First Day.

ELWOOD, IND., APRIL 10TH, 1901.

The fifty-eighth session of the North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was opened in the First Methodist Episcopal Church of Elwood, Indiana, by Bishop Stephen M Merrill, DD, LL D, at 9:00 A M, on Wednesday, April 10th, 1901, by reading for Scripture lessons, the 58th chapter of Isaiah and the first seventeen verses of the 10th chapter of Romans, and announcing Hymn No. 447,

“O! happy day that fixed my choice,”

which was sung.

At the request of the Bishop, Dr Marble invited J A Lewellen, E F Hasty, A Greenman and P J Albright to assist in consecrating the elements and administering the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Bishop Merrill then closed the Sacramental service by extemporaneous prayer.

Adjournment—On motion of L A Beeks, it was ordered that we do now adjourn until 7:00 o'clock this evening. The long meter Doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by M A Harlan.

REPORTS.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The American Bible Society is the one agency of American Protestantism that is especially designed to give the Holy Scriptures to the world. To fully meet these claims in our own land, this Society would spend every dollar of its present collections. To do this would be disastrous to the Foreign Missionary work. This great Society has for many years supplied, free of cost, every missionary of our church with every copy of the Scriptures that he uses.

But, while the Home Missionary work demands greatly enlarged donations and the Foreign work needs more than the whole amount of the contributions of the churches, a new and pressing demand has arisen. In the providence of God, some ten or twelve millions of people who have been wickedly deprived of the Word of God have been thrown on the hands of our nation. The vast responsibility of giving the Bible to the Cubans, the Puerto Ricans and the Filipinos has been thrown upon American Protestantism. This is emphatically our responsibility. Our Bible Society must grapple with this gigantic task. Our people do not know, but must be told, that this exigency is upon our Bible Society; that it will cost many hundred thousand dollars to supply these people with the Holy Scriptures; that to supply these our wards many new translations of the Bible must be made, and that the emergency demands haste. We are persuaded that as pastors we have not appreciated the need and the urgency of this matter, but we will, as soon as possible, lay this great cause before our congregations and ask for their offerings to aid this work. Therefore,

Resolved, 1, That at an early day we will present the great work of the American Bible Society to our people and receive their offerings for the same.

2. That, unless related to an *efficient Auxiliary*, we will forward the money at once to M. Van Foulke, Treasurer American Bible Society, Bible House, Astor Place, New York City, or to the Field Agent.

3. That we will seek from the Field Agent, Rev. John Pearson, D.D., of *The Roanoke*, Clifton, Cincinnati, Ohio, such literature as may be needed in presenting this cause and heartily invite him to our pulpits.

4. That we request the various District Stewards' meetings to apportion to each charge, for this cause, five per cent. of the amount apportioned for missions.

5. That the Committee of Arrangements for the next Conference services be instructed to arrange for the holding of an anniversary of this Society during the next session of our Conference.

CHURCH INSURANCE.

From information given by our Board of Insurance, we are pleased to know it has met with a royal reception, and is meeting a great need, as more than nine thousand policy-holders, against fire and tornado, representing more than \$11,500,000 in risks, have sought its protection.

Special mention is due Rev B A Kemp, Presiding Elder, and Rev John T Hammond, Pastor, for the wisdom they have shown in aiding to secure this splendid gift.

EDUCATION.

DePauw University is closing another successful year. The enrollment has kept up with former years, notwithstanding the kind and unkind competition. The student body will average among the best. The faculty is strong, loyal and hard-working. The religious spirit in the University is commendable and gratifying. We rejoice to see the quickened interest of Indiana Methodism in this important trust. Endowments are increasing. The DePauw estate is settling. The great gift of \$40,000, of Hon D W Minshall, of Terre Haute, for the erection of a fire-proof science building, is very gratifying to us. The contract for the erection of this building will be closed immediately and the work completed by September 1, 1901.

We congratulate Mr Minshall over this wise benefaction, and commend to our people this example of most worthy and wisely bestowed generosity.

DePauw University is a necessary component part of Indiana Methodism. The Christian university is to the Church what drill-grounds and drill-masters are to an army. It is not only necessary for the life-power of the Church, but our civil institutions and the stability of our Republic will depend more and more upon Christian leadership. It is the duty, therefore, of loyal citizens to support the Christian university, and surely it is the privilege and duty of every Methodist in Indiana to support our own school, DePauw University. Therefore, be it

Resolved, (1) That we heartily commend the very earnest and efficient work being done by Chancellor W H Hickman, and we pledge ourselves to assist him as far as possible in this work, in which he has met with such great success.

(2) In harmony with the instructions of the Discipline, and the action of the other Indiana Conferences, we will observe "DePauw Day," May 12th, or as near that date as possible we will preach on Christian Education and take the collection for education.

(3) We recommend that a permanent place be given in our annual Conference program for a DePauw anniversary.

(4) We have examined the propositions of the Chancellor for the ministers of Indiana to raise a Sustaining Fund for current expenses for DePauw. This collection is designed to take the place of all other public collections for Endowments, Long Roll, etc. Said *Sustaining Fund* is not an extra collection, but the regular educational collection, and is to average not less than fifteen cents per member per year for the next five years. It does not include subscriptions now made, but is the regular educational collection. The Chancellor proposes that if we will raise this sum *he* will, with our co-operation, raise, from private sources, our pledge of \$200,000 as a Thank Offering Endowment for DePauw.

This plan is commended by all the Presiding Elders of the State, and is accepted by many, who are now working it. We think the plan a most excellent one. It will enable our Chancellor to give more time to student attendance and endowments and other important matters. It will make more surely for success. It will save the pastors from the embarrassment of making public appeals for endowment.

We, therefore, recommend that we accept this plan and request our Presiding Elders to apportion this sum to all our charges, which is the same amount that we recommended last year.

