A communication from the Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was received, read and referred to the Board of Church Extension.

Question 20 was called, viz.: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration ?"

The name of T. J. Gattis was called, and W. H. Moore said: "There is nothing against Brother Gattis, except complications involved in his law-suit against Dr. Kilgo and others, which suit is still pending. With this explanation, and in accordance with the action of this Conference for four years past. I suggest that his character pass for the present." Whereupon his character was passed, and, on motion, his name was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a superannuated relation.

Charles Martin Lance and Samuel Freeman Nicks, of the Durham District; Charles Alexander Jones, Fayetteville District; John W. Hoyle, Rockingham District; William Richard Royall and Valerius Addison Royall, Wilmington District; Duncan Ajah Futrell, Washington District; Robert Eugene Hunt, Warrenton District, and William Oscar Davis, Elizabeth City District; having been recommended by their respective District Conferences and approved by the Committees on Admissions and Examination for Admission on Trial, were admitted on trial.

On motion of W. S. Rone, the motion of F. D. Swindell that when we adjourn this morning we do so to meet tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, was reconsidered.

On motion of W. S. Rone, it was ordered that when the Conference adjourns that it do so to meet at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon

At 1:15 o'clock p. m. the Conference adjourned, with the benediction by Rev. A. F. Watkins, D.D.

FOURTH DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

SATURDAY, November 28, 1903.

The Conference opened at 3:30 o'clock, Rev. E. A. Yates, D. D., in the chair.

The opening religious services were conducted by Rev. N. E. Coltrane.

The Journal of the morning session was read and approved.

F. L. Church submitted and read the report of the Committee on Temperance, which was adopted. (Document No. 8 of Appendix.)

B. H. Black submitted and read the report of the Committee on the Bible Cause, which was adopted. (Document No. 9 of Appendix.)

W. B. Cooper submitted and read the report of the Sunday School Board, which was adopted. (Document No. 10 of Appendix.)

On motion of N. H. D. Wilson, it was ordered that when

the Conference adjourns this afternoon it do so to meet to-morrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock for the Memorial Services.

Question 45 was called, viz.: "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?"

J. D. Bundy presented an invitation from the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Henderson, for the Conference to hold its next session with that Church.

R. C. Beaman presented an invitation from Trinity Church, Durham, for the Conference to hold its next session with that church. After the vote was had, and a majority had voted to accept the invitation from Henderson, R. C. Beaman withdrew the invitation from Trinity Church, and moved to make unanimous the vote to accept the invitation from the Henderson church, and this was done.

On motion of J. C. Kilgo, Rev. J. R. Scroggs, D. D., of the Western North Carolina Conference, was requested to present to this Conference the action of the Western North Carolina Conference regarding the ownership and control of the Trinity College property in Randolph County.

J. W. Jenkins moved the appointment of a Committee to confer with a committee that had been appointed by the Western North Carolina Conference regarding this property.

On motion of E. Pope this motion was laid on the table.

Q. K. Nimocks submitted and read the report of the Joint Board of Finance, which was accepted. (Document No. 11 of Appendix.)

The funds for the Conference claimants were distributed in open Conference.

At 5:10 o'clock the Conference adjourned, with benediction by Rev. E. A. Yates, D. D.

# APPENDIX.

# MEMOIR OF REV. B. R. HALL,

Benjamin Robinson Hall, the eldest son of Henry G. and Emily B. Hall, was born in Fayetteville, N. C., September the 25th, 1851. His boyhood was spent for the most part at Beaver Creek, seven miles from his birthplace, where he passed through the trying times attending civil war and reconstruction days.

After receiving preparatory training at a school in Petersburg, Va., and the Bingham School, this State, he entered Trinity College, where he graduated in 1875. On December 3rd of the same year he was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference, convened at Wilmington, Bishop H. N. McTyeire presiding. In 1877 he was admitted into full connection, and was ordained deacon by Bishop D. S. Doggett; and two years later was ordained elder by Bishop W. M. Wightman.

He was married April 27th, 1876, to Miss Fannie Olivia Stedman. To them were born six children, four of whom, with the grief-stricken mother, still live.

Airy District; 1889, 1890, 1891, 1892, appointed to St. Paul's Station, Goldsboro; 1893, 1894, appointed to Trinity Station, Durham; 1895, 1896, 1897, 1898, appointed Presiding Elder Washington District; 1899, 1900, 1901, 1902, appointed Presiding Elder Fayetteville District.

The above is but the briefest outline of the career of a great man, whose life is worthy of study and admiration.

In his younger days he must have been a magnificent type of physical manhood, and so say those who knew him then. Nature endowed him with buoyant energy, which sought an outlet in impassioned speech in the pulpit, and bubbled over with fine wit and humour in the social circle. With all men his manner was easy; sufficiently dignified among learned and cultured when occasion demanded, yet readily adjusted to the demands of good fellowship among those in a lower sphere. It is no wonder, therefore, that he was a welcome visitor to the mansion of the affluent, or the hut of the poor. Among all classes and conditions of men his friends were legion.

Intellectually strong, he was a student, but rather of men than books. He could not long remain within the limits of a small room, with only the printed page before him; he must be among men, and study life in its various phases. There he was a master. Only give him this humanity as a text-book, and his eye caught every expression of face and figure, and his ear recognized the most delicate overtones of every symphony from the harp of life whether it were comic, pathetic, or tragic. Indeed, all nature, to him, with open volume stood and spread

her Maker's praise abroad. Upon bird and beast, tree and flower, field and forest he laid tribute for analogy and illustration. The strength of his preaching lay largely in these two things: a familiarity with the workings of nature, and an understanding of humanity as known through its activities. In dissecting character, his keen knife penetrated to the dividing of joints, and mercilessly laid open rottenness and corruption.

