best care for, but there are other interests which are best served by the Assembly's Department. Individual congregations and pastors can promote much of their local publicity without assistance, but there are numberless ways in which this Department can be and is of invaluable aid to them. We entertain the opinion that this Department has served the Boards and individual pastors and congregations in effective ways during the past year and is capable of even larger service in coming years as opportunity may afford.

Yet it is well for the Commission and for the Assembly to keep in mind the fact that this Department is an agency, not of the Boards nor of the individual churches but of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., and as such is an activity of the General Assembly. It is under the control of the Assembly through the Executive Commission and represents it in promoting all the wide and diverse interests of our great Church.

This is the consideration that indicates the source of its financial support. It would seem scarcely fitting for this support to fall to the Boards, since the Department serves them not as part of their organization, but because it is an agency of the Assembly. It is the Assembly caring for the publicity interests of the Boards at points where these
interests can be better cared for by the Assembly than by the individual Boards. It would appear, therefore, that it falls upon the Assembly to support its own agency.

The Department is not a benevolent agency of the Church although in many respects it serves all of these agencies. While at many points it promotes as part of its work these agencies, yet at the same time it also serves other great interests of the Church. For example, it promotes the spiritual work and interests of the Church as well as the financial, and independently of the financial interests. In the judgment of the Commission, it is more properly classed with the administrative Agencies of the Assembly than with the Benevolent Agencies.

Since it is an administrative, and not a benevolent, agency of the Assembly, the logical place for its budget would appear to be in the Assembly's Administrative Budget. So long as the Assembly wishes a Publicity Department it should provide for its maintenance in the same way that it provides for other Assembly expenses. The Commission has therefore included the Publicity Department in the Assembly's Budget, where in its judgment it more properly belongs.

In deciding upon the amount to be allowed the Department in this budget, the Commission was influenced not by the demands of the work but by the present financial condition of the Church. The demands of the work require many times the amount assigned to this Department in the budget. Some of our sister churches are expending hundreds of thousands of dollars for publicity and think it a most profitable expenditure. We could do likewise if we were prepared so to do. Instead of attempting to reach the limit of need, we have kept the budget to the minimum of expenditure for the past year and are recommending the minimum for the coming year. A Publicity Department cannot be run on a less sum and justify itself. Either the Assembly should appropriate the amount recommended or discontinue the work. If the Assembly wishes a Publicity Department it is needful to appropriate for the year 1922-23, $\$ 20,000$.

The Commission is of the opinion that the Department of Publicity should sustain the most cordial and influential relations with the Office of the General Assembly and, during the year, every effort has been made by the Department and by the Assembly's Stated Clerk to make this relationship as effective as possible. There are many considerations which would lead to the conclusion that the headquarters of the Department should be located either in, or in proximity to, the Office of the General Assembly, but it has been thought wise for the present to leave these Headquarters where they
are at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York. The Department has been during the year, and may be in a very increasing measure in coming years, a useful and valuable channel of the Office of the General Assembly for communication with the Church and the general public.

We take occasion to commend the ability, fidelity, and efficiency of Mr. Walter I. Clarke and Mr. Herbert H. Smith, the Director and Assistant Director respectively of the Department. These positions require men who are expert publicity men and who enjoy the confidence of publicity men and the newspaper world. We are particularly fortunate in having men who meet these requirements and who, for their love of the Church and its interests, are willing to put at its service not only their large fitness, but also their enthusiastic devotion.

The Commission has received for this Department during the past year $\$ 24,156.91$, of which $\$ 22,546.85$ was the proceeds of the $11 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ apportioned to the churches in the Assembly's Budget for 1920-21. Of this amount there has been expended prior to April 1, 1922, $\$ 17,958.03$. The principal items in the expense account were Refund to the New Era Magazine, $\$ 1,500$, Salary of the Director, $\$ 5,000$, Salary of the Assistant Director, $\$ 4,500$, Reporter to November 1, 1921, $\$ 1,603$, two stenographers, $\$ 2,600$, rent, $\$ 1,350$, Postage, $\$ 1,340$, Mimeographing and Printing, $\$ 1,342.48$. The Department had an income of $\$ 1,610.06$ from the sale of cuts to local churches and for services rendered to institutions and churches. The details of the finances of the Department will appear in the report of the Assembly's Treasurer, the Land Title and Trust Company, which has had charge of these as of other funds of the Assembly.

The balance in the Treasury on April 1, 1922, was needed to cover the expenses of the Department until the close of the Assembly, during which period the expenses are unusually heavyon account of the Assembly.

The Commission recommends:

1. That the Executive Commission be authorized and directed to maintain the Publicity Department of the Presbyterian Church at its highest possible efficiency, within the limits of the appropriation already made.

## Extract from Annual Report for 1921-22 of The Presbyterian Department of Publicity

The Department of Publicity of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A., during the year since the General Assembly of 1921, has continued the closest cordial relations with the press of the country and has secured the widespread publication_of
important constructive news concerning the work of the Church.

The great press associations, as well as individual newspapers, have rendered invaluable service to the church through the dissemination of Presbyterian news supplied by this Department.

Through the religious press the Department has kept the constituency of this and other denominations alert to the live facts of Presbyterian progress. Through the secular press the Department has conveyed a constant and forceful spiritual message to the great mass of the people.

Among the achievements of the past year are: 50,000 articles supplied to the public press; 800 photographs furnished to press; 3,120 personal letters to editors; 650 articles in telegraph service of press associations; 4,050 articles to parish papers; 21,500 copies Presbyterian Press Service circulated; 2,500 letters of publicity counsel written to local churches; 2,300 copies of church calendars circulated; 3,000 copies of Bulletin Board Sermonettes distributed; 435,200 total circulation of 4 booklets written; 434 advertisements written for Presbyterian institutions; 39 articles published on church publicity; 29 addresses made on church publicity; 5 conferences held on community church publicity; 637 electros of cuts sold churches.

In addition, 1,600 electros of cuts designed by the Publicity Department were circulated in conjunction with the New Era Movement for Every Member canvass and Self Denial week. Five denominations endorsed and used the Publicity Department's stewardship cuts. Unsolicited churches of other denominations sent paid subscriptions to Presbyterian Press Service.

It is manifestly impossible to procure complete returns as to the volume of newspaper publicity. But as a sample exhibit the following facts are accurate: Intensive effort was made in 19 cities visited by the Moderatorial party for Presbyterian Field Days, to assemble the actual newspaper clippings resulting from the work of the Director of Publicity. These clippings show a total of this Presbyterian news actually printed in these 19 cities amounting to 82 columns in papers whose total actual circulation was $10,877,000$ copies. In addition, there was much preliminary publicity on this occasion of which no record was obtained. Similar results were obtained throughout the country.

News concerning the Church as issued by the Department has related not only to the Office of the General Assembly and the boards and agencies but also to individual churches, presbyteries and synods. The Department has seduously
cultivated closer relations with synods and presbyteries, and where practicable has by personal representation at presbyterial and synodical meetings increased its efficiency. The Department hopes as far as funds permit, to extend further the coming year this personal relationship to synods and presbyteries.

The Department has increased with excellent results that branch of its service designed to aid individual churches in local publicity through the medium of home newspapers, church calendars and bulletin boards, parish papers and general printing, and has successfully promoted the use of paid newspaper advertising by local churches.

The Director earnestly recommends that our theological seminaries provide opportunity for instructing students in the practical use of printer's ink as a part of missionary and pastoral work.

One of the synods was so impressed with the effective publicity directed by this Department during the sessions of that synod that it voted to continue such publicity work, utilizing the services of a local school of journalism whose students were glad to volunteer their aid. This idea might with profit be adopted by other synods and presbyteries contiguous to a reputable school of journalism.

During the year the Department developed an enlarged Presbyterian Press Service. Originally a small mimeographed sheet, this is now a printed monthly the size of a standard newspaper page. It is sent to 2,150 pastors who ask for it and contains paragraphs of Presbyterian news, especially relating to the boards and agencies, for use in church calendars and parish papers; suggestions for Presbyterian news stories to be developed by pastors in their local newspapers; samples of display advertising for churches; and other practical helps.

The opportunities for Christian service by the Presbyterian Department of Publicity are limited only by the funds available and by the capacity of the small working force. This service continues to be such a joy and inspiration to the staff of the Department that the Director and his associates, seeing the vast field of opportunity, earnestly ask from the church membership its constant co-operation and full support.

## XII. Charter of the Board of Church Erection Fund

The Boards of Church Erection, Home Missions, and General Education appeared before the Commission with reference to the problems involved in the adjustment of their several lines of building operations; the Board of Church Erection being represented by Dr. J. C. Bruce and Dr. R. S. Inglis, the Board of Home Missions by Dr. John McDowell, and the General Board of Education by Dr. Edgar P. Hill.

After giving careful consideration to the questions involved, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:
"That the Board of Church Erection be directed to secure as soon as possible such an amendment of its Charter as will permit the Board to carry out the mandate of the Ceneral Assembly (see Minutes 1921, p. 204, sections 4 and (6), in making said Board of Church Erection the building Agency of the Church, and thus enable it to co-operate more fully with the building projects of other Boards."

Upon motion, Thomas D. MeCloskey, Esquire, a member of the Commission, was appointed to look into the legal questions involved, and represent the Commission up to and during the next meeting of the General Assembly in all matters relating to the amendments to the Charter of the Board of Church Erection.

## XIII. New Narrative Blank

Mr. Nathan G. Moore, Vice-Moderator and Acting Chairman of the Special Committee on Christian Life and Work submitted a verbal report with reference to the Narrative Blank, and in accordance with the action of the General Assembly (see Minutes 1921, p. 161), as follows:
"That the Special Committee on Christian Life and Work be hereby authorized to continue its labors for another year in behalf of an improved Narrative Blank, and when completed, to circulate it among the churches as a tentative plan for one year and report upon its acceptance to the next Assembly, with the proviso that the new blank shall first be submitted to the Executive Commission for its approval before being circulated."

The report was received, and a Committee consisting of Dr. George B. Stewart, Mr. J. W. Smith, and Dr. L. S. Mudge was appointed with power to receive the Narrative Blank when put in form by the Special Committee on Christian Life and Work, and to render a decision thereon.

The Committee unanimously approved of the "Survey and Report" Blank submitted to it by the Special Committee on Christian Life and Work.

## XIV. Overture 1402

The Special Committee of the Commission appointed for the purpose, submitted a report with reference to Overture 1402. This report was adopted and is as follows:

Overture 1402 on the Duties of a Stated Clerk of Presbytery, asked the Assembly to make specific deliverances on certain matters presented in detail. It is recommended that
this overture be referred to the Executive Commission for formulation of a statement defining the works "properly required" in Chapter 20, Form of Government. The Executive Commission is directed to report their findings to the next General Assembly. (Minutes 1921, p. 200.)

Chapter XX. Form of Government. Every judicatory shall choose a clerk to record their transactions, whose continuance shall be during pleasure. It shall be the duty of the clerk, besides recording the transactions, to preserve the records carefully; and to grant extracts from them, whenever properly required; and such extracts, under the hand of the clerk, shall be considered as authentic vouchers of the fact which they declare, in any ecclesiastical judicatory, and to every part of the Church.

The Executive Commission would respectfully recommend to the General Assembly the following answer: and suggests that said answer be referred to the Standing Committee on Polity for examination and report to this Assembly.

## Extracts Are Properly Required.

(a). When requested by vote of the judicatory of which the clerk is an officer, or of a superior judicatory.
(b). When requested in writing by a member (minister or elder Commissioner) of the judicatory of which the clerk is an officer.
(c). When requested in writing by the Session of a Church under the jurisdiction of the judicatory of which the clerk is an officer.
(d). When requested by one of the original parties or his officially recognized counsel, in a case of discipline of review, of reference, of complaint, or of appeal.

Provided, however, that under no circumstances whatever shall a clerk grant an extract or extracts from records of the judicatory of which he is clerk, when in doubt as to his right so to do under the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., as contained in the Form of Government and the Book of Discipline until he shall have presented the request for an extract or extracts from his records to the judicatory of which he is clerk and has received instructions from said judicatory as to his duty in the premises.

## XV. Washington City Presbytery Memorial

The Committee on the Washington City Presbytery Memorial made a report of progress as follows:

The committee was impressed with the need of a more worthy representation of Presbyterianism in Washington,
and with the plans of individual churches of the Prestevery for more adequate facilities, and was of the unanimous opmion that the Church at large should render substantial assistance in carrying out a well-considered program, when such a program shall be presented.

A conclusion has, however, not yet been reached as to the form which the Church's aid should take.

At the suggestion of the committee, the National Capital Church Extension Committee for the Presbytery of Washington City is now in process of organization.

It is expected that the matured plans of this committee may be laid before the Executive Commission at an early date.

Since this report was made to the Executive Commission we have been advised that the organization of the Capital City Church Extension Committee of the Presbytery of Washington City has been completed. A large and representative Committee has been appointed with the Rev. Charles Wood, D.D., of the Church of the Covenant as President.

The first task of this committee was the preparation of a pamphlet setting forth the needs of the Presbyterian Church in the Capital and indicating certain great objects toward which the benevolence of the Church might be directed.

That pamphlet has been placed in the hands of all the Commissioners of this Assembly.

You have therefore been made aware of the situation and, we trust, have been convinced of the advisability of some action such as we shall presently submit for your approval.

Presbyterians were vitally influential in the foundation period of this nation. The historian Bancroft, said: "The Revolution was a Presbyterian measure so far as it was affected by religion." We are proud to remember that the only clergyman, who was a member of the Continental Congress, was a Presbyterian, Rev. John Witherspoon. His strong support caused the wavering Congress to adopt Jefferson's Declaration. It is said that by his suggestion and influence the principle of representative government embodied in our national Constitution was borrowed from the Constitution of the Church of Scotland.

The signers of the Mecklenburg Declaration, the forerunner of our Declaration of Independence, were all Calvinists. Nine were Presbyterian elders and one a Presbyterian preacher.

It is not undue presumption for Presbyterians to claim a considerable share in the foundation of the United States and in its phenomenal early history.

The spirit of our Scottish ecclesiastical ancestors was the
spirit of our political forebears: resistance to tyranny, the right of the governed to a share in the privileges and responsibilities of government.

Fervid loyalty to the government has always been characteristic of our Presbyterian fellowship. We repudiate any organic relation between Church and State; nevertheless we believe that the spirit of loyalty to the principle of our Presbyterian government makes us devoted to the same principle in the government of the nation.

So we have had Presbyterian elders who have sat in the presidential chair. Presbyterians have also been Justices of the Supreme Court, representatives and senators in the Congress, and a considerable number of Presbyterians have held cabinet positions.

We are proud that our Church has been so useful to the nation in training so many who have held high positions in the government.

In years gone by our beloved Church has claimed and fulfilled her fair share of responsibility for the spiritual life of the capital.

Officials of our nation have worshipped with our congregations. One of our churches was the place of worship of a number of our Presidents, including the immortal Lincoln, who was accustomed to seek calm for his wearied spirit and strength for his terrific ordeal in the house of God.

But now our Washington brethren come to us to say that our churches in Washington are no longer able to minister adequately to the spiritual life of the city, and that their equipment is not adequate for their task.

Other religious bodies, other denominations of Protestantism whose history has no such vital connection with the nation's life and growth as has the history of the Presbyterian Church, have far more impressive representation in Washington than we have.

It is significant also that this representation has been made possible in all cases, not by supcrior loyalty on the part of local congregations, but by the liberal gifts of the national organizations of those churches.

We therefore offer the following resolutions:
Resolved, That the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. hereby affirms its sympathy with the proposal of the Presbytery of Washington City to secure for the Presbyterian Church a representation in the capital city which shall worthily express the dignity and power of our denomination.

Resolved, That the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. hereby affirms its conviction
that the erection and maintenance of Presbyterian institutions in the city of Washington are matters in which the whole church is concerned and in which the whole church should have a part.

Resolved, That the Cieneral Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. hereby urges the National Capital Church Extension Committee of the Presbytery of Washington City to present to the Church definite proposals which shall seek to secure for the denomination adequate representation in the national capital; and that the Executive Commission be and hereby is instructed to coöperate with the National Capital Church Extension Committee of the Presbytery of Washington City in the formulation of such proposalis.

## XVI. Dubuque University

The Report of the Committee of the General Assembly, on Dubuque University (see Minutes 1921, p. 118), was presented by the Chairman of the Committee, Dr. Zenos.

The following were heard, representing the Synod of the West (German): Rev. J. E. Drake, Holland, Iowa, member of Board; Rev. S. G. Manus, Forreston, Illinois, member of Board; Mr. Evert Klinkenberg, George, Iowa.

And, the following, representing the Board of Trustees: Rev. William Hiram Foulkes, New York City, Pres. Board of Directors; Oliver R. Williamson, Chicago, Illinois, member of Board and Executive Committee; Glenn Brown, Esq., Dubuque, Iowa, Secretary Executive Committee of Board.

The report of the Assembly's Committee was approved, and its recommendations adopted, which are as follows:
"1. Place the financial responsibility and control explicitly" in the Board of Directors, its officers and committees, and make the Treasurer of the college an officer of, and responsible to, the Board.
" 2 . Close the fiscal year with the college year, June 30, and require an annual financial report to follow an adopted form, which shall be detailed, explicit and complete.
"3. Establish an effective budget system, to govern and limit all current expenditures and provide that no officer, committee, or employee shall have authority to exceed any adopted item of expenditure therein, without the explicit authority of the Board or the Executive Committec.
"4. Reorganize the faculties of the three departments (the Theological Seminary, the College of Liberal Arts, and the Academy) by sharply differentiating between them, placing each as at present under a separate dean or principal, and cultivating an esprit de corps in each with no loss of mutual loyalty and organic feeling for the whole University.
" 5 . Establish and maintain at least four chairs in the Theological Seminary, filled by men who devote their entire time to their work. Increase the endowments of the chairs, and make a full statement to the individual churches of the Synod of the West (German) of the condition of the Seminary, both financial and educational.
" 6 . Require from the heads of the departments in the College the degree of M.A. from some college or university of standing. Also maintain a full number of professors, giving full time to college work as required by the North Central Association of Colleges.
"7. Select and appoint as principal or dean of the Academy a man especially trained for the work both as a disciplinarian and pedagogue. Also keep in accord with the regulations of the Association of Secondary Schools in order that the work done in the Academy may receive full credit for entrance in other colleges. Further, secure a survey in an educational way of the situation in the Academy by the Dean of the Department of Education of the State University of Iowa and carry out such recommendations as may be made. Such survey would be authoritative, and would furnish a basis for change and growth.
"8. Re-establish harmony in the faculty and as between the faculty and the administration by careful but conservative recognition and change of personnel. The Board of Directors has done much toward this end and may be trusted to continue and complete the work."

## XVII. Invitations for the Meetings of the General Assembly

At the request of the Stated Clerk, the Executive Commission unanimously recommends the adoption of the following Standing Rule.

Beginning with the General Assembly of 1923, and thereafter until further notice, invitations for the annual meeting of the General Assembly, to receive the consideration of the Assembly's Committee on the Next Place of Meeting, must be in the hands of the Stated Clerk in the Office of the General Assembly, at least one month previous to the date of the opening day of the meeting of the General Assembly rext preceding that for which said invitation is extended.

## XIX. Committee on Supplies

Following instructions of the General Assembly, of 1913, the Executive Commission appointed a committee consisting of three members; one representing the Executive Commission, one the Boards and Agencies, and one the membership of the Church, to be known as the Committee on Supplies. This committee has been continued from year to year and is at present composed of Mr. Henry F. Scheetz, for the Boards and Agencies; and Mr. Thomas W. synnott, for the Church at large. Mr. J. Willison Smith has been appointed to take the place of Mr. A. B. Endicott (recently deceased), for the Executive Commission.

The Manufacturer of the Board of Publication has conferred with several of the Boards and the Office of the General Assem-
bly, regarding the purchase of stationery, fixtures, etc., and finds that a general standardization is not practical or economical. Regarding the various kinds of printing he has learned that in almost all cases where it is expedient, estimates have been secured and orders placed with the lowest bidders.

In the purchase of paper for printing the Reports of the Boards, the Chairman has ordered a supply sufficient to meet the needs of all the crganizations, with one or two exceptions; the estimate representing a figure about $\$ 1,600.00$ below the price paid last year. By buying in such a large quantity quite a saving has been made, and a uniform grade of paper has been secured.

The vote on the question "Shall a Trustee or Trustees of the General Assembly be elected this year?" was answered in the affirmative, and the election appointed for Thursday at 7.30 P.M.

## Chosen Commission

The Report of the Chosen Commission was presented by its Chairman, Rev. Thomas R. Good, and pending the adoption of the report, the Assembly was addressed by the Rev. J. G. Holdcroft of the Korea Mission, the Rev. Wm. A. Waddell, D.D. of the Brazil Mission, the Rev. R. J. Dosker of the Japan Mission, and the Rev. Reuben A. Torrey, D.D. The report of the Commission was adopted and is as follows:

## Foreign Mission Field Administration

The Chosen Commission reports that in accordance with the instructions of the General Assemblies of 1920 and 1921 (Minutes of General Assembly 1920, pp. 94-96;1921, pp. 96-100), it attended the Post-War Conference of Foreign Missionaries, and, after carefully reviewing the Findings of that body formulated a tentative report which was submitted to the Board of Foreign Missions and the Various Missions of the Church, that they might consider the same and propose any desired changes.

On the basis of the suggestions received, the report was reconsidered in all its bearings, and the Commission now recommends that the following Interpretations and Definitions of relations between the Board and the Missons and Regulations concerning the administration and organization of work on the field be adopted, and printed in the Board's Manual.

## Interpretations and Definitions

1. The Commission "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to the whole creation" (Mark 16:15) was given to the whole Church, and the work of evangelizing non-Christian nations is the responsibility of all Christians. "The Church itself is the first Missionary Society."
2. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A., acting on behalf of the whole Church and in accordance with the provisions of its Constitution, conducts the work of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church by a Board appointed for that purpose.
3. The Board of Foreign Missions is the agent of the General Assembly for organizing, supporting and administering the work of Foreign Missions. It is amenable to the General Assembly, and reports its proceedings every year for review and approval. It has complete supervision of the whole Foreign Mission work of the Church, subject only to such directions as may be given from time to time by the General Assembly.
4. The missionaries on the field are representatives of the whole Presbyterian Church. Ordained ministers are subject to the jurisdiction of the Presbyteries of which they are members in all matters pertaining to their ministerial standing. As missionaries, in common with all others appointed by the Foreign Board, they are necessarily under the direction and control of the Board as the agent of the General Assembly.
5. The Missions are the agents of the Board of Foreign Missions for organizing and administering the work on the field. Their powers are delegated by the Board, with the approval of the General Assembly, and are defined in the Board's Manual. They regularly report all actions to the Board for review and approval. The Mission is not a permanent institution. It is a necessary organization in the first stages of evangelization, but aims to build up as soon as possible an indigenous Church, which shall be self-propagating, self-supporting and selfgoverning, and prepares and encourages the native Church to complete the work of evangelization in the mode best suited to its own national genius.

## Administration and Organization

## 1. The Mission: How Constituted.

In general a Mission consists of all foreign missionaries under appointment by the Board within specified territorial limits. No missionary shall have a right to vote
until after at least one year's service in connection with the Mission and until he or she shall have passed the language examinations appointed for the first year (Manual, Par. No. 28), and shall have been assigned to definite:work. The married women missionaries are subject to the provisions of Paragraphs 28 and 39 of the Manual, as amended above.
2. Powers of the Mission.

The Mission has the general care and supervision of all work within its limits. In all field matters it has the right of initiative. The Board may also exercise the right of initiative in conference and agreement with the Mission. All questions of Mission policy and method, and of expenditure within the budget of the Board for the Mission, are subject to the decision of the Mission, but the right is reserved to the Board of supervisory action and authority where any problems involve relations with other Boards and denominations, or relations and interests wider than those of any particular field, and where fundamental questions of mission policy affecting other Missions or the relation of Missions and Governments are concerned.

In the exercise of such supervisory authority, however, it is the policy of the Board not to engage in new union work within the territory of any Mission if such work is against the judgment of the Mission, un'ess directed to do so by the General Assembly.

Among the matters recognized as distinctly within the functions and powers of the Mission are the following:
(1) The assignment and supervision of the work of individual missionaries.
(2) Liberty of transfer from one object to another of appropriations for the conduct of native work on the field.
(3) Distribution of undesignated grants.
(4) Determination of all regular and emergency furloughs in accordance with the regulations of the Board on Terms of Service and Furlough.
(5) Organization of the Mission and determination of the powers and duties of its various committees.
(6) Special rights delegated to Councils, as in China and India.
(7) Use in the work of funds earned by members of the Mission.
(8) Use in the work of money accruing from the rental of property on the field.

All requests requiring the adtion of the Board should be accompanied by the action of the Mission upon them. Tours of exploration or any musuad work shoukd be undertaken only with the advice of the Mission.

The successful application of the principle of self-govermment on the field in hamony with the Board's rosponsibility to the Cieneral Assembly for the whole Foreign Missionary enterprise of the Church requires the cordial cooppration of the Board and the Missions, and the exercise in the highest degree of mutual patience and forbearance, so that the work may be promoted in heartiest agreement and unity. If however, differences arise between the Board and a Mission which cannot be adjusted satisfactorily by conference, appeal may be made to the General Assembly. Mission Minoritics and individual missionaries also have the right of appeal in all matters of their concern. But the right of appeal should not be resorted to except for grave reasons, and the controversial spirit should be guarded against as injurious to the work and contrary to the true spirit of Christ.

The Commission further reports that it has made careful investigation into the correlations of the Board and Missions with the native Churches. In some countries the native Church has already become self-propagating, and selfgoverning, and almost entirely self-supporting. In others rapid progress is being made in that direction. This is cause for rejoicing, and we recommend that the General Assembly express its heartiest sympathy with the progressive spirit thus manifested and give its encouragement both to the Missions and the native workers in their fine work together. Inasmuch, however, as there is no uniformity, either in conditions or the stages of development in the different fields where our Missions are established, it is impossible to formulate any rules which could be made of general application. We believe, therefore, it is wiser for the General Assembly to leave to the Board and Missions the utmost freedom of action in coöperating with the native Churches, with confidence that experience will indicate the paths of wisdom in each individual field, and the Spirit of God will guide the Church today as truly as He guided the Church of the Apostolic Age.

## Reorganization and Consolidation Report

The Report of the Special Committee on the Reorganization and Consolidation of Ássembly Agencies was presented by its Chairman, Rev. John Timothy Stone, D.D., L.L.D.,
and on motion, the Assembly approved the consideration of the report seriatim by its Parts I, II, and III.

It was ordered that in the discussion, each speaker should announce his name, his presbytery, and his relation to any agency involved in the discussion.

A motion submitted by the Rev. W. O. Thompson, D.D., LL.D., was duly seconded, and carried as follows:
"That the report be received and that we now proceed to consider the three resolutions of Part I, seriatim, and vote 'aye' or 'no' upon them."
It was ordered that each speaker be limited to five minutes.
The Rev. Edgar F. Knickerbocker, of the Presbytery of San Joaquin, opened the discussion.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the time was extended one-half hour.

The Rev. William T. Hanzsche of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, The Rev. G. C. Shaw, D.D., of the Presbytery of Cape Fear, the Rev. Edwin A. McAlpin, Jr., D.D., of the Presbytery of Morris and Orange, Elder H. P. Faris, of the Presbytery of Sedalia, the Rev. Walter D. Harrell of the Presbytery of Cincinnati, and the Rev. David R. Wylie of the Presbytery of New York, continued the discussion.

The previous question being called for and carried, and the hour of adjournment having arrived, the time was again extended fifteen minutes.

The Assembly then proceeded to vote on the three resolutions of Part I as called for by the previous question, which were adopted and are as follows:

## PART I.

Resolved, That in order to effectuate the recommendations of the Special Committee on Reorganization and Consolidation of the Boards and Agencies of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America, appointed by the General Assembly of 1920 and continued and enlarged by the General Assembly of 1921; and in order to simplify and improve the work of said Boards and Agencies, the following action be taken:

1. That the work of the following Boards and Agencies of the Church; namely:
2. The Board of Foreign Missions
3. The Board of Home Missions
4. The Woman's Board of Foreign Missions
5. The Woman's Board of Home Missions
6. The Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work
7. The General Board of Education
8. The Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation
9. The Board of the Church Erection Fund
10. The Board of Missions for Freedmen
11. The Board of Tenperance and Moral Welfare
12. The Permanent Committee on Evangelisur
13. The Permanent Committee on Men's Work
14. The Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance
be committed to and hereafter carried on by the following Boards:
(a) The Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A.
(b) The Board of National Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A.
(c) The Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A.
(d) The Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.
15. That the said existing thirteen Boards and Agencies be continued as now constituted, in organization and function until such time as the new Boards are duly incorporated, organized and capacitated to assume their obligations.
16. That the charters of existing Boards whose work is transferred to other Boards are to be retained, and obligations and operations thereunder continued by the new Boards, until there shall have been accomplished all technical and legal adjustments necessary to complete transference; and as long thereafter as may be necessary in order to protect the title and possession of property owned or controlled by the existing Boards.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. John Allan Blair, D.D., of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, to lead the devotions at noon on Tuesday.

At the request of the Stated Clerk, the Standing Rules of the Assembly were suspended, the docket for Tuesday forenoon re-arranged, and the Assembly ordered to reconvene at 8.30 A.M. Tuesday.

The Assembly then adjourned to meet at S.30 A. M. Tuesday and was closed with prayer by the Rev. H. L. McCrory, D.D.

A popular meeting was held at 7.45 P.M. in the interest of the work of the Board of Missions for Freedmen.

The Assembly met and was opened with prayer by the Rev. R. J. Williams.

The Assembly approved a change in the docket, ordering that Assembly be seated according to its Electing Sections at 2.30 P.M. on Wednesday, in order to receive the Mileage checks from the Treasurer.

## Work In Europe

The special Committee on Work in Europe, presented its report through its C'hairman, Rev. Sylvester W. Beach, D.D., and pending the adoption of the recommendations, the Assembly was addressed by the Rev. Kenneth D. Miller. The
report and its recommendations wore adonted, and :are in follows:

The General Assembly's Committee on Wrork in Eumonw herewith presents its amual report for the year emding Wateln 31, 1922.

The General Assembly of 1921 reconstituted it: ('ommittoe by transferring to it the unfinished work of the (implal Assembly's Committee to Administer the Fund for the . Lid of Protestant Churches in Europe. The persomel of the Committee was also enlarged to inchude representation of all the interests formerly served by both the special committom and the Standing Committee. The wisdom of this action of the Assembly is increasingly apparent. There will doubthes continue to be opportunities and responsibilities confronting our Church in behalf of American people temporarily residing in various sections of Europe. The maintenance of Englishspeaking churches and the development of the fully-rounded work of the Church in a large number of European centers will inevitably be a part of the permanent program of the Committee. It is not surprising, however, in view of the pressing character of the present emergency confronting the Protestant Churches of Europe, that the attention of the Committee should be largely directed to those phases of its: task which have arisen out of war conditions. The Committee desires to inform the General Assembly that in its judgment these emergencies are more disturbing and appealing than ever before. It believes that if the Church-at-large were to know the full measure of need that is confronting our own Protestant Brethren in the war-stricken countries of Europe. and particularly our brethren of the Reformed Churches, it would place this cause at the very forefront of its stewardship and prayer, sympathy and gifts.

The Committee respectfully calls the attention of the General Assembly to the fact that it has served practically without administrative expense. Its executive officers give their time without salary cost to the Committee; office space and stenographic assistance are provided without cost to the Committee by the New Era Movement and the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions. The only items involving administrative overhead are those pertaining to a modest amount of printing and postage. The Committee, being constituted with representatives of the Boards of Home Missions, Foreign Missions and Church Erection, with the New Era Movement, as well as representatives of the Church-at-large, has been able to serve the Church in a co-operative and representative capacity. It believes that for the period of emergency, at least, its work can better be carried on by a

Committee constituted as the Committee on Work in Europe is now constituted, than by one of the established Boards of the Church.

At a meeting of the Committee held December 19, 1921, it was unanimously resolved to call attention to the facts:

First, That the charter of the Board of Foreign Missions has been interpreted not to permit the Board to carry on its work in nominally Christian lands;

Second, That the Board of Home Missions has by its policies been limited to work under the American flag;

Third, That the Committee on Work in Europe has been constituted from the beginning with members of the Boards of Foreign and Home Missions and Church Erection, as well as with members from the Church-at-large;

Fourth, That in the judgment of the Committee it would have been a serious error for a new committee to have been constituted by the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. to set up work in Christian lands where our Reformed and Protestant brethren are already at work.

The Committee's. chief concern, however, is to see that the present emergencies are fully met, and it earnestly requests the General Assembly to see that full provision is made for the continuance and immediate enlargement of our work for the Protestant Churches of Europe, under whatever auspices it may seem wise to General Assembly to carry on this enterprise.

This Committee has labored under serious embarrassment during the last two years on account of the fact that its work was not included in the benevolence budget approved by the Executive Commission and apportioned to the churches. During the year ending March 31, 1921 the Committee was accorded a belated recognition by being recommended to the churches for a sum not to exceed $\$ 25,000$, to be secured out of undesignated gifts that might be provided by individual churches. The practical effect of this action, however, was to remove the Committee from the active benevolent support of the Church, and but for the interest of a small group, to leave the cause stranded.

In its report to the General Assembly of 1921, the Committee recommended that the General Assembly make provision for the work of this Committee during the fiscal year closing March 31, 1922, to the extent of $\$ 50,000$, "in addition to the sum included in the budget of the Boards and Agencies, and that the Assembly direct that hereafter this cause be placed in the regular benevolence budget of the Church." The Executive Commission of the General Assembly, at its meeting held in Atlantic City in November, 1921, for the
purpose of determining the benevoldence budget of the ('hurch for the year 1922-23, gave careful consideration to the appeal of the Committee to be included in the regular benevolence budget for the ensuing year. For reasons that appeared sufficient to the Executive Commission, it declined to comply with the request of the Committee, thus nullifying in effect the action taken by the General Assembly in 1921 in approving the report of the Committee, a pertinent paragraph of which has just been quoted. The Committee calls the attention of the General Assembly to the fact that the omission of this cause from the budget for the ensuing year is seriously jeopardizing its work. The Committee is therefore under obligation to request the General Assembly to permit it to make a widespread appeal for its work during the ensuing year, without interfering with the percentages already fixed for the budget of 1922-23.

The work of the Committee has been carried on in the closest co-operation with the Protestant bodies already existing in the various European countries. It has scrupulously followed the opportunity of supporting the local Protestant churches and educational institutions, helping to meet their demands as far as possible in accordance with their own expressed desires. The Committee has also worked in co-operation with other American denominations and through national committees abroad, which have been constituted by the representatives of the leading local churches. The settled policy of our Church not to extend its organization to Europe has guided the Committee in all its work. Our effort has been strictly confined to helping the historic Protestant churches already there, to re-establish themselves after the devastation of the war.

France and Belgium.-The work carried on by the Committee during former years in assisting the evangelical Protestant Churches of France and Belgium has been carried forward during the past year. A substantial conditional gift was pledged from the Laura Spellman Memorial Fund. As a result of generous individual contributions, largely secured through the unremitting activity of Mr. William Sloan Coffin, a member of this Committee, the Presbyterian Church was able to provide a fair share of the amount necessary to secure the conditional gift. It is felt by the Committee that the raising of the substantial sum proposed by the Commission on Relations with France and Belgium, appointed by the Federal Council, is a reasonable and worthy undertaking. In addition to the necessity for rebuilding a number of Protestant Churches, there is the equally important work of assisting in the educational work of the evangelical Churches
of France, notably in the theological seminaries. Substantial provision must also be made to assist the French churches in carrying on the enlarged Foreign Mission Work which has been committed to them as the result of the surrender of (ierman territory. It is hoped that if the co-operating Protestant Churches of America will contribute generously to their sister Churches in France and Belgium during the ensuing year, the work of the latter may be practically put upon a self-sustaining basis in the near future.

Italy.-The concerns of the Waldensian Church in Italy ought to continue to rest heavily upon the Protestant Churches of America, notably upon the members of the Reformed and Presbyterian Churches. In a peculiar sense the Waldensians are related to the American Churches holding the reformed system. It is unnecessary to rehearse the severe disappointment which came to the Waldensian Church through its failure to realize the sums originally placed by this Committee in its budget. The officers of the Waldensian Church accepted in good faith the effort of the American Presbyterian Church to secure substantial sums for them, and even went ahead making definite projections, only to be disappointed and confused. The Waldensian Aid Society is attempting to meet the Protestant emergency in Italy by an expansion of its program and by a wide-spread appeal to an increased American constituency. The Committee believes it is the duty of the Presbyterian Church to make a generous and even sacrificial contribution to these devoted people in Italy. It proposes to make such appropriations as its fund will justify during the ensuing year, toward the budget of $\$ 75,000$ asked by the Waldensian Society.

Hungary and Transylvania.-The work of the Committee among the Protestant Churches of Hungary and Transylvania has been seriously curtailed because of the limited funds received by the Committee. It was proposed at a meeting of the Committee held during the year to appropriate the sum of $\$ 10,000$, if so much were proportionately available, for the assistance of the Hungarian and Transylvanian Churches. The facts that the total receipts were so small and the situation in Czechoslovakia was relatively so important prevented the Committee from making any substantial appropriation to the Transylvania and Hungarian Churches. This omission is seriously to be regretted because of the pitiful condition in which our Reformed brethren are found in both of these countries.

Many of our ministers and teachers are eking out a bare existence. In Transylvania the government has announced its decision to withdraw all support from schools and from
congregations having less than three humdred member: This puts an almost unbearable burden upon the l'rotestant Churches. Funds are immediately and desperately necded for the purposes of giving physical relief to the minister's, providing teachers for the religious schools and providing teachers for religious instruction in the day schools. In addition, funds are being earnestly sought by the leaders of the Hungarian Reformed Church for the purpose of carrying on a significant evangelistic movement which is gathering forer in Hungary.

In order to take advantage of the rising tides of evangelistic interest and to meet the responsibilities caused by post-war conditions, the American Presbyterian Churches are asked to provide for a large number of evangelistic pastors who will be commissioned by the Hungarian Church to go from place to place stimulating the evangelistic zeal of their brethren. It is also desired by the leaders in the Reformed Church in Hungary greatly to enlarge the Sunday School operations of that Church, and funds are needed immediately for this purpose.

Czechoslovakia.-The major portion of the Committee's work during the present fiscal year has been centered upon Czechoslovakia. The Rev. Kenneth D. Miller, under the employ of the Board of Home Missions, has been sent by the Committee, co-operating with the Board of Home Missions, to Czechoslovakia, in order to bring assistance to the Protestant Churches there. In addition to Mr. Miller, certain other representatives have been sent, including the Rev. Messrs. Krenek and Dobias, whose addresses created such a profound impression upon the General Assembly of 1921. The Rev. Messrs. Laky and Sirny have also been sent. In each case there has been cordial co-operation on the part of the Board of Home Missions, the Presbytery, and interested individual churches, so that a minimum of cost to the Committee these earnest and faithful witnesses have been released for the assistance of their brethren overseas.

