DAILY PROCEEDINGS

THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in its seventy-third annual session in Saint Marks Church, High Point, North Carolina, Wednesday morning, November 25, 1931, at 9:30.

Bishop H. Lester Smith, resident Bishop of the Chattanooga Area, called the session to order.

IN THE DEVOTIONAL PERIOD Hymns No. 560 and 411, from the Methodist Hymnal, were sung. Bishop Smith read the Scripture from the twelfth chapter of Saint John and delivered a forceful address from the general subject of "Sacrificial Service." At the close of the address Bishop Smith, assisted by the District Superintendents and the pastor of the church, administered the Holy Communion.

ROLL CALL: The Secretary of the last Conference called the roll of retired, effective, and probationary ministers.

QUESTION 17: At the calling of the names of the deceased brethren, E. A. McArthur, J. P. Morris and N. S. T. Shambourger, the Conference stood while Bishop Smith invoked the blessings of God upon their work and upon the bereaved families.

THE BAR OF THE CONFERENCE was made to include the first seven seats from the Chancel.

ORGANIZATION: A motion prevailed that the officers of the Conference be elected by ballot. The tellers appointed were D. L. Thomas, J. B. Meekins, A. S. McGowans, R. B. Rhyne. G. H. Caldwell was elected Secretary, N. J. Pass was elected Treasurer, and P. I. Wells, Statistician.

The Secretary named as his assistants, W. C. Scarborough, W. T. Lomax, R. S. Abernathy.

The Treasurer named to assist him, D. L. Thomas, J. W. Wells, D. H. Kearse, C. W. Perry, J. W. Hall, P. J. Cook, N. M. Black, and Leroy Hedrick.

The Statistician named G. W. Patterson, H. C. Gannaway, J. B. Meekins, E. I. S. Swann, to assist him.

The Secretaries of the Conference were made reporters to the daily and religious press.

In the WELCOME SERVICES Dr. C. S. Grayson, Mayor of High Point, delivered an address of Welcome on behalf of the city, to which Dr. J. A. McRae, of Reidsville, responded. On behalf of the Ministerial Alliance, Rev. F. R. Mason, pastor of First Baptist Church, brought welcome. Rev. N. J. Pass, in his own inimitable way, responded. Prof. A. J. Griffin brought welcome on behalf of the citizens, to which Prof. W. B. Windsor responded.

BOOK CONCERN: Mr. Amos L. Betts, of the Book Concern, was introduced. He presented a check of \$246.37 from the Book Concern, and \$50 from the Chartered Fund. Both checks were received and turned over to the Conference Board of Stewards for distribution.

THE PRINTED PROGRAM, with the amendment that the hour of election of ministerial delegates to the General Conference be changed from 11:00 on Friday to 10:00 on Thursday morning, was made the official program of the Conference.

Representing the BOARD OF PENSIONS AND RELIEF, Dr. S. H. Sweeney was introduced. He reported the Conference share of funds from his Board as follows: An unexpended balance of \$55.70; by regular appropriation, \$531; by extra appropriation, \$110; interest on Conference Permanent Fund, \$11.78 and \$31.50; making a total of \$684.27.

THE MEMORIAL SERVICE program for 10:30 in the morning was postponed until the afternoon session and placed at 2:15.

After the announcements, the morning session adjourned to meet at 2:15 P. M. Dr. A. P. Shaw pronounced the benediction.

FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY — Afternoon Session

In the Devotional Period the Conference sang Hymn No. 185 and Hymn No. 50, from the Methodist Hymnal, with a prayer by G. M. Phelps.

MEMORIAL SERVICES were conducted for N. S. T. Shamburger, J. P. Morris and E. H. McArthur, with addresses by J. W. Simpson, S. A. Peeler and W. R. Zeigler, respectively.