His pulpit ministrations, possessing such practical and closely discriminating qualities, always deeply impressed the thinking men of a community. The sermons he preached were made on the streets, in the homes of his people, or while travelling the public highways; hence, they were strikingly realistic. He spent little time in theorizing on disputed points of theology. Religion and theology, apart from action, were dead letters to him, and were left undisturbed.

As a presiding Elder he was able, and had the faculty of getting at the kernel of matters with which he had to deal, and of knowing the personality of his district. Few men could find out what a church needed more quickly than could he.

Personally, he was a man possessing to an unusual degree what is known as magnetism, which attracted to him hosts of friends who admired and loved him to the end. Love and fidelity to his friends were striking characteristics of his nature, and in behalf of those he loved he was ever a mailed knight, ready to do battle. Infidelity to friends, and hypocrisy, were in his eyes the highest crimes of which men could be guilty.

The energy of his nature—of heart, body, and soul—swept him like a hurricane through life, and he was old before his time. At fifty-two, he had lived an hundred years, measured by the lives of many. After a severe attack of illness while on the Washington District, he never fully regained his virility of body and mind. Gradually the last enemy gained on him, till at our last Conference many a prophetic eye saw the end was near. After returning from Conference he was able to do but little effective work.

This writer was with him the day before the call came. His mind was clearer than it had been for weeks, and he spoke with the calm resignation of one who was not afraid to launch on the wild sea of death. He had confidence in the Pilot. Before the morning of February 20th dawned, he had anchored in a quiet harbor. "and not a wave of trouble rolled across his peaceful breast." T. A. Smoor.

#### MEMOIR OF REV. J. W. WALLACE.

John William Wallace was born at Magnolia, in Duplin county, N. C., July 21, 1870, and was the son of J. P. and Sarah M. Wallace. He was converted and joined the church under the ministry of the writer of this sketch at Wilson, N. C., in February, 1889. With his conversion came his call to preach. His education was very limited. This was due to two causes: first, his

parents were of the "humble poor," and hence could not give the mental training; second, his eye-sight was defective, and he could use books only in day-light—the hours that had to be used in he ping to support the family. But a call to preach meant to him, as to all rightly guided ones, a call for preparation to preach. The esteem in which he was held in the church at Wilson made it an easy matter to secure for him the means necessary to neet the expenses of training in the ordinary branches of an English education at Trinity College (old Trinity as we now call it). He made the best possible use of his opportunities. His was a meek, quiet, child-like spirit. Not ashamed of the little learning he had for one of his age, but being hungry to know, he was willing to ask questions that he might know, even though the asking was humiliating to him. After his conversion, and while at work in the cotton mills, he gave a l the time he could so utilize in the study of such books as would be helpful to him in preparing to preach. He would come often to me saying: "Brother Tuttle, will you give me a little help by answering a few questions?" The physical defect in vision had more than compensation in tenacity of memory, and a truth once in the grasp of his mind was his forever-his to be used, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit that baptized and filled him for the glory of God in the gospel he preached. He was licensed to preach in the summer of 1892, while assisting the writer on Tarboro Station and Mission, and was admitted on trial at the session of our Conference held in December of the same year in Goldsboro, N. C. He was ordained deacon, and admitted into full connection by Bishop Wilson at Durham, December, 1894. and by the same was ordained Elder at Kinston in December, 1896. From August to December, 1892, he served as supply the Snow Hill Circuit. His appointments, unsought and cheerfully accepted, were as follows: 1892, Washington Circuit; 1893, Core Sound Mission; 1894-95, Prospect Circuit; 1896-97, Red Springs Circuit: 1898, Magnolia Circuit: 1901-02, Buckhorn Circuit. Tэ these six fields, white unto harvest, he went in the true spirit of itinerant consecration, and in them all won souls for his Lord and Master. In each of them he diligently sowed the "good which is the "word of God," and will accomplish the seed" thing whereunto it was sent. It was his duty to preach the Word, and he did it. As to the result, he prayerfully, and without anxiety, left all with God.

As a man. What shall I say of him? To know a man you should live under the same roof with him. This I never did but he lived for awhile under my roof, and thus I lived a little nearer to him' than others of his brethren. As the breath of springtime, so was his genial spirit. For all public duties of his holy calling he seemed girded with gentleness, and bound friends to himse'f with cords that never broke or chafed. At no time or place was he a masked man, but the sincere inwardness and perfect transparency always appeared. He could in any company talk naturally and easily of daily experiences in religion, and draw out the experiences of others. He was a "succorer of many" in that he could encourage the timid and with inspiring words cheer the discouraged, often lifting up those who were cast

