

Bishop Place Time The North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in Berry Temple, Asheville, N. C., October 11, 1906, at 9.30 o'clock, Bishop Burt presiding.

Devotions

The Bishop announced the first hymn, "Oh for a Thousand Tongues to Sing." The Conference sang it heartily. The Scripture lesson was read by the Bishop after which Dr. M. M. Jones, the presiding elder of the Western District, and Rev. N. D. Shamborguer, pastor of Berry Temple, led in prayer.

The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll. S. A. Peeler was elected Secretary by manimous vote. He chose for his assistants R. P. Hairston and A. S. Cottingham.

The Bishop announced checks form the Book Concern and the Chartered Fund for \$559 and \$22 respectively. The Conference authorized the payment of these checks to J. P. Morris chairman of the Conference Board of Stewards. The amount of \$313, Episcopal Fund, was by vote of the Episcopal Conference handed to the Presiding Elders for re-distribution.

VIII. Reports of Presiding Elders

GREENSBORO DISTRICT.

M. J. Bullock, Presiding Elder.

Pishops and Brethren of the North Carolina Conference Greeting:

It becomes my privilege and duty under the all seeing eye of Almighty God to present this my fourth annual report of the work that has been done in Christ's vineyard on the Greensboro district this conference year.

We are thankful to say that since we received our appointment at Maxton last October we have had the blessings of our Heavenly Father. The love of Jesus Christ, and the sweet influence of the Holy Ghost have led us along through the winding paths of duty until we have arrived at this sacred Altar in whose fear we now stand. To Him be the glory, raise and honor. One of the greatest difficulties we have had to encounter is that of keeping ourselves in the way in which God might lead us into the paths of righteousness and success. We have had a successful year. The Lord has abundantly blessed us. We have had no discord on the district with pastors. Peace and love have prevailed in all our quarterly conferences and visits. I am indeed thankful to the good pastors and members for their kindness toward me during this conference year.

We have had no sickness among the pastors this year. Death has not visited the homes of any of them. God has kept them through His love and goodness. We have lost some of our official members, Brother Aaron Mendenhall, a good man and trustee of our church, at Greensboro, passed away September 22.

SPIRITUAL CONDITION.

The spirit of revivals has been alive nearly all the year. Most all of the churches have had good revivals, and a good number added to the church.

SUMMARY OF THE WORK.

Central Randolph—Brother W. T. Lomax, P. C.—Has had good revival meetings. Added to the church, 23. Benevolent collection, \$30. They have done some work on the new church at St. Peters.

East Greensboro--Dr. J. P. Morris, P. C.-Benevolence, \$10.

Empire—Brother S. R. McCorkle, P. C.—Benevolence, \$26. Added to the church, 14. A new church has been bought and moved on the lot at Cox's Chapel at a cost of \$100.

Greensboro—Brother R. P. Hairston, P. C.—Benevolence, \$202. Added to the church, 27. The pastor and trustees have been at work all the year bringing the new church on to completion. The Sunday-school raised \$1053 for the Sunday-school room. It has been completed and they are using it. The Sunday-school and church have raised a grand total, \$2228. When the church is completed it will be one of the best in the Conference.

High Street and Bass Chapel—Rev. A. W. McMaster, P. C.—Benevolence, \$37. Added to the church, 40. A new church has been built on High street, a prominent part of the city. This church bids fair to be one of our best churches of its kind. In a few years if it continues as it has this year it will be self-supporting soon. A well has been dug at Bass's Chapel.

Jackson—Brother J. H. Garret, P. C.—Benevolence, \$9. Added to the church, 4. A small church is being built three miles from Greensboro and one at Hickory Grove. Brother Garret has been on this charge nine or ten years and his people still want him.

Leaksville—Brother A. S. Cottingham, P. C.—Benevolence, \$50. Added to the church. The pastor and his people have worked faithfully this Conference year. They sold the old parsonage and lot and bought in a much more desirable place. They have built a new parsonage and the pastor is living it it, and besides this they have built one of the neatest churches in the Conference with a steel ceiling and raised floor. It is a beautiful church. The people and pastor are very proud of their success. Money raised for the church and parsonage. Good for the Leaksville people.

Ramseur—Brother M. C. Laughlin, P. C.—Benevolence, \$25. Added to the church, 8. Brother Laughlin is a good worker.

Reidsville and Danville—Brother R. W. Winchester, P. C.—Benevolence, \$50. Added to the church, 31. A new church has been built at Reidsville this year. The pastor and his people are proud of their success. A Sunday-school has been organized three or four miles from Reidsville with a number of 25 children. Brother Winchester is looking after it. He is planning to buy a lot and build.

