WHEREAS, There is great need of some place of correction for the young criminals of the State of North Carolina, without incarcerating them with men who are old and hardened in crime: for almost in every

instance such confinement trains them to a life of criminality, rendering their restoration to civic and moral worth almost impossible; and the present method of punishing such youthful criminals entails a loss to the families from which such unfortunates come, and robs the State of those who might become good citizens; and results in confronting the church with a larger criminal class:

Resolved, That we enthusiastically endorse the general movement among us for the establishing of an institution for the care and training of youthful criminals in our State, and pledge ourselves to work for the establishing of such an institution; and recommend that such steps be taken by the General Assembly as may result in a wise solution of this very difficult problem.

Whereas, There has been great progress in cultivating public sentiment in favor of prohibition of the liquor traffic throughout North Carolina; and,

WHEREAS. The granting license to manufacture and sell intoxicating liquors in the bounds of local option and prohibition territory by the United States Government defeats the will of a majority of the best people of the State: therefore, be it—

Resolved, by the North Carolina Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, in session at Rocky Mount, N. C., December 10, 1906, that our Senators and Representatives in Congress from North Carolina be requested and respectfully urged to use their best efforts to secure the enactment by Congress of a law to prevent the sale and issuance of license to any party or parties to manufacture or sell intoxicating liquors within the bounds of any territory where a majority of the people have voted against such manufacture and sale.

And furthermore, that we, the said North Carolina Conference, do urgently request our Senators and Representatives in Congress from North Carolina to call in a body upon the honorable Secretary of the Treasury of the United States Government, and endeavor to secure the names of all parties to whom licenses to manufacture or sell intoxicating liquors have been issued in North Carolina, and have said names published.

Resolved. That our Senators and Representatives in Congress from North Carolina be respectfully requested to use their best efforts to secure the enactment of such laws as will prevent interstate traffic in intoxicating liquors in local option or prohibition territory.

Resolved. That the Secretary of this Conference send a copy of this paper to our Senators and Representatives.

MEMOIR OF REV. J. J. RENN.

Rev. Joseph John Renn, D.D., son of Green Renn and Jane Renn, was born in the county of Warren, State of North Carolina, on June 12, 1839, and died in Wilson, N. C., January 2, 1906. His boyhood was spent in the country, and he grew up strong and healthy. As a patriot and brave man, he joined the army of the Confederacy as a volunteer in Company C, 12th Regiment N. C. State troops; he fought in many battles, and was finally captured and imprisoned for thirteen months at Elmira, New York. God shielded the young soldier in the storm of battle, for, like Paul, he was chosen to bear the message of salvation to a lost world.

On December 25, 1865, he was married to Miss Susan Williams Twisdale, of Warren County, N. C. God blessed this union with eight children, five of whom—three sons and two daughters—are living; one daughter and two sons preceded the father to the better world. Bro. Renn lost his first wife in Thomasville, N. C., April

14, 1882,

On November 24, 1884, he was united in marriage to Miss Roberta L. Reavis, of Vance County, N. C. The issue of this marriage—two sons and two daughters—with the mother, survives him.

Bro. Renn was licensed to preach by the quarterly conference at Warrenton, N. C., Rev. R. S. Moran, D.D.. Presiding Elder, in 1867, and preached his first sermon in old Cokesbury church, Warren County, N. C., from the text—"For here have we no continuing city, but we seek one to come." Hebrews 13:14. He served as a supply in the North Carolina Conference on Columbia Circuit during the years 1867-1869. He joined the North Carolina Conference at New Bern, N. C., in 1869. He was ordained deacon at Charlotte by Bishop Paine on December 3, 1871, and elder by Bishop Marvin in 1874, at Raleigh, N. C. He was appointed and served as follows: 1869-1870, Rolesville: 1871-1872-1873-1874, Durham; 1875-1876, Chapel Hill and Haw River: 1877-1878-1879, Salisbury; 1880-1881, Thomasville and High Point: 1882-1883-1884, Henderson: 1885-1886-1887-1888, Tar River; 1889-1890, Presiding Elder of the Salisbury District.

The General Conference having divided the State of North Carolina into two Annual Conferences, Bro. Renn was embraced in the membership of the Western North Carolina Conference, and was appointed and served as follows: 1891-1892, Presiding Elder Salisbury District; 1893-1894-1895-1896, Presiding Elder Shelby District: 1897, Monroe Station: 1898, Reidsville Station; 1899-1900-1901-1902, Presiding Elder Mt. Airy District: 1903, Greensboro Circuit; 1904, West Greensboro Circuit. November, 1905, transferred to

North Carolina Conference.

Joseph J. Renn was born of highly respected Warren County stock—than which the world affords no superior. Raised on a farm, he developed a strong constitution. His early educational advantages were limited—the good mother wisely placed literature of such a nature into his hands that the start in mental and spiritual life was of the best character. Possessed of a massive brain—

original, clear, progressive—his thirst for knowledge increased with the years. He became a real student of the Bible and classic literature, storing his mind with nuggets of pure gold. For trash he had a contempt. His library was carefully selected—it contained the wealth of the master minds of the world. Feeding for many years upon the best—thinking for himself upon the profoundest problems—he became a widely informed, safe, accurate scholar.

As a preacher Bro. Renn was solid, evangelical, earnest—he loved to tell sinners of the greatness and power of Jesus to save, and many souls were converted under his ministry. At times he was a wonderful preacher—his great mind would grasp a glorious theme, and with the power of a master he would unfold the secrets of the Word until men were thrilled by the glowing fire of his eloquence. One of the greatest sermons the writer ever heard was preached by Dr. Renn from the text—"Thrust in thy sickle and reap; for the harvest of the earth is ripe." Rev. 14:15.