down. His was not the habit of the trifler, though often his joyial spirit bubbled up and flooded with desight the encircling company. His heart was tender and responsive in practical effort to every call of need or sorrow. He was a man of contented spirit; in looking back he never fretted; in looking forward, hope's sunshine left no place for worry. Now while the bereaved companion lifts the veil, let us take a glimpse of our departed brother in the home circ.e. She says: "We have lived together a little more than four years. Mr. Wallace was a devoted husband, a loving father, and above all a true Christian. Only the night before he died he asked me to read the first Psalm, and he lay on his bed and led our family prayer." Such was the man in whose memory I write. As a preacher, what shall I write of him? If there was a place where he was not acceptable in the pulpit this writer has not learned of it. His powers were at easy command, and his mental machinery, which worked without friction, could be set in motion or stopped at any time or in any place without hesitation or confusion. He was strictly biblical in his sermonizing. Being afflicted with defective vision he could not indulge in the close study that makes one sharply critical, but he was sufficiently so to furnish an exact foundation for his sermons. The Bible was his book, and from it through the ear as much if not more than the eye he gathered its truths for meditation during the hours when he could not read or was alone. Accordingly he took the sifted findings of prayerful meditation to his congregations in Scriptural mould, tone and flavor. He was truly a Gospel preacher. There is a kind of preaching that is much from the Bible and yet has but little Gospel in it. One may even handle Gospel themes and get but little saving truth to his hearers. The Gospel came from Brother Wallace, not as sounding brass, but in the power of fervent love. He preached a full salvation through the death of Christ, receivable by faith and entirely without works of merit. He had no new views of saving truth, but contentedly and faithfully adhered to the old time Bible revelation of the need of sinful man and the complete cure for sin in Christ.

Our brother was twice married: First to Miss Georgia Estelle Jones, of Pitt county. March 7, 1894. To them one child, Eula, was born. She will make her home with her grandmother in Fitt county. He was married the second time to Miss Hallie Ruth Covington, of Scotland county, November 23, 1898. By this union there are three children.

For two years his health had been failing. He attended our 'ast Conference but went home to heaven February 17, 1903. His sufferings of body were very severe, but his patience had its perfect work, and in sweet submission he awaited God's righteous will. A few days before death he called his wife to his bedside and said. "Mama, dear, do you know I am standing almost on the brink of the other world? I have been mighty sick, but it won't be but a little while. I hate to leave you, but we will soon be together again." He was a pastor to the last; only the day before his death he wrote a pastoral letter to the members of his charge, beautiful in diction and spirit. His body awaits the resurrection of the just from his newly-made grave at Cokes-

bury, N. C., where the funeral services were conducted by Rev. T. N. Ivey, D.D., on February 19, 1903. On the neat monument that marks his quiet resting place is the following inscription: "Sacred to the memory of Rev. J. W. Wallace, born July 21, 1870. Died February 17, 1903. Age 32 years, 6 months, 26 days.

> Silently, peacefully, angels have borne him Into the beautiful mansions above. Free from earth's toilings forever. Safe in the arms of the God he loved.

# MEMOIR OF REV. LAFAYETTE JOHNSON.

The Rev. LaFayette Johnson was born February 18th, 1871. He was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South, in early manhood. Soon after his conversion he felt called to the ministry of the Gospel, and began to make preparation for his life work. Having obtained the rudiments of an education, he spent some time as a student at Trinity College. He was licensed to preach at a session of the Washington District Conference held at Nashville in 1900, and at the Annual Conference of the same year, held at New Bern, he was admitted into this Conference on trial; and was appointed to serve Campbellton and Rose Chapel charges. Fayetteville District for 1901 and 1902. He was married to Miss Virginia Windley, September, 1902. His health having failed, he was relieved of work at the Conference held at Wilmington in 1902.

His connection with the Conference was short, but he gave evidence of deep and earnest consecration, and entered joyfully into his loved employment, as long as he was able to work.

The last months of his life were spent in deep affliction, which he bore with Christian fortitude and submission to the will of God.

While it seems strange to us that one so young and with a future so full of promise should be so soon cut down, yet we know that our heavenly Father who holds our lives in His hands makes no mistakes; and believing in His special providence over us all, we believe it is well with our young brother, who had hardly entered the battle, when he was called from the conflict and strife of an earthly ministry to the rest and reward of heaven. No faithful servant of our Lord can die an untimely death, for they are immortal until their work is done. We are glad to believe that we are represented in heaven by our brethren of all ages, and they are waiting to greet us on our arrival.

While we sorrow for our loss of their companionship and helpful lives, we rejoice in hope of meeting them again when the battle of life is over.

Brother Johnson lived well, and died in the blessed hope of everlasting life. L. L. NASH.

## MEMOIR OF REV. A. R. GOODCHILD.

Arthur Robert Goodchild was born in London, England, October 15, 1856, and died in the Methodist Episcopal Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, April 8, 1903. His was the goodly heritage of a pious ancestry. His father was a Wesleyan Methodist preacher and his mother a devoted Christian, who was during the latter years of her life a class-leader of City Roads Church, London. An uncle of his was a missionary in South Africa, where he died, a brother is now a Methodist preacher in Manchester, England, and a cousin a missionary in the West Indies.