Reidsville Circuit—Brother F. L. Bost, P. C.—Benevolence, \$13. Added to the church, 7.

South Greensboro—Brother C. E. Ball, Pastor.—Benevolence, \$70. Added to the church 21.—This work has improved in benevolence.

Summerfield—Brother J. W. Jones, P. C.—This charge has a good year. Benevolence, \$100. Added to the church, 56. This is the best circuit on the district. The pastor is storming the fort.

Wentworth—Brother E. H. McArthur, P. C.—Benevolence, \$50. Added to the church, 12. Endowment, \$40. Brother McArther is a good worker.

West Greensboro-Brother J. A. Laughlin, P. C.-Benevolence, \$70.

Added to the church, 40. Money raised for improvement, \$125. This work is in a good condition. Pastor has the confidence of his people.

TEMPORAL WORK.

The district is in a good building spirit. During the four years we have built 10 new churches. Some of them are completed. Others are on the way of completion, 34 churches on the district, 4 new preaching places. We hope to have churches on them soon. I have urged that all of our churches be well insured. As far as possible I have looked after our church deeds. Find that most of them are made according to the discipline of our church. Indebtedness on the district is small to the amount of churches and buildings. Pastors are doing their best to push the work forward.

EDUCATION.

I have tried to encourage our young people to attend some one of our schools and read good literature. I urged them to read our church papers. I have distributed some tracts. Sold a lot of hymnals and disciplines. Our conference school is on this district. It is the place for Methodist, and I trust that our pastors and officers will do their best in helping the faculty. And send their children to this school.

Our district conference was held at Ramseur, McRae's Chapel. It was the best that we have had. All the pastors were present but one. Had a large delegation and the conference was inspiring to the brethren. Drs. Peeler and Morris were with us and gave good service.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE.

There are 36 Sunday-schools on the district. Most of them are in good condition. They use our church literature. There are 14 Epworth League Chapters. They are not doing as well as we would like to have them do.

Kent home in Greensboro, under the supervision of Mrs. Colburn is doing a good work for our girls. The work in the home is moving along o. k.

The Woman's Home Missionary Society held their second annual meeting in Greensboro, September 5. It was a very helpful meeting. They are doing their best to help the girls. Let every mother engage in this work. There is so much to be done and so little to do with. May God crown their work with success.

TEMPERANCE.

We have a temperance committee on every charge, organized and working to spread temperance sentiments against the use of tobacco, whiskey and other filthy habits. May God bless them in their work.

The Missionary Convention of our Conference met in Winston and our district promised \$25, for a student fund in Liberia, Africa. We

raised the amount. The conference was a very helpful meeting. We trust this will be a helpful conference and that we may go away better prepared to do the best year's work for the church and people that we have ever done.

RALEIGH DISTRICT.

H. L. Ashe, Presiding Elder.

Dear Bishop and Brethren: I submit to you the following my second annual report of the work and condition of the Raleigh District. We began the work this year with twelve preachers on the field, all of these have been spared and able to be at their post of duty except Bro. W. F. Allen, who was in charge of Rocky Mount circuit. He was afflicted in April and had to leave his work. Most of the pastors have been faithful in carrying forward the work of the church, and their reports will show an increase in the development of the charges committed to their care, every phase of this work has been looked after, most of the churches are now insured and the deeds are perfect. The Sunday-schools throughout the district are in very good shape. In some charges the Epworth League is at work and bringing good results. I have lectured to the young people on the district and urged them to attend our Christian schools.

District Conference was held in Newport News, Va., June 28, July 1, 1906, at which time and place we attended to the business of the district and enjoyed an intellectual feast, and were spiritually helped.

SPIRITUAL CONDITION.

The Spiritual life of the churches is not all that could be desired, and yet there are some helpful signs, special revival services have been held in each charge through these services Christians have been inspired and edified and some sinners saved.

SUMMARY OF THE CHARGE.

Raleigh and Oberlin—This charge has been supplied by Rev. A. C. Hill, who came to us last conference from the Alabama Conference. He has managed things well in that charge and it has been the most successful year in its history, all indebtedness has been paid and many improvements made.

Pleasant Ridge, Va.—Bro. W. M. Chavis, Pastor—This church has enjoyed a prosperous year. Some improvement has been made on the church and the Benevolent collections increased.

Newport News, Va.—Brother W. B. Scales, Pastor—He has things well in hand. A new church has been finished and dedicated. Bro. Scales has looked after the church in Norfolk and reports success there. Rocky Mount, Va.—Bro. W. F. Allen was appointed to this charge at conference, but was disabled in the spring and had to give up. Bro. N. J. Pass, one of our young preachers, who graduated from Gammon Theological Seminary this spring, was available and was secured to take charge of the work. He has done well.