(5) That a committee of three be appointed by this Conference to express our thanks and hearty appreciation to the Hon D W Minshall, of Terre Haute, Ind, for his magnificent gift of \$40,000 for the erection of a science hall, and also to Mr A A Prescott, of Goshen, Ind, for his great gift of property in Chicago, valued at \$10,000, for the Endowment Fund.

We recommend that the Hon James F Elliott and the Hon Hugh Daugherty be elected as Trustees, for a term of three years from September 1, 1901, to succeed themselves.

We recommend the following as visitors: C E Line, to DePauw University, for two years from September 1, 1901; Garrett Biblical Institute, E F Albertson and J A Beatty; Drew Theological Seminary, Sherman Powell; Boston, J K Walts; Woman's College, Baltimore, F M Stone.

THE AMERICAN UNIVERSITY.

The American University stands for Americanism, Protestantism and Methodism. It is a great post-graduate school at our Nation's capital, where training of the highest character and original investigation can be pursued under Christian auspices, close to the marvelous Congressional Library and fourteen great scientific collections, owned by the government and now open to the students of this University.

The University is making great headway, and God is raising up friends to it on every hand. One splendid building, the Hall of History, is completed.

Being a post-graduate university, there is no room for jealousy. It does not parallel the teaching of any school now in existence, but it takes the place in this country of the great universities abroad.

TAYLOR UNIVERSITY.

This institution is located within the bounds of our own Conference. It is under the control of the National Association of Local Preachers of the Methodist Episcopal Church; is Methodistic, thoroughly spiritual, has a devoted faculty and a commendable course of study. We commend it to the sympathy and favorable consideration of our people.

THEOLOGICAL SCHOOLS.

All young men expecting to enter our ministry are *earnestly* recommended to *avail themselves* of the high privileges and benefits bestowed at our Theological schools.

Boston School of Theology is our oldest; it has a progressive faculty, low expenses, and the intellectual stimulus of a classic city.

Garrett Biblical Institute is located on the shore of Lake Michigan, near Chicago. It has scholarly instructors, access to the university libraries and laboratories, and ranks with the best of its kind in our land.

Drew Theological Seminary has free scholarships at Columbia and New York Universities, is in close touch with the life of the metropolitan center, has a magnificent campus and material equipment, and a faculty profoundly learned. It is one of the greatest Theological seminaries on the continent.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The work of this Board is bearing abundant fruit. It is making our great educational work truly connective and constantly advancing it toward the highest standards. The circulation of the *Christian Student* and *Educational Truths for the Twentieth Century* can not fail to arouse interest. The wise administration of "The Children's Day Fund," and the increased benefits resulting to the Church therefrom, should impress every pastor and member in the Church and should stimulate great loyalty to the work and plans of this Board.

in the zeal and plans for great revivals throughout the Conference. We are profoundly grateful for the recognition of the pastors in this memorable Pentecostal meeting which kindled revival fires upon so many Chapter altars.

Arrangements are being made to make the convention to be held in Wabash next October a Pentecostal gathering and school of practical revival methods and department work.

That the largest results for good may be accomplished we desire the hearty co-operation of the several District organizations, and urge the perfecting of our work in association with other Conference Epworth Leagues of the State, thus giving a logical relation for the State League, in harmony with the recommendations of the Board of Control.

We recommend that the Epworthians of the Conference attend the Fifth International Convention to be held at San Francisco, Cal, July 18 to 21, 1901, and to avail ourselves of the opportunity offered by the special excursion under the management of the NORTH INDIANA CONFERENCE QUARTETTE.

We commend the Twentieth Century Movement, as outlined in the *Epworth Herald* and discussed in the convention at Delaware, Ohio, and also to be given local recognition in the helpful ten days' School of Methods of like character, under the management of the Conference Secretary, the Rev L J Naitzger, at Island Park Assembly and elsewhere in the District Conventions.

We have a profound feeling of gratitude for the accomplishments the Society has made, the great victories of the schools, and the gifts of the men and women of God to these schools.

There was never a time when the necessity for the uplifting and saving of the poor and degraded people of our own country was more urgent than now. In saving America, we do much toward saving the world. The work of the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society, upon which society has especially laid the educational and moral uplifting of the three millions of poor white people and the ten millions of destitute black people of the South, relates itself not only to the progress of the church in our land, but also to the very life of the Republic. It therefore deserves the deep interest of our pastors, and an earnest presentation of its work annually before the people of our churches.

A series of interesting tracts have recently been issued, which will be furnished free to those applying for them. To everyone giving one dollar or more to the Society, the *Christian Educator* will be sent free for one year.

Resolved, That, as a Conference, we express our appreciation of the efforts the Secretaries are making in presenting the facts to the public, and pledge them our hearty co-operation.

Resolved, That we accept the apportionment of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) to this Conference, and recommend that the Presiding Elders apportion the amount to the Districts.

PARSONAGE AND FURNITURE.

Resolved, That the Presiding Elder be requested at the first Quarterly Conference to inquire into the condition of each parsonage.

That the local committee on Parsonage and Furniture be urged to purchase one or more articles of heavy furniture each year.

That the trustees of our parsonage property be requested to provide means for keeping the buildings in repair and for beautifying the grounds.

PREACHERS' AID SOCIETY.

The Committee on Preachers' Aid Society make the following report :

First. That the salary of the General Secretary be the same as last year, \$1,350; this to include all incidental expenses.

Second. That the rate be the same as last year. All effective preachers receiving \$500, or less, not including parsonage or house rent, to pay two-fifths

of one per cent. ; all receiving more than \$500 and less than \$1,000, four-fifths of one per cent. ; all receiving \$1,000, or more, one and one-fifth per cent.

Third. Should the aggregate of these amounts be more than enough to pay the salary of the General Secretary, the excess shall be paid into the permanent fund of the Society ; or should the aggregate be less than the salary required, the treasurer of the Board is authorized to pay the deficiency out of the Society's funds.