Brother Goodchild's father died when he was only eight years of age, and the care and training of the children devolved wholly upon his mother. And well did she perform the task. This son was converted in his fourteenth year and joined City Roads Church. He was educated in London and at Oxford. He was licensed to preach when eighteen. After his mother's death, and while still a young man, he came to America, and was living in Watertown, New York, in 1886, where he married Millie Frances Fry Eaves, a greatgranddaughter of Elizabeth Fry, one of England's most noted reformers and philanthropists. Soon after his marriage Brother Goodchild was called to secretaryship of the Young Men's Christian Association in Petersburg, Virginia. In 1889 he joined the Virginia Conference in Richmond, and, till his death belonged to the itinerant ranks of Southern Methodism. While a member of the Virginia Conference, his work was in Spottsylvania, Petersburg and Suffolk. In 1894 he was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and in this Conference served the following charges, viz: Bertie Circuit, Northampton Circuit, Littleton Circuit, Bertie Circuit (second time), and Southport Station. In all these places he left the memory of a good name, the record of a guileless Christian life and faithful preacher and pastor. His appointment to Southport was in December, 1901. He entered early upon his labors, which gave promise of great success, but the stealthy approach of an incurable disease (locomotor ataxia), soon rendered him incapable of pastoral work. He continued to preach, however, even after it became necessary for him to be carried to the Church and for him to preach from his chair. In the early spring of 1902 he had to desist from that, and preached no more. He remained in Southport during the year, and by his patience in great suffering, his cheerfulness, and his implicit child-like faith, won the hearts of the people to him, and showed forth the beauty of holiness and the power of the grace of God in his great adversity. His people sought no other pastor, but abounded in the grace of ministering to him.

At the meeting of our Conference in December, 1902, he was put on the superannuate list. He was then completely helpless, but hoped that he might be cured. He went to the Methodist Hospital in Brooklyn as the last hope of relief. This came only with the loosing of the silver cord, and the return of his spirit to God who gave it. He sleeps in Windsor, North Carolina, by the side of little Gwendolen, his daughter and only child, whom he laid to rest there two summers before.

Brother Goodchild was a man of good mental training. He was a lover of books and used them well. He was a careful and accurate student of the Bible. His preaching was simple, clear, practical, Scriptural. His thoughts were presented in a smooth attractive style. They partook of his own nature, and had the power of the sun, rather than of the storm. In character he Double-dealing was impossible to him. was transparent. He was as unsuspecting as a child, and the confidence he gave, he During his last sickness he suffered much, but he was ever won. cheerful, and when not in severe pain, happy. The grace of our Lord Jesus failed him not. He often quoted the precious prom-uses, and gave assurances of God's sustaining power. When near the end, he said, "It pays to live right." And again, "The Savior whom I have tried to serve so long is so very near to me now." Of him may well be said, "Blessed are the pure in heart." R. B. JOHN.

#### MEMOIR OF REV. BERNICE B. CULBRETH.

Bernice B. Culbreth, a servant of Jesus Christ, separated unto the Gospel of God, and a faithful soldier in Methodism's itinerant hosts, died at his home in Cary, N. C., May 12, 1903.

He was born near Owensville, Sampson County, November 6, 1835. He failed to measure the allotted span of life, yet in his life there was a rich fulness, which can not be expressed in terms of days and months and years.

The following is the record of his labors. It tells only of a humble Methodist preacher whose highest ambition it was to work wisely and faithfully for the salvation of human souls. It recounts the labors which, in fulness, rarely belong to lives of even three-score years and ten.

Entered Conference in 1859; 1860 served New Bern Circuit; 1861-2 served Columbia Circuit; 1863 served Stokes Circuit; 1864 served Contentnea Circuit; 1865 served Wilson Circuit; 1866-7 served Duplin Circuit; 1868 served Magnolia Circuit; 1869 served Cape Fear Circuit; 1870-1 served Jonesboro Circuit; 1872 served Williamston Circuit; 1873-4 acted as Agent of Trunity College; 1875 served Wadesboro Circuit; 1876-7 served Washington Station; 1878 served Lenoir Circuit; 1879 served La Grange Circuit; 1830-81-2-3 served Cary Circuit; 1884 served Smithfield Circuit; 1885 served Laurinburg Circuit; 1886-7 served South Edgecombe Circuit: 1888 served Weldon and Halifax Station; 1889 served Rocky Mount and Battleboro; 1890-1 served Warren Circuit; 1892-3 served Tar River Circuit; 1894 served Lumberton Circuit; 1895 served Sampson Circuit; 1896 served Keuly Circuit; 1897-8 served Bethel Station; 1899 served Bladen St., Wilmington; 1900 served Cape Fear Circuit; 1901 served Deep River Circuit; 1902 served Wilson Circuit: 1903 served Durham City Mission and Buckhorn Circuit.

It is thus seen that as an itinerant preacher he traversed the whole State from the Blue Ridge to the Atlantic Ocean. He had, perhaps, a wider acquaintance than any other preacher in North Carolina of like age.

While the mental endowments of Bernice Culbrech were not striking, yet they were not less than strong. He was an educated man. He graduated at Trinity (then Normal) College in 1858, and was thereafter deeply interested in the cause of Christian education.

No one was able to be long in the company of Bernice Culbreth without becoming conscious of the fact that his chief endowment was of a spiritual kind. He loved to talk of God and His Son, Jesus Christ. His presence exhaled a spiritual aroma. His soul carried the glow caught from a shining face on the mountain top. It is not strange that he had unusual aspirations for the very highest life attainable in the economy of grace. He made no professions which lacked a foundation in the white virtues of a consecrated life. His spiritual temperament was that of the mystic with martial longings. He would have made a beautiful ideal of a soldier in the hosts of the Crusaders.