The opportunity in Czechoslovakia, according to all reportr, is unprecedented in modern history. Certain items from : report sent by Mr. Milier under date of February 2nd, will outline the urgency of the situation.
"On Sunday, January 15th, I preached to one of the new Czech Brethren congregations-at Brandys, not far from Prague. In 1914 there were just fifteen Protestants in the entire town of 15,000 ; now there are over 600 . some 500 were assembled the morning I preached, crowded into one of the rooms of the schoolhouse, sitting at the children's desks or standing in the back and out in the hall. This in
one of the places where a church building is absolutely necessary. They would require 500,000 crowns to build one, and they can raise 100,000 , but no more. They have the problem of training the new members, who are exCatholics not used to giving for the support of the Church, in stewardship. The town is strategically important because of its proximity to Stara Boleslav, a Catholic centre for pilgrimages, and because historically it was one of the strongholds of the Czech Brethren and one of the last places abandoned by them when they were forced into exile by the forces of anti-reformation. In the afternoon I drove across country five miles or so to preach in a little village where work has been started, but where preaching services are held not more than once every two months, owing to the scarcity of preachers. Again some four hundred people were assembled in the schoolhouse, and I found a rapt audience in these people, many of whom were attending a Protestant service for the first time. I had a two hours' walk across country to the railroad, but it was worth it.
"On January 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th, Mr. Krenek and I had a series of four lectures in various parts of Prague on the general theme 'The Legionnaires and our National Regeneration.' The lectures were held under the auspices of the Czech Brethren Church, but were designed especially for ex-legionnaires from Russia and Siberia who would know of me from my work there. Each evening we spoke to a crowded hall and to a most sympathetic and enthusiastic audience. At the last two meetings especially the crowd was tremendous, the people being crowded in almost to the suffocating point."
The "Kostnicke Jiskry," the Protestant weekly of Czechoslovakia, gives the following account of the ministry of Mr. Miller and Mr. Krenek:
"'The Legionnaries and our National Regeneration' was the theme of four lectures given in different parts of Prague on January $17-20$ by our dear guests, Rev. Kenneth D. Miller and Rev. Josef Krenek. There was a large attendance at each lecture, but at the last two lectures the crowd was so great that no one could move. Both speakers eloquently and fervently called the attention of their audience to our national virtues and faults. Taking as an example the life and efforts of the Siberian legionnaires, they urged their hearers to think through and live out the ideals and principles which were ruling for Masaryk and the legionnaires, and to help the nation as a whole to accept them as the foundation for its new national life. The
basis for a clean, strong and successful life was given long ago by Jesus of Nazareth as the Hussites and ('yech Brethren understood Him and interpreted Him. The great applause which was given to both lecturers evidenced not. alone the gratitude of the audience but its sympathy with their message, as well. Rev. Krenck is well known to us all as an eloquent spokesman of our thoughts and feelings, and he is given an ovation every time he appears. But this time a special welcome was given to Rev. Miller. He was a true "Uncle from America" to our boys in Siberia, having accompanied them through thick and thin on their long trek from Ukrania and Vladivostock. He was counted as one of them especially by the Third Regiment of Jan Zizka, so that Mr. Miller was able to proudly claim at the meeting at Zizkov that he was also a Zizkovak. He loves the Czech people. Ten years ago he studied the Czech language in Prague, and he perfected it in Siberia, so that now he speaks quite easily and has no difficulty in lecturing. He loved our Siberian soldiers and had many good words to say of them. But our legionnaires also remember him with affection. We saw that upon the occasion of the lecture at Zizkov. A deputation of legionnaires presented Mr. Miller with a large bouquet, made him an honorary member of the Zizkov Lodge of the Czechoslovak Legion, and in glowing words thanked him publicly for the service he rendered them in Siberia. Deeply moved, Mr. Miller recalled many episodes from the life of the legion in Siberia, laying stress on the great moral victory achieved by the men who came out of unhappy Russia with their health, honor and character unimpaired by the influence of the Russian anarchy. This series of lectures has made a great impression, and arrangements are being made for their repetition in other large centres in the Republic."
The Committee has wisely and scrupulously confined its work to the assistance of the Protestant Churches in Europe along spiritual lines. As Mr. Miller writes in his report:
"Undoubtedly these congregations need our help, but our help must be given them in such form that it shall be clear to them that it is for the strengthening of their spiritual life and not for their strengthening as exponents of Magyar culture or the Magyar national idea."
Mr. Miller also calls attention to the fact that there is immediate need of relief measures for some of the widows and orphans. He says that they need clothing, underwear and shoes for the pastors, their families and their widows. The response of the people to the ministry of the gospel in some of the outlying villages is indicated by the following items from Mr. Miller's report:
"After returning trom Bratislav, I went out into the country north of Prague to preach in one of the old congregations in the morning. It is a country church, situated in a little village of not more than 1,000 people. It was quite a cold day, and as the church with its stone walls and floors is absolutely umheated, it takes some courage to come out to service. We had some 400 people there. I preached in a heavy winter overcoat with a fur robe around my feet. One could see one's breath, and it was hard to get 'warmed up' to one's subject under the circumstances. In the afternoon I spoke in the church at Melnik, a town of some 15,000, chiefly noted for its wine. Here the Czech Brethren congregation has about doubled, numbering now over 1,200, and the church was packed the afternoon I was there. After the service we made several visits to different families of the congregation, and it was pleasant to enjoy their hospitality, and heart-warming to see enthusiasm in religious matters.
"This Sunday I am to speak to two entirely new congregations near Tabor, the historic gathering-place of the old Hussites and Czech Brethren. One congregation (Sobeslav) numbers 1,000 , meets in a brewery and is without a regular pastor. The other, in a little village, numbers 500. In neither of these towns was there a single Protestant two years ago."
Mr. Miller further outlines the great opportunity confronting the Church in these inspiring words:
"My impression that the Czechs are ready and waiting for a great religious movement is confirmed by new evidence every day. The doors are open everywhere, and I am sure that the majority of the Czechs would leave the Roman Catholic Church immediately if there were men to preach to them and to shepherd them after their conversion. The people are turning to Methodism, Theosophy, Spiritualism, New Thought, Christian Science, Unitarianism, Salvation Army-grasping at any straw which holds out hopes of giving them a real religion. Any meeting on a religious subject is sure to be largely attended, and no special publicity measures are needed. The ministers here do not have to run after their people, and use all sorts of 'followup' methods to induce them to go to church. Rather it is the people who are running after the ministers and begging them to hold services for them. Every single man now on the field could be kept busy preaching every night, and still the demand would not be met. Anyone who comes in contact with this intense longing for God on the part of the people, cannot help but feel uplifted by it. It is a refresh-
ing and inspiring experience, for one who has had ahwe to combat religious indifference, to suddenly witness widespread and gemuine enthustasm for religion."
Mr. Miller's practical recommendations which have appealed to the Committee with cogeney and foree, are summarized in the following words:
"But also, I am convinced that the ('zech Brethren Church will not prove adequate to the present emergeney without our help. That help I believe should take the form of a considerably large sum of money put at the disposal of a representative of our own Church, an American Czech or other American trained man, and devoted (1) to the training of leaders here, (2) to the maintenance of traveling missionaries, (3) to the establishment and temporary maintenance of several demonstration centres of city work and country work and (4) to assistance in church buildings. I do not think it wise to send over many men from America as workers, first, because it is comparatively expensive, and second, because few of them would be satisfied to settle here under the conditions which surround the pastorate in a state church. But workers can be trained here easily if facilities can be provided for their training and for their maintenance for a time. The church here needs the assistance of men who are free from the restrictions of the state, and who have resources to fall back upon, to demonstrate what a church can mean either to a city or to a country community. And lastly, they must have buildings. They are most expensive now, and beyond the reach of most congregations, but American money, given now when the exchange is still favorable, can do much. Only yesterday, a small congregation of 800 people, every one a convert from Rome, asked me for 10,000 crowns to complete their building fund: It is only $\$ 200$, but I had to put them off. I can see no way of effectively helping these churehes without money. My presence here is a help, I am sure. They are anxious that I stay as long as possible. But I can do very little without some money: The same is true of Krenek, and will be of every one who comes over here. The Methodists are spending $\$ 150,000$ a year in Czcchoslovakia alone, and we have nothing to offer but our good will."
In order to present to the General Assembly in brief compass the financial requirements of the Committce's work for the ensuing year, the following tabulations of proposed appropriations is presented. A total budget of $\$ 2.50,000$ would be far from meeting the really imperative needs of our brethren in Europe, but on that seale the following approximate distribution might be made:

It is understood that the foregoing schedule of appropriations is subject to adjustment by the Committee, and also subject to the amount of money that may be received by the Committee during the ensuing year.

The following recommendations are respectfully submitted for the consideration of the General Assembly:

1. That the General Assembly heartily endorses the plans and policies of its Committee on Work in Europe and instructs its Committee to carry on both the emergency and more permanent part of its task with increasing vigor during the coming year.
2. That the General Assembly approve of the principle adopted by its Committee of supporting local Protestant Churches and educational institutions, helping to meet their demands as far as possible in accordance with their own expressed desires, and without any purpose of extending our Presbyterian Church to these countries.
3. That the General Assembly approve the plan already adopted by the Committee of working in hearty co-operation with other American denominations and through national committees abroad which have been constituted of representatives of the leading local churches.
4. That the General Assembly approve the effort of the Churches co-operating through the Federal Council's Commission on Relations with France and Belgium and the Federal Council's Commission on Work in Europe, to secure a sufficient sum of money to enable the Protestant Churches of Europe to meet their present pressing responsibilities.
5. That the General Assembly authorize its Committee on Work in Europe to make a thorough-going effort to secure a sufficient sum during the ensuing fiscal year for the relief and assistance of the Churches of Europe, for whose help the Committee on Work in Europe has been reconstituted; it being understood that there will be no interference with the percentages already approved in the benevolence budget of 1922-1923.
6. That the General Assembly solemnly reinforce the claim of the struggling Protestant Churches of Europe upon the conscience and generosity of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A., and that it call upon all of its constituent bodies to rally to the support of theil fellow-servants over-seas in the hour of their great need and unprecedented opportunity.

## Judicial Business

The Standing Committee on Judicial Business, through its Chairman, Rev. S. T. Wilson, D.D. , presented a report recommending the following references, which was adopted, as follows:

(1) A petition of Rev. John McElmoyle, D.D., asking a review and revision of his case.

## To the Committee on Theological Seminaries.

(1) A petition of Rev. Alois Barta, Ph.D., asking for a review of the action of the Directors of the University of Dubuque.
(2) A petition of Rev. Wm. C. Laube, D.D., asking for a review of the action of the Director's of the University of Dubuque.

## To the Committee on Polity.

(1) The reply of the Presbytery of Pecos Valley to the request made of said presbytery, upon recommendation of the Committee on Polity, by the General Assembly of 1921, for the reasons for the action taken by the presbytery in 1916, in the case of Rev. H. C. Rimmer.
(2) A petition of the Elkton (Md.) church to be transferred from the Presbytery of New Castle to the Presbytery of Baltimore.

The committee also reports that the Stated Clerk of the Synod of Illinois has certified that Rev. E. N. Ware had been granted permission to withdraw and had withdrawn the paper he presented to the General Assembly of 1921, and that thus no further action in the matter is needed.

The following resolution, presented by the Special Committee on Church Coöperation and Union, through its Chairman, Rev. J. Ross Stevenson. D.D., LL.D., was approved.

That the Joint Committee on Comity endorse the proposed plan for coöperation among the Home Mission agencies of the Reformed Council of Churches by which these agencies shall endeavor to do together, wherever practicable, mission work they are now doing separately.

On nomination by the Special Committee on Church Coöperation and Union, the following were elected a Committee to coöperate with the Commission on France and Belgium of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America in celebrating the Huguenot Walloon Tercentenary:

## Reorganization and Consolidation Report

The special order of the day having arrived, the Assembly continued discussion on the Report of the Special Committee on Reorganization and Consolidation of Assembly Agencies.

It was moved and seconded to adopt Section II of Part I of the Report. The Assembly heard Mrs. F. S. Bennett, ('hairman of the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions. On motion of Elder B. C. Steiner, Ph.D., the following amendment to the report as printed in the Blue Book was approved, and will appear in the full report of the Committee.

That the whole of Par. 6, page 146, be transferred and made par. 4. of Section I, page 145, and that the word "Committee" which appears in par. 6 , page 146 , be changed to the words "General Assembly;" that pars. 7, 8 and 9 be changed to pars. 6,7 , and 8 . Page 154 , par. 5 , line 3, the word "annually" inserted after the word "selected."

The Assembly then adopted this transferred paragraph as Resolution 4 of Section I, Part I.

Section II of Part I was then adopted by the Assembly.
It was moved and seconded to adopt Section III of Part I of the Report. On motion of Rev. James H. Snowden, D.D., LL.D., the name of the new Board was changed to "The Board of National Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America." By consent, the word "one" was substituted for the word "each" in par. 4, page 147, making the sentence read "the terms of one class expiring each year."

Elder J. E. Delmarter of the Presbytery of Sacramento, Rev. H. P. Cory, D.D., of the Presbytery of Southern Arizona, Elder Fred S. Goodman of the Presbytery of Newark, Rev. Cleland B. McAfee, D.D., of the Presbytery of Chicago, Rev. Henry S. Brown, D.D., of the Presbytery of Chicago, Rev. Edwin A. McAlpin, Jr., D.D., of the Presbytery of Morris and Orange, Elder Wm. W. Fiske of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, and Rev. Thomas J. B. Harris of the Presbytery of Jersey City, continued the discussion.

The order of the day having arrived, the time was extended one hour.

At the request of the Committee Rev. John M. Gaston, D.D., General Secretary of the Board of Missions for Freedmen, was heard.

The discussion was continued by Elder L. P. Berry of the Presbytery of I.e Vere, Rev. G. C. Shaw, D.D., of the Presbytery of Cape Fear, Rev. J. W. Holley, D.D., of the Presbytery of Knox, Rev. Wm. L. Bethel of the Presbytery of Rendall, and Rev. D. S. Collier of the Presbytery of White River.

On motion of Rev. William R. Taylor, D.I)., the name of the Board of Missions for Freedmen was changed 10 "The Department of Missions for Colored People."

Section III of Part I of the Report was then adopted.
It was moved and seconded that the Assembly adopt trotion IV of Part I of the Report.

Elder H. P. Faris of the Presbytery of Sedalia opened the discussion. On motion of Rev. Joseph W. ('ochran, I).1)., the word "secondary" was stricken from the beginning of sub-paragraphs (c) and (d) of Resolution 3, and in Resolution 5 , after the words "thirty-six members" there were inserted the words, "twelve of whom shall be women."

Section IV of Part I was then adopted by the Assembly.
Section V of Part I was adopted by the Assembly.
The last paragraph of page 131 of the Report as printed in the Blue Book was made Section VI of Part I, and adopted as Section VI.

The order of the day having arrived, the time was extended until 12 noon.

On motion it was ordered that the headquarters of the Board of National Missions remain as at present located in the Presbyterian Building, New York City, N. Y.

On motion, Part II of the report was adopted by the Assembly.

It was moved and seconded that the resolutions of Part III of the report be adopted.

The hour of the day having arrived, the time was extended in order to finish action on the Report.

On motion the words "now being performed by the Executive Commission" were stricken out of section 2, page 162 of the report as printed in the Blue Book, and the words "now being performed by the New Era Movement, viz,," from section 3, page 162 of the report as printed in the Blue Book.

On motion the words "four proposed capital" were stricken out of section 5, page 163 of the report as printed in the Blue Book, and the words "of the Church" inserted after the words "Boards" immediately following the words thus stricken out.

The resolutions of Part III were then adopted by the Assembly.

The Report as a whole was adopted, and as amended is as follows:

The Committee has held during the year four meetings, with several sub-committee meetings, and frequent interviews and consultations. At the meeting in February in Philadelphia, it received by appointment, representatives from each of the Boards and Agencies for the purpose of information and conference. The Committee has sustained its policy of freedom and open-minded discussion with all who came, and has invited frank and unhindered suggestion and counsel.

The Committee has also refrained from discouraging any effort to oppose or discredit the wisdom of their task, and has encouraged complete freedom of discussion in public utterance, press, and private interview. The Committee appreciates that each existing Board and Agency of the Church has originated out of manifest need, and has been sustained by the faithfulness of officers and board members, and by the continued benevolence of the people. Naturally, this has led to a loyalty and devotion which are not easily changed, and which should not meet with interference, nor alteration, unless such change promises to clarify vision, increase efficiency and enlarge result.

For many years the denomination, as well as other communions, has felt a general demand for simplification, and a lessening of duplication in the vast work carried on. No satisfactory plan, however, has met hitherto with the large approval of the General Assembly, although committees and commissions previously appointed have faced the problem seriously and faithfully. The Committee considers the reduction of the overhead expense of administration a matter of great importance. We value equally, however, the necessity of the adequate performance and the development of the entire work. The simplification and co-ordination of the work, in order that it may be visualized and understood by the average congregation, and easily grasped by the individual, is also considered by the Committee to be of great importance.

The Committee submitting this report does not underestimate the difficulty of the task assigned to it, nor does it disregard the viewpoint and sincerity of those opposed to the proposed changes and consolidations. Long years of service and continued allegiance on the part of board members have established methods and gained confidence, which cannot and should not be sacrificed, unless by such changes as will enhance the quality and quantity of their work for the entire Church.

## PROGRESS TOWARD CONSOLIDATION

The Presbyterian Church is organized under a constitution. It has principles of organization, a form of government, and special administrative Boards and Agencies. For nearly a quarter of a century, the Presbyterian Church has been struggling with the problem of co-operation and co-ordination, and greater efficiency. A former Committee on Administrative Agencies sought to work out the problems involved in answer to a demand on the part of the Church, but were intimidated by the fear of legal complications in the administration of the large trust funds. Later, the problem arose again and was referred to the Executive Commission with definite instructions from the General Assembly, with the result that a plan was presented. This plan was adopted in its essential features by the General Assembly, and then was timidly shelved by the same Assembly. The next year, the way being opened, the Board of Ministerial Relief and the Board of Sustenation were consolidated into one organization as the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation, which Board has been successfully operating ever since.

Later, the College Board and the Board of Education were consolidated legally into the General Board of Education of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. In this consolidation, one Board incorporated in the State of Illinois was consolidated with another Board incorporated in the State of Pennsylvania, and the consolidation was effected in an incorporation in the State of New York. The plan for this consolidation was legally conceived, and the experience gained thereby has warranted the larger scheme of consolidation proposed by the General Assembly of 1920 at Philadelphia and urged enthusiastically by the General Assembly of 1921 at Winona Lake. The Present Committee appointed at Philadelphia in 1920, was therefore instructed at Winona Lake in 1921 to proceed to a general consolidation of the Boards and Agencies of the Church, and now brings in a report substantially in accordance with the definite instructions given by the Winona Assembly last year.

## FUNCTIONS OF GOVERNMENT

There are, according to the common analysis, three functions of government-legislative, executive and judicial. These are all combined in the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church; i.e., the General Assembly legislates for the Church; passes judgment upon the laws, and acts of the Church, as to the constitutionality of the same; and discharges the executive function largely through Boards, Agencies and various committees of its appointment. It does not surrender any of these powers to subordinate agencies, but simply delegates power to them from time to time, subject to its own approval, and requiring them to report from time to time. It has been found that so far as the judicial function is concerned, because of the amount of time necessary in reviewing cases, it is better to have a Judicial Commission and the judicial function is largely discharged on the recommendations of the Judicial Commission. So far as the legislative function of the General Assembly is concerned, that is held under the immediate initiative and control of the Assembly itself.

The executive function of the General Assembly is performed directly by the General Assembly, or indirectly, by its Boards, Agencies and Committees. Thus we have the Executive Commission, the New Era Movement, the Boards of Foreign and Home Missions, the Woman's Boards of Foreign and Home Missions, the General Board of Education, the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, the Board of the Church Erection Fund, the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustenation, the Board of Missions for Freedmen, the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare; such Committees as the Permanent Committees on Evangelism, Men's Work, Sabbath Observance, and Vacancy and Supply; such Special Committees as the Committees on Work in Europe, and Church Co-operation and Union. Also the Trustees of the General Assembly. While there are nearly a score of these subordinate organizations, incorporations and committees, which are directed by the General Assembly in the administration of its executive functions, by no means all of the executive functions are included in these permanent Agencies. The Moderator, the Stated Clerk, the Treasurer, and also, as above enumerated, the Trustees of the General Assembly, do a vast amount of work. It can easily be seen, however, that if everything done by each of these agencies was to be undertaken by the immediate action of the Assembly, the Assembly would have to be in continuous session throughout the year. Therefore, it is a great conservation of time, energy and money, to have these executive functions of the

General Assembly discharged through instructod, incorporated and authorized subordinate agencies.

In the Presbyterian Chureh, under its Constitution and Govermment, all these controlling functions, Leginativa Administrative and Judicial, are collected in and distributod by the General Assembly. Attempts to unify, co-ordinato and effectuate the purposes of the Church through the (iencral Assembly have been made at various times, but a degree of embarrassment has arisen because at one time certain functions of administration were conferred upon one Board or Committee, and at other times on another Board or Committee. This practice has extended through all the years of the history of the General Assembly. Is it any wonder, therefore, that cross purposes have been developed and conflicts of interests have emerged as the result of experience? The demand that has been so persistent for more than a quarter of a century, grows out of constant duplicating and overlapping, until now the present Committee has been entrusted with the responsibility of suggesting a plan for securing unity, co-operation, co-ordination and efficiency, and reducing the complexity to greater simplicity and a clearer system.

It should be borne in mind that the Assembly can not give away its legislative powers, nor its judicial powers, nor its executive powers, but seeks by delegation to provide a more deliberate and efficient system of administration. The Committee was careful to get the views of the General Assembly before working out the details of the plan.

## A UNANIMOUS REPORT

The Committee unanimously reports that it has worked out a plan in accordance with the instructions of the Winona Assembly. It recommends the reduction of the sixteen Boards and Agencies to four Boards, and the establishment of a General Council. The Committee also recommends that certain work hitherto performed by committees, be assigned to the Office of the General Assembly, under the direction of the Stated Clerk.

IV. The Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.

The Committee recommends that the present existing Boards and Permanent Committees of the Church be continued as now constituted in organization and function, until such time as the new Boards be duly organized, incorporated and capacitated to assume the rights and responsibilities of the new and completed organizations. The Committee recognizes the service which has been given to the Church for many years through the Woman's Board of Home Missions and the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions, and is fully aware of the spiritual and educational value of the woman's missionary program in the individual church. The Committee appreciates the large moral and financial responsibilities which these Boards have assumed for enterprizes established on the Home and Foreign Mission fields and realizes that the support of these has been secured only through the efficient and carefully co-ordinated organization of the womensynodically, presbyterially and locally. The Committee therefore recommends that these agencies be maintained at their present level of service and be held to their present standard of responsibility in order that the program of the local church and the work assumed on the mission field shall not suffer during the period of the reorganization of the Boards.

The Committee recommends the constitution of the Four Boards designated as follows:
I. The Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.
(a) That the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America shall continue to direct the foreign work of the Church, and that with it shall be consolidated the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and to it be entrusted the work now carried on by the Special Committee on Work in Europe, under the conditions hereinafter stated.
(b) That the number of members (trustees) of the Board shall be increased to forty in accordance with the powers given to the Board by the amendment to its charter of date March 15, 1900.
(c) That when the General Assembly shall have decided to effect this consolidation, the present members of the Board of Foreign Missions shall offer their resignations, to be accepted in such manner and at such time as the General Assembly may direct, provided, however, that the members of the Board, as at present constituted, shall continue to hold office until their successors have been chosen.
(d) That the enlarged Board shall consist of forty persons, of whom twenty-five shall be men and fifteen shall be women. After the initial election, they shall serve for three years and shall be elected in three classes by the General Assembly upon nomination of the Board itself.
(e) That in the initial election twenty-two persons shall be recommended to the General Assembly by the Board of Foreign Missions as at present constituted; fifteen by the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions as at present constituted, and three by the Standing Committee on Work in Europe.
(f) That great care be taken to conserve and develop the invaluable work done by women in the churches throughout the country in the interest of missions-(1) by maintenance of the Woman's Local, Presbyterial and Synodical Societies, and (2) by affording these societies opportunity to make nominations to the Board for membership on the Board.
(g) That the enlarged Board, when organized, shall work out details of departmental organization in such manner as it may deem expedient.
(h) That the Board in assuming the direction of the work hitherto conducted by the Standing Committee on Christian Work in Europe, does so in harmony with its long established policy that Europe is not to be considered foreign missionary ground for American Christians. It is understood that the budget assigned to the Board will be enlarged from year to year by such sums as may represent the added responsibilities which this relationship to the work in Europe would necessarily involve, and that the Board will not be expected to devote to work in Europe funds given to it distinctively for work in foreign missionary lands.
(i) That the headquarters and offices of the Board remain at the Presbyterian Building, New York City, New York.
II. The Board of National Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.

The Committee recommends that the name of this Board shall be The Board of National Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. That the purpose of this Board shall be the extension of Christianity in the United States (including Alaska and the West Indies, and elsewhere as the General Assembly may direct) ; to extend the Gospel of Christ in all its fullness, and the service of Christ in all its implications, by establishing and strengthening local churches by evangelism, by organization, and by such special enterprises as may be deemed wise.

The Board shall include the work now carried on by the present Board of Home Missions, the Woman's Board of Home Missions, except certain educational work as provided for on page 141, sec. d; the Board of the Church Erection Fund, the Board of Missions for Freedmen, except certain educational work as provided for on page 140, sec. c; such portions of the work of the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work as may rightly be considered as pertaining to its missionary and evangelistic work, and the Permanent Committee on Evangelism. In this connection, the Committee feels that the work of Evangelism was originally one of the very foundation principles of the Board of Home Missions, and that it has always been a very definite part of the work of that Board. Because of the multiplicity of other activities, it perhaps has not always received the special attention which it did originally, but for this very reason the work of National Missions should be strengthened by the emphasis which this work will place upon it.

The Permanent Committem on Evangelism.-The Committee recommends that the work now carried on by the

Permanent Committee on Evangelism, be conducted as a department of the National Board, to he known as the Department of Evangelism of the Board of National Missions.

The Board of Misisions for Freedmen.- The C'mmmittee recommends that the work now carried on by the Board of Missions for Freedmen be conducted as a department of the National Board, and that its organization and headpuarters continue to be located in Pittsburgh. The work of this department deals with a peculiar problem, and makes a distinct appeal throughout the Church. For over fifty years the Board of Missions for Frecdmen has served to awaken the interest and arouse the conscience of the entire Pittsburgh district in behalf of its work. The Committee feels that this strength should not only be conserved, but also vastly extended. With this in mind, two members of this Department are added to the Board of National Missions as representing this particular work.

The Committee also recommends that the name of this department be changed to the Department of Missions for Colored People.

The Board of the Church Erection Fund.-The Committee recommends that in making the Board of the Chureh Erection Fund a Department of the Board of National Missions, there be conserved to the greatest degree all that has been gained and established throughout its long years of most faithful and effective service.

## Departmental Plan.

The Committee also recommends the Departmental Plan throughout the organization of the Board's work with the necessary secretarial leadership.

The Committee recommends that the Self-Supporting Synods and Presbyteries be urged by the Ceneral Assembly to identify their work and organizations as closely as possible with the Board of National Missions, in order that full national policies and programs may be worked out, enabling the Presbyterian Church to function as a unit in the evangelization of the homeland, as well as it now functions in the evangelization of foreign lands; and that the carrying out of this recommendation be committed to such a body as may be empowered by the General Assembly 10 carry into effect the reorganization of the Boards and Agencies.

The Board should also concern itself with the maintenance and the regulation of the close relations which must exist between the evangelistic work of the Board of National Missions and the educational work of the Board of Christian

Education, as both these Boards seek to serve side by side in some of our outlying rural districts, and amid the foreign speaking peoples in our congested centers of populations.

Special Committee on Chaplains.-The Committee also recommends that to the Board of National Missions be committed the work of the Special Committee on United States Chaplains, and that so long as it may be deemed desirable, a sub-committee with this work in charge have its headquarters in the city of Washington, D. C.

## Organization

The membership of the Board of National Missions shall consist of forty members, fifteen of whom shall be women, elected by the General Assembly for terms of three years, and divided into three classes, the terms of each class expiring each year. This membership shall be distributed as follows:
(a) Two members from each of the eight geographical regions herein described.
Colonial-Synods of New England, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Baltimore, New York and Vermont (Welsh), Pennsylvania (Welsh), The West Indies.
Middle West-Synods of Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, West German, Ohio and West Pennsylvania (Welsh), Wisconsin (Welsh).
North Central-Synods of Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Minnesota (Welsh).
South Central-Synods of Missouri, Arkansas, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Western (Welsh).
South-Synods of Tennessee, Kentucky, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, West Virginia, Atlantic, Canadian, Catawba, East Tennessee.
Southwest-Synods of California, Arizona, New Mexico. Northwest-Synods of Oregon, Washington (including Alaska).
Rocky Mountain-Synods of Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho.
(b) Two additional members for each 100,000 Presbyterian Church members or major fraction thereof above the first 100,000 within any region (this numerical basis to be revised from time to time by the General Assembly in order to keep the membership of the Board at the number stated.)

The members of the Board from each region shall be selected to represent the widest area and varied interests of each region.
III. The Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

The work of Christian Education is one work, whether in the home and Sunday School, the Training School, the High School, the College or the Theological Seminary. The Presbyterian Church should express this unity by the creation of one Board wherein the scattered elements of Christian Education now existent in the Church would be brought together as far as possible, and all their interests conserved, with such enlargement of the work as will meet the need of the Church.

The Committee recommends:

1. That the General Assembly create a new Board to be called: The Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.
2. That the New Board shall include the work of:
(a) The present General Board of Education, with its work for higher education, its university work, its recruiting and maintaining of candidates for the ministry and the other forms of educational service.
(b) The Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work as at present constituted, leaving for future adjustment the difficult problems which arise in some of our Synods or Presbyteries because of the intimate relations necessarily existing between the work of the present Board of Home Missions and the Sabbath School Missionary work of the present Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work.

The Committee believes that no satisfactory solution of these problems can be secured, except by obtaining the advice
of the Synods and Presbyteries in which are located the fields in which overlapping of functions is likely to occur or has occurred.

The Committee would therefore recommend that the adjustments necessary be referred with power to the New Board of National Missions and to the New Board of Christian Education in consultation with the duly appointed representatives of the Synods and Presbyteries concerned.
(c) Secondary schools and colleges, conducted by the present Board of Missions for Freedmen, or its successor, which may prove to be permanent and properly part of an educational system, shall pass as soon as that fact is demonstrated, under the supervision of the Board of Christian Education, their financial support being determined in each case by the conditions which may appear.
(d) Secondary schools or colleges, conducted by the Woman's Board of Home Missions, or its successor, which may prove to be permanent and properly part of an educational system, shall pass as soon as that fact is demonstrated, under the supervision of the Board of Christian Education, their financial support being determined in each case by the conditions which may appear.
(e) The Missionary Educational Departments of the Board of Foreign Missions, the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions, the Board of Home Missions, and the Woman's Board of Home Missions, and the missionary educational departments of any other Board or Agency. The headquarters of this Department shall be for the present at least at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York City, New York.
(f) The Permanent Committee on Men's Work.

The Committee concludes, after careful consideration of the entire subject, that the efficient work among men so successfully carried on in various parts of our country by our Permanent Committee on Men's Work should be included under this Board.

The Committee also feels that a larger work may be done by this committee in developing the Bible class work among men and boys as carried on now by another department of this Board, and by thorough coöperation with the Board of National Missions in the department of Evangelism.

The work, after all, is largely educational. It was not originally, and has not been, the intention of this work to organize a new department, but to stir up the male members of the local churches to do their own part in the entire work of the Church.

The Committee believes that this work should be sustained as a department but should be related increasingly to the work of the entire Church.

The Committee feels just as the work among the women of the Church has been emphasized and strengthened throngh their associated co-operation, so the work of the Mon's ('ommittee, already gaining such marked monentum, should be encouraged by this valuable department.

The Committee recommends that the headquarters of this Department be continued for the present in (hicago, and that the Eastern office of this Department be transferred from New York City to Philadelphia.
(g) The Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare.
(h) The Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance.

In this connection, the Committee desires to call attention to the fact that both the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare (to which the Church at large and the nation owe so much), and the Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance (which has kept alive so vitally this important question) are primarily Educational Agencies.

The work undertaken and accomplished in legislation, although influential, has been and should be secondary to the promotion of intelligent zeal in promoting public opinion and training youth.

Interdenominational agencies, such as The Anti-Saloon League and The Lord's Day Alliance, should, and can handle political and public action along this line. Our great problem is to educate and train with knowledge and fact.

The committee feels that these questions, important as they are, should be related to and included in the proper department of our great educational system.

## Theological Seminaries

The Committee recommends that the Theological Seminaries of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A., should be encouraged to sustain a relation of cordial co-operation with the Board of Christian Education, that the Church may realize more fully the possibilities of these Seminaries as a part of the educational system of our Church.

## Organization

The Committee recommends:
(a) That the Board of Christian Education shall consist of thirty-six members, made up of ministers and laymen, to be elected by the General Assembly in such mamner as it shall decide, for terms of three years, except that in the initial election, one-third shall be elected to serve one year; one-third to serve two years; and one-third to serve three years.
(b) That the Board of National Missions secure working agreement with the Board of Christian Education in connection with its missionary educational work in the following particulars:
(1) That new educational work undertaken by the Board of National Missions shall be planned in coöperation with the Board of Christian Education as to its educational features and location.
(2) That the Board of Christian Education, without assuming control or responsibility for present temporary work, shall bring to the service of the Board of National Missions, its educational equipment and experience in correlating its schools with institutions of higher learning in which mission school students may continue their work.
(c) That both the editorial and business departments of the present Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, be continued as departments of the Board of Christian Education.
(d) That the headquarters of the Board of Christian Education be in the Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, and that department offices of said Board be located where advisable.

## Departments

The Committee recommends that at present the new Board of Christian Education be divided into departments, such as:
(a) College and Higher.Education, as now conducted by the General Board of Education.
(b) A Department of Religious Education, including the work of educational method and Sunday School teaching, and all other educational agencies, in the home, in the individual church, and in the community, such as the Daily Vacation Bible School and other like agencies concerned with Bible study and the training of the young.
(c) A Department of Missionary Education.
(d) A Department of Moral Welfare, to include the work now done by such agencies as the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare and the Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance.
(e) A Department of Publication, including both the editorial and business departments of the present Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work.
(f) A Department of Men's Work, to include the work of the present Permanent Committee on Men's Work.
IV. The Board of Ministerial Relief and SustentaTION.

The Committee, after careful review of the large and valuable work of the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation,
would encourage them in their purpose and plans for an enlargement of the scope of their work so soon as the support and provision of the Church make the same possible.

The Committee recommends to this Board the investigation of the subject of a Department of Pensions for teachers, and all others engaged in life service for the Church, who have given themselves to the service of the Educational Institutions in the Church, and who are not provided for under the conditions of any present organization.

The Committee also recommends a Department of the Board which shall assist and co-operate so far as possible with local Boards for the erection and proper support and endowment of Presbyterian Hospitals, Homes for the Aged, Orphanages and other like agencies of relief.

That this department also keep on file and for distribution, information and assistance in the form of appropriate printed matter and advice, pertaining to all such work of institutional advance and development.

The Committee appreciates fully that this work, necessary as it is, should in no way curtail or interfere with the present and important work of the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation but that these features shall be held as a definite and clear ideal and purpose to receive attention so soon as the interest and available funds of the Church encourage and provide for such action.

The Committee recommends that the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation consider and report back to the General Assembly, the advisability of the adoption of approved retirement plans such as are now in use in other churches and organizations.

(b) The Board of National Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.
(c) The Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.
(d) The Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A.
2. That the said existing thirteen Boards and Agencies be continued as now constituted, in organization and function until such time as the new Boards are duly incorporated, organized and capacitated to assume their responsibilities.
3. That the charters of existing Boards whose work is transferred to other Boards are to be retained, and obligations and operations thereunder continued by the new Boards, until there shall have been accomplished all technical and legal adjustments necessary to completed transference; and as long thereafter as may be necessary in order to protect the title and possession of property owned or controlled by the existing Boards.
4. That great care be taken to conserve and develop the invaluable work done by women in the churches throughout the country in the interest of missions-(1) by maintenance of the Woman's Local, Presbyterial and Synodical Societies, and (2) by affording these societies opportunity to make nominations to the Board for membership on the Board.

10. That to the National Board be committed the work of the Committee on United States Chaplains, and that so long as it may be deemed desirable, a sub-committee with this work in charge have its headquarters in the city of Washington.
11. That the headquarters of the Board should remain as at present in the Presbyterian Building, New York City, N. Y.

## IV. <br> The Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.

1. That there be created a new Board, to be called The Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.
2. That for the purpose of indicating the nature and scope of the work of the new Board, the following organizing principle be adopted:

Organizing Principle: The work of Christian Education is one work, whether in the home and sunday School, the Training School, the High School, the College, or the Theological Seminary. The Presbyterian Church should express this unity by the creation of one Board wherein the scattered elements of Christian Education now existent in the Church would be brought together as far as possible, and all their interests conserved, with such enlargement of the work as will meet the need of the Church.
3. That the work of the new Board shall include, in whole or in part, the work of the following Boards and Agencies now engaged in educational activities:
(a) The General Board of Education.
(b) The Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work as at present constituted, leaving for future adjustment the difficult problems which arise in some of our Synods or Presbyteries because of the intimate relations necessarily existing between the work of the present Board of Home Missions and the Sabbath School Missionary work of the present Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work.
(c) Schools and colleges, conducted by the present Board of Missions for Freedmen, or its successor, which may prove to be permanent and properly part of an educational system, shall pass as soon as that fact is demonstrated, under the supervision of the Board of Christian Education, their financial support being determined in each case by the conditions which may appear.
(d) Schools or colleges, conducted by the Woman's Board of Home Missions, or its successor, which may prove to be permanent and properly part of an educational system, shall pass as soon as that fact is demonstrated, under the supervision of the Board of Christian Education, their financial support being determined in each case by the conditions which may arise.
(e) The Missionary Educational Departments of the Board of Foreign Missions, the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions, the Board of Home Missions, and the Woman's Board of Home Missions, and the Missionary Educational Departments of any other Board or Agency. The headquarters of this Department shall be for the present at least at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York City, New York.
(f) The Permanent Committee on Men's Work.
(g) The Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare.
(h) The Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance.
4. That the Theological Seminaries of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. A., be encouraged to sustain a relation of cordial co-operation with the Board of Christian Education, that the Church may realize more fully the possibilities of these Seminaries as a part of the educational system of our Church.
5. That the Board of Christian Education shall consist of thirty-six members, 12 of whom shall be women, to be elected by the General Assembly in such manner as it shall decide, for terms of three years, except that in the initial election one-third shall be elected to serve one year; one-third to serve two years; and one-third to serve three years.
6. That the Board of National Missions secure working agreements with the Board of Christian Education in connection with its missionary educational work in the following particulars:
(a) That new educational work undertaken by the Board of National Missions shall be planned in coöperation with the Board of Christian Education as to its educational features and location.
(b) That the Board of Christian Education, without assuming control or responsibility for present, temporary work, shall bring to the service of the Board of National Missions, its educational equipment and experience in correlating its schools with institutions of higher learning in which mission school students may continue their work.
7. That the editorial and business departments of the present Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work be continued as departments of the Board of Christian Education.
8. That the headquarters of the Board of Christian Education be located in the Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, and that department offices of said Board be located where advisable.
9. That at present the New Board of Christian Education be divided into departments, such as:
(a) College and Higher Education, as now conducted by the present General Board of Education;
(b) A Department of Religious Education, including the work of educational method and Sunday School teaching and all other educational agencies, including Daily Vacation Bible School and other like agencies involved in Bible study and the training of the young.
(c) A Department of Missionary Education;
(d) A Department of Moral Welfare, to include the work now done by such agencies as the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare, and the Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance, etc.;
(c) A Department of Publication, including both the editorial and business departments of the present Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work;
(f) A Department of Men's Work, to include the work of the present Permanent Committee on Men's Work.

## V. The Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.

1. That the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation as now constituted shall continue its work with the same powers it now possesses.
2. That the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation give consideration to the establishment of a department of pensions for teachers, and all others engaged in life service for the Church, who have given themselves to the service of the Educational Institutions in the Church, and who are not provided for under the conditions of any present organization.
3. That a department shall be created to assist and cooperate, so far as possible, with local Boards for the erection and proper support and endowment of Presbyterian Hospitals, Homes for Aged, Orphanages and other like agencies of relief; that this department keep on file and for distribution information and assistance in the form of appropriate printed matter, and advice, pertaining to all such work of educational advance and development; and that this work, necessary as it is, should in no way curtail or interfere with the present and important work of the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation, but that these features shall be held as a definite and clear ideal and purpose to receive attention so soon as the interest and available funds of the Church encourage and provide such action.
4. That the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation consider and report back to the General Assembly, the advisability of the adoption of approved retirement plans such as are now in use in other churches and organizations.

## VI. Committee on Unified Financial System

The Committee has considered the question of treasury facilities of the Boards and Agencies, and is convinced that a unified treasury system is essential to efficient operation. In view of the vital importance of this subject, and the necessity for mature and expert consideration from a practical standpoint, we would recommend that a committee of seven members be appointed to consider a unified financial system for the General Assembly, its Boards and Agencies, and that this Committee report back to the next General Assembly.

This Committee should also consider the present organization of the Trustees of the General Assembly, and their relation to the trust funds (designated or undesignated) held by and committed to them for administration.

The moderator has named as the members of the committee Ministers Joseph A. Vance, Chairman, W. P. Merrill, Matthew F. Smith, Laymen H.S. P. Nichols, Herbert K. Twitchell, A. C. Ernst, and E. H. Perkins.

## PART II.

## Office of the General Assembly

No report of the character now being presented would be complete without reference to and recommendations concerning this long established office.

As already provided by action of the General Assembly, the executive head of the office of the General Assembly, and of all the departments of said office (except fifth see below), should be the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly.

The Office of the General Assembly should have the following departments:

1. Administration: This department should include all the functions hitherto assigned to the Office of the General Assembly or to the Stated Clerk by constitutional provision or General Assembly enactment.
2. Publicity: This department in general should include such functions as have hitherto been assigned to the Department of Publicity, which has been under the direction of a committee of the Executive Commission.
3. Vacancy and Supply: This department should in general include such functions as have hitherto been assigned to the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply.
4. Narrative of Christian Life and Work (Annual Survey and Report):

This department should in general include functions that have been hitherto assigned to the Special Cómmittee on Christian Life and Work, and this committee should be discontinued.

In directing the work of this department, it should be the duty of the Stated Clerk to obtain, annually, for presentation at the meeting of the General Assembly, through the Stated Clerks of the Presbyteries, reports outlining the state of the Church spiritually, and the Stated Clerk should be authorized to use such means as may from time to time seem wise to secure the fullest, freshest and most reliable information.
5. Church Co-Operation and Union: It is recommended that this work be under the immediate super-
vision of a committee of fifteen members, to be selected by the General Assembly. To this Committee shall be committed, subject to the approval of the General Assembly, the interests of the Church as they relate to other ecclesiastical bodies, and to organizations formed thereby for promoting co-operation and general goodwill. The Committee, of which the Stated Clerk shall be a member, shall be assigned an appropriate place and hour upon the docket of the General Assembly, and through it all organizations and causes related thereto shall report.

