NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., July 9, 1906.

The Presbytery of Westchester met pursuant to Adjourned Meeting, July adjournment (Vol. IV, p. 566) in the North Avenue 9, 1906. Church, New Rochelle, N. Y., Monday, July 9, 1906, at 7.30 p. m. In the absence of the Moderator, Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt, Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall, the last-elected Moderator present, acted as Moderator and constituted Presbytery with prayer.

Rev. Henry M. Brown, of the Manhattan Congregational Association, and Rev. Stanley White and Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor, of the Presbytery of Morris and Orange, were invited to sit as corresponding members.

The Committee on Publication and Sabbath School Work presented a report, which was accepted.

The Committee on Church Erection presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

We recommend that the churches of Presbytery be enjoined to give special attention to this cause, that the treasury may be able to assist the needy churches in California.

The Committee on Temperance presented a special report on the failure of the New York Legislature to pass the Medicine Labeling and Local Option Extension Bills, which was accepted, and its discussion was made the second order for the afternoon.

The Committee on Resignation presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

REV. BENJAMIN T. MARSHALL (p, 8). — There has been referred to your committee the request of Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall for translation from the pastorate of the Scarborough Church to that of the New Rochelle Church. The reason assigned by Mr. Marshall is that he feels it to be a duty to accept the call of the New Rochelle Church. Both parties have been heard. The church concurs with the request but with great regret. The translation is to take effect October 7. It is recommended that the commissioners be heard.

The Commissioners of the Scarborough Church were then heard.

The Committee on Call presented a report which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

1. Bedford (p. 7).—The call is for the pastoral services of Rev. John Wallace Cooper, received from the Presbytery of St. Clairsville. The form of the call and procedure of the congregation

are regular. The salary stipulated is \$1,000 with the use of the manse and a vacation of three Sundays. All parties have been heard. Fall Stated

2. Mr. Kisco (p, γ) . — The call is for the pastoral services of Meeting Octo-Rev. Clarence Wells Dunham, received from the Presbytery of Troy, ber 2, 1906. The procedure of the congregation has been regular, and the call is in due form. The stipulation as to salary is \$1,000, with the use of the manse and four weeks' vacation. All parties have been heard.

3. New Rochelle (p, g). — The call is for the pastoral services of Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall of this Presbytery. The procedure of the congregation has been regular, and the call is in proper form. The salary stipulated is \$2,500, with the use of the manse and six weeks' vacation. All parties have been heard.

Your committee recommend —

That calls be placed in the hands of the persons called; and If the way be clear, the following arrangements for the installations be made.

Rev. Daniel H. Foster, of the Presbytery of New Brunswick, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The order of the day for 11.30 λ , M, (p, 6) was then taken up, and a conference was held on "The Church at Work Today in the Community," Rev. Douglas Putnam Birnie presiding. After devotional exercises, addresses were delivered by Rey. George William Knox on "The Minister as Preacher," Rev. James A. McWilliams on "The Minister as Pastor," Rev. Adrian V. S. Wallace on "The Foreigner Who Has Become Our Neighbor,"

and Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall on "The Church and Social Ideals," which were followed by an open discussion. Presbytery then took recess until 2.00 p. m. Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 2.00 p. m.

Presbytery met at 2.00 p. m. and was opened with prayer.

The Committee on Resignations presented a second report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

1. Rev. Andrew D. Reid. — Mr. Reid requests leave to resign the pastoral charge of the Katonah Church, assigning as a reason that he has received a call from a church within the bounds of the Presbytery of Algoma of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, which he feels it to be his duty to accept. All parties have been heard. The church through its commissioners has signified its concurrence in the request, but with great regret. The resignation is to take effect on October 8. It is recommended that the repuest be granted 2. Rev. William W. Breckenridge. — Mr. Breckenridge requests

2. Rev. William W. Breckenridge. — Mr. Breckenridge requests leave to resign the pastoral charge of the Hartford Church. In his judgment the time has come for a change in the best interest of both church and pastor. The church through its commissioners concurs in the request, but with great regret. The date named for the resignation to take effect is October 15. It is recommended that

the request be granted.

Rev. Andrew D. Reid was, at his own request, dismissed to the Presbytery of Algoma, Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Committee on Examinations presented Mr. Charles Hodge Corbett, a candidate under the care of this Presbytery, for licensure and ordination. Mr. Corbett read a statement of his theological belief and a part of a sermon.

The Committee on Examinations then presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommend —

1. That Mr. Corbett's examination be sustained; and

^{2.} That Mr. Corbett be now licensed to preach and ordained as an evangelist, the Moderator propounding the constitutional questions and offering the prayer of ordination, and Rev. George William Knox delivering the charge.

Presbytery then proceeded to the ordination of Mr. Corbett. The Moderator propounded the constitutional Meeting, Octo-questions and offered the prayer of ordination and he was ber 2, 1906. duly set apart to the Gospel ministry as an evangelist with the laying on of hands. The charge was delivered by Rev. George William Knox. It was then ordered that Mr. Corbett's name be enrolled.

The second order of the afternoon, the special report of the Committee on Temperance, was then taken up (p. 13). After discussion the following recommendations of the committee, with the exception of the last which was referred to the Committee on Finance, were adopted:

1. That the facts presented in the report of the committee with the following overture be sent up to the Synod of New York, at its meeting in Lockport, N. Y., October 16-18;

The Presbytery of Westeliester begs the Synod of New York to take the following action at its next meeting in Lockport, N. Y.,

October 16-18:

A. That Synod declares its approval of the principles embodied in these two measures, and demands of the next Legislature the passage of bills requiring the labeling of all proprietory medicines containing alcohol, narcotics, and other harmful drugs, sold within the State of New York, and of bills extending the right of local option to villages, and cities, and portions thereof.

B. That the Synod most heartily approves the action of the Assembly in discharging the Committee of Excise from the further consideration of the Tully-Wainwright Bill, and in passing the same.

C. That the action of the chairman of the Assembly's Committee on Public Health, Hon, George H. Whitney of Saratoga, in obstruct ing the passage of the Stevens-Wainwright Bill, and of the majority leader of the Senate, Hon, John Raines of Ontario, in refusing to allow the Tully-Wainwright Bill, passed by the Assembly, to come to a vote in the Senate, be unqualifiedly condemned.

D. That the Synod's committee be instructed immediately to communicate with pastors in such manner as shall seem to them wise and most expeditions, asking them to urge voters in their congregations to support in the November elections such candidates for the Assembly and Senate as are known to favor the principles embodied in these two measures,

2. Finally, in order that this matter may be carefully considered by Synod, we recommend that the above findings of the committee and the proposed action be printed, and copies sent to all persons elected to attend the next Synod.

The following resolution was referred to the Committee on Finance:

Resolved. That the Committee on Temperance be directed to secure the publication of its report in some paper of wide circulation, that they obtain and send out as widely as possible copies, not to exceed 5,000 in number, to those they deem may be most helped thereby.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee would report as follows:

- 1. Sessional records of the following churches were presented for review: Bedford, Bridgeport First, Darien, Gilead, Greenburgh, Greenwich First, Harrison, Hartford, Huguenot Memorial, Mt. Kisco, Mt. Vernon First, New Rochelle, New Rochelle North Avenue, Ossining First, Thompsonville, and South East.
- 2. Sessional records of the following, called for, were not presented: Croton Falls, Holyoke First, Irvington, Katonah, Mahopae Falls, and New Haven First.

3. It is recommended —

(1.) That the sessional records of the following churches be approved without exception: Bedford, Bridgeport First, Darien, Gilead, Harrison, Huguenot Memorial, New Rochelle, New Rochelle North Avenue, and Thompsonville.

(2.) That the following be approved with exceptions:

a. GREENBURGH. — December 5, 1905, the names of churches from which members were received by certificate are not recorded.

b. Greenwich First, — Λ memorandum dated October 9, 1904, states that four members were received by letter. No names are given, and there is no record to show that a meeting of the session was held.

c. Hartford. — Record has not been presented for ap-

proval since October 4, 1904.

d. Mr. Kisco. — Names of absent elders not recorded. June 2, June 10, July 1, July 22, 1906, an elder acted as moderator: no explanation.

The Commission on Italian Work (Vol. IV, p, 550) presented a report, which was accepted.

The Commission on the Pleasantville Church ($Vol.\ IV$, $p.\ 564$) presented a report, which was accepted and its recommendation adopted; the recommendation is as follows:

We ask only that as the recent supply has withdrawn and the church is without a leader, the Commission be continued.

The Committee on Ministerial Relief presented a report, which was accepted and is as follows:

Thirty-tive of our churches contributed \$2,442 as against thirty-three churches giving \$1,441 the year before. On the recommendation of your committee the Board paid \$1,335 to eight deceased ministers' widows, who are members of churches belonging to this body, and one aged disabled brother received \$300.

The Committee on Systematic Beneficence presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The committee recommended that the following preamble and resolutions be sent to the sessions of our churches:

Whereas. The Presbyterian Church at large has given, for all objects, but little more this past year that the year before, viz.: \$17.34 per capita as against \$16.70; and the Presbytery of Westchester has given less, viz.: for all objects reported \$23.46 as against \$23.71, and for missionary objects \$6.00 the past year as compared with \$7.29 the year before.

Therefore we would call the attention of our churches through the sessions to the following recommendations of our last General As-

sembly.

1. That the sessions of our churches be reminded of their responsibility in connection with the stimulation and systematic development of church benevolences, and be urged to devise and faithfully carry out some plan of annually canvassing the entire constituency of each church for offerings in aid of all authorized missionary and benevolent causes of the church.

2. That the sessions of our church make a larger use of the literature prepared by the several boards of the church, and the Committee on Systematic Beneficence for general distribution among

members of their congregations.

3. That the sessions of our church make use of some form of envelope system in taking offerings for the boards of our church.

4. That the membership of our church be affectionately urged to set apart a definite portion of their income as well as a definite portion of their time for the Lord's work.

The Committee on Temperance presented a report, which was accepted, and its recommendations, with the

exception of the last, carrying an appropriation, which was referred to the Committee on Finance, were adopted. Fall Stated Meeting, October 2, 1906. They are as follows:

Your committee makes the following recommendations:

1. The appointment of a committee to take under advisement the question of a County Federation for temperance and other social ends, with authority to confer with pasters of other denominations or with other persons or agencies through whom such federation might be accomplished, the committee to report its findings and

suggestions at an early meeting of Presbytery.

2. That we declare our satisfaction with the work of the Anti-Saloon League, regarding it as non-partisan, practical and effective; that we deprecate any effort to organize a specifically ecclesiastical federation to do the work, which can be more effectively done by a less unwieldy organization; that we especially urge pastors and sessions to co-operate in the efforts of the League to secure better cooperation among the churches and voters in counties and election districts.

3. That we authorize and direct the Committee on Temperance to co-operate in such manner as it may deem effective and wise in the efforts of the present year to secure improvement in excise and

anti-gambling laws.

4. That for the expenses of this committee the sum of \$25 be appropriated, if so much be needed,

The Commission on the Pleasantville Church presented wary 15, 1907 a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The church during the interim of the pastorates has progressed tavorably the membership has increased in good proportion, some twelve per cent,, the Bible school has grown both in numbers and effectiveness, the auxiliary organizations have shown splendid loy alty, the finances show continually better conditions, the envelope collections and loose plate offerings having exceeded in amount the hopes of the officers of the church and the commission. With the coming of a new pastor under happy auspices, we feel hopeful of better and better days.

With the entrance, also, into the life and work of the church of several substantial men of the community, we feel that the affairs of the church are safe in the hands of the pastor and officers and would recommend that the commission be discharged.

The Committee on Temperance presented a special report on overtures sent by Presbytery to Synod (p. 17). which was accepted. Action on the first recommendation was postponed until the next stated meeting of Presbytery, and the second recommendation was referred to the Committee on Finance. The report is as follows:

The overtures were duly forwarded to the Synod and by it reterred to its Committee on Temperance. They were adopted by that committee with some minor modifications, which were accepted by us, viz: 1. Substitution of petitions for demands in overture A: 2. Omission of names of chairmen of committees in B; 3. The insertion of new before committee in D. The report of Synod's Committee was adopted by Synod after thorough discussion. By this action Synod's new committee was instructed immediately to communicate with pastors in such manner as should seem wise and most expeditious (wrongly transcribed by the Clerk of Synod as judicious) asking them to urge voters in their congregations to support in the November elections such candidates for the Assembly and Senate as are known to favor the principles embodied in the two measures in question. Synod's new committee took immeliate action and decided unanimously to send out the state. ment of facts as prepared by Presbytery and submitted to Synod with the action of Synod, the report of Synod's old committee. having included this statement as part of the same. A resolution was also unanimously adopted by Synod directing the Stated Clerk to send out such communications as Synod's Committee on Temperance might direct, and also directing that the expense involved be paid from the treasury of Synod to the amount of \$15. In a subsequent conference with the chairman of the Synod's committee, he suggested that the printing of the envelopes as well as of the Intermediate

report be supervised by us, the plates of Presbytery's statement of facts being still in existence. The signature of the Stated Clerk Intermediate Meeting, Jan. was secured, the order placed in the bands of the printer with in-nary 15, 1907, structions to forward reports and envelopes to the Stated Clerk of Synod at the earliest possible moment. After considerable correspondence between your committee and the Stated Clerk, finally on the Saturday before election there appeared, not the report ordered by Synod's new committee and printed under the supervision of your committee, but a mutilated copy of the report of Synod's old committee. The result was that the action of Synod was unintelligible to all pasters who were not at Synod or members of this Presbytery. Further communication with the Stated Clerk of Synod developed the further fact that he was unwilling to countersign the bill for printing under authorization of Synod's new committee, so that it could be settled by the Treasurer of Synod.

Your committee recommend:

1. That the above facts, having been verified by the Synod's Minutes, be put before the Synod in such manner as may seem to Presbytery most judicious.

2. That pending such action, the bill for printing under authorization of Synod's new committee, amounting to \$18.50, be paid from funds already appropriated to the use of your committee, so far as these suffice, the remainder to be paid from the general fund.

The Committee on Finance reported, recommending the adoption of the second recommendation of the Committee on Temperance, referred to them. The report was accepted and adopted.

The Committee on Examination was directed to formulate the reasons for the ordination of Rev. Charles Hodge Corbett as an evangelist at the last Stated meeting (pp. 16 and 17).

The Committee on Calls presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

 Gilead. — The call is for the pastoral services of Rev. George P. Noble. The salary is \$800 per annum in regular monthly payments with the use of the manse and four Sundays vacation. The form of the call is regular, signed by the elders and trustees as authorized by the congregation, and duly attested by the moderator. Commissioners of the congregation were heard.

2. Katonah. — The call is for the pastoral services of Rev. William T. Bartlett, received this morning. The form of the call is regular, signed by the elders as authorized by the congregation. and duly attested by the moderator. The salary is \$1,000 per annum in regular monthly payments and free use of the manse and vacation of four weeks each year. The commissioners of the congregation were heard.

3. Pleasantville. — The call is for the pastoral services of Rev. Charles H. Van Wie, received this morning. The form of the

call is regular, signed by the elders and trustees as authorized by the congregation, and duly attested by the moderator. The salary is \$1,000 per annum in regular monthly payments without the Meeting Jan-parsonage and with an annual vacation of four weeks. Commis way 15, 1907. sioners of the congregation were heard.

It is recommended that these calls be found in order and placed in the hands of the persons called.

The calls of these churches were then placed in the hands of Rev. Messrs, Noble, Bartlett, and Van Wie, who signified their acceptance.

learn that

(1.) Three are teachers, Joseph C. Wyckoff is a teacher and Superintendent of Public Schools at New Canaan, Conn. James C. Mackenzie is Director of the Mackenzie School, Dobbs Ferry, N. Y. Dean R. Leland is one of the faculty of the Peekskill Military Academy. Mr. Wyckoff preaches occasionally, Mr. Mackenzie every Sunday, and Mr. Leland as opportunity offers and his school duties permit. All prefer to remain without charge.

(2.) Two are engaged in executive duties connected with religious organizations. Mr. House is field secretary of the Canton Christian College, and preaches occasionally. Mr. Morse is executive secretary of the American Bible League. Neither desire a pas-

toral charge.

(3.) Two are acting pastors or stated supplies of churches. Mr. Ferris is acting pastor of the Closter (N. J.) Congregational Church. Mr. Froschl was chapel pastor of Immanuel Chapel of the Yonkers First Church, but has accepted a call of the

Long Branch Reformed Church.

(4.) Mr. Adriance has been engaged for eight years past in settlement work on the East Side of New York City, which has developed into an undenominational church, called the Church of the Son of Man. Mr. Chichester is assistant chaplain of the Hampton Institute. Va., preaching nearly every Sunday either there or in its interests in the North. Mr. Graham ceased to be pastor of Mahopae Falls Church on June 1 last, and has accepted a call without the bounds of the Presbytery.

(5.) Three are without charge. 'Mr. White reports that ill health will not permit him to take a pastoral charge. Mr. Dixon was stated supply of the Pleasantville Church until last April, when he was compelled by the condition of his health to relinquish work for a season. Mr. Van Horsen was stated supply of the Bedford Church until December, 1905. He now resides in

Boston.

(6.) Mr. Teal disappeared some years ago.

The committees to install pastors over the Bedford, Mt. Kisco, and New Rochelle Churches reported the discharge of those duties (p, 15).

The session of the Irvington Church was excused from presenting its record for review at this meeting (p. 18).

The report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, action on which was deferred until this meeting (p, 22), was taken up, and its recommendation adopted. The report is as follows:

Your committee has had referred to it six overtures sent down to us by the last General Assembly (p, 7). Five of them relate to Judicial Commissions and the sixth contains a proposed amend-

ment to Constitutional Rule No. 3. The amendments proposed therein, although already adopted by the Church, were declared inoperative by the last General Assembly on account of the prior Meeting Jan-agreement fixing the basis of reunion with the Cumberland Pres wary 15, 1907 byterian Church (Min. of G. A., 1906, p. 15), and are now resulmitted to the presbyteries.

Your committee recommend that as Presbytery has already answered them in the affirmative (Vol. 13, pp. 474 and 546), that they be again answered in the affirmative,

The appointment of Mr. E. J. Hamborzki by the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, as colporteur among the Hungarians within the bounds of Presbytery, was approved.

The foregoing minutes were read and approved.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the First Presbyterian Church, Yonkers, N. Y., Monday, April 15, 1907. Closed with prayer and benediction.

The Committee on Publication and Sabbath-School Work presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee would respectfully report that Mr. E. J. Hamborszki has been doing colporteur work within the bounds of this Presbytery among the Hungarians in Peekskill, Hastings, Verplanck's, Yonkers and elsewhere under appointment of the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work and in accordance with the action of this Presbytery, taken at the intermediate meeting (p. 41). As Mr. Hamborszki is a student in Bloomfield Seminary, he has been able to give Saturdays and Sundays only to the work. He has found 89 Protestants living in Yonkers, 77 in Hastings, 83 in Peekskill, and 20 in Verplanck's.

Last summer Mr. Hamborszki preached to the Hungarians at Tompkins Cove, where several hundred congregate when the brick yards are in operation.

Your committee is of the opinion that the distinctively colporteur work is about completed and as the next step would be to establish preaching services, the matter should be in the hands of the Committee on Home Missions. Therefore we recommend that the matter of conducting services in the Hungarian language be referred to that committee.

A petition, bearing 52 names of persons residing at Spring Stated Peekskill and vicinity, for religious services in the Hun-16, 1907. garian language, was also referred to the Committee on Home Missions.

The Trustees of Presbytery presented a report, which was accepted, referred to the Committee on Finance, its recommendation adopted, and is as follows:

Of the General Fund \$500 and the whole of the Frost, Portchester Church, and Milne Funds are invested in guaranteed bond and mortgage, and the balance of the General Fund and all the interest is on deposit in the Peekskill Savings Bank.

The three trustees, whose term of office expires with this meeting of Presbytery, are Rev. Charles S. Lane and Elders W. Addison Burnham and Sanford R. Knapp. It is recommended that a committee of three be appointed to fill these vacancies.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 16, 1907. The Committee on Temperance, whose report was referred back for a specific recommendation (p. 54), presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

At the intermediate meeting held in New York, January 15, your committee made a special report relative to the failure of the Stated Clerk of Synod to comply with the instructions of Synod's Committee on Temperance relative to overtures from this presbytery. The report will be found in full on p. 37 of the Minutes. In that report your committee made two recommendations: 1. That the statement of the committee, having been verified by Synod's Minutes, be put before Synod in such manner as may seem to Presbytery most judicious. 2. That pending such action certain bills for printing be paid from funds of Presbytery. The second of these recommendations was adopted on the recommendation of the Committee on Finance, and action on the first was postponed until the next stated meeting.

Having earefully examined Synod's Minutes we beg to submit the

following additional report:

The Minutes of Synod (p. 39) records as follows: "That Synod's new committee be instructed immediately to communicate with pastors in such manner as shall seem to them wise and most expedient, asking them to urge voters in their congregations to support in the November elections such candidates for the Assembly and Senate as are known to favor the principles embodied in these two measnres." Under this resolution, adopted by the Synod, it will be seen that the authority to communicate with the churches was given to the new Committee on Temperance, composed of Rev. Messrs. Henry R. Fancher, Duncan Cameron, Alexander McGaffin, and Otis A. Smith; and Elders John J. Burt, J. P. McKenzie, and J. B. Scoville (Minutes of Synod, 1906, p. 74). The original chairman was Rev. Duncan Cameron, who subsequently resigned the chairmanship, but not from the committee. Subsequent to the adoption of the above resolution the committee met Rev. Messrs. Duncan Cameron and Alexander McGaffin, Elder John J. Burt and at least one other member being present. The committee, acting under the resolution above mentioned, authorized the printing and sending out of a certain report. They also asked and secured the consent of the Stated Clerk of Synod to send out the same. They further authorized the introduction on the floor of Synod of the following resolution: "That the Stated Clerk be instructed immediately to send out such communication as Synod's Committee on Temperance may direct, and that the expenses involved thereby be paid by Synod to an amount not exceeding fifteen dollars." This resolution was offered by the chairman of your Committee on Temperance and was unanimously adopted by Synod just at the close of the afternoon session on Thursday, and immediately before the devotional services conducted by Rev. George Alexander (Minutes of Synod, 1906, p. 45). No record of this resolution appears in the Minutes of Synod.

From the letters of the Stated Clerk of Synod bearing dates of November 8, 1906, and April 5, 1907, and the statements of Rev. Messrs. Duncan Cameron and Alexander McGaffin, the Stated Clerk of Presbytery and Rev. Daniel J. Many, Jr., Temporary Clerk of Synod, herewith presented, it is clear that there has been an over-

sight or the intentional omission on part of the Stated Clerk of Spring Stated Synod, and that, under the action of Synod, the bill for printing, etc., Meeting, April incurred on behalf of Synod's Committee on Temperance and paid 16, 1907, by the Presbytery of Westchester should rightfully be borne by Synod.

Your committee therefore recommends that these facts, together with such other testimony as may bear upon the matter, he put before Synod by delegates to the next meeting of Synod, with request that the Minutes be corrected and the Presbytery of Westchester be

reimbursed for its outlay on behalf of the Synod,

The special Committee on a County Federation for Temperance and other Social Ends (p, β) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

An organization was effected last Tuesday evening, the 9th inst., at Hollywood lun, Yonkers, two of your committee and several other members of Presbytery being present. Your committee feels that this movement covers the ground mapped out in the resolution under which it was appointed (p,2I). We regard the organization of the Westchester County Civic League as a most hopeful and important step in the direction of better government and of uplifting the standards of our civic and social life. The interest in this new movement has been positive and widespread.

We recommend that Presbytery express its hearty interest in and cordial approval of this movement, and urge upon all our ministers and laymen, who are residents of Westchester county, the claims of the Civic League as one of the efficient means through

which good citizenship may express itself,

The following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The cost of living has been steadily and constantly increasing in recent years, resulting in increased compensations for many classes of those earning wages or receiving salaries.

Resolved. 1. That the Presbytery of Westchester hereby expresses its sense of the urgency and importance of an inquiry into the subject of the salaries our ministers are receiving with view to ascertaining whether or not they are adequately supported.

2. That the Committee on Systematic Beneficence be and is hereby directed to investigate this question by circular letter of inquiry addressed to the officers of our various churches, or otherwise, as may seem wise to them, and to report their findings with

recommendations at the Fall Stated Meeting.

3. That Presbytery recommend to the said committee that its circular letter of inquiry lay proper stress upon the installation obligations of our congregations, especially in response to Question 4, Form of Government, Chap. XV, Sec. XIII, and that its letter seek to ascertain from others than our ministers the following or similar facts, viz.: (1) The minister's salary at present and in the years 1870, 1880, 1890, and 1900; (2) Whether the salary has been increased since 1900; (3) Whether there has been growth in the size or ability of the congregation. If so, whether there has been a corresponding increase of salary; (4) Whether the congregation or its officers are accustomed from time to time to consider seriously the

Spring Stated obligation above referred to, with a view to its generous and scrupu-Meeting, April lous fulfilment in a spirit of Christian fellowship and brotherly love; 16, 1907. (5) Whether a present increase of salary is proper and possible.

The committee to confer an overture to the General Assembly (Vol. IV, p. 566) presented a verbal report. The committee was continued.

The committee to install Rev. George P. Noble pastor of the Gilead Church (p. 39) reported the discharge of that duty as directed by Presbytery, with the exception that the charge to the people was delivered by Rev. William J. Cumming in the absence of those appointed.

The committee to prepare a biographical minute for the Necrology on the late Elder Edward P. Bullard of the Bridgeport First Church (p. 35) reported. The report was accepted and it was ordered entered in the Necrology.

The Commission on Italian Work (p. 20) presented a report, which was accepted. The first recommendation was referred to the Committee on Examinations, the second was adopted, and the third was referred to the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions. They are as follows:

The commission recommends:

1. That the license of Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano as a local evangelist be renewed.

2. That he be recommended to the Board of Home Missions for reappointment to the field of Port Chester and vicinity for another year at the same salary.

3. That the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions be requested to renew its appropriation of \$50 to the Italian Mission of Port Chester and vicinity on the same conditions as former one.

The Committee on Freedmen presented a report on Biddle University, which was accepted.

The Committee on Finance presented a report recommending that the report of the Trustees of Presbytery, referred to them, be approved. It was adopted.

The committee to prepare a biographical minute on the late Rev. Henry M. Baird (p. 35), presented a report, which was accepted, and ordered entered in the Necrology. The committee to install Rev. Charles II. Van Wie, spring Stated pastor of the Pleasantville Church (p. 39) reported the 16, 1907. discharge of that duty as directed by Presbytery.

The Committee on Resignations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

REY, JAMES L. JEWELL: — Mr. Jewell requests leave to resign the pastoral charge of the South Salem Church in order that he may accept a call to another and larger field within the bounds of another presbytery. All parties have been heard. The church concurs with regret in the request.

Your committee recommends that request be granted, the resigna-

tion to take effect May I next.

The Committee on Calls presented a report, which was accepted, and laid on the table for the present.

The Committee on Examinations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee would report as follows:

1. With reference to the renewal of the license of Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano referred to it (pp, 49 and 56), it is recommended that it

be granted for one year.

2. The request of Mr. James Packard Gillespie for ordination was also referred to it (p, β) . Mr. Gillespie has been examined by your committee, and it is recommended that the examination be sustained and that he be ordained.

3. In accordance with the instructions of Presbytery (p. 38), your committee has formulated reasons for the ordination of Mr. Charles Hodge Corbett as an evangelist at Rye, N. Y., October 2,

1906 (p. 17), as follows:

(1.) That his examination showed him to be exceptionally fitted for the work of the ministry both in intellectual attainments

and spirit.

(2.) That while he was not under call to the pastorate of any particular congregation, he was engaged in distinctively Christian work for which it was desirable that he should be an ordained minister,

(3.) That he expected to devote his life to the work on the foreign field and to enter on that work at an early date.

The report of the Committee on Calls was then taken from the table. The report was adopted and is as follows:

Yorktown.—The call is for the pastoral services of Mr. James Packard Gillespie. The salary stipulated is \$1,000 per annum in monthly payments, with the use of the mause and an annual vacation of one mouth. The form of the call is regular, signed by the elders and trustees as anthorized by a vote of the congregation, and duly attested by the moderator. Commissioners of the congregation were heard.

It is recommended that the call be found in order and placed in

Mr. Gillespie's hands.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 16, 1907.

The call was then placed in Mr. Gillespie's hands, and he signified his acceptance thereof.

The Committee on Calls made an additional report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Wilson of the Presbytery of Brooklyn, to be invited. Charge to the pastor — Rev. John A. Ingham; Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt, alternate. Charge to the people — Rev. Dean R. Leland; Rev. Thomas C. Straus, alternate.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee would report that there has been referred to it a communication from the Presbytery of Erie on union with the United Presbyterian Church (p,49). It is recommended that Presbytery join with the Presbytery of Erie in overturing the General Assembly for the appointment of a committee of conference on union with the United Presbyterian Church.

Rev. James L. Jewell was at his own request dismissed to the Presbytery of Rochester.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was accepted after amendment, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee would report as follows:

1. The sessional records of the following churches were presented for review: Ossining First, Peckskill First, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Rye, Scarborough, Sound Beach First, South Salem, Springfield First, Stamford First, White Plains, Yonkers, Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers Dayspring, Yonkers First, Yonkers Westminster, and Yorktown.

2. The sessional records of the following, called for, were not presented: Patterson, Peckskill Second, Pound Ridge, South East,

South East Center, and Thompsonville.

3. It is recommended:

(1.) That the records of the following be approved without exceptions: Peckskill First, Rye, Scarborough, South Salem, Springfield First, White Plains, Yonkers, Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers First, Yonkers Westminster, and Yorktown.

(2.) That the following be approved with exceptions:

A. Pleasantville, Port Chester, and Sound Beach First lack the yearly statistical report. It was ordered that the records be returned to these churches for completion and to be Spring Stated B. Ossining First and Yonkers Dayspring have 16, 1997, presented again.

all or some of the minutes unapproved.

C. Stamford First - Absentees from meetings not recorded. Reports of church organizations made to the church meeting are recorded but without the approval of the Session. Minntes not uniformly approved.

The order of the day for 11.30 λ , M, (p, 49) was taken up, and a conference was held on "The Presbyterian Brotherhood - Its Possibilities," Rev. James L. Jewell presiding, in the absence of Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall, out on a committee. Presbytery ordered that the subject of this conference be the subject of another to be held at the Fall Stated Meeting.

The Narrative was then presented. It was accepted and adopted, and it was ordered that an abstract be entered on the minutes and also sent to the General Assembly. The abstract is as follows:

1. CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES.

The membership of our churches as reported this year is 9,990, and the net gain seems to be about 260. All but two maintain two preaching services. The attendance in the morning equals about 70 per cent, of the reported membership, and in the evening about onethird of the morning. At the first service, of those present about 20 per cent, are men, and at the second about 25 per cent. The attendance of children is reported as good. Almost all the churches maintain a weekly service of prayer with an attendance equal to about 12% per cent, of the net total of communicants.

II. SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The number of schools connected with our churches is 47, of which 41 are home schools and 6 are branch, mission or union schools; 13 report the teaching of the Shorter Catechism, and 29 use the Westminster Helps. But few have weekly teachers' meetings for the study of the lesson; 28 report libraries. The membership, as reported, is \$,933; 214 scholars were received into the communion of the church.

III. SOCIETIES.

Of societies of men 13 are reported, the objects of which are for the most part social. Thirty-six churches report more than 60 women's societies, Ladies' Aid, Missionary, Doreas, etc. Of young people's societies upwards of 70 are reported, Christian Endeavor of different grades, Mission Bands, Boys' Brigades, etc. Their names indicate their objects.

IV. SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS.

Four report a religious interest with accessions, one having received more than twice as many persons as in any previous year.

V. BENEVOLENCE.

Opportunity is given by the sessions to the congregations to contribute to all the boards. The Sabbath schools contribute to Home and Foreign Missions and Sabbath-School Work. The women's and young people's societies contribute to Home and Foreign Missions and Freedmen. Offerings for all benevolent causes amount to \$62,115.

VI. FAMILY RELIGION.

Christian parents are generally faithful in presenting their children for baptism. Family worship is pretty generally neglected.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS.

The temporalities are for the most part managed by trustees, and the financial obligations are met with reasonable fidelity. Offerings for congregational expenses as reported foot up \$195,176. Children's Day is generally observed, and, to a very limited extent, Day of Prayer for Colleges, Sabbath Observance, and Temperance.

Rev. Robert R. White of the Presbytery of New York was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Two papers were referred to your committee, viz.: The report of the Committee on Publication and Sabbath-School Work on the colporteur work of Mr. E. J. Hamborski among the Hungarians within the bounds of Presbytery $(p,\ 5.2)$ and a petition bearing fifty-two names of residents of Peekskill and vicinity for religious services in the Hungarian language as often as once a month $(p,\ 53)$.

