

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
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

### 1.—Historical View Since Organization in 1836.

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in the Virginia, and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conferences. In the year 1836 the General Conference set up a North Carolina Conference. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned there were two Conferences.

Statistical session ordered. On motion, a statistical session was ordered for the afternoon, and the Bishop appointed Robert Smith to preside.

Adjournment. After the announcements, on motion of A. H. Newsome, Conference adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock p. m., with the singing of the doxology and the benediction by Bishop Joyce.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Conference met at 2 o'clock p. m. in statistical session, Robert Smith presiding by appointment of the Bishop. Devotions were conducted by Daniel Brooks.

Reports filed. The chairman called for reports and the pastors responded, reporting to the Conference treasurer and statistical secretary.

Adjournment. After announcements, Dr. Dunham came forward and, according to appointment, conducted the pentecostal service. Dr. Dunham asked that the services be concluded with the "Quaker Benediction," and the congregation joined in a hearty hand shaking.

The Bishop introduced Rev. T. B. Neely, D. D., secretary Introductions of the Sunday School Union and Tract Society, and Rev. D. H. Kearse, of the South Carolina Conference. Dr. Neely ad-Dr. Neely ad-Dr. Neely dressed the Conference in the interest of his work.

Question seven, "Who have been admitted into full con-Question nection?" was taken up. The class was called forward, "A charge to keep I have" was sung, and prayer was offered by Bishop Joyce. The Bishop delivered a magnificent address to the class. John W. Simpson passed in character, reported his work, and, having completed the prescribed course of

studies for the first two years, was admitted into full connection, elected to deacon's orders and advanced to the studies of the third year. John H. Lovell and Stephen A. Peters, professors in Bennett College, were passed in character, and having completed the prescribed course of studies, were admitted into full connection, elected to deacon's orders and advanced. Robert W. Winchester passed in character, reported his work and was admitted into full connection, having been previously ordained deacon.

Question five. Question five, "Who have been continued on trial?" was taken up. William M. Wells, William B. Scales and Sylvester J. Hayden passed in character, reported their work and having completed the first year's course of studies, were advanced to the studies of the second year.

Question thirteen was resumed. S. A. J. Miller, whose case was referred at the last session to the presiding elder of the Western District, no grounds for charges having been found after investigation, was passed in character.

#### MEMORIAL AND PETITION

To the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Held May, 1904, at Los Angeles, California.

Memorial touching the Southwestern Christian Advocate,

Reverend Fathers and Brethren:

We, your petitioners of the North Carolina Conference, with a ministerial membership of 75 and a lay membership of 11,555, respectfully petition you to request the Book Committee to supply the Southwestern Christian Advocate, New Orleans, La, during the present year with a complete printing outfit, including job

press, Linotype and a variety of advertising type and such other requirements and modern appliances necessary to print said paper and to do the current job work of the day. We present the following reasons for making this petition:

First. Such an outfit would bring the paper to self-support in a much shorter time than the present plan can secure. The following obstructions so long as they exist, will prevent our reaching the desired end, viz: (1) The printing of the paper upon presses not owned by the church in New Orieans. (2) The high price of union labor. (3) No chance to do job work. Thus we are brought face to face every year with the disappointing fact that our honest endeavor to meet the requirement of the church that we come to self-support is foredoomed to failure. Experience and observation convince us that, with a larger subscription list than we have had hitherto, with such an outfit we can make that paper a greater power in the life of the church.

Second. Such an outfit would enable us to use the efficient labor of our young men and women trained in the typographical art. This departure would render a fourfold benefit to our whole cause. First, it would free us from the fluctuations and competitions of high priced union labor. Second, with these increased facilities we could compete for job work and thus reduce our expenses and increase our savings. Third, it would enable us to do for the large number of well equipped young men and women from our schools what the church has not been able to do up to the present in her publishing houses in New York city, Cincinnati and Chicago.

The labor unions have made it practically impossible for the church to take these sable sons into her printing departments. With the outfit we here ask for, we could employ many of this increasing number of efficient workmen and not Le forced to the high water mark of prices for labor. This act alone would strengthen the educational and industrial work of schools and inspire our young men and women to increase their efficiency in these lines. Fourth, with the sense of a larger responsibility with such an outfit and with a growing desire for self-support, we are confident that our whole constituency would rally as never before to the support of the paper and make it self-supporting.