The address made at the Centennial of Methodism in Raleigh, N. C., in the year 1876, and published with the other addresses in a book, edited by Dr. L. S. Burkhead, would fix for all time the

reputation of the man as a preacher of high order.

His book on the "Image of God in Man," written in the prime of his manhood, and, as yet, not published, this writer had the great pleasure and profit of reading in manuscript. The authorship of this book stamps him as both a scholar and a profound theologian. Rutherford College was highly honored in conferring the degree of D.D. upon J. J. Renn, for he was worthy of such distinction.

Bro. Renn was a strong, true man in every relation of life. He despised trickery and sham. His self-respect and sensitive, unself-ish spirit kept him far above the arts of the ecclesiastical politician and place-seeker—he had a conscientious respect for the rights of his brethren of the ministry. He received his appointments in good faith from the authorities of the church, and fet, as he went forth

to preach, that he was a God-sent man.

For the Methodist Church, its doctrines, ministry and institutions, he had the most profound veneration and love. The itinerant ministry never had a more loyal servant. He gladly laid the wealth of his great soul upon this altar of sacrifice and service. The record of these long years of toil and suffering, of souls won and saints fed, is written on high in the Book of Life. Dr. Renn made many faithful, lasting friendships. These friends were to him choice, congenial spirits, and he loved them with all the ardor and intensity of his soul; they were enshrined in the temple of his heart as sacred treasures worthy of eternal love. He did not wear his heart upon his sleeve, open to the cold gaze of the world: it was necessary to get in close fellowship with him to know how great a man he was. There was a magnetic charm in the sparkle of his original mind, the pathos of his tender, sympathetic heart, and the lofty soarings of his poetic soul. He was a prophet who saw glorious visions of the coming Kingdom of the Lord Jesus Christ. His descriptive powers were very fine. To see him in the Spirit, with face aglow-eyes kindling-voice thrilling-a transfigured souland hear him describe the mountains he loved—the crystal spring, laughing rivulet, roaring torrent, majestic trees, wealth of flowers, singing birds—the panoramic views of sublime grandeur—the language flowing rich and beautiful-was to fully realize that no ordinary man was before you. The favored ones felt it was well worth while to know and love such a man-one real and true-a

lover of nature, men and God.

He has gone from us—God called him from labor to rest—he heard the call, mounted the chariot and ascended to the Golden City where the choice spirits of the ages gather to be co-heirs with the Lord of Glory. We shall find him again some great day in the ranks of the blood-washed in our Father's home. The faithful father, husband, friend and minister is forever safe. When he grappled death for the last struggle, he left the message that all was well. He died, as he had lived, strong in the faith once delivered to the saints.

Appropriate funeral services were held in Trinity Church, Durham, N. C., by Dr. F. D. Swindell, assisted by Drs. J. T. Gibbs, J. C. Kilgo, R. C. Beaman and Rev. A. McCullen. His body sleeps by the side of the wife of his young manhood in the cemetery at A. McCulley.

REV. THOMAS JEFFERSON GATTIS.

Rev. T. J. Gattis, for forty-five years a member of the North Carolina Conference, was born in Orange County, three miles from Chapel Hill, November 11, 1838, and died in the city of Charlotte, N. C., May 25, 1906, at 4:45 a. m., being sixty-seven years and six months old. At the time of his birth, and the years following, North Carolina being a rural and agricultural State, he spent his early life at home on the farm, as almost all boys of that period did. His father dying when he was about fifteen years old, he was deprived of that strong arm to lean upon. His educational advantages were such as the rural schools of that time afforded, till he went to Trinity College, where he pursued his studies under the instruction of Dr. Craven and his corps of teachers. Having been converted at an early age he joined the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and hearing the call of the Master to preach, he offered himself to the North Carolina Conference at Salisbury in the fall of 1860, and was accepted. His classmates in the Conference were Revs. W. H. Moore, W. M. Robey, A. R. Raven and E. A. Yates. Two of these still abide.

Brother Gattis filled the following appointments: 1861.—Whiteville Circuit. At the close of this year, December 12, 1861, he was happily married to Miss Martha C. Smith, of

Whiteville, who, with seven children, still survive.

1862.—Brunswick Circuit. 1863.—Uwharrie Circuit.

1864.—Brunswick Circuit.

1866.—He engaged in business on account of the unsettled condition of the country following the Civil War.

1867-1868.—Blockersville Circuit.

1869-1870-1871.—Alamance Circuit.

1872-1873.—Agent for Davenport Female College.

1874.—Ansonville Circuit.

1875.—Flat River Circuit,

1876-1877.—Leasburg Circuit.

1878-1879-1880-1881.—Pittsboro Circuit.

1882-1883-1884-1885,—Albemarle Circuit.

1886-1887.—Tarboro and Bethel Circuit.

At the Conference held in Fayetteville, 1887, Bishop Key presiding, he was appointed Conference Colporter, which position he held for eleven years, part of the time including the South Carolina Conference in this work.

1899.—Granville Circuit. This was his last charge. At the close of that year he was granted the superannuated relation, which he

held till his death.

Brother Gattis, as a preacher, ranked well with his brethren. His sermons were clear and forceful. He understood the meaning of his subject, and made his hearers see it. Those who heard him were edified and instructed.

He was a great reader, reading the best books that came from the press, and kept up with the latest thought of our best writers. He

continued this to the last.

