OF THE
HOLSTON ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

ABSTRACT OF THE DAILY JOURNAL.

FIRST DAY,

THURSDAY, OCT. 8, 1868.

The Holston Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in their Chapel in the city of Chattanooga, at 9 o'clock, A.M., Bishop D. W. Clark presiding. The Bishop conducted the opening religious services by reading the 46th Psalm and 1st chapter of John's Gospel; and, after singing, Rev. Dr. Pearne led in prayer. The members of the Conference with emotions of gratitude joined in the communion of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll, and sixty members answered to their names.

On motion, Rev. Jno. F. Spence was re-elected Secretary of the Conference, and J. N. S. Huffaker and John S. Petty Assistants.

Rev. J. J. Manker was elected Statistical Secretary.

Rev. Dr. Pearne presented a resolution on standing committees, which was adopted.

Rev. E. O. Tade, of the Congregational Church, and Rev. James Mitchell, of the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, were introduced to the Conference.

On motion, the session hours of the Conference were fixed between 8½, A.M., and 12, M.

The Chair proceeded to take up the eleventh question.

QUESTION. *Who are the Effective Elders?*

Greer, J. N. S. Huffaker, J. A. Hyden, W. R. Long, N. E. Cobleigh, W. C. Daily, J. W. Mann, R. D. Black, M. H. B. Burkett, W. H. Rogers, J. B. Little, John Forrester, E. Still, P. H. Reed, F. M. Fanning, A. F. English, J. F. Woodfin, B. F. Wells and J. G. Trull, were severally called, approved and passed.

G. C. Andrews was granted a supernumerary relation without appointment.

The 7th and 8th questions were called, and J. F. Spence, G. A. Gowan, James Cumming, R. H. Guthrie, W. H. Duggin, John Ally, T. P. Rutherford, John Leach and A. F. Shannon were severally passed and relation continued.

E. E. Gillenwaters' character passed and located at his own request.

S. B. Harwell, returned, withdrawn from the connection.

The report of the Church Extension Society, also exhibits of the Eastern and Western Book Rooms, were presented and read by the Secretary.

A Committee on Church Finances was raised by the Conference.

On motion, it was agreed that the first half hour of each session should be devoted to religious exercises.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

SECOND DAY.

CHATTANOOGA, October 9, 1867.

The religious exercises were conducted by Rev. F. M. Fanning.

Journal read and approved.

Rev. L. F. Drake, Secretary of the Committee on Nominations, presented their report, which was adopted as a whole.

Circulars from the Sunday School and Tract Societies were presented to the Conference and referred to their appropriate committees.

Rev. Dr. Walden, of the Western Book Concern, Rev. H. Stephens, of the Tennessee, Rev. Dr. Fuller, of the Rock River, Rev. D. W. Hammond, of the Minnesota, Rev. W. H. Black, of the Kentucky, and Rev. C. P. Frame, of the Cincinnati Conferences, were severally presented and introduced to the Conference.

Rev. T. S. Walker, character passed and advanced to a Deacons of the 2d class.

Rev. S. W. Hyden and R. O. Ayres were passed and advanced to Deacons of the 2d class.

Joseph P. Milburn, being absent, character passed and continued as a Deacon of the 2d class.

QUESTION 4th. *Who are the Deacons?*

ANSWER. J. W. Peace, J. N. Stamper, P. L. Chambers and T. R. West, were severally called and passed.

W. P. Jackson was passed and advanced to a Deacon of the 2d class.

James B. Fitzgerald, John Mahoney, H. J. Crumly and Daniel Carter, were represented and passed.

George W. Coleman was passed and elected to Elders orders.

Samuel M. Tate, John Pendergrast and John Cox, were elected to Local Elders Orders.

2d QUESTION. *Who remain on trial?*

ANSWER. John M. Mitchell, John R. Hughes, Samuel Greer, James M. Durham, A. B. Wright, H. H. Burke and Isaac N. Knox, were severally passed and advanced to the second year's probation.

A. G. Watkins, Henry Pile, Thomas K. Clark, Charles R. Mays and Thomas W. Atkin, not being before the committee, were simply passed.

Samuel W. Lee was discontinued at his own request.

Rev. R. D. Black was appointed a Committee on Post Offices.

Rev. G. W. Coleman was appointed Financial Committee for the East Tennessee Wesleyan University.

James McAdams was elected to Local Deacon's Orders and admitted on trial.

