

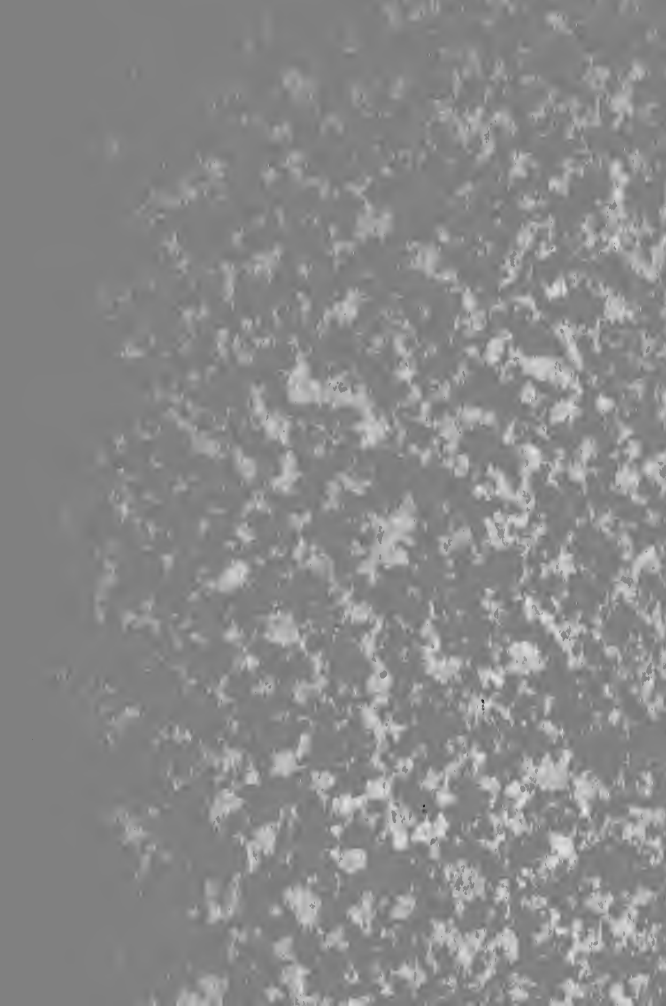

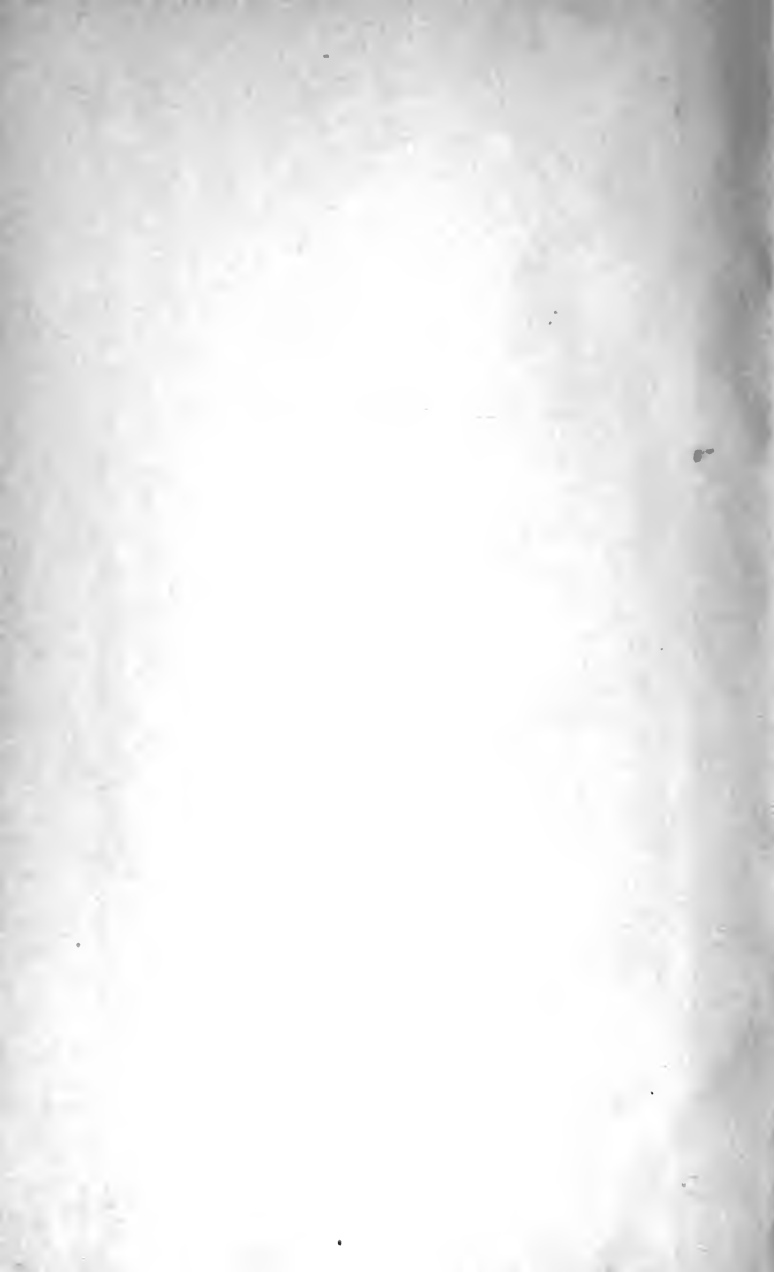

IV. REPORTS

District Supt. Report—North Carolina Conference

GREENSBORO DISTRICT

J. P. Morris, District Supt.

Dear Bishop and Brethren:—When we took charge of this Dist. we found it in a growing condition. It is still growing. There are 47 church buildings on the work, most of which have made material improvements, property value has been more than doubled. two new brick churches are in process of construction, one at Reidsville, one on Northwest Greensboro charge, costing respectively \$25,000.00 and \$15,000.00.

Membership.—Our total enrollment including probationers is over 4000, but for the migration of our people North and to other points we would number over 6000. However, we rejoice that souls are saved.

Ministerial Support.—Since 1914 we have more than doubled in Ministerial Support, we have now ten charges on the District that pays a thousand dollars or more and several others paying as much as did the leading charges six years ago.

Benevolences.—Our District has kept pace with the great church. The Centenary has not failed to have its effect upon us, our laity and Ministers responded nobly to the program, and are reporting over \$4,000 benevolences this year for this District.

General Uplift.—Besides the Specific gains there has been a general growth in the moral of our people, all of our forty-seven congregations have made decided improvement in their methods of worship, in their mode of Church management and in their ideas of obligation to the church community life. We have a new revelation and a higher conception of the religious and patriotic welfare of the nation. The Christ is looked upon as a man of everyday affairs mingling in everyday life.