He was not a robust man, but suffered much. For some years he spent his winters in Florida with his son seeking relief in that mild elimate. But last winter while there, he was very unwell, and as the warm season came on in the spring, he was brought home where he grew worse, in spite of the best nursing and medical skill, till that

early May morning when he went home to God.

I visited him frequently during his sickness and always found him ready to talk about spiritual things, and his own personal relation to God. His faith was strong, and his hope was abiding. Once while I was by his bedside he called his family together and gave them the strongest assurance of his willingness and readiness to go. Among other most comforting expressions he used was: "There is not a man living that I would not be willing to take in my arms and say in Christ I love you: the past is all gone and buried." And to his pastor, Rev. H. K. Boyer, he said on another occasion: "There is not a thing in my life that God has not written forgiveness on." These, with many similar expressions, came from him during his last sickness. Brother Gattis was verily ready when the summons came. He was buried in the beautiful Elmwood Cemetery at Charlotte to await the resurrection.

MEMOIR OF REV. JOHN WESLEY JENKINS.

The Rev. John Wesley Jenkins was born in Granville County, North Carolina, May 4, 1832, and died at the Methodist Orphanage

in Raleigh, July 4, 1906, aged 74 years and two months.

He was received on trial in the North Carolina Conference at its session in New Bern, N. C., December, 1858, being then in his 26th year, and the prime of his young manhood. From that time, with the exception of one year, when he was placed on the supernumerary list, he gave a valuable and unremitting service to the church, as will be seen from the appointments he successively filled in the

course of his pastorates. These were: Plymouth, Tarboro, Rocky Mount, Warrenton, Chapel Hill, Beaufort, Leasburg, Yanceyville, Rockingham, Lincolnton, Snow Hill, Lenoir, Youngsville, Warrenton, Ridgeway, Durham Circuit, Cary. Smithfield and Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage, where he closed his earthly career.

This long ministry of forty-eight years carried him into many sections of the State, and into thousands of Christian homes, in all of which he was ever after a welcome guest, for everywhere he left

behind him the sweet savor of a good name.

Born of religious parents, he was brought up "in the nurture and admonition of the Lord," and their pious care was rewarded in seeing their son grow up a godly youth, and as his young life unfolded, the light of his Christian life shone with a clear and steady

glow

He had the advantages of both heredity and environment. From his parents he inherited a strong physical constitution, which, never having been abused by excesses of any kind, carried him beyond the limit of three-score years and ten, with bodily vigor but little abated, and with his mental powers unimpaired. He worked, and worked efficiently, to the very end of life.

He received a good academic education, and, having taught for some time after leaving school, he entered the ministry with a better scholastic preparation than most young men of his day. As a preacher he was solid, if not brilliant. He was never dull. From the store-house of a mind and heart, cultured and refined by grace, he brought forth things new and old to interest and edify the most cultured of his parishioners; and like his Master "the common people heard him gladly." Many souls were brought to Christ by his ministrations, and these shall shine as stars in his crown of rejoicing. Another has said of him: "Men of larger potency have served the State and church, but in those qualities that make for righteousness I have not known his superior." He was a pure man—an Israelite in whom there was no guile. Chastity was a law of his life. His were faithful words, and though they were, as a minister's words must sometimes be, words of reproof, there was no bitterness in them. They were an excellent oil which did not break the head, and the reproved felt it was a kindness to them.

Bro. Jenkins was married four times. His first wife was Miss Lucy T. Willeford: the second Miss Mary Alice Thaxton; the third Mrs. Bettie W. Garrett: the fourth Miss Mattie Virginia Atwater, who survives him, together with six children, five by his first marriage, and one by the second.

Long and useful as was his life to the church, it was in his last years the crowning work of his life was wrought in the splendid home he was instrumental in building for the orphan children of our State and church. This is a monument more fitting than marble, and more enduring than bronze, to perpetuate his memory to those who shall come after us.

We miss him and mourn our loss; but the void is greatest in his home and among the fatherless ones who are a second time bereaved

of a father's oversight and loving care.

Though taken away with a stroke, the end was as we should expect. He was twice stricken with paralysis—the second stroke following in two hours of the first—after which he was unconscious.

When first attacked his family and friends were alarmed; but he was unmoved, and said to the weeping ones about his bedside: "It might be worse; let us be happy to-day." That was his last conscious utterance, and characteristic of his whole preceding life—a life which had many sorrows in it, but which had been largely spent in making the lives of others bright and happy. He had built on the sure foundation and it did not fail him in his extremity. The gospel of peace which he had preached, and the divine comfort which it had been his privilege to bring to others, soothed and sustained him in the shadows of death, and, after two days of mortal struggle, his life went out as quietly and gently as a tired child falls to sleep on its mother's bosom.

We laid him to rest in Raleigh's beautiful cemetery, and from Edenton street church, at the altar of which three days before he had assisted in the administration of the holy communion to those who were then performing for him the last sad office of Christian

burial.

I have witnessed many affecting sights on such occasions, but none more affecting than was witnessed on this occasion, in the manifested grief of the orphan children gathered at the grave of him who had been a father to them. Each of these placed a small boquet of flowers on the grave, and turned away weeping as if brokenhearted, after which other loving hands literally covered the grave with tokens of their affection.

Farewell dear comrade! Thou hast wrought well thy task in this lower world, and it was meet, thy wings so fully grown, should plume themselves for highest flight and a more blissful home!

MEMOIR OF REV. L. S. ETHERIDGE.

