
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

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION

The fifty-first session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, met in Morris Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church, High Point, North Carolina, October 14, 1909, at 8 o'clock, a. m., Bishop David H. Moore, D. D., LL.D., presiding.

After singing Dr. J. E. Thompson led in prayer. Follow-Devotions ing the reading of the Scripture lesson by Bishop Moore, prayers were offered by W. W. Pope, G. W. Morehead and N. D. Shamborguer.

R. E. Jones was chosen temporary Secretary.

The Secretary called the roll. Many were absent on Roll account of the fact that Conference was called one hour earlier than was previously announced.

On motion of R. Smith, S. A. Peeler was unanimously chosen Secretary.

On motion of G. W. Morehead, R. P. Hairston was unani-Treasurer mously chosen Treasurer.

On motion of R. Smith, J. P. Morris was unanimously Statistician chosen Statistical Secretary. Dr. Morris nominated the following assistants and they were confirmed: P. J. Cook, J. A. Maston, A. W. McMaster, W. T. Lomax and J. W. Wells.

On motion of N. D. Shamborguer the bar of our Confer-Bar ence was made to include all seats from the altar to the rear side of a large window.

On motion of R. Smith, the time of meeting of the Con-Time ference was fixed at 8:00 a.m., the first half hour to be devoted to devotions and by the same motion the hour for adjournment was fixed at 12:00 o'clock. Introductions

Dr. J. E. Thompson, pastor of Washington Street Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Dr. P. J. Maveety, Corresponding Secretary of the Freedmen's Aid Society and Dr. J. P. Wragg, Agent of the American Bible Society, were introduced.

Character

The character of the District Superintendents, S. F. B. Peace, M. M. Jones, R. Smith, H. L. Ashe and G. W. Morehead, were passed.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Reports

G. W. Morehead, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District read his report.

Following the District Superintendent all the pastors of the Wilmington District reported their work except D. H. Chambers, who had abandoned his work.

Western District: H. L. Ashe District Superintendent of the Western District, read his report. All the pastors of the Western District except S. B. Cornelius, who was absent, reported their work.

Raleigh District: M. M. Jones, District Superintendent of the Raleigh District, reported his work. All the pastors of the Raleigh District reported their work.

Greensboro District: S. F. B. Peace, District Superintendent of the Greensboro District, read his report. The pastors of the Greensboro District made their reports.

Characters

The character of each preacher was examined and all of them in the Districts above mentioned were passed, except that of D. H. Chambers and Chas E. Ball.

Welcome

Welcome Program. R. E. Jones was appointed by the Bishop to preside while the above mentioned program was being rendered. Dr. Jones introduced His Honor, Fred M. Tate, Mayor of High Point. The mayor addressed the Conference. The following persons delivered addresses of welcome: Rev. J. E. Thompson, pastor Washington Street Methodist Episcopal Church, South; Dr. G. A. Gerran, Principal A. J. Griffin, Rev. O. S. Bullock and Mr. William Webb.

Responses to these words of welcome were made by Bish-Responses op David H. Moore and W. R. Zeigler.

Dr. P. J. Maveety delivered an address setting forth the Maveety

work of the Freedmen's Aid Society.

The Conference appointed select members to try the cases select of Chas. E. Ball and Qliver B. Stancil, who were suspended under charge.

The following were appointed on the case of Oliver B. Stancil: J. D. Murphy, S. M. Haynes, Marcus Mundy, J. W. Wells, P. J. Cook, W. B. Scales, B. F. Thomas, J. A. Laughlin, D. Connell. M. J. Bullock was appointed chairman, J. P. Morris, counsel, J. C. Prince, secretary.

The Bishop announced a draft of seven hundred Drafts and forty-one dollars from the Book concern; of twenty-five dollars from the Chartered Fund. The Conference ordered these drafts to be paid to J. P. Morris, chairman of the Conference Board of Stewards.

The Standing Committee nominations for 1910 were made by the Secretary of the Cabinet.

