MINUTES

OF THE

HOLSTON ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

ABSTRACT OF THE DAILY JOURNAL.

FIRST DAY,

THURSDAY, OCT. 3, 1867.

The Holston Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in the Methodist Episcopal Church in the city of Knoxville, at 9 o'clock, A.M., Bishop Calvin Kingsley presiding. The Bishop conducted the opening religious services by reading of the Scriptures; and, after singing, Rev. Brother Patty led in prayer. The members of the Conference with deep feelings of gratitude joined in the communion of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll, and sixty-eight members answered to their names.

On motion, Rev. John F. Spence was re-elected Secretary of the Conference, and J. S. Petty and R. D. Black, Assistants.

Rev. Dr. Pearne was elected Conference Reporter.

Rev. Dr. Pearne presented a resolution on standing committees which was adopted.

On motion, the session hours of Conference were fixed between 9, A.M., and 12, M.

Dr. Pearne presented and read the Legislative Act incorporating the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

On motion, a committee of three was raised, to whom the subject of Trustee succession was referred, viz: Brothers Pearne, Drake and Graves.

The 7th question was taken up:

QUESTION. *Who are the Supernumerary Preachers?*

ANSWER. The characters of Rev. E. E. Gillenwaters and George A. Gowan were passed, and relation continued. Rev. J. N. S. Huffaker was made effective and S. P. Harwell passed for the present.

QUESTION 8th called. *Who are the Superannuated Preachers?*

ANSWER. James Cummings, R. H. Guthrie, D. Fleming, Wm. Duggin, John Alley and T. P. Rutherford were severally passed and their relation continued. R. W. Patty was made effective.

The effective Elders were called and passed in the usual manner.

Rev. N. E. Cobleigh, D.D., of the New England Conference, Rev. Brother Leach, of the Pittsburgh Conference, Rev. Mr. Bates, of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and Rev. Mr. La Vere, of the Presbyterian (colored) Church were introduced to the Conference.

By a unanimous vote Rev. Dr. Cobleigh was invited to transfer his membership from the New England to the Holston Annual Conference.

Hon. Thomas H. Coldwell, Attorney General of the State, was introduced to the Conference, and made a brief but effective address.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

SECOND DAY.

FRIDAY, OCT. 4, 1867.

Conference assembled at the appointed hour. The usual religious services were conducted by Rev. F. M. Fanning. Journal read and approved.

Rev. Bro. Fortner, of the Protestant Methodist Church and

Hon. Horace Maynard were introduced to the Conference. Mr. Maynard, member (elect) of Congress, addressed the Conference in a most earnest and eloquent manner.

Rev. Dr. Pearne, Rev. W. H. Rogers and Prof. Wilson presented reports from different educational institutions. Reports referred to their appropriate committees.

Papers from the Sunday School and Tract Societies were referred.

The relation of A. F. Shannon was changed from effective to superannuated.

Rev. Brother Aikin of the Holston Presbyterian Church, and Rev. J. N. Baker, from Ohio were introduced to the Conference.

The case of S. B. Harwell was referred to a committee.

Second question was taken up:

QUESTION. *Who remain on trial?*

ANSWER. Thomos R. West, John S. Petty, J. G. Trull, J. A. Ruble, Thomas R. Clapp, Lemuel Bogart, Joseph F. Cardwell, John J. Manker, J. B. Powell, C. M. Caldwell, were severally called, examined and continued.

W. P. Proffit was discontinued.

Brother Gibson C. Andrews was readmitted from the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

Rev. Mr. Bachman, Pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of this city, was introduced to the Conference.

After the usual announcements, Conference adjourned.

THIRD DAY.

OCTOBER 5, 1867.

The devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Wm. Milburn. The journal of yesterday was read, corrected and approved.

The exhibit of the Western Book Concern was read, and Rev. Dr. Reid, Editor of the Western Christian Advocate, was introduced, and in a short address called the attention of the Conference to the interests of our church publications in the

West. A number of papers were presented, read and referred to their appropriate committees.