Louland Summerfield Etheridge, son of Samuel R. and Eliza Wright Etheridge, was born in Portsmouth, Va., February 12, 1866, and died in the McDaniel Memorial Hospital in Kinston, N. C., August 3, 1906. He was converted to God and joined the M. E. Church, South, early in life. When he was 12 years of age his parents moved to Wilmington, N. C., thence after a lapse of a few years to Laurinburg; from which place he went to Trinity College in Randolph County, where he remained as a student for two years. In 1888 he joined the North Carolina Conference at New Bern, was ordained deacon in 1890 by Bishop Keener, and elder in 1892 by Bishop Duncan. He served the following charges: Campbellton Mission 1889, Smyrna 1890, Pekin 1891-1892, Carver's Creek 1893, 1894, 1895, 1896, Magnolia 1897-1898, Rockingham Circuit 1899-1900. In 1901 he took the supernumerary relation and resided in Laurinburg. With improved health he served Elkin Circuit 1902-1903, Pamlico Circuit 1904-1905, Grifton Circuit until Aug. 3, 1906, on which day he answered the call on the other side. These are the principal facts in the life of this good man as they have come to me; they give but a meagre suggestion of the real life that lay behind. What is done we partly may compute, we know not what is resisted. If there be any easy places for the Methodist itinerant here, few, as

may be seen, came his way. He never sought them-they seem in some way not to have sought him. He received a commission-Go work in my vineyard. The going and working were his, the choosing of the place he cheerfully left with them to whom his church had committed it. He went without dissent or murmur, with no feeling as far as one could tell that he had not received his due, from one side of this Conference to the other, from the hills and pure air of Moore to the swamps and malaria of Pamlico, carrying with him a large family; and wherever he went he gave his people, his church and his God his best service. He was a good preacher. The testimony of those to whom he was pastor and of his brethren whom it was his pleasure to help in their meetings was altogether to this effect. His preaching was characterized by spirituality—its flavor was distinctly of that kind. He called men to repentance, to amendment of life, and was successful in doing so: he called them also to a close walk with God, to that holiness without which no man shall see the Lord. The gospel that he preached to others found illustration in his own life and nome. The church in thy house is a New Testament expression that had a meaning for him. church was under his roof and you could not long breathe the atmosphere of his home without knowing of its presence. When he, the high priest, was absent there were not wanting others, the wife, the daughter, who could officiate at that altar. He had a message for the people and usually he had the people for the message. He knew his people, visited them freely, was in close touch with them. At feeding time they knew his call and received from him the bread of life. No pastor in the New Bern District, I doubt if one in any district in our borders, had a stronger hold upon his people than he had upon the people of the charge he last served. In many ways was it attested while he was still with them, in many more since he went to join the general assembly and church of the first born above. None of those present will soon forget the 3rd Quarterly Conference of the past year in the Grifton charge. Sixteen officials of the charge were gathered together in the front room of the little parsonage—in the hall was the entire family of their late pastor. Routine business disposed of, the 31st question was called, Is there any miscellaneous business? A moment's silence, and then each one of those sixteen brethren gave voluntary testimony of his appreciation of Bro. Etheridge's work and each one closed his testimony with quivering lip. It was a sad occasion, and yet a blessed one, for the unseen presence was felt. While Bro. Etheridge's preaching was spiritual and while he delighted to feed the church of God over which the Holy Ghost had made him an overseer. he did not hesitate when occasion demanded to denounce evil. than once he endured hardness on this account, but he had in him the same sort of stuff out of which the pioneers of Methodism were made, and he had experiences like those you read of in the story of their lives. You may not rate him high as you scan the list of the charges that he served, but he was in the same line with the Apostles to the Gentiles for in all things he approved himself as a minister of God in much patience, in afflictions, in necessities, in distress, in tumults, in labors, by pureness, by knowledge, by long-suffering, by kindness, by the Holy Ghost, by love unfeigned. November 14, 1888, Bro. Etheridge was married to Miss Lena J.

Biggs, of Laurinburg, who shared with him nobly the vicissitudes of an itinerant's life. Seven children were born to them—six of them are living. I doubt not that at this very hour they are gathered together in the parsonage at Grifton and are thinking of him as they look this way—there are the mother and her aged father, Ruth and Johnnie, Lena and Paul, Lee and Louland. May the God who in His Providence first brought this couple together and blessed their union with these dear children, and through that same Providence took away the absent ones, be with those that remain until they meet again.

MEMOIR OF MRS. LUCY A. CUNINGGIM.

Mrs. Lucy A. Cunninggim was born in Mocksville September 28, 1838, and died in Greensboro June 28, 1906. She was a woman of rare beauty and excellence of character, and amiable and gentle in

disposition.

She was converted while young and all her lifetime she was an earnest and devoted Christian. Before her marriage—January 2, 1862—to Rev. Jesse A. Cuninggim she was a teacher in Greensboro Female College. She was a model wife for an itinerant preacher, and was useful and greatly beloved wherever she went. The names of Uncle Jesse and Aunt Lucy were household names, loved and revered. Her whole life was spent in usefulness and helpfulness, for in her was the Christly spirit of self-giving and the Christly love for souls. Her presence in a home was a benediction, and her life and example an adornment of the doctrines of God and an inspiration to hely living. She was faithful to every duty to which the Lord called her. Her special field seemed to have been the mission work.

From the organization of the N. C. Conference Woman's Foreign Missionary Society she was identified with and was one of its officers. For twenty years she was the honored and beloved President, and while presiding at the last annual meeting she was taken with

the illness which resulted in her death.

I need not mention her great love for the cause of Foreign Missions: it is well known. She gave freely her services and her means to the work and nothing gave her more joy than good tidings from the lands afar. Not only does the Woman's Missionary Society mourn her loss, but all Methodism in North Carolina, for we recognize that we have lost one of our choicest spirits, an elect woman indeed. It is fitting that her name will be known and perpetuated in the Orient, in the Lucy A. Cuninggim Home and School in Songdo, Korea. We thank God for having given her to us, and letting us keep her so long.