## Part II. Resolutions to be Acted Upon

## Office of The General Assembly

## Resolved:

That the Office of the General Assembly, the executive head of which is the Stated Clerk, be divided into the following departments and be charged with the following duties:

1. Administration: This department shall include all the functions hitherto assigned to the Stated Clerk by constitutional provisions or General Assembly enactment.
2. Publicity: This department in general shall include such functions as have hitherto been assigned to the Department of Publicity, which has been under the direction of a committee of the Executive Commission.
3. Vacancy and Supply: This department shall in general include such functions as have hitherto been assigned to the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply.
4. Narrative of Christian Life and Work (Survey and Report): This department shall in general include functions that have been hitherto assigned to the Special Committee on Christian Life and Work, and this committee shall be discontinued.

In directing the work of this department, it shall be the duty of the Stated Clerk to obtain, annually, for presentation at the meeting of the General Assembly, through the Stated Clerks of the Presbyteries, reports outlining the state of the Church spiritually, and the Stated Clerk is authorized to use such means as may from time to time seem wise to secure the fullest, freshest and most reliable information.
5. Church Co-operation and Union: That this work be under the immediate supervision of a committee of fifteen members, to be selected annually by the General Assembly. To this Committee shall be committed, subject to the approval of the General Assembly, the interests of the Church as they relate to other ecclesiastical bodies, and to organizations formed thereby for promoting co-operation and gencral good
will. The Committee, of which the Stated Clerk shall be a member, shall be assigned an appropriate place and hour upon the docket of the General Assembly, and through it all organizations and causes related thereto shall report.

## PART III.

## The General Council

The Committee recommends that a General Council be established, composed of twenty-seven members; said Council to include the work of the Executive Commission and the New Era Committee, both of which have proved to be of constructive value.

The General Council is simply the agent of the General Assembly, acting ad interim with such powers as the Assembly itself may delegate to it.

This General Council will make possible an economical and efficient supervision of all the affairs of the Executive department of the Church, as delegated to it by the General Assembly.

## Composition

The Committee recommends that the General Council be composed of twenty-seven members as follows:

A chairman of the General Council who shall give his full time to the duties thereof, the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, the Moderator of the General Assembly, the retiring Moderator of the General Assembly and his predecessor, one representative chosen by the Boards from each of the four newly organized Boards of the Church; eighteen members at large, chosen by vote of the Assembly, representing so far as possible the entire Church at large.

The Executive Commission of the General Assembly has no permanent executive, whose time is given exclusively to the administration of the affairs of the Executive Commission.

The placing of the chairman of the General Council in the position of an employed officer, devoting all his time to the general guidance of the work is an important feature in the proposed constitution of this General Council. This chairman, however, should be chosen with the greatest care and should be one in whom the entire Church has the fullest confidence.

The Moderator of the General Assembly is now the Chairman of the Executive Commission, but he is in office for one year only and during this brief period can of necessity devote but little time to such duties. The use also of the two most recent ex-moderators, in addition to the present moderator,
provides that the best wisdom of the Church in the selection of its leaders shall be preserved in the activities and supervision of the General Council.

The present Executive Commission has no immediate contact with the various Boards and Agencies through secretarial or Board membership in the Executive Commission, such persons being, by Act of the Cieneral Assembly, excluded from membership therein.

The plan suggested above provides that each of the four proposed Boards, with all the interests of the Church that are combined in them, shall have a representative in the General Council so that most important contact and information may be at hand at any time through these representatives. It should also be noted especially that the Church at large has a controlling majority in the Council, through its chosen representatives, which insures unprejudiced guidance in its official duties and in general supervision.

## The Evaluation of the General Council

1. Conservation: The Council will be a conservative influence for the Church. That is, it will use men who have been Moderators of the General Assembly, active leaders in the principal activities and agencies of the Church, and widely known influential factors in various parts of the denomination at large, including the women, to conserve the authority, traditions and ideals of Presbyterianism as represented in its General Assembly and its history.

Certain great lessons have been learned through the Executive Commission and its abundant and valuable service to the Church, and certain other achievements have been attained by the New Era Movement. The Council is to incorporate in itself and perpetuate in its activities the best things attained through these two great agencies.
2. Prevision: The Council must not only express the past and present conscience and purposes of Presbyterianism. The old is yielding place to new, and the Council must also sense the best desires of the Church with reference to the new problems and the new possibilities and fields of endeavor, and give counsel to the Assembly, and to the various Boards and Agencies of the Church accordingly. Such planning for the future will, of course, call for vigilance and foresight and great wisdom, and the Council must include in its membership therefore the best available minds in the Church.
3. Executive: During the intervals between meetings of the General Assembly, the Council will have executive oversight of the affairs of the Church. Such oversight will involve great responsibilities and carry great influ-
ence, but men of the type described in the article above, concerning membership, can be trusted noc to abuse the powers conferred and not to misinterpret the great body which will be functioning through them.
4. Unification: The Council will be the unifier of the plans, activities and agencies of the Church. It will be the one body which will see all, feel the responsibility for all, and in its own consciousness will adjust each of the extraordinary elements to the other, and thereby promote harmony, cooperation and achievement by its superintendence of the budget and its study of all the interests of all the Boards. The whole plan is one plan. The power, efficiency and good influence of the Council will depend largely upon the extraordinary factors of the plan so far as the Boards of the Church are concerned. The Council is the head and the Boards are the members of the body. The Council will not be incorporated; the Boards will be incorporated. The Council represents the Church in its supervisory and representative functions. The Boards represent in a more definite way the administrative or executive functions of the Church. The ideals and purposes of the Presbyterian Church will express themselves through the General Assembly; the General Council wil catch the spirit and embody the purpose of the Church and these will be expressed in definite plan and performance by the Boards of the Church.

Thus the conscience, the heart and the will of the Church will be in action continuously throughout the year.

## Work of Council

The General Council will prepare the budget for the consideration of the General Assembly.

It is proposed to give to the General Council, the power to act upon its own initiative and also supervision over the spiritual and material interests of the Boards and Agencies of the Church. It is to be borne in mind, however, that these powers of supervision are always subject to the authority of the General Assembly. It is not the intention of this Committee to recommend the creation of an independent body with general powers of supervision which might be exercised without due subordination to the wishes of the General Assembly. It is believed that by placing upon the General Council the duty of supervision and direction, together with the right to initiate action upon its own motion, checking the exercise thereof with the necessity of securing the approval of the General Assembly, an efficient method of performing the work of the Church will be attained. In most instances the course to be pursued by the General Council will appear to be
clear and the members of the Council will be unaminome in their conclusions. In such cases, there can be but littie dowht about the approval of their course ly the (ieneral Assembly. In other cases a division of opinion may exist among the members of the General Council, and the probable artion of the General Assembly may be in doubt. In al such rases, the chances are that the General Council wil' not seek to have its action made effective until, or unless, approved by the General Assembly. In cases of great importance, involving fundamental changes, the General Council will undoubtedly present its views to the General Assembly with reconmendations as to the course to be pursued, and make no attempt to carry out its conclusions until the matter has been first acted upon by the General Assembly. Knowing that the exerejse of its authority is at all times subject to the approval of the General Assembly, the General Council wil be very careful about taking definite action in cases where it feels uncertain about the approval of its position by the General Assembly.

The representation of the Boards on the General Council is not large enough to enable the Boards to control the General Council, but it gives them an opportunity to make known in an effective way their respective needs, and gives them a fair and reasonable opportunity to influence the policies and actions of the General Council. With this representation, it is believed there will be very little objection on the part of the Boards to the conclusions finally reached by the General Council.

The method of selecting the General Council is such as to give a fair representation to ministers, to laymen and the Boards. Stability is given to the General Council by having in continuous membership the Chairman, the Stated Clerk, and also by having only one-third of the membership changed each year. New life is provided by the election of one-third of the membership of the General Council annually.

An important feature is that the Chairman of the General Council is required to give his full time to the work, as the executive officer of the Council. The importance of this provision is self-evident, and needs no claboration. The Chairman is to be elected for five years, and if his work is satisfactory there will be no doubt about the permanency of his position.

Another important feature of the proposed plan is that no member selected by a Board or from the Church at large, having served for two consecutive three year terms, shall be eligible for re-election until after an interim of at least one year.

It will also be observed that the duties of the Cieneral

Council have been so stated as to make of it an executive and supervising body-not one having charge of details. The Committee believes this to be a very important feature, and desires to emphasize the necessity of keeping the General Council free from the performance of detail work.

A copy of the recommendation providing for the establishment of the General Council is attached to this report.

## Part III.-Resolutions to be Acted Upon

## General Council

## Resolved :

That as a part of the plan to reorganize and consolidate the Boards and Agencies of the Church in accordance with the recommendations of the Special Committee on Reorganization and Consolidation, a General Council be established, and that it be done by amending Chapter XXVI of the 1920 revision of the Government, Discipline and Worship of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., entitled "Of Executive Commissions," as follows:

## Change in Church Law

## I.

That the following be inserted as sections 1 to 10 of said Chapter XXVI:

1. A General Council is hereby established with authority and duties as herein specified.
2. The General Council, subject to the authority of the General Assembly, shall have supervision over the spiritual and material interests of the Boards and Agencies of the Church. It shall assume and discharge the following duties now being performed by the Executive Commission:

To correspond with and advise the Executive Commissions of Presbytery and Synod; to prepare and submit annually to the General Assembly the Budget for the permanent benevolent and missionary agencies of the Church (including selfsupporting Synods and Presbyteries); to consider between annual meetings of the General Assembly cases of serious embarrassment or emergency concerning the benevolent and missionary work of the Church, and to provide direct methods of relief. It shall discharge such other responsibilities as may have been devolved upon the Executive Commission by the General Assembly, subject to the right of the General Assembly to change or withdraw such powers.
3. The General Council, subject to the authority of the General Assembly, shall also make suitable provision for the discharge of the following duties now being performed by the New Era Movement, viz:

The formulation and promotion of a co-ordinated program for the Assembly's Boards and Agencies; the urging of the adoption of goals and seasonal schedules, and of the group system by all our churches; the employment of efficient methods of publicity; the education of the Church in the principles and methods of Christian Stewardship; and the general direction of the Annual Every-Member Canvass for the raising of the Assembly's Budget.
4. The General Council shall discharge such other duties as the General Assembly shall from time to time require and authorize.
5. The General Council shall be composed of twenty-seven members, including the Chairman of the General Council; the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly; the Moderator of the General Assembly; the retiring Moderator of the General Assembly and his predecessor; one representative chosen from each of the four proposed capital Boards and elected by the irrespective Boards; and eighteen members at large-six chosen for three years, six for two years, and six for one year, and thereafter six selected each year for a term of three years, three of whom thus selected shall be laymen.

No member selected by a Board or from the Church at large, having served for two consecutive three year terms shall be eligible for re-election until after an interim of at least one year.

The members at large shall be selected by the General Assembly in the following manner, to-wit: The electing sections shall each appoint one member of the nominating committee to name candidates for the Council, an elder to be chosen from each even section, and a minister to be chosen from each odd section; the Chairman of the Committee to be appointed by the Moderator; this Committee to present a list of nominees to the General Assembly for membership on the General Council, and the Assembly to elect by ballot from the nominees as presented. Vacancies in the membership of the Council shall be filled ad interim by the General Council, such appointments by the General Council to be effective until the meeting of the next General Assembly.
6. The General Council shall meet (bi-monthly) at stated meetings upon the first Tuesday of May, June, September, November, January and March, at ten o'clock in the morning; and upon intervening dates when necessary.
7. The Chairman of the General Council shall be known as the Chairman of the General Council of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., and shall be chosen for a term of five years by, the General Council, subject to the approval of the General Assembly.

The Chairman shatl give his full time to this work as the executive officer of the Council. His salary shall be determined by the General Council.
8. The General Council shall select from its own membership a Vice Chairman.
9. The General Council shall keep a record of its proceedings and shall submit for approval to each General Assembly, a report of all business transacted by it.
10. The General Council shall have the right to adopt rules and regulations for the conduet of its business, not inconsistent with the authority hereby granted, or the laws of the Chureh.
II.

The number of section 1 is changed to 11 , and it is amended by adding the word "and" between "Presbytery" and "a Synod" in the first line of said section, and by striking out the words "and the General Assembly" in the same line; by adding the word "and" between the words "Presbytery" and the words "not less than" in the fourth line of said section; by striking out the words "and not less than fifteen for the General Assembly" in the fifth and sixth lines of said section; so that the seetion as amended will read as follows:
11. A Presbytery, and a Synod, may elect from the ministers and ruling elders composing them, an Executive Commission, which shall consist of not less than three members for a Presbytery, and not less than seven members for a Synod. The membership shall be divided in each case, as equally as practicable, between ministers and laymen. No member, salaried offieer or employee of a missionary or benevolent Board or Organization, under the direction of the judieary concerned, shall be a member. Vacancies may be filled by the Moderator of the judicatory until the next regular meeting. The term of service shall be three years, and the members shall be divided into three classes, one of which shall be elected annually. A quorum shall be a majority of the members, and less than a quorum may adjourn to a fixed date.

## III.

The number of section 2 is changed to 12 , and it is amended by striking out the following sentence; "The Moderator of the General Assembly shall be the Chairman of the Executive Commission of the General Assembly, and the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly shall be the Secretary of the Commission." so that the section as amended will read as follows:
12. A Presbytery or a Synod shall elect the Chairman of its Exceutive Commissfon, and the Stated Clerk of, the
electing judicatory shall be the Secretary of the Commiswion. Stated Clerks of judicatories, when secretaries of the Executive Commissions, shall not be nembers of the Commissions.

## IV.

The numbers of sections $3,4,5$ and 6 are changed respectively to $13,14,15$ and 16 .

## V.

Section 7 is stricken out.
VI.

The number of section 8 is changed to 17 .
VII.

The number of section 9 is changed to 18 , and it is amended by adding the word "or" between the words "Presbytery" and "a Synod" in the second line of said paragraph; and by striking out the words "or the General Assembly" in the second and third lines of said section, so that the section as amended will read as follows:
18. Nothing in this chapter shall be so construed as to prevent either a Presbytery or a Synod from electing, at their own discretion, Special Commissions for specific administrative or executive purposes, which shall be subject to the limitations and regulations as to powers contained in this chapter, so far as they apply, and also to the Constitution of the Church. Such special commissions shall report whenever the electing judicatories shall require.

## VIII.

The title of the chapter is changed to read as follows: Of the General Council and Executive Commissions. Be It Further Resolved: That the foregoing be transmitted to all the Presbyteries for consideration and action and return to the next General Assembly, and that the Stated Clerk be directed to prepare and send to the Presbyteries for their action the following Overture:
"Shall the following be substituted for the present Chapter XXVI, Form of Government?"

## Chapter XXVI

## Of the General Council and Executive Commissions

1. A General Council is hereby established with authority and duties as herein specified.
2. The General Council, subject to the authority of the General Assembly, shall have supervision over the spiritual and material interests of the Boards and agencies of the Church. It shall assume and discharge the following duties:

To correspond with and advise the Executive Commissions of Presbytery and Synod; to prepare and submit annually to the General Assembly the Budget for the permanent benevolent and missionary agencies of the Church (including self-supporting Synods and Presbyteries); to consider between annual meetings of the General Assembly cases of serious embarrassment or emergency concerning the benevolent and missionary work of the Church, and to provide direct methods of relief.
3. The General Council, subject to the authority of the General Assembly, shall also make suitable provision for the discharge of such duties as the following:

The coördination of the Missionary and Benevolent programs of the Church as proposed by its Boards; the promotion of Christian benevolence and stewardship throughout the Church; the cultivation of sound methods of Church finance and the development in all congregations as well as Presbyteries and Synods of the highest possible spiritual efficiency.
4. The General Council shall discharge such other duties as the General Assembly shall from time to time require and authorize.
5. The General Council shall be composed of the following members: the Chairman of the General Council; the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly; the Moderator of the General Assembly; the retiring Moderator of the General Assembly and his nearest living predecessor; one representative chosen from each of the Boards of the Church and elected by his Board; and eighteen members at large elected by the General Assembly in such manner as it may determine-six chosen for three years, six for two years, and six for one year, and thereafter six selected each year for a term of three years, three of whom thus selected shall be laymen.

No member selected by a Board or from the Church at Large, having served for two consecutive three year terms shall be eligible for re-election until after an interim of at least one year.
6. The General Council shall hold stated meetings in May, June, September, November, January and March, and upon intervening dates when necessary.
7. The Chairman shall be known as the Chairman of the General Council of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., and shall be chosen for a term of five years, by the Gener.al Council, subject to the approval of the General Assembly.

The Chairman shall give his full time to this work as the executive officer of the Council. His salary shall be determined by the General Council.
8. The General Council shall select from its own membership a Vice Chairman.
9. The General Council shall keep a record of its proceedings and shall submit for approval to each General Assembly, a report of all business transacted by it.
10. The General Council shall have the right to adopt rules and regulations for the conduct of its business, not inconsistent with the the authority hereby granted, or the laws of the Church.
11. A Presbytery, or a Synod, may elect from the ministers and ruling elders composing it, an Executive Commission, which shall consist of not less than three members for a Presbytery, and not less than seven members for a Synod. The membership shall be divided in each case, as equally as practicable, between ministers and laymen. No member, salaried officer or employee of a missionary or benevolent Board or Organization, under the direction of the judiciary concerned, shall be a member. Vacancies may be filled by the Moderator of the judicatory until the next regular meeting. The term of service shall be three years, and the members shall be divided into three classes, one of which shall be elected annually. A quorum shall be a majority of the members, and less than a quorum may adjourn to a fixed date.
12. A Presbytery or a Synod shall elect the Chairman of its Executive Commission, and the Stated Clerk of the electing judicatory shall be the Secretary of the Commission. Stated Clerks of judicatories, when Secretaries of the Executive Commissions, shall not be members of the Commissions.
13. Executive Commissions shall handle and consider only such administrative business as may be referred to them by the electing judicatories, as indicated in the succeeding sections, and shall have no power of initiating action except as hereinafter provided. No judicial business shall be referred to an Executive Commission.
14. The proceedings of an Executive Commission shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and Rules of the Church. The Commission may sit in private whenever deemed advisable, and all business transacted shall be held as private unless definitely voted otherwise.
15. The Executive Commission of a Presbytery may have the following general powers when voted by the electing Presbytery: to prepare the docket of business for the meeting of the Presbytery, with the assistance of the Stated Clerk;
to consider and report upon all proposals and appeals for moneys; to correspond with the Executive Commissions of Synod and General Assembly, and to present to the churches the budget of the missionary and benevolent causes and agencies as adopted by the General Assembly.

It may have also the following specific powers, when voted by the Presbytery: to receive and dismiss ministers, in good standing, who are without pastoral charge, in the intervals between regular meetings; to receive under care of Presbytery licentiates or candidates for the ministry from other Presbyteries; to install ministers, to organize or to dissolve churches, and to adjust difficulties in particular churches, after appropriate action by Presbytery. The Executive Commission shall report at each regular meeting of Presbytery every item of business transacted by it. Its decisions shall be operative, wherever power has been conferred, but may be reviewed and reversed by Presbytery.
16. The Executive Commission of a Synod may have the following powers, when specifically voted by the electing Synod: to prepare the docket of business for the meeting of the Synod, with the assistance of the Stated Clerk; to correspond with the Executive Commissions of Presbyteries and of the General Assembly; to carry out the directions of Synod with respect to the Presbyteries, Sessions and people under the care of Synod; to inquire into conditions existing in any Presbytery; but it shall not receive power to erect, unite or divide Presbyteries, and, in consultation with the Presbyteries or the Executive Commissions of the Presbyteries under the Synod, to have charge of the Budget of the benevolent and missionary causes and agencies within the Synod. The Executive Commission shall report at each regular meeting of Synod every item of business transacted by it. Its decisions shall be operative wherever power has been conferred, but may be reviewed and reversed by Synod.
17. Executive Commissions shall meet on their own appointment and adjournment, and at the call of the electing judicatory, but shall not meet during the regular meetings of the electing judicatory, unless specifically authorized so to do by the judicatory. The minutes shall be submitted annually to the electing judicatory for review, and shall be referred, for the purpose, to the Committee on Bills and Overtures or similar Committees. The expenses of the Executive Commissions shall be provided for by the electing judicatories.
18. Nothing in this chapter shall be so construed as to prevent either a Presbytery or a Synod from electing, at their own discretion, Special Commissions for specific administrative or executive purposes, which shall be subject to the
limitations and regulations as to powers contained in this chapter, so far as they apply, and also to the C'onstitution of the Church. Such special commissions shall report whenever the electing judicatories shall require."

The following resolution, submitted by the Rev. Edwin $\therefore$. McAlpin, Jr., D.D., was adopted by the Assembly:

Resolved, That the special Committee on the reorganization and consolidation of the Boards and Agencies of the Church, consisting of the following members, viz: John Timothy Stone, Chairman, Alexander MacColl, William H. Black, Robert J. MacAlpine, William R. Taylor, Leon D. Young, Frederick W. Hinitt, William O. Thompson, Andrew Timberman, John H. DeWitt, Nelson H. Loomis, Bernard C. Steiner, George P. Conard, and Ralph W. Harbison, be and is hereby continued, for the purpose of carrying into effect the resolutions adopted by this Assembly reorganizing and consolidating said Boards and Agencies and establishing departments in the office of the Stated Clerk and charging them with certain duties; and the said Committee is hereby given the power to perform all of the acts, to make all of the adjustments and to arrange and put into effect all of the details necessary to the consummation of said resolutions. The said Committee is also charged with the duty of furnishing the Presbyteries with information relating to the establishment of a General Council pursuant to resolution adopted by this Assembly and overtured to the Presbyteries, and with the reasons supporting the establishment of such General Council.

Said Committee is authorized to incur the necessary expenses incident to carrying out these instructions, but not to exceed the sum of $\$ 2,500$, and the Executive Commission is directed to make an appropriation of that amount subject to the orders of the Chairman of said Committee when supported by proper voucher, and also to make provision for legal counsel in addition to this amount, if needed.

The Moderator is authorized to declare and to fill vacancies on the Committee caused by death, resignation, or inability to serve.

Said Committee will make full report of all its doings under this resolution to the General Assembly at its next meeting.

The Assembly, by a rising vote, expressed its thanks to the Special Committee on Reorganization and Consolidation of Assembly Agencies for their faithful services.

At the request of the Stated Clerk, the rules of the Assembly were suspended, and the docket for Tuesday afternoon re-arranged.

The following message received in reply to the one sent to Rev. Robert Christie, D.D., of the Western Theological Seminary, was read to the Assembly:
"Resolution of sympathy of General Assembly conveyed by you has been an unspeakable comfort to me. Signed, Robert Christie."

The Assembly took recess, after devotions were conducted by the Rev. John Allen Blair, D.D., of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, until 2.30 P.M.

## TUESDAY, May 23, 1922, 2.30 P.M.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. W. H. Hudnut, D.D., of the Presbytery of Mahoning.

The following resolution, presented by the Rev. C. C. Tyler of the Presbytery of Philadelphia North, was adopted by the Assembly:

That the General Assembly express sympathetic appreciation of the work of the Barnardo Homes, and commend that work to the favorable consideration of our churches.

On motion the repor't of the Standing Committee on Relief and Sustentation was reconsidered, and resolution 4 stricken from the report, and the report as thus amended will be found on page 89 of this Journal.

On motion the docket as arranged for Tuesday afternoon was reconsidered, and the time for the report of the Standing Committee on Temperance and Moral Welfare set at one hour.

## Temperance and Moral Welfare

The report of the Standing Committee on Temperance and Moral Welfare was presented through its Chairman, Rev. Matthew F. Smith, D.D., and pending the adoption of the recommendations, the Assembly was addressed by Miss Maud M. Aldrich, Rev. Charles Scanlon, LL.D., Rev. Gustav A. Breigleb, Elder C. J. Meetze and Rev. D. S. Martin. The report and its recommendations were adopted, and are as follows:

Whereas, The possibilities for good or evil which lie in Motion Pictures and the opportunities afforded the home, the school, and the church in the matter of visualized instruction, inspiration and entertainment are beyond computation, and

Whereas, Certain interests in the Motion Pictures Industry in screen presentations make light of mariage, woman': virtue, the Lord's Day, the Eighteenth Amendment, and chastity, thus spreading a moral blight across America and striking at the vitals of the nation in suggesting to the youth of the land habits and attitudes of life that tend only to ruin, and

Whereas, Whenever decent citizens seek to cleanse a city of some vile picture, they are confronted by a well-organized opposition directed by powerful interests within the industry, and

Whereas, It is publicly stated in Motion Picture Magazines that the Photoplay Interests have entered politics. determined to prevent the election of candidates who will not pledge allegiance to their cause.

Be it therefore resolved, That the Gencral Assembly call upon the constituency of our Churches to refrain from attendance upon any theatre, which permits upon its screen the presentation of pictures that are suggestive and unclcan, and that whenever possible our membership inform the management of theatres showing such pictures of their intention so to do, and

Be it further resolved, That the General Assembly hereby instructs its Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare:
(1) To inaugurate a movement which will seek to unite all the moral agencies of America in a concerted request of Congress that such legislation be enacted as will make mandatory, production of pictures in accordance with certain welldefined moral standards, this legislation to be applied at the point of production; that is, before the picture is made.
(2) To lend the aid of the Board whenever possible to the moral forces of such states and communities as are endearoring to secure some form of regulation of the Movies.
(3) To call upon the Moral Welfare forces of America to demand of the Theatre Owners' Associations of America that Anti-Prohibition propaganda be kept off the screen.
(4) To urge upon all good citizens the supporting of only such men for public office as will protect the high and noblo traditions of America's best manhood and womanhood and who are pledged to no private interest but seek only the public good.

Whereas, The Eighteenth Amendment is a part of the Constitution of the United States and the Volstead Act the regularly enacted instrument for its enforcement, Be it therefore resolved,
(1) That we heartily commend all who are honestly endeavoring to secure the enforcement of this law and earm-
estly urge our people to aid in bringing to justice the violators of said law, whether rich or poor.
(2) That we declare against the repeal or weakening of the Volstead law and urge the continuance of the teaching of temperance in our sunday schools, and the observance of World's Temperance Sunday.

Whereas, The use of narcotic drugs and cigarettes is acknowledged to be injurious and because of the increase in the use of the same, Be it therefore resolved,
(1) That the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare continue a vigorous policy to secure anti-drug and cigarette legislation by the Federal Government and that the Board work through synodical and presbyterial committees and with other agencies to secure similar State legislation.
(2) That the Board continue to prepare and distribute literature of an educational nature relative to narcotics and cigarettes and that pastors use this material in our sunday schools and public schools wherever possible.
(3) That the Assembly reaffirm former deliverances discouraging the use of tobacco and that ministers, church officers, parents, and teachers be urged to instruct the youth by precept and example as to the evil effects of this habit.

Whereas, The Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare has devoted much study and experiment upon the problems of family and juvenile welfare, the defective and delinquent, including prisoners. Be it therefore resolved,
(1) That we regard with satisfaction the efforts of the Board to rebuild into normal society, so far as possible, those discharged from prison and to help them spiritually while yet confined in prison.
(2) That we rejoice in the definite constructive work of the Board in Social Hygiene, especially among students, in coöperation with the government and state boards of health.
(3) That we view with deep concern the growing evil of divorce and approve wise efforts being made to safeguard honorable marriage.
(4) That we note with gratification the increased attention given to humane teaching and rejoice that at least twenty states have laws on this subject.
(5) That we commend the work of the Board in supplying chaplains for our disabled soldiers and sailors who are confined to hospitals.
(6) That the Minutes of the Board and the treasurer's report as certified by the public accountant be approved.
(7) That the members of the Board whose term of office expire with this Assembly be elected and that Reverend

Stuart Nye Hutchison, D.D., be elected to fill the mexpired term of Reverend James H. snowden, D.I., resigned, and that Elder J. E. Potter be elected to fill the unexpired torm of Elder S. E. Cill, deceased.

## Freedmen.

The Report of the Standing Committee on Freedmen was presented through its Chairman, Rev. R. Lincoln Long, I).I)., and pending the adoption of its recommendations, the 1 ssembly was addressed by the General Secretary of the Board of Missions for Freedmen, the Rev. John M. Gaston, D.D., and the Assembly was favored by selections from the Quintet of Biddle University, Charlotte, N. C. The report and its resolutions were adopted, and are as follows:
I. The term of service of the following members expires with this Assembly: Rev. Maitland Alexander, D.D., Rev. M. M. McDivitt, D.D., Mr. George B. Logan, James C. Gray, Esq., Mr. Alexander Murdock. We recommend to the Assembly that they be re-elected.
II. Whereas, There are twelve million of negroes in this great republic who are frequently the direct objects of prejudice, mob violence, lynchings and other forms of maltreatment and injustice, and

Whereas, The Senate of the United States has before it the Dyer Bill designed to destroy these great evils, therefore,

Be it Resolved; That this Assembly now in session express its approval of this bill, put itself on record as supporting it, thus reminding the christian forces of the nation of their solemn duty to work for the destruction of these evils which are undermining the very foundations of our government.
III. That the General Assembly especially note and commend the movement growing out of the Inter-Racial conference held in Memphis, Tennessee, October 6, 7, 1920, and that our Church shall coöperate with this movement by asserting and applying Christianity as the solution of race relations in America; by promoting mutual confidence and acquaintance between white and negro churches, by arraying the sentiment of our Churches against mob violence: by securing and distributing accurate knowledge of the actual facts regarding racial relations and racial attitudes in general: by helping to develop a public conscience which will secure safety and liberty for the negro in securing education, health, housing, recreation and all other necessities of a christian community; by the cordial reception in our churches of qualified speaker: both white and colored on the problems of the negro people;
and by showing the same Christlike spirit toward these $12,-$ 000,000 negroes within our borders, that we have endeavored to show toward the Africans of the foreign mission field.
IV. That the Women's department of Missions for Freedmen is certainly to be commended with gratitude for their share of the work, and especially in their interest in the education and civilization of the negro. The work of the women has always been marked by unprejudiced interest and womanly sympathy. Instinctively they have understood the problem of home life among our colored people and their sympathy has materialized in most generous financial assistance.
V. That as recommended by former Assemblies, the Sabbath nearest Lincoln's Birthday be reserved in all of our Churches for presenting the cause of the negro people of the United States and that it be recommended that offerings shall be taken upon that day for the work of the Freedman's Board, especially where the printed programs provided by the Board are used in observance of Freedmen's Sunday.
VI. That in view of the fact that there are over $12,000,000$ negroes in the United States-that among them there are only 675 Presbyterian workers and a constituency of 26,811 negro communicants, and that to cope with the enormous problem of education, evangelization of these people, there are only 147 day schools of our denomination that this Assembly especially urge the local churches to see that the just percentage of benevolences voted by the Assembly for the work of the Freedman's Board be faithfully observed and where possible, local churches shall be urged to support their work among colored people within the territory of influence of the local churches by specific programs that will safe-guard against violence and save souls with true Missionary zeal.
VII. That we earnestly recommend to the Executive Committee that in future budgets the percentage of benevolences designated by local churches to the Freedman's Board be increased. This in view of the fact that the present budget is entirely inadequate of the needs and emergencies and out of proportion to the critical situations faced by the Board Workers and the enormous constituency the Board not only seeks to serve, but is pressed to serve.
VIII. That the records of the Secretary of the Board being received and found in order, be approved by the Assembly.

## Education

The Report of the Standing Committee on Education was presented by its Chairman, Rev. Paul R. Hickok, D.D., and pending the adoption of the recommendations, the Assembly
was addressed by the General Secretary of the General Board of Education, the Rev. Edgar P. Hill, D.D. A resolution submitted by the Rev. Wallace Radcliffe, D.D., was referred to the Standing Committee on Education to be considered and reported back to this Assembly.

The report and its recommendations were adopted, which are as follows:

1. That for the establishment of a reasonable moral and spiritual basis for all plans formed or energies put forth, it be affirmed as the solemn conviction of the Church as represented in this General Assembly, that "the cause of Christian education is fundamental to the maintenance and extension of the work of the Christian Church at home and abroad"; and that "the success of Home and Foreign Missions, and of all other enterprises of the Church, admittedly depends upon the success of Christian education."
2. That the minutes of the General Board of Education, also of the Board of Education and of the College Board be approved.
3. That the report of the Treasurer of the General Board of Education, having been duly examined and approved by certified public accountants, be approved, and that the Treasurer be commended for the efficient manner in which he has handled the funds of the Board.
4. That Sunday, May 6, 1923, be designated as Vocation Day, when the Christian principles of life investment shall be emphasized and the call to the ministry, missions and other forms of distinctly Christian service shall be definitely presented both to the young people and to their parents.
5. That in conjunction with the Assembly's Permanent Committee on Evangelism, which will provide the evangelistic emphasis, the Board arrange for a special effort in each Presbyterian college to win to Jesus Christ those students who are not His followers, to deepen the devotional life of the institutions, and to secure workers needed for trained life service in the fields and callings for which the Church is responsible. Furthermore, that the efforts of this nature made during the past year under direction of the Board in conjunction with the Committee on Evangelism, be gratefully recognized, and the officers of these agencies, together with those who served in each of the colleges and universities be heartily commended for the wisdom and effectiveness of their labors.
6. That the Assembly approve of the revised rules of the Student's Rotary Loan Fund, and of the revised rules under which aid is granted to those preparing for Christian srvice.
7. That the Assembly authorize the Board to place in the Rotary Loan Fund any amounts realized from repayments of special loans made to Soldiers and Sailors.
8. That inasmuch as the World's Christian Student Federation annually calls for the observance of the last Sabbath of February as a universal day of prayer for students, the Assembly requests that on Sabbath, February 25, 1923, special intercession be made for students both of our own and other Churches in America and in all the world, to the end that they may know Jesus Christ as their Saviour and that they, the leaders of the coming generation, may learn to follow the Prince of Peace.
9. That the Assembly approve of the action of the General Board of Education in granting aid to six students who are studying in the Teologico Seminario at Cardenas, Cuba, a seminary fostered by the Presbyterian Board of Home Missions.
10. That the General Assembly herein expresses its appreciation of the loyal labors of the presidents of the various academies and colleges with which the General Board of Education coöperates in the several synods. By the tireless devotion of these men and their faculties in these difficult financial times, the cause of Christian education has been steadily advanced and the fundamental principles of Christian leadership have been given an increasing prominence in the educational program of the colleges.
11. The Assembly has deep satisfaction in the reports of methods and achievements in the department of University and College work. With more than 25,000 Presbyterian students now enrolled in non-sectarian institutions, and this number rapidly increasing, the demand for our systematic service to them is urgent. We rejoice in the marked success of this work represented by 23 full-time and 25 part-time university pastors, and commend the Board for its farsighted policy of assisting synods in procuring funds for buildings, salaries and endowments.
12. That the Assembly heartily commend to pastors and people the book approved by the General Board of Education, entitled "Education for Successful Living," written by Rev. James E. Clarke, D.D., and designed especially for use in prayer meetings and study groups, in order that the whole Church may become fully aroused to the importance of religion as an essential part of any education which will result in a truly Christian Commonwealth.
13. In view of the vital relation sustained by the rural community to all the interests of society, urban and rural alike, and especially to the maintenance in America of sound religion and a strong Church, the General Board of Education is requested to give earnest and sympathetic consideration to the practicability of undertaking in the Colleges of Agricul-
ture, and especially in those colleges having large wroups of Presbyterian students, forms of service and evangelism eorresponding in some measure to those now being offered to similar groups in colleges of liberal arts and ,n state miversities.
14. Recognizing the increasing demand and opportunity for wisely trained lay workers in our Churches and in mission service the General Assmbly receives with interest the ent larged plans of Lay Training Schools of the Chureh, and the General Board of Education is encouraged to give such counsel and assistance to schools of this character as in the Board's: judgment may seem wise.
15. That the Assembly approve the plan of the General Board of Education for holding a series of Conferences in Presbyteries and large centers for the purpose of a concentrating the thought of leaders upon the cause of Christian Education.
16. That the Assembly heartily congratulate the Ceneral Board of Education on the success thus far achieved in the campaign for $\$ 35,000,000$ for Christian Education as inaugurated by the Assembly of 1918 and as modified by the Assembly of 1921, and that the Assembly urge the General Board of Education to push forward the campaign with all possible fidelity until the entire sum of $\$ 35,000,000$ has been secured.
17. That the Assembly approve the re-election to the class of 1925, of the following members of the College Board, whose terms of office expire with this Assembly:

## Theological Seminaries

The Report of the Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries was presented by its Chairman, Rev. Wilton Merle-Smith, D.D. The report was approved and its recommendations adopted, as follows:

1. That the election of all Directors, Trustees and Professors as reported by the various Seminaries be approved.
2. That the change of Charter in the Kentucky Seminary providing for the election of 12 Directors by the Synod of Kentucky of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. and of 24 Directors by three or more Synods of the Presbyterian Church of the U. S. which change has already been voted by the Synods involved be approved.
3. That this Assembly heartily approve of such recruiting for the ministry as Seminaries may be able to do, believing that this work needs added emphasis. It calls also upon our ministers and upon Christian parents to do what they can to influence the best of our noble Christian young men toward the ministry, that our Seminary Graduates may be sufficient to man our vacant churches.
4. That the excellent work done in our Theological Seminaries be commended and the church be urged to increase their endowment to an amount sufficient for their imperative needs.
5. That this Assembly approves the high standard of education in our Seminaries, and urges the Presbyteries to see that candidates for the ministry sent to the Seminaries have such preliminary education as will fit them to master the Seminary courses.
6. That this Assembly approves the instruction established for lay workers by our Seminaries as an invaluable aid in the

Christian education of Women Missionaries, Sunday School Workers, Lay assistance to pastors and other lay helpers, and urge all our seminaries to use their endowment and equipment more largely if possible in the cause of Christian Education, believing, however, that the Presbyteries will not allow insufficient training to constitute a short cut to the ministry.
7. This Assembly suggests to the Seminaries the consideration of the question of a service not only to their own graduates but to all ministers who may live in their vicinity, by such use of their libraries and by summer schools of theological training and refreshing which will make them a great source of inspiration to the churches in their neighborhood. The closing of the Seminaries for more than four months during the year makes possible a work the importance of which has been fully demonstrated already, and the influence of which will be far reaching and of inestimable value to the church.

The Rev. Howard Campbell, D.D., of the Presbytery of North Siam, having presented credentials in proper form, was enrolled as a commissioner of this Assembly.

The order of the day having arrived, the time was extended ten minutes.

At the request of the Stated Clerk, the Standing Rules were suspended, and the docket for Wednesday forenoon, rearranged.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. J. Milton Thompson, D.D., of the Presbytery of Brooklyn-Nassau, to conduct the devotional service on Wednesday noon.

The Assembly adjourned to meet at 8.30 A.M., Wednesday, and was closed with prayer by Elder J. P. Moore of the Presbytery of Cedar Rapids, who was presented to the Assembly by the Moderator as having completed 50 years in the eldership of the Church.

At 7.45 P.M. a popular meeting was held in the interests of the work of the Board of Home Missions.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by the Rev.
J. C. Barr, D.D., of the Presbytery of Jefferson.

## Bills and Overtures

The Committee on Bills and Overtures, through its Chairman, Rev. Cleland B. McAfee, D.D., presented a further report, which was adopted as follows:

Overturcs Nos. 88 from the Presbytery of Kittanning, 91 from the Presbytery of Lehigh, and 128 from the Presbytery of St. Clairsville. It is recommended, in view of the action of this General Assembly continuing the tentative plan of the Annual Survey and Report for another year, that record be made of the protest of the Presbyteries of Kittanning, Lehigh, and St. Clairsville, without further action, and that the documents be forwarded to the Committee on Christian Life and Work for its information.

Overture No. 90, a Memorial from the Presbytery of North River on the subject of advertising by the Boards and Agencies. It is recommended that the expression of the Presbytery of North River be referred to the Department of Publicity for transmission to the Boards for their consideration.

Overture No. 110 from the Presbytery of Long Island regarding a fund of the Government for the social work of the chaplains. It is recommended that the Special Committee on Chaplains in the United States Army and Navy be instructed to consider this proposal and to take such action as may seem proper in behalf of the General Assembly.

Overture No. 111 from the Presbytery of Wichita, requesting the distribution to all sessions of the overtures sent down from the General Assembly. It is recommended that the overture be answered in the negative. The General Assembly, however, expresses its earnest desire that all ministers and elders shall familiarize themselves with the various overtures sent down to the Presbyteries, copies of which will always be found in the Minutes of the Assembly and in the church press.

Overture No. 114 from the Presbytery of Philadelphia, requesting permission to erase the name of Ernest C. Bartlett from the roll of Presbytery. It is recommended that answer be made as follows: A similar petition regarding another minister having reached the General Assembly of 1906 which was answered with permission to erase the name from the roll, without prejuclice to the ministerial standing of the missing minister, this General Assembly authorizes the Presbytery of Philadelphia to drop the name of Rev. Ernest C. Bartlett from the roll without prejudice to his ministerial standing.

Overture No. 132 from the Presbytery of Nashville, with reference to the distribution of apportionments to the Boards and Agencies. This General Assembly having already taken
action on the matter, it is recommended that bo further action is now required.