Your committee recommend:

1. That the Board of Home Missions be requested to appoint Mr. E. J. Hamborski a missionary to the Hungarians within the bounds of Presbytery; and

2. That Rev. Messrs. Arthur C. McMillan and Benjamin H.

Of this, \$3,815,28 was through the Woman's Board, leaving for the direct work of the Board \$6,917.91. or about thirty two per cent, of the total gifts. The Board asks for an increase of \$1,383.58, making a total of \$8,301.49,

Resolved, That the Presbytery approve of this proportionate in crease, and that the chairman of the Home Mission Committee be directed to correspond with each of the pastors, giving him the statistics in the matter, and urging that the church be asked to make up the full amount.

The report of the Committee on Systematic Beneficence was then taken up, and its recommendations were adopted. They are as follows:

Resolved. 1. That Presbytery approves the plan for a twenty per cent, increase in church offerings, in distinction from the offer ings of Women's Societies and other organizations, for the Boards

Since the letter, granted on May 21st to Rev. Henry A. The Committee on Church Erection presented a report, which was accepted.

The Committee on Freedmen presented its annual report, in which with facts and figures concerning the Board's work among the Freedmen it was stated that Presbytery's quota of \$125 toward the Biddle University Library Fund had been received from churches and individuals. The report was accepted.

The Committee on Ministerial Relief reported eight annuitants, one minister and seven widows, who have received the sum of \$1,505 during the year. The gifts to this cause in this Presbytery fell off \$833, from \$2,442 to \$1,609. The amount apportioned to this Presbytery is \$1,930.86, which the committee asks to apportion among our churches. That the Rev. Charles Hodge Corbett be recommended to the Board of Foreign Missions for appointment for foreign work.

The motion to discharge the Commission on Italian Work and place the work in charge of the session of the Port Chester Church (p. 86) was taken up. After consideration it was lost.

The Committee on Finance presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

That the sum of \$25 be appropriated for the use of the Committee on Temperance, as recommended by the said committee (p. 88).

The Commission on Work among the Hungarians (p. 90) presented a report, which was accepted, and is as follows:

Services have been conducted by Mr. Rudolph Pompl in Yonkers, N. Y., in the lecture room of the Westminster Church, with an attendance of thirty to forty persons. The sacraments were administered by the pastor of the Hungarian Church in New York. Services were also held at Verplanck's Point. The work has been encouraging, although it has been difficult to secure a preacher who does things methodically, regularly, etc. Mr. Pompl will not be able to continue the work.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved: 1. That the Presbytery, recognizing the gross inequality of existing laws, by which, contrary to the clear intent of the constitution of the state of New York, discrimination is made in favor of gambling on authorized racetracks, and believing that the public good demands the enactment of such equal laws and penalties as will earry out the intent of the constitution and effectually prohibit all gambling in this state, respectfully petition the Honorable Senate and the Honorable Assembly of the State of New York for the prompt enactment of the measures to this end proposed by the Governor of the state in his last annual message.

Resolved: 2. That a committee of three, consisting of one minister and two elders, be appointed by the Moderator, with instructions to communicate with representatives in the Legislature of the State of New York from within the bounds of this Presbytery, urging

them to support such measures.

Resolved: 3. That the committee be authorized to communicate with pastors and sessions on the subject; to seek the cooperation of other ecclesiastical bodies; and to take such other constitutional action as they may deem necessary in the furtherance of the proposed measures, subject to the approval of Presbytery.

REV. ARTHUR REQUA. — There has been referred to your committee the request of Mr. Requa for leave to resign the pastoral charge of the Springfield First Church (p. 103). The reason assigned is that he has received a call from the Presbyterian Church of Mineville, N. Y., which he desires to accept. All parties have been heard. The congregation voted unanimously, but with deep regret, to concur in the request.

Your committee recommends:

1. That leave be granted to Mr. Requa to resign the pastoral charge of the Springfield First Church, resignation to take effect January 31 next.

2. That the Rev. Adrian V. S. Wallace be appointed moderator

of the session of the said church.

3. That the session be given leave to supply the pulpit of the church from January 31 until the next stated meeting of Presbytery.

The following minute was then adopted:

In dissolving the pastoral relation existing between the Rev. Arthur Requa and the church at Springfield, the Presbytery of Westchester desires to place upon its records an expression of its affection for and esteem of one who has long been identified with its fellowship, of regret at his departure from our bounds, and of its cordial goodwill and earnest wishes for Mr. Requa's largest success in his new field.

It is recalled with interest that Mr. Requa's birthplace is within our bounds; that after a decade spent in teaching, in response to his own conviction of the leading of the Holy Spirit, he prepared for the Gospel ministry under the direction of this Presbytery, by which he was ordained and installed pastor of the Darien Church, January 24, 1887, almost exactly twenty-one years ago. In his two pastorates, covering more than a score of years, he has ever been a faithful presbyter, an earnest and consecrated pastor, a tireless and devoted servant of the Great Head of the Church. During his connection with this Presbytery, Mr. Requa has seen changes in the pastorate of every church, with the exception of Croton Falls and Yonkers Dayspring; indeed, the installation of the Rev. Robert P. Gibson at Croton Falls followed his own by ten days. Through these frequent changes, which have ever been a marked feature of the life of our

On the evening of December 8, 1907, in that part of Yonkers, N. Y., known as South Yonkers, on petition of 57 persons, a Presbyterian Church was duly organized, Rev. William P. Stevenson presiding, and Ruling Elders Theodore Gilman and Allan Bourn being present, 49 uniting by certificate and 8 on confession. Mr. William J. Yates, formerly a ruling elder of the First Reformed Presbyterian Church, of New York, and Mr. Kenneth G. Mackenzie, formerly a ruling elder of the Church of Sea and Land of New York, were elected ruling elders and duly installed. It was voted that the new organization should be known as the South Yonkers Presbyterian Church. At a congregational meeting, held January 15, two deacons were elected and inducted into office, and it was voted that application be made to this Presbytery for enrollment.

> The Commission on Italian Work (p. 108) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

> The Evangelical Italian Mission of Port Chester and vicinity prospers. The year has been a very successful one. A friend of the mission has builded for it a neat and convenient chapel seating one hundred people, for which a rent is paid. Since its completion and consecration there has been a larger attendance and greater interest. Financially the year has been a good one for the mission. Expenses have been nearly \$400. This the churches of Presbytery and friends of the mission have enabled us to meet. But the expenses during the coming year will be somewhat larger. We are counting on more from the mission, which now raises \$6 a month. What the mission does not supply we shall have to look to our churches and the friends of the Italians in America for.

> The missionary, Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, is at liberty to present himself for examination for ordination. He has served his four years, and it would be well for the work were he ordained. Then he could celebrate the sacraments. He purposed presenting himself at this meeting of Presbytery, but two eases of sickness in his home compel him to postpone it until a more convenient time. He asks that his license be renewed for one year.

Your commission recommends that he be recommended to the Board of Home Missions for reappointment to the same field at the same salary as last year.

The license of Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano as a local evangelist (p. 115) was extended for one year.

The Committee on Presbyterial Boundaries (p. 104) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Inasmuch as the Presbytery is asked simply for an expression of its judgment, without committing itself to the approval of any distinct action, and this expression is asked for the assistance of Synod's committee in the more intelligent discharge of its duty, your committee recommends that the answer of the Presbytery to

the communication be as follows:

The Presbytery of Westchester respectfully informs the Committee on Presbyterial Boundaries of the Synod of New York, in response to its communication under date of December 16, 1907, that the Presbytery is disposed to regard with favor any rearrangement of presbyterial boundaries which will be agreeable and advantageous to the presbyteries affected by such rearrangement, but seeks no rearrangement of its own boundaries or the transfer of any church to or from its jurisdiction.

The Committee on Publication and Sabbath-School Work presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

There has been referred to your committee a communication from Spring Stated the Stated Clerk of the Synod of West Virginia (p. 115). It is Meeting, April recommended that no action be taken.

By permission of Presbytery, Rev. Robert P. Gibson spoke in commendation of Rev. J. E. Fink's illustrated fectures on Home Missions.

The special committee, consisting of the Committees on Evangelistic Work and Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, on the employment of a presbyterial pastor-evangelist (p. 105) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommend the adoption of the following plan:
1. The Presbytery of Westehester shall employ a man, to be known as a pastor-evangelist, whose duties shall include the fol-

lowing lines of work:

(1.) The holding of special services in and under the direction of the several churches of the Presbytery, including union

efforts, tent meetings, and open air services;

(2.) The seeking out of opportunities for new work and for the establishment of new churches within the bounds of Presbytery in both English-speaking communities and among our foreign populations;

(3.) Such visitations as the representative of Presbytery

among the churches as may be directed by Presbytery.

2. The direction of the work of the pastor-evangelist shall be in the hands of the Committee on Evangelistic Work. His appointments for special services shall be arranged, as far as possible, at the request of the churches of Presbytery and ordinarily for a period of two weeks in length.

The selection of the pastor-evangelist shall be made by the Committee on Evangelistic Work, subject to the approval of Presbytery.

 The salary of the pastor-evangelist and all other expenses of the work, excepting the local expenses of the services, shall be as

sumed by the laymen of Presbytery.

Presbytery shall appoint a Laymen's Committee, who shall have charge of the finances of the work underwriting a guarantee fund, which shall amount to not less than \$3,000 a year. This guarantee fund is to be raised by individual subscriptions and shall be called for as the needs warrant, not more than 25 per cent, to be called for in any one quarter.

All funds received for the services of the pastor evangelist and from rent and sale of hymn books shall be paid into the treasury of

the Laymen's Committee.

Vacancies in said Laymen's Committee shall be tilled and additions made by the Presbytery on the nomination of said committee.

4. The services of the pastor evangelist shall be free to the several churches, except that they shall be required to take a free-will offering at some time during the special services which he may hold, which offering shall be paid directly into the treasury of the Laymen's Committee.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 21, 1908.

Each church shall meet all local expenses of the services, pay for the rental of hymn books, and provide for the transportation and entertainment of the pastor-evangelist during the services. This need not be the case in prolonged tent work in the summer.

Whenever the pastor-evangelist shall act as a supply for any church in the Presbytery, the usual sum paid by that church for such supply shall be paid into the treasury of the Laymen's Com-

mittee.

5. That the appointment of the following persons as the Laymen's Committee be approved: William Matthews, Thomas J. James, A. C. Dodge, Horace J. Parker, D.D.S., and Alfred L. Manierre.

6. That the special committee be continued, and that the plan proposed be printed in the minutes for information of Presbytery.

The Commission on the Springfield First Church (p. 111) presented a report, which was accepted, and its recommendation of aid was referred to the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions. The report is as follows:

The church has ninety-eight members in good standing. All bills are paid. The semi-annual interest due March I was promptly met. There is a mortgage of \$45,000 on a property conservatively estimated to be worth \$9,000. On the recommendation of your commission the church has engaged Rev. J. Fraser Evans of the Presbyterian Church of Canada to supply its pulpit three months, beginning April 19. The session have applied to the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions for aid at the rate of \$25 a month. The commission endorses this application and recommends the church to the prayerful interest and sympathy of the Presbytery.

The Committee on Resignations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

REV. ALVIN R. PENNELL. — There has been referred the request of Mr. Pennell for leave to resign the pastoral charge of the Holyoke First Church, the resignation to take effect July 1, 1908. The reason assigned is that after eight years' labor in the field he feels that his work there has been completed, and that he has received a call to the presidency of the Alabama Brenan College, Eufaula, Ala., which he desires to accept. The congregation, at a meeting duly called and held December 7, 1907, after many expressions of regret, unanimously consented to unite with their pastor in his request.

Your committee recommends:

1. That Mr. Pennell's request be granted, his resignation to take effect July 1; and

2. That the Rev. Adrian V. S. Wallace be appointed the moderator of the session.

Rev. W. D. Buchanan was heard (p. 115) with reference to the chapel at Narragansett Pier, R. I. The matter was referred to the Committee on Presbyterial and Synod ical Missions.

The order of the day for 11.30 A, $M_{\odot}(p, 115)$ was taken up, and a conference was held on the theme, "The Past Year in the Presbytery Its Facts and Its Lessons," Rev. Joseph H. Robinson, Leader. The Narrative prepared by the Rev. Clarence Wells Dunham was read, fol lowed by a general discussion.

Rev. John F. Johnston was received by letter of dismission from the Presbytery of Chatham of the Presbyterian Church in Canada after answering in the affirmative the first seven questions of Sec. XII, Chap. XV of the Form of Government, and it was ordered that his name be enrolled.

Presbytery then took recess until 2 p. m.

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 2 p. m.

Presbytery reassembled at 2 p. m. and was opened with prayer.

The Committee on Calls presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

 PLEASANTALLIA (p. 118). The call is for the pastoral services of Rev. William F. Perry, a member of this presbytery. The requirements of the Form of Government have been carefully observed. The salary is \$1,040 in monthly payments with the tree use of the manse, and an annual vacation of four weeks. We recommend that the call be found in order, placed in Mr. Perry's

Spring Stated hands, and in case of its acceptance by him, that he and the elder Meeting, April of the church be appointed a committee to arrange for the installation.

2. Hartford (p. 116). — The call is for the pastoral services of Rev. John F. Johnston, received and enrolled today. The requirements of the Form of Government have been duly observed. The salary is \$1,600, in monthly payments, without a manse, and a vacation of one month is stipulated. We recommend that the call be found in order, placed in Mr. Johnston's hands, and in case of its acceptance by him, that he and the elder from the church be appointed a committee to arrange for the installation.

3. SOUTH YONKERS (p. 116).—The call is for the pastoral services of the Rev. Joseph Taylor Britan. The requirements of the Form of Covernment have been fully observed. The call stipulates a salary of \$1,500, in monthly payments, without a manse, and a vacation of four weeks. We recommend that the call be found in order, placed in Mr. Britan's hands, and in case of its acceptance that he and the elder of the church be appointed a committee to

arrange for the installation.

The calls were then placed in the hands of the Rev. Messrs. Perry, Johnston and Britan respectively, and they signified their acceptance.

The Narrative (p. 123) was adopted, and it was ordered that an abstract should be sent to the General Assembly. The abstract is as follows:

1. CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES.

The membership of our churches as reported to the General Assembly is 10,088, and the net gain 98. Usually two services are held on the Lord's day. About 25 per cent, of the children and youth are present. All but two hold weekly prayer-meetings with an attendance of about 12 per cent, of the reported membership.

H. SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The churches reported 50 schools, of which 42 are home, eight branch, union and mission. The Shorter Catechism is regularly taught in only five, and the Westminster Lesson Helps used in 32. Teachers' meetings are held in about one-half of the schools, five reporting weekly meetings, eight monthly, and three occasionally. Twenty-seven report libraries, the books being usually selected by a committee. The total membership reported is 7.814, and 200 have been received into full communion.

III. SOCIETIES.

Twelve churches report men's societies with various names, and membership varying from 16 to 125, the total reported being 510. The objects are social, philanthropie, and devotional. Thirty-seven churches report women's societies, Ladies' Aid, Missionary, Dorcas, and King's Daughters, 61 young people's societies, Christian En-

deavor (senior, intermediate, and junior). Mission Bands, Boys' Spring Stated Clubs. Brigades, etc., are reported with a total membership of Meeting April 2,220. The objects are devotional, missionary, and social.

IV. SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS.

Eight report unusual interest, 410 having united on examination during the year.

V. BENEVOLENCE,

Sessions generally comply with the rules of the General Assembly, and contribute to each of the boards. Fifteen churches reported growth in giving, five having given the 20 per cent, increase asked. The financial depression of the year has, however, affected some of our churches. The Sabbath schools contribute usually to Home, Foreign and Sabbath school Missions and Freedmen. One society of men contributes to Home Missions. The societies of women and young people contribute to Home and Foreign Missions and Freedmen. Provision is generally made for the poor.

VI. FAMILY RELIGION.

Parents generally are faithful in presenting their children for baptism. Family worship is not generally observed. Two hundred and fifty-two persons baptized in infancy were received into full communion.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS.

Financial obligations are met with fidelity. Temporalities as a rule are managed by trustees. The income is derived from pew rents, pew rents and voluntary offerings, but generally solely from the latter. Children's Day is generally observed, but a few churches also observe the days set apart for Prayer for Colleges, Sabbath Observance, and Temperance.

The special committee to communicate with representatives of the Legislature of the State of New York from within the bounds of this Presbytery in support of measures against race-track gambling (pp. 108 and 109) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee issued a statement, which was sent to pastors and sessions, urging them to present the matter to congregations and men's organizations, with a view to taking action thereon. The responses have been hearty and unanimous. Presbytery was represented at the joint hearing on the Hart-Agnew Bills by Mr. Theodore Gilman. The action of Presbytery, duly certified, and resolutions and communications from churches were placed in the hands of the committees. The response of our representatives in the Legislature of the State of New York to our appeals has been friendly and hearty, and we are glad to report their unanimous votes in favor of the Hart-Agnew measures. There should be no abatement of agitation at this time. The temporary deteat of the Hart Agnew measure only emphasizes the fundamental importance of a question which strikes at the very soul of constitutional government.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 21, 1908. In view of the situation we recommend:

1. That the committee be continued with instructions to cooperate in every constitutional way in present and future efforts to secure the desired legislation.

2. That the Stated Clerk be instructed to communicate with representatives in the Legislature of the State of New York from within the bounds of our presbytery assuring them of our hearty appreciation of their action in regard to the Hart-Agnew bills; and that he be also instructed to communicate with the chief executive of the State of New York, assuring him of our unqualified approval of the course pursued by him in regard to the Hart-Agnew Bills and declaring our purpose to coöperate until the same or similar measures are passed by the Legislature.

3. That the committee be authorized to communicate with our own and other churches with a view to bringing the power of public sentiment to bear upon representatives in the Senate who voted in

opposition to the proposed reform.

4. That the expenses of the committee, amounting to \$16.36, be paid from the appropriation already made to the Committee on Temperance with the approval of that committee.

The Committee on Temperance presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends that the expenses of the Special Committee on Race-track Gambling be paid from the appropriation of the current year for its own expenses $(p,\ 108)$ to an amount not exceeding \$20.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions reported on the Springfield First Church (p. 122), and, on motion, that committee was directed to appropriate \$25 a month for three months to aid that church towards the payment of the minister's salary.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was accepted, after amendment, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee would report as follows:

5. Executive Commissions. Such a commission of the General Assembly, one of whose duties is to arrange a budget plan for raising money for the boards. Presbyteries are urged to appoint similar commissions, which are instructed to coöperate with that of the Assembly.

6. Assessment of the General Assembly for the coming year is

seven cents a member.

The committee to prepare a biographical minute for the Necrology on the late Jacob T. Wheeler, an elder of the Greenburgh Church, (p. 134) presented a report which was accepted and ordered entered in the Necrology.

Following these reports and remarks by several members prayer was offered.

The committee to revise standing committees (p. 137) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee would recommend:

1. That the present standing (now permanent, p. 145) committees of Presbytery be continued until the January Intermediate Meeting.

2. That the committee be continued and enlarged by the addition of the Moderator, Stated Clerk, Rev. William P. Stevenson, and

mittee be discharged.

The thanks, appreciation, and congratulations of Pres bytery were extended to the committee.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

In accordance with its recommendation at the last meeting (p. 153), two series of special services were arranged for at Port Chester and Yorktown, at which services members of the committee and other members of Presbytery assisted. The committee also ar ranged for the Annual Day of Prayer, which was held in the Day spring Church, Yonkers, N. V. About forty ministers and elders

were present.

The most of the effort of the committee has been centered upon putting into operation the work of the pastor-evangelist. Up to today fourteen churches have asked for his services. Appointments have been made for him as follows: January 10-22, at Port Chester; January 24 February 5, at Yonkers, the first week in the South Youkers Church and the second in the Westminster Church; Feb. (mary 14:28, at Ossining) March 7:19, at Mt. Kisco; March 21 April 4, at Mt. Vernon. In addition to this schedule we have made out a feutative one as follows: April 25 May 2, at Greenwich: May 9/23, at Scarborough; June 6-13, at Noroton; September 26. October 10, at Pleasantville; and November 7-14, at Rye.

It is the conviction of the committee and the pastor evangelist that, unless extraordinary circumstances prevent, the churches should plan for two full weeks of services. The success of the services, humanly speaking, is dependent largely upon the preparations that are made for them. Much should be made of singing The hymn book to be used is Winona Hymns, which will be turnished by the committee. Envelopes for free will offerings will also be furnished by the committee. The committee feels that the cm phasis of our work this winter and spring should be put upon the evangelistic side. We also feel that this is the most important forward step that Presbytery has taken in years. May we ask that out of our busy session this morning, after the discussion of this report, five minutes be spent in special prayer for this work

The Moderator also appointed the following special committee on the petition of the Hungarians for the organization of a Presbyterian Church (p. 185).

The Committee on Temperance presented a verbal report, which was accepted.

The Committee on Foreign Missions presented a report, which was accepted, and is as follows:

Our Presbytery was asked to contribute \$3,714 toward the liquidation of the deficit of the Board. Up to date twenty one churches have responded to our appeal—just half of the number in Presbytery—and from these twenty-one churches has come in all the sum of \$1,947.35, practically \$2,000.

The committee also presented a bill for printing, etc., and for telegram to the Department of State (p. 185), which was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Committee on Ministerial Relief presented a report, which was accepted.

The Committee on Church Erection presented a report, which was accepted.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 20, 1909.

Rev. George N. McDonald of the Presbytery of Florida was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

Rev. Clarence Wells Dunham was, on recommendation of the special committee (p. 185), appointed chairman of the Committee on Home Missions and the Rev. John McLaren Richardson to fill the vacancy on that committee caused by the resignation of the Rev. Adrian V. S. Wallace.

The Committee on Education presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

There have been referred to your committee the certificates of dismission of Messrs. Clinton Jennings Greene and E. Graham Wilson, candidates for the ministry, dimissing them from the Presbyteries of Newton and Philadelphia, respectively, in order that they may place themselves under the care of this presbytery (p. 184). It is recommended that they be received and enrolled.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of three, of which the Moderator shall be chairman, be appointed to take under advisement and to report at the June Intermediate Meeting plans for the appropriate celebration of the four hundredth anniversary of the birth of John Calvin at the Fall Stated Meeting.

The Moderator completed the above committee by appointing thereto Rev. Messrs. John M. Trout and Donglas Putnam Birnie.

The Permanent Clerk gave notice of the meeting of the Ninth Council of the Alliance of Reformed Churches of the World, holding the Presbyterian System in New York in June next, beginning on the day of Intermediate Meeting. The Stated and Permanent Clerks were appointed a committee to determine what action should be taken by Presbytery.

The special committee on the application of the Rev. Rollin A. Sawyer (p, 170), presented a report which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommend:

1. That the application of Rev. Rollin A. Sawyer to be placed on the honorably retired list be not granted.

2. That he be recommended to the Board for aid to the amount Spring Stated of \$200; and Meeting, April 3. As to the question referred to the committee by Presbytery 20, 1909 of how a minister is to be however.

of how a minister is to be honorably retired (p. 169), your committee is convinced that with the growth of the church, with the addition of so large a number of ministers from the Cumberland Church, and with the sustentation plan, it is important that there should be a more definite understanding in this matter, and that some agreement should be reached by the whole church, which will allow a certain discretion to Presbytery and yet take account not only of the length of service but of the character of service, and of whether the service has been consecutive and of whether it has been continued down to the time of being placed on the retired list, and in general tend to maintain this honorably retired list as an honorable distinction for those who have served longest and best. We recommend, therefore, that Presbytery overture the General Assembly of 1909 asking that some definition be given as to what constitutes an honorably retired minister, and the conditions on which a minister may be declared honorably retired, particular attention being paid to maintaining this as an honorable distinction for those who have served the church longest and best.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures, to which a communication from the Presbytery of Syracuse was referred (p. 169), reported, recommending that no action be taken. The report was accepted and adopted.

The Trustees presented a report, which was accepted and is as follows:

The Trustees have held meetings as required by the by-laws.

1. The Trustees hold title to the four church properties, con-

stituting the following real estate:

(1.) The property of the church at Somers came to us under the statute as the property of an extinct church. It brings in no income, and is now only used for funeral purposes in connection with a nearby cemetery and for religious purposes under the supervision of the pastor and elders of the Croton Falls Church.

(2.) The property of the North Salem Church came to us as the property of an extinct church. It produces no income.

(3.) The Trustees hold title to about eight city lots at the corner of Radford Street and Cliff Avenue, Yonkers. This property was conveyed to the Trustees in trust for purposes of the use of a Presbyterian Church at South Yonkers, with power to mortgage for the purpose of erection of a church building. A temporary building was creeted on the land by the Permanent Committee for Presbyterian Church Extension in Yonkers. This property and building is used by the South Yonkers Presbyterian Church. The property came to us charged with a debt of \$1,000, which we assumed and agreed to pay. The property has been occupied as stated, and as a fair return for the use, the occupant has paid to the Trustees of Presbytery a sum equal to the interest on the debt, which is but fair, as the whole property is occupied by that church.

Spring Stated which enjoys all the benefits of the property. The \$500 has been Meeting, April paid on the indebtedness, and the interest, \$200, has been paid on 20, 1909. the debt.

> The Trustees hold the title to the church lot and building at Port Chester. It is occupied by the Port Chester Church and produces no income.

2. The Trustees also hold personal property as follows:

(1.) A trust fund of \$1,000 under the will of Miss Frost, which was primarily for the Somers Church, and if not used, then for certain designated purposes. The fund has in the year past produced \$50 in interest, and \$102.50 of back interest has been paid out, leaving \$16.81 of interest on hand.

The proceeds of sale of the Port Chester manse, sold several years ago. It amounts to \$2,000. The interest during the

last year, \$100, has all been paid to the church.

The fund under the will of Rev. Carson W. Adams, (3.)amounting to \$1,000 for "missionary purposes," has produced an income in the year of \$42.28, of which \$35 has been distributed for the purpose named, and there is \$93.28 of interest on hand.

(4.) The fund under the Milne will is \$5,000, and has produced an income of \$323.73, and \$750 has been distributed for the purpose named in the will, and there is still \$693.19 of accrued

interest on hand.

(5.) The Trustees also hold a general fund of \$3,168.84

of principal and interest.

The Trustees keep the funds invested in guaranteed mortgages or on deposit in savings banks. The accounts of the Treasurer are audited and the securities inspected once a year.

The Trustees recommend:

1. That the office of Luther W. P. Norris as Trustee of Pres-

bytery be and the same is hereby declared vacant.

2. That a committee of three be appointed by the Moderator to report to the Presbytery the names of Trustees to fill the terms of office now expiring, and also to consider the resignation of the Rev. George William Knox as a Trustee and to recommend action to Presbytery.

The Moderator appointed as the committee called for by the second recommendation, the following:

Elder.— Ransom E. Wilcox; and Ministers.— Benjamin II. Everitt and John M. Trout.

Rev. A. Woodruff Halvey of the Board of Foreign Missions, by invitation, delivered a very interesting address on Foreign Missions.

The Committee on Foreign Missions reported that a telegram had been sent to the Department of State urging "immediate and adequate action to insure the safety of missionaries and all the American citizens in Tarsus and other endangered cities in Turkey." The report was Spring Stated Meeting, April accepted.

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee would report, recommending:

1. That the June Intermediate Meeting be held in New York and that the Stated and Permanent Clerks be the Committee of Arrangements.

2. That the Fall Stated Meeting be held in the Mt. Kisco

Church, from which an invitation has been received.

Rev. A. Woodruff Halvey of The Presbytery of New York, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The Committe on Finance presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows.

There has been referred to your committee the bill of the Committee on Foreign Missions for printing envelopes, postage, and the telegram to the Department of State, in the total sum of \$8.38 (p, 187). It is recommended that the bill be allowed.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved. That the Committee on Ministerial Relief be requested to make active effort to induce the elders of this presbytery to advocate the claims of this Board in the various churches.

The order of the day for 11:30 a, m. (p. 184), was taken up and a conference held on the theme "Sabbath-School Work." The Committee on Publication and Sabbath-School Work presented a report on the Sabbath-Schools of Presbytery, and addresses were delivered by Elder Ransom E. Wilcox, Superintendent of the Sabbath-School of the Mt. Vernon First Church, Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall and Mr. Walter Thomas, Superintendent of the Sabbath-School of the Westminster Church.

Presbytery then took a recess until 2 p. M.

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday 2 p. m.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 20, 1909.

Presbytery reassembled at 2 p. m., and was opened with praver.

The special committee to nominate Trustees (p. 190), presented a report, which was accepted, and the Stated Clerk was directed to east a ballot for those nominated. The report is as follows:

1. Rev. George William Knox has consented to serve until his term of office expires.

Your committee present the following nominations:

To fill the unexpired term of Elder Luther W. P.

(2.) To serve for the full term of three years, Rev. Arthur C. McMillan and Elders Joseph Barrett and John H. Harmer.

The Stated Clerk cast a ballot for the persons named, as directed.

The Committee on Resignations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

REV. WILLIAM T. BARTLETT.—There has been referred to the committee the request of the Rev. William T. Bartlett for leave to resign the pastoral charge of the Katonah Church (p. 186). The reason assigned is the health of the pastor's wife, which makes it his duty to be relieved of pastoral duty for the present. All parties have been heard, the congregation, through its commissioners, concurring in the request.

It is recommended:

That the request be granted to take effect May 1st: and

2. That the Rev. Robert P. Gibson be appointed Moderator of the session of the Katonah Church.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends:

1. The appointment of moderators of sessions of churches without pastors, as follows:

The Committee on Indicial Business presented a report, which was accepted, after amendment, adopted and is as follows:

1. There has been referred to your committee a paper from the pastor of the Bedford Church, informing Presbytery that the only elder of that church had recently died, and that at a meeting of the congregation, on March 28th, it was voted that "competent persons could not at this time be found for the office of ruling elder, etc."

We recommend, therefore, that in accordance with "Acts of the General Assembly," 1890, a commission be appointed to take the oversight of the church, and that the said commission shall consist of the pastor of the church, as chairman, Rev. Messrs, Clarence Wells Dunham, Robert P. Gibson, and Albert F. Pierce, and Elders

Joseph Barrett and George W. Banks.

2. There has also been referred to the committee certain papers of a member of the Hartford Church (p. 184). Your committee examined the papers and conferred with the member of the Hartford Church. At the suggestion of the committee he consented to withdraw the papers.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was accepted, after amendment, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee reports:

1. That the records of the following churches were presented for review: Hartford, New Rochelle, Peekskill First, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Rve. Scarborough, Sound Beach First, South Salem, Stamford First, White Plains, Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers

First, Vonkers South, Yonkers Westminster, and Yorklown. 2. The sessional records of the following, called for, were not Patterson, Peekskill Second, Pound Ridge, South East

Center, Springfield First, Thompsonville.

(3.) That the records of the following churches be approved without exception: Peekskill First, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Rye, Scarborough, Sound Beach First, South Salem, Stamford First, White Plains, Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers Dayspring, Yonkers First, Yonkers South, Yonkers Westminster.

(4.) That, in view of the fact that no meetings of the session of the South East Church have been held, the church being in a weakened condition and services held only in the summer, the certificate of Presbytery shall only state that records have been

examined.

The Narrative was presented and adopted. It was ordered that an abstract be entered on the minutes and also sent to the General Assembly. The abstract is as follows:

1. CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES.

The membership of our church as reported this year is 10.728, and the net gain is 640. Of the forty churches reporting, thirty-three hold two preaching services each Sunday, three hold three, three hold only one, and one holds only summer services, beginning May 1st. The attendance of children seems to be fair. Various means are employed to draw the children, such as children's sermons, go-to-church bands, and honor rolls. All but two churches report weekly prayer meetings, one church reporting two prayer services. The attendance ranges from eight in a church of seventh-six members to one hundred twenty-five in a church of five hundred sixty-one, the latter in the Dayspring Church of Yonkers.

II. SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The number of schools reported connected with our churches is forty-nine, with a membership of 8,136, an increase of 322. The Shorter Catechism is taught in seventeen schools, and the Westminster Lesson Helps are used in twenty-five. Teachers' meetings are held in some form, weekly, monthly, bi-monthly, quarterly, or irregularly in twenty-five. Twenty-six schools have libraries selected by committees.

III. SOCIETIES.

Nineteen churches report mens' organizations. Some of them are engaged in distinctively church work, but the majority seem to exist for social and athletic purposes. A goodly number contribute toward local church expenses, but only three are reported as giving to the Boards. All but two churches report women's societies, Home and Foreign Missionary, Ladies' Aid, Pastor's Aid, Women's Associations and Benevolent Societies, and their gifts go

along the channels their names suggest. Four churches report no Spring Stated young people's societies, but in the churches which do, Christian Meeting, April Endeavor, Senior and Junior predominate. The number reported is 20, 1909, as follows: — Twenty-eight Senior, twelve Junior and Intermediate, nine Boys' Clubs, and three Bible Clubs for boys.

IV. SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS.

Four churches report that there has been unusual interest in their parishes during the year, but do not say in what way. Four others report having held special meetings. One church mentions a growing interest and a two weeks' visit from Presbytery's pastor-evangelist. One reports a healthful interest, and two a quickening interest. Twenty-seven churches report no unusual interest. The accessions on examination have been.