Mesdames Nancy Morehead, Marcus Mundy and H. O. Frederick, deceased wives of ministers of the Conference, were eulogized in addresses by J. C. Rush, M. C. Laughlin, D. L. Thomas and H. L. Ashe. J. W. Shufford spoke in memory of Theophile Wells, deceased son of one of the ministers of the Conference. To close the service, the Conference sang No. 604. Rev. S. F. B. Peace, Chairman of the Memorial Committee, presided.

A basket of carnations was presented to Bishop Smith from the Ladies Aid Society of St. Marks M. E. Church, under a privileged question granted E. L. Ashe.

In the STATISTICAL SESSION, which followed, the Treasurer and Statistician received in open Conference the statistics from the charges and checked on their accuracy at the time they were presented.

Mrs. C. W. Perry, a talented soloist, led the Conference in the singing of the Negro Spiritual, "Couldn't Hear Nobody Pray."

BENNETT COLLEGE FOR WOMEN was represented in an address by its talented President, David D. Jones.

A COMMISSION OF SEVEN, by motion of R. G. Morris, was raised to study and work out a plan by which a permanent fund might be secured and invested for our retired ministers.

Following announcements, the session was adjourned with the benediction by Dr. S. H. Sweeney.

SECOND DAY, THURSDAY — Morning Session

At nine o'clock Bishop Smith called the Conference to order. Hymns No. 90 and 428 were sung. The 90th Psalm was read and N. M. Black led in prayer.

THE JOURNAL of the morning and afternoon sessions for Wednesday was read and approved.

CONSIDERATION OF UNDERGRADUATES in their respective classes was the next item of business. GEORGE E. HOGUE, passed in character, was admitted to full membership, elected to Elder's orders as a local preacher, and was placed in the studies of the third year. LEANDER A. BROWN, JAMES E. GREEN and PRINCE A. TAYLOR passed in character and were advanced to the studies of the fourth year. LEROY W. HEDRICK and CYRUS W. PERRY passed in character, were admitted into full membership, graduated from the Course of Study, and elected to Elders Orders under the Seminary Rule. THOMAS H. WOOTEN was received on trial, elected to Deacons Order under the Seminary Rule to be ordained elsewhere, and was placed in the studies of the first year.

THE JOURNAL OF 1930 was found to be in error in that it placed the names of HENRY JONES and BEVERLY E. STATON as Probationers. The Journal of 1929 showed them to have been admitted into full membership at the Winston Conference. They were passed in character, were graduated from the Course of Study and elected to Elders Orders. CHARLES G. BYNUM was continued on trial in the studies of the first year. DOCK A. HILL was continued on trial and advanced to the studies of the second year. JOHN H. FOYE and S. H. PRESSLEY were passed in character and continued on trial in the studies of the third year.

ELECTION OF DELEGATES: Pursuant to a previous order, the hour of 10:00 had arrived, when the ministerial delegates to the General Conference were to be elected. The Bar of the Conference was cleared. Bishop Smith gave full instructions as to the method of procedure.

The tellers were named as follows: R. T. Weatherby, Chairman; S. A. Peeler, P. J. Cook, A. H. Newsome, N. M. Black, J. E. Brower. The Secretary of the Conference was requested to make the record for the tellers. The first ballot was taken.

While the ballot was being counted, QUESTIONS 3, 7 and 10 were called, to each of which the Conference responded, "None."

Under QUESTION 26, the Retired Elders—J. C. Addie, J. J. Blanton, Daniel Brooks, M. J. Bullock, G. W. Byers, S. B. Cornelius, H. O. Frederick, J. H. Garrett, J. D. Hairston, J. R. McNair, A. B. McQueen, Dorsey McRae, G. W. Morehead, Marcus Mundy, W. W. Pope and L. W. Thomas—were passed in character and continued in the retired relation.

The result of the first ballot follows: Ballots cast, 77; necessary to a choice, 39; R. W. Winchester, having received 42 votes, was declared elected.

A second ballot for a second delegate was immediately taken.