Madison and Hayes Chapel—Bro. H. O. Frederick, Pastor—He has worked hard with some degree of success.

Madison Circuit—Bro. S. A. Gibson, Pastor—His wife has been sick most all the year, but he has stuck to his work and succeeded in keeping things together.

Walnut Cove—This circuit has been supplied by P. W. Horton. Has about held its own.

Newbern and Kingston—Bro. Clark, Pastor—Very little has been done.

Goldsboro—Has been supplied by Brother Hunter. He has worked hard. Kept together and made some improvement.

Durham and Creedmore—Has been supplied by Brother G. D. Dunn up to September. We then got Brother Prince to take charge and run a meeting which resulted in much good.

Townsville Circuit-Brother Hayden, P. C.-The charge has about held its own.

Oxford 2nd Bullocks—Bro. J. C. Prince, Pastor—This charge boasts of the greatest year in its history. Long standing debts have all been paid off on the church at Oxford and money raised and in bank to pay for putting new roof and painting, they have lumber on the ground to build a new church at Bullock, and money in the bank to begin the work. Bro. Prince is a strong and wise leader and handles things with a masterful hand. The people are much pleased and say he can do anything he wants to do. This district is weak numerically and has labored under many disadvantages, but is gradually forcing its way to the front, with prayerful leadership it will soon take its place with the other districts of the conference.

WESTERN DISTRICT.

M. M. Jones, Presiding Elder.

Bishop and Members of the North Carolina Annual Conference:

Dear Brethren: Your humble servant begs leave to submit the sixth annual report of the condition and work done on the Western District, I am thankful to our Heavenly Father for his gracious providence that has brought us through another year. And to Him let all hearts be

lifted in prayer for such intellectual enlightenment and spiritual discernment as shall fit us for the duties before us.

We invoke the providential care of our heavenly father upon our families and churches, praying that neither sickness nor death may disturb our thought or mar our work while here assembled. Most of all let us beseech Almighty God to bestow such pentecostal gifts of the spirit that the entire conference may be raised into such a high state of absolute consecration to God, as shall expel all unworthy motives and lead us to faithful work to promote the interest of the kingdom of God among men.

Accompanied by the band of loyal Christian ministers committed to my care, by Bishop Earl Cranston, twelve months ago, I hastened to my field of labor and began to sow the seeds of righteousness. Oftentimes we sowed in tears, but having obtained help from God we have continued until this day. I entered upon the discharge of my duty fully determined by the help of God and united effort of the ministers of the gospel and their several congregations, to win the battle for God and humanity. With such a determination and a steady march upon the common foe of Christianity, we have had success, although our way seemed dark and the paths through which we have passed were turbulent with difficult things to conquer. We feel grateful indeed to our Heavenly Father for His watchful care over us and the preservation of our health and strength.

For six years I have traveled this district from the snow-capped peaks of the Blue Ridge to the fertile valleys of the Catawba, and from he hill tops to the plains suffering the privations that usually charactrize such labors in the Western section of the State. I have gladly visited the charges of the district, and generally speaking much advancement has been made.

This district includes twenty-three counties in the Western section of the State. In some of these counties they have frost ten months in he year. We have twenty charges with thirty-eight churches and sixeen preaching places.

In these churches we have a membership of about 2,200, with fiftyive Sunday-schools and twenty-five Epworth League chapters. Great nterest has been manifested in each department of our church work, saining souls for Christ and extending the borders of the church have ad close attention. Special efforts have been put forth by our minisers for a revival of religion and in no small degree have they been uccessful. Hundreds of souls who were bound by the gods of this vorld have been gathered into the church. Great spiritual interest as been demonstrated and the spiritual growth among the members f the church is substantially increasing. I rejoice that we have had ood revivals in some parts and there have been added to the church aany whom we trust shall be eternally saved. Our churches are spir-

itually alive. It is worthy of special mention that sinners have been converted both at the preaching and the communion services: this is as it should be. An appeal should be made to sinners at all of the services; if more of this was done I believe that God would add daily to the church as He would delight in saving. We are preaching, praying and laboring for the salvation of the world. And our chief song is "Nearer My God to Thee."

TEMPERANCE.

I have spent much of my time in preaching and lecturing on temperance. The result has been marvelous. The Rum Demon ought to be driven out of our land. There is but little hope of justice to all men until the conscience of our American nation is awakened to see the destructiveness of this evil monster, Our schools deserve a warm place in our hearts. And I have endeavored to stimulate an interest in the education of our young people by distributing catalogues and circulars of our Institutions. I highly appreciate the public school system of our country. And think it indispensable to good citizenship; but there is also a great need for urging our young people to attend our own colleges where they are trained in the doctrines and spirit of the church. Most of the pastors have complied with the requirement of the discipline and have preached or caused to be preached the sermon on education, and have taken the collection and made the canvas for students. Some did not. All observed Children's Day.