Revivals.—We have not failed to have growing revivals this year. At some points as many as forty souls have been converted and joined the church, at about all the points there have been conversions, accessions and a general spiritual uplift.

Education.—Bennett College continues to grow, Pres. Frank Trigg and corps of efficient teachers are doing an excellent work for the youth of our race and for the country at large. With the cooperation of the Ministers of the North Carolina Conference the President has succeeded in filling the school to an overflow,

more than one hundred applicants had to be turned away for want of house room. We are sadly in need of another building on the campus. Kent Industrial home under the auspices of the Women's Home Missionary Society enjoys the general prosperity of Bennett College, and is doing quite a deal towards training our girls for future usefulness.

Southwestern.—We want to assure Dr. King that we have not lost interest in the Southwestern Christian Advocate, because its former editor a boy of ours, has been promoted to serve his church in a higher capacity. We are urging every officer on the District to take the paper, for we know that without an enlightened constituency it will be impossible to collect the Centenary finance and carry over its spiritual program.

Super-Annuates.—Last year we had three honored veterans on the District this year we have but two, Revs. L. W. Williams and L. B. Gibson. Brother Samuel McDonald has been stationed on high by the great Bishop of us all who never makes a mistake in placing his servants.

WESTERN DISTRICT

M. C. Laughlin, District Superintendent

Dear Bishop and Co-workers of the North Carolina Conference:—
With praise and thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father I come before you to make my second annual report.