Fourth. That the Presiding Elders be authorized to collect from the preachers, at the Quarterly meetings, and remit to the treasurer of the Society monthly.

Fifth. That all effective ministers in the Conference be given credit on the amount necessary to constitute them beneficiary members of the Society, for the amounts paid last year and next for the salary of the General Secretary ; provided that feature of the new constitution be adopted which makes it necessary to pay into the treasury of the Society the sum of one hundred dollars, before they are entitled to a certificate of membership.

Sixth. That the Treasurer be instructed to advance money on the salary of the General Secretary, as the emergencies of his work may require.

The committee appointed to consider changes in the Constitution of the Preachers' Aid Society, beg leave to submit as their report the following recast of the entire Constitution, with the request that it be printed in the Conference Minutes for examination during the year, action to be taken upon it at our next annual session :

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE PREACHERS' AID
SOCIETY OF THE NORTH INDIANA CONFERENCE
CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. — NAME AND SEAL.

The corporate name of this organization shall be, "The Preachers' Aid Society of the North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church." It is organized under the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of Indiana, entitled, "An Act Concerning the Organization of the Voluntary Associations, and Repealing Former Laws in Relation Thereto," approved February 12, 1855, and an act amendatory thereto, approved February 10, 1863.

The seal of this Society shall be a metallic impression containing the following words and letters: "The Preachers' Aid Society, N. Ind. Conf., M. E. Church."

ARTICLE II. — OBJECT AND FUNDS.

The object of this Society shall be to raise by donations, bequests, membership dues, or otherwise, a fund to be perpetually maintained for the relief of itinerant preachers in the North Indiana Conference, their widows and

dependent children, in harmony with the spirit of paragraph two hundred and ninety-three (293) of the Discipline of nineteen hundred (1900).

The funds of this Society shall consist of receipts from the following sources:

First. That which was received by this Conference from the Preachers' Aid Society of the Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, incorporated by an act approved February 12, 1841; and the amount specifically appropriated to this object from the centenary contributions of the church.

Second. The money received as dues or fees from the members of the Society.

Third. Bequests, donations and subscriptions of money, bonds, stocks, real estate, personal property, or anything else of commercial value that may legitimately come into the possession of the Society.

The funds of this Society shall be permanent, but all the proceeds arising from rents, interest, or any investment that brings an income, shall, after the payment of all incidental expenses, be distributed annually as herein directed.

ARTICLE III. — MEMBERSHIP.

The membership of this Society shall consist of two classes: *Beneficiary* and *Non-Beneficiary*. Effective members of the North Indiana Conference are eligible to membership in the first class, and lay members or friends of the church not members of the Conference, are eligible to membership in the second class.

1. *Beneficiary Members.*—The annual fee for beneficiary members shall be one per cent. of the cash salary which the said member received the year immediately preceding, until his payments shall amount in the aggregate to one hundred dollars. Or he may elect to pay in annual installments of not less than ten dollars each, or in larger amounts, until he has paid in one hundred dollars, when he shall receive a certificate of life membership, not transferable. Those who have paid into the permanent fund of the Society annual dues or larger amounts, shall have credit for what they have paid. Those who have already paid one hundred dollars into the Society, shall be entitled to a certificate of life membership.

2. *Non-Beneficiary Members.*—The annual membership fee in this class is five dollars; but one may become a life member by the payment of fifty dollars at one time, or a life patron by the payment of one hundred dollars in the same manner. The members in this class shall be entitled to participate in all the proceedings of the Society, provided they are members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Notes bearing annual interest and payable within five years, may be received from life members or life patrons.

ARTICLE IV.— OFFICERS AND MANAGERS.

The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, General Secretary, and nine Managers. These officers and managers shall be elected at the annual meetings of the Society, and shall hold their offices until the close of the next ensuing annual Conference, or until their

successors are elected. They together shall constitute a Board of Control, having full power to manage the affairs of the Society, subject to this Constitution.

The Treasurer and five Managers shall be laymen resident in the city of Muncie, or vicinity. Before entering upon the duties of his office, the Treasurer shall give bond and security in the penal sum of fifteen thousand dollars, which may at any time be increased at the discretion of the Board; said bond to be approved by the Board and filed with the Secretary.

The Board shall have power to make By-Laws for its own government, not inconsistent with this Constitution. Any vacancy in office caused by death, resignation, or otherwise, during the interim of the annual Conference, may be filled by the Board.

ARTICLE V.— BENEFITS.

The net proceeds of the funds of this Society shall be distributed annually to such of its beneficiary members as are recognized by the annual Conference as entitled to assistance from the Conference Claimant Fund. If any member shall become a claimant before he has paid into the permanent fund of the Society the full sum of one hundred dollars, then one-third of the benefits which would accrue to him or his family shall be withheld each year and turned into the permanent fund, until he shall have one hundred dollars to his credit, when there shall be issued to him or his wife a certificate of life membership.

The proceeds of this Society shall be distributed according to the following basis:

Each superannuated minister, who is a Conference Claimant, shall be allowed annually ten dollars for each year of his effective service; each widow shall be allowed annually five dollars for each year she was the wife of a minister during his effective service; and each child, under sixteen years of age, of a deceased minister, shall be allowed annually two dollars for each year of the father's effective service.

ARTICLE VI.— ANNUAL AND SPECIAL MEETINGS.

The annual meeting of the Board of Control shall be held in the city of Muncie within the thirty days next preceding the session of the annual Conference, upon the call of the President or the highest ranking officer of the Board. Special meetings of the Board may be called at any time, by the President or any three members thereof, upon reasonable notice being given to all the members of the Board. In all meetings of the Board, seven shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The annual meetings of the Society shall be held at the seat of the annual Conference, at ten o'clock in the forenoon of the second day of the session, the President of the Conference presiding. This meeting shall be for the purpose of electing officers and managers for the ensuing year; to receive and pass upon the annual report of the Board of Control, made out according to the order found in the accompanying By-Laws, and to transact any other business pertaining to the interest of the Society. This meeting may adjourn to any other

day or days of the Conference session; or, in an emergency, the President and Secretary may call a meeting of the Society on any day before the Conference closes; and it shall require the presence of thirty-five members to constitute a quorum.