In view of these facts and of the sincere desire of the supporters of the paper to lift it from the list of charity papers so undesirable by the church, we hope that the prayer of your petitioners will be granted.

> Whereas, The interest for several years on notes for sums loaned Bennett (ollege are past due and principal unpaid,

> Be it Resolved, First, that we accept one year's interest for all due up to date.

Second. That we thank the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society for assuming the debt, of \$614.74 now covered by a personal note of J. D. Chavis.

That the Conference accept partial payments on the principal from time to time, and that the special fund raised for Bennett College shall be forwarded to the main office of the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society.

Treasurer ordered to give bond.

On motion, Daniel Brooks, treasurer of Conference, was required to give bond equal to all moneys held by him. M. M. Jones, M. J. Bullock and Robert Smith representing the trustees were appointed a committee to arrange with Daniel Brooks a satisfactory bond.

On motion of A. H. Newsome, the Conference adjourned' the benediction being pronounced by Bishop Joyce.

# FOR THE ELECTION OF A BISHOP OF AFRICAN DESCENT.

A Memorial and Petition from the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church to the General Conference to be Held in Los Angeles, Cal., May, 1904.

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, composed of 75 ministers and representing a membership of 11,555, desire to bring to your attention a matter that is of thegravest importance to us and must be of interest to all who love our glorious church. We respectfully memorialize and petition you to elect a Bishop of African descent, and we present the following reasons for such petition:

First. The need of such an officer among us was forcefully and unmistakably declared by the last General Conference in the following lucid statement, Report No. 5, Journal page 250; "In the election of Bishops there should be no discrimination on account of race or color, but men should be chosen because of their worth and fitness for the position" In the presence of this statement, often reiterated by various bodies of our church, we believe the time has come when the General Conference may safely and wisely choose a Bishop from among our seventeen hundred ministers of African descent, and we recognize the need of such an officer among our people of African descent. Taking this judgment to be expressive of the mind and heart of the church, and speaking out of a burdened experience, we affirm it as our deliberate judgment that our Episcopal Board would be greatly strengthened in its work for the race by the addition of a Bishop of African descent.

Second. Episcopal Methodism can prosper and come to its largest fruitage only by constant social as well as the intellectual and ecclesiastical touch, work and inspiration of the Episcopacy.

· · · Third. · We are struggling to maintain ourselves in the midst of

three distinct negro Methodisms that have twenty-three Bishops who are at work incessantly among those of Methodist persuasion to influence them to join their churches, We are at great disadvantage to hold our members and young people and bring our churches to greater efficiency by reason of the taunts and humilation to which we are subjected because of our having no Episcopal representative of our race.

Fourth. While recognizing with you the necessity of our coming to self-support, we find ourselves seriously hampered in our effort to attain it. A Bishop of the race who will reside among us and assist us by his presence, his counsel, his ecclesiastical leadership, would do much to hasten this greatly desired end. We also recognize that according to the social and unwritten but all powerful laws of the section in which we mostly live, our Bishops are hindered and embarrassed in doing for us much that they otherwise would. The election of a Bishop of African descent will greatly relieve this unpleasant situation.

Fifth. We believe the work of the church will be advanced by such an election as it has been by no other act in recent years that bears upon our Southern work.

Sixth. We are confident that the proverbial prudence of the Board of Bishops would prompt them to so arrange the appointments of a colored Bishop as would not disturb the social preferences of the majority nor humiliate the minority represented by your petitioners, and at the same time do no violence to the constitution of the church.

Finally, we believe in the present and past Godly administration of the Board of Bishops over our work, and do not wish to have this petition construed as evidencing a desire on our part to sever the pleasant and highly beneficial relation existing between us. For it simply grows out of the facts, embarrassments and hindrances for which neither our Bishops nor ourselves are responsible. We know and reverence them and our earnest wish is that the tie between the two races, formed by the Methodist Episcopal church and the work carried forward by her general officers. may be developed and strengthened and that it may continue to be seen of the world that we are one in Christ Jesus.

#### GREENSBORO DISTRICT.

# M. J. BULLOCK, PRESIDING ELDER.

DEAR BRETHREN: I feel it a great privilege to report to you the condition of the Greensboro District.

We give thanks to Almighty God for having spared our lives and for blessing us with health and strength during this Confer-

Bishop Walden appointed me to this district one year ago. Some of the good points were taken off and mission points added. I felt that I must necessar ly have a hard year's work, but with renewed energy and consecration and perfect trust in our Heavenly Father

I entered the field to do my best in His name.