Though dead she still lives and will continue to live in the spirit

she imparted to us and the example she set us.

REPORT No. 1 OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Your Board has had under consideration certain suggestions made in the report of the Board of Trustees of Trinity College to this Conference, and we recommend the adoption of the following:

- 1. That this Board be authorized to hold a mid-year meeting in the interest of Education.
- 2. That the second Sunday in July of each year be observed by all the Sunday schools in our Conference as Educational Day; and that each Superintendent, either himself or through some one appointed by him address the school on the subject of Education. Also that each teacher bring to the attention of his class the subject of Education.
- 3. That two thousand dollars of the assessment for Education be appropriated for the establishment of a chair of Biblical Literature in said institution.

REPORT No. 1 OF COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS

The Committee on Books and Periodicals, having under consideration the Raleigh Christian Advocate, the chief medium in our Conference for disseminating news and ideas among our people, and also the Methodist Handbook, beg to commend each to the Conference. The Advocate has done and is doing a fine work in the field of religious journalism and is in every way worthy of the support of all our people.

Dr. T. N. Ivey, in his report to your body, says: "Since February 1, 1906, 1871 new subscribers have been added to the *Advocate* mailing list. The circulation is now a few over 8,400 subscribers."

Out of a membership of over 70,000 we certainly should have not less than ten thousand subscribers. We therefore, recommend:

I. That the Presiding Elders in their several districts manage the campaign for the securing of not less than two thousand new subscribers during the ensuing year, and that the same be pro rated on the basis of membership as follows, to-wit:

Minimum for Durham District	235
Minimum for Fayetteville District	272
Minimum for Rockingham District	206
Minimum for Wilmington District	227
Minimum for New Bern Discrict	234
Minimum for Washington District	185
Minimum for Warrenton District	219

2. That we most emphatically enter our protest against the contemplated action of the third Assistant Postmaster-General, making the

rate of postage for second-class matter four cents per pound, instead of the present rate of one cent per pound.

- 3. That we heartily endorse and recommend the Southern Methodist Handbook, edited by Dr. T. N. Ivey, as a source of information.
- 4. We recommend that this Conference elect the following a commission to elect an editor for the Raleigh *Christian Advocate* in case a vacancy should occur during the interim of Conference, the said editor to serve until the ensuing session of annual Conference, said commission to hold for a term of five years from date. That the following constitute the commission: A. J. Parker, L. L. Smith, B. B. Adams. H. A. Page, J. E. Underwood, J. D. Pegram and M. Bradshaw.
- 5. That the attention of the Conference is called to the fact that this is the time to elect an editor for the Raleigh *Christian Advocate* for the ensuing term of two years.

From the standpoint of interest and membership we fear we are badly behind. We feel that our Sunday school roll should fully equal our church roll at every church. We cannot be satisfied until this is accomplished. It can, it must, it will be done if we all pull and work together, preachers, laymen and last but not least laywomen. The church is doing her most effective work through the Sunday schools: so we can well afford to emphasize this point, in the opinion of your Board.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BIBLE CAUSE.

We are gratified to learn from the report of the American Bible Society that it made last year the largest distribution of the Scriptures in the 90 years of its operations, having circulated 2,236,755 volumes of God's word, nearly 1,300,000 going into the foreign field.

The opportunity set before it has been truly great and inviting, and the society to the utmost of the means at its command, candeavored to use it. The only hindrance has been the lack of funds. But in this respect the excessive straits of last year have been in a measure relieved by the receipts from legacies which came into the treasury recently. The opportunity for sowing the seed, which is the word of God, is so great in the open doors set before us and the readiness of the people to receive the Bible, and God's blessing on the word distributed is so rich and constant that we all ought to be encouraged to take a larger part in this work and give it a wider success.

We, therefore, recommend that we take the collection, in accordance to the discipline, during the month of March, that it may not be crowded out in the last of the year. And that our young people may be educated as to the value and use of the Bible and trained to take part in its circulation among the destitute.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee on Church Property beg leave to submit the following report:

From the statistics we note with pleasure the full amount of church property is \$1,617,176.72, and we rejoice in the increased valuation during the year in the following amount, \$126,552.05. We also are much gratified in the work given in the way of new church buildings and repairs, and others in prospect of completion; and also the building and repairing parsonages.

We think it a good precedent that the most of our churches and parsonages that have been recently built are unincumbered with debt; and again we would warn our people against incurring debts on churches and parsonages which will partially cripple any work. We request the presiding elders and preachers in charge of work to inquire through the trustees of church property as to the deeds of said property and see that such document is "in fee-simple" with "trust clause" of discipline incorporated. And where we have a church of long standing, and there is no deed nor record of any, we ask that the preacher act with trustees in getting an order from the court of the county in which said church is located for deed to be made. We recommend that the presiding elders require, at the Fourth Quarterly Conference, a report from the Trustees as prescribed by the law of the church.

We also remind our people that we believe the wisest and best plan is, in dedicating to God a house of worship, that the money shall be guaranteed or provided for before such dedication, and we trust this rule shall be regarded both by preachers and laymen.

REPORT No. 2 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

No people can be stronger than their thought-life; and the well-being of the individual, the home and society is secure only when this is reenforced by the clear recognition of our moral and religious obligations. The greatest dangers which threaten us are not those which appear upon the surface. They are hidden away in the secret sources of life. They lurk in the false motives which impel men to action, and in the false ideals of life that determine the direction of our energies. This truth may not appear in a day or a year, but it reveals itself in the course of a generation. The inspiration and proper moulding of these motives and ideals constitute the most important function of education, and in so far as these are perverted the well-being of the individual and of the nation is imperiled. Since Christ is the truth in the highest and ultimate sense, he cannot be too highly enthroned in the education which is to determine the character of these sources and ideals of life.