V. BENEVOLENCE.

In thirty-two of thirty-eight churches opportunity was given to contribute to all the Boards, but only twenty-nine report having so given. Eighteen report growth in giving. Others report a decrease, due to various causes. Three churches are using the duplex envelopes. The women's societies are reported active in all churches except three, and for the most part contribute to Home and Foreign Missions and Freedmen. In all cases adequate provision is reported as being made for the poor of the parish.

VI. FAMILY RELIGION.

Nine out of thirty-eight churches give no answer. The reports of others indicate that family worship is generally neglected. A few of our churches publish in their weekly bulletins Daily Bible Readings for the use of their congregations at family worship.

Rev. Messrs, Marshall, Britan, and Stratton were heard on the Narrative at the suggestion of the Narrator.

The special committee on the petition of the Hungarians for the organization of a Presbyterian Church (p. 187), presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

There was referred to your committee a petition from Hungarian residents of Yonkers, N. Y., signed by sixty-six names, asking that Presbytery establish a Presbyterian Church (p. 185). After hearing from the local ministers we recommend:

1. That a local committee of five, including Rev. Messrs. Arthur C. McMillan and William P. Stevenson, be appointed by the Moderator to take the whole matter under consideration and report some plan of action at the June Intermediate Meeting; and

2. That for the year beginning April 1, 1909, we request an appropriation from the Home Mission Board of \$50 a month for this work in consideration of the fact that at one time this work was under the care and support of the Board.

2. That he be recommended to the Board of Home Missions for

reappointment to his present field at the same salary.

3. That the Italian Evangelistic Mission of Port Chester and vicinity be recommended to the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions for assistance to the amount of \$9 a month, on condition that the mission raise a like amount, such appropriation to run for one year.

The special committee, consisting of the Stated and Permanent Clerks (p. 188), presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

That, in view of the fact that the Ninth Council of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches of the World holding the Presbyterian System holds its opening meeting on the day appointed for the June Intermediate Meeting, Standing Rule No. 1 be suspended and that that meeting be held on Monday, June 14th, the day previous.

The committee to prepare a biographical minute on the late Albert Wililamson, an elder of the Bedford Church, for the Necrology (p. 185), presented a report, which was accepted and ordered entered in the Necrology.

Rev. William T. Bartlett presented his resignation as a member of the Committee on Colleges. The Rev. William F. Perry was appointed chairman, and the Rev. Spring Stated Meeting, April 11 and Elevanor Value and Meeting, April 20, 1909. Harris Ely Adriance was added to the committee.

Rev. Douglas Putuam Birnie tendered his resignation as a member of the Commission on Italian Work, and it was accepted.

The foregoing minutes were read and approved.



The report of the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions was presented and referred to the Committee on Finance for audit.

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommend:

1. That the January Intermediate Meeting be held in New York, and that the Stated Clerk be appointed the Committee of arrangements.

2. That the Spring Stated Meeting be held in the New Rochelle North Avenue Church, for which an invitation has been received.

The committee to take under advisement plans for the appropriate celebration of the four hundredth anniversary of the birth of John Calvin (p. 188) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Since the anuiversary date is now so far behind us, and as most of us have already celebrated it in one way or another, your committee feels that no further action is desirable, and would recommend that none be taken.

The committee to prepare a biographical minute on the late Rev. Talmon C. Perry (p. 203) presented a report, Meeting, Octowhich was accepted and ordered entered in the Necrology, ber 12, 1909

The committee to prepare a biographical minute on the late Elder John K. Myers (p. 211) presented a report. which was accepted and ordered entered in the Necrology.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report, which was accepted, after an address, by invitation, by Rev. Stefano L. Testa of the Presbytery of Brooklyn on work among the Italians, amended and adopted and is as follows:

Your committee would recommend.

1. That each church be instructed to earefully examine its local field and see what effort can be undertaken to evangelize the foreign elements.

2. That Presbytery seek to reach the amount asked for this year by the Home Mission Board, and that to this end each church be

urged to increase its gift to the Board,

3. That Presbytery make earnest request that all offerings made by congregations. Sunday Schools and other societies of our churches for the work of the Board of Home Missions be promptly forwarded to the Board by those into whose hands the said offerings are placed.

The Committee on Education presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommend:

1. That all churches be urged to make an offering to the Board during this fiscal year.
2. That the appropriation of \$50,00 to Mr. Climon J. Greene, a

student last year in the Hartford Seminary, be approved.

3. That Mr. Jacob L. Hartzell, a candidate under the care of Presbytery, who is now pursuing his studies at Lane Seminary, be recommended, this year, to the Board of Education for aid to the amount of its appropriation.

4. That Mr. Andrew Szilagyi, a member of the Westminster Church of Yonkers, be taken under the care of Presbytery after the usual examination and recommended to the Board of Education

for aid.

Mr. Szilagyi was then examined as to his religious experience and motives for entering the ministry. On motion, he was received under the care of Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry.

The Committee on Calls presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

1. Bryn Mawr Park (p, 210).—The call is for the pastoral services of the Rev. Daniel G. Lawson, received from the Presbytery of North River and enrolled this morning. As no member of Presbytery could be secured to moderate the congregational meeting, an elder of the church presided. The call does not show that the persons signing it were authorized to do so by the congregation. The elder from the church assures the committee that they were so authorized. A salary of \$1,200 per annum without a manse but with four weeks vacation is stipulated. The parties were heard. It is recommended that the call be found in order and placed in Mr. Lawson's hands.

2. Thompsonyhle $(p, 21\theta)$.—The call is for the pastoral services of the Rev. William S. Voorhies, just received from the Presbytery of New Brunswick and enrolled. It is in regular form and stipulated a salary of \$1,400 per annum with a vacation of four weeks but without a manse. The parties have been heard. It is recommended that the call be found in order and placed in Mr.

Voorhies' hands.

3. SOUTH YONKERS (p. 210).—The call is for the pastoral services of the Rev. E. Munro Dill, just received from the Presbytery of Springfield and enrolled. It is regular in form and stipulates an annual salary of \$1.500 with a vacation of four weeks but without a manse. It is recommended that it be found in order and placed in Mr. Dill's hands.

These calls were then placed in the hands of the persons named and by them accepted.

The persons called with the elder-delegate to Presbytery from the church were appointed committees to make arrangements for the installations.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommend:

1. That Presbytery hereby expresses its deep conviction of the wisdom and worth of the step taken last January in employing a pastor-evangelist and renders hearty thanks to God for the success which has already marked the undertaking.

2. That we urge upon the ministers and churches of Presbytery the duty of remembering the work of the pastor-evangelist and the special services he may hold in both their public and private devotions, praying "without ceasing" for God's blessing upon the effort

now being made.

3. That we also urge upon all the churches, whether they may be visited by the pastor-evangelist or not, the supreme importance of "seeking the lost" and of using every possible means of reaching the unsayed and bringing them into the Kingdom of God.

4. That the annual Day of Prayer of Presbytery be held in the

New Rochelle Church on Tuesday, November 9, 1909.

5. In regard to the communication from the Committee on Meeting Octo Evangelistic Work of the General Assembly, referred to your comber 12, 1909 mittee (p. 209), we recommend that no action be taken, as the ground is already covered by our plan of a presbyterial pastorevangelist.

The Layman's Committee (pp. 121-122) presented a report, which was accepted,

The committees to make arrangements for the installation of pastors presented reports, which were accepted, adopted and are as follows:

The Committee on Finance presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee reports that there have been referred for audit the reports of the Treasurer of Presbytery and the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions. These have been examined and found correct, and it is recommended that they be approved.

In reference to the unpaid assessments for the years 1907, 1908 and 1909 your committee recommend that the attention of the delinquent churches be called to them and some answer be requested

before the next meeting of Presbytery.

Presbytery then took recess until 2 P. M.

Closed with prayer.

Thesday, 2 p. M.

Fall Stated Meeting. October 12, 1909

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer.

The special committee, to which was referred the petition of officers of the Springfield First Church for the consent of Presbytery to the transfer by the Synod of New York of the said church and surrounding territory to the Presbytery of Boston (p. 213), presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee would respectfully report as follows:

We recognize the hardship imposed upon churches located on the outskirts of Presbytery, in that the distance to be traveled cuts off many opportunities for that Christian fellowship, which has ever been one of the most helpful features of the life of the Westchester Presbytery.

We are convinced, however, that it is both geographically and logically essential that our two churches in Massachusetts be connected with the same presbytery. It would be particularly inelicitous to transfer to the Boston Presbytery the Springfield Church while retaining in Presbytery the more distant Holyoke Church.

We therefore recommend this petition be referred back to the sessions of the Springfield and Holyoke Churches with the understanding that the Westchester Presbytery is disposed to accede to such an arrangement as will be satisfactory to both churches.

Your committee is inclined to go a step further and to call attention to the fact that the expense of attending the meetings of Presbytery is a serious difficulty in the case of our more distant churches. The burden is small on our churches centrally located and heavy upon many of the churches whose location makes it especially desirable that they should enjoy the privileges of attending the meetings of Presbytery.

We therefore suggest that a special committee be appointed to work out a mileage plan, by which there shall be added to the assessments upon our churches a proportionate amount sufficient to pay the railroad fare of members of Presbytery in attending the stated meetings.

We believe that this plan will call upon the strong to assist the weak, and will tend to increase the attendance at Presbytery's meetings, especially from the smaller and more distant churches.

We therefore recommend that a special committee of three

We therefore recommend that a special committee of three (including the Stated Clerk) be appointed to consider a mileage plan, the committee to report the same at the January Intermediate Meeting.

To the same committee was referred the question of paying the Moderator's expenses in attending the installations of pastors. The Moderator appointed the following the special committee called for above:

The Committee on Bills and Overtures presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends:

(L) Amendment of Chapter XI. Section 4, Form of

Government (Min. of G. A., 1909, p. 156) in the negative.

(2.) Amendment of Chapter XII. Section 3, Form of Government (Min. of G. 1., 1909, p. 156) in the affirmative.

(3.) Amendment of Section 48, Book of Discipline (Min.

of G. A., 1909, p. 191) be answered in the affirmative.

(4.) Amendment of Section 49, Book of Discipline (Min.

of G. A., 1909, p. 193) in the negative,

- (5.) Amendment of Section 125, Book of Discipline (Min. of G. A., 1909, p. 175) in the negative.
- 2. In reference to overture proposed by the Presbytery of Blairsville for the separation of the offices of Stated Clerk and Treasurer of the General Assembly, referred to the committee $(p,2\theta\theta)$, it is recommended that no action be taken.
- 3. In reference to the questions on representation in the General Assembly (Min. of the G. A., 1909. p. 209) and overture on reduced representation, also referred to your committee (p. 210), it is recommended that the following answers to the questions be given:
 - (1.) In the affirmative.
 - (2.) In the negative.
- (3.) In the affirmative, but with the understanding that in reckoning the ministerial membership of a Presbytery on which representation is to be based, only those shall be counted who are actually engaged in the ministerial work of the Presbyterian Church, under the direction of some indicatory of the church.
 - (4.) In the negative.
 - (5.) In the negative.

At the same time Presbytery feels that these answers do not express its full opinion. We believe in reducing the number of members in General Assembly so as to make it a real working and deliberative body; but we believe that this should be brought about in the simplest possible way and in the way which will make the least possible break with present methods. If Synod is to be concerned in the choice of commissioners, it should not be by election but only by nomination, the election being left to the pre-byteries.

We believe that the best results will be attained most directly and simply by some plan similar to that proposed in the overture

approved by the majority of the Standing Committee on Polity of the last Assembly and sent to us by the Stated Clerk.

The plan might be that each presbytery should be represented by one commissioner, either minister or elder, for every twenty-four members or major fraction, instead of by both minister and elder as now. If a presbytery, for example, had thirty-eight members, it would send one minister and one elder. Where a presbytery sent only one commissioner it should alternate, sending a minister one year and an elder the next year. The presbyteries could be so arranged as to which should send ministers and which should send elders, that the Assembly shall contain an equal number of ministers and elders.

The Committee on Temperance presented a report, which was accepted, and after hearing the Rev. Henry Hayden Barstow its recommendation was adopted. The recommendation is as follows:

Your committee recommend that the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt be appointed in the place of the Rev. Joseph H. Robinson, removed from the bounds of the Presbytery.

The committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee reports:

- 1. That the records of the following churches were presented for review: Bedford, Bridgeport First, Croton Falls, Darien, Gilead, Harrison, Huguenot Memorial, Irvington, Mt. Kisco, Mt. Vernon First, New Rochelle, New Rochelle North Avenue, Ossining First, Patterson, Peckskill Second, South East Center, Springfield First.
- 2. That the sessional records of the following, called for, were not presented: Greenburgh, Greenwich First, Hartford, Holyoke First, Katonah, Mahopac Falls and New Haven First.
 - 3. It is recommended:
- (1.) That the records of the following be approved without exception: Bedford, Bridgeport First, Croton Falls, Darien, Gilead, Harrison, Irvington, Mt. Kisco, Mt. Vernon First, New Rochelle, New Rochelle North Avenue, Ossining First, Patterson, Peekskill Second, South East Center, Springfield First.

(2.) That the records of the Huguenot Memorial Church be approved with the exception that the minutes of March 3, 7 and 31 are wanting.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report on appointments for churches without pastors, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows: Your committee recommends:

The Committee on Systematic Beneficence presented a report, which was accepted, the first recommendation adopted and the second and third referred to the Committee on Bills and Overmres, with instruction to report at the next meeting of Presbytery. The report is as follows:

Your committee has received from the Executive Commission of the General Assembly, acting in cooperation with the Executive Commissions of the Synods and Presbyteries, a schedule of apportionments of contributions to the respective causes of the Assembly and the Synod. An advance of five per cent, on the contributions of past fiscal year is asked.

Your committee has also acceived from the Executive Commission of the General Assembly a recommendation of the budget plan of securing contributions to the Boards, with the individual subscrip-

tion eard as the means of carrying the plan into effect. Λ study of the statistics of the last fiscal year reveals that each of the Assembly's causes, with the single exception of Temperance, has failed not only to receive as much as was asked, but as much as was given the previous year. A five per cent, increase

was asked. A twelve per cent, decrease was given. Moreover, it appears from the reports of the several churches, that not one of the Assembly's causes received a contribution from every church, either as a direct contribution or through the Women's Boards. Ten churches failed to make an offering for Home Missions, though six of the ten gave through the Sabbath School, the Young People's Society or the Women's Society. Five failed to make an offering for Foreign Missions, though four of these gave through the Sabbath School, the Young People's Society or the Women's Society. Fourteen gave nothing to Education. Two gave nothing to Sabbath School Work. Ten gave nothing to Church Erection. Eight gave nothing to Ministerial Relief. Three gave nothing to Freedmen. Fifteen gave nothing to Colleges. Twenty-five gave nothing to Temperance.

Your committee respectfully recommend:

- 1. That the Presbytery approve the budget plan recommended by the Executive Commission of the General Assembly and commend the individual subscription card to the favorable consideration of church sessions.
- 2. That Presbytery create an Executive Commission to coöperate with the Executive Commission of the General Assembly and the Executive Commission of the Synod.
- 3. That the functions of the permanent Committee on Systematic Beneficence be transferred in such manner as may accord with the rules of Presbytery to such Executive Commission.

On motion the following action was taken:

That the committee on Systematic Beneficence be instructed to communicate with the permanent committees on the several Boards regarding the apportionment made by the Executive Commission as to the amount to be contributed by this presbytery to the different causes, and that these committees shall seek to secure from the churches the amount thus apportioned.

The Committee on the Minutes of the General Assembly presented a report, which was accepted and is as follows:

Your committee calls attention to the following action taken by the last General Assembly:

- 1. Overtures. Certain overtures and questions sent down to the Presbyteries (Min.~of~G.~A.,~1909,~pp.~156,~175,~191,~193~and~209.)
- 2. Honorably Retired. "Overture No. 41 from the Presbytery of Westehester as to what constitutes an Honorably Retired Minister. We recommend the following answer: A faithful ministry in the past and ineapacity for further active service are the conditions for Honorable Retirement. The responsibility for conferring the title must rest with the Presbytery. Adopted "(p. 191).

 3. Spring Stated Meetings. "That the attention of the

3. Spring Stated Meetings. "That the attention of the presbyteries meeting before April be called to the advisability of appointing their spring meetings early in April that they may receive complete reports of the work of the year" (p. 98)

4. Executive Commissions. "That the presbyteries and synods which have not as yet appointed executive commissions be Fall Stated and hereby are requested so to do; and that all presbyteries and Meeting, Octosynods are requested to direct their executive commissions, or, ber 12, 1909 if there be no executive commission, then such other committee as may be appointed, to cooperate with the Executive Commission of the General Assembly in carrying out the resolutions of the Assembly in so far as connected with its work" (p. 98).

5. Licensing Students. "The General Assembly urges all our presbyteries to satisfy themselves before licensing students, whether they have been well instructed and indoctrinated in the principles. doctrines and polity of the Presbyterian Church and are in hearty accord with these principles and doctrines and loyal to evangelical Christianity " (p. 165).

6. Brotherhoods. "That presbyteries and synods appoint standing committees charged with the responsibility of holding presbyterial and synodical conventions: the committees of presby teries to seek, through the sessions, to organize brotherhoods in all the churches not having them and to encourage and stimulate those brotherhoods which have already been formed " (p. 123).

7. SABBATH OBSERVANCE. "That the General Assembly recommends that a Sabbath Observance Committee be organized in each presbytery to cooperate with similar committees of other denominations within its bounds in aiding the work of local Sabbath associations; and when such organizations do not exist, to promote the formation of such associations in connection with the Sabbath leagues or national organizations, the Lord's Day Alliance of the United States and Woman's National Sabbath Alliance" (p. 69).

8. Sunday Schools. "Recognizing the opportunity afforded the Sunday School committees of synods and presbyteries for rendering helpful service to Sunday Schools under their care, the General Assembly recommends that an effort be made to place upon these committees men who are known as efficient Sunday School workers. and that these committees be encouraged to plan and work for the improvement of the Sunday Schools of the church " (p, I_H) .

The Committee on Publication and Sabbath School Work presented a report on discrepancies in our Sabbath School statistics referred to it (p. 203), which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

1. Comparing the reports submitted to the Assembly, the narrator and your committee and reflecting on the same, there appear to be two instances where the figures in the Minutes of the General Assembly are too large and five instances where they are too small. In the judgment of your committee, the Sabbath School membership of this Presbytery is 7,910, as far as any one knows.

2. There is not a Presbytery in this Synod which reports the same Sabbath School membership to the Assembly as it reports to the Board. Moreover the variation in the church as a whole is 24,950. This statement is not offered to Westchester Presbytery in

extenuation but as consolation.

3. Your committee recommend that each church make up its mind just what its Sabbath School membership is and consistently report the same to all who ask.

4. That Presbytery instruct all sessions to report fully and accurately the statistics called for on the various blanks, including

· branch or mission schools.

5. It should be understood that the Stated Clerk, the narrator and the chairman of your committee each reported the figures sent to them, and any fault must be attributed to some one further back.

The following vote of thanks was passed:

Kisco Church for their generous and cordial hospitality and its provision for the convenience of Presbytery in transacting its business. Presbytery would also express its satisfaction at again meeting in the Mr. Kisco Church and among its people,

The Commission on the Hungarian Church (p. 209) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

The work among the Hungarians in Yonkers has been carried on with energy by Mr. Andrew Szilagyi in the Westminster Church. Services are held twice each Sabbath. A Sabbath School has been established and four times during the week meetings for study in English and Hungarian, these meetings being held in a room hired by the Hungarians themselves.

At the suggestion of your commission Mr. Szilagyi translated "The Brief Statement of the Reformed Faith" into the Magyar language and this has been published by the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work. At one preaching service each Sabbath Mr. Szilagyi explains a chapter of this statement, a copy of which has been given to each Hungarian. As this exposition and instruction has not been completed, your commission asks that it be continued.

The Committee on Resignations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

REV. JOSEPH H. ROBINSON (p. 212).—The Rev. Joseph H. Robinson requests leave to resign the pastoral charge of the White Plains Church in order that he may accept the chair of Religious History and Biblical Literature in Dartmonth College. Both parties have been heard, Mr. Robinson by letter and the church by commissioners, the latter consenting, but with regret. The resignation is to take effect immediately.

Your committee recommend:

I. That the request be granted and that the pastoral relation between the Rev. Joseph H. Robinson and the White Plains Church be and is hereby dissolved, the same to take effect immediately.

2. That Presytery hereby expresses its hearty appreciation of the faithfulness and efficiency of Mr. Robinson's work among us as paster and presbyter, and prays God's richest blessing upon him in his new and important work.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions was authorized to fill any vacancy that might occur in that committee.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

To your committee were referred certain recommendations of the report of the Committee on Systematic Beneficence (p. 221). We recommend

 That Presbytery do not create an executive eommission for the following reasons:

(1.) That confusion will result, inasmuch as the Moderator of Presbytery is required to be chairman of the commission, because our Moderator is chosen for only six months, while the members of the commission serve eventually for three years.

members of the commission serve eventually for three years.

(2.) That such a commission, with part of its membership changing every year, will be less likely to carry out a consistent and vigorous policy in the particular matter of the budget and apportionment than some more permanent body such as our present Committee on Systematic Beneficence, appointed for two years, with a chairman of its own.

(3.) That we have no need for a Moderator's conneil, nor for any body to perform the functions of Presbytery in the interim between meetings, our present meetings, with such occasional called meetings as are necessary, being quite sufficient.

2. That all matters pertaining to the "Budget Plan" for the missionary and benevolent work of the church and apportionments of the amounts among the churches, and all communications or actions pertaining thereto which would come from the General Assembly or Synod for an executive commission, if we had one, be referred to the Committee on Systematic Beneficence, to be acted on by them.

The special committee to work out a mileage plan (pp. 218-219) presented a report, which was accepted, that part which relates to a mileage plan for stated meetings

was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures, report thereon to be made at the Spring Stated Meeting, and Intermediate Meeting, Jan that concerning the payment of the expenses of the mary 18, 1910 Moderator in attending ordinations and installations after amendment was adopted. The report is as follows:

The mileage plan for stated meetings: —Your committee find:

1. That attendance on the meetings of Presbytery places a considerable financial burden on the representatives of our most distant churches, particularly Hartford, Thompsonville, Springfield

and Holvoke, or on the churches, if they assume it.

2. That an estimated total transportation expense for the stated meetings at White Plains, 1904, Bridgeport, 1905, Mt. Vernon, 1906, Peekskill, 1908, Yonkers, and Mt. Kisco, 1909, with an average attendance of 67, foots up \$497, an average of \$83 for each meeting.

That one of several plans might be adopted.

(1.) That all railroad fares or similar traveling expenses be paid in full, amounting approximately to about \$170 a year, and requiring an addition of about 3313 per cent, to the presbyterial assessment.

(2.) That railroad fares or similar expenses over \$1 This would require about \$145, or an addition of 28

per cent, to our budget.

(3.) That railroad fares or similar expenses, amounting to more than \$2 be paid. This will add about \$100, or 20 per cent.

4. The effect upon church assessments for the expenses of presbytery would be about as follows: A church now paying in round numbers \$4.50 would have to pay \$5 or \$6; one paying \$10 now, \$12 to \$14; \$18 now, \$21 to \$24; \$30 now, \$36 to \$40; and \$40, \$48 to \$53, according to the plan adopted.

Your committee would prefer to present what to them seem to be the facts, without recommendation, leaving the issue to

Presbytery.

11. The payment of the expenses of the Moderator in attending

ordinations and installations:

That the Stated Clerk be directed to call the attention of churches that Presbytery expects those over which pastors are to be installed, to pay the expenses of those participating in the service by appointment or invitation of Presbytery,

The Rev. Thomas C. Straus and Elder Edwin A. Slosson were appointed a Committee on Calls in the alsence of those appointed at the last meeting.

The Committee on Education presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

1. That the churches be urged to increase by 5 per cent, their offerings to this Board.

Intermediate Meeting, January 18, 1910 2. That so far as practical, Thursday, February 10, or at least some day that week, be observed by the churches as a Day of Prayer for Colleges.

The Rev. George Phillips Payson of the Presbytery of Morris and Orange, Rev. Albert F. McGarrah of the Presbytery of Pittsburg, and the Rev. E. Morris Ferguson of the Presbytery of Newark were invited to sit as corresponding members.

The Rev. Alfred Ray Atwood was received by certificate from the Norfolk Association of Congregational Ministers of Massachusetts, and it was ordered that his name be enrolled after he had answered in the affirmative the constitutional questions. The questions were so answered by him.

The Committee on Calls presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

PATTERSON (p. 239).—The call is for the pastoral services of the Rev. Alfred Ray Atwood, just received. It is regular in form, signed by elders of the church, and attested by the Rev. Robert P. Gibson, the Moderator of the meeting, duly called. The vote was unanimous. The salary stipulated is \$1,000 a year, in monthly payments, with the use of the manse, and an annual vacation of four weeks. The parties have been heard.

It is recommended that the call be found in order and placed

in Mr. Atwood's hands.

The call was then placed in his hands and he signified his acceptance of it.

The same committee reported arrangements for the installation. The report was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Time. — Tuesday, February 15, 7.30 p. m. To preside and propound the constitutional questions — The Moderator. Sermon — Rev. Murray H. Gardner. Charge to the pastor — Rev. Albert F. Pierce. Charge to the People — Rev. Robert P. Gibson. Vacancies are to be filled by the session.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was accepted.

The Laymen's Committee (pp. 121-122) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Intermediate Meeting, January 18, 1910

Your Laymen's Committee was named at a meeting held in New York in March, 1908, and was formally appointed at the Spring Stated Meeting of Presbytery following (pp. 121 and 122). The object of the committee was to obtain subscriptions from the laymen of our churches sufficient to adequately support and carry on the work of our pastor-evangelist.

It was not until January, 1909, that the work actually began, and since that time your committee has endeavored to interest the

laymen of the churches in this work.

Our first annual report will show the amount received from the different churches, also the amount received from other sources, and we would urge a careful study of this report. The report will be sent to all the men who have subscribed to this cause.

The work of a pastor-evangelist was new to our men and our churches, and it has taken considerable time and effort to interest the men in it. We believe another year will see better results, and in order to increase the influence of our Laymen's Committee,

we recommend that two new members be added.

Our aim for the present year is to raise a fund of not less than \$5,000 to adequately carry on this work. We believe that the money is well invested, and that our pastor-evangelist's work for another year will be even more successful than that of the past year.

The report of the Laymen's Committee was made the order of the day for 11 a. m. at the January Intermediate Meeting.

The special committee on the request of the Springfield First Church for consent to its transfer to the Presbytery Intermediate Meeting, January 18, 1910 of Boston (p. 218) reported the action of the Synod (Min. of Synod, 1909, p. 27), and the whole matter was laid over until the Spring Stated Meeting.

The Committee on the Minutes of Synod presented a report, which was accepted and is as follows:

Your committee calls attention

1. To action on the request of the Springfield First Church for transfer to the Presbytery of Boston: — In view of the expressed willingness of the Presbytery of Boston, the committee approves, in general terms, the transfer of the church of Springfield from the Westchester Presbytery to Boston Presbytery, but, inasmuch as we have no official information as to the attitude of the Westchester Presbytery, we recommend that action be deferred until next year." (Minutes of Synod, 1909, p. 27.)

2. The appointment of a committee to consider the advisability of Synod's providing for its own entertainment upon some such plan or basis as practiced by the General Assembly. (Minutes of

Synod, p. 28.)

3. Instruction of stated clerks of presbyteries to furnish the Stated Clerk of Synod with a list, annually, of the chairmen of all standing committees, with their addresses, for the convenience and

efficiency of the Synod. (Minutes of Synod, p. 27:)

4. The fact that this year the fiscal year of the Board of Foreign Missions will cover only eleven months, so as to close Marsh 31, with the other boards. Inasmuch as a large part of the receipts of the Foreign Board has hitherto been in the month of April, the churches are asked to gather their offerings and forward them as early as possible, that the board may avoid the embarrassment and expense of another large deficit. (Minutes of Sumod. n. 52.)

5. A plan for the spiritual oversight of the large number of Presbyterian students in Cornell University and other educational

institutions in that city. (Minutes of Synod, pp. 18 and 56.)

6. The suggested plan of annually appointing an elder to present the cause of Ministerial Relief in a public service and supervise the offering, holding such open and soliciting funds for it as long as may be deemed wise. (Minutes of Synod, p. 42.)

7. The observance of Young People's Day, February 6 (Minutes of Symod, p. 41), and a sermon on "Ministerial Education," the Sunday following the Day of Prayer for Colleges (p. 35).

8. One day in seven as a rest-day for employees on railroads (*Minutes of Synod*, p. 11): temperance legislation (pp. 57-59).

The Moderator reported that the installation of pastors over the Thompsonville, South Yonkers and Bryn Mawr Park Churches had taken place as ordered by Presbytery (p. 217) with the exception that at the first named the charge to the pastor was delivered by the Rev. Henry

A. Davenport and that to the people by the Rev. Frederick A. M. Brown.

The Stated Clerk was directed to present at the June meeting a revised schedule of churches willing to entertain Presbytery.

Mr. Rosmond McDonald, a member of the First Church of New Haven, and a student at Yale College, was examined by the Moderator as to his Christian experience and motives for entering the ministry. On motion he was received under the care of Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry.

The Commission on Italian Work (p, 275), presented a report, which was accepted and referred to the Commistee on Home Missions for a conference with the Commission.

The session of the Greenwich First Church received permission to present its records at this time for review, and they were referred to the Committee on Sessional Records,

The Trustees of Presbytery presented a report, which was accepted, its recommendation adopted and is as follows:

There have been held three meetings during the year; at one there was not a quorum present; at each of the other two there were seven present. Spring Stated The property in the hands of the Trustees remains the same as Meeting, April stated in the report made last year (p. 189). 19, 1910.

These funds are all invested, same as last year on guaranteed bond and mortgage, and on deposit in the Peckskill Savings Bank.

The Trustees would report that, at the request of the South Yonkers Church, an application has been made to and an order entered in the Supreme Court for the sale of a part of the real estate held by the Trustees in trust for a church in South Yonkers, viz.— a lot fifty feet wide, front and rear, and one hundred and twelve feet six inches deep, leaving after this sale is effected a lot one hundred and fifty feet, front and rear, and one hundred and twelve feet six inches deep. The amount to be received from such sale is \$4,500, which will pay off the mortgage now on said lot and leave a balance of \$1,000 to be used toward a building fund for a new church.

With a feeling of sadness the Trustees report the death of one of their number, Mr. Joseph Barrett. He was elected a Trustee at a meeting of Presbytery, April 20, 1909, and because of ill health was unable to attend any of our meetings. He died at Atlantic City, N. J., March 13, 1910.

The Trustees, whose term of office expires with this meeting of Presbytery are Rev. Charles S. Lane and Elders Robert G. Abercrombie and Sanford R. Knapp. It will also be necessary to elect a Trustee to fill the unexpired term of two years, occasioned by the death of Elder Barrett.

The Trustees would recommend the appointment of a committee to present nominations for election to fill such vacancies.

The Moderator appointed as such committee the Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall and Elder Sylvester L. Storms.

The committee to prepare a biographical minute on the late Elder Edward S. Folsom of the Katonah Church (p. 239), presented a report, which was accepted and ordered entered in the Necrology.

The Committee on Resignations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

REV. JOHN WALLACE COOPER (p, 251).—The Rev. John Wallace Cooper requests leave to resign the pastoral charge of the Bedford Church in order that he may accept a call to another field, in which there is a larger opportunity for service. Both parties have been It is recommended that the request be granted.

Mr. Cooper then presented his resignation as a member of the Commission on the Bedford Church (p, 193). It was accepted.

The Commission on the Bedford Church was reorganized to consist of the Rev. Messrs, Clarence Wells Dunham, Robert P. Gibson, Albert F. Pierce and Elders George W. Banks and William Henry Clark.

The Committee on Foreign Missions presented a report, recommending that the time alloted to the Committee be given to the Rev. Norman C. Whittemore, a member of Presbytery and a missionary of the Presbyterian Board at Syen Chun, Korea, just returned on a furlough.

Mr. Whittemore was then heard on missions in Korea. Rev. Wilson Phraner addressed Presbytery on the sixty years of active work in the ministry. Presbytery then presented to him its hearty congratulation on his long period of usefulness in the Master's service.

The order of the day for 11.15 x, m, was taken up, and a conference on "Church Finance" was held, led by the Rey. Albert D. McGarrah, special representative of the Board of Home Missions on this subject.

A call of the Mahopae Falls Church for the pastoral services of the Rey, Thomas C. Mackay of the New Haven Association of Congregational Ministers.

A recommendation of the Committee on Church Erection to the Board of Church Erection for a loan to the Bryn Mawr Park Church was approved.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report (p. 257), which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

We recommend Mr, Vincenzo Cighano to the Roard of Home Missions for reappointment as missionary to his present field and at a salary of 875 a month.

Spring Stated 2. We recommend the mission to the Italians at Port Chester to Meeting, April the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions for an amount equal to that raised on the field up to \$12 a month.

3. We recommend that the license of Mr. Cigliano, as a local

evangelist, be renewed for one year.