The brethren have worked faithfully, and though we have not accomplished all we had hoped, yet we are thankful to report that we have made some improvement. The motto has been "A step forward, but never a step backward." Just how far we have suc-

ceeded will be seen by the reports of the pastors.

There is a vast extent of unoccupied territory on this district from Raleigh to Noriolk, Va., and from N rfolk to Danville, Va., and we may say to Reidsville. I have visited several of the towns in the east - Scotland Neck, Halifax, Littleton and Warrenton. If we had men and money to work in these towns and others I believe the east would pay as well as any other part of the State. There are a good many people in the east. We hope to gather them some day. They need our church and schools in the east

There are 16 charges on the district, 9 of which are missions.

Some of them are poor.

#### EDUCATION.

I have tried to encourage our young people to attend some one of our schools and read good literature, and most especially have I urged them to read our church papers I have distributed tracts and sold some books and Bibles. Our church school, Bennett College, is on this district—Its opening this year was larger than it has been for several years. The president and faculty are planning to build a dining hall and the bricks are being made and put on the ground. Every minister should be interested in this school and work for its success. It is our school and its success depends largely upon us. Let us rally to its support

Kent Home, under the supervision of Miss Crowell and her coworkers, opened up with a bright prospect. She has succeeded in putting in a heating plant, and a good deal of other work has been done. The home is much more comfortable than before. This is

the place for our girls.

I have preached and lectured in the schools at Henderson, Oxford, Raleigh and other places where I found an opportunity.

#### REVIVALS.

Nearly every charge has been blessed with a glorious revival.

Many have professed faith in Christ and were added to the church. I urged the study of God's word and the practice of the same.

#### TEMPERANCE.

We have a temperance committee on each charge and some of them are doing good work. They are leaving off snuff and tobacco and strong drink. We hope the work will grow.

#### BENEVOLENCE.

I have urged the benevolences in all the quarterly conferences and congregations. The reports of the pastors will show that the work is improving slowly.

#### TEMPORAL WORK.

I have examined as many of our church deeds as I could get hold of and found all as the discipline of the church requires. have urged that all the church property be well insured. have built 3 new churches this year, one of which is finished. have bought 4 church lots, and on 2 of them are new churches.

The W. H. M. S. is doing good work in some places on the district. We pray God's blessings upon them.

#### SUMMARY OF THE WORK.

CENTRAL RANDOLPH. - A new church has been organized, church lot bought and a neat church has been built. The work is good. Benevolent collection double that of last year.

DURHAM AND CREEDMORE.—W. M. Wells, Pastor. At Durham nothing has been done. The church at Creedmore has been

East Greensboro.—R. D. Bethea, Pastor. A new church has been built at Bass's and it is nicely painted. A church lot is being

bought on High street. The work is doing well.
St. Matthews M. E. Church.—This church will speak for itself. For all purposes the church has raised about \$3,000 this year. The parsonage has been covered, painted and fitted with blinds. The pastor and trustees have worked earnestly to build the new church, which, when completed, will be the best church in the Conference. It is hoped that the new church will be enclosed before winter.

LEAKSVILLE .- M. Mundy, Pastor. This is one of the leading charges on the district. The pastor and members are planning to

# WESTERN DISTRICT.

#### M. M. JONES, PRESIDING ELDER.

BISHOP AND MEMBERS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFER-

Dear Brethren: Your humble servant begs leave to submit the following third annual report as presiding elder of the Western District.

Accompanied by the band of loyal Christian ministers committed to my care, I hastened to my field of labor and began to sow the seeds of righteousness. Oftentimes we sowed in tears, but having obtained help from God we have continued until this day. I entered upon the discharge of my duty fully determined by the help of God and a united effort of the ministers of the gospel and their several congregations, to win the battle for God and humanity. With such a determination and a steady march upon the common foe of Christianity, we have had success, although our way seemed dark and the paths through which we have passed were turbulent with difficult things to conquer. We feel grateful indeed to our Heavenly Father for His watchful care over us and the preservation of our health and strength.

Notwithstanding the exodus among the people during the year affecting us seriously along all lines, we regard the success of the district as being remarkable. For three years I have traveled this district from the snow capped peaks of the Blue Ridge to the fertile valleys of the Catawba, and from hilitops to plains, suffering the privations that usually characterize such labors in the western section of the State. I have gladly visited the charges of the district, and generally speaking much advancement has been made.