The Bishop paid a high tribute to the members of the North Carolina Conference for their promptness and the good order during the Conference session. He spoke at length on the importance of Fraternity and careful living in order that we may be mutually helpful. He recommended for all the preachers three Doctors: Dr. Diet, Dr. Quiet and Dr. Merryman.

REPORT OF PRESIDING ELDERS

GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

I am permitted here upon the floor of this Conference, and in your presence, to make this, my first annual report, of this, the Greenshoro District, for this Conference year.

We give heart-felt thanks to our Heavenly Father for His many blessings bestowed upon us, both seen and unseen; the ministry and laity have great causes to return thanks unto Him for his goodness.

I am thankful to state here that there has been marked improvement along many lines on this District for this Conference year; in provements material, and I trust also spiritual.

I have not only visited all of the charges this year, but have, with only one exception, been to all of the churches on the district and have spoken in them the words of the Lord.

When this District was turned over to me last fall, it was in a very good condition, having been in the hands of that excellent man the Rev. M. J. Bullock, for six years; with his far-sightedness, energy, pluck and push, how could it have been otherwise?

The work moved on without a hitch, for we have good men

on this field, therefore the work moves on.

We are striving to push our work into the foremost ranks for the salvation of our people and also for the glory of God; to do this it takes the united effort of us all.

The District has fourteen charges with thirty-six churches and four other places of worship. There are thirty-nine Sunday schools with two hundred and fifty-five officers and teachers; there are about twelve Epworth League chapters on the District. I must say that the League work on this District as a whole is on the decine.

I have urged the people on all of these charges to raise the full apportionment for the benevolent cause this year.

Children's Day has been observed on almost all the charges, and the Educational Sermon has been preached on many of them.

The District Conference was held at St. Peter's M. E. Church, Randleman, N. C., July 14 to 18, and was well attended. I am glad to say that great good was accomplished. Both the ministry and laity seemed to have been greatly inspired. All who attended it seemed to have been greatly benefited. We had many visiting brethren among us on this occasion—Drs. M. M. Jones, S. A. Peeler, (not a visitor), and the Rev. Robt. Smith of the Winston District. All of these men seemed to thrill us with words of instruction.

Dr. Isaac L. Thomas of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, gave many of his eloquent addresses, representing his cause in that grand and good way which he always does.

EDUCATION

Here in the midst of this District is our beloved Bennett College, known for the work that it has done almost over this Southland, and many parts of the North also.

Dr. Silas A. Peeler, with able faculty, is doing a great work in the uplift of our people; not only are they striving to educate the head and hand, but the heart also, which is the mightiest work that any one can be engaged in.

The building last school-year was crowded to the utmost, many students were turned from the doors, there not being room for them.

What we need most here at Bennett is larger and better buildings; I would that the North Carolina Conference would with oldtime enthusiasm take hold of Bennett in that mighty spirit and give to us the plant that we so much need here, then I believe that the Freedmen's Aid Society would come to the rescue.

KENT HOME

Under the superintendency of Mrs. Colburn is well attended, and is doing a great work for our people in giving the needed training to our girls.

No race need hope to be great without the training of its women.

TEMPERANCE

I am sure that we all can see that we have much better order in all of our services since we have in our state what is known as State-Wide Prohibition; we have a right to congratulate ourselves for this forward movement in temperance.

There have ben a great many good revivals on the District this year, many persons have professed faith in the Lord Jesus as you will see from the following report of the charges.

SUMMARY

Central Randolph, W. T. Lomax, pastor, is in a good condition; God has poured out his spirit to these people in a wonderful way. The church at St. Peters has been improved; professions thirtythree; accessions thirty.

Empire: E. H. McArthur was appointed to this charge last fall by Bishop Bristol, but he was put on the Reidsville Circuit for some reasons as you may know; no fault of his, however. Brother W. I. Dickson is now at this point, and is doing a great work, I think, under the circumstances; professions forty-three; accessions twentyeight.

East Greensboro, M. C. Laughlin, pastor. There has been a great improvement on this charge; the church has been recovered at Browning Chapel; a church lot has been bought at Sedalia, and the people with the pastor are anxious to begin work on the new church at once; we plan to have a nice church built to the glory of God by this time next year; professions twenty-five; accessions thirty-two.

