JOURNAL.

First Day.

HARTFORD CITY, IND., March 23, 1898.

On Wednesday, March 23, 1898, in Grace Methodist Episcopal Church, Hartford City, Indiana, at 8:30 A. M., Bishop Charles H. Fowler opened the fifty-fifth session of the North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, by announcing Hymn No. 798,

"And are we yet alive?"

which was sung, and Bishop Fowler led in a fervent prayer for the blessing of God upon the Conference and its work.

He then called the Presiding Elders into the chancel to assist him in the consecration of the elements, and afterwards they administered the same to the people, in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. William L. Singer, recommended by the Woodburn Quarterly Conference; John K. Cecil, recommended by the Madison Street and Whitely Quarterly Conference; Fred F. Thornburg, recommended by the Richmond District Conference; Addison D. Alexander, recommended by Majenica Quarterly Conference; Frank P. Morris, recommended by the Swayzee Quarterly Conference.

Charles W. Stephens was recommended, but, on motion, the Presiding Elder was permitted to withdraw his application and employ him as a Supply in his District.

Thirtieth Question.— The Thirtieth Question was called: "Where shall the next Conference be held?" Decatur was put in nomination, and, on a rising vote, was unanimously chosen as the place for holding the next session of the Conference.

Introductions.— William A. Spencer, Corresponding Secretary of the Church Extension Society, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Statistical Secretary.—The Statistical Secretary read the totals of the statistical reports, and, on motion, report was accepted and the entire report ordered printed in the Minutes.

Introductions.— H. C. Weakley, Superintendent of Christ Hospital and Elizabeth Gamble Deaconess Home, Cincinnati, Ohio; A. J. Palmer, one of the Secretaries of the Missionary Society; Joseph F. Berry, editor of the *Epworth Herald*, and Jesse L. Hurlbut, editor of our Sunday School publications, etc., were introduced to the Conference and delivered brief addresses in the interests of the causes they represent.

Lay Representation.—The proposition presented by the Rock River Conference, on equal Ministerial representation, was presented to the Conference. On motion, a rising vote was ordered, resulting in 145 votes for and 2 against.

Also, the proposition from the Maine Conference, substituting the word "sixty" for "forty-five", as the basis of representation. A rising vote was taken, resulting in 148 votes for and none against.

On motion, time was extended.

H. A. Gobin.—H. A. Gobin, President of DePauw University, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

DePauw University.—The following resolution was introduced by W. D. Parr, and unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The General Assembly of the State of Indiana, at its session of 1897, enacted a law authorizing any educational institution, university or college, incorporated under any law of the State of Indiana, to admit to membership, in its board of trustees, any number of additional trustees, not exceeding four, who may be chosen or elected such trustees by the alumni of such institution, university or college, whenever the existing board of trustees, or their successors in office, may determine such action to be expedient: provided, that all persons or bodies of persons, entitled under the charter of said institution to choose the trustees thereof, shall have first signified their assent to such action; and,

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of DePauw University, at its annual session, in June, 1897, unanimously adopted a resolution declaring the admission of such additional members to its board, to be chosen by the Alumni Association of said University, to be expedient: therefore, be it

Resolved, By the North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, that it does hereby give its assent to such additional members of said Board of Trustees of DePauw University, and that the same be chosen as proyided for in said law.

Afternoon Session.—The Bishop appointed M. Mahin to preside at the afternoon session, and also appointed W. D. Parr to conduct the devotional exercises.

Missionary Society.—The following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Resolved, That, as a Conference, we most heartily approve the action of the Board of Managers of the Missionary Society, to furnish, free of charge, The Gospel in All Lands to the effective members of the various annual Conferences, and World Wide Missions on the same terms to all our families, where at least

one member contributes the sum of one dollar to the cause of missions; and we desire to pledge our loyal support of this effort to place in the hands of our ministers and members so much valuable information, and a more earnest endeavor to raise at least our full apportionment for the cause of missions.

COMMITTEE ON THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Whereas, The Bible being pre-eminently the Book of God, we commend the Society for its publication and distribution, at actual cost of publication, of the Word of God, to the confidence and support of our people. In eighty-three years, this Society has printed and circulated more than sixty-three million copies of the Bible, in this and foreign lands, to aid the missionaries in bringing men and women to God; therefore,

Resolved, 1st, That we learn with regret that the Board of Managers, because of the falling off in the collections, found it necessary to dispense with the services of district superintendents;

Resolved, 2nd, We recommend that one hundred dollars be distributed to each one of the districts, for this Society.

