SIXTY-NINTH SESSION

The Sixty-ninth Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference convened in the St. Matthews M. E. Church in Greensboro, N. C., at nine o'clock in the morning, October the 26th, 1927, Bishop Robert E. Jones presiding. Hymn 577 was sung. N. M. Black led in prayer. Hymn 32 was sung.

Welcome addresses were made by his Honor, the Mayor E. B. Jeffress, of Greensboro, by Rev. J. J. Scarlette and Mrs. A. E. Peace. Bishop Jones made response.

On J. H. Isham's being reported deceased, the Conference rose and sang "Blest be the Tie that Binds," and Bishop Jones led in prayer.

S. A. Peeler was elected Secretary. He chose as his assistants J. E. Brower and G. H. Caldwell.

R. W. Winchester, Conference Treasurer, chose to assist him D. L. Thomas, A. G. Jenkins, J. C. Rush, W. T. Lomax, W. R. Zeigler, P. J. Cook, N. M. Martin, N. M. Black.

P. I. Wells, Statistician, chose his assistants.

The bar of the Conference was made to include the space lying between the pulpit and the first section of the large windows.

Question 15 was called. The characters of the District Superintendents, J. P. Morris, N. J. Pass, J. A. Baxter and G. M. Phelps, were passed.

J. P. Morris reported the Greensboro District.

N. J. Pass reported the Western District.

J. A. Baxter reported the Winston District.

Dr. F. I. Johnson, representing the Board of Foreign Missions, was introduced. He addressed the Conference.

On motion of H. L. Ashe, the Conference ordered a regular session for the afternoon.

Dr. W. A. C. Hughes, Secretary of the Board of Church Extension and Home Missions for Negroes, Rev. N. D. Shamburger, of Louisville, Ky., and Rev. M. B. M. Butler, pastor Trinity A. M. E. Z. Church, were introduced.

Bishop Jones, assisted by the District Superintendents, administered the Lord's Supper.

Announcements were made and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

In the afternoon, at half past two, the Conference met. Devotions were conducted by the Bishop. A. G. Jenkins led in the prayer.

G. M. Phelps reported the Wilmington District.

On motion of J. P. Morris, the Conference voted to require the pastors to report their World Service collections, the number of conversions and the accessions.

The characters of the effective Elders of the four districts were passed and they made their reports.

The character of W. J. Smith was passed.

Bishop Jones spoke of the Gammon Lectureship and collected \$70.00 on subscriptions previously made.

Mr. W. C. Price, representing the Methodist Book Concern, was introduced. He presented a check from the Book Concern of \$757.00.

A check of \$40.00 was presented from the Chartered Fund.

Mr. D. H. Sansom, of the American Bible Society, was introduced. He made remarks.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by D. Brooks.

H. L. Ashe presided at the evening session. The anniversary of the Board of Foreign Missions was held. Drs. F. I. Johnson and R. J. Wade delivered addresses.

SECOND DAY

On Thursday morning, at nine o'clock, the Conference opened its session with devotions led by J. P. Morris, who was appointed to preside in the temporary absence of Bishop Jones. The Conference sang the 1st Hymn and M. C. Laughlin led in prayer. Hymn No. 2 was sung.

Dr. J. R. Gettys was introduced. He presented from the Board of Pensions and Relief a check of \$513.40. He explained the memorial to General Conference for the adoption of the Plan of the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund, which the Conference adopted on motion of S. A. Peeler.

On motion of S. A. Peeler a Conference biography was ordered.

Question 32 was called. Hickory, N. C., was chosen as the seat of the next Conference. A vote of thanks was extended to High Point for their cordial invitation to hold the next Conference there.

The Reverends A. D. Avery, J. T. Hairston and K. C. Holt were introduced.

On motion of D. H. Kears, the Conference voted that the order of the day for Friday morning at ten o'clock be the election of delegates to the General Conference.

R. G. Morris, representing the Board of Church Extension, addressed the Conference. Miss Irene Thomas addressed the Conference.

On motion of S. A. Peeler, the Conference appointed R. T. Weatherby, R. G. Morris and H. L. Ashe a committee to construct a plan for Annual Conference entertainment. Bishop Jones took the chair and introduced Dr. J. H. Dillard. He addressed the Conference.

Dr. W. W. Alexander was introduced. He addressed the Conference.

Hymn 540 was sung. Mr. Chas. H. Ireland was introduced. He addressed the Conference.

Hymn 516 was sung. Announcements were made. Miss Irene Thomas rendered a solo—"I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say," and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Jones.

In the afternoon, at three o'clock, Rev. N. D. Shambourger, of Louisville, Ky., delivered one of his great sermons to the big congregation that taxed the capacity of the St. Matthews Church.