The Commission on Italian Work (p, 257), presented a report, which was accepted, and the following substitute therefore adopted:

Resolved, That the Commission on Italian Work be discharged, and that work be committed to the charge of the session of the Port Chester Church.

The Rev. Irving E. White presented his resignation as member of the Committee on Church Erection, and it was accepted.

Presbytery then took recess until 2 p. m.

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 2 p. m.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer.

The Committee on Examinations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee have examined Messrs, E. Graham Wilson and Andrew Szilagyi in the various subjects required for licensure and would report that the examinations have been satisfactory. It is recommended that they be licensed after reading their statements of belief and portions of their sermons.

The candidates then read their statements and were examined thereon. They also read portions of sermons. Their examinations were sustained and they, after prayer, were duly licensed to preach the Gospel.

It was also ordered that they be ordained as evangelists, the former, Mr. Wilson, being about to take charge of the distinctively religious work of the Young Men's Christian Association, New York City, and the latter, Mr. Szilagyi, is now in charge of Presbytery's work among the Hunga-

rians and a church has not yet been organized, of which Spring Stated Meeting, April he might be pastor.

The Narrative was then presented and adopted, and it was ordered that an abstract be entered upon the minutes and also sent to the General Assembly. The abstract is as follows:

I. CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES.

The membership of our churches reported this year to the General Assembly is 10,643, a net gain over last year of 101. Two preaching services are held on the Lord's Day in our churches. About lifteen per cent, of our children and youth are present. Some of our pastors preach sermons to the children. Weekly prayer meetings are held, with an average attendance of about lifteen per cent, of the membership.

H. SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Fifty-three schools are reported, forty-three church schools, three branch schools, three union, and four mission. In only a few is the Shorter Catechism taught. The Westminster Lesson Helps are generally used. Teachers' meetings are held in two-thirds of the churches, usually monthly. The schools have libraries, selected by committees.

III. SOCIETIES.

The Narrator finds it impossible to report on societies on account of the unsatisfactory character of reports received.

IV. SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS.

No unusual interest is reported, and the number received into our churches on examination according to the narratives received is 483.

V. BENEVOLENCE.

The sessions usually have given opportunity to the congregations to contribute to every Board, and contributions have been generally made. The budget plan is used in but few of our churches. The Sabbath Schools contributed to two or three of the Boards, men's societies to none, women's societies to Home Missions, Foreign Missions, and Freedmen, young people's societies to some. Provision is made for the poor.

VI. FAMILY RELIGION.

Christian parents are generally faithful in presenting their children for baptism,

VII. MISCELLANEOUS.

Funancial obligations of congregations are met with fidelity. The temporalities are usually managed by Boards of Trustees. The sesions are reported as supervising the Sabbath Schools. Children's Spring Stated Day is the only special day generally observed. Notices are rarely Meeting, April sent by sessions as to the removal of church members, 19, 1910

The Committee on Home Missions presented a second report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

1. The report of the Women's Board of Home Missions to Presbytery has been received, and we recommend that it be put on file. From this report we note that the amount received totals \$4.923.66. The apportionments were \$1.116.14 for general work and \$420.58 for the debt. The receipts, consequently, have exceeded the apportionments by nearly \$400.

2. The chairman, Rev. Clarence Wells Dunham, asks permission to retire from the committee. Your committee recommend that his request be granted and that the Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall be

appointed to fill the vacancy,

The Committee on Bills and Overtures presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

A resolution was referred to your committee (p, 257). It is recommended that it be adopted and such a committee be appointed.

The Moderator appointed the following as the committee:

The committee to prepare a biographical minute on the late Elder Z. Edward Lewis, M.D., formerly of the New Rochelle Church (ρ , 239), presented a report, which was accepted, and ordered entered in the Neerology.

The former Committee on Bills and Overtures (p. 212), presented a report which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Spring Stated Meeting, April 19, 1910 1. The presbyterial mileage plan, to provide, in whole or in part, for the expenses of the delegates attending the stated meetings of Presbytery, was referred to your committee, together with the report of the special committee (p, 2/I).

Your committee appreciates the difficulties and expense involved in attendance on meetings from the remoter parts of our field. We also appreciate the desirability of full and regular attendance. At the same time it seems to us that any mileage scheme will involve so many petty details and so many questions as to what expenses and whose expenses should be paid that it would be of doubtful advantage. There does not appear to be any general desire for it throughout the Presbytery or any general conviction of its expediency. Your committee is of the opinion that it ought to be the general rule for churches to pay such expenses of their pastors and delegates.

We recommend therefore:

(1.) That no action be taken in the matter of instituting a mileage scheme for the payment of the expenses of delegates in

attending meetings of Presbytery.

(2.) That the churches of Presbytery be advised that it is desirable that the expenses of pastors and delegates in attending meetings of Presbytery be met by the churches themselves out of the general funds for current expenses or such other funds as may be available.

2. There have also been referred to your committee certain papers from the so-called "Advisory Committee" and from the Blairsville Presbytery referring to the so-called "Blairsville Overture," providing for the separation of the offices of Stated Clerk and

Treasurer of the General Assembly (p. 239).

We have examined these papers and inasmuch as the papers do not require any action, and as all that could be done with them would be to put them before Presbytery for its information, and as that has probably been already sufficiently accomplished by their publication in the religious press, we recommend that no action be taken on these papers.

3. There was also referred to your committee a communication from the chairman of Synod's Committee on the Brotherhood Work, asking for the appointment by Presbytery of a similar committee.

We, therefore, recommend:

(1.) That a 'Committee on Brotherhood Work' be appointed to consist of three elders and two ministers, to have charge of all work of men's organizations in the Presbytery, by whatever name known, to receive correspondence and co-operate with similar committees of Synod and General Assembly.

(2.) That the papers relating to this matter now in the hands of this committee be delivered to the new Committee on

Brotherhood Work, when appointed.

The committee to install the Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell pastor of the White Plains Church (p. 267) reported the discharge of that duty in accordance with the directions of Presbytery with the exception that Rev. George P. Noble delivered the charge to the pastor instead of the Rev. A. H. Wheelock.

The Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt asked to be excused from serving on the Committee on Calls and the Rev. John F. Johnstone was appointed to take his place.

The committee to prepare a biographical minute on the late Elder Joseph Barrett of the Katonah Church presented a report, which was accepted and ordered entered in the Neerology.

A biographical minute was presented on the late Elder George William Camp of the Mt, Vernon First Church (p. 279). It was accepted and ordered entered in the Necrology.

The special committee on the Narrative (p. 262) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That the presentation of the Narrative and a discussion of the state of religion within the bounds of presbytery be made a special order for the entire last hour of the morning session of the

Spring Meeting of presbytery, 2. That this committee be continued with instructions to prepare a form of narrative blank, which shall better suit conditions

in this presbytery than the one prepared by the Assembly.

Intermediate Meeting, June 21, 1910

A communication from the officers of the Port Chester Church to the Trustees of Presbytery, requesting that the real property on which the house of worship of the said church is located, the title to which is now vested in the Trustees of Presbytery (Min., Vol. IV, p. 15) be restored and reconveyed to it, was received and read, and the elder-delegate heard.

On motion the request was approved and it was ordered that it be sent to the Trustees for their action.

The Laymen's Committee (p. 243) presented a report, calling attention to the need of funds, and it was accepted.

It was ordered that a conference be held by the session of the Port Chester Church (p. 260) and the Committee on Home Missions on the work being carried on among the Italians.

The Moderator appointed the following a special committee on the communication of the Rev. John Wallace Cooper (p, 278):

Ministers. — Clarence Wells Dunham and William F. Perry. Elders. — William Mathews and Edwin A. Slosson.

The report of the Committee on Colleges, with an address by the Rev. Robert Mackenzie, Secretary of the College Board, was made the order of the day for 11.45 A. M.

The committee to consider and report a plan for a permanent commission for the purpose of organizing churches and aiding in the erection of houses of worship within the bounds of Presbytery (p. 263) presented a report, which was accepted.

Pending its consideration the order of the day was taken up, and the Committee on Colleges presented a report, which was accepted and after an address by the Secretary of the College Board on its work adopted. The report is as follows:

We recommend

Intermediate Meeting, June 21, 1910

1. That you request all ministers and elders to faithfully present the work of the College Board not only to their churches, but to their Women's Societies, Sunday Schools, and Young People's Societies, not simply for the moneys which they may contribute, but that being informed as to what the Board is doing they may be brought into sympathetic interest with its work.

 That offerings be taken in all churches and, as far as it is possible, in their auxiliary societies, for the cause of Christian col-

leges, and that these offerings be sent to the College Board.

3. That the attention of men and women with means be directed to the fact that colleges which are well equipped can best prepare for their life work the young men and young women who are being trained for the future work of the church.

The report of the special committee, which was laid aside for the order of the day, was taken up, adopted, and is as follows:

To meet the growing needs of new communities and to strengthen and develop the resources of our smaller churches, we recommend the creation of a permanent committee to be constituted and governed

as follows:

I. This committee shall be called the Committee on Church Extension of the Presbytery of Westchester. It shall be composed of nine members, not less than three of whom shall be pasters of churches. Three members shall be chosen to serve until the Fall Stated Meeting in 1913, three to serve until the Fall Stated Meeting of 1912, and three until the Fall Stated Meeting of 1911. Thereafter three members shall be chosen annually for a period of three years. In case of vacancy for any cause the unexpired term shall be filled at the next meeting of Presbytery.

H. The committee shall elect its own officers, arrange for its own meetings, form its own rules of procedure, and have the fullest liberty to plan and carry on its work, subject only to the conditions herein set forth, or such other regulations as may here-

after be made by presbytery.

III. In order to accomplish the purpose the presbytery has in view, the committee shall have power to purchase land for religious uses, to aid in building churches, chapels, and manses, to assist churches in enlarging or repairing their houses of worship, and to make any other investment which may be deemed wise for furthering the interests of the church at large. But appropriations shall be made only from such funds as are already in hand and which may be used for such purposes, and no obligations shall be assumed which shall in any manner involve the credit of presbytery or impair its invested funds.

IV. Appropriations may be made to churches both in form of

loans and grants.

1. Loans.— Aid granted to any church in the form of a loan shall be without interest and shall be repaid by the church in equal annual installments, ordinarily covering a period of not more than ten years. Proper security shall be required to cover the amount of the loan until the same has been repaid.

2. Grants. - A grant shall be in the nature of a gift, but a

Intermediate Meeting, June 21, 1910 mortgage covering the amount of the grant shall be required. Such mortgage shall not bear interest and shall earry with it no obligation except that in the event of the dissolution of the organization, or the property ceasing to be used in the interests of the Presbyterian Church, the mortgage shall become collectible in order that Presbytery may not suffer loss.

3. Finds not required for use in the presbytery may be contributed to the Board of Church Erection, or used in the interests

of the Presbyterian Church at large.

V. FUNDS.

1. Current Funds.—The churches of the presbytery shall be requested to send their collections taken for Church Erection to the treasurer of this committee. Such collections, together with leans refunded by churches, gifts, and moneys received from all other sources, when not otherwise conditioned, shall constitute the current resources for the work and shall be subject to immediate appropriation.

2. Permanent fund. — Invested funds whose income alone can be used shall be designated as permanent funds. Under exceptional conditions the committee shall have authority to invest the permanent funds by making loans to churches for short periods of time, when such loan shall not violate any condition imposed with the gift or bequest, but such loan must be properly secured and shall

bear not less than 3% annual interest.

VI. It is not deemed wise to have this committee become an incorporated body. It is therefore suggested that the committee and the Trustees of presbytery agree upon some working basis whereby the Trustees shall be the custodians of the funds invested, and shall receive and pay out such funds according to the order and direction of the committee. The Trustees are not to exercise any authority over or in any way interfere with the committee and its administration of its work, but are to act merely as custodians of the funds in order to give the committee proper legal authority for the prosecution of its work.

VII. Bequests for this work should be made to "The Presbytery of Westchester, State of New York, for the work of the Committee on Church Extension." It is to be hoped that all gifts and bequests will be made so that the principal as well as the interest may be either used or invested according to the wisdom of the committee

and the needs of the work.

VIII. The present permanent committee on Church Erection and Church Extension are hereby discontinued and their functions and responsibilities hereafter shall be assumed by this committee.

IX. These rules can be amended at any time by Presbytery, notice having been given in writing at a previous meeting. It is to be hoped, however, that presbytery will allow the committee the largest freedom in working out its own problems, and will not restrict and hamper it by unnecessary limitations.

For the Term of One Year. — Rev. Lewis Gaston Leary, Elder Ransom E. Wilcox, and Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor.

The Committee on Calls presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Stamford First (p. 278).—The call of the First Church of Stamford, Conn., is for the pastoral services of the Rev. Howard Agnew Johnston, just received from the Presbytery of Pueblo (p. 278). It stipulates salary of \$4,500, with the use of a mause, or \$5,500 without a mause, in regular monthly payments, with four weeks vacation. The call is in due form and the procedure regular. It was reported that the Rev. Howard Agnew Johnston had been installed pastor of the Stamford First Church,

in accordance with directions of Presbytery (p. 283), Fall Stated Meeting, Octowith the exception that the Rev. Ford C. Ottman presided ber 4, 1910 and propounded the constitutional questions in the absence of those appointed.

The order for 10 x, m, (p. 290) was taken up, and the special committee on the Narrative presented a report, recommending that a Narrative blank be prepared for the use of our churches. The report was accepted, and it was ordered

That the committee in conjunction with the Stated Clerk be authorized to prepare and print a new Narrative blank, taking into consideration the suggestions which have been made.

The Commission on the Bedford Church (p, .284) presented a verbal report, which was accepted.

The Commission on the Hungarian Church (p. 284) presented a report, which was accepted, its first recommendation referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures and the second adopted, and the commission was commended for its work. The report is as follows:

Your commission reports that the "Hungarian Presbyterian Church of Yonkers, N. Y.," was organized Sunday evening, October 2, 1910, with 114 members. Elders and deacons were elected and ordained and the procedure accorded with Presbyterian law and usage.

The commission recommend:

1. That the church be enrolled; and

2. That the commission be continued for advice and encouragement.

The Committee on the Minutes of the General Assembly presented a report, which was accepted.

The Committee on Brotherhood Work made a verbal report for information.

The Committee on Church Extension (p. 281-2) presented a report, which was accepted:

Your committee met in New York on September 8 and organized by electing the Rey, Anthony N. Petersen chairman; and Elder Ward W. Adair secretary and treasurer. We urge upon the churches to send to this committee the offerings, which they usually send to the Board of Church Erection, for the reason that that board cannot

grant any loans to churches whose edifices cost more than \$5000. That, of course, cuts out our Presbytery. If the position of the Presbyterian Church is to be strengthened in Westchester County, we must help congregations in the growing communities obtain suitable houses of worship.

We have thought best to make a special effort this year in behalf of the Pleasantville Church. This church, small as it is and growing as it is, has been putting forth commendable zeal and energy in soliciting funds for the church building. They need some help just now, and if we can help them now, they will stand upon their own feet, and not ask aid of any kind in the future. It was decided to ask the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions to aid this year.

The following action was taken:

The Presbytery requests the committee to prepare the proper form of a bequest to be sent to the pastors of churches with the request that they accept opportunities to interest members of their churches in this work resulting in legacies for the same.

The Committee on Finance presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

1. Your committee report that they have examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, and also those of the Treasurer of Presbytery, and have found them correct and recommend their approval.

2. Your committee would also report on the communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, referred to them (p. 289), that it is simply a notification that the apportionment for the next year will be 9 cents for each communicant, an increase of 2 cents. This increase is to meet the increased cost of railroad transportation and certain general litigation expenses growing out of the reunion with the Cumberland Church.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

The South East Church is being supplied by Mr. H. Von L. Meyer, a student at Princeton Seminary. The Italian Mission at Port Chester is carried on by Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, a local evangelist of Presbytery. The Armenian Mission at Thompsonville was carried on for nine months by Mr. Diradour A. Dikijian, a student of Hartford Seminary, but was discontinued July 1, because of his assuming charge of another field. Work there was resumed October 1, by Mr. Hoohaunes L. Garabedian, a student at Hartford.

These applications, with others that are pending or like to be presented, indicate an increasing demand on these funds. To meet these proper and important demands, and at the same time continue a reasonable contribution to the general work of the Synod, it is more than ever necessary that every church shall do its utmost to contribute its full assigned quota this coming year.

The committee recommends that Presbytery send word to the Board of Home Missions, through the Secretary of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, that Presbytery welcomes within its bounds the work of the Board among the foreign speaking people in co-operation with the local session.

The Committee on Calls presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

KATONAM (p. 1911). The call is for the pastoral services of the Rev. G. Phillips Payson of this Presbytery. The call is in due form and the procedure regular. The salary stipulated is \$1,200 a year in monthly payments, the use of the manse and four weeks vacation. All parties were heard.

Pending the consideration of the report the order of the day for 11 A. M. was taken up, and the Committee on Resignations presented a report, which was accepted, after hearing the representatives of the church adopted and is as follows:

Rev. Charles S. Lane (p. 290). — The Rev. Charles S. Lane requests leave to resign the pastoral charge of the First Church of Mt. Vernon, X. Y., in order to accept the vice-presidency and professorship of Church History in the Hartford School of Religious Pedagogy. Both parties have been heard. The congregation concur with regret in the request. The resignation is to take effect October 5, 1910.

Your committee recommend:

That the request be granted to take effect October 5, 1910.

2. That the representatives of the church be heard.

3. That Presbytery be given opportunity to express its esteem for Mr. Lane, its regret at the dissolution of this pastoral relation and its pleasure that he is to remain a member of Presbytery.

On motion the following minute was adopted:

in dissolving this relationship between the First Church of Mt. Vernon and the Rev. Charles S. Lane, Presbytery desires to place on record its appreciation of the Christian courtesy and loyalty of the pastor and to commend the unfailing cordial co-operation of the church and office bearers. As Presbytery wishes Godspeed to Mr. Lane in his new work in the Hartford School of Religious Pedagogy, we congratulate ourselves that we shall still have his co-operation as a loval presbyter.

Twenty-two years ago last March, the Rev. Charles S. Lane was called to the pastorate of the Presbyterian Church, recently organized, in Mt. Vernon, N. Y. He accepted the invitation of the young church and began his work. The intelligence, consecration and enthusiasm of the young minister, the cordial co-operation of the congregation found ample opportunity for service in the rapidly Fall Stated increasing population of Mt. Vernon. The blessing of God rested Meeting Octompon their work, and today there is a vigorous united church of ber 4, 1910 eight hundred members.

Prayer was then offered.

It is recommended that it be referred to the Committee on Systematic Beneticence with instructions that the chairman arrange for a series of evening conferences at convenient points in Presbytery, over which Mr. McCarrah was to be asked to preside.

6. Overtures from the Presbytery of Nassau (p. 290) asking the General Assembly for a change of arrangement in the lists of churches and ministers in the Minates of the General Assembly. It is recommended that it be laid over for future consideration.

 A communication from the Secretary of the Eastern District of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America

(p. 289). It is recommended that no action be taken,

The Committee to prepare a minute expressive of the sympathy of Presbytery for the Rev. Wilson Phraner, in the loss of his wife (ρ , 292), presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

The Presbytery of Westehester in session at Hartford, Conn., October 3 1, 1919, learns with prefound sorrow of the bereavement of its honored and beloved Nestor, the Rev. Wilson Phraner, in the death, July 4, 1910, of his companion of twenty two years, Wrs. Sarah Van Vleeck Phraner, at the age of 75 years.

Presbytery, therefore, hastens to the side of our brother in his sorrow and loneliness, and tenders, in Christian love, the assurance of its sympathy, bringing all of human comfort and fraternal solicitude, of which it is capable, and looking up in faith and trust and reaching out with contidence to welcome for our bereaved co-presbyter the companionship and consolation of the compassionate and loving Christ.

We rejoice with our brother in the happy memory, unclouded and unsullied, which abides in his heart, its most precious human possession, as he contemplates the many years through which he walked with her who now walks in white; as he recalls her devotion and constant helpfulness in his work, and as he remembers her particular activities as home maker, educator and general friend, wherein her social graces, her unusual powers of mind and her complete consecration were beautifully manifested.

We beseech for him the gentle instruction of the Father that he may know that "God never takes away a boon once given." and that in this separation no bonds are broken, no attachments severed, but that she waits for him to claim him at his coming and be claimed by him forever.

We pray that his remaining years may be rich in love and in sweet contemplation of a life well lived for God and man, and that all loneliness be dispelled and all gloom dissipated by Him who promised that "at evening time there should be light."

The Rev. W. Douglas Mackenzie of the Hartford South Association of Congregational Ministers of Connecticut, and the Rev. Warren H. Wilson of the Presbytery of Brooklyn were invited to sit as corresponding members.

The order of the day for the Conference (p. 289) was taken up and an address was delivered by the Rev. W. Douglas Mackenzie, President of the Hartford Theological Seminary, on the Edinburgh Missionary Conference.

The following resolutions were offered and adopted only so far as to dispensing with the roll-call at the opening sessions of Presbytery, action on other matters contained therein being postponed until the January Intermediate Meeting:

Resolved. 1. That Presbytery, if it be consistent with our clerical and statistical relations with the higher judicatories of our church, directs that hereafter the rolls of our churches and of our ministers must be in parallel columns and that the first column be for the churches in alphabetical order; that in the alphabetical roll of ministers there appear in parentheses or brackets after each name, first the year of his ordination and second the year of the beginning of his pastorate or ministry of the church he serves.

2. That hereafter the calling of the roll at the opening sessions

of Presbytery be dispensed with, and that for purposes of enroll-Fall Stated ment, a card be presented each member of Presbytery upon his Meeting, Octoarrival, whereby he may register his name and the church which ber 4, 1910 be represents.

3. That the Stated Clerk with such assistance as he may require be requested in the next publication of the minutes so to print the rolls of churches and ministers, and at the next meeting of Presby-

tery so to provide for enrollment by eard.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Home Missions the Rev. Warren II. Wilson of the Board of Home Missions was heard on the "Problem of the Rural Church."

Presbytery then took a recess until 4.45 p. M. Closed with prayer.

Fall Stated Meeting, October 4, 1910 Presbytery reassembled at 1.45 r. m. and was opened with prayer by the Moderator.

The committee to make arrangements for the installation of the Rev. G. Phillips Payson as pastor of the Katonah Church (p. 297) presented a report which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Katonah.— Time.— Thesday, October 25, at 8 p. m.— To preside and propound the constitutional questions.— The Moderator; Rev. Anthony N. Petersen, alternate. Sermon.— Rev. Edward P. Payson of the Presbytery of Newark, to be invited; Rev. Albert F. Pierce, alternate. Charge to the pastor.— Rev. Robert P. Gibson; Rev. William J. Cumming, alternate. Charge to the people.— Rev. Clarence W. Dunham; Rev. William F. Perry, alternate. Prayer of installation.— Rev. Murray H. Gardner; Rev. James Packard Gillespie, alternate.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

It is needful to remind you that the Board is forced to advance in its field and to call for increased contributions to the amount of \$75,000 over last year. Our churches should promptly and generously meet this call for this fact among others that the Home Board, with a promptness and generosity that is most cheering, is supporting in our country, among foreign-born communities, not less than five efficient workers.

Your committee obeyed the direction of Presbytery for a conference of this committee with the session of the Port Chester Church upon the situation of the Italian Evangelical Mission in Port Chester $(p, 28\theta)$. On the basis of this conference, supplemented by the personal investigation by the chairman of this committee, we believe the direction of the work of that mission should be placed in the hands of this committee to co-operate with the Port Chester Church.

We call attention, too, to the increasingly successful effort for the Italians of Mt. Kisco, generously and wisely assisted by the church there, and to the revival of work for the Italians of White Plains under the supervision of the White Plains Church, and the immediate personal direction of an Italian Missionary of exceptional qualifications.

We recommend:

 That the churches be urged by pastors and elders to increase their offerings in the current year to the Board of Home Missions.

The Committee on Systematic Beneficence presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

To the request of the Executive Commission of the General Assembly for a report as to the causes of delinquency of certain of the churches of the Westchester Presbytery in respect of contributions to the permanent agencies of the church, the Presbytery respectfully replies:

It is the aim of the Presbytery to secure from each of its churches a contribution to all the Boards of the church. Conditions in certain of the churches during the past year, however, have prevented the attainment of this aim. Among these conditions may be named vacancies in pastorates, filled only after considerable intervals or not yet filled, and changes in plans and schedules of contributions resulting in temporary irregularity. In addition to these conditions, the closing of the fiscal year on March 31 for all the Boards has prevented contributions secured during March from being entered as of the past year. To some extent churches have contributed to other agencies working to the same general purpose, rather than those of the church. This has been true especially in the case of Temperance, considerable gifts having been made to the Anti-Saloon League rather than the Permanent Committee on Temperance.

Your committee recommends the adoption of this statement in lieu of a detailed report covering individual churches.

The committee to prepare biographical minute on the late Elder Isaac Brewster Prindle of the First Church of Bridgeport, Conn., (p. 290), presented a report, which was accepted and ordered entered in the Necrology.

Resolved, That we do hereby overture the General Assembly to take such steps as may be necessary with the Woman's Board and Societies to consolidate these three into one periodical, which shall represent all the missionary and benevolent work of the Presbyterian Church.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report on the Italian Mission at Port Chester, which was accepted and its recommendations adopted. They are as follows:

1. That the sum of \$100 be at once paid to Elder William E. Peck, Treasurer of the local committee, by the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, to reimburse Mr. Cigliano for deficits forme by him, month by month, up to December 31.

2. That the sum of \$20 a month from January 1 until the Fall Stated Meeting, 9 months, be paid by the Treasurer of the

3. That the Trustees of Presbytery be directed to investigate the feasibility of taking over the property and administering it in the name of Presbytery, report to be made at the Spring Stated Meeting.

 That Presbytery endorse the plan for a local interdenominational committee to secure helpers, contributors, and friends for

the mission.

5. That the Committee on Home Missions be directed to investigate the question of the status of the mission, as to adherents, etc., and, if the way be clear, to take steps to organize—but not before Presbytery shall hear its report upon the situation at the Spring Stated Meeting — an Italian Presbyterian Church under such provisional session as may seem best.

Intermediate Meeting, January 17, 1911 The committee on Systematic Beneficence reported that conferences on church finances under the leadership of the Rev. A. F. McGarrah had been held in accordance with the instructions of Presbytery (p. 299), at Patterson, Yonkers, Westminster Church, and Stamford.

Its recommendation that a committee be appointed to Meeting, April nominate Trustees to fill the places of those whose terms ^{18, 1911} of office expired, was adopted, and the Moderator appointed as such committee Rev. Messrs, Gardiner and Leary and Elder Abererombie.

A certificate of licensure of Albert A. Marquardt from the Tolland Association of Congregational Ministers of Connecticut was presented, and referred to the Committee on Examinations.

Elder Ralph E. Prime presented a report from the Trustees as directed by Presbytery, reporting that in the opinion of the Trustees the Presbytery itself is not incorporated, but that the Trustees of Presbytery are an incorporated body separate and apart from Presbytery.

The report was accepted.

On motion the name of the church at New Haven was changed to "The Benediet Memorial Church," the legal name of that church corporation having been changed pursuant to law three years ago.

The Rev. George William Knox took the chair at the request of the Moderator.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was accepted. After a long discussion, in connection with which the financial statement of the Treasurer of the Laymen's Committee was read, the report was adopted. It is as follows:

Your committee has a special burden on its heart to day. It relates to the work of the Presbyterial Evangelist, which work has been committed by you into our hands jointly with Laymen's Committee, of which Elder William Mathews is chairman. These two committees have been working in conjunction with one another—the one to direct the work of the evangelist, and the other to defray the expenses. Approximately the amount needed to carry on this work is \$4,000 annually, and the committee had no trouble to raise it the first year. The second year found the committee \$150 short, due in part to the failure of many to continue their contributions beyond the first year. Moreover the pastors of our churches have not given the coöperation to the committee it was led to believe it would have, and which it absolutely needs. A

Spring Stated third fact is a failure of some one to keep the contributors in-Meeting, April formed concerning the work in progress. As a result the Lay-men's Committee find themselves embarrassed for funds with a deficit of \$150 for the year ending December 31, 1910, and the committee, with a third of the current year past, are still unable to meet expenses.

Presbytery not only desires but needs an evangelist. In every church he has visited he has left a blessing alike on pastor and people and precious souls have been brought into the kingdom. The Pleasantville Church will testify to the wisdom of the action of Presbytery in employing a pastor-at-large, and other churches have received the same help and inspiration. But there is a larger work, that of church extension, in which Mr. Pierce has been active. The field at Hartsdale, for example, has been thoroughly canvassed, two weeks or more having been given to it, and as a result the committee are about to begin a Sunday preaching service and a Sunday School there. Through his activity ground for a church has been donated and a temporary meeting place provided. A few years hence will be available the \$25,000 bequest of the late Welcome G. Hitchcock given for a church at Hartsdale, and every indication points to a strong Presbyterian Church at this place not many years hence.

It is the opinion of the Joint Committee that the effectiveness

of the work of a Presbyterial Evangelist would be increased could one or more Presbyteries unite in the employment of a man, and to this end we have been in correspondence with the Presbytery of North River. We regret that we cannot report anything definite

at this time.

Your committee recommends:

1. That Presbytery reaffirm its belief in the need of the work of a Presbyterial Evangelist within our borders.

2. That it record its appreciation of the faithful efforts of the

Laymen's Committee to make this work possible.

3. That it recommend this work to the men of our churches

for their support.

4. That it urge upon the pastors a deeper interest and more active cooperation in the work.

A call of the Irvington Church to the Rev. Daniel Russell was presented, and referred to the Committee on Calls.

On motion it was ordered that the Committee on Evangelistic Work and the Laymen's Committee jointly be instructed to apportion among the churches the amount further needed for the current year, taking into consideration the amounts previously contributed by the respective churches which have already contributed.

The Moderator resumed the chair.

The Committee on Ministerial Relief presented a

report, which was received, and its recommendations Spring Stated Meeting, April 18, 1911 adopted and they are as follows:

1. That Presbytery rejoice in the growing interest in the world

and in the church in the aged citizens of the kingdom.

2. That in harmony with the suggestion of Synod and General Assembly, a layman be appointed in each church to keep this cause in public and private work before the communicant members of our churches.

3. That we make an honest and determined effort this year to raise our contributions so that we shall be giving 25 cents per

member to this cause.

4. That we pray our Heavenly Father by His spirit to stimulate good men and women to increase the endowment fund for this cause.

On motion, Rev. Anthony N. Petersen was made chairman of the Committee on Ministerial Relief in place of Rey, William P. Stevenson, who declined to be chairman.

The commissions, respectively, on the Bedford Church and on the Hungarian Church at Yonkers reported, and the two commissions were continued.

The Committees on Judicial Business were given leave to report at the June Intermediate Meeting.

The Committee on Finance reported recommending that \$25 be appropriated for the work of the Temperance Committee $(p, \beta\beta\theta)$, and the report was accepted and the recommendation was adopted.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The Order of the Day for 11.30 A. M., the Conference with the Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell as leader, was taken up. The Narrative was read. There was then a discussion on — "What is the Duty of the Pulpit in View of the Present State of Religion in our Communities?" It was ordered that an abstract of the Narrative be entered upon the minutes and also sent to the General Assembly. It is as follows:

I. CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES.

The membership reported this year by our churches is 11.084, and the net gain over last year, 441. Four hundred and ninety-two persons have united on examination. Generally two services are held on the Lord's Day. Some churches have 4 communions and others 6. As high as 50% of the children and youths are reported as attending the preaching services. Non-church members largely attend. Prayer-meetings are held with an average attendance of 10% of the reported membership.

II. SABBATII SCHOOLS.

There are 53 schools in connection with our churches — 43 church schools, 4 branch, and 6 mission. The Shorter Catechism is taught in only a few of the schools. The Westminster Helps are generally used. But few schools have either teachers meetings or libraries. Adult Bible classes are reported by 18, teachers' training classes by 2, home departments by 25, and mission training classes by 12.

THE SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS.

Several of our churches have classes of young persons preparatory to the communion. Pastors and sessions report diligence in making clear the relations of baptized children to the church. In most churches no special religious interest is reported. Our pastorevangelist has visited many of our churches and interest is reported by these. In only one instance do we hear of a waning interest in spiritual things. Almost every pastor writes hopefully of the spiritual life of his people.

IV. FAMILY RELIGION.

Christian parents are faithful in presenting their children for baptism. Efforts are made to revive and maintain family worship in the home by pulpit presentation and pastoral visitation.

V RENEVOLENCE

Spring Stated Meeting, April 18, 1911

Congregations are given opportunity to contribute regularly to 18, 1911 the Boards, and most of the churches report offerings secured by pledges through envelopes. Sabbath Schools usually contribute to three of the Boards. Provision is made for the poor.