Resolved, 3rd, That we heartily endorse the administration of Rev. W. J. Vigus, D. D., as superintendent for Indiana, who has, so ably and well, managed the affairs of the Society in his field of labor.

BOOK COMMITTEE.

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

We ask your careful study of the exhibit hereto appended, showing the measure of business and the degree of prosperity realized by our Book Concerns in the fiscal year closing October 30, 1897.

There is much for which to be grateful. The business has more than kept pace with the general commercial interests of the country, and our property, credit and trade are on a safe foundation. We are persuaded, however, that the amount of business secured is not proportional to the greatness and needs of our constituency. If you all realized how dependent our publishing interests are upon your active co-operation, sales, profits and dividends would be much larger.

We very deeply regret that we are compelled to decrease, for the coming year, the annual dividend. A reduction of 20 per cent. we regard as imperative. The large subsidies directed by the General Conference, the demands for new machinery and other improvements, and the greater protection of our business against rival institutions, force us to this action.

The change of form in our Advocates, and our Sunday school literature in part, the enlargement of their scope and contents, and a consequent larger expenditure, without an increase in the price, call for greatly increased subscription lists. We are compelled to say that in certain quarters so earnest effort is not given to the circulation of our periodicals as their merits and their ability to bless pastor and people, Churches and Sunday schools, authorize, and as we have a right to expect.

We appeal to you to stimulate in every suitable way the circulation of our books and periodicals, believing, as we do, that you will thereby develop a more loyal and stalwart Methodism, increase the evangelistic spirit among our people, add to our benevolences, and bring to the honored claimants of the Church what their needs and services make their just due.

The collections for the Episcopal Fund aggregated about five per cent more in 1897 than in 1896, but were not sufficient to meet current expenses. The small surplus on hand some years ago is now exhausted. We are surprised that in some Conferences the collections are so far below the apportionments. The apportionment is one and one-fourth per cent on ministerial support, and, according to the law of the Church, the Bishops must share pro rata with Presiding Edders and Pastors.

It is known to you that the duty of selecting the location and providing for the expense of the next General Conference is assigned to the Book Committee. All necessary expenses of delegates are paid by the Church. The General Conference committee will estimate the amount needed, and apportion the same to the Conferences. Our people cheerfully met this expenditure the last quadrennium, and will do so this, when they learn their share of responsibility. The collections for it should be taken during the year 1898.

We earnestly plead for an intense loyalty to all these interests so necessary to our prosperity and usefulness, and such a use of all the agencies of the Church as shall bring at last the "well done" of the Master.

The Board of Church Extension, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, makes report of its progress and needs in its bi-monthly magazine, *Christianity in Eurnest*.

For the ensuing year, our Conference is asked to raise by collections, \$5,000.

For the ensuing year, our Conference is asked to raise by collections, \$5,000. Our needy churches may, on approved applications, receive \$700.

The amount of aid granted must depend on the amount of the collections taken, and cannot exceed the proportion above indicated. Interest, therefore, in our own Conference, as well as in the general cause, should inspire us to use all diligence to secure the full amount asked, and if possible go beyond it.

Church Extension and Missionary work go hand in hand. The proportion asked is as \$1 to \$4. It should be remembered, however, that our Sunday schools as well as churches give for Missions, while we rely wholly on the church collections for Church Extension. Let us remember, also, that the voice of the pastor is the only living voice that can reach all our people, and that, if any be silent, his people will neither hear nor care for this great cause.

Intelligent interest in Missions should carry with it interest in Church Extension also; for, it is estimated, that of every five dollars annually contributed to Missions, one dollar comes from the churches aided by our Board of Church Extension, during the last thirty years.

Christianity in Earnest, with its bi-monthly visits, will furnish to all who receive it, the latest tidings of this work and its wants. It should find cordial welcome by all who pray and work for the coming of the kingdom. No pastor or intelligent layman who would know the work of his church, should be without it.

Glad Tidings, with facts and figures condensed, and with sweet songs for every voice, will help in public service, with collections, and maps showing the work at a glance will be added when desired; and all for the asking and the bare cost of printing and mailing. If this work shall languish, we and our people will surely be without excuse.