There were several circumstances which rendered spiritual his whole trend and cast. He had a spiritual ancestry. He was the son of Love Culbreth and Martha Owen. The former was a faithful preacher of the Gospel. The latter was one of Solomon's wise women. He had three uncles who were preachers of usefulness and influence: Blackman, Gray, and Daniel Culbreth. He was converted at an early age, and the evening glow of his religious experience carried the beauty of the dawn. The mellowness of the harvest retained the freshness of the planting. The faith born in childhood carried childhood's simplicity and trust into the very shadows of life's twilight. He was converted in a meeting held in old Union Church, a log meeting-house, when religious experience was perhaps more greatly magnified than at the present time. The new birth was an emphatic reality in his life. All these circumstances helped to make Bernice Culbreth an intensely spiritual man—an intensely happy He rioted in the very joy of existence. He was a royal man. companion. His bursts of quaint humor, his original sayings, and his sunny, stingless repartee made him a conspicuous and popular figure in every circle and body. How we miss his exuberant humor and tonic companionship at this Conference.

As a preacher, he was plain and evangelical. He was not uniformly impressive, yet he was always earnest. At times he rose to grand heights of effectiveness. He loved to call sinners to repentance and was strictly a revival preacher. Thousands of his spiritual children remain to speak in loving tones of B. B. Culbreth.

He was twice married—in 1862 to Miss Ada Moore, who lived only a short while, and in 1866 to Miss Dora McGee, who years ago entered into rest. She left two children to him—Ada Moore and J. Marvin. The latter is following in the ministerial succession as a member of the North Carolina Conference. The deceased loved his family with a deep, tender love.

At the last Conference he was assigned to the Durham City

Mission. He went bravely to his post of duty. His field was somewhat limited. I saw him frequently during the earlier part of the year. He made no complaint, but I thought that I could see symptoms of unrest in his heart. As I looked into his eyes I saw what I took to be longings for the old scenes—longings for the freedom of the fields and the forests when the battle cry could ring clear and strong, longings for the hungry congregations in the old Church around which the birds sing and the breezes sweep—longings for the prayer around the country firesides where simple faith in the old eternal doctrines hallow the hearthstone—longings, in fact, for that rest which the homebound sailor craves when he sights the distant harbor.

God gave the old man the "desires of his heart." For a short while he was the pastor of the flock on Buckhorn Circuit. He heard the birds sing again and preached to loving hearts the precious doctrine of redeeming grace. Then came the real rest.

> "The calm of Heaven was in his eye, And joy and peace were in his breast; He found amid confusion rest, In which all strife and clamor die. His Psalm was keyed to one deep note; In him we saw the reverence dwell, The mind and soul according well; Of which the greatest Laureate wrote."

And so in another life we see an illustration of the truth of the Psalmist, "Precious in the eyes of the Lord is the death of His saints." T. N. IVEY.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Church has no more important work than the education of her youth. It is the trained mind that must produce our literature, and the character of this literature is determined by the character of the education that is behind it. If a large per cent of the books that are falling into the hands of our young people are found to glorify heterodoxy at the expense of orthodox truth, when they touch religious thought; and if they inculcate principles of social life which are subversive of New Testament morals, when they touch upon that phase of our being-if these things are true (and who can dispute it?), then the thinking mind must ask the cause of which this is the result. Literary men ought not to be the weaklings who cater to such public taste, nor yet so mercenary that they can be bought for such ends; and, if such teachings express their real convictions, then there must be something radically wrong in the processes of their making. The only remedy for the moral and religious evils of the literary world is an education that is vitally Christian. This truth alone, though it is by no means the only ground for it, would necessitate the work of the Church in this field; and the scope and power of the work which the Church is doing in this connection is cause for profound gratitude. Your Board rejoices in the success already attained, and hails with delight every advance movement in this important field of the Church's work.

#### VANDERBILT UNIVERSITY.

This institution stands at the head of our educational system. It is an institution of the highest merit. It has the first claim' upon the patronage of all our people who desire university training, and we heartily commend it to the favorable consideration of our aspiring youth. We are pleased to learn that it has had this year the largest opening in its history. Especially does its biblical department appeal to the young men who are looking to the ministry of our Church. This department is responding nobly to the conditions of our Church life, as shown in its inauguration of the correspondence courses. The marked success which has so far attended this effort shows that our ministry appreciates the opportunity thus offered. We note this truth with peculiar pleasure, and your Board recommends your adoption of the following resolution:

*Resolved*. That it is the sense of this Conference that the methods of the Correspondence School are better than those formerly employed in carrying on the required courses of Conference studies, and that the undergraduates of this Conference should pursue their studies under the direction of the Correspondence School. The Board recommends that the Conference ask the Bishop to reappoint Rev. J. L. Cuninggim', Director of the Correspondence School.

#### TRINITY COLLEGE.

Another year of progress has wrought itself into the history of this noble institution. Her high purpose has not been lowered, nor has her strenuous life relaxed its efforts. The enrollment to date in the College proper is 231, as against 201 last year. The College and High School together now number 375, an increase of forty over last year. In this student body are represented thirty-nine different vocations, and they come from eight States of the Union and from far-off Japan. These facts show the growing life of the institution, and the broad field into which its influences are going. But she has only begun to write the history of her achievements. Her past has been heroic; the work she has done has been thorough and scholarly, but her future no man may yet forecaste. She deserves your support and your patronage, and we commend it to the Methodists of North Carolina as the best place for you to give their boys a college education Here is another truth which we copy from the report of the Board of Trustees that should not be overlooked: "Too much emphasis can not be laid upon the large benefactions which are now being bestowed through Trinity College. The income derived from the endowment, amounting to something over thirty thousand dollars, is a gift. Besides this, thousands of dollars in the form of remitted tuitions run the benefactions of Trinity College up to something like forty thousand dollars."

The Board recommends that the Conference confirm the following who are nominated for Trustees to fill vacancies caused by expiration of term, December 31, 1903: A. P. Tyer, H. A. Page, J. H. Southgate, B. N. Duke, F. M. Simmons, and N. M. Jurney.