Local Deacon's: George H. Carden, Isaac Wofford, Daniel

Hickson, C. J. Crofts, John W. Dodson, B. F. Bryant, Samuel W. Lee and Thos. Hardin, were severally elected to Local Deacons Order.

Communications from the East Tennessee Wesleyan University and Jonesboro' Female College, were presented and referred to the Committee on Education.

After the usual announcements, Conference adjourned.

THIRD DAY.

CHATTANOOGA, October 10, 1868.

The religious exercises were conducted by Rev. L. F. Drake. The journal of yesterday was read, corrected, and approved.

On motion, A. F. English was made supernumerary without appointment.

Rev. A. R. Bennick was continued as the President of the Franklin Institute.

The 2nd question being called, T. R. Welsh and J. G. Trull were represented and passed.

John S. Petty, J. A. Ruble, Thomas H. Cass, Lemuel Bogart, J. L. Cardwell and J. J. Manker, having passed the prescribed course of study were received into full connection.

John S. Petty was elected to Deacon's Orders.

Rev. Dr. Hitchcock, Agent of the Western Book Concern, was introduced to the Conference, and addressed the members concerning the literature of the Church.

The Committee on Church Paper made their report through the Chairman, Prof. John F. Spence.

17th QUESTION. *Where will you have the next Conference?*

ANSWER. Jonesboro'.

Rev. L. F. Drake, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, presented their report, which was adopted.

John H. Jennings was recommended, admitted on trial and elected to Local Elder's Orders.

Rev. Dr. Cobleigh presented and read the report on education.

By order of the Conference, the Chair appointed Dr. T. H. Pearne, W. H. Rogers and L. F. Drake, to examine and report the true condition of the Jonesboro' Female College.

Rev. R. O. Ayres was elected to Elders Order.

George W. Coleman and W. R. Long were appointed a Committee to solicit funds to aid Rev. R. O. Ayres in meeting the loss sustained by having his horse stolen. Committee reported a collection of \$51 25.

J. N. S. Huffaker, Assistant Secretary, was appointed a Committee on Conference Minutes.

Conference adjourned to meet on Monday, at 8½, A.M.

FOURTH DAY.

MONDAY, October 12, 1868.

Conference convened at the appointed hour.

The religious services were conducted by Rev. J. L. Mann.

The journal of the previous session was read and approved.

First question was called and Rev. Daniel Richardson was received on trial, and elected to Deacon's Orders.

Bramwell B. Redwine, Samuel Richardson, Wesley Harkins, M. H. Nichols, James D. Lawson, R. M. Witt, Spencer Henry, John W. Dodson, George Julian, James A. McGriff and Thos. W. Brown, were severally represented and received on trial.

Jeremiah Gudger, Thomas De Witt and Samuel Patterson were received on trial from the Zion Methodist Church; also John C. Tate, Reuben Wallace and Harrison Hunter, were recommended and received on trial.

Report on Church Extension was read and adopted.

Reports on Temperance and Lay Delegation were presented, read and adopted.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to send the published minutes subscribed for by the members to the Presiding Elders.

The Chair announced the Committees on Examination for the ensuing year.

On motion, a Committee of Three, consisting of Prof. J. F. Spence, J. W. Mann and J. J. Dr. N. E. Cobleigh presented circular of the Central Tennessee College, located at Nashville.

Rev. Dr. Pearne presented several resolutions, which were adopted. (See table of resolutions.)

Rev. J. J. Manker, Statistical Secretary, presented his report which was amended for the general minutes, and ordered to be published.

Committee on Sunday Schools presented their report, which was read and adopted.

The Committee appointed to represent our interests in the Jonesboro' Female College, made the following report:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The importance of education to the success and happiness of the individual, to the progress and well being of society, to the strength and usefulness of the Church, has been so often and so well stated, is so generally admitted and so well understood, as not to need re-statement or repetition in this report.

The record of our Church for a hundred years past fully commits her ministers and laymen to this cause. Her liberal offerings and immense sacrifices to the necessities and interests of her literary institutions demonstrate her sincerity and earnestness in this work, while her wonderful and unparalleled success in this line of operation proves the wisdom that has hitherto guided her efforts. If the spirit that animated the fathers still lives in their sons, if the fallen mantels of the departed have been caught up and are worn by those now living and acting, none of our necessary institutions of learning will be long allowed to languish or suffer for lack of either sympathy or support. We have only to pray that the public spirit of our Church may not degenerate—that the Methodism of the future may be as wise, far-seeing, laborious and self-sacrificing, as the Methodism of the past—in order that our schools of learning may be amply endowed, patronized and sustained. In common with all others, the Holston Conference has its full share of responsibility in providing the means and facilities sufficient to meet the educational wants of the Church within its own boundaries. We fondly hope and trust that the eyes that look upon us from without will fail to discover in us any lack of labor or sacrifice to meet manfully our growing responsibilities.