In the evening, at seven-thirty o'clock, the anniversary of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension was held. Addresses were delivered by Miss Irene Thomas and Dr. W. A. C. Hughes.

THIRD DAY

On Friday morning, at nine o'clock, the Conference opened with devotions led by Bishop Jones. Hymn No. 2 was sung, and G. H. Caldwell led in prayer.

S. A. Peeler and R. W. Winchester were ordered to give bonds in the amount of \$1,000, bonds to be satisfactory to the Conference Board of Trustees.

Question 3 was called. The character of S. J. Hayden was passed.

The characters of the retired ministers were passed.

Question 6 was called. Chas. G. Bynum was passed in character and he reported his work. He was continued on trial

in studies of the first year. The character of B. W. Stewart was passed. He reported his work. He was continued on trial in studies of the first year.

Calvin L. Gidney was passed in character and he made his report and was continued on trial in studies of the fourth year.

Question 7 was called.

The Order of the Day was taken up. The Bishop appointed P. J. Cook, G. M. Phelps, R. S. Abernethy, N. M. Martin, G. H. Caldwell, A. G. Jenkins tellers for the election of General Conference delegates.

R. G. Morris and R. W. Winchester were elected on the first ballot. H. L. Ashe and N. J. Pass were elected reserve delegates.

Dr. R. N. Brooks represented Gammon Theological Seminary in appropriate address.

Hymn 678 was sung. Dr. A. R. Howard, of the Board of Temperance and Public Morals, addressed the Conference.

The character of B. F. Gieaves was passed. He made his report and was advanced to the studies of the fourth year.

J. W. Hall was passed in character. He made his report and was advanced to the studies of the fourth year.

Question 25 was called. S. B. Cornelius was continued in the supernumerary relation for the third year.

G. W. Morehead and Marcus Mundy were granted the retired relation.

Dr. N. D. Shambourger addressed the Conference.

Announcements were made. Hymns 91, 530, and 410 were sung. The Conference ordered a joint session with the laymen at three o'clock in the afternoon.

Announcements were made. Bishop Jones pronounced the benediction.

Friday afternoon, at 3 o'clock, the Lay and Ministerial Conferences met in joint session, Bishop Jones presiding. The session was opened with devotions. Hymns 106, 123 and 57 were sung. Dorsey McRae led in prayer. Hymn 99 was sung.

Dr. C. H. Rowland, President of the Ministerial Association, Greensboro, and pastor of the First Christian Church, addressed the Conference.

R. G. Morris and R. W. Winchester, delegates elected to General Conference, addressed the Conference.

A memorial to the General Conference, offered by R. W. Winchester, was tabled.

Question 12 was called. W. C. Cook was elected to Local Deacons' Orders. Cyrus W. Perry was elected to Deacons' Orders, to be ordained elsewhere.

On motion of S. A. Peeler, the Conference ordered the printing of 1,200 minutes at a price adequate to pay for a journal meeting the Disciplinary requirements.

The four District Superintendents, and S. A. Peeler, the Secretary, were made the Publishing Committee and were requested to publish the minutes within 60 days after the adjournment of the present session of the Conference.

A collection was taken for S. L. Gilreath.

Announcements were made. Benediction was pronounced by Dr. Howard.

EVENING SESSION

At 7:30 o'clock in the evening the anniversaries of the Board of Education and Southwestern Christian Advocate were held.

Drs. R. N. Brooks, M. J. Holmes, and A. R. Howard made addresses.

FOURTH DAY

Conference met at 9 a. m. in the chapel of Bennett College.

Devotions were conducted by the Bishop. Prayer was offered by J. E. Brower. Minutes of the previous day were read and adopted.

Question 5 was called. Robert F. McCollum was received on trial and placed in studies of the third year. Henry Jones and Beverly E. Staton were received on trial and placed in studies of the first year. Beverly E. Staton was elected to Local Deacon's Orders.

Question 28 was called. The following were appointed Triers of Appeals: S. A. Peeler, G. H. Caldwell, P. I. Wells, R. G. Morris, R. B. Rhyne, R. W. Winchester. A. H. Newsome and P. J. Cook were appointed reserves.

A resolution relative to Bishop Jones was offered by R. W. Winchester and was adopted by the Conference. Hymn 678 was sung.

The Conference Board of Stewards made their report.

The Order of the Day was called.

The Glee Club of Bennett College for Women sang.

The Conference sang the Negro National Anthem.

The Bishop presented President David Jones to report the result for the Week of Sacrifice ordered by the last session of the Conference. J. P. Morris led in raising a deficit necessary for the collection of a five hundred dollar pledge made by Dr. Bruce, of Winston. The quota was raised and W. M. Wells presented Dr. W. H. Bruce's check for \$500, making our total \$5,000 for the year.