To me this has been the greatest history making year of the church and I realize that there has been more responsibility placed upon us than ever before and we have labored hard to prove ourselves equal to the task.

In the beginning of the year we called a district stewards meeting with the majority of the members, and for the first time in its history put our district on the disciplinary plan for raising ministerial support and it is working fine, only charge refused to accept the plan.

Reports will show that there has been an increase in salaries and we all are sharing alike.

We held our ministerial council at Gastonia in Feb., and planned for our years work, we worked hard up to the Sunday School and Epworth League Convention which was held at Marion with good results. Our district conference convened at Lawndale, N. C.

Some things were found in connection Douglas Academy not so favorable but the conference was a success. Our visiting friends were Dr. J. C. Sherrill and S. A. Peeler.

Summary of the District

Reports will show what has been done on all lines. Allen Home and Douglas Academy reported the best years work in their history. Allen Home has opened up with a large enrollment with her new Superintendent. We find that Douglas does not belong to the church but it is deeded to a board of individual trustees, therefore we have no claim on it. I have asked them to make it over to the Church but as yet they have not. I have also notified each Pastor not to pay any more on the shares until we get a deed, if what I have done is not right I am willing to be corrected.

We observed good literature day and I hope reports will show and increase for the Southwestern.

Summary

Asheville.—Has closed a good years work with an \$800 improvement and we are buying the property joining the church so we can enlarge our borders for the new church.

Bessemer City and Galilee.—This charge is doing a good work.

Boone and Jefferson.—Are doing well and has ask to be divided.

Buffalo and Elkville.—Are so thinly settled and so many of the people have gone and I think it is best to discontinue a part of the charge and change the name to Lenoir Circuit.

Ebernezer and Cornelius.—Rev. L. D. McQueen was appointed to this work he made one round and disbanded it. I was able to supply the work with brother Edward Powell, he has done well and is to be commended for his faithful service.

Franklin.—Is a loyal little band and has done her work well over the top with all claims.

Forest City and Brackettton.—This has been a good year with the Pastor and people they have taken care of every cause.

Gastonia.—May be called the banner charge on the district, at the rate they are going in the next few years it will be the star charge in the Conference.

Hickory.—In many ways aught to be Hub of the district the Pastor has worked hard to make it what it ought to be.

Lawndale.—It is a good work it led in the centenary last year. They have worked hard to hold the banner; reports will show what has been done.

Lenoir.—Has had a great year with an increase in membership and is rejoicing over her victory. They have asked to be made a station.

Lincolnton.—There is some hope for Lincolnton we have bought

a new church lot it is well located and we hope to have a new church soon.

Lowesville and Stanley.—Have had a good year. The Pastor and people are working hard to complete their new Church at Lowesville.

McPelah and Denver.—This is a good charge if the pastor and people understood each other and get on the job they could do a great work.

Mooresville and Mayhew.—This charge bids fair to be one of the best on the district, the work at Mooresville is very hopeful.

Marion and Addies.—We need one good church in Marion if we had it we could take care of our people better this we hope to have in the near future.

Newton and Conover.—This is getting to be one among the leading, but they want a man who will live in the parsonage.

Old Fort and the Glads.—Father S. P. West was appointed to the work, in the month of February he was called to his reward, I succeeded in getting brother B. E. Staten a local preacher to take the work and he has done well, and the people are asking for his return.

Shelby and Brooks.—Under the present leadership this charge is doing well.

Sherrill's Ford.—They have not made as much advancement as many others in ministerial support but it is growing on all lines.

Statesville and Philadelphia.—There has been some improvement yet we do not grow very fast in Statesville, the pastor has worked hard with some results.

West Asheville and Waynesville.—Some improvement has been made. The people and pastor are well pleased, the future is hopeful. By the help of the Lord I have held all of my quarterly conferences except two, on the account of sickness I had to get some one to hold them for me. The revivals were good many professed hope in Christ and were added to the church.

A new church is being constructed at Laurinburg, toward this

enterprise the people have already contributed \$6536.00. They have received \$2350.00 from the Centenary Fund. In purchasing a lot and material for building and in laying the foundation the amount of \$7374.00 has been applied on this project. N. J. Pass is the Pastor.