Overture No. 150 from the Preshytery of Mattoon, asking certain alterations in the rules of the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation. Action on this overture having been taken by this Assembly, it is recommended that no further action be now taken.

Overture No. 152 from the Presbytery of Catawba, opposing the merging of the Board of Missions for Freedmen with any other Board. This Cieneral Assembly having already taken action including the Board of Missions for Freedmen in the plan for reorganization and consolidation, it is recommended that no further action be taken.

Overture No. 151 from the Presbytery of Minneapolis, requesting a fuller interpretation of certain declarations of the Presbyterian Church in "The Social Creed." It is recommended that the following action be taken: The attention of the Presbytery of Minneapolis is directed to the action of the General Assembly of 1920 on the Church and Industry, as being the most explicit declaration thus far made. The request of the Presbytery is referred to the Board of Home Missions for consideration as to the wisdom of further declarations, such declarations, if found to be necessary, to be reported to the next General Assembly before their authoritative publication.

The following resolutions are recommended for adoption:
The General Assembly learns with interest of the purpose to celebrate on Wednesday, October 4, 1922, the fiftieth anniversary of the first formal meeting of the eminent American scholars who constituted the American Revision Committee, and whose persistent labors during the ensuing thirty years resulted in the issuance of the American Standard Bible. It recalls that the head of this committee was an honored minister of our own communion, Philip Schaff, and that others of its ministers served in the same cause. Welcoming, as it does, all new light upon the Word of God, and all new light from that Word, it commends the celebration of this anniversary to Presbyteries, churches, and people, as an opportunity to present anew the living and refreshing truth of the Scripture.

The General Assembly notes with renewed interest the plans for the celebration of the anniversary of the granting of Magna Charta, on June 15th, and the observance of the third Sunday in June as Magna Charta Sunday. It commends to its churches and Sunday Schools such recognition of the days designated as may aid to a fuller appreciation of the blessings. of liberty and a clearer apprehension of the hand of God in human history.

The Stated Clerk of the Assmbly calls the attention of the Committee on Bills and Overtures to the unfortunate wording which is introduced into the Form of Government by the adoption of the overture on the election of women as deacons. For the sake of clarity we recommend that the following overture be sent to the Presbyteries:

Shall the Form of Government be amended to read as follows:
(a) Shall Chapter XIII, Section II, which now reads as follows: "Every congregation shall elect persons to the office of ruling elder and to office of the deacon, or either of them in the mode most approved and in use in that congregation. But in all cases the persons elected must be male members in full communion in the church in which they are to exercise their office. With the exception that deaconsmay be male or female", be amended to read as follows:
"Every congregation shall elect persons to the office of ruling elder, and to the office of deacon, or either of them, in the mode most approved and in use in that congregation. In all cases the persons elected must be members in full communion in the churches in which they are to exercise their office; provided, that men shall be pigible to election to the office of ruling elder, and that men and women shall be eligible to election to the office of deacon"?
(b) Shall Chapter XIII, Section IV, V, be amended by the insertion of words suitable to the ordination of women to the office of deacon, inserting in brackets after the word "brother" the word "sister," and in brackets after the masculine pronouns the appropriate pronouns?

The Committee on Bills and Overtures, continuing its report, presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, The people of the United States have been for years and are now being requested to contribute to the relief of Christians in the Near East, and

Whereas, We believe the conditions necessitating relief arise mainly through the persecution of the native Christians by the Turks, and

Whereas, Mere relief, however generous, will not guarantee the security of the Christians of the Near East.

Therefore, The General Assembly respectfully petitions the Government of the United States to take such steps as may seem wise to make the Christian peoples of the Near East secure in the peaceful pursuits of their lives and worship.

Also that this action be communicated to the Secretary of State of the United States and to the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the United States Senate,

The Committee appointed to canvass the vote on Overtures sent down to the Presbyteries by the Assmbly of 1921, through its Chairman, the Rev. P. W. Snyder, D.D., presented its report, which is as follows:

Your Committee has canvassed the count of the vote of the Presbyteries on the Overture sent down by the $A$ ssembly of 1921, proposing to change Chapter XXII of the Form of Government so as to permit the election of Commissioners to the General Assembly for a term of two years, and find that 31 Presbyteries have voted in the affirmative, 222 in the negative, one took no action, and one declined to pronounce, as follows:

The Committee of Canvass having reported that the Overture on the Election of Commissioners to the General Assembly for a Term of Two Years had not received the majority required by the Constitution, the Moderator then announced that said Overture had been lost.

## Women as Deacons

The Committee of Canvass having reported that the Overture on the Election of Women as Deacons had received the majority required by the Constitution, the General Assembly
declared by resolution that said Overture had been adopted as a part of the Form of Covermment. The Overture adopted reads as follows:
"Shall the Form of Govermment, Chapter XIII, Section 2, be amended by adding, 'with the exception that Deacons may be either male or female'?"

## Standing Committee on Polity

The Standing Committee on Polity, through its Chairman, the Rev. John B. Laird, D.D., presented a report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

That an overture be sent down to the Presbyteries amending Chapter VIII of the Form of Government by the addition of a new Section III to read "In these assemblies only members thereof who are personally present are entitled to vote."

Overture 63 from the Synod of Western (Welsh) asking that the Synod be dissolved, the Churches to join the nearest Presbytery and Synod. It is recommended that this overture be answered in the affirmative.

Overture 64 from the Presbytery of Eastern Long Creek (Welsh) asking the General Assembly to recognize and confirm the dissolution of the Presbytery. It is recommended that this request be granted.

Overture 65 from the Presbytery of Western Kansas (Welsh) asking the General Assembly to recognize and confirm the dissolution of the Presbytery. It is recommended that this request be granted.

Overture 66 from the Presbytery of North River asking that the action of the Assembly of 1921 ordering that all Minutes of Boards of Trustees shall be entered on record of sessions be rescinded. It is recommended that no action be taken on this request.

Overture 68 from the Synod of Minnesota (Welsh) asking approval of the change in the name of the Presbytery of the Synod and of the action uniting two Presbyteries. It is recommended that this approval be given.

Overiure 62 from the Presbytery of Laramie, requesting the realignment of the Presbyteries in the Synod of Wyoming. Affirmative action upon this already having been taken by the Synod, the Committee recommends its approval.

Overture 69 from the Synod of West Virginia and Overture TO from the Presbytery of Nebraska City, asking first, that the Assembly rules be so amended that any evangelical minister serving a federate church of which a Presbyterian Church is a constituent member, may be authorized, upon request of the Session, to act as Moderator of the Session in all matters per-
taining to reception and dismiswal of members, and in all matters pertaining to the local and benevolent budgets of the Church. In all other matters the regularly appointed Moolerator shall preside; asking, second, that the names of all Non-Presbyterian ministers serving Presbyterian Churches in federation shall be included in the list of ministers in the Assembly Minutes, set apart by brackets, with the abbreviations "Fed. S. S." added. The recommendation concerning the first petition is that no action be taken. The Committee would call attention to the provision of the Form of Government upon this subject and also to the action of the General Assembly of 1922. With reference to the second petition, the Committee recommends negative action.

Overture 76 from the Presbytery of St. Cloud, asking for the creation of a reserve roll of Churches upon which the Churches of the Presbytery which to all practical purposes are dead, may be placed, even as Churches have authority to place inactive members, upon a reserved list. It is recommended that this be answered in the negative.

Overlure 209 providing for the following change in Form of Government: Chapter XXVI, Section I of the Form of Government, be amended as follows: In sentence one, the word "five" be substituted for the word "three," and the word "fifteen" for the word "seven." For the last sentence, this sentence is substituted. "A quorum in the Executive Com mission of a Presbytery shall be three ministers and as many elders as may be present; a quorum in the Executive Commission of a Synod shall be seven ministers and as many elders as may be present; a quorum in the Executive Commission of the General Assembly shall be a majority of the members. Less than a quorum may adjourn to a fixed date." The Committee recommends that an overture be prepared and sent down to the Presbyteries embodying these changes.

Overture 207 from the Church of Newberg in the Synod of Oregon, asking to be transferred from the Presbytery of Willamette to the Presbytery of Portland. Accompanying the petition of the Newberg Church are the consenting act of the Presbytery of Willamette and the concurrent action of the Presbytery of Portland, the endorsement of the Synod of Oregon and a full description of the territory affected, giving metes and bounds. The petition is adopted.

Overtures 71 from the Presbytery of Rock River, 131 from the Presbytery of Ottawa, and 142 from the Presbytery of Freeport, asking amendment to the Form of Government, Chapter X, so as to allow a pastor employed by two or more Presbyteries working among vacant Churches to perform the office of pastor in those Churches.

The Committee recommends that the following overture be submitted to the Presbytery, to be known as Section II, Chapter IX of Form of Government: "When two or more Presbyterics unite in employing a minister to labor among the vacant Churches of these Presbyteries, he may perform all of the offices of a pastor in any of the vacant churches within the bounds of the Presbyteries so employing him when authorized by the Presbytery in which he is laboring but of which he is not a member."

Overture 202 from the Southern Presbyterian Church of Racine, requesting transfer from Presbytery of Central West to Presbytery of Milwaukee. The Committee answers this Overture as follows: "Forasmuch as no information has come to the Committee of the Church's application to the Presbytery of which it is a member, or of the Synod, it recommends the return of this overture to the Church sending it, suggesting that they proceed in an orderly way."

Paper No. 122 from the Presbytery of Newark inquiring if a Ruling Elder who is a Moderator of a Presbytery is legally competent to propound the constitutional questions at the licensing of a candidate to preach. The Committee answers this inquiry as follows:
"That in view of the many deliverances of the Assembly upon the subject declaring that an elder is not competent to participate in the ordination of a minister, it would seem that the same is true with regard to licensing, which is the initial step in the process of ordination, and therefore he cannot propound the constitutional questions at a licensure."

Overture 112 from the Presbytery of Philadelphia asking that a method for the induction of Deaconesses into office suggested by that Presbytery shall be approved by the Assembly. The answer to this overture recommended by the committee is that the form of service suggested be commended as a fit and worthy method to be used by any Presbytery desiring to use it in a service setting apart Deaconesses to their work.

Overture 148 from the Presbytery of Cleveland asking a judicial interpretation or decision relative to the right of a member of any Presbytery to prefer charges against a member of another Presbytery without first having submitted his case to the Presbytery of which he is a member and within whose bounds alleged offenses are said to have been committed. The answer to this overture recommended is that the Book of Discipline, Chapter II, Section 15, fully covers the petition made, and therefore no answer is necessary.

Paper submitted concerning the transfer of the Western Welsh Synod which asks that the action of the Synod in thus
transferring itself be approved. The recommendation is that this action be approved.

Papers from the Pecos Valley Presbytery which were riquested by the Asscmbly a year ago, were presented and found satisfactory.

The Committee received from the Assmbly, Section XIV of the Executive Commission's Report with reference to furnishing excerpts of records in the custody of Stated Clerks, and recommends that these recommendations be adopted as follows:
(a). When requested by vote of the judicatory of which the clerk is an officer, or of a superior judicatory.
(b). When requested in writing by a member (minister or elder Commissioner) of the judicatory of which the clerk is an officcr.
(c). When requested in writing by the Session of a Church under the jurisdiction of the judicatory of which the clerk is an officer
(d). When requested by one of the original parties or his officially recognized counsel, in a case of discipline of review, of reference, of complaint, or of appeal.

Provided, however, that under no circumstances whatever shall a clerk grant an extract or extracts from records of the judicatory of which he is clerk, when in doubt as to his right so to do under the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., as contained in the Form of Government and the Book of Discipline until he shall have presented the request for an extract or extracts from his records to the judicatory of which he is clerk and has received instructions from said judicatory as to his duty in the premises.

## Telegram from Presbyterian Church in the U. S.

The following telegram, received from the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. was read to the Assembly:

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. having expressed a preference for the General Council of the Reformed Churches in America over the Constitution of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches, which has been the subject of discussion between us for several years past, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. accepts that decision. We renew our expression of most cordial admiration and affection for your venerable Church, we thank God for the great work you have done, are doing, and are destined to do.

## Christian Life and Work

The Report of the Standing Committee on Christian Life and Work; together with the Report of the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply, was presented by the Chairman, Rev. L. M. Coffman, D.D. Pending the adoption of the report and its recommendations, the Assembly was addressed by the Rev. George N. Luccock, D.D., Chairman of the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply. The report and its recommendations were adopted, and are as follows:

The Standing Committee on Narrative of Christian Life and work report that the Special Committee on Christian Life and work having thoroughly canvassed the general spiritual condition of the Church, and the General Assembly having accepted their report with its resolutions, nothing further remained for this Committee to do in the matter of a narrative; and that Section X of said report and Section XI, resolution 9, finally dispose of this Committee.

With respect to the report of the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply, referred to us, we recommend:

1. That the Chairman of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply be heard.
2. Inasmuch as the General Assembly's Continuation Committee on Reorganization and Consolidation of the Boards and Agencies has selected September 1, 1922 as the date when the work heretofore performed by the General Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply should be transferred to the office of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, and has appointed a special committee consisting of G. N. Luccock, R. E. Pugh and John Timothy Stone, to counsel with the Stated Clerk in effecting such transfer, we recommend that the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply be discharged from further responsibility after September 1, 1922.
3. That the following recommendations of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply be adopted:
4. That the General Assembly, recognizing its great loss in the death of Rev. W. H. Houston, D. D., records its deep appreciation of the constructive pioneer work performed by him, as the Executive Secretary of the General Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply, from the beginning of its organization until his death.
5. That the Committee's action in arranging for the temporary conduct of the central office, without electing a successor to Dr. Houston, pending reorganization plans, be approved.
6. That the temporary organization of the work of the central office be continued until the action taken by this Assembly for its transfer to the office of the Stated (lerk shall become effective.

A resolution introduced by Elder C. C. Kerr, of the Presbytery of Chillicothe, was referred on motion to the Standing Committee on Temperance and Moral Welfare.

## Visitation of Theological Seminaries

The Report of the Special Committee to Visit Theological Seminaries was presented by its Chairman, Rev. W. O. Thompson, D.D., LL.D. A resolution submitted by the Rev. Henry C. Swearingen, D.D., was ordered to be incorporated at the end of the report, and the report as thus amended, was adopted, and is as follows:
I. The Action of the Assembly.-Reference to the action of the Assembly of 1921, Pages 128, 129 of the Minutes, Item 5 , of the report of the standing committee on Theological Seminaries will reveal the fact that this Committee is to "consider the whole situation" and more specifically to make recommendations concerning the most efficient use of the equipments and endowments for the training of religious workers and leaders for the Church in her modern situation. This resolution would appear to authorize two things; first, a somewhat general report; and, second, a specific report of the use of funds.
II. Method of Procedure.-After preliminary correspondence, the examination of Seminary catalogs, the report of these Seminaries to the General Assembly, and the preparation of a memorandum as the basis of discussion, all members of the Committee met in Chicago, February 10th and 11th, 1922. During this period a visit was made to the McCormick Theological Seminary. At other times one or more members of the Committee visited Western Theological Seminary, Omaha Theological Seminary, Lane Theological Seminary, Auburn Theological Seminary and Princeton Theological Seminary. It was not found practicable to visit all the seminaries. The Committee recognizes with gratitude the cordial spirit shown by all the Theological Seminaries and their readiness to consider and discuss the questions suggested in the resolution of the Assembly.
III. The General Situation.-At the outset t may be stated that the primary object of the Theological Seminaries is to educate a ministry for the Church. In the earlier years three or four men constituted a faculty of instruction. These
professors undertook to teach men in the important fields of Theology, Old and New Testament Exegesis, Church History and Homileties. The catalogs of these seminaries at present reveal the fact of a considerable increase in the number of men engaged in teaching and a correspondingly increased number in the subjects of instruction. Not a little diverse criticism had found expression from time to time in various quarters of the Church based upon the fact that the instruction given fails to prepare men for the work required by the modern Chureh. This criticism has expressed dissatisfaction with some of the older subjects of instruction and a desire that the seminaries put a larger emphasis on organization and operation of the Church in large cities, in mission fields and among exceptional populations. Some complaint has also been expressed that the Theological Seminaries are not sufficiently responsive to the importance of a study of modern Psychology, the Principles of Education, and especially to the needs of the wide field of Christian education. Pastors are disposed to observe that the young men from the seminaries are somewhat theoretical in their attitude and lacking in the grasp of the practical phases of Christian life and practice facing the Chureh. This suggests the importance of having in theological faculties representative men whose achievements in the American pulpit are outstanding and whose gifts are such as to inspire young men to the highest success in preaching.

Without discussing at length the content of the curricula of the seminaries, it is proper to observe that the theological faculties are entrusted with the duty of adjusting the curriculum from time to time as needed. No other agency exists for this purpose. If a conservative attitude prevents adjustment, it is also true that a too ready response of a superficial character may result in great dissatisfaction. The Church is not without responsibility for the Theological Seminaries but the Seminaries themselves should be awake to the needs of the Church at all times and keep the curricula in accord with the demands of sound scholarship, an educated ministry and the needs of the Church. The historic position of the Presbyterian Church in her demand for an educated ministry has given her a definite place of leadership among the Protestant denominations. To sacrifice this leadership through indifference to a collegiate or theological education or through any failure to meet the demands of the modern Church would reflect upon our history and darken our prospects.
2. In response to a demand, not very well articulated, there has come into existence a number of Bible Institutes, Summer Bible Schools, and other short course agencies whose
objective seems to be the preparation of evangelists, preachers and religious workers.

These institutions and organizations have no doubt rendered effective service in the preparation of a great many religious workers. The motives underlying these organizations may be commended most heartily. The fact remains, however, that they are not equal to the demands of the Church as now expressed in many quarters. Furthermore, the Church should not be blind to the facts that much of this work is of necessity somewhat superficial. This is due in part to the meagre equipment of the institutions, the inadequate education of those attending and the lack of continuity in the teaching organization. The variable preparation of students in these schools contravenes well established educational principles both in the organization of the school and in the character of the teaching possible. It is not surprising, therefore, that complaints have been heard to the effect that some of these persons are neither well balanced in their theological and religious views nor adapted to the service demanded by the Church. The divisive effect resulting from the work of some of these persons is altogether too evident.

The fact that the responsibility for the licensure of candidates for the ministry rests with the Presbytery suggests that a more careful consideration of this question be urged upon the Presbyteries. The constitutional requirements for the licensure and ordination of candidates for the ministry are too often lightly considered. Examination as to motives for entering the ministry as well as the subsequent examinations for licensure and ordination are often altogether too informal. The impression is wide-spread that examinations are more in the interests of orthodoxy than of theological learning. A little more time given to these examinations would probably conserve both interests and elevate the standard of the ministry in the Church. Attention is therefore urged upon Presbyteries as to the importance of exercising their constitutional rights with more care both in the recommendation of young men to the theological seminaries and in their licensure. The need of the Church is not so much quantity as quality of men who are prepared to present in an adequate and effective manner the great issues of life and salvation that lie in the field of Christian education. The endorsement and recommendation of candidates for the ministry should be taken rather more seriously than is ordinarily true. Too much conscience and judgment cannot easily be expended in this service.
3. It has been estimated in certain circles that in order to carry forward the Christian program for the immediate future,
the evangelical Churches of the United States need ten thousand religious teachers and workers. The Presbyterian Church would, of course, need a reasonable proportion of this number. This field calls for pastors' assistants, religious teachers in the communities, directors of religious education in some of the Churches, and in some instances for specially educated men to serve as Sunday School superintendents.

Several of the theological seminaries are announcing courses intended to meet the needs of the Church for workers of the above description. There is some doubt, however, whether they are adequately equipped, either with money or with men, to provide an education such as the Church requires. They are to be commended, however, for pointing the way toward meeting this need and for revealing a disposition to utilize their resources to the highest possible degree. It is obvious that if these helpers are to meet the general standards of education set by the Church a more adequate preparation's should be provided.
4. It will be apparent that the Church, as a Church, is not organized to meet this need. The Presbyterian denomination is probably not in any better situation in this regard than any other of the leading denominations. There is a doubt whether we are quite up to the average.
5. It will be apparent that the denominational and Christian colleges are not adequately equipped either with biblical scholars or libraries to meet the need of the Church for religious teachers in our colleges and in other fields. The commendable effort to provide religious education in the Christian college has not yet reached the efficiency that its most ardent friends would desire. The centers where graduate work in theology or in the field of religious education is organized are few. The Presbyterian Church is not conspicuous for leadership in this work. The Committee makes grateful recognition of the fact as reported to the last General Assembly of the endowment of religious education in some of the seminaries and of the program announced for Summer Schools. These indicate an interest in and perhaps point a way to a larger participation by the Church in the general field of Christian education. A School of Religious Education, as announced by the Auburn Theological Seminary occupying separate buildings and requiring a college degree for entrance, will enjoy the instruction in part from the theological faculty and in part from members of the faculties of nearby educational institutions. The aim of this school is not "to furnish a short cut to the ministry" but to supplement the work done by the seminary in making provision "to train qualified men and women to aid the ministers in their task at home and abroad."

This school is a serious and earnest effort to meet a recognized need, but like all such efforts needs a more generous support in order to be free to render its best service. The Western Theological Seminary also announces special courses in religious education and considerable emphasis upon the study of the English Bible throughout the entire course. Seminaries located at Princeton and Western, also Lane, have working agreements with the local universities whereby they are able to combine the opportunities of the seminary and the university, thus making available not only courses of study but greatly enlarged library facilities. The fact should not be overlooked, however, that any great utilization of these combination courses should mean an extension of the time of study. The years given now to preparation for the ministry are all too short and the candidates need more time for the deliberate reading and study essential to well adjusted scholarship. Other theological seminaries are attempting some organization of their curricula toward meeting these newer demands. The fact remains, however, that the adjustment is still incomplete and insufficient.
6. It will be apparent that there is very little graduate work of significant character available either in the colleges, universities or theological seminaries to prepare men to be teachers of the Bible. It is doubtful whether such as is available is comparable with the organized graduate work in other fields of learning. We are organizing graduate schools in the leading universities adequately equipped to prepare scholars and teachers. But very few of these institutions have been prepared to cover the field of religious education in any such manner as they would cover the field of Chemistry, History or Economics. Most of the work done in the field of religious education is under-graduate or post-graduate work rather than graduate work. The demand of the future, if our Christian faith is to be strongly buttressed in the educated men and women of the country, will be for a scholarly teaching of the scriptures and a scholarly survey of the field of Christian education. The committee recognizes with appreciation the announcement in the catalog of Princeton Seminary looking toward the development of advanced and of graduate study. The fellowship funds of Princeton furnish a foundation for advanced scholarship of the very highest importance. The location of Princeton and some others of the seminaries in proximity to universities enables a co-operative participation in developing scholarship and graduate study. It should be noted, however, that the field of biblical and theological knowledge is rarely given the consideration in the University necessary for the advancement of Christian scholarship. This
raises among other questions the important issue of an adequate library for graduate work at such seminaries as undertake to grant advanced degrees.
7. There is a lack of literature from our own Church and in general from the Reformed Churches. Some commentaries and single volumes representing scholarship of a high degree do exist but there is a great dearth of teachable and usable books for religious instruction. An examination of the books now used in the Presbyterian Church will reveal the fact that too few of them come from Presbyterian sources and that many of them are written with underlying assumptions upon biblical questions and the Christian faith that are not in harmony with the standards of the Church. The Presbyterian Church has not kept pace with other communions in this field. The question is here raised whether any stimulus can be put upon Presbyterian scholarship to meet this situation. The appeal might well be made to the theological faculties for a more generous response to the needs of the Church for a literature of Christian education.
8. Whether the responsibility for meeting the demand for trained leaders and adequate number of scholarly leaders lies with the theological seminaries or with the colleges and universities we may not now be able to say. The opinion is here expressed that the Church should face the responsibility for Christian education more earnestly if she expects to meet the needs of the coming generation. If this position be accepted, then it would seem to follow that a closer co-ordination between collegiate and theological education should be encouraged and developed. The opinion has prevailed altogether too widely that the theological seminary is an institution apart from the colleges and from the general system of education under the direction of the Church. The Committee recognizes the delicate and difficult question of control or of adjustment where institutions themselves desire a closer co-operation with the Church. Nevertheless, the highest efficiency would seem to require an intelligent unifying of the cause of the higher and theological education. It is apparent also that the control of the Church is theoretical rather than actual or practical in the field of religious education. The theological seminaries have had very few suggestions from the Church. The colleges are in the same situation. The Bible schools as a rule are dependent upon the local presbyteries or synods for moral approval and upon individuals in the Churches and upon patrons for financial support. This general approval and support has been given in a very limited degree by the Church. The educational program and organization of these schools has not been examined and approved,
and while their efforts may be commended, the support has been based upon general sympathy with the aim rather than upon definite acquaintance with the means for achieving desired results. The issue, therefore, is raised whether the Church can afford to go on and be dependent for her leaders upon a situation in which an altogether limited interest has been shown.
9. Reference may again be made to the protest sometimes expressed against the curriculum of the theological seminaries. This protest is not effective because it does not strike at the real issue or suggest an adequate remedy. The issue centers around the fact that the modern Church and the modern situation demand religious leaders other than the preachers in the pulpit. The preparation of a ministry for the Church is a distinct service. The last decade has developed the necd of scholars, teachers and workers in the field of Christian education. The remedy would not be to increase the number of ministers. Many of these men are prepared to preach the gospel but very few of them are prepared to teach the Bible or to teach in the wide field embraced in Christian education. The diversity of gifts must now have some attention if we are to meet the situation completely. The opinion prevails that men expecting to become teachers either in colleges or theological seminaries should be encouraged to attend the theological seminaries and pursue such courses as would equip them for exercising teaching gifts as effectively as we should like to see the preacher exercise his function.
10. Without desiring to criticise, it may nevertheless be said that there is some reason to believe that the faculties both in the theological seminaries and in the colleges representing religious education have not been the force in educational policies that their scholarship, character and service would warrant. This situation may be due in part to the fact that religious education is one of the newer divisions of the modern curriculum and in part to the historic conception of separateness attaching to the theological school. There is some reason to believe also that the curricula in theological seminaries have not been the subject of as much conference and scientific examination as the curricula in the public schools and colleges. In recent years conferences of the faculties of theological seminaries have begun to recognize the necessity of a more careful study of the curricula of theological seminaries than hitherto. This is a most hopeful prospect. Furthermore, where religious education has been introduced into the colleges an apologetic attitude has often been taken. There is a good reason to doubt whether the teaching of the English Bible in the denominational college
is on a parity with that of other collegiate subjects. Christian education can not make successful headway so long as the college is compelled to apologize in any degree for the work done in the name of religion.
11. The action of the Assembly would seem to intimate that the Theological Seminaries are heavily endowed and that probably they have available funds for the extension of their work or for use in fields or departments of education not now occupied. This impression may have arisen from indefinite information or from the fact that the financial reports submitted to the Assembly from year to year are not sufficiently in detail to be intelligible to the uninitiated. It may be worth while to reorganize the form of reports in such way as to bring to the Church desired information while protecting all legitimate rights and interests of the seminaries. The Committee makes recommendation that the Stated Clerk be authorized through his office to make a suitable revision of the blanks now used for the financial reports of the theological seminaries. No evidence exists that excessive salaries are paid for any service rendered to the seminaries. The truth is that the salaries paid to theological professors are altogether inadequate. They do not compare with men of college scholarship and standing in well established colleges and universities. These men by virtue of their calling have removed themselves from the temptations to enter the competitive fields for higher salaries. This, however, should not prevent a just consideration of adequate salaries for theological professors nor should it be forgotten that the seminaries are dependent entirely upon endowments for the payment of salaries since students' fees make no contribution to this end.

In every instance regret would be expressed that the funds available for libraries are insufficient. Modern education demands that the student shall live in the presence not only of ancient authorities but of the current thought of his day and generation. The increased cost of books has practically reduced available funds for libraries until the seminaries are suffering from the need of money with which to provide the current and annual needs of the libraries. The attention of the Church should be drawn to this need of theological education with great urgency and earnestness.

The physical equipment providing for instruction and for housing of students requires a considerable outlay annually. Buildings used as dormitories are special subjects of such expenditures. The fact that the theological seminaries have scholarship funds available for students should not be overlooked in estimating the available resources from seminary holdings. These funds greatly relieve the demands that
otherwise would be made upon the general board of education. Attention should be drawn to the fact that endownents are frequently given for specific purpose and could not, therefore, be utilized in new and different fields. The opinion sometimes expressed that there are more theological seminaries than the needs of the Church require and that a combination of seminaries might enable them to minister more effectively to the Church may be presented but it is doubtful whether such procedure presents the real issue. As the Committee views it, the issue is whether the theological seminaries can be better co-ordinated and organized and whether some of them could be equipped for doing a type of work much in demand by the Church. No disposition exists to lessen or weaken the work done in the preparation of a ministry but the desire is strongly expressed for more provision through which a new type of preparation may be made effective. It should be borne in mind, however, that the relation of the seminaries to the Church is not primarily legal but rather vital involving the spirit of intimate counsel and co-operation. Doubt might well exist whether these institutions on specific foundations could be united or transferred without involving a forfeiture of at least a portion of their funds. The Committee did not feel that this question was committed to it for investigation and recommendation. The reorganization and closer coordination of theological education among the different seminaries, however, would seem to be an open question worthy of future study and consideration. Whether some of these seminaries could be put upon a university basis and provide for that which is lacking in the secularized public education by training scholars for college professorships is a question well worthy of deliberate consideration by the theological faculties. The enlarged program of the Christian Church of the future will require a better co-ordination and organization of all the educational forces within the command of the Church. No doubt exists as to the readiness of theological seminaries to serve in any desired and approved capacity. The issue is rather to define the needs, survey the field and organize the forces for effective service.

Furthermore, there is a probable misapprehension as to the place of the theological professor in the economy of the Church. It is true that the seminary year is short as compared with the year in public schools or colleges. The theological professor, however, is a representative of the Chureh not only as a teacher in the most important field of education but also as the embodiment of theological learning and of the productive scholarship of the Church. The leisure necessary for such service is obvious to anyone giving it consideration. The value of the
service of the theological faculties, therefore, should not be measured by the time schedule but very largely by the representative character of these men in the fields of scholarship and education. The committee, therefore, expresses the opinion that any important addition to the work of education will require adequate endowment.
IV. Special Training Schools.-Any comprehensive consideration of education specially adapted to equip persons for religious work other than the ministry and the pastorate will raise the questions as to the scope of this work, whether such work should be under the direct and immediate control of the Church, and the relation of the Church to independent institutions of religious education such as are already in existence.

The further question as to where this work shall be done will raise the issue in most of our denominational colleges whether they should be equipped to take charge of this special phase of preparing religious leaders or whether such work shall be under the supervision of the theological seminaries or under separate organizations with appropriate Church supervision and control. The fact, however, that a more adequate teaching of the Bible in the light of present-day education will remain as a great necessity in all our colleges should not be overlooked. The truth is that the Bible has stood the abuse of a large amount of misrepresentation and misapprehension. The imperative need of a better acquaintance with the Bible is so obvious as to require no argument. The spirit of inquiry so appropriate and so active in the minds of the youth of the country should be welcomed and responded to by a wellequipped teacher able not only to guide and lead but to meet successfully the insidious attacks upon faith so common to young men and young women. The pastor in the pulpit who will always remain the chief teacher in the church will not be able personally to meet all the needs of the young people in his congregation. He must be supported by a body of well prepared teachers organized for the purpose of bringing the Bible and its teachings into the mind and heart of the rising generation. The colleges will meet the select group from these congregations but the persistent problems of faith and unbelief will meet us in every class-room either of the Sunday School or the college. These issues cannot be avoided and, therefore, should be adequately met.

The increasing demand for competently educated lay workers is emphasized by every discussion of the religious problems of the Church. Many of our large city churches are becoming increasingly conscious of the importance of these lay workers. Their education, therefore, is vital to the entire program.

It should be borne in mind that the education and traming of woman for religious work to which she is specially adapted raises a most important issue. Unless the Church recognizes this need and meets it squarely and fairly she must depend upon the more or less irregular supply of inadequately equipped representatives. It is not quite fair either to the Church or to those who undertake the service to expect that under these circumstances satisfactory results are possible. The increasing activity of women in the work of the church and the enlarged program which they are carrying have opened up new fields in which educated young women may find a splendid opportunity for the use of their talents. The day has passed when a college degree of itself signifies fitness for participating in organized Christian work. To meet this deficiency is one of the great objects in these special schools for the training of religious workers.
V. Some Practical Issues.-1. What, if anything, can the Assembly do to arouse in the Church a deeper sense of obligation with reference to an enlarged program of Christian education?
2. Is there any opportunity now before the theological seminaries not fully met and if so what remedy can be proposed and provided?
3. Is there any proposal available that would adequately prepare men and women for teaching the Bible in the Christian colleges of the country, in the Sunday Schools and other fields which the Church is invited to enter?
4. Shall the Church undertake the organization of a limited number of special schools for the education and training of lay workers? (It may be stated in this connection that the opinion of theological faculties so far as obtained was practically unanimous that such special schools would function better if not under the administrative control of the theological seminaries.)

Conclusion.-The Committee has felt its duty was to state rather than to discuss the issues. The Committee is unanimously of the opinion that a great opportunity lies before the Church. If for any reason or reasons this opportunity is not seized with vigor and the task undertaken with a high enthusiasm the conclusion can not be resisted that the Church will have limited her program of service to the next generation. The Committee submits its report chiefly as a matter of findings in the hope that the interest in the cause of Christian Education in all forms may be led to a new emphasis upon the importance of the teaching unction of
the Church and to the desirability of a closer co-ordination of existing agencies and the larger endowment of these agencies for their work.

Your Committee realizes the handicap under which it has been laboring by reason of the vague and general terms under which it received its instructions and regrets its inability to present definite and practical recommendations. It is firmly convinced, however, that the time is ripe for a fearless and thorough-going survey of the entire field of training for ministerial and lay service and believes the Church will welcome a well-considered program to meet the changed conditions in the present world order.

Resolved, That the Special Committee on Theological Seminaries be continued and that the membership of the Committee be enlarged to nine by the appointment of four new members.

That the Committee be instructed to submit to the next Assembly:
(a) A plan to provide for the more adequate training of laymen in the field of religious education as teachers, directors of religious education and business managers of churches with a recognized official status.
(b) A plan so to improve the quality and enlarge the scope of training of women for special Christian service as will attract graduates of our colleges to this form of Church work.
(c) A report on curricula of our theological seminaries with recommendations as to the methods by which they may be modified, if necessary, to meet the demands laid upon the ministry of today.

That to this end the Committee be empowered to call into conference representatives of our Seminaries and training schools, and that the institutions be requested to lend all possible assistance to the Committee in the prosecution of its work.

In order to allow for a full presentation of the Report of the Standing Committee on Home Missions, the time of the morning session of the Assembly was on motion extended one half hour.

## Standing Committee on Home Missions

The Report of the Standing Committee on Home Missions was presented by its Chairman, Rev. Robert Freeman, D.D. The Assembly stood and was led in prayer by the Rev. W. Beatty Jennings, D.D., in memory of those Home Missionaries who had during the last year been called to their eternal reward. Pending the adoption of the recommendations of the

Committee, the Assembly was addressed by Mrs. Fred s. Bennett, President of the Woman's Board of Home Nissions, Rev. Baxter P. Fullerton, D.D., Rev. E. A. Odell and Rev. Edgar A. Elmore, D. D. The Assembly saluted the flag of Cuba, unfurled by Rev. E. A. Odell, thus assuring the Christian people of Cuba of its good will. Elder II. P. Faris of the Presbytery of Sedalia, also addressed the Assembly in behalf of a movement to reduce the debt of the Board of Home Missions.

The report was approved and its recommendations were adopted as follows:
(1) That we give thanks to Almighty God for the faithful labors and Christian spirit of four Home Missionaries called to their reward during the past year.

(3) That to the Ukrainian Protestants themselves essentially Presbyterians, and whom we, first of all Protestants with our brethren in Canada, afforded light and help, we give assurance of our sympathy and desire to aid and that we recommend to our Board of Home Missions proper investigation of their need and, if possible, definite assistance.
(4) That the General Assembly recognizing the rapidly growing difficulty and importance of the American city as a Home Mission field, welcome a new movement of city church extension which aims to recast our organization and consolidate our strength in the city centers in order to meet the tremendous needs which there confront the church.
(5) That the General Assembly approve the policy worked out under the guidance of the Home Board of organizing biennial conferences of pastors of foreign speech together with their interested American brethren, and commend the Italian biennial conference and the Magyar biennial conference to the Synods and Presbyteries of the church for hearty coöperation and support.
(6) That the Assembly express its pleasure in the gratifying growth of the church in the south and southwest as noted in the Board's report, and as a nation-wide church reaffirm our duty as such to help meet the spiritual and moral needs of that part of our country as we have been doing for more than a century; and that owing to the impending rapid industrial development of that section and the continued failure to secure a united Presbyterianism which alone can adequately meet the spiritual needs of the south and the southwest, the Board be charged with the responsibility of actively sustaining, encouraging and developing its work there in needy fields, while yet avoiding through fraternal comity relations with sister churches on the ground of mutual concessions, all unnecessary duplication of effort.
(7) That in accordance with custom the Sundays nearest Thanksgiving Day and Washington's birthday be set apart by our Sunday Schools as Home Nission Days with appropriate exercises, and offerings to be sent to the Treasurer of the Board of Home Missions or to the local treasurer.
(8) That the Board of Home Missions be authorized to take over the work among Orientals in Ameriea when connmitted to it by the Board of Foreign Missions.
(9) That the Assembly ask the Executioe Commission to have prepared for next year a simple form of pledge card. which will provide that the funds contributed (unless there is a specific declaration to the contrary) shall be ued to assure to each Board and Agency that proportion of the total receipts, by which it is represented in the gross budget.
(10) That in view of the action of the Cieneral Aswembly consolidating the Boards and Agencies, and in view of the great handicap of debt upon the Board of Home Missions, and in view of generous offers from members and friends of the Board conditioned upon the liquidation of the entire debt this year, the Committee recommends that the Cieneral Assembly instruct the Board of Home Missions to undertake to raise at once from individuals money enough to cancel the whole obligation, and thus be enabled to go into the new Board of National Missions free of debt.
(11) That the Assembly assure our Home Missionaries of our gratitude for and pride in their character, zeal, courage, and self-forgetfulness without which qualities in the humblest of them, the cause of Christ had never gone forward; and our secretaries who, in some cases, bring to their office the wisdom of years of experience in the whole church, and in others highly specialized training to consecrate to the Lord, our gratitude for their patience and resourcefulness.

The devotional service was conducted by the Rev. J. Milton Thompson, D.D., of the Presbytery of Brooklyn-Nassau.

The Assembly took recess until 2.30 P.MI., and was closed with prayer.

WEDNESDAY, May 24, 1922, 2.30 P.MI.
The Assembly met and was opened with prayer by the Rev. P. W. Snyder, D.D., of the Presbytery of Pittsburgh.

The Assembly received from the Treasurer the Mileage Checks for the Commissioners. On motion, the Treasurer of the General Assembly and the Iowa National Bank of Des. Moines, were heartily thanked for their courtesy and efficiency.

Elder Wm. H. Vail, M.D., of the Presbytery of Newark, on behalf of the Assembly, presented the Moderator with a bouquet of roses.

## Bills and Overtures

The Committee on Bills and Overtures, through its Chairman, the Rev. Cleland B. McAfee, D.D., presented a further report which was adopted, and is as follows:

Paper No. 118 being a resolution from Elder James E. Martin of the Presbytery of Portland regarding the preservation of the primary public schools, the exclusive use of the English Language in such schools, and the reading of the Bible in the public schools. It is recommended that the resolution be referred to the General Board of Education for consideration, and to present to the next Assembly a suitable declaration if it shall seem expedient.

That the Standing Rules of the General Assembly as revised by the Stated Clerk and presented in the Official Bulletin of the 134th General Assembly, be adopted with the following changes:
(a) The second paragraph of Rule No. 29 on page 56 shall be changed to read as follows: "All reports included in the above bound form are thereby released for public comment or quotation; but such release does not preclude subsequent changes in any report before its presentation to the General Assembly."
(b) The following clause shall be added to the last paragraph of Rule No. 15: "except with the express permission of the General Assembly," the period now closing that paragraph being changed to a comma.

That the Stated Clerk be empowered to recast for presentation to the 135 th General Assembly any standing rule or rules which in his judgment might be stated with greater clearness.

That the Stated Clerk be instructed to investigate and report to the 135th General Assembly the mechanical possibility of the following suggestions:
(a) That the columns for the vital statistics in the General Assembly Minutes be changed to the following order:

Elders; Deacons; Added on Confession; Added on Certificate and Restoration; Dismissed; Suspended Roll; Deceased; Resident Members; Non-Resident Members; Total Membership; Confession; Baptisms; Infant Baptisms; Sunday School Membership.
(b) That if necessary to obtain space for printing the above on the present size page the General Assembly tax amounts be included within the Congregational amounts, or that the General Assembly tax be reported in dollar amounts only, at the discretion of the Stated Clerk.
(c) That the Stated Clerk make the necessary changes in the report blanks sent to Session Clerks and Stated Clerks of Presbyteries, in accordance with the above.

That the per capita tax for General Assembly purposes continue to be apportioned upon the total number of communicants.