Mr. Chas. H. Ireland accepted these gifts in touching and happy address.

"Steal Away Home" was sung.

Bishop W. P. Thirkiel addressed the Conference on "Our Vision for Bennett."

Miss Florence Read, of Spellman College, addressed the Conference.

R. T. Weatherby spoke. Announcements were made and Bishop W. P. Thirkiel pronounced the benediction.

On Saturday evening at eight o'clock the anniversary of the Board of Hospitals, Home and Deaconess Work was held in St. Matthews, A. G. Jenkins presiding.

Dr. N. E. Davis and Dr. A. R. Howard delivered addresses.

FIFTH DAY

On Sunday morning at ten o'clock Love Feast was conducted by Daniel Brooks and W. W. Pope. At eleven o'clock Bishop R. E. Jones preached.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

REPORT OF THE GREENSBORO DISTRICT

J. P. Morris, District Superintendent

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

Guided by the Almighty Hand we have supervised the Greensboro District the past year. The task was strenuous but pleasant. With the pastors and people we went to work to make the district the best in its history, both materially, financially and spiritually. To some extent we had success. We looked after the charges carefully and adjusted their problems whenever possible.

Buildings

At several places material improvements have been made to the extent of large indebtedness. Help from without is necessary to save these points to our Methodism.

There has been erected at Norfolk, Va., one of the most beautiful brick structures of the Conference, at a cost of \$25,000, and it is in keeping with the other churches of the city. We have increased in membership 100%. Within a few years, at this rate of increase, Norfolk will be a great asset to the Conference and church. The indebtedness is large but the outlook is fine.

A very worthy improvement has been made at Browning Chapel, East Greensboro Charge. A beautiful, brick veneer structure has been erected and when finished, will be a church of which we may be proud.

Warren Street Church, in the western part of the city, is a church of brick material. In our judgment, this church is destined to meet the Master's demand in saving the people who hear Him gladly.

A goodly number of the constituency own their homes, yet there are many who work in service for the wealthy whites, and for the white schools. Certainly there is a unique place for this church to fill in proffering Christian help for this vicinity. Certainly these people should have religious provision and Christian supervision. The North Carolina Conference and the Church Extension Board will make a great mistake if they fail to render financial aid to these three points. For all three of them are paying largely to World Service. Other points have made advancement and have managed to meet their obligations.

World Service

The financial requirements have been largely met. Our World Service apportionment is beyond that of last year. From our Council meeting in February, on through the year, our district password has been "World Service Advancement."

Education

Our interest in Bennett College for Women has been, and is now, at a high level. We responded nobly to the call of President Jones and the trustees for means to assist in beautifying the campus. The notice was short, but the response was good under the circumstances. The value of this exceptional school for our girls is more and more appreciated. The work that is being done by the president and faculty is destined to bring Bennett College for Women to the forefront of all the special schools for our women. The specific program that was put on this year to prepare our girls in the main features of keeping an all-round home was something without a parallel in our educational life. This very unique training will be a yearly feature in the program of the school, and will help not only the student body, but will be of great benefit to the entire community.

Much might be said in praise of the personnel of the faculty and thoroughness of their work, but space will not permit.

Ministerial Support

The interest shown by our pastors and people in ministerial support is encouraging, especially that part that pertains to the retired minister. The layman is constantly expressing the opinion that more should be done for the veteran preacher who has made the North Carolina Conference possible. Our retired brethren are model men and are helping in every way that they can to push forward the program of the church. They give their money, their good word, and their wholesome spiritual influence for the advancement of the Kingdom. Brothers M. J. Bullock, J. H. Garrett, J. W. Jones and L. W. Thomas have been good attendants on the means of grace, and splendid advisors to the several pastors who administered unto them. The pleasant face and patient suffering of Brother A. W. McMaster show his absolute reliance upon the Master.

Revivals

We have been unusually blest this year spiritually. West Raleigh, Reidsville, and Empire are prominent among the many charges that received abundant blessings. Quite a number of names have been added to the church rolls, and souls to the Kingdom. The entire district has had a spiritual awakening and the brethren have witnessed a glorious year's work along with the laymen and the District Superintendent.

REPORT OF THE WINSTON DISTRICT

J. A. Baxter, District Superintendent

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

Divine Providence has made it possible for me to come up from my appointed field of labor to render this, my third, official report. It is with exultant joy we report the good health of the brethren and their

families and their high hopes. We dare not take any credit to ourselves but all glory and praise to Jesus give for His redeeming grace. We are still conscious that there is much room for more competent service; however, we are still learning how to be more efficient by profiting by former blunders. If we have obtained any degree of success it is largely due to the beautiful spirit of brotherly love and hearty co-operation of my brother ministers and faithful laymen.