W. M. Wells passed in character and reported the work of the Laurinburg District.

THANKSGIVING SERVICE: At 11:00, pursuant to the program arrangement, H. L. Ashe announced Hymn No. 713. R. W. Winchester led in prayer. W. M. Wells read the 105th Psalm, and Hymn No. 177 was sung. J. E. Brower presented Bishop H. Lester Smith, who delivered the Thanksgiving sermon from Rev. 15: 2, 3, 4 verses. The close attention and response from every one in the audience proved the searching power of the sermon to move to new resolution and higher living. A Thanksgiving offering of \$50 was received and turned over to the pastor of the church to be used locally.

The result of the second ballot was announced as follows: Ballots cast, 78; defective, 1; ballots counted, 77; necessary to a choice, 39. No one having received the necessary 39 votes, there was no election.

The Conference waived its motion of adjournment and moved to take a third ballot for election of a second delegate.

While the tellers counted the ballot, the Conference joined heartily in the singing of Negro spirituals.

The third ballot resulted as follows: number of votes cast, 79; necessary for a choice, 40; no one received the necessary 40 votes, and there was no election. The tellers immediately prepared a fourth ballot.

Prof. R. Baxter McCrary, of Baltimore, Md., was introduced.

A motion prevailed that business for the afternoon session be suspended and that the election of the reserve delegates become part of the business of Friday morning.

The result of the fourth ballot was announced as follows: Number of ballots cast, 78; necessary for a choice, 40; R. G. Morris, having received 43 votes, was declared elected.

Dr. A. P. Shaw, Editor of the Christian Advocate, Southwestern Edition, was announced to preach at 3:00 in the afternoon.

The session adjourned, with benediction by H. L. Ashe.

THIRD DAY, FRIDAY — Morning Session

During the devotional period Hymns Nos. 265 and 312 were sung. Prayer was offered by Rev. Guy F. Crawford. Scripture was read from Ephesians 6:1-12.

The JOURNAL of Thursday's session was read and approved.

A ballot for election of RESERVE DELEGATES to the General Conference was taken.

Bishop Smith delivered the address to the class for full admission, and after receiving affirmative answers to the prescribed questions, received them into full membership.

The report of ballot for Reserve Delegates was as follows: Ballots cast, 48; necessary to a choice, 25; G. M. Phelps, with 35 votes, and W. M. Wells with 29 votes, were declared elected.

R. T. Weatherby, rising to a question of personal privilege, presented some Boy Scouts who had caught an o'possum for the Bishop's benefit and had walked from Greensboro to High Point to greet Bishop Smith and be presented to the Conference.

Bishop Smith, in receiving these Boy Scouts, related some of the experiences of his life as a boy, and with boys since he became Bishop. He strongly urged the pastors to give point and leadership to boy life.

J. E. Brower, R. W. Winchester, District Superintendents of the Winston and Western Districts respectively, were passed in character and reported the work of their Districts.

The EFFECTIVE ELDERS of the Laurinburg, Western and Winston Districts, and those of the Greensboro District, were passed in character.

In response to QUESTION 1, the Conference answered that it has a Board of Trustees as required by State Law. S. A. Peeler, Treasurer of the Trustee Board, is already bonded to the amount of \$1,000, and N. J. Pass, Conference Treasurer, was ordered bonded to the amount of \$1,000.

In response to QUESTIONS 2 and 4, the Conference answered, "None."

R. C. SHARPE was elected to Deacons Order as a local preacher. The name of S. E. DUNHAM, a supply pastor, was presented by the Committee on Conference Relations for reception into full membership and Elders Orders. Bishop Smith ruled that no supply pastor who had not the educational qualifications could be admitted to an Annual Conference. The name of S. E. Dunham was withdrawn and his District Superintendent was allowed to use him as a Supply.

Bishop Smith further ruled that no person, whatever his orders, and from whatever his church, could be used as a Supply unless he were a member of the M. E. Church, and that his orders were non-effective for use in our connection unless they had been recognized by a Methodist Episcopal Conference.

Under QUESTION 14, the name of J. A. CHERRY was presented. Bishop Smith ruled that a man left without appointment to attend school must be in attendance at school. Action in the case was deferred for Cabinet consideration.