That the following Overture be transmitted to all the Presbyteries for consideration and action and return to the next General Assembly, and that the Stated Clerk be directed to prepare and send to the Presbyteries for their action the following Overture:
"Shall there be added to Chapter VII, Section 50, of the Book of Discipline, as the closing paragraph of the Section, the following?"'
"The roll of communicant members shall be divided into two classes where necessary in order to include all its members; namely, resident and non-resident. Resident members shall be construed to include all members whose legal residence is within the bounds of the congregation or who regularly attend upon or support its worship. Non-resident members shall include all those members who both legally reside beyond the bounds of the congregation and do not attend upon or support its worship; but who should not, in the judgment of the Session, be placed upon the Suspended Roll."

## Theological Seminaries Committee

The Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries, through its Chairman, Rev. Wilton Merle-Smith, D.D., presented a supplemental report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

Resolved, That the action of the Board of Directors of the Dubuque Theological Seminary in the Election and retirement of Professors be approved, but that the Board be urged to assent to the plan for the settlement of all difficulties between the Board and Professor Laube, who has appealed to the Assembly against the vote retiring him, but has now under the advice of this Committee submitted his resignation upon the conditions that the action retiring him which he felt reflected upon his character and standing be repealed and expunged from the record, and that his salary be paid up to this date.

Resolved, also, That the Assembly advise the Board of Directors to seek a like adjustment with Professor A. Barta, who has also appealed to the Assembly against the vote retiring him, and whose case is exactly the same as that of Dr. Laube.

The Standing Committee on Temperance and Moral Welfare, through its Chairman, reported back to the Assembly the resolution referred to it at the morning session. The recommendation of the Committee that no action be taken, was adopted by the Assembly.

## Men's Work Committee

The Standing Committee on Men's Work, through its Chairman, Rev. T. W. Swan, D.D., presented a supplemental report, which was amended, and then adopted by the Assembly, as follows:

Overtures, Nos. 85, 86 and 87 from the Presbyteries of St. Clairsville, Washington and Wheeling, each asking that "the Assembly designate the Sabbath nearest November 11th, Armistice Day, in each year as Father and Son Day, and that the Assembly urge the Churches to an observance of the day, and that the Board of Putlication be requested to prepare suitable programs and literature for its observance," having been referred to the Standing Committee on Men's Work, the Committee makes the following recommendation:

That in view of the fact that many feel we already have too many designated days, the Committee considers it unwise to designate another.

## Church Erection Committee

The Standing Committee on Church Erection submitted the following nominations for membership on the Board of the Church Erection Fund, which, on motion, were received:

## Publication and Sabbath School Work

The Report of the Standing Committee on Publication and Sabbath School Work was presented by its Chairman, Rev. Stuart Nye Hutchison, D.D., and pending the adoption of its recommendation, the Assembly was addressed by the General Secretary of the Board, Rev. Harold McA. Robinson,
D.D., Rev. W. O. Thompsom, D.I)., LL.I). and Elder Wim. . . Stewart. The report was approved and its recommondations were adopted, and are as follows:

1. That the minutes of the Board and its three Administrative Committees be approved.
2. That the Eighty-third Ammal Report of the Board be approved.
3. That the General Assembly confirms the following elections to fill vacancies:

In the Class of 1922 , J. 'T. Fain to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of John H. DeWitt.

In the Class of 1924, T. F. Squires to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of George R. Russell.

And the following ministers and elders to serve for three years beginning June, 1922:
Louis F. Benson, D.D. Franklin L. Sheppard.
Rev. Edmund G. Rawson. Rev. W. L. Wheeler. Matthew J. Hyndman, D.D. John B. Rendall,D.D.
J. T. Fain.

4. Overture No. 77 from the Presbytery of Southern Oregon, touching the free distribution of tracts, having been referred to this Committee, we recommend that in view of the fact that such free distribution has long been the practice of the Board, that no action be taken.

In response to the Overture from the Presbytery of Chester asking that the Board print the Golden Texts in its Lesson Helps, in either the authorized version, or both in authorized version and American revision, we recommend: That in all publications of the Board, Colden Texts and Texts for memory work be printed according to the American Revision, and that comment be based, as at present, on the text.
5. The Assembly recognizes with appreciation the faithfulness of the Board's field workers, particularly the Sunday School Missionaries, and commends the work to the Church.
6. The Assembly again urges every Sunday School to observe Children's Day as a means of directing the attention of the Church to the necessity of making adequate provision for the Christian instruction of its children, and at the same time giving an opportunity to make liberal offerings for the support of Sunday School Missionaries. The Committee urges with equal emphasis the observance of Rally Day and the making of offering for the Board's work in behalf of foreign immigrants.
7. The Board is urged to continue its promotion of the Daily Vacation Bible school and the Week Day Church School, and recommends for the use of such schools the heips provided by the Board.
8. The General Assembly approves the educational policy of the Board in developing a comprehensive system of religious education in the home, in the individual church and in the community: and conmends in particular the Board's policy of correlating the agencies of religious education in the ndividual Church.
9. The General Assembly commends to the Sunday Schools the Board's Departmental Graded Lessons because of the practical plans of the system, the quality of the helps provided, their wide and growing use in the Church, and the fact that the Departmental Lesson Plan has been recognized by the announced policy of the International Lesson Committee to issue lesson outlines based on this plan.
10. The Assembly commends to the Church the Departmental Lesson Edition of the Westminster Adult Bible Class and the growing library of Adult Class Electives in booklet form-the response of the Board to the call of adult classes and of the Assembly Committee of Men's Work for topical courses and Bible book courses.
11. The Assembly commends the plan of the Board to maintain and improve the publication of the Uniform Lesson Series.
12. The Assembly commends the policy of the Board in including in its list volumes designed for use in the homes and among the young people of the Church.
13. The Assembly approves the coöperation of the Board in the International Sunday School Council of Religious Education, and anticipates from its Committee on Education an educational Leadership in the formulation of a national policy of religious education for the evangelical churches.

## Committee on Polity

The Standing Committee on Polity, thwough its Chairman, Rev. John B. Laird, D.D., presented a supplemental report on papers referred back to it, as follows:

A petition from the Presbyterian Church of Elkton, Md., was, on motion, referred back to the Church, in order that the case may take the usual order as provided in the Book of Discipline.

## Permanent Judicial Commission

The hour having arrived for the presentation of the report of the Permanent Judicial Commission, the Moderator gave
notice that the Assembly was about to sit as a Court，and exhorted the mombers to regard their high character as judges in a Court of Jesus Christ．

The Assembly was then organized as a Judicial Court．
The record of Case No． 1 was read，and the preliminary judgment by the Commission was confirmed as the final judgment of the General Assembly．The report is as follows： Judicial Case No．1．－First Italian Church，vs．the Presbytery of Detroit．
The facts in this case are that the affairs in the First Italian Church of Detroit in the deliberate judgment of the Presby－ tery of Detroit called for the exercise of direct interference under powers granted the Presbytery in its care of local churches．There had been years of patient dealing on the part of the Presbytery of Detroit，with the pastor and con－ gregation of the First Italian Chureh，profound anxiety de－ veloped in the Presbytery for this important work among Italians carried on in a plant representing large gifts from the Presbyterians of Detroit．A change in pastorate seemed imperative if the work was to be successful．The Presbytery proceeding in a way approved by the book and in discharging the obligation to the trust imposed dissolved the pastoral relation．

## Opinion．

The complaint of the First Italian Church of Detroit in dissolving the pastoral relations existing between the Rev． G．Buggelli，and the First Italian Church of Detroit is not sustained．

The Presbytery of Detroit has not exceeded its rights or powers as provided in Chapter 10 Section 7，of the Form of Government．

Viz．A Presbytery may in its discretion，after careful ex－ amination and on deliberation dissolve the pastoral relation existing between the pastor and any church in the jurisdic－ tion of the Presbytery with or without the consent or over the protest of either or both parties（Rev．Henry Ward vs．Synod of New York．Minutes 1908，page 201）．

The record of Case No． 2 was read，and the preliminary judgment by the Commission was confirmed as the final judgment of the General Assembly．The report is as follows：

Judicial Case No．2．－J．Edie Stewart，Appellant，vs．The Synod of Colorado，Appellee．
The appellant in this case，the Rev．J．Edie Stewart，was suspended from the Ministry by the Presbytery of Gunnison．

He appealed to the Synod of Colorado. The Synod found that the appeal was "in proper form" but that there were "no grounds on which it could be entertained." Mr. Stewart therefore took this appeal to the General Assembly.

The citation charged two offences: First, lying. Second, obtaining money by means of false representations and false statements. The Presbytery found a verdict of guilty upon both charges.

In support of the charge of lying, the prosecution attempted to prove the writing of a letter in which a false statement was made. But the only proof of the contents of the letter is the testimony of witnesses who say they heard it read. Neither the letter itself nor a copy of it is in evidence. The witnesses produced do not even testify that they themselves read it, but only that they heard it read by another person. Such evidence is clearly hearsay and insufficient to support the conviction.

In support of the charge of obtaining money by means of false representations and false statements, the prosecution proved that Mr. Stewart sold mining stock to certain persons; that at the time of the sales he made statements as to the extent of the profits which stockholders would realize upon the investment and that such profits were not in fact realized. In other words, it was proved that Mr. Stewart was mistaken in his judgment as to the commercial possibility of their investment. It was not proved that he made a false representation or false statement as to any existing fact. Proof of mere failure to realize anticipated profits, is not sufficient proof to support a conviction upon a charge of obtaining money by false representations and false statements.

## Opinion.

It is, therefore, the judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission that the appeal of the Rev. J. Edie Stewart from the Synod of Colorado be and the same is hereby sustained; that his conviction by the Presbytery of Gunnison be and the same is hereby reversed and his suspension from the Ministry revoked; and that the Presbytery of Gumnison is hereby directed to restore the name of the said Rev. J. Edie Stewart to its roll of ministers in good standing.

Rev. Joseph L. Weaver, D.D., being a member of the Synod of Colorado, took no part in the decision of this case.

The record of Case No. 3, was read, and the preliminary judginent by the Commission was confirmed as the final judgment of the General Assembly. The report is as follows:

Judicial Case No. 3.-l'restytery of New Castle vs. Synod of Ballimore.
This is an appeal by the Presbytery of New Castle from the action of the Synod of Baltimore on October 26, 1921, directing the Presbytery to call a meeting of the congregation of the Presbyterian Church of Elkton, Md., for the purpose of electing Elders, as the church may wish, and for the transaction of any other business that may legitimately come before the congregation. This action by the Synod was taken upon complaint of the congregation concerning the course pursued by the Presbytery of New Castle and its committee, after the General Assembly of 1921 had directed the Presbytery within thirty days to call a mceting of the members of the Elkton church for the purpose of taking all measures necessary to bring about the peace and harmony of the church. Minutes 1921, page 142.

The Committee of the Presbytery procured a meeting of the congregation on July 17, 1921. The Committee through the Moderator informed the congregation that it would be permitted to elect three additional Elders who would serve at least one year together with the three existing Elders who declined to coöperate with the large majority of the congregation and who were not acceptable to them. The Moderator ruled out of order a motion to elect four new Elders and to adopt the system of limited terms, or rotary system, for Elders. The purpose of the committee was to provide for government of the congregation by six Elders of whom three should represent each faction, for at least one year, and that within that time the rotary system should not be adopted. This plan was rejected by the congregation by a vote of 98 to. 3 , and no further steps have been taken effectively to restore peace and harmony.

The Synod of Baltimore, at the hearing before the Commission, moved to dismiss this appeal by the Presbytery as involving questions that do not affect the doctrine of Constitution of the church as is necessary to our jurisdiction under Chapter XI, Article IV of the Form of Government; but the Judicial Commission is of the opinion that there is involved in this appeal the constitutional right of a congregation to elect its own Elders, to prescribe the number to be elected and their terms of office, without dictation by the Presbytery, and, therefore, we have declined to sustain the motion to dismiss the appeal.

The Presbytery of New Castle having decided to stand by the action of the Committee and failing to take further steps toward peace and harmony, the Synod undertook, upon complaint of the congregation, to exercise its powers in such
cases under Chapter XI, Article IV of the Form of Government.

## Opinion

The Judicial Commission is of the opinion that the congregation was within its rights in declining to accept conditions sought to be imposed upon it in adopting the rotary system or in choosing its Elders, both as to number and personnel. These are among the powers belonging alone to the congregation. Form of Govermment, Chapter XIII, Article VIII, Chapter V; Case of the Church of the Covenant, Minutes G. A. 1902, p. 152; Supplement to Digest, 1907, p. 1067.

The dismissal of this appeal will leave in full force and effect the action of the Synod appealed from and will leave the congregation of the Elkton Presbyterian Church free to adopt the rotary system to choose Elders and take all other steps within the power of a congregation under our form of government, toward bringing about peace and harmony in the Church.

It is therefore the judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission that the said appeal of the Presbytery of New Castle be, and the same is, dismissed.

The record of Case No. 4 was read, and the preliminary judgment by the Commission was confirmed as the final judgment of the General Assembly. The report is as follows:

## Judicial Case No. 4-Presbytery of New Castle vs. Synod of Baltimore, Petition of Rev. John McElmoyle, D.D. for Review.

The petition of Rev. John McElmoyle, D.D., the former pastor of the Elkton, Md. Presbyterian Church, presents an appeal for a review and revision of the decision of the General Assembly of 1921 adopting the report of the Judicial Commission in Judicial Case No. 3, Part A. In that decision the action of the Presbytery of New Castle in dissolving the pastoral relation between the Rev. John McElmoyle, D.D., and the Elkton Presbyterian Church was affirmed.

## Opinion

We have very carefully considered said petition for review and revision. We are of the opinion that inasmuch as in a later and supplemental petition Dr. McElmoyle sets forth the fact that he has accepted the dissolution of the pastoral relation and has been dismissed, at his request, to another Presbytery, there is no need to reopen the case decided in 1921. But we gladly proceed to explain further the grounds upon
which the judgment in that case was based. In our opinion the evidence showed such a state of feeling that the Presbytery was warranted in dissolving the pastoral relation; yet we recited with emphasis that there was no charge of an offense against Dr. McElmoyle, and that his ecelesiastical standing as a minister in the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America was not affected by that proceeding. We did not find that he had been guilty of conduct that would justify a denial to him of the right and privilege of further enjoying his good standing and pursuing his ministry in the Presbyterian Church. The statement in the opinion rendered in 1921 to which Dr. McElmoyle takes special exceptions referred to certain matters which produced an impression upon the public that was unfortunate. We took notice of this situation only as it affected the question of the advisability of continuing the pastoral relation. Having only appellate jurisdiction, we sought only to discover whether or not there was evidence to support the action of the Presbytery in dissolving the pastoral relation. We did not think that the Presbytery had abused its discretion; and on the other hand, we did not cast aspersion upon the character of Dr. McElmoyle nor was any such aspersion intended.

We therefore reaffirm our former declaration that no charges of any offense have been made against Dr. John MeElmoyle; that he is a minister in good standing in the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. We find that he is lawfully entitled to accept and hold the position of pastor of any church to which he may be called.

It is, therefore, the judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission that said decision of 1921 be not reviewed and revised.

The judicial business having been completed, the General Assembly rose as a court and proceeded to other business.

## Standing Rule 41

On motion, the interpretation of the last two sentences Standing Rule 41 was referred to the Executive Commission, in Conference with the Boards.

The Assembly ordered that a message of love and sympathy be sent to the Rev. W. O. Ruston, D.D., of Dubuque, Iowa, in his serious illness.

## Committee on Education

The Standing Committee on Education, through its Chairman, Rev. Paul R. Hickok, D.D., presented a supplemental report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

The Standing Committee on Education to which was referred a resolution relative to certain conditions existing at some University centers, and to safe-guarding certain property rights of the Church at University Centers, finds that such rights are properly conserved so far as the power of the General Board of Education extends; and also that the Board is fully conversant with and attentive to conditions existing in our University centers.

Your Committee recommends the reference of the resolution and the entire subject to the General Board of Education for consideration and action.

Your Committee further recommends that the General Board of Education continue to exercise careful oversight of trust funds provided for University work, and that the resolution of the Board adopted April 25, 1922 as follows:
"In view of the incalculable importance of having our strongest and most prophetic ministers in Churches located in College and University centers; and in view also of the fact that a church in a large student center ministers to a constituency which is at least Synod wide, and in many cases nation wide and even world wide, be it resolved:

That Synods and Presbyteries be urged to coöperate with the General Board of Education in devising ways and means whereby churches in these communities may be aided when necessary in securing the needed leadership of highly qualified ministers."
be adopted as the sense of the General Assembly, and sent down to Synods, Presbyteries and local churches for their special attention and guidance.

## Enabling Resolutions

The following resolutions dealing with the routine business of the Assembly were presented by the Stated Clerk, and adopted:

1. That the Stated Clerk be directed as usual to publish the Minutes of the General Assembly.
2. The General Assembly is responsible only for the expenses of its commissioners and officers, in connection with its annual meetings.
3. That the Stated Clerk be authorized to furnish the Minutes to such Presbyteries only as have paid in their full quotas to the Contingent Fund.
4. That the Stated Clerk forward a copy of the Minutes and Reports of the Boards to the Ruling Elders that are Commissioners at this Assembly; provided, that the Presbyteries which they represent have paid their full quotas to the

Mileage and Contingent Funds；also that he be authorized to furnish the Ninutes to the lay members of the Boards．

5．That the Moderator be authorized to fill，by appoint－ ment，any vacancies which may occur，by resignation or other－ wise，in any of the Special Committee and Commissions．

6．That the stated Clerk and the Treasurer be authorized to pay the usual bills and salaries，subject to the provisions of the financial plan of 1912－13．

7．That，as customary，all matters connected with railroad rates and arrangements for the next placs of mecting of the Assembly be committed solely to the Stated Clerk．

8．That the Stated Clerk and the Treasurer be authorized to pay the actual traveling and entertainment expenses of the members of Special Committees，appointed or continued by this General Assembly，and of the Executive and Judicial Commissions，said expenses to be kept within as low a limit as possible；all subject to the financial plan of 1912－13，and other regulations of the Assembly which have relation thereto．

9．That the Stated Clerk be authorized to contract for the usual printing of the Minutes and the Manual of the Assembly，list of Commissioners，list of Overtures，Commit－ tee Reports，and all blanks and papers connected with the current annual work of the General Assembly，payment to be made for the same under the regulations of the financial plan of 1912－13．

10．（a）That the Assembly authorize the binding and dis－ tribution of 7,000 copies of the Reports of the Boards and Permanent Committees，for the ecclesiastical year 1921－22； the expense of the same to be borne by the Boards．
（b）That in accordance with the Standing Rule the Boards be requested to deliver the printed sheets of these reports to the Stated Clerk on or before June 15， 1922.

11．That the Assembly is respectfully asked to approve of the continuance of the publication of the Presbyterian Handbook，under the editorship of the Stated Clerk．

An American Flag was presented to the Moderato：by Elder Chas．H．Kessor，M．D．，of the Presbytery of Wheeling， to be placed on the platform of the Assembly，and was saluted by the Assembly，together with the singing of the first verse of＂My Country＇tis of thee．＂

A resolution with reference to the restoration of the Bible in the public schools of the State of Washington，was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures．

At the request of the Presbyterian Press representatives present, the Moderator presented to the Assembly the Rev. Francis C. Monfort, D.D., Editor of the Herald and Presbyter, this being the fifty-first consecutive Assembly at which Dr. Monfort has been in attendance. Dr. Monfort suitably replied to the greetings of the Assembly.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. Henry C. Swearingen, D.D., of the Presbytery of St. Paul, to conduct the devotional service at noon on Thursday.

The Assembly adjourned to meet at 9 A.M., Thursday and was closed with prayer by the Rev. W. A. Roulston, of the Presbytery of Blairsville.

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The Assembly met and was opened with prayer by the Rev. Murdoch McKenzie, D.D., a former Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Special reference was made in the prayer to the death of Elder J. H. Washington, of the Presbytery of Atlantic, a commissioner to this Assembly.

The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

## Bills and Overtures

The Committee on Bills and Overtures, through its Chairman, the Rev. Cleland B. McAfee, D.D., presented a supplemental report which was adopted and is as follows:

In response to the resolution referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures on Wednesday, it is recommended that the following declaration be made:

The General Assembly learns with interest of the organizing of a state wide Bible Fellowship among the citizens of the state of Washington, whose purpose is the gaining of the legal right to have the Bible read in the public schools in such manner as may be suitable to the civil and political rights of the communities. Since "The opening of God's Word giveth light," the Assembly welcomes this renewed evidence of the desire of the lovers of that Word to bring it to the minds of the youth of the troubled and critical day in which we live.

The Committee reported that the Committee on the reorganization and consolidation of the Boards and Agencies desired to make no further change in the overture regarding the formation of a General Council, except purely mechanical
ones which will result from the editing of the verbiage of the existing sections of the chapter which will be modified by the new sections if they should be adopted.

## Executive Commission

The Executive Commission, through its Chairman, the Rev. Henry C. Swearingen, D.D., presented a report on Overture 140 referred to it, recommending no action, which was adopted.

Also in regard to Resolution 3 of the Report of the Special Committee on Church Coöperation and Union referred to it, the Executive Commission recommended "that, in view of the fact that action at this time will prejudice the making of the budget by the new Executive Commission, this matter be referred to the new Commission for such action as it may deem wise," which was adopted.

In the matter of the suit pending in the Supreme Judicial Court of Suffolk County, Massachusetts, entitled Samuel J. McNeilly et al vs. First Presbyterian Church in Brookline, et al., the Assembly approved the action of the Executive Commission, as follows:
"The matter of the suit pending in the Supreme Judicial Court of Suffolk County, Massachusetts, entitled Samuel J. McNeilly, et al. vs. First Presbyterian Church in Brookline, et al., involving the use of the church property belonging to the Presbyterian Church, having been brought to the attention of the Executive Commission of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, it is hereby Resolved, That the Moderator and Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, be and hereby are authorized and empowered to retain counsel to represent in said proceeding the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and to intervene in said suit on behalf of said General Assembly; and the said Executive Commission, acting under the authority conferred upon by said General Assembly, does hereby authorize and empower said Moderator and Stated Clerk to sign, in the name of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, any and all documents which they may be advised are necessary or proper; and to authorize said counsel to take such steps as may be necessary to protect, preserve or enforce any such rights as said Presbyterian Church may have in the property or the use of the property heretofore used by the said First Presbyterian Church in Brookline for church purposes as a Presbyterian Church, in accordance with the
government, discipline, and worship of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America."

It was further Resolved, That in carrying out the authority given to intervene in the litigation over the property of the Brookline Presbyterian Church, in the Presbytery of Boston, the Moderator, Stated Clerk and the counsel retained in that proceeding, arrange, if possible, to have any expense incurred by them paid by the local parties interested in the litigation.

## Next Place of Meeting

The Committee on the Next Place of Meeting, through the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, made a report, and the Assembly heard the Rev. Matthew F. Smith, D.D., on behalf of Indianapolis, Ind., and the Rev. Edwin A. McAlpin, Jr., D.D., on behalf of Atlantic City, N. J. On motion, the Assembly decided that the next place of meeting should be Indianapolis, Ind.

Rev. C. C. Tyler of the Presbytery of Philadelphia North asked for information as to the interpretation of the telegram from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. The Rev. James E. Clarke, D.D., replied for the Special Committee on Church Coöperation and Union, stating that a further telegram was expected, which later was read to the Assembly, that the General Assembly of the Presby-
terian Church in the U. S. had roted to join the (ienemal Council of Reformed Churches.

## Committee on Correspondence

The Standing Committee on Correspondence, through it : Chaiman, Rev. Rasmus Thomsen, D.D., requested that the Assembly receive the Rev. Masahisa Uemura, D.D., Moderator of the Church of Christ in Japan, and leave being granted, he was presented to the Moderator and the Assembly, by the Rev. Arthur J. Brown, D.D. Dr. Uemura addressed the Assembly in his native tongue. Rev. Albert Altmans, a missionary of the Reformed Church in America in Japan acted as interpreter.

The Moderator replied to the greeting of the visiting Moderator.

The following resolution presented by the Standing Committee on Correspondence was adopted by the Assemblv:

The General Assembly has listened with profound and sympathetic interest to the distinguished Moderator of The Church of Christ in Japan, the Rev. Masahisa Uemura, D.D., of Tokyo, Japan. The Assembly warmly reciprocates the fraternal greetings that he has brought from the General Assembly that he represents. The Assembly records its devout gratitude to Almighty Gord on the completion of the first half century of The Church of Christ in Japan, which has grown from small and difficult beginnings to a strong selfgoverning church coöperating with the Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., the Presbyterian Church in the U.S., the Reformed Church in America, and the Reformed Church in the U. S., a Church which now represents 228 churches, 37,000 communicants, and more than double that number of adherents.

The Assembly recognizes the eminent appropriateness of the proposal of The Church of Christ and the coöperating Missions that the Jubilee of the Church should be signalized by securing a Memorial Fund of $\$ 250,000$, one-half of which our Japanese Brethren will undertake to raise in Japan, and the other half to be sought in America. The Assembly commends this cause to the generosity of congregations and individuals, and trusts that the full share of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., in this Memorial Fund will be contributed as a special thank offering of our Church to a sister Chu:ch of the Presbyterian and Reformed family in commemoration of the manifest blessing with which God has crowned the labors of the missionaries who have so faithfully consecrated their
lives to the founding of the Church in Japan, and the zeal and devotion of the Japanese Christians who have given their hearts to Christ and so clearly manifested their faith in Him. The Assembly instructs the Moderator and Stated Clerk to prepare and send to The Church of Christ in Japan a suitable message in response to the message which the Moderator of the General Assembly of that Church has brought to this Assembly.

The Standing Committee on Correspondence presented a further report, which was adopted, and is as follows:

Your Committee on Correspondence respectfully submits, the following report:

A telegram extending greetings to the Assembly has been received from the Gideons of Ohio in convention assembled in Canton, Ohio, and suitable response has been made thereto.

The greetings of this Assembly have been sent to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church U. S. meeting in Charleston, West Virginia; the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, meeting in Greenville, Tennessee, and the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in North America, meeting in Cambridge, Ohio.

Messages of cordial greetings to this Assembly have been received from the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church U. S. and the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

Copies of the messages sent and received are herewith attached. We recommend that the messages sent be approved by the Assembly.

A communication from The National Reform Association calling attention to "The Fourth World Christian Citizenship Conforence to be held at Winona Lake, Indiana, June 30th to July 7th, 1923" has been carefully considered. Your Committee recommends the following expression of interest by the Assembly:

The Assembly notes with interest the announcement of the Fourth World Christian Citizenship Conference to be held at Winona Lake, Indiana, June 30th to July 7th, 1923, under the auspices of the National Reform Association, for the consideration of the problems confronting citizens of all lands. Inasmuch as many of the greatest statesmen of the Christian world are to be heard on the platform of the Conference, the Assembly expresses its deep interest in the purpose and success of the Conference.

The Supreme Synod of the Independent Presbyterian Church of Brazil, having named as fraternal delegate to this

Assembly, the Rev. Eduarde Carlos Pereira, who is by illness prevented from attending, we recommend that without expense to the Assembly, the Rev. W. A. Wardell, a Commissioner to this Assembly from Brazil, present to said Synod at its next meeting, our fraternal greetings.

It has come to the knowledge of your Committee that the Rev. Owen R. Williams, pastor of the Welsh Presbyterian Church of Oakland, California, plans to visit his old home in Wales at the time when the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Wales is in session at Cardiff in June. We therefore recommend that he be requested to present the fraternal greetings of this Assembly to the said General Assembly of the Welsh Presbyterian Church.

It also appears that the Rev. Joseph Brunn, a member of the Presbytery of New York, expects to go to Italy this summer to investigate Protestant work in his native country. We therefore recommend that he be requested to bear the fraternal greetings of this Assembly to the Waldensian Synod.

We would add to our recommendations concerning fraternal delegates that the Rev. Samuel M. Kelly of Brainerd, Minnesota, be requested to bear the greetings of this Assembly, to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, at its next meeting, it being understood that these brethren will serve as fraternal delegates without expense to this Assembly.

We recommend that the Rev. E. M. Wherry, D.D., representing the Presbyterian Church of India, be received by the Assembly.

The Moderator, in the neeessary absence of the ViceModerator, at this time called to the chair the Rev. Wallace Radeliffe, D.D., a former Moderator of the General Assembly.

## Committee on Foreign Missions

Before the presentation of the Report of the Standing (committee on Foreign Missions, the Assembly rose and was led in prayer by the Rev. Wallace Radcliffe, D.D. The Report was then presented by the Rev. William R. Taylor, D.D., Chairman of the Standing Committee. Pending the adoption of the recommendations, the Assembly was addressed by Mrs. Charles K. Roys, General Seeretary of the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions, Rev. William P. Sehell, Rev. E. M. Wherry, D.D., and the Rev. James B. Rodgers. After the reading of the names of the missionaries who had been called to their eternal reward, the Assembly was led in prayer by the Rev. John Grant Newman, D.D. The Report was approved and its recommendations were adopted, and are as follows:
(1) After a careful review of the Minutes of the Board of Foreign Missions, your committee recommends their approval as admirable in form and content, an accurate and complete record of the proceedings and actions of the Board. They evidence the most painstaking and efficient discharge of a great trust. Through all of this extended record there runs like a golden thread the intelligent and sympathetic care of the missionaries and their families.
(2) That the Assembly gratefully acknowledge the many splendid benefactions of money and property received by the Board during the past year.
(3) The Assembly commends the Board's action in requiring that, as a gencral rule, the first furlough of all missionaries shall be used for further preparation under the direction of the mission and the Board and suggests that, especially in the case of medical missionaries, a portion of each subsequent furlough be spent in acquiring the latest practice in Medicine and Surgery.
(4) The Assembly approves the adoption of the policy for the visitation of every mission by an officer of the Board once every seven years, that interval to be reduced to five years as soon as practicable.
(5) The Assembly urges all Churches to make prompt and regular remittances to the Treasurer of the Board in order to obviate the necessity for the heavy interest charges on money that the Board is compelled to borrow to meet its obligations.
(6) The Assembly reaffirms its unswerving confidence in the Board's consecration and competence for the discharge of its sacred trust. It rejoices to learn that after most careful investigation of certain charges of irregular beliefs and teachings amongst our missionaries, it has been unable to discover any ground for such accusations. Neither has it received any evidence with regard to any individual calling for or capable of transmission to any Presbytery. Our Church has full trust in and deep affection for our foreign missionaries and is not in any mood of suspicion or misgiving with regard to them. We therefore call upon our churches loyally to support our foreign mission undertakings and to send their contributions to our own Board.
(7) That the Assembly approve the report of the Treasurer as printed in the Annual Report of the Board, and heartily commends the low percentage of administrative cost.
(8) That the following members of the Board whose terms of office expire with this meeting of the Assembly, be re-elected to serve for three years:

Also that the election of Mr. Ralph W. Harbison as a member of the Board, in place of Mr. Scott Foster, deceased, be approved.
(9) That the Assembly has learned with hearty satisfaction of the completion of the fund in memory of Dr. A. W. Halsey; the establishment of the Board's new Medical Department for conserving the health of the missionary force, and for promoting the work of medical missions; the new regulations equalizing the salaries of single men and single women missionaries and making more liberal provision for our missionaries while sick and while traveling on furlough, and for the maintenance of their children; and especially the provision for the continuance of salaries of the missionaries of the Board who have reached the age of seventy years or have given forty years of service in the field, by this provision affording inexpressible relief and comfort to these faithful servants of Christ and his Church.
(10) That the Assembly is pleased to hear of the good results following the consolidation of the six former Women's Boards into the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions and the closer coöperation with the Assembly's Board thus secured, and the Assembly congratulates the Woman's Board of

Foreign Missions upon the signal acherements of its first yoar, especially upon the large increase of $\$ 110,000$ in its receipts over those of the preceding year.
(11) The Assembly commends the Home Department of the Board for its wise, energetic and highly successful work in promoting missionary interest, intelligence and enthusiasm throughout the Church in the homeland.
(12) That the Educational Department of the Board be commended for the effective promotion of the study of Foreign Missions in the churches, the Sunday schools, and the Women's Organizations; and especially for the development of the lantern service of the Board.
(13) That the Assembly approve the Board's plans for the study of India this year, and call upon each Church and Sunday school to provide in its program ample opportunty for this study.
(14) That the Assembly again appoint the Sundays nearest Christmas and Easter for special offerings from the Sunday schools for work under the care of the Board of Foreign Missions, and urge each Sunday school to use the excellent programs provided by the Educational Department of the Board and to take part in the special offerings on each of these days.
(15) That the Assembly reiterate its hearty approval of the plan whereby many churches, Sunday schools, Women's Missionary Societies, other organizations and individuals now support particular missionaries or some particular mission station, and are thereby brought into closer and more vital touch with the work. The Assembly recommends this plan of foreign missionary giving to all our churches and other donors.
(16) The Assembly notes with great interest the work which the Board has done since the signing of the Armistice in the rehabilitation of its mission work in Syria, including special contributions for enlargement of the work and the erection of new buildings, and notes also that the Board will probably be called upon to do a similar work of rebuilding for Persia, as a result of the investigations made by the Board's deputation who are just returning from that field. The Assembly, therefore, urges the churches to study this Near Eastern field with the greatest care and to strengthen it both by their prayers and their gifts.
(17) The Assembly views with anxiety the reports that, under the new treaty to be negotiated between the allied countries and Turkey, power may be granted to Turkey which will seriously threaten the continuance of Mission Work
in the Near East, and expresses its gratification at the expressed determination of our Government to guard American interests in this Near Eastern country, and urges upon the United States Government utmost vigilance lest by any chance the work which has existed for more than a century be destroyed, and the Near East be deprived of those Christian influences through which alone its problems can be solved.
(18) The Assembly notes with satisfaction that the JonesMiller Bill restricting the export of morphine and opium has been passed by the National House of Representatives and appeals to the Senate to take similar action at an early date. It is a distress to all Christians and an obstacle to our mission work that the traffic in morphine seems to be on the increase; that by subtle and sinuous ways this drug is being sold, not only in America but in China, contrary to the law. The Assembly is gratified to learn that Great Britain is taking action to arrest this trade, and earnestly hopes that our own Government will promptly pass and enforce the Jones-Miller Bill whose object is to break up this nefarious traffic.
(19) The Assembly notes with profound interest the large number of students in the colleges and other institutions who have signified their desire to go to the foreign field, and that, notwithstanding the fact that the Board has raised the standard of qualifications, it has been able to send the average number sent out in the past ten years. The Assembly calls the attention of the churches to the demand upon the Board for highly qualified men and women, and urges pastors, educational leaders, and parents to aid the Board, not only in discovering the choice young men and women of the Church, but also in presenting the needs of the foreign field and the call of God to missionary service.
(20). The General Assembly has learned with interest of the adjustment contemplated between the Board of Foreign Missions and the Board of the Welsh Calvinistic Methodists' Foreign Missions in regard to the Assam Mission formerly under the Welsh Calvinistic Methodist Church in the U. S.A. The Assembly approves the Board's action in offering to turn over the properties to the Welsh Church without compensation, with the understanding that they are to conduct the work in the future, and that all responsibilities for repairs to buildings and for funds for running expenses are to be assumed by them. The Assembly in approving this action authorizes the transfer to be consummated as soon as the Board receives a definite acceptance of the offer from the General Assembly of the Welsh Calvinistic Methodist Church which meets in Cardiff, Wales, June 13-15, 1922.
(21) That the Board be authorized to transfer to the Board of Home Missions and the Womens: Board of Home Missions the work among Orientals in the United states now under the direction of the Board of Foreign Missions and the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions-this transfer to be mado on the following terms; already nutually agreed upon by the Boards concerned:
(a) That the administration of the entire work be turned over to these two Boards June 1, 1922.
(b) In accepting the action of the Woman's Board of Home Missions the Foreign Boards will contribute $\$ 18,000$ for the fiscal year 1922-23 towards the work among the Orientals on the Pacific Coast, which has been conducted by the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions; that for the year beginning April 1, 1923, they will contribute, $\$ 12,000$ toward this work, and for the year beginning April $1,1924, \$ 6,000$, and thereafter their financial responsibility will cease.
(c) (1) That the Assembly's Board of Home Missions will accept the administration of the work suggested by the Foreign Board with the understanding that the Foreign Board carry the entire budget for the year beginning April 1, 1922.
(2) That for the year beginning April 1, 1923, the Home Board will assume one-third of the budget; for the year beginning April 1, 1924, two-thirds of the budget; and thereafter all of it.

In transferring this work the Foreign Board also agrees to transfer its property to the Two Home Boards without charge, the legal papers in regard to this transfer to be prepared by the attorney of the Board of Foreign Missions.
(22) That no action be taken on the overtures relating to the installation of ordained missionaries as pastors abroad, of home churches assuming their financial support, such a double relation as is contemplated between the missionaries concerned and the churchas and Presbyteries with which they would be connected being impracticable.
(23) That the Assembly heartily commends the plan of the Board for Annuity Gifts on which the Board pays interest until the death of the donor, or of the annuitant, when the principal becomes available for the foreign mission cause; and the Assembly urges all friends of the cause to remember the Board in their wills.
(24) That the Assembly hereby records with sorrow, and in grateful remembrance of their services, the death, during the year, of the following missionaries:

(25) That, with ever-deepening conviction that the Gospel of Christ is the wisdom of God and the power of God unto salvation, not only of the individual soul but of human society in all its groupings, from the family to nations and international alliances; and with our established confidence in the ability of our Board of Foreign Missions still further strengthened by the remarkable results achieved during the past year, both at home and abroad, in the face of unusual difficulties, the Assembly commends anew to the entire Church this Board and its divine enterprise; and, believing that the supreme philanthropy is the giving of the Gospel to men, the Assembly urges all members of our Church possessed of wealth to observe a juster proportion between their gifts and bequests for Christian missions and those they make with such splendid generosity to universities, libraries, hospitals, and other educational and philanthropic institutions.

The Standing Rules of the Assembly were suspended, and the docket for Thursday afternoon re-arranged.

The Rev. Henry C. Swearingen, D.D., of the Presbytery of St. Paul, conducted the devotional service.

The Assembly then took recess until 2.30 P.M., Thursday, and was closed with prayer.

The Assembly met and was opened with prayer by the Rev. Milton E. Todd of the Presbytery of Lima.

## Committee on Church Erection

The Report of the Standing Committee on Church Erection was presented through its Chairman, Rev. C. E. Hills, D.D. Pending the adoption of the recommendations, the Assembly was addressed by the Rev. David G. Wylie, D.I)., General Secretary of the Board, and the Rev. Cleland B. McAfee. The report was approved and its recommendations were adopted, and are as follows:
I. Whereas the Board of Church Erection has completed another year of useful service, having assisted in the building of 172 Churches and 75 Manses, closing its year with a substantial balance in its treasury, be it resolved, that the General Assembly heartily approve of the efficient business-like methods and management of the members of the Board and earnestly commend the officers of the Board, the Rev. David. G. Wylie, D.D., General Secretary; the Rev. Jesse C. Bruce, D.D., Field Secretary; the Rev. George R. Brauer, Treasurer, and the members of the Board for their fidelity, and urge this important cause be presented to all our Presbyteries, and thus seek to help the extension of the Kingdom of our Lord in wider benevolence of our beloved Church.
II. We recommend that the General Assembly authorize the Board of Church Erection to make a grant of $\$ 7,500.00$ to the Japanese Union Church of Los Angeles, said grant to be made on the merits of the case.
III. That inasmuch as the Board has calls for loans far in excess of the present loan fund, we recommend that it be directed to transfer from the J. S. Kennedy Fund, the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, or so much thereof as may be needed; and in addition be authorized and empowered to negotiate loans, evidenced by an issue of its bonds, to be secured by mortgage, assignment or deed of trust of such securities as it may own, the proceeds of such Loans or Transfers to be placed in the Loan Fund.
IV. That the plan of insurance reported to and approved by the last General Assembly be continued, and that our Presbyteries be urged to impress on all churches within their bounds the need of carrying adequate insurance on both houses of worship and manses, said insurance to be on replacement values according to present building prices and not prewar value.
V. We recommend that the General Assembly authorize the Board of Church Erection to make a grant of $\$ 1,200.00$ to the Protestant Chapel, at Sherman Institute (Indian) at Riverside, California, said grant to be made on the merits of the case.
VI. That where a church issues bonds secured by a first mortgage not in excess of 50 per cent. of the value of a new building or improvement, the Board at its discretion may loan from the Loan Fund an amount equal to one-third of such bond issue, but not in excess of $\$ 15,000.00$, accepting as security for such loans, bonds equal to the amount of the loan. The payment of a loan secured by church bonds shall not be made until the entire bond issue, excepting the amount taken by the Board, shall have been sold and the proceeds with other gifts applied on the cost of new building or improvement.
VII. That Presbyteries be urged to adopt the suggestion made by the Board that Presbyterial Committees on Church Erection make a careful survey of the Building needs of Presbyteries, both for churches and manses at least a year in advance and submit result of such survey on or before October 1st, in order that tabulated returns from all Presbyteries respecting their building needs may be made the basis on which to rest its appeal to the Executive Commission, for adequate budget to meet the building needs of the denomination.
VIII. That on account of the growing importance of church and manse buildings, the Standing Rule of General Assembly placing the report of Board Church Erection on the last Thursday of Assembly be changed, if practicable, so that the subject may be presented at an earlier date.

## Reorganization and Consolidation

The following resolution, presented by the Rev. James H. Snowden, D.D., LL.D., was adopted by the Assembly:

Whereas this Assembly has been called upon to meet at critical situation involving grave and pressing problems in connection with a growing demand for a reörganization and consolidation of our Boards and Agencies：and

Whereas this Ascembly，while containing in the beginning a diversity of views，yet has been able to adont a system of reorganized Boards that it is believed will be more efficient and progressive in the work of the church，with a large measure of agreement and with full unity of spirit；therefore be it

Resolved，That this Assembly is thankful to（iod for this promising harmony and achievement and it hereby now pledges itself to the fullest loyalty in supporting this new system；and it calls upon the pastors and sessions and the entire membership of the Church to consecrate themselves to the most devoted and faithful and enthusiastic service in keeping up and carrying forward the work of the Church， especially in its benevolent contributions and agencies，during this transition year while the new plans are being adjusted and put in operation；and may the whole Church pray for and be baptized with the Spirit of God without measure during this year．

## Committee on Mileage

The Standing Committee on Mileage presented its report through its Chairman，Elder John S．Cort，which was adopted， and is as follows：

Checks for transportation to and from Des Moines have been drawn in favor of the several Commissioners in the sum total of $\$ 65,397.83$ ．This was done by the Treasurer，after mileage bills had been audited by your Committee．

The receipts for apportionments from the Presbyteries for this Assembly are：Mileage Fund $\$ 50,550.47$ ；Entertainment Fund $\$ 33,278.18$ ；Contingent Fund $\$ 50,201.42$ ；Committee on Vacancy and Supply $\$ 7,569.06$ ；Total $\$ 141,599.13$ ．

The payments are as follows：Nileage $\$ 65,397.83$ ；Enter－ tainment \＄22，000．00．

All balances of funds are in the custody of the Treasurer of the General Assembly，The Land Title \＆Trust Company of Philadelphia， Pa ．

The Presbytery which did not contribute is the Presbytery of Dodgeville．In regard to the latter it is only fair to say that no representatives have attended the Assembly．The Presbyteries not contributing to the entertainment are Clarion and Kittanning．

The Committee recommends the following for adoption：
That the apportionment for the next Assembly be 10 cents for each communicant；to the Mileage Fund 4 cents；to the

Entertaimment Fund 2 cents; to the Contingent Fund 3 cents. Publicity 1 cent.

That the Treasurer be authorized to have the accounts for the mileage and entertaimment of the Assembly duly audited after the adjournment of the Assembly.

That the Treasurer be empowered to pay Commissioners such further sums as may be considered by the Treasurer justly due by the reason of underestimation of railroad charges and other expenses incurred in returning home; and also for fare paid in excess of the published rates of transportation in cases where it was found that it was impossible for the Commissioners to secure reduced rates.

The Mileage Committee wishes to extend their thanks to The Land Title and Trust Company for the use of Mr. Davis, Secretary, Mr. Hamilton, Assistant Secretary, and the two young ladies, Miss Millard and Miss Mumma, for their painstaking and efficient work in getting up this report in detail and keeping track of everything, as it would have been impossible for this Committee to have done this work.

## Committee on Finance

The Standing Committee on Finance presented its report through its Chairman, Elder E. P. Holden, which was adopted, and is as follows:

The report of the Trustees of the General Assembly with the report of its Treasurer, the correctness of which is verified by certified public accountants, Messers. Vollum, Fernley \& Vollum, was submitted to and examined by your Committee. These reports show that the Trustees are now administering the following trusts:

Of the various trusts, twenty-seven were founded prior to 1832. The earliest, in 1817. Eight of them are 100 years old and over.

Many of the miscellaneous funds are subdivided, thus largely increasing the number of beneficiaries.

The income from investments of all sorts inereased $\$ 5,510.24$ during the year, averaging nearly $5.3 \%$ as against $4.9 \%$ the previous year.

The regular expenses of administering the various trusts were $\$ 2,567.70$. This includes the salaries of the Secretary and of the Treasurer, the compensation of the Solicitor and also printing, auditing, etc.

In addition to acting as Treasurer, the Philadelphia Trust Company supplies to the Board, free of charge, a safe in its burglar-proof vaults under two separate sets of keys, for the safekeeping of the securities, provides storage facilities for the large number of title papers, insurance policies, etc., which aecompany the mortgages and also allowed $\$ 701.80$ interest on current balance in their hands.

The Palethorp Memorial Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia having been completed and the Trustees having no funds with which to aid in its maintenance, have turned the property over to the Trustees of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, a corporation formed for the purpose of holding title as Trustees of Presbytery to certain churches and for caring for their support. The Trustees of Presbytery have an invested fund for the purpose of assisting this church.

In accordance with the will of the Rev. John C. Lord, the income from the legacy received from his estate is to be disposed of and distributed by the General Assembly at each annual meeting for the furtherance of the Gospel of our Blessed Saviour, at home or abroad, as to the Assembly may seem best. It will be necessary for this General Assembly to direct the Trustees as to how the income from this legaey shall be distributed under the terms of the will, and respectfully request such direction for the current year. In 1921 they were directed to distribute it equally between the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions respectively.

The report also shows that the indemnity bond of the Treasurer, the Philadelphia Trust Company, for $\$ 25,000$, has been renewed for another year.

There is in the possession of said Trustees $\$ 5,171.76$ of unexpended income. Of this amount your Committee assumes that about $\$ 2,200.00$ belongs to the above mentioned John C: Lord Fund income, leaving a balance of about $\$ 2,800.00$ subject to the orders of this Assembly.

Your Committee respectfully recommend:

1. That the report of the Trustees of the General Assembly and of its Treasurer be received and approved, with the thanks of the Assembly for the faithful and efficient services rendered.
2. That the Assembly direct that the income from the said Rev. John C. Lord Fund be distributed equally between the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions as suggested by said Trustees.
3. There are two vacancies upon the Board of Trustees, Mr. Walter F. Hager died February 27, 1922, having served the Board for eight years. Mr. Francis B. Reeves resigned at the May meeting on account of ill health. Mr. Reeves had been a member of the Board for twenty-two years.

The Committee recommends the election of Rev. Alexander MacColl, D.D., and Mr. J. Howard Pew to fill the vacancies in the membership of said corporation and that the election to fill said vacancies be held on Thursday, to conform with the two days' notice required by the Assembly Rules.

The accounts of the Land Title and Trust Company, Treasurer of the General Assembly have been submitted to your Committee and found correct, being duly certified by Lybrand Ross Bros. \& Montgomery Public Accountants, showing a balance in the hands of Treasurer or in transit of $\$ 37,618.31$. Your Committee will not trouble you with the detailed report of Receipts and Payments by the Stated Clerk, Acting Stated Clerk, and Treasurer, as these will appear in the Appendix of the Assembly Minutes.

Your Committee respectfully recommends:

1. That the report of the Assembly's Treasurer be received, and approved with the thanks of the Assembly for the faithful and efficient services rendered.
2. That pursuant to the action of the General Assembly, the following appropriations be made.

## Committee on Synodical Records

The Standing Committee on Siynodical Records, through its Chairman, Rev. R. T. Roberts, D.D., presented a report which was adopted as follows:

The Committee on Synodical Records respectfully reports to the Assembly that the Records of the Synods of Arizona. Arkansas, Atlantic, C'alifornia, Colorado, East Tennesese, Florida, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Minnesota (Welsh), Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New England, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, New York \& Vermont (Welsh), North Dakota, Ohio, Ohio Western (Welsh), Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania (Welsh), South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Washington, West (German) West Virginia, Wisconsin, Wisconsin (Welsh), Wyoming, have been carefully examined, that they are neatly and correctly kept, that they are in accord with the constitution of the church, and that their approval is, therefore, recommended.

The records of the Synods of Alabama, Baltimore, and Catawba, have been carefully examined, that they are neatly and correctly kept and their approval is recommended with the following exception, namely, they do not record the absentees.

A resolution with reference to the work of the Biblical Alliance was referred to the General Board of Education.

The Stated Clerk was given permission to file the report of the Standing Committee on Leave of Absence.

The calling of the Roll of the Assembly was omitted by consent, in view of the excellent attendance.

The Standing Committees of the Assembly were discharged with thanks, and all papers were returned.

The Minutes of the session on Thursday forenoon were read and approved, and the reading of the Minutes of the last session was dispensed with by consent, and was referred to the Stated Clerk with power.

## Resolutions of Thanks

The Committee on Resolutions of Thanks presented its report through its Chairman, Rev. Samuel Callen, D. D., which was approved and is as follows:

The 134th General Assembly in drawing its session to a close, would express its sincere appreciation of the hospitality
which has been extended to us by the City of Des Moines and our gratitude to God for His abundant blessings and manifest favor that has attended all the sessions of this Assembly.

We would express to the Rev. Frank C. McKean, D.D., Chairman of the Committee on Entertainment, and to all associated with him in preparing for, receiving, and caring for this Assembly, our grateful acknowledgement of the abundant provision and generous hospitality in which they have received and cared for us, the cars designated for guests and the excursions about the city, the ample provision made for our convenience in the building in which we have assembled, in the churches put at our disposal by our sister denominations, in the library building tendered by the city Library Board, in the Coliseum with its splendid provision for the exhibit of the work of this great denomination, the entertainment given by the young people of the churches, the abundant and ready hospitality of the Hotels and Homes in which we have lodged, will be remembered by all Commissioners and Visitors to this Assembly as contributing to our daily happiness while here and to our efficiency in the performance of all duties incumbent upon us in the work with which we have been engaged.

We would mention also the officials and employees of all Railroads to whose attention and care in travel we are so greatly indebted.

We would express our sincere thanks to the Press for their faithful work in publicity and in keeping the whole church informed of the daily progress of the work this Assembly has carried on. We would include in this expression of gratitude the employees of all buildings in which the work of the Assembly was distributed, the telephone, telegraph and messenger service, the post office and postal service to all of whom we are obligated by a debt of gratitude. And to the Chamber of Commerce that has so efficiently coöperated in all the work of these days.

We wish to thank the pastor, the Rev. Burtis R.MacHutton, D.D., and the officials and members of the Pilgrim Congregational Church for the great kindness in granting us the use of their beautiful church for the opening session of the Assembly.

We record with gratitude to God his guidance of this Assembly in the selection of the Rev. Calvin C. Hays, D.D., as Moderator for the year 1922-23. In him the ministry of the gospel of Christ, the spirit of brotherly love, and the beautiful courtesy of Christian fellowship have been presented to us all. We would testify to the uniform kindness, fairness, and faith-
ful diligence with which he has conducted the business of the Assembly.

The Assembly has also been fortunate in the choice which it made of the Rev. Wm. O. Thompson, D. D., L.L. D., as Vice-Moderator, who when called to the chair, conducted the business of the Assembly with Christian courtesy and dispatch.

We desire to give thanks for the service rendered by our Stated Clerk, the Rev. Lewis S. Mudge, D.D. He has directed the business of the Assembly with remarkable dispatch, and his courtesy, consideration, and devotion have been appreciated by every commissioner. We are confident that this office of the Stated Clerk is in able hands. We also wish to thank the Stated Clerk's Assistants for the care and fidelity with which they fulfilled their tasks.

We would express our gratitude to God for the report of the Committee on Reorganization and Consolidation of Assembly Agencies, so ably presented to this Assembly by the Chairman, the Rev. John Timothy Stone, D.D., LL.D. The spirit of gentleness, wisdom, and strength, attributed to him when nominated to the Moderatorship of the General Assembly a few years ago, was never more beautifully expressed than in the presentation of this report. Dr. Stone and his Committee have performed a most difficult task in a truly and blessedly Christian fashion and they have brought us far on our way toward the establishment of Christ's Kingdom in the earth. For this we express our gratitude to God and our grateful recognition of the service they have rendered to the Church.

The spirit of unity and brotherly love, that marked the Commissioners to this Assembly in all their deliberations, discussions and actions upon this Committee's report, witnesses to the truth of the prophecy of which the sessions of this Assembly were opened. The trumpet call of the retiring Moderator, Dr. Henry C. Swearingen, in his opening sermon, to "rise, be enlightened, for thy light has come," led this Assembly to carry forward the business of the Kingdom as men should on whom the Sun of Righteousness has shone and on whom a new day has dawned. As we complete the business of the King for which this great Assembly was convened, let us return to our places of labor in the Church with high confidence that the Church has many glorious bands of men whose heart the Lord God has touched, and who, under His hand and by direction of His spirit, will lead us on until the Kingdom of this world have become the Kingdom of our God. Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thee be the Glory and the Praise, now and ever more. Amen.

The business of the Assembly having been completed, and a vote having been taken for the dissolution, the Moderator dissolved the Assembly, saying, "By virtue of the authority delegated to me by the Church, let this Assembly be dissolved, and I do hereby dissolve it, and require another General Assembly chosen in like manner, to meet at Indianapolis, Indiana, on the third Thursday of May, 1923."

The Sessions were closed with prayer, singing, and the Apostolic Benediction.

The Synod of West German was not represented.
We have examined the Minutes of the Board and find them neatly kept and carefully prepared for preservation for future reference and we commend the Board and its Clerk for the splendid manner in which the records of the proceedings have been put into permanent form.

We reaffirm our conviction that the Christianization of America is the objective of the whole Church. This objective is to be secured by the presentation in national terms of a common budget and a common promotional program for Evangelism, Education and Service. The share of each Synod or Presbytery in this national task is to be determined in a joint budgeting conference.

We heartily approve the Community Social Service program as a necessary means of making the whole life of the community Christian. The Council believes that the primary emphasis should ever be on the original commission of the Church, "Go, Preach, Teach," and urges the Board in all its activities to continue to keep this principle in mind.

The Home Mission Council approves the efforts being made for better unification of the whole Home Mission enterprise throughout our nation, but believes that in all efforts for such unification the desirability of independent action and the value of free local administration ought to be recognized and encouraged.

We heartily endorse the action of the Home Mission Board in inaugurating an enlistment movement for Home Mission workers as a Fellowship for American Service along the lines suggested by the Council last year and we rejoice in the success that has already rewarded such effort.

We recognize and regret the necessity which has compelled retrenchment in the number of men and enterprises supported by the Board. We believe this condition should be given the widest publicity and that the whole Church should set itself to the correction of this condition by largely increased gifts to the benevolence budget.

We would recommend for next year the adoption of a simple form of pledge card which will provide that the funds contributed (unless there is a specific declaration to the contrary)
shall be used to assure to each Board and Agency that per cent. of the total receipts by which it is represented in the gross budget. It is further recommended that the Board of Home Missions confer with the other Boards and Agencies to this end.

The division of receipts for this common budget between the Board and each self-supporting Home Mission Agency shall be determined upon a percentage basis agreed upon between the Board of Home Missions and the Agency concerned.

It shall be understood that each self-supporting Agency clearing through the Board shall put into the Board's Treasury during a given year an amount sufficient to cover all expenses for work within its own bounds for which it retains the initiative, direction and control and such share of expenditures for other work as may be agreed upon. The disposition of any surplus or deficit accruing in any given year shall also be a matter of agreement between the Board and the Agency concerned. Specific gifts for objects outside the Budget shall not apply against the Budget appropriated for that year. Such contributions, however, shall not be solicited without a previous agreement between the Board and the Synod or Presbytery. These Synods and Presbyteries shall agree to participate in the promotion of this program of national work outside their own bounds to the extent of their ability.

The Council firmly believes that our people are vitally interested in work at home and commends the presentation of separate fields to churches for support within the spirit and limits of the New Era plan.

We would call attention to the rule of the General Assembly providing that Presbyterial and Synodical Chairmen of Home Mission Committees shall be invited to sit with Presbyterial and Synodical New Era Committees in making allocations to the churches of the annual benevolence budget, and recommend that the benevolence quotas for aid receiving churches should be large enough to stimulate the grace of giving, but not so disproportionate as to make Home Mission treasuries in effect contribute to the other Boards and Agencies of the Church.

The Home Mission Council approves the policy of a joint promotional program on the part of the Home Board, the Synod, and the Presbyteries and recommends that the policy be put into effect as rapidly as possible. In view of the apparent lack of missionary knowledge on the part of men of the Church it would seem wise to arrange the program so as to appeal especially to men.

The Council recommends that as far as possible some form of definite and intensive Home Mission promotion be organized this year in each Presbytery of the Church, assuming that in putting these programs into operation the Board of Home Missions will pursue a policy of co-operation always desirable between the Boards of the Church.

We call the attention of the Board of Home Missions to the need of a presentation of the Home Mission history, program and outlook which shall include all noteworthy Home Mission work whether under the supervision of the Board or other Agency, in textbook form for use in mission study classes and the general information of the Church.

We declare the right of our Church to prosecute its work in every part of our country and urge our Board and our ministers to an aggressive policy wherever, in the judgment of the Church, there seems a call for its services, and we also express our loyal support of its work in every Synod where it exists or where it may be established.

The Council expresses its deepest appreciation of the splendid work of the Woman's Board of Home Missions in the performance of its special tasks and its enlistment of so large a body of supporters, and urges the Assembly, in the consideration of the "Plan for Consolidation" to use every means to conserve the work now assigned to them through the preservation of the organizations in the local Church, Presbytery and Synod, the interest of their constituency, and the liberal gifts of the women to these special objects.

VI. General.

Our two summer schools will be held as usual, the School of Theology, July 10-28th, with seven members in its Faculty; the School of Religious Education, July 31st-August 12th, with thirteen members in its Faculty. There were 184 students in attendance upon both schools last summer.

Four members of our Middle and Junior classes have been assigned Summer Service Fellowships and will be engaged during the summer, under the direction of the Faculty and supervision of the Professor of Sociology, in New York City and elsewhere. The value of these Fellowships to our students for purposes of insight into the City problems and experience in their solution can hardly be over stated. Our method of giving the students thorough scholastic training in social subjects during eight months of the seminary year and practical experience in the same subject during the summer has proven to be pedagogically a wise and unexcelled method.

We have had during the year seven Oriental Fellows from Japan and China. These students have been carefully selected by our Committees in these countries and are granted Fellowships because of their seholastic attainments and promise for usefulness in the religious life of their respective countries.

Ezra Halladay Woods of the Graduating Class was awarded the Joshua I. Maxwell Fellowship for 1922-23, and Arthur Tillotson Clark of the same Class was awarded the Alumni Fellowship for the same period.

We have continued thronghout the yar the eampaign, begun a year aro, of reeruiting for the ministry, and we are happy to believe that it hats not, bern without advantage to the various seminaries of our Church.

There has been a gratifying inerease in the number of students entering the Seminary during the past year. Twenty-four entered the varions elasses.

The Russell Lecturer for this past year was President Ceorge W. Richards, D.D., of the Theological Seminary at laneaster, Pa., on the subject "Christian Ways of Salvation." Rev. David S. Cairns, D.I)., of Aberdeen, Seotland, is the Russell Lecturer for the year 1923-23.

In September last we were able to put into effect our plans of several years' standing for a School of Religions Education. This is a department of the Seminary which, however, is entirely separate from it, having its own Faculty, student body, class-rooms and school life. By reason of its association with the Seminary the School gains greatly in atmosphere and inspiration, and by reason of its separation a school consciousness is developed and all thought of it affording a "short cut" to the ministry is effectually discouraged. Notwithstanding this was its first year there were eight regular students pursuing the course, two of whom are candidates for the degree of Master of Religious Education and six are candidates for the diploma. There were ninety unclassified students and eight students in the Seminary pursued eertain courses in the Sehool. This made a total enrollment in the School of Religious Education of 106.

In all departments the total number of students in attendance upon the Seminary, the School of Religious Education, and the two Summer Schools for the past year has been 341.

The University of the State of New York, through its Board of Regents, has granted the Seminary power to confer the following degrees in course: Bachelor of Theology, Master of Theology, Doctor of Theology, Bachelor of Religious Education, Master of Religious Edueation.

A Department of Religions Edheation has heen organized and the work has been assigned to Dr. Farmer, Dr. Snowlen, and Dr. Vance. Four courses are offered in this department:

1. Psychology of Childhood and Adolesence. Principles of payehology as applied to the mental and moral development of chitdhood and youth, with special reference to the problems of adoleserenee.
2. Organization and Administration of Ruligious Education. This conrse is designed to comprehend not onty the organzation and operation of the siunday School within the individual church, but all organized activities in the community which look toward refigions and moral education.
3. Principles and Methods. An application of the principles and methords of general pedagogy to Religious Education.
4. The Psychology of Religion. A study of the religions nature and activities of the soul in the light of recent psyohology; and a course in modern theories of the ultimate basis and nature of religion.

## General.

The resignation of Dr. Selby F. Vance to accept a chair in the Western Seminary, as announced in our report to the last Assembly, and the resignation by Dr. Francis Powell Cheek of the chair of the New Testament Exegesis, took from the Seminary men of unquestioned scholarship. But Lane's high standard of scholarly equipment, and training in the rightful handling of the Word of God, and in the discharge of the duties of the pastorate has not been lowered.

Dr. Frank Granstaff of the Oakland Presbyterian Church, Springfield, Ohio, was elected to the Chair of Homiletics and Apologetics; Rev. Julian P. Love, of the Fourth Presbyterian Church of Dayton, Ohio, to the chair of New Testament Greek and New Testament English Bible.

They were both duly installed in their professorships on Friday, March 3, 1922. The services incident thereto were held in the Presbyterian Church of the Covenant, of which, when then the Second Presbyterian Church, Lyman Eeecher, while the First President of Lane Seminary, was for ten years its Pastor.

Mr. William Jennings Bryan made to a crowded audience his address on the Christian Ministry.

Both of these brethren are graduates of Lane. They represent the older and the younger alumni of the institution.

Some years ago, the late Dr. Wilbur Chapman, a member of our Board of Trustees, wrote Lane"s President concerning Dr. Granstaff: "I wish you would call Dr. Granstaff to Lane for the Chair of Homiletics, he is a great and growing man. . . . I cannot urge this too strongly, and I do not think there is a better man for you in the Church."

Rev. Julian P. Love was the leading scholar of his class, and has had a brilliant and successful pastorate in the Fourth Presbyterian Church of Dayton, Ohio.

President Hughes of Miami University writes: "I am delighted to hear of the honor coming to Mr. Love. He was a student at Miami four years, and graduated with distinction. . . . I feel confident that you have added to your staff a capable scholar, a man of the very highest ideals."

The physical equipment of the Seminary is being much improved. Through the activity of the alumni, electric lights have been placed in the dormitory and class rooms; through the activity of Dr. Vance, steam heating was extended to all the rooms of the student, and the alumni are engaged in a movement to
renovate the entire buikling and espeesially to furnioh the rome of the sturbents with modern convenienees and comfort.. We are faring the future with confidence.

Note.-During the campaign by the two Synods of Kentucky for their educational institutions, and for some months preceding it, the representatives of the institutions agreed to solicit no funds. This accounts for the small deficit.


## VI. General.

1. Rev. Thornton Whaling, D.D., entered upon his aetive service in the Chair of Systematic Theology at the beginning of the session and has made a great impression as a teacher of Theology, has stimulated all phases of our Scminary life and has rapidly won a high place in the regard and confidence of the Seminary's constituency.
2. In accordance with the demand in this general region for a training school for lay workers, and the recommendation of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church U. S. A., at its last meeting, in response to a recommendation by the General Presbyterian Board of Education, a tentative training school was organized during the session in affiliation with the Seminary. The Committee of management represented the Faculty and others and instruction was given by the Seminary professors, some of the Presbyterian ministers of the city and one layman. Sixty-five students were enrolled; all of whom were from the city of Louisville, and the session covered a period of four months. There was no provision available for taking care of students outside of the city, but the number of inquiries and applications indicated the were a women's dormitory to be provided and the funds for a teaching force, a training school in affiliation with the Seminary would do a great service throughout this part of the Chureh.
3. During the year three scholarships have been established; namely, The Goodwin Scholarship of $\$ 2,500$, established by Mr. J. G. Goodwin of the First Presbyterian Chureh of Marshall, Mo., in honor of Mrs. Goodwin; The Elsea Scholarship of $\$ 2,500$, established by Mr. and Mrs. Ernest E. Elsea, of the First Presbyterian Church of Marshall, Mo.; The Mary Nichols Veeeh Memorial Seholarship of $\$ 2,000$, established by Mr. Burwell K. Marshall, of Louisville, Ky., in memory of Mrs. Marshall's mother.
4. The two Synods of Kentueky have entered upon a campaign to raise $\$ 1,000,000$ for their educational institutions, and of this amount the Seminary is to receive $\$ 300,000$. There is every promise that this campaign, which is under the management of the Education Committee of the Presbyterian Chureh, U. S., with coöperation of the General Board of Education of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., will meet with success. With this addition to the already inereasing resources of the institution the Seminary may under the blessing of God be expected to give a much larger service to the Presbyterian Chureh, especially in the Mississippi Valley.
5. Amendments to the Charter: The Board of Direetors at its annual meeting held May 3, 1921, aeting under Article IX of the Charter, and the Executive Committee of the Board on October 10, 1921, approved and recommended certain amendments to the Charter to the controlling Synods; namely, the Synod of Kentucky, U. S. A., and the Synods of Kentueky, Missouri and Appalachia, U. S. The amendments are as follows:
That Article VII of the Charter be so amended that the Synod of Kentucky in conneetion with the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America shall eleet one-third of the directors of the Seminary, and the Synods of Kentucky, Missouri and Appalachia, in connection with the Presbyterian Church in the United States, together with any other Synod or Synods of the said ehurch that may be hereafter associated with these Synods in the control of the Scminary, shall elect two-thirds of the directors.
That the number of Directors be ehanged by agreement of the Synods from twenty-four (24) to thirty-six (36), as provided for in the first part of Artiele VI of the Charter; and that the Synod of Kentueky, U. S. A. shall continue to eleet, as heretofore, twelve directors, and that unless and until the representation of the Synods in connection with the Presbyterian Chureh in the United States equals twenty-four, the number they are entitled to according to the proposed change in the Charter, the members of the Board from the synods of said church shall elect sufficient members to complete the required number of twenty-four,

The above amendments, unanimously approved by the Board of Directors and by the Executive Committee of the Board, were also unanimously concurred in by each one of the controlling Synods, and are now, in accordance with Article IX of the Charter, reported to the Assembly for its approval.

Note.-It may be proper to state that Centre College, at Danville, Ky., and the Kentucky College for Women, at the same place, came into relation last October with the two Synods of Kentucky, and their charters and constitutions were so changed as to have one-third of the directors of these institutions to be subject to veto by each Synod, and the remaining third to be elected by the directors of the Synod of Kentucky, U. S. A. These changes were unanimously approved by each board of directors and by each of the Synods of Kentucky.

8. At the meeting of the Board, April 27, 1922, the Rev. Augustus Stiles Carrier, D.D., LL.D., having completed thirty-five years of service in the work of instruction in McCormick Seminary, was made Professor Emeritus of Hebrew and Old Testament Exegesis.
9. At the meeting of the Board, April 27, 1922, the Rev. Ovid Rogers Sellers, B.A., B.D., who graduated from McCormick Seminary in 1915 as the Nettie F. McCormick Fellow in Old Testament Hebrew and who has pursued advanced studies in Assyrian, Arabic, Aramic, and Hebrew, as well as in Hieroglyphic, Hieratic, Coptic, Sumerian, Avestan and Old Persian, was elected to the Chair of Hebrew and Old Testament Exegesis. 13. The Alumni by general subseription have started to endow a Scholarship which will in due time be given the name of some special person, a goodly portion of the desired amount having been already secured.
14. The death of John H. Holliday during the year at Indianapolis, Indiana, is recorded in the Minutes of the Board of Directors with every possible expression of appreciation and of love. He served on the Board from 1886, was a member of the Executive Committee and gave of his time, labor and counsel unstintedly to the welfare of the Seminary-always being present at the meetings of the Board-a force for righteousness and an example of wisdom, piety and helpfulness.

16. The Board of Directors records with the greatost gratitude that Mrs. Nettie F. ## VI. Needs.

To maintain the salaries of professors so that they shall be adequate to meet the present high cost of living the endowments of the professorships must be largely increased. The limited number of the Scholarships thus far endowed do not begin to meet the demands upon the Scholarship Fund, of the increasing number of students. Notwithstanding a considerable increase in income through the New Era Funds of the Pacific Coast Synods, the necessary expenses have exceeded the total income by about $\$ 4,500$. To meet the increased demands upon the treasury of the Seminary, owing to its rapid growth $\$ 500,000$ additional endowment is an imperative need. $\$ 250,000$ is needed for repairs, another dormitory, and other new equipment. The past year it has been necessary to put cots into a number of rooms in the men's dormitory. A campaign is being planned to secure the above needed funds. In the meantime the contributions of friends are earnestly requested.

## VII. General.

The Seminary has had by far the largest attendance in its history. It has made a 35 per cent. increase over last year, and has doubled the attendance in the past two years. There is no dormitory space for a further increase.

A year ago the Presbytery of San Francisco resolved to proceed to the securing of $\$ 50,000$ to endow a chair of Religious Education in this Seminary. Later they informed the Seminary they might choose any member of the Presbytery to give instruction in Religious Education without expense to the Seminary. Rev. Robert S. Donaldson, D.D., Executive Secretary of the Board of Church Extension of the Presbytery was chosen. He has given instruction in this subject throughout the year. Though it was an elective course it was largely attended, and has proved both interesting and profitable.

The Westminster School for Christian Social Service was instituted in Westminster House, Berkeley, Cal., a year ago. It is conducted as an Extension Department of our Seminary, in conjunction with the General Board of Education of our Church, the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions, the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, and the Woman's Boards of Home and Foreign Missions. There have been in attendance 23 graduate and undergraduate students of the University of California, 8 of whom have completed a
required eourse, and received certifieates. The studics are, in gemerat, of a biblicat, missionary, and social service character. As our laculty provides half the instruction of the school, the students might well be added to there reported above, which would make a total of 129 .

Several interesting week-end conferences, continuing from Saturday noon to Sunday night, have been held in the Seminary buildings under the tuspicess of the students. First came the Russian students from the Univereity of California, the most of whom were not professing Christians. It was attended by some 25 or 30 men. The second was the Student Volunteer Conference of Northern California, at which 80 were registered. The third, the Iligh School Boys, consisting of seleeted boys from the churches in the Sin Franciseo I Bay region. Approximately 75 attended. Fourth, the Christian Men's Conference from the Universities and Colleges of Northern Catifornia. Thirty-five were in attendance. All of these gatherings have afforded excellent opportunitios of reeruiting men for the ministry and other kinds of Christian service.

A committee of neighboring friends and eitizens have interested themselves the past year, in improving and bautifying the grounds of the Seminary. They have already expended a considerable amount. Working under the general direetion of a landseape gardener, they will, in the near future, make the place one of rare beauty.

The graduating elass have made a subscription gift of $\$ 600$ to develop one feature in the plan of beautifying the grounds above mentioned.

The only sad event of the year was the death on January 4th of Mr. Alexander Bouick, superintendent of grounds and buildings. In six months more, he would have completed thirty years of faithful and eminent service in this capacity.

## VI. Needs.

In the statement made last year under this heading, we reported that not the principal, but what would be the interest on such principal had been given by the General Education Board to increase salaries of Professors. This year they offer $\$ 35,000$, if the University will raise $\$ 65,000$, making a total of $\$ 100,000$ of permanent endowment to perpetuate this increase. It would be most unfortunate not to secure this $\$ 65,000$ for the salary even thus increased will not remove the necessity of frugality and economy by Professors.

The amount needed for a modern and sufficiently equipped Science Hall is drawing nearer completion, but it must all be raised before a last offer of $\$ 15,000$ to complete it will be given.

We are still waiting for some gencrous friend to give a Y. M. C. A. Building including a Gymnasium.

The beautiful Memorial Arch mentioned in last year's report, as being in process of erection, was finished by Commencement Day in June, and was fittingly and formally dedicated on the same day by the President and selected representatives of the Alumni, and also with most appropriate addresses by President Harding and United States Senator Philander Knox. Mrs. Harding, the first lady of the land, and Mrs. Knox accompanied their honored husbands on this occasion. Senator Knox may be said to have made one of his last and crowning speeches at Lincoln University, as only a short time afterwards he passed away. Senator George Wharton Pepper, his distinguished successor, will give the ehief Commencement address this year on June 6th.

## VII. General.

It takes seven years of advanced education, four of college, and three of seminary to equip and furnish a trained man for the ministry. Seven years ago, or in 1915, we had 54 men in our Seminary, of whom 17 were in the graduating elass. The war came and the young men were called to the colors, and our Seminary shrank to 22 from 54 , and two years ago, we had only 33 to go forth into a ripe harvest field. Last year the 3 were doubled to 6 , and this year the number has grown to 9, and these are harbingers, we trust, of larger numbers.

Negro ehurches in the North are increasing so rapidly that perhaps a year before graduation most of the men are mortgaged. Biddle University, our noble co-worker in this field, and our Seminary can not begin to supply the demands. The Lord of the harvest incline more and more to answer, "Lord here am I, send me."

## V. General

During the year upward of fifteen colleges in the West were visited by the President and the calling to Christian service and especially the ministry, was laid on the hearts and eonsciences of the young men and women. He also visited neighboring Synods and Presbyteries and spoke in the interests of the Seminary and Christian education.

Of the two hundred alumni of the Seminary, most have selected fields in the Synods contiguous to the Seminary. There are eight in S. Dakota, eight in Missouri, eleven in Kansas, thirty-five in Iowa and fifty in Nebraska. This fact helped to lead Nebraska to write the Seminary into its budget for the current year for $\$ 4,000,00$. It is hoped that others of these Synods may do likewise. Eight of the alumni are in Foreign Mission fields.

During the past year, Prof. Edward Puls gave instruction in voice and delivery and Prof. V. H. Vartanian of the University of Omaha in the Psychology of Religion. Next year, Prof. Mitchell will teach Religious Pedagogy and instruction will also be given in vocal musie.

The vastness of the territory in which the Seminary is situated is a stan ing argument for its existence and sustenance. There are sixteen states in this great section containing an area of $1,300,000$ square miles and a population of $23,000,000$. There are 3,000 Presbyterian Churches, having a membership of 330,000 and there are fourteen Presbyterian Colleges. Truly this is a great territory to be possessed from Minnesota to Texas and from the Mississippi River to the Rocky Mountains, and there is great need of ministers; for last year nine hundred and sixty-five Presbyterian Churches in this territory were reported to the Assembly as vacant. Many of these are small in membership but most, of them furnish large opportunities for service and many possibilities of increase for the kingdom of Christ.

## YiI. Curricula.

The regular course leading to a Diploma is of three years' duration, and includes all the subjects usually found in a Seminary course. Although at present the requirements for admission are only those of the professional schools of Porto Rico-a High School Diploma-yet this course includes, in the Seminary and in the nearby University of Porto Rico, work in college subjects to the extent of 40 of the necessary 120 credits of the B. A. Degree, and by taking six years both the B. A. Diploma of the University and the Seminary Diploma may be obtained. This latter arrangement is recommended to the students, and five are now pursuing it.

In addition, the Seminary offers a briefer Certificate Course of two years for those who may not find it convenient to take the regular Diploma course.

Instruction is also given through home-study courses along the same lines as the work done in residence.

## VIII. Needs.

The Seminary needs a complete, adequate plant of its own. The present rented plant is full and already there are more applications for the coming year than can be taken care of. $\$ 100,000$ is needed at once to properly house the Seminary and its Faculty.

## IX. General.

The wonderful development now in progress among the Spanish-speaking pooples demands the best possible preparation of their Evangelical ministry. This preparation requires a complete facility in the use of the Spanish language and at the same time a thorough mastery of the Evangelical literature in English. In the University of Porto Rico, which sustains friendly relations with the Seminary, much of the college work is done in English and superior instruction is given in Spanish language and literature, while in the Seminary the discussions are carricd on in Spanish with an extensive use of English text and reference books, so that students for the ministry here find the peculiar conditions most helpful to their preparation. Just now, two Spanish eollege graduates and a Cuban student who came without any knowledge of English are receiving this preparation in their own language and are becoming able to master the extensive Evangelical literature in English.

On the basis of this policy, within a few years, the Protestant Church in Porto Rico now has its own native ministry and has given a ministry to Santo Domingo and has made a notable contribution to the ministry of Cuba.

Dear Sirs:
We have examined the account of the Land Title \& Trust Co., Treasurer of the General Assembly, for the period from August 5, 1921 to March 31, 1922, and found them to be correct.

The Treasurer's cash balance at March 31st was $\$ 37,618.31$, the deficit in the Mileage Fund having been closed into the General Fund.

The uncollected apportionments which were called to your attention in our report dated August 15, 1921, have not been collected during the period covered by this report.

On November 1, 1921, the General Board of Education purchased from the Assembly $\$ 25,000$ of its Certificates of Indebtedness on which interest of $\$ 375$ had accrued. This interest was not paid by the General Board of Education, but we understand the matter is to be adjusted by your Treasurer at the next interest period, which is June 30, 1922.

We submit herewith a Summary of the Receipts and Payments by the Treasurer for the year ended March 31, 1922, including receipts to April 10, 1922, which were in the mail on March 31, 1922, and a schedule of Certificates of Indebtedness outstanding at March 31, 1922.

The Trustees of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., in accordance with the ninth section of its Charter, respectfully report to the General Assembly the state of the accounts of the Corporation for the year ending March 31, 1922.

The accounts are herewith presented and made part of this Report and consist of the Treasurer's annual account of the principal and income, showing the receipts and disbursements of both funds and the balance of cash on hand at the end of the fiscal year, together with the investment of the principal.

These accounts are accompanied by the Report of the Committee of the Board of Finance, with the usual certificate of this Committee and the Report of the Committee on Accounts as to the conditions of the finances and the investment of the funds as shown by the account, and the audit of the Treasurer's account. The certificate of Vollum, Fernley and Vollum, certified public accountants, as to the examination of the accounts, cash and securities of the Corporation, is also appended.

The disposition of the income received upon the various trusts appears in the Treasurer's accounts.

Of the various trusts twenty-seven were founded prior to 1832. The earlicst in 1817. Eight them are 100 years old and over.

Many of the Miscellaneous Funds are subdivided, thus largely increasing the number of benficiaries.

The figures on the column marked Assessed Amount in the values placed upon real estate upon which mortgages are held are those of the official assessment of the properties. Those in the colum marked Appraised Amount are the valuation of the expert appraiser of the Philadelphia Trust Company, Treasurer of the Board.

The ineome from investments in stocks, bonds and mortgages and real estate increased $\$ 5510.24$ during the year. The total income of all investments averaged nearly 5 3-10 per cent. Nearly all of the investments in Corporation Bonds were made at the time when the income return was much smaller than that obtainable at the present time, besides which the Trustees are necessarily restricted to the highest class of investments. The Trustees hold $\$ 58,000.00$ in U. S. Liberty Loan $4 \frac{4}{4}$ per cent. bonds and $\$ 112,000.00$ U. S. Treasury certificates, a part of which was received as a legacy.

The 89 shares of Delaware \& Hudson Company, 3 shares Germantown Passenger Railway Co., of Philadelphia, the only stocks held in principal account, were received as legacies, also real estate to the value of $\$ 8,750.00$.

The Chicago \& Eastern Illinois R.R. Co., of which the Trustecs held $\$ 20,000.00$ General and First Mortgage Bonds and which had been in the hands of receivers for several years, has been reorganized and a satisfactory settlement made with the Trustees. New bonds were received for the entire amount of principal. At the date of this report no interest is in default on either stocks, bonds or mortgages or real estate. In addition to the bonds received from the Chicago and Eastern Illinois Railroad Co., on account of principal there have also been received $\$ 3,260.00$ in cash, $\$ 3,240.00$ in General Mortgage bonds and 20 shares cumulative preferred stock. The cash has been credited to income account and the $\$ 3,240.00$ General Mortgage bonds and 20 shares cumulative preferred stock are being held for account of income and when sold will be credited to that account as against interest in default.

The entire regular expenses of administering the various trusts were $\$ 2,567.70$. This includes the salaries of the Secretary and of the Treasurer, the compensation of the Solicitor and also printing, auditing, etc.

In addition to acting as Treasurer, the Philadelphia Trust Company supplies to the Board, free of charge, a safe in its burglar-proof vaults under two separate sets of keys, for the safekeeping of the securities, provides storage facilities for the large number of title papers, insurance policies, etc., which accompany the mortgages and also allowed $\$ 701.80$ interest on current balance in their hands.

The Palethorp Memorial Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia having been completed and the Trustees having no funds with which to aid in its maintenance, have turned the property over to the Trustees of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, a corporation formed for the purpose of holding title as Trustees of Presbytery to certain churches and for caring for their support. The Trustees of Presbytery have an invested fund for the purpose of assisting this church.

In accordance with the will of the Rev. John C. Lord, the income from the legacy received from his estate is to be disposed of and distributed by the General Assembly at each annual meeting for the furtherance of the Gospel of our Blessed Saviour, at home or abroad as to the Assembly may seem best. It will be necessary for this General Assembly to direct the Trustees as to how the income from this legacy shall be distributed under the terms of the will. The Trustees respectfully request that the Assembly direct them how the income shall be applied during the current year. In 1921 they were directed to distribute it equally between the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions.