In the interim of the annual Conference, meetings of the Society may be called by the President, Secretary and any three members of the Board, twenty days notice having been given in the official church paper (*Weekly Advocate*) having the largest circulation within the bounds of the Conference.

ARTICLE VII.—INVESTMENT OF FUNDS.

The funds of the Society shall be invested according to the judgment of the Investing Committee, subject to the following restrictions:

All investments shall be made either by direct loan or by the purchase of United States Bonds.

All loans shall be secured by two responsible names for amounts of two hundred dollars or less, who shall be joint drawers, and said loans shall be renewed annually. All loans over two hundred dollars shall be secured by mortgage on unincumbered, imperishable real estate, the cash value of which shall be at least double the amount borrowed, and the net income of which exceeds the interest.

The Investing Committee shall make a full report of its doings and of the condition of the entire fund, to the Board at its annual meeting; and the Treasurer shall, at the same meeting, present a report of the receipts and expenditures during the current year, and of the amount on hand. The Board shall thereupon determine the amount to be applied to the objects of the Society for the Conference year then closing, and shall order accordingly, which amount the Treasurer shall be authorized to pay over to the Disbursing Committee. Contingent expenses shall be paid by the Treasurer, upon the order of the Board, and no money shall be paid out by him except as herein directed.

ARTICLE VIII.—APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

A meeting of the Board of Control shall be held within the first thirty days after the annual Conference adjourns, at which time the following Standing Committees shall be appointed:

1. The Investing Committee, composed of the Treasurer and three laymen who are members of the Board of Control, residing in the city of Muncie.
2. The Auditing Committee, whose duty it shall be to examine reports and such other documents as may be referred to it by the Board.
3. The Disbursing Committee, which shall consist of three members of the annual Conference, and who shall be members of the Society. It shall also be the duty of this Committee, in the interim and during the session of the annual Conference, to obtain what information it can relative to the condition and necessities of claimants on the funds of this Society.

These Committees shall serve until the close of the Conference session subsequent to their appointment.

ARTICLE IX.—THE GENERAL SECRETARY.

The Society, at its regular annual meeting, shall elect a General Secretary, in the same manner it does the other officers of the Society. By virtue of his office he shall be a member of the Board of Control, and shall work under the directions of the Board. The Society, upon recommendation of the Board, shall determine whether the General Secretary is to give his entire time to the work of the Society. It shall determine his salary and provide for its payment, either by a pro rata tax on the membership or by directing the Board of Control to pay it from the funds of the Society. In either case the salary shall be payable in quarterly installments.

All revenues and everything of commercial value that comes into the hands of the General Secretary shall be paid over to the Treasurer, who shall receipt therefor. These reports shall be made quarterly.

ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution, with its accompanying By-Laws, may be changed or amended, at an annual meeting of the Society, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, such changes or amendments having been first recommended by a majority of all the members of the Board of Control.

BY-LAWS.

Section 1. The officers shall perform the same general duties in all meetings of the Board of Control that they do in the meetings of the Society.

Sec. 2. The Secretary shall keep a full and permanent record, in book form, of all the transactions of business both of the Society and the Board of Control. He shall keep in his possession the corporate seal of the Society, all reports made either to the Society or to the Board, and all other important books and papers not belonging to the Treasurer or General Secretary.

Sec. 3. The General Secretary shall keep a list of those who have been granted certificates of life membership, and also a list of those who are in the process of becoming life members. He shall credit them with the payments they make from year to year, charging them six per cent. interest on all deferred payments until paid, this interest to be paid into the fund for disbursement and not the fund for investment. The General Secretary shall make out all certificates for life membership, which shall bear the signature of the President and General Secretary of the Society.

Sec. 4. Any note executed to the Society by any of its members and remaining unpaid, shall be deducted from the allowance made to him, his widow, or children; but neither the Society nor the Board of Control shall have the power to apply the amounts so appropriated to the payment of any other claim.

Sec. 5. The report of the Board of Control to the annual meeting of the Society shall embrace the following items:

1. Total Permanent Fund at last report.
2. Total Permanent Fund at present.

3. Changes explained in detail.
4. Amounts now invested, with kinds of security.
5. Net proceeds reported last year.
6. Net proceeds for the present year.
7. Differences explained in detail.
8. Any other items necessary to complete the exhibit of the financial status of the Society.

SOCIAL AND MORAL QUESTIONS.

Your Committee on Social and Moral Questions present the following report

First—We reaffirm the bugle call in our last year's report and urge upon our people, "from the pulpit and by personal effort in our pastoral calls, the necessity of all attending the social means of grace, especially the class and prayer meetings." We will insist upon our members making the Church and all of her means of grace first in claim of attendance and first in our gifts of money.

We make no war on social or literary organizations, but do insist that the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ has first claim upon affections, attendance and support. The questions asked and answers given when probationers are received into full membership pledges them to a loyalty not to be interfered with by any secret, social or literary organization, but demands the best of their heart, head and hands. The theater, circus, dance and card-playing robs the heart, clouds the brain and paralyzes the hands.

Second—We ask our Epworth Leaguers to take no part in any kind of masked entertainments, and under no circumstances to countenance card-playing or dancing. Have social entertainments, but let them be of such a character that God's blessing can be asked upon the entertainment. Let every member take anew the League pledge of membership and make the twentieth century glorious by holy living and enthusiastic efforts in the work of soul-saving.

The following resolutions were referred to us :

FIRST—ON DIVORCE.