Great interest has been manifested in each department of our church work. Gaining souls for Christ and extending the borders of the church have had close attention. Special efforts have been put forth by our ministers for a revival of religion and in no small degree have they been successful. Hundreds of souls who were bound by the gods of this world have been gathered into the church. Great spiritual interest has been demonstrated and the spiritual growth among the members of the church is substantially increasing.

#### EDUCATION.

I have urged the pastors to preach on education, to canvass their charges and endeavor to stimulate an interest in the education of our youth by distributing catalogues and circulars of our institutions. I have lectured to our young people as follows: Two colleges, three academies, ten graded schools, twenty-five district schools and lectured twenty times on education in our churches. Our people are realizing the need of Christian education. We are expecting a large number to enter school this fall, some at Bennett and others at the Industrial School and Home at Asheville.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE.

We have on this district 53 Sunday schools, 270 officers and teachers. 2,295 scholars of all grades. The average att adance has been 1,480. Three-fourths of the Sunday school scholars are old enough to attend public worship in our congregations. One-fifth of the scholars in the Sunday schools are from non-church going families. Most of the schools run all the year. Some stop in the winter. We use the wholesome literature coming from our publishing houses Dr. C. C. Jacobs, field agent of the Sunday School Union, has done great good on the Western District in helping to organize new schools and getting literature. He attended our Convention and District Conference and rendered us valuable service. Presiding Elder I. Wells visited our District Conference and preached to the delight of all.

We have 20 Epworth League Chapters, 325 active members, 125 associate. We are expecting great success in our league work.

#### TEMPERANCE.

We have spent much of our time in preaching and lecturing on temperance. The results have been marvelous. Many have given up snuff, tobacco and drink. We will continue to war against intemperance until our church and land are free from the curse.

#### BENEVOLENCE.

I have urged the benevolent collections in all the Quarterly Conferences and congregations. The reports of the pastors will show that we are advancing. Our motto was the same as last year, "A report without a blank, and some increase for each cause."

#### TEMPORAL WORK.

I have carefully examined all deeds of church property in my district and find that in most cases they conform strictly to the law and form of the discipline. I have urged that all of the church property be well insured. The indebtedness on the district is less than last year. I take not the glory to myself for the success which has attended labors in this district during the year, but I give due credit to the noble pastors who have labored with me and made this success possible. The brethren who have labored with me in this district are to be commended for their efforts; but for them there could have been no advancement made. I have traveted through my district preaching two and three times each Sabbath and often during the week. Administered the Lord's Supper nearly as often. Perhaps I can have you see the field of operation more clearly by a detailed statement of the several charges.

ASHEVILLE.—Rev Samuel McDonald has successfully managed his congregation. His usefulness to them as a gospel minister is highly esteemed. The faithful little congregation at Asheville is working hard on their new church. We hope to interest the whole

Conference in this important place.

FOREST CITY.—Rev. J. C. Robbins has for three years successfully led the people at this place. The charge is in a good condition. They are planning to build at Brook's Chapel.

GASTONIA AND BESSEMER — Rev. R. A Cottingham has charge. This church has made great progress during the year. The pastor

has given earnest attention to his work.

HICKORY AND NEWTON—Rev. Robert Smith has marshalled things with a steady hand. The new church is finished and the people gather there in large numbers to worship. They ask for the tonference in 1904.

LENOIR. - Rev. J. W. Wells has done a good year's work. The

spiritual condition of the charge is good.

MACHPELAH.—Rev. G. W. Brower is in charge. His work has been well managed. He has the respect and confidence of the people. They are preparing to build at Rock Hill.

MAYHEW.—Rev. J C. Addie has charge, and under his watchful

care everything has gone on to success

PATTERSON. – Rev. P. F. Johnson entered this charge with a determination to win and his efforts were not fruitless. The work is

#### TEMPERANCE.

#### EPWORTH LEAGUE AND SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Our district Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held in St. Paul Church, Winston, August 12-16. Prof. Jas. A. McRae, the efficient district president, had the work well in hand. The attendance was good. We have twenty leagues and forty-four Sunday schools organized into missionary societies. They use the literature from our own publishing houses.