The third question was taken up, and the following Deacons of the 2d class were called, viz: George M. Hicks, Thomas S. Walker, S. W. Hyden, R. D. Black, R. O. Ayres and J. P. Milburn, were severally passed and advanced. Rev. George W. Coleman having given full satisfaction to the committees of the third and fourth years course of study, by resolution of Conference, his course of study was accepted as completed.

The chair called the list of candidates for orders and full connection, viz: J. W. Peace, J. H. Stamper, Philip Chambers, John H. Moore, John Warthman, W. P. Jackson, Harmon J. Crumley, John Mahoney, Daniel Carter, George W. Coleman, J. B. Fitzgerald, were severally passed, elected to Deacons orders, and received into full connection.

The certificate of transfer of Rev. Nelson E. Cobleigh, D.D., from the New England to the Holston Conference, was read by the Secretary and placed on file.

QUESTION 5th. *Who are eligible to Elders Orders?*

ANSWER. John B. Ford and R. D. Black were passed and elected to Elders Orders.

Rev. Mr. Humes, Rector of St. John's Church, of this city, was introduced to the Conference.

The following were recommended and elected to Local Elders Orders, viz: John Carroll, J. C. Brown, Joseph B. Everett, Samuel M. Williams and Absalom B. Wright.

The following brethren were represented and elected to Local Deacons Orders, viz: John M. Mitchell, Patterson F. Mountain, Henry Walker, W. H. Weaver, James R. Crank, John Boynton, James M. McCart, James A. Ruble, James A. Hamilton, William Bluford, Robert Clark, William A. Cobb, John A. Matheson, Wesley Hoskins and Charles R. Mays.

Conference adjourned to meet on Monday at 9, A. M.

FOURTH DAY,

MONDAY, OCTOBER 7, 1867.

Conference opened its session at the usual hour. Rev. W. C. Graves conducted the religious services by reading the 4th

chapter of Second Corinthians, 483d Hymn and prayer. The journal of the previous session was read and approved.

Brothers Spence and Huffaker presented the following resolution :

Resolved, That this Conference appoint two representatives to the next General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and that the General Conference be respectfully requested to grant them the privileges of delegates to that body.

While the resolution was pending, the chair decided that the Holston Conference, under the conditions of its formation, had no legal right to send delegates to the next General Conference; but if the Conference deemed it important to send representatives to that body, with the understanding that the representatives make no claim upon the General Conference funds for traveling expenses; and with the further understanding that the privileges of such representatives shall be defined by the next General Conference, he should interpose no objection to the appointment of such representatives.

The resolution was adopted, and Rev. Thomas H. Pearne, D. D., and Rev. W. C. Daily, were elected representatives, and Rev J. Albert Hyden, a reserve.

The Chair presented the Certificate of Ordination of Deacons and Elders.

Rev. W. H. Rogers, Chairman, in the case of S. B. Harwell, presented the following resolution, which was adopted :

Resolved, That the case of Rev. S. B. Harwell be referred to the Presiding Elder of Athens District, and the accused be tried according to Discipline.

The report of Conference Committee on Conference Charter was read and adopted.

On motion, Mrs. Nancy Patton, widow of Rev. Samuel Patton, was recognized as a regular claimant on the Conference funds.

First question was taken up :

QUESTION. *Who are admitted on trial?*

ANSWER. Jonathan N. Baker, Albert G. Watkins, John R. Hughes, Samuel Green, Samuel W. Lee, Thomas W. Atkins, Henry Pile, Thomas R. Clark, James M. Durham, Absalom B.

Wright, John M. Mitchell, Isaac M. Knox, Charles R. Mays and Hilton H. Burke, were severally admitted on trial.