True to Our Ideal

We are frank to confess that we are given to dreaming. Dreaming as was Nathaniel under the fig tree. Dreaming of the coming Kingdom of God and the Christ. We see the picture of the ideal condition when the lion and the lamb shall lie down together and the little child shall lead them. This being the vision of the Messianic prophet and the church, it must be no less ours. This idealistic state must be materialized and made practical through the church, the spouse of Christ, who spent his time among men proving that the dreamer, like Joseph, despised and rejected by his brethren may provide a practical way for living a natural life daily, thus proving ourselves great benefactors to the great brotherhood of the human family. This spirit I have endeavored to manifest among the brethren of the district.

Readjustment of Territory

At the last session of the Annual Conference there was appointed a committee of three to dispense with all outlying property, and money accrued therefrom be used at a point that was in course of erection. Until this time we have not been able to make a sale. However, there has been added to our territory other tracts of land that mean much to us by way of enhancing the value of our property. In Pen Hook, Va., our pastor has secured a valuable tract of land that gives much prominence there to our property.

There has been no recent movement on in the bounds of our Conference to enter new territory, but rather admonished to let our efforts be toward more intensive work and not extensive. But we must launch our boats when the full tide leads on to certain fortune. Through the benevolent spirit of widow Harshaw, one of our Conference claimants, we have in hand a deed made to Methodist Church for a tract of land, containing nearly two acres, within the incorporate limits of Mocksville, on which there is a nice house. Realizing we have no work anywhere between Advance and Statesville, we now have leeway to open up new fields. This is a challenge to the adventurous. While we are doing some extensive work, we're also doing some intensive work.

We have had our financial drives, our membership drives, which have taxed our pastors to their utmost, but to see one pastor in just a little different light we invite you to Winston-Salem where you will see the most modern, best equipped, outstanding, most imposing fourteen-room parsonage in the Chattanoooga area, when completed. The future home of a whole family of *culinary artists—Cooks.*

Making mention of intensive work, we have a man not content to

build *one* church at a time, but is now ready to begin the erection of *two* churches at one time at East Thomasville.

Young People's Work

For more than four years our district has not had its annual meeting for the young folk. This particular convention was discontinued so as to make possible the League Institute. This most wonderful enterprise was forced to the wall because of the lack of proper interest manifested. This has been a cause of shame to me, for I have come to believe that the young people of the Old North State would match favorably with the young people of any other state, but until now we have nothing to compare with the wonderful institutes of Atlanta and New Orleans areas. Not willing to suffer defeat, we have reorganized our Sunday school and Epworth League Convention with the idea of carrying out the institute program through the convention, looking forward to the idea when the district idea will become state-wide. And at some time in the near future our young folk will have a large tract of land where we can have an annual convention that will compare favorably with "Waveland," the pride of the New Orleans area.

Education

We have not lost sight of the fact that along with a consecrated life there must be the enlightened mind. Hence when wisdom lifted her voice at the gates of Bennett College for Negro Women, Allen Home, Clark University, Mehavey, and other of our schools, the Winston District has responded liberally with cash and talent.

World Service

We have been watching with keen interest and almost with bated breath the mighty upheavals that are taking place in the foreign fields. The return of missionaries to the home land with no apparent plans to return to their former tasks, the concerted efforts of the nations to refute Christianity, the Christian church in the home land seemingly losing interest, evidenced by the continued slumps in her missionary givings. Over against this gruesome picture we see the flood sufferers of lower Mississippi valley bereft of home, school and church life, looking to the church as her only hope for sustenance and rehabilitation. Still further in the background I see the profile of the "Man Galilee," as he sits among the Celestial hills looking this way, eagerly watching to see if we, the members of the Winston District, will desert Him at such a time as this. We are glad to report, Bishop, that instead of a slump we are in advance of last year. We have not deserted; we can't; we won't.

Church Membership

Throughout the district the revival fires have blazed. The smouldering flax has been fanned into mighty flames. Many souls have been quickened. This is the time we look forward to great harvest of members. Just how much stronger we are in our ranks I am unable to say,

as most of the revivals came after I had begun my fourth round. Whether it has been great or small I have not placed much stress, for most of them that were washed in by rising tide have been washed out by the receding. But I have been very solicitous about those members that are transplanted into the church from the hot-beds of the Sunday schools, and are watched and cared for by faithful teachers. These are the ones that are substantial, trustworthy, and are not so easily carried away by the varied winds that blow. I have not ceased to warn against the malicious cutting off or dropping of members because of apparent inability to keep up financial obligations. If such becomes necessary, be sure that every precaution has been taken to save the individual to the church. There has been a substantial gain according to my records.

Looking Ahead

We do not agree with the ancients that the "Golden Age" has passed. We are not convinced that "Utopian" days were back before the sixties. I am not so sure that the present days are more evil than the past. It may appear so because there is more light turned on today than formerly and more so because most of us harking back to Egypt, forgetful of Caanan that lies ahead.