#### LITERATURE.

I have distributed not a few tracts. Solicited about 100 subscribers to our periodicals, with this thought in mind: The more intelligent our people become concerning our church institutions the more they will contribute to its success.

# CHURCH EXTENSION.

To our minds it is hard to over rate the merits of the work of this society. The danger is and has been of not getting a true estimate of its value. We here record with unspeakable delight the good record made by this great institution.

From 1866, the time of the organiztaion of this society, to November 1, 1902, the board collected and disbursed \$7,748,781.24. Of this the general fund, derived chiefly from collections, bequests and personal gifts, for frontier churches \$250 each, and mountain funds \$100 each, has aggregated \$4,803,888.53. The annuity and loan fund, including loans returned, amount to \$2,944,792.71, making

the total above given.

Our Conference has shared the disbursement of this enormous income as is shown by the following: Collections from the church from the beginning of this work up to November 1, 1902, the fiscal year of the board, aggregates \$2,972.78. 128 churches within the bounds of our Conference have received help by donations \$22,284.09 and by loans \$6,500. Our Conference is asked to raise for the ensuing year only \$350, and needy churches can, on application, receive \$550.

We deplore the fact that the credit of our Conference does not warrant a loan at this time. It becomes us to labor with holy diligence to put ourselves on better financial relations with the board. We know by personal letters from one of the secretaries the prostrated financial condition of our standing with the board. Let us as we go to our fields make this matter a prayerful study and double our collections for this cause. We ought to do it. The "Christianity in Earnest" will greatly help us to this end. It is a magazine affording no little current information as well as thrilling and helpful thoughts, and it ought to be carefully read by every member of the church

The condition of our churches in the leading hamlets, towns and cities, such as Wilmington, Goldsboro, Asheville, Charlotte, Greensboro, Winston, Durham, Reidsville, Danville, Norfolk, Newport News, Portsmouth and many other places, certainly appeals to us in thunder tones and intense pathos and should move us onward to greater liberality for this one cause. Beautiful churches in the places named would mean volumes for our Methodism in the

bounds of this Conference.

We record with much regret the decrease in the collections for this Conference year of \$24. May this never occur again, but may the good work move forward untill upon each highway, in each village, town and city there shall be a beautiful Methodist Episcopal church.

# EDUCATION.

We most heartily commend the excellent work that is being accomplished by the board for higher Christian education. We note with pleasure the increased attendance for the past year, which has reached the number of 48.000, and also the special gifts to the Board of Education, and we unreservedly commend it to the benevolence of our people, particularly to those who are able to make large gifts. We especially approve of the emphasis laid upon educational excellence and genuine spirituality as a true ideal for our schools

The local advantages of our schools are such that any one of very small means can enter them. Since these schools have been estab-

lished in the southland 275,000 of our boys and girls have been en-

rolled in them. They have sent out 13,000 graduates and 33 of this number are now doing effective work in Africa.

During the past year the board aided students who gave their home residences or church relationship as within the bounds of our Conference to the number of eleven and to the amount of \$200. The aggregate contributions of our Conference received by the board were only \$330. Our minutes show a large number of charges not contributing to this cause at all. We urge that public collections be taken, aside from the regular collections, and that Children's Day be always observed, and a collection taken on every charge according to the discipline.

We commend the officers of the board for their energy in collecting loans, and we urge all beneficiaries within our own Conference

to make payments as promptly as possible.

The reports of Drew Theological Seminary, Boston University, Garrett Biblical Institute and our own Bennett College show an onward movement toward the summit of higher Christian education. Let us pledge ourselves to renewed zeal in pushing the claims of the board before our congregations and in endeavoring to increase its collections.

Your committee further desires to call the attention of our youth to Bennett College, with Kent Industrial Home for Girls, at Greensboro, and to our Allen Industrial Home at Asheville. It is with pride also that we point our young men who feel the call to preach to the superior advantages offered by our Theological Seminaries both North and South.

Your committee further urges upon our people their duty to Bennett College, and offer for the consideration of the Conference

the following resolution:

Resolved, That we will cheerfully co operate in providing for the increased attendance in Bennett College by raising every cent that to each of our charges.

#### EPWORTH LEAGUE.

It is a matter of great satisfaction to the Methodist Episcopal church that it has succeeded in organizing the young people of Methodism into a distinctively Methodist young people's society known as the Epworth League. The great growth of the league to 30,000 chapters with an approximate membership of two million is a striking evidence of the need of such an organization, and further that there is a place in the church for it. The growth also indicates that the league has had the blessings and favor of God.