EAST TENNESSEE WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

We learn from the catalogue of our Institution at Athens that its name and title, during the last year, has been slightly changed by the State Legislature so that it is to be known hereafter as the East Tennessee Wesleyan University. The number of students in attendance last year was 120. All things considered it was a prosperous and successful year. Peace and harmony prevailed among the students, who were for the most part well behaved, studious and proficient. Revival influences were among the students and several were converted.

The present scholastic year commenced September 2d. About seventy are already in attendance; a large number of those present last year being detained for a month or two as teachers of free schools in their respective neighborhoods. Although the Institution has but just entered upon its second collegiate year, it has already organized the first three college classes—Freshman, Sophomore and Junior—and these classes are receiving regular instruction in all the branches of study usually pursued by similar classes in older colleges.

JONESBORO' FEMALE COLLEGE.

Your Committee have learned that the Jonesboro' Female College has passed into private hands; but have learned also that the present owner holds himself ready to transfer it to the Conference as soon as the Conference are prepared to reimburse him for the amount he has expended in the payment of college debts and for repairs, amounting at present to a little over \$2,000.

FREE SCHOOLS.

Your Committee is happy to report the successful inauguration of the system of free schools in this State. We look to that system with great expectation for the more general diffusion of the blessings of education. This opens, in every neighborhood, an interesting field of usefulness for the ministry of every Evangelical church. By direct labor, by co-operation with others and by personal influence, our ministers can render valuable services to the cause of virtue and morality in assisting to lay broad and deep the foundation, and build wisely the superstructure of an institution which is destined to become a great power in society.

As the safety and perpetuity of our free civil institutions depend mainly upon the intelligence and virtue of the people, the preachers of righteousness do well for the cause of christian morality when they neglect no favorable opportunity, so far as other duties will allow, to aid and encourage, through free schools, the general diffusion of the blessings of knowledge among all the people. Therefore,

Resolved, 1st, That with great gratitude to Almighty God, we, as a Conference of Christian ministers, hail with delight the establishment of free schools in our State, and regard it as the harbinger of good; for a more general diffusion of light and knowledge among the people, and as a valuable help "to prepare the way of the Lord" for a fuller understanding and a readier appreciation of the word of God that bringeth salvation.

Resolved, 2d, That we will heartily co-operate in all suitable ways in encouraging, establishing and supporting free schools in every community where, in the Providence of God, we are called to labor.

Resolved, That we will endeavor to greatly increase our contributions for the Sabbath School cause during the ensuing year, and will organize new Sabbath Schools wherever practicable.

Resolved, That we will endeavor to supply our Sunday Schools with books and periodicals from our own catalogue.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Church Extension Society, organized by authority of the General Conference, meets a most important demand in the Church. Before this Society was organized, the work of aiding the weak of the newer and feebler parts of the Country was very large. As each Church through its Pastor then sought relief for itself, it is impossible to estimate accurately the aggregate amount thus expended, but it was unquestionably very much greater than at present. But the method, or rather want of method, by which the work was done, necessarily involved the loss of the proper service of the men thus engaged, very disagreeable work for them, great and continual annoyance of those to whom they applied, and the worst possible economy of time and means.

A better method of meeting the wants of the work as it then was, was imperatively demanded, and to meet this necessity the Church Extension Society was organized.

But subsequently the field has been greatly extended and the work enlarged. The population has pressed out upon the frontiers and up into the mountains with astonishing rapidity. Settlements, villages, towns, cities,

have sprung up as by magic. With the wilderness to be claimed, the resources of the country to be developed, residences, business houses, school houses, churches, all to be provided, it is no wonder that the few and feeble, but earnest Christians who are intent on claiming the country for Christ, and planting his kingdom firmly in every growing community, should call earnestly upon the older and wealthier parts of our common heritage for help in their great and vitally important work.