We recommend for adoption the following Resolutions:

- 1. We heartily congratulate the Board of Church Extension, and the church-at-large, on the remarkable success of this work through a period of thirty years.
- 2. That our country, being new, with rapidly increasing population and unlimited resources, will continue to need Church Extension, in the future as in the past, and that our church, by fostering and strengthening this work, will increase its own power to promote all forms of Christian and benevolent activity.
- 3. That we, as a Conference, will not be content with anything less than a full response to the call of the General Committee for our proper share in Church Extension, until, everywhere, in communities now destitute, the people shall have opportunity to "enter His courts with praise."
- 4. That our Presiding Elders be requested to apportion, with care, the full amount asked for Church Extension, to the several Districts and pastoral charges for collection; and that, availing ourselves of the helps provided by the Board, and especially Christianity in Earnest and Glad Tidings, we will present this cause in all our churches, and endeavor to secure, at least, the amount asked, in accordance with the plan of our Discipline.

CLASS MEETINGS AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK.

We recognize in the Class Meeting one of the great sources of the spiritual power and life of Methodism, and we note with regret, that in many places this valuable means of grace is but indifferently used or neglected entirely; therefore, we urge upon the pastors of the North Indiana Conference, to work and pray for a revival in Methodism along the lines of the Class Meeting.

We also recognize, in the Epworth League, very largely, the hope of future Methodism. The church will be stronger, purer and more useful because of the training given in the Epworth League. We see, by the reports of the Presiding Elders, that the Epworth League has been a very potent factor in revival work in the North Indiana Conference, the past year. Therefore, we recommend a closer identification of the League and church, making these young people to feel that they are a part of the church, and not an organization to themselves, simply to bear some financial burden, but to take part in the general work, and to enjoy the spiritual life of the church. We heartily commend the spirit of the young people's societies of this Conference in so fully identifying themselves with the Epworth League.

We approve of the general management of work, also the new Reading Course and the English Bible Course.

We would urge systematic benevolence among the young people of both the Senior and Junior Leagues.

We sanction the efforts of our officers to secure regular attendance from all members of the Epworth League upon the usual church services. We would urge all pastors to organize Junior Leagues everywhere, when possible.

We recommend the Epworth Herald for every Christian home.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

DE PAUW UNIVERSITY.

From the report of our Visitors, we learn that the enrollment in DePauw University is quite up to last year, and the personnel of the student body is excellent. The departments are well defined, and are under as strong faculty as any school in the country. The religious spirit among the students is most excellent. The University maintains its old character and its loyalty to the Church, notwithstanding certain flippaut and sensational statements. The unparalleled times of the last few years have caused great shrinkage in the property and income of the University. The DePauw fund, to help carry the institution till the will should be executed, ran out last year, so that the University is thrown back upon the Church to carry, not only till the DePauw estate is settled, and certain other property turned to endowment, but, also, to provide for this great school larger endowments and more thorough equipments. There is not another obligation before the Church in Indiana and the central west more sacred, or involving more for the country and the Church, than the care of DePauw for the next few years. We recommend—

- That, in accordance with the plan of the Board of Trustees, as endorsed by our Presiding Elders, ten cents per member be apportioned to the charges to be raised for DePanw University next year.
- 2. That we endorse the third Sunday in May as DePauw Day, and urge its observance by all our charges.
- 3. That we heartily endorse the state rally, in the interest of DePauw University, to be held at Indianapolis April 26 and 27, 1898, and urge as large attendance as possible of both ministers and laymen.
- 4. That we fully approve the election of Dr. W. H. Hickman as Vice-Chancellor, cordially invite him to visit our charges, and cheerfully commend his plan for a sustaining fund.
- That James F. Elliott and Hugh Dougherty be elected as Trustees of DePauw University for three years, from September 1, 1898, and A. W. Lamport and C. U. Wade, Visitors, for two years, from September 1, 1898.
- 6. That B. A. Kemp, E. T. Gregg and M. E. Nethercut be appointed Visitors to DePauw School of Theology, and that E. L. Semens and C. C. Cissell be appointed Visitors to Garrett Biblical Institute.

THEOLOGICAL SCHOOLS.

It is recommended that young men who expect to enter the ministry should first take an Academical Collegiate Course, and after that, a thorough training in one of our Theological Schools.

Boston School of Theology.— Located in the heart of the city, it thus affords to students the advantages of great libraries, the living examples of great preachers, and the varied life of a center of culture. Living is cheap, instructors are able, and an evangelical spirit pervades the institution.

Drew Theological Seminary.—Eight hundred young men have graduated since its opening, in 1867. Rooms are free of charge. The J. B. Cornell library is one of the best in the country. Being only twenty-five miles from New York, it offers, in addition to its inherent advantages, an opportunity to study metropolitan life.