We are glad to learn that there are fully 2,500 chapters and 100,-000 members in our twenty colored conferences, and we pray that this army of young Christian workers may be greatly augmented in the ensuing conference year. We recognize in the league the means to the end of saving our young people. In view of its need, growth and usefulness to the church, therefore be it resolved,

First, That we make every effort possible to organize a chapter of the Senior League, and Junior League as well, in every church

within the bounds of our Conference.

Second, That we make renewed efforts to distribute among our leagues the literature of the league, such as the Epworth Herald. the Responsive Service, Epworth Pledges, etc., that we may have the aids for league work.

Third. That inasmuch as the board of control has called for a collection from each league for the general expenses of the league. the same to be taken once each year, we pledge ourselves to take the collection the ensuing Conference year so that at the next Conference not a charge shall fail to be represented.

Fourth, That we publish in the minutes this year the charges which contributed to the general Epworth League expenses with

names and amounts sent in.

Fifth, We are glad to have Assistant General Secretary Penn with us and pledge our continued support to him in the prosecution of the league work.

#### STATE OF THE CHURCH.

There are in the bounds of the North Carolina Conference 151 church buildings erected and dedicated to Almighty God. These churches were built at a cost of \$114,510, and there are 34 parsonages built at a cost of \$10,285, making a total of \$124,795.

We have 76 appointments under the fatherly care of four presiding elders and 72 self-sacrificing gospel ministers of the Lord Jesus

Christ. whose salaries average about \$235 year.

Our statistics show that we have forty-two appointments without parsonages, including the four districts, although the record shows that worthy improvements are being made at different points for which the pastors and their people are to be commended.

In these churches we have gathered 11,065 members, including the Sunday schools, that are being trained in the principles and teachings of Jesus Christ. Their souls are warmed at the fires of

the prayer meetings, class meetings and the preached gospel of the world's Redeemer every week.

We have some indebtedness, but not beyond control within a reasonable length of time. Statistics show that the debts are rapidly being paid off, and many of our congregations are now free from

debt.

We further notice that the number of baptised infants is comparatively small, and we recommend that all of our ministers preach special sermons on this all-important subject and thus stimulate the parents to put into practice their duty to themselves, their children, their church and their God.

Many of our charges have had soul-stirring revivals and many penitents have been brought to realize the benefits of Christ's atone-

ment through faith in his blood.

Notwithstanding all of these victories there is a great unrest among our people. Thousands of them are going north, east and

west. Class legislation, discriminations, small wages, political pressure and lynch laws have disturbed the peace of our people. These things, in the main, are driving our people from the South. Yet while many of our churches have been depleted in membership by this immigration idea, we are glad to note that not one under the Christian instructions of our church has been lynched or even accused of the "nameless crime."

It is to be feared that our people who go away will be lost to our church, the church of their choice and love. Circumstances make this possible. Then let us act discreetly by urging them to seek the old church in their new situations, or to act like Barbara Heck, organize themselves into congregations and write one of our Bishops

to send them a pastor.

Let us keep the M. E. Church prominently before our people by giving them a clear conception of its purposes and work. Let us make clear to them Christ's purpose in the gospel commission and prove to thom that the M. E. Church is the fulfillment of John's "New Jerusalem" which he saw coming down from God out of heaven.

We recognize in the Sunday school one of our most important factors in the religious and educational life of our people. The

total Sunday school population in the United States is more than 13,150,000, of which there are in the Methodist Episcopal church over 32,390 Sunday schools with 351,402 officers and teachers and more than 2,758,429 scholars. The literature for the Sunday schools supplied by the Methodist Episcopal church and published by our own Book Concern is the best for the purpose that can be obtained.

We congratulate ourselves on having at the head of this important department of our church work Dr. T. B Neely, by whose untring efforts our Sunday school literature has been improved and

our Sunday school work has received new life.

We feel sure that the church has made no mistake in appointing Dr. C. C. Jacobs as field agent for the Sunday School Union. His efforts to organize new Sunday schools, increase the circulation of literature and raise collections for the Sunday School Union are meeting with success.

We urge that our pastors and presiding elders see that our literature is used in our Sunday schools. We also recommend that the Home Department be established in connection with all of our

Sunday schools.