VI. MISCELLANEOUS.

Financial obligations of our churches are met promptly, and the temporalities are managed generally by trustees. The income of the churches comes from pew rents and voluntary offerings. The various organizations are supervised by the sessions, and most sessions are diligent in reporting to other sessions removals of members.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The sessional records of the following churches were presented for review: Peekskill First, Peekskill Second, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Searborough, Sound Beach First, South East, South East Center, South Salem, Stamford First, Thompsonville, White Plains, Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers Dayspring, Yonkers First, Yorkers South, Yonkers Westminster, Yorktown, Irvington, and Greenburgh.

3. Your committee recommends:

(1.) That the following churches be excused for not presenting their sessional records: Pound Ridge, Rye, Springfield First, and Hungarian.

(2.) That all the records presented be approved without

exception.

Announcements were made, and Presbytery took a recess until 2.30 r. m.

Spring Stated tained and was accepted as an examination for ordination, and Presbytery took orders to ordain Mr. Hartzell. Marquardt was also presented by the committee, and, on recommendation of the committee, it was ordered that he be received by Presbytery as a licentiate.

> On motion, Presbytery voted to proceed to the ordination of Mr. Marquardt.

> The Moderator propounded the constitutional questions to Mr. Hartzell and Mr. Marquardt, and both answered the same in the affirmative, and thereupon both of them were ordained to the Gospel ministry by the laying on of the hands of Presbytery. The charge to the newly ordained ministers was delivered by Rev. Frederick A. M. Brown, and their names were ordered enrolled as members of Presbytery.

Whereas, The three committees of Presbytery, known respectively as the Committee on Home Missions, the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, and the more recently constituted Committee on Church Extension, have in general a common purpose, namely, the care and oversight of new enterprises of the Presbytery of Westchester within the bounds of Presbytery, the stimulation of work already established, and the arousing of an increased interest in the work of the Kingdom within our Presbytery, state and nation; and

Whereas, There has appeared from time to time a certain overlapping of effort, and sometimes a degree of difficulty in effecting

the most desirable cooperation; and

Whereas, This Presbytery ought to be so organized as to present the most effective possible means for the propagation of the Church of Christ in that strategic territory for which, in common with Spring Stated Meeting, April

other Churches, it is responsible; and

Whereas, The Board of Home Missions through their representatives have in conference, recommended some practicable merger of the above named committees, upon lines which have proven successful elsewhere; therefore, be it

Resolved. That a merger of the three committees named above be

directed by Presbytery upon the following lines:

1. That a committee, consisting of sixteen brothren, eight ministers and eight elders be formed to be known as the General Committee of Home Missions.

2. That the chairman of this general committee be elected

by Presbytery.

- 3. That the remaining members of the committee be appointed by a committee to be appointed by the Moderator, and be assigned in groups of five each to three sub-committees, to be known as (1) Sub-committee on Home Missions. (2) Sub-committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions. (3) Sub-committee on Church Extension; each with its own chairman and the chairman of the general committee to be, ex-officio, a member of each committee.
- 4. That is shall be the duty of each sub-committee to continue so far as may be found expedient the functions of the committees now existing for these various phases of work; especially shall this be true of the Sub-committee on Synodical and Presbyterial Missions, whose method of raising its funds, proven so wise, should be continued.
- 5. That the entire committee shall hold regular meetings at a time and place by it agreed upon, when the particular features of work for which each sub-committee is responsible may be by that sub-committee presented and be discussed by the whole general committee. The action of the general committee upon any item of business or upon any matter prescrited to it, shall be the action also of each sub-committee upon that point, subject, of course, to the approval of Presbytery.
- 6. The committee shall have one Treasurer, who shall have charge of all moneys of the committee and of the funds of the Sub-committee on Synodical and Presbyterial Missions, and of all funds that may accrue for the use of the Committee on Church Extension.

This Treasurer shall be elected by the committee at its first meeting for organization.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a statement of expenses in connection with the investigation of Italian Mission at Port Chester, amounting to \$8.80, and requesting to be reimbursed. It was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Committee on Calls reported on the call of the Irvington Church to the Rev. Daniel Russell: that it was regular in form, stipulating a salary of \$3,000 in monthly payments, the use of the manse and four weeks vacation

In view of the large number of cases of tuberculosis in West-Spring Stated chester County, averaging at least 320 deaths annually, and in Meeting. April view of the deplorable lack of facilities for isolating and treating those cases according to approved modern scientific methods, and in view of the fact that our County Board of Supervisors have appointed a committee to take under advisement the plan for the establishment of a County Sanitarium for the treatment of tuberculosis.

Be it Resolved, That the Presbytery of Westchester, representing the Presbyterian Churches of Westchester County, do respectfully petition our Honorable Board of Supervisors to act favorably in this matter, and to take such steps as may speedily remedy conditions as they now exist, and that the Moderator and Permanent Clerk of Presbytery be hereby instructed to make such representations to the Board of Supervisors as in their judgment may aid in bringing about this result.

The committee to nominate Trustees presented a report, recommending the election of the Rev. George William Knox and Elders Ralph E. Prime and Ransom E. Wilcox for the term of three years. The report was accepted and its recommendation adopted.

The request of the Rev. William B. Waller for leave to resign the pastoral charge of the First Church of Greenwich, Conn. (p, 351), was then taken up.

Mr. Waller gave as the only reason for his request ill health.

The congregation appeared by commissioners, as cited (p. 351), and signified its concurrence with regret in Mr. Waller's request.

The request was then granted to take effect July 15. The following minute was adopted:

The Rev. William B. Waller was admitted to the Presbytery of Westchester in January, 1883, and installed as pastor of the New Rochelle Church. With marked ability and true consecration he guided the growing life of the congregation and won a high place in the affection and regard not only of the church when he served Adjourned but also of the community. With clear vision he saw the need of Meeting, July a church on North Avenue, and with unselfish Christian statesman ship aided the inception and development of what is now a vigorous church. After 18 years of devoted labor he resigned the pastorate and accepted a call to the church at Greenwich, Coun. Many complications had hampered the growth of this new work, which he assumed at a critical time in its history. With clear judgment, gracious tact, and fine Christian spirit he gathered about him consecrated helpers. Prosperity blessed their hearty co-operation and today the church is in splendid condition. On account of ill health, after ten years' service, he now resigns the pastorate, having won the affectionate regard of the church. As a presbyter he has always been ready and efficient, willing to do what he could for the general interest of the Presbyterian Church. The Presbytery desires to express its cordial appreciation of these 27 years of service and to cytend to him our best wishes as he now enters upon a vacation which he has well carned.

The Rev. Howard Agnew Johnston was appointed moderator of the session of the Greenwich First Church, and leave was granted to supply the church until the Fall Stated Meeting of Presbytery.

The application of Mr. William Thomson, a member of the Hartford Church and a licentiate of the Hartford Association of Congregational Churches, to be taken under the care of Presbytery with view to ordination was referred to the Committee on Examinations.

The committee to which was referred the question of work among the Ruthenians at Yonkers, N. Y. (p. 354), presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee held a conference with three representative men of the Ruthenians residing in Yonkers, N. Y. We find that there are in the neighborhood of 9,000 or 10,000 in the city, more than half of whom have broken away from the Greek Church or are entirely without religious services. A large number of these people are anxious and willing to support, both by their attendance upon Presbyterian services and in financial contributions, as they are able, any service we will give them.

With all these facts in mind and with confidence in the need of work among the Ruthenians, and in the people themselves as well as in Mr. Nickolas Podluski, we would recommend that Presbytery request the Board of Home Missions to employ Mr. Podluski under

the supervision of the pastors of Yonkers.

Whereas, It has come to the knowledge of Presbytery that the Presbyterian churches of New England are considering the desirability of the organization of a separate synod to be known as the Synod of New England; and

Whereas, The following facts have been set forth as in part rea-

sens for such a step, to wit:

1. That the six states of New England now have 50 churches and more than 80 ministers connected with the Presbyterian Church, the said churches containing a total membership of more than 10,000. There are fourteen western synods that do not contain as

many members.

2. The fact that the great Synod of New York has found it impossible to give the attention to the Presbyterian churches in New England that it gives to its own churches, because it cannot cover the ground of so many states in view of the demands in New York. As a result the New England churches have rather been allowed to be identified with the Synod of New York as an act of courtesy.

3. The fact that there is a growing number of Presbyterians coming into New England from Canada. Great Britain, and the western states, many of whom do not find in their places of residence,

a church congenial to their faith.

4. The Board of Home Missions has felt for some time that the way is opening in New England for the establishment of many Presbyterian churches without any violation of the comity agreement which now exists with other denominations; and

Whereas, The Presbyterian churches in Connecticut and a few in Massachusetts, now connected with this presbytery, are involved

in this step; Therefore,

Be it resolved. That the Presbytery of Westchester expresses its sympathy with the Presbyterian churches located in New England in their desire to secure the constitution of the Synod of New England, and that this presbytery signify to the Synod of New York its readiness to coöperate with the said churches in bringing about this organization, should the General Assembly approve of the same, it being understood that all details of organization will follow the action of the General Assembly by its own appointment.

The Trustees of Presbytery presented a report on the property occupied by the Italian Mission at Port Chester, referred to them (p. 354), which was accepted, and action thereon postponed until later.

The Committee on Home Missions presented a report, which was accepted, and after consideration action was postponed so that the order of the day might be taken up.

The order of the day, the conference on "The Reorgani-

zation of the Presbyterian Forces of the State for Greater Fall Stated Meeting, Octo Efficiency," was taken up with Rev. Douglas Putnam ber 4, 1911 Birnie as leader.

An address on the above topic was delivered by Mr. J. Ernest McAfee of the Board of Home Missions.

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. McAfco.

The following was adopted:

Whereas, Every meeting of the Presbytery of Westchester reveals to a greater or less degree, the unsatisfactory organization and, therefore, the unsatisfactory and inadequate results of efforts put forth perhaps with zeal, but oftener without intelligence; and

Whereas, We recognize the condition is neither creditable, endur-

able, or Christian; and

Whereas, At heart we sincerely do desire that the Presbytery of Westchester be intelligent, business-like. Christian, and efficient to the fullest possible degree in the work of the kingdom of God; therefore,

Be it resolved, That in the face of these facts and in the presence of such presentations as have been made in the conference of this Fall Stated Meeting at Rye, N. Y., October 2-3, 1911, a committee of ten, of which the Moderator shall be chairman and the Stated and Permanent Clerks members, be appointed looking to the solidifying and effective reorganization of presbytery's forces.

The following, in addition to those named above, were appointed members of the committee:

The reports of the Committee on Home Missions and the Trustees were then taken up. After consideration their recommendations were adopted. The recommendations of the Committee on Home Missions are as follows:

Your committee recommends:

- 1. That the letter of the Rev. A. T. Rivard, Duelos, Province of Quebec, proposing work among the French Protestants of Spring-field, Mass., be kept in the hands of the committee and acknowledged, and that the committee be instructed to study the field and report at the January Intermediate Meeting, the Board of Home Missions having expressed its willingness to assist if the facts should warrant it.
- 2. That in view of the continued acceptable results of Mi, Vincenzo Cigliano's work in Port Chester, the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions be directed to continue the payment of \$20 a month toward the expenses of the

Italian Mission, until the next Spring Stated Meeting, a period of six months.

- 3. That the Committee on Home Missions, with such members as they may choose to add, be appointed with power to take steps toward the organization of a Presbyterian Church for Italians in Port Chester, if the conditions are deemed by the committee to be favorable.
 - 4. That the great and fascinating enterprise of Home Missions, "America for Christ," be exalted this year before all the eyes and hearts of our people, and that pastors and elders coöperate to make this a banner year in gifts and results for the Board of Home Missions.
 - 5. That the Board of Home Missions be requested to continue Mr. Podluski in the Ruthenian work at Yonkers (p. 357), at such salary as they deem sufficient.

The report of the Trustees is as follows:

The Trustees would report

I. That they have no funds available at the present time for the purchase of the property.

2. That they seriously question whether it would be advisable to purchase the property in question, even if the funds were available.

3. That they have appointed a committee to make further inquiry regarding the purchase of the property and the solution of the situation.

The report of the Committee on Evangelistic Work was made the order of the day for 2.30 p. m.

Presbytery took a recess until 2 P. M.

The Committee on Young People's Societies presented a report, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee would report as follows:

Very little interest seems to be taken by the pastors in filling out the blanks sent to them. Only 30 of our 43 churches took the trouble to return the card, and of these six gave only the membership of their societies, all other questions were left blank, and five churches answered not more than six of the thirteen questions asked. Under these conditions it must be evident to Presbytery that it is an impossibility for its committee to make a report in keeping with the importance the Young People's Societies should play in our church life.

The 30 churches reporting show the following condition as compared with 1910: 73 societies as against 61 in 1910, a gain of 12, with a total membership of 2,575 as against 2,293 in 1910, a gain of 282. In 1911, 88 are reported as uniting with the church on confession, while a year ago there were 144, a loss of 56. The contributions for this year foot up \$3,343, as against \$3,152 last, a gain of \$191. Last year 8 study classes were reported, and this only 5.

We conclude with the recommendation that Presbytery, if it feels that this report from year to year is of any value, that it request the pastors to give more heed to the making out and sending

the reports of their respective churches.

Rev. Harry Baldwin Roberts of the Presbytery of Brooklyn was invited to sit as a corresponding member. Fall Stated Meeting, October 3, 1911 The Committee on Temperance presented a report, which was accepted, after amendment adopted and is as follows:

Legislation in Connecticut has been somewhat obstructive of progress. Some very excellent measures were killed and very much bad legislation opposed and utterly defeated. There has been going on for some weeks a no-license campaign in which there are some fifty contests. There are hopes for some gains and there are many fears of some losses. The most expert authorities say we are about at the limit in gaining new dry territory under our present laws. Speaking purely from a legislative point of view there has been a tendency to concede to the side of the liquor forces. Furthermore it is daily more apparent that the present statute laws are insufficient to cope with the problems arising from the complexity of modern industrial conditions and social aspects created by the influx of population from the old world. The result of local elections yesterday throughout the state proved a net gain of 95 to 73 for no-license, being a gain of 2 over last year.

Recommendations are as follows:

1. That the Rev. Henry Hayden Barstow, Treasurer of the Anti-

Saloon League of the State of New York, be heard.

2. The Presbytery of Westchester expresses its disapproval of the position taken by the Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, in connection with the Brewers' Congress, and that the Stated Clerk transmit this action to him and to the President of the United States.

Mr. Barstow was then heard on temperance conditions in the State of New York.

 Λ Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was accepted.

The Laymen's Committee presented a report, which was accepted.

After consideration, action on these reports was post-poned until an adjourned meeting to be held in the Assembly Room of the Board of Home Missions, 156 Fifth Avenue, New York, Monday, October 30, 1911, at 10 a.m. The Stated Clerk was directed to send with the notices of the meeting certain questions to be answered by the sessions of the churches, the said questions to be prepared by the Chairman of the Committee on Evangelistic Work and the Stated Clerk.

The Committee on Brotherhood Work presented a re Fall Stated nort, which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

Meeting, October 3, 1911

Twenty-five churches report men's organizations and 17 none. Various reasons are assigned by the latter. Six are reported as affiliated with the Presbyterian Brotherhood of America, while 19 are not.

Your committee would make the following recommendations:

- 1. The organization of a men's club in each church where none now exists.
- The affiliation of all men's clubs with the Presbyterian Brotherhood of America.

The Moderator was directed to send the greetings of Presbytery to the North Avenue Church of New Rochelle on the 20th anniversary of its organization.

The Committee on Church Extension presented a report, which was accepted. The financial statement of the Treasarer was referred to the Committee on Finance for audit and the recommendation adopted. The report is as fol-

Presbytery desires at this time to make record of its thanks giving for the life and activities of our co-presbyter. Rev. Wilson Phraner. Spared to us for these many years he has attained, and since we last met has passed his ninetieth birthday, and he st !! Fall Stated Meeting, October 3, 1911

retains his old time vigor and health and fitness for a willing usefulness. In his present ripe years and with his long experience he yet serves the Lord and the church with cheerfulness and full-heartedness and sacrifice of personal comfort and ease, and is a living

example to his younger brethren.

He has been a member of this presbytery for the entire period of its existence. He was pastor of the church at Sing Sing, when, and in which it first met and organized. He participated in that event. He became a member thereof at that time and his love for this presbytery never flagged from then until now. He has been a most faithful presbyter. We are accustomed to see his face in all our meetings and, if from any of them he is ever absent, it is so seldom, that it becomes a conspicuous event.

For the information of the younger members of presbytery and of those who have recently come to us, we recall that he was born August 29, 1822, at Jamaica, Long Island; was graduated from the University of the City of New York in 1847; was a student in Union Theological Seminary from 1847-1850 inclusive, and was graduated in 1850. He was ordained to the Gospel ministry October 28, 1850, by the former Second Presbytery of New York and installed as pastor of the Sing Sing Presbyterian Church. He continued to be such pastor until December 27, 1885, a period of thirty-five years. The degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by his Alma Mater in 1878. His activities did not cease with the dissolution of his pastorate of the church at Sing Sing, for the same year he became a member of the Board of Home Missions, and ever since, in season and out of season, he has continued to plead the cause in presbytery, in synod, and in General Assembly and in the churches in general and far and near and he has become a necessity to the continued success and service of that board. ferred by the act of Synod with this church in the reorganization of 1870 to this presbytery, then organized, he has never taken nor asked for a transfer. His later place of residence in another state has not attracted him to a newer presbytery, but his love for this has forbidden such a change of relations.

For the unusual period of thirty-five years pastor of one of our clurches, supplemented by twenty-six years of service in the cause of Home Missions, sixty years as a Christian minister, and still active and enthusiastic in all that continually and daily comes to

his hand to do. What a record!

We rejoice in his faithfulness and his continued usefulness and in his endless affection for our presbytery and its members, to the organization of which he contributed and of which he still remains

a member. We stand in grateful wonder at the record.

The years have brought to him many afflictions, in all of which our tears have mingled with his tears. To him these have been the forging, each of a new link in the chains that draw toward the better country. They are a swect realization to him that there are great things and happy reunions for him in the beyond where his service shall be most blessed, and to the greatness of which his long experience and his long life in earthly service here shall better fit for the service and the glory and the joy to which he and we too are hastening.

We pray that his life and labors may yet be spared to the church on earth and to his co-presbyters for many long years to come, in which they shall witness and follow his example and have his counsel and enjoy his fellowship. We record our gratifude to the Fall Stated Heavenly Father for the past and our congratulations and best Meeting Octowishes to our brother.



The consideration of the report of the committee to solidify and reorganize Presbytery's forces was resumed (p. 404), and the remaining sections were adopted. report, as adopted, is as follows:

The Committee respectfully recommends and moves

That the proper and requisite steps be taken to amend and revise the present Standing Rules and Standing Orders of Presbytery, so as to embody the following provisions and to eliminate such provisions as may be in conflict therewith:

1. The stated meetings of the Presbytery shall begin not later

than four o'clock on Monday afternoons, of the appointed days,

2. The order of procedure at the Monday afternoon session of the Spring Stated Meeting shall be: (1) Prayer, (2) Election of officers to serve for one year. (3) Communications. (4) Announcement of Committee on Sessional Records and call for sessional records. (5) Report of Committee of Arrangements. (6) The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. (7) Recess for the meetings of committees.

3. The order of procedure at the Monday afternoon session of the Fall Stated Meeting shall be: (1) Prayer. (2) Communications, (3) Announcement of Committee on Sessional Records and call for sessional records. (4) Report of Committee of Arrangements. (5) A memorial service, of not more than a half hour's duration, for members of the Presbytery deceased within the previous year. (6) The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. (7) Recess for the meetings of committees.

The memorial service to be held annually is to supersede the presentation of biographical minutes during the business session.

4. The Monday evening session of each stated meeting shall embrace: (1) A brief period for the transaction of urgent and necessary business. (2) A meeting, for which the Committee of Arrange Spring Stated ments shall provide, at which there shall be presented some Subject Meeting, April of vital and practical religious interest.

5. The Tuesday morning session of each stated meeting shall begin at nine o'clock, and after a devotional service of ten minutes. shall be occupied solely with the docket as arranged, which docket shall contain only matters of business.

- 6. The Tuesday afternoon session of each stated meeting shall begin not later than two o'clock, and the first hour thereof shall be occupied with a conference, as may be arranged; after which the business of Presbytery shall be resumed and continued till adjourn-
 - 7. The permanent committees of Presbytery shall be as follows:
- The Committee on General Business. This committee shall consist of seven members. It shall have charge of: (a) Calls: (b) Resignations; (c) Finance and Audit; (d) Bills and Overtures; (e) Such further business, not included in the functions of other permanent committees, as may be referred to it by order of Presbytery.
- (≥. The Committee on Education and Examinations. This committee shall consist of nine members. It shall have charge of the interests of the Board of Education, the College Board and the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, of Young People's Work, and of Examinations. This committee shall devise and prosecute measures for the promotion of religious education throughout the Presbytery.
- The General Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions. This committee shall consist of lifteen members. It shall have in charge: (a) Local Home Missions, within the bounds of the Pres bytery; (b) Presbyterial and Synodical Missions; (c) Evangelistic Work: (d) Church Extension and Church Erection. This committee shall continue and exercise the functions hitherto possessed and exercised by the committee of the same name, as formerly con stituted. It shall devise and prosecute a program: (a) and strengthen such churches of the Presbytery as may require such service; (b) To carry on work among people of foreign speech, within the bounds of Presbytery; (c) To stimulate the churches of the Presbytery in the propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, in their several communities; and (d). To survey the territory of Presbytery, in a thorough and comprehensive way, with a view to the establishment of new churches. This committee shall also frame and present to the Presbytery and its churches a budget sufficient to meet the needs of the above named objects and shall secure and administer the funds of said budget. The committee shall elect its own Treasurer, who shall receive and disburse its funds, All moneys raised by the church for Preshyterial and Synodical Missions shall be kept separate and devoted only to that purpose
- (4) The General Missionary Committee. This committee shall consist of seven members. It shall have charge of national Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Missions to Freedmen, Ministerial Relief and Systematic Beneficence. This committee shall represent the in terests of the Board of Home Missions, the Board of Missions tor Freedmen, the Board of Foreign Missions, and the Board of Minis terial Relief. It shall devise and prosecute measures to promote the adequate support of the work of the Boards of the Church, through systematic giving.

- (5) The General Committee on Social Service. This committee shall consist of seven members. It shall have in charge Temperance, Brotherhoods and other phases of social and moral effort.
 8. A Committee on Judicial Business shall be appointed by the
- A Committee on Judicial Business shall be appointed by the Moderator only when there is occasion for the services of such committee.
- 9. Members of Presbytery desiring leave of absence may present their requests to the Stated Clerk. The appointment of a Committee on Leave of Absence at each stated meeting shall be discontinued.

10. The Moderator, Permanent Clerk and such temporary clerks

as Presbytery may order shall hold office for one year.

11. Permanent committees shall serve for two years, beginning with the Spring Stated Meeting, at which their appointment takes effect. They shall be selected by a committee appointed for the purpose, which committee shall ordinarily report not later than the January Meeting. The adoption of the report of this committee by the Presbytery shall constitute appointment of the permanent committees.

12. A committee appointed to perform an executive or administrative act, such as the installation of a pastor, shall, upon the performance of the duty assigned, forward to the Stated Clerk of Presbytery a written report as to the same, which report shall be noted by the Stated Clerk in his report to Presbytery, as its next regular meeting.

13. When the report of any committee shall have been presented to Presbytery, it shall be considered as accepted by the Presbytery, without a formal vote to that effect, unless there be objection.

14. Such portions of the report of a committee as propose definite action by the Presbytery shall be considered and treated by the Presbytery as motions duly brought before the house, on their presentation in the report, without a formal motion of adoption from the floor, following the order of precedence which they have in the report. The formula of introduction for such propositions should be: "The committee recommends and moves."

15. At any meeting of Presbytery at which Commissioners to the General Assembly or Delegates to the Synod are to be elected, nominations of such commissioners or delegates may be handed in in writing, to the Stated Clerk, previous to the time set for open nominations. Each of such nominations must be signed by a member of the Presbytery who is present at said meeting. The names of persons thus nominated shall be read to the Presbytery, at the hour appointed for open nominations, after which opportunity for open nominations shall be given.

16. Commissioners to the General Assembly and Delegates to the Synod shall present to the Presbytery, at its next stated meeting after the meeting of the higher judicatory, a joint written report concerning their attendance upon the meeting of the higher judicatory, and concerning any acts or procedures of said higher judicatory which may require action by the Presbytery. The commissioner or delegate whose name stands first on the list shall be the convener of the commissioners or delegates for the purpose of preparing such report. This report shall supersede individual reports on the minutes of General Assembly and Synod as formerly required.

17. A brief set of rules for the guidance of the Moderator shall be printed and put into the Moderator's hands at each meeting of Presbytery.

All standing rules, or parts of rules, which conflict with Meeting April the action just taken, were repealed.

The Moderator, Stated and Permanent Clerks, were appointed a coannittee to revise the standing rules so that they may accord with the action taken today, with instructions to embody in the said rules only what is permanent in character and should not be changed except after due consideration, other directions of Presbytery for the transaction of its business being made standing orders.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Howard Agnew Johnston delivered the charge to the pastor and the Moderator offered the prayer of installation. The report was accepted.

The committee to install the Rev. George II. Smyth as paster of the Pleasantville Church (p. 399) reported the discharge of that duty in accordance with the directions of Presbytery with the exceptions that the Rev. Carl Elmore offered the prayer of installation and the Rev. Joseph R. Duryca delivered the charge to the paster. The report was accepted.

The Committee on Ministerial Relief presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows;

Your committee recommends

- That each church appoint an elder or some member, whose business it shall be to see that his church gives at least twenty five cents a member,
- 2. That we mige our Commissioners to the General Assembly to take an especial interest in the propositions looking toward the union of the forces and work of the Board of Relief and Minis terial Sustentation Fund.
- 3. That it is the opinion of the Westehester Presbytery that the terms of union should favor the Board of Relief,

The Committee on Temperance presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee would recommend and move

That all possible attention be given by our churches to the inculcation of the principles of self-control and abstinence from our pulpits as ministers may find opportunity, and in the several organizations of the church, especially in the Sunday School classes of all grades, and in the Christian Endeavor topics. Moreover that modern methods and results of careful physiological and psychological investigation be used wherever possible and practicable.

2. That the Amethyst be supplied to the members and adherents

throughout our churches.

3. That each congregation should place upon its benevolent budget the Presbyterian Temperance Committee.

The Committee on Examinations reported recommending that the rule requiring notice be waived in the case of Mr. William Norman Courtice and that he be received under care of Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry after passing the usual examination.

The Moderator examined Mr. Courtice as to his religious experience, and his views in seeking the ministry, and, on motion, his examination was sustained and he was received as a candidate.

The committee further reported, recommending that Presbytery hear a part of Mr. Courtice's sermon and his statement of belief. The report was accepted and adopted, the candidate was so heard.

It was ordered that the examination be continued at 1.45 p. m.

Recess was then taken until that hour.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented the Narrative. It was accepted, and adopted, and it was ordered that an abstract be sent to the General Assembly and entered in the minutes. It is as follows:

I. CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES.

Our churches report this year a membership of 11,505, a net gain of 402. There have been received into our churches on examination 534. In our churches two services are usually held on the Lord's Day. The communion service is held in some four times a year, in others six. Some 10 or 12 of our pastors report special sermonettes to children and youth. Weekly prayer meetings are held with an attendance of from 10 to 16% of the membership.

H. SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Fifty Sabbath Schools are reported. The Shorter Catechism is not taught as a rule. The Westminster Lessons Helps are used for the most part. Teachers' meetings are largely held, either weekly or monthly. But few schools have libraries, and where there are the pastor has a part in their selection.

HI. SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS.

Six churches have classes for young persons preparatory to communion. Pastors have been faithful in making clear the relations of baptized children to the church, but parents for the most part have been indifferent. There has been no special or spectacular teligious interest, but a steady growth in number, interest and influence. It has been a good year spiritually. The present spiritual condition of our congregations, including the Sunday Schools, is excellent. Unly four of our Sunday Schools report no special evangel. istic effort during the year. Our Sunday Schools are a contributing agent to the growth of the church, and it has been a good year tor them spiritually as well as numerically

IV. FAMILY RELIGION.

Christian parents are faithful in presenting their children for baptism. Very little is being done to revive and maintain family worship. Our pastors admit ignorance as the actual condition.

V. BENEVOLENCE.

The sessions generally have given the congregations an opportunity to contribute regularly to every Board. And there has been an increase. Very largely the budget plan is in effect, and special emphasis is also laid on the Boards. The provision for the poor is ample.

VI. MISCELLANEOUS.

The financial obligations of our congregations are met with promptness, and the temporalities are managed by trustees. The income is secured by duplex envelopes or pew rents, or both. Special days appointed by the Assembly are observed largely. Sessions send notices to other sessions of the removal of members.

Mr. Marshall and the commissioners of the church and congregation were heard, and the minutes of the meeting of the church were read. After appreciative remarks by various members of Presbytery the request was granted to take effect at the date named.

The following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Rev. Benjamin T. Marshall has resigned the pastorate of the New Rochelle Church in order to accept a position on the teaching staff of Dartmouth College, his alma mater; and

Whereas, The Presbytery of Westchester has approved the dissolution between Mr. Marshall and the New Rochelle Church; therefore, be it

Resolved, 1. That in dismissing Mr. Marshall to his new field of service the Presbytery of Westchester records its appreciation of Mr. Marshall and of his work done within its bounds. Mr. Marshall has served his entire pastorate in this presbytery, covering a period of nearly fourteen years. During this period we have been increasingly impressed by vigor of his mind and the loyalty and strength of his character. He has proved a most effective preacher, holding his convictions with tenacity, and urging them with felicity and charm of language and rare grace of spirit. Mr. Marshall has been an exceptional pastor, especially in his ability to win and hold young people of every sort. No one will miss him more than the boys in the two parishes, where he has worked. He has done his full work as a presbyter and more, never refusing to accept any burden, if thereby the welfare and interest of the church might be furthered. We record with special gratitude our appreciation of his thorough and valuable work as a member of our Committee on Home Missions and on other committees of Presbytery. We are deeply gratified by the large place which Mr. Marshall has taken in the life of the communities where he has lived, and in the life of the county, by his fearless and open advocacy in the name of Christ of everything making for the welfare of his fellow men and by his large construction of the office of the Christian minister. The special committee, to which was referred the extract from the minutes of the General Assembly of 1912, in reference to the erection of the new Presbytery of Connecticut Valley, Synod of New England (p. 423) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The minute of the General Assembly is as follows: — "The Preshytery of Connecticut Valley, consisting of the ministers and churches in the State of Connecticut and all Massachusetts west of the Connecticut River, including Springfield and Holyoke, Mass., the churches being Stamford, Greenwich, Hartford, New Haven, Bridgeport, Springfield, Holyoke, Thompsonville, Noroton, and Sound Beach; except that ministers without charge, who are enrolled members of the Presbytery of Westchester, shall remain members thereof save that any of them may elect to become members of the said new Presbytery of Connecticut by notice to the convener thereof before the organization of said new presbytery.

"This presbytery shall meet at Stamford, Conn., on Tuesday, October 8, 1912, and the Rev. John F. Johnstone of Hartford, Conn., shall be the convener, preaching the opening sermon and presiding until the presbytery shall be duly organized; or in case of his absence the oldest minister present shall perform these duties."

This action of the General Assembly was taken in opposition to the wishes not only of the representatives of our Westchester Presbytery, who were present, but was also contrary to the preferences of the churches affected by its decision (p, 415). As loyal Presbyterians, however, we are in duty bound to submit to the will of our highest court, and in the hope that its view of the matter, less biased, it may be, by local feeling and prejudices than ours, may be for the extension of our denominational influence and the growth of God's kingdom, we bid these churches, which are thus going forth from our bounds, God-speed.

In recording this action, which brings to an end presbyterial associations with men and churches, which have been most harmonious and delightful and which have grown strong and tender with the passing years, we desire to put on record our affectionate appreciation of their fellowship and co-operation, and to assure them that we shall ever follow their future course with sincere interest and pray that they may all be blessed with an ever-increasing prosperity.

It is recommended that the Stated Clerk, on account of the action of the General Assembly, be directed to drop from our rolls the names of the churches thus transferred, viz.—Stamford First,

Greenwich First, Hartford, New Haven Benedict Memorial, Bridge Intermed ate port First, Springfield First, Holyoke First, Thompsonville, Darien, Meeting June and Sound Beach First, and those of their pastors, viz. - Howard 18, 1912 Agnew Johnston, Frank M. Carson, John F. Johnstone, Frederick A. M. Brown, John McLaren Richardson, Horace T. Chadsey, Frank Duncan Smith, William S. Voorhies, and Carlos Martyn.

It was ordered that copies of the above minute should be sent to the churches and ministers affected by the action of the General Assembly.

A hearty vote of thanks was extended to the pastor, officers, and members of the Yorktown Church for their hospitality.