Greensboro, St. Matthews, A. S. Cottingham, pastor. The work here is still making some improvements; pastor and many of his members are hard at work for the Master; there has been raised by the trustees more than \$1,000 for the church; accessions twelve. What we need most in this place is a great revival that will reach all of the classes in this congregation; pray for us to this end.

High Street and Bass's, D. C. Skeen, pastor. Nearly \$200 have been paid on church debt at High Street; at Bass's a nice tower has been built this year; a large bell has been bought and paid for; professions twenty-eight; accessions twenty-six.

Leaksville, R. W. Winchester, pastor. This work is in a good and flourishing condition; the church and parsonage at Leaksville have been painted; the Shady Grove church has been painted also, and more than a thousand dollars raised for the trustees; moreover the fourth quarterly conference voted to a man asking that you have your next annual meeting at that point.

The people at this place have been and are loyal members of our great church; there are reasons why they urge you to come to them; and one is that this great body of Christian ministers has never been there in a body, (or as a conference), in Leaksville; you should see that beautiful church and its loyal members; professions nine; accessions ten.

Reidsville, D. McRae, pastor. This work has not made the upward mark that we had looked for; but we will not lose heart; the pastor has worked hard; professions three; accessions eight.

Ramseur, supplied by Brother E. L. Gilbreath, is in good condition, there has been marked improvement on this charge; brother Gilbreath has done a good work; if all of the charges had come up to this one, there would be little cause for complaint; professions twenty-five accessions, forty-two.

Reidsville Circuit. E. H. McArthur, pastor. Brother McArthur came to this work about the last of March. He has done a good work under peculiar circumstances; we hope that this charge will do much better this coming year; professions twenty; accessions fifteen.

South Greensboro, J. W. Jones, pastor. This work prospers; a beautiful church has been built at Red Hill this year; the pastor and people are working like beavers; would that all of our charges were like this; professons thirty; accessions twenty-five.

Summerfield, ex-Superintendent M. J. Bullock, pastor. Some improvements have been done both at Summerfield and Raleigh's; Elder Bullock, like most ministers, has his heart in the work; would that we had more like him; professions thirty-two; accessions thirty-one.

Wentworth, S. M. Hanes, pastor. Members and friends at St. Paul are striving to build a much needed church at that point. The work is in a fair condition; professions twenty; accessions eight-teen.

West Greensboro, J. A. Laughlin, pastor. There has been improvement all along the line; at Mt. Carmel an annex has been built, which gives to us the needed room and at the same time a very good church; God has wonderfully blessed both pastor and people; professions thirty; accessions twenty-five.

We are striving to teach both by precept and example the needed loyalty that is due our church; and not only that, it takes loyalty to make any cause prosper.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

The Raleigh District has completed another year of earnest labor, the results of which are woven into history. And while these may bear marks of imperfection, surely the indications of growth and prosperity are quite evident.

I wish first of all to express a deep sense of gratitude to our Heavenly Father for life preserved, health continued, and for the privilege of labor in His vinyard.

Second, to give recognition to the appreciative attentions received from the pastors, their faithful wives and families, and the official representatives of our churches. All of these serve to lighten the task and sweeten the labor.

I have attended the quarterly conferences and faithfully looked after the work of the church. These meetings were harmonious and the official members seemed interested in the prosperity of the church. The love feasts and sacramental services have been seasons of precious religious experience.

Our Sunday school work is in fair condition. The difficult task of attracting our young people in church and the great need of the kind of material necessary to carry it on is felt.

Three fourths of the Sunday school scholars are old enough to attend public worship in our congregations. One fifth of the scholars in the Sunday schools are from non-church-going families. Our Sunday schools use the wholesome literature coming fresh from our publishing houses. Most of the schools run all the year. Some stop in winter.

Our Epworth League work has not prospered as we desired, yet we have a number of Leagues and members sufficient to encourage us as you will see. Notwithstanding revival meetings have been conducted in nearly all of the charges in the district. The winds of evangelistic power have not in the aggregate blown

very strong with us, yet we were successful in gathering some sheaves for the Master. I have urged the study of God's word and the practice of the truths taught therein so as to raise up a people who will give themselves, their time and their money to the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom.