Garrett Biblical Institute.—Beautifully located, in a grove on the shore of Lake Michigan, in classic Evanston, within close touch of Chicago, it affords an ideal place for study. The University library and laboratories are conveniently located. The institution is well equipped—materially, intellectually, and spiritually.

DePane Theological School.— We rejoice in the great good that this institution has been able to do. We respectfully recommend to the Board of Trustees of DePauw that the number of teachers be increased. But if the financial affairs of the institution will not permit of this, we recommend that the school be discontinued for the present.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

As twenty-two students during the last year, within the bounds of this Conference, have been aided to the amount of \$1,023, while, during the same period, our Conference raised only \$934 for the same cause, we recommend that special efforts be made on Children's Day to increase the collections. We recommend, for use on Children's Day, the "Pictures of Heroic Methodism," published by the Book Concern. These pictures are 42 x 28 inches, and beautifully colored. Six great epochs in the history of Methodism are represented, namely: Epworth Rectory, The Holy Club, An Eventful Card Party, Heroes of the Saddle-bags, Cokesbury College, and The Future Leaders of the Church.

FREEDMAN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

We, your Committee of Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society, submit the following report:

The work of this Society commends it to the favorable consideration of all our people. It has expended \$4,250,000 in the South. It has established fifty schools among the white and black people in which there are 477 teachers and \$8,396 students, and which more than 100,000 young men and women have attended.

There are more than 600,000 communicants within the territory of this Society depending upon it for their religious education, therefore,

- Resolved, 1. We regret that 5,000 charges can be found where no collections were taken, and 3,000 more that gave only \$1 for the work of this Society last year.
- 2. We recommend the circulation of the *Christian Educator*, published by this society, among our people, containing information concerning the work and needs of the Society.
 - 3. That we accept the apportionment for this Conference.
- That we urge a collection in every charge, with the use of literature and envelopes gratuitously furnished by this Society.
- 5. That we invite the Secretaries of the Society to visit our respective charges.

MISSIONARY CAUSE.

We, your Committee on Missionary Cause, offer the following:

Resolved, 1. That we recommend that all the members of this Conference adopt some systematic plan for instructing their congregations in the Missionary work and needs.

- 2. That we urge upon each pastor to take a special single collection for the Missionary Cause very early in the year, and have the same payable as early as the middle of November or first of December, assuring the congregations that the money will be forwarded at once to the Treasurers.
- 3. That we urge all ministers who have not done so to take a collection or pledge for the Missionary debt.
- That we recommend Missionary Conventions in each District, under the directions of the Presiding Elders, to be held in every charge, during the fall months.

- 5. That the Presiding Elders of each District appoint a Missionary Secretary for each District and assign his duties.
- That we appreciate the efforts of our Secretaries to personally visit our charges and hold mass meetings therein.
- 7. That we heartily commend the work of our Secretaries and Publishing Agents to furnish the *Gospel in All Lands* to ministers free, and the *World Wide Missions* to families or persons paying \$1 or more for Missionary work.
- 8. That we recognize the good work done by the Woman's Home Missionary Society and Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, and that we will assist them and their workers.

MORAL AND SOCIAL QUESTIONS.

Your Committee on Moral and Social Questions submit the following:

A communication from the Anti-Saloon League, inviting our co-operation by naming a representative on the National Board of Directors, meets our approval, and we name Rev. Thomas Stabler, D. D., as such representative. Also, we name as delegates to the National Convention, to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, December, 1898, Rev. W. O. Pierce, D. D., and Rev. Frank G. Browne, Ph. D.

We also re-affirm the following resolution, adopted at our session last year:

Resolved, That we, the members of the North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, declare, before all the world, that Christian men and women ought to be known always and everywhere as the relentless and uncompromising foes of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and that it is their imperative duty to wage a ceaseless warfare upon this question; and, while we accept restrictive measures, and while we indorse the Anti-Saloon League, and while we re-affirm our approval of the Nicholson Bill, and will aid in the enforcement of laws for the overthrow of the saloon, that we use them only as leading toward total abstinence on the part of the individual and absolute prohibition on the part of the State and Nation.

We are also pleased to receive the following from Bishop Mallalieu, which meets with our hearty concurrence:

Resolved, That, so far as practicable, we will make special effort to have our congregations, Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues observe the 4th of July of each year as a day consecrated to the promotion of the Temperance Reform; that we especially seek to interest our children and young people in this movement; that, with songs, music, speeches and various services in our Churches, public halls, or groves, we will strive to promote a proper and Christian celebration of the birthday of the Nation, in the cultivation of a

sound temperance revival; and, finally, that we invite the co-operation of all religious bodies, temperance organizations, young people's societies of whatever name, and all Churches, Sunday Schools, pastors, patriots and philanthropists, in the effort to save our Nation from the curse of drink.