GENERAL BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The report of the General Board to our Conference shows a healthy growth in this department of church work both in material equipments and in the number of students enrolled in our institutions of learning. Fifty-four new buildings have been erected or completed at a cost of \$812,074. Our endowments have been increased \$115,711, and the income of our institutions has increased \$680,993. Our total enrollment is 34,446 students, showing an increase throughout the connection this year of 5,368. These facts demonstrate the wisdom of the policy pursued by our church in this important field of her activity. It seeks to develop the bone and sinew of the church. It looks to nothing less than the furnishing of trained and cultured workers in every department of church activity. The recent General Conference has enlarged the scope of the General Board, and your Board wishes to pledge its hearty endorsement and co-operation.

VANDERBILT UNIVERSITY.

Our educational system has but one university—the Vanderbilt, located at Nashville, Tenn. We rejoice in its prosperity and in the great work which it is doing in the cause of Christian education. We trust that our ministerial candidates will more and more take advantage of the Theological course which it offers, and we commend its Academic departments to those of our people who are seeking university training.

We especially rejoice in the growing usefulness of the Correspondence School in connection with the Biblical Department of the University. The Director informs us that the enrollment has now reached 870, an increase of 318 over last year. We trust the time is not far distant when all of our undergraduates shall adopt this method of taking their Conference course. But this work is not limited to them. There are higher courses designed for older ministers, and still others that are helpful to Sunday school teachers, league leaders, parents and Christian workers generally. It is hoped that the ministers will inform the laymen of this work that they may take advantage of the opportunity thus offered them. Your Board wishes to express its pleasure and appreciation in having Dr. Tillett with us at this session of our Conference to deliver a series of lectures under the auspices of this school, and your Board recommends that the securing of a similar series for the next session of our Conference be left in the hands of the President and Secretary of this Board, together with one other member to be selected by these officers.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

Our church owns but one institution of college grade within the bounds of our Conference or of our State. We desire to express our abiding confidence in the character and scholarship of its teaching force and in the wisdom of its management. We speak soberly when we say that no institution in all these Southern States maintains a higher grade of scholarship or is better equipped for doing college work than our own Trinity College. She stands without apology for Christian education. With breadth of vision she surveys the field of life to-day and earnestly seeks from the standpoint of Christ to solve the problems that confront us. Your Board rejoices in the great work which she has done and is doing. Our special recommendations were included in report No. 1, but would now earnestly commend it to the patronage of all our people.

SECONDARY CHURCH SCHOOLS.

Greensboro Female College.—This institution is in the midst of the most prosperous year in its history. Two hundred and four students have matriculated, and others would have come had there been room to receive them. The Faculty has been increased by the addition of two teachers, so that it now numbers 16. They are competent, painstaking, consecrated Christian men and women. The main building has been completed during the year, and about \$2,000 have been used in further equipping the institution. In all more than \$16,000 have been added to the value of the property. It has been a year of progress at which North Carolina Methodism rejoices. There is no better place at which to educate your daughter. The Board recommend that you confirm the following nominations for the Board of Trustees: J. A. Long, representing the N. C. Conference; M. D. Stockton, representing the W. N. C. Conference; and L. L. Smith, representing the Alumnae Association.

Trinity Park School.—Of the 141 students entering Trinity College from church preparatory schools during the last three years, 116 came in from this school. This not only proves the advantage that accrues to Trinity College from this institution, but it also shows the inspiration

with which it fills young men to secure a college education. It is likewise a testimony to the thoroughness with which it prepares young men for college work. It is also well known that students attending this institution have access to the Trinity College library, gymnasium and other advantages that high schools are not usually able to furnish. Your Board heartily commends Trinity Park School to the patronage of our people.

SECONDARY AFFILIATED SCHOOLS.

Littleton Female College.—The report of the President shows the patronage of this school to be a stradily increasing one, having now gone well over 200. In equipment and furnishings it is constantly being improved, and is thus making for itself a larger place in our educational work. While the property is not owned by the church, it stands for distinctively Christian education, and we commend it to the patronage of our people.

Louisburg Female College.—Since the death of its late lamented President this institution has been re-organized, and a Board of Directors has been appointed. Mrs. Ivey Allen has been elected President, and with an able corps of teachers the work of this institution is being vigorously prosecuted. We are pleased to note that 137 students have been enrolled, and this in the face of the fact that a recently established graded school has practically taken away the local patronage of the primary departments. The terms of this institution are very reasonable, and the religious atmosphere of it is that of the Christian home. Your daughter there will be in safe hands.

The Scarritt Bible and Training School.—We again call the attention of our people to this institution, whose design is to train our girls who desire to become missionaries, Sunday school teachers or who wish especially to prepare themselves for Christian work. It stands alone in its unique field, and we heartily commend it to the patronage of our people.

Your Board recommends that the Conference ask the Bishop to make the following appointments:

Rev. J. C. Kilgo, D.D., President of Trinity College and Cor. Sec. of Education.

Rev. E. A. Yates, D.D., Lecturer in Trinity College.

Rev. H. M. North, Headmaster Trinity Park School.

Rev. J. M. Rhodes, President of Littleton Female College.

Rev. J. A. Sharpe, Principal of Stanhope High School.

Rev. J. L. Cuninggim, Director of Correspondence School, Vanderbilt University.