The name of B. W. STEWARD, applying for reception on trial, was withdrawn for lack of recommendation to support the application. He was disallowed the privilege of being used as a Supply.

Responding to QUESTION 15, the Conference answered that the character of each preacher was examined in open Conference.

When QUESTION 16 was called, James A. Baxter was announced transferred to the Atlanta Conference, the transaction having taken place November 10, 1930.

To QUESTIONS 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 27, the Conference answered, "None."

Under QUESTION 25, A. M. Robertson was continued in the Supernumerary relation for the fourth year.

THE TRIERS OF APPEALS were named as follows: S. A. Peeler, R. G. Morris, N. J. Pass, P. I. Wells, G. H. Caldwell. Reserves: A. H. Newsome and R. B. Rhyne.

Drs. Guy Foye Crawford, of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, and D. S. Patterson of the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals, were introduced to the Conference.

R. T. Weatherby was excused from attendance upon the Saturday session of the Conference to attend a meeting of the Commission on Unemployment called by the Governor of the State, at Raleigh.

The Conference moved the adoption of a resolution endorsing the plans and hopes of the State Commission on Unemployment, and authorized R. T. Weatherby to express the same.

By motion the Conference requested that a special Committee of five be appointed to cooperate with R. T. Weatherby in the State work of Unemployment Relief.

In the noon day DEVOTIONAL HOUR Hymn No. 19 was sung. Following the prayer, Bishop Smith read the Scripture from St. Matthew 16. He delivered a forceful message on the passage read.

Dr. A. P. Shaw, Editor of THE SOUTHWESTERN EDITION OF THE CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, addressed the Conference with much fervor and favor relative to the support of the paper.

The BENNETT QUARTETTE honored the Conference with a musical number.

The LAY DELEGATES to the General Conference, President David D. Jones and Prof. J. A. McRae, were presented for remarks.

After the announcements, the Conference adjourned to meet at 9:00 Saturday morning.

The benediction was pronounced by Bishop Smith.

FOURTH DAY, SATURDAY — Morning Session

In the Devotional Period Hymns No. 538 and 508 were sung. Scripture was read by Bishop Smith from the sixth chapter of Galatians. R. N. Brooks led in prayer.

The minutes of Friday's session were read and approved.

Under QUESTION 32, N. J. Pass, the Conference Treasurer, made his report. The report was adopted. The Treasurer was requested to include in the columns for Education the amounts contributed by the respective charges for the Bennett College Campaign. (See Treasurer's Report).

GENERAL CONFERENCE EXPENSE FUNDS was brought to the attention of the Conference by Bishop Smith. By motion, the Conference was urged to collect General Conference expense from the several charges and send the money in to the Treasurer of General Conference Expense not later than March 15.

WORLD SERVICE INTERESTS were brought to the attention of the Conference by Dr. Guy Foye Crawford. The attitude of the Conference toward World Service was reflected in the report of the Conference World Service Committee. The report recommended a District World Service Council and sub-District gatherings in each District. It further recommended the use of all available helps from the World Service Commission including stereopticon lectures, World Service News, dime booklets and regular systematic giving.

Under QUESTION 31 the Statistician made his report. The report was adopted. (See report).

STANDING BOARDS AND COMMITTEES were named by the Secretary of the Cabinet and approved by the Conference.

ON THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING, G. M. Phelps was appointed in the place of N. J. Pass and D. H. Kearsse in the place of J. E. Brower.

THE COMMITTEE ON UNEMPLOYMENT, as ordered in a previous session, was named as follows: R. T. Weatherby and the four District Superintendents.

THE BOARD OF STEWARDS made their report. The Stewards' Report provoked a discussion relative to immediate and permanent funds.

By motion, the Conference rate apportioned to pastoral Charges for support of Conference Claimants was changed from 5% to 3% of the pastor's cash salary.