EPWORTH LEAGUES

We gratefully recognize the moral and spiritual power of our Epworth Leagues, but we view with alarm the tendency in some Chapters to allow questionable games and amusements in the social meetings.

Resolved, That we will steadily resist this tendency by all proper means, and call especial attention to page 136, paragraph 248, in our Discipline, which forbids "playing at games of chance, or taking such other annosements as are obviously of misleading or questionable moral tendency, or disobedience to the order and Discipline of the Church."

Resolved, That we will support those Assemblies and Camp-Meeting Associations which close their gates on the Holy Sabbath, and we positively condemn all Sunday excursions and the patronage of the same by members of the Church

Resolved, 2. That we will encourage in our pastoral charges in every proper way, both in public and in private, the development and the highest usefulness of the auxiliaries of the Woman's Foreign Missionary and of the Woman's Home Missionary Societies, where such exist, and where they do not exist will arrange for and welcome the visitation to our churches of any authorized representatives of either of these Societies who may come with the view of organizing auxiliaries.

Resolved, 3. That an efficient Conference Deaconess Board, consisting of nine members, at least three of whom shall be women, be appointed by the Conference at its present session, to carry out, as far as practicable, the provisions of the Discipline regarding the work of Deaconesses among us.

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

This Society has had a very prosperous year. Twelve auxiliaries, two Young Ladies' Societies, and two bands have been organized, making a total of sixteen new societies, and several members of the "Isabella Thoburn" auxiliary at large.

Associations were held in each District last fall, and were intensely interesting and very helpful to all who attended them. Most of the Societies report promptly each quarter to their District Secretary and Conference Treasurer, and show an increasing interest in the work.

Most of our auxiliaries observed "Thank-offering" Day before Conference. We trust those who did not will observe the day in the near future. This meeting should be truly a *thank offering* service when we recall the kindness of our Father, and praise Him with a loving heart and generous giving.

The Conference is responsible for the salary of Miss Emma Lamb, a Missionary, who goes from our midst to Calcutta, India. It is expected that each Society pay something for this purpose each year as long as she shall work in the Mission field.

Fort Wayne District supports a Bible woman in Japan in memory of Miss Mollie Collins, for many years their Secretary, but now a member of the choir invisible. Goshen District supports a Bible reader in Fukuoka, Japan. Every Society in the District assists in this good work.

There has been an increase in *special work*. Fifty different scholars are supported by auxiliaries or individuals. Our Father calls every one to this Missionary work. We will not be satisfied until every woman in our Church shall become an active member.

Obituary.

JULIA A. HARTMAN BAKER.



Julia A. Hartman Baker, daughter of Isaac and Elizabeth Hartman, was born in Westmoreland county, Pennsylvania, June 15, 1827, and died at her home in Warsaw, Indiana, April 10, 1897, aged sixty-nine years, nine months and twenty-five days. She was clearly and happily converted to God, and identified herself with the Methodist Episcopal Church fifty-eight years ago. She moved. with her parents, to Findlay, Ohio, in 1842, and was married to her now deeply bereaved husband November 9, 1847. This union was blessed with five children, all of whom have preceded her to the spirit world. The reunion now is sweet. In October, 1852, with her husband and family, she moved to Kosciusko

county, Indiana. In 1858 Brother Baker became a member of the North Indiana Conference. She was his full partner in this great undertaking. She was a home-lover, but cheerfully denied herself any and all things for the Master's work. She gladly performed the slightest duty, when that duty became apparent, meeting, most particularly and acceptably, each demand as it came. This she did, without wavering, for twenty-five years. Failing health finally compelled them, in 1883, to retire from the work. This she did very reluctantly, and said that it seemed almost like giving up her life, so devoted was she to the work. Since that time she has been unable to do much active work for the Master, but her interest in and love for the church did not decrease with her declining health and advancing years. It seemed rather to increase, and nothing filled her soul with as much joy as the news of souls born into the kingdom. They served, together, the following charges: Bourbon, Akron, Springfield, Roanoke, Leesburg, Pierceton, Pendleton, New Castle, Waterloo, Columbia City, Hartford City and Jonesboro.