Rev. J. M. Culbreth, student in Vanderbilt University.

Rev. S. E. Mercer, agent seminary for girls at Maxton, N. C.

The Board recommends the following for your adoption:

Whereas, the citizens of Maxton and vicinity have proposed to the

North Carolina Conference to establish and equip a seminary for girls at Maxton, N. C., and to present the same to the North Carolina Conference without any incumbrance or financial responsibility on the part of said Conference, therefore,

Resolved, that we do hereby commend the establishment of such institution, and do appoint the following as trustees: A. J. McKinnon, J. W. Carter, Luther T. Cottingham, Rev. E. McWhorter, Rev. M. Bradshaw, Rev. A. P. Tyer, W. N. Everett, W. H. Neal, W. R. Land, W. H. Humphrey, J. A. Huggins, Frank Page, W. B. Cooper, A. S. Thompson, J. B. Schulken, C. C. Lyon, Rev. S. E. Mercer, Q. K. Nimocks, H. L. Godwin, T. A. Green, F. A. Woodard, F. A. Daniels, Edgar W. Smith, J. A. Green, Rev. G. T. Adams and Rev. J. E. Underwood.

Your Board recommends an assessment of \$3,000 for Greensboro Female College, \$5.000 for Trinity College, the part of this not heretofore directed to be applied toward the creation of a sinking fund to meet our share of the bonded indebtedness of said institution, and \$2,020 for educational extension. REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

We are pleased to note the continued prosperity of the Epworth League throughout Southern Methodism; that its spirit remains steadfast and loyal to the church, its doctrines and polity; and that the past twelve months have witnessed the largest and most satisfactory development of the League idea in all its history.

We are glad to report that the Conference League held last June at Wrightsville Beach, in connection with the Sunday School Institute for the Carolinas, was a success, and we recommend the holding of a League Conference in connection with the Institute the coming year, and authorize the President of the Conference League to arrange for said Conference. Also that District League Conferences be held in connection with District Sunday School Conferences, and where there is

no Sunday School Conference that one day be devoted to the interest of the League at District Conferences.

We most heartily recommend that in those charges in which there are no Epworth Leagues, that as early in the year as is practicable the pastors organize at least one League, and give it their most earnest effort and prayerful attention, believing it will more than repay the most faithful care and attention.

We further recommend wherever practicable the formation of a "Boy's League" under the direct authority of the last General Conference. This is not a new society, but simply an extension of the Junior League idea and opens up a new and very promising field of work. We wish again to urge the organization of Junior Leagues.

We especially desire to call attention to the League Reading Course and our periodical literature, the "Epworth Era." the "Junior Topies Quarterly" and "Helps for the Devotional Department."

We recommend to our chapters and leagues generally the Epworth League columns of the Raleigh *Christian Advocate*, and ask their continuance under the present editorial management.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHANAGE.

Your Committee on the Orphanage beg leave to report that this beloved institution of ours has enjoyed remarkable progress during the past year. We have passed the experimental stage and we feel deeply gratified at the healthful condition the institution now enjoys.

Since the death of our late lamented Superintendent, Rev. J. W. Jenkins, all the interests of the Orphanage have been properly served by our efficient and faithful matron and her assistants and by the Executive Committee. There are ninety-one children now there under our care We are in much need of a Superintendent's residence, a sewerage system and electric lights.

Since our last Conference two members of the Board have died, Mr. L. B. Bynum and Rev. J. W. Jenkins; the one the great founder of our institution, the other a man of warm devotion to the orphanage cause.

We recommend the election of the following as trustees to fill the vacancies caused by these deaths, namely: Mr. R. E. Prince and Mr. S. C. Vann.

We recommend that an assessment be made for the incoming year of an amount equal to ten per cent of the amount assessed for pastor's salary for the year 1906 in each pastoral charge. Provided, that where any Sunday school or individual shall support an orphan or make a private contribution, it is not to be considered a part of the regular assessment.

Your committee has carefully considered the proposition of the Western North Carolina Conference, looking to a union of North Carolina Methodism in the operation of one home for our orphans in the State, which proposition is as follows:

"Whereas, This Conference has no permanent orphanage, and believing that it would be to the advantage of North Carolina Methodism that it should have but one orphanage, we, the Western North Carolina Conference, make the following offer to the North Carolina Conference:

"1st. That we offer to join the North Carolina Conference in the support of the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh, N. C., on equal terms, namely, an assessment in each pastoral charge equal to ten per cent of the pastor's salary, with the privilege of corresponding patronage.

"2d. That as we contribute to the endowment, enlargement and equipment of the institution, this Conference have proportionate representa-

tion on the Board of Trustees.

"3d. That the acceptance of this proposition by the North Carolina Conference will bind this Conference to this action."

And the resolutions submitted by our Orphan Home Trustees in response thereto are as follows:

"Resolved, 1st, That the North Carolina Conference has heard with pleasure the proposition of the Western North Carolina Conference to co-operate in the work of the Methodist Orphanage, and declares itself in favor of a union of the two Conferences in the work.

"2d. That the matter be referred to the Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage, with full power to enter into such an arrangement with the Western North Carolina Conference through its commission as may seem equitable, and that their action be binding upon the North Carolina Conference as soon as accepted by the Western North Carolina Confer-

"3d. That the Trustees of the Orphanage are hereby authorized to have such changes made in the charter as may become necessary in accomplishing this union of the two Conferences in the work of the Orphanage."

Your committee recommends non-concurrence in the foregoing, and submits the following in lieu thereof:

"Resolved, 1st, That we express to the Western North Carolina Conference our hearty appreciation of their interest in the work of the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh, and of their good will as indicated by their proposition to co-operate with us in the support of the Orphanage.