It's not so much what you are, or from whence you came, but whither bound.

The "Golden Age" is yet to come; Caanan lies just ahead.

Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: But this one thing I do: Forgetful of those things which are behind and reaching forth unto the things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

REPORT OF THE WESTERN DISTRICT

cannot but be interested in everything that touches the lives of people of the whole wide world.

I again point with pride to the great strides the Western District is making. Especially in bringing men and women, boys and girls, into the Kingdom of God.

We thank God that the lives and health of the pastors and their families have been spared. Death has entered none of our parsonages, and the general health of those who occupy them has been good.

Your humble servant has traveled throughout the district, visiting the charges, preaching, and instructing the people, assisting in revivals and holding the Quarterly Conferences within the bounds of my district.

Every interest of our great church, every phase of its progressive and far-reaching program for human uplift, world-wide evangelism, and Kingdom building, has been carefully and prayerfully looked after.

As previously referred to, this year has been among the best in the history of the Western District in the matter of conversions and accessions.

Each charge on the district has shared in this wonderful spiritual awakening, some in a more marked degree than others, but all having made gains in membership—and in that high spiritual sense and fervor which characterized the faith of our fathers.

With a total of more than three hundred conversions and accessions, including children in the morning of their lives, young men, young women who have entered upon the more sane, sober, and solemn periods of life, older men of families, who have thought on their ways and turned to tread the heavenward road, the Western District has occasion to thank God, take courage, and as never before renew its attack upon the strongholds of sin and make far greater strides in putting across the great programs of our beloved Zion.

We rejoice that there exists upon our district a feeling of co-operation, peace, harmony and love among District Superintendents, pastors and people, beautiful and sublime. We are sharers in each other's joys and happiness, sympathizers and supporters in each other's sorrows. Thus coupled together, laboring under the banner of the blessed Christ, our fullest success as we desire it might be temporarily delayed, but failure is impossible.

Sunday Schools

That the Sunday Schools properly looked after and nurtured are the plant bed of the church has long since been noted by the church fathers.

It is a fact that is irrefutable. We are glad, dear Bishop and brethren, to report that the growth of this institution on the Western District has been marvelous indeed. The use of the literature of our church, the bringing into our Sunday Schools better prepared and more consecrated teachers are responsible for this noteworthy change, and the result is that the increase of well trained members coming into our churches through the Sunday Schools is remarkable.

During the month of May we met in Sunday School and Epworth League Convention on the Catawba Charge. It was indeed a great gathering of enthusiastic young folk of our church.

The papers prepared and read by these delegates, the intelligence dis-

played in their timely discussions, gave deepest encouragement and inspiring hope that the great church will not cease its aggressive fight for soul emancipation with the passing of the present generation.

It was also shown that there is a mighty awakening of interest in the Epworth Leagues on the district, and the proverbial Epworth wheel, once proclaimed so infinitely hard to start and more difficult to continue, is now revolving with accuracy, ease and efficiency.

District Conference

The Western District Conference was held in Lenoir, the mountain city. It was well attended and made a profoundly favorable impression upon the city for our church.

From every angle by which success or failure may be measured or determined, this Conference was a stupendous success. Rev. McLeod and Rev. Rhyne, and the good people of their charges who respectively entertained these gatherings, deserve great credit for the manner in which they cared for their guests.

Education

Within the bounds of the Western District is Allen Home, Asheville, N. C. To the members of the North Carolina Conference it needs no special introduction. For many years, with a faculty of consecrated, faithful and cultured women, it has been writing in bold letters its introduction and its history in the lives and characters of the young women. Not of our church alone, but of the states of our glorious republic. We are justly proud of her achievements in the past, her equipments and success of the present, and brilliant outlook for a brighter future. To this end the Western District pledges its best efforts and most loyal support.

Bennett College for Women

In the wisdom of the Board of Education for Negro Schools and Colleges of the Methodist Episcopal Church, focused by the vision of the Bishop of the Chattanooga Area, our own beloved Bishop Wilbur P. Thirkield, D.D., L.L.D., this newest of our denominational institutions of learning was born and christened only a year ago. We heard with joy its advent into the field of education within the limits of our conference. Its mission is a great one, and there is great need for it in the educational system of North Carolina, the most progressive today of all her sisters in the union of states.

We are delighted that at its head, as President, is a young man of brain, character, religion and culture, who in other positions of honor and trust has proven himself a master, has been selected in the person of Prof. David D. Jones, A.B.