A motion prevailed that at the calling of the roll of members and probationers of the Conference each be required to pay 1% of his cash salary as a Permanent Fund for Conference Claimants. The Conference further moved that any defaults or deficits in these payments of 1% should be charged against his claim when he retires.

The entire action on Conference Claimants was referred to the Committee of Seven to become a part of their report at the next session of the Annual Conference.

The report of the Board of Stewards was adopted. (See Stewards' report).

Under QUESTION 39, where shall the next Conference be held, Reidsville and Mt. Airy extended invitations. The invitation to Reidsville was accepted. The Conference extended its thanks to Mt. Airy for its kind invitation.

THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING presented a resolution setting forth a yearly plan of operation effecting the undergraduates and supplies. The report was adopted and ordered published in the Journal. (See resolutions).

PLEASURE IN THE PRESIDENCY OF BISHOP SMITH and a desire that he be returned to our Area for another quadrennium was expressed in a resolution presented by R. W. Winchester. The resolution was unanimously adopted.

A collection was lifted for the extra service of the sexton and turned over to the pastor of the church.

ALLEN HOME AND HIGH SCHOOL was represented in a communication to the Conference from its Superintendent, Miss Louisa A. Bell. Miss I. R. Jones, from Allen Home, was introduced. She thanked the Conference for the support given on the D. Brooks Memorial Library and expressed the wish that the Conference might continue until all were paid. The Conference voted confidence in the administration and work of the school, and re-pledged itself to continued support.

Our church property at CULLOWHEE and BEAVER DAM property at Asheville, was placed in the hands of our Conference Trustees to be sold, the proceeds therefrom to be held by the Conference Trustees subject to the vote of the Conference.

THE SCHOOL OF PRACTICAL METHODS at Livingstone College was endorsed in a resolution presented by R. G. Morris. The resolution was adopted.

The noonday Devotional Address was omitted for lack of time.

The report of the Publishing Committee was read and adopted. The Publishing Committee was requested to print 1000 copies of the Journal.

THE PRINTED JOURNAL was made the official record of the seventy-third session of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS: The proposed Constitutional Amendments originating in the Central Pennsylvania Conference, were voted upon as follows: No. 1—Amend Par. 38, Sec. 2, Discipline 1928, so as to require any delegate elected to the General Conference to have served in the Conference electing him at least four successive years immediately preceding his election. Yeas, 51. Noes, 0. No. 2—Amend Par. 38, Sec. 2, so as to elect as many Reserve delegates as it may determine, not exceeding the number of its delegates. Yeas, 51; Noes, 0. No. 3—Amend Par. 39, Sec. 4, to read: A Lay Electoral Conference may elect as many reserve delegates as it may determine, not exceeding the number of its delegates. Yeas, 51; Noes, 0.

A Conference Committee assigned its ministerial and lay delegates to General Conference Standing Committees, as follows: Episcopacy, R. W. Winchester and D. D. Jones; Itinerancy, R. G. Morris and J. A. McRae; Boundaries, R. W. Winchester and J. A. McRae; Temporal Economy, R. G. Morris and D. D. Jones; State of the Church, R. G. Morris and D. D. Jones; Hospital, Homes, etc., R. W. Winchester and J. A. McRae; Book Concern, R. W. Winchester and D. D. Jones; Foreign Missions, R. W. Winchester and J. A. McRae; Home Missions, R. G. Morris and J. A. McRae; Education, R. G. Morris and D. D. Jones; Pensions and Relief, R. W. Winchester and J. A. McRae; Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals, R. G. Morris and D. D. Jones.

A motion prevailed that after Sunday morning service, Ordination Service, the reading of Complimentary Resolutions, any necessary items of business, the Devotional Period, and the reading of the appointments, the seventy-third session of the North Carolina Conference should adjourn, sine die.

The Saturday session adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Smith.

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conferences. In the year 1836, the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes and from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 19,495 white members and 3,990 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A. M. E. Church, some the Colored M. E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and 1865, when at the close of the War the M. E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.