I have endeavored to stimulate an interest in the education of our youths by distributing catalogues and circulars of institutions. I have visited and lectured to our young people as follows: Two colleges, three academies, six graded schools, fifteen district schools and have lectured on education in most all the churches on the district.

We have spent much of our time in preaching and lecturing to our people on temperance. The results have been marvelous Many have given up snuff, tobacco and strong drink. We will continue to fight against intemperance until our church and land are free from the curse.

I have urged the benevolent collections in all the quarterly conferences and congregations. This motto has been sounded all over the district: "A report without a blank, and some increases for each cause."

I have carefully examined all deeds of church property in my district, and I am pleased to state that in most cases they conform strictly to the law and form of the Discipline.

I have urged that all the church property be well insured.

I have inquired in every charge whether the apportionment for the Episcopal Fund has been paid in accordance with the provision of the Discipline. We have done our best to push the interest of the Southwestern Christian Advocate. I have urged that all officers and members become subscribers to the paper. We are doing what we can to help make the paper self-supporting.

I have viewed with pride and admiration the work accomplished through the heroic efforts of pastors and people in the charges on the Raleigh District, and return sincere thanks to Almighty God, for the gracious providence which brought us success.

May the choice blessings of Heaven attend all our deliberations, and may angels rejoice at the praises of God that may go from the hearts of men and women who attend these services.

We beseach you, dear Bishop, and brethren of the conference to pray God's blessings upon us to the end that we may be led by the Holy Spirit into fields of usefulness.

WESTERN REPORT

The Lord has blessed me to finish my third year's labor as Superintendent of the Western District and I find pleasure in reporting the same.

I praise God that he has thus blessed and honored me. I realize more and more as the years go by that the hand of God is leading me, and though my ministry may be beset with many difficulties through Christ I am more than conqueror.

The church is God's spiritual agency in the world through which He is dispensing light and life to a dark, lost and dying world.

There never was a greater demand for larger spiritual life among our people. The materialist tendency of the age is greatly affecting our church life. The disposition to get money and have pleasure at the expense of the soul is the fad of the age. As Methodist ministers, true to the spirit which actuated Wesley when he came out of dry, formal and dead church of England to raise up a holy people, we find ourselves busily engaged in spreading Christian holiness and teaching our people that righteousness exalteth a nation.

The Western District has been blessed this year with the labors of a band of ministers whose influence for good has been largely felt.

Through them the spiritual life of the church has been quickened, stirring and enthusiastic revivals have been held throughout the district, which have resulted in the conversion of many souls, most of whom have joined our own church greatly increasing the membership.

Some of the pastors have come to the conference from revivals.

The interest of education is being looked after on the district. The desire for learning among our young people is increasing. We thank our Heavenly Father for the many institutions he has given us through our own church that have done so much for the race in training and preparing young men and women to take their places in the race of life. Through them have come some of the strongest leaders of the race.

While we encourage and stimulate the desire for education we are emphasizing the importanc of Christian education.

We have, situated on this district, The Allen Home and Asheville Academy, under auspices of the Woman's Home Missionary Society, which is doing great work in developing womanhood among our young girls. Miss A. B. Dole, Superintendent, is loved and honored by all for her long and efficient service.

Bennett College, under the leadership of Dr. S. A. Peeler, is

holding its own among other colleges of the state and is accomplishing much in the elevation of our boys and girls.

We have urged the people to subscribe for, and read the Southwestern, so ably edited by our brother, the beloved Dr. R. E. Jones. We trust the pastors have many subscribers with them. All the Sunday schools use our literature.

What the churches have done individually:

Asheville—Berry Temple, under the leadership of brother J. C. Prince, has enjoyed a prosperous year. The indebtedness on the church has been canceled, the notes burned and the church dedicated to God. The benevolent collections have been increased to a greater abount than any year in its history.