In addition to this greatly enlarged field, the whole South has been opened to us by the hand of God in the war. Multitudes of Methodists, true in their hearts to the old Church and the old Union from the beginning, are looking anxiously to us for a religious home, in which they can have, instead of proscription, Christian sympathy and fellowship. Four millions of freedmen, who have hitherto owned nothing,—not even themselves,—are struggling upward into freedom, intelligence and Christian civilization. They have everything to do, and to procure in order to attain the end toward which they strive. Thousands alienated alike from God and country, have drifted away from all religious influences, and are in the ways of death.

A few heroic men, under immense disadvantages, and in the face of a most cruel opposition are doing nobly for our common cause. God has already given them the most extraordinary success, and they only need in addition to His blessing the united support of the Church, to make that success complete. Their great want, as all who have spoken assure us, is Churches in which to gather the people, and for aid to procure these they most earnestly appeal.

Every consideration of patriotism and religion should prompt us to respond to these appeals. In the light of past history no thoughtful mind will expect a truly united country with a divided Church. It was a division of the Church that led to the attempted division of the country, and sectionalism in the church cannot but promote sectionalism in the nation. So long as true unity must have its foundation—its home in the hearts of the people, so long should all who desire unity and peace set their faces firmly against sectional divisions in every form of organized society. Above all, let Christ's Church, animated by His spirit, discard all sectional lines, and go everywhere, and to all classes, with its proclamation of "Peace on earth; good will toward men," and bring all into the "unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace." "The field is the world." "The world is our parish." This certainly includes the whole of our country. Let us occupy it, and bind it firmly together with the bonds of an old fashioned and homogeneous Methodism.

In almost every part of this vast field, especially in the West and South, embracing more than half of our national domain, the present is our golden opportunity. Society is in its formative state. All the agencies of evil are intensely active; those of the Church must be, or the results will be disastrous to the public virtue that affords the only security to our form of Chris-

tian civilization and civil government. Now a comparatively little will accomplish more than millions when society shall have crystalized into permanent forms.

We are deeply convinced that there never has been a time or a field in which liberal sowing would yield so rich a harvest; that there is not now an agency through which the Church can accomplish greater and more permanent good, than it can through the Church Extension Society. Therefore,

Resolved, 1st, That the Church Extension Society is entitled to, and shall receive our most cordial and earnest co-operation.

Resolved, 2d, That the following persons be appointed to constitute a Board of Church Extension for this Conference: Thomas H. Pearne, President; W. H. Rogers, Vice President; J. F. Spence, Corresponding Secretary; J. J. Manker, Recording Secretary; John W. Mann, Treasurer; T. R. Stanley, J. A. Hyden, J. L. Murphy, Managers.

Resolved, 3d, That the Presiding Elders be instructed to apportion the amount for which the General Committee may ask this Conference, among the several districts and pastoral charges for collection, and that each preacher in charge shall report at our next session, along with his missionary collection the amount asked and received for Church Extension.

Resolved, 4th, That we recommend that, so far as practicable, this collection be taken in the month of May.

Subscriptions and donations for the Church Extension Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, may be sent to the Treasurer, at Philadelphia, or paid to the Presiding Elder of the district, or the Preacher, in the circuit or station to which the contributor belongs.

TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance desire to make the following report:

It must be admitted that the great curse of our country is intemperance. Carefully prepared statistics show that 60,000 lives are annually *destroyed*

in the United States by its ravages. 100,000 are yearly sent to prison in consequence of strong drink. 200,000 children are sent to the *poor-house*; 300 *murders* are committed; 400 *suicides*; 200,000 orphans are thrown upon the cold charity of the world, and \$200,000 are annually required to carry on this *fearful*, this *shocking* amount of crime in the United States.

But to be more specific. Intemperance creates *disease* and causes premature *death*—intemperance destroys the *peace* and *security* of society—intemperance causes *heavy taxes*, and as a consequence *impoverishes* a country—intemperance produces *miser*y and *wretchedness* wherever its accursed effects are felt—intemperance is the *parent of crime*. Judge Patterson, of England, once said, in addressing a grand jury: "If it were not for this *drinking* you and I would have nothing to do." Another eminent judge said: "There is scarcely a *crime* comes before me that is not, directly or indirectly, caused by strong drink." And last but not least of the terrible results of intemperance that we would call attention to, is that it sends *untold millions* of souls to a *drunkard's hell*.