Beyond controversy, we have made progress in education but our people are still a long way behind. It behooves every pastor to be faithful. The people need to know more about the advantage of Bennett College and Allen Industrial School and Home that are at our door. They need to be aroused to embrace these opportunities, that their "sons may be as plants grown up in their youth," that their "daughters may be as corner-stones, polished after the similitude of a palace." Let students go to these schools from every charge.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE.

Most of the Sunday-schools are in good condition. They are training schools for the young and old in biblical knowledge and Christian doctrine and practice. We have on this District fifty-five Sunday-schools 275 officers and teachers, 2,285 scholars of all grades. The average attendance has been 1,475. Three-fourths of the Sunday-school scholars are old enough to attend public worship in our congregations. One sixth of the scholars in the Sunday-schools are from non-church going families. Our Sunday-schools use the wholesome literature coming fresh from our publishing houses. Most of the schools run all the year.

Closely allied to the Sunday-school is the Epworth League, which

enrolls a number of our Sunday-school teachers, senior scholars, and many other young people. This institution is doing good work in leading the young people to a higher personal religious life and activity. In the Sunday-schools and Leagues we have had great spiritual interest demonstrated.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

We can hardly hold in too grateful appreciation the work done by the Woman's Home Missionary Societies. We have urged the women to organize and look after the great work of training the young girls who are to be wives and mothers of the new generation. The Woman's Home Missionary Society maintains an Industrial School and Model Home at Asheville, N. C., and also a Model Home at Greensboro, N. C. These homes are doing great good for our girls.

Believing as I do that the progress of our church work depends argely upon having officers who are religiously and Methodistically ntelligent, I have urged in all the quarterly conferences that all offiers become subscribers to one of our weekly church papers. And since the Southwestern Christian Advocate so well edited by our own Or. R. E. Jones, is so full of religious and Methodist teachings. I have urged that all our officers and members become subscribers to this paper. We will do all we can to make the paper self-supporting. I nave endeavored to promote the interest of all of our benevolent causes, and urged the pastors to conform strictly to the provision of he discipline for the support of the various benevolences of the church. I have inquired also, in every charge whether the apportionment for the Episcopal fund has been paid in accordance with the provision of the discipline. I have urged that all of the church property e well insured. I have viewed with pride and admiration the work ecomplished through the heroic efforts of pastors and people in the harges of the district, and return sincere thanks to Almighty God, or the gracious providence which brought us success.

May the choice blessings of heaven attend all our deliberations, and may angels rejoice at the praises of God that may go from the hearts f men and women who attend these services.

We beseech you, Dear Bishop and brethren of the Conference, to ray God's blessings upon us to the end that we may be led by the Ioly Spirit into fields of usefulness.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT.

I will not take up each charge, but will have each pastor to give a detail report for himself.

REVIVALS.

Some of the charges have had real good revivals and a number of onversions and accessions.

EDUCATION

I have endeavored to stimulate an interest in the education of our oung people. A number of our young people from Winston and ther places on the district are preparing to enter Bennett or Allen ndustrial Home this fall.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE.

We have on the district 45 Sunday-schools they are all well organized and are supplied with literature from our book concern, the most of

them observe Children's Missionary Day. The district Epworth League Convention was held at Trinity and was a success, Prof. R. B. McCrary was elected President. We hope for great success.

TEMPERANCE.

We are urging temperance along all lines. We have only two places on the district that have open bar rooms.

BENEVOLENCE.

According to the reports rendered at the district conference, and at the fourth quarterly conference there has been an advance over last year.

SUMMARY OF THE WORK.

High Point—Some money has been raised on church debt, and par-sonage improved.

Jefferson—Some work done on new church frame which is partly inclosed.

Kernersville-Two churches painted.

Liberty-New floor has been laid.

Mayhew-A new church completed at Hunter's.

Mt. Airy-\$300 paid on church debt.

Jonesville-A church completed at Ronda.

Statesville and Philadelphia—They are trying to complete Scott's Chapel at Statesville and are repairing the church at Philadelphia.

South High Point—The lot is clear of debt, and some money paid on building.

Winston St. Paul—A slate roof has been put on the building. Raised \$155.00.

Winston Mission—A lot paid for and \$100 on hand for building. Lexington—Parsonage inclosed.

Wilkesboro and North Wilkesboro—A lot is paid for at North Wilkesboro and \$100 on hand for building. The church is finished at South Wilkesboro.

NEW WORK.

We have organized at Cornelius on the Mayhey charge. We have also organized at Salisbury.