WHEREAS, The granting of divorce for almost any reason is not only an evil but is growing in the State of Indiana, four thousand and thirty-one being granted in 1899 and four thousand six hundred and ninety-nine in 1900, or one-sixth as many divorces granted in 1899 and nearly one-seventh in 1900 as there were marriage licenses issued ; and

WHEREAS, The restrictions about the securing of marriage licenses are so few that many persons are licensed who ought not to marry, and

WHEREAS, Many ministers perform the marriage ceremony for persons divorced on other than Scriptural grounds, be it, therefore,

Resolved, That we, the members of the North Indiana Conference, hereby pledge ourselves to use our influence in all legitimate ways to discourage in every possible manner the granting of divorces for any but Scriptural reasons, and to urge upon our people the necessity of better legislation on this question.

SECOND—PRISON REFORM.

Resolved, That this Conference respectfully requests its ministers, so far as they shall find it possible so to do, to set aside Prison Sunday, October 27, 1901, for the delivery of an appropriate sermon on Prison Reform.

(2), That we urge an offering to be taken in all our charges.

TRACTS.

WHEREAS, The Tract Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church is doing a great evangelical work in distributing annually 11,000,000 pages of tracts in the United States, besides sending \$10,000 to be used in our Foreign Mission stations for religious literature; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we raise the full amount apportioned to our Conference this year.

TEMPERANCE.

2. We congratulate the country on the abolition of the "army canteen." It is an expression of a growing temperance sentiment.

3. The movement to substitute, for the "canteen," legitimate amusement and entertainment quarters we hereby commend and support.

4. We deprecate the attempt of certain secular papers to break down legislation abolishing the "canteen," by misrepresenting the facts at army posts, resulting also in defaming the good name of our soldiers.

5. We most heartily approve the action of those managing all state occasions, such as inaugurals, etc., in which they refuse to entertain with the wine cup and the dance, as being safe in example, and in principle in harmony with the word of God.

6. We affirm our approval of the attitude and indorse the action of the National and State Anti-Saloon League, and all other organized efforts for the suppression of the liquor traffic.

7. We are decidedly of the opinion that the temperance work is of such vital importance as to demand recognition at our Conference session, and hereby order that at our meeting next year an evening be set apart for a grand temperance rally.

WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the North Indiana Conference supports six American missionaries, two assistant missionaries, seventeen native Bible-women, seven famine widows, eighty-one orphans, three Day Schools and the Medical Work in Bareilly, India.

Miss Emma Lamb, for four years our Conference missionary in India, has severed her connection with our Society and is now working independently near Calcutta. We most earnestly pray God to bless her as she continues her work for the salvation of the women of India. In her place, we support Dr Ellen Lyon, who is in charge of the large Hospital for Women and Children in Foochow, China. Many of the patients in the Hospital last year went to their homes believing in Christ. Dr Lyon, accompanied by an evangelistic

worker, makes tours to distant villages and is everywhere gladly received by the Chinese women who need healing of the mind and body.

Miss Isabelle Longstreet, our evangelistic worker in Ming Chiang, China, is supported by Muncie District. Her work was interrupted for a while and she assisted in Japan, but returned to Ming Chiang last month. The anti-foreign element in Ming Chiang were preparing a great reception for her upon her return, and hoped by the firing of many crackers and the presentation of lanterns to prove their repentance for their wrong doing.

Kokomo District sent Dr Margaret Lewis to Bareilly, India, last fall. At the end of two months she reported eight hundred and fifty-three new patients, seven hundred and eighty-seven return patients, twenty-nine hospital patients, many calls made on the sick in the city and one thousand six hundred prescriptions filled. All of this before she could speak the language. Every patient is given instruction from God's Word, and Dr Lewis is anxiously awaiting the time when she can use the language and do personal work with these needy women.

Goshen District has one of her own daughters, Miss Laura Beazell, in Rome, and gladly supports her in the work. Miss Beazell is unusually successful in evangelistic work and finds her time fully taken in trying to have the school girls accept Christ as a personal Saviour.

Fort Wayne District supports Miss Mamie Melton in Nagasaki, Japan. She has charge of the Biblical Department in the College for Girls, and is constantly training and sending out bright young Japanese girls to win Japan for our Lord.

Richmond District has had her heart filled with compassion for the starving children of India and is supporting Miss Charlotte Porter, the Superintendent of the Industrial School for Girls in Telagaon, India. The girls were all rescued from the famine and Miss Porter finds them obedient and anxious to learn. The twenty acres of land and the buildings were given to us by the English government, and, finding the water supply was insufficient, they have recently made provision for a good well and further irrigation of the land—all without any expense to us. Miss Porter hopes more fully to develop the industrial part of the work as the girls grow stronger.

Warsaw District will support Miss Alice Linam, of Leesburg, upon her return to China next August. During her vacation Miss Linam is indefatigable in her efforts to increase the interest in the work and has organized many new societies in the District.

Our Twentieth Century Thank Offering this year is used in the erection of a School for Girls in Cawnpore, India, to be called "The Hudson School for Girls," a small recognition of the faithful services of Mrs C G Hudson, our former Secretary. Knightstown, Union City, Marion, Muncie and Lapel will name rooms in this new building, having given \$100 or more as a Thank Offering this year. Others may do so later.

The total amount raised up to the present time for the Twentieth Century Thank Offering is \$2,949.08, but a large amount is pledged to be paid before

September. The Rev Nelson Gillam, of Richmond, gave us \$200. Thank Offering to be sent to Lucknow, India.

We rejoice in seventeen new societies, but the desire of our hearts is to see every one of the more than twenty-five thousand women in this Conference a working member of our Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

The total amount raised this year is \$8,513.01, a gain of \$459.70, and has been raised by the Districts as follows:

2d, That we will encourage in our pastoral charges in every proper way, both in public and in private, the development and high usefulness of the auxiliaries of the Woman's Foreign and Home Missionary Societies, where such exist, and, where they do not exist, will arrange for and welcome the visitation to our churches of any authorized representatives of either of these societies, who may come with a view of organizing auxiliaries.