In her home life she was self-sacrificing, almost to a fault. Her great concern was for the happiness and comfort of others, regardless of herself. As a mother, she was kind, gentle and loving; as a wife, she had no superior, always ready to cheerfully do everything possible for the happiness of her

husband. Her last illness continued eight months. During much of the time she suffered most intensely, enduring it all with wonderful patience and Christian fortitude. For weeks she fully realized that she could not recover, and expressed her perfect resignation to the will of God. Quietly, peacefully, trustfully, she stepped into the chariot of Israel's God and was borne away to her home in the skies. There she waits, with the others, to welcome the one they loved so well. The funeral was conducted at the home of Brother Baker, by her pastor, Rev. J. A. Beatty, assisted by the presiding elder, Rev. J. A. Lewellen, Rev. J. H. Jackson, and other brethren of the Conference. She was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery at Warsaw.

REV. JOHN E. EARP, Ph. D., D. D.



The subject of this sketch was born in Marion, Illinois, April 12th, 1846, and died at Atlanta, Indiana, May 10th, 1897. was of Methodist ancestry, his father being a useful member of the Southern Illinois Conference. When twelve years of age, he gave his heart to the Saviour and united with the church. He acquired studious habits in childhood, and at nineteen he was graduated from McKendree College. Three vears later, in 1868, he received the Master's degree. In 1879 he received the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Lawrence University, and in 1882 Dickinson College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. He was elected professor in Central Weslevan College in 1862. In 1867-9 he was a student at the Universities of Tubingen and Berlin, having earned the

necessary means by teaching. He was called to DePauw University in 1869, and in 1873 was made full professor of modern languages in that institution. A second trip to Europe, for advanced studies in German and French, was made. In 1876 he was admitted to the North Indiana Conference. He became President of the Southwest Kansas College, at Winfield, Kansas, in 1886, which position he held till 1890, when he entered the pastorate in the Southwest Kansas Conference, having been transferred in 1887. In this relation he served the following charges: Marion, 1890–2; Kingman, 1893, and El Dorado, 1894–6. In order to be nearer his sons, he was transferred to the North Indiana Conference in 1896, and stationed at Atlanta, which appointment he served, with great acceptability, till his death.

Such is the outline of a brief but very useful life. What patient toil and rigid economy must have been crowded into those brief years, to make such splendid achievement possible. In all this he was forgetful of self, in his endeavors to promote the welfare of others.

"In the reorganization of the university as DePauw University he did a large amount of work, and was greatly admired by Mr. DePauw and other members of the Board of Trustees for his business insight and comprehensive management of all the affairs intrusted to him."

In the pastorate Dr. Earp possessed great zeal for soul-winning, and was very successful. While entertaining large views of what ought to be realized by the church, he never lost sight of the minutest detail of his work. He frequently reported to his presiding elder, explaining his methods, every item of progress and evidence of divine approval. He interested himself in the work of his neighboring pastors, and while at Atlanta he was a member of the preachers' associations in both Hamilton and Tipton counties. Here, as elsewhere, his ripe scholarship and true piety made his services most valuable, and they were greatly appreciated.

His character and worth, as a man, was ably presented by the Faculty of DePanw University, from which we make the following extract:

"During his long service among us, as a professor in the university, he won our admiration and esteem by his many noble qualities and rare gifts and attainments.

"We recognized in him a most manly man, a courteous gentleman, and a true Christian.

"He was a close student of books, of men, and of events, and was always fully abreast of the times. His reasoning was always clear and accurate, and few men, whom we have known, possessed to so remarkable a degree the power of solving the difficult and intricate problems of life.

"He was a tireless worker, and a man of unbounded energy and application. He possessed great powers of application and endurance, and wasted no time upon trifling matters or in frivolous pleasures. Life, to him, was too sacred to be trifled with, and time too precious a gift to be wasted.

"He was as true to principle as the needle to the pole, and possessed the courage of his convictions. He was prompt in meeting all obligations and engagements, and in performing every task and fulfilling every duty devolving upon him, conscientious in doing the right thing at the right time and in the best possible manner, and was in every matter reliable and trustworthy.

"While he was by nature somewhat cautious and reserved, he was a warm and true friend, nor did he spare himself any labor or sacrifice in aiding those in need.

"He was economical in spending money upon himself, but was generous, almost to a fault, in aiding every worthy cause.

"He was a man who loved God supremely and his brother as himself, and thus his was a consistent Christian life. "Such he was as we knew him in DePauw University, and such, and much more, he has doubtless been in the great work of the Christian ministry."