Is it not time then that the Church was more fully awake to this important subject? Oh! when shall our country be redeemed from the terrible consequences of this growing evil? What country has not been invaded by this great national enemy? What community has not, as the results of this pestilential foe, been visited with *brawls*, *indecent exposures* and *shocking scenes* of barbarity? What Church has not suffered from inroads made by this enemy of all righteousness? What family circle has been too sacred for the encroachments of this heartless and relentless destroyer?

Shall we quietly submit to the fearful depredations of this fell monster? Individually we can do very little, but as a Conference *we can do much*. Let us lift our banners and in the strength of Divine Grace raise our voices against the multiplied thousands of distilleries and dram shops that are filling our land with the wail of the drunkard's widow and our prisons with the drunken culprit. Therefore,

Resolved, 1st, That as a Conference, in view of the terrible results of intemperance in our midst, we will use our best endeavors, by precept and example, by every means in our power, to stay its progress.

Resolved, 2nd, That we will give our influence to all temperance organizations that in our judgment will tend to carry forward this great work.

Resolved, 3rd, That we will never give up the struggle until intemperance shall be banished from our land, and morality, Christian love and friendship shall reign triumphant to the glory of the great Redeemer.

At no time in the history of the Church of God have there been such demands for the Bible as now, both in our own and other lands. The Living God has now given an open door to the free circulation of the Bible in all the commercial centres of the earth. From all parts of our own glorious country loud and impressive calls for the Bible come up. In view of the foregoing facts, your Committee offer the following resolutions for your adoption, viz:

Resolved, 1st, That the American Bible Society now, as ever, has the entire confidence of this Conference, and that we will give increased attention to the Bible cause the ensuing year.

Resolved, 2nd, That we will at all times encourage the agents of this Society when they come into our different charges and *ask our aid.*

Resolved, 3rd, That we do now organize ourselves into a Bible Society to be known as the East Tennessee Bible Society, auxiliary to the American Bible Society, and recommend the following brethren as its officers for the ensuing year: Dr. Cobleigh, President; J. A. Hyden, Vice President; J. W. Mann, Secretary; J. J. Manker, Treasurer; J. F. Spence, F. M. Fanning, W. C. Graves, Managers.

STATE OF THE COUNTRY.

Your Committee on the State of the Country respectfully report :

We solemnly recognize the fact that we are ministers of the gospel—pastors of the flock of Christ. Yet our rights and responsibilities, as *citizens*, are not necessarily thereby abridged, much less destroyed. We are not the less citizens because ministers. We are not, indeed, called to bear office for honor or profit; for we already hold the highest, most honorable and profitable one which a human being can wield.

As citizens, we have a vital stake in the maintenance of order, liberty and righteousness. To preserve and establish these is at once our interest and our duty; for without them Christianity itself could not prosper. In aiding to promote these important ends, we must assert the unquestionable and untrammelled exercise of the ballot, for ministers not less than laymen.

The right of freedom of speech and of the press must be maintained. This is indispensable, in a government like ours, to preserve our liberties as a people, the purity of our laws, the virtue of our public officers, and the highest welfare of the State. Only interested partisans or unscrupulous demagogues, with base ends in view, will denounce the just exercise of this right of free speech by ministers, on any and all questions affecting the public weal.

We hold it a duty enforced alike by the Bible and our own articles of religion, to maintain and teach, both by example and precept, allegiance to the State and nation, to offer prayers for our rulers, to render them the respect and honor to which official authority entitles them by the will of God.

We also regard it the duty of ministers, citizens of the State or of the Republic, to expose and oppose with the light and force of truth—not as partisans, but as patriots—whatever in our laws and institutions is unrighteous, and therefore injurious.

Caste legislation, founded upon distinctions of race or color, is unjust in principle and dangerous in tendency. Persistence in it must work disturbance of civil order and must seriously interrupt the progress of a pure Christianity.

We note, with painful regret, the distraction, violence, bloodshed and recklessness of life, so fearfully prevalent in many parts of this and neighboring States. Sad, indeed, is it, to reflect upon oft-repeated instances of murder among us, causing terrorism and anxiety in the public mind. In many cases—perhaps in most—these criminal deeds result from a wicked disregard of the sacred obligations of law and justice, and from the presence and power of a blinding spirit of sectional prejudice and hatred. To the extent that they pass unrebuked and unpunished, they destroy the peace as they endanger the stability of the State.

These facts should summon us as ministers to instruct, with meekness,

those who oppose themselves, to inculcate from the pulpit the moral obligation resting upon all to obey the laws, to thus "put them in mind to be subject to principalities and to obey magistrates," to teach them that "they who resist the power, resist the ordinance of God, and shall receive unto themselves damnation."