"2d. That we would be glad to accept this proposition, but after due investigation of the present status of our institution-considering especially the aims, purposes and rights granted in its charter, and the limitations of its management and ownership to the North Carolina Conference, and the further fact that gifts and legacies have been received under said charter to the extent of nearly one hundred thousand dollars, and the possibilities of legal difficulties affecting the title to these various properties; considering, too, the difficulties in the way of the control being divided between two Conferences, meeting at different times and places. In view of all these considerations, it seems best that the ownership and control should remain as originally provided in the charter-in the hands of the North Carolina Conference.

"At the same time we would say to our brethren of the Western North Carolina Conference that our doors are open to their children; that we shall be glad to receive their indigent orphans, as far as we have the capacity to care for them, and that if they choose to assess their charges and to contribute to the support of our Orphanage, we shall do our best to care for as many orphans from their territory as may be provided for by the funds received from them.

"We recognize the fact that in their proposition they said nothing about joint ownership, or change in the charter; yet we feel that if we accepted their proposition it would be but fair to grant it to them; and therefore we think best to make this frank statement, which we do in

all brotherly love."

We request that the Bishop appoint Rev. John N. Cole, Superintendent of the Orphanage for the ensuing year, he having been elected by the Board of Trustees.

[Document No. 20.] REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Annual Conference Board of Missions would submit their annual report, as follows:

The communication from the Missionary Secretaries referred by you to the Conference Board is full of encouragement. It is with a feeling of gratitude to Almighty God that we note the great success with which our workers on the foreign field have met during the past year. We are glad also to note the awakening of missionary interest in the church at home. Our people are evidently giving more liberally to the cause of missions and praying more earnestly for the success of the work than ever before. May the encouraging facts presented to us move us to more earnest endeavor than we have hitherto put forth.

From a review of the year's work in our own Conference, we find that we have made progress along all lines. In the mission fields the preachers have been doing faithful work, and God has let His blessings rest upon their labors. Many souls have been saved, and the interests of the church have been cared for. We bespeak for these servants of God an interest in your daily prayers. Many of them are serving in most difficult fields, but they are doing a work for the church the value of which it would be difficult to over-estimate.

The collections for missions in our Conference during the past year have been in advance of any preceding year. One year ago we reported \$15,678.49 raised for Foreign Missions. This year we report \$16,260.05. an increase of \$581.56. Last year we reported \$11,688.24 raised for Domestic Missions. This year we report \$11,866.07, an increase of \$177.73. Amount raised above assessment for Foreign Missions, \$822.05: for Domestic Missions, \$366.07; total excess, \$1,188.12. Last year. while the total amount of the assesements upon the Conference was paid. three districts failed to pay their assessments in full. This year every district has paid its assessment in full. The reports show that 147 charges have paid their assessment in full, and of this number 56 have paid more than the assessment. Only 27 charges failed to pay the assessment in full. When we think of the almost unprecedented failure in crops in many parts of the Conference, this report appears the more significant. It indicates faithful work on the part of pre-iding elders and preachers in charge, and a growing spirit of liberality, even to the extent of self-denial, on the part of our people.

There are many indications of decided progress in our Conference which we would like to mention. In the Durham District every charge had paid its assessment in full before the end of the second quarter. The Rockingham District has overpaid the assessment for missions by \$622.40. Hay Street Church, Fayetteville, has begun the support of one missionary, and the Fayetteville District has assumed the support of another. Centenary Church, New Bern, has pledged \$2,500 for Foreign

Missions next year, thus providing for the support of three or four missionaries. We believe that these facts indicate a deeper interest in the cause of missions on the part of preachers and people than has ever existed before.

In the cultivation of this missionary spirit we believe that the holding of District Missionary Institutes early in the year has had a very important part. Last year an institute was held in each district. The Board would request that the same be done again this year. To arrange for these, and to consider other matters pertaining to our work, the presiding elders are asked to meet with the Executive Committee of the Board in Raleigh on Tuesday night, January 1.

We would call special attention to the work of the Young People's Department. To quote the words of the secretaries, this department "means systematic and persistent educational effort looking to the preparation of the youth of the church for the responsibilities they will be called upon to bear in the evangelization of the world." Rev. Ed. F. Cook, a man of "experience acquired in the pastorate and presiding eldership," has been selected by the General Board to take charge of this department. He will be glad to furnish upon application literature relating to Mission Study Classes and Sunday School Missionary Societies. We would urge every preacher to post himself on this work and call the attention of his people to the same.

We are glad to note the success with which the Missionary Training School is meeting. This institution fills a most important place in our church, and we bespeak for it your most hearty support. In connection with this school there will be conducted during the first three weeks in February a Preacher's Institute, which we would commend. We have had representatives from our Conference at this institute during the past two winters, and they bear witness to the benefit to be derived from attendance. It is to be hoped that a number of our preachers on Domestic Mission charges and others will arrange to attend the institute this year.

We shall depend upon the assessment being overpaid wherever it is possible.

The last General Conference made provision for the employment of a Missionary Evangelist. We believe that the interest of our work calls for the employment of such an evangelist, and we therefore place in nomination for that position Rev. L. L. Nash.

The Board requests the Bishop to appoint R. H. Willis, Conference Missionary Secretary.

It is with sorrow that we note the death during the year of one of the most valuable lay members of the Board, viz., Dr. J. F. Miller.

SESSIONS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE.

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in February, 1837. In 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences, In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference. So now the two Conferences embrace the whole of North Carolina.