Gastonia and Bessemer City, under the pastorate of brother N. J. Pass, has had a splendid year. Quite a number have been brought into the church, all financial obligations have been met and the charge is in fine shape. All the members seem to love brother Pass.

Wells Spring and Bracket Town. B. F. Thomas, pastor. He has labored under many disadvantages but has stuck to his post and brought up a fair per cent, of his assessments.

Lawndale City, brother A. W. McMaster, pastor, has had a large number of conversions and accessions to the church and increased its benevolent collections.

Lenoir. Brother W. R. Zeigler has proved to be the right man in the right place. The large modern church that was begun three years ago has been nicely finished. It is a credit to the town. Brother Zeigler is a popular pastor in Lenoir,

Lowesville Circuit. Brother G. F. Hill is the pastor. Two churches on this charge have been completed this year.

Hickory. Brother A. J. Jenkins, pastor. Brother Jenkins is a hard and successful worker. No interest can suffer where he labors. The church has been overhauled outside and in. Many members have been added. The pastor and people are in love and harmony with each other.

Machpelah, W. M. Chavis, pastor. A new church begun last year is about completed. Brother Chavis works for success.

Newton, A. B. McQueen, pastor. Every phase of the work has been carefully looked after. A new church has been organized on the charge with a membership of over twenty-five. A lot has been obtained and lumber for the erection of a new church has been purchased. The church at Conover has been ceiled..

Shelby and ElBethel, Brother L. G. McDonald, pastor. A new church has been organized on this charge at Cherryville and some good members added.

Sherrill's Ford, R. J. Shipp, pastor. This charge is alive. All

the churches have been improved, a new building bought and good payments made.

Marion, J. C. Addie, pastor. This has been indeed a good year for Marion. The membership has been about doubled and a new church built at the Glades.

West Asheville was left among the supply places last conference. We succeeded in getting Brother C. I. Withrow, a strong preacher and successful evangelist to take charge of this work. He has had over one hundred conversions.

Brother R. D. Bethea came to us from Gammon in the spring and has had charge of Hendersonville, Beaver Dam and Waynesville, and has done good work.

The following places have been supplied and some good work done: Franklin, J. H. Morrison has built a church. Boone, Lenoir Circuit and Moorsboro.

We humbly submit this report for your consideration.

We are delighted to have you with us, Bishop, and extend to you a most hearty welcome in our midst. We trust your stay with us will be pleasant and profitable to yourself and a benediction to our conference.

CHURCH DEEDS

We have examined as far as we could our church deeds and find that they are all good.

Some years ago we lost one church in Fayetteville. That church would be worth \$2,000 to us today, and yet the records at the Court House show that Mr. Walter Watson sued the trustees for \$16 and got judgment form the court and sold the church for \$135 at the Court House door. In it was a donation of \$600 from our Church Extension Society. We may be unable to redeem it again through the court.

SUMMARY OF THE WORK

The seventeen new questions on membership have all been carefully asked. Some of the charges will show a slight decrease while others will show an increase. About all of the churches have had good revivals.

Charlotte, Rev. R. P. Hairston, pastor. This is a fine charge. A good years work has been done here this year. Improvements \$980.

Cool Springs and Beaver Dam, Rev. J. D. Murphy, pastor. There has been some improvements on this charge. The pastor has labored hard this year. Imporvements \$100.

Concord, Rev. H. T. Patterson, pastor. Concord is a large place and is one of the leading cities for education and it is here we need a good church. But little has been done. We need money.

Elkton, Rev. L. D. McQueen, pastor. This brother has worked hard but with little success.

Hamlet, Rev. W. P. Hayes, pastor. Brother Hayes is a faithful worker and has done some good work by repairing the churches. Improvements \$82.

Hoffman and Vass, Rev. H. L. Chambers, pastor. At Hoffman a nice church lot is being bought.

Johns and Piney Grove, Rev. W. M. Wells, paster. This charge is strong and is doing good work. Improvements \$120.

Laurinburg and Gibson, Rev. G. W. Brower, pastor. Brother Brower has done a good year's work. The work at Gibson has been pastored by Brother C. S. Gibson. At this point there has been some improvements to the amount of \$56.