The Board a'so recommends that the Conference ask the Bishop to re-appoint Rev. J. C. Kilgo, D.D., President of Trinity College, and Rev. E. A. Yates, D.D., to a lectureship in the College.

## SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

Greensboro Female College.—Your Board has had under long and searching and prayerful consideration a communication from the Alumnæ Association of this institution. Our hearts have been pained by the sore trials through which it has passed within the last year, and yet we note with pleasure the favorable opening which has marked the beginning of this scholastic year despite the difficulties under which they have labored. We rejoice in this success, and heartily commend it to the patronage of our people. With reference to the proposition that has been made to us, the Board recommends the adoption of the following:

After carefully considering the communication of Greensboro Female College Alumnæ Association, we recommend the approval and acceptance of the same as a proposition to convey the College in fee-simple to the M. E. Church, South, through and by means of a Board of Trustees, consisting of three members from the W. N. C. Conference, three from the N. C. Conference, and three to be named by the said Alumnæ Association, to be maintained as a Methodist College for women. We recommend that Joseph G. Brown for two years, and J. A. Long for four years, and Q. K. Nimocks for six years, be named as Trustees on the part of this Conference.

We further recommend that a committee consisting of three members of our Board of Education, viz., Andrew P. Tyer, L. S. Massey, and L. B. Bynum', be appointed to confer with a committee of said Alumnæ Association, and a committee of the Board of Education of the W. N. C. Conference for the purpose of maturing plans and methods for carrying out the aforesaid proposition to save the College for our Church.

We further recommend that an assessment of fifteen hundred dollars be made by this Conference to aid in paying the interest for one year on the bonded indebtedness of the College.

Littleton Female College.—This institution is doing a noble work in the cause of Christian education for our young women. The report of the President informs us that, since our last Conference, he has matriculated 212 boarding and 29 town pupils, making a total of 241 pupils from five different States. He also has a Faculty of 22 officers and teachers. Four thousand dollars worth of improvements have been added during the year. We sincerely commend this institution to the patronage of our people.

The Board recommends that the Conference ask the Bishop to reappoint Rev. J. M. Rhodes, President of Littleton Female College.

Louisburg Female College.—Another year of deserved prosperity has come to this institution of learning. It has a cultured, Christian faculty, and its members are devoted to their work. We are assured that they are strenuously endeavoring to lead those entrusted to their training to the higher cultured Christian life—to train them for noble womanhood. We heartily commend Louisburg Female College to the patronage of our people.

Trinity Park High School.—This is located on the Park at Trinity College, and is thoroughly correlated with that institution. It has matriculated to date this year 144 students, an increase of ten over last year. The students of Trinity Park High Schoo' have the advantages of the best equipped High School to be found anywhere, of the Trinity College Library, and the intellectual stimulus of college NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

life. There is no better place to prepare a boy for college, and we most heartily commend it to the patronage of our people.

The Board recommends that the Conference ask the Bishop to reappoint Rev. J. F. Bivens, Headmaster of Trinity Park High School,

The Scarritt Bible and Training School.—This institution seeks to prepare young ladies who desire to become missionaries. Sunday School teachers, nurses, or who desire to become well-furnished Christian workers. It is without a rival in its sphere, and is serving a most needed purpose.

The Board recommends that Rev. J. C. Kilgo, D.D., be re-appointed Conference Educational Secretary.

The Board recommends an assessment of \$602 for Paine Institute and Lane College, \$602 for the General Board of Education, and \$5,000 for education; the last amount to be used as a loan fund for needy and worthy students: *Provided*. as much as \$500 thereof may be used by the Board of Trustees of Trinity College to help pay the interest on the bonded indebtedness of the College. The distilleries have been driven out of our rural districts by law; a large number of our counties have prohibition, and such towns as Goldsboro, Raleigh and Wilson and others have eradicated the saloon from their midst, and the tidal wave of temperance is moving onward and Christian people and temperance lovers should feel greatly encouraged as never before and should push on the fight against the liquor traffic with renewed energy and vigor.

2. We wish to express our appreciation of the good work being done for the cause of temperance by the W. C. T. U. and the Anti-Saloon League.

3. We recommend that at least one sermon a year on temperance be preached to every congregation in our Conference by the respective pastors.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

1. We rejoice to know that the past year has surpassed any preceding year in the circulation of God's Word by the American Bible Society, reaching nearly 2,000,000 copies. This is an increase of 269,767 copies over that of last year. Of these 734,649 were distributed in the United States, not including the Philippines. This means an increase of 47,894 copies in the domestic field. The issue in the foreign field is an increase of 221,876 copies over last year.

2. We regret to learn of the immense falling off in receipts, amounting to \$74,000.00; about one-third of the whole, as compared with the preceding year. Our Conference gave last year \$493.38. an increase of \$43.73.

3. We learn from Rev. T. H. Law that the British and Foreign Bible Society will celebrate its centennial in March, marking the beginning of organized effort for the general circulation of the Bible among all peoples in their own languages.

Your Board recommends that January be set apart for special col-

lections for the American Bible Society; that all our preachers are urged to take this collection in every congregation and endeavor to raise at least 2 cents per member.

## REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

During the past year \$289.00 was disbursed to needy Sunday Schools. Every applicant was helped, but on account of limited amount of funds some not so much as wanted.