His death, which was caused by acute inflammation of the bowels, was sudden, and a great shock to all. But he was not taken by surprise; he was ready. His suffering was intense; but he retained the use of his faculties till the end, and adjusted all his private affairs, even to the minutest detail. His last hours were most triumphant. The old habits of the scholar clung to him. He knew the experience he was passing through, and studied it as carefully as he ever studied a proposition in philosophy. His conclusions were based upon facts gathered from the experience of the hour. His mind was engaged in a calm yet heroic effort to enrich itself with another great truth, and to communicate it to those around him, before leaving the body. Meanwhile, his spirit was steadled by faith, and his soul was buoyant with hope. If Socrates died like a philosopher, so did Dr. Earp. But Dr. Earp also died like a Christian.

In his life work he was nobly sustained by a talented and accomplished wife, who, with three sons—Rev. Joseph Earp, of the Philadelphia Conference; Ralph Earp, M. D., and Carl, six years of age — mourn his loss.

In addition to many telegrams and letters of condolence, memorial services were held in former charges.

Short services were held in Atlanta, conducted by the presiding elder, who was assisted by William D. Parr, D. D., C. E. White, J. F. Radcliffe, W. W. Martin, and others.

On Thursday, May 14th, the remains were taken to Greencastle, Indiana, accompanied by all the relatives, a number of the citizens of Atlanta, and others. The funeral was conducted in College Avenue Church by Rev. H. A. Gobin, D. D., assisted by Dr. John Poucher, Dr. T. J. Bassett, M. S. Marble, and J. W. Miller. The interment took place in Forest Hill Cemetery, by the side of his two little boys, who preceded him several years ago.

Mrs. Josinah Medsker was transferred to the Church Triumphant, from her home, 424 Prospect Avenue, Kansas City, Mo., Thursday a. m., July 1, 1897, at the ripe age of seventy-eight years.

She was the daughter of James Dodd, who came from Virginia to Henry county, Indiana, while our sister was quite a small child. She was married to Jehn C. Medsker March 12, 1835. Blessedly, they walked life's pathway together until they had celebrated their fifty-seventh wedding anniversary. Brother Medsker departed this life August 9, 1891.

Soon after their marriage, her husband was received into the North Indiana Conference, he being received in 1841. He remained an honored member of this Conference until he was called home. During

the twenty-nine years of his active service in the ministry, they had many trials and hardships to endure, for the country was new in those days; but amidst all their difficulties ran wonderful streams of joy, for they bore all their experiences joyfully, for the sake of Christ and His church. In all these responsibilities our sister was as ready for her part and as strong in her conviction of duty, and as ready to do the will of the Master, as her husband. In her later years, as she spoke of those days, her friends loved to listen and never grew weary of the recital of such interesting pages from real life, but felt their own hearts strangely warmed and impressed towards deeper consecration to the Master's work.

In the year 1870 the health of our brother compelled him to retire from the active ministry, although he preached, with great frequency and his old-time fervor, for nearly ten years more as a superannuate. At the time of his retiring they moved to Kansas City, Mo., which has been their home ever since. Six children survive them, one son and five daughters. They were members of the Grand Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church.

Sister Medsker was a great sufferer during the last four years of her life, but her Christian character was beautiful. Her face continually wore a smile of Christian triumph and contentment that was ever an inspiration to her family and friends.

She talked freely of the experiences of their active ministry, the glorious triumphs in her present experience, and the hope of home gathering in the land beyond.

After she was deprived of the pleasure of attending divine services, nothing gave her more pleasure than the visits of her pastor and old friends, to come in and sing and pray with her.

She suffered greatly at the last, but in death her features resumed their normal expression and she lay as one asleep, with a smile of blessed delight upon her face. REV. CHARLES E. HOLLOPETER.



Charles Edwin Hollopeter was born in Cedarville, Allen county, Ind., September 20, 1869, and died in the village of his nativity July 23, 1897, aged twentyseven years. In the month of February, 1886, under the preaching of James H. Slack, he was converted to God. Feeling called of God to preach the gospel, he attended the Fort Wayne Methodist College, and high school of Valparaiso. He was licensed to preach in 1892, and in 1895 he passed the examination for admission, on trial, at the Logansport session of the North Indiana Conference. and was appointed to Butler Circuit, in the Goshen District. His work in the pulpit and as a pastor was highly complimented by the people he served.

Before the close of the Conference year on Butler Circuit his health failed, and he was compelled to retire from the pulpit to rest and recuperate, and with this end in view he visited the health resorts of Minnesota, the North and California. Returning, he began teaching school and preparing for his Conference examinations; but that fatal disease, consumption, fastened upon him. Still looking on the bright side, he requested to be continued in the Conference on trial, which was granted, with the hopes that by the next regular session he would be able to again take up his life's work, but the disease made rapid progress, and soon all of his cherished hopes were shattered. About the first of July he began to sink rapidly, and in the bright afternoon of July 23rd the

summons came, and, surrounded by loving friends, he passed away, to be with Jesus. The funeral occurred Sunday morning, July 25th, from the Methodist Episcopal Church in Cedarville, his pastor, Rev. Ralph C. Jones, officiating.