3d, That an efficient Conference Board, consisting of nine members, at least four of whom shall be women, be appointed by the Conference to carry out, as far as practicable, the provisions of the Discipline regarding the work of deaconesses among us.

WOMAN'S HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Another year of successful work has been recorded by our Society. Auxiliaries have been organized at Trinity Church, Fort Wayne; LaGrange, Albion, Lynn, Converse, and Locust Grove. Young Ladies' Circles at Marion and Mishawaka, and a Band at South Whitley and Middletown.

We now have 46 Auxiliaries, 10 Circles, 8 Bands. Total membership, 1,767; an increase of 264.

Besides the membership dues, which is one dollar a year, we have paid \$400.00, the salary of Miss Flora Mitchel, Superintendent of Thayer Home, Atlanta, Ga.; \$20.00 on salary of Missionary at Kinsey, Ala. Warsaw supports a child in Mothers' Jewells Home, York, Neb; Marion, a girl in Ritter Home; Goshen District, one in Bennett Home; Knightstown, one in Thayer Home. Contributions have been sent to Marcy Home, Chicago; to Browning, New Jersey; Harwood and the E L Rust Homes. Also, to Deaconess' work in Utah; Immigrant work at our seaports; to Jewitt, New Mexico; to Alaska, Hawaii, and Porto Rico. Three hundred dollars has been paid toward the support of the Deaconess' work of our own State. Making a total Special Fund of \$1,646.65.

Most all of the Auxiliaries have paid their full apportionments to these special funds.

During the year, quite an amount of our Twentieth Century Thank Offering has been raised.

One hundred and fifty dollars has been subscribed and partially paid, for naming a room in our new "Rust Hall," at Washington, D C, to be known as the "Elizabeth Bunyan Room, North Indiana Conference." Mishawaka has also named a room and a window in this building.

Most of the Auxiliaries have increased their membership; a number have placed their names on the "Roll of Honor." Middletown and Wolcottville deserve special mention, having doubled their membership.

The hearts of our women have been made happy while their hands have been busy, preparing garments for the boxes and barrels they have sent to our heroic ministers and their families on the frontier.

We are planning that this, the first year of the New Century, shall be one of unusual activity in the cause of Home Missions in our (North Indiana) Conference.

Mrs M W Bass, of New York, one of the General Organizers, is to be with us for two months, and we are praying that great success may attend her efforts, and that next year we may be able to report an Auxiliary in every charge in the Conference.

CONSTITUTION OF THE MUTUAL RELIEF SOCIETY OF THE
NORTHERN INDIANA CONFERENCE.

AS AMENDED APRIL 12, 1901.

ARTICLE I.

This society shall be called the Mutual Relief Society of the North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

ARTICLE II.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually, and shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE III.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Society; but if he be absent, the Vice-President shall preside; and if they should both be absent, then the Society shall elect a President pro tem.

ARTICLE IV.

The Secretary shall keep a record of the names of the members of the Society, and accurate minutes of its proceedings, and shall give notice in our Church papers of the death of any member of the Society, as soon as it is made known to him.

ARTICLE V.

The Treasurer shall receive and pay out all moneys belonging to the Society as follows: When there are three or more deaths in any one year the money on hand shall be equally divided between the claimants on account of the deaths occurring that year; provided that in no case shall there be paid on any claim a sum larger than one-third of the amount received that year; and provided further, that the amount paid to any claimant shall not exceed \$800.

ARTICLE VI.

Each member of the Society shall be required to pay annually as follows: First, all salaried men shall pay a sum equal to two per cent. of cash received, and where salaries are reported for the minutes such report shall be the basis. Second, all unsalaried men shall pay annually two per cent. of their income. The amount, however, shall not exceed \$15.

ARTICLE VII.

Any member who shall forfeit his ministerial standing in the Conference, either by expulsion or withdrawal, shall forfeit his membership in this Society, and his heirs shall have no claim upon the funds thereof.

Should any member of the Society die without leaving a widow or children, and also die intestate, there shall be no claim upon the funds of this Society because of such death; but any member of this Society may bequeath, by will, his interest in the funds thereof.

ARTICLE VIII.

This Society shall hold its annual meetings for the election of officers and the transaction of business, at the time and place of the session of the annual Conference.

ARTICLE IX.

Members who are unable to pay assessments at Conference, and thereby forfeit their membership, wishing to retain their membership, shall give their notes, payable within ninety days, and upon payment thereof at or before maturity, they shall be restored to membership. Provided, that any member giving his note shall be entitled to all the benefits of the Society during the time for which the note is given; but should he die before the note is paid, payment shall be made on said note out of his benefits.

ARTICLE X.

The officers of this Society shall serve without compensation from the funds thereof. Current expenses to be paid by collection.

ARTICLE XI.

Any layman or minister may become an honorary member of this association by subscribing to the Constitution, but shall have no claims on the funds of the Society; they only desiring to benefit the ministers and their families, and agreeing to pay the sum of five dollars annually to the Treasurer of this association.

ARTICLE XII.

Members of this Society shall not forfeit any of their rights, claims or privileges in consequence of a transfer to any other conference or by location; provided, they shall continue to comply with the requirements of this Constitution.

ARTICLE XIII.

All questions relating to forfeiture of, or restoration to, membership, all claims upon the Society, which may be in question, and all questions relating to the interpretation of the Constitution, shall be referred to the Executive Committee, consisting of the officers of the Society and three senior members, to be appointed by the chair; and all facts, papers, statements or representations shall go to the committee without discussion, and the action thereon by said committee shall be final, when reported to the Society.

ARTICLE XIV.

Any member of this Society, having forfeited his membership on account of non-payment of dues, shall not be re-instated until all dues have been paid.

ARTICLE XV.

Hereafter no preacher shall be permitted to join or be restored to membership in this association who is over forty-five years of age, or who shall have neglected to join for five years after he has been admitted into full membership in this Conference.