A new church building has been enclosed at Rockingham and a fairly good congregation is worshipping in it. This work has been executed largely under the pastorate of W. M. Wells of the Hamlet charge.

Brother A. B. McQueen a retired minister has been holding services at Jonesboro and the way seems to be opening there for organizing a church.

The Maxton charge through the advice of the District Superintendent and the leadership of their pastor, J. W. Simpson, bought back that part of the church lot that was sold for repairs. They are also ready to purchase again a part of the parsonage lot which was lost by failure to record promptly a deed to it.

Four Retired Ministers.—W. P. Hayes, J. D. Hairston, A. B. McQueen, and H. O. Frederick reside on this district. They are worthy men and deserve the sympathy and help of the Conference.

WINSTON DISTRICT

P. J. Cook, District Superintendent.

Bishop Bristol and Brethren:—In making my report as Superintendent of the great Winston District I desire first to say that I thank God for His manifest presence and for giving me a place of service in His Kingdom. We have tried in a measure to be somewhat worthy of the affairs entrusted to our care for we feel that a great responsibility rests upon the leader of the people.

We have twenty-three pastoral charges, Forty-five Sunday Schools, Twenty-two Woman Home Missionary Societies, Sixteen Ladies Aid Societies, Fifteen Epworth Leagues. Every charge on the district has unit leaders and is organized. Every charge has had a preacher for the whole year without any interruption whatever.

Organizations.—The Sunday Schools on the District are in good shape, we have cradle rolls, Home Departments, Teacher Training Classes, Adult Bible Classes. The Teachers are giving more time to the Sunday School work, therefore we have better Teachers and better scholars and the Sunday Schools have been raised to a higher degree of efficiency. We have advised the leaders of the Sunday Schools to see to it that the children and young people

be brought to an open confession of faith in Christ Jesus and added to the church in order to keep much of our work from going to waste. We have asked the Pastors to observe Decision Day and that earnest personal application of the Gospel appeal be made to every member of the Sunday School. The conversion and the establishment in the Faith is of paramount importance and cannot be neglected without an injury to the church of God.

Epworth League.—One of the greatest problems is to find proper persons for the work of the League in our churches, what the League needs is a great spiritual awakening which only can come from enlarged vision of their duties and responsibilities to God's cause. A great help in giving this enlarged vision was the great meeting for the training of the Epworth League Leaders at Bennett College last Sept., 1920. That meeting did immense good and meetings of that kind for instruction and inspiration of our young people should be kept up.

Women Societies.—The Women's Home Missionary Society and the Ladies Aid Society have not only aided the preachers by beautifying the parsonages and the grounds of the churches but help to raise the Centenary and other benevolences of the church and it has raised the church to higher degree of spiritual efficiency. The churches on the Winston District could not do the great work that they are now doing without our heroic women.

Our Literature.—We believe that our Literature stands among the best if not the best for the material and spiritual development of the people therefore we insist on the Pastors and Sunday Schools, Superintendents and other officials of the church to see to it that our Literature be put in the hands of the people. The Southwestern Christian Advocate should be in the homes of all our people as well as other Literature of the church. The editor of the Southwestern should be congratulated for such a noble paper fraught with good tidings for our people as well as for all people.

Pastoral Support.—The salaries for preachers on the District have gone up but not yet commensurate with the high cost of living. On account of insufficient pay a goodly number of ministers have to resort to other employment in order to make a living for themselves and those depending on them for support. The work cannot be done required by the church with an under fed and underpaid ministry. These brethren still feel their bodies and some steps must be taken if we hold the religious heights already attained, no set of people would undergo the sacrifice of which a goodly number of our pastors now undergo.