This included maintenance of work already established, resumption of aid to Springfield church, and aid in new work at Armour Villa Park. This last is a new enterprise in a growing suburban section of the city of Yonkers. Springfield church under the new pastor, Rev. H. T. Chadsey, is advancing steadily. Church attendance and interest are increasing at Bedford under the leadership of Rev. J. W. Rac. The church at South East is one of the oldest in Presbytery. Part of the year it was led by Mr. Milton Campbell, a student at Princeton Seminary, and now is led by Mr. Philip H. Dowling, a student at the Bible Teachers' Training School, New York city. The Armenian Mission at Thompsonville was carried on by Mr. Basmagian, a student at Hartford Coming. magian, a student at Hartford Seminary. The members of the Mission have increased their offerings and therefore asked for less aid than in previous years. The Italian Mission at Port Chester, as ordered by Presbytery, received aid to be used for rent. Rev. George Hugh Smyth began his pastorate at Pleasantville in December, and the splendid work of the church has been continued. Aid granted for the new year will be the last applied for. Work at Harrison is progressing rapidly under Mr. Lester H. Bent, a student at Union Seminary.

The committee expresses its appreciation of the constant support in past years of the New England churches, now formed into the Presbytery of Connecticut Valley, and would cordially commend to their care the work at Springfield and Thompson-

ville.

The Stated Clerk presented a report on communications, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

1. Request of the Rev. Henry Havden Barstow for dismission to the Presbytery of Albany. It is recommended that it be granted.

2. Mr. Ludwig K. Seith, a member of the Presbyterian Church of Patterson, N. Y., filed an application on December 29, 1912, to be taken under the care of Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry.

3. A communication from the Corresponding Secretary of General Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply asking for the amount furnished by each church of presbytery for pastoral support. The Stated Clerk does not know and has not been able to give the information. He asks for direction as to what he is to do.

4. A communication from the Presbytery of Pecos Valley. It it recommended that it be referred to the General Missionary

Committee.

5. The Rev. Joseph C. Wyckoff and the Rev. Ford C. Ottman have notified the Stated Clerk that they have elected to become members of the new Presbytery of Connecticut Valley and had so notified the convener of that presbytery (p. 430). It is recommended that their names be dropped from the roll.

6. The committee to install the Rev. Harry B. Roberts pastor of the Yorktown Church reports the discharge of that duty in

accordance with the directions of Presbytery (p. 458).
7. Request of the Rev. William Sinclair for dismission to the

Classis of Ulster. It is recommended that it be granted. 8. Request of Mr. Umberto Berardelli, a candidate under our care, to be dismissed so that he may place himself under the care of the Presbytery of New York of the United Presbyterian Church.

It is recommended that it be granted.

g. A communication from the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Kansas City stating that the request of the Rev. George Reynolds for dismission to this presbytery would be presented to the Presbytery of Kansas City at a meeting to be held on January 20 and that the action thereon would be telegraphed the same evening, with a telegram to the effect that he had been dismissed, was read. It is recommended that he be received and his name enrolled by the Stated Clerk on the receipt of the usual certificate of dismission.

12. A call of the New Rochelle Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. George Reynolds. It is recommended that it be referred to the Committee on General Business.

13. A call of the South East Church for the nastoral services of Mr. Ludwig K. Seith. It is recommended that it be referred to the same committee.

14. Died:

(1.) At Greenwich, Conn., January 8, 1013, William C. Fowler, an elder of the Peekskill First Church. It is recommended that the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt be appointed to prepare a biographical

minute for the Necrology.

(2.) Suddenly, at Yonkers, N. Y., January 11, 1913. Rev. George N. McDonald, aged 72 years, and Elizabeth, his wife, aged 75 years. It is recommended that the Rev. Daniel G. Lawson be appointed to prepare a biographical minute for the Necrology.

The Moderator then propounded the constitutional questions to the Rev. John Lee Maddox, who answered them in the affirmative.

The printed minutes, pp. 359-456, were approved.

The committee to revise the standing rules (p. 440) presented a report, which was accepted and referred back to the committee.

The following resolution was adopted and referred to the committee to revise the standing rules:

Resolved. That it is the sense of this presbytery that the work contemplated by the General Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply be placed under the jurisdiction of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report on church extension, which was accepted and is as follows:

Presbytery authorized the purchase of a pertable chapel (p. 442). Such a chapel with all the furnishings has been purchased from a Jewish congregation of Yonkers for \$1,000, the purchase money being donated by a friend of church extension. It has been Meeting January 21. 1913

Intermediate removed to Scarsdale and erected there at an expense of \$485, and has been painted and put in thorough repair at an additional expense of about \$175. A carpet, hymn books, a pulpit Bible, pulpit furniture, and \$50 have been donated, the latter being applied to the bill for painting. The first service was held on the second Sunday of December. On January 19 representatives of this presbytery met at the chapel and organized the Hitchcock Memorial Presbyterian Church of Scarsdale, N. Y., with nineteen enrolled members. Steps have been taken to secure a pastor and it is hoped that he will enter on his work by April. The new church starts its career under the happiest auspices with every prospect of rapid growth.

> The General Missionary Committee presented a report on the communication from the Presbytery of Pecos Valley referred to it (p. 460), recommending that no action be taken. The report was accepted and adopted.

> The Committee on General Business presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

- 1. Auditing.—The accounts of the Treasurer of the former Committee on Church Extension, which were not presented at the Fall Stated Meeting have been examined in accordance with the directions of Presbytery (p. 444), found correct and turned over to the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.
- 2. Apportionments.—Owing to the separation of the New England Churches from presbytery (p. 430), it has become necessary to increase the apportionments for presbyterial expenses of the churches that are left (p. 441); for while the number of churches is less the expenses of Presbytery will not materially decrease. The expenses during the last ten years have risen from \$392.44 to \$563.10, each year showing some increase over the preceding one. To meet these expenses the apportionments of the churches remaining foot up only a total of \$396.31 on the present basis. We have, however, a balance on hand of over \$500. But little retrenchment seems to be possible, and that little will not bring our expenses down to the average of the last ten years. An increase of apportionments, therefore, seems to be a necessity.

Our last apportionments were made in 1904. There has been little change in relative strength of our churches since that time. The only solution seems to be an increase of all apportionments proportionally. An increase of 30 per cent, will bring the income up to within \$50 of the highest expense in any one year, i.e., up to The apportionments for presbyterial expenses are but about 30 per cent. of the total apportionments, the rest being for Synod and General Assembly, so that the proposed apportionments will add only about 10 per cent, to the total apportionments for last vear.

We, therefore, recommend and move that the apportionments of the churches be increased as follows:

3. Overtures from the General Assembly.—The overtures sent down by the last General Assembly were referred to us at the

Fall Stated Meeting (p. 435).

(1,) Overtures 1-5, concerning churches operating under a "bond of union." These overtures naturally fall or stand together. While the object sought is certainly in many cases desirable and we feel that Presbytery is in full sympathy with such a desire, yet we believe that the overtures as presented would help very little toward that end and have so many defects that they should be rejected These overtures have been very hastily prepared, so that the places designated for amendments in the Form of Government are erroneous and out of place; so much so that the Stated Clerk of the Assembly in a letter accompanying them says that Overtures 1, 2, 3 and 4 might be assigned properly to other places and Overture 5 should be more definitely located and says that if "Presbytery votes affirmatively on the overtures, I ask that it consent to have the General Assembly of 1913 consider the alterations in place above suggested and adopt the same in its discretion -a vote which is on its face unconstitutional and impossible. Evidently they have not been carefully considered even by the Assembly Again, while possibly the intent of the overtures is clear, although that is a deMeeting January 21. 1913

Intermediate batable question, the language in some is very unfortunate. Likewise, we believe, that the whole plan as proposed is contrary to the very spirit of Presbyterianism, except in such things as are already possible under the Form of Goevrnment. We, therefore, recommend and move that Overtures 1-5 be answered in the negative.

(2.) Overture 6, concerning representation in the General As-This overture proposes a change of basis, looking to a reduction in size. The new plan means that a presbytery must have at least 65 ministers before it is entitled to more than one minister and one elder in the Assembly, while the present one requires but 36. It means an increase of the influence of the smaller presbyteries, already over-large in proportion to size; in other words, minority rule of the most pronounced type. A presbytery of five ministers will have the same representation in the highest court as one of 64, even irrespective of the size of the churches. We, therefore, recommend and move that overture 6 be answered in the negative.

(3.) Overtures 7 and 8 concerning the roll of church members. We recommend and move that they be answered in the affirmative.

4. HITCHCOCK MEMORIAL CHURCH.—There has been referred to your committee the request of nineteen persons, who were organized on January 19 as the Hitchcock Memorial Church of Scarsdale, N. Y., that the said church be taken under the care of presbytery and enrolled. We recommend and move that the request be granted and the church enrolled and that the Stated Clerk be authorized to send to this new church the most cordial greetings of presbytery.

5. CALL OF THE NEW ROCHELLE CHURCH.—The call of the New Rochelle Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. George Revnolds was also placed in our hands. The commissioners of the church and the moderator of the meeting were heard. The call promises a salary of \$3,600 a year in equal monthly payments with the use of the manse and six weeks' vacation. The committee

recommends and moves:

(1.) That the call be found in order and placed in the hands of Mr. Revnolds at a meeting of presbytery to be called after his name shall have been enrolled.

(2.) That the Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor, the moderator of the session, and Elder John H. Harmer be appointed a com-

mittee to arrange for the installation.

6. CALL OF THE SOUTH EAST CHURCH.—The call of the South East Church for the pastoral services of Mr. Ludwig K. Seith was also referred to the committee. Inasmuch as Mr. Seith is not vet a member of presbytery, we recommend and move that the call be returned to the moderator of the session of the South East Church for the preparation of the necessary papers.

The committee to consider the new uniform financial plan proposed by the General Assembly (p. 441), presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Probably nothing has demanded and received more attention during the last few years in practical methods of church work than the question of church finance. The plan submitted by the last General Assembly which this committee was to consider, was the Intermediate result of a year's deliberation by the Executive Committee of the Meeting conference of the Executive Commission and the Boards of the 1913 (Church, The plan is found in detail on pp. 257 to 260 of the Assembly's Minutes, 1912, and your committee would urge every pastor and every elder to make a careful study of the plan with especial reference to its application to his own church.

The chief and important features of the uniform plan are the budget plan, preferably a double budget, one for church expenses and the other for benevolences, definite pledges for each budget from every member of the church, and such a personal canvass of the church and congregation as shall reach every member with a

pledge card and envelopes.

While your committee feels that the plan is a good one and something like it should be adopted in almost every church, yet the particular plan to be chosen and the needs of the local church are best known to the session and trustees of such church; and there-

fore we recommend and move;

That sessions be urged to consider carefully the Uniform Financial Plan proposed by the last Assembly, if advisable and possible in joint meeting with the trustees, with a view to adopting the very best plan for raising funds for both the local expenses and the benevolent gifts of the churches.

The Rev. William P. Schriver, of the Presbytery of New York, was invited to sit as a corresponding member and addressed presbytery on the conference of Magyar pastors and churches to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, January 28 and 29.

The following minute was adopted:

With reference to the Rev. John Lee Maddox, a member of this presbytery, who desires appointment to a chaplaincy in the U. S. Navy in place of the Rev. R. Randall Hoes, retired, also a member of this presbytery:

Resolved. That this presbytery does most heartily approve of Mr. Maddox's application and that the Stated Clerk of this presbytery be instructed to communicate this action to the President of the United States, the Secretary of the Navy, the Rev. Charles L. Thompson, President of the Home Mission Council, and the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and that the latter be requested to concur in our recommendation.

The foregoing minutes were then read and approved.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator.

The Trustees presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The Trustees of the Presbytery of Westchester have had four meetings during the year ending March 31, at each of which there were present six trustees.

These funds are all invested on bond and mortgage and on deposit in the Peekskill Savings Bank. The Trustees have obtained a decision from the Supreme Court that the interest from the Milne Fund may be paid to persons whom the Trustees decide, residing in the original bounds of the Presbytery of Westchester.

Through the generosity of one of the board, the Trustees have received the gift of a portable church complete to be used by the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions in its work of church extension, and the same is now occupied by the Hitchcock Memorial Church at Hartsdale. At a meeting of the Trustees on April 15, they decided to accept title to certain lots at corner of Washington and Jefferson Streets in Yonkers, to hold the same for the use of the Hungarian Presbyterian Church

Spring Stated

The trustees whose term of service expires with this meeting Meeting, April 21, 1913 of Presbytery are the Rev. Charles S. Lane and Elders Robert G. Abercrombie and Sanford R. Knapp. There is a vacancy to be filled for one year caused by the death of the Rev. George William Knox.

The Trustees recommend the appointment of a committee to report nominations for election to fill such vacancies.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. Messrs. Everitt and Dunham and Elders Ransom E. Wilcox and George E. Reed a committee to nominate trustees.

The Rev. George G. Mahy of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, and the Rev. Agide Pirazzini of the Presbytery of New York, were invited to sit as corresponding members.

The Committee of Arrangements presented a report which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee respectfully reports

That the members of presbytery will be entertained in the homes of the members of the Presbyterian congregations or at the hotels, and will be escorted to their places of entertainment after the evening session. A collation will be served in the Sunday School room of this church at 6.30 P. M. today and in the Sunday School room of the First Church tomorrow at 12.45 P. M.

The committee recommends and moves

1. That the order of the docket as printed be followed.

2. That the hour of recess on Tuesday be 12.30 P. M.

The sessional records were called for review and presented.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that Mr. Ludwig K. Seith, a member of the Patterson Church, who filed his application to be taken under the care of this presbytery as a candidate for the ministry on December 29, 1912, be now examined as to his religious experience and motives for entering the Christian ministry, as provided in the Form of Government, and that if the way be clear, he be received as a candidate for the ministry under the care of this presbytery.

Mr. Seith was then examined by the Moderator concerning his religious experience and motives in seeking the ministry, and on motion he was taken under the care of the presbytery.

The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was celebrated spring stated. The report of the Committee on Presbyterial and Meeting, 1913 Synodical Missions was made the order for 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, to be followed by the conference on What Methods are Best Adapted to Promote the Growth of the Church in this Presbytery.

The call of the South East Church was presented and referred to the Committee on General Business.

Prechytery took a recess until 8 p.m. Closed with prayer.

Monday, 8 p.m.

Presbytery reassembled at 8 p.m.

After devotional exercises, a sermon was preached by the Moderator, Rev. Thomas C. Straus, on the text, Isaiah 52:1: "Awake, awake: put on thy strength, O Zion."

The Narrative was then read. It was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The following is a summary of the reports of thirty-one of the thirty-four churches of this presbytery. The total membership of these churches is 8,585, a net gain over last year of 381. There has been received this year a total of 724, of whom 406 have been received on confession of faith.

The average attendance at the morning service has been 150. There are five churches that report average attendances of more than 300, the largest being 670. The average evening attendance has been 83. Only three churches report more than 200. The largest average attendance has been 260. It is assumed that all these figures represent actual count.

Christian parents are reported as faithful both in presenting their children for baptism and in guiding them into the membership of the church. Family worship is generally neglected. A few ministers are reported as having taken frequent occasion to encourage this practice, by many characterized as "obsolete." Only one church

reports an increase in the practice of family worship.

Few churches report any unusual interest manifested during the past year. The great majority of ministers declare they preach evangelistic sermons, one declares he does not. A few state that every sermon they preach has behind it an evangelistic purpose, It is worth noting that the churches of which this is said are the churches that present the most encouraging reports—encouraging in the fact that they are leading in accessions and in benevolences and in their general condition as indicated by their reports.

The Bible schools of the presbytery seem to be in a live condition. The total Bible school memberships of the churches reporting

Spring Stated is 5,200, with an average attendance of 212. The largest schools Meeting:
April 21, 1913

are those connected with the Dayspring, 922; Yonkers First, 505; and the Mt. Vernon First, 470. Practically all the schools are either wholly graded or partially so. The Bible School representation at the services of the church seems to be small. This fact may be of interest, the churches which have the largest children's attendance are those churches, in which the minister preaches a weekly children's sermon. About fifty per cent. of the ministers of this presbytery do this. In a few churches the pastor conducts a communicant's class for children, who are considering church membership. Mt. Kisco and Mt. Vernon report Boy Scout organizations, the latter reports also three groups of Camp Fire Girls. One school writes that every boys' Bible class is led by a man, a condition that ought to prevail universally.

> The total amount spent last year upon our local churches was \$108.308.21; the amount contributed to benevolences \$45.933.90; and the total amount given to the boards of the church was \$17,259.03. The missionary activities are cared for almost exclusively by the women's organizations of the churches. About half of the churches make use of the duplex-envelope plan for raising their benevolences. Of these a part ask pledges at the beginning of the year and a part do not. About half still retain the monthly collection for the boards, usually preceded the week before by an appeal for that particular cause. It is noticeable that in the great majority of cases the offerings for benevolences have been increasing. One church reports an increase of 60 per cent, in the amount of its benevolences, although the membership for the past year has decreased, owing to

changing local conditions.

In almost every instance the session of the church reports its fidelity to all its duties and avows its willingness to exert its disciplinary function whenever cause shall demand it. Automobiling, golf, and "bridge" are the charges generally made against the "nominal Christians" in our churches. It is interesting to note that at least 60 per cent, of the churches have men's clubs that are taking a hand in affairs of the community. One minister diagnoses the difficulty in his church as a lack of the vision that looks out beyond its own four walls and sees the needs of the community and of the

church at large and the great opportunity for service.

The writer before closing must refer to an instance that points to the source of weakness of many a ministry, the lack of personal touch. One minister states that "for the greater part of the year he preached as earnestly as he knew how, and often preached evangelistic sermons, but made no effort to follow up the sermon by personal appeal." The result was no appreciable increase in church Toward the close of the year, he writes, he began to enlist his people in personal work. Every sermon was followed by the individual appeal by him and by members of his workers' group. Results were quick to follow. A large number have already united with the church as a direct result of this personal work, and others have signified their intention to follow. It was the Master's way of winning men, and if we would win we must make his way our way.

Presbytery then adjourned until 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The Permanent Clerk was granted leave of absence from the June Intermediate Meeting in order that he may attend as a delegate to the Aberdeen Council.

The Rev. William P. Stevenson was granted leave of absence from that meeting for the same reason.

The committee to nominate trustees presented a report recommending that the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt be elected to fill vacancy caused by the death of the Rev.

Spring Stated George William Knox and that the Rev. Anthony N. Meeting, April 22, 1913 Petersen and Elders Robert G. Abercrombie and George W. Banks for the full term of three years. The report was accepted and the persons nominated elected.

The committee to revise standing rules (p. 461) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that in accordance with the sense of presbytery as expressed at the meeting on January 21 (p. 461) the following clause be inserted in Standing Rule No. 33 (new), immediately after the words "Evangelistic Work" "and (6.) Vacancy and Supply," and that the word "and" immediately before (5.) be stricken out.

The order of the day for 10 o'clock (p. 473) was taken up. The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was accepted, and its recommendations with the exception of one appropriating money, which was referred to the Committee on General Business, adopted. The recommendations are as follows:

I. That the Board of Home Missions be requested to make grants for our work as of the year that has just closed, with the exception that there be no grant at this time for work among the Ruthenians of Yonkers and that the grant for the work among the Italians at Port Chester be continued for three months, or until the sub-committee make further requests for a change of plan.

2. That the following plan of evangelistic work be adopted:
(1.) That the members of the evangelistic committee visit each and every church of presbytery for at least one evening, holding

a. A conference with the pastor and the officers of the church, at which the spiritual conditions and problems of the church are discussed and plans laid (a) for the deeping of the spiritual life of the church, and (b) for the reaching out for the unsaved in our respective communities.

b. A mass-meeting in the evening (preferably at the time of the mid-week service) at which the members of the evangelistic sub-committee will speak and emphasize the need of a definite Christian home influence, urging the re-establishment of the family altar, and, if expedient, to enlist definite pledges from the heads of families, to daily Bible reading and prayer with the family at home.
(2.) That this plan of presbyterial visitation shall begin as

soon after the first of May as is possible and that the churches of the rural districts be visited first, reserving the churches of the cities and larger villages until the early fall and completing the visitation before Sunday, November 9.

(3.) That Sunday, November 9, be designated as a day of

presbyterial interchange of pulpits, at which time, as far as it can Spring Stated a. Every pastor of presbytery shall preach in a pulpit to which April 22, 1913 has been assigned by the committee be arranged

he has been assigned by the committee.

b. A presbyterial letter shall be read from each pulpit, on the day of exchange, emphasizing (a) our presbyterial unity, (b) our presbyterial opportunity and (c) our presbyterial responsibility.

c. Each pastor will preach upon a theme distinctively spiritual.

(4.) That the evangelistic committee be instructed to supply ministers of our own churches, who will spend a week or such part as may be desired, in special evangelistic meetings either in connection with the day of pulpit exchange, or at any other time, upon the request of any church.

3. That the evangelistic committee be authorized to draw upon the Treasurer of presbytery for the expenses of such a campaign, not to exceed the amount which is held for evangelistic purposes.

A conference was then held on What Methods are Best Adapted to Promote the Growth of the Church in this Presbytery, in which the Rev. George G. Mahy, Corresponding Secretary of General Assembly's Evangelistic Committee, took part.

The General Missionary Committee presented a report, which was accepted and its recommendations were adopted. They are as follows:

1. That at least one-half of the morning session of the Fall Stated Meeting be devoted to the consideration of the "Every Member Campaign for Benevolence," which is to be conducted in

March, 1014.

2. That presbytery urge upon the ministers the vital necessity present efforts of our Board of Ministerial Relief and also of interesting individuals in the churches in this worthy cause.

The General Committee on Social Service presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Whereas, There has been introduced in the Legislature of the State of New York a bill known as the Velte-Hammer Bill conferring upon the aldermen of certain cities authority to permit the

opening of saloons during certain hours on Sunday; and

Whereas, In our judgment this measure partakes of the nature of class legislation conferring upon some rights that are not at the same time extended to all, thereby working injustice to other branches of trade, in favor of the liquor business, and further violates principles regarding the proper use of Sunday, for which the Christian Church has always stood, and is, finally, a distinct concession to those elements in our society, who, for the sake of gain, have persistently, flagrantly and openly violated the existing laws of this state with no consent whatever except the good will of those who have heretofore broken the law; therefore

Spring Stated Meeting, April 22, 1913

Be it resolved. That the Presbytery of Westchester, now in session, representing the churches of Westchester County and part of Putnam County, registers its earnest protest against these and all kindred measures designed to promote the interests of a business, which sacrifices the moral and religious welfare of the state; and that the General Committee on Social Service through the chairman be hereby authorized to inform the senators and assemblymen of Westchester County and such part of Putnam County as is within the bounds of the Presbytery of Westchester of this action by telegraph and respectfully request them to oppose this measure and to vote against it, and that a full copy of this resolution be forwarded to them by mail with a similar request, also to the Governor of the State, and to such civic organizations as are directly engaged in opposing the passage of such measures.

The Committee on General Business presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee has considered the following matters referred to it (p. 473):

I. The call of the South East Church for the pastoral services of Ludwig K. Seith. The commissioner of the church was heard and the minutes of the congregational meeting were examined. There appeared a discrepancy between these minutes and the call, and there was no proper attestation of the moderator of the meeting. We therefore recommend and move that the call be referred back to the congregation that it might be put in accord with the minutes of the congregational meeting and that it might have the proper attestation of the moderator.

2. A communication concerning the ministerial standing of the Rev. James H. Hoyt, a member of this presbytery. It appears that Mr. Hoyt's name appears in the vear book of the Congregational Church as the installed pastor of the Congregational Church of New Canaan, Conn. We recommend and move that the Stated Clerk be directed to ascertain from Mr. Hoyt, or from any other reliable source, whether Mr. Hoyt has been installed as pastor of the Congregational Church at New Canaan, or whether he is a

member of any Congregational Association.

3. Communications from the Presbyteries of West Jersey, Los Angeles and Ogden and from the Rev. Vernin N. Yergin concerning records for Annual Statistics. We recommend and move that

these be laid on the table.

It was ordered that record should be made of Presbytery's appreciation of the presence and stirring address of the Rev. George G. Mahy, Corresponding Secretary of the General Assembly's Committee on Evangelistic Work.

The Committee on Education and Examination presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

1. Your committee had before it joint communications from the College Board, the Board of Education and the Board of Publica-

tion and Sabbath School Work, proposing a joint presentation of Spring Stated the cause of Christian Education at the Fall Stated Meeting. The Meeting, plan contemplates a popular meeting and a conference to be under April 22, 1913 the charge of your committee. The committee recommends and moves

(1.) That the Monday evening session of the Fall Stated Meeting be devoted to a popular meeting in the interest of Christian Education.

(2.) That the Tuesday afternoon conference at the same meet-

ing be devoted to the subject of Christian Education.

- 2. Your committee has examined for licensure the following candidates for the ministry: Domenico Blasi, Jay Knox, Ludwig K. Seith and Rino Venturini. The committee recommends and
 - (1.) That Mr. Blasi be directed to continue his studies; and

(2.) That Messrs. Knox, Seith and Venturini be presented to Presbytery for their parts of trial.

Messrs. Knox and Venturini read written statements of their faith, and Mr. Seith by leave of the Presbytery made an oral statement. Parts of their sermons were delivered by Messrs, Knox and Seith,

Presbytery then took a recess until 2 p.m.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions was authorized to designate one of the Commissioners to the General Assembly to represent this presbytery at the conference on evangelistic work prior to the meeting of the General Assembly.

The thanks of presbytery were extended to the churches of Peekskill for their hospitality.

The minutes of today's sessions were read.

The committee to revise the standing rules (p. 461) presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves the adoption of the following standing rules, standing orders and rules for the guidance of the Moderator, and the repeal of all standing rules now in force, and of all standing orders and action of presbytery in conflict therewith:

STANDING RULES. MEETINGS.

1. Stated meetings of the presbytery shall be held on the third Monday of April and the first Monday of October in each year, and the intermediate meetings on the third Tuesday of January and third Tuesday of June in each year, unless in either case presbytery shall otherwise order.

2. The session of the church in which the meeting is to be held shall constitute a committee of arrangements for that meeting.

3. At every stated meeting the presbytery shall spend the first hour of the first morning in devotional exercises, unless otherwise ordered by presbytery.

4. Notice of all meetings of presbytery shall be given to all

ministers and to the clerk of each session.

5. Excuses for absence from meetings and requests for leave of absence shall be presented to the Moderator through the Stated Clerk, and report thereon shall be made to presbytery.

MINISTERS.

6. Every minister coming to this presbytery on certificate from another pre-bytery, may, in the discretion of the pre-bytery, be examined as to experimental religion, theology, and church government, and every minister coming from any other ecclesia-stical body shall be required to answer affirmatively the first seven questions in the Form of Government, Chap. XV, Sec. XII, and shall be examined in such other measure as to assure pre-bytery that his spiritual and intellectual equipment corresponds to the Pre-byterian educational standards.

LICENTIATES

7 Every licentiate coming to this presbytery on certificate from

Spring Stated another presbytery may in the discretion of the presbytery be ex-Meeting, April 22, 1913 amined as to his religious experience and on theology and church government and every licentiate coming to this presbytery from any other ecclesiastical body shall be required to answer affirmatively the questions in the Form of Government, Chap. XIV, Sec. VII, and shall be examined as to his religious experience and in theology and church government and in such further measure as to assure presbytery that his intellectual equipment corresponds to the Presbyterian educational standards.

CANDIDATES

8. (1.) Every applicant seeking to be taken under the care of presbytery as a candidate for the ministry shall file his application at least three months before the meeting of presbytery, addressing the same to the chairman of the education committee of presbytery, in the care of the Stated Clerk, in order that the committee may have ample time to make a careful investigation of his Christian character, physical and mental qualification, and his previous education; and no person shall be received by presbytery as a candidate for the ministry who has not been recommended by the session of the church of which he is a member, under whose care he shall have been for a period of at least six months. And no exception shall be made to this rule without a unanimous vote of presbytery.

(2.) Presbytery shall examine annually, in person or by letter, all candidates under its care, concerning their Christian experience, their progress in study, and their fidelity to the doctrines of the church. It shall also advise with them concerning their course of study, and the institutions in which they are to pursue their studies.

(Constitutional Rule No. 3.)

9. No candidate shall receive license to preach until he has been under the care of the presbytery for at least one year, except in extraordinary cases and by consent of three-fourths of the members of presbytery present. (Form of Government, Chap. XIV, Sec. VI.)

10. When a person shall be introduced to presbytery to be taken under its care as a candidate for the ministry, his application shall be referred to the Committee on Education and Examinations.

11. Every candidate shall be placed under the superintendence

of the Committee on Education and Examinations, who shall carefully attend to his moral and intellectual improvement and make a report of the same to presbytery.

EXAMINATIONS.

12. The examination of candidates as to their religious experience and motives for entering the ministry shall be conducted by the Moderator before presbytery. (Form of Government, Chap. XII', Sec. III.)

13. Examinations in all other subjects required shall be conducted primarily by the Committee on Education and Examina-The chairman shall convene the committee for this purpose when notified of the intention of any candidate to apply for licensure or ordination at the next stated meeting of presbytery. He shall also advise each candidate as to the time, place, and scope of the examination, giving him the address of the respective members of the committee to whom the several written parts of trial are to be sent.

14. The committee may appoint temporary substitutes for absent spring stated members of its sub-committees.

- 15. Any member of presbytery is entitled to be present at ex-April 22, 1913 aminations before the committee. Friends of candidates, not members of presbytery, may be present with the consent of the committee.
- 16. After the examination by the committee, each candidate shall appear before presbytery. The candidate shall read to the presbytery a brief comprehensive statement, in his own words, of his doctrinal belief, and shall deliver so much of his sermon, as the committee shall direct. Opportunity shall then be given to the members of presbytery to question him upon his doctrinal statement, after which he shall retire from the room. The committee shall then report its recommendations, and presbytery shall take action.

17. Licentiates applying for ordination shall be examined in church government and in such other subjects as may be ordered.

OFFICERS.

18. The officers of presbytery shall be a Moderator, a Stated Clerk, a Permanent Clerk, a Treasurer, and two Temporary Clerks. The Stated Clerk and Treasurer shall hold office during the pleasure of presbytery. The other officers shall be elected at the Spring Stated Meeting for a term of one year. The duties of the Treasurer may be assigned to any of the clerks.

19. The Moderator shall preside at all meetings, taking the chair precisely at the hour appointed, preserve order, enforce the rules, appoint all committees except in those cases where presbytery shall decide otherwise, decide all points of order, carefully keep notes of the several articles of business assigned for particular hours, and endeavor to conduct all business to a speedy and proper result.

- 20. The Stated Clerk shall form the roll of each meeting; receive all overtures and papers addressed to presbytery and present the same to presbytery with his recommendation for its action or reference, unless otherwise ordered; make up a docket of business for each meeting; give all necessary notices to carry orders of presbytery into effect, and perform such duties as by rule or usage of Presbytery, Synod, or General Assembly are performed by the Stated Clerk, and such other duties as presbytery shall prescribe. He shall index the minutes, make such permanent record of them, and from time to time print them or an abstract of them, and deliver a copy to each minister in presbytery and to each ruling elder of its churches, as presbytery may direct. He shall also prepare, print, and deliver in like manner each year a list of the officers of presbytery, of all ministers, licentiates, candidates, and local evangelists, and of all the ruling elders of its churches arranged in alphabetical order but under the names of their respective churches.
- 21. The Permanent Clerk shall himself keep, or cause to be kept, by a Temporary Clerk, if presbytery appoint such a clerk, a correct record and minute of all business transacted by presbytery, and shall, within seven days after the close of each meeting, deliver such record to the Stated Clerk.
- 22. The Treasurer, or the clerk acting as Treasurer, shall re-ceive the moneys of presbytery, and disburse the same as directed by presbytery, or by the standing rules of presbytery. At each Fall Stated Meeting he shall present in writing a report of receipts and

Spring Stated disbursements during the year then ending, with vouchers for all Meeting, April 22, 1913 payments made by him, and the same shall be referred to the Business Committee.

23. The salary of the Stated Clerk, and his disbursements for blanks, stationery, postage, etc., and also his personal expenses in attending special meetings of presbytery shall be audited, and shall be paid by the Treasurer out of the moneys belonging to presbytery.

24. Officers of presbytery who are not members shall have the

rights of corresponding members.

TRUSTEES.

25. The Trustees are to choose their own officers for the term of one year at the first regular meeting following the annual election

of Trustees of presbytery.

26. Regular annual meetings of the Trustees shall be held at or shortly before the Spring Stated Meetings of presbytery, at which time a written report shall be prepared for presentation to presbytery, giving receipts and disbursements for the period since the last report, and exhibiting the present condition of the funds and other property held by the Trustees.

27. Special meetings of the Trustees may be called by the chairman, and must be called at the request of any two trustees. One

week's notice shall be given in ease of special meeting.

28. The accounts of the Treasurer of the Trustees shall be

audited by the Trustees at least once each year.

29. The minutes of the Trustees shall be presented to presbytery once each year at the Spring Stated Meeting for review.

COMMITTEES.

30. Permanent committees to serve two years, beginning with the Spring Stated Meeting of each even-numbered year, on the nomination of a committee appointed for the purpose at the Fall Stated Meeting preceding, which committee shall ordinarily report not later than the January Intermediate Meeting, shall be appointed by presbytery as follows:

(1.) Business Committee;

- (2.) Education and Examinations;
- (3.) Presbyterial and Synodical Missions;

(4.) Missionary Committee;

- (5.) Social Service; and
- (6.) Sessional Records.