It is our conscientious opinion that no better selection could be made. The Western District though stricken by three successive years of poor crops and poorer prices, entered the campaign with the other districts of the Conference to raise its quota for this college, as ordered by the last Annual Conference. While we did not reach our goal, we are glad to report that we did raise something over \$500.00, and we stand pledged to stand by the school with our co-operation, our moral support, and our money, until its highest ideals are reached.

World Service

If "To be living is sublime," what is life in this, the most wonderful age of the world's history? It is an age in which large things are being done on a larger scale.

"World Service" is a stupendous word. Transposed it reads, "The church of God is called upon to serve the world in placing God's Kingdom in the remotest bounds of the earth, and the bringing of the people of all lands into fellowship with Him."

All nations of earth must hear before they can accept the Gospel of the Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. The saved must touch and energize the unsaved; the tutored must teach the unlearned; and strangers to the commonwealth of Israel must be introduced to our God and his Christ through those who know Him.

The Methodist Episcopal Church is enthusiastically getting under its share of this world redemption load.

We have mustered our men and women—sent them into lands of danger, darkness and death, to the end that all the races of man may hear the clarion sound of "Good news and great joy." Manacles broken, captives freed.

We are not only sending our bravest, our purest, and our best into our foreign fields, which include the whole known world, but we have underwritten in terms of millions of dollars what it actually costs to keep them on the firing line—in both our home and foreign work. To raise our quota of this stupendous amount the Western District, splendidly organized and well manned, has cheerfully betaken itself to its task, and is doing its best.

The Western District lies almost wholly in the agricultural section of Western North Carolina, where cotton is the chief money crop. Much of our success or failure in raising assessments is influenced by good or bad crops, fair or poor prices, late or early harvesting of cotton.

We have no large city churches on the district. Our work is almost entirely rural, and yet, Mr. President, we rejoice to be able to report an increase on every charge, with possibly two exceptions, in World Service collections over that of last year, which our pastors' reports will show.

REPORT OF THE WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop, Honored Fathers, and Fellow-Workers of The North Carolina Conference:

It has become my duty and privilege to make a report for the year as District Superintendent of the Wilmington District.

I left the Annual Conference last fall, in company with the other men assigned to the Wilmington District, with higher hopes and greater expectations for the district than ever before.

As soon as possible thereafter, we assembled ourselves and agreed on plans which, according to our prayerful consideration, we thought would make this success possible. Therefore, we present ourselves this day, ready

to make our report, after having given ourselves unreservedly to the tasks which were given us.

While we rejoice over the fine spirit of co-operation and brotherliness which has been evident at all times during the year, we are at the same time mindful that our ranks have been broken twice this year by the unwelcome stranger who usually comes without an invitation. On his first visit he carried away the wife of Rev. W. M. Crawford, whose untiring and devoted efforts have meant much to the success which has accompanied his ministry. The second visit was made to get the Rev. J. H. Isham, who was winding up one of the most successful year's work of his ministry. He was a hard worker and a great lover of his church.

District Activities

It has been ours during the year to do some special work with the young people. There were two occasions which I think deserve mentioning in this report. For some time the district has held in the spring a Sunday School and Epworth League Convention. We had, in connection with the convention this year, institute work, conducted by Dr. F. H. Butler, Secretary of the Sunday School and Epworth League work. The young people which were privileged to attend the institute, requested that it be an annual affair.

The other cause in which the young people were given primary consideration was our Young People's World Service District Council meeting. (We have given to them the task of helping us to spread World Service news.) In this Council meeting the young people read papers which they had read in their local Council meetings on the following subjects: The Foreign and Home Fields, The Agencies at Work in these Fields, and The Financial Needs of the Same. We have put forth no effort that has met with heartier response on the part of the young people than this one.

Our District Conference this year was one of interest throughout the entire session. The reports were put through as quickly as possible that ample time might be given for the discussion of the following subjects: Worship, Meditation, The Elevation of the Communion Service, and Evangelism. In connection with the previous things, two of our brethren were asked to prepare two sermons, giving special attention to their spiritual and homiletical values.

Financial Results

In our first district meeting, financial plans for the year were agreed upon, at which time it was emphasized by one of the older men of the district that if we would have financial success we must lead in this, as in other things. It was the following of this suggestion, together with the other financial plans, which has pushed our district far ahead of last year financially. There has been such an increase beyond that of last year in every charge that I dare not mention any one of them.

Spiritual Results

When the people can be made to see and assume willingly their financial obligation, it is a clear indication that spiritual results have preceded or will soon follow.

We have kept before our people this year the necessity of meditation, the sincerity of worship, the importance of the communion service, and personal evangelism. While we have not been able to interest quite so many as we had hoped to, the number has been sufficient to warrant all of our efforts. Therefore, with those who have given evidence of their sincerity, we shall go on touching and influencing others as we present to them the never-failing Christ.