REV. JAMES JOHNSTON.



James Johnston was born in New Jersey, December 15, 1821, and died in Pierceton, Indiana, July 30, 1897, aged seventy-five years, seven months and fifteen days.

In early childhood he removed with his parents to Ohio, and there, when but two years old, he was left an orphan. He lived with strangers till fourteen years of age, when he went to live with a sister. He learned the tailor trade, and worked at that for a number of years.

Coming to Indiana in early manhood, he made his home in Hagerstown for about eight years. There he was licensed to preach, beginning his ministry in the North Indiana Conference in 1853. His appointments were as follows: 1853, Ossian; 1854, Massillon Mission; 1855, Spencerville; 1856–57, Allen; 1858–59, Kendallville; 1860, Elkhart Mission:

1861, Elkhart and St. Joseph; 1862, La Grange; 1863-64, Ligonier and Haw Patch; 1865-66, New Paris; 1867-68, Blountsville; 1869-70, Centerville and Cambridge; 1871, Williamsburg; 1872-74, Pierceton; 1875-77, Leesburg; 1878, Mexico; 1879-80, Corrunna; 1881-82, Wawaka. In 1883 he took a superannuated relation. During his superannuation he made his home in Pierceton.

He was greatly honored and beloved by those who knew him. Rev. James Johnston was quiet in his Christian life, though the fountain of his love ran deep. He had a large heart, with "charity for all, and malice toward none."

After superannuation he preached often, taught a Sunday-school class, and in a general way looked after the temporal and spiritual interests of the church.

He had been a sufferer for many months past, and seemed to realize that the end was near. He had no fear, but talked of his departure with joy and calmness. He said to his pastor a few days before his departure: "I have followed the Lord a good many years, imperfectly, to be sure; but he has been very good to me, and I long to see the King in his beauty."

"It is all right," he remarked to a member of the family, "I may never shout on earth, but when I get to heaven I expect to have a long and loud shout of triumph through our Lord Jesus Christ."

His first wife died while he was pastor in Mexico, in 1878.

He was married to Mrs. Sarah M. Long, March 2, 1881. Eight children preceded him to the spirit land, one son, Samuel, having died in the service of his country. A wife, a son, and two daughters, as well as two others to whom he had been as a father, are left to mourn, but not as those who have no hope.

Funeral services were conducted at Pierceton by his pastor, Rev. J. E. Ervin, assisted by the presiding elder, Rev. J. A. Lewellen. He was interred at Leesburg.

Mary Myers was born in the State of Virginia, about the year 1816, and died in Muncie, Indiana, March 2, 1898.

with whom she lived about fourteen years. By this marriage there was born one son, who died in early life.

She was again married, to the Rev. Enoch Holdstock, in 1856, with whom she also lived most happily until his death, in 1894. She had with him an experience of about thirty-five years as the wife of an itinerant Methodist minister, in the States of Michigan and Indiana.

She was much afflicted with lameness for many years, and yet she was frequently found, with her husband, in the homes of those who needed sympathy because of their sorrow.

She was a most kind and affectionate wife and mother, and was greatly honored, by the testimony of her blind step-son, James Holdstock, who said to her a short time before he died, "You have been a good mother to me." Many of us who have been much about their home can corroborate that testimony. Not unfrequently step-mothers perform as faithful and tender a part toward even afflicted children as any mothers can possibly do.

No one, perhaps, enjoyed the society of her friends and neighbors more fully than did Sister Holdstock. She specially enjoyed the company of ministers of the gospel; hence, after the death of her husband, she greatly missed such associations, and felt that it was a real and painful loss that they did not come to her home as formerly. Perhaps in this fact there may be to us, as ministers, a significant suggestion as to our duty in similar cases of bereavement. We might hesitate, for her sake, to say these things if she were present. We refer to the wife of Rev. J. E. Brown, a pastor in the Presbyterian Church.

In her eighty-second year, our dear sister passed from her home on earth, as we doubt not, to her home in heaven. We deeply and tenderly sympathize in the behalf of the daughter, because of her peculiar and profound bereavement, and ask for her the sufficient grace and the encircling of the everlasting arms.