31. The permanent committees shall be composed of such num-

ber of ministers and elders as presbytery shall order.

32. The Business Committee shall act as a committee on (1.) Bills and Overtures, (2.) Calls, (3.) Resignations, (4.) Finagee and Audit, and such other business, not included in the functions of other permanent committees, as may be referred to it by presbytery.

33. The Committee on Education and Examinations shall act as a committee on (1.) Education, (2.) Examinations, (3.) College Board, (4.) Publication and Sabbath School Work, and (5.), Young People's Work. The committee shall devise and prosecute measures for the promotion of religious education throughout the presbytery.

34. The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions shall act as a committee on (1.) Home Missions within the bounds of presbytery, (2.) Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, (3.)

Church Erection, (4.) Church Extension, (5.) Evangelistic Work, Spring Stated Meeting, and (6.) Vacancy and Supply. It shall continue to exercise the April 22, 1913 functions hitherto possessed and exercised by the committee of the same name, as formerly constituted. It shall be its duty (1.) To foster and strengthen such churches of presbytery as may require such service; (2.) To carry on work among people of foreign speech within the bounds of presbytery; (3.) To stimulate the churches of presbytery in the propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in their several communities, and (4.) To survey the territory of presbytery in a thorough and comprehensive way with view to the establishment of new churches. The committee shall also frame and present to presbytery and its churches a budget sufficient to meet the needs of the above named objects and shall secure and administer the funds of said budget. It shall elect its own treasurer, who shall receive and disburse its funds. All moneys raised for Presbyterial and Synodical Missions shall be kept separate and devoted only to that purpose. This committee shall have in charge the arrangements for the annual Day of Prayer, the preparation of the narrative and the selection of moderators of sessions and supplies for churches without pastors. It shall also have supervision of all vacant churches within the bounds of presbytery, except as such supervision may be arranged otherwise by the presbytery in special cases. It shall be the duty of this committee to prepare and keep a list of vacant churches within the bounds of the presbytery and of such unemployed ministers of the presbytery as are competent for service and not relieved by presbyterial action from the regular work of the ministry; and also to arrange for the supply of the vacant churches from the list of its available ministers and from such other sources as may be suggested by correspondence with the General Assembly's Permanent Committee on Vacanacy and Supply.

35. The Missionary Committee shall act as a committee on (1.) National Home Missions, (2.) Foreign Missions, (3.) Freedmen, (4.) Ministerial Relief, (5.) Systematic Beneficence, and (6.) Budget of the General Assembly. It shall devise and prosecute measures to promote adequate support of the work of the Boards through systematic giving.

36. The Committee on Social Service shall act as a committee on (1) Brotherhoods, (2.) Temperance, and (3.) Other phases of

social and moral effort.

37. Reports of permanent committees, except that on Sessional Records, shall be in order at any time that the business committed to their care may require, and shall be placed on the dockets of all The Committee on Sessional Records shall reregular meetings. port at the stated meetings.

38. A Committee on Judicial Business shall be appointed only when there is occasion for the services of such a committee

39. A committee appointed to perform an executive or administrative act, such as the installation of a pastor, shall, upon the performance of a duty assigned, forward to the Stated Clerk a written report as to the same, which report shall be noted by the Stated Clerk in his report on communications at the next regular meeting of presbytery.

40 Each member of a committee shall be entitled to the privi-

Spring Stated leges of the floor when any report of his committee or matter touch-Meeting, April 22, 1913 ing the work of the committee shall be under consideration.

CALLS AND RESIGNATIONS,

41. Calls and requests for release from a pastoral relation shall

ordinarily be referred to the Business Committee.

42. Such reference may be made by the Moderator or Stated Clerk of presbytery in the interim of meetings of the judicatory. when a call or a written request for release shall be placed in his official charge; and the committee may then proceed in the case to the extent of its powers, reporting thereon at the next meeting of presbytery.

43. The report on calls shall in each case present

(I.) An exhibit of facts-

a. The name of the church;

b. The name and ecclesiastical connection of the minister:

c. The form of the call;

d. The procedure of the congregation;

e. Stipulations as to salary, manse, and vacation; f. Hearing of the parties by the committee.

(2.) Recommendations concerning

a. Disposition of the call:

- b. The installation of the minister, if the way be clear.
- 44. The report on resignations shall in each case present

(1.) An exhibit of facts comprising

a. The names of the church and the pastor; b. The party making the request;

- c. The grounds of the request, concisely stated;
- d. Consent or refusal of either party to concur in the request:

c. The hearing of the parties by the committee; f. The date for the release to take effect.

(2.) Recommendations as to action upon the request. COMMISSIONERS AND DELEGATES.

45. Commissioners to the General Assembly and Delegates to Synod, and their alternates, shall be elected by ballot at the stated meeting next preceding the meeting of the judicatory to which they are respectively commissioned, a majority of votes being necessary to an election. Nominations therefor shall be the first order of the morning session of the second day, and election shall take place at the noon recess of the same day.

46. Nomination of Commissioners to the General Assembly or Delegates to the Synod may be handed in, in writing, to the Stated Clerk, previous to the time set for open nominations. Each of such nominations must be signed by a member of presbytery, who is present at said meeting. The names of the persons thus nominated shall be read to the presbytery at the hour appointed for open nominations, after which opportunity for open nominations shall be given.

47. The vote shall be counted by two tellers, appointed by the Moderator, and the report upon it shall be in the following form:

(I.) Whole number of ballots cast:

(2.) Necessary to a choice:

(3.) Names of ministers nominated in the order of votes severally received, beginning with the highest, with the number of votes for each.

Spring Stated

(4.) Names of elders nominated in like manner.

(5.) A list of candidates elected, and the number still to be Meeting. April 22, 1913 chosen.

48. If there be no objection, vacancies in the lists of principals shall be filled by the names next highest on the lists, and alternates shall be those whose names follow, in the order of the vote.

49. In the case of a tie vote, the names of those receiving the equal vote shall be arranged in the order of seniority of ordination. If the tie affects the choice of a principal the fact shall be reported to presbytery for its action.

50. The lists sent to the Stated Clerks of the higher judicatory

shalf follow the order prescribed above.

- 51. The alternates of either class shall take the place of the principals of the same class, who are unable to serve in the following order: The one receiving the largest number of votes shall fill the first vacancy, the one receiving the next largest number of votes the second vacancy, and so on until all the vacancies are filled. Commissions of those unable to serve shall be returned as promptly as possible to the Stated Clerk, who shall issue a commission to the proper alternate.
- 52. Commissioners to the General Assembly and Delegates to the Synod shall present to the presbytery, at its next stated meeting after the meeting of the higher judicatory, a joint written report concerning their attendance upon the meeting of the higher judicatory and concerning any acts or procedures of the said higher judicatory, which may require action by the presbytery. The commissioner or delegate, whose name stands first on the list shall be the convener of the commissioners or delegates for the purpose of preparing such report. This report shall supersede individual reports as formerly required.

CHURCH SESSIONS

- 53. Each church session shall, at least ten days before each Spring Stated Meeting of presbytery, send to the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions a narrative of the state of religion in said church, and to the Stated Clerk of presbytery, on or before the same meeting, its statistical report.
- 54. The sessional records of the first half of the churches, alphabetically arranged, shall be presented for examination at the Fall Stated Meeting, and of the second half of the churches at the Spring Stated Meeting. Failure to present records once each year forms a ground of exception. (Book of Discipline, Chap. IX, Sec. 72.)

Sessional Records.

55. The minutes of each meeting of the session should record

(t.) The time and place of meeting;

- (2.) The name of the moderator and each elder present or absent;
- (3.) Each action taken, showing the full contents of every motion or resolution carried.
 - (4.) Reading and approval of the minutes;

(5.) Adjournment:

(6.) The opening and closing with prayer, if that be done.

56. The yearly statistical report of the church is to be entered upon the records of the session.

57. The minutes of each meeting must be attested by the signature of the moderator or clerk of session.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 22, 1913

58. The Committee on Sessional Records shall examine

(1.) Whether proceedings of the session have been correctly recorded:

(2.) Whether they have been constitutional and regular;

(3.) Whether they have been wise, equitable, and for the edification of the church. (Book of Discipline, Chap. IX, Sec. 73.)

59. Proceedings are to be accounted correctly recorded and constitutional and regular when they are in accord with the rules of presbytery, the instructions of the higher judicatories, and the constitution of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America.

60. The Committee on Sessional Records shall note all proceedings which shall seem from the facts of record not to be wise, equitable, or for the edification of the church, and shall either report its judgment thereon or report the facts to presbytery without action.

61. The opening and closing of meetings of sessions with prayer is not required by the Form of Government, though in accord with the rule for the higher judicatories, and its omission is

not to be made a ground of exception.

62. When exception is found against any record, the committee shall notify the representatives of the session concerned, and shall permit them to account for the matter of the exception or to correct the record so far as that can be done without essential alteration. Exceptions which remain after this procedure shall be reported to presbytery. Records to which no exception is found shall be reported for approval.

63. A certificate of review, signed by the Moderator or Stated Clerk of presbytery, shall be entered upon each record reviewed Churches Without Pastors.

64. Churches without pastors shall pay supplies a compensation

of at least one-half of the regular salary.

65. It shall be disorderly for any church without a pastor to employ itinerant preachers whose credentials have not been submitted to some member of presbytery, or for any minister to labor statedly in any of our churches who does not come under our jurisdiction, unless by special permission of presbytery at each stated meeting.

66. When a church becomes vacant and at each subsequent stated meeting, until a pastor is installed therein, a moderator of

session shall be appointed by presbytery.

67. When the pulpit of any congregation has been vacant for a longer period than twelve months, the appointment of ministers for the pulpit shall be made by the presbytery, and shall continue to be so made until a pastor has been elected by the congregation and duly installed by presbytery. (Form of Government, Chap. XXI, Sec. III.)

FUNDS.

68. Each church shall pay annually before the Spring Stated Meeting to the Treasurer of presbytery for the expenses of Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly, the sum that shall have been apportioned by presbytery.

69. Each treasurer of presbytery, or of a board, commission, committee, or other body appointed by or reporting to presbytery, shall keep his accounts, entered fully or at large, in books belonging

to presbytery or to the body of which he is treasurer, and shall Spring Stated keep all moneys in his hands as such treasurer deposited in bank Meeting, and separate account from any other moneys, and to his credit as such treasurer.

70. Such accounts, with the exception of those of the Treasurer of the Trustees, shall be presented annually or oftener as presbytery shall direct, for audit, and shall be examined and approved, and the approval recorded in the same manner as in the case of sessional records.

71. All requests for appropriations shall be referred to the

Business Committee; and

72. All requests for release from the payment of apportionments shall be so referred; and, if granted by presbytery, the amount of such apportionments shall be added pro rata to the assessments of the churches for the following year.

RULES OF ORDER.

73. No committee shall leave the house while presbytery is in

session, without permission.

74. When the report of any committee shall have been presented to presbytery, it shall be considered as received by the presbytery, without a formal vote to that effect, unless there be objection.

75. Such portions of the report of a committee as propose definite action by the presbytery shall be considered and treated by the presbytery as motions duly brought before the house, on their presentation in the report, without a formal motion of adoption from the floor, following the order of precedence which they have in the The formula of introduction for such propositions should be: "The Committee recommends and moves.

70. A brief set of rules for the guidance of the Moderator shall be printed and put into the Moderator's hands at each meeting of

presbytery.

STANDING ORDERS AND RULES.

77. Presbytery may make standing orders for the transaction of its business, as it may deem best. Such standing orders may be enacted, suspended or repealed at any time by a majority vote.

78. Standing rules may be altered or amended by a two-thirds

vote at any stated meeting.

70. Standing rules may be suspended at any time by a two-thirds vote of those present.

STANDING ORDERS.

MEETINGS.

1. The Stated Meetings of the presbytery shall begin not later than four o'clock on Monday afternoons of the appointed days.

2. The order of procedure at the Monday afternoon session of the Spring Stated Meeting shall be: (1.) Prayer, (2.) Election of Moderator, (3.) Election of Permanent Clerk. (4.) Election of Temporary Clerks, (5.) Communications, (6.) Call for sessional records, (7.) Report of Trustees, (8.) Report of Committee of Arrangements, (9.) The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, (10.) Recess for the meeting of committees.

3. The order of procedure at the Monday afternoon session of the Fall Stated Meeting shall be: (1) Prayer, (2) Communications, (3) Call for sessional records, (4) Report of the Treasurer, (5.) Report of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical MisMeeting, April 22, 1913

- Spring Stated sions, (6.) Report of the Committee of Arrangements, (7.) A Memorial Service, of not more than a half hour's duration, for members of presbytery deceased within the previous year, (8.) The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, (9.) Recess for the meeting of committees.
 - 4. The Memorial Service to be held annually is to supersede the presentation of biographical minutes during the business sessions.
 - 5. The Monday evening session of each stated meeting shall embrace: (1.) A brief period for the transaction of urgent and necessary business, (2.) A meeting, for which the Committee of Arrangements shall provide, at which a sermon shall be delivered, if convenient, as required by the Form of Government (Chap. X. Sec. XI).

6. The Tuesday morning session of each stated meeting shall begin at nine o'clock, and after a devotional service of ten minutes, shall be occupied solely with the docket as arranged, which docket

shall contain only matters of business.

7. The Tuesday afternoon session of each stated meeting shall begin not later than two o'clock, and the first hour thereof shall be occupied with a conference, as may be arranged; after which the business of presbytery shall be resumed and continued until adjournment.

COMMITTEES.

8. The permanent committees shall be constituted as follows:

(1.) Business Committee, three ministers and three elders:

(2.) Education and Examinations, five ministers and five

elders:

(3.) Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, eight ministers and eight elders;

(4.) Missionary Committee, five ministers and five elders;(5.) Social Service, four ministers and four elders;

- (6.) Sessional Records, five ministers and five elders.
- 9. A majority of the ministerial members of the permanent committees, with as many elders as may be present, shall constitute a quorum. STATED CLERK.
- 10. The Stated Clerk is directed to notify churches that presbytery expects those over which pastors are to be installed, to pay the expenses of persons participating in the service by appointment or invitation of presbytery.

TREASURER.

11. Traveling Expenses of Delegates to the Synod. (1.) The Treasurer of presbytery is directed to pay the actual transporta-tion expenses with one meal each way and charge for berth in sleeper, if travel by night be necessary, of all Delegates to Synod, who attend its sessions and answer the first roll-call.

(2.) The Treasurer is directed to pay all delegates who attend but do not answer to the first roll-call two-thirds of said charges.

(3.) The Treasurer is directed to furnish each delegate with a blank, itemized for attendance and traveling expenses, which must be filled out, signed and returned to him.

Communications.

12. The Stated Clerk is authorized to refer to the permanent

committees, prior to the meetings of presbytery, such communica-Spring Stated tions as are usually referred to them for consideration; and such Meeting, reference shall be reported to presbytery by him.

RULES FOR THE GUIDANCE OF THE MODERATOR.

GENERAL RULES OF ORDER.

1. The Moderator shall take the chair precisely at the hour fixed for the opening of the services of presbytery.

2. All sessions of presbytery shall be opened and closed with

praver.

3. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preserve order and to endeavor to conduct all business before presbytery to a speedy and proper result.

4. The Moderator shall decide all points of order, subject to appeal to presbytery by any two members, and may speak on them in

preference to other members.

5. The Moderator shall carefully keep notes of the several items of business, which may be assigned for particular hours, and call

them up at the time appointed.

6. A motion must be seconded and afterwards repeated by the Moderator, or read aloud, before it is debated; and every motion shall be reduced to writing, if the Moderator or any member require it.

- (6.) To amend.
- 8. Motions shall have precedence as follows:

- (4.) To postpone to a day certain;
- (5.) To commit; and (6.) To amend.
- 9. The following motions shall be put without debate:
 - (1.) To lay on the table unconditionally;
 - (2.) To lay on the table for the present;
 - (3.) To take up business:
 - (4.) To adjourn;
 - (5.) The call for the previous question; and
 - (6.) Appeals from the decision of the Moderator.
- 10. Of amendments there shall be in order only:
 - (1.) An amendment to the original motion; and
 - (2.) An amendment to that amendment.
- 11. The previous question shall be put in this form: "Shall the main question be now put?" It shall only be admitted when demanded by a majority of the members present, and the effect shall be to put an end to all debate and bring the presbytery to a direct vote on-

12. If the presbytery be equally divided, the Moderator shall possess the casting vote. (4.) Right hand of fellowship (Sec. XIV);

(5.) Charge to the minister (Sec. XIV). MEMORIAL SERVICE.

16. The order of service at the annual Memorial Service shall

(1.) Reading of the names of deceased ministers and elders. with brief biographical sketches;

(2.) An address or addresses;

(3.) Praver:

(4.) Singing of a hymn.



The Business Committee (p. 486) presented a report. which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

1. The following papers were referred to your committee (p. 501):

(1.) Letter from the Rev. John Lee Maddox. This letter has to do with the action of presbytery at the Spring Stated Meeting in connection with the application of Mr Maddox for a chaplaincy in the United States Army (p. 181). The action then taken did not meet the legal requirements of the War Department and is returned to the presbytery for correction. We recommend that presbytery take the following action:

Resolved. That the Presbytery of Westchester recommends the appointment of the Rev. John Lee Maddox a member of this presbytery, as chaplain in the United

States Army.

Resolved. That the stated clerks be instructed to forward a copy of this action to the Secretary of War, the Rev. Charles L. Thompson, President of the Home Mission Council, and to the stated clerk of the General Assembly.

(2.) Letter from the Rev. James II. Hoyt This is a letter in reply to the communication from Stated Clerk p. 478), asking for a statement of his relations to the Intermediate Meeting June 17, 1913 Congregational Church. There is no action necessary, as Mr. Hoyt states that he is not installed as pastor of the Congregational Church at New Canaan, Conn., nor is he a member of any Congregational body, and prefers to remain a member of the Presbytery of Westchester. We recommend and move that no action be taken.

(3.) Call of the Pleasantville Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. Thomas Morgan. The commissioners of the Church were heard and the minutes of the Congregational Meeting were presented. The call stipulates an annual salary of \$1,200 in reguiar monthly payments, with the free use of the manse and a vacation of one month.

We recommend and move that the call be found in

order and placed in the hands of Mr. Morgan.

We also recommend and move, if the way be clear, that the arrangements for his installation be as follows:

Time.—Friday, June 27, at 8 P. M., to preside and profound the constitutional questions—The Moderator. Sermon—Rev. Llewellyn S. Fulmer, of the Presbytery of Newark, to be invited. Charge to the pastor—Rev. John McDowell, of the Presbytery of Newark, to be invited. Charge to the people—Rev. Clarence Wells Dunham. Prayer of Installation—Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell. The Rev. Thomas Morgan and the commissioners of the church to presbytery are authorized to fill any vacancies that may occur.

2. In as much as there seems to be a widespread difference of opinion as to the proper form of a call to a pastor and in some cases an ignorance or misunderstanding of the requirements of the Form of Government in the matter,

We recommend and move that the Stated Clerk be authorized to prepare a circular giving the information necessary as the proper method of procedure, the form of the call, attestation of the moderator of the meeting and the arrangements of the installation service: and that such a circular be sent by the Stated Clerk to all the moderators and clerks of sessions of vacant churches in the presbytery.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, and is as follows:

The sub-committee, having evangelistic work in charge, in carrying out the plan of visitation adopted by presbytery (p. 476), have been able to visit but five churches. They have held informal conferences with the pastor and elders, presenting to them by actual statistics the conditions of that particular church and seeking to deepen the spiritual life of the members and to bring the unsaved to know their Saviour. We want to say that we have found the elders of our churches a band of men, whose hearts have been touched with the burden of their responsibility for the spiritual welfare of the church, and out of these informal conferences we believe there will come lasting good to our elders and through them to the churches.

This informal conference has in every case thus far been followed by a meeting with the whole church, at which the

conditions and facts have been frankly stated, and the need intermediate of some definite evangelistic activity impressed, while at the Meeting same time the committee has pointed out the various opportunities to be found within the church for the deepening of the spiritual life of its members, and the increasing of the number of professed followers of Christ in the church. It has been our aim to impress upon the churches the need of maintaining a continuous spirit and activity along evangelistic lines throughout the whole year and to enable them to see the agencies within the church to accomplish this end. We have found the members as truly interested as were the elders and thus far each meeting has been attended by a goodly number of church members.

Your committee has planned a schedule of visitation, which will take us until early in July and to thirteen churches of presbytery, where the same plan in general will be carried out. Thus far the visits have been made by the Rev. James Packard Gillespie and the chairman of your committee, but we are hoping to enlist some laymen to the profit of the churches. We ask you all to be ready to co-operate with the committee in this work, which is as yet only in the experimental stage, but which is already giving evidence of

permanent good.

The Committee on Social Service (p. 486) presented a report, which was received, and is as follows:

We would report that the Velte-Hammer Bill, which was before the State Legislature to make possible the legal opening of the saloons between certain hours on Sunday, against which we, as a presbytery, made protest (ρ , 477), failed in its passage. In acknowledgment of our word of protest against this bill the New York Civil League and Anti-Saloon League expressed their appreciation of our position, and stated that it was undoubtedly due to such protests as ours that this bill was defeated.

We would advise that the chairman of your committee has had several conferences with a representative of Mr. Stelzle, of the Home Board, regarding the suggested saloon survey of the presbytery. The matter has also been considered with various members of the presbytery, and it has

seemed best to defer action until the Fall.

The attention of the presbytery is called to the fact that Mr. Dwight E. Worrell, representing the General Assembly's Temperance Committee, has been in our vicinity, and doubtless has called upon some of the presbytery. It seems as though his suggestion is worthy of our consideration, that the Temperance Committee of the General Assembly is more worthy of our attention than we have heretofore seemed to have acknowledged. We would call to the attention of our churches the recommendation of the General Assembly that the Presbyterian Temperance Committee be placed on the schedule and included in the budget of every church for an annual offering with the hope that our churches will more generally respond to this recommendation than they have been doing in the past.

Intermediate The Committee on Education and Examinations re-Meeting June 17, 1913 ported that Charles Papp and Eugene Meray, members of the Hungarian Church of Yonkers, N. Y., have filed applications to be taken under the care of Presbytery as candidates for the ministry. The report was received.

The Rev. John H. House, a missionary of the American Board at Salonika, Macedonia, by invitation, addressed the Presbytery on "Missionary Work in the Balkan Peninsula." and, on motion, was given a vote of thanks for his address.

The minutes of today's session were read and approved.

The Business Committee presented a report which was received, after amendment adopted, and is as follows:

To your committee have been referred the following matters

(7. 506):

1. Request of the Rev. Douglas Putnam Birnie for the dissolution of the pastoral relation existing between him and the church at Rye. The parties were heard, and the church by resolution at a regularly called congregational meeting concurred in the request, though with great regret. We, therefore, recommend and move.

(1.) That the request be granted and the pastoral relation existing between Mr. Birnie and the church at Rye be hereby dissolved, said dissolution to take effect on October 31, 1913

(2.) That in severing the bastoral relation between Mr. Birnic and the church at Rve, Presbytery would place on record its appreciation of the faithful services that have been rendered to both church and Presbytery for almost fifteen years. The basal work of the church has been strengthened. Amounts contributed for

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 7, 1913 benevolences and parish expenses have increased till at the present time they are more than double what they were at the beginning of the pastorate. The material equipment of the church has been enlarged so that to-day the church at Rye possesses a situation and building that are unsurpassed in Presbytery for beauty and the opportunity for the deep spirit of reverent worship. Additions have generously been made to the endowment fund.

In spiritual things Mr. Birnie has been an earnest pastor in

In spiritual things Mr. Birnie has been an earnest pastor in personal work and preaching, witnessing the welcoming into the membership of the church those who wished to be known before

the world as the disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Mr. Birnie has been a faithful presbyter, regular in attendance at the meetings of Presbytery, interested in its actions and doing his part in assigned duties. He has been prominently identified for many years with the work of Presbyterial and Synodical Missions as member of the committee with these in charge and in recent years as chairman.

Presbytery records its regret at the resignation and the removal of Mr. Birnie from the bounds and the roll of Presbytery, and wishes for him God's best blessings in his new field of

activity.

- 2. The request of the Rev. Ira W. Barnett for the dissolution of the pastoral relation existing between him and the church at Port Chester. Both parties were heard. The church at a regularly called congregational meeting did not concur in the request, voting against so doing by a vote of 44 to 17. However the committee after due consideration and especially after hearing Mr. Barnett's earnestly expressed wish to be relieved of the pastorate, recommends and moves
- (1.) That the request be granted and the pastoral relation now existing between Mr. Barnett and the Port Chester Church be hereby dissolved, said dissolution to take effect immediately.

(2.) That the Stated Clerk be authorized to grant Mr. Barnett

a letter of dismission to the Presbytery of Logansport.

- 3. The request of the Rev. Alfred Rav Atwood for the dissolution of the pastoral relation between him and the Patterson Church. This request was in writing, as Mr. Atwood had already begun work as Educational Superintendent of the Synod of Michigan. The commissioner of the church was heard and the minutes of the congregational meeting were presented, showing that the church concurred in the request. Therefore the committee recommends and moves
- (1.) That the request be granted and the pastoral relation now existing between Mr. Atwood and the Patterson Church be hereby dissolved, said dissolution to take effect immediately.

(2) That the Stated Clerk be authorized to grant a letter

of dismission to Mr. Atwood to the Presbytery of Lansing.

4. A communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly requesting that Presbytery add to its apportionment the sum of one-half cent per member for the use of the General Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply. We recommend and move that no action be taken.

5. A communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, in accordance with instructions of the last Assembly, asking that presbyteries express their approval or disapproval of

the union with the Reformed Church in the United States, com-patt stated monly called the German Reformed Church, as set forth in the plan Meeting, of union given in the report of the Committee on Co-operation and Oct. 7, 1913 Union to the Assembly of 1011. This approval or disapproval is simply tentative in order that there may be an expression of opinion on part of the presbyteries in regard to the matter for the guidance of the Committee on Co-operation and Union. The replies are required before January 1, 1014. Inasmuch, however, as the plan of union is not thoroughly known, we do not feel that Presbytery is ready to vote on this question at this time. We, therefore, recommend and move that the matter remain in the hands of the committee, report to be made at the January Intermediate Meeting.

6. A communication from the Clerk of the General Assembly, calling attention to the addition adopted to Section 50 of the Book of Discipline, that presbyteries including towns or cities containing two or more Presbyterian churches shall appoint in each of those towns a committee on members changing residence, the chairman of which shall be a minister, who shall be indicated as such by a distinctive sign in the Assembly Minntes. This is an important matter and should be complied with at once. Therefore we recommend and move that such committees be appointed as follows:

8. A request of the Church Extension Committee of the Yonkers Churches, concerning the apportionment of the Hungarian Church of that city. This church is struggling hard to obtain a building. Its pastor's salary is paid by the Board of Home Missions. We find that the amount asked of them is out of proportion to their ability. We, therefore, recommend and move that the apportionment of the Hungarian Church of Yonkers be cut in two, one half of which is to be paid by the church and the other half apportioned among the other churches of Presbytery by the Treasurer in accordance with Standing Rule No. 72.

9. The accounts of the Treasurer (p. 508). These accounts have been examined with their vouchers, and we recommend and

Pending its consideration the order of the day, the consideration of the Every Member Campaign for Benevolence, was taken up, and an address thereon was delivered by Mr. David McConaughy of the Board of Foreign Missions.

The Rev. Douglas Putnam Birnie was granted, at his request, a letter of dismission to the Presbytery of

Washington City.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Regarding the work of our presbytery among foreign-speaking people, which is directed by a sub-committee, we call attention to the fact that during the past year work has been carried on among such people within our bounds as follows: Among the Italians at Mt. Kisco by Mr. Rino Venturini; among the Hungarians at Yonkers by the Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, for Italians at New Rochelle by Mr. Blazi; at Port Chester by Mr. Cigliano; and at Mt. Vernon by Mr. Moxedano and a visitor, Miss Warren, who has just re-signed her work. With the possible exception of Port Chester there is a close oversight and an efficient and active co-operation in the work of these mission fields upon the part of the local session and churches, and your committee is satisfied that Presbytery is receiving adequate returns from its interest and investment. At Port Chester we have found discouraging and yet not insuperable difficulties, which are retarding the work in the want of any wholesome interest or any active co-operation on part of the members of our church there and in the not altogether wholesome business basis of the enterprise in the fact that the title to the property, in which it is carried on, is held by the missionary himself, making him our landlord as well as our missionary. In justice to him it must be said that he is not altogether responsible for the conditions, since a commission appointed by Presbytery encouraged and inspired his action in the purchase of the property. Nevertheless they are not conducive to the highest confidence in the arrangements.

Your committee have the testimony of many men in Port Chester that there is a call for just such a work there, and that it is only a question of a few years, when the neighborhood of our mission work will be the home of at least 5,000 Italians. Hence your committee feel that the work should not be abandoned, and it is the purpose to place the work upon a basis that will inspire confidence and encourage him, who may be the leader. end our first effort is being directed to some plan whereby, with satisfaction and justice to all, we may obtain title to the property and rest it in the proper officers of Presbyterv. We have the assurance of the owner of the building of a willing co-operation and a generous concession. Our second effort will be to revive a real interest in this work upon the part of the Port Chester Church

and to encourage active co-operation upon the part of our conse-patt stated crated men and women. This we believe can be done. Our third Meeting, purpose is to eventually secure another missionary in place of Mr Oct. 7, 1913 Cigliano, which we believe under other conditions would be both acceptable to him and advantageous to the work. This we hope to recommend to the Home Board at a later date. Your committee recommends and moves

1. That the Board of Home Missiens be requested to make a grant of \$75 a month to Mr. Cigliano for work at Port Chester, such arrangements being understood to be monthly and not to extend beyond March 31, 1914, and to be terminated at such time before then, as a new and better arrangement can be made by the committee.

2. That the Presbytery authorize the payment of \$20 a month for the rent of the chapel at Port Chester until such time as the committee is able to complete the plans of securing title to the

property.

The attention of Presbytery is called to the coming observance throughout our entire Church of Home Mission week, November 16-23, and to the request of the Home Board that the problem of immigration be subject of one sermon. We call your attention again to the growing immigrant population in our field and the unparalleled opportunities to have a large and vital part in moulding the character of these Americans. One thing above all others, to which we as a Presbytery should bend our efforts, is the increasing of our gifts to the Home Board. For the year ending March 31, 1913, our contributions to that Board footed up \$4,431, while for the same period the Home Board put back into the work of our Presbytery \$4,257, leaving the balance of \$174 as our contribution to national Home Missions. We further recommend and move

- 3. That the observance of Home Mission week, November 16-23 inclusive, be commended to our churches.
- 4. That as far as possible every pastor present, at some time during the week, the needs and the opportunities of immigrant work.
- 5. That an effort be made to increase our gifts to the Board of Home Missions.

Attention is called to the vacancy in this committee caused by the resignation of the Rev Douglas Putnam Birnie and to say that Elder George W. Banks has been made chairman of the sub-committee to succeed Mr. Birnie. We recommend and move

6. That the Rev. George Reynolds be appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of Mr. Birnie from the Presbytery.

Your committee has received for Church Extension \$6(200), twenty-seven churches having contributed their apportionments either in full or in part. We report that the last payment to the Pleasantville Church has been made, and that in fulfilment of the rules, under which loans are made to the churches, arrangements are being made to secure a moragage covering the amount of the loan. The sub-committee on Evangelistic Work has endeavored faithfully to prosecute the work of visitation according to the plan adopted by the Presbytery (p. 476). Thus far we have visited eighteen churches, where we met the pastors and officers and at which we addressed the congregation. We desire to bear testimony to the cordial reception accorded us by the pastors and officers, and to the sympathetic hearing of the members, as well as to the universal expression upon the part of all of a desire to make our churches a spiritual force. Our visitation has given us encouragement to believe that the coming year will show results that can come only from a universal evangelistic consciousness. We have pointed out the great opportunity afforded by the gathering of the young in our Sunday Schools, and we have urged pastors and Sunday-school teachers and officers to make the winning of the souls of the scholars for Jesus Christ the supreme aim and purpose of the coming year. We have emphasized the need of a wider and deeper family religion, and have tried to impress parents with the responsibility in leading their children to accept Christ. In two of our churches, where our visit was on Sunday, we were given the opportunity to speak a Gospel message to the scholars in the Sunday-school, and it gives us joy, as it gave to the pastor and teachers of that school, to say that as many as eight of the young people took a stand for Christ. We are convinced that our Presbytery in the coming fall and winter is ripe for a great gathering of souls for Christ. We testify to the presence in the churches of a large band of willing disciples, who are ready for active personal work for their Saviour.