It is with great regret that the Trustees announce to the Assembly the death of Mr. Walter F. Hagar, a member of the Board. They also announce the resignation of Mr. Francis B. Reeves. It will be necessary for the General Assembly to fill these vacancies.

The indemnity bond of the Treasurer for $\$ 25,000.00$ has been renewed for another year.

## VI. THE MILEAGE AND CONTINGENT FUNDS

Special attention is called to the Mileage and Contingent System adopted by the General Assembly of 1870, and amended by the General Assemblies of 1875, 1877, 1884 and 1896. As amended, it is, in part, as follows:
"The Committee to whom it was referred to consider and report a uniform system of Mileage, whereby full provision may be made for the traveling expenses of the Commissioners to our General Assemblies, and to meet the contingent expenses of each Assembly, respectfully report:
"It is affirmed, Form of Government, Chapter xxii, Section 3, that, 'in order, as far as possible, to procure a respectable and full delegation to all our judicatories, it is proper that the expenses of ministers and elders, in their attendance on these judicatories, be defrayed by the bodies which they respectively represent.'
"The principle is thus established, that provision should be made for the payment of the traveling expenses of Commissioners to the General Assembly. This provision should be made by the Presbyteries. As far as possible, the feebler Presbyteries should be aided in this matter by the stronger. It appears just and reasonable, and so has been found by experience that the estimated contingent expenses of each Assembly, and the traveling expenses of the Commissioners in coming to and returning from the Assembly, should be fully met by the apportionment of the whole amount among the several Presbyteries, according to the number of their communicants respectively.
"It is therefore recommended-
"1. That the Standing Committee on Mileage, annually appointed, be instructed to present an estimate of the probable amount that will be needed by the next General Assembly, in order to meet their contingent expenses and the traveling expenses of their Commissioners, with a statement of the per capita rate, based on the number of communicants, that will be needed to sedure the amount.
"2. That the Presbyteries, at their Stated Meeting next following the adjournment of the General Assembly, apportion the amount required of their churches as they deem best.
" 4 . It is understood that Commissioners, both in coming to and returning from the Assembly, will avail themselves of any commutation of fares that may be offered in season; and that in other cases they are to take, when practicable, the most economical route; no allowance to be made for extra accommodations on the way. Also, that Commissioners asking compensation for sleeping car fare attach receipts to their claims for Mileage, for all sleeping car fares. Also, that no one will charge for return expenses unless he intends to go baok to his field of labor; and that no one on a business tour, or excursion of pleasure, will make a convenience of the meeting of the Assembly and expect payment of his traveling expenses from the Mileage Fund. Also, that Commissioners, as soon after their arrival as practicable, are to report themselves to the Committee of Arrangements, and have their respective places of abode assigned them.
"6. That, in order to avail themselves of the proceeds of this fund, the Presbyteries must contribute their full proportion to it according to the per capita rate.
"7. That every Minister, and every vacant church contributing to this fund, connected with the Presbyteries thus complying with the provisions of this plan, be entitled to a copy of the Annual Minutes of the General Assembly.
" $\$$. That the Commissioners froin Presbyteries in foreign lands receive their necessary traveling expenses, pro rata, from and to their place of residence in this country."

In accordance with this system, every Presbytery is requested to pay in full, next year, to the Treasurer of the General Assembly, a sum equal to three
cents for Miteare, and three certs. for Contimgent Wxpenses, or in all sis rents for every communicant under the eare of their charehes, :ts leternines by then statistical Report, herewith printel. This will matite their Commismeners in a full share in the apportionments for menestary traveling expensecs. It is expected that these expenses will be fully met, if the Preshyteries comply with the recommendations of the Assembly.

In addition to the Mileage Fumd, the Assembly of 1877 made provision for : "Supplemental Contingent Exponse Fuml," to "be used for the purpose of meeting the expense of entertaining surh Commistoners as are not otherwi-e provided for." Each Presbytery is refuested to eontribute to this funt a sum equal at least to two cents per church uember, and to forward it, with the Mileage and Contingent Funds, to the Treasure of the Assembly.

The bills for entertainment for moneys actually expended, up to the limit fixed by the Assembly, the Treasurer is morized to pay, subject to the provisions of the Plan of Financial Administration of the Assembly.

## VII. THE ANNUAL MINUTES

The Minutes for 1922 will be issued in three parts and will be supplied in accordance with the following regulations:

1. Paper-covered copies of Parts I and II are sent, free of charge:
(1) To every ordained minister belonging to a Presbytery having paid its full Contingent and Mileage apportionments. (2) To each vacant church connected with a Presbytery that has paid its apportionments for the Contingent and Mileage Funds, if the Session Clerk applies for it by writing to the Stated Clerk. (3) To lay commissioners of the preceding Assembly. (4) To lay members of Boards and of Permanent and Special Committecs. (5) To Foreign Mission Stations and Missionaries whose addresses are furnished by the Foreign Board Secretaries. (6) To such persons, organizations, and institutions as the Stated Cler , with the advice of the Executive Commission, may place on his "exchange" and "free" lists.
2. To any of the above-mentioned, if they so request, cloth-bound copies will be sent, instead of paper, as follows: Part I The Journal, 20 cents; Part II The Statistics, 40 eents. Part III in paper binding will be sent free to all ministers in charge of churches. All others must apply. If it is desired in cloth the price is 40 cents per copy to all in the six classes above mentioned.
3. In addition to the distribution above indicated, a free cloth copy of each of the three parts is sent to each Assembly officer and Synodical and Presbyterial Stated Clerk.
4. The charge to Session Clorks is: Paper-Part I 50 eents; Part II \$1.00; Part ILI \$1.00. Cloth—Part I 75 cents; Part II $\$ 1.25$; Part III \$1.50.
5. Others than those above designated, who wish to purchase these publications can obtain them by making application to the I'resbyterian Book siore, Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, Pa., and at the following prices: P'aper BoundPart I \$1.00; Part II \$2.00; Part 111 \$1.00. Cloth Bound-Part I \$1.50; Part II \$2.50; Part III \$1.50.

## VIII. SYNODICAL REPORTS

A Statistical Report is to be made to the Assembly by the Stated Clerk of every Synod, in which are to be stated the number and names of the Presbyteries within the bounds of the Synod; the names of the Stated Clerks of the Presbyteries; the place and hour of the next annual meeting of the Synod; the names of the Moderator and the Stated Clerk of the Synod. A blank will be sent to the Stated Clerk of every Symod for this purpose, which should be filled out and forwarded, without delay, to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly.

## IX. PRESBYTERIAL REPORTS

It is required of every Presbytery to prepare and forward to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly:

1. A Statistical Report, according to the form exhibited on page 325 of the present Supplement, a printed blank for which will be furni-hel in due season to the Stated Clerk of every Preslytery. This Report should embrace all the
changes made in the Presbytery previous to the first day of April each year. In arcordance with Standing Rule 40, this Report should be in the hands of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, on or before May 1 earh year.
2. A Roll of Presbytery, the printed blank for which will be furnished in due season to the Stated Clerk of every Presbytery. This Report shall show the surname of each presbyter in alphabetical order, followed by his Christian names and titles, his street and town address, and his orcupation. Also the names and addresses of the licentiates and local evangelists of the Presbytery, and the number of the candidates under the care of the Presbytery. This Peport should be in the hands of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly immediately after April 1 each year.
3. An Annual Survey and Report (formerly the Narrative of Christian Life and Work) the printed blank for which will be furnished in due season to the Stated Clerk of every Presbytery, together with sufficient blanks to be sent to each Church in the Presbytery.

The General Assembly has disbanded the Special Committee on Christian Life and Work, which for many years has conducted this investigation on behalf of the General Assembly, and has placed responsibility for the Annual Survey and Report in the hands of the Stated Clerk. The General Assembly has definitely directed that for the current year, the Annual Survey and Report blank used last year shall be again employed as the basis for the gathering of the necessary information, and that the report made to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly by each Presbytery shall cover the calendar year, namely the year 1922.

It is the purpose of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly to give each Presbytery the fullest liberty possible as to the method to be employed in gathering the information for recording on the furnished blanks. The blanks for the Presbyterial reports, embodying the fullest possible information, should be in the hands of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly not later than March 1 of each year.
4. A statement of the number of licensures, ordinations, installations, dissolutions of pastoral relations; organizations and dissolutions of churches; receptions and dismissions of ministers and churches. A printed blank will be furnished to the Stated Clerk of every Presbytery.
5. A statement of the number of deaths of Ministers for the church year, together with other information, on a printed blank to be furnished to the Stated Clerk of every Presbytery. This blank should be returned even though there have been no deaths during the year, in order that there may be a certified record from every Presbytery.

In preparing the Statistical Report, let the following RULES be strictly observed:
(1) Fill up the Statistical Report Blank in every detail.
(2) Record the Churches in the alphabetical order of their Post Office addresses. Put every Pastor or Stated Supply in the same line with his Church. Annex in the same column their occupation, as P., S. S., If the Church is vacant, place a "V" at the beginning of the column for ministers. Do not put the vacant churches at the foot of the list. Keep the alphabetical list intact. If a church fails to report, insert the number of church members from the last report, with an asterisk (*) before the figures. If the church has a manse, add an " $m$ " after the name of the church. If the church uses in worship a language other than English, indicate the fact by words such as German, Welsh, Spanish, Indian, Bohemian, or their recognized abbreviations.
(3) Report as in transitu on both the Statistical Report and the Roll of Presbytery the name of each Minister dismissed by action of Presbytery. Do not strike his name from your Roll until you have been officially informed of his reception by another Presbytery.
(4) The following is a list of authorized abbreviations for the occupation of Ministers:

It is respectfully recommended that only doctor's degrees be inserterl after the names of ministers. The insertion of other titles has not been approved by General Assembly.
(5) Additions. -In the additions to ehureh membership, distinguish between those by Examination, those by Certificate, and those by Restoration. The column headed "Restored" is to include all those who have been reinstated, whether from the Suspended Roll, or by action of Session in restoration after full judicial process.
(6) Losses.-In the losses, distinguish between those dismissed by letter, those placed upon the Suspended Roll, and those deceased. The column headed "Dismissed, etc.," is to include the members dismissed to other churches, also those erased from the roll under Sections 49 and 53, Book of Discipline, and also those excommunicated. The column headed "Suspended Roll" is to include the number of non-resident members whose cases were acted upon, during the year. by the Session under Sections 50 and 51, Book of Diseipline (not the total number on the Roll); also those suspended after full judicial process.
(7) Baptisms.-In the baptisms, distinguish between the persons baptized upon confession and those baptized as infants.
(8) Balancing of Returns.-Compare your report of communicants with that of the previous year and adjust the return so that it will balance. For example: Total members previous year, 205. Additions, "Examination" 22 " "Certificate" 16, "Restored" 5 , total 43. Losses, "Dismissed," etc., 12, "Suspended Roll" 18, "Deceased" 6, total 36. Gain, 7. Net total this year, 212.
(9) Sabbath-school Membership.-To include officers, teachers and scholars in all Sabbath-schools connected with the congregation, not including the "Cradle Roll" nor the "Home Department." [Note.-A separate statement of the details of Sabbath-school work is to be made for the use of the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, but this is to be on a special blank furnished by the Board of Publication, and not from the Office of the General Assembly.?

Funds.-The columas for the Funds Contributed are to be filledias follows:

1. Home Missions.-To include all moneys paid to the Board, all moners pair! for Presbyterial and Synodical Home Missions and Church Extension, also all moneys paid to any general Home Mission object; including contributions of societies, value of boxes, etc.
2. Foreign Missions.-To include all moneys paid for the spread of the Gospel in foreign fields, whether given to the Board or other agencies; including contributions of societies, etc., and gifts to institutions connected with the Board.
3. Education.-To include all contributions, whether sent to the Boarl, or direct to colleges, academies and schools; to student pastors' mork at state universities; to theological seminaries and training schools; and for the elueation of candidates for the ministry and other students preparing for Chri-tian service. Contributions to institutions connected with Foreign Misions anl Freedmen are to be placed under those headings.
(4) Sabbath-school W'ork.-To inchude all moneys paid to the Board of Publiration and Sabbath-school Work for its missionary operations, and to other Sabbath-school organizations. The contributions for the support of the Sabbathschool or other agencies for religious education in the home church are to be plared in the column headed "Congregational."
4. Church Erection.-To include all moneys contributed for church and manse building outside of the congregation, whether through the Board or otherwise.

6 Relief and Sustentation.-To include all moneys paid in behalf of disabled ministers and missionaries, and in aid of their families, whether to the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation or otherwise; including contributions of societies, ete.

7 Freedmen.-To include all moneys paid for the evangelization and education of Freedmen, through the Board, including contributions of societies, and individuals, to institutions connected with the Board.
8 Temperance and Moral Welfare.-To include all moneys given to the Board for moral and social reform, or to other Temperance and Moral Reform agencies.

9 Evangelisitic Work.-To include all moneys paid to the Assembly's Committee on Evangelism and for evangelistic work in Synods and Presbyteries.

10 Men's Work.-To include all moneys paid to the Assembly's Permanent Committee on Men's Work.

11 Sabbath Obscrvance.-To include all moneys paid to the Assembly's Permanent Committec on Sabbath Observance, and to the Lord's Day Alliance.
12 General Assembly, etc.-To include all moneys given for eeclesiastical expenses, whether for Presbytery, Synod, or General Assembly. Here give both dollars and cents.

13 Congregational.-To include all moneys collected in or by the congregation for local church purposes-the salary of the minister, the support of the church Sabbath-schools, the relief of the poor, building and repairing edifices, the liquidation of debts, chureh endowments and other objects. Moneys received from any Board or other source, except the congregation, for the salary of the minister or for other expenses should not be included.

14 Miscellaneous Benevolences.-To include "all moneys paid to Bible and Tract Societies, the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., Hospitals, Homes, or to other benevolent causes for which provision has not been made in preceding columns.

15 Individual Gifts.-If the donors do not object, the direct gifts of individuas to any of the Boards or to the causes they represent, should be reported with other gifts under the proper head. Individual gifts for religious and charitable causes not included in the regular schedule should be placed under the head "miscellaneous."

Be sure to omit the fractions of the dollar, except in the General Assembly column.
(10) ADD UP ${ }^{\text {cisin }}$ and verify every column of figures, and Authenticate the Report with your signature, together with the date.
(11) Avoid erasures and interlineations, make names and numbers distinctly legible, and punctuate properly.
(12) Affix no extraneous matter, such as memoranda, explanations, or orders for the delivery of the printed Minutes of the Assembly; let these be given on a separate sheet; also, every Overture to the Assembly.

Revise your Report, and find out its defects. Put in the commas and periods that are wanting; fill out the abbreviations; supply the Christian names of every Minister (an initial letter is not a name), and see that every name and figure is perfectly legible and arranged in strict accordance with the established form.

## X. STANDINC RULES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

1. The General Assembly shall meet annually, on the third Thursday of May, beginning at 10.30 A.M.; the afternoon session shall be held at 2.30 P.M.
The Stated Clerk shall have oversight of all the arrangements for the meetings and entertainment of the General Assembly including the assignment of time and space for the unified exhibit of the Boards and Agencies.

Churches desiring to entertain the Gencral Assembly during its annual meeting shall give notice thereof in writing to the Stated Clerk at least one month previous to the opening session of the General Assembly next preceding that for which the invitation is extended.

The Moderator, the Stated Clerk and the Treasurer shall be the committee to which all invitations relating to the place of meeting shall be referred for consideration and recommendation to the General Assembly.

This committee, should an emergency requiring action at any time arise, are authorized to provide a new place of meeting for the General Assembly.
2. The enrollment of Commissioners and Delegates takes place on the opening day of the General Assembly and on the preceding day or days, according to public notice.

The Stated Clerk shall be the Committee on Commissions. Appeals from his decisions may be taken to the Standing Committee on Polity.
3. In all regions, where through the organization of Union Presbyteries or the existence of Missions without Presbyterial organization, there are no Presbyteries in connection with this Assembly, each Mission organized, as such, under our Board of Foreign Missions, may send to the General Assembly an ordained missionary, or ruling elder, as a delegate; and the Standing Rules of the Assembly are hereby so amended that such delegate is entitled to sit as an advisory member in the Assembly, and to speak, under the rules, on all questions, and that his expenses from his domicile, in this country, to and during the A ssembly, and return, shall be met, as those of Commissioners, out of the funds of the Assembly [1887, p. 247]. This rule shall also apply to Home Mission Presbyteries whose members are so located as to prevent regular meetings, and in the discretion of the Assembly. The names of the Advisory members shall be called at the first Roll-Call, and seats shall be assigned them by the Stated Clerk [1907, p. 88; 1908, p. 130.]
4. The whole territory of the Church shall be divided into twenty-two Electing Districts, composed of Presbyteries, so arranged, by combining the smaller Synods, and dividing the larger by Presbyteries, as to make nearly equal delegations, as follows, e.g.:
5. (a) The General Assembly shall be divided into twenty-two Electing Sections, composed of Commissioners, so arranged as to make the Sections of nearly equal delegations. The Electing Sections shall be numbered the same as the Electing Districts.
(b) The members of each Electing Section shall be seated together in a compact body. Accordingly, each Commissioner sliall be assigned to his seat in advance of the meeting of the Assembly, by the Committee of Arrangements, under the supervision and direction of the Stated Clerk, and shall occupy such pew or seat from the beginning of the first session until the end of the second day. The Commissioners of any one Electing District shall not occupy the same position relative to the Moderator's Chair two years in succession. Electing Sections, in the place of meeting, shall be numbered beginning from right to left immediately in front of the Moderator, and the respective Electing Sections shall be rotated from front to rear successively.
(c) The organization of the Electing Sections shall be effected in the following manner, to wit:

Immediately after the roll call, and before the nominating and seconding speeches for Moderator shall be made, the Stated Clerk shall announce one

Commissioner in each Electing Section as the Convener thereof, and the receiver of any necessary papers for the Section. Under the supervision of such Convener, each Electing Section shall then elect a Chairman and a Secretary. The quorum of an Electing Section shall be a majority of its members.
6. (a) The roll shall be called immediately after the opening prayer at the afternoon session of the first day, in the following manner, unless there be a motion to the contrary, to wit: only the names of absentees as they appear on the roll shall be called, at which time any needed corrections may be made.
(b) Whenever additional members take their seats, their names shall be added to the roll.
(c) No Commissioner failing to enroll shall be allowed to vote in his Electing Section.
7. The election of the Moderator shall be effected immediately after the roll-call and the organization of the Electing Sections, in the following manner, to wit:
(a) Only one speech nominating a candidate for Moderator shall be made, limited to ten minutes; and only one speech, and that not to exceed five minutes, shall be made in reconding the nomination of a candidate.
(b) Where there is only one nominee for Moderator, the election may be made by acclamation. Where there are more than one, the election may be made by ballot, in the following manner, to wit:

After the nominations are made (the organization of the Electing Sections having been effected (see Rule 5, (c) ), the Chairman of each Electing Section shall appoint two tellers. Each Commissioner shall write the name of his choice on a blank, to be provided in advance by the Stated Clerk. The tellers shall collect the ballots and count them, under the supervision of the Chairman. The result shall be recorded by the Secretary on blanks in duplicate, one of which shall be handed to the Stated Clerk, with the number of the Section written thereupon. The other shall be retained by the Secretary.
(c) When the reports of the ballots have been handed in from all the Sections, the Stated Clerk shall read each aloud, giving the number of the Section and the vote cast. Tellers appointed by the Stated Clerk shall take and tabulate the votes as read. The Moderator shall then announce the vote as tabulated. If no one has received a majority of the whole vote, another vote shall be taken in the same manner. When one shall have received a majority, the Moderator shall announce the result, and declare him to be elected.
8. The election of the Standing Committees, by the Electing Sections. shall be efferted immediately after the election of the Moderator, in the following manner, to wit:
(a) The Electing Sections shall meet, at the places assigned them, for the purpose of electing the Standing Committees, at the close of the second session on Thursday, the first day, and the place of meeting shall be designated by the Stated Clerk.
(b) The Standing Committees shall be numbered consecutively, and shall each consist of twenty-three members, including the Chairman and eleven ministers and eleven elders. The Committees shall be chosen from the Electing Sections as herein provided. The quorum shall be a majority of the members. Each Presbytery shall be represented on some Standing Committee.
(c) On odd-numbered years, each odd-numbered Section shall elect one minister for each odd-numbered Committee, and one elder for each evennumbered Committee.

On the same year, each even-numbered Section shall elect one minister for each even-numbered Committee, and one elder for each odd-numbered Committee.

On the even-numbered years this order shall be reversed.
(d) The Stated Clerk shall furnish to each Electing Section properly printed Election Return Blanks, for the election of the Standing Committees, which shall be filled in by the Secretary of the Electing Section, and returned forthwith to the Stated Clerk.
(e) As soon as possible after his election, the Moderator shall appoint an additional member of each Standing Committee, who shall be the Chairman thereof, provided that he shall not appoint more than one member, as Chairman, from the same Electing Section, except in the case of the Committees on Mileage and on Finance, and the Chairmen of these two Committees shall be Ruling Elders.
9. The Stated Clerk shall assign their places, in the Electing Districts, to new Presbyterics that may be erected during the intervals of the meetings of the Assenibly, and he shaill attend to all other details connected with the operation of the Plian.
10. The election of the class of members of the Executive Commission whose term expires at an Assembly shall take place on the second Thursday of the Assembly's session, the nominations to be made by a Special Committee of twenty-fhree members, eleven ministers and eleven elders, together with the Moderator; the twenty-two ministers and elders to represent the twenty-two Electing Sections, and to be appointed as follows: on odd-numbered years each odd-numbered Section shall elect one minister, and each even-numbered Section shall elect one elder; but on the even-numbered years the order shall be reversed. The members of the Special Committee shall be clected by the respective Electing Sections immediately after the election of the members of the Standing Committees. (Minutes, 1909, p. $99 ; 1912$, p. 79.)

Appointments by the Moderator to fill vacancies in the Executive Commission shall be valid only until the next succecding Assembly, which shall then fill the vacancies by election.

With the exception of the Moderator of the General Assembly, no one shall be eligible to serve on the Executive Commission, either by appointment or election, or both, for more than four years in succession, until one full term of three years shall lave intervened.
11. The Executive Commission shall, whenever it may so desire have the floor at the sessions of the Assembly immediately following the report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures.
12. The nomination and election of members of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly shall be taken up on the morning of Tuesday, the fifth day, as the first Order of the Day, in the following manner:

It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee on Judicial Business of the General Assembly to report to the Assembly, on Tuesday, the fifth day, suitable nominations to fill the vacancies on the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly, from which nominations, ogether with any others regularly made by the Commissioners at the same time as those made by the Judicial Committee, the necessary number of persons shall be elected, on Thursday, the seventh day, as the first Order of the Day.
13. The Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly shall have authority to adopt rules pertaining to its own method of procedure, and shall report the same to the General Assembly; provided, that such rules shall not be inconsistent with the Constitution of the Church or the rules adopted by the General Assembly.
14. The Lord's Supper is celebrated by the Assembly on the first day of its sessions, all details as to place and hour and the order of the service being left to the discretion of the local Committee of Arrangements and the Moderator of the last Assembly, who presides on this occasion.
15. The times assigned to popular meetings are as follows:

The evening of Thursday, the first day, to the Board of Ministerial Relief and Sustentation.

The evening of Friday, the second day, to the Board of Publication and Sabbath-school Work and the Sabbath-school interests of the Church.

The evening of Saturday, the third day, to the Permanent Committee on Men's Work.
The afternoon of Sunday-to the Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance at 2.30 ; to the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare at 4.00; and the evening to the General Board of Education.

The evening of Monday, the fourth day, to Missions among the Freedmen.
The evening of Tuesday, the fifth day, to Home Missions.
The evening of Wednesday, the sixth day, to Foreign Missions.
In emergencies the Stated Clerk shall have power to change the above assignments.

It shall be disorderly for any Board or Agency of the General Assembly, other than the designated Board or Agency, to hold or cause to be held a popular meeting at any of the above hours, except with the express permission of the Gicneral Assembly.
16. The following Reports shall hen condered at the times here designatert: Pemanent Conmitter on Evangelism, first triday morning.
Stated Clerk's Report on Ministerial Necrology, first Friday iftornoon. Sperial C'ommitee on Christian Sife and Work, first lriday afternom.
Permanent Commitee on sahbath Ohservance, suturday morning.
Standing Commitere on Men's Work, Saturday moming.
Standing Committee on Relief and Sustentation, Monday, 11.00 A.M.
Standing Committee on Temperance and Moral Welfare, Tuesday, Io.no A. M.

Standing Committee on Freetmen, Tuestay 11.00 A.MI.
Standing Committce on Education, Tuesday 3.00 P.MI.
Standing Committec on Home Missions, Wednesday 10.30 A.M.
Standing Committee on Publication and Sabbath-school Work, Wednestay 3.00 P..II.

Standing Committee on Foreigu Missions, Thursday 10.30 A.M.
Standing Committee on Church Erection, Thursday 3.00 P.M.
Standing Committee on Correspondence, Thursday 4.00 P.M.
In emergencies the Stated Clerk shall have power to change the above assignments.
17. The Standing Committees on Home Missions, Forcign Missions and Education shall have each one and a half hours for the consideration of their reports; and those on Publication, Churel Erection, Ministerial Relief, Erecdmen, Temperance and Moral Welfare, and Men's Work shall have each one hour; the time shall be divided in the following manner, one-half to the standing Committee, and one-half to the floor; the Secretary or other representative of the Board or Agency to have at least one-half of the time assigned to the Standing Committec, if he so desires. No Commissioner shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, until all other Commissioners have been heard who desire to speak on the pending question; that the reports of the chairman shall contain only the recommendations to be submitted to the Assembly, all details contained in the printed reports of the Boards and Agencies to be omitted from the reports; that the address on a report shall be delivered by a representative of the Board or Agency reported upon, and that it shall be the duty of the Stated Clerk to communicate this rule to the chairmen of the standing committees upon their appointment.
18. The Stated Clerk shall have printed and ready for distribution, so far ae practicable, on the morning of the day fixed for their consideration, the resolutions appended to the Renorts of Standing Committees.
19. All reports of Standing Committees and Commissions presented on the floor of the General Assembly shall be typewritten, and two carbon copies shall be made, the original to be presented to the Stated Clerk at the time the report is made, one carbon copy to be retained by the Chairman of the Committee or Commission until the close of the Assembly, and one carbon copy furnished to the Publicity Department through the Stated Clerk for the use of the Press and such other persons as desire copies of the Assembly actions.
20. Each Board and Permanent Committee is instructed to send up its Minutes with its Annual Report, that these Minutes may be reviewed by the Assembly, on the Report of the appropriate Standing Committee [1885. p. 690].
21. On or before May first of each year a sufficient number of the "Preliminary" Reports of the Boards and Permanent Committees, prepared according to specifications furnished by the Stated Clerk, shall be forwarded by them to the place designated by the Statcl Clerk. A complete file of the same, stitched together, shall be delivered to each Commissioner.
22. No person shall serve as a member of a Board who is a salaried executive officer or employé of said Board, or of any institution officially connected with said Board, or a member of any other benevolent Board of the Church; and no more than one ruling elder from the same congregation shall serve on a Board at the same time [1887, pp. 51, 108; 1898, p. 132].
23. Upon the original appointment of any salaried executive officer of any of the Benevolent and Missionary Boards of the Chureh, such appointment shall be subject to the approval of the General Assembly [1598, p. 132].
24. Anv vacancy occurring in the membership of any of the Boards of the Church, during the interval between Assemblies, may be filled, until the next succeeding meeting of the Assembly, by the Board in which such vacancy may occur [1887, p. 128].
25. The Moderator is authorized to fill by appointment any vacancies which may occur, by resignation or otherwise, in any of the Special Committees [1892, p. 209].
26. When members of Committees do not attend for two successive meetings, and their absence is unexcused, then their places berome autonatically vacant, and the Moderator of the Assembly is authorized to appoint their suecessors [1915, p. 31].
27. Wherever practicable, neither ministers nor elders shall be appointed to serve on more than one special committee, except by consent of the General Assembly.
28. All Special Committees appointed by one General Assembly to report to the next Assembly shall be ready to present their Reports on the second day of the session. Only one formal address in explanation of a Report shall be made. (See Rule 17.)
29. All reports of Special and other Committees shall be delivered to the Stated Clerk on or before April 1, in each year, shall be printed by him, and copies shall be sent, in bound form, to Commissioners, so far as practicable, immediately upon notification of their election; and copies shall also be delivered to the Assembly on the second day of the sessions.

All reports included in the above bound form are thereby released for publie comment or quotation, but such release does not preclude subsequent changes in any report before its presentation to the General Assembly.
30. The Stated Clerk shall receive all Memorials, Overtures and other miscellaneous papers addressed to the General Assembly, shall make record of the same, and then deliver them, for distribution or reference, to the Standing Committee on Bills and Overtures. All complaints and appeals, however shall be transmitted by the Stated Clerk direetly to the Committee on Judieial Business.
31. All Overtures, memorials and miscellaneous papers, connected with the business of the Assembly, must be presented to the Assembly through the Stated Clerk not later than the close of the second day of its session.
32. All Overtures from Presbyteries and Synods, which are to come before the General Assembly shall be, so far as practicable, in the hands of the Stated Clerk at least two weeks before the meeting of the Assembly, and by him shall be printed in convenient form for distribution on the floor of the Assembly, such distribution to be made not later than the second day of the Assembly.
33. All resolutions for the appropriation of money, outside of the Boards, shall be submitted to the Executive Commission for consideration and recommendation before action be taken by the Assembly. (1921, p. 175.)
34. The recommendation of any particular congregation to the benevolence oi the denomination, by the General Assembly, is not to be understood as creating either a legal or a moral obligation upon the Assembly for the payment of the amount recimmended to be eontributed by the churches. (1892, p. $36 ; 1893$, p. 41.)
35. Unless previously doeketed no new business may be introduced on the floor of the General Assembly after the adjournment of the Wednesday (the sixth day) afternoon session of the General Assembly.
36. Only notiees connected directly with the business of the General Assembly shall be read from the platform, and all notices, prior to announcement, shall be submitted either to the Moderator or the Stated Clerk for approval. Telegrams and special letters shall be reported to the Assembly only at times to be designated by the Moderator.
37. The Stated Clerk is authorized to revise the phraseology of all papers sent down to the Presbyteries to be voted upon, provided that in no case shall he oo change the phraseology as to alter the meaning [1886, p. 113].
38. The Stated Clerk shall supervise the publication of any and all editions of the Constitution hereafter issued by the Board of Publication, and also of the Rules for Judicatories [1886, p. 113].
39. The Annual Statistical Report of each church to Presbytery shall be in the hands of the Stated Clerk of Presbytery on or, if possible, before April fifteenth.
40. The Annual Statistical Report of each Presbyterial Stated Clerk together with such other papers as it may be his duty, annually, to transmit to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly shall be in his hands on or, if possible, before May first.
41. On or before June first of each year each Board and Ayoncy of the (ieneral Assembly and, so firr as the Stated Clerk may deem mecessary of the sumens: and Presbyteries, shall file with the Stated (lerk a complete statement of the amounts received by them from the individual churches. These statements shall be filed on forms furnished by the Stated Clerk. They shall, in the catse of each individual church, include all moneys received through the church and also, as far as possible, all moneys contributed directly ly the individual members thereof to the Boards and Agencies. Legacies, special gifts and benevolent contributions applied toward the liquidation of loans or mortgages, are to be included.
42. On or before June fifteenth of each year a sufficient number of the enmpleted Reports of the Boards and Permanent Committees, prepared according to specifications furnished by the Stated Clerk, shall be forwarded by them to the place designated by the Stated Clerk for binding and distribution according to the direetions of the General Assembly.
43. The Standing Rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Assembly, upon motion duly made.

## XI. GENERAL RULES FOR JUDICATORIES.

[The following "General Rules for Judicatories," not having been submitted to the Preshy. teries, make no part of the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church. Yet the General Assem bly of 1871, cousidering uniformity in proceedings in all the subordinate judicatories as greatly conducive to order and despatch in business, having revised and approved these rules, recommended them to all the lower judicatories of the Church for adoption. Subsequent Assemblies have modified them from time to time.]
I. The Moderator shall take the chair precisely at the hour to which the judicatory stands adjourned; and shall immediately call the members to order; and, on the appearance of a quorum, shall open the session with prayer.
II. If a quorum be assernbled at the time appointed, and the Moderator be absent, the last Moderator present being a Commissioner, or, if there be none, the senior member present, shall be requested to take his"place without delay, until a new election.
III. If a quorum be not assembled at the hour appointed, any two members shall be competent to adjourn from time to time, that an opportunity may be given for a quorum to assemble.
IV. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, at all times, to preserve order, and to endeavor to conduct all business before the judicatory to a speedy aud proper result.
V. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, carefully to keep notes of the several articles of business which may be assigned for particular days, and to call them up at the time appointed.
VI. The Moderator may speak to points of order, in preference to other members, rising from his seat for that purpose; and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the judicatory by any two members.
VII. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, except in those cases in which the judicatory shall deeide otherwise. In appointing the Standing Committees, the Moderator may appoint a Vice-Moderator, who may oceupy the chair at his request, and otherwise assist him in the discharge of his duties.
VIII. When a vote is taken by ballot in any judicatory, the Moderator shall vote with the other members: but he shall not vote in any other case, unless the judicatory be equally divided; when, if he do not choose to vote, the question shall be lost.
IX. The person first named on any committee shall be considered as the chairman thereof, whose duty it shall be to convene the committee; and, in case of his absence or inability to act, the second named member shall take his place and perform his duties.
X. It shall be the duty of the Clerk, as soon as possible after the commencement of the sessions of every judicatory, to form a complete roll of the members present, and put the same into the hands of the Moderator. And it shall also be the duty of the Clerk, whenever any additional members take their seats, to add their names, in their proper places, to the said roll.
XI. It shall be the duty of the Clerk immediately to file all papers, in the order in which they have been read, with proper endorsements, and to keep them in perfect order. The Stated Clerk shall receive all overtures, memorials and miscellaneous papers addressed to the judicatory; shall make record of the same and deliver them to the Committee on Bills and Overtures for appropriate disposition or reference. This committee shall have the floor on the reassembling of the judicatory after each adjournment, to report its recommendations as to orders of business or reference of papers, and this right of the commitkee shall take precedence of the Orders of the Day. This committee shall report
the papers retained by it, as well as those recommended for reference to other committees, and no committee shall report on matters which have not been referred to it by the judicatory.
XII. The minutes of the last meeting of the judieatory shall be presented at the commencement of its sessions, and, if requisite, read and corrected.
XIII. Business left unfinished at the last sitting is ordinarily to be taken up first.
XIV. A motion made must be seconded, and afterwards repeated by the Moderator, or read aloud, before it is debated; and every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the Moderator or any member require it.
XV. Any member who shall have made a motion, shall have liberty to withdraw it, with the consent of his second, before any debate has taken place thereon; but not afterwards, without the leave of the judicatory.
XVI. If a motion under debate contain several parts, any two members may have it divided, and a question taken on each part.
XVII. When various motions are made with respect to the filling of blanks, with particular numbers or times, the question shall always be first taken on the highest number and the longest time.
XVIII. Motions to lay on the table, to take up business, to adjourn, and the call for the previous question, shall be put without debate, but it shall not he in order for any one debating another motion to propose the motion to lay on the table or the previous question, at the elose of his remarks, unless he shall obtain the floor again for that purpose. On questions of order, postponement, or commitment, no member shall speak more than once. On all other questions, each member may speak twice, but not oftener, without express leave of the judicatory.
XIX. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, unless to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, or to amend; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein arranged; and the motion for adjournment shall always be in order.
XX. An amendment, and also an amendment to an amendment, may be moved on any motion; but a motion to amend an amendment to an amendment, shall not be in order. Action on amendments shall precede action on the original motion. A substitute shall be treated as an amendment.
XXI. A distinction shall be observed between a motion to lay on the table for the present, and a motion to lay on the table unconditionally. viz.: A motion to lay on the table, for the present, shall be taken without debate; and, if carried in the affirmative, the effect shall be to place the subject on the docket, and it may be taken up and considered at any subsequent time. But a motion to lay on the table, unconditionally, shall be taken without debate; and, if carried in the affirmative, it shall not be in order to take up the subject during the same meeting of the judicatory, without a vote of reconsideration.
XXII. The previous question shall be put in this form, namely. Shall the main question be now put? It shall be admitted only when demanded by a majority of the members present; and the effect shall be to put an end to all debate and bring the body to a direct vote: First, on a motion to commit the subject under consideration (if sueh motion shall have been made); secondly, if the motion for commitment does not prevail, on pending amendments; and, lastly, on the main question.
XXIII. A question shall not be again called up or reconsidered at the same sessious of the judicatory at which it has been decided, unless by the consent of two-thirds of the members who were present st the decision; and unless the motion to reconsider be made and seconded by persons who voted with the majority.
XXIV. A subject which has been indefinitely postponed, either by the operasion of the previour question, or by a motion for indefinite postponement, shall not be rgain ralled up during the same sessions of the judicatory, unless by the consent of three-fourths of the members who were present at the decision.
XXV. Members ought not, without weighty reasons, to decline voting, as this practice might leave the decision of very interesting questions to a small proportion of the judicatory. Silent members, unless excused from voting, mist be considered as acquiescing with the majority.
XXVI. When the Moderator has commenced taking the vote, no further debate or remark shall be admitted, unless there has evidently been a mistake, in which case the mistake shall be rectified, and the Moderator shall recommence taking the vote. If the House shall pass the motion to "vote on a given subject at a time named," speeches shall thereafter be limited to ten minutes. Should the hour for adjournment or recess arrive during the voting, it shall be pnotponed to finish the vote, unless the majority shall vote to adjourn; in which case the voting shall, on the reassembling of the House, take precedence of all other business till it is finished. Under this rule, the "yeas and nays" shall not be called except on the final motion to adopt as a whole. This motion to fix a time for voting shall be put without debate.
XXVII. The yeas and nays on any question shall not be recorded, unless required by one-third of the members present. If division is called for on any vote, it shall be by a rising vote, without a count. If, on such a rising vote, the Moderator is unable to decide, or a quorum rise to second a call for "tellers," then the vote shall be taken by rising, and the count made by tellers, who sha!! pass through the aisles, and report to the Moderator the number voting on each gide.
XXVIII. No member, in the course of debate, shall be allowed to indulge in personal reflections.
XXIX. If more than one member rise to speak at the same time, the member who is most distan from the Moderator's chair shall speak first. In the discussion ot all matters where the sentiment of the House is divided, it is proper that the floor should be occupied alternately by those representing the different sides of the question.
XXX. When more than three members of the judicatory shall be standing at the same time, the Moderator shall require all to take their seats, the person only excepted who may be speaking.
XXXI. Every member, when speaking, shall address himself to the Moderanor, and shall treat his fellow-members, and especially the Moderator, with decorum and respect.
XXXII. No speaker shall be interrupted, unless he be out of order, or for the purpose of correcting mistakes or misrepresentations.
XXXIII. Without express permission, no member of a judicatory, while business is going on, shall engage in private conversation; nor shall members address one another, nor any person present, bus through the Moderator.
XXXIV. It is indispensable that members of ecclesiastical judicatories maintain great gravity and dignity while judicially convened; that they atteud closely, in their speeches, to the subject under consideration, and avoid prolix and desultory barangues; and, when they deviate from the subject, it is the privilege of any member, and the duty of the Moderator, to call them to order.
XXXV. If any member act, in any respect, in a disorderly manner, it shall be the privilege of any member, and the duty of the Moderator, to call him to order.
XXXVI. If any member consider himself aggrieved by a decision of the Moderator, it shall be his privilege to appeal to the judicatory, and the question -a the appeal shall be taken withous delate.
XXXVII. No member shall retire from any judicatory without the leave of the Moderator, nor withdraw from it to return home without the cousent of the judicatory.
XXXVIII. All judicatories have a right to sit in private, on business which, in their judgment, ought not to be matter of public speeulation.
XXXIX. Besides the right to sit judicially in private, whenever they think proper to do so, all judicatories have a right to hold what are commonly ealled "interlocutury meetings," in which members may freely eonverse together, without the formalities which are usually necessary in judicial proceedings.
XL. Whencver a judieatory is about to sit in a judicial capacity, it shall be the duty of the Moderator solemnly to announce, from the chair, that the body is about to pass to the consideration of the business assigned for trial, and to enjoin on the members to reeollect and regard their high character as judges of a court of Jesus Christ, and the solemn duty in which they are about to aet.
XLI. It is expedient that Judicatories appoint a Standing Committee, to be known as the Committee on Judicial Business, to which shall be referred all papers and questions of a judicial nature, and whose duty it shall be to recommend to the judicatory answers to judicial questions, and orders of procedure in all judicial cases.