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia, and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina conferences. In the year 1836 the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first nine sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes and from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

At this date the Conference had 19495 white members and 3990 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some entered the A. M. E. Church, some the Colored M. E. Church of America; but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church, as it returned to the State.

At this session a new Conference—the Blue Ridge—was formed, with twelve preachers, 2839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.

RESOLUTIONS

Whereas this session of the North Carolina Conference has been singularly blessed to have as its President one of its own beloved, honored and distinguished sons in the person of Bishop Robert E. Jones, D.D., resident Bishop of the New Orleans Area, and;

Whereas he has presided over the deliberations of this Conference with marked ability, great culture, noticeable ease, grace and dignity, kind and brotherly in dealing with his brethren, the members of the Conference. Fair and impartial in his rulings, yet business-like and scrupulously exacting in handling the affairs of the church, in their minutest details, and;

Whereas, from the emphasis he placed upon things spiritual during the devotional hour each day, deeply has impressed and inspired the Conference;

Be it therefore resolved: First, that we thank God for him, and feel a high sense of pride in the splendid success which has come to the church through his labors as one of the general superintendents of our Methodism.

Resolved: Second, that we shall follow him with our prayers in the years to come, that his life and health may be spared for continuous service, in the high position of honor, trust, opportunity and responsibility into which he has been brought for such a time as this.

Resolved: Third, that this Conference place itself on record in expressing its deep gratitude and high sense of appreciation for the invaluable service Bishop Jones rendered our church and our racial group during the distressing floods of the Mississippi valley and other contiguous parts of that section of our country the present year.

Resolved: Fourth, that we thank the Board of Bishops for having assigned him to hold this session of our Conference which has been such a pleasing and successful one.

Resolved: Fifth, that we do hereby instruct and request the delegates elected at this Conference who are to represent us in the next General Conference to appear before the Episcopal Committee and present to that body the request hereby made that the North Carolina Conference shall remain a part of the Chattanooga Area, and that Bishop Robert E. Jones be assigned the resident Bishop of said area.

Whereas, our own beloved Bishop, W. P. Thirkield, D.D., L.L.D., whose love and large self-sacrificing labors for and with our people have made possible their elevation to the highest position in the gift of this great church, has honored, blessed, cheered and thrilled us with his presence, inspired us with his usual brilliant and scholarly addresses, ably presiding at one of our daily sessions, and;

Whereas, his active services as a general superintendent will end at the close of this quadrennium—a great and good man, whose whole life has been spent for the uplift of the Negro race,

Be it resolved: First, that it is with genuine sorrow that we part with this, our beloved Bishop, our teacher and our friend. We shall ever hold him and his dear wife, Mrs. W. P. Thirkield, in grateful remembrance for what they have done for the great church of which we are a part, and for our race especially.

We shall ever pray that upon them God shall pour His choicest blessings and His richest rewards.

Whereas, several of the representatives of our General Church Boards have visited us, inspired and instructed us by their eloquent and masterly addresses,

Be it resolved: That we thank them for their presence, and for the help they have given us in understanding our relations to their respective Boards, to the end that we may, with greater efficiency, discharge the duties which the church places upon us.

Whereas, his honor, the mayor of the City of Greensboro, personally honored us with his presence and in choice, fitting and friendly words, extended to the **Conference the hearty welcome** of the city,

Be it resolved: That we sincerely thank him for the honor he has conferred upon us.

Resolved: That we thank Mrs. S. F. B. Peace, representing St. Matthews Methodist Episcopal Church, and Rev. Dr. J. J. Scarlett, representing the Ministerial Association of the City of Greensboro, for strong addresses of welcome in behalf of their respective organizations.

Resolved further: That we thank Dr. James H. Dillard, Mr. Ireland, Dr. Alexander, and the pastor of the local Christian Church (white), for their presence with us, the able addresses delivered, and for the interest they manifested in the work of the Conference.

Be it also resolved: First, that we thank the Secretary, Dr. S. A. Peeler; the Treasurer, Dr. R. W. Winchester; the Statistician, Rev. P. I. Wells, and their assistants for the faithful and efficient performance of the arduous duties of their respective offices.

Whereas, Dr. R. T. Weatherby, pastor, and the faithful members of St. Matthews church, assisted by the pastors and members of nearby charges of our own Conference, and the good people of the City of Greensboro, irrespective of denominational lines, have spared no pains or expense to make our entertainment royal in a marked degree.

Be it resolved: That we thank them for their kindness, their hospitality and the unselfish contribution they have made in making our stay among them one that will linger long in our recollections.

Resolved further: That we shall remember them in our prayers, asking for them the choicest blessings of the Father of us all.

TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST
EPISCOPAL CHURCH, TO BE HELD AT KANSAS CITY,
MISSOURI, MAY, 1928

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

WHEREAS, There has been presented to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church the "Complete Text of the Plan of the MINISTERS' RESERVE PENSION FUND" of the Methodist Episcopal Church as approved by the Board of Pensions and Relief; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, (1) That we hereby approve the principle of providing adequate reserve funds to protect and stabilize the payment of pension and other benefits to the retired and disabled ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church and to the widows and orphans of Methodist preachers;

(2) That we commend to the next General Conference the adjustment of the pension program of the church in such manner as to make the progressive funding of pensions for "New Entrants" a certainty, and at the same time make provision for the guaranty of all pensions based on services rendered by "Previous Entrants";

(3) That we urge the General Conference to direct that steps be taken to promote a general effort throughout the church to secure the requisite reserves so as to make possible at an early day the reserve funding of all accrued pensions;

(4) That we approve the general principles embodied in the "Complete Text of the Plan of the MINISTERS' RESERVE PENSION FUND," prepared and approved by the Board of Pensions and Relief, as furnishing a progressive program that will gradually stabilize the pension system of Methodism on a reserve basis, without disturbing, meanwhile, pension operations under the "Original Pension System" of 1908; and respectfully memorialize the General Conference to adopt the Plan of the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund and incorporate it into the legislation of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

A MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE
KANSAS CITY, MO.

RESOLVED: That we, the members of the North Carolina Conference, earnestly request and call upon and urge those who are now in any way involved in planning for and in arranging the adjustments of the schools for Negroes, that ample provision be made for at least one accredited college or university that will be recognized by the University Senate of this country.

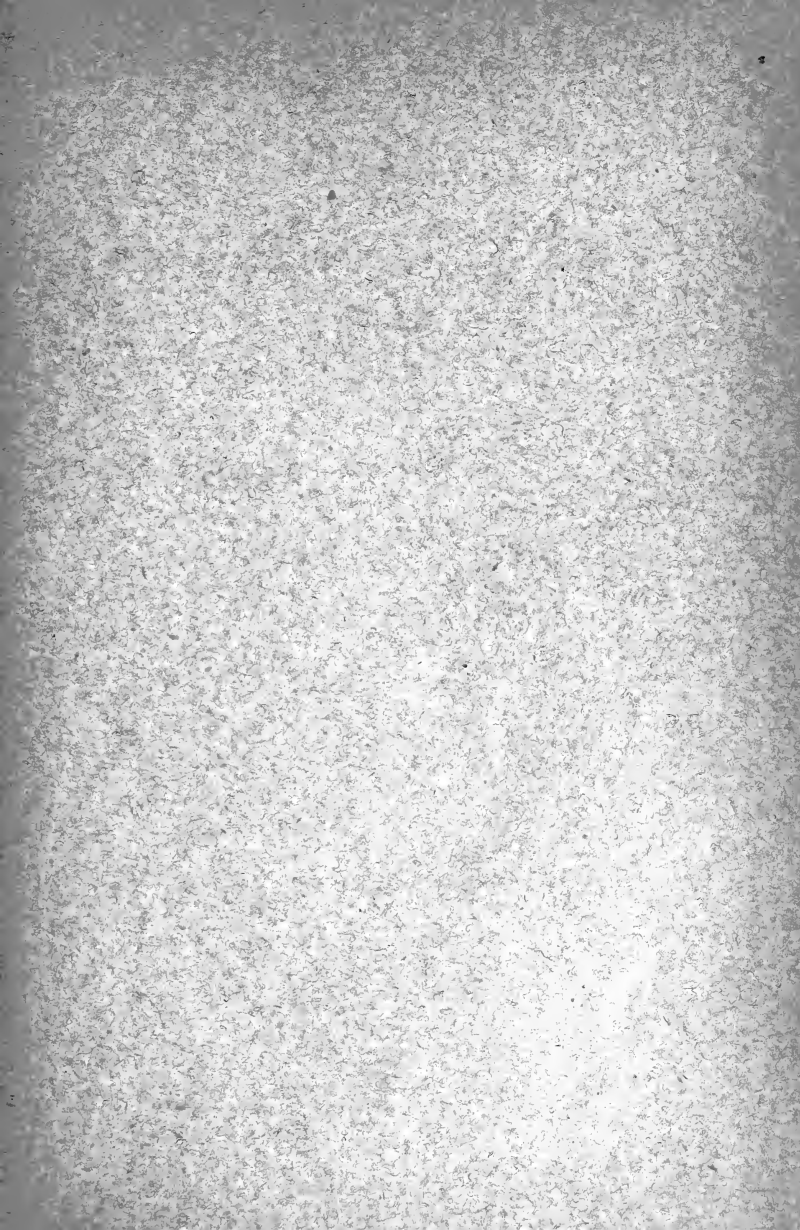