We most earnestly beg each pastor to preach a special sermon on Sunday Schools to every church on his charge during the month of April, and see to it that every school observe Children's Day in May, as required by the Discipline.

Let the collection on Children's Day go at once to L. G. Roper, Treasurer, Roper, N. C. We earnestly hope for larger collections so that we may help needy schools, not only with literature, but with libraries, where they can pay half the cost.

Persons desiring help should send applications to W. B. Cooper, Secretary, Wilmington, N. C., not later than March 1st. Application blanks will be furnished by Secretary; also Children's Day programmes free from Secretary's office on application.

We beg our pastors to see that each school takes hold of the Cradle Roll and Home Department. Many fathers and mothers may be reached through the simple Cradle Roll, as well as the children saved to the Church and the Lord. The Secretary will furnish further information on application.

We believe trained workers the great need in most schools, and urge more general use of the "Bible Teachers' Study Circle" course.

Our Chairman was directed to prosecute the work in every way, and to appoint a district manager for each Presiding Elder's district to have charge of the Sunday School work in his district in conjunction with the members of the Board in his district under the oversight of the Presiding Elder. We ask the Presiding Elders and pastors to give him all help possible as soon as appointments are made.

In conclusion, the hope of the Church being the children, why look on this work as of little importance? Why not save them young? About 90 per cent. of our members coming from the Sunday School, is it not the place for work? We can, we must, we will do more along this line.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

We are glad to note the continued prosperity of our Publishing House, the total net gain for the year ending March 31, 1903, being \$36,361.02, and the increase in sales over last year being more than \$16,000.00. We realize the great importance of the Publishing House to our Church, and, therefore, advise our preachers and laymen to do all they can to aid it in the great work it is doing for the cause of Christianity.

The Nashville Christian Advocate we regard as a strong, ably edited paper, and sincerely regret that so few of our people read it. We believe that a more general reading of this great paper would help every interest of our Church by awakening the intelligence of the people; it is too true of us that we perish for lack of knowledge. We beseech every lay member of this Conference, who is not already a subscriber, to give his subscription to Rev. John H. Hall before he goes home; and suggest to each pastor that he appoint a live agent in each of the congregations to solicit subscriptions.

We regret to know that the *Epworth Era* and the *Methodist Quarterly Review* have not yet been able to get upon a paying basis, but note with pleasure that they are going on towards this state. We commend these periodicals to our people.

We wish to lay especial emphasis on our Missionary paper, called *Go Forward*, as being of untold aid in spreading missionary information, and, therefore, missionary zeal. We suggest that the watchword of this Conference be to put a copy of this paper in every home.

We are glad to know that our Sunday School publications are increasing their circulation. We desire to call especial attention to our *Sunday School Magazine* as being, in our opinion, the best single publication for the Methodist teacher, and to the "Teachers' Study Circle," so ably presided over by Dr. H. M. Hamil.

We desire to record our sincere pleasure in the establishment of a publishing house in China by our Church, in connection with the M. E. Church, and pray that this movement may be a mighty agency in spreading the Gospel of peace among the people of the East.

We are very much gratified at the continued improvement of our Conference organ, the *Raleigh Christian Advocate*, and to know from the written statement of the editor, Dr. T. N. Ivey, that the paper has more than paid expenses for the current year. We heartily thank Dr. Ivey for his faithful work and for the noble, manly stand he takes on moral issues; and we beg all our people to pray for him and his difficult work every day. We realize, however, that the usefulness of this paper would be greatly enlarged if it had a larger subscription list. We, therefore, recommend that each Presiding Elder take such steps as may seem wise to himself and his preachers to secure by the first of May, 1904, one hundred and fifty new subscribers from each district over the entire Conference.

We take pleasure in endorsing the Methodist Hand Book, published by Dr. Ivey, as containing much valuable information for Methodist people.

We recommend the endorsement by our Conference of the Southern Methodist Book Depository, of Staunton, Virginia.

#### [Document No. 13.]

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions begs leave to make the following report:

One year ago the Board of Missions reported an increase in the collections for Foreign and Domestic Missions of \$2,251.20. We are glad to report that during the past year there has been a similar increase, the exact amount of the increase being: For Foreign Missions, \$1.376.64; for Domestic Missions, \$959.08. Total, \$2,335.72. Last year one district paid in full its assessment for Foreign and Domestic Missions. This year three districts have over paid their assessments. The advance in the Wilmington District is especially noteworthy, the amount collected being \$650.49 in excess of the year before. Our preachers and people are evidently beginning to appreciate as they have not before the obligation resting upon them to send the Gospel into all the world.

Notwithstanding this increase in collections, however, the available funds are not sufficient to meet the urgent calls for help. In the foreign field doors have been thrown open, men are waiting to be sent, but funds are lacking. In our own Domestic Mission field there has been a call for nearly \$2,000 increase in appropriation, and still not all that has been needed has been asked for.

We have not been able to respond to all the calls. Encouraged by the advance in collections, however, during the past year, we have made appropriations for the coming year amounting to an increase of \$1,275 over the appropriation of the year before. This is more than the collections for the past year by \$560. Yet we have not increased the total amount of the assessment for missions. We must, therefore, work for collections in full throughout the Conference this year. If there is the same increase this year that there has been during the two past years, we will be able to report at our next Conference the amount of the assessment paid in full.

We believe that much good has resulted from the mid-year meetings held during the past two years. The Board has accordingly decided to hold another this year. All the Presiding Elders and District Missionary Secretaries are urged to meet with us. We would be glad to have any others to attend who will do so. The meeting will be held in Rocky Mount, January 27-28, 1904.