In the General Assembly, the province of the Committee on Judicial Business shall be to pass upon the question of the regularity of the papers and the record in all cases referred to it by the Assembly; to determine, upon the face of the papers, whether questions of doctrine or Constitution are raised, and if, prima facio, there is a case, to recommend the same to the Assembly for reference to Judicial Commissions. The members of the Committee on Judieial Business are not debarred by their appointment from sitting and voting as members of the judicatory.
XLII. The permanent officers of a judicatory shall have the rights of corresponding members in matters touching their several offices.
XLIII. The Moderator of every judicatory above the Church Session, in finally closing its sessions, in addition to prayer, may cause to be sung an appropriate psalm or hymn, and shall pronounce_the apostolical benedietion.
XLIV. Whenever a case is to be taken from an inferior judicatory to the General Assembly, the Stated Clerk of such inferior judicatory shall, at least twenty days before the meeting of the General Assembly, send a notice concerning such case to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly, who shall forthwith notify the Chairman of the Permanent Judicial Commission, unless the General Assembly shall have ordered otherwise, that the services of the Commission will be needed at the approaching Assenbly; but if no such notice shall be reeeived by the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, he shall forthwith notify the Chairman of the Permanent Judicial Commission that the services of the Commission will not be needed at the approaching Assembly.
XLV. These Rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the judicatory, upon motion duly made.

## XII. RULES OF THE PERMANENT JUDICIAL COMMISSION.

In accordance with the requirements of the Constitution, the Permanent Judicial Commission respectfully reports to the General Assembly the following Rules of Procedure:

1. The General Rules for Judicatories, as far as applicable.
2. Vice-Moderator.-In addition to a Moderator and Clerk, the Commission shall elect, annually, a Vice-Moderator, who shall act as Moderator in the event of the death, disability, resignation or absence of the Moderator, or of the termination of his commissionership; and he shall hold office until the election of his successor.

The Vice-Moderator shall be a member of the Commission, whose term expires at a period not less than two years from the date of his election.
3. Clerk.-In the event of the death, disability, resignation or absence of the Clerk, or the termination of his commissionership, the Moderator shall appoint a Clerk pro tem., to serve in the interim of the meetings of the Commission.
4. When the Moderator receives notice from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly that the services of the Commission will be needed at any time or place, he shall forthwith notify each member of the Commission that the services of the Commission will be required at such meeting
5. The Commission, when so ordered, shall meet at the same time and place with the General Assembly, and shall convene for organization at 5 o'clock P.M. of the first day of the meeting of the General Assembly. The time and place of all other meetings shall be determined by the 'Moderator and the Clerk of the Commission, unless otherwise ordered by the Commission or the General Assembly.
6. Immediately after the organization of the Commission, at any meeting of the General Assembly, the fact shall be reported to the General Assembly, and at the same time a report shall be made as to vacancies existing or about to occur, caused either by the expiration of the term for which members were elected or by death or resignation, for reference to the Judicial Committee, according to the Constitution.
7. The officers of this Commission shall be elected, annually, on Tuesday, the fifth day of the meeting of the General Assembly, at 3 o'clock P.M., and such officers shall assume the duties of their several offices upon the final adjournment of the General Assembly, serving in the interim between meetings of the General Assembly and until final adjournment of the next succeeding General Assembly.
8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, or some one designated by him, to appear before the General Assembly to present the findings of the Commission in cases referred to it by the General Assembly.
9. The Commission shall designate a member or members to represent it in the General Assembly to defend any action or finding of the Commission.
10. The Commission shall set a time limit for arguments of such litigants and their counsel as may appear before the Commission in any case, and shall so notify them prior to the hearing of the same.
11. The Commission is requested and directed to file its Minutes in due time after the adjournment of the Assembly with the Stated Clerk.

## RULES GOVERNING THE TAKING AND IEARING OF APPEALS AND COMPLAINTS.

The General Assembly of 1914 adopted certain rules on the above subject which are given below so far as related to Assembly business.

1 and 2: These rules have to do with the duties of Stated Clerks of Presbytery and Synod.
3. It shall be the duty of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly in transmitting to the Committee on Judicial Business the transcript in any Appeal or Complaint, also to transmit a certified copy of the docket made by him.
4. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Judicial Business to examine the record and all the papers and documents in all appeals and complaints and determine whether it contains all steps taken by the Synod or Presbytery where the action sought to be reviewed was had. If the Committee on Judicial Business finds that all such precedent action had is properly embraced therein, it shall then certify such case to the General Assembly, which certificate shall be in the following form:
"The Committee on Judicial Business of the General Assembly of 19hereby certifies that it has duly examined all the papers, documents and records Gled with it by the Stated Clerk of the Assembly in the within Case, and finds that all steps have bcen taken which are required by the laws of the Church, in order to properly present to the Permanent Judicial Commission the questions arising therein, and herewith transmits to said General Assembly all such papers, documents and records."
5. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Judicial Commission to docket the records of each of said Causes in the order indorsed thereon by the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly.

I. Meetings.-The Western Section during the year hell three meatingz: one ${ }^{3}$ in Washington, Pa., February 16, 1921; in Pittsburgh, Pil., September 16, 1921; and in Atlantic City, N. J., February \&, 9, 10, 1922. In Pittsburgh, Pa., also in September, 1921, there was held the Eleventh Council of the Alliance which was unanimously voted by those who have had the longest experience in, the various Councils, to have been quite the best of them all. The background of the success of this Couucil was the extraordinary and gracious hospitality of the Pittsburgh Churches. It left nothing to be desired. The arrangements were all quite perfect. Where so many co-operated to bring these results to pass it may scem unwise to mention any one name or names but it would be quite unfair to fail to speak of the untiring service, the uniform patience, and kindly helpfulness of the Rev. John McNaugher. D.D., President of the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. A report of this Council will be given by the representative to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. meeting in Des Moines.
II. Officers.-The officers for the present year are: Chairman, Rev. RoberP. Mackay, D.D., Vice-Chairman, Rev. S. H. Chester, D.D., Recording Secret tary, Rev. J. C. Scouller, D.D., Chairman, Executive Committee, Rev. John McNaugher, D.D. The American Secretary, Rev. Henry B. Master, D.D. and Mr. Philip E. Howard, American Treasurer are permanent officers of the Alliance and of the Section.
III. Work on The Continent of Europe.-The following Resolutions presented by the Committce at Atlantic City were adopted:

1. That the Western Section is greatly gratified at the interest of our constituent Churches in, and contributions for, the Churches of our Faith and Order on the Continent of Europe, as shown by their contributions. We would urge them to continued liberality and even an increase of their gifts, in view of the unprecedented providential openings in those countries.
2. That the Western Section recommend to the General Assemblies and Synods of the Constituent Churches, the raising of $\$ 100,000$, for Chapels in Bohemia; and also $\$ 25,000$ that we may join with the Continental Committee of the United Free Church of Scotland, in the opening of a Jewish Mission at Kolosvar, Transylvania. The amounts to be allocated to the various Churches on the percentage basis, the percentage in each case to be determined by the amounts which the individual Churches now pay annually for the expenses of the Alliance.
3. That we appoint a deputation to go to Europe, especially to Hungary and Czecho-Slovakia, and that the Executive Committee be authorized to constitute this Committee from such members of the Alliance as may be going to Europe this year.
4. That the Continental Committee be authorized to approach our Theological Seminaries, requesting them to provide means to pay the traveling expenses and for the education of one or more theological students from the Continent of Europe.
5. That this Western Section express to those Churches that are suffering from noverty and other disabilities, in Transylvania, Jugo-Slavia, Czecho-Slovakia, and Vienna their sympathy. We assure them of our continued interest and prayer. We, therefore, appoint as a day of prayer for them the last Sunday in November (Reformation Sunday).
6. That we call the attention of our constituent Churches to the need for more English services on the Continent of Europe, and we appeal to the appropriate Organization or Committee or Board in cach of our Churches to consider the opening of such a station on the Continent.
7. That the Section reappoint the Special Committee to send clothing. books, ctc., to the Churches in Europe, so that in case these things are needed
for next winter, they can prepare for this work earlier than last year and so have the goods over there before the rigors of next winter appear. It also expresses its gratefulness to those in Philadelphia who assisted this Committee in their labors.
8. That this Seetion pullish a small handbook of the Reformed and Presbyterian Church of Europe, at a small cost, for the information of our Churchies and for the use of our members going to Europe.
IV. Foreign Missions. - A rapid survey, touching salient points, is all that is possible in a brief report, and yet how much of world-wide interest must remain unnoticed.

Latin America.-The time at our disposal might be devoted profitably to developments in Latin America since the Panama Conference in 1916. During these five years, Foreign Missionaries have increased from 771 to 1,066 . The annual cost of maintenance has grown from $\$ 1,269,58.5$ to $\$ 2,577,877$. The increased interest in Latin America throughout North American Churches was illustrated at the Des Moines Student Volunteer Convention, by the fact that out of an enrollment of 7,000 , there were 2,100 who attended the meeting with a view to missionary service in Latin America.

Ten regional committees have been organized, covering the various sections of the country, and a co-operative programme has been accepted throughout the twenty Latin American Republics. It was thought that possilly the simple evangelistic methods and message would not appeal to the Latin temperament. with its love of display and ceremony, but it is found that the simple Gospel message does appeal to the human heart everywhere. It is still the power of God unto salvation.

India.-Political conditions in India are so fluid and disordered as to make it difficult to appreciate the significance of the agitation of which Gandhi is the stormy petrel. In a word it is an agitation which has for its object social and political self-determination. Gandhi may pass as other agitators have passed, but the hunger for self-determination remains. And what most directly interests us in this discussion, is that the same spirit prevails as to mission administration. The Indian feels that he should rule in Church as well as in State. It is felt in every Mission. The fact that the source of supply is in foreign hands is the one thing that prevents more vigorous protest against foreign domination. Some Missions are wisely recognizing the importance of making concessions, the only question being how rapidly such transfer of power into native hands can be made without sacrificing the work.

China.-The New Thought Tide, as it is called, is the outstanding phenomenon in the Orient, especially in China. All conservative barriers or restraints have been broken down. The Chinese students have become possessed of a spirit of inquiry that accepts nothing as final. The old has been unsettled, and the door thrown open for anything that is new. Such intellectual freedom quickly manifests itself in all departments of national life.
At the present time China is politically in seemingly hopeless confusion. She became a Republic without realizing what it involved. The spirit of patriotism and national solidarity are not sufficiently developed to induce personal sacrifice in the interests of the whole.

Nevertheless, industrially, socially and intellectually, China is progressing, notwithstanding this political disorganization. China is awake. There is nothing in the world today, not even in Europe in the throes of reconstruction that equals China. History records no parallel. That such an intellectual awakening should be felt in all the members of the body is natural and expected, and is actually transpiring before our eyes.

What about Missions? How are they affected by so great a change? The Missionary challenge is greatly intensified. The Chinese are emancipated from the bondage of idolatry. Old religions are decadent, and who can contemplate without emotion the thought that the religions in which generations of men trusted have been found wanting. The Chinese, like the Japanese, are recognizing that some religion is necessary as a national basis, and having discovered the insufficiency of their own, are looking abroad and giving more respectful attention to the religion of Jesus Christ. The attitude has changed. Friendliness, a spirit of inquiry has succeeded antagonism and distrust. Missions are accordingly seeking to adjust themselves, girding up their loins, adopting their organizations to new situations, qualifying to improve opportunities as they arise.
Does it not seem an opportune moment for such a National Christian Conference as is about to meet in Shanghai? There are to be 1,200 delegates, one-
half Chinese, representing the Chinese Church, and the other half foreign, representing missiontries and the church in foreign lands. Five Commissions have been at work and will present carefully prepared reports on the following themes:

1. The present state of Christianity in China.
2. The future task of the Church.
3. The message of the Church.
4. The development of leadership for the work of the Church.
5. Co-ordination and co-operation in the work of the Church.

The scope of these five is so comprehensive as to include all. Nothing is omitted or need be omitted that directly bears on the growth of the Kingdom of God in China. It will be a great stock-taking occasion, an inventory of achievements and assets, and a forecast of what needs to be done and of what is to be.

A revival, a pentecostal outpouring in Shanghai during these days would not move China alone, but the world.
V. Quarterly Register.-The Quarterly Register, the organ of the Alliance, continues as in former years, to supply the various constituent churches of the Alliance with information relative to their varied interests. It is a publication of great interest to all who are looking forward to the time when there will be much greater co-operation between all the Reformed Churches. It contains the latest news of three continents and it ought to go regularly to every member of the constituent churches of the Alliance. Certainly, every member of the Executive Commission or Western Section ought to be a subscriber, and all who desire the Register should write to Rev. J. R. Fleming, 44 Queen St., Edinburgh, Scotland. The price of the subscription is but 50 cents per year. If desired the American Secretary, Rev. Henry B. Master, 510 Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, Pa., will forward these subscriptions.
VI. Finances.-With the increase in the cost of travel and printing, and indeed in the doing of every lind of work, a Special Committee appointed by the Western Section considered the matter of an increased apportionment distributed among all the constituent churches of the Western Section. At the meeting in Atlantic City the Chairman of this Committee, Rev. James I. Good, reported four plans for increasing the revenues of the Western Section. The fourth plan, that of an increased apportionment of $50 \%$ was adopted unanimously by the Section. This will make the apportionment of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. $\$ 3,090.00$. It is respectfully requested that this sum be forwarded not later than October 1, 1922, to the American Treasurer, Mr. Philip. E. Howard, 1031 Walnut Street, Philadelphia, Penna. The financial provisions of the Alliance include the salary and expenses of the General Secretary, Rev. J. R. Fleming, D.D., of Edinburgh, Scotland, and the current expenses of the Western Section. The American Secretary continues to serve without pay.

VIII. Next Place of Meeting.-The Western Section will meet in February, 1923, in Toronto, Canada, at a date to be fixed by the Executive Committee.
IX. The Future of The Alliance.-As one of the results of the shaking and sifting of the nations because of the great world war, there has been born in the hearts of many a new conviction of the importance of co-operation among the Churches in every field where co-operation will increase efficiency and further the immediate spread of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In this hour of crisis the members of the Alliance are keenly alive to the opportunities for usefulness which lie before the organization. The need of a practical program is keenly felt and in both the last Council and the last meeting of the Western Section largely realized. It is along this line that the Alliance is projecting its plans for the coming year.

## XVI. GENERAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Dear Brethmen:-The Cencral Council of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churchos in Amorica respectfully reports to its constituent churches for the year ending March 31, 1922.

The constituent churches in the General Council are the same as heretofore and are as follows: Reformed Church int America, Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., Presbyterian Church in the U. S., Reformed Church in the U. S., United Presbyterian Church of N. A., Associate Reformed Presbyterian Synod, Cumberland Presbyterian Church (colored).
I. Meetings.-The regular biennial meeting of the General Council was held at Hotel Chalfonte, Atlantic City, N. J., March 14 and 15, 1922.
II. Officers.--The Officers of the General Council for the biennial term of service ending March, 1924, are as follows: President, Rev. J. Sprole Lyons, D.D.; Vice-President, Rev. J. Ross Stevenson, D.D.; Stated Clerk, Rev. William Pomeroy Fulton, D.D.; Permanent Clerk, Rev. Rufus IV. Miller, D.ID.; Treasurer, Rev. David F. McGill, D.D.
III. Executive Committee.-The Exccutive Committee of the General Council, which transacts the business in the intervals between the regular meetings, is composed of the officers above named together with the chairmen of the standing committees viz.:-Rev. George Alexander, D.D., Foreign Missions; Rev. Charles S. Cleland, D.D., Home Missions; Rev. James E. Clarke, D.D., Christian Education and Literature; Prof. George L. Omwake, Ph.D., Work among Colored People;Rev.J.Rauch Stein, Ministerial Relief; Rev. J. Addison Jones, D.D., Correspondence; and Silas F. Hallock, M.D., Finance.
IV. Members Present.-There were present at the meeting of the General Council representatives from all the constituent Churches with the exception of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Synod and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (colored). The members present numbered 30 and the Boards and Agencies were represented by 15 members.
V. Necrology.-Since the last meeting of the Council the following members departed this life, namely: The Rev. William Henry Roberts, D.D., LL.D., the Rev. J. Frank Smith, D.D., the Rev. William J. Darby, D.D., of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. and the Rev. J. W. Beardslee, D.D., of the Reformed Church in America. Appropriate minutes were adopted relating to these brethren.
VI. Conferences.-The Conferences of the Committees of the General Council with the representatives of the Boards and Agencies were held Tuesday evening at 9 o'clock. These Conferences were helpful, fraternal and fruitful of fellowship and harmony, and plans were formulated for enlarged and closer co-operation.
VII. Home Missions.-"The purpose of the General Council in Home Mission matters is not mainly to promote the prosecution of Home Mission Work but to seek to coordinate the agencies of the various Constituent Churches and particularly to be of service in so directing the efforts of the churches that unseemly and hurtful rivalries may be avoided and that trouble of this kind now prevailing may be remedied by wise and fair adjustment."

The following recommendations were adopted and are submitted for approval:
(1) That a Committee consisting of three representatives from each of the Home Mission Agencies within the Council be provided by the appointment of the Agencies themselves to study the whole Home Mission situation of the Constituent Churches with a view to working out not only a comity arrangement by which hurtful rivalry may be avoided but a constructive policy of co-operation in meeting our Reformed Church share of the Home Mission needs of the country with special reference to the Evangelization of the Colored and Alien population among us.
(2) That this Committee be directed to meet at as early a date as possible and arrange for at least annual sessions to perform the duties assigned to it; that it report to the next biennial session of the Council and to the Constituent Churches and that the expenses be borne by the Home Mission agencies represented.
(3) That the chairman of the Council's Standing Committee on Home Missions be appointed the convener of the Committee.
VIII. Foreign Missions.-"On the foreign field wherever Churches holding the Presbyterian System occupy the same territory they practically function as one. Their converts to the Christian faith are gathered into one Church Organization and, as far as possible, all unite in the support of institutions of education and philanthropic work. Experience proves the wisdom of this co-operative effort. Every passing year strengthens the bonds which unite the Missionaries of our several Churches and makes them more impatient of any restriction upon union effort from the home base. There has
been made one promising effort to form a Union Agency for the prosecution of Evangelistic Work in the Mohammedan World. The Mission Boards of the Reformed ('hurch in America, the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. and the Reformed Church in the U. S. have taken initial steps toward founding a United Mission in Mesopotamia.
"There has been an attempt to effect a more perfect Union for the accomplishment of our common task by substituting for the Foreign Mission Boards and Agencies now existing a single Board that should represent all interests and combine all resources. The plan, thus far, has failed to secure endorsement. Negotiations for the Union, either Federal or Organic, of the Churches here represented though continued through several years have resulted in no general agreement and have now been suspended. The General Council, being now the only representative of the Federal principle so far as the Presbyterian family is concerned, should feel deeply the responsibility resting upon it for stimulating and developing united action."

The following recommendation was adopted and is submitted for approval:

Resolved, that the chairman of Council's Standing Committee on Foreign Missions be authorized in the name of the Council, to hold one or more Conferences with official representatives of the Foreign Boards of the constituent bodies prior to the next meeting of the Council for the consideration of the common interests and problems of our Churches and to report to the Standing Committee of the Council. The expenses of one member from each Board to be borne by the Council.
IX. Christian Education and Literature.-"In our day there is no cause that so greatly needs to be effectively pressed home upon the hearts and consciences of Christian people as the cause of Christian Education.
"There are two outstanding facts with reference to the whole educational movement in our country. The first is that the number of persons seeking complete educational preparation for life is increasing with amazing rapidity. Schools, high schools, colleges and universities are wholly unable to aecommodate the throngs of young people who besiege their doors. The second is that the war convinced the leaders of the nation as they were never before convinced that the religious element, the development of the spiritual nature and purpose of the child, is absolutely essential to the production of a citizenship which shall stand for the ideals of service and brotherhood without which we cannot hope for world peace. Because of
these two outstanding facts the present is an unusual opportune time in which to press the cause of religious education in the family, the church and the school.

There is much more co-operation than ever before in the effort to promote Christian education, yet it is apparent that greater economy and greater efficiency would result if the Presbyterian Churches would co-operate more generally in this sphere of Christian activity."

The following recommendation was adopted and is submitted for approval:

Resolved, that it is the judgment of the Council that the time has come when there should be erected a Joint Committee on Christian Education made up of representatives of the Presbyterian and Reformed Agencies of Education, Publication and Sunday School Work for the purpose of leading the Churches of this Council in such forms of Educational Work as can best be done co-operatively. It is therefore, requested that each of the said Agencies send at least two representatives to a Conference to perfect a plan for the erection of such a Joint Committee and recommend the plan to their respective Supreme Judicatories for approval; the Chairman of Council's Committee on Education shall serve as the convener of said Conference and the expenses of one representative from each Agency to one Conference shall be met by the Council.
X. Work Among Colored People.-There was no report on work among Colored people but the following recommendation was adopted and is submitted for approval:

Resolved, that the representatives of Colored Work hold a meeting prior to the meeting of the Council and report through the Committee to the Council.
XI. Ministerial Relief and Sustentation.-A carefully prepared report was presented by Rev. J. C. Scouller, D.D., which was approved and ordered published in the minutes of the Council. The following recommendations were adopted and are submitted for approval:
(1) That the Secretaries of the Boards and Committees on Ministerial Relief meet for Conference annually for the discussion of questions of common interest.
(2) That these Secretaties be requested to work out, as far as possible, a uniform method for the administration of this work.
(3) That in this uniform method of administration, provision be made by which a minister going from one branch of the Presbyterian family to another shall be able to carry with him any equities which may have accrued from the years of service rendered in the Church which he leaves.
XII. Finances.-The Treasurer of the Council, Rev. David F. McGill, D.D., reported as follows: Balance March 15, 1921, $\$ 1,992.27$; receipts, $\$ 304.00$; Total, $\$ 2,296.27$; disbursements, $\$ 402.20$; balance March 14, 1922, $\$ 1,894.07$.
XIII. Finance Committee.-The Finance Committee reported as follows which was adopted and is submitted for approval:
(1) That the apportionments for the ensuing two years shall be as follows:

XV. Membership in The General Council.-The Supreme Judicatories are respectfully requested to elect, at their next meetings, the members to represent them in the General Council for the next two years or for such other periods as the Judicatories may deem proper. As the Plan of Federal Union became operative at the last meeting of the Council by the adoption of the Amended Articles of Agreement the denominations are now entitled to increased representation. Relating to this matter the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that the Executive Committee notify the Supreme Judicatories of the Constituent Churches that the Amended Articles of Agreement are constitutionally adopted and, according to Article 2, the Several Judicatories are entitled to an enlarged basis of membership.
XVI. Plan of Federal Union.-The Council of 1922 declared that the Amendments to the Articles of Agreement have been approved and are now a part of the Articles of Agreement under the title "Plan of Federal Union," which is as follows:

The Presbyterian and Reformed Churches in America, desiring to evince and develop their spiritual unity, and to promote closer relations and more effective administrative co-operation among these Churches, hereby adopt a Preamble, a Basis of Federal Union, and also the following Articles of Agreement in furtherance of these purposes:

## Preamble

The Presbyterian and Reformed Churches in the United State of America represent the same type of evangelical Protestant Christianity, commonly known as Reformed or Calvinistic. The Churches of the Reformation in Europe, to which they are historically related, originated in different lands and passed through different experiences, which differences by reason of nationality and language appear in the forms of the original Standards of the several Churches. We, therefore, with clear understanding of the nature of such differences, hereby declare our conviction that the Westminster Confession of Faith and Catechisms, the Belgic Confession, the Heidelberg Catechism and the Canons of the Synod of Dort are in essential agreement, and are different expressions of one and the same system of doctrine. This doctrinal agreement appears in the recognition, in all the symbols, of the fundamental doctrines of evangelical Christianity as held by the Reformed or Calvinistic Churches, and also in the use made of the Apostles' Creed, the Ten Commandments, the Lord's Prayer, and the Catechisms of the several Churches, for the instruction of the youth of their congregations.

## Basis of Union

1. The Doctrinal Basis of the (ieneral Council shall be the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments acknowlediged as the inspired Word of Cod and the onty infallible rule of faith and practice, with the common system of doctrine as set forth in the existing Standards of the constituent Churches.
2. The principles of the Forms of Government and the Constitutions including the terms of doctrinal subscription of the several Churches uniting, are recognized as a part of the Basis of Union.
3. The Directories for Worship of the several Churches shall be a part of the basis of union to the extent that congregations shall have the same freedom of worship, both as to forms and usages, under the General Council, as they had before the federation.

## Articles of Agreement

1. For the prosecution of work under this Federal Union an Ecolesiastical Council is hereby established, which shall be known by the name and style of "The General Council of the Presbyterian and Reformed Churches in America."
2. The Gencral Council shall consist of at least eight representatives, ministers or ruling elders, from each of the constituent Churches, for each one hundred thousand communicants or fraction thereof up to three hundred thousand; and where a Church has more than three hundred thousand communicants, then eight representatives, ministers or elders, for each additional two hundred thousand communicants or fraction thereof. These persons shall be chosen with their alternates under the direction of their respective supreme judicatories, in such manner as those judicatories shall respectively determine.
3. Every Church entering into this Agreement retains its distinct individuality, its own creed, government and worship, as well as every power, jurisdiction and right, which is not by these Articles expressly and exclusively delegated to the body hereby constituted.
4. The General Council shall exercise only such powers as are conferred upon it by these Articles, or such as may hereafter be conferred upon it by the constituent Churches. All acts of the Council affecting the interests of any of the constituent Churches shall have only advisory authority. except in matters covered by Articles 5, 6, 7 and $S$.
5. The General Council shall have power to promote the co-operation of the constituent Churches in their Foreign Missionary work, and also in their general work in the United

States of America, so far as denominationally organized, in comnection with Home Míssion, Evangelism, Work among the Colored People, Church Erection, Sabbath-schools, Publications, Education, Ministerial Relief and Comity, and shall exercise this power in the establishing and appointing of administrative agencies to maintain and conduct the work representative of any one or more of the causes mentioned, as consented to by the several supreme judicatories concerned. The Council may advise and recommend in other matters pertaining to the general welfare of the kingdom of Christ.
6. The General Council shall have power to deal with questions which may arise between the constituent Churches, infegard to matters within the jurisdiction of the Council, which the constituted agencies of the Churches concerned have been unable to settle, and which may be brought to the attention of the Council by the supreme judicatories of the partiez thereto; and such differences shall thereupon be determined by the Council or by such agencies as it may appoint. If determined by an agency, such as a Committee or Commission, there shall be the right of appeal to the Council for final decision. The representatives in the Council, of Churches which are parties to questions at issue, shall be excluded from voting upon such questions. Every final decision shall be transmitted by the Council to the supreme judicatories of the Churches concerned, which shall take such steps as are necessary to carry the decision into effect.
7. The General Council shall have power to deal with any other matters of interest common to any two or more of the constituent Churches, which may be referred to it by the supreme judicatories of the Churches concerned for its action, with such authority in the premises and under such conditions as may be agreed upon by the Churches which make the reference. It may also initiate movements having co-operation and union in view, subject to the approval of the Churches concerned, and may, if necessary, conduct a survey of particular fields or causes.
8. The General Council shall have power to open and maintain a friendly correspondence with Presbyterian and other Evangelical Churches for the purpose of promoting concert of action in matters of common interest; but nothing in this Article shall be construed as affecting the present rights of correspondence of the constituent Churches.
9. The General Council shall give•full faith and credit to the acts, proceedings and records of the duly constituted authorities of the several constituent Churches.
10. The officers of the Cieneral Council shall be a President, Vice-President, Stated Clerk, Treasurer, and such other subordinate officers as may be necessary. The (ieneral Council may also appoint an Executive Committee with such authority as the Council may vote, to act in the intervals between the meetings of Council.
11. Any Boards or other administrative agencies which the General Council may appoint with the approva! of the Churches concerned shall be composed of representatives of the constituent Churches, each Church being represented thereon by at least one member. When the number is more than one for each Church, then the increase shall be in proportion to the volume of work as represented by the annual investment of each Church. All members shall be nominated by the supreme judicatories directly interested or by their Boards or Agencies as the judicatories may determine: Each judicatory shall nominate one or more persons for each vacancy and the term of office shall be four years, the members being clivided into two classes, one of which, in the first election, shall be elected for two years only.
12. The Gencral Council shall meet in reguiar session at least biennially, and on its own adjournment, at such time and place as may be determined. In the conduct of its meetings it shall respect the conscientious views of its constituent members. The President shall call special meetings at any time when requested so to do by a majority of the representatives of each of two or more of the constituent bodies; thirty days notice of such meetings shall be given to all the members and only such business may be transacted as is specified in the notice.
13. The expenses of the General Council shall be met by a fund to be provided by a pro rata apportionment on the basis of the representation of each Church in the Council. The expenses of the representatives shall be paid by their respective Churches. All the expenses involved in the settlement of any question between the Churches shall be borne equally by the Churches concerned.
14. When the representatives of three of the Churches, at a meeting of either the General Council or its Agencies, request a unit vote by Churches upon a pending motion, the vote shall be so taken.
15. The General Council shall have power to make such regulations and by-laws as shall be deemed necessary for the conduct of its business.
16. Any Church holding the Reformed Faith and Presbyterian Polity may be received into the General Council by a majority of the representatives of the Churches, voting by the unit rule, and upon its adoption of the Plan of Federal Union, these Articles of Agreement included.
17. Any Church in the General Council may withdraw therefrom on notice officially given, and on its observance of the same constitutional steps as were followed in its adoption of these Articles.
18. Any amendment to these Articles proposed to the General Council shall before its adoption be approved by the Council, and receive the consent of two-thirds of the constituent Churches acting in accordance with their respective Constitutions. When the General Council shall have been notified of such consent, it shall declare the amendment to be a part of the Articles of Agreement.

The Minutes of the General Council are herewith submitted for your consideration, the above compendium of the work of the Council being for general distribution through inclusion in the minutes of the respective Supreme Judicatories.

## XVII. REPORT OF THE FEDERAL COUNCIL

The report of the Feflemal Council of the Churches of Christ in Anerica for 1921, records steady and solid gain in the development of the co-operative work of the Protestant churches. There are mmistakable evidmes that both in the quality of work done and in the support given by the constituent booties of the Comell there has been definite advance.

## Evangelism at the Base

More than in any other year, the evangelistic mission of the churches has been at the heart of the Comeil's activitics. The co-operation of the evangelistic agencies of the denominations in the Commission on Evangelism has been more hearty and complete than crer before. The men on whom the denominations have laid the responsibility for stimulating the spirit of evangelism have found in the Federal Council a central agency through which to plan together a concerted effort for a more effective presentation of the claims of our Lord and Saviour upon the allegiance of men's hearts and wills. As one illnstration of its work it may be pointed out that in no fewer than fourteen of the leading citics of the country the evangelistie leaders of the denominations have united, under the auspices of the Federal Council, in bringing together the pastors of all the local churches to aid them in developing plans for simultancous and communitywide evangelistic programs. From cvery city where such conferences have been held have come gratifying testimonies of the unity of purpose and increase of spiritual power thus developed. The records of the denominations show that the past year has been most remarkable in the number of additions to chureh membership. Especially noteworthy has been the success of those cities in which there have been local Councils of Churches and in which the pastors have united in this plan of simultaneous evangelistic effort.

This primary task of winning men to personal discipleship to our common Master, the Council is keeping at the center of all its work. It begins where all the churches begin, with the unchanging message to the individual soul, "Repent, believe, follow.". Whatever else it may do, it is fully recognized, can be done only on the basis of the foundation thus laid in the redeemed lives of those who in their Divine Lord have found the source of new strength and gained the new vision that leads to service for Christ and the world.

## International Goodwill

With the emphåsis on personal discipleship to Christ has gone an increased effort to lead the world to understand what discipleship means for the relations of men to one another in our modern life. Especially during the past year has the message of the Gospel for the relation of nations to each other engaged the attention of the churches co-operating in the Council. In a world that now recognizes more keenly the inherent contradiction between the spirit of Christ and the spirit of war, the Commission on International Justice and Goodwill has been called upon to function vigorously as a central agency through which the churches could express their common devotion to the Christian ideal of a warless world, and work together in practical efforts for that end. The appeal of the Council for the observance of June 5th, as a Sunday for united prayer and for calling attention throughout the nation to the moral necessity for reduction of armament, wasthe beginning of a parsistent campaign for more Christian international relations.

The publications of the Council dcaling with "The Church and a Warless World," circulated widely among both pastors and laymen, through the generonis help of the denominational agencies, not only rendered a distinct service to the churches, but, as we are informed on high authority, had no sma! part in creating that public sentiment which alone made possible the results which the International Conference on Limitation of Armament achieved. This work in behalf of Christian international relations, the Council is convinced, must go on with unabated energy until war has been outlawed, by the development of a Christian spirit and of permanent co-operation among the nations in the maintenance of world peace. The constituent borlies may well consider the practical measures by which they may co-operate most effectively with the Council in this great task.

## International Relief

Since international justice and good will is best expressed not in words, but in deeds of serving love, the Council, face to face with the great tragedy of millions of our fellowmen starving in other lands, established a special Committee on Mercy and Relief to serve as a responsible channel through which all the churches can unite in the relief of suffering and the saving of human life. To the appeal issued by the Council in behalf of the Russian children there has been a most generous response, all rejoicing that through some common agency the churches could manifest in a practical way the spirit of Him whose will it is that none of these little ones should perish. The funds thus received have been transmitted to the American Relief Administration for distribution, with a moderate percentage to the American Friends Service Committee (Quaker), and the Council has been urged by the Relief Administration to provide for a special mission to the Russian people in the name of all the churches. It is hoped that by the time this message is in the hands of the constituent bodies of the Council, outstanding representatives of the churches will have gone to Russia as messengers of brotherhood from the churches of America.

## Race Relations

In the midst of serious problems raised by the relations of the races in this country, especially relations between the white and Negro peoples, the Council has faced also the need for constructive work. Included in the Council are the great national churches of both races, possessing alike the one gospel of human brotherhood. Here are mighty forces that need to be brought to bear more definitely upon the solution of the difficult questions of race relations in America. The Council, therefore, acting on the urgent recommendation of many leaders in the churches, both white and Negro, has created a new agency known as the Commission on the Church and Race Relations, in which Christian men and women of the two races are now working together to promote racial justice and goodwill.

## Social Relations

In the field of social relationships at home the Council, through its Commission on the Church and Social Service, has continued its educational work, seeking especially to help the local churches to serve the community and to make more clear the meaning of Christian discipleship in the industrial realm. All its activities have been under the direction of an executive committee made up of the denominational officials who are charged with responsibility for this work in their own churches. In several of the larger cities the pastors have been brought together in conference with Christian employers and employees to consider the application of Christian principles to industrial life, and to promote co-operation between the parties to industry in the place of self-seeling and strife. A Research Department on the relation of the Church to social questions has been developed, and through the medium of a fortnightly Information Service the work done by engineers and other experts in the industrial field has been interpreted from the Christian point of view and information as to what is being done by some churches in the social field is made available to all. Pastors everywhere have expressed their appreciation of the help thus given them.

## Many Other Tasks

Other important tasks in furthering a more united approach to Christian education, in carrying on a united study of problems confronting all the churches, in interpreting to the outside public through the daily press the significance of the Gospel for contemporary life, in helping to rebuild devastated Protestant churches in France and Belgium, in assisting the union churches in the Panama Canal Zone, and in developing co-operation with the churches of Europe, it is impossible to discuss in this brief summary, but they are fully described in the accompanying Annual Report of the Executive Committee. In all its work, in whatever field, the aim of the Council has been not to direct the churches, but to be their servant through making it possible for them to do together what they could not do so well alone. In the carrying out of its tasks the development of local Councils of Churches throughout the country, through which the churches in the community can work together in all accepted common tasks, has been the very keystone of the arch of co-operative effort. It is a special satisfaction, therefore, to he able to report that during 1921 six new Councils in important cities have been formed, each with an executive secretary.

## Financial Support

The budget for 1922, as approved by the Executive Committer at its annual meeting in Chicago, December 14-16, has been reduced to the lowest possible figure consistent with the maintenance of the present work. The whole program of the Council is brought within a total budget of $\$ 245,400$ for the current year.
In the carrying out of the poliey umamously agreed upon by the representatives of the denominations at the Quadrennial Meeting of the Council in 1920, looking toward the assumption of the financial responsibility by the constituent bodies, substantial progress has been made. Every denomination has made greatly increased appropriations to the Council. Some have voted officially to accept their full pro rata share of the whole budget. The amount received directly from the denominations in 1921 was three times as large as in any previous year. The complete financial statement for 1921 is given in the report of the Executive Commitiee.

It is confidently believed that the denominations which have adopted the method of contributing directly their increased share of the Council's budget will feel that the practice has abundantly justified itself because of the resulting sense of closer relationship with the policies of the Council, and it is earnestly hoped that the denominations which have not yet made provision for assuming their pro rata share of the Council's budget will clo so at the coming denominational gatherings.

## Recommendations

The two following recommendations are made for consideration by the constituent bodies, and, if approved, for their action:

1. That the denominations officially adopt as their own statement the following declaration of "International Ideals of the Churches of Christ," formulated by the Executive Committee of the Council at its last meeting:
2. "WE BELIEVE THAT NATIONS NO LESS THAN INDIVIDUALS ARE SUBJECT TO GOD'S IMMUTABLE MORAL LAWS.
3. "WE BELIEVE THAT NATIONS ACHIEVE TRUE WELFARE, GREATNESS AND HONOR ONLY THROUGH JUST DEALING AND UNSLELFISH SERVICE.
4. "WE BELIEVE THAT NATIONS THAT REGARD THEMSELVES AS CIIRISTIAN HAVE SPECIAL INTERNATIONAL OBLIGATIONS.
5. "WE BELIEVE THAT THE SPIRIT OF CHRISTIAN BROTHERLINESS CAN REMOVE EVERY UNJUST BARRIER OF TRADE, COLOR, CREED AND RACE.
6. "WE BELIEVE THAT CHRISTIAN PATRIOTISM DEMANDS THE PRACTICE OF GOOD-WILL BETWEEN NATIONS.
7. "WE BELIEYE THAT INTERNATIONAL POLICIES SHOULD SECURD EQUAL JUSTICE FOR ALL RACES.
8. "WE BELIEVE THAT ALL, NATIONS SHOULD ASSOCIATE THEMSELVES PERMANENTLY FOR WORLD PEACE AND GOOD-WILL.
9. "WE BELIEVE IN INTERNATIONAL LAW, AND IN THE UNIVERSAL USE OF INTERNATIONAL COURTS OF JUSTICE AND BOARDS OF ARBITRATION.
10. "WE BELIEVE" IN A SWEEPING REDUCTION OF ARMAMENTS BY ALL NATIONS.
11. "WE BELIEVE IN A WARLESS WORLD, AND DEDICATE OURSELVES TO ITS ACHIEVEMENT."
12. That in keeping with the action of the last Quadrennial Meeting of the Council, each denomination provide through its official channels for paying its pro rata share of the budget of the Council for 1922 as approved by the Executive Committee, it being understood that any denomination which cares to do so may designate phases of the Council's work for which it desires its funds to be used.

The Stated Clerk desires to place on recorl in immediate connection with the foregoing statistical tables, the indebtedness of the Church to Mr. Henry Barraclough, Office Manager, for the painstaking care which he has excreised in the immediate supervision of the preparation and printing of the statistics, and in particular, in connection with the preparation of the new set of statistics based upon the reports received from General Assembly, Synodical and Presbyterial agencies as to the amounts received by them from individual churches.

In preparing this latter set of tables for the first time, every available check has been used, and the utmost care has been taken to secure correctness. Except for such aid as has been most willingly given by the Central Receiving Agency at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York, the editors have been entirely without such information as will in future years be available to test the accuracy of the figures.

For the following errata at the time of going to press, we are indebted to Rev. Herman C. Weber. An examination of the proof sheets shows that with one exception all the errata here noted were corrected in the proof, and the errors have occurred after the final proof left the Office of the Ceneral Assembly. In view of the character of the tables, and the extreme difficulty of producing them accurately in such a short space of time, it is most remarkable that so few errors have occurred at the printery.

As to the future: we who are responsible for the preparation of these statistical tables earnestly request the clerks of sessions, presbyteries and synods, and all treasurers interested, to send us constructive suggestions as to how we may make these tables as accurate as possible.

[^0]:    The Committee received and approved the Auditor's Report and the Treasurer's quarterly statement.

    The Committee would recommend to the Commission, for its approval, the following actions:

    1. That the Chairman of the Committee, in conference with the Stated Clerk be authorized to prepare the budget of the Office of the General Assembly for presentation to the meeting of the Commission to be held in May at the General Assembly.
    2. That the adjustment of the mileage and entertainment funds, and transfer of funds from one budget item to another, as advised by the Treasurer of the General Assembly be committed to the Chairman of the Finance Committee in consultation with the Stated Clerk, with power.
    3. That, beginning with the adjournment of the present session of the Executive Commission, the Commission direct that all vouchers relating to the funds of the General Assembly in the hands of the Treasurer of the General Assembly, the Land Title and Trust Company, be signed by the Stated Clerk and the Treasurer of the General Assembly. In the absence or the disability of the Stated Clerk, the Chairman of the Finance Committee shall act in his stead.
    4. The Committee recommends that $\$ 150$ out of the Contingent Fund of the General Assembly be appropriated to secure a thorough study by a railroad expert of the problems connected with the Mileage Fund, and in particular for the securing through such expert of the approximate mileage of the Commissioners of the General Assembly to and from a dozen or more centres to which the General Assembly is likely in future years to be invited.
    5. The Committee further recommends that the same Auditors shall be employed next year as last, namely: Lybrand Ross Bros. and Montgomery.