Rev. Isaac Fortner was re-admitted from the Protestant Methodist Church. William Kinsland was re-admitted from the Methodist Episcopal Church South. Rev. John Leach was re-admitted and granted a supernumerary relation. Rev. Alexander F. English was re-admitted from the Methodist Episcopal Church South. Thomas R. West was received into full connection. George M. Hicks was located at his own request. Joseph R. Burchfield was recognized as a Local Elder, and James D. Lawson as a Local Deacon.

Rev. Dr. Pearne offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the presiding elders and preachers in charge of stations or circuits, where persons bring recommendations for orders, or to be admitted into the traveling connection, be and are hereby constituted a committee to examine the same.

William P. Lowery was recognized as a Local Elder, and F. Roten as a Local Deacon. Henry Griffith was elected to Local Elders Orders. Rev. J. F. Spence, Secretary of Committee on Education, presented and read their report, which was adopted.

After the usual announcements, Conference adjourned with the benediction.

FIFTH DAY.

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 8, 1897.

Conference convened at 9 o'clock, A.M. The religious services were conducted by Rev. J. B. Little. Journal read, corrected and approved. The chair announced the Committees of Examination for the ensuing year. Rev. L. F. Drake was appointed to preach the Missionary Sermon; J. L. Mann, alternate.

Rev. W. W. Neal, of the Church South was introduced to the Conference.

The chairmen of the different standing committees presented their reports, which were severally adopted. Dr. Pearne read the Report of the Missionary appropriations.

On motion, Rev. A. R. Bennick was appointed to the Franklin Institute, and Rev. W. H. B. Burkett to the Chatata Seminary.

Rev. Brother Smith, of the Baptist Church, was introduced to the Conference.

Rev. L. F. Drake presented a number of resolutions which were unanimously adopted :

1st. *Resolved*, That the members of this Conference tender their sincere thanks to the families of the city of Knoxville, for the very kind and courteous manner in which they have received us, and for their hospitality during the session of Conference.

2d. *Resolved*, That our thanks be tendered the ministers and members of the several denominations of Christians, for the use of their houses of worship, during the Session of Conference.

3d. *Resolved*, That we extend to the officers of the several Railroads our grateful thanks for half fare tickets in coming to and returning from Conference.

4th. *Resolved*, That these resolutions be published in the Knoxville Whig and other papers throughout the State, and that a copy be sent to each minister in this city, and, also, to the Presidents of the several Railroad Companies.

On motion, a collection was ordered to be taken in the month of January, at each appointment, to defray the expense of our representatives to the General Conference.

Report on Pastoral Address was referred to a Committee, preparatory to publication.

The next session of the Holston Annual Conference, was, by vote, fixed at Chattanooga. Report of Auditing Committee received and adopted.

The Secretary offered the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Conference, by rising vote, express their high satisfaction with the official and personal influence of our beloved Bishop, Rev. Calvin Kingsley, D. D., in this, his first visit among us.

A committee of three were raised, viz: Rev. Thomas H. Pearne, J. A. Hyden and W. H. Rogers, to proceed as soon as practicable to look after the interests of the Conference, in the property of the Jonesboro' Female College.

Resolved, That each member of this Conference be instructed to preach a sermon on Education, early in the conference year, and take a collection in behalf of the East Tennessee Wesleyan College.

The journal was read and approved,

It was moved that after the reading of the appointments the Conference adjourn.

The Bishop then addressed the Conference, read the appointments, and the Conference adjourned with the doxology and benediction.

REPORTS ON EDUCATION.

EAST TENNESSEE WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

Your committee after a careful examination of the report submitted by Prof. P. C. Wilson, Chairman of the Conference Committee, appointed by this body at its last session, with full power to select and locate a first class Institution of Education, and also a report presented by Dr. Thos. H. Pearne, President of the Board of Trustees, beg leave to present the following Report:

We are gratified in reporting that through the labors of the committee, of which P. C. Wilson was Chairman, we have a College property worth from \$15,000 to \$20,000, eligibly located in the town of Athens, McMinn county, Tennessee, with good title, and funds sufficient to meet all existing liabilities. And we also report that, through the indefatigable labors of Rev. Dr. Pearne, President of the Board of Trustees, a Charter from the Legislature of the State has been secured, giving to the Institution university powers and privileges, and that during a portion of the past year a flourishing preparatory school has been in operation under the supervision of Prof. P. C. Wilson, and that recently it has been opened under the Charter as a College.