The Board would call especial attention to our one missionary paper. Go Forward. It ought to be put in every Methodist home, and this can be done if the matter receive proper attention from the preachers.

N. H. D. Wilson has been elected Vice-President of the Board. We have just heard with sorrow of the death of our brother and fellow-worker, F. B. Gibson. For a number of years he has been a most valuable member of the Board of Missions, and in his death we have sustained a great loss.

The Board requests the Bishop to appoint R. H. Willis Conference Secretary of Missions for the coming year.

## REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

It is with great pleasure that we note the continued growth of the Epworth League throughout our Church, the intensifying of its interest, the enlargement of its usefulness and specially of its zeal and activity in the evangelistic movement of the Church.

The League meetings held during the year, now closing, have been marked by great spirituality and intellectual fervor in the work of the Church. From these gatherings have gone out a pronounced evangelistic activity. The International Epworth League Conference, held at Detroit, July last, was a Pentecostal assembly.

We would call your attention to the League Reading Course, which has now secured a wide attention and interest, and specially to the Institute Series on Church history, doctrine, biography and missions being brought out by the central office at small cost. The Self-Culture and Christian Culture Courses should be in the hands of all our Leaguers, and we call upon our pastors to assist in securing the systematic use of these text books in their chapters.

It is with pleasure that we note also that the *Epworth Era* is now on a paying basis and we urge upon all the members of the Conference who are now subscribers to this most excellent paper to renew their subscriptions as they expire, and that they encourage its circulation among their young people. The editor, Dr. DuBose, contemplates, in the near future, the enlargement of the paper and will enlarge the space devoted to Christian Culture, the Bible Study Course and Literature.

Wherever the League has become a part of the organic life of the Church it has quickened the missionary zeal and activity of the whole Church, the Leagues themselves having in a single year contributed over \$20,000 to this cause, the Leagues of our own Conference contributing \$85.21 of this amount, and for all other purposes \$1,426.65.

The North Carolina Conference has had the small increase this year of seven Leagues and 229 League members. Their interest and usefulness has been enlarged, yet we have scarcely made a beginning. We are far behind other Conferences in this work, although we have before us vast undeveloped opportunities. There are something like 75,000 children and young people in the bounds of our Conference and under the influence of our Church; yet, including Junior and Senior Leagues, we have only 2,667 members, whereas, we should have at least 35,000 enrolled members.

Looking to the enlarged usefulness of future Methodism, as well as the present organization and development of the young life of our constituency, now going astray or drifting from us into other churches, we recommend that in every district there be appointed by the Presiding Elder an organizer whose duty it shall be to promote the organization of League chapters wherever feasible, who shall also, with the assistance of the Presiding Elder, hold a District League Conference, either separate or in conjunction with the Sunday School Conference.

We further recommend the holding of a League Conference during the ensuing year, at such time and place as shall hereafter be determined upon; and that Saturday evening of Conference week, or a more convenient time, be observed as League Anniversary.

Dr. Ivey, editor of our organ, has kindly consented to allow us the use of space in the columns of the Advocate, to be edited by one chosen by the League Board, and we most earnestly request the pastors to call attention of their Leagues to this department and to urge them to send items of interest to the League editor for publication.

We would again call attention of the Leagues to the importance of sending at once to the central office the 10-cent assessment recommended by the General Conference.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE ORPHANAGE.

Your Committee on our Orphanage begs leave to report that we greatly rejoice at the prosperity and success of our young institution—the Methodist Orphanage—as conducted by our able Board of Trustees and wise Executive Committee, and at its prospect of enlargement for usefulness by finishing up the basement of the first story that it may be occupied at an early date, by which room, as we learn, will be furnished for fifty more children. The finishing of the main building is greatly to be desired, and we trust that the Church will press this matter until the building is completed.

This will be an object of great joy to the many helpless orphan children that are anxiously longing for a home.

The time has come for an onward movement in this great work of our Church.

We are delighted with the rapid growth of our Orphanage, for success has crowned every effort that has been made for it. Counting four years of active work, in that time we have put more than forty thousand dollars in actual cash in our plant. Adding the cost of running the institution for three years, and that of an agent for two years and three months, it will make more than fifty thousand dollars that the North Carolina Conference has put in this work, or more than \$12,500 for each year.

Your committee desires to thank the many friends that have contributed to the building of this great institution.

We recommend that the month of June be made Orphanage Month, and that a collection be taken in every congregation in the Conference for this great institution. We also urge that every Sunday School pledge itself to give so much a month to this worthy cause. Those that have been giving monthly have accomplished a great work, that has both aided the Orphanage and blessed the schools.

And now, to carry forward this work in every field it is necessary for our Conference to co-operate most heartily with the Board of Trustees in their plans. As the term of eight of the Trustees expires on the first day of January, 1904, we recommend that the Conference elect their successors. We also request that the Bishop reappoint Rev. J. W. Jenkins Superintendent of the Orphanage for the ensuing year.

We offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That we kindly invite the co-operation or union of our brethren of the Western North Carolina Conference in the Orphanage work, and to this end we appoint the Executive Committee to meet a like committee from that body to arrange for this co-operation or union on satisfactory terms, to be submitted to each Conference for their ratification. Also, that said committee be directed to present this resolution to the Western North Carolina Conference at its next annual session.

In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1890 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference. So now the two Conferences embrace the whole of North Carolina.