The Tract Society of the Methodist Episcopal church is aiding much in circulating religious sentiment throughout the world. During the past year it has distributed tracts to the soldiers in nearly every camp, sailors upon every sea and to prisoners in every country. We recommend that our pastors avail themselves more generally of the offer made by the Tract Society, which provides that every preacher who will apply can receive in the form of tracts one half of last year's collection for the tract cause.

We further recommend that each pastor shall make a more strenuous effort to increase the collection for the Sunday School

Union and Tract Society.

# XIII.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS.

#### SAMUEL L. JOHNSON.

Brother S. L. Johnson was born in Lincoln county, N. C., about 1867, and dled November 6th, 1902, being about 36 years of age.

He was admitted into the Conference on trial in 1890, and ordained elder in 1894, having spent 12 years in the work of the ministry. He served as pastor at Boone, Patterson, South Greensboro, High Point, and was appointed to Mt. Airy at our last annual Conference, and, having served his people only two weeks, was

called from labor to reward.

He was a faithful minister of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. He was successful wherever he labored, and was full of energy and zeal for the progress of Christianity and the Methodist Episcopal church. His career was one of progress, and we hoped that he would have lived long to do much good in the field of the Lord, but in the strength of his young manhood, and with every energy and purpose of heart to succeed in the work of the blessed Master, he was suddenly taken from us. The Lord knoweth best, and He that cannot err doeth all things well. "Well done, thou good and faithful servant," saith the Lord, "thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." We regret to give him up, but we feel that our loss is Heaven's gain.

#### JOHN E. CHAMPLIN.

Brother J. E. Champlin was born in 1841 and died Oct. 3, 1903, being about 62 years old. He entered the itineracy in 1864 and was

ordained elder in 1874.

He spent 34 years as a minister of the North Carolina Conference, have served several appointments and filling the place of presiding elder eight years. He died at Midway at his post of duty. He suffered very intensely. September 18th he walked 16 miles to his work, and on the following Sunday he preached at Midway. On Monday he was taken sick, but did not feel alarmed until the last of the week. He gradually became worse and finally surrendered to the summons. He had the hope of eternal rest in Heaven. His funeral was conducted by Rev. W. R. Zeigler, pastor of the M. E. church, and he was buried at High Point.

Rest thou, oh faithful pilgrim. Thy battle hath been fought, thy victory bath been won, thy crown hath been received. Rest thou

in peace.

# MACAJAR C. ROGERS.

Brother M. C. Rogers was born in 1854 and died July 24th, 1903 aged 49 years. He entered the Conference on trial in 1880 and

was ordained elder in 1893. He served in the North Carolina Conference 23 years. He was a faithful preacher and the Lord blessed

him in his labors.

The history that surrounds his death is very sad. The brethren were at Salem, one of the churches on his charge, on the Wilmington District, attending their District Conference. Brother Rogers received them and made them feel at home in his care. On Friday evening about 4 o'clock while the Conference was in session he became suddenly ill, and early next morning about 4 o'clock he surrendered his spirit to the Lord. This man of God died at his post, leaving behind him a record of being a conquering hero for Christ. We feel that while his Conference was mourning his loss he was receiving the crown of life in heaven, for the promise of the Lord is, "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life."

# ANDREW CONNOR.

Brother Andrew Connor was born in 1818 and died in February, 1903, aged 85 years. He was converted at the age of 17, joined the Conference in 1870 and spent 38 years in the ministry. He was one of the pioneer preachers, and went into the field when the forest had to be cleared and the foundations of Methodism had to be laid in North Carolina. He labored when the struggle was hard, the way was dark and gloomy, but he faithfully struggled and remained firm in the profession of his faith in Christ and his hope of glory until he was called to occupy his seat in heaven. He was a faithful minister and a consistent Christian.

He was one of the members of the Methodist Episcopal church before the division and never left it. He led a blameless life and

leaves behind a Christian example.

In the language of Charles Wesley we say-

"Servant of God well done, Thy glorious warfare past, The battle's fought the race is won And thou art crowned at last."

# MRS. MARY CHAVIS.

We record among the names of our honored dead the name of sister Mary Chavis, the wife of Rev. Wm. Chavis, whom the Lord called from our midst to the home he has prepared for his people. Her body moulders in the tomb but her spirit has gone to be with Jesus. It will not be long before we shall join the number that have crossed the flood.