A competent Board of Instruction has been secured, with Rev. N. E. Cobleigh, D.D., as President. Dr. Cobleigh, it is well known, was formerly President of McKendree College, where he labored for several years with marked success; resigning his situation only at the call of the church to a more important work. The Institution thus constituted is the *legitimate child* of the Conference, and *as such*, it is the duty of the Conference to cherish and foster it with all the means and influence in its power. True, there are discouragements, the Institution is in its infancy; yet not so puerile at the end of ten months as old *Yale College* at the end of ten years. "We should not despise the day of small things." Yale College commenced with £30 and accompanied the earth ten times in her journey around the sun before she had an edifice or landed property equal to our own.

Though the things of to-day be small with us, not so our expectations. The trans-Atlantic Universities were once as low as we, and in their progress to their present glory, they have seen nations rise and fall and long lines of royal patrons gathered to their fathers.

And furthermore your Committee claim that

WHEREAS, The labor of building up an Institution of the character this is designed to be is not the work of a day or year; but a work requiring time, money and persevering effort. And

WHEREAS, In other localities several annual conferences combine in building up one institution, it appears to your Committee of the highest importance that this Conference should be fully impressed with the idea of *unity of feeling and action* in this great enterprise. Therefore,

Resolved 1, That as a Conference we pledge ourselves, *individually and collectively*, to give our united influence to the work of building up, sustaining and amply endowing the East Tennessee Wesleyan College.

Resolved 2d, That we will promptly discourage and oppose any attempt to divide the interests of the Church, by any movement whatever to establish another Institution of the same grade for males, within the bounds of the Conference.

Resolved 3d, That the nominations of the Board of Trustees be, and are hereby confirmed, viz: Dr. M. R. May, Rev. W. C. Daily, Rev. John W. Mann, G. M. Bloom, Samuel M. Henderson, Theodore Richmond and James N. Baker, as Trustees of the College, in accordance with the Charter.

We also recommend the appointment of the following named persons as a Board of Visitors for the ensuing year, viz: Rev. A. G. Watkins, Rev. J. B. Little, Rev. L. F. Drake, Rev. J. L. Mann and Hon. T. H. Coldwell.

HOLSTON SEMINARY.

Your Committee do further report that they had before them a paper from the Board of Trustees of the Holston Seminary, located at New Market, Tennessee, representing a property well located, worth \$5,000, and a school in a very prosperous condition under the principalship of Prof. Samuel P. Johnson, and in accordance with their request we recommend the appointment of the following named persons as a Board of Visitors for the ensuing year, viz: Rev. Thos. H. Pearne, D.D., Prof. P. C. Wilson, J. Cawood, J. N. S. Huffaker, A. J. Greer, J. M. Meek and R. B. Owen.

It is not only a matter of gratification to report the flourishing condition of this School but real pleasure in presenting the fact that the State Legislature recently passed an act prohibiting the sale of ardent spirits within two miles of the Institution. This law being passed at the request of the students and citizens.

JONESBOROUGH FEMALE COLLEGE.

From the report of Rev. L. F. Drake, President of the Board of Trustees, we learn that this Institution, so far as members and literary reputation are involved, is in a flourishing condition; there being over 80 students in attendance. Prof. Henderson Pressnell, a popular educator, has been elected to the Presidency of the Institution; thereby giving general satisfaction to all concerned.