Education.—We have visited our educational Institutions and find them doing excellent work. Bennett College under the leadership of Prof. Frank Trigg is enjoying one of the most prosperous years in its history. The school is full to overflowing, students have to be turned away on account of room. It is very necessary that more room be made as quick as possible so we may be able to accommodate our own membership and friends who are desirous as never before to attend Bennett College. We had at Bennett this year an excellent Epworth League Training Institution which by the way it was conducted and the entertainment given by College reflected great credit upon the President and faculty of said Institution. Those desiring a good liberal education will do well to attend Bennett whose certificates are recognized by the State and O. K. in all Counties by County Superintendents for those desiring to teach.

We cannot forget to call attention also to Kent Home and Allen Industrial Home for the best training of our girls.

Spiritual Results.—On almost every charge revivals have been held and good results accomplished. The work done is more permanent and thorough than that of previous revivals where questionable methods by some so called evangelist obtained. The brethren are learning to do their own work and thus making themselves a great force for righteousness and the uplift of the people. The doctrine of a New Birth witnessed by the Holy Ghost is faithfully preached and is consciously realized in many of these meetings, and a goodly number of the people reach the point where fear is cast out by perfect love.

Material Results.—The church at Mt. Airy has been remodded and a pretty galvanized shingle roof gives it a unique appearance. Mt. Pleasant, Winston-Salem, N. C. has been painted inside and out and beautiful seats have been ordered, also a heater installed.

The church at Asheboro is one of the prettiest structures on the District. It is a new church brick veneered the joints of the brick rodged and the brick colored which gives it a unique appearance. The District Superintendent layed the brick free of charge and was too glad to do so in order to build up the Kingdom of God. The Superintendent didn't miss a single quarter while working for five weeks gratis.

Centenary.—I cannot forecast what amounts will be raised at this Conference for Centenary but I have some idea what should be raised according to reports given me. We have raised and sent off including Asheville report \$3149.75. We hope after Conference to still be the Banner District on the Chattanooga area.

Personal.—Mr President: I would like to say in conclusion that I have given myself unsparringly to the work committed to my hands, my health has been good save that of a few days illness during the spring. We have labored under this idea that a failure on the Winston District would mean an embarrassment of the success of the work as a whole, the fellowship of the brethren has been delightful but above all I have had a great manifestation of Divine presence during the year, I thank God that He has blessed me and given me a place to work in His vineyard which is a great privilege one that Angels need not be ashamed.

Brother West was born in Kershaw, S. C. in 1853, he was converted in 1870 and admitted to North Carolina Conference in 1882. He was an active member of the Conference for 38 years, during all these years Brother West was active, he served a variety of appointments, some of the poorest as well as some of the best. He was a model Christian a safe leader and a powerful preacher, men followed him because he was able to lead them.

Memorial Services

Services of this kind bring us to consider those who have finished their worldly work. Those who have gone the way we are going but since death makes all men equal we will soon be on the same side of the equasion. They now rest where they cannot suffer from malice of profit from praise.

Three of our brethren and one prominent layman have answered the final roll call since our last Annual Conference: S. P. West, Samuel McDonald, S. M. Hanes.

Second—Samuel McDonald was born in Stokes County North Carolina. He came from sturdy stock, he was admitted on trial in North Carolina Conference in 1888 and became a full member in 1890. Brother McDonald possessed many qualities of worth. He believed in intelligence, so anxious was he to be educated that after he was the father of seven children he entered Bennett College and graduated from the Normal Course, he was not always understood but he was always a fearless advocate of what he conceived to be right. He was a good Counsellor and a logical preacher. He had a wife and several children for whose care we are morally responsible. For thirty years he pastored wherever sent.

Mrs. Maggie Brower—There was not a more active woman within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference than Maggie M. Brower, she was born in Maxton, Roberson County and died in Greensboro, October 28, 1920, she was educated at Bennett College and at the time of her death she was Matron of her Alma Mater, she was what the Conference needs more of an active layman. Her influence in the Woman's Home Missionary was felt all over the Conference, she is gone but we hope that the young women of the church will emulate her example. *Facts from the first nine sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes and from the Conference Journal for those years which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South. At this date the Conference had 19,459 white members and 3,390 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became a part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church South. Some entered the A. M. E. Church, some the Colored M. E. Church of America; but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church, as it returned to the State. At this session a new Conference—the Blue Ridge—was formed, with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