ARTICLE XVI.

No preacher shall be permitted to join this Society except during the session of the annual Conference, and no one shall be permitted to withdraw from the Society except by private notice to the Secretary during the Conference session.

ARTICLE XVII.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting of the Society; notice of the proposed change having been submitted in writing to the Executive Committee and recommended by them for action.

OBITUARY.

REV. HENRY A. DAVIS.



Rev Henry A Davis was born near Greentown, Ind, April 9, 1855, and fell asleep in Jesus in Marshall, Texas, April 20, 1900, aged forty-five years. He was united in marriage to Alice Fifer, September 18, 1878. Six children have been born to them. Four-- Fred, Ward, Beulah and Eva--are living; two-- Gracie and Maud--died when quite young. He united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1884, but was not converted until 1885 in a meeting held in Greentown by Rev L E Knox and Miss Kate Leebrick. The summer of the same year he experienced the blessing of perfect love. Soon after his conversion he was called to preach. He was licensed to preach in 1885, served as a supply one

year, and was received on trial in the North Indiana Conference at Marion, April, 1887. He passed his studies with credit, and was ordained Deacon at Lagrange by Bishop Edward G Andrews, April 7, 1889. He was ordained Elder at Huntington by Bishop I W Joyce, April 5, 1891. He served the following charges: Jolietville, as supply, one year (here he built a church); New Waverly, two years; Wheatland Street, Logansport, four years, where he built a parsonage and church; Red Key, two years, where he built a parsonage; Alexandria, three years; Marion, First Church, nearly two years, where he laid down his labors to soon receive his reward. After his appointment to the latter Church he said to his wife, "I am for the second time on trial in Marion." As a preacher he was logical, systematic and eloquent. Soon after his conversion he espoused the cause of temperance and prohibition, and was known as a prohibition preacher. In these convictions he never wavered, but they grew stronger until death. His last address to the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Marion was a powerful appeal for temperance and prohibition. On account of failing health he was compelled, though reluctantly, to give up his work. His Official Board kindly relieved him of his work the latter part of January last, and continued his salary and relation as pastor of the Church until Conference. In an effort to regain his health, he started for El Paso, Texas. While there he suffered a severe attack of la grippe, which greatly aggravated his disease. Despairing of any benefit from this change of climate, he started home April 13th. He grew rapidly worse, and was compelled to leave the train at Marshall, near the eastern line of Texas. On the train and at Marshall loving hands and newly-made friends rendered every assistance possible. He had the best medical care, hotel accommodations, and ministerial comfort. Mrs Davis, his wife, who has been his com-

panion in much suffering, and has done much to relieve and comfort him, hastened to his bedside. Her presence probably was known, but he could speak but little to her. At last the end came. After nearly a week of intense suffering, the silver cord was severed, and Henry had rest with the redeemed, the angels, and God. Before starting West, he said, "The gospel I have preached to others has not failed me." On being asked by an attendant what he thought about dying, he replied: "O, that is all right. Nothing is in the way. I do not want anything, unless it would be to see my family, and that if it is the Lord's will. If not, it is all right." A lady attendant said to him, "I fear the trains, which run so near the hotel, disturb you." He replied, "Yes; but the blessings are so much greater." Thus with great suffering, yet in the midst of greater blessings, he ended his work on earth and went to his reward in heaven.

The remains were brought from Marshall, Texas, by Mrs Davis, to St Louis, where she was met by Rev C E Parsons, of Ninth Street M E Church, who had been sent by their many friends to accompany them to Marion. There the casket was taken to the home of Mrs E Hully, where the remains lay in state until Sunday afternoon, when they were conveyed to the First M E Church, Marion, where a brief service was conducted by the pastors of the city, assisted by Rev C E Line, of Alexandria. After the services the remains were taken to Greentown, Ind, where the funeral services were conducted by the pastor, J F Radcliffe, assisted by a number of the brethren. Beautiful wreaths were sent from Alexandria, Marshall, Texas, where he died, and from Marion. His remains were laid away in the cemetery at Greentown.

SARAH STINSON McCARTER.



Sarah A Stinson was born in Pike county, Ohio, February 26, 1838. She was the daughter of Jacob and Sarah Stinson, who moved to Indiana and settled in Kosciusko county when she was only six months old. When very young she was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, joining Gilead class, a preaching point near her home, but which has long since given way to Morris Chapel, now a part of the North Webster Charge. June 17, 1858, she was married to the Rev A G McCarter, a young preacher who was serving in his first pastorate, and of which Sister McCarter was a member. With her husband she took up the arduous duties of the pastorate in the following charges:

LaGro, Leesburg, Fishersburg, Castleton, Albany, Middletown, Castleton (again), Columbia City, and Coesse. Then they were superannuated one year,

after which came the following appointments: Silver Lake, North Webster, Bourbon, Muncie Circuit, Dunkirk, Markle, and Arcola. After this service, Brother McCarter was superannuated, and he and his family took up their future home on a portion of the old Stinson homestead, where they continued to live, Brother McCarter dying January 8, 1899, and Sister McCarter, August 28, 1900. Sister McCarter was sick but a few days, and in a brief time passed into unconsciousness, but her faith was founded on her Savior, and she had no preparation to make. She was ready, even for so sudden a call. Three sons and two daughters, all her children, remain, an honor to the precious memory of their parents, which they prize more than earthly inheritance. The funeral services were held at her late residence, and were conducted by the Rev C King, of Warsaw, assisted by the Rev C H Wilkinson, of Pierceton, and the Rev George H Kemp, of North Webster. A large concourse of friends showed their appreciation of her life and character by attending, and by carefully laying away the remains to await the final summons to immortality.

JOHN WESLEY LEWELLEN.