Lumberton, Rev. S. M. McDonald, pastor. Brother McDonald is a faithful worker. He works hard to bring the people up to a high standard of living. Improvements \$25.

Maxton, Rev. J. W. Wells, pastor. This church is one of the best on the district for loyalty. The pastor has been able to make some improvements to the amount of \$67.

Melrose and Bowmore, Rev. M. Mundy, pastor. The new church at Bowmore is not quite completed. The pastor is a faithful worker. Improvements \$282.

Monroe and Bethel, Rev. J. P. McNair, pastor. At this point there has been no improvements.

Parkton and Prospect Hall, Rev. L. W. Thomas, pastor. This point has only one church. We need money. The pastor is a hard worker. Improvements \$13.

Pembroke and New Zion, Rev. Daniel McCullum, pastor. A new church frame has been put up at Pembroke and will soon be completed. Improvements have been made on the charge to the amount of \$165.

Red Springs and H. Bend, Rev. G. W. Byers, pastor. Brother Byers has done some good work here. On this charge we have succeeded in getting another good church deeded to the Methodist Episcopal Church. Improvements \$175.

Rowland and Salem, Rev. J. M. McNeill, pastor. This work is holding its own with some improvements to the amount of \$80. The pastor is a good man and an earnest worker.

Sanford Circuit, Rev. J. L. Hairston, pastor. We have not seen the work grow on this circuit as was our hope when we started. The pastor has worked hard and has made improvements to the amount of \$225.

Wilmington, Rev. G. W. McLean, pastor. Here is where indeed to give attention or pull up our pegs and take down our flag. I believe that God needs our church in this city. But before we can build up here we must have more money there to support the man and he must be one of the best in the North Carolina Conference. The pastor has worked hard this year trying to build up the work. Membership has increased somewhat, but nothing else except to reduce the \$700 debt on the church. Improvements \$93.

Total improvements on the District this year \$2,443.

We give thanks to our Heavenly Father for all of these rich blessings which he hath bestowed upon us this year.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

The Sunday school work is in a healthy condition. I have looked after them carefully and find that they are all using literature from our publishing houses. Nearly all of them observed Children's Day, and the collections were fairly good.

EPWORTH LEAGUE

The Epworth League Convention met in Asheboro the last of June, and was quite a success and showed several active chapters on the District. I have urged the collection of the General expenses at all of the quarterly Conferences.

TEMPERANCE

We rejoice that all of the open bars in North Carolina are closed. We have urged that every Sunday school be organized into Temperance Societies. I feel it necessary to urge temperance as long as there are so many moonshine whiskey dens.

One new church at Jefferson; one new church at North Wilkesboro; one new church at Ronda; one new church at Elkin; the debt of \$1,200.00 paid off on the Mount Airy church; new church at Winston, St. Paul; one being built at Winston, Mount Pleasant; one new church at Winston, St. James; one new church at High Point; one new church at South High Point; one new church at Midway; one new church at Statesville; one enlarged by making a T; Connelius two new churches; one new church at Dennis; one completed at Liberty and one completed at Andrew's Grove.

PARSONAGES

A parsonage purchased at Asheboro; a new parsonage built at Lexington.

EDUCATION

Mr. President and members of the North Carolina Conference: We, the committee on Education, beg leave to submit the following report:

The total number of students aided from the beginning of the society in 1873 to July 1908 is 16,609. The total loaned from 1873 to November the 30th, 1908, is 1,844.339.4.

There are three chief sources of regular income to the society: Children's Day collections, returned loans and interest on invested funds.

The Children's Day collections show a gratifying increase, reaching this year a total of \$89,342.43. This being the largest amount received in the history of the society.

The increase over last year is \$9,377.75. The advance is chiefly from the Conferences of last year.

The income from returned loans is \$40,998.70, about \$10,000 less than last year.

The grand total of available receipts for the year amounts to \$148.848.90.

Therefore, knowing of the great work of this society, we urgently request that the North Carolina Conference raise its full apportionment for education. Respectfully submitted.