We recommend for adoption the following resolutions:

1. *Resolved*, That Christianity is the surest safeguard and support of all good government, and therefore we are doubly interested, both as ministers and citizens, in fulfilling our high commission, and so subserving the welfare of the State.

2. *Resolved*, That our duties to the State, as citizens, cannot consistently be neglected.

3. *Resolved*, That we will endeavor, by prayers and good examples, and in the spirit of Christian charity, to promote, in the State, that "righteousness," which "exalteth a nation."

4. *Resolved*, That the present distracted and unhappy condition of the States lately in rebellion, is injurious to religion and to every valuable public interest, and should elicit the prayers and efforts of all Christians for its improvement.

"LAY DELEGATION."

Resolved, 2. That the Presiding Elders are expected to see that each Quarterly Conference in their respective districts appoint two laymen to co-operate with the preacher in charge in giving due notice of the election, and superintending its details.

Memoirs.

REV. DAVID FLEMING was born in Carlisle county, Pennsylvania, May 4th, 1779. When six months old his parents removed from Pennsylvania to Wythe county, Virginia. He was converted October 30th, 1820, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church; was licensed to preach September

20th, 1823, at Nelson's Camp Ground, Washington county, Tennessee, and sent to the New River Circuit in Virginia.

In the Fall of 1824, at the organization of the Holston Conference, young FLEMING was admitted on trial and sent to the Jonesboro' Circuit. For a period of forty-five years Brother FLEMING was in the traveling connexion, eighteen years of this time on circuits and in stations, and twenty years on districts, and for the last seven years of his life was on the list of superannuates.

December 10th, 1829, Brother FLEMING was married to Miss Mary Miller, of Hawkins county, Tennessee, a noble woman, a true Christian and one every way qualified to be the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher.

Without any disparagement to others, it may be said of DAVID FLEMING that he was one of the most laborious men that ever belonged to the Holston Conference. The life of Brother FLEMING has now passed into history, and we give the following as the most important points in the life of this great and good man. His uniform piety made good impressions in all the social and Christian circles where he moved and commanded for him universal respect. Through life, both in principle and practice, he was opposed to the great evil of African slavery; and when the Methodist Episcopal Church divided upon this great question in 1844, Brother FLEMING gave his consent to the separation, as one of the evils which he could not control; and when the great struggle came for our nationality DAVID FLEMING did not hesitate but declared himself in favor of the Government and free institutions, and on the first opportunity united his fortunes again with the Methodist Episcopal Church. Perhaps no one rejoiced more than Brother FLEMING to get back again to the Church of his first love.

Brother FLEMING was a solid man and a useful preacher. In the circulation of our books and periodicals he stood in the front rank. To the young preachers he was always kind, and to the children affectionate. For seven years he was a great sufferer, his memory almost entirely failing him, and at times, so much so that he did not even recognize his own family. In the last intelligent conversation which he ever had he remarked, in answer to a question from a brother in the ministry, to-wit: "Do you feel that God is with you in your affliction?" "Oh yes! oh yes! all the time."

On August 28th, 1868, this faithful man of God exchanged the toils and tented fields of earth for the rest and palaces of Heaven.

Chattanooga, October 10, 1868.

Rev. WILLIS INGLE was born in the State of Virginia, as near as we can learn, about the year 1798. In early life he was converted to God, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church; was licensed to preach when comparatively a young man, and for nearly forty years was engaged in preaching the gospel of Christ. For the first several years he served the Church as a local preacher with great acceptability and usefulness. About 1838 or

40 he joined the Holston Annual Conference, and continued in the traveling connexion until the day of his death, which occurred October 29, 1867.

Brother INGLE was an excellent preacher and faithful in the performance of all the duties of his high and holy calling. He was one of our best revival preachers, and large numbers were converted under his ministry. It is due to the memory of our departed brother to say that through life he was opposed to African slavery, and was always devoted to the doctrines and discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, as given to us by the fathers of American Methodism.

At the outbreak of the rebellion Brother INGLE was living in Virginia. He was a firm believer in the doctrines of the Declaration of Independence, and one of the faithful among the many faithless to the cause of our Government.

At the reorganization of our Conference here, Brother INGLE was one of the first to unite with us, and remained with us doing efficient service until the Master said, "It is enough, come up higher."