As the "Angels of Dawn" heralded the morning light of June 21st, 1900, the spirit of John W Lewellen took its flight from all that was mortal, to take up its abode with the redeemed hosts of heaven. The whispers of loved ones in the death chamber reverberated in louder expressions among neighbors and distant friends, that a good man had fallen.

Brother Lewellen was born in Randolph county, Indiana, near the place now called Parker City, September 8th, 1845, of very worthy parentage, being at his death 54 years, 9 months and 13 days of age. He was brought up on the farm, devoting his time during the summer months to farm labor, and attending district school in winter, until at the age of sixteen years, he became an apprentice for an uncle in the business of wagon making. He remained in this occupation until the autumn of 1864, when he enlisted, with some of his comrades, in the service of his country. Toward the close of the rebellion, he did military duty in the Twenty-second Indiana Infantry, serving to the close of the war; receiving an honorable discharge, was mustered out of the service in April, 1865.

In the month of September, 1867, he entered Indiana Asbury University, at Greencastle, and pursued a special course in that institution. This was a step preparatory to the plan which was gradually developing in his life-work. He was converted in his seventeenth year, and proved his consecration by his

activity in church work. In the capacity of trustee, Sabbath school superintendent, and class-leader, he served the church as a loyal follower of the God he loved; and at the age of twenty-two he was licensed as an exhorter, and one year later as a local preacher. He did not fail to exercise his gifts and graces in this capacity, for such he truly possessed, until in 1871 he was admitted into the traveling connection in the North Indiana Conference, receiving his first appointment to Elwood, as Junior preacher. He then served the following charges: Hartford City, Jonesboro, Perrysburg, LaGro, Bourbon. At the close of the last named pastorate he received a Supernumerary relation, because of vocal disabilities. Soon after he removed to his farm in Delaware county, Indiana, where he spent the remainder of his life.

In March, 1874, he was united in marriage to Miss Minerva Watson. To them were born five children — three sons and two daughters. The youngest, a daughter, died in early childhood. The widow and four children survive him.

Brother Lewellen was a preacher of unusual ability — earnest, logical, spiritual. As a pastor, he was popular in his charges among all classes. As a revivalist, he was very successful, his labor being rewarded with the conversion of many souls. His years of supernumerary relation were full of usefulness. His pastor had a warm friend and worthy supply, while adjoining charges eagerly sought him for quarterly meetings and special occasions. He was a willing, patient sufferer, but desired his Father's will to be done, and peacefully fell asleep, to waken on the resurrection morn.

AMANDA MILLER WONES.



Amanda Miller Wones, daughter of Dayton and Mary E Miller, and wife of Rev W R Wones, of the North Indiana Conference, was born near Dayton, Ohio, October 18, 1849, and died at her home in Wolcottville, Ind, July 22, 1900, in the fifty-first year of her age. At the age of nine years, her father died, and a year later she was bereft of her mother. One effect of this early loss and sorrow was to unseal the fountains of sympathy for all whom in later years she found in like distress. On January 2, 1868, she was married to W R Wones. Sister Wones was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1870. In 1876 she entered upon the labors of the Methodist itineracy, her husband uniting that

year with the North Indiana Conference. She was in thorough sympathy with her companion in his work, and though of a naturally timid and reserved disposition, she accepted cheerfully and discharged with fidelity the duties

imposed upon her. She was for twenty-three years an active member of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, and in this, as in all other Christian work with which she was identified as the wife of a pastor, rendered important service. On eight different charges, covering a period of twenty-four years, she proved herself a true helpmeet to her husband. She never failed to win the respect and love of those who knew her, and she was most highly esteemed by those who knew her most intimately. Though ill for nearly three years, she bore her sufferings with great fortitude and patience. To the last her interest and solicitude in her husband's work were unfailing; often saying, when it seemed to him that his place was at her sick-bed, "Go and do your work; it will be all right with me." Only on the last Sabbath of her life here, when her companion said, "I am not going to leave you to-day," did she enter no protest, but smiled a happy response, glad that in her last hours they might be together. For some months before her departure all hope of recovery had failed. She lingered, however, in much suffering, with strong and submissive faith, until the Master's call was heard, and she passed quietly and triumphantly into the heavenly home. Short services were held at the home in Wolcottville, on the Tuesday following the Sabbath of her death, after which her remains were taken to her childhood home, near Dalton, Ohio, where funeral services were conducted by Rev George H Hill, D D, assisted by the resident pastor, in the presence of a large gathering of the old friends of the deceased and her husband.

JULIA WELLS NASH.



Julia Wells Nash was born in Trumbull, now Mahoning county, Ohio, December 5th, 1818, and died at her home in Monroeville, Allen county, Indiana, December 1st, 1900, aged 82 years, 11 months and 6 days. She was married to the Rev John P Nash, April 9th, 1840. She was the third child of a family of eight children, and being of a robust constitution, she was called upon in her early girlhood to assist her father in the field and forest. As a result of the time spent in this out-door labor, she did not have many educational advantages, but her vigorous and active mind enabled her to greatly overcome this misfortune. In early life she gave herself to the Lord, and lived her long life with devotion to

the Lord's cause in the Methodist Episcopal Church, the church of her early choice. Twenty years of her life were spent with her husband in the itinerant

ministry. In the later years of her life she passed through great affliction, being seldom free from pain. She was the mother of four children, two of whom long since preceded her to the spirit land — one in infancy ; the other, a soldier, died in hospital during the civil war, and was buried in the national cemetery at Charlotte, North Carolina. The other two are still living, and were present at their mother's death to minister to her in her last moments.

Our sister was a kind spirit, cheerful, hopeful, always planning for the comfort of those about her. She was devoted to her family, affectionate and loving. At a ripe old age she has passed to her heavenly reward. Her husband, with two children, are left to mourn their loss, but feeling what is loss to them is gain to her.

The funeral services were conducted by her pastor, Rev O S Harrison, and her remains were laid to rest in the Odd Fellows' Cemetery, near Monroeville, Indiana. "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord."