At the last session of the Holston Annual Conference, this Institution was presented by the Trustees and citizens of Jonesborough, and accepted and espoused as the legitimate daughter of the Conference; and *as such*, your Committee have watched its growth with great interest; and to-day report that we are touched with its infirmities. The Board of Trustees inform us that the title and financial condition of the Institution are in a precarious situation, thereby jeopardizing the interests of the Conference in the property, requiring our immediate attention, or this "Munificent donation" will pass forever out of our hands. We therefore recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved 1st, That a committee of three be, and is hereby appointed, who shall proceed, as soon as practicable, to look after the interests of the Conference in said property.

Resolved 2d, That the Conference appoint Rev. Thos. H. Pearne, D.D., Rev. N. E. Cobleigh, D.D., Rev. W. C. Daily, Rev. J. L. Mann and the Pastor of Jonesboro' Station, as a Board of visitors for the ensuing year.

Resolved, That the publications of our own Union in doctrinal purity, beauty and cheapness, are preferable to any others in the country; and we therefore recommend our people to select from our own catalogues to furnish or supply the schools in our bounds.

Resolved That we will endeavor to increase the circulation of the Sunday School Advocate and Teachers Journal.

1st. In a few days the influence of this grand demonstration was felt not only in our National Capital, but in all the great commercial centers of our glorious republic, and thence to all the out-posts of the nation. And now in all the most enlightened towns and country places there are Divisions of Sons of Temperance, Knights of Jericho or some other temperance organizations contributing to carry on the glorious temperance reform.

2d. Our own State Legislature, with its patriotic Governor, have nobly aided this great reform. May God continue to inspire them with a laudable zeal in the cause of this great enterprise. Therefore

Resolved, That the members of this body give countenance to all temperance organizations, and each contribute to the great enterprise by preaching a temperance sermon at each appointment in his charge as early as practicable in the conference year, and by the circulation of temperance tracts and books.

Pastoral Address.

To the members of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the bounds of the Holston Conference :

DEAR BRETHREN:—As your pastor, we are desirous to address you on some of the more important interests and obligations growing out of the relation that we naturally sustain to the great household of faith; and we do this the more gladly from the fact that God has made it our duty as well as a glorious privilege, to assist each other in working out our own salvation. We would therefore stir up your pure minds, by way of remembrance of these things, though ye knew them and be established in the present truth. Such is our innate proneness to forget the things that make for our good and prosperity in this life, that we ever need line upon line, precept upon precept, here a little and there a little, to urge us to faithfulness in the practical performance of the great moral duties upon which are so eminently suspended the blessings and rewards which God holds in reversion for them that love and serve him in this life.

We most devoutly hope, that having given ourselves to the Church and the ministry for your sake, you will suffer the word of exhortation from us on this occasion.

The glorious and almost unparalleled success of our Church in this country within the past few years is certainly occasion for devout thanksgiving to God. After four years of deadly conflict and of devastating struggle the great rebellion succumbed, not by consent but by sheer force of necessity. And when the din of battle was hushed and peace was once more being restored to the friends of God and humanity, and the war clouds having passed away, what desolations, mourning and weeping were witnessed through all the land. And now with bleeding hearts the mournful enquiry was made by a few of the Methodist people who had dared to be loyal to the best government the sun ever shone upon, what has become of the Methodist Episcopal Church South? And so it was ascertained that the great mass of her ministry had refugeeed before the Federal army and had left their sheep in the wilderness to shift for themselves. But soon the Macedonian cry was heard from this country going up to the Old Methodist Episcopal Church, "come over and help us." And come she did and met a most hearty welcome by thousands who had been driven from her bosom in 1845.

Through the instrumentality of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the old anti-slavery, humanity loving doctrines held and preached by an Asbury and Coke, with others, are again, under God, to be preached and heard all over this wide spread country, bearing the mark of God's approbation manifest in their wonderful success among the people. In her operations in this country during the last two years, see the thousands that

have eagerly returned to her bosom and joyfully settled down in their old and long loved home, and enjoy a communion and fellowship there which they can find no where else. And brethren this is but a part of her doings hundreds and thousands have been happily converted to God through her instrumentality, and stand forth as living and glorious testimonials of God's mercy and approbation, that probably would otherwise have been this day in the gall of bitterness and bonds of iniquity.

We look upon Methodism, the great fundamental doctrines of the Methodist Episcopal Church as practiced and preached by her ministry, to be doctrines revealed in the Bible and well calculated to better the moral condition of our race, in bringing them to repentance and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ; lifting them up from the ruins of the fall, and presenting them as sinners, redeemed and saved to the God of Mercy, through the preciousness of the death of him who hath saved us and washed us in his own blood.

But dear brethren if we would be very successful in the great and glorious work to which our Master has called us in our several relations to the church, we must never loose sight of the glorious doctrine of Christian perfection, yea, verily, we must seek it, we must groan after it, we must never stop short of it, we must live it, we must graciously enjoy it in our own poor hearts; the truth and power of holiness of heart, an entire consecration, full and earnest, to the work of God, as taught and promised in the Bible, enjoyed and preached by that good man, John Wesley, and his coadjutors in the early history of Methodism; in which doctrine, under God, is to be found the great element of their success in winning souls to God.

In order to this, brethren, we must remember and practice all the duties of a Christian, small and great, as clearly taught in the Holy Scriptures. We would therefore call your attention to the duty of secret prayer. "When thou prayest, enter into thy closet and when thou hast shut too the the door, pray to thy Father which is in secret, and thy Father which seeth in secret, shall reward thee openly." This is a Christian duty you cannot neglect without great danger and loss to your own souls, and a weakening of those moral influences which God intends to make efficient in you, to the salvation of those whom God has committed to your care. Do not forget to have your stated times of secret prayer. It would be well to follow the example of David, praying morning, noon and night. Personal converse with God in the closet is very essential to our growth in religion, and progress to the home of the pious and good, in the better land. Therefore, brethren, pray without ceasing.

We would now call your attention to the duty of family religion and family prayers. It is to be feared that too many are living in the partial, if not total neglect of these duties. "Let your light shine before others, that they, seeing your good works, may be constrained to glorify our Father which is in Heaven." This must be done by the practice of everyday-

Christianity. In going in and out before the world we must live to impress them with the truth that our life is practically hid with Christ in God, and this should be preeminently so in reference to our own loved families—those pledges of his love and trust committed to our care, we should constantly live as if fully expecting to hear from the lips of Jehovah in the great day, “Christian parent, where is thy family whom I commanded you to train for Heaven and eternal life?” God has thus graciously given us our dear families in order that we might be blessed and benefitted in training them up for God, bringing them up in the way in which they should go, with the blessed assurance coming down from God, out of Heaven, upon our own hearts, in the promise that when he is old he will not depart from it. You may enquire at this point as did Nicodemus, of old, how can these things be? Our answer is this, in the fear and love of God, go do your duty, and God will certainly take care of results. It is not only our duty to pray with our families around the family altar, but it is also our duty to take them with us when we go to the closet to pray in secret, and thus, in early infancy, sow the seed of piety and grace in their infant hearts and minds, and the Great God that loves little children, who sent his son to die for little children, who, while upon earth, took them up in his arms and blessed them, the Holy One whose great heart yearns for their salvation, will see to it, that in the proper time the harvest shall be gathered to eternal life.

Your child may not now know what father and mother mean by taking them to the closet, bedewing their little heads with the tears of affection prompted by the throbbings of a full soul in prayer to God for mercy and grace upon their loved little babe who now knows nothing of Him with whom the mothers talks and pleads; but still that child has a mind—has a memory—and in after life, as it grows up to maturity and begins to look out upon the world in earnest searching after a knowledge of the object of its creation, and a desire to know the meaning of past events, it will certainly be led back to the times with mother in the closet praying to God, and in the developing of that mind learning that there is a Great God above, the maker of all things, who sent his son into the world to die for fallen man to bring him to God, and feeling as that child would necessarily feel from its teaching, and the Spirit of God that it was a poor condemned sinner in the government of God, with an anxious, earnest desire to be saved it would very reasonably be led to the correct conclusion that the being with whom mother talked in the closet when I was a child, is the God who saves poor wretched sinners from death and hell; and long after your heads are quietly sleeping in the grave, will your prayers and supplications be heard and answered in the salvation of those you loved and for whom you so earnestly prayed.

The duty of reading and studying of the Holy Scriptures is too much neglected among us. The blessed Bible is to all Christians a kind talk and fatherly instruction upon the great work of our salvation—it is our chart and way-mark to the goodly land—it contains all of interest to us in

this life, both of a spiritual and temporal nature. The great truths the Bible unfolds to our enquiring hearts is a mighty bulwark of defence in every time of temptation and trial. It becomes to us a shelter from the stormy blast, when the waves of bitter persecution beat heavily against our little bark, it comes to our hearts graciously assuring us that the good and great God is full of compassion and love to all them that faithfully serve him. Seek, then, to understand it, and turn away from the trashy, sickly, soul-corrupting productions of the present day. Let the Bible be to you the book of books—your guidance to the port of endless bliss. Then with care and earnest prayer, read all other books and periodicals that will assist you in coming to a knowledge of the fullness of Christ.

Brethren, ever keep in mind the great commands of the Bible urging you to a faithful persistence in attending upon the ministry of the word. God has called men of like passions with yourselves, and sent them out over all this land to preach to you the Gospel of His Son. In that Gospel, when coming through a warm heart deeply imbued with the Spirit of Heaven, there is much of life and comfort: it is as food to the soul, insomuch that the true humble Christian feels as did the Psalmist when he said "my heart was glad when it was said to me, let us go up to the House of God." Therefore, forsake not the assembling of yourselves together as the manner of some is, but exhort one another and so much the more as ye see the day approaching, be the more intent if possible, to press on in the good old way our fathers trod, allowing no persuasion to hinder your final success. While on this point we are led to think of the man who had through a long series of years been bending his steps toward the Mount Zion above. While in old age, halting on his crutch to the house of God, pressed down under affliction and infirmity, he was halted by a friend who enquired why it was that at this time of life, he did not give up the house of God and quietly remain at home, urging as a reason why he might do so, his former faithful attending upon the preaching of the word. The old man of God, seeming to rise above infirmity and age, with his face all lighted up with divine love and holy expectation answered in these words: "I have been toiling and striving to gain the blessed shore too long and have gotten too near the end of my journey—too near my long sought home—to stop and turn back now, and loose all my past labor and travel;" and hastened on to the house of God, to hear again the message of divine love and mercy to man.

The duty of fasting is another command we fear is too much neglected. There is no duty more certainly impressed upon the Christian than is the duty of fasting, and in it is found much of that power which is the secret of the success that attends the Christian in his journey through life, strengthening and making him powerful through God, to the pulling down of strongholds. Brethren, remember this duty.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is a means of divine grace to which our attention is solemnly called in the Holy Scriptures. "Do this in remembrance of me." No Christian can wantonly neglect this solemn com-

mand without incurring the sore displeasure of God. See to it brethren, that on all suitable occasions you attend to this last dying request of our common Lord, and so eat His flesh and drink His blood, that your sinful souls may be made better in this life, preparatory to living with God forever in His kingdom above.

A faithful discharge of the duties above named will certainly bring you to a proper appreciation of the Gospel of the Son of God, and gently lead you to look after and attend to and supply all the reasonable wants of those who labor among you in word and doctrine. God has mercifully ordained that those who preach the Gospel shall live of the Gospel. And now, beloved brethren, the very God of peace sanctify you wholly.