The plan adopted provides for a day of presbyterial pulpit exchange on Sunday, November 9, at which time every pastor of Presbytery is to spend the date at a church other than his own, to which he will be assigned by the committee. Our purpose in this exchange of pulpits is to make more real our sense of presbyterial unity, and to bring every church into a personal contact with the pastor of another church to give and to receive the inspiration and encouragement of such a visit. We urge that the day be made one of distinct Gospel emphasis, and that each

preacher make the occasion one of opportunity, either during or patt Stated following the sermon to appeal for an immediate acceptance of Meeting, Jesus Christ as the sinner's personal Saviour. The committee Oct. 7, 1913 is not unmindful of the fact that the expenses of transportation, incident to the pulpit exchange, must fall unequally, and may fall untimely upon some of the pastors, and it is with a view to relieve the pastor of this financial responsibility and to give the church an opportunity to show its approval of the plan and to have a part in its success by bearing a small share of the expense that each church is asked to contribute for this purpose an amount not to exceed three dollars. The action of Presbytery fixing 2 p.m. for beginning of the afternoon recess was reconsidered, and Presbytery took a recess until 1.30 p.m. Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 1.30 p.m.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer. Elders Nathan P. Bushnell and Floyd O. White were appointed tellers of votes for Delegates to Synod.

Presbytery resumed consideration on circular to sessions of vacant churches (p. 515). The circular with the third alternative presented was approved, and the recommendations presented with it were adopted. They are as follows:

1. It is recommended and moved that the circular be printed, not in the minutes, but separately.

2. It is also recommended and moved that the following standing order, to be shown as No. 13, be adopted:

The Stated Clerk is directed to send to Moderators and sessions of vacant churches a circular giving necessary information for the calling of a pastor, the procedure of the congregational meeting held for that purpose, the form, subscription and attestation of the call, and the service of installation.

The Committee on Education and Examination pre-

sented a report, which was accepted and adopted.

Your committee respectfully reports: The Boards represented by your committee. Education, Publication and Sabbath-School Work and College, acknowledge contributions from churches as fellows: Education \$571, Publication and Sabbath-School Work \$1,790, and College \$577 In a number of instances the figures given in the reports of the Beards are larger than those reported by our churches in the Minutes of the General Assembly, contributions from Sabbath-schools or young people's societies not being included in the latter. In view of this fact your committee recommends and moves the adoption of the following:

Presbytery calls attention of the sessions of churches to the instructions on the annual statistical blanks regarding contribu-tions to the Boards, and urges that care be taken to secure from Sabbath-schools, young people's societies and other organizations within the congregation exact statements of all contributions made by them to the Boards and other missionary or benevolent causes, that these may be included in the reports of the church to the

Presbytery.

Your committee recommends and moves, second, the adoption Fall Stated

of the following:

In view of the pressing need of the church for trained workers bet. 7, 1913 in the several lines of activity, the Presbytery recommends that proper steps be taken in all our churches to present to the young people of the congregations the daty and privilege of giving their lives to definite Christian service, such presentation to be made in connection with the observance of "Education Week" from the first to the second Sundays of February inclusive, as approved by the General Assembly, or at such other time as may be best suited to each congregation.

Your committee recommends and moves, third,

That Mr. George R. Brunges, a candidate for the ministry under our care be recommended to the Board of Education for the full amount of aid at this stage of preparation, Mr. Brunges being now a member of the Freshman Class of Amherst College.

Your committee further reports that it has examined Mr. William Y. Duncan, who appeared before Presbytery at the Spring Stated Meeting but was not received as a candidate because his church relations at that time did not conform to our rules and who was received yesterday (p. 511), in the subjects required by the Form of Government, and recommends and moves.

t. That Mr. Duncan be now brought before the Presbytery for

his public parts of trial; and

2. That, if acceptable to Presbytery, he be licensed to preach the Gospel.

With sincere and deep regret Presbytery accedes to the request of the Rey, Charles S. Lane for his transfer to the new Presbytery of Connecticut Valley. We cannot let this going from us

Fall Stated pass without record of the long and valuable service he had performed for and in this Presbytery. For these times his was an Oct. 7, 1913 unusual pastorate of twenty-three years at Mt. Vernon, full of work and fruit. He was as a presbyter most faithful and diligent. It was a remarkable incident that a meeting of Presbytery ever took place, when he was not there. His invaluable place, which can hardly be filled, was so many years at the head of the Committee on Examinations. He stood there for the conservative old faith, once for all delivered to the saints, and his faithfulness as an examiner was an assurance to members of Presbytery that in this age of doubt no fundamental point was overlooked. It was only the cutting off of a large number of our churches to form the new Presbytery of Connecticut Valley and the following reorganization of the committees on a new plan that removed him from that place of service, where he was trusted and was a bulwark.

The Committee on the Bedford Church (p. 411), presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

The year just ending has been one of continued unanimity and fair success. The problem of the country church in Bedford is becoming more and more difficult as the years pass. The population is on the decrease, and when old members drop off the roll because of death, and others remove the bounds, there is no new material to take their places. Under these circumstances a church does well that holds healthily its own as the Bedford Church has done for the last two years.

The committee appointed by Presbytery has had the oversight of the work to the satisfaction of the congregation. Peace and harmony has prevailed. No cause of friction has arisen, and the Fall Statest task assigned has been pleasant.

Meeting.

A morning and an evening service has been held every Sab-Oct. 7, 1913 bath and a prayer meeting every Thursday. The Sunday-school, the Christian Endeavor Society and the Woman's Missionary Society have each contributed its share to the success of the work.

The uninistrations have been conducted by the Rev. James W. Rae as stated supply, who has tendered his resignation to take effect November 1, 1913. Mr. Rae returns to Toronto, Canada. Your committee desire to report that the wishes of the Bedford Church were fully met by the commission, who had charge of the field during the vacancy before the present arrangements came into effect and would respectfully suggest that similar appointment be again made to take charge at the first of November next.

The Rey, E. Munro Dill was appointed a member of the Committee on Education and Examinations to fill the vacancy caused by the removal of the Rey, Charles S. Lane to another Presbytery.



2. Communications from the Presbyteries of Syracuse, Buffalo and Erie. It is recommended and moved—that the Moderator appoint a special committee to consider the overtures regarding the continuance of the Church and Country Life and Labor and Social Service work of the Home Board and, if it seems to be wise, to prepare an overture to the General Assembly from this presby-

tery on the subject.

3. A call of the Patterson Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts. The call was placed in our hands too late for a hearing of the commissioners, yesterday. We have, however, examined the call, which stipulates a salary of \$1,000 a year with the free use of the manse and a vacation of four weeks, and the minutes of the congregation, and find that the papers are in proper form, and recommend and move that the

commissioners be heard.

4 The union with the (German) Reformed Church. This matter came before us at the Fall Stated Meeting but action thereon was postponed until the meeting (p. 515). It comes to us as a request from the last General Assembly for an answer to the question: Do you favor union with the Reformed Church in the United States, as set forth in the plan of union proposed tentatively by the General Assembly (Min., G., L., 1011, pp. 236-241)? We recommend and move that the question be answered in the negative, and that in explanation of such answer presbytery adopt the following minute to be forward to the Stated Člerk of the General Assembly

The Presbytery of Westchester, in answering the above ques-

tion in the negative, wishes to express its sincere desire for union with the Reformed Church in the United States, whenever such union can be consummated without serious ichism in either church, but it does not feel that the union can be consummated at the present time.

Furthermore, there are two serious objections to the plan of

union as now proposed, viz:

(1.) The use of the word "either" in the matter of the subscription of ministers and church officers to the double standards of the church giving such the choice of accepting either the Heidelberg Catechism or the Westminster Confession, or both. If it be true, as stated in the plan, that the two standards are but different expression of the same system of doctrine, there should be no occasion for such a choice, but

he who so believes should cheerfully accept both.

(2.) In the matter of organization, there seems to be the perpetuation of the organization of the Reformed Church within the united church, a church within a church. Not only are the boundaries of the classes and synods to remain as they are now, except by petition to the General Assembly, and the nomenclature of the Reformed Church, different from ours, to be perpetuated, thus giving rise to confusion and misunderstanding, but for a period of five years all appeals from consistories, classes and synods, are to be adjudicated by the proper bodies of the same church, and only to come before the united church on appeal to the General Assembly on matters of doctrine. We do not believe this evidences the proper amount of faith and trust in the brethren in our church to make the union a happy one and will lead to much confusion and differences of policy and action.

5. The apportion of the Hitchcock Memorial Church. committee, without any instructions from presbytery, has also considered the matter of the proper apportionment of the Hitchock Memorial Church for presbyterial expenses, the church having been organized since the apportionments were made. We recommend and move that the apportionment of the said Hitchock Memorial

Church be fixed at \$5 a year.

6. The request of the Rev. E. Munro Dill for leave to resign the pastoral charge of the South Yonkers Church, the resignation being now before the church but not yet acted on. We recommend and move that when presbytery adjourns, it adjourn to meet at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York, Tuesday, February 3, at 10.30 A. M., and that the congregation of the South Yonkers Church be cited to appear at that time to show cause, if any, why Mr. Dill's request should not be granted.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. Messrs. Lewis Gaston Leary, G. Phillips Payson and Anthony N. Peterson and Elders Edwin A. Slosson, William O. Remsen and Horace J. Parker, the special committee, called for by the above report (See 2), to consider overtures on Church and Country Life and Labor and Social Service work of the Home Board.

The commissioners of the Patterson Church with ref- Intermediate Meeting erence to the call of the Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts Jan. 20, 1914 were heard and the call was found in order.

The Committee on Education and Examination presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that Eugene Meray, second year in Bloomfield Seminary, and Charles Papp, first year in the same institution, candidates under the care of this presbytery (p. 526), be recommended to the Board of Education for aid to the amount of \$90 each a year.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

The sub-committee on evangelistic work reports that the schedule of visitation of the churches, adopted by presbytery at the Spring Stated Meeting (p. 476) has been completed, and, with four exceptions, conferences were held with the officers and members of the churches. The day of presbyterial exchange of pulpits was observed. With the exception of the weather this plan had the hearty co-operation of every element that could possibly contribute to its success. Only one pastor was unable to keep his appointment, but the committee was able to fill the vacancy without trouble. This committee proposes to submit at an early date to every pastor and elder of presbytery plans for evangelistic work. To defray the expenses of the exchange every session contributed, the sum total being \$98.25. From this fund the travelling expenses of every pastor as well as other expenses incidental to the day were paid, leaving a balance of \$17.02, which will be used for the prosecution of the work.

Our sub-committee on work among foreign-speaking people report that the Rey. Andrew Szilagyi, the pastor of the Hungarian Church, Yonkers, N. Y., whose salary is paid by the Home Board on the recommendation of presbytery, has been advised by physicians to give up his work for a period of four mouths and to return to his native land for rest and health. He accordingly sailed for Hungary on January 8, with the hope that at the end of that period he may be able to return to his work in Yonkers. In view of the unusually faithful and efficient services of Mr. Szilagyi and that during his connection with the Home Board, a period of nearly five years, he has not had a vacation. Your committee recommends and moyes:

t. That the Board of Home Missions be requested to grant Mr. Szilagyi a leave of absence for four months with full pay from January 8.

2. That the trustees of presbytery be requested to pay from the income of the Adams Fund \$2.50 a week to the Rev. G. Dokus, a Hungarian minister connected with the Labor Temple, during Intermediate Meeting Jan. 20, 1914

such time as he may supply the pulpit of the Hungarian Church in Vonkers

Your committee is giving its thought to a solution of the property question of the Port Chester Italian Mission and hopes to be

able to report definitely at the Spring Stated Meeting.

The sub-committee on Synodical Missions is desirous that presbytery should hear at the Spring Stated Meeting a representative of the Synod. It therefore recommends and moves that twenty minutes of the Tuesday morning session of that meeting be given to the Rev. U. L. Mackay, Synodical Superintendent.

Presbytery may no doubt be interested to know that the subcommittee on church erection and church extension is making an effort to establish a Presbyterian work at Larchmont Manor, where the opportunity and need for such a work is great.

The special committee on the Every Member Campaign (b. 525) presented a report, which was received.

The Rev. E. Floyd Rippey was received by letter of dismission from the Presbytery of Utica and his name enrolled

The Commission on the Bedford Church reported that the services of the church were being maintained and the pulpit supplied by Elder Ward W. Adair, a local evangelist of this presbytery. The report was received.

The action of the Moderator in appointing a commission of six members instead of four on the Bedford Church (b. 523) was approved.

The Rev. Thomas J. Stevenson, Associate Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League (b. 539) was then heard.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report. which was received

The foregoing minutes were read and approved.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet at 156 Fifth Avenue. New York, Tuesday, February 3, 1914, at 10.30 a.m.

Whereas, During Mr. Lawson's pastorate, thus far, an unusually successful work has been done, as witnessed by the increase of the membership of more than five hundred per cent., the erection of a well-equipped church building at a cost of \$17,000 and of a comfortable manse at a cost of \$3,700; and

Whereas Mr. Lawson has ever given due attention to the discharge of all the obligations imposed upon him by presbytery;

therefore be it

Resolved, That as a presbytery we give expression to our appreciation of the zeal and fidelity of Mr. Lawson, of the good work he has done at Bryn Mawr Park, and of his work as a presbyter; and be it further

Resolved, That in granting him release from the pastorate we do so with regret, at the same time extending to him our heartiest commendation, and praying that the great Head of the church may speedily set before him an open door to the end that his services may ever be enlisted in the furtherance of the one interest, the conquest of the world for Christ,
(3.) We recommend and move also the adoption of the fol-

lowing resolutions:

Resolved, That presbytery congratulates the Bryn Mawr Park Church in Yonkers on the results accomplished during the pastorate now to be dissolved; that we express our sympathy for the church in its now serious future; that we bespeak for it the sympathy of the presbytery and of the community in which it is located, and the hope that it may soon be blessed with the leadership of a pastor who shall carry on the work in the interest of the church and to the glory of the Master.

(4.) We also recommend and move that copies of these resolutions be sent by the Stated Clerk, the one to Mr. Lawson and the

other to the church.

9. The call of the Harrison Church for the pastoral services of Mr. Lester H. Bent, a licentiate of this presbytery. The call is in proper form, the proceedings of the congregation were regular, the salary is \$700 (to be supplemented, it is expected, by a grant of \$300 from the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions) with the free use of the manse and one month's vacation. The commissioners of the church were heard. We recommend and move that the call be found in order and placed in Mr. Bent's hands.

The call was then placed in Mr. Bent's hands and was accepted by him.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee has organized by the election of the Rev. Thomas C. Straus as Chairman and the Rev. Arthur C. McMillan as Secretary. It has examined Messrs. Lester H. Bent and Rino Spring Stated Venturini, licentiates of this presbytery, for ordination, and rec-April 21, 1914 ommends and moves

1. That the examinations of Messrs. Bent and Venturini be

sustained.

2. That the request of Mr. Venturini for ordination as an evangelist be granted, and that the following order be adopted

therefore:

That when presbytery adjourns, it adjourn to meet in the Mt. Kisco Church on Thursday, April 23, 1914, at 7, 45 P. M. To preside and propound the constitutional questions—The Moderator. Sermon—Rev. William H. Marquis of the Presbytery of Missouri, to be invited. Charge to the evangelist—Rev. Clarence Wells Dunham. Prayer of ordination—Rev. Thomas Morgan.

3. That the request of Mr. Bent be granted and that the arrangements for the ordination service be referred to the Business

Committee.

4. That a sum not to exceed \$50 be appropriated from the Education Fund as a loan to Mr. George R. Brunges, a candidate under the care of this presbytery, now a member of the Freshman Class in Amherst College.

The order of the day (p. 551) was taken up and Elder John A. Offord was heard in the interest of the Dubuque Seminary.

The Business Committee presented a second report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

We recommend and move

1. That a meeting of presbytery be appointed for Friday, May

22, 1914, at 7.30 P. M. in the Harrison Church.

2. That at that meeting presbytery proceed, if the way be clear to the ordination and installation of Mr. Lester H. Bent as pastor

of the Harrison Church according to the program:

To preside and propound the constitutional questions—The Moderator, Sermon—Rev. Henry Sloane Coffin of the Presbytery of New York to be invited. Ordination and installation prayer—Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth. Charge to the pastor—Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt. Charge to the people—Rev. Joseph H. Hollister.

The Committee on the Every Member Campaign (†. 544) presented a report and is as follows:

We have been deeply gratified with the response which presbytery has made. Of our 34 organized churches 17 have either made the canvass or have definitely decided to do so in the near future. Eight have the matter under consideration and may be expected, most of them, to make the canvass toward the end of the fiscal year now opening. Only 2 positively refused, and in case of these we do not despair. Eight churches failed to make any response, but the silence of 6 of these is readily explained, they being for the most part without pastors.

We believe the canvass has thoroughly approved itself in those

churches in which it has been adopted.

Spring Stated The Committee on the Minutes of the Synod pre-Meeting, April 21, 1914 sented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Synod took action looking toward the shortening of the time occupied in reports by ordering the printing of a "blue book," which is to contain these reports.

The report of the Committee on Synodical Missions showed an ever-increasing work and new opportunities, which they are accepting, in service for the lumber jacks and among foreignspeaking peoples.

Work among the students at Cornell University has begun with a resident pastor in charge, and appeals are made to the churches for the support of the work.

An overture to the General Assembly was adopted, requesting the continuance of the department of Church and Country Life by the Board of Home Missions.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Twenty-five churches have reported on Temperance. Sermons or addresses have been given in 19, Temperance Day has been observed in 13, 2 have used Temperance literature, The Amethyst, the official organ of our Board of Temperance, has been distributed in 11, and 16 have placed the Board on the schedule for an annual offering. It would seem that our churches are not linked very closely to the Board, nor are we presenting a very aggressive front in the great battle that is now on against the forces that work for intemperance.

On Men's Work 19 report. Seventeen show Men's organizations in 8 churches, Young Men's in 4, Boys' in 4, and Boy Scouts in 6, with a membership of 1,111. 'Not one of our churches seem to be in any way associated with the General Assembly's Committee on Men's Work, nor does any of them desire to relate itself to it. We call this condition to your attention with the recommendation that our churches give the claims of the General Assembly's committee greater consideration.

Your committee recommends and moves

r. That presbytery endorse the Optional Local Prohibition Bill as introduced in the last Assembly of the State of New York by Assemblyman Gillett of Yates County.

2. That presbytery endorse the bill for National Constitutional

Prohibition.

3. That presbytery express its confidence in the work of the New York Anti-Saloon League under its present efficient leadership.

The order of the day was taken up and the Rev. Ferdinand C. Iglehart was heard on the work of the Anti-Saloon League, and a vote of thanks was extended to him for his address.

On motion the Moderator appointed the Rev. Messrs.

William P. Stevenson and Thomas C. Straus and Elder Spring Stated Allan Bourn a committee to nominate Trustees.

April 21, 1914

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report which was received, after amendment adopted and is as follows:

Your Committee organized by the election of the Rev. Paul Stratton, Chairman; Elder William J. Yates, Secretary; and Rev. Clarence Wells Dunham, Treasurer; and the appointing sub-committees in charge of supplementing salaries-Rey, Messrs, Clareuce Wells Dunham and George Reynolds and Elders William I. Yates and Georges W. Banks (Chairman), work among foreign-Nates and Georges W. Babks (Chairman), work among foreign-speaking people—Rev. Messrs, James Packard Gillespie (Chairman), and Joseph H. Hollister and Elders William E. Peck and Henry M. Lester, church erection and church extension—Rev. Messrs. Frank S. Hunnewell (Chairman), William P. Stevenson and George Reynolds and Elders Ward W. Adair and Walter L. Johnson, and evangelistic work-Rev. Messrs. Daniel Russell, James Packard Gillespie and Paul Stratton and Elders William Smellie and Jay R. Decatur. Regular meetings are to be held on the last Monday of January, March, May, September and November at 4 P. M. in the rooms of the Railroad Young Men's Christian Association at Park Avenue and 50th Street, New York.

The sub-committee in charge of church erection and church extension have already taken steps to begin work at Larchmont, a growing suburb east of New Rochelle. A survey and canvass have been made, unofficial and informal conferences have been held, and a preliminary work for ten weeks or three months is to

be undertaken at once by the Rev. Charles L. Carhart.

During the past year the membership of the Hitchcock Memorial Church has increased from 10 to 20, and the church has already begun to support presbyterial benevolent agencies. It is expected that ground will soon be broken for the new church provided for in the will of the late Welcome G. Hitchcock, and ere another year passes it is hoped this church will be worshipping in its own edifice.

Up to date about 20 churches have made contributions to the work of church erection and church extension to the amount of

\$675, a substantial increase over a year ago.

Work among foreign-speaking people is being carried on at six points. The Rev. Andrew Szilagyi of the Hungarian Church of Youkers, who went back to his native land for rest and health (f. 543), has returned to his field in improved health. The church extension committee of the Presbyterian Churches of Yonkers are interesting themselves in behalf of th Hungarians in providing a suitable house of worship. At New Rochelle the work among Italians is being carefully and efficiently cared for by Mr. D. Blasi, under the close supervision and co-operation of the pastor and members of New Rochelle Church. Ground for a mission house for this work, to cost more than \$8,000, has already been broken. Work at Mt. Vernon has been discontinued. At White Plains work for the Italians has been reorganized under the supervision of the session of the Presbyterian Church. Miss Mary Kellogg

Spring Stated has been engaged to direct and to carry on work among the chil-Meeting, April 21, 1914 dren, and frequent Sunday morning services will be conducted by Mr. Pietro Guiffrida, who has been secured to conduct work at Mt. Kisco and Pleasantville. Mr. Rino Venturini, who has done such acceptable work for Italians at Mt. Kisco, has completed his studies and has been called to a large and important Italian Church The services of Mr. Pietro Guiffrida, a student in in New York. the Bible School in New York, have been secured for the work at that place, and he is to give attention to that at Pleasantville, which has developed with promise of large success, the Italians there having provided for themselves a house of worship.

Your committee has been faithfully endeavoring to adjust the Italian work at Port Chester, and we believe that we are now able to do so. There is a large opportunity for work at this place. In the vicinity of the chapel there are thousands of Italians. The Port Chester Church is coming to a point of united and sympathetic activity. We have also received an offer from Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano to sell the mission property to presbytery for \$5,000, with the understanding that he will be continued as missionary at the same salary he now receives (\$75 a month) and be given the free use of the dwelling for himself and family for at least four vears. In the judgment of real estate men the property is worth the price asked, and to your Committee the offer seems eminently fair. The property is situated on Slater Street, having a street frontage of 50 feet and a depth of 100 feet, with a dwelling of seven rooms with modern improvements and a little chapel, 20 by 25 feet equipped with chairs and benches for services, all of which is included in the purchase price. At present there is a mortgage upon the property of \$3,800, held by a man of Port Chester, who, it is believed, will be glad to continue to hold it. The balance of \$1,200 can be borrowed from a friend of presbytery at 3 per cent. interest until such time as we are able to pay it back. It is the unanimous opinion of your committee that this property should be purchased by presbytery and the title vested in its Trustees. There is undoubtedly among the Italian constituents of this mission as many as 40 men and women who are ready for church membership and who should be taken into the communion of the Port Chester Presbyterian Church as soon as the session can satisfy themselves of their fitness, and it is the sense of your committee that the time is not far distant when a Presbyterian Church should be regularly organized for the Italians at Port Chester.

In view of the fact that a large majority of the members of presbytery in answer to cards sent out by the sub-committee in charge of evangelistic work have expressed their approval of and desire for local group church conferences, continuation of visita-tions by the committee, permanent annual day of exchange and Christian home league and family altar it is planned to carry into effect the desires thus expressed, and to concentrate its effort in 3 or 4 days of conference with a limited number of churches. Pastors desiring such conferences will please confer with the subcommittee promptly.

We therefore recommend and move

1. That presbytery approve the appropriation by this committee of \$250 for preliminary work at Larchmont.

2. That the sub-committee in charge of church erection and Spring Stated church extension be authorized to purchase the property of Mr. April 21, 1914 Cigliano on Slater Street, Port Chester, for work among the Italians under the directions of presbytery, at a cost of \$5,000 subject to a mortgage of \$1,800.

3. That the said sub-committee be authorized to borrow \$1,200

at 3 per cent, interest to effect the purchase

4. That the title of the property be vested in the Trustees of presbytery, the same or the proceeds of sale, if sold, to be held in trust for and subject to the orders and control of presbytery.

5. That in the event of acquiring the title to the property, Mr. Cigliano be given the free use of the dwelling house upon the property during such time as he may remain the missionary or pastor of the Italian work there.

6. That the Board of Home Missions be asked to make a grant

of \$75 a month for the salary of Mr. Cigliano for a period of

one year from April 1, 1914

7. That presbytery agrees to retain the services of Mr. Cigliano for a period of at least four years at his present salary, providing his services and ecclesiastical standing continue to be acceptable to presbytery; and that in event of the severance of these relations presbytery agrees to remunerate Mr. Cigliano for the balance of \$1,000 due him, such balance to be estimated on the basis of \$20 a month for the remaining months of the four years beginning April 30, 1914.

8. That the Board of Home Missions be asked to make grants for the salaries of mission workers within the bounds of presbytery

as follows:

(1.) \$75 a month for one year from April 1, 1914, to the Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, stated supply of the Hungarian Church of Yon-

(2.) \$550 for the year from April 1, 1914, towards the salary

of Mr. D. Blasi of New Rochelle;

(3.) \$450 for the year from April 1, 1914, towards the salary of Miss Mary Kellogg of White Plains;

(4.) \$280 for the year from April 1, 1014, towards the salary of Mr. Pietro Guiffrida of Mt. Kisco and Pleasantville; (5.) \$66.65 for one month's salary of Mr. Moxedano of Mt. Vernon.

The Rev. Thomas C. Mackav and Elder Robert M. Reevs were appointed tellers of votes for Commissioners to the General Assembly.

A recess was taken until 2 p.m.

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 2 P.M.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer.

Spring Stated Meeting,

The Trustees reported, presenting their minutes for April 21, 1914 approval, and recommending and moving that the resignation of Elder John H. Harmer be accepted. The minutes were referred to the Business Committee for review and the recommendation was adopted.

> The committee to which was referred overtures on Church and Country Life and Labor and Social Service of the Home Board (p. 542) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your Committee recommend and move that the following over-

tures be sent to the General Assembly:

I. Inasmuch as we believe that the work of the Board of Home Missions, through its Social Service Department, has done more than any other single agency during the last few years to set the Church of Christ before our country as realizing and grappling with the greatest problems that now face the Church and State.

The Presbytery of Westchester hereby overtures the One Hundred and Twenty-sixth General Assembly to instruct the Board of Home Missions to continue the work of the Social Service Department, and, as circumstances may warrant, to increase its scope.

2. Inasmuch as the Board of Home Missions has shown itself awake to the problem of the rural church, and through its Department of Country Life, has contributed effectively toward the solution of the problem, and has stimulated other denominations to like effort, we heartily endorse the Board of Home Missions in the prosecution of the work of the Department of Country Life, and, further.

The Presbyterv of Westchester hereby respectfully overtures the General Assembly to continue the work of the Country Life Department and, as circumstances warrant, to increase its scope.

The Commission on the Bedford Church (p. 544) presented a report, which was received.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your Committee reports

I. That the sessional records of the following churches were presented for review:—Peekskill First, Peekskill Second, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Scarborough, Scarsdale Hitchcock Memorial, South East, South East Center, South Salem, White Plains, Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers Dayspring, Yonkers First, Yonkers, Hungarian, Yonkers South, Yonkers Westminster, Yorktown and New Rochelle.

2. That the following, called for, were not presented: Pound Ridge and Rye.

3. Your committee recommends and moves

(1.) That the records of the following be approved without exception: Peekskill First. Peekskill Second, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Scarborough, South East Center, South Salem. White Plains, Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers Dayspring, Yonkers Spring Stated First, Yonkers Hungarian, Yonkers South, Yonkers Westminster, April 21, 1914 Yorktown and New Rochelle.

(2.) That the records of the following be approved with ex-

ceptions: Scarsdale Hitchcock Memorial and South East.

The order of the day, the conference on Evangelism, was taken up.

The Narrative was then read. It was received, adopted and it was ordered that an abstract be entered upon the minutes and sent to the General Assembly. The abstract is as follows:

Judging by the figures reported our presbytery has not even held its own spiritually, at least in the gathering of the spiritual harvest. The net gain in membership is only 107. The total accessions by letter and examination amounted to 660, 20 more than a year ago. 332 were received on examination, 93 less than the previous year. Three churches had not a single accession during the year, 4 received no one on confession, and 9 churches report a net loss in membership. Sixteen received fewer than a year ago, 15 more and 3 the same. The present membership of our 34 churches is 9.082.

The larger part of the accessions by examination, as usual, 213 out of 332 or 64 per cent, have come from our Sunday Schools. This fact bears testimony to the consecrated endeavor of the officers and teachers. In spite of the apparently contradictory figures not a single pastor deplores a lack of spiritual life in the church, and all agree that the spiritual life is healthy and promising. With an effective campaign during the coming year the reports of one year hence will undoubtedly show not net losses but a steady and increasing growth in number as well as in spirit.

There is no way of telling certainly from the statistics returned upon the blanks what is the cause of the losses recorded above, in some few cases it is definitely stated that there has been an unusually large number of deaths and dismissals, but for the most part it has been left to the narrator to draw his own conclusions, and the evident fact, which impresses him most is that in all too many cases the "Suspended" or "Reserve" roll accounts for the large majority of our losses. For example one church that received 72 members during the year had a net increase of only 16, while another receiving 60 members increased its total only 27. and a third, which received only a member, reported a net loss of 24, and still another receiving 55 members reported a net loss of 36 members. These facts indicated that the "Suspended" roll has reaped a rich harvest. The discipline of the church permits the transfer to this roll of two classes-those who remove without dismission and those who have forsaken the house of God. Only about one-half of the churches are ready to report that they are faithful to the duty imposed by following up the former class with notices of removal, and sessions do not seem to be keeping spiritnal oversight of the wandering sheep, who are living close to the fold, and winning them back

Spring Stated

The Sabbath morning preaching services are well attended Meeting, April 21, 1914 The large majority of the churches report considerably over half the membership present, while only a few fall below that mark-a year ago the figures were reversed, only a very few having an attendance of 50 per cent. The figures and words of pastors this vear indicate an increasing interest and attendance. The second service is, however, as usual the neglected service. church reports as large or larger attendance in the evening than in the morning, while most report only one-half to one-quarter as many present. The midweek service of prayer is a bad third with a corporal's guard of the faithful present. Seventy-five is the largest number reported present out of a membership of 683 while 69 follows in a church of 624. For the most part, however, 10 per cent. is a large attendance. These figures are not to be taken as a conclusive evidence of a lack of interest in the prayer meet-Undoubtedly, in a suburban presbytery such as ours, the commuting members find it physically impossible to be present at such services.

> The reports on the religious life of the home are not encouraging. Only 2 churches report with any definiteness the number of families known to have a family altar. One reports 20 families belonging to a "Pocket Testament League, another 40 per cent. of the families engaged in family worship. On the whole there seems to be no improvement.

> An encouraging condition is the large number of children in regular attendance upon one preaching service a week. There is scarcely a church but reports a fair and encouraging percentage of its congregation made up of children, ranging all the way from 75 per cent. to 10 per cent. of total congregation. At least 12 of the pastors address a sermon weekly to the children, others monthly and still others occasionally.

> Twenty-four of our 34 churches report one or more societies of Christian Endeavor, and it is of more than passing significance that all but one report favorably, most of them in most flattering terms, on the influence of the Christian Endeavor Society upon the spiritual life and activity of its members. Twenty-one churches report \$123,376.82 for local church support, while 26 report \$69,-942.60 for benevolence, \$27.857.84 going to the boards. These amounts indicate a substantial increase over last year. The duplex envelope is more and more growing with favor. Only few retain the "pew rent" system, and only a few monthly offerings for benevolence. The Every Member Campaign is bringing about a change of method and pastors report a possible increase.

> In every case the session is reported as exercising supervision over the various departments of the church. There is the usual indifference to the strict observance of the Lord's Day, in which church members, however, are minimum offenders in the community. For the most part our members are free from "gambling with cards" or over-indulgence in intoxicating liquors, and our pastors are not at all timid in preaching the straight Bible truth regarding these evils.

> The past year does indeed reveal signs of a healthy spiritual life, but there are spots, which need the attention of the specialist

and the united co-operation of the forces of presbytery, and I Spring Stated would suggest our prayerful and united attention and activity in April 21, 1914.

1. A persistent refusal to allow itinerant members of our

churches to get away unnoticed, through sending notices both to the member and a neighboring pastor.

2. Some earnest and definite plan through sessions and church

members to reclaim the fallen and wandering brother.

3. A simultaneous presbyterial campaign to increase religion in the home and the re-establishment of the family altar.

4. A definite training of members for personal work.

The Rev. John F. Carson, of the Presbytery of Brooklyn, was invited to sit as a corresponding member, and, by invitation, delivered a very stirring address on Evangelism.

Presbytery expressed its appreciation for the address.

The Business Committee presented a report on the minutes of the Trustees (p. 560), recommending and moving their approval. The report was received and the recommendation adopted.

- 3. That the special committee be continued to receive and consider any requests that may be made of presbytery by the Port Chester Church report to be made at the Fall Stated Meeting.

The Rev. William Y. Duncan was at his own request dismissed to the Presbytery of New York.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:
