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Journal of the Daily Proceedings of the North Carolina Conference

SIXTY-SEVENTH SESSION

The sixty-seventh session of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened in Wilson Temple M. E. Church of West Raleigh, N. C., on the morning of the 28th day of October, 1925, at 9:30 o'clock, Bishop Matthew W. Clair presiding.

Bishop Clair led the devotions and administered the Lord's Supper, the district superintendents assisting.

The roll was called by J. A. Baxter, Secretary of the last Conference.

S. A. Peeler was chosen Secretary for the Conference and he named for his assistants J. E. Brower and Marshall Mc-Callum.

R. W. Winchester, Treasurer, named his assistants: J. C. Rush, D. L. Thomas, J. M. Harris, W. R. Zeigler, T. C. Frazier, J. A. Cherry, J. W. Simpson, R. S. Abernethy.

P. I. Wells, Statistician, named his assistants : W. M. Wells, P. F. Johnson, E. I. Swan, J. H. Isham.

D. H. Kearse and R. G. Morris were appointed newspaper reporters. Moses Lord was appointed P. M. for the Conference.

His Honor, Mayor E. E. Culbreth, made an address of welcome on behalf of the city of Raleigh.

Hon. Josephus Daniels, ex-Secretary of the U. S. Navy, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Dean W. S. Turner of Shaw University delivered the address of welcome on behalf of the Negro churches and schools of Raleigh.

Willis Graves made the Conference welcome to the Wilson Temple M. E. Church.

H. L. Ashe made response to these addresses of welcome.

A resolution relative to the presidency of Bishop Clair by R. W. Winchester was adopted by the Conference. (See Resolution).

A. G. Jenkins, R. G. Morris, Wm. Wells and J. M. Harris were appointed a committee to revise the Conference program. The following persons were introduced to the Conference: Drs. N. B. Hollinshead, L. H. King, N. D. Shamborguer and Mr. W. C. Price.

Bishop Clair made remarks expressing sympathy with Rev. J. M. Harris and family in their bereavement.

Rev. G. M. Phelps pronounced the benediction.

Afternoon Session

At three o'clock the Conference reassembled in statistical session. Following devotions the charges reported by districts.

The Committee on Revision of Program reported. It was approved.

J. P. Morris was called to the chair to preside during the rendition of the anniversary program of Board of Pensions and Relief. R. G. Morris, representing Dr. E. M. Jones, made the principal address.

S. A. Peeler pronounced the benediction.

At 7:30 o'clock the Anniversary of the Southwestern Christian Advocate was held, A. H. Newsome presiding. Professor Brawley of Shaw University and Dr. L. H. King, editor of the Southwestern, addressed the Conference.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. C. E. Ball of the Lexington Conference.

Second Day

Thursday morning at 9 o'clock the North Carolina Conference opened with devotions. Rev. C. E. Ball led in prayer. Bishop Matthew W. Clair read the Scriptures.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous sessions and they were adopted.

Question Fifteen was called. H. L. Ashe, Superintendent of the Greensboro District, was passed in character and he made his report. N. J. Pass, Superintendent of the Western District, was passed in character and he made his report.

During an intermission the Conference sang "Where He leads me I will follow."

The character of J. A. Baxter, Superintendent of the Winston District, was passed in character and he made his report. G. M. Phelps, Superintendent of the Wilmington District, passed in character and he made his report.

Mr. Price, representing our Book Concern, made remarks. He announced check from The Book Concern of \$831, draft from chartered fund of \$40, and reported draft of \$12 from Board of Pensions and Relief. These drafts were heartily received by the Conference and were handed to the Conference Treasurer, R. W. Winchester.

A resolution requesting Boys' Conference within the next convening of the North Carolina Annual Conference was offered by R. T. Weatherly. It was adopted. Weatherly was appointed by the Conference to direct and promote the Boys' Conference.

H. L. Ashe moved that Friday, ten o'clock, be made the order of the day for voting on the question of Unification. This motion prevailed. He also moved that Friday at 11 o'clock be set as time for President Trigg and R. G. Morris to put before the Conference the College Endowment and Expansion Program.

Dr. L. H. King and President Frank Trigg were introduced.

A motion by R. G. Morris that we send greetings to the absent and sick members of the Conference prevailed.

On motion of H. L. Ashe, Saturday morning at ten o'clock was set apart as time for presenting visiting ministers.

J. A. Baxter offered a resolution relative to Epworth Institute. It was adopted.

Trustees of the N. C. Conference presented a report which the Conference re-committed on motion of R. T. Weatherly,

The Conference requested pastors to report five items— World Service, Pensions and Relief, Conversions, Accessions, and the Episcopal Fund.

Dr. Hollinghead addressed the Conference.

Rev. D. O. Walker and Prof. Hill were introduced to the Conference.

Benediction was pronounced by R. G. Morris.

Thursday Afternoon

Conference reconvened at 4 o'clock, P. J. Cook presiding. A quartet from Bennett College sang. S. F. Peace led in prayer.

R. G. Morris addressed the Conference.

On receiving information of illness of Bishop R. E. Jones and others of the N. C. Conference business was suspended. The Conference offered prayer for their suffering brethren. S. A. Peeler and Robert Smith voiced the prayer of the Conference. J. M. Harris made remarks showing the benefits coming from the prayerful sympathy of those whom we trust.

President Trigg spoke in the interest of Bennett College.

The Bennett quartet sang. W. W. Pope pronounced the benediction.

In the evening at 7:30 the Anniversary of the World Service was held. Dr. W. B. Hollingshead made the address. R. T. Weatherby presided at this session.

Friday Morning Session

On Friday morning at 9 o'clock the Conference opened with devotions. The Bishop read Rom. xii. Prayer was offered by Rev. C. E. Ball of the Lexington Conference.

The Secretary read the minutes of the previous session and they were approved.

Dr. E. M. Evans was introduced to represent the Board of Pensions and Relief. He presented draft from the Board for \$612.25, which the Conference gratefully accepted. A resolution relative to Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund offered by Dr. Evans was adopted by the Conference.

The Bennett quartet rendered a selection.

The order of the day as fixed in yesterday's session was called. The votes recorded stand seventy-one for unification and four against it. On the proposition of admitting laymen to the Annual Conference the following persons—R. W. Winchester, H. L. Ashe, R. T. Weatherly, R. G. Morris and S. A. Peele—made remarks. The votes cast showed that thirty-two were in favor of the proposition and forty-two were opposed to it.

Question Forty was called. Madison, N. C., was chosen as the place for the next Conference. On motion of S. A. Peeler, the Conference ordered the Secretary to write a letter thanking Mt. Airy for their generous invitation to visit them.

The order of the day, Endowment for Bennett College, was called. President Trigg, S. A. Peeler and R. G. Morris made remarks. Plan having for its goal \$100,000 endowment was inaugurated.

The balance of \$1000 augmenting the fund for science apparatus for Bennett College was collected.

The characters of the effective elders of the Greensboro, Western, Winston and Wilmington Districts were passed and they made their reports.

A select number was appointed to try S. J. Hayden for financial immorality.

Lieutenant L. A. Oxley was introduced. He addressed the Conference.

The Rev. Mr. Scott of the A. M. E. Church, Miss I. R. Jones of Allen Home, Asheville, N. C., and Miss Bessie Hawkins were introduced. Miss Hawkins made remarks and offered prayer for the Conference. "Hark, the voice of Jesus calling?' was sung.

Dr. L. H. King gave his parting word. Bishop M. W. Clair spoke on the value of faithful and diligent pastoral ministering to the people.

The Bishop pronounced the benediction.

Saturday Morning Session

Saturday morning at 7:30 o'clock Conference assembled and spent thirty minutes in devotions. The Bishop read Eph. VI. J. W. Simpson led in prayer.

The secretary read the minutes of the previous session and they were approved.

Question Four was called. Geo. T. Foley's elder's orders from the A. M. E. Church was recognized and he was admitted in full connection.

Question Five was called. Edward M. McLeod and Geo. W. Patterson were admitted on trial and placed in studies of the first year.

Henry A. Channelle's deacon's orders from A. M. E. Church was recognized and noted under Question 24.

On motion by J. P. Morris, Conference voted to require all undergraduates to attend the Conference Summer School at Claffin College, Orangeburg, S. C.

Question Six was called. Benj. F. Gleave was continued on trial in studies of the second year.

Question Nine was called. Robert McRae was passed to the studies of the fourth year.

Questions 7, 13, 16 were called. None.

Question Eleven was called. Henry A. Davis, Herbert C. Ganaway, Frank J. Lee, Marshall McCallum and Wm. C. Scarborough were graduated from the conference course of

study and elected to elder's orders. Jasper B. Meekins was graduated and elected to elder's orders to be ordained else where.

Question Twelve was called. John Mallory, Chas. G. Bynum, Douglas L. Steele were elected to deacon's orders. Robt. F. McCallum was elected to deacon's orders to be ordained elsewhere.

Ouestion Fourteen was called. F. D. Caldwell left without appointment to attend school.

Question Twenty-five was called. Chas. E. Howard for the second year.

Question Twenty-six was called. (See list under Question 26).

Revs. C. K. Brown, C. E. Ball and N. D. Shamborgner were presented to the conference as visiting ministers who formerly went from us. They were very cordially received.

The sum of \$2343 was reported on hand for distribution among the conference claimants.

On motion by H. L. Ashe to bring this up to \$3000, the balance was ordered to be collected by the Conference.

On motion of R. G. Morris the Conference ordered \$600 to be apportioned to the four districts and that this money be collected and forwarded on or before August 1, 1926, to the treasurer of the Board of Conference Claimants Fund, the treasurer being required to send this as final payment on the assessment for the present year.

The Conference instructed the trustees to sell the property at Hickory and apply the proceeds to supplement the pension fund.

William Wells presides.

Dr. H. L. Canright, returned missionary from China, addressed the Conference.

Dr. D. D. Martin addressed the Conference.

Choir sang The Kingdom Is Coming.

Conference adjourned to meet at 7:30 o'clock p. m.

Benediction was pronounced by Dr. H. L. Canright.

Saturday Evening Session

Saturday evening at 7 o'clock the Conference opened with devotion led by G. W. Brower. M. C. Laughlin led in prayer The trustees of the Conference were elected by ballot.

S. A. Peeler reported for the trustees. (See report).

The statistical report was made by P. I. Wells.

The treasurer's report was made by R. W. Winchester.

P. I. Wells and R. W. Winchester were elected statistician and treasurer, respectively, for the ensuing year.

D. Brooks was elected treasurer of Conference Relief Fund, S. A. Peeler, assistant.

R. G. Morris read the report of Conference Stewards.

S. B. Cornelius was removed from the retired to the supernumerary list.

The charges reported \$138 collected from the sale of minutes.

The sons of Bishop Clair and J. M. Harris, Mrs. M. M. Jones, Mrs. L. Belle and Miss I. R. Jones were introduced.

The Conference voted that after the Sunday services and the reading of the appointments we stand adjourned.

Love Feast was conducted by D. Brooks, M. J. Bullock and D. McRae Sunday morning.

Bishop M. W. Clair preached at eleven o'clock.

In the afternoon the W. H. M. Society held a brief service. This was followed by a memorial service held for our deceased brother, M. M. Jones, and the late Mrs. J. M. Harris.

John Mallory, Charles G. Bynum and Douglas Steele were ordained deacons.

Henry A. Davis, Herbert C. Ganaway, Frank J. Lee, Marshall McCallum and William C. Scarborough were ordained elders.

Following a sermon by Rev. N. D. Shamborguer, of Chicago, Sunday evening the Bishop read the appointments.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

GREENSBORO DISTRICT

H. L. Ashe, District Superintendent

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

I am happy for the privilege of meeting another annual conference, presenting a report of the workers and work of the Greensboro District. The pastors have been very faithful in the discharge of their duty; most of them have enjoyed good health.

Brother J. A. Laughlin of the Guilford charge has been ill and unable to preach since the middle of August. He is better than he has been, but unable to attend the Conference and will not be able to take work next year and desires to take the retired relation until his health improves. Brother Laughlin is a faithful and earnest worker and we commend him to you for your prayerful consideration.

The home of Rev. J. M. Harris, the host of the Conference, has been stricken by the hand of death. His accomplished wife, Mrs. Ella B. Harris, departed this life October 23, 1925, leaving her husband and five children in sorrow. Brother Harris needs our prayer, for this is a dark day for him and his loved ones.

This has been a year of strenuous endeavor. We started out at the beginning of the year to put over a program in the church that would be telling along all lines. To this end the pastors lined up with the leading laymen and threw themselves into the work and have wrought well, and the detailed reports of the pastors will show that improvement has been made along all lines.

Every phase of the work has received attention and while ideals have not been reached, we have striven hard to approach them.

The young people's activities present a somewhat encouraging aspect. Every charge has a Sunday school and is using the literature of our church, and there seems to be an increase in interest and attendance.

The World Service movement has had its rightful place in the activities of the district group, and district meetings have been held in various sections of the district which have created and kept alive interest in this God inspired movement. We have prayed, paid, and worked and will be able to report a 100 per cent increase in collections.

The Epworth Leagues seem to take on new life. An institute was held at Bennett College, Greensboro, in the spring that seemed to be a mighty uplifting force to League work throughout the Conference. The work in the classes and the addresses were instructive and inspirational. The ladies' activities constitute a live wire in the church program; almost every church has a Ladies' Aid Society that is playing an important part in all of the church activities.

The Woman's Home Missionary Society has done a fine work.

SIXTY-SEVENTH SESSION

We have not failed to give due consideration to our institution of learning, Bennett College, which is located on this district. This school has done a work for the North Carolina Conference in the training of leadership that cannot be overlooked, and should command the respect and consideration of the entire Conference. Situated as it is in the gateway of the state, with its splendid plant, it ought to be made one of the great schools of the South for the education of our people. Let's rally and make it that.

The pastors have given attention to evangelism. We realize that the purpose of the church is the conversion of many souls and an increase in the membership. We are emphasizing in every charge the need of salvation and the part that the church is playing to bring about that end in these critical days, when there is so much to try the faith of the church and tax the power of the Christian host. We need the genuine religion.

Restlessness abounds everywhere, spiritual poverty is everywhere felt. The larger spiritual life is the need of the age. This need can't be met by any mere superficial response. It can be satisfied only by a mighty religious awakening. We plead not merely for a big conventional revival. The greatness of a spiritual movement depends not upon a particular method, however successful it may have been in the past. But we must be concerned about the great force that brings results rather than mechanical. The message of the pulpit today must be courageous and illuminating.

Is the world being saved? This question must be answered by the men who fill the pulpit. Our task is a great one. We are living in the greatest day witnessed by man, a day filled with great opportunities and mighty responsibilities.

Let's go to the task with a determination of iron, a will of steel, a heart of love and preach a gospel fraught with life and power until we deliver a redeemed humanity into the nail pierced hands of the Prince of Peace.

REPORT OF WINSTON DISTRICT

J. A. Baxter, District Superintendent

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

In this my initial report you will in a short while detect that it is the product of the inexperienced and the efforts of the very recent initiated. These facts being noted I am sure you will withhold your unfavorable comments and in privacy give to me the ideas or suggestion that will help me improve on my subsequent reports.

The facts obtained herein are obtained from personal observation and personal contact; therefore minus of all imaginations, unless it is for what I hope the district will be if the good bishop deems it wise to further intrust the work of the district to hands of a greenhorn.

I entered upon the work with a tremor, fully realizing that there were others better qualified to care for a work that calls for the zeal of the Psalmist that declared, "The zeal for thy house hath eaten me up." The resolution of a Joshua, that before the cause of Israel should suffer defeat, let the King of Day stop his fiery steeds upon the hills of Gibeon and the "Queen of Night" her silvery charlot in

the Valley of Ajalon; the meckness of Moses, who would rather suffer with his people than dwell in the courts of Pharoah; the love of a Christ that could embrace friend and foe alike and accept all men as brothers. Searching myself for these qualifications I found written upon the walls of my sanctus sanctorium, "Thou art weighed and found wanting." As my spirit drooped and I had all but given up in dismay, it was Paul who echoed in my soul, "With Christ I can do all things." With these words my spirit revived and I went forth to the field trusting solely upon Him who does all things well And now if you find anything that you would deem success let Christ be praised, for it is He and not I that hath wrought.

First Things First

The matter that was of first consideration to me was that we are engaged in kingdom building; and if the declaration of John and Christ, "that the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand," means anything to me it is that I may have a place in which to labor with and for God, and if I would mean most to its establishment in the earth there must be self-abnegation and working the greatest good for the greatest number.

Church Records

When the statistics of the district are read you will note a decrease in the membership, due mainly to the functioning of that allimportant committee known as the committee on church records. With unabated zeal I strenuously insisted that every church on the charge have an up-to-date record showing every phase of the membership and that each pastor make out his report for the Annual Conference in concurrence with facts that are found on the records. By so doing we as pastors will cease to send to headquarters a membership roll that's about two hundred or about fifty: but it's either two hundred or it's not two hundred, and nine times out of ten it's less than two hundred, for after the names of the dear souls who have long since been translated have had their names dropped from the active list and the names of their children who are scattered to the four winds of the earth have been dropped, the large number of members formerly rostered off, has dwindled to a mere seventyfive or a hundred by actual count; this is the desire of the general church to know its membership by actual count. This will account for the apparent shortage in membership.

Better Charges for the Men

There seems to be a degree of satisfaction in the thought that a half loaf is better than none at all; and where many of the half loaf charges are, they are getting half-loaf service, and as a consequence the Kingdom is getting half-loaf returns. It is my conviction that a man can do a better job when he knows there is an adequate support in the charge where he is to labor; so in order that a brother minister might feel more encouraged to do efficient work I have endeavored to so group the work that each charge might be more conducive to whole-hearted service from the one sent there to serve.

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SIXTY-SEVENTH SESSION

Better Service

It is customary that when a minister is approached with the question regarding a certain point he asks the question. What's in it for me? or, What do they pay there? The time has come when the people ask. What is in the man for us? In other words, they are looking for value received in return for the price they pay. We are aware that the average salary paid our ministry is far too low, but in many instances the people feel they are paying more than they are getting in return; and they are eagerly watching the preacher that is putting the job over in the place where he is located, whether he is on the Piney Ridge Circuit or the First Church on Main Street, and they reason that if he can put the job over at one place he can put one over for us—and they reason correctly. The ministen that is doing his best at the point where he is creates a demand for himself. This being my conviction I have not failed to let the brethren know that if they are promoted, depends largely how well he is doing the job he has in hand. All based upon the fact that he who is faithful with that which is small can be trusted with the larger things.

The Signs of the Times

I have not ceased to urge the observance of the signs of the times; this is an age of consolidation. Bank systems, railroads and other large corporations are merging for more intensive effect. The church would do well to emulate these temporal enterprises in that of doing more intensive and a bit less extensive. In this spirit we have begun consolidating churches that are serving adjoining territories or communities that would flourish better under one good strong church than two small societies, neither of which is strong enough to do very effective work. We have succeeded in getting together two of the churches of Winston, viz., Mayes Chapel and St. James, and have now a new organization to be known hereafter as St. Andrews; other such projects we hope will follow soon.

The Program of the Church Carried Out in Every Charge

I have found that one of our greatest drawbacks in our church life is close adherence of pastor and people to old rules and customs in church polity. They hang on to the old ruts of omnibus giving and taking of collections. You will find that many of our pastors are disappointed because it rained last Sunday, which day was set for big collections and farewell sermons, but the downpour of rain was of little concern to those pastors that have trained their people to give weekly according to system and not by feeling. The church has a definite financial plan and published in our book of church government and many of the pastors know little or nothing concerning it, and others know about it but are afraid to venture out on the modern national highway of the "Every Member Canvass" and other phases of church financing.

World Service

In the machinery of our great system World Service seems to be the fly-wheel; for if the Christian missionary spirit fails to move the other wheels, shafts and bands may as well be committed to the scrap pile. The church's great and grand object is that of Even gelization. Her commission is not to any one nation, race or country, but world wide in its scope. To my way of thinking, much of our failure to keep pace with the program of the church in our giving to this all important cause is due largely to our narrow conception of world relations. Our people have been slow to see that their obligation is to a world of people. The church family to which they belong is world wide; the gospel of Glad Tidings is world wide and in our giving it should be world wide in purport. In my efforts to give the people this vision of world service, I have traveled the district with lantern and slices endeavoring to deepen their conviction through the eye as well as the ear. The response has been gratifying, as you will note the gradual upward pull in the world service report.

The Child in the Church

Last but not least, the cause of the child has not been neglected. The child has not only been sinned against by commerce and industry but also by the church. Not intentionally, but nevertheless done; not necessarily a sin of commission, but rather a sin of omission. We have made him a side issue when prophesy made him a leader of the new order of creation—"and a child shall lead them." Jesus made him the standard of his Kingdom. "Unless you become as this little child ye shall not enter the Kingdom."

In my travel I have espoused the cause of the child; I have declared his rights not only for his place at the communion table but a place in systematic giving. At one point in the district we have what is known as "The Children's Church."

Education

We are not favored with any well organized church school on our district, but education has been given due consideration. We have boys and girls in several of our schools. In Clark University there are four; Allen Home, Asheville, four; Bennett College, fifteen; Meharry, one; Morgan, one; Gammon Theological Seminary, two. We are staunch believers in the education of the whole man, the head, heart and hand.

In my conclusion, Bishop and brethren, it might be that I have not satisfied you in every particular in your desire to know what has been accomplished in the work of the district, but as best I could I have endeavored to point out some of the peaks that have towered high in my thought-life and though they may seem very low to you, nevertheless there are valleys between; and over these hills and through the vales I have traveled the past months, encouraging the brethren and helping them as best I could to make smooth the rought places, make straight the crooked paths and heralding the coming of the king.

REPORT OF THE WILMINGTON DISTRICT G. M. Phelps, District Superintendent

Dear Bishop, Fathers and Brethren:

In the providence of God it has become my duty to report for the Wilmington District. When the men of the Wilmington District began this year's work under the wise leadership of Dr. M. M. Jones their ambition was to make this one of their most successful year's work and to show their spirit I quote their last words through their leader: We see not a step before us as we tread on another year. but we have left the past to God's safe keeping; the future His mercy shall clear, and what looks dark in the distance may brighten as we draw near. Shortly after the conference Dr. Jones called together the men of the district and laid before them his plans for the These plans were highly indorsed by all of the men, who vear. went forth from this meeting with the spirit of the Master and with a determination to help stir the same spirit in the hearts of all their hearers. They had hardly gotten started with this great task before Dr. Jones found himself growing weak physically, and yet with a will power truer than steel he labored on until the end came the first of March. It was a wise leader and a brother beloved which was taken from us. Shortly after his death Dr. H. L. Ashe, the District Superintendent of the Greensboro District, was asked by the Bishop to look after the Wilmington District in connection with his own, until the newly appointed District Superintendent could take charge. Dr. Ashe is to be highly commended for his tireless efforts in helping to carry on the work that the cause might not suffer because of its change in leadership. It was mine to take charge of the district on the 24th of May. I am sure that I tell you no more than you expect to hear when I say that I have been received with open arms by every man of the Wilmington District. They have answered every call willingly to help bring their district to the forefront. Our first move was to lay a plan by which we might bring up our World Service. It was mine first to make a personal appeal to every man on the district, which was done by the District Conference. We met at the District Conference in July and there adopted resolutions to have a World Service drive to end September We met in Hamlet on the day set and reported in cash \$930. 4

While we have given much of our time to this phase, it is not ours to have a one-sided program. For we are equally interested in the Conference Claimants, the Southwestern Christian Advocate and every phase of the church work.

During the five months I have been on the district I have not only visited every charge, but I have been in every church but one and the members that belonged to this church were in service with me at the church near them. I do not think that there is to be found a more loyal people anywhere than those of the Wilmington District. With the proper leadership they will easily take care of every interest of the church. We have had this year one of our churches de-stroyed by fire. I have reference to our church at Rowland, of which Bro. S. F. B. Peace is pastor. I am glad to report that even here the cause has not suffered, but every phase has been looked after and they are already at work in replacing a more modern brick structure. To this end more than \$1300 has been raised through the membership. I shall not use the valuable time of this Conference in mentioning the men or the places that have done work worthy of being mentioned. Suffice it to say that every man with but two exceptions has been steadily on the job. I am asking that you wait patiently and hear their reports which I believe will show advancement along all lines. During the past few months which were given me to superintend the Wilmington District I have observed the following needs in the churches. (a) The need of appreciating the duty and responsibility of office in the church. Many are satisfied just to know that they hold an office. (b) The need of having official meetings. In many places this is not deemed necessary only to put on rallies. (c) The need of class leaders or unit leaders functioning as such. These have reduced their jobs to collecting money which if kept up will in time make this impossible. (d) The need of church records and rightly kept. (e) The creating of a greater interest in the quarterly conference. It is quite difficult in most places to get many of the officers to sacrifice their time to look after this work. We feel though that this need will be met in the near future, which will give us an opportunity to discuss the program of the church. And by so doing we believe that every phase will soon take on new life and become greater instruments in helping to further God's Kingdom. It is to this end that we pray and labor.

RESOLUTION ON THE ENDOWMENT AND EXPANSION CAM-PAIGN FOR BENNETT COLLEGE

The endowment and promotion of Bennett College is now one of the most pressing obligations upon the North Carolina Conference.

The institution has had a long and honorable career. Its graduates have stood out as leaders in the past and present.

No institution was dealt with more generously during the five year Centenary period. Many new buildings have been erected, so that the institution faces its greatest opportunity.

In the meantime academic standards have gone forward more rapidly in North Carolina than in any other state of the South, in both private and tax supported institutions, so that with all the progress the institution has made in physical plant and academic growth, its needs are still great, in order to continue its growth and usefulness. Therefore increased income is necessary and in line with all the other institutions for the education of the Negro, an endowment and expansion campaign is imperative.

Therefore resolved:

First, That the North Carolina Conference in session approves and authorizes an Endowment and Expansion Program for Bennett College.

Second, That the campaign goal be set at \$100,000 (one hundred thousand dollars) the same to cover a period of two and one-half years and to be secured by popular subscription and appeals to foundations and boards of education, denominational and general.

Third, That the North Carolina Conference pledges itself to cooperate with Board of Education through the Department of Educational Institutions for Negroes in carrying forward this campaign. Respectfully submitted.
